

## House, Senate agree on war bills

WASHINGTON — House and Senate negotiators shook hands on two multi-billion dollar spending bills late Thursday after dropping one proposal to boost prices for dairy farmers and easing another to slash aid to Jordan.  
The House and Senate were expected to vote on final congressional approval on Friday for the two bills and send them on to President Bush. One would provide \$42.6

billion to pay U.S. costs of the Persian Gulf War, the other about \$5 billion for a range of programs including aid to Israel and Turkey.  
The lawmakers eliminated the dairy increase and softened the Jordan aid cut after the proposals prompted veto threats from White House budget chief Richard Darman. Legislators worked out the final details just before midnight after a long evening of bargaining in the otherwise empty Capitol.

After days of bargaining with Bush administration officials, the lawmakers softened the aid cut for Jordan, which would have blocked all of this year's \$57.2 million slated for the kingdom. Instead, they granted Bush the power to restore the money by declaring that King Hussein is working toward peace in the Middle East.  
Until that change, such a declaration by Bush would have restored Jordan's \$35 million in economic aid, but congressional approval would have been needed to let the

\$22.2 million in military assistance flow.  
In the face of the administration veto threat, dairy-state lawmakers lost their fight to increase the payments milk farmers get from processors. They contrasted White House opposition on that issue to its support for aid for Jordan, Israel and Turkey elsewhere in the legislation.  
"I don't think we're in the business of playing Churchill abroad and Scrooge at home," complained Rep. David Obey, D-Wis.

## Former Buhl man gives up, faces charges

ELKO, Nev. — A former Buhl-area resident turned himself in to Elko County authorities Wednesday afternoon to face 197 counts of cruelty to animals.  
Arthur Transeau's surrender at the Elko County Jail forced the continuance of a trial today of a woman charged with the same counts. The woman, jailed in Elko County under the name Marilyn Evans, was married to Transeau but told Justice of the Peace Marjean Kidner that Evans is her legal name.  
Kidner was not sure whether the two are divorced.

Transeau might be arraigned today, Kidner said.  
Evans and Transeau were charged with cruelty to animals after Nevada authorities discovered a so-called "puppy mill" outside Jackpot, Nev., in late December. Dogs, chickens, rabbits, peacocks and other animals allegedly were found starving and freezing to death in subzero weather.

Animals allegedly were piled together, and authorities said they could not count all the animals that died.

Nevada authorities arrested Evans in early January in Jackpot, where she was said to be living and working. She was

## Stalin-era mistake gives Soviets bad time

MOSCOW — Red-faced Soviet officials are admitting they haven't kept the correct time in more than six decades, blaming a mistake in the Stalin era when clocks should have been turned back an hour.  
As a result, the officials are scrapping the Soviet version of daylight-saving time this summer. Clocks, however, will still "fall back" an hour in the autumn.  
All this timekeeping havoc is bound to further buffet a nation that has had its share of confusion for 1991.  
March 31 is when clocks usually are moved forward an hour for summer time in the Soviet Union, which has 11 time zones.

But the Cabinet of Ministers has decreed that the move won't be made for most of the Soviet Union — the huge Russian Federation, which includes Moscow; Armenia; Azerbaijan; Byelorussia; Turkmenia and the Ukraine.

The republics of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania and Moldova, however, will follow their rebellious tradition and move their clocks ahead as before.

To confound the masses even more, Tadjikistan, parts of Kazakhstan and some other regions will actually set their clocks back an hour to better organize the hours of daylight, the decree said.

As if the decree itself weren't

puzzling enough, it appeared to have been stuck in a time warp. The Cabinet adopted it Feb. 4 but did not release it until Wednesday, only days before the clocks were to have changed.

Even without the time confusion, 1991 has been among the most confusing of times for the Soviet Union.

Residents' lives were thrown into chaos when the government confiscated 50- and 100-ruble notes in a bid to shore up the economy. They've voted in a confusing referendum on preserving the union that featured one question that in reality was three. And they're facing perplexing price increases next week.

"Are We Going to Move Our Hands?" asked a headline in Moscow "Pravda" as it tried to explain the time troubles.

According to the newspaper Evening Moscow, the move was made to correct a 61-year-old mistake.

"In 1930, it was decided to introduce summer time and move the hands of clocks one hour ahead," Evening Moscow said. "In the passage of time, they did not announce winter time" in the fall of 1930.

For reasons that remain a mystery, summer time was not re-introduced in the spring of 1931, leaving the country with a single time year-round.

In 1981, it was decided to restore summer time. But it was begun in spring, rather than fall.

## UN to lift Iraq food embargo

UNITED NATIONS — The Security Council's sanctions committee will lift the food embargo on Iraq now that Baghdad has agreed to allow the United Nations to distribute the foodstuffs, a senior Western diplomat said Thursday.

The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the sanctions committee would allow food and other essentials into Iraq starting Friday if the Red Cross and United Nations can see that it reaches all parts of the country.

Iraq will have to allow the food to be sent into the Kurdish-controlled areas of the north, and the provinces of the south where Shiites are rebelling, he said.

The Security Council on Thursday heard a report that Iraq had been "relegated to a pre-industrial age" by the "near-apocalyptic" allied military assault.

## U.S. intent left unclear by messages

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration sent a blizzard of confusing signals that may well have misled Saddam Hussein about U.S. intentions in the days before Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, a leading congressional Democrat charged Thursday.

Rep. Lee Hamilton, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Middle East subcommittee, said conflicting public statements by Pentagon and State Department officials beginning July 17, two weeks before the invasion.

"It is a record which confused me, confused this subcommittee ... and it is not unreasonable to think it might have confused Saddam Hussein as well," Hamilton told former U.S. Ambassador to Iraq April Glaspie.

Glaspie, on Capitol Hill for her second straight day of testimony, countered that after her meeting with Saddam in the early morning hours of July 25, "there was no doubt in my mind that he knew we meant business."

While she did not directly threaten the use of military force if Saddam moved against his small oil-rich neighbor, Glaspie did make clear to the Iraqi leader that the United States would defend the sovereignty of its friends in the gulf and its own vital interests in the region, she said.

## 27 missing in collision of Navy sub-hunter planes

SAN DIEGO — Two Navy submarine-hunting planes collided Thursday, and all 27 people aboard were feared dead in cold, choppy waters 60 miles off Southern California, authorities said.  
The Navy listed the crews as missing but there was little hope any of the crew members from the downed P-3 Orions survived.

The all-weather planes were engaged in an anti-submarine warfare training exercise when they collided in bad weather, authorities said.

"I think we have to be realistic here," said Senior Chief Petty Officer Bob Howard, a Navy public affairs officer at North Island Naval Air Station. "It is very cold out there. We're talking about what apparently is a mid-air collision of two aircraft. I would say it would be very grim."

Still, he said, the Navy was conducting an aggressive air and sea search of the crash site.

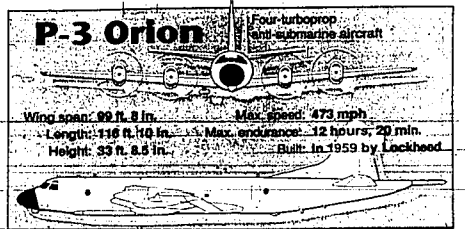
Search and rescue teams spotted and retrieved some debris from the planes but found no signs of life. Further details about what was found were not immediately available, Howard said.  
There was no word on how long the search would last, but Howard said the Navy would make "extraordinary" attempts to retrieve remains and wreckage.

A Navy helicopter crew flying in the area and sailors from the destroyer USS Merrill all reported a ball of fire and loud explosion at about 2:30 a.m. PST, Howard said during a briefing at North Island Naval Air Station.

He said the accident occurred over the Pacific Ocean about 60 miles southwest of San Diego.

"They were operating in conjunction with other surface and air elements when a mid-air explosion was reported approximately the same time radio

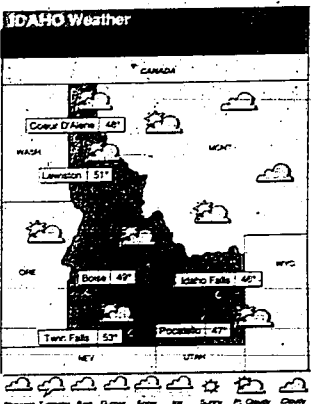
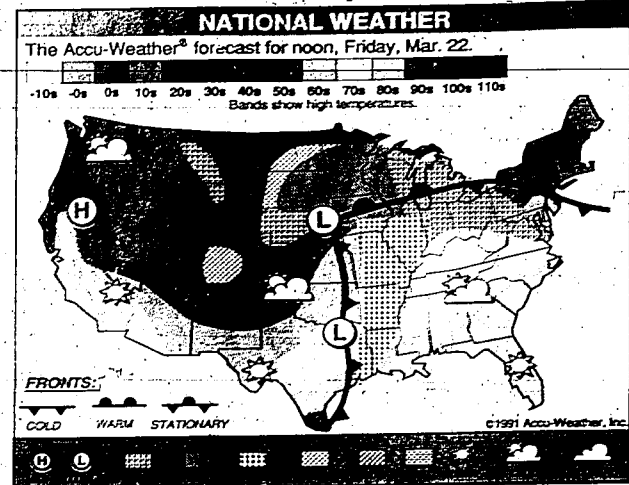

## Spring brings grip of winter, touch of summer to nation

A low pressure center in the southwestern states spread clouds and a few showers along Idaho's southern border Thursday.

Meanwhile, a weak disturbance over the Bitterroot Mountains was producing variable clouds and a few showers in the Paradise.

The remainder of the state was reporting mostly sunny to partly cloudy conditions.

The showers Thursday were mostly aloft or confined to the mountains. Winds of 15 to 25 mph blew in the south-central region. Elsewhere they were less than 15 mph.

Afternoon temperatures around the Gem State were in the 40s and 50s. Extremes varied from 40 at McCall to 58 at Lewiston, with Blaine and Mountain Home close behind at 55.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 63 degrees at Lowell and Payette. Stanley reported the coldest at 35 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 74 degrees at Laredo, Texas. The lowest was 11 degrees at Embury, Maine.

The first day of spring looked a lot like another day of winter Thursday in the mountains of the West as snowy conditions lingered there, but Detroit got a preview of summer with a record-setting high temperature.

Some 19 inches of snow fell at Flagstaff, Ariz., and 8 inches at Prescott and the south rim of the Grand Canyon. Colorado's snowfall included 5 inches at Wolf Creek Pass, and shouter 4 to 6 inches was expected to accumulate.

Detroit warmed to 73 degrees by early afternoon and set a high temperature record for the date. The previous record had been 72, set in 1918. Flint, Mich., reached 72 degrees, breaking its 60-degree record set in 1949.

Thunderstorms developed in the Plains. By mid-afternoon, had three-quarters of an inch in diameter had fallen near Colorado, Oklahoma, and northeast of Tableburg. Hail also pelted Iowa Park, Texas.

Hail nearly one inch in diameter fell north of Westville, Okla., and thunderstorm wind gusts caused roof damage north of Fayetteville, Ark.

Snow fell Thursday in central New York state, and was scattered in eastern and northwest Upper Michigan, western and central Minnesota, southern Montana, western Wyoming, west-central Colorado, northwest New Mexico, northern Arizona and east-central Nevada.

Rain extended over the northern and central Pacific Coast, southwest California, southeast Arizona, south-central New Mexico, south-central Texas, western and central South Dakota, southern Minnesota, northwest Wisconsin and northern Upper Michigan.

Freezing rain fell in central Upper Michigan. Thunderstorms developed in north-central Texas and southern Oklahoma.

# Watkins, Nevada governor spar over site of nuclear waste dump

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Secretary James Watkins complained on Thursday that Nevada officials were waging a "grounded-earth" legal battle against a permanent storage site for high-level nuclear waste and said their resistance threatens to delay the program indefinitely.

Nevada Gov. Bob Miller countered that the Energy Department's scientific review of the proposed Yucca Mountain site couldn't be trusted. And "We're not going to roll over and play dead," he declared.

Both men appeared before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, where Watkins asked for legislation empowering the department to proceed more quickly with its site studies.

"It appears the state intends to litigate on each and every permit application," Watkins complained, adding that the legal obstructionism to delay construction of the only permanent burial site for high-level radioactive wastes "indefinitely into the future."

The governor told the Senate panel that while the state is prepared to begin processing three applications for permits involving Yucca Mountain, the review would not be rushed.

He charged that the Energy Department is so determined to locate the waste away from Nevada that its scientific rationale is suspect.

"We're not confident in the process. We do not believe in its objectivity," said the governor, adding that he planned to pursue "whatever legal authority available"

to ensure the federal plans are properly scrutinized.

Sen. Bennett Johnston, D-La., the energy bill's chairman, read a long list of past statements by Miller and other Nevada officials promising to fight the federal waste disposal plan.

"If I were (Nevada's governor) I'd be doing exactly what you're doing," Johnston said at one point. Miller, having earlier noted that while "nuclear wastes must be disposed of somewhere... no one wants it to be in their state."

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., said he questioned the Energy Department's rush to develop Yucca Mountain, arguing that some scientists have raised concern that the location is near an active volcano and may be subject to earthquakes, he said.

## LaRocco joins tour, hearing at WIPP site

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Larry LaRocco, D-Idaho, said he will join other members of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee in a tour of the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant near Carlsbad, N.M., next Monday and Tuesday.

And the freshman congressman welcomed word Wednesday from Rep. Peter Kostmayer, D-Pa., chairman of the panel's Subcommittee on Energy and the Environment, that a hearing on the proposed nuclear waste storage facility would be conducted April 16.

Kostmayer said he called the hearing in response to "urgent requests" from LaRocco.

"We've been too many years of delays in opening this facility," LaRocco said in a news release. "It's high time WIPP was open for business and the nuclear waste at INEL sent to a permanent home."

He and other Idaho officials have been critical of delays in opening WIPP that have forced the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to continue serving as a temporary storage site. The delays also have led to a bitter legal and political battle between the U.S. Department of Energy and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus.

## OSHA lists violations at nuclear plants, labs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Worker safety has been such a low priority at government nuclear weapons plants that one safety manager said he views the government's job safety agency reported Thursday.

A seven-month evaluation of nuclear weapons plants and laboratories found more than 600 violations and fundamental defects in the way the Energy Department deals with workplace safety, according to the report from the Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

The Energy Department owns the plants and laboratories and hires private companies and universities to run them.

"OSHA recommended that DOE make major organizational changes," said Gerald F. Scannell, administration of the agency.

"Had this been a private sector (evaluation) there would have been a number of citations with proposed penalties."

He said he had no estimate of what the penalties would have been if private industry ran the plants.

Greg Baxter, who headed the evaluation teams, said "We were looking for the systems that break down that allow hazards to exist."

They found plenty:

- An Environmental, Safety and Health that lacked the staff, money and power to keep tabs on workplace conditions.
- No incentive for plant operators to emphasize workplace safety.
- Safety orders from Washington that were "vague, inconsistent and in part ineffective."
- Minimal planning and budgeting for safety.
- Complaints from workers who said they were punished for pointing out unsafe conditions, and inadequate investigation of those complaints.
- Emergency medical workers were put at risk of contracting AIDS, hepatitis and other blood-borne diseases because there was no policy requiring them to take proper precautions.
- "Serious record-keeping problems."

The United States' report recommended the sanctions committee lift barriers to food and agricultural equipment immediately.

Iraq's U.N. Mission and Washington Embassy were close, and Iraq officials were not available to confirm that they would allow food to be distributed to all regions of the country.

The council's committee on sanctions was to meet Friday morning. It consists of the same 15 nations as the Security Council under Austria's chairmanship.

"Food is only allowed under Iraq in humanitarian circumstances. But the sanctions committee can effectively lift the embargo on food by declaring that a humanitarian emergency exists."

Western officials have indicated the overall embargo on Iraq would not be lifted until a permanent cease-fire is signed.

The United States has circulated a proposal that would require Iraq first to agree to destroy its nuclear weapons-grade materials and ballistic missiles, as well as chemical and biological weapons.

Ahtisaan's report suggested Iraq was scarcely in a position to resist such conditions for a cease-fire. He said 90 percent of Iraq's industrial workers were jobless and "most means of human life support have been destroyed."

U.S. officials said Thursday that Security Council members were still negotiating the fine points of the resolution proposed by the United States that could lead to an end of the embargo.

A copy of a U.S. working paper distributed to the other Permanent Security Council members proposed:

- The destruction of Iraq's weapons of mass destruction and ballistic missile systems under supervision of the United Nations Secretariat, the World Health Organization and the International Atomic Energy Agency;
- That Iraq agree to never again "develop, build or acquire" ballistic missile systems or chemical, biological or nuclear weapons;
- Establishing the 1963 border agreement between Iraq and Kuwait as the legal boundary;
- Stationing U.N. military observers to patrol the border of Iraq and Kuwait, to a depth of 10 kilometers into Iraq and five kilometers into Kuwait;
- Establishing a commission to administer a fund that will levy a percentage of future Iraqi oil exports to pay for war damages;
- Lifting the economic embargo on food and medical supplies, and allowing the Security Council's sanctions committee to permit shipments of other essential goods;
- Keeping an arms embargo on Iraq, including technology applicable to weapons production;
- Declaring a formal cease-fire only upon "formal Iraqi acceptance of the provisions above."

Howard said it was believed 13 crew members were aboard one P-3 Orion and 14 on the other. The planes were on a training mission from Moffett Naval Air Station near San Jose. Names of crew members were withheld pending notification of their families.

The P-3s were in contact with land- and sea-based air controllers during the exercise, but officials were uncertain who was directing them at the time of the collision, Howard said.

He called that "a very pivotal point," and said investigators will examine how the two planes wound up on a collision course.

"That's obviously something we're looking at," Howard said. "When you conduct an investigation like this, the one thing you don't want to do is rule anything out."

Showers and strong winds were reported in the San Diego area overnight. About three hours after the planes collided, a funnel cloud was sighted off the coast of San Diego's Mission Beach.

The National Weather Service said pilots in the area reported severe turbulence at about the time.

Howard said the Navy was uncertain what part, if any, weather played in the collision.

The P-3 Orion, driven by four propellers, is regularly used by weather forecasters to fly into hurricanes.

"It is very sturdy and traditionally has been one of the safest aircraft the Navy flies," Howard said. "Historically, it has proven themselves capable of operating even in bad weather conditions."

"I've got 21 years in the Navy and this is the first time I've heard of a mid-air collision between P-3s."

When used to hunt submarines, the planes can be armed with torpedoes, nuclear or conventional depth charges, mines and Harpoon and Sidewinder missiles.

# Rebels say Saddam using acid, napalm, chemicals against them



## U.S. troops await permanent cease-fire, eager to leave Iraq

WITH THE 3RD ARMORED DIVISION, Allied-Occupied Iraq (AP) — A Bradley Fighting Vehicle sits at the demarcation line, its cannon pointed at the Iraqi town of Um Qasr.

Only a wire fence and a few hundred yards separate U.S. and Iraqi troops. For the Americans, spring has come, time to be home. Instead they patrol the sand-swept deserts waiting for a permanent cease-fire.

On Thursday, more than a dozen Iraqis surrendered to troops of the U.S. 3rd Armored Division, who sit on their doorstep. Twenty-four hours earlier, the Americans would have sent them back. Now they are taking prisoners again, in a change of policy.

The wrath of the 100-hour ground war surrounds them. The coastal road to Um Qasr is littered with the hulks of tanks and trucks that were retreating from Kuwait in the face of the allied advance.

Near Um Qasr itself lie the ruins of an artillery base, its cannons twisted wreckage. Empty shell casings are scattered throughout the base. In the litter are battle helmets that Iraqi troops once wore.

A U.S. officer says tracers snap through the night skies above Um Qasr. Iraq is in a civil upheaval, and that unrest complicates the signing of a permanent cease-fire.

Futures hinge on it.

For Spec. Jon Skogen, 23, a reservist from Sioux Falls, S.D., spring marks two months away from the wire he married only three days before shipping out. He has his own lawn-care business and spring is his busy time.

"I'd like to get back and attend to that," he said. "I put in a request for early return but it doesn't look like I'll get it."

Skogen is a member of the 323rd Chemical Company, attached to the 3rd Armored Division. The unit decontaminates chemical agents — such as Saddam Hussein threatened to use against Americans but has not thus far.

Now the company has turned its attention to setting up shower stalls at a small U.S. compound west of Um Qasr for front-line troops, some of whom haven't had a shower in 45 days.

Skogen isn't happy about his company staying on.

"I think it's absolutely unnecessary," he said. "I found out how much just our unit costs, almost \$200,000 a month. They could use that for Kuwaiti children begging for food, get us out of here since we're not needed. I think the threat is pre-

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iraqi opposition groups claimed Thursday that Saddam Hussein's loyalist forces were using acid, napalm and chemical weapons to crush Kurds in the north and Shiite Muslims in the south rebelling against his rule.

Iraqi troops have tried to cut-off supplies of food and medicine to areas held by the insurgents, and Iraqi warplanes and helicopters also have attacked rebel-held northern oil fields, setting wells ablaze, the opposition said.

Meanwhile, tension grew between Iran and Iraq. Iran's official news agency said the Tehran government had on Tuesday protested Iraq's reported abduction of the world's highest Shiite authority.

The opposition Iraqi Kurdistan Front, in a statement released to Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, said the leader of the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan sent a message to the U.N. secretary-general seeking an urgent Security Council meeting on the Iraqi uprising.

IRNA said the letter from the Kurdish leader, Jalal Talabani, cited the torching of the oil wells and the use of napalm.

It said he urged the Security Council to "act resolutely to prevent Saddam Hussein's forces from persisting in these acts, of gross environmental terrorism and to prevent the indiscriminate destruction of civilian areas by Hussein's forces."

Talabani, in an interview with The Associated Press in Damascus, said he would return to Iraq this weekend to join forces with other opposition leaders.

"This is the spring of freedom for Kurdistan," said the guerrilla leader, who has "spent" the past 30 years fighting for a measure of autonomy for Iraq's 4 million non-Arab Kurds.

In London, the Free Iraq Council released a statement urging Egypt, Syria and Saudi Arabia to commit troops in support of the anti-Saddam uprising.

"We would invite them to intervene on the side of their Iraqi brothers to promote an Arab solution to the struggle and thereby prevent any intervention by other foreign forces," said Imam Sayed Hussein al-Sader, the general secretary of the council.

The Supreme Assembly of the Islamic Revolution in Iraq, an umbrella of opposition groups, claims Iraqi forces have used ground-to-ground missiles against rebel-held cities, shelled them with artillery and tank cannons, and used napalm and chemical weapons.

The Iran-based assembly said 15,000 people were killed in the southern Shiite holy city of Najaf alone. Rebels say the city has been under attack since March 19.

## Senate OKs compromise on vets' benefits package

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday approved a \$658 million package of benefits for military personnel who fought in the Persian Gulf War as well as veterans of earlier wars.

The package, approved on a voice vote, was a compromise reached with House members and the Bush administration over widely divergent bills that the House and Senate had approved last week. The House still must approve the compromise.

The final bill includes \$400 million in personnel benefits and \$255 million in veterans assistance.

Foreign contributions to a fund set up to cover U.S. costs of the war would finance the package.

The bill:

- Increases imminent danger pay from \$110 per month to \$150, retroactive to Aug. 2, 1990, the day Iraq invaded Kuwait. Imminent danger pay will revert to \$110 six months after a formal declaration that the war has ended. Cost to the government was estimated at \$173 million.
- Increases family separation pay from \$60 per month to \$75, retroactive to Aug. 2. The increase, which is expected to cost \$52 million, also falls back to its old level six months after the formal end of the war.
- Provides one month of medical benefits to deactivated reservists.
- Delays a scheduled increase in the deductible for Civilian Health and Medical Programs of the Uniformed Services from April 1 until Oct. 1 for dependents of those serving in the Gulf.
- Among the benefits for veterans of prior wars are increases in education benefits:
  - For those with at least three years of active duty experience, from \$300 per month to \$350.
  - For National Guard members and reservists, from \$140 per month to \$170.

## Generals up for awards, but 5th star still elusive

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Colin Powell and H. Norman Schwarzkopf may be rewarded for their Gulf war victory with medals and new titles, but it's less likely that five-star rank will be bestowed upon them.

A fifth star, which requires presidential approval, is an act of Congress, was last awarded in 1950 to Gen. Omar Bradley.

No five-stars emerged from the Korean or Vietnam wars. And despite consensus that the Persian Gulf military leaders should be rewarded, it's unlikely the 40-year drought will end.

"There's no need to do it," said one senior Pentagon military official. "You'd be screwing around with the entire military structure and we never liked an imperial military."

Even at the White House, where euphoria reigns in the aftermath of the war, there was no sense of a fifth star.

"They're usually not given as rewards, but as promotions to people that are moving into significant positions," chief of staff John Sununu said recently. "You may not see another star for five generals, but you see one for Schwarzkopf alone."

He and Powell are among 12 Army four-star generals. But Schwarzkopf, as Central Command field commander, is outranked by Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Powell would need a fifth star to stay ahead.

Likewise, Schwarzkopf is outranked by Army Chief of Staff Gen. Carl Vuono. And John Galvin, supreme commander of NATO, which recognizes "exceptionally meritorious service to the government in a duty of great responsibility."

But, he said, that medal is also likely to go to senior commanders through the division level and some senior staff officers, such as Joint Chiefs of Staff director of operations Lt. Gen. Thomas W. Kelly, a chief Pentagon spokesman during the war.

**NASA submits smaller space station plans**

WASHINGTON (AP) — NASA said Thursday it did everything Congress asked in "shrinking the size and cost of its proposed space station and expects the new design to be welcomed "with open arms."

"It is absolutely critical that we get the budget that's required; there is no fat left," said William B. Lenoir, NASA's associate administrator for space flight.

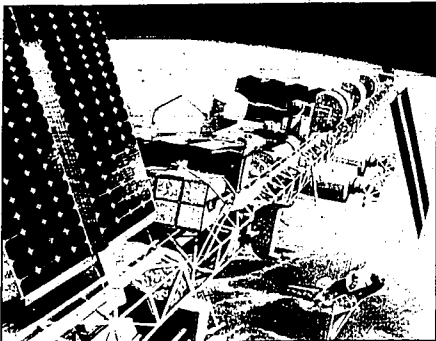
NASA sliced \$8.3 billion from the cost by cutting down on electrical power available to researchers, delaying completion to the end of the century and simplifying construction.

"We have come out with a space station we can be proud of," Lenoir said, adding that the new schedule will make it possible to stay within the Congress-imposed limit of spending no more than \$2.6 billion a year.

In all, the cost target is \$30 billion through 1999.

The timetable calls for the first structural parts to be carried into orbit in 1994, one of the stations by visiting astronauts in 1997 and permanent occupancy by four astronauts at the turn of the century.

Lenoir said the major differences in the redesign were that the living and laboratory quarters — as well as the main truss — would be outfitted and tested on the ground rather than

being built in space "a stick at a time."

That will reduce dangerous space-walking time by astronauts by more than 50 percent, to under 300 hours a year — or about 20 such excursions by

teams of two astronauts, Lenoir said. A major criticism of the previous design was the amount of such activities required to assemble and maintain the station.

President Reagan proposed the sta-

tion — to be named "Freedom" — in his 1984 State of the Union address, setting a goal of having it in orbit in 10 years. The cost was to be \$8 billion.

After NASA spent nearly \$4 billion for studies and prototype parts, Congress became alarmed last year and called a halt, bluntly warning that "the budget crisis is only beginning."

For the current fiscal year, Congress allowed NASA \$1.9 billion for the station, \$550 million less than the agency requested.

Lenoir was asked why he expects this design to be the final one, when others have gone by the wayside.

"The first question is going to be what is appropriated for fiscal year 1992," he said. "If that number is \$2.35 billion (for the station), then you can take everything we said as gospel. ... If we get a dollar less than that, then we're probably not on this path."

But, he added, "I would anticipate and certainly hope that the redesign would be welcomed with open arms. We have done virtually everything that they asked us to do."

Originally, NASA had hoped to have eight astronauts occupy the station permanently for long-term studies of how humans perform in space. Such life sciences studies are vital for prolonged flight, such as to Mars.

**Bush: Police beating 'made me sick'**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Thursday the videotape of Los Angeles police beating a prone man "made me sick," but he defended the officers' embattled boss as "an exemplary police chief" in many ways.

He said Gates, a longtime political supporter, is "entitled to credible hearing. ... Nobody's going to prejudice anybody here."

Bush made the comments at the outset of a meeting with his attorney general, Dick Thornburgh, on the status of the Justice Department's investigation into police brutality.

**Senate confirms drug policy director**

WASHINGTON — The Senate, by a vote of 88-12, on Thursday confirmed former Florida Gov. Bob Martinez as the nation's drug-control policy director.

Martinez, 56, succeeds William Bennett, who resigned in November. Martinez encountered some criticism from Democrats who said his drug-fighting program in Florida was lopsided in favor of law enforcement and prison expansion, with too little emphasis on drug prevention and treatment.

**SBA examines Neil Bush oil company**

WASHINGTON — The Small Business Administration has examined one of Neil Bush's oil companies and its relationship with two venture capital business firms that financed it, an agency spokesman said Thursday.

"The agency did send somebody out to look close up at Apex," SBA spokesman Mike Stamler said about Bush's oil company. "We wanted to find out what the deal was, too." Stamler said the SBA's examination of Apex has been completed, but he declined to disclose any conclusions on grounds of business privacy.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., asked the SBA in mid-December to investigate the investment in Bush's company by Wood-River Capital Corp. and a subsidiary, Bridger Capital Corp.

Wood River and Bridger are private, for-profit companies known as Small Business Investment Corporations that provide venture capital to small start-up businesses.

**Polish leader seeks U.S. business help**

WASHINGTON — Polish President Lech Walesa announced Thursday that Americans will no longer need visas to visit his country and appealed to them to do business in his economically struggling nation.

Walesa, 47, came to Capitol Hill to ask for help as his country attempts to transform its economy from a state-controlled enterprise to a free-market system.

He made the visa announcement in a closed meeting of the House Foreign Affairs Committee and confirmed it later to reporters.

**February's red ink less than year ago**

WASHINGTON — The government sank \$26.1 billion more in debt in February, but the month's red ink was 29.9 percent less than during the same period of fiscal 1990, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

The additional debt in February followed a \$1.76 billion surplus in January and boosted the deficit to \$110.6 billion for the first five months of the fiscal year.

The total so far this year is 13.4 percent more than at the same point in fiscal 1990.

## Official: Error inflated Lincoln infant death rates

BOISE - Alarm raised last week over a high infant death rate in Lincoln County has been put to rest, thanks to an inquisitive Shoshone physician.

Jan Wick, of the Statistics Bureau of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, told *The Times News* Thursday that statistics released from her office last week should have referred to Lincoln County, Wyo., not Lincoln County, Idaho.

The report originally stated that Lincoln County, Idaho, had one of the highest infant mortality rates in the state, at 27.8 per 1,000 births. Though the statistics showed only one baby died in Lincoln County in 1989 out of 36 live

births, the proportion was among the highest in Idaho.

But Dr. Keith Davis, the sole practicing physician in Lincoln County, was suspicious. Davis said even though some people in Lincoln County go out of town for medical services, he felt certain that he would have remembered an infant death in his county in 1989.

"It's a small enough county, that when numbers like this come out I do get doubts that they are accurate," Davis said.

Wick said she received a call from Davis last week asking about the death rate. That's when the error was unearthed.

Wick attributed the mistake to a data entry error in her office. She said that her office receives hundreds of death

certificates each year from across the nation for Idaho residents who die out of the state.

"When I looked at it, I could immediately see how it happened," said Wick. "We're really sorry about this."

The baby that died in Lincoln County, Wyo., was not an Idaho resident, but was listed as such in the computer.

The updated figures now show Lincoln County, Idaho, as having an infant death rate of zero per 1,000 births. The correction also reduces the infant death rates for Health District 5, which includes Twin Falls, and for Idaho.

Wick said her staff re-checked all the numbers for any additional errors and didn't find any.

"We've never had an infant death rate error like this," said Wick. "I can't believe it happened and we didn't catch it."

"You can't let it get to you, you have to

keep going," Worthington added. Lewis and Worthington appeared with Lewis' wife, Katie, 21, and Worthington's brother Scott, a 19-year-old lance corporal.

Katie Lewis said having her husband in Saudi Arabia was scary, but that a Marine wife has no choice but to keep going. Her husband said thoughts of home couldn't be allowed to interfere with duty.

"You have to put your whole mind into it," he said. "I'd write one letter a week and after the letter is sealed you have to go on with your job."

## Bills to ease Blaine school cash crunch fail

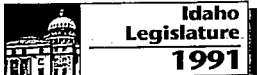

BOISE - Blaine County schools lost two rounds in the Idaho House on Thursday - but may win one today.

The House rejected two bills Thursday designed to help ease the county's school funding problems, and one failed on a 41-41 tie vote. It was the first tie of the session in the House, about a week away from adjournment.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Pattie Nafziger, D-Wendell, will be reconsidered today and supporters expect a better result.

"We're lining up our votes. I think we'll



get it through," said Rep. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum.

Nafziger's bill would allow Blaine County to pass indefinite supplemental property tax overrides that could be built into the basic school budget.

The override could pass by a simple majority, but only districts that have passed overrides of at least 20 percent of their maintenance and operations budgets for at

least seven consecutive years would have this authority.

"That currently applies to three districts: Blaine, Muffin and Wallace, Nafziger said.

"This would give these three districts a little bit of relief," she said.

Nafziger speculated that her bill tied because she tried to be brief in explaining it to accommodate leadership, which wanted to speed up debate and wind down House business by today.

Following Stennett's presentation, Nafziger said she didn't think she needed to discuss Blaine County's school funding problem in depth.

## Senate sends amended performance audit bill back to House

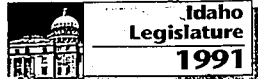

BOISE - The Senate on Thursday passed a bill on a 28-14 vote to create a process for performance audits of state agencies.

But having been amended in that chamber, the bill must be approved again by the House again before going to the governor's desk.

"It's no problem now," said Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley.

The bill, his idea, would create a legislative committee that would direct an independent analyst to audit state agencies' per-



formance and fiscal management.

The amendment does not affect the purpose or intent of the bill, Newcomb said.

Sen. Michael Crapo, the Republican president pro tem and a co-sponsor of the bill, said the message is "a tremendous step forward for Idaho."

The bill's other Senate sponsor, Democratic Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston,

said that in other states, the return rate is four to 20 times the investment of the audit.

The governor has signed the appropriations bill that provides \$500,000 for the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee from July 1 to June, 1992.

Performance audits would be a tool for the Legislature, Sweeney said, which continues to "throw money at the problem without ever realizing whether it's effective," he said.

While Sen. Brian Donesley, D-Boise, called the legislation a "noble idea," he also said it is unconstitutional.

The legislative committee would be able

to question witnesses and determine whether the witness had committed perjury, Donesley said. And it would inappropriately have the authority to tell the state attorney general when to prosecute, he said.

"Rather than passing this bill, which is arrogant, and fix it next year, let's put it on the shelf and come back next year," Donesley said.

Democratic Sen. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, also opposed the bill, saying there is already a legislative auditor "with a rather massive budget." She said she wants to be sure there is no duplication of services.

## Jerome school officials announce bond issue costs

JEROME - School officials have announced how much the proposed \$5 million bond issue, if approved, would cost individual taxpayers.

Taxpayers would pay \$1.28 for every \$1,000 in property value. For a \$50,000 home, this equates to an annual cost of \$64, which would be reduced by about 50 percent for property owners living in their own residence and qualifying for

the home owners exemption.

Previous numbers published in a school bulletin and distributed in a local weekly newspaper were incorrect.

The \$4,985,000 bond issue would pay for construction of a new elementary school, a vocational-agriculture building at the high school and for improvements at Washington and Central elementary schools and the junior high school.

Voters will cast their ballots on the measure on May 7.

# Filer School District will join vocational education consortium

**FILER** - The school district plans to form a consortium with about 10 other school districts to obtain federal funding through the Carl Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Act.

Superintendent James Fisher told the board that districts already committed to the consortium include Jerome, Gooding, Wendell, Kimberly, Richfield, Fairfield, Shoshone, Dietrich and Bliss.

Several other districts, such as Valley and Hagerman have expressed an interest, but have not yet committed to joining the group.

The Carl Perkins Act has undergone changes that are expected to reduce the amount of funds available to districts.

Forming a consortium will increase the amount of government funds available to the school districts.

Many parents crowded into the room at Tuesday evening's School

Board meeting to show support for letting students out of school during the week of the Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo.

Fisher also discussed the need for more family-oriented activities and said they feel the fair would be such an activity.

The board approved the 1991-92 school calendar, which does include a week off for the fair - Sept. 2 through 6. The first day of school will be Aug. 26.

Several Hollister parents were also present at this week's meeting to follow up on an issue brought to the board's attention previously.

For several years a late activity bus has transported students to Rogerson.

But beginning in the fall, the bus route was reduced and the bus has been traveling only as far as Hollister.

At a previous board meeting, the Hollister Parent-Teacher Organization requested the late activity bus return to its original route to Rogerson.

But at that time the board made no decision.

It has since decided to completely eliminate the late activity bus going to the Hollister and Rogerson area, beginning in the fall.

In other business:

- The president of the Filer Elementary Parent-Teacher Organization addressed the board regarding plumbing needed in three elementary classrooms for water fountains and sinks.
- The PTO is prepared to donate \$1,000 to the project. The board estimated the project would cost approximately \$5,000. No decision was made.
- Superintendent Fisher gave the board a brief update on teacher negotiations. Fisher said the district will have a series of "collaborative style" meetings with the Filer Education Association. The first meeting was held March 14.
- Fisher said these are very informal meetings and the first one went very well. The next meeting is scheduled for April 11.

# Stallings, Craig remain at odds over dairy price support bill

**WASHINGTON (AP)** - Idaho Congressman Richard Stallings says legislation raising dairy price supports to former-level necessary emergency action.

The Senate on Tuesday approved a bill added to the House-passed Dire Emergency Supplemental Appropriations measure for Operation Desert Storm. It provides emergency price supports for the nation's dairy farmers, who are being staggered by the lowest prices in recent years for their product.

Stallings, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, urged members of a joint committee working out differences between the House and Senate bills on Thursday to retain the Senate provision.

"This is not a long-term solution, but a temporary program to try to prevent the loss of an inordinate

number of family farmers who have spent their lives getting where they are," the Idaho Democrat said.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, opposes the so-called Leahy Amendment. He called it "a short-term cover up of a problem that needs long-term fixing," and said it actually would hurt dairy farmers because it "takes the pressure off the Agriculture Committee."

Stallings said work on a long-term solution to the production problem is under way through implementation of an inventory control program mandated in the 1990 farm bill.

In the meantime, however, "The Idaho dairy-producers calling my office aren't at all sure they can hang on until the farm bill provides for a long-range solution," he said.

# Castleford delays some school repairs

**CASTLEFORD** - The school district will not be able to make all the elementary school building repairs that it had planned this year.

Because bids have come in over the \$108,000 the district has available for the repairs and improvements, the School Board decided that some projects will have to be postponed until later.

After reviewing bids, the board moved to contract with Reus Plumbing of Filer to replace the boiler, heating system, lights and ceilings in the elementary building for \$128,501.

The difference between the price and the funds available will be made up in carry-over money when the new budget is finalized later this spring.

New windows and the construction of two extra classrooms will be put on hold, but reconsidered at a later date.

Several parents, concerned with overcrowding in the first-grade classroom, voiced their concerns at the board at its meeting Tuesday.

Parents said they would like to see

something done, and suggested hiring a qualified, full-time aide to provide help to the teacher.

"We have talked quite a bit about this problem," said Superintendent Henry Kilmer. "Right now there are 28 children in the class."

He said the school's kindergarten teacher works separately with a portion of the class during the afternoon, reducing the first-grade class size to 20 students during that time period.

There are many ways to solve the problem, said board Chairman Fred Schaar. And he assured the parents that the problem will be solved by next year.

Teacher Mary Anne Blick and several of her government students attended the board meeting.

In her teacher's report, Blick displayed the textbooks she uses in her classes and explained several class projects, including one in which her seventh-grade students created their own countries.

"On the whole, (Castleford) students are cooperative and they want to learn," Blick said. "They are appreciative of our education here and they are good kids."

In other business:

- School Board elections will be held May 21. The seats held by Chairman Fred Schaar and Don Graybeal, vice chairman are up for re-election.
- New rules this year require that write-in candidates declare their candidacy at least five days before the election.
- Also, if only one person runs, and there is no declared write-in candidate, the election will not be held and that person will be declared the trustee.
- Trustee Dave Smith commended the senior college English class for its hard work and dedication in raising enough money to visit Washington D.C. this spring.
- Kilmer reported the Pillsbury Company has donated \$1,000 to the school's greenhouse fund, bringing the fund to a total of \$2,000.
- The board voted to work with other schools in the area to form a consortium that will qualify for federal money under the Carl Perkins Vocational Education Fund. One possible use of the funds, if received, would be to hire one person to work with students in these schools in job placement and work experience areas.

He arrived in Twin Falls March 16 and will leave for his station at Twentynine Palms, Calif., April 21.

"It's been a real learning experience for me. I think I made a mistake by not giving more details," she said.

Stennett's bill, which failed 52-31, would have required the state pay at least 25 percent of each school district's budget.

"We are asking for a floor to be built under our educational system," he said.

Blaine County currently pays a disproportionate share of sales and income tax for its population. Stennett said, but receives much less than other counties for school funding.

He said the Blaine school district receives 6.7 percent of its budget from the state, while other districts receive an average of 54 percent through the funding formula.

"We are not asking for new money. We are asking for our fair share," he said.

But opponents said it would hurt poorer districts.

"We set a dangerous pattern when we take from the poor and give to the rich. It's Robin Hood all backward," said Rep. Ron Black, a Twin Falls Republican.

Rep. Bill Taylor, R-Nampa, agreed the school funding formula is "out of sync," but he said Stennett's bill "will just throw it further out of sync."

Instead, Taylor said lifting the 5 percent cap on property taxes "would help tremendously."

"There are other answers besides this," he said.

Stennett said he wasn't surprised his bill failed.

"I wish I have been nice but I didn't expect it," he said. "I'd be put it this way. I guess I would have been shocked if it had gone the other way."





### Medical indigency will have to come from higher taxes

When is a legislative compromise not a compromise?

When it compromises the point of the legislation, as in the medical indigency bill awaiting action in the state Senate.

It appears the version that will eventually be approved by the Legislature and signed by the governor will be a wash — or worse — for taxpayers. Counties will get their promised \$8 million property tax withdrawal, all right, by shifting the burden of paying for the medical bills of the poor to the state.

But where's the money coming from on the state level?

If the Legislature funds no other new programs this year, there is \$2 million left to spend at this point. The rest of the \$6.1 million cost of the medical indigency program would have to come out of higher state taxes.

Although the bill's provision extending subsidized health care to thousands of Idahoans is beneficial, it is an open-ended expenditure. Worse, it will do nothing to relieve funding pressures for counties because it is not a service counties currently provide.

So why are we doing this? Way back in December, there was something approaching consensus in the Legislature and the governor's office over the need to do something about the crushing burden counties currently bear in paying the medical costs of those who can't afford to pay or don't have health insurance.

But that consensus was based on a state budget surplus that has dwindled rapidly during the course of the session. It collapsed altogether two weeks ago when Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed an \$11.5 million medical indigency bill passed by the Legislature that did not contain a subsidy for health care benefits that are currently absorbed by hospitals and doctors.

The package was too expensive, Andrus argued, and simply shifted the medical indigency expense from the counties to the state. So the House came back a week ago with a \$6.1 million bill that includes the medically needy provision and won't take effect until mid-1992.

The cost after 1992 will be \$12.9 million a year of your state tax dollars, and because of the medically needy provision, it will certainly increase after that.

Nobody in the Legislature doubts this is a shell game.

## Democratic nomination wide open again

For some time, many top Democrats have sought to put the best possible face on the apparent lack of interest in the party's 1992 presidential nomination by citing the widespread view that recent campaigns have gone on too long.

Now, party leaders seem ready to spur some action and invited some potential candidates to address this weekend's Democratic National Committee meeting. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas and House Majority Leader or Dick Gephardt of Missouri have accepted.

The meeting will ratify the allocation of delegates for 1992 and give party leaders a chance to discuss the potential participants in what looks like the third wide-open Democratic race in the past five elections.

In 1976 and 1988, the Democratic nomination wasn't decided until well into the primaries. For one thing, the Republicans had internal battles in those two years that kept them from gaining the advantage they will get in 1992 from the unopposed renomination of a popular incumbent.

And the wide-open 1976 and 1988 Democratic races stemmed from a large field of eager candidates, rather than their absence. Enthusiasts then had no fear of seeing a candidate from those who might seek to unseat President Bush.

Still, even if the Democrats fail to unseat Bush, a relatively strong showing could boost their 1992 nominee for 1996, when most Democrats think their chances will be far better.

Here is how the current field looks:

- MARIO CUOMO: Last summer, the New York governor was regarded as a likely candidate and the probable front-runner. Now, both assumptions are in doubt due to

the state's budget troubles, the governor's lackluster re-election showing and a drop in voter approval, the renewed emphasis on foreign policy and his comments on the Persian Gulf crisis. He initially suggested compromise with Saddam Hussein and later said the U.S. victory didn't necessarily mean the war was a good idea. Political opinion inside and outside the party is split on whether his vulnerabilities could be offset by his undoubted eloquence and the perception of strength he can convey.

- LLOYD BENTSEN: The Texas senator is another Democrat whose candidacy seems less likely as party prospects decline. Even some close to him doubt he'll run unless the field is very small and his chances of victory seem good — for the nomination and the general election.

- JESSE JACKSON: After two unsuccessful bids, the civil rights leader seems preoccupied with such non-presidential pursuits as his syndicated television show and staidhood for the District of Columbia. Many top Democrats doubt he'll run, though they concede there is no way to be sure.

- DICK GEHPHARDT: The widespread belief earlier this year that he would try again has diminished with the successful end of the Gulf War. But there is unanimous belief the Missouri congressman is better prepared to run than any other possible contender. And he is putting off making the necessary appointments in case he decides to run.

- ALBERT GORE: The Tennessee senator says he is giving serious consideration to running, and many think his chances were bolstered by his position as one of the few prominent Democrats to back force in the Gulf. His wife Tipper reportedly wants to wait until 1996, and the 42-year-old senator

has done nothing to put together a campaign. But the lack of a strong field could increase pressure on him to run.

- DOUGLAS WILDER: The quiet and aggressive freshman Virginia governor is considered one of the likeliest candidates. His conservative fiscal policies could provide the means to challenge other governors like Cuomo, prominent leaders of Congress, and Jackson.

- BILL CLINTON: There is substantial interest among party moderates in the Arkansas governor, who is highly regarded by his fellow state executives. Clinton is believed interested but has ruled out consideration until later in 1991. Two possible handicaps: questionable fund-raising capacity and the renewed emphasis on foreign policy.

- JAY ROCKEFELLER: The West Virginia senator has been out and about, though he says he's not running, might be tempted by a void.

- PAUL TSONGAS: Party leaders were surprised at the expression of interest from the former Massachusetts senator, who retired in 1984 after one term because of cancer that is now in remission. But he appears to be serious and has talked to top officials, lined up some potential staff members and drafted an 83-page essay that looks like a campaign platform. Still, he remains a distinct long shot.

- GEORGE MCGOVERN: There is widespread doubt the 1972 nominee and former senator from South Dakota will run, let alone become a serious contender.

- SAM NUNN: The Georgia senator said several weeks ago he saw no conceivable circumstances under which he would become a 1992 candidate.

### Cash would show appreciation

Below is a copy of a letter I have circulated in regards to the current negotiations among the Arab nations and others in the Persian Gulf to settle damage and reparation claims. I encourage the promotion of this idea and concept. Anyone pursuing this is free to use this in whole or in part.

Bear in mind, the Persian Gulf War was a war where the United States had no direct military interest; we were not attacked and were "invited" to free Kuwait and to "protect" Saudi Arabia. I do not question the necessity of dismantling Saddam at that point, but I do believe it is morally correct to those rich nations to indemnify those who made the supreme sacrifice.

I am not proposing a program to be funded by the American taxpayers. I don't believe that should be considered.

I suggest the following:

These reparations would total less than \$100 million, a drop in the bucket in light of the total cost of the war.

These payments would also be the very first to be paid.

As Kuwait and Saudi Arabia are profusely thanking us for their liberation and protection, let them put up a small tangible token of their appreciation in cash!

As for Iraq is concerned, they would have no choice to pay, as it would be taken

out of frozen funds held by the United States. All of Iraq's reparation payments should be covered by a 20 percent royalty payment collected from all of Iraq's oil exports by the United Nations and pro-rated out to the approved beneficiaries by the United Nations.

# Otter vote kills increase in health spending Andrus opposes water draw

BOISE (AP) — Senate Republicans on Thursday used the tie-breaking vote of GOP Lt. Gov. Butch Otter to defeat Democratic efforts to increase spending on health and environmental programs.

The vote was taken as leaders continued grappling with the floodslide of relief swamping their new general tax spending blueprint.

With analysts already estimating the overall budget for the spending year that begins July 1 will be at least \$1.1 billion, above the conservative revenue estimate, Republicans stood firmly against approving the deficit.

"There were many, many programs recommended by the governor that were not included," said Sen. Lynn Tomlinaga, R-Rupert, the budget committee member who put together much of the legislative alternative to the plan of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"We could easily put \$3 million or \$4 million into this budget," Tomlinaga said, but the money is not there.



The state attempt was expected with the House-passed \$484.5 million public school aid package, but there were indications it might be successful on that bill and several million more dollars could be added.

At the same, Andrus fired off a letter to the Republican leadership, complaining that legislative decisions on the 1992 public works program have committed the state to spend \$25.8 million it will not have in 1993 to finish projects only partially funded in the new budget.

At the time the \$19 million package was fashioned by the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee earlier this month, House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, maintained there was no commitment on the panel's part to com-



plect any of the projects only partially funded in the 1992 package.

Among those is the higher education center in Idaho Falls, a new classroom complex at Eastern Idaho Technical College, a new building at State Hospital North in Orofino, a new Parks and Recreation Department headquarters in Boise and a new library and media center at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls.

In addition, planning has been done, but no money allocated for a new women's prison in Pocatello and a new Law Enforcement Department

headquarters in Boise.

In his letter, Andrus said that means either money is being wasted in the 1992 budget on projects that will not be completed, or "that scarce resources for education and other critical needs will be diverted to cover this shortfall."

The governor asked leaders to advise him of what corrective action they contemplated before the construction budget reaches his desk.

"They had better solve this problem or let me know what their plans are or there won't be a building program," Andrus said later in the day.

Earlier, the governor signed into law a special \$2.9 million diversion of general tax revenues to support legislative operations over the next 20 months, including \$500,000 to underwrite operations of a new legislative oversight committee and \$350,000 for a special session Andrus has suggested he would be hard-pressed to call.

LEWISTON (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus has notified the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers that he opposes the agency's plan to double the water reservoir available in May from Dworshak Reservoir to help migrating salmon.

An Andrus letter to the corps dated last Friday is another round in a dispute between the Idaho governor and the corps.

The people of the Clearwater Valley should not be asked to bear the burden of a steep draft in a reservoir in their backyard when other geographic areas refuse to make any

contribution to the anomalous fish problem," Andrus said in the letter.

The letter was filed with the day after corps officials announced they would not pursue an Andrus-backed drawdown test on Lower Granite Reservoir, Andrus made the proposal earlier this year to members of the Salmon Summit.

The corps had agreed to release 600,000 acre feet of water from Dworshak to help speed the migration of young salmon. In recent years, the corps has released half that much water for the fish.

## Craig bill calls for talks on new U.S. bases in Panama

WASHINGTON — Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, introduced a resolution Thursday calling for the negotiation of new base agreements with Panama to ensure that the U.S. has a military force in the region when the canal returns to Panama in 1999.

Joined by Congressman Philip Crane, R-Ill., Craig said that it was vital to U.S. interests to be able to keep American soldiers in the region to guard vital shipping in the event there is a hostile coup in the Central American republic.

Both lawmakers think that with the democratically elected President Guillermo Endara the claim is right for some sort of agreement before 1999 that would guarantee U.S. access to the canal.

"As we approach Dec. 31, 1999, we draw nearer to putting U.S. interests and regional security at risk," Craig said. "Unless we act in time, the canal will be surrendered with no real safeguards against a hostile third party taking control or restricting use of the canal."

The lawmaker said that despite the democrati-

cally elected government, there has been a long history of political instability in Panama.

The resolution specifically calls for the following:

- Negotiating new base rights agreements with the government of Panama.
- Allowing the permanent stationing of U.S. troops in Panama beyond Dec. 31, 1999, to maintain the security of the Panama Canal and to guarantee its regular operation.
- Consulting with Congress throughout the negotiations.

## Development, low water cause fish kill

LAST CHANCE (AP) — Persisting drought and continued residential development around eastern Idaho's Henrys Lake have combined to cause what Fish and Game Department experts fear is the worst kill ever in the famed trout fishery.

"It's basically a total department-spokesman Bill Goodnight said.

With an ice cover of nearly three feet topped by a foot of new snow, officials said they could not determine the full extent of the fish kill.

"But the creek mouths and springs, where we can see open water, we are starting to see dead fish," Herb Pollard, regional supervisor, said, "and where we have taken oxygen samples through the ice, it is very low to where trout can't survive for very long."

More than 1,000 dead and dying fish have been recovered from Hatchery Creek, he said, and additional dead fish are being found at other outlets.

"This appears to be the worst situation that we have ever recorded," Pollard said. "We can do a little bit about it, but we can't fix an entire 6,000 acre lake."

"We won't lose all of the fish in the lake," he said. "But the quality of the fishery, the number of big, live fish available to fishermen this summer, may be greatly reduced."

The dramatically reduced oxygen levels for what had been a huge population of large trout in a generally shallow lake are the result of extremely low water flows through the lake aggravated by increased nutrient pollution from the growing number of lakeside vacation homes and their septic systems.

Pollard said the nutrients are fertilizing lake plant life, which consumes oxygen as it both grows and dies off, and the water flows from creeks and springs have been reduced so much by the drought over the past five years that they no longer flush out plant life and bring in adequate new oxygen.

During the other seasons, sunlight has been able to keep oxygen levels in balance, but in the winter amplified by the extremely thick ice cover has combined with the other factors to cause the kill, he said.

The state Division of Environmental Quality is preparing to study Henrys Lake to determine the extent and sources of pollution.

Susan Harris, director of the state's Water Quality Bureau, said studying the eastern Idaho lake has been one of her office's top priorities.

## CBS reports increase in NCAA TV ratings

NEW YORK — CBS Television reported ratings of 8.3 Thursday for last weekend's broadcasts of the NCAA tournament, an increase of two percent over last year's numbers.

Spokeswoman Susan Kerr said the daytime averages of 4.5 for last Thursday and 4.3 for last Friday were on target with projections and triple ESPN's ratings of 1.3 and 1.6 last year. The cable network reaches 58.3 million homes compared with 93 million for CBS.

Sunday's third game — most of the country saw Georgetown against UNLV — earned a 12.6 rating, highest ever for any second round game. The highest previous second round rating was 11.8 for the regionalized coverage of four games in the 1992 tournament.

Saturday night's split primetime coverage of Indiana vs. Florida State and Connecticut vs. Xavier attracted an 8.3 rating, an increase of 26 percent from the network's season average for that time period of 6.6.

"Bo Jackson's future should not be judged by doctors who haven't seen his medical reports, his agent says.

All of these quacks around the country have not examined Bo's records and have no idea what they're talking about," Richard Woods, Jackson's agent, said Thursday from Mobile, Ala.

"When I see doctors in San Diego, San Francisco, or New York or Washington, commenting, it makes you wonder what sort of ethical medical standards they have."

An Alabama medical center where Jackson was examined this week said the two-sport star would be tested again in 30 days. It said it would not comment on Jackson's condition until then.

Meanwhile, Woods said the New York Yankees are serious about claiming Jackson by Friday's 2 p.m. EST deadline.

"Bo and the Yankees could be a match made in heaven," Woods said. "A New York is New York, the Yankees are the Yankees and Bo is Bo. The Yankees are the greatest franchise in history and Bo could breath new life into a great organization."

Yankees general manager Gene Michael said the team was still deciding what to do.

"We haven't put in a claim yet," he said in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. "We haven't done anything yet. We're still discussing it. We have a lot more things to talk about. We're going to know more tomorrow."

Woods said the only person with all of Jackson's medical records regarding his hip injury is Dr. Jim Andrews, the two-sport star's personal physician from Birmingham, Ala.

"He's a world renowned sports medicine guy and he's very optimistic about Bo's future," Woods said. "Right now, he's being cautious and conservative and he still feels strongly that Bo will be back, and will possibly play this year."

# NL expansion chairman says division realignment unlikely

NEW YORK (AP) — The chairman of the National League expansion committee said Thursday that divisional realignment was unlikely when two teams are added for the 1993 season.

Pittsburgh Pirates chairman Douglas Danforth, the head of the expansion committee, also said the NL and the American League have "only one choice" to settle the division of \$190 million in expansion fees, or else commissioner Jay Vincent will decide the matter.

Danforth said he hoped that the two leagues would make a final choice on expansion cities at the owners' meetings in Los Angeles on June 12-13. The expansion committee already has visited the three Florida cities: Miami, Orlando and St. Petersburg. It will visit Buffalo, N.Y., and Washington on Monday and go on to Denver the following day.

Denver's ownership group expanded when Adolph Coors Co. of Golden, Colo., agreed last Friday to invest \$20 million in equity, ownership and promotion. In addition, the backers of the prospective team agreed to name their proposed 43,000-seat stadium Coors Field.

Danforth said he didn't think the existing NL teams would agree to a realignment of the divisions which have been in place since 1969. Because Chicago and St. Louis refused to go to the West Division, they were placed in the East, then and Atlanta was placed in the West.

"It's not saying it's a foregone conclusion we will not (realign), but it's unlikely," Danforth said.

He said that even if two eastern teams were selected, it was possible that they would be placed in different divisions.

Danforth said after next week's visit, he will meet with his other ex-

pan committee members: NL president Bill White, Phillies owner Bill Giles and New York Mets co-owner Fred Wilpon.

"We'll see if we can reach a consensus in ranking the six cities," Danforth said. "We'll probably call a special meeting after that."

At that meeting, the expansion committee would brief the entire major league ownership on its findings. While some officials in the commissioner's office believe a final vote will not be possible until July or August, Danforth thinks it is possible to conclude the process by the quarterly meetings in Los Angeles.

"I'd like to get it over with as soon as possible," he said. "The teams should be able to get going as early as they can."

Vincent has said the division of the money must be settled before cities can be selected. The AL wants

a share of the \$95 million-team fees, while the NL wants to retain all the money. In the past, each league has kept its own "commissioner's money."

John Monetti, chairman of the Colorado Baseball Partnership, said Coors' involvement as a limited partner boosts his group's equity over \$100 million.

"I've thought it was important to have Coors' participation because they are the major name in Colorado," he said. "Coors participation is paramount to the success of the franchise. It will allow us to have financial stability into the next century."



**HAILEY** — Have any spare pizzas, beef tongues or dead octopuses? If so, Ivan and his fellow Flying Karamazov Brothers might agree to juggle them in a show set this weekend at Wood River High School.

For 18 years, the Flying Karamazov Brothers have crisscrossed the country and gone abroad with a zany blend of juggling, improvisational comedy and music. The troupe's current show — "Theater of the Air" — hits Hailey at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

A highlight of the show should be "The Gamble," in which the audience is invited to bring impossible objects for the troupe's champ, Ivan, to juggle. Objects must weigh at least an ounce (although not more than 10 pounds) and be no bigger than a bread box.

If Ivan succeeds in juggling the donated object, he gets a standing ovation. If he fails, he gets a pie in the face. In addition to the items listed above, Ivan has juggled snakes, bread dough, slices of watermelon, dead fish, a plate of Jell-O and much, much more.

In the Karamazovs' words, "the champ will not juggle any live animals, or anything which might stop the champ from being a live animal."

In spite of such precautions, Ivan (the only right-handed Karamazov) severely broke his right index finger in a performance last March. "Not to be deterred, the four Karamazovs spent the spring performing as a seven-handed juggling group. Ivan is now back to normal, or as normal as these guys get."

Now based in the Seattle area, the Flying Karamazov (pronounced "Kara-mah-soft") Brothers have been performing as a troupe since 1973, when the group started on the streets of San Francisco.

In an interview last year with The Seattle Times, Ivan — whose real name is Howard Jay Patterson — mentioned that the Karamazovs claim a particularly regional appeal.

"We seem to have a Northwest sense of humor," he said. "When we play other places, there are sometimes blank spaces in the show when there's no reaction at all from the audience. But when we play here, we get the most consistent laughs of anywhere."

Nevertheless, the Karamazovs — who aren't really brothers — are frequently on tour and draw raves wherever they go.

"They are as nimble of wit as they are deft of hand, and your mouth will open wide in laughter no less than in awe," wrote John Simon of New York magazine. "They handle an audience as cleverly as the cleavers, clubs, knives and other imaginable and unimaginable objects they juggle."

"These master jugglers are hilarious. Don't everything and go to see them," said Gene Shalit of NBC's "Today" show.

In addition to Patterson, the company includes Dmitri (Paul David Magid), Fyodor (Timothy Furst) and Smerdyakov (Sam Williams).

Their Public Broadcasting System special, "The Flying Karamazov Brothers: Stars of New Vaudeville," won an Emmy Award for Outstanding Entertainment Programming. The brothers also starred in their own Showtime special and appeared in the film "The Jewel of the Nile."

## Battle ends before war music can take hold

**WASHINGTON** — What if they gave a war and it was over before anybody could write a song about it?

Well, the Persian Gulf conflict wasn't quite that quick, but an awful lot of opportunistic music became instantly outdated at the end of the 100-hour ground war. In fact, bad timing all around is likely to ensure that we won't remember this war through song the way we did Vietnam.

For instance: The Lenny Kravitz-Sian Lennon-Peace Choir update on John Lennon's "Give Peace a Chance" was released the day the air war started and while the multi-star video got lots of MTV airplay, the single — like Randy Newman's "Lines, in the Sand" — got very little commercial exposure.

At the other end of the war, Fox telecast a documentary on the making of the

celebrity choir "Voices That Care" the day after the cease-fire was declared, and the same time, the Rolling Stones, long known for their lack of haste in the studio, weighed in with "Highwire," written in December, recorded in January. And Tony Orlando has just released "With Every Yellow Ribbon (That's Why We Tie 'Em)," a rotten variation on his 1973 anthem, "Tie a Yellow Ribbon Around the Ole Oak Tree."

The Stones' song, which has the group's classic rhythmic punch, is critical of arms-for-oil trade-offs.

"We sell 'em missiles, we sell 'em tanks. We give 'em credit, you can call up the bank. It's just a business, you can pay us in crude."

It also expresses concern for the soldiers on the front lines, but suggests that

"sometimes dictators need a slap on the wrist another Munich we just can't afford. We gonna send in the 82nd Airborne."

We already did, Mick, we already did. "Voices That Care," described by USA Today as "an all-star singing telegram to U.S. troops," may be returned to senders since the troops are already heading home. It was rushed to radio in late February, but the record wasn't released until this week.

The song that got the most exposure, not surprisingly, was Whitney Houston's "Star-Spangled Banner," advertised by "Arista" as performed at the Super Bowl. Maybe the company that brought us Milli Vanilli is a little publicity-shy, particularly after it was revealed that Houston's stunning performance was prerecorded at a Los Angeles studio several days before

the game; Arista says Houston didn't just lip-synch but sang along live, though she was inaudible to the stadium crowd.

Oddly enough, the Florida Orchestra supporting Houston was also playing live, but its microphones were off, so Houston was hearing a tape of it on the monitors. This week, "The Star-Spangled Banner" is No. 21 (with a bullet) on the Billboard charts (five places behind Houston's "All the Man That I Need") and is rapidly approaching platinum sales status (CDs and cassettes include a Houston recording of "America the Beautiful," recorded in the studio at the same time). And shades of Madonna, there's also a hot-selling video single version available.

This is the highest the national anthem has charted since Jose Feliciano's version in 1969. Not surprisingly, Houston will star in a "Welcome Home Heroes" concert for HBO on Sunday, March 31.

## Television's full docket of law shows will get fuller

**HOLLYWOOD** — Comedy writer-producer Martin Rips and a former University of California, Los Angeles, classmate, attorney Bob Cohen, were having lunch.

"I was a young lawyer," Cohen recalled of the meeting 10 years ago, "and I told him I had a good idea for a show based on looking at live cases in and out of the office, of lawyers. And I'd call it 'Beverly Hills Law.'"

"And Marty started laughing. He said, 'Bob, this morning I saw my dentist. He was doing a root canal on me and he told me he had this idea — for a series on dentists!'"

"Marty said, 'Bob, you stay with law. I'll handle TV.'"

Rips may have missed the concept of

of Rosie O'Neill" to "Law and Order," there are enough such series already on our screens to constitute major gridlock — and three more legal dramas open this month.

"Eddie Dodd" debuted on ABC last week, with Treat Williams in the heroic defense attorney role that James Woods played in the "True Believer" feature film. "Shannon's Deal" returns to NBC Saturday night, with Janney Sheridan as the grubby former corporate attorney.

And due in July: "Court TV," a 24-hour cable channel on law, lawyers and courtroom trials, with former CBS law correspondent Fred Gisham as managing editor. They will join, in addition to the dramas already mentioned, "Equal Justice" and "Gabriel's Fire" on ABC; "Night Court" and the "Perry Mason" movies on NBC; "Against the Law" on Fox Broadcasting; the "TrialWatch" morning magazine

"reality" series on NBC; the syndicated "People's Court," "Superior Court," "Divorce Court" and "The Judge," and the occasional "Rumpole of the Bailey" on PBS.

Why the glut? Charles Vogel, a Los Angeles trial lawyer who is president of the California Bar Association, figures the popularity of TV law may be "because the structure of a contest, good and bad, is easily provided in the matrix of a law suit." And with people more knowledgeable about and conversant with the law, he observed, "It's no longer the mystery that it once was."

It's also cheaper, he jokes. "All you need is a couple officers, a courthouse and some shots of Century City."

Several producers laughed at the suggestion that their legal series are cheaper, but

# Jackson, Sony agree on lucrative deal

NEW YORK (AP) — Sony Corp. demonstrated its awesome power in the entertainment industry by announcing a long-term contract with Pop superstar Michael Jackson that could be worth more than \$1 billion in sales.

The agreement between Jackson and the Japanese electronics giant's U.S. entertainment subsidiary Sony Software Inc. for Jackson's collaboration in projects ranging from full-length feature films to his own record label. He also will do work for Sony in television shows and possibly even video games.

Jackson's compensation in the agreement wasn't disclosed, but was bound to vastly increase the wealth of a modern-day legend who already is one of the best-paid recording stars in the world. "It is the first time that Sony has structured an agreement for an entertainer to cross from one of our mediums into another," said Sony Software spokesman Robert Zito. "We feel Michael Jackson is certainly unique."

It was one of the largest deals ever with a single entertainer and dwarfed the \$32 million recording contract Michael's sister Janet signed earlier this month with Virgin Records.

"This is a great opportunity for us to both continue and expand our relationship with Michael Jackson," Sony Software president Michael Schulhof said in a statement.

"Sony and Michael Jackson have had an outstanding relationship in music," he said. "We look forward to expanding this relationship to include other entertainment opportunities, which only Sony can provide."

The agreement marks the latest example of a trend reshaping entertainment: the corporate marriages of Japanese electronics

companies that produce the cameras, stereos, compact disk players and videocassette recorders, to the creative forces that make the films, records, CDs and videos played on them.

Sony, which produces some of the best-known brands names in consumer electronics gear, was able to engineer the deal with Jackson partly because it owns the company he has recorded with for 15 years.

Sony purchased the former CBS Records Inc. for \$2 billion in 1988.

Sony also owns Columbia Pictures Entertainment Inc. which it bought in 1989 for \$3.4 billion.

Other Japanese electronics giants have since moved to match Sony's strategy. The most striking example is Matsushita Industrial Electric Co., maker of Panasonic, Quasar and Technics electronic gear, which earlier this year purchased MCA Inc., owner of Universal Studios, for about \$7 billion.

Under the terms of the Sony-Jackson arrangement disclosed Wednesday, Jackson will produce six albums, the first scheduled for release on Sony's Epic label this summer. He also will work with famed directors ranging from Richard Attenborough to David Lynch in producing short films based on his songs.

In addition, Jackson will star in a full-length feature for Columbia, which the Sony station described as a "musical action adventure" written by Caroline Thompson, author of "Edward Scissorhands" and Larry Wilson, co-author of "Beetlejuice."

Jackson, who is still dealing with life and death but without the crash costs associated with police suites. He cited the "vice" in "Miami Vice"; "It's the chasing around, the burning of automobiles, the speedboats, the action sequences ... and, he quickly added, as a tribute to Don Johnson's wardrobe — "the lavender suits!"

Boston trial attorney Jack Curtin Jr., president of the American Bar Association, says the appeal of such shows might be profound: "In our society, it's hard to find groups of people who can actually make a difference in the world — and, more and more, people have become aware of their own lack of power."

Lawyers are one group that can make a difference, he contended. Not only that, said Colten, the Los Angeles litigator, but attorneys also are at the heart of power: "No question, law is all about power; that's why people — even though they hate lawyers — that's why they love them."

He noted the historical context: "In the '80s we had a time of tremendous deregulation and greed and, as a result, we have had economic warfare between the Michael Milken and the Ivan Boesky and the airline wars and all these other things — and the lawyers have been in there every step of the way."

David Manson, who co-created (with Michael Butler) Fox's "Against the Law," acknowledged

the courtroom as "a theatrical arena, so it's automatically attractive to writers," but says the issues at stake strike a deeper chord in the audience.

"Our sense of good and evil and right and wrong have become very relative," he said, "and people over the last 10, even 20 years, have been searching for how to act, how to do

the right thing. ... Issues of right and wrong are just no longer as clear, or at least as clear as they appeared to be before the Vietnam War and Watergate. ... The war was good for a number of acts who "appropriated" songs on albums that had already peaked commercially (Bette Midler's Grammy-winning "From a Distance," Oleta Adams' "Get Here," George Michael's "Mother's Pride" and Sly's "Show Me the Way"), but whether any of these songs will have the impact 20 years down the line of Edwin Starr's "War" remains to be seen. Country radio accented support-the-boys, fly-the-flag and stomp-Saddam Hussein songs, and pop-radio savaged the middle-of-the-road acts as always.

Urban and rock radio leaned toward classic protest songs from the Vietnam era: Marvin Gaye's "What's Going On," Freda Payne's "Bring the Boys Home," "War" (the Starr original) — and Springsteen's cover, Jefferson Airplane's "Volunteers," the Doors' "Unknown Soldier," Lennon's original "Give Peace a Chance" and Bob Dylan's "Masters of War" (not the indelic-

pherable version he rendered on the Grammys, the one many failed to recognize as Dylan's sharp attack on the political-military-industrial complex).

The major difference between Vietnam and the Persian Gulf may be: This has turned out to be a popular war, one fought by a volunteer army, backed by state-of-the-art weaponry and supported by a great majority of the people. Not just a war, but a just war and a short one, not a long war fought in the midst of a countercultural uprising.

All this has probably given well-known artists pause, particularly if they wanted to offer anti-war positions at a time when the music industry and the establishment are sometimes indistinguishable.

The sound of silence was surprising. Apparently it's easier to express anti-war sentiments in times of peace and harder to criticize the war without seeming to criticize our troops (another Vietnam quill-associated lesson).

There has been a glut of songs by deservedly unknown writers and performers, on vanity labels, or custom tapes sent to local radio stations and newspapers looking for angles.

They take either of two paths: one maudlin and sentimental, focusing on absent soldiers and their families; the other, jingoistic and confrontational, focusing on Saddam Hussein specifically, and Iraqis in general. Luckily, the end of the war means they no longer have to be discussed.

## Johnny Cash eulogizes McEntire band members

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Johnny Cash eulogized seven members of singer Reba McEntire's band, victims of a California plane crash, as musicians who fulfilled their dreams. Eight-hundred mourners attended a memorial service for the seven, and for McEntire's road manager and two pilots also killed Saturday when their private plane crashed near San Diego. McEntire, who was on another flight, arranged the 60-minute church service and attended. She did not participate in the memorial, but sat with 100 members of the victims' families.

Every one of these worked with the top name doing the thing they loved and performing for more people than they ever imagined," said Cash, dressed in his traditional black. "What could be more fulfilling? They achieved their dream," he said. Among those attending the service at Christ Church were country stars

"Rosie O'Neill" executive producer Bruce Rosberg asserted that cost is a vital factor these days. Among various reasons: "The syndication market (for series resales) for hour dramas has fundamentally collapsed in this country, the networks have increased the license fees the last three or four years (and) labor is up."

The fact is that with a law show, he said, you are still dealing with life and death but without the crash costs associated with police suites. He cited the "vice" in "Miami Vice"; "It's the chasing around, the burning of automobiles, the speedboats, the action sequences ... and, he quickly added, as a tribute to Don Johnson's wardrobe — "the lavender suits!"

Boston trial attorney Jack Curtin Jr., president of the American Bar Association, says the appeal of such shows might be profound: "In our society, it's hard to find groups of people who can actually make a difference in the world — and, more and more, people have become aware of their own lack of power."

Lawyers are one group that can make a difference, he contended. Not only that, said Colten, the Los Angeles litigator, but attorneys also are at the heart of power: "No question, law is all about power; that's why people — even though they hate lawyers — that's why they love them."

He noted the historical context: "In the '80s we had a time of tremendous deregulation and greed and, as a result, we have had economic warfare between the Michael Milken and the Ivan Boesky and the airline wars and all these other things — and the lawyers have been in there every step of the way."

David Manson, who co-created (with Michael Butler) Fox's "Against the Law," acknowledged

the courtroom as "a theatrical arena, so it's automatically attractive to writers," but says the issues at stake strike a deeper chord in the audience.

"Our sense of good and evil and right and wrong have become very relative," he said, "and people over the last 10, even 20 years, have been searching for how to act, how to do

the right thing. ... Issues of right and wrong are just no longer as clear, or at least as clear as they appeared to be before the Vietnam War and Watergate. ... # Black ministers question movie's effect on youths

HOUSTON (AP) — Black ministers asked the district attorney to temporarily ban the movie "New Jack City" until its producer researches the effect the film about drug dealers is having on urban black youth.

The movie, about a fight against a Harlem drug lord, has been marked by violence at several theaters showing the film. One person was killed at a New York theater. At a sold-out Los Angeles theater, a crowd rioted through the area.

The Rev. James Dixon told a news conference that the ministers were not asking for censorship. "But the government has asked all industries to cooperate in the national war against drugs."

The district attorney's office said it had no jurisdiction in the case and referred the ministers to a private attorney, said an assistant district attorney who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Dixon and three other ministers who comprise the Urban Crisis Task Force said the federal Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 encourages private industry to be involved in anti-drug efforts.

He said Warner Bros., which produced the film, should determine the movie's effect on youth before it continues to show it. The ministers also want the Harris County district attorney's office to enforce the movie's "R" rating, barring children under 17 from entering the theater without an adult.

Warner Bros. spokeswoman Vivian Boyer said the company had no comment.

# Demme film quietly terrifies

**HOLLYWOOD** — The Jonathan Demme of "Something Wild" or "Melvin and Howard" or "Stop Making Sense" might not be the first director one would think of for suspense or bloody terror; his touch has always seemed lighter, his interests more quirky and off the mainstream.

## Review

So much for pigeonholing Demme's vision of "The Silence of the Lambs." Thomas Harris' truly terrifying novel is stunning. It is also unusual, as the FBI races to save a kidnapped young woman from a serial killer, Demme concentrates on the hypnotic duel between his two strong central characters, an FBI trainee and a brilliant sociopath, rather than the easy effects calculated to make an audience jump.

They may jump anyway, since "The Silence of the Lambs" is marked by the second appearance of Dr. Hannibal Lecter — Hannibal the Cannibal — and Anthony Hopkins' insinuating performance puts him right up there with the screen's great bogymen.

We have seen Dr. Lecter's pure evil before: the impulsive insane psychiatrist-murderer was played mesmerizingly by Brian Cox in "Manhunter," Michael Mann's adaptation of Harris' earlier novel "Red Dragon." Later, perhaps realizing the pull of the monster created, Harris moved Lecter to the forefront of "Lambs," and here in Ted Tally's screenplay by very nearly owns the film: Only nearly — he would have to be superhuman to wrest this film away from Jodie Foster, and Lecter is only a very close second.

Foster's Clarice Starling is a promising FBI trainee in her last year; brought in by Jack Crawford (Scott Glenn), chief of the Bureau's Behavioral Science Section, to do a psychiatric profile of Lecter. Although Starling isn't let in on the bureau's full agenda, Crawford's hope is that Lecter can be lured into shedding light on one of his own kind, a seemingly random serial killer nicknamed Buffalo Bill who slays the bodies of his women victims for his own, unfathomable purposes.

The build-up to Starling's first meeting with Lecter is as dramatic as the unmasking of the Phantom of the

Opera. Warned not to tell him anything personal — "You don't want Lecter inside your head" — the list of things Starling may not do, touch or say is capped by a photograph of Lecter's last victim, a nurse within the asylum whose grisly fate is graphically told and shown to Starling.

Mercifully, Demme doesn't share this sight with us, although there will be a gruesomely clinical tour of one of Buffalo Bill's victims in a later scene. The film is MPA-rated R for explicit shots of the murder victims, for terror, for scenes of gore and violence and for language.

The film swings between Starling and Lecter as though it were moving between sunlight and the chill of fluorescence: Even within the straitjacket of FBI-approved behavior, Foster radiates intelligence, sturdiness, unspoken empathy with the poor dead victims and the most profound human concern.

Hopkins sometimes literally slasher-jacketed, exudes cunning, a laser-keen intellect, patent contempt for most of the world, concentration that could seemingly bend spoons, and terrifying physical power. Lecter's persuasiveness becomes particularly threatening when he agrees to trade insights on Buffalo Bill for details of Starling's past, and from these he forges an unsettling bond with her.

Our fears about Lecter are height-

ened by Kristie Zea's production design for his isolation cell: its bars are far apart, separated by super-thick glass, but the visual effect deliberately suggests that the glass isn't there at all, that Lecter could simply reach through the bars to Starling — or to us.

Demme punches up this immediacy as Hopkins and Foster work directly into cinematographer Tak Fujimoto's camera in some of these early, intense scenes, a device that provides Lecter's caustic, deprecating tirades directly at us.

After Buffalo Bill kidnaps a U.S. senator's feisty, resourceful daughter (Brooke Smith), Crawford pulls Starling into the hunt as his assistant, liking her insights and her deductions.

Hopkins' performance may be the film's bravura showpiece, but Foster's goes the whole distance, steadfast, controlled, heartbreakingly insightful, a fine addition to her gallery of characterizations.

Although Crawford's search for Buffalo Bill and the Starling-Lecter duel dominate the action, the film is dotted with real, peripheral characters who give it a sense of authenticity: Kasi Lemmons as Starling's supportive roommate Ardisia; Paul Lazar as the sweetly friendly Smithsonian entomologist; Anthony Heald as Lecter's pindrift jailer, the smartly Dr. Chilton, and Fed Levine's terrifying Buffalo Bill, a.k.a. Jame Gumb.

# "Dances with Wolves" irresistible

**DANCES WITH WOLVES (PG-13).** In his first directing work; Kevin Costner has made a clear-eyed authentic vision of the frontier Northwest that is irresistible. The story of a Union soldier who befriends and falls in love with a tribe of Sioux, it has all the elements of epic: vastness, astonishing action sequences, exotic-seeming characters but because it's more concerned with character than spectacle, its epic quality becomes engaging, never self-congratulatory. Beautiful, memorable and full of humor, it's one of the most winning films of the year.

**THE DOORS (R).** A sometimes terrific, incendiary bio of Lizard King and Vietnam War-era rebel Jim Morrison of the Doors. Portraying one of the youth idols, Oliver Stone tries to put us right in the hot core of the action, while also lyricizing it, giving it a stylized framework. Twenty-five Doors songs, performed by the Doors — with occasional vocals by star Val Kilmer, an eerie visual motif for Morrison — provide a constant choric commentary and Stone, as usual, blasts our ears and scorches our eyes. If he doesn't quite blow our minds, it's still a hell of a ride and a great, roaring rock movie.

**EDWARD SCISSORHANDS (PG-13).** It's not as frenetic as Tim Burton's previous movies, but it's just as daffy; a modern fairy tale about the bewitched young artificial being, pulled from his Gothic horror house into the pastel land of modern suburbia. It's part Portrait of the Artist as a Young Frankenstein, part relentless satire of Burton's birthplace, Burbank, Calif., and part Seuss-Gorey allegory about how middle-class America has educated itself out of appreciating wonder. As Edward and two prototypical suburbanites, Johnny Depp, Dianne Wiest and Kathy Baker, the whole film has a tender underlining and a marvelously spry, fun-house look and pace.

**HOME ALONE (PG).** A 7-year-old child (Macaulay Culkin) is left behind by his parents when they jet to Paris for Christmas. Left to his own devices, he pigns out on junk food and foils a pair of cunning thieves (Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern). Some of the low-comic slapstick works on a tiful, Three Stooges level, but the basic idea — an abandoned child defending himself against intruders — is a bit too

seamy for comfort. Chris Columbus directed from a script by — who else? — John Hughes.

**KINDERGARTEN COP (PG-13).** The gentling of Arnold Schwarzenegger, first presented as a stubbled, long-winded cop with a taste for vicious vigilante tactics and gradual-

ly turned into a family-loving pussycat — by his undercover-surveillance job as a kindergarten teacher. The last word in glib, shallow, soulless, spuriously warm-hearted commercialism. Director Ivan Reitman and the usual consortium of writers barely miss a trick, or a marketing hook. Call the recent "trailer" movies films that resemble elongated trailers — this may be the most fool-proof.

# Academy, looking for quality movies, will hand out the Oscars on Monday

Call it committed humanism or squishy-soft sentimentality. Whatever the label, it's the quality that members of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences look for when they vote for Best Picture.

"Dances With Wolves," Kevin Costner's epic treatment of the lives of the Lakota Sioux, has that quality in abundance. That's why film critic Damien Bona expects "Dances" to waltz off with the Best Picture statuette when the Academy Awards air live from Los Angeles, Monday, March 25, on ABC.

Bona, co-author of "Inside Oscar" (Ballantine Books), observes, "Dances With Wolves" is everything that members of the Academy go for: It's warm; it's an epic; (Costner) had to fight all the studios to get the film made."

Bona rates "GoodFellas" a long-shot possibility for Best Picture. It won both the New York and Los Angeles critics awards, but for the Academy it's probably a little too downbeat, too violent. Fellow nominee "Awakenings" has the requisite humanism, but it was a box-office disappointment.

Everyone is talking about surprise Best Picture nominee "Ghost." "It's unusual, because a movie that makes as much money as 'Ghost' did is considered too popular to be good enough to win a Best Picture award," Bona says.

But the appeal of "Dances With Wolves" may not carry it to a sweep, despite its 12 nominations.

"Direction is one area in which 'Dances' isn't necessarily the favorite," Bona explains. "A lot of people feel that Costner's major achievement was getting the movie made at all." As a first-time director, Costner isn't likely to defeat such practiced hands as Martin Scorsese ("GoodFellas"), Francis Ford Coppola ("The Godfather, Part II"), Stephen Frears ("The Grifters") or even Barbet Schroeder ("Reversal of Fortune"). Bona's prediction: "They may want to honor Scorsese, who has never won before. People in the industry are in awe of him, because he makes personal films that get studio backing, good reviews and decent commercial success."

In the Best Actor category, one possibility is Robert De Niro for "Awakenings." "It's the kind of performance that the Academy

likes," Bona observes dryly. "But he already has two Oscars." Bona predicts a long-shot victory for Jeremy Irons.

Bona adds, "Unless it is a total sweep for 'Dances,' Costner won't win this award. The consensus is that his acting is the least of his achievements in the film." Gerard Depardieu might merit serious consideration for his work in the title role of "Cyrano de Bergerac," but, as Bona points out, "The fact that it's a French film works against him. On the other hand, (Depardieu) does have 'Green Card,' so he has to be kept in mind as a dark horse."

## Leslie Stahl stands first in line to take over '60 Minutes' job

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS newswoman Leslie Stahl is a top candidate to replace Meredith Vieira on the network's "60 Minutes," but no decision had been made, a CBS spokesman said last week.

Stahl, 49, anchor for CBS' "Face the Nation" broadcast on Sundays, is in Paris and working on a story for "60 Minutes," but there is nothing unusual in that, said CBS spokesman Roy Brunett.

Vieira is leaving "60 Minutes" at the end of the current season to have her second child, and news reports suggested the Paris assignment made Stahl a leading contender to replace Vieira.

"She is certainly a top candidate for that position, but nothing has been finalized at this time," Brunett said.

"It's for her, Leslie, to be comfortable with the '60 Minutes' format before she would make that

kind of decision," he said.

The Washington Post asked "60 Minutes" executive producer Don Hewitt whether the Paris assignment was a tryout.

"Just say that in the spirit of the way they do things in this day and age, we've agreed to live together a little bit before we get married," the newspaper quoted Hewitt as saying.

"And I can't envision our not getting married."

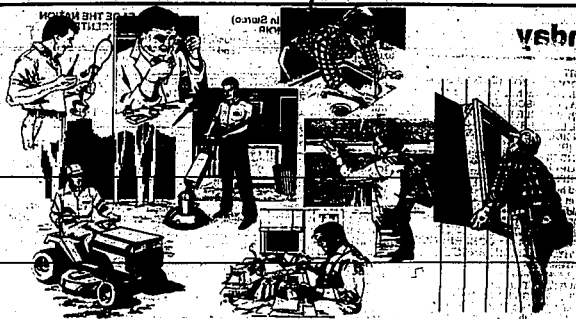

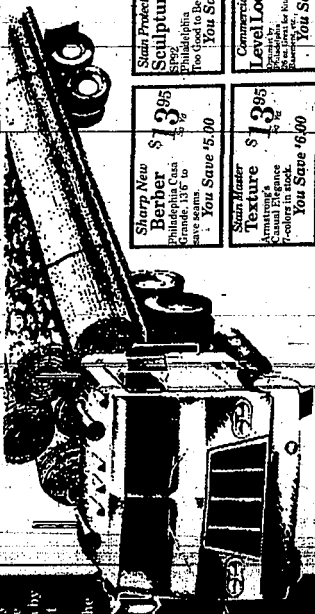
