# Bush calls for 'revolution in education'

WASHINGTON — Deftly combining high policy and practical politics, President Bush proposed an elaborate package of educational reforms Thursday designed to accomplish two goals:

• Persuade worried American parents and employers that he is serious about improving the country's ailing schools.

• Blunt Democratic charges that he is a do-nothing president on the home front who cares more about foreign affairs than domestic needs.

Bush's new "National Education Strategy" calls for a "revolution in education" that is supposed to "break the mold" and find new ways to train children and adults for the demands of the next century. The plan includes voluntary national achievement tests, freedom to choose your school, merit pay for superior schools and teachers, and 535 innovative "New American Schools" — one for each

## Who will pay? Idaho officials ask

TWIN FALLS — President Bush's education proposals drew mixed reviews in Idaho Thursday.

"I'm willing to explore non-traditional ideas," said Will Brown, superintendent of the Jerome School District. But "planning should be more bottom-up than top-down."

The president on Thursday unveiled a plan that calls for creation of non-

traditional schools and voluntary national achievement tests for fourth-, eighth- and 12th-graders in math, English and other subjects.

The strategy also encourages schools to pay good teachers more, and give extra money to those who teach core subjects, work in dangerous or challenging settings or who serve as mentors for new teachers.

Brown wondered where the money

congressional district — to be designed by businessmen, not educators.

To demonstrate his personal commitment to education, Bush said he would start taking computer lessons next week "to

prove that no one's ever too old to learn."

As a statement of presidential policy, Bush's proposal — devised by his new education secretary, Lamar Alexander — gives him an opportunity to demonstrate

leadership in an area of intense concern to the American people at very low cost — less than \$1 billion a year.

Educators and Democrats complained that the president's proposal was still mostly symbols without a major financial commitment. "Too little and too late," scoffed Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, which hastily approved a rival Democratic education plan Wednesday.

The president's strategy calls for relatively little new federal money — \$690 million in the coming year — plus \$130 million to \$200 million to be contributed by private industry to design the "new generation of schools" for the next century.

"Dollar bills don't educate students," Bush said. He noted education spending rose 33 percent, after adjustment for inflation, over the last 10 years without a comparable improvement in student achievement.

# Breckenridges donates 60 acres to CSI

TWIN FALLS — The College of Southern Idaho Foundation is the owner of 60 acres of prime north Twin Falls real estate, thanks to John and Miriam Breckenridge.

The Breckenridges donated the farmland, which borders the CSI campus on the north, to be farmed or sold, with proceeds going to a trust fund.

The foundation hasn't decided what to do with the property, but the college will probably keep at least part of it for future development.

"John and Miriam Breckenridge and their family have been involved for many years in the development of Magic Valley and the state of Idaho," said Joan Edwards,

executive director of the foundation. "Their latest gesture is a continuation of that dedication to their community."

The Breckenridges declined to reveal the value of property.

Several years ago, the couple sold a nearby parcel of land to a Salt Lake City developer, Woodbury Corp. Gary's Westland Motors recently completed a new car dealership building on a section of the land.

Miriam Breckenridge said she and her husband donated the land because they believe in the college. "It does a great deal for the community," she said. "We feel good about giving the land to the college."

John Breckenridge echoed his wife's

feelings. "... CSI is the greatest thing to come to this area since the Milner Dam. ... It's given a lot of people the opportunity for extending their education who might not otherwise have had the chance," he said.

A portion of the land has been in the Breckenridge family for 72 years. In 1919, L.L. Breckenridge, John Breckenridge's father, bought the first part of the farm, which was originally homesteaded by Ledyard Perrine, the brother of Twin Falls founder I.B. Perrine.

Three parcels of land were added in the early 1920s. In 1942, a family corporation was formed and eventually John and Miriam Breckenridge acquired sole ownership of the land.

Miriam Breckenridge was the founding president of the CSI Foundation in 1984 and served until 1986.

# U.S. sailors will remain in gulf after troops leave

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia — As the United States pulls out its combat troops, a naval armada of 45 ships and 150 warplanes remains in the Persian Gulf to enforce a U.N. arms embargo on Iraq and keep an already battered Saddam Hussein in line.

Some U.S. officers say the U.S. military activity in the gulf will probably not extend much beyond that, because Saddam's forces were seriously weakened by their defeat in the Gulf War.

One officer, who spoke on condition of anonymity, summed it up this way: "We've destroyed his ability to pose any threat to his neighbors. The United Nations peacekeeping force is in place to prevent any problems which might arise and to ensure the security of Kuwait and its people."

The 1,440-member U.N. force that will operate in the newly established

demilitarized zone in Iraq and Kuwait is small and lightly armed.

Saddam is believed to have survived Operation Desert Storm with more than 2,000 tanks and armored personnel carriers and more than 300 artillery pieces. Also, sources say 20 Iraqi divisions were never committed to the war.

Nonetheless, Iraq did suffer heavy losses and some observers say the Iraqis are intimidated by America's might.

Since shortly after the fighting was halted on Feb. 27, U.S. soldiers have been going home. U.S. troop strength has been sliced in half from a peak of 540,000 during the height of the war. American troops who had occupied southern Iraq have been withdrawn to the demilitarized zone and are waiting to be replaced by the U.N. force.

# Utah lawmakers lessen penalty for women who have abortions

SALT LAKE CITY — The Utah Legislature on Thursday approved legislation protecting women and doctors from murder charges related to abortion and clarifying the nation's strictest abortion law.

The Senate voted 22-6 and the House 60-12 in favor of legislation that revised elements of the abortion law as well as parts of a related criminal homicide statute.

"The House earlier voted 50-22 to reject a measure that would have repealed the law, which bans virtually all elective abortions.

Meanwhile, about 40 abortion rights advocates gathered at the State Capitol on the second day of a special legislative session to protest the law.

Democratic Sen. Karen Shepherd, who has opposed the abortion law since it

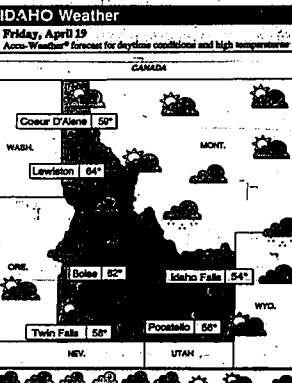
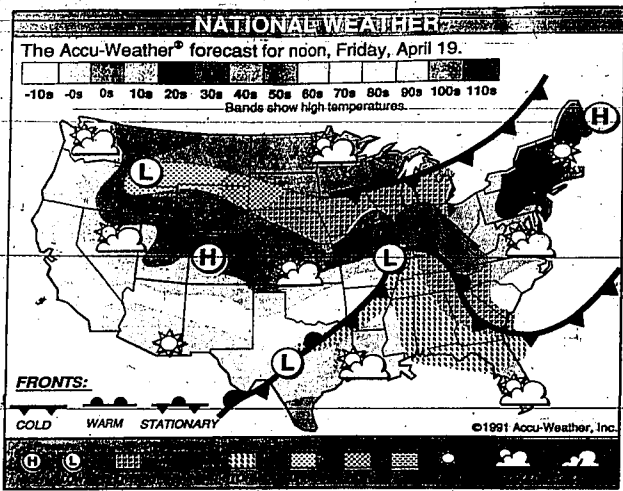
arose in the 1991 general session, asked her colleagues to remember that their constituents hold a variety of views on the issue.

She said many Utahns believe in free agency, quality of life for their children and the freedom of a woman and her family to make decisions such as those involving abortion without government interference. "They are near religious" principles ... and I beg you to have respect for those feelings," Shepherd said.

About 70 percent of Utah's 1.7-million residents belong to the Mormon Church, which considers abortion a serious transgression. Some 90 percent of the predominantly Republican Legislature are members of the faith.

In the House, Republican Rep. J. Reed Hunter said the revised law will stop many abortions and save many lives.

## Snow in northern Rockies, rain in Southeast

Snow fell across the northern Rockies and northern Plains on Thursday, and rain fell from the upper Midwest and across the Southeast.

At midday, snow was falling from southwestern Montana across northern and western Wyoming, eastern Idaho and northwestern North Dakota.

Red Lodge, Mont., in the mountains southwest of Billings, had 64 inches of snow on the ground as of Thursday morning. Snow cover in Wyoming at midday included 12 inches at Fort Washkie, 7 at Meeteetse, and 6

at Lander. During the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT, 4 inches of snow fell in Wyoming at Cody and Lander.

Rain reached from west-central and south-central Montana across southwestern North Dakota and eastern south-central Wyoming.

Showers and thunderstorms extended over southern and central Florida, the Florida Peninsula, Alabama, Mississippi, eastern Louisiana, Arkansas, western Tennessee, Missouri, Iowa, southeastern South Dakota, southern Minnesota, southwestern Wisconsin and northern Illinois.

## Baker sent to Kuwait to 'follow up' on normalization

JERUSALEM — Concerned about the Sabah family's sluggishness in getting Kuwait back to normal, President Bush ordered Secretary of State James A. Baker III Thursday to visit the emirate next week.

Bush and Baker see the visit as a good opportunity to follow up on the progress being made to normalize the situation in Kuwait and to discuss specific measures being taken on getting the society back on its feet.

State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler told reporters traveling with Baker. Tutwiler declined to say specifically whether the administration is disappointed with the pace of normalization, but a senior State Department official noted that "it was important" to Bush and Baker to assess the situation firsthand.

Tutwiler said Baker will fly to Kuwait Monday after holding talks in Saudi Arabia with King Fahd and other senior officials.

**Denying Holocaust draws sentence**  
PARIS — A history professor who denies that gas chambers were used in World War II Nazi concentration camps was convicted Thursday under a new law that prohibits public denial of the Holocaust. He was ordered to pay the groups that brought suit against him.

In an unusual move, the court criticized the law it used to convict Robert Faurisson as a "new limit on the freedom of expression and opinion."

**Reports: Census missed millions**  
WASHINGTON — As many as 8.3 million Americans were overlooked in the 1990 census, according to preliminary conclusions from two sets of research released Thursday by the Census Bureau.

The new preliminary information gleaned from the two studies will undoubtedly bring more political pressure to adjust the census, as big-city mayors, minority advocates and some governors have urged in court and other public forums.

The studies also indicate that minorities — notably blacks and Latinos — were disproportionately undercounted.

**Ex-Kansas official selected for Interior**  
WASHINGTON — President Bush has chosen former Kansas Gov. Mike Hayden to oversee the National Science and the Fish-and-Wildlife Service, the White House said Thursday.

The president said he would nominate Hayden as assistant secretary of the interior for fish and wildlife and parks. The nomination must be confirmed by the Senate.

**Watkins defends DOE cleanup plans**  
WASHINGTON — Energy Secretary James Watkins Thursday defended his department against accusations it is skipping on funding for waste cleanup at nuclear weapons plants, saying more money is not needed.

But the DOE's critics said Watkins' budget continues to place bomb-making ahead of health, safety and the environment. "The Bush administration prefers warhead production over environmental protection," said Daryl Kimball, associated director of the Physicians for Social Responsibility.

**Rocket destroyed shortly after launch**  
CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A rocket carrying a Japanese broadcasting satellite tumbled out of control shortly after liftoff Thursday and both were destroyed in a \$100 million disaster.

The Air Force sent self-destruct commands to the upper stage of the Atlas rocket; six minutes after launch once the trouble became evident.

The satellite still was attached to the upper stage, which is called a Centaur. Debris fell into the Atlantic Ocean.

# Prosecutor upset that media named women who charges Kennedy rape

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A prosecutor Thursday sought a court ruling on whether he can prosecute new organizations that have identified a woman who says she was raped by a Kennedy family member.

Palm Beach County State Attorney David Bludworth also said he expects three more organizations of investigation before making a decision on whether to charge William Kennedy Smith, nephew of U.S. Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass.

In his first extensive public

comments since the March 30 rape allegation, Bludworth also defended the Palm Beach police investigation and his office's handling of the investigation.

"This is the Smith case to us," Bludworth said, insisting the investigation was progressing and that no favoritism has been shown the Kennedys.

After publication of the 29-year-

old woman's name and photo in a Boca Raton-based supermarket tabloid, The Globe, NBC News broadcast her name Tuesday. Her name then was published Wednesday in The New York Times and some other newspapers — but not in any southern Florida daily.

Bludworth filed a petition asking a judge to rule whether a 1911 Florida statute barring identification of a sex-crime victim, which makes violation a second-degree criminal misdemeanor, meets state and U.S. constitutional standards.

# Gem board to debate college fee hike

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — More than 200 Lewis-Clark State College students signed a petition against a proposed fee hike this fall, but most of them are resigned to the increase, student leaders said Thursday.

"If this increase is approved, it should go for instructional purposes only," Lewis-Clark student

President Petra Burkhardt told the finance committee of the state Board of Education.

The board considered Thursday proposed fee increases for 1991-92 at the state's five public universities and colleges. Discussion also was expected on creation of a chancellor's position to oversee higher education.

The university's proposed fee increases as submitted to the board were: Idaho State, \$615, up from \$580; Idaho State, up from \$583; Boise State, \$623, up from \$583; Lewis-Clark, \$594, up from \$560; and Eastern Idaho Tech, \$181.75, up from \$175.

Most university representatives attributed the increases to inflation.

will come from A1 to pay for such changes.

Initially programs mandated from above do not include sufficient funding to make them work, he said, citing an Idaho law that requires all school districts to have elementary school counselors by 1993. Brown is trying to figure out how Jerome will be able to hire them.

"It's certainly better than what (Bush's) budget proposed, but not as good as what the Democrats have done," Sen. Rick Santorum, D-Idaho, told States News Service.

The Democrats' proposal, pushed through the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, emphasizes early education and allows an additional \$350 million for the next fiscal year for programs like Head Start.

Although Stallings said he had not thoroughly studied Bush's plan, he condemned the president's past attempts to education as rhetorical exercises. "They quit certificates and honors to a few schools that achieve some goals, but offer no real substantive measures," he told States News Service.

But Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, was enthusiastic about the president's ideas.

"I am very excited that our president has come to this debate with some new and innovative concepts in public education," Craig told States News Service. "Often we are suggesting that the people we want to lead this dynamic world be educated in a 19th Century system."

Bush's proposal also includes a plan to get local business communities more involved in education and encourage them to help set job-related standards of achievement.

The Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce established an education committee last year to work with the Twin Falls School District to improve education, said Sue Summers, chamber marketing and membership director.

"People I spoke with are willing to make facilities available for schools for students to receive specialized training," she said. "They are anxious to become a resource.

"The business and education communities have been separate too long, she said. "We have found there needs to be a commitment between the two," Summers said.

# U.S. teams search Iraqi lands for possible refugee camp sites

ISIKVEREN, Turkey (AP) — A U.S. Special Forces team scouted Iraqi territory Thursday to search for sites for refugee camps, and a new Army commander arrived in Turkey to lead the international relief effort for Kurdish refugees.

Hundreds of thousands of Iraqi Kurds fled into the mountains of northern Iraq after a rebellion in their ancestral homeland was crushed by Saddam Hussein's forces.

Hundreds are dying daily of hunger, disease and exposure in crude encampments in the rugged terrain along Iraq's borders with Turkey and Iran.

But officials estimate that finding sites and building the refugee centers will take up to 40 more days, and some say even those estimates are too optimistic. In the meantime, the refugees endure conditions that remain desperate despite the huge infusion of aid.

The new refugee centers, surrounded by smaller camps, are to house at least 400,000 Kurdish refugees near the Iraqi town of Zakho, the Turkish border, and Dohuk, about 30 miles into Iraq. Iraqi troops occupy both cities.

The Pentagon said an Army and Marine Corps reaction force will set up a base at an undisclosed location inside Turkey and stand by

in case Iraqi troops try to interfere with the relief effort. Defense sources said the force would number at least 5,000.

Iraq said there was no need for the allies to guard the refugees. And U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar raised questions about the legality of the Bush administration plan to have U.S., British and French troops set up camps inside Iraq.

Meanwhile, Army Lt. Gen. John M. Shaliskashvili, deputy command-

er of the U.S. Army in Europe, arrived in Turkey to take over Operation Provide Comfort, which officials say is the largest humanitarian relief project attempted by the military in modern history.

The army commander taking over from Air Force Brig. Gen. James L. Jamerson, reflects that the project has shifted from being a simple airlift to a longer-term ground operation, said spokeswoman Air Force Capt. Marcella Adams.

## Crisis aids Iran's opening to West

URUMIYEH, Iran (AP) — The flood of Kurdish refugees is giving Iran unprecedented opportunities to quicken its opening to the West and resolve internal disputes, Western diplomats and aid officials say.

Iran claims the crisis is costing its government \$10 million a day. It might be worth every penny.

Tehran's treatment of the Kurds has won high marks among Western diplomats and politicians visiting this northern city, the center of relief efforts to help the refugees.

In the long run, Tehran could gain influence among the Kurds, who have long been a political headache. That, in turn, could give Iran a stronger voice in Middle East politics, diplomats said.

"They're the white prince and Turkey is the black prince," said Pierre Vinet, a Tehran-based official

with the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees. "This is making Iran look very good."

The 1.5 million refugees already in Iran or approaching it is more than double Turkey's load.

When refugees began trying to enter Iran, they were not kept outside the border in desperate conditions, as has happened on the Turkish border.

Instead, Iran set up camps, donated bread and did what it could to help, Western aid officials said.

"Iran has also done this with little aid from the West," said a member of a delegation of Austrian lawmakers who visited Urumiyeh this week. "My government is definitely taking notice."

Iranian officials say their humanitarianism has nothing to do with hopes of reaping diplomatic benefits from the crisis.

"We have no political motives," said Habib Berengi, the political and economic inspector for West Azerbaijan province and a former diplomat.

However, the signs are there. For the first time since the 1979 Islamic revolution, an American plane carrying medical supplies landed at Urumiyeh's small airport.

"The guys in the control tower were pretty excited," said Eric Weintz, director of projects for AmeriCares, which flew the plane. The Connecticut-based humanitarian organization is the only American aid group in Iran.

"If a fringe benefit of this is that we improve relations, I think everybody would be happy," he said.

Said Berengi: "We live in the world, Iran doesn't want to live alone."

## Cost of Kuwaiti recovery revised

KUWAIT CITY (AP) — It may cost far less than originally believed to rebuild Kuwait, but that won't make it any easier for Western firms that are battling rival bidders and a languid bureaucracy for contracts.

Immediately after allied forces drove Iraqi soldiers from Kuwait City on Feb. 27, estimates of reconstruction costs ranged from \$100 billion to more than \$200 billion.

Western experts now say \$25 billion is a more accurate figure for the major projects. However, they note that Kuwaitis will spend incalculable additional sums to repair vandalism and replace appliances and other items looted by Iraqi troops during their seven-month occupation.

"The big money available for Americans is for mid-size firms and suppliers," said one U.S. official. "There were so many houses looted that will need to be replaced."

Most Western officials spoke on condition of anonymity. They admitted they were impatient with the Kuwaitis' slow pace of work and lack of urgency.

One diplomat said he was so tired of having to drive slowly over dirt obstacles erected in February that he was tempted to get out of his car and remove them himself.

Kuwait's Cabinet affairs minister, Abdulrahman al-Awadi, didn't protest when asked if the government is moving slowly — but he said he preferred the word "gradual."

The acting minister of planning, Sulayman Mutawa, said Kuwaitis and foreigners alike were frustrated. "The government made a lot of promises but did not deliver," he said. "It sat for seven months (in exile in Saudi Arabia) planning a post-liberation program and, when it returned, the man in the street did not see the fruition of that plan."

Cultural differences are partly to blame, he said.

"The frustration that people have, especially those from countries where management has a totally dif-

ferent philosophy, is apparent," Mutawa said. "They thought that under an emergency you put aside all established procedures.... Unfortunately, in several areas this was not adopted."

He said the government, following Frank and honest feedback from

those who came to help us," had begun to adjust, however.

Mutawa also expressed hope that a new Cabinet, to be named soon, will be more dynamic than the one that resigned on March 19 in response to public outrage that essential services had not been promptly restored.

### Bush wants changes in Clean Water Act

WASHINGTON — President Bush told Congress on Thursday he would push for "market-oriented" amendments to the Clean Water Act this year as it comes up for reauthorization.

In his annual message on environmental quality, Bush offered no details of what he wanted, although he said his administration would "seek to make progress toward the goal of no-net-loss of wetlands."

The wetlands section of the Clean Water Act has drawn criticism both from environmentalists, who say it is too weak to protect vital areas, and from land owners, who contend it prevents useful development of property that shouldn't really be considered wetlands.

### Senate panel votes to pursue tribunal

WASHINGTON — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted 16-0 Thursday to pursue an international tribunal that would hold Saddam Hussein and other Iraqi officials responsible for crimes related to the Persian Gulf War.

The panel, with little debate, approved a bill that calls on President Bush to propose such a tribunal at the United Nations. If the world organization does not accept the idea, the president is urged to pursue it with the allied coalition that carried out Operation Desert Storm.

The bill, which now goes on the calendar for full Senate action, also establishes an office in the State Department to promote the establishment of the tribunal, and to gather evidence of crimes by Iraq.

### Western Union Corp. receives facelift

MONTVALE, N.J. — Western Union Corp., which kept America wired together for 140 years, changed its name Thursday to New Valley Corp.

Directors of the debt-ridden company asked shareholders for the facelift in order not to sully the Western Union name in a possible bankruptcy filing in June.

The holding company is New Valley, while the two profitable divisions that remain — money transfers and Mailgrams — will continue to operate under the Western Union name.

### City settles suit with harassed workers

NEW YORK — The city agreed to pay \$2.2 million to settle a lawsuit filed by corrections officers who said they were harassed for getting pregnant and told to get abortions or lose their jobs, the officers' union said.

The city will give cash payments to 22 correction officers who sued the Department of Correction in January 1990, the Correction Officers' Association said at a Wednesday news conference.

Some women who quit under pressure will get their jobs back with seniority and corresponding benefits, the union said.

### FTC ends probe of FNN-GE merger

WASHINGTON — The Federal Trade Commission on Thursday closed its antitrust investigation of the proposed acquisition of Financial News Network by General Electric Co., apparently clearing the way for approval of the merger.

General Electric also owns the Consumer News and Business Channel.

The FTC asked a federal bankruptcy court March 14 to withhold final approval of the merger until the commission had completed its review.

The commission told the bankruptcy court the proposed transaction "would eliminate CNBC's only competitor" in 24-hour financial and business programming.

Thursday's commission action was taken on a 3-1 vote, with Commissioner Andrew J. Strenio Jr. dissenting.

### Volunteer Corps. established for seniors

WASHINGTON — The U.S. commissioner on aging, Joyce Berry, called on older Americans Thursday to help each other by volunteering.

"There are seniors out there just waiting to be asked," Berry told a news conference at which she announced the establishment of the Elderserve Volunteer Corps., a \$15-million effort to recruit and organize volunteer programs for the elderly.

"When senior citizens become involved as volunteers, they live healthier, longer lives," added former Michigan Gov. George W. Romney, who founded the National Center for Voluntary Action in 1974.

### Harm of secondhand smoke confirmed

WASHINGTON — An advisory board of scientists on Thursday endorsed a government proposal to classify secondhand tobacco smoke as a known cause of lung cancer in nonsmokers.

The Environmental Protection Agency's science advisory board endorsed the proposal unanimously to support the conclusions of an EPA draft study on passive smoking, while urging revisions to strengthen its supporting arguments.

## Rail workers back at work

Train crews expecting to picket were put to work instead Thursday as the nationwide rail strike ended after one day, putting freight back in motion and allowing travelers to resume journeys.

"We are getting back to normal as quickly as possible," said Jim Reilly, a spokesman in the Kansas City, Mo., office of Southern Pacific.

Ron Superson, a radio operator at a Conrail freight yard in Detroit, said a "clear sign" things were returning to normal was the traffic on the walkie-talkie pressed to his ear.

"They're starting to yell at people," he said, smiling.

The first CSX Transportation crew back to work Thursday had expected to picket, not work, said company spokesman Norm Going. The Roanoke Rapids, N.C., crew showed up at 3 a.m. EDT for picket duty.

"We put them on a train," he said. Congress swiftly passed and President Bush early Thursday signed legislation to halt the strike by some 235,000 rail workers. The

government intervened after railroad labor unions and major freight carriers were unable to reach a new contract despite three years of trying and a three-month cooling off period.

The measure sets up an emergency board to deal with remaining issues such as work rules and con-

ditions and would impose a final contract settlement within 65 days if labor and management fail to do so.

"We're glad to be back to work," said Norfolk Southern employee J.T. Smith in Atlanta. "Now we just have to hope Congress can negotiate us a good contract."

## Bush signals compromise possible on crime bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration made a second gun-control concession on Thursday by signaling its willingness to ban some semiautomatic weapons if Congress enacts key provisions of the president's crime bill.

If President Bush gets the crime package he wants, said Attorney General Dick Thornburgh, the proposed ban on nine types of assault weapons, as passed by the Senate last year, would be viewed "much more favorably."

Thornburgh's statements to the Senate Judiciary Committee marked the second time in recent weeks that the administration has given ground on gun-control legislation.

Last month, the administration said it would accept the proposed

seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases to win passage of its anti-crime package, which includes an expansion of the federal death penalty and curbs on the appeal rights of death-row inmates.

Both gun-control measures "will be favorably reviewed by the administration only as part of a comprehensive crime control package incorporating the key provisions in the president's bill," Thornburgh told the Senate panel.

Thornburgh repeated a threat that the president would otherwise veto gun-control legislation.

Failure to reach agreement on death-penalty and other anti-crime provisions last fall produced bitter argument between Congress and the administration.

### SDI director looks to bolster program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Political unrest in the Soviet Union increases the chances of an accidental nuclear attack on the United States, the director of the Strategic Defense Initiative told Congress on Thursday.

Looking to bolster dwindling support for the SDI program, Henry Cooper said concerns of Soviet officials over regional turmoil and the possibility of an accidental missile launch heightens the need for the \$46 billion program.

"If defending against accidental and unauthorized launches was a valid concern in 1988 when Senator (Sam) Nunn argued that should be the focus of SDI, it is a greater concern today," Cooper said.

Cooper encountered opposition from some Democrats as he told the House Armed Services research and development subcommittee that the SDI program will require \$6 billion annually in the mid-1990s.

## Nation Neil Bush receives sanctions

DENVER (AP) — Federal regulators today imposed sanctions against Neil Bush for conflicts of interest while he was a director of the failed Silverado Banking Savings and Loan, a lawyer said.

James Nesland, attorney for the president's son, said Office of Thrift Supervision Director Timothy Ryan accepted a "law judge's" finding that Neil Bush should be banned from future conflicts of interest.

"It's just a cease-and-desist order," Nesland said.

The thrift office penalty resulted from a nearly two-year battle with federal regulators over Bush's role at Silverado, whose failure is expected to cost taxpayers \$1 billion.

Bush, involved in settlement hearings with another Silverado-related case with the government this week in Denver, would not comment, Nesland said.

"We disagree with the decision just like we disagree with the decision of the administrative law judge," Nesland said.

## Racial conflict causes riot at high school

LAWDALE, Calif. (AP) — Hundreds of students rioted at a high school Thursday in a racially motivated conflict that drew dozens of law officers and prompted neighboring businesses to shut down, witnesses said.

The disturbance at Leuzinger High School began at 1:15 p.m. and involved about 200 students, said sheriff's Deputy Gabe Ramirez.

There were no immediate reports of injuries or arrests.

"It was between some black and white kids this morning. It went on through the day and escalated into a riot," said Robert Warner, a salesman at Conroy's Flowers near the school.

Hilario Tovar, manager of the El Pollo Loco fast-food restaurant a half-block from the school, said when the riot spilled into the neighborhood numerous businesses shut down at the request of police "so the students wouldn't come in here and cause another riot."

Deputies were summoned from nearby stations and police were sent from the cities of Ingleswood, Torrance and Hawthorne, Ramirez said.

Warner said such fights have flared every few months at the high school, yet "the principal at Leuzinger has claimed to us there is no gang activity at her school."

Students apparently were sent home from school after the violence erupted, Warner said.

# Debate rages over naming of woman in Florida rape case

To name or not to name? Newspapers and broadcast journalists debated the issue Wednesday after NBC, The New York Times and others named the woman who said she was raped by a member of the Kennedy family in Palm Beach, Fla.

One women's group said divulging the name without the woman's consent was "vulgaristic." But a member of the ethics committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors said withholding rape victims' names "shrouds them in the stigma of being dirty."

About 15 members of the Guardian Angels, self-styled crime fighters who patrol urban areas, marched in front of NBC News headquarters today. They protested NBC News President Michael Gartner's decision to identify the woman Tuesday.

"We think it's a complete and total tragedy," said Lisa Sliva, wife of the founder of the Guardian Angels. "We find it outrageous that the NBC president has decided to air her name to the entire country without her consent."

The group also planned a later march in front of the Times. They carried signs that read: "Gartner: Your Name Will Carry The Shame" and "NBC and New York Times: Integrity For Sale."

Palm Beach County State Attorney

David Bludworth asked the county Circuit Court today for a ruling on the Florida law that bans identifying a sexual offense victim in the news media. He said his office is reviewing the reporting by NBC, the Times and others as to whether they can be prosecuted.

Appearing on ABC's "Nightline," Gartner twice mentioned the victim's last name. ABC's policy is not to identify rape victims, according to spokeswoman Laura Wessner but the network does not follow the views of those appearing on its live news shows. "We're not responsible for the positions our guests take. We have no way or desire to censor them," Ms. Wessner said.

Among the newspapers who identified the woman Wednesday were The Des Moines (Iowa) Register, the San Francisco Chronicle, the Denver Post, the Fort Worth (Texas) Star-Telegram and The Courier-Journal of Louisville, Ky.

"Whatever anonymity this woman had is gone. It became almost an affectional not to run the name," said Geneva Overholser, editor of the Register.

The Register's policy is to shield the name of a rape victim unless she comes forward. The paper won a Pulitzer Prize last week for a series about a rape victim who went public in hopes of drawing attention to an underreported crime.

# Highway safety advocates call for ban on certain trucks

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group of highway safety advocates said Thursday that Congress should ban long and heavy triple-trailer trucks, calling them dangerously unstable and a menace to passenger cars.

"It is time to put a lid on size and weight," said Gerald Donaldson, co-chairman of CRASH, Citizens for Reliable and Safe Highways.

— And Joan Claybrook, co-chair of CRASH and president of the consumer advocacy group Public Citizen, said the trucks' size, weight, difficulty in accelerating and serious braking problems make them "incompatible with passenger cars in traffic."

But representatives of the U.S. trucking industry said triple-trailer trucks are safe because they are operated by the largest trucking companies and driven by the most experienced people. And, they said, the larger cargo capacity would mean fewer trucks on the road and therefore fewer accidents and injuries.

At a news conference and in testimony before the House Transportation subcommittee, Claybrook and Donaldson presented a four-point program designed to ban triple-trailer trucks by limiting the length and weight of trucks generally. Claybrook is a former head of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

## Families file claims in Iowa case

MIAMI (AP) — The families of 37 sailors killed in a gun turret explosion aboard the USS Iowa two years ago filed \$2 billion in wrongful death claims against the Navy on Thursday, their attorney said.

Longstanding U.S. Supreme Court doctrine bars such claims on behalf of military personnel, but Miami-based lawyer Ellis Rubin said the families are challenging that precedent.

"They want me to test this decision and ask the Supreme Court to

revisit this question," Rubin said. "Why should the Navy have total immunity when it was their negligence that snuffed out the lives of these loved ones?"

The families also filed a parallel lawsuit under admiralty law in Alexandria, Va., federal court to pursue all legal avenues, Rubin said.

The families reached the \$2 billion figure by valuing each year the victims were likely to have lived at \$1 million, or an average of about \$50 million a sailor, said Rubin.

## Quarantine set after killer bee' sightings

HIDALGO, Texas (AP) — State inspectors have quarantined a 2-mile chunk of Texas after a swarm of Africanized honey bees was trapped and killed in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

It was the second confirmed sighting of the so-called "killer bees" in the United States. The first reported swarm was trapped Oct. 15 in Hidalgo.

The bees, a defensive hybrid responsible for deaths in Latin America, were brought from Africa to Brazil by a scientist and escaped from a laboratory in 1957.





## Biggest INEL danger is inefficiency

The spring winds have continued to fan the "debate" about the future of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. I have silently followed the questions that have been raised and the voices that raise them. The whole subject is complex, but it is addressable. There have been reasonable voices that have raised these questions; but when sophists claim undocumented "superior knowledge," beware. Specifically, what are Dr. Peter Rickards' credentials?

While it is clear that most of what Rickards has to say is little more than drain water, Rickards is accurate when he states that the Department of Energy has misled the public. Few would disagree with that statement.

The specifics of things like engineered nuclear reactor designs, obscure statistical models for health risks from ionizing radiation and human dose-rates reconstructions can be publicly discussed about as well and rationally as theoretical cosmology could. When it comes to the nuclear activities at the INEL, few in the general public have a real grasp on what's being discussed. All the public gets is a lingering aftermath of terms like "deadly" radiation and cancer associated with nuclear industries.

The problem of public misunderstanding precisely why the DOE is bound to fail when it comes to public confidence in facilities like the INEL.

All of the anti-nuclear postiferists in the world couldn't do the damage to the public's perception about nuclear power and research that has been done by the DOE bureaucracy. Why, it sends Lane Allgood (bless him) over to a new office in Twin Falls which is supposed to be a public reading room and information center about the INEL. The public is paying dearly for a service primarily geared to appease Rickards and his buddies in the Snake Oil Alliance. ### Careful planning crucial for survival of small towns

The 1990 Census showed what we in Idaho have known for a long time: Most urban areas are getting stronger and most small towns are getting weaker.

What it didn't show is which small towns will thrive and which will die, and why.

A recent study by University of Idaho geographer Harley Johansen sheds some insight on that subject.

Nation-wide, retail activity — traditionally the mainstay of small-town economies — is waning. Most small towns these days are within driving distance of a regional shopping center, and the retail business is flowing outward.

But Johansen points out that doesn't necessarily mean the trend is inevitably toward extinction of small towns.

"The evidence from our study shows more new growth than decline in the Magic Valley service activities in villages," he said.

What's working for those communities? Playing to their strengths.

Some, such as Buhl, Richfield, Gooding, Burley, Rupert and Heyburn, have stable or growing food-processing industries. Others, such as Jerome and Glenns Ferry, benefit from light manufacturing. A third category, including such spots as Hagerman and the Wood River Valley, are places where people like to vacation, and in many cases, move in to stay.

These communities successfully replaced disappearing jobs on the farm and the ranch with jobs in the manufacturing and service industries, and they did it themselves.

For all the advantages of government-assisted economic development

and business recruiting, these towns were wise enough not to seek a corporate savior as a solution to their economic problems. Instead, they assessed what they had going for them economically, and they carefully nurtured it.

The result? An economic future. Small towns can't compete with the urban malls, but they can offer what an increasing number of Idahoans came to Idaho for in the first place: safe streets, clean air, quality of life, affordable housing and relatively drug-free schools.

Even so, the Magic Valley — like the rest of rural America — is going to have more people living in fewer communities in 20 years. While many small towns are in a strong position to grow and survive, many more aren't.

Specialty retailers and a substantial part of the health care system have already fled many communities in the Magic Valley. Service businesses and schools have remained, but they won't stay for long in towns that can't generate enough economic activity on their own.

For those communities, which never recovered from the farm recession of the 1980s, it's probably only a matter of time.

That process probably can't be reversed, but it can be managed.

It's time for residents of those communities to think seriously about how long their hometown schools can survive, and where their kids will be educated if they don't. They need to consider how they will get access to essential services if those services aren't available on Main Street in 10 years' time, and where the jobs of tomorrow will come from.

## Peanut price hikes create political jam

WASHINGTON — President Bush is about to become involved with a commodity near and dear to me: peanut butter. The question is whether he will do something about the recent spike in its price.

I should explain that while not a peanut butter expert, I am a life-long fan. As a kid, I did well in the kitchen contest to build — and eat — the tallest peanut butter and jelly sandwich. As I remember, anything above five slices threatened jail and stomach muscles.

Peanut butter still fills an important void. Example: I went directly from the office to a 10 p.m.-to-midnight tennis session, skipping dinner. Arriving home hungry and tired after tennis, I dumped my keys, wallet and change onto the kitchen table and headed for the peanut butter jar. The first two slices of bread and peanut butter were a delight, despite my increasing sleepiness, but my teeth could not penetrate the third slice. It tasted leathery and, upon bleary-eyed inspection, I found it contained peanut-buttered dollar bills, credit cards and IDs.

Someone with such peanut butter credentials naturally is interested in whether Bush will expand the peanut import quota to relieve pressure on peanut butter prices. At the heart of the matter are the New Deal laws creating a peanut price support program and allowing restrictions on imports that threaten any price support program.

The peanut program is complicated enough to tick to the root of your mind. In broad outlines, it assures farmers, lucky enough to have one of the production quotas set long ago, of a minimum price 60 percent to 80 percent above world prices.

Under the program, the government promises to buy quota peanuts from these farmers when prices fall below the minimum. And it pegs each year's total U.S. supply to anticipated demand so that the government has to redempt few peanuts. That saves the government money but consumers of peanut products pay for the program at the cash register.

In the 1990-91 season, drought in the heart of the Southeast's peanut belt cut U.S. production by nearly 10 percent, to 3.6 billion pounds. A peanut mool may reduce the net volume of the crop by another 10 percent.

As a result, domestic peanut prices more than doubled between August and Decem-

ber last year. In part because six large manufacturers of peanut products already had locked in lower pre-harvest prices through long-term supply contracts, the price of peanut butter rose "only" about one-third.

But peanut processors without such favorable contracts say they faced difficulty in locating supplies and/or paying peanut prices not competitive with those paid by larger companies.

On behalf of the smaller processors, the Peanut Butter and Nut Processors Association petitioned the U.S. International Trade Commission in October to recommend that Bush remove the peanut import quota. It has been only 1.7 million pounds since 1953 except for 1980 when president and peanut farmer Jimmy Carter raised it to compensate for another drought.

The processors' association also asked the ITC to recommend an interim import authorization of 400 million pounds. In March, two commissioners backed raising the quota to 300 million pounds for entry by July 31, saying that would not hamper the support program. A third urged indefinite suspension of the quota while the fourth said the president should not take action.

The commission's 3-1 recommendation for opening the quota is at the White House and was the subject of a meeting last week by the first of two administration policy groups that will prepare a recommended decision for the president.

The interests supporting opening the peanut import quota have been cheered by

reports that the meeting indicated heavy support within the policy group for additional imports. But the group did not reach a formal conclusion and will have to meet again soon.

At the same time, the pro-import forces worry about recent meetings Bush has had with key senators from peanut-producing states. No change in the quota.

The politics involved aren't peanuts. The peanut quota itself is at least a potential embarrassment for the administration as it seeks to reduce restrictions on agricultural trade in the current round of multilateral trade talks.

But the administration is playing every card it holds to secure congressional approval for an extension of the special trade negotiating authority it needs for that Uruguay Round of trade talks and for a North American free trade agreement.

Two other factors: Many of the lawmakers opposed to raising the peanut quota are from textile states, so their trade bill votes may be lost to the administration anyway. And the Office of Management and Budget reportedly regards the peanut program as a prime and eminently disposable example of economic over-regulation.

Whatever the president decides in a week or so, there is still the question of the cost of the peanut support program to consumers. It has been estimated the program inflates the price of peanut products by from about \$200 million a year to two or three times that. That's a big bite out of all of our wallets.

## Brady Bill is dangerous 1st step in war on rights

Should HR-7, the Brady Bill, pass the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate, you can forever forget your constitutional rights. # Summit moves to treaty

TOKYO (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev Thursday agreed to work harder with Japan to reach a formal World War II peace treaty, including the resolution of a territorial dispute over four Soviet-held islands off northern Japan.

Gorbachev's concession, however, fell far short of the conditions Japan had set in order to give major financial aid to the faltering Soviet economy.

The Soviet president and Japanese Prime Minister Toshiaki Kaifu met for one hour and 40 minutes late today to work out a joint statement that capped the first visit to Japan by a Soviet leader.

The communique was signed just before midnight in a rococo-style state guest house in central Tokyo. The leaders then locked plotters in a traditional Japanese geisha house.

"The Soviet Union and Japan are about to build a new era of relations similar to that between the Soviet Union and the United States, which has helped bring about enormous change in world politics, including Europe and elsewhere," Gorbachev told a news conference immediately after the signing.

Throughout Gorbachev's trip that began Tuesday, it has been clear that he and Kaifu would not reach a comprehensive settlement on ownership of the four tiny islands in the Kuril chain. The islands were seized by Moscow in the closing days of World War II.

At Japan's insistence, the joint communique made a reference to an unfulfilled 1956 agreement under which the Soviets would hand over the two smallest islands, but did not commit Moscow to handing them back.

The communique did, however, mention all four of the disputed islands and commit the countries to work harder toward a World War II peace treaty that would include a settlement of the territorial issue.

# NATO expecting speedy solution to Soviet impasse

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — After months of resistance, the Soviets seem ready to implement a historic treaty slashing conventional weapons, opening the way to new talks on reducing troop strength, arms negotiators said Thursday.

"We are optimistic like never before," one diplomat said.

Some negotiators for NATO and the disbanded Warsaw Pact said a positive Soviet response could come within days at the 22-nation Conventional Forces in Europe talks.

Setting the dispute would remove what the White House said this week is the major stumbling block to a summit between U.S. President George Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

"It's possible that there will be an offer as soon as Gorbachev comes back from Japan and gives his OK," early next week, said a NATO delegate.

Others said a conclusion in several weeks was more realistic. But the delegates, who spoke on condition of anonymity, generally agreed that an acceptable Soviet offer on ending the dispute was likely before the current round of talks ends in mid-May.

The talks resumed Wednesday after a scheduled three-week break. Speaking to a closed session Thursday, chief Soviet negotiator Oleg Grinevsky "suggested response soon" to a letter Bush sent Gorbachev on ending the impasse, a Hungarian delegate said, without giving details.

# China complains about Bush to envoy

BEIJING — China has called U.S. Ambassador James Lilley on the carpet to complain about President Bush's private meeting on Wednesday with the Dalai Lama, the exiled spiritual leader of Tibet.

Vice Foreign Minister Liu Huaqing summoned Lilley Thursday to lodge a "strong protest" against Bush's decision to meet with the Dalai Lama, saying that the president's decision was "doing harm to Sino-U.S. relations."

# Winnie Mandela calls allegations a 'blatant lie'

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Winnie Mandela said Thursday that allegations she kidnapped and assaulted four young men were so ridiculous she had not even bothered to try to refute them. Spectators in the crowded courtroom groaned at one point as Prosecutor Jay Swanepoel repeatedly asked Mrs. Mandela why she had not done more to clear her name since news of the attacks surfaced more than two years ago. She gave a similar response each time: "I have stated I was very angry,"

she said under cross-examination in her kidnap and assault trial. "I knew it was a blatant lie." Mrs. Mandela said that since she had done nothing wrong, there was no reason to talk to the accusers or call outside parties to give evidence disproving the youths' claims they suffered beatings. Mrs. Mandela, wife of African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela, has said she was hundreds of miles away when four young men allegedly were kidnapped and beaten at her house on Dec. 29, 1988.

# ANC rejects proposed peace summit

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — President F.W. de Klerk on Thursday invited political, religious and academic leaders to a peace summit on township violence, but the main black-opposition group rejected the idea.

The African National Congress also dismissed de Klerk's proposal for an official commission to investigate political violence.

The ANC said neither proposal fulfills demands the group presented last month.

The Inkatha Freedom Party, a rival black opposition group and the ANC's main foe in most township unrest, welcomed de Klerk's proposal and said it would participate in the

peace conference.

De Klerk acknowledged in a statement that previous government steps to end unrest — curfews, deploying extra police and soldiers, and giving police broad powers to detain people — had been inadequate.

He said the May 24-25 summit would "call upon political and other leaders to assume co-responsibility" in ending the factional township strife that has claimed 6,000 lives.

"I hope that the coming summit ... will enjoy the cooperation and support of everyone who rejects violence and intimidation," de Klerk said on the eve of a visit to Europe.

Those invited would include political leaders; government law en-

forcement officials; city, church, labor, business and community leaders and academic experts on violence, he said.

The ANC rejected the peace conference as "propaganda" aimed at winning de Klerk support when he visits Europe. It said the conference would be "unnecessary and diversionary."

De Klerk said his proposed government commission would investigate politically inspired violence, identifying those responsible and coming up with ways to prevent it.

The ANC has threatened to end talks aimed at setting up formal negotiations on ending white-minority rule unless de Klerk meets certain demands by May 9.

# Spread of disease fueled by impatience with measures

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Efrain Porras lay on the floor of a crowded shantytown clinic, his face twisted with pain. An intravenous tube fed serum into his arm. A bedpan lay by his side.

Porras said he was unsure how he contracted cholera. Maybe it was the untreated water he mixed with his drink or, maybe, he said, it was the

raw fish he ate.

"Of course, I heard all the warnings," said Porras, who lives in a mudbrick house in the shantytown of Marquez. "But after a while I just wanted to live a normal life."

The cholera epidemic that has killed more than 1,000 Peruvians continues to spread rapidly, health offi-

cials say.

Although the death rate fell dramatically in response to newspaper and television health warnings, it has soared again. Many recent victims, doctors say, are people who simply got tired of almost three months of boiling their drinking water and not eating their usual foods.

He entered the Veterans Administration Hospital on Easter Sunday and underwent surgery for blockage of the intestinal tract. His condition was upgraded last week from critical to serious and Thomas has been moved out of intensive care, Hardin said.

## Jerome police brutality case revived

**JEROME**—A woman who says she overheard a conversation between a Jerome police officer and his boss has breathed new life into a nine-month-old lawsuit against the city and Jerome County.

Barbara Dorland of Jerome said in a sworn deposition that she heard Officer Mike Wambolt—now a corporal with the Jerome Police Department—tell their chief that Will that Wambolt and another officer may have broken a man's arm during an arrest in January 1989.

The alleged conversation took place the same night a disabled, Eden man was arrested at a Jerome bar and locked into the county jail.

The man, 61-year-old Fred Heath, sued the city and the county for more than \$2 million after a medical examination following his release revealed a broken elbow.

Dorland worked for Beverly Will, the police chief's wife, at the time of the incident and was having coffee at the Will's home when Wambolt came to the door and asked to see the chief, she said.

Will and Wambolt went into a room just a few feet from where Dorland was sitting, but did not completely close the door, so Dorland said she could hear much of their conversation.

"Mo and Barrett made my arrest tonight and we roughed him up pretty bad," Dorland's statement quotes Wambolt as saying. "Damn it, we may have busted his damn arm, chief," he said later, according to Dorland's deposition.

Wambolt could not be reached for comment. His partner, Sgt. Steve Barrett, has moved to Nevada and could not be reached.

Dorland said Thursday she waited more than two years to release her statement because, at the time of the incident, she was afraid of the police.

## Eaton family gives CSI fund \$103,000

**TWIN FALLS**—The College of Southern Idaho Foundation will soon begin disbursing more than \$103,000 in scholarship money from the family of the late Twin Falls banker Curtis T. Eaton.

The money, intended to be used as stipends for CSI agriculture students, came from the Curtis T. Eaton and Wilma H. Eaton Scholarship Endowment and the Curtis T. Eaton Community Memorial Scholarship.

The CSI Foundation will set up a committee to select qualified recipients for the Eaton scholarships. Recipients must be full-time, second-year students enrolled in the college's agriculture curriculum who carry at least a C average. Students with financial needs will be given special consideration.

Scholarships will not exceed \$1,000 per year per student, and the first disbursements will be made for the 1991 fall semester.

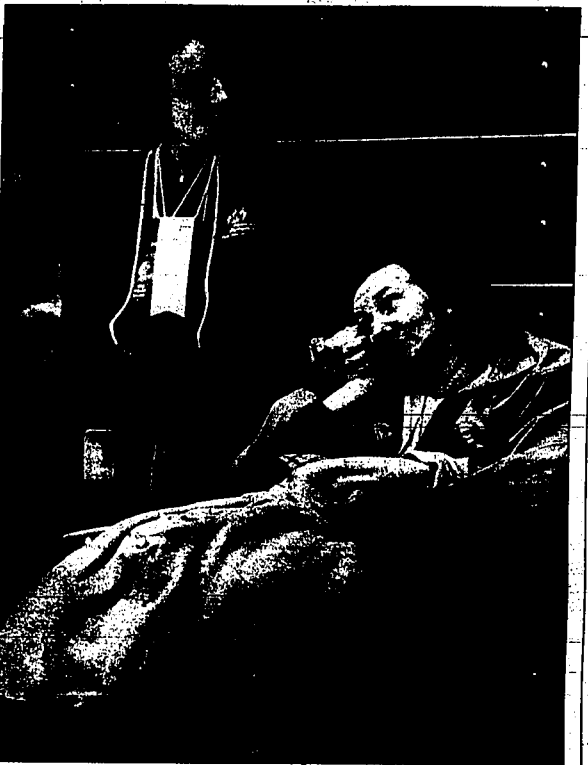
Eaton, who died last summer, was a rancher for 17 years before he began working for the Twin Falls Bank and Trust in 1927. He became president of the bank in 1972, upon the death of his father. When he retired in 1985, he retained his positions as chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the bank.

The Eaton family sold the bank to First Security Corp. in 1989. Eaton, a graduate of Stanford University, served for 10 years on the State Board of Education in addition to his work with various community, state and national organizations.

Wilma Howarth Eaton, a native of Glens Ferry, worked as a teacher in the Twin Falls School District and as dean of girls at O'Leary Junior High School before she retired. She received her teaching credentials from Lewis and Clark College and her bachelor's degree from Idaho State University.

She and Curtis Eaton were married August 25, 1940, in Pocatello.

## City deadline too late; board sets pool opening

**JEROME**—The swimming pool at the Jerome Recreation Center south of town will open June 1, regardless of what happens to the malfunctioning city pool, the Recreation District Board decided Thursday morning.

"We support the current renovation of the Jerome city pool and when the pool is ready to open, welcome the opportunity to discuss with representatives of the city a schedule of pool activities which will maximize the utilization of both the swimming facilities that will be available to the public," the district board said in a prepared statement.

"We feel the potential operation of two swimming facilities in the

Jerome area will provide the public with an unprecedented opportunity for recreational swimming," the board said.

Jerome Mayor Gerald Ostler said "that's the rec district's prerogative."

"They need time prior to opening the pool to get staff and other necessary preparations done prior to June 1," he said. "The council postponed signing an agreement with them until May 7 and that doesn't leave enough time."

The council rejected a recreation district suggestion that the two entities sign an interim agreement that would call for opening the district's pool near the Spears' plant if the city pool isn't repaired in time for summer swimming.

The council had planned to discuss the agreement with the city.

## Group forms to support teens in anti-abortion work

**TWIN FALLS**—Working a booth at the county fair and helping with a crisis pregnancy hot line are two of the ideas new Teens for Life group considered at an organizational meeting Thursday night.

"I just want to help out and let them know there's a choice. They don't need to have an abortion. I think abortion is wrong. It is murder," said 18-year-old Filer High School senior Jeannette Foster. Foster, who brought her 11-week old daughter Kendira to the meeting, suggested

the group pass out informational pamphlets to pregnant teens in school.

"If she (a pregnant teen) can see that and relate to that, it would help a lot," agreed Marilyn Scott, president of the local Right to Life chapter as she pointed to a photo of an eight-week-old fetus.

"She'd have the facts and not misinformation," said Scott, who facilitated Thursday night's meeting at the KMYT Community Room.

Scott reassured the seven teens who attended the meeting that as they become active, they will find support.

"You feel like you're part of a minority, don't you?" she said.

Trisha Hoppock, 15, and Samantha Gee, 14, both students at Robert Stuart Junior High School, said they did, but that if individuals would voice their anti-abortion views, a different majority would be heard.

"If more people tell how they feel, more people will speak up," Hoppock said.

"Teens need to show their opinions instead of just keeping them inside," Gee said.

Both students said teens could have a strong influence in preventing their peers

from having abortions.

"More teens will listen to other teens than they will to adults," Hoppock said.

Scott decided to help form a Teens for Life chapter in Twin Falls after attending a Right to Life convention last summer and being impressed by knowledgeable and active teens involved in the youth organization.

Teens for Life is separate from Right to Life, but Scott said one goal of the group is to work together with other anti-abortion groups.

Teens for Life plans to meet every two weeks to organize, then meet monthly.

## School officials agree on activities guidelines

**TWIN FALLS**—Magic Valley superintendents have agreed to limit sports and scholastic activities that interfere with class time.

The Region IV Superintendents Association voted Wednesday to adopt in principle a philosophy to restrict the activities.

However, they will use it only as a guide and will not adhere strictly to a policy adopted by a different superintendent's group in eastern Idaho—the Region IV Superintendents Association.

The eastern Idaho policy sets limits for hours students can spend away from class and limits the number of games that certain teams can play each year. Eastern Idaho superintendents is-

sued a report that says the number of classes missed because of participation in activities has increased substantially over the past 10 to 20 years.

"Efforts to reduce or control the expansion of activities have been meager with coaches and principals," the report says.

Richard Bauser, Region IV Superintendents Association president and Kimberly superintendent, said individual districts will follow the guidelines as they fit.

The restriction that no student miss any class to participate on a skiing team would not affect Kimberly, which does not have a team, for instance. But it would affect Wood River High School, he said.

For some sports, the reduction in games would mean a loss of revenue.

## City Council approves permit for daycare

**HAGERMAN** — Controversial plans for a new day-care center in Hagerman have been approved.

The City Council Tuesday granted a special use permit to Gary Grissom for a day-care center on Spring Street in a residential area.

Earlier this month, Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman Laura McAuliffe recommended Grissom's center be restricted to 17 children.

A planned addition to the existing building to meet state requirements for more children would make the outside play area too small, she said.

Also, McAuliffe said, a fence should be built across the front of the proposed center to protect children from cars.

But after reviewing Grissom's plans, the council voted unanimously to grant the permit because the plans meet state regulations for space-child ratios.

The center will be able to care for 24 children or more as long as it meets state requirements.

Grissom said a fence in front of the building is not a state requirement, and he said a state fire marshal even advised against it.

Councilman Rolly Zollinger said the City Council should agree with the professional opinions of those who set state standards.

"I certainly do," he said.

Although she voted to allow the permit for Grissom, Councilwoman Audrey Hoffman said she supports the restrictions advised by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

"I don't think it's large enough (for more than 17 children)," she said. "I don't care what they (state officials) say."

Grissom said he needs at least 24 children in order to be able to hire two women "for the professional care we're seeking." He said his business will provide a high-standard service for the city and also will generate revenue for the city.

In other business:

Robert Ross said the city may be at fault for his water pipes that were broken from freezing water. Ross said he drained his pipes before leaving for the winter, so the fault is not his and he needs to make an insurance claim against the city. He said the city may have a faulty valve or the water in his home may have been mistakenly turned on.

Mayor Gloria Jarwick said the city will investigate the matter and discuss it again at the next meeting.

Leon and Janice Urie were granted a city license to sell beer and wine from a new store they plan to open on South State Street, across from the museum.

Janice Urie said the store, to be called "Fossil Land," will be a gift shop selling souvenirs, gourmet food, local wine, imported beers and Idaho artwork. Plans are to open the business in time for the city's Fossil Day at the end of May and eventually expand to sell office supplies and have a fax service. Beer and wine will not be consumed on the premises, Janice Urie said.

Leon Urie, president of the Hagerman Chamber of Commerce, said no one member can make decisions for the chamber. At the last council meeting, a chamber member

told the council that no alcohol will be served at a dance during a ball tournament co-sponsored by the chamber.

That decision whether to allow alcohol at the dance has not been made, Urie said, and when, or if, it is made, it will be decided by a vote at a chamber meeting.

Members added that the city does not plan to ban alcohol use with an open container law. However, they said, bottles do need to be banned from the park.

The council voted to add new electrical services to the park. It will install a power pole and buy removable receptacles that can be brought to the park when needed. Cost will be \$1,310.

Zollinger said the replacement of the park bleachers will require seven sections costing \$900 each. Also, Grissom said he is "working hard" to find funding from a national juice company that donates money for park improvements.

Leon Urie said the ball teams that play in Hagerman should be assessed \$10 each to help buy the new seats.

## Expert: Middle school concept good for kids

**JEROME** — Speaking to a near-capacity crowd of about 100 people, an educational consultant said Jerome has the resources, equipment and commitment from teachers to make a good middle school — but facilities are inadequate.

William Kerewsky, an educational consultant and publisher from Columbia, Md., talked about the special needs of sixth-through eighth-graders and how a middle school concept helps meet those needs.

Under a middle school plan, students have the same teachers all day instead of moving from room to room with a different teacher for each subject. Having a different teacher for each subject leads to "a kid not belonging to any teacher," Kerewsky said.

Parental involvement, family togetherness, school design and

collaborative decision-making are the most important keys to the development and education of an adolescent, he said.

He cited dishwashers, not television, as the main detriment to family communication. Washing dishes together provided families with an opportunity to talk among members, Kerewsky said.

Beginning with the 1991-92 school year, the Jerome Junior High School will be reorganized as a middle school for seventh- and eighth-graders. The School Board approved a pilot program that includes about 96 junior high students and three teachers for the 1990-91 school year.

Kerewsky said a middle school should also include sixth-graders, "because at that age the child is less at risk and more malleable."

Jerome's middle school will not include sixth-graders, Craig Ainsworth, junior high principal said.

**Craig gathers members for dairy panel**

WASHINGTON — Freshman Republican Sen. Larry Craig has named 16 members to his dairy advisory committee, promising Senate Agriculture Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., that the panel's policy recommendations are on the way.

## Commission fails to set livestock permit price

**RUPERT** — An application fee for a livestock confinement operation permit has not been set yet.

The Minidoka Planning and Zoning Commission discussed the application fee Wednesday, but did not make a decision.

The ordinance will go into effect Jan. 1.

Bill McClung, building inspector, told those present that it will cost the county \$60 per application in desk

time, inspection time and to print the paperwork.

"My recommendation is \$75," McClung said. "The people who are going to use this service should be the ones who pay for it."

McClung estimated about 100 applicants during the ordinance's first year.

Planning and Zoning Commission member Walt Schoen said he thinks the county should keep the cost to \$35 for the first six months to encourage livestock operators to list their properties.

"Hold the charge as low as possible," Chairman John Remsburg countered.

The delayed effective date for the ordinance will allow those with farming interests to conclude the growing season. And it will allow the Building Inspection Department to finish its busy summer building season.

The fee discussion was tabled until the zoning commission's next meeting, scheduled for May 16.

The Planning and Zoning Commission will make its recommendation to the county commissioners. The commissioners will make the final decision on what fee to charge.

## All's quiet at target of gambling investigation

**ROY, Utah (AP)** — Things were quiet at the Jade Terrace Restaurant Wednesday afternoon after a raid by women who allege the establishment was a front for illegal gambling.

A patrons sat around one table and a nervous hostess said the manager wasn't in and she didn't know when he'd be in. She wouldn't even reveal his name.

Officers from a multi-agency task force, armed with search warrants, on Tuesday seized documents and other items from the restaurant and safe-deposit boxes belonging to its owner, identified by Roy City business records as Henry Wong.

The warrant alleges the Chinese restaurant was the front for an illegal sports gambling operation.

Wong, contacted at the restaurant Thursday morning, said he had not been served with any legal documents.

"All they do is just come in here and pick up (papers)," he said. "I don't even know what they're going on."

Wong said if police had any evidence, they already would have filed charges.

"I don't know nothing about the whole thing," he said.

Capt. Joe Gre, a Salt Lake County sheriff's official attached to the task

force, said no criminal charges had been filed against any suspect.

"We're waiting to go through the documents, to see what we've got," he said.

Lawmen said, statewide, they confiscated somewhere around \$2 million in cash, guns, silver and other property from some 22 Wasatch Front businesses in the raids. They allege the goods were purchased with gambling proceeds.

The evidence has been turned over to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

### Sheriff says car bomb work of a 'psycho'

SALT LAKE CITY — Investigators are searching for a bomber who blew up a Salt Lake County Sheriff's deputy's car, leaving a note promising to be the "avenge angel" of wrongs committed by police.

"I'm afraid this guy's a psycho," said Sheriff Aaron Kennard. "If he'll do a cop, he'll do anybody."

The homemade pipe bomb detonated beneath a marked Salt Lake County Sheriff's patrol car parked outside the deputy's southeast county home about 11 a.m. The blast destroyed the vehicle and imbedding flying metal in a nearby fence and the house, Kennard said.

The deputy, patrol Sgt. Bill Ellis, and his family weren't hurt, Kennard, however, said if the bomb had been taped about three feet towards the rear of the vehicle, under the gas tank, serious injuries could have resulted.

A rambling note was found taped to Bills' garage threatening police and hinting at further violence.

### Germ testing to begin again at Dugway

DUGWAY PROVING GROUNDS, Utah — Army officials officials say they are close to testing defensive biological agents at Dugway Proving Grounds, the first such tests in nearly six years.

Col. Frank Cox, the base commander, said he has received a directive for fiscal 1991 from the headquarters of the Test and Evaluation Command, telling him to resume the program.

The go-ahead hinges on approval by state and federal officials, he said.

Dugway stopped testing pathogens in 1985 to upgrade its laboratory equipment. The pathogen testing rooms are now "state of the art," he said.

### Kappa Sigma stripped of recognition

MOSCOW — University of Idaho officials have pulled recognition of the Moscow school's second fraternity in five months over hazing of pledge class members.

The Kappa Sigma fraternity chapter was stripped of university recognition Wednesday. The same action was taken against the school's Sigma Alpha Epsilon house last November.

Because the university does not recognize the two fraternities, they will not be allowed to participate in rush and other campus activities or to use university buildings.

But Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity leaders said they plan to seek reinstatement of university recognition within the next two weeks, and Kappa Sigma leaders plan to petition for reinstatement in time for fall rush.

### Fighters to change Gowen Field's mission

BOISE — The Wild Weasel tactical fighters that played a big role in the Persian Gulf War are coming to Boise's Gowen Field.

Eighteen of the F-4G Phantoms that flew in ahead of bombers to knock out radar sites in Iraq will be arriving in Idaho in the next year. And that means a new mission for the Idaho Air National Guard base after 15 years of specializing in photo reconnaissance.

### Town allowed to race porcupines

PORTLAND, Ore. — A prickly issue has been settled with a state commission deciding to allow Baker City to hold its Miner's Jubilee porcupine race one more time.

The Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission acted Wednesday after a hearing at which animal protectionists argued that the porcupines were being exploited, chased and worried for human amusement.

Harassment of wildlife is banned by state law. But the commission is empowered to allow exceptions.

# Washington teachers strike

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — About 21,000 teachers in six districts in western Washington went on strike today after the governor rejected pleas for more money, smaller classes and more supplies.

Schools were closed as teachers carried picket signs in Tacoma, Olympia and other cities and towns. The biggest strike in the state's history affected more than 300,000 of Washington's 800,000 students.

"There is no solution in sight right now," union president Carla Nuxoll said after meeting on Wednesday with Gov. Booth Gardner. "This strike could go on indefinitely."

The governor said: "Dialogue is healthy, but other than exchanging a lot of ideas I didn't resolve anything. The strike will not change the outcome of this (legislative) session as it relates to funding for education."

Howard Coble, executive director of the Washington Association of School Administrators, advised districts to seek for ways to force the teachers to work. He estimated half the striking districts have no-strike contracts.

"It's essentially illegal action to shut down schools," Coble said. To help parents cope with the walk-out Seattle planned to turn 25 community centers into day-care programs. Child-care officials elsewhere said they would offer expanded services.

On Wednesday, a six-member, bi-

partisan team of lawmakers continued negotiations on a state budget for the two years beginning July 1.

The Senate version would spend \$7.1 billion on education, or \$369 million more than current levels, but the House proposal contains a \$419 million increase.

The teachers' union wants a raise of at least 10 percent over two years. The House and Senate propose 7.5 percent increases for veteran teachers, or 8.2 percent overall if higher increases for beginners are taken into account.

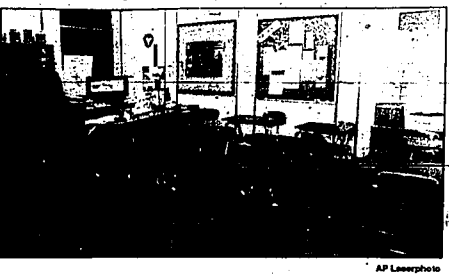

### Interstate 15 shutdown after crash

HAMER (AP) — An Air Force transport carrying three Minuteman solid fuel rocket motor stages went out of control and rolled Thursday just off Interstate 15 in the desolate high desert of eastern Idaho, forcing the interstate and a state highway to be shut down.

There was no explosion when the accident occurred shortly before noon. But as a precaution the Idaho State Police evacuated the state Transportation Department's Sage Port-of-Entry, which is right at the interchange with Idaho 33 and the only building within miles.

"It does have the solid rocket fuel in it so it does have the propensity to be a hazard," Dispatcher Chris Petersen said.

A special team from Hill Air Force Base north of Salt Lake City flew to the site by helicopter, and the base moved heavy equipment by road to recover the rocket motor stages. Air Force spokeswoman Sylvia LeMons-Liddle estimated the operation would take into the evening.

The transport, driven by a civilian employee of Utah Freightways of Salt Lake City, was taking the rocket motor stages from Malmsstrom Air Force Base near Great Falls, Mont., to Hill. LeMons-Liddle said Hill is the site of the Air Logistics Center, where the government services Minuteman and MX missiles.

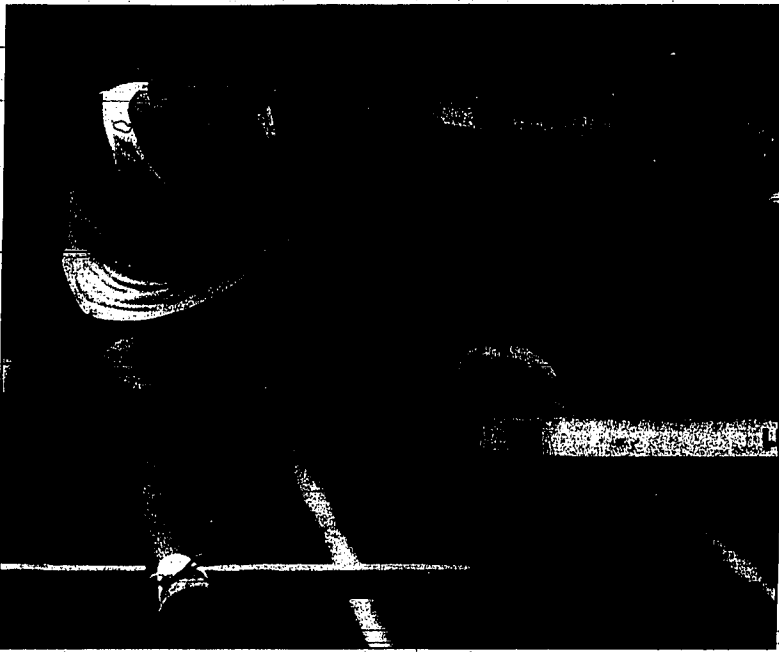
"The cold kind of kept the times down, but I'm looking to get under 60 seconds," Sparks said.

ventured an estimate. "He's had around 40 fights and probably lost about eight of them," he said. "It's a record anyone would be proud of, and he's been in with some of the best. You see him fight someone who's just pretty good, it's hardly a fight."

"He's lost two out of 10 bouts, but the first was to the second-rated welterweight in Canada and the other was against the No. 2 man in the United States. ## Late drafters may fare best

NEW YORK — Bill Polian of the Buffalo Bills is happy to be choosing 26th in Sunday's NFL draft for at least one good reason.

This year's NFL draft is full of excellent 26th choices; very few Nos. 1, 2 or 3. In fact, even the acknowledged No. 1 pick, Raghib "Rocker" Ismail of Notre Dame, has questions about him.

It looks like a year where the strong will get stronger and the weak won't improve much.

"We don't have any glaring weaknesses and this is a draft for teams that don't have glaring weaknesses," Polian says. "If you're looking for someone to come in and turn you around right away, that's another story."

One of the top defensive line prospects, for example, is Eric Swann, who has played only semi-pro football for the Bay State Titans. He probably will be the first player without college experience taken in the draft since Emil "Six Yard" Siko was picked by the Rams in 1946, the year they moved from Cleveland to Los Angeles.

Siko chose Notre Dame instead, something that Swann isn't likely to do. But the Titans go far beyond Swann. Ismail, for example, is a unanimous choice for No. 1. Most of his college achievements, however, were as a kick returner and some 2,000 yards of return yardage at 175 pounds and his hands as a pass receiver. Overall, he is considered a player who would have a greater impact with a winning team than with 1-15 New England, which chooses first overall.

"All I know is that I'd love to have him," says Polian, whose Bills finished 13-3, won the AFC championship and lost the Super Bowl 20-19 to the Giants.

**Course denies access to black prep**

COLUMBIA, La. — The St. Frederick High School golf team withdrew from matches against two other high schools at the Caldwell Parish Country Club on Wednesday when its black player was not allowed on the course.

"I couldn't believe it," St. Frederick coach James Murphy said. Murphy said his team had been practicing for about 20 minutes when told the private club bans blacks.

"It kind of shocked me," said Dondre Green, a senior who had played at several private clubs while competing for St. Frederick the last two years. Green is the No. 5 player on St. Frederick's eight-man team.

Club manager Bill McGee said he had no choice. "It's a club rule," he said. "This is a private club, and it has the discretion to bar anybody it wants."

Club president Iley Evans confirmed that the policy had been in effect since the club opened in 1971.

Ernestine Green, the student's mother, said she had warned her son when he might happen.

"Dondre and his father and I discussed this when he first got on the golf team," Mrs. Green said. "We told him that he'd better be ready for the day — even here in the 1990s — that some club sees his little black face and tells him he can't play. He said, 'Oh, mama, we're past that.'"

"Things like that don't really bother me," Green said. "I just look down on their stupidity."

**Washington Redskins let running back go**

HERNDON, Va. — Running back Kelvin Bryant's career is over with the Washington Redskins, the club said Tuesday.

The team still could try to sign the free agent but "I would not anticipate Kelvin being back," said general manager Charley Casserly.

The Redskins declined to make contract offers to Bryant, 30, or running back Reggie Branch for the upcoming season.

The Redskins are loaded with running backs, including Earnest Byner and Gerald Riggs. The Redskins also added John Settle to the roster in the off-season from the Atlanta Falcons.

The Redskins find themselves in an unusual position for Sunday's draft. They actually have a first-round pick, the first time since 1983. Washington has the 20th choice, and Gibbs said the team "probably" would prefer to take a defensive player.

**Billy Owens delays decision to go pro**

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Syracuse forward Billy Owens has put off a decision on whether to turn pro, possibly until early next week, according to Syracuse coach Jim Boheim.

Owens' father had told the Syracuse Herald-Journal that his son would decide about the NBA draft Wednesday and make an announcement Thursday. But no announcement was made, and Boheim told Syracuse reporters Thursday that Owens needs more time.

Boheim said he expects Owens will make a decision by Tuesday. Owens has until May 12 to apply for the draft if he intends to leave Syracuse with a season of college eligibility remaining. Owens, a 6-9 forward with a gift for passing, would likely go among the first three picks in the June 26 draft.

Barkley, who sprained his left knee on March 31 and missed seven games, was scoreless in 5½ minutes in the first quarter but went 5-for-6 and scored 10 points in the second as the 76ers built a 60-48 halftime lead. Barkley scored two points in the third quarter and nine in the fourth, when the 76ers put the game away.

Hersey Hawkins and Ron Anderson led the 76ers with 26 points apiece. Kevin Gamble scored a career-high 33 points for Boston, which played without Larry Bird and Reggie Lewis, both out with back problems.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Jon Casey stopped 31 shots as the Minnesota North Stars continued their upset run in the NHL playoffs with a 2-1 victory over the St. Louis Blues in the opener of the Norris Division finals Thursday night.

Dave Gagner got the North Stars' 16th power-play goal of the playoffs and Shane Churla also scored while the Minnesota defense did the rest.

The North Stars' forechecking frustrated the Blues all night and Casey was there to stop St. Louis' best scoring chances.

Casey shut out the Blues the first two periods before Rich Sutter scored on his own rebound at 4:35 of the third.

The Blues were 5-1-2 against the North Stars during the regular season and had 37 more points while finishing with the second-best record in the league. They also have the highest point total of the remaining teams in the playoffs, but they're having a hard time handling the favorite's role.

St. Louis fell behind three games to one before finishing off the Detroit Red Wings in the first round and will be playing catch-up again in Game 2 Saturday night in St. Louis.

The North Stars tied a playoff record with 15 power-play goals in 54 chances in their first-round upset of overall points champion Chicago, and they didn't waste any time getting No. 16.

The North Stars were 1-for-4 on the power play in the 16-45-58-minute playoffs. The Blues were 0-for-4, falling to an abysmal 3-for-43 for the playoffs.

# New England talks deal with No. 1 pick

**FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) —** The competition for Raghib "Rocket" Ismail heated up Thursday as the New England Patriots, who hold the top pick in Sunday's NFL draft, considered trade offers from Dallas and Atlanta.

Sam Jankovich, the Patriots' chief executive officer, said he expected pressure to build to complete a deal so the other team would have time to try to sign Ismail before the draft starts at noon EDT.

Although the situation can change, Jankovich said, the Patriots prefer to trade the first pick. Their next choice would be to take Ismail, he said, and the least likely option would be to make another player the top choice.

Atlanta, which has the third and 13th picks, was the first team to express serious interest in positioning itself for a shot at Ismail, the wide receiver and kick returner who is foregoing his senior season at Notre Dame.

But Dallas, which has the 11th, 12th and 14th

choices, caught the Patriots' interest with a new proposal Wednesday, Jankovich said. Any trade also could involve current NFL players, said Joe Mendes, the Patriots vice president of player operations.

Jankovich and Mendes said the current offers could change.

Asked if he would be satisfied not getting a pick in the top 10, Jankovich said, "there's a noticeable dropoff, but still you're in a position to get yourself some very good football players."

Jankovich said two other teams continue to have lesser interest than Atlanta and Dallas.

"This will probably move rather rapidly within the next day or two and... some very hard decisions are going to have to be made," he said.

Ismail also has been wooed by Toronto of the Canadian Football League, which reportedly has made a two-year, \$4 million offer. That would increase the importance to an NFL team of signing him before the draft rather than risking pick-

ing him and then losing him.

Ismail reportedly was to announce Thursday whether he would go to the CFL, but Ed Abram, his agent, had no comment.

"Our position is if the trade was made to Dallas... the challenge is to try to sign him before the draft," Abram said. "The Canadian offer is still on the table and quite viable."

Another of Ismail's representatives talked Wednesday night with Patrick Forte, the Patriots vice president of administration. Abram refused comment on how far apart the sides were.

In the NFL, Jankovich said, he's surprised the Falcons haven't been more forceful. They have been playing "maybe a little more poker game than" the Cowboys, who have been "very up front," he added.

"Maybe Patrick's error in saying this," he added, "but I also think that the Falcons have felt all along that there probably isn't any other interest out there so why don't they just go ahead and have a waiting game."

# Nicklaus leads PGA seniors

**FALM BEACH GARDENS, Fla. (AP) —** Jack Nicklaus is leading the 52nd PGA Seniors Championship only because he's playing at home.

"If I'd had to go somewhere to play this week, I wouldn't have gone," Nicklaus said Thursday after a birdie-birdie finish capped off a first-round 66.

"Crazy," he said. "A shot into the pond on the 17th gave Lee Trevino a double bogey and he shot 72. Arnold Palmer had a 74."

He is coming off an unsuccessful attempt at a seventh Masters championship and, he said, it's usually difficult for him to compete immediately following one of golf's major events.

"Sure, it's hard to play right after the Masters," Nicklaus said.

"But this is easy. It's just a 10 minute drive" from his home at Lost Tree Village to the PGA National Golf Club.

"It makes all the difference in the world being able to stay at home and play in a tournament," he said.

Nicklaus, who has won three of his five previous career starts among the over-50 set, reeled off four consecutive birdies beginning on the fifth hole and one-punted 10 times in his fast start.

"I didn't play that great," he said. "Some errant shots off the tee. But my iron play was good and I putted very, very well."

One of his favorite weapons, the driver, was in action only three times.

Nicklaus held a one-stroke lead over a man he's never met, Tom Joyce, a club pro from Huntington, N.Y.

Joyce, who hasn't played competitively since taking the national senior club pro championship last October, shot 67 despite a double bogey from the water on the 17th hole.

"You know, some of the great players — Nicklaus, Trevino, Player — they'd take a 67 and just run with it," he said, then added:

"To tell you the truth, I'm just trying to make the cut."

"As long as this course is, you'd think it would be to my advantage," Nicklaus said.

But the course set-up, with some tees forward, and the direction of the wind "took the driver out of my hand," he said.

"You could drive it right through the fairways most of the time; so my advantage I had there was gone."

So he relied on his short irons and his putter, dropping a downhill 25-foot hole for a birdie on the fifth and holing a 15-foot putt on the sixth.

He hit a 5-iron to five feet on the next hole and got his fourth consecutive birdie with a 9-iron approach that came to rest six inches from the cup on the eighth.

South African Gary Player, the defending champion and a three-time winner of this event, complained of poor-putting after shooting a 73.

Chi Chi Rodriguez had the same total on a round that included four birdies, a double bogey and a triple bogey.

Another 9-iron shot set up a 3-foot birdie putt on the 13th hole.

He 3-putted from about 35 feet for his only bogey, on the 16th, then came back with a 15-foot birdie on the 17th and finished it off with a 5-foot putt, again following a 9-iron approach, on the final hole.

Investment company questions revamp plan

KELLOGG (AP) A national investment company whose clients bought millions of dollars worth of bonds issued by Sunshine Mining Co. questions whether a 1988 reorganization of the company was legal.

Sunshine, which operates the Sunshine Mine near Kellogg, sold \$58 million worth of silver-indexed bonds in the early 1980s. The bonds were secured by annual silver production at the Sunshine Mine. On Monday, Sunshine halted principal and interest payments on eight bond series, leaving three bond series in default.

American Investment Services, Great-Barrington, Mass., holds an undisclosed number of the bonds, and strongly recommended them to clients in the early 1980s. Since Sunshine's default announcement Monday, however, American Investments has advised its clients to sell and clients from losing millions.

Larry Pratt, American Investment president, said his company wants to know why a 1988 reorganization of Sunshine Mining Co. was not brought until after it completed.

In 1988, Sunshine Mining reorganized assets, essentially placing ownership of the mine with a subsidiary, Sunshine Precious Metals

Inc. Substantial amounts of cash, oil and natural gas assets and other income-producing properties were left with the Dallas-based parent company, Pratt said.

The silver-indexed bonds were an obligation of the entire company. But after reorganization, the bonds were the obligation only of Sunshine Precious Metals, whose primary asset was the mine.

"All the cash and other assets they transferred to the parent company are out of reach of the bondholders," Pratt said. "Only the mine was left behind."

In an interview Tuesday, Sunshine vice president and treasurer Gayland Avance said he is not sure the company is required to notify bondholders of the 1988 reorganization. "But the stockholders did vote on it and it was a public transaction," he said.

Avance said the reorganization had a "good" effect on the company. "The collateral that the silver-indexed bondholders had (before the reorganization) is still the same — production at the Sunshine Mine."

Sunshine officials planned a meeting with American Investment and was expected to unveil a bond debt restructuring plan.

Pratt said his company's clients hold between 4 and 6 percent of the silver-indexed bonds.

Bunker Hill Mining looking at end of tunnel

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Unless new investors can be found, Bunker Hill Mining Co. assets likely will be sold and the company's mine lease to expire, a company attorney says.

Mine equipment and other company assets most likely will be sold at auction and its property seized to satisfy tax liabilities by fall, Bunker Hill attorney Ford Elsas said Wednesday at a bankruptcy court hearing.

"Unless a buyer shows up soon, things don't look good," Elsas said. At the hearing, Bunker Hill agreed in principle to let Shoshone County take title to property for which the company is three years behind on tax payments.

The company owes \$2 million in back taxes, though not all of its property in the area is affected. Bunker Hill owns 14 square miles of land around Kellogg.

Gary Edson, a Boise attorney hired to represent the company. Bunker Hill Mining Co. Inc. (U.S. Leasing) had filed for Chapter 11 protection from creditors under federal bankruptcy code.

The company's president, Alan Richardson, had been unsuccessful in efforts to attract new investors. The company also agreed Wednesday to continue working to remove more than 100 electrical transformers inside the mine.

The federal Environmental Protection Agency has raised concerns that hazardous polychlorinated biphenyls, or PCBs, inside the transformers could contaminate groundwater should the mine flood.

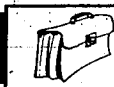

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Genius is nothing but a greater aptitude for patience.  
— George de Buffon.

A reader asks, "If one is sure of winning a defensive trump trick, should he always win it at the first opportunity?"

"Not necessarily" is the best answer. It all depends on whether the interests of the defense require immediate action.

East wins the first two diamonds with the 10 and ace, and then leads the King. When South ruffs with the nine, what should West do?

Many would overruff now and think later. After much anguish and pain, West would then have to choose between two unattractive black-suit returns. Whichever is led, dummy wins, South's A-K-10 of trumps pick up the trump suit, and declarer has his 10 tricks.

A casual look at dummy should reveal to West that there is no compelling reason for him to rush to win his trump Jack. And in today's case, patience pays off with a huge reward.

If West discards on the third diamond, South must later lose two trump tricks instead of one. If South plays his ace and king, West's J-8 will be behind South's 10-4, and South's game goes down one.

ANSWER: Three no-trump. Might not make, but if the diamonds run, it should be a sure game.

## Rockers are now trading on their famous faces

Madonna worth two Metallicas? Can an Aerosmith fetch an Alice Cooper? Or how about Motley Crue for Mickey Mantle?

The American trading card hobby, until now mainly in sports, has grown into a multibillion-dollar business, and the music industry is grabbing a piece of the pie — or the bubble gum, as it were.

Dallas-based Pro Set, which manufactures football, hockey, golf and Desert Storm cards, is distributing two sets of music cards — a 250-card "Superstars" series and a 100-card "Yo! MTV Raps" edition. In late April, Albuquerque-based Major League Entertainment (MLE) will unveil "RockCards," a

288-card series geared toward hard-rock enthusiasts.

Both companies are working with leading music industry merchandisers — Pro Set with Winterland Productions, Major League with Brockport — and predict massive sales.

Consider, says Pro Set's marketing vice-president Victor Shaffer, that worldwide sales of music merchandise total \$23 billion.

"No single sport comes anywhere near that," Shaffer says. "Music as an industry is bigger than any single sport."

Because of that, card manufacturers think there's an untapped market of fans ripe to buy music cards.

"Four years ago, we talked about trading cards," says Brockport's Allen LeWinter. "Now we can do them. The staples have

become T-shirts and posters, and fans are looking for new products."

Adds Rudy Kanonik, an associate editor of the card-collecting magazine Beckett's, "The field is pretty much wide open in non-sports. There's no competition. But it's hard to predict how they'll do. (Music) is a popular thing with young kids, but whether or not they're going to spend money to buy cards with these performers on them remains to be seen."

The card-makers say they're already seeing the answer — and it's a resounding "yes."

Based on initial orders, Pro Set's Shaffer predicts that within two years the company will sell up to 200 million packs of music cards, surpassing its football series. And

MLE President Jim Cameron says a small display of prototype RockCards has generated an unexpected "several million dollars" in advance orders.

"It was very apparent to us that if we combined the current stars of today on cards, we'd have a pretty hot product," Cameron says. "And unlike sports cards, the music cards can be sold in so many different places — record stores, toy stores, gift stores, convenience stores."

The opportunities to put these cards on a counter is terrific.

The window for music cards has been blown open by blustery business in both the trading card and music memorabilia business.

# The greatest narrative filmmaker and 'Lawrence of Arabia'

NEW YORK — When film students, critics, historians and other buffs are asked to list the best movies ever made, "Lawrence of Arabia" appears with shattering and well-deserved frequency. And no wonder, David Lean's majestic epic is cinematic poetry.

It was indeed the singular masterpiece in the illustrious career of the British filmmaker, who died this week at age 83.

Compared to other leaders in the movie industry, his career outpouring may be considered by some to be well, lean — he made only 16 movies. But all are rare and exquisite jewels, each in its own special way.

"His legacy is that he's the only filmmaker to make intelligent epics, and I really think our greatest narrative filmmaker," his biographer, Stephen Silverman, said.

"He had been in declining health since returning home to England after the 1989 re-release of "Lawrence of Arabia," Silverman said. "Although he was a man of such remarkable strength that he was preparing his final epic, "Nostromo," based on the Joseph Conrad novel."

Set in a fictional South American country about capitalism, revolution and personal corruption, the movie was set to roll May 4 and star Dennis Quaid.

Many of Lean's works were based on books, and he once told The Associated Press, "I've only ever gone for something I've liked reading and

I thought I could put on the screen."

From the lovely "Brief Encounter," to the sometimes amusing, often melodramatic rendering of Dickens in "Great Expectations" (the film, which earned seven Academy Awards including best picture and best actor), Lean's favorite of his

own movies was "Lawrence of Arabia."

An "adventure of a lifetime" was how Lean remembered the 19 months of location work for the film, which earned seven Academy Awards including best picture and best director.

The vividly atavistic and stirring epic introduced an unknown actor named Peter O'Toole.

When it landed in New York on Dec. 17, 1962, it opened with some of the lovely and majestic touches including a brilliant and lengthy overture by Maurice Jarre, and a program

book complete with bibliographical and biographical material.

The charms and cinematic seductions of "Lawrence of Arabia" were greater than ever in a restored version.

After a decade, 32 minutes of the movie had been cut and one print contained a complete reversal (Lawrence's watch is switched from hand to hand).

There also were original editing cuts made when the movie was first released to trim it for American audiences who had a short attention span.

Lean restored some of those scenes, at times calling some of his actors (notably O'Toole) into a studio to record new dialogue.

The restoration by Robert A. Harris and Anne Coates, who won an Oscar for editing the original movie, gave the film a running time of 218 minutes.

The new version, with an added 20 minutes, is still breathtaking and attempts to more deeply probe the elusive and enigmatic Lawrence.

But the movie's real star was the desert with its smoldering dunes and poetry of colors.

T.E. Lawrence was an arrogant cartographer in the British army sent to Arabia to assist Prince Feisal

(Alec Guinness) in the 1917-18 Arab revolt against the Ottoman Empire. He quickly adapts to the desert and the Bedouin way of life. He also becomes a messianic warrior whose strategy and wisdom are matched only by ego and obsession.

With his virginal white robes, O'Toole, with eyes a Mediterranean blue and hair the color of golden straw, struts about not with the swagger of a British gentleman but with the stance of a god.

Indeed, the exploits Robert Bolt so craftily chiseled in his excellent screenplay, paint Lawrence as a demigod.

In one scene, O'Toole rushes back into the deadly Nafud desert, where he and his Arab army have crossed to surprise the Turks in a land raid, to find a man who fell from his camel — a man who is surely dead. But Lawrence retrieves him, emerging from the steaming horizon like a humpbacked ant.

Scenes later, he must kill the man he saved in order to stave off a squabble between tribes.

Lean had a keen eye for detail and strove for cultural accuracy. And "Lawrence of Arabia" accomplishes what few epics ever did: the artistic fusion of intimacy and adventure.

## Oscars help 'Ghost' set a record for rental tapes

Last month's Academy Awards show was one of the most popular Oscar programs in years, and its continuing to have a spin-off effect on the video market.

Paramount Home Video claims to have shipped an unprecedented 642,000 cassettes of its blockbuster, "Ghost," which won Oscars for best original screenplay (by Bruce Joel Rubin) and supporting actress (Whoopi Goldberg). Rubin also wrote "Jacob's Ladder," which is getting a hefty publicity push from LIVE Home Video, which plans to release it May 23 on disc and tape.

The figures for "Ghost" represent a significant leap over "Die Hard II," which held the previous record for rental-priced tapes (\$10,000 units). Most of the "Ghost" cassettes were shipped before the Oscars were awarded, but after the movie received a best-picture nomination Feb. 13.

"Ghost" has also been released in the rarefied 8mm format, which is compatible with Sony Video Walkman TV/VCRs.

To date, only about 1,700 8mm tapes have

been released. While the VHS tape of "Ghost" sells for close to \$100, it's available on 8mm and Beta for \$30.

Three other major Oscar winners — "Reversal of Fortune" (Jeremy Irons, best actor), "Misery" (Kathy Bates, best actress), "GoodFellas" (Joe Pesci, best supporting actor) — are tentatively scheduled to be released on video in mid-summer. Several nominated losers are set as well: "Avalon" (May 1), "Havana" (May 9), "The Grifters" (June 5), "Postcards From the Edge" (June 5) and "Edward Scissorhands" (June 27).

No video date has been set for "Home Alone," which grossed more than any of the above and got Oscar exposure because it was up for best song ("Somewhere in My Memory"). But Fox Video has announced that it will add a costly commercial to the front of the "Home Alone" tape — a practice that was begun four years ago with the bargain-priced release of "Top Gun."

Most likely scenario: "Home Alone" will be released for the Christmas sell-through market at \$25 or less per cassette.

On the heels of the seven-Oscar sweep by Kevin Costner's Indian epic, "Dances With

Wolves" (which won't be out on tape until Aug. 29), CBS/Fox Video is repackaging and reissuing "Windwalker," a 1980 Western starring the late Trevor Howard as a Native American patriarch. The actors speak English-subtitled Cheyenne and Crow. The new price is \$20.

Along the same lines, PBS Home Video has just released its "American Indians" collection of five tapes, including "Geronimo and the Apache Resistance," "The Spirit of Crazy Horse," "Myths and Moundbuilders," "Winds of Change: A Matter of Promises" and "Seasons of the Navajo." The tapes are \$20 apiece, or \$100 for a boxed set. The rental-priced success of "Ghost," along with the relative failures of such sale-priced cassettes as "Lethal Weapon II" and "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids," appears to have pushed the industry away from bargain-priced tapes for the moment.

At an Arizona convention last month, Warner Home Video executive Jim Cardwell pointed out that "the sell-through business is very seasonal" (Christmas is the public's favorite tape-buying time), and predicted that there will be 30-35 million fewer tapes on the market this year.

# Director Oliver Stone studies all the angles for film on JFK assassination

DALLAS — Assassination conspiracy devotees: Oliver Stone has your angle.

The director of the movie JFK will use at least five sites from which gunmen might have shot President John F. Kennedy, according to eyewitness accounts of filming and moderately reliable sources.

The locations include two on the sixth floor of the old Texas School Book Depository, the infamous grassy knoll, the top of the Dallas County Records Building and the second floor of the old Dal-Tex building, just east of the depository across Houston Street.

Considering that official accounts of the assassination include only three gunshots, Stone seems set upon a creative path that will please many in the crowd that watched filming. Few of the spectators said they believed that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone.

Strangers stood along Main Street discussing favorite theories, much like baseball fans in the bleachers chewing over statistics from seasons past.

"There's too many unanswered questions," said Michelle Jones of Lewisville, Texas. "Whoever did it may be standing here among us right now."

Stone seems to be taking no chances that he might miss where the gunman was standing when the shots were fired on Nov. 22, 1963. He and his film crews will be in Dallas for two weeks, blocking off portions of downtown streets and drawing thousands of spectators.

Three of the shooting sites are

well-known: the "sniper's perch" on the sixth floor endorsed by the Warren Commission; the grassy knoll just west of the depository, where some witnesses at the time thought they heard gunfire; and the top of the Records Building, where a shell casing was discovered years after the shooting. But the focus of attention right above the Soda Shop restaurant on the second floor of the old Dal-Tex building puzzled even some movie crew members.

Larry Ray Harris was not among the puzzled. Harris is a researcher for the JFK Assassination Information Center and is a consultant for the movie. He had no comment about the film but offered a historical link between the assassination and the lesser-known sites apparently under consideration by Stone.

Harris pulled a book from the extensive library of assassination information located in the center at the West End Marketplace. He quickly located a photo taken by Associated Press photographer James Algens moments after the assassination.

The Dal-Tex building is in the background. If the photo is blown up several hundred times, it reveals a faint smudge in one window that looks sort of like an arm — and sort of like an astronomer's snapshot of a distant galaxy.

Some conspiracy theorists speculate that the faint smear is key evidence and that a relatively low-trajectory shot from that height jibes with the pattern of injuries caused by the shots.

Harris, who has researched the assassination for 16 years, acknowledged that the link between the lower floors of the Dal-Tex building and the assassination is relatively obscure.

"Most of the conjecture over the years has focused on the rooftop," he said.

The other end of the sixth floor from the "sniper's perch" is also considered to be suspicious by some analysts of assassination day, Harris said.

"Those windows were the only ones that were completely open," he said. On the other hand, the actor in workman's garb who set up a rifle in

the window of the Dal-Tex building Tuesday had at least as good a view of where the president's car passed as any sixth-floor site. JFK is a movie, not a history text. And Stone isn't saying from where he believes the fatal shots came.

Jones, standing near the corner of Main and Record streets, went content to wait for the movie's release to find out what is Stone's vision of the assassination.

# Reagan bio zooms to top of best-seller list

NEW YORK (AP) — Kitty Kelley has slowed her promotion of "Nancy Reagan, The Unauthorized Biography," but the torrid book with its tales of sex, Sinatra and pot smoke has topped the best-seller list after just one week.

The biography of the former first lady will hit No. 1 in The New York Times Book Review for sales ending the week of April 13, and book stores confirmed the tell-all tome is still selling like crazy this week.

"It's just doing phenomenally well. There's been nothing in the past five or six years anywhere close to this book," said Donna Passanante, spokeswoman for B. Dalton-Barnes & Noble.

Only Salman Rushdie's "The Satanic Verses" enjoyed a better first week than the Kelley book, which outperformed such best-selling authors as Stephen King, Tom Clancy and Bill Cosby, the Times said.

"Nancy Reagan, The Unauthorized Biography" arrived in stores April 8. Its publisher, Simon & Schuster, said there are 925,000 copies in print.

Passanante declined to release exact figures, but said the biography was still flying out of the stores eight days after its release.

"This is something nationwide. It's not Washington specific, or just limited to New York," she said.

Sales remained solid at the 800 B. Dalton stores and 50 Barnes & Noble outlets around the country, she said.

"Part of it is the enormous publicity, good or bad," she said. "Last week, there was an initial wave of buyers."

One Waldenbooks store on Manhattan's Upper West Side was restocking its shelves this week. It received shipments on two different days last week and sold out both times. The same was true at a Doubleday Book Store in midtown, where merchandising manager Richard Haas said the book remained in demand.

"My perception is it's still doing quite well, although not as wildly as the first few days," said Haas.

"It's settled into being a normal best seller instead of a record breaker."

Haas said the outlet at 53rd Street and Fifth Avenue went through more than 900 copies of the book last week.

"I've never had anything like this," said Haas, explaining that the biography far outdistanced such past top-sellers as "Trump: The Art of the Deal," "The Bonfire of the Vanities," and "Spycatcher."

The rest of Doubleday's 43 metropolitan area stores were doing just as well, said the company's spokesman Marty Goldberg.

# Town in 'Home Alone' grows weary of stardom

WINNETKA, Ill. (AP) — Stardom is wearing thin for some in this affluent Chicago suburb, featured in the smash hit "Home Alone" and other movies.

Years of playing host to Hollywood, Winnetka officials are considering restricting filmmakers' access to their exclusive North Shore village.

"We have not sought-out movies as a way to improve our economic base, and wouldn't," Winnetka's not for sale, that way," Village Manager Robert A. Buechner said.

"We don't want to be party poopers," he said. "But let's try to get some rules and regulations so no property owners are inconvenienced."

For over a year, since shortly after "Home Alone" was filmed here, the village has required full village council approval rather than a simple permit for filmmakers who want to shoot on location in Winnetka.

Council approval will remain a requirement until an official policy on filmmaking is adopted, Buechner said. Regulations under consideration include imposing a rental fee for using public property that is blocked off during filming, and restricting the number of days a film crew can remain in town, he said.

Setting the policy will be up to the full council.

"An outright ban on movie making is unlikely," Buechner said.

"It gets mentioned, in passing, every time the matter is discussed," he said.

But Buechner said that would probably anger some residents, who view filmmaking in their town as a fun thing.

Others, however, consider the invasion of Hollywood types an intrusion.

Winnetka has been featured in about 10 movies in the last five years, including "Uncle Buck," "Ferris Bueller's Day Off" and "Home Alone."

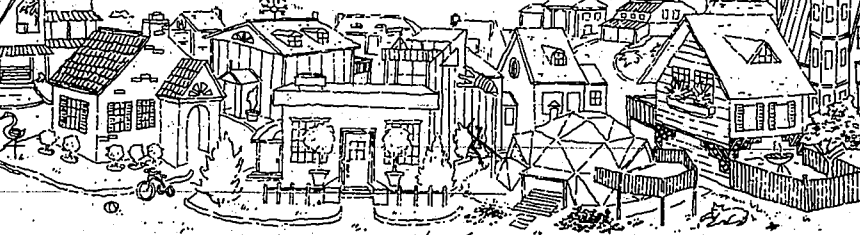
"For some people, it was the straw that broke the camel's back," Buechner said of "Home Alone," the tale of the adventures of a boy accidentally left home while his family vacations in Europe. The home, a stately Winnetka colonial, is prominently featured in the movie.

"The people immediately next to the home ended up getting tired of it ... shooting way into the wee hours some nights ... the noise, klieg lights, temporarily being shut out of their driveways," Buechner said. "It's a quiet residential neighborhood."

Suzi Kellett, director of the Illinois Film Office, has been working with Winnetka officials with hopes of establishing a policy that won't keep movie moguls and their money from coming to Illinois.

She said other North Shore communities have restrictions and doesn't think Winnetka's proposed restrictions will act as a deterrent. But Mark Levinson, an executive producer of "Home Alone," said a restrictive policy "would be too bad because it'd limit the amount of filmmaking" done in Winnetka.

**'Class Action'** features a father and daughter on opposite sides of an explosive lawsuit. The movie stars Gene Hackman and Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio.

"There are a lot of little kids in here," says the manager of the Record Bar in Glen Burnie, Md.

"I guess they're spending their allowances. I've seen a lot of little kids come in here, flop a \$20 on the counter and buy eight or nine singles."

Some of these kids may be picking up a heavy metal CD or even a golden oldie single.

But look out, Mick Jagger — your newest competition could be a bunch of turtles.

That's right — the newest hot group isn't INXS, it's TMNT. (That's Teenaged Mutant Ninja Turtles to the unhip or the grown-up.)

"They're not real? They are real! They might not be real to you, but neither is Santa Claus," says Steven Leber, co-producer of the Turtles' "Coming Out of Their Shells" tour. "The kids love it."

Indeed, Leber is not the only producer convinced that cartoon characters can sing: Barbie made her rock debut when her album, "The Look," was released. (She'll probably go on tour next year, says her manager.)

And just before Christmas, Geffen Records released a 10-song album called "The Simpson's Sing the Blues" including the hit single "Do the Bartman."

"It's the biggest thing," says Michelle Blum, a Baltimore mother of three.

"Even the baby dances when the Simpsons' video is on."

It's all part of a recent boom of slick, sophisticated music, from the New Kids on the Block to Barbie, aimed at the younger set — kids aged 5 (or even younger) to 13.

Many other groups, while not aimed specifically at kids, are drawing youthful fans as well, says Paul Grein, a columnist for Billboard magazine. "Vanilla Ice's current success — it's the fastest selling album since Prince's 'Purple Rain' — owes a lot to kids and M.C. Hammer's 'You Can't Touch This' appeals to a lot of kids, too."

The timing and price of the rock-for-young movement is right, according to market analysts.

At last, Baby Boomers who cut their teeth on the Beatles and drove their parents nuts with the Rolling Stones have children who have reached the age of consumption. And according to research done by the J. Walter Thompson marketing firm, children between the ages of 5 and 14 account for \$6 billion a year in discretionary spending.

"It's the second Baby Boom, if you will," says Ralph King, president of Rincoon Records, producers of Barbie's album.

"We saw a potential market and, from the research, it was apparent that these kids were very active in terms of entertainment buying, that there was a strong appeal to them for music and products that they perceived to be more credible and a little more grown up."

And parents who grow up loving rock are also likely to pay for entertainment in the form of rock music for their kids, Grein points out.

Blum confirms that her kids — ages 1, 3 and 5 — listen to music "because of their father. ... They know certain Rolling Stones songs — and they have the disc from the Turtle movie."

Although there were acts appealing to the young bunch in the 1960s, such as the Archies, and later cartoon-rockers such as Josie and the Pussycats, Grein thinks the real impetus for the new young rock came when acts that drew pre-teens began selling big.

"Three years ago, with the success of Tiffany and Debbie Gibson, who had multimillion selling albums and a long string of hits, I think people began catching on. It's a natural extension of the market," he said.

"I call it 'tot rock,'" says Leber, one of the producers of the Turtle group.

"It's becoming quite the thing because they've grown up watching MTV and music has been part of their lives and their parents' lives."

"My parents never played rock, they played classical music."

# 'Northern Exposure' leaves dog days, attracts following with offbeat tales

How many series can you name that premiered in the dog days of summer and actually went on to become hits? Probably not many. But "Northern Exposure" (now airing Mondays on CBS) may join the elite group. In its first outing, it led people to hurry home to watch it and start asking around to see if anyone else had heard of it. The series focuses on a graduate of Columbia University Medical School who moves to Alaska to repay that state, which financed his medical education. The die-hard New Yorker experiences severe culture shock up in Cicely, Alaska, which is about as far from Broadway as one can get. The series stars Rob Morrow, Barry Corbin, John Cullum and Janine Turner.

"When I first got the script, it looked to me like the characters had someplace to go," booms Corbin, who plays Maurice Minnick on the series. "Mostly (when you look at a script) you know exactly what will happen."

It's hard to know exactly what will happen on "Northern Exposure," a show renowned for its quirkiness. "My character is a man with very definite standards," says Corbin. "I also like him because he's a little unpredictable, a little crazy. There's an element of danger there. You don't know what he might do."

But it's the moral values of the series to which Corbin keeps returning. "People are interested in seeing positive moral standards," he says in his Texas drawl. "There's nobody (on the series) who is venal or corrupt. They might not have your standards or my standards, but they have definite standards."

But what Corbin really likes about the show is that the characters — and the town — are not mainstream. "I'm drawn to shows that take place on the outskirts of society," he explains. "At heart I'm a frontier person. I think most people are. We don't want to give up our modern conveniences, like our computers, but we do have this romantic frontier longing."

This season, Corbin says cryptically that Maurice will get to see some

of his romantic longings satisfied. "He's not as taken up in global concerns," Corbin explains. "We get more tied up in his own peccadilloes. We get to explore his sex life. It's kind of interesting. The focus this season is on the personal problems of the people."

If the season opener was any indication, the people will remain as offbeat as ever: The whole town banded together to help Joel (Morrow) get over being jilted by his fiancée. They enacted a "psychodrama" so he could move on with his life. That's not typical sitcom fare.

The hardest thing to do, Corbin confides, is to keep the show's quirkiness from slipping into stereotypes. "It would be easy for my character to become a caricature," he says. "Maurice is painted in very broad strokes. You have to make him sur-

prising, so you have to play against what's written, in a way."

Corbin remembers one such unexpected moment with pride. "It was the second or third episode (last summer)," he says. "It was when I took over the radio station, and I talked about Walt Whitman and how important it is to have heroes. That really crystallized the character for me. That was one of my favorites."

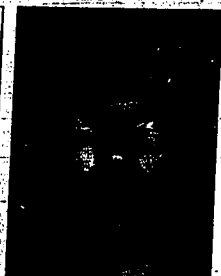

# NBC declares victory in '90-'91 season; CBS claims ratings momentum for fall

NEW YORK — NBC, as predicted, won the networks' 1990-'91 TV season ratings race in a photo finish that separated first, second and third by less than half a point, network executives said Tuesday.

NBC won its sixth consecutive season, finishing with a 12.7 overall rating, ABC's average rating was 12.5 and CBS' 12.3 rating. Each network had 21 shows, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co.

NBC was satisfied with the win, but CBS had a plan to best it, said Robert Niles, NBC's vice president for research.

It was the tightest three-way contest since 1964, when three tenths of a point separated the finishers, and the second tightest in the history of network television, network executives said.

The Fox Broadcasting Co., which regularly supplies four nights of prime-time programming each week, finished with a 6.4 average.

NBC drew 372,400 more TV households for the season that ended Sunday night than did CBS. Yet CBS, with its ratings up two-tenths of a point, or 2 percent, had the only ratings increase, said those could claim "momentum" for fall.

"Put it in perspective, it was the first time in four years that any network increased its ratings from season to season," said David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research and planning.

The last time was the 1986-'87 season, when NBC also went up two-tenths of a point, he said.

"It is the first time CBS' ratings have gone up from season to season since 1980," he said, noting that ABC had had a season-to-season ratings increase since 1978.

The season's top-rated show was NBC's "Cheers," with a 21.0 rating and 34 share. It was the first time a comedy show has been No. 1 in its ninth year on the air. Only the western "Bonanza" hit No. 1 in its ninth season.

"Cheers" was No. 1 for 18 weeks of the season. CBS' second-ranked

"60 Minutes" news magazine show topped the ratings for seven weeks.

ABC's "Roseanne" was third, followed by NBC's "A Different World."

"The Cosby Show" on NBC was fifth, ABC's "NFL Monday Night Football" finished sixth, followed by the network's popular "America's Funniest Home Videos."

The No. 8 slot for the season was occupied by the make-believe TV news room of CBS' "Murphy Brown." In a three-way tie for ninth place was NBC's "Empty Nest," CBS' "Designing Women" and ABC's "America's Funniest People."

Overall, NBC finished first 15 times in the 30-week season. ABC claimed eight weekly wins followed by CBS with seven.

NBC delivered three of the top five shows for the sixth straight year, as well as five of the top ten shows and eight of the top 20, Niles said.

The top-rated made-for-TV movie was CBS' "Sarah, Plain and Tall," with a 23.1 rating and a 35 share. NBC's starring of "Three Men and a Cradle" was No. 11.

"Baby" was the season's top-rated theatrical movie, with a 19.0 rating and a 31 share.

One rating point equals 2.1 million television households in the Nielsen universe. A share is the percentage of TV sets in use that are tuned to a show in its time period.

No network produced a new sitcom hit series, and the audience continued to erode, with the three networks accounting for their lowest percentage of the prime-time audience, 65 percent, down from 65 percent in the 1989-'90 season.

Niles pegged the smallest blow to CNN's late-winter sports coverage for the "Gulf War." PBS' acclaimed "Civil War" series and Fox Broadcasting Co.'s "Billingsley" gave nights of programming a boost.

"CBS is up, but not too far," he said at a level that would still mean "momentum," Niles said.

Poltrack, however, said CBS had overtaken ABC's lead in program advertisers' first most desirable CBS is now tied for first place in total adult delivery with NBC.

## ABC sends 'Twin Peaks' back to hiatus

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Twin Peaks, television's most critically acclaimed and least watched series, is going into hiatus for a second time, ABC announced Thursday.

The series, a dreamlike chronicle of inappropriate behavior among moody residents of a Pacific Northwest lumber town, will leave the air next Thursday, just as it did in February.

Last month, however, ABC revived the low-rated cult hit with six original episodes left to air. Now there are two.

The two remaining original episodes will air as an ABC Monday Night Movie on Monday, June 10, said ABC spokeswoman Janice Grotenboer.

The fate of 'Twin Peaks' as far as returning as a series next fall will be determined when we announce our fall schedule in late May, she said.

The quirky series' midseason replacement created by film director

David Lynch and producer Mark Frost, won critical acclaim in April 8, 1990, debut but his initial 33 percent share of the TV audience steadily eroded.

"David is in the middle of editing the last hour of 'Twin Peaks.' We're on schedule and on time as far as

delivering the show," said Michael Salzman, a spokesman for Lynch-Frost Productions.

Production wrapped on the last episode three weeks ago, he said, so there is no way to adapt the series' story line to its current circumstances.
