Library addition filling up

Book transfer will be finished by this weekend

TWIN FALLS — The move to the children's library in the new building is complete and the new mezzanine is nearly full as well, said Twin Falls Public Library director Arlan Call on Thursday.

"It's looking like we're on target," Call said.

He expects the adult library to be moved into the new section by Saturday. Crews started moving materials early this week.

Call said the entire new section probably won't be available to the public until next week, although the children's section is open and the adult section on the mezzanine will be in business soon.

The move from the old section of the library to the new part has been accomplished the old-fashioned way — through volunteer help, Call said. While the library has not been overwhelmed with volunteers, enough people have helped out that the move is going well.

Of course, anyone who wants to volunteer is welcome.

Workers soon will begin remodeling the old section of the library to look like the new part, Call said. This is expected to be completed by June 7.

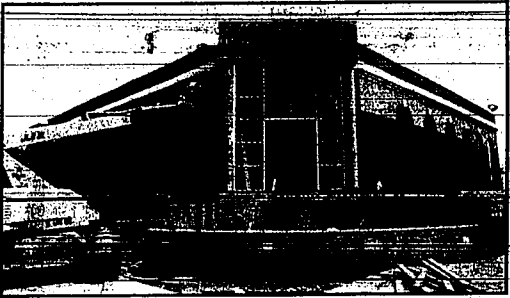
The new front entrance will be open before May 29.

Offices and the stack area for adult fiction will be housed in the older section.

The library will hold an open house to celebrate the finished building sometime in June, Call said.

Bush has Graves' disease

WASHINGTON — President Bush is suffering from Graves' disease, a common and treatable thyroid condition that is not life-threatening, his physicians announced Thursday.

"The president remains in excellent spirits, is in good health, without adverse symptoms of any kind," said Dr. Burton Lee, Bush's personal physician. He said that he and Bush's other physicians have urged the president to relax his schedule temporarily.

"We've been working ... to try to give him a break over the next week," Lee said. "He does not request this. Every time we try to give him a break, he tries to add things into his schedule. But he does listen to his physicians, and he is going to be cutting back his schedule a bit over the next week."

To that end, Bush canceled a Monday trip to Chicago and announced that Vice President Dan Quayle would take his place.

Bush's condition was disclosed when he underwent a diagnostic thyroid scan at Bethesda Naval Hospital Thursday morning. Graves is one of three general types of hyperthyroidism and the same kind also diagnosed in first lady Barbara Bush in 1989.

The president was immediately given a standard dose of radioactive iodine, standard therapy for his condition.

"We anticipate that the president will be fully restored to his usual vigorous state of health very quickly," said Dr. Kenneth Burman, an endocrinologist at Walter Reed Army Hospital and a member of the president's treatment team. Lee added that

Target outlet seems on way for Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — A national discount-store chain apparently has targeted Twin Falls for a new discount store.

In a move to accommodate Minneapolis-based Target Stores, the development company Woodbury Corp. is reworking its shopping-center plans near the Pole Line Road-Battle Lake Boulevard intersection.

While Woodbury Vice President Mel Clement refused to confirm that Target plans a store in Twin Falls, city zoning maps have the Target name written into the space. And at a recent Twin Falls City Council meeting, Target was cited as the driving force behind Salt Lake City-based Woodbury's proposed changes.

Target Stores is a division of the Minnesota retailing giant Dayton Hudson Corp. Target is what an industry publication calls the upper middle class, with about \$3 billion in annual sales and 56,000 employees.

Demo senator seeks gun control compromise

WASHINGTON — A key Senate Democrat signaled a willingness Thursday to compromise on provisions of President Bush's anti-crime bill to gain the president's support for gun-control legislation.

Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., chairman of the Judiciary Committee, vowed to send an anti-crime package to the floor "as rapidly

as I can" to meet Bush's challenge to enact the legislation by June 15.

House passage of a seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases on Wednesday was a "phenomenal victory" for gun control advocates that could lead to compromise with the White House on key elements of the president's anti-crime package, Biden said.

One disputed element of Bush's bill would make it harder for state prisoners, particularly those on death row, to file

habeas corpus petitions in federal court to challenge their sentences.

Another would expand the exceptions to the so-called exclusionary rule that bars prosecutors from using illegally seized evidence in court.

"I think there is room for compromise on both," Biden said, although he and other key lawmakers said working out an agreement would be difficult. "It requires genuine compromise on habeas corpus," he said.

Rape charge in Florida names Kennedy nephew

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — William Kennedy Smith was charged with rape on Thursday, nearly six weeks after a 29-year-old woman reported he attacked her at the Kennedy family's seaside estate.

State Attorney David Budworth said a warrant had been issued for Smith's arrest, and police cited the 30-year-old Georgetown University medical student was expected to surrender early next week.

"I'm very confident that when the thing is resolved that I'll be able to stand by my original statement, which was that I didn't commit an offense of any kind," Smith said in Washington.

In a statement, the woman, stepdaughter of a Midwestern industrialist, said: "I feel a profound sense of relief and vindication." If convicted, a defendant with no prior

criminal record could face a sentence from probation to 4½ years under sentencing guidelines.

Budworth's announcement before more than 100 reporters capped weeks of speculation and controversy in the United States and overseas. The intense interest has been driven in part by the fact that Smith was with his uncle, Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and the state Rep. Patrick Kennedy, the night of the incident.

Extensive news coverage of the event has itself been a topic of debate, in part over the decision of some news organizations, to name the woman who made the accusation.

Providing more fuel for that debate, Budworth announced that he had filed misdemeanor charges against the publishers of The Globe newspaper, the

Former Miss America describes ordeal of incest

DENVER — A former Miss America on Thursday revealed a dark family secret: that her millionaire father repeatedly assaulted her sexually.

Marilyn Van Derbur, Miss America 1958, said reporters she was making her story public to help children and their families by making the crime "speakeable."

"A list of all my accomplishments since 1958 — pale before the only real accomplishment of my life, said in only three words: I survived incest," Van Derbur said.

There are so many children that are going to be violated tonight and I fear they don't have options," she said. "I've thought it through ... and I believe that the greatest service that we adult survivors can give to the children

is to stand up in such vast numbers that we begin to take away the stigma and the shame."

The offender was her father, the late Francis S. Van Derbur — millionaire Denver businessman, socialite, philanthropist and pillar of the community, she said. He died in 1984.

Van Derbur, 53, met with reporters Thursday after telling her story of incest to a support group meeting at the Kempe National Center for the Prevention and Treatment of Child Abuse and Neglect.

Van Derbur told "about 150 people" she was "olated" by her father from ages 5 to 18.

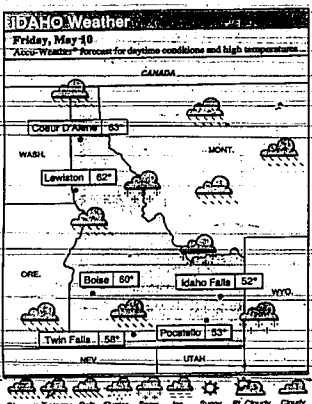
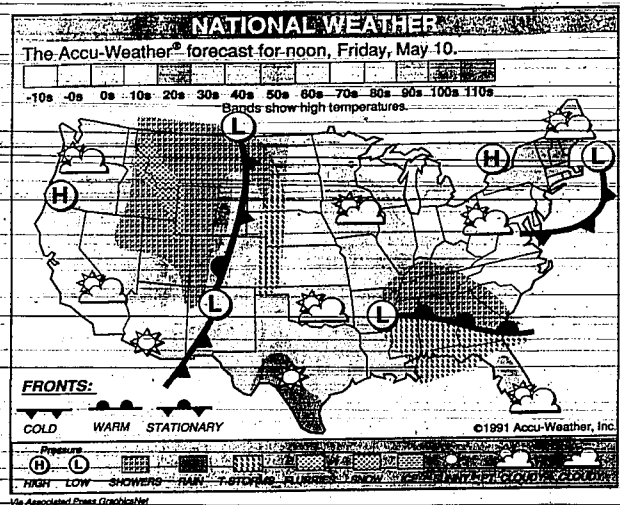

The National Weather Service said locally heavy snow is expected in the higher mountains of Idaho today.

Storms over Alberta and Nevada continued to produce unsettled weather across Idaho. Precipitation was lighter in the valleys Thursday, but locally heavy snow is expected over the higher mountains through Friday.

The storm will shift southeast and some drying should occur by Sunday.

Precipitation was widespread over southeast Idaho Thursday afternoon, while mostly cloudy skies and scattered showers covered the rest of the state.

Snow, gusty winds buffet West as storms soak South

Thunderstorms grew in number, size and strength over the Gulf states Thursday while snow fell in Nevada and California and high winds blew across parts of the West.

Up to a foot of snow had fallen in the northern Sierras by morning. Up to six inches of snow was expected in northeastern Nevada during the night.

High wind warnings were posted for southern Utah, Nevada, Arizona and California, with gusts to 60 mph possible in Utah. Winds reaching 45 mph rained scattered dust and sand clouds over a wide area.

Oversecretion of thyroid hormones can produce weight loss, increased appetite, intolerance to heat, and a rapid heart rate.

Bush "is carrying on all of his normal responsibilities."

The thyroid, a small organ in the neck, secretes a hormone called thyroxine that regulates how fat tissues throughout the body burn sugar and produce energy. Graves' disease results from an abnormality in the immune system where the body manufactures antibodies that stimulate the thyroid gland to overproduce the hormone.

The doctors said that they will also continue the drug regimen begun last weekend to stabilize Bush—a "irregular heartbeat" condition called atrial fibrillation, which was caused by his overactive thyroid. Bush spent Saturday and Sunday nights at the naval hospital after complaining of shortness-of-breath while jogging at Camp David on Saturday afternoon. He returned to the White House Monday.

Bush has been taking the drugs digoxin and procainamide to treat the fibrillation, along with coumadin—an anticoagulant—to reduce the risk of blood clots with atrial fibrillation have a slight risk of developing blood clots in the atria of the heart that can break free and travel to the brain, causing stroke.

The physicians said that when Bush's normal thyroid hormone levels are reached—approximately two to six weeks—the heart medicines will be tapered until he no longer needs them. They said, however, that Bush may require long-term thyroid hormone replacement therapy, depending on the effect of the iodine treatment, which can sometimes damage or destroy the thyroid gland.

"Although rapid iodine begins to exert its effect immediately, the full effect may not be noted for two to three months," Burman said.

In the interim, he said, the president will take a saturated solution of iodine for approximately two weeks "that will more rapidly restore the serum thyroid hormone levels to normal."

With correction of the thyroid abnormality, the tendency toward atrial fibrillation will probably disappear.

Boce Baton-based supermarket to print the first American paper.

Bludworth charged the tabloid with violating a 1911 Florida statute that bans identifying pye victims.

In a statement read by her attorney, the woman thanked her family, friends and lawyers for supporting her and other victims of rape, whose courage has been of immense value.

"Rape needs to be reported to keep others from going through this ordeal," attorney David Roth quoted her as saying. But she added that "had I known my name would have been released, it might have dissuaded me from going through this."

Bludworth charged Smith with one count of sexual battery, a second-degree felony, and one count of battery, a first-degree misdemeanor. Rape is classified as sexual battery in Florida.

The prosecutor also released an eight-page police affidavit that provided a detailed description of the allegations by the woman, who lives in nearby Jupiter.

The woman said Smith raped her by the pool of the Kennedy estate as she struggled to free herself from his grasp. At one point she said, he told her to "stop bitching."

Palm Beach Police Chief Joseph Terlizze said that Smith's "have done" to you I never would have done it."

"I must tell you I didn't believe him then and I don't believe him now. But let it be a cry for every father that his excuse can never again be used. A daughter assaulted and traumatized by a father is devastated to every aspect of her life."

The assaults split her into two disparate lives—the driven personality, the beauty queen, the Phi Beta Kappa scholar she would call herself, and the fearful, repressed "nightchild" who harbored unspoken secrets.

"During—the days, no, embarrassing or angry glances ever passed between my father and me because I had no conscious knowledge of the traumas and errors of the nightchild."

"But the more degraded the nightchild became, the more the daylight needed to excel."

Smith was not arrested Sunday afternoon when he learned of any such allegation.

Bush clips Sununu's free wings

WASHINGTON—President Bush on Thursday revoked Chief of Staff John Sununu's travel authority, curtailing his ability to attend personal travel only in cases of immediate and compelling need.

Bush decreed that Sununu must seek the White House approval before using government planes.

Under the new policy, the counsel's office also will determine whether the government must be reimbursed, a switch from the previous practice that had Sununu using his own discretion to categorize trips as official, personal or political.

The new policy emerged from a review Bush ordered from his legal counsel, Gregory Sisk. After disclosures that Sununu had used government planes for political trips and personal travel, including ski vacations, as well as for official business.

Gregory also reviewed Sununu's own travel records and determined that two trips to the Christa McAuliffe charity ski weekend in his home state of New Hampshire, which Sununu had classified as official, should have been categorized as personal.

The White House attorney also said Sununu must reimburse the government for a June 1990 trip to see his dentist in Boston, where he was also on an official business trip in Concord. After Concord, he flew back to Boston for another official appearance.

In addition, Gray said the government must be reimbursed for parts of the trips that had been categorized as well.

On the other hand, Gray determined that Sununu characterized four trips as political in nature, or at least had an official component. Gray told Sununu that part of the reimbursement paid by the Republican Party for those events should be returned to the party.

Sununu was found to be within ethical guidelines in accepting free meals, lodging and lift tickets on various ski weekends.

"I'm pleased with the review that was done," Sununu said in an interview with The Associated Press. "I told them when they did the review I would agree with whatever assessments and recommendations they made. I'm very happy at the conclusion they've drawn."

"We try to give a cleaner, better merchandise image than the typical discounters," Boise Target manager Warner Hauer said. "We're not only trying to provide an upscale image, but we're very committed to customers."

The store would be located on the northern edge of the 78-acre parcel that Woodbury owns south of Pole Butte and west of Blue Lakes Boulevard.

Target operates about 420 stores nationwide, including 24 in the Pacific Northwest, Hauer said. It has one store in Boise and plans to open another in Coeur d'Alene this October.

The chain's stores typically are 80,000 to 120,000 square feet. The remodeled Twin Falls K mart store is 90,000 square feet.

Target is the third major retail company to consider a move to Twin Falls. Salt Lake-based Zion Cooperative Mercantile Industries has been talking about a move for several years, and Lamonts Apparel Inc. of Boise has said it has announced plans to build a store onto the Magie Valley Mall.

Target officials don't return phone calls to The Times-News on Thursday.

Senator says Medicare paying millions for junk equipment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Taxpayers are being billed for millions of dollars by Medicare for last year for 850 types of durable medical equipment, one of which was a telephone answering machine, a Republican senator said Thursday.

The most blatant example cited by Sen. William Cohen of Maine, senior Republican on the Senate Aging Committee, was a two-inch-thick, mattress-size piece of corrugated pink foam that was advertised as a shaving bed.

An equipment supplier paid \$28.57 for the foam and sold it to older Americans for prices that ranged as high as \$1,132, Cohen told a news conference. The federal government paid \$943 of the cost; the patient presumably paid the remainder.

"Millions of dollars have been collected by shameless durable-medical-equipment marketers with dollar signs in their eyes who are blind to the threat their equipment often poses and to the harassment they cause," Cohen said. Medicare paid \$2.2 billion last year for 850 types of durable medical equipment, one of which was a telephone answering machine, a Republican senator said Thursday.

Cohen reported on preliminary results of an investigation by Republican staff members of the Aging Committee with assistance from the inspector-general's office in the Department of Health and Human Services. He said he was the top Republican on the Senate panel, and he is flying to Philadelphia to hold a hearing on Medicare equipment abuses when he was killed in an air collision April 4.

"The investigation will be continuing in the weeks ahead and we will be working closely with (HHS) to determine the best method for stopping these costly practices," Cohen said.

Among options for correcting the abuses, he said, is requiring that no durable medical equipment be financed by Medicare unless prescribed by a physician.

GAO says count of homeless too flawed to use

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Census Bureau's special \$2.9 million count last year of people sleeping outdoors and in shelters was so flawed that it is useless as a tool for designing programs to help the homeless, a congressional investigator said Thursday.

"The number has one purpose and one value," said L. Nye Stevens of the General Accounting Office. "It does not add to the overall population count of the country. It does not have value for any other public purpose."

Stevens, in testimony before a joint hearing of House and Senate subcommittees, lent support to what he called the "outlet" of the homeless in its March 1990 operation called S-Night. The undertaking counted 228,621 homeless on the streets and in the shelters.

Stevens said he and his colleagues have been in the streets since S-Night.

Bill wants more strict controls on pesticides

WASHINGTON (AP) — Christina Locke's life as a concert pianist and champion ice skater was ruined when she was drugged by chemicals being sprayed on a neighbor's yard, she testified Thursday before a Senate panel considering legislation to tighten controls on such pesticides.

"My health was destroyed in minutes," Ms. Locke told the Senate Environment Committee's subcommittee on toxic substances.

Democratic Sen. Joseph Lieberman of Connecticut and Harry Reid of Nevada are sponsors of legislation that would require lawn care companies to notify neighbors before they apply pesticides or herbicides.

"Too many of us fail to recognize that the chemicals that kill weeds and bugs are also powerful enough to threaten the environment and even human health," Lieberman said. "Are we doing enough to protect people from the tests notify them of these threats?"

Ms. Locke said she was nearly blinded and has had to use canes to walk since the incident, which also killed her dog and cat. She said the lawn-care company, which was not named in her testimony, refused to tell her what chemicals it was using.

The panel, chaired by Reid, also heard from an 8-year-old boy who can't go to school for fear of pesticide exposure, a college student who sometimes lives in her car to avoid pesticide spraying near her home and a man who said his health was ruined by the interjection of a lawn care chemical with the prescription drug he was taking.

Reid said he hoped the Environmental Protection Agency would work harder to assess the health risks of lawn chemicals and tighten restrictions.

Warren E. Stickle, president of the Chemical Producers and Distributors Association, urged the senators to consider the "significant human health benefits and reduced risks for millions of Americans" stemming from use of lawn care chemicals.

"Herbicides control ragweed, thus reducing suffering from hay fever," Stickle said. "Other herbicides control dandelions and clover, and reduce weeds from recreational and home and lawn areas, thus reducing bee stings. Approximately 45 to 50 people each year die of bee stings."

Stickle said the Senate bill's notification system was so extensive it would be "unworkable, uneconomical and ineffective, and would be extremely burdensome" to businesses and local governments.

Ann McClure, executive vice president of the Professional Lawn Care Association of America, said her group would support a more limited notification requirement, covering people who live adjacent to a customer's property and who submit a doctor's certificate that confirms they are sensitive to lawn-care chemicals.

She said the association also backs a requirement to post markers on lawns when the products are applied.

Military exceeds recruiting goals

WASHINGTON (AP) — All military services met or surpassed their recruiting goals in the first half of fiscal 1991, when the United States was preparing for its fight against Iraq in the Middle East, the Pentagon said Thursday.

"To date, Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm have had no adverse effect on recruiting," the Pentagon said in announcing recruitment results for October through March.

It said 107,500 men and women enlisted in the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines, compared to 104,800 in the same period of fiscal 1990.

Panel OKs abortion ban

RATON BOUCE La. (AP) — A state House committee Thursday approved two anti-abortion bills, the harshest of which would send a doctor to prison for up to 15 years for ending a pregnancy.

The other measure would send a doctor who performs an abortion to jail for up to 10 years. Both would allow abortions to save "pregnant women's lives" and the bill with the tighter penalty also provided exceptions for victims of rape or incest.

Both bills would face immediate court challenge, and were written with the idea of overturning the 1973 Supreme Court decision that established abortion rights.

With Thursday's approval from the Criminal Justice Committee, both measures go next to the full House. If they make it through the House and Senate, both face close scrutiny from Gov. Buddy Roemer, who last year angered abortion opponents with his veto of similar legislation.

In Montgomery, Ala., a bill that would prohibit abortions except in cases of rape, incest or a threat to the life of the mother was approved by the House Health Committee 11-2 Wednesday. The bill, which carries penalties of up to 10 years in prison for physicians performing illegal abortions, could come up for a vote in the House of Representatives as early as next week.

David Smolin, a law professor at Cumberland Law School in Birmingham, said the bill also is designed to provide a legal challenge to overturn the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

Interior Committee gets new chairman

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., an aggressive environmentalist, succeeded Morris K. Udall as chairman of the House Interior Committee Thursday.

Miller was approved by the Democratic caucus, 13-2, and then accepted by the full House on a voice vote. At 45, he is the youngest chairman of a major committee in Congress.

The lawmaker said his approach to legislation would remain the same. He has 17 years on the committee — to make sure that public lands and resources are treated well and the government gets a fair return when private interests use them.

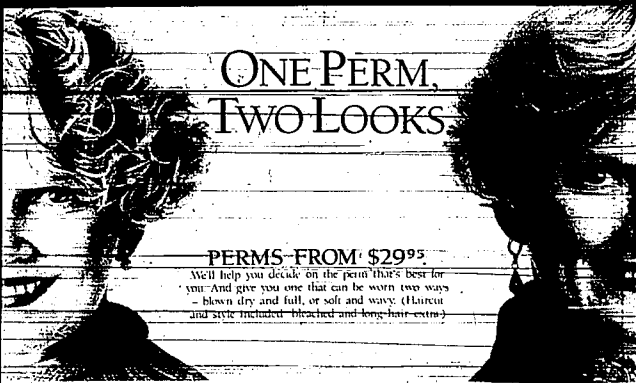

Why the fuss? Quayle's doing OK

Republicans should force Symms into retirement

We hope the rumors are true that Idaho Sen. Steve Symms is considering retirement rather than another race for the Senate in 1992. It's time for Symms to leave Congress, where he's been for 20 years.

Idaho Republican Party Chairman Phil Batt said his party wants Symms to run for a third term in the Senate. "I have every confidence that we will win that seat with Steve Symms," Batt said.

Recently, Rep. Richard Stallings, the Democrat who represents Idaho's 2nd District, announced he's preparing for a campaign against Symms. He said several polls show him winning the seat. The next day, Symms said he wasn't ready to declare whether he would seek a third term and raised the possibility that he would retire.

Privately, the state's leading Republicans have mixed feelings about Symms running again for his seat. And for good reason.

The 52-year-old University of Idaho graduate has not exactly matured since his freshman days here in Moscow. He is better known in Washington, as well as in Idaho, for drafting attractive female companions than he is for drafting legislation. Classroom chatter in the U.S. Senate in the few years since Symms abandoned his crumpled wife-and-family has often centered on who Symms escorted to the most recent Bellway function.

This Gary Hart-type behavior, which Idaho media have previously been too cowardly to report, could doom the winner from Caldwell.

And that's not even mentioning how in-

effective Symms has been as a legislator. With 20 years in Congress, Symms has few significant pieces of legislation to his credit. Symms has fewer still federal projects he can claim he has brought home to Idaho.

In short, he's spent more time playing that performing for Idaho.

That isn't the only reason Symms should step aside in 1992. There are several potential Republican candidates who could do a better job. Lt. Gov. Butch Otter, Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne, Latah County's Tom Boyd or even Phil Batt himself would make excellent, effective and respectable Republican candidates for Senate.

The nation—and Idaho—have outgrown Symms and the empty rhetoric he hasn't changed in 20 years. Symms quickly tried to label Stallings a "tax and spend" politician—the same charge he's made against every opponent. Symms, for his part, would be hard pressed to defend himself from the same label. Since he's been in Washington, the federal budget has gone from \$500 billion to \$1.23 trillion and the deficit has grown even greater.

Symms once said he hoped someone would come to Washington and drag him by his boots back to Idaho if he became a lifelong politician. If Symms should mistakenly decide to run in 1992, Idaho Republican leaders should book a flight to Washington to grab some boots.

The Moscow Idahoian

The words "arbitrary fibrillation" were scrawled on our lips, and President Bush barely settled into the Bethesda Naval Hospital in the "Quality factor" popped up in the headlines. The president's heart problem unexpectedly put Vice President Dan Quayle on probation. Without warning, his qualifications were again up for review.

In certain liberal quarters one even detected an uncharacteristic solicitude for the president's health. There were suggestions that he might consider retiring in his hectic schedule, take it easy for a while—anything rather than put us at risk of a Quayle presidency.

Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas, described in one account as "a possible presidential contender" lost no time in launching an attack on the vice president, at the same time appealing for prayers for Bush. Meanwhile, Republicans in Washington were reported to be speaking "in the lowest of murmurs" about the vice president, implying the hatching of plots of offstage.

For decades, of course, vice presidents have received only the most cursory attention. Perhaps it's something about the job itself that makes its holders seem smaller than life and unqualified for promotion. Nonetheless, Quayle has received more than his fair share of abuse, and this campaign of disparagement has often been mean-spirited. He is, I believe, perfectly well-qualified to be president.

He is certainly more intelligent than is generally assumed. As I found out when I was assigned to interview him a couple of years ago. He had been vice president for two months, and I was granted an hour's audience in the West Wing. My task was to discern the extent of his commitment to conservative ideas. Piece of cake, I thought, but as I left the White House I realized that he had maneuvered his way through the conversation quite deftly.

He made forthright statements on issues that (in retrospect) were not very controversial (the trustworthiness of the Soviet Union, the merit of communism), but at other times he gave carefully qualified, even guarded answers. (On national security, for example, he said he was "considered" to be a hard-line, leaving unclarified the question

whether he really was one or not.) In the end he easily ran out the clock with soothing speeches on issues too tedious to describe. (When he brought up the Job Training Partnership Act, I knew it was time to throw in the towel.)

On balance, I suspect that Quayle is fairly conservative—certainly more so than his boss. But his conservatism tends to be of the type that accepts high domestic spending in exchange for high military spending. Quayle's aides are mostly young neo-conservatives who (unusually for Republicans) are alert enough to know what their opponents are up to.

Quayle's own youth is another point in his favor. For years, the great problem with the Republican Party has been its domination by men for whom the Depression and World War II were not merely formative but overpowering influences. They have believed that a large, activist government is something that cannot really be opposed by people of goodwill. In short they are Democrats at heart, with the reservation that big business, too, should get a helping hand from Washington.

Quayle does not share the can-do enthusiasm for limited government that is so characteristic of Bush's generation. Several observers have noted that at times he has seemed remarkably uninterested in the whole project of governing. Several years ago he told political scientist Richard Fenno that when he was a congressman from Indiana, he was "very bored in the House." Being a Republican there was "an awful job," he added. When Bush picked him as his running mate, there was hints that he had been planning to quit the Senate at the end-of-his-term.

If he remains not much interested in the fine print of social policy (as I suspect), and at some point does become president, he would probably end up disappointing those who think we are over-governed. The reason is that cutting back government is obviously the unsolved conundrum of our age; bitterly resisted by the recipient classes, and if it is to be achieved it will require the full-time

attention of someone (Margaret Thatcher comes to mind) who is singlemindedly committed to the task.

One only has to mention such qualities to appreciate that Dan Quayle doesn't have them and never will. My recollection of our interview is that he spoke rather more affectionately of the Paradise Valley golf course in Phoenix, Ariz., than he did about reducing the level of government regulation and taxation.

In fact, one wonders why the liberals seem so hostile to him. He's a genial, serenely self-confident man who no doubt would do a perfectly competent job in the Oval Office. But who would be most unlikely to try to upset the existing order.

The new high school with its tie to the College of Southern Idaho, too, is being offered by the administration of CSI, will allow two very important steps:

1. Non-college-bound students will start in their junior year of high school to get training in needed trades so that they are able to enter the job market at above minimum wages immediately out of high school.
2. College-bound students can cross over and take some entry-level college courses so

that they enter college with a head start.

In addition, the tax base can be broadened by bringing in more industry. The new vo-tech high school will allow courses to be tailored made for industry that would like to come to the area if the labor skills they need are in the work force.

Example: Several years ago, a company wanted to buy a plant in Savannah, Ga., where I come from, to build aircraft. It needed workers, and it needed electrical workers and so on. The vo-tech high school in Savannah, in conjunction with the economic development office of that area, said, "You agree to build the plant and in two years when you are ready to start production, we will have the workers for you."

They tailor made a vo-tech program to suit this industry. The deal was signed, based on this vo-tech school, and today, just nine years later, they are the largest single employer of the county with over 2,500 employees in good-paying trade jobs. Most of the trainees were and are kids who were headed for dropout.

How can a property owner and taxpayer not vote for this bond issue? We can find reasons not to vote for something, but for the long-range future, the proposal is needed.

There were many reasons for the new 30-bed jail, including size of the old jail, overcrowding, cost of housing prisoners in other counties, etc. The pamphlet makes our jail advisory committee sound very forward looking and progressive.

Progressive and forward looking do not describe the county commissioner's personal attitude, however. I have my doubts that we'll ever need a 30-bed facility in Owyhee County as long as the office of the prosecuting attorney is kept on a part-time basis with part-time compensation and our sheriff's office is understaffed and underpaid.

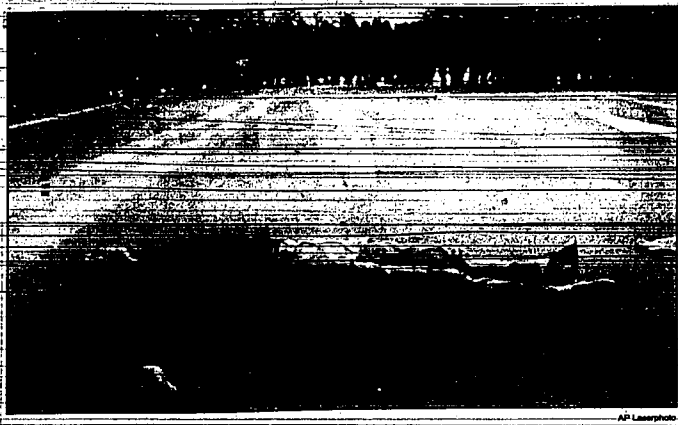

Tens of thousands of S. Korean protesters clash with riot police

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Riot police swinging truncheons and firing tear gas fought tens of thousands of demonstrators Thursday in the largest anti-government protests in three years.

Radical students cut their fingers to write protests in blood and carried wood-coffins to symbolize their hope for the end of the ruling party of President Roh Tae-woo.

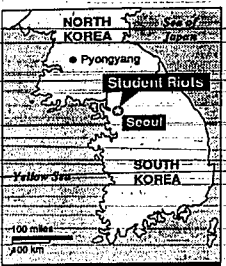
Fighting was the most widespread since Roh took office in 1988 and was considered certain to deepen the political crisis for his government embroiled in controversy since the April 26 fatal police beating of a student.

Police said at one point 35,000 protesters hurling firebombs and rocks were a block from the U.S. Embassy and heading toward the presidential Blue House mansion.

"Murderous regime!" screamed the mob. "Down with (President) Roh Tae-woo!"

Protests took place in 87 cities and townships, news reports said. Police said street protests took place in 37 cities; 11 of them violent.

News reports said at least 200,000 protesters took part in protests nationwide. Up to 1 million people



"Terminate suppressive rule," chanted about 200 members of the main opposition New Democratic Party near Seoul's City Hall. Tear gas wafted around them.

Nearly about 60 members of the smaller opposition Democratic Party chanted "Disband the DLP (ruling party)." The two groups included 29 national legislators.

In dozens of more peaceful protests, marchers carried black framed portraits of 20-year-old Kang Kyung-dae, the student beaten to death by police and hailed a patriot. His death has sparked two weeks of anti-government protests and brought calls for economic and political reform.

Roh fired a Cabinet minister and arrested five riot police involved in the student's death, but critics say it's not enough.

Forces seize 2 more Armenian villages

YEREVAN, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Soviet and Azerbaidzhan troops occupied two more Armenian-populated villages Thursday, but residents of a third settlement avoided an attack by surrendering their arms, Armenia's Interior Ministry said.

The Interior Ministry said the troops fired on Manasht and Ushu and occupied the villages, but officials said they had no further details.

Soviet troops also had threatened to storm Azerbaijan, a town of about 5,000 people 135 miles northeast of

Yerevan, but residents complied with demands they give up their weapons Thursday and no attack occurred, the ministry said.

Earlier Thursday, Armenia's interior minister, Ashot Manucharian, criticized the siege of Artzavshan and said he feared Soviet troops would continue to seize Armenian villages along both sides of the border with Azerbaijan.

"After each bloody action, it's harder to refrain from the next one," he said.

Armenian officials said Soviet troops had seized at least eight Armenian settlements.

Manucharian said at a news conference in Yerevan, the Armenian capital, that 48 Armenians had died during "punitive actions" by Soviet troops during the past 10 days.

The fighting started when Soviet troops, sometimes accompanied by Azerbaijanian not police, attempted to disarm Armenian police and vigilantes along the 600-mile border between the two southern republics.

Volcano sets off landslides in Costa Rica

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — A volcano erupted in northern Costa Rica near the Nicaraguan border, spewing lava and setting off a series of landslides that swept away bridges to two mountain villages, an official said Thursday.

There were no reports of injuries.

Five hundred people in the villages of Buenos Aires and Dos Rios de Upala were cut off from transportation by the two eruptions Wednesday near the Rincon de La Vieja volcano, said Vilma Barboza, a volcanologist at National University.

The 5,900-foot volcano, with a crater 1,600 feet in diameter, is about 115 miles north of San Jose, the capital. It started rumbling and letting off steam and debris earlier this week after being inactive since 1983.

"The explosions set off an avalanche of lava — ashes, sulphur, mud and rocks — that swept away the two bridges on the Penjamo River leading to the two villages," Barboza said.

She said the rain of ashes blanketed surrounding woods for miles around, dammed up and muddied parts of the Penjamo River and has been uprooting trees and ruining crops and pasture.

Guerrilla checkpoint shut down

ZAKHO, Iraq (AP) — U.S. military police on Thursday shut down the biggest Kurdish guerrilla checkpoint in occupied Iraq, indicating growing impatience with Kurdish leaders for not helping move refugees down from the mountains.

The allies also said they had received Iraqi assurances that the Iraqi army would avoid shooting incidents like firing anti-aircraft guns at a U.S. Navy plane early Wednesday.

Allied officers said Thursday they were heartened that local Kurdish guerrilla leaders had met for the first time with a high Iraqi officer to discuss reducing tensions. Participants at the meeting Wednesday night said both sides agreed to try to form a joint police force for the security zone.

The Kurds' meeting with Brig. Gen. Nushwan Danoun, Saddam Hussein's liaison with coalition forces in northern Iraq, tried by the general met with allied officers to give assurances Iraqi troops would avoid firefights.

It was not clear if Gen. Nushwan actually admitted the Iraqis had fired at the plane. Officials in Baghdad denied Iraqi forces had anything to do with the attack.

In other developments Thursday:

- The last American troops withdrew from the former battle zone in southern Iraq on Wednesday and left a U.N. peacekeeping force in charge of 9-mile-wide demilitarized strip on the Iraq-Kuwait border.
- Iraq rejected a U.S.-backed proposal for a U.N. police force in northern Iraq. U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar said. Perez de Cuellar said he had received Saddam's rejection of the proposal "by special envoy" shortly before his morning meeting in Washington with President Bush.
- Senior relief officials said 70,000 Kurdish refugees who fled a failed rebellion against Saddam in Iraq following the Gulf War have gone home. "We do not know whether they are going back for good or if it is just temporary," Omar Bakht, head of the U.N. High Commission for Refugees in Iran, said in Tehran.

Brazilian economic officials resign

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Brazil's central bank president and other top economic officials resigned Thursday, a day after the economy minister quit under fire from business, labor and foreign creditors.

Economy Minister Zelia Cardoso de Mello's resignation Wednesday followed a 14-month battle to control spiralling inflation and prop up declining industries. Her policies, which included a freeze on bank accounts, angered many Brazilians.

Central Bank President Ibrahim

Erís, his entire staff and the secretary of economic policy, Antonio Kandir, announced their resignations at a news conference Thursday in Brasilia.

Marcello Marques Moreira, 59, Brazil's ambassador to the United States, was named the new economy minister. He is to take office Friday, when he is expected to name a new economic team.

Francisco Gross, 49, a former central bank president, was nominated to replace Erís.

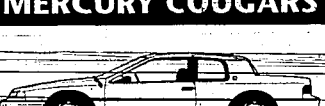

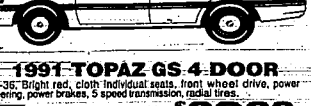

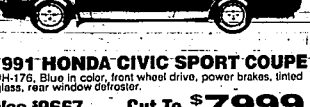

Slack winter sends airport funds into tailspin

HAILEY — Mild winter weather produced a decline in airport traffic at Friedman airport, resulting in a 34 percent decrease in revenues.

Gearing up to face the 1992 budget, the Blaine County Airport Commission Tuesday night reviewed several factors relevant to setting the budget. A budget workshop to hash over revenues and expenses will be

held May 21 from 5 to 7 p.m. at the courthouse and is open to the public.

Due to several additional expenses incurred through the course of this year, the 1991 budget will need to be reworked and amended later this summer. Airport Manager Todd Wirthin said. Funds are available to pay for these expenses from the airport's reserve account.

An air traffic summary report given by Wirthin revealed there were 16,000 operations during December, 1989 to March

1990, but only 13,000 operations during the same time period this year.

In addition, receipts from commercial air carriers to pay for on-site fire protection were lower than anticipated.

Estimated revenues of \$39,000 to \$42,000 may be collected from Horizon Airlines and Sky West Airlines for fire protection required by the Federal Aviation Administration and supplied by Hailey's fire department.

However, the airport's contract with the

city of Hailey is for \$55,000, leaving a \$13,000 deficit which will be paid for with money from the reserve account.

Commissioner Steve Keenan, a Hailey city councilman, suggested the commission add a line item to the budget which would enable the airport to pay the city of Hailey rent for use of the city-owned land on which the airport is located.

Hailey has not specified an amount of

Sass said he would eliminate grades kindergarten through 12 and letter grades

Testimony wraps up in molestation proceedings

TWIN FALLS — The girl who says she was sexually molested by a Twin Falls man more than two years ago played only a bit part in the drama that unfolded in 5th District Court Thursday.

The case against Thomas Phillips, 51, took a turn in favor of the prosecution when Judge Daniel Meehl said early in the day that he would allow the testimony of three women who told the jury Phillips molested them when they visited his house as children.

At a hearing Wednesday afternoon that interrupted the trial,

Phillips' attorney, Monte Carlson, said the woman's testimony would be devastating to his client if allowed.

"If this evidence comes in, we're dead ... This trial is over," Carlson said during that hearing. Phillips has not been charged with any crimes stemming from the women's allegations and should not have to defend himself against charges unrelated to the case, Carlson said.

Meehl allowed the testimony, however, telling the jury not to use the information as evidence of Phillips' character. The evidence was intended to show that Phillips had a pattern of sexual abuse and that he intended to touch the 12-year-old girl who spurred the sexual abuse charge against him, Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor Julie Sturgill said.

Phillips is charged with touching the girl sexually while she was at his 155 Monroe St. home. According to the girl's testimony, she was struggling to get away from Phillips when his daughter knocked on the door and came inside the house. Phillips then let go of the girl and she was able to get away, the girl said.

Phillips faces a second charge of sexual abuse of a child involving a different girl in a case scheduled for trial later this year. Further attention was focused on the Phillips family in March, when his 16-year-old daughter Nikie committed suicide.

Committee favors Southern home for weapons reactor

WASHINGTON — A House committee has approved a resolution favoring a South Carolina site for the proposed \$5.6 billion New Production Reactor, a facility the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory hopes to land.

The non-binding House of Representatives resolution, approved during a closed session of the House Armed Services Committee Wednesday, urges Energy Secretary James Watkins to select the Savannah River site near Aiken, S.C., for the NPR.

The resolution, pushed by South Carolina's congressional delegation, could be a setback for INEL. NPR will produce radioactive tritium for nuclear

weapons and is expected to generate 2,000 construction jobs and hundreds of permanent jobs.

Tritium is a radioactive form of hydrogen used to increase the yield of nuclear bombs. The reactor also could be used to produce plutonium.

The Energy Department is proceeding with a complex environmental process to select the site and has scheduled 13 hearings on the document this month. The first is scheduled May 16 in Idaho Falls and another will be May 20 at Pocatello and in Twin Falls on May 23.

An odd coalition of NPR supporters and opponents reacted angrily to the resolution, saying it short-circuits the

City refuses to vacate street for business' expansion plan

TWIN FALLS — With alternative traffic routes to Blue Lakes Boulevard North badly needed, the Twin Falls City Council refused this week to vacate part of a street so a local mini-storage company can expand.

Meldeo Inc. wanted the city to vacate nearly 320 feet of Elm Street North so the company could expand its storage facilities.

But members of the council said keeping Elm Street open might, in a roundabout way, eventually help take pressure off North Blue Lakes by diverting traffic to Cheney Drive.

Elm Street runs parallel to Blue Lakes North, intersecting Laywdale and Cheney drives. Meldeo had asked that part of the section between Laywdale and Cheney be vacated.

But Cheney intersects Blue Lakes North

and aligns with Breckenridge Drive on the other side of the street. If the city completed Cheney to Locust, and then finished Locust to PG&E Line Road, Elm Street could tunnel traffic to Kossuth and up to Locust.

Completing the Cheney-Locust link also could open more land to development and provide an east-west traffic corridor because it aligns with Breckenridge, Councilman Jim Vickers said.

Jeff Rolig, representing Meldeo, said the city would not really give up anything of value by vacating Elm Street North. He said funneling traffic down Cheney to Blue Lakes would not minimize traffic on the boulevard.

Opening Cheney to more traffic from Blue Lakes also would promote left-hand turns on the boulevard, not a wise traffic pattern, Rolig said.

The council voted 5-2, however, to keep the right of way.

Twin Falls on state's short list for new work center

TWIN FALLS — The state's newest work center for convicted and parole felons who are in probation or parole could be built in Twin Falls.

A state corrections official was in town Thursday to drum up support for the project, which will be built in either Coeur d'Alene or Twin Falls.

"We want Coeur d'Alene and Twin Falls to kind of fight for it," said Eugene Larson, administrator for field- and community services for the Idaho Department of Corrections.

The Department of Corrections sent a request for proposals out to local construction firms and developers at the beginning of May. At the end of the month, the department will take the best proposal from Coeur d'Alene and the best proposal from Twin

Falls make a choice between the two, Larson said.

The purpose of a work center is to help convicts who are in danger of violating their probation or parole without locking them up, Larson said.

"There are currently 564 convicted felons living in this judicial district," he said. "Periodically some of them start to get out of control."

When that happens, rather than sending more people to the already-crowded state penitentiary, the Department of Corrections would like to put people in a work center where they are released for their jobs each day but their free time is supervised, Larson said.

The 5th Judicial District is comprised of Blaine, Camas, Gooding, Lincoln, Jerome, Twin Falls, Cassia and Minidoka Counties. Corrections officials hope to eventually open work centers in all seven of Idaho's ju-

dicial districts. The site not chosen this year will likely get a center next year, Larson said.

The work center will be modeled after the state's other two centers in Boise and Nampa. The center could open as early as January and will eventually hold more than 50 men, Larson said.

The facility will be built and owned by a private individual or group and leased by the state, he said. The Department of Corrections will provide the staff, he said.

The men taken to the existing work centers are required to check out each day when they leave for work and report back when they return, Larson said. The evenings are filled with hobby classes, such as fly-tying and woodworking, and other self-help activities, including Alcoholics Anonymous meetings and counseling, he said.

The centers also provides van pools to help people get to work and encourage they

as an alternative to hitch-hiking to a job. Men at the centers go on shopping trips together and can earn eight-hour passes to be with their families or girlfriends, he said.

"A lot of the process is just teaching these people what they should have learned when they were 14 to 18 years old," Larson said.

Only men already living in the area would be placed at the work center, meaning outsiders wouldn't be taking local jobs, he said.

"If they weren't in the work center, they'd be in their homes being visited by a probation officer — at most — once a day," Larson said. "This way we know what happens to them."

The work center gets 25 percent of each man's paycheck to help pay for operating costs. The cost to the state is about \$20 per day rather than \$35 per day at the penitentiary, Larson said. Men stay in the work centers about four months compared to an average of 42 months in the state prison, he said.

Continued from B1 attending a parent-teacher organization meeting representing 500 students. Alexander said she envisions a big school. "I see students in class, not driving around," she said. She sees a helping environment where students are not bullied but given the assistance they need. She also envisions enough teachers in the district to effectively meet the needs of children. Both candidates said they will vote for the \$20 million bond issue proposal. "Personally, I am definitely going to vote yes," Alexander said. The proposal would improve teacher-student ratios and allow the district to adopt the "wonderful" middle school concept, she said. It also is a long-term answer to

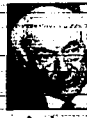

Continued from B1 News of her death spurred anonymous calls to the Twin Falls County prosecutor's office and the city police department implying the girl's death might not have been self-inflicted. "An autopsy revealed, however, that Nikie Phillips stepped on herself from a closet door and there was no evidence of foul play, according to Twin Falls County Coroner Carl Edwards. "Neither Nikie nor the girl who said she was molested by Phillips was the center of attention Thursday, as three local women, all in their twenties, gave emotional testimony that Phillips sexually abused them as children. "The first woman, now 25, said Phillips frequently took her inside his garage when she came to the Phillips house to play with his daughters

more than 10 years ago. There, Phillips showed her "dirty" magazines and would frequently try to brush past her breasts on the outside of her shirt or pat her behind, she said. "A 24-year-old woman repeated the story about photographic magazines in the garage. Phillips frequently performed sex acts on her from the time she was 6 or 7 years old, she said. She told the jury she was so afraid of Phillips that she didn't tell anyone until she was 20 years old and married. "He had drilled it into my head that I was nasty," she said. A third witness said Phillips first touched her sexually by age eight when she was 9 years old. She also said Phillips showed her sexually explicit magazines in his garage and claimed he had a "peephole" in the

bathtub. In Phillips' defense, Carlson pointed out that the girls continued to visit Phillips' daughters at the house long after the alleged incidents began. Under questioning from Carlson, Phillips' daughter denied earlier testimony that she knocked before entering the house and found her father strangling with the girl named in the complaint. "That's always been my home, and I've never knocked," Tammy Belcoe said, adding that she has no qualms about taking her own three children to visit their grandfather. "My father would not mess with anyone," Belcoe said. Both sides are expected to give closing arguments this morning and the case will be handed over to the nine women and three men in the jury.

Continued from B1 legal process of selecting an NPR site. "They are really kind of playing a cute little game here," Rep. Richard Stallings of Idaho said Thursday. "I guess what I'm surprised at is how blatant they are. Usually they use a little more subtlety." Snake River Alliance spokeswoman Patricia Baudlandeked anonymity in a letter concerning the resolution will undermine the open public debate in the environmental review process. "We don't want to remove the decision from the public process," she said. "They're trying to subvert the whole environmental impact statement process," said Tom Clements of Greenpeace in Atlanta. "But a spokesman for Rep. Butte Derrick, D-S.C., said the resolution is merely a way for Congress to have a say on NPR. Derrick, whose district includes the Savannah River site, sponsored the resolution. "It's by no means trying to bypass environmental laws," said Carrie Rowell, Derrick's press secretary. "The resolution will not affect the Energy Department's environmental review process or planned public hearings," said department spokesman Tim Tomastik. The department had nothing to do with resolution, he said. "The resolution says 'standing role' in producing tritium and other nuclear weapons materials, has the

expertise, the space and the infrastructure already in place for defense production. Derrick feels the site has a 40-year history of good sound management and he would like to see that continue, Rowell said. Besides, the local community is "reactor friendly," she said. "The Savannah River has halted construction of two facilities at the Savannah River Site. Westinghouse Savannah River Co. has suspended construction of tritium and uranium processing facilities at the Bechtel Corp. project. The Energy Department reviews the project and "until a more effective management plan can be identified and an improved process be put in place to assure compliance with Congressional directives and fiscal limitations," the department says. INEL, Savannah River and Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington state are all NPR candidates. "Watkins is expected to pick one in the next few weeks." If Watkins decides to locate the NPR in Idaho or Washington, the resolution would restrict the Energy Department from any site work for up to 90 days. Watkins also would have to submit a report to Congress explaining why he decided not to put NPR in South Carolina. Wednesday's committee action could be the first step in a renewed political battle that lawmakers have been pushing since they suggested that the Savannah River site has the political clout to land the NPR. While Derrick's resolution was

approved in committee, Stallings still claims a victory of sorts. He said the South Carolina delegation was pushing stronger language last week, mandating placing the NPR at Savannah River. "We have been partially successful to this point," he said. Stallings also said he would fight Derrick's resolution on the House floor. "The NPR resolution could come before the House later this month as part of a defense authorization bill."

Group works to preserve elk without winter handouts

HAILEY — Herds of elk once wintered on Wood River Valley bottomlands now occupied by subdivisions and hobby ranches. Development of the valley floor has forced the elk to winter ever higher on surrounding mountains where forage is inadequate two years out of every 10.

Helping these herds survive harsh winters and weaning them away from feeding programs has become a priority project for the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, an international non-profit organization based in Montana.

The local Wood River chapter of the foundation, formed in 1989, will hold a

Western-style barbecue in Hailey Saturday to raise money for elk habitat projects.

The barbecue will be held at Cutters, a cutting horse arena, beginning at 4 p.m. Cutting horse demonstrations are planned, as well as an auction and a cowboy poetry performance. Tickets are \$25 for individuals and \$45 per couple.

"As an organization, we don't really believe in elk feeding," said Hollis Poe, one of the local chapter organizers. "We only support it in desperate situations."

Here in the Wood River Valley, the valley floor has been taken away from the elk. That's where they used to go to survive the bad winters," she said.

Working cooperatively with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and the Saw-

tooth National Forest, the foundation supports development of alternative winter habitat for the elk. It plans to fund research and habitat improvement projects like bitterbrush plantings and controlled burns. A comprehensive plan for the Wood River elk will be the focus of a Forest Service environmental analysis beginning this fall.

If habitat improvements are successful, and the elk herds can be persuaded to move to better winter quarters, emergency feeding programs can be phased out. In the meantime the foundation plans to work with the Wood River Elk Trust, which finances local feeding sites, on a feeding program that will keep the herd viable.

Unlike other conservation groups, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation is apoliti-

cal. Gary Burnett, the foundation's regional supervisor, pointed out. It does not comment on forest plans or lobby for legislation.

Instead, the organization raises money primarily for research and habitat projects. In areas where critical habitat is in danger of development, the Elk Foundation sometimes purchases property for conservation.

Last year the 1,650-acre Bingham Ranch in southeastern Idaho was purchased in 1989. The foundation bought the 3,265-acre OTO Ranch just north of Yellowstone National Park from the Church Universal and Triumphant.

Unlike the Nature Conservancy, which also buys land, the Elk Foundation does not get involved in land management. Instead, it

leases and eventually sells its land purchases to public land agencies.

With more than 50,000 members nationwide, and local chapters in every state, the 5-year-old Elk Foundation's fund-raising has grown from \$14,500 in 1986 to \$1.7 million last year. By paying the \$20 dollars to matching funds from federal, state and private sources the foundation was able to more than triple the amount of money available for its habitat fund last year.

Court rules repeat DUIs call for tougher penalties

BOISE (AP) — Repeat drunken driving convictions within a five-year period call for tougher penalties, no matter in what order a driver is charged or convicted, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday in two separate cases upheld state laws calling for tougher penalties for repeat drunken driving offenses, with the third and subsequent convictions becoming felonies.

In Blaine County case, the Supreme Court reversed a lower court ruling that Michael Beach couldn't be convicted of a repeat DUI violation because his first case hadn't been decided when the second was filed.

The court said state law holds that if a defendant is found guilty of two drunken driving violations within five years, harsher penalties may be applied, regardless of whether the second charge comes before or after the first conviction.

As he did in the 1990 decision laying the groundwork for Thursday's ruling, Justice Stephen Bistline dissented. "The only way the threat of an enhanced penalty can deter conduct is if the prospective defendant is provided the time to alter his conduct," Bistline said.

In the case involved, he said, the defendant was in danger of an en-

hanced penalty before he had a chance to change his ways after the earlier violation.

The court also upheld the felony drunken driving conviction of Michael Garrett in an Ada County case. Garrett argued that although he was convicted of two DUI charges in 1985, he wasn't formally charged with a repeat offense the second time.

The court said the law requires only two previous convictions before the third violation raises the offense to a felony level.

Four members of the court upheld the use of an alcohol test, the horizontal gaze nystagmus (HGN) test. Justice Byron Johnson dissented, saying the officer's testimony did not provide a scientific basis for accepting results of the test.

In an Ada County estate case, the Supreme Court ordered Albert and Kathleen Blaser to pay \$47,267 in damages and interest to the estate of the late Rozella Nottingham. But the court reversed the award of \$10,000 in punitive damages against Blaser, saying there was insufficient basis for it.

Bistline dissented, noting Blaser's many delays and refusals to furnish documents and information in the legal proceedings. "It simply is not judicially possible to consider Blaser's conduct as anything but a substantial deviation from reasonable standards of human being in their dealings with one another," he said.

Judge finds for state in promotion lawsuit

BOISE (AP) — The state of Idaho has been awarded \$20,000 in fines and attorney fees against a Texas company and its president in what the state Department of Finance said was an illegal oil and gas promotion.

Finance Director Belton Patten said a district judge signed a judgment against Geotech Energy Corp. and its president, Michael G. Reedy, both of Houston.

In a lawsuit, the state alleged that Geotech solicited oil and gas leases in the state without being licensed in Idaho.

A judgment signed Wednesday by 4th District Judge Alan Schwartzman found that the company and Reedy violated the Idaho Securities Act.

Motion fails to remove judge from cruelty case

ELKO, Nev. — Former Buhl-area resident Arthur Trane lost a motion this week to disqualify a justice of the peace from hearing his trial on cruelty to animal charges.

Unless Trane appeals the ruling, the trial will go forward, but a date remains to be set. The trial had been scheduled for April 30.

Trane had claimed Justice of the Peace Marjane Kidner showed bias in refusing to lower his bail. But Justice of the Peace Molly Luddy did not agree.

"I didn't think that under the statute there was enough evidence to show that she (Kidner) was biased or prejudiced," Luddy said in a telephone interview.

Luddy did not know if Trane

planned to appeal the decision and his lawyer, Gary Underwood, was unavailable for comment Thursday.

Trane's motion to disqualify Kidner stemmed from a late-April hearing in which he asked her to reduce the number of charges against him from 16 to one, to reduce his bail from \$5,000 to zero and to release Trane on his own recognizance. He also asked evidence be heard without a search warrant barred from his trial.

Kidner denied all three requests.

Trane turned himself into Elko County authorities in late March and has been in jail since. Another former Buhl-area resident, Marilyn Evans, was jailed in early January on cruelty to animal charges after authorities discovered a so-called "puppy mill" about 20 miles north of Wells, Nev.

A number of dead and starving dogs, rabbits, chickens and peacocks allegedly were found in outside cages in freezing weather. Trane and Evans originally were charged with 197 counts of cruelty to animals.

Trane and Evans will be tried together, but Kidner did not know when the trial will start. A jury must be chosen an after that motion to change the trial location might be heard.

Before trying to get Kidner disqualified, Trane had claimed he could not get a fair trial in Wells and asked to have the trial moved. Kidner has not ruled on that request.

Kidner will try to reschedule the trial as soon as possible, but working with two defense attorneys and a prosecutor makes scheduling difficult.

"I'm afraid it might be into June," Kidner said.

Pool remains on target for opening on June 1

JEROME — The Jerome swimming pool is still scheduled to open June 1. Councilman Rocky Jackson, made that announcement at Tuesday's council meeting.

Students from the junior high school wanted the kiddie wading pool, volunteers have done much of the mechanical work and the block building for pool equipment is under construction. Rates and the daily schedule are yet to be decided.

The junior high students also moved sod in the park adjacent to the pool in preparation for volleyball and basketball courts that were taken down for the expansion of the Senior Citizen Center.

The council scheduled a public hearing on the city's application for a \$500,000 block grant that will help pay for the waste-water treatment plant upgrade. The hearing will be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at City Hall.

The improvements are necessary to handle waste products from businesses in the Industrial Park south of Jerome. In addition to comments from the public that can be given during the hearing, comments will be accepted for five days after the hearing, Mayor Gerald Ostler said.

The council also scheduled a public hearing to amend the city budget to include revenues, donations, expenses and other funding transactions required to operate the city swim-

ming pool. The hearing will be held at 7 p.m. May 28 at the City Hall.

The hearing will discuss the outline budget requirements totaling \$55,174. Written and oral comments from the public will be accepted.

In other business, the council:

- Gave unanimous approval for the purchase of 100 water meters at a cost of \$9,000. The meters will be used to replace meters currently installed.
- Heard the second reading of a bill that will allow a continuous, 24-hour agreement between the city and landlords for rental property. The agreement, when approved, will make landlords responsible for water and sewer services when a renter doesn't pay for the services or when he fails to move from the property without notifying the city to cease services in the renter's name.
- Approved John Curtiss as a volunteer fireman. With this appointment, the volunteer firefighter roster is filled, something that hasn't happened for a long time. Fire Chief Jim Auclair said.
- Heard the second reading of a bill to vacate city property at the end of Elm Street. The property adjoins the property owned by Lee and Nancy Preston and serves the Preston's only, Ostler said.
- Approved the purchase of a used 1-ton truck for the fire department to replace the volunteer firemen and then possibly bid to purchase needed firefighting equipment. Purchase price will be approximately \$6,000.

Lawmakers back big truck ban

BOISE (AP) — Two state lawmakers, including the chairman of the House Local Government Committee, have endorsed banning triple-trailer trucks from Idaho highways.

"They're a safety hazard," House Chairman Ruby Stone, R-Boise, said Thursday. "Plus, our highways are in bad shape. We don't need heavier bad shape. We don't need heavier trucks compounding that problem."

Stone and Boise Democratic Sen. Sue Reicin, a member of the legislative budget committee, joined a representative of Citizens for Reliable and Safe Highways in urging Idaho's congressional delegation oppose federal legislation to allow triple-trailer truck combinations nationwide. Currently, only 13 states allow them.

In addition, they called for support

of amendments that would limit trailer-truck combinations to no more than 65 feet in length and 80,000 pounds in weight. Some states allow combinations as long as 120 feet, weighing 135,000 pounds.

The effect of such legislation would be the ban of triple-trailers, which have been common on Idaho highways for 20 years.

Republican Sen. Steve Symms was their primary target because Symms sits on the Senate panel that will begin reviewing the bill next week.

Pocatello goes after owner of deteriorating historic building

POCATELLO (AP) — The Community Development and Research Department has gone after a local businessman for failing to refurbish Pocatello's historic 99-year-old Pioneer Building.

Misdemeanor charges were filed Wednesday against Ted Hunt after repeated attempts to get Hunt to make the needed improvements, including imposition of a March 28 deadline that was ignored, failed.

BOISE (AP) — Despite increasing public attention on the campaign against drunken driving, the number of drunken driving cases filed in the Idaho court system last year rose for the first time since 1986.

And in its annual report on the courts for 1990, released Thursday, the Administrative Office of the Courts said the 16 percent increase could mean the campaign of intensified enforcement, tougher penalties and improved public education may not be working.

Court officials had been hopeful that the prior downward trend in DUI filings reflected a change in the public's attitude toward drunken driving, the report said. "The figures for 1990, however, may be signaling that drunken driving was once again a major problem for the public and the courts in Idaho."

At the same time, Idaho has remained relatively free of drug-related criminal cases, the report said. The number of drug filings decreased 12 percent to slip under 3,000 for 1990 and hitting a decade high of nearly 3,400 in 1989.

In a year when court filings set another record, hitting nearly 397,000, the number of drug filings decreased and felony drunken driving charges total 12,435, up over 700 from 1989. Felony cases jumped 16 percent to 666.

The last time all drunken-driving filings increased was in 1986 when the increase was over 8 percent, nearly 1,000, to 12,417.

The 1990 caseload was also the second-highest since state lawmakers enacted a tough new drunken driving law in 1983, and court officials said that when adjusted for changes in the felony laws the caseload remains below what it was prior to the new law.

The report said that while trials on drunken-driving charges finally appear to have stabilized at the prior 1983 level of percent, there is substantially less plea-bargaining and more jail time in those cases.

The number of plea-bargained cases, where defendants are allowed to plead guilty to lesser charges, dropped another three percentage points from 1989 to 1990 to 13 percent. In Ada County, the state's most populous, plea bargains occurred in less than 10 percent of the cases compared to over 40 percent before the new law.

And nearly 89 percent of motorists convicted of misdemeanor drunken driving last year received some jail time as part of their sentences, although in some cases it was suspended. That is more than the percentage getting jail time prior to 1983.

The record court filings last year were led by more than 250,000 traffic cases, a 4 percent increase over 1989, and the number of arrests for protective orders under the Domestic Violence Crime Prevention Act rose 30 percent to 3,400.

But civil case filings declined for the fourth consecutive year with filings down over 20 percent since 1986.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Idaho residents were among 68 people honored by the Department of Interior at a ceremony marking Public Service Recognition Week.

Logan Lunham, former senior vice president of Idaho Power Co. and now a member of the state Industrial Commission, was among four people receiving a Conservation Service Award at Wednesday's dinner.

Harold Scott, a Bureau of Indian Affairs police officer, was among 22 people receiving the Valor Award presented by Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan.

Lujan was honored for initiating the design of power transmission lines to protect raptors, for a program of placing nesting platforms on power lines for golden eagles and for other actions that have aided in conservation of natural resources.

Scott, from Blackfoot, entered burning home in Plummer on the Coeur d'Alene Indian Reservation and saved the lives of five people, including two young children, on Dec. 3, 1989.

Snake River project stirs up opposition

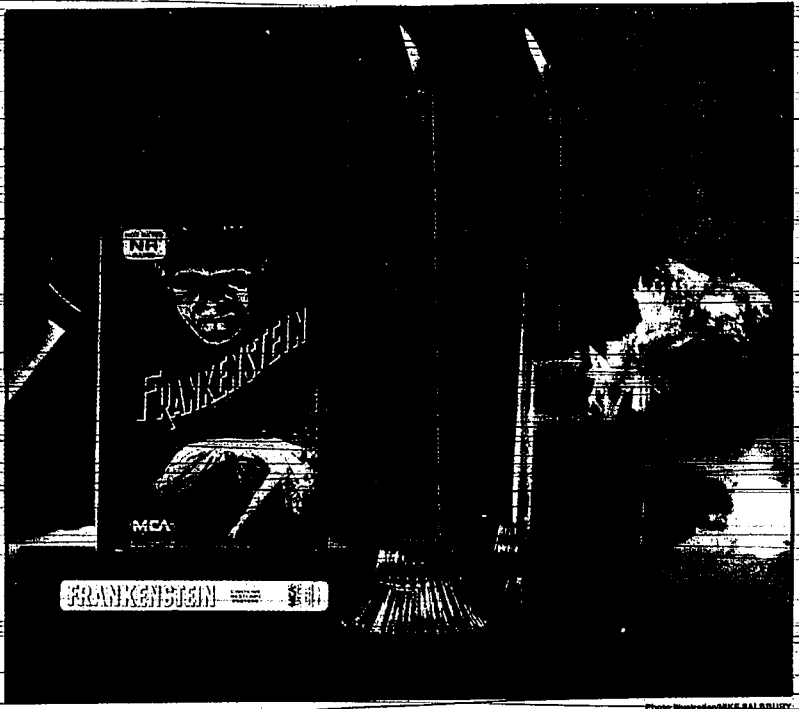

Belt tightening taking place in Tinseltown

A few weeks ago, Bill Murray decided he wanted a part in "Mad Dog and Glory," an upcoming movie produced by Martin Scorsese and starring Robert De Niro. He also wanted millions of dollars.

Scorsese wanted Murray. So did De Niro. But at his price, the studio balked. When Bill Murray wants something badly enough, his influential representatives at Creative Artists Agency go to bat for him. So a deal will no doubt be made — but something more "creative" than a simple multi-million-dollar payment up front. Instead, the arrangement will allow the studio to keep the budget

lighter on the way in and hedge its bet if the movie disappoints.

Just a couple of years ago, studios fell all over themselves for a few minutes of Bill Murray's time. Sure, his career has cooled a little since "Quick Change" died a quick death last summer. But that's not all that's going on here: Increasingly, movie executives are playing hard to get on deals they would have jumped on a year or two ago.

The reason is that Hollywood — as the rest of America may be happy to hear — is feeling an economic pinch. Not especially because of the recession afflicting the country as a whole, but because of fast-rising production costs — costs that have burgeoned largely because of the insatiability of the

top-level stars, directors, producers and executives.

The movie business boomed in the late '80s. Box office was boffo, the video-late expanded — new overseas markets opened up. And deals got richer for everyone — rich to the point that Hollywood actually started to scare itself. "I think in some cases it's way out of hand," says one prominent agent whose agency, he admits, has made some of those killer deals.

Movies got outrageously expensive — the average cost was somewhere around \$26 million but many cost twice that amount and more. Costs went up steadily — 25 percent for production and 33 percent for marketing in 1990, according to one studio chairman.

This year, production costs will rise at the same rate, while marketing costs will go up, though not as dramatically, he says.

At the same time, revenues from box office, video and pay television are flattening out. According to industry analysts at Paul Kagan Associates, revenues from all sources grew 12.1 percent in 1990, reaching \$11.7 billion. That's down from a 16 percent increase the year and a 22 percent jump in 1989. Kagan projects that revenue growth will slow in the next several years.

It's not that people are going to the movies less. But the video market has leveled off, the pay television services are driving tougher bargains and the financially

Disney plans resort with 'controlled' atmosphere

ANAHEIM, Calif. - Walt Disney Co. announced plans for a \$3 billion expansion at Disneyland that would include a second theme park patterned after its highly successful Epcot Center in Florida.

The new complex, called Westcot, would be located on what is now Disneyland's 100-acre parking lot, as well as surrounding properties, Disney officials said.

Westcot is expected to capture the concept of a futuristic "global village." Visitors would be able to travel to theme areas representing "the four corners of the Earth."

In addition to Westcot, the expansion will include new attractions in Disneyland, a satellite parking facility, three hotels and retail and dining facilities, said Disney Development Co. vice president Kerry Hannevell.

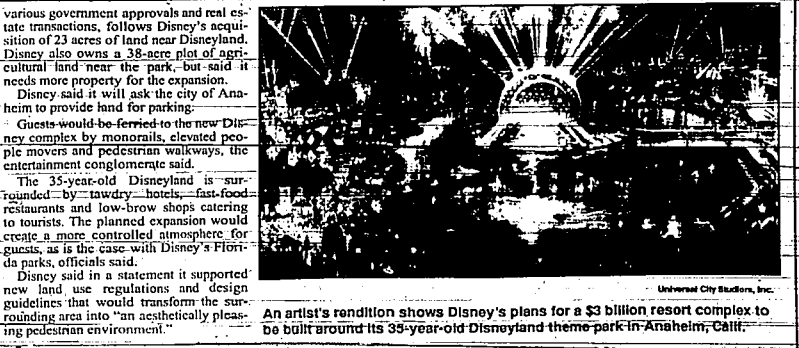
The 470-acre master plan, subject to various government approvals and real estate transactions, follows Disney's acquisition of 23 acres of land near Disneyland. Disney also owns a 38-acre plot of agricultural land near the park, but said it needs more property for the expansion.

Disney said it will ask the city of Anaheim to provide land for parking.

Guests would be ferried to the new Disney complex by monorails, elevated people movers and pedestrian walkways, the entertainment conglomerate said.

The 35-year-old Disneyland is surrounded by tawdry hotels, fast-food restaurants and low-brow shops catering to tourists. The planned expansion would create a more controlled atmosphere for guests, as is the case with Disney's Florida parks, officials said.

Disney said in a statement it supported new land use regulations and design guidelines that would transform the surrounding area into "an aesthetically pleasing pedestrian environment."

Video manufacturers go after little girl market

Boys ages 11 through 17 have long been the core market for home video games.

But two small video manufacturers hope to change some of that this year with two new games targeted for little girls ages 4 through 10.

This summer Capcom USA will introduce "The Little Mermaid" video game, and in the fall Hi Tech Expressions will follow with a "Barbie" video game.

Both companies say they hope to offer a video game that little girls will like and will feel exclusively theirs.

"Up until now, girls have had to make do with their brothers' games," said Kathleen Watson, Capcom director of marketing. "Now they can say, 'I have the Little Mermaid game and my brother hates it.'"

Both games differ from conventional video games in their approach to violence. There isn't much. "The Little Mermaid" loosely follows the plot of the movie. Ariel's friends have been captured by Ursula the sea witch. But to do so, the Little Mermaid must make it through a series of worlds, some on land and others under the sea.

For example, in one underwater world, Barbie gets by a large octopus by losing it a compass and slipping behind it while the octopus is prepping.

In other video games, when the lead characters fail they die, and you have to start the game over again. But in "Barbie" and "The Little Mermaid" never die in this game. If Barbie fails, she merely wakes up, and then you start the game again.

"Barbie is about glamour," says Joan Ziegler, vice president of product acquisition for Hi Tech. "That's what we are trading on with this. It's very pro-social and positive and not an aggressive, beat-'em-up game."

Hi Tech and Capcom have previously introduced video games targeted for a preschool audience. Between the two companies there are Muppet, Disney and Sesame Street games.

But this is the first time both companies have decided to introduce something that will immediately exclude boys.

Ziegler says video game demographics are the reason Nintendo has sold about 30 million game systems, Ziegler said, and the 6- to 11-year-old market accounts for about 7 percent of that. While it's only a small fraction, she said that's up from 3 percent in 1988.

Ziegler said she expects the young market will also increase when older brothers begin to ask their parents for newer video game systems, such as the \$200 Nintendo Super System scheduled to be unveiled in June. As these new "16-bit" systems become more popular, older siblings may hand their parents for newer video game systems, brothers and sisters, Ziegler says.

A Saturday-morning Little Mermaid cartoon show is scheduled for May, and Capcom plans to bring its game out in June, hoping to benefit from Disney's promotions of its cartoon show. Suggested retail will be \$44.95.

Counterculture TV guys have made the impossible happen through Globalvision

NEW YORK (AP) — Someday this could be a TV series. Two smart, hip, network TV guys with counterculture roots decide to quit the networks to start their own production company on the West Coast.

In one episode, they use foundation money to produce a critically acclaimed weekly news show on South Africa, where courageous journalists shoot videotape news from and smuggle it out of the apartheid state.

When the grant money expires, the producers create a show about human rights around the world that manages to be informative and astonishingly entertaining as well.

Does this sound like an improbable enough network-TV idea? Then meet Danny Schechter and Rory O'Connor, the real-life co-founders of Globalvision, the 3 1/2-year-old company that put the distinguished "South Africa Now" on public television.

They have first dibs on the series idea even though it sounded impossible 3 1/2 years ago.

"People said, 'frankly, look, even if you get the information out of South Africa, it's 10,000 miles away, under censorship, every week, nobody in America's going to watch that,'" O'Connor said.

"Well, not only did people in America watch, but we were on the air every week in January. That's why we think television is going global."

Globalvision pioneered "inside-out" coverage of Southern Africa, giving small format camcorders to local writers and journalists many of who were working in TV for the first time. It was high-risk television, with an edge.

The video was raw, gritty and powerful. They got stories that network news didn't. They gave the stories background and context. They covered news media coverage of Southern Africa, and they report-

ed on pop music and the arts. Globalvision brings that same approach to their new show, "Rights and Wrongs," also for public television. Check listings for the local air date.

The format of "Rights and Wrongs" is not as limiting as you might think. Pick a country on page one of this newspaper. Chances are pretty good it has a human rights problem, eh?

Like its predecessor, "Rights and Wrongs" will feature the work of local journalists and filmmakers, but it has sophisticated animations and a graphic style that is much more polished than "South Africa Now."

"We think people are tired of the blandness and the formula approach to television," Schechter said. "If you look at what has made waves in television, it's been the format. It's the 'In Living Colors,' it's 'The Simpsons.'"

Schechter reckons Globalvision can do the show for about \$50,000 a week. He doesn't know what it costs to make a show like ABC's "20/20," where he worked as a producer for nine years.

Will there be another episode of "Rights and Wrongs?" "We're waiting to hear," Schechter said. "The ways of foundations are mysterious. Big money works in mysterious ways."

Schechter, O'Connor and Globalvision have drawn fire from conservatives. One group accused

"South Africa Now" of being biased in favor of the African National Congress. Schechter and O'Connor deny the charge.

"We're not pushing any political agenda, although people who find it different in tone and feel try to label it," Schechter said. "We're not overlooking abuses in Cuba or in California."

"We like lots of points of view," O'Connor added. "That's what different and that's in fact what's threatening about us."

Both men have their roots in as newsmen in the Boston counterculture's "alternative" media. Schechter at WBUR, Boston's progressive FM station, O'Connor as managing editor of the weekly The Real Paper. In 1978, Schechter "the news dissector" was the first radio commentator to win Harvard University's plum Nieman Fellowship. O'Connor left "The Real Paper" when it sold to competitors in 1981. He's worked at CBS' 248

Hours. "The lesson for us in the '80s was you have to build your own institution," O'Connor said. "You have to get out there in the corporate, entrepreneurial world and compete if you're going to control your own destiny."

O'Connor is producing a documentary on Rev. Sun Myung Moon for PBS' "Frontline" series. Other projects include a Warner Bros. special on the making of Oliver Stone's movie "JFK," and a tribute to Bob Marley for Island Records.

NEW YORK (AP) — Susan Lucci may feel that *deja vu* is becoming a permanent condition. The star of ABC's "All My Children" was nominated for a daytime Emmy award for a record 12th time. She has yet to win.

Lucci was among the 215 contenders for the 18th annual Daytime Emmy Awards. The show is being televised by CBS on June 27, and will be aired in prime time for the first time.

A rival awards show, NBC's "The 7th Annual Soap Opera Awards," also got an Emmy nomination, as it did in 1990, when it was called "The 6th Annual Soap Opera Awards." This year's nominees also include Whoopi Goldberg, an Oscar-winner this year for the movie "Ghost."

CBS' venerable "Guiding Light" led the pack with 16 nominations, followed by 14 for "Pee-wee's Playhouse," the off-beat Saturday morning series that CBS has canceled after five seasons.

CBS shows easily led the nominations, getting 78, with 37 going to ABC shows and 32 to syndicated programs. NBC had 29 nominations and PBS 22. Fox network shows only got three nominations.

Cable shows, which only received two nominations last year, got 10 this year. The one for cable tycoon Ted Turner's save-the-environment cartoon series for kids, "Capt. Planet and the Planeteers."

'Dances' gives big boost to actors' careers, and even the stunt buffalo is newly popular

LOS ANGELES — Even Cody, the stunt buffalo, now works steadily.

With two new television movies and a feature film under his belt, the massive mammal is but one of the members of the crew of "Dances with Wolves" thriving as a result of the film's commercial and critical success.

The film's editor may become a director. His composer now hopes to produce. And the telephone screenwriter Michael Blake's house won't quit ringing.

Hollywood employment tends to be cyclical, with long breaks between jobs. Yet many of the film's alumni interviewed after it won seven Academy Awards that they now anticipate few slowdowns. "This picture can't hurt anybody's career," says producer Jim Wilson.

The three-hour Western stars Kevin Costner as Lt. John J. Dunbar, a renegade Civil War soldier who journeys to command an isolated Union outpost near the Dakota Sioux. Once at the remote Fort Sedgewick, Dunbar develops a friendship with the Indians that ultimately forces the idealistic lieutenant to decide with whom his loyalties lie.

Fig. Productions, a movie production company which Wilson runs with Costner, who is the director as well as the star of "Dances," is now seen as having a Midas touch. Wilson says, "Certainly, it gives me a great deal of clout. It's verifiable now that I know how to make pictures." When the success of "Dances" will allow, Wilson says, is creative independence.

Costner is set to act in at least three more movies — "JFK," directed by Oliver Stone, "Bodyguard," opposite singer Whitney Houston, and "The Mission," written by Blake. He also stars in "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves," set for a June release.

Mary McDonnell, who in "Dances" played Stands With a Fist, the Indian woman raised by the Indians, says, "The movie definitely has changed my situation. I'm getting access to far more movie scripts."

A stage actor by training, McDonnell says before "Dances" she "was coming close" but not always getting film roles she coveted. Nowadays, she says, she is considered for a much broader scope of potential projects.

Graham Greene, the Indian leader Kicking Bird in the film, says he's mulling over "a stack of offers." Among the many offers he now says is that he doesn't audition any more. "I just speak to the director or the producer or we have lunch," he says.

Greene, who wants to act in more contemporary films, confesses that most scripts he sees still call for ethnic roles, rather than for lead main characters whose ethnicity is secondary to plot writing.

The less-visible "Dances" players, too, suddenly find their careers blossoming, including an increase in job offers and talent fees.

"It certainly paid off for Costner and everybody involved with him," says Oscar-winning sound technician Jeffrey Perkins, who's swamped with work proposals.

As production designer, Jeffrey Becroft took responsibility for the overall look of "Dances."

Prior to the Western, Becroft had worked for English theater companies and was an assistant art director and

Mary McDonnell, actress who played an Indian

art director on several other movies. Becroft, 34, says he was selected for "Dances" in part because Costner wanted to work with somebody young.

Becroft says the experience — he lost in the Oscars to the "Dick Tracy" team — certainly will boost his standing. "It adds a lot of credibility," he says.

Neil Travis, the Oscar-winning "Dances" editor, hopes the film's triumphs will improve his chances of becoming a director.

"The editor's job is to make his work invisible," Travis says. "I'm tired of being invisible."

Cinematographer Dean Semler is set to begin work in Zimbabwe on the historical apartheid movie "The Power of One," directed by John Avildsen. Later this year, Semler plans to make his directorial debut in the tentatively titled movie "Afterburner."

Perkins, who was one of four "Dances" Oscar winners for best sound, says business at International Recording Corp. has been especially

steadily since the film came out. "Because of the film we kind of rose out of the fog — nobody had ever heard of us before," he says.

A five-time Oscar winner, "Dances" composer John Barry says his most recent Academy Award wasn't likely to alter his career that much. "There's a mythology that everything changes," Barry said. "It doesn't."

With a comparatively microscopic budget of \$40,000, Eric Zamparelli designed and supervised construction of the epic Western's costumes, jewelry and headpieces. His resume will now be foisted by studios, bean counters and payback for a buck. "I worked for less than a normal rate, and every penny of the budget is on screen," says Zamparelli, who lost in the Oscars to "Cyrano de Bergerac's" Franca Squarciapino.

Since the film came out, she says, "I'm getting much better scripts, much larger stories, much more interesting offers."

The career of screenwriter Blake has probably experienced the most dramatic turnaround. "My life has changed 180 degrees," he says. "Now I can basically pick and choose what I want to do. A year ago, I couldn't get in the door."

But it hasn't been blue skies for everybody who worked on "Dances." Rodney A. Grant, who played Indi, a warrior Wind in His Hair, said in March he hadn't had an acting job since last summer, when he worked in the TV miniseries "Son of the Morning Star."

"To tell you the truth, right now I don't have an occupation," says Grant, who's making ends meet moving furniture.



It's a Mad world at a California cartoon museum these days

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — It's a Mad world at the Cartoon Art Museum these days.

That's Mad as in magazine, the irreverent periodical that has been lampooning American institutions for 39 years.

The exhibit befits a publication that once declared on a cover, "This Magazine is Revolting" with "against conformity" in fine print. The original paintings and sketches from Mad magazine range from the silly (equipping staplers) to the satirical (an ad for Aspiring Bootlick Politist).

Above all looms the familiar mug of magazine mascot Alfred E. Newman, famous for his big ears, freckle-faced grin and trademark philosophy of "What Me Worry?"

Real estate agent Mark Cohen owns the artwork collection and wanted to share it. The show, "Humor in the Jugular: Years of the Art of Artists and Artifacts of Mad Magazine," is not affiliated with the New York-based magazine.

"Many collectors have wonderful collections, but they never let them out of their own possession. I think it's very important that people get to see things that they wouldn't ordinarily see," Cohen said.

Among the funnier pieces is a 1963 painting by Joe Orlando of "Reader's Disgust," a spoof of the staid Reader's Digest.

On the cover, Alfred E.'s head sits sphinxlike atop a pyramid as a nearby "camel" smokes. The cover also contains titles ranging from "The Most Unforgettable Character I've Ever Met" by "Your Baby" to "The Encyclopedia Britannica"

listed on pages 142-43. Then there are the political digests: "I Was a Sore Loser," by Adlai Stevenson, "So Was I," by Thomas E. Dewey and "Suddenly, It's 1964," by Richard M. Nixon.

Cohen remembers sneaking the "Reader's Disgust" issue into school, fooling teachers who had banned the unruly periodical.

"I still read it today; it comes in a plain brown wrapper addressed to a third party," he joked.

Still, there was a time, Cohen notes, when Mad's subversive status was anything but laughable.

Mad was created by publisher William M. Gaines after his Entertainment Comics came under attack, along with the rest of the comic industry, during the 1950s.

Under pressure from the Kefauver Senate Subcommittee on Crime who felt the horror, science fiction and war comics were un-American, publisher Gaines decided to switch to magazine distribution.

He turned the 10-cent comic, "Tales — Calculated to Drive You Mad," into the 25-cent Mad Magazine in 1952.

"It was surprising the number of people that thought comic books contributed to juvenile delinquency," Cohen said. "They were actually satirizing McCarthy, which was a pretty gutsy thing to do at the time."

On one recent afternoon, Mike Rudolph chuckled his way past the artwork. Rudolph, Gaines' art director, said he was impressed at the wealth of meticulous detail apparent to his adult eyes.

'Out for Justice' is mean, but fast-moving

Capsule reviews

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

OUT FOR JUSTICE (R)—In most ways, the usual rough-and-ugly, slam-bang, cop-vs.-psycho (which is which?) vendetta thriller this new Steven Seagal movie—actually has something extra: a Scorsese-style heavy Indo-American lingo and atmosphere—and some surprising, in-your-face macho humor. It's mean, but it moves; directed by John Flynn.

THE SILENCE OF THE LAMBS (R)—Thomas Harris' harrowing, mesmerizing book concerned an institutionalized psychopath who is used to identify a rampaging serial killer.

In a fine adaptation, director Jonathan Demme and screenwriter Ted Tally have focused on a duel of wits and wills between Jodie Foster's young FBI trainee and that paradigm of evil, Dr. Hannibal Lecter (Anthony Hopkins). Hopkins is glittering in the showier role, but Foster carries the film, suggesting the strength, gravity, intelligence and compassion of Clarice. Stealing the show, however, is the way both actors are able to do with their literally-or-occupationally straitjacketed characters. Although Demme does not dwell on the gore, it's definitely there, making it a film not for the faint of heart.

SLEEPING WITH THE ENEMY (R)—A solid book has been inflated by overproduction and underwriting into this melodrama to make a veli-

cle for Julia Roberts, playing an abused wife who tries to begin her life again; Patrick Bergin, uncharismatic as Sir Richard Burton in "Mountains of the Moon," is even more so here as her menacing husband. It's another fairy tale for Roberts; wife abuse being seen here as no more grueling than Roberts' job as a Hollywood Boulevard hooker in "Pretty Woman," and she attacks this role with the same bland

compliance and dazzling superficial warmth.

THE MARRYING MAN (R)—A man who remarries his wife four times is a man worth making a movie about, but this isn't the movie. Neil Simon's script is all promise and no deliver, and that goes double for Alec Baldwin and Kim Basinger, who lack the required chemistry to make their crazy-just-believable.

'Dying' may have early demise at box office

"A Kiss Before Dying" longs to be a thriller in the spirit of Alfred Hitchcock—but tailspins into the mire of Brian Easton Eills. This is a witless, poorly constructed movie, stumbling over plot holes as big as Hitchcock's belly.

Want Dillon as a Jonathan Carison, an only child abandoned as a teen-ager by his father. Badly traumatized, the boy spends hours gazing out his window at the passing freight trains, his mind twisting into the next "American Psycho."

He'll do anything to get rich, and collects articles on copper baron Thor Carlsson (Max von Sydow) for inspiration, regarding him as the father he never really had.

Carlsson has twin daughters, Dorothy and Ellen, both played by Sean Young. Dorothy has frosted hair and attends the University of Pennsylvania, where she meets fellow student Jonathan. As the movie opens, they are secret lovers planning to get married, but Jonathan instead lures her to a roof in downtown Philadelphia and pushes her over the edge. (It turns out she was pregnant, and kids were not what he had in mind.)

Ellen has long, dark hair, wears old sweaters and is a social worker in Manhattan. With Dorothy's death written off by police as a suicide and none of her friends sus-

her, hiring the fact he went to the University of Pennsylvania. She all it takes to unravel his case is a college yearbook he may have to wipe out an entire graduating class to cover his tracks. He bumps-off two former students during the film.

When it becomes obvious Ellen is on to him as well — Young's moment of revelation is captured in cliché-defying slow motion — he somehow allows her to spend hours unsupervised calling the police. More incredibly, she doesn't do it.

The story is a tedious morality play about why great is bad; Dillon and Young have little to work with; von Sydow's part is too small to make any impact, and the plot twists are too obvious to generate suspense.

Writer-director James Dearden lists the screenplay to "Fatal Attraction" among his credits, but "A Kiss Before Dying" could use a couple of boiled bunnies to get it going, or at least one scene with the two Seans.

The Universal Pictures release is rated R and includes violence, nudity and profanity. Running time is 95 minutes.

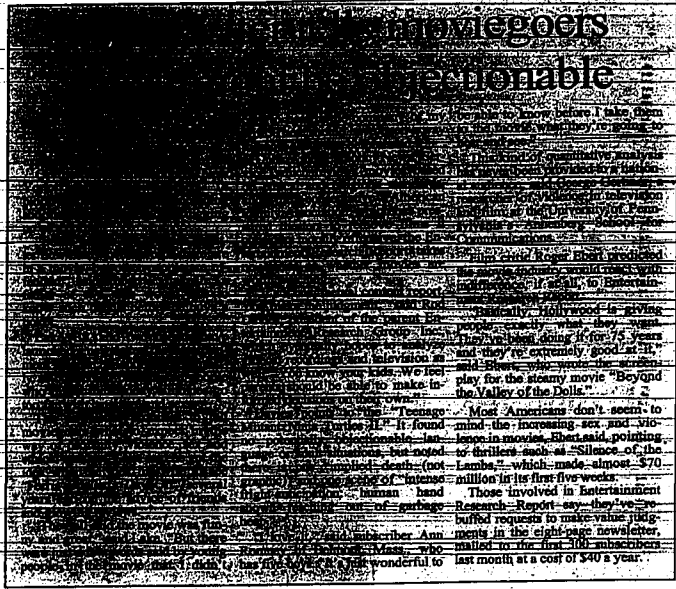

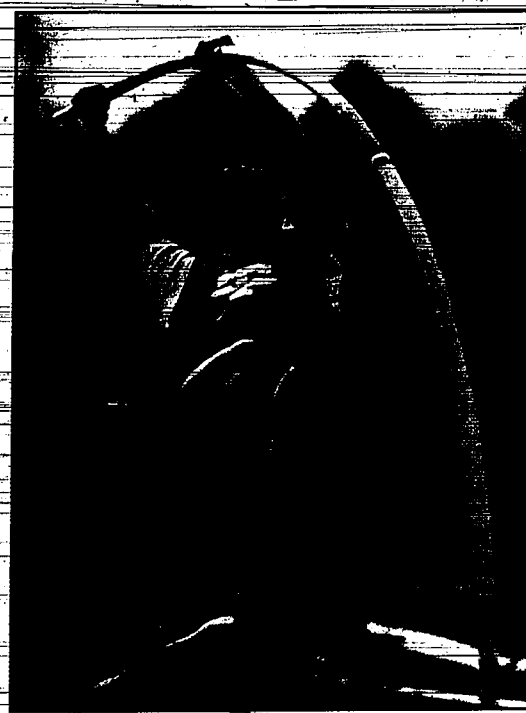

Warriors' leading scorer looking for another big night

OAKLAND, Calif. — Chris Mullin squeezes the baseball with both hands, getting the feel. He spins it, bounces it twice, and shoots, beginning another practice session in a lifetime of practice sessions.

That Mullin scored 41 points, making 16 of 21 shots, in the Golden State Warriors' 125-124 victory over the Los Angeles Lakers the night before mattered not. He's already working for the next one.

"Nights like that are what you put in all the time for," Mullin said Thursday. "I wish they happened more often. ... You hope for a night like that, and every once in a while you should be rewarded."

The left-hander warmed up Thursday with jumper after jumper falling effortlessly through the net.

To earn his latest reward, Mullin spent Monday and Tuesday nights putting himself through private post-practice shoot-arounds at the Forum — thanks to trainer Tom Abovner, conditioning specialist Mark Grabow and an unidentified security guard.

"It wasn't concerned about my shooting really," Mullin said. "I was more concerned about the knee; I'm not good enough to play with a bad leg against anybody, especially this team."

After a hurt it, the doctors wanted to wait until the next day to decide what was wrong," Mullin said. "I couldn't sleep all night. I just sat there and looked at it — I wanted to make sure it didn't go anywhere or do anything without my permission."

Reluctantly Mullin, who describes his injury as something akin to a sprained ankle, sat in street clothes on the Warriors' bench in Game 1 as the Lakers won 126-116.

"It was really tough not playing the first game," Mullin said. "I felt useless. To play all those games and then to not be able to play was really hard."

Bird returns but Brown steals spotlight as Celtics even series

BOSTON (AP) — The mere fact that an aging, ailing Larry Bird played was surprising. The way young, energetic Doc Brown played was stunning.

His presence made Detroit's detractors pay attention and Brown's shooting and passing made them pay the price as the Boston Celtics evened their playoff series at 1-1 with a 109-103 win Thursday.

In the fourth quarter, Brown had 15 points and three of his game-high eight assists. The rookie matched his career-high of 22 points and grabbed a key defensive rebound in the final minute.

"We needed somebody to step up," Brown said. "Somebody needed to make things happen by hitting a shot from outside or making a big pass."

"You can't call Doc a rookie anymore," Boston's Reggie Lewis said. "He took it upon himself to lead."

With starting point guard Brian Shaw struggling, Brown took over and gave the Celtics the big victory and a homecourt split as they headed into a building where they've never won.

They are tied in the Palace of Auburn Hills, where the next two games of the best-of-7 Eastern Conference semifinals are scheduled Saturday afternoon and Monday night.

Bird's absence because of several back spasms was obvious in Detroit's 86-75 series-opening win on Tuesday night. In Game 2, he had 16 points and eight rebounds in 42 minutes.

"It's invaluable having Larry out there just this rebounding," Boston coach Chris Ford said. "I don't know how he does it, coming out there feeling as he does."

Detroit's superstar, Isiah Thomas, couldn't get out there for Game 2. He sprained his right foot when Brown landed on him at the open court. Thomas suited up Thursday, but didn't play.

"Whether he's with the team or not, we have players capable of winning in this building," Detroit's Bill Laimbeer said. "The Celtics have more game" than the Pistons were able to dictate in the opener.

With Bird's outside-shooting threat back, the Pistons had to guard him. That meant they couldn't double-team on him, but the open court did in Game 1. When the Pistons did double-team, Brown got open outside shots and finished 7-for-11 from the field.

"Bird changes the game," Detroit coach Chuck Daly said. "He handles the ball well and he either scores or dishes it off."

"We were able to establish our inside game," Lewis said. "Every time they tried to double-team, we always

found Doc Brown or somebody like that outside to take the shot."

"He either made the big shot or penetrated. His quickness comes into play when you're doubling or trapping," Detroit's Vinnie Johnson said.

Boston had plenty of open shots in the opener but hit only 39.4 percent of its field goal attempts. The Celtics made 48.8 percent Thursday, while Detroit connected on 40 percent.

Lewis led Boston with 23 points and Robert Parish had 19. The Pistons were paced by Joe Dumars with 29 and Mark Aguirre with 24.

The game was played in the afternoon because Boston-Garden was tied up Thursday night with the fifth game of the NHL Stanley Cup semifinal between Boston and Pittsburgh and on Friday night by an ice show.

The Celtics led 50-48 at halftime and 71-70 after three quarters, then took control with a 7-0 surge that turned a 78-76 edge into an 85-76

lead with 6:37 left.

Parish hit two free throws and Bird hit a 14-foot, fallaway jumper, making the score 82-76.

Brown then hit a foul shot before forcing a turnover by slapping the ball out of Dumars' hands. On the next possession, Brown hit a 17-foot shot to cap the rally.

After Detroit drew within 92-87 on Johnson's jumper with 3:57 to go, Kevin McHale made a three-point play. Dumars then made a layup for Detroit, but Brown countered with an off-balance driving jumper that put Boston ahead 97-89 with 3:07 left.

With the score 107-101, Laimbeer fired up an errant 3-point shot with 23 seconds to go. Brown scrambled for the rebound, passed to Bird and was fouled with the ball in the front court.

Brown hit both shots, putting Boston on top 109-101 with 13 seconds to play.

Penguins move within 1 win of 1st Stanley Cup finals berth

BOSTON (AP) — The Pittsburgh Penguins moved a win away from the first Stanley Cup finals berth in their 24-year history Thursday night, getting two goals and three assists from Kevin Stevens in a 7-2 rout of the Boston Bruins.

Pittsburgh used its superior speed and scoring punch to win the third consecutive game after losing the first two and to clinch the best-of-7 Walter Cup Conference final at home Saturday night in Game 6.

The winner of the series plays the winner of the Campbell Conference final in which Minnesota leads defending NHL champion Edmonton 3-1.

Boston, appearing tired in its 18th game in 37 days, is in jeopardy of missing the finals for the second time in four seasons. It lost to Edmonton both times it reached the championship series.

After Boston's Don Sweeney scored 40 seconds into the game, the Penguins got seven of the next eight goals.

Besides Stevens, forwards Mario Lemieux and Bryan Trottier and defenseman Paul Stastny, Larry Murphy and Ulf Samuelsson scored for Pittsburgh, the NHL's second-highest scoring team in the regular season. Craig Janney scored for Boston.

Lemieux had goal and three assists and took over the NHL playoff scoring lead with 29 points from teammate Mark Recchi, who has 28. Stevens tied Minnesota's Brian Bellows for third with 26.

Stevens, who has 13 playoff goals, began the onslaught at 7:55 of the first period, giving him at least one goal in each game of the series.

He took a pass from the right side of Pittsburgh's

blue line that bounced off the left boards in the Bruins' zone. He collected the puck behind Boston's Chris Nilan and Ray Bourque and fired a 10-footer from the left over the right arm of goalie Andy Moog.

Lemieux then scored for the fourth consecutive game, giving the Penguins the lead for good in a 4-2 victory at 2:04 of the first period. His 10th playoff goal came on a 5-footer from the left after a pass from Stevens.

Trottier connected for the 66th playoff goal of his 16-year career at 15:49 before Janney cut the lead to 5-2 at 19:27, breaking Boston's streak of 17 scoreless power plays.

Pittsburgh goalie Tom Barraso then stopped all 25 shots he faced in the last two periods.

Stevens got the second of Pittsburgh's three power-play goals with a 30-foot blast from the left at 13:04 of the second period, making the score 4-2. Stastny, a rookie, made it 5-2 at 17:02 when he hit alone up the slot and shot a 20-footer for his first playoff goal.

Murphy got the other power-play goal 1:08 into the third period.

With 7:22 remaining, Boston's Nevin Markwart was carried off the ice on a stretcher after backing hard the boards as he fell down behind the Penguins' net.

The Penguins, in the playoffs for the second time in three seasons after missing them the previous six years, already are in the third round for the first time.

Limit basketball teams to 4 a side

CHICAGO — Basketball, the only game devised in the United States without any promptings from pastimes that originated elsewhere, first was played with nine men on a side.

James Naismith, its inventor, was a physical education teacher at Springfield, Mass., who divided his class of 18 men. This was 100 years ago, in 1891. Had his class size been 22, more than likely there would have been 11 on each side.

Later, each side was limited to eight players, then seven. The size of the floor was the determining factor. In 1894, teams started to experiment with five on a side. Three years later, according to Encyclopaedia Britannica, "the rules stipulated five." It has been five ever since.

This slice of history is offered to demonstrate the evolution and, more importantly, to support my belief the time has come for a radical decrease in the number of players on a basketball team, especially in the National Basketball Association.

The current court size, 94 feet by 50 feet, has been the standard since the 1930s, when most of the players were of normal size, except perhaps for a "tall" 6-foot-11-inch center. The game was slow and played with a weaving style; as many as five or six short passes preceded each field-goal attempt.

Most of the shots were taken from the key. The game was slow and weaving; it was a foul. I have no stats, but my guess is there probably weren't more than 10 or 12 fouls per game. Scores of 35-32, sometimes lower, were common as late as the late 1940s. The leading scorers averaged 16 to 18 points a game. A 33-percent shooter was a phenom, an absolute "dead-eye."

Today, the players in the NBA are enormous, a foot taller and 70 to 80 pounds heavier. Many starting teams average about 6-9 in height. The players are the world's best athletes. They run faster, shoot with one hand, either at the top of the jump or driving toward the basket. To open the game and encourage outside shooting, a recent rule change awards three points for shots made from a distance of 23 feet, 9 inches.

Because of the constant action, the remarkable pace and the size and speed of the players, the court has shrunk. Today, to get rebounding

position, or to get free for a pass, even to get a shot off, the players are constantly pushing and shoving each other. There is so much body contact, three officials are required.

A four-man game would loosen the middle, reduce fouling and diminish the effect of the big man. Because of the larger territory, he would have to run more. The smaller players are much more agile and usually have more stamina. They are also better shooters. More shooting would be taken. There is no doubt scoring would increase. Michael Jordan, even if he continues passing, would average 50 points.

Five years ago, soon after Jerry Reinsdorf purchased the Chicago Bulls, I mentioned the growing necessity and the advantages of the four-man game. Reinsdorf said it wasn't a bad idea. "I didn't propose it in a formal context," Reinsdorf recalled Wednesday, "but I did mention it to a number of owners while we were sitting around socially. Nobody liked the idea."

After watching the Bulls and 76ers in their playoff series, I again was struck by the fact the floor is too small. I have since been calling around, asking basketball experts for their thoughts. Here is what each of them said:

Former De Paul coach Ray Meyer: "It would be a much better game. The way it is now, the two big men in the middle — all they do is waste each other for 40 minutes. They just bang each other. (Bill) Cartwright (Patrick) Ewing for a while and Will Perdue comes in and does the same thing. It's not basketball. It's a contest of strength. Only the strong survive. If the referees call every 'push' and shove, it'd be nothing but a parade to the foul line."

In a four-man game, everything would be more out in the open. You could cut back to two officials. The players are so big, they can stretch across the floor and hold hands almost.

Former Loyola coach George Ireland, who, like Meyer, had a successful 40-year coaching career: "It's a good thought, a novel idea. It would open the game up. Whoever thought there would be so many 7-footers out there? It certainly would diminish the big man."

Nobody wants to make a change. But if they experimented with it, it

Northwestern coach Bill Robertson: "The only change, tactically, would be to have the floor go to get larger. You'd see more offense. With the way the salaries are going, it might be a possibility. And from a college standpoint, the number of scholarships would limit the number of players."

Former Illinois star Lou Budreau, who played one season in the National Basketball League, one of the NBA's predecessors: "It's a different game entirely from when I played because of the shooting accuracy and the speed of the game. It's amazing what they can do with that basketball. But the game itself is OK. They just have to tighten up on the rules. There's too much traveling."

Sports writer Leonard Koppett, who began covering the NBA more than 40 years ago: "I think it would be the greatest thing in the world mainly because of the physicality. The physicality of the fifth man is not important. There are very few plays that actually involve all five men. We talked about it 20 years ago. Everybody said, 'You're crazy.' But we did talk about it. It's the most aggressive idea imaginable. It would make it a much better game in every conceivable way."

Former Bloom and Illinois star Jerry Colangelo, now part-owner and general manager of the Phoenix Suns: "I'd love to have a great game. The way it is I admit it's a prejudiced statement. But the rules have evolved to make it the most exciting game of all. We need more Michael Jordans, not a four-man game."

Former NBA player-coach Tom Heinsohn, now a Boston Celtics broadcaster: "The game is not diminished by the size of the floor. It's what you do on the floor. 94 feet is plenty big enough for 10 men. If you're going to play chess, how many pieces do you want on the board? If you take out one of the bishops or something, you're taking out a formidable part of the defense and offense."

If the floor were widened by 12 to 15 feet, the problem would be solved. But the floor never will be widened. Too many of the \$100 seats would be eliminated, a departure with this prediction. By the year 2000 or perhaps 2007, or whenever the NBA is in a financial crisis, it will be a four-man game. The colleges will be the first to experiment.

Funk said he began thinking about the record after he rolled in a 3-foot birdie putt on No. 4, his 13th hole of the round.

"I had just birdied the third hole in a row," he said.

Funk said he was thinking "if I could do something, I just never got it close again."

It matched the lowest round on the Tour this year. Scott Simpson had a first-round 62 in the Hawaiian Open, but finished tied for 31st place.

Funk, who will be 35 next month, finished third twice in his first two years — at Chattanooga last year and at Hattiesburg in 1989.

Indy drivers figure 230 mph plateau unreachable this year

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Have the speeds at Indy topped out below 230 mph? Some of the drivers vying for the pole position Saturday in the May 26 race believe they have at least until the next rules change or technological breakthrough.

A year ago, the fastest unofficial lap at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway was 228.502 mph by Al Unser Jr. on the Friday prior to the opening of qualifications.

Rich Mears has the fastest lap so far this month at 226.569.

In both cases, the drivers admitted to getting a tow on their fast laps around the 2.5-mile oval from the field of other cars.

"I don't see a 230 by yourself for a long time," said Michael Andretti, another of at least 10 drivers who appear capable of winning the top qualifying position for the 75th Indy race.

"There are just no big gains to be made at this point," said Andretti, who has been above 225 in both his primary and his backup car this week. "The cars are all trimmed out right now, and they're so developed to the current rules that there's nothing left to change but little stuff — and I mean little stuff."

Bobby Rahal, who has a 226.080 — the second fastest this week, said, "There are no

big jumps now because the speed comes from making the car handle. We didn't get out to run 226. We were trying to make the

Unser, Rahal's teammate, has been struggling to get above 224.5.

"We haven't posted a real fast time yet because I never found a friend out there," Unser said. "That's where these 226s are coming from."

"I saw the Andrettis (Michael and father Mario) out there going slow. They were looking for someone to give them a tow, looking for those fast laps. We're not really looking for 'em, but when you get the big numbers it kind of works to your advantage because all the other drivers up and down pit road, except the one who was in front of you, don't know if it was done by yourself."

"The main reason why you may not see any progress (in speed) is because we're running wider open all the way around — there is any improvement, it's going to be very, very small."

Fittipaldi, whose best so far this week has been just above 224.5, set one- and four-lap speedway records of 225.375 and 225.301, respectively, last May.

"Let's face it, horsepower is pretty tough to beat here," Rahal said. "But, they're still looking for a handle; if they get it, they can be up front on qualifying day."

"Come race day, though, you still have to have a car that will run 500 miles and handle well in traffic. We'll see."

"Michael Andretti said, 'With the advantage they have, if Buick doesn't get the pole, there's really something wrong. They shouldn't show their faces here next year.'"

"If conditions are perfect, somebody could catch it right and break the track records. But, if it happens, it won't be by much."

Winter wheat outlook down sharply from last year's levels

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wheat production in 1991 to qualify for price-support benefits in 1992 is expected to decline sharply, but it may be higher than last year's, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture Thursday.

The winter wheat crop was estimated at 4.7 billion bushels down 26 percent from last year's harvest of 2.03 billion bushels.

Based on May 1 indications, the average yield was put at 30.5 bushels per acre, down from 40.7 bushels in 1990. Further, the acreage for harvest at 40.5 million acres will be down from nearly 50 million acres last year.

Farmers were required to idle more wheat

land in 1991 to qualify for price-support benefits — 15 percent of their crop base in 1991.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's "average reserve program" compared with only 5 percent for the 1990 crop.

But there have been problems. One-third of U.S. wheat production is in the Pacific Northwest and dry weather in many parts of the country. In other areas, too much rain has been a problem.

In Kansas, the largest producer, the winter wheat crop was estimated at 367.2 million bushels, down from 472 million last year.

Yields are expected to average 34 bushels per acre against 40 in 1990.

The state is expected to have 10.8 million acres for harvest, a drop of one million from last year.

Winter wheat is planted in the fall and matures in the next year. It accounts for three-fourths of U.S. wheat production. The remainder is planted in the spring.

The USDA's first official estimate of 1991 production of all wheat will be issued July 11, with the first estimate for corn, soybeans and some other major spring-planted crops scheduled for Aug. 12, along with revised figures for wheat.

No official estimates of total 1991 wheat output based on field surveys were included. However, department analysts in a related report did project "highly tentative" 1991 production of all wheat at 2.07 billion bushels, down from a near-record 2.78 billion bushels last year.

Projections for all wheat and some other crops were based on yield trends and an assumption that the crop would have normal weather the remainder of the growing season.

The 1991-corn harvest was projected at 8.28 billion bushels, compared with 7.93 billion bushels last year. Soybean production was projected at 1.875 billion bushels, compared with 1.922 billion bushels in 1990.

Based on these tentative projections, the report said the U.S. wheat inventory by the

beginning of the 1992-93 marketing year next spring could be trimmed to 652 million bushels, down from 1,900.91 million bushels.

The report said the inventory is expected to be around 856 million bushels this June 1, a relatively large quantity that has helped depress the farm price of wheat this season.

But with a reduced crop in the works, the analysis says 1991-92 wheat prices could rebound to the range of \$2.80 to \$3.20 per bushel.

Raymond Burr keeps audiences guessing in 20th post-revival Perry Mason movie

Who would ever think that Raymond Burr, he of the basso profundo voice, the overstuffed-arm-chair physique — not to mention the intimidatingly ominous Perry Mason theme music — would actually turn out to be perfectly charming?

"That's OK; don't worry about it, dear. I'm just happy to talk to you," said Burr after we were a few minutes late for this phone interview. Could this be the same man who made mincemeat of District Attorney Hamilton Burger week after week throughout our '50s-and-early-'60s childhoods?

"Perry Mason: The Case of the Glass Coffin" (airing Tuesday, May 14, on NBC) marks the 20th two-hour Mason TV movie since Burr brought the popular attorney back to prime time in 1985. (The original "Perry Mason" TV series ran from 1957-66.) "Twenty TV movies is a whole career by itself," says Burr. "Maybe we can call a halt to it after this season, and I'll come back 30 years from now."

Drill and unpretentious, Burr clearly understands the appeal of the character that he made indelible in TV history: (Eric Stanley Gardner created Mason in 1933 in the first of a popular series of mystery novels, and a number of actors subsequently played him on radio and in movies — but none better than Burr, who was personally chosen by Gardner for the TV role.)

"I believe people like Perry Mason because if they ever got in trouble they would like someone on their side," Burr says. "He represents the fact that the Anglo-Saxon system of law is the best in the world; the fact that the justice system works and hopefully that it's available to all people."

The classic "Perry Mason" series was one of the high points of a TV genre that also will never die: mystery. "Life around us is such a Greek tragedy that we all need escapism," Burr says. "It's nice to have a story we don't necessarily have to have all the answers to. It's a challenge."

Burr sees the current series of TV

movies, which are produced at the rate of three or four per TV season, as pure entertainment. "Mystery works because it's good fun for the audience," he says.

Burr enjoys the Mason TV movies because "in the old days with the hour show, there wasn't time for anything else but plot. Mason has a sense of humor, and Burr does too. Now I've plenty of time to work on that. If I don't like what's written for me, I rewrite it."

"Today's young actors don't know how to take me," Burr continues. "The fact that I have a sense of humor — and a far-ranging sense of humor — surprises most people."

In "The Mystery of the Glass Coffin," however, there aren't many opportunities to laugh. Peter Scolari ("Newhart") plays David Katz, a magician. One night, the body of his pregnant girlfriend (Nancy Grahn of

"Santa Barbara") plummets from a levitated glass coffin to the stage floor during an elaborate illusion. Mason must prove Katz innocent of murder.

Burr seems to love being Mason because it creates a sense of family for him. "In two years, I will have known Barbara Hale (who continues to play Mason's secretary; Della Street) 30 years!" he says. "She's my best friend."

"great shape" and is planning to get back in the Perry Mason saddle very shortly.

Q: Can you tell me about stuntman "Super-Dave" Osborne, who stars in the Showtime series? — I.Y.

A: Super-Dave Osborne, the television daredevil whose stunts always backfire to the surprise of no one but himself, is actually Emmy-winning writer-producer Bob Einstein. The former television and radio advertising man never planned to be a performer. A spur-of-the-moment local talk show appearance with a friend brought him to the attention of Tommy Smothers, who offered him a job as a writer-performer on Glen Campbell's summer series. He was hooked on performing and there was no turning back. He will soon make his big-screen debut. Einstein's brother is writer-director-actor, Albert Brooks.

Q: Now that the Persian Gulf War is over, can we expect a barrage of war-related movies? — D.B.

A: Hollywood is nothing if not opportunistic and the wheels are in motion for at least four films dealing with the Iraq conflict. They are "Desert Shield," starring Rob Lowe and Jan-Michael Vincent; "Human Shield," with a cast of unknowns; "Shield of Honor," to star David Caradine; and "Target, U.S.A."

Q: Watching "Citizen Kane" during its current release, I was mystified by the odd fact that Joseph Cotten, playing the part of Orson Welles' best friend, makes a brief appearance earlier in the film as one of a group of reporters. How do you explain this weird double casting? — G.O.

A: My source at Paramount, which has re-released the film, thinks it was just a mistake. Cotten wasn't a recognizable face at the time, and most likely it was thought that his tiny extra role as a reporter would not be noticed. Cotten, of course, became a star in this, his first film — making his few seconds as a reporter all the more glaring when seen today.

Q: Even though he made an impression as the nasty mob lawyer in "Godfather III," isn't George Hamilton still regarded as a Hollywood joke? — C.W.

A: Hamilton is as canny as a fox and knows that presenting himself as something of a perpetually

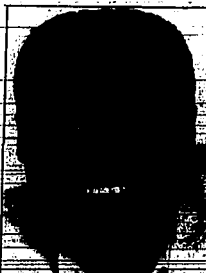
Autobiography will tell all

tanned goof-off, he'll get a fair amount of attention. Privately, George sports a razor-sharp mind with wit to match. He's also a good businessman. He's all set to join the cast of "Criminals," a comedy with John Cundy and Jim Belushi, currently being filmed in Monte Carlo, one of Hamilton's favorite haunts. George is also preparing to star in a new TV series to be titled either "Serving Time" or "Jives."

Q: Now that Mariel Hemingway seems to be in the restaurant business, has she abandoned her acting career? — P.K.

A: Hemingway, who has been acting since the age of 13 — she's now 30 — has actually made two films in the last year. The troubled finances of MGM-Pathe have delayed the opening of "Delirious," in which she stars with John Candy. Should the studio's cash problems improve, the film will go into distribution this summer. In the second film, Hemingway plays the wife of rock star John Cougar Mellencamp in "Falling From Grace." This wife and mother of two young daughters has, with restaurateur husband Steve Crisman, opened their fourth restaurant, Sam's Cafe, in Westlake Village, Calif. She is one young woman who seems to be doing it all.

acter. Sly originally sought Victor Mature for the tiny cameo part. "He asked us for \$250,000 a day," an astonished Stallone told me. Kirk Douglas wound up with the role — at a presumably less lofty price which took just a day to shoot.

Q: What's this about Sandra Dee, who played all those "Gidget"-type movies back in the '60s, being redrafted to reading tarot cards for strangers? Sounds like an awful comedown for this one-time star. — R.H.

A: Though Sandra Dee's recent hard times have been well reported in the press, thankfully they don't include telling fortunes, as was reported in a supermarket paper. Fact is, that New York tarot-card reader has absolutely no connection with the ex-Hollywood star except for their name, a coincidence that the tabloid nevertheless capitalized on.

Q: In a recent column you mentioned that Nancy Reagan has asked friends to call the publisher if they find themselves misquoted in the Kitty Kelley biography of her. Any inkling what her California pals really think about the book? — J.L.

A: Nancy's nearest and dearest have acknowledged her faults among themselves (imperiousness, greed, stinginess and bossiness) but they feel sorry for her and feel the book was too harsh. However, among the former first lady's group of California friends, the most sympathy goes to Barbara Sinatra,

Soap-opera scene

Soaps operas play the ratings game

The prime-time shows live and die by the ratings, and one actress, starring in a marginally ranked prime-time sitcom, put it all in perspective when she said, "I can't stand it, all they talk about on the set is the ratings. You come in and go to makeup and the hairdresser is on the phone with his friend discussing the overnight (ratings). When you go to lunch, the waitresses in the commissary are even talking about the ratings. It drives you crazy."

The soaps may not generate that frantic atmosphere when it comes to the weekly ratings, but that doesn't mean the networks don't keep a keen eye out for the rankings of their soaps. In a fairly recent Nielsen Ratings Report, a rather surprising thing happened. "As the World Turns," which recently celebrated its 35th anniversary on TV, jumped up from its usual spot of four or five on the national ratings to number two. It's not very likely for a long-running show to make it almost to the very top of the heap, and there was cause for celebration at CBS and on the "ATWT" set.

"General Hospital," which had occupied the number-2 spot, slipped to number 3 and the wags are having a field day, blaming honcho Gloria Monty for the downward spiral. Ms. Monty has been chopping heads left and right since she took over the reins on the soap, which she guided to the top of the heap some years back with the Luke and Laura storylines. Many so-called experts are predicting ABC execs will step in shortly (if the ratings continue to drop) and make some changes themselves.

Meanwhile, at the "As the World Turns" camp, there are smiles on every one's face. No one can really analyze why this durable soap has suddenly taken on new interest for the viewers. Could it be the storylines make more sense than some of the other soaps? Might it be due to the cast, which is always first rate. As for appealing to the younger viewers, there are actors who certainly mix with the teen girls who make up a good part of the audience. Two of them are Jon Hensley, who has returned to the role of Holden

Snyder and James Wleek, who plays Linc Lafferty. These two guys have helped to lure the young girls who buy the soap magazines, judging by the many articles that appear about them in those periodicals. Demographics have shown that many high schoolers are fans of "As the World Turns," while college students gather in groups to watch the show.

Of course, the undisputed champion in the soap sweepstakes has been "The Young and the Restless," which has remained in the number one spot for a long time now. The inhabitants of the fictional Midwestern town of Genoa City hold a constant fascination for viewers. The current cast is probably one of the strongest in soaps today. The lineup includes such popular soap stars as Peter Brandon, Peter Bergman, Eric Braeden, Jeanne Cooper, Michael Corbett, Michael Damian, Doug Davison, Don Diamont, Tracey Bergman, Quinn

Redeker and Melody Thomas Scott.

At the other end of the spectrum is "Loving," which has remained in the ratings cellar for a long time. It is ranked number 11 out of 11 daily soaps. Actually, the soap is not bad at all and probably would do better in another time slot, but that's the way it is — some soap has to be the lowest rated and for the time being, "Loving" has that dubious distinction.

The ratings may not be as "do or die" as they are in prime time, but the networks are aware of the numbers and the competition to rank as high as possible is always there.

CHANNEL CHATTER

NBC takes victory in 2nd sweeps week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS' "Dallas" finale was the No. 2 show on television but NBC was the No. 1 network in the latest weekly ratings battle.

The two-hour final chapter of "Dallas," ending the prime-time soap's 13-year run on CBS, gave the Texas Ewing clan its best rating since 1987.

But NBC, aided by back-to-back first-place finishes for its "Switched at Birth" miniseries, won the overall network race with a 13.5 average rating.

Figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed CBS in second place with an overall network average of 12, ABC was third with 10.8.

Part two of "Switched at Birth," which chronicled the real-life saga of two babies raised by the wrong sets of parents, was the most-watched show on television last week. Part one of the NBC miniseries finished first in the previous ratings period.

NBC's "Cheers" was third last week, followed by ABC's "Roseanne."

The mental-collapse of divorce lawyer Arnie Becker and more romantic suggestions between two female attorneys pushed NBC's "L.A. Law" into fifth place last week.

CBS' "60 Minutes," which usually hovers near the No. 1 spot, fell to No. 6.

of Archie's bad humor. Also starring Jean Stapleton, Rob Reiner and Sally Struthers, "All in the Family" premiered on Jan. 12, 1971. It was the No. 1 television program for six seasons.

By its last broadcast on Sept. 21, 1983, Stapleton, Reiner and Struthers had quit, and the show's name had been changed to "Archie Bunker's Place."

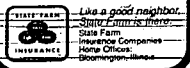

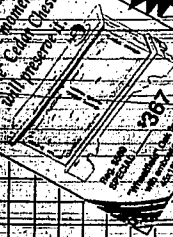
