Andrus proposes \$992 million budget

BOISE — Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday offered lawmakers a restrained 1992 state general revenue budget that — Republican — leaders labeled — both optimistic and austere.

In his budget message to a joint session of the House and Senate, Andrus muted his earlier optimism about the state's economic future, but said his new financial blueprint fulfills his commitments to taxpayers, children, the elderly and poor.

"With the threat of a national recession bearing down on us, with the price of oil extremely unpredictable and with the drums of war beating and with the uncharted waters, Idaho sails into uncharted waters," Andrus told lawmakers.

"Faced with these uncertainties, it is more essential than ever that we make the very best use of our resources and so by establishing long-term direction," the

Democratic chief executive said in his budget message prepared for the joint session of the House and Senate.

"We cannot make mistakes," he added. "This is a budget that we can afford, and it is not one bit more than we need."

The budget proposal, which falls just short of the \$1 billion spending plateau, provides limited property tax relief Andrus promised during the campaign, meets the

most pressing of the state's medical and welfare demands and offers comparatively modest spending increases for public and higher education.

State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans said the public school allocation would do little more than maintain the status quo. And the executive director of the state Board of Education suggested the limited increase in higher education support would set the board looking for revenues from other sources, possibly higher student fees.

But administration and legislative officials pointed out that Idaho is looking at increased spending while more than half the other states are starting at deficits as recession sweeps the nation.

After Andrus' State of the State address on Tuesday left many lawmakers expecting another expansive round of spending, GOP House Speaker Tom Boyd of Genesee was

War prospects fail to slow area recruiting

TWIN FALLS — The daunting prospect of war in Kuwait evidently is not stopping area young people from joining the military. Local Army, Marine Corps, Air Force and Navy recruiters say they have met or exceeded recruiting quotas in the Twin Falls area since Iraq invaded Kuwait last Aug. 2.

Given current circumstances, new enlistees have slim chance of going to the Middle East, recruiters say.

"Only one person said he wanted to wait and see what happened after Jan. 15," said U.S. Army recruiter Sgt. Stuart Smith.

The United Nations has imposed a Jan. 15 deadline — next Tuesday — for Iraqi troops to

withdraw from Kuwait. If Iraqi troops are not gone by then, the United States could go to war.

Stallings fell one short of its recruitment goal, but recruiters have been recruited or exceeded since August, Smith said.

"People in this area are pretty patriotic about enlisting in the service," he said.

Nationally, the Army set a goal of recruiting 25,700 people from October through December. The service enlisted 26,900 people — 1,200 above quota — an Army spokesman said.

Fifteen people in the Twin Falls area joined the Army in those three months. They will not necessarily will be heading to the

ment in war in the Gulf.

"Yesterday (Wednesday) was the heaviest day yet," Stallings said. "They are running about 9- or 10-to-1 against military involvement."

Stallings, who thinks United Nations sanctions should be given more time to work, believes that by Bush's insistence on Iraq's unconditional withdrawal from Kuwait, the president has in effect "pointed himself into a corner."

Idaho delegation pessimistic about events

WASHINGTON — Idaho's congressional delegation expressed pessimism Thursday over prospects of the United States avoiding war with Iraq.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, expressed grave disappointment over the failure of talks Wednesday between Secretary of State James Baker and Iraqi Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz and said the intransigence of Iraq has narrowed the options for a peaceful settlement to the Gulf crisis.

"The nation's (Iraq) refusal to accept President Bush's letter to Saddam Hussein

was not a positive sign that they are sincerely in search of a peaceful settlement," said Craig.

Craig, like most other members of Congress, said the failure of the Bush-Aziz talks will make it easier for Bush to prevail in a pending congressional vote on a resolution of support for the president's vow to use force against Iraq if its

Congress ready to grant Bush war-making power

WASHINGTON — A somber Congress on Thursday sped toward its starkest war-and-peace decision since World War II, and leaders in both parties predicted President Bush would get what he wants: authority to take the nation to war in the Persian Gulf.

"The captain cannot abandon the ship," Danforth said. "It is not an option of the U.S. Congress to disapprove what we for months have asked others to support."

Supporters and opponents of the president introduced competing resolutions, one giving authority for war, the other asserting that sanctions and diplomacy must be given more time to work — as Tuesday's United Nations deadline for Iraq withdrawal bore down.

The weight of the decision facing lawmakers was apparent as the debate unfolded in both chambers. "There is a real under-

General UNITED NATIONS Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar is expected to propose the phased withdrawal of Iraqi and U.S. military multinational forces supervised by U.N. peacekeepers, diplomats said Thursday.

The U.N. chief was setting off for Europe and the Middle East on Thursday night on a peacekeeping mission.

His flight plan was arranged for the last minute to have him arrive Friday morning in Paris, rather than Geneva, due to unspecified security reasons, spokeswoman Nadia Younes said. She

French Foreign Minister Roland Dumas will meet Perez de Cuellar in Paris, and the two will travel to Geneva together to meet with the other EC foreign ministers, the French U.N. Mission announced.

Neither they nor the U.N. press department could confirm whether French President Francois Mitterrand would also meet the U.N. chief, but diplomats said they would not be surprised if the two met briefly.

Diplomats and U.N. officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the United Nations has worked out possible

er Bob Dole of Kansas has said the force authorizing version had votes to spare in both houses. Numerous lawmakers said the failure of the U.S. Iraq talks in Geneva on Wednesday would help Bush's case.

Both chambers convened Thursday to begin considering the war-and-peace issue, with decisive votes expected this week-end.

The margin for Bush seemed most comfortable in the House, less so in the Senate, where the outcome hinged on the decision of half a dozen or so conservative Democrats. A bipartisan group, including the key senators, met at the White House with Bush Thursday afternoon.

Late in the day, Dole issued a warning: If the Senate appears poised to take action that would embarrass Bush, Republicans would filibuster in order to block it. "This is about as serious as they come," Dole said.

Study says 8th grade education too passive for modern students

WASHINGTON (AP) — Eighth grade education is dominated by old routines and practices that in the 1990s are no longer appropriate for, or effective with, early adolescents, said the study. The report was based on the observations and records of experienced educators in 162 schools in 41 states, the District of Columbia during March 1989-Bartler studies by the principals association focused on the sixth and ninth grades.

The report said 14-year-olds are very concerned about how they look and have a need to socialize for healthy emotional growth.

Yet, said Lounsbury, senior author of the report, the traditional school program is "cold and canned" and viewed by the students as a thing apart from their struggle to become independent young adults. For example, he said, socialization in the schools is often restricted or curtailed. Classes are departmentalized, even though studies show that subjects should be integrated.

"Although early adolescents are very much caught up in the 'here-and-now,' the school curriculum continues to be heavily oriented toward the then and there," Lounsbury said.

The report said "every school that

houses an eighth grade ought to examine carefully and honestly its offerings and approaches in light of what we know about these young people and the demands placed on them by contemporary society."

Kanthak said school districts also should offer comprehensive training programs for middle school teachers so they can learn different ways to teach these youngsters and better understand their needs. While a few states are beginning to focus training programs on the needs of adolescents, she said only a few, including Georgia, North Carolina, Florida and Colorado, have distinct certification programs.

The association is the nation's largest school administrators' organization, representing 43,000 high school and middle level educators.

The American Federation of Teachers supported the findings of the study, agreeing that "most students are tuned out and turned off."

"Maybe if more principals, teachers and parents followed students around for a day and saw what school was like through the eyes of kids, we'd make a lot faster progress toward restructuring our schools."

FBI has no room for agent who refused to probe peace groups

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — The FBI has no room for a pacifist agent who refused orders to investigate peace groups, a former top FBI official testified Thursday in a lawsuit by the FBI agent.

"There were no other cases ... where an FBI agent specifically refused to follow a direct order. I considered his conduct egregious," said John D. Glover, former FBI executive assistant director for administration.

Glover testified about the disciplinary options he considered after Jack Ryan told superiors he would not investigate peace groups suspected of vandalizing military recruiting offices.

Ryan, 52, was fired for insubordination from his \$50,000-a-year job in September 1987, after more than 21 years with the FBI. He was 10 months away from retirement and a \$28,000 annual pension.

The suit was filed in one day, U.S. District Judge Harold Baker did not say when he would rule.

A Roman Catholic, Ryan said his decision to embrace pacifism prevented him from carrying out some of his sworn duties as an FBI agent. Ryan now lives as a volunteer worker in a homeless shelter.

His lawsuit accuses the FBI of religious discrimination, saying the agency could have reassigned him to duties that did not conflict with his religious beliefs. The suit seeks his reinstatement and full pension eligibility.

"There was no attempt by the FBI to accommodate

my religious beliefs," Ryan testified.

He said his non-violent beliefs surfaced in a 1983 meeting with his supervisor, but were brushed aside. He said he carried a gun and made arrests until his dismissal, but later decided carrying a gun was a religious conflict. Glover said the weapons refusal reinforces the decision to fire Ryan.

"The FBI is a paramilitary, highly-disciplined organization, which cannot tolerate such insubordination," Glover said. "There's no place in the FBI for agents who don't perform or refuse to perform."

Ryan's attorney, Arthur Greenberg, repeatedly asked Glover why he did not speak with Ryan, question him about his beliefs or accept suggestions that Ryan be reassigned before rendering his decision.

"This is not an insubordination case," Greenberg said in his opening argument. "We're dealing with an accommodation case. Did the government make a reasonable effort to accommodate his religious beliefs? They did not. They could have easily."

Glover acknowledged that the FBI's 9,000 agents handle a variety of jobs ranging from record-keeping to violent crime investigations.

James A. Lewis, the assistant U.S. attorney representing the FBI, said Ryan's position put an undue hardship on the bureau.

"The FBI should not be required to accept an agent who, as a pacifist, refuses to follow his weapons training," Lewis said.

Taxpayer aid for banks considered

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislators reacted negatively Thursday to a plan under consideration by the Bush administration that for the first time would force taxpayers to share the cost of future large bank rescues.

"The proposal is outrageous," said Rep. Frank Annunzio, D-Ill. "How can the administration even think of asking the nation's taxpayers to dig into their pockets to bail out the banks."

Top administration policymakers have yet to approve the plan, "but we're at the very final decision-making phase," said a senior Treasury of-

ficial, speaking on the condition of anonymity.

The plan would become part of a sweeping set of banking reforms President Bush will include in his Jan. 29 State of the Union address.

The measure's goal is to make bailouts protecting uninsured deposits, as was done in this week's rescue of Bank of New England Corp., far less common.

Using some taxpayer money and elevating the decision to government's highest levels would make deciding on such bailouts politically more difficult.

Banks then would be under pressure from large depositors to operate more safely since depositors would risk losing a portion of their funds over the \$100,000-per-account insurance limit.

Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Texas and chairman of the House Banking Committee, criticized the Treasury plan as a halfway measure.

The administration is "like the drunk on New Year's Eve who says, 'Man, some time after tomorrow, I'm going to get on the wagon.' But in the meantime, boys, pick me up if I drop on the floor," he said.

- AT&T rate plan overruled by FCC**
WASHINGTON — AT&T may not include in its overall rate structure temporary discounts for some customers at the expense of others, the Federal Communications Commission ruled Thursday.
- Decision means the nation's largest long-distance company must either withdraw a pending request for higher night and weekend rates or lower other charges to offset the increase.**
- AT&T's plan would have allowed it to raise the prices of some residential calls but remain within FCC-imposed rate caps by including promotional reductions targeted to specific customer groups.** For example, AT&T could have offered short-term reductions to attract new customers and raised other prices to offset the loss in revenue.
- Gephardt calls for health system reform**
WASHINGTON — The best way to reform the nation's health care system is to build on the current framework, not start over with a new one, House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt said Thursday.
- Gephardt, testifying before a Senate committee, said the current system, in which 37 million Americans have no health insurance and which costs about 12 percent of the nation's gross national product, needs major reforms.**

WASHINGTON — Sen. Dennis DeConcini continued Thursday to defend his assistance to S&L owner Charles H. Keating Jr., but his testimony was punctuated by bitter clashes with lawyers for the Ethics Committee and Sen. John McCain.
- The cross-examination of the Arizona Democrat produced some of the most-contentious testimony in nearly two months of hearings on the conduct of DeConcini, McCain and three other senators.** DeConcini has had sharp differences with McCain, an Arizona Republican, over their respective roles in assisting Keating. Some of that anger was apparent when DeConcini was questioned by John David McCain's lawyer.
- Airlines suffer \$2 billion loss for 1990**
WASHINGTON — The nation's airlines suffered a record \$2-billion loss for 1990, most of it registered after Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait caused fuel prices to leap, industry spokesmen said Thursday.
- "The airlines are hemorrhaging due to the combined impact of a recession and dramatically increased fuel costs," said Edward A. Merlis, vice president of the Air Transport Association, which represents most U.S. airlines.**

Judge lets birth control order stand

VISALIA, Calif. (AP) — A judge Thursday refused to rescind his order requiring a woman convicted of child abuse to have a birth control implant as a condition of probation.

"I find no case that precludes the order I made and will leave the issue to higher courts," Tulare County Superior Court Judge Howard R. Broadman said in the case of Darlene Johnson.

Defense attorney Charles Rothbaum said he will appeal on grounds that Broadman "violated Johnson's constitutional right to privacy."

"There is a fundamental right to reproduce," Rothbaum told Broadman.

He noted that the NorPlant implants, which gradually release a hormone, only recently were approved by the Food and Drug Administration and won't reach the market until February.

Johnson agreed to the implant after Jan. 2 sentencing hearing, but has changed her mind. Under that agreement, she is serving a brief jail term and is to go on three years' probation when released, probably in April, rather than begin a two- to four-year prison term.

Rothbaum told reporters he would not pursue an opening Broadman left in his decision by deeming the implant requirement as a condition of probation if a doctor said the implants are not safe for Johnson, who has a heart murmur and high blood pressure.

Prosecutor Jeff Wass noted that he recommended probation since Johnson has only two prior convictions, mainly in bad check and theft cases, and has used eight aliases.

Embargo won't force Iraq out, says director, in a reverse stand

WASHINGTON (AP) — CIA Director William Webster said Thursday that even if economic sanctions against Iraq remain in place for six months to a year, the embargo would not drive President Saddam Hussein's forces from Kuwait.

Last month, Webster gave Congress a far more optimistic view of the effectiveness of economic sanctions against Iraq, saying they were beginning to suffer economically and eventually would feel the embargo's impact militarily.

Webster now believes it is unlikely that sanctions of six months to a year would substantially reduce the ability of Iraqi forces to maintain their stranglehold on the oil-rich emirate of Kuwait and southern Iraq.

"This is especially true if Iraq does not believe a coalition attack is likely during this period," Webster said.

The CIA director's comments came in a three-page letter to Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., and chairman of

the House Armed Services Committee, Aspin, who backs the Bush administration's view that military force will drive Iraq from Kuwait, wrote to Webster on Wednesday seeking an update on sanctions.

"Our judgment remains that, even if sanctions continue to be enforced for an additional six to 12 months, economic hardship alone is unlikely to compel Saddam to retreat from Kuwait or cause regime-threatening popular discontent in Iraq," Webster said.

The CIA director believes that Iraq's air force and air defenses would suffer far more severely than its army if sanctions remain in place for six months to a year.

However, the CIA director said the Iraqi air force is not expected to play a major role in a battle for Kuwait. It would have only a marginal impact on Saddam's ability to hold Kuwait and southern Iraq, Webster said.

Webster's letter touched off a series of attacks on the House floor as

liberal Democrats questioned the administration's continued revision of the effectiveness of economic sanctions.

"I think we ought to make sure that the public understands that the administration keeps raising the threshold as they work their way toward war," said Rep. George Miller, D-Calif.

"They keep trying to close down the debate by raising the threshold of what the performance level would be."

Miller said Congress never sought a guarantee from Bush or any other administration official about the effectiveness of economic sanctions. The lawmaker argued, however, "if we don't let them run the proper time, they won't work."

Rep. Sam Gejdenson, D-Conn., said if the nation goes to war now, "we guarantee that sanctions won't work."

"Give the president the authority to go to war, but not today," Gejdenson said.

National blood supplies under threat if gulf war breaks out, officials warn

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — War in the Persian Gulf could deplete already low blood supplies nationally, leading to emergency shortages, United Blood Services officials said.

"If we go to war, we immediately deplete 50 percent of our blood supply, and then it would be a catch-up ballgame all the more to keep up with the war as it continues," said Jan Falk, United Blood Services director of community relations in Albuquerque.

She said the 50 percent depletion would apply to all 20 United Blood centers serving 18 states: New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, Mississippi, Illinois, Wyoming, Nevada, Louisiana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Oklahoma, Alabama, Missouri and Nebraska.

"The whole nation is feeling this crunch," Ms. Falk said. "Our sister centers do not have blood to help us out either."

Ms. Falk said the non-profit national corporation has a contract

with the U.S. military to send blood daily to McGuire Air Force Base in Wrightstown, N.J., in the event of war.

She said the year already is off to a bad start with declared emergency shortages Jan. 2-4, during which United Blood lacked enough blood to last 24 hours.

Last year's first declared emergency blood shortage didn't occur until September, she said.

United Blood serves New Mexico through its Albuquerque and El Paso, Texas, offices.

The El Paso facility, which serves southern New Mexico, faces a similar hardship, director Judy Sligar said.

The El Paso center needs 100 to 125 donors a day to meet needs of the hospitals it serves, she said.

Among them is Memorial Medical Center of Las Cruces, which had to cancel several elective surgeries last year when blood supplies were low, said Vicki Simmonds, the hospital's laboratory manager.

"We're at the levels where if we had a lot of emergencies tonight we could have to choose between taking blood from a scheduled elective surgery and using it for an emergency," MMC medical technologist Anne Grant said Wednesday.

She said there have been no severe shortages at the hospital yet this year, but right now it doesn't have large reserves.

"If there is a war, then there will be a shortage, and we will have to start canceling elective surgeries," she said. "I am 95 percent sure of that."

Marine Corps needs a few more good men

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Marine Corps is offering former Marines a chance for re-enlistment and immediate assignments generated by Operation Desert Shield, which began with the deployment in the Persian Gulf, an official said Wednesday.

The two-year term of service is open to former Marines with specific skills. The Marine Corps had been able to fill certain jobs through recruiting but Operation Desert Shield recently has forced the service to make the offer.

"This program is intended to authorize re-enlistment and immediate assignment of trained Marines to fill manpower requirements generated by Operation Desert Shield," said Maj. Nancy LaLunas, a Marine spokesman.

The offer to former Marines began Dec. 19 and expires Jan. 31, although Ms. LaLunas said the service would decide in a month or so whether to continue the program past that date. Former Marines must report no later than Feb. 1 and are limited to two years of service.

They will not be considered for lateral moves within the service since they are being selected for specific skills.

"We are not actively soliciting prior-enlisted Marines. We opened it up so that some people who may not be eligible would be able to enter," Ms. LaLunas said. "None who answer the offer will have to take part in any training or boot camp," she said.

The offer is being made to former Marines nationwide and those interested are being told to contact their local Marine recruiter.

The Marine Corps had no figures on how many jobs needed to be filled. Ms. LaLunas said it was too early to say how many former Marines have accepted the offer.

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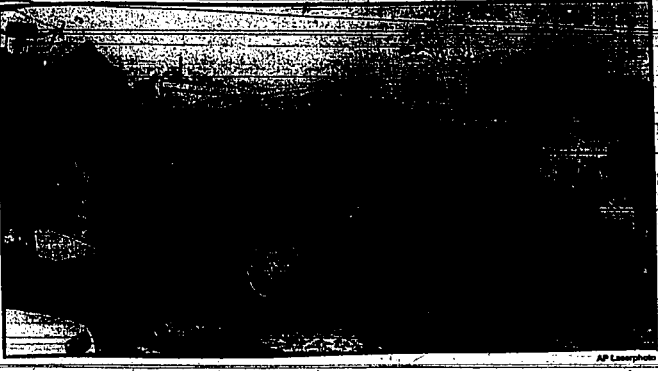

Lithuania rejects Gorbachev's threat of rule, appeal for help

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev on Thursday demanded that Lithuania suspend its drive for independence or face the possibility of Kremlin rule. Leaders of the restive Baltic republic rejected his threat and appealed for Western support. Gorbachev's sharp words reinforced the hard line he took Monday when he ordered paratroopers in seven secessionist republics to help round up draft dodgers and deserters. About 5,000 Lithuanians who learned of Gorbachev's action from radio and television newscasts, missed outside the parliament in Vilnius to support the drive for independence. About 500 others were

reported gathered at the republic's television tower. They fear a takeover attempt by Soviet paratroopers sent by the Kremlin to round up as reported 13,000 draft dodgers and deserters. Thousands of pro-Kremlin protesters demonstrated and called for the imposition of presidential rule in Lithuania, adoption of the Soviet constitution and a general strike if their demands are not met. Lithuanian lawmakers working into the evening replaced Prime Minister Kazimiera Prunskiene with Albertas Simenas, a 40-year-old economist. She resigned Tuesday in a dispute with her legislature over price increases. Thousands of paratroopers have

been mobilized this week for deployment in restive Soviet republics. A deputy Soviet defense minister, Gen. V. Achalov, said in an interview published Thursday that 1,000 paratroopers were sent to Lithuania. Some hard-line politicians have urged Gorbachev to impose direct rule over ethnic hot spots, saying independence movements by all 15 republics is the greatest threat to the country. Gorbachev has been taking the harshest measures against Lithuania — the republic most advanced in its independence drive. In another secessionist conflict, demonstrators rallied in the southern republic of Georgia late Wednesday after their rebellious parliament denounced Gorbachev's "interference" in their conflict with the enclave of South Ossetia. The enclave itself is seeking independence from the Kremlin. In the statement sent to the Lithuanian parliament released by the state news agency IASS, Gorbachev accused the republic's "makers of violating the Soviet constitution, infringing on citizens' rights and ignoring his presidential decrees.

Tallest building finished

TOKYO (AP) — In terms of size at least, Tokyo residents might have good reason to believe you can't fight City Hall. Theirs will soon be the world's largest. Come April, a 48-story mountain of marble and glass will open for business in this city of nearly-12-million. Towering 795 feet high, it will be Japan's tallest building. And although a taller behemoth is under construction in the nearby port of Yokohama, Tokyo officials said at an open house Thursday that their city-jewel will never be beat in one category: the view.

"We expect people hoping to get a look from the observation floor to have to wait in lines up to three miles long," said Seiji Hoshino, who was in charge of construction for three years. Officials acknowledge that getting 13,000 municipal workers — and their 260,000 boxes of papers — settled into the new city hall in March will be a major task. But they are confident of opening on April 1. That is just before elections that may be run without the pan most instrumental in giving the Tokyo government its new home — Gov. Shunichi Suzuki, 80.

10 killed in copter crash

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — A police helicopter used to film sequences for a popular TV program on unsolved crimes crashed and exploded Thursday, killing all 10 people aboard, the state PAF news agency reported. The victims included three crewmembers, six police officers and one civilian, PAF said. The Interior Ministry Mi-8 helicopter had been handed over to police for their permanent use.

A team preparing the TV program "997" — its title is taken from a telephone number to call police in an emergency — had been using the helicopter near Ciema, in Krosno province about 175 miles south of Warsaw. When it crashed it was on a training flight, PAF said. The "997" program has a police colonel and a TV reporter at host and uses "docudrama" techniques to recreate unsolved crimes.

Poland bars Red Army rail passage

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland has refused to allow the Red Army further right-of-passage by rail through its territory as it withdraws from Germany and has drawn back one military train, the Foreign Ministry said Thursday. Polish railway officials halted the train at the German border near the northwestern city of Szczecin on Monday, in what was apparently the first incident of its kind, ministry spokesman Wladyslaw Klaczynski said. He said the Soviet troop pullout from Germany cannot take place through Poland until an agreement on their transport is signed. A third round of Soviet-Polish talks began Thursday in Moscow on the proposed treaty to determine conditions of passage through Poland of Soviet troops in former East Germany, Klaczynski said.

The newspaper Gazeta Wyborcza reported that the train stopped at the border town of Gumienice consisted of 26 cars with 168 soldiers, 30 officers, 26 trucks, nine tanks and two anti-aircraft weapons. It said two other returning Soviet trains already inside Poland were stopped but allowed to continue to the Soviet border because they were already two-thirds of the way there.

3rd opposition party legalized

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Albania's third non-Communist political party was legalized Thursday, one month before the Balkan nation's first multiparty elections, the state news agency reported. Justice Minister Enver Hallil gave an order approving the Republican Party's request for legal status, the ATA news agency said. The Ecological Party was granted legal status on Monday. The Republican Party was the third opposition party to be legalized in less than a month. In December, the ruling Communists reversed decades of single-party rule and decided to permit alternative parties after student protests grew into demands for democracy. Meanwhile, the Democratic Party, which helped spearhead political reforms, continued to hold rallies across the country to drum up support ahead of the Feb. 10 elections. About 35,000 people, many chanting "Freedom" and "We Want a Democratic Albania," turned out for a rally Wednesday in Berat, 40 miles south of the capital, Tirana, said a party spokesman, Gene Pollo. More rallies were scheduled.

Shevardnadze says force was necessary

MOSCOW (AP) — Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze said in an interview that deployment of Soviet troops to seven, secessionist republics is not an excessive use of force. He also said in an interview with The Christian Science Monitor Television in Moscow, released Thursday, that his successor probably will take part in the scheduled Feb. 11-13 summit between presidents Bush and Mikhail S. Gorbachev. Shevardnadze cited fears of a dictatorship in a speech last month in which he resigned as foreign minister, a position he has held since 1985. Gorbachev on Monday ordered

Soviet paratroopers to help track down draft resisters in seven republics. Baltic leaders charged the move was intended to suppress their independence drives and was confirmation of Shevardnadze's warning of impending dictatorship. However, when asked on Wednesday whether the deployments were further evidence of dictatorship, Shevardnadze said no. "I can't say this is the display of some kind of dictatorship," he said. "This is a simple desire to introduce order because it's impossible to live under conditions of chaos and anarchy."

U.S. unsatisfied by rebel claim it will investigate crew deaths

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Thursday that if Salvadoran rebels are sincere in wanting justice for the killers of two American soldiers in El Salvador the rebels will turn the suspects over to the Salvadoran government. Department spokesman Richard Boucher expressed skepticism about reports the FMLN rebels had detained two guerrillas on the suspicion they had executed the Americans after their helicopter was shot down Jan. 2. "We have no information to confirm that the suspects were, in fact, detained, and they haven't been named," the spokesman said when asked about the reports. "I would point out that the FMLN's first reaction was to cover up the killings and to lie about the facts."

They fear a takeover attempt by Soviet paratroopers sent by the Kremlin to round up as reported 13,000 draft dodgers and deserters. Thousands of pro-Kremlin protesters demonstrated and called for the imposition of presidential rule in Lithuania, adoption of the Soviet constitution and a general strike if their demands are not met. Lithuanian lawmakers working into the evening replaced Prime Minister Kazimiera Prunskiene with Albertas Simenas, a 40-year-old economist. She resigned Tuesday in a dispute with her legislature over price increases. Thousands of paratroopers have

Mr. President, don't spill American blood needlessly

As war draws near, patriotic Idahoans can be forgiven if they have mixed feelings about it. It's a mixed feelings kind of situation.

On the one hand, we all want to support the president, because he is, after all, the president.

We also want to support our military personnel in the Mideast. They already have endured hardship and now are prepared to lay their lives on the line in their nation's service.

They have kept faith with us, and surely we must keep faith with them, both materially and in spirit.

On the other hand, however, is a tattered question, nagging question: What are we doing over there?

The question is a legitimate one to ask. American interests in the Persian Gulf are shaky at best. Oil? For the many billions we will spend on this campaign, we could go far toward energy self-sufficiency.

Imagine what could be achieved if the resources already poured into this campaign could be spent on oil-shale extraction, or solar technology, or nuclear-waste recovery.

But President Bush has said many times that oil is not why we are there. What then? Stopping aggression?

A lofty goal, but hardly a satisfying answer.

This century has seen our nation evolve from a backwoods upstart into the world's greatest military and economic force. Recently, however, we have felt more like a wounded giant, uncertain about our economy's ability to sustain a world-spanning military force.

Minding our own business is an increasingly attractive alternative to policing the world.

What business is it of ours, some people are asking, if one Middle Eastern despot wants another Middle Eastern despot's territory?

For Idahoans, inland Westerners, this isolationist sentiment has a long and honorable history. Our own Sen. William Borah, as chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, thwarted Woodrow Wilson's desire to have the United States join the League of Nations.

It's hard to imagine Sen. Borah approving of President Bush's "New World Order."

Ironically, if President Bush pursues a bloody and expensive war, he unwittingly may cause a resurgence of isolationism. A majority of Americans supports him now, but that support may evaporate if his New World Order translates into thousands of dead Americans.

Tuesday is Saddam Hussein's deadline. After that, Bush has the United Nations' blessing — and soon, that of the U.S. Congress — to attack.

But that doesn't mean he must or even should make war.

Evidence is trickling out of Iraq that the blockade is causing shortages of staple goods and military parts. Iraq cannot sell its primary export product, oil, and it cannot import what it needs. That's a reason for waiting.

Here's another: Killing Arabs will not enhance U.S. stature in the Arab world — especially if Israel is drawn into the fight on the U.S. side. Our efforts to preserve Mideast security may inspire more resentment than gratitude from Arabs.

The issues revolving around the morsel of real estate known as Kuwait are complex. But from our viewpoint, here in our fertile Idaho valley, all those issues can be made simple.

Yes, we support our president. Yes, we support the brave men and women of our military.

But, please, Mr. President, don't spill those brave warriors' blood unless you must.

Iraq-Iran relationship a key to crisis

Since the downfall of the Shah of Iran, the United States has experienced increasing problems in the Middle East.

The anti-American rhetoric espoused by Khomeini and his followers sowed the seeds of animosity against the United States throughout Islamic countries. Any efforts by pragmatic leaders of Islamic countries to neutralize anti-Western sentiment were largely sabotaged by political assassination (i.e., President Sadat of Egypt), war and acts of terrorism, as well as by the growing poverty and frustration of the masses in the Moslem world.

The historical Arab-Israeli conflict and the strong support of Israel by the United States have made this country almost helpless in resolving conflicts as our stance is always suspect. This very issue is now critical as, out of desperation, Saddam Hussein may attack Israel in an attempt to rally the Moslem world.

This would be an effective means of diverting attention from the crimes he has committed against Moslem neighbors.

The Saddam Hussein challenge to the legitimacy of Western economic and political ties to the Middle East is the latest in a series of Islamic and "Pan Arabism." To succeed in this venture, Saddam desperately needs to gain the support of the "Pan Islamic" movement.

It is thus necessary from a Western perspective that the Islamic world be reminded time and time again that it was Saddam who mercilessly sent half a million Iraqis to death in a war with Iran and who killed three-quarters of a million Iranians; it was Saddam who used a chemical arsenal against Kurdish civilians — all Moslems. It is Saddam who has violated Islamic principles and humanity: His trick of declaring Jihad (holy war) against the "Satanic" power of the United States and Israel is a reminder of Khomeini.

Fortunately, even the most fundamentalist of Moslems no longer take such rhetoric seriously.

Despite this note of optimism, however, any military action against Iraq may result in dangerous consequences.

The dominance of Islamic fundamentalists who believe in their "spiritual superiority" against all non-Moslems and who demand unabashed humility and outright apology from a West that is "continuing the legacy of colonialism" against the Islamic community is reality.

To such fundamentalists, one can offer little dialogue. They believe in the paradigm of martyrdom — Heaven "awaits" them. They are the homeless Palestinians, as well as the bare-footed peasants, discontented working class and the unemployed of Egypt, Morocco, Jordan, Iraq, Pakistan and many other Moslem countries.

They are the destitute and frustrated masses of Islamic society who march while chanting the rhetoric of their religious leaders.

Their fearlessness of their own mortality is reinforced by the belief that merciful Allah is their guardian.

In the event of war, it is possible that such impoverished peoples will become uncontrollable, striking against their own national armies who ostensibly have sided with the multinational but Western-dominated force in the region.

This volatile and potentially destabilizing action may lead to military coups and further Islamic radicalism. Certainly Saddam Hussein will exploit such a golden opportunity.

A more fearful scenario, however, is one that features Iran: Saddam, a Suni, may appeal to Shi'ah Moslem sentiment (Shi'ah

Moslems are in the majority in Iraq) in an attempt to gain the support of the Shi'ah in Iran. Or in the event of the downfall of Saddam, Iraq's political apparatus may fall in the hands of Shi'ah extremists. In such a case, it is realistic to expect that Iranian fundamentalists will actively defend Iraq, thereby creating further complications for the United States and western allies.

The leadership of Iran, which has been buying Russian and Chinese weapons for some time, has made numerous threats against the U.S. presence in the Persian Gulf area.

Though the Iranian economy is in ruins and the Iranian public disillusioned by the facade of the Khomeini revolution of 1979, the regime wishes to divert the attention of the masses from internal economic and political problems to international politics.

Khomeini's successor has already made numerous speeches to the effect that "We will make the Persian Gulf the graveyard of American soldiers."

Iran becomes a part of conflict siding with Iraq, then the entire U.N. Resolution would need to be reconstructed. I believe predicting how the multinational forces from Islamic countries would react, as well as the Russian and Chinese response to the new development, would be extremely difficult.

I do believe the military leadership of Iraq is counting on chaotic conditions generated by Islamic fundamentalists and, ultimately, support from the Iranian regime.

The best strategy of the United States and its allies is to use every available means to prevent Saddam and his military commanders from gaining these two objectives.

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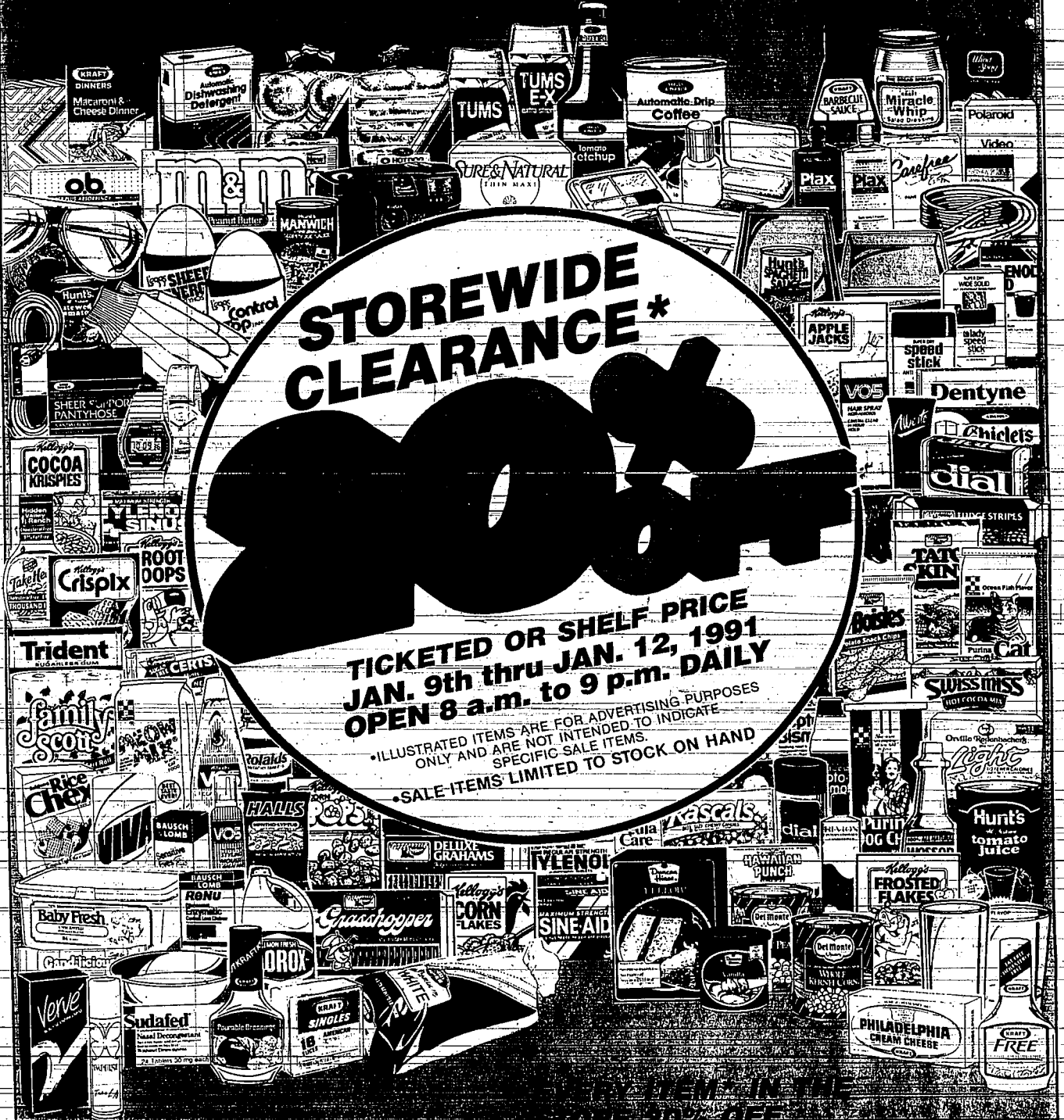

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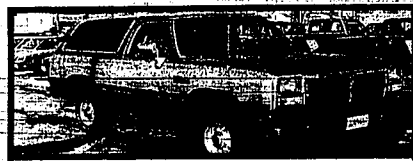

Investigators taking a closer look at bombing

LAS VEGAS — Federal investigators are studying a possible connection between a November power station bombing in Jackpot and a Dec. 22 blast that knocked out electricity in Jean, Nev.

Agents from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms were in Jackpot this week to investigate whether the blasts were linked.

Sig Celaya, head of the Las Vegas ATF office, said there are similarities between the two cases, in which high explosives were used to destroy power company substations.

"Both are near state lines, both substations are in close proximity to casinos and both happened about the same time of night," Celaya said.

Celaya said, however, that the similarities in the two cases may be mere coincidences. Jean is a casino development about 30 miles south of Las Vegas.

Celaya said the explosives used in the Jean blasts have yet to be identified by the ATF's Washington laboratory. But he said it appeared they were commercially manufactured.

Hagerman man waives hearing and pleads guilty

GOODING — A Hagerman man pleaded guilty Wednesday to a felony charge of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor.

According to a report by Hagerman Police Chief Todd Peterson, Derrick Lingnaw, 25, was arrested Tuesday.

The charge stems from a Jan. 4 incident involving a 9-year-old girl not related to Lingnaw, the report said.

At his arraignment Wednesday before Magistrate Judge Thomas Cushman in Gooding, Lingnaw waived his preliminary hearing and pleaded guilty.

The maximum sentence for lewd and lascivious conduct is life in prison. Peterson said Lingnaw was being held on a probation violation charge connected to another case.

Cash stolen in break-in at Jerome junior high school

JEROME — Police are looking for someone who made off with \$850 after breaking into the junior high school of office Wednesday night or Thursday morning.

Principal Craig Ainsworth called police just after 7 a.m. Thursday and reported the desks in the office had been ransacked and money stolen. Cpt. Jay Gardner of the Jerome Police Department said.

Someone broke a plexiglass window in the boy's locker room, then pried open several doors to get into the office, Gardner said. There are no official suspects at this time, he said.

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Bank officials see a gloomy future

Experts predict downturn in Idaho economy

TWIN FALLS — Idaho has not yet felt recession's bite, but bank officials warned Thursday that the U.S. economy is in sad shape and faces an uncertain future.

"We are definitely adrift in uncharted waters," said Spencer F. Eccles, chairman of First Security Corporation.

Speaking at the bank holding company's annual economic outlook luncheon in Twin Falls, Eccles recited a fearful litany of national economic problems:

- The nation is "looking down the gun barrel of a possible war in the Middle East," while Operation Desert Shield and higher oil prices drain money from taxpayers and consumers.

- The nation is entering recession as a debtor nation for the first time in many generations.

- Massive domestic and trade deficits will hamper recovery from recession.

- Excessive consumer and corporate debt burdens the economy.

- Bank failures forebode tighter money.

Economic growth in Idaho will slow, but recession has not come to the state yet, and it is not likely to, said Kelly Matthews, senior vice president and economist for the bank holding company.

"I don't think we'll have negative economic growth at all," he said in an interview.

Matthews predicted:

- Idaho personal income growth will slow to about 7 percent — down from about 9 percent the last two years.

- The state will gain about 11,000 jobs.

- Idaho unemployment will be over around 6 percent, compared with 5.6 percent in 1990.

- Potato, wheat and dairy prices will remain weak and perhaps decline further, but beef prices will remain strong.

Eccles warned that the national recession will influence the way his bank does business, bringing a few more effects of the national recession home to Idaho.

Borrowers will likely have a harder time obtaining loans, he said in an interview.

"Obviously, the credit criteria has been substantially tightened up," he said.

Also, First Security Bank will likely hike charges for some services to cover \$5 million in new Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation costs that became effective Jan. 1.

"Like any other business, costs that are driven by the marketplace or the government will have to be passed on," he said.

But things will be worse elsewhere. Among other, general effects of the national recession, Eccles predicted:

- "Unhappily the worst news is yet to come" as far as job losses are concerned. More companies will cut employees — following the lead of Sears and Citicorp, which have cut a combined 29,000 jobs.

- Real Gross National Product will decline 1 percent to 2 percent in 1991.

- A national economic malaise could persist into 1992 with an off-and-on growth pattern.

- Inflation will run at about 3.5 percent to 4.5 percent nationally, which is below the 1990 level.

- Oil prices will probably settle between \$23 and \$25 per barrel, based on the long-term interaction of oil and gold prices. Prices topped \$31 briefly Wednesday following the failure of diplomatic efforts in Geneva to avoid a Persian Gulf war.

- Larger payments to the FDIC will force more banks to consolidate.

- The federal deficit will go up more than \$100 billion from the 1990 level — possibly as high as \$350 billion.

But Eccles assured his audience that First Security Corporation is in excellent shape to weather a national recession.

"We're a very solid, safe, sound bank holding company," he said. "Our reserves are solid. We're committed to the Intermountain West and we're going to be there when you need us."

A third speaker, H. James Dorey, president of First Security Investment Management, said he is optimistic about money-making possibilities in the U.S. stock markets because prices of many good stocks have fallen lower than their real value because of the Persian Gulf crisis.

"But if the United States becomes embroiled in a lengthy war, making money in the stock markets could become more difficult," he said.

A short war will only have a "short-term, psychological effect on the markets," Dorey said.

Lawmakers give thumbs up to Andrus' budget

BOISE — Magic Valley legislators expressed guarded optimism Tuesday about Gov. Cecil Andrus' budget package, with the greatest hesitations surrounding his revenue projection and proposed gasoline tax increase.

"It's a relatively conservative budget," said Rep. Bruce Newcomb of Burley, assistant Republican leader. "It sounded like a Republican budget."

"Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, praised the

governor's "good forward planning" for looking ahead to fiscal year 1993, but thought Andrus' \$992.7 million projected available funds for 1992 was a high estimate.

"I'm wondering if he's not coming in a

little high on his revenue projections," agreed Rep. Collie Gould, R-Buhl, a member of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

Income from the agricultural economy will decline in the next year, said Jones, who sits on the House Agriculture Affairs Committee. A drought continues and commodity prices are down.

One point of contention was the govern-

nor's long-anticipated proposal for property tax relief. He suggested \$10 million in surplus funds be returned to cities and counties for tax relief.

Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, said she would prefer that surplus funds go to one-shot expenditures and allow the savings from last year's indigent care plan to provide property tax relief. That legislation shifted the financial burden from counties to the state, saving counties the cost of paying indigent medical bills with property taxes.

Report raises nagging questions about police affair

TWIN FALLS — An Idaho deputy attorney general said Thursday that Twin Falls police officers may have overstepped their bounds when they made an off-duty traffic stop in December.

Michael Kane repeated an earlier state-

ment, however, that he will not file criminal charges against officers Dan Chatterton, Kenneth "Chuck" Dudley and Mike Covington.

"That's not to say I think they acted within the proper boundaries," Kane said. "They probably went beyond what they should have done."

A final report from the attorney general's

office detailing the actions of officers will be completed today or Monday, Kane said.

City officials won't say whether the officers, who were put on administrative leave after the incident and later reinstated, will be disciplined.

"It's an area that's protected by law," said City Manager Tom Courtney. Any action taken by the city can be appealed by

the officers, said Courtney, who has the final decision on any disciplinary action stemming from an ongoing internal review of the officers' actions.

"This is something that could ultimately be decided in the courts ... and the less that's said about it, the better," he said.

The internal review was prompted by a

Suit filed against sheriff

HAILEY — A class action lawsuit has been filed against Blaine County's sheriff and commissioners over unsatisfactory conditions at the county jail.

The suit filed earlier this week in U.S. District Court in Boise does not seek damages, but, rather, asks that substandard conditions be remedied or the jail facility closed, said Stephen Pevar, an attorney in Denver with the American Civil Liberties Union, which filed the suit.

Pevar said "it's unusual" for a lawsuit such as this not to ask for damages.

"I feel that the sheriff and county officials are generally doing the right thing," Pevar said. "It's just that they haven't been given the money when the people voted down the bond issue."

A \$4.97 million bond to build a new jail facility failed this past November. County officials have recently initiated a project to renovate an old office building into a home for work release prisoners, to help solve the jail's overcrowding problem.

Pevar said the law is clear: The county has to meet certain federal standards. They either comply with the law, or don't operate the facility, he said.

As of Thursday, Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williamson had not received a copy of the complaint and declined to comment.

Pevar said that if the county denies the allegations set forth in the complaint, the ACLU will hire one or two experts to examine the jail to give future testimony on its condition.

The county has 40 days upon receipt of the complaint to file its answer.

Locals willing to serve in war

TWIN FALLS — As America inches closer to war in the Middle East, young men and women from the Magic Valley are still volunteering to serve in the military.

No pulled-up bravado, no flag-waving. If several recruits reflect the thinking of most, the prospect of joining Operation Desert Shield worries them little.

"I didn't even think about the Persian Gulf. It has to go, it'll go," said Lorenzo Gonzales, who is trying to enlist in the Army.

Former Twin Falls High School track star Ron Marsh, 19, starts Army basic training in May and said he is not too concerned either.

"I figure they (U.S. government leaders) know what they're doing," he said. "Shawn Carder enlisted with the Army just before Iraq invaded Kuwait but said events there had not changed his mind

about serving. "I'm more willing and more excited about getting in there ... I support Bush Administration policy," Carder said.

Gonzales, 23, was in the Army recruiting office in Twin Falls recently. He hopes to fulfill a long-time goal by joining the Army to eventually become a military policeman.

Soft-spoken, Gonzales graduated from Twin Falls High School. He is from Mexico; has lived in the city for 15 years and is a permanent resident. To join the military police, Gonzales must become a naturalized citizen, so he will have to accept another assignment in the army until he becomes a citizen.

"I just want to serve my country. The United States gave me the chance to live here and I just want to repay the favor," Gonzales said.

He has wanted to be in the Army since junior high school. Marsh, who also ran track on a scholar-

Savings to homeowners under governor's plan not large

BOISE—So you want to know how Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus' property tax relief proposal would affect your pocketbook?

Administration officials say it would be a 7 to 10 percent savings in the average individual's total property tax bill.

Big deal, you say. What does that mean, you ask.

According to the governor's office, the \$10 million refund would be distributed on the basis of the population, and to cities based on population and market value.

Big deal, you say. Please speak in English, you say.

Well, the owner of a \$60,000 home in Twin Falls with a \$37,500 taxable value would save about \$25.

The same homeowner in Jerome would save approximately \$29; in Gooding, \$30; in Shoshone, \$30; in Fairfield, \$20; in Burley, \$24; and in Rupert, \$31.

Changing the equation slightly for Blaine County, the owner of a \$85,000 home in Hailey with a \$55,500 taxable value would save about \$21, while the same homeowner in Ketchum would save about \$15.

But wait. Don't spend it yet. These calculations don't include any tax increases, overrides or any other potential, locally imposed changes to the proposal that could offset the savings of the relief proposal.

"It's a move in the right direction," said Rep. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, who sits on the House Environmental Affairs Committee.

"Let's try that first ... that's a long-term solution."

Another member of the committee, Rep. Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls, said recycling should work hand-in-hand with regional landfills.

"We're still going to have to have our landfills," he said.

"I think that's really important to our landfill," he said.

"I just don't think a 6-cent gas tax is sellable in my neck of the woods now," Gould said.

She pointed out that the governor said he did not raise general fund taxes but wants to raise the gas tax and double vehicle registration fees to fund highway improvements. "It's a matter of semantics that it's not general fund," she said.

Another of the governor's special projects is Rural Revitalization Initiative that proposes spending \$1.5 million to improve rural health care, economic development and infrastructure, drew a mixed response.

"I think we've made some good steps in that direction. We have to keep concentrating in that direc-

tion," Newcomb said.

Magic Springs isn't happy with strings attached to permit

TWIN FALLS — A Hagerman trout hatchery is not happy with conditions attached to a proposed state permit to increase its production.

The state Water Resources Department proposed issuing the permit with conditions it doesn't have the authority to impose and based on water quality standards that don't exist, said Steve Tolman, attorney for the Magic Springs Hatchery.

The proposed order acknowledges the vagueness of state water quality standards, yet it requires the hatchery comply with them.

Confusing standards make enforcement difficult, said Mike Maguire, a state water quality supervisor with the state Division of Environmental Quality.

The hatchery has sought a permit to re-use 45 cubic feet per second of water to raise small trout. The water would be run through new raceways before flowing through the main hatchery raceways.

DEQ could not deny the permit because the standards "by which this application is to be judged are unclear to the department and difficult, if not impossible for the applicant to prove compliance with," the agency said.

Problems with vague water quality standards may become even more acute as the state grapples with its most restrictive regulations aimed at protecting water quality by banning any activity that would lower it.

DEQ has established a "level 1" "numerical" standards for only a few water quality criteria. Those are easy to enforce, McMasters said.

But for others it has only descriptive, or "narrative," standards.

"It's difficult to enforce criteria that they don't have numerical standards," he said.

Criteria such as temperature, amount of dissolved oxygen, acidity, bacterial content and ammonia levels are easily measured and expressed in numbers.

But state standards for other pollutants such as nutrients, suspended solids, chemicals or hazardous materials are less definitive. They are not allowed "in concentrations found to be of public health significance," or if they result in "a nuisance or objectionable conditions," McMasters said.

Violations of such standards are hard to document, he said. Normally action is taken only if a specific incident can be linked to a specific

discharge, such as a fish kill traced to a mining operation's discharge of heavy metals, he said.

Timber, mining and grazing industries have cited vague standards and lack of data on existing conditions for their opposition to three Outstanding Resource Waters designations proposed to the Idaho Board of Health and Welfare.

One of those is the middle fork of the Salmon River and 27 of its tributaries. The designation would ban any human activity that lowered water quality.

The primary pollutant in that river is sedimentation from mining operations.

But state water quality regulations do not include a numerical standard for sediments, McMasters said, nor does the state have much information on existing conditions in many

tribes and streams. And it's impossible to say whether water quality has been affected, if current conditions aren't known, he said.

"You need baseline data and specific numeric criteria to document compliance," McMasters said.

Water quality officials agree that moss and algae mats, which blanket the Snake River most summers, are a problem. But they don't have any studies that document the source of the problem, although such a study is now under way.

Because no information exists on the sources or effects of pollutants in the river, there is little the state can do to impose restrictions on the sources thought to contribute to the problem, McMasters said.

The Environmental Protection Agency issues permits that limit the amount of solids a facility can dis-

charge. But those permits must be approved by the state, which cannot deny them because it cannot show whether the additional discharge will violate state water quality standards.

The Magic Springs Hatchery has such a permit. In 1988, however, the EPA cited the hatchery for discharging wastes into the Snake River in violation of that permit.

Magic Springs is maintaining the EPA's evidence was inadmissible and denied any wrongdoing, but agreed to pay a \$5,000 fine, reduced from \$60,000, to avoid a lengthy and expensive court battle.

The proposed order and any exceptions, briefs or oral arguments on the order will be considered by the director of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and a final order issued.

Highway plan faces roadblocks

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday urged the Legislature to approve an ambitious program to pump more money into highway improvements, but key lawmakers say he may have a hard time getting it approved.

Andrus urged the Legislature to approve a combination of state fuel taxes, vehicle registration fees and bonds that will provide an extra \$50-million per year for state highway projects.

It also would mean a huge increase in funding from the state for local highway agencies such as the cities, counties and highway districts.

Andrus urged an increase of 6 cents per gallon in the state fuel tax to 24 cents, effective April 1 if the Legislature goes along.

"If conflict occurs, it will be about increasing the tax to get that much of an increase," he said.

An administration spokesman said the entire package would cost the average driver about \$55 a year in new taxes. But he said it still would leave the permit cost of driving in Idaho below all neighboring states except Oregon.

Key elements of the proposal:

- Boosting the state fuel tax from 18 cents to 24 cents, effective April 1.
- Doubling the registration fees for cars and small trucks. That will increase the average car registration by \$22.
- Increasing registration fees and trip permits for other trucks.
- Using some of the increased revenue from the higher fuel to pay for \$75 million in bonds for highway construction projects.
- The governor proposed issuing \$20 million in new bonds each year for the next three years. It would take \$7.5 million per year from the extra revenue to cover the cost of the bonds.
- A 300 percent increase in the cost of obtaining vehicle titles, from \$3 to \$12, effective July 1.

Together, the proposals would give the Transportation Department an extra \$32.2 million in ongoing revenue next year, plus \$25 million from bonds. After taking out the \$7.5 million for the bonds, the state would have an extra \$50 million for highway construction.

The governor said that will allow the state to accelerate its highway construction program and that it will gain on what state officials have estimated is a \$7 billion backlog of road and bridge needs.

"I think he will have a hard time getting it approved," Sessions said. Rep. Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, co-chair of the budget committee, said, "I think you can sell a gas tax increase. I think 6 cents is higher than you can expect."

Finance Committee Chairman Atwell Parry, R-Molokai, said the governor's fuel tax increase would hit hard at people who live in rural areas, as he does. But he said the program deserves study, especially the status plan to issue \$20 million in bonds over the next three years for highway projects.

"Our highway situation certainly isn't going to get any better if we just try to maintain the status quo and work it out with future revenues," Parry said.

Advised that the Andrus bond proposal would require \$150 million over 20 years to repay \$75 million in bonds, Parry said, "That would bother me. I want my constituents to tell me how they want their roads and bridges fixed."

"It's going to depend on what happens in the Persian Gulf,"

Council's energy plan is supported

BOISE (AP) — The Northwest Power Planning Council's proposals for meeting the region's long-range energy needs are being generally endorsed by Idaho interests.

But at a hearing in Boise on Wednesday night, some of the 20 people testifying said the council's plan needs to be expanded, and it was at that point that views differed.

The council had scheduled the hearing in conjunction with its regular two-day meeting, but the meeting was cancelled after fog shut down the city's airport.

The council, which oversees power needs in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, wants to reduce energy demand by 1,350 megawatts through conservation over the next decade. Conservation was responsible for freeing up 350 megawatts of power during the past 10 years.

Conservation and increased energy efficiency are lower-cost resources from an environmental viewpoint, Michele Tice of the Idaho Conservation League said.

But she said the league also wants the council to play a leading role in integrating protection of fisheries with power generation and further develop a system of interstate seasonal electricity exchanges.

BOISE (AP) — The Andrus administration expects Idaho Lottery dividends earmarked for state government construction and school building projects to keep growing over the next 18 months.

That's despite an anticipated \$6 million drop in ticket sales during the budget year that ends June 30, and sales during the next budget year the administration expects to be \$1 million below the \$66.3 million generated during the lottery's first year.

About \$17.2 million of that fiscal 1990 revenue was divided between state and school district construction needs, and another \$31.1 million was paid out in prizes.

Gov. Cecil Andrus executive budget plan unveiled Thursday estimates \$18 million in dividends for the two-building accounts will be collected and \$30 million in prizes will be paid out from an anticipated \$60.3 million in ticket sales revenue during the current spending year.

In the budget year that begins July 1, Andrus expects sales to reach \$65.3 million, with prize money pegged at \$32.5 million and \$20 million in estimated dividends.

Scientific panel to study storage tanks

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — Yet another scientific panel will study the potentially explosive, nuclear waste storage tanks on the Hanford nuclear reservation.

Westinghouse, Hanford Co. is forming a new team of outside experts to help it solve the safety problems in the underground tanks.

Spokesman Penny Phelps said the new panel is needed in part because of all the existing panels.

"It's helping us to resolve all the recommendations coming in from all the external panels," Ms. Phelps said.

The new panel will look at all the recommendations offered, some of which are not consistent, and advise the company on how to proceed, she said.

The new panel joins at least three others in addition to hundreds of Westinghouse and U.S. Energy Department employees, studying the tanks.

Hanford's 177 storage tanks contain wastes from the production of plutonium for nuclear weapons.

In the past year it had been revealed the ferrocyanide in some tanks and hydrogen buildup in others have the potential to explode.

Officials for the Energy Department insist the explosion risk is low.

Operations at the tanks have been restricted, and major efforts launched to solve the problems. Because of a lack of good information on the exact contents of the lethal tanks, progress has been slow.

The new panel is called the Waste Management External Advisory Committee, with an annual budget of up to \$200,000, said Westing-

house spokesman Eric Campbell.

Chairman will be Frank Parker of Vanderbilt University. Also on the panel are Bruce Kowalski of the University of Washington and Gregory Choppin of Florida State University.

Up to three more panelists are sought, Westinghouse said.

Westinghouse also plans to contract some work to UW's Center of Process and Analytical Chemistry "directed, coincidentally, by committee member Kowalski," the company said in a news release.

Sales drop, but dividends may go up in lottery

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Honors class makes video

GOODING — A local eighth-grade honors English class has produced an 18-minute video movie on drug awareness.

Teacher Marilyn Flynn said the film, called "Why Me," was made for a state contest on drug awareness. She and students Adrian Cleva-Miller and Ellie Roper-Ater made the movie to the School Board Tuesday.

"The board was impressed with their presentation," Superintendent James Cobble said. "It was well done."

Flynn said every student in her class participated in the project. They all produced. They all directed. They all starred. They all were great," she said.

The story is about a girl with drug-related problems who has a series of flashbacks to realize her mistakes.

Flynn said her students used a school video camera and improvised the rest.

They put foil, for instance, on a wall to direct the spotlight, which was a living room lamp.

The film may be crude, but the students learned a great deal from it, Flynn said.

Results of the contest will be announced in March.

In other school business:

A water line above the superintendent's office froze and broke during the Christmas vacation. Cobble said damage of ceilings and carpets was estimated at \$8,000. Fortunately, he said, no permanent records, computers or office equipment were damaged.

"It came down in the best place it could as far as not doing damage," Cobble said. "It put a ton of water out in a hurry."

This week, as well as two other minor broken lines, were discovered right away by staff working during the holidays, Cobble said, so damage was minimal.

The district has purchased 10 new computers and hardware for the high school, using federal Chapter II funds.

The trustees agreed to participate in a city project sponsored by the Gooding Chamber of Commerce and the City Council to construct new sidewalks, curbs, gutters and drain systems on Main Street from the Wood River canal north to the railroad tracks.

Cobble estimated the three blocks of sidewalks in front of the elementary and middle schools will cost \$25,000 to \$30,000.

The board approved a \$15,000 bid from a Boise company to refinish the high school gymnasium floor.

The work will be done this summer to make the 18-year-old floor look new again, Cobble said.

Woman among 4 finalists

WASHINGTON (AP) Shirley Rau, Idaho's 1990-91 Teacher of the Year and a 12th-grade English teacher at Nampa High School, has been named one of four finalists in the national Teacher of the Year program.

Gordon M. Ambach, executive director of the Council of Chief State School Officers, which sponsors the program with Encyclopaedia Britannica Inc., said Thursday that other finalists were Beatrice Kramer Volkman of Alabama, Shirley A. Thompson of Washington, D.C., and Ray E. McKee of West Virginia.

John Quam, director of the national Teacher of the Year program, said Rau and the three other finalists will be interviewed Feb. 4-5 in Washington, D.C., by a panel of educators. The 1991 Teacher of the Year will be honored by President Bush at a White House ceremony in early April.

Idaho Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans said Rau's selection was a compliment to all Idaho teachers.

"We have a history of attracting well-qualified, dedicated people to the teaching profession," Evans said. "Our standards are high—in part because teachers themselves are committed to good preparation and ongoing professional development."

Boise district:

Legal action's 'Un-American'

BOISE (AP) — Boise School Board trustees charged that a lawsuit contesting how state dollars are spread among Idaho's school districts is "Un-American."

Trustee Rory Jones announced Wednesday that the Boise district would join forces with the State Department of Education as co-defendants in the suit.

Boise is the first district to align with the state since the School District, along with 18 other districts in state, filed the suit in Fourth District Court in September.

"We view this suit as a bid on our treasury," Jones said. Calling the suit "Un-American," Jones said the opposing districts were attempting to "entirely socialize educational funding."

Dan Mabe, assistant superintendent of the Meridian School District, agreed, in part, with Jones' statement.

"All public schools are social institutions but our school district is very American," Mabe said.

The Idaho Constitution mandates the state provide children with "a uniform and thorough education," Mabe said, but he believes many in request exist.

Mabe said the present method of distributing state funds to Idaho's 113 school districts penalizes children living in "property-poor" districts.

In general, those districts collect less property tax revenue than districts with higher property values, he said.

Banks woman dies in head-on collision

GARDENA (AP) — A Banks woman was killed in a head-on collision on snow-covered Idaho Highway 55 about one-mile north of Gardena, Idaho State Police said.

Mary R. Donley LaChapelle, 45, died at the scene of the accident about 6:30 a.m. Thursday. Police said she was not wearing a safety belt.

The driver of the delivery truck that she collided with, 31-year-old Kevin Robotyn of McCall, was treated and released from a Horse Shoe Bend clinic.

An Idaho State Police dispatcher said the crash was weather related, but an investigation was continuing.

Pocatello's hopes dim for winning state prison facility

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho Department of Corrections officials apparently have all but closed the books on Pocatello's prospects as the site for a \$10 million, 160-bed state women's prison.

The state Board of Correction was expected to decide Friday on where to locate the facility, which would add about 90 jobs and an estimated \$2 million annual payroll to a local economy.

Besides a number of sites in Pocatello, a parcel of state-owned land near the Idaho State School and

Hospital in Nampa was being considered.

"We're crossing our fingers. We're still in the running, but at this point, we're not sure," Pocatello Mayor Peter Augustad said Thursday.

The gloomy outlook came in the wake of a letter from Deputy Corrections Director Mel Johnson of Boise. The letter, which arrived late Wednesday, expressed disappointment that Corrections officials had been unable to come to Pocatello to tour the latest sites being offered for

the prison.

Johnson's letter also expressed the state's frustration at having to sift through nine Pocatello site offerings. It also reminded city officials that they had missed a Jan. 7 deadline for supplying adequate site information to both the Department of Corrections and the three-member board.

In addition, Johnson said the city's latest property offer had several drawbacks, including a sloping location. On Wednesday, Board of Correction Chairman Wendell Miller of Idaho Falls also said

Pocatello's chances of winning the prison were diminishing.

Meanwhile, Bannock County Commissioner Tom Katsilometes said he met with Gov. Cecil Andrus on Wednesday to talk about the likelihood of siting the prison in Pocatello. Katsilometes said the governor understood the problems, but did not commit to getting involved in the discussions.

"The governor recognized we're trying, but he was unable to offer any suggestions or ideas on what we could do to enhance our chances,"

the commissioner said.

Nick Miller, a Correction Board member from Boise, said suggestions that the state take another look at Philbin Road property northwest of Pocatello were misguided. The site, located near the FMC Corp. and J.R. Simplot plants, is in an air pollution "non-attainment area."

Miller said the board's hands were tied in trying to reopen discussion on that site in light of a state Division of Environmental Quality letter pointing out the severe air quality problems.

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Exclusion from Hall of Fame closer for Rose

NEW YORK - The Baseball Hall of Fame took the first step toward barring Pete Rose when a special committee recommended Thursday that players on the ineligible list not even be on the ballot.

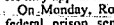
The proposal will be considered by the Hall's board of directors on Feb. 4. If approved, the only way Rose could get into the Hall would be if he is reinstated from the permanent ineligible list by the baseball commissioner.

Rose, baseball's career hits leader, agreed to his lifetime ban on Aug. 23, 1989, following an investigation that he gambled on games involving the Cincinnati Reds while he managed the team. He may appeal for reinstatement at any time.

On Monday, Rose completed a five-month federal prison sentence which followed his guilty plea to two income-tax felonies. He now is serving a three-month term at Talbot House, a Cincinnati halfway house.

"Pete expected it," said restaurateur Jeff Ruby, a longtime Rose friend who visited the former manager Thursday. Ruby told reporters outside Talbot House that Rose "wasn't surprised and wasn't depressed" by the vote.

The Rose matter wasn't on the agenda for Thursday's meeting, called primarily to consider changes in the voting procedure of the

NEW YORK (AP) - Not even a training camp holdout could keep Emmitt Smith from the honor roll this season.

Smith, the Dallas Cowboys running back, was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year on Friday by The Associated Press.

Smith, the 17th pick in the first round of the 1990 draft, received 33 of the 80 votes cast by sports writers and broadcasters who cover the NFL. Another runner, Johnny Johnson, the seventh rounder for the Phoenix Cardinals, was a close second with 29 votes.

"I feel very honored," said Smith, who barely played in the first two games of the season as he tried to get into shape. "For me coming out of college and not achieving the Heisman, this made it a big honor for me to be rookie of year."

"It shows someone else feels you have the capabilities of becoming a leading player."

Smith, an All-American at Florida, where he rushed for 3,929 yards and 36 touchdowns in three seasons, passed up his senior season to enter the draft. He was the second running back taken behind Blair Thomas of the New York Jets.

While Thomas was rushing for 620 yards and did not receive a vote for Offensive Rookie, Smith got 937 yards and 11 touchdowns.

He was the focal point of a revitalized ground game and offered a balance to the passing of Troy Aikman.

"After carrying just twice for two years, I got to open against San Diego and only six times for 11 yards against the Giants. Smith took off. Against Washington, he had 17 carries for 63 yards and a touchdown."

The Giants shut down Smith the next week (12 for 28, one score), but he had his first 100-yard effort the next week, gaining 121 on 23 runs and scoring once.

He didn't have another big game for a month and after getting just 40 yards on six attempts against San Francisco, Smith complained he wasn't getting enough work. Aikman seconded that complaint.

"I want Emmitt to get the ball more," coach Jimmy Johnson said.

Ranchers could close hunt lands

POCATELLO - More than 450,000 acres of private land in southeastern Idaho could be closed to hunting this year if a group of ranchers upset with state management plans succeeds in organizing area landowners.

The group, which is circulating a petition among landowners, hopes a meeting with the Idaho Fish and Game Commission next Wednesday in Boise will persuade commissioners to think again about their five-year management plans.

But in case it doesn't, organizers said the petitions also would be submitted to state legislators.

Rancher Ken Estep said about 90 percent of ranchers in the Arbon Valley area have signed the petition, and rancher Roger Whitnah said almost all the ranchers in the American Falls-Rockland area support the petition. John Jones of Maland and Rusty Davis of Downey said organizing efforts also were under way in their areas.

Estep said 177,000 acres of private ground in the Arbon Valley area could be affected, along with 160,000 in Rockland, 30,000 acres in the "Big Onion" near Downey and possibly 100,000 more acres around Maland.

"There also may be national forest access limited all through this area," Estep said.

The petition states in part that earlier big game starting dates proposed by the state Department of Fish and Game make the season "longer than we are willing to tolerate people running over and through our property."

As a result, petitioners vow they are "closing our properties to hunting and trespassing until there can be an acceptable management plan involving the hunting of birds and big game in our area."

Ken Norris, assistant Fish and Game director, said from his Boise office Wednesday that the management plans are still subject to public input and change. The Fish and Game Commission will not adopt them until its April meeting, he said.

"There have already been major changes in the plans following public comment generated by the 22 meetings we held statewide concerning the plans," Norris

NCAA names Californian 1st woman president

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - The NCAA convention adjourned Thursday, making history one last time by naming Judy Sweet of California-San Diego as the NCAA's first woman president.

"I'm not sure I can find the right words to express to you what I'm feeling right now," the 42-year-old Wisconsin native said as more than 2,000 delegates gave her a standing ovation.

"I don't sure my words will be heard over the thumping of my heart."

The nomination of Sweet, director of men's and women's athletics at her Division-III school, was unopposed, as most of the presidents' bling reform measures

turned out to be. With almost 300 college chiefs present and most either delegates carrying instructions from their president on how to vote, the entire package of cutback reforms sailed through the four-day meeting and no doubt set the tone for next year's convention.

"In these past four days, the presidents have reassessed their appropriate authority over the direction of intercollegiate athletics," David L. Warren, president of Ohio Wesleyan, said. "Our next test will be around the academic issues."

NCAA executive director Dick Schultz had warned before the convention that failure to pass the reform measures would incur Congressional intervention into athletics.

"Now we're telling them that we're taking control," Sweet said. "A very positive message has been delivered by the membership."

With the far-reaching reform measures of the Presidents Commission out of the way, delegates hurriedly completed work on the rest of their agenda. Thursday, giving top football schools the autonomy they've sought for more than 20 years and approving what could be two fateful resolutions.

One resolution instructs the NCAA staff to begin preparing research and legislation for the 1992 convention concerning academic eligibility - which could even fuel a drive toward revoking freshman eligibility. The second will bring legislation to the

1992 convention making it possible for athletes to be drafted by professional leagues and not lose their eligibility if they decide to remain in school.

The Division I-A autonomy issue - one of the most sensitive for decades - finally carried on the second ballot.

As a result, the 105-Division I-A schools will now be able to vote strictly among themselves concerning financial aid for their athletes.

Smaller Division I schools had opposed the move for more than two decades out of fear the majors would vote greater aid for athletes, including basketball players, and become dominant in basketball as well as in football.

Sutton's odd shot leads to tie at Tucson

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—Hal Sutton saw the ball disappear into the hole at Tucson National and figured he had an eagle and the first-round lead in the Tucson Open.

But he didn't get all of the ball all the way into the hole and, in a situation that may be unique, had to settle for a close birdie and a share of the top spot with Bob Tway.

"It's history-book stuff," Sutton said Thursday after he sweated out a 40-50 minute delay and eventually signed for an 8-under-par 64.

"I've been out here (on the PGA Tour) for 25 years and I've never seen anything like it," said Tway. "Cagle, the Tour's Tournament Supervisor.

"I was nervous starting out and had to make a 15-footer for bogey on the first hole, but then I made three birdies in a row and I settled down.

"It was just a lot of fun after that," said Mickelson, a left-hander who last year won the U.S. Amateur title and his second NCAA championship.

"Gary Hallberg, Nolan Henke and Jim Hallet had 66's. Hallberg and Henke played at Starnap, the site of the last two rounds, and Hallet was at Tucson National.

Robert Gamez, who won this event last year in his first start as a touring pro, could do no better than a 70 at Tucson National.

Sutton, a former PGA champion but a non-winner since 1986, started from the 10th tee and played that side in 33.

Turning to the front, he receded off three consecutive birdies beginning at the second hole. He two-putted for birdie-4 on the eighth and closed it out with the controversial birdie on the ninth.

Miami wants ball control against Bills

MIAMI (AP)—In a season when improved rushing attack defense has propelled the Miami Dolphins to the playoffs, it's easy to forget that they have the NFL's highest-scoring passing combination ever.

In fact, until last week few people knew that Dan Marino and Mark Clayton had combined for more touchdowns — 65 — than any other duo. When the record was unearthed, it was news to just about everyone, including the quarterback and receiver.

"I don't like to know, but this ain't no big thrill," Clayton said. "I don't have anything to me; I don't have a championship ring. I'll take that over all the records."

Pursuit of the ring will continue Saturday when Miami visits Buffalo in a second-round AFC playoff game. While the Dolphins want to control the ball with their rejuvenated ground-attack, the game-breaking potential of their passing game always looms.

"I think if they would lose Dan Marino, they'd be about 50 percent off offense," Bills defensive end Bruce Smith said. "He's the one person that makes that offense click."

"I know they have a lot of other

talent on the offensive side of the ball, but Dan Marino is Dan Marino. He's amazing to watch on film. For every defensive player, he's their worst nightmare."

For Miami defenders, nightmares for this week have taken the form of Buffalo's "back" Thurman Thomas, who carried a career-high 30 times for 154 yards in a 24-14 victory over the Dolphins three weeks ago. The win clinched Buffalo's third consecutive AFC East title.

"The last time we played, the Dolphins did a lot of talking about how they were going to stop our running game," Thomas said. "You didn't hear that this time. We can run and when they know it."

While Marino may be 75 percent of the Dolphins' offense, Thomas means just as much to the Bills. He rushed for 1,297 yards and caught passes for 532 more to lead the NFL in total yardage from scrimmage the second time in as many seasons.

"Thurman is an instinctive player," said Billings Pitts, who coaches Buffalo's running backs. "I'd like to take credit for it, but just happens to have a little ability, doesn't he?"

Like the Dolphins with Marino to Clayton, the Bills' with Thomas can

reach the end zone quickly. He had runs of 80, 60 and 43 yards — longer than Marino's best — and receptions of 63 and 48 yards.

"There's no question Thurman is a game-day player," Pitts said. "He's a real self-motivated individual who is ready for all the games. In the big ones, though, he tends to do even better."

Marino and Clayton also have a history of rising to the occasion — and with a trip to the Super Bowl Saturday game as big.

"I look at it as an opportunity you've got to try to take advantage of," Marino said. "When we were younger — Clayton, myself, Mark Duper and some of the other guys that were here — we went to the playoffs the first year (1983). Super Bowl the second year, AFC championship the third year. It was like, 'This is going to happen all the time.'"

"And then you realize that the opportunity is not always there. So you have to take advantage when you get the opportunity."

In the Dolphins' first playoff season since 1985, they have become more reliant on defense and running back Sammie Smith. Marino is

throwing less, and Clayton — who missed six games with injuries — has just four touchdown catches.

But as this season's games have become more important, Marino and Clayton have assumed a more prominent role.

Clayton had season-high totals of seven catches for 89 yards in the loss at Buffalo three weeks ago; Marino threw two fourth-quarter touchdown passes as Miami failed to beat Kansas City 17-16 last Saturday.

The winning score against the Chiefs came on a 12-yard pass from Marino to Clayton with 3:28 left.

"We do have a special kind of connection as far as throwing the football," Marino said. "I know where he's going to be, he can make big plays and he catches the ball in crucial situations."

Postseason games don't count in career statistics, so Marino and Clayton will go into next season still at 65 touchdowns.

John Elway and Raymond Berry are second with 63. Joe Montana and Jerry Rice are third with 55 and counting.

"It's kind of neat," Marino said. "There have been a lot of great passing combinations over the years."

Montana promises to deliver aerial attack

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Quarterback Joe Montana is used to pressure, and that's good, because he'll certainly receive a healthy share of it in the playoffs.

If you believe San Francisco offensive coordinator Mike Holmgren, it appears the 49ers will all but abandon the running game and heap their hopes for a third consecutive Super Bowl on the arm of Montana and the passing game Saturday when they host the Washington Redskins at Candlestick Park. And that's just fine with the NFL's player of the year.

"In fact, he thinks the 49ers should have gone this route some time ago."

"I think we got away from some of the things that got us to where we were," Montana said. "And that's throwing the ball all the time. Not every play, but we've been a passing-type team to set up the run, not so much a running team that sets up the pass. We've got going to be the ball into the ground. Our passing game's part of our running game — that's what makes us successful."

San Francisco spent much of the season trying to prove to other teams — as well as critics — that yes, it can run the ball. So the 49ers ran, and ran, and ran some more, but the only thing that happened was their

offense suffered, as it averaged nine yards and 50 yards fewer in the last five games.

Holmgren said the 49ers have some tough decisions to make. He told the San Francisco Chronicle that the team has to "evaluate what we've done and make some hard decisions on how we approach the next few games."

"You know what?" he told the newspaper. "We have to do what we do better. You get to outguessing yourself or thinking too much. They think we're going to pass, so they're going to dare us to run, so we're going to run. You get into all that stuff."

"We're coaching like crazy. The players are trying hard. You can't put a square peg in a round hole. You reach a point where you say, 'Hey, okay, we tried, everybody's excited on how we're approaching the way we would like it to happen, so let's — do what we think we do best.'"

Which is rely on Montana and Rice, the latter becoming only the third player in history to catch at least 100 passes in a season. Holmgren had a career-high 13 touchdowns.

To say Montana had another great season is like saying an election campaign is going to become dirty. It's expected. Montana completed 61.7 percent of his passes, threw for 3,949 yards and 25 touchdowns, did a few Pepsi commercials with singer

Ray Charles, and was voted the league's MVP by the Associated Press.

He managed to be damaging to other teams even while they tried every form of Montana damage control possible. Really, only the Los Angeles Rams on Nov. 25, using their present defense for most of the game, severely hurt Montana, intercepting him three times. Yet he still was 22 of 37 for 235 yards and two touchdowns.

"Montana also believes that maybe the 49ers were trying to be something they weren't this year by running the ball more than usual."

"For a while there," he said, "we were being manipulated into trying to have to run the ball, or thinking we had to run."

It's never been a major part of our offense. It has always been a big part — because you need a running game. But we're not New York or Washington. We'll run four or five (running) plays all day long."

"I think if we pass the ball down the field, make big catches, then that would be our running game."

Rice said. "If you make them respect you deep, well, they can't cover everything at once. And the pass has always been our best play."

What makes Montana special is that he has great skill in the types of situations. When San Francisco won the Super Bowl in 1981, it didn't

finish among the top 10 rushing teams in the NFL. No team since then has been able to win the Super Bowl without ranking among the top 10 rushers in the league.

The fact San Francisco is 14-2 despite some of its problems on offense is tribute to both Montana's skill and the team's ability to overcome the problems other teams present.

And Montana has played only sparingly in the last three games after getting a helmet to the groin on Dec. 9 against Cincinnati.

"I had a good year until the last four games or so, and teams started playing us differently," Montana said, "and we started doing some things differently. And I think from that point on it reflects more upon the team. So it says a lot for this whole team."

"I think up to a point I've had a good year (as last year). And then we're hit a kind of lull where we're really trying to get our running game going and when we didn't, we were in some tough situations throwing the ball."

"So there was a lot more pressure already added to the pressure of our passing game anyway. I think we had a pretty good year all around."

Said 49ers safety Ronnie Lott: "Joe's as great as he is, he doesn't go up and down. He remains at that high level."

BSU's Hall in line for 13.9% salary increase

BOISE (AP) — A proposed new three-year contract for Boise State University football coach Skip Hall will be on the agenda when the Idaho Board of Education meets Jan. 22-23 in Boise.

Under the contract, which Boise State is proposing and must be ratified by the board, Hall would receive a 13.9 percent raise for the 1991 season — from \$21,260 to \$24,140.

"We felt Skip and his staff have earned that," Boise State athletic director Gene Blyemeyer said Wednesday.

Hall, 46, completed his fourth year as Boise State's head football coach last fall. The Broncos went 8-3 during the regular season and qualified for the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs

for the second time in three years.

Boise State tied with Idaho for second in the Big Sky Conference at 6-2 before defeating Northern Iowa and Middle Tennessee State at home in the playoffs.

The Broncos' season ended at 10-4 in Reno with a 59-52 triple-overtime loss to Nevada in the semifinals.

Hall's four-year record is 30-18. He came to Boise State after 18 years as a collegiate assistant coach, including 12 years at the University of Washington under head coach Don James.

"When we hired him, we had talked about the fact that we'd look at basically a four-year commitment; that's pretty standard," Blyemeyer said.

"After that four-year period, we review the situation. We've reviewed it every year, but we were at the point where we felt like we needed to review it and make another multi-year commitment."

Boise State also is proposing raises and new one-year contracts for six assistant coaches.

Head coach Skip Hall's raise is \$3,600, to \$43,618 — for John Gough — a \$2,700 raise to \$22,719; for both defensive coordinator Jim Fleming and linebacker coach Scott Pelluer, a \$2,300 raise to \$28,355; to running back coach Jay Mills, and \$1,800 raises to \$19,512 each for three-quarter-time quarterback coach Jim Zorn and three-quarter-time defensive line coach Steve Buratto.

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Ex-Lion Rogers wants 2nd shot after prison time

SEATTLE (AP) — After spending a year in Michigan prisons, Reggie Rogers says he hopes the Seattle Seahawks will give him another chance to play professional football.

Rogers, 26, a star defensive end at the University of Washington and first-round draft choice of the Detroit Lions in 1987, was convicted of negligent homicide following a traffic accident in which three people died on Oct. 20, 1988.

After a 15-month prison sentence, he had been drinking heavily before the accident. He was sentenced to 16-24 months in prison. Rogers has served 18 days

at the Michigan state prison in Jackson and 11 months at Camp Brighton, a minimum-security institution in Pinckney.

Eligible for parole next month, Rogers said Tuesday he planned to move to Seattle and wants to play for the Seahawks.

"I'd like to play for them," he told The Seattle Times. "They took a chance with Derrick Fennner. I hope they have the same compassion with me."

Fennner, a running back, gained 859 yards and scored 14 touchdowns, to tie a club scoring record this season, his second with the Seahawks after a troubled college career.

Fennner spent 44 days in a Maryland jail in 1987 on a murder charge that was later dropped, pleaded guilty in 1988 to cocaine possession and later was shot and slightly wounded outside a Washington nightclub.

The Seahawks called Rogers for a physical exam after the Lions released him in 1989.

"I recall that it wasn't very favorable," Seahawks president Tom Flores said. "Whether that has changed, I don't know."

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Hall-of-Famer Palmer attempts pitching comeback

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — Hall-of-Fame pitcher Jim Palmer, throwing a comeback at age 45, musing to "hitters" Thursday for the first time since he retired in 1984.

Palmer, who hopes to get a tryout with a major league team, pitched batting practice for the Miami Marlins and was pleased with the results.

"I've worked out every day since the 16th of December, and every time I throw it gets better," he said.

Palmer, who spent his entire career with the Baltimore Orioles, won 268 games, captured an ERA* of 2.68 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame last year.

"I've had a lot of people hitting at home; I'll say there's no way in the world somebody 45 could take six

of seven years off and come back and pitch."

"Time will tell. Maybe I'll get an opportunity and maybe I won't. Either way, I'll walk away from this knowing myself better and have a better understanding of the young kids."

Palmer, a broadcaster for Orioles, said the daily workouts have reminded him what it's like to be a pitcher.

"This is rewarding from a personal standpoint, and educational and insightful from a broadcasting standpoint," he said. "It's nice to get in touch with what it's like to be a pitcher again, and that happens every time I get out of bed."

Miami coach Ron Fraser said of Palmer: "With that Hall of Fame pride, he pumped up a little bit, and he was throwing pretty good."

Palmer, who said he is in "major shape," is waiting for a March league team to contact him.

"I think I'm the most interested in him because I think he can help them," Fraser said. "In the major leagues today they can't get enough pitchers. They're paying millions for guys that are 8-14. This guy is a winner, he knows how to win."

The "oldest player" in the major leagues has had a thriving Texas Rangers pitcher Nolan Ryan, who earned his 300th victory last season at age 43.

"I certainly don't think I can be a Nolan Ryan," said Palmer, whose fastball has reached more than 85 mph in workouts.

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15 finalists on the list for NFL Hall of Fame

CANTON, Ohio (AP) — L.C. Greenwood and Lynn Swann, two more members of the Pittsburgh Steelers' Super Bowl teams of the '70s, head the list of 15 finalists for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame Jan. 26.

Joining Greenwood, a defensive end, and Swann, a wide receiver, on the list are four players eligible for the first time: running backs Earl Campbell of the Houston Oilers and John Riggins of the New York Jets and Washington Redskins; New England Patriots offensive lineman John Hannah; and placekicker Jan Stenerud, who spent 12 of his 19 NFL seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs. Greenwood and Swann both spent their entire pro careers with the Steelers.

Six other modern-era players among the finalists are Detroit Lions cornerback Lem Barney; offensive tackle Bob Brown, who played for the Philadelphia Eagles; Los Angeles Rams and Raiders defensive ends Carter Eller of the Minnesota Vikings and the Rams' Jack Youngblood; Baltimore Colts tight end John Mackey; and Ken Stabler, who "quarterbacked" the Oakland Raiders, Houston Oilers and New Orleans Saints.

Also being considered are current Los Angeles Raiders managing general partner Al Davis, former Dallas Cowboys executive Tex Schramm and seniors committee candidate Stan Jones, who played offensive guard and defensive tackle for the Chicago Bears.

During presentation remarks for wide receiver Eric Blumkinoff, who was inducted as the Raiders' Davis was booed by a decidedly pro-Pittsburgh crowd at the inductions in Canton.

Later, Davis quipped that the Hall of Fame had apparently been moved to Pittsburgh's Three Rivers Stadium.

If Greenwood and Swann are inducted, the Hall of Fame would almost take on a black-and-gold hue.

Members of the Steelers' four Super Bowl championship teams have been inducted each of the last four years. They include defensive lineman Mean Joe Greene in 1987, linebacker Hank Williams in 1988, quarterback Terry Bradshaw and linebacker Mel Blount in 1989, and linebacker

Jack Lambert and running back Franco Harris last year.

All played exclusively with the Steelers except for Harris, who closed out his career with one season in Seattle.

The Green Bay Packers have placed 11 players from their 1961 roster in the Hall of Fame — the most from any one team. The 1960 and '62 Packer teams have 10 apiece, and three teams — the 1965 and '66 Packers and 1953 Cleveland Browns — have nine each in Canton.

All together, 12 players who spent most of their careers with the Steelers are in the Hall of Fame. Six from the Super Bowl-winning seasons of 1974, '75, '78 and '79. Former Steelers Donnie Shell, John Stallworth and Mike Webster, who is now playing with Kansas City, all could make the Hall of Fame when they become eligible.

That trio was also part of the Pittsburgh juggernaut of the '70s.

Barney, Greenwood, Jones and Schramm are finalists for the first time, although they have been eligible in previous years.

If he is elected, Stenerud would be the first player inducted who was strictly a kicker. George Blanda and Lou Groza both were outstanding kickers, but Blanda also starred as a quarterback and Groza was an all-league tackle.

Similarly, Hannah could become the first Hall of Famer who wore a Patriots uniform.

Seven long-time Raiders are currently in the Hall and Davis has made the presentation speech for each of them, a record for appearances as a presenter.

The finalists were picked in a mail vote of the Hall of Fame's selection committee from a preliminary group of 64 players, coaches and contributors.

Jones was the recommended nominee of the seniors committee.

The inductees, as voted by the board of selectors, will be announced Jan. 26 in Tampa, site of the Super Bowl. At least four of the 15 candidates will be elected and as many as seven.

Each year, Davis will take place on the front steps of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton on July 27.

Infielder Backman signs \$1.3 million contract

NEW YORK (AP) — Free agent infielder Wally Backman agreed to a two-year, \$1.3 million contract with the Philadelphia Phillies on Thursday while Glenn Braggs, home runs and 28 RBIs in 104 games with and Pat Borders avoided salary arbitration by reaching agreement on one-year deals.

Backman, 31, will make \$650,000 in each of the next two seasons and could double his salary with performance bonus.

Phillies general manager Lee Thomas said: "We're still going with Mickey Morandini at second base, but Backman can give Mickey a break five times to time out also fill-in at third base." Braggs and the Cincinnati Reds agreed to a deal for 1991 worth \$825,000.

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Astros trade slugger Davis

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Astros continued to rebuild themselves by trading slugger Glenn Davis to Baltimore for pitcher Steve Lirio and outfielder Steve Finley.

The trade saved Astros owner John Mullen \$1.63 million in salaries but cost the team its only power hitter, earned \$1.1 million last season and the three new Astros earned a combined \$348,000.

The 29-year-old Davis hit .251 last season with 22 homers and 64 RBIs but was on the disabled list from June 25-Aug. 29 with a strained rib-cage muscle.

He has hit 30 or more homers three times in the last five years.

The Astros acknowledged they could not meet Davis' salary demands, believed to be a five-year deal worth \$25 million.

"We made every effort to sign him right up until recently but it became obvious that we would not have the dollars to keep him," Astros general manager Billy Winters said. "We're talking about a player in Davis who was going to take megabucks to keep."

"By getting these three players we were able to make-up some of this rebuilding ground in rapid fashion."

Davis would become a free agent in the Orioles deal, sign him before the end of the 1991 season.

"We are going to start immediately negotiating with Davis and his agents. Right now, we want to celebrate the moment," Larry Lawrence, Orioles president, said.

Baltimore manager Frank Robinson said Davis would be batting cleanup and that the acquisition of Davis complemented the signing of free agent outfielder Dwight Evans, formerly of Boston.

"I felt we had to add two quality offensive players to our club," Robinson said. "I feel we've done that."

The trade is an extension of the Orioles rebuilding program, general manager Roland Hemond said.

"We knew we'd have to add quality hitters throughout the lineup to enable Frank to have a more consistent first six," Hemond said.

McMullen is attempting to sell the Astros and wants to make the 1991 payroll attractive to prospective buyers.

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Bengals know Bo: They must contain him or pay the price

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. (AP) — There's one way the Cincinnati Bengals can keep Bo Jackson from running the length of the field: give the Raiders decent field position all day.

Jackson burned the Bengals with a 92-yard touchdown run during a 28-7 Raider victory last season and an 88-yarder to the 1 in a 24-7 win last month.

In the two games, Jackson gained 276 yards on 21 carries. The underdog Bengals know they've got to contain him or their chances in Sunday's second-round playoff game at the Los Angeles Coliseum are shaky.

"If we play well for 30 plays against him, we have to make sure we play just as well on the 31st play," Bengals linebacker Carl Zan-der said. "One big mistake and you're done."

Meanwhile, the Raiders coach Art Shell issued a warning of sorts to Zander and the rest of the Bengals this week, saying he believes Jackson is due for another big game.

But that doesn't mean much because Shell also said, "In my mind, Bo's due every game."

Jackson's 88-yarder was a beauty. With the Raiders at their 11 in the third quarter, Jackson started a sweep of left end but found no room to run. He reversed his field, hurdled Jay Schroeder, who was trying to throw a block, and raced down the right sideline.

It appeared Jackson was going to score, but Bengals cornerback Rod Jones made the shocking stop at the 1. It only delayed the inevitable since the Raiders scored two plays later, making it 24-7, but just the thought of Jackson's being caught was news.

It was the most notable moment of the year for Jones, traded to the Bengals by Tampa Bay right before the season began.

"Hopefully it won't happen again because if you have to run Bo down, it means he's been on a long run," Jones said.

"When asked how he'd attempt to stop Jack-

son, Raiders defensive tackle Bob Golic smiled and said, "Bring friends, don't try and do it by yourself."

"I'm glad I don't have to do it," Golic said. "He's such a threat, he's got the speed to run the perimeter and the power to run inside."

One of the main duties of Bengals safety David Fulcher, a 240-pounder, is to contain the run. Fulcher said Jackson, who he called a good friend, is "pound-for-pound probably the best athlete around."

"What is there to talk about," Fulcher said. "We're just going to have to stop him. With the kind of guy Bo Jackson is, a lot of his cuts come after the line of scrimmage. We've got to keep him inside the line of scrimmage."

Actually, Jackson might be due for a good game, as Shell said. After surpassing the 100-yard mark in three straight games — against Denver, Detroit and Cincinnati — he was held to 65 yards on 17 carries by Minnesota and 28 yards on 11 carries by San Diego. He didn't score a touchdown in either game.

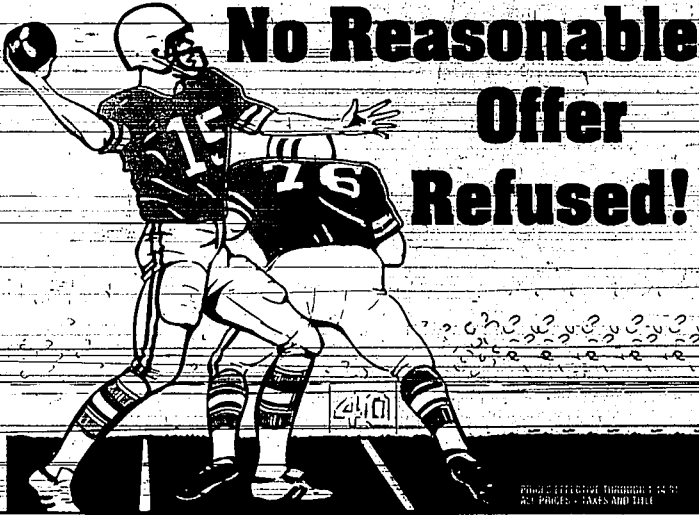
Davis missed the first six games of the season because of baseball, Jackson was voted to the Pro Bowl. He gained 698 yards on 125 carries, caught six passes for 68 yards and had five touchdowns.

"I just wish I had a formula for that (stopping Jackson)," Bengals coach Sam Wyche said. "The runs he's had against us have generally been an individual thing. We stopped him on the play and he reversed his field."

"All we can do is keep playing hard, trying to contain him. You've got to outnumber him. One on one, he's going to beat you."

Schroeder, again, the Bengals will concentrate on keeping Jackson from busting a big play, but he said that doesn't mean the Raiders will alter their plans.

"We find that a lot of teams are going to try and stop Bo, stop the run," Schroeder said.

Bush using wrong approach: Experts

WASHINGTON — Saddam Hussein fully understands what's at stake as the showdown looms in the Persian Gulf, say Iraqis and Americans who know him.

It's President Bush, they say, who doesn't understand Saddam Hussein, a proud man who ruthlessly-eliminated rivals in his quest for the presidency, would rather suffer war than be seen as caving in to an administration he feels has done its best to humiliate him, these experts say.

"We're going to kick his ass" approach is counterproductive, said Marshall Wiley, a former U.S. envoy to Baghdad and one of the few Americans who have met Saddam.

And Clovis Maksoud, the long-time ambassador to the Arab League to Washington, said Saddam "seeks respect and recognition more than approval or acceptance. It's ingrained in the Arab psyche."

"Any language (Bush) suggests that implies humiliation for President Saddam Hussein is a prescription for intransigence," said Maksoud, who resigned to protest his organization's handling of the Persian Gulf crisis.

Saddam, Arab experts say, would be much more likely to accept peace proposals from a country such as Algeria than from the United States or its Western allies.

The West, they say, represents the wealth and power resented by Third World leaders still smarting from decades of colonial rule.

U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar, who was to go to Baghdad in a desperate bid to head off war, is viewed by Iraq as a messenger rather than a negotiator, said one Iraqi-born American.

Perez de Cuellar represents the U.S.-led coalition demanding Iraq's ouster from Kuwait, but he also leads a world body of which Iraq is a member of equal standing with the United States, according to the Iraqi-born American.

The man spoke on condition of anonymity so relatives still in Iraq would not be endangered. Saddam has shown himself capable of being flexible.

Iraq says Pentagon misleads Bush on war in gulf

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The Iraqi leadership said Thursday that President Bush had been misled by the Pentagon into thinking the U.S.-led force could win a war, and it said any conflict would spill "rivers of American blood."

British diplomats evacuated their embassy, meanwhile, and the U.S., Dutch and Australian governments "prepared to withdraw their own diplomats."

The Iraqi Defense Ministry newspaper al-Qadisiyah said U.S. fears of "Iraq's emergence as a powerful force in the 'Arab homeland'" had brought about the current confrontation in the Persian Gulf, according to the official Iraqi News Agency.

The Iraqi army is eager to fight and "has finalized all military preparations for the great battle," the newspaper said.

The price which Bush will pay is not only the U.S. defeat and the loss of U.S. strategic interests, but rivers of Americans' blood," said the newspaper of Iraq's ruling Arab Baath Socialist Party, Al-Thawra.

"The American president is still deluded by the paper calculations drawn by the Pentagon that he can control the theater of operations," the paper said in a front-page editorial, according to INA. The Baath newspaper also said Iraq has prepared itself for a long war with the United States and warned that Americans will suffer a humiliating defeat.

"Iraq has been fully prepared to make the conflict a comprehensive and final battle between the group of the faithful spearheaded by Iraq and the group of the infidels led by the U.S.," it said.

Baghdad also indicated once again that Israel would become embroiled if war erupted.

Al-Thawra said that the "overall and decisive victory would be the share of the gatherers of believers, led by Iraq, who would liberate Palestine and all Arab and Moslem sanctities," according to INA.

The Iraqi media attack on Bush came one day after Iraqi Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz and Secretary of State James A. Baker III failed to make any progress on the crisis during talks in Geneva. After the meeting, Aziz told reporters that Iraq would "absolutely" attack Israel if it were attacked by the U.S.-led multinational force.

Aziz returned home to Baghdad on Thursday, but made no comment, INA reported. President Saddam Hussein then summoned his Baath Party leadership to a meeting, the news agency said without providing details.

based on speculation. A rare glimpse of the Iraqi leader's sensitivities was offered Wednesday by Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz, who told reporters in Geneva why he refused to accept a letter from Bush to Saddam.

"The language of that letter was contrary to the traditions of correspondence between heads of state," Aziz said, "if he really intends to make peace ... he should use polite language."

Bush denied the letter was rude, describing it as a "direct" effort to make certain Saddam understood the stakes and the U.S. resolve to use force to oust him from Kuwait.

Former ambassador Wiley, who after government service headed a business group with ties to Iraq, said that by personalizing the dispute with Iraq — comparing Saddam to Adolf Hitler — there was something in him with war crimes trial, implying he is a liar — Bush hardened Saddam's resolve to remain in Kuwait.

Wiley said neither he nor fellow diplomats were consulted by the administration since the crisis began.

Others familiar with the Arab world note that the manner and tone in which people address each other is just as important, if not more so, as what they say. The Arab language is full of hyperbole and flowery idioms that reflect those norms.

Addressing the Iraqi leader as "Saddam" rather than "President Saddam" or "President Hussein," for example, is viewed as an insult, said some Arab-born Americans.

"For Bush to put down an Arab leader in front of his people is a cardinal sin. It stabs our national ego," said Fouad Taima, an Iraqi-born businessman who talked with Saddam last year in Baghdad.

Bush, Taima said, treats Saddam and the Iraqis as equals, and the Iraqi leader would "rather die than accept such indignity."

That, Wiley said, is something Bush should be able to understand.

"After all, death before dishonor is a well-known concept to Americans, too."

Remaining bids for peace hinge on Mideast talks

PARIS — French and Arab diplomats on Thursday groped for ways to avert a seemingly inevitable war in the Persian Gulf, but neither their private talks nor a planned U.N. mission to Iraq roused more than faint hopes for peace.

"Secret diplomacy is in a state of extreme difficulty," said Pierre de Boismaison, French ambassador to Washington, after the failure of Wednesday's U.S.-Iraq talks in Geneva.

The remaining peace initiatives center on the vital issue of an international conference to resolve the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Many nations, ranging from France to the United States, oppose it as tantamount to rewarding Saddam Hussein.

French and Algerian diplomats in the Middle East said Thursday they are persisting in their pursuit of peace efforts beyond Tuesday's U.N. deadline for Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait or risk war.

They outlined a tentative peace plan calling for Iraq to announce prior to the deadline its intention to withdraw, provided that the United States agrees to implementation of U.N. resolutions on other Mideast problems, including the Palestinian question.

The diplomats said the United States might then accept the convening of an international conference that would discuss the implementation of the Palestinian issue, but broader security matters such as elimination of chemical and nuclear weapons from the region.

Defense Minister Jean-Pierre Chevènement suggested that the United States could bring about Iraqi withdrawal from Kuwait through the "very small gesture" of endorsing an international conference.

For officials in many countries, the trip to Baghdad on Saturday by U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar represented a final, long-shot chance for a breakthrough.

At the United Nations Thursday, diplomats and U.N. officials said Perez de Cuellar is expected to propose an Iraqi withdrawal from Kuwait under the supervision of

U.N. peacekeepers. They said the United Nations has almost worked out contingency plans for peacekeepers to monitor the withdrawal of Iraqi troops from Kuwait and of the U.S.-led forces from Saudi Arabia.

"The chances for peace are very difficult to say," Perez de Cuellar said Thursday. He expressed support for the concept of a broad Middle East peace conference, but did not link it to the current crisis.

"At some time, this conference has to take place. When that is for the (Security) Council to decide," he said.

France, while reaffirming its solidarity with U.S.-led alliance against Iraq, pressed ahead with efforts to engineer some sort of Franco-Arab proposal that might induce concessions from Saddam.

Foreign Minister Roland Dumas conferred over lunch Thursday with 20 Paris-based Arab ambassadors, and later met with the foreign ministers of Algeria and Morocco.

The Algerian, Sid Ahmed Ghozali, told reporters there was no specific Franco-Algerian initiative, but said he held out hopes for a settlement.

On Friday, Dumas was to meet with the political chief of the Palestine Liberation Organization, Fawzi Kaddoumi.

Kaddoumi said France, as a permanent member of the U.N. Security Council, had the leverage to force concessions from Washington that could help avoid war. He was expected to ask France to intensify its advocacy of an international conference.

Mitterrand, at a news conference Wednesday, said France was engaged in a multi-pronged quest for peace. He mentioned contacts with Algeria, Morocco, the Soviet Union and the United Nations.

Americans advised to get out

WASHINGTON — The State Department Thursday ordered further reductions in its diplomatic missions in Yemen and advised Americans to leave there and three other North African countries as the Jan. 15 deadline for Iraq's withdrawal from Kuwait approaches.

A separate warning was issued for Algeria, Tunisia and Morocco, advising Americans to "defer non-essential travel" to those countries and suggesting that those already there consider leaving "until the Gulf crisis abates."

The warnings are the latest in a series the U.S. government has issued in recent days as it prepares its own plans for Iraq's withdrawal from Kuwait approaches.

Israelis admit they can't stop Iraqi missiles

TEL AVIV, Israel — Israel stands virtually defenseless; Israeli officials acknowledged this week, if Iraq attacks the country and its major population centers here with long-range missiles.

Despite defense spending in the billions and highly regarded armed forces, Israel's sole defense against a chemical weapons attack by long-range missiles consists of the estimated 4 million gas masks the government has handed out, officials said.

What's more, the failure last month of U.S. intelligence to detect Iraq preparation for a test missile launch has led some Israeli analysts to conclude that Iraq might get only five to seven minutes' warning of an Iraqi missile attack, too little time to warn the population and minimize casualties.

Prospects for attacks increased Wednesday when Iraqi Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz vowed after his unsuccessful talks with U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III that Iraq would attack Israel if war broke out.

Even so, most independent Israeli analysts support the government's contention that a missile attack would cause minimal damage.

Chemical specialists, however, said a surprise chemical weapons attack might exact a frightful toll if a large volley of missiles landed with little warning in a heavily populated area.

"If Iraq fires 30 missiles with chemical warheads in one salvo and they hit in a relatively small area, the results will be absolutely terrible," Avner Yaniv, a security specialist at the University of Haifa, said Wednesday. "There could be extensive casualties on a scale we have never experienced in the past."

Like others, Yaniv emphasized that such an outcome represents a worst-case scenario. But he said government predictions that casualties would be

minimal depend on "an element of luck."

Israeli leaders indicated Wednesday that were pleased that the United States had not wavered from demanding that Iraq get out of Kuwait and refusing to link a pullout to settling the Palestinian question.

Foreign Minister David Levy told Israel Television, "I am very happy that the secretary of state repeated the very principles he wrote to us and was faithful to them."

It is speculated that Israel, if attacked, would respond with a massive strike, using its air force and its own surface-to-surface missile, the Jericho-1. Iraq might estimate striking back with nuclear weapons. By most estimates, an Iraqi air attack would be disastrous for the attackers. Few planes would be likely to get through Israel's sophisticated air defense screen or past its highly trained fighter pilots.

But Israeli military analysts said Wednesday that enemy aircraft that eluded Israel's defenses could inflict substantial casualties and damage if they use highly destructive fuel-air explosive bombs in their inventory.

The bombs, which Israel and the United States possess, have an destructive power 10 to 100 times that of conventional bombs, said Daniel Leshem, a defense analyst at the Jaffee Center for Strategic Studies at Tel Aviv University.

Yaniv and an Israeli military officer, however, said they believe that Israel's air defenses are so superior that it is possible that not a single Iraqi plane would survive an attack.

The missile threat has been on Israel's mind even before the gulf crisis erupted. Almost a year ago, Iraqi President Saddam Hussein threatened to attack Israel with chemical weapons if it attacked Iraq.

Saddam said Tel Aviv would "receive the first blow" in a war.

At first, Israel's government and media described Iraq's chemical missiles as terribly inaccurate, with some accounts suggesting that missiles aimed at Tel Aviv might land in Syria. Reports said few missiles would survive Israeli air defenses.

In the past week, however, it has become increasingly apparent that such reports were overstated.

"Unfortunately, we have no serious capability of knocking down incoming missiles," retired Maj. Gen. Aaron Aziz told reporters of the Jaffee Center said at a news conference this week.

Leshem, the Jaffee Center missile specialist, said Iraq has about 80 missile launchers, an estimated 30 of them deployed in western Iraq and aimed at Israel. The missiles, named the Hussein and Al-Aziz, are modified, long-range versions of the Soviet Scud missile, can be fired 390 to 550 miles, well within range of Tel Aviv. The missiles do not have pinpoint accuracy of some of those in the U.S. arsenal. But they are not as wildly inaccurate as they have been portrayed, Leshem and Yaniv said. The missiles are accurate to within about 2 miles, enough to kill people in a densely populated urban area.

The Tel Aviv metropolitan area is Israel's most heavily populated region, with more than 15,000 residents per square mile.

All along, Israel's best hope against a missile attack has been early detection of Iraq's preparation of the missiles, steps that can be observed by satellite in the 60 to 90 minutes it takes to fuel and aim the missiles. Such early warning could allow either U.S. or Israeli airplanes to destroy the launchers before the missiles could be fired.

But those expectations were shaken when U.S. intelligence filtered last month, failing to detect the test firing until after the launch.

Chemical warfare work non-stop

DUGWAY, PROVING GROUND, Utah — Since Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, the Army has been working around the clock on ways to protect soldiers from biological and chemical toxins, Dugway Proving Ground officials said.

Even with the best available technology, if fighting breaks out and Saddam Hussein orders the use of toxins, U.S. troops could suffer 10 percent to 20 percent casualties, said Gary Resnick, chief of Dugway's Life Sciences Division.

"The problem is we don't have any real-time detection equipment where there's a chemical agent that goes off when the agent is present," Resnick said. "It's a severe deficiency."

The only real-time detectors would be those soldiers who would be the first casualties of such weapons, before other troops could don cumbersome protective clothing, Resnick said.

The best defense available now to Operation Desert Shield troops probably is the German-built NBC (nuclear, biological and chemical) vehicle, said Lt. Col. Dean Ertwine, director of material testing

at Dugway.

A number of the vehicles have been deployed along the Kuwait-Saudi border, Ertwine said. The crew is completely encapsulated in the NBC, similar to an armored personnel carrier, protected by shielding and air-filtration systems.

"They can basically tour the battlefield and take samples and analyze the samples, and define the type and extent of the contamination," Ertwine said.

Resnick said Dugway is working with simplified chemical detection kits that are hoped to be deployed within a few weeks.

Dugway has been involved in accelerated testing of things that were already planned, primarily chemical protection for soldiers and in chemical detection, Ertwine said.

"Most of the chemical tests ... had already been scheduled," said Ertwine. "But with the events in Saudi Arabia, a lot of the test schedules have been accelerated."

We also have done a lot of testing with smoke and illumination rounds." Smoke shells help hide troops and equipment from detection, while illumination rounds help locate enemy formations at night.

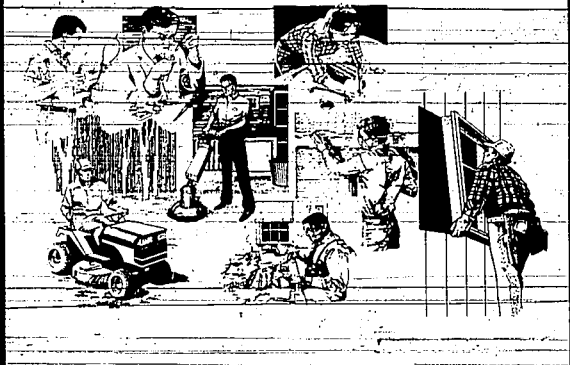

Twin Falls man blows away competition

\$23,000 auto sound system places 3rd in world championship

TWIN FALLS — At first glance, the 1987 Buick Grand National looks like a typical gas-guzzling luxury sedan.

But with a license plate that reads "TOYSRUS," it's clear this car's owner isn't a little old lady who merely takes it out for a Sunday spin now and then.

Hidden in the gleaming white car is a stereo system that ranks with the world's best. Joe Sorenson and a team from his business, Audio One, won best of show in a half-dozen International Automobile Sound Competition Association events around the West last year.

He was undefeated entering the world championships, held in November in Arizona, an event that attracted participants from as far away as Thailand and Indonesia.

And there, in his first year of competition, Sorenson took third place, taking home a trophy and \$1,000. But Sorenson is not content to have a car with one of the world's top-ranked stereo systems. He and his dad — also named Joe Sorenson — drag race it, too.

Sorenson's car is a marvel of engineering, with sound quality far better than most home stereo systems. Yet, as amazing as the stereo's sound is, its appearance — or lack thereof — is equally impressive.

There are 27 speakers in the passenger area, but none is clearly visible. When Sorenson opens the trunk, it looks like a trunk — until he removes an inside panel that reveals a cadre of stereo components.

All contained from the driver's seat, the stereo is real simplistic, Sorenson says. "If you're not an audiophile, you probably wouldn't even know there is a car stereo in it."

The key components in the 1,600-watt system are made by Nakamichi, MB Quart and Hifonics. A 10-disc compact disc changer in the trunk is operated by a remote control on the steering wheel.

Singer Tracy Chapman is probably in New York City somewhere, but when Sorenson turns on the stereo, it sounds like she and her band are right there in the car.

The way it sounds now, there are subtle frequencies you can't hear, but they must be apparent only to a highly trained ear. Sorenson leans toward the classics for his mobile sound chamber, favoring Mozart and Pavarotti. His dad, on the other hand, likes AC/DC, Sorenson says.

Sorenson can crank this stereo up to 127

decibels, but volume only accounts for 30 of the 415 points awarded at sanctioned sound challenge events. "The International Automobile Sound Competition Association was formed not to see how loud a stereo can go, but how accurately it reproduces the music," he says.

At the world championship, Sorenson placed behind cars from California and Massachusetts. But he says both those vehicles, like many at the top of the sound challenge circuit, can't even be driven. Loaded down with stereo equipment, they're simply too heavy.

Sorenson drove his car to each event, getting 25 miles per gallon on the highway en route. He compensated for his audio components which weigh about 750 pounds modifying other parts of the car to make them lighter.

"I believe in the best of both worlds," he says. "It still has air conditioning, still has cruise control."

Sorenson's results with his car and with Audio One, which opened in the fall of 1989, make him one of the valley's most successful young entrepreneurs. A 1984 Twin Falls High School graduate who rents helicopters and airplanes as a kid, he

and his father also own Sam Inc., an aviation company. His future plans include more auto sound competition, including a possible trip to Georgia in March for a contest where the top prize will be \$25,000. After that, however, Sorenson may head off to another competition car, because he's had offers to buy the Grand National. He's also thinking of opening a second Audio One store, possibly in Boise or Sun Valley.

Sorenson says that, before his entry into the international competition, audio manufacturers weren't impressed with his plans. They thought he was too new, and Twin Falls too small a market. For Sorenson, to make it in big-time sound competition — now, however, he's had a half-dozen manufacturers offer to sponsor him next season.

"They're realizing the kid has lived up to everything he said he'd do," Sorenson says.

Networks gird for 'ready-set-go' gulf war

HOLLYWOOD — By the time the U.N. deadline for Iraq withdrawal from Kuwait arrives Tuesday, Cable News Network will have 150 reporters, photographers and producers in the Middle East. CBS and NBC will each have about 80, and ABC will have 40.

The networks, which have so far spent about \$12 million apiece covering the Middle East since Iraq invaded Kuwait Aug. 2, have budgeted about \$1 million a week — twice current expenses — for coverage if war breaks out.

For the first time in history, cameras will be poised to record what Ed Turner, executive vice president in charge of news gathering at Cable News Network, calls a "ready-set-go" war, one where hostilities are coordinated with calendar dates and where soldiers, even among enemy governments, have been cultivated and are stand-fair.

If the Pentagon has its way, even the rules of reporting will be laid out ahead of time, with reporters agreeing not to publish stories about sensitive troop movements and submitting controversial pieces for government screening before they are aired.

But this war, if it does break out, is not likely to restrain itself to the polite realm of the stored and structured media event. Network executives and media analysts say that elements as varied as the weather in the Middle East and the possible use of chemical weapons by Iraq promise to make the conflict more of an uncontrollable melee, in which the safety of reporters is threatened more than ever before, and clashes with the Pentagon may mean censorship in the face of the best information technology in history.

Already, apparent false reports that Iraq had been defeated to Saudi Arabia have been printed and broadcast throughout the United States, renewing concerns about disinformation campaigns by both sides.

The biggest challenge will be keeping a national handle on the campaign, and ABC news vice president Jeff Grunick. "We're going to function in large part as a national conduit for information and national rumor control."

And there is the likelihood that either the U.S. or Iraqi government will block television signals from the Persian Gulf, at least initially. Turner has said that while he ex-

Prime-time series deal with gulf crisis issues

HOLLYWOOD — Gomer Pyle's Marine Corps unit never got shipped off to Vietnam. Jed and Jethro did not debate the bombing of North Vietnam over the "Beverly Hillsbillies" dining room table. Carol Brady never brought her brand of suburban cheer to counsel a neighbor whose husband was in the armed forces.

But unlike the Vietnam War, which was virtually ignored by prime-time entertainment television, several series are weighing in with Persian Gulf-related stories.

On NBC's "A Different World," Thursday night, the Hillman College students experienced mixed emotions as a friend and distinguished alumnus, Zelman Collier (Blair Underwood), joined his reserve unit in the Persian Gulf. The episode was written by series star Jasmine Guy and Dominic Hoffman, who portrayed her boyfriend last season.

Jasmine has a friend who is a doctor who joined the reserves and has been called up, so she has a close experience with this kind of event, co-executive producer Susan Falley said. The issue that is particularly affecting young minorities because so many of them have to enroll in ROTC to pay their education. It seemed particularly timely and meshed beautifully with our game plan for the season to deal with world issues and the world outside.

Saturday, "Under Cover," ABC's new spy series, looks back to last summer just prior to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait. National Intelligence Agency agent Dylan D'Amico (Anthony Denison) meets resistance with his plan to leave Iraq while, simultaneously, his wife and fellow agent Kate (Linda Hart) and a new NSA recruit (Kasi Lemmons), are taken hostage in Kuwait.

"In the Iraqi episode, we deal with the question of whether or not you sacrifice people for a higher cause, which is something that figured very prominently with my experiences in the agency," said Frank Sneyd, a former CIA agent who is a story editor, writer and consultant on the series. "I had a friend in the agency who was left behind in Vietnam and was killed. In this sense, this episode was a tribute to him."

CBS' "Designing Women" may well have been the "first" series with an episode related to the Persian Gulf crisis when it aired "Keeping the Home Fires Burning" Nov. 26. Charlene (Jean Smart) joined a military support group after her husband Hill (Douglas Barr), an Air Force pilot, was sent to the Middle East.

"We knew when the whole thing started we were going to have to address it somehow because her husband was in the military, co-executive producer Pam Morris said. "To ignore it would be silly. One thing that television does really well is address things that are happening."

of U.S. casualties. And if bombings or the deliberate jamming of signals prevent video transmissions, television reports will not be able to file their stories.

At the same time, there is concern that while reporters in Baghdad may be in a position to provide information hitherto unheard-of in war reporting, they may also wind up as hostages. Last March, the Iraqi government executed a British reporter, Farzad Bazoff, and, according to the New York-based Committee to Protect Journalists, has threatened to do the same to other reporters.

For the first time, journalists may not be safe even behind the lines.

"We've got our people deployed and now we are facing advanced weapons weapons that can reach way beyond the borders of Iraq and Kuwait," said Joe Feyrinnin, vice president and assistant to the president of CBS News.

"What we find as we lay out every scenario is that it's very hard to plan more than a day in advance, because everything could change on a moment's notice," said CBS News spokesman Tom Goodman. Already, the response to the Pentagon's proposed restrictions on coverage has been mixed, with some networks saying they would obey and others vowing to challenge the restrictions.

Last week, the U.S. military said that it would require severe restrictions on coverage including no access to the front lines, but CBS severely wounded U.S. soldiers or certain enemy successes. The Pentagon has since backed down on many of the restrictions, but still retains the right to screen footage before it goes out and requires that reporters remain with military escorts at all times.

"Sure, we'll abide by it," Turner said. "Because we're not about to be banned from the theater of operation just because we disagree with some of the points on this list."

None of the networks said that it would deliberately violate the rules, but CBS severely said the network "would make very clear the restrictions under which we are working," and NBC's Browne swore that his network's reporters would push the limits and challenge the rules at every turn.

"A war is an ugly thing," Browne said. "And we're going to constantly question and challenge anything that restricts our ability to cover the war in any way that does not jeopardize lives and does not jeopardize the military operation."

When they are happening. Movies and other media don't seem to respond as quickly.

No series has had its fate tied more to the Persian Gulf crisis than "Major Dad," network television's only comedy set in the Middle East.

The CBS situation comedy was intended to be a look at the wartime Middle East.

"We are a half-hour comedy, and we try to dramatize or address an issue where people are losing their lives," executive producer Rick Hawkins said. "I have made up my mind to write on my show. It's not a time to be silly. Making fun of any of the news events that we would see on the news."

Hawkins said that the series is not constrained by a four-week lag between when an episode is filmed and when it is broadcast.

"I've seen a lot of news and I've seen a lot of time, it would create a chronological difficulty," Hawkins said. "It would knock the believability out of our show."

Last season, Maj. John D. McGillis (Gerald McRaney) was in a battle to become a Central American nation. But now he's been moved to Camp Holtzler, a Virginia supply base, there are no plans to send him to the Persian Gulf.

He has a vital role in this supply base," Hawkins said. "Only in a dire situation would he be sent to the Gulf. If he was still in the job he had last season (leading a school of in-

fantry at a recruiting depot), he'd probably be over there now."

An episode is being planned on a contingency basis in case war does break out and would be shot and aired as quickly as possible, Hawkins said.

Although "Major Dad" has not devoted a full episode to the crisis, the subject has not been ignored.

"We started our season with an on-the-air tribute to all of the armed forces personnel deployed overseas," Hawkins said. "We did a scene (in another episode) where they tied yellow ribbons on the porch of the house where they live."

In a day-to-day basis within the office context, they talk about bringing supplies to the Middle East and they make jokes about the sand and the equipment.

"It's very much a 'Mr. Robinson' situation, where we have Marines in an office whose hearts would very much like to be with their fellow Marines overseas, yet they know they're doing an important job here at home," he said.

None of the producers involved reported receiving interference or opposition from the networks because of the Persian Gulf-related episodes.

Sometimes people say sitcoms shouldn't deal with reality, that no character should be touched by a potentially tragic situation and no body should have any political beliefs or address anything that's in the newspapers. That seems ridiculous to me," Norris said. "These are characters and situations. Ordinary people talk about the Persian Gulf crisis every day. You don't have to be (public-affairs talk show host) Tom McLaughlin to talk about it. These issues belong to all of us."

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Competing digital tape technology may cause battle in music industry

NEW YORK (AP) — A war is shaping up in the music industry, and the battle ground is the cassette tape player.

Rival groups are tussling over competing technologies for next-generation cassettes that offer the superior sound quality of compact discs.

In one camp are several Japanese companies, including Sony Corp., which began selling digital-audio tape, or DAT, products in this country last year. Such tapes are about half the size of conventional cassettes but far more expensive.

The new contender is N.V. Philips, the Dutch electronics maker, which unveiled a technology it calls the digital compact cassette.

Unlike the Japanese DAT players, Philips says machines using its technology will be able to play today's cassettes as well as the new digital tapes.

"With the average household already owning between 50 and 60 music cassettes, this compatibility is seen as a major factor in the successful introduction of DCC," Philips said in a statement.

However, the Philips machines won't be able to play the Japanese DAT tapes. That means the two DAT camps end up a replay of the video-

tape war of the 1980s, in which the VHS tape format beat out Sony's Beta standard, leaving millions of consumers with virtually obsolete Beta tapes and VCRs.

"What this means for the market is confusion," said Tom Berger, editor of Audio magazine.

"This has become a very interesting time for the home recording industry because there are all of these things unsettled."

Philips says its tape players should cost \$200 to \$600 when they are introduced next year, far cheaper than the Japanese DAT models, which carry a list price of up to about \$1,000.

However, industry experts say the price of DAT machines may have dropped steeply by that point if the price drops seen in other electronics products such as VCRs and CD players are a guide.

Both the Japanese and the Philips technologies record music in digital format, the computer language used in compact discs, eliminating the background hiss and other distortions of conventional tapes.

Philips, which invented the cassette tape and the compact disc, has joined with Tandy Corp., the Fort Worth, Texas-based owner of the Radio Shack chain, to develop DAT. Although the two companies said

in October they were working on the technology, they waited until this week to display it at the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas, the semiannual showcase for the home electronics industry.

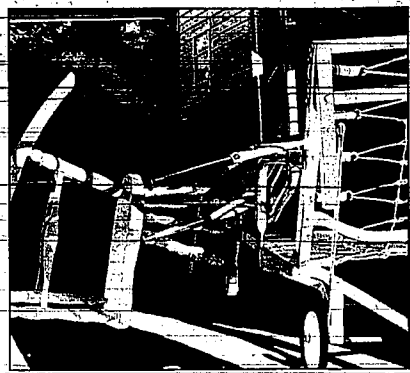
Tandy says it will make tape players and blank cassettes at its U.S. plants for sale at Radio Shack stores and elsewhere. Philips, which makes electronics products under the Magnavox, Sylvania, Norelco and Philips brands, also will sell home audio equipment.

Pocatello potter Martin, a New York native, has been teaching ceramics at Idaho State University since 1977. He holds degrees from Illinois State University and also studied at Kent State University in Ohio and Murray State University in Kentucky.

Martin frequently creates functional pottery and has exhibited widely in the Northwest and Midwest. "There are many styles and approaches for creating with clay, but the aesthetic beauty inherent in a hand-crafted clay object cannot be replaced," he says.

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'Home Alone' star takes stardom in stride

NEW YORK (AP) — As the season's biggest box office star strolled past the customers at a Manhattan ice cream shop, conversation halted and jaws dropped.

"Mom!" squealed one little girl sitting at a table with her mother and sister. "It's the little boy from the movie!"

Within seconds, 10-year-old Macaulay "Mack" Culkin was besieged by fans, young and old, asking for autographs and praising his performance in the smash movie, "Home Alone."

Since the movie opened in November, it became the third-biggest-grossing film of 1990. It took in more than \$150 million to beat out the likes of Arnold Schwarzenegger in "Total Recall" and Bruce Willis in "Die Hard 2." And it continued its reign as the nation's biggest hit for the eighth straight week, Exhibitor Relations Co. reported.

When he was in Los Angeles to promote the movie, Mack was hustled out the back of the Beverly Hills Hotel by guards armed with walkie-talkies when fans gathered out front. He recently had to leave a Manhattan clothing store when he was mobbed.

Mack handles the attention with the same aplomb shown by his on-screen alter ego, Kevin McCallister, who heroically foils burglars when

he's accidentally left home after his family goes on vacation.

"It's no big deal," said the blond, blue-eyed boy. "But the other day, something really weird happened. I had on a ski mask and this kid saw me across the street and says, 'Oh, there's that kid from 'Home Alone.' I had this thing covering my face! I couldn't believe it."

The box-office performance of "Home Alone," which is equally popular with adults and children, suggests that little Mack Culkin may be a tonic for tough times.

Mack has little interest in talking about the movie. He's polite and professional, but after trips to the West Coast and 16 countries in Europe to plug the film, his eyes glaze over after the third or fourth question.

The Culkins are like an old-fashioned theatrical family. Mack's father, Kit, 46, also was a child actor. He accompanies his son on location and on tours. He held a succession of odd jobs and is now Mack's manager. Mack's aunt is the actress Bonnie Bedelia. Several of Mack's siblings also are performers; his 7-year-old brother, Kieran, was in "Home Alone."

Mack made his New York stage debut at age 4 and began to win rave reviews two years later for work in other plays. He has played "Fritz" in "The Nutcracker" with the New York City Ballet, having studied at George Balanchine's school since he was 4.

He has also appeared in the films, "Rocket Gibraltar," "See You in the Morning," "Uncle Buck" and "Jacob's Ladder." He leaves for Florida soon for his next movie, and a sequel to "Home Alone" is planned.

Mack is so modest about his acting talent that it sometimes backfires. On the set of "Rocket Gibraltar," he told star Burt Lancaster that acting was "too easy." When Lancaster played along and asked him for some acting tips, Mack didn't miss a beat.

"Just don't step on my lines," he said.

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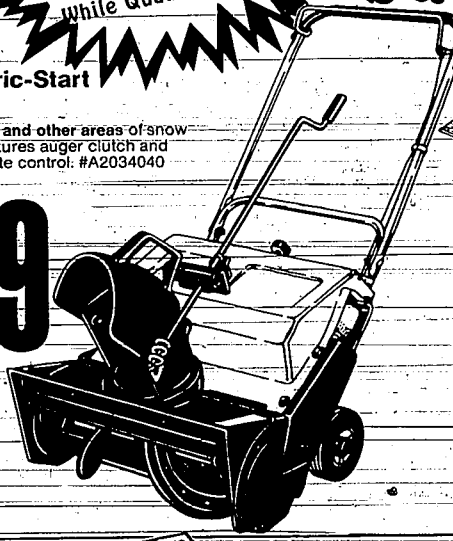
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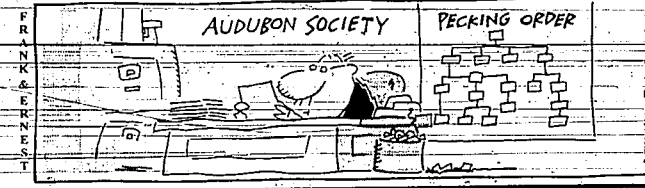
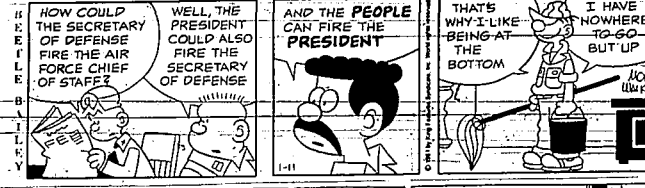
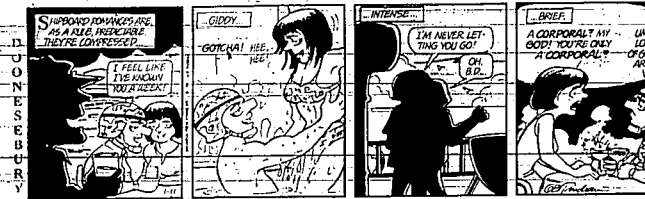
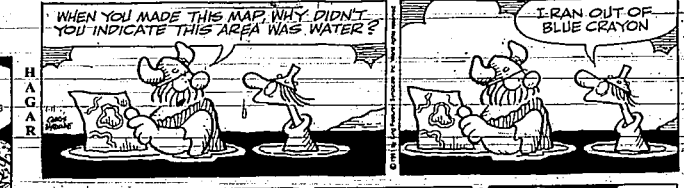
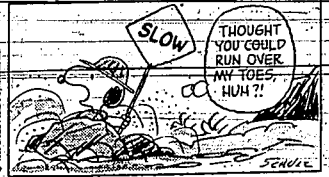

When will I know how much fun I've been having?

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'Awakenings' rarely rises above tear-jerker

HOLLYWOOD — In his book "Awakenings," the neurologist Oliver Sacks describes how, as a young doctor in 1969, three years after entering Mount Carmel Hospital in the New York borough of the Bronx, he ad-

ministered the drug L-DOPA to post-encephalitic patients who had survived the worldwide sleeping-sickness epidemic of the '20s.

In almost every case he observed in them an astonishing reversal. These people — most of them "frozen," trancelike, vegetating in hospitals — were considered beyond recovery. L-DOPA "awakened" them to life. Suddenly and astonishingly, they were able to converse, ambulate, write, laugh. But the reawakening short-lived. The drug proved no magic elixir and most of the patients slipped back into their own sentient but private oblivion.

The movie adaptation of Sacks' book centers on one of its many case histories. It is about the relationship between Dr. Malcolm Sayer (Robin Williams) based in part on Sacks — and the virtually voiceless and immobile Leonard Lowe (Robert De Niro), who contracted encephalitis 30 years earlier, and whose mother (Ruth Nelson) still tends to him.

The main material of Sacks' account is so powerful that it almost sustains the soft-geddon film that has been adapted from it. Sometimes a less-than-stellar movie can reach into areas of dread and poignancy that are emotionally affecting as anything could be. The mistake is in assuming that because we get the sniffles the film must be great. As well-meaning and sensitive as "Awakenings" is, it never rises much above the level of a grade-A tearjerker. It achieves most of its effects by tenderizing raw material into something marshmallowy.

This is not to say that director Penny Marshall pulls out all the stops. As she demonstrated with "Big," to which "Awakenings" bears a thematic resemblance, Marshall has a gift for reticence. She has the taste to cut and trim the big moments in "Awakenings" before they get all-

sloberly and fake. But, his sense of reserve also keeps the film from truly engaging us. It pulls back from the true terror of the unawakened lives we're shown, and so unwakened-
ing lacks force.

Besides Leonard, the post-encephalitic patients we see are (to countenance and sanitized. Nobody slobbers in this film. Dementia is downplayed. In one of the film's centerpiece scenes, the awakened patients go on a field trip to a dance hall in the Big Apple, where they carry on like they were in a '20s speakeasy.

It's not that something like this didn't, or couldn't, happen. It's that the film (rated PG-13 for strong language) has reduced the patients' lives to easily comprehensible, casebook anecdotes. The patients have the companionable quality of treasured pets, and there's a measure of unconscious condescension in the way they are made to gambol and twirl and make nice.

In the process, Sayer's full humanity is also reduced. Steve Zillman's

script goes for the most obvious connection: It explains the doctor's passion for helping his patients by positing a spiritual link between them. Sayer, a private man, is really "one of them." He is first introduced to us as a "pure" researcher with no people skills. He lives in a crummy bachelor apartment and won't allow himself to acknowledge the attentions of his nurse (Julie Kavner).

But, of course, Sayer is actually a people person par excellence. In his attempt to put all his encephalitic patients on L-DOPA, he breaks through the stonewalling of the hospital's medical Establishment — a cadre of live-or-live-always-headed-by-John Heard's Dr. Kaufman — and finally gets his way.

The predicament of his patients — played by, among others, Anne Mearns, Alice Drummond, the late Dexter Gordon and Judith Malina — effects a kind of awakening on Sayer himself. In the film's own allegorical terms, Sayer's kinship with Leonard teaches him to love. Leonard's re-en-

try into oblivion forces his doctor's rebirth.

As a tribute to the acting of Williams and De Niro that this kinship doesn't seem achingly schematic. But the conception of their roles is a bit too squishy and Teddy-bearish. Sayer is supposed to gain from his experience with Leonard by recognizing what is precious in life. But Sayer is never made to recognize his kinship with Leonard's dark side — his agonies. Williams allows few shadows to creep into Sayer's radiance.

If "Awakenings" had been made 20 years ago, it might have opted for a "Cuckoo's Nest"-style scenario in which the encephalitic patients were shown to be more fully alive, more sane, than their overseers. There's a smidgen of this attitude in the film, but, mostly, it's "Rain Man" redux. Leonard's life is employed not as a paragon but as a beacon. Sayer learns that "the simplest things matter." The trouble with "Awakenings" is that the simplest things are too simple.

'Home Alone' tops at box office for 8th-straight week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The little rascal in "Home Alone" is again in first place for the eighth consecutive weekend.

With weekend ticket sales of \$12.6 million, the trapped toddler comedy starring Macaulay Culkin now has made \$168.7 million, Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc. said.

The last film that was No. 1 for eight weeks was 1987's "Fatal Attraction," said 20th Century Fox, which released "Home Alone."

"Home Alone" now has made more money than "Fatal Attraction" and such hits as "The Exorcist" and "White Frenched Rats." In coming weeks, it is expected to pass the smashes "Crocodile Dundee," "Three Men and a Cradle," "Rain Man" and "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade."

In second place with a weekend take of \$9.5 million was Arnold Schwarzenegger in "Kindergarten Cop." It was followed in third by the min-

sequel "The Godfather Part III," which made \$8.3 million.

Director-actor Kevin Costner's Western, "Dances With Wolves," continued its box-office stampede, collecting \$7.3 million for fourth place and a total of \$71.1 million to date.

DANCES WITH WOLVES (PG-13) — In his first directing work, Kevin Costner has made a clear-eyed authentic vision of the frontier West that is irresistible. 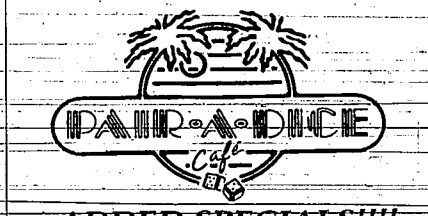

The last word in glib, shallow, soulless, spuriously warm-hearted commercialism. Director Ivan Reitman and the usual consortium of writers barely miss a trick or a marketing hook. Of all the recent "raiter" movies — a film that resembles elongated trailers — this may be the most fool-proof.

MISERY (R) Better than most of the Stephen King adaptations, this Rob Reiner-William Goldman collaboration has a creepy, claustrophobic and a pair of expert performances by Kathy Bates and James Caan. It's about a pulp best-selling writer who is imprisoned by his "greatest fan" in the snow-bound Colorado Sierras. What's missing is Reiner's squiggly, off-center side — his best side.

'Dark Shadows' has been reincarnated, but is it creativity or outdated schmaltz?

"Dark Shadows" has risen from the grave, along with platform shoes and the reputation of Richard M. Nixon. This resurgence of things outgrown is due to a common affliction: nostalgia. The same adult who sneers at those pre-fabbed New Kids on the Block is likely to get misty-eyed at a Monkees reunion concert. "Dark Shadows" (airing Sunday and Monday, Jan. 13 and 14, on NBC), the new miniseries based on the gothic soap opera of the late '60s and early '70s, can likewise be viewed as faithful re-creation or outdated schmaltz.

"Dark Shadows" begins just prior to the arrival of Victoria Winters (Joanna Going) at Collinsport, Maine. She has been hired to tutor David Collins (Joseph Gordon-Levitt), heir to Collinwood, ancestral mansion of the Collins family.

In a recycled opening narration that sounds like prose written by Snooty, the young governess describes her "strange and dark" destination "high atop a stormy cliff at the edge of the sea."

Uncertain by caretaker Willy Loomis (Jim Fyfe), vampire Barnabas Collins (Ben Cross) returns, pretending to be a British cousin to Roger Collins (Roy Thinnes) and his matriarchal sister Elizabeth (Jean Simmons).

Suave Barnabas soon begins to drain the jugulars of the townies, but cousin Daphne Stoddard (Rebecca Staab) survives his nibbling, and the sheriff enlists various professors and doctors to track the villain.

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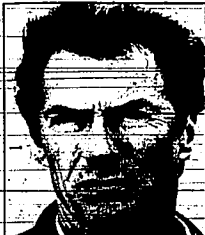

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Soap opera scene

Daytime is yawn time for some soaps

Daytime is just not NBC time. The peacock network scores at night, and stumbles in those money-making hours where people turn on the set for company.

The common touch is missing. "Generations," the half-hour soap about middle-class black and white families goes dark this month after a two-year run. Called "ambitious" because of integration, the soap bored blacks and whites by playing it cozy — ducking sensationalism or deep black hurt.

The prize-winning soap for NBC, "Santa Barbara," has a corner on daytime Emmys, yet is black and blue from the weekly drubbing it receives in the ratings from the opposition, "General Hospital." Fans want the show moved, and the response continues to be silence. Being number two in the time slot is the soap's reward for gambling on outrageous plots and larky performances.

Which leaves us with the network plodder, 25-year-old "Days of Our Lives," NBC's most popular daytime drama, say the publicity people.

That's another way of hiding the facts. Don't rock the boat, play it safe, keep fans snoozing after lunch. That's the network's message. Because "Days" stays with love stories that go on and on. Sure, there's rape and murder and all matter of larceny, but it's hokey stuff, mere background for the relationships. The trouble with that is the relationships begin to grow mossy with age. Take the Jack Deveraux-Jennifer Horton love affair. You can count on three months of misunderstanding and one week of true love. They're incompatible, and deep down love each other madly.

Deep down is the game on "Days." Characters bond and then the writers bust them up over slights, hurts and misunderstandings. Basically the soap counts on men being unable to state their true feelings. And it is said over and over again.

This winter Jack is squabbling with Jennifer, unaware she's been raped by Lawrence. Around March, Deveraux will get the picture.

If the Jennifer-Jack relationship leaves fans yawning, move over and watch Bo Brady (Peter Reckell) lose his heart to spirited Carly Manning (Crystal Chappell). Bo is still trying to forget his true love, Hope, but there he is kissing Carly in a lighthouse, and later taking it back saying he's not ready to lose his heart again — not yet, not yet. Shades of Jennifer and Jack.

If the men are predictable on "Days," their opposite sex must dominate. Newcomer Crystal Chappell and Melissa Brennan are an inviting twosome — young, spirited, almost too pretty for their own good. Both appeared on "Santa Barbara," then moved to safer quarters where they can learn their trade without pressure.

If anything is going to jerk "Days of Our Lives" out of its comfortable rut, it's going to be youngsters like Crystal and Melissa. Bo Brady's Peter Reckell used to be the soap's fireball, a dark and brooding trouble-

maker until Peter went off into prime time. Back again, Bo has lost his edge. The fellow is simply growing up.

So look to the ladies on "Days," fresh, inviting faces and bodies. Since the plots aren't going to excite, better focus on verve and personality. It's your turn, Crystal and Melissa.

Football delay kicks new Pauley series, but NBC still lands on top of Nielsens

NEW YORK (AP) — Despite a CBS football telecast that went into prime time and helped kick Jane Pauley's new NBC series right in the Nielsens, NBC won the first week of the New Year, ratings estimates showed Tuesday.

But the margin was tiny. NBC had a 13.2 ratings average in prime time and CBS a 13.1. ABC began 1991 on a gloomy note with an 11.6 rating for the week ending Jan. 6.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

The week's top-rated show with a 24.4 average was NBC's "Cheers."

CBS' Sunday telecast of the New Orleans Saints-Chicago Bears play-off game had a higher rating, a 26.9, for the 21 minutes it overlapped into prime time. But Nielsen officials didn't count it among the week's shows because it didn't start in prime time, said a spokesman for the ratings company.

Still, the football battle had an impact. It delayed the start of CBS' top-rated "60 Minutes," putting that show against the premiere of NBC's

"Real Life With Jane Pauley" anchored by the former "Today" star. It was no contest: CBS' broadcast was the week's second most-

Gulf war could be hard to cover

MARINA DEL REY, Calif. (AP) — If war erupts in the Middle East, government censorship may produce the most limited battlefield news reporting in history, NBC News President Michael Gartner said Sunday.

"It'll probably be the most difficult war for television, and probably for print as well, to cover," Gartner told television critics, reporters and industry representatives assembled for an annual winter tour.

The Saudi government and U.S. officials in the Persian Gulf censor the media by denying them free access, Gartner said.

"In Saudi Arabia, your movements are very, very much controlled," Gartner said. "You can't go anywhere without a keeper or a watcher from the military-public affairs operation going with you. I'm, at any given day, somewhere between frustrated and outraged."

Gartner, who has launched an ambitious plan to overhaul the network's bottom-rated news division, said covering the Middle

East crisis precipitated by Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait costs NBC \$500,000 a week.

That bill could rise to \$1-million as the United Nations' Jan. 15 deadline nears for Iraq to pull out of Kuwait or face attack by the U.S.-led multinational force assembling in the gulf, Gartner said.

Gartner also complained of a U.S. proposal that would ban network footage of injured soldiers.

"That's something I find totally unreasonable," he said. "I don't think you can hide the horror of war from the Americans whose children and aunts and uncles are over there fighting."

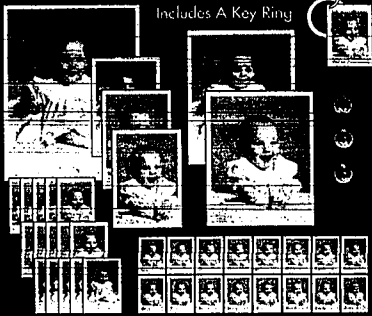
