U.S. orders Iraqis away from camps

WASHINGTON — The United States on Thursday threatened to "take whatever steps are necessary" if Iraq balks at an ultimatum for the withdrawal of its security forces from the refugee zone in northern Iraq.

Within hours, Iraq said it had pulled out most of its troops. President Bush called the withdrawal announcement "encouraging. ... It's a very good development."

Saturday is the deadline for the pullout, an administration source said. The White

House refused to pinpoint any timing beyond "early this weekend."

U.S. officials said they believed the Iraqis would comply but added that American troops were prepared for a showdown.

"There should be no doubt in their minds about what the outcome would be," Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said. "We've got sufficient forces in the area so that there's no question but that we would prevail."

Cheney said about 7,000 American troops already are in northern Iraq and across the border in Turkey and the United

States "may well deploy additional forces." In Baghdad, Iraqi Prime Minister Saddam Hammadi said of the withdrawal order, "We believe that (neither) the United States nor any other country has a right to ask Iraq to do such a thing."

But at the United Nations, the Iraqi ambassador said after a meeting with his U.S. counterpart that all Iraqi soldiers had left the northern town of Zakhwo, and all but 50 policemen were leaving in accordance with an agreement between Baghdad and the allies.

"The Iraqi authorities will be more than willing to cooperate and pacify, in the

proper sense of the word, the town and accelerate the humanitarian assistance given to the Kurds in the area," said Ambassador Abdul Amir al-Anbari.

At the White House, presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said, "They've said they're going to comply. ... We're glad that they've accepted this plan and we look forward to seeing it fully implemented."

U.S. officials have said the presence of Iraqi security forces in the Zakhwo area is deterring the Kurds from leaving their mountain strongholds and

Severe drought for area

TWIN FALLS — The federal Bureau of Reclamation has assigned its most extreme drought rating to much of the Magic Valley, with the worst problems in the Wood River drainage.

But the agency says there probably will be adequate storage in the Snake River reservoirs of its Minidoka Project that supply water to canal companies in south-central Idaho.

"The reservoirs are not expected to fill completely and the irrigation water should be generally adequate, but tight," the bureau said in its annual spring water supply report for the West, released Thursday.

"People who use storage water are probably going to be OK," said John Keyes, III, director of the agency's Boise regional office. "Those folks who don't are probably going to be out by mid-July."

The Palmer index, which includes factors the bureau uses to measure relative drought conditions, points to near-record dryness, said Keyes. The agency studies weekly precipitation totals, weekly average temperatures, moisture content of the soil, evaporation rates and uses historical records.

The Bureau of Reclamation report says that as of April 6 there was extreme drought on the north side of the Snake River from Lake Walcott to Glens Ferry, in most of Cassia County and in the Wood River drainage. Moderate to severe drought conditions existed in Twin Falls, Owyhee and Elko counties, the agency reported.

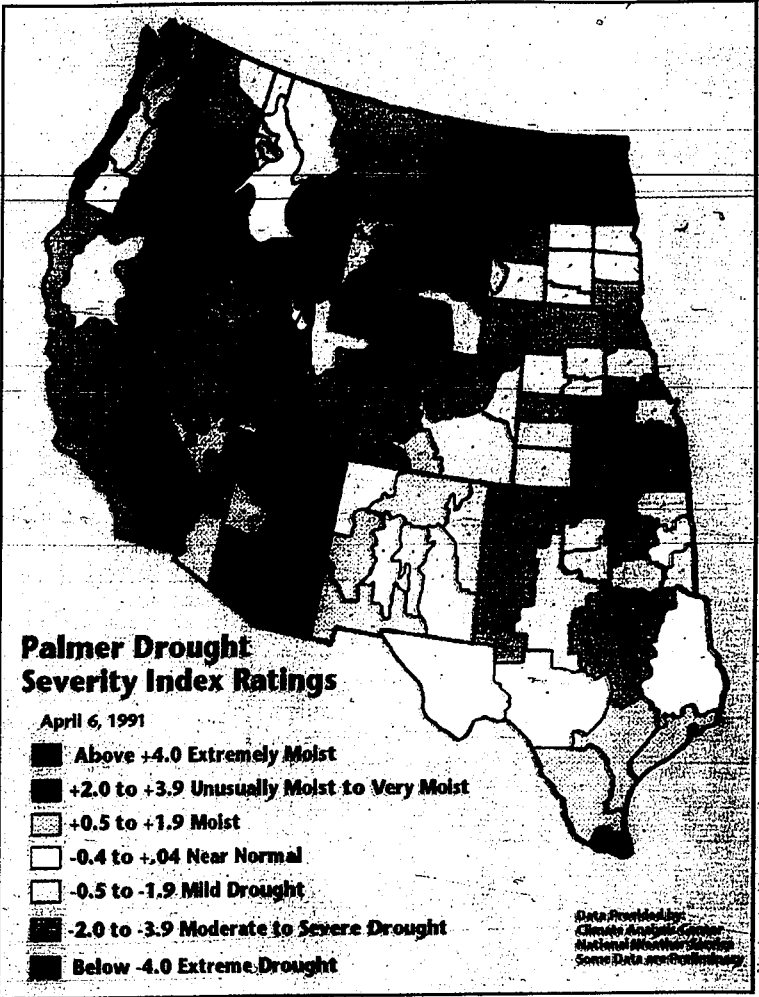
"The Palmer index is designed to give a total picture," said Keyes. "It covers everything but water storage."

The bureau said March precipitation in the upper Snake River Basin was 150 percent of normal. Total seasonal precipitation through March was 77 percent of normal.

April 1 snowpack in the basin was 78 percent of normal, and storage at the end of March in the project was 65 percent of capacity, or 85 percent of normal.

But even if enough rain and snow have fallen in the Wyoming Rockies to keep Magic Valley irrigators in business, there is very little moisture either in the snowpack

Dead Americans receive \$5 million every month

WASHINGTON — You may not be able to take it with you, but that doesn't stop the federal government from sending almost \$5 million a month to dead Americans, according to recent federal audits.

A computerized match-up of death records and benefit payments found that dead Americans were sent \$4.3 million in one month by the Defense Department, the Labor Department, the Railroad Retirement Board and the Office of Personnel Management.

A separate study uncovered an additional \$475,000 in payments by the Department of Veterans Affairs to 1,212 dead people, according to the General Accounting Office, Congress' investigative arm, which did both audits.

"Several federal agencies erroneously pay millions of dollars to deceased beneficiaries because they lack a timely, effective way to detect unreported deaths and curtail payments," the GAO concluded in a report sent to Capitol Hill in February.

The Social Security Administration already collects death information from the states, which are required by law to record death certificates. However, the information is not widely shared, nor is it used quickly enough to weed out the dead from benefit rolls, according to the GAO.

At the GAO's urging, the House Ways and Means Committee has assembled a working group to study the issue and develop how Social Security's Master Death File, as it is called, could be shared quickly with all branches of government, a congressional staffer said Thursday.

But to a watchdog citizens group, the solution seems obvious. "This doesn't seem to be a very difficult problem to solve. It's just simply a question of the right hand knowing what the left hand is doing," said Bill Pierce, spokesman for the non-profit National Taxpayers Union, a 200,000-member organization in Washington.

Drop in Idaho abortions 2nd fastest in nation

WASHINGTON — The number of abortions in Idaho is dropping faster than in any state in the nation except South Dakota, according to a new national study.

Only South Dakota had a sharper decline in abortions between 1980 and 1987, according to researchers at the federal Centers for Disease Control and The Alan Guttmacher Institute.

"Part of the problem is that there aren't a lot of (abortion) providers," said Linda King White, executive director of Planned Parenthood of Idaho. "There is probably more disapproval of abortion in Idaho than in some places and that impacts physicians who might perform the service and people who might seek the service."

According to the study published

Thursday in the Guttmacher Institute's Family Planning Perspectives, Idaho had an abortion rate of 8.5 per 1,000 women in 1987, down 33.1 percent in seven years.

The number of abortions dropped 8.2 percent nationally during the same period.

Idaho's abortion rate per 1,000 women in 1980 was 12.7.

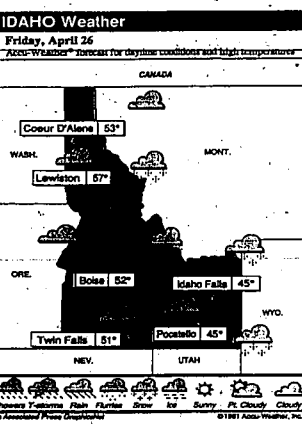
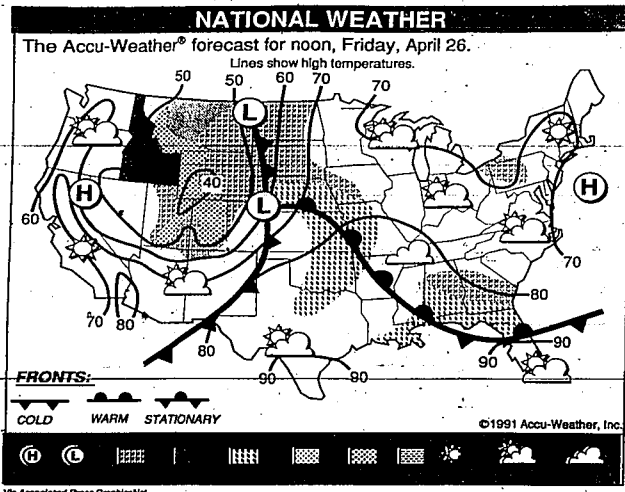
"We've seen a decline since 1983," said Kerry Uhlenkott, legislative coordinator for Right-to-Life of Idaho, passed the parental notice law. We know it's being enforced here in Idaho."

Under that law, parents of women under the age of 18 must be contacted when the woman seeks an abortion.

"When the rate is going down, one of the factors may be that more women are going out of state because the number of providers dropped," said Susan Tew.

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says a cold low pressure center continued to drift southeast across the Pacific Northwest, prompting a winter storm warning for the eastern Idaho mountains through Thursday night.

This center was expected to move east of the state today and conditions should gradually improve. Another weather system will move through over the weekend.

Precipitation was heavy in the eastern mountains Thursday, while valley amounts were mostly light. Grandville reported one of the largest valley amounts with around four-tenths of an inch.

Winds of 15 to 25 mph were common across the state with stronger gusts near showers.

Temperatures continued to show a downward trend with most readings in the 30s and 40s. The extremes varied from 32 degrees at McCall to 49 at Salmon and Halley.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 57 degrees at Hagerman. Dixie reported the coldest at 23 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 95 degrees at Laredo, Texas. The lowest was 25 degrees at Gunnison, Colo.

Thunderstorms drench South as snow falls across West

Thunderstorms rolled across the South with heavy rain and high wind Thursday while a snowstorm blew through the northern mountains of the West.

At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended from the northern half of the Florida Peninsula across the Florida Panhandle, southern Georgia, southern Alabama and southern Mississippi.

Wind gusts to 63 during a thunderstorm at Largo, Fla., and rain was described as binding, the National Weather Service said.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT included 3.43 inches at the New Orleans Naval Air Station; 3.05 inches at Apalachicola, Fla.; 1.32 inches at Biloxi, Miss.; 1.23 inches at Panama City, Fla.; and 1.21 inches at Mobile, Ala.

Rain also reached from north-central Texas across southern Oklahoma, and from central and northeastern Missouri into southeastern Iowa and southwestern Illinois. Showers, with snow at higher elevations, extended from southwestern Montana across western Wyoming; eastern Idaho and northern Utah, as well as southwestern Oregon and northern California.

About 2 inches of snow fell overnight at Owyhee, Nev., and about 2 inches fell near Elko, Nev. Two to 5 inches of snow fell overnight and during the morning across northwestern Wyoming. As much as 8 inches fell in Yellowstone National Park.

Twelve to 18 inches of snow was possible in the mountains of northern Utah, with 4 to 12 inches possible in the mountains of eastern Idaho.

A winter storm warning was in effect through Friday over the mountains of northwest Wyoming and over much of southwestern Montana.

Winter storm watches were in effect through Friday over the northern and central mountains of Colorado, the mountains of northern and southern Wyoming and western and central Montana.

Heavy snow fell during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT was 3 inches at Grandville, Idaho, and 1 inch at Austin, Nev.

or in prospect for south-central Idaho.

"It's going to be extremely dry throughout the region, and that's assuming we get normal rainfall from here on out," said Keyes. "In our area, there are two areas that are in tough shape - south-central Oregon and the drainages of the Boise, Lost and Wood rivers in Idaho."

The Big Wood Canal Co., which draws its water from the Wood River drainage, has 60 to 80 days of irrigation water accumulated, manager Dick Oneida said Thursday. That's assuming it gets the runoff it expects, he said.

"We are still quite a bit short, but we are in better shape than we were the first of March," said Oneida. "We had a 20 percent water deficit in March, but it is over 60 percent

now."

Both Oneida and Keyes said heavy precipitation in the last six weeks has helped, but Keyes said it would take record-breaking rainfall in May and June to break the drought.

"The soil is so dry that it would take several hundred percent of normal precipitation from here on out to bring us up to normal," he said.

Party leaders reject Gorbachev offer to resign as their chairman

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union's Communist leadership decided Thursday to keep Mikhail S. Gorbachev as party chief, despite hours of criticism that prompted him to offer to quit.

The demands for Gorbachev's removal ended in "a crisis of nerves on all sides," said Alexander A. Pomorov, a regional Communist Party leader from Siberia.

The hard-liners at the closed session spent the morning blaming the Soviet president for the nation's protracted political and economic crisis, delegates said.

In his closing remarks to delegates, Gorbachev said it had been one of the "sharpest plenums ever. It was impossible to expect anything else," the Interfax news agency quoted him as saying.

The hard-liners demanded Gorbachev declare a state of emergency to restore order, which he had already rejected on Wednesday, the first day of the meeting.

Russian republic Communist boss Ivan Polozkov said Gorbachev had "abandoned the party," according to one delegate.

For two hours, Gorbachev endured tongue-lashings from 18 delegates, and many urged him to resign, Interfax said.

Then, in a tactic he has used before, Gorbachev forced the issue. The chairman of the Soviet Communist Party said he had had enough of the endless attacks and made what one delegate said was a "half-serious" offer to resign if the Central Committee took a vote of no-confidence.

A letter signed by 72 Central Committee members was circulated during an ensuing break in the meeting, saying the resignation of the party leader was a matter for the

the party's Congress, not a Central Committee meeting, Interfax reported.

If the Central Committee insisted on pursuing Gorbachev's resignation, the 72 signers threatened to convene the Congress to elect a new Central Committee, said Interfax, an independent news agency.

Also during the break, the party Politburo met and unanimously decided that Gorbachev's resignation should not be considered, said Valentin Falin, head of the party's international department.

The Central Committee then voted 322-13 against pursuing the idea, Falin told a news conference.

"Those of us who work with him side-by-side certainly found a lot of human sincerity when he spoke about his resignation," Falin said.

Kazakhstan President Nursultan Nazarbayev described the bid to remove Gorbachev from his post as "an explosion by the (party) apparatus, which does not reflect the opinion of the people and the members of the party," Interfax said.

Thursday's criticism came one day after Gorbachev announced an agreement with nine republic chiefs, including his main rival, Boris Yeltsin.

Cheney favors widening roles for women in nation's military

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney on Thursday suggested he favors expanding the role of women in the U.S. military, but he stopped short of endorsing an advisory panel's recommendation to drop a ban on women in combat roles.

Cheney said women already are "an extremely important part of our capability."

"I would expect they would continue to play an important role in the future, perhaps an even more important role in terms of the number of assignments they're given," Cheney said at a Pentagon news conference. He was not more specific.

The defense secretary said he had not yet seen the recommendation of

the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services. The panel on Wednesday recommended to Cheney that he support the repeal of laws and Defense Department policies barring women from combat roles.

Cheney said he would stick to existing laws and policies regarding women in combat for the time being.

"Whether we want to adopt a recommendation to the Congress to change it, I just can't give you an answer today," he said.

In its recommendation, the advisory panel said the repeal of laws excluding women from combat roles would make ability rather than gender the basis for assignments. It also would give women a better chance at promotions, the panel said.

"The events in the Persian Gulf demonstrated that the entire theater of operation is part of the modern battlefield, where exposure to the risks of combat extended to all members of the armed forces," the panel's report said.

The panel also asked that the Pentagon provide a written report on the participation of women in the Gulf War and Operation Desert Shield, which preceded the war.

"This is the first time that large numbers of women have served in a wide spectrum of roles in a combat theater," the panel's report said.

About 35,000 women served in the war and the months-long buildup in Saudi Arabia, according to the Pentagon's Directorate of Defense Information. That is about 9 percent of the total U.S. military deployment in the gulf.

assistant director of communications for the Guttmacher Institute. "In a state as rural as Idaho, two providers may make a difference."

In 1985, Idaho had 11 abortion providers and 20 percent of Idaho women seeking abortions went out of state. In 1988, there were nine providers and out-of-state abortions rose to 28 percent.

Idaho's culture is also a factor, said Randall Terry, national director of Operation Rescue, an anti-abortion group.

"The state has a very strong pro-life bent," Terry said. "It was one of

the first states after the Webster decision to attempt to pass strong pro-life legislation."

In the Webster vs. Reproductive Services decision of July 1989, the U.S. Supreme Court gave the states the power to limit women's access to abortion.

Nine months later, the Idaho Legislature passed House Bill 625, at the time the most restrictive abortion law in the nation. Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed it.

White said the number of women in Idaho who sought contraception grew 12 percent between 1984 and

1989, but that such growth did not factor into the reduced number of abortions.

"I think it's not real significant in terms of the abortion rate," White said. "I would like to hope it has had an effect, but it's hard to prove cause and effect."

There were a total of 1,980 abortions in Idaho in 1987, the most recently available statistics used by the CDC. Nationally there were about 1.6 million abortions performed in 1987, creating an abortion rate of 26.9 per 1,000, down from 29.3 per 1,000 in 1980.

Persian Gulf

Saddam neutralizes Kurds, but he may be buying time

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Saddam Hussein appears to have neutralized Iraq's Kurdish rebels, a thorn in Baghdad's side for decades, in his drive to cling to power in the post-Gulf War turbulence that has swept his nation.

But the country's majority Shiite Muslims alienated by Saddam's ruthless suppression of their own ill-fated revolt, remain a potent threat he cannot afford to ignore.

A tentative agreement to give the Kurds the autonomy for which they have struggled for so many decades has given Saddam breathing space as he tries to hold his rivaled country together with himself at its head.

Yet big problems remain, apart from the festering hostility of the Shiites who make up 55 percent of Iraq's 17 million people. Their shrines in the southern cities of Karbala and Najaf were battered by the army.

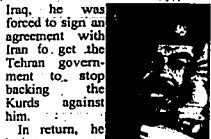
Western correspondents who have visited Iraq's battle zones said the damage in the south outstrips anything seen in the Kurdish north.

Saddam will have to contend with growing demands for political reforms, the awesome task of rebuilding Iraq and its shattered economy, overcoming a humiliating peace treaty with the U.S.-led coalition that liberated Kuwait and preventing the despair of many Iraqis from degenerating into hostility.

The televised hugs and kisses exchanged by Saddam and the Kurdish chiefs Wednesday in Baghdad cannot mask the deep hatred and distrust between them.

Saddam has a history of making agreements when he's in a jam and tearing them up when he's in a position of strength. And not just with the Kurds.

In 1975, when he was vice president and wielded the real power in

Iraq, he was forced to sign an agreement with Iran to get the Tehran government to stop backing the Kurds against him.

In return, he had to agree to share sovereignty of the Shatt-al-Arab waterway, formed by the confluence of the Euphrates and Tigris rivers and Iraq's main outlet to the Persian Gulf.

It was a humiliation he never forgot. Five years later, he went on state television and physically tore up that agreement.

Five days after that, his armored divisions invaded Iran, setting off a war that lasted eight years and killed more than a half-million people before it ended in stalemate.

By all accounts, many Kurds are deeply uneasy about Wednesday's

tentative agreement in Baghdad, which grants the Kurds more autonomy than they've had before.

"Kurdish people have a bitter experience with Saddam. He's only doing this to try to get back into the international community," said Kawwa Rashid, spokesman for the Iraqi Kurdistan Front in London.

Kamal Mirhadi, director of the Kurdish Information Project in London, noted that Jalal Talabani, leader of the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan, negotiated a cease-fire with Saddam in 1983-84.

"But nothing came from the Iraqis. It was all empty promises," he said.

Talabani and Massoud Barzani, leader of the Kurdistan Democratic Front, the other main Kurdish movement, both know from experience how far Saddam can be trusted. They have repeatedly said he has reneged on earlier accords in the Kurdish homeland, an autonomous homeland in northern Iraq.

Both Saddam and the Kurds were

forced to bargain because both had been weakened.

In the past, Saddam has relied on brute force and handsome handouts to keep the lid on in Iraq.

Now his army has been largely shattered. It remains a formidable force internally, but the twin uprisings by the Kurds and the Shiites in March showed that he could not fight rebels on two fronts.

He had to crush the Shiites in the south before they could take on the Kurds. He also had to mobilize the Mujaheden Khalq, the main Iranian opposition group whose 15,000-man army is based in Iraq, to bolster his depleted army.

The Kurds acknowledge they cannot topple Saddam alone. Saddam knows from experience he can't completely crush the Kurds in their mountain strongholds and can't afford to leave them gnawing away at his power.

Saddam also needs to get U.S. and Western troops out of northern Iraq, where they are protecting the Kurds

in their "safe havens" to avoid another damaging confrontation.

In recent weeks, Saddam has made a show of being more politically flexible and has promised democratic reforms.

He has relinquished the largely symbolic post of prime minister and installed a new government under a Shiite, Saadoun Hammadi. But at the same time he retained hard-line associates such as Interior Minister Gen. Ali Hussen al-Majid.

He has given his rule a veneer of democracy by referring key decisions to parliament, generally seen as a rubber-stamp body, for approval.

Analysts believe much of this is cosmetic, designed to deflect internal and external criticism and spread the responsibility if anything else goes wrong.

By allowing Hammadi a high profile for instance, critics believe Saddam is simply setting him up as the fall guy if things deteriorate.

U.S. shedding 'Great Satan' image in Iran

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — The anti-American slogans on the walls of the old U.S. Embassy are fading.

Business is slow at a bookshop selling documents from the former embassy, which Iranians know as the "nest of spies."

Washington might still be a "warmonger" to many Iranians but the United States is no longer the "Great Satan."

Iran's virulent anti-Americanism, like the most radical aspects of its Islamic Revolution, is in retreat.

Criticism of Washington is muted in the press. Americans are welcomed openly in the streets: And in the bazaar, the dollar reigns supreme.

For the Iranian government of President Hashemi Rafsanjani, it's no easy task sanitizing Satan to people who've been fed a daily diet of rabid anti-Western slogans for more than a decade.

"How do you say the No. 1 enemy has lost his job? The people look at that and they see a contradiction," said a senior official, speaking on condition of anonymity. In universities, the Education Ministry is loosening its iron grip on a curriculum that since the revolution has been dominated by Islamic teachings and light on helping people understand the world beyond Iran's borders.

Kambiz Mahmoodzadeh, an English teacher at Tehran's Institute for Persian Culture and Foreign Languages, was told recently he could use tapes of Voice of America broadcasts in his classes.

A short while ago, his class saw a documentary criticizing Iran's taking of American hostages when the U.S. Embassy was stormed Nov. 4, 1979. Fifty-two Americans were held 444 days, prompting President Jimmy Carter to sever relations with Tehran.

"The religious men said this kind of stuff could separate my students from

their religious beliefs," said Mahmoodzadeh, who once worked for an American company. "I disagreed, and they let me continue."

On the governmental level, Iran has recently voiced support for an allied plan to set up temporary enclaves in Iraq for Kurds fleeing Saddam Hussein's crackdown.

The United States says it will give the Tehran government direct aid — the first since the revolution — to help Iran assist an estimated 1 million Kurdish refugees.

Rafsanjani heads Iran's so-called pragmatists who have been seeking to move the Islamic republic out of its isolation as a fundamentalist pariah since Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the architect of the revolution, died in June 1989.

Rafsanjani has gradually been easing Iran out of its religious straitjacket

and has eased aside the radicals who consider any deviation from "the path of Khomeini" betrayal and heresy.

To keep them at bay, Rafsanjani and other leaders have to spout anti-Western rhetoric every now and again.

But in an interview published Monday in Tehran's Etemad daily, Rafsanjani took what many said was an extremely soft line on the United States.

He admitted Iran is talking to the United States through a variety of channels — the World Court, the Swiss Embassy in Tehran and other third countries, such as Turkey.

One topic of discussion is likely Tehran's demand that Washington re-

lease about \$11 billion in Iranian assets frozen when relations were severed.

That's the general impression among the diplomatic community," said a senior diplomat said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

"We don't expect any major breakthroughs—but the direction toward improving ties is clear," the diplomat said.

However, most diplomats believe restoring relations with Washington is not yet just around the corner.

A major impediment is the continued captivity of six Americans by pro-Iranian Shiite fundamentalists in Lebanon. They are among 13 Westerners missing in Lebanon, most believed held by Shiites.

Rocky Flats plant still unsafe, officials told

GOLDEN, Colo. (AP) — The Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant is going ahead with plans to restart operations in some buildings though plant officials have been told by engineers the buildings are unsafe, according to sources at the plant and documents obtained by The Associated Press.

One source said a laboratory has a faulty air exchange system that could lead to plutonium-contaminated air flooding laboratories and offices in the event of an accident.

The source, an independent contractor hired to evaluate safety problems at Rocky Flats, spoke on condition of anonymity, as did some others interviewed for this story.

Among other warnings:

• The Department of Energy said in its 1992 budget request to Congress that poor equipment at Rocky Flats could hinder detection of some radioactive releases and fires. DOE officials said the needed repairs could cost \$100 million and take several years to finish.

• A member of a commission that oversees DOE operations said officials have not adequately studied the possibility of a chemical explosion in the laboratory building, which is known as Building 559.

• Bob Nelson, manager of the plant for the DOE, said recently that plans call for operations to resume later this year in Building 559, and also in a plutonium fabrication facility, Building 707.

He said operations would resume in other buildings later.

But the contractor and other sources knowledgeable about operations at Rocky Flats said serious problems remain in Building 559, Building 707 and other buildings. They said it would take at least two years to fix the problems — well be-

hind the time when DOE plans to restart operations.

Vic Stella, assistant-director of operations for the DOE, acknowledged recently that the DOE will not meet all federal guidelines before resuming operations. He said the agency will seek waivers for any federal regulations it cannot meet until the problems are fixed.

DOE had previously promised plutonium manufacturing at Rocky Flats would not resume until it is safe.

DOE officials failed to respond to repeated requests for comment by the AP over the past two months. Department spokeswoman Beth Brainerd was in a meeting Thursday and unavailable for comment.

Another DOE spokeswoman, Deb Smith, was quoted by The Denver Post on Thursday as conceding that the plant has shortcomings. She said Rocky Flats will resume plutonium production only in buildings where all safety problems are corrected.

"This is the reason we are starting it up one building at a time," she said.

The plant, which produces plutonium detonators for nuclear weapons, was shut down in December 1989 for maintenance and has not been allowed to reopen because of serious safety problems.

The DOE budget document reported that airborne-radioactivity testers at the plant do not meet department or National Environmental Policy Act standards, and there are not enough of them.

"Consequently," the budget request said, "environmental records are incomplete and the environmental monitoring program is difficult to monitor."

The budget document also said the current fire alarm system is outdated, overloaded and deteriorated. As a result, firefighters sometimes cannot

locate exact alarm sites, which "creates dangerous delays," the budget request said. In addition, it said, a public-address system to alert workers during emergencies failed to broadcast alarms 30 times after being triggered by radiation detection equipment or during testing.

In a memo obtained by the AP, one worker warned that Building 559, the laboratory building considered least contaminated and easiest to bring back into operation, presents a serious hazard to workers and to the environment.

The memo, written by consulting engineers, said the building does not meet federal nuclear specifications.

Building 559 is designed so that air pressure decreases in four zones leading to areas where radioactive materials are handled. In the event of

an explosion or accident, air supposedly would be drawn in from the outside and contaminated air would not be allowed to escape.

However, the engineering study showed the air supply is connected to laboratories, offices, occupied areas and utilities areas, and a separate analytical laboratory.

Airborne radioactivity "may present a substantial consequence to the workers and public," the engineer warned.

The independent contractor hired to review plant safety said it would take two years to replace the system, and there are no plans to do so.

In addition, the plant has not analyzed the chemicals in Building 559, and has no plans to do so before operations in the building resume, officials said.

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U.S. offering humanitarian aid to Hanoi

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the first time since the Vietnam War ended 16 years ago, the United States is offering a modest amount of humanitarian aid to Hanoi as a step toward improved relations, a State Department official said Thursday.

Richard Solomon, the assistant secretary of state for East Asia, said \$1 million in aid is being sent to pay for artificial limbs for Vietnamese citizens.

U.S. policy has long encouraged providing prosthetics to help Vietnamese war wounded.

Solomon told a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee that the small aid gesture was being made as part of an effort by Gen. John Vessey, the special U.S. emissary to Hanoi who deals with humanitarian issues and with the search for Americans missing in action since the war.

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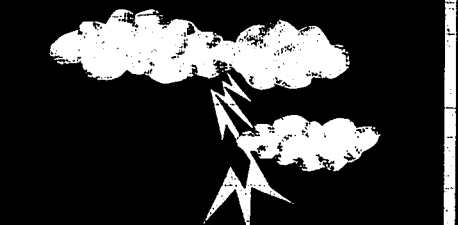

Pentagon puts in cost-saving measures

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon expects to save \$70 billion over the next six years with management changes designed to reduce wasteful duplication and red tape but also cut civilian and military jobs, officials said Thursday.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and his chief deputy, Donald Atwood, outlined a series of management changes that they said by 1995 will save the government \$13.6 billion a year. They said the total savings for 1991-97 will be \$70.9 billion. The changes, stemming from the Pentagon's two-year-old Defense Management Report, will lead to cuts of 44,000 military and 50,000 civilian jobs by 1997, they said.

Pentagon alters contracting schedule

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon has pushed back its schedule for the Strategic Defense Initiative by at least two years after congressional investigators found that millions of dollars would be paid to contractors for unproven designs. The General Accounting Office, in a report obtained Thursday by The Associated Press, found that testing at Lawrence Livermore Laboratory in California on the Brilliant Pebbles element of SDI would be conducted while contractor teams are still working on the theory.

O'Neill wages war for cancer research

WASHINGTON — Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill Jr., the former speaker of the House, returned to Capitol Hill on Thursday on a mission of mercy. The survivor of one bout with cancer who is now waging a valiant struggle against a second and even deadlier strain, O'Neill came to plead on the 20th anniversary of the War on Cancer for a rededication to the cause of cancer research.

"How many Americans know we're spending less now, in real dollars, for cancer research than we did in 1980?" O'Neill asked the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee.

Holding himself out as a "living example" of the value of research, O'Neill, 78, candidly recalled his successful struggle against colon-rectal cancer, which left him with a colostomy, in 1987.

Shultz defends Sununu's jet travel

WASHINGTON — Former Secretary of State George P. Shultz, the author of a policy that helped put Chief of Staff John Sununu on military jets, said Thursday the concept still makes sense.

"In my opinion, if he is going to travel, he should travel on the government," Shultz said. But should Sununu have traveled so much? "It's not for me to say," Shultz said. Shultz's 1987 memo to then-President Reagan — suggesting that the chief of staff and national security adviser fly on military aircraft at all times — has been repeatedly cited by the White House in defense of Sununu's frequent travel.

Weather satellite edges eastward

WASHINGTON (AP) — The satellite that provides those popular photos of the nation's weather began edging its way eastward Thursday, getting ready for hurricane season. The satellite, known as GOES-7, positioned in the sky 22,300 miles above the Earth, will shift about 10 degrees of longitude eastward.

The move will allow it to see more of the Atlantic Ocean, where tropical storms form.

Located above the equator, the satellite's current position is at 108 degrees west longitude, about the same as western New Mexico. The move will bring it to 98 degrees, roughly south of Austin, Texas.

The move is done slowly to conserve fuel, and so it will take some three months for the satellite to arrive at its new position.

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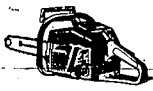
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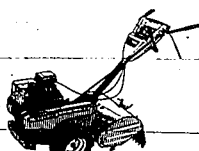
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Citizen advocacy group criticizes nuclear plants

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's nuclear power plants reported nearly 2,000 safety-related incidents last year, reflecting continuing safety risks, a citizen advocacy group said Thursday. But industry officials said the numbers were lower than previous years, showing steady safety improvements.

Public Citizen, a non-profit advocacy group founded by Ralph Nader, said the 111 commercial nuclear reactors in the United States had 1,921 safety-related incidents last year that had to be reported to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Among those incidents were 177 in which plants had to be immediately shut down, 894 cases in which there were violations of federal safety regulations and 404 safety system failures, the group said.

The number of incidents in which there was concern about a potential threat to the health and safety of the public declined from 85 in 1989 to 38 last year, according to the group's review of NRC records.

Nevertheless, report co-author David Trickett said the statistics show there is "an on-going risk of a Chernobyl-scale accident in this country." He was referring to the major Soviet nuclear accident in 1986. NRC spokesman Joe Fouchard didn't dispute the statistics. However, he said the agency believes the atomic power plants "are safer today than

they've ever been" because of increased scrutiny by both the industry and federal regulators.

"There's been steady improvements in the last few years," Fouchard said. "Our performance indicators show automatic shutdowns are down, safety system interruptions are down, significant events are down, collective radiation exposures are down."

The Public Citizen report covers 14 categories from incident reports and safety system failures to operation costs and amount of hazardous waste generated.

Using those criteria and giving each numerical values, the group ranked the 111 reactors based on performance in both 1989 and 1990.

According to the Public Citizen ranking, the five worst plants were: Brunswick Unit 2 in Southport, N.C.; Arkansas Unit 1 in Russellville, Ark.; Peach Bottom Unit 2 in Peach Bottom, Pa.; Surry Unit 1 in Gravel Neck, Va.; and Oyster Creek Unit 1 in Tom River, N.J.

The best were Prairie Island Units I and II near Minneapolis; Seabrook Unit I in Seabrook, N.H.; Byron Unit I near Joliet, Ill. However, officials representing both the nuclear industry and the NRC said such rankings were misleading because they give equal weight to criteria other than safety issues.

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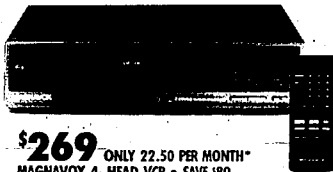
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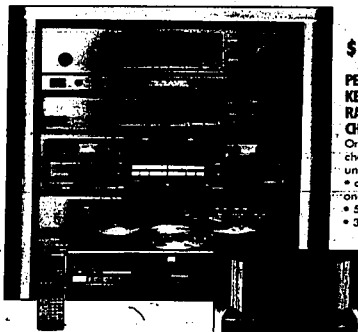
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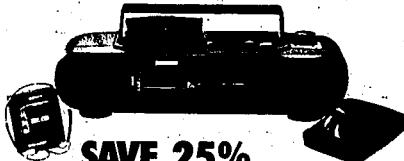
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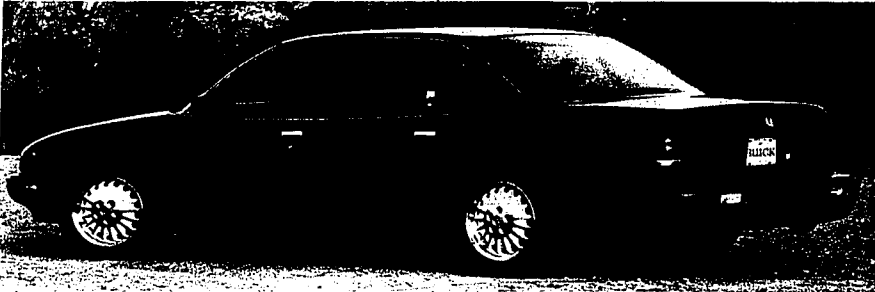
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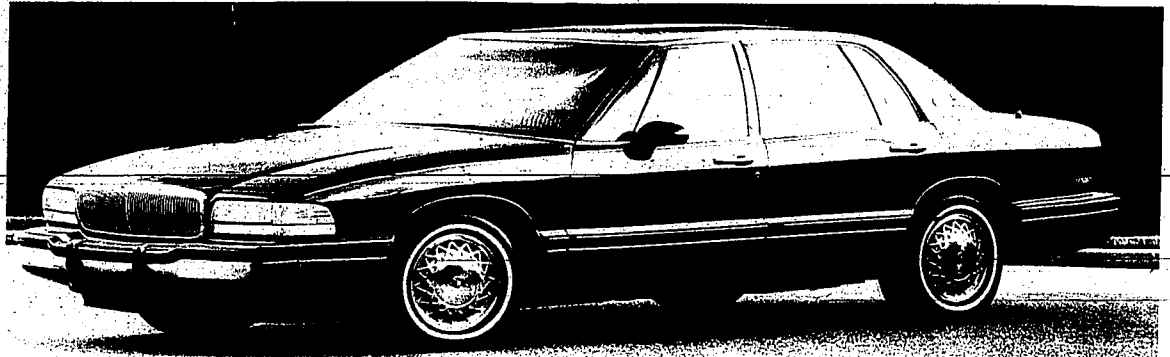
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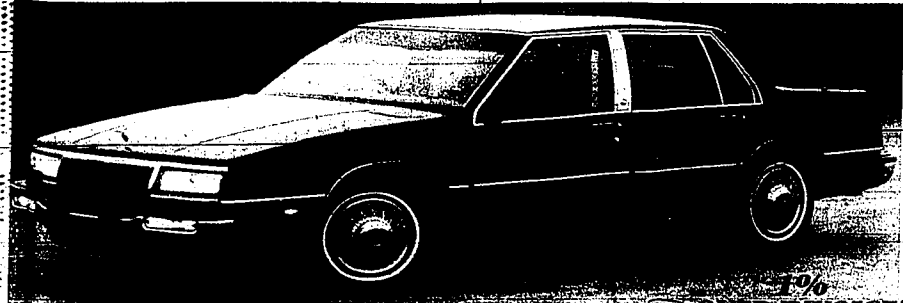
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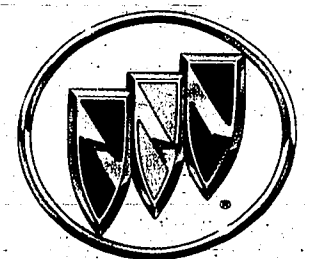

Building proposal offers multitude of opportunities

The proposed building design chosen by the Twin Falls School Board this week is a cornucopia of opportunity.

The 280,000-square-foot high school contains the physical necessities for a wide selection of innovative and ambitious education programs. The sciences, vocational technology, music, drama, physical education—all would have the space and facilities for learning opportunities that are only a dream of today.

But space, of course, is not everything. A spacious and well-equipped laboratory does not guarantee well-taught young scientists. Nor does a grand auditorium guarantee graduates who appreciate the performing arts.

Such things require a long-range commitment from the adults who can influence youngsters' education. Teachers, administrators, school board members. And, yes, taxpayers.

If Twin Falls voters agree next month to spend \$20 million on this proposal, they and their education leaders also must dedicate themselves to filling it with the high-quality education programs our youngsters deserve.

The board and administration have been encouraged to assemble that sort of curriculum; they'll need the community's long-term encouragement (and perhaps, occasionally, insistence) to remain dedicated to the task.

For the moment, though, let's look at the building.

The board picked a two-story design, a wise choice, for it means the school takes up less land, and it means greater energy efficiency.

Skeptics may question the building's sheer size. After all, it would be bigger than the district's existing high school and Robert Stuart Junior High School combined.

Remember, though, that it would need to house four grades, not three. And a new school should be like a child's new winter coat. Frugal parents buy one winter for growth.

Furthermore, a high school for the 21st century needs special spaces for education that goes beyond the Three R's. This building promises some fine ones:

• An agricultural laboratory, where students can engage in hands-on study of the industry that fuels their hometown's economic engine.

• Labs for automotive, building and manufacturing technologies, where students can begin practical training for careers in those fields.

• Practice rooms where young musicians can master those tough passages in seclusion.

• A 600-seat auditorium for dramatic and musical performances. This facility is a far superior alternative to a 2,000-seat option the board rejected.

It's big enough for almost any conceivable audience, without being extravagant.

Along with its value to the school, the auditorium will be an asset to the broader community. Twin Falls has long needed a mid-sized public auditorium.

• Greenhouses. Along with the traditional science laboratories, the building's design allows sunny enclosures that will let students observe plant growth, instead of only reading about it. Another appropriate feature in an agriculturally dependent region.

In our view, the plan's one weakness is an overemphasis on athletic facilities.

The addition of this plan's facilities would mean that, among the new high school, the old one and the two existing junior highs, there would be six gymnasiums—including two large, competition-oriented ones. The district will have four all-weather tracks.

Programs tend to follow structures. That is, how schools are built influences how they are used.

The athletic facilities in this plan suggest that resources and faculty attention will continue to focus disproportionately on a relatively few students—a pattern that deserves re-evaluation in schools here as well as throughout the nation.

But aside from that, the design is, in our view, worthy of the support the board gave it last week.

We urge the board—and the community—to give similar support to the educational advancements that will make this proposal a reality.

Congress should go on pork-free diet

Rest easy, taxpayers. Five-hundred-thousand of your hard-earned dollars won't go bubbling out of the National Park Service's 1991 budget. Turn back! Let's welcome Welk's North Dakota birthplace into a tourist attraction after all.

Embarrassed by news stories about the proposed Welk pork chop, the House of Representatives voted last month to rescind the appropriation. Congress did, however, let stand a \$320,000 grant to restore the home of President William McKinley's in-laws in Canton, Ohio.

Canton hoteliers and restaurateurs undoubtedly are already gearing up for the expected business boom. Surely visitors to the city's main tourist mecca, the Pro Football Hall of Fame, now will insist on extending their stay in order to check out McKinley's mother-in-law's doilies.

Just another example of your federal tax dollars at work.

It may be hard for the average American to grasp the notion that Washington's pork barrel is still filled to the brim even in a period of economic recession, rising unemployment and incomprehensible trade and budget deficits.

But it is sadly and painfully true. The process that permits well-placed members of Congress to attach their pet projects to spending bills is thriving, even though most congressmen give eloquent lip service to cutting waste and fat out of the \$1.4 trillion federal budget.

The most shameless practitioner of this dubious art is surely Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W. Va., who was dubbed the "Prince of Pork" by Newsweek magazine. Last week, Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Byrd hacked off a juicy rump roast from the District of Columbia and shipped it home to "almost Heaven."

The \$185-million Federal Bureau of Investigation fingerprinting center and the Bureau of Public Debt (along with 3,000 government jobs) henceforth will receive their mail in the Mountain State.

Since he became Appropriations chairman less than three years ago, the former Senate majority leader has worked tirelessly to fulfill his vow to make the federal government a billion-dollar industry for West Virginia. So far, he has wrapped up more than \$700 million in grants, including a training center for wildlife workers. Byrd also is partial to highway "demonstration projects," in which new construction methods are presumably tested. Nearly one-third—\$137.3 million—of the total funds set aside for demonstration projects this year will go to improve West Virginia's country roads.

Some of the pork-barrel projects undoubtedly have merit, but merit usually has less to do with the way they are parceled out than geography. The home districts of congressmen

who hold key positions on the appropriations committees enjoy an enormous advantage when it comes to emptying the barrel.

The Interior Department, Agriculture Department, Small Business Administration and university research departments are particularly productive hunting grounds for congressional butchers.

So clever are the porkmeisters that they often thrust unrequested money on agencies. Last year, Agriculture found an extra—but earmarked—\$68 million for "buildings and facilities" grafted onto its budget. Some \$3.75 million of it—hardly chicken feed—was destined for a Pottery Center of Excellence at the University of Arkansas, a pet project of Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark.

Not all congressmen approve of such brazen bringing-home of the bacon. Common Cause Magazine quoted Rep. Jim Slattery, D-Kan., as saying, "It's important from the standpoint of restoring public confidence in Congress to show we are prepared to stop wasteful spending," even if only as a symbolic gesture.

Industry wants future appropriations bills to include index that red-flags pork-barrel projects. That would be progress, but not nearly enough. Congress should do no less than put itself on a pork-free diet.

Sununu: Seldom is justice so poetic

With great effort, I have managed to ignore the fact that John Sununu has been flying back and forth from Washington to New Hampshire whenever he feels like it in a government jet that costs taxpayers \$3,945 an hour. The only thing that makes it worth comment is that he and his boss are such loudmouthed complainers about government spending and taxes. Nobody else is a hypocrite.

There is only one Sununu, and he is White House chief of staff. There are hundreds of other complainers about federal frivolity and cruel taxes who are getting away with fiscal murder, over and over. It happens just about the time the rest of us are calculating how big a hit we will take from the Internal Revenue "Service" each spring.

In 1988, the last year for which such figures have been made public, 472 citizens who had income of more than \$200,000 managed to pay no federal taxes at all. These cagey individuals and couples, whose income averaged \$442,000 apiece that year, had particularly good luck with capital gains. Two of them actually admitted getting unearned capital income. Altogether, \$57,848 filers of Form 1040 reported incomes above \$200,000. Of those, 9,300 paid less than 5 percent taxes, and 17,082 others less than 10 percent. Any hard-working schoolteacher, truck driver or bartender is likely to have paid more.

Of those 472 who lived the high life with no taxes at all, more than twice as many claimed business losses as claimed business profits. Seven times as many took farm losses as took farm profits. Their deductions for interest averaged \$135,000, for medical costs \$186,000, for casualty losses \$405,000, and for charity \$87,000. Another 3,396 high-income filers would have gotten away with no federal taxes if not for the minimum tax provision meant to catch rich folks with heavy deductions. In 1988, that minimum level was 21 percent.

Despite what Sununu and President Bush have insisted upon during every tax session with Congress, the IRS itself makes clear that the main beneficiaries of any capital gains tax cut would be high-income citizens.

Of those in the over-\$200,000 bracket, 58 percent reported capital gains—averaging \$384,476. Poor things, their salaries averaged a mere \$291,646.

The next time the president or his chief of staff tries to sell the argument that a capital gains tax cut would mainly benefit poor widows, those whose true interests lie with working Americans may find these figures handy.

If Sununu were capable of embarrassment,

he would give up his self-appointed role as chief administration hatchet man against government waste and taxation. He has piggy-backed the president in an uncomfortable spot, any Democrat who pushed for curbing abusive government privilege, Bush would be all over him like chicken feed. In this case, he has done what any chief executive does when the offender is of his own kind, and the revelations have gone beyond denial. He called for a study.

Other facts about RU-486

Recently, several readers have written in to describe the debate over the new abortion pill, RU-486, as nonsensical and unwarranted and have decried the Right to Life efforts to prevent RU-486 from being introduced into the United States, usually claiming that this drug has many uses other than abortion and that the drug shouldn't, therefore, be prohibited.

I would like to respond to these proponents of RU-486 by adding a few additional facts to the debate. First, RU-486 is currently used in France exclusively to induce abortion in women who are five to seven weeks pregnant. RU-486 thus kills a human being before his or her heart has begun beating (and, as National Right to Life notes, the correct medical term for the victim is "human embryo" and not "fertilized egg").

Second, the Food and Drug Administration in this country has placed RU-486 on the list of unapproved drugs, not as part of any abortion politics but because the American Medical Association itself (a pro-choice organization) has supported such a ban. Representatives of the AMA recently told U.S. Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., and his House subcommittee that "RU-486 poses a severe risk to patients unless the drug is administered as part of a complete treatment plan under the supervision of a physician." In France, even under close medical supervision, there have been two reported deaths already, two near-fatal heart attacks and serious complications in 5 percent of the women who have used the RU-486 abortifacient.

The Times-News readers who have written in support of banning RU-486 introduced into America have implied that pro-life groups also oppose research involving the drug's effects on diabetes, breast cancer and other diseases. This is not true! Here, I quote Douglas Johnson of the National Right to Life Committee:

"NRLC has vowed to lead a boycott of all products of any corporate entity that disseminates RU-486 as an abortion technique—and such a boycott would undoubtedly be supported by leaders of religious and social-action organizations representing many millions of Americans." But NRLC has never objected to research on RU-486 for purposes unrelated to abortion."

How, he inquired, could such a well-educated, Christian, clean, handsome and proper folk knowingly participate in the organized barbarism associated today with the word "Nazism"? His answer: Human beings have an uncanny capacity to disconnect their private lives from the public sphere of existence. SS officers, for example, could live contentedly with their families—being affectionate, refined and ethically scrupulous off the job—and then with minor changes in costume and scenery, be magically transformed into diabolical executioners on the job.

This spring, we are being asked to voice our opinions regarding the wisdom of relocating three components of America's skyrocketing bomb industry to the INEL. However, this project might be justified by local boosterism in essence an American Buchenwald—a death factory with one purpose: extermination. In the likely event that the product of this weapons complex is ever used (recall, a majority of Americans advocate the use of nuclear bombs in the Iraq war) or that the inevitable waste of production contaminates the Snake River aquifer, investigators may well inquire of us: How

could that God-fearing, literate, morally upright folk of southeast Idaho, a people obviously fond of children, forests and fine music—a people, come to think of it, much like the Germans of old—how could they have been so willfully complicitous in nuclear genocide or in poisoning their own blood base? Is our answer also to be: "We were just doing our jobs?"

I urge each reader to participate in the hearings and to express their revulsion at the proposal to militarize southeast Idaho.

Brady Bill may have side effects

The Brady Bill and its seven-day waiting period doesn't seem to concern some people. Unfortunately, the bill may have some unexpected "side effects."

An anti-gun official might prevent any handgun purchases by refusing to acknowledge receipt of the required paper work. This scheme is already used by anti-gun activists whose signatures are required by some existing federal gun regulations. Also, a police chief or sheriff could create his own rules for citizens to comply with before granting a signature. This too, could be used to discourage the exercise of constitutional rights. U.S., USSR near agreement on troop level reduction in Europe

JERUSALEM (AP) — Edging toward a long-delayed summit meeting, the United States and Soviet Union have decided to end their squabbling over a treaty to make historic cuts in troops and tanks in Europe.

Word of the decision emerged after Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Alexander A. Bessmertnykh ended five hours of talks Thursday in the Soviet Union.

"The dispute has been already settled to the mutual satisfaction of both sides," Bessmertnykh said. The Bush administration has said that questions about the already signed treaty on conventional weapons would have to be dealt with before agreement could be reached on a separate treaty to sharply reduce long-range nuclear

Soviet troops marched in Lithuania on Thursday. The U.S. official, commenting on the new agreement, which he said had been worked out in an exchange of messages over nearly two months. Essentially, the Bush administration got its way, he said. The administration had objected that the Soviets were trying to exclude certain units from the treaty's restrictions, including some 3,700 tanks, armored vehicles and artillery pieces assigned to coast guard and naval duties, and 1,700 armored vehicles assigned to strategic rocket forces. The U.S. official, commenting on condition of anonymity, said the dispute over coastal defense forces and naval infantry had been resolved and they proposed to meet on requirements. The rocket forces are still an issue, but they are the smallest of the categories and the two sides are close to accord there, as well, the official said. "We have to be satisfied on the entire thing. So we still have an issue out there," he said. But, he concluded, "What they have proposed is very good.... We're in good shape."

China warns against human rights-trade tie

BEIJING (AP) — Chinese officials, facing a U.S. review of Beijing's most-favored-nation trading status, warned Washington on Thursday not to try to win human rights concessions in exchange for the trade privileges.

Putting human-rights conditions on China's special trade status with the United States would hurt both countries, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said.

"Obviously it will not benefit the development of the bilateral relations between the two countries to take the issue of human rights as a condition," Wu Jianmin said at a weekly ministry briefing. "It will not benefit the Chinese people or the American people."

"China's most-favored-nation trade status, which allows the lowest pos-

sible tariffs on exports to the United States, comes up for review in June. President Bush is expected to extend the trade preferences, although Congress could overturn the decision if both chambers act within 30 days.

The House voted by a large margin last year to halt the trade preferences for China, but the measure died when Congress adjourned without action by the Senate.

Since China's violent suppression in June 1989 of the pro-democracy movement, critics of the country's human rights record have pushed for the favorable trade status to be revoked.

Hundreds of people were killed when the Chinese army opened fire on student-led protesters urging democratic reforms. Some reports

put the death toll in the thousands. Some U.S. critics of the Beijing government say attaching human rights conditions to the trade status would force China to address international concerns over treatment of dissidents and prisoners. China deems that undue meddling in its affairs.

"It is obvious that China and the United States have different views on the issue of human rights because China and the United States have different situations, historical backgrounds and social values," Wu said.

A mounting trade deficit with China and concern over use of Chinese prison labor for export products have increased pressure this year for punitive steps against China.

The United States also has warned

China that it must eliminate piracy of computer software and other copyrighted products or face tariffs on exports to the United States.

But Wu said any punitive steps over intellectual property rights would hurt relations between the two countries.

GENEVA (AP) — Latin America's cholera epidemic threatens about a quarter of the region's population, or up to 120 million people, the head of the World Health Organization said Thursday.

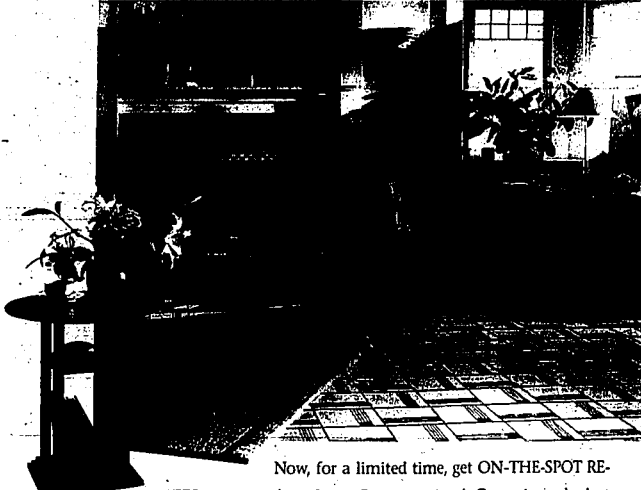

Soviets agree to co-host peace conference

JERUSALEM (AP) — The Soviet Union agreed Thursday to join the United States in sponsoring peace talks between Israel and the Arabs.

But the outlook for such a conference remained uncertain. After more than a week of shuttle diplomacy, Secretary of State James A. Baker III has gained agreement neither on the format for negotiations or on which Palestinian Arabs would attend.

Soviet Foreign Minister Alexander A. Bessmertnykh speaking at a news conference in Kislovodsk, the Soviet retreat where he and Baker had been meeting, said:

"We intend to act as sponsors of that conference, and the fact that there are two major powers — great powers — that help in getting that process under way would make it possible for that process to move at a faster pace."

For his part, Baker said a Mideast peace conference would not "be a successful undertaking — in fact, it will not even take place — unless the real parties to the conflict have a true desire for peace."

It was not immediately clear whether the arrangement was acceptable to Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir and Foreign Minister David Levy.

Baker flew from Kislovodsk in the Central Caucasus, to Israel to get an answer Friday from Shamir and Levy on whether they would also accept a role for the United Nations and ease the restrictions they want to place on who would speak for the Palestinians.

"My honest feeling remains that there is a genuine desire on the part of the parties for Israel," Baker said before leaving for Israel. "My honest feeling is that there is a better chance now than has been the case for quite some time in the past."

In Jerusalem, Yossi Ben-Aharon,

a top aide to Shamir, cautioned: "Whoever expected some dramatic breakthrough will be disappointed. We all know it's a complex, deeply rooted conflict, and several flights from one capital to another cannot resolve the problem."

Earlier this week, Baker expressed open irritation at Israel for continuing to allow new settlements in its occupied territories.

"We were very disappointed" at news of the newest settlement, he commented then, adding, "It is easier to obstruct peace than to promote peace."

Before his discussions with Bessmertnykh, Baker met with Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk Sharaa, who said he was "not optimistic at all" about the chances for a peace conference.

During Baker's meeting with Bessmertnykh, the Soviet news agency Tass announced that the foreign minister would go to Israel in May in what would be the highest-level visit by a Soviet official since Israel achieved statehood in 1948.

Asked about the report, Bessmertnykh said, "I am planning to go to the Middle East area, although I am not finally decided on the itinerary of that trip."

BERLIN (AP) — Germany's top neo-Nazi leader died Thursday of an undisclosed illness, officials at a hospital said.

Michael Kuehnren, 35, died in a hospital in the west German city of Kassel. Medical officials refused to reveal the cause of death.

He had been hospitalized for two weeks. German newspapers said Kuehnren had been ill for several months.

Tigre rebels say they captured desert town

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Tigre rebels seeking to topple the government claimed Thursday to have captured a town 65 miles west of Ethiopia's capital, Addis Ababa.

Western diplomats in Addis Ababa say the insurgents pose the greatest threat ever to the Marxist government of President Mengistu Haile Mariam who overthrew Emperor Haile Selassie in 1974.

There was no immediate government comment on the claim.

Forces of the Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Democratic Front won the desert town of Ambo on Wednesday, a spokesman for the front said.

Ambo, near one of the country's main ammunition factories, was considered a "line in the sand" by many foreign diplomats in Addis Ababa.

The United States has said that if Ambo fell it would consider reducing its embassy staff in the Horn of Africa nation from about 30 to essential personnel only.

A source said a final decision on the order had not yet been made, but a reduction looked likely.

In addition to embassy personnel, there are about 600 Americans in Ethiopia on private business or working with aid organizations trying to

cope with a famine that threatens at least 5 million people.

Fighting was continuing with remaining government troops who were dug in about 10 miles north of the town on the main road to the capital, Front spokesman Asefa Mamo said in a telephone interview from his London office.

He described the government soldiers as elite forces that were being reinforced by crack troops from Asmara, in the country's north and Dessye, to the east.

Mamo said rebels eventually planned to march on the capital but said that was the "final goal ... not the immediate goal." The Tigreans have been fighting since 1975 seeking Mengistu's ouster and greater autonomy for their home province, Tigre.

Last month, many embassies, including that of the United States, advised their dependents and non-essential staff to leave the country on a voluntary basis following dramatic rebel gains.

However, it was not immediately known whether any other foreign missions also planned to upgrade their advisories to ordered departures and further reduce the number of their personnel.

Monroe's swimsuit nets \$22,400 at auction

LONDON (AP) — A black cotton polka-dot swimsuit worn by Marilyn Monroe to publicize the 1954 movie "There's No Business Like Show Business" fetched \$22,400 at a pop memorabilia auction Thursday.

The swimsuit and matching white cotton cover-up were purchased by collector David Gainsborough Roberts, 47, at Christie's auction.

The swimsuit will join other items in Roberts' private collection on the island of Jersey, including Adolf Hitler's wallet, cigarette lighters that belonged to Al Capone and Benito Mussolini.

Opponents fume over plant revival plans

ELKO, Nev. — As federal land managers waited for word from the former project director of the aborted Thousand Springs power plant Thursday, opponents in Utah and Idaho reacted angrily to plans to revive it.

"I thought we had put a stake through its heart," said U.S. Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, vowing to try again.

Ex-project manager Joe Gremban, now a Reno businessman, sent a letter April 12 to the Elko office of the Bureau of Land Management, asking that an abandoned environmental impact study be completed for a scaled-down version of the project, which would be located 26 miles northeast of Wells.

Gremban said his company, Environmental Energy Enterprises, wants to reduce the proposal for the Hoover Dam-sized project from 2,000 megawatts to 500 megawatts.

The reduction would cut the number of power-generating units from eight to two, he told the agency in his letter.

The original Thousand Springs proposal ran into a wall of opposition from people who live downwind of the site, and the consortium that was bankrolling the project withdrew its support.

Owens, who along with Idaho Congressman Richard Stallings was instrumental in forcing the BLM to reopen the environmental impact study of the original project,

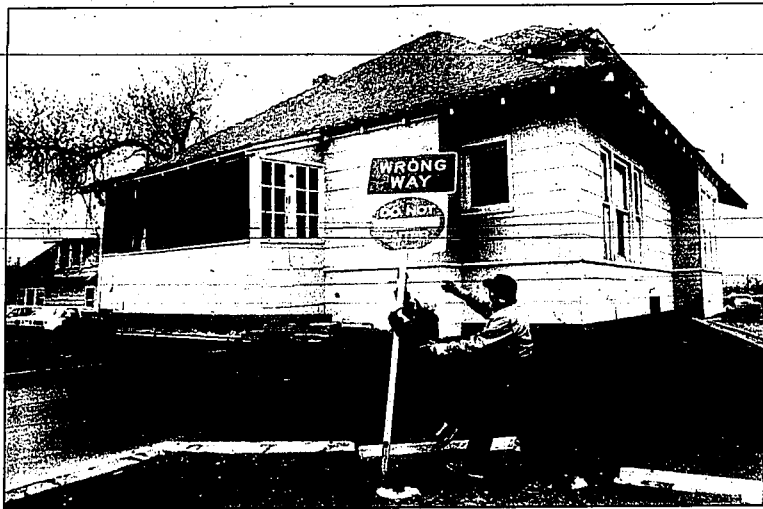
said Thursday he might not oppose a down-sized power plant.

But he added that he is leery the recent suggestion from Gremban as a way to begin construction on what eventually will become a 2,000 megawatt plant.

"If that is the case, I will get the stakes out again and aim better," he said.

Judge allows search evidence in animal cruelty case

ELKO, Nev. — A judge has ruled that evidence gathered without a search warrant may be used against former Buhl-area resident Arthur Transue for trial on cruelty-to-animal charges, an Elko County district attorney's office investigator said Thursday.

The investigator also said Elko County Justice of the Peace Marjean Kidner decided Transue's bail should remain at \$5,000.

Transue contended that evidence gathered from a ranch north of Wells could not be used at his trial and had asked Kidner to

release him from jail on his own recognizance.

Kidner denied the two requests and turned down another asking that the number of charges against Transue be reduced from 16 to one, said Joel Westfall of the Elko County district attorney's office.

Kidner could not be reached for comment Thursday. Westfall spoke briefly over the telephone after the hearing.

Transue had claimed that Elko County sheriff's deputies illegally gathered evidence from a ranch 20 miles north of Wells when they entered the property without a search warrant last December. The deputies allegedly found dogs, rabbits,

chickens, and peacocks piled frozen in outside cages.

Other animals at the site were starving, deputies said.

Elko County Sheriff Neil Harris said deputies were within Nevada law when they entered the property and removed some of the animals. Deputies thought the animals were abandoned and Nevada law allows law enforcement officers to enter property without a search warrant under such circumstances, Harris said.

Deputies posted notices at the property stating that the animals had been taken.

Authorities arrested another former Buhl resident, Marilyn Evans, in Jackpot in Jan-

uary and charged her and Transue with 197 counts of cruelty to animals. Evans, who was married to Transue, has been in jail since arrested.

Transue turned himself in to Elko County authorities on March 20, two days before Evans' trial. Her trial was postponed when Transue's attorney requested that the two defendants be tried together.

Kidner granted the request.

Bail for Transue and Evans was set at \$62,500 each but was lowered.

Transue and Evans are scheduled for trial next Tuesday. They face a possible \$1,000 fine, or six months in jail, or both, for each count against them.

Jerome zoning commission looks into dairy issue

JEROME — Should area dairymen who shut down operations as part of the federal government's buyout program five years ago be exempt from the county's new livestock confinement ordinance?

That question will be considered at the county Planning and Zoning Commission's meeting Monday at 7:30 p.m. at the courthouse.

The new ordinance does not specify whether the buyout dairies can begin operations under a grandfather clause, which would exempt them from the new rules.

The county's new rules apply only to new dairies — current dairies operations have been grandfathered in.

New dairy operators must obtain a permit from the county after providing a site plan, topographical and soil maps, a waste system design and a fee.

The amount of the application fee will be set by the county commissioners, Carl Montgomery, commission chairman, said.

Under the ordinance, adopted in December, a buyout dairy would be classified as a new dairy, Glen Elwell, zoning commission chairman, said.

A letter has been sent to dairy owners, explaining the requirement to apply for a permit to begin milk production again, Elwell said. No applications have been received.

There are 17 buyout dairies in Jerome County. Comments from the public will be allowed at Monday's meeting.

Any change to the approved ordinance will require two public hearings before the ordinance becomes law again, Elwell said.

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Wendell councilman offers to resign, decides to stay

Rumors mayor unhappy with job prompt discussion of resignation

WENDELL — One of the councilman offered to resign from the Wendell City Council Wednesday saying he has heard second-hand criticism from Mayor George Benson.

"I've had two people tell me on two separate incidents that the mayor has stated to them that the biggest mistake he ever made was to appoint Jack Green to the council," Councilman Jack Green said. "I'd be happy to resign if there is a problem."

Green asked Benson to explain what is going on, or what the problem might be.

"I don't think that if you feel that it was a mistake to appoint me, that you could have come and talked to me rather than talk to other individuals and have it around town," Green said to Benson during the council's regular public meeting.

In a recent property sale to Ambrose Distributing Company, Benson said, Green agreed with the rest of the council to set a lower sale price than what the mayor wanted. Also, Benson said, Green did not vote to add the cost of a survey to the sale price as the mayor had suggested.

"Idaho has to remain sensitive to its air quality," he said. "I believe based on the laws today and the realistic impact it could have on Idaho, I would have to take a critical look at it."

Crowding puts pressure on parole board

BOISE (AP) — With the state prison system again pushed up its limit and hundreds of state inmates backed up in county jails awaiting cell space, the Commission for Pardons and Parole is struggling with the role it should play in helping to ease overcrowding.

During its quarterly meeting at the main state prison in Boise on Thursday, the commission, with one member absent, deadlocked, 2-2, on whether to change its policy for initial parole hearings so that acceptable inmates could be released as soon as they become eligible rather than several months after that date.

"We need to help them out a little bit with this overcrowding," Chairman Del Ray Holm of Roberts said.

Commissioner Ida Leggett of Coeur d'Alene was expected to be present, would set an inmate's initial parole hearing about three months before the parole eligibility date. It is now set a month before.

Holm maintained that would provide time to prepare inmates winning parole for release while offering a little breathing room to Corrections Department officials trying to manage a system handling 22 percent more inmates than it was designed to hold.

But Paul Morris of Emmett stood strongly against any procedural change, arguing that parole consideration should be influenced by nothing but the determination of the commission that an inmate will present no serious threat to society.

"The overcrowding has nothing to do with it," Morris said. "The public safety is what we're here for."

Minidoka junior highs adopt, lower grades study trimesters

RUPERT — The junior high schools in Minidoka County have opted to try the trimester system for the 1991-92 school year.

Minico High School adopted the same system two years ago. The elementary schools, however, have been reluctant to use the trimester system. The Minidoka County School Board at this week's meeting decided to allow elementary school officials to study the program for another year.

Also at the meeting, the committee for textbook selection reported it has chosen the Addison Wesley Science Program for the elementary schools. The students in first- and second-grade will not have individual books but will work from a single "big" book.

The publisher Scott-Foresman was chosen for the secondary health and science books. Minico Principal Steve Hubsmit told junior high principals they would need 20 percent fewer books on the trimester system.

The "Sex Respect" program will be incorporated into either health or science class, whichever is most appropriate.

A new athletic policy was reviewed at the meeting. The significant difference between the new athletic policy and the previous one is that this one is written. Superintendent Gene Snapp said "This is just putting into print what we think is there," board member Bill Hepworth asked. "This will allow consistency in

our athletic programs," Principal Hubsmit said.

A committee studying the Senate bill that calls for a school accountability report card recommended the school district use the state model.

The report will address a minimum of 16 areas, including: student progress toward meeting reading, writing and arithmetic goals; reducing dropout rates; estimating expenditures per student; reducing class sizes and teacher loads; reduction of teachers assigned outside of their subject areas of competence; currency of textbooks and availability of counseling and other student support services, among others.

Lew Roberts, principal at Big Valley Elementary School, emphasized that the accountability report card's purpose is to evaluate each school's performance not individual teachers.

A request for graduation from Raul Hasert, an East German exchange student, was brought before the board.

Hasert is the first East German student in the area. Because of the difficulty of translating his transcripts, it appears that he does not have enough English credits to receive a diploma.

He arrived in the middle of the second trimester and did not receive credit for those classes even though his teachers gave him high recommendations for his work.

Hasert said he feels that the diploma is of great value as he intends to return home and challenge the credits he has missed. Hasert

would like to return to the United States to attend medical school and said the diploma would help him in his country and here, where medical school applications are restricted.

The board could not set aside state requirements for graduation but agreed to send his request, transcripts, and recommendations to the state level for review.

Minico is one of the few schools that does allow exchange students to graduate.

In other business:

- Ten teachers, all certified and currently staff members, will staff the summer migrant program.
- The county's alternative high school program will hold a summer school session.

"The administration will check to see if there is a desire and need for a six-week summer school (for regular students)," said Darwin Anderson, curriculum director.

The board asked administrators to check into relocatable units that could be used for classroom expansion needs at Pershing and Paul elementary schools.

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Sun Valley tables outlay for land-use plan

SUN VALLEY — Revising the city's comprehensive land-use plan would cost the city about \$20,000 more than it originally had budgeted for the project, according to City Administrator Roy Rainey.

The city already has paid Design Workshop \$30,000 for a study of its present comprehensive land-use plan. But the council has postponed making a decision on whether to have the company make the required revisions, which would cost an additional \$40,000.

The comprehensive land-use plan is a map of the town that outlines how land should best be used.

While Rainey admitted that the cost of the project had been underestimated, he also told the board that some of the costs can be eliminated by using data from previous studies.

"Why do all these things over again?" asked Councilman Joe Humphries, saying that the city had already completed studies on avalanche hazards and slope analysis.

City Councilman Steve Lubber, after looking over the proposal submitted by Design Workshop, told other members of the council that he is concerned about receiving broad recommendations from the Colorado-based consulting firm.

"This plan must be very specific," said Lubber. "We don't want information coming off a shelf somewhere... We want a real product for our money."

In other business, the council discussed complaints they had received from homeowners in River Ranch about sewer trucks using a smaller residential road, rather than Elkhorn Road to access the city's water and sewer facility. The council agreed to continue discussions to explore other alternatives.

Craig offers clout in school's prayer battle

REXBURG (AP) — Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, says he's offered to put his political weight behind the Madison School District in its battle to allow prayer at a high school commencement next month.

"I am one who believes that prayer has been a part of an American tradition that is fundamental to our country's existence," Craig said. He's a Methodist.

"Thomas Jefferson would be appalled."

District officials let students decide whether they wanted prayer included in their graduation ceremony. The students decided in March to have two student-led prayers, saying they wanted to keep the school's tradition alive.

4,000 state workers in Montana on strike

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — More than 4,000 Montana government employees went on strike Thursday to protest a veto of a state pay raise and the National Guard was called out to maintain essential services.

The strikers include 90 percent of the state's Highway Patrol troopers.

Gov. Stan Stephens called the strike "self-defeating for everybody" and blamed Democratic lawmakers for falsely missing the hopes of state employees. He said he stood by his veto Tuesday of a 60-cent hourly pay raise for most workers.

The Legislature failed to override the veto Wednesday night and union leaders called a strike.

A scattering of walkouts began at midnight. By 8 a.m., pickets appeared at most state office buildings near the state capitol in Helena.

Staff at the women's prison in Warm Springs struck at 11 a.m. and guards at the men's prison in Deer Lodge followed an hour later after locking in high-security inmates in their cells.

Janette Rynoson, a non-Hispanic woman who lives in the home with her Hispanic husband and two children, said the offer to paint her home shows that people care and are concerned about discrimination in Idaho Falls.

Zion Park rockslide closes highway

ZION NATIONAL PARK, Utah — A rock slide in Zion National Park blocked both lanes of State Road 9 and closed a 1.5-mile stretch of the highway near Mt. Carmel Junction for about nine hours Thursday.

Chief Ranger Larry Van Slyke said two front-end loaders and three dump trucks moved 700 cubic yards of sandstone from the road. The debris had covered about 20 yards of roadway 10-15 feet deep near the eastern entrance of the mile-long tunnel.

Some of the boulders had to be drilled and blasted before being carted away. Van Slyke said the road was reopened shortly before noon Thursday after engineers determined the road bed had been undamaged.

He also said the source of the debris, sandstone cliffs that had been blasted in road construction earlier this century, was assessed as safe, but he could not predict when the next slide would occur.

Does NFL practice double standard?

NEW YORK (AP) — Maybe the NFL should just say no.

In last week's draft, three NFL teams took a player with a known drug problem and now some folks are wondering if there isn't a double standard in the league regarding drug abuse.

"I think the question we're really asking here is: Does the NFL give more priority to getting a star player on the field, or to the well-being of a troubled performer?" said Dr. Arnold Washon, whose Washon Institute in New York has treated many well-known athletes for drug abuse.

"I think we should look at the answer to that. Pro football is a huge corporation, employees are valued more for what they can produce."

Two of the players taken in the draft — quarterback Todd Marinovich of Southern Cal and halfback Darren Lewis of Texas A&M — are involved in drug counseling. Another, Walter Sutton of Southwest State University in Minnesota, was taken in the 10th round by the Atlanta Falcons even though they knew he had been convicted of a drug felony.

"I know they're waging a major battle to prevent drugs in the NFL, but in view of the draft, there seems to be some inconsistency," sports attorney Bob Woolf said.

Woolf represents, among others, former Washington Redskins defensive lineman Dexter Manley, who was banned for life from the NFL as a three-time drug loser before being reinstated last year.

Manley has been through rehabilitation and is now with the Phoenix Cardinals.

"I'm sure this is an embarrassment to the NFL," Woolf said.

Marinovich, taken by the Los Angeles Raiders in the first round, was ordered into a program by Judge in Irvine, Calif., after the charges of possessing marijuana and cocaine were dismissed.

Lewis, taken by the Chicago Bears in the sixth round, checked into a rehab center in Houston on Wednesday.

Lewis was the only player who tested positive for cocaine at the NFL's scouting evaluations in February. The league sends the test results to each team, but the Bears said they never saw it.

The most bizarre case, however, was that of Sutton, a wide receiver taken by Atlanta. Sutton was convicted in February of trying to deal crack cocaine and ordered to begin serving a

19-month prison sentence as soon as he finished college.

The Falcons knew of the conviction but said they were led to believe Sutton wouldn't have to go to jail.

"On Thursday, a federal judge in Tampa, Fla., told Sutton that was not the case. He must report to prison on Jan. 26, 1991."

The NFL says it not only had not heard about Sutton's conviction, it hadn't even heard of Sutton.

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This is kiss-and-make-up baseball

CHICAGO — Two hours before game time Monday night, in the bowels of the Astrodome, Rob Dibble, Cincinnati's star relief pitcher, and Houston infielder Eric Yelding smoked the peace pipe.

According to published reports, Dibble, who on April 11 had thrown a fistball behind Yelding's back, apologized and said, "I'm sorry it happened." Yelding blew a puff and said, "Fine, I believe you're sincere."

Tuesday night, in the Astrodome, Dibble worked the final two innings in relief-and-struck-out-six-consecutive Houston batters. This tied the National League record for successive strikeouts by a reliever. Immediately, I wondered if Yelding had been among Dibble's victims.

Yelding leads off and was in the game, but he didn't bat against Dibble, who can throw 100 miles an hour. Dibble struck out Craig Biggio, Ken Caminiti and Jeff Bagwell—in the eighth and Luis Gonzalez, Mark McLemore and Karl Rose in the ninth. Rose batted eighth, two spots ahead of Yelding.

Whatever, there is this unanswered question: What if Yelding, Dibble's new-found friend, had come to the plate? Would Dibble have pitched him inside and brushed him back? Or would he have been fearful of hitting him and a repeat of the April 11 scenario, which triggered a big on-the-field brawl?

I asked Frank Robinson, the Baltimore manager, for his thoughts. When he was a player, F. Robby was an absolutely ferocious competitor. He usually was among the league leaders in being hit by pitches. It was his doing. To have a better chance of hitting the outside pitch, he stood, in defiance, almost on top of the plate.

I told him Dibble and Yelding had kissed and made up.

"It used to be a tough game," F. Robby said. "Today, it's a buddy-buddy game. People say, 'Why don't pitchers pitch inside anymore?' Why do we see so few knockdown pitches? I tell them, 'It's a friendship thing in baseball today.'"

But he didn't answer the question. What did he think would have happened if Dibble had pitched to Yelding?

"I don't know. I can only guess," Robinson said. "Probably, it would work both ways. If Dibble brushes him back or knocks him down, Yelding isn't as likely to charge the mound." He would say to himself, "Hey, we've patched it up; this guy's my friend." And, at the same time,

Dibble will think twice before brushing him back."

So patship makes a difference? "Of course. The idea is to be pals with your teammates, not opposing players."

F. Robby is the only player to win the Most Valuable Player award in both leagues. But he wasn't the only fierce competitor of his time.

"I put a call through to Don Drysdale, a Hall of Famer, the master of the brushback pitch, but now a peaceable member of the Dodger's broadcasting squad. He's an aging warrior who would rather make love than war."

"I heard they met and made up," Drysdale said. "I'm not surprised. That's the way it is today. They have a rule against fraternizing with the other team, but all you've got to do is look behind the plate (before a game) and it looks like a chess reunion every day of the week. There has always been a fraternity among ballplayers but not on the field. Today, it's more of a social thing."

"Hell, they even have chapel services together. I have nothing against religion, but I never heard of two teams praying together, and then they go out and try to beat the hell out of each other, cheat, anything to win. I think the Good Lord is forgiving, but there is a time and place for religion."

Did he ever apologize?

"I never hit anybody in the head, and I've never been in favor of throwing behind a hitter's head," he said. "You don't have to do that. But there are times when a pitcher does lose control. I'm serious about that. Hell, if I threw every pitch where I wanted to throw it I would have never lost a game."

What about the next Dibble-Yelding matchup?

"Dibble isn't going to change," said Drysdale. "Intimidation is always a big factor. If there was someone who could be intimidated you always give him a little reminder and pitched him inside. If you know a hitter can be intimidated, you never let him forget it."

"We used to talk in the clubhouse, when we went over the hitters. Today, if you have that kind of language in a clubhouse meeting, your own club might file a grievance against you."

What about Dibble and Yelding? What's your prediction?

"It'll be the same," said Drysdale. "When a pitcher goes into his delivery there is an awful lot of mind block. The pitcher is trying to make the best pitch possible. Same with the hitter. When he's up there swinging, he's trying to hit the ball. He isn't thinking about the Sunday Social Club."

So Dibble will continue pitching inside and, when the occasion demands, knock down a hitter?

"What they did, getting together, shaking hands, was a nice gesture, soothing over old wounds," said Drysdale. "But these peace-treaties have a tendency to go by the wayside. A few years ago we had a treaty with Iraq and we just wound up beating the hell out of them. In games and wars, peace treaties are broken."

Seahawks extend Knox's contract

SEATTLE — Coach Chuck Knox has agreed to a two-year extension of his contract with the Seattle Seahawks, the team said Thursday. Terms were not disclosed, spokesman Gary Wright said. Newspapers reported Knox wanted a three-year extension on the contract that will pay him \$950,000 this year. He has been negotiating for four months with team owner Ken Behring.

The contract gives both parties 30 days at the end of each season to cancel. The Morning News Tribune of Tacoma reported in today's editions Knox, who turns 59 this week, is entering his ninth season with the Seahawks and his 19th as a National Football League head coach.

Patriots' Wilson ends 10-year career

FOXBORO, Mass. — Marc Wilson, who didn't figure in the New England Patriots quarterback plans, announced his retirement Thursday after a 10-year NFL career.

He spent the past two seasons with the Patriots after sitting out the 1988 season. He had been cut before that season by the Los Angeles Raiders. He had spent the first eight years of his NFL career with the Raiders. After going 1-15 last season, the Patriots undertook a rebuilding campaign. There was a front office shakeup, Dick MacPherson replaced Rod Rust as coach and there was an emphasis on younger players.

Veteran signs for 1 year with Royals

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Terry Puhl, a 14-year major-league veteran, agreed to a one-year contract Thursday with the Kansas City Royals.

The Royals said Puhl, 34, would sign Friday and replace first baseman George Brett, who will be placed on the 15-day disabled list. Puhl, a 281 lifetime hitter, spent 14 years with the Houston Astros and was released by the New York Mets on April 1. He was named to the 1978 NL all-star team. "Puhl is a veteran player who comes to us highly recommended by everyone who has been associated with him," said Royals' manager John Wathan.

NCAA coaches asking for stiffer penalties

OVERLAND PARK, Kan. (AP) — The NCAA should impose harsher penalties on schools and athletes who cheat, its officials were told Thursday by a group of Division I coaches.

Another idea coming out of a two-day meeting between the coaches' group and NCAA officials was a recommendation to force athletes to meet minimum eligibility requirements before they can even make recruiting visits.

Representatives of football and basketball coaches both said they want the NCAA to begin targeting athletes as well as schools and coaches who are involved in recruiting or academic irregularities.

"These are not naive young people any more we're dealing with for the most part. Some are standing their feet on their hands out saying, 'What's involved here?'" Kentucky football

coach Bill Curry said at a news conference.

"We want to send a message to presidents that we're reading off the same page they are, that we're interested in academic integrity and accountability," said George Raveling of Southern California, representing basketball coaches.

"We want to send a message to young people that they have to show greater academic achievement if they want to be involved in the recruiting process and if they want the privilege of interacting with coaches and student-athletes."

The two-day meeting was called by NCAA executive director Dick Schultz to discuss ways of simplifying recruiting rules. The recommendations will go to various recruiting committees and then to the NCAA Council and Presidents Commission,

which could sponsor them at the NCAA convention in January.

No specific recommendations were presented at the news conference other than forcing basketball prospects to meet Proposition 48 requirements before they can make paid campus visits during recruiting season.

"The coaches agree that student-athletes should not be permitted to visit a campus until that prospective student-athlete has achieved a minimum of 700 on the SAT or 18 on the ACT and has a minimum of 2.0 grade-point average on seven core (college preparatory) courses," Raveling said. "These test scores and a 2.0 in 11 core courses are the minimum standards for freshman eligibility as specified in Proposition 48."

Raveling and Curry both reported "a strong feeling" among coaches for harsher penalties for both schools and athletes, though they declined to name recent cases in which they felt penalties had been too lenient.

"But they are only saying what a majority of people tell us by letter every time an institution is put on probation," Schultz said.

"We get two kinds of letters. One says we were all wrong and that we acted too harshly. Then we get about three times as many letters saying that what we did was just tough enough."

The idea that athletes are innocent, exploited youths who do not understand the NCAA system "is the biggest myth in American sports," Raveling said.

"In a large majority of situations, the athlete encourages those inducements," he added. "If they accept a car or money, they should be ineligible."

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Tryouts start for Pan American team

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Forty-one of the nation's top players opened four days of practice on Thursday in hopes of making the 12-man team for the Pan American Games, a squad that could end up becoming the final all-american American men's basketball team in international competition.

Head coach Gene Keady said the changes brought about by the increased emphasis on the 3-pointer have made it necessary to look for a different style of player.

"Our Pan American team won't be like the teams of old that have participated in basketball," said Keady, head coach at Purdue. "The sport is entirely different from the 1960, 1970 and 1980s — the sport has changed that much."

Keady said he is looking for a well-rounded team, with an emphasis on good 3-point shooters and defensive players who can defend against the 3-point shot.

"The 3-point field goal has changed basketball considerably and

every team needs this type of shooter," he said.

Keady also said he is missing some of the players he had hoped to see try out for the Pan Am Games, scheduled for Havana from Aug. 3-15. Among those invited but not attending are Duke center Christian Laettner and Indiana's Calbert Cheaney.

"We have a number of players we would have liked to see at the trials," Keady said. "But basketball is changing so fast and there's some didn't

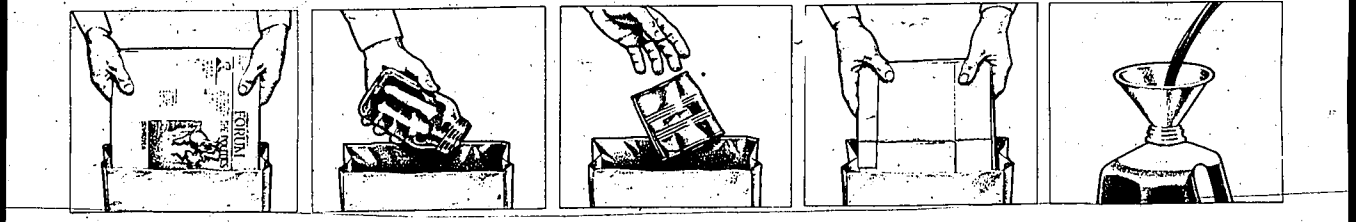
want to come, along with those that claimed they were burned out," he said.

"How can a player be burned out at age 21?"

Next year's Olympics will be the first in which professionals are allowed to play and is expected to be dominated by NBA players. Keady said that's not his concern right now.

The 12-man team is expected to be named early next week following four days of workouts.

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Who are not interested in the possibilities of defeat. — Queen Victoria.

Today's club suit offers more potential tricks than does the heart suit, but it is the only consideration. Which suit offers a hope of making game, and which suit settles for being down one?

South wins the first spade with his king and counts six more winners off the top, bringing his total to seven. Needing two more tricks, you should choose to play the hearts rather than the longer club suit.

When you play the club suit, his chances for developing two more winners are excellent — any 3-2 break will do. But at what cost? At the cost of conceding another loser, the one that will break the game. If South plays clubs, the defenders are sure to get a club, three spades and a heart, for one down.

The heart suit holds better promise. The queen lies with East, two finesses against the queen will produce two winners while denying a fifth winner to the defense. Clearly, playing the hearts is the better bet.

At trick two, South should lead a diamond to dummy's king and finesse against East's heart queen. South wins and takes his spades, but that is all. A second heart finesse yields nine tricks, and the short "chubby" suit proves better than the long "lean" suit.

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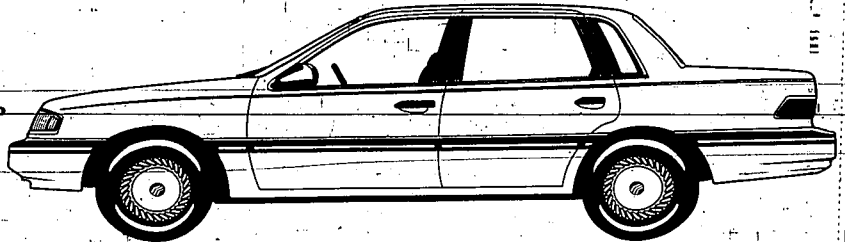
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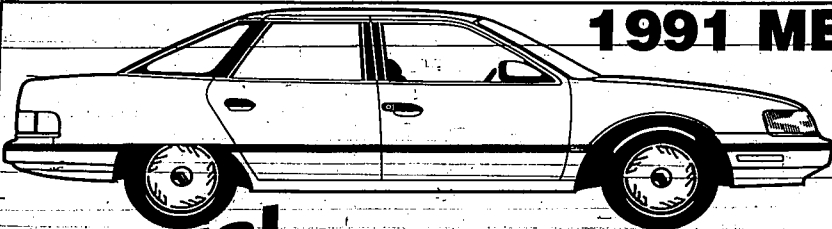

New ABC series aims to take advantage of dinomania craze

Earl Sinclair is a cross between Archie Bunker and Ralph Cranford. He's also a Megalosaurus - as in dinosaur. The Sinclair family, headed by Papa Earl, has been given its own ABC sitcom, "Dinosaurs," premiering at 7:30 p.m. today on KKVU. The show is a cooperative effort between Jim Henson Productions and Michael Jacob Productions in association with Walt Disney Television. To say the main characters are just puppets would be like saying Earl Sinclair is just a little bit ugly. "These characters are a combination of every discipline and technology we have ever used," said Brian Henson, Jim's son and co-executive producer for the series, during a Wednesday satellite screening of "Dinosaurs." In fact, the live-action puppetry and state-of-the-art electronics are so intricate that the show's creators are hesitant to reveal too much about the magic they have designed. Henson says the series is the culmination of a concept his father was working on before he died last year. In the premiere episode, viewers are introduced to

the Sinclairs, the first generation of married dinosaurs. Earl is a huge, blustery father figure with a carefully hidden tender side. His wife, Fran, is a '50s-style housewife, a style which may change as the show evolves. Robbie, 14, and Charlene, 12, provide the teen focus, while Baby Sinclair manages to be both sealy and cute. But this is not a prehistoric "Father Knows Best." Cigars and beer, sexual innuendo and semi-course language appear occasionally in the show. The frozen TV dinners (with crawly arms and legs) are gross enough to please any young high student. Comparisons are likely to be made between "Dinosaurs" and "The Simpsons." "I don't expect problems with TV-viewing groups," said Michael Jacobs, executive producer of the show. "We have steeped our show in a sort of past philosophy with strong values and a very good heart." Network executives are calling the show an "adult comedy with kid appeal." "Dinosaurs" was planned to take full advantage of the dinomania craze now sweeping the country. "Dinosaurs are particularly appealing to kids because they are real monsters," said Henson of the first production his company has developed since his father's death. He said he is also pleased that some

environmental awareness has been incorporated into the series. The dinosaurs portrayed in the sitcom "abuse" the planet, felling trees and bulldozing land. The fact that dinosaurs eventually became extinct has not been lost on the show's creators. "We are purposely using environmental topics and current issues of the day on this show," Henson said. Some of the puppets have big name voices, too - Sally Struthers and Sherman Hemsley, for example. But advertising campaigns for the show are not stressing that fact, in order to keep the fantasy of the medium intact. "Dinosaurs" is running without a laugh track at the present time, though other options are still being discussed. The show is also probably one of the most expensive half hours on television. "We will make our decision on May 22 about what shows will be included on the ABC fall schedule," said Robert A. Iger, president of ABC Entertainment, who refuses to divulge exactly how much "Dinosaurs" costs to produce. "Obviously, we are enthusiastic about this show, even though it is an expensive half hour, and we hope it will be one of the shows selected."

TV season's over, but spring sweeps are here

LOS ANGELES - The 1990-91 television season is officially over. Officially, in this case, is the inoperative word. It is time again for that network programming frenzy called "sweeps," a quarterly period in which ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox Broadcasting Co. use high-powered shows

to boost viewership and advertising rates. So even though April 14 marked the end of the regular 30-week TV season, it's not really over until the sweeps have sung. Through May 22, the four networks have scheduled cliffhanger series endings, premieres of summer replacement series and ripped-from-the-headlines TV movies. NBC, which finished first at the end of the regular season in the most closely contested ratings race in 26 years, offers the following sweeps programming:

- In the May 2 cliffhanger of "A Different World," Whitley (Jasmine Guy) is undecided about whether to leave Dwayne (Kadeem Hardison) to take a big job in the Big Apple.
- The final episode of "L.A. Law" (scheduled for May 16) is being kept under wraps, but expect to see more fireworks as the ensemble cast deals with the departure of series stars Harry Linnam, Susan Dey and Jimmy Smits. Meanwhile, in the May 2 episode, the law firm tackles a case drawn

- from the real-life videotaped police beating of Rodney King.
- In the movies and miniseries department, Jill Clayburgh plays actress Jill Ireland, who struggled to help her son recover from drug addiction before cancer took her own life in the tentatively titled "Life Lines" premiering May 20.
- And "Donnie Bedelia" stars in the four-hour miniseries "Switched at Birth," to be broadcast this weekend, about a real-life

Marriage appears to mellow 'Wild Man' Willis

NEW YORK - Just a few years ago, he was known as "The Wild Man." Today, he is married to actress Demi Moore and is the father of a 2½-year-old daughter who will any day now have a sister or brother. Have marriage and fatherhood sobered Bruce Willis? It would seem so. On television, he laments the excesses of his 20s. "They were a waste," he said. He smarts when Kitty Kelley's name is mentioned. "What a parasite," he said. "It's terrible when your crowning achievement is to pick up a lead pencil and write those things," he said. "I despise it. It's awful when you get a \$1 million advance to write a slant and a trash piece." Willis has good reason to loathe this kind of journalism. He has been a frequent target of the supermarket tabloids. "That's the negative side of all this," said Willis, "the gossip."

He is not too happy about the business reporting, either, the stories on budgets, salaries, etc. "All that kind of thinking has had its effect," he said. "It's all big business now. They are scraping away all of the mystery

of it, they won't go to the movies anymore because every secret, every trick is uncovered." At the moment, Willis and Moore are visible in "Mortal Thoughts," a mystery melodrama (with a few laughs). In the film, Willis plays the husband of Joyce (Glenn Close). A British man, he is murdered before the film is very far along. Moore plays Joyce's good friend, Cynthia, and she and her off-screen husband have several scenes together. In one, they slap each other around when he attacks her. So how did it feel to beat up on his own wife, all in the name of art? "Well, we had two things going for us," Willis said. "One was the film, and the other was what was going on between two actors who know each other." "We were able to start at a much higher point of departure because we have communication and trust, two elements you wouldn't have had with a stranger. The movie, however, is about those two women. My character is just one of the things that happen to them." It's true. The women are really the stars of the film. Willis, who gets third billing, is doing what amounts to a supporting role. Does that bother him?

"I'm not threatened by that," he said. "It gives me focus as an actor. Others would have me be larger than life, but I don't care about that. What I do every day is keep myself humble. I don't believe all the hype. It's just a job. Doing supporting roles keeps it all fresh and exhilarating. If I were to do 'Die Hard 32,' you'd be tired of me, and besides, when you do supporting roles, you don't have to carry the film." Willis also had a supporting role in "Bonfire of the Vanities," his previous film, one that he believes deserved better treatment than it received. "The movie suffered from all that hype," he said. "It was a foregone conclusion that no one would like it no matter what Brian De Palma did. You've got to translate a book when you do it for the screen. If you want to say you don't like the translation, that's fine, but people got in line to throw rocks at the film. Some reviews were written before the movie even appeared. Some critics felt the casting was wrong, the director was wrong and that my character shouldn't have been changed from English to American." "And even if it had been the most ex-

Video releases feature 4 fine foreign films

It's a week of abundance in home video: four excellent foreign films and three sequels. Of the latter, one is a worthwhile return to a classic, another stars rock star Prince and third is, well, "Rocky V."

MAY ROLLS 3½ stars. (1990) (Orion) 105 minutes. Michel Piccoli, Miu-Miu, Henry-Leclerc, Renaud Danner. Louis Malle's second visit to his childhood is almost as rewarding as his first (the superb "Au Revoir, Les Enfants"). Here he examines what happens when the children grow up to be mothers and fathers. Seamlessly set against the political upheaval in France in 1968, the witty and wistful script centers on a family gathered for a funeral. Piccoli leads a first-rate ensemble.

MONSIEUR HIRE 3½ stars. (1990) (Orion) 88 minutes. Michel Blanc, Andre Wilms, Sandrine Bonnaire. A romantic thriller from France that ranks with the best of Hitchcock. Blanc ("Menage") stars as a tailor and Peeping Tom suspected of molesting and murdering a young woman. Based on the Simonon novel that inspired the 1946 "Panique," Patrice Leconte's doomed romance brilliantly evokes a timeless, placeless sense of eroticism and isolation. Co-starring Bonnaire as the subject of Blanc's nocturnal peeping.

TEXASVILLE 3½ stars. (1990) (Nelson) 126 minutes. Jeff Bridges, Cybill Shepherd, Randy Quaid, Annie Potts, Timothy Bottoms. This Texas-fried "Peyton Place," Peter Bogdanovich's tragicomic sequel to "The Last Picture Show," reunites Bridges, Shepherd and Quaid to look at how the hopeful youth of Anarene, Texas, circa 1951, grew up to become unfulfilled middle-agers weathering the oil bust of 1984. Excellent performances from Bridges and Bridges, who plays his long-suffering, short-tempered wife.

JESUS OF MONTREAL 3 stars. (1989) (Orion) 119 minutes. Lothaire Bluteau, Gilles Pelletier, Johanne-Marie Tremblay. Denys Arcand's Canadian film is a satire of organized religion for particular and modern greed and hypocrisy in general is more than a broadside. It is, like its title figure, compassionate to sinners - especially a flawed priest who hires an out-of-work actor to "update" the annual Passion play. The film examines the chasm that separates what Jesus taught from what preachers actually practice.

TOO BEAUTIFUL FOR YOU 3 stars. (1990) (Orion) 91 minutes. Gerard Depardieu, Josiane Balasko, Carole Bouquet. The assumption of most French sex comedies is that the adulterous husband has a frump for a wife and a mistress who's a goddess. Not so in Bertrand Blier's eccentric comedy, in which Depardieu dumps his model-perfect wife (Chanel "face" Carole Bouquet) for

the radiantly ordinary Josiane Balasko. An intriguing movie about the tyranny of the beautiful and the humility of the plain.

ROCKY V 2 stars. (1990) (MGM/UA) \$92.98, 105 minutes. Sylvester Stallone, Talia Shire, Burt Young, Sage Stallone. Round Five of the ring cycle that even Wagner might think a tad long is a split decision: After suffering brain damage - like his audience - during "Rocky IV," Rocky finds a clone of his youthful self, trains his protégé for a shot at the title and copes with his son's jealousy. Repetition of previous rhetoric about winning turns the air staler than a post-fight locker room. Stallone says this is the last one. May he be like Rocky in always keeping his word.

(1990) (Warner) \$92.99, 90 minutes. Prince, Morris Day, Jerome Benton, Ingrid Chavez. A dark-blue haze of a movie in which Prings-resurrected his "Purple Rain" protagonist, The Kid, and again does battle with Morris Day, his cartoonish nemesis and leader of the group the Time. Written, directed and scored by the diminutive, batty-eyed rock star, this is a fuzzy-headed tale about rival club owners, rival bands and a mysterious young beauty (Chavez) who stares into her decolletage and sighs, "I'm forever searching for the spiritual substitute of sex." This ain't it.

VINTAGE FILMS:
THE ALPHABET MURDERS (1966) (MGM/UA) \$19.98, 91 minutes. Tony Randall, Robert Morley, Anita Ekberg, Guy Rolfe. Randall is a bit, disconcerting as Agatha Christie's Belgian detective, Hercule Poirot, tracking down a killer who seems to be murdering people in alphabetical order. Watch Margaret Rutherford, as "Christie's" Miss Marple, in a very catnip.

COOLEY, HIGH 3 stars. (1975) (Orion) 107 minutes. Glynn Turman, Lawrence-Hilton Jacobs, Garrett Morris, Corin Rogers. Amusing but flimsy "American Graffiti" spinoff set in inner-city Chicago. Turman registers, strongly, despite amateurish direction.

KISS ME DEADLY 4 stars. (1955) (MGM/UA) \$19.98, 106 minutes. Ralph Meeker, Albert Dekker, Cloris Leachman, Paul Stewart. Robert Aldrich's violent, neon-washed adaptation of Mickey Spillane's bloody detective thriller is a precursor of the French New Wave. Meeker is a suitably-nasty Mike Hammer.

RATINGS: 4 stars, excellent; 3 stars, good; 2 stars, fair; 1 star, poor. Videos with no stars were not reviewed.

Mickey Rooney spares no one in new autobiography

LOS ANGELES—Mickey Rooney was posing for a nostalgic photo outside his old home grounds, MGM studios, now occupied by Sony-owned Columbia Pictures, when a minor official strode up.
 "Have you cleared this with the publicity department?" the young woman inquired. Rooney was understandably upset.
 "Young lady, I spent 14 years of my life at this studio when it was MGM," he snapped. "I made \$6 billion for this studio."
 The figure may seem inflated, Rooney being prone to hyperbole. Yet there can be no doubt that he enriched the MGM treasure at a time when he was the No. 1 box-office star. The low-budget Andy Hardy movies and the musicals with Judy Garland earned huge profits.
 Rooney covers his MGM heyday as well as the rest of his tumultuous 70 years in his new autobiography, "Life Is Too Short."
 The author spares no one, especially himself.

Puck in Warner Bros. "A Midsummer Night's Dream." "A Family Affair" in 1937 was the first of the 17 Hardy Family movies which captured the nation with their old-fashioned family values.
 "It was a kinder, softer time in our great country," Rooney observed. "Now everything is so violent (in films). Cars turning over. I love Charlie Bronson's movies. Clint Eastwood, Chuck Norris, Sylvester Stallone — I like them as much as anyone else. But the pictures have gotten to be more like cartoons."
 Rooney's popularity peaked in the early 1940s with the Hardy series, musicals such as "Babes in Arms" and "Girl Crazy" and such dramas as "The Human Comedy" and "National Velvet."
 After his army service in World War II, Rooney's career began to slide. Leaving MGM in 1948, he busied himself in good pictures ("The Bridges at Toko-Ri," "Requiem for a Heavyweight") but mostly bad.

"How to Stuff a Wild Bikini," "The Private Lives of Adam and Eve."
 "The Black Stallion," which brought him an Academy nomination as supporting actor in 1979, also polished the luster of the film career.
 Rooney was asked for thumbnail portraits of some of the greats he worked with. His replies:
 • Clark Gable: "Silent repose ... almost afraid to let you know that he was Clark Gable."
 • Lewis St. (Judge Hardy): "My surrogate father. Yet ... I don't work in 17 Hardy pictures without becoming close."
 • Lionel Barrymore: "Talented, beautiful man who suffered in his late years with rheumatoid arthritis. A lot of people don't know that he was the first Judge Hardy."
 • Joan Crawford: "Invasive, but glamorous. She epitomized Hollywood and mystery and star."
 • Red Skelton: "Clown-of-clothes. Much like Gable, he's become a real sort."
 • William Holden: "Who ... a man who in later years was a real ... unhappiness."
 As always, Rooney is full of plans for the future, including a Broadway musical he has written about himself and Judy Garland. Reflecting on his good times and bad times, he commented:
 "That's what you grow. But how come I ... not past 5 feet-3? I think they kept ... a refrigerator or something. I ... seven sons and five daughters and four grandchildren, and most of them are 6 foot or over. Mickey Jr. is 6 feet 4. You figure it out."

Seagal's 'Out for Justice' misses the mark

The roll 'Steven Seagal was on may come to an end with "Out for Justice." Seagal's previous films ("Above the Law," "Marked for Death," "Hard to Kill") were on their own level, entertaining. You wouldn't include any of them in a top 10 list, but they were, as action films go, fast and exciting.

"Out for Justice" is neither. It's an out-and-out clunker.

This murky muddle of a film has an uneven soundtrack, and at times the dialogue is inaudible. But that may be a blessing. Often enough the dialogue isn't worth hearing.

Like all of Seagal's movies, this one is big on violence, but it is so silly, so badly staged, it plays like The Three Stooges. It is ugly, yes, but you will never believe it. You may even laugh at it.

Seagal plays Gino Felino, a New York cop who learns that his Brooklyn neighborhood is being terrorized by a former acquaintance, a bully Gino knew as a kid.

Today, the bully, Richie Madano, is killing, killing, killing on the streets - anywhere his mood takes him. He is a four-foot man whose brain has been destroyed by drugs. If a woman driver is foolish enough to ask Richie to get his car

out of the way, he is very likely to put a bullet through her head, which he does.

Felino seems to work failure. No other cops seem to be around. It is just he and Madano, which adds to

the silliness. Adding to the inanity is the wreckage. People don't go into a bar to drink. They go in to wreck things - the tables, the bar, the bottles, anything that can be destroyed.

William Forsythe plays the killer. Forsythe was Flattop in "Dick Tracy." He has not yet left the comics.

As Felino, Seagal is up to the usual. He bops his enemies and breaks a lot of bones. Seagal's movies are big on crunch and crack. The star, however, is putting on weight, which, for a karate star, can be a distraction.

As the cop, Seagal speaks a bit of Italian, which is given to us through subtitle. Later, we get subtitles for passages in Spanish. These may be the only intelligent portions of the film, which is mercifully short.

Because the movie takes place in Brooklyn, the mob is around. Actually, they want to get Madano as much as Felino does, but we all know who is going to get there first, bopping and crunching all the way.

"Out for Justice" is more laughable than sinister, and that may not be what Seagal, who co-produced, and John Flynn, who directed, had in mind.

Who knows what they had in mind?

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Persuasive detail rarely seen helps 'Class Action'

Capsule reviews

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

CLASS ACTION (R) The film's undeniable fun comes from watching lawyers Gene Hackman and Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio tangle as a strained father-daughter who find themselves on opposite sides of a class action suit. The courtroom conclusion may surprise no one; the inferences that money-and-prestigious law firms and scrappy activist ones both bend the letter of the law to their own purposes may not be big news. But director John Dahl and his fellow artists have done something special in drawing Hackman's and wife Joanna Merlin's convictions carry through to every detail of daily living, from fits and business associates, to where and how one lives. That's a rarely-seen and extremely rich and persuasive detail and it gives this film an extra resonance.

THE DOORS (R) A sometimes terrific, incendiary bio of Lizard King and Vietnam War-era rebel Jim Morrison of the Doors. Portraying one of his youthful idols, Oliver Stone tries to put us right in the hot core of the action, while also lyricizing it, giving it a stylized framework. Twenty-five Doors songs, performed by the Doors - with occasional vocals by star Val Kilmer, enrich the visual math for Morrison - and provide a constant choric commentary and Stone, as usual, blasts our ears and scorches our eyes. If he

doesn't quite blow our minds, it's still a hell of a ride and a great, roaring rock movie.

THE SILENCE OF THE LAMBS (R) "Thomas" Harris' harrowing, mesmerizing book concerned an institutionalized psychopath who is used to identify a rampaging serial-killer. In a fine adaptation, director Jonathan Demme and screenwriter Ted Tally have focussed on a duel of wits and wills between Jodie Foster's young FBI trainee and that paradigm-of-evil, Dr. Hannibal Lecter (Anthony Hopkins). Hopkins is glittering in the showier role, but Foster carries the film, suggesting the strength, gravity, intelligence and compassion of Clarice Starling. For audiences, the fascination is how much both actors are able to do with their literally or occupationally straightjacketed characters. Although Demme does not dwell on the gore, it's definitely there, making it a film not for the faint of heart.

SLEEPING WITH THE ENEMY (R) A solid book has been inflated by overproduction and underwriting into thin melodrama to make a vehicle for Julia Roberts, playing an abused wife who tries to begin her life again. Patrick Bergin, uncharismatic, as Sir Richard Burton in "Mounting of the Moon," is even more so here as her menacing husband. It's another fairy tale for Roberts; wife abuse being seen here as no more grueling than Roberts' job as a Hollywood Boulevard hooker in "Pretty Woman," and she attacks this role with the same blind compliance and dazzling superficial warmth.

New video shows teen-age rock fans the proper way to party on

SECAUCUS, N.J. (AP) — Though not quite "Miss Manners Does the Meadowlands," a video aimed at teen-age thrash-rock fans lays down some concert etiquette.

Its message: Please refrain from comporting yourself as a drunken jerk, and gets no change.

The star-studded, 10-minute "Ted and Julie Visited the Meadowlands," which will be shown in schools and local cinemas, is supposed to show concertgoers how not to behave.

At Secaucus Middle-High School, the audience — prone to shrieks at the merest hint of Jon Bon Jovi — viewed the decidedly unexcellent adventures of Ted and Julie, interspersed with hip-sounding sermons from athletes, disc jockeys and rock stars, and a cameo by Bon Jovi.

The video's release follows the deaths of three concertgoers in the last two years and complaints about harassment and beatings by Meadowlands' security guards.

The plot is periodically summarized in flashy MTV-style graphics that leap from the screen — in all capital letters. The story goes like this: 17-year-old Ted is a JERK and subjects Julie to a DATE FROM HELL as he takes her to a Grateful Dead concert at the Meadowlands.

Julie gets increasingly bummed out as Ted evolves into a TOTAL

LOSER by committing every faux pas in the concertgoer's guide to good manners.

He pays a scalper \$200 for a pair of seats high in the nosbleed section — RIP OFF — and pays \$20 for a \$10 bootleg T-shirt in the parking lot, and gets no change.

Guards at the entrance have a hunch something is WRONG. Upon demand, Ted surrenders a half-drunk bottle of fortified wine from his coat and a can of malt liquor from his pants.

Lucky for Ted, Julie already made a SMART MOVE by grabbing his sandwich bag of marijuana and stuffing it back in the car.

Once inside, the energetic Ted jumps up and down on his seat, bangs into his neighbors and pelts them with popcorn when they complain.

Security guards arrive, Ted is BUSTED and the couple are escorted out. In the parking lot, an impatient Ted asks for another date, but Julie makes a GOOD MOVE, tells him he's a jerk and storms off to call her father for a ride home.

Anna Reilly, 15, said she was on Julie's side, having run into a few Teds.

"It's sad how kids of my own age group ruin the concert for you," the ninth-grader said. "It makes me kind of angry when they stand up on their

chairs and cut through lines and start fights."

But some of the video's stars at the screening weren't ready to put all the blame on the Teds of New Jersey, saying that security guards have been part of the problem.

"We need to educate both sides of the fence, kids and security," said Joe Lynn Turner, long-haired Black-catck native and lead singer for the rock group Deep Purple. "From up on stage, I can look down and see security guards on power trips as well as completely rowdy concertgoers."

The video was paid for by the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority, which operates the Meadowlands.

Meadowlands security guards have drawn criticism for their allegedly rough behavior. In November, 21-year-old David Gregory died after a scuffle with a state trooper before an AC-DC concert.

The suspicious death of Adam Katz outside a Grateful Dead concert in 1989 remains unsolved, as does the death of 26-year-old Ronald Siroosky, who was killed during a fight with an unknown man outside a concert by The Who in June 1989.

In March, two former security guards were sentenced to two years' probation for assaulting Meadowlands patrons.

Writer's Oscar back in foundation's hands

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Writer William Saroyan's Oscar is back in the hands of the Saroyan Foundation a year after it disappeared and turned up in a pawn shop.

The statuette, presented in 1943 for Saroyan's screenplay of "The Human Comedy," became the property of the foundation when he died in 1981.

The foundation later loaned the Oscar to Saroyan's sister, but when

she died last year it was not among her property.

Then a mysterious man who claimed to be a friend of the family hooked it at Darryl Kaplan's pawn shop in the Mission District for \$250.

Kaplan refused offers to buy it and, in a brief ceremony, the Oscar was given to foundation head Robert Setrakian, a member of the U.S. Postal Service Board of Governors,

who was joined by Postmaster General Anthony Frink, who displayed an enlargement of a 22-cent commemorative stamp that honors the writer. The stamp will be issued in Fresno, Saroyan's hometown, on May 22.

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DAT revolution: A no-progress report

Has the digital audio tape format made much progress since its introduction in the United States by Sony last June?

Not really. DAT, now also marketed by JVC, Denon, Casio and Technics, was ballyhooed as the next big audio boom — possibly replacing the CD. With a DAT recorder, you can make a tape that is CD quality — minus the hiss and distortions that make standard (analog) tapes sound muddy. The advantage over CD players is that DAT players also record while the CD technology allows only for playback.

So far, though, several factors have prevented a DAT explosion, including the price of the DAT players (roughly \$800 to \$1,000) and the lack of pre-recorded software — there are only a few hundred titles on the market. Another problem has been a rival format — the digital compact cassette — looming on the horizon.

"Until they get down to about

\$500, nobody except wealthy people, professionals or audiophiles will be buying them," said Jesse Jacobson, vice president of the DAT Store in Santa Monica, Calif.

And without pre-recorded tapes, all you can do with a DAT machine is make flawless copies of CDs.

There is no hope of record companies releasing pre-recorded DAT tapes until the settlement of a class-action suit filed against Sony by the National Music Publishers' Association last July 9. Concerned about consumers taping CDs instead of purchasing them, it asked a New York federal court to declare the unauthorized taping by DAT equipment a violation of copyright law and to ban Sony from importing and selling decks and blank cassettes in the United States. But the case still has not come to trial and there is no indication that a settlement is near. DAT decks do come equipped with circuitry that prevents making multiple copies of the same tape. This compromise, though, was reached without approval of the songwriters and publishers, who want sharcages — on blank DAT


tapes, for instance — to make up for lost royalties.

DAT's biggest problem may be the digital compact cassette, which is being developed by Philips in conjunction with the Tandy Corp. This machine, reportedly due on the market sometime next year, not only plays and records digitally, but also plays standard analog tapes. The two-in-one player will cost about \$500, and its blank tapes will be cheaper than DAT blanks.

Another plus, for record companies, is the fact that pre-recorded DCC's cost less to manufacture than DATs.

DCC's digital capabilities aren't equal to DAT's, but the difference is minimal — particularly to the untrained ear.

"I think what will happen is that the DCC will take over most of the consumer sales from DAT," Jacobson speculated, echoing a widespread view in the industry. "The DAT will end up being primarily for professionals. It's a better format, but in the consumer market, the better format doesn't always win."

Harmon tackles 2nd multiple-murder role in new 'Hall of Fame' production

"I think serial murders reflect something about our nation's psyche and that violence is definitely very much a part of it."

So says Mark Harmon, who plays multiple murderer Uncle Charlie in "Shadow of a Doubt," a "Hallmark Hall of Fame Presentation," airing Sunday, April 28, on CBS. Harmon previously played real-life serial killer Ted Bundy in "The Deliberate Stranger."

In that 1986 miniseries, Harmon's character murdered more than a score of young women, all the time maintaining a gentlemanly public demeanor. In "Shadow of a Doubt," he plays another wholesome-looking character, who returns to his small Norman Rockwell-esque California hometown to live with his sister (Diane Ladd) and teen-age niece (Margaret Welsh), also named Charlie after him. But Uncle Charlie, we learn, has killed a series of rich widows.

"Bundy's story was more outwardly about deception than Uncle Charlie's," says Harmon. "Bundy was deceiving everyone. However, Uncle Charlie's deeds are known to one person, his niece. This story is about suspense, but it's also about corruption of innocence. And ultimately the no-longer-innocent child becomes her uncle's judge and jury."

The more serious theme, Harmon suggests, is probably what attracted the prestigious Hallmark producers to remake the story. The classic 1945 film of the same name was directed by the master of suspense, Alfred Hitchcock, and co-written by Thornton Wilder, author of the classic humanistic play "Our Town."

Harmon first saw the original movie while he was a student at UCLA: "I loved it then, and I love it now," he says. "What I admire is that Joseph Cotten, the actor who played Charlie, somehow managed to retain an air of innocence, no matter how psychotic the character was revealed to be. The ambiguity, the doubting of Charlie is what drives the whole movie."

Harmon says that remaking a Hitchcock classic is not as intimidat-

ing as it might sound. The television movie was written by John Gay, who has adapted other classics for Hallmark, including "Witness for the Prosecution" (1982) and "The Hunchback of Notre-Dame" (1982). Of director Karen Arthur (whose credits include 1985's "The Rape of Richard Beck"), Harmon says, "She's tough. Just like I'm not intimidated by playing the character Cotten played in the original, Karen's not intimidated by the legacy of Alfred Hitchcock. She's not a self-doubter, and that's the kind of person I like to work with."

Nor is Harmon excessively troubled by self-doubt. Embarrassingly dubbed "The Sexiest Man in America" by People magazine a few years ago, he has pursued serious, complex dramatic roles ever since. He starred in the theatrical film "The Presidio" (1988) and will star in the

upcoming "Cold Heaven," directed by Nicolas Roeg. He successfully played opposite Elizabeth Taylor in the television remake of "Sweet Bird of Youth" last season, and this year Harmon has essayed the title role of "Dillinger" and headed the cast of the well-regarded TV movie "Long Road Home." He is in the midst of filming the pilot of a proposed new crime series, in which he stars opposite deaf actress Marlee Matlin. Harmon promises this series "is going to be very innovative. And at least in this I'm on the right side of the law."

Soap focuses on national problem

Susan Flannery's Stephanie Forrester, a selfish, overpowering woman determined to have her way on "The Bold and the Beautiful," experienced a small stroke recently and ended up in the gutter.

Privileged Stephanie, experiencing life among the homeless, is producer Bill Bell's way of injecting a national problem into Forrester's narrow world.

It's a case of opposites. Hoity-toity Stephanie turns into a helpless creature almost overnight. Befriended by Michelle Davison's Ruthanne, a strong black woman able to make the best of anything, Stephanie begins to function again, and even flirts with a man down on his luck, Adam. The idea is to create sympathy for a lady created to irritate.

It's clear without Ruthanne's protection and friendship, Stephanie would have folded like a tent on Skid Row. Friendship saves Stephanie, something foreign to the lady. If she becomes aware of the troubles of the homeless, Stephanie might change into a useful woman. That's the long-range possibility.

Michelle Davison can only speculate. At least, Michelle has signed a contract, a clue that Bill Bell isn't going to dump the homeless story this spring. Davison last appeared in '87 on "The Young and the Restless" where, for a few episodes, she played Ruth during Ashley's time in the mental institution.

When casting around for the role of Ruthanne, somebody remembered Michelle. She auditioned and got the job: Steady pay for a while. Michelle is in clover.

It wasn't long ago that Michelle worked for L.A. City Schools in the speech and pathology department. She carried a caseload of 120 students requiring attention in seven schools, and she covered them all once a week. Some were on-going problems, others required a semester or less of counselling and training. The program worked.

"But I wanted to be an actress," says Michelle. "My mother knew the odds against a working black actress and insisted I have an alternate. I went to the University of Minnesota and graduated with a degree in speech

pathology. I came to L.A. because I like the place and caught on with the school system."

Still Michelle had that deep down yearning about acting. She couldn't wait until she retired as a teacher, and she took the plunge, working in little theatres and on episodic TV.

The gamble paid off.

Black Ruthanne opens the doors for white, helpless Stephanie down there on Skid Row. With Stephanie, Bell makes the point that the plight of the homeless can happen to anybody. Our safety nets no longer do the job.

Will we as a nation solve this festering sore?

"Eventually, yes," answers Michelle. "With all the exposure we're aware of the problem. Pretty soon we may concentrate and do something. We can't sweep it under the rug much longer."

Q: Roscanno Barr was suing a couple of supermarket scandal sheets or threatening to sue them. Has she dropped the idea of litigation as many stars do? — J. McC.

A: While part of Roscanno's suit against the National Enquirer was dismissed due to a technicality, the other charges were left in place. The newspaper had published excerpts of love letters that she and Tom Arnold had exchanged before they were married. Barr claims that the newspaper stole the letters from her and inflicted emotional distress. Barr is also suing for copyright infringement, conspiracy and invasion of privacy. I hear that Barr is determined to have her day in court.

Q: We've always been fans of Loretta Young, one of Hollywood's greatest leading ladies. How can we find out more about her? — H.J.

A: Loretta, now 78, remains one

of Hollywood's most interesting personalities. Those who saw Loretta's films of the '30s and caught her stately TV appearances of the '50s are not likely to soon forget this fine actress. Young has never been that much of a self-publicist. But I expect we'll soon learn more about her. Loretta tells me she's preparing a book of her memoirs, which will cover the 30 years of Loretta's life since her 1961 autobiography, "The Things I Had to Learn."

Q: Sophia Loren comes across as one cool cookie on television. Tell us, is this self-possessed Sophia for real or is it more acting? — J.B.

A: Sophia is a cool, firm woman who knows her way around professionally. On occasions where she's called upon to speak in public at a special appearance (such as the christening of a ship) she reads some prepared words, poses for a few pictures — and that's it. Nothing extra, nothing off-the-cuff. When finished, she waves reporters and photographers aside with a brisk "That's it, boys," and means it. Any further pleading for additional posing, etc. is likely to bring a glare and a brusque, "I've told you, that's enough. No more pictures."

TOO MANY COOKS... Dinah

Shore was in Seattle recently promoting her new cookbook. She autographed two for a man and asked who they were for. He explained that one was for his wife, the other for his mistress so they could both whip up his favorite dishes. (Maybe one of them will eventually throw the book at him?)

Q: Where do studios get the cars used in movies? Do they already own them as part of their big prop departments? — C.M.

A: Cars are obtained from a number of different sources. Car manufacturers regularly provide automobiles in exchange for the exposure they receive. In addition, independent car brokers act as agents for privately owned cars available for rent. They charge the owners 25 percent of the rental fee, which can range anywhere from \$75 (1970 Volkswagen) to \$1000 (1933 Duesenberg) per day depending on the car's uniqueness and the way it will be used. Cars that work steadily on a TV series remain on the studio lot and owners are either paid for each day of shooting involving the car or they receive a flat fee per month. Television's "Hunter" series uses five matching cars for star Fred Dryer's police detective car. Each of the cars is used differently: for sitting in, stunt work, exterior shots, etc.

NBC's entertainment boss said to be discussing new job with Paramount

NEW YORK (AP) — Brandon Tartikoff, who helped keep NBC at the top of prime-time ratings for the past six years, reportedly is talking with Paramount Communications Inc. about heading its film and television production studio.

Neither Paramount nor NBC would comment on the published reports. A spokeswoman for Tartikoff said Tuesday he was not returning media calls.

The report first appeared Monday in *The Hollywood Reporter*, which cited a highly-placed Paramount insider it didn't name. A similar account appeared Tuesday in *The New York Times*, which cited a senior television industry executive it didn't identify.

Paramount has been looking for a new chairman and chief executive of Paramount Pictures since Frank G. Mancuso left March 20.

Mancuso's abrupt departure came two days after influential film producer Stanley Jaffe was named president and chief operating officer of the studio's parent company.

That move placed Jaffe, who once reported to Mancuso, in charge of the Paramount Pictures operation as well as Paramount's publishing division.

Mancuso later sued Paramount, saying he was forced out in violation of his contract.

The Hollywood Reporter said it has been widely speculated that Tartikoff aspires to head a film studio.

But chances that NBC's parent, General Electric Co., would offer him that chance by buying a studio appeared to dim in view of the Federal Communications Commission's recent decision to modify rather than repeal rules that limit involvement of the broadcast networks in program production.

Tartikoff, 42, became president of the NBC Entertainment division in 1980 after 2½ years after joining the company as a director for comedy programs.

He guided the network to the top spot among the three major networks in the prime-time ratings in

the 1985-86 fall television season. The network has remained on top each year since, though its lead over ABC and CBS has shrunk.

Among shows that have helped put NBC on top have been "Cheers," "Family Ties" and "The Cosby Show." NBC has also aired award-winning series during Tartikoff's tenure such as "Hill Street Blues," "St. Elsewhere" and "L.A. Law."

Last year, the NBC Entertainment division was restructured and Tartikoff was installed as chairman to give him a break from day-to-day concerns, and allow him to focus on long-range strategic issues facing the division.

He was replaced as president by Warren Littlefield.

The Times story said the senior TV industry executive familiar with the situation said Tartikoff "is feeling burned out" and was disappointed with the FCC decision on the financial interest and syndication rules.

Nicholas Ashooh, a spokesman for Paramount, said Paramount would not comment on any rumors and said no decisions had been made on a new studio boss.

Susan Binford, a spokeswoman for NBC Entertainment in Burbank, Calif., said that to the best of her knowledge, Tartikoff plans to stay put.

"He has given every indication that he plans on remaining at NBC," she said.



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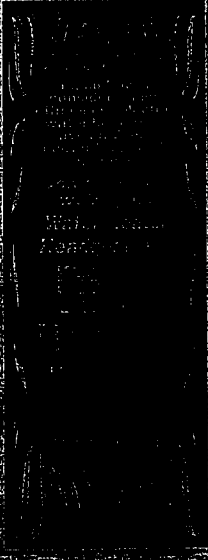


