# Paul soldier dies in Iraq battle

PAUL — Sgt. Nels Andrew Moller's wait ended Sunday when the U.S. Army's VII Corps met Saddam Hussein's Republican Guard in the windy desert of southeastern Iraq.

His life ended Tuesday at 6 a.m. in an armored personnel carrier as the battle raged and allied troops were well on their way to routing the Iraqis.

"We're all ready to take our chances and fight. We just want to get on with it," Moller wrote to his father.

The troops were tired of waiting in the rain and the cold desert "where the wind blows nine days out of 10, and where boredom was the worst thing to deal with."

The letter, dated Jan. 29 and addressed to his father, Nels Moller, stepmother, Pat, and brother, Chris, arrived Wednesday. At 6 o'clock that night, military officials told Moller that his son had fallen in battle.

Moller, who turned 23 on Feb. 13, became one of 28 American combat dead in the ground-war phase of Operation Desert Storm — a day before it ended.

He was the first air, as far as it is known, the only Magic Valley and Idaho combat fatality of the Gulf War.

Two Mountain-Home Air Force Base aviators, Air Force Capt. Douglas Pratt and Paul Eichenlaub II, were killed Feb. 14 when their EF-111A electronic warfare jet crashed in the Saudi desert after a combat mission over southern Iraq. But their deaths were later ruled non-combat losses.

Andrew was a good son, his father said Thursday.

Andrew loved being in the Idaho mountains and forests. He hunted deer, elk, antelope and ducks and was teaching his

brother, seven years younger, how to hunt. He's accustomed to be out alone in nature," his father said. "But he wasn't a loner — he had a lot of friends."

His aunt, Marilyn Andrew, remembered him as a "quiet person. He enjoyed his family and loved Christmas. In one of his letters home, Andrew said he missed not being home when the family gathered for Christmas, she said.

"I'll remember him laughing and having fun. And think of the outdoors," she said.

Moller graduated from Minnetonka High School in nearby Rupert in 1986. A

# U.S. armored corps alert against possible Iraqi tricks

WITH THE VII CORPS IN IRAQ — The mighty armored U.S. VII Corps that cut the Republican Guard to pieces kept its guard up Thursday, waiting to see if the cease-fire would hold and watching for any Iraqi tricks.

"It's just a very dangerous time right now. The uncertainty," said Sgt. Maj. Robert E. Wilson of El Paso, Texas, the VII Corps' un-commissioned officer in the VII Corps.

"This guy may rally some people who'd got across and try something stupid. I hope for his sake he doesn't. In

Vietnam they just used the cease-fire to resupply."

Hours after he cease-fire announced by President Bush — explosions punctuated the vast desert plain.

Some were the sound of American engineers blowing up abandoned Iraqi tanks, armored vehicles, artillery and trucks.

But some were clashes with up to company-sized units of the Republican Guard that had been bypassed by the one British and four American divisions that made up the largest ground force since World War II.

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia — From the Euphrates to the Persian Gulf, U.S. and allied troops held their fire along a smoldering battlefield Thursday, weary, muddy but victorious in a lightning war that freed Kuwait and humbled Iraq.

Statesmen began what President Bush called "the difficult task" of securing the peace and ordinary Iraqis began a new countdown — for the trip home.

As a cease-fire dawned on the 43rd day of the conflict, American paratrooper David Hochins had a warm vision of peace. "My girlfriend, good friends and good times."

Kuwaitis said thousands of their countrymen — mostly young men — were taken off to Iraq as hostages in the final days. Kuwait's U.N. ambassador put the number at 22,000. In addition to 6,000 Kuwaiti soldiers held prisoner by Iraq.

The return of Kuwait detainees was one demand set out by President Bush in declaring the cease-fire for midnight EST Wednesday — 8 a.m. Thursday in the Gulf.

The United States warned Thursday it might resume the offensive against the Iraqi military if Baghdad does not meet all

the conditions, which also include the "immediate" release of U.S. and allied prisoners of war. Iraq said it would return the prisoners.

There's still great concern about the next several days. White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said, Bush later announced the Iraqis had agreed to designate military commanders to discuss the cease-fire terms.

The U.S. command reported some cease-fire violations Thursday, including an incident in which Iraqi gunners fired on a group of U.S. Army Airborne Corps troops receiving the Red Cross Association's fire back and destroyed two tanks and two multiple-rocket launchers, the command said.

Other isolated clashes with pockets of Iraqi troops continued in mid-afternoon Thursday.

# It's taps for those who waste California water

LOS ANGELES — Residents of two California regions faced new water rationing plans Friday, and a threat of severe fines if they fail to do their part for survival in the fifth year of a statewide drought.

Thousands of residents of Marin County, in northern California, began living with a daily water allotment of 50 gallons per person, while more than 1 million Los Angeles homeowners must cut consumption by 15 percent.

"My plans are going to die. And you can't flush every time," said "Pat" (director of the state Drought Center) in Winterson of Mill Valley in Marin County. "But I think we're in really good shape. We've been conserving right along."

Ironically, the new measures are going into effect in a week in which rain has begun falling. Los Angeles got more than 2 inches and parts of northern California got around 1 inch. And several water systems were expected to dump even more rain during the weekend.

But the lull of Pacific storms, the first significant rain since the beginning of February, was expected to do little to Sacramento.

"If we were to get 200 percent of our normal rainfall during the rest of the wet season — the next 40 or 50 days — we would only get up to about 50 percent" of normal for the season, he said.

The stringent mandatory rationing by the Marin Municipal Water District also requires businesses to cut back 45 percent and institutional accounts, such as hospitals, to cut back 50 percent from 1986-87 water usage levels. Irrigation accounts will have to reduce usage by 85 percent.

Unfortunatly, we have had the driest winter in 112 years, and the amount of rainfall we've gotten in the past five years has been very low," water district spokeswoman Lynn Schneider said.

# House will consider 3-cent-a-gallon gas tax boost

BOISE — Members of the Idaho House will be asked to approve an increase of 3 cents per gallon in the state motor fuel tax starting next month.

After battling three hours Thursday afternoon on the best way to increase funding for highway construction, the House Transportation and Defense Committee finally settled on a 3-cent per-gallon fuel tax increase.

If it becomes law, starting April 1, Idaho's fuel tax will be 21 cents per gallon. For a motorist driving 20,000 miles per year and getting 20 miles per gallon, the increase would be \$30 per year.



amendment a measure increasing registration fees on big trucks.

House Bill 218 now proposes boosting registration fees for trucks over 8,000 pounds by 50 percent. But Rep. Richard Adams, D-Grangeville, asked the committee to release the bill, said he wanted to amend the increase to 15 percent, which would be about the same as the fuel tax increase.

The vote to report out the 3-cent fuel tax increase was only 7-6, and the move succeeded only because Chairman John

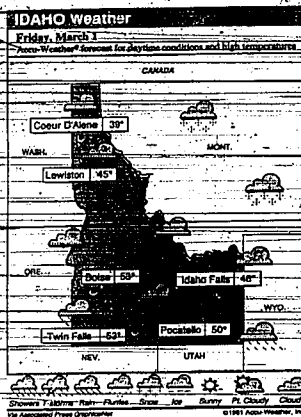
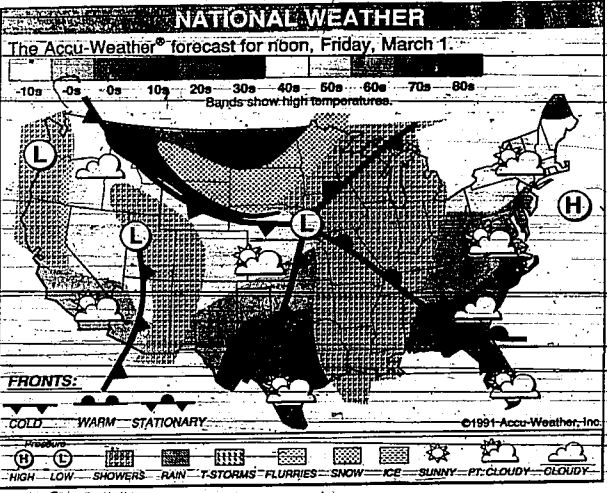
Sessions cast the tie-breaking vote. But Sessions remained optimistic lawmakers will approve some tax increase for highways this session.

"I have to be optimistic," he said. "I think it will pass, but it's hard to tell."

Earlier the committee rejected a (Gov. Cecil Andrus) package of tax increases to generate an additional \$63.3 million for highway work. The Andrus bill called for a 6-cent per gallon fuel tax increase, with higher registration fees.

**Heavy snow, rain fall over mountains of West**

Winter storms dumped heavy snow in the mountains and plains of the western United States on Thursday and poured welcome rain in Oregon and in drought-stricken California, causing near flooding in some areas.

Snow fell in parts of California, Nevada, Utah, Montana, Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico and Arizona. Five inches of snow fell during the morning near Mammoth, Calif., and in Duck Creek, Utah.

A blizzard warning was posted in part of Montana.

Up to 7 inches of rain had fallen in parts of California, which is in its fifth year of drought, since the storm arrived Wednesday, with 3 inches in downtown Los Angeles.

Minor street flooding was reported in the Santa Maria Valley at midday. Flood and mudslide advisories were posted in parts of five-mile-long Santa Barbara, Calif., where rain fell at a rate of one-third to one-half inch per hour at some points.

In the 24-hour period ending at 1 p.m. EST, San Francisco had received 9.4 inches of rain and 16.6 inches of snow.

Naval Air Station, about 50 miles to the south, reported 12.4 inches.

The chain of Pacific storms was expected to do little to ease the California drought, said Doug Priest, director of the state Drought Center in Sacramento.

Heavier rainfall during the 6 hours ending at 1 p.m. EST included about an inch at Fort Huachuca, Ariz. Snowfall during the same period included 2 inches at Great Falls, Mont., and in Minneapolis.

Snow also fell in parts of North Dakota, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Pennsylvania and New York state.

High wind advisories also were posted throughout the West. Winds gusted to 61 mph during the morning at Cut Bank, Mont. High winds also were reported in parts of California and Arizona.

Temperatures in the Lower 48 states at 3 p.m. EST ranged from 6 degrees at Cut Bank, Mont., to 78 degrees at Key West, Fla.

The nation's low temperature Thursday morning was 12 degrees below zero at Escanaba, Mich.

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# Some troops will have to wait despite effort to bring forces out

**DHAIRAN, Saudi Arabia** - The United States is going to have to wait to get some of its troops out of the Persian Gulf, it is expected to take months, and reservists probably will be called up and sent in with other fresh troops to organize the exodus, the military said Thursday.

Some of the half-million American troops, such as those held past the end of their military obligation or those with family crises, could be on their way home by the weekend, officials said. Many others could be here for longer.

"It took seven months to get in. It's going to take many months to get out," White House spokesman Martin J. Fitzwater said in Washington. "But we're going to get them out as fast as we can."

The overall plan, updated continuously during the six-month U.S. deployment, calls for sending troops home by unit on a first-in, first-out basis.

"I don't want to begin the exodus until we can't send peace with Iraq is certain, military officials said.

"Can I give you a time? No, I really can't," Marine Brig. Gen. Richard L. Neal, deputy director of operations for Operation Desert

Storm, said in Riyadh when asked if the command had a timetable for shipping troops home.

"We're going to have to find out how this peace process develops," he said. "If things go well, I think you will see a quick return for some forces."

Some units will have to designate logistics personnel — such as equipment haulers, maintenance workers and administrative workers — to stay behind to prepare, pack and inventory equipment for the trip home.

And the U.S. command said some additional logistics, maintenance and other support units will probably be brought to Saudi Arabia to help get the message on their way back to the United States and other U.S. bases around the world.

There may be an opportunity to replace a lot of those combat-oriented forces, Neal said. "We'll see how the situation can be resolved. We'll get people that can prepare equipment, do clean-it-up and get it ready to go aboard ship."

Many units with these specialties are reserves. Some already are here and will probably leave their way back to the United States and other U.S. bases around the world.

Military officials said it is too soon to say how many troops will be needed or called up.

"It is also possible that new combat units will be brought in if the U.S. forces are involved in any long-term peacekeeping operation in Kuwait, officials said.

For troops in the field, the ceasefire, although tentative, immediately brought thoughts of home.

"I can't wait to get home," said Capt. Fred Gallett of Detroit and the 1st Airborne Division. "I just hope it comes soon."

Shipping more than a half-million troops and their gear home to their bases is a daunting challenge to planners. Perhaps even more difficult to organize than the U.S. buildup.

The buildup accelerated gradually over the nearly seven-month since the Aug. 2 Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, yet still proved an unprecedented strain on air and sea transport.

Some units are now deep into Iraq and will have to be brought hundreds of miles south to ports and airfields in Saudi Arabia. Heavy equipment, tanks, ships and other military supplies, and ships to carry equipment home are a month away of U.S. ports.

classmate, Irene Sanchez, described him as a "real kid, very friendly and no one disliked him. He was active in sports and was a leader."

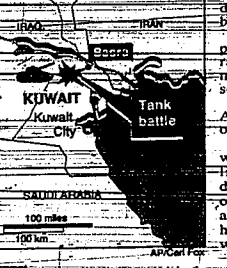
The summer before his senior year in high school, Moller became interested in the National Guard, and joined in 1985. At the same time he helped his father and grandfather on the family farm.

But friends had joined the Marines and told Andrew they liked it. In January 1987, he joined the Army and was assigned to the 2nd Armored Cavalry Regiment to become a platoon sergeant.

His father, Fred, had married Anne Whitney, who was in the Army.

The two wanted to transfer to Germany for duty. But the Army started to come home as the Cold War thawed, the Mollers could not work out a transfer for both. They went instead to Fort Carson near Colorado Springs, Colo. where his wife remained.

Andrew, like most of the troops in the Persian Gulf, was scared, his father said. But his spirits remained high nonetheless, and he wrote in one of his letters that he looked

forward to coming home to Idaho in August.

He talked of using his savings from the Army to buy a new Chevrolet Blazer. It was his first car and becoming an Idaho State Police officer.

Andrew enjoyed sketching and drawing. He liked doing still lifes and his father remembered one in particular for a candle in his study war intercom that thing, we were going to send this sketching

materials to him so he'd have some drawings from there when he got back. His father said that the sketches were limited to the kinds of packages the troops can receive and rather than risk losing Andrew's materials, his father decided not to send them.

Thursday, his father said, Andrew's sacrifice was an important one.

"Sending troops was something we had to do... Although, I hoped I like heck every time we made a decision that we'd take the easy way out... But I truly believe this was a nut of some kind and somebody had to deal with him... The Lord still take care of him."

But with so few American casualties in the war, Moller's sacrifice was not understood.

"It's just so hard to understand why that one..."

Now, however, Andrew's sketches and other memories will comfort those who mourn him. And the letter too. He faced death bravely.

"I'm not too worried. We have constant air support and a whole corps of artillery to pound down the enemy," he wrote.

"I'll be OK."

"A soldier responsible for conducting a military operation like forward construction until the mission is completed," Lt. Gen. Frederick Franks Jr. said from his command post 80 miles from the Saudi border.

"I'm scared soldiers are going to walk around the desert pick up dust and blow themselves up," said Col. Johnnie B. Hitt of Willis Point, Texas, commander of the 11th Aviation Brigade.

- Two bills doubling registration fees.
- A bill boosting the gas tax by 4 cents per gallon, one imposing a 2-cent increase this year and the same amount next year and a bill calling for a 3-cent increase in April and a 2-cent increase 12 months later.
- The long discussion digressed at times into debate whether heavy trucks are paying their share of highway costs, or whether public funds are being used to subsidize trucks at the expense of railroads.
- Dick Gardner, Division of Financial Management, urged approval of the Andrus proposals to decontaminate and rebuild roads which he said would provide "a new piece of funding for highways."
- "Don't cut it down to the point where it doesn't adequately address the problem," he said.
- Various individuals and groups urged the state to look into other ways to fund road and bridge repair.
- Shoshone Mayor Tim Rittinger, a trucker, said, "We all realize there is a serious problem with our roads and bridges."
- He urged at least a 6-cent per gallon increase but preferred a 10-cent jump. "The longer we wait the more serious the problem will be," he said.
- Bob Barber, Weiser Chamber of Commerce, pushed for more money so U.S. Highway 95 could be improved. AL current funding, he said, it will take 30 years to improve the next 300 miles.
- State Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards argued against the Andrus proposals, which included a bid to issue \$75 million in bonds for highway work. The committee sent her competing proposal on bonding to the Revenue and Taxation Committee for future work.
- She said she was alarmed by the Andrus bid. "It is a bold and powerful. It think it is obscene," she said.
- Edwards, a former lawmaker, said the legislature has been reluctant to issue bonds to meet needs, but it should move in that direction.

**U.S. wants to keep arms embargo in force**

In Washington, State Department spokesman Margaret Tutwiler outlined the U.S. requirements in the resolution.

"We have always said that if Saddam Hussein remains in power, it's the view of the United States government that an arms embargo must continue," she said. The UN slapped the embargo on Iraq after the Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

## Gulf war victors have definite aims

WASHINGTON (AP) — The countries that fought Iraq, along with some important ones that sat out the conflict, are jockeying for position on the crowded postwar playing field.

Their wish list reflects disparate interests, and the United States faces the difficult task of making sure that the glue that held the war together can also hold the peace. What do these countries want?

- Saudi Arabia: "They want to be left alone to enjoy their wealth and peace," says Michael Mandelbaum of the School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University.
- For the most part, Saudi Arabia wants to return to the status quo of pre-invasion days, although it might seek a more active role in regional politics now that Iraq has been removed as the predominant power.
- The Saudis, who asked the United States to defend them against Iraq in August, want the allies to leave soon because of pressure from religious Muslims who view the foreign presence as defying Islam's holiest sites.
- "But they want a U.S. presence on the horizon," probably in Kuwait and aboard ships in the Persian Gulf, said Daniel Pipes of the Foreign Policy Research Institute.
- The Saudis also want Iraq to be a government devoid of territorial ambitions, analysts say.
- Egypt: "Egypt wants the United States to press Israel into ceding occupied lands to the Arabs."
- They feel their Arab nationalist credentials were tarnished by their siding with the United States. Now they want to prove to their critics that the alliance can benefit the Palestinians, said Pipes.
- Egypt fished domestic unrest to fight Iraq. Now it wants the Saudis to show gratitude by sharing their oil wealth. Egypt also wants to strengthen its role as a leader of the Arab world, possibly by ending

forces to "keep the peace" between Iraq and Kuwait, analysts say.

- The Persian Gulf states: The tiny, oil-rich countries of Oman, Qatar, Bahrain and the United Arab Emirates want a greater U.S. role in the region to protect them. Until now, these countries had secret military agreements with the United States. Analysts predict that they'll be more open about cooperation.
- Syria: President Hafez Assad nimblely leaped aboard the allied bandwagon to replace his crumbling alliance with the Soviet Union. Assad wants, along with improved ties with the West, Assad has named himself a sponsor of Palestinian terrorism, and financial aid from Saudi Arabia.
- He has already benefited: The United States looked the other way last fall when Syria effectively took control of large chunks of Lebanon, said Mandelbaum.
- Turkey: President Turgut Ozal wants to cash in on his support for the coalition — a move he undertook in defini-

ance of top aides — and public support — the world-like the European Economic Community to consider Turkey for membership and he wants increased financial aid from the United States. Some analysts believe Ozal is eyeing northern Iraq, which Turkey struck a claim in the 1920s and would make a grab for the region if Saddam were ousted and a power vacuum ensued.

- Britain, France, Italy and Germany: They want contracts to rebuild Kuwait, and a free flow of oil, said Mandelbaum.
- The United States: In addition to what the Europeans want, the Bush administration wants a pro-Western, or at least a neutral, government in Baghdad and a balance between the two regional powers — Iran and Iraq.
- It also wants the Arabs to take a more active part in policing the region against "bullies" like Saddam, and the Israelis to grant the Palestinians self-determination. The U.S. is also seeking regional arms cuts and a system that would preclude the starting of Arab oil

wealth with the poorer nations of the region.

- The Soviet Union: Although not a fighting member of the coalition, Moscow has sided with the allies politically. "What they care about is being in the club, not outside," said John Steinbruner of the Brookings Institution.
- Although consumed by internal problems, President Mikhail Gorbachev gave a say in the postwar Gulf region to counter the predominant influence of the United States.
- Some analysts believe Gorbachev, under pressure from conservatives and military hardliners, wants to save Saddam so the Kremlin can resume being his main arms supplier.
- Outside the coalition are some real winners and losers.
- The Islamic liberation Organization: Having sided wholeheartedly with Saddam for his championship of their cause, the PLO lost the financial support of the Gulf states and had won political backing from Washington.
- Iran: Without lifting a finger, Iran saw its biggest rival greatly weakened. Its neutrality in the conflict, also eased its international isolation, led to warmer ties with France and the Soviet Union, and even raised the possibility of a dialogue with the United States.
- Jordan: King Hussein backed Saddam under pressure from his Palestinian subjects and an insistence of his neutrality in the conflict, also welcomed back to the fold," said Pipes. Hussein wants to emerge as the champion of the Palestinians and will try to use that to extract badly needed aid from the West, analysts say.
- Israel: Its biggest enemy Iraq has been destroyed militarily. But Israelis worry about the price they might have to pay.

## Thursday's events in the gulf

### War developments in brief

- Allied military officials said the cease-fire was holding in the 43-day Persian Gulf War. They reported a few violations including an incident Thursday in which Iraqi tanks exchanged fire with U.S. forces. Some truce violations were probably due to poor Iraqi communications, they said.
- The U.S. military cautioned it will "take us longer to bring the troops home than to get them over there." With 537,000 Americans serving in the gulf, a withdrawal would take months, and some soldiers might be replaced by fresh troops with different skills, it said.
- Allied troops attacked Iraqi positions until the truce took effect at 8 a.m. (midnight EST), 100 hours after the ground war started, U.S. commanders said. The fighting was concentrated near Basra and in northern Kuwait, where demoralized Iraqi troops were trying to head home.
- Far to the northwest of Basra, troops of the U.S. 101st Airborne Division stood less than 150 miles from Baghdad, in the deepest allied penetration of Iraq.
- U.S. losses were put at 79 killed — 28 of them in the ground campaign — and 212 wounded. A war total of at least 126 allied troops were killed in combat; 56 were missing in action, including 35 Americans; and 13 were prisoners of war, including nine Americans.
- Iraq's army — the world's fourth largest on the eve of war — was in shambles. U.S. officers said allied forces knocked out 40% of Iraq's 42 divisions, each averaging 12,000 troops. The allies also destroyed or captured more than 3,000 of the 5,000 tanks Iraq had in the war theater, 1,857 of its 3,000 armored vehicles and 2,140 of its 3,500 artillery pieces.
- President Bush said a permanent cease-fire depends upon the actions of Iraq. The administration ordered its ambassador to Kuwait, Edward Gnehm, to take up his post in the newly liberated Kuwait City.
- Wall Street stocks were mixed. The Dow Jones industrial average was down 11 at 2,880 at 11 a.m. EST. Gainers outnumbered losers by nearly 2 to 1.

## Abandoned Iraqi tanks destroyed

NORTHERN KUWAIT (AP) — Troops of the U.S. 3rd Armored Division blew up abandoned Iraqi tanks and other weapons left on the battlefield Thursday to cap a 180-mile push through Iraq that pushed the vaunted Republican Guard.

The 3rd Armored's several divisions that flanked Iraqi forces in a dash across empty desert, destroyed hundreds of tanks and carried over personnel carriers in 21 days of fighting that began in Iraq on Tuesday and worked its way into Kuwait.

Most of the major fighting took place at night, Commanders praised both their troops and equipment, particularly the TOW missiles.

"Every time we shot we got a kill," said Capt. Ronald Turner of Panama City, Fla. "Our thermal sights gave us a big advantage — we could see them but they couldn't see us. We shot everything in our way."

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## Battle of Khafji showed weakness of Iraqi army

WASHINGTON (AP) — The battle of Khafji, Iraq's only offensive of the Persian Gulf War, tipped U.S. military planners to critical Iraqi weaknesses and led to important revisions in the allied war plan, a senior military officer said Thursday.

The "Khafji" encounter in which about 1,500 Iraqi soldiers briefly gained control of the abandoned Saudi town on Jan. 30, told U.S. military planners at least three important things that helped shape the eventual allied offensive, the Marine Corps officer said.

- Iraq's respected armored forces in the interior of Kuwait were unable to communicate adequately and thus coordinate, with the forces closer to the Saudi border.
- Iraqi forces showed little skill in using their powerful artillery to support the infantry and armored troops. This indicated to the allies that their fears of being mowed down by an artillery fire at the outset of an allied offensive were overblown.
- The Iraqi soldiers' hearts were not in the war. From the Khafji battle, in which hundreds of Iraqis surrendered and many were killed, the

allies deduced that "they were not as tough as we thought they might be," the officer said.

The officer, who helped oversee Operation Desert Storm from its arrival in the Persian Gulf, said the ground war was a "pre-emptive" condition that he had identified.

"We had indications at Khafji that they (the Iraqis) wouldn't stay and fight" if they were taken on by an allied ground offensive inside Kuwait, he added. "At the battle of Khafji, and on the basis of other intelligence information gathered in January, the U.S. Central Command decided to shift the main points of attack for the two Marine divisions situated along the gulf coast, the officer said.

The 18,000-man 1st Marine Division, which kicked off the allied offensive at 4 a.m. on Feb. 24, drove northeast toward Kuwait's Jubayl airfield and gained control of it within 24 hours of the "move" on to Kuwait International Airport, where it engaged Iraqi armor in an intense battle in which about 310 Iraqi tanks were destroyed. The Marines, using older-model M-60 tanks, lost none, the officer said.

## Congressman asks unit's quick return

GREENSBURG, Pa. (AP) — U.S. Rep. John Murtha asked the Army's chief of staff Thursday to expedite the return of a reserve unit that lost at least a fifth of its personnel in an Iraq missile attack.

The 68-member 14th Quartermaster Detachment in the United States just a week and a day before a Scud missile hit Monday near Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

At least 13 members of the Pennsylvania-based 14th died and 37 were injured, said Rodney Burrell, assistant commander of the 99th Army Reserve unit in Oakdale.

The Army released the names of 13 victims by late Thursday and planned to release more other family members were notified. Among the dead were the first three U.S. women reported killed in the Persian Gulf.

## Soviets seek to link gulf pact, other conflicts

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union on Thursday urged a lasting political solution to seal the Gulf War cease-fire and said "the time is ripe" for renewed efforts to resolve other Middle East conflicts.

"We must rule out completely any resumption of military action in the Persian Gulf region," Foreign Minister Bessmertnykh said at a news conference.

"I believe the Soviet Union could not and is not intending to consider its approach to this issue ... on an individual basis. We have started to discuss such an issue with the United States and some of the states of the Middle East," he said.

"We welcome the liberation of Kuwait, the restoration of its independence, sovereignty, territorial integrity and the restoration of the lawful government of this country," he said, reading a statement.

"For the first time the international community showed its unified will in the face of the occupation of one country by another."

Bessmertnykh said the Gulf War highlighted the need to resume negotiations with the other Middle East problems, including the future of the Palestinians.

"We are resolved to get down urgently together with the Arab states, Israel and all other sides involved in the Middle East problem which is the main source of instability, lack of trust and continuing arms race in the region," he said.

diplomacy between Moscow and Baghdad was acceptable to the U.S.-led coalition.

Bessmertnykh said he agreed with Gorbachev's assessment earlier in the week that Soviet-U.S. relations, strained by the war and the Korean Peninsula, were "fragile." But he was optimistic they would improve.

He said he might soon meet Secretary of State James A. Baker III and that a rescheduled superpower summit "also cannot be excluded."

Weeks ago, President Bush canceled a Moscow summit scheduled for mid-February, citing the war. Gorbachev's spokesman, Vitaly Ignatenko, told the state news agency that he thought relations with the United States had "a historical event which interrupted the process, even while the superpowers were adhering to their own approaches."

## Kuwaiti opposition presses demands for free elections

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Kuwait's government press secretary said Thursday the country's opposition is stepping up pressure for the reestablishment of parliament, free elections and a government representing all political beliefs of the country.

"They have asked Kuwait's parliament for a pledge that military rule will not last too long, and that the country's parliament, dissolved in 1986, will be revived. Some are demanding a date for parliamentary elections. But even the opposition concedes that these are unrealistic times demanding unusual measures, and they have thrown support behind the temporary imposition of martial law."

"Martial law under the circumstances is necessary, but we hope it does not stretch for long," said

Muhammad al-Hadi, an outspoken opposition leader and opposition member.

"There is fear of military rule, so there would be government of national unity," he said.

The public is forming a "unity government" representing all political views to oversee the reconstruction of Kuwait, with relations with the United States, a top meeting this week between 10 opposition leaders and Sheikh Sabah, crown prince and military governor of Kuwait.

The opposition said the unity government's primary task would be to fix a date for elections.

## Corps screech to halt after lightning attack

IN SOUTHERN IRAQ (AP) — U.S. and French units that swept around the left flank of Iraqi forces and cut off all possibility of escape ground to a triumphant halt Thursday.

The lightning move of the XVIII Airborne Corps, using assault helicopters and light armor, drove to the north of Basra, southern Iraq's largest city, before President Bush's orders stopped it.

"You probably know more about this than I do," Maj. Gen. J.H. Birtford Peay, commander of the 101st Airborne Division, said at a news conference after a briefing Thursday morning. "I just got a call this morning telling me to stop."

The Screaming Eagles of the 101st had the farthest to go in the cut-off of the XVIII Corps to the rear of the main Iraqi force. They moved quickly to the Euphrates River, cutting off retreat to Baghdad by Highway 8, then attacked the highway north of Basra.

An air assault helicopters of the 101st knocked out armored personnel carriers, helicopters, trucks, tanks and other heavy equipment trying to move northward.

"They were in full retreat, bumper to bumper," said Brig. Gen. Henry Shelton, deputy division commander. "They had no where to run. We didn't leave them any place to hide."

Peay said the 101st suffered no casualties, but the fate of a downed rescue helicopter crew remained unknown Tuesday morning.

Some soldiers expressed mild disappointment at the quick end of the ground campaign.

"I hope they call it off (the cease fire) so we can go back on them a little bit more," said Capt. Steven Laws, 23, of St. Louis, Mo.

Spec. Mansu Knox, 20, of Hartsdale, N.Y., was content to have it over. "I just want to hug my mother," he said. "I want to get on with

my life. I've got two siblings, seven nieces, letters waiting for me."

With the 101st pressing escape to the west and north, the 24th Infantry Division (mechanized) and the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment had pushed up south of Basra and north of Kuwait. The 2nd Airborne Division was mopping up an area behind the 24th and the French 6th Armored Division was protecting the left flank.

"There was absolutely nothing else to be gained by continuing the offensive," said Lt. Gen. Gary E. Luck, the corps commander.

"All the objectives of the coalition and the United States have been realized," his assistant, Maj. Gen. James D. Moore, said. "We've just got 10 seconds left in the game," Luck said. "We don't really need a field goal, especially with the first team still in."

"I'm so pleased the way those guys fought, the way they moved, the way they maneuvered, out-maneuvered and got behind this vaunted army that wasn't vanquished at all."

Asked whether anything went wrong in the ground campaign, Luck noted only 100 hours, the commander said. "A lot of small things always go wrong when you are dealing with 120,000 men and four and a half divisions, but our plan was perfect. Our execution of the plan was perfect."

"We just outfoxed him. We were on the Euphrates River in less than 24 hours."

With the VII Corps on their right pushing from the south, the XVIII boxed the Iraqis from the west and the north, cutting off the squeeze.

The first assault to the Euphrates, carried out with 300 of the 101st Airborne Division's helicopters, both attack and transport, made the Iraqis think the allies were on their way to Basra. "They never intended to go to Baghdad," he said, and the key to success "was the speed and tenacity that we brought. We captured hundreds and hundreds. We have killed hundreds."

## Israel lifts alert system, issues warning to Iraq

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel lifted its emergency alert against Iraqi missile attacks just hours after the Gulf War cease-fire Thursday, then warned Iraq not to make any moves against the Jewish state.

"If the Iraqis are considering resuming fighting, they must also take into account an Israeli response," said Defense Minister Moshe Arens.

At the end of emergency rules saw Israelis putting away the gas masks they had kept at hand against possible chemical attack. There was also dancing in the streets for the Jewish holiday of Purim, which coincided with the cease-fire.

But the end to the fighting also brought fears that with Saddam Hussein still in power, Iraq remained a threat to Israel.

"We are pleased that the war ends with the defeat of Saddam Hussein and the destruction of a great part of his military machine," said Avi Pazner, a senior government adviser.

After 39 Iraqi missiles fired at the Jewish state in the past six weeks, causing two deaths and 230 injuries, life was returning to normal in many ways.

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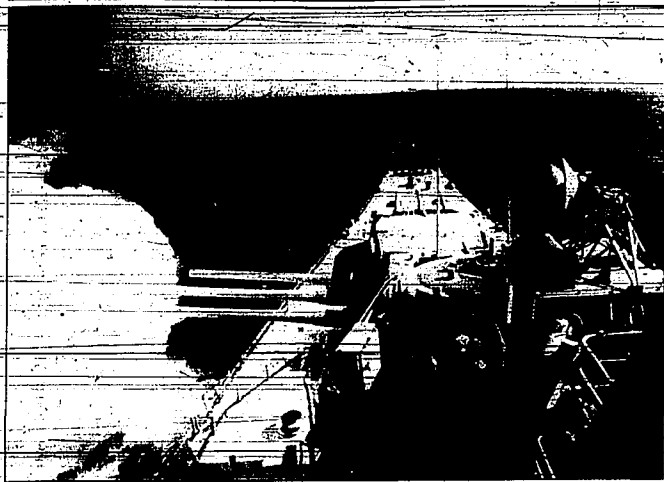

## Another attack ends in death of U.S. soldier

IZMIR, Turkey (AP) — An assassin shot an American soldier in the head Thursday in the second attack on a U.S. military employee in Turkey in a month.

A Marxist group opposed to the Gulf War claimed responsibility for both shootings.

The semi-official news agency Anatolia said the victim, identified as Lt. Col. Kevin Macke, 44, was in stable condition after surgery. It said he worked at NATO Land Southeast Command in Izmir. His hometown was not available.

"We will continue our activities until imperialism gets its hands off the Middle East," said a caller claiming to represent Dev Sol, after contacting the Izmir office of the daily newspaper Cumhuriyet.

Two assassins followed the American to his fourth-floor apartment in the western city of Izmir and shot him in the head, Anatolia said.

Officials at the Saglik hospital in Izmir told "The Associated Press" the American was brought in wearing a U.S. military uniform.

It was the second shooting of an American claimed by Dev Sol in a month. On Feb. 7, Dev Sol said it was behind the slaying of a U.S. military aide in the southern Turkish city of Adana.

The U.S. Embassy confirmed an American was shot on Thursday, but refused to give further details.

Each ship is 887 feet long and 108 feet wide, can travel about 40 mph and has a crew of 1,500. Each is equipped with 16-inch guns that fire shells and with deck-side launchers for Tomahawks.

The Reagan administration spent \$385 million to refurbish the Wisconsin and \$235 million to refurbish the Missouri after 26 years of inactivity, McGuinn said. The ships cost \$110 million when they were built in the early 1940s.

"They've all been modernized," McGuinn said. "It still looks like a 1940 car, but when you run it, it operates as a modern battleship."

The Navy estimates it would save about \$80 million a year by mothballing the ships, mostly because of the costs of maintaining a crew of 7,500 sailors and 120 officers on each, McGuinn said.

McGuinn said it is possible but unlikely the ships would be pulled from mothballs. But that would be cheaper than building new battleships, he said.

Retired Navy Capt. Wilbur Sundt of Fort Atkinson, Wis., served aboard the Wisconsin as a radio supervisor after World War II and on a state of Wisconsin committee for the decommissioning of the ship in 1988.

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## War loss of 140 allied soldiers could be history's lowest tally

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — The nearly 140 allied soldiers and airmen killed in the six-week war against Iraq are probably an all-time low, considering the size of the forces involved, allied military officials said Thursday.

The 79 Americans who died assist that criterion for U.S. combat deaths in a major war, U.S. sources said. They noted further that fully a third of the total were killed in a single act by the Iraqis.

Twenty-eight American service members were killed Feb. 25 when an Iraqi Scud missile hit their barracks near the big allied air base at Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

Figures compiled by U.S. Central Command showed that 23 Americans were killed in the air war between Jan. 17 and Feb. 24, and 28 others died in the four days of ground fighting that ended Wednesday in Iraq's defeat.

Only four were killed on ground combat in the first two days, but the figure rose as the U.S. armored units charged through Kuwait and Iraq, clashing with some of the sturdiest Iraqi armor.

Official figures released by U.S. Central Command showed 79 killed, 213 wounded and 45 missing in Operation Desert Storm. All but six of the missing predated the ground

war, primarily pilots shot down in raids over Kuwait and Iraq. At least eight of the MIAs are believed to be Iraqi prisoners.

U.S. officials estimated that the 20,500-led coalition force had 433,000 troops in the combat zone compared with Iraq's 623,000 when the war began on Jan. 17. About 200,000 of the combat forces were American, they said. The Pentagon said there were 19 deaths among 15,000 U.S. troops in the 1983 Grenada invasion, and 23 killed among 27,000 in Panama in December 1989.

Military sources said the low casualty rate in allied ranks was due to many factors, including better protection for troops in the rear and high-tech weaponry that allowed the troops to take on their adversary from a distance.

In Desert Storm, planning was heavily geared to limiting casualties. Weeks of bombing that "degraded" Iraqi fighting capabilities and an attack that sped over or around defenses.

Allied forces released no estimate of Iraqi killed in combat. A spokesman for Prince Bandar bin Sultan, Saudi Arabia's ambassador to the United States, said Saudi officers estimated 85,000 to 100,000 Iraqis killed and wounded.

Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf,

the U.S. commander in the Gulf, held a briefing on Wednesday that there were a "very, very large number of dead."

U.S. officers have refused to discuss the subject of enemy soldiers killed in the bombing, even to say whether the Iraqis were burying them in mass graves or otherwise removing them from the battlefield.

Officers said Thursday that the U.S. invasion force could be so fast that it could not have taken time to count, let alone bury, enemy dead without endangering the mission.

Col. Ahmed al-Robayan, spokesman for the Shiite and Jordan Arab Forces, said they lost 41 killed and 206 wounded in the operation since Jan. 17 but could provide no breakdown for losses in the four-day ground war.

Lt. Gen. Sir Peter de la Billiere, the commander of 60 British forces in Operation Desert Storm, told reporters that the overall losses by the coalition were "the smallest number for the size of the campaign in the history of warfare."

"The British had 42 killed, 22 wounded and 12 missing in the 47 days of war. Nine were killed on Tuesday when a U.S. Air Force A-10 'tank buster' accidentally hit two British armored vehicles while trying close air support missions during a battle in southern Iraq.

The U.S. Command said the accident would be investigated but de la Billiere said he thought it was unnecessary. "I'm not looking for blame," he said. "The soldiers' equipment had been 'second to none,' and because of it we're going home with a lot more people than would otherwise be the case."

### Editorial

#### Nels Andrew Moller: Valley family pays victory's price

Suddenly, the video-game war has a face. It has a name, and it has a name: Nels Andrew Moller, Army sergeant, armored-vehicle crewman, farmer, Roman Catholic, avid hunter, high school football player. Dead at 23.

We Americans have been marveling at the relatively tiny human cost of the "Persian Gulf" victory. After weeks of high-tech bombardment, the ground war was a romp, a 100-hour steamrolling over an enemy that scarcely fought back.

Amazingly, only 79 Americans were killed in action - negligible losses in strategic terms.

Yet, for 79 American families, one of them in pain, Idaho, the losses were devastating. The nation's delight in so easy a victory must be tempered by the grief we share with them: To the family of Nels Andrew Moller, to offer the condolences of all the Magic Valley: Surely, we do not exaggerate to say everyone here mourns with you the loss of this fine young man.

In the coming days, pundits and politicians will offer a rainbow of opinions about just what Sgt. Moller and the others gave their lives for. Let it be said here that they gave their lives for their country. For a soldier, that

says enough.

What will the war's aftermath bring? In the Mideast, with Iraq's power broken and with militant Muslims left disappointed and bitter, the future is as hazy as the smoke-filled Kuwaiti sky.

Here at home, we Americans surely will behave as we always have in these circumstances. Given the opportunity, we will find room for compassion toward the vanquished Iraqi people, who have suffered grievously in a war their dictator foolishly caused.

President Bush will reap a rich harvest of political popularity. Even those of us who counseled against using force must acknowledge that his policy led to success. Whether another

course of action might have been better is moot. Next year, somehow, the Democrats will find a writing major to challenge Bush, but at this point any kind of real contest is hard to imagine.

Today, however, these and a thousand other domestic and international issues swirl cantankerously in the background, barely noticed as the war's human face gazes from the front page.

Nels Andrew Moller, 1968-1991. Thank you, sergeant, and may you rest in peace.

#### Prediction One: The foreign policy elite and their hector-kicker allies among "America last" cadres will begin a major assault to discredit America's victory. They will suggest that military victory bought no political solutions and that the expense in dollars, if not in blood, was obscene in the face of so many pressing domestic needs. The foreign policy elite makes its living by talking and spitting hairs to infinity, by intellectualizing every problem for as long as possible. Direct and unambiguous action that succeeds threatens the very livelihood of the "policy wonks" who labor in the think tanks and in academia.

The political future of the American monstrosity, now depends on dividing American society into as many fragments as possible, and a miliary war is dangerous to their health. Worse, this war has shattered myths about weapons not working, about might never making right and about the moral bankruptcy of Western civilization.

It may be that the war will indeed fail to solve all the Middle East's problems and that political solutions will remain as elusive as ever. But Saddam Hussein was not a political problem - he was a military problem, and that problem has been solved. The war was partly about telling bullies that they cannot control of half the world - out of Iraq's hands and very much about keeping a murderous despot from getting his hands on nuclear bombs. Military objectives were achieved.

Prediction Two: Iraq's defeat is a long-term earthquake in the Arab world. There is no disguising this defeat, no way to salvage honor. The fact is that the nations of the Arab world lack the social, political and economic structures necessary to life in the modern

world. In time, this realization will thwart the forces of medievalism and create movements to bring Islam into the modern world. In a world where might is respected above all else, America might win. What America does with this leverage is another question.

Prediction Three: The United States is now the world's only superpower. Forget the prattling of the deconstructionists venting their spleens against a nation that has not had time for their demands. The Soviets will remain a military power, but the Soviet generals know they are technologically overmatched at present. Even if it avoids a civil war, the U.S.S.R. is decaying away from being a seriously competitive in the modern world. The Soviet system has been revealed to the world as a monstrous fraud. Without the moral authority of Marxist religion, the Soviet Union is just another nation seeking advantage.

The Japanese and the Germans continue to be owned. The Germans are bogged down in their own eastern provinces. The Japanese capital hoards will soon be running low as their aging population and their Americanized teens begin to devour those savings. The vast U.S. market will continue to be the market.

Prediction Three: The Iraq war has finished Mikhail S. Gorbachev. Soviet generals have watched in humiliation as a Soviet-trained army, fielding Soviet equipment, was routed by American high-tech firepower. Worse, the Iraqis owe the Soviet Union more than \$50 billion for this equipment, money the Soviets need but will

never get. Coming on the heels of the loss of Eastern Europe, this humiliation will lead the neo-Stalinists to oust Gorbachev. This will lead to civil war and the most dangerous moment in world history - maybe ever.

Prediction Four: China will soon return to the front pages. The sands of life are running out for the old men in Beijing. When they go, China will begin to disintegrate into civil upheaval, maybe civil war. The crackup of the communist world has only begun to occur.

Prediction Five: The 1990s will witness a revival of American industry as Baby Boom managers take control of companies large and small, abandon the Thimbleton syndrome of the 1980s and concentrate on products. Given upheaval elsewhere in the world, these companies will recapture American markets in large measure and make considerable strides overseas.

Prediction Six: The United States, Canada and Mexico will agree to a free-trade agreement, thereby touching off a historic economic boom in Mexico. American companies will bring back millions of jobs from the Orient to Mexico and in so doing reverse the tide of migration. This will cause the United States and will also provide enormous business opportunities for American Hispanics.

Wish One: Vice President Dan Quayle will turn golf pro and ask President Bush not to ask him to serve again, and the president will then ask Gen. Gorman to fill the terror with him for vice president, thereby carrying America to a historic turning point.

In training dog obedience classes, I am often in contact with people who have purchased what they believed to be an expensive pure-bred "pet store" puppy only to find out the dog barely resembles the breed, has major medical problems and/or is basically untrainable. Biting, structural problems, internal organs in the wrong places, can't be house trained, too hyper to handle, etc. - the problems go on and on. Why? Because pet stores basically sell puppy-mill puppies.

Years ago, as president of the Boulder County Humane Society, I became involved in a campaign to stop pet stores from selling dogs. I visited a number of puppy mills and still have vivid memories of the filth and suffering I saw in the Washington state. I was a

cruelty officer and helped close down several puppy mills and I have also seen a similar puppy mill in Twin Falls County. These puppy mills come in all sizes and shapes.

These dogs are poor quality to start with, in poor health, with poor care, often inbred for generations. The puppies are then whored out to pet stores and sold for six to 10 times the purchase price. Bottom line: People, with rare exception, are being sold inferior dogs for quality prices. Ever wonder how pet stores can advertise they can get you any breed you want - just a phone call to their puppy broker?

Without pet stores, puppy mills could not exist. In doubt, call the American Humane Society or the Humane Society of the United States.

If you want a nice pure-bred dog, contact a kennel club, a specialty breed club (American Kennel Club in New York can give you information), buy a "Dog World" magazine or go to the library and check the want ads of newspaper in other cities; contact these people. If you just want a cute puppy, go to our annual shelter/humane society and give some money.

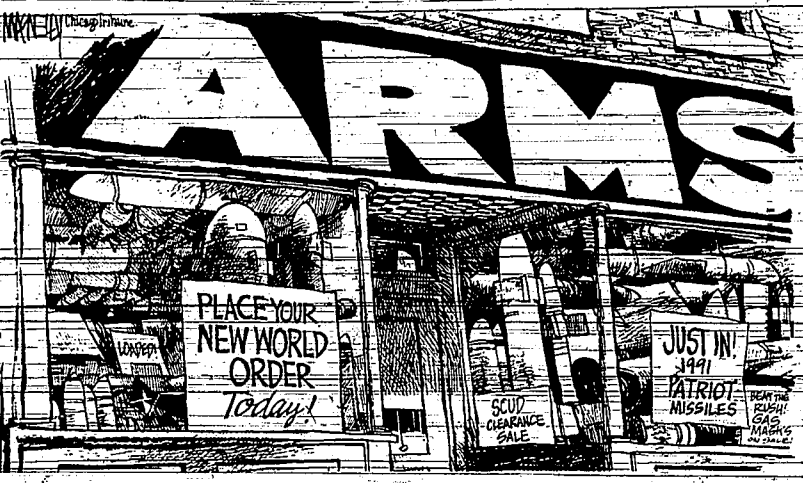

# Angry over layoffs, east Germans protest

NEURUPPIN, Germany (AP) — Nearly five months into unification, eastern Germans are abandoning hopes of quick prosperity and are taking to the streets by the thousands to vent their anger.

More than 40,000 east Germans staged winning strikes and blocked traffic Thursday from Berlin to Rostock — a day earlier 60,000 marched in Leipzig, Halle and Schwerin in some of the largest protests since the peaceful revolution against hard-line Communist leader Erich Honecker in autumn 1989.

Consumer goods abound, but houses are still crumbling, roads have sunk further into disrepair and factories are grinding to a halt. At least 4 million workers will be jobless by summer.

In some ways, Germans are more divided than ever, with health care collapsing and cities running out of money in the former Communist country. Over in the west, the wealthy economy rolls along. "As rents, energy costs and utility bills rise, people are being pushed to a subsistence level," said Udo Massberg, a mid-level manager at a factory in the former east German town of Neuruppin outside Berlin.

Massberg, 43, says the price hikes coupled with low wages and runaway unemployment have brought about the unrest in the east, a region of 16.6 million people.

He and many others predict the protests will increase.

Angry workers have been holding daily vigils at the front gate of Massberg's plant, the EPW works. Of approximately 2,500 employees, no more than 300 will have jobs as of July.

The sprawling, rundown electronic parts factory is filled with aging and outmoded machines. Even the 10 workers in one modernized division are threatened with layoffs.

# Zia's party triumph: Dreams coming true

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — The victory of Khaleda Zia's party in parliamentary elections is a monument to the memory of her assassinated husband and the realization of her nation's long-frustrated dreams of democracy.

With nearly all election results tallied Thursday, Mrs. Zia's Bangladesh Nationalist Party has an unassailable lead in the contest for Parliament's 300 seats.

Mrs. Zia, 46, has often said there would have been no need for her to enter politics if her husband, President Ziaur Rahman, were alive. But the mother of two has proved to be a savvy politician who confounded expectations by trouncing the better-organized Awami League of her rival, Sheikh Hasina.

With 289 districts reporting from Wednesday voting, Mrs. Zia's party has 136 seats versus the Awami League's 84.

A shaken Hasina declared that "something mischievous went against us," but foreign election observers said the voting appeared to be fair.

Mrs. Zia and Hasina, who is the daughter of another assassinated president, temporarily shelved their longtime animosity last October to lead a mass protest that forced President Hussain Muhammad Ershad to resign. Ershad, seized power in a 1976 coup, has been under two years later, after founding the Bangladesh Nationalist Party in an attempt to eliminate his power.



charges demonstrated he still has political clout. His party won 35 seats, including five that went to Ershad himself.

The former army general can keep only one of the seats, with the others put up for by-elections. Under Bangladesh law, he would automatically be stripped of the remaining seat if convicted.

Jamiat-e-Islami, a right-wing Muslim religious party, won 17 seats. Eleven others went to small-party allies of Hasina's Awami League and six went to scattered among small parties and independents.

Nine seats have not yet been declared. Elections for two others were postponed when candidates died — one in emphysema, violence, the other of natural causes.

Mrs. Zia, a stylish mother-of-two, emerged from her bungalow in the heart of Dhaka's chief military base shortly before sundown Thursday to place a wreath on the tomb of her husband, an army general who seized power in a coup in 1976.

Gen. Zia was elected president two years later, after founding the Bangladesh Nationalist Party in an attempt to eliminate his power.

### Albanian protests lead to 200 arrests

VIENNA, Austria — Police arrested more than 200 people after dozens of Stalinist dictator Enver Hoxha were torn down last week during protests by tens of thousands Albanians, an opposition leader said Thursday.

Some of the inflamed protesters were beaten before being released, and an unknown number are still in detention, said Arben Imami, a Democratic Party leader reached by telephone in Albania's capital of Tirana.

Authorities have spoken of 60 to 74 people detained and state TV said Wednesday trials had started against some. According to Imami, 170 to 200 people were arrested in Tirana and another 70 to 80 in Korca.

### Famine threatens Ethiopia and Sudan

GENEVA — Famine caused by two years of drought and continuing civil war threatens up to 13 million people in Ethiopia and Sudan this year, International Red Cross officials said Thursday.

Saying "widespread famine is imminent," the League of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, appealed for \$66 million in international emergency aid.

It was the latest of several warnings by international aid agencies that the area could face a repeat of the devastating 1984-85 famine that killed more than 1 million people in the two African countries and left millions more in refugee camps.

"It's nearly as bad, very close to the situation in 1984-85," said Red Cross spokesman Ann Naef.

### Police suspect political motive in death

JERUSALEM — A Jewish seminary student was found stabbed to death Thursday in the Muslim Quarter of Jerusalem's old city, and police said they believed the slayer was a Palestinian with political motives.

The slaying followed a lull in fatal attacks on Israelis by Palestinians during the Persian Gulf War.

The funeral of Eihannan Atali, 27, was attended by 1,000 mourners. Mayor Teddy Kollek called the murder "a wretched event marred what should have been a happy day" because of the cease-fire in the Gulf conflict.

Atali studied at a seminary in the old city's Jewish Quarter, police said. They said his body was found by a friend in a pool of blood Thursday in the nearby Muslim Quarter. His throat was slit, police said.

# Trial on for nurses' aides charged with 42 murders

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Four nurses' aides accused of killing at least 42 helpless, elderly patients with overdoses of medicine or water torture went on trial Thursday in Austria's largest-murder case since World War II.

Chief defendant Waltraud Wagner, charged with 32 murders and two more attempted killings, stared at the floor as state prosecutor Ernst Klobber read an 88-page indictment to a packed courtroom.

Wagner became "mistress-over-life-and-death" as she and her alleged accomplices killed patients they found tiresome, Klobber charged.

Irene Leidolf, 39, charged with four murders, wept as she answered routine questions.

Stefanja Gabner, a 51-year-old native of Yugoslavia, charged with three as she pleaded guilty in helping Wagner in some murders Wagner denies.

Both Wagner and Leidolf pleaded guilty in some deaths, but said they were mercy killings. Grouber charged with two murders, pleaded not guilty.

The women, who allegedly cooperated in some of the killings, caused many more than 42 deaths, Klobber suggested.

"We will never know the true dimension," he said. "I fear that it is larger than we can imagine."

The four women were detained in April 1989 after a series of suspicious deaths in wards where they worked at Lains hospital in suburban Vienna.

Klobber dismissed the argument the deaths were mercy killings, suggesting Wagner and the other three aides murdered patients had other motives.

# Salvadoran rebel leader dead at 59

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Guillermo Ungo, who headed the political wing of El Salvador's guerrilla movement, died Thursday in a Mexico City hospital, his wife said. He was 59.

Ungo, who lived for several years in exile in Panama, had been hospitalized for five weeks and died of a heart attack following complications from two operations, said Nora Lopez Andreu de Ungo.

She said his body would be returned to El Salvador on Saturday.

Ungo's Salvadoran newspaper, El Salpress, said Ungo died shortly before noon at the Spanish Hospital.

The canal company operates three power plants and will build two more by the spring of 1993, company manager Ted Diehl said.

"With every power plant we build, we'll be able to reduce the cost of water farmers have to pay," Diehl said. "If we don't have extended periods of drought eventually the electricity generated could pay for all the water usage."

**TWIN FALLS** — First Security Bank will formally open its new drive-through facilities at its downtown Twin Falls branch this morning.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony is scheduled for 9:30 a.m.

The drive-through is part of the expansion and consolidation of First Security's facilities in downtown Twin Falls following the bank's purchase of Twin Falls Bank & Trust two years ago.

### Pinball machines may not be against the law soon after all

**BOISE** — Pinball machines are one step closer to being legal after a bill redefining Idaho's definition of gambling passed the House on Thursday by a 51-9 vote.

Under current language in the code, pinball machines and video games that award free games to winners are illegal. The bill, sponsored by Rep. Cole, would R-Boise, would clean up old language to exempt those amusement or entertainment games that require skill to play.

The Idaho Department of Law Enforcement supports the bill.

### Police report rash of license plate thefts occurring all over

**TWIN FALLS** — At least a dozen Twin Falls residents have reported their cars' license plates stolen in recent days.

"According to police reports, most of the victims had one license plate stolen, although some said both were taken. In one case, the vehicle registration was also stolen from inside the car.

Nearly all of the thefts reportedly took place Tuesday or Wednesday, but some people were unable to say exactly when the license plates were stolen.

"No one, apparently, is immune from the plate pilferers," as the license plates were reported stolen from cars in front of homes, restaurants, bars, hotels and even a hospital.

Police said Thursday they have no suspects. Anyone caught stealing a license plate could be charged with petit theft, which carries a maximum sentence of one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

## Poisoned dogs stump Murtaugh officials

**MURTAUGH** — Eight dogs have died recently from what appears to be strychnine poisoning.

Murtaugh's chief of police Francis Johnson is currently investigating the apparent poisonings, but said he is not 100 percent sure it is a person who is poisoning the dogs.

Johnson said he is aware of nine dogs that have been reported as poisoned — all but one have died. But he could not pinpoint a rumor that up to 20 dogs have been poisoned.

And he dispelled a second rumor. "It's a complete fabrication that the poison has been thrown into people's yards," Johnson said.

He said that all the dogs that have been reported poisoned were let outside for a

time before becoming sick, but were not tied up or fenced in a yard.

Elmer and Betty Dinarud's dog, Shadow, was poisoned and died Feb. 20 and was sent to veterinarian Charles Donnelly of the Green Cross Veterinary Hospital for an autopsy.

"Shadow was a loveable dog — everybody loved him," Betty Dinarud said. "He spent his time down at the shop with my husband and my son."

Shadow was let outside for about 10 minutes, she said, and became ill by 2 p.m. By 2:30, Shadow had had a seizure and was in the Green-Cross Veterinary Hospital.

Donnelly was not available Thursday for comment but a hospital staff member said the toxicology results from the tissue samples sent to the state laboratory were not back yet.

## School counselors deal with it all

**TWIN FALLS** — Elementary school counselors deal with more than just drug or alcohol, others who are physically or sexually abused at home.

But sometimes their jobs involve helping a shy kid find a friend on a lonely playground.

"We tell them to go up to another child and ask if they will play with them," said Jane Garrett, the Twin Falls School District's elementary counseling coordinator.

Children can bluntly rebuff such a request from a child who has made a habit of wandering the playground alone, she said.

"If the answer is no, we tell them to go ask someone else," she said.

Giving that kind of advice to children is one of several missions of the district's elementary counseling program, now in its second year.

Garrett said she hopes the Twin Falls district will eventually hire three new elementary counselors so the program can serve all grades.

The new program recognizes that factors, besides a teacher's skill can affect learning. "If a kid is upset about his parents fighting, he can't learn," Garrett said.

Counselors have made several referrals to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and a few to police in cases of child sexual and physical abuse, Counselor Kathy Waggoner said.

One girl told school officials she was having sex with a boyfriend, but counselors discovered that family members were actually sexually abusing her.

In another case, a girl's brothers were sexually abusing her.

"We're seeing kids in the second grade with severe emotional problems," Garrett said.

They offer drug and alcohol counseling, intervene in cases of child abuse and give classroom workshops on different topics, including health.

Simple advice has its value, Garrett said. Many adults have never learned to socialize and end up selecting reclusive careers, she said.

They are handicapped in an information society.

Counselors classify the types of problems grade school students encounter by four categories: family, social skills, education and other.

They can range from poor grades and low motivation to a death in the family and legal troubles.

In the first half of the school year, three counselors working in grades 1, 5 and 6 gave individual counseling to 46 children for educational reasons, 46 for family reasons, 100 for difficulties with social skills and three for other reasons.

Counselors hope to identify problems while children are young and resilient, Waggoner said.

One thing that has surprised them is the fact that school counselors have the same number of kids with problems, although the kinds of problems vary.

Kids from schools in more affluent areas have pressures to excel in school or wear the right kind of clothes.

In other schools, the problem might be having enough clothes.

## Judge rules against Odiaga insanity defense

**HAILEY** — The murder case against Mitchel John Odiaga moved a step closer to the Idaho Supreme Court Thursday when a district judge refused to limit Odiaga's attorneys to use the outlawed insanity defense in the case.

At a hearing scheduled for March 6, attorneys Brian Elkins and David Nevin asked District Judge James May to allow an appeal of his decision to be taken directly to the state's highest court.

If granted, that appeal could delay Odiaga's trial, currently penciled in for April 22, Elkins said. If May denies the appeal, defense attorneys could appeal the decision after a trial.

## Parents of shooting victim sue Odiaga for damages

**HAILEY** — Parents of the Burley man killed in a drive-by shooting in downtown Ketchum last summer have filed suit against their son's alleged killer, Donald and Charlotte Schaefer of Burley.

Odiaga, 36, faces two first-degree murder charges stemming from the random shootings of two men on the streets of Ketchum June 22. He sat quietly through Thursday's hearing, occasionally asking for water and turning to look at a nearly empty courtroom.

Although a 1982 state law prevents attorneys for using insanity as a defense in criminal trials, Nevin argued Thursday that the ban denies constitutionally guaranteed due process rights.

The suit accuses Odiaga, a former postal worker with a history of mental illness, of shooting his son, Bruce Tate Schaefer, on the streets of Ketchum June 22.

In ruling on the motion, however, May said in September ruling by the Idaho Supreme Court upholds the Idaho law.

"The state Supreme Court ruled the statute is constitutional and... that's the controlling decision so far as what this court will do," May said.

If Odiaga's appeal reaches the state Supreme Court, it will become the latest in a series of recent challenges to Idaho's insanity defense ban.

"The last chapter has not been written" on the insanity defense, said Nevin, who argued that the right of a defendant to deny responsibility for his actions because of a mental defect or disease has an 800-year history, extending throughout American and English common law.

Only three states — Idaho, Utah and Montana — currently have laws barring the use of insanity as a defense.

# Education committee introduces Jones' soda pop tax bill

**BOISE**—For Republican Rep. Doug Jones of Pocatello, the second time was the charm.

After the House Revenue and Taxation Committee earlier this week refused to introduce Jones' soda pop tax bill, the Education Committee agreed to it on Thursday.

Revenue from a 2-cent-per-can tax—\$8 to \$10 million a year—would fund vocational and community outreach at six of Idaho's higher education institutions, including the College of Southern Idaho.

There is a tremendous potential here to do some really good things for the state, Jones said.

The committee also introduced a measure requesting the State Board of Education and the Legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee fund 85 percent of community college district budgets.

Currently, about 60 percent of the academic budgets at CCI and North

Idaho College in Pocatello are funded by student fees and local university taxes.

Both measures stem from a study of a nation by an interim legislative committee that studied the state's community colleges. Another bill, which would allow community college districts to impose an individual income tax surcharge with two-thirds-vote approval, is

also being considered.

Some members of the Education Committee said it was inappropriate for the committee to consider a soda pop tax bill.

"We're in an area here where we have no business being in," said Rep. Helen Stanger, R-Boise, who opposed introducing the bill.

Jones, however, said once the bill is introduced, it may be referred back to the Revenue and Taxation Committee for a consideration.

Rep. Peter Adams, D-Weed, supported introducing the soda pop tax bill.

"It is possible we know more than Rev. and Tax," Napiger said.

It's perfectly logical and acceptable to be in this committee," Jones said.

For the second time this week, Tom Brennan, president of the Idaho Retailers Association, spoke against the proposed tax.

"It's a truly punitive" Brennan said, adding a soda pop tax to tax on chocolate-litening gross from some committee members instead of on candy for general use.

"I'm introducing retailers, holders, fast-food restaurants, and others. I encourage you not to waste your time," he said. "The opposition will be extensive."

Jones said the tax, which would be collected by wholesalers, would fund much-needed vocational education programs.

"There really is a need to bolster our community commitment and vocational funding in this state," he said.

Across the hall Thursday morning, a bill that would hand in hand with the soda pop tax passed the Senate Education Committee.

Sponsored by Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, the legislation calls for local communities to examine how community colleges serve their areas and how to improve high school vocational education outreach.

State Sen. Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert, said he hoped Andrew Moller is remembered for his sacrifice.

"None of us ever really wanted to go to war or have people we know go," Tominga said. "Now that's over, we know that it's not by any means decided to protect people and freedoms we believe in."

The word of Andrew Moller's death had spread through most of the town by Thursday afternoon.

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"He never showed a frustration point," said Virginia Eates, who taught Andrew as a youngster through the Chaparral One special reading program at St. Nicholas School in Rupert.

"He was a lot like his father—even gentle, soft, which doesn't sound like an Army material. It's kind of a paradox," she added.

Though Andrew struggled with reading and may have had dyslexia, Eates said, he compensated for the problem well.

"He never gave up," she said.

During his senior year at Mimmo High School, Andrew was a member of the G.I. Debert Bennett, junior counselor at Mimco, knew him well.

"I probably had a lot to do with him joining the service," Bennett said.

Andrew joined the National Guard during his senior year in high school.

Bennett said he was not a member of the military extensively.

"He wanted to travel and see the world," Bennett said. "The way he went to college and he knew the GI Bill and college programs they had were good. I don't know what he wanted to study in college, yet."

Bennett said he had never wanted to get out and do some things, things he couldn't do around here.

"I'm sure he would have been a good leader," Bennett said.

Andrew's former coach, football coach at Mimco and now a teacher and coach at Burley High School, remembered Andrew as "a hard-working individual."

"He was quiet and had a lot of inner emotion... He was very much a patriotic person who thought a lot of his country, his family and this area," Bailey said.

"The thing I remember most about him," Bailey said, "was that he didn't care as much about individual glory. He was out there to help the team, the school."

Capt. Steve Knutzen, company commander of the Burley-based 2nd Battalion, 116th Cavalry, National Guard unit, also called Andrew a team player.

"Knutzen was the young Moller's platoon leader when he was in the National Guard."

"He was always extremely professional. He really wanted to do it and he really liked what he was doing—that's why he transferred to active duty," Knutzen said.

Andrew had a lot of interest in military. Knutzen said. And he was well liked.

"He was a natural leader, somebody that other people followed just because he seemed confident."

Knutzen said Andrew's active-duty enlistment would have been up any time now.

"He wasn't sure whether Moller had existed before his death."

In September, Idaho's high court voted 3-2 to uphold the murder conviction of Barry Seary, who appealed on the basis that his due process rights were violated by not being allowed to use the insanity defense. # Buhl students will soon be getting 1-up on TV news

**BUEL** - The School Board voted to enter into a three-year contract with Whittle Communications and students soon will be watching Channel One programs at the middle school and high school.

Channel One is a 12-minute news program that includes two minutes of commercials that students must view.

The program is free and Whittle Communications will provide the school district with approximately \$17,000 worth of telecommunication equipment for as long as the program is viewed in the classroom.

Superintendent Gene Pyles said the program is well received by those currently using Channel One and that the commercials are taste-

ful.

Pyles said Channel One will be very compatible with the schools' telecommunication program also recently accepted. Pyles also said that having once been a social studies teacher, he was very fond of Channel One's program.

According to Dennis Caines, high school principal, the high school's business education program is in need of help. Caines said last year's state evaluation stressed improving the business program.

Caines said equipment is part of the problem. He said several typewriters are obsolete.

However, the high school recently purchased seven new computers, which will help the situation.

Don Blinn, school business teacher, presented two plans at the week's School Board meeting to help turn around the business pro-

gram.

Both plans, Black suggested, are organizing the number of business courses offered by adding courses such as business technology, an introduction to business courses, business computer applications I and II, general business, economic math and law.

One of the plans also called for an additional full-time business teacher at the high school. Currently, Black's schedule is split between the middle and high schools, and one other business teacher is at the high school full time.

Black would also like to see keyboarding become a mandatory freshman class and suggested having advanced keyboarding courses.

The business program isn't the only program changing.

Chuck Humphries, chemistry teacher, presented an explanation of

"Chemcom" designed to involve students with their community and environment.

For instance, Humphries said the class just completed studying resources available in the area and how to preserve, utilize and recycle those resources. He listed several local businesses to complete the study.

Humphries sees this program becoming an independent study course soon, instead of being a special project in chemistry.

In other business:

The district is submitting a letter of intent for participation in the federal funding program under the Carl Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Education Act.

With the changes made in the Carl Perkins Act, the amount of funds available to the district will be reduced from previous years, if qual-

ifications are met.

Superintendent Pyles said this will have some effect on vocational programs, but not home economics. He said it is possible the state will provide funding to replace federal shortfalls.

The district has to decide about forming a consortium with other districts in March. Shortly after that they must have their vocational programs prepared, in order to qualify for this funding.

The board gave Sue Matthews, lunch program supervisor, approval to remodel the elementary lunch room. Claude Hayer of Hayes Construction, estimated the remodel will cost \$30,000.

Matthews said she is excited about changing to a cafeteria style program and said "environmental factors alone make this an issue that must be addressed sooner or later."

Changing from paper to plastic trays will save the district \$16,000 annually.

The board accepted a proposal from Pyter Anderson to handle bidding, contractors and a one-year in-practice for the middle school placement of the gym floor. Superintendent Pyles called the \$1,500 proposal excellent.

Many architects charge 10 percent of the total cost, which amounts to \$36,000. Now bidding can get underway so work can be completed this summer.

Lee Popplewell, board chairman, announced there will be a public election May 21 to fill the Zone 3 board seat, currently held by Jim Winkle.

There will be a special School Board meeting following the closure of the polls at 8 p.m. to canvass the votes.

## Corps says Andrus plan needs support

**LEWISTON (AP)** - The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has told Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus it cannot proceed with the governor's proposal to draw down four lower Snake River reservoirs without broader support for the plan.

Andrus asked the Corps to begin planning to lower the reservoirs, including Lower Granite at Lewiston, below minimum operating levels beginning April 6.

The governor suggested the plan last month during a Salmon Summit meeting in Boise. It was to be a review of the Corps' plan to flush smolts to the sea through the slack water of downstream reservoirs behind power dams.

But the proposal has touched off waves of concern among shipping, port, recreation and farming interests as the summit prepares for another final meeting Monday in Portland, Ore.

Northwest states the Bonneville Power Administration, utilities and environmentalists have been negotiating for months on how to restore

dwindling Columbia and Snake river salmon runs to based on a federal declaration that they are endangered.

On Thursday, shippers, salmon advocates and others associated with the summit process gathered with Gov. Blinn at the school Andrus plan and others at a meeting sponsored by the Lewiston Chamber of Commerce.

It was reported by the Lewiston Morning Tribune.

Witt Anderson of the Corps of Engineers North Pacific Division in Portland said he expects Monday's Salmon Summit meeting to produce a more definite plan for lowering Snake River reservoirs.

Then it will be the Corps' turn.

"Because something is proposed and has consensus doesn't mean we can then around and implement it," Anderson said.

He said the agency will have to study the proposal, then ask for public comments before deciding on a process it hopes to complete by mid-April.

## Judge begins sorting out complex Hanford nuclear reservation suits

**YAKIMA, Wash. (AP)** - A federal judge has ordered the consolidation of five lawsuits seeking damages for people who believe they were harmed by radiation releases from the Hanford nuclear reservation.

U.S. District Judge Alan McDonald also selected five lead lawyers in the litigation, and gave them a March 15 deadline to merge the lawsuits into a single case.

The suit is a first step in dealing with the claims of potentially hundreds of thousands of people who contend their health and the environment were damaged by radiation emissions from the federal plutonium production

site.

The potential enormity of this litigation, as well as the dollar value of any recovery, is almost staggering, McDonald wrote in his Wednesday ruling.

Defendants in the various lawsuits include the U.S. government, former Hanford contractors DuPont and General Electric Co. and others involved in the production of plutonium for nuclear weapons at Hanford since the 1940s.

Plaintiffs could conceivably be anyone who within the past 50 years resided in the area exposed to radioactive emissions from Hanford.

That area includes much of southeastern Washington, north-

eastern Oregon and a small portion of western Idaho.

McDonald's decision is also a step towards determining which lawyers will get the bulk of what are likely to be millions of dollars in legal fees.

His earlier names as lead counsel Stanley Chesley of Cincinnati, Merrill Davidson of Philadelphia, Tom Foulds of Seattle, Roy Haber of Eugene, Ore., and Erico Castelan Sayre of Santa Monica, Calif.

McDonald gave the lawyers 30 days to come up with a fee plan.

Foulds, who already represents at least 450 claims, said he is not certain the cases can be consolidated in two weeks.

"Different legal theories have to be taken into account," he said.

McDonald's decision addresses the possibility that consolidating all the cases may not be appropriate.

The first case was filed last August, shortly after the release of an initial federal dose reconstruction report that found thousands of people may have potentially been harmed by Hanford radiation.

The five cases represent an estimated 24,000 people.

Haber said the research phase of the case will involve millions of documents and thousands of people.

"We've only gotten to the tip of the iceberg," he said.

Lack of Indian jurors won't halt trial

BLACKFOOT — Seventh District Judge James Herndon has ruled an absence of Indians would not justify dismissing the all-woman jury empaneled for the first-degree murder trial of John Heveawah Jr. Herndon rejected Boise defense attorney William Mauk's motion late Wednesday that a new jury be picked to consider the case against Heveawah for the 1964 slaying of 16-year-old Susan-Lois Hansen of Blackfoot. Heveawah, 45, is an Indian and Mauk argued that Bingham County Prosecutor Tom Moss had violated his constitutional rights by dismissing "every person of color from the jury." Mauk complained that an "Hispanic" and an Indian and a woman whose father is married to an Indian were struck from the panel. But Moss argued that Mauk had come to the hearing prepared to complain about discrimination.

Attorney heads Transportation Board

BOISE — Idaho Falls attorney John X. Combo has been elected chairman of the Idaho Transportation Board. Combo, who has been in private law practice for the past nine years, was appointed to the three-member Transportation Board in January 1990 by Gov. Cecil Andrus. He replaced Melvin Smith of the Idaho Republican Party.

State given Justice Department grant

WASHINGTON — A U.S. Justice Department agency has awarded Idaho \$80,000 to improve and expand service for victims of federal crimes on Indian reservations. The Office for Victims of Crime, part of the Office of Justice Programs to the Department of Justice, supports state, local, and other programs that compensate and help innocent victims of crime and their families.

University endowment earnings fall

MOSCOW — Earnings on more than 600 University of Idaho endowments dipped well below the national average last year for the first time in at least a decade. But the average return on investment of the \$36 million trust fund managing the endowments continues to be among the best in the country since 1981 according to the 1989-90 UI Foundation report. Nearly \$2 million in endowment income was used last year for student scholarships and loans, academic programs and athletics, the report said. The University of Idaho's 10-year average rate of return on endowment funds is 15.9 percent, which ranks in the top 19 percent of more than 5,000 portfolios managed by institutions and measured by an independent analyst. Unlike most universities, officials at the Moscow school invest endowment funds themselves rather than hiring an outside money manager.

Trial opens in slaying of Nampa teacher

CALDWELL — Calling the June 1988 slaying of a Nampa school teacher "an exceptionally brutal murder," the prosecuting attorney in opening statements charged in 3rd District Court that an Oregon man bound the victim's hands behind her neck and killed her "in most execution style." Andrus keeps the pressure on DOE

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus is keeping up his tough talk on the Fort St. Vrain nuclear waste issue, accusing the U.S. Department of Energy of renegeing on two oral agreements on the waste shipments. But Energy Secretary James Watkins is not backing away, either. In his latest letter to Andrus, Watkins said important Energy Department policy decisions should not be intimidated by "threats of forcible interference." Andrus has banned the shipments of high-level nuclear waste from the Fort St. Vrain commercial reactor and has sued the Department of Energy over its planned shipments. The federal agency and Public Service Co., the Colorado utility that operates the idled Fort St. Vrain reactor, have responded with suits against Andrus. During a stop in Idaho Falls Wednesday, Andrus remained adamant about stopping the Fort St. Vrain shipments. If the spent fuel from Fort St. Vrain comes to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, he said, the state will not be able to stop high-level waste shipments from other facilities.

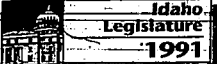

"This is like the nose of the camel pointing into the tent," Andrus said. During an interview and a speech later before the Greater Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce, Andrus said the Energy Department had backed away from two oral agreements on Fort St. Vrain. The first, he said, could have brought the DOE's processing facility for the spent fuel in conjunction with the shipments. The second would have given Idaho the power to levy fines up to \$25 million a year if the Energy Department failed to meet its timetable for processing research. "When we said, 'Put it in writing, the whole thing fell apart,'" Andrus said. Meanwhile, Watkins has responded to a Feb. 13 letter from Andrus informing congressional leaders that he had rejected the Fort St. Vrain shipment. In his letter to Andrus, Watkins said the Fort St. Vrain spent fuel would be used for high-temperature gas-cooled reactor research. But he said the Energy Department's New Production Reactor office "recently determined not to participate directly in this particular research initiative." Watkins said the Fort St. Vrain research would not affect the decision to build the weapons-related New Production Reactor, a multi-billion-dollar project. "Last week, Watkins said Andrus' waste ban could hamper Idaho's chances of getting the tritium-producing project. "Whether and how this research is conducted does not determine the ultimate question whether a New Production Reactor facility will be located in Idaho," Watkins wrote. Andrus said Wednesday that he had not received a copy of Watkins' letter. But after reading Watkins' remarks about the reactor siting decision, he said Watkins was "swiftness" about his agency's commitment to the project.

House panel moves to loosen school rules

BOISE — Upon the recommendation of a committee on academic excellence, Idaho adopted a number of rules in 1984 designed to tighten school attendance requirements, boost course loads and improve classroom performance. The House Education Committee voted Thursday to loosen the attendance requirement, with some committee members saying they wanted to go even further. The committee voted "do pass" approval of a resolution repealing a requirement that students must attend 90 percent of the class sessions to get credit in a subject. Other members said they also wanted to repeal the rule requiring a C average in certain core courses to get credit in them. Some committee members, who opposed the action, said they were concerned it was sending the wrong message to educators. "I'm concerned about the statement we will be making," said Rep. Dick Davis, R- Rexburg. "I'm concerned it will appear we are watering down academics." "We should be toughening up instead of going the other way," Davis said. The vote was 9-7 to send the full House a measure repealing the 90 percent rule. Members supporting the effort, sponsored by Rep. "I'm putting better than I've ever had. I'm more confident and comfortable than I've ever been."

"And I'm still learning to use this big putter. The more comfortable I become with it, the better it's going to be," he said.

# World's most popular sport still struggles to get spectators in U.S.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Americans can't seem to get enough of soccer — until they have to pay for it.

Millions play the game in the United States; but soccer has never scored with spectators in this country.

"The first American college football game was played in 1869," said Alan Rothenberg, president of the U.S. Soccer Federation. "That game was a soccer game. You might say that was the first of a series of missed opportunities by soccer to be promoted in this country. That is going to change."

America's role as host of the 1994 World Cup will stimulate that change, Rothenberg said.

"There's been an incredible surge on the participant side, now I guess it's our job, the federation and the World Cup, to turn that into success on the spectator side," said Rothenberg, who also serves as chairman of the World Cup organizing committee.

Rothenberg, speaking at the Sport Summit, an annual sports business meeting held this week, said he thought FIFA, soccer's governing body, had the best chance of convincing the United States to host the World Cup for the first time.

"The first was to present a successful tournament," he said. "The second was to promote a market in America for international players,

teams and countries, and the third was to elevate soccer as a spectator sport in this country and hopefully use the World Cup as a catalyst to create a successful outdoor professional league."

All previous attempts to make professional outdoor soccer a success in America have failed. The North American Soccer League briefly looked as if it would take off. But, as president of the Los Angeles Aztecs, Rothenberg would often gaze at 90,000 empty seats in the Rose Bowl.

"By the end of the 1970s, the sport appeared to be gaining popularity. It was the era of the Cosmos, with Pele, with Franz Beckenbauer and other great foreign stars coming into this country and playing before sellout crowds," Rothenberg said.

"Unfortunately, no base was being laid and in a few years, when those stars disappeared, so did interest in soccer as a spectator sport in this country."

He believes interest will rise again in 1994, saying the scope of the World Cup is staggering. He pointed out that while the NFL's Super Bowl draws some 100 million television viewers, soccer's World Cup is estimated to have 1.5 billion watched the 1990 World Cup final match.

And, Rothenberg said, the World Cup draws more foreign visitors than any other event or events, including the Olympics.

Financially speaking we're back to reality

NEW YORK — War's end means the battle lines shift to other zones of concern, to reconstructing Kuwait, to be sure, but even more significantly to the challenge of the U.S. economy.

"That latter battle isn't going as well as Americans have come to expect of the battles they fight. When war broke out the economy had begun slipping into recession. Now it is in the midst of a recession whose depth and duration cannot be determined, and the problems of that recession are accompanied by structural weaknesses.

Just a couple of these weaknesses are enough to reconfirm to the tough economic realities: "The Resolution Trust Co., created to clean up the savings and loan mess by selling and selling-in-finance S&Ls, is itself in a serious money bind and could run out of money to do its job if Congress doesn't fund it.

The Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp., which guarantees obligations of defined-benefit pension plans, such as those offered by large corporations, lost \$780 million in the past year, and has a negative worth of \$1.8 billion. These are exceptional and serious problems, but the routine statistics on economic performance depict an equally exceptional and serious situation. Despite rhetoric, the problem of federal budget deficits remains and even gets worse. Personal income and personal consumption are down. The number of unemployed is rising. Profits are poor and show little sign of rising.

Despite this, economic expectations have risen as if synchronized with military successes. "The number of economists who published forecasts, including those advising the White House, support the view that the recession will be short and shallow.

The stock market, viewed as a barometer of economic activity levels, rose three to nine months hence, has risen sharply since October. That barometer has not always been accurate; still, it remains a good indicator of expectations. While profits, on which stock prices are based, have declined, that is, price-earnings ratios have risen as if synchronized with military successes.

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Jump-start education, panel urges

NEW YORK (AP) — A panel of corporate chiefs called Thursday for a broad set of school reforms addressing special as well as academic concerns, and including more than \$10 billion in spending on early childhood programs.

The Committee for Economic Development, a non-profit group of 225 corporate leaders and educators, said in a report issued Tuesday that business community must take leading role in expanding the nation's reform agenda to include adequate prenatal care, nutrition and early childhood programs.

Reformers "have a tendency to speak of the problem as academic in nature — improving math and science achievement — and that's not what's wrong," said James J. Renier, chairman and chief executive officer of Bell & Howell, who led the panel that produced the report.

The 95-page report, "The Unfinished Agenda: A New Vision for 'Child' Development and Education," was released Tuesday at a ceremony in Washington.

Two previous CED studies, in 1985 and 1987, gained wide attention as strong signals that the business community was ready and willing to enter the fray of school reform.

"We felt it was necessary to give the reform movement 'another push,'" Sandra Kessler-Hamburg, CED's director of education studies and principal author of the report, said in an interview.

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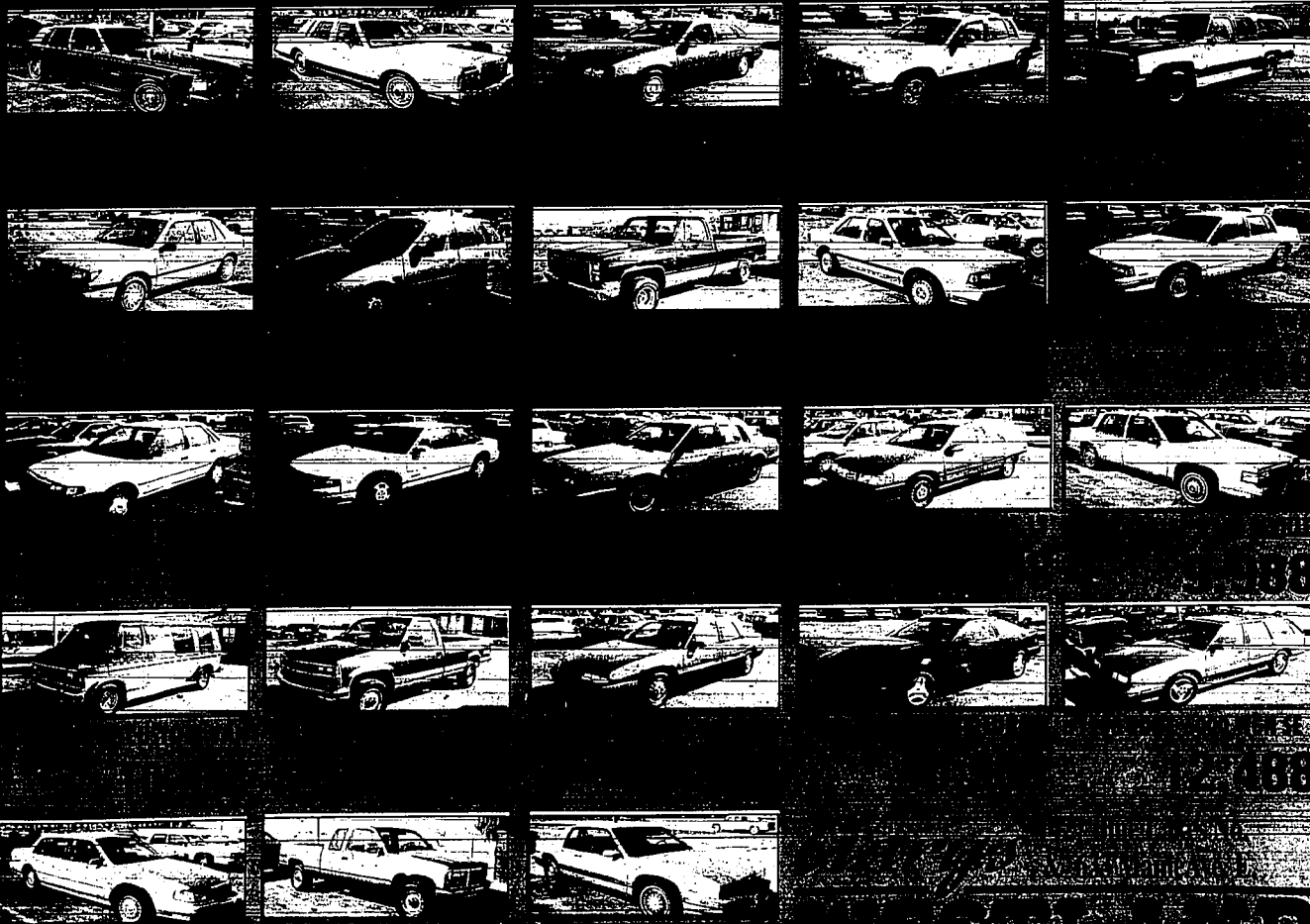

My play lands the slam whenever clubs are 3-3 or when the heart finesse wins," announced South. "That's about a 68 percent chance for success."

Look over the play to see if you can spot how South can improve his chances by a considerable margin. East's double of four diamonds told South where the diamonds and look as he didn't bother to take a finesse at trick one. Instead he won dummy's ace, cashed two high clubs and ruffed a club high in search of a 3-3 split. When this failed, he cashed the ace and king of trumps and took the heart finesse. This lost also, and the defenders' two red kings sent the slam one down.

How does South improve his chances? He was right to place the diamond king with East, but he was wrong to play dummy's diamond ace at trick one. Instead he should play low from dummy, allowing East to win the jack. South wins East's heart return with the ace and the top clubs and a club ruff follows. "They don't split as before, but there is one big difference. Dummy still has two entries to take advantage of the 4-2 club break.

The ace and king of trumps are cashed, another club ruff establishes dummy's fifth club, and the diamond ace serves as an entry, allowing South to discard his heart queen.

## Religious leaders decry 'anti-Christian' entertainment

**HOLLYWOOD** — Charging that there is "anti-Christian bigotry" in movies and television shows, a group of 300 individuals, including leaders from more than 50 religious denominations, have sent a "statement of concern" to the corporate chiefs of the major studios and networks.

"During the past several years, there has been an increasing number of television programs and movies containing anti-Christian bigotry. This situation must end," said Donald Wildmon, a United Methodist minister and head of the Tupelo, Miss.-based American Family Association, which sent out the letter.

Wildmon said that the group is not threatening a boycott at the moment. "If the letter falls on deaf ears, that would be most unfortunate," he said. "It would mean we would have to rethink our strategy."

Only one of the studios or television networks could confirm that it had received the letter as of Wednesday. A Paramount Pictures spokesman said that the studio would have no immediate comment.

The statement of concern cited "Ghost" movies as Paramount Pictures' "biggest

Universal Pictures' "Problem Child" and 20th Century Fox's "Nuns on the Run" as containing "anti-Christian bigotry."

Among TV shows cited are specific episodes of ABC's "MacGyver," NBC's "Matlock" and "Cheers" and CBS's "Knots Landing."

In the example of "Ghost," the letter says that the character of the psychic medium Oda Mae, played by Oscar nominee Whoopi Goldberg, "deceives viewers into

thinking there is some other form of salvation than Jesus Christ."

"Furthermore, it mocks Christianity. She is a fortune teller, a medium, and a known con artist," the letter said.

In an telephone interview with his Tupelo office, Wildmon reacted to a question about how seriously one should take Goldberg's character. He said that he and the other letter signers "do have a sense of humor, but we don't think that humor should be an argument on the specifics of 'Ghost,' which he said he had not seen.

Wildmon said that the issue is not limited to "Ghost" or any of the other shows or movies cited. "Overall, there is a complete lack of balance. That's what we're complaining about."

## Utah writer visits Ketchum for speech, book signing

**KETCHUM** — Invoking touchstones of "landscape, family and community," Utah writer Terry Tompsett Williams will speak "On Being Native" at 7:30 tonight in the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities Gallery.

Admission to Williams' talk will be \$5 for the general public, \$3 for students or \$4 for Sun Valley Center members. The gallery is located in the Walnut Avenue Mall.

In addition, Williams will appear for a book signing from 4 to 5 p.m. today at Chapter One Bookstore, 90 N. Main St.

Asked to explain her topic in a telephone interview this week, Williams said she will explore the question of "how does one stand one's ground in the places one loves?"

"It's about digging in, finding roots and really becoming biologically literate to where we live," she added. "Part of being native is not only taking from our communities but giving."

"I think we are all so blessed to live in the American West," she added. "We really need to think about our roles as responsible citizens."

Williams is the author of "Pieces of Myself: Shell: A Journey to Navajoland," a 1984 book based on her experiences as a teacher among the Navajo. Other books include 1989's "Coyote's Canyon," a collaboration

At 35, she is the youngest writer represented in "The Norton Book of Nature Writing," an anthology published last year.

Williams' next book, which she's been working on seven years, is "Refuge." It will be published by Pantheon this fall.

Williams' writing is deeply personal, strongly evoking her Southwestern home and her Mormon culture.

One essay — "The Clan of One-Breasted Women" — dealt with her concerns that it was years of nuclear testing in Nevada and Utah that brought about breast cancer in the women of her family.

Her mother, her grandmother and six aunts have all had mastectomies. Williams herself has had two biopsies for breast cancer and a small tumor between her breasts diagnosed as "borderline malignancy."

Williams told how, meeting her father for dinner after her mother's death from cancer, she mentioned to him a recurring vision — a flash of light in the middle of the desert.

"You did see it," her father said.

The flash was a mushroom radiation cloud Williams viewed while sitting on her pregnant mother's lap in 1957. The family had been driving north and pulled over as ash fell on their car.

"It was at this moment I realized the world I had been living under," Williams wrote. "Children growing up in the American Southwest, drinking contaminated milk from contaminated cows, even the contaminated breasts of their mothers, my mother ... members years later of the Clan of One-Breasted Women."

"I was taught as a young girl not to make waves. Don't rock the boat," she wrote. "Just let it go, my mother would say. 'You know how you feel. That's what counts.'"

"For many years, I did just that," she added. "Listened, observed and quietly formed my own opinions within a culture that rarely asked questions because they had all the answers. But one by one, I watched the women in my family die common, heroic deaths — the price of obedience became too high."

Williams said this essay — which she read on National Public Radio last year — has created some controversy.

"I think it has upset some people, including some of my family," she said. "But I think you have to question. I love my culture, but I also love the truth."

Williams has twice been arrested for practicing civil disobedience by trespassing on the federal government's Nevada Test Site, acts she has described as gestures not only for peace but on behalf of her family.

In addition to her writing, Williams is naturalist-in-residence at the Utah Museum of Natural History, a director of the Northern Lights Institute and a member of The Wilderness Society's Governing Council.

Williams holds a bachelor's degree in English and biology and a master's in environmental education, both from the University of Utah. She lives in Salt Lake City with her husband of 16 years, Brooke.

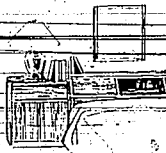

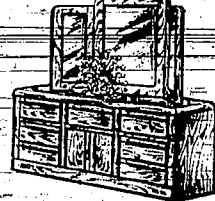

## Herrett Art Gallery will feature 'Photographic Visions' of Idaho

TWIN FALLS — "Photographic Visions: Contemporary Photography in Idaho" opens Tuesday at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery on the College of Southern Idaho campus. The public is welcome to attend an opening reception set for 7 p.m. Tuesday at the museum. The show will continue through April 11. The Centennial show — a juried exhibition that was open to all state residents — started late in 1989 at the Boise Art Museum and has since been traveling around the state. It was on view last spring at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, from Twin Falls, its ninth stop, it will travel on to several other sites before finishing this December in Idaho Falls.

## Nominated films mine Oscar gold in box-office receipts

With the bestowing of the Academy Awards less than a month away, nominated movies are already mining Oscar gold. "GoodFellas" and "The Godfather, Part III" are no longer sleeping with the fishes; "Ghost" continues to haunt a handful of movie houses; "Awakenings" remains alert among the top dozen moneymakers; and "Dances With Wolves" is leader of the Oscar-nominated pack, still pulling in more than \$4 million per weekend.

For two of the five — "Ghost" and "GoodFellas" — the nominations insure theatrical runs even though they seemed to be on their last legs before nabbing major nominations two weeks ago. For the other three — "Godfather III," "Awakenings" and "Dances With Wolves" — the nominations will add to their total grosses to varying degrees. It's an established fact that along with prestige, Oscar's surge in ticket sales for the Oscar-nominated movies. In fact, Hollywood banks on it, preparing special ads weeks before the nominations are announced and planning redistribution schedules to pump up grosses.

Box-office bottom lines can get a boost in big ways, and this year is no different — all five movies were back last week among the top 20 highest-grossing movies on weekly Variety's chart. And a Best Picture win on Oscar night (March 25) can mean as much as an extra \$7 million in box-office revenue — "Chariots of Fire" and "Driving Miss Daisy" to name just two, got major mileage from Oscar wins.

"Ghost" and "GoodFellas" — the two that have been in release the longest, since last summer and early fall, respectively — needed the Academy recognition just to remain in active distribution. "GoodFellas" got more out of than "Ghost," which after more than five months in theaters has already made \$214 million in domestic (United States and Canada) box-office receipts.

The five Oscar nominations "Ghost" received will keep it in theaters through March 21, which is when Paramount, its distributor, releases it on video (that's the weekend before Monday's Oscar telecast). "GoodFellas," which opened in September, had started winding down at the \$40 million mark before the nominations, having dropped to 39th on weekly Variety's list. Yet the week after winning six nominations, Martin Scorsese's mob epic jumped to 17th place and Warner Bros., the movie's distributor, dramatically increased its theater count.

The steep box-office plummet of "The Godfather, Part III" — it made less than \$1 million a weekend for the first time during the weekend before the nominations were announced — has at least been slowed by its seven nominations. Coppola's crowning gangland opus was going to be rubbed out at \$65 million; now, having topped \$1 million the week after the nominations, it has a chance of closing in on a first domestic box-office tally of \$75 million — though that's still not enough to put it in the black. "Awakenings" — at \$42 million — and "Dances With Wolves" — with

\$117 million — were going strong even before their Oscar nods. "Dances," however, which nabbed 12 nominations (most for any film), benefited at the box office from three nominations.

Kevin Costner's epic was up a whopping 36 percent in ticket sales the week after the nominations were announced. "Awakenings," on the other hand, managed only to remain in the top 10 and didn't show a percentage increase.

"Dances With Wolves" and "Awakenings" are also considered front-runners to take home the Best Picture statuette. But even if neither wins, "Dances" still has a good chance at the \$150 million mark, and "Awakenings" could notch \$50 million.

The studios have also increased the runs of some of their actor-nominated films and have released others to cash in on Oscar publicity.

Jeremy Irons is nominated for "Reversal of Fortune," and the movie continues its run. Its weekly take was up more than 100 percent in the weeks following nominations.

Richard Harris is up for "The Field," which saw an 11 percent up-bid.

Because of Gerard Depardieu's nomination for Best Actor, "Cyrano de Bergerac," also a nominee for Best Foreign Language Film, doubled its box-office tally. Columbia has released "Postcards from the Edge" and "Misery" on a double bill, enabling viewers to catch two nominated Best Actresses — Meryl Streep and Kathy Bates — for the price of one.

# January was biggest month ever for gold music video certification

WASHINGTON (AP) — More music videos were certified as gold in January than in any month since video certifications began in 1985, according to the Recording Industry Association of America, which does the certifying.

Seventeen music videos were certified gold, seven were certified platinum and 15 multi-platinum in January 1990, no music videos were certified gold. Two were certified platinum and one multi-platinum.

A single or album must sell 500,000 copies to become gold, 1 million to become platinum and 2 million to turn into multi-platinum. Music video must sell 25,000 for gold, 50,000 for platinum and 100,000 for multi-platinum.

# Disney sanitizes 'Shipwrecked' to create a pleasant fantasy

The last century's books and movies about pirates all owe a debt to Robert Louis Stevenson, and "Shipwrecked" pays up early.

Murderous Merrick sails the South Seas in the guise of an honest sailor, trying to recover the treasure he left on a deserted isle. He's opposed by a young girl who, trying to improve his impoverished family's lot, signs on as a ship boy and accidentally discovers Merrick's murderous plans.

From that point, however, this film adaptation of the novel "Haakon Haakonsen" sails off on its own course: The young hero (Silan Smestad) teams up with a plucky British orphan (Louise Halgh) who stows away en route to Calcutta. When a storm drives their ship against the rocks off the treasure island, they swim ashore, and encounter everything from amiable natives to a solitary gorilla.

Fajck-Ytter, but I suspect Walt Disney Pictures has sanitized it. The naive tribe (fully clothed, of course) immediately befriends... Mary Hakon doesn't get dirty or bloody or injured, scrambling about barefoot on his island.

The pirates never say a naughty word, and not a single bullet finds its mark. Even the bad guys die peacefully under a cannon blast, but helplessly in shallow water. Still, people who didn't grow up on the whiskey-laced writing of Stevenson should find this warm milk comforting.

Director Nils-Gaup debuted with "Pathfinder," a gripping film about Lapp nomads threatened by bandits. Here he works with bigger sets, a bigger cast and an English language script, and he handles things well. The big storm, stay but scary, is a thrilling mini-epic.

Kids will be able to identify with plucky Hakon (here, spelled "Hakon"), despite Smestad's movie-star cuteness, he's a likable presence, and Mary's no-nonsense affection for him helps toughen up the team. Gabriel Byrne, the only minor "name" in the cast - he was the lead in "Winter's Crossing" - is a small part as Merrick but manages to be quietly menacing.

The lovely scenery, fine supporting cast, and adventures are high points. Even the band guys (Henry V) combine to create a pleasant escapist fantasy. I do wish, however, that someone would explain to me how one gorilla managed to get wounded thousands of miles from his kind.

Encased in heavy makeup, he plays a toting New Jersey justice of the peace who sends miscreants to their doom. John Candy also appears in a double role, as well as Chevy Chase and Demi Moore. Any actor who gave the kind of performance that Aykroyd gave in "Driving Miss Daisy" should not be so cavalier with his gifts.

**SLEEPING WITH THE ENEMY (R)** A solid book has been inflated by overproduction and underwriting into thin-melodrama-to-make-a-vehicle. For Julia Roberts, playing an abused wife who tries to begin her life again, Patrick Bergin-unceremoniously as Sir Richard Burton in "Mountains of the Moon," is even more so here as her menacing husband. It's another fairy tale for Roberts; wife abuse being seen here as no more grueling than Robert's job as a Hollywood Boulevard hooker in "Pretty Woman," and she attacks this role with the same bland compliance and dazzling superficial warmth.

GOODING — Cowboy humorist Baxter Black gave up his veterinary practice in Grand View 11 years ago to travel around the United States and write his poetry-and-anecdote-filled stories.

With his handlebar mustache and down-home dialect, the lanky ex-veterinarian has become a favorite speaker at banquets, fairs and other events.

"I don't think he likes to call them shows," secretary Sheryl Suhr said this week from Black's office in Colorado. "And they're not all banquets. Programs is a word he's used. That doesn't sound quite as stuffy as speaking engagements."

Black is the author of nine books

ing from the fair office at 934-4529 and also from Don Gill, Beverly Clark and Duane Cuthbert. Tickets are available in Wendell room at 8 p.m. Saturday. Tickets cost \$10 per person.

Proceeds will go into a fund for the new grandstand at the Gooding County Fairgrounds.

Lucy Osborne, fair manager, said tickets are available in quantities that together have sold more than 120,000 copies. His four cassettes of poetry and stories have sold more

than 30,000 copies. Black's latest book, "Cowboy Standard Time," came out

in October and already is in its second printing after selling more than 15,000 copies.

"Not bad for a self-published work," Suhr said. The new book's poems include "Banker's Nightmare," "Shepherd's Lament," "Cow Chip Filled," "Serious Roping," "Cowboy's Hat" and "The Chauvinist."

Suhr, who proofread the book, said she could not pick her favorite poem from it.

"The 'K.A.A.B.' is a riot," she said. That's short for "The Vegetarian's Nightmare" and "The Oyster."

"The Range Fire" is a wonderful one," she continued. "It's probably

## 'Home Alone' becomes all-time popular comedy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "The Silence of the Lambs" outsold the competition at movie theaters for a second week and "Home Alone" became the most popular comedy in box office history, according to recently released figures.

"The Silence of the Lambs," which stars Jodie Foster and Anthony Hopkins, made \$11.9 million over the weekend, according to figures from Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc.

"Home Alone" finished fourth but made enough — \$4.8 million — to pass "Beverly Hills Cop" on the all-time box-office comedy chart.

It is the seventh-highest grossing film with receipts of \$236.4 million and next would top sixth-place "Batman," which made \$251.2 million.

"Sleeping With the Enemy," starring Julia Roberts, finished second at \$9.2 million. "King Ralph," starring John Goodman, was third at \$8.3 million. Kevin Costner's "Dances With Wolves" was fifth at \$4.2 million. "Scenes From a Marriage," a comedy pairing Bette Midler and Woody Allen, was sixth at \$3.8 million.

"He Said, She Said," starring Kevin Bacon and Elizabeth Perkins, was seventh in its debut weekend at \$2.9 million. Eighth was Steve Martin's comedy, "L.A. Story," at \$2.8 million.

# 'Blossom' family is not 'The Simpsons,' but it's more dysfunctional than 'Cosby'

When Blossom blossomed into womanhood, her dad called in her brothers and announced they would celebrate the big event by going out for Chinese food.

Great, said one of Blossom's brothers. "Empathy is the key to any good relationship." Yeah, said Blossom. "So is privacy."

"Blossom," which airs Monday nights on NBC, stars Mayim Bialik in the role of a young teen being raised by a less-than-perfect musician-father (Ted Wass) and co-existing with two brothers, one of whom is a recovering substance abuser. It isn't "The Simpsons," but "this family is slightly more dysfunctional than the Cosby clan or the insufferably flawless Seavers of "Growing Pains." Bialik's admittedly biased assessment of the show probably isn't that far from the truth: "A lot of stuff on TV is really not stuff that I can relate to. I would watch 'Blossom' if I wasn't in it. I think it's appealing to a lot of people."

Prior to "Blossom," Bialik was best known as the young C.C. Bloom character (played as an adult by Bette Midler) in the 1988 film "Beaches." Close your eyes and listen closely, and you may recognize another of Bialik's characters. A talented mimic, she has been used as the voice of Peppermint Patty in the "Peanuts" specials.

Playing her older brothers are Michael Stuyakov as the one-time substance-abusing brother Anthony and Joey Lawrence as the somewhat dim Joey. The show also uses

prominent guest stars in fantasy sequences — Rhea Perlman as Blossom's fairy godmother, Little Richard as a preacher and Phyllicia Rashad in her "Cosby" character as Blossom's fantasized version of the comforting, all-knowing mother who handles perfectly her daughter's concerns.

At 19, Bialik appears self-confident, intelligent, and more thoughtful than some people twice her age. Her parents, independent producers who specialized in anti-war films during the '60s, taught her to be socially aware, and it shows. One more than one occasion, Bialik has challenged the show's writers and kept them on-guard against stereotypes.

"In one of our episodes, they had my best friend and myself shaving our legs," she says. "It was changed to dancing. I just felt for a portrayal

of a girl in the '90s, you don't necessarily have to do things like shaving legs, which is basically tradition."

Another script had flat-chested jokes, implying that Blossom couldn't get a date to a school dance because of her physique. It was changed after Bialik protested.

"It annoyed me," Bialik explains. "I think it's important for girls, and especially for guys, to see that these aren't necessarily normal things that have to carry on."

If this keep up, producers Paul Junger-Witt and Tony Thomas ("Golden Girls," "Empty Nest") might have another show that could blossom into something worthwhile.

# 'Santa Barbara' back on write track

The Dobsons, Bridget and Jerome, are back on "Santa Barbara" as of Friday, March 1, when their fresh material began to appear on the air.

That's right, the welcome mat is out once again for the show's creators. All is forgiven, Bridget and Jerome. Don't be angry. What's a lawsuit, or a firing in the big bucks entertainment world?

The Dobson-NBC story sounds like a soap writer's fantasy. This time the juicy action is behind the camera rather than on the set.

Bridget Dobson laughs, saying, "We should have turned the camera the other way," as she and husband Jerry look back on their "Santa Barbara NBC affair."

First, the backup story: In the early '80s, the Dobsons were asked by NBC to create a new soap after 27 years of writing for "General Hospital," "The Guiding Light" and "As the World Turns."

Raising a family in lovely Santa Barbara, Calif., the Dobsons decided to base the new soap on the city, the rich, their spoiled offspring, the eccentrics, and the old line Mexican population, the work base.

"Santa Barbara" made its debut on July 30, 1984. Pleased by the reception, the network later groused about the "always-in-the-red budgets." Seeking help, the creators, through their lawyers, turned to New World Productions for business control.

Things didn't pan out. Three-and-a-half years into the show, NBC and New World ousted the Dobsons. Lawsuits followed. Guess who won both cases?

The talent—the Dobsons.

Following the old adage of "if you can't beat 'em, join 'em," NBC and New World swallowed their pride and asked the Dobsons back as "creative production executives" to work with executive producer John Conboy, who was hired eight months earlier to run a tight ship.

With Conboy running the business end, and the Dobsons supplying the ideas, NBC felt better. Ratings might go back up.

Asked about conflicts between Conboy and the Dobsons, Bridget was honest. "We have creative differences, but the point is to get on

one wave length and make a communal effort."

Neither Bridget nor Jerry had a high opinion of the soap during their absence. Awards were won, but Jerry didn't care for the jokes or the violence, accusing the soap of joining the mob.

"We're not interested in jokes," says Jerry. "The best humor comes out of character. We've learned that the more complicated a character is, the more unique. We will offer many-layered people. That's risk-taking, but we started out that way. We're going back to what we know best."

### CHANNEL CHATTER:

Soap fans are seldom interested in ratings. They are devoted to the shows they like and watch them whether the show is number one or at the bottom of the list. However, the networks scrutinize the ratings carefully, and those that hover at the

bottom of the list are always in jeopardy.

"The Young and the Restless" has enjoyed the top spot in the daytime ratings for a record 112 consecutive weeks. The CBS soap is doing something right. However, the plotting doesn't seem to be terribly innovative or for that matter, very different from the other soaps. As for the cast, there is the usual mixture of handsome men, pretty women and some character actors.

So, what is it that makes a soap number one for so long? The truth of the matter is, no one can answer that question. It's an unknown factor. It's always up to the audience to make a soap a hot commodity or a cold entry hovering at the bottom of the ratings heap.

# CBS big ratings winner once again with powerhouse of special shows

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS has won its second consecutive prime-time weekly ratings battle, this time with a powerful lineup of specials that included the Grammy awards and a Mary Tyler Moore anniversary show.

Figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed CBS winning last week with a 15.1 average. NBC was second with 14.1 and ABC was last with 11.9. Each point represents 931,000 homes.

Back-to-back wins for CBS also helped push the usually last-place network into first for the February sweeps period. Ratings for the month-long sweeps period are used by local stations to set ad rates.

With 30 percent of its schedule devoted to specials last week, CBS had six of the top 15 shows.

The first part of "And the Sea Will Tell," a true-life mini-series based on a book by Vincent Bugliosi, the former Los Angeles deputy district attorney who prosecuted the Manson family and also wrote "Helter Skelter," ranked third for the week.

NBC had the top two shows on the schedule, leading with the long-standing favorite "Cheers." In second place was part two of NBC's

own true-life mini-series, "Loves, Lies and Murder."

CBS' Sunday newsmagazine "60 Minutes" was fourth, followed by Wednesday night's 3½-hour broadcast of the Grammy Awards from New York's Radio City Music Hall.

The make-believe TV newsroom of CBS' "Murphy Brown" ranked seventh. The 20th anniversary of

Now in its fourth season, the series will leave its Tuesday slot after its March 5 broadcast and return with six new episodes on April 23, the network said

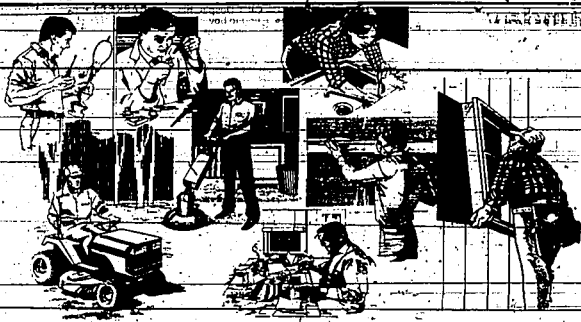
