Just the ticket

That citation for running a red light may prove easy to beat before judge

TWIN FALLS — If you run a red light, you might get a ticket. But that ticket might not stand up in court.

Twin Falls city police officers have ample opportunity to ticket drivers who run red lights — but making those violations stick is not always easy, they say.

"You wouldn't believe it, but they're very difficult cases to win," Cpl. Dave Heidemann of the police Accident Reduction Team told the Twin Falls City Council recently.

Fifth District Magistrate R. Michael Redman said the variables involved in red-light cases make them more difficult for officers to win in court.

"Officers probably lose more of those than their regular traffic cases," Redman said. "It depends on their testimony."

Idaho law says that drivers cannot enter an intersection on a red light, but says nothing about yellow lights, Redman said. If someone gets the nose of his car into the intersection before the light turns red, he is there legally.

Redman said this is a bad law and poses

problems for police officers in proving someone ran a light.

If an officer follows someone who runs a red light and can testify that the light turned red before the car entered the intersection, the testimony might be enough to win a conviction. A witness to the infraction makes the case even stronger, Redman said.

But an officer can't assume that just because the traffic light in his direction was green that the light in another direction was red, Redman said.

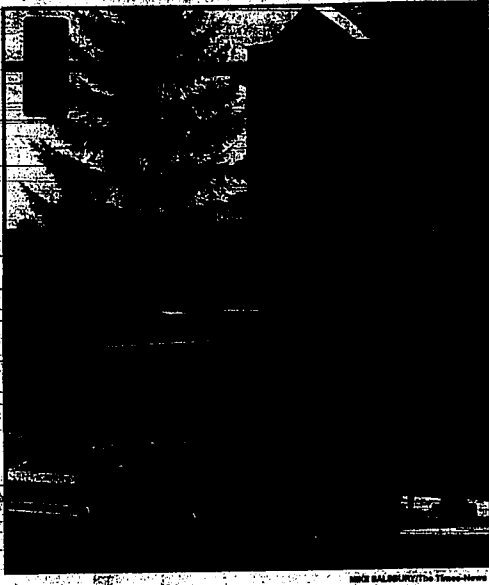
"You can't convict somebody on that," he said.

A judge has to consider all possibilities, especially if the officer cannot testify that the light in the defendant's direction was red.

Heidemann said he has heard of judges who want an engineer to testify that the traffic signal was functioning correctly when the driver ran the red light in order to convict the motorist. Other judges want the officer to testify not only that he saw the defendant run the red light but also that the light in the opposite direction was against the suspect, he said.

Kennedy's actions generate speculation about his future

WASHINGTON — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy had a right to avoid talking to Palm Beach police investigating an alleged sexual assault at his family home, say legal experts, but his actions are sparking speculation about his political future.

While one Democratic pollster said she sees no danger to Kennedy in his home state of Massachusetts, the state GOP chairman said questions about the senator's behavior could help solidify opposition in 1994. "We will have a strong Republican candidate, I am sure," said Leon J. Lombardi.

At the center of the speculation are Kennedy's reaction to the Easter weekend that led to an allegation of rape against the senator's nephew, William Kennedy Smith.

Records released Tuesday show that Patrick Kennedy had told police his father — the senator — became aware on Easter Sunday of an alleged sexual assault.

That attempt to contradict the senator's own statements, Kennedy issued a statement Wednesday saying he had discussed the incident involving Smith with several people but that "none of us thought that the investigation was about rape."

"I thought the police were investigating a

different offense such as sexual harassment," his statement said. It cited an "honest semantic misunderstanding."

Despite attempts by the authorities to contact him, Kennedy said he had not known that police wanted to talk to him.

Kennedy has not yet announced plans to seek a new term in 1994, although there are no signs that he intends to retire.

Democratic pollster Colinda Lake said she saw no political danger to Kennedy in Massachusetts, but added there was a risk to his standing as a national leader and to "the progressive movement" where "he plays an incredibly, incredibly powerful role."

Given the public perception of Kennedy, said Lake, would be any appearance at a criminal trial of Smith, charged by police with sexual assault, tantamount to rape.

"How he handles that is going to be very important," she said. "It'll either answer a lot of people's questions or it'll destroy the myth."

Richard Ben-Veniste, who was one of the lead prosecutors in the Watergate trials and now practices law in Washington, said Kennedy was under the legal obligation to talk to police.

"Even if you were to understand that the police were requesting an interview with him, absent a subpoena or other court process, he had no obligation to talk to them," said Ben-Veniste.

Other legal authorities agreed.

Subs go to sea minus full load of missiles

WASHINGTON — The Navy has decided not to fully arm the long-range ballistic missiles carried aboard some of its new Trident submarines because of a shortage of its most powerful nuclear warheads, military sources said Thursday.

The decision means that, for the first time, the Navy's most modern and lethal submarines are being sent to sea with less than a full complement of warheads.

Unlike the eight Trident subs in the Pacific Fleet, which are fully armed but with older missiles, the first four subs assigned to the Atlantic Fleet will have fewer than the maximum 192 W88 warheads, said the Pentagon sources, who discussed the matter on the condition they not be identified.

The Trident submarines are the crown jewels in the Navy's strategic nuclear force. They form one leg of the Pentagon's nuclear "triad" of land, air and sea-based nuclear weapons capable of striking the Soviet

Union.

Private analysts say the move has little or no immediate effect on national security, was forced by a prolonged shutdown of the weapons plant near Denver that is the only maker of plutonium pits, which form the core of all nuclear warheads.

The Rocky Flats closure has left the Navy with too few W88 warheads to fully arm the 25 long-range ballistic missiles carried aboard the Trident subs, the sources said. Each of the 24 missiles on a sub can carry as many as eight warheads, each of which can be aimed at a separate target.

The first three Atlantic Fleet subs — the USS Tennessee, the USS Pennsylvania and the USS West Virginia — have entered service since Rocky Flats closed in 1989, while the fourth, the USS Kentucky, is to join the fleet next year.

This is the first known case in which the shutdown at the Rocky Flats plant has forced a substantial change in the U.S. strategic nuclear weapons plans.

Twin Falls 'Taters: Comic relief for baseball fans

TWIN FALLS — Minor league baseball has returned to the Magic Valley.

The Twin Falls 'Taters comic strip makes its debut in the May 25 issue of Baseball America, a semi-weekly, nationally distributed sports newspaper.

"We're hoping Twin Falls will embrace the 'Taters as we have," said Dean Gyorgy, editor of the Extra Innings page on which the 'Taters appear. "We hope the people there take it with good humor." Not since 1969, when the Magic Valley

Cowboys last played at Harmon Park, has Twin Falls been host to a professional baseball team.

The fictional 'Taters play at Potato Patch Park, sell 223 varieties of potato refreshments, and their concession stand is backed by the Sweet Potatoes cheerleaders.

Baseball America plans for the strip to carry a theme similar to the baseball movie "Bull Durham," focusing on the fun and characters in the minor leagues.

Not much is known about the 'Taters yet since the newspaper only has the first and second strips.

"We're playing it by ear," said Gyorgy. "We don't really know what's going to happen in this team, whether they'll be winners or losers or what."

The first strip introduces the team but no characters. The second will feature a local doctor who quits his practice and makes the team.

Being a former professional baseball team helped Twin Falls get the franchise. "If I had a minor league team once, so we thought we would bring it back," Gyorgy said.

Once strip author Jay Schiller decided on the name 'Taters, he needed to find

home. Pocatello was the first choice, but Baseball America editors wanted to avoid using a town that had a recent minor league baseball team.

After a study of a road atlas, Twin Falls became the consensus choice of the staff. The 'Taters won out over entries like the Walla Walla Walleyes and the Eau Claire Elains.

Baseball America, an 11-year-old, Durham, N.C.-based publication with a circulation of 75,000, started the strip after it decided to redesign its look. Extra Innings runs on the next-to-last page and

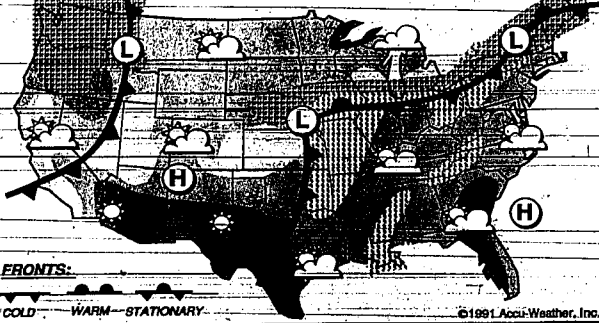

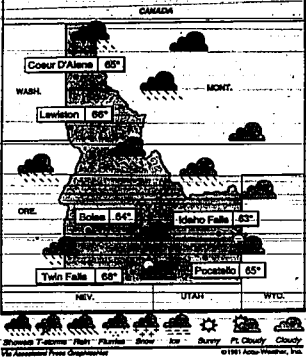

Rough weather rumbles across Great Plains, Midwest

A band of thunderstorms rumbled over the nation's midsection Thursday after belting Texas with high winds and heavy rains. Tornadoes also touched down in central Kansas.

The violent weather was spawned by warm, moist and unstable air over the Plains clashing with cooler drier air from the northern and central Rockies. The meeting ground was over Kansas, where three different severe weather watches were posted.

Tornadoes touched down in central Kansas near Lawrence, Russell, and Lucas. There were no immediate reports of damage. A severe thunderstorm also dropped golfball size hail east of Hays.

Widespread showers and thundershowers also hit Illinois, Indiana, and Kentucky. Severe thundershowers in central Illinois spawned a tornado just southeast of Farmington.

A cluster of strong thunderstorms produced wind damage in northwest Texas Thursday morning.

Outbuildings and utility poles were blown down in Coconino shortly after sunrise and nearly an inch of rain fell in 45 minutes near Lake Brownwood. One inch hail also pelled Coconino.

Showers and thundershowers were scattered from eastern South Dakota through the western Great Lakes. Slow moving morning thundershowers at Preston, Minn., dropped more than 1.5 inch of rain in just over an hour.

Strong thundershowers over South Carolina Thursday morning dumped heavy rains over Charleston. Heavy showers and thundershowers also covered much of the Florida peninsula.

A slow-moving storm system dumped heavy snows in the northern and central mountains of Colorado overnight. More than a foot and a half of snow fell at Winter Park, while 10 to 12 inches fell at Fraser, the Arapahoe Basin ski area, and at the Eisenhower Tunnel, west of Denver.

Extremely heavy rainfall overnight and early Thursday produced flooding in south central South Dakota. A 6 inch rain gauge at Tuhill overflowed.

Rocky Flats processing in disfavor

WASHINGTON — A House Appropriations subcommittee has voted by a narrow margin to advise against future plutonium processing at the Rocky Flats nuclear-weapon plant near Denver until an independent panel has reviewed whether the work could be done elsewhere.

The melting and purification of plutonium "is a key step in fashioning new nuclear weapons from the material in retired U.S. warheads. No such work has occurred since November 1989, when the Rocky Flats plant was shut down to correct environmental and safety hazards.

The Energy Department, which manages warhead production for the U.S. military, intends to renew the processing of plutonium at Rocky Flats next year. It also has sought to renew the manufacture at Rocky Flats of new nuclear-weapon cores or "pits" later this year, using purified plutonium stockpiled at the plant.

Officials have said that operation would occur before some federally mandated safety and health and environmental standards can be met at the plant.

But in a 5 to 4 vote this week at the urging of Rep. David Skaggs, D-Colo., who represents the Rocky Flats area, the energy and water subcommittee backed formation of a panel to examine whether there are practical alternatives to a resumption of processing at the plant.

An aide to Skaggs noted that in 1989, the National Research Council urged the department to consider moving much of the processing to Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico. Since then, the department has begun testing another plutonium-processing plant at Savannah River, S.C.

If supported by the full committee in a vote expected next week, the recommendation will appear in a report on the Energy Department's fiscal year-1992 appropriations. Although the recommendation is not legally binding, such congressional suggestions are rarely disregarded by the executive branch.

DOE spokeswoman Deborah Smith said Thursday that the department opposes the proposal as "an unnecessary waste of time" because other plants cannot shoulder the Rocky Flats plant's plutonium-processing workload.

Reopening the facility is a mandatory step required by law, dictated by the president in a nuclear-weapon stockpile plan, she said.

said traffic signals are equipped with monitors to prevent lights in different directions from being green at the same time. Whether those lights are in cross directions or opposite directions, if two simultaneously turn green and should not be, the monitor would trigger and the lights would flash.

"If you see red, you're supposed to see the green," Young said.

To help officers make their cases in court, Young and other city officials want to talk with Magistrate Court judges about the traffic signal system. Young hopes to explain how the system works and hopes that judges then might better accept officers' testimony on red-light violations.

In the meantime, drivers who think they can run red lights with impunity ought to reconsider.

Despite the difficulty sometimes in getting a red-light ticket to stand up in court, the best prescription for getting drivers to stop running lights is to "ticket them," Hertz said.

"The best thing to do is write a citation. A properly worded/oral warning helps... but running lights is a driving habit. A warning is a short-term answer. Tickets are better," he said.

"Legally, a person is not required to make money available to the police," said Geoffrey Hazard, a professor at the Yale Law School.

Congress sees queen, applauds her speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — The first British monarch to address Congress stood before that solemn body Thursday and pointedly addressed the issue that has preoccupied both nations' capitals for several days: Her royal headgear.

"I do hope you can see me today from where you're," Queen Elizabeth II said in clipped tones, bringing her audience to its feet in a burst of applause.

Seeing her could, the folks that prepared the letters to the House chamber having no interest in a report of Tuesday's White House hat flap.

Then, the 5'4" queen was dubbed "the talking hat" because a wall of microphones obscured her face so that the television viewers saw only the brim of her purple and white boater.

President Bush kept the issue alive Wednesday by blaming his protocol chief, Joseph Reed, for the gaffe. Then Reed replied that he just wanted the world to see the queen's "beautiful hat."

The queen managed to get through Wednesday in a variety of military without international incident. Another potential protocol breach was avoided when lawmakers decided to scrap the tradition against hats in the chamber for her Thursday speech, which was delivered under a tangerine straw number.

Members of the House and Senate and the diplomatic corps gave the queen a standing ovation as she entered, and House Speaker Thomas

Environmentalists, others want to expand chemical reporting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Environmentalists and key senators on Thursday urged a sweeping expansion of the "right-to-know" law requiring manufacturers to report their releases of toxic chemicals.

The nation's factories reported releasing 5.7 billion pounds of such chemicals in 1989, a cut of 18 percent in two years, the Environmental Protection Agency said.

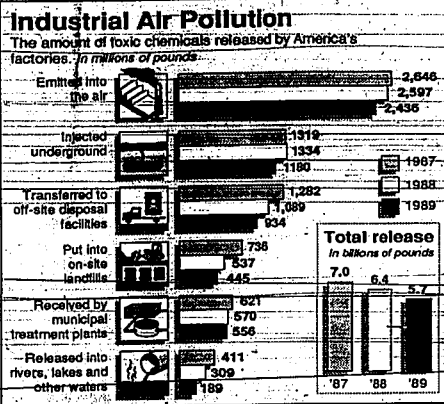
But critics said the figures announced Thursday just highlighted the gaps in the system, estimating that about 95 percent of toxic chemicals are not covered.

"It's time to expand the law," said Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., chairman of the Superfund subcommittee of the Senate Environment Committee.

"The public has a right to know," Lautenberg, who wrote the 1986 law setting up the existing disclosure system, was joined at a news conference by the subcommittee's ranking Republican, Dave Durenberger of Minnesota, who said he backed the effort to require reporting of more chemicals and more sources of pollution.

"Whoever invented the phrase, 'What you don't know can't hurt you' never made a toxic chemical," Durenberger said.

Industries not covered by the law include mining, farming, electric utilities, hazardous waste recycling, oil

and gas drilling and all federal facilities, such as military bases or nuclear weapons plants.

Lautenberg said he did not know how many chemicals should be added to the 320 currently covered, but said a starting point would be a list of several hundred substances regulated under the Clean Air Act and other pollution control laws, but not included under the right-to-know law.

EPA officials say they have added 16 chemicals to the list originally set by Congress, while deleting several determined not to be toxic. But the process is cumbersome and can take years for each chemical.

EPA Administrator William K. Reilly said the report, known as the Toxics Release Inventory, "is fast becoming one of the most powerful tools we have to reduce toxic emissions."

Interior trims government revenue from Yellowstone

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top Interior Department officials watered down a staff recommendation to increase the government's revenue share from its concessionaire in famed Yellowstone National Park, an internal document shows.

The decision in the Yellowstone case is the first major test of Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan's sweeping new policy initiative, as touted by a department press release, to increase payments by profitable, private firms operating on public lands.

Lujan and top National Park Service officials decided last month to raise payments from Yellowstone's concession operator — from the current 22 percent of gross revenues annually to 25 percent. The new figure was expressed as a minimum requirement for a new concession contract to take effect in November.

The new Yellowstone contract would be structured this way:

- 10 percent of gross revenues would go to a construction program that would include replacement and rehabilitation of lodges and cabins in the park, including the Snow Lodge at Old Faithful. The staff analysis recommended that this program be set at 14 percent of gross revenues.
- Another 10 percent of gross receipts would provide maintenance

and repair of facilities, including new roofing, utility repairs and renovating historic furnishings at the Mammoth Hotel.

About \$8 million would be spent for specific construction projects over three years, averaging about 5 percent annually. This would ensure that the most urgent construction projects are completed, regardless of gross revenues. Renovation of the Old Faithful Inn and the Mammoth Hotel would be among the projects.

A Park Service staff analysis, obtained by The Associated Press, recommended an increase to 29 percent of gross revenues when the new contract is awarded.

A comparison of potential revenues showed that at the 29 percent figure, the park could realize an additional \$12 million over the 10-year contract. Total revenues could total \$86.4 million at the higher figure, compared to \$74 million under the lower amount.

National Park Service spokesman George Berkeley said the staff analysis was "in line with the recommendation" of top Park Service officials. The Park, the Park Service's Rocky Mountain region and the Washington office were in full agreement on the final outcome.

Reagan-hostage issue to be probed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Democratic leadership has quickly approved a preliminary staff investigation into whether the 1980 Reagan-Bush campaign against President Jimmy Carter conspired with Iran to delay release of American hostages until after the election.

Burton, looking into the matter already have disproved an allegation that President Bush, then the vice presidential candidate, secretly met with Iranian representatives in Paris in October 1980, the source said.

House Speaker Thomas P. Foley, Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, and the chairman of several committees met privately early this week to discuss the overall issue, and put their authority behind the efforts of several key staff members to review available evidence. A group of House members conducting interviews on the matter planned to meet Thursday with Richard V. Allen, a former campaign official and Reagan's first national security adviser.

In its private meeting, the Democratic leadership gave a more formal endorsement to the staff investigation, and asked for a report recommending whether to go to a second phase that could include subpoenaing documents and putting witnesses under oath, said sources speaking on condition of anonymity.

Only Bush can save NASA project

WASHINGTON (AP) — A congressional committee's refusal to spend money for a space station has left NASA in its worst political crisis in two decades, but the White House promised Thursday to fight for the funds and to get the project restored.

"This action is totally unacceptable," said Vice President Dan Quayle, who heads the National Space Council. "We're going to work to get these funds restored."

President Bush's spokesman, Martin Flitwater, said, "I'm sure there will be a fight over it, but we intend to try to get it back."

With a 6-3 vote in a closed session, a House appropriations subcommittee on Wednesday denied further funds for the station, a project that has been underway since 1984 and that already has cost taxpayers more than \$4 billion.

Rep. Bill Green of New York, the senior Republican on the subcommittee, said the panel "faced the choice of eliminating or dramatically scaling back NASA's many worthwhile science programs or funding a program which still is searching for a mission."

Given those options, Green said, "the choice was an easy one for me."

The panel's vote to cut \$2 billion of space station funds from Bush's space request for \$15.7 billion next year was just the first step in a long budgeting process.

The spending bill now goes to the full House. Appropriations Committee, which is likely to ratify the subcommittee's action, then the process starts again in the Senate.

Privately, lawmakers and administration sources say the space station cause already is lost in the House and has its best chance in the Senate.

Voters' sweet dilemma: A pair of fine candidates

The only bad news about Tuesday's School Board election in Twin Falls is that one of the two candidates is going to lose.

David Sass and Char Alexander are as good a pair of would-be board members as the community could ask for. If two seats were available, voters would be smart to elect them both.

At age 38, both candidates exemplify the growing community involvement of the Baby Boom generation, a constituency with a pointed interest in quality education.

The boomers expect their own children to get more out of public education than was available a generation ago, and they're not shy about demanding improvement.

Sass and Alexander represent that constituency thoughtfully and articulately.

The two candidates come to the race from different directions. Sass grew up in Twin Falls, graduated from college and came home to run his own contracting business.

Alexander dropped out of Filser High School just short of graduation, but she never gave up on education. She carved out success for herself in

local business, and she finally collected a diploma in 1989.

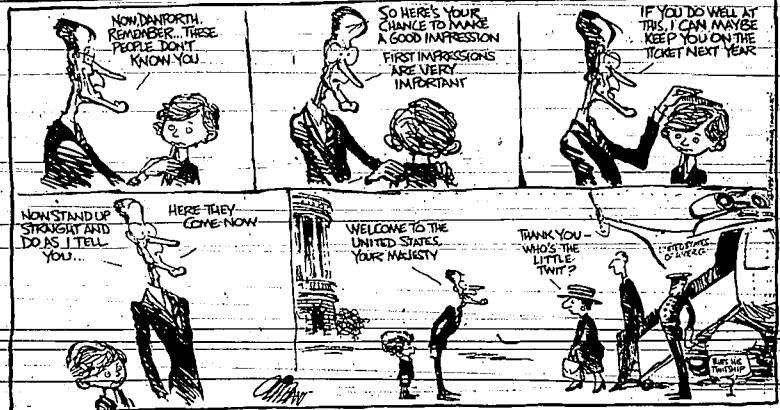
Her belated sheepskin and her board candidacy are reminders that today's so-called "at risk" students possess enormous potential that we dare not waste.

In their individual ways, Sass and Alexander represent viewpoints that would be valuable additions to the Twin Falls School Board.

Voters, parents and taxpayers can expect fine service from whichever of the two wins.

As for the loser: We hope the second-place candidate finds a niche for service in an advisory committee or some other volunteer job. Local schools need more people like both of them.

Note: Sass and Alexander are running for the District 1 board position. Only voters in that district (roughly, south of Addison Avenue, west of Locust Street and east of Rock Creek) may vote. Ballots must be cast at Bickel School. All district residents may vote on the bond issue proposal at any school.



Gun control's toughest test is in Senate

The National Rifle Association is right about one thing. As one of its lobbyists remarked after the Brady bill passed the U.S. House: "The ball game's not over yet." The measure establishing a national seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases faces an even tougher test in the Senate.

"Roll Call," the Capitol Hill newspaper, has polled the Senate and found that the Brady bill's fate is very much up in the air. Forty members oppose the legislation or are leaning against it; 33 favor it or are leaning toward it. Fourteen are undecided, and the remaining 13 did not respond.

As satisfying as the win in the House was for proponents of the bill, they cannot afford to let their triumph linger. For three years, the gun-control advocates appropriately have focused on the House, since that is where the battle has been fought. But now they need to turn their eyes to the Senate.

Majority Leader George Mitchell's initial opposition to the legislation—appears to have resolved itself. The Maine Democrat is now saying he wants to improve, not kill, the Brady bill.

Mitchell argues that the measure, as it now stands, does not do enough. He proposes to strengthen it, by making background checks of prospective gun buyers mandatory (instead of optional, as in the House bill) and by allocating some money to help create a national registry of criminal records.

Some people fear that the majority leader is being disingenuous and simply giving the NRA's allies more reasons to try to defeat the legislation. But unless the skeptics can

prove that Mitchell is a wolf in sheep's clothing, his proposals deserve to be considered on their own merits. Both seem sound.

The real dilemma for waiting period proponents is that the Brady bill is likely to be attached to the comprehensive anti-crime legislation under consideration in the Senate. President Bush already has warned that he won't sign the handgun measure if it is not part of his anti-crime package.

Yet the president's anti-crime plans contain several proposals that are anathema to many of the senators who support gun control.

Among them is a hotly disputed proposal to make it harder for state prisoners, especially those on death row, to file petitions in federal court to challenge their sentences.

Another of Bush's recommendations, also disliked by senators who would be inclined to vote for a waiting period, would expand the exceptions to the exclusionary rule—which bars prosecutors from using illegally seized evidence in court. A third element would extend the federal death penalty.

The lawmakers opposing the president argue that he is trampling on individuals' constitutional rights. Will they give Bush what he wants in exchange for the gun control they favor? Or will they conclude that the acquiescence on these other issues would be too high a price to pay for the Brady bill?

It is a shame the president has turned an issue as important as gun control into no

more than a bargaining chip. Ideally, a national waiting period for handgun purchases would be voted upon separately, as it was in the House. But the bill's advocates understand political reality and know that a free-standing Senate measure is wishful thinking.

The best to be hoped for is that a face-saving compromise can be worked out by the anti-crime bill—one that allows the Democrats who support gun control to vote in favor of the overall legislation. That will mean finding some middle ground between Bush's position and the Democrats' on these other anti-crime proposals.

The Brady bill's 53-vote margin of victory in the House surprised all. Three years before, the measure had been defeated by 46 votes.

Some of the new support was due to the dogged lobbying of Jim and Sarah Brady. Some of it was the result of lawmakers overcoming their fear of the NRA.

But most of all, the dramatic shift on this issue was a recognition by congressmen that despite Americans' longstanding love for firearms, many people now see guns more as a source of danger than a source of security. A majority of citizens want some reasonable controls.

The House was expressing, at long last, the public's sentiment. The Senate, in writing its own legislation to combat the rising tide of violence, must not do anything less.

In December, the board recommended ninth-graders be isolated. They even postponed the bond to allow more time for the needs of ninth graders. Of course, the latest proposal puts ninth graders into a mega-high school. *(Ara cadabra presto change-o)*

The board wants to most accommodate growth. The state projects a drop in enrollment. The board claims they have more experience and better data. Have they noted the large number of new residents that are retiring baby boomers beyond their child-rearing years? Have they assessed the flight of families with young children to larger cities to improve their income?

The board consistently analyzes the most negative possible year-round schooling alternative and avoids presentation of alternatives that are attractive and fully workable. In one breath, the board whines it can't implement year-round schooling. It won't work. It can't work. It requires money we don't have; but in the next breath says if the bond fails, year-round schooling is the likely next step.

The issue is far less a matter of what is workable, educationally beneficial or fiscally responsible as far more a matter of the board having its mind made up and not wanting to be told otherwise.

In his own analysis, Ken Olson conceded a \$108,000 annual savings by adopting some form of year-round schooling and a related capital outlay of less than \$2 million.

Added specialized classrooms, physical education and theater facilities would total only another \$2.5 million. Excuse us, but that's \$15.5 million saved off the top and \$108,000 annually!

The board's non-traditional schedules would be a terrible inconvenience to certain families but has never considered that the current schedules are also inconvenient to many. Furthermore, the board never discusses the most flexible year-round scheduling option, the quarter system.

Shouldn't our priority be having the highest-quality and best-paid teachers in the Northwest instead of the most expensive high school campus?

ing against one another in the summer. It allows a program acceleration for motivated students.

And it allows families who must absolutely have a specific quarter off (for example, child-sharing divorced families) the option of being placed on a high-priority-for-that-particular-school.

Incredibly, the board expects us to accept its analysis but recently acknowledged in *The Times-News* that \$20-million might not be enough or that their growth analysis might be wrong. If under-budgeted, they will either ask for more tax money or start cutting programs.

Or, if it turns out they've over-built, Bickel School will either be closed or turned into a nice new district office complex.

Why should taxpayers on the south side ignore their own money and vote for a bond to build a new campus, three new gymnasiums, new soccer field, etc.?

Colleges all across America cooperate with high schools having campuses separate by many more miles in much more hostile environments than the mile and a half between TFHS and CSI.

How many buses could run between CSI and TFHS on a five-minute departure schedule before \$1 million (let alone \$20 million) would be spent?

The board apparently can't see the wisdom of utilizing scheduling to solve its projected crowding and investing new monies instead into teacher's salaries, retraining, benefits, teaching resources and numbers.

Shouldn't our priority be having the highest-quality and best-paid teachers in the Northwest instead of the most expensive high school campus?

Have you ever heard of attracting quality job applicants by keeping salaries and benefits low? What's wrong with solving student/teacher ratios and investing in teachers at the same time instead of building more buildings and paying more to maintain them?

Voter apathy could buy Twin Falls an educational white elephant on May 21. Every registered voter is urged to get out and vote.

2 helicopter crash victims identified

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — The U.S. government on Thursday identified two women who were killed in a military helicopter crash on Monday as National Guard members from northern California. The dead were Lt. Lt. Micki L. Boyd, 30, of Salinas, Calif., who piloted the UH-1H Huey helicopter and Sgt. Linda S. Simmons, 34, of Sacramento, Calif., who was a medic, the U.S. Embassy said. Both were attached to the 126th Airlift Medical Company based in Sacramento. They arrived April 17 at the Soto Cano Air Base 40 miles northeast of Tegucigalpa. A soldier injured in the crash was identified by the embassy as William Jarrell, 24, of West Virginia, who was assigned to the 371st Medical Brigade in Fort Carson, Colo. The embassy did not give his rank.

Police use tear gas against mourners

KWANGJU, South Korea — Thousands of angry mourners fought Thursday with police blocking a funeral march for a dissident worker who burned himself to death to protest the killing of a student demonstrator. Riot police fired volleys of tear gas for nearly two hours to stop about 3,000 students and dissidents marching from a hospital morgue toward the center of this city 165 miles south of Seoul. Dissidents pledged nationwide protests on Saturday, the anniversary of a 1980 pro-democracy revolt in Kwangju in which at least 200 people were killed. In industrial Busan, the nation's second-largest city, about 5,000 workers, dissidents and students demanding the resignation of President Roh Tae-woo fought riot police Thursday.

Mongolia begins meat rations in capital

BEIJING — Mongolia began rationing meat Thursday in its capital, Ulan Bator, due to supply shortages. Meat is one of many necessities in short supply. Flour, sugar, soap and other supplies have been rationed since Feb. 1. There also have been shortages of fuel and newspapers. Fuel shortages and the partial conversion of state cattle herds to private ownership have resulted in meat shortages in cities.

Presidency barred to non-Communist

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Yugoslav leaders scrambled Thursday to come up with a political solution to the latest crisis threatening their federation. Communist-run Serbia's refusal to allow a pro-Western Croat to become president. The Croatian representative to the collective federal presidency, former political prisoner Stipe Mesic, fell one vote short Wednesday of being chosen to head the body for the next year. Until now, rotation of the federal chairmanship occurred every year as a mere formality. But this year, disputes between Serbia and Croatia, Yugoslavia's two largest republics and intense rivals, threaten to tear the country apart. Mesic, a 56-year-old lawyer, would be the first non-Communist president of Yugoslavia.

Parliament makes Koran supreme law

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Parliament on Thursday passed a measure that would make the Koran the supreme law of Pakistan and subject all aspects of life to Islamic tenets. Liberal intellectuals fear the new system of law, called sharia, will hurt this impoverished nation of 120 million back into the Middle Ages. The law will govern Pakistan's life from social mores to education and the economy. It will trim laws in line with the Koran, the Muslim holy book, and the Sunnah, a collection of the teachings of the prophet Muhammad. The bill was passed by a "voice vote," which is not accompanied by a vote count. An estimated 120 members of Pakistan's 237-member national assembly were present.

Gorbachev bans strikes, fearing chaos

MOSCOW — President Mikhail Gorbachev on Thursday banned strikes in the coal, oil, natural gas and other industries in order to prevent economic chaos the summit could cost millions of jobs. Gorbachev's decree was issued hours after Soviet Prime Minister Valentin Pavlov announced leaders of the Soviet Union and 13 of the 15 republics had agreed on an "anti-crisis program" to shift from central planning toward a more market-oriented economy. The measures are the latest seeking to halt the collapse of the Soviet economy, which has been hit by walkouts, rising costs and shortages of many basic consumer goods.

Kurdish refugees set up camp in allied zone

ZAKHO, Iraq (AP) — Tens of thousands of Kurds from outside the allied security zone are cramming refugee camps and pitching tent settlements in northern Iraq, creating a major problem for the coalition forces trying to get them home, officials said Thursday. They said they could not put up tents fast enough for the refugees, with over 10,000 people coming down from the mountains on Wednesday alone. Most of the refugees are refusing to go to their towns because they remain in the hands of Iraqi forces.

The development is putting new pressure on the coalition to extend its 3,600-square-mile security zone to include the provincial capital of Dohuk, home to many of the refugees. "If we don't go down there, we could wind up with a quarter-million people here, which would be crazy," said U.S. Maj. Gen. Jerry Garner, commander of the coalition forces in northern Iraq. Already, the U.S.-built refugee camps in the northern city of Zakho are overflowing, with about 55,000 refugees arriving so quickly the camps ran out of tents on Tuesday, officials said. A fourth camp was started late Wednesday.

The more refugees were the harder it is to keep up, said Garner. "Every tent that we possess is either on a truck heading for Zakho or is up at Zakho," said Lt. Col. Philip Crowley, a spokesman for the allied zone at the Iraqi base in Turkey. "We have asked refugees to bring their own tents."

He said refugees who had left homes within the secure area were returning to them. He said Zakho's pre-exodus population of 52,000 was almost all back in the city. The same applied in smaller communities. Some of the refugees were returning from Iran, where about 1.2 million Iraqis sought shelter when the Iraqi army crushed the Kurdish rebellion in late March. Another 450,000 Iraqi Kurds fled to the Turkish border, where they had been living in squalid camps. More than half of them have returned to Iraq.

In addition to the refugees at the Zakho settlements, more than 15,000 other Iraqis have set up camp near a British "way station" at Kani Masi, originally intended for Kurds going to their homes.

Radon can cause gene mutations, research shows

LONDON (AP) — A preliminary study suggests people exposed to high levels of household radon have more of a certain genetic mutation than neighbors who are not exposed, scientists said Friday.

But Dr. Bryn Bridges, director of the study, stressed that the results from the small sampling could have been due to a statistical fluke, chance or some cancer-causing agent. He said the question needed more research.

The study found the frequency of mutations in people living in houses exceeding national standards for radon levels was "comparable to what you find in the blood of smokers," said Bridges, director of the Medical Research Council Cell Mutation Unit at the University of Sussex in Brighton. Many cancers are thought to be triggered by genetic mutations, but the study did not show that radon increases the risk of cancer.

Conflicting results have emerged from scientific studies examining cancer rates in areas known to have high levels of radon, a radioactive gas that forms naturally underground and seeps to the surface. Some studies indicate an increased risk of lung cancer or leukemia, while other studies show no risk at all.

Floods kill 30 Turks; scores homeless

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — Flash floods killed at least 30 people in eastern Turkey and left scores of others homeless, the Anatolia news agency and state radio said Thursday. Torrential rain and winds up to 75 mph lashed the region, inundating houses, roads and farmland and knocking out electricity, the reports said.

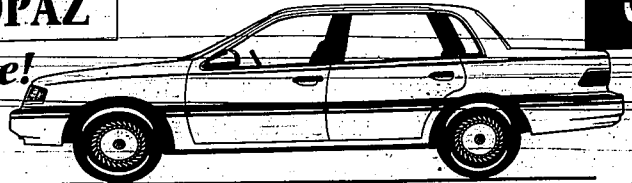

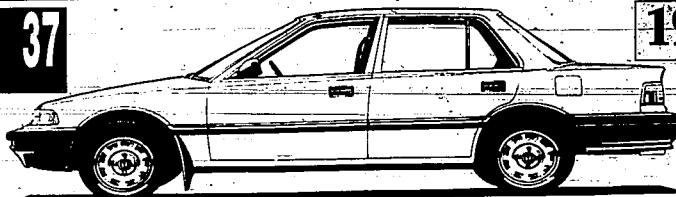

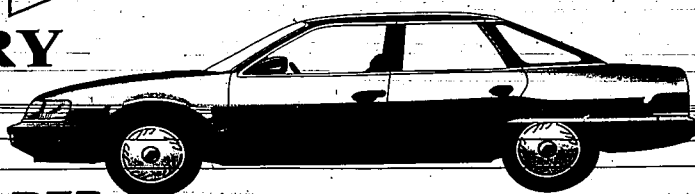

Hearing for former bean warehouse operator slated

TWIN FALLS — A hearing for former bean warehouse operator Jerry Hawkins, charged with 36 felony counts of falsifying corporate documents, is scheduled for July 1-3.

Dates for the preliminary hearing were set Wednesday when Hawkins made his first appearance in Magistrate Court on the charges. The hearing before 5th District Magistrate Charles Brumbach is to determine if the state attorney general's office has enough evidence to try the case.

Hawkins, who has not entered a plea in the case, is accused of making up \$500,000 in false check vouchers to owners of beans in Hawkins Co. Ltd. warehouses.

Hawkins Co. Ltd. filed for bankruptcy in January 1989. In December of that year, a majority of the people with beans in the Hawkins warehouses at the time of the failure came to an agreement on payment for the beans.

A class action lawsuit seeking \$5 million from Hawkins Co. directors and the state of Idaho is still pending.

Applicants must be 17 to 21 years old, U.S. citizens, single, not pregnant and have no legal obligation to support children or other dependents.

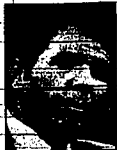
Applicant files are reviewed by Stallings' office, and he submits 10 nominations to the four academies, which make the final appointments.

Symms 'amused' at election speculation

TWIN FALLS — U.S. Sen. Steve Symms is "amused" and "a bit perplexed" by speculation over whether he'll seek a third term in Washington, D.C., says his press secretary, Dave Pearson.

"He doesn't understand it," Pearson said.

"Since his first election to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1972, Symms has consistently renounced his candidacy in the year of the election, Pearson said. In 1986, he formally announced in April.

"He's so consistent it's almost incredible," Pearson said.

But politicians are waiting for Symms' announcement, with bated breath ever since he hedged questions about seeking "another term" in the Senate and facing a challenge by Democratic 2nd District Congressman Richard Stallings.

"I would have to assume he's our best candidate and I would like him to run," said state party chairman Phil Batt.

Symms is expected to decide by Labor Day.

Meanwhile, Batt said he has spoken informally with a number of potential candidates should Symms opt out of the race, including Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne, state Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo of Idaho Falls and Boise stockbroker Milton Erhart.

Batt emphasizes that he's waiting for Symms' decision, and if the senator decides to go for it, Batt said he doesn't want a Republican primary challenge to the incumbent.

Although he hasn't ruled out the option of running for the U.S. Senate if Symms steps down, Crapo said he's more interested in Stallings' congressional seat.

"I think Steve Symms will run, and if not, my feeling is that at this point, I still

would look at the congressional race," Crapo said.

Kempthorne said he wouldn't challenge Symms in a primary, but if the senator doesn't run, "then I would certainly consider running."

But Erhart hasn't ruled out entering the primary.

"If Steve doesn't run, there isn't any question that I will be running," Erhart said. "Otherwise, there's a 50-50 chance."

Symms, Erhart said, can't win in a race against Stallings.

"It's very unlikely that if Steve Symms chooses to run that he can win. He may run because of his ego, but he won't be able to win," Erhart said.

School districts miss out on promised federal aid

WASHINGTON — Two south-central Idaho school districts are receiving only a fraction of the federal "impact" aid to which they are entitled, and Congress is hunched criticizing the cash-strapped programs responsible for the funding shortfalls.

In 1989, the last year for which figures are available, the Camas County School District received just 12 percent and the Glenns Ferry School District only 9 percent of the money they were authorized under a congressionally mandated formula.

The 39 Idaho school districts that get impact aid received just 41.1 percent of the money that Congress had authorized for them in 1989, according to a trade group study using federal Department of Education data.

The money goes to school districts that include substantial amounts of federal land in order to offset the diminished tax base impact aid is supposed to compensate public schools for what Congress estimates the federal presence costs them each year.

The entitlement levels were set by law in 1981, but Congress has not appropriated

enough money for the Department of Education to meet the required funding levels.

How much an individual school district sees of its official entitlement depends on a complicated formula that takes into account how many students' parents both live and work on tax-exempt federal land.

Land that was federally owned before 1938 is not included in the impact aid tabulations, according to Michael Muller, spokesman for the National Association of Federally Impacted Schools, which generated the school-by-school statistics.

Dozens of representatives from mostly rural states testified before a House Appropriations subcommittee Wednesday to Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, was among those demanding change.

"This disparity is unreasonable," Stallings said. "These and other school districts are forced to make up the difference by either reducing services or increasing the local tax burden. As a principal property owner, the federal government has a clear responsibility to contribute to the local schools, not only because it removes so much land from the tax base, but because it

ACLU: Inspection shows 'serious' problems in jail

HALLEY — A sanitary engineer was on hand this week to inspect the Blaine County Jail, sizing up allegations of poor conditions at the facility.

Although there weren't any surprises, "very serious deficiencies" were found at the county jail, said Stephen L. Pevar, attorney for the American Civil Liberties Union.

In January, the ACLU filed a class action lawsuit against the Blaine County commissioners and Sheriff Walt Femling. The suit alleged two dozen instances of poor conditions ranging from overcrowding to sanitation and recreation.

The ACLU chose an expert from Chicago to inspect the jail and compile a report on the situation. On Tuesday, he spent 14 hours at the facility along with Pevar and the county's attorney handling the suit, Dave Sasser.

Pevar said a complete report will be available within three weeks, but several inadequacies were found.

Problems that would be costly to correct were inadequate space and kitchen facilities and inadequate lighting, ventilation and recreation, Pevar said.

Femling said other "glaring areas" included inadequate medical screening, storage, staffing and lack of space to house inmates.

Sun Valley goes to court for right to collect tax

SUN VALLEY — The city of Sun Valley will go to court to seek the right to collect taxes on ski lift tickets sold in Sun Valley, according to City Administrator Roy Rainey.

The decision to seek a declaratory judgment against the Sun Valley Co. in 5th District Court followed a Tuesday-afternoon closed-door meeting of the Sun Valley City Council.

To date, the company has not collected taxes on lift tickets sold in Sun Valley or any of its other locations, but a recent opinion by Idaho Attorney General Larry Echthawk said a skier who buys a ticket in Sun Valley must pay a 2 percent option tax.

Rainey said the city is trying to work out an agreement with the Sun Valley Co., but "he didn't think the city's determination to collect the tax."

"We have a fiduciary responsibility to our citizens to collect this tax," he said.

Rainey said the city's talks with the company over the tax issue would be non-adversarial.

"We just want a situation that will be best for both of us," he said.

Sun Valley Co. officials could not be reached Thursday afternoon for comment.

The city of Sun Valley will be seeking taxes for the past three years, according to Rainey.

Sun Valley is also trying to collect taxes on building materials bought outside the city and brought into building sites within city limits.

The city does not intend to double tax materials, but wants to make sure that the appropriate tax is levied, Rainey said.

For instance, if a contractor were to buy materials in Ketchum, he would pay 6 percent tax, including a 5 percent state tax and a 1 percent local tax. If he then brought those materials into the city of Sun Valley, he would have to pay an additional 1 percent to cover the city's building materials tax, according to Rainey.

If materials were purchased in a state that has no sales tax and were shipped into the city, a full 7 percent tax would be levied.

Rainey said the city is exploring different ways to enforce the building materials tax, including adding the tax to building permits bought in the city and possibly licensing contractors as retailers.

Board delays decision on consolidation plan

HALLEY — It will be two more weeks before Blaine County residents will learn whether Blaine County Medical Center in Halley and Moritz Community Hospital in Sun Valley will be consolidated.

The medical center board of trustees put off a decision at its meeting Wednesday night, instead setting May 29 at 7 p.m. as the time to decide the fate of the merger. The Moritz board, the city of Sun Valley and the Blaine County commissioners have already given their approval for consolidation.

If the Blaine hospital board goes along, its facility and Moritz would be run under a single management structure. The hospital board did not have time to address the issue during its regular monthly meeting Wednesday, said board chairman Kendall Kinghorn. The trustees were occupied by a study of hospital care issues and other business issues.

The board, however, is prepared to make a final decision at its next meeting, Kinghorn said.

Officials say reactor equals jobs

IDAHO FALLS — Local government officials want a new federal energy Department reactor for the jobs it would create and its potential to produce electricity.

"We're not afraid of the nuclear industry," said Idaho Falls City Councilman James Groberg on Thursday. "We have learned to live with it."

Groberg spoke at the first of five public hearings in Idaho on the Energy Department's environmental impact statement covering its proposal to build a New Production Reactor. The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is one of three proposed sites for the reactor.

The NPR would produce steam, a radioactive form of hydrogen used to increase the yield of nuclear bombs.

A hearing is scheduled for Twin Falls next Thursday, at 8:30 a.m. at the Canyon Springs Inn.

"Though uneasy about the nation's large nuclear arsenal, Groberg said he is encouraged about the potential for peaceful applications that flow from defense projects.

Excess heat from the NPR could produce steam that in turn could be used to generate more electrical energy than Idaho Falls could use, Groberg said.

Despite being badly outnumbered, critics of the proposed reactor point out that it is a bomb plant and would not be built to produce electricity.

Department officials said power production is not part of the department's plans, but the capability exists.

"It's not our first concern," said Henry Garson, senior policy advisor in the Office of New Production Reactors.

Any power production, however, would require a utility to buy the excess steam from the reactor and build

its own generators to produce power.

"I think it's fair to say there will be electricity generated," DOE official Dave Nulton said.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said he supported the NPR in Idaho "if it is determined that the NPR should be built there and if it can be determined that the project will not damage the environment or endanger our citizens."

Andrus added that "I will continue to insist that waste management concerns be resolved before construction of any significant facility."

But the impact statement states lightly over the issue of waste disposal, said Beatrice Brailsford of the Snake River Alliance, a statewide nuclear disarmament group.

"The department assumes spent fuel from the NPR would be disposed of in a federal waste repository."

"No such repository exists," she said.

Man charged in 8-year-old murder

ASHTON (AP) — Almost eight years after the slaying occurred, a 27-year-old Ashton man has been arrested and charged with the shooting killing of an Ashton teenager.

Robert J. "Red" Grube, 27, was arrested Wednesday afternoon on a charge of first-degree murder in the shooting death of 15-year-old Amy Elizabeth Hossner in Ashton on June 4, 1983.

In his first court appearance, Grube was ordered to appear at a preliminary hearing May 29 at 9:30 a.m. and was ordered held in the Fremont County Jail without bond.

Residents of the close-knit community said they were shocked by the news.

"I'm so very sorry for both families," said Robin Jenkins, who was at Ott's Place in Ashton. The Hossner and Grube families are neighbors.

A news conference Thursday, Fremont Sheriff Terry Thompson would not say why Grube was arrested and charged, saying that release of that information "could jeopardize someone's safety."

Thompson also wouldn't say whether Grube was one of the original suspects, whether anyone else was involved or if a weapon had been recovered.

He was ordered held for Grube's arrest after a lengthy investigation in which more than 100 witnesses were contacted and extensive scientific testing of physical evidence took place, Prosecutor Penny Stanford said in a statement.

State authorities and Fremont County deputies pulled Grube over Wednesday afternoon as he was driving on U.S. 91 south of St. Anthony, Thompson said.

Rexburg attorney Michael Kam was appointed to represent Grube. Deputy Attorney General Michael Kane of Boise will assist in prosecution of the case.

Fremont County Magistrate Keith Walker, who will conduct the preliminary hearing, issued the warrant for Grube's arrest after Thompson and Deputy Kurt Hillman testified at a probable cause hearing Wednesday morning.

A citizen's jail review committee has been put back into service this spring to come up with a solution, Fleming said once the report is in hand, everything will be re-evaluated.

Proposed Blaine County setback ordinance under fire

HAILEY — A controversial Blaine County ordinance that regulates how close homes can be built to waterways has been rejected once again and will be subject to at least two more public hearings before its adoption.

In a meeting that began Tuesday afternoon and continued through Wednesday, the Blaine County Commission pored down the riparian management ordinance to make it less restrictive than a draft recommended by the County's Planning and Zoning Commission.

"The riparian management concept is still in there, but it is not nearly as restrictive or permitting as it was," said commission Chairman Alan Reynolds of Ketchum.

"A two-hour-long public hearing drew nearly 75 people, 90 percent of whom were opposed to the ordinance in any form."

"I've got to afford the jail and can't afford the roads, how the heck are we going to afford the lawsuits?" asked Ralph Girtton, who owns property along the Big Wood River.

Many opponents view the setback as an illegal "taking" of property without due compensation to the property owners, but the county does not.

Girtton said he wants to protect the Big Wood, but doesn't want to "take" the riparian way to do it and instead favors an education process.

The ordinance regulates for the protection of riparian areas along all natural waterways in Blaine County as well as building setbacks for homes.

Originally it was drafted to provide flood control by establishing appropriate vegetation along waterways and to preserve the wildlife corridor found along waterways.

The riparian management zone would also serve to preserve the natural process in which it acts as a sponge — sopping up water and slowly releasing it back to recharge the water system, said reorganizing committee member Ted Gmy.

The commissioners made several decisive changes from the P&Z Recommendation.

The Big Wood will be the only waterway determined to be a Class 1 stream that would require a 75-foot building setback and riparian management zone. The Salmon River has been changed to Class 2.

Class 2 streams require 50-foot setbacks and include the Salmon, Trail Creek, Warm Springs, East Fork and Deer Creek, among others. Class 3 streams are smaller perennial or intermittent streams and require only 25-foot setbacks.

Farmers and ranchers who own property along Silver Creek won a roundabout commission decision to drop the stream from the Class 2 designation.

Instead, Silver Creek and its spring-fed tributaries will be separated into a category by themselves. A 40-foot riparian zone will be enforced, restricting any plowing or disturbance of vegetation within 10 feet of the stream.

Another major change the commissioners made was dropping the requirement for building setbacks

on lots with pre-approved building envelopes.

Only 14 of the lots with platted building envelopes on the Big Wood intrude into the 75-foot setback, Reynolds said.

While these property owners will be allowed to build within the setback zone, they must still adhere to riparian management practices in the remaining footage to the riverbank as stipulated by the ordinance, said P&Z Commissioner Leonard Harlig.

A building moratorium that expired on May 14 has been extended as an "interim" moratorium until July 22. The original moratorium prohibited riverfront property owners from placing their homes any closer than 75 feet to streams.

However, in order to allow people to build this summer, this moratorium will let people build if they are within the anticipated setbacks for each stream classification.

The revamped ordinance leaves the door open for people to bring their own evidence to the county to refute the setbacks for the riparian management zones on their individual property, Reynolds said.

The building setbacks must still be adhered to, but riparian owners will now have the ability to change the riparian zone if it is applicable to their specific site, he explained.

Reynolds and Commissioner Tom Blanchard of Bellevue favored the ordinance, while Commissioner Rupert House of Hailey was adamantly opposed to it.

"I don't have much faith in this ordinance," he said.

asked to build a bomb plant being we have the processes and sites for the treatment and safe disposal of its waste."

Despite the testimony of many people to the contrary, the real issue at stake is the need for tritium, not the economy of Idaho Falls, said William Weida, former economist with the Defense Department.

More than 2,000 pages notwithstanding, the impact statement fails to prove an "urgent need" for tritium. The NPR would produce, Weida said. The document relies on outdated economic and political data from 1988 and before, and it overstates the need for tritium, he said.

The nation has a stockpile of about 75 kilograms — 165 pounds — of tritium, but needs only about 4 kilograms a year to replace decaying tritium, Weida said. The government also recovers tritium from weapons retired from the arsenal as a result of replacement with newer weapons and as a result of arms reduction treaties.

Tritium decays at about 5.5 percent per year, which means tritium in nuclear weapons must be replaced periodically — to maintain the

weapons' potency.

"As long as you've got (nuclear) weapons, you'll need to make tritium," Garson said. "More tritium would be able to produce more tritium than a future nuclear arsenal might require, it does not have to be run at full capacity, he said.

Weida maintains other methods of obtaining tritium would be far cheaper than the \$5.5 billion the department estimates the NPR would cost.

But the DOE is not satisfied with those alternatives, Garson said. They are either too speculative or too insecure to be reliable.

Weida also said the department overestimated the number of jobs that the project would create in Idaho. The department used improper methods to calculate the number of jobs and the money that would be spent in the region.

The department's impact statement estimated that if the NPR were built in Idaho it would create about

2,500 jobs. But it has doubled that figure, much to the surprise of Idaho Falls officials upon whom the burden of providing housing, schools and utilities would fall.

Idaho Idaho Chamber of Commerce executive director Ira Koplow, however, expressed confidence that the area could deal with the new employees, even at the inflated figure.

Ranting bus rider slain after 3-hour standoff

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—A woman riding a bus ranting about Nazis and "just opened fire" and shot a fellow passenger, then held off police for three hours until deputies stormed the bus early Thursday and killed her.

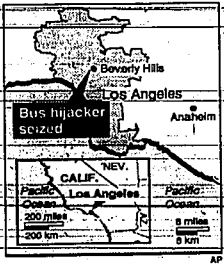
All other passengers and the driver, who had radioed his dispatcher for help, escaped unharmed after the shooting broke out late Wednesday. The wounded passenger later died.

The woman was identified as Esther R. Rogers, 42, of Los Angeles, said a spokesman — Bob Dambacher.

The dead passenger was a 30-year-old French-national living in West Los Angeles. His name was withheld until relatives were notified.

Little was learned about the woman's motive. Neighbors described her as a sad, lonely and eccentric woman whose parents survived a Nazi death camp. Passengers said she seemed deranged.

"She just was talking stuff about black people, white people, Nazis and next thing I know I heard some-



The woman, dressed in a shirt and jeans, was not attempting to hijack the bus, said Los Angeles County sheriff's Sgt. Robert Stoneham.

"She never did anything directed at the driver," he said. "She never demanded to be taken anywhere by the driver."

The shooting erupted as the Southern California Rapid Transit District bus rolled west on Santa Monica Boulevard. No more than 20 passengers were aboard, said Anthony Greno, a transit company spokesman.

Driver Harold Carter radioed that he had an emergency, Greno said. The bus' electronic sign also was set to flash "Emergency, Please Call Police."

"The driver stopped the bus on a tree-lined, residential section of the boulevard. Beverly Hills police arrived first but summoned the sheriff's special weapons team to deal with what was initially reported as a hijacking."

Several members of the SWAT team reached the fallen passenger, lying near the front of the bus,

around midnight, nearly two hours after the shooting. He was pronounced dead at a hospital from gunshot wounds to the upper torso.

During the standoff a deputy attempted to talk the woman out.

"Come on out!" the deputy urged. "Don't be afraid, I just want to help. If you do, this will all be over."

Shortly after 1 a.m., a police officer spotted the woman at the rear of the bus.

"She was in the back, pointing a .357 Magnum at the front of the bus. We believed if someone came on the bus, she was going to shoot them," Stoneham said.

The SWAT team set off an explosive device as a diversion and entered. The striking officers fired several rounds, and the woman fell in the upper torso. She died at the scene. None of the deputies was injured.

Deputy John Rhodes, one of the SWAT team members who stormed the bus, said the woman did not say anything to the deputies or fire her gun.

Depressed metals market forces exodus of Challis mine workers

CHALLIS (AP)—There's more than the usual springtime proliferation of yard sale signs sprouting around Challis these days.

More than 100 employees of a shut-down mine and their families are striking out for greener pastures.

Cyrus Mines has terminated 106 workers at its Thompson Creek molybdenum mine west of Challis, reducing the work force by 25 percent. The layoff, announced last month in response to a depressed metals market, was effective May 10 but employees continue on the payroll until June 8.

Pat Fitch, Thompson Creek general manager, said about 25 of the laid-off employees have accepted jobs with other Cyprus mines in Arizona. Fitch said Cyprus may re-

hire a dozen or so in November when the mill is scheduled to reopen after a six-month shutdown.

Fitch said the layoff is part of a cost-cutting strategy change, but declined to elaborate.

"There's some speculation in the market about our closure," he said. "That gives you an idea of market conditions and the degree of speculation. I don't want to add to that."

Entrepreneur blames Fish and Game for liquidation

REXBURG (AP) — A local entrepreneur is liquidating his \$2 million business for what he claims is the failure of the state to keep its promise that the electronic arrow-tracking system he was marketing would not be outlawed for archery hunters.

Mike Ferguson said his 2-year-old company, SureTrak, has been put out of business by the Fish and Game Commission's decision last month to effectively ban attaching electronic devices to arrows used in hunting.

But Ferguson, who concedes his product has yet to be widely used by hunters, claims the tracking system he has been marketing does not give archers any technological advantage beyond finding an animal after they have wounded it.

"I just can't believe the Fish and Game would condone wantonly losing wounded animals when there is a solution to it with SureTrak," Ferguson said.

He maintained that he had been assured by Fish and Game officials and the governor that his tracking system would not be outlawed.

But Fish and Game Wildlife Manager Lloyd Oldenburg refused to accept Ferguson's arguments, defending the commission's decision to discourage the use of high-technology equipment in what is viewed as a primitive hunting method...

Soap actor still attached to Idaho roots

Joey Moscini is the flirtatious young nephew of Angela Eckert. James Morrison, a native of Twin Falls, is Joey Moscini's sort of...

Actually, Morrison plays the role of Moscini on the ABC daytime soap opera "General Hospital." But the two have little in common, according to the actor.

"Tell your viewers to watch out because I don't even know what I am going to do next," said Morrison of the character he plays. In real life, Morrison has planned a much steadier course.

Though he moved to Salt Lake City when he was 6 years old, Morrison's ties to Idaho are strong.

"I come back to Twin Falls at least once a year to visit my grandparents (Stuart and Justina Morrison)," he said. "You are so lucky to live where the weather is so beautiful and the people are so neat."

In fact, Morrison said he would like to work in Los Angeles and live in Idaho.

"He does love to come back to Idaho," said Stuart Morrison of his grandson. "He's always been interested in acting, and we are really happy for him, but he loves the outdoors, too."

For now, Morrison spends a large part of his time and energy charting his career path. He landed the "General Hospital" job five months ago.

"This is my first really big job," said Morrison, who has appeared in the independent feature, "Promised Land," as well as in several commercials. "Like everyone else, I just lined up to audition for the role of Joey, and I didn't feel good about the way the audition went, so I was really surprised when I got the part."

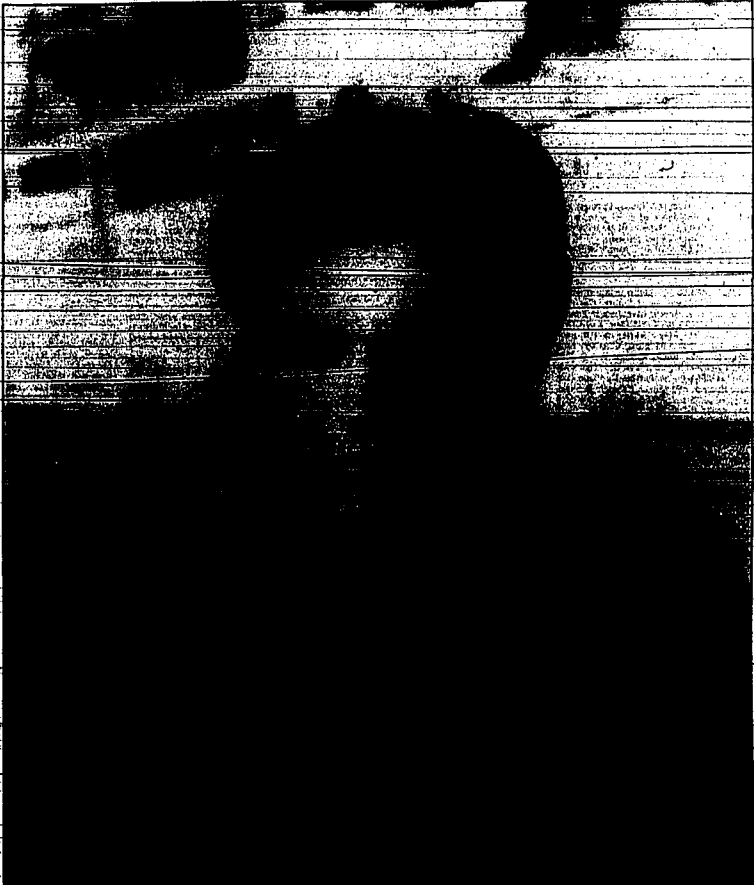
In "General Hospital," Moscini has returned to the town of Port Charles with his cousin, Bill. Morrison steps into character about three days each week, often working 12-hour days at a stretch.

"The pace is so fast on a soap opera, where you're doing 60 minutes a day of material," said Morrison. Morrison said he relishes the chance to work with the show's executive producer, Gloria Monty. Monty has been credited with revolutionizing daytime TV in the early '80s, when she brought to the screen innovations like short, fast-paced scenes, action/adventure stories and location shoots.

Her recent return to "General Hospital" along with the February return of actor Tony Geary, who played the legendary Luke Spencer on the show from 1978-84, has been heralded as a great step forward in daytime programming.

"Gloria Monty is making changes every single day, and she will keep making them until the show's creativity is totally restored," said Morrison, adding that he also feels privileged to work with Geary.

"Tony is a very serious actor," he said, "and he happens to be from Utah." Morrison, himself a student at the University of Utah State University, where he originally studied to be a writer. But, after two semesters of theater work,

he was hooked on acting. "I have been acting for about six years," said Morrison, who arrived in L.A. a little over two years ago. "I've been working to pay for classes until now. These days, Morrison, who is single,

has an L.A. apartment, where he resides with a rottweiler puppy named Boe. He is an avid outdoorsman and he loves to ski, lift weights, wrestle, backpack, ride horses and play football, tennis and golf. "We were supposed to play golf when

him was in Twin Falls in April, but it rained," said Steve Andrus, owner of the Escape and Morrison's longtime friend. "He's a down-to-earth guy, and his success on 'General Hospital' hasn't changed him at all."

Summer of '91 filmgoers ready for a little romance

The movie summer of 1991 finds the studios responding to the earth-shaking surprises of last year - namely, the disappointing performances of the big-budget, male-oriented action movies that have long dominated the summer market, and the sleepless success of the female-oriented, romantic weepie, "Ghost."

At this point, the melodramas "Dying Young," "Soapdish," "The Butcher's Wife," "Only the Lonely," seem to outnumber the music-flexers - "Hudson Hawk," "The Rocketeer," "Terminator 2" - by at least 2 to 1.

There is one film that seems to straddle both camps, and it may well be the season's

breakaway hit: the Kevin Costner version of "Robin Hood."

In any event, filmgoers will feel no shortage of choice. The number of releases is strongly up this summer. The following is a list of some of the releases.

"ANOTHER YOLP" - Richard Pryor and Gene Wilder together again; the former as a reforming con man, assigned to community service, the latter as a pathological liar just released from a mental hospital. Mercedes Ruehl, Stephen Lang and Vanessa Williams costar; the director is Maurice Phillips. "BACKDRAFT" - A family dynasty of Chicago firefighters, chronicled by director Ron Howard and writer Gregory Widon. At 33, Donny Osmond gives it another wholesome spin

OCEAN CITY, Md. - "No wonder I had an image problem," deadpans Donny Osmond, looking at himself bell-bottom clad, mop-topped and ever-smiling on an early 1970s record jacket. He shakes his head. "Look at that outfit, man." The old album was thrust at him onstage at Scandals nightclub in Ocean City, where Osmond, now 33 and still wholesomely handsome, played a short solo set in front of about 30 fans.

He opened the show with "Love Will Survive," the first single from his new album "Eyes Don't Lie," and the audience - most of them women about his age and just as clean-out-applauded warmly but not giddily. Displaying only a hint of good-natured frustration, he then launched into "Go Away Little Girl," a song he first sang to himself when they really were little girls. Suddenly swept back to blissful adolescence, the women squealed, swayed and swooned. Ah, the perils of the comeback trail.

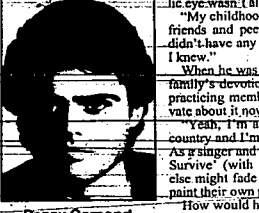
Osmond is blitzing music stores, nightclubs and TV talk shows around the country, trying to promote his second comeback album. He wants to persuade audiences that the teeny-bopper idol with whom they were once in puppy love is now a grown-up talent. But it's a tough sell. "We heard his current music, and we thought, 'We don't want that,'" says 30-year-old Kim Smith of Ocean City, who showed up at Scandals with three friends and two very

old Donny Osmond albums. "When we were kids, we were in love with him. It's nostalgic."

"It's great to hear a crowd," Osmond admits. "When they're cheering your name, man, it's great. But you do 400 many live things and you start believing the hype. It can't replace staying in the studio and writing."

"On the new album, I co-wrote 80 percent of the songs. That's something I didn't do in the past," he says. "I realized that I've got to write my own material or else I'd be nothing more than a novelty act."

He says he is especially proud of "Before It's Too Late," a cut from "Eyes Don't Lie." "I wrote it for two reasons," he says. "We've got to start turning things around for this planet. And we've got to stop the deterioration of the family. I'm a family man myself, and I worry about that."

lie eye wasn't always as much fun as it looked. "My childhood wasn't typical," he says. "I didn't have the friends and peers and public school most kids had. But I didn't have any other lifestyle to compare it to. That was all I knew."

When he was a teen star, the pop media made much of his family's devotion to the Mormon faith. He says he is still a practicing member of the church but prefers to be more private about it now. "Yeah, I'm a Mormon," he says. "But we live in a free country and I'm not going to shove it down people's throats. As a singer and songwriter, I can write songs like 'Love Will Survive' (with lines that echo the biblical promise that all else might fade away, but love will endure) and let listeners paint their own pictures."

How would he react if someone wanted to sweep his children off to overnight stardom, as Andy Williams did when he discovered 4-year-old Donny and the other Osmond brothers? "I don't know," Osmond admits. "One of the things that saved me was my family. If my kids did get into the business, I'd stay close to them and teach them some good values the way my parents did for me."

"It's all peaks and valleys," says the man who sings "I Wanna Be Like You" in a hokey, comical style in the "70s. If you really hit big," he says, "expect to hit rock bottom."

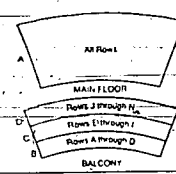

"DARK JUSTICE"

Feminist revenge thriller 'Mortal Thoughts' needs rethinking

HOPE YWOOD "Mortal Thoughts" is structured as a feminist revenge thriller, but the director, Alan Rudolph, doesn't pump up the melodrama. His specialty is turning pulp into something high-glow, and dreamlike, and this gives his movies—even impersonal projects like this one—an oddly dissociative effect. They seem lurid and delicate.

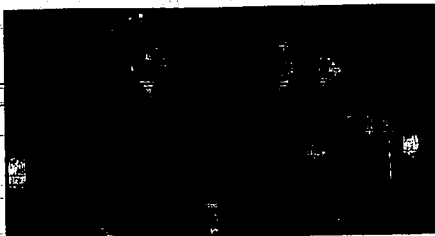
Rudolph was brought on to "Mortal Thoughts" as a last-minute replacement, and the script, by William Reilly and Claude Kerven, does not have the airy unreality of the movies he has written—or co-written—for himself ("Choose Me," "Double in Mind"). It's more populsive than you might expect from Rudolph, and that's not all bad—Pulp gives his fancy pants aesthetizing a welcome foothold.

The trouble with "Mortal Thoughts," (rated R for violence and strong language) is that Rudolph's technique, beautiful though it is, is too

slippery and vague for the material he is working on. Detective thrillers are all about the facts, and this one is all about ambiguity. There isn't enough substance to his style and there isn't enough substance to the script, either.

Demi Moore's Cynthia and Glenn Headly's Joyce, best friends, run a blue-collar, New Jersey beauty shop. Cynthia's dim, buxom husband (John Pankow) is a saint compared to Joyce's—a boorish batterer played by Bruce Willis—murderer—is the film's fulcrum, and its returning center-piece is a police investigation where a detective played by Harvey Keitel challenges Cynthia's version of what happened. The film keeps fracturing into flashbacks and, although the flashes are from Cynthia's point of view, they have a weirdly all-seeing-eye quality.

Nothing in this movie can be pinned down, and that gives it a float-

Part of the problem is that, in order to preserve all the pieces of the puzzle, Rudolph does not delve into psychological areas that might tip off the audience. It's not always clear what's deliberately obscure, and what's just plain muddled storytelling.

It's particularly unfortunate that the film does not go deeper into psychological terrain because the film makes have tapped into a powerful subject. The movie's subtext is the ways in which close female friends reinforce their own rage against men, but the friendship in "Mortal Thoughts" does not have enough levels. Neither, for that matter, do the men in the film, with the exception of Keitel, are all portrayed as louts in line for a mercy killing. The true horror of wife-battering shows up in brief glimpses, like a scary flashback in the benny saloon, but Joyce's rage is developed only as it sets the murder cover-up in motion. There is no insight into why she stayed with her husband—who was abusive to her even on her wedding day—or how she might have reacted to her own victimization.

The film makers seem to think that, by presenting the women's revenge as righteous, they have done all they need to do. "Mortal Thoughts" has a feminist but, in its lack of psychological understanding, it ends up pre-

senting Joyce as a kind of Gorgon. And—the blue-dart surroundings—which are broadly drawn, make the film uncomfortably class-conscious.

There are some strong sequences. Rudolph stages the interrogations between the detective and his assistant—and Cynthia—in a free-form, highly charged, present-tense style. They are like theater, improv games, and both Keitel and Moore seem to have all their antennae out, picking up vibes of treachery and evasion. Headly has a great spooky moment when she mixes rat poison in with her husband's sugar—her face has the simplified, almost relaxed concentration of the pure obsessive. Moore and Willis have a nasty intuitive rapport "whenever they're together. And throughout the film Rudolph is working hard to put this thing over, mixing in slow-motion and shock cuts.

But his heart is not really in it. His technique is both too good and not enough for this material, and it doesn't sit right. He's trying to glamorize dread.

Jodie Foster carries Demme's 'Silence of the Lambs'

THE SILENCE OF THE LAMBS (R). Thomas Harris' harrowing, mesmerizing book concerned an institutionalized psychopath who is used to identify a rampaging serial killer. In a fine adaptation, director Jonathan Demme and screenwriter Ted Tally have focused on a duel of wits and wills between Jodie Foster's young FBI trainee and that madman of evil, Dr. Hannibal Lecter (Anthony Hopkins). Hopkins is glittering in the show-off role, but Foster carries the adaptation in the strength of her intelligence and compassion of Clarice. Starring. For audiences, the fascination is how much both actors are able to do with their literally or occupationally straightjacketed characters. Although Demme does not dwell on the gore, it's definitely there, making it a film not for the faint of heart.

SLEEPING WITH THE ENEMY (R). A solid book has been inflated by overproduction and underwriting into this melodrama to make a vehicle for Julia Roberts, playing an abused wife who tries to begin her life again. Patrick Bergin, uncharismatic as Sir Richard Burton in "Mountains of the Moon," is even more so here as her menacing husband. It's another fairy tale for Roberts; wife abuse being seen here as no more grueling than Roberts' job as a Hollywood Boulevard hooker in "Pretty Woman," and she attacks this role with the same bland compliance and dazzling superficial warmth.

MALE ALONE (PG). A 7-year-old child (Macauley Culkin) is left behind by his parents when they jet to Paris for Christmas. Left to his own devices, he pigs out on junk food and foils a pair of bumbling thieves (Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern). Some of the low-comic slapstick works on a fifth. Three Stooges level, but the basic idea—an abandoned child defending himself against

intruders—is a bit too scary for comfort. Chris Columbus directed from a script by—who else?—John Hughes.

KING RALPH (G). This movie seems to have arrived 25 years late. Wasn't it originally a vehicle for Jackie Gleason back in 1967? A fiasco lounge pianist elevated to the throne of England in a castleful of courtiers and schemers? Even John Goodman, Peter O'Toole and John Hurt burping or smirking their way through, it looks worse. Writer-director David S. Ward seems to be trying for populist comedy; instead it's a smarmy depths of condensation and formula. His message seems to be: Slobs are nice and royalty is nicer.

OUT FOR JUSTICE (R). In most ways, the usual rough-and-ugly, slam-bang, cop-vs.-psycho (which is which?) vendetta thriller, this hits (Steven Seagal) movie actually has something extra: a Seagal-style heavy Italo-American lingo and atmosphere and some surprising, in-your-face macho-humor. It's mean, but it moves; directed by John Flynn.

Eagles split at Region 18 tourney

ST. GEORGE, Utah — The accepted theory for success in postseason play requires the key criteria of: A — winning the opener; and B — winning your bad game.

Former racer trying to make comeback in Indy qualifying

INDIANAPOLIS — He, too, began racing in a different car. But David "Salt" Walther is not a Foyt.

Walther has no victories, no following and has not even made the Indianapolis 500 starting field since 1979. But like Foyt, he keeps coming back to the track to grab one of the 15 positions remaining in the 33-car starting field for the Indianapolis 500.

Walther is back this year with a car he owns along with his father — Dayton, Ohio, industrialist George Walther — and a California businessman.

Salt got on the track for the first time this month on Tuesday and got the car up to 202 on Wednesday, just getting a feel for it.

"If we can get up to 210 today, then we work a little on the chassis and wings,

we'll put it on our new engine on Friday and get it in the race on Saturday afternoon," Walther said confidently.

"The car's comfortable and I just want to get it in the show. I don't want to miss the race again. It's time for me to be back." By the time his car was ready to go out Thursday, however, rain was falling, washing out most of the afternoon of practice. That left only Friday to get ready for qualifying, but Walther wasn't overly concerned.

"It was hard to start all over with the ARS and then taking the rookie test here. It took a lot of money and a lot of time. But it was worth it."

"There's nothing else that really entices me as much as racing cars and boats. To me, the greatest thrill is anything that goes fast."

BALTIMORE — The dice were rolled Thursday morning to determine the post positions for Saturday's 116th Preakness, and the trainers of the top horses all came away believing they were winners.

But winning a lottery is a lot different than winning a horse race.

—Kentucky Derby winner Strike the Gold drew the No. 3 starting slot in the eight-horse race and was installed the 9-to-5 morning line favorite.

"That was great," said trainer Nick Zito, referring to the post position for his stretch-runner. "I wanted to stay inside early."

The second choice on the morning line at odds of 5-2 is Olympio, a colt held out of the Kentucky Derby by trainer Ron McAnally to prepare for the Preakness.

Then comes Derby runnerup Best Pal at 7-2 followed by Hansel at 9-2. Hansel finished 10th after being dispatched the Derby favorite at 2:30:41. Trainer Frank Brothers

the barn and then worked three furlongs in a scintillating :34 3/5 Tuesday at Arlington International Racecourse.

This horse has shipped well before." As a 2-year-old, he won the Tremont so that's the mark of a pretty good horse. If he runs badly, I don't think having come here a later than the others will be the deciding factor."

But the trainer, who won this race with Codex in 1980 and Tank's Prospect in 1985, was unhappy because "you lose a few of your options."

Luckily, we've got a horse who is quick enough to get to the first turn in pretty good shape, and that's a plus. If I had my choice, I would have liked 5, 6 or 7. You're not off and running you can look inside and see how the race is developing."

"We all have such good attitudes," said Patterson. "I know I'm happy to have Bridgette."

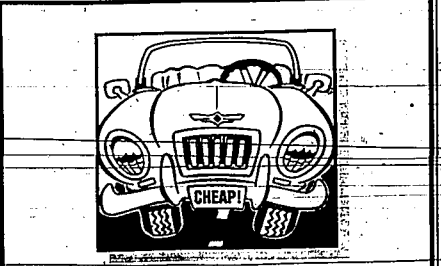
Hoskins, who played for the Indians last season, is the reason that Gooding had enough girls to field a complete team this year.

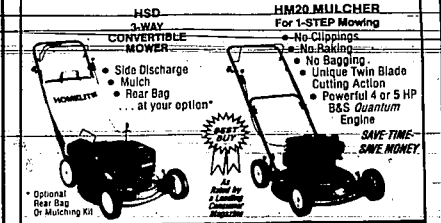

Stocks rebound as investors snap up bargain-priced issues

NEW YORK—The stock market rebounded from a disturbing sell-off and closed higher on Thursday after investors snapped up some bargain-priced issues.

But traders remain worried stocks are becoming too expensive in light of the economy's disappointing performance.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks gained 28.63 to close at 2,894.01.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 7 to 4 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 989 up, 569 down and 509 unchanged.

Volatility on the floor of the Big Board came to 154.6 million shares, down from 193.11 million in the previous session.

Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 187.26 billion shares.

Many analysts believe traders overreacted

Wednesday when they rushed to unload technology stocks after Compaq Computer Corp. reported an 80 percent drop in second-quarter profit.

The Dow Jones average fell more than 40 points during Wednesday's session but rebounded in the last hour of trading to finish the day with a loss of 21.47 points.

Although Thursday's move ended the recovery, it left some investors concerned about the market's recent erratic behavior.

Analysts said computer maker Hewlett-Packard helped lift the market after reporting a strong second-quarter profit of \$233 million. Hewlett-Packard's stock closed up 2 1/2 points to 104 1/2.

The firm turned in the most profitable active issue, which traded up most of the day but closed down 1/4 at 35 1/2. It lost 27 percent of its value the day before.

Also contributing to the rebound were comments by Federal Reserve Board Chairman Alan Greenspan, who said short-term interest rates may begin to fall soon. Greenspan said that Congress the credit crunch may soon be

likely to ease and as it does, interest rates are likely to fall as competition intensifies among banks to make new loans.

Stocks also gained strength from the bold market, which formed after the Labor Department reported initial claims for state unemployment insurance rose 4,000 for the week ended May 4, a sign the recession still lingers.

Active issues included Royal Dutch Petroleum, up 1/4 at 82 1/2; Phillip Morris, up 1/4 at 65 1/2; Jones Apparel, unchanged at 14 1/2; and PepsiCo, up 1/4 at 31 1/2.

Tragic Jill Ireland story puts accent on mother's struggle with son's habit

You read about it in the tabloids: gorgeous movie-star mother dying of cancer, spending her dwindling days trying to get her adopted teenage son off heroin. You later saw the picture on the front pages: illness-ravaged movie-star mother sitting in sunglasses at the graveside service of her now-dead son. Tragic stuff.

But Jill Ireland, the actress and the wife of actor Charles Bronson, wasn't embarrassed by such coverage. She seemingly wanted to air her tragic tale to teach rather than to titillate. She told the intertwining stories of her and her son Jason McCallum in "Life Lines," published a year ago, not long before her own death. That story has been adapted into the NBC movie "Reason for Living: The Jill Ireland Story," airing Monday, May 20.

Jill Clayburgh, who plays Ireland, sees the story as much more than a double "disease-of-the-week" movie.

"It's the kind of story that would be identifiable to a lot of parents," Clayburgh says. "It's universal: All parents have the possibility that their children can get into serious trouble, whether it be (in) school or (with) drugs. She puts all her energies and strength into solving that problem, but it doesn't work that way. What she finds is (that) they have to find a way of living together — it's a tentative peace.

"And it's not a happy ending," Clayburgh adds. "It's tragic, although they don't die on screen. What they find is a meeting of the minds on a day-to-day basis."

Clayburgh stresses that "Reason for Living" is less the story of Ireland's struggle with cancer than it is of her son's battle with drugs. "Cancer is a minor player here," she says. "Jill covered that in her first book, 'Life Wish,' which she didn't want made into a movie. Our movie starts when she's in remission, recovering from surgery and chemotherapy. In the beginning, you see her wearing wigs or with short hair. Most of the time she's very healthy. But from cancer she did learn about living with death — liv-

ing one day at a time. A lot of the passion she has for living comes from death."

Clayburgh, who became a movie icon in the 1970s with Academy Award nominations for her performances in "An Unmarried Woman" (1978) and "Starting Over" (1979), says she was not familiar with Ireland and her work prior to making "Reason for Living." She based her performances on videotapes of Ireland. "Ireland did an amazing interview with Joan Rivers just two weeks after her son died," Clayburgh says. "It was just haunting." Most instructive, though, "were 10 hours of videotape she did with the writers and producers of this movie. Jill had come to them with the material, and she is listed as executive producer."

Clayburgh did not meet members

of Ireland's family. Bronson was in litigation with the producers of the movie, but has since settled out of court.

Despite Ireland's fame, Clayburgh emphasizes of the NBC movie, "This is not about an actress. It's about a mother, and Jill was a wonderful one. She really touched me. The driving force behind her whole story was her love for her family."

I'd like to be married again and be the perfect husband."

Q: Did Corbin Bernsen of "L.A. Law" start a business in Los Angeles that's completely unrelated to show business? — C.F.

A: As far as we know, Corbin is quite busy with his television series and the feature films he fits in during the series hiatus, not to mention the print ads he does for various products. His wife, actress Amanda Pays, has, however, opened a shop with partner Kathryn Ireland. Both from England, they saw the need for a home accessories shop when they could not find some of the decorative items readily available in Great Britain. The charming shop, Ireland Pays, is located in trendy Santa Monica. Since opening the shop, Pays landed a starring role in television's "The Flash" series.

Q: Nicolas Cage, the sexy young actor who is somehow related to "Godfather" director Francis Ford Coppola, seems like such an unhappy person. What's his problem? — J.H.

The actual process takes 12 people five hours to complete.

Q: On our last visit to Los Angeles we enjoyed dinner at Sonny Bono's restaurant. Does the restaurant still exist now that he has settled in Palm Springs? — G.O.

A: His honor, Mayor Bono, no longer owns the L.A. eatery but until recently he owned and operated an Italian restaurant, also bearing his name, in Palm Springs. Sonny is presently selling the popular restaurant, as his full-time mayoral duties preclude his full-time involvement in the business. He's been working out for years, has lost unneeded pounds, and at 68, looks great. My Hollywood spies report, however, that he recently underwent surgery on his leg for what was termed "a circulatory problem."

Q: It is true that the estate of the Sammy Davis Jr. is in serious financial trouble? If so, how come? — A.R.

A: Sammy's estate owes the government some \$5 million in unpaid taxes. Even though he made several fortunes in his lifetime, Davis went through money pretty freely — a true big spender. Also, he was the victim of some dubious investment advice. A good chunk of his fortune was invested in shabby tax-shelter deals that the IRS eventually disallowed: thus the tax bill. Soap opera scene

St. John playing free agent in soaps

A promising daytime rookie, Kristoff St. John, thinks the world of soap works in big league baseball fashion — actors are traded just like players. You move from club to club, or soap to soap, and the fans adjust.

Take Kristoff. He played the black college graduate Adam Marshall on "Generations" for a couple of years, creating an enthusiastic following. When "Generations" folded this winter, Kristoff quickly signed with "The Young and the Restless," dickering with CBS shortly before the NBC cancellation. Number one "Y&R" wasn't about to let the competition land a hot prospect.

The jump from loser to winner isn't demanding. Kristoff again is the bright, striving college grad in Neil, a charmer for the black storyline involving sisters Olivia and Drucilla competing for Nathan's heart. Drucilla is losing out, yet schemes to ruin Olivia's wedding plans. Adam, that is Neil, promises to be a factor, a handsome heartbreaker.

Clearly, "Y&R" intends to widen its black storylines using St. John, but being careful to avoid any highly sensational stories such as an interracial love affair. St. John is there for charm, good looks and the aura of success. You won't find any depressing loser qualities in Neil.

Looking back, St. John realizes that "Generations," the NBC experiment with a black family and a white clan, was doomed from the beginning. "We had a terrible time slot, tame stories and differences over show direction which led to management changes. Some of us had the feeling that NBC was using the show as a loss write-off. Maybe a Denzel Washington could have turned the ratings around, but I doubt it."

Still, "Generations" was good for Kristoff, making his daytime debut. He sneaked in a large body of work and caught the industry eye. Fans liked Adam.

"Everybody calls me Adam," St. John continues. "We had three million viewers watching, and that number didn't fall off."

St. John doesn't expect any sizzling black stories on "Y&R." Networks are leery. No one wants to go all out depicting black reality.

"Generations" stayed clear of blacks in management, "going with the people it knew," and hired a total of two writers over two years. Caution can be deadly.

But St. John is working, riding with the flow. His social consciousness will surface in a low-budget homeless project where he controls the subject matter. In the meantime, St. John will please with Neil. After all, Adam Marshall taught him all the tricks.

Clever optical editing helped create the illusion of moving birds (often sea gulls) on the attack. Real birds were thrown at actors; moved by threads and otherwise manipulated as part of the modus operandi. The famous director opted to fly with.

Q: Who holds the record for the largest divorce settlement in Hollywood? — S.Y.

A: One would assume that actress Amy Irving's settlement — a reported \$100 million — would be the topper, but that honor goes to Frances Lear, whose settlement from ex-husband producer Norman "All in the Family" Lear was in the neighborhood of \$112 million. Mrs. Lear runs her namesake *"Insignia"* line; Lear's.

Russia begins independent broadcasts

MOSCOW (AP) — The Russian republic launched its own television programming Monday, emblazoning the pre-revolutionary tricolor flag across the screen and poking fun at President Mikhail S. Gorbachev even before it was an hour old.

Russian Television featured a Western-style newscast that showed destruction in an Armenian village it said was caused by Soviet troops and an American TV interview of Lithuanian President Vytautas Landsbergis predicting more Kremlin gunships.

"Today is a special day, because today we stopped the monopoly of the airwaves," Alexander Nekhorosho, an executive at Russian Television and Radio, told viewers.

Television has become a major battleground in the Soviet Union. Reformers like Russian leader Boris Yeltsin are harshly critical of how the state-controlled Central Television, headed by Gorbachev appointee Leonid Kravchenko, has been turned into a mouthpiece for the Kremlin.

Kravchenko has said "no pluralism" can be tolerated in the state-owned national media.

In contrast, Russian Television's Anatoly Lysenko said in an interview with The Associated Press on Monday: "What we want to do is create normal TV. Our political image will be formed on the basis of the broadest possible consensus."

Operating out of space leased from Central Television, Russian Television initially will broadcast about six hours a day, featuring two 15-minute newscasts and independently produced cultural, entertainment and political shows.

It can be received by about three-quarters of the Soviet people, said Oleg M. Poptsov, chairman of the All-Russian Committee for Radio and Television, which was founded last year as part of Yeltsin's challenge to central authority. Its radio operation has been broadcasting five months.

From its first moments Monday evening, Russian Television indicated what direction it would take. Its ini-

tials, RTR, appeared on the screen with the red, white and blue pre-revolutionary flag of Russia spreading across the letters.

Much of the programming was irreverent and satirical.

In its first hour, an old woman sang: "Comrade Gorbachev, see what you've done! You wanted to prohibit vodka but instead you've introduced hunger!"

Gorbachev was the target again on "Around the Laughter," a comedy program dropped by Central Television last month. Comedian Alexei Trushin mocked Gorbachev in an impersonation.

RTR followed the laughter with the first of two 15-minute newscasts, "Vesti," an old-fashioned Russian word for "News."

Svetlana Sorokina, a popular figure from Leningrad television, a state-owned local channel, anchored a fast-paced newscast that featured items that never would be seen on Central Television's staid nightly newscast, "Time."

NBC wins ratings war with TV movies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Made-for-television movies based on sensational headlines pushed NBC into first place again in the weekly ratings contest.

NBC's "Cry in the Wild: The Taking of Peggy Ann" was the most-watched show on TV last week. The two-hour docudrama was taken from the real-life kidnapping of Peggy Bradnick, held captive by a mountain man for eight days while the FBI conducted one of its biggest manhunts ever.

The network's other fact-based movie, "In the Line of Duty: Manhunt in the Dakotas," was No. 8 in the weekly rankings. This program chronicled the search for Gordon Kahl, a white supremacist who eluded authorities by hiding in the rural midwest homes of his followers.

NBC was the No. 1 network last week with an overall average rating of 11.9, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. CBS was second with 11.1 and ABC finished third with 10.5.

HBO plans to 'multiplex' signals

NEW YORK (AP) — Home Box Office Inc. will pack more kinds of programs onto its pay cable TV signals, announcing plans Wednesday to expand its service by multiplexing the HBO and Cinemax channels.

Multiplexing "takes full advantage of the increased channel capacity that video compression and fiber-optic technology will yield in the 1990s," HBO chairman and chief executive Michael Fuchs said in a statement.

Current plans envision HBO and Cinemax each eventually

consisting of three separate satellite feeds, HBO said. "HBO-1" might carry a film drama, "HBO-2" a teen-oriented comedy and "HBO-3" an original concert, the company said.

The service would be added at no charge to its cable affiliates, it said.

HBO plans to test the idea on cable systems in Overland Park, Kan., and Plano, Texas, on Aug. 1, followed later by Racine, Wis. HBO could introduce the multiplex service nationally as early as 1992.
