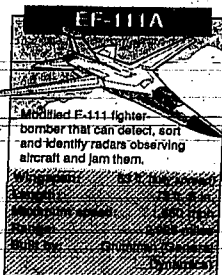

# Loss of jet brings war to Idaho

**MOUNTAIN HOME** - The reality of the Gulf War came home to Idaho Thursday. Flags were lowered to half staff in tribute to two Mountain Home Air Force Base crewmen killed in northern Saudi Arabia in the crash of their EF-111A jet during a combat mission.  
"It's a feeling of resigned sadness because we all know the price of freedom is very high," said Jim Birchfield, a former B-52 pilot who owns a restaurant just north of the base.  
The Air Force identified the crewmen as the pilot, Capt. Douglas Lloyd Brady, 29, whose hometown is Houston, and the electronic warfare officer, Capt. Paul Richard Eichenlaub II, 29, originally from Bentonville, Ark. They were the first Idaho

residents to die in Operation Desert Storm. The men were killed when their plane went down after being damaged in combat over southern Iraq. The Air Force said the aircraft crashed a few miles south of the Saudi-Iraqi border and the two bailed out, but were found dead in the aircraft's ejection capsule.

## Farm loans will be tough to get in '91

**TWIN FALLS** - With crop prices depressed and the federal government chopping its agriculture budget, Farming Home Administration officials is predicting difficulties for farmers needing loans this spring.

"We're very, very limited in funds to loan to help out through the Farmers Home Administration," said Melvin Weil, supervisor of the Twin Falls County FmHA office.

Virtually the only service available to borrowers will be loan guarantees. Weil said. Commercial lenders can ask FmHA to guarantee 90 percent of a farm loan if the applicant has poor equity or poor cash flow.

"But farmers will have to qualify for the guarantees and prove that their shaky finances result from 'circumstances beyond their control,'" Weil said.  
"We're still basically the lender of last resort, we're just improving the quality of our loans," Weil said. "We anticipate more requests for this service than in many years."

So far, just one applicant has been denied a loan guarantee, Weil said. That represents less than 10 percent of the applicants since October.

"We've got a guarantee with just about every bank in the valley that deals with farms," he said.

But more requests are on the way.  
"At this point in time, the majority of the requests will start coming in next month," he said.

## Waste ban word sent to Congress

**BOISE** - Gov. Cecil Andrus has set in motion a process that could lead to at least tacit congressional endorsement of his recent refusal to accept high-level radioactive waste at a federal facility in Idaho.

And the governor quickly brushed aside the chairman of the Idaho Republican Party's suggestion that he "cool his rhetoric" on the issue. Andrus last week called U.S. Department of Energy officials "lying so-and-sos" and this week accused them of misleading the public over plans for spent fuel: it wants to ship from a mothballed Colorado nuclear reactor.

Andrus announced Thursday that he notified House Speaker Thomas Foley and Senate President Pro Tem Robert Byrd by letter that he had rejected the Energy Department's delivery of waste from the Fort St. Vrain reactor to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Under the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982, the governor's rejection of the waste becomes final unless Congress passes a resolution overturning it within 90 days.

Andrus had 60 days to submit his "notice of disapproval" to Congress after Energy Secretary James Watkins, Feb. 7 letter notifying him of the agency's plans to ship waste to the INEL from the Fort St. Vrain reactor.

"Unfortunately, the DOE has failed to meet its legal obligations in several respects with regard to the storage of this waste."

## Idaho school improvement report aims for 90% graduation rate

**BOISE** - An 18-member task force named almost two years ago by Gov. Cecil Andrus and Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans has unveiled a blueprint Evans says will help guide Idaho's public-school system through a "crisis of change."  
The Task Force on the Future of Education in Idaho submitted its report Thursday. The 26-page report, "Educational Success for All Idaho Students," outlines a single goal, five areas of focus to achieve it and a number of strategies for change within each.

student performance during each student's school career and improves the high school graduation rate to a minimum of 90 percent.

To reach that goal, the task force said parents and patrons, local school districts, the state Department of Education, state Board of Education and the Idaho Legislature should concentrate on preschool and early childhood education, student performance and completion rate, parental and community involvement, school organization and facilities and the education profession.

Implementing the strategies for improving each of those areas will take a long-term commitment, according to the report.

"No one good year, no one good program, and no one well-publicized

reform measure will solve all of the problems facing Idaho's public education system," it said. "Included are regulatory

changes, all new program proposals, and all organization alterations must be evaluated on the basis of their potential for improving student performance and high school graduation rate, and ultimately evaluated on the extent to which those improvements occurred."

Andrus added another condition for success of recommendations included in the report, which was printed in blue ink keeping the cost within levels acceptable to Idaho taxpayers.

"What we have to do is ensure it doesn't end up in red ink," he said.

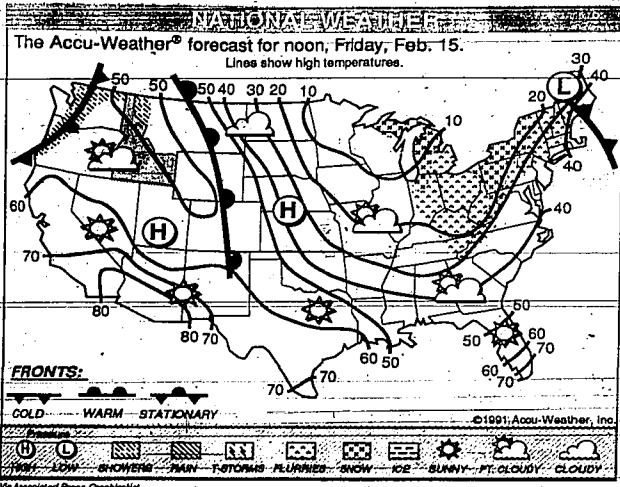

## Forecasts

## Weather summary

The National Weather Service says sunshine prevailed across Idaho Thursday afternoon after a gloomy morning. High temperatures rolled over the state through light winds and an inversion which has trapped moisture at the surface. All this held in the low clouds, fog and smoke in many areas into the afternoon hours. Some travel delays have been reported.

The high pressure will weaken today, allowing another Pacific weather system to enter the state. This system will bring rain to mainly the northern half of the state by this afternoon and into the south late tonight.

Thursday afternoon temperatures had the warm up at Twin Falls with 58 degrees and the cool spot, McCall with 36. Other 3 p.m. temperatures were Boise at 56, Lewiston 54, Pocatello 50 and Coeur d'Alene 44.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 67 degrees at Hagerman. Ketchum reported the coldest at 19 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday the highest temperature was 90 degrees at Palm Springs, MORROW and San Gabriel, Calif. The lowest was 14 degrees below zero at Fort Kent, Maine.

## Rain, snow fall on northern corners of nation

Snow and rain fell from the upper Mississippi Valley to the East Coast on Thursday while rain fell in the Northwest.

At midday, snow was falling over northern New England, from much of New York state across the western half of Pennsylvania, and over western Maryland, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, north-central Kentucky, Illinois, northeastern Missouri, eastern Iowa, southeastern Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan.

Heaviest snowfall during the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST was 3 inches at Glens Falls, N.Y., and Marietta, Mich. — 2 inches at Birmingham, N.Y., and Bradford, Pa. — and 3 inches at Portland, Maine.

Central New England had snow turning to rain southward. Rain also fell over eastern Kentucky, western

Virginia, northeastern Tennessee, eastern Pennsylvania, southern New York State and northern New Jersey.

The midday snow was heaviest in the Lake Superior-Friday over northeastern Ohio and the Lake Superior shore of Upper Michigan.

A winter storm watch was in effect through Friday over the mountains and northwestern sections of Pennsylvania, western Lower Michigan and northwestern Maryland.

Snow also fell over western Nebraska, Colorado's northern and central mountains and the northeastern third of Wyoming. Rain fell over the Idaho Panhandle and eastern Washington.

Heavy wind blew across parts of the Plains and Mississippi Valley, reaching speeds of 58 at Johnson City, Ark., 52 at McConnell Air Force Base at Wichita, Kan., and 51 mph at Sioux City, Iowa.

# California loses federal water

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — In another indication of the severity of California's worsening drought, the federal government stripped farmers in California's fertile Central Valley of three-fourths of their water allocations and also sharply curbed deliveries to two urban centers in Northern California.

The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation's announcement that it will reduce water deliveries for agriculture by 75 percent set off fearful speculation among farmers that crop prices will rise, workers will go idle and acres of land will fall out of production.

The reduction is effective on

March 1.

"We'll lose 350,000 acres or so of land not farmed," said Stephen Hall, executive director of the California Farm Water Coalition. About 23,000 farms get water from the federal Central Valley Project, and all of them will be affected to some extent, Hall said.

Citing drastically low levels in reservoirs left depleted by five dry years, the federal bureau said that it could deliver only one-quarter of its normal Central Valley Project water supply to growers in the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys.

Municipal users in populous Santa Clara and Contra Costa counties will receive only 25 percent to 50 percent of their federal water allocations.

"All systems are near zero," said Don Paff, operations chief for the Bureau's Central Valley Project. "The bank account is near dry."

California Farm Bureau Federation spokesman Clark Biggs said that the federal cutback, which will siphon off 15 percent of the water available to farms statewide, "is not anything surprising, but it's obviously going to stress agriculture, particularly on the west side of the San Joaquin and Sacramento valleys."

Neither urban nor agricultural users depend exclusively on water from the Central Valley Project. The project does supply farmers with about 20 percent of their water.

Cecil Andrus said, "Obviously, the war has come home to Idaho."

Bradt, a seven-year Air Force veteran who had been stationed at Mountain Home, since October 1989, was married but had no children. Eichenlaub, who had been in the Air Force for six years, was assigned to Mountain Home in December. He was married and had two children.

The wives of both men live at Mountain Home Air Force Base and have asked public relations officers that they not be contacted by the media. Susan Kleusner, a civilian spokeswoman for the base, said, "I am deeply saddened to hear of the loss of the two airmen from Mountain Home," said Congressman Richard Stollings, whose district includes Mountain Home. "My heart goes out to their families and also to their friends and compatriots at Mountain Home."

The EF-111A was the 27th U.S.

military aircraft lost during the war and the 16th in combat, but the first EF-111A to be shot down in combat. Some 500 men and women from Mountain Home Air Force Base have been deployed in support of Operation Desert Storm.

The Air Force said an investigation was under way to determine the exact cause of the crash.

"It's tragic to have these losses," U.S. Sen. Steve Symms said, but he was confident Idahoans would be able to support the Bush administration policy.

While the mood in Mountain Home was somber, there was no real shock.

"This is a military town," said Kelly Everett, editor of the Mountain Home Post-News. "We recognize this is what they do, the risk they take."

"These airplanes were not designed to be in the background," Mayor Donald Eiter said. "We knew they would be right up on the front

lines."

News of the crash spread quickly. Eiter said he heard of the crash early Thursday morning. "The plane's base was not identified. Later in the day, his secretary took a call confirming his fears."

"It's always a sad day when you lose someone from the community," Eiter said.

Customers were talking about the crash at Airman Pawn, but Amy Jacobsen said the general feeling was that "a kind of inevitability would be the same. If it were guys from other bases rather than our guys."

But at the base post office, the crash was not being mentioned. Blufffield, who has two sons in the military still stationed in the United States, said he could understand. "Military people have a reserve about their emotions. They won't show," he said. "They may want to cry but the won't. Their nonmilitary neighbors want to cry and they do."

comparison of the task force findings with recommendations made last month by the business-sponsored Idaho Education Project. BOE is set to strongly suggest Idaho should work toward an "output-based" public school system, and together they should give state and local officials a clear vision of what needs to be done to improve education in the coming century.

The task force was led by retired educator Helen Werner and included legislators, Board of Education President Gary Fay, school teachers and administrators throughout the state, corporate leaders and higher education officials.

It is the second statewide group within a decade to scrutinize the condition of Idaho's school system, coming in the wake of the 1982 report from the state Board of Education's Commission on Excellence in Education.

The new panel began its work by reviewing federal and state laws and regulations. State Department of Education specialists described the workings of such programs as accreditation, textbook adoption, testing, special education, teacher certification, vocational training, compensatory education and public school funding.

The committee also reviewed a number of statistics from Idaho and other states and learned how local school board policies and negotiated union contracts affect the way schools operate. It hosted 16 public hearings where more than 300

people testified, and it received about the same number of letters.

In addition, it met with various state agencies and commissions, studied recent developments in educational reform and looked into the impact of new instructional technology on instruction, early intervention efforts and other innovative programs.

Recommendations outlined in its report are intended to be flexible and adaptable to varying circumstances in local school districts.

"Time and experience will determine which strategies are most effective in improving both student performance and the high school completion rate," according to the report. "Time and experience will also suggest new options for achieving that overriding goal."

Here are the five areas of emphasis and strategies for each identified in the task force report:

**Preschool and early childhood education**  
Provide state support to expand the Head Start program to serve all eligible children.  
Develop a preschool preparation program.  
Establish pilot programs to offer early intervention to students identified as being at risk of school failure.

**Student performance and completion rate**  
Encourage implementation of most effective teaching practices and provide needed support and instructional equipment.  
Establish statewide instructional

goals and performance objectives.  
Provide support to students throughout their school careers, through comprehensive guidance and counseling.  
Improve student performance through the use of educational technology.  
Establish alternative programs, leading to high school graduation.  
Parental and community involvement.  
Encourage and improve parents' involvement in their children's education.  
School organization and facilities.  
Allow experimentation with "ungraded" primary levels, eliminating the pressures of grade-to-grade advancement for elementary school students.  
Strengthen middle-level programs in junior high schools.  
Evaluate the basic structure of the school year.  
Develop class size and use of classroom space at all grade levels.  
Encourage development and implementation of school-initiated improvement plans for increasing student achievement.  
Develop a program of deregulation to encourage development of pilot projects.  
The education profession.  
Attract, develop and retain quality personnel.  
Revise professional preparation programs.  
Revise certification standards.  
Improve programs of supervision and evaluation.  
Evaluate the current "renewable contract" law for teachers.

material in Idaho," Andrus said in his letter. "Moreover, I do not believe it is in the national interest, or in the interests of the people of Idaho, for this storage to occur at INEL."

Public Service Co. of Colorado, a Denver-based utility, wants the waste shipped to Idaho under an agreement with the Department of Energy to handle spent fuel from the commercial reactor in Platteville, Colo.

But Andrus refused last week, and after being sued by Public Service in U.S. District Court in Boise to force acceptance of the waste, the governor filed a complaint with his own federal appellate court.

Andrus expanded on that in his letter to Foley and Byrd, listing five reasons why he decided to reject the Fort St. Vrain waste, which the Department of Energy said this week it plans to use for research on advanced designs for high-temperature gas-cooled reactors. The agency specifically cited commercial applications, but similar technology is used in the proposed Idaho Nuclear Reactor for waste product tritium for use in nuclear bombs.

According to the governor, the Energy Department:

- Failed to cooperate and consult with the state as required by the Nuclear Waste Policy Act on all

stages of planning, development, modification, expansion and operation of such a storage site.

- Failed to comply with the act in its agreement with Public Service on the use of INEL as a storage site for the waste.
- Proposed a storage site above the Snake River Plain Aquifer, which provides drinking water for more than 200,000 southern and eastern Idaho residents, posing a potential threat to their health and safety.
- Failed to complete a full environmental impact statement as required by the Nuclear Waste Policy Act before providing storage capacity for 300 or more metric tons of waste, as it proposed to do at the INEL.
- Completed an inadequate environmental assessment under federal law. Council on Environmental Quality regulations and the department's own rules, that concluded the waste would have no significant impact.

**'Domestic partners' flock to register status**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Chris Minor and Richard Mulholland, sporting matching leather jackets and boots, beat the Valentine's Day rush and became the city's first domestic partners.

"It's a real milestone, not only in our relationship, but for the gay community," said Minor, who had waited since 5:30 a.m. on the steps of City Hall. His chilly vigil paid off when the couple became the city's first legal domestic partners shortly after 8

a.m., a "test case" on the first day that unwed couples could officially register their romances with the city.

About a dozen couples were waiting when City Hall opened for an expected Valentine's Day deluge of gays, lesbians and unwed heterosexuals taking advantage of the first opportunity to sign up under the new law.

Among the first were Christmas Leubric, a 41-year-old nurse, and her lover of six years, Alice

Heinsoth, 39, a city health worker. They were pastie silk outfits and flowers in the hair.

"We worked hard on this," said Leubric, who was active in the campaign to get the law approved by voters last November. "It's about love and recognition of relationships."

City Hall already had 100 weddings scheduled for Valentine's Day, and no one was sure how many domestic partners would show up to add to the throng. Estimates ranged

from 50 to 5,000. By 11 a.m. about 70 couples had paid the \$35 fee to file their declaration with the county clerk.

A late-afternoon, multidimensional ceremony was planned to recognize each registered couple, with their names announced as they stroll down City Hall's rotunda stairway.

San Francisco Supervisor Harry Britt's staff handed out thousands of flyers about the law in the predominantly gay Castro district.

**New rules on treatment of animals start in March**

WASHINGTON (AP) — New federal rules prescribing the treatment of dogs and monkeys used in laboratories and sold in pet stores will go into effect next month, the Agriculture Department said Thursday.

The regulations, the last of three installments, generally cover animals used in research, sold into the pet trade, transported commercially and publicly exhibited.

Congress has amended the Animal Welfare Act of 1966 three times, most recently in 1986.

That led to the latest round of regulations, which take effect March 18.

James W. Glosser, administrator of the department's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, said the agency has produced a practical and enforceable blend of performance and engineering standards "affecting the treatment of animals."

"We have made room for variation in the way individual animals behave and for differences in the

way they are housed and used and housed," he said.

Engineering standards set design requirements, such as a formula for producing the floor space in a pen for a dog, based on the animal's size.

The performance standard requires that each dog must be able to turn freely, stand, sit and lie in comfortable positions, and to walk in a normal manner.

But some animal welfare advocates said the USDA failed to go as far as it should have.

"My main complaint is that USDA has given too much discretion to the researchers to decide the details of exercise for the dogs and psychological well-being for primates," said Martin Stephens, vice-president of the Humane Society of the United States.

Stephens, who oversees the society's laboratory animals program, said the department "simply lays out a few parameters but leaves it to the researchers to decide the details" on how to carry out the rules.

**CDC: Rubella cases on the rise**

ATLANTA (AP) — Rubella, the usually mild childhood rash that can cause devastating birth defects, is making a comeback, largely among young adults who were never vaccinated, federal health researchers said Thursday.

Rubella, sometimes known as German measles, was on the decline three years ago, when a record low 275 cases were reported nationwide. But 396 were reported in 1989 and 1,093 were reported last year, the national Centers for Disease Control announced.

"This indicates we need to make more progress," said Dr. Laura Fehrs, an immunization specialist with the Atlanta-based CDC.

She said the case count remains well below the millions of cases reported before the advent of rubella vaccine in the late 1960s.

**Ibuprofen linked to ulcers**

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The widely used pain-reliever ibuprofen doubles the risk of ulcers, according to Vanderbilt University researchers, and some experts say people taking it may want to consider lower doses or alternatives.

But for those suffering chronic pain and inflammation, ibuprofen may be the best choice, as it has the lowest ulcer risk in its class of analgesics, researchers said.

The Vanderbilt study confirms the increased risk of ulcers in people who use prescription pain relievers, including ibuprofen, that belong to a group called non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs or NSAIDs.

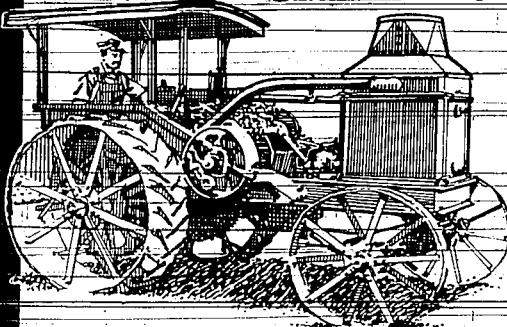
It said the overall risk increased with higher doses and was greatest

in the first month of use.

Ibuprofen, available without a prescription since 1985, is sold under such brand names as Advil, Medipren, Motrin and Nuprin. It has captured about 20 percent of the \$2.5 billion non-prescription pain-reliever market.

The study, published in Friday's *Annals of Internal Medicine*, involved 1,415 Tennessee Medicaid enrollees hospitalized for ulcers from 1984 to 1986 and 7,063 control patients. At recommended dosages for treating rheumatoid arthritis, NSAIDs quadrupled the risk for ulcers. But of the dozen drugs studied, ibuprofen showed the lowest risk, at 2.3 times, while mefenamate increased the risk 8.7 times.

**U.S. dismisses Soviet Union allegation**

WASHINGTON — The State Department on Thursday dismissed as "ridiculous" a Soviet charge that Western and Soviet banks had engaged in conspiracy to destroy the country's financial system.

"The story is a transparent effort by Soviet authorities to blame foreigners for economic and financial difficulties that result primarily from the Soviet Union's own domestic policies," spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said.

The allegation was made Tuesday by Soviet Prime Minister Valentin Pavlov, who said the conspirators, whom he did not identify, had been plotting to overthrow President Mikhail Gorbachev.

**State ready to do some fancy footwork**

RALEIGH, N.C. — North Carolina's General Assembly adopted a state ball, beverage and dog in the 1980s, and now may step on some toes while it embarks on a search for an official state dance.

The steel taps of more than two dozen clog dancers clattered their challenge for the title on the Legislative Building's granite plaza Wednesday. And state Rep. Bertha Holt has already joined state Sen. Herbert Hyde in filing a bill to make clogging the state dance.

"But among those waiting in the wings is state Rep. Dave Redwine, whose bid to make the shag — a regional beach dance — the state dance failed last session.

**Garn: Reporters Hussein mouthpiece**

LOGAN, Utah — Sen. Jake Garn says the U.S. and its allies have destroyed Iraq's ability to communicate to the world, so American reporters have become Saddam Hussein's "mouthpiece."

"The U.S. news satellites in Baghdad are serving as Saddam's conduit to the Arab masses as he tries to stir up dissent and break up the U.S.-led coalition," Garn told the Logan Kiwanis Club Thursday.

The Utah Republican described himself as a defender of freedom of the press, but added, "Somehow, there has got to be some common sense and responsibility in a wartime situation." The senator said he does not question the integrity and loyalty of the U.S. reporters in Iraq. But, "I frankly think they ought to get out and quit being Saddam Hussein's mouthpiece. They are helping him reach his goal of winning the political battle even though we win the war."

**Investor may not get his piece of rock**

LOS ANGELES — An investor who purchased a landmark known as Eagle Rock says he's caught between the 50-foot-high boulder and a hard place. The City Council voted this week to begin eminent domain proceedings to acquire the rock for \$500,000, saying it has cultural significance. The rock, which looks to some like an eagle with wings spread, is part of the Eagle Rock district eight miles north of downtown. Fred Heim's plan to sell a parcel of land that includes Eagle Rock to a developer prompted the City Council action Tuesday. The city is offering Heim \$500,000 for the land. He contends it is worth far more.

**Economy declining, sales down**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Business sales plunged 2.3 percent in December, the steepest in four years, the government said Thursday in a report analysts said showed the economy in a significant decline.

The Commerce Department reported that business sales slowed to a seasonally adjusted \$530.9 billion, even worse than the 1.5 percent decline in November and the biggest drop since they fell 3.1 percent in January 1987.

The report on overall sales came a day after the department said sales on the retail level continued to fall in January. The 0.9 percent decline followed a 1.5 percent drop in December for the first back-to-back decreases in seven months.

Retail sales, which were flat in November, haven't risen since a barely perceptible 0.1 percent advance in October.

However, Thursday's report also had a touch of good news: It said business inventories in December dropped 0.7 percent, to a seasonally adjusted \$810.7 billion, after advancing 0.2 percent in November and 0.4 percent in October.

In past recessions, big piles of goods on shelves and backlogs caused growing production cutbacks and job layoffs as businesses struggled to sell off their backlogs. The activity pushed the ratio of inventories to sales to 1.53 from 1.5 in November.

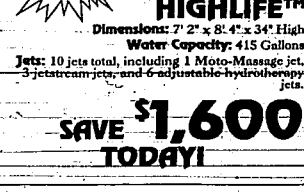

**Teacher strike latest eastern German woe**

BERLIN (AP) — More than 15,000 teachers and school workers staged a warning strike in eastern Germany on Thursday in the latest sign of the region's growing economic troubles.

The German economics ministry said eastern German industrial output plunged 10.5 percent in December.

Across the former Communist nation of 16 million residents, local leaders are clamoring for more mon-

ey from the federal government, unemployment is increasing and rents are rising beyond the reach of many people.

For many, the euphoria over October's unification of the two Germanys has been replaced by anxiety and feelings of insecurity about the future.

Teachers walked off their jobs in the cities of Dresden, Leipzig and Chemnitz, forcing three-quarters of the local schools and kindergartens

to close for the day.

In all, about 15,500 striking teachers and school personnel took to the streets in demonstrations during the one-day job action, according to the GfW teachers' union.

The strikers were demanding higher wages and job protection, despite efforts to trim down the bloated Communist-era work forces.

Economics Minister Jurgen Moellmann said earlier this week that rebuilding the industry in east-

ern Germany will take longer and be more difficult than originally thought.

At the same time, the federal government said it was sending \$6-billion to eastern German this month to keep towns and cities financially afloat.

On Thursday, Moellmann said the 10.5 percent drop in eastern German industrial production underscores the "seriousness of the economic situation there."

**Kremlin recalls ambassador to Iceland**

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has recalled its ambassador to Iceland and demanded an explanation of Iceland's decision to establish diplomatic ties with the socialist Lithuanian republic, the Foreign Ministry was quoted as saying Thursday.

"Lithuania remains one of the union republics of the Soviet Union. Ignoring this fundamental fact is an attempt to interfere in the Soviet Union's internal affairs," spokesman Vitaly Churkin said.

**Soviet shoppers skeptical price hikes will fill stores**

MOSCOW (AP) — Government proposals to hike retail prices by up to 200 percent brought sighs of resignation from Soviet shoppers who said Thursday it would do nothing to put more food and goods on empty store shelves.

The plan, which must be approved by the Soviet legislature, would eliminate government subsidies to producers.

Wages, pensions, children's wel-

fare payments and other income would be increased to compensate for at least some of the higher prices, according to the government newspaper, Izvestia, and state television. The plan is an attempt to close the large gap in the Soviet Union between the cost of producing goods and wholesale prices. It would not end central government control over prices, a cumbersome system that must be dismantled before a free

market economy can ever exist in this vast nation.

No date has been set for the increases to take effect. Many details have not been released. The hikes were originally announced last month by Anatoly Kravina, deputy chairman of the State Price Committee. "It's not going to do any good for any of us," said Sergei Baranov, a worker at a Moscow machine tool factory. "The compensation is

laughable. The prices are too high even now compared to our pay."

Baranov, waiting for his wife to buy shirts in a children's department store in Moscow, said he doubted the plan would improve scarce supplies of food and consumer goods.

"What we need is private property ownership and a form of capitalism so that there could be material incentives for everybody to work," he said.

**Mandela's kidnap trial put on hold**

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The kidnap and assault trial of Winnie Mandela was postponed Thursday until March 6 so prosecutors could search for a witness whose disappearance put their case in jeopardy.

Prosecutor Jan Swanepoel received the postponement by arguing that it would be "impossible" to proceed after one key witness vanished and two others subsequently were too scared to testify.

Mrs. Mandela, wife of African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela, and three co-defendants are being tried on charges they kidnaped and assaulted four young men in Soweto in December 1988. All pleaded innocent Monday to four counts each of kidnap and assault.

One of the four young men, Stompie Seipei, was found dead with his throat slit in a field in January 1989. The missing man, Gabriel Mkgwae, and the two who are refusing to testify survived the alleged assault, and their testimony is vital to the prosecution's case.

Mkgwae disappeared Sunday night, hours before he was to take the stand. On Wednesday, Kenneth Kgase and his wife Mono said Mkgwae's disappearance frightened them, and they refused to testify.

Judge M.S. Stegmann said he sympathized with Kgase and Mono but did not consider their fear of reprisals "a just excuse" for declining to give evidence.

Stegmann ordered the men detained Thursday morning, then released them after the postponement was announced.

**5 guns taken from deputies**

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Security guards at the federal Parliament on Thursday confiscated five handguns from two Croatian deputies and bodyguards, the state news agency Tanjug reported.

Croatia, an anti-Communist republic in western Yugoslavia, is at the center of a bitter dispute over the future of the fractious federation, made up of six states and two provinces.

According to Jovan Vuckovic, an official of the federal Interior Ministry, four guns were found on prominent Croatian deputy Branimir Glavic and his two bodyguards when they entered the assembly in downtown Belgrade, Tanjug said.

Security officials confiscated the weapons and another Croatian deputy Ivan Mikulic also handed over a pistol, the agency said.

**Leftist group bombs chapel in war protest**

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Members of a radical leftist group exploded a bomb at a Mormon chapel to protest the Persian Gulf War, causing minor damage and no injuries, police reported.

The bombing occurred shortly before midnight Wednesday at the chapel in Maipo, a middle class suburb in western Santiago, police said, 11 minutes from downtown.

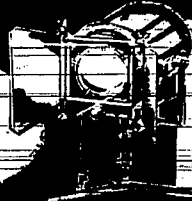
At the site of the explosion, police found pamphlets of the Leftist Revolutionary Movement, a radical leftist group, saying "No to the imperialist war."

The Mormon chapels have been a frequent target of attacks by extremist groups, a tool of the Mormon Church "a fool of yankee imperialism."

**Soviet Union warned about arms talks: No 'business as usual'**

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Former Soviet allies on Thursday joined the West in warning there could be no "business as usual" at arms talks unless the Kremlin complied with a treaty to slash tank quotas and other non-nuclear weapons.

The stand of the Eastern European countries, still formally allied with Moscow in the moribund Warsaw Pact, illustrated the Soviets' increasing isolation in Europe.

The West says the Soviets are trying to exclude three motorized infantry divisions of about 7,000 tanks from an historic East-West arms

treaty signed last November in Paris. Western countries also are concerned about the movement of thousands of Soviet tanks outside the zone covered by the treaty and figures the Soviets have provided on the quantity of weapons they possess.

"No one supported the Soviets," Hungarian chief negotiator Istvan Gyarmati told reporters after the meeting.

"It's very serious, it's more than serious," he said. "We hope this is not the prevailing policy in Moscow."

There has been evidence in the Soviet Union recently that hard-line rightist military officials are gaining influence, affecting the policies of President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

U.S. Secretary of James A. Baker III suggested delaying congressional ratification of the Paris treaty because of questions about Soviet compliance. Hungary has said it would not submit the treaty for ratification until the Soviet position is clarified.

The treaty commits all countries to strict limits on the number of tanks and other conventional

weapons. The new round of the Conventional Forces in Europe talks are to focus mainly on the number of soldiers stationed on the continent. But the Soviets were told Thursday there will be no progress in those talks until they comply with the treaty they signed in Paris.

Polish chief delegate Jerzy Nowak Moscow's former allies and neighbors, seeking to ensure the security of their new democracies.

Poland, Hungary and Czechoslovakia all share borders with the So-

viet Union. Central and Eastern Europe lose most when the treaty does not go into effect," Nowak told reporters. He said his delegation had "full sympathy with the Western position."

Western diplomats quoted U.S. chief delegate James Woolsey as warning the meeting that it could "not conduct business as usual" if the Soviet position is clarified.

"Military equipment that is unambiguously and expressly within the scope of the treaty cannot be excluded from the treaty limitations by

means of organizational measures," said German chief delegate Ruediger Hartmann.

"Precisely because confidence in the political will of all participants is at issue here, it is urgently necessary that this obstacle be promptly removed by those who have created it," he added.

His opening speech to the closed-door plenary session was made available to reporters. Western delegates quoted Soviet chief delegate Oleg Grinevsky as saying the talks should move not get bogged down over the issue.



**Fireworks explosion injures 4**

CULEMBORG, Netherlands (AP) — A massive explosion wrecked a fireworks factory Thursday, causing several injuries and widespread damage on the outskirts of this central Dutch town, police and witnesses said.

A city council member told Dutch Radio four employees were injured and two were missing in the blast.

The six workers were in the MS Fireworks Factory at the time of the explosion, which occurred around noon local time, according to the official. He was identified only by his last name, Dieperink.

"All I've heard is that some injured people have been evacuated," said police spokesman Sebo-Nayser, who could give no further details on casualties.

There was no immediate word on what may have caused the blast at the plant 3 1/2 miles outside of town.

Two hours after the explosion, smoke was pouring from the plant as police set up a 600-yard safety radius around the factory, fearing further explosions.

Chunks of concrete and steel were scattered around nearby fields. Eyewitness Hendrik Wemdyly said "First I thought it was a sonic boom. Then I looked over and I saw a huge cloud of smoke and fireworks exploding."

Another witness told Dutch Radio that the explosion caused severe damage to nearby homes. The radio report said windows were shattered throughout Culemborg as well as Leerdam, about 4 1/2 miles away.

**9 skiers dead in Alps**

BRIANCON, France (AP) — Nine Dutch skiers were killed in the French Alps when they were buried by an avalanche apparently set off by earth tremors, local officials said Thursday. It was the worst killer avalanche in Europe in 10 years.

Rescue workers had been searching since Wednesday afternoon for the nine, who were swept away by a 250-yard-wide avalanche in any area of the Alps where there had been numerous smaller snowslides. Local officials said slight tremors were suspected of loosening the wave of snow following several recent snowstorms.

**Iranian edict stands**

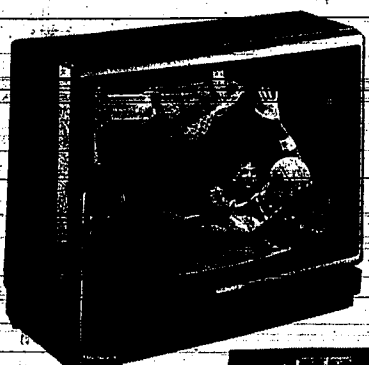

Mohammad Vaez-Zadeh, Khurasan told Muslims that the fatwa, or religious edict, could not be rescinded by any other religious figure, according to Iran's official news agency.

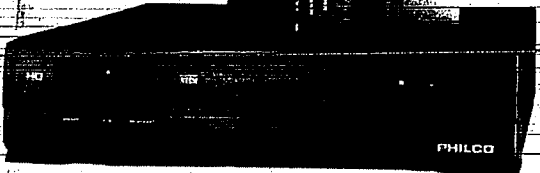

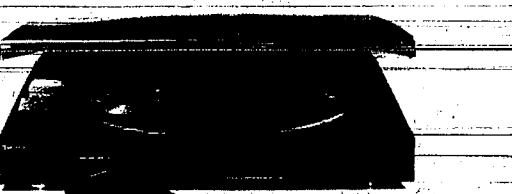

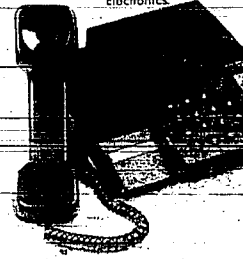

## Keep politics out of game management

### Editorial

### A few thoughts on politicians, war, a bridge to prosperity

Once again, some selected short subjects:

#### Our partisan patriot

Shame on U.S. Sen. Steve Symms. Shame on him for questioning Congressman Larry LaRocco's patriotism over LaRocco's vote against authorizing use of force in the Mideast.

The congressional vote, just before the Jan. 15 deadline for Iraq's withdrawal, was not a litmus test of patriotism. It was the culmination of an important national debate over how best to free Kuwait. LaRocco was among the minority who thought sanctions should be tried awhile longer before sending U.S. troops in harm's way.

When Symms says LaRocco and other Democrats were putting party goals ahead of their country, he isn't fighting fair.

LaRocco and others who favored sanctions over force had every right to do so — in fact, they had a constitutional responsibility to consider the issue carefully and vote according to their consciences. For them, blindly backing the president would have been dereliction of duty. If anyone is exploiting the war for political ends, it's Symms.

#### The first stone

Speaking of the war, the sudden alarm about civilian deaths in Iraq carries an air of hypocrisy.

The deaths are a shocking tragedy. Images of the victims' burned bodies will doubtless haunt the allied military officers who planned and executed the air strike. Any repeat of such an event must be avoided.

But let's have some perspective. Innocent people suffer and die in every high-tech targeting, modern intelligence-gathering and so-called precision bombing can't change that ugly fact.

Anyone who can't tolerate the terrifying truth about war should work earnestly and unswervingly for peace. That includes anyone on the allied

side who suddenly is having doubts about the war effort. It also includes Saddam Hussein and his handful of Arab allies.

Let them ask themselves, "Did I do all I could to prevent the chain of events that led to this horror?" If not, let them keep silent.

#### A positive step

Having rapped Sen. Steve Symms' knuckles in the first item, we'd like to give him a little pat on the back, too. News that his office is setting up an internship program for Hispanic students is welcome.

Hispanics as a group are overlooked and underrepresented in Idaho politics. A program that will expand opportunities for Hispanic students while injecting a Hispanic viewpoint into a congressional office is an excellent step.

Other Idaho politicians would be wise to follow Symms' example of reaching out to this important ethnic group.

#### Name that bridge

Twin Falls city officials reportedly haven't settled on a name for the new bridge over Rock Creek. Some folks are calling it the "Victory Bridge" simply for convenience, since it connects with Victory Avenue. But some City Council members are said to favor "Centennial Bridge."

Either would be a fine choice. But in a year of war, "Victory" definitely has the emotional edge — especially if the war and the construction project happen to conclude about the same time.

Here's one more idea. The Peace Bridge.

Consider the symbolism: The bridge's goal is to make truck travel easier in the industrial area, in order to promote economic development. So Twin Falls would have a bridge of peace, linked to an avenue of victory, leading to a zone dedicated to prosperity.

What? You think that's corny? OK, so let's hear your idea.

As I see it, there are a number of politicians in this state of Idaho that keep trying to get the Idaho Department of Fish and Game involved politically more than they already are. A cardinal example was illustrated in the Feb. 9 Times-News titled, "Defeated in House, Fish and Game pushes ahead."

Although Rep. Myron Jones's, R-Malad, bill was defeated in the House (and by the way, Myron Jones just so happens to be a Malad farmer/rancher), the same bill is now being sponsored by a Marti Calabretta, a Democrat, in the Senate with some slight modifications.

I see it, this is nothing more than a diabolical plot to get the Idaho Department of Fish and Game subject to the whimsical odd notions of politicians, most of whom don't know a thing about the management of game.

Managing game and fish is not, and never has been, something for politicians to get their hands in. It's a complicated process that should not be hampered by politics.

Furthermore, for commissioners to be elected by the general electorate would be a disaster.

I would wind up in cynicism, with unqualified people trying to run the show who would know nothing or very little about fish and game management but would yield to political party pressure. Which I'm afraid this whole thing is about anyhow.

Calabretta's bill would expand the commission to seven members. They would be elected by state districts and be non-partisan, she advocates, which is simply

hogwash. No sooner than politics would enter into the scheme, the Fish and Game Department would have their hands tied by the district politicians who would be dictators of policy.

As the end result, Fish and Game would take a beating from every direction, and deprecation payments would be extreme, and game laws wouldn't be worth the paper they would be written on.

In every state where politics control the wildlife, there usually isn't enough to making hunting worth the effort. Politics was partially taken out of Idaho's Fish and Game Department in the 1930s — except for the appropriation of the finances to operate the department.

And in my opinion, that shouldn't be either. Each department of the state should be its own stewardship, responsible for its own finances, management and council with no interference from politics, especially so for Fish and Game policy.

It's the hundreds of thousands of dollars contributed annually by sportsmen in Idaho that keep the hunting and fishing as it is today.

Enter politics into that equation and you'll have the largest deterioration of fish and game in the long history of Idaho's popular sports, which from where I sit, is the present scheme of these two nefarious bills presented and sponsored by Calabretta and Jones.

You see, with no game to hunt or no fish to fish for, there would be no problem with trespassers, no game to eat the grass and everything would be rosy for the public hand users.

Perhaps these two bills are long-range programs to cut down or — in effect — eliminate the Fish and Game Department and have the whole department back into politics as it was in the 1930s.

Unless we sportsmen band together and put a stop to these political shenanigans, we'll find that the future of hunting and fishing in Idaho is in serious jeopardy — maybe not right away but certainly in the future!

Our best defense is to call our state legislators and emphasize the fact that should they vote for any such legislation, that we sportsmen will remember them at the next election.

Our hunting right now is one of the best in the West/East states and we damn well want to keep it that way. Just remember this one thing: Politics was the main culprit that shut off the black bear and mountain lion seasons in California in 1989.

The sportsmen must hang together and immediately call their representatives and give them their opinion on this legislation.

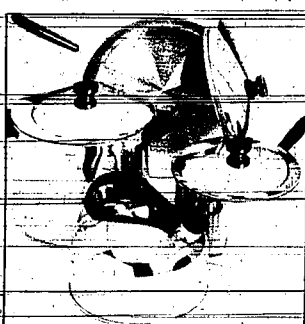

## Drought bad news hasn't dried up yet

Irrigators, hydroelectric producers and other water users below the Salmon River got more bad news from the year's second meeting of the Idaho Water Supply Committee.

Southern Idaho's five-year drought is getting even worse.

And while the state might get a little rain and mountain snow this weekend, the forecast through April is for continuing below-normal precipitation throughout most of

the state.

Phil Morrissey, a hydrologist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, told the federal-state agency Thursday in Boise that Feb. 1 snowpack measurements in central Idaho's Big Wood, Little Wood, Big Lost and Little Lost river basins were the second-lowest since records started being kept in 1950.

Only the record drought of 1977 saw lower snowpack readings in those basins over the past four decades, and Morrissey said things have gotten even worse over the past two weeks.

"You just have to look out toward the

mountains to see there's nothing," Morrissey said.

With more than half the water year that began last October now past, a summary report from the Soil Conservation Service on the state's outlook for coming months said it was "highly unlikely that the snowpack deficit in central and southern Idaho can be overcome before spring runoff begins."

"Water users in these areas should be prepared for potentially critical water-shortages," the report said.

Making matters worse, snowfall was

down all over Idaho last month, with the southern portion of the state getting less than half of its normal amount and the still fairly moist Panhandle only a little more than half of normal.

National Weather Service hydrologist Tom Egger said southeastern Idaho and the Upper Snake River Basin east of the river needs nine more inches of rain than it normally receives to end the drought there.

He said the Boise, Weiser and Payette river drainages need seven extra inches.

### Man charged with kidnapping, assault

RUPERT — A 25-year-old Rupert man has been arrested and charged with dragging a girl at knifepoint from the apartment where she was baby-sitting.

David Kime faces separate charges of aggravated assault and second-degree kidnapping. He remained in the Minidoka County Jail Thursday in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

The woman for whom the 14-year-old girl was baby-sitting returned home at about 10:30 p.m. and saw Kime and the girl in the parking lot of Pashermakny Court apartments, Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. said.

The woman reported that Kime ran away when she drove up, Creason said. When Kime returned about 30 minutes later, three Rupert Police officers arrested him.

Kime lives in the apartment directly above the one in which the girl was baby-sitting, Creason said.

### Bill to protect the Middle Snake River passes House

BOISE — A bill to protect the Middle Snake River from hydro development passed the House on Thursday by a 77-4 vote. The bill now goes to the governor.

"We just want to make sure we keep this river healthy, alive and viable and working for this part of the state," Republican Rep. Maxine Bell of Jerome said on the floor.

An 84-mile stretch of the Snake River from Murtagh to King Hill was granted protected status for two years under the Comprehensive Rivers Planning Protection Act so its waters could be studied.

Protected status expired in July, but the measure passed Thursday would extend protection while the study is completed.

### Twin Falls, other cities apply for federal development funds

BOISE — The cities of Twin Falls, Burley, Fairfield and Gooding have applied for federal money available for economic development projects, senior centers and infrastructure improvements.

Twin Falls has asked for \$360,418 to build a road to the labor camp; Burley has asked for \$100,000 to build a senior center; Gooding has asked for \$4,900 to make senior center improvements; and Fairfield has asked for \$59,170 for senior center renovations.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has made \$7.1 million available to Idaho rural communities this year and the money is administered on a competitive basis by the Idaho Community Development Block Grant program.

Grant recipients will be announced by the governor this spring.

### Museums may be established as separate taxing districts

BOISE — A bill to establish county museum boards as separate taxing districts passed the House floor Thursday.

Sponsored by Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, in the interest of Jerome County, the bill passed 68-12.

Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, said he voted against the measure because he opposes creating additional taxing districts to skirt the 5 percent tax increase cap.

The bill amends existing law to make county museum boards separate tax districts and requires county commissioners to levy property taxes for the county museum budget.

If passed by the Senate and signed by the governor, the legislation would help the Jerome County Historical Society raise tax revenue for the agricultural museum it is constructing on U.S. Highway 93.

### Minimum stream flow bill application passed by House

BOISE — The House on Thursday passed a minimum stream flow application for Circle Creek in the City of Reks National Preserve.

The measure, sponsored by Rep. Myron Jones, R-Madad, appropriates a minimum flow of 1.5 cubic feet per second for Circle Creek and .5 cfs for its tributaries within the preserve in Cassia County. The U.S. Forest Service requested the water right to protect habitat.

The concurrent resolution, having also passed the Senate, will be filed at the Office of the Secretary of State.

It was passed by a 74-1 vote.

## Murtaugh has sewer problems

MURTAUGH — An engineer says the city has too much sewage flowing through its system.

JUB engineer Tracy Ahrens told the City Council that the city has 185 gallons per capita of sewage flowing through the system.

The Environmental Quality division of the state Health and Welfare Department requires a study if readings indicate more than 120 gallons per capita is flowing through a city's system.

Environmental Quality has given a grant to the city to improve the sewer system and the city has hired JUB to conduct the necessary tests on the system.

JUB currently is doing an infiltration and inflow study to determine where the extra sewage is coming from.

The engineers need to physically look into the sewer system but have been unable to do so.

Ahrens said that when they lifted the manholes they found standing water, indicating that there is a plug somewhere in the system.

Mayor Rob Wright said that there have been no complaints from residents or businesses in the area in regard to having a backed up sewer because the system is designed to reroute the sewage when there is a plug.

The plug will have to be located and removed before JUB can continue its investigation.

## Committee approves minority program

BOISE — Nineteen-year-old Julio Garcia of Rupert, a sophomore at Boise State University with a 4.0 grade-point average, is a role model showing minority students can excel in higher education.

The legislation would create the scholar-

ship program, but the money is appropriated separately. Gov. Cecil Andrus has included a \$100,000 appropriation for the program in his budget, while advocates are seeking \$250,000 from the Legislature.

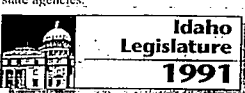
"It will provide a beginning access for those who need it, not just those who want it," Byrd said.

two inches, and the southern half of central Idaho and western half of the Upper Snake River Basin four inches.

"These amounts are very difficult to come by," Egger said. "Nine inches is about what southeast Idaho gets in a normal year, so I would estimate it would take several years to get that down to zero."

Historically, overall precipitation for Idaho through January was slightly above what it was at the same time in 1990. Only the Ketchum Station has reported less than half of normal precipitation for the water year so far.

But last month was much drier than January 1990, and Egger said the cumulative soil moisture deficit has Idaho rangeland and non-irrigated farmers on the ropes. He said Ketchum received only 7 percent of normal precipitation last month, dropping its total for the year to 29 percent.

It's not likely that will be significant because our biggest months for snowpack accumulation are January and December," O'Keefe said.

The Soil Conservation Service reported that reservoir water storage in northern Idaho remains near average, but conditions drop to below average central and southern Idaho.

The three reservoirs on the Boise River system had 10 percent of normal storage, or 42 percent of capacity, on Feb. 1, while the nine reservoirs on the Snake River system reported 79 percent of normal storage, or 55 percent of capacity.

Harder hit areas included Magic Reservoir at 21 percent of average and 10 percent of capacity, Oakley Reservoir with 31 percent of average and 10 percent of capacity;

Blackfoot Reservoir with 37 percent of average and 25 percent of capacity; and Salmon Falls Reservoir with 29 percent of average and only 8 percent of capacity.

And because of low snowpack levels, experts said river flows, kayakers and anglers can expect an earlier than usual runoff season, especially on the state's southwest desert rivers.

The Water Supply Committee, appointed by Gov. Cecil Andrus in 1988, said Idaho entered the second and so far driest year of the continuing drought, scheduled another meeting March 14 to continue its work of keeping water users informed so they can take steps to conserve or find alternatives.

Lottery benefits Gooding School District

GOODING — The state lottery has been "a real shot in the arm" for the Gooding School District, Superintendent James Cobble says.

The district will receive \$48,000 in lottery funds this year, he said at the School Board meeting Tuesday.

Trustee Joseph Pavkov said he would like the public to know that the school district's receiving lottery funds as promised, and those funds are a big help.

Cobble said the lottery money can only be spent on plant facilities, not on salaries or programs.

This year, he said, the district plans to spend more than \$160,000 on a new gymnasium roof, floor refinishing, new sidewalks, remodeling for a middle school faculty work room, new storage buildings, carpeting, the replacement of doors and windows and other projects.

"Without the lottery money, we would have to cut back considerably," Cobble said.

In related business, Cobble said the Gooding district can expect to receive a \$50,436 cutback in state funding. The district will cover this loss from the fund balance rather than making program or salary cuts this year, he predicted.

"That state cutback is not definite yet," he added. "There is some movement in front of the Legislature, asking for emergency appropriations for all districts, so that money is not lost for sure."

The lottery money and the state funding cut do not balance each other, Cobble said, because the two funds are in "totally different" budget areas, the former is part of the plant facilities budget and the cutback affects the budget for programs and personnel costs.

"There's no interchanging of funds," he said. The state cutback, although it is only about 2 percent of a \$3 million budget, would be a "pretty significant amount of money," Cobble said.

Also at the meeting, the School Board agreed to support a proposal from the Glenns Ferry district that girls and boys should equally share "prime time" — weekend nights — on the basketball courts.

Instead of boys always playing their games on Friday and Saturday nights while girls play on Tuesday and Thursday nights, the boys would play on one school night and girls should be given a weekend night, the proposal said.

School Board Chairman Claire Major said the Gooding district pushed for this "non-discrimination" change several years ago, but did not get

support from other districts. "I really am in favor to do anything we can to get some of those girls' games out of the middle of the week," she said.

Trustee Martha Oberle said schools should try to get away from as many weekday games as possible because the students get home so late on school nights.

Trustee Mitch Arkoosh said he would like to see the prime time shared.

Cobble said new basketball schedules for boys and girls would need support from other schools in the ID District.

"It's fairly complex," he said. "It's not as easy as it seems."

The School Board decided to send a letter to state legislators, stating their support for the 90 percent school attendance law.

"I'm very much in favor of it," Major said. "It has been beneficial."

Recently, she said, people have objected to the law and are asking legislators to repeal it.

Cobble said the 90 percent attendance promotes dependability. He said a study of the public work force shows that problems with attendance and lack of human relation skills are the two main reasons people get fired from their jobs.

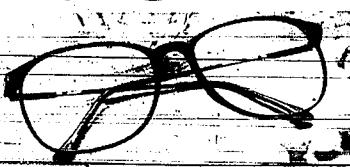

## Committee begins work on 1992 budget

BOISE (AP) — Despite operating under a more conservative revenue outlook, legislative budget writers on Thursday began their quest for a 1992 state spending blueprint, quickly exceeding the recommendations Gov. Cecil Andrus made in his more financially optimistic plan.



to shift attention to the 1992 spending year, which begins July 1, came after members agreed to halt further consideration of agency and administration requests for cash to supplement 1991 spending.

On a 14-9 vote, the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee authorized a \$40 million increase in general tax support for the Hispanic Commission.

Meanwhile, that pressure continued to mount as the Senate Education Committee endorsed creation of a special scholarship program for minority and other "at risk" students. Andrus included that program in his budget proposal. But he recommended initial financial support of \$100,000, enough to underwrite 40 scholarships. The governor's plan was scaled down from the original request of education leaders for a \$250,000 annual commitment.

That precluded, at least for the moment, consideration of the governor's \$200,000 proposal to re-establish a Youth Conservation Corps that would supply work for some 60 teenagers this summer. Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, said the panel would consider the program if the bill authorizing it wins legislative approval. That bill is awaiting committee consideration in the Senate.

The actual amount of revenue involved was just \$55,000, an increase of nearly \$45,000 over this year's allocation. The money is for two full-time staff members.

Before moving on to 1992 spending decisions, however, the committee diverted \$10.2 million from its revenue pool to supplement 1991 agency budgets, over half of it going to public schools. That was more than five times as much as Andrus recommended using to augment

1991 spending. Lawmakers began their deliberations with a revenue estimate \$14 million below the one Andrus used for a plan that has still been criticized as skimping in areas like aid to education, and their decisions exceeding his recommendations only complicated an already tough budgeting task. Most of Thursday's action involved agencies that do not rely on general tax receipts for their operations so there was little debate. But a majority of the budget committee refused to take a hard-line stand when it reviewed the Hispanic Commission request.

But the decision by the committee's 10 Democrats, joined by four Republicans, demonstrated the kind of pressure for increased spending budget writers have been facing amid a significant slowdown in the dramatic economic growth that produced substantial cash surpluses.

## Compromise offered on election consolidation bill

Mrs. Ahrens said the compromise will allow five elections per year, and make other changes to meet objections raised in the hearing. It will expand the definition of "emergency" to allow school districts more leeway when they can take matter to the voters.

"I'd like about 50 dates," said Dick Dillon, superintendent of the Payette District. Last session, after several years of trying, the House passed an election consolidation bill. But it was amended in the Senate, then defeated as county clerks and school officials opposed it.

"I believe we have found the common ground we can agree on," she said.

School district officials testified earlier that election dates proposed in earlier bills do not fit as well as convenient for school district business.

There were 18 county clerks on hand for Thursday's hearing, and some of them said they could live with this year's version of the legislation. Some of the school officials

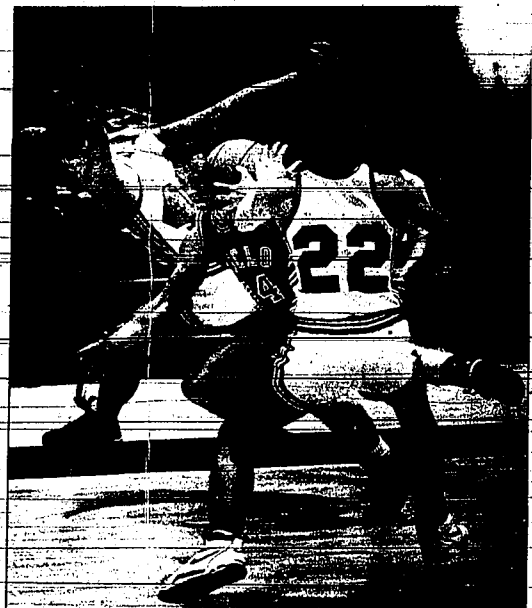
Faced with the fact the Tigers had shot just 14 percent in the first half, Wright said "we told them at halftime we were going to pound and pound the ball inside."

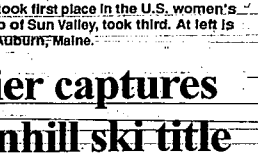

# New baseball salary arbitration mark set

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Don Mattingly's salary arbitration record last season was broken by Wally Joyner's last five days.

National League Cy Young Award winner Doug Drabek broke Joyner's mark on Thursday with the first \$3 million award in arbitration history.

Raymond Goetz, who heard the case on Wednesday in Chicago, picked the 28-year-old right-hander's request of \$3,335,000 instead of the team's offer of \$2.3 million.

"Salaries are going up a lot, but people don't complain about movies stars making (big) money; they still go to the movies," Drabek said.

"We're in the entertainment business, just like movie stars and rock stars. And adjust yourself to the changes."

On another busy day in the baseball salary market, Fred McGriff and the San Diego Padres formally announced their \$15.25 million, four-year deal which gives him the fifth-highest salary in baseball.

"If the Padres exercise their 1995 option, McGriff would get \$19 million over five years."

Players and owners have split the eight cases decided by arbitrators, and 28 players remain scheduled for hearings.

Drabek's record may not last long. Bobby Bonilla and Pittsburgh had their hearing Thursday and the outfielder is asking for \$3,475,000. The team is offering \$2.4 million.

Drabek '94 became the fourth highest-paid pitcher in baseball behind Roger Clemens (\$5,380,250), Dave Stewart (\$3.5 million) and Bob Welch (\$3.45 million).

Drabek became the 38th player and first Pirate with a \$3 million contract.

"We're delighted ... but we thought we clearly won," said Randy Hon-dricks, one of Drabek's agents.

"The Birmers were respectful and cordial in negotiations, but they came in with a low-ball figure. This represents the flow of the market."

Drabek won \$1.1 million in arbitration last year, when he was 22-6 with a 2.78 ERA for the National League East champions.

He was also a near unanimous choice for the Cy Young Award, receiving 23 of 24 first-place votes.

#### King Videocable will preview American Movie Classics

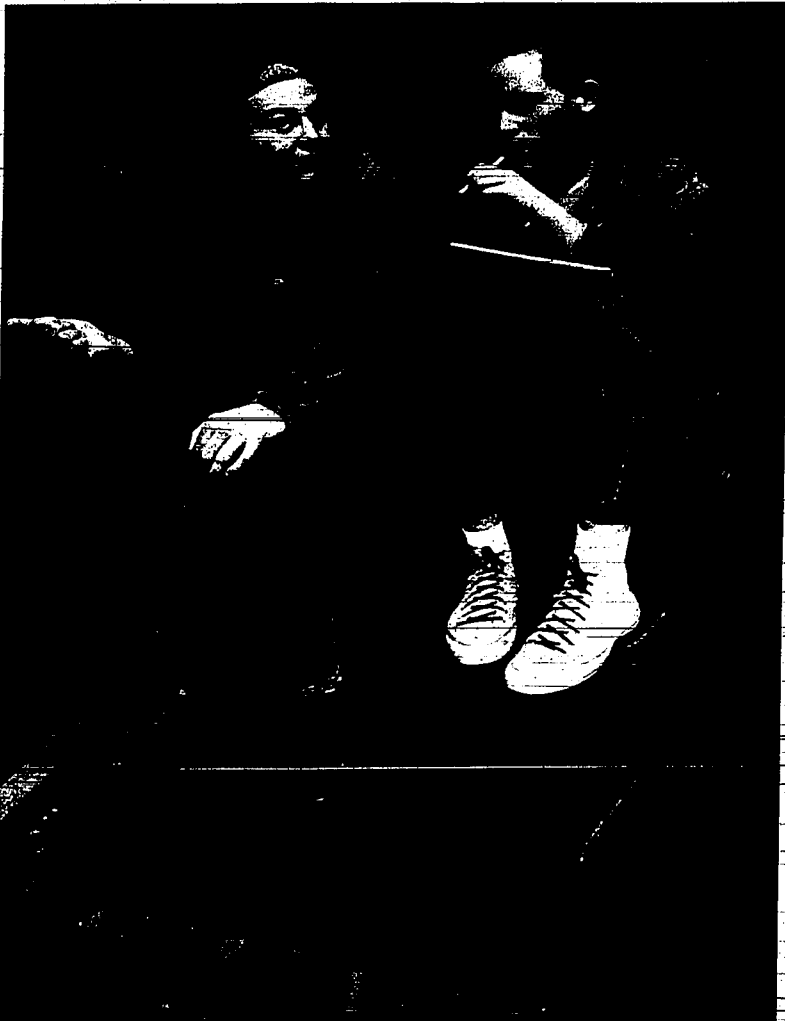

## Offbeat films steal spotlight at nominations

—BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Despite the cannonading of ads and publicity for big studio Oscar hopefuls, independent and offbeat films stole much of the spotlight in the nominations for the 63rd Academy Awards.

Few people predicted that Richard Harris in an obscure Irish film, "The Field," would triumph over Al Pacino for "The Godfather

Part III" and Robin Williams for "Awakenings."

Or that the dark, independently made "The Grifters" would collect four major nominations: Angelia Huston, actress; Anne Bancroft, supporting actress; Stephen Frears, directing; Donald E. Westlake, screenplay adaptation.

This year's nominations continued the recent trend that has seen a disproportionate number of honored artistic films coming from independents. Examples: "My Left Foot," "Kiss of the Spider Woman," "The Trip to Italy," "Tender Mercies."

Other 1991 Oscar nominees from smaller distributors included Gerard Depardieu, actor, "Cyrano de Bergerac"; Bruce Davison, supporting actor, "Longtime Companion";

## O'Connor's staying home, but Grammys will go on ... and on

NEW YORK — The 33rd Annual Grammys return to New York Wednesday with 40-year-old Phil Collins, fresh-fired pop diva Mariah Carey, 57-year-old Quincy Jones and close-cropped singer O'Connor among the top nominees in a record 79 categories.

The first three could walk away big win-

ners at the nationally televised show; not so O'Connor. The ever-controversial performer has already announced she wants no part of the Radio City Music Hall ceremony.

The angst-ridden Irishwoman says she will not accept attend or perform at the Grammys because they "acknowledge the mostly the commercial side of art. They respect mostly material gain."

Surprise, surprise.

But such issues remain as close to O'Connor as her hairline. She has refused to appear on "Saturday Night Live" with Andrew "Dice" Clay and infuriated Frank Sinatra by not playing "The Star-Spangled Banner" before a New Jersey concert.

If she wins in one of the four categories in which she's nominated, O'Connor would become the first person in Grammy history to refuse an award, making her spiritual kin to noted Academy Award refusniks

George C. Scott and Marlon Brando. As predictable as O'Connor's boycott was the conservative nature of the nominees in the major categories: chart-topping newcomers mingled with veteran music superstars.

Jones, the all-time nominations leader with 76, received seven nominations for his "Back on the Block" album. The eclectic collection, which brought together artists,

Joanne Woodward, actress, "Mr. and Mrs. Bridge"; Diane Ladd, supporting actress, "Wild at Heart"; Whit Stillman, original screenplay, "Metropolitan."

The 63rd Academy nominations offered a few firsts and the usual number of glaring omissions. The naming of Graham Greene for supporting actor in "Dances With Wolves" was the first time in 20 years that an American-Indian was nominated for an acting award. Chief Dan George was nominated but lost in 1971 for his supporting role in "Little Big Man."

China Sorensen's first nomination for foreign-language film with "Judeo" Kevin Costner's mentions for actor and director marked his first nominations in any category. If he wins in both, it would be his second first. If he wins as actor, but not as director, it would still be the first time this has happened since Laurence Olivier directed himself to an acting Oscar for "Hamlet" in 1948.

Some of the omissions were glaring. If "The Grifters" won such important nominations, why not as best picture? Did the hugely popular "Ghost" really warrant best picture? If so, why no mention of its director, Jerry Zucker, or the stars, Patrick Swayze and Demi Moore?

"Awakenings" scored as best picture, but Danny Marshall was overlooked as director. She would have been the first American woman to be so recognized (Lina Wertmuller

was nominated for Italy's "Seven Beauties" in 1976).

The selection of Pacino for supporting actor in "Dick Tracy" rather than actor in "The Godfather Part III" was a curiosity. Could this be recognition for The Star Who Wore the Most Makeup in a Supporting Role?

Here are some other performances of merit that didn't make the cut:

Marlon Brando's delicious self-parody in "The Freshman"; Dianna Agron's virginal eye, "Aeon Lady," in "Edward Scissorhands"; Danny Glover's hardy grifter in "To Sleep With Anger"; Sean Connery's wise Soviet in "The Hunt for Red October"; Susan Sarandon's harsh singer in "White Palace"; Shirley Maclaine's boozey actress in "Postcards From The Edge."

The nomination of Depardieu for the French-speaking "Cyrano de Bergerac" is not the English language. Green Card, raised a longstanding issue: Can Academy voters really judge an acting performance when they don't understand the words?

They have twice decided "yes," giving awards to Italian Sophia Loren for two "Women" in 1961 and to Robert De Niro, who spoke Italian to win a supporting Oscar for "The Godfather Part III" in 1974.

One more omission: The actor who carried the year's most successful film on his own small shoulders failed to receive a mention — Macaulay Culkin of "Home Alone."

# 15-year-old fills bill of spunky 'Blossom'

MARINA DEL REY, Calif. — If you were casting a television situation comedy and needed a talented teen-age girl with a lot of spunk, whom would you turn to?

Faced with that problem, Paul Junger Witt and Tony Thomas, manufacturers of an impressive list of TV hits, turned to Myrim Bialik. She's talented — she can dance (ballet, jazz and tap), play the piano and blow a bit of trumpet. She's 15, a year older than her character, Blossom, to her real life.

She appeared here recently as part of the Television Critics Association press tour, along with Witt and co-star Ted Wass, who plays her dad. In less than an hour she showed amazing poise and maturity — enough for a 35-year-old. Let alone someone 15 — as she discussed career decisions and related her character, Blossom, to her real life.

"Blossom" (Monday nights on NBC) centers on a teen-age girl coming of age in a household dominated by males. There are her brothers, Anthony (played by Michael Stoyanov) a recovering substance-abuser, and Joey (played by Joey Lawrence), an aspiring teen-Lothario.

And there's Dad, played by Wass, a musician and single father trying to keep things rolling after his wife has left him to pursue a singing career. Ellen Brennan plays Blossom's neighbor and confidante.

On the surface, the show sounds like a made-to-formula single-parent sitcom, but in the hands of Witt-Thomas it has some interesting shadings to it. And it comes from the same production house that knows how to succeed: Witt-Thomas-Harris productions have been responsible for "Benson," "It Takes Two," "Soap" (Wass played in that one), "I'm a Big Girl Now," "The Golden Girls" and "Empty Nest."

But clearly, the success of the show will turn on the appeal of Bialik, who is best known for having played a young Bette Midler in "Beaches."

"Basically, the character of Blossom is a lot like me," said Bialik. "She's a young high-school student growing up around different people and relating. But in the show I think Blossom has to relate to a lot of different characters, especially all males, which is a lot different than my personal life."

Her parents, who made what she described as independent anti-war films for PBS's "Great American Dream Machine," were against Bialik's becoming an actress.

"I had always wanted to be an actress," recalled Bialik. "I was always active in school plays and things like that. But my parents really didn't want me to be an actress, because it can be very hard for a little kid."

When she was 11 — 1½ to be exact — her parents relented, shopped for an agent and launched their star.

"I think they realized that I was old enough at 1½ to kind of deal with things like rejection and things that can be very hard for a little kid. And I was very persistent, at the time."

Since then, there hasn't been much time for rejection. She's had roles ranging from guest star to recurring on such shows as "Beauty and the Beast," "The Facts of Life," "Webster," "Once a Hero," "MacGyver," "Eagle-Hawes," "My Brother Brown," "Peggy Sue," "She started in the TV series "Molly."

Oh, yes, she can sing and mimic and has done the voice-over for Peppermint Patty, the "Peanuts" character. On stage, she's been in productions of "The Wizard of Oz," "Cats" and "Hansel and Gretel" — and in theaters she's been in "Pumpkin Head" and "Halloween," in addition to "Beaches."

"Blossom" went through substantial changes before it became a series. Originally, the family was to be whole, with both parents together. Witt said that while the network liked the original version, there was concern that the situation in this comedy was not distinctive enough. Enter the idea of a single parent.

"And that parent is a musician," Witt said. "That parent is at home a lot. And that parent's relationship with his children is, we feel, unique to television. He's a bright man and an articulate man, but sometimes an over-enthusiastic and confused man. He didn't necessarily apply for this job. He kind of got stuck with it."

And he was stuck with a daughter most parents probably would love to be stuck with. In real life, Bialik describes herself as the child of parents who taught her and her brother "to be aware of things going on in the world, and just the fact that you have to make changes, which I do."

She belongs to various groups concerned about the homeless, the environment and cruelty to animals, and she went to Washington last fall to march on behalf of the homeless.

"I do a lot of celebrity things like that, because I like to use the visibility that I have to help others," Witt pointed out. "That she also organized a food collection for the homeless on the lot where the show is produced."

"I think Myrim is an exceptional person," Witt said. "One of the things we wanted to do in having a young female protagonist, which is very unusual in television, from whose point of view we're seeing life, was to not have some cute airhead, which television is covered with."

"We wanted to have a young woman who is capable of articulating herself and its capable of thinking, perhaps confusedly, but thinking deeply. And we happened to get the whole package in one person."

# 'Huckleberry Finn' manuscript found in Hollywood attic

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The handwritten first half of the original text of Mark Twain's "Huckleberry Finn," lost for more than a century, has been found in an attic trunk, Sotheby's auction house said.

The 665-page document is especially significant because it varies widely from the published text. Twain scholars said it was an extraordinary literary discovery, one that will stir up fresh debate over one of the most studied books in the world.

"All modern American literature comes from one book by Mark Twain called 'Huckleberry Finn,'" Ernest Hemingway once wrote.

"If you had to pick a single lost manuscript you would like to find, you would pick the first half of 'Huckleberry Finn.' We never believed it would be found," said Robert H. Hirst, general editor of the Mark Twain Project at the University of California, Berkeley.

"The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," published in 1884, is the tale of an incorrigible boy who escapes from "civilization" on a Mississippi raft with a slave named Jim. It is widely regarded as a foundation of American writing.

The second half of Twain's book has been at the Buffalo and Erie County Public Library since the 1880s. Twain sent it there at the request of James Fraser Clark, a benefactor of the library's predecessor.

Clark had asked Twain for the original of Twain's "Life on the Mississippi." That wasn't available, so Twain volunteered "Huck."

Twain wrote "Huck" in 1882 at the original first half of the manuscript. He rediscovered it in 1887 and sent it to Buffalo, but its whereabouts since then had been unknown to modern scholars.

Then last fall, Gluck's granddaughters found the manuscript in a trunk in her attic in Hollywood. She turned it over to Sotheby's for authentication at the company's New York offices.

The Gluck descendants declined to be interviewed. Sotheby's re-

leased a statement from them saying they were "sympathetic" to the possibility of recanting the two halves of the manuscript.

"We are deeply grateful to Sotheby's for authenticating the manuscript and for their research into its background, and intend to be in touch with the library soon," the statement said.

William H. Loos, curator of the rare book collection at the Buffalo library, which has an extensive collection of Twain memorabilia, said the library has two 1887 letters to the author that he feels prove the library once possessed both halves of the manuscript.

Loos theorizes that "Huck" borrowed the first part of the manuscript from the library to study it and then died before he could return it.

"We might consider this manuscript as being an overdue book," Loos said. "And the fines are forgiven."

Twain, a pen name for Samuel Langhorne Clemens, started "Huckleberry Finn" in 1876, worked on it a few years, then put away and returned to it in 1882, Hirst said.

Hirst said "Huckleberry Finn" was the book that took Twain the longest to write.

The study of "Huck" has focused in large part on how it evolved, he said. "He stopped and started more times before he finally finished it. And for that reason, the various plantings and trails he went through have been studied very extensively, and this will allow us to know more about the first half than ever before."

One reason the manuscript is so keenly treasured is because "Huckleberry Finn" is written in dialect, making spelling and punctuation errors in publication likelier as the dialect was "corrected."

Twain was infuriated by changes that were commonly made by printers in his time. On one occasion he said his publisher had "written" that the printer's proof-reader was improving my punctuation for me, and I telegraphed orders to have him shot without giving him time to pray."

Bobo trumpeter Dizzy Gillespie, vocalist Dinah Washington and Hampton himself are all among this year's Grammy nominees. Other musicians slated to play in the Kibbie Dome include the Hank Jones Trio, the Ray Brown Trio with Boise pianist Gene Harris, Billy Eckstine and Stanley Turrentine.

Reeves, who has starred in previous festivals, has seen her career skyrocket lately. She is nominated in the "Best Jazz Vocal Performance — Female" category for her recording of "I Got It Bad — And That Ain't Good."



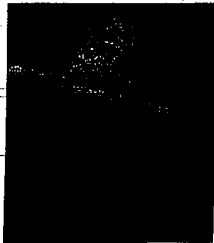
# Wendell native competing in TNN contest

WENDELL - Western singer Ernie Sites is in Nashville, Tenn., this week, competing in "Be A Star," a nationally televised, invitation-only contest sponsored by The Nashville Network (TNN).

"There's several hundred people trying to get into this contest, so getting accepted is real tough and go, Sites said last week. "Randy Travis was not accepted to get on this show (several years ago). They didn't think he had enough going for him."

Sites, 37, a native of Wendell, has recorded three cassette albums of his original songs and also of his favorite "cowboy classics." He and his wife Lana flew to Nashville Monday to rehearse for the first day of performances on Wednesday. Sites said

Recorded three cassette albums he did not know when the contest will be on the air or when winners will be announced.

To be selected for the contest, Sites had to send TNN sheet music and a tape of his original songs and a video of his performances. About 100 artists will appear in the contest. Each contestant has two and a half minutes to perform. Three rounds narrow the field to a dozen finalists for the last show.

"Sites said songs cannot be repeated, so his first song will be "Idaho Winds." If he is a finalist, Sites said he plans to "take home the money" with his rousing "Sagebrush Boogie."

Although first place prize includes \$25,000, four appearances on national television and a recording contract, Sites said winning is not as important to him as being seen by record company scouts who watch the competition.

"They figure this is the best talent available in the nation," he said. "So

the big winner isn't always the contest winner. I'm confident. All I really want is television coverage. I look at it as a chance to strum up a little business. And, if I do win something, that's great."

Two years ago, Sites auditioned for and was accepted to be on a similar show, also based in Nashville. But the show was cancelled two weeks before he was to appear. Sites said "being accepted to that show helped him win a place on "Be A Star."

"I feel pretty confident that I'll make it through the first go-round," he said. "But I don't have to win to continue with my career. I'm finding there's no such thing as an overnight success in the music business. Some popular singers seem to spring out of nowhere, but in reality, they were determined to do it, for a long time. They had perseverance."

# Twin Falls pianist's recording sells 100,000 copies

TWIN FALLS - "Piano Reflections," the recording of light classical music by Twin Falls pianist Kelly Yost, has now sold more than 100,000 copies.

Yost and Channel Productions, the company she started with her husband, Sam, were profiled as "American Dreamers" in The Times-News business section in August 1989.

Since then, sales of the compact disc - and cassette - tripled during 1990. The recording is now available in more than 2,500 stores in all 50 states and Yost's playing is heard on more than 200 radio stations, too.

A Woman's Place Bookstore in Salt Lake City has sold more than 850 copies of the tape. Jud's Bookstore of Twin Falls is also on the top 10 list with more than 500 copies sold.

"Piano Reflections" started when Yost's friend asked her to play classical music at her father's funeral. Yost thought it was a strange request, but she obliged.

She soon found her talent in demand among area funeral directors who, in time, convinced her a need existed in their industry for soothing, gentle music - not the dirges usually associated with death.

Since finding its first niche with funeral homes, "Piano Reflections" has been discovered by a variety of

other audiences, including many fans who have written the Yosts to tell of their pleasure.

Jan Hill, a childbirth educator in Alaska, says "Piano Reflections" is the most popular music she uses in her classes. The Yosts say many doctors and dentists also use it in their offices.

"It's a superb collection, superbly played," says Bob Christiansen of Northwest National Public Radio in Pullman, Wash. The tape "does well" what it intends to do: relax, notes Peter Johnson, music director of WDAV in Davidson, N.C.

Yost is now putting the finishing touches on her second recording at Spectrum Sound Studios in Portland, Ore. It is set for a mid-1991 release.

# 'Sleeping With the Enemy' delivers chills

"Sleeping With the Enemy," a surprising drama of hateful marriage and murderous love, quickly asserts itself as the most gripping shocker of the new year and heightens Julia Roberts' range from pretty comedy into black pain and rage.

More importantly, perhaps, it delivers a new man you love to hate in Patrick Bergin and extends Joseph Ruben's hold over the thriller, a genre he has served so well in "The Stepfather" and "True Believer." About the only problem with Ruben's new excursion into suspense lies in the improbabilities in Ronald Bass' screenplay, drawn from the novel by Nancy Price. But any questions about how the plot develops arise only after the film is over.

Ruben is no Alfred Hitchcock, but like the master of the genre, he keeps us sufficiently involved with his characters and story so that we never dwell on how the plot is set in quivering motion. "Sleeping With the Enemy" begins on a Cape Cod beach and ends in a darkened hallway half a country away. It opens on a deceptively serene note, though with a hint of menace. Laura, the young wife, played by Roberts with a submissive moodiness, is raking up clams at the water's edge when her formally retired husband comes across the sand and announces plans for the evening that will not require fresh clams at home.

Laura Bumei (Julia Roberts) takes desperate measures to escape a destructive relationship with her husband, Martin (Patrick Bergin).

Laura and Martin, a tall, gaunt figure with an aquiline beak overhanging a trim black mustache, occupy an enormous new beachfront place of weathered wood and glass. Inside and out, their pleasure dome has an austere feeling about it that reflects the lives of the inhabitants. As it soon becomes clear, Martin rules over Laura's young life with an iron hand. At first he seems merely dominating, compulsively tidy and cruelly hypocritical. Later, something much darker emerges, and the reason Laura obeys him so slavishly becomes clear. Martin is an insanely jealous wife beater who caps his punishments with unfeeling, driven sex. A hard clip that involves Laura to

the floor and a sharp kick come in response to an invitation from a young yachtman who asks the couple for a night cruise. Martin accepts, even though Laura has a terror of the water going back to childhood. At sea—and here is where the unpredictable coincidences begin to pile up—a brief, violent storm breaks out, snapping loose the jib and forcing the women to battle to keep the boat from heeling over and swamping. During the tempest, Laura disappears, presumably drowned. Later, far away, she begins a new life. From this point onward, "Sleeping With the Enemy" intertwaves the discoveries of the betrayed husband and his enraged pursuit, with the run-

away wife's struggles to be reborn. After false starts, she even finds love with the boy next door, a singing-dancing-drama teacher—appealingly played by Kevin Anderson.

Ruben has a nice feeling for small-town life; some of the film resonates with the feeling of Hitchcock's portrait of Santa Rosa in "Shadow of a Doubt." There's a gala parade and, as the film darkens, a carnival scene that calls to mind the lurid, tense carnival sequences of "Strangers on a Train."

Whether the images by John W. Lindley are sunny or nocturnal, coolly Eastern or warmly Midwestern, the prodigious composer Jerry Goldsmith mixes romance and fear as Hitchcock's thrillers did. Important as the music is, however, Ruben's most impressive assets are his two leading actors.

From the outset, Roberts communicates the vulnerability and edginess of Laura Fontaine in her Hitchcock films "Rebecca" and "Suspicion." But the worst fears of the wife in the latter film are mild compared with the terrors stirred up by Bergin, a sinister blend of tight control and manic exuberance.

With a tremulous victim who fumblingly takes back her life, and an implacable husband—with love and hate tearing at his intelligent but twisted mind, "Sleeping With the Enemy" (rated R) delivers the litten and jumps its unerring title promises.

# 'Home Alone' falls from No. 1

The movie's young star, Mikkel Gaup (no relation to the director), witnesses his family's massacre at the hands of a band of marauding warriors. The teen escapes to a nearby camp but is eventually captured and forced to serve as a "Pathfinder" to his surviving people.

The movie, set against the harsh conditions of Lapland, is "a stirring and simple film, at once brutal and beautiful, suspenseful and mystical," Ansen wrote. "Pathfinder" was nominated for an Academy Award in the Best Foreign Film category.

• "Flowing like Water: Liquid Investigations," May 16, 18 and 23 for fourth- through sixth-graders, taught by Hill. The fee is \$25.

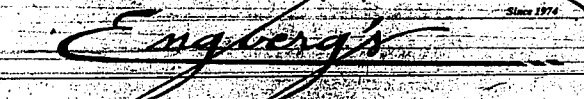

# All-star cast learn about survival as they reenact Los Angeles blaze

Those of us who are used to seeing Lisa Hartman pouting sulkily in an expensive fur or storming off to wreak revenge on some rich person are in for a surprise: On Monday, Feb. 18, Hartman plays a woman battling smoke and flame for survival in "Fire! Trapped on the 37th Floor."

The ABC movie, which focuses on a real 1988 blaze in a Los Angeles skyscraper, co-stars Lee Majors and Peter Scolar. The actual fire required 300 people to extinguish it and led to the adoption of new fire-safety measures.

"Fire!" comes hot on the heels of another unlikely Hartman vehicle, last week's "Not of This World," in which she played an alien-battling engineer. Both represent a big change from previous roles in such luxury-swaddled vehicles as the prime-time soap "Knots Landing" and the miniseries "Koses Are for the Rich" (1987) and "Jacqueline Susann's Valley of the Dolls" (1981).

In a phone interview from California, Hartman is personable, cheery, and about as un-Jacqueline-Susann-like as we can imagine. She excuses herself several times to instruct workmen on where some lamps should be deposited and talks naturally and easily.

"The movie is based on a true story," she explains with a hint of a twang from her native Houston. "It's about a fire in the First Interstate Building, which was 62 floors high and was then the tallest

building in Los Angeles."

Despite the hysterical title and the "Towering Inferno"-like associations, Hartman contends that it was the human factor that attracted her to the script.

"It's really about this couple who were-in-the-office-building," she says.

"They just happened to be working late one night; they didn't know each other or know that the other one was there working. The movie is really about how they lived through the fire."

"They did amazing things to stay alive," she continues, "like opening the door of a refrigerator to breathe in little breaths of the air. It was the smoke inhalation that was so scary, not just the flames. It was really incredible, the way they managed to survive."

But what Hartman would really like isn't the life-and-death drama of "Fire!" or the glittery high life of many of her miniseries characters. Although she sounds pleased — and a little surprised — by her recent string of TV movies, what she wants is something with a little more stabbility.

"I'm looking for a series," she says thoughtfully.

"I want to find a woman (character) that I like and can relate to. At first I wanted to do a comedy, and I guess I still do, but I'll look at different things."

Not only has Hartman moved from "Knots Landing" to battling fires, but this erstwhile embodiment of rich, glamorous young women confesses quite happily that one of her favorite movies as a child was "Queen of Blood" (1966).

# Pleasure before business for Marshall

On a recent afternoon Amelia Marshall, who plays Gilly Grant in "Guiding Light," sang a blues song while her boyfriend Hamp blew some plaintive notes on his sax. The song was the '40s standard "Sunday Kind of Love" and Amelia delivered it beautifully. The dialogue in the scene was sparse but to the point. The two lovers had quarreled and the song was the way they chose to make up. It was sexier than most steamy soap scenes played in bed.

"I got to choose the song myself and I always liked those standards with good lyrics. When the producer came up to me, all he said was, 'You're going to be singing on Friday, so pick a song that you like.' I was pleased that the song fit the scene so well."

Amelia has had years of singing and dance training and has appeared in a number of musicals, but her fans from the soap may not have known about her musical credentials and the song may have caught them by surprise.

Amelia is full of surprises. She is one of three children born to David and Catherine Marshall. Dad is an insurance company exec and mom is a math teacher. They instilled a sense of independence in their kids and Amelia certainly has put that independence to good use. She always was able to sing and it was her voice (and good grades) that got her into the High School for the Performing and Visual Arts in Houston, Texas. This led to her studying dance with the Houston Ballet and the Houston Jazz Ballet, which is run by Patrick Swayze's mother Patsy. However, when it came to college, Amelia's practical side showed itself and she got a business degree from the University of Texas.

Amelia admitted that she toyed with the notion of going to New York after college and seeing if she could get a job in a Broadway show but "I remember this young woman who tried that and telling us horror stories about jealous dancers locking her up in a dressing room so she could miss her cues. After hearing that, I chose the safer path and went into business."

That safer path included a stint as a telephone company repair person, which required Amelia to climb those tall poles. She stayed with them two years and worked for other companies as well.

"At that point in my life, I was planning to settle down in Houston. I even bought a condo and was on my way to becoming a bona-fide yuppie. Then I started to wonder if I had missed something by not giving show business a try. Six years had gone by since I graduated from high school and I decided to go to New York."

When Amelia arrived on the Broadway scene, there were a large number of black musicals on the boards but she soon found out that being young, beautiful, talented and black wasn't enough. However, she managed to hang in there and got roles in touring companies of "Cats" and "West Side Story." On

Broadway, she was in "Harrigan and Hart" and "Porgy and Bess." One of her fondest memories was working in Bob Fosse's last Broadway show, "Big Deal."

"Working with Fosse was an experience I will forever cherish. He was definitely one of a kind. Even though he was very ill while we were in rehearsals for 'Big Deal,' he never gave anything less than 100 percent."

He was absolutely inspiring and the entire cast worked to the top of their talents."

After conquering Broadway musicals, soap operas were a natural segue for the performer. After a short time as Miranda in "One Life to Live," Amelia created the part of Gilly, the frisky lady who worked in the TV studio. She wasn't a contract player at first but the producers saw the possibilities of the character and

Because the original show can be seen in reruns as many as three times a day in some markets, network executives know that the show appeals to new generations of fans. So far, no luck persuading Montgomery, a highly successful actress who can afford to be picky about her roles, to change her mind.

**Q: I read that Madonna enjoys dining out, but tries to stay inconspicuous. If this is so, then how come a friend swears he saw her all decked out in full Madonna finery in a Manhattan eatery? — F.T.**

A: It's true that Madonna doesn't dress down for her food forays. But it's equally true that she cherishes her privacy. My restaurant spy tells me the lady prefers the proverbial quiet table in the corner, and expects the management of any place she favors to keep fans and autograph hounds as far away as possible.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Helped by Barbara Walters and a heavy dose of comedy, ABC won its third consecutive network ratings race.

According to A.C. Nielsen Co. figures released Tuesday, half of television's top 10 shows for the week of Feb. 4-10 belonged to ABC.

The network's highest rated show was Sunday's installment of "America's Funniest Home Videos," which placed third.

In overall network ratings, ABC earned a 12.8 average, followed by NBC with 12.7 and CBS with 12.2.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

Last week's figures showed improvement for NBC.

The usually first place network had finished last the previous three weeks.

As the crucial February sweeps period hit its halfway point, the three broadcast networks were separated by less than half a ratings point for the season.

The February sweeps period, which runs from Jan. 31 to Feb. 27, is one of four times set aside each year and used by local stations to set advertising rates.

## 'L.A. Law' loses partners, producer

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Emmy-winning NBC television series "L.A. Law" will do without Susan Dey, Jimmy Smits and Harry Hamlin next season.

Executive producer David Kelley, who took over when co-creator Steven Bochco left two years ago, said he, too, is leaving the popular series after this season. Kelley said he will remain with the program as a consultant, a title also held by

Bochco.

"The truth is, I think the show can use change when you go into year six and year seven," Kelley said of the 5-year-old program, which won the Emmy last year for best drama series. "You can't succeed in year eight and nine with the same voices," he said.

Dey, who plays attorney Grace Van Owen, has said for some time that this season would be her last.

Smits, who plays Victor Sifuentes, and Hamlin, who plays Michael Kuzak, have not signed contracts for next season, Kelley said. Talks with Smits and Hamlin continued.

"We hope Harry Hamlin returns, but if not, we wish him well. We have asked Jimmy Smits to make cameo appearances next season," Harris Kattelman, Twentieth Century Television president, said in a statement.

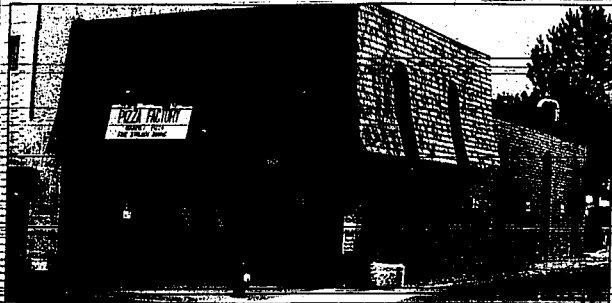
