Big chill will stay on

The Times-News today, a few, including Wood River and Camas County, dismissed classes for Christmas vacation Wednesday. Buhl and Glens Ferry, which were scheduled to be in school today, went on Christmas break a day early.
School officials advised patrons to monitor designated radio and television stations for further information on possible closures this morning.
Police and sheriff's department dispatchers throughout the Magic Valley reported dozens of slide-offs and minor accidents Thursday. Blizzard conditions brought traffic to a near-standstill on Interstate 84 between Burley and Twin Falls Wednesday night, stranding motorists at truck stops from Mountain Home to Rupert.

Wind drives killer cold across West

An Arctic front menaced the West and northern Plains with killer cold and blowing snow Thursday, and forecasters warned farmers, stranded truckers and strained power companies to brace for more this weekend.
"There's no place to park. No place to stand. People are just trying to stay warm. Their trucks are frozen up. It's a terrible day, I can tell you that," said Darrell Kruljic, who owns a truck stop in Rock Springs, Wyo.
Drivers jammed his and other truck stops in Wyoming, waiting for a snowy 100-mile stretch of Interstate 80 to reopen as the wind chill reached 77 below.
The corned effect of the wind and cold was expected to drop the wind-chill index as low as 60 below in Minnesota and the Dakotas, the National Weather Service said. The wind chill made it feel like 75 below at Livingston, Mont., on Thursday, the day before winter officially begins.
"The system will modify early next week, but until then it will be just brutally cold — stiff winds, and wind chills well below zero," said David Wert of the weather service's office in Norman, Okla.
The cold trailed a snowstorm that arrived Tuesday from Canada. Together, they brought an early Christmas vacation for many students, threatened wheat, apple and other crops, and pushed electricity demand to record levels.
The storm system was blamed for at least 12 deaths since Tuesday, in California, Oklahoma, Oregon and Washington.
Record-lows Thursday included minus-26 degrees in Casper, Wyo.; 25 below in Great Falls and Helena, Mont.; 22 below in Billings, Mont.; 11 at Olympia, Wash., and Eugene, Ore.; 14 at Seattle; 15 at Astoria, Ore., and 23 at Sacramento, Calif.
Temperatures dove into the 40s in Los Angeles and single digits in Oklahoma.
"It's been colder earlier, but it hasn't turned cold this fast all at once," said Bobby Gray of Alva, Okla.
The highest high temperature predicted for Montana on Thursday was minus 2 at Libby, in the northwestern corner of the state. Most of Montana faces lows ranging from minus 10 to 40 below zero through Monday.
North Dakota Gov. George Sinner ordered public schools closed statewide Friday. Temperatures of 20 to 35 below zero were expected to combine with northerly winds of 15 to 25 mph to create a wind chill factor of 60 to 80 degrees below zero.

Bush sees dire results for Saddam

WASHINGTON — President Bush told members of Congress on Thursday he would welcome a strong resolution endorsing military action against Iraq and pledged that Saddam Hussein would "get his ass kicked" if it did come to war.
Meanwhile, the White House played down a general's warning that U.S. ground troops in the Persian Gulf might not be ready to fight Iraq by the Jan. 15 deadline for Iraq's withdrawal from Kuwait, suggesting it might have been an attempt to mislead Saddam.
Bush met with two groups of lawmakers just back from the gulf. They said they discussed whether Bush must seek a declaration of war from Congress before any attack against Iraq, and the possibility of a congressional resolution expressing support for Bush's policies.
Rep. Anthony C. Beilenson, D-Calif., said he believed there should be a declaration of war before the use of force.
However, Beilenson said, "It's not clear, necessarily, what the response of the Congress would be. The president feels... that it's his decision to make."
White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said Bush would welcome a strong endorsement from Congress along the lines of the U.N. resolution that authorizes force against Iraq unless it withdraws from Kuwait by Jan. 15.
On the other hand, he said Bush told lawmakers, "If you're going to debate this for months and not reach a conclusion and argue about it, then that may not be that helpful, or if you're going to water it down."
Fitzwater added, "I'm sure that every committee up there has got 40 brilliant little staff guys running around drafting resolutions."

Symms among heaviest users of mail frank

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Senate spent half as much on taxpayer-subsidized mail this fiscal year than in 1989, after enacting new-appealing limits.
And one of the heaviest correspondents was Idaho Republican Sen. Steve Symms. Lawmakers from rural states like Idaho were able to send more mail per constituent than their colleagues because of a provision setting a minimum mail budget of \$100,000 for each office regardless of state population.
Next year the minimum allowance may be lowered to modify the advantage given to rural lawmakers, said Senate aides.
Symms was one of six senators who sent an average of more than an average of 1.5 pieces of mail to each address in their state, according to a recent analysis of financial disclosures by the Capitol Hill newspaper, Roll Call.
Symms sent 728,135 pieces of mail, but curbed his taxpayer-supported mail bill, according to Secretary of the Senate financial report.
His mail bill went from \$137,185 in fiscal year 1989 to \$109,154 this fiscal year, according to the records. Those figures in

Gem Senate arguments will be on TV

BOISE — If they want, Idahoans will be able to watch Friday's oral arguments before the Idaho Supreme Court on whether the Democrats or Republicans should control the Idaho Senate.
Oral arguments before the court will be televised across the Idaho Educational Public Television network, starting at 9 a.m. Arguments from the lawyers are expected to take one to two hours and will pre-empt programming on the public broadcast stations at Boise, Moscow and Pocatello.
The Senate is tied with 21 members of each party. Republican Lt. Gov. Butch Otter broke the tie at last week's organizing session, and Republicans took control of the chamber. The GOP used Otter's vote to create a new committee, Senate Ways and Means, giving itself a majority on that panel and de facto control of the Senate.
Democrats filed suit over it, contending Otter has no authority to vote on anything except legislation. It asks for an order declaring the organizing session void, requiring a new organizing session.
Two veterans of the political wars will argue the case. Timothy Hopkins, an Idaho Falls Republican and a candidate for the GOP attorney-general nomination in 1974, will argue for Otter and the 21 Senate Republicans.
Carl Burke, a long-time power in the Idaho Democratic Party, will appear for the Democrats.

Resignation ends special U.S.-Soviet relationship

WASHINGTON — The abrupt resignation of Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze removes from the warming super-power relationship a close ally of Mikhail Gorbachev whose candid revelations of his country's troubles and hopes prompted an amiable U.S. response.
This year, alone, Shevardnadze met 19 separate times with Secretary of State James A. Baker III. Together, they explored the Soviets' sagging economy, concluded the arms control treaty and pushed another near completion and plotted ways to end wars in Afghanistan, Angola and Cambodia.
And together, they devised the U.N. Security Council resolution that warns Iraq to withdraw its forces from Kuwait by Jan. 15 or face a military clash.
That threat could not have been levied without the support of Moscow, nor could President Bush have won Security Council adoption of a series of economic sanctions designed to reverse the Aug. 2 invasion.
Shevardnadze, as Gorbachev's foreign minister, was instrumental in closing down the Cold War and plotting with the Bush administration what is now being called a new world order.
The treaty signed in Paris last month by the 16 NATO and six Warsaw Pact nations to slash weapon stockpiles across Europe is only one historic result of the new relationship.
"If you make a dictatorship, no one can say who will become the dictator," Shevardnadze told the Congress of People's Deputies in Moscow as he quit Thursday, a move that surprised Gorbachev and Bush administration officials.
There had been speculation here that Shevardnadze would be given a new portfolio, as prime minister perhaps, but not that he would quit to protest the concentration of powers he had concluded hard-liners were forcing on Gorbachev.
In fact, the stunned Soviet leader said he had planned to appoint Shevardnadze vice president under a government reorganization plan.
The White House took a cautious, wait-and-see approach to the resignation.

It was bitterly cold over all of Idaho Thursday, and the mercury is expected to stay well below freezing, the National Weather Service says.

To fit the conditions, winter arrives at 8:02 p.m. MST today.

The entire state is in the icy grip of an arctic airmass. A low pressure center aloft over southern Idaho continued to produce light snow in that region.

The remainder of the state was sunny to partly cloudy. The extremely cold conditions will remain over the region for the next several days, although they should start to moderate by early next week.

Late afternoon readings varied from 15 degrees above zero at Lowell to 12 degrees below zero at Challis.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 15 degrees at Lowell. Dixie and Reid reported the coldest at 31 degrees below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 89 degrees at McAllen, Texas. The lowest was 39 below zero at Wisdom, Mont.

Deep freeze extends to Plains; rain falls in Southeast

Unusually cold and windy weather continued Thursday to move across the United States, bringing snow to unexpected places and frigid wind chills to others.

Santa Maria, Calif., received their first recorded snow, though not enough fell to measure. Temperatures in the 20s were expected through the weekend in Southern California.

Devastating wind chills were recorded at Rock Springs, Wyo., with 77 below zero, 75 below in Livingston, Mont., between 70 and 80 below zero over much of the Black Hills of South Dakota and 55 below in the Uintah Basin of Utah.

Low temperature records set included 15 degrees in Astoria, Ore.; 26 below in Casper, Wyo.; 14 in Eugene, Ore.; 25 below in Great Falls, Mont.; 11 in Olympia, Wash.; 23 in Sacramento, Calif.; 14 in Seattle-Tacoma, Wash.; and 21 below in Sheridan, Wyo.

Daytons Beach, Fla., hit a record high 83 degrees and Jacksonville, Fla., reported a record 82.

Rain fell at midday along the southern coast of California, and in south-central Arizona, changing to snow over central and northeast Arizona.

Snow fell over northern New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, southern Utah, central and eastern Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, most of Kansas, the Oklahoma and Texas panhandles, much of Iowa, Minnesota, northwest Wisconsin and eastern upper Michigan.

Freezing rain extended from southwest Oklahoma into southeast Kansas, northwest Missouri and south central Utah. Rain reached from northern Mississippi through Tennessee, northern Alabama, into parts of Georgia and the Carolinas.

Thursday-morning's low temperature for the Lower-48 states was 39 below zero at Wisdom, Mont.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EST ranged from 24 below zero at Butte to 88 at McAllen, Texas.

than 200 trucks at the Traveler's Oasis truck stop southwest of Eden.

Slack roads and snowdrifts left many motorists stranded and law enforcement officers spent most of the day shoveling out unlucky travelers.

"People need to realize that if they get stuck out there, they need to have a box in the car that has some type of clothes and they should carry a shovel," said Bill Galkin of the National Weather Service office in Kimberly. "It doesn't take long for flesh to freeze in weather like this."

"Temperatures barely crept above zero on Thursday, up to 2 degrees in Twin Falls, 9 degrees in Jerome and minus-2 in Hiley."

The weather service said temperatures were headed much lower this morning — the first day of winter — and even lower on Saturday. The

forecast low for Twin Falls Friday morning was minus 10 and for Saturday minus 15. Forecasters said Wood River Valley and Camas Prairie residents should expect lows below minus 20 Saturday morning.

While Twin Falls, Jerome, Blaine, Camas, Cassia and Minidoka counties were digging out Thursday, the storm left comparatively little snow in Gooding and Lincoln counties.

Calm winds and cloud cover moderated conditions on Thursday, but forecasters predicted that would disappear by Saturday.

"We're going to have sunshine by the weekend and the west winds that are going to make it very cold-out there," said Galkin.

The forecast for today for Twin Falls is for a high of minus 2 and winds of between 5 and 15 mph.

The wind-chill factor would make that combination feel like minus 27 to exposed areas.

Forecasters said a combination of a forecast nighttime low of minus 15 would make it feel like minus 40.

"If you're going to be outside, it's important that you have gloves and a hat," said Galkin. "Most heat loss is through the head."

Driving conditions remained severe throughout the Magic Valley with the exception of some highways in Gooding, Lincoln and Blaine counties. Light winds throughout most of the day Thursday allowed crews to remove snowdrifts from roads.

Auto parts stores and auto service centers throughout the valley were doing land office business Thursday, mostly in snow tires, batteries, anti-freeze, radiator heaters and anti-icing gasoline additives.

Horizon Airline had allowed let-ter-carriers to the Postal Service was experiencing no insurmountable problems getting holiday mail delivered.

"We have our trucks chained up, and so far we've been getting through," Bradshaw said. "Most routes are normal."

Bradshaw said he had not heard of any rural routes on which mail could not be delivered.

South-central Idaho's two operating ski resorts, Sun Valley and Pomerelle near Albion, were able to open Thursday. Magic Mountain south of Hansen was slated to open for the season today and Soldier Mountain north of Fairfield on Saturday.

Because of extreme weather conditions, owners of livestock should make sure their animals have protection from the wind or plenty of food or both, said Bill Hazen, Twin Falls County Extension agent.

"The wind-chill factor has the same effect on livestock as it does on people," Hazen said.

Animals can consume 20 percent to 50 percent more feed when exposed to cold wind. Straw or other bedding is important for young animals to keep them off the cold snow.

Cattle need water; they can't eat snow. That means extra work keeping water, troughs running and tanks thawed.

Galkin said daytime temperatures should climb back into the teens by Tuesday.

"Right now, it's looking pretty good for Christmas Day," he said.

clude \$9,414 Symms' office spent on paper and printing for that mail.

By comparison, Sen. James McClure's franking bill showed he was winding down his office before leaving the Senate. The Idaho Republican's bill for mail dropped from \$238,401 in fiscal year 1989 to \$320,000 this year. He sent out only 192,425 pieces of mail, or an average of 42 letters to each Idaho address, according to Roll Call.

The "franking" privilege accorded to members of Congress allows senators and House members to send contents everything from town meeting announcements to questionnaires, while charging the bill to the taxpayer.

Under fire from critics who charge that the mail gives an unfair advantage to incumbents in election years, the Senate voted last week to cap this year. Members' mail expenditure dropped from \$35.5 million in fiscal year 1989 to \$15.1 this year, below the \$24 million appropriated.

"That includes \$4.5 million spent on individual pieces and small amounts of first-class mail by Senators and committees.

Lawmakers from rural states were allowed to send more letters per state address because they argued

that their constituents rely upon them more for Washington news. Senate aides said. The lawmakers do argue that their mail bills are substantial compared to lawmakers from more populous states.

But the \$100,000 minimum has meant that rural senators can send up to five times as much mail per constituent than urban senators. They also have a mail advantage, according to a 2-to-1 difference, according to staff.

For example, Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., who spent more than other senators on franked mail, cost taxpayers \$11 million with nearly 7.5 million pieces of mail. Nevertheless, his mail cost only, on average, 0.6 pieces received per household.

By comparison, Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, only spent \$98,256 on mass mail, but was able to send an average of 2.4 pieces to households in his state.

The House sent \$72.9 million worth of franked mail this fiscal year, costing the taxpayer \$15.7 million more than in fiscal year 1989.

Up to now, House members have not been required to keep mailing records making it virtually impossible to calculate how much mail was sent by individual offices. Offices will be required to report next year.

General's remark relieved tension around Jan. 15 deadline

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army Lt. Gen. Calvin Waller's candor caught political Washington off guard, but former military leaders said Thursday he merely stated the obvious in declaring that U.S. troops won't be ready to take the offensive when the U.N.'s Iraqi pullout deadline arrives.

Whether by design or accident, they added, Waller relieved President Bush of the tension building around Jan. 15 as the moment for

action if Saddam Hussein fails to withdraw his invasion forces from Kuwait.

"I had to guess, I'd say it was the kind of a spontaneous remark which you guys (in the media) have given excessive velocity to," said Lt. Gen. William Odom, a former Army chief of staff for intelligence and head of the intelligence-gathering National Security Agency in the Reagan administration.

"There may be great machinations behind all this," Odom said. "But

with the limited knowledge I have of what the realities are... it has long been clear to me that a March date was about all we could meet. To hear Waller say that comes as no surprise."

On the other hand, Robert Hunter, director of Middle East Affairs on the National Security Council in the Reagan White House, said Waller's remarks may have reflected the military's distaste for what is bound to be a costly war.

And retired Army Col. Harry G. Summers Jr., a distinguished fellow at the Army War College, said Waller's comment made U.S. post-Jan. 15 intentions all the more uncertain for Saddam.

"It clouds the issue and it should be cloudy," he said.

Waller, second in command of Operation Desert Shield behind Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, told reporters in Saudi Arabia on Wednesday that if Bush wanted to attack

sharply after Jan. 15 he would advise the president, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, "that until our full complement of forces are on the ground that we should not initiate hostile activities."

The statement appeared to undercut Bush's strategy of steadily increasing pressure on Saddam. White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater sought to minimize its im-

pact, and on Thursday a top Cheney aide stressed that, whatever the readiness of ground forces, American air power will be prepared to strike Iraq hard by the Jan. 15 deadline.

Odom said he couldn't discount the possibility that Waller's seeming candor was staged for a strategic purpose. "It's entirely possible that there's some ventriloquy going on, but I am inclined to doubt it," he said.

Drug abuse hasn't fallen off in inner cities

Drug treatment experts disputed President Bush's statistics on declining drug use Thursday, saying they ignore the very populations affected most by addiction: the homeless and the inner-city poor.

"If you're in prison, if you're homeless, if you're mentally ill and on the street, you simply don't exist in these statistics," said Steve Dnistrian, a spokesman for New York City's Phoenix House, the nation's largest residential drug treatment center.

"I think the numbers are very misleading. You'll see declines out in, say, Searsdale or parts of Orange County, California, but not in East

Study says home abuse leads to violent children

WASHINGTON (AP) — A study of young children finds that physical abuse at home is more strongly linked to later aggressive behavior than are such factors as poverty, divorce or marital violence.

John E. Bates said Thursday a study that followed 309 children from age 4 into kindergarten showed that those who were physically abused by an adult at home were more likely to be aggressive — or even violent — in difficult social situations.

Abuse, he said, is more powerful by far than any other home influence on how a child learns to cope.

The study, to be published Friday in the journal Science, attempted to eliminate from consideration all factors other than abuse the child might

Harlem or Watts." Nina Peyser, executive director of the chemical dependency institute at Beth Israel Medical Center, said there has been no evidence of a decrease in New York City in recent memory.

"Absolutely not. We have had waiting lists as long as I've been here, and I've been here 15 years," said Peyser, whose center treats 8,100 heroin addicts in the city.

The study also fails to address drug-related problems such as pregnant addicts, AIDS, and the dysfunctional families created by drug use — all of which still plague the inner city, the experts noted.

The Household Survey on Drug

Abuse, released Wednesday, reported that use of any illicit drug dropped 24 percent during the last five years. The survey, conducted by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, also found a 72 percent drop in casual cocaine use during the past five years.

"These people missed the cocaine epidemic. ... In the treatment field we don't pay much attention to NIDA studies," said Scott McMillin, director of the addiction treatment center at Suburban Hospital in Bethesda, Md.

Rene Topalain, assistant director of drug abuse services for the Los Angeles County Department of Health, said it was too early to declare victory in the war on drugs.

"We are still dealing with the issue of cocaine babies, AIDS and the transmission of AIDS by people who are drug users and heavy alcohol use," said Topalain. "So I would

have been exposed to at home.

Included in the study were children from both rural and urban areas, from different social and economic levels and from areas of two different states.

Boys and girls were about equal in the group and 83 percent were white, 16 percent African-American and 1 percent were of other races. Abused children were identified by physical examinations and interviews with the parents and the children.

Levels of aggression were determined by a number of tests, including evaluations by kindergarten teachers, who didn't know if the children had been abused, and by interviews with classmates.

Research groups closing in on gene

WASHINGTON — Two research groups reported Thursday they have closed in on a gene that increases susceptibility to breast cancer in some families.

Mary-Claire King of the University of California, Berkeley, said that in a needle-in-a-haystack quest for a gene linked to the disease, her research group has narrowed the search to a specific chromosome. "We're now at the point of knowing the handful of hay in which this needle lies, as opposed to having to search through the whole haystack," she said in an interview.

U.S. officials see no point in trade talks

WASHINGTON — U.S. officials said Thursday there's no point in resuming global trade talks until West European countries show they are ready to compromise on cutting farm subsidies.

Arthur Dunkel, the director general of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, got that message in talks here on prospects for reviving the 107-nation negotiations that collapsed two weeks ago in Brussels, Belgium, the officials said.

Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yeutter told Dunkel on Wednesday that the United States does not favor another ministerial meeting "until the European community changes its position on agriculture," Yeutter's spokesman said.

Legislator: Regulator didn't repay loans

WASHINGTON — A member of a regional regulatory board overseeing savings institutions in four states did not fully repay loans from thrifts under his purview, a legislator said Thursday.

Richard H. Hughes, a Dallas business executive, served on the board of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Topeka from 1979 until resigning Dec. 13.

During his tenure, he received "multiple loans totaling \$6 million from five different thrift institutions within the Topeka region," Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., said in a letter to Housing Secretary Jack Kemp.

Health officials say AIDS cousins rare

ATLANTA — After a year of blood testing, federal health officials concluded Thursday that two cousins of the AIDS virus, one of which causes leukemia, remain rare in the United States.

The Food and Drug Administration recommended in November 1988 that blood centers test all donated blood for HTLV-I, a virus that causes a vicious form of adult leukemia.

Only 902 of 6.4 million blood donations during 1989 — or 0.014 percent — tested positive for the virus, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday. The Council of Community Blood Centers, another blood-donation organization, reported a similar rate — 0.018 percent — among its 2.8 million donations from December 1988 through the end of '89.

Financier will appeal 10-year sentence

NEW YORK — Lawyers for convicted junk bond financier Michael Milken have notified a federal court they intend to appeal his 10-year prison sentence.

The legal notice of appeal was filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court. It does not state the basis for the appeal.

Milken, 44, was sentenced last month by U.S. District Judge Kimba Wood for his guilty plea to six felony counts related to illegal securities trading.

Consumers keep tight grip on wallets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumers kept a tight grip on their wallets in November.

They spent just 0.1 percent more than they did in October while their income growth merely matched the 0.3 percent growth in inflation, the government said Thursday.

Analysts said they see no immediate improvement.

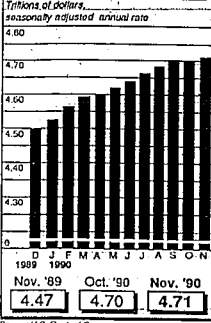
The Commerce Department said spending totaled a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$3.73 trillion, up from \$3.72 trillion in October. The October total was unchanged from September and was the first month spending had not increased since last May.

At the same time, incomes totaled a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$4.71 trillion, up from \$4.70 trillion the previous month when they rose 0.5 percent.

But the department attributed the income gain solely to an increase in farm subsidies. Excluding those payments, it said, personal income essentially stood flat in November. "That explains why consumers are not spending very much," Michael K. Evans, head of a Washington forecasting firm, said.

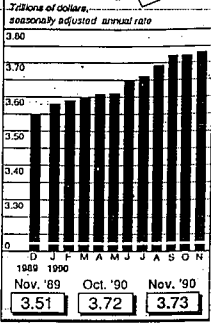
Economist Sandra Shaber of the Futures Group in Washington agreed, saying too much emphasis is being placed on "the huge plunge in consumer confidence" for the decline in

spending. "The real reason is much more serious... and that's that the economy is so weak," she said. "People's purchasing power is being squeezed."

Squeezed so much that consumers

apparently are dipping into their savings. Americans' savings rate — savings as a percentage of disposable income — was 4.0 percent, up from a 3.7 percent rate in October but down from the 4.6 percent rate for all of 1989.

Americans' disposable incomes — incomes after taxes — inched up 0.3 percent after remaining flat the previous month.

The spending and income figures were not adjusted for inflation. When adjusted, spending actually fell 0.2 percent after a 0.8 percent decline in October, the lowest since a 2.2 percent decrease in April 1987.

Disposable incomes, when adjusted for inflation, did not budge from October, when they declined 0.8 percent, the steepest drop since a 1.1 percent decline in April 1989.

A key component of the income category — wages and salaries — fell \$3.9 billion following a revised \$15.3 billion decline the previous month. The October drop was even worse than the \$9.3 billion first reported.

Spending on durable goods — usually expensive products expected to last at least three years — fell \$9.0 billion in November after a \$12.8 billion drop in October. Non-durable purchases were up \$6.5 billion following a \$2.2 billion gain a month earlier. Spending on services rose \$5.4 billion, nearly half of the \$10.7 billion advance in October.

U.S. businesses slash investment plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — American businesses, worried about recession, plan a barely perceptible 0.4 percent increase in spending to modernize in 1991, the most pessimistic outlook for business investment in five years.

The findings released in a Commerce Department report Thursday showed that the pessimism about the future that had been widely reflected in surveys of consumer confidence has spread to American businesses.

"The plans for 1991 reflect increasingly tough times in the economy," said Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co.

The 0.4 percent increase, after adjusting for inflation, would follow a projected advance of 4.1 percent for this year.

It would be the weakest showing since business investment fell 3.1 percent in 1986, when American manufacturers battered by a flood of foreign goods cut back plans to expand and modernize.

Some economists said even the tiny 0.4 percent gain was unlikely if the recession turns out to be worse than expected. The estimate, they said, is

based on a survey taken in October and early November.

Since then, evidence has mounted that the downturn could be worse than originally believed. A report last week showed industrial output fell in November at the steepest pace since the end of the last recession in 1981-82.

Sinai predicted that when the actual 1991 spending is totaled, it will show business investment falling anywhere from 3 percent to 5 percent. That would act as a further drag on the economy because business investment in each of the past two years has contributed about one-fifth of the economy's total growth.

Brandt: Germany's responsible for Israel

BERLIN (AP) — Willy Brandt, the elder statesman of German politics, on Thursday opened the first session of the newly elected parliament by saying the united nation was responsible for the safety of the Jewish state.

The former chancellor also said he hoped for a settlement of Israel's conflicts with its Arab neighbors.

The 662-member parliament elected Dec. 2, met in the gleaming, flower-decorated chamber of the Reichstag building, near what was

once the Berlin Wall. Lawmakers from east and west formally began work, while outside the imposing, battle-scarred edifice, German flags flew proudly in snowy skies.

Legislators elected Rita Süssmuth as speaker, giving the politician the same job she held in the parliament of former West Germany and in the interim body that followed the Oct. 3 unification of the two German states.

One day after his 77th birthday,

Brandt delivered the keynote speech, an honor he received as the oldest lawmaker.

"Is there anyone in the chamber who was born before Dec. 18, 1913?" he asked jokingly at the start of his speech. "Apparently no one wants to admit it or can admit it."

That drew a laugh from Chancellor Helmut Kohl, 60, and other lawmakers present. In addition to urging resolution of the 4½-month-old Persian Gulf crisis, Brandt touched on German relations with Israel.

"We cannot escape our joint responsibility for the security and well-being of the state of Israel," said the Nobel Peace Prize winner. "To that I add the urgent hope for an agreement with the Arab neighbors." Brandt did not elaborate.

Germans are agreed on the special responsibilities they bear following the Nazi Holocaust that claimed the lives of 6 million Jews. But German leaders also are increasingly insistent on resolution of the Arab-Israeli conflicts.

Dad knows how to shout

TOKYO (AP) — A 36-year-old father of three won a shouting contest Thursday with a roar louder than a passing train.

"If YOU want a war, YOO GO!" Yoshihiko Kato shouted. The sound-meter-registered 115.8 decibels, more than 15 percent louder than the racket of a train passing overhead on an elevated railroad.

For that, the self-employed Kato, who admitted he probably built up his voice shouting at his

children, won the \$750 grand prize of the 10th Annual Halls Year-End Loud Voice Contest.

Kato didn't explain the content of his yell. Some thought it was directed against the Japanese government, which has heeded strong opposition and dropped a proposal to send troops to fill non-combat roles in the U.S.-led multinational forces deployed against Iraq.

Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, however, was a target of some of the 54 contestants.

Emotions are mixed in Panama

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — With a mixture of gratitude and indignation, Panama on Thursday observed the anniversary of last year's U.S. military invasion that ousted Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

"That action itself cannot lead us to proclaim a national holiday, because it was an invasion and no Panamanian likes to see his country invaded, with the consequences of deaths and injuries," said Foreign Minister Julio Linares.

"Neither can we say it is a day of national mourning because it liberated us from dictatorship."

The government scheduled the date a "day of national reflection," while the families of Panamanians killed in the invasion set a "grand black march" of protest for the evening.

Hundreds of families left homeless by the invasion demonstrated for government housing at a rally Thursday night and lasted into early Thursday.

But the streets of Panama City were mostly filled with Christmas shoppers on anniversary morning, and a scheduled picket of the U.S. Embassy did not materialize.

Newspapers reflected the ambivalence that is the invasion's legacy.

"Panama is a country with a future that is more promising every day. And that is the principal difference between the country today and the country of one year ago," said the newspaper La Prensa said.

But the daily La Estrella warned against continued U.S. military presence in the country.

"Our territorial integrity continues to be seriously damaged and at times disastrously compromised even by the federal government," it said.

Joint U.S.-Panamanian military patrols were scheduled to end this month and have not. The U.S. Army was called out at President Guillermo Endara's request to put down a minor police revolt Dec. 5.

About 10,000 U.S. soldiers are stationed in Panama under the Panama Canal treaty, providing security for the waterway.

Fight disease, WHO urges

GENEVA (AP) — The World Health Organization on Thursday urged greater efforts to reduce the estimated 250 million cases of sexually transmitted infections that occur each year.

The U.N. agency said although education and medical programs have helped combat the spread of infections such as gonorrhea and chlamydia, the number of cases in the Third World remains "unacceptably high."

Dr. Andre Meheus, a senior WHO official, told a press conference that sexually transmitted infections pose an "important public health problem," and may lead to sterility, infertility, stillbirths, blindness, brain damage, cancer or death.

A WHO report said the most common infection is trichomoniasis, a parasitic infestation causing vaginal discharge in women. It estimated there are 120 million cases each year. The report said some 50 million cases of the bacterial infection chlamydia occur worldwide.

'Empire of the Sunset' idea unlikely but worth exploring

If Western Europe can do it, why not the western end of North America?

That's the reasoning of legislators from several U.S. states and Canadian provinces, who met in Seattle a week ago. They propose something akin to the European Economic Community, uniting this region's vast resources into a single economic force.

Though the idea may be politically implausible, some aspects of it could offer benefits.

Lawmakers at the Pacific Northwest Legislative Leadership Forum talked about a hypothetical union of five Western states and two provinces: Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Alaska, British Columbia and Alberta.

Those five states and two provinces combine to form (hypothetically) an economic powerhouse: With a combined population of 15 million, they have a gross product of \$280 billion.

That would make this fantasy empire the world's No. 10 economic player. Not bad for a bunch of cowboys and backwoodsmen.

Remember, though, that it's only a hypothetical empire. The entities involved are political subdivisions of two sovereign nations. The kind of political and monetary unification being contemplated in Europe is neither feasible nor desirable.

Even so, greater cooperation among Westerners of our two nations makes sense.

Culturally and economically, U.S. Northwesterners and British

Columbians have more in common with each other than with Easterners of either country. We share common problems, similar resource bases, comparable geography and sometimes even weather.

The legislative conference offered some ideas worth pursuing:

- Regional advertising and promotion for tourism, along with removal of government restrictions on tourism and travelers.

- Cooperation between timber companies and wood-products manufacturers on both sides of the border.

- Regional planning for work-force needs.

- Marketing the region's expertise in environmental cleanup. Thanks in part to the Hanford Nuclear Reservation, Northwesters have a leg up on competitors from other regions. Already, 800 companies here are working on cleanups ranging from town dumps to Hanford.

Environmental cleanup will be a growth industry over the next decade, and a Canadian official at the conference predicted the region could realize \$5 billion a year from it by 2000. That's worth some attention.

Ideas such as these may sound futuristic and idealistic. But big opportunities often do.

Although an "Empire of the Sunset" is probably out of the realm of possibility, the benefits of thinking regionally are not. The idea born in Seattle this month could stand exploration by business and government leaders on both sides of the border.



State offers pathetically slim hope for youth

It was recently announced that the state plans to make an initial investment of \$741,000 to establish one juvenile detention center in Jerome County. Another such detention center is planned for Minidoka County. Statewide, Idaho has made a commitment to spend \$6 million to establish juvenile detention centers to serve every region. This, of course, is only the initial cost. It is anticipated that the two juvenile jails in the Magic Valley alone will cost a million dollars a year to operate and maintain.

A recent study projected that 14 juvenile detention beds would be adequate to serve the entire Magic Valley area. Yet, these two facilities will provide 40 beds. The sad part about providing more beds for youth than needed is that such beds are almost always filled.

Though this huge financial commitment resolves one serious problem (to finally respond to the federal mandate which prohibits the jailing of youth in adult institutions), it also raises a significant question concerning the logic of the Legislature. While punishment is a relevant part of dealing with boys and girls in trouble, a large percentage of the youth now detained can be treated and rehabilitated with the proper care and a coordinated effort. As with adults, an estimated 85 percent of the youth arrested are jailed because of alcohol/drug-

related offenses. Unfortunately, the focus on diverting and assisting youth with these problems has, until recently, been non-existent and today is pathetically minimal.

After much debate and deliberation, the state this year finally committed just a little more than \$4,000 to provide residential treatment for chemically involved youth. In a year's time, this works out to just 50 youth, or about seven boys and girls in each region. This comparatively trivial investment in the treatment and recovery of Idaho's youth is a negligent and embarrassing confession of priorities.

Certainly, there is a percentage of youth that for whatever reason are bad have committed serious crimes and should be punished. It is, however, my belief that a great number of these youth can be helped and will respond to treatment if given the opportunity. The clear danger is that by solely punishing and not helping these youth, we set them up as future candidates for adult institutions.

Today's inmates in a detention center will be the same individuals incarcerated in our

state prisons tomorrow. I have seen firsthand (through our evaluation of inmates at the prison in Boise and our programs at the correctional facilities in Orofino and Cottonwood) that the majority of the state inmates were - only yesterday - our youth, since today most inmates are under 30 years of age. If we are going to curb the flow of young people eventually going to adult jails and prisons (and the additional need for more adult jails), we must start helping youth instead of just warehousing them.

There is much talk and interest in alcohol/drug programs to prevent youth from developing problems and dependency on drugs and alcohol. There should also be a concentrated interest and determination to treat youth who have legal problems as a result of drug use. This may well prevent them from becoming life-long liabilities to our counties and state and give them a chance to become productive members of our communities.

When we repeatedly state that our youth are our hope for the future, we must remember that these troubled youth are part of that future. Those in a position to make decisions need to rethink both their logic and priorities.

Stanton may have thought his wife was suffering from a terminal illness, Crystal said. An autopsy has been done, but Crystal said he did not have the results Thursday.

Billman asked to form Centennial Park committee

TWIN FALLS — To water-ski or not to water-ski.

That is the question facing Twin Falls County over development of Centennial Waterfront Park in the Snake River Canyon.

To help answer that question, the Twin Falls County Parks and Recreation Board and the Twin Falls County Commission have asked Blaine Billman of Twin Falls to put together an advisory committee of people on both sides of the issue to come up with a compromise.

The county applied for and received a \$57,000 state grant to help build a waterfront park with facilities for motorboats. But the area is not a good water-skiing area,

Billman said. It can accommodate only a few boats at a time.

"It's absurd for one group to want to dominate an area just to satisfy a handful of people," he said.

But banning water-skiers or restricting motorboats could mean the county would lose the grant, which comes out of state gasoline taxes, and perhaps other money for the park.

The decision to form an advisory committee grew out of a stormy public hearing last week during which proponents of the park's development debated opponents of allowing motorboats in that stretch of the river.

Billman, a Twin Falls artist, said the committee would focus on what sort of park and what sort of use will best serve the

needs of the Magic Valley. It also will look at what other funding sources might be available that wouldn't be tied to motor boats.

The committee may also look at alternatives such as different levels of park development and boating restrictions such as wake zones and speed zones. It may also consider building a park and not worry about the waterfront.

But all the money available for developing the park is tied one way or another to waterfront development, County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said. That, however, doesn't necessarily mean turning the quiet stretch of water between the Perrine Bridge and Pillar Falls over to powerboats.

"We always did assume there would have to be some restrictions," he said.

The committee is to include representatives from the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, the Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, the Twin Falls Rotary Club, the county parks board and private citizens including interests such as hiking, fishing, hunting, canoeing and water skiing.

Billman said he hopes to have the committee assembled to meet before Jan. 5.

In the meantime, the county still needs to get the go-ahead from the BLM for development of the land it administers at the park site and there's planning and engineering to do and contracts that could be let.

"We're not going to stand around with our hands in our pockets," Hempleman said.

Rancher pleads innocent to threat

BOISE — An 80-year-old Oakley rancher who gained national notoriety for allegedly threatening to slit the throat of a Twin Falls District ranger, has pleaded innocent to a federal offense.

Winslow B. Whiteley filed the plea Wednesday through his Twin Falls attorney, Brad Browning, in U.S. District Court in Boise.

Whiteley's Twin Falls attorney, Ken Pedersen, said at Whiteley's preliminary

hearing here last month that his client would plead innocent.

No trial date has been set.

Whiteley is accused of "threatening (a) Forest Service officer" in the federal complaint. The charge stems from an Aug. 19 New York Times article in which Whiteley was quoted as saying, "Myself and every other one of the permit holders would cut his throat if we could get him alone."

Twin Falls District Ranger Donald Oman is the officer in question. Oman brought armed federal officers to

a cattle count last summer. He claims the grazing permittees have abused the range, but cattlemen called his actions "Gestapo tactics" and asked the Forest Service to transfer Oman out.

After Oman filed a whistleblower complaint, the agency reneged on its agreement and announced Oman would stay in the district.

Whiteley has stated he did not realize the caller was a reporter, and that he was misquoted.

United Way tops its goal

TWIN FALLS — For the first time since the mid-1980s, United Way of Magic Valley has reached its campaign goal.

"We said we would get our goal by Christmas, and we did," United Way President Dan Brizec said.

Brizec said Thursday the campaign had topped its \$265,000 goal — which was \$10,000 lower than the target goal from last year's campaign.

"We said we wanted to set a goal we could reach," Brizec said. The campaign's original deadline was Thanksgiving, but contributions continued to trickle in after that date.

Donations have been stagnant in recent years. United Way last year decided to lower its sights from the \$275,000 goal in the last campaign.

Last year's campaign gathered in \$250,000, and the 1988 campaign collected \$252,000. The 1987 campaign collected a little more than \$230,000.

Officials looking at who pays and who doesn't

HAGERMAN — City officials are looking for guidelines to decide which residential businesses should be charged with the commercial water rate.

Residents run a variety of businesses from their homes, such as beauty shops and retail outlets. And they offer many services such as car repair work, used car sales, accounting services and dance lessons.

The problem is that some residential

businesses are paying the commercial water rate but others are paying the residential rate, City Clerk-Corona Lloyd told to the Hagerman City Council Tuesday.

"We need to have some uniformity," she said.

The city's monthly residential water rate is \$11 and the commercial rate is \$14.25.

Lloyd said that since the city has no water meters to measure consumption and also does not require business licenses, the council needs to establish guidelines to determine which water rate a home business should be charged.

In a related problem, three businesses in one building are paying one rate.

"It's not equal," Councilwoman Audrey Hoffman said. "It's not right."

Although they agreed some guidelines need to be set up, council members were hesitant to charge all businesses the commercial rate.

"I hate to get too sticky, there," Rolly Zollinger said.

There is a fine line between what is a business and what is not, he said.

Judge grants intervention order in school funding suit

BOISE — A group of 33 Idaho school districts will be allowed to intervene in a lawsuit challenging the formula used to apportion state public school funding to local school districts.

Fourth District Judge Gerald Schroeder on Thursday signed an order allowing the districts to intervene in the lawsuit.

The 33 school districts and other plain-

tiffs have filed their own lawsuit over school funding. But at a Dec. 10 court hearing, attorney Robert Huntley argued that the districts he represents, which include Dietrich, stands to lose \$3 million per year in state funding if the other lawsuit succeeds.

"The parties who seek to intervene are comparable to the plaintiffs," Schroeder said. "However, they apparently believe that action favorable to the plaintiffs

claims may be adverse to their interests.

"It appears that if the plaintiffs have a right to proceed in this case, the parties who seek to intervene have a right to be heard," the judge said.

A group of 19 school districts, including Twin Falls, are challenging the formula used to dole out school funds.

A second lawsuit was filed by Huntley's group which also includes four students and their parents and six other taxpayers. It

simply contends that the state isn't putting enough money into public school support to meet the constitutional requirement of an equal and proper education in the school system.

The lawsuits are separate now, but could become one.

There's a motion to consolidate. Deputy Attorney General Williams von Tegen said the state does not oppose the motion.

Bus crash victim remains in critical condition while others improve

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Authorities are stymied in their search for the identity of one of the seven people killed when a Greyhound bus collided with an out-of-control truck near the Utah-Wyoming border.

The Utah Highway Patrol has released the names of six of the seven, but the identity of the seventh — a black male, about 30 years old — remained a mystery late Thursday.

Sgt. Gary Whitney said all efforts to find out who the man was had failed, but the UHP and state medical examiner's office had not given up.

The unidentified victim was carrying a discount shopper card from the Sacramento area, but the name on the card apparently wasn't his, Whitney said.

Authorities still are going on the assumption the man likely is from north-central California, he added.

"They've been checking the area, where they thought he might be from. They faxed down (to Sacramento) copies of his fingerprints, but they couldn't get a match," Whitney said.

The medical examiner next made original prints from the body and these are being sent to Sacramento law enforcement officials in hopes a clearer set of prints may be matched.

The man's fingerprints also are being filed in an automatic fingerprint information system that covers 11 western states and sent to the FBI.

"That's not coming up right positive, so right now we're really not too close (to identifying the victim)," Whitney acknowledged.

Killed in the Tuesday morning crash on Interstate 80 10 miles from the Wyoming border were: Neddie Hernandez, 41, of Idaho Falls, Idaho, and her 7-year-old daughter, Tina Marie Jones; Lance E. Jenkins, 28, Glendale, Ore.; Troy Jenkins, 20, Lebanon, Ore.; Malinda Martin, 19, Afion, Wyo., and Marie E. Yeager, 55, Orem, Utah.

Irene Mollico of Western Springs, Ill., was upgraded to fair condition at Evanston (Ill.) Regional Hospital, where four others were in satis-

factory condition.

Chandon Peter Gomez, 18, of Bangladesh was upgraded from critical to serious condition at LDS Hospital in Salt Lake.

John Mutungi, 19, Kenya, remained in critical condition. Thursday, Donna Burt, 25, Amberson, Pa., was upgraded to fair condition, said a nursing supervisor at the University of Utah Health Sciences Center.

Other passengers were bused Wednesday from Evanston to Salt Lake City with the option of flying or traveling by rail to their destinations at Greyhound's expense.

Among those arriving at the Salt Lake Greyhound Depot Wednesday night was Bud McVeoy, who was driving the bus when the accident occurred.

McVeoy recalled that when the bus — with 43 passengers aboard — came to a rest after tipping over and sliding down a 30-foot embankment, he found himself dangling from his seat belt.

Inside the bloody coach, injured passengers were screaming and moaning, struggling to extricate themselves from the wreckage and bodies of others.

But they soon calmed down, helping each other get free of the bus.

"We got on the P.A. system, and were able to quiet people down. The people were very cooperative," McVeoy said.

McVeoy said he has worked for Greyhound for seven months, but more than 20 years experience driving professionally.

He also said he is a trained emergency medical technician.

But "nothing ever prepared me for what was going on inside that bus," he said. "About all we could do was manage."

The bus left San Francisco at 1

p.m. PST Monday and Chicago was its final destination.

Authorities said a tractor-trailer rig slid off the icy, snowplow-tripped westbound level of "divided" I-80, down around the median and into the eastbound bus and another truck.

The bus careened off the road and tipped over, coming to rest about 35 feet from the highway, Whitney said several vehicles behind the bus then collided with each other.

The wreckage was taken to Coatsville, Utah, for examination by investigators from UHP, the Nation-

al Transportation Safety Board and the National Highway Safety Board.

Robert Williams, 46, of Salt Lake City, was the driver of the west-bound truck, owned by Wanship Enterprises of Salt Lake City, Whitney said.

The second truck was owned by Brian-Horse-of-Arizona and driven by Homer G. Dover.

Mike Peery, owner of Wanship Enterprises, said Williams told him he swerved to avoid colliding with a car that may have lost control.

Wife may be due husband's pension, appeals court says

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals has concluded that a Bannock County divorce case falls into a "gap" created by changing laws and court decisions on whether a spouse can claim a portion of the military pension earned by a marriage partner.

The court on Thursday reversed a lower court ruling and sent the divorce case back to district court for hearings on the value of a pension earned by Matthew D. Brooks, and what portion his ex-wife is entitled to.

Lower court denied an effort by Marsha Brooks to re-open the di-

voiced order to claim a portion of the pension.

But the Court of Appeals said the case qualifies under special laws designed to cope with a "gap" between a U.S. Supreme Court decision and Congressional action.

The court upheld a lower court decision increasing support payments for four children by \$25 per month, but dismissed most of the woman's appeal because she presented no transcript of earlier court proceedings.

In another decision Thursday, the court upheld the mandatory five year prison term ordered for Roger

Lee Pelletier in a Kootenai County case. Pelletier was convicted of lewd conduct involving two teen-age girls, while on probation for a similar crime in the state of Washington.

The Court of Appeals concluded Pelletier's 19-year record of sex abuses justified a prison term to protect society from him.

The court also agreed with dismissal of a personal injury lawsuit against Washington Water Power Co., filed in Kootenai County by Thomas and Ninfa Gerstner.

The court upheld a lower court order in 1989 dismissing a lawsuit filed in 1984.

Hansen schools to join computer age

HANSEN — Computer technology will be a part of the school curriculum here.

Trustees approved the purchase of four IBM compatible personal computers, printers and software during its meeting Monday.

The new computers will be used in the secondary school.

The machines, purchased from Blake Micro Systems of Twin Falls, will replace the Commodore and Apple computers currently in use.

Superintendent Richard Smith said the school will pay about \$7,000 to set up the new computer lab.

School Board members asked Smith to reassess the financial situation to determine whether more computers can be purchased this year.

Smith said money may be available but recent cutbacks in state funding could cause problems.

Idaho has experienced an enrollment

increase larger than was predicted. This increase has reduced the amount of money available on a per classroom unit basis.

Hansen schools have about 204 classroom units, Smith said. A classroom unit is 19 elementary students or 12 secondary students.

Last year, the school received \$40,563 per classroom unit. As of November, the figure is \$39,546 per classroom unit. Smith's \$1,017 reduction per unit may affect the district.

However, he said he feels Hansen has seen a slight increase in enrollment, which may even out the change.

Due to the recent change in Idaho law, the school district will be writing a policy regarding the enrollment of out-of-district students.

Trustees agreed to meet Jan. 7 in a work session to discuss the issue.

The district currently has no policy, Smith said. The new open enrollment law is to take effect in September, 1991.

Smith said he has about six secondary students who have asked to remain in Hansen schools although their families have moved away.

Other out-of-district students are usually those of teachers who live outside of Hansen. There is no formal policy on this matter either, he said.

In other business:

The district will spend \$30,588 for the purchase of a new 65-passenger bus from Harlow Bus Company of Boise. The company has offered the school \$750 trade-in value for the bus being replaced. The district has about 120 days to make a decision. Smith said the last time Harlow's bus, it fetched nearly double Harlow's trade-in offer.

The district has experienced a \$5 million decrease in assessed value, Smith said. Last year, assessment was \$48 million, Smith said, this translates to about \$6 more tax per \$10,000 assessed property value for patrons.

Former chief has heart attack

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — June A. Carter, the former Wendover police chief charged with distributing cocaine, has suffered a heart attack and is in guarded condition at the Pioneer Valley Hospital, officials said.

The heart attack came the day before the 35-year-old Carter was scheduled to appear in court and plead guilty to a charge of possession of cocaine, according to attorney Steven Lee Payton.

Carter had been charged with possession with intent to distribute for value after state narcotics agents found drugs, scales and plastic bags in the trunk of his police car in February.

A day earlier, his wife, Janese, was arrested in Salt Lake after selling undercover agents drugs out of the trunk of her husband's marked police cruiser.

Janese Carter was a part-time police officer and evidence clerk with

the Wendover department. Officials say the drugs apparently were stolen from the police evidence room.

She is currently serving a 1-to-15 year sentence at the Utah State Prison.

Prosecutors say June Carter knew there was cocaine in his trunk, but the defense claims he did not know.

June Carter was also expected to plead guilty to obtaining a prescription drug by using a false name and address.

Mistrial found in case of Duke's daughter

SANTA ANA, Calif. — A mistrial was declared Thursday in the case of physician Thomas A. Gionis, who was charged with ordering an assault on his ex-wife, Wayne.

Deputy District Attorney Christopher J. Evans said afterwards that because nine of the 12 jurors voted for a guilty verdict, he intends to prosecute Gionis again on eight felony counts connected to the assault.

A hearing to determine a new trial date was set for Jan. 24.

Gionis' response after learning of the jury deadlock was: "It shows I am still innocent."

Prosecutors contend that Gionis wanted to "teach a lesson" to his ex-wife, Aissa Wayne, on the eve of a 1988 custody trial over their daughter, who was almost 2 at the time.

The three hold-out jurors all said that the prosecution's case was damaged when an investigator for the district attorney's office was forced to admit on the witness stand that "it looked like" he perjured himself about a critical piece of evidence related to the doctor's whereabouts shortly before the assault.

"(The investigator's testimony) was a disaster," said Sharon Cooley of Anaheim, one of three jurors who voted for acquittal.

Police looking for suspect in tavern killings

BOISE (AP) — Police were pursuing leads Thursday in the late night beating deaths of two local residents in a Boise tavern.

Boise Police Lt. Mike Monroe said the bodies of Bradford Rains, 20, and John Justad, 23, were found by a patron in the back room of The Rose Pub about 12:15 a.m. Thursday.

Ms. Rains was the tavern's bartender, and Justad, who worked for a local beer distributor, apparently was a customer, Monroe said.

Both had been "beaten severely about the head with an unknown blunt object," according to a police report.

Investigators said robbery was a possible motive since an undisclosed amount of cash was missing.

Monroe said the suspect apparently fled out the rear door of the bar.

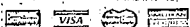

Pentagon takes aggressive posture, warns Saddam of air might

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — The Pentagon adopted an aggressive stance a day after a senior officer questioned American combat readiness in the Persian Gulf, warning Saddam Hussein that U.S. air power could punish Iraq even if ground forces were not ready for all-out war by Jan. 15.

Pentagon officials visiting the gulf and senior officers already there said Thursday that Saddam should not interpret the comments by the deputy commander of America's gulf forces as a sign the United States would not attack until well past the U.N. deadline for withdrawal from Kuwait.

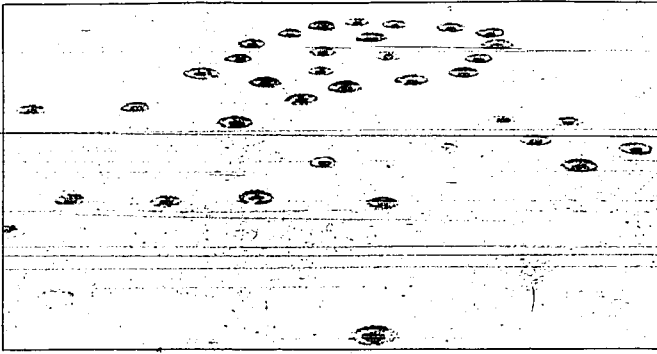
Lt. Gen. Calvin A.H. Waller began the controversy in comments Wednesday to reporters accompanying Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and Gen. Colin Powell, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, on their week-long gulf trip.

Waller said ground forces yet to arrive in the region might not be combat-ready until well into February and recommended that President Bush delay any military action until then.

The commander of Army forces in Saudi Arabia, Lt. Gen. John Yeosock, was far more optimistic in comments Thursday.

"Clearly, we are ready to perform whatever mission we are called upon to carry out," Yeosock said. He promised "a violent, fast battle" if war begins.

Other officials did not dispute the essence of Waller's non-readiness as-

sessment, though there was private criticism that he had been too open and might have hurt the effort to persuade Saddam that Bush might order an attack on Jan. 15 or very soon thereafter.

In Washington, Secretary of State James A. Baker III said merely that an important principle he learned in the Marine Corps was that "it is critical to preserve the element of surprise."

If nothing else, Waller's statements

and those of other officials seemed to support the idea that an early attack would heavily feature air assaults designed to weaken Iraq's war machine and give still-arriving U.S. ground forces more time to prepare.

Yeosock said that although Iraq continues to pour troops into Kuwait and southern Iraq the reinforcements are less capable troops and the Iraqi occupation force is near its maximum-force potential.

Iraq also urged its citizens to stockpile oil in a new indication the Iraqis were girding for war.

A Pentagon spokesman in Washington said an additional 10,000 U.S.

troops arrived in Saudi Arabia this week, pushing the total American force to 280,000 soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines. The spokesman, Bob Hall, said U.S. intelligence sources put the Iraqi force in and around Kuwait at 510,000.

In Saudi Arabia, as Cheney and Powell huddled in daylight, private meetings with commanders, spokesman Pete Williams said Cheney was "not displeased" by Waller's comments.

But Williams issued a brief statement saying Cheney would not reach conclusions of his own about the status of the deployment until the end of

his five-day trip and then, unlike Waller, would share his advice only with the president.

And Williams, in a clear effort to attach a military threat to the U.N. deadline, said some of the U.S. firepower would be at full strength by the deadline.

"The air part of the force, for example, reaches its level of readiness earlier than the others," Williams said.

A senior Pentagon official, speaking privately, said all combat aircraft committed to the gulf would be in place by Jan. 15 and Saddam should be deeply worried about that deadline.

As for ground forces, Yeosock said, "We will do everything in our power to apply maximum power in minimum time to maintain the highest, up-tempo battle ever recorded."

Yeosock said American forces had taken extensive steps to prepare for combat on a "dirty battlefield" in the event Saddam uses chemical weapons.

He said Iraqi forces are stacked behind each other in defensive lines and have dug extensive fortifications that include mine fields and barbed wire. Asked if U.S. ground forces could crash through, he said, "I wouldn't say it's easy but we can do it."

Marine unit with special history being sent to gulf

WASHINGTON (AP) — About 150 leathernecks from the nation's oldest Marine post are being sent to the Persian Gulf, the first time the company has been deployed for a military operation since 1906, the Pentagon said Wednesday.

"A" Company is stationed at the Marine Barracks, and the unit's colorful history includes the 1859 capture of insurrectionist John Brown at Harper's Ferry, W.Va. "A" Company, composed of about 150 infantrymen, is commanded by Capt. Bryan P. McCoy, 28, of Philadelphia, Pa. It is scheduled to leave Dec. 27 for Camp Lejeune, N.C., to join the 2nd Marine Division.

It later will be sent to the gulf area.

The Barracks was established in 1801. The last time its Marines were deployed for a military operation was in 1906 when a detachment was

assigned to the expeditionary battalions sent to Cuba for pacification duty.

Barracks Marines served in 1837 against the Seminole Indians in Florida. They also defended the nation's capital in the War of 1812 and served in the war with Mexico and the Spanish-American War.

In recent years, Barracks Marines have served mainly ceremonial duties. They perform wreath-laying ceremonies at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery, and they march in the Sunset Parades held each Tuesday evening during the summer at the two Jima Memorial.

The Barracks Marines also provide security for the president's mountain retreat at Camp David, Md., and serve as guards at White House arrival ceremonies for foreign dignitaries.

Couple marries aboard cargo plane

VENTURA, Calif. (AP) — A couple who couldn't find a chapel quickly enough got married aboard a military cargo hauler.

"We done a lot of these, and in some unusual places before, but never in a C-130," said Lt. Col. Jim Price, a California Air National Guard chaplain who performed the ceremony.

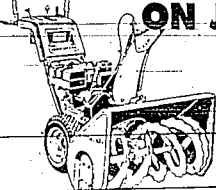

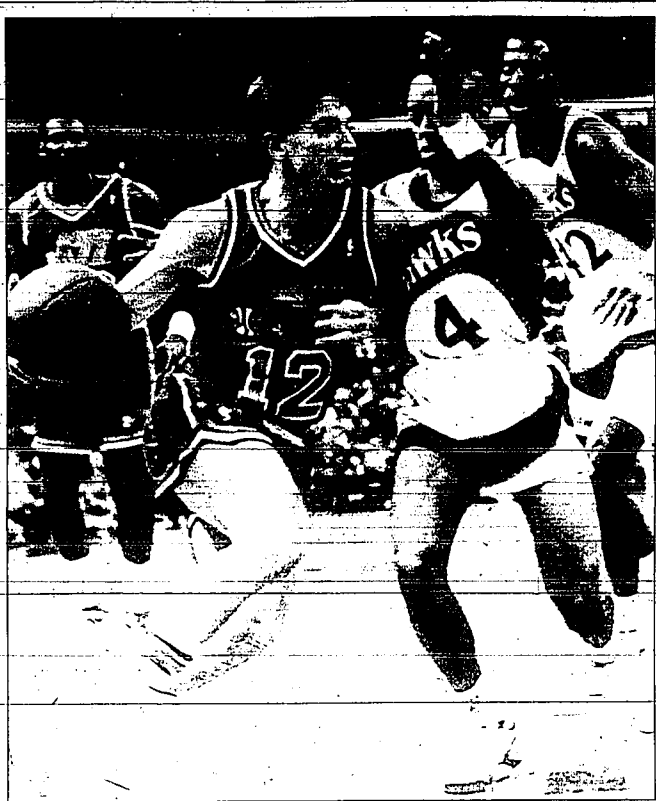

Ex-Idaho coach facing charges at Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Texas A&M has notified the NCAA that violations have occurred in its basketball program, athletic director John David Crow said Thursday.

Alleged violations became public Thursday after recruit Tony Scott told the Syracuse Post-Standard that a New York talent scout arranged his transfer from Syracuse to Texas A&M. The newspaper also quoted Scott as saying the university paid for part of his father's airfare and permitted the talent scout to fly on its plane.

The allegations, if proven, would be in violation of NCAA rules.

Crow said in a statement that he learned several weeks ago of possible rule violations in the basketball program under the direction of first-year coach Kermit Davis Jr. Davis moved to Texas A&M after three years at University of Idaho.

Davis did not return calls to his office from The Associated Press on Thursday, but the Post-Standard the school had not violated NCAA rules in recruiting Scott, who is ineligible to play this season.

Scott said he transferred to A&M on the advice of Queens, N.Y., talent scout Rob Johnson. He told the newspaper Johnson told him he was paid \$2,400 to work two weeks last summer at a basketball camp operated in College Station by Davis.

Scott told the newspaper Davis paid for Johnson's accommodations in a flight from New York to Houston, that Johnson accompanied him to College Station on a university jet, despite NCAA rules that prohibit recruits' friends or relatives from traveling on an institution's aircraft.

Scott also said the school paid \$750 of his father's \$550 airfare home to Rochester, N.Y., from College Station after the elder Scott helped his son move to Texas. He said Davis also promised that he would pay for Scott's mother to visit College Station in addition to paying for travel home for Christmas for Scott and his fiancée.

NCAA rules prohibit schools from paying travel expenses for players' relatives or promising such extra benefits.

Davis told the newspaper Johnson did travel to College Station with Scott. Davis said he was interested in hiring Johnson as a graduate assistant coach and it was "just kind of coincidental" that Johnson and Scott wound up on the same plane. Davis said neither he nor Texas A&M broke any NCAA recruitment rules.

Crow said when the school's compliance office learned there was a violation, he immediately notified the NCAA and university administrators.

NCAA alleges UNLV gave car to recruit

LAS VEGAS — The NCAA has charged UNLV's powerhouse basketball program with a host of violations in the recruitment of Lloyd Daniels, who allegedly was given a car and motorcycle by an assistant coach and had his bail paid by a booster following his arrest at a crack cocaine house.

Ten of the 29 allegations contained in a NCAA letter of inquiry surrounded the 1986 recruitment of former New York prep star Daniels, including charges that members of the basketball staff lied to NCAA investigators looking for recruiting violations.

Potentially the most serious of the charges allege a lack of institutional control in the recruitment of Daniels and in the handling of money given to players, some of whom allegedly were given free plane tickets, basketball shoes, meals and other incidentals during their visits to the UNLV campus.

The 43-page letter of inquiry was received by the university Tuesday, three weeks after UNLV settled a 13-year battle between coach Tom Izzo and the NCAA. That agreement prohibits the Runnin' Rebels from appearing on live television or playing in the postseason tournament in 1992. The defending national champions are currently undefeated and ranked No. 1 and will be allowed to defend their title this season.

The letter of inquiry was released by the University of Nevada system, which deleted all names mentioned in the document in what the system's legal counsel said was an effort to protect them against charges yet to be proven.

Counsel Donald Klasic wrote in a cover letter to UNLV president Robert Maxson that releasing the names would make them "subject to obloquy and stigmatization within both the local and national communities."

UNLV had 60 days to respond to the allegations, following which the NCAA will set up a hearing with its Committee on Infractions where the validity of the allegations will be decided.

Maxson was not available for comment, but said Wednesday the university would cooperate fully with the latest probe of the basketball program.

"When you find out you've made mistakes, you do whatever you have to do to correct them," Maxson said. "We're very anxious to get this cleared up and get the slate clean."

The NCAA probe began in 1977, when the Long Island paper Newsday printed allegations about the recruitment of Daniels, who never graduated from high school despite playing for five different schools. Daniels never played for UNLV after being arrested on drug charges and now is on the taxi squad of the Albany team in the CBA.

The NCAA charged that the university did not act properly in allowing then-assistant coach Mark Warkentin to become Daniels' legal guardian prior to his enrollment at UNLV, and that Warkentin "provided numerous improper living, travel and educational expenses to the young man."

The NCAA said UNLV allowed Warkentin to proceed with his attempts to become Daniels' legal guardian despite instructions from the Big West Conference to seek an official interpretation of the arrangement from the NCAA.

While his guardian, the NCAA alleged, Warkentin provided UNLV with

General Jim Jones' office was asked for a legal opinion on the issue Thursday. Officials considered going to court to seek an injunction, but decided to put off any legal action until hearing from Jones.

"We have to have an opinion on this," Jacobsen said. "We've talked to our attorneys and we're investigating our options, but we're not doing anything rash right now."

Farm Bureau Federation questions F&G director's position on wolf panel

IDAHO FALLS — The Idaho Farm Bureau Federation has asked the state attorney general's office whether Fish and Game Director Jerry Conley can legally serve on a federal panel studying wolf reintroduction.

It's the latest attack on the newly formed, congressionally mandated Wolf Management Committee. The panel, appointed Tuesday by the U.S. Department of Interior, is supposed to come up with a plan to reintroduce and manage the endangered gray wolf in Yellowstone National Park and central Idaho.

The 10-member panel, which has until May 15 to come up with a management plan, is the latest attempt to come up with a compromise on the issue.

If the farm bureau files for an injunction, it will cite a 1988 state law prohibiting Fish and Game from entering wolf recovery agreements with other agencies, or spending money on wolf management.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Bob Hill inherited his second NBA coaching job on Thursday when the Indiana Pacers fired Dick Versace after 25 games.

Under Versace, in the final year of a three-year contract, the Pacers were 9-16 this season and team president Donnie Walsh said it was time for a change.

Walsh said he decided to replace Versace after the Pacers' 114-117 overtime loss to the Washington Bullets Wednesday night.

"The reason for the change is we don't feel the team is going in the right direction," Walsh said Thursday, adding that he decided to fire Versace after Wednesday's 114-117 overtime loss to the Washington Bullets. "We had some problems going back to last year. We felt these problems could be resolved but, based on the first month-and-a-half of the season, they weren't getting resolved."

Hill, a Pacers' assistant, was an assistant coach with the New York Knicks who was named interim coach when Hubie Brown was fired during the 1986-87 season. Hill was passed over by the Knicks in favor of Rick Pitino the next season.

Versace is the second NBA coach fired this season. Stu Jackson was fired by the Knicks in 15 games and replaced by John MacLeod.

Walsh said the Pacers, 1-11 on the road, have been inconsistent.

"We are a professional basketball team," Walsh said. "We are here to win games and when you're not doing that, you have to make a change."

Team co-captains Chuck Person and LaSalle Thompson both expressed optimism about the change, but both said the team's problems shouldn't be dumped on Versace.

"You can't blame it all on Versace. But some of the responsibility is definitely with the coach," Thompson

said. "He must make sure that if we're not playing well that he does something about it."

Hill said the Pacers, last in the Central Division, are capable of being a major force, but need to work together.

"Winning is very important, but more important right now is how we play the game," Hill said. "We're going to do everything we can to create the proper atmosphere for winning. The team has to become more focused on what we're trying to do out there."

Hill said the Pacers would continue to play a fast-paced game.

"I want us to get in the habit of running and continuing to run, and when we do that we'll play better offense," said Hill, adding he will give some players more playing time.

Walsh said criticism regarding the amount of playing time Versace permitted reserves played a role in the dismissal.

"There has to be a constant way of dealing with players on the bench. They have to know where they stand," Walsh said.

Versace was criticized beginning last year for playing seven players most of the time, leaving the other five sit on the bench. Versace was not available for comment.

Versace was an assistant coach with the Detroit Pistons before taking over the Pacers in January 1989. He

was 22-31 record with Indiana to close out that season, then followed with a 42-40 mark last season, when the Pacers went to the NBA playoffs.

Hill was in his second season as an assistant coach for the Pacers. The year before joining the Pacers, he was head coach of Virtus Knorr, a professional team in Bologna of the Italian League.

Newly hired coach changes mind, turns down Boston College

BOSTON (AP) — His job done, Chet Gladchuk settled into a sound sleep. He was jolted out of it at 5:30 a.m. by the ringing telephone.

"I thought it was my wife," Boston College's athletic director said Thursday. "Who else calls you at 5:30 with a crisis other than my wife?"

It was Jimmie Laycock, telling Gladchuk that his job wasn't done. Laycock, who resigned Wednesday as coach of William & Mary and accepted the job as coach at Boston College, had changed his mind.

Laycock said he made the decision on personal grounds. "I have a look at what I feel comfortable with, and I could never really feel comfortable with the decision."

So by 6:30, Gladchuk was back on the phone, trying to find a coach after his second rejection of the week. On Monday, Virginia Tech coach

Frank Reamer turned down an offer to succeed Jack Bicknell, fired Nov. 27, after four consecutive losing seasons.

Gladchuk himself is new on the job. He took over Dec. 10 for retiring athletic director Bill Flynn after holding the same position at Tulane. His family has yet to join him in the Boston area.

He said that Laycock was "signed, sealed and almost delivered" but that he understood the change of heart. "It took a lot of guts."

"He feels from a professional point of view that Boston College is very significant opportunity for him, career-wise," Gladchuk said. "He just can't pull his family from that environment" in Williamsburg, Va.

"Now I can control a lot of things," he said. "But I can't control a man's emotions."

vided a car, motorcycle, tuition fees, cash and travel expenses, some of which was paid after the NCAA notified the university the expenses were not permitted.

Daniels also was given a job by R&B Advertising, owned by Stu Rogich, now an adviser to President Bush, and given a car leased by Rogich to use fulltime, the letter alleges.

Seven of the allegations claim that university officials-or boosters—acted "contrary to the principles of ethical conduct," and charged that several of them lied to NCAA investigators.

Other allegations in the letter include:

- The UNLV athletic department submitted an altered certificate of compliance to the NCAA for the 1986-87 basketball season after a staff member refused to sign the document "due to her knowledge of possible violations in the men's basketball program."

- At least one player was given reduced rates of between \$70 and \$125 a month for rent and utilities for a three-year period.

- A staff member took a recruit to dinner and to a nightclub, then on a

visit to tour a local health club where many of the UNLV players practice in the offseason.

- Recruits were allowed to use athletic department credit cards for long distance calls, and allowed to make excessive room service and other hotel charges while on visits to Las Vegas.

- An "assistant coach" kept player scholarship money in a desk drawer and delivered rent and utility payments on behalf of players.

- Warkentin gave \$500 to a woman to settle a traffic accident Daniels was involved in.

- A prospective recruit lived with a former player for a month at no cost and was given cash, food and transportation, along with shoes and clothes and the use of the health club's basketball court.

- An assistant coach paid \$150 cash for auto insurance for one player, and a \$50 library fine so another player could meet a graduation deadline.

- At least two players were invited by a booster to have lunch at Caesars Palace, and the booster then left at least \$20 on-the-table to pay for the meals.

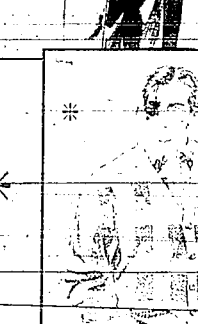

White motion lights outline the home and driveway, energizing the scene, while still white and colored lights in the trees add a touch of tranquility.

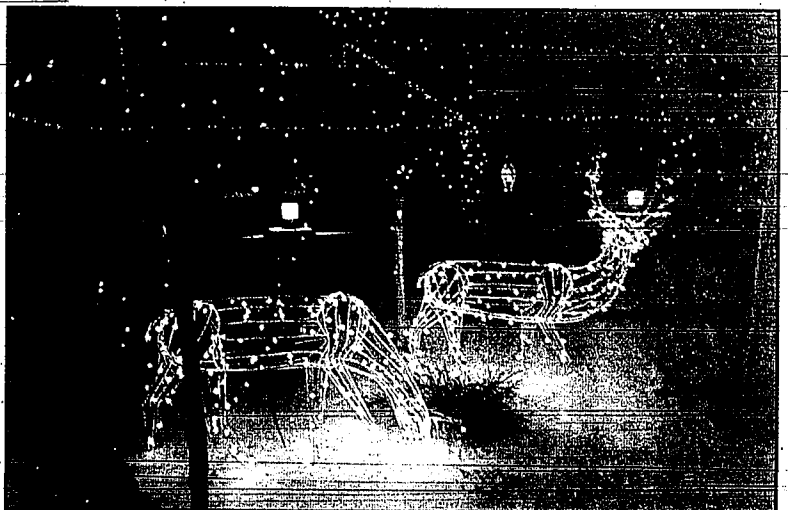

Take "Three Men and a Little Lady," predicted to be a "blockbuster," "bigger than the first," "probably the top commercial movie of the season."

And "Predator 2," hailed by one wag as "the keeper of the season."

So much for the experts. Call it "The Imp That Stole Christmas." "Home Alone" — about an 8-year-old left to defend the manse against burglars when the family flies off to Paris without him — has thrown Hollywood's prognosticators not to mention its studio executives, for a mega-loaf.

John Hughes-scripted-and-produced "Home Alone" — a potential sleeper. But no one — nary a soul — had any inkling how big the Twentieth Century Fox release would be. The prepurchase version of Peckinpah's "Straw Dogs" recently topped the \$100 million mark — the first of the holiday releases to do so.

"Nobody can predict movies that turn out as well as 'Home Alone,'" Tom Sherak, Fox's marketing chief, told a reporter recently. "You can believe in the movie and feel you have a good movie. But these kinds of pictures come along rarely. We're flying at 38,000 feet and we don't want to come in for a landing."

Peter Bart, a columnist for the trade weekly Variety, calls "Home Alone" and "Predator 2" "phantom blockbusters," projects that "come out of nowhere to knock off the high-profile competition."

The high-profile fatalities this season include the "shoo-in" "Three Men and a Little Lady," which has scared up just \$40 million in four weeks of release — not

enough to cover its production and promotion budget — and is sinking fast. Also on the no-hit hit list is "Rocky V," which opened the same day as "Home Alone" and is already gone from the Top 10 weekend box-office charts. "Predator 2," with Danny Glover trying to fill Arnold Schwarzenegger's shoes, opened strongly four weeks ago, but its subsequent numbers have been disappointing.

"Havana," which one critic dubbed "Robert Redford's Day of Dies," opened in limited release Dec. 12 — nationwide two days later — and grossed a puny \$2.3 million over the weekend. The big-budget Sydney Pollack romance has BOMB written all over it.

Like Redford, Clint Eastwood is learning the hard way that past success is no guarantee at the box office: His self-directed buddy pic, "The Rookie," opened softly and is getting mushier by the minute. And the Cher vehicle "Mermaids" came up soggy in its opening weekend, grossing \$3.5 million on 920 screens, a per-screen average of just \$3,820.

By contrast, Tim Burton's peculiar fairy tale "Edward Scissorhands" — which, like "Home Alone" comes from Fox and incor-

porates Christmas themes into its storyline — had a hefty \$6,183-per-screen average. Of the other holiday pics already out, only "Misery" and Kevin Costner's sprawling western, "Dances With Wolves," are hanging in there. 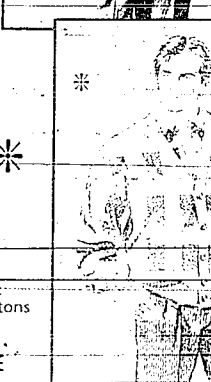

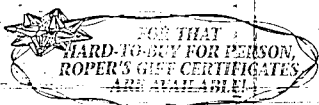

White motion lights outline the home and driveway, emerging the scene, while still white and colored lights in the trees add a touch of tranquility.

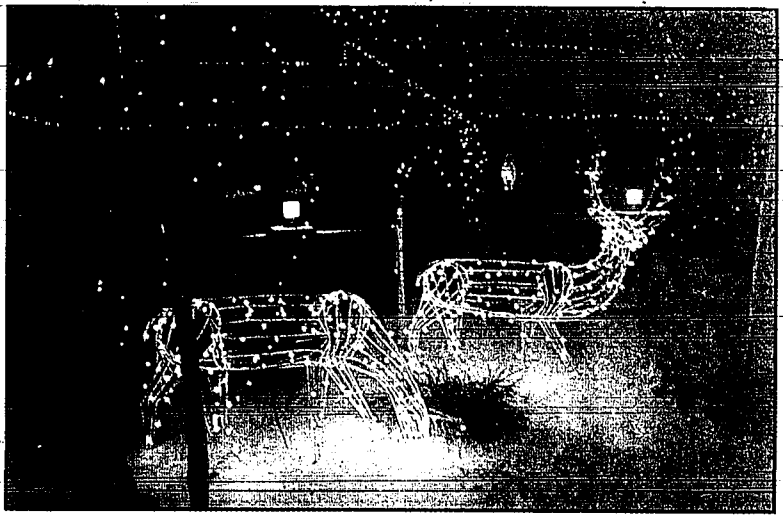

The next wave: Digital radio

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new breed of high-tech radio programers think they've found a better way to give music junkies near-perfect renditions of their favorite hits, from Beethoven to Billy Idol, 24 hours a day.

It's called digital radio, and one day it may be zipping out of Earth orbit directly to your car or portable radio or through your TV set.

What digital radio promises is impressive: no more hissing signals fading in and out or humming from the bottom of a barrel. No pops or crackles. Compact disc-quality sound.

Several new satellite companies want to offer it, so do traditional AM and FM radio stations. Some cable companies already are offering digital radio to subscribers, for a price.

Because digital radio can produce such a clear sound, the recording industry is keeping a wary eye on a technology that may spur home taping.

But many observers think there's no stopping it. Today's radio "no longer is state of the art sound quality," says Robert Mazer, a Washington communications lawyer.

Digital radio transforms sound into the precise binary pulses of computers, whereas traditional analog radio changes sound into electrical signals transmitted as rising and falling waves of energy.

Computer technology can reconstruct digital signals into sound that is a near-perfect copy of the original material, which in the music industry nowadays typically is a digital compact disc.

Testing is under way in Japan, Canada and Europe on satellite-delivered digital radio. In this country, the Federal Communications Commission is considering whether to set aside a portion of the already overcrowded airwaves for digital audio broadcasting.

Whatever happens, the new system may render existing radios obsolete.

Some entrepreneurs are hoping to

carve out a market for digital audio carried over the unused portions of a cable TV system's wires. The idea has been spreading across the nation slowly since May when Jerrold Communications rolled out its 17-channel Digital Cable Radio.

Two other cable radio offerings — Digital Planet and Digital Music Express — were demonstrated last month to a cable TV convention in Anaheim, Calif.

Carson, Calif.-based Digital Plan-

et began marketing its 26-channel service to a limited number of Continental Cablevision subscribers in Los Angeles in September. Continental is charging customers \$8 for the service. Some channels have commercials.

Customers get a tuner that is connected between the incoming cable and their stereo receiver, where the digital signal is converted back into analog, with only a slight decrease in sound quality.

Although some might wonder why people would pay for what now is offered basically free on traditional radio, Digital Planet president William DeLany said subscriber response "has been just marvelous."

"There are people out there willing to pay a little extra for high quality," DeLany said.

DeLany said his company originally had projected 2 million subscribers within two years. But based upon the early results in Los Angeles, the service may attract double that number in two years, he said.

Jerry Rubinstein, chairman of International Cablecasting Technologies Inc. in New York, said his company has commitments for the 30-channel "Digital Music Express" from cable systems representing 15 million subscribers in Denver, Las Vegas, New York, Chicago, Seattle, San Francisco and St. Louis, Rubinstein said. It should begin in spring 1991.

The music will be commercial free and uninterrupted, Rubinstein said. A computer even will arrange the order in which songs are played. Unlike Digital Planet, which will have "moderators" telling listeners what they're hearing, Digital Music Express will offer an optional remote control that displays the name of the artist, the song, album title, record company and catalog number.

"The subscriber will have all the information he wants to buy the CD, be it by phone call or by going into a particular record store to get it," Rubinstein said.

The cable radio executives said they didn't want to alienate the record companies. For that reason, they won't publish advance play lists or play albums end to end.

The recording industry still fears the introduction of digital audiotape recorders, particularly when digital radio begins picking up digital audio broadcasts.

To offset the potential loss of revenues, record manufacturers want a performance royalty or a tax on tapes or recorders.

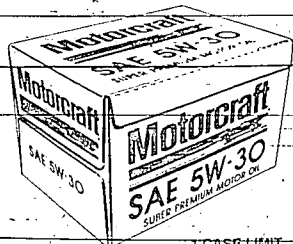

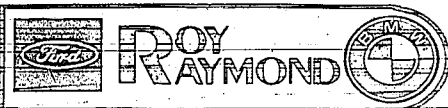

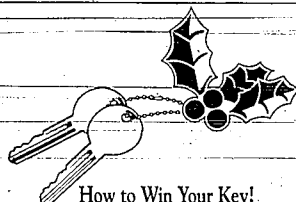

Rap star tops music awards nominations

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Rap star M.C. Hammer received seven American Music Award nominations Thursday, including nods in the pop, rock, soul, rhythm & blues and rap categories for his album "Please Hammer Don't Hurt 'Em."

Janet Jackson was nominated five times and Madonna, Bell Biv DeVoe and rapper Vanilla Ice received four nominations apiece. Aerosmith, George Strait and Mariah Carey were each nominated three times.

Twenty-seven awards will be presented Jan. 28 during the 18th annual American Music Awards ceremony, which will be televised on ABC.

'Look Who's Talking' sequel stinks

HOLLYWOOD — As Marcel Proust once warned, the only thing we learn from our mistakes is that we're doomed to repeat them.

"Look Who's Talking," last year's talking-baby comedy hit, was not exactly a mistake. It pleased a lot of people, made a lot of money.

It had a refreshingly warm and wryly feminine point of view, from writer-director Amy Heckerling. It gave stars John Travolta and Kirstie Alley two amiably frantic romantic sitcom roles — the dancin' fool hook cabbie and the workaholic unwed mother — they could handle with ease. And it brought out sides of Bruce Willis, as the voice of Baby Mikey that probably only his mother had been previously aware.

But making big movie sequels is often a mistake. Of intelligence, artistry and humor if not of finance, and "Look Who's Talking Too" leaps into most of them.

Like many predecessors, it's been pumped up. The anything-goes shaginess of "Look Who's Talking" is slicked up, even while the movie makers try, laboriously, to hit most of the marks they got the first time around.

Instead of one star talking baby, supplying toddler stream of consciousness, we now have three star talking babies: Rosanne Barr as the voice of Baby Julie (replacing Joan Rivers from the last movie), Damon Wayans as the voice of Baby Eddie (replacing Richard Pryor, identified as a co-star in the video trailer), plus planes, fire and Mel Brooks as the appoplectic voice of the Toilet Fun.

Deluging us with baby-voice stars and toddler-ons is only the first of the movie's excesses. So is the new tone supplied by Heckerling and husband Neal Israel. Riffing their brains for marriage humor, they stumble out the inspiration of having Alley's Mollie

throw Travolta's James out of the house, after a thoroughly trivial argument, so the movie can go straight through Boy-Meets-Girl, Boy-Loses-Girl, Boy-Gets-Girl all over again.

So, unfortunately, is Barr, whose flair for physical humor is wasted and whose bellicose voice as Baby Julie demolishes the light mood.

In "Look Who's Talking," Heckerling tapped into potent levels of wish-fulfillment that gave her movie tension. There was also the double-edged message of Willis' streetwise Baby Mikey.

These fantasies, like the ones in "Ghost," "Pretty Woman" or "Home Alone" were ones that audiences were ready to buy, and you can sense that Heckerling had fun dreaming them up. But she's not as good a writer as she is a director and "Look Who's Talking Too" (PG-13, for language and sexual innuendo) has a strained, gotta-get-it-done quality. There's little fun behind it; there was no real reason to make it, beyond the obvious financial one.

Actors opting for no credit

HOLLYWOOD — Raul Julia has a sizable supporting role in "Havana," but you'd never know it from the on-screen credits, says Julia's agent, Jeff Hunter, referring to the fact that stars Robert Redford and Lena Olin had already secured top billing. "So we decided not to take any credit at all," Julia, Hunter explains, has become accustomed to elevated billing since his star turn in "The Kiss of the Spider Woman."

"Havana" producer-director Sydney Pollack says a dilemma arises when there is "an actor on the ascendancy, like Julia, and you ask the actor to do a role that's somewhat smaller (than usual)."

With Redford and Olin contractually bound for the only credit over the title, and the first credit after the title committed to Alan Arkin, says Pollack, "the only billing left for Julia was to be stacked with the rest of the names — his agent felt that would be a step backward."

In Abraham's case, Tom Hanks, Bruce Willis and Melanie Griffith were the top names, with Morgan Freeman firm on the fourth rung.

"The credit they (Warner Bros.) suggested was not suitable," says Abraham's agent, Clifford Stevens. "So we decided to take none at all."

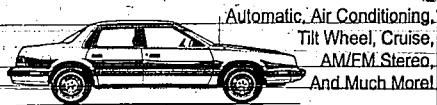

Caution marks market as trading drops sharply then recovers

The Associated Press NEW YORK — The stock market vacillated through a mixed session Thursday in an atmosphere of caution over international worries and new questions about the interest-rate outlook. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, down about 25 points in the early going, was up 2.73 to 2,629.46 by the close. Declining issues outnumbered advances by four to eight in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 726 up, 813 down and 507 unchanged. Volume on the floor of the Big Board rose to 174.7 million shares, against 180.83 million in the previous session. Nation-wide consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 215.74 million shares. Analysts said the news of Edward Shevardnadze's resignation as Soviet foreign minister put many traders on the ground. The Bush administration indicated that it was awaiting more information before ap- praising the situation. Stock-market investors seemed to be in a similarly wary mood. In addition, brokers said doubts had spread in the past day or two over how much further the Federal Reserve might go in the near fu- ture toward easing credit conditions. A floor the Fed's announcement Tuesday of a cut in its discount rate, interest rates in the bond market turned upward Wednesday. In Thursday's activity, prices of long-term government bonds dropped more than \$5 for each \$1,000 in face value, increasing their yields to the neighborhood of 8.24 percent. Among actively traded blue-chips, International Business Machines rose 1/16 to 137 1/2, General Electric 1/8 to 57 1/2, American Express lost 1/8 to 21 1/2, and American Tele- phone & Telegraph dropped 1/8 to 30 1/4.

INEL radioactive releases small in '89

IDAHO FALLS - Radioactive releases from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, while small in past years, were even lower in 1989, according to a monitoring report released this week. INEL scientists say none of the 1989 releases were detectable beyond the borders of the sprawling eastern Idaho site. As a result, they again say the facility's 1989 operations had no impact on area health or the environment.

"As in the previous years, the effects of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory operations were negligible to the off-site environment," Manager Augustine Pitrolo said in a cover letter to the INEL's annual environmental report.

The numbers indicate that the INEL releases dropped considerably in 1989.

The year before, more than 124,000 curies of radiation were released through site smokestacks. Last year's figure was 22,000 curies.

Forest official announces departure

LEWISTON - The second of northern Idaho's top U.S. Forest Service officials has announced his departure.

Clearwater National Forest Supervisor Fred Trevey said Wednesday he expects to leave Orofino to accept a promotion, the top job on the Coconino National Forest in Arizona, in February.

Trevey, 48, has been supervisor of the 1.8-million-acre Clearwater based at Orofino since January 1988. He is a 26-year veteran of the Forest Service.

He was offered the chance to be supervisor on the Flagstaff-based Coconino Tuesday and announced to his staff his decision.

The Coconino, located in northwestern Arizona is larger and more complex than the Clearwater, he added.

Nez Perce National Forest Supervisor Thomas Kovalicky announced Friday he will retire from that post Dec. 31. Kovalicky, 55, had led the Nez Perce staff since 1982.

The departures leave the top jobs in two of Idaho's top three timber producing national forests vacant.

25-foot tree brightens Freezeout Hill

EMMETT - Emmett residents who can see a Christmas tree twinkling on Freezeout Hill overlooking their valley can thank Carl and Helen Abercrombie and their nightly vigil.

The 25-foot pine tree just off Idaho Highway 16 is decorated with more than 1,600 twinkling lights. The Abercrombies apply the lights each year and then man a generator at night to keep them shining.

"We thought it would enlighten the entry into the valley," said Carl, 67. "When people come in, it's something to greet them."

This is the third Christmas season the couple have decorated the tree with help from friends and family.

The lone tree is on a turnout about four miles east of Emmett, a farming and sawmill community of about 5,000 people. It features a commanding view of the valley.

Hwy 55 contract to be awarded

BOISE - Idaho Sand & Gravel Co. Inc. of Nampa was the apparent low bidder for the final stage of construction on the state Department of Transportation's Idaho Highway 55 project over Horseshoe Bend Hill.

The Transportation Department said Wednesday that the company's bid of slightly more than \$5.2 million was among six submitted. The contract is expected to be awarded within a month.

Work on Stage 3 of the project will include grading, drainage and paving of 6.37 miles of roadway to replace the winding-highway motorists now use, the Transportation Department said.

Idaho 55 is the western Idaho's main north-south highway. Work is expected to begin later this winter and be complete by Dec. 15, 1991. The public should be able to start using the new highway next fall, and final seal-coat work will be done on the project during the summer of 1992.

In addition to the road work, the contractor on Stage 3 also will be responsible for placing 5.4 miles of concrete guardrail and signs along the new section of highway.

Fish advocates blast doomsday predictions

BOISE (AP) - Idaho conservationists say the Pacific Northwest Waterways Association is using "scare tactics" by arguing that protecting the region's salmon runs would threaten Idaho's grain farmers and the state's only seaport at Lewiston.

Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited and the Northwest Resource Information Center, which has been representing the Idaho group and other fish advocates at "Salmon Summit" conferences through the region, issued a statement Thursday condemning the Waterways Association's stand.

The latest Salmon Summit was conducted Monday and Tuesday in Portland.

Ed Chaney of the Resource Information Center said the association's predictions were part of a public relations campaign orchestrated by the Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference Committee, a lobbying group for electric utilities and aluminum

companies. Fish advocates contend the utilities committee has opposed changes in federal dam operations in the Columbia River system that would reduce fish deaths but could raise power generating costs.

"Oregon and Washington utilities and aluminum companies think the Columbia and Snake rivers are their private moneymaking machine. They're not satisfied with 95 percent of the water they want to sell," said Mitch Sanchotena, executive director of Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited.

He and Chaney have proposed temporarily lowering water levels behind four dams on the lower Snake River during an eight-week period next spring to help flush young fish through the slow-moving reservoirs and past the dams.

"The salmon, fishermen and their communities have been suffering for decades because of those

improperly designed federal dams," Chaney said. "The fish need help from a lot of different groups that profit from the dams. We're asking the Waterways Association to give the least, almost nothing. Instead of help we get doomsday predictions."

Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., organized the Salmon Summit last fall, bringing together representatives of 30 public and private interest groups to discuss the future of five beleaguered salmon species that are being considered for federal endangered species protection. Two meetings remain, in Pasco, Wash., next month and in Boise in February.

Committee members have agreed that their primary goal is to restore the Snake River spring, summer and fall chinook and sockeye runs. Over time, the runs should be rebuilt to a point where harvest could be allowed, the group agreed.

Children file suit against their father

IDAHO FALLS (AP) - No one has faced a criminal charge in the slaying of a woman found shot to death in an Idaho Falls home nearly 18 months ago.

But the children of the woman, Betty Lou Gray, Jackson, Wyo., have filed civil action against their father, alleging he killed her. They're seeking more than a quarter-million dollars in insurance proceeds, claiming someone who causes a person's death can't benefit by it.

The action was filed Tuesday in 7th District Court against William Gray Jr. and four insurance companies.

Betty Lou Gray, 47, and Reeda Ilene Roundy, 49, were found shot to death July 24, 1989, in Roundy's residence east of Idaho Falls. No one has been charged, but court records show investigators have searched William Gray's residence, business and vehicle in Jackson seeking evidence.

Gray said Thursday he was shocked by the lawsuit and said it was completely unexpected. He said he would contact an attorney to respond to the suit. He has 20 days to file a reply from the time it was filed.

It alleges Gray killed his wife "intentionally and without any justifiable provocation," and calls the shooting "wanton, malicious and outrageous."

The children are Jeffrey Gray of Portland, Ore., and Sara Hoffman of Jackson. Their attorney, Tom Moss, said a civil action is "theoretically easier to prove than a criminal charge because a civil case only requires a point be proved by a preponderance of evidence, while a criminal charge must be proved beyond a reasonable doubt.

Mount St. Helens shoots steam, ash thousands of feet into air

SEATTLE (AP) - Mount St. Helens shot a plume of steam and ash thousands of feet into the air Thursday, but scientists said it did not immediately appear to be an eruption involving molten rock.

Bob Norris, a seismologist with the U.S. Geological Survey in Seattle, said instruments at the University of Washington recorded a "strong seismic signal" at 12:59 p.m., and reports a few minutes later of a sizable gas and ash plume.

Michael Doukas, geologist with the U.S.G.S. at its Cascade Volcano Observatory in Vancouver, said a column of light gray ash had reached 23,000 feet 30 minutes after the small explosion occurred on the lava dome in the volcano's crater.

The wind was blowing to the southwest, and ash could fall on

the cities of Portland, Ore., and Vancouver, he said.

The plume was unusually visible because of cold temperatures and clear skies above the 8,366-foot peak, which frequently is shrouded in clouds.

Norris said he did not anticipate much ash would fall, although the event was still occurring half an hour after the first signal.

Doukas said there were no earthquakes before the event, and the start of seismic activity began about the same time as the surface eruption of gas and ash.

He said it was similar to the latest volcanic burp that occurred on Nov. 5, when a plume of steam and ash rose 30,000 feet into the sky and dumped small amounts of ash as far away as The Dalles, Ore., about 65 miles southeast of the

mountain. Similar bursts occurred last December and January.

Doukas said scientists hoped to fly into the volcano crater within hours of the blast.

Scientists have theorized such bursts come from either gases bubbling out of solution in molten rock beneath the mountain, or from rain and snowmelt percolating down to hot areas and bursting into steam.

The volcano's last significantly large eruption was on March 19, 1982, when mud flowed from the crater six miles to the north fork of the Toutle River. Since then, the mountain has had a series of "dome-building" eruptions in which the mountain quietly adds lava to the heap in its crater. The last of those, however, was in October 1986.

Judge sentences man to probation for part in stabbing

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) - First District Judge James Judd has sentenced a 19-year-old Coeur d'Alene man to one year on probation for his part in last spring's stabbing death of a woman.

Kevin Bailey pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor assault charges in connection with the March 16 slaying of Michael C. Rosalez, 17, who lived at a Coeur d'Alene apartment complex.

Besides probation, Judd fined Bai-

ley \$400 at Tuesday's sentencing, ordered him to reimburse Kootenai County \$500 for his prosecution and defense and to serve 500 hours of community service.

Official contend Bailey, Edward Fox Jr., 19, and Michael Reecer, 21, drove with 20-year-old Joshua D. Frazier to Rosalez's apartment last March. They allegedly beat him, chased him and left him to die after being stabbed.

Frazier pleaded guilty three

months ago to second-degree murder after authorities accused him of stabbing Rosalez in the chest and back. He was sentenced earlier this month to life in prison, with a minimum of seven years before he will be eligible for parole.

Fox pleaded guilty to the same misdemeanor assault charges as Bailey. Judd sentenced Fox to two years on probation and ordered him to serve 1,000 hours of community service.

Ice Capades celebrates anniversary 50 with top guest stars and 2-hour special

The Simpsons, Pia Zadora, Bobby Berosini and his Orangutans, Michael Feinstein.

No, that's not who's appearing on the cover of next month's issue of *Spy* magazine. It's the guest lineup for "The Ice Capades 50th Anniversary Special," airing Thursday, Dec. 27, on ABC.

Some of the two-hour special's guest stars — the human ones, that is — seem to savor the opportunity to be a part of the celebratory show. Says host Peter Scolari, who last season finished up his five-year run as Michael Harris on "Newhart," "Oh, it's an honor. I saw the Ice Capades when I was really young and wanted to become an Ice Capades skater. My mother, being a realist, told me to stop dreaming and concentrate on obtainable goals, like learning how to walk, to read and to shovel snow."

When producer Martin Pasetta called him with the offer to host the show, Scolari says, "I wanted to say yes right away, but being a grown man and entertainer, I did what any entertainer would do — I called my mom: 'She said it was OK, if I dressed warmly.'"

Scolari's wit will no doubt be on display as he narrates the ice-show's 50-year history in between the individual acts. Pia Zadora kicks off the special's first historical production number, the Masquerade Ball, by singing "The Best of Times" from Broadway's "La Cage Aux Folles." She says that no other of her professional achievements have affected her young daughter as much as this

one has. "It's funny," says Zadora. "I've performed on Broadway, headlined with Frank Sinatra and sung at Carnegie Hall, but because of my involvement with the Ice Capades, my child is finally impressed!"

Feinstein, a song stylist and pianist noted for performing the classics of Gershwin, Porter and Berlin, notes that he has an early connection with the Ice Capades. "I first saw the Ice Capades as a boy in Columbus, Ohio," Feinstein remembers. "I was so inspired that I borrowed a couple of skates and promptly humiliated myself in front of the whole neighborhood."

Lisa Simpson, speaking for the entire animated Simpson family, insists there is no truth to the rumor that Bart will wax the spikes in his hairstyle and skate upside down.

But costume designer Jeff Billings

says there was a special challenge in designing the costumes of the skating Simpsons. "Not only do (the costumes) have to represent the audience's image of who the Simpsons are," Billings points out, "but the skaters have to be able to both perform in them and see where they're going."

There will be a lot of pageantry and much skill displayed in the 50th-anniversary special. Olympic silver medalist Elizabeth Manley and world freestyle champion Brian Orser will both perform on the special. Canadian Manley noted there are some differences between competitive skating and performing with the Ice Capades.

Smith's storyline taken off back burner

Rex Smith's personal appeal should make him a favorite on "As the World Turns." He joined the show in October in the role of Darryl Crawford, but his storyline has only recently begun to really cook on the front burner.

Rex is one of those actors with super good looks and charm to spare. He sings and dances and has appeared in many a Broadway musical before moving on to soap operas.

As a boy growing up in Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama and Illinois (his father was an executive with a large insurance company and the family moved around some), Rex and his two brothers were encouraged by their mother to study piano and develop their musical skills.

"I recall being sent on a promotion tour by the recording company who did a soundtrack album of "Sooner or Later" and when we arrived at the first city on the short tour, I didn't see anyone when we got off the plane. Then we heard this noise, it was like a roar and when I looked up, there were thousands of girls behind a barrier screaming. It really surprised and shocked me." Rex recalled.

When the screaming subsided, Rex decided to try his hand at the stage and was hired to be one of the many actors who portrayed Danny Zuko in the long running Broadway musical "Grease."

During his run, Rex met Scott Holmes, who ironically is cast as Tom Hughes in "As the World Turns," and they became the best of

friends.

"Scott and I have been buddies for a long time and it's really fun working with him again. In fact, my 3-year-old daughter is named Madison and that's the name Scott and his wife were thinking of giving their daughter. Until very recently Rex was doing double duty, appearing on the soap by day and portraying the romantic Baron Von Glogern in the hit Broadway musical "Grand Hotel."

It was a hard grind and he's happy that he no longer is doing the musical and can concentrate on his soap role. One of the most appealing things about doing a soap for Rex is the so-called "normal" family life he

can enjoy with his wife Jamie and his two daughters, Madison and Megan.

NBC wins network race this time as viewers continue to say 'Cheers'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC, aided by the season's best ratings for its Tuesday night lineup, won the latest network battle for television viewers.

"In The Heat of The Night," "Mollock" and "Law & Order" each won their Tuesday time periods and landed in the top 20 for the first time in the 13-week-old fall season.

NBC earned a 12.4 average rating for the week, followed by ABC with an 11.6 and CBS with 11.4, showed figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 television homes.

The top-rated network had seven of the top 10 shows, with longtime favorite "Cheers" grabbing the most viewers of any television program last week.

A bag full of holiday specials failed to make the top 20. Even NBC's "Bob Hope's Christmas Special" from Bermuda got left out in the cold.

The 60-minute Saturday night special ranked 22nd. A repeat and colorized version of the CBS "I

Love Lucy Christmas" tied for 30th place with ABC's "Sunday Night Movie: The Witches of Eastwick."

CBS' "60 Minutes" was the No. 2 show, followed by a two-way tie for third place between NBC's "A Different World" and ABC's NFL "Monday Night Football" match-up between the Los Angeles Raiders and the Detroit Lions.

"Empty Nest" on NBC was fifth. NBC's "The Cosby Show" and "In The Heat of The Night," spun from the Oscar-winning 1967 film of the same name, tied for sixth.
