Ban on jailing mentally ill step closer

BOISE— Legislation ending Idaho's distinction as one of just two states that still jail mentally ill people who have committed no crime has been overwhelmingly approved by the state Senate.

If it becomes law, Twin Falls is ready. Twin Falls County has a contract with Canyon View Hospital to accept people picked up by police who are a danger to themselves or others.

"We're in good shape," said Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter. "The courts are committed, Canyon View is

committed, law enforcement is committed."

Canyon View Hospital, which is also negotiating a contract with Blaine County, anticipates hearing from more counties around the Magic Valley if the legislation passes, said administrator Jeff Hauser.

"It could be good for business, but I tell you, we'd never want to make our living off these folks," Hauser said. They don't

belong in jail, but most are chronically ill and a short-term stay only helps temporarily, he said.

The hospital wants to help counties, but "it wouldn't hurt our feelings if we didn't see too many of these folks," Hauser said.

The measure was sent to the House on a 4-1 vote. Poastello Democratic Sen. Patricia McDermott, sponsor of the bill, said Arkansas is the only other state that uses jails as holding tanks for the mentally ill until rooms open in a state facility.

Republican Stan Hawkins of Ucon was the lone opponent, claiming the prohibition would create severe financial hardship for counties, particularly small ones with little or no access to hospital care for the

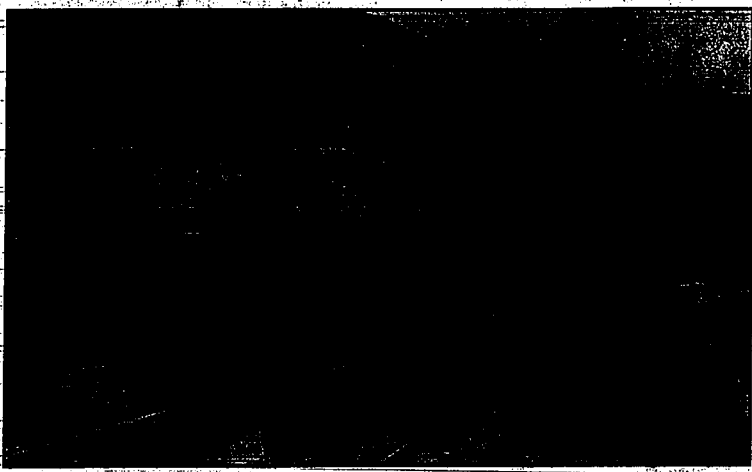
mentally ill.

Other senators, while voting for the bill, said it might result in people who truly pose a danger to themselves or others being allowed to remain free because counties have no alternative to jailing them until space opens up at one of the two state hospitals.

Jerome County Prosecutor John Horgan said his county doesn't have much of a problem with mentally ill people needing hospitalization and they go to Canyon View Hospital when the situation arises. But the difficulty lies with the extremely violent people whom Canyon View doesn't accept and the county has nowhere to

Former POWs recount beatings, fear during captivity in hands of Saddam

WASHINGTON — Returned prisoners of war said Thursday they were coerced — at least one case with electric jolts to the head — into making wide-spread antiwar messages for the Iraqis while in captivity in Baghdad.

"They ... told me what questions they were going to ask and then they told me what my answers were going to be," said Lt. Jeffrey N. Zaun, 28, of Cherry Hill, N.J. Zaun, in a news conference at Bethesda

Naval Medical Center, did not say what means of coercion were used.

Air Force Maj. Jeffrey Tice, 35, of Sellersville, Pa., said at a separate news conference at Andrews Air Force Base, Md., that the Iraqis wrapped his ears and chin with electrical wires and shocked him. It was the first time the POWs had spoken publicly about the details of their captivity since their return to the United States on Sunday.

Lt. Lawrence R. Slade, 26, of Virginia Beach, Va., said he worried about the

reaction in the United States to his videotaped statement, but felt that the tape at least would show he was alive.

"In any case, I didn't have a choice," he added.

Marine Lt. Col. Clifford M. Acree, 39, of Seattle, said the POWs' statements were made under duress, but he declined to go into detail, saying that could endanger service members still missing in action in Iraq.

Bush balks at new talks with PLO on peace

TROIS-ILETS, Martinique — President Bush said Thursday he has no intention of renewing talks with the Palestine Liberation Organization in the search for a Middle East peace.

He said PLO leader Yasser Arafat "bet on the wrong horse" in backing Iraq in the Persian Gulf crisis.

At a news conference with French President Francois Mitterrand, Bush also said a Palestinian state "is not the answer"

to the Arab-Israeli dispute that underlies many Middle East problems. But he said diplomacy following the Persian Gulf War is "going to have to address ... the homeland question."

Mitterrand said, "I have used the word state," and added that it was dangerous to deny a people "any form of identity." But the two leaders took pains to show at least general agreement on major Middle East questions.

Yet, Mitterrand said French forces have completed their mission in the Gulf War,

while Bush said U.S. troops have a role to play, including in Iraq. "Clearly those troops are not going to be — all of them — out of there until there's a cease-fire, a formalized cease-fire," Bush said.

On a separate subject, Bush was asked about the fate of the Western hostages held in Lebanon and said it was "clearly in the interests of those countries that have any influence" to see that they are freed.

Terry Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press, is near the end of his sixth year as a captive.

Baker visit at key moment in U.S.-Soviet relations

MOSCOW — Soviet leaders will seek to strengthen a fragile superpower relationship in their talks with U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III, a Soviet analyst said Thursday.

While generally praising the cooperation built by the United States and the Soviet Union during the Persian Gulf War, Soviet foreign policy experts believe superpower ties are not as strong as they were six months ago.

President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, in a speech last month in Minsk, described the relationship as "very fragile," and warned that responsible actions were needed to avoid destroying what had been achieved.

"Considerable political and diplomatic efforts will be needed to strengthen the present level of Soviet-American relations," wrote Pavel Vasiluyev, a Tass news agency commentator, of the three-day Baker visit that began Thursday.

After Iraq invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2, Washington and Moscow displayed an unprecedented level of cooperation in condemning Saddam Hussein's actions.

But by the time U.S.-led forces began the ground war against Iraq, the Kremlin's support had cooled as its fears rose of escalation of the conflict.

Viktor Kremenyuk, deputy director of the Institute for U.S. and Canada Studies, said the first postwar meeting between Baker and Gorbachev "is high time to do something ... about overcoming the existing fragility of the relationship

and working for the next summit."

A superpower summit scheduled for February was postponed because of the war and the failure to conclude the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty, or START, which would cut about 30 percent of the deadliest nuclear weapons in U.S. and Soviet arsenals.

Kremenyuk said U.S.-Soviet relations were hurt because of Washington's unhappiness about the Kremlin's reluctance to get involved more deeply in the war, and because of Gorbachev's problems in the Baltics and the economy.

U.S. pilot's capture on tape: 'They're coming for me, dudes'

Shot down in the Kuwaiti desert, Air Force Lt. Col. Jeffrey Fox tried to elude Iraqi troops by joggling back to Saudi Arabia in spite of an injured knee. Overhead, fellow pilots desperately searched for him while the enemy closed in.

"May Day! May Day! I'm on the ground!" Fox squawked on his radio. "I've ejected! Now heading south!"

"There's a guy coming at me with a gun! I'm not holding out any hope here," he said.

These dramatic statements, recorded on tape, have become a source of wonder for Fox's family since he was released as a prisoner of war.

"It kind of gives you goose bumps," said his sister, Nancy Howard. "You can just picture it. You're running in the desert and somebody's coming after you."

Fox, 40, a native of Swansan, Mass., was captured Feb. 19 when his A-10 Warthog tank-killer jet was shot down. He was among the prisoners of war released after allied troops forced Iraq from Kuwait, and arrived last weekend at Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland, where he is being treated for his knee injury.

Despite his injury, Fox, a marathon runner, tried to jog to the Saudi Arabian border about 10 miles away after he ejected from his plane.

"They're coming for me, dudes," Fox said in the recording.

"I'm heading south."

The pilot of a rescue plane asked Fox if he knew his coordinates, and Fox responded: "No, I sure don't, man. I sure don't."

"Here come some guys to pick me up," Fox said.

"Nail 5-3 (Fox's code name). ...Talk to us."

"They're coming for me, dudes."

"I'm coming your way," the rescuer said.

"I'm across the handball from you."

"There's a guy coming at me with a gun. I only see one. I don't see anyone else."

"Copy that. I'm coming your way. If you see an A-10 overhead, look for me."

"He's yelling. Telling me to get my hands up."

Moments later, Fox said: "You got my crush site yet?"

"I don't see it. I'm coming to you. Do you see an A-10 overhead?"

"No I do not. This guy's less than 100 yards away."

"OK. I'm trying to get through to you. I don't know where you are exactly."

"OK. I'm not holding out any hope here."

"Nail 5-5's got a tally on your smoke site. Say (your location) from the south."

"In a hundred meters to the south."

"Copy that. I'm inbound."

As the rescue plane tried to home in on Fox's location, he said: "Too late guys. He's here."

Kuwaiti emir returns to war-torn country

KUWAIT CITY (AP) — Kuwait's ruler flew home Thursday after seven months in exile and kissed the ground of his once-prosperous nation, wrecked by Iraq in his absence.

It was a relatively low-key homecoming for the emir, Sheikh Jaber al-Ahmed al-Sabah, with a minimum of ceremony and only a small show of public adulation. He has been criticized by some Kuwaitis for waiting so long to return.

The 64-year-old monarch, one of the world's wealthiest and oil-married men, arrived from Saudi Arabia on a Kuwait Airways jet named Bubiyan. It was named after the Saudi island that Iraqi President Saddam Hussein demanded before his Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

As Sheikh Jaber emerged from the blue-and-white jet, he stood on the top of the stairs with his hands over his eyes. Some observers thought they saw tears.

When he stepped onto Kuwaiti soil, the emir knelt and kissed the ground. The black braided band holding his white headdress, called a keffiyeh, flopped onto the tarmac.

"This is the completion. This is the final stage," said Minister of Planning Sulaiman Mutawa, referring to the United Nations' resolution calling for the restoration of Kuwait's legitimate government.

Cabinet members, diplomats and friends applauded when the emir appeared, and mobbed him as he walked toward a VIP tent, set up in front of an airport building burned by the Iraqis.

In the distance, black smoke rose in the sky from several of the more than 500 oil wells touched by Iraq.

Elsewhere Thursday, in Persian Gulf War-related developments:

- Iraq said reports of continuing fighting between loyalist troops and rebels in Baghdad were "fabricated, baseless and completely unfounded," but opposition spokesmen reported continued unrest throughout the country.
- Kurdish rebels claimed Iraqi troops rounded up civilians in the northern oil city of Kirkuk and massacred them with helicopter gunships.
- In Damascus, Syria, Secretary of State James A. Baker III wound up a five-nation Middle East trip, and said Syria and other key Arab countries were serious about pursuing peace with Israel.

They were the grunts, the infantrymen who fought the war.

They were the Army support troops — a supply sergeant, a warehousing specialist, even an air-conditioning technician.

But they kept the Army supplied and fed, and like the grunts and tankers of the XVIII Airborne Corps they served, have been here since August, when the U.S. military buildup began.

They were more than 100 miles inside Iraq when the three-day ground war with Iraq ended Feb. 28. On Thursday, 600 of them were at the Dhahran military air base, finally going home to Fort Bragg, N.C.

Sgt. Wyatt Wilson, 33, grinned when asked what he'd do when he gets home. "I'm going to have a cold beer — and some barbecue ribs," he said.

The soldiers are among the second wave of returning U.S. forces, following the 17,000 who left here last week as part of the gradual scaling down of a U.S. combat force of 540,000 servicemen and women.

The Gulf War force was as large as that which fought the Vietnam War, but only a few of those leaving Thursday were veterans of that long, tragic war. One was an Army chaplain who'd been a grunt in Vietnam in 1966.

Maj. Alfred Terrell, 42, a father of three from Hampton, Va., was wounded twice, while serving with the First Air Cavalry Division in Vietnam.

A short, compact man, he was a "hummer" who cleared Viet Cong bunkers and tunnels. He didn't come home to cheers, parades, and yellow ribbons tied around trees, as many of those troops will.

U.S. support troops coming home

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia (AP) — They were the grunts, the infantrymen who fought the war.

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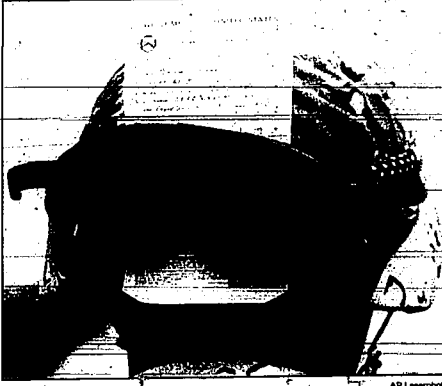
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U.S. Army Sgt. Gerard Jackson secures his customs declaration while waiting for a plane home from Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

Back then, he only saw members of his family when he was flown home with his second Purple Heart for wounds suffered in combat. He'd been shot in the ankle and had grenade fragments in his side.

Back then, anti-war protests were growing in the U.S. and dividing the country, and "there was no welcoming party," he said bitterly.

"Other than my family, the only people who said 'Welcome home' were at the Veterans Administration hospital," said Terrell.

He became a Baptist minister after the war and re-entered the Army as a chaplain in 1977.

It's a different story for veterans of the Persian Gulf War for several reasons, he said, including that the war was short, casualties were relatively few and "we come home victoriously. We won, without a doubt."

"Now, we're calling home to a lot of happy people because their loved ones are coming back home safely. So we're returning to a different America."

Sgt. Keith Flynn, 25, of Harrisburg, Pa., was an air-conditioning specialist in the war. "It sounds odd,

but was necessary in the early days of the U.S. buildup, when temperatures reached 130 degrees and he helped rig air-conditioned tents to give the newly arrived troops some respite.

When winter cold arrived in the desert and the ground war began in February, he still worked on air conditioners, Flynn said, but this time the computers used in artillery fire control centers.

Sgt. Phil Schafer, 24, of Wilmington, N.C., helped the departing C-130s toss their duffel bags into a pair of five-ton trucks. A former Army infantryman, he joined an Army reserve unit after his first hitch ended.

He was a college student when his transportation company was called up. It arrived here Jan. 15, two days before the start of the allies' aerial campaign, and may not leave until June, he said.

But he has no gripes. "Knowing that these guys came here in August and knowing that they were up there (in Iraq), it makes me feel good they got to go now. Because I know they deserve to go home first," Schafer said.

Spec. Cindy Schafer, 22, a warehousing specialist who served in Iraq, loudly exhaled in relief when someone helped her unshoulder a huge rucksack and threw it in the truck with her duffel bag.

She was going back to Fort Bragg to await the return in two weeks of her husband, John, who also is an Army reserve specialist and still is with U.S. forces in Iraq.

The two, who met and married at Fort Bragg, flew here together shortly after Aug. 12, the date of their first wedding anniversary. Their plans when he returns? She smiled.

"We'll start a family," she said.

Ambassador to break silence

WASHINGTON (AP) — After a lengthy silence, Ambassador April Glaspie is expected to rebut allegations that she unwittingly signaled Saddam Hussein last summer that the United States would not contest an Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

U.S. officials said Glaspie views an Iraqi transcript of her July 25 conversation with Saddam as "selective and incomplete." According to the transcript, Glaspie, who was then ambassador to Iraq, told Saddam that the United States had "no opinion on inter-Arab disputes, such as your border disagreement with Kuwait."

A week after she spoke to Saddam, Glaspie flew to London, not believing that Saddam would do what he did the next day: invade

Kuwait. Shortly thereafter, the Iraqis released their account of Saddam's conversation with Glaspie.

The U.S. officials, asking not to be identified, said Glaspie plans to break her silence in the coming days. They said she will disclose that she warned Saddam on July 25 that the United States strongly opposed the use of force as a means of resolving conflicts.

It is not known what forum she will use to give her side of the story.

Glaspie, 48, has not spoken publicly about the events leading up to the invasion of Kuwait. Some Democrats have suggested that a firmer stand by Glaspie in her conversation with Saddam might have averted a full-blown crisis in the Persian Gulf.

Public remains cautious about wars

LOS ANGELES — Support for President Bush broadened with the success of the Persian Gulf War, but most Americans feel the United States should be cautious about using force, a Los Angeles Times poll found.

Bush's approval rating was at 84 percent, with all demographic groups including blacks, Hispanics, women and low-income citizens expressing high regard for his performance during the war, according to the poll published Thursday.

The poll surveyed 1,518 adults nationwide from March 9-11. It has a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

Most said they agreed with Bush's statement that the war could help force "a new world order."

As a result of the war, 89 percent said they thought "peaceful nations" would work to stop "aggressive nations."

But only 15 percent said the United States "should make active use of its military forces overseas." Three-fifths said "military spending should be trimmed."

Evangelist who bought park is sued

COLUMBIA, S.C. — The evangelist who bought the former PTL Christian theme park has been accused in a lawsuit of misusing \$4 million he received from selling memberships in the New Heritage USA Christian retreat.

The lawsuit filed Wednesday by partners of evangelist Morris Cerullo said membership cards promised lifetime, half-price discounts for hotels and attractions at the Christian retreat.

Cerullo's partners said they knew nothing about the promises until January. They said they fear the discounts could throw New Heritage into financial trouble. The lawsuit said the money flowed into an escrow account controlled by him. "We have not seen a single check," New Heritage President Yet King Loy said.

Cerullo, who is chairman of New Heritage, said he was "shocked, amazed and saddened" by the U.S. District Court lawsuit.

Killing elephants for ivory not legal

NEWARK, N.J. — A company caught trying to import African ivory was fined \$100,000 on Thursday by a judge who issued a warning to others tempted to kill elephants for their treasured tusks.

"In my judgment the only message that can be sent out is, if you get caught, you've got to pay for it," said U.S. District Judge Harold Ackerman.

The company, Pacemark Corp. of New York, pleaded guilty to lying to the Customs Service. Pacemark altered documents to make it look as though the figures were ordered before a ban on ivory went into effect in January 1990.

Bush questions financial aid proposal

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration is worried about the effects of proposed legislation to provide direct financial aid to republics in the Soviet Union, a top State Department official said Thursday.

Curtis Kanman, deputy assistant secretary of state, said, however, the administration wants to expand its contacts in the republics at the local level.

"We share the goals of the ... bill and would like to work with Congress to support the bill's objectives," he said in testimony to a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee. Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., and Rep. Dana Rohrabacher, R-Calif., have sponsored companion bills to direct U.S. aid to democratic republics in countries in transition from communism to democracy. Dole has said such aid could go to republics in the Soviet Union, Yugoslavia and other countries.

Mrs. Bush pushing poison prevention

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barbara Bush on Thursday urged adults to keep dangerous chemicals and medicines locked away from young children, and said she was "feeling very guilty" about the safety of her vacation home.

"I can hardly wait to get to our house in Maine and lock ... things away," the first lady told a news conference marking the 30th observance of National Poison Prevention Week.

Jacqueline Jones-Smith, chairman of the Consumer Product Safety Commission, said the number of poisoning deaths among children under the age of five has dropped dramatically since the observances began.

In 1961, Jones-Smith said, 450 youngsters died from poisonings. That number dropped to 31 by 1987, the most recent year for which statistics are available. The commission played a role in requiring child-resistant packaging, she said.

"We want to see poisonings drop to zero," she told the gathering at Georgetown University Hospital, site of the National Capitol Poison Center.

Mrs. Bush said she would appreciate slightly easier-to-open safety packages, joking that "you spend half your life trying to open (safety) packages if you're my age and you have funny hands."

"But the truth is, a little extra trouble doesn't hurt us to have safety in packaging," she said.

Jones-Smith said such safety packaging serves as the second line of defense, but she and Mrs. Bush emphasized that caregivers are the first line of defense.

Such caregivers are "not just mothers and fathers but grandmothers and grandfathers," Mrs. Bush said, also encouraging "babysitters, anyone who's in charge of children to be sure that you keep all poisons locked away and that you keep them up high."

And that's not just in the home, said Mrs. Bush, who spoke after hearing Ann Newburg of Tampa, Fla., tell about the time her 2-year-old daughter Elizabeth drank furniture polish when the family was at their office furniture business. The daughter was rushed to the hospital after a call to a poison center and she recovered completely, Mrs. Newburg said.

Some cities begging for plutonium business

WASHINGTON — Cities around the nation are lining up and some are even begging for Rocky Flats' plutonium business, which the Department of Energy has said it may move from the Denver area sometime in the next 20 years.

That's right. Some people are begging for it.

The 160,000-resident city of Amarillo, Texas, could hardly wait to announce its enthusiasm for making the plutonium triggers used in nuclear missiles, now made only at Rocky Flats. Their mayor hastily called a press conference to make the proclamation the same day Energy Secretary James D. Watkins announced a plan to be streamlining DOE operations.

"Why? I think the general reason is that the community as a whole is interested in it," said John Ward, Amarillo's city manager. "They

have had a very good relationship with the Pantex (Plant in Amarillo), a very positive relationship, and (Pantex) has been a good citizen, they're an important part of our economic community, and of our work force."

The town this week flew Mayor Keith Adams, who is the general manager of the local radio station and representatives of the bringing-Rocky-Flats-to-Amarillo lobbying group (known as the Pantex Task Force), to Washington to begin

courting the DOE officials who will decide the fate of Rocky Flats.

The city coaxed its best and brightest onto the task force, including attorney Jerome W. Johnson, who was instrumental in making Amarillo one of two final sites for the supercollider. The city lost the final bid.

Amarillo isn't the only city that Denver residents may be "viewing with a quizzical eye. Oak Ridge, Tenn., the home of the atom bomb and the DOE's Y-12 plant, is busy

drafting a proposal to get the Flats' plutonium business. So is Savannah River Site, which is lagging behind the other two a little on getting local city officials heavily involved in the lobbying effort. And energy officials privately hint that they expect a lot more applicants, perhaps a virtual cornucopia of American hamlets, private companies and DOE facilities all pleading for what people in Denver would just as soon get rid of as fast as possible.

Large number of deaths involve guns

WASHINGTON — Firearms are involved in one-fifth of the deaths of Americans between the ages of 15 and 34 and account for nearly half of the fatalities of young black males, a federal study shows.

"During every 100 hours on our streets we lose more young men than were killed in 100 hours of ground war in the Persian Gulf," Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan said in releasing the report Thursday.

The study, by the National Centers for Disease Control, examined homicide, suicide and unintentional firearm deaths among people ages 15 to 34. It was based on figures for 1988, the latest year for which data were available.

Among those 15 to 34 years old, accidents were the leading cause of death.

Motor vehicles accounted for two-thirds of the deaths. For those aged 15 to 34, homicide and suicide were the second and third leading causes of death.

But among black males ages 15 to 34, homicide was the leading cause of death and guns figured in 88 percent of the cases.

2 men held after massive drug seizure

WASHINGTON — Two New York men were ordered held without bond Thursday after what authorities called the capital's single largest drug seizure — 50 pounds of high-grade cocaine worth up to \$10 million discovered aboard an Amtrak train.

Gilberto Mendoza, 27, and Victor Clarke, 28, would face 10 years to life imprisonment and fines of up to \$4 million if convicted of possession of drugs with intent to distribute, said U.S. Magistrate Patrick J. Stridge.

Authorities said the two were arrested Wednesday after investigators boarded the New York-bound Amtrak train at Union Station.

Amtrak officials said the amount seized was by far the largest since the railroad began a nationwide drug interdiction program in 1987.

Baker staffer in line for key position

WASHINGTON — Ivan Selin, a top aide to Secretary of State James A. Baker III, for the past two years, is expected to be named chairman of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, an administration official said Thursday.

He would replace Kenneth M. Carr, whose five-year term as a commission member expires this summer.

Selin has served as under secretary of state for management, advising Baker on matters involving the allocation of the State Department's resources.

Prior to joining the State Department, Selin was the chairman of the board of American Management Systems, Inc., a computer systems, services and consulting firm that he founded in 1970.

Blizzard forces sled dog race reversals

NOME, Alaska — Blowing snow forced three of the five leaders in the 10th round of the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog race to reverse course Thursday in the home stretch of the 1,163-mile trek. The location of the two others was not immediately known.

"It's incredibly bad. I don't remember when I've seen it worse," musher Tim Osmer said of the so-called ground blizzard conditions. He was one of the three who returned to White Mountain, just 77 miles from the finish line in Nome. Also turning back was four-time winner Susan Butcher.

Another four-time winner, Rick Swenson, and Martin Buser were somewhere between White Mountain and Safety, 55 miles away and the last checkpoint in the Anchorage-to-Nome race.

Wind in the White Mountain area gusted to 46 to 57 mph and the temperature was about minus 20 degrees, officials said.

Police chief hears clamor for resignation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Police Chief Daryl F. Gates, his department now the focus of a federal misconduct probe, listened grim-faced Thursday to a parade of civil rights leaders and politicians demanding his ouster.

Clamor for the chief's resignation in wake of the videotaped March 3 attack on a black motorist reached feverish proportions at the weekly Police Commission hearing, where a boisterous overflow crowd screamed and chanted.

"Get rid of the bum," shouted one member of the audience after NAACP leader Joseph Duff called for the commission to solve the police abuse problem in the minority communities.

"Your job as law enforcement officers is not to bring about agitation for war but for peace," Duff said.

John Mack, of the Urban League, demanded the removal of Gates to a

chorus of what they claimed was a high-speed chase clubbed him dozens of times with their batons, kicked him and shot him with an electric stun gun.

A resident in the neighborhood videotaped the beating.

King underwent minor surgery at an undisclosed hospital Thursday and was reported in good condition, said a spokeswoman for his attorney, Steve Lerman.

Hours before the Police Commission hearing, Attorney General Dick Thornburgh ordered a review of complaints of Los Angeles police brutality in the last six years to determine if there is a pattern of misconduct.

Thornburgh's announcement in Washington came after he met with two lawmakers who urged the department to broaden its investigation of the King beating.

State Sen. Diane Watson of Los Angeles noted Thornburgh's order

Officers who stopped King after

to the Justice Department and received a standing ovation when she read to the commission its own rules allowing it to remove Gates for misconduct.

She said that in 1982, the commission issued an official reprimand to the chief for his statement that some blacks were more susceptible to choke holds "than normal people."

Watson said the reprimand meant that Gates was to avoid such inflammatory comments in the future and prevent racism on his force.

Police Commissioner Melanice Lomax, presiding over the hearing, allowed speakers five minutes each to state their points. Many had to be stopped in mid-statement as they continued their denunciations of Gates.

The auditorium was so crowded that Lomax had officers clear the aisles at the request of a fire commissioner.

Researchers identify key gene link in colon cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers said late Thursday they have identified a gene that is a "smoking gun" link to an early stage of colon cancer.

The step advances the prospect of developing a test to identify people at high risk for one of the major cancer killers.

Kenneth Kinzler of the Johns Hopkins Oncology Center in Baltimore said — a team of researchers identified the gene by finding genetic mutations in cells that produce ab-

normal growth early in colon cancer development.

The gene they found has been called MCC, for "Mutated in Colon Cancer."

"We have several lines of evidence to suggest that the mutation of the gene is one of the earliest changes that occurs during the progression from a normal cell to a colon cancer cell," Kinzler said.

A report on the study is to be published Friday in the journal Science. Earlier studies have shown that

many cancers arise from a series of genetic mutations in cells. Some mutated genes, called oncogenes, cause abnormal cell growth. Other genes, called tumor suppressors, normally prevent the abnormal growth. When mutation causes the tumor suppressors to not work normally, then a natural control on cell growth is removed.


Evidence suggests that it may take one or more oncogenes, plus the mutation of one or more suppressor genes for a tumor to develop.

Kinzler said that MCC appears to be a suppressor gene. In addition to its mutation, he said, "We think there are four to six changes that have to occur before it can become a cancer cell."

The Hopkins researchers in earlier studies identified two other suppressor genes, called p53 and DCC, and one oncogene, called RAS, that play a role in colon cancer.

Colon and rectum cancer is diagnosed annually in about 140,000 Americans.

Memorial message for Andrew Moller

Nels D. Moller of Paul wrote this message for Saturday's memorial service for his son, Nels Andrew Moller, who was killed in the Persian Gulf War.

Nels D. Moller

On behalf of Andrew's family, I would like to convey to you some of the thoughts and feelings in my moment of honoring Andrew.

Andrew, who sought no special place or recognition in this life, would have - in all probability - been overwhelmed and uncomfortable in this time of glory.

So we just want to briefly state to you what we think Andrew would have wanted to say about what he did for himself, for us and for all of his countrymen.

First of all, we as his family want to share our pride in Andrew with you as you have shared with us in our sorrow.

So you, our friends and fellow mourners, we thank you for your taking time and giving in so many ways to us for the sake of Andrew.

We have, like so many of you, been involved in continuous prayer in these last seven months of crisis.

We have been praying for resolution of the crisis in Kuwait, asking for peace and asking for protection of our loved ones sent there to force a solution.

I myself have been involved in a guided scriptural meditation, prayer and journaling exercise. This exercise was based on the book of Exodus.

On the morning of Feb. 26, the reading was from the 13th chapter of Exodus which relates to the observance of Passover.

In the first and second verses, the scripture says, "The Lord spoke to Moses and said, 'Every firstborn, the first birth of every womb among the Israelites, you must

dedicate to me, both man and beast, it is mine.'"

And then in verses 13 to 15, the Lord said, "Every firstborn among your sons you must redeem."

When in time to come your son asks you what this means, you shall say to him, "By the strength of his hand, the Lord brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery."

When the Pharaoh proved stubborn and refused to let us go, the Lord killed the firstborn in Egypt both man and beast.

That is why I sacrificed to the Lord the first birth of every womb if it is male and redeem every first born of your sons."

Now the meaning of this reading became apparent to me and the family later on the afternoon of the next day.

For it would seem my son was redeemed for hopefully some noble purpose.

And where the Israelite could have the redemption of his son accomplished by paying 5 shekels, it is apparent to us at least and hopefully to all of you that Andrew's redemption must come from our conscious efforts of remembering what it means to be an American and being an American in all we do.

Andrew gave his life to a country, a people and a way of living with one another.

Where freedom has been developed and refined and continues to evolve so that all are truly free.

Where what we hear and say is not controlled by a Ministry of Information.

Where one political party does not suppress and annihilate all other parties.

Where religious and ethnic factions do not suppress all other factions and limit their rights.

Where citizens may express their feelings and beliefs in any manner that does not endanger life, property and domestic tranquility.

Where men and women have the right to serve their country with dignity instead of facing conscription and execution squads.

Where we are willing to hear both sides of the story instead of killing the messenger.

Where we are willing to make efforts to be better stewards of the quality of our environment instead of plundering and destroying for cheap political gain.

And there are many other blessings, strengths and rights - most of which we love and cherish - while others we question are important to our way of life.

For all these, our young fought and died for their preservation.

We give thanks that our country was able after enlightening discussion to commit as a nation to protect these rights well of life. We give thanks to our armed forces and our political leadership who performed so well to carry this commitment to a conclusion.

And all we would ask of each of you is that when you must make a decision in your personal and public life, you will remember these rights and blessings and exercise responsibility. Remember also that sacrifice and tolerance are required.

Let us now look to the future with the commandment that our Lord Jesus gave us, that we love one another as we love ourselves and as he loved us.

We pray to our God to have mercy on us and the same God who is called Allah to have mercy on Saddam Hussein.

Party that realizes Idaho is changing will hold power

The state's top Republicans got together in Boise recently for a pep rally. The Idaho GOP's fortunes have been on the wane for three straight elections now, and Republicans wanted to talk about putting things right.

There was lots of discussion about seizing the initiative and making the big spender, big-government, big-tax label stick to Democrats, but not a lot about the problems that got the Idaho GOP into trouble in the first place.

That's unfortunate for the Republicans, because unless the GOP gets after those problems, and soon, the Democrats are in a strong position to strengthen their position following reappointment.

The Idaho Republicans' basic dilemma is that Idahoans are no longer dependably predictable.

The typical Idaho resident is no longer a farmer or a Main Street businessman or a cradle-to-grave conservative. He or she is more likely to live in or near one of the state's larger cities, work full or part time for a corporation or a growing smaller company and be more concerned about quality of life than purity of ideology.

That quality-of-life orientation is probably why he or she lives here, and the party that realizes it first is going to be the most successful into the next century. People don't vote for one political party by accident; they vote their own interests.

The Republican Party has historically been successful in Idaho because it represented the kinds of things Idahoans wanted: low taxes, accountability and keeping government as local as possible.

But there's no patent on that style of government. Democrats have adopted it and ridden to victory in six straight gubernatorial elections and elsewhere.

Since 1984, Democratic numbers in the state Senate have almost doubled.

Why? The Idaho GOP of the '80s was rent by ideological conflict, pitting moderate and conservative factions in

the worst family feud the state has experienced in a generation. It created a wedge for the Democrats to exploit.

Scratch a successful Republican politician and you'll find a pragmatist. Lt. Gov. Butch Otter is a prime example; he got into politics two decades ago as a flamboyant ideologue of the far right.

But he got elected to state office five years ago because he's a practical, successful businessman with a demonstrated ability to manage for the public interest. The lesson is clear. Extremist politics simply don't work in Idaho these days.

That, and a few other realities of the '90s, need to be made clear to the GOP:

• The abortion issue wasn't just a negative for the Republicans last year; it was a disaster. The GOP must make room for pro-choice views in its party.

• Grassroots organization, an area that Republicans have traditionally done well in this state, is no longer a GOP franchise.

Fact is that in some swing counties, such as Ada and Latah, the Democrats simply had their act together far better last fall.

• The Republicans need more Jim Joneses - credible, electable candidates for state and federal office. Democrats didn't pick up all those offices last November because they outcampaigned their GOP opponents; they won because they outrecruited the Republicans on the state level and, thanks to the Idaho Education Association, outspent them too.

• There is an emerging plurality of education- and environment-conscious voters in Idaho who before too many more years may be a majority. These people have no loyalties to Republicans - unless Republicans demonstrate they understand and share those values.

For most of the past 100 years, the Idaho Republican Party has had a genius for success by keeping in touch with Idahoans' concerns. It needs to stay in touch.

What we have here is a failure to communicate (a line from an old Paul Newman movie).

The planners advocate a vision of education which is fundamentally uncompetitive. It has more to do with feedlots than families.

Your children will be trained (and trained well) to produce. Else who will pay the debt they have accrued well into the next generation? It does provide a measure of security, and you don't have to be involved. Just pay, pray and obey. It is a vision of slavery, actually, though it's "nice" slavery. And one must admit it has enjoyed a measure of success, especially in Lane measures success in dollars. It says "big is best."

There is another vision of reality centered on God and family. It measures success in terms of character and happiness, simplicity and interconnectivity. It values not 2,000-seat feedlots but family farms. It says small is beautiful.

Whether you spend \$20 million is not my problem directly. I do not live in your district - though I do care what happens there. So when you decide how to vote, remember your little "X" does not say simply yes or no to spending \$20 million. It says yes or no to a whole vision of reality. Kind of makes you stop and think about what's really simple, doesn't it?

Bible is accurate document

Over the past weekend on CNN and the Associated Press newswire, it is reported that the conclusion of the Jesus Symposium that they have rejected 80 percent of the Gospel of John and other significant synoptic passages as being the authentic words of Christ. This report was incredibly misleading.

The Jesus Symposium has met over the last few years around the country and is composed of about 200 professors of religion from state universities and mainline colleges. The press would have us believe that these are biblical scholars on the cutting edge of modern research. In fact, all that their symposium consisted of was a four-card colored voting system (extremely precise) to tally whether each participant considered a certain passage of the gospel "sounded like" it was the authentic words of Christ or that he "plagiarized" it (quoted from the Old Testament) or that it was amended or put into his mouth by his followers after his death.

This "scientific" inquiry had at its base the presupposition that all supernatural elements of the narrative were excluded. In other words, Jesus performed no miracles, predicted no prophesy, did not rise from the dead, etc. Therefore, with this basic understanding, it would be elementary exercise in personal opinion to dismiss three-quarters of the gospel right off the top. And if you think about it, the world has rejected it entirely and gives you an indication of where these scholars are coming from.

To be sure, the early church had other "gospels" to consider and choose from. They were also confronted by several "heretical" acts who attempted to advance their doctrines through these writings. They finally had to sit down and officially recognize those writings which are contained in the New Testament.

The New Testament books were those written by eyewitnesses of the resurrection (Matthew, John, Peter, James, Jude, Paul) and their contemporaries and companions (Luke, Mark, Silvanus, Tertius, etc.). These testimonies must be tested on the same basis as a courtroom transcript. These writings were received, preserved and distributed by the early church as authentic and accurate

accounts. The information contained in the accounts correspond to geographical and historical facts of archeological research. Early manuscripts found through recent discoveries underscore the accuracy of their transmission and preservation to us today.

Textual scholars who work with these documents have confirmed that the Greek text we have today to translate from is purer than Ivory (99.44/100 pure). It is without a doubt and without dispute that the Bible is the most accurate ancient document in existence. We should have every confidence in accepting its accuracy and truthfulness.

Bill ready to fight for country

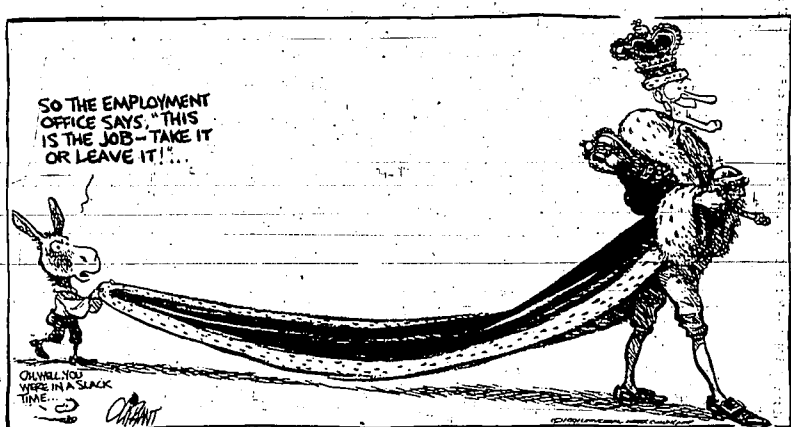
So Bill Chisholm burned three United States flags and must be proud that he is a patriotic American.

Rival black groups to try to halt riots

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Representatives of the African National Congress and the Inkatha Freedom Party agreed Thursday to work together to halt an outbreak of renewed violence in black townships near Johannesburg. Scores of people have died in street fighting between supporters of the two black opposition groups the past two weeks in Soweto, Alexandra and Tembisa.

The government imposed emer-

gency measures, including an overnight curfew, in the three townships this week.

Thursday's ANC-Inkatha meeting lasted five hours, and participants told a news conference the goal was stopping the violence, not casting blame.

Some black leaders have accused security forces of instigating violence to destabilize black opposition groups. The government has denied the charge.

The joint ANC-Inkatha statement said the groups would conduct investigations to discover what it called the "criminal element" fueling conflict between them.

A statement said joint committees would be formed to monitor trouble spots and work with residents to stop the fighting. It said the committees would be an extension of the Jan. 29 peace agreement reached by ANC leader Nelson Mandela and Inkatha leader Mangosuthu Buthezi.

Malawi flood death toll now at least 472

BLANTYRE, Malawi (AP) — Flash floods that washed away entire villages in southern Malawi killed at least 472 people, including refugees from Mozambique's civil war, a regional official said Thursday.

Several hundred people are still missing and an estimated 150,000

people have been left homeless by the floods, which were caused by torrential downpours Sunday in the Mulanje district, the official Malawi News Agency said.

Regional administrator Stewart Wings said the bodies of 472 flood victims had been recovered by late Wednesday.

Monorail girder fall claims 14

TOKYO (AP) — A 40-ton steel girder rolled off an elevated monorail under construction in Hiroshima on Thursday, crushing vehicles at a traffic light below and killing 14 people, police said.

Nine people were injured by the 213-foot section of the monorail's horizontal frame, which demolished 11 vehicles, police official Kiyomitsu Umakoshi said.

He said the steel girder was being moved by construction workers when it slipped off a support column and fell.

"I clearly saw it come falling down on my car," a weeping woman driver said in a nationally televised interview. "I saw about four or five cars ahead of me get crushed."

The cars were waiting at a traffic light on the road below, which parallels the elevated monorail route, Umakoshi said.

Some of the cars were flattened to less than half a yard in height. Police and construction workers spent more than two hours removing the girder from the crushed cars to get to the victims below, Umakoshi said.

Rescue workers then used power tools to remove the trapped victims, as horrified bystanders watched.

Five of the dead and three of the injured were construction workers who had been working at the top of the support column, Umakoshi said.

Police were questioning workers to see if improper procedures had been used in moving the girder and to determine why they had not stopped traffic on the road below, he added.

Construction workers said they had moved the girder to the end of one arm of the T-shaped support column and were removing blocks from underneath it to adjust its final position when it apparently became unbalanced and fell.

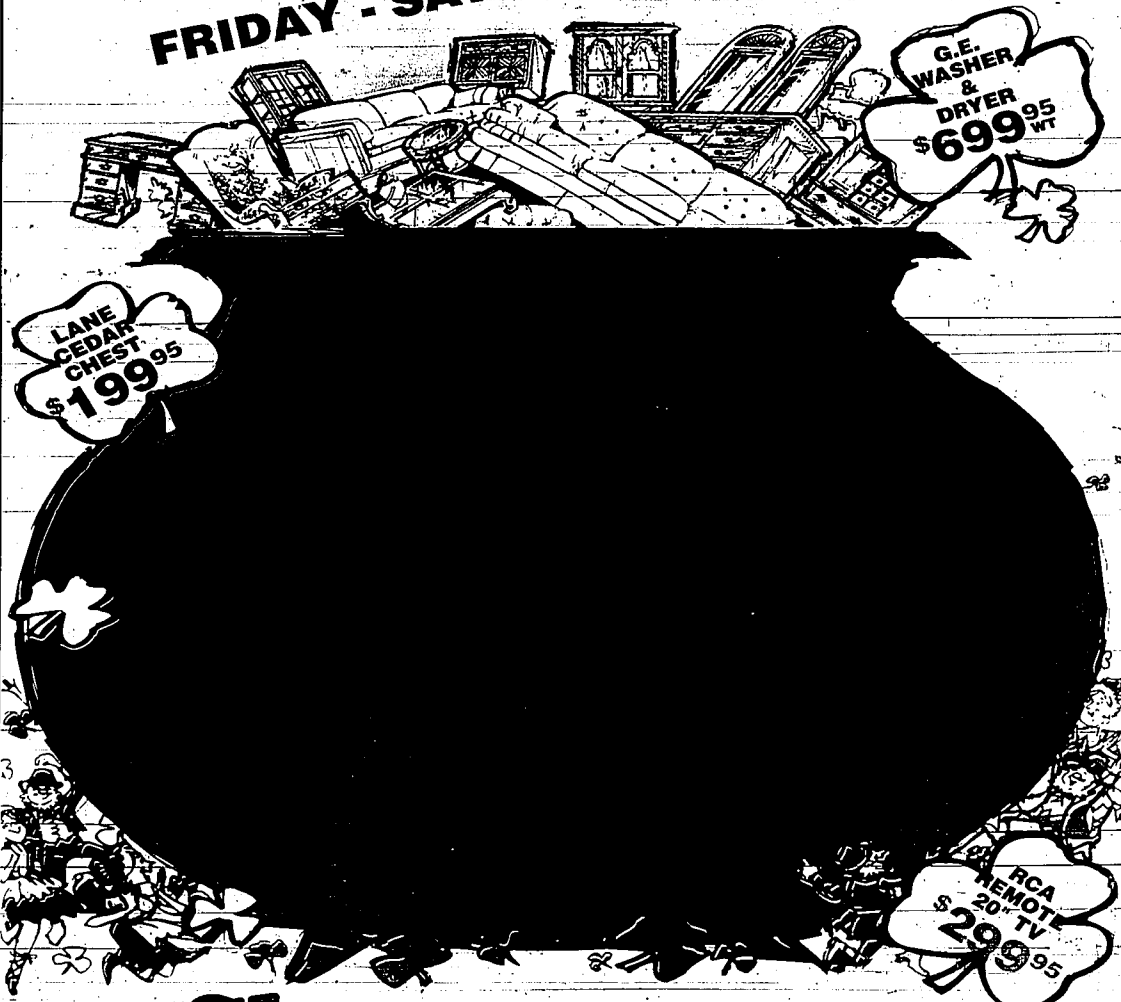
Sweep for Alliance

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and his Islamic Democratic Alliance swept Thursday's Senate elections, giving him a solid majority in both houses of Parliament.

Former Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto, whose party was badly beaten, accused the government of intimidation and vote-rigging and vowed to boycott the Senate, which is the upper house of Parliament.

In Pakistan, the Senate is chosen by federal and provincial legislators rather than by popular vote.

Denied right to talk, Yeltsin wants station

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris N. Yeltsin, denied permission to deliver a speech on the Soviet broadcast network, demanded Thursday that the British government surrender television facilities to his Russian federation.

Angered by the official press campaign against him, Yeltsin said the time has come to organize a national political party to challenge the Communists for control of the Soviet Union.

The struggle between Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev and Yeltsin, his archrival and president of the Russian federation parliament, has sharpened in the run-up to a nationwide referendum Sunday on preserving the Soviet Union.

The chairman of the state broadcast monopoly, Leonid P. Kravchenko, a close Gorbachev ally, denied Yeltsin's request to address the nation Friday. Gorbachev was scheduled to deliver a nationally televised speech Saturday.

Gorbachev's aides apparently feared Yeltsin would use the forum to urge a "no" vote on the referendum, or to repeat his accusations that Gorbachev has led the nation to the

brink of dictatorship and should resign.

Nearly 100,000 coal miners across the Soviet Union are on strike, backing Yeltsin's call for Gorbachev's resignation and demanding the government keep the economic pledges it made to end a nationwide coal strike in July 1989.

Communist officials, military officers and state-run media countered by stepping up their exhortations for people to vote "yes" on Sunday.

They warned that a resounding "no" vote would destroy the Soviet Union and shatter Gorbachev's political authority.

Yeltsin has not said how he will vote on the referendum. He said in a newspaper interview published Thursday that he dared not express his view for fear of intensifying the orchestrated media campaign against him.

British court reverses bombing convictions

LONDON (AP) — Vowing revenge, six angry defendants were freed after 16 years in prison when the Court of Appeal reversed their convictions for the Irish Republican Army's deadliest bomb attack.

"Sixteen years because of hypocrisy, brutality. But every dog has its day and we are going to have ours!" proclaimed one of the so-called Birmingham Six, Richard McKelvey, as he emerged from the Old Bailey Court.

"Justice! I don't think the people in there have got the intelligence nor the honesty to spell the word, never mind dispense it!" shouted another, Patrick Hill, to a crowd of cheering supporters. "They're rotten!"

Lord Justice Lloyd told the gray-haired defendants, each convicted on 21 counts of murder in the 1974 bombings of two pubs in Birmingham, that they were being freed "in the light of fresh evidence."

The defendants, wearing conservative dark suits, range in age from 44 to 60.

Lloyd said the court would spell out its reasons later. But during the nine-day hearing, prosecutors conceded the six were convicted on the basis of questionable scientific and police evidence.

Four of the six had confessed, but maintained they did so only after being beaten.

Secretary Kenneth Baker quickly announced the appointment of a Royal Commission to review the criminal justice system "to minimize as far as possible the likelihood of such events happening again."

The six, all natives of Northern Ireland, were arrested shortly after explosions in two Birmingham pubs killed 21 people and injured 162 others on Nov. 21, 1974. It was the deadliest attack ever mounted by the

IRA in England.

A huge crowd waited outside the Old Bailey for the defendants: McKelvey, 57, Hill, 46, Johnny Walker, 55, Bill Power, 45, Gerard Hunter, 44, and Hugh Callaghan, 60.

The men embraced tearful wives and daughters, and posed for a picture with Chris Mullin, a Labor Party member of Parliament whose book, "Error of Judgment," had brought public attention to the case.

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Germans want Honecker back

BERLIN (AP) — The German government on Thursday demanded the immediate return of East German former Communist leader Erich Honecker, a day after the Soviets shipped him out of Germany for Moscow.

The move to the Soviet capital pits Honecker, who authorities charge is responsible for the deaths of 1.1 million Germans trying to flee to the West during his 18-year regime — out of the reach of German prosecutors. Lawyers for the 78-year-old Honecker said he was taken to the Soviet Union on Wednesday for medical treatment. He had been in a Soviet military hospital south of Berlin. Dieter Vogel, chief spokesman for Chancellor Helmut Kohl, said the German government was informed about an hour before Honecker's departure.

Idaho potato storage sheds are full of spuds

TWIN FALLS - Despite last fall's record setting Idaho potato crop, fewer potatoes remained in storage nationally March 1 than in 1985, 1986 and 1987, according to the Idaho Agricultural Statistics Service.

But Idaho's storage sheds remained 16 percent fuller than March 1, 1990 - they contained 51.5 million hundredweight of potatoes this year.

Nationally, 126 million sacks were in storage March 1. "Disappearance" is a record 210 million sacks.

Nice weather allows work to speed ahead on truck route

Searchers pull chilled climbers from steep Snake River Canyon

TWIN FALLS - Two Twin Falls men - cold but otherwise unharmed - were rescued from the Snake River Canyon Wednesday evening.

The Jerome Sheriff's department, with help from the Twin Falls sheriff's office and search and rescue team, combed the two miles of canyon between Pillar Falls and the Perrine Bridge for Erry Quinton,

23, and Bryan C. Draper, 19, who became lost after failing to climb out of the canyon.

The two had climbed down the north canyon rim near Pillar Falls Wednesday afternoon but were unable to climb back up to rejoin their companions on the rim. Their friends contacted the police.

Searchers finally spotted the two about 10 p.m. on the south side of the river about one-quarter mile west of Shoshone Falls when one of the men signaled with a small flashlight. Apparently they had failed to

climb out near the bridge. They turned east, somehow crossed the river and headed for Shoshone Falls.

Searchers contacted Idaho Power Co. officials at the Shoshone Falls Power Plant, who put a small boat in the water and brought the two men to safety.

"They had pretty much given up," said Sgt. Gerald Brant of the Jerome sheriff's department. "They said they were too cold to walk any further, Brant said.

House committee approves income tax bills

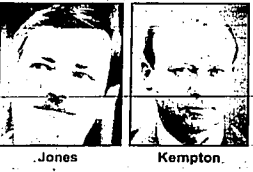
BOISE - The House Revenue and Taxation Committee on Thursday approved two bills that would allow income taxes to increase.

One of the bills sent to the floor by the committee is designed to reduce property taxes by shifting the local school funding base to income taxes.

The other would allow existing or new community college districts to levy a local-option income tax of up to 20 percent of tax liability with a two-thirds majority vote in an election.

"It has to be very carefully structured and very specific what the money's for," said Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer. Jones is sponsoring the local-option income tax bill, an idea generated by an interim committee that studied community colleges.

"There is a great deal of resentment to

property tax in this state at all levels," Jones said. "The interim committee thought this was a more fair way to go about this."

Mike Glenn, assistant to College of Southern Idaho President Gerald Meyerhofer, told the committee that CSI "very definitely" would use it.

The Twin Falls community college fees are "about all people can stand," and the college's property tax revenue is "maxi-

mized," Glenn said.

In order to serve the needs of the fast-growing student body, CSI needs a fresh source of revenue.

"I think it's important this body recognize community colleges can't continue to grow without new funding sources," Glenn said.

But the bill was criticized by some.

"I don't think we should open ourselves to the policy to go to voters for an income tax increase every time a project is needed, which it looks like this will do," said Randy Nelson, president of Associated Taxpayers of Idaho.

Rep. Don Loveland, R-Boise, said it's unfair that only local counties have the burden of funding community colleges and local people would continue to pay for the colleges under the bill.

"I'm not so sure this is the cure," he said.

But Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl, said community college funding "has been studied

to death and no one has come up with a real good solution. ... The first step is to throw something out there and see what happens."

Because CSI and North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene are levying their maximum property taxes, the bill would create property tax relief, Glenn said.

The school-funding bill guarantees property tax relief - \$10 million statewide in the first two years, \$20 million in the next two years. After a four-year test period, the program would be re-evaluated.

"HB392 is a fresh new look," said Rep. Jim Kempton, the Albion Republican sponsoring the bill.

Property taxes don't consider one's ability to pay and were originally established to fund services such as fire and police protection, Kempton said.

"We've gone far astray from that position and then to the state, which in October ruled that as a charitable organization, The Nature Conservancy is entitled to tax-exempt status."

"We won the battle, but the way I looked at it, we lost the war. It was a very bitter-sweet victory," Elsbree said.

The conservancy wants to pay "fair and equitable" taxes to the county, Elsbree said, but was concerned that as it acquires land around the state, the same tax problem may arise.

So it turned to the Legislature to create a new tax category, which would tax its holdings at the same rate as agricultural land.

"So farming for pheasants is the same as farming for grain," Elsbree said.

Conservancy gets its wish, now pays taxes

BOISE - It may be the first time someone has gone to the Legislature and asked to pay property tax.

And by a 77-0 vote, the House approved The Nature Conservancy's request Thursday.

"We're not giving anything they don't have," said Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg. "Otherwise, they'd pay nothing."

Linford is sponsoring a bill, which must still pass the Senate, to allow land owned and managed by private, non-profit organizations for protecting wildlife habitat to be taxed as agricultural property.



The legislation stems from a situation in Gooding County, where The Nature Conservancy owns Thousand Springs Island and about 220 more acres along the Snake River. It also manages another 427 acres along the canyon rim.

Although its non-profit status exempts the conservancy from paying taxes, the organization had been paying \$2,300 a year in property tax, an agricultural rate, on the

land.

"We want to pay a fair and equitable rate, to be good neighbors," said Mark Elsbree, assistant Idaho director of the conservancy.

But in 1989, because the conservancy wasn't farming for profit, Gooding County assessed the land in its development category, raising the organization's property tax to \$14,000 - more than half the operating budget for the preserve, Elsbree said.

"We viewed that as pre-emptively expensive," he said. "We couldn't afford it."

And the conservancy, which purchases land and preserves it for wildlife habitat, would never develop the land and build condos, he said.

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Blaine County bars homes near power lines

HAILEY - Developers of new subdivisions can no longer build within 150 feet of transmission lines.

But an Idaho Power Co. official says that due to a lack of concrete scientific data, Blaine County is "premature" in its attempt to enact a building setback from high-voltage transmission lines.

At issue is whether there is a health hazard - primarily childhood leukemia and other cancers - associated with electromag-

netic field radiation emitted from transmission lines, the lines that usually carry large quantities of electric power at high voltages over long distances.

Experts across the country are polarized on the issue - so much so that at least 26 separate scientific studies are ongoing in an attempt to answer this question, said Dan Olmstead, Idaho Power's Hailey district manager.

And there are three sets of national standards in use for electromagnetic fields.

Through the proposed ordinance, Blaine County has undertaken the role of safe-

guarding the public's "safety, health and welfare" as stipulated by the county's comprehensive plan, the commissioners say.

To carry out this directive, the Planning and Zoning Commission has drafted an amendment to the county's subdivision ordinance that would require buildings in new subdivisions to be at least 150 feet away from the center line of transmission lines.

The setback already has become "county policy," but official adoption of the ordinance has been held up due to a heavy workload, said Planning and Zoning Com-

mission member Leonard Harlig.

Olmstead said Idaho Power Co. realizes this question is of concern and has helped fund two major research studies.

Currently, however, studies are five to 10 years away from arriving at a definitive answer to the question of whether close proximity to high voltage transmission lines is a health hazard, and if so, what distance is safe, Olmstead said.

Olmstead asked why the commission is singling out transmission lines, and not discussing the effects of distribution lines - Please see POWER/B2

Coach resigns; school unsure

"I was wrong," he said. "The move was never accepted by the players or the parents."

Thompson said it has been "an extremely difficult and trying basketball season for him and his family. As a coach, Thompson said he felt the usual "self-inflicted pressure" plus the added pressure of having his own son on the team.

At least 4 officers indicted in L.A. beating incident

LOS ANGELES — At least four Los Angeles police officers were indicted Thursday by a Los Angeles County grand jury investigating the videotaped beating of a motorist who had been stopped for speeding. The indictments were sealed, and the precise allegations and number of indictments issued by the grand jury were not known.

According to their attorneys, four of the 15 officers present at the beating had been indicted and were ordered to surrender in court Friday.

The 23-member panel began hearing evidence Monday in the case, which came to light when a witness to the early-morning incident on March 3 presented a videotape to a Los Angeles television station. The images of uniformed officers

repeatedly kicking and striking the prone, unarmed man have sparked outrage nationwide and prompted calls for the ouster of Los Angeles police Chief Daryl F. Gates.

All 15 officers present at the assault on Rodney G. King, 25, who is on parole after a robbery conviction, have been removed from active field duty by Gates.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation is presently aligned with its investigation of the incident, an unusual development in that the federal agency usually refrains from duplicating the efforts of local investigators.

The case has carried racial overtones because King is black and the officers white. King suffered numerous injuries in the attack. He was held in custody for three days before prosecutors said that three

were no grounds to press allegations that he had evaded police in a high-speed chase.

The grand jury, acting on evidence presented in secret sessions by Deputy District Attorney Terry White, went beyond the scope of Gates' recommendation that three officers be prosecuted.

While Gates had singled out for criticism the supervising sergeant at the scene and vowed to take administrative disciplinary actions against all 15 officers — he did not recommend the 14-year veteran sergeant be prosecuted.

Witnesses before the grand jury included the man who made the videotape from a nearby balcony; eyewitnesses from the same apartment building; a Los Angeles Unified School District officer who was present, and at least two Los Angeles police officers.

Building with dangerous chemicals will be moved

HAILEY — School children in Carey will be safer thanks to a measure by the Blaine County Commission to move a pesticide storage building.

Despite high bids, the county will go ahead with plans to move and upgrade a building located at Carey School that is used to store pesticides and other chemicals.

Commissioner Tom Blanchard said the critical issue is removing the current pesticide building — which is in poor condition and has no means for containment of spills — from the school yard of Carey School, which houses kindergartners and grades one

through 12.

The commissioners allocated \$35,000 for the project, but due to architectural designs — which included technological safeguards — bids came in at slightly more than \$100,000, Blanchard said.

The county commissioners authorized the project to proceed, but with a simplified design.

The building will be moved to a county yard and will have containment capabilities and storage space for dry and liquid chemicals used by the county's weed control programs. It will also have electricity, covered parking and an office. It will no longer have plumbing.

Though the specifications have been changed, the commissioners decided not to rebid the project.

Berkeley park will remain park

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Berkeley's notorious People's Park, once a symbol of the 1960s peace movement and later a hangout for drug dealers and the homeless, should get a '90s-style facelift, University of California officials agreed Thursday.

The park by the UC Berkeley campus would be refurbished with restrooms, lights, volleyball courts, and extra police protection under the plan a university committee approved by an vote.

The plan for the university-owned land goes before the 26-member Board of Regents Friday.

The board often rubber stamps committee votes, but approval was uncertain.

Some regents disliked that the plan called for the park to be operated jointly with the politically unpredictable City of Berkeley. But others said the plan should be given a chance.

"Am I confident it will work out?" "Absolutely not," said David P. Gardner, UC system president, who voted for the plan.

In 1969, thousands of students and community activists occupied the 2.8-acre site about a quarter-mile from campus, declared it a "liber-

ated zone" and dubbed it "People's Park."

National Guardsmen and police tried to take the park, igniting a riot that left one person dead and 100 injured. It became a symbol for generations of activists.

But in the last decade, students and neighbors have complained the park has become a hangout for criminals and street people.

Still, activists have opposed suggestions that the university build a dormitory on the site, saying the park has become a hangout for criminals and street people.

Nuclear cleanup hearings are not planned for Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS — The Federal Energy Department's plans to involve citizens through workshops that explain how proposed cleanup activities in the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory are identified and described have bypassed the Magic Valley.

"I noticed, not without some consternation, that the workshops are scheduled for as far away as Moscow, with nothing anywhere in the Magic Valley, the area potentially affected the most by the waste problem at INEL," wrote Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls, to an INEL official.

Reuel Smith, INEL's Public Involvement Coordinator, said Energy Department headquarters required INEL to conduct workshops explaining "activity data sheets," the building blocks of environmental cleanup plans.

The workshops also will explain department criteria for determining cleanup priorities.

The department and federal contractors decided to conduct one workshop in Idaho Falls and one in Boise to involve state regulators. They decided to schedule another workshop in Moscow to accommodate people from northern Idaho.

That way, nearly everyone in Idaho would be within about two hours

driving time of a workshop, Smith said.

"Dispel my fears. Tell me there are workshops scheduled in the Magic Valley," Stubbs wrote.

"I do not believe that the workshops in the areas indicated can possibly serve the needs of the Idahoans most affected."

Workshops are scheduled for 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday at the University (in Boise); from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, March 23, at the Westbank Inn, Idaho Falls; and from 6 to 9 p.m. on Thursday, March 28 at the Value Inn, Moscow.

tion and sometimes the property owner is burdened with more than he can handle," he said.

Kempton's bill was criticized Wednesday by Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans in part because it would benefit property-rich districts more than poor districts.

merce and Industry, said the bill is a change in tax philosophy that may be ahead of its time.

"I think it does deserve a little more study before it goes to the floor," Eames said.

But Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg, however, said, "It's something that should have been done a long time ago."

lower voltage lines that carry power to a local region — and the effects of in-home appliances.

The electromagnetic fields of nearly all electrical apparatuses give off radiation, said Les Bell, a Wood River Valley electrical engineer who attended the meeting.

Common household culprits include microwave ovens, electric blenders, hair dryers, electrical shavers, computer terminals, clocks and electrical heaters.

Oldstead said it is Idaho Power's policy to "take a close look" at anything built closer than 50 feet from the centerline of transmission lines, but this is due to interference from the lines with television and radio reception, he said.

Bell explained to the commission that there has been no cause and effect relationship established between electromagnetic fields of any-

kind and cancer.

He cautioned the commission that setting a setback of any type carries with it the possibility of placing people in danger due to the uncertainty of the pattern the electromagnetic field gives off.

For example, along a certain stretch of a power line, the field may be strongest at 50 feet, be negligible at 75 feet, but increase again at 100 feet away.

This will vary by location and with the amount of load on the lines.

"Anything that you do here, you're going to be on the leading edge," Oldstead said. "Other counties don't have prepared ordinances to address the issue."

Likewise, Bell said that California turned down a proposed state standard because there is not enough information available to say that one particular level of radiation

is safe.

Oldstead said that Idaho Power Co. has nothing to hide regarding this issue.

It offers a tracking program where personnel will come out and measure the electromagnetic field for all properties within 50 feet of centerlines and will then generate a computer model to show the electromagnetic field.

Oldstead said once the field is measured, it is up to the individual to choose the degree of risk he prefers — would he like to see his backyard as an extension of his lifestyle and take the risk of an unknown health hazard, or would he rather have the kids play in the street and take on that risk?

The commissioners will review the information presented for consideration when the ordinance comes up for adoption. A date has not been scheduled for a vote on the actual ordinance.

Washington state panel moves to toughen vitamin packaging

SEATTLE (AP) — Warnings to be alert for tampering should be posted wherever over-the-counter medicine is sold, the Washington state Board of Pharmacy decided Thursday.

In an emergency meeting following the February cyanide poisoning deaths of two people who had taken Sudafed capsules, the panel also voted to ask the Legislature for power to extend tamper-resistant packaging requirements to vitamins.

The board, which barred the sale of over-the-counter medicine capsules for 90 days after two people died in a tampering case in 1986, did not take similar action this time.

Also considered but rejected was a suggestion that cold remedies, pain-relievers and similar non-prescription drugs be sold only from

behind pharmacy counters.

The more drastic restrictions were proposed in written material submitted by Daniel Sullivan, a lawyer for the family of one of the most recent cyanide poisoning victims, and state Sen. Phil Talmadge, D-Seattle. Neither was present.

In other developments, the FBI said Thursday that therapeutic levels of the decongestant pseudoephedrine were found in the system of Jack Durham, an Everett man who died Monday after telling medics he had taken Sudafed. Earlier tests confirmed Durham died of cyanide poisoning.

It was not possible to determine what brand of decongestant Durham took, FBI agent John Thurston said. A search of Durham's home and possessions turned up no Sudafed,

the FBI said.

The investigation into Durham's death continues but authorities so far have been unwilling to link him to the tampering deaths.

There have been 14 known product-tampering deaths, starting with tainted Tylenol that killed seven Chicago-area residents in 1982. "The vast majority of them deal with capsules," Roger Lowell, Food and Drug Administration regional director, told the pharmacy board.

A nationwide recall of Sudafed 12 Hour capsules was ordered March 3 after two deaths and the nearly fatal poisoning of a woman after she took the widely sold decongestant.

Three capsules containing cyanide later were found in Sudafed packages, two returned to stores by buyers and the third in an unsold package.

All six cases were in the Tacoma and Olympia areas.

Public education and awareness are the best prevention for such tampering, the board was told by representatives of the Nonprescription Drug Manufacturers Association, Washington Retail Association and Washington State Pharmacists Association.

Al Czup, president of Thorne Research Inc. of Sandpoint, Idaho, compared anti-tampering requirements to anti-hacking computer security measures.

"Whoever you make a more tamper-resistant package, you're going to have a hacker who is going to see that as a challenge," Czup said.

Even warnings, improperly drafted and handled, can lead to people into doing what is just below the

surface of their minds," asserted James D. Cope, president of the drug makers group.

"If we were to roll out a massive campaign on tampering, we could be facing a rollback tsunami of tampering cases," Cope said.

Capsules are the only form of medication some people can swallow, and some over-the-counter drugs cannot be compressed into solid tablets, said Dr. R. William Soller, senior vice president and science and technology director of the same trade group.

On Thursday the national Centers for Disease Control called for a re-evaluation of precautions against medication tampering.

No one at the pharmacy board meeting spoke in favor of a capsule ban. Only a couple of speakers gave

tepid support to moving capsule drugs behind the counter.

"If these sales were controlled by a pharmacist, it might provide an added safety step," said Ray Olson, executive director of the pharmacists group.

John Benson, a Bellingham pharmacist, suggested a requirement that all over-the-counter medication stocks be within open view of a store clerk.

The 1986 tampering case was solved with the arrest and conviction of Stella Nickel of Auburn in 1988.

She is serving a 90-year prison term for putting cyanide into Extra Strength Excedrin capsules that were taken by her husband and Sue Snow, who both died.

Snow helped, but state still dry

BOISE (AP) — Two weeks of wet weather have helped, but the Idaho Water Supply Committee says the southern half of the state remains in the grips of the fifth year of drought in the past six.

The panel of state and federal water supply, snowpack, stream flow and other experts met for the third time this year Thursday for an update on how Idaho is faring as it prepares for the 1991 runoff and growing season.

Peter Palmer, snow survey supervisor for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service in Boise, said "amazing precipitation" so far in March have in some cases almost doubled snowpack in areas of south-central Idaho.

The greatest improvements occurred where they were needed the most, for a change," Palmer said.

Snowpack increased from 40 percent to 58 percent of average in the Boise River drainage and from 30 percent to 58 percent in the Wood and Lost River drainages, among the state's driest.

Still, Palmer said virtually no snow in February "degraded an already pitiful snowpack," and the big percentage jumps so far this month are more a statement about how bad things were before than how good they are now.

As a whole, he said, Idaho is experiencing its lowest snowpack levels since the record drought of 1977, made even worse by the fact that soil moisture and reservoir water storage are depleted from previous dry years.

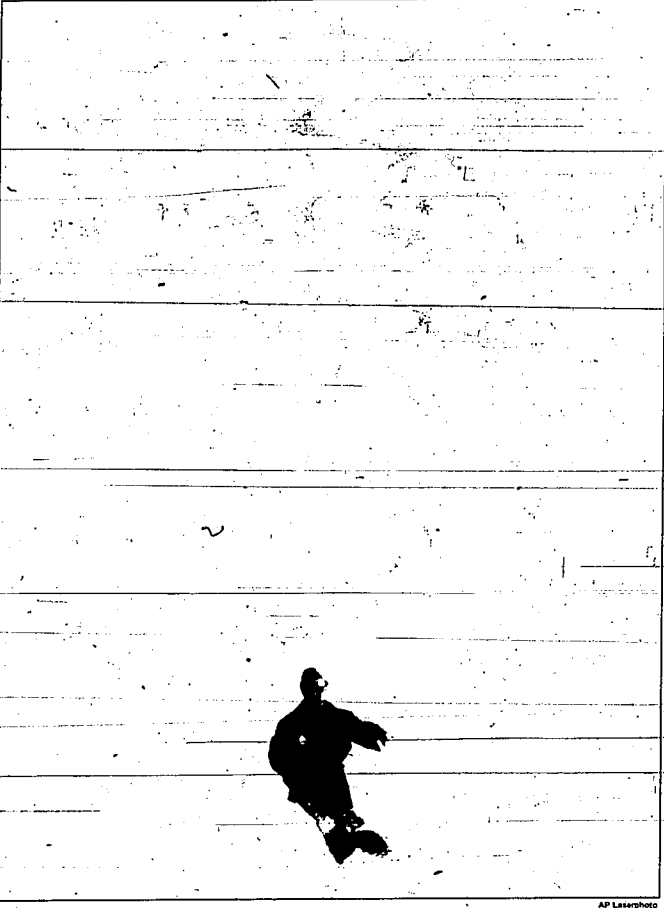
National Weather Service hydrologist Mary Mellema said February precipitation statewide was only 45 percent of normal. While it ranged from well above to only slightly below average in the north, southern

Idaho stations like Ketchum reported as little as 4 percent, Idaho City and Grace 17 percent and McCall 31 percent of normal.

Through the first five months of the water year that began last October, Mellema said Idaho has received 70 percent of its normal precipitation. That compares with 71 percent through February 1990. The difference this year is the cumulative moisture deficit after last year's drought conditions.

But March rainfall is helping, she said. Pocatello, which received only 33 percent of its normal precipitation last month, had been drenched with 2.17 inches through Wednesday — more than 200 percent above average.

And more good news could be on the way. Mellema said the 30-day forecast for Idaho through mid-April indicates near-normal precipitation for most of the state and above normal in the southeastern portion.

Environmentalists claim victory in stopping Utah coyote shooting

CEDAR CITY, Utah (AP) — Environmentalists are claiming victory in their challenge to a U.S. Forest Service plan to carry out a helicopter-based coyote shooting program in the Dixie National Forest.

But forest officials say that victory is a hollow one that will hurt local ranchers.

Dale Robertson, U.S. Forest Service chief in Washington, D.C., announced this week that the Dixie forest's proposed aerial predator control program on the Teasdale and Cedar City ranger districts has been canceled in response to an appeal by the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance in December.

Ken Rait, alliance issues coordinator said "the Forest Service's plan to sanitize the range of coyotes months before the grazing season was biologically, economically, and legally ill-conceived."

Lori Potter, staff attorney for the Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund, said that to have permitted shooting to proceed on the two Dixie districts left the Forest Service vulnerable to legal challenge.

"We are elated that the Forest chief took the time to make the only rational decision that could be made in this instance," Potter said.

However, Robert Meinrod, forestry supervisor for the Dixie National Forest, said that if environmentalists are calling the "decision a victory, they are being very callous

as well as irresponsible.

"When they consider the potential losses for the DNF grazing permittees, they are revealing a lack of

sensitivity for the economic losses to the local livestock owners," he said.

The coyote is not a threatened species, Meinrod said.



Committee chairman offers compromise on sex education bill

BOISE (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Education Committee on Thursday offered a compromise aimed at ending the heated debate over the State Board of Education's regulations for sex education in public schools.



Republican John Hansen of Idaho Falls said the proposal put together by himself and others "might be the only one that brings some people left excited."

Hansen's proposal was offered as an alternative to House-passed legislation that critics claimed would completely prohibit school districts from offering sex education classes.

Republican Rep. Herm Steger, the former Boise school principal, has led the charge

against the board regulations he said mandate sex education as a part of a comprehensive health curriculum. He said the decision on whether students should take sex education, known as the human sexuality and family life section of the board's curriculum, should be left to parents, although critics contend his proposal would not even allow that.

The Senate committee alternative would simply leave the issue of what will be included in any comprehensive health curriculum to local school officials and parents.

"It doesn't say that section shall be ex-

cluded from the curriculum," Steger responded; the committee proposal. "I don't know how I feel about that."

The board has already set in motion a modification to the controversial regulation that would ensure students can decline, in writing, to take the sex education section.

The public debate before the committee mirrored those that occurred in the House earlier this session.

public schools. "We wish teens were getting this information at home. The fact is the majority are not."

But Rick Deighton, a Nampa minister and businessman, disputed contentions that sex education reduces teen pregnancies and the spread of sexual diseases.

He maintained the effect was just the opposite.

Supported by a Caldwell school principal, Deighton said abstinence-based sex education courses are preferable to the course the board has promoted.

Amendment would limit use of peyote to Indian reservations

BOISE (AP) — A bill legalizing Indian use of the hallucinogenic drug peyote has been amended by the House to make it clear that it can be used only on Idaho's five Indian reservations.

The measure cleared the Senate 27-9 last month and a parade of Indians urged the House State Affairs Committee Thursday to go along.

But after a two-hour hearing, the committee voted to put the bill up for amendment to specify that if the drug is legalized, its use will be limited to Indian reservations.

The amendments were adopted later in the day with little debate. "This does not impact the intent," said Rep. Perry Bengson Ahrens, R-Boise.

"It will strengthen the legislation," Indian supporters of the bill were disappointed, because once a bill is amended in one chamber of the Legislature, it must be sent back to the other chamber for approval of the amendments.

In response to a question, Indian witnesses said the Native American Church allows peyote to be used in religious ceremonies only on reservations.

But Rep. Sheila Sorenson, R-Boise, said she wanted it in the law. Sorenson also sponsored an amendment specifying what documents would be needed to identify Indians authorized to purchase peyote in Texas and transport it to Idaho.

Backers of the bill pressed for im-

mediate approval, knowing that if the bill is amended in the House, it has to go back to the Senate for final approval of the amended version.

"How strange," muttered one Indian woman, leaving the committee room after the bill was sidetracked.

Legislators and Indians urged approval of peyote as part of religious ceremonies of the Native American Church.

About 2,500 members of the five Idaho Indian tribes are members of the church, concentrated at the eastern Idaho Fort Hall Reservation.

Church members said peyote is a critical part of the church's ceremonies, and it probably could not survive without it.

Senate will consider bill to shift indigent medical care costs to state

BOISE (AP) — The Senate will be asked to consider another version of legislation shifting funding for medical indigency programs from counties to the state.

The House voted 74-12 for the latest bill on Thursday, sending the measure to the Senate. It's a new version of legislation voted by Gov. Cecil Andrus earlier, and sponsor Rep. Tom Loertscher, R-Idaho Falls, acknowledged the new version might meet the same fate.

"This does not represent by any means a compromise with the gentleman on the second floor (the governor)," he said.

The bill holds out the attraction of \$8 million in property tax cuts at the local level. "But some House members questioned whether that was a real tax cut, or whether other taxes would have to be increased to make up for it."

"I think we are moving into a very dark hole here from which we will never emerge," said Rep. Deanna Vickers, D-Lewiston. "People will be duped. Property tax relief is the main motivation. We didn't tell

people, at the same time that we have to raise other taxes to pay for these things."

In vetoing the first bill, Andrus said it was too expensive and did not go far enough. He called for a new program covering the medically needy.

Loertscher said his new bill includes that program, although it doesn't start until July of next year.

Some Democrats praised the latest version on that basis, although acknowledging there still was a possibility Andrus might veto the second try.

Rep. Jim Stokich, D-Sandpoint, said the new program picks up people with no medical coverage. About Loertscher's work on the matter, he said, "He is a big man and this effort toward compromise puts a couple of inches on him."

Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, said the new version is not perfect. "In the spirit of good government, we should endorse this proposal and send it over to the Senate," he said.

The cost of the vetoed bill was \$1.5 million and Loertscher said the new version would cost \$6.1 million.

Pocatello cited for polluted water near garbage dump

BOISE (AP) — The state Department of Health and Welfare has issued water-quality violation notices to the city of Pocatello, a landowner there, and northern Idaho's Schweitzer Mountain Resort.

The notice issued against Pocatello cites water contamination near the city's abandoned Pocatello Creek landfill.

It was not unexpected. "Still, it's kind of a shock to finally see it in writing," Mayor Peter Angstad said Wednesday.

Besides Pocatello, Health and Welfare's Water Quality Bureau also named Elwin and Fern Anderson as possible violators.

The Andersons own property adjacent to the landfill.

The notice will begin the process of determining how extensive, if any, cleanup will be undertaken at the old landfill east of Pocatello, and what steps the city will take to get fresh drinking water to residents living along Pocatello Creek Road near the abandoned dump.

Angstad said the city has scheduled a meeting March 24 with Walt Poole, the field supervisor for the Department of Environmental Quality office in Pocatello.

"The notice gives us the mechanism to move on the problems and try to figure out which way to go and also how much money may be needed to fix the problems," the mayor said.

Elwin Anderson, a local farmer, said he leased about 40 acres to the city so it could expand its landfill in the 1960s.

"I figured I was doing them a favor," he said. "I didn't have anything to do with who dumped or what they dumped or anything. The city supervised it."

Anderson said he would talk to an attorney before meeting with Poole. The official notice of violation is another chapter in the controversy over whether the old dump is responsible for foul-tasting water in the region.

Over the past five to six years, residents along Pocatello Creek have been hauling water in from friends or buying bottled water at local supermarkets.

Some said their well water was almost impossible to drink.

The discovery of the contamination came in July during state testing of 16 private wells.

Officials said the results revealed abnormally high levels of selenium, chlorides, sulfates, trichloroethylene and tetrachloroethylene.

But in the notice, state officials listed only manganese, iron and chloride.

The Pocatello Creek landfill was used by the city of Alameda in the mid-1950s to the early 1970s.

It was closed when Bannock County opened the landfill on Fort Hall Mine Road south of the city.

City gets state grant for sewer

BOISE (AP) — The eastern Idaho town of Sugar City has been awarded a \$100,000 Idaho Community Development Block Grant to extend sewer lines to the newly expanded Sun-Glo of Idaho Inc. potato-processing plant.

That will mean the creation of 10 new jobs, including at least six for low- to moderate-income employees, Gov. Cecil Andrus said.

Sun-Glo is proposing a \$2.3 million, three-to four-year multi-phase expansion of its Sugar City plant. According to the Idaho Economic Advisory Council, 20 to 30 new positions eventually will be created for development and production of new products.

UI says state to blame for water citations

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho officials contend the state is partially to blame for nine citations the Moscow school has received from the Environmental Protection Agency for federal drinking water violations.

The university could face penalties of up to \$5,000 for failing to adequately test for coliform bacteria and volatile organic chemicals such as solvents or gasoline. Six of the violations stem from coliform bacteria levels in the school's water system exceeding safe levels.

The Idaho Division of Environmental Quality has 30 days to enforce the laws or the EPA will issue an administrative order forcing compliance by 13 Idaho water systems the agency cited for failing to conduct adequate tests.

University of Idaho officials said Wednesday that the unacceptable coliform levels are nagging problems that they plan to correct by overhauling the antiquated domestic water system this spring. That includes scouring and repainting the inside of a 500,000-gallon water tank and construction of new campus water lines.

On two occasions last fall, state health officials suspended bottled water orders on the University of Idaho because of high bacteria counts in the campus drinking water supply. "As far as we're concerned, this is much ado about nothing," said Ken Hall, the school's physical plant director.

Milsap goes 'Back to the Grindstone' for Jackpot shows

Ronnie Milsap's new album is called "Back to the Grindstone," but making music has never proven much of a chore for the versatile Nashville star.

Calling earlier this week from a tour stop in Orlando, Fla., Milsap spoke excitedly about the new RCA disc, which was just released Monday.

Milsap - who will appear at Cactus Pete's tonight and Saturday - is known primarily for country hits including "It Was Almost Like a Song," "Stranger in My House," "There's No Getting Over Me" and "I Wouldn't Have Missed it for the World."

But he's always thrown a few curves his fans' way, and "Back to the Grindstone" continues that tradition.

One song (and possible future single), "Love Certified," features a soulful duet with Patti LaBelle.

"All Is Fair in Love and War" revives rockabilly, while "Spare the Rod (Love the Child)" has a gospel groove underpinning its synthesizer-driven plea against child abuse and neglect.

Milsap also recently produced "Almost Like a Song," written by John Hiatt, who stopped by to help put the bluesy track on tape. It will soon be heard on the soundtrack to "Switch," a new movie directed by Blake Edwards. Former-Dixie-Strait guitarist Mark Knopfler and the Boys Choir of Harlem helped out on Milsap's new album, too.

Milsap also recently produced "Almost Like a Song," an autobiography written with friend Tom Carter and published by McGraw-Hill. The singer said it has sold 100,000 copies in hardback, with a paperback version due this fall.

An excerpt in the current issue of Country Music magazine reveals a childhood any kid would be lucky to survive, much less go on to become a major entertainer.

Born blind, Milsap was abandoned a year later by his mother. His father took him to be raised by his own mother and stepfather, who treated him kindly.

But occasional contacts with his mother continued to scar the boy. Once, she gave him a dollar, only to ask for it back two days later.

Another time, when he was five or six, his mother brought along a baby daughter. "Feel her eyes, Ron," she told him. "They're real clear, not like yours. She's not like you, and she didn't shame me. She can see."

But the greatest blow came at age 14, when Milsap was attending the North Carolina School for the Blind. A housefather proctoring study hall slipped a friend of Milsap's, knocking the partially sighted boy's glasses to the floor and breaking them.

Milsap told the proctor "You didn't have to slap him!" The adult then smacked Milsap on the face.

"Until then, Milsap had slight "light vision," in his left eye. He couldn't see forms or tell distances, but he could detect a bit of light if he stared into direct sunlight. But the blow from the housefather ended even that.

"When I grew up in the '50s and '60s, it was more common for that type of thing to happen," Milsap said of his encounter with the housefather. "Thank goodness

times have changed in the educational system, and actually whipping the students doesn't happen so much anymore."

"It was a struggle to relieve some of those things I really hadn't thought about in a long time much less want to write about," he added. "One thing about it, I found out how hard writing a book is. I've found making records is a whole lot easier."

Although his blindness has doubtless caused him pain, Milsap places his handicap in perspective.

"I don't think I would be in music today if I had been born sighted," he said. "I would probably have grown up in the Smoky Mountains of western North Carolina and found something to do there. I was comfortable with it - I certainly would never have had anyone to develop the talent they discovered when I was in school in Raleigh."

Nor has blindness prevented him from thoroughly enjoying his concerts.

"There's nothing like a live performance," Milsap said. "That electricity is the most special thing."

"It's something you can feel," he added. "You don't have to be able to read the expression on someone's face to know."

"Maybe I'd be better at what I do if I could read that expression, but at the same time, you know when it's happening," he said. "You can feel when it's working and when people are into it."

Baby shower literally helped turn unwed mother's life around

DEAR ABBY: The letter you published from the office women, in conflict over whether a baby shower should be given for an unwed mother-to-be, revived a long-forgotten memory.

In 1962, I was 17 and had just graduated from high school. I had to give up two scholarships to college and take a job because I was pregnant and unmarried. In those days, most unwed mothers were sent away to live their babies, then gave them up for adoption so that no one in the family would be embarrassed. I chose to stay home and keep my baby.

I'm sure my parents were embarrassed and disappointed in me. The baby's father and I were immature, and a silly quarrel had caused our breakup. I was so depressed that I considered suicide on a daily basis.

In my seventh month of pregnancy, 30 women from my office gave me a baby shower! I can't begin to tell you how much it meant to me to have those wonderful women shower me with their good wishes and much-needed gifts. They literally saved my life and my baby's life.

That shower turned my life around. After that, I was able to hold my head up. When my son was a year old, his father and I got together and were married. Five years later, we had another son. I worked while my husband finished college, and after he graduated, I went to college and graduated in 1977. Today, our firstborn is married and has a son of his own.

Abby, when I think of how close I came to ending my life, I shudder. I also thank God for those wonderful co-workers who "didn't" ponder whether it was proper to give a baby shower for an unmarried girl. That shower brought me out of the worst depression of my life.

Your advice was right on, Abby. Keep up the good work.

DEAR ABBY: I am married to a



man who is a wonderful person, but he has a habit that drives me crazy—he's a fidgeter. There is never a moment that he is not tapping his fingers, jiggling his leg or wiggling in some way. This even goes on in the bed. I have tried to ignore his fidgeting and have even asked him to stop several times, but he claims he's not aware that he is doing it.

It bothers me to the point where I want to just scream at him to knock it off, because it makes me nervous to be around him. We try not to be too critical of each other's behavior, so I feel guilty asking him to stop, but I'm getting angrier and angrier about his fidgeting because I don't think he cares about the effect it has on me. (I can feel my blood pressure rising when he starts.)

I think he could control this behavior if he wanted to, but do I have a right to insist on it?

Hyperactive 'Hard Way' serves up an entertaining buddy movie

'HOLLYWOOD — Is Los Angeles the world's principality of palm trees, power lunches and media ephemera? Is New York a capital of culture-loaded wise guys, chic rich and mean, vibrantly sleazy streets?

In "The Hard Way," the moviemakers ram these two clichés together with a tongue-in-cheek vengeance. It's a buddy-buddy movie in which the two main characters—a nail-hard Manhattan homicide cop (James Woods as John Moss) and a winsomely cute action-movie (Michael J. Fox as Nick Lang)—become symbols of their respective cities. In it, New York declares war on wimp-ridden L.A. and L.A. wins New York over with charm, guile and movie deals.

Fox's Lang and Woods' Moss, thrown together because the actor is researching the cop for an upcoming movie, are the male-bonding equivalents of the Roadrunner and Wile E. Coyote. Their relationship is different, but it's just as stylized, just as fraught with physical peril. Lang gets hurt—head-over-heels—out a barroom window; Moss goes flying down the street on a tow-truck's swinging door. In between them are the love interest (Annabella Scierra) and the death interest: a grinning serial killer who calls himself the Party Crasher (Stephen Lang).

It's a big, blowzy, hard-racing, half-bright movie that comes at you a mile a minute: hyperactive, packed to the brim, jabbering away like a

speed freak on a roller-coaster. Its real premise is that movie cops and real-life cops, like L.A. and N.Y., are oil and water, especially when one of them is used to car phones and poisside haute cuisine and the other favors a bat on the skull and Frog Dogs smothered with mustard.

The director, John Badham, knows how to handle this kind of big, brassy pop entertainment, and he leaves reality behind quite early. He's dealing less with impressions

than with all the L.A.-N.Y. images sprayed onto the screen in two decades of action movies. His "Hard Way" is like a conventional, over-dressed buddy-buddy cop movie, an old-fashioned "Lethal Weapon" or "Raining Scurves," with the screening-room wisecracks built right into the script.

The numerous inside film-making gags, on everything from sequels and promos to Mel Gibson's bottom to Michael J. Fox's height (the prime running gag in the movie),

also point up its main incongruity: the fantasy land of L.A. seems so much more real than the Manhattan grit.

In a way, Michael J. Fox is fleeing into the same sort of place he's trying to avoid, the kind with Roman numerals in the title—and the whole movie is a rumination on buddy-buddy scripts. The villain, known as the Party Crasher, who often seems like a frustrated screenwriter, composes all his murders on a computer,

and at one point Lang bursts in on Moss and announces he knows what's about to happen because they've just reached "this act." The characters even flee into one of Lang's movies ("Raiders of the Lost Ark" parody) and, before the end, they've gotten swallowed up in the marketing campaign too: all four of them clambering around a huge three-dimensional billboard with Lang's face puffing smoke into the Times Square night.

The R-rated "The Hard Way" is loud, brash, racy and, on its own shallow terms, fairly entertaining. Die-hard fans of buddy-buddy movies will appreciate the often sarcastic dialogue, the garish over-the-top flamboyance with which Badham—and the screenwriters—hurt around all the clichés of the genre from "Hill Street Blues" station-house clutter to the monstrous supervillain. Playing the fanatical Crasher, Stephen Lang has Ruiger Hauer's hairdo and Ron Lieberman's smile; he's a real scene-chewer.

Less hardened audiences may object to the unrelenting, unmodulated tempo, the crash-bang cartoon simplifications and the silly way the tag-team of screenwriters drag in Moss romance and turn it into a triangle. Trapped between Woods and Fox, Annabella Scierra's Susan might as

well be walking around wearing a sandwich board emblazoned "Obturator Girlfriend" on one side and "Humanizing Element" on the other. But it is Woods and Fox who are the movie's core. They are an interesting duo, though they don't exactly show on-screen chemistry. Often they seem to be in the middle of an actor's duel, pushing their roles naturally to the edge of caricature—and their best scene is a male-bonding homoerotic conundrum staged in that machismo-soaked Manhattan bar, McSorley's.

Badham directs the dialogue as if he were trying to remake "His Girl Friday." The actors not only step on lines, they keep kicking each other's lines in the shin.

Woods uses his trademark battering, live-wire intensity to extravagant satiric effect, jamming down hard on every phrase, letting his chin dart around madly. Fox counters by continually flickering his eyes around in those hurt, burnt, boyish looks of his, playing with his lip, letting his spaniel eyes brush around the room, plaintively.

Starring in for the Big Apple and La Land, Woods dynamically plays the abrasive cynic to Fox's sultry, laid-back dilettante. They're good, but if they had more to work with they might really be dynamic. Instead, they have to pull back and watch the dynamic blow up all around them.

'New Jack City' debuts with strong 2nd to 'Silence of the Lambs' at box office

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The debut of the inner-city drama "New Jack City," marked by violence at several theaters, produced strong box-office results.

According to recently released figures, "New Jack City" made \$7 million over the weekend while playing on just 862 screens — good for second place on the box-office charts behind "The Silence of the Lambs."

"The Silence of the Lambs," featuring Jodie Foster as an FBI trainee after a psychotic killer, claimed the top spot for the fourth straight week on ticket sales of \$8.9 million, according to Entertainment Data Inc.

Alterations broke out at several theaters as "New Jack City," a gritty look at a drug lord and the police officers laboring to bring him down, opened last Friday. One man was killed in New York and disturbances erupted in Chicago, New Jersey, Nevada and Los Angeles.

The film stars Wesley Snipes, Judd Nelson, rap star Ice-T and Mario Van Peebles, who also directed.

In third place was another new movie, "The Hard Way," starring Michael J. Fox as an obnoxious actor who wants to pattern a new role after a hard-as-nails cop, played by James Woods. It grossed \$6.3 million in its premiere weekend.

"Sleeping With the Enemy," a drama with Julia Roberts as a battered wife, was in fourth with \$6.1 million.

After just one week, the \$40 million rock movie "The Doors" plunged 34 percent despite appearing on 364 more screens. It took fifth place with \$6 million.

In sixth was Kevin Costner's Western "Dances With Wolves," which grossed \$3.4 million. It was followed in seventh by "Alone."

The comedy is now the sixth biggest-grossing film ever with receipts of \$245.9 million to date.

The story of a Union officer who becomes assimilated with a tribe of Sioux, it has all the elements of epic vastness, astonishing action sequences, exotic-seeming characters but because it's more concerned with character than spectacle, its epic quality becomes engaging, never self-congratulatory. Beautifully memorable and full of humor, it's one of the most winning films of the year.

THE DOORS (R), A sometimes

terrific, incendiary bio of Lizard King and Vietnam War-era rebel Jim Morrison of the Doors. Portraying one of his youthful idols, Oliver Stone tries to put us right in the hot core of the action, while also lyricizing it, giving it a stylized framework. Twenty-five Doors songs, performed by the Doors—with occasional vocals by star Val Kilmer, an eerie visual match for Morrison—provide a constant choric commentary and Stone, as usual, blasts our ears and scorches our eyes. If he doesn't quite blow our minds, it's still a hell of a ride and a great, roaring rock movie.

KINDERGARTEN COP (PG-13), The gentling of Arnold Schwarzenegger: first presented as a subtitled lone-wolf cop with a taste for vicious vigilante tactics and gradually tamed into a family-loving pussycat by his undercover-surveillance job as a kindergarten teacher. Director Ivan Reitman and the usual consortium of writers barely miss a trick—or a marketing hook—of all the recent "trailer" movies—films that resemble elongated trailers—this may be the most fool-proof.

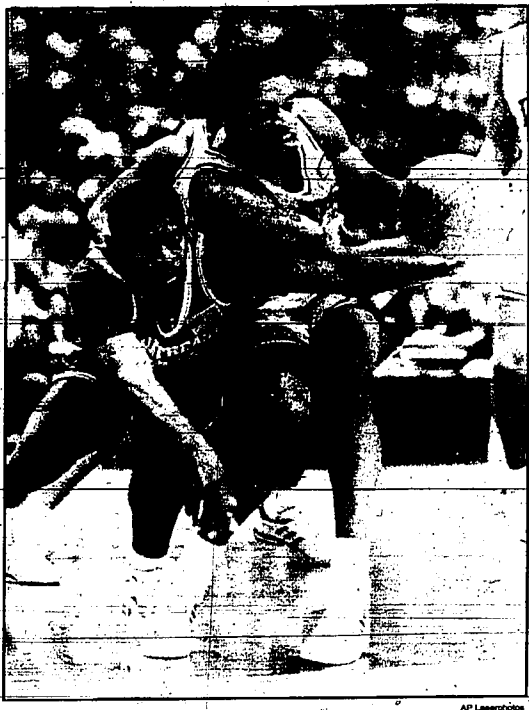

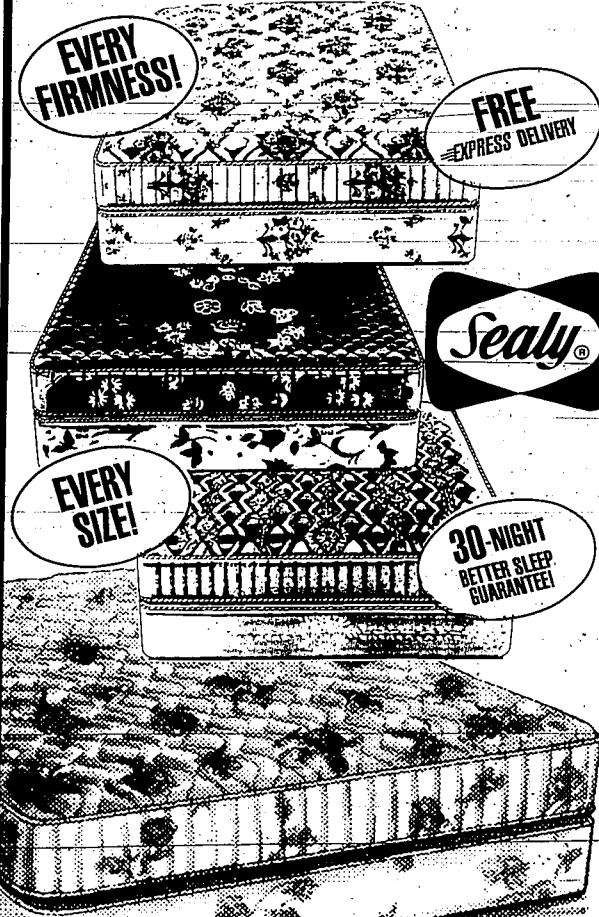

Richmond upsets 2nd-seeded Syracuse

Bob Knight was right. Dick Tarrant is one fine basketball coach.

Tarrant went from unknown to sensation when Richmond beat Knight's Indiana Hoosiers, the defending national champions, in the first round of the 1988 NCAA tournament. Knight insisted it was no upset, because Dick Tarrant teams are capable of beating anyone.

Tarrant proved it again on Thursday, when his 15th-seeded Spiders scored a 73-69 first-round knockout over Syracuse in the East Regional.

"I had heard Richmond was capable of upsetting some people, and I guess they proved it," Syracuse coach Jim Boeheim said.

Curtis Blair fired 18 points and six assists to lead the Spiders (22-9) over Syracuse (26-6), which closed its season with first-round losses in the Big East Conference tournament at the NCAA.

Richmond led throughout and was on top by 10 with nine minutes to play. Syracuse got as close as 70-69 with 32 seconds left on a running one-hander by Billy Owens, who led the Orangemen with 22 points.

Eugene Burroughs made two free throws with 21 seconds to go for a three-point Spider lead, and Syracuse missed its last chance when Owens and Michael Edwards missed 3-pointers.

Blair, fouled with seven-tenths of a second to go, made the final free throw as Tarrant hugged his assistants and players along the sideline.

"This is another great feather in our bonnet," Tarrant said.

Brewers trim payroll, deal Parker to Angels

It sure didn't take long for the Milwaukee Brewers to start cutting their payroll.

Shunned on Wednesday by the loss of pitcher Ted Higuera because of a torn rotator cuff after signing the left-hander to a four-year, \$13 million deal this winter, the Brewers sent Dave Parker and his \$1.4 million salary (plus incentives) to the California Angels on Thursday for promising outfielder Dante Bichette.

Parker, 39, was acquired by Milwaukee as a free agent in December 1989. He batted .289 with 21 home runs and 92 RBIs in 157 games last season as a DH.

"We needed left-handed power to balance our lineup," Angels manager Doug Rader said. "Part of this equation was to afford Dante Bichette a chance to play and develop, and we couldn't do that using him sporadically."

Parker was named the American League's outstanding designated hitter of the year for a second consecutive year in 1990. He has a .293 career batting average with 328 homers and 1,434 RBIs. Bichette, 27, who joined the Angels organization as a 1984 draft pick and made his major league debut Sept. 5, 1989, hit .255 with 13 home runs and 53 RBIs in 109 games last season. He has shown flashes of potential but has yet to play a full season as an every-day starter.

Parker spent the first 14 seasons of his career with the Pittsburgh Pirates and Cincinnati Reds. He played for Oakland in 1988 and 1989, helping the A's to two pennants and a World Series, before moving to Milwaukee.

"I respect the man greatly for the way he projects himself and the way he has his influence on the ballgame," Rader said. "I think Dave Parker could walk into the middle of Grand Canyon and make his presence felt."

Meanwhile, the spring training injuries continued to mount. "Rick Cerone of the New York Mets left Thursday's game against Cincinnati at Fort St. Lucie after the top of the first inning with a fractured ring finger on his glove hand."

The 25-year-old outfielder, who stole 40 bases in 63 games last year as a rookie, sustained the injury while batting in the seventh inning.

After hitting a line drive to right field, Cole turned to run to first, tripped, and landed on his right shoulder.

Boston right-fielder Tom Brunansky will be sidelined for a couple of days with a toe injury suffered in his backyard.

Boo birds follow Bucs' left fielder

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP) — Pittsburgh Pirates left fielder Barry Bonds, the National League's Most Valuable Player last season, may be establishing himself as Spring Training's Least Liked Player.

Almost everywhere Bonds has appeared so far in the exhibition season, he has been routinely booed by the normally sedate spring training crowds.

In January, Bonds criticized the Pirates for failing to offer him a long-term contract.

He then had a training camp shouting match last week with club publicist Jim Iachima out of field instructor Bill Vichita and manager Jim Leyland.

It all happened in view of the fans watching the workout at Pittsburgh's Pirate City complex.

"I'm not letting the fans bother me," Bonds said. "I'm not worrying about it. That's how it goes."

Bonds has played to a crowd a few times — this spring — in the opener against the Boston Red Sox at Winter Haven, he turned the boos to cheers when he made a diving catch in left field. In response, he grinned and tipped his cap.

When the Pirates played the Chicago White Sox in Sarasota a game callback to the home fans in Pittsburgh — Bonds

was booed again when he stepped to the plate for the first time.

"This time, he made a grandiose display of calling time and doffing his helmet."

"I might as have some fun with it all," Bonds said. "It might as well make the best of it because it could get a lot worse."

Bonds doesn't blame the fans. "I finally figured it all out," Bonds said with a smile. "You writers are scaring the fans. You're the ones that write the stuff that the fans read and believe. They read the papers and go by what you say. They can't get the full story."

"It's not about money," Bonds said. "I never said I was upset about the money. I was making. Never. I didn't have any comment after I lost to arbitration this year."

"What if I'm upset with me is respect. I want to be respected by everyone, for who I am and I want people to just let me be. If I'm only worth \$1 million pay me \$1. Just give me my respect and let me be myself."

The Pirates are not worried about the boos after Bonds.

"It won't bother Barry at all," Leyland said. "If anything, it will cause him to turn it up another notch."

Good spring training can help successful surge into regular season

DUNEDIN, Fla. (AP) — We all know that spring training records don't mean anything, right?

Well, maybe wrong. Because, surprising as it might seem, a spring surge can become a springboard to success.

Consider this: In the last three full exhibition seasons, the five teams that had the best records all went on to win championships.

The Toronto Blue Jays are believers, sort of. They have the best spring training record in baseball during the last decade, and their good springs have led to great seasons.

In 1985, Toronto went 19-9 in March and wound up winning its first American League East title. In 1989, the Blue Jays went 21-10 in Florida and won their second crown.

"Obviously, if you had your choice, you'd rather win as many as you can in the spring," Toronto infielder Rance Mulliniks said. "That's the point of the game, no matter when you play. You'd like to get going in the right direction right from the start."

In 1987, Los Angeles and the New York Mets each went 12-14 in the spring. The next year they both rebounded, the Dodgers going 21-11

and the Mets 19-10, and they met in the National League playoffs.

A sudden improvement in the spring of 1987 may have been an indicator of good things to come. The Cardinals went 12-15 in 1986, but went 17-6 the next spring and reached the playoffs. There, they met San Francisco, which had gone 20-10 in March.

Minnesota beat the Cardinals in the 1987 World Series. The Twins never been a good spring-training team, dipping to 11-19 in 1986. But they bounced back to 14-10 the next year, and won their first series.

"We just came to play from the beginning," recalled Frank Viola, then the World Series MVP and now with the Mets. "It was an attitude we took

in the spring, that we were out to win."

This month, Minnesota, Seattle, San Diego and Cubs got off to the best starts, all at 5-1. Milwaukee was worst at 1-6.

While exceptional springs may set up good seasons, there are notable exceptions.

San Diego had the best record in last year's lockout-shortened spring at 12-2, but struggled all season.

The Chicago Cubs, notorious for their poor spring records in Arizona, went 9-23 in 1989 but won the NL East title. Detroit, an average spring team, was 9-20 in 1987 and went on to take the AL East.

to treat me like that is really nice. It's respect. They have respected me for a long time."


And that makes a fill-in role just fine with Wilson, who played the last two years in a utility role for the Kansas City Royals after 11 years as a star.

Day of reckoning: Grizzlies take on No. 1 Runnin' Rebs

MISSOULA, Mont. — It happened the other night.

Baby-faced Gary Kane, a freshman guard who has one of those "Up With People" smiles and actually drives home on most weekends just to eat his mom's cooking, had a vision. Or was it a nightmare?

While reading a chapter on Japanese economics, Kane turned the page and suddenly, there he was.

Anderson Hunt.

That would be the same Anderson Hunt who plays guard for No. 1-ranked and undefeated Nevada Las Vegas. And everyone knows that UNLV is the supposed greatest-ever-assembled, the team expected to win a second consecutive national championship, the team predicted to wipe the floor Friday night with 64th-seeded Montana, as if the Grizzlies were an NCAA tournament-issued chamois cloth.

Kane stared at the page for 45 minutes, his eyes transfixed on the inner workings of the Japanese market system but his mind spellbound by the thought of playing against Hunt, the same guy he watched on television

half a dozen times this season.

"After a while I just closed the book," he said. "It was getting no work done."

Roger Fasting, another Montana guard, has been consumed by the idea of stepping onto the same court with Las Vegas. It is the last thing he remembers before falling asleep and the first thing he thinks of when he awakes.

"People talk about David and Goliath," he said. "Well, I'd say we're David's younger brother and they're Goliath's dad."

Or worse. One oddsmaker, Danny Sheridan of USA Today, made Montana a billion-to-one shot to win the NCAA A tournament. A billion to one. David got better odds against the Philistine.

"You kind of have to laugh it off," said center Daren Engelland, who is being asked to stop UNLV's dunking machine, George Ackles. "I guess if you're going to climb a mountain, you might as well climb Mount Everest. I just didn't think I'd climb it in a pair of tennis shoes."

Nobody did. When the NCAA selection committee released the pairings last Sunday, you could have heard a jaw drop in this city

of 72,000. At Coach Stew Morrill's house, where the Montana team was gathered to watch the tournament show, no one uttered a sound when the Grizzlies' name was placed next to UNLV's. "A moment of silence — for about 30 seconds," is how Fasting described it.

Morrill expected a low seeding, but this? Sure, no one confuses the Grizzlies with the Big East, but the Grizzlies did win the regular-season title and the conference tournament. That should count for something, right?

According to the selection committee, it was the 64th and final place in the NCAA tournament — take it or leave it. Montana, which hasn't been invited to the tournament since 1975, gladly took it. But

"Before this started, I said that if we won the regular season and our tournament that I wouldn't care if we played the Lakers," Morrill said. "Hey, I didn't mean it, guys. UNLV is like a pro team."

Strange how this works out. Montana's last NCAA appearance was Jerry Turkantown's first as a UNLV coach.

The Rebels beat the Grizzlies in a second-

round consolation game.

Also, that 1975 Montana team was coached by the combative Jud Heathcote, who later won a national championship at Michigan State.

If all goes as predicted, Heathcote and Turkantown could meet again in the West Region semifinal. Of course, once a Montana man, always a Montana man: Earlier this week, Heathcote spent considerable time on the phone with Morrill swapping strategies to beat Las Vegas.

Everyone, it seems, has a plan to upset UNLV. A high school coach in the Montana town, always a Montana man: Morrill wanting to pitch something called "the Butterfly Defense." Guaranteed to work, the prep coach said. Morrill declined.

A Montana psychology professor offered his services: Morrill politely said no thanks. What he really needs is a 7-2 center who can shoot and has at least a postseason's worth of eligibility left.

"I've got a stack of messages this high," he said.

The phone rings. Morrill does nothing at first and then reaches across his desk, punches the phone jack and pulls out the cord.

"My favorite weapon," he said.

This is Morrill's fifth season as Montana's head coach. He has never won fewer than 18 games and has never lost more than 11. In fact, there hasn't been a losing season here since 1970-71, which is why Heathcote was hired.

When Heathcote left, Jim Brandenberg came in and won 31 games in two seasons (that is, if you don't count the 11 games Montana had to forfeit in 1977 because of an ineligible player).

Mike Montgomery succeeded him and averaged 19 victories during his eight-year tenure before accepting the Stanford job.

Morrill, a Montana assistant for each of those eight years, was offered the job 90 minutes after Montgomery resigned.

Despite the impressive list of victories, Montana had only the "one NCAA" appearance. Grizzly followers, as fervent and loyal as any fans, began to get restless.

"It's not easy in Missoula," Montgomery said. "They expect a lot. They live in Montana because they want to and to them, there's no reason in their minds why you can't beat everybody every night."

Celtic guard undergoes knee surgery
BOSTON — Boston Celtics guard John Bagley underwent surgery Thursday that successfully repaired cartilage damage in his right knee, but he is expected to miss the remainder of the season, team officials said.

Arthroscopic surgery performed by Dr. John Bergfeld repaired a cartilage fracture of the bone in the knee, officials said. The surgery was performed at Cleveland Clinic in Cleveland.

Bagley, in his ninth year, was acquired by the Celtics from New Jersey last season. After starting as point guard in several games, Bagley played sparingly due to a separated left shoulder and a hamstring strain.

NCAA says Illinois not cooperating
CHICAGO — The chief investigator in the NCAA probe of recruiting violations at Illinois says the school did not cooperate fully with the investigation.

In November, the NCAA infractions committee barred Illinois from postseason play as part of sanctions for rule violations and a fining the school lacked institutional control of its basketball program.

On Wednesday, Randy Rueckert, the investigator, said he believes the NCAA has been unfairly criticized as being too tough in the Illinois probe. And Rueckert said he believes Notre Dame star LaPhonso Ellis was telling the truth when he told the NCAA that Illinois had offered him money to enroll.

But Illinois athletic director John Mackovic said in a statement, "It is impossible for us to see how anyone could conclude the University of Illinois didn't cooperate fully."

"Furthermore, it is clear the university and Mr. Rueckert have a different understanding of the facts in the case."

Illinois was cleared of major charges, including an allegation that an assistant coach offered money and cars to recruit Ellis and Deon Thomas. The school vigorously disputed the NCAA's other findings.

Rueckert, who left the NCAA last fall and now is practicing law in Chicago, said Illinois didn't cooperate fully, as, for example, in the investigation of misuse of student complimentary tickets.

"I was asked for the complimentary ticket list early in the investigation, and I didn't get it until the 14th hour," Rueckert said. The infractions committee eventually cited Illinois for numerous ticket violations.

Ontario puts SkyDome up for sale
TORONTO — The Ontario government is trying to sell its majority ownership of the debt-ridden SkyDome to interested buyers, a key figure in the negotiations said today.

Bob White, head of the Canadian auto workers union, said that under one proposal, private business would assume the domed stadium's \$355-million debt in return for the province's 51-per-cent share of the stadium.

The stadium is the home of the Toronto Blue Jays and Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League.

White was appointed by Premier Bob Rae last fall to head a team to renegotiate the stadium agreement between the province and its 30 corporate partners.

"Our committee is trying to find financial arrangements, so some members of the consortium would take over the dome," White said.

He said the committee has exchanged proposals with members of the consortium — including Brascan, Labatt's, Ford and the Toronto Sun — in the hopes of "forming a proposal to get the province out of the dome."

The consortium is receptive to the idea but details are still being worked out, he said, adding he hopes to conclude the negotiations within a month.

White said the SkyDome debt could climb to more than \$570 million over five years.

Palmer expects PGA tourney money to slow

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The economy dictates that there will be a slowdown in the enormous growth rate of PGA Tour purses, Arnold Palmer said.

"Everything I see and hear, things I'm told by business associates, says purses will stay up, but I think we'll see them staying steady for a while, leveling off," Palmer said.

The 61-year-old Hall of Famer was looking at the financial side of the game from his position as a tournament sponsor.

He has seen purses on the pro golf tour go from a total of about \$46 million in the rookie season of 1955 to more than \$46 million last year.

He was the first player to reach \$1 million in career earnings. It took him 13 years to do it.

In the past two years, however, four players have won \$1 million or more in one season.

Most of the growth has taken place in the past few years, with purses more than doubling between 1984 and 1990.

"A few years ago, I felt purses were moving into the area of inflation a little too fast," Palmer said.

That period of enormous growth, he said, has put "tourneys — almost all of the tournaments now offer at least \$1 million — at a level from which it will be difficult to advance."

At least four Tour events either have lost their commercial sponsors, or are in the last year of a contract that they know will not be renewed.

"I think the tour, in general, is in solid shape financially," Palmer said. "I think they'll be able to fill in any vacancies."

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Some added power and that old, familiar precision—enabled—Nick Faldo—to compile a bogey-free 67 and move within a stroke of the lead in the Nestle Invitational Thursday in his first competitive start of the year.

Faldo, heavier and stronger than he was in 1990 victories in the Masters and British Opens, said he found "a bit more tweak with the driver" as a result of an off-season conditioning program.

Faldo was tied for third with Buddy Gardner and Clarence Rose.

Rocco Mediate, making his first start since winning the Doran Open two weeks ago, was another stroke back at 68.

Also at four under par were Mark O'Meara, Nolan Henke, Davis Love III, Andrew Magee, Leonard Thompson and Don Fooley.

Robert Gomez, who won this title with an eagle-2 on the final hole last year, struggled to a 76.

Greg Norman, the victim of Gomez' 1990 heroics, and Curtis Strange were in a large group at 70.

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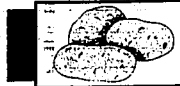
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Critically acclaimed 'Shannon's Deal' receives return engagement invitation

No, Philadelphia attorney Jack Shannon didn't make the deal himself with NBC Entertainment Chairman Brandon Tartikoff, but on Saturday, March 23, "Shannon's Deal," which is returning to the network, airs a special preview episode.

"Brandon did personally assure me last May we'd be back," says Stan Rogow, executive producer of the critically acclaimed show that had a tryout last spring on NBC. "I've also ensured that our time slot won't be moved around as many times as it was last season, when we were used kind of defensively. I knew it was bad when my own parents called and told me they couldn't find it (on the schedule)."

All past things considered, Rogow seems relatively unconcerned with network politics. Rather, he almost seems to feel his show's return was mandated by a sense of noblesse oblige. The show, which stars Jamey Sheridan as a lawyer putting his life back together after a severe run-in with his compulsive gambling habit, was showered with good reviews, not only by television critics but by prestigious film magazines.

"It's flattering that the media picked up not only on the content of the show, but (on) the kind of talent involved," Rogow says. "When a show like ours is written up in something like Film Comment, that's a whole new kind of audience, which will tune in as soon as they hear it's on. It's not the kind of audience that watches six hours of prime-time TV a night. This gives us a better demo-

graphic and helps the ratings."

Most of the talent involved in "Shannon's Deal" comes with a decidedly non-television pedigree. Rogow says the character of Jack was based on his own experiences as a lawyer in a Boston ghetto in the early '70s, "where," he says, "I'd rather make a deal than spend the client's money going to court."

John Sayles ("The Return of the Secaucus Seven," "Matewan," "Eight Men Out") created the series. Almost all of the directors and writers of last season's episodes came from film backgrounds. "This season, we're going to have an episode written by Joan Tewkesbury, who got an Academy Award for "Nashville" (1975), and another by Eugene Corr, who directed "Desert Bloom" (1986). And our special two-hour movie is directed by Tom Rickman, who did "Coal

Miner's Daughter" (1980). Tom had written our season opener last year, but he was heartbroken he couldn't direct, because he was called away to do a rewrite on a (Steven) Spielberg film."

How did Rogow round up talent of this caliber? "Some of these people I knew, and the show has fans," he explains. "The word gets around. Hopefully we offer a unique opportunity to work with the voices that our characters provide. This show has a good cachet. It started with John Sayles. We've consistently been a magnet for all different kinds of talent."

big hit flick. The reason wasn't fear but good taste. "I don't think this is the proper time to go over there and talk about a movie," he told me.

Q: Why doesn't an accomplished actor such as Jon Voight make more films? — D. O'T.

A: The Academy Award-winning Voight is experiencing the problems of all actors who are not on the "A" list with filmmakers and studios. The topnotch scripts go to the hot box-office stars and the pickings are lean by the time they trickle down. Voight, 52, has spent the last five years of his career involved in the writing of a film called "Eternity," in which he eventually starred. It turned out to be unreleasable and will go straight to video, where its success is unlikely as well.

Q: We keep hearing terrible things about Richard Pryor's health. Just how sick is he? — B.S.

A: There's little wonder why you've been hearing those rumors about Pryor's medical condition. After he nearly immolated himself in a narcotics-related accident a few years back, Pryor was rumored to be an AIDS victim. It wasn't so. Nonetheless, right up to the present Richard remains disturbingly gaunt, although able to work. He is currently co-starring with pal Gene Wilder in a new comedy titled "Another You." He's very thin but in good spirits. Richard tells me he'll go into the hospital as soon as shooting is concluded to have some unspecified "dental work" done. The work is major, he concedes, and he hopes to return soon to robust good health.

Q: What's this about Mickey Rooney writing a book about how to preserve a happy marriage? How would he know? — H.V.

A: Good question. I've lost count on how many wives Rooney has had — seven or eight, I think. On the other hand, a man who's been through that many marriages must have learned something. But to your question, Mickey signed a contract with a major publisher. He's already written his autobiography, which hits the bookstores in April. Next is a couple of novels and something titled "Mickey Rooney's Guide to a Happy Marriage." Don't take the title seriously, Mickey and his publisher certainly don't! Q: Now that the Japanese own a big Hollywood studio, aren't movie stars like Tom Selleck all of a sudden busy bowing and scraping? — F.K.

A: There's an unpleasant tone to the question you and many Selleck fans have asked that bothers Tom. He's making a movie called "Tokyo Diamond," for the studio owned by MCA Inc., the company that the giant Japanese electronics maker Matsushita is buying for \$6.59 billion. Is Tom currying favor with the new owners? Nope, he says. The project was approved long before the big deal went through. There have been and will be no script changes, he emphasizes. Tom plays an over-the-hill player for the New York Yankees who hopes to find greener baseball pastures in the land of the rising sun.

Q: Do you think the late "Saturday Night Live" star Gilda Radner would still be alive if her husband at the time had urged her to seek medical help earlier than she did? — P.D.

A: At the time of her death from ovarian cancer at age 43, Gilda was married to actor-comedian Gene Wilder. Husband Gene was faithfully supportive right up to the end. The problem had nothing to do with Wilder, but with the fact that Gilda's illness baffled doctors for nine months before the correct diagnosis was made. "If we knew then what we know now," Wilder told me, "Gilda would still be alive." That's

Gloria Monty is back - with a bang

It's astonishing the way one person can make a difference in Hollywood. Gloria Monty, the lady boss who turned "General Hospital" into king of the mountain years ago, is back in charge again.

And what happens — "General Hospital" begins to nudge "The Young and the Restless" for the number one spot, only being off fractions of a point.

Soap followers say they can tell the difference already in the show. It's tighter, more focused. Peripheral stories are out in favor of just three families, including the debut of the blue-collar Eckert clan, led by Fred (William Boyett), mother Angela (Carol Lawrence), son Bill (Anthony Geary) and daughter Jenny (Cheryl Richardson).

Since producer Gloria Monty is so busy putting the show-pieces together, and star Geary wants to wait a few weeks until he feels right about his new character, it's up to newcomer Cheryl Richardson, cast as sister Jenny, to do the talking.

Redheaded Jenny, 23, arrives in Port Charles and immediately creates a ruckus by supporting the Green Belt environmental cause. "Jenny is an action girl," Cheryl explains. "Outspoken, she talks in paragraphs, and has a sibling rivalry with brother Bill (Geary)."

Not long ago, Northern California's Cheryl was a UCLA cheerleader with majors in business and psychology. Acting never entered her head. 'Twin Peaks' fans can cheer up now

NEW YORK (AP) — "Twin Peaks," the moody, obscure nighttime soap opera about the eccentric inhabitants of a Pacific Northwest lumber town, is returning to ABC's prime time lineup, network officials said.

"Twin Peaks" returns Thursday, March 28, at 9 p.m. EST with six original episodes to air in that time slot, said Robert Iger, president of ABC Entertainment.

"We've returned it to the time period where it performed very well against strong competition last spring, and we're hopeful that this move will revitalize interest in the program," Iger said.

"Twin Peaks" replaced "Gabriel's Fire," a drama starring James Earl Jones, which will be on hiatus following Thursday's broadcast. "Gabriel's Fire" will return in April at a different time period, Iger said.

"Twin Peaks" had been languishing in a Saturday night time slot until it was placed on hiatus last month. At the beginning of its March 28 broadcast, Iger said, what has happened so far in the season will be recapitulated.

That's a tall order, considering how even fans of the quirky series sometimes have trouble following its events.

Let's take, for example, the mysterious death of Josie Packard (Joan Chen). She died in bed while aiming a pistol at her lover, Sheriff Harry S. Truman (Michael Ontkean) and mystical, pie-gobbling FBI Agent Dale Cooper (Kyle MacLachlan).

Was she angry? Who knows. She feared that he would learn all her unsavory secrets. What happened to her after she died? Glad you asked. Her image took up residence inside

a dresser drawer knob at the Great Northern Hotel.

Let's not even discuss who killed Laura Palmer. Everybody knows it was her father, Leland, while under the influence of the demonic BOB.

BOB, you may be interested to learn, appeared on the bed shortly after Josie died. So did that really, REALLY strange dwarf who appears in Cooper's dreams.

The series was conceived by director David Lynch, the high priest of cinematic anxiety ("Eraserhead," "The Elephant Man," "Dune," "Blue Velvet" and "Wild at Heart") and Mark Frost, a TV producer from "Hill Street Blues."

"Twin Peaks," a midseason replacement, was the year's most written-about show even before its April 8, 1990, debut won a 33 percent share of the TV audience.

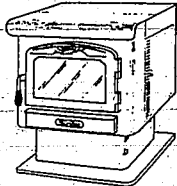

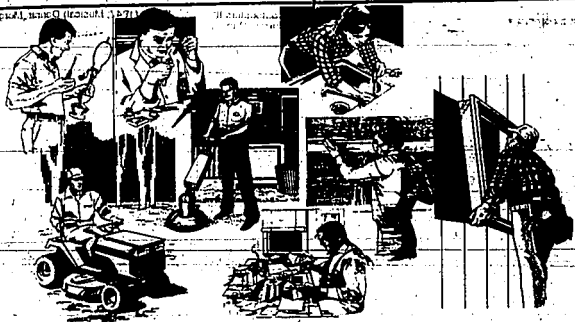
