Judge rejects lawsuit to bar attack by Bush

WASHINGTON — A federal judge refused Thursday to bar President Bush from attacking Iraq without the consent of Congress, saying the issue of war and peace in the Persian Gulf is not ripe for a constitutional verdict.

But U.S. District Judge Harold H. Greene did affirm the Justice Department's contention that the president has sweeping, unilateral authority to conduct a military offensive.

In the end, however, 54 members of Congress, virtually all of them liberal Democrats, did not get the bottom-line ruling they sought: a court order barring Bush from taking the offensive in the Persian Gulf region without first obtaining a declaration of war from Congress.

In a 29-page opinion rejecting the lawmakers' request for a preliminary injunction, Greene said the lawsuit is premature because Congress views an institution not declared its views; Bush has not yet brought the nation to the brink of war and there is no constitutional impasse between Congress and the president.

Bush also indicated that, if those conditions are met, the members of Congress would have a sound legal case. He said that they have legal standing to sue and that the U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf region are "of such magnitude and significance" as to make it "clear that congressional approval is required if Congress desires to become involved."

Greene rejected the Justice Department's argument that the president as commander-in-chief of the armed forces has sweeping powers to direct military actions and decide when a war begins without interference from Congress or the courts.

"If the executive had the sole power to determine that any particular military operation, no matter how vast, does not constitute war-making, but only an offensive military attack, the congressional power to declare war will be at the mercy of a semantic decision by the executive," Greene wrote.

"Such an interpretation would evade the plain language of the Constitution, and it cannot stand."

Greene also said courts have "the power and the ability to make the factual and legal determination of whether this nation's military actions constitute war for the purposes of the constitutional war clause."

Local option tax opposition eases

BOISE — Idaho's leading business association is dropping its opposition to the campaign of county and municipal leaders to secure legislative authority for local option sales or income taxes.

Because of limitations on property taxes and state income and sales taxes that are higher than the national average, we recognize that cities and counties have difficulty providing many of their traditional services," the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry said.

The association's membership, representing the bulk of Idaho's business community, also suggested support for some kind of scheme that would begin returning at least a portion of surplus revenues to taxpayers, apparently in the form of a rebate.

Twin Falls officials, like those in many other Idaho cities, would like to have an option to asking voters to approve local option taxes to fund municipal services.

In its annual statement of the policies it backs heading into the winter legislative session, the association urged local and state officials to look for other revenue-generating alternatives for cities and counties before settling on any local option tax plan.

"We encourage supporters of local option taxing authority to investigate amendments or inequities in the current tax structure, especially property taxes, before cre-

ating new authority for local option sales or income taxes," the policy statement said.

Local government leaders have been facing increased demands for services, many mandated by the federal government, at a time when their primary source of income, the property tax, remains restricted. Although much of the anti-property tax One Percent Initiative has been eliminated, the 5 percent limit on annual property tax increase continues to hamper efforts to meet those demands.

National tax comparisons provided by the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho show that while state, personal and corporate income taxes rank in the middle among the 50 states, property tax burdens in Idaho ranked well into the bottom half of the states.

Still, Gov. Cecil Andrus is proposing using about half the estimated \$40 million state surplus for property-tax relief, and government leaders have generally steered clear of efforts to loosen the constraints on local increases in property taxes. They all maintain that no matter what the comparative burden is, property taxes remain the most detested among Idahoans.

IACI said that if no changes in the current tax system can be made, any local option tax plan must be conditioned on the authority being extended only to cities and counties and limited to general sales or personal income taxes. The plan should also require any local option tax to be approved by majority vote of those affected, con-

Protection for snails step closer

TWIN FALLS — A group of small snails found in the Snake River has moved one step closer to protection under the Endangered Species Act.

The federal Interior Department has signed the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's order that proposes to list the species as endangered.

That means federal agencies must confer with Fish and Wildlife officials before approving projects that could harm the five species of mollusks.

But the listing won't necessarily stop all development, said Jay Gore of Fish and Wildlife's Boise field office. "If it's done with the snails in mind."

The order will be published in the Federal Register, opening a 60-day public comment period. The service will consider the comments and issue a final listing within one year.

Fish and Wildlife wants endangered species listing for four species of snails and one limpet. The mollusks are found only in the free-flowing waters of a 40-mile stretch of the Snake in the Thousand Springs area of large adjacent springs, according to biologists.

The species in the proposed listing include the Blue Rapids snail, the Utah valley snail, the Snake River physa snail, the Idaho spring snail or Lanx and the Barbary Springs limpet or Lunx n. sp., a mollusk with a cone-shaped shell and a thick, fleshy foot.

Secret leaks:

American off to space station

WASHINGTON — Somewhere in the United States, an unidentified company is sitting on what it had hoped would remain a big secret.

It has contracted with the Soviet Union to send an American to the space station Mir.

The secret is trickling out, but the company isn't ready to say much. It had hoped to make a big, splashy announcement in January.

"We executed a contract with NPO Energia, which is the manned part of the Soviet space program," said Art Dula, whose Space Commerce Corp. in Houston markets Soviet space services in the United States. What company is paying for it and why?

Dula wouldn't say, explaining that secrecy is part of the contract.

The Soviets — for a hefty price — taken passengers of a variety of nationalities aboard their space station. They have included a Frenchman, a Cuban, an East German, and, this month, Japanese journalist Toyohiro Akiyama.

But there's never been an American.

The weekly newspaper Space News on Monday was the first to reveal the secret, with only the sketchy information that the unknown company's cost will be more than the \$12 million the Tokyo Broadcasting Service paid to the Glavkosmos space agency. Other news accounts then repeated that information.

Dula's associate, Bill Wirin of Colorado Springs, Colo., said Space Commerce Corp. signed the deal in Moscow on Nov. 30.

Agency tightens limits on nuclear radiation

ROCKVILLE, Md. — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission on Thursday tightened radiation-exposure limits for nuclear plant workers and residents near atomic power facilities.

The revision was the first in more than 30 years.

The agency said the new regulations, by reflecting recent scientific studies, will provide an extra "margin of safety." Yet, the commission said, the current standards do not put workers at risk.

Anti-nuclear groups immediately criticized the new regulation, which does not

take effect for two years. Critics argued that the tightened limits still put people at too high a risk of cancer and are based on outdated health information.

The new rules require that, by January 1993, the nuclear industry assure that:

• The maximum exposure to the general population from atomic facilities be no more than 100 millisieverts a year, a fifth of what is now allowed.


• Atomic workers be exposed to no more than 5 rems of radiation a year.

Plant operators be required to adopt policies keeping radiation doses "as low as reasonably achievable" instead of merely being urged to do so.

Drunk driving fatalities down over 7 years

ATLANTA (AP) — Drunk driving deaths have decreased 12 percent in the last seven years, probably due to stepped-up law enforcement and public awareness, said a report released Thursday.

In 1989, 39.2 percent of traffic deaths involved at least one person who was legally drunk, down from 46.3 percent in 1982, the federal Centers for Disease Control said in the report.

In actual numbers, 17,849 Americans died in such accidents in 1989, down 12 percent from 20,356 in 1982.

Similarly, 24.2 percent of all the drivers who were involved in fatal crashes in 1989 were legally drunk, down from 30 percent in 1982. The numbers showed 14,644 drunken drivers involved in fatal crashes in 1989, down 13 percent from 16,793 in 1982.

Reasons for the improvement may include changes in state laws penalizing drunken driving, increased enforcement, higher drinking ages and increased public intolerance for drunken drivers, the Atlanta-based CDC concluded.

all biological information during the comment period, but will accept comments on other issues as well. If no new biological information is uncovered during the comment period, the service will proceed with its plans to protect the species. But if data show the species are not threatened, the snails would not be listed.

Retiring Idaho-Sen. James McClure fears listing the snails as endangered could hurt Idaho agriculture because Fish and Wildlife included water quality as a possible threat to the snails. But the reference to water quality was vague, McClure's natural resources specialist Carl Haywood said.

Haywood could not be reached for comment Thursday and MCEU was not in his Washington, D.C., office.

The Fish and Wildlife staff recommended listing the snails as endangered because of threats to the mollusks in the Thousand Springs stretch of the river, primarily from two proposed power plants and a trout farm.

The agency said two proposed hydroelectric projects are threatening the species: the A.J. Wiley Project proposed above Bliss and the small Elk Dike project below Bliss.

The snails are remnants of what was once a diverse population of 90 mollusk species that lived in what was once Lake Idaho during the Pleistocene period some 12,000 years ago. The Barbary Springs limpet is believed to be the only representative of its genus left in the state. Others of that genus have been found only as fossils from Lake Idaho.

Lanx has been found only in Box Canyon Creek and Barbary Springs, biologists say.

Three of the species have been found in Box Canyon north of Buhl, where Boise developer Earl M. Hardy has proposed building a water diversion that would take much of the water in lower Box Canyon Creek and move it to a trout hatchery at the mouth of neighboring Blind Canyon.

Final listing of the snails would probably forestall Idaho Power's plans for development at the Wiley site and, perhaps also, at Kanaka Rapids, Idaho. Power spokesman Jim Tancy said.

The utility plans to consult with Fish and Wildlife to find out what possible alternatives might be, he said.

dicted at a general election, with the project to be financed by the tax and the period the tax will be in effect clearly spelled out.

On a state level, the organization continued to view the overall tax structure as one of the most equitable and balanced in the nation, making it clear that no attempt should be made to shift tax liability within it.

With the beginning-state economy producing unanticipated tax rev-

enue surpluses in the last three budgets and the likelihood of a fourth next spring, IACI expressed concern that the consistent cash windfalls will eventually be used to undermine continuing government expenditures instead of limited to one-time, nonrecurring purchases. "It therefore seems appropriate to consider adding to our informal fiscal policy a method of capping state revenues and/or funding those funds back to those that paid them," IACI said.

Weather summary

Low clouds with light snow and fog prevailed through much of Thursday across the Gem State.

The fog and snow combination often reduced visibilities to one-half mile or less, mainly in the south and southeast during the afternoon.

Along the eastern border and north into the panhandle the clouds and fog were breaking up enough to show glimpses of blue sky about mid-day.

Fairfield's 20.9 was the heaviest precipitation report listed. Ketchum reported an inch of new snow and Stanley reported two inches of fresh snow with four on the ground.

The widespread low clouds and snow-cover held temperatures mostly in the 20s and 30s around Idaho Thursday.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 40 degrees at Riggins; Stanley reported the coldest at 1 degree below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 84 degrees at Birmingham, Alice and McAlester, Texas. The lowest was 6 below zero at Warroad, Minn.

Heavy snow blankets southern Rockies, spreads east

Heavy snow fell in the southern Rockies and in the high country to the west, with light rain and snow on the western Plains and rain was scattered from Mississippi to Maine.

An upper-level weather disturbance produced heavy snow in the northern six states of New Mexico from Wednesday night into early Thursday. Totals ranged up to 10 inches at Angel Fire, with 6 inches at Red River and 7 inches at Alamogordo, N.M.

It blanketed parts of southeastern Colorado during the night with half a foot of new snow at Cuchara.

The same weather disturbance brought snow to the mountains of Arizona. Totals in the White Mountains ranged up to 6 inches at the Sunrise ski area. Flagstaff received 4 inches of snow.

The snow ended over Arizona by mid-morning. Snow showers continued to produce some light snow in Colorado

and New Mexico and a few rain showers extended over the southern high Plains.

A winter storm watch was posted through Friday for the mountains of southwestern Colorado, where up to a foot of new snow was possible.

Light showers also extended from western Kansas and southeastern Colorado to southeastern Kansas and northeastern Oklahoma at midday. Light snow was reported in southwestern Kansas, freezing snow was reported in southeastern Colorado, and sleet was reported in northern Oklahoma.

Showers developing along a cold front in the eastern part of the region were scattered from northern Mississippi through West Virginia to northern Maine. Freezing rain was reported during the night in north-central and northeastern Vermont.

In the Northwest, snow showers developed along a cold front and were scattered from eastern Washington state and western Idaho into northeastern Nevada at midday.

Credit could be golden harvest for farmers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The \$1 billion farm credit extended to the Soviet Union could buy most of the Kansas wheat crop this year.

Or all the corn grown in Ohio. Or all the soybeans produced in Missouri and Mississippi.

And you could be that producer of oats, barley, rice, dairy products and dozens of other farm goods will be clamoring for Moscow's attention, too.

"Wheat could be the majority of it, I would think," said Barry Jenkins of the National Association of Wheat Growers. "We may have something going for us because they need some flour real quick."

"But there's going to be people lined up along with us," he noted.

Citing the "tough times, difficult times" facing the Soviet people, Pres-

ident Bush announced Wednesday he was waiving through June 1991 the longstanding trade restrictions and long-standing Soviet Union credit lines of \$1 billion for farm products and \$300 million for manufactured goods.

Ironically, Bush's announcement proved beneficial on the market, because the grain trade had expected the president to give the Soviets an even higher credit limit.

Grain futures opened sharply lower Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade, and one analyst said the credit package was disappointing, that traders had expected a figure in the range of \$1.5 billion to \$3 billion, the level urged earlier by Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan.

The Agriculture Department will work with Soviet officials to work

out details of the credit package, including schedules for financing and payment. The USDA underwrites the loans, which are made by private lenders under the department's export credit programs.

Theoretically, if a four-way split could be arranged, with each interest group getting a \$250 million piece of the pie, it could mean Soviet purchases of:

• About 105 million bushels of wheat, based on a recent U.S. farm price average of \$2.39 per bushel.

• About 45 million bushels of soybeans at the recent average U.S. farm price of \$5.51 per bushel.

• And miscellaneous purchases with the remaining \$250 million of rice, oats, barley, dairy products, meat and various processed food items.

• About 114 million bushels of corn at an average farm price of \$2.19 per bushel.

• About 45 million bushels of soybeans at the recent average U.S. farm price of \$5.51 per bushel.

Galileo provides new view of Earth, moon

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Pictures by the Galileo spacecraft as it boomeranged past Earth on its way to Jupiter show icy Antarctica and a giant meteorite impact crater on the far side of the moon.

The first photos of the back side of the moon were made by Apollo astronauts two decades ago.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration released three photographs Thursday as Galileo sped away from Earth, snapping more pictures of its home planet from a distance of 2.33 million miles.

"It's a new perspective. It's a beautiful planet," said Andy Ingersoll, a California Institute of Technology researcher and member of Galileo's imaging team at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

"This is the first time we've had a chance to use a spacecraft designed to explore another planet to come back and look at our own Earth and moon as if we were alien observers," said Torrence Johnson, Galileo's chief scientist.

"In the process, we're learning some new scientific things about our own world and its companion, but perhaps more importantly, it's providing us a different perspective on our 'own home' planet as a fragile world."

On Saturday, Galileo swooped 597

miles above the southwest Atlantic Ocean, using Earth's gravity as a slingshot to help expand the spacecraft's orbit around the sun so it can reach Jupiter in 1995. If used for the same purpose last February and will fly past Earth again in December 1992.

The planetary encounters are meant solely to help propel Galileo on its \$1.4 billion mission to Jupiter, but scientists took the opportunity to use the spacecraft to study Venus and Earth in dress rehearsals for exploring Jupiter.

Flying past Earth made Galileo the first planetary craft to approach Earth from interplanetary space and the first spacecraft equipped with modern instruments to study the far side of the moon, which is always pointed away from Earth.

"We're going to learn a lot about the geology of the back side of the moon," said Clark Chapman, a Galileo researcher from the Planetary Science Institute in Tucson, Ariz.

"It's been a fantastic lunar mission already."

One of Galileo's pictures shows Mare Orientale, a 550-mile-wide meteorite impact crater. Because of the way the moon orbits Earth, only five-eighths of its surface can be seen from Earth. Mare Orientale is on the moon's western edge.

Bennett: No to top GOP job

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former drug policy director William Bennett on Thursday spurned President Bush's offer to be chairman of the Republican National Committee after White House lawyers told him he'd have to give up a book contract and other outside income.

"I didn't take a vow of poverty," Bennett told reporters after giving Chief of Staff John Sununu his letter declining the offer just two weeks after he'd accepted it.

Bennett indicated he was initially told by the White House that his plans to write two books and accept payments for speeches would not present a problem.

However, Bennett said, "the ad-

vice changed." He said he was told by White House counsel Boyden Gray that accepting the outside income while serving as RNC chairman would violate the Ethics in Government Act.

The surprise development was an embarrassment to both Bush and Bennett and sent the White House scurrying in search for a new candidate to take over day-to-day operation of the party from the ailing Lee Atwater.

Administration and Republican sources said that Secretary of Transportation Samuel Skinner and defeated Sen. Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn., were among those being considered.

Nation**Jolly season may miss retailers**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retail sales declined 0.1 percent last month, the government said Thursday in a report analysts said pointed to a bleak holiday shopping season.

"I'm looking for a gloomy Christmas," said economist David Jones of Aubrey G. Lanson & Co., a New York securities dealer. "The consumer has become extremely selective, buying practical gifts such as clothing, and waiting for a bargain even on those."

The report "implies that consumers are being very cautious," agreed Sung Won Sohn, an economist with the Norwest Corp. in Minneapolis. "People are not buying non-disposable goods."


Sales totaled a seasonally adjusted \$151.6 billion, down from \$151.8 billion in October and the first decline since a 0.1 percent drop in May. The Commerce Department reported.

Economist Rosalind Wells of the National-Retail Federation in New York said she has not seen much reason to expect the Christmas shopping pace to pick up soon.

Analysts said retail activity would have been even more sluggish except for widespread promotions and other incentives to lure shoppers. While markdowns might drag up sales in one month, they tend to depress them in following months.

"They're borrowing sales from the future," Sohn explained.

Gains were recorded in sales at grocery stores, up 0.5 percent; apparel stores, 0.8 percent; restaurants



expensive products expected to last more than three years — fell 1.4 percent after rising 0.6 percent in October.

Automobile sales plummeted 1.3 percent, reversing a 1.4 percent October increase that some analysts said had come largely from fleet sales. Excluding automobiles, sales inched up 0.2 percent last month.

While purchases of furniture and other home furnishings rose 0.3 percent, sales of building materials fell 2.6 percent.

Although purchases of nondurable goods increased 0.5 percent, general merchandise and department store sales dropped 0.5 percent.

Sandra Shaber, economist with the Futures Group in Washington, said general merchandise sales are a good barometer of consumer sentiment. "And it's telling us that it's weak." "It's interesting that department-store sales for the last three months over year-ago levels are up less than 2.0 percent," she said. "If it's adjusted for inflation, it's down for the year and that's ominous."



U.S. Ambassador Howell leaves Baghdad for flight home a hero

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nat Howell, U.S. ambassador to Kuwait, is coming home a hero, a symbol of America's resistance to a tyrant's coercion.

"He drank the same dirty water, he slept outside with the flies and the heat," said Jack Rinchhart, an engineer from St. Louis, Mo., and one of the last to leave the embassy. "He's a hero like John Wayne."

W. Nathaniel Howell left Baghdad on Thursday or what was said to be the last chartered plane carrying foreigners from Iraq and occupied Kuwait.

Howell was trapped in Kuwait when Iran invaded the country Aug. 2. For three months, he defied Saddam Hussein's orders to close the diplomatic compound, which had been surrounded by Iraqi troops.

The Bush administration this week ordered Howell to evacuate the embassy, saying he had completed his job by helping U.S. citizens leave Kuwait.

The U.S. Embassy in Iraq remains open, but Ambassador April Glaspie had left the country on vacation three days before the surprise invasion. The charge d'affaires is running the embassy in her absence, and the administration says it will remain open and staffed.

Howell was packing his bags, closing out a three-year stint in Kuwait, when Iraqi troops stormed over the border. His wife had already left for home.

After Howell refused to leave the embassy, the compound was deprived of electricity and running water. The eight diplomats and 19 American civilians survived on canned tuna and rice. They planted gardens and drank the water from the swimming pool.

The 50-year-old Howell, clad in an orange shirt and Virginia Tech shorts, helped shovel snow when the Americans dug a latrine trench and a well. When they struck water good enough for washing, they showed their defiance to the Iraqi guards by washing their cars.

Christmas can cheer, even in gulf

IN EASTERN SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — The only thing white about Christmas here is the desert sand.

Families and loved ones are far away for the American military personnel deployed in Operation Desert Shield.

Outward Christmas displays are buried so as not to offend the Islamic sensibilities of the Saudi Americans.

Twinkling lights don't go with military tents.

It's enough to give the toughest troops the Christmas blues. But a psychologist says Desert Shield won't be completely barren of holiday cheer.

"There will be kind of a blue-haze over everything. It's kind of a funk," said Capt. Frank Mullins, 54, of Mobile, Ala., a psychologist at the U.S. Navy's Fleet No. 5 Hospital.

"But the average person will find a lot of solace being among friends, sharing Christmas dinner, singing a couple of carols," he said.

What helps people get through the holidays are "personal" things sent from home: a card, a trinket, a snapshot, Christmas music, yule decorations, Mullins said.

Army Maj. Doug Brule of Chicago received a candy cane house complete with fake snow and an artificial tree from his wife.

Navy Petty Officer Diane Escobar of Austin, Texas, has a nativity scene, and a paratrooper in the Army's 82nd Airborne Division was mailed the artificial tree his father had in Vietnam. "The troops here should try to have as normal a Christmas as they can—with as many customs and traditions as they can get from home," Mullins said.

People are upset, but I get me wrong—if you don't feel upset, maybe there's something wrong with you," he said. "They may get depressed." They may cry a little bit. But they'll be fine the next day.

"We don't expect to see overflow with pay-as-you-eat restaurants on Christmas Day." What's also absent in Saudi Arabia is spiked eggnog and alcoholic spirits because liquor is banned in Saudi Arabia.

Howell had to keep underground links open to the hundreds of Americans in Kuwait who were in hiding, afraid of being captured and used by the Iraqis as human shields.

Meanwhile, Howell had "a hope of a peaceful solution," said Ted Wilkinson, president of the American Foreign Service Association.

Wilkinson said "it was the kind of discipline you'd expect" from an experienced field officer who was also posted to Egypt during the 1967 Six-Day War and to Beirut during Lebanon's mid-1970s civil war.

Howell left Kuwait only after being assured that all Americans who wanted to leave the country had been allowed to go.

Howell and his staff "performed

courageously," said White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater. "They deserve to be taken out."

The ambassador, accompanied by Barbara Bodine, deputy chief of mission, and three other diplomats, were the last Americans to evacuate Kuwait City compound. They were to arrive in the United States on Friday.

Rinchhart, the American engineer, described Howell as "a tremendous leader. I told him I trusted my life to him."

Howell is reportedly thinking

about retiring after 25 years in the foreign service, but if he decides to stay on, it's likely that his future will be bright.

"He performed with distinction and he should be recognized," Wilkinson said.

Glaspie, the first American woman ambassador to an Arab country, has been in the United States since the invasion. And in marked contrast to Howell's triumphant return home, Glaspie has faced criticism.

She met Saddam a week before the invasion and, according to tran-

scripts released by Iraq, praised the Iraqi president for his "extraordinary efforts" to rebuild his country. Glaspie reassured Saddam that the United States took no official position on Iraq's border dispute with Kuwait.

The transcripts, never challenged by the State Department, showed that Glaspie didn't respond directly to Saddam's threats of terrorism. She stressed that the Bush administration opposed economic sanctions against Iraq.





Make sure tax dollars for education go to educate kids

Changing public school finance system is a little like a Russian novel: It's long, it's boring and in the end everyone gets killed.

That's the position in which Idaho, like a growing number of states, finds itself these days as it attempts to ward off legal challenges to the way it pays for public education.

Two suits are pending: one from a group of larger school districts that claim smaller districts generally get higher per-pupil funding; and the second from a consortium of smaller districts that insist they can't afford to give their students the same quality of education they would receive in larger districts.

Both groups, citing the state Constitution that mandates free and equal education in Idaho, want more state funding, which would have to come by and large from state income taxes.

But with money comes control.

In California, the state finances most public education, and since it pays the bills it makes local decisions — everything from personnel policy to purchasing. Those decisions are heavily influenced by the California Legislature, the state's powerful teachers union and other special interests.

Moreover, although per-pupil spending is virtually equal in 96 percent of school districts across California, the overall level of school fund-

ing in the state has slipped sharply.

That's because in California only one level of government — the state — finances public education, and the state can't make ends meet.

Local control of schools bolstered by heavy reliance on property tax is a cherished tradition.

But property taxpayers in Idaho won't — and can't be expected to — raise their taxes more to support public schools.

Clearly, the best answer for Idaho is keeping local control while increasing state funding. But we need to make sure that tax dollars raised for education actually go to educate kids.

In Twin Falls County, for example, there are eight school districts and seven superintendents, all of whom earn more than \$25,000 a year, to educate 11,773 kids. If there were just one county superintendent, or if there were fewer districts, how much more money would be available for schools?

Idaho is already walking a tightrope between a strained budget and a tax revolt. Court-ordered reforms may do little more than diminish the quality of good schools.

If we're really serious about eliminating unequal funding of education and maintaining local control, we're going to have to be smarter about the way we spend our money.

The year was 1973. Three glorious vacation days and a 20-pound turkey simmering in someone else's oven. What more could a busy young wife want for Christmas?

Never mind the fact that the turkey was 500 miles away, or the fact that I would have to work until 6 p.m. on Christmas Eve. My husband and I were going home for the holidays. It was all that mattered.

And so, on Christmas Eve night, in a snow-storm soggy enough to dampen the spirits of St. Nick himself, we piled some half-wrapped gifts into our half-dead car and set off down a long winter's trip.

Two hundred miles down the road, a wheel fell off the car. We were stranded; with only a very small town nearby, and the good Lord, one resident mechanic with a tow truck.

My husband and I huddled around a tiny space heater in the shabby gas station, spent the rest of that night apologizing to the mechanic for taking him away from his family on Christmas Eve.

"Don't you never mind, kids," he said. "I've been lookin' for a way to get out of that mudhouse for 30 years." Then he added, "The wife's fruitcake is terrible; too many blasted green things in it."

As the night wore on, the three of us talked about families, about holidays, about the significance of the very first Christmas Day, a day marked by physical discomfort for more

severe than the type we were feeling in that dirty little barn of a gas station.

"What makes you kids want to fight this snow tonight anyway?" the mechanic wondered, but we couldn't really answer his question. Not fully. Not then. We're too young, too carefree, too oblivious of the fact that the homemade Christmas we were speeding toward would be the last one of its kind that we would ever experience.

Soon after that Christmas in Illinois, my father got sick. After he died, Great Grandmother

and a favorite aunt, who could make the kind of mincemeat pie you could talk about all year long, also passed away. Then came the inevitable shifting of the generations.

My husband and I have our own home now, and our own children. The Christmas turkey now simmers in our oven, and the cranberry juice is spilled on our carpet. The giggles and warmth are still there, too, as the members of our family make brand new memories to carry with them through the years ahead.

And yet, Christmas 1973 will always be my extra special one. For that was the Christmas when I began to understand — that the trappings are not nearly as important as they sometimes seem, and that life's deepest meaning is often found in places where we least expect to be.

No matter that the future may hold, I will always remember 1973's Christmas interlude, an interlude that sent three people home to their families a little better able to look beyond the "greenies" in their fruitcakes.

Bush administration's 'off-budget' Persian Gulf policy is off the beam

WASHINGTON — One of the administration's more imaginative acts in the Persian Gulf crisis was the decision, announced deadpan early in the game, that the cost would be "off-budget." Presto. The fiction of a no-cost war.

The cost of the Persian Gulf operation was officially off-limits in negotiations with Congress over the deficit-reduction package. Nobody could estimate the cost at that point, so it was decided to ignore it.

But now the first real payment on the bill is coming due, \$30 billion for 1991, according to latest administration estimates. If there is no fighting.

And if it comes to war, Congress has been told, the cost probably would come to about \$1 billion a day for as long as the fighting lasted.

Question: Who's going to pay? Answer:

Right now: nobody knows.

This is one example of the kind of head-in-the-sand psychology that the Persian Gulf ad-

bombed. Those assertions, too, have been shredded off.

In the passionate drive for war that seems to infect the White House, these issues have received little or no attention.

Clearly, money is not the most important issue in the question of whether to go to war to drive Saddam Hussein out of Kuwait. The big issues are the potential human costs, in deaths and injuries, and the prospects for bringing stability to the region.

But the way the money issue has been brushed aside does tell something about the peculiar atmosphere of unreality that seems to hang over the Persian Gulf debate.

Only two members of Congress seem to be thinking about the dollars and cents: Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Illinois, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, and Sen. Jim Sasser, D-Tenn., chairman of the Budget Committee.

Both have suggested that an income tax surtax may be necessary to finance the Per-

sian Gulf operation. Rostenkowski said costs are mounting so rapidly that "they have to be paid for."

But the mere thought appeared to enrage White House Chief of Staff John H. Sununu, who said Democrats were trying to use the Persian Gulf crisis as an excuse to raise taxes.

Democrats are "looking for a cause to justify a tax increase," Sununu said. He said the National Press Club that Bush had been forced to pay "tax ransom" in the budget negotiations, "but he will not be forced to pay the tax ransom again."

The message was clear: Bush was sucked into the budget agreement, which requires some tax increases, but he has no intention of allowing the Persian Gulf or anything else to justify new tax increases.

That was good news. If we go to war, it's going to be free. Well, this is the season to believe in Santa Claus, so it must be time to leave out cookies for George Bush.

Lyndon B. Johnson refused to raise taxes to

finance the Vietnam War and the country paid a price in runaway inflation. The consumer price index increased by more than 400 percent from 1964 to 1970.

We're still paying that price. The inflation rate has never gone back to the low levels of the early 1960s, before Vietnam.

The real question, however, is why can't we apply the "off-budget" rule to some of our other national problems?

Why not put the huge costs of Medicare "off-budget"? And what about welfare payments?

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus, but finding the money for the Persian Gulf isn't likely to be as easy as simply not counting it. In fact, if we go to war, it's just possible that George Bush's read-my-lips-no-new-taxes pledge will wind up as one of the great jokes of the past decade.

Idaho**Driver sent to dry out strikes couple head-on**

LEWISTON (AP) — An attorney for Bonner County insists county officials were only doing their duty when they permitted an alcoholic inmate to drive himself to the Alcohol Treatment Unit at Orofino.

Larry Dawson detoured on his way to Orofino from Sandpoint, and his pickup hit head-on a vehicle occupied by Grangeville couple Floyd and Betty Litchfield, court records say.

All three survived the March 3, 1988 crash, but received serious injuries. Dawson had a blood-alcohol content of 0.34, more than triple the legal limit of 0.10, according to court documents.

The Litchfields sued Bonner County, alleging officials violated their duty to the public by not ensuring Dawson did not drive while under their control. A Lewiston jury trial began Tuesday, with 2nd District Judge E. D. Ponack presiding.

"There were two people who could have prevented those injuries from occurring. First of those was Larry Dawson," said Boise attorney James Davis, representing Bonner County, in opening remarks.

The second person who has responsibility is Judge Heise. Judge Heise released Larry Dawson on the morning of March 3, 1988. That was her province," he added.

He was referring to Bonner County Magistrate Debra Heise, who ordered Dawson to attend a one-month alcohol treatment program at Orofino as part of his sentence. Dawson was to be given credit

against his 60-day jail term for attending the treatment.

Davis said evidence shows the judge does not order Bonner County jail personnel to transport people to Orofino because she believes county residents should not have to pay for it.

"The only way it (Bonner County) could have been responsible for this accident is if it disregarded Judge Heise's order," Davis said. "We conclude that we had no choice but to release Larry Dawson. We conclude that we couldn't transport Larry Dawson."

But Darrel Aherin, representing the Litchfields, said the county should take the responsibility, and said the wreck was foreseeable.

Dawson was serving a jail term for driving while intoxicated. This was his fourth or fifth offense, he said.

Aherin said Dawson checked out of the jail at 6:30 a.m. on March 3. No one even called the Orofino treatment unit to say when Dawson had left, Aherin added. The wreck occurred at 3:30 p.m. near Lapwai.

"If you send an alcoholic to a place to dry out for 30 days...some 200 miles unsupervised in his own vehicle, he is going to consume alcohol," Aherin said. "It's foreseeable that he is going to drink and drive, and he is going to have a wreck."

Some alternatives are taking a bus or having deputies or another person drive them, he said.

Attorney named Bannock prosecutor

POCATELLO (AP) — Pocatello attorney Bill Bacon will succeed Larry EchoHawk as Bannock County prosecutor.

The Bannock County Commission on Wednesday picked Bacon for the \$43,000 per year job, over the recommendation of the Democratic Party Central Committee.

EchoHawk was elected attorney general last month. He said earlier he expected to resign around the first of the year.

He will be sworn in Jan. 7 to start a four-year term.

The attorney general pay goes to \$67,500 per year effective with the new terms.

School reforms looming

TWIN FALLS — After challenges to the state's educational funding formula are decided in court, Idaho will have the opportunity to become a national leader in educational reform.

So said Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, vice chairman of the House Education committee, at a Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce breakfast Thursday at which seven legislators fielded questions from the business and civic community leaders.

Year-round schooling, longer school days and consolidation are some of the reforms that could follow court rulings on two suits filed by school districts concerned with the uniformity and fairness of the existing state funding formula for public schools.

"I don't know how many of those changes will take place, but there will be a real window of opportunity there," Jones said.

Jones predicted that the courts will find the formula unfair and instruct the Legislature to fix it, with some or no guidelines. When that happens, at least a year from now, change will happen.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, said educational reform takes more than "fiddling with structure." It takes a change in perception by the public that "education comes first."

If teachers are paid to keep students after school a couple of hours for athletics, why not pay them to keep students two more hours to teach them become productive citizens, Noh asked.

"Those are the kinds of things that have to happen and I think will happen," Noh said.

Jones cautioned that a change in the funding formula will cost "big money."

In Montana, he said, change to that state's formula meant a \$100 million increase in education's budget, and in Kentucky, the price tag is \$1.2 billion over two years, Jones said.

"And folks, that's new taxes out of your pockets," Jones said.

An expanded, unified and more efficient community college system is also in the works, Noh said. An interim legislative committee studying the system wants to see a college formed in Idaho Falls, followed by one in the Treasure Valley, he

Gooding teachers sign contract, end 3 months at bargaining table

GOODING — School trustees voted this week to ratify a new contract agreement with Gooding teachers.

The contract has a base salary of \$16,900 and will cost the district \$200,000 more this year than last year for certified teacher salaries, Superintendent James Cobble said.

After three months of negotiations, teachers voted in November to accept this salary offer from the district. The vote was

60 in favor and four against.

In related business, Cobble said the Gooding School District can expect to receive about \$54,000 less than anticipated in state funding.

This will have a substantial negative impact on the district's \$3,015,885 budget, he said.

Public school enrollment statewide has increased, so there is less money available per student, Cobble said.

Most of the Gooding budget is for fixed costs, so it will be very difficult to find where to cut \$54,000, he said.

"You don't turn the thermostat down, you don't eliminate contracts you're obligated to and you don't stop the yellow bus from moving," Cobble said. "We may have to make the cuts in next year's budget."

He added that there may be some emergency appropriations from the Legislature to give school districts the funding they expected when setting their budgets last spring.

Cobble said the district made its safety contract offer to teachers before the state

Blaine schools have funding shortage

HAILEY — The Blaine County School District will have to come up with an estimated additional \$200,000 to \$300,000 to comply with a new law that requires a 20-to-one student teacher ratio in kindergarten and grades one through three.

Superintendent Phil Homer gave the School Board the bad news Tuesday night.

Homer expressed concern that "other school districts received money to meet

the letter of the law, but Blaine County did not."

The mandatory ratios came at a time when school districts across the state are in a financial quandary.

For fiscal year 1990-1991, the Education Department underestimated growth in Idaho schools by close to 4,000 students, resulting in massive funding cuts.

The current class ratios in Blaine County's elementary schools are: Bellevue Elementary, 20/17 students to one teacher; Carey, 22/25 to one; and Hemingway,

19/17 to one.

Homer explained that these ratios are deceptively loose because they are an average of the three grades rather than the actual number in each class. The law requires that each classroom must have no more than 20 students.

Homer indicated that the school district will ask for exemption from the state while other alternatives are explored.

In other action at the school board, regis-

BLAIREY — Frost weather caused a pileup of four tractor-trailers and a pickup Thursday afternoon, closing the westbound lanes of Interstate 84 at the Burley exit.

Numerous injuries resulted from the accident, although several head of cattle being carried in one of the trailers were either killed or had to be destroyed, according to police officials.

Traffic dispatchers throughout the Magic Valley reported numerous minor accidents due to weather and road conditions Thursday evening.

The Burley accident closed the westbound lanes of the freeway about 1:25 p.m. until late in the evening. Idaho State Police and the Minidoka County Sheriff's Department handled the accident.

Officials would not comment on the nature of the accident, although Whitehead said citizens were involved.

One of the officers involved has been re-

trieved to jackknife, according to an Idaho State Police dispatcher.

Penecost stopped because the windows on her truck were icing up, the dispatcher said.

The second truck, driven by John Anderson, 44, of Burley, slid into the Penecost vehicle and stopped. A third semi-truck, driven by Charles Matlock, 43, of Denver, then struck the side of Anderson's trailer, the dispatcher said.

A fourth tractor-trailer rig, driven by Harold C. Windsor, 49, of Rathdrum, Idaho, struck the rear wheels of the Matlock truck and slid into the overpass columns, cracking a pillar, the dispatcher said.

Finally, a 1989 Mazda pickup driven by Jose Esquivel, 22, of Houston, Idaho, slid into the Penecost and Matlock trucks.

Matlock was taken to Minidoka Memorial Hospital with head and leg injuries, where he remained in stable condition Thursday night. Anderson sustained hip and leg injuries and transported himself to Cassia Memorial Hospital, the dispatcher said.

Climbers want no restrictions at City of Rocks

BURLEY — Climbers have urged the National Park Service not to attempt to restrict their sport at the City of Rocks National Reserve in Cassia County as they have in Arizona's Superstition Mountains.

Burke Superintendent David Pugh said climbers need not worry since no major management decisions about the City of Rocks will be made before next October.

"Since last winter, the climbing community and other users began to express concern that they were going to be restricted out of whatever it is they were doing at City of Rocks," Pugh said. "which is not the case at all."

A hearing was conducted Thursday in Salt Lake City aimed at helping the Park Service develop a comprehensive management plan for the 14,320-acre southern Idaho reserve. It was the fifth of seven planned throughout the region. Others are scheduled Jan. 9 in Boise and Jan. 10 in Ketchum.

About 50 people who attended a hearing Wednesday night in Pocatello submitted a list of three management strategies they would like seen included in the comprehensive plan.

They included representing climbers in the planning process, allowing climbers to regulate themselves with no additional restrictions on their activities and placing no restrictions on what private property owners can do with their land.

The only exception, according to the recommendations, should be a requirement that any new buildings be designed to complement the historic value of the reserve south of Burley.

The National Park Service originally held the position that hunting should be restricted within the City of Rocks, citing language in the 1916 Organic Act, which created the federal agency. But at the urging of retiring Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, Congress passed legislation this year allowing hunting under applicable state laws and regulations.

Still, climbers have expressed concern that the Park Service might use the same kind of strict interpretation of the Organic Act that led to the ini-

tial hunting ban. Pugh said the same standards do not apply.

"Climbing can only indirectly be related to the Organic Act," said Pugh, who also manages the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument. "The Organic Act says the Park Service is to preserve natural features in such a way as to keep them from harm."

Climbers could damage the granite spires at the City of Rocks, he said, depending on the practices used. To help determine which should be restricted, the Park Service has hired Maura Longden as a "climbing ranger" at the reserve.

Longden advised climbers Wednesday to leave equipment they leave on the rocks and said clipping or altering climbing holds in the rocks would not be tolerated.

Other suggestions made at the Pocatello meeting included restricting oil exploration in the City of Rocks, limiting off-road-vehicle use, controlling gun use in the "inner city" portion of the reserve during the fall and restricting the issuance of business licenses in the area.

Spokane radio loud, clear in Pennsylvania

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — On the family farm in northwestern Pennsylvania, Timothy and Virginia Birt say they can turn on their police scanner and listen to radio transmission chitter thousands of miles away in Spokane.

Communications engineers say it's plausible because of the tendency of low-frequency radio waves to "bounce" thousands of miles off the ionosphere.

It started about a year ago, after the Birts returned from a vacation that took them through Washington state. Last month, the chatter from Spokane had become so common that they decided to write the Spokane Area Chamber of Commerce.

"We can hear people talking mobile (radio) to mobile," 65-year-old Virginia Birt wrote. "They would call Spokane to number so and so. That way we knew we were picking up from Spokane."

"It is so clear you would think that they are sitting in the next room ... it must be coming from the electric company, because they talk about setting a pole here or there or installing a new meter."

It all sounded a bit well, sort of — particularly when there happens to be another Spokane in northeastern Ohio, a couple hundred miles closer to the Birts.

No, Virginia Birt insisted on the telephone, this was from Washington. When these people gave the time, it was three hours earlier than in Pennsylvania.

There was a repairman named Roger working out on Vista Grande Drive one day, and repeated references to someone named "Kelly 522."

Freeway plan is scrapped

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Federal authorities have approved a state plan to scrap a half-finished freeway interchange along the unstable northern shore of Lake Coeur d'Alene.

"We've learned from our mistakes," Rick Scar, an engineer for the Federal Highway Administration in Boise, said Wednesday. "We're all human."

To make room for the Interstate 90 interchange east of Coeur d'Alene, a contractor hired by the Idaho Transportation Department and paid mostly with federal money filled about five acres of the lake with crushed rock.

But the fill collapsed several times during construction. In May, the largest slide carried to the lake bottom two earthmovers that were being used to extend the fill.

That slide halted work, and a subsequent review of the project found the lake bottom could not support the weight of the crushed rock.

The interchange was part of a project to replace a temporary stretch of the highway east of Coeur d'Alene with five miles of permanent roadway.

Federal highway planners concede, as the state did, that more thought should have gone into the decision to build the interchange.

"We can look back and say, 'Gee, it would have been nice if you would have done a significant amount of foundation investigation,'" Scar said.

Radiation recipients meet with health officials

LEWISTON (AP) — It is "too soon to develop health programs for people who may have been exposed to Hanford Nuclear Reservation radiation from Washington state, an Idaho health official said.

One of the problems with new federal legislation mandating development of those programs is that it assumes Idaho patients were exposed,

which may or may not be true, said Richard Schultz of Boise, director of the Division of Health in the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

A scientific project reconstructing Hanford radiation doses is underway and should be done before health officials start looking at the effects on the population, Schultz said on Wednesday told a group of people in Lewiston concerned they may be among those exposed.

"Until then, we're shooting in the dark," Schultz said. "We don't know which isotopes hit which counties

and what magnitude. Consequently, we don't know what we're looking for."

Still, the state of Idaho held the Lewiston meeting and one Thursday in Coeur d'Alene to get help prioritizing the three programs the state will be allowed to develop if it receives any money from federal legislation.

Those attending also wanted information about possible health effects and to make names known to those doing any studies. They also wanted to be kept informed.

Schultz promised to forward their names to the Technical Steering Panel performing the dose reconstruction project so they will receive continuous updates.

Five of the seven people there said they were concerned about their health or their children's health. Three lived in the Tri-Cities area

and two lived in Whitman County, Wash., during the exposure times.

President Bush on Nov. 5 signed into law the National Defense Authorization Act for 1991, which requires the Department of Energy to establish a health program for Hanford downwinders.

They are those east of Hanford possibly exposed to radiation releases between 1944 and 1972.

The states of Idaho, Washington and Oregon will be given money appropriated by Congress to the Energy Department to develop and run health programs, Schultz explained; but that money may be a minimal amount unless Congress gets "a great deal of pressure" from the public.

Washington is supposed to receive \$3 million and Oregon and Idaho are each to get \$1 million. But Schultz said he will be "wicked pink" if we got \$100,000 out of this."

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus has sent a letter to the Energy Secretary James Watkins, stressing if there is no money available, the DOE should divert some from its 1991 budget. Schultz said.

He said Idaho also is concerned it can spend the money in only three ways: preparing information about radiation effects, referring those exposed to medical professionals, and creating a registry of those affected.

Chuck Broscious, director of the Environmental Defense Institute at Moscow, also attended the meeting with a list of suggestions for the Division of Health.

Broscious called for a questionnaire to gather information on the downwinders using the national Centers for Disease Control's Hanford thyroid questionnaire as a model.

He also recommended a toll-free telephone number for the division.

Intermountain regional forester leaves in February

OGDEN, Utah — Intermountain Regional Forester Stan J. Tixier whose decision to transfer a Twin Falls forest ranger resulted in a continuing controversy, is retiring from the Forest Service in February to become the 1991 president of the Society for Range Management.

Tixier, whose supervisory responsibility includes the Sawtooth National Forest, approved the transfer of Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman last year after complaints from Oakley-area cattlemen over Oman's range management practices.

Oman filed a federal whistleblower complaint with the agency, and his transfer was put on hold. In August, an Oakley rancher was quoted by the New York Times as threatening to kill Oman, and in the wake of the ensuing national publicity, the Forest Service decided against transferring Oman.

Browning stays silent on forecast

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The man whose projection of an earthquake set off disaster drills and a media storm still refuses to talk about it.

Iben Browning's 50-50 projection of a quake along the Midwest's New Madrid Fault or near Dec. 2 was dismissed by scientists. But in some communities residents left town for the weekend, school districts canceled classes and police officials barred troopers from taking vacations that week.

He based the projection on unusually high tidal action.

The fault, running from Marked Tree, Ark., to southern Illinois, is capable of setting off major quakes in the early 1800s it rings church bells in Washington, D.C.

But nothing happened on Dec. 2. Browning, 72, a science consultant for businesses, refused to be interviewed Wednesday, hanging up twice on The Associated Press.

"No one is going to get a hold of me," Browning said from his Sandia Park home. "I'm not going to give any interviews at all."

Browning's wife, Florence, also said he won't comment.

"It has not done any good in the past," she said.

Browning's daughter, Evelyn Garrison, had been speaking for him, but there was no answer at her home.

However, Mrs. Garrison said Tuesday in Missouri that tidal forces did not trigger a major quake in the New Madrid Fault zone because the "gun" wasn't loaded.

Mrs. Garrison, who spoke at the Missouri Governor's Conference on Agriculture in Osage Beach, Mo., said small earthquakes in the region during the fall apparently reduced the potential for a larger quake.

"Apparently everything that could be triggered didn't wait, so there was nothing there," she said.

None of the tremors caused any significant damage.

Browning's projection was dismissed in October by a group of scientists who evaluated it for the U.S. Geological Survey. They said it had no credibility and lacked scientific basis.

One Missouri scientist who was criticized because he refused to disassociate himself from Browning's projection has given up his job.

Dr. David Stewart, said, Tuesday, he was stepping down as head of the Center for Earthquake Studies at Southeast Missouri State University to ensure that the criticism doesn't affect the center itself.

Tixier is the second Forest Service official to leave the Ogden area after making a decision about the controversial land swap with Snowbasin ski resort, but agency spokesmen say that is coincidental.

Tixier will be replaced by Gray F. Reynolds, director of the Forest Service's Land Management Planning program in Washington, D.C., and former director of the Sawtooth-National Recreation Area, Forest Service Chief Dale Robertson announced this week.

Tixier, who has been an agency worker for 31 years, has been regional forester in Ogden for the past eight years.

An agency spokesman said Tixier, who is out of town until next week, was emotional when he announced his retirement to the staff.

"He really enjoyed his job; he was a workaholic about it," spokesman Guy Chojnicky said. "Tixier was one of those who loved the Forest Service so much that it was joked about that he was green underneath."

Tixier's retirement will come just days after Robertson is expected to either uphold or overrule appeals to Tixier's decision to trade 695 acres of national forest land to Snowbasin owner Earl Holdring.

In October, Tixier overruled the decision of Wasatch-Cache Forest Supervisor Dale Bosworth to trade only 220 acres. Bosworth left for a job with the Forest Service in Washington, D.C., just days after he made the original Snowbasin decision.

Chojnicky said both exits are coincidental.

Tixier apparently decided at the last minute to take advantage of some early retirement incentives, as are a number of other regional Forest Service employees, she said.

Chojnicky said Robertson's decision on the Snowbasin appeals is expected around Jan. 30. The three appeals that have been filed all request the land trade be exchanged.

She said the Society for Range Management presidency, which the 50-year-old Tixier is assuming, coincidentally

The city offered three possible sites, but one is on a hillside, which would present construction problems, and another is too small, in a fairly dense light industrial area and sits atop an old auto wrecking yard.

It was the first time all eight companies have agreed to work together to restore the Panhandle environment, John Meyer of the Environmental Protection Agency said, accelerating what is estimated to be a \$120 million project on one of the nation's largest Superfund sites.

Coalition pushes dam management changes

BOISE (AP) — A new coalition of business, environmental and sportsmen groups says it's going to work to change the way the Columbia and Snake rivers are managed, with the goal of protecting salmon.

Formation of the new Columbia-Snake Rivers Main-Stream Flow Coalition was announced at a Boise news conference on Thursday. Its goal is to force changes in federal-power dam operation to protect fish.

Coordinator Ed Cheney, Eagle, made it clear who should pay.

"He said it should be downstream utilities."

"They've enjoyed below-cost energy at the expense of fish for decades. Changes are going to have to be made."

"As beneficiaries of this welfare for all these years, it is appropriate that they bear a proportionate share of the cost," Cheney said.

"Basically, what we are going to do is call in some debts that have been owed for years," Cheney said.

Sportsmen and environmental groups, some of which are involved

in the new coalition, have requested endangered or threatened species protection for four strains of salmon that spawn in Idaho. Officials say the Idaho species are on the verge of extinction. Due to dwindling spawning runs, there has not been a general salmon season in Idaho since 1977.

The state on Wednesday released its response to those petitions, urging action to protect the fish instead of declaring them endangered species.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said the obvious answer is higher streamflows and higher water velocity at downstream federal dams, during the two months when fish are trying to get through the dams. But he said it should be a shared solution between Pacific Northwest states, because there isn't enough reservoir water in Idaho to do it.

The new coalition said in a news release, it represents organizations with more than 30,000 members, although one speaker at the news conference said it was 40,000 members.

The coalition said the state Fish and Game Department estimates fed-

eral power dams on the Columbia and Snake are responsible for more than 90 percent of the deaths of man-killed migrating salmon. "The dams also annually kill millions of salmon and steelhead produced in Oregon and Washington," the coalition said.

Sheila Mills, an Idaho outfitter, said re-establishing salmon runs could be worth millions of dollars to outfitters and guides, because of the business they would bring in.

"There could be a reasonable solution if all sides could give a little," she said.

The coalition said its goals were:

• Expanding membership so it becomes "a major, grassroots force in regional energy and fish policy-making."

• Implementing a regional information program to get people in-

volved in the decisions.

• Establishing regional advisory panels.

• Preparing a business-like action plan to resolve the conflict between "the world's largest coordinated energy system (Bonneville Power Administration) and what once were the world's largest chinook salmon and steelhead runs."

Coalition members include: The Wilderness Society, Southwest Washington Anglers, Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations; Oregon Trout, Oregon Salmon Commission, Northwest Resource Information Center, Northwest Environmental Defense Center, Long Live the Kings, Idaho Wine Merchant, Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited and Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association.

Albanian military to help with unrest


VIENNA, Austria — Communist Albania on Thursday ordered its soldiers to quell an attack on officials and buildings by "hooligans" armed with stones and iron bars, official media reported.

The attack in the northern city of Shkodra came one day after a peaceful rally by tens of thousands of people in the capital, Tirana, celebrating the founding of the country's first non-Communist party, the Democratic Party of Albania.

Journalists said Tirana remained calm Thursday.

Official Albanian Radio, monitored by the British Broadcasting Corp. in London, said gangs were "throwing stones at the district party and government buildings, and committing acts of vandalism inside the local radio station." It was the district police chief, a policeman and one other person were hurt by people wielding iron bars.

Earthquake rumbles through Sicily



SYRACUSE, Sicily — A moderate earthquake shook eastern Sicily early Thursday, killing 18 people, panicking thousands and destroying part of a small town, officials said.

The disaster took the biggest toll in Catenlino, a town of 10,000 people between Catania and Syracuse, where members of four families were killed when their homes crumbled on top of them as they slept.

The quake struck at about 1:30 a.m. (3:30 p.m. Wednesday MST) and registered 4.7 on the Richter scale, the Ministry of Civil Protection reported. It was followed by dozens of aftershocks, said Sebastiano Valente, an employee at the Syracuse prefect's office. The bodies of 13 people were pulled from the rubble in Catenlino. Five other people died of heart attacks, authorities said.

Soviet Army unloading stranded food

MOSCOW — The KGB said Thursday that thousands of tons of government-purchased food are stuck at ports and railway stations, and officials said the Red Army has been drafted to help unload foreign food aid.

Deputy Prime Minister Lev Voronin, who heads a government commission on the aid distribution, vowed that the "harshest measures" would be used against anyone caught diverting donated food to the black market.

KGB officials said more than 1.6 million metric tons of imported goods await unloading or shipment from Soviet ports, and about 7,000 railway cars need to be emptied at border stations.

Clash over elections kills 3 in Mexico

MEXICO CITY — Riot police and members of an opposition political party clashed in a town southeast of Mexico City, leaving at least three people dead and 50 injured, authorities said.

The clash on Wednesday followed four weeks of opposition protests that accused the long-governing Institutional Revolutionary Party of fraud in elections Nov. 11 in Mexico state.

Each side blamed the other for starting the disturbance, in which two of the three killed were police.

"I think this was planned by the state government to give us a violent image," Heriberto Castillo, director of the left-leaning opposition Revolutionary Democratic Party, said in a telephone interview.

ANC president welcomed home

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Oliver Tambo, president of the African National Congress, came home Thursday after 30 years in exile and was welcomed joyously by his supporters to a country far different from the one he left.

The arrival of the ailing Tambo brought the core of the ANC leadership together—and free in South Africa for the first time since before the black opposition group was outlawed in 1960.

His long-time ANC colleagues, Nelson Mandela and Walter Sisulu, both were freed from prison in the past 14 months as part of reforms that have eliminated major apartheid laws and led to talks with the white-led government. The day for which we have all waited has come," Mandela told cheering supporters at an airport welcoming ceremony.

Food not the main task facing Gorbachev

MOSCOW — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev is asking the West, the KGB and the army to help solve his country's food shortages while he tackles the much tougher task of trying to keep the Soviet Union intact.

All his efforts appear aimed at buying time through what promises to be a hard winter, and he has no guarantee of success:

Gorbachev got a boost this week from President Bush, who promised to back loans for the Kremlin to buy up to \$1 billion in American farm products and \$300 million in manufactured goods through June.

Other nations, fearing food riots that could jeopardize Gorbachev's reforms, also are rushing to help the Soviets.

At home, Gorbachev is trying both the carrot and the stick in his efforts to reassert central control over the nation's disintegrating political and economic structure. He says he will use force to prevent profiteering.

But neither threats nor force are likely to persuade the governments of the 15 republics to agree to his proposal that their economies remain under central control.

Both topics will be debated Monday when the national Congress of Peoples' Deputies convenes in the Kremlin for what promises to be a tumultuous session.

Conservative lawmakers are urging Gorbachev to declare a state of emergency, and he has partially obliged them by replacing the moderate interior minister with generals from the

Farmhand a key murder witness

XAPURI, Brazil (AP) — An illiterate farmhand in hiding for more than year waited under heavy guard Thursday to testify in the trial of a rancher accused of plotting the murder of Amazon rain forest defender Chico Mendes.

Prosecutors say the testimony of the 15-year-old farmhand will be vital in their attempts to assert that rancher Darly Alves da Silva plotted Mendes' 1988 killing and oven held a barbecue to celebrate it.

Da Silva's son stunned the court on the first day of the trial Wednesday by confessing to the slaying of the rubber tapper, but prosecutors contend the statement was crafted to protect his father.

Mendes, 24, had gained international recognition for organizing opposition to ranchers who have cleared vast swaths of rain forest for

KGB and the army. Additionally, he has ordered the KGB, the army and the Interior Ministry to stop workers in the state distribution system from stealing food and selling it on the black market.

Deliveries of most food products are running from 13 to 44 percent below 1989 levels, according to figures released this week by the Council of Ministers, which blamed much of the drop on pricing and profiteering.

Tough law enforcement is needed with the old administrative system being withdrawn and the new market is not in place to regulate supply and demand, and prices, KGB Maj. Gen. Alexander N. Karbunov told a news conference Thursday at the agency's Lubjanka headquarters.

He said the measures could last six months, maybe a year, depending on the results.

The food shortage appears most acute in big Russian cities like Moscow and Leningrad, and much milder in the countryside and most of the 14 other republics. Times also seem lean in Armenia and Moldavia, two republics beset by ethnic unrest.

To feed the cities, Gorbachev has announced that during the first three months of 1991, his government will spend 2.1 billion rubles (\$3.57 billion) to import food.

Bottlenecks in ports and on railroads threaten to prevent meat from reaching the cities, however, say KGB and army officials mobilizing to solve the problem. Still, they

say it is unlikely that people will starve.

"In this country, there is no such situation as we had in 1921, when there was famine," said Karbunov, referring to the Russian Civil War, in which millions died from lack of food.

The three Baltic republics of Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia, plus Moldavia, which was part of Romania until World War II, have refused to join the talks. Gorbachev's chances of winning the republics' approval of his draft proposal appear slim.

And while it may be possible to send the KGB and the army to ports, rail yards and warehouses to frighten food-industry workers, it is quite another thing to use force simultaneously against 15 republics in various stages of rebellion.

"In the long range, we must stick to democratic methods," said Karbunov, the KGB general. "So we cracked down, returned to the methods of the past. Then in 10 years, we'd right back where we started."



World**Shoppers in Moscow welcome U.S. economic aid with open arms**

MOSCOW (AP) — Weary shoppers ending another day of scouring stores for food said Thursday they welcomed economic aid from the United States and did not feel embarrassed, because it wasn't a handout.

"What humiliation?" said Nikolai Kropotov as he bundled up against the chill of the Moscow night. "No one is humiliated."

The Bush administration has promised the Soviet Union up to \$1 billion in loan guarantees to buy American wheat, corn and other

farm products to stave off food shortages this winter.

"You are selling it quite fairly and we are buying it quite fairly," said Kropotov, 72. "There is no embarrassment."

As he adjusted a cloth sack to secure three loaves bought at Bread Store No. 150 in western Moscow, Kropotov said he was confident the food the Soviet government would buy from the United States would reach the people, despite the current problems in the nation's supply system.

Expressing similar confidence was Viktor Rozhkov, 35, who was waiting in the store while his wife bought bread.

"At present, I think the food will make it to the stores, what with the Interior Ministry, the KGB and the police all controlling its distribution," Rozhkov said.

He had some mixed feelings about the aid. "On the one hand we need help, but on the other, you have to pay for any credit," Rozhkov said.

"If it was help simply free of charge, it would be humiliating," he

said, "but as it's credit, it's not humiliating."

"It is very good that our relationships are so close," she said of the current ties with the United States.

"If we receive the aid and make friends at such a difficult moment, that would be wonderful."

A 68-year-old woman who wanted to be identified only as Katya said the U.S. aid was only proper, because the Soviet Union had helped other nations for years.



TWIN FALLS - Ralph Vaughan Williams' "Hodie," a holiday cantata, will share the bill with a selection of favorite holiday songs when the Magic Valley Chorale presents its annual Christmas concert this weekend.

"Hodie," a celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, was the last major choral work by Vaughan Williams. It was first performed in 1954.

Vaughan Williams was born in 1872, his father an Anglican priest and his mother a niece of Charles Darwin, the founder of evolutionary theory.

Throughout his career, Vaughan Williams was known for his adaptations of folk music. He wrote a wide variety of music, from symphonies to choral works to folksongs for the stage. He died in 1958.

James Bay, in his book about Vaughan Williams, noted the great cheer and vitality of "Hodie." The soft rejoicing of the Polyphony is the kind of music expected from a man of 22 rather than 82, he wrote.

Carson Wang will direct the chorale presentation of "Hodie," and the singers will be accompanied by the Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra and Phyllis Van Nest.

Four soloists who have been chosen for the work: soprano David Finsterle, soprano Martha "Marty" Mead and Linda Stevenson, and tenor Jack Van Buren.



Composer completes Mozart's unfinished requiem

TOKYO (AP) — An Austrian group has chosen a Japanese composer's arrangement of a requiem left unfinished by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart to mark the 200th anniversary of the composer's death, it was announced earlier in the week.

The International Stiftung Mozart, an organization devoted to Mozart research, chose Shigeaki Saigusa's "Symphonic Concerto for Violin, Viola, Cello and Orchestra."

It is to be performed Dec. 5, 1991, the anniversary date.

Saigusa's composition is a completed version of Mozart's unfinished "Requiem Mass." Mozart was commissioned to write the work in the summer of 1791 but died before completing it.

One of his students, Franz Xavier Sussmayr, completed a version of the work after Mozart died later that year.

But, "said Saigusa, "Sussmayr's version was written in a style too 'romantic' to suit Mozart's composition.... The Stiftung Mozartum asked me to write my own version."

"I tried to return to his state of mind," said Saigusa, one of Japan's foremost composers of classical music.

He said his composition will be recorded in May and released next August.

World War II music released

WASHINGTON — Two things kept Clyde Boden's spirits up through the cold, bitter fighting during the Battle of the Bulge: prayer and the songs that crackled over his Army-issue radio.

"We had it turned to the BBC and Armed Forces Radio all the time. Just listening to the songs and tunes and they were good for you," he said. Boden, now 73 and a retired Army colonel living in Arling-

ton, Va. Many of the songs Boden heard were big band and top vocalists who recorded for the military's V-DISC label (V as in Victory) for no pay, but with the promise that the music would never be played at home. A prolonged musician's strike had silenced the commercial recording industry during World War II.

Now some of the recordings, in

cluding Frank Sinatra's crooning

and lifting, Tommy Dorsey tunes, have been issued commercially here for the first time since they boosted the morale of troops overseas.

E.P. "Dig" DiGiannantonio, the Navy officer who recorded his songs in hotel ballrooms and movie sound stages, won permission from the American Federation of Musicians and the Pentagon to re-release some of the records intended to be heard overseas, then destroyed.

He sent approximately eight million records to every base, ship, hospital, station, the front lines throughout the world, DiGiannantonio recalled in a recent interview. "It brought music to them from their loved ones back home."

The military also sent 125,000 wind-up victrolas equipped with steel needles to play the records.

Soldiers, sailors and Marines heard songs that became the signature sounds of the era: Glenn Miller's recordings of "Chattanooga Choo Choo" and "Little Brown Jug."

DEAR ABBY: I have been reading your articles for a long time, but I've never seen a problem like mine.



'Home Alone' a funny Disney, Peckinpah mix

Imagine Alfalfa starring in a Disney remake of that classic of psychotic territoriality, Sam Peckinpah's ultraviolent "Straw Dogs," and you've got a faint approximation of "Home Alone."

In Peckinpah's bleak vision of the human condition, a mild liberal wimp hiding from reality on a Cornish farm finally freaked when some British rednecks tried to break into his house; using everything from a bear trap to a shotgun to boiling water, he waged total war and snuffed them all.

In this version, a cute tyke played by Macaulay Culkin is accidentally left home over Christmas vacation, when the house is assailed by two less than brilliant thieves. But rather than play it for horror as the great Peckinpah did in his film, the writer-producer John Hughes and the director Chris Columbus play it for very mild suburban slapstick.

The movie has one sustained passage of brilliance: that the previews and the TV ads make you wait at least an hour and a half, it lasts about 10 minutes. This is the assault itself, when the doubly moronic Joe Pesci

and Daniel Stern walk into the clever and mean-spirited mesh of booby traps the boy has sprung on them. Columbus keeps it a long way from horror, believe me. The hero is of the pratfall variety, clearly inspired by the wan doubletakes in the face of destruction pioneered by that great one-child semi-demolition derby, Wile E. Coyote. Columbus loves to watch the dumb look of hopelessness recognition that falls across the eyes of each of the victims before they get clobbered.

In truth, there is an unsettlingly mean current running through it. The injuries aren't just the usual Willies-thumps-Wilie of the movies; instead, they've been conceived for maximum sense of squeamishness. Feet are involved frequently, and one scene where the barefoot Daniel Stern plants his sole on a strategically emplaced roofing nail may have you cringing from the knees upward. But it's still quite funny. Columbus has put his stunts together neatly and Stern and Pesci manage to be threatening enough to enable you to enjoy their humiliation without becoming threatening enough to scare you.

They're housebreakers as clowns

and never for a second do you believe they could would stay the child; thus the whole drama plays in a kind of enchanted forest zone.

And Culkin is a major find. He was one of the children in Hughes's "Uncle Buck" of last year, here promoted to major movie star. He's wonderful. He doesn't possess a shred of that horrid professional child actor's aplomb; he doesn't act like a 43-year-old tax accountant or a little Ethel Merman ready to belt 'em out. He's all boy, vulnerable, captivating and exceptionally charming.

As the movie around him is not captivating, or, exceptionally charming — but it is vulnerable. It takes some doing to set up a scenario in which parents would forget one of their children, and "Home Alone" labors mightily. For the record, here's the gag: The McCallisters, a prosperous and large suburban Chicago family, are heading to Paris over Christmas vacation; one of dad's brothers, with his large, prosperous family, is staying with them also and will be making the flight.

On the night before the whole tribe —

four adults, fifteen kids — is to leave for the airport, a power shortage knocks out the alarm clocks. Everybody oversleeps. In the chaos of the last-second rush, no one remembers that the bad boy Kevin has been ordered to sleep in the attic as a disciplinary measure.

It's marginally believable. What is wholly unbelievable is the contempt with which Kevin is treated by brother and sister, parent and uncle. If my brother called my son a "jerk" for accidentally spilling some milk on some pizza, I'd kick him out of the house in less than three seconds; in this big, unreal family circus it's standard operating procedure.

Moreover, in the movie's other half — chronicling the guilty parents' discovery and mom Catherine O'Han's desperate attempt to return home — is dead on arrival. Dead as in not funny, not illuminating, not interesting, not ironic. Just dead. When the wasted O'Han ends up riding in the back of a truck with a polka band fronted by avuncular John Candy, he's still dead! Nothing to laugh, no interest, boring time-waste.

But those glorious 10 minutes, how they sing!

10-year-old says film's success is 'pretty cool'

The star of one of the season's biggest box-office smashes is on the phone, conveying much happiness over his movie's near-record-breaking opening weekend revenues. From Friday, Nov. 16, through Sunday, the 18th, the film made \$17.1 million on some 1,200 screens — drumming Sly Stallone's heavy-weight favorite, "Rocky V," in the process.

"Yeah, it's pretty cool," says Macaulay Culkin, who knows big numbers when he sees them. You see, "math is one of my favorite subjects."

Culkin, an elfish 10-year-old Manhattanite, is the central character in the latest John Hughes comedy road movie — sort of a prequel to "Straw Dogs" in which grade-schooler Kevin McCallister must defend his family's lavish suburban "Chicago" house against two numbskull burglars. Mom, Dad and a brood of snotty siblings have inadvertently flown off to Paris without him.

Was this role something he could build personal experience to? Was he ever abandoned by his own parents — and his six brothers and sisters?

"No," Culkin says, explaining that he's been left alone "on purpose" a couple of times when his mom has had to do some quick shopping down at the corner store.

What did he make of some of the reviews, which panned the movie for its surfeit of cartoon violence? Culkin nemesis Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern got tarred-and-feathered, bonked on the head, sealed with oil clothes-iron, and cut with ground-up Christmas ornaments?

"It didn't bother me," he reports. "It's funny fur violence. Fun and violence — what a combination!"

Culkin, a fifth grader at St. Joseph's School on New York's upper east side, is no stranger to Hollywood — although "Home Alone" marks the young actor's first starring role. He made his screen-debut playing one of Burt Lancaster's grandchildren in 1987's "Rocket Grip." Last year, he appeared in Alan



Pakula's family drama "See You in the Morning" and John Hughes' filial farce "Uncle Buck."

The blond Culkin also had a role in this fall's dark, hellish "Jacob's Ladder" playing Vietnam vet Tim Robbins.

Culkin son: He has seen the R-rated movie — an intense, hallucinatory drama ripe with images of demons and devils — and is not sure what to make of it.

"Kind of weird," he offers.

The diminutive thespian has worked the TV medium too, appearing in commercials (Apple Computers' Dr. Pepper juice ABC's "Aladdin" Special) and a guest spot on "The Equalizer," "All This, and School."

"I keep up on everything," he says. "Math, science and gym are my favorite subjects. We do relay races in sports. I'm pretty fast ... And when he's out of class, working on a film, he has a tutor.

Kiam consults lawyer about moving team

BOSTON — New England Patriots owner Victor Kiam, realizing his team's financial problems were not getting better, met three weeks ago with noted attorney Joseph Aloito to discuss, among other things, the mechanics of moving a football team and the possibility of moving to Sacramento.

Kiam has not made his decision to move or sell the team, and he reportedly told Aloito that he did not want to move the team out of New England but had to look at all his options in case he had to do so.

Bob Romano, the Patriots' director of finance, Thursday denied any move to Sacramento. "I can categorically say that there have been no discussions by Victor or anyone representing Victor with a representative of Sacramento," Romano said. "But two or three years down the road, moving or selling are options he will have to consider. Fellow owners were told in Dallas this past week at an NFL meeting (Kiam was not present because he was in Japan on business) that Kiam plans to meet with Massachusetts Gov.-elect William Weld soon to tell him the Patriots need a new stadium or they could be on the road."

Holtz reported looking hard at NFL spots

PHILADELPHIA — Despite his demands, Notre Dame football coach Lou Holtz has intensified his interest in head coaching positions with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and the Minnesota Vikings, according to a published report.

Columnist Paul Domowitch of the Philadelphia Daily News on Thursday quoted sources as saying the impetus for Holtz's job hunt is the NCAA's 2½-year investigation of the University of Minnesota, where Holtz coached in 1984 and 1985.

The NCAA said in a letter outlining its findings to the school this week: A university spokesman told the newspaper Minnesota would make an announcement Friday.

However, a woman contacted at the Minnesota men's athletic department told The Associated Press on Thursday night that the re-



port had not been received by late Thursday afternoon.

No news conference had been scheduled, she said.

The NCAA investigation focused on reports of payments to Minnesota athletes, including about a dozen football players, by Luther Darville, the former athletic department administrator.

Darville was convicted in November 1989 of stealing almost \$200,000 of university funds and giving it to athletes.

Holtz was implicated by a former school academic adviser, who said the coach once gave him money to give to a player.

Holtz is in the final year of his contract at Notre Dame.

He denied Wednesday that he is "looking to leave" the school.

But Domowitch speculated that Notre Dame probably would not want Holtz if he is tainted by the investigation.

Sources told Domowitch that Holtz has an intermediary in contact with both the Tampa Bay and Minnesota franchises about his interest.

The Tampa job became vacant two weeks ago when Ray Perkins was fired.

Vikings coach Jerry Rice has hinted he will retire at the end of the season.

BSU concerned about Big Sky change

BOISE — A new Big Sky Conference policy regulating television rights could cost Boise State University thousands of dollars, athletic director Gene Blymeyer contends.

But Big Sky Commissioner Ron Stephenson said the decision, which gives the league office control of live-television rights and cuts for the equitable distribution of revenue from televised games, should benefit all nine schools.

The Big Sky athletic directors, at the league's annual fall meeting last week in Reno, voted 6-3 in favor of the measure, Blymeyer voted against it. Boise State is on television the most, so we stand to lose

the most," he said. "We stand the potential of losing a lot of money."

But whether for or against the proposed parties involved agreed it is too early to know what impact it will have financially. They also said the viewers will not notice much of a change.

Surgery shelves Packers' Majkowski

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Green Bay Packers quarterback Don Majkowski underwent surgery Thursday to repair a torn rotator cuff in his right shoulder and will miss the rest of the season.

Couch Lindy Infante said surgeons who performed the operation in San Diego did not characterize the injury as career threatening, but said Majkowski would not be able to throw for three to six months.

"Doctors feel very good about his chances for full recovery. There was no mention of career ending or anything remotely like that. The prognosis is a good one. They feel the repair is successful," Infante said.

He said Dr. Gary Losse and Dr. David Flood initially were performing an arthroscopic procedure to repair an impinged nerve, but then discovered a ½-inch-by-¾-inch tear in a tendon in the rotator cuff. The doctors then made a separate 1½-inch incision to repair the tear in a 90-minute procedure.

The rotator cuff is a group of muscles covering the shoulder joint that connects the upper arm bone to the shoulder bone. It controls shoulder rotation, a key motion to a quarterback's passing.

Cardinals hire \$3.3 million backup

ST. LOUIS — First baseman Gerald Perry, who spent 1990 with the Kansas City Royals and then became a free agent, agreed Thursday to a three-year, \$3.3 million contract with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Perry, 30, spent his first seven major league seasons with the Atlanta Braves. He hit .254 in 133 games for Kansas City last summer and is a lifetime, .267 hitter.

General manager Dal Maxvill said Perry will back up Pedro Guerrero at first base and also fill the role of a left-handed pinch hitter.

Denny Walling, the Cardinals' top left-handed pinch hitter the past two seasons, also is a free agent. Previously this winter, St. Louis lost left-hander Ken Dayley to the Toronto Blue Jays and outfielder Vince Coleman to the New York Mets.

Perry, who made \$702,500 in 1990, gets a \$500,000 signing bonus, \$1 million in each the 1991 and 1992 seasons and \$800,000 in 1993. He can earn up to \$700,000 more each season in performance bonuses; \$8,750 per game from 105 to 144 and \$2,333 per plate appearance from 326 to 475.

Perry, who stole 17 bases last summer for Kansas City, had 42 steals in 1987 for Atlanta and hit a career-best .300 for the Braves the following season, when he was a member of the National League All-Star team.

Mets sign free agent outfielder Puhl

NEW YORK — Free agent outfielder Terry Puhl agreed to a one-year contract with the New York Mets on Thursday.

Puhl, a .281 batter for 14 years in the majors with Houston, batted .202 in 37 games with the Astros last season. He was troubled by shoulder problems and underwent arthroscopic surgery Aug. 27.

"My shoulder is 100 percent now," Puhl said. "I'm already throwing and I don't anticipate any difficulties."

Puhl is guaranteed \$100,000 under the contract, but would get a \$350,000 salary if he makes the opening day roster. He could make bonuses of \$75,000 each for 200 and 250 plate appearances.

He made \$800,000 last year and became a free agent after the Astros declined to exercise a 1991 option at \$850,000 and gave him a \$75,000 buyout instead.

The Mets plan to use Puhl as a left-handed pinch hitter, replacing Tom O'Malley, who left the team to play in Japan.

Robinson discounts talk of Rams' feud

— ANAHEIM, Calif. — After a couple of reports that Coach John Robinson and the Los Angeles Rams' front office are headed toward a major clash once this disappointing season ends, Robinson refused to put himself into the line of fire.

"Asked Thursday if he thought the reports of his tenacious job security were distracting to his team as it prepares for Monday night's game against the San Francisco 49ers, Robinson's answer was short and to the point. 'No, I don't,'" Robinson said. "I think the last time this came up was before the (the previous game against the 49ers — a Ram victory). So maybe it's good that it's coming up."

But Robinson also made it clear he was not pleased by a Los Angeles Times' story on Thursday that said the Rams' front office is growing weary of him after almost eight seasons — six of which ended in the playoffs.

Bare heads in NHL down to 7

CHICAGO — Doug Wilson knows that what was once a badge of courage is today the sign of nothing more than a thick skull. But he still can't bring himself to put on a helmet.

"I wore one for an entire season, but I never shook the feeling that I was protecting an injury. So I took it off again. Because I knew if I ever played another season as bad as that one," the Blackhawks' 33-year-old defenseman said. "I probably wouldn't have a job today."

In a rare show of enlightenment, the NHL passed a rule in June 1979 that every player entering the league from that day forward has to wear protective headgear. Of the hundreds of players who began that season exempted from the rule, only seven are still playing — Wilson, Quebec's Guy Lafleur, Edmonton's Craig MacTavish, St. Louis' Harold Smeets, Winnipeg's Randy Carlyle, Washington's Rod Langway and Toronto's Brad Marsh.

"Everybody knows who everybody else in the group is," Carlyle, a fourth-year player for the Hawks, said before a matinee practice. "But I'm not sure that isn't just because we're some of the oldest guys around. I guess we're like dimwits that way."

"I think it's just a case where we all got into a habit and it's too late to change. I mean, it's not a macho thing ... it's not like we're all trying to prove to each other that we're known as the last guy around without a hat."

Good thing, Dick Plasman of the



St. Louis Blues Harold Smeets, right, is becoming a rarity.

Chicago Bears won the dubious distinction of being the last guy to play pro football without benefit of a helmet and he cut short the 1941 season by running into a low brick wall at Wrigley Field.

But don't tell any of the bareheaded even then: They feel a certain maniacal pride for one another, but theirs is not a fraternity in the sense that a bunch of them get together over a few beers and swap war stories. Just the opposite, in fact, is true.

"I don't talk to my friends much with anybody," Wilson said. "This is one game where this moment, you even think about getting hurt, it's al-

most certain to happen."

In Wilson's case, just the opposite turned out to be true.

In 1983, he busted his nose and for the next 15 games, wore a helmet and face shield to protect the injury.

Though the club's trainer at the time begged him to keep it on, Wilson, when he went out to play the Toronto Maple Leafs in his 16th game back, and promptly caught a shrapnel between the eyes that fractured his skull.

His first and only season in head gear followed.

"And I'll bet in that one year," he, "explaining that one to him."

added almost sheepishly, "I had more cuts around the eyes than any two seasons combined."

That is what passes for logic among the group. Like Wilson, Marsh is convinced that opposing players swing the stick more indiscriminately when the guy across from them is wearing a helmet. Carlyle finds them too warm. Others have complained they are too confining or that they limit peripheral vision.

But pinned down, each member of the group long ago realized that if their excuses were piled on top of one another, all they would have erected was a monument to bad logic.

"I can see how it looks to people on the outside," Carlyle said. "I have a hard time explaining it to friends and relatives, let alone the fans who get on me."

"Sometimes, I have snappy comebacks. But one time, at a home game one night, when this guy leans over the glass and yells, 'Put your hat on, it'll cover the bald spot.'

"That," he laughed, running his hand through thinning blond hair, "was a zinger."

Wilson felt even worse one afternoon. He and his wife dressed his 4-year-old son, Dougie, from head to toe for his first Mighty Mite hockey game and sent him onto the rink.

"Well, he took about two strides, unbuckled the helmet and threw it back at his mom," Wilson said. "He just looked at her and said, 'Daddy doesn't wear one and I'm not going to either.'

"I had a hard time," Wilson said.






'Roseanne' still on top, but silver lining has unpleasant cloud hovering nearby

For Roseanne Barr, the star of ABC's top-rated, Tuesday-night sitcom, it is the best of times and the worst of times.

"Roseanne" consistently hovers in the Olympian heights of the Nielsen Top 3. Her take is \$100,000 per episode. When the show goes into syndication in 1992, it's estimated that she will earn \$30 million more. She's so crazy about her new husband, comic Tom Arnold, that they can hardly keep their hands off each other when they are being interviewed. Arnold and Barr recently signed a lucrative production deal with ABC. They have a place at the beach in Malibu and a \$4 million Tudor mansion in Brentwood.

But every silver lining comes with an unpleasant cloud, and Barr's cloud is more like a hurricane. Even the president of the United States took time out from the Persian Gulf crisis to condemn her singing talent on national television after she screeched her way through the national anthem at a San Diego Padres game. Barr's ex-husband is suing her for \$15 million.

Her ex-manager wants another \$15 million. She is currently estranged from her sister Geraldine, even though they were once so close that Barr started to weep while discussing the support that she got from her sister on a Barbara Walters special. Her husband is a recovering cocaine addict. And both of her daughters have been hospitalized—one for alcohol abuse and the other for psychological problems.

Yet, "I'm happier than I've ever

been," Barr says in her production office in the San Fernando Valley.

Arnold agrees. "We have fun, 24 hours a day."

Amid all this gooey sentiment, Barr quickly returns to her famous prickly persona when asked about all the touching and fondling that goes on in their interviews. "It's sickening, it's gross, but it's fun," she says. "If I saw anybody else carrying on like us, I'd throw up!"

Arnold adds, "No one else likes either one of us, so it's lucky we're so crazy about each other."

Arnold may not be exaggerating much. Barr's ex-husband is suing him for \$3 million for causing the breakup of their marriage. At the beginning of the season, ABC executives were furious with Arnold, whom they blamed for "Roseanne"'s slippage in the ratings. (Since then, the show has

climbed back near the top.)

Barr immediately defends her man. "Anybody who knows anything knows why the ratings dipped earlier this year," she says. "The other networks threw Jackie Collins and Danielle Steel and first-run movies up against us. They threw millions of dollars against us to knock us off the air. And it didn't work. Now that the special counter-programming is over, we're back on top."

Barr is even more optimistic about the future. When "Roseanne" finally goes off the air, she says she wants to direct, write and star in films.

Soap opera scene

Williams is taking it easy for a while

It's holiday season, the only time of year the soaps go dark for two weeks. Forgetting summer vacations, Christmas is the one chance the well-paid performers have for taking it easy and forgetting the trials and tribulations that plague their harried characters.

A fellow with TV's highest daytime TV-Q, meaning his audience appeal according to research, is Doug Davidson on "The Young and the Restless." For 13 years he has played the character Paul Williams and now he's at home playing with 11-month-old daughter Calyssa Rae, giving wife Cindy a break.

After almost a year-long storyline about murder, Davidson's Paul Williams has had an easy summer and fall.

The soap's top gun with fans dawdles with Cassandra, once his love, and murderer suspect, but producer Bill Bell is clearly giving his ace a breather, careful not to overdo a good thing. The long haul counts and the show, still on top, doesn't miss a ratings beat. Unable to make headway against "Y & R," NBC cancelled "Generations." Bucking "Restless" was not a wise move for a beginner.

Yet kingpin of soaps "Restless" is continually ignored in the Daytime Emmy Awards. "Santa Barbara" collects Emmys like grapes, only to be drubbed daily competing with "General Hospital."

"Our feelings are hurt," Doug Davidson admits. "We would like Emmy recognition." Davidson takes solace in the Emmy method of selecting winners. "The judges look at one or two scenes. That's hardly a clue to a year's work. I mean, I've seen 'Santa Barbara,' and watched some good episodes and some terrible ones. They're very uneven. But I don't worry much about it. The Emmys are a tough call."

Asked about the power that goes with being selected "Outstanding Hero" for 1990 by a soap magazine, and for the top TV-Q ranking, Davidson just laughs.

"It sounds great, but I don't know what it all means. In this town you can overestimate your own importance. I've been here 11 or 12 sea-

No specific area of excellence was cited, an omission Beatty took care of with years of Hollywood womanizing.

Q: Is Lena Olin that good an actress or was there really something romantic going on off-camera between Olin and Robert Redford that made their love scenes in the film "Havana" so authentic looking? — G.D.

A: Unlike another very gifted Swedish actress, the late Ingrid Bergman who actually did become involved with her leading men during filming, Olin's on-screen romantic trysts with Redford were all part of the job.

The lovely and talented Olin, who was so astounding in "The Unbearable Lightness of Being" and "Enemies — A Love Story," says she approaches a screen relationship as if they actually lived together. In Bergman's case, by the way, after

Q: Isn't Mickey Rourke, for all of his classiness as a big-time movie actor, a real slob in private who has a policy of never washing his hair? — M.R.

A: That's the reputation Mickey has been cultivating, setting off a fashion wave, of sorts, in Hollywood equating unwashed hair with sex appeal.

Mickey's manager told me that in reality, the actor washes his hair daily. He gets that unwashed, oily look by applying "a ton of gel" to his hair. There really is a move in Hollywood's young male circles that favors dirty hair. But Rourke is busy setting a new trend. He just got a crew cut.

It's touchdown for Monday football as ABC topples NBC in ratings lists

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Monday night football scored a ratings touchdown for ABC, putting the network in the No. 1 spot for only the second time in the 12-week-old season.

The National League Football showdown between the New York Giants and the San Francisco 49ers gave ABC its rare victory by grabbing a 27 average rating — the highest this season for Monday night's prime-time gridiron ritual.

Each ratings point in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey released Tuesday represents 931,000 homes.

ABC's only other win this fall came last month when the NFL match-up of the Los Angeles Raiders and the Miami Dolphins helped the network outrace its competitors with a 13.4 average.

Usually first place NBC fell to second last week with an 11.9. CBS was in its usual third place with an 11.1.

"60 Minutes" on CBS garnered its highest ratings of the season and finished second with a 23 average.

"Cheers" on NBC, the perennial No. 1 favorite of American television viewers, dropped to third.

Finishing fourth was ABC's "Roseanne," followed by NBC's "A

CBS late-night show gets ax

NEW YORK (AP) — "America Tonight," a late-night CBS News series, has been axed and will be succeeded next month by five action-adventure series airing Monday through Friday, CBS said Monday.

"America Tonight," begun as a series of specials after Iraq's Aug. 2 takeover of Kuwait, became a regular late-night competitor of ABC News' "Nightline" and NBC's "Tonight Show" on Oct. 1.

Its final broadcast will be on Jan. 18, three days after the deadline the United Nations has given Iraq to get out of Kuwait.

The series replacing the show has

the umbrella title of "CBS Late Night" and will start on Jan. 21.

Charles Kuralt, who co-anchored "America Tonight" with Lesley Stahl, said in an interview last month he expected the ax to fall because CBS had committed itself to entertainment fare at the 11:30 p.m. EST time period.

His half-hour series, whose national ratings generally put it third against its network rivals, had replaced entertainment programs that succeeded CBS' ill-fated late night talk-variety series, "The Pat Sajak Show."

CBS Entertainment President Jeff Sagansky said in a statement that

the five new late-night series coming to CBS "represent programming of prime-time quality, with a more adult bite because of the late hour."

The shows range from "Fly-By Night," a light-hearted series about an air charter service, to "Scene of the Crime," an anthology series of thrillers created by producer Stephen J. Cannell.

The new series and the night on which each one will appear are "Sweating Bullets" on Monday, "Fly By Night" on Tuesday, "Scene of the Crime" on Wednesday, "The Exile" on Thursday and "Dark Justice" on Friday.
