Air raids stall Iraqi move

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia — If Iraqi troops make their forces for another foray into Saudi Arabia, they had to abandon them at least temporarily early Saturday in the face of punishing allied bombing.

Persistent but widely varying reports of troop movements in southern Kuwait early Friday seemed to indicate that the Iraqis either were preparing for their recent border crossings or preparing for a larger, more concentrated stab to the south.

Allied commanders said there had been no enemy probes across the border by about 12:30 a.m. Saturday, Saudi Arabia time, and that none appeared imminent.

U.S. Rep. Adam Smith said he had heard at the Pentagon that by paying too much heed to unsubstantiated reports of enemy activity, you can quickly take yourself into a major movement.

But hundreds of allied warplanes — including bomb-heavy B-52s, flying from

bases in Europe — pounded Iraqi positions north of the Saudi frontier. McConnell offered a succinct explanation of what occurred late Thursday night and on Friday: "There was movement. We understood it. We reacted to it. And now there is no movement."

Meanwhile, minor skirmishing between Iraqi and American troops continued west of the seaside city of Khafji, Saudi Arabia, where on Thursday Saudi-led Arab troops expelled Iraqi invaders who had held the city for more than a day.

The occupation of Khafji had been the most successful part of a larger incursion by the Iraqis into Saudi territory, which U.S. commanders characterized as a complete defeat for Iraq.

The latest fighting appeared to be the ending phase of that multi-prong incursion. But reports from the battle area by reporters traveling in military-approved groups were confusing and often contradictory.

The Marine Corps launched an investigation Friday into the deaths of 11

Marines, who were killed in the confused fighting west of Khafji as allied forces converged on the area early Wednesday to blunt the Iraqi advance. There were indications that the light armored vehicle in which the Marines were riding may have been hit by "friendly fire," specifically, by cannon fire from a tank-killing A-10 jet.

"We're saddened and disappointed" about the possibility that the Marines were killed by U.S. weapons, said Lt. Col. Jerry Humble, operations officer for the 1st Marine Division. "But historically, there's always casualties by friendly fire because it's a fight for your life."

The fight in which the Marines died took place at night in the open desert, with some fire being exchanged at targets as close as 75 yards.

A close ally early Friday threatened other Marines when allied planes attacked an Iraqi convoy in southern Kuwait, dropping cluster bombs as close as 700 yards from their camp, Maj. Bob Weimann said. He

Parents pray for daughter on MIA list

NEWAYGO, Mich. — When Leo and Joan Rathbun first learned the only woman soldier missing in action in the Persian Gulf war was from a transportation company, they prayed for their daughter. But a military officer came to their home on Thursday night to tell them their only child, Army Spec. Melissa Rathbun-Nealy, apparently had been captured with another soldier near the Kuwait border.

"At first, we jokingly thought surely out of the hundreds of thousands of troops stationed in Saudi Arabia, that the woman reported as missing wouldn't be our daughter, Melissa."

"But our worst fears became a reality when we were informed that our daughter was missing in action," the Rathbuns said in a prepared statement released Friday.

"We were told that Melissa and the other soldier's jeep was found abandoned in the desert with their duffel bags and gas masks inside the vehicle," the statement read. "We can only hope and pray that she's OK."

Radon risk overstated?

WASHINGTON — Radon gas in homes may not be as dangerous as previously believed, but high concentrations can cause lung cancer, experts said Friday.

A study issued by the National Research Council said that earlier estimates of the risk of lung cancer in homes may have overstated the danger by 20 to 30 percent.

Estimates by the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements and other agencies compared the danger of developing lung cancer from exposure to radon in homes with the risks of radon-caused lung cancer among mine workers.

Several factors overlooked in the previous studies, the NRC said, caused the final estimates to be too high.

Soviets learn addiction treatment, American-style, on Twin Falls visit

TWIN FALLS — A backward drop of a ladder into waiting arms was a calculated and minor risk for two alcohol-treatment experts from the Soviet republic of Moldavia.

But for the alcohol and drug addicts who joined them in the "experiential" exercise this week — and for the people of the Moldavians with no drinking habit — it can be as frightening as suicide or as exhilarating as a cocaine high.

The Moldavians, Dr. Yuri Gozun, a

clinical pharmacologist, and Vyacheslav Burkovsky, a psychology and English professor at the University of Kinross, spending six weeks in Twin Falls learning about the American way of treating alcoholism and drug addiction.

"The Soviet Socialist Republic of Moldova — its name in Romanian, which is the language of Moldavia — is one of 15 constituent nations of the Soviet Union, with a population of 4.5 million. It is located in the southwest corner of the sprawling USSR.

Moldavia, originally a region of Romania that was annexed by the Soviet Union in 1940, is one of the many Soviet republics seeking autonomy from Moscow.

The Moldavians are learning more about Alcoholics Anonymous for a group they helped form last year. Gozum said Burkovsky will also observe treatments at the Port of Hope Center.

To that end, on Wednesday they climbed a 6-foot ladder to its second-highest rung. After meditating about their next step, they let themselves drop straight back into the arms of profes-

29 missing after aircraft collide, burn

LOS ANGELES — A USAir Boeing 737 airliner coming in for a landing Friday struck an outboard commuter plane and caught fire at Los Angeles International Airport.

The mishap killed at least two people and injured 25, officials said. The airliner collided with a Sky West commuter plane, Federal Aviation

Administration spokeswoman Elly Brekke said, adding that they crashed on the ground.

"There were 101 people involved in this accident ... from both airplanes. At this point we have account for 72 of those people. 29 we have still not accounted for," Ms. Brekke said.

At least two people died and 25 were hurt, Fire Department spokesman Jim Wells said, adding that there were dozens

of survivors.

"We saw a flash," said Gretchen Emig, a witness. "We could see people jumping out."

Black smoke and bright orange flames poured out of the jetliner's windows and the runway was flooded with firefighting foam. The commuter plane, with 12 people aboard, was not visible in TV broadcasts and there were unconfirmed reports it was

Magic Valley unemployment rate falls in January

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley's jobless rate rose slightly in January, but a survey suggesting that December's high rates were due to the cold snap, not a sluggish economy.

January number seems to signal that our economy is still performing fairly well," said Lon McDonald, labor market analyst for the Twin Falls Job Service.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in the three-county area of Twin Falls, including Jerome counties, which the department refers to as the Magic Valley, dropped to 4.9 percent in January, down 0.6 of a percentage point from December's 5.4 percent.

The total unadjusted labor force number 37,995 workers. Those with jobs numbered 35,645. Jobs lost totaled 2,350. The three-county unemployment rate for January exceeded the 3.9 level of January

1990, however, McDonald attributed the decline to the "extreme" weather experienced over the past few months that allowed farms to operate through much of the winter.

For all of 1990, the average adjusted unemployment rate was 4.8 percent.

The state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate slipped back below 6 percent in January as job opportunities expanded and the number of Idahoans at work hit its highest level since April.

The Department of Employment said Friday that its preliminary estimate of the state's labor situation in January put the jobless rate at 5.9 percent, down three tenths from December.

"Idaho's employment will continue to grow in 1991 but not as much as in the past few years," forecasting provided department analysts said in releasing their forecast for a further rise in the annual unemployment rate through this year as the pool of

Allies claim win in Khafji fight

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Saddam Hussein's forces killed hundreds of soldiers in his abortive campaign to capture and hold the border town of Khafji, allied officers said Friday.

A senior U.S. military source said Iraqi units on Friday night were retreating northward through Kuwait, not heading southbound as had been widely reported. While allied officials gave varying figures for Iraqi casualties and captured prisoners in the 36-hour battle, they portrayed it as a decisive victory in the first major ground clash of the 2-week-old Persian Gulf War.

Stevens also had no information on whether 11 Marines who died Tuesday night were accidentally killed in allied fire. They died in action, under fire and that's about all I can give you at this point," Stevens said.

U.S. officers said more than 500 prisoners were in Saudi hands — some cooperating with the allies and the number could increase. 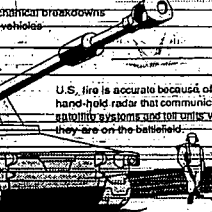

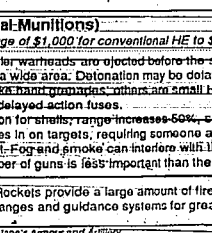
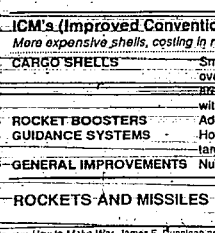

CHEMICAL: Loaded with one or more poison gases.
HEAT: High explosive antitank shell, penetrates armor like the size of the shell's diameter.
ICM's (Improved Conventional Munitions): More expensive shells, costing in range of \$1,000 for conventional HE to \$35,000 for a Copperhead.
CARGO SHELLS: Smaller warheads are ejected before the shell hits ground and air spread over a wide area.

Vehicle criticized in which U.S. Marines died

WASHINGTON — The 11 Marines killed on the Saudi battlefield Wednesday—the first U.S. casualties of the ground war, were sitting inside vehicles that some Pentagon analysts have long considered excessively vulnerable to even light tank weapons.

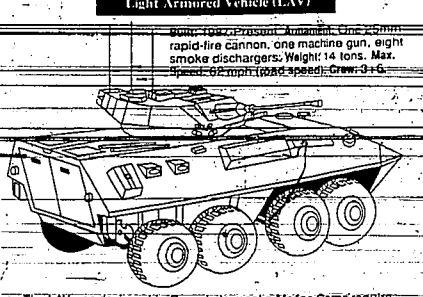
The LAV-25, or Light Armored Vehicle, is a combination armored personnel carrier and light-infantry fighting vehicle. It carries seven Marines—a commander, a gunner, a driver and four infantrymen—who would dismount to fight a battle and hoist a 25mm gun that can pierce the armor of Soviet-built personnel carriers from a range of about 1.5 miles.

However, some past and present Pentagon officials believe that the LAV's armor is too thin to survive an attack and that the huge cases of ammunition inside the vehicle would ignite too easily if hit by an antitank round.

U.S. officials in Saudi Arabia said the 11-Marines died when Iraqi anti-tank rounds destroyed two LAV-25s. A Pentagon spokesman confirmed that report Thursday and said that an examination of the vehicles had not yet determined why so many of its passengers were killed. Nor was it clear whether any other soldiers in the vehicles had survived.

The LAV has been used before, without incident, in Panama. Even one of the officials critical of the LAV said it was too early in this

The LAV was designed in Canada to meet a Marine Corps requirement for a light, air-mobile personnel carrier. This vehicle has proven to be a flexible design; modified versions have the capability of carrying anti-tank weapons or mortars. Although its armor is similar to that of the M2 Bradley, the LAV has superior road speed and is more successful in amphibious operations.

...tions that would have made the LAV somewhat less vulnerable. For example, the engineer said, the inner walls of the vehicle could have been padded with special liners to prevent a penetrating antitank round from splintering into deadly shards. The stores of ammunition rounds could have been better shielded. Finally, the roof could have been moved.

"A roof makes everything more difficult to see and things that are not to be identified. It contains and magnifies an explosion, and it makes it harder for the crew to escape. Remember all those photographs from the Vietnam War with the soldiers riding on the outside of the M-113s, the armored personnel carrier of the day. That wasn't just to show off. They knew it was safer to be on the outside than on the inside."

He continued, "I think after this you're going to see a lot of Marines riding on the outside of the LAV." Another former Pentagon official recalled that in the mid-1980s, when the Marine first bought the LAV-25s, there were plans to test its vulnerability by loading one with ammunition and firing live antitank rounds into its armor. However, the Marines rejected the plan.

A similar test was conducted around this time against the Army's M2 Bradley Fighting Vehicle, a weapon similar to the LAV but much larger and heavier. The test, which the Army also rejected, but was finally forced to conduct, revealed that the Bradley was highly flammable, a finding that led to some modifications in its design.

Marine gunners: Iraqi tanks sitting ducks

KHAFJI, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Lance Cpl. Zaak Cazares leaned back on his 155mm howitzer, the one with "Psalm 23" painted on the barrel, and chuckled about popping off 17 Iraqi tanks like ducks in a gallery.

"First shoot, first kill," he said, laying aside a pocket-sized Bible to explain how U.S. Marine gunners pulverized an enemy column in Khafji, helping Saudis and Arab allies take back the border town.

For the Marines, their success in a high-noon shootout raised confidence that their presence on the ground could mean a pilot's superiority in the air to destroy Saddam Hussein's heavy armor.

"We had real good F-16s (forward observers) up there, and we all just picked 'em off," said Cazares, from Dallas, leaving an arm toward a crescent of howitzers deployed across the empty desert.

The battle of Khafji started Tuesday night when an Iraqi brigade rolled through a deserted border post and down a broad avenue into the abandoned town. Saudi defenders retreated at some speed.

"The Marines, based 25 miles down the coast, hurried up to help. "When we came up the road, everybody else was headed south," one young Marine recalled on Friday. "I wondered if we were the only ones who were going to fight this war."

But the Saudis' counterattack, helped by Qataris. Only a small Marine force shot its way into town to hold up in the center. For the most part, the Marines used firepower.

Cobra assault helicopters swept over Khafji, spraying rockets and grenades. And the howitzers.

When the 155mm guns began to blaze, a voice crackled over the radio. "That was dynamic, give me a repeat." The 1st Marine Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment obliged.

Howitzers fired dual-purpose rounds; shells which explode over a target and scatter armor-piercing bomblets.

The gunners were told they killed 17 tanks, although some were probably armored personnel carriers. That was good enough for Cazares and his Hawaii-based buddies.

"We must have scared 'em pretty bad," he said, recounting how some Iraqis "surrendered" and helped Marines change a tire on their vehicle. "I saw my first Iraqi—a prisoner. I hope I keep seeing 'em like that."

Marine officers count hardly make pride at how artillery and airstrikes had repulsed the Iraqis. Officially, it was a small incursion of no military value. But it was a political coup for Saddam Hussein.

Persistent reports say that Iraqi armored columns, are anguishing in southern Kuwait and moving toward the Saudi border in an area 50 miles west of Khafji.

Speaking privately, officers wondered aloud at why Iraq would expose so much hardware in open

country for dubious gain. They suspected that Saddam had something up his sleeve, and were glad their guns had scored.

For the gunners, it was just a forest exercise in what they learned at Kaneohe Bay.

The unit came out on Sept. 5, a month after Iraq invaded Kuwait. It was attached to the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade, and sent to five in the gulf.

Cazares, 24, spends a lot of time reading his Bible and writing to his two sons, Joseph and Zaak, Jr., who live with their mother in Jacksonville, N.C.

"We're not real killers," Cazares said, explaining that his father was a preacher in Dallas. "Other guys write Destroyer or something ruder on their howitzers. We wrote, 'Psalm 23.'"

That is "The Lord is my shepherd" psalm, and the crew takes confidence from it. As the long guns rolled off Friday, Lance Cpl. David Crowe of Stockton, Calif., yelled down from the ammunition truck: "It's not over. We're not in Kuwait yet."

Federal Reserve Board cuts key interest rate 2nd time in 6 weeks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Reserve Board, confronted with more evidence on the depth of the recession, moved Friday to cut interest rates lower, prompting immediate reductions in several major banks' prime lending rates.

The central bank announced it was cutting its discount rate, the interest it charges on loans to commercial banks, from 6.5 percent to 6 percent. It was the second cut in six weeks. Cutting the discount rate is the most dramatic action the Fed can take to signal its pursuit of easing credit conditions to boost economic activity.

The Fed also acted Friday to supply extra money to the banking system in a move that analysts interpreted as signaling the central bank's intention to push the federal funds rate down from 6.75 percent to 6.25 percent.

The Fed does not make public announcements on changes in its target for the funds rate; the interest banks charge each other on overnight loans, but analysts said it was obvious that the Fed was seeking a lower funds rate as well.

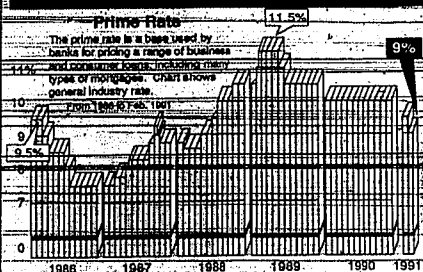
By lowering the cost of funds to commercial banks, the Fed hopes banks will do more lending at lower rates and thus spur such key sectors of the economy as car sales and housing. The Fed's credit easing was followed immediately by announcements by several major banks that they would cut their benchmark lending rate from 9.5 percent to 9 percent. The prime rate is used to set a variety of consumer and business loans charges.

The Fed's reduction, which put the discount rate at its lowest point since August 1988, followed an earlier half-point reduction on Dec. 18, when the rate was reduced from 7 percent.

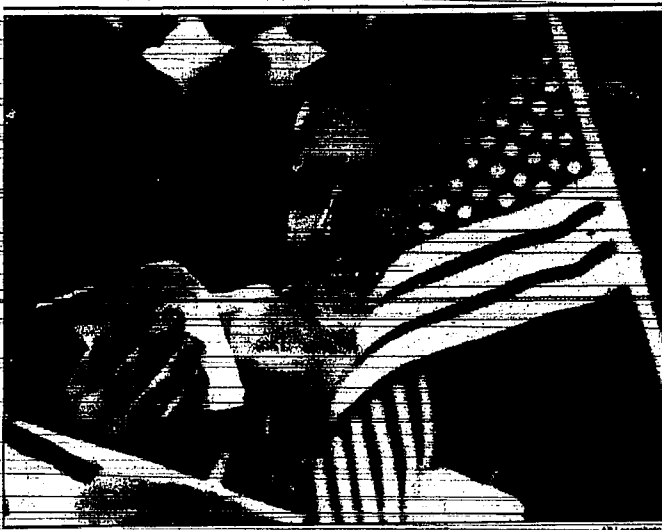
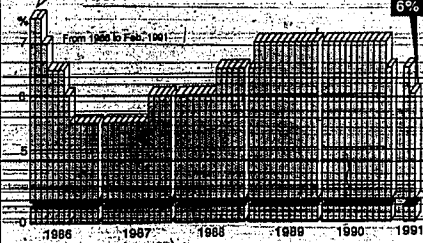
The central bank's credit easing came shortly after the Labor Department announced that the civilian unemployment rate in January hit a 3½-year high of 6.2 percent as businesses cut an unexpectedly large 230,000 jobs. The labor department report said the recession may not be as short and mild as many economists are predicting.

The Fed has been under heavy pressure from the Bush administration to cut interest rates. President Bush making an unusual appeal in his state of the Union address.

Bush consoles wives, relatives of pilots downed in Middle East

SEYMOUR JOHNSON AFB, N.C. (AP) — President Bush, on a morale-boosting visit to military bases Friday, consoled the wives and children of airmen downed by Iraq and told them "we were doing everything we could to find their husbands."

Sixteen days into Operation Desert Storm, Bush spoke repeatedly during stops in North Carolina and Georgia of sacrifices still to be made. But he also told flag-waving crowds that Iraq's ability to wage war "is being systematically destroyed" and declared, "We are on course; we are on schedule and things go well."

The president met with the wives and children of two men listed as missing in action and two listed as prisoners of war.

The White House declined to identify the families on the advice of the Pentagon.

White House press secretary Martin Fitzwater described the private meetings as serious but not overly emotional.

"I think the president was very impressed by their courage and their very supportive," they said, their husbands believed very strongly in what they were doing," Fitzwater said.

He said Bush told the women that "we were doing everything we could to find their husbands." The meetings took place at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base in North Carolina.

School honors dead teacher-astronaut

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — The auditorium in which Christina McAuliffe said a jubilant farewell as she headed off to astronaut training and where her pupils watched the space shuttle explode five years ago was named in her honor Friday. McAuliffe's husband, Steven, helped unveil the "McAuliffe Auditorium" sign at Concord High School, and her pupils would have been proud.

"She was an ordinary person and she knew she was an ordinary person," McAuliffe said.

Goldsboro, N.C., after Bush spoke to a large crowd of military families and praised the valor of U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf.

As he shook hands with members of the audience, one woman thrust a blue bracelet toward the president and pleaded, "Wear it for my husband." The president accepted the bracelet, which was inscribed with the name of Airman 1st-Class Robert Mickle Jr. and the words "Desert Shield."

Bush referred to the missing indirectly when he said, "Today, while some may be prisoners of war and others may have made the ultimate sacrifice, a lifetime of democracy and faith in God keeps their spirits free."

The president reported on the war during visits to Marine Air Force and Army bases. Thousands of military personnel and their families turned out to vigorously cheer their wartime commander in chief.

"I heard on the radio, the president is going to North Carolina to lift the morale of the people," Bush told a large crowd in a frigid airport hangar at Cherry Point Marine Air Station. "Let me assure you, it's the other way around after seeing this group."

At Goldsboro, Bush ate a barbecue, pitched tennis outdoors in frigid temperatures, surrounded by a huge throng of military spouses and dependents.

"I know it's been tough on a lot of you, maybe all of you," the president said.

Recalling the long ovation given to American troops during his State of the Union address, Bush said, "I

hope that Saddam Hussein in his bunker somewhere in Baghdad saw every single minute of it." Bush said the salute was proof that "we are a nation united."

To the many children in the audience, Bush said, "Your parents are enduring the hardships of war today so you may know the blessings of peace tomorrow."

In his first stop, at the Marine base, Bush noted the Iraqi attack against American forces in Saudi Arabia that killed 11 Marines in the first ground casualties of the war.

He praised the fallen Marines as "American heroes" and said that the Marines fought with great distinction and fought very bravely. Bush said to loud applause.

"Their professionalism and sacrifice will end the nightmare. I'm absolutely confident of that," he said, "and the nightmare of Iraq's brutal occupation, and ensure that Kuwait is once again free."

Bush said, "Day by day, night by night, Iraq's capacity to wage war is being systematically destroyed by U.S. and allied coalition forces." He confidently said that allied forces rule the skies over the Persian Gulf and that "the Iraqi air force is no longer a factor."

He said that when the war is over, "we will have taught a dangerous tyrant and those few who would follow in his footsteps that there is no place for lawless aggression in this critical region and in the new world order."

"Sacrifices still lay ahead, but we will succeed," he said later at the Air Force base stop.

Unemployment hits 6.2%

WASHINGTON (AP) — America's civilian unemployment rate hit a 3½-year high of 6.2 percent in January, said the Labor Department report, which was based on a survey of payrolls.

It was the worst stretch of layoffs since 1982 wore on, forcing businesses to cut 230,000 jobs, the government said Friday.

Last month's rise in the jobless rate, up from December's 6.1 percent, means that unemployment since June has shot up at its fastest pace since the last recession. Seven months ago unemployment was at a relatively low 5.3 percent.

Since then, 1.2 million Americans have joined the ranks of the unemployed and the nation's businesses million

have cut more than 1 million jobs, said the Labor Department report, which was based on a survey of payrolls.

In January alone, payrolls tumbled by 232,000 jobs. Manufacturing and construction were particularly hard hit. That huge loss followed a December decline of 150,000 jobs, a revised number about twice as bad as that first reported by the government. In a separate survey of households, the government said the number of Americans who lost their last jobs rather than voluntarily leaving rose by 270,000 in January to 4.1 million.

State Department: No Baltic deal made

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department joined with the Soviet Union on Friday in denying a deal was struck to gain Soviet support for the war against Iraq in exchange for a muted U.S. response to the crackdown in the Baltic republics.

"These reports are absolutely, completely and totally untrue," said Margaret Tutwiler, the department spokeswoman. "And there will not be any deal. ... It is simply without foundation."

Earlier, a Soviet foreign ministry spokesman in Moscow denied his government had struck such a deal.

South African president calls for scrapping of all apartheid laws

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — President F. W. de Klerk said he would repeal all remaining apartheid laws, paving the way for a new constitution and an end to a century of conflict and violence. He said the government would scrap the last three major legal pillars of apartheid — the Group Areas Act, the Land Use Act and the Population Registration Act. While clearly signaling de Klerk's intentions to end white domination, the scrapping of apartheid laws will not resolve the country's racial and political conflicts after 300 years of racial division. A new political system must still be devised and blacks and whites learn to live together in peace and equality.

De Klerk told the opening session of Parliament that the government would adopt his proposals to scrap the South African statute book. He said the government would scrap the last three major legal pillars of apartheid — the Group Areas Act, the Land Use Act and the Population Registration Act. While clearly signaling de Klerk's intentions to end white domination, the scrapping of apartheid laws will not resolve the country's racial and political conflicts after 300 years of racial division. A new political system must still be devised and blacks and whites learn to live together in peace and equality.

The government's strong majority in Parliament ensured the laws in a land where there are 30 million blacks and 5 million whites will be scrapped. The speech came one year after de Klerk announced he would scrap apartheid. He legalized the African National Congress and other opposition groups and released ANC leader Nelson Mandela, jailed for 27 years, within days.

Once apartheid laws are scrapped, de Klerk must still hammer out a new constitution acceptable to both white and black opposition groups. He has said this could take years. De Klerk's speech triggered a walkout among outraged lawmakers of the pro-apartheid Conservative Party, the opposition party. All 39 Conservatives trooped out of the chamber as the parliamentary speaker roared, "Order, order!"

Gorbachev orders talks on Baltics

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev on Friday softened his hard-line position on his Union Treaty by inviting the country's republics to start talks with the secessionist Baltic republics. Meanwhile, there were few signs of the joint police-military units that were sent into Lithuania after nationwide Friday elections to curb crime. At least six republics, several cities and reformers have denounced the patrols; some said Gorbachev was succumbing to pressure from hard-liners who are demanding stronger Kremlin control. Gorbachev's apparent concession during a meeting of the Federation Council, indicated the embattled president was seeking a middle ground between secessionist republics and hard-liners. Gorbachev's position as Communist Party chief was even questioned during a Central Committee session Thursday.

One Baltic leader suspected Gorbachev was playing his conflict off an inner-Kremlin political battle. "We must know what is hiding behind it, what is the political situation in the Soviet Union's leadership," he said. He said he would talk to president Vytautas Landsbergis, (left Lithuania Radio, monitored in London).

The meeting of the Federation Council, which includes presidents of all 15 republics, was held by Gorbachev's first meeting with republic leaders since the mid-January crackdown in the Baltics that has left 19 civilians and one soldier dead.

The new draft Union Treaty would allow the republics to limit the powers of the central government "based on the principle that the republics, as sovereign states, are united in the union only on a voluntary basis," said Bayanov. President Nikolai Dementiev, according to the news agency Tass.

The authority of the central government is defined by the republics, Tass quoted Dementiev as saying. Apparently in return, the republics would agree to recognize the superiority of national laws over republic laws, Tass said, effectively reversing the central issue in many of their sovereignty declarations.

In the past two years, all the republic parliaments have declared their laws supreme. Soviet open, Gorbachev declared this unconstitutional, and the stand-off has paralyzed government at all levels.

Earthquake kills 15 in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistan was rocked early Friday by an earthquake measuring 6.8 on the Richter scale, knocking down mud-huts while their inhabitants were asleep and killing at least 105 people. The official news agency said another 200 were injured. The quake, centered hundreds of miles away in neighboring Afghanistan, shook for minutes at about 4 a.m., collapsing the fragile sand-baked huts in clouds of dust.

The Associated Press of Pakistan reported a steadily increasing death toll throughout the day as reports from remote parts of this impoverished country trickled in. There were no immediate reports on the quake from Afghanistan. No communication links currently exist between Pakistan and Afghanistan.

The official Soviet news agency reported the spreading of the quake to Asian republics of Uzbekistan and Tajikistan, but reported no casualties.

Meeting set to implement school reports

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's governor, superintendent of public instruction and the state Board of Education president have announced the agenda for an Idaho Education Summit on public school reform, Feb. 19 in Boise.

The daylong meeting will focus on implementing proposals from four recent studies on improving Idaho's public school system over what Governor of Public Instruction Jerry Evans called "a decade of change."

"We're going to bring an end to the studies and move into an implementation mode," Gov. Cecil Andrus said Friday at a news conference in his office. "The time is now, and I think there's willingness in the Legislature and certainly in this office if there that we can move ahead."

Evans said the emphasis will be on moving from piecemeal to comprehensive reform of Idaho's public schools, and on developing a consensus for change between state legislators, the state Department of Education, the Board of Education and local school districts.

"Education in our state does need to improve," he said. "What we're doing now isn't bad; it simply isn't good enough."

Board of Education President Gary Fay of Twin Falls said the Feb. 19 Education Summit will begin the process of developing a "strategic plan" for proposals from four studies.

The recommendations are included in a report released Monday by the business-financed Idaho Education Project, a report scheduled to be released Feb. 14 by the governor and superintendent's Task Force on the Future of Education in Idaho, findings from the Board of Education's Task Force on Hispanic Education and a board study on the need for reform in teacher education scheduled to be completed in June.

"We've studied public education until we're blue in the face. We have the answers," Fay said. "It's time for all of us to join forces and put the best of these answers to work for Idaho children."

He also committed the Board of Education to devoting "much more of its attention" to public school issues. In fact, Fay said, the board is revising its schedule so half its meetings will be devoted solely to public schools.

Evans, whose office has primary responsibility for day-to-day operations of the state's public school system, said he has no problem with the Board of Education's decision to play a larger role.

He and Andrus also agreed that one of the themes of the reform effort would be increasing local control over how public school goals are met while establishing more statewide accountability over those goals.

But Evans said implementing the changes will cost money.

"We simply are going to have to recognize the need to spend more on the education of our young people," he said.

State Sen. John Hansen, R-Idaho Falls, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, said later that lawmakers would do what they can for public school funding. But he said a determining factor might be whether Idaho's economy remains strong enough to generate enough tax revenue to finance the requests.

"The challenge is going to be identifying those things that can be done in the way of reform without spending a lot more money," Hansen said.

Besides Andrus, Evans and the board, the Education Summit will include legislators, Idaho Education Project sponsors and staff, state Department of Education officials and members of the various task forces that developed reform reports. Also invited will be representatives from the Idaho Education Association, Idaho School Boards Association, Idaho Association of School Administrators, Idaho PTA and the presidents, Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry and the presidents, academic vice presidents, and education deans from Idaho's private and public colleges and universities.

Panel introduces election consolidation bill

BOISE (AP) — Election consolidation bills introduced around the Idaho Legislature since 1977, is back.

The House State Affairs Committee on Friday voted to print and introduce the latest attempt to limit the number of elections which can be held—and to update election practices.

But first the measure survived a potentially crippling amendment.

Rep. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, wanted to amend the bill to say it would not go into effect until Idaho changes its requirement for a two-thirds "supermajority" in certain elections to 60 percent.

The committee quickly rejected Stennett's idea and voted to introduce the bill.

State Affairs Chairman Pam Benson Ahrens, R-Boise, said that would just be introducing another controversial issue. It was no place here, said Rep. Wayne Sutton, R-Midvale, of Stennett's proposal.

Mrs. Ahrens said many lawmakers want to change tax laws, but the first step in that direction is election reform, since there are 996 special tax-

ing districts and 57 irrigation districts in Idaho with no limits on when they can hold elections.

Theoretically, she said, there could be an election every day.

Past efforts to pass election consolidation bills have centered on the proposition that special elections of ten day very tight turnouts because there are so many.

Mrs. Ahrens' bill limits to six the number of elections allowable each year. The dates fall in January, March, May, July, September and November, with no more than 60 days between elections.

The measure also standardizes registration, so a person registered to vote in school, city, county or special district election will be registered to vote in all others.

The bill has county clerks conducting all elections and calls for a special appropriation of \$600,000 to allow the secretary of state to list and code all taxing districts. It also authorizes special taxes to pay for the cost of elections.

The measure would not take effect until 1993.

"This is an attempt to streamline and standardize the election process," said Mrs. Ahrens, who believes "many vested interests" will oppose the bill.

Enter: the committee also voted to print and introduce a companion measure to encourage voter registration. Mrs. Ahrens said it stipulates that when someone 18 or older renews or applies for a driver's license, the person will be handed a voter registration form.

"It's an attempt to make the registration process less confusing," she said. "One more step toward encouraging access to the election process."

 - HB128 (State Affairs) — Extends the time allowed for the county clerk to issue certificates of nomination.
 - HB129 (Business) — Changes procedure for suspending automobile insurance coverage.
 - HB130 (Business) — Restricts conditions under which third party payment of medical and hospital benefits may limit coverage for prescription drugs.
 - HB131 (Business) — Changes provisions for exclusion of automobiles from commercial liability insurance policies.
 - HB132 (Judiciary, Rules and Administration) — Provides that both justices of the Supreme Court and district judges shall be nominated, retained or elected in the primary election.
 - HB133 (Judiciary, Rules and Administration) — Provides for reporting by hospital, doctors and nurses of injuries caused by deadly weapons and injuries sustained in the commission of a crime.
 - HB134 (Judiciary, Rules and Administration) — Provides that inflicting an electric line-of-pole is a misdemeanor.
 - HB135 (Resources and Conservation) — Provides that property purchased by public agency shall be subject to prior approval and a determination that such purchase is consistent with a county plan or ordinance.
 - HB136 (Energy and Conservation) — Provides for application of the Surface Mining

Briefly

Convicted killer loses 1st court appeal

BOISE — Convicted slayer Paul Ezra Rhoades has lost his first appeal to the Idaho Supreme Court from his conviction for the killing of an eastern Idaho man nearly four years ago.

Still pending the other appeals from Rhoades' conviction for two first-degree murders and subsequent death sentences.

The court on Friday unanimously upheld the life sentence ordered for Rhoades after he pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in the March 1987 slaying of convenience store clerk Nolan Hadlock.

In a key portion of the ruling, the Supreme Court said when Rhoades blurted out, "I did it," when first approached by investigators, that was a voluntary, spontaneous statement and officers did not have to precede it with a warning about his legal rights.

Department OKs hyphens on licenses

BOISE — Idaho Transportation Department officials have dropped a prohibition against listing a married woman's hyphenated name on her driver's license.

The state agency took that step during the past week after state Sen. Ron Britschpacher, D-Cratersville, uncovered regulations that provided officials with more flexibility.

Britschpacher had proposed legislation to reverse the Transportation Department's policy. Last year, the agency said it was required by federal regulations to use only a woman's legal married name on a driver's license. The federal program is designed to cut down on duplicate and even fraudulent identification practices from state to state.

Bill opponents predict F&G chaos

BOISE — A bill that would make Idaho fish and game commissioners elected officials could reduce the board in chaos, opponents said during a public hearing before the House Resources and Conservation Committee.

But supporters of a bill from Rep. Myron Jones, R-Malden, Thursday argued they trust Idaho voters to elect the best commissioners.

Since 1938, fish and game commissioners have been appointed by the governor, based on Idaho's first initiative petition drive that sought to remove politicians from wildlife decisions.

The six-member citizen board sets policy for the fish and game Department, which is moving from a \$3.4 million budget.

EPA orders power plant to cut pollution

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency, saying it was acting to protect one of the earth's most precious natural wonders — the Grand Canyon — on Friday ordered a nearby power plant to drastically cut its pollution.

Environmental groups, however, accused the agency of backing away from tougher controls on the plant.

The environmentalists and some officials in the National Park Service criticized the EPA for retreating from a proposal that would have required operators of the plant to cut pollution by 90 percent.

Elderly Rigby woman dies of exposure

RIGBY — A 67-year-old Rigby woman died of exposure Tuesday night or early Wednesday after apparently falling in front of her residence.

The body of Renah L. Martin was found by her son-in-law about 7:30 a.m. Wednesday near the front steps of her home, Rigby Police Chief Larry Anderson said Friday.

Jefferson County Coroner Neyle Raymond said an autopsy determined the woman struck her head, apparently in a fall, and died of exposure.

He estimated she was outdoors for about eight hours before being found.
