Veto stamp stings Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS — Gov. Cecil Andrus' red-stamp action on Thursday left the Magic Valley smoldering.
In addition to vetoing \$3-million of the \$6.1 million allocated by the Legislature to relieve counties of indigent health care costs, Andrus nixed \$300,000 for the College of Southern Idaho to plan construction of a new library and he axed a \$500,000 plan by Rep. Bruce Newcomb of Burley for performance-audits of state agencies.
"I'm not sure we've got anything workable at this point. The counties are real

upset. They've been dealt a real blow," Twin Falls Republican Rep. Ron Black said, referring to the indigent health care cut.
Counties pay the bills of the medically indigent up to \$10,000. If above that, the bills are paid from a catastrophic health care account, which the counties currently fund also. But the state should pick up the tab for the account beginning in October under new legislation.
State law still leaves counties ultimately responsible for indigent medical costs.
Although the governor says the catastrophic fund has more than enough

cash to last another year, Magic Valley county commissioners were leery of his veto of \$3 million earmarked for the account.
"I don't know how they're going to do it if they don't have the funding coming at full speed," said Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman. Twin Falls County contributes \$230,000 a year to the catastrophic fund.

Hempleman said he doesn't know how the veto will affect the county, which also pays about \$800,000 a year in regular indigent medical costs, because the state

might not be able to fulfill its promise to alleviate the burden.

"Who's going to pick up the funding?" echoed Jerome County Commissioner Veronica Lierman. "It doesn't make sense to me."
Lierman said she was also disappointed with Andrus' veto of the Legislature's first proposal — under which the state would have absorbed \$11.5 million in indigent costs — because she said it was a much better bill.

"The compromise at least was some assistance to the taxpayers, but I don't think that was enough," Lierman said. Jerome County currently picks up

Bringing explorer out like a big math problem

CARLSBAD, N.M. — Rescuers overcame a maze of narrow passages, massive cliffs and treacherous chasms to pull an injured explorer from the nation's deepest cave early Thursday.

"Oh, the stars are out tonight," a jubilant Emily Davis Mobley said after her stretcher poked up from Lechuguilla Cave in Carlsbad Caverns National Park.

Mobley, 40, had a simple fracture of the left tibia and was in good condition Thursday, said Ruth Mead, Guadalupe Medical Center spokeswoman. She said doctors at the hospital in Carlsbad would set Mobley's leg Friday.

Mobley, who suffered a broken leg Sunday, emerged shortly after 1 a.m., ending a four-day operation that drew cave experts from around the United States. "Yee-haw!" she yelled.

The veteran spelunker called her husband, Bill, at home in Schoharie, N.Y., after she was lifted the final 70 feet out of the cave.

"Hello, Billy. This is your loving wife come up from the depths of the Earth to see you," she said.

"I'm wonderful. It was made a lot more of a big deal than it was," she told him.

He remarked later in admiration: "She isn't exhausted. She's in great shape. She's an absolutely incredible person."

Originally, officials said they didn't expect to get Mobley out of the cave before late Thursday or Friday. When she broke

her leg, she was 1,000 feet beneath the surface and more than 2 miles from the entrance of the complex cavern.

Rescuers had to stretch rope across chasms and weave them through pulleys up steep slopes to bring Mobley out of the cave that is 1,565 feet deep at its lowest point.

Mobley hobbled when there was space to stand upright and was carried or slid on stretchers elsewhere. A doctor with her in the cave gave her painkillers.

"Emily moved along at a very slow and steady pace" with rescuers always at least one step ahead of her, said Steve Sontag, who coordinated rigging of ropes inside the cave.

"We'd do a dry run with a real person so when Emily reached a particular problem we could briefly explain it ... and then it was clip her on and go," said Sontag, a member of the Albuquerque-Mountain Rescue Team.

At one point in a narrow crevice strewn with large boulders and gaping holes, rescuers had to lie on their backs and pass Mobley's stretcher across their bodies from one person to another.

"It's like a big math problem," said Steve Attaway of Albuquerque, a Sandia National Laboratories engineer.

The cave in a remote area of the park is closed to the general public. The National Park Service lists a limited number of experienced cavers in to explore and map it. Mobley was part of a mapping expedition.

Senator, 6 others die in air collision

MERION, Pa. — Sen. John Heinz and six others, including two children, were killed Thursday when a helicopter collided with his plane over a schoolyard at midday, authorities said.

The collision occurred as the helicopter was checking the landing gear of the senator's plane, authorities said.

The children killed were on the ground. Most children were in class at Merion Elementary and only a few were outside at the time of the fiery crash, said John Fowler, head custodian.

"Fifteen minutes later, there would have been 400 kids where the helicopter came down," Fowler said.

Heinz, a 52-year-old Republican, was an heir to the H.J. Heinz food empire. He was elected to the U.S. House, representing Pittsburgh, in a special election in 1971 and was re-elected twice. He was elected to the Senate in 1976 and was re-elected in 1982 and 1988.

Heinz and his wife, Teresa, have three children.

The bodies of Heinz and his two pilots were taken to Lankenau Hospital. Officials said the bodies were burned so badly that dental records were being brought from Washington to identify which one was Heinz.

Heinz's fellow senator from Pennsylvania, Republican Arlen Specter, was "too upset" to comment on the death, his office said. A spokesman said the two had been "very close friends" as well as colleagues. Heinz concentrated on issues

involving the elderly and on protecting steel from subsidized foreign competition.

He was the second ranking Republican on the Senate Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee and was the ranking GOP member of Banking's securities subcommittee.

Ozone layer thinning faster than anticipated

WASHINGTON — The earth's protective layer of ozone appears to be thinning about twice as rapidly as scientists previously believed, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday.

EPA Administrator William K. Reilly said new estimates suggest there could be an additional 200,000 deaths from skin cancer in the United States over the next 50 years because of the unexpected ozone loss.

That would represent a near doubling from the current rate of 5,000 skin cancer deaths a year.

Reilly said the agency would work harder to eliminate ozone-depleting chemicals such as chlorofluorocarbons, or CFCs, widely used in air conditioning and refrigeration, in a

making insulating foam and as a solvent.

An international agreement, the Montreal Protocol, calls for a phase-out by the year 2000 of CFCs and other chemicals that attack the ozone layer.

Reilly said preliminary data from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration suggest that the ozone layer has been depleted by 4 percent to 5 percent over the United States since 1978. Previous studies showed depletion of about half that amount, he said.

"What's happening is close to the worst fears. You're talking about losses that weren't expected," said F. Sherwood Rowland, a chemistry professor at the University of California at Irvine who discovered in 1974 that CFCs were damaging the ozone layer.

U.S. patrol flights to continue, Powell tells Iraq

WASHINGTON — U.S. warplanes may continue flying surveillance over Iraq indefinitely, even if Iraq promptly agrees to comply with the U.N. Security Council's strict terms for a permanent cease-fire, Gen. Colin L. Powell said Thursday.

Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, predicted that the allied ground troops occupying the southern 15 percent of Iraq will be out of the country about a month after a U.N. observer force arrives.

But the round-the-clock flights over Iraq by heavily armed Air Force F-15s and other warplanes, which have gone on since the shooting stopped, will continue until

President Bush orders them to halt, Powell said.

He said the flights are intended to ensure Iraqi compliance with the U.N. cease-fire resolution and to protect allied forces that would remain in the region.

The U.S. warplanes have already shot down a pair of Iraqi planes that took off in violation of the provisional cease-fire that took effect after Bush halted the shooting Feb. 28. Earlier this week, the Pentagon said the flights would continue despite Iraqi objections.

"We have the ability to maintain that air

cap for an indefinite period, even beyond the withdrawal of U.S. ground troops, Powell said, referring to the military term for a combat air patrol.

The U.N. cease-fire resolution calls for Iraq to agree to the destruction of its chemical, biological and nuclear weapons, as well as its long-range missiles; to pay reparations for its occupation of Kuwait; and to accept a U.N.-defined border with Kuwait. In return, the Security Council would lift economic sanctions imposed in August.

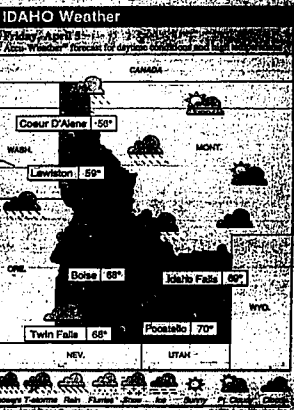
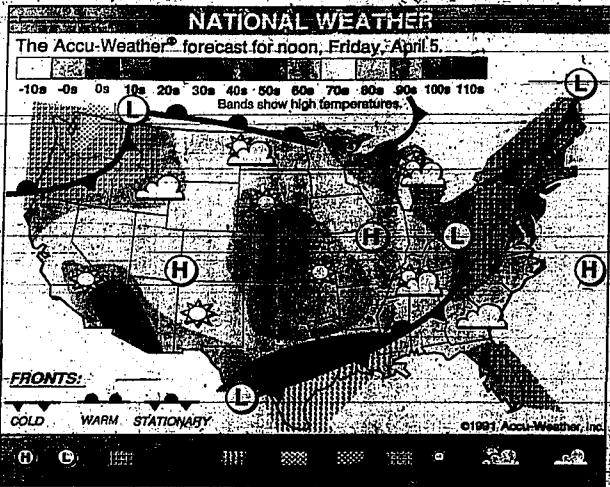
The United Nations would also station an

observer force on the Iraq-Kuwait border and could do so even before Iraq formally accepts the cease-fire terms, Iraq has not said when — or whether — it will accept the terms.

Although U.S. ground forces will leave as the U.N. observer force arrives, ending the plane patrols "is more closely linked to the acceptance of the resolution and entering into force of the permanent cease-fire, which is conditional on the acceptance of that resolution," Powell said.

Once some U.S. forces leave Iraq, "we will (still) have forces in the region," and the protection requires continuing the flights because of "the threat that exists from the Iraqi air forces," Powell said.

Weather summary

Thursday was the warmest day of the year in the Magic Valley, with temperatures rising into the 70s across much of the region on the wings of a warm southerly wind. Twin Falls recorded a 75 degree reading, the year's highest. Elsewhere in the state, highs ranged from the 40s into the 70s. Rainfall amounts ranged from traces at Salmon and Boise to .93 inch at Mullan, .13 at Moscow and .42 at McCall.

Some clouds also piled up across the Magic Valley during the afternoon but they were not heavy enough to either develop any precipitation or to have any appreciable effect on the warming trend of the day.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 78 degrees at Hagerman. Grace reported the coldest at 20 degrees.

April showers, thunderstorms across central part of U.S.

Rain was scattered Thursday from the Midwest to the Gulf of Mexico, while thunderstorms developed over the Southeast and locally heavy rain fell on the Northwest.

Showers developing ahead of a cold front crossing the central part of the nation were scattered from Wisconsin through Illinois and Indiana to the western half of the Tennessee Valley.

Showers and thunderstorms were scattered from northern Mississippi to the Texas coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Other showers and thunderstorms were scattered across southwestern Texas, with hail the diameter of dime reported at PECOS.

Showers and thunderstorms also were scattered across Georgia and Florida. Strong easterly wind accompanied the storms over the Florida Peninsula.

Showers associated with a cold front curving through

the Northwest were scattered from the northern Pacific Coast to western Montana. Heaviest rain in the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST was generally around a half-inch.

Heavy rain fell across parts of the northern Pacific Coast region Wednesday and Wednesday night. In the 24 hours up to 7 p.m. EST, 2.52 inches of rain fell at Quillayute, Wash., 2.25 inches fell at Olympia, Wash., and 2.04 inches fell at Astoria, Ore.

Strong southerly wind helped temperatures warm into the mid-60s and lower 70s in the north-central part of the nation. International Falls, Minn., warmed to a record high of 63.

Freezing temperatures during the night were primarily confined to the northern Atlantic Coast states and the Rocky Mountain region.

Bush emphasizes good relations with Tokyo in session with Kaifu

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (AP) — President Bush and Japan's Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu brushed aside obstinate trade differences Thursday but Bush said the two countries share a "fundamentally sound" relationship that transcends those problems.

The two leaders did not get into details on trade during nearly two hours of talks, nor did Bush make specific proposals in the effort to open Japan's markets to rice, said a senior U.S. official who attended the talks.

The official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said those "strained" trade relations "but that both leaders said they would push for a successful conclusion to the rocky Uruguay round of talks under the General Agreement on

Tariffs and Trade."

The talks bogged down over agricultural issues and the Bush administration was upset that Japan did not back its attempt to open agricultural markets and end export subsidies the talks.

During a joint news conference, Bush prodded Japan anew to move on the rice issue, as well as construction services, auto parts, semiconductor and other trade commodities that U.S. producers want to move into Japan's markets.

He said it was time "to move ahead" on trade, but also said the two nations had "made solid progress" in easing some trade tensions.

"Yes, we would like to have access to the Japanese rice market," Bush said.

Prime Minister Kaifu explained the complications that he faces in Japan on this question. But I think the overriding point is we both realize that we must have a successful conclusion of the Uruguay round, and to do that, agriculture must be included."

Kaifu said "there are difficult issues in the agricultural area" for both the United States and Japan.

He said he was willing to discuss rice in the GATT talks.

Kaifu expressed his country's sensitivity to congressional criticism it engendered by failing to supply troops to support the allied military effort in the Persian Gulf war.

"I firmly believe we have to rectify this situation," he said, noting it had caused much consternation in his country.

Washington shudders as Kurds flee

WASHINGTON (AP) — The image of Kurds fleeing in terror to escape the threat of annihilation by Saddam Hussein's army sent a shudder through Washington Thursday and led to complaints that President Bush had "stopped the war too early."

Still, opinion was divided over what Bush could — or should — do now to protect Iraq's three million Kurds. Some said the consequences of intervention would be even worse for America.

Bush, at a news conference Thursday, forcefully — almost angrily — ruled out U.S. military intervention on behalf of the rebels, but said the United States "will do what we can" to help Kurdish rebels.

"We're not going to get sucked into this by sending ... American lives into this battle," Bush said.

Experts said U.S. intervention could draw the United States into a Middle East quagmire. Even so, Bush was being blistered for having betrayed the Kurdish people by giving Saddam the ability to suppress the rebels with the firepower of helicopter gunships.

William H. Inge, conservative columnist of The New York Times, wrote that the Kurds' leader, Massoud Barzani, "knew he could defeat Saddam Hussein's war-weakened forces in the rugged hills if he now denied the dictator use of the skies ... But that was when George Bush got cold feet." He called it "failure of nerve."

With Congress on recess, the president has largely escaped political criticism, but some of what he said was delivered by Rep. Melvin Levin, a California Democrat who supported Bush's use of force to oust Iraq from Kuwait.

"By first encouraging a revolt in Iraq, and then suddenly refusing to intervene, we have in fact contributed to the nightmare facing the Kurds and other rebel groups," said Levin. "Unless action is taken quickly to put an end to the slaughter, this may go down in history as George Bush's Bay of Pigs."

Also killed were two pilots on Heinz's twin-engine Acrostar PA-44, Rick Shreck and Iron Stegan. Their bodies were not immediately available. Two pilots in the Bell 412 were identified by an airline spokesman as Charles J. Burke, 42, and Michael Pozzano, 43.

The aircraft burst into flames on impact and showered debris over the old stone houses and manicured lawns in the upper middle class suburb of Philadelphia.

The helicopter wreckage came to rest on the playground about 35 feet from the school. The plane fell to the ground on the other side of the building.

"The room started shaking and the windows blew open," said Joelle Morgan, 10, a fifth grader who was in math class at the time. "The teacher yelled, 'Fire.' Everyone was crying. Everyone wanted to go home."

Three children and two school employees were injured.

The teacher, the custodian, had his hand bandaged from the thumb to the wrist and said he was burned when he caught a boy trying to run into the school from the playground, his clothing on fire.

"The teacher was trying to restrain him, his pants were on fire," Fowler said. "We knocked him down and smuffed it out."

"I saw two children on the ground," said Fowler. "It was too hot to get close to them."

Shannon said he had heard reports that the instrument panel on the senator's plane did not show that the nose landing gear was locked and down.

Federal Aviation Administration spokesman LeRoy Johnson said the helicopter crew had confirmed the plane's landing gear was down and the plane was headed for the airport when the two collided. He said their radio conversations were tape-recorded.

The National Transportation Safety Board began compiling information shortly after the crash, but an agency spokesman said it could be four to six months before a report is issued on exactly what happened.

\$325,000 a year in indirect medical costs and contributes another \$63,000 to the state catastrophic health care account, she said.

"I would guess there will have to be some adjustments next year," he said.

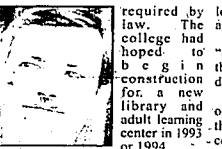

Desert war is full of love, lust, emptiness

IN A U.S. AIR BASE IN CENTRAL SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — It wasn't quite a storybook engagement celebration but it was definitely unforgettable: silk flowers, a fake ring, and non-alcoholic champagne served in a tent in the desert.

For Air Force Staff Sgts. Dee Ann Heidersheit and Steve Poole, the picnic dinner on an Army cot featuring cheese and crackers and summer sausage was the culmination of a five-month romance. It began at a bus stop at another air base in the Persian Gulf.

As tents start to fold and Desert Storm shifts to non-desert homecomings, the more than 500,000 U.S. troops deployed in the gulf will be closing a chapter in their personal lives.

For a few like Sgts. Heidersheit and Poole, the pages are filled with lusts, love letters and wedding plans. For others, there are memories of love and sexual escapades. But for some, there was only emptiness, heartbreak and even divorce.

"I think that this experience has been the acid test for relationships," said Air Force Capt. Michael Thornton, 35, of Kansas City, a Church of

Christ minister and Protestant chaplain. "To be or not to be, that is the question. And many are finding out what the answer is."

For many troops, letters addressed to "Any Serviceman" were a great morale booster. For Staff Sgt. Tim Bowden, 26, of Abington, Mass., a letter was the start of a long-distance romance.

When he leaves the air base in western Saudi Arabia where he works as a weatherman, Bowden will fly to Mountain Home Air Force Base in Idaho, pick up his car, and drive straight to Kentucky to meet Amy Marie Cowen, a 20-year-old student at Transylvania College.

They started writing in October after he read an "Any Serviceman" letter she wrote, and they decided it is possible to fall in love, sight unseen. "Love thanks to Saddam Hussein — who would believe it?" he asked.

Unlike Vietnam, which was renowned for its bagirra, Saudi Arabia offered no chance to fraternize with the completely robed and veiled local women.

But the Gulf War had far more

American women in the military, so there were opportunities for relationships, though not on ships or in combat units where females were banned.

At one air base in the gulf, a senior officer set up a "love palace" in a tent that was the envy of his juniors.

The camp commander, angered at reports of widespread hanky-panky, sent security police with night-vision goggles peering under tent flaps.

Several GIs were caught and disciplined, according to pilots at the base speaking anonymously.

Kurdish refugees crowd along Iranian border

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — About a million Kurdish refugees are crowded along the border opposite the Iranian town of Nowsood trying to escape Iraqi government troops, Iran's official news agency said Thursday.

The Islamic Republic News Agency said as many as 1.5 million refugees in all were heading toward Iran. It quoted Ahman Ziade, mayor

of the border city of Piranshahr.

The agency said at least 40 Iraqi refugees died in the cold on the road from the northern city of Erbil to the mountainous Iranian border. Turkish newspapers reported that hundreds of others died of wounds while trying to escape to Turkey. Iraq claimed on Thursday to have crushed the rebellion that has been raging in the Kurdish north and in the south, where

Shiite Muslims also have been fighting to topple the regime of President Saddam Hussein.

But Kurdish rebels still control many areas in the remote mountains, and refugees reaching Iran as well as Kurdish rebel spokesmen reported scattered fighting in both southern and northern regions.

In Washington, the Pentagon said Iraqi troops have consolidated their

control over most of Iraq including all the population centers. It said the army on Wednesday recaptured the last provincial capital, Sulaimaniyah.

Masoud Barzani, leader of the Kurdistan Democratic Party, drew thousands of listeners when he staged an impromptu rally in one mountain village. Associated Press correspondent Alex Efly reported from the scene.

Starvation danger looming in Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Many Iraqis will soon starve because of a scarcity of food in state warehouses, a top government official said Thursday. Trade Minister Mohammad Mehdi Saleh attributed the shortages in basic foodstuffs to the U.N. economic embargo and rebel looting of warehouses in northern and southern Iraqi cities. He appealed to international relief agencies for assistance, telling reporters: "The Iraqi people will soon starve to death because government food stocks are drying up and there are no means to fill them out again now."

Police arrest 51 in demonstration

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A major underground nuclear weapons test was conducted Thursday after authorities arrested 51 anti-nuclear activists trying to block workers from entering the remote desert test site.

The blast caused some high buildings to sway in Las Vegas, 195 miles from ground zero — the point of detonation.

The weapon was buried 2,000 feet beneath the surface of Fabius Mesa and had an explosive force equivalent to 20,000 to 150,000 tons of TNT, said Energy Department spokesman Darwin Morgan.

He said he did not feel any ground motion at a control point 31 miles from ground zero.

"Everything appears to be normal," Morgan said. "There's nothing on the radiation monitors. Everything looks normal at ground zero."

Authorities arrested 47 protesters who blocked U.S. 95 leading to the Nevada Test Site as scientists prepared for the second nuclear test of the year. Four more were arrested at the test site several hours later.

Two of the protesters, both arresting officers, Morgan said.

The test was delayed on an hour-to-hour basis today because of unfavorable weather conditions, with wind blowing toward Las Vegas, Morgan said. The test was originally scheduled for Wednesday but was delayed because of unfavorable wind conditions.

Tests are not conducted if the wind is blowing toward a populated area in case radioactive materials escape from the underground blast.

Chief placed on leave during investigation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Police Chief Daryl F. Gates was forced into a paid leave of absence Thursday until the outcome of investigations into the videotaped beating of a motorist by a group of officers.

The decision by the civilian Police Commission came after a private meeting with Gates. There was no reason given for the 60-day leave, decided by three members of the panel who attended the meeting.

"I feel that I have been disgraced and defamed," Gates said afterward.

"I have no idea why this is happening. I'm very controlled. I always have been," Gates said, adding he would fight the order.

Gates has been under attack since a group of white police officers repeatedly struck a black motorist after a high-speed chase. The beating of Rodney King was videotaped by an onlooker and televised nationally. Gates said earlier he would not resign until the commission report is issued. Mayor Tom Bradley has said Gates' response to the March 3 videotaped attack on King plunged the nation's second-largest city and its 8,300-member police department into crisis.

"I would not dispute their authority. I understand that could be insubordination," he said on ABC-TV's "Nightline" program Wednesday.

He said he would instead rely on "a due process system."

Gates' personal attorney, Jay Grodin, earlier said a forced leave probably wouldn't pass a legal muster. "Even a temporary leave has to be for some cause, and the cause cannot be nebulous," he said.

Gates has refused to leave his 13-year post, saying he would resign only if two blue-ribbon citizen panels examining the police find him guilty of derelict duty.

Unemployment claims soar deflating hopes of recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of Americans filing new unemployment claims jumped to the highest level in eight years last month, the government said Thursday in a report dampening hopes of quick end to the recession.

Meanwhile, a private study said a smaller percentage of jobs Americans received in 1990 than during any other recession year since World War II.

The bleak jobless claims data from the Labor Department — showing applications topping a half-million for the third straight week — followed more favorable recent reports indicating rebounds in consumer spending and the housing industry.

"For those who might have been hoping for a quick end to recession, I think that notion should be shattered," said Allen Sinai, chief economist at the Boston Co.

The separate study showing that only 37 percent of the nation's jobless received unemployment benefits last year brought renewed calls for Bush administration action.

The study, based on Labor Department figures, was compiled by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

Researchers uncover genes that trigger sense of smell

NEW YORK (AP) — Biologists have discovered a family of genes that may explain why a rose by any name would smell as sweet.

They have identified what they believe are 18 of the genes that enable the nose to latch on to the fragrant oils of the rose and distinguish them from tens of thousands of other smells.

"It's a bombshell," said Charles Wysocki of the Monell Chemical Senses Center in Philadelphia. "It's something that was not expected for many years."

A report of the discovery, by Linda Buck and Richard Axel of Columbia University, will appear Friday in the journal Cell.

"These molecules will serve as useful tools," said Buck, for solving a variety of important scientific and practical problems.

Buck said the discovery could be the first step toward understanding how the brain's nerve cells are wired together. It also could have practical applications in such areas as insect control, she said.

Strong-smelling substances called pheromones play a role in insect behavior and reproduction, she said. Learning how those substances are detected could lead to new means of inhibiting reproduction, for example.

Before this study, researchers had disagreed about whether smell was governed by a very few genes in a large number. The study suggests that 100 to 200 genes may be involved, Buck and Axel said.

"The number of genes, if it holds up to be true, is phenomenal," said Wysocki, an authority on the biology and psychology of smell. "It makes it now one of the largest related families of genes that's been identified."

He said the research is "literally going to open up whole new fields. It's going to draw people who never even thought of doing work with the sense of smell."

Televised exorcism reveals mysterious rite

NEW YORK (AP) — The 16-year-old girl has stopped retching and suddenly turns violent.

A low, guttural voice bursts forth toward a priest attempting to cast out the devil: "Get outa here."

Undaunted, the priest intones, "In the name of Jesus Christ, I silence Mings. I command the spirit of evil to leave now."

But the menacing voice the girl now speaks in refuses to be silenced. "We don't want to leave. ... We want Gina."

As clergy before him have done since medieval times, the priest makes a final determination that the woman is possessed and decides to perform an exorcism.

What will be different in this chapel at a house for nuns in suburban Palm Beach, Fla., is that the solemn rite — once confined to the imagination of Hollywood in such films as "The Exorcist" — will be broadcast to millions.

In hopes of dramatizing the reality of evil in the modern world, Roman Catholic Church officials gave ABC's "20-20" news program permission to film the solemn rite last October for a segment to be broadcast Friday night.

"It is my ardent hope that this film will be helpful in promoting awareness for the ongoing need for humble prayer and penance to counteract diabolical activity around us," said Bishop J. Keith Symons of the Diocese of Palm Beach, who gave permission for the filming.

The Rev. James J. LeBar, a consultant on calls for the Archdiocese of New York and one of the priests who participated in the exorcism, said Thursday the media attention on the centuries-old rite gives "hope to those who may be afflicted and at least they would have some place they could turn." But the decision already has drawn criticism from some priests who say the broadcast violated an understanding in the church that public spectacle should be avoided in what for centuries has been a private ceremony.

"There is a place for exorcism in the healing ministry of the church,

but it is very rare and extraordinary," the Rev. Richard Woods, a professor at Loyola University in Chicago, told The New York Times. "The place is not in the public mind. There are many New Testament accounts of this." The Catholic Church, like Jesus casting out devils.

Judge gives man 17 years for shooting

Respite care is for mentally ill people experiencing short-term crises, such as depression or extreme anxiety, said Jerry Anderson, manager of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's regional mental health program. He said Wednesday that the average stay at the facility should be about four days, and that those using the house would not endanger the community.

Seafood company still processing fish

POCATELLO — Dory Seafoods Inc. is playing down chances that it will close the Domesa Farms fish processing plant in Pocatello. Domesa will continue processing fish at the old Zweigart meat packing plant on Pocatello's northwest side, at least for now, Dory Seafoods President Arnie Einmo said Thursday. Ed Brauer, Domesa's operations manager, said corporate officials were evaluating whether the plant will remain in Pocatello or be relocated to the Crystal Springs Hatchery in Springfield — northeast of Aberdeen in Bingham County — which has contracts to provide salmon to Dory.

Pocatello war hero to receive honors

BOISE — Gulf War hero Frank Bradish of Pocatello has been asked to attend the USO's 50th anniversary concert in Los Angeles for a special presentation. Bradish, 23, at his parent's home in Pocatello, said the presentation Friday may be the Silver Star citation medal he has been nominated for for bravery under fire. "I am supposed to receive something on the show. They haven't told me what yet," he said. President Bush is expected to attend the program at the Universal Amphitheater that will be televised nationally April 14 by ABC.

Andrus again rejects engineering proposal

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday again rejected a new, expanded proposal from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to drain Dworshak Reservoir in northern Idaho in a bid to solve spring migration programs for potentially endangered Northwest salmon runs. Reiterating the objections to an earlier version of the plan he made in a letter to the Corps last month, Andrus said the proposal still fails to understand that the issue is not increasing the amount of water in the

lower Snake and main Columbia rivers but increasing the speed of the water already flowing in the rivers. "They're behaving like smart alecks now," Andrus said after being advised of the latest Corps proposal. "You've got to drop the water levels." Apparently casting aside the governor's earlier objections to release of 600,000 acre-feet of water from the reservoir this spring to facilitate salmon migration, the Corps announced this week that it will total 1 million acre-feet. Analysts said that will drastically reduce the chances of the reservoir filling this year.

The announcement came after the National Marine Fisheries Service issued its recommendation this week

that the Snake River sockeye salmon be placed on the endangered species list. If that recommendation is carried out after a year of "public review, it could create dramatic economic disruption throughout the Northwest. A recommendation on four other salmon runs is expected in June.

Andrus objected to the earlier, more limited, drawdown of Dworshak on grounds that none of the downstream interests were making any similar substantial contribution to preserving the anadromous fish runs.

The Corps' expanded plan still proposes leaving the slack-water pools behind the Columbia River dams at levels that will not significantly interfere with power or irrigation uses.

"This has never been done before," fisheries biologist Doug Arndt said. "I can't think of a better way to say it except to say, that's a lot of water."

Students think name's no gem

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Some Bonneville School District students are unhappy that a new high school being built in the district will be called Gem State, but school officials say they have no intention of changing it.

Angie Westergard, president of the sophomore class at Bonneville High School, presented the school board with a petition signed by 600 students Wednesday. It objects to

Gem State and suggests alternatives including Caribou, Chaparral, Hillcrest, Ponderosa, Targhee and Willow Creek.

Board Chairman Larry Clayton said trustees will consider the petition, but that changing the name now would be a bad precedent. The \$8.9 million high school is being built southwest of South Bonneville Junior High in Ammon, east of Idaho Falls.

Frustrated lawmakers uphold Bush Iraqi stand

WASHINGTON — Idaho lawmakers, expressing dismay over Saddam Hussein's brutal assaults on Kurdish rebels, nevertheless are hesitant to criticize President Bush's policy of nonintervention in that nation's civil unrest. "I have urged the President to use the same skills and fortitude in the exercise of his power that he has shown throughout the Gulf crisis to bring about a quick end to the civil war," Republican Sen. Steven Symms said in a statement.

"However, I wish not to limit the president's prerogatives," he said. Over the past months Bush had encouraged Iraq's rebels, particularly the Kurds in the north and the Shiite Muslims in the south, to rise up and overthrow Saddam Hussein. But many lawmakers were frustrated by last week's shift in policy, in which the White House declined to take a stand on the rebel uprisings. Critics of the administration say the switch to a hands-off policy has left the rebels in the lurch, denying them the U.S. support they were led to believe was coming to them. "The Kurds are doing what President Bush suggested early on," said Rep. Richard Stallings. "I'm frankly puzzled."

Stallings, a Democrat, recalled how earlier in the Gulf conflict Saddam Hussein had been compared to

Hitler. "If the man is as bad, why now are we siding with his forces in power? I don't understand the reversal in policy," he said. However, he stopped short of urging military intervention, saying he would seek a rationale for Bush's change in policy next week when Congress is back in session. "I would hate to be caught second-guessing the president," he said.

Democrat Rep. Larry LaRocco declined to comment on Bush's policy, a spokesman for his office said.

Of the Idaho delegation, Republican Sen. Larry Craig was the most adamant in his support of the president's handling of the Gulf situation. "The civil war in Iraq is a separate matter," Craig said in a statement. "Why should young Americans be unilaterally drawn into Iraq's civil war which stems from a decades-old internal conflict?" Both Symms and Craig, who supported the congressional resolution authorizing the use of force to drive Iraqi troops out of occupied Kuwait, faulted Democrats for what they see as an inconsistent Gulf policy. Craig said, "I find it hard to believe that liberal Democrats who voted against supporting our president in the liberation of Kuwait are now the first to want to commit U.S. forces to Iraq's internal conflict."

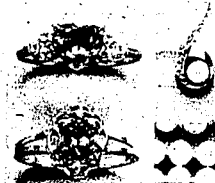

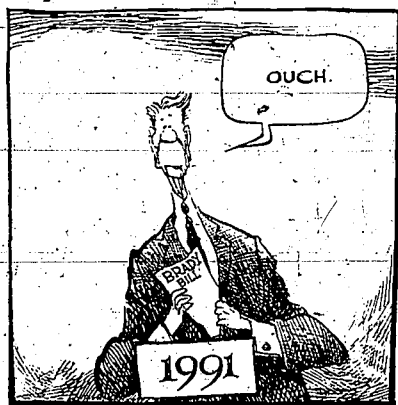
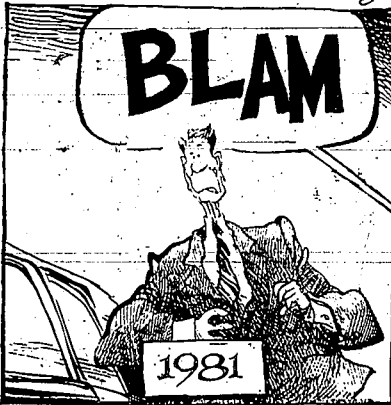

Atwater gave no quarter, asked none

"He was a smorgasbord of negatives," the youthful strategist added.

He was so taken with the theory that he planned to use it as the basis for his doctoral thesis, something he never quite got around to writing.

Instead, he applied it throughout a career that saw him rise from South Carolina to being one of 25 regional political directors in the 1980 Reagan general election campaign. After a stint in the White House political office, he was given the No. 2 job in the president's 1984 re-election campaign and, two years later, was picked for the top job by Bush.

If a candidate didn't start out with the kind of negatives that Connally brought to South Carolina, Atwater was happy to help out. He believed that any candidate could be beaten by raising his negatives through the kind of relentless attacks that marked the 1988 Bush effort.

When Atwater began to develop his plan for the 1988 general election, Bush had a far more negative image than his Democratic rival, Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis. Polls showed that more voters regarded Bush unfavorably than favorably.

By the time those voters had learned about Willie Horton, the governor's veto of a law requiring students to say the Pledge of Allegiance and pollution in Boston Harbor, the situation was reversed — as was the likely outcome.

Bush's election enabled Atwater to achieve the second of his two major life goals: managing a successful presidential campaign and becoming the chairman of his party.

Though not totally comfortable with the

out-front role that the Republican national chairmanship required, he enjoyed his new celebrity. And he was a popular figure among the party faithful, who recognized that, without Lee Atwater, there might have been no Bush presidency at all.

Atwater's astuteness was so recognized among top Republicans that when Bush ran into trouble over the budget and the savings-and-loan bail-out last year, one often-cited factor was the absence of the ailing GOP chairman.

Despite his illness, he maintained his interest in politics. Over dinner one night last fall, he provided his customary keen insights on some top 1990 contests, though some forecasts proved to be off the mark. A sad irony of his fatal disease was that Lee Atwater had always prided himself on his physical fitness. A vigorous jogger, he once said he had developed a keen physical and mental self-discipline from reading Aristotle in college.

"Freedom to me is maximizing self-discipline," he told Marilyn Thompson of the Columbia (S.C.) Record in 1980. "Anything you do like smoking, drinking, anything you do like that takes away your freedom. If the picture of vigorous young health, Atwater only admitted becoming ill on such occasions as an unsuccessful 1988 campaign in Texas.

"When I lose, I get physically sick," he said in an 1986 interview with Esquire magazine. When Republican Edd Hargett lost that special congressional race in east Texas, "I had the dry heaves for two days. I'm not ashamed of it. It's right healthy to be a poor loser in this business."

But until last year, losing was something Lee Atwater rarely had to confront.

When they attended the same preschool a couple of years ago, a classmate with whom son Ben liked to play was Lee Atwater's daughter, Ashley Page.

"Ashley Page isn't like the other little girls," the director told us once. "She likes to play with the boys. She likes to play rough."

In that, she was certainly like her father, who died last week at age 40, barely a year after he collapsed — from what subsequently was diagnosed as an inoperable brain tumor — at a fund-raiser for son, Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

Indeed, historians may someday look back at the 1980s and say that Lee Atwater set the standard for hard-nosed political combat, from his earliest days in South Carolina politics to his masterful 1988 strategy that put George Bush in the White House.

But what made Atwater such a brilliant success was that his willingness to play rough was accompanied by a quick intelligence and a perceptiveness that made him the era's shrewdest analyst of both the dynamics of politics and the motivations of voters.

That was already evident when many of us who cover national politics met him during the 1980 South Carolina GOP presidential primary contest that ended John Connally's presidential aspirations and gave Ronald Reagan a crucial victory.

His mentor, venerable South Carolina Sen. Strom Thurmond, backed Connally. But Atwater, just 29, had seen through the former Texas governor's charisma to identify his fundamental weakness as a candidate.

"It's my position that if you have a negative factor of 35 percent and the positive rating is within five points of that either way, you've got an unelectable candidate," he said. "I used 33 different polls, and Connally's aggregate negative was 37, and his positive was 26."

Some great misconceptions about the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory are being perpetuated by those who know better. All nuclear projects are not the same. There isn't just one issue at the INEL that needs to be discussed, there are many. You need not be either 100 percent for — or against — the INEL.

Those with public responsibilities, whether they are elected officials or the media, have a duty to tell the truth about these issues — regardless of how politically unpopular or difficult that may be.

As I said at a Rupert town meeting this week, I don't know all there is to know about the INEL. Few really do — despite some claims to the contrary. I believe that the Department of Energy has made some mistakes in dealing with the state and made some confusing statements. But INEL is not alone.

Would-be experts have been purposefully misleading the public for some time.

Case in point: The lead story of the March 1991 newsletter of the Snake River Alliance said that the governor's veto of a law requiring students to say the Pledge of Allegiance for "temporary storage" at the INEL and that the recent attempt by the Department to bring more material in from Fort St. Vrain was a breach of faith. Not so. The material previously blocked by the governor was from Rocky Flats and it was totally different material, destined for totally different use. It is just such "small" points that keep the public confused and concerned and the future and impact of INEL uncertain. I've always opposed actions that would result in Idaho becoming a nuclear

waste dump and I will not tolerate misrepresentations by the Department of Energy. But we should be equally leary of "factual" statements by others.

When I want to know what impact the INEL activities have had and will have on our environment — on the Snake River aquifer and the quality of life in Idaho. We all want to know the mission of the INEL in the years ahead. These are fair questions deserving truthful answers; not determined to find the truth and will work with others who feel that way. If we are to have meaningful answers to the many complex questions about the INEL, answers that balance environmental, economic and national defense concerns, we need to reject "tell-it-or-water-it-ill-buy" politics and get down to serious fact finding. I invite those who are truly concerned to join me.

Craig could help resolve nuclear waste dilemma

Idaho's junior U.S. senator did a strange and wonderful thing this week. He admitted a lack of knowledge on a hot issue.

The subject was the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, and Sen. Larry Craig told a group meeting in Paul, "I don't know a great deal about it."

In political circles that kind of remark is regarded as a blunder. Politicians are supposed to know the answers. They're supposed to be glib, confident, being uncertain is a greater political sin than being wrong.

For those of us who live outside political circles, however, Craig's admission was refreshingly honest.

No one should expect Craig to know much about INEL. Until this year he was Idaho's 1st District congressman, and INEL is in the 2nd District.

But now he's a senator, and he has much to learn about southern and eastern Idaho. He told the group in Paul that his learning curve on INEL is "almost straight up."

Don't look now, but Craig is behaving like someone with an open mind. The disappointing aspect of the situation is that Craig was drawn into political sniping before his learning curve started its climb. In the recent flap between Gov. Cecil Andrus and the federal Energy Department over

nuclear waste, Craig quickly sided with the feds.

He stumbled badly on Feb. 21, when he played straight man to Energy Secretary James Watkins in a Senate hearing. He practically invited Watkins to threaten Idaho jobs, and Watkins obliged.

Craig's urge to cozy up to the DOE is understandable. The Energy Department is part of a Republican administration in Washington, D.C. And Craig's GOP colleague, Sen. Steve Symms, had attacked Andrus harshly for jeopardizing Idaho jobs. Few newly minted GOP senators would back a Democratic governor under those circumstances.

Besides, it's only natural for a conservative member of Congress to lean toward economic concerns rather than environmental ones.

But if Craig is being as open-minded as his comments this week hint, he quickly will learn that even conservative Idahoans have deep misgivings about the Energy Department's use of INEL. He will learn that appeals to patriotism and economic interest are no longer enough.

No one would expect Craig to embrace Andrus' position publicly. But if he can stake out a practical centrist position, Craig could become a key player in resolving Idaho's nuclear-waste standoff.

L.A. beating is different story though police eyes

The beating of Rodney King by Los Angeles police officers creates police behavior at its worst and fully merits the criminal and administrative actions taken against those involved. But as this tragedy has unfolded, the public has continued to receive much misleading information from the electronic media, the American Civil Liberties Union and syndicated columnists.

For example, the fact that in one year Los Angeles paid out \$8 million in claims to victims of police brutality was offered as proof that brutality there is rampant. And the Southern California Civil Liberties Union says that it receives 350 complaints of "police overreaction" weekly.

Without question, \$8 million is a great deal of money, but absent further elaboration it leaves the public with the false impression that officers are routinely beating citizens without cause.

What is not mentioned in any of the references to this figure is the number of cases that this \$8 million represents.

Given that civil juries often award huge sums of money in damages, a suit of this nature could very well bestow \$500,000 on the victim. Using that figure, \$8 million would translate to 16 incidents of police brutality — in a city where the population nearly 4 million.

Further alleged brutality cases are often settled out of court — not because an allegation of brutality is true, but because it is cost effective.

A lengthy litigation costs more than a settlement. The 350 weekly complaints of police overreaction present a classic example of semantic ballet. All police overreaction is not police brutality, just that statistic without supporting evidence conjures up images of gangs of police roaming the streets of L.A., looking for someone to beat.

A motorist stopped at night by a lone officer who approaches the car with his hand on his weapon could conceivably file a complaint of overreaction.

To the law enforcement community, the officer's behavior is sound street survival. Clearly, Rodney King was beaten well beyond the point where he was a threat — if he ever was a threat. But in the rush to fault the police, not one editorial, television story or syndicated column has seen has sought to present the full picture.

King would not stop. Created an atmosphere of danger and suspicion.

That Rodney King failed to stop for police is no reason, for him to receive the beating he did, but it is very much a factor in understanding how these things happen. No matter how it is dissected, Rodney King's conscious decision to avoid the police was ultimately the reason the LAPD was involved. Had he stopped for the CHP, he would have been issued a citation or arrested for obstructing the violation, and that would have been the end of it. He chose to flee, and that action triggered the ugly chain of events that followed. We cannot lose sight of that fact.

As George Will has written, "Police work is frequently dangerous and even more often unpleasant."

It can be desensitizing and demoralizing literally terrorizing. It requires special strength of character to do this indispensible work right, day by day and night after night, without succumbing to callousness, disgust and rage.

We have devised ways to deal with frustration and stress associated with police work. Most law enforcement agencies have full-time psychologists available to help officers cope with these problems.

We can educate, train, sensitize, shield and treat officers affected by the hazards of their work. But beyond that, little can be done to guarantee a flawless police force, because for all our sophistication, we have yet to devise ways to recruit officers from other than the fallible human race.

By no means do these occupational hazards relieve law officers of their responsibility to honor the rights of others.

What happened to Rodney King in Los Angeles is tragic.

All law enforcement officers will view that episode with anger and revulsion and press on to regain the confidence of the public.

Perhaps the greatest paradox of all will be seen in the days to come, when, in spite of feelings so strong as to defy logic, those who are so critical of the police will not hesitate to call on them for help when danger looms.

And despite all the ill will, animosity, anger and contempt for those who wrongly accuse them of racism and hate, officers will readily heed the call.

Norwegians have pill to fight radiation

OSLO, Norway — Pills to fight radiation sickness are being distributed to areas of Norway at risk in event of a Soviet nuclear disaster, officials were quoted Thursday as saying.

"The background for them being distributed here is the risk of acute and powerful radiation from Soviet sources," the Oslo newspaper quoted Siri Fosse, deputy county physician for the northern Finnmark province, as saying.

After fallout from the Soviet's Chernobyl nuclear disaster showered Norway in 1986, Norwegian officials began drawing up public protection plans, she said.

Iodine pills, which help the human body dispose of some radioactive isotopes, will be kept at pharmacies near the Soviet border, in port towns visited by nuclear ships and in areas around Norway's two reactors, said Marit Kromberg of the state health directorate.

Yeltsin moving forward in power bid

MOSCOW — Russian leader Boris Yeltsin on Thursday was sweeping powers to rule by decree in the biggest Soviet republic, greatly increasing his ability to implement reforms and stand up to his rival Mikhail Gorbachev.

The breakthrough on the eighth day of the stalemated Russian Congress of People's Deputies gives Yeltsin the means to try to overcome opposition in his own republic and face the Soviet president on a more equal footing.

"It will equalize their positions and will let them cooperate," said Alexander Rutskoy, leader of a newly formed group of Communist Party moderates who broke with hard-liners on Tuesday.

But Yeltsin was given no enforcement powers, such as a long-discussed Russian army, and there was no assurance local officials would obey his decrees.

Award-winning Swiss playwright dies

ZURICH, Switzerland — Max Frisch, the Swiss novelist and playwright who focused on the predicament of man in modern society, died Thursday. He was 79.

He succumbed to cancer at his Zurich home after a long illness, said his son, Hans Peter Frisch. He settled in his native Zurich in 1983 after three years in New York, a city he liked because "every invented story is possible there."

Frisch, considered the dean of German-language literature, was one of the most influential writers in the post-World War II era. His works, including "I Am Not Stiller" and "Man in the Holocene," were translated into 37 languages.

Frisch described himself as a pacifist and socialist but never joined a party.

He won several literary awards but the Nobel Prize eluded him.

French Corsicans to have own identity

PARIS — French lawmakers narrowly agreed Thursday to give a separate identity to inhabitants of the French island of Corsica, where nationalists have long waged a guerrilla struggle for autonomy.

After months of debate, deputies voted 297-275 to adopt the first and most controversial article of a bill to reform the status of natives of the Mediterranean island, part of France for 176 years.

Article 1 identifies Corsicans as the "Corsican people, a component of the French people."

The bill is sponsored by the Socialist government of Francois Mitterrand.

At least 1 injured in Peruvian tremor

LIMA, Peru — A strong earthquake struck northern Peru Thursday in the same jungle region where a slightly stronger tremor a year ago killed 67 people, officials said. Radio reports said at least one person was injured.

The tremor caused roofs to collapse in one northern town, said the Peruvian Geophysics Institute.

The Peruvian officials said the quake measured 5.5 on the Richter scale and was centered 30 miles south of Moyobamba, in a highland-jungle 400 miles north of Lima.

The institute said roofs collapsed in the town of Rioja, 15 miles east of Moyobamba.

The U.S. Geological Survey said the earthquake was recorded at a preliminary magnitude of 6.1 on the Richter scale.

Military concerned about return of refugees to Iraq


RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — More than 15,000 Iraqi civil war refugees being cared for by the U.S. military will be returned to Baghdad's control once American forces leave occupied Iraq, a Red Cross official said Thursday.

The prospect has raised fears for the safety of the refugees, some of whom are insurgents and rebel sympathizers. There are also concerns they may be mistreated for having crossed into American-controlled territory.

The Bush administration has been sharply criticized for turning its back on the Iraqi refugees, who fled southward as Saddam Hussein's troops crushed a Shiite Muslim rebellion in southern Iraq, killing scores of women and children.

Plane veers off runway; pilot escapes injury

Gibson declined to comment about the incident.

Apparel store may open here

TWIN FALLS — Lamonts Apparel Inc., one of the fastest-growing clothing retailers in the Pacific Northwest may soon be catering to Magic Valley Mall customers.

Although Lamonts' plans aren't final, company spokeswoman Susan McAllister said, the Bellevue, Wash., company hopes to open the store in February 1992. It would be the 50th store in the Lamonts chain and the fifth major retailer to stake out a claim at the Magic Valley Mall since it opened in 1986.

Lamonts is still negotiating with Salt Lake City-based Price Development, which owns the Magic Valley Mall. Its plans for Twin Falls won't be certain until those negotiations are complete.

The store would be built onto the mall near Showko. Price Development President Rex Frazier said. It would cover about 20,000 square feet, about one-half the size of The Bon Marche's and Sears, Roebuck & Co.'s stores in the mall.

Lamonts' arrival at the mall would enhance clothing competition there — some of company's biggest competitors are stores in The Bon and J.C. Penney chains, McAllister said. The Bon and J.C. Penney both have anchor stores at the mall.

Lamonts sells clothing exclusively, emphasizing mid-priced, brand-name, fashion apparel for the entire family.

Their target customer really is Middle America, McAllister said.

Ironically, Lamonts' current management team was collected from The Bon's parent company, Allied Stores Corp. Chairman Leonard M. Snyder switched from Allied to Lamonts in 1987, and brought with him three other Allied Stores executives.

Under the new management team, Lamonts has opened 19 new stores and remodeled 18 since 1987. Revenues increased nearly 12 percent between 1989 and 1990.

In Idaho, Lamonts has stores in Coeur d'Alene, Moscow, Lewiston, Idaho Falls and Poacello. Its other 44 stores are in Washington, Oregon, Alaska, Montana and Utah.

Snails are not endangered, some argue

HAGERMAN — A federal proposal to list as endangered four Snake River snails and one limpet is based on insufficient evidence and poor science, opponents charge.

"If proper field research had been done, we wouldn't be here," said Jim Yost, director of public affairs for the Idaho Farm Bureau.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has

recommended protection because of threats to the mollusks, not much bigger than the head of a pin, if the Thousand Springs reach of the river.

The proposal includes the Bliss Rapids snail, the Utah valvata, the Snake River physa and the Idaho spring snails and the Banbury Springs limpet, a mollusk with a cone-shaped shell and a thick, fleshy foot.

All five are found in the cool, clear, free-flowing waters of a 40-mile stretch in the

Thousand Springs area or large adjacent springs, biologists say.

Fish and Wildlife officials met Thursday in Hagerman with area residents and representatives of local interests to hear comments on the proposed listing.

Yost said he thinks the snails are being used as a convenient roadblock to development in the Magic Valley area, he said. He accused environmentalists of using the Endangered Species Act as a roadblock.

U.S. will reap few benefits from war, expert argues

TWIN FALLS — The United States fought a war it could have avoided against Iraq for goals it will probably never achieve, a Palestinian-born Middle East expert told a College of Southern Idaho audience Thursday night.

"The reasons that the Bush administration cited for going to war — democracy in the Middle East, regional security, an Arab-Israeli agreement — probably are not going to happen," said Fouad Moughrabi, professor of political science at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, in the final lecture of the Snake River Symposium series.

"I cannot take seriously the essential morality of the war. I can't take seriously Bush's contention that it was a just war."

Moughrabi said America transformed Saddam Hussein from neighborhood thug into regional hero.

"The Arabs are frustrated with the United States because of its constant support for Israel. They're frustrated with their own governments and they're frustrated with

their failure to use resources to promote human needs," said Moughrabi. "Before the war, Saddam Hussein had no following at all the region. Arabs knew him for what he was."

"The United States and its allies achieved the rapid defeat of Iraq, but not the removal of Saddam, Moughrabi said, because they weren't willing to take the chance of dismembering Iraq by civil war and ending regional dominance to Iran and Syria.

"We actually provided some arms to the Shiite rebels in the south," he said. "The Israeli supplied arms to the Kurds in the north, and the idea was to put enough pressure on Saddam so that sooner or later Baghdad would announce some brigadier general you never heard of who was a hero of the war against Iran was the new leader. It didn't work out that way."

Moughrabi, a 48-year-old native of Jerusalem who has lectured throughout the world on Arab-American relations, was the fifth and final speaker in the Snake River Symposium, sponsored by the CSI Honors Program. This year's lecture series dealt

with the United States and its relationship with the peoples of the Middle East.

"The war won the United States military hegemony in the region for a few years and a bigger arms market," he said. "But it changed very little else."

"The only nation the U.S. will succeed in disarming in the region is Iraq, Moughrabi predicted. All of Iraq's neighbors will acquire bigger arsenals, he said, including Israel.

"I don't think Bush will be able to solve the Israeli-Palestinian problem, because of one immovable object, and that is Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir ... If Bush achieves anything, he is going to have to spend some political capital, and that is going to cost him with Israel's supporters in the United States," he said. "I'm skeptical that he's willing to do that."

Moughrabi said Kuwait, which before the war was governed by an absolute monarch who dissolved the country's parliament, is unlikely to become a democracy as Bush has predicted.

United Way embezzler is allowed to leave jail days

TWIN FALLS — Fifth District Judge Daniel Meehl on Thursday denied a motion by the state to revoke Paula Bivens' daytime jail release.

Bivens, who admitted embezzling more than \$3,000 while working for the United Way of Magic Valley in 1988; began serving four months in the Twin Falls County jail March 6. Mechl ordered her released each day between 7:30 a.m. and 8:30 p.m. to care for her ailing father, Thane Lancaster of Filer.

Lancaster, 61, died March 22, and Bivens was released for several days until

after the funeral. After the furlough, however, the daytime release remained in effect.

When he agreed in March to allow Bivens out of jail in the daytime, Mechl said the exception was "more out of humanitarian concern for (Bivens' father) than it is for her."

Since that time, however, other factors have arisen that Mechl said prompted him to continue the terms of the sentence. The decision was made Thursday morning after a 30-minute telephone conference with Bivens, her Boise attorney Michael Powers and Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Daniel Mink.

Court upholds capture of bank robbers

BOISE — After a vehicle is legally stopped by police, a search of the car and its occupants is permissible if police have a reasonable belief that the driver may be armed and dangerous, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday voted 4-1 to uphold the conviction of Troy Gascon in a Twin Falls bank robbery four years ago. Gascon was stopped at a roadblock as he drove a vehicle out of the city a short time after the robbery.

Chief Justice Robert Bakes wrote an

opinion holding that it was reasonable for police to set up a roadblock at the south end of Perrine Falls, the main route out of Twin Falls.

"To suggest that it was unreasonable for the police to suspect that the robber would attempt to flee the community in an automobile, using the Interstate highway, ignores the logistic realities which the local trial judge was in the best position to determine," the court said.

Justice Stephen Bistline dissented, saying in his opinion, police did not follow the proper procedure.

Groups agree to clean up pollution at Niagara Springs

GOODING — Idaho Department of Fish and Game and Idaho Power Co. officials have promised to repair problems at the Niagara Springs Hatchery that have resulted in fish waste being washed into Niagara Springs Creek.

state Division of Environmental Quality.

Idaho Power, which owns the hatchery run by Fish and Game, agreed to improve operation of the hatchery's waste collection and treatment system and to consider the possibility of dredging fish wastes built up in Niagara Springs Creek, which drains into the Snake River north of Butte.

Until permanent changes can be made at the hatchery, the utility said it would reduce production and block the lower end of the

raceways to allow solids to settle so they can be vacuumed out.

Fish and Game and Idaho Power were called on the carpet recently by the Gooding County Commission after discharge problems at the hatchery came to the commissioners' attention through a Times-News article last month.

Commissioner Bob Muffley of Wendell said he was troubled most that it was necessary to call the hearing at all to address a

problem state agencies should have taken care of long ago.

"Somehow problems at the hatchery escaped detection by DEQ inspections. But Mike McMasters, the division's Twin Falls water quality field supervisor, blamed the oversight on a lack of manpower.

"If we didn't catch this one, how many others out there have we missed?" McMasters told the Gooding commissioners.

200 sign Bliss petition opposing landfill

BLISS — Many Bliss and area residents don't want a landfill in their backyard—and they've sent a petition with 200 signatures to the Gooding County Commissioners asking them to pick another spot.

Landfill issue on meeting agenda

The Bliss Chamber of Commerce will meet with Gooding County commissioner Bob Tupper to discuss the landfill issue on April 11 at the Ox Bow Cafe.

Commissioners have been looking into alternative landfill sites since last year, and the site near Bliss has been a top candidate. They also have been considering the possibility of trucking county garbage to a landfill in Mountain Home. The site near Bliss has a clay soil structure, ideal for a landfill, and is located near the county's western boundary.

But Gary Weeks, who has been asked by the Bliss City Council to investigate the matter on their behalf,

says he was assured by the commissioners that the landfill would not be allowed down the throat.

Weeks presented a copy of the petition to the Bliss City Council on Wednesday night.

The petition stated, in part, that the undersigned feel that a landfill west of Bliss would adversely affect the property values and quality of life of the residents of Bliss.

Weeks said he accepted signatures from Bliss residents as well as residents of the surrounding area. Bliss has a total population of about 200 people.

Weeks also asked that the council draft a letter to the county commissioners stating its opposition to the proposed Bliss site.

The council voted unanimously to draft the letter.

The Bliss Chamber of Commerce will hold a meeting with county commissioner Bob Tupper to discuss the

landfill issue. The meeting will be held at noon April 11 at the Ox Bow Cafe.

In other business, Mayor Sam Bishop announced that the council's application for a \$9,000 loan from the Idaho Water Resource Board has been approved. The council applied for the loan, which will be taken from the Water Resource Board's revolving development fund to help cover the costs of an Environmental Protection Agency mandate that the city upgrade its well-and-for-repairs to the city-water system.

The city has 10 years to pay off the low-interest loan. Work on the well upgrade and the water system repairs has already begun. If the city receives a grant for the cost of the project, it will use the grant to pay off the loan. The council has switched to summer hours. Meetings will be held at 8 p.m. on the first Wednesday of each month beginning in May.

Illegal pesticide site found in Madison County

REXBURG (AP) — Federal and Madison County officials are investigating the illegal dumping of pesticides west of REXBURG.

Three people already have suffered minor eye injuries from the open dump.

The hazardous waste dump is relatively small, but it could be part of a much larger problem, officials said. It's the second illegal dump site found on Bureau of Land Management property in the last two weeks, and a local BLM official said there may be dozens of similar dumps in the area.

Cleaning them up would cost taxpayers \$1 million, BLM and county officials discovered the pesticide dump Monday morning, at a popular target shooting area, about seven miles

west of REXBURG. The pesticides were dumped about one mile north of the Madison County landfill.

The pesticide, known as Eptam, produces noxious fumes and can be dangerous if it comes in contact with skin.

About 80 pesticide containers were dumped at the shooting range. Most of them were empty, but officials found about 10 gallons of pesticide. The dump covers a 10-by-10-foot area and about 300 pounds of soil has been contaminated. Cleanup is expected to cost at least \$5,000.

"It's really a shame because the site is within a mile of the county landfill, and proper cleanup of pesticide containers is not that tough," said Rick Martin, a BLM ranger in Idaho Falls.

 "If we didn't catch this one, how many others out there have we missed?" McMasters told the Gooding commissioners.

Power and Fish and Game agreed to submit a report on the problems to the Twin Falls office of DEC by Thursday.

Hatchery Manager Jerry Mowery told the county commissioners that from October until fish are taken out in March or April, the hatchery waste system cannot capture all the fish waste cleaned from the facility's raceways.

Hatchery records show that since before 1980, the flow of water through the hatchery has exceeded the capacity of the removal system to contain wastes, resulting in a portion of the raw fish wastes being washed directly into Niagara Springs Creek.

Mowery said he and previous hatchery managers have notified officials of this problem since 1980. Bill Hutchinson, manager of Fish and Game's hatchery program, said in 1989 "was the first year we thought we had a problem down here. In 1976, when the collection system was built, however, an Idaho Power engineer said the waste removal system was designed for a maximum flow of 4 cubic feet per second in each raceway. According to hatchery flow records, the flow during peak produc-

tion periods has been above 6 cfs since 1977; above 8 cfs since 1987 and reached a maximum of 9.4 cfs in 1989.

The hatchery built in 1966 was designed to raise a minimum of 200,000 pounds of fish. The waste collection system designed for cfs per acreway, but the hatchery can't raise 400,000 pounds of fish. That amount can be raised only by exceeding the effluent system capacity. Idaho Power fish biologist Paul Abbott disagreed that older hatchery was designed for only 200,000 pounds of fish. It has successfully reared more than 400,000, he said.

Over the years, sediments have filled in the upper end of Niagara Springs Creek just below the hatchery's diversion.

But the sediments are not from fish waste alone. Natural sediments in the spring water and the earthen structure formerly used to divert water to the hatchery have contributed to the problem. Until 1988, an earthen dam was in place across the creek. Now, said Scott, when the hatchery finished diverting water for the season, workers dug a channel through the dam and let the water flush the rest of the dam down the creek.

"We don't have any way of hauling it out," Mowery said. Though not the preferred method, it is not against the law, according to the Army Corps of

Engineers.
 "Abbott told commissioners that the power company had planned to build two extra raceways, and that they would ease the waste problem."

The expansion was not designed to correct any problems with the effluent system, Abbott said. But it would spread out the fish and leave a little room at the ends of the raceways for wastes to settle, making raceways easier to clean, reducing the amount of waste going out into the creek.

Claims to Niagara Springs exceed by far the 264 cfs the springs provide. Some state officials say a neighboring hatchery, Rim View Trout Co., is taking more water than it has rights to, reducing the amount of water available to the Idaho Power hatchery. Rim View's diversion is just above Idaho Power's.

Rim View, however, disputes Idaho Power's right to 132 cfs at the springs. Muffley suggested Idaho Power assert its right to 132 cfs, not only in the company's interest but as a public benefit.

Water not used for fish production, could be spilled into the creek for the public good, he said.

But according to the Idaho water law, that would require an amended or new license with a new priority date, making the water available only when no other license holders use it.

Resident loses patience with city

HAGERMAN - A businessman trying to start a new day-care center in Hagerman says he is disgusted with city officials he claims have held up the project.

City Council members voted Tuesday to delay granting requested permits for the project.

Gary Grissom, owner of the Quik Stop, told the council he wants to open a state regulated day-care center on Spring Street near the elementary school. The facility would meet all state requirements to handle 27 children - the two women operators will be state certified and each child will be insured for \$300,000, he said.

The existing facility was approved by a state fire marshal to take care of 17 children. Grissom said he plans to add 300 square feet to the building to meet state requirements for 27 children.

City Building Inspector Howard Winegar said he told the council he has approved Grissom's plans.

But Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman Laura McAnulty recommended Grissom's center be restricted to 17 children. "Adding would make the play area too small, she said.

Grissom said the play yard would be an ample 60-by-50-foot area and would comply with state requirements.

Also, McAnulty said, a fence should be built across the front of the proposed center to protect children from cars.

"The front door opens into a parking lot," she said. "There's nothing to hold the children back."
 Grissom said the state does not require a fence outside the entrance to a day-care center. And, he said, according to the Fire Marshal Tom Owens of Buhl, the fence would create a fire trap between it and the house.

Mayor Gloria Zajewick said the council will have to decide whether to follow the zoning commission's recommendation to restrict Grissom, or to override the recommendation and grant Grissom permission to proceed with his plans for a 27-child facility.

Councilman Mike Wintner said the larger facility would be better because it would fall under state regulations, whereas the smaller facility centers of 12 children or less are not regulated.

Grissom said a smaller facility is not financially feasible for him.

Council members decided to table the matter until the next meeting so they have time to look at the proper way to consider the parking situation.

Grissom said Wednesday he is upset by the delay.

"There's no sense to it," he said. "I'm completely with all regulations. This should be cut and dried."

Grissom said he waited two weeks for a zoning commission hearing, and the two center operators have waited more than one month without income.

"They can't wait forever while the City Council sits and plays with the idea," he said. "The council is tying up people's jobs. I think it's an injustice."

Council members Audrey Hoffman and Wintner said Thursday that the council wants to look at the property to see why the zoning commission recommended a limit of 17 children.

"Rather than vote on something and make a mistake, we all wanted to investigate - and look - for ourselves," Hoffman said.

Wintner, who is the council representative on the zoning commission, said the commission is concerned about the size of the building, though it will meet state requirements.

"I don't know what their basis for trying to limit it was," Wintner said. "I don't think there's a problem as long as the space is adequate for that number of children."

In other business:

The council agreed to have 10 wooden-frame enclosures built to hold trash cans at City Park, outside City Hall and in front of the library. Cost will be less than \$500, said Kevin Lyttott, who will build the frames. Dogs will not be able to tip over cans in the frames, he said.

Dates were set for the four Hagerman softball tournaments. "One Pitch" will be May 4 and 5. "Daze" will be July 14-15. "Doorslammer" will be Aug. 17-19.

These tournaments will be co-sponsored by the Hagerman Chapter of Commerce, Ag Concepts and the ball clubs. Proceeds will help buy new bleachers for City Park.

The "Icebreaker" tournament, sponsored by Ducks Unlimited, is scheduled for April 19-21.

Council members said dances during the tournaments that were "a little rowdy" may need to be canceled. Dave Snyder, representing Ag Concepts, said no alcohol will be served at the dances.

"We'd like to lift that reputation," he said.

Richard Konopky, office manager of Panice Environmental Biologists, a consulting firm hired by the Farm Bureau to study the mollusks, said "data in the proposal do not support the conclusions of the proposal."

Konopky, who has a doctorate in fisheries resources, said his own studies show the five species are more numerous and more widely distributed than the proposal suggests. But his data were not included in Fish and Wildlife's proposal.

"The fact that he looked at hundreds of sites and only found a few specimens, shows the tragedy is, far greater than we thought," said Peter Bowler, who has a doctorate in biological sciences and filed one of the original petitions to list two of the snails in 1980. Jay Gore, the Fish and Wildlife official who wrote the proposal, earlier had said Konopky's studies found nothing to add to or detract from the status of the mollusks.

Randy MacMillan, director of research for Clear Springs Trout Co., said a fisheries biologist who did fish sampling in the studies done by Fish and Wildlife was inadequate and inconclusive. The research appeared purposely misleading, and its built-in bias "would be expected to result in representations of poor species abundance," he said.

"Decisions should not be based on emotional, self-serving interests," MacMillan said.

The Secretary of the Interior has until Dec. 18 to decide on the listing. Idaho Power has asked that the comment period be extended "from its present 30-day deadline to just before the final decision is made in order for the results of its own studies to be considered in the final decision," Meyers said.

If the mollusks are listed, a recovery or protection plan could have devastating effects on agriculture, Yost said. Such a plan could impose restrictions on agricultural practices, the trout industry and hydropower development, he said.

"We're waiting in the Snake River is improving," Yost said.

"The Farm Bureau is not opposed to the listing, if the scientific data warrants such a listing," he said.

 "There were some American soldiers on leave in Bahrain or the (United Arab) Emirates before the fighting started," he said. "They ran into some Kuwaitis, and one of the American soldiers asked them if they had any home fighting to liberate their country. The Kuwaitis said 'why should we when we're paying you to do that?'"

"If you want to understand the Saudis and the Kuwaitis and the way they deal with their workers, the best example is the plantation in the American South before the Civil War," Moughabbi said.

Moughabbi contended the United States would have been better off in the long run by allowing the United Nations economic sanctions more time to work before going to war.

"When (Iraqi Foreign Minister) Tariq Aziz came to Geneva (in early January) to talk to (Secretary of State James) Baker, they were willing to negotiate," he said. "They were looking for a fig leaf (such as the promise of an international conference on Palestine); and Bush was unwilling to give it them."

Bozeman works to keep National Finals Rodeo

BOZEMAN, Mont. — Members of the Bozeman Site Promotion Committee have been told the city may be able to retain the College National Finals Rodeo once the current contract expires by promoting their best assets — experience, community support and participation.

"We have a unique thing going here," committee member Gene Surber said at a public meeting Wednesday night. "We have a track record and the ability to gather volunteers."

But the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association has three other bidders for a five-year contract to host the rodeo — Lubbock, Texas; Ogden, Utah; and Rapid City, S.D. The new contract will be awarded in mid-June.

The NIRA, which administers college rodeo, has a "wish list" for CNFR bidders that includes everything from complimentary jackets to having the host pay about \$60,000 to cover the entry fees of the 300 to 350 cowboys and cowgirls who participate.

NCAA rule chases swimmers out of school

FEDERAL WAY, Wash. — A tidal wave has hit college swimming because of a new NCAA rule drastically changing the way athletes train. It's already swept away the collegiate career of Olympic champion Janet Evans and coaches say more big names will follow.

For its part, the NCAA says the rule is being misinterpreted and that Evans and other world-class swimmers can still get in as much supervised pool time as they like.

But the impact is something different and has left college programs shaking. "Isn't it sad that someone who is as ex-

cellent a student as Janet Evans has to quit college to pursue her dream?" Texas women's coach Mark Schubert asked. "I think it borders on criminal."

Said Evans, competing in the U.S. Spring Nationals: "I think the NCAA is going to have to get its act together."

— Evans of Stanford and Melvin Stewart of Tennessee, both world record-holders, said Wednesday they were leaving school to better prepare for the 1992 Olympics.

Both blamed the new NCAA rule, which takes effect in August. They said it cuts a world-class swimmer's supervised workout schedule, which usually averages 35-40 hours per week.

White Sox grab Jackson at bargain basement prices

White Sox owner Jerry Reinsdorf may have been more lucky than smart in this instance, since Bo Jackson picked him rather than the other way around. But give Reinsdorf credit for this much: He has the good sense to answer the door when opportunity knocks.

Six years ago, Reinsdorf picked up Chicago's moribund NBA franchise at fire-sale prices. The team's largest asset — maybe its

only one at the time — was a big-earred kid from North Carolina who played with his tongue hanging out and designed to touch the earth only when the mood struck him.

To date, the Bulls have sold out Chicago Stadium for 176 consecutive games, the franchise is one of the league's most-prized, and that kid, Michael Jordan, is one of the biggest values in all of sports. At a salary of slightly less than \$3 million annually, a half-

dozen players in the NBA alone are making more money.

And now Reinsdorf has Bo's head on his office wall at an even better price.

When Kansas City released Jackson some two weeks ago, the going price for Bo was \$2.375 million a year then, plus a \$1 service charge to pluck him off waivers. But under the terms of deal struck Wednesday, Reinsdorf is obligated to pay Jackson just \$700,000 in guaranteed salary this year.

Though the entire package could yield as much as \$8.15 million over three years, ev-

ery check after the first one might just as well have been made out using invisible ink. Not a penny leaves the bank after the 1991 season unless Bo plays, and not much more follows it out the door unless he plays well. On top of which, Reinsdorf is already ahead on the service charge.

Outside of a convention for actuaries, baseball's owners, bless them, are about as circumspect a group as you could gather together in a single room — especially since

Focus Shuttle Atlantis set for Friday liftoff

Vatican on hold in sainthood issue

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The shuttle Atlantis was buttoned up ready Thursday to carry a 17-ton satellite into space to study the incredibly powerful gamma rays that burst violently but instantaneously from the universe.

"The Gamma Observatory is truly a mission of discovery because we will be looking at regions of space that have not been studied before," said Leonard Fisk, NASA's chief scientist. "You have the real possibility of seeing phenomena that have not been discovered before and perhaps have not been imagined before."

NASA scheduled the liftoff for 9:18 a.m. EST Friday but said it could delay until nearly 2 p.m. to wait out any weather problems. Weather forecasters gave NASA 60-40 odds of getting off on time and held out hope for improvement later in the morning.

Air Force Col. Steven R. Nagel and his crew of three men and one woman will be the first Americans to go into space in four months. They are to return to Earth on Wednesday morning at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

The astronaut's main mission is Sunday's release of the 35,000-

building a space station.

It will be the first American space walk in five years. The last American space-walker, in late 1985, was Ross.

The Gamma Ray Observatory, or GRO, is the second in NASA's Great Observatory series. The first, the Hubble Space Telescope, was launched last April and, despite some disappointments in its ability to "look back" to the beginning of time, is returning valuable scientific dividends.

GRO, which cost \$617 million, will be 31 feet long when it is extended in orbit. Three of its four scientific instruments are about the size of a Volkswagen.

Observatories still to come in the series will study the X-ray and infrared spectrum.

While the Hubble does its work in the relatively narrow bands of the visible spectrum, gathering light that originated billions of years ago, the GRO operates at the extreme end — beyond ultraviolet and X-rays.

In that range, it monitors energies ranging from 20,000 to more than 30 billion electron volts. Gamma rays are born often in cataclysms — blazars in what appears to be naked eye as the void of the heavens

— in black holes, quasars, pulsars and supernova explosions.

If the action gamma rays were visible — the rays do not penetrate Earth's atmosphere — the sky would be a flashing, violent sight.

This is a continuation of the second age of space science. "First said, 'GRO will allow us to observe in the universe the most energetic form of radiation, gamma rays, with unprecedented resolution and sensitivity.'"

Gamma rays have been studied before with a variety of smaller satellites and high-altitude balloons, but never with an instrument as large and as sensitive as GRO.

For example, GRO can detect very high temperatures flowing out of stellar black holes and thereby verify that these exotic objects do exist. The observatory will resolve questions of how matter was distributed through the universe and about the processes that followed the "Big Bang," which is believed to have created the universe.

On their space walk, Ross and Apt will test three prototype cart designs being evaluated for transporting astronauts around the outside of a space station. A space walk is scheduled to last six hours.

YATCANCITY — The Vatican said Thursday it had delayed action on a proposal to make Queen Isabella I of Spain a saint, but denied that protests from Jews and Muslims were the cause.

A Vatican spokesman said there was no more documentation to be examined now, so the work was stopping for a time.

The queen sent Christopher Columbus on the voyage that discovered America and a new world for the Roman Catholic church to convert. Next year will be the 500th anniversary of his discovery, and a Spanish archdiocese has been pushing to have Isabella sainted.

Jews and Muslims have objected strongly to the idea. Isabella expelled members of both groups from Spain, and she and her husband, Ferdinand II, are associated with the dreaded Inquisition that persecuted Jews, Muslims and

other non-conformists.

It has been judged opportune to have a momentary pause in Isabella's case, said Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro.

He acknowledged letters of protest to the Vatican but denied they caused the work to stop. "It is a pause" and "not a suspension," Navarro insisted.

Navarro said it is common to stop work for a time on people who lived hundreds of years ago, because of difficulties in obtaining documentation useful to determine suitability for possible sainthood.

The Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints must decide if a candidate was heroically virtuous or martyred.

If so, the cases go to the cardinals in the congregation and eventually to the pope. For non-martyrs, the church requires proof of two miracles demonstrating saintly behavior. That has proved another problem, backers found.

It has been judged opportune to have a momentary pause in Isabella's case, said Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro.

He acknowledged letters of protest to the Vatican but denied they caused the work to stop. "It is a pause" and "not a suspension," Navarro insisted.

Navarro said it is common to stop work for a time on people who lived hundreds of years ago, because of difficulties in obtaining documentation useful to determine suitability for possible sainthood.

The Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints must decide if a candidate was heroically virtuous or martyred.

If so, the cases go to the cardinals in the congregation and eventually to the pope. For non-martyrs, the church requires proof of two miracles demonstrating saintly behavior. That has proved another problem, backers found.

Saturdays swing at Spanbauers'

If it's Saturday night, the moon is flying high and the lonesome guitars are in tune, it must be time for the weekly barn dance at Spanbauer Ranch southeast of Jerome.

Every Saturday, John and Marie Spanbauer throw a down-home party for country music lovers, who flock by the dozens to meet with friends and dance to sweet waltzes, peppy polkas and lively swing tunes.

The Spanbauer Barn Dance is the only one of its kind in the Magic Valley, and it's not the sort of place where people wait until the second set to show up. At five minutes past 8, the floor is packed and the air is full of conversation.

"You see people here you know have been dancing together all their lives," says John, who himself has been married to Marie for 50 years. The crowd is mostly middle-aged and up, although many younger folks who are taking swing dance lessons have lately been showing up to try their new skills.

Barn dances boast a rich tradition in the Spanbauer family. The clan held dances while living on a ranch 7 miles from Pocatello. Those affairs became so popular that, toward the end of the dances' 15-year run, people needed reservations to get in.

The family moved to the Magic Valley in 1980 and wanted to continue the dances. But the barn on their new spread wasn't fit to be used. "The barn should have been torn down when we moved here," says John Spanbauer Jr.

The family spent nearly a decade rehabilitating the old barn. They salvaged the 900-square-foot hardwood dance floor from a Twin Falls church and the walls from the Hunt Labor Camp.

In 1989, the family threw a Christmas party for their ranch hands and business associates. Everyone had a great time, and a few weeks later, the Spanbauers were back in the barn dance business.



They weren't sure at first whether people would come - the barn sits at the end of a bumpy, gravelly road that's a dark 3 1/2-mile drive off Route 93. But the word got out, and an estimated 60 to 120 people crowd in each Saturday to two-step the night away. The barn has been used for weddings and other events, too.

Free mythweaver series includes rare tales

TWIN FALLS — As spring's air warms, the days lengthen and the ground softens, humans are reminded of their kinship with the rest of the natural world.

These ties will be the topic tonight as Ramona Walema, an elder from the Shoshone-Bannock Tribe, visits the Magic Valley as part of The Idaho Mythweaver statewide storytelling tour.

The presentation is set for 7:30 p.m. in Room 117 of the Shields Building at the College of Southern Idaho. Admission is free, and the public is welcome.

Walema, the daughter of a medicine man, is of Bannock and Paiute ancestry and lives on the Shoshone-Bannock Reservation at Fort Hall. Her stories include both those of the Sho-Ban Tribe and the Shoshone-Paiute people of Duck Valley, where her parents were born. Many Indian tales unveiled on this

tour have never before been heard outside the tribal cultures. In addition to storytelling, Walema works to preserve her tribal culture through bead-

work, basketry and traditional Indian uses for the plants of southern Idaho. She is also an accomplished artist and musician and was honored last year by Gov. Cecil Andrus with the Biennial Award for Support of Arts Education.

The Idaho Mythweaver project, titled "Speaking the Earth Mother," was organized by Jane Fritz, a freelance writer and producer from Sandpoint. It was funded with grants from the Idaho Humanities Council and the Plum Creek Timber Company.

"Our goal is to provide a public forum for Idaho Native American elders to share their tribal myths and legends which speak to the interconnectedness of people and the natural world," Fritz says.

"To the Indian, no story existed in isolation from the life of the people or the life of the land," Fritz adds. "The stories helped the Indian people believe strongly in themselves, their language and their sacred traditions." "As we face the ecological chal-

lenges of the 1990s, perhaps the Indian people can teach us to listen to the land by sharing their stories with us," Fritz says. "They are, after all, the original caretakers of Idaho's environment."

Seven tribal elders have taken part in the project, which started March 1 and will have reached 14 Idaho towns before it concludes next week. The project also included a series of radio documentaries. The final two programs will air on KRIC Radio (103.9 FM) in Burley, 96.3 FM in Twin Falls) April 13 and April 20.

In another project, Fritz worked with two members of the Sho-Ban community to develop an environmental education program based on Native American stories.

The state Department of Fish and Game and the Idaho Department of Education have agreed to sponsor a workshop on Native American environmental education for 25 teachers. The seminar will take place near Coeur d'Alene in June.

Hundered by worries, stock market winds up mixed session

NEW YORK — The stock market chummed through a mixed session Thursday, unable to make much headway in the face of worries about corporate profits.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, up about 15 points at its midmorning peak, closed with a 2.23 loss at 2,924.50.

But advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 7 to 5 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 967 up, 693 down and 427 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 198.12 million shares, down from

213.72 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in the over-the-counter market, totaled 239.06 million shares.

Analysts said investors were a bit discouraged by persistent evidence of weakness in the economy and business profits.

The latest data on initial claims for state unemployment insurance showed a 33,000 increase to 543,000 for the week ended March 16. That suggested that enthusiasm over the end of the Gulf War still had injected no life into the job market.

Bond prices rose and interest rates fell

on the news. But stock traders showed only mild encouragement over the possibility of further declines in rates.

The likely intention of the Federal Reserve Board are expected to become a little clearer Friday morning after the issuance of monthly Labor Department statistics on employment.

Analysts are projecting a decline of roughly 100,000 to 150,000 in nonfarm payroll employment last month, and an increase in the unemployment rate from 6.5 percent to 6.6 or 6.7 percent.

Polaroid Corp. weighed in with one of the latest earnings disappointments, saying that it expected to report sharply lower

first-quarter profits. Polaroid shares fell 4 to 23% in active trading.

Customer Systems tumbled 5 1/2 to 26%. The company also estimated lower earnings for the first quarter.

Losers among the blue chips included American Express, down 1/2 at 28 1/2; General Motors, down 1/4 at 37 1/2; International Paper, down 1/2 at 59 1/2; and Merck, down 1/4 at 108 1/2.

Bank stocks were mostly higher, extending their recent rally amid hopes for a continued easing of "credit-crunched" conditions. Citicorp rose 3/4 to 15 1/4; Republic Bank of New York rose 1/4 to 5 1/4; Chemical Bank, 1/2 to 19 1/4; First Wachovia 1/2 to 5 1/2; and Chase Manhattan 1/2 to 17.

As measured by Wilshire Associates' index of more than 5,000 actively traded stocks, the market increased 58.70 billion, or 0.24 percent, in value.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks gained 13 to 207.73.

Standard & Poor's industrial index rose 1.10 to 449.84, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was up .83 at 379.77.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market climbed 2.52 to 497.57. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 365.11, up 2.64.

'Separate but Equal' examines issues in 4-hour miniseries starting Sunday

By Christopher Hull

The mills of the gods grind slowly," shrugs George Stevens Jr., the writer, producer and director of "Separate but Equal." The four-hour miniseries airs Sunday and Monday, April 7 and 8, on ABC.

Stevens is speaking of the genesis and development of his idea to commit one of the formative events in modern American history to film.

"Separate but Equal" tells the story of one of the five civil-rights cases that have come to be known collectively as "Brown vs. the Board of Education," after the history-making 1954 Supreme Court decision that initiated the touchy process of desegregating the nation's schools. It focuses on a South Carolina case that began when a request for a school bus for black children was turned down.

Sidney Poitier stars as future Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, who at the time of the case was chief counsel to the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, which brought the case to the high court. Burt Lancaster stars as former Democratic presidential candidate John W. Davis, who argued against Marshall. The miniseries also stars Richard Kiley as Chief Justice Earl Warren and Cleopatra Little as Robert Carter, Marshall's deputy.

Stevens, the son of renowned film director George Stevens, mulled over the idea of the miniseries for the better part of a decade before the wheels really got rolling. In 1979, the 25th anniversary of the landmark decision, Stevens read an article by

conservative columnist James J. Kilpatrick. "He wrote a fascinating piece," Stevens remembers. "A Southerner's reassessment of his views." The piece struck a chord, and finally, in 1987, "I got keen on it and went and talked to Sidney Poitier."

Initially, Stevens did not receive much encouragement for the project. "People would say, 'You'll never get this done, because there is no actor who could carry it. I would say, 'Well, what about Sidney Poitier?' and they would say, 'He turns down a hundred television projects a year.'"

In fact, Poitier had not done a television project since "A Man Is Ten Feet Tall" 35 years ago.

"I went to Sidney," says Stevens, "and I said, 'Look, I want to do this... and I want to know where I stand before I start out.' He looked at me

in that princely manner, and said, 'I do not do television ... (long pause) ... but if you come with a compelling script, I will do this.' That kind of sentenced me to do something, and after I sent the script to Sidney, he called back and said, 'I must be a part of this.'"

Stevens is especially proud of what he sees as the miniseries' even-handed approach to the case and the emotions that surrounded it. "This is not a black-and-white story," says Stevens, acknowledging the unintentional pun.

Oscars, Barbara Walters lead ABC to top spots in Nielsen ratings lists

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Academy Award presentations and a Barbara Walters special that followed propelled ABC to the top of the ratings last week, dropping NBC to No. 2 for the second time in three weeks.

CBS came in third with only two entries in the Top 20, its "60 Minutes" news magazine and Duke's 79-77 upset win over the University of Nevada Las Vegas in the National Collegiate Athletic Association basketball semifinals, the A.C. Nielsen Co. reported Tuesday. "60 Minutes" placed third and the basketball contest was No. 13 in the weekly ratings competition.

The 63rd Annual Academy Awards show Monday from the Shrine Auditorium scored a 28 rating and helped give ABC its best night since the network broadcast Super Bowl XXV in January.

For the second time last month, ABC newswoman Barbara Walters hurt the normally first-place NBC. The "Barbara Walters Special," featuring Oscar winners Whoopi Goldberg and Jeremy Irons, rode the Academy Awards coattails to finish fourth. Two weeks earlier, Walters' interview with Desert Storm com-

'Twin Peaks' freaks cliques are piqued

NEW YORK (AP) — Our story thus far: ABC, possibly under the demonic influence of low ratings, put the odd, broody little nighttime soap opera "Twin Peaks" on hiatus.

The result: 10,000 pieces of odd, broody fan mail plus the following items:

- A 12-pound fireplace log (Log Lady style) with a letter of protest;
- boxes of doughnuts and 60 cents in coins so that ABC Entertainment President Robert Iger can buy "a damn good cup of coffee";

- two dozen used golf balls (like those used for living room putting practice by Laura-killer Leland Palmer);
- a resolution from Michigan Senate ("WHEREAS, many of the people of Michigan are desirous of the immediate return ...");
- an 11-page document with the phrase "Bring Back Twin Peaks" imprinted more than 1,500 times.

— ABC, in a news release, said the tone of the letters ranged from despairing ("I want my 'Twin Peaks.' It was all that I have to live

for.") to menacing (cut-out past-up letters that read "Bring back 'Twin Peaks' — or else ...").

The series, created by director David Lynch and producer Mark Frost, went into hiatus in February, then returned to complete its run of six original episodes. The finale will be directed by Lynch, said ABC spokeswoman Janice Gretemeyer.

"The eventual fate of the series has not been determined yet, but will be when we announce our fall schedule in mid-May," she said.

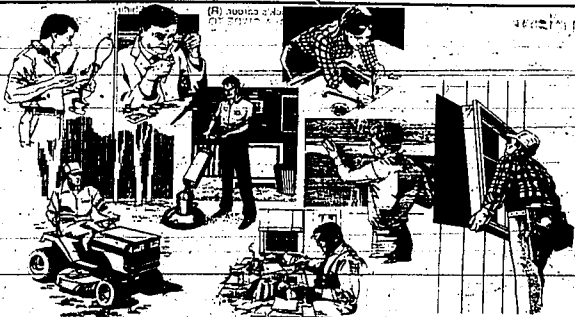
