Iraqi Scuds hit Israel

CENTRAL SAUDI ARABIA—Iraq struck back early Friday against a non-stop hammering by American warplanes the way it said it would — by lobbing missiles into Israel and Saudi Arabia. The early-morning attack on the Jewish state threatened to turn the Persian Gulf war into a wider Mideast conflict. At least eight missiles landed in Tel Aviv and elsewhere in Israel about 2 a.m. Friday, all Scuds launched from western Iraq, Israeli and U.S. officials said. The Scud is Iraq's deadliest ground-to-ground missile. The Israeli army said the weapons bore conventional, not chemical, warheads, and at least seven people were slightly injured. Another Scud was fired at Dhafran, site of a major military air base in eastern Saudi Arabia, Pentagon officials said in Washington.

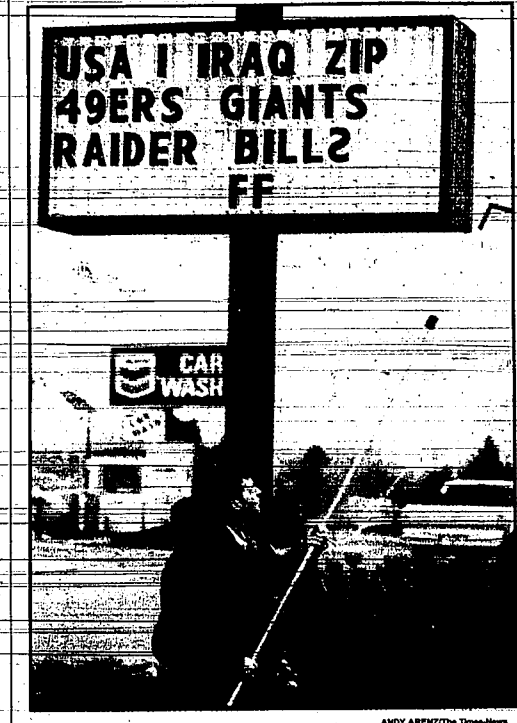
They said a U.S. Patriot interceptor missile knocked down the incoming Iraqi weapon. The Baghdad government had said it would strike out at Israel if Iraq was attacked, as it was early Thursday, by the U.S.-led coalition massed in Saudi Arabia. Iraqi President Saddam Hussein's strategy: to draw Israel into the war and possibly drive Syria and other Arab states out of the U.S. alliance. But, hours after the attacks, it was still not known whether Israel would retaliate against Iraq for the missile onslaught. There were reports Israel had agreed not to strike back. The U.S. command, after long hours of bombardment of Iraqi targets, expressed satisfaction with the air offensive by American and allied planes. But the warplanes were running into inevitable problems.

Bad weather frustrated some strikes, and pilots said anti-aircraft fire was intense. The jetted sink was coming up through the clouds," said one American flyer. The U.S. warplanes made the missile attack on Israel possible, said Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga. "We knew we hadn't hit those," the Senate Armed Services Committee chairman said. On the ground, allied tanks and troops were reported rumbling north toward the Kuwait border and a possible desert showdown with the dug-in Iraqi forces in the occupied emirate. American defense chiefs clamped a near-blackout on information about ground operations, and no news reports were coming in from the front lines. But Gen. Colin Powell, joint chiefs

Bombs rip Iraq's elite force apart

Saddam Hussein's best troops — the elite Republican Guards — may have been virtually wiped out by allied-bombing on the first night of the Gulf war, according to a Bush administration intelligence report circulated Thursday morning in Washington.

According to parts of the report read to the San Jose (Calif.) Mercury News by a government official, preliminary estimates indicate that as many as 150,000 members of the Republican Guards were killed or wounded when apparently caught in a single staging area.

Estimates vary on the size of the elite force, but the intelligence report would seem to confirm the public description by administration officials that the Republican Guards had been "decimated." The troops had been expected to see action defending Iraq or reinforcing the troops dug in on the front lines in Kuwait, and their loss would be a crippling blow to Iraq's war plans.

"We don't have anything here," said Chris Shuko, a Pentagon spokeswoman. But the existence of the report was confirmed by an intelligence analyst who said he had been briefed on it Thursday morning.

"From all indications from a variety of credible sources, it appears that in excess of 100,000 Republican Guards were 'removed,'" the source said.

He added that the Guards were attacked by U.S. and British aircraft carrying anti-personnel weaponry.

However, Loren B. Thompson, deputy director of the National Security Studies Program at Georgetown University, was skeptical of the numbers. He said he was "unaware of the report." "If someone says to you, 'We attacked a concentration over 100,000,' I'd believe that. But to kill or wound that many sounds a little on the op-

Missile raid ends gains in markets

NEW YORK — The U.S. stock market soared to its second-biggest gain in history and oil prices crashed Thursday, but Japanese markets began reversing the gains on reports of Friday fire in Israel.

Markets began reversing course in Tokyo early Friday after reports of missile attacks on Tel Aviv. Air raid sirens wailed in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv and residents donned gas masks.

Stocks tumbled after early big gains in Tokyo. The dollar began reversing ground against the Japanese yen, and oil and gold prices began rising on early reports of the attack. Prices of U.S. Treasury issues traded in Tokyo also started falling.

"The market is falling apart now," said Jay Goldinger, analyst for Capital Insight Inc. in Beverly Hills, Calif.

U.S. markets were jolted with optimism Thursday after lightning air strikes on Iraq turned five months of anxiety into world-wide financial euphoria.

But the attacks against Israel began to cause the enthusiasm that grew about a possible short-war that would not jir markets or destabilize world oil supplies.

Takashi Hiseotomi, a dealer at Manufacturers Hanover Trust, said Iraqi counterattacks that could prolong the war would strengthen the dollar, which is considered a safe haven for investors during times of

Scud attacks on Israel could endanger coalition

UNITED NATIONS — Kuwait's U.N. ambassador said the missile attacks on Israel could threaten the carefully crafted, U.S.-organized coalition against Iraq. "Surely, it might cause a problem, but I hope that the United States will take care of that and control the Israeli reaction," Mohammad A. Abulhasan, Kuwait's permanent representative to the world body, said late Thursday.

U.S. and Arab diplomats have expressed concern that if Iraqi President Saddam Hussein drew Israel into a Mideast war, the coalition might unravel because Arab members would see Israel, not Iraq, as their main enemy. "I hope there would not be an Israeli reaction; if there is, it complicates the matter, but we should not exaggerate the complication," Abulhasan said in a telephone interview.

"This should not change the coalition against Iraq. It has a task and it will fulfill its task whether Israel interferes or not," Israeli Mission spokesman Yuval Rotem said Thursday. "It is clear that Israel had taken a huge risk upon herself by refraining from a pre-emptive strike."

Surgeon says care of wounded would be best ever

TWIN FALLS — As the ability to wage war has increased with technology, so has the ability to save the lives of those injured in battle.

Experience gained from World War I to Vietnam will give American soldiers wounded in the Mideast East, and who make it to a military hospital, a 99 percent chance to survive, said Twin Falls general surgeon and Idaho state Sen. Russ Newcomb.

Newcomb served in a Mobile Army Surgical Hospital, a MASH unit, in the Vietnam War for a year, including during the start of Tet Offensive in January and February of 1968. Military medicine has evolved to the thinking of bringing medical facilities as close as possible to injured soldiers, he said.

"Basically, right now, a full-service-type hospital is available to wounded soldiers," Newcomb said. This was true in Vietnam and would be in the Middle East.

In World War I, the wounded were taken by ambulance to hospitals and the mortality rate in that war ranged to 28 percent, he said. By the Korean War, the mortality rate was 14 percent and dropped to less than 1 percent in Vietnam.

Hospitals in the Middle East will have large emergency rooms and a full range of medical supplies and workers, Newcomb said. The injured would go first to a triage center where their injuries would be evaluated and a priority for treating them would be set. Doctors, probably internists or general practitioners, would decide if a soldier's injuries require immediate surgery, or if the injuries would be evaluated and the soldier is in stable condition can wait, or if a soldier's injuries are such that he or she will not require

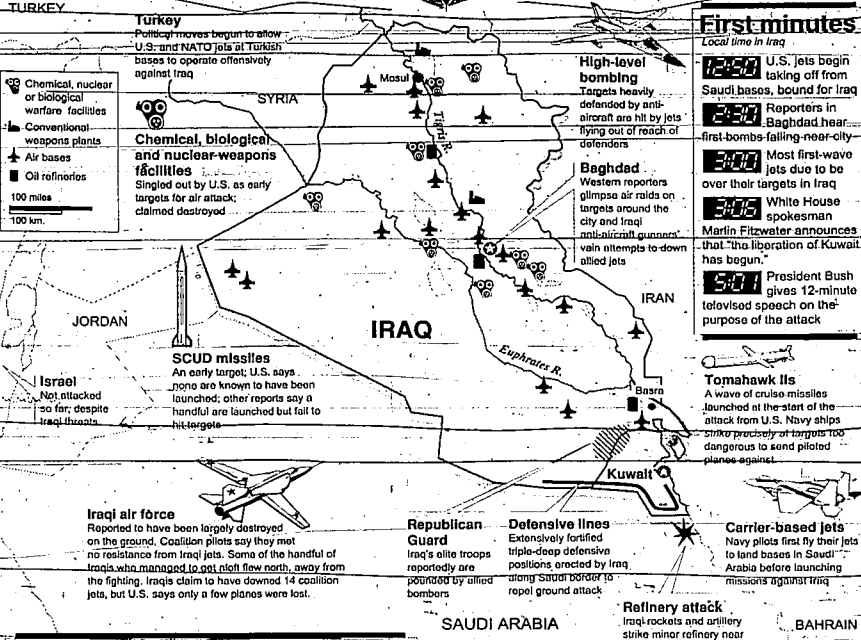
surgery. Sadly, there is one other decision doctors must make: when a soldier's injuries are so grave that there is no chance of survival. "That is a tough decision... It is not taken lightly," Newcomb said.

There are extensive guidelines to determine when a soldier cannot be saved, and the decision generally is not reached by just one doctor, Newcomb said. Fewer than 1 percent of injured soldiers would be in this category, he said. Physicians in a war zone see a lot of burn victims from fires and soft-tissue injuries from explosions. Soldiers receive fractured legs and arms and traumatic am-

Here are the latest developments in the Persian Gulf war.

- In the gulf**
- U.S. and allied warplanes hammered Iraq again and again Thursday in what one American commander vowed would be war "24 hours a day" to expel the Iraqis from Kuwait.
- President Saddam Hussein declared defiantly, after wave upon wave of aerial bombardment Thursday, that Iraq would defeat "the Satan in the White House." "Success is assured," he said during an early evening news broadcast.
- Allied officials said three of their planes had been downed: one American, one British and one Kuwaiti.
- Baghdad radio reported Iraqi forces shot down 44 U.S. and allied warplanes by 3:30 p.m. Thursday. Two Iraqi diplomats abroad said 76 allied planes were shot down. Baghdad radio said the Iraqis also shot down 23 cruise missiles. The radio said several unexploded missiles were retrieved and were usable.
- The Cable News-News Thursday broadcast footage from Iraqi television showing Saddam praying in what looked like an office. Wearing his uniform, he bowed his head, then knelt on a Muslim prayer rug. An Iraqi Embassy spokesman in Washington said the footage had been taped Thursday.
- A Kuwaiti minister in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, said that perhaps hundreds of wounded Iraqis were in several hospitals in Kuwait.
- In the first Iraqi report on casualties, a military spokesman said 23 civilians were killed and 66 wounded throughout Iraq in the early air attacks of "Operation Desert Storm." There was no report on military casualties.
- A threatened Iraqi strike against Israel never occurred — perhaps, Israeli officials suggested, because the allies knocked out the missiles in western Iraq aimed at the Jewish state.
- In Turkey, the parliament authorized the use of Turkey's military bases for attacks on Iraq by the U.S.-led multinational force.

In Washington

- The United States declared it was too late for Iraq to withdraw its troops from Kuwait in exchange for peace. Iraq must surrender, the White House said. "The pause for peace is over," State Department spokeswoman Margaret D. Tutwiler said in canceling a U.S. offer to consider any Iraqi initiative that might result in the withdrawal of all 540,000 Iraqi troops from the occupied emirate.
- Defense Secretary Dick Cheney cautioned against premature claims of victory over Iraq. Cheney said that one U.S. pilot was killed when his plane went down. Military sources said first indications were it was shot down by a surface-to-air missile.
- Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said there soon would be movement of allied ground forces being repositioned for an assault on Iraqi troops entrenched in Kuwait.
- Cheney said U.S. and allied planes flew 1,000 sorties. Early targets in the raids on Iraq and occupied Kuwait included military bases and command and control centers.
- Congress, sharply divided in deciding to authorize war, rallied quickly behind the president. "I believe that we will prevail in a matter of days or weeks," said Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. "Saddam Hussein has made a tragic miscalculation."

Financial

- Good news, rather than bad tripped market circuit breakers Thursday as reports of early successes in the U.S.-led military action against Iraq drove stocks higher and oil prices lower.
- After a minute of silence at the New York Stock Exchange, the Dow Jones average rocketed nearly 100 points in one hour. The stock market swept ahead to its second-largest point gain ever with the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial ending the day up 114.60 points to 2,623.51, according to preliminary calculations.
- Gold prices plunged Thursday. On the Commodity Exchange in New York, gold fell nearly \$30. In London, gold fell to a late bid price of \$376.50 a troy ounce from \$403.25 late Wednesday.

Elsewhere

- Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar said on entering U.N. headquarters that only Iraq has the power to stop the war now. "It depends on Iraq, whether Iraq capitulates," Perez de Cuellar said this is a time for war, not diplomacy.
- Iraq was no longer in a position to launch a serious chemical attack on allied forces because air attacks have neutralized launching sites for such arms, France's armed forces chief said Thursday. Gen. Maurice Schmitt predicted that the surviving planes in the Iraqi air force would probably stay grounded for the rest of the war.
- For many Americans, realization that the country was, finally, at war, brought a strange sense of release, but the report of the first American death fueled mounting fear. Carol Thompson of Friend, Neb., who has three sons stationed in the Persian Gulf. "I'm just worried to death. It's got to be hard for everybody who has children over there."
- Demonstrators blocked federal buildings and rural bridges Thursday as anti-war protests turned into civil disobedience in many parts of the country. Hundreds were arrested, some in confrontations with supporters of the war.
- Police across Europe and the United States tightened security Thursday at airports, embassies and other places.

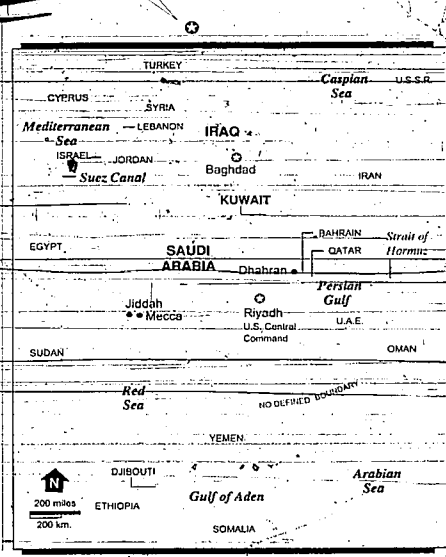
Allied onslaught against Iraq's air defenses

A typical formation attacking an Iraqi airbase would include several different types of aircraft specializing in different aspects of the mission.

- F-15E Eagle** — U.S. fighter-bomber, excels in high-speed low-level bombing attacks on many types of targets
- A-6 Intruder** — U.S. Navy attack jet, the EA-6B electronic countermeasures version jams enemy radar systems, allowing the formation to reach targets without being spotted by Iraqi jets or missiles
- E-3 AWACS** — Command jet directs air operations using sophisticated on-board radar
- F-117 Stealth fighter-bomber** — Jet's astoundingly small visibility to radar makes it useful for gaining surprise and knocking out anti-aircraft missiles and radar stations
- Tornado GR1** — Fighter-bomber flown by British and Saudi air forces which carry runway-buster bombs and other weapons

Other aircraft likely to be used in airbase attacks: U.S. F-4 Wild Weasel radar-jamming fighter-bombers; British and French Jaguar fighter-bombers; British Tornado F-3 and U.S. F-14 fighters for cover against enemy fighters

Fur Ball among exotic jargon heard in war

Here are some of the more exotic military and geographic terms, code names and slang words being used in reports from the Persian Gulf.

AWACS — Airborne warning and control system. A jet that monitors air space with its big external radar dome and guides fighters and bombers to their targets.

Collateral Damage — Military jargon for civilian losses.

Chaf — Metal foil dispensed by warplanes to confuse enemy radar.

Frogfoot — Iraq has about 60 of these SU-25 attack planes (range 470-780 miles) similar to the at least 100 American A-10 Thunderbolts deployed by the Allies.

Fur Ball — Military pilot slang for the hectic tangle of air-to-air dog-fights.

Operation BB — Soviet doctrine the Iraqis are said to be emulating in their air-defense efforts: if enough bullets and other projectiles fill the sky during an air raid, at least a few are bound to hit the target.

Operation Desert Storm — Military code name for the Gulf war.

LANTIRN — Low altitude navigation and targeting infrared night. One model of the F-16 fighter, called the "Night Falcon" for its advanced night-flying capability, has "pods" underneath which hold LANTIRN systems.

Most themselves out — Jet fighter pilot slang for planes shooting one another accidentally. The term fratricide is also used.

Sand — Soviet made surface to surface ballistic missile. There are three Iraqi versions that can carry explosive or chemical warheads to targets 160 to 1,200 miles away.

Sebkhah — An Arab word for underground river. Sebkhahs that turn the ground into quagmires impossible to cross with tanks lie near the Saudi border and south of Kuwait City.

Sortie — One mission by a single military plane.

Stealth — Term applied to planes designed to remain nearly invisible to enemy radar. The F-117A, a single-seat, Stealth-equipped jet was used in the original raid on Baghdad. Its range and armaments are classified.

Tomahawk — Unmanned, rocket-launched, jet-propelled (also termed "air breathing") cruise missile fired from ships or submarines. The cruise missile can also be launched from B-52 bombers. It can hug the ground and is guided to a pre-programmed target 300 miles away by an onboard computer.

TOW — Acronym for tube-launched, optically-tracked, wire-guided missile.

Wadi — An Arab word for dry ravine or valley. A wadi runs all along the Kuwait border, and Iraqis have set up a defense line behind it.

Wild Weasel — The F-4G fighter, whose main mission is electronic countermeasures that can knock out or suppress enemy radar installations.

Turkey makes bases available for attack on Iraq

ANKARA, Turkey — U.S.-led coalition warplanes will be permitted to attack Iraq from Turkish air bases, Parliament decided Thursday.

It was at day marked by relief at Iraq's weakened military capability and optimism that Turkey will be spared the worst of a Middle East war.

Turkish forces massed along the 206-mile border with Iraq will not attack Iraqi targets, the government de-

clared, but 48 U.S. bombers and fighter jets, plus anticipated reinforcements, are free to do so.

"Iraq has become a danger in the region. It has made it a habit to fight with its neighbors," said Prime Minister Yildirim Akbulut. "If our neighbor keeps the oil of Kuwait in its hands, it will take the region under its control."

Turkish and American military authorities who share use of the Incirlik base in southern Turkey, 435 miles from the Iraqi border, declined to provide details Thursday on plans for the base.

No warplanes flew attack routes from Turkey on the first night of the bombardment. Four F-15s flew defensive missions from Incirlik's 10,000-foot runway, but saw no action.

Turkish military intelligence suggests that eight Iraqi divisions, perhaps 80,000 soldiers, are posted along the border. The Foreign Ministry reported that the area on the Iraqi side has been laid with land-

mines and the border shut to traffic.

Facing the Iraqis are more than 100,000 Turkish soldiers, including armored brigades, bolstered by a formidable air force.

Forty-two warplanes under NATO command reached the region to signal Iraq that an attack on Turkey is an attack on the 16 countries of "NATO."

Barring retaliatory missions, the NATO forces will not be used in attacks on Iraq, President Turgut Ozal said Thursday.

Americans settle into reality of war times

For many Americans, realization that the country was, finally, at war, brought a strange sense of release and a willingness to dig in despite likely sacrifices. The nation, however, was far from united Thursday, and reports of the first American death in combat — a pilot whose plane was shot down — fueled mounting fear and frustration. "I don't know where my boys are," said Carol Thompson of Friend, Neb., who has three sons stationed in the Persian Gulf. "I'm just worried to death. It's got to be hard for everybody who has children over there." Schools formed crisis teams to help children and teen-agers cope with the war, and the principal of Arkansas' elementary school in Jacksonville told "teachers to keep televisions off."

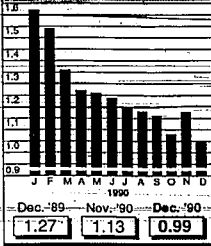
"I've already seen a few teary eyes coming in this morning." Children in music classes at Joynor-Elementary School in Tupelo, Miss., sang patriotic songs, and teachers at several schools held impromptu discussions or watched television news with their students. In Pennsylvania, officials Thursday suspended 130 students for leaving classes in anger the previous day because they left Hempfield Area High School administrators had not devoted enough attention to the crisis. Principal George Vollmer said more class time will be devoted to the crisis. "The suspended students won't be readmitted until their parents meet with administrators." Lona Smith said she had no business at her store, Harrigan's Video in Helena, Mont., because so many people were watching television. In Cheyenne, Wyo., the Vietnam Vet Center reported being swamped with scores of veterans seeking help in dealing with stress and anger, regardless of whether they supported

the attack on Iraq. "Things they've built up for years are breaking loose," said volunteer Rick Scott. Legislators streamed off the floor of the Georgia House on Thursday after Rep. Cynthia McKinney declared that "George Bush ought to be ashamed of himself" and called the attack against Iraq "naked aggression." The incident ended quickly after other legislators rose to defend American policy. Anti-war protesters, worried that the fighting would drag on or move to the ground, prepared for the long haul. Demonstrations were organized in many cities, with federal buildings targeted and dozens of arrests reportedly well before noon. In San Francisco, protesters blocked intersections, broke windows and spray-painted slogans around the blockaded Federal Building in a third day of noisy, occasionally violent anti-war demonstrations. The crowd had grown to about 3,000 people by midmorning. Chief of Police Willis Casey said about 150 people had been "detained." Police arrested 12 demonstrators

in Des Moines, Iowa, after protesters took over a U.S. Army office, vowing to stop recruiting efforts. The six men and six women chanted "The super and troops bring them home" as they walked to waiting police cars. Early Thursday about 100 people walked down an Ohio State University campus street in Columbus showing support for the attack. They shouted "Mesa with the best; die like the rest" and "Liberate Kuwait." Congress, which "less than a week ago gave President Bush the authority to use force in the gulf," on Thursday was expected to express support for his actions. In anticipation of Iraqi reprisals, Americans tried to protect themselves from terrorist attacks with increased security at airports and military bases. But many people tried to just follow the patterns of their daily lives. Cindy Church, whose husband was sent to Saudi Arabia five months ago from Fort Campbell, Ky., said her children, 7 and 8, would go to school Thursday.

Housing down

WASHINGTON — Housing starts fell 13.3 percent last year to a level not seen since the last recession, the government said Thursday. And analysts said any substantive improvement was months away. "The housing market—and it's going to be a down market through at least the first quarter," said economist Martin Regalia of the National Council of Savings Institutions. "And when it comes back, it's going to be a modest comeback." The Commerce Department said the year ended with a 12.4 percent decline in starts in December, to just 987,000 units at a seasonally adjusted annual rate. That compares with the number of monthly starts since a 902,000 rate in June 1987. It helped drive starts for the year down to 1.19 million units, compared with 1.38 million in 1989. It was the lowest level of yearly starts since builders broke ground on 1.06 million units in 1982.

Applications for building permits, often a barometer of future activity, appeared to support forecasts of lingering weakness. They fell 6.6 percent in December to an annual rate of 846,000 — the smallest amount since 804,000 forms were filed in February 1982. Starts fell steadily throughout the year, except for November when they jumped 9.8 percent due solely to a 92 percent gain in apartment buildings. Analysts said the November number was an anomaly and couldn't be sustained. Indeed, apartment construction fell 35.4 percent in December to an annual rate of 232,000 units.

Mountain lion may have killed jogger

IDAHO SPRINGS, Colo. — Clear Creek County authorities were awaiting the results of an autopsy on an 18-year-old cross-country jogger to determine if he was killed by a mountain lion. The smallest of the animals, said Diana Van Voorst, spokeswoman for the sheriff's department. "We're 99 percent sure this guy was attacked by a mountain lion," said Stuart G. Nay, Idaho Springs police chief and deputy coroner. An autopsy will determine whether he died because of the cougar's attack or died beforehand and the body later was attacked by the animal. The jogger was found on Wednesday. Another searcher sighted a mountain lion about 100 feet away and the cat was tracked down and killed.

Lancaster, a senior at Clear Creek Secondary School, was reported missing after he failed to return from a group jogging run Monday. His body was found less than a mile from the school.

Albanian miners back on the job

VIENNA, Austria — Striking Albanian miners returned to work after forcing their Communist government to grant higher pay and better working conditions, the official news agency ATA reported Thursday. The miners at the Valias pit, who were on strike since the weekend, agreed to end their strike after the government accepted demands for a 60 percent pay increase, ATA said in a dispatch monitored in Vienna.

Albanian President Ramiz Alia, under pro-democracy pressure, has begun to reverse 46 years of hard-line Communism. He faces spreading labor unrest around the desperately poor nation of 3.2 million people.

Billionaire crosses Pacific in balloon

TOKYO — British billionaire Richard Branson and his Swedish co-pilot Thursday became the first hot-air balloonists to cross the Pacific, setting several records and overcoming a fuel shortage. A landing was planned during the afternoon in far-northern Canada. Branson and partner Per Lindstrand were sighted west of Juneau, Alaska, at 4:45 a.m. EST, said project spokesman in Miyakonojo, the southern Japanese town where a flight began. The two balloonists remained airborne and were later sighted in the Northwest Territories in Canada, near Yellowknife. But by reaching Alaska they had become the first to cross the Pacific in a hot air balloon. — Compiled from wire reports

ADA, AMA adopt new policies following AIDS case

ATLANTA (AP) — AIDS-infected doctors and dentists should warn their patients about their disease or give up surgery, the American Medical Association and the American Dental Association recommended Thursday. The new policy comes after the Atlanta-based Centers for Disease Control says at least three people may have been infected with the AIDS virus by one dentist, who has since died from the disease. The CDC officially released its

latest report on the Florida case Thursday, two days after the patient, whose AIDS was first linked to the dentist, Kimberly Bergalis, said she was told of the infections of two others former patients. The American Dental Association, whose officials were publicly skeptical of the CDC's report of Ms. Bergalis' case last August, announced a new policy, telling its infected dentists to warn their patients or stop performing dental surgery. "Until the uncertainty about trans-

mission is resolved, the ADA believes that HIV (AIDS virus) infected dentists should refrain from performing invasive procedures or should disclose their seropositive (infected) status," the ADA statement said. The American Medical Association, which has urged family doctors who perform surgery or other invasive procedures and are at risk of acquiring HIV infection, should determine their HIV status. "Those who test positive for the disease, the AMA went on, "have an

ethical obligation not to engage in any professional activity which has an identifiable risk of transmission of the infection to the patient." The dental association still believes that masks, gloves and other steps to prevent the spread of infection in dentists' offices are sufficient to protect patients, said spokesman Philip Weintraub. The dentist involved in the Florida case, Dr. David Acer of Fort Pierce, has died of AIDS. Ms. Bergalis has been diagnosed with the disease.

Lawmakers not a target, says Moscow

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. (AP) — The Kremlin promised Thursday not to attack the Lithuanian parliament but wary Baltic residents said they feared a further crackdown while the world watches the Persian Gulf war. In Paris, the European Community threatened to cut off all Soviet aid, including emergency food supplies, if Moscow continues repressing the Baltic republics.

Both Lithuania's Baltic neighbors, Latvia and Estonia, were reported calm Thursday. The official Tass news agency said the Soviet military and Estonian officials had reached agreement on the contentious issue of military service.

The Baltic republics were independent states between the two world wars, but the Soviets forcibly annexed them in 1940. They are now seeking independence, though Lithuania has been far bolder than Estonia or Latvia. The Kremlin has used an economic embargo as well as seizure of key buildings, to try to bring Lithuania under control.

New treatment helps children who have AIDS

WASHINGTON (AP) — Research on a new treatment Thursday to reduce bacterial infections in some children infected with the AIDS virus. While not curing the youngsters, the treatment could improve their quality of life. Monthly doses of intravenous immunoglobulin, or IVIG, were found to decrease significantly the occurrence of serious, sometimes life-threatening bacterial infections in children whose immune systems are weakened by the AIDS virus, officials at the National Institutes of Health said. These infections include pneumonia, sepsis, meningitis and sinusitis, which often result in prolonged hospitalization, said Dr. Anne Willoughby, a researcher at the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development and the study director.

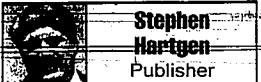
Prayers for peace make sense to children; gulf war does not

Dear Tiffany and Rachel:

Under ordinary circumstances, I would only write a public letter to you once a year, on your birthdays, expressing both hopes and dreams. I have done this for you, Tiffany, each May for several years now and had planned to do so this year. But this is a year that is not ordinary. Our great nation has entered armed conflict in an onrushing series of events we can barely grasp, much less understand fully. I was wowed this Persian Gulf War, but it has become non-the-less, and now we all should give our fullest support to our armed forces and our political leaders that the resolution will be swift and the loss of life minimal.

In the past few days, as the enormity of this event has become actual, I have heard much fear and confusion in your voices. Despite your young ages of 14 and 6, you know enough to know that whatever happens now, things will be different.

I cannot tell you with assurance why



America is involved in this situation. I have searched my experience as a journalist for some 25 years, and from my knowledge of American history, and character, and I am not at all sure how our national interest is at stake here.

OH! I would gladly spend an extra one or two dollars a gallon to have us explore our own oil shale business and generate true energy self-sufficiency.

Confront Saddam's aggression and free Kuwait? We have sat on our hands in situation after situation in the past decades; from Afghanistan to Israel to Chad, without confrontation.

Appausement? The comparison of Saddam to Hitler seems strained. We have nearly a half-million troops in position to defend Saudi Arabia. If Poland had been defended

by that kind of Allied force in 1939, would Hitler have attacked?

Democracy? Kuwait and Saudi Arabia hardly qualify.

Long-term strategic interests? In the volatile Middle East, it is difficult to see how a war led by a Western power advances either stability in the region or our national long-range objectives. Clausewitz says war is the continuation of political objectives by other means. It is hard to see how such objectives are advanced in this situation.

But while I hold these concerns, I am nonetheless in absolute support of our armed forces in carrying out what they have been directed to do. Now that our nation is committed, we must complete this task; and when the war is done, offer Iraq a just and fair peace.

Now all of this must seem confusing to your young minds. Fighting, to you, means mostly schoolyard disputes, raised voices, an occasional bloody nose. War, in which people are killed and injured, must seem incomprehensible.

I am most concerned for you, Tiffany, for

you are far from home at school in Portland, studying hard for college, career, life.

The Persian Gulf War already has touched you in deep and personal ways. Last week, you tell me, the school sponsored an open-microphone forum, in which many of you spoke on your feelings at this troublesome time.

Your roommate is a girl from Saudi Arabia and I know how concerned she must be. Whatever happens, I want you to hug her for your mother and me and tell her that we pray for her, her loved ones and family.

You don't say so, Tiffany, but I sense you feel that all of us adults have somehow failed by allowing the world to come to this. Maybe you are right. You do not differentiate in that sense of betrayal, and perhaps that is a normal reaction for a young person today.

And what could I say to you, Rachel, when you asked me earlier this week what war was happening in the world and why a war was coming?

It seems that what you really wanted to know is that no matter what happens, you will be safe and warm with your teddy bears,

that your mother and I will love, hug and protect you. When you are 6, the world is somehow less complex.

Many years ago—before either of you was born and indeed before your mother and I were born, the world fell into a war that touched the entire earth.

Your grandparents and many others put their lives on hold and prayed.

Many people died and the lives of many others were altered and shaped by that experience.

Even today, a half-century later, your grandparents speak of those events as if they were yesterday.

I cannot tell either of you, my girls, how this will end. Like all Americans, your mother and I pray for a quick resolution.

We pray for the well-being of all of American and all Allied servicemen and women who are in danger.

We pray for the wisdom of both our leaders and for Iraq's, that they may soon see a way more rapidly out of war.

And we pray for both of you, my girls, and the world you will inherit.

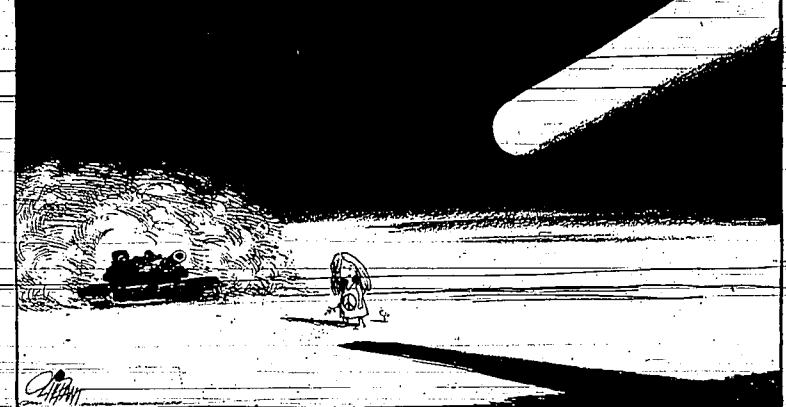

Eastern Idaho wants Targhee to grow

IDAHO FALLS — Eastern Idaho residents are continuing to question plans for a \$27.3-million expansion of Grand Targhee Ski Resort. At a public hearing Wednesday night in Idaho Falls, people asked whether the expansion will leave any room at the resort for local day skiers. They asked how tax revenues generated by the Alta, Wyo., facility would be shared with Teton County, Idaho — winter figures to rise most as demand for services. And they wanted to know how the expanded resort will affect nearby wilderness areas. But Grand Targhee owner Mory Bergmeyer asked residents and U.S. Forest Service officials to consider the economic impact on the Teton Valley if his resort fails.

Ex-Kuwait resident supports gulf war

IDAHO FALLS — Saddam Hussein must be stopped. That's all there is to it for Donald Latham, who lived in Kuwait for 10 years and was trapped there for four months after Iraq invaded the Persian Gulf nation Aug. 2. Nothing but force will stop Saddam and he will stop at nothing to get what he wants, Latham said Thursday while visiting his sister, Velma Edson, in Idaho Falls. "I think he will make some," Latham said. "He will kill some of our own people." The Albuquerque, N.M., man witnessed Saddam's aggression first-hand while working with an American company in Kuwait. When Iraqi troops invaded, Latham saw some of his friends killed and others taken to concentration camps. Two weeks later, Latham and his father, Gene Hughes, went into hiding.

Complaints prompt PUC investigation

BOISE — Complaints from local customers have prompted state utility regulators to launch an investigation into Idaho Power Co.'s quality of service in the Salmon area. The Idaho Public Utilities Commission announced the probe Wednesday in response to what it said were calls and letters from dissatisfied customers. The commission staff and company representatives will meet with Salmon-area residents and inspect the electric system there as soon as winter snows have melted. Five Salmon-area customers contacted the PUC this month about outage problems and asked to be heard in a pending Meridian Gold Co. vs. Idaho Power case scheduled to be heard by the commission Jan. 29 in Boise. That case deals with allocation of transmission installation costs to serve Meridian Gold's Beartrack Mine at the old Leesburg site, about 12 miles west of Salmon.

Accused killer pleads innocent in Boise

BOISE — A man accused of killing a 32-year-old-Boise-nian-in-November during a party pleaded innocent to a first-degree murder charge. Fourth District Judge Alan Schwartzman scheduled George Kersey, 57, for a two-week trial starting May 13. Authorities allege Kersey killed Michael Lee Arnevik on Nov. 26 because Arnevik was trying to steal his girlfriend of three days and was "letting her share a jug of wine." Defense attorneys maintain Kersey fired in self-defense. A friend was shot five times with a .25-caliber pistol in the living room of a victim's apartment.

House fire victim's remains identified

OROFINO — Officials have identified the remains of a northern Idaho woman, who was the victim of a house fire. Janice Berger, 44, lived alone about 10 miles outside Orofino, along Lower Fords Creek. She was found dead Tuesday in her home, which has been destroyed by fire. Clearwater County Sheriff Nick Albers said the fire apparently was started by an electrical short and no foul play was suspected. The fire in Berger's wood-frame home apparently started about noon Sunday, Albers said. The sheriff said the remote location of the home may have contributed to the fire not being discovered until a friend of Berger called the building destroyed. Berger's remains were found when authorities arrived later, Albers said. Identification of the remains was made late Tuesday through dental records, Albers said.

St. Anthony farmer chairs water panel

BOISE — St. Anthony farmer Davis Rydalch has been elected chairman of the Idaho Water Resource Board for the coming year. The eight-member panel elected Rydalch during its meeting Thursday in Boise to succeed Gene Grey of Pocatello. Clarence Parr of Heyburn was elected the board's new vice chairman, and Grey will be secretary-treasurer for 1991. Idaho Department of Water Resources spokesman Wayne Haas said.

HOOD RIVER, Ore. (AP) — Two key participants say it is unlikely the salmon summit will produce a recovery plan for the Northwest's dwindling salmon runs, at least not by the summit's final scheduled meeting next week.

At Wright, executive director of the Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference Committee, and Ed Chaney, spokesman for Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unimac, said the best result the summit can produce is a broad framework for a recovery plan.

The job of creating the recovery plan itself would be shunted off to somebody else, the two men said Wednesday. "We have exhausted all of the possible implications and options," Chaney said. "But the two sides still hope to agree on a set of basic principles they will put before the summit next Tuesday and Wednesday in Boise."

"Our objective here is a simple four-letter word," Wright said. "It's fish."

Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., created the summit in an effort to reduce the likelihood that five-Columbia River Basin salmon runs might be added to the nation's endangered species list. The National Marine Fisheries Service is reviewing petitions for such a listing, and will issue preliminary decisions in April and June.

The two officials drove together to Hood River on Tuesday to speak to Lewis and Clark College students.

Before and after, they discussed the complexities of a resolution of the salmon controversy. They also met in Portland on Monday, and further meetings are possible.

They represent the two most polarized elements at the summit table — electric power utilities and fish conservation groups. Each side has several

representatives at the summit table, which also includes representatives from industry, agriculture, state and federal agencies and Indian tribes.

Chaney and Wright made clear that they are not attempting to "cut a deal" or negotiate any kind of settlement for the summit.

Rather, they said, the purpose is to reach an understanding on the philosophical issues that separate the two groups.

Wright said the summit should direct its attention away from the possible listing and focus on a plan that would revive the weak stocks of salmon.

"The fix will require some, fundamentally different thinking," Wright said.

State officials: Pocatello still in running for prison

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho Division of Public Works officials say with at least four suitable sites, there is no reason Pocatello should be out of the running for a \$10 million, 160-bed state women's prison.

The announcement came Thursday, less than a week after the Idaho Board of Correction closed the door on Pocatello. It said local officials had presented no adequate site in Bannock County by the board's Jan. 11 deadline.

Public Works officials, along with representatives of Bannock County's legislative delegation

and city officials, spent much of Wednesday in Pocatello poring over documents and maps.

The city said the most promising sites reviewed include two on Pocatello's West Bench, a third on Phillips Road northwest of Pocatello, and a fourth on the city's east side near the Veterans nursing home now under construction.

The final decision will be up to the Board of Correction, which is expected to act by Jan. 21.

"We didn't see anything here that would not say we can't build a prison in Pocatello," Public Works Director Anne Barker said. "I've given my

report to the governor, and I think he will convey the message to the board about our visit."

Pressure from Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, local officials and Bannock County legislators followed the Board of Correction's vote last Friday that the women's prison should be built on a 160-acre parcel of state-owned land south of Boise.

The board said in December that it wanted to build the facility in Pocatello, but finally decided it had run out for selecting a site in which legislative funding for construction expected to start this summer.

"My parents were really off in space last night," Vaughn said.

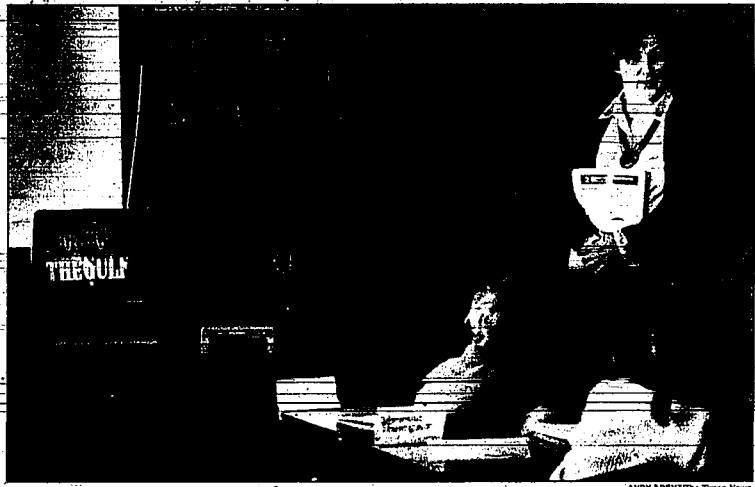

Oil market is down, but don't buy a gas guzzler yet

TWIN FALLS - The shock of plunging oil prices shortly after the outbreak of war probably won't trickle down to customers to any great extent soon.

"There's just a lot of volatility...so it's hard to predict what might happen with our

prices," Chevron spokesman Bob Qundson said.

Chevron USA, Inc., Amoco Corp. and possibly others have frozen wholesale prices to prevent quick price hikes. Several oil companies have also allocated deliveries to avoid hoarding of oil products.

But gas stations and petroleum wholesalers are operating on razor-thin profit

margins, probably the lowest in years. And oil companies are reluctant to reduce prices quickly in the wake of huge price swings the day after war broke out in the Middle East.

The only near certainty in the oil market is volatile trading.

"If something goes wrong, if somebody hits an aircraft carrier or blows up a

drilling platform, this thing is liable to spike back up again," said Dick Cowan, Sinclair Oil Corp. vice president of marketing.

"And that may have happened Thursday night, when missiles landed near Tel Aviv and it appeared Israel was mounting a retaliatory strike.

Desert war has changed, vets say

TWIN FALLS - If American ground troops have to ply entrenched Iraqi forces from Kuwait, the desert battles will likely be very different than those fought in Sicily and North Africa almost 50 years ago, World War II veterans say.

"They have a lot of advantages now that we didn't have in World War II," said Leonard Emerson, 79, of Twin Falls.

America's apparent air superiority and ability to attack at night should make a ground attack easier than that faced by Emerson when his Navy attack group landed at Sicily in 1942.

"It's an entirely different show over there right now," Emerson said. "As long as they can wipe out those (Iraqi) planes, the actual combat's all they have to worry about."

Ground troops in the Mediterranean region during World War II were frequently bombed and strafed by Italian and German fighter planes, Emerson said.

But initial reports from Saudi Arabia indicate that as much as half of Saddam

Hussein's air force has already been destroyed by the massive air strikes begun by the United States and other coalition countries Wednesday afternoon.

Allied troops fighting in Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia in the 1940s had to battle malaria, remembered retired Army Lt. M.J. Bays, 75, of Boise. Bays was involved in the 1942 allied invasion of Morocco and later trained in Algeria before moving on to Sicily.

Modern vaccines have greatly reduced that threat, but desert warfare is still no picnic, Bays said.

"I don't like desert warfare," he said. "The water's bad and it's very hot."

"The desert plays funny things on you," said retired Army Spec. 5 Gilbert Ivey, 77, of Shoshone. "During the day it's hotter than Hades and at night it gets cold."

Ivey spent time in North Africa, Sicily and France during World War II.

Bays said he hopes American war planes will soften up entrenched Iraqi ground troops before U.S. soldiers and tanks have to move into Kuwait.

If the United Nations forces are able to rule the skies, it will enable ground troops to keep supply lines open and receive fresh water and ammunition,

Bays said. "The desert is really miserable at times," said retired Staff Sgt. Joe Froehlich of Hansen. "But you can endure it if it's necessary."

Today's tanks are much faster and more accurate than their World War II predecessors, pointed out Froehlich.

In addition, the air filtration systems are much better at keeping the sand out of the engine and the tank, he said.

"It's pretty hard for me to really tell" what tank battles will be like for American troops in Saudi Arabia and Kuwait, he said. "I've never seen the inside of one of the newer ones."

Any tank, old or new, "is a portable foxhole, but it's a death trap, too, if you get hit," Bays noted.

Patience is the key to success on the ground, Ivey said. "Young soldiers are often anxious to go in and get this daggone thing over with," he said, while more seasoned commanders are willing to wait until the time is right to attack.

"The troops just have to follow their leaders and have patience," he said.

Residents looking at bond issue to fix older school buildings

HAZELTON—Residents of the Eden and Hazelton communities are discussing a bond issue election and have received the full support of the Valley School Board.

The residents are worried about the condition of the district's school buildings, which are old and out of date.

Nick Fife and Mark Okelberry attended the School Board meeting this past week to

explain the community's ideas on the issue and to ask how the board viewed this proposal.

"We're at the point where we've got to do something," Fife said.

"If we sleep on this, we might get consolidated... and nobody wants that," he said.

Fife and Okelberry pointed out that this community group is flexible on how the money from a school bond issue election could be used since there are many options, such as building a new school or remodeling the old schools.

They said completely different ideas might be discussed or introduced during future public meetings.

The community-based group will be mailing a survey to gauge the community's interest in a bond issue election and will work to get a plan ready for a vote in May.

Several bond issue elections have been proposed and defeated in the past.

After the surveys are returned, the group will hold several meetings, beginning in February, to hear positive and negative comments from the people.

Although the issue is being brought up by members of the community, the group's representatives said they would like to have the full support of the board because there could be some expenses in the later stages of this project, which the board could help cover.

Since the board has voted in favor of supporting the school bond issue, it will have the final decision as far as which architect or plan to follow, with full comment from the community.

In other matters, School Board Chairman Keith Huettig has been nominated by the ex-

ecutive board of the National School Board Association to be a member.

He received unanimous support in Oregon last week and will be officially named at the national convention in San Francisco this April.

Superintendent Arlyn Bodily said that "this is quite and honor for Keith and us."

Other honorees for the Valley School District go to Marc Stusny, who is going to Germany as a State Future Farmers of America officer, and to Erin Erickson who is a finalist to be a page in the State Senate.

Blaine County gets stream extension

HAILEY — A building moratorium has been extended to April 1 to give the Blaine County commissioners time to adopt a complex stream setback ordinance.

The moratorium prohibits construction within 100 feet to riverbanks and it restricts any disturbance of vegetation within this area.

This interim moratorium extends an emergency moratorium that will expire Jan. 23.

After a public hearing regarding a revamped stream setback ordinance, the commissioners decided the document had been altered to the extent that it should go back to the Planning and Zoning Commission for another round of public hearings.

The overall importance of this kind of document to the county is paramount," said Bruce Lium, a member of the committee formed to draw up a "compromise" proposal to replace the original setback ordinance.

The original ordinance was hotly disputed by real estate agents and riverfront property owners this past September.

Renamed the Riparian Management Ordinance, the 34-page document establishes criteria for how far away from streams and riverbanks buildings must be constructed.

In an effort to preserve the riparian habitat found along the county's rivers and streams.

While the original ordinance called for a blanket setback of 100 feet on all Blaine County rivers and streams, the new ordinance separates waterways into four classifications, with different setbacks for each one.

A Class 2 stream — which includes all Chip Creek — has the lowest setback during years of normal main-

tenance. He said the "Big Wood River is such an important public resource that the Fish and Game Department would support the maximum protection along its banks."

Committee member Pawan Mehra, however, did not agree. He said a 100-foot setback on the Big Wood had been proposed by the committee and the 50-foot designation was the best compromise for all.

"I don't want to give you the power, guys, to tell me what I should do," Mehra said.

Although the investigation, research and categorization of stream types was extensive, many criticized the ordinance as being "an administrative nightmare."

The document stipulates special permits must be obtained from the county planning office for certain types of riparian management.

For instance, permits must be obtained to thin trees and underbrush to gain a view of the river, and before removing vegetation that may be "endangering public health, safety or welfare."

The ordinance also calls for property owners to obtain permission from county commissioners before ripping their riverbanks in the event of an emergency flood.

The property owner, however, must mitigate the measure by replanting at their expense the ripbank and restoring the river and its banks to normal.

A special meeting of the Blaine County Planning and Zoning Commission will be scheduled to review the ordinance after it is fine-tuned and to take public testimony.

The ordinance will then be moved forward to the county commissioners who then pass it as an emergency ordinance, which means it would take effect immediately.

full — calls for a setback from the high water mark or the top of the bank of 50 feet.

The Big Wood River, East Fork, Warm Springs Creek, Deer Creek, Trail Creek and several others fall under this classification.

Intermittent or ephemeral streams are grouped under a Class 3 category and require a 25-foot setback.

And Class 4 streams, which are dry streambeds, have no required setback.

The ordinance also establishes a 15-foot "buffer" zone in which no construction can take place except for decks and outbuildings.

For instance, on property adjacent to a Class 2 stream, there is a minimum of a 50-foot riparian setback plus another required 15-foot "buffer" zone to the edge of the foundation.

The buffer zone is needed because construction disturbs the ground and vegetation around the site, said John Gaeddert, assistant county planning director.

A Class 1 stream requires a 100-foot setback. But streams can only earn that classification when the majority of property owners with deed title to land adjacent to the stream ask the county commissioners to upgrade the stream or a section of stream to Class 1.

Such an upgrade could only be made on grounds that the stream has habitat and supports threatened and endangered species, is a critical wildlife habitat, is a flood hazard area or is of significant public benefit.

Commissioner Tom Blanchard said that while he thinks the body of the ordinance is excellent, he would like to make the Big Wood a Class 1 stream and require property owners to maintain a 100-foot riparian management area.

Jerome city pool use may dry up

JEROME — The malfunctioning city pool will be fixed by May or not at all.

Councilman Rocky Jackson has reported to the City Council.

Castleford School Board to look at repairs

CASTLEFORD — The School Board has approved a priority list of long-range building improvement needs.

"Someplace down the line, a few years from now, these things need to be done," said Superintendent Henry Kilmer. "And it would help for planning purposes to decide what our priorities are."

After reviewing the list at its meeting Wednesday night, the board decided that repairing or replacing the vocational-agriculture building's leaking roof must be the district's top priority.

Remodeling the outdated and inadequate gym locker rooms earned second priority. And additional work on the gym, such as repairing the ceiling and floor and remodeling the snack bar, won third place on the list.

The music room, located in an old and separate building, received the fourth priority spot. One suggestion is to move the music facilities to the

cafeteria area of the main school building to create a multi-purpose room.

Priority was given to the outdoor area behind the school. This includes the possibility of paving the parking area.

In his superintendent's report, Kilmer told the board that repair bills for broken pipes and water damage in the elementary building and the gym may total as much as \$2,000.

Kilmer also reported that a survey seeking "community opinion" about school program, facilities and other issues "will be conducted" in February.

Principal Kelly Murphy reported that the Castleford school district is one of five schools selected by Boise State University to participate in a grant program featuring computer technology into the school's satellite learning system.

This will supply a greater exchange of information during satellite classes, "and our cost will be nil," Murphy said.

In other business, the board:

- Decided to put out for bid some repair and energy conservation work needed at the elementary school.
- Requested that students and others attending school functions, such as basketball games, not park their vehicles between the music room and the school. A sign must be kept clear for any emergency vehicles, such as fire trucks or quick response units, to access the gym area.
- Seven recycling bins will be placed on the school grounds, to be managed by student organizations.
- The teachers' report was given by sixth-grade teacher Richard Dykes. Dykes told the board that his class is a transitional class between elementary and secondary school, and prepares students for middle school.
- The sixth-graders gave officers and are involved in student government, like the higher grades, he said.
- Dykes also reported that his class has new health, social studies and science textbooks and that the students are planning two spring field trips.

Judge dismisses verdict against bank officials

BOISE (AP) — An Ada County judge has dismissed a jury verdict against two former Idaho State Bank officers, finding no evidence of individual liability or personal gain.

A following a 4th District Court trial, a jury on Jan. 29 that former bank President Harry Knox III and former Vice President Ann Neavill acted illegally in a complex series of dealings with a Boise business man.

Petros and Janet Eliopoulos, who claimed in the suit their agricultural ventures were forced into financial ruin, were awarded \$482,500 in damages. No additional punitive damages were awarded.

Judge Deborah Bail ruled on appeal that Knox and Neavill, who are brother and sister, didn't exceed the scope of their employment and therefore could not be individually

liable.

Boise attorney Thomas Chandler, representing the Eliopoulos, said Wednesday he is "reviewing the decision and trying to consider the next step."

Knox, 37, of King Hill and Neavill, 34, of Anchorage, Alaska, were convicted last year in U.S. District Court and sentenced to prison for allegedly using bank funds.



TWIN FALLS — "Imago" is a derivative of the Latin word for image.

"We wanted a kind of obscure word," explained Jerry Mousaw, co-founder of the theater mask ensemble that will appear at the College of Southern Idaho on Tuesday. It's a poetic word, too, he added.

It's also a word that also evokes imagination.

Just a few dozen people attended Imago's workshop performance last summer at O'Leary Junior High School.

But those who did ranged in age from toddlers to senior citizens. All sat entranced by Imago's imaginative, multi-sensory blend of drama, mime, music and dance.

The young children squealed with laughter as the masked performers cavorted on stage, taking on the shapes of worms, monkeys, frogs and beams of light. And the adults smiled, both at the youngsters' reactions and the performance itself.

"I marveled at how an actor can become something else," he recalled.

Two years later, Mousaw and Carol Uselman created Imago. Since then, the company has performed on three continents, touring an average of seven months a year from its base in Portland, Ore.

Perhaps one reason behind Imago's success is that what the company does is so unlike what other troupes do — and definitely different from what Americans usually see on stage, screen or television.

Yet, unlike some avant garde theater or performance art that appeals only to a few, Imago's work is accessible and often funny.

Mousaw sees parallels between mask ensemble work and music.

"You take music; you play it abroad, and someone can understand it immediately," he said. "In our work, the same thing is apparent."

Despite its immediacy, Imago's work — like music — has many layers. Children laugh at the masks and physical antics; adults can appreciate deeper layers and underlying themes.

Mousaw says the show Imago will bring to Twin Falls next week is different

from the one seen last summer. "This one is more formally staged, with more lighting and more visuals," he explained.

The company — which includes Mousaw and Uselman (who are married), Fiely Matias and Graydon Kouri — will perform 10 pieces.

One is "Larvabatic," a popular piece seen here last summer in which a whimsical creature — character, twists, slithers and hops about the stage.

Another is a new piece based on the story of Dr. Frankenstein in Imago's version, the doctor creates a monster and teaches it to become an artist. At first, the monster paints traditional pictures, which please his creator. But when the monster turns to abstract art, watch out.

After seeing Imago's show, many viewers believe the players must be incredibly fit to withstand the contortions they're seemingly performing.

"We get that comment a lot," Mousaw said. "But mostly, it's an illusion."

"We have to have people who know how to move," he added. "But we're not as physical as a dancer or a gymnast. We use our bodies differently than a dancer would."

In addition to the weird and wonderful music, Imago's performance includes original music and costumes. "We create everything you see," said Mousaw.

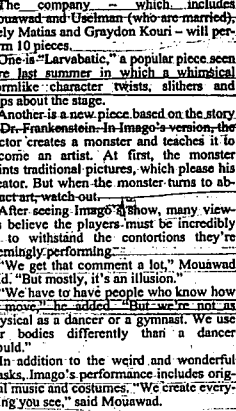

Family Channel works to shed its religious image

The Family Channel has gone through more incarnations than Shirley MacLaine.

Well, maybe not that many, but the basic cable channel bares little resemblance to the 24-hour-day CBN (Christian Broadcasting Network) Satellite Service that premiered years ago to bring evangelist Pat Robertson's "The 700 Club" to cable subscribers.

Today the channel, while still home to "The 700 Club," is getting more viewers and more revenue from a mix of family programming that includes new programs and movies mixed with airings of reruns of network TV series.

Despite its financial success, however, the Family Channel is still trying to buck its image as the Christian network.

The network was started by Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network in 1977 to bring "The 700 Club" and other church shows to cable. Robertson's national exposure on CBN helped him launch an unsuccessful campaign for the Republican presidential nomination in 1988.

The network's first reincarnation came in 1981, when it became CBN Cable Network, an advertiser-supported entertainment network, still owned by CBN.

Although the network initially depended on reruns of such chestnuts as "My Little Margie" and "Bachelor Father," it began producing its own series the same year, including a weekday morning program called "U.S. a.m.," the daily soap opera "Another Life," and the animated children's series "Superbook" and "The Flying House."

In 1986, CBN Cable Network added reruns of "Hunt for McConkie," straight off ABC, and co-produced with Canada the new dramatic series "The Campbells." Another new series, "Butterfly Island," joined the lineup the following year. (None of these series are now on the schedule.)

Two years ago the network changed its name again, this time to the CBN Family Channel. In 1989 it dropped the CBN name entirely and was christened The Family Channel.

In the process, the subscriber base has grown from 10.9 million households in 1981 to more than 51 million households this year, making it the eighth-largest basic cable network.

Run today by Tim Robertson, the evangelist's 35-year-old son, the Family Channel describes itself as providing "new, exclusive shows and golden oldies that can be enjoyed by the entire family — programming that is entertaining without being offensive."

That means no sex, violence, car chases or bad language.

There are still repeats of such classic Westerns as "Wagon Train" and "The Virginian" and the cult series "Beauty and the Beast," but most of the schedule consists of original movies, children's programming and eight

original "wholesome" series including the Western "Bordertown," a new version of "Zorro," "The Adventures of the Black Stallion" featuring Mickey Rooney, "Big Brother Jake," a sitcom starring trainer to the stars Steve Steinfield, and the offbeat comedy "Maniac Mansion," featuring SCTV veterans and produced by George Lucas' Lucasfilms.

In January, CBN sold the Family Channel to International Family Entertainment, a new partnership headed by the Robertsons and the Denver cable company, Tele-Communications Inc., and several more hours of non-CBN produced religious programming Saturday and Sunday evenings and Sunday mornings. The religious shows are all paid programming.

Robertson agreed that some subscribers still view the Family Channel as primarily a religious network.

"It is one of those things that is going to take time to get past," he said. "We have a major campaign, which we are launching in 1991, a very serious campaign to let people know exactly what the Family Channel is and what we program and what we can see when they watch us."

Some critics maintain the Family Channel's series and original movies have religious overtones. Channels magazine recently stated: "A religious vision for the channel is still very much in evidence, and that has kept Family Channel from finding a balance between the wholesome and the holy."

Such criticism rankles Robertson: "What we do are programs which we hope look at the world from a perspective that tries to base itself in the Judeo-Christian

LOS ANGELES — It didn't take long for "LA Law" newsmonger John Spencer to discover he'd made a formidable impression on the show's typically intense fans.

Three of my episodes had aired, and then I was out shopping for Christmas presents for friends and family back East," Spencer says. "One thing that was not inside the walls of the firm was someone who was basically 'street,' and Tommy Mullaney does that," Kelley says. "He goes against the polish of the other members of the firm. making headlines during the last four years, "General Hospital," too, has been exhibiting signs of stagnation.

The answer seemed obvious. Monty was persuaded to return as executive producer. Anthony is rejoining the show as another member of the Spencer clan (not Luke, everybody stresses).

"Well, I'm under a gag order not to say too much," said Geary, who will return to "General Hospital" in mid-February. "We are still working on right down to what he's going to look like."

Although Monty started working

Baseball film parallels lives of its players

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Life will be imitating art in the upcoming baseball movie "Talent for the Game."

Jeff Corbett plays New York writer Sammy Boddem, a pitching phenomenon who is discovered by the big leagues. And Corbett, rookie actor, is getting his big break in the movie, too.

He joins Edward James Olmos, Lorraine Bracco and a batch of baseball legends in the tale of a baseball scout and his once-in-a-lifetime find.

Corbett's father and brother were standout players in school, but he didn't set the world on fire as an outfielder.

"So, to-and- behold, probably the most athlete in the whole family gets to do a big league movie," Corbett said during a break in filming at Dodger Stadium.

"There's some sort of justice in there, 'cause they always made fun of me with my .225 batting average in high school, and now it will cost them seven bucks to see the movie just like everyone else," he said.

Olmos, nominated for an Academy Award for his portrayal of math teacher Jaime Escalante in "Stand and Deliver," stars as Virgil Sweet.

Sweet's life is anything but, except in spring when fast balls smack into catcher's mitts. He finds Boddem and signs him up with the California Angels — Bracco ("GoodFellas," "Someone to Watch Over Me") is savvy Bobbie Henderson, a spokeswoman for the major league team.

The story is of innocence lost, love found, deceit and the perennial magic of baseball.

Like Corbett, Olmos is a real-life baseball aficionado. A star player in little league, he says the game taught him discipline, determination and a key ingredient, patience.

"When I was small, my whole dream was to play baseball as a career, as a life," Olmos said. "I never thought I'd be given the opportunity or the chance to make a baseball movie. This came as quite a surprise and I think probably one of the biggest blessings I've had in my career."

Olmos' life and that of his movie character are similar. Olmos was a California state batting champion while playing catcher in the little league. Virgil Sweet also was a local baseball star. In Sweet's case, a promising career was cut short by an arm injury. In Olmos' life, a blossoming career was shunted aside for

his love of music and theater.

Although the movie concerns the California Angels, the team's Anaheim Stadium was unavailable for filming because of the Los Angeles Rams also play football there. So the film's crew fixed up Dodger Stadium to look like the "Big A."

"Talent" stunt coordinator and former minor leaguer Ken Medlock is pleased with the look of the movie and the athletes in it.

"We get people that can and know how to play the game. That really helps when you start to choreograph a baseball film. We've never seen a lot of that in a lot of good baseball movies," he said.

"This is going to be a wonderful love story and hopefully we're going to have a lot of good baseball to go

along with it," said Medlock, who played outfield and pitcher for the farm clubs of the Dodgers, Angels and San Francisco Giants.

Director Robert Young ("Triumph of the Spirit," "Extremities") says baseball complements the story and isn't worried about the recent proliferation of baseball pictures.

"I don't care how many baseball movies there are, it's a great sport. Young said this has a lot of the flavor of baseball but also has wonderful characters. It's very alive and funny and human and dramatic."

He may even be banking on the recent popularity of baseball movies.

Baseball movies used to strike out at the box office, primarily, it's thought, because they were too obscure for non-sports fans here and

most everyone overseas.

When independent producer Thom Mount shipped around his "Bull Durham," five studios passed. Then Orion Pictures said yes, and the movie went on to make \$50.3 million in 1988.

The next year, "Field of Dreams" took in \$62 million and "Major League" made \$49.8 million.

On the other hand, the 1988 drama "Eight Men Out," a story about the scandal-tainted 1919 World Series, was a critical success and a box-office flop.

So Hollywood is still pitching baseball. A new baseball film, "One Cup of Coffee," will be unveiled later this month, and "Talent for the Game" is scheduled to open when baseball does — in early spring.

Olmos said it has been fun yet troublesome — filming his first baseball movie.

"When you get to start playing with the pros the game intensifies immensely," he said. "They do not slack off just because I'm an actor."

"Since I'm 43 years old and I haven't really been playing for the last 30 years like they have, it's very difficult."

"Through the Fire," by a native South African currently living in Boston, is an account of the trial of five leaders of the United Democratic Front, a major anti-apartheid group.

Orion sets record with 13 productions

Universal to reconstruct 'Spartacus'

NEW YORK — In a major step toward the preservation of classic motion pictures, Universal Pictures will reconstruct and restore the 1960 epic motion picture "Spartacus," directed by Stanley Kubrick and produced by Kirk Douglas, who also stars.

As part of the restoration process, five minutes of footage cut from the original "Spartacus" will be added to the picture along with the original overture and intermission.

Released in 1960, "Spartacus" marked Kubrick's fifth feature film as a director. In addition to Douglas, the cast included Sir Laurence Olivier, Jean Simmons, Charles Laughton, Peter Ustinov and Tony Curtis. Dalton Trumbo wrote the screenplay based on Howard Fast's best-selling novel.

"Spartacus" was nominated for six Academy Awards and won four, including supporting actor for Ustinov, and cinematography for Russell Metty.

The restorative process will be completed by early 1991.

CNN's war performance may have changed face of TV news

The easiest job around during these first days of war — publicist for CNN.

Until the Iraqis ordered the cable network's three Baghdad-based correspondents to cease their live, phoned-in reports Thursday, the world — from the White House to Saddam Hussein's ministries — followed the trio's personalized coverage from their ninth-floor hotel room.

And the unsolicited tributes were everywhere, all of them supporting CNN's claim to be the one to watch when the big story happens.

Several network affiliates around the country abandoned their networks' coverage and began airing CNN. "CNN seemed to be a little ahead of ABC in information," said news director Dick Moore of WSOE-TV in Charlotte, N.C., who ordered the switch in the few hours of Thursday.

Unable to reach his own man in Iraq, NBC anchor Tom Brokaw was reduced to interviewing CNN's Bernard Shaw — one of the "Boys of Baghdad," as CNN anchor David

French dubbed Shaw, John Holliman and Peter Amett — CNN used to be called the little network that could, Brokaw told viewers after hanging up.

America's top military leaders saluted CNN's Baghdad-based coverage during Wednesday and Thursday meetings with reporters. "The best reporting that I've seen on what transpired in Baghdad was on CNN," said Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

Cheney's revelation that he was glued to CNN — along with it, turned out, Joint Chiefs Chairman Colin Powell — was not a big surprise.

Washington's news junkies have long been fans of the 10-year-old, Atlanta-based cable network. "The reason's simple: It's the only network around that offers news — and nothing else — 24 hours a day."

But what happened Wednesday night was that the ranks of news junkies increased. "The world over turned to TV to tell them what was going on. The networks tried to accommodate them by offering around-the-clock coverage. But minute-for-minute, CNN bested them all, beaming the latest to 103 countries — a global reach the networks can't begin to match."

CNN may not have been in a position to achieve its Wednesday-night glory without a little help from the Iraqi government. CNN and the network's all asked Hussein's government for permission to install a "No. 4 wire" — a private, dedicated open phone line that doesn't go through the standard switching system of a standard telephone.

Only CNN got permission. So on Wednesday night, CNN's Baghdad trio stayed on the line, loud and clear, throughout the harrowing allied air attack on Iraq.

ABC's Gary Shepard actually reported the first signs of the attack. But ABC soon lost contact with Shepard. CBS and NBC had similar problems throughout the night.

By Thursday morning, Americans returning to work appeared to talk almost as much about CNN's Baghdad team as the attack itself.

It was Holliman who went on first with news that Baghdad was finally under siege; "Atlanta, it's Holliman. There's shooting in the night sky. We'll leave the microphone by the window."

Amett, a Pulitzer prize-winning correspondent, who also reported from Vietnam, coolly and precisely

sized up the situation for viewers: "I think some of them had to be 2,000-pound bombs. Seems to be direct hits on other buildings."

Shaw, unable to sleep and crawling through the hotel hallway, was the most melodramatic: "Clearly, I've never been there. But it feels like we are in the center of Hell."

It's been predicted many times before, but Wednesday night may have finally changed the face of TV news.

Galas will mark comedian's 95th birthday

Will Smith takes a look at 'Fresh Prince,' beyond

LOS ANGELES — Resplendent in a red, orange, green and black leather jacket, Will Smith seems anything but mild.

His "Fresh Prince of Bel-Air" isn't the bust-out TV hit many had predicted. But it's the highest-rated new series of the season. And it usually wins its time period in competition with CBS' "Evening Shade" and ABC's "MacGyver."

"I don't have ANYTHING to complain about right now," Smith says, six months after the media and NBC Entertainment Group Chairman Brandon Tartikoff teamed to raise great expectations. "Our problem isn't that people don't like the show. Our problem is there's an (older) age group that hasn't turned the show on. But I could give a damn about numbers and all that. I want to make this show funny, period."

Smith, 22, plays a street-wise Philly kid sent to live with his aunt and uncle in their Bel-Air mansion. The series is co-produced by a composer Quincy Jones, who branched into television after winning almost two major Grammys to count. He has accumulated some creature comforts, too.

"Some black people were saying, 'Black people just don't live like this,'" Smith says. "That's why Man, Quincy Jones has the butler, the security guard, the 'French cook' for black-American, we need to see that it is out there. You get brainwashed into thinking it's not real. But it's out there for everybody. People who would like to make you think it was hard to get it. So you don't even take your shot. It is NOT that hard."

Smith and his two sisters and brother were raised in Philadelphia by middle-class parents. His father is a refrigeration engineer

and his mother works for the Philadelphia school board. "But I don't want them to work any more. They're retiring," Smith says.

Smith's money has been talking since he began rapping as The Fresh Prince, with partner D.J. Jazzy Jeff. Their hit singles include "Girls Ain't Nothin' But Trouble" and "I Think I Can Beat Mike Tyson." A fourth album, still to be titled, is due in March. It'll be "a smash hit," says Smith, who is reticent only when talking about his first movie, scheduled to begin shooting in late March.

"I'll be a computer genius, a whiz kid," he says. "I don't know if I'm supposed to be talking about it just yet. There's murderers and explosions and fires. An action comedy."

Smith volunteers another update. "I'm in love," he says, with a woman named Tanya Moore, whom he met in Los Angeles three years ago.

His 60-hour work week on the "Fresh Prince" is more demanding than expected. "It's not just standing up, telling a joke and getting a paycheck," he says.

He plans to hire an acting coach to help him with his first movie role. "I'm starting to feel like 'I can do better,'" he says. "But I want it to happen now. I want to be like Denzel Washington, who won an Oscar last year for his role in 'Glory'."

Smith says he has turned down offers to do commercials because his manager has advised him. "Let's build a career rather than just try to get everything we can get right now."

He'll also agreeably shave the goatee he has grown — "It's my Malcolm X look" — during a two-week break in production of "Fresh Prince."

LAS VEGAS (AP) — George Burns, the ageless comedian who's touched the hearts and tickled the fancy of generations, turns 95 Sunday with a gala birthday weekend planned in the foothills he loves.

Special parties are planned at Caesars-Palace tonight and Saturday night, with celebrities joining V.I.P.s in a toast to the entertainment legend.

The focal point of the two nights will be Burns back on stage, doing the patter, the song-and-soff-shoe-ho-ho done for decades.

Burns is winding up a five-year contract at the Strip resort. He bulked at a 10-year deal at age 90, joking he wasn't sure Caesars would be around that long. And he's planning on playing the London Palladium five years from now, a vow he made to mark his 100th birthday.

How does he do it?
"When you walk out on stage and all that love comes over the footlights, it gives you a lot of energy," Burns said in a recent telephone interview from Los Angeles. "If you just asked me to get out and stand someplace for an hour, I couldn't do it. But the love you feel from the audience keeps you going."

On the go is what George Burns is all about. He just released his eighth book, "All My Best Friends," a nostalgic look at show business legends he's known and worked with dating back to vaudeville days. A new "Oh, God!" movie — his fourth — is being written for him. And he's a regular at Caesars resorts in Las Vegas, Atlantic City and Lake Tahoe.

He's just taped a TV birthday special with his famous friends to be aired on CBS Feb. 1.

And he was nominated last week for a Grammy for his book "Gracie: A Love Story" — a poignant recollection of his 38-year marriage to the late Gracie Allen. The nomination is in the Spoken for Non-Musical category.

How does he feel with birthday No. 95 just days away?
"I feel just as good at 95 as I did at 94," he quipped in his trademark raspy voice. "I love what I'm doing. I'm smoking a cigar right now. It's nice to love what you do and get paid for it."
"To be 95 and get out of bed and

like what you're gonna do that day, there's nothing like the feeling. It's important for me to want to get out of bed each day because I don't think I can make any money in bed."

Born Nathan Birnbaum on Jan. 20, 1896, Burns has been in show business an incredible 87 years, dating back to the time when he quit grammar school and organized a group of child singers known as the PeeWee Quartet. A member of a poor family growing up on New York's lower East Side, he had only to look to his 11 brothers and sisters for his own entourage.

He bounced around vaudeville as a trick-roller-skater and struggling comic, then hit his stride when he teamed with the "zany Gracie" in 1923. The two became stars of radio in 1932, moving to television in 1950.

Their move to TV was one of the ironies of his career, Burns recalled.

They were having dinner with Jack Benny's agent when Benny was asked to do a nine-minute spot on the budding medium known as

television. Benny wasn't available and Burns volunteered the services of Burns and Allen.

The husband and wife were a hit, and the "Burns and Allen Show" ran until 1959, when Gracie retired. She died of a heart attack in 1964, taking a part of her soul mate with her.

"George will always have this special love for Gracie," Irving Fein, Burns' manager and longtime friend, once recalled. "He goes to her grave, (in Los Angeles) once a month. He talks to her, tells her everything he's doing. He'll say, 'I just got back from Vegas. We did great.' He'll spend a lot of time just standing there, talking to her, letting her know what's happening in his life. She's still a very special part of his life."

Burns gives Gracie credit for his success.

"If it wasn't for Gracie, I wouldn't be here," he says. "I would be in show business, but not where I am." Ask him the highlight of his career, and Gracie dominates the response.

"There were a lot of things. When I met Gracie. When I married Gracie. When we played the Palace. When we first went on radio, then on TV. When Gracie retired. It was just down the Strip from Caesars 30 years ago that Burns helped launch the career of a teenager named Ann-Margret, started the late Bobby Darin on his career and crowned with his late friend, Jack Benny.

After Gracie's death, he played clubs around the country, then took over Benny's role in "The Sunshine Boys," which won him an Oscar.

He hesitates when asked if there's anything he'd like to change, then answers: "I wish vaudeville would come back, so I could start all over again. I always loved what I was doing. You're very, very lucky if you can fall in love with what you're doing."

Meanwhile, he continues to aim for that performance five years from now in London.

"I've booked for two weeks (at the Palladium)," he says, matter-of-factly. "If I don't like my dressing room, the deal's off. When I win I do the same things I'm doing right now."

Written by Sonia Manzano ("Maria" on "Sesame Street"), who also writes for the regular TV series, this video helps children understand what goes on at a hospital and overcome their fears of visiting. It is also comforting for those wondering

what to expect during a hospital stay.

Added pleasure comes from two original songs: "Busy Getting Better All the Time" and "You Have to Be Patient to Be a Patient."

The visit to the firehouse also has an original song, "Waiting for the Bell to Ring." This video shows Big Bird, Elmo, Gordon and friends being invited to tour the firehouse after Oscar's trash can barbecue gets a little too smoky.

Real firefighters show them how equipment like hoses, trucks and ladders work, as well as what firemen do between alarms. Tony Award-nominee Bob Gunton plays the chief.

Young viewers also learn what a smoke detector is and get some useful tips on what to do in a fire. Big Bird and his pals even get to watch firefighters battle a fire and rescue a trapped monster.

There are more than 3,000 children's titles out there in videotape. Studies show that by the time a child reaches 18, he or she will have spent about 1,000 hours in front of a TV set.

Some concerned parents have turned to their VCR and videos that educate. This series does just that.

'Mo Better Blues' director launches into riff, forgets the theme

Another film from maverick director Spike Lee, and a western sequel, top this week's list of new videos.

MO' BETTER BLUES (1990) (MCA/Universal) 129 minutes, 2½ stars. Denzel Washington, Spike Lee, Joie Lee, Cyndia Williams. Lee's previous film, "Do the Right Thing," is arguably a masterpiece, so it should be no surprise that "Mo" is less. The film plays like a jazz soloist who launches into a riff and then forgets the theme, and it often has the feel of a director making a statement without being sure of what he wants to say. Washington is the protagonist, a gifted trumpeter who learns some hard lessons in the world outside his music. Full of director Lee's earthy and sardonic humor, but also meandering in stretches. The soundtrack, with Terence Blanchard dubbing Washington's solos, is superb.

Schwarzenegger's performance flawless

"Kindergarten Cop" may be regarded as the peak in the career of Arnold Schwarzenegger, who began his professional career as a muscle man, then moved on to motion pictures, finally making it as a real actor in the new film.

His performance is without flaw. There is absolutely nothing wrong with it. There is nothing wrong with the film, either.

Directed by Ivan Reitman, "Kindergarten Cop" is a combination of comedy and thrill. Despite its PG-13 rating, however, the film is not recommended for small children. Parents, misled by the title, are taking their kids to see the film, and they shouldn't, particularly the smaller children. Some of "Kindergarten Cop" takes place in the kindergarten, but much of it does not, and some of the film may frighten the very young.

In the movie, Schwarzenegger is John Kimble, undercover cop who tells everyone he was born in Austria, which is the best way to get past

that accent. Actually, the writers don't really try to get past it. They embrace it, use it to good advantage. They have Pamela Reed, pose as Schwarzenegger's sister, complete with the Austrian accent.

Schwarzenegger is looking for a murderer whose wife and young son have fled and changed their names. All the cop knows is that the boy is enrolled in a kindergarten class in a small town in Oregon. He has to find the boy, then persuade the child's mother to testify against her husband, a mad man.

Richard Tyson plays the murderous husband, and he, too, is looking for the school. When he finds it, he heads for the kindergarten class, where the climax of this consistently amusing, frequently suspenseful film takes place.

Schwarzenegger proved he could do comedy in "Twins." In "Kindergarten Cop," he proves that he can do both comedy and drama. He has come a long way. While it is true that the new film has been tailored to fit his talents, he makes the most

of the role.

Reed is quite good as his partner. Linda Hunt is the principal of the school, where most of the action takes place. Penelope Ann Miller is the woman on the run, and Carroll Baker is the mother of the killer.

The role of the mother is a twist for Baker. As the bad man's mom, she is a true Ma Barker, a woman

who will kill to protect her boy. The irony, of course, is that Mom looks like a suburban housewife, not the kind of woman who would do anything to save her son, including taking shots at Schwarzenegger.

"Kindergarten Cop" is another of those movies that is far better than the trailers that promote them. Go, she is a true Ma Barker, a woman—but leave the smaller kids at home.

"AWAKENINGS" (PG-13)—Based on Oliver Sacks' true-life account of encephalitic patients revived; for a time by a new wonder drug in 1969; this Penny Marshall film has some heartfelt moments and a lot of corn. It's a grade A tearjerker: call it "Brain Man." As doctor and patient, Robin Williams and Robert De Niro have a steady rapport that takes some of the starch out of the overly schematic scenario.

HOME ALONE (PG) A 7-year-old child (Macaulay Culkin) is left behind by his parents when they jet to Paris for Christmas. Left to his own devices, he pigg out on junk food and foils a pair of bumbling thieves (Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern). Some of the low-comic slapstick works on a bitful, Three Stooges level, but the basic idea — an abandoned child defending himself against intruders — is a bit too scary for comfort.

THREE MEN AND A LITTLE LADY (PG) In Emilio Ardolivo's improbable follow-up to the 1987 hit "Three Men and a Little Lady," we're asked to believe that the three ex-swinging bachelors have

been happily living for five years in a brownstone commune, with their ex-baby boomer and her mother. We can't. It's an overbright, overdesigned sequel-asual. But Fiona Shaw, as a voraciously aroused British school teacher, ignites a few scenes. **DANCES WITH WOLVES (PG-13)**—In his first directing work, Kevin Costner has made a clear-eyed, authentic vision of the frontier Northwest that is irresistible. The story of a Union officer who becomes assimilated with a tribe of Sioux, it has all the elements of epic: vastness, astonishing action sequences, exciting character, but because it's more concerned with character than spectacle, its epic quality becomes engaging, never self-congratulatory. Beautiful, memorable and full of humor, it's one of the most winning films of the year.

Education loans available

POCATELLO - Education loans are now available through PEO, a philanthropic educational women's organization.

The group provides education loans to qualified women who desire a higher education and are in need of financial assistance, said Idaho State University scholarship officials.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States or Canada, must demonstrate financial need, must be high school graduates or have equivalent education, may be enrolled full or part time during the loan period and must be within two years of completing the course of study for which the loan is approved (graduate students may be considered for a waiver to this requirement). The applicants must also maintain the grade point average required for graduation by the school where they are registered.

A maximum of \$3,500 will be loaned to any one individual with a 4 percent interest due annually on

the unpaid balance of the loan, due in full five years from the date of issue.

Graduate students (including medical and law majors), seniors or students returning to school for teacher certification may obtain the full loan amount in one academic year; other students may draw installments up to \$1,750 per academic year of study.

Local applications will be screened by ISU and the top applicants referred to Chapter BJ of PEO which will interview them and recommend one woman for national consideration. Selection of loan recipients is made by the national PEO office.

Application forms are available at ISU from the Vo-Tech Student Services Office; the Center for New Directions, located on the top floor of the REC Building and the ISU Scholarship Office, Room 327 of the Museum Building, and must be returned to the ISU Scholarship Office no later than 5 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 18.

Shop built on Yellow Pages' loss

"The theory is the bigger the ad, the better off you are, but that's not necessarily so in the phone book," Jayco senior vp Matt Toning said. "We find many advertisers can get by on spending with the telephone companies."

Jayco was formed in January by Jay Valiquette, president, and Mr. Toning. Since then, Mr. Toning said, they have cost telephone companies (General Telephone and Pacific Northwest) \$111,000,000 in Yellow Pages advertising. Jayco's fee ranges between 15% and 20% of the amount a business saves by reducing its advertising.

Companies often run ads larger than needed and list their names under too many classifications, Mr. Toning said. Studies show that people using Yellow Pages generally have made up their minds and are looking for phone numbers and addresses, not a fancy sales pitch.

Variety of factors affect AFC championship

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. - If Sunday's AFC championship game comes down to a balancing act, the Bills have better equipment. If it comes down to an aerial shootout, Buffalo also would seem to have an edge.

If the game is to be won on the ground, it's the advantage Raiders, although not by much if Bo-Jackson can't go because of a hip injury. Defensively, things are pretty even. So are special teams.

Then, of course, there is the Bills' supposed biggest ally—the weather.

"Hogwash," Raiders defensive end Howie Long said, sort of. "We've got guys who have played in every kind of weather. Re-

member, we play in Denver and Kansas City every year and it can get pretty tough there."

"I'm from Chicago," defensive tackle Scott Davis added, "so the weather won't bother me. I like cold weather."

"The weather is not a factor as much as being the visiting team," said Mike Harden, who played in some nasty stuff in Denver before joining the Raiders.

"It's not even so much being the visiting team. If you're losing, you feel cold. I don't intend for that to be a factor."

Forecasts for Sunday have varied. As of Thursday, predictions were for "blustery, snowy conditions, with temperatures in the mid-20s."

"The Raiders are coming here to play for the championship and go to the Super Bowl," said Danny Talley. "I don't think the weather is going to be on their minds."

"We know and I'm sure they know that you have to focus on what you're doing and you can't get caught up in that or the media blitz and forget about playing football."

"We're not running for president or governor—we're just in a football game. It's an important game for both of us and we're not going to lose that focus."

The Bills certainly have proven themselves on all kinds of fields, at all kinds of conditions. They won in ideal weather early in the year and on frozen fields later. They

went to Giants Stadium and won in the freezing rain. They outscored the Dolphins 44-34 on a frozen field in the playoffs.

Only in the heat of Miami in Week 2 did they really falter, and such tropical conditions won't apply for at least another week, when the AFC champion goes to Tampa for the Super Bowl.

The Raiders have not faced the horrendous conditions the Bills conquered against the Giants and Dolphins in the last month. They claim, however, they know how to deal with the situation.

"We dress for it," Raiders equipment manager Richard Romanski said. "A lot of teams wear a lot of heavy clothes in winter games. We believe in just the opposite."

Giants yipping, 49ers yapping as NFC game nears

SAN FRANCISCO - It's not quite as loud or hostile as it would be if Buddy Ryan or Jerry Glanville were coaching, but there's quite a bit of yipping and yapping between the New York Giants and San Francisco 49ers as they prepare for Sunday's NFC championship game.

"I feel it's my obligation to history not to let these guys threaten," says nose tackle Erik Howard of the Giants, who grew up as an Oakland Raiders' fan in San Jose, about 8 miles from San Francisco's current training base in Santa Clara.

"It's like they're walking six inches above the rest of us. Their feet never touch the ground. You hear all the hype and the commercials on the radio."

None of this, relatively mild as it may be, gets by the 49ers as they prepare for the second game of the year between the teams that were considered the best in the NFL for most of the season.

"The Giants are talking trash about us," says San Francisco receiver Jerry Rice.

The ill will started after the 49ers beat the Giants 7-3 at Candlestick Park on Dec. 3. As the teams left the field after the game, San Francisco defensive back Ronnie Lott got into an angry verbal exchange with New York quarterback Phil Simms.

Simms won't play this week because of a foot injury. He will be replaced by Jeff Hostetler, who led New York to a 31-3 win over Chicago last week.

"I kind of hope they don't respect us," says Giants receiver Stephen Baker. "If they don't, it'll be their loss and our gain. It's not hard to get up for this game or get focused."

Florida player-hoping scouts watch Senior Bowl

MOBILE, Ala. - Florida tight end Kirk Kirkpatrick says a coaching change has turned him into an NFL prospect.

Kirkpatrick will be trying Saturday to prove that theory in the Senior Bowl game here.

"I wouldn't be the physical blocking tight end that some teams are looking for. I could put an average 110- to 115-pound and not lose any speed," the 6-foot-2 Kirkpatrick said Thursday at practice for the senior all-star game.

Kirkpatrick said he's talked to some pro scouts and they think he could play the 11-back position in pro ball.

He caught only 27 passes in three years. Then, Florida hired Steve Spurrier as his head coach and Spurrier unleashed Kirkpatrick, who caught 55 passes for 770 yards this season.

Kirkpatrick was a All-Southeastern Conference selection and was a second-team All-America selection by The Associated Press.

"There's no question playing for Coach Spurrier helped me," said Kirkpatrick, who will play Sunday for the AFC squad in the

pro-style game. "I'm just glad I had the opportunity to play under him for one year."

He added, "I think I could fit in on a team like the Miami Dolphins or Dallas Cowboys, somebody that uses that type of passing game."

Senior Bowl officials promised increased security at the game as war in the Persian Gulf raged, raising the threat of domestic terrorism.

The game is at 40,000-seat Ladd Stadium in Mobile, Ala., on Saturday. Mobile Police Chief Harold Johnson said Thursday that more officers would be present and outside the stadium as a precaution. Additional security measures will include screening of spectators and some use of metal detectors.

Kansas City Chiefs coach Marty Schottenheimer, who was the Larry Coach last year — under the old North-South format — in the South's 41-0 victory over the North, is leading the AFC team this year. New Orleans Saints coach Jim Mora heads the NFC team.

"We had a spirited practice in the afternoon, and one of the reasons was the big crowd of scouts and coaches," Mora said. "They wanted to see us in pads, and it was really their first time to do so."

Advertisers ponder football games in wartime

NEW YORK - The U.S. Army withdrew its commercials from Sunday's NFL conference championship games on CBS and NBC as other advertisers considered whether "the mood of the country was right for football" during wartime.

The networks, meanwhile, kept in close contact with the NFL. While it was not quite business as usual, CBS and NBC were poised to forge ahead with coverage plans, modified to the needs of their news departments.

"To the extent that breaking news warms, we'll of course follow the lead of our news division," NBC Sports executive vice president Ken Schanzer said. "Our plans aren't finalized. I will say that we're working with the NFL in trying to make whatever accommodations are appropriate."

The NFL said Thursday it still was monitoring the situation in the Persian Gulf but was sticking with its postseason schedule, which includes the Los Angeles Raiders at Buffalo-Bills on NBC for the AFC title, and the New York Giants at the San Francisco 49ers on CBS for the NFC title.

"There was very intense, competitive football being played in the United States even during the worst of the World War II era," Coca-Cola advertising executive Pepsi-Cola executive Bill Wadsworth said. "Naturally, our concerns are with war, but we're going to carry on. There's room for both."

Col. John Myers, director of advertising for the Army recruiting command at Fort Sheridan, north of Chicago, confirmed that the Army has pulled all of its TV advertising for at least two weeks.

That included one ad on each game Sunday and other spots on various college basketball games, but it had not purchased any Super Bowl time.

One source, who spoke only on the condition of anonymity, said the networks anticipated this and understood the Army's position that ads to "be all that you can be" might be inappropriate now.

Advertising for the two games reportedly is going for an average of \$300,000 for each of the 26 30-second spots.

ABC sold advertising for the Super Bowl on Jan. 27 at a rate of about \$800,000 per 30 seconds. As of midweek, ABC had sold all but one of the 36 time slots.

A number of big advertisers plan to unveil special campaigns during the Super Bowl, including Anheuser-Busch Inc. and the Coca-Cola Co. Both companies and Pepsi-Cola companies. They also have purchased ad time during the conference championships.

"If the mood of the country is right for football, we'll be there," said Rebecca Madara, a Pepsi spokeswoman in Purchase, N.Y. "Our decision is not going to be a matter of dollars and cents, but what is right. Right now, we're on. We don't want to overreact and make any decision today. We don't need to."

"Chances are, if the games go on, we'll go ahead, but it's not mine to make the call yet."

Anheuser-Busch, the nation's largest brewing company, said it planned no changes in its advertising campaign, and the decision when to play its postseason games belonged to the NFL.

"We recognize the sensitivity of the situation and if the NFL decided to postpone, we would not object—the company's stance is a statement. "Postponing the Super Bowl would be symbolic, but it is also important to strive to maintain the normalcy of life in our country, especially regarding events like the Super Bowl, which can pull us closer together."

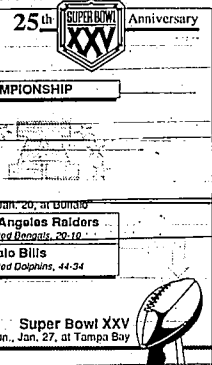

Both games will have a little different look to them. The news divisions of the two networks have the authority to cut from football to war news any time they want.

CBS plans to do a pregame feature on players' reactions to the war and at this time, also plans to air specified amounts of time during the pregame, halftime and postgame shows to war news.

NBC will lengthen its halftime show to 15 minutes to accommodate more news, and it has moved its studio show from Buffalo back to New York "to keep news and sports in close proximity to coordinate what we're doing," Schanzer said. CBS will do its studio show from San Francisco.

"As of now, we have every indication from the NFL that we're going forward," Schanzer said. "I've heard nothing to the contrary."

Judge: Gathers' mom can be part of lawsuit

LOS ANGELES — A Los Angeles County Superior Court judge Thursday denied a motion by Loyola Marymount University and several physicians that sought to oust Loretta Gathers out of the wrongful-death suit filed after the death of her son, Loyola Marymount basketball player Hank Gathers.

Attorneys for the school and the physicians argued that Mrs. Gathers, 47, Philadelphia, had never been supported by her son and thus had no grounds under state law to seek wrongful-death damages.

Hank Gathers died March 4, 1990, after collapsing on the court during the deposit in the Mount game. He had been taking a drug for an irregular heartbeat.

In their motion to dismiss the suit, the school and the physicians made public the depositions given by Mrs. Gathers and her son during the depositions. They testified that Hank Gathers had received cash payments from

a Loyola booster totaling about \$50,000 over three years.

Defense attorneys argued that Mrs. Gathers admitted receiving gifts and about \$2,000 in cash from Hank, but said she supported herself through working and most recently, disability and welfare payments.

But Judge Gary Hastings said the law states that a parent fully or partially supported by a child can sue for wrongful-death damages.

Bruce Fagel, an attorney for the Gathers family, said he would now press forward with the case, which is scheduled to go to trial Sept. 3. He said he still hoped that the case could be settled out of court.

"My obligation is to try and do something for the family," Fagel said, "and the only way I can do that is to make sure there is some kind of monetary resolution.

"A trial is not good for anyone, and certainly not good for a woman who has lost her son. But she is prepared to go forward and to testify."

Giants ready to halt 49ers luck, if they can

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The San Francisco 49ers always seem to find a way to win. They have done it against the New York Giants and everyone in the NFL for nearly three years.

"That's going to end Sunday in the NFC title game," Giants linebacker Lawrence Taylor said. "This year we've got a couple of surprises," Taylor said after a practice for the game at Candlestick Park. The 49ers have won the last four

meetings against New York, including a 41-21 decision in a 1987 strike game. They've won the other games 20-17 in 1988, 34-24 last season and 7-3 Dec. 3.

"I know a couple of years ago we got into a shootout with them and lost," Taylor said. "This year was a defensive game and we lost. It's time for the Giants to find a way to win."

Increasing the urgency of winning for the Giants is a growing dislike

for the 49ers. This season's game ended with quarterback Phil Simms jawing with San Francisco safety Ronnie Lott.

There also is bad blood since the 1988 season when the Los Angeles Rams defeated the 49ers 38-16 in the regular-season finale. The 49ers' loss allowed the Rams to earn the final playoff spot and kept New York out of the postseason competition. After the game, Simms accused the 49ers of not trying.

Now, most Giants think the 49ers can be beaten. Most thought the Washington Redskins had a good chance prior to last week's 28-10 loss to San Francisco, but they didn't make the big plays.

"They can be beaten," safety Greg Jackson said. "We have to play error-free football. We have to play aggressively and we can't have any mental breakdowns. We can't let them sit back and do what they want to do."

Yankees Kelly triples salary with new contract

NEW YORK (AP) — Center fielder Roberto Kelly, one of the few bright spots in a dismal New York Yankees season, tripled his salary Thursday when he agreed to a one-year contract worth \$900,000.

Four other players agreed to one-year contracts on Thursday, leaving 152 remaining in salary arbitration. Players and clubs will exchange figures Friday afternoon, and hearings will be scheduled for the first three weeks of February.

Right-hander Mark Eichhorn and California's Steve Litaize, a \$352,500 raise, and right-hander John Dopper and Boston's left-hander Mike Kingery got \$362,500, a raise

of \$187,500.

Also, free agent right-hander Jeff Robinson agreed to a one-year contract with the California Angels with a club option for 1992. Robinson pitched for the Yankees last season and was 3-6 with a 3.45 ERA in 50 relief appearances and four starts.

There are 36 free agents remaining who have not yet agreed to contracts for the 1991 season.

Kelly, 26, hit 285 last season with 15 homers, 61 RBIs and 42 stolen bases, the third-most in the American League. He became the second Yankee to play in all 162 games, joining Roy White, who did it in 1973.

Kelly had a base salary of \$265,000 last season and made an additional \$30,000 in bonuses.

Eichhorn was 2-5 with 13 saves last season in 60 relief appearances, while Dopper had no record and a 2.04 ERA in four games.

Johnson to run in Sunkist

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Ben Johnson, banished from track in one of the most infamous moments in the sports history, already is stirring controversy in his return.

Johnson, banned from the sport and stripped of his gold medal after testing positive at the deposit in the 1988 Olympics, will run in the United States for the first time since 1987 on Friday night in the Sunkist Invitational.

The race, at 50 meters, will be the second in his comeback.

Johnson, 29, finished second in the 50 meters at the Hamilton Specialist Indoor Games in Canada a week ago.

He was beaten by Daron Council, who was timed in 5.75 seconds to 5.77 for Johnson.

After the race, Johnson claimed he was confused by the finish-line markings and had slowed at the first marking, for 50 yards as opposed to 50 meters.

Council, however, said the race officials had pointed out the 50-meter finish line to the runners prior to the race.

More controversy surrounding Johnson arose Monday, when he was charged with assault in Toronto after a female athlete filed a complaint claiming Johnson allegedly grabbed her by the throat in an incident last month.

Cheryl Thibedeau, formerly a teammate of Johnson's with the Mazda Optimist Track Club, claimed in the complaint filed Dec. 24 that she suffered a "swollen neck," was treated for whiplash and had an asthma attack because of the alleged attack.

Witnesses to the Dec. 17 incident at the York University track and field center in the Toronto suburbs said Thibedeau made a comment to Johnson about his being a "mere mortal" in his start, which is considered his main strength as a sprinter.

Georgia Tech slates Penn State

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Georgia Tech, which shared the national college football title with Colorado in the wire service polls, will play Penn State on Aug. 28 in the Kickoff Classic at Giants Stadium, officials said Thursday.

Georgia Tech posted a 11-0-1 mark this season, including a 45-21 victory over Nebraska in the Florida Citrus Bowl.

Penn State was 9-3, dropping a 24-17 decision to Florida State in the Blackbuster Bowl.

The Bobby Ross-coached Yellow Jackets were selected as the No. 1 team in the coaches' poll, Colorado, which defeated Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl, was selected No. 1 in the writers' poll.

Georgia Tech will make its first appearance here.

Joe Paterno's Nittany Lions lost 44-6 to Nebraska in the inaugural

Kickoff Classic in 1983.

The schools are each guaranteed \$650,000 for playing in the game, a \$100,000 increase in the amounts teams received in the first eight Kickoff Classic games.

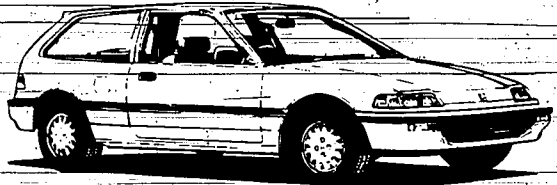

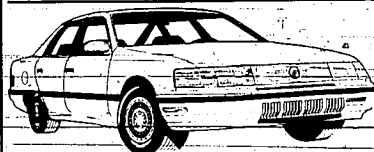

'Fairrah Syndrome' provided Bergen with means to turn her career around

There was a time — and it wasn't all that long ago — when you couldn't mention Candice Bergen's name without running the risk of someone snickering.

Oh, sure, she was beautiful, but what, exactly did she do? Well, she modeled, and she took some photographs, and she made some movies, many of which were not very good. But now she's the two-time Emmy Award-winning star of "Murphy Brown" (airing Mondays), one of CBS's most popular series, and no one out there is snickering anymore. What happened?

What happened, more or less, was the Fairrah Syndrome, the process by which a pretty but not terribly well-respected actress-celebrity redeems herself in the public view by producing quality work that shows she's serious about her career. Fairrah Fawcett turned her reputation around with "The Burning Bed." Bergen started her own redemption process by writing a pretty decent autobiography ("Knock Wood") and making some not-so-terrible movies ("Starting Over").

But even after "Murphy Brown" came along, it still seemed as though no one would take Bergen seriously. Apart from some of the show's other early problems — for example, the inevitable comparisons to "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," which also focused on a single woman who worked in a newsroom — Bergen herself seemed somewhat wooden and uncomfortable.

She appeared ill at ease with the

other actors — even taking into consideration her role as a tough news-woman. And although many of the jokes were funny, Bergen didn't always get the maximum out of them.

But over the show's first season, something happened. Bergen relaxed. And as she has mellowed over the show's three seasons, she and the writers have allowed that slightly icy quality to become part of the show and her relationships with the other characters. Murphy Brown can be tough and cold — but she can also be vulnerable and make fun of those very qualities in herself.

In one episode, for example, Murphy and her mother (Caitlin Dewhurst) went out on a double date with a father and his son. In a poignant moment near the end of the show, Murphy bemoans the fact that she always scares men away because

she's so successful. We might not be too sympathetic about this problem in most people, but scenes such as this allow the audience to get closer to both Bergen and her character.

With that softening, the whole cast has relaxed, and, in effect, cheerfully handed Bergen the place of honor. Although "Murphy Brown" is an ensemble show, there's no sense of false equality.

Bergen is clearly the star and the strongest presence. And she seems to be having a better time, as Murphy's relationships with the other characters have developed more warmth and individuality.

The only danger now is that Murphy may mellow too much.

Networks' nightly news ratings soaring as Persian Gulf crisis draws in viewers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The prospect of war in the Persian Gulf brought more viewers to nightly news broadcasts and NBC posted its highest prime-time win of the season in the latest network ratings showdown.

NBC won last week's race with a 14.5 average, its best finish of the 17-week-old season. NBC also won by the largest margin of the season, finishing two ratings points ahead of second-place CBS.

CBS earned a 12.4 average in the overall network standings. ABC was third with 12.3, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

As the Jan. 15 deadline loomed for Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait or face military attack, greater numbers of viewers tuned in last week to nightly network newscasts.

ABC and Peter Jennings were No. 1 with a 12.5 average, followed by a tie between NBC and CBS with 11.5 each. Those ratings reflect an increase from the previous week of nearly 1 million viewers for each network.

A ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

NBC's "Cheers" was the most watched show on television, fol-

lowed by CBS' news magazine "60 Minutes" and its special Gulf reports. CBS' smart-aleck TV reporter

"Murphy Brown" was No. 3 and the network's wisecracking interior decorators of "Designing Women" were No. 4.

Snappy graphics grab audiences

NEW YORK (AP) — Bright, attractive studio sets and slick, electronic graphics are grabbing news-hungry television viewers who tune in for developments in the unfolding Persian Gulf crisis.

The most conspicuous set was on ABC, where a huge map let anchor Peter Jennings take viewers for a "walk" through the Gulf region Monday night.

"It's 49 feet wide, its height is 15 feet and it's 43 feet deep from back to front," said George Paul, who directed the special.

"Line in the Sand: War or Peace?" and won a 27 percent share of viewers tuned in. "This started with Peter, who's always

wanted to do something like this," Paul said.

"Graphics are a very necessary part of being able to establish facts and figures in the viewer's mind," Paul said. "But a person walking from one area to another can really demonstrate how short these distances are." The sides and the back of the painted surface are slanted for a more pronounced "perspective" effect, Paul said. The set also has a rear-screen projector for live, two-way conversations.

The idea hatched by Jennings, Paul and producer Tom Yellin was executed by scenic designer Alan Kimmel in less than two weeks, and was used in the original "Line

in the Sand" news special ABC aired Sept. 11, 1990.

Viewers shouldn't be surprised if CBS' big set for its Gulf coverage seems a bit familiar. "We left up our elections set," said spokeswoman Donna Dees. "It's in the same studio, it's just much larger than the evening news set."

NBC also has built a special set for its news specials on the crisis.

Only CNN hasn't created or maintained a special set for its general Gulf coverage, although spokeswoman Melinda McIntyre said the Atlanta-based cable network did build a special set at the United Nations to cover Gulf-related news.

ABC Founder: Network TV will last

MARINA DEL REY, Calif.
— Network television will remain the leading mass communication medium despite its rapidly decreasing audience, the founder of ABC said.

"The networks will always be reaching the mass audience," said Leonard Goldenson.

"The networks will be able to compete with anybody in the business."

The 85-year-old chairman of the executive committee of Capital Cities-ABC Inc. is the lone survivor of the three men who fathered network television.

The others were NBC founder David Sarnoff and CBS icon William Paley.

Speaking to TV critics gathered here for the winter press tour, Goldenson touched on everything from the Golden Age of television to the state of programming that exists today.

The greatest change in television, Goldenson said, is the increased competition from cable and home video rentals that has left networks with 63 percent of the TV audience.

"I personally welcome the competition," he said. "It's the best thing that can happen in a democratic society. It puts men to the test."

Goldenson also cautioned network programmers against continuing to rely on reruns for their summer schedules.

"We're giving it away in the summer time," he said. "The ingenuity of man has got to be such that we can find an alternative to reruns."

Goldenson revitalized television by taking Hollywood studios into TV production.

In 1953, with a network that reached only 35 percent of the country, he made history by helping to finance the building of Disneyland in exchange for the first Disney TV series.

In the 1960s and 1970s, Goldenson introduced Westerns, medical series and adventure programs to television. "Cheyenne," "Maverick" and "Ben Casey" brought TV viewers a new and hugely successful kind of entertainment.

It took Goldenson nearly 20 years, however, to turn ABC into a profit-making network.

In 1976, for the first time in its history, ABC became the No. 1 network, a position it held until 1980.

Goldenson stunned the industry in 1986 by merging ABC with the independent broadcasting and publishing firm of Capital Cities Communications.

Goldenson has said he has no regrets about the \$3.5 billion merger, the largest media deal ever at the time.

"I felt the time had come to pass the torch to someone," he said. "With all the junk bombs floating around, I didn't want ABC to get into the hands of someone who would tear it asunder."

Goldenson also discussed his autobiography, "Beating The Odds," scheduled for release next month.

He said that he had read the memoirs of NBC's Sarnoff and CBS' Paley.

"I thought it was an ego trip," Goldenson said.

"And I just didn't want to do it." For his book, Goldenson hired someone to interview 100 friends and co-workers and report back "with the good and the bad," he said.

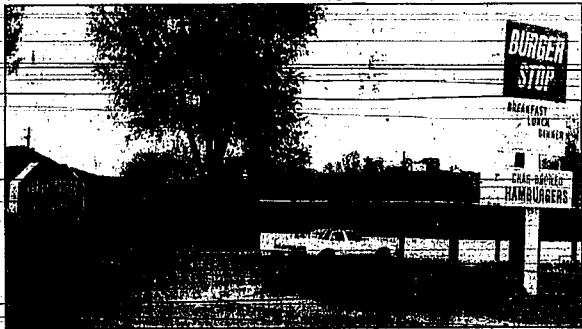

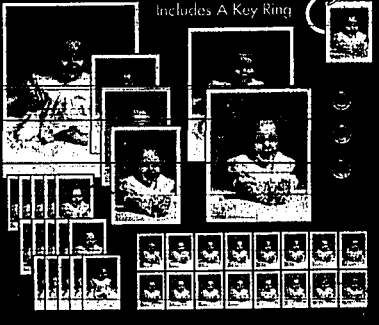
