U.N. declares gulf war at end

UNITED NATIONS — The Security Council announced a formal end to the Persian Gulf War on Thursday, accepting Iraq's pledge that it will pay for war damages and scrap its weapons of mass destruction.

At 6 p.m. EDT, Iraqi Ambassador Abdul Amir al-Anbani entered the council chambers and received a letter containing the official cease-fire declaration.

A Feb. 28 truce declared by the U.S.-led allied coalition halted hostilities, but only the Security Council, which authorized the use of force to oust Iraq from Kuwait, could rescind the state of war.

The letter from council president Paul Nordenskiold, the Belgian ambassador, formally capped a war that began Jan. 17 with a blistering allied air campaign. The fighting concluded in late February, after a

North Iraq 'safe haven' for Kurds

WASHINGTON — The White House declared Thursday that the northern tip of Iraq is a "safe haven" for Kurdish refugees and off-limits for "any kind of military activity" by Iraq.

The region is still part of Iraq, said presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater, and Iraq will be responsible for governing and maintaining law and order there.

However, he also said the United States is prepared, along with international relief agencies, to sustain the Kurdish refugees north of the 36th parallel until they feel safe going back to their homes.

And while the massive relief effort is under way, "we have the resources there available to support the operation," Fitzwater said.

"There are forces there that are capable of taking action to carry out this warning that we have given to Iraq," he added.

and Saddam Hussein's suppression of them.

The letter noted Iraq's "irrevocable and unqualified acceptance" of the council's terms and concluded, "the conditions ... have been met and that the formal cease-fire ... is therefore effective."

The council's cease-fire resolution, passed April 3, included stringent demands for the destruction of Iraq's chemical, biological and nuclear weapons and payment of war damages to Kuwait.

It set a 120-day timetable for steps to destroy those arms.

The ban on selling Iraq weapons of mass destruction and long-range ballistic missiles, and the technology to develop them, will remain in effect indefinitely.

By Aug. 1, the Security Council will review its ban on other arms sales to Iraq, "taking into account Iraq's compliance with this resolution."

Owls, fish leading list for rescue

SEATTLE — Environmentalists say imperiled Northwest salmon and spotted owls are only two recent examples of a long list of species needing rescue nationwide.

But development interests, fearing conflict between jobs and animals, say wildlife protection must be tempered to keep the U.S. economy off the endangered list.

Both sides expect a big congressional battle next winter over re-authorizing the 1973 Endangered Species Act. Environmental groups want the act expanded to protect whole ecosystems as well as individual species; their opponents want it changed to allow more economic development.

"It's going to be the fight of the century," said Robert Irwin, a National Wildlife Federation attorney.

The law has pitted wildlife protection against economic development since 1978, when a fish called the snail darter temporarily halted construction of Tennessee's Tellico Dam.

In the Northwest, conflict boiled up last June when the northern spotted owl was declared a threatened species. Owl-protection measures are expected to close much old-growth forest to logging and could eventually cost more than 20,000 jobs.

Veto sends insurance firm packing

BOISE — Continental Life and Accident Co., which has been headquartered in Boise for more than 50 years, says it's moving out of the state because Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed a bill which would have cut the insurance premium tax from 3 percent to 1 percent.

Chief Executive Officer Gerald Tyler said Thursday Continental has started negotiations with other states which have a more favorable tax climate for insurance companies and hopes to move its headquarters by Sept. 30.

"While our current employees will remain with the company in Boise, future employment and expansion will take place outside the state of Idaho," he said.

"The impact of the governor's recent veto of House Bill 87 will result in fewer Idaho employees; lower sales tax revenue and results in the loss of a major incentive for insurance companies to locate in Idaho," Tyler said.

"We find the governor's veto and the lack of support by the Department of Commerce for this legislation to be in conflict with the administration's stated objective of attracting jobs to Idaho," he said.

A spokesman for the governor, Press Secretary Scott Peyton, said Andrus wanted to link the reduction in taxes for insurance companies to the imposition of a 1 percent tax on

the "Blues," Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Idaho, which would have been revenue neutral.

"That bill was sidetracked, and the separate bill lowering the insurance premium tax to 1 percent" was the only measure that got through the Legislature.

Peyton said the issue will be brought up again next year.

"The governor conceptually supports what House Bill 87 was trying to accomplish," he said. Peyton said Andrus' goal is "to reduce the insurance premium tax to create a competitive advantage for all insurance companies doing business in Idaho and protect the tax base."

Officials said the change in Continental's Idaho taxes would have been only \$100,000.

Company officials disputed the estimate, saying that did not take into account the lost income and sales tax.

Tyler said he urged Andrus to sign the bill, and said the governor made it clear he was vetoing it because of the cost.

"That was a business decision and we respect that," Tyler said. "We are reaching a business decision."

Continental operates in 39 states and has 165 employees nationwide, 135 in Boise. Tyler said the company expects to double its business by next year. The company's annual report to the Department of Insurance said it collected \$20.6 million in accident and health insurance premiums in 1990. Continental is in its 51st year of operation.

Publisher calls off tour for Kelley

WASHINGTON — Simon and Schuster Thursday canceled Kitty Kelley's book tour for "Nancy: Reagan: The Unauthorized Biography," saying that it was "changing its strategy."

"We have achieved our initial publishing objective: to make the public aware of the book and generate sales," said publicity director Victoria Meyer. Plans for Kelley to go to Boston, Detroit, Chicago and the West Coast have been replaced by satellite interviews from a New York studio, which will start next week. All print interviews have meanwhile been put on hold.

The decision to cancel the tour, Meyer said, was the publisher's. "Obviously (Kelley) is aware of and in agreement with it, but it's not at her insistence."

An S&S insider disputed that account, saying the tour was being canceled at Kelley's initiative.

Negotiator an 'agent of reality, prophet of doom'

TWIN FALLS — The gentle motion of his houseboat on Seattle's Lake Union takes Ty Tice far from the bustle of the city.

"It's like you're on vacation," he said. Though it's only two miles from his downtown office, the water, the motion and the geese make this floating home seem completely removed from the city.

Tice needs the respite.

He has taken on the daunting job of helping diverse Idaho interests reach some sort of agreement on a wilderness proposal for the state's 9 million acres of roadless public land.

Tice is a member of the Mediation Institute

of Seattle, hired by the state of the Idaho to the tune of \$150,000 to run the state's wilderness negotiations. Past efforts to decide the fate of the state's remaining roadless areas have failed.

About 4 million acres within the state already are designated wilderness. Only California, Washington and Alaska have more wilderness within their borders.

As mediator in negotiation, he sees himself as an "agent of reality and prophet of doom," he said. His job is to keep negotiators on track and to referee the process, and he finds himself reminding negotiators of the possibilities if agreement is reached and the consequences if it is not.

In the case of Idaho's wilderness, he says Idahans are "in control of your own destiny."

But if no agreement is reached, "it's going to get done to us rather than by us."

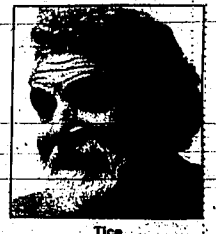
What mediation offers is a lesser evil, he said.

To ease logistics and to insure negotiators know the areas in question, the process was split into six regions. The south-central Idaho negotiations got under way March 30. The next meeting is scheduled for April 23 in Hatley.

And when the negotiators next meet, Tice will ask them to check their positions at the door. Instead of defending a stance, they will explore the opportunities for creative solutions that the conflict presents, he said.

For Tice, the process of debate and compromise is something he's known for a

Weather summary

It was extremely windy across the southern two-thirds of Idaho Thursday. A large storm system in the Rockies brought windy conditions to all of Idaho except the Panhandle. Wind speeds of 25 to 35 mph, along with local blowing snow and dust, were reported in the south. In the Panhandle, winds were mostly 10 to 20 mph and speeds were expected to gradually decrease across the state today.

By afternoon, most of the snow showers were in the southeast and over the central mountains. Reported precipitation amounts were light. A snow depth of 2 inches at Pocatello took top honors for valley stations. Skies were mostly cloudy except for mostly sunny to partly cloudy in the north. Afternoon temperatures in showery areas were in the 30s, while readings elsewhere were in the 40s and 50s.

The warmest temperature Thursday was 60 degrees at Lewiston. Stanley was coldest at 2 degrees below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 93 degrees at Presidio, Texas. The lowest was 12 degrees at Wisdom, Mont.

Rain, snow, cold stretch across central part of nation

A band of rain and snow stretched across the center of the nation Thursday, dumping more than a foot of snow and producing thunderstorms with at least one tornado in the South.

At midday, snow was falling over western South Dakota, south-central through western Montana, Wyoming, northeastern Colorado, eastern Idaho, northern Utah and northwestern Nevada.

A winter storm warning was in effect through Friday across northwestern North Dakota, with a winter storm watch for much of the rest of the state.

Rain mixed with snow fell over north-central Iowa and south-central Minnesota, eastern South Dakota, southeastern North Dakota and southeastern Montana. Showers and thunderstorms extended from west-central Louisiana across north-central Louisiana, central and eastern Arkansas; much of Missouri, southeastern Nebraska, western Kentucky; southern Illinois and south-central Iowa.

Rain fell over eastern Alabama and west-central through central Texas. Rain also dampened northern Maine.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT included 1.80 inches at the Jacksonville Air Force Base at Little Rock, Ark., and .87 inch at Leesville, La.

Low temperatures replaced record heat in the East, and advisories for frost and freezing temperatures were posted over sections of Ohio, New York state, New Jersey, West Virginia, Virginia and Maryland.

Cool air also moved into the Pacific Northwest. Record lows included 31 at Astoria, Ore.; 31 at Eugene, Ore.; 33; at tie, at Portland, Ore.; 29; at tie, at Salem, Ore.; and 35, at tie, at Seattle-Tacoma, Wash.

State seizes insurance subsidiary.
 LOS ANGELES — State regulators Thursday seized the main subsidiary of First Executive Corp., the insurance giant that was Michael Milken's top junk-bond customer and suffered huge losses when the junk-bond market dissolved.

The takeover of Executive Life Co., which the company did not contest during a brief Superior Court hearing, was by far the biggest collapse of an insurer in history.

California Insurance Commissioner John Garreault said holders of life insurance policies, annuities and other contracts probably won't get full value. Executive Life has 170,000 life insurance policies, all in California, with a face-value of \$38 billion, he said.

Cut tobacco ties, secretary advises
 WASHINGTON — Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan wants the federal government to set an example for the rest of the country and cut its ties with tobacco company sponsorships, officials said Thursday.

Sullivan delivered another anti-smoking blast on Wednesday, asking sports and film fans to use the "language of money," by staying away from events sponsored by tobacco companies.

His latest target is a tennis tournament scheduled to be held on National Park Service land in Washington. The August tournament is to be sponsored by a cigarette manufacturer.

Sullivan has appealed to the Washington Area Tennis Patrons Foundation and his friend and fellow Cabinet member Manuel Lujan, secretary of the Interior Department, but so far to no avail.

Kennedy nephew denies abuse claim
 PALM BEACH, Fla. — The nephew of Sen. Edward Kennedy, at the center of a rape investigation by his Washington attorney, strongly denied abusing the alleged victim and said "any suggestion to the contrary is a damnable lie."

"I emphatically deny that the woman in question was abused or that force was used by me in any way," William Kennedy Smith said in a statement released Thursday by his Washington attorney, Robert Smith, 30, a medical student at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., issued a statement April 3 that he has committed no offense at the Kennedy family's oceanside compound on Easter weekend.

Police said Thursday they will release a narrative of the sequence of events of the alleged assault because they feel disclosure will no longer jeopardize the investigation.

Pentagon releases money for Osprey
 WASHINGTON — The Pentagon, at the urging of Congress, is releasing \$200 million for development of the V-22 Osprey aircraft, a House panel was told Thursday.

But Defense Department Comptroller Sean O'Keefe told a joint hearing of two House Armed Services subcommittees there was no commitment to produce the craft — only to explore the "hilt rotor" technology.

"As (Defense) Secretary (Dick) Cheney has said numerous times, the V-22 may prove to be an interesting aircraft to explore. But we still believe that there are acceptable, less expensive alternatives than can meet our military needs," O'Keefe told the subcommittees.

limber jobs.

Now the spotlight has turned to the rocky salmon of Idaho's Snake River, a nearly extinct fish whose rescue could dwarf the cost of saving the owl.

Federal biologists last week recommended endangered status for the salmon. That raised worries that releasing "extra" water from reservoirs to help the fish migrate past dams could dry up irrigated farmland and raise electricity rates throughout the hydro-powered Northwest.

And that's not all — 3,500 animals and plants are being considered for addition to the federal endangered species list.

You've got to expect more conflicts, said Jay Sheppard, a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist who helps oversee the 606 species already listed as endangered or threatened.

As we pour more concrete, cut more forests and build more dams, it restricts species to smaller and smaller areas," he said.

In the Southeast, a plan to protect red-cockaded woodpeckers would close a million acres of national forest to logging. In Arizona, construction of a mountaintop astronomy observatory is pitted against the Mount Graham red squirrel. Home-building has been blocked by golden-cheeked woodpeckers in Texas, by desert tortoises in Nevada.

long time. He grew up in a small Connecticut town in which regular town meetings were held at which residents aired their concerns and opinions publicly.

But mediation is not a town meeting, he said; nor is it a hearing or public comment session. "It is an opportunity for opposing interests to establish some safe ground from which to negotiate."

Rather than an adversarial process that relies on expert witnesses or legal wrangling, negotiation depends on the cooperation of negotiators.

"In order to resolve the conflict, you need the best that everybody can bring," Tice said.

Tice joined The Mediation Institute in 1979. The organization, founded in 1975 by Gerald Cormick, grew out of Cormick's research at the University of Washington to see if labor-management negotiations could be extended to multi-party negotiations on natural resource issues.

Before "recycling" his life in the middle 1970s, Tice negotiated corporate mergers. The new turn in his career is more satisfying, he said, and the outcome of natural resources and land use negotiations is ultimately more meaningful for the planet, he said.

When it comes to environmental issues, there is seldom a right or wrong solution, he said. Mediation is often an attempt to see what can be done, a controlled experiment, he said — a course of action rather than a final decision.

Clearly not everything is negotiable, but a lot more is negotiable than is now negotiated, he said. It could be a "first resort" for conflict resolution.

When he's not trying to get people to settle their differences peacefully, Tice likes to read and travel.

"I have discovered a lot of places on the planet that are fascinating," he said.

Schwarzkopf says every gulf war mission was accomplished

KUWAIT CITY (AP) — Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, visiting Kuwait as a permanent cease-fire was to take effect, said Thursday the allied forces "accomplished every single mission" assigned to them in the Gulf War.

Schwarzkopf, who arrived by helicopter from the Saudi capital of Riyadh, said neither Saddam Hussein's brutal repression of internal rebellions or the chaos in Iraq diminished the allied success. "I have a great feeling of a great victory," said Schwarzkopf. "Anyone who dares

imply that we did not achieve a great victory obviously doesn't know what the hell he's talking about."

The general, dressed in camouflage fatigues, said the nearly 100,000 U.S. troops in southern Iraq were leaving, but would not withdraw completely until President Bush gave the word. He declined to give a timetable, though most are expected home before the Fourth of July holiday.

United Nations officials are to arrive in Kuwait on Friday and a monitoring force is to be deployed along the Kuwait-Iraq border.

Schwarzkopf made a one-day trip to Kuwait to present the Legion of Merit to the acting commander of the

Kuwaiti armed forces Maj. Gen. Jaber al-Khaled al-Sabah.

The Legion of Merit, authorized by Bush, is the highest military award the United States bestows on foreigners. Other military commanders of the 33-nation allied coalition also are expected to receive the award, U.S. military officials said.

Schwarzkopf pinned the medal and red ribbon on Gen. Jaber's chest and presented a plaque commending his "outstanding service during Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm."

"I promised Gen. Jaber a long time ago that the first forces going into Kuwait City would be Kuwaiti armed forces, and I'm very proud to say that they were," the general said of the emirate's liberation on Feb. 27.

The brief ceremony was held at the Kuwait Armed Forces Hospital. Schwarzkopf said Iraq's battered military was no longer a threat to its neighbors even though it had sufficient strength to crush rebellions by the Kurds in the north and Shiite Muslims in the south.

"People tend to greatly exaggerate

what he (Saddam Hussein) has left," Schwarzkopf told an impromptu news conference. "His war machine is destroyed."

"It doesn't take a well-trained military to beat a bunch of rebels in the mountains," he added.

Schwarzkopf is expected to return soon. Asked what he planned to do, he said, "I'm looking for another cause."

He also said he would go fishing, play with his dog, and "enjoy being a father." It's something "I haven't done for about eight months."

Kurds kill 12 Iraqis in ambush

KORE, Iraq (AP) — Kurdish rebels on Thursday ambushed Iraqi troops trying to punch deeper into the mountains of northern Iraq, killing at least 12 soldiers and knocking out two tanks and an armored personnel carrier.

The attack by Saddam Hussein's forces came less than 24 hours after Washington announced it had warned the Baghdad government over the weekend not to launch air attacks against Kurdish areas.

Meanwhile, the mass exodus of the Kurdish population continued despite the American warnings to Iraq to leave the refugees alone. Scores of refugees, particularly babies and old people, are dying daily from exposure, malnutrition and disease.

In a mountain pass leading to Iraq during one of the frequent violent storms, mothers wrapped babies and small children tightly in blankets to protect them from a blushing by hail. They plodded up the steep road, drenched to the skin. Rebel commanders said their success against the Iraqi troops — which followed a similar battle a day earlier — was easier because the army had not used its deadly helicopter gunships after the American warning.

At the ambush scene — a natural line of defense formed by a steep line of low rocky mountains — reporters counted 12 bodies of Iraqi soldiers on the road next to the damaged armor.

Two wounded Iraqi soldiers lay on the ground, groaning in pain. "Damn Saddam for causing this!" said one of the Iraqis, his face half covered in blood.

"I did not fire a shot. The officers

continued to reverberate with cannon fire and the crash of exploding shells.

The army kept up intermittent shelling against the rebel-held mountains, but the shells were off target and harmlessly kicked up puffs of smoke.

Jubilant turban-clad guerrillas flashed victory signs as they walked amid the corpses and the damaged tanks, paying no attention to the enemy fire.

This was the second army attack

repulsed by the rebels at the same spot.

Reporters counted eight dead soldiers and one tank and two APCs knocked out in a rebel ambush the previous day.

The main rebel successes underscored the vulnerability of the army when it tries to venture into the Kurdish mountain hinterland.

The ambush scene is next to Kore, a village about three miles from the summer resort town of Salahuddin, the last of the lowland Kurdish main cities regained by the army from the rebels on Sunday.

In London, Hoshyar Zebari, a spokesman for the Kurdistan Democratic Party, maintained the Kurds were continuing to use gunships against the rebels around Salahuddin and Zalkho, farther north near the Turkish border. There was no independent verification of his charge.

Salahuddin is about 15 miles northeast of Erbil and is within the area north of the 36th parallel where U.S. officials warned Iraqis not to interfere with refugees and efforts to aid the fleeing Kurds.

Many of those fleeing were skeptical that the Bush administration's warning to Iraq will provide them with any real protection.

"We don't trust Bush's words any more," said one refugee in Diwani, a town at the bottom of the Haj Omran pass leading to Iraq's border.

"We cannot trust Saddam after what he has done to our people. We want safety for our children," said one refugee mother.

During a reporter's journey along the pass Wednesday and Thursday, it was jammed with hundreds of thousands of refugees. Some estimates put as high as a half-million. A solid line of tens of thousands of families on foot continued their slow trek toward Iran, undeterred by the mountain storms lashing the region in the past few days.

Refugees in the column complain that none of the foreign refugee aid dropped in the border region has reached the people in the pass.

Rebel officials said scores of refugees are dying from hunger and hardship. One man said 18 people died in his small section of the road the previous day.

Baker sees progress in peace possibilities

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Saudi Arabia's foreign minister told Secretary of State James A. Baker III Thursday that his government was cutting off financial support to the Palestine Liberation Organization, a senior U.S. official said.

Prince Saud also responded positively to an Israeli proposal for Mideast peace talks, the official said as Baker flew to Damascus for an appraisal of the plan from Syrian President Hafez Assad.

Assessing his efforts so far,

Baker said, "We've made some progress but there's still a lot that has to be done." Speaking to reporters before he saw Assad, Baker said there was potential for a breakthrough. And yet, he said, "We're hoping people wouldn't rush to judgment. It isn't black and white."

Syrian government radio, which usually reflects Assad's views, stressed that Israel must adhere to U.N. resolutions calling for withdrawal from lands that had been held by the Arabs until the 1967 Mideast war.

Kurdish refugees more desperate as aid trickles

CUKURCA, Turkey (AP) — Turkish troops used German shepherds to charge Iraqi Kurds swarming over a food-laden truck Thursday, but after the dogs withdrew the refugees surged back, trampling much of the cargo.

The scene at the Cukurca refugee camp demonstrated the increasing desperation of hundreds of thousands of Kurdish refugees threatened by starvation, freezing temperatures and disease on the Turkish-Iraq border.

Turkish authorities pleaded Thursday for more international aid for the 400,000 to 500,000 refugees they say have now arrived at their frontier. "Delaying aid means abandoning these people to their deaths," said Health Minister Halli Sivgin.

But relief officials said aid distribution being severely hampered by roads made impassable by mud and rain in the mountainous border region.

At the entrance to the Cukurca camp Thursday, Iraqi refugees napped a truck loaded with bulgur wheat, beans, pasta, onions and potatoes donated by Turkish Kurds.

Trying to restore order, Turkish troops charged the crowd with fierce German shepherds. The dogs bit an old woman on the shoulder, and

tugged at the sweater of another refugee.

But as soon as the dogs turned away, the crowd climbed on the truck again, spilling and trampling nearly half its contents.

A Turkish major in charge of security at the camp of 50,000 complained the refugees lack the social organization needed for more orderly distribution. Many refugees, desperate from days of hunger and cold, snatch up whatever they can.

The major, speaking on condition of anonymity, said there were cases where refugees grabbed three tents and hid two white families nearby were forced to sleep under bone-chilling rain.

The major then pointed to plastic water taps still stacked on a truck and said the chaos and plundering was delaying the provision of basic services.

Jafar Muhammad, 41, a slightly built Iraqi refugee, tried to warm himself at a fire Thursday while his wife boiled broth and their children slept under rain-soaked blankets.

Speaking in broken English, he said he was at the breaking point. Asked if he would go back to Iraq, he said, "If it goes like this, I go back. If Saddam, kill me, then no more problem for me."

Atlantis completes extended mission

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Space shuttle Atlantis touched down Thursday after an extended six-day mission that featured the deployment of an observatory to study gamma rays and the first U.S. spacewalk in five years.

The shuttle landed at 6:55 a.m. on an unpaved runway on Rogers Dry Lake, one day later than scheduled and one day before the 10th anniversary of the first shuttle launch.

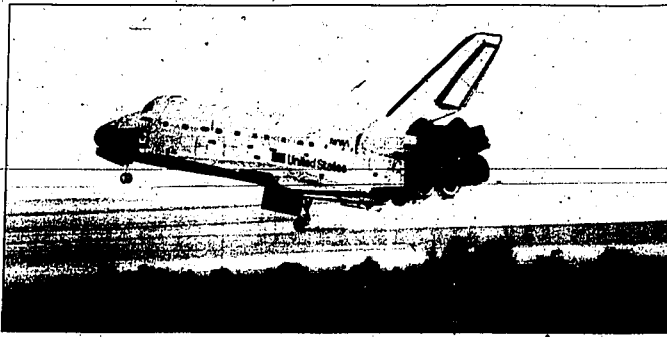
The last 10 years laid the foundation and springboard to go on in expanding our frontiers outward into space, P.J. Weitz, deputy director of Johnson Space Center, said at a post-landing news conference at this Mojave Desert military base.

Atlantis' 93-orbit mission featured ham radio chats with children in eight states and Sunday's deployment of the \$617 million, 35,000-pound Gamma Ray Observatory, the heaviest civilian satellite ever launched from a shuttle.

About 1,300 spectators put up with 43-degree temperature to watch Atlantis land in a headwind gusting to 21 mph.

Blustery wind up to 40 mph had forced NASA to cancel two possible landing attempts Wednesday. Mission Control had considered having the shuttle land Thursday on the concrete runway at Cape Canaveral, Fla., but wind at Edwards diminished adequately.

The shuttle's braking rockets were fired about an hour before touchdown, slowing Atlantis enough to send it on a searing dive through Earth's atmosphere.

Weitz said the crew and orbiter appeared in excellent condition, with no apparent damage to the shuttle's new carbon brakes and only minimal damage to its heat-shield tiles.

The first mission of the year carried commander Steven Nagel, pilot Ken Cameron, flight engineer Jerry Ross and mission specialists Linda Godwin and My Aft.

"Congratulations on a great job," mission control's Brian Duffy told the astronauts.

Spacewalker Apt was so excited when the astronauts disembarked

that "he bounced around," Weitz said. "He had one heck of a good time."

Apt and Ross performed an unscheduled spacewalk Sunday to repair a balky antenna on the observatory. Ross freed the antenna by shaking it.

"It was an eminently successful mission," Weitz said. "We had the opportunity to demonstrate the value of manned missions."

The next day, the two made their planned space walk to test methods and materials that may be used to

help astronauts construct a \$30 billion space station.

Columbia, the first shuttle to go into space, lifted off from Cape Canaveral on April 12, 1981, and landed in California two days later with astronaut John Young and Robert Crippen, who now heads the shuttle program.

Since then, there have been 38 other shuttle launches, including the Jan. 28, 1986, liftoff of Challenger, which exploded seconds later, killing seven crewmembers and grounding the fleet for 2½ years.

Discovery next up, Star Wars research slated

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — With Atlantis and its crew back home in glory, NASA is now concentrating on getting space shuttle Discovery off the ground in less than two weeks for a mission devoted to Star Wars research.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration has not launched two shuttles in the same month since January 1986. The second of the two shuttles was Challenger. The flight ended in tragedy 73 seconds after liftoff.

NASA is aiming for an April 23 launch for Discovery, 18 days after Atlantis' successful sendoff. Seven days separate the last two shuttle launches of 1990.

An official launch date will be set early next week.

Discovery was supposed to lift off

with its seven-man crew and Pentagon cargo in early March. But large cracks were discovered in the mechanisms that open and close doors to the fuel inlet, and shuttle managers decided it was too risky to fly.

The shuttle was hauled from the launch pad back to the hangar last month, and workers replaced the cracked metal hinges with reinforced devices. NASA returned Discovery to the pad in early April.

Smaller cracks were found in the same place on the two other shuttles as well as the new orbiter Endeavour, which rolls off the assembly line April 25.

Officials proceeded with Atlantis' flight despite the cracks after judging them too small to be of concern. The two fuel inlet doors closed tightly following liftoff Friday and protected

against the terrific heat of Thursday's re-entry.

"We decided to do the right thing because we didn't understand how we got there" with the cracks on Discovery, said NASA Administrator Richard Truly. "But we're happy with all the vehicles now."

The delay with Discovery forced NASA to drop one shuttle mission from this year's schedule. A total of six flights are now planned for 1991.

Le Blaine Hammond Jr., the pilot of Discovery's upcoming mission, approves of NASA's conservative approach.

"It shows the system is willing to stand up no matter what the public risk or appearance is," Hammond said. "They're willing to take that risk and stand up for safety, and say, 'We're not going to do it until we

know what the problem is."

Discovery's trip will be the 40th for the fleet since Columbia took off 10 years ago Friday on the first shuttle flight, and the 15th since the Challenger explosion on Jan. 28, 1986, that killed all seven crew members.

The Discovery crew will work around the clock for eight days, conducting tests for the Defense Department. The experiments are intended to provide information that will improve the military's ability to detect and intercept enemy missiles.

A Strategic Defense Initiative spacecraft will be released from Discovery to analyze the orbiter's exhaust plumes and gases and chemicals discharged from canisters. The satellite will be captured by the crew 1½ days later and placed back in the cargo bay.

Experts predict more flu cases next winter

ATLANTA (AP) — Parts of the United States saw an upswing in flu at the end of an otherwise mild winter this year, and the flu types involved could signal a rougher season next year, federal health officials said Thursday.

Most of the winter's flu cases were the type researchers know as Type B flu. That type historically does not hit hard among the elderly, who are at greatest risk of severe illness and death from influenza.

But since mid-February, some locales, particularly in the western half of the country, have seen a slight increase in both of the two major Type A flus,

which researchers call A-H1N1 and A-H3N2, the national Centers for Disease Control report.

"The flu virologists refer to this kind of upswing as a 'herald wave,' because it's often a predictor of what's going to be coming in the coming season," said Dr. Louisa Chapman, a CDC epidemiologist.

And one of the two flu types in the upswing, Type A-H3N2, can be particularly problematic for older people, she noted. The 1989-90 flu season "was one of the biggest flu seasons in 10 years in terms of mortality, and that was predominantly an A-H3N2 year," she said.

'Gilligan's Island' star Schafer dies at 90

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Actress Natalie Schafer, known to generations of 'Gilligan's Island' fans as the stranded millionaire's wife, Lovey, has died. She was 90.

Miss Schafer died Wednesday of cancer at her home, said family spokesman Frank Lieberman.

Miss Schafer also starred in the short-lived drama 1969-1970 series

"The Survivors" with Lani Turner and Kevin McCarthy.

Miss Schafer played the wife of Thurston Howell III, portrayed by the late Jim Backus. They were among the marooned passengers on the charter boat "Minnnow."

Bob Denver starred as Gilligan. Other cast members included Alan Hale Jr. as skipper Jonas Grumby and Tina Louise as Ginger Grant.

Newspaper will publish explicit list

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — The Boston Globe has decided to print a legal notice featuring the titles of 355 books and magazines named in an obscenity case despite reservations that the list could offend some readers.

Hampden County District Attorney William Bennett was ordered to publish the titles as a legal notice in both a local newspaper and daily newspaper in Boston to prosecute a store that sold the publications.

The Union-News in Springfield published the notice Saturday, and plans to run it again this weekend. The Globe and the Boston Herald had rejected the advertisement.

But on Wednesday afternoon, the Globe announced it would publish the list of titles that included explicit four-letter words and references to a variety of sexual acts.

"After initially refusing to publish the notice because of the language it contains, the Globe has decided to comply with the request to provide the district attorney with access to a Boston paper as required by law," Globe spokesman Richard Gulla said in a statement.

"However, the Globe publishes this ad with extreme reluctance because of its potential to offend our readers," the statement said.

Congress approves medals for generals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House approved bills Thursday award gold medals to Gen. Colin Powell and H. Norman Schwarzkopf to honor their successes in the Persian Gulf War.

The bills, approved by the Senate last month, passed 400-0 and 405-0. The only sign of dissent was votes of "present" on the bills by Rep. Gus Savage, D-Ill., who vehemently opposed the U.S. military action.

Under the legislation, which goes to President Bush for his signature, the Treasury would strike gold medals for the president to present to the generals.

In addition, "bronze" duplicates could be minted for sale to the general public.

Park Service will halt bison shoot

HELENA, Mont. — The National Park Service agreed Thursday to drop plans to shoot bison in Yellowstone National Park this spring as part of a livestock disease research project.

The Fund for Animals announced the agreement, calling it a major victory that will save 22 bison from execution.

Federal rangers shot three pregnant bison Monday for a study of whether brucellosis, an infectious disease which causes domestic livestock to abort their young, can be transmitted from bison. The project called for killing 25 bison to obtain tissue samples for laboratory tests. The killings were delayed when U.S. District Judge George Revercomb in Washington granted the animal-rights group a hearing on its request for a temporary restraining order.

Park spokeswoman Joan Anzelmo said because of the court action and Monday's public opening of the park, officials decided they had missed their best opportunity to kill pregnant bison and obtain tissue samples.

Desks serve as memorials after crash

MERION, Pa. — The desks where little Lauren Freundlich and Rachel Blum used to sit are now classroom memorials to the young victims of an aircraft collision over their school playground.

A week after the 6-year-olds were killed in the crash in which Sen. John Heinz also died, Merion Elementary School is trying to cope with the loss. "It's comforting to the children to have this reminder," said Marvin Gold, principal of the 570-pupil school in this well-to-do Philadelphia suburb.

All traces of the helicopter-plane collision were removed from outside the stone school building by the time pupils returned to classes on Monday. Gone was the burned playground grass, debris and singed trees and shrubs from last Thursday's accident.

The desks were left vacant.

FDA unable to do its job, panel told

WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration is too swamped to do its job right and the problems are so severe they pose a potential threat to public health, an advisory panel said Thursday.

"The situation is urgent," said John Rother of the American Association of Retired Persons, who serves on the advisory panel. "It's not just minor problems. There are major problems throughout the agency."

Another panel member said the growing gap between what's expected of the FDA and what it can accomplish strains the agency's ability to protect public health.

"It can't do it all," he said. "It can't enforce all the laws it is supposed to enforce. It's stretched too thin," said Lawrence Horowitz, an investment banker with James D. Wolfensohn Inc.

The advisory committee met to review a draft staff report that said the FDA needs stronger enforcement powers, better management, more money, better-trained employees and greater visibility and authority within government.

Tax cut a bad idea, committee told

WASHINGTON — A proposed Social Security tax cut that has strong support in the Senate would push up interest rates, worsen inflation and slow economic growth, the Congressional Budget Office said Thursday.

In a report to the Senate Finance Committee, the agency suggested the national savings rate, which is already so low that it usually is blamed for a good share of the nation's economic problems, would decline for the next quarter-century.

"The most important effect... during this period of reduced national saving is to reduce the growth of Gross National Product," the broadest measure of the U.S. economy, the agency said in its report.

The reduction comes about because the federal deficit rises up more of the available supply of saving, forcing interest rates upward and reducing productive investment.

U.S.-Panama reach drug sale pact

WASHINGTON — The United States and Panama have reached final agreement on a treaty aimed at enhancing cooperation in the fight against drug trafficking, U.S. officials said Thursday.

The treaty, subject to legislative ratification by both countries, was to be signed later today in a ceremony in Panama, the officials said.

The agreement provides for the sharing of evidence in cases involving drug trafficking, money laundering and other crimes, said the officials, asking not to be identified. Negotiations for a new treaty began shortly after U.S. forces ousted Noriega in December 1989.

Lawmakers nix Miami judge for post

WASHINGTON — The Senate Judiciary Committee rejected President Bush's nomination of Miami judge Kenneth L. Ryskamp to a federal appeals court Thursday on an 8-6 party-line vote. It was the first rejection of a Bush judicial nominee.

Ryskamp, nominated to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, had been accused of being insensitive to civil rights issues and oblivious to widespread allegations that his country club discriminated against blacks and Jews.

Two conservative Democrats considered swing votes on the panel, Dennis DeConcini of Arizona and Howell Heflin of Alabama, joined other members of their party in voting against Ryskamp, who will remain a federal judge in Miami.

Hanford said best for new reactor

YAKIMA, Wash. — A study of where a new nuclear weapons reactor should be built clearly indicates the Hanford nuclear reservation is the best choice, U.S. Rep. Sid Morrison says.

The other candidates in the draft environmental impact statement are the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and the Savannah River Plant in South Carolina.

The draft study by the U.S. Department of Energy examines the three sites and three separate reactor technologies. It makes no recommendations on which site or technology should be used.

Morrison, whose district includes Hanford, said the best alternative is for the government to acquire and convert a partially completed civilian reactor mothballed on the Hanford site.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices fell in February for the fourth straight month, the first time that's occurred in five years, the government said Thursday.

The Labor Department said its Producer Price Index, which measures inflation before it reaches consumers, fell 0.3 percent last month, reflecting continued big declines in energy prices.

The better-than-expected news on inflation was tempered, however, by a report that retail sales were down in March, dashing hopes that rising consumer confidence after the end of the Persian Gulf War would spell a quick end to the recession by boosting sales.

In addition, the government said new claims for unemployment benefits, while dropping below 500,000 for the first time in three weeks, still remained at a recession level of 473,000 for the last week in March.

Financial markets rallied on the economic reports as investors expressed confidence that the combination of moderating inflation and no break in the recession will force the Federal Reserve to further lower interest rates.

The Dow Jones industrial average of 30 stocks, which had fallen sharply earlier in the week over fears the Fed would raise rates, was up almost 37 points by mid-afternoon.

The Bush administration kept up pressure Thursday on Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan and his colleagues at the central bank to do more to get the economy moving again.

Michael Boskin, the president's chief economic adviser, said various business barometers showed the country was still mired in recession with "ample room" for the Fed to lower interest rates.

Boskin, said lower oil prices and rebounding consumer confidence suggested the downturn could be nearing a bottom. But he cautioned that unemployment, which in March hit a 4½-year-high of 6.8 percent, would rise further for several more months.

"The recovery has not started yet, but there are hopeful signs," Boskin said in an interview on NBC's "Today" show.

Many private economists, surveying Thursday's rash of reports, also said the Fed should cut interest rates again. Some said the next rate cut could come as soon as Friday, once the government releases what's expected to be a good report showing only modest inflationary pressures at the consumer level.

But other analysts weren't as sure on the timing, noting a deep split among Fed policy-makers.

The machine can make images of blood vessels by measuring magnetic resonance signals given off by hydrogen atoms in the blood.

No dye injections or other invasive procedures are needed.

NEW YORK (AP) — An office pool on the NCAA basketball tournament ended up costing three Wall Street traders their jobs and reportedly led a clerical worker \$330,000 in debt.

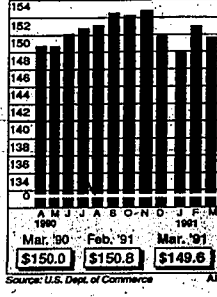
Elaborate, high-stakes betting pools were set up at many Wall Street firms, where individual teams are assigned a share price based on their expected performance, then traded just like stocks.

At some firms, terminals are actually programmed to carry price quotes on the college teams.

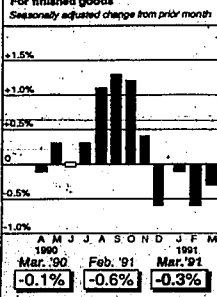

Some analysts noted that the government did sharply revise sales up in February to show a gain of 2 percent, but they said the March decline was still disappointing given the fact that surveys of consumer sentiment had posted big gains with the end of the war in February.

A second survey limited to large department stores showed their sales remained sluggish last month when compared with a year ago.

The 0.3 percent drop in wholesale prices in March left prices declining at an annual rate of 3.9 percent for the first three months of this year, sharply below last year's 5.6 percent rise, an increase blamed on the big increase in energy prices after Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

So far this year, energy prices have been falling at a steep annual rate of 35.4 percent as oil prices retreated from the levels reached in the months immediately after the invasion.

In further good inflation news, the government said the underlying inflation rate, excluding energy and food costs, rose a modest 0.2 percent — just half of the February gain.

Analysts said that bolstered their belief that big gains in the core inflation rate in January and February had been based on temporary factors.

"Anyone reading this report can't be saying that inflation is about to roar off," said Donald Ratajczak, head of the forecasting unit at Georgia State University.

He said he was expecting the Consumer Price Index for February to be up about 0.1 percent when it's released Friday.

In February, food costs one step short of retail rose a modest 0.2 percent as small increases in a variety of products offset actual declines for beef, poultry and vegetable prices.

A Greenspan-led camp supports further rate cuts, while another group maintains the Fed has already done enough to ensure a recovery and that any further easing would make inflationary pressures worse next year.

"Greenspan has been arguing that lower interest rates are needed as risk insurance to guard against a deeper recession and the statistics support that viewpoint," said James Annable, senior economist at First National Bank of Chicago.

"The latest reports show that the economy is still weak with the anticipated rebound in consumer spending still a big question mark."

Conditional ban likely on abortion pill

PARIS — A French health official says use of the controversial abortion pill will likely be banned soon for women who smoke or are over 35, following the death of a woman treated with the pill.

The death of the 31-year-old woman, who smoked heavily, was the first associated with the pill. Known as RU-486, it has been used by about 60,000 women during the year in which it has been on the market in France.

Deputy health minister Bruno Durieux told lawmakers Wednesday that the recommendations to restrict the pill's use would probably be made in coming days by two expert commissions set up following the death.

He said in addition to leaning toward banning the treatment for smokers or women over 35, the commissions were expected to call for modifying doses and administration of the progestandin, a hormone used in conjunction with the pill itself. Use of the pill alone is not allowed in France.

Soviets push space program for cash

MOSCOW — Officials are using the anniversary of a milestone in space travel to try to boost the commercial Soviet space program — which is seen as a way to generate badly needed cash for the country's failing economy.

It was 30 years ago Friday that Yuri Gagarin became the first human in space. The Soviets claimed the triumph, at the height of the Cold War, as a victory for communism.

Gagarin, who died in a plane crash in 1968, became a national hero and is remembered in statues and memorials across the country.

On Wednesday, in a ceremony setting the scene for Friday's anniversary celebrations, President Mikhail S. Gorbachev stood beneath a banner bearing a portrait of Gagarin and called for a new push to develop the space program.

Soviet officials are converting "a number of leading branches of our defense complex" to civilian use, Gorbachev said. He suggested joint use of space stations to improve telephone and radio communications around the world.

Israelis mourn Jews killed in Holocaust

JERUSALEM — Israelis fell silent and traffic halted for two minutes Thursday as sirens wailed to mourn the 6 million Jews killed in the Nazi Holocaust.

At memorial ceremonies across the country, hundreds of Israelis marked Holocaust Remembrance Day, many reading the names of relatives who fell victim to the Nazis. Israeli children recited the names of children who died in concentration camps.

Speaker Dov Shilansky, a Lithuanian survivor of the Dachau concentration camp who lost aunts, uncles and grandparents to the Nazis, opened the public name-reading ceremony at the Knesset, or Parliament.

Saudi aid cutoff to impair PLO efforts

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Saudi Arabia's cutoff of financial aid to the PLO will impair but not cripple Yasser Arafat's ability to represent the Palestinian people.

Arafat made plans for such an emergency years ago by investing \$2 billion in Europe, Asia and Africa, as well as the Middle East.

Nevertheless, the Saudi decision announced Thursday — following a similar move by Kuwait because of Arafat's support for Iraq in the Gulf War — will cut deeply into the Palestine Liberation Organization's budget.

Coalition stabilizes Italian government

ROME — Premier-designate Giulio Andreotti ended a two-week political crisis Thursday by putting together a coalition to serve as Italy's 50th postwar government.

The Christian Democratic leader told President Francesco Cossiga he would present his list of Cabinet ministers on Friday, the president's office said.

The government formed by Andreotti includes the same five political parties that have governed Italy together for much of the past decade.

The political crisis began March 29 when the Socialists withdrew their support for the government and Andreotti resigned.

Soviet government agrees to hear workers' demands

MINSK, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Leaders of a strike in the Byelorussian capital of Minsk ended the protest by 200,000 workers Thursday after the government agreed to discuss their political and economic demands.

Coal miners across the nation, meanwhile, said they will continue

their 6-week-old strike until all their demands are met, news reports said.

The strikes have reflected the growing loss of confidence in Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and his promises to improve the lives of the Soviet Union's 290 million residents by transforming the

economy with free-market reforms.

A member of the Minsk strike committee, Georgi Mukhin, told The Associated Press that the decision to halt the walkout in the city was reached with Byelorussian Vice President Stanislav Shushkevich and First Deputy Prime Minister Vladislav Piluta.

Mukhin said all the strike committees' economic and political demands remained open for negotiation and that talks could begin as early as Friday.

"The main victory for us is that the people now understand that they cannot live in the old way any longer," he said.

Cabin attendant lone survivor of fire aboard Italian ferry

LEGHORN, Italy (AP) — A cabin attendant dangled from the side of a flaming ship for two hours, the only known survivor Thursday from a ferry fire that authorities feared killed 139 people.

"My friends died beside me, it's a miracle I'm alive," said Alessio Bertrand from his hospital bed, where he was being treated for shock.

Bertrand said he and two other crewmen had been watching a soccer game below deck when the ferry rumbled an anchored oil tanker Wednesday night in thick fog off northwest Italy.

"Flames erupted and smoke was every-

where, we wouldn't see anything," Bertrand, 23, told The Associated Press.

They stumbled over bodies as they fought their way upstairs and outside.

The water, a flaming sea of oil, offered no hope.

His friends died from the smoke that swept the ferry. Bertrand saved himself by clinging to a rail overboard, and to life.

"I hung on, I don't know how, for about two hours. Then the coast guard came and told me to jump off. I don't know why I'm here and the others are all dead, it's a miracle."

By the time rescue efforts were halted at dusk Thursday, 40 bodies had been recovered.

The ferry carried 72 passengers and a crew of 67. All but one person, an Austrian, were Italian.

The 28-man crew of the tanker jumped into lifeboats and survived. The disaster occurred as the Moby Prince ferry was 2 1/2 miles off Leghorn, steaming toward Olbia, Sardinia.

In an unrelated accident Thursday afternoon, an explosion aboard a Cypriot oil tanker turned it into a "ball of fire," killing at least one crewman and injuring 25 people, authorities said. Nine sailors were reported missing as the burning ship began to sink three miles off Genoa.

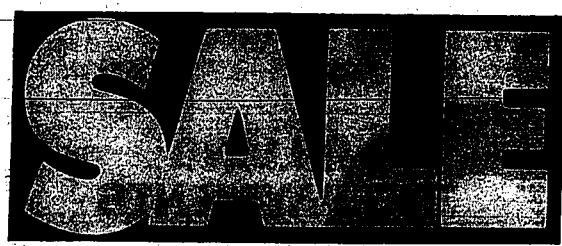
The ferry blaze Wednesday may have inadvertently been worsened by the captain, who put the ship in reverse after the collision, pulling it apart from the tanker but starting a cascade of oil from the tanker, port officials in Leghorn said.

"We were at anchor and all of a sudden we felt the jolt of this ship that came upon us," said Renato Superino, captain of the tanker Abruzzo. "The flames erupted immediately. We tried to put out the fire and we worked as long as it was possible" and then abandoned ship.

The search for bodies was hampered by the fierce heat below deck, said Civil Defense Gen. Giuseppe Marzotta.

Farmers upset with Legislature's work

POCATELLO (AP) — While farmers were frustrated during the 1991 legislative session, future grounds may be worse, according to the spokesman for Idaho's largest farm organization.

"I think legislators who are from urban areas lack a certain sympathy for rural interests," said Mike Tracy of the Idaho Farm Bureau. "Not all — that's a generalization. But I think there definitely has been a shift in Boise alone, they have definitely turned a deaf ear to many of rural Idaho's needs."

The 1990 census showed a decrease in Idaho's rural population and an increase in urban centers. Farmers and ranchers could lose representation under the next redistricting plan.

"It's difficult to say how reapportionment will affect that," Tracy said. "It could get worse, I've seen analysis from both sides."

Sen. Karl Brooks, D-Boise, predicted the change will not be felt until later in the decade.

"It will probably require a couple of election cycles," he said. "By the middle or later part of the decade, we'll have more representation from Coeur d'Alene, Boise, the Nampa-Caldwell area and Idaho Falls and proportionately less from rural areas."

Officials: Crash involved high alcohol levels

BOISE (AP) — Clinton Dewitt Bays Jr. had a blood-alcohol level of more than twice the legal limit when his pickup and a car collided Saturday, leaving two people dead and another seriously injured, authorities said.

Bays, 50, was charged Monday with two counts of vehicular manslaughter and one count of aggravated drunken driving. If convicted of all three felony counts, he could be sentenced to up to 19 years in prison.

The defendant's attorney, Thomas McCabe of Boise, said the news did not necessarily mean his client would be convicted.

"Just because there's a blood-alcohol result doesn't mean it's admissible in court. And it doesn't necessarily mean he's caused these people's deaths," McCabe said.

Bays' blood-alcohol level was 0.21 percent, according to laboratory test results released Wednesday by the Ada County Sheriff's Department. Under Idaho law, a person is considered to be driving under the influence if his or her blood-alcohol is 0.10 percent or greater.

Craig pursuing wood use funds

MOSCOW (AP) — Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said he plans to ask Congress to provide the University of Idaho \$1 million in each of the next five years for a wood use and design research center.

And a Craig spokesman said Wednesday that chances the Moscow school would get the money were "very good."

The University of Idaho started a wood use and design program last year. It currently has 15 students and expects to double its enrollment.

The program is aimed at fostering efficient use of wood and creation of value-added wood products to maintain and create jobs in the forest products industry.

Company puts off incinerator project

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A Montana company has indefinitely postponed construction of a medical-waste incinerator near Hauser Lake in northern Idaho because of a legislative ban.

Streck-Way Systems of Montana Inc. decided to halt the project when the 1991 Idaho Legislature issued a 15-month moratorium on waste-burner construction to give lawmakers time to tighten air-quality standards.

Sure-Way is reevaluating its regional plan, company spokesman Lee Tower said.

The Kallispell-based company plans to build its first incinerator near Anaconda, Mont.

According to Tracy, farm groups spent much of their time this year troubleshooting measures they opposed.

"I think we can look at what we avoided, rather than what we gained," Tracy said. "There really wasn't much done," said Democratic Rep. Albert Johnson, who farms near Pocatello.

The bullets dodged included proposals for new taxes affecting agriculture and tighter environmental regulations. Disappointments included the failure of an election consoli-

dation bill, substantial property tax relief and rural health care reform.

"In general it was a wash because so much of our time was spent in fending off proposals to increase taxes, to put, strict environmental provisions into law, those kinds of things," Tracy said. "Other important things were pretty much shot down."

Brooks contended rural concerns were addressed and agricultural interest groups came to the Statehouse well-prepared and well-briefed.

Governor goes 3-for-3 in vetoing dumb laws

One of the most valuable services a governor can perform is putting muddy, half-baked legislation out of its misery. Gov. Cecil Andrus mercifully pulled the trigger three times this week.

• He vetoed legislation to compensate counties for land removed from the tax rolls by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

• He killed another bill calling for a "constitutional impact analysis" to be prepared whenever state actions affect private property.

• He dispatched a third that would have released real-estate agents from the responsibility of telling clients a house is haunted.

The first was the step-child of an ill-considered constitutional amendment passed by the voters just last fall, under which Fish and Game would have made "payments in lieu of taxes" to counties that lose property from their tax rolls when the state obtains it for wildlife habitat and sportsmen's access.

As drafted, the bill implementing the amendment was an open invitation for counties to raid sportsmen's license fees — an estimated \$132,000 this year alone.

That's on top of the proceeds from fish and game fines that the Idaho Fish and Game Commission has been funneling to schools and local governments for years as an informal payment-in-lieu-of-tax system.

We thought the constitutional amendment was a bad idea to begin with.

Opening the Fish and Game coffers to the counties sets a dangerous precedent for all sorts of claims on state agencies, many of which have revenues local governments would love to get their hands on.

Moreover, it's just not necessary — at least not yet. Fish and Game controls only about 100,000 acres statewide, an average of less than 3,000 acres per county. The amendment is on the books, but a bad

amendment doesn't justify a worse law to implement it.

The "constitutional impact analysis," an idea hatched by some of the Legislature's anti-big-government crusaders, had the potential of creating a bureaucratic snarl of monumental proportions.

Government agencies would have been required to evaluate whether proposed regulations or administrative actions might result in a "taking" of private property rights, a process that would have made government slower and more expensive.

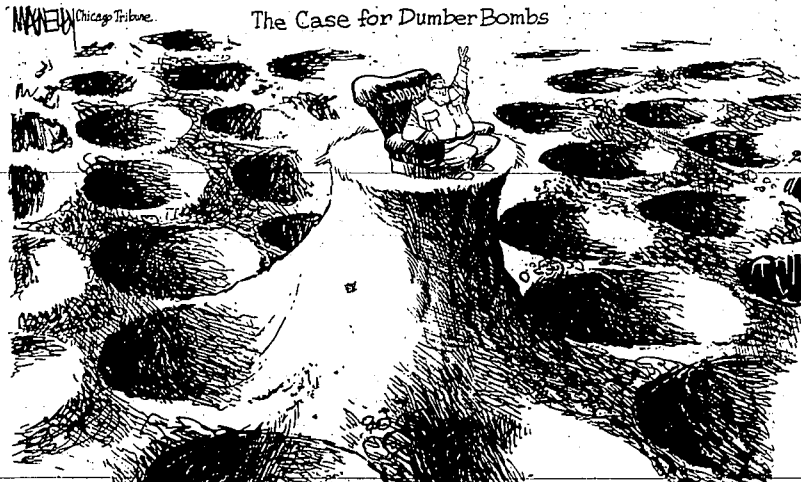
Anyone who feels his property rights have been violated by state government has the right to go to court and challenge it. According to a Congressional Research Service report, federal courts ruled in favor of the landowner more than half the time in such cases during 1990 alone.

The constitutional impact analysis bill was a political statement, not a tool of good government. The best way to guarantee government doesn't run amok over the rights of property owners is to make sure the people running those agencies are responsive to the taxpayers and doing their jobs.

The "haunted house" bill was, hands down, the silliest piece of legislation to pass the Idaho Legislature in a decade. The law would have released real-estate agents from the responsibility of telling potential buyers that a property had been "psychologically impacted."

Having killed a potential buyer that the house had been the scene of a violent death or that a previous owner had had AIDS or that the structure was haunted, the bill's backers contended, could drastically reduce the selling price of such property and frighten away customers.

What's really scary is that there was not a legislative majority willing to put up spirited opposition to the specter of the House and Senate seriously considering a truth-in-haunting bill.



Demos hedge on backing Brady Bill

WASHINGTON — It was like one of his old shoot-'em-up MGM movies. Here came the Gipper, riding hard in the saddle, six-shooters blazing to save the Good Guys.

Still husky-faced, chipper and wayward-haired at 80, Ronald Reagan had returned to the Washington hospital that saved his life after the 1981 assassination attempt. He also had a shocker for the gun lobby.

"I was to say something, and I'm going to say it in clear, unmistakable language," said Reagan firmly. "I support the Brady Bill, and I urge Congress to enact it without further delay."

Cynics, thick as potholes in the Imperial City, had a field day second-guessing the Gipper's about-face on gun control.

Was he trying to take an edge off the stormy scandals he knew were ticking inside Kitty Kelley's sex-and-pot book on Nancy?

Was he paying an old debt to Jim Brady, permanently damaged in the Hinckley shooting, and wife Sarah, who gave Reagan thumbs-up signs as he blew them kisses?

Or, more likely, was Reagan able to speak from the heart now that he was free at last from National Rifle Association pressure?

Whatever Reagan's reason, his defection two weeks ago caused earthshakes of joy among congressional gun-control fans. Sure, the Brady bill was no cure-all. It only asks a seven-day wait before buying a handgun. But with a strange war cry, "Win One for the Gipper," they thought they might finally whip the big bad NRA.

"Our triumph is assured," whooped Rep. Ed Feighan, D-Ohio, who's watched helplessly for years as NRA grunts used the Brady bill for target practice.

"If he (Reagan) ain't cover," said Rep. Les AuCoin, D-Wis., "there's no such thing."

Amid jubilation over Reagan's turnaround, there was talk the National Rifle Association, whose 2.6 million members and fat campaign checks usually cover politicians, was running out of magic bullets.

To which the guys at NRA headquarters snorted, "Oh, yeah? Keep your heads down."

The counter-fusillade exploded quickly. Sen. George Mitchell, D-Maine, said on a TV talk show he was opposed to the Brady bill — and I don't know any member of Congress who's changed his mind because President Reagan changed his mind.

Why would good, gray George Mitchell, usually liberal leader of Senate Democrats, man the 1992 presidential nomination, shun a sensible idea like gun control?

"Lots of hunters in Maine," said a Democratic insider, "are a quarter-million NRA members. And George wants to protect Democrat freshmen up for reelection."

Then House Speaker Tom Foley, D-Wash., said he was also impervious to Reagan's charms and cool to the Brady bill. ("Lots of hunters in Washington state, too.")

Never mind how many of them hunt deer, moose or bobcats with a 38 Special.

Question is, do Democrats have a political death wish? Or are they haunted by the NRA's ghosts?

Pummeled for their opposition to the Persian Gulf bombing triumph, you'd think the Dems would seize a popular way to change

the subject. After all, a Gallup poll shows 95 percent of Americans favor the Brady bill.

Sure, even Sarah Brady, formidable lobbyist, admits the Brady bill is only a "stopgap." It probably wouldn't have prevented John Hinckley from buying a gun. Cops could do some screening in the seven-day wait, but a computerized list of felons and whackos is years and \$100 million away. And, sure, most criminals buy their artillery on street corners.

In fact, the handgun wait is so innocuous, the Bush team is dangling a deal to Congress: Hey, pass our super-tough Crime Bill and maybe we do the Brady bill.

But Democrats are in such feckless djerri-ray, they'll probably blow a chance to pass a handgun bill most Americans want. Their lurking fear is that the NRA is like Saddam Hussein: Drive a stake through its heart, it's still around to gloat.

"I'm afraid at what he (Mitchell) said," mourned Rep. Larry Smith, D-Fla., a Brady bill roofer. "The country wants this waiting period for guns."

If the Dems can't pass a simple gun bill with Jim and Sarah Brady as sentimental symbols and Ronald Reagan as cheerleader, they're a mob in retreat. Maybe they should offer their 1992 surrender to Bush now.

Even the Gipper, up to his earlobes in literary scandal, must be amazed at Democrats' timidity.

They are the political equivalent of the Iraqi army: Fire a shot and up goes the white flag.

Kilgrow, Daly ignored troubles

Station owner sees tax report as competitor's tactic

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The owner of Kootenai County's only FM radio station says the disclosure of his delinquent tax problems by a businessman seeking approval to build another FM station was an act of desperation on the part of his competitor.

John Rook, owner of Rook Broadcasting of Idaho Inc., said the disclosure of his tax problems in a document filed with the federal government by Todd Hagadone was hypocritical since Hagadone's father, Panhandle media magnate Duane Hagadone, had yet to pay his share of \$2 million owed to Shoshone County by the defunct Bunker Hill Mining Co., in which Hagadone has a financial interest.

In the filing with the Federal Communications Commission last week, Todd Hagadone outlined the fact that Rook has yet to return some \$15,000 with-

held from his employee paychecks in 1989 to the Internal Revenue Service and that he is also making payments on Idaho state income taxes that date back to the early 1980s.

Hagadone filed the material to raise questions about the credibility of Rook, who has vigorously been fighting Hagadone's bid to build a competing FM station.

Rook, who owns KCDA-FM, has objected to Hagadone's plans since his father already owns KVN-AM in Coeur d'Alene as well as the Coeur d'Alene Press and several other Panhandle newspapers.

FCC regulations prohibit media monopolies, including ownership of newspapers and radio stations in the same service area.

Stallings, panel probing plight of dairy farmers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of Congress are wondering why the retail price of milk does not reflect the 25 percent reduction in the prices producers receive.

That's one of the questions posed by Rep. Richard Stallings, R-Idaho, to a House Agriculture subcommittee. It's working on financial problems facing dairymen.

In 1989, Idaho ranked 13th in milk production, with 2.6 billion pounds, 1.9 percent of the national output, and third among Western states behind California and Washington.

Stallings told the subcommittee it must understand why retail prices do not reflect the sharp decline in prices received by producers before action can be taken on a new dairy policy.

He said some Idaho milk producers are receiving as little as \$8.60 per hundredweight for their milk, with others getting less than \$9. "We will lose many of these producers this year," her said.

Stallings said Idaho is a state of small dairy operations, with the average herd 120 head. There are

1,300 dairies in the state, he said. Stallings also said he has been informed that the Department of Agriculture plans to produce a dairy policy study by June 15, instead of its original deadline of Aug. 1.

Because of critical problems facing the industry, Stallings said he urged Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan to move the date up.

"The situation facing Idaho dairymen is critical," he said. "Many...wouldn't last long enough to benefit from a new policy if the deadline for the study had stayed at Aug. 1.

"I agree with Secretary Madigan that by advancing the timetable, we will be able to work together much sooner to come up with something to help our dairy producers," Stallings said.

The dairy policy study was mandated by the 1990 farm bill.

Chief given leave

SUNSET, Utah (AP) — Police Chief Bruce Gunderson was placed on a two-week paid administrative leave after a former secretary filed a sexual harassment complaint against him, said Mayor Norm Sant. In a complaint filed Feb. 20 with the state Industrial Commission, Barbara Cording claimed she was the victim of discrimination.

Evans admits lawmakers didn't skimp

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — After spending much of the winter criticizing lawmakers and the governor for skimping on state aid to public schools, State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans admits education came away from the 1991 session in relatively good shape.

"I wouldn't want to be too enthusiastic in my praise, but it was a generally good session," Evans said. "We got about an 8.3 percent overall increase, and that's not too bad."

Evans, traveling across eastern

and southern Idaho this week to review the actions of lawmakers with school district superintendents, also shrugged off comments from some members of the Idaho Falls Coalition for Excellence in Education that he was suffering from burnout.

Only the second man in state history to serve more than 12 years as superintendent of public instruction, Evans conceded that he felt a certain amount of frustration during the session. But he said he still is giving 100 percent to his job.

Coalition members may have gotten a poor impression of his performance, he speculated, because their representatives were in Boise during the busiest part of the session and he did not have unlimited time to spend with them.

When Gov. Cecil Andrus unveiled his proposal for a 7.7 percent increase in state aid to education, pushing the allocation to \$484.3 million for the coming school year, Evans said it would barely allow the system to maintain its current operations let alone continue improving.

Man who provided drug charged in overdose death

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Michael Plopper could face a life-term for providing liquid morphine, prescribed for his dying mother, to a friend who subsequently died of a drug overdose, a prosecutor said Thursday.

Plopper, 21, of Coeur d'Alene pleaded guilty Wednesday to delivery of a controlled substance. A charge of involuntary manslaughter was dismissed.

The charges stemmed from the death of Rockford "Rocky" Joseph Thomas, 23, on Sept. 9, 1988. Prosecutors contend Plopper stole the liquid morphine from his cancer-stricken mother, who has since died. The addictive drug was prescribed to relieve the pain of her

caner. Thomas died after grabbing the bottle from Plopper and swallowing most of the contents, police say.

Plopper could be sentenced to the maximum term on the drug-delivery charge when he is sentenced May 22 in 1st District Court, said Kootenai County's chief-deputy prosecutor, Lansing Haynes.

Police at first classified the death an accident.

The case was reopened after Prosecutor Bill Douglas took office in January 1989. A judge ruled later that year there was probable cause to charge Plopper.

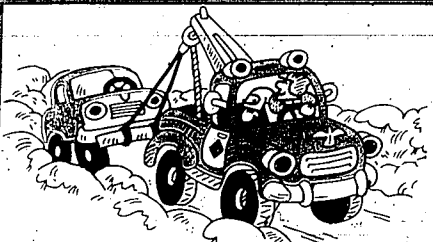

District judge says feds must pay filing fees

TWIN FALLS - Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt has ruled the federal government must pay its way when Idaho's water rights adjudication.

Hurlbutt ruled for the state of Idaho Thursday, accepting the state's arguments that federal laws do not exempt the government from paying filing fees.
Hurlbutt is handling the massive chore of sorting out hundreds of thousands of water rights in the Snake River Basin.
The Snake River Basin Adjudication seeks to identify and record all water rights and claims in the Snake River Basin. All water-rights holders, whether private, industrial or agricultural, are required to file claims with the state or risk losing their water rights.
And each claimant must pay a filing fee according to the nature of the claim.
Federal water rights in Idaho make up about 66 percent of the adjudication and would amount to more than \$11 million in filing fees, by federal estimates.
However, Idaho Deputy Attorney General

Clive Strong, chief of the Natural Resources Division, said it could be much less.
"It is hard to estimate until they make the actual filing," he said, but put the government's cost at \$5 million to \$6 million.
"What the United States would like is a free ride in the adjudication," Strong said.

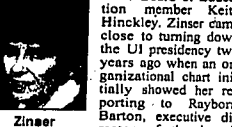

TWIN FALLS - The University of Idaho's involvement in education projects with the College of Southern Idaho will continue to expand, the institution's president predicted here Thursday night.

"We're very proud of the developments that have taken place here," Elisabeth Zinsler told UI alumni and boosters at their annual Magic Valley Silver and Gold Dinner. "They are an important part of the growth of our university."
The UI is building a fish research laboratory in the Magic Valley that would involve CSI researchers and is scheduled for completion in 1992.

idea, suggested by State Board of Education member Keith Hinckley. Zinsler came close to turning down the UI presidency two years ago when an organizational chart initially showed her reporting to Rayborn Barton, executive director of the board.

"And the Food Quality Assurance Laboratory's UI joint venture with CSI and the Idaho Department of Agriculture. Ground will be broken for the building on the CSI campus in June and it is expected to open next year."
"The aquaculture laboratory will be an opportunity for our students to learn and develop in a very important field, using the expertise of the aquaculture industry in the Magic Valley and CSI," she said.

Zinsler said that the UI's statewide research and development efforts validate the school's status as Idaho's only land-grant university.
"The land-grant university system dates from 1862 and in Idaho to a couple of years before statehood," she said. "The university continues in that tradition of excellence."
On another subject, Zinsler said construction of the university's high-tech potato research building at Kimberly is complete and the facility is able to operate at about 50 percent capacity, although more work needs to be done on the project. Cost overruns delayed the completion of the \$400,000 center by about three months.

"The Food Quality Assurance Laboratory will be a complex relationship ... (and) the training of CSI students will be an important part of the program and an extremely good example of cooperation between the institutions of higher learning in our state."

Zinsler characterized 1991 as a good year for the university in the Legislature.
"We were able to get funding for completion of a number of important projects on the campus," she said. "We were also able to get the money to attract federal matching funds for other projects."

Coach who walked out goes back to the fold

GOODING - After a wave of public support, varsity basketball coach Rich Thompson has decided to take back his resignation and continue coaching.
Thompson turned in his resignation last month, but school trustees took no action on it, saying they wanted to give him time to reconsider.

"They'll be the ones that can make this all work out in the end."
He predicted that the Gooding varsity team will be "very competitive" in the next two or three years and will do well in both conference and state competition.
Also at the meeting, first-year teacher John Priest talked about his band and choir programs in the Gooding schools.

"I was in favor of him not resigning," trustee Joseph Pavkov said. "There was a lot of support on his behalf."
Pavkov said Thompson had the unanimous support of the School Board.

He said the district needs a music teacher who will stay more than two years so a solid program can be developed, and said that is what he plans to do.
Priest said new instruments - including four timpani drums - and new music stands, chairs and sound system have added greatly to the program this year.

Thompson said he had decided to resign because his plan to put several sophomore players - including his own son - on the varsity team was not accepted by some of the junior players and their parents.
But other parents have shown "overwhelming support for the things I set out to do," Thompson said.

Still needed, he said, is carpet in the middle school band room, more sheet music and a computer for arranging music.
Priest said the students are "fired up" about the jazz band he has started and said the district music festival will be held this year in Gooding on May 8 at the high school and at the Methodist Church. The public is invited, he said.

He said he plays as many players as possible and is devoted to the success of the team.
One resident's talk of a petition to get the coach fired never materialized, Thompson said.

Priest said he arranges and composes music, repairs instruments and specializes in playing the marimba.
In other business:
"Elementary Principal Rob Winslow said his enrollment has increased by 10 since the spring break.
Fraham Middle School Principal Rich Thompson said he is working on a new plan to require students to retake classes they failed the previous year in place of their elective classes.

Case against migrant dismissed

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A judge Thursday dismissed a murder case against a migrant farm worker who gained national renown when three jurors said they made a mistake by sending him to prison. Santiago Ventura Morales, 23, said he would go to Mexico City to see his mother. She last saw her only son, five years ago. Ventura's conviction in the killing of another migrant, Ventura's father died while his son was in prison. "I feel more comfortable now. I don't have to worry about anything," Ventura said. "Now I can go on with my life."

While he studied English in prison, supporters raised \$25,000 for the campaign to win his freedom. He received hundreds of letters from well-wishers. An investigator working for-free went to Mexico and gathered evidence that another migrant killed Lopez. Last fall, a judge ordered a new trial, saying court-appointed defense attorney Michael Curtis made a series of mistakes. Marion County Circuit Judge Duane Ertsgragard said Curtis should have had an expert testify that Ventura's knife could not have been the murder weapon. Ertsgragard also said Curtis should have let Ventura testify. In their motion to dismiss the case, prosecutors said they were unable to find enough evidence to prove in a new trial that Ventura was guilty. Clackamas County Circuit Judge Robert J. Morgan signed the dismissal order Thursday morning. Later in the day, Portland lawyer Constance Crooker said Ventura probably never would have been convicted if he had not been His-

panic. Ventura is a Mixtec Indian from southern Mexico. Supporters had complained that the trial was translated into Spanish, a language Ventura hardly understood. He spoke a local Indian dialect. Ventura, who has been free on bail since December, sounded bitter when he talked about the case in Crooker's office Thursday afternoon. "They knew that they didn't have any evidence, but they were still trying to get something to make them not look bad," he said of the prosecutors. Ventura was in the Oregon State Correctional Institution 4 1/2 years. He said he believes many other innocent men are behind bars. Ventura earned the equivalent of a high school degree and played the guitar in Mass while in prison. He is taking a history class at Portland State University this spring while living at the home of a key supporter, Donna Slepach. Ventura said he hopes to start on a career in law by enrolling at the University of Portland in the fall. The Roman Catholic school has offered him a scholarship.

Ex-prosecutor backs up Adams in allegations of sexual assault

WASHINGTON (AP) — The former Republican federal prosecutor who found no merit to sexual assault allegations leveled against Sen. Brock Adams in 1987 came to the senator's defense Thursday night. "There was absolutely no merit whatsoever, none," Joseph DiGenova said about the assertion of a former family friend that Adams drugged her and molested her. "To the extent I can provide some truthful commentary as to what is going on, I feel obligated to do so," said DiGenova, a lifelong Republican who served as a Reagan appointee from 1983-87. "DiGenova attended a fund-raising reception for Adams, a Washington state Democrat. Adams threatened to file a defamation suit Tuesday against the professed victim's father, who mailed a letter to 140 political action committees last week urging them to help defeat the first-term senator. "Brock Adams drugged and sexually assaulted our daughter Kari in his Washington, D.C., home," wrote Dr. James Tupper, a Seattle surgeon and former friend of Adams for 40 years. "Nobody thinks Brock Adams

can be re-elected — and he shouldn't," Tupper wrote. DiGenova said he reviewed the Adams case in 1987 and agreed with career staff prosecutors who recommended against filing any charges. DiGenova said Adams' administrative assistant invited him to the fund-raising reception Thursday night attended by Democratic Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts, Bill Bradley of New Jersey and Wendell Ford of Kentucky, among others. "I'm not here to give him money. It's just a matter of principle," DiGenova told reporters, adding, "I was not paid to come." Adams has denied any wrongdoing and his wife, Betty, said Thursday night she was her husband's run for re-election "to dispel the lies." "This matter has gotten to a point where it is abundantly clear that it is more than unfair what is happening to the senator," DiGenova said. DiGenova said the charges leveled by Kari Tupper, then 24, were investigated by senior prosecutors, "including women, who concluded they were absolutely meritless. "At a minimum, it lacked sufficient evidence," he said.

"I'm really somewhat surprised that in light of that disposition that the matter has taken on additional and late life. We made a decision based on the facts. I am a Reagan appointee, a life-long Republican. ... We took our cases as we saw them. We took that one, we saw it and we got rid of it because it had absolutely no merit whatsoever, none, zip," he said. James Tupper, contacted Thursday night in Seattle, said he found DiGenova's comments "unbelievable." Tupper said District of Columbia police did extensive interviews with his daughter and other witnesses. "Based on this investigation it was the opinion of the police detective that there was sufficient evidence to prove the events as related by Kari beyond a reasonable doubt," he said. "The police detective requested the U.S. attorneys to issue a warrant for Sen. Adams' arrest. "Without interviewing Kari or any of the other witnesses, the U.S. attorney's office refused to indict Sen. Adams. Kari received an explanation from that office that it is totally inconsistent with the later public statements of DiGenova."

Deputy decides to wear flag patch after order reversed

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A Spokane County sheriff's deputy who refused his boss' order to wear an American flag logo on his uniform has decided to wear the patch after all. Deputy Mike Hirst, who is also an Air National Guardsman, said Wednesday he changed his mind only because Sheriff Larry Erickson changed his.

Erickson reversed a policy he instituted in the wake of the Gulf War requiring deputies to wear an insignia of the U.S. flag. Instead, deputies can choose what they want to wear on their right sleeve — the flag or a sheriff's department emblem like the one worn on the left sleeve. Hirst said he supported wearing the flag but felt complying with Erickson's original order amounted to making a political statement on his boss' behalf. "This had nothing to do with the flag. I believe in the flag," he said. "I just don't like being forced to say something for somebody else."

Attorney Peter Monson, representing the federal government, argued that the federal government is not trying to get a free ride. It already has provided significant contributions to the state in a number of ground and surface water studies, and the adjudication fees outstrip any benefits to the U.S., he said. "The McCaren Amendment allows the state to sue the federal government over adjudication of water rights, but it doesn't allow the 'judgment of costs,'" Monson said. "The U.S. Congress clearly intend the U.S. should fund those adjudications" when it passed that amendment, he said. But Hurlbut saw otherwise. He ruled the filing fee that all participants in the adjudication are required to pay is neither a "judgment of costs" nor a tax, a Monson tried to convince the court. Hurlbut said a 1983 Colorado case, United States vs. City and County of Denver, applied in this case. The court held that although the applicable federal law forbids the awarding of costs against the federal government, it does not excuse the government from paying a filing fee. The government alleged the filing fees were a "tax" and, with some of the money going to pay for expenses of the director of the Department of

Water Resources and its attorneys. It also claimed that money from the adjudication account was used to pay an airplane ticket for Gene Gray of Payette, chairman of the Water Resource Board. State officials acknowledged that the Gray ticket should not have been paid out of the fund, Hurlbut said. "There have been tens of thousands of expenditures and this one expenditure slipped through the review process. The credits to entry of 9237 (adjudication) account by the United States, with the finding that there was but one error, speaks well of the account review process presently in place. "A simple bookkeeping error does not render the filing fees a 'tax,'" the judge said. "It is clear the federal government did get a specific benefit

from the adjudication. "The ultimate beneficiary, the United States, is well-served by having its water rights administered and adjudicated," he said. "Here, the Snake River Basin Adjudication filing fees are not charged to every person or citizen of the state of Idaho. Department outlines safeguards for atomic plant, sets hearing schedule

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Energy Department on Thursday outlined safeguards designed to make its planned atomic weapons production reactor at least as safe as the best commercial nuclear plants. A new reactor design and waste minimization policies will keep environmental impact as low as possible at any of three sites under consideration as the location of the project, the department said. The locations being considered are the Hanford nuclear reservation near Richland, Wash., Savannah site in South Carolina and the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in Idaho. A draft environmental impact statement will be available starting April 19 for public review and comments, the department said. It plans to issue the final version in November. The reactor will produce tritium and other nuclear materials for the

nation's atomic weapons program. Tritium is essential to nuclear warheads but decays rapidly. Three aging reactors designed to produce tritium have been shut down since 1988. The department is considering three types of reactors as well as three potential sites. A decision on what type to build and the location is scheduled for December. The draft environmental analysis gave plans for minimizing impact at each of the potential sites. For example, it said, at the Hanford facility efforts would be made to protect endangered species. In some cases, artificial nesting platforms would be constructed to replace current nest sites, the analysis said. At the Idaho location, the department's design would use no surface water for cooling. There would be no discharge of wastewater directly into natural surface waters.

Efforts also would be made to limit erosion and use of groundwater, the department said. If the reactor were built at the Savannah River site near Aiken, S.C., efforts would be made to protect cultural and archaeological and historical sites in the vicinity, the department said. The department scheduled a series of hearings on the environmental impact statement next month in 13 communities. Here is the hearing schedule: Idaho: Idaho Falls, May 16; Pocatello, May 20; Twin Falls, May 23; Boise, May 28; Moscow, May 31. Washington: Richland, May 20; Spokane, May 23; Seattle, May 28. Oregon: Portland, May 31. South Carolina: Aiken, May 21; Columbia, May 31. Georgia: Augusta, May 24; Savannah, May 28.

Vicious snowstorm hits mountain states

A powerful spring storm dropped up to 30 inches of snow on the mountains of the West on Thursday, creating blizzard conditions that closed schools and snarled traffic, and threatened to do the same to the northern Plains.

Heavy snow blew across Colorado, Wyoming and Montana, and rain, snow and lightning drove eastward into Nebraska and the Dakotas. Kansas had wind gusting to a record 82 mph during the night, the National Weather Service said.

Snow also fell over eastern Idaho, northern Utah and northwestern Nevada.

Wind blowing at 10 to 25 mph whipped up blowing and drifting snow Thursday in Wyoming.

"This is a dangerous late winter storm and people should be prepared for wet snow and areas of blowing and drifting snow," the weather service said in Wyoming.

Overnight, 15 inches fell on the northern Wyoming community of Story and 8 inches fell on Burgess Junction. Sheridan and Big Horn received 5 inches.

Forecasters said another 1/4 foot of snow was

possible by Friday in Wyoming's northern mountains.

High wind driving heavy, wet snow created blizzard conditions in Montana.

Schools closed at Fairfield, Heart Butte and Conrad in north-central Montana because electrical power was knocked out.

A school bus was reported stuck west of Fairfield. A school official at Heart Butte estimated wind at 70 mph.

The Great Divide ski area near Helena closed almost two weeks ago but announced by mid-morning Thursday that it would re-open for the weekend because of its new supply of snow.

Up to a foot of snow was expected by Friday morning for southern Montana, and 3 to 8 inches for northern Montana.

In Colorado, Denver's Stapleton International Airport reported 30-minute delays for inbound flights and 15-minute delays for outbounds due to reduced visibility during the morning.

Denver had 4 inches of snow by midmorning and up to a foot of snow was expected in the state's northern and central mountains by Friday morning.

A tractor-trailer rig jackknifed on slippery In-

terstate 70 west of Denver and closed all but one westbound lane for 45 minutes, according to the Colorado State Patrol.

In advance of the snow, hail, lightning that caused grass fires and heavy rain struck eastern, central and southwestern Nebraska during the morning.

The biggest fire raged across 300 acres of grass near Hamlet in southwestern Nebraska.

In western South Dakota, heavy snow was falling in the Wall area with sleet west of Rapid City during the morning, and light rain fell over much of the rest of the state.

Accumulations of 6 to 12 inches were forecast in western South Dakota, with up to 8 inches in southwestern North Dakota.

Wind gusting to 82 mph across northwestern Kansas during the night caused some damage in the Goodland area, but no injuries were reported, authorities said.

The gust at Goodland was accompanied by a sudden drop in temperatures of about 40 degrees. Thunderstorms dropped hail during the early morning at Topeka and heavy rain briefly in eastern and southeastern sections of the state.

Spring storm socks Northern Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A spring storm socked northern Utah Thursday, dropping up to three feet of snow along the Wasatch Mountains and triggering several traffic accidents, one of them fatal.

"It's been a busy day all right," said Jose Ortiz of the National Weather Service's Salt Lake Office.

Snowblain, a resort 15 miles east of Ogden, had received 38 inches of new snow from the storm by late Thursday afternoon.

The mountain resort town of Alta reported 27, Ortiz said.

Snow totals at lower elevations ranged from 11 inches in western Utah's Tooele to 10 inches at northeastern Utah's Flaming Gorge. Salt Lake City itself received 3 inches, but its suburbs were harder hit — Sandy recorded 8 inches, while West Valley City had 7.

Provo reported 2 inches, Draper 8.

The snow, which fell heavily overnight and into the morning rush hour, left arterials snow-packed and icy.

A 23-year-old man was killed when his car skidded out of con-

trol on West Valley City overpass into an oncoming garbage truck, which then rolled down an embankment into the Jordan River.

A passenger in the garbage truck suffered minor injuries when he jumped from the garbage truck moments before it hit the water.

Police did not release the names of either man pending notification of kin.

Near-blizzard conditions were blamed for several other accidents near the Point of the Mountain early Thursday, but no major injuries were reported by the Utah Highway Patrol.

Ortiz said the storm front would linger over the state Friday and Saturday before breaking up.

Temperatures were expected to dip into the 20s overnight, with highs in the 40s Friday and Saturday in northern Utah and 50-55 in the south.

Snow continued to fall over the Salt Lake Valley late Thursday afternoon, but the NWS predicted only occasional snowfall Friday and scattered showers Saturday.

Abdul denies back-up singer had lead vocals on new album

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Pop star Paul Abdul went on the offensive Thursday in the biggest musical flap since Milli Vanilli proved to be phony baloney, insisting the lead vocals on "Forever, Your Girl" are forever hers.

The singer-choreographer appeared at a Hollywood news conference to counter claims by backup singer Yvette Marine, who alleged in a Superior Court lawsuit she had "substantial participation" in some songs on the top-selling album.

"This angers me," Miss Abdul said in her first appearance since the lawsuit against Virgin Records was filed Monday. "I sing the lead on every single song on 'Forever Your Girl.'"

Miss Abdul, who went from a Lakers cheerleader to successful recording artist and music video star, said Miss Marine was trying to take "a shortcut to success at the expense of all the work I've done."

A music expert cited by Virgin Records, Miss Abdul's record company, said he could find no hint of Miss Marine's voice on the lead tracks of the album, which has sold seven million copies since its release in 1988.

"No evidence can be found to support the contention that anyone other than Paula is responsible for the predominant sound of the lead vocals on the CD as released," said Fredrick Lieberman, professor and chair of the Board of Studies in Music at the University of California, Santa Cruz.

"It remains possible, though I believe highly improbable, that a small percentage of Yvette's pilot track was blended or bled into some sections of the lead vocal mix, but if so, it is imperceptible," he said in a statement.

Miss Marine claimed Lieberman's statement amounted to an admission that she recorded lead vocals with Miss Abdul.

Jeff Ayeroff, co-director of Virgin Records, said Lieberman analyzed the song "Opposites Attract" on the album. He did not mention other songs.

Miss Abdul explained the use of "guide tracks" in recording, a practice in which artists learn songs by listening to a demo by another person.

Miss Marine's lawsuit claims the backup singer's guide tracks were used to strengthen Miss Abdul's voice. Virgin Records claims the vocals were left out.

"This is simply a case of a back-ground singer doing what she was paid to do," Ayeroff said. He said Miss Marine was paid \$200 an hour.

"This is not how you litigate, it's how you manipulate, and I resent it," Ayeroff said.

The lawsuit by Miss Marine was the second vocal dispute in the music business in recent months.

Last November, the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences took back the Grammy it had awarded to Milli Vanilli in a flap over lip-synching.

The duo's producer admitted they were merely front men, mouthing the words of others on songs from the album that won them best new artist honors.

Police arrest suspect after body is found

LODI, Calif. (AP)—A man was arrested early Thursday on suspicion of killing a girlfriend and keeping her body for five years in a padlocked freezer.

A warrant was issued for Michael Shinkel, 35, after a suspicious landlord pried open the freezer and found the partially mummified body.

Shinkel and his wife, Renee, had been evicted from a house in Galt and left the freezer behind, said Sacramento County Sheriff's Detective Darrell Edwards.

Police from Sacramento and San Joaquin counties apprehended Shinkel about six miles southwest of Lodi where he was staying with a friend.

The body was discovered last Friday by landlord Rick Harmon, who said the freezer had been at the Galt property for about seven months.

Official praises Hill cleanup

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah (AP)—The cleanup of environmental mistakes at Hill Air Force Base to clean up its hazardous waste messes, says the commander of the Ogden Air Logistics Center.

"Until the early '70s, when we began to appreciate what that would do to the health and well-being of our people, we dumped and disposed of substances and contaminants at regular intervals," said Maj. Gen. Dale W. Thompson Jr.

"Since that time, as our awareness of those problems has grown, we've ceased dumping hazardous wastes here," he said Wednesday during the signing of a cooperative state-federal agreement on cleanup of the base and adjacent lands.

The document was signed by Thompson; James Scherer, administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency's Region 8, and Kenneth Alkema, director of the state Environmental Health Division.

"We view this agreement as a cooperative effort toward a common goal to protect human health and clean up the environment," Thompson said. "It's part of my commitment to cleaning this mess up."

Alkema called the pact a "road map" for guiding the cleanup at Hill, which was placed on the EPA's Superfund list in 1987. With the agreement signed, Scherer added that he hoped Hill could move forward quickly with removal and disposal of toxic wastes.

Highway patrol recovers \$1.5 million in cocaine

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The Utah Highway Patrol confiscated 45 pounds of cocaine worth an estimated \$1.5 million from the trunk of a car pulled over during a traffic stop.

Utah Sgt. Gary Whitney said the bust marked the largest cocaine seizure on the Salt Lake County highway.

"We've never had one that big; most are usually made along Interstate 70 in the southeastern part of the state," he said.

The drugs were seized after Trooper Gary Toone stopped a car traveling 35 mph in the fast lane on Interstate 80 near the mouth of Parley Canyon. Toone also noticed the car had expired Minnesota license plates.

The trooper suspected the car was stolen when the driver couldn't find registration information. That led to a search of the car's trunk, where Toone allegedly found 22 bricks of cocaine.

"It's usual procedure to ask to search a car for weapons if you think it might be stolen," Whitney explained.

A New Jersey woman was arrested and booked into Salt Lake County Jail for investigation of narcotics possession. Her name was not released pending further proceedings.

The car apparently came from Las Vegas and was traveling west when the stop was made at 4 p.m. April 4, Whitney said.

"I don't think (the cocaine) would have been distributed in the Salt Lake valley — it was just passing through," he said.

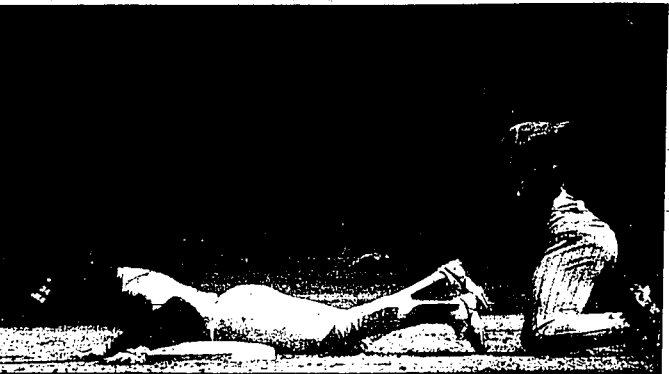

Sandwiched between French Open, Wimbledon ...

Wimbledon-bound turning down Davis

The timing of the Davis Cup smack between the red clay of the French Open and the green grass of Wimbledon — has U.S. captain Tom Gorman scrambling, piecing together a jigsaw puzzle of players and places for America's second round match against Spain.

Pete Sampras, the reigning U.S. Open champion, and John McEnroe, a veteran Davis Cupper, both turned down Gorman's invitation largely because of the dates of the next matches — June 14-16, a week before Wimbledon.

"I know what they're thinking," Gorman said. "It will be a difficult call for anyone. It will be the same for the others. It's a difficult call for anyone."

Most Wimbledon-bound players commit to the grass court Queens-Club tournament in London, set to start this year on June 10. There is also the matter of the French Open, another Grand Slam tournament, which ends June 9. That complicates the situation of Andre Agassi, a finalist in that event last year.

"If you look at Andre's potential for the French and maybe playing that final weekend, the Davis Cup starts four days later," Gorman said. "Probably on an entirely different surface, too."

Gorman and the United States Tennis Association Davis Cup Committee are mulling that choice, as well. A decision is due next week, although Gorman said that deadline could be extended. "We know it will be on the East coast," he said.

Among the candidates are the grass courts at Newport, R.I., indoor supreme courts or outdoor fast courts, like the hard courts of the National Tennis Center in New York City.

"If we go for grass, the Wimbledon problem will be reduced and it will be an advantage against Spain," Gorman said. "It depends on the players. But the dates cause problems. We know that and we have to deal with it. It's like a chicken-egg deal."

The second round dates were assigned by the International Tennis Federation Davis Cup Committee. The first round matches against Mexico were scheduled for February

but postponed until March because of the Persian Gulf War. That forced the June 14-16 dates for the Davis Cup, which Gorman called "a makeshift week."

Even without Sampras and McEnroe, Gorman has no shortage of top players to choose from. They include Agassi, Brad Gilbert and Jim Courier, all ranked among the top 10 in the world. Courier and Gilbert played singles in the match against Mexico.

The team need not be announced until 10 days before the matches, so time is on Gorman's side as he sifts through the candidates. "That's a lot of time," he said. "Feelings may change."

The problem is not as severe for Spain. With a world ranked players, selection of a team is simpler. "Spain knows its team all the time," Gorman said. "We have to pick ours from among so many players."

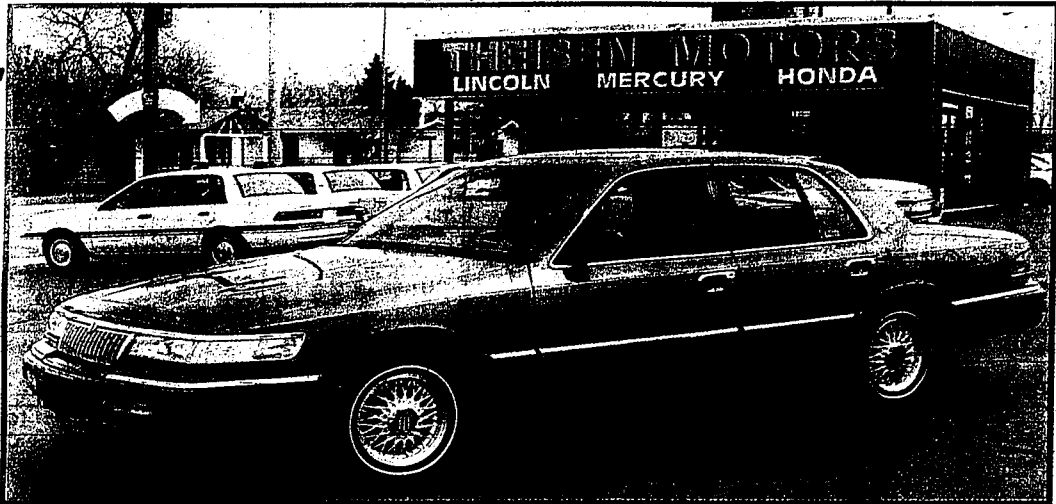

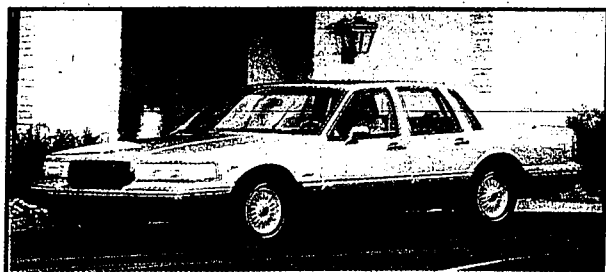

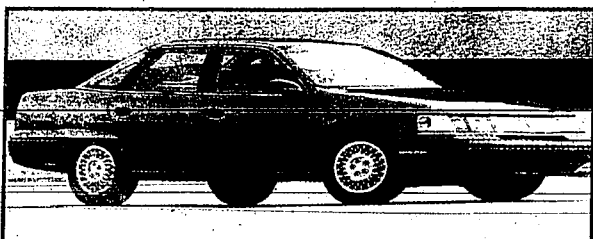

Sun Valley Film Festival aims to inspire

SUN VALLEY — Escapism and movies are a time-tested team, and romance and comedy will play prominently in the 6th Sun Valley Film Festival, set today through Thursday at the Sun Valley Opera House.

Kate Wright of the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities says festival planners took the gloomy world situation into account when selecting this year's films.

Reasoning that many filmgoers are weary of unrest in the Middle East, hints of trouble in the Soviet Union and our own social and economic domestic woes, the planners picked films they hope will entertain, inspire and take the audience to another time and place.

The films set for screening are:
 • "Come See the Paradise," a 1990 American film directed by Alan Parker and starring Dennis Quaid and Tamlyn Tomita.

Using the internment of Japanese-Americans as its backdrop, "Come See the Paradise" is a "Romeo and Juliet"-style saga of the love between a passionate American leftist union organizer and a Japanese-American woman.

The film was photographed in Washington state, Oregon and California, and it features period and original music; some of it Japanese.

• "Life and Nothing But," a 1989 French film directed by Bernard Tavernier and starring Philippe Noiret and Sabine Azema.

This film is set in 1920 as a nation prepares to make a final accounting of its World War I casualties. Two women wait anxiously as bureaucrats and soldiers search for their loved ones' remains and memorabilia. Despite its theme, the film is one of hope and transformation, not pain and despair, Wright says.

• "Iceicle Thief," a 1990 Italian film directed by Maurizio Nichetti, who plays himself.

The film begins as Nichetti is about to be interviewed prior to the first broadcast of his serious film. From the start, nothing goes as planned, but the disasters befalling Nichetti's film-within-a-film mean much hilarity for the audience.

• "Mama, There's a Man in Your Bed," a 1989 French film directed by Coline Serreau, who directed the original French version of "Three Men and a Cradle."

In this latter-day fairy tale, a white, affluent president of a yogurt company falls in love with a black cleaning lady several years his senior. Daniel Auteuil and Firmine Richard star in the film, which watches as the executive is forced to re-think his attitudes and emotions to discover where his true values lie.

• "C'est la Vie," a 1990 French film directed by Diane Kurys.
 The story of a young girl's loss of innocence as she experiences her parents' divorce, the film takes the sad topic of a family's break-up and still finds humor by gently poking fun at the antics of adults. Kurys also wrote the screenplay.

• "Tilai," a 1990 film from Burkina Faso directed by Idrissa Ouedraogo.
 Set in the same village as the film "Yanaba," seen at last year's Sun Valley Film Festival, "Tilai" tells the tale of illicit passion that violates tribal law. Again, it is children who see the situation with the clarity of youth.

The story of love and loyalty is heightened by its setting of endless vistas, rocky hillsides, and desert and clumps of luscious sheltering shrubs.

In addition to these feature-length films, all festival screenings will include "The Lunch Date," winner of the Gold Palm for the best short film at the Cannes Film Festival. The 10-minute film was directed by Adam Davidson in 1989.

'Town meeting on arts' stops in Magic Valley for ideas

TWIN FALLS — Last year, 544 people — or about one of every seven people living in Buhl — attended that town's presentation of the American Festival Ballet's "Wizard of Oz."

At the end, audience members cheered and stomped their feet. "I'm going," wait a minute, that was ballet, not basketball," recalled Gayle Banigar, president of the Buhl Arts Council.

People in Buhl — from little children to the men and women in the fields — are plugging into the arts, Banigar said, adding, "Farmers are suddenly seeing the purple in the dirt that used to be just brown."

Banigar was one of about a dozen artists and community leaders offering suggestions and testimony during a "town meeting on the arts" Wednesday. The meeting was held by the Idaho Commission on the Arts, and close to 40 people attended.

Over and over, speakers cited the importance of widespread access to the arts, especially for children, and

the need for state and local arts organizations to work together.

This week's meeting was the third of 16 planned statewide, according to Margot Knight, the commission's executive director.

Arts commissioners including Mary Jane Kinney of Twin Falls will look at ideas generated in the local sessions when they meet in June to develop a five-year plan for the arts in Idaho. That plan will be one of only a few

CSI's Wong wins Music Educator of the Year

TWIN FALLS — He once planned a career in economics. But today, Carson Wong of the College of Southern Idaho is the state's Music Educator of the Year for 1991.

Wong received the award in a surprise ceremony at Sunday's concert by the Magic Valley Chorale, which he directs. The honor was given by Jerry Shively, president of the Idaho Music Educators, and Sharon Warner of Twin Falls, who won the award last year.

The music association includes most of the music educators in Idaho's public schools and colleges, and each member is eligible for the award. "I was flabbergasted," Wong says, "never in my wildest dreams have come close to thinking about receiving this award."

Born and raised in Hong Kong, Wong moved to the United States to pursue his

higher education. He earned a degree in economics from the University of California at Berkeley and had nearly completed his master's in the same field at San Jose State when he decided to prepare for a career in music instead.

"I've never regretted it," he says. "It's been lots of fun... it's much less work to be employed in what you like."

At CSI, Wong, 53, is an associate professor of music and director of choral activities. He came to campus in 1980 after teaching 13 years at Jerome High School and two years at Caldwell High School.

In addition to leading the Magic Valley Chorale, a college-community group, Wong also directs the college Chamber Choir, Jazz Choir and Madrigal Ensemble. He served as conductor of the Magic Valley Symphony from 1984 through 1989, and also led the Boise Master Chorale for two years.

Wong's wife, Rukunda, is a registered nurse who sings in the Magic Valley

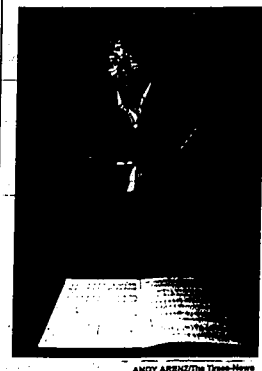
Chorale. They have two sons, Jeff, 16, and Christopher, 14.

Sitting in his small office in CSI's Fine Arts Building, congratulatory balloons and a rose on his desk, Wong says he looks forward to a planned expansion of the fine arts facility.

"My goals are to see the college continue to improve as far as the facilities and curriculum," Wong says.
 Once the addition is built, CSI faculty and students will enjoy a new 1,500-square-foot classroom and three practice studios. Wong also hopes to see acoustics in Fine Arts Auditorium improved for large choral group concerts.

Wong says he enjoys teaching at CSI, where he instructs singers fresh out of high school and older, returning students. All ages have something to contribute, he adds.

"Every group is different," he says. "You have to find their strengths and weaknesses, then strengthen the weaknesses and show off the strengths."

Lyrical 'Hamlet' a surprising joy to watch

Mad Max as Hamlet?
Come on. The only person who would try something like that is Franco Zeffirelli, and that he has, with surprising result:

Review

It's all rather amazing. We've seen this drama so many times, we know all the lines by heart (well, some of them), and still we are enraptured, transported, moved by the film, one that was done on locations in Scotland.

Mel Gibson may be the weakest thing about the movie, but he isn't at all bad. He is better, say, than Clint Eastwood would have been in the same part. He does tend to run now and then, but he does "by the book" with his soliloquies, and his death scene is all you'd want it to be.

Gibson was diving casting. American born, he lived in Australia from the time he was 12. As an adult, he did screen time as "Mad Max," the futuristic Robin Hood.

Since then, he has become an international screen presence as a Hollywood star. Up to now, however, nothing has taxed him so much as the role of the mad Dane, and he need never be ashamed.

Nor should Glenn Close, who should be very proud. Close plays Queen Gertrude with remarkable sensitivity. Add this to a long line of stellar performances by this woman, who in this instance is every inch the queen, mother to Hamlet and wife to her first husband's brother.

Zeffirelli has cut very little from the text. Most of it is still there and is beautifully delivered, by Alan Bates (Hamlet's stepfather), Jan Holm (Polonius), Paul Scofield (Hamlet's murdered father) and He-

lena Bonham-Carter as the hapless Ophelia.

The biggest star of the film, however, is Zeffirelli, who gives the film pace, sweep and flow so lyrical it becomes the heart of the film. This isn't too surprising. He did the same with his screen versions of "Romeo and Juliet" and "The Taming of the Shrew." He also did "The Champ" and "Endless Love." It's been an interesting career, and this only adds to it.

Some of the dialogue is lost. The

sound isn't always that good. Most, however, is there, ready to be heard, ready to be understood.

Some have voiced the opinion that Zeffirelli puts too much emphasis on the Oedipal relationship of Hamlet to his mother. That's a matter of interpretation. If the director does give all this more than the usual stress, he isn't at all obvious with it.

Watching "Hamlet" again, this particular version of it, is interesting. It is interesting listening to all the

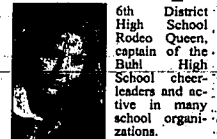
Music club awards Buhl senior with scholarship

The courtroom conclusion may surprise no one; the inferences that moneyed and prestigious law firms and scrappy activist ones both bend the letter of the law to their own purposes may not be big news. But director Michael Apted and his fellow artists have done something special in drawing Hackman's and wife Joanna Merlin's character - he's shown how political

convictions carry through to every detail of daily living, from friends and business associates, to where and how one lives. That's a rarely-seen and extremely rich and persuasive detail and it gives this film an extra resonance.

DANCES WITH WOLVES (PG-13) - In his first directing work, Kevin Costner has made a clear-eyed authentic vision of the frontier Northwest that is irresistible. The story of a Union officer who becomes assimilated with a tribe of Sioux, it has all the elements of epic vastness, astonishing action sequences, exotic-seeming characters but because it's more concerned with character than spectacle, its epic quality becomes engaging, never self-congratulatory. Beautiful, memorable and full of humor, it's one of the most winning films of the year.

HOME ALONE (PG) - A 7-year-old child (Macaulay Culkin) is left behind by his parents when they jet to Paris for Christmas. Left to his own devices, he piggies out on junk food and foils a pair of bumbling thieves (Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern). Some of the low-comedy slapstick works on a fitful, Three Stooges level, but the basic idea - an abandoned

child-defending himself against intruders - is a bit too seamy for comfort. Chris Columbus directed from a script by - who else? - John Hughes.

L.A. STORY (PG-13) - Steve Martin's new comedy is a true original. Wiggly and enchanting, it's both an affectionate swipe at Losland and a valentine to its pop peppiness. Britisher Mick Jackson, best known in this country for the superb TV movie "A Very British Coup," directed from Martin's script. Co-stars Victoria Tennant.

THE SILENCE OF THE LAMBS (R) - Thomas Harris' harrowing, mesmerizing book concerned an institutionalized psychopath who is used to identify a rampaging serial killer. In a fine adaptation, director Jonathan Demme and screenwriter Ted Tally have focussed on a duel of wits and wills between Jodie Foster's young FBI trainee and that paradigm of evil, Dr. Hannibal Lecter (Anthony Hopkins). Hopkins is glittering in the showier role, but Foster carries the film, suggesting the strength, gravity, intelligence and compassion of Clarice Starling. For audiences, the fascination is how much both actors are able to do with their literally or occupationally straightjacketed characters. Although Demme does not dwell on the gore, it's definitely there, making it a film not for the faint of heart.

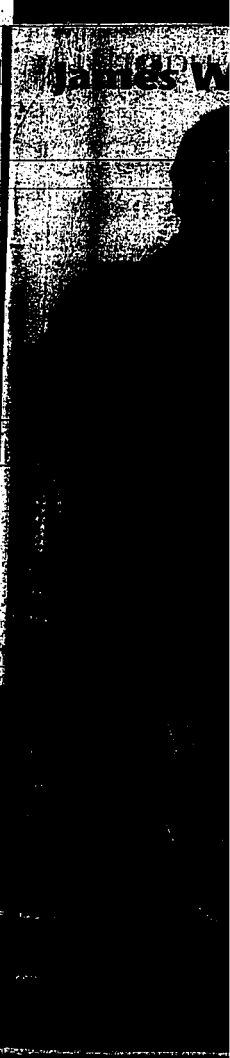

Woods, Lithgow team up for comedy dealing with friendship, smoking habit

The writing team of Richard Levinson and William Link created some of the most popular television ever produced. Among their accomplishments were "Columbo," "Mannix," "Murder, She Wrote" and almost two dozen TV movies.

The duo worked together for more than 20 years until Levinson, a heavy smoker, died a few years ago of a heart attack. Their story, written by Link, airs Monday, April 15, in the ABC movie "The Boys." Although only loosely based on reality, it captures the essence of the lifelong relationship between the two writing partners.

James Woods and John Lithgow star as Walter Farmer and Artie Margulies, a team who work together in a small room, churning out copy for television. Artie, a chain smoker and family man, has the polar opposite lifestyle of Walter, a health-food nut, jogger and bachelor. In a twist on the real story, it is Walter who contracts lung cancer from Artie's secondhand smoke.

"I thought it would be a stronger piece," Link says of his decision to have the non-smoker contract cancer. "It's much more interesting if the non-smoker gets it from his best friend. That's a much more interesting drama."

Link says that writing the movie was a form of therapy for him. And, for the first time ever in his writing career, the network said he did not have to change one comma in his first draft of the script.

"Obviously I did a polish, but it was a first experience for me having a network say, 'We like it so much, if you don't want to change it, don't change it.'" Link says.

To lighten the grimness of the story, Link wrote "The Boys" as a black comedy. In one scene, the two writers tumble into an open grave as they argue about the cause and effect of Walter's illness.

"It is such a tragic situation, I felt I had to lighten it," says Link. "I use comedy, but it is basically a serious picture. It is not a great polemic. I mean, we're not up on soapboxes

railing against people who smoke. But it does present the facts."

In real life, Link has never suffered any side effects from his partner's smoking, and his doctor has given him a clean bill of health. Link kicked his own tobacco habit more than 30 years ago. Not so for Woods, who continues to struggle with smoking.

"Any smoker with an IQ above 6 certainly loathes the notion," says Woods. "You know, after all, it is an addiction, and it is the No. 1 or No. 2 cause of preventable death in the United States. Yet 50 million people still smoke, and the irony — and this outrages me — is that the federal government subsidizes tobacco growing. I mean, it would be literally as if the federal government was passing out arsenic to its citizens, and we were paying taxes for it. I

guess capitalism rules with an iron hand and a velvet glove."

Woods says quitting his smoking habit is "a very difficult struggle." He only smokes on screen if a role calls for it and asks photographers not to take pictures of him with a cigarette.

"I'd give anything not to smoke again," says Woods. "I try not to promote it as something that should be emulated."

mer liaison with Sinatra may have at least something to do with the decision. Angie told a friend that some of the stories would have made the book a best seller. She would have written about her wild and woolly days — and nights — with Sinatra and his pal, composer Jimmy Van Heusen. Sounded interesting. Too bad Angie has changed her mind.

Q: Who is Barbra Streisand dating these days? — J.L.

A: Like many workaholics, Barbra often seems drawn by those in show business. Her latest steady is one James Newton Howard, a composer and record producer who's worked with Elton John, among others. Howard composed the score for the movie, "The Prince of Tides." In any case, he and Streisand are singing a happy tune these days.

Q: Did that near-brush with death in that recent helicopter crash in California change Kirk Douglas's outlook on life? — M.R.

A: Kirk tells me that the tragic accident — the helicopter crashed after ramming another, killing two in the other craft — has had a remarkable psychological impact. "I have a whole different outlook on life," says the 74-year-old screen star. "Only partly in jest, he adds: "I'm going to be a nice guy from now on." Douglas's new novel, "Secrets," won't include his near-fatal accident. But, he says, "It has taught me a lot (about) what's important — and what's not."

Q: Do filmmakers have to pay for the use of products in their films?

A: On the contrary, product placement has become such big business in Hollywood that scores of companies now exist for the sole purpose of placing their clients' products or services in films and television shows. For this service, these companies are paid either annual retainers or a one-time payment. On occasion, the situation can backfire. The Orkin Exterminating Company filed a breach of contract suit against the producers of the film, "Pacific Heights." Orkin had paid \$20,000 to have its services depicted in the film. But the exterminating company was portrayed in the movie as unwilling or unable to perform good

exterminating services. Orkin considers the depiction an insult to its reputation rather than an enhancement.

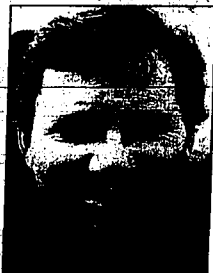
Q: Just how old is Kim Basinger, and is she really rich enough to buy an entire Southern town? — J.W.

"I'm completely recovered," Peter tells me. "Living agrees with me."

A DOUBLE LIFE: Sally Jessy Raphael comes across as rather mousy and low-key on her TV show. But the private, off-screen Sally is a surprise. Recently, at a major antiques show, Sally's chic, sophisticated outfit and manner were nothing like her professional image. A puzzled dealer who kept staring at her finally blurted out, "You look just like Sally Jessy Raphael on TV...are you related to her?" "No," quipped Raphael with a straight face. "She's not a relative. We just happen to inhabit the same body."

Q: I read that Carmen Miranda, famed as the Brazilian bombshell who wore piles of fake fruit on her head, sported such large platform

heels because she was so short. Is this so? — H.O.

A: Though this has been printed by the press — and assumed by her fans — for years, it isn't the real reason. Carmen, who died in 1955 at age 46, adopted the idea of six- to 10-inch platform shoes mainly because she liked tall men. The 5-foot-2-inch Miranda wanted to keep an eye on her dates, but found that when dancing with them, she couldn't peer over their shoulders to check on whether they were flirting with other women. Hence, she instructed her shoemaker to make the special platforms with which she became identified.

Q: What does Shirley MacLaine really think of the superactive, love-life of her famous younger brother, Warren Beatty? Isn't she disgusted by it all? — Y.K.

A: Shirley, 56, views her brother's libidinous doings with some amazement and consternation. Warren, 53, has "a psychological dilemma," she says, "not something I can resolve. NBC back on top, ABC's news show '20-20' does well with help from below

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC regained the weekly ratings title on the strength of "Cheers" and college basketball bounced CBS to second, but not even a deal with the devil could pull ABC out of third.

ABC's "20-20" broadcast of an actual Roman Catholic exorcism was the second highest rated program of the week after "Cheers," the A.C. Nielsen Co. reported Tuesday.

SBIJ: ABC dropped from first to last among the three major networks with a 12.2 rating. NBC led with a 12.9 rating for the week with five shows in the Top 10, including the six-figure movie "Danielle Steel's 'Changes.'" CBS had a 12.3 rating.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 households.

ABC bumped the normally No. 1 NBC out of first place twice last month, with the help of a "20-20" interview with Operation Desert Storm commander Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf and the broadcast of the Academy Awards.

But the network had a devil of time against the denizens of "Cheers" and the attorneys of "L.A. Law" last week, despite the "20-20" broadcast of Catholic priests performing an exorcism to rid a 16-year-old girl of a demon.

Learning Channel sold for \$12.75 million

NEW YORK (AP) — Cable television's Discovery Channel, which offers scientific and educational programming, has reached a definitive agreement to complete its purchase of The Learning Channel, company officials said Monday.

Financial News Network Inc. and Infotechnology Inc., which together own 51 percent of The Learning Channel, agreed to sell their positions for \$12.75 million.

Discovery is buying the remainder of The Learning Channel from American Community Service Network, a nonprofit organization that owns about 35 percent of the network, and the managers and employees of the cable service.

The Learning Channel provides a 24-hour, adult TV education service to more than 20 million TV households and many schools. Discovery reaches 54 million TV households.

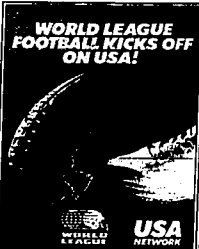
