

Court restricts abortion advice

Ruling hits home - A2

WASHINGTON — A deeply divided Supreme Court said Thursday that federally subsidized family planning clinics can be barred from discussing abortion with pregnant women or from telling them where to get one.

By a 5-4 vote, the court said a ban contained in regulations issued by the Reagan administration in 1988 does not violate free-speech rights of a woman's right to end her pregnancy.

The ruling could affect millions of low-income women served by 4,000 clinics that receive federal money.

Justice David H. Souter, the court's newest member, cast the tie-breaking vote to uphold the ban. His vote underscored the pivotal role he will play when the court is next asked to overturn its 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision legalizing abortion.

Souter's vote, although inconclusive as

to his position on the 1973 ruling, alarmed abortion rights activists but delighted those in the anti-abortion movement.

Thursday's decision in no direct way altered the Roe vs. Wade ruling. But Harry A. Blackman, author of the 1973 decision, accused the court of depriving low-income women of their abortion right.

"While technically leaving intact the fundamental right protected by Roe vs. Wade," he said, "the court had made the right worthless. This is a course nearly as noxious as overruling Roe directly, for if a

right is found to be unenforceable, even against flagrant attempts by government to circumvent it, then it ceases to be a right at all."

But Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, writing for the court's majority, said the regulations comply with the system of family planning clinics Congress created 21 years ago.

"Congress' refusal to fund abortion counseling and advocacy leaves a pregnant woman with the same choices as if the

Most voices at hearing oppose NPR

TWIN FALLS — It is too expensive, not necessary and no one knows how to dispose of the waste it would produce.

Those criticisms of the federal Energy Department's proposal for a New Production Reactor were repeated many times Thursday in a public hearing on the draft environmental impact statement on the proposed project for which the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is one of three sites.

Actor Scott Glenn, a resident of Blaine County, said the U.S. Navy officers he met 2 1/2 years ago while researching a movie role aboard nuclear submarines were aware that the Soviet Union was not the threat to America that they once thought.

The officers also spoke of the ongoing Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty talks that propose reducing the U.S. nuclear weapons arsenal from 20,000 to 13,000 and then to 10,000.

But the Energy Department wants to maintain the 20,000-warhead inventory in contrast to the country's policy, Glenn said at the Thursday meeting.

The NPR would produce tritium, a radioactive form of hydrogen used to increase the yield of nuclear bombs.

Glenn spent time aboard two nuclear submarines in preparation for his role as Capt. Mancuso in the movie "The Hunt for Red October," an undersea Cold War thriller.

The propulsion systems of U.S. Navy nuclear submarines were developed and tested at INEL.

Instead of spending money on the reactor that would produce material for nuclear bombs, Glenn said, the country should be spending badly needed money on education. If it doesn't, the Germans and the Japanese will soon eclipse the United States in world influence.

The Energy Department has the most dismal, shoddy and slipshod record of any government agency with which he has had contact, Glenn said.

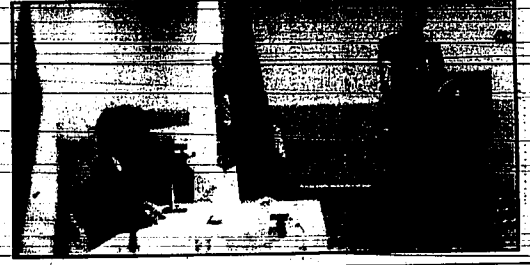
"They talk a great game of safety," he said. Citing a list of contaminated weapons production sites across the country that

Campaign finance bill receives Senate approval

WASHINGTON — The Senate passed a campaign finance bill Thursday to cap what Democrats called a "seemingly endless money chase" after special interests.

Instead, candidates would be offered limited taxpayer subsidies. The vote was 56-42, split largely along party lines.

On Wednesday, President Bush said he would veto the bill if it contains spending ceilings and provides for public financing of congressional campaigns.

Leaders of both parties said they expect the bill to be significantly rewritten once the House passes its version and the White House enters into direct negotiations on a compromise.

Republicans contend the bill would create "food-stamps for politicians," rein in

their party's acknowledged superiority in raising money privately and maintain Democrats' control of Congress.

"This is to ensure that Republicans who once sniffed the fair flowers of the majority will never get another whiff for about 40 years," said Senate GOP Whip Alan Simpson of Wyoming.

Democrats, citing Bush's acceptance of \$60 million in taxpayer funds to finance his 1980 and 1988 presidential races, called the objections to public financing a "red herring" — even as they tried to promise voters that taxes will not rise as a result.

"The issue isn't public financing; each year the Republican Party receives millions of dollars in subsidies," said Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine. "The debate is over spending limits (to) a seemingly endless money chase ..."

House gives Bush leeway to negotiate trade treaty

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday gave President Bush wide latitude to negotiate a free-trade treaty with Mexico, accepting his plea that the pact be spared step-by-step review and amendment by Congress.

By a vote of 231-192, the House extended for two years the president's "broad" authority that limits Congress' role to an up-or-down vote on the final product.

The action was seen as a major spur to Bush's attempts to work out a tariff-reducing trade treaty with Mexico along the lines of one negotiated earlier with Canada.

He said, calling the vote a "great show of bipartisan cooperation."

Congressional action immediately shifted to the Senate, where debate started late in the day. Senators are expected to follow the House's lead in voting for fast-track authority before beginning a Memorial Day recess. A vote was scheduled for noon Friday.

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., led the group opposing the administration. South Carolina has a high concentration of textile workers, who Hollings says would be hurt by a free trade pact with Mexico.

The House vote ended months of bitter wrangling and lobbying over what Bush said was one of the most important foreign policy issues facing Congress this year.

Idaho youth knows his way around the world

WASHINGTON — David Stillman, a 14-year-old Idaho kid with glasses and braces, relied on hours of study and at least one educated guess to win the National Geography Bee Thursday.

It was his second try in two years at the top prize.

Seated beneath the seal of the National Geographic Society, the 10 finalists, all boys, showed such knowledge of maps, geology, history and religion that some adults in the

audience were unashamed to shrug in ignorance at the questions.

After 40 minutes of the arcane and unpronounceable, it came down to one question: "What type of land form is commonly associated with orographic precipitation?"

"Mountain" was David's answer. He won a \$25,000 college scholarship.

Carlos De La Fuente, whose wide grin and confident manner in the presence of TV cameras made him an audience favorite, guessed "rain forest." The 11-year-old from Chandler, Ariz., went down to defeat. He got a \$15,000

scholarship and said he'd be back next year.

The other eight finalists were Matthew Coldiron, 14, of Somerset, Ky.; Liam Burnell, 13, of Falmouth, Maine; Danny Dudley, 13, of Pocomoke City, Md.; Stephen Gent, 14, of Gulfport, Miss.; Joe Turner, 14, of Bernie, Mo.; Tom Harringer, 11, of Delta, Ohio; Rob Leitner, 14, of Carlisle, Pa.; and Elliot Brenner, 13, of Richmond, Va.

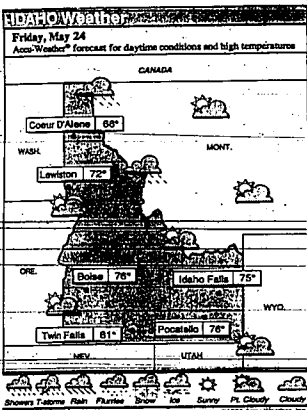
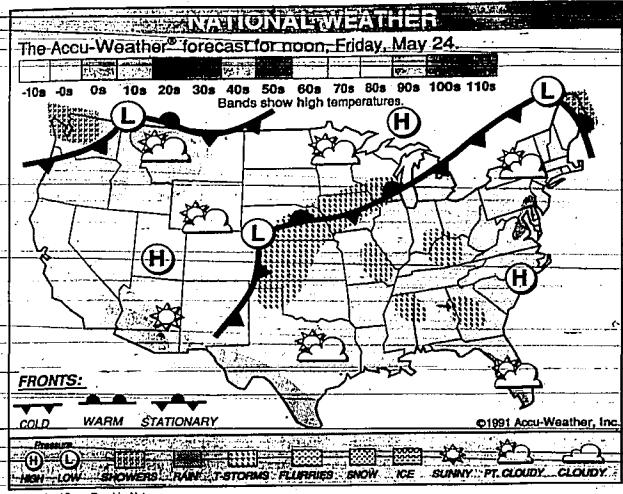

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says dry and warm conditions covered Idaho Thursday, but enough moisture remained for a few thunderstorms over the southeast. Meanwhile, a low-pressure center developing off the northwest coast will spread clouds into the north Friday, while drier air moves into the southeast. It looks like a typical Memorial Day weekend with a chance of showers across the north and a slight chance in the south. Skies were mostly sunny across the state Thursday afternoon except for partly cloudy in the southeast. Winds were generally in the 10 to 20 mph range. The Henry's Fork in southeast Idaho near Rexburg remained above flood stage at 9.3 feet but was slowly falling. Afternoon temperatures continued near seasonal, with readings in the 60s and 70s. The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 85 degrees at Hagerman. Stanley recorded the coldest at 28 degrees. Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 104 degrees at Palm Springs, Calif. The lowest was 30 degrees at El Estadio, Ariz., Pinedale, Wyo., and Houston, Maine.

Heavy rains inundate Plains; storms roll into Midwest

The Associated Press Rain was scattered across the Plains states Thursday, flooding some streets and highways, and into the Midwest and the South. At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended over eastern North Dakota, eastern South Dakota, southeastern Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Iowa, and Minnesota. South-central Nebraska got extra-heavy rain that flooded side streets in Cozad up to car doors and had water running over roads in Lexington. Up to 8 inches of rain fell in Cozad from Wednesday night into Thursday morning and up to 5 inches fell in Lexington, said Dawson County Civil Defense Director Merle Morgan. Central and southwest Oklahoma also got heavy rain and authorities in Lawton had to rescue occupants of stalled cars. Showers and thunderstorms also spread over Wisconsin, Lower Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, southeastern Louisiana; southern and central Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, and Florida. Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT included 2.57 inches at West Palm Beach, Fla.; 2.15 inches at Fort Sill, Okla.; 1.84 inches at Titusville, Fla.; 1.41 inches at Grand Rapids, Mich.; 1.09 inches at Altus, Okla.; and 1.00 inch at Dayton, Ohio. Showers were scattered over the lower Texas-Gulf Coast. Elsewhere, rain fell across northeastern Utah and northeastern Utah into northwestern Colorado. Ahead of the rain, warmer weather continued in parts of the Northeast, with Buffalo, N.Y., hitting a record high of 89, Cleveland reaching a record 88 and Youngstown, Ohio, tying its record of 88.

government had chosen not to fund family planning services at all," he said.
The program, enacted in 1976 as Title X of the Public Health Service Act, subsidizes clinics serving over 4 million low-income women each year.

Court's abortion-advice ruling strikes home in Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley residents on both sides and in the middle of the abortion debate reacted strongly to Wednesday's news that federally funded family planning clinics can be prevented from discussing abortion with clients.
The U.S. Supreme Court ruled 5-4 Wednesday that a 1988 ban on such discussions is not unconstitutional, drawing fire from abortion-rights activists and praise from anti-abortion groups.
"It just shows again that the American people don't believe in abortion as a means of controlling pregnancy," said Mike Havener, vice-president of Right to Life of Idaho's Magic Valley chapter.
A Magic Valley Citizens' Group for Choice spokeswoman said the ruling smacks of censorship and puts the government in the role of "big brother" — deciding what information should and should not be available.
"They are denying access to information pertaining to a legal medical procedure," said Julie Miller. "What information will they next decide they don't think we should have?"
Such talk is merely a "smokescreen" used by pro-abortion groups, who, on the national level, have opposed past legislation regarding abortion information, Havener said.
"They're just being hypocrites when they say that," he said.
How the ruling will affect local family planning clinics is still unclear.
Maggi Machala, family planning coordinator for the South Central District Health Department, said her office will wait for direction from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare before making any policy changes.
The local health department currently does six to 10 free pregnancy tests each week in Twin Falls. For each positive test, a counselor or nurse provides information available to the client, including abortion, Machala said.
"We don't encourage abortion and we don't make appointments," she said.
As a health-care worker, Machala said her goal is to give patients the best care possible, and that includes

telling people about all the alternatives available to them.
The federal regulations leading to Wednesday's ruling are aimed at the 4,000 clinics nationwide — including those run by state health departments — that receive federal funds under Title X of the Public Health Service Act.
The impact on clinics that receive government money through other federal programs is not known.
Dr. Marc Tunzi of the Family Health Services Clinic in Buhl said women making difficult decisions about abortion often have nowhere else to turn other than the doctor at a federally funded clinic.
"Women who are considering an abortion often don't have a non-judgmental, non-biased person to discuss it with," Tunzi said.
The Family Health Services Clinic does not receive Title X money, but does get federal funds through other programs.
Not everyone has access to alternative channels where she can get information about abortion, Miller said.
"It's a question of funding," she said. "It's a question of consumer rights."

The bee was part show-biz, with Alex Trebek of TV's "Jeopardy!" fame as host. He found himself in a battle of wits with artillery one rarely finds on a commercial game show. He had his pronunciation corrected and had to back complaints about name cards and flashing lights.
But the Energy Department, INEL and the NPR project were not without their defenders Thursday.
Several union representatives of workers at the site spoke in favor of the project, which would bring jobs to eastern Idaho and tax benefits to the state.
"It would be a tremendous boon to our economy," said Garth Case, executive director of the Idaho Contractors Association.
"INEL employees have asked many of the same questions environmental groups raise," said Duane Allen, president of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union.
The employees and contractors are Idaho's only true and dedicated environmentalists," Allen said. "We at the INEL are the watchdogs of Idaho's environmental safety and health."

Committee OKs energy plan allowing drilling in Alaskan refuge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Energy Committee approved a national energy blueprint Thursday that would allow drilling in a pristine Alaska wildlife refuge and ease the way toward building new nuclear power plants.

The package, expected to be vigorously debated on the Senate floor, was endorsed on a 17-3 vote after the panel narrowly approved the expanded Alaskan drilling.

The blueprint includes many of the measures pushed by President Bush in a national energy strategy announced earlier this year.

Sen. Bennett Johnston, D-La., the committee chairman and the bill's chief architect, called it a "balanced and comprehensive" approach to reducing America's dependence on foreign oil through conservation measures and production incentives.

But some other senators, including Sen. Timothy Wirth, D-Colo., said it falls short of what is needed to ease the country's reliance on foreign oil by failing to include steep increases in automobile fuel economy.

Environmentalists quickly denounced the legislation as focusing too much on production with too few measures to curb America's thirst for energy and attacked provisions opening Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) to drilling.

"This is the rape-and-pillage approach with nothing substantial on conservation," declared Sierra Club lobbyist Daniel Becker.

Supporters and opponents alike acknowledged that several controversial provisions, including the drilling and attempts to improve automobile fuel economy, will be decided on the Senate floor.

The 264-page legislation also calls for:

- Streamlining the approval of nuclear power plants by allowing the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to establish a "one-stop" licensing process covering construction and operating permits. Nuclear-power

critics argued it would reduce the public's ability to scrutinize plant safety.

- Deregulating key parts of the electric utility industry so that independent power producers may play a larger role.
- Easing restrictions on the construction of natural gas pipelines to make the fuel more readily available as an alternative to oil.
- Expanding the use of alternatives to gasoline by requiring fleet operators in cities of more than 250,000 people to use alternative fuels such as compressed natural gas.
- Putting into law the ban on offshore drilling announced last year by the Bush administration. The panel rejected attempts to expand the ban to the southern Florida coast.

No indication has been given when the bill will be considered by the full Senate. Several other committees have indicated they want to examine parts of the legislation.

The House is in the early stages of considering energy legislation.

A tremendous debate (before the full Senate) on ANWR, predicted Johnston, who managed to gain only a narrow margin of approval for drilling in the Alaska refuge when the panel rejected attempts to scuttle the provision by an 8-11 vote.

Another battle left unresolved in the committee's package is over proposed improvements in automobile fuel economy. Johnston failed twice to include specific fuel economy improvements for new cars, leaving the provision by a requirement that the Transportation Department examine the issue.

The White House has threatened to veto legislation containing new automobile fuel economy standards.

Johnston said he remains convinced that any legislative proposals will have to require specific fuel economy improvements to pass the Senate.

That measure lost by a vote of 6-14 with some senators arguing the Johnston requirements were too weak while others maintained they would threaten an economically struggling U.S. auto industry.

Johnston proposed that the current, minimum, 27.5 miles-per-gallon automaker average be raised to 37 mpg by 2006.

Separate legislation awaiting floor action would require automakers to achieve a 40 mpg average by 2001, but that bill, sponsored by Sen. Richard Bryan, D-Nev., is likely to be worked into the overall energy bill on the Senate floor.

The most heated debate before the panel involved whether to drill for oil in a 1.5 million acre coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge in Alaska. The Interior Department estimates there is a 50 percent chance of finding as much as 3.2 million barrels of oil under the plain.

Panel approves new cabinet position

WASHINGTON — A Senate committee approved a bill Thursday that would add an Environment Department to the Cabinet, an idea that has wide support but bogged down in Congress last year.

The legislation, supported by a unanimous voice vote of the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee, would also establish an independent Bureau of Environmental Statistics within the new department, a move the White House opposes.

President Bush has called on Congress to make the Environmental Protection Agency into a Cabinet department, headed by a Secretary of the Environment. But he says there should be no other changes in its operations.

McGovern says he will pass up '92 race

WASHINGTON — George S. McGovern declared Thursday he would pass up a 1992 presidential bid in favor of pushing a liberal Democratic agenda "without the distraction of personal ambition."

In a speech to the National Press Club, McGovern said he thought it now likely that "a younger, less battle-scarred candidate would become the Democratic nominee in 1992."

As the 1972 Democratic presidential nominee, McGovern was on the losing end of one of the great presidential landslides. He carried only Massachusetts and the District of Columbia in his bid to unseat Republican incumbent Richard M. Nixon.

Chairman cancels consulting contract

WASHINGTON — The chairman of the commission reviewing military base closings, former Rep. James Courter, said Thursday in an abrupt about-face that he has cancelled his \$2,000-a-month consulting contract with the defense contractor Grumman Corp.

"I am concerned about perceptions of conflicts of interest," he said in a statement released in Washington and in Jacksonville, Fla., where the commission was holding public hearings on base closings.

"As chairman, I fully intend to uphold the integrity and independence of our work," he said. "For this reason, I have cancelled my contract with Grumman."

Bush vows to join fight for space station

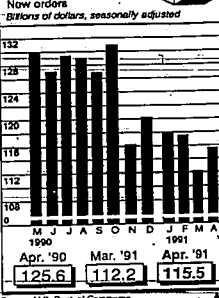
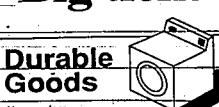
WASHINGTON — President Bush told two senators and NASA's administrator Thursday that he will actively campaign to persuade a congressional panel's decision to approve the space station project.

"He expressed his view that he is absolutely committed to the space station," said Richard Truly, the space agency's chief. "I think you are going to see him very publicly supportive, just as he has always been in the space program."

The space station's future was clouded last week when a House Appropriations subcommittee approved only \$100 million of the \$2 billion the administration had asked for the station for next year. That amount would not be enough to pay the \$250 million to \$500 million estimated cost of canceling the 7-year-old program.

'Big ticket' orders surge forward in April



WASHINGTON (AP) — Orders for "big-ticket" manufactured goods advanced in April for the first time in four months, the government said Thursday in a report welcomed as a cardinal harbinger of economic recovery.

President Bush told a group of retailers he believes the recession is "bottoming out" and "there's an awful lot of economic forecasters that would agree with what I just said," he added.

Indeed, a new survey of the nation's top economic forecasters released on Thursday showed that nearly 75 percent of them believe the recession will be history within five weeks.

The Commerce Department said orders for durable goods — industrial products like aircraft, cars, computers and other items expected to last more than three years — rose 2.9 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$115.5 billion, up from \$112.2 billion in March.

Orders had not risen since a 3.5 percent advance last December. They dropped 2.0 percent in January, 4.5 percent in February and 7.4 percent over the past year.

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan had said earlier this week "the first sign" that the econ-

omy is turning around "will show up in the order books of major materials producers."

Another suggestion of economic improvement was the Labor Department's report on Thursday showing that new claims for unemployment benefits fell by 5,000 in early May to 454,000. Last March, claims had topped the half-million mark for three weeks in a row.

Still, all categories in the durable goods report posted gains except transportation.

Excluding aircraft, non-defense

capital goods orders — a barometer of industry plans to expand and modernize — rose 3.5 percent, the first advance since January.

Defense orders, which had fallen 14.1 percent in March, rebounded 9.4 percent jump, to \$7.4 billion. But even excluding the sporty truck category, overall orders advanced 2.5 percent.

Orders for electronic and other electrical equipment shot up 11.0 percent, to \$47.4 billion, after a 13.5 percent decline a month earlier.

Baker's remarks upset lawmakers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional friends of Israel chastised Secretary of State James A. Baker III Thursday for singling out Israeli settlements as a leading obstacle to Middle East peace talks, focusing instead on what they called the intransigence of Saudi Arabia.

"It seems to me that the Saudis owe the United States something, and beyond that the Saudis owe Israel something," said Sen. Al Swift, R-Pa., a reference to U.S. leadership in the war against Iraq.

Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., said Baker had done "a disservice" by complaining publicly a day earlier about Israeli settlement activity in the occupied territories. Such comments were "not evenhanded," he said.

Pro-apartheid party gains in election

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — The pro-apartheid Conservative Party gained a substantial increase in its majority in a rural by-election, according to results released Thursday.

Conservative Party leaders said the victory proved whites were opposed to President F.W. de Klerk's plans to abolish apartheid and share political power with the black majority.

Election officials said the Conservatives polled 6,276 votes compared to the governing National Party's 5,018 in the whites-only vote Wednesday in the Ladybrand district of the Orange Free State.

The Conservatives, who won the seat from the government in the 1989 general election, increased their majority from 70 votes to 1,258 votes.

Authorities halt Romanian adoptions

BUCHAREST, Romania — The adoption of orphaned and abandoned Romanian children is being halted for several months while authorities prepare new rules aimed at the burgeoning black-market in adoptions, officials said Thursday.

"The selling and buying of children has to stop," Foreign Ministry spokesman Train-Chebelescu said at a news conference.

The number of couples coming to Romania seeking to adopt children has been rising, and there are widespread reports of Westerners going to poor rural areas where parents are exchanging their boys and girls for cash.

Chebelescu said Parliament was expected to complete work next week on legislation that would set strict guidelines for the adoption of Romanian children by Westerners.

Republics accuse troops of attacks

MOSCOW — Lithuania and Latvia on Thursday accused Soviet troops of attacking customs checkpoints on their border and demanding an end to "terror and provocations" by Soviet forces.

Meanwhile, seven Latvian checkpoints reported violent raids Thursday by Interior Ministry forces and Soviet paratroopers, according to the Tass news agency.

Latvia and Lithuania set up the customs posts on their borders after they declared independence in 1990. The move was aimed at preventing their resources from being exported to other Soviet republics.

Soviet troops have attacked the checkpoints several times the past three months, and two people were killed this week in incidents on the border between Lithuania and the republic of Byelorussia.

E. Germany may have taken children

BERLIN — For East Germany's Communists, prison wasn't enough punishment for some of the regime's foes. Several had their children taken away as well, Berlin officials said Thursday.

"It's now clear that the state was acting as a kidnapper," Thomas Krueger, head of the city's youth and family department, said of the regime ousted in 1989.

Eight cases have been documented so far, but more are expected to be uncovered, officials said.

They said the program to separate families was directed by the wife of Erich Honecker, the former Communist chief.

Colombian vigilante groups kill 15

BQOGTA, Colombia — Vigilante groups killed 15 people in two massacres near Medellin, the country's second-most populous city, police said Thursday.

In the Medellin suburb of Bello, gunmen stormed a private home and shot to death 10 of its inhabitants late Wednesday, local police said.

Several radio stations received phone calls from members of the city's so-called "popular militias," who claimed responsibility for the killings.

The militias are vigilante squads that roam Medellin's streets eliminating "undesirables," thieves, drug addicts, prostitutes, gang members and others.

China condemns congressional moves

BEIJING — U.S. congressional moves to declare Tibet an occupied state were condemned Thursday by China, which staged celebrations under heavy guard to mark 40 years of Communist rule.

Foreigners have not been allowed to attend the festivities, which began Wednesday in Lhasa and have been shown only briefly on Chinese television.

In Beijing, a mass meeting was held in the Great Hall of the People to hear speeches praising Chinese rule in Tibet. The official Xinhua News Agency quoted a top Communist Party official, Qiao Shi, as saying party policies in Tibet "have been proven completely right."

China is celebrating the May 23, 1951, signing by Tibetan representatives of a document that brought their homeland under Communist Chinese rule. China claims its sovereignty over Tibet dates to the 13th century.

Gandhi's wife refuses to take party post

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — The future of India's dominant Congress Party was thrown into doubt Thursday when the widow of former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi refused to take her slain husband's place as party head.

Shaken by Sonia Gandhi's decision, party leaders postponed until after Friday's funeral the decision on a new party president, who could become India's next prime minister. National elections are scheduled for June.

Rajiv Gandhi, prime minister from 1984 to 1989, was to be cremated with state honors on a 7-foot-high red brick platform along the Jamuna River. It is next to the spot where his mother, Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, was laid to rest after her 1984 assassination.

Dignitaries from at least 20 countries, including Vice President Dan Quayle and Prince Charles of Britain, were to accompany his cortege for portions of a 10-mile procession through the capital.

Gandhi, 46, was killed in a bomb explosion Tuesday in the southern Indian town of Sriperambudur near

Hindu funeral: Slain leader's son to light pyre, head first

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Even to many Hindus, the traditional funeral can be a shock when the burning skull of the deceased is broken with a cudgel to release the soul.

Funeral arrangements for former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi have not been announced, but the traditional ceremony was given to his mother, Indira Gandhi, after her assassination in 1984.

Rajiv Gandhi will be cremated Friday on the banks of the Jamuna River in New Delhi near the memorials to mother, his grand-

father Jawaharlal Nehru and to Mohandas (Mahatma) Gandhi, father of the nation.

Hindus do not use a coffin to transport the dead to its cremation. The body is wrapped in white linen and tied to a bamboo stretcher. The son leads the procession carrying a fire pot in his hands and throwing coins and sweets for the poor.

move was aimed at keeping the party united and capitalizing on public sympathy among India's 840 million residents.

The Congress Party was favored in the balloting, which began Monday but was postponed because of the assassination until next month.

Mrs. Gandhi declined the offer Thursday, saying in a written statement, "The tragedy that has befallen my children and myself does not make it possible for me to accept."

Although there was some chance the party would ask Mrs. Gandhi to reconsider, the decision appeared final. Congress spokesman Pranab Mukherjee asked how he could have said a "day earlier" that Mrs. Gandhi had no choice, said simply: "We thought she would accept."

The decision appeared to end the Gandhi-Nehru political dynasty, which has dominated Indian politics and the Congress Party for five decades.

Gandhi's mother, Indira, and grandfather, Jawaharlal Nehru, were both prime ministers. Together, the three ruled India for 37 of the country's 43 years since independence.

Ethiopian rebels claim to close within miles of capital

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — The government deployed tanks and soldiers around the presidential palace Thursday to protect it from rebel forces, who claimed to have advanced within 22 miles of the capital.

Diplomats on three continents, meanwhile, sought to halt the fighting in advance of U.S.-initiated peace talks scheduled to begin Monday in London.

In Addis Ababa, the acting government, seeking to placate its foes and obtain a cease-fire, freed 171 political prisoners. Most were arrested following a coup attempt against former President Mengistu Haile Mariam in 1989.

Mengistu resigned and fled the country Tuesday, leaving power in the hands of his vice president, Lt. Gen. Tesfaye Gebre Kidan, and a council of advisers. The new government has appealed to the major rebel groups to observe a cease-fire pending peace talks.

But the Eritrean and Tigrean rebels have rejected the government's call, saying they will continue fighting until either a peace agreement is reached or the government in Addis Ababa is destroyed.

Hundreds of armed soldiers roamed the streets of the capital Thursday, many in dirty uniforms that betrayed them as stragglers from the Western front.

Funerals in a south Indian village, Press Trust of India reported.

As Gandhi's body lay in state Wednesday in his childhood home, Congress Party leaders named his politically inexperienced father-in-law as his successor. The

Military police were seen rounding up about 30 at one city square and herding them into trucks.

The MPs, identifiable by their armbands, waved reporters away with their weapons.

The army is made up largely of conscripts, many of them illiterate youngsters taken from villages by army squads. They receive little training and generally show little willingness to fight.

Late in the afternoon, tanks and hundreds of soldiers took up positions at the presidential palace's sprawling grounds on the city's north side.

Five tanks were seen guarding its three entrances and soldiers were spaced a few feet apart inside the fence surrounding the compound.

S. Korean president orders release of political prisoners

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — President Roh Tae-woo on Thursday ordered political prisoners freed and charges dropped against a top opposition leader, but the moves failed to quell anti-government unrest.

Militant groups have called for nationwide protests against the Roh government on Saturday, the scheduled release date for more than 70 political prisoners, including some suspected North Korean spies.

The government has faced a growing wave of protests following the

April 26 fatal police beating of a student demonstrator. The rallies have demanded major political reforms and changes in Roh's Cabinet.

At least nine protesters have set themselves on fire, and six have died. Hundreds of protesters and police have been injured. Scattered anti-government protests flared in Seoul and at least two other cities Thursday.

The Information Ministry said 74 political prisoners would be released and charges of pro-Communist activity would be dropped against 151 others.

President appoints Powell to new term, says 'he spoke his mind'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush asked Gen. Colin Powell on Thursday to stay on for a second two-year term as head of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, lavishing praise on Powell's performance during the Persian Gulf War.

"I can think of no one more qualified to lead our armed forces as we prepare them for the challenges of the 21st century," Bush said.

The president said his top military adviser "spoke his mind" and laid out all options for responding to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait — a subject of controversy since the recent, book-on-how-the-administration moved toward war.

"It was Colin Powell, more than anyone else, who I think deserves the credit for the time we had to draw the line in the sand. It was he that suggested (it) to me," Bush told reporters.

The president spoke to reporters gathered in the Rose Garden on a sunny and muggy morning. Defense Secretary Dick Cheney stood by, smiling but saying nothing. Although Bush's move had been widely expected since most chairmen serve for four years, the announcement was notable for its timing and the attention Bush drew to it.

It came soon after publication of an eyebrow-raising book by Bob Woodward that described Powell as favoring economic sanctions over military action in order to force Saddam Hussein from

Kuwait. The book suggests Powell did not fully present his opinions to the president on the issue.

Bush's action also could serve to dampen any speculation that Powell might replace Vice President Dan Quayle on the Republican ticket in 1992.

The speculation was renewed following the reports of Bush's heart and thyroid problems.

While refusing to discuss the specifics of the Woodward book, Powell did seize the opportunity to give his lengthiest public commentary on one of its points.

"It's a pleasure working within a team that you can give advice on all options," the general asserted. "Efforts to suggest that there was distance between the president and his other advisers are incorrect."

"He gave me sound advice, straightforward advice," Bush said. "He spoke his mind; he did it openly ... he was a constructive force all the way along the line."

Bush asserted that Powell "told me the risks, he told me what was at stake in terms of human lives." The president said he was angered with "revisionist" accounts that suggested he and Powell disagreed on the administration's gulf policy.

Bush argued that no one in the military leadership was "rushing to commit our young men and women to battle" and that that "is exactly the way they should have been."

The president explained the timing of Thursday's announcement by saying he wanted to "demonstrate my great confidence in his ability and the tremendous respect that I have for him."

Powell's term is up at the end of September. Normally, such a renewal would have given little fanfare and only announced in writing.

Of the dozen military men who have held the title, only two have ever served only two years. Most have served four and one — Gen. Earle Gilmore Wheeler, served six, from 1964 to 1970.

Defense Department spokesman Pete Williams, asked whether Powell informed the president he intended to stay in office for the two years — which would put him beyond the next presidential race — said the general told the president he would serve the full term.

According to a report in Newsweek, Powell was so embarrassed by the idea that he might replace Quayle, that he telephoned the vice president to assure him that he had no interest in running.

Powell's reappointment is subject to Senate confirmation.

The four-star Army general is the youngest ever and the first black to hold the chairman's post. In that role, he not only oversees the Joint Chiefs, the top generals and admirals of the nation's armed services — he also acts as the primary military adviser to the president and his secretary of defense.

Panel endorses Mideast arms sale moratorium

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House committee on Thursday endorsed an indefinite moratorium on virtually all U.S. arms sales to the Middle East amid indications that President Bush's new weapons-control package will fall well short of such a step.

The Foreign Affairs Committee adopted the stringent controls on a voice vote as part of an emerging foreign aid bill for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

The chairman, Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., said the move was intended "to challenge ourselves and the international community" to avoid returning to arms business as usual in the region, which has been the No. 1 destination for international weapons

sales over the last decade.

At the same time Secretary of State James A. Baker III signaled that Bush's "arms-control" plan, which sources said will be announced Tuesday, will be less far-reaching on conventional weapons than on nuclear, chemical and biological arms.

Baker declined to detail the proposal, but sources said it would include new efforts to conclude a chemical weapons ban, a push to strengthen the current ban on biological weapons, a ban on ballistic missiles of more than 90 miles in range and a ban on production of weapons-grade nuclear material in the Middle East as a first step toward a nuclear-free zone.

UN, Iraq agree on Kurd guards

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United Nations and Iraq signed an agreement Thursday for the dispatch of U.N. guards to Kurdish camps in Iraq, where they will replace U.S. and allied troops, officials announced.

The agreement was signed in Baghdad by Berni Bernander, a U.N. official, and Iraqi authorities, said U.N. spokesman Francois Giuliani.

About 400 to 500 U.N. guards, or police will go to Iraq to replace allied soldiers protecting the refugees who are returning to their northern villages, officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Details of the agreement were not immediately available at U.N. headquarters, but U.N. officials and the Iraq had been discussing a lightly armed force of police or guards, not military-style peacekeepers.

Redouble efforts to find consensus on school plans

When a Jerome school bond issue failed by only 88 votes two weeks ago, some disappointed supporters muttered that Idaho's two-thirds requirement is an unfair obstacle. A simple majority ought to be enough, they said.

That sort of talk often follows losing a squeaker. The same sentiment was murmured in Twin Falls when people began to see that Tuesday's election probably would end in defeat for the \$20 million Twin Falls school bond issue, although in the final event there was no doubt about the magnitude of the loss.

But there are sound reasons behind the two-thirds rule for bond issue elections. Raising everyone's taxes shouldn't be easy.

For most issues in our republic, even the slimmest majority rightly rules. But if a large sum of money is to be raised for an important community project, leaving nearly half the voters dissatisfied can only breed resentment.

Something more nearly approaching a consensus is a superior way to make the decision.

Neither Jerome nor Twin Falls has reached that consensus level. Significant portions of each community hold deep reservations about the projects that were proposed. Others simply hate new taxes. That's the viewpoint everyone recognizes as well.

Short-term, the two school districts must get by without the improvements they sought. Long-term, community leaders must redouble their efforts to forge a stronger sense of unity.

The route to that kind of agreement requires more thought, more time for consideration and persuasion, and even more community involvement than already has taken place.

In Twin Falls, we suggest that the people who have opposed the bond issue should be high on the roster for the next citizen committee.

Let the critics—who complained about our "in-group" dominating the debate take leading roles in the next round of consensus building.

We have strongly supported the Twin Falls bond issue in this column, and we still maintain that it was a good idea.

But it certainly was not the only plausible solution to the district's crowding problems, or the only way to provide facilities geared to curriculum improvement.

The community simply must find another one.

Chances are, the new one will be less ambitious. The high school proposed in Tuesday's election wasn't a Rolls-Royce, but it may have been a Cadillac.

If a new high school turns out to be part of the next proposal, it probably will be a Chevy, serviceable but not so luxurious.

On the other hand, year-round schooling should come in for closer examination than it has so far. Our guess is that the community won't accept that idea except in the direst of circumstances. But let's make sure it gets thorough scrutiny.

The same goes for the two high-school option, the add-a-wing option, the build-a-grade-school option and whatever else is put on the table.

Eventually, all but one of the options must be discarded. But if supporters feel they've had a fair hearing, they'll be more willing to accept a new plan.

For our part, we pledge to aid the process by providing thorough news coverage of the debate—and by occasionally putting in our editorial two cents.

What about you? What will your contribution be?

Get bond issue back to basics

There is an old saying in coaching when you've just lost one you should have won that goes, "Back to the basics." So it is with the Twin Falls Board of Education, they should get back to the basics of good school plant planning.

Forget the illusions of grandeur and put the emphasis on what is actually needed, not someone's idea of what they think would be ideal. It is impossible to succeed when you ask the taxpayer to support a bond issue which the district is incapable of maintaining.

First, no education. I am pro-facilities, but I can get fanatical about proper classroom size and teaching materials so that teachers can do the job in the classroom. Just like in athletics, I don't care about new offenses or tricks on defense. You do a better job with the basics and you win.

The basics in education deal with having the time and numbers so that you can work and assist all your students. There is also something missing about the middle class that offers students any more opportunities, including social, that are not available in the 6-3-3 educational concept. Both concepts leave room for social desires at each end of its age spectrum.

We have an excellent school system in Twin Falls. The concepts are good. We do not need a lot of change just for the sake of change. Just recently an elementary school teacher told me, "I don't have to have a new facility to teach in. What I need is adequate teaching materials and a 25 student classroom load. Then we will see some educational improvements." I couldn't agree more.

Let us get the elementary classroom load down to a realistic number. Certainly not the 32 to 36 that some teachers are carrying or have carried.

We do need some new facilities. We need

another elementary school badly, perhaps even two. Forget about not using Bickel, it is a fine school with many good years left. We need an auditorium at the high school. We need at least seat the student body. We need an additional physical education facility at the high school.

We may even need an additional classroom or two, however that is debatable because the enrollment size at the high school is considerably less now than it was once. We need these improvements added we will be in great shape for school-plant facilities for the next 10 to 15 years. As far as I am concerned, that is a long enough period to be concerned because conditions may change.

port, 71 percent of the people polled at the beginning of the campaign wanted a second high school rather than a "mega high school." There is no virtue simply in business or expense. It's what goes on inside the buildings that counts.

The plan would be a devastating waste of present facilities. The present high school building and campus was built for a high school, not for an intermediate school. With the addition of a fine arts building for perhaps a million dollars, it is still an excellent facility for a high school. The parking lot and the athletic fields would be much more than an intermediate school would need.

Also, the present O'Leary campus was built for secondary, not intermediate. With its two gymnasiums, its fine arts building, its shops, football field and all-weather track, with the addition of a science addition and bleachers on the football field, O'Leary would make a magnificent second high school.

Furthermore, crowding in the elementary grades. We do need a new school—preferably an intermediate school—somewhere on the south side of town to give the residents there easier access to it.

GOP chairman backs property tax ballot

Idaho

BOISE (AP) — State Republican Party Chairman Phil Batt on Wednesday backed ballot status for a controversial initiative to reduce property taxes throughout much of Idaho, but he stopped short of endorsing the measure.



Batt said he would prefer attacking the outrageous overspending at the federal level. Batt said, but "it is of symbolic importance to the Republican Party to reassert its historic opposition to high taxes."

Batt's support for a public vote on the initiative being pushed by northern Idaho conservative activist Ron Rankin follows the decision by the governing committee in Ada County, the state's most populous, to fully endorse the measure. Moderates on the committee had urged the majority to delay any decision,

but conservatives pushed for the endorsement earlier this week. The initiative, if enacted by voters, would limit total property taxes to 1 percent of assessed value and require a two-thirds majority of registered voters to approve tax increases. Currently, no more than a two-thirds majority of those actually voting is required to approve any tax increase proposals.

The initiative would apparently reduce property tax revenues for cities, counties and school districts by an average of 25 percent statewide, Batt said, and the voter approval requirements would make it "next to impossible" for

those entities to restore the reductions. He pointed out that of every tax dollar paid by people this year, 67 cents went to the federal government while just seven cents covered property taxes with the other 26 cents going to the state.

Rankin would prefer attacking the outrageous overspending at the federal level. Batt said, but "it is of symbolic importance to the Republican Party to reassert its historic opposition to high taxes." Because of the negative impact the initiative would have on local government and school district budgets, he said Rankin and his backers should declare what services would be deleted. Having the state cover the expected \$105 million cut in property taxes, he said, would require a 20 percent increase in the state income tax or a hike in the sales tax from 5 cents to 6.5 cents on

the dollar — both bad for the business climate. But, he added, "The debate about its merits will cost some long-needed light on the growth of governmental services and increased taxation."

The initiative needs just over 32,000 valid signatures by July 1992 to win a spot on the general election ballot, and Rankin has predicted the initiative will draw 40,000 signers or more. The tax-limiting proposal was sparked by the Legislature's decision this winter to repeal the final vestige of the 1978 property tax revolt — a 5 percent cap on annual property tax increases. Now local governments and school districts can raise tax rates any amount they want within other legal limitations, but they must advertise the proposed increase and its impact on property owners before taking that action.

Kootenai auditor warns of effects of new initiative

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Kootenai County's annual budget will shrink by 19 percent if an attempt to revive the One Percent Initiative cap on property taxes succeeds, the county auditor says.

The initiative, launched by Property Owners Association President Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene, would bring back the 1978 tax ceiling. The previous 1 percent final limit became a 5 percent limit on how much the counties can raise the tax annually.

The limits would have a "devastating effect" on the budget, he said. The state's Division of Finance told him the county can expect its \$4.38 million current expense fund to drop about \$764,000, he said. That covers the daily cost of

running such departments as the assessor's and commissioners' offices.

Taggart also learned the county would see about a \$3.2 million decrease in the amount it can collect through tax levies. That represents a fair-sized drop in the county's \$42 million annual budget, he said.

The city of Coeur d'Alene would lose \$1.5 million in revenue from property taxes and the Coeur d'Alene School District would see a \$1.3 million plunge, Taggart said.

Idaho earns 4th lowest cancer rank

BOISE (AP) — Idaho has the fourth-lowest cancer death rate in the nation, according to a new report from the American Cancer Society.

In Idaho, 146 people per 100,000 are expected to die from cancer this year, according to the study, which used reported deaths in a recent period to make 1991 projections.

Utah had the lowest rate with 127 deaths per 100,000 people. Hawaii ranked second with 138 deaths, and Colorado was third with 144 deaths per 100,000.

The District of Columbia had the highest cancer death rate at 222 deaths. The national average was 171 deaths.

Dick Schultz, administrator of the Idaho Division of Health, attributed Idaho's low cancer death rate to the large number of Mormons living in the state. Because of their religion, they avoid a long list of carcinogens, including cigarettes and alcohol, he said.

"They have a positive influence on our cancer rates," he said. The following were some of the leading cancer killers in Idaho from 1983 to 1987:

- Lung cancer killed 400 people.
- Colon and rectum cancer killed 200.
- Prostate cancer killed 125.
- Breast cancer killed 125.

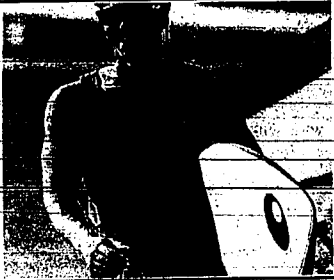
Schultz said Idaho's cancer death rate has remained fairly steady for the past four years, although the state does have a higher than average death rate for breast cancer.



Senator Craig to speak at gulf war monument

"We wanted to do something that would be significant to all of the Magic Valley," said Linda Hurley, a co-director of the Gulf Post, the group that set up in the Blue Lakes Mall in support of the troops.

The monument is funded by donations and volunteer efforts. It will be dedicated at 10 a.m. Saturday at the visitor's center near the Perrine Bridge.

State Rep. Ron Back, R-Twin Falls, whose son served in Operation Desert Storm, will give the dedication. The public, especially returning service personnel, is invited.

Hurley said the Gulf Post is closing down and people can stop by anytime to collect photos of family members who served in the war that were displayed at the post.

State allows Blaine County to declare 'nuclear free' status

HAILEY — It's official. The state has given Blaine County authorization to let the public know the county is a "nuclear-free zone."

Loren Thomas of the Idaho Transportation Department said the green signs with white lettering will be placed at county lines on U.S. Highways 20 and 93 and Idaho Highway 75. It is the county's responsibility to manufacture and pay for the signs, Thomas said.

A referendum passed more than 10 years ago declaring Blaine County a nuclear-free zone. Recently the Idaho Conservation League has asked the county to push for the identification.

County ordinances restrict any nuclear activities, but cannot restrict hauling nuclear materials across its highways.

Lawmaker collects promise to guard commodities in talks

WASHINGTON — Idaho Sen. Larry Craig says he's elicited a commitment from U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills that "no single commodity, such as sugar, will be unilaterally traded away" in upcoming international trade talks.

By a vote of 231 to 193 Thursday, the House agreed to extend until 1993 President Bush's broad power to negotiate all trade pacts, a power that would expire June 1.

Debate focused on Bush's authority to negotiate the proposed U.S.-Mexico free-trade pact.

The so-called "fast-track" authority, which limits Congress to a single up-or-down vote on trade agreements, also gives the administration more freedom to negotiate with Europe in the current round of talks under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

Following a meeting with Hills earlier this week, Craig, a Republican, said he received what he considered an "ironclad guarantee" from Hills that "fast-track" would not be used to circumvent congressional oversight of trade negotiations.

Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, voted against the bill Thursday.

"Idaho agriculture groups are scared, it is because they know the facts," said Stallings. "Most of the major agriculture groups in Idaho have serious concerns with fast-track."

Boise man cited after heading wrong way on Interstate 84

BURLEY — A wrong turn on Interstate 84 near Burley sent four people to the hospital Wednesday afternoon.

Larry Chittenden, 84, of Boise, was cited for reckless driving after he made a U-turn and headed west in the freeway's eastbound lane, according to a Cassia County Sheriff's Department accident report.

Fort Hall resident Willard Atkinson, 81, and his wife, Norma, swerved to avoid Chittenden and hit a 23-foot trailer being pulled by Twin Falls resident Wilford Nelson Jr., 69, and his wife, Ellen, the report says.

The trailer disconnected and rolled over, and the Atkinsons and the Nelsons ended up in the median. All four were taken to Cassia Memorial Hospital. No information on their conditions was available Thursday evening.

Chittenden, who was not hurt, was released on his own recognizance.

EPA hits area dairies with \$15,000 fines

WENDELL — The federal Environmental Protection Agency has filed administrative complaints against two Magic Valley dairies for allegedly violating their waste water discharge permits.

The EPA's Northwest regional office in Seattle proposed \$15,000 penalties for both the Goodhart Dairy near Wendell and the Hank Haflinger Dairy south of Buhl.

The proposed fines are the highest ever assessed for a permit violation in the Magic Valley.

"That's not to say that there may not be a higher one coming along," said Ward Harshman, water quality compliance officer with the Twin Falls office of the state Division of Environmental Quality. "In fact, there may be. You may be seeing one higher coming down here soon. Possibly."

Harshman said the EPA can charge up to \$25,000 per violation if the discharges are considered severe and the conditions warrant the action.

If the operators fail to request hearings challenging the agency's allegations, or contesting the penalty amounts within 30 days, the EPA can order payment of the penalties.

Hank Haflinger said Thursday he is not

sure yet what he will do about the charges. "We just got the information and I haven't had time to review it," he said. "I haven't received notice to pay anything. All I've received is notice of violations."

According to the EPA complaint against Haflinger's dairy, there were five unauthorized discharges into irrigation ditches and a breach of the wall of the dairy's waste impoundment area.

In the Goodhart case, the allegations stem from a March 1990 inspection by DEQ.

According to the EPA complaint, inspectors found waste water from an impoundment area overflowing into a nearby irrigation canal, Goodhart allegedly failed

to notify either the EPA or state officials of the discharge.

Goodhart's operators could be not reached for comment Thursday.

The agency said it took a number of factors into account in calculating the proposed penalties, including the dairies' compliance history.

The proposed penalty against the Goodhart Dairy was influenced by an EPA administrative complaint issued to the operation in 1989 that resulted in a penalty payment of \$4,000 for three unauthorized discharges of wastewater to Cedar Creek in 1988.

Donicht says schools hurt by formula

TWIN FALLS — Because of inequities in state education funding, Twin Falls schools have outdated textbooks and the district pays comparatively low teacher salaries, a lawsuit against the Idaho State Board of Education says.

"In my professional opinion, the Twin Falls School District is unable, due to the lack of adequate funding, to provide a general uniform and thorough educational opportunity to its students," Twin Falls Superintendent Terrell Donicht wrote in an affidavit.

Donicht's five-page affidavit, detailing educational inadequacies caused by the state's school funding formula, was filed in support of a lawsuit against the state in which Twin Falls and 18 other school districts are plaintiffs.

The suit claims the state funding formula, which relies partly on local property taxes, is unfair to districts with low prop-

Neibaur requests preliminary hearing on charges

RUPERT — A Magic Valley man described as a business associate of Idaho Congressman George Hansen demanded a preliminary hearing Thursday on felony charges stemming from a multimillion-dollar securities fraud.

Brad Neibaur of Rupert remained free following his initial court appearance before Minidoka County Magistrate Bob Workman on 14 felony counts of writing insufficient fund checks worth nearly \$2 million.

Workman indicated the hearing to determine whether Neibaur should face trial on the charges would be held within three weeks. The maximum penalty upon conviction is five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine on each count.

Neibaur, represented by attorney Brent Robinson of Rupert, will be arrested and jailed if he fails to appear for that hearing, Workman said.

Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason charged

Neibaur last week in what he said was a scheme also involving Hansen and state Republican Party Regional Chairman John Scoresby to defraud the Bank of Commerce of Idaho Falls.

Creason said Neibaur was acting in concert with Hansen and Scoresby but there was no evidence that either Hansen or Scoresby were in Minidoka County so no charges were filed against them.

The prosecutor said he has turned his investigative files over to U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth in Boise and Bonneville County Prosecutor Kimball Mason in Idaho Falls. Neibaur has filed criminal charges yet.

Hansen, who served nearly a year in federal prison for falsifying federal financial disclosure statements, was the subject of a Idaho Finance Department securities fraud investigation that resulted in a court judgment against both him and Scoresby in February. The department accused the pair of violating securities laws and defrauding investors.

Hansen admitted he raised and lost \$18 million from some 180 investors in a dozen states during the late 1980s.

The federal bankruptcy law, October and promised as part of this winter's civil court judgment to do his best to pay back the investors. A bankruptcy reorganization plan filed this week by Hansen in Virginia showed he owes \$19.5 million but claims to expect payments for consulting services to cover at least a third of that.

According to government documents, Neibaur was part of a check-kiting scheme last year that eventually involved the exchange of 170 checks worth nearly \$20 million between Neibaur and Hansen's Ideal Consultants during just the month of October. Prosecutors said Neibaur's bank accounts contained only a fraction of that amount.

Hansen said he raised the money, promising investors interest ranging from 20 percent a year to 10 percent a month, to finance various conservative political enterprises including one to abolish the Internal Revenue Service.

Bill boosts BLM control over land

WASHINGTON — The House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee has adopted a controversial measure that would allow the U.S. Bureau of Land Management to prohibit mining, logging, grazing and development on 270 million acres of federal lands it manages.

The measure could affect a proposal to turn Craters of the Moon National Monument into a national park, and would also influence development around City of Rocks National Reserve in Cassia County and Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument in Gooding County.

The legislation would give the BLM director discretion to establish critical environmental buffer zones around national parks, wilderness areas and wildlife refuges located on BLM land.

"The whole bill was litigation legislation, allowing the environmental ac-

tivists to bring injunctions, file lawsuits," said Rep. Ron Marlene, a Montana Republican who sits on the Interior or committee.

If the measure passes the full House, Marlene predicted the Senate would not buy it.

"It will never become law," said Rep. Richard Stallings, an Idaho Democrat who has proposed national park status for Craters of Moon, nor Rep. Larry LaRocco, an Idaho Democrat who sits on the Interior committee, could be reached for comment Thursday.

Under the measure, the BLM could limit the use of buffer zones to recreation or no use at all, Interior committee officials said.

Environmentalists have fought the measure, arguing that BLM lands are not sufficiently protected.

"This is an open-ended hunting license" for environmentalists who want to increase the national park system

and clamp down on development of federal lands, said Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska. "It is a death to any western state."

"It's a fundamental expansion of park boundaries without going through the park boundary expansion procedure," said Rep. John Rhodes, R-Ariz.

The measure, which is tucked into legislation reauthorizing funds for the BLM, passed the House last year, but was not taken up by the Senate.

The issue is a touchy one in southern Idaho, where the objections of environmentalists are mounting.

Trail could link Ketchum, Stanley

KETCHUM — Trail enthusiasts in the Wood River Valley are hoping to develop a 60-mile system of trail-linking Ketchum with Stanley that would be open year-round.

As envisioned by the Forest Service and a group of local outdoor enthusiasts, the trails would be used by hikers in the summer and cross-country skiers in winter. Part of the trails may also be open to motorized

vehicles.

Dutch Harper, snow ranger for the Ketchum Ranger District of the Sawtooth National Forest, called the proposed trail system an "awesome opportunity" and said preliminary discussions on where and how the pathways would be built are under way.

"We're going to let the community for help planning the route," Harper said.

An environmental analysis of the trail system could begin as early as next fall, depending on the progress of the plan.

A meeting of outfitters, Forest Service personnel and others interested in the proposed trails will be held in early June, according to Ken Britton, recreation planner for the Sawtooth National Recreation Area.

"Right now, we're just developing a vision and identifying alternative routes," Britton explained. Funding sources are yet to be identified and the possibility of forming a trails association is being discussed.

A system of trails — circular or cross-country — has been suggested, at five- or 10-mile intervals along the route.

Several yurt, used by outfitters and the Nordic Ski Patrol, are already located on the SNRA. The proposed trails could link those to cabins, yurts or other shelters. "These interested in the project can contact Ken Britton at the SNRA headquarters north of Ketchum by phoning 726-7672."

Supporters applaud Senate committee approval of trails proposal

POCATELLO (AP) — A Senate committee's endorsement of Sen. Steve Symms' bill authorizing the use of federal fuel tax revenues to maintain recreational trails on public land shows environmentalists' opposition is misguided, the spokesman for an off-road vehicle group says.

The Senate Environmental and Public Works Committee voted Wednesday to recommend full Senate passage of the National Recreational Trails Fund Act. It was sponsored by the Idaho Republican as part of the

omnibus Surface Transportation Efficiency Act.

While the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, the Pocatello-based Blue Ribbon Coalition and other off-road vehicle groups support the act, environmental organizations have criticized its potential for land abuse. "The committee concluded that the trails fund provides money that does not constitute a federal subsidy," Symms said after Wednesday's vote. "And the lack of adequate trail funding is itself a major contributor to environmental damage and trail safety problems."

Catherine Holman of the Sierra Club's Washington, D.C., office described the measure as an "outrageous abuse of land."

But Clark Collins, Blue Ribbon Coalition spokesman, said committee support proved that environmental groups were barking up the wrong tree.

"This endorsement by the most environmentally sensitive committee in the Senate proves that the Wilderness Society, Sierra Club and other opponents of the bill didn't have their facts straight," Collins said. "This

is a major victory for grass roots trail users nationwide."

Originally submitted as a separate bill, the trails legislation added to the transportation bill calls for fuel tax funds to be used for motorized, non-motorized and multiple-use trails. Each category would receive no less than 30 percent of funds allocated to states.

An amendment was proposed by Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, prohibiting spending funds on motorized trails. Idaho Parks and Recreation officials sent a letter supporting Symms' measure.

"The Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation Board has officially endorsed this legislation and we are excited about the benefits this bill will offer," said Yvonne Ferrell, department director, in a letter to the Senate committee chairman.

"We see (the bill) as the solution to many of the trail problems we have been struggling with for many years and encourage you to support this bill, without putting it through a time-consuming and diluting amendment process."

Idaho congressional delegation splits on 'fast-track' treaty vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho's two House Democrats split over giving the Bush administration continued broad freedom to negotiate a free-trade treaty with Mexico as part of an overall North American Free Trade Agreement.

Four-term Rep. Richard Stallings, who is considering a U.S. Senate race in 1992 against Republican Steve Symms, voted against extending the president's "fast-track" negotiating authority for two years.

But freshman Rep. Larry LaRocco joined Thursday's 231-192 majority in favor of the measure he said was needed to ensure Congress is not allowed to pick apart trade agreements essential to the nation's economic health.

The question, he said, came down to "a choice between growth and stagnation."

LaRocco said he had met with representatives of Idaho's silver, sugar, timber, electronics and dairy industries and passed along their concerns. In response to fears about job and income losses from foreign competition, he said, Bush had pledged to provide "adequate assistance and ef-

standards which this nation has worked so tirelessly to establish."

But Stallings said Thursday's vote amounted to a failure by Congress in its responsibility to ensure the health and safety of the American people and their environment.

He cited "serious concerns" with fast track expressed by the United Dairyfarmers of Idaho, the Idaho Sugarbeet Growers, the Idaho Rural Council, the Idaho Wheat Commission, and the Idaho Farmers Union.

"Although I wholeheartedly support efforts to reform global trade and to eliminate policies that hurt trade, I oppose giving the administration a blank check to negotiate these agreements," Stallings said. "If Idaho agriculture groups are scared, it is because they know the facts."

Among them, he said, was that global standards proposed in the Uruguay Round of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade are less restrictive than U.S. requirements. For example, Stallings said, global standards would allow use of DDT, aldrin, dieldrin and other highly toxic chemicals banned here.

LaRocco said, "In this area, I trust the president."

Without the policy adopted in 1974 of all-or-nothing votes by Congress on trade pacts with other nations, he said, "The progress to be gained from an open market gets lost in bureaucratic crony."

Still, he promised to monitor fast-track agreements to ensure they protect U.S. interests.

"I will not endorse any trade pact unless it thoroughly addresses the environmental, economic, labor, health and safety concerns of all Americans," he said. "I will not allow the 'fast track' to become a green light for circumventing the production

Ada interest in recycling explodes

BOISE (AP) — The whisper with which Ada County's recycling program began last week has turned into a roar, boosting hopes for its long-term success.

By Wednesday, some 2,000 plastic bags filled with cans, newspapers, plastic and cloth were collected at curbsides, estimated Boise Ada Dispose-All President Doug Lomow.

About 1,500 bags were picked up this week, and 500 last week, he said.

"We're delighted," he said, attributing the boost in collections to the 40-gallon size of the bags. Residents simply were not putting out recyclables for pickup until the huge bags were filled, he said. Boise Ada initially estimated 4,000 of its 16,000 customers on its trash collection route outside Boise would participate in the voluntary program.

But based on the response from residents, Lomow said "We think

it will push 6,000" by the end of the year.

May's recyclable collection is free, but the company will charge \$2.25 per month starting in June. He does not expect the charge to dent participation by the enthusiastic residents.

Another sign of the recycling hunger: "We're getting (Boise) city customers calling us, (saying) 'Just come and pick our stuff up,'" Lomow said.

But he said those callers were told Boise Ada cannot take up recyclables in Boise. The city has its own pilot recycling program underway, and is looking into the feasibility of some sort of city-wide recycling.

Lomow estimates two-thirds of his customers want to or potentially will recycle.

One of the skeptics is Arthur Lillard of Meridian who said he is for recycling, but perceives sales

of recyclables will cover Boise Ada's expenses and yield a profit. "We're not going to sign for it unless they explain it a little better," Lillard said.

Lomow's explanation: Given the employee, equipment and operating costs, "I expect to lose the first year. We expect to break even after that ... The bottom line is to protect our trash franchise."

He said his trash company in Orinda, Calif., is only breaking even, despite 80-percent participation in its recycling program. Checks from its recyclable sales there in April totaled \$12,600, about \$1 per customer. Customers there also pay \$3 a month for recycling.

Under Boise Ada's contract with Ada County, 30 percent of the proceeds — not profits of recyclable sales — go to the county. Those proceeds will be rebated to customers to help defray the monthly recycling charge.

Lawsuit forces district's budget cuts

SANDPOINT (AP) — The Bonner County School Board has trimmed \$408,727 from next year's budget by laying off four teachers, cutting money for sports teams and not filling vacant positions.

Superintendent Ed Humble told trustees this week that the cuts were necessary to come up with money the district was ordered to pay teachers in back wages.

The district recently lost a lawsuit filed by the Bonner County Education Association alleging that school officials misappropriated funds the Idaho Legislature earmarked for teacher salaries.

An appeal is being filed, Humble said, but the district needs to have four full-time

Cutbacks include laying off three elementary music teachers, one elementary counselor and not filling one of two vice principal positions at Sandpoint High School.

"This is very distressing," Humble said. "We are going in the wrong direction. Every one of those positions added was a struggle. Now we are eliminating a lot of what we were able to accomplish over the last several years."

Del Schanz, the district's special education director, was reassigned to a staff position in the \$1 million lawsuit filed last month by Clark Fork High School Principal Richard Christensen and his wife, Susan, a consulting teacher in the special education department.

The Christensens contend in their complaint that Schanz intimidated and harassed them.

"This has nothing to do with the lawsuit," Humble said of Schanz's reassignment. "It is a personnel

matter and I won't discuss it publicly."

Overall, the cuts were not as drastic as some associated, said Bonner County Education Association President Joan Head. And she said the cuts were in response to the district's \$536,000 budget deficit

rather than to losing the lawsuit filed by the teachers union.

Humble disagreed, saying the original budget blueprint for next year included money to offset part of the deficit and the cuts would not have been necessary without the court judgment.

Sheriff faces anger over gun permits

YUBA CITY, Calif. (AP) — A sheriff wants to limit the number of concealed weapons in this rural county. Many pistol-toting residents now want the sheriff out of office.

"It's nothing unusual to have a concealed weapon," said Tom Pelfrey, 57, a roofing contractor and a leader of the recall effort. "A lot of women even carry them in their purse. I don't think concealed weapons are the big problem here."

Pelfrey, a former sheriff's deputy and investigator for the district attorney's office, hopes to gather nearly 6,000 signatures to put a recall measure on the November ballot in Sutter County, which has the highest number per capita of concealed weapons permits in California — about 1,350 in a population with 65,000.

The hub of the 670-square-mile, largely agricultural county, Yuba City, is about 40 miles north of the state Capitol.

Newly elected Sheriff Art Brandwood, who took office in January after defeating a veteran incumbent, said he was concerned that misused concealed weapons might lead to a lawsuit against the financially strapped county.

So he cracked down on issuing the permits, requiring applicants to detail their reasons for needing a deadly-weapon permit.

"On the permit applications under 'reason' people were saying 'self-protection' but they weren't articulating what that self-protection re-

ferred to," Brandwood said Thursday. "I felt that they should articulate a good cause to have a concealed weapon."

Some applicants, however, believed Brandwood's policy reflected "a lack of trust in their integrity; not that for years they had routinely received permission to carry concealed weapons."

"When my permit was about to expire, I went to the sheriff's office to get it renewed, and they informed me it was very hard to get a renewal because the sheriff was cutting down on the reasons," Pelfrey said. "We

couldn't understand it. There had never been a problem."

He said 900 people signed a petition asking to meet with Brandwood, but that the sheriff declined. After that, he and other decided to push for a recall.

Under California law, county sheriffs have the authority to issue permits in their jurisdictions, but the criteria vary from county to county. With the largest urban counties — San Francisco — the most restrictive and the rural counties generally the most lenient.

West Stallings is critical of Corps

LEWISTON (AP) — U.S. Army Corps of Engineers plans for five public meetings on drawing down Snake River reservoirs to help stalling salmon runs has drawn a sharp attack from Congressman Richard Stallings.

Stallings, D-Idaho, said in a Wednesday letter to the corps it offered too little notice of the early-lunch meetings and failed to schedule sessions in southern Idaho.

Further more, Stallings said he doubted the two hours allotted for each meeting would be enough for citizens to state their concerns.

"I have serious reservations about this limited time for discussion of one of the most important issues we are dealing with in our region," he said.

The corps listed 21 possible issues to be considered, ranging from how reservoir drawdowns would help salmon survive to effects on Indian treaties, non-migratory fish, water supply systems, irrigation and shipping.

The corps issued notice this week of its plans to hold meetings between June 3 and 6 to consider the scope of an environmental impact statement.

Two Idaho meetings have been slated thus far on Monday, June 3; Lewis-Clark State College in Lewiston and at Orofino Junior High School.

Other sessions are planned at Pasco, Grand Coulee, Wash., and Portland, Ore.

Stallings said his concerns about the corps' plans were several.

"First, in considering the far-reaching effects this process could have on Idaho and the entire Northwest, I question whether 15 days is adequate notice for all interested parties, including governmental agencies, to be prepared for these scoping meetings," he said.

Stallings also asked the corps to hold additional meetings at Boise and Pocatello.

The corps, Bonneville Power Administration and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation are considering several changes in river flows to help the dwindling salmon runs.

The environmental impact statement will flesh out plans for a proposed drawdown experiment next year of one or more reservoirs to hand federal dams on the lower Snake River.

The Snake's sockeye and spring, summer and fall chinook salmon runs are the focus of petitions seeking Endangered Species Act designations. Environmental groups are pushing for a much quicker protection of the sockeye which has all but disappeared in its migrations to Redfish Lake near Stanley.

The National Marine Fisheries Service April 2 proposed listing the sockeye as an endangered species.

Company may shut down mine

REI LOGG (AP) — The Sunshine Mining Co. threat to close its northern Idaho silver mine if a new labor contract is not hammered out has been made so many times it's baffling, a union representative said Thursday.

"I would say it's a really stale threat that's been going on for the last four years," said Steve Brown, a spokesman for the United Steelworkers of America.

The mine could be closed if the union does not accept management's offer by May 31, said Dan Hultinger, a spokesman for Sunshine Precious Metals Inc., a subsidiary of the Dallas-based Sunshine Mining Co.

The company also announced several weeks ago that it plans to lay off 300 of 425 employees June 1 because of depressed silver prices.

Small quake rattles central Utah town

CASTLEDALE, Utah (AP) — A small earthquake rattled this central Utah community Thursday morning, but there were no reports of damage.

The University of Utah Seismograph station at Salt Lake City said the quake at 1:38 a.m. struck about 7 miles east of Joes Valley reservoir and 9 miles northwest of this community of about 1,700.

Seismologist Jim Pechmann said the quake registered 3.6 on the Richter scale, a magnitude of 2 is the smallest normally felt by humans and a 3.5 quake can cause slight damage.

Putting a new pirouette on ballet

It's the story of an American Dream, but they say it's a little overwhelming.

Benjamin Kuzmichev, his wife Valeriya, and 5-year-old daughter Lucy defected from the Soviet Union to Twin Falls eight months ago.

"Benjamin Kuzmichev, who said he didn't know what he'd be doing when he came to live in the United States, has recently been appointed as the new artistic director for the American Festival Ballet in Boise."

"For Benjamin I think it's very fast because we'd been here for just seven months," Valeriya Kuzmichev said.

Benjamin Kuzmichev, who says he's been dancing "all his life," was a dancer with the Shcherbenko Academic Theatre in Kiev from 1960 to 1980. He then worked as an instructor and choreographer at the Choreographic College in Kiev from 1981 to 1990 and was the business manager for the Philharmonic Society for the family.

"It's a big project," Benjamin Kuzmichev says, adding that he wants "to make Boise a ballet city where everybody would know about ballet."

"My dream is that the theater will be full all ways," he says. "Ballet in Idaho is a small baby, and I will make it grow and take care of it."

Benjamin Kuzmichev says he doesn't think there will be a language barrier with his students because "ballet is universal language."

He began his career by applying to the Choreography College in Kiev, thinking he was signing up to study voice because he had always enjoyed singing. He thought it was strange that they wanted him to dance in the audition.

"He was then chosen to join the school and stayed for six years before going on to dance for 20 years. He retired at age 40 and then returned to the college to teach and choreograph."

That's when things began to turn for the worse for the family. The Kuzmichevs explain that they lived a life that was repressed by the Soviet government.

"We are people who like to tell the truth," Valeriya Kuzmichev said. "We don't like the false. The Soviet power always works with the false."

For many years, the Kuzmichevs say, they saw many "untruths" by the government and didn't make waves. Then, with Gorbachev in power and Glasnost, they thought things were changing and they began to "try to tell people the truth" about the injustices around them.

"It was just words" that Gorbachev had been speaking, the Kuzmichevs say.

After an article ran in a prominent young people's magazine about problems in a dance school that some people attempted to hide, they say the government repressed them even further.

"With art, ballet — we don't like to make a sensation," Valeriya Kuzmichev said. "We decided it would be better to live in the U.S."

Goldberg, Cher and Stewart are just a few of the scores of celebrities on Glenn Nowell's growing list of who reads what. And just who is Glenn Nowell? Sites, an enterprising librarian in this list of celebrities who recently released her fourth annual list. She came up with the idea of writing to

celebrities in 1988.

Some celebrities send Nowell cordial notes, listing several favorites. Others, such as Queen Elizabeth II, coolly turn her down.

"I was looking for a hook that would get people to read a book," Nowell said, adding that she also wanted to steer readers toward books other than best sellers.

After looking at news and fashion magazines and listening to suggestions from readers, Nowell formulated her first list of VIPs to be contacted. She dug their addresses from the celebrity references at the Gardiner Public Library.

The first list included several Maine political figures, and

such entertainers as Doris Day, whose favorite is "Kinship With All Life"; Lana Turner, who liked "Anatomy of an Illness"; and Oprah Winfrey, who listed "The Color Purple" among her favorites. And then there was Alan Alda, whose response Nowell still considers her favorite.

Among the actor's best-liked volumes is "The Congressional Record," which he remembers poring over as a child. "I had never read anything so funny," Alda wrote. "From then on, I knew I wanted to do comedy."

Lucille Ball, writing back for the 1989 list, recalled being

Yippee-a-i-o. Rope in some cowboy poetry in the park

Midnight stampedes and the milling of herds
Yells of cowmen too angry for words
Right in the thick of it all would I stay
Make me a cowboy again for a day

That sentiment, from a poem by nationally known western entertainer Ernie Sites, is echoed in the preparation now being made for Western Poetry in the Park, Twin Falls Western Days event set for 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday, June 1.

Sites will be there — all day — sharing his poems and entertaining the crowd. He has no novice to the stage, or to the world of the cowboy.

"The first time I recited cowboy poems for an audience was in Elko, about eight years ago, when they started the cowboy poetry gathering there," said Sites. "On the way to Elko, I hadn't planned to participate, but those poems just started going through my brain, and I was hooked."

It shows, Sites not only dresses the part, with his tennison hat and chaps, but his poetry recitations come complete with Western enthusiasm, sound effects and down-home fun.

In February, Sites was featured on The Nashville Network.

"I have been a professional entertainer for about 20 years now," said Sites, who pursues his country calling full time. He travels across the nation telling tales, trucking music and displaying some pretty fancy rope tricks.

Sites grew up on a ranch outside Wendell, and still makes his home in the area. His wife and six children often join into his act. "My wife is a western singer, and my kids appear on stage with me, too," Sites said. "My three boys are cowboy poets."

As a youth, Sites competed in high school rodeos.

He moved on to semi-professional rodeo, where he participated in wild bull riding, calf roping and even

rodeo clowning. These days, he spends more time at cowboy poetry gatherings.

"Cowboy poetry is really beginning to catch on in a number of areas," Sites said. "It began in the West and Midwest, but Nashville and the Midwest are catching up."

Sites is just as comfortable writing songs as he is writing poems. "Marty Robbins was my favorite singer while I was growing up, and I started writing ballads listening to him," Sites said. Today, Sites records albums of his own.

The album "Idaho Winds" mixes an electrical sound with cowboy music. On the album, Sites accompanies himself on acoustic guitar, rhythm guitar and mandolin. He also opted for some backup help from drums, electric guitar, electric bass, acoustic bass fiddle and saxophone. "Rage of the Sage," is a 55-minute collection of western stories, poems and songs aimed at collectors.

Following the poetry reading in the park, Sites will head for Benchwarmers, where he will lead some western entertainment and a cowboy dance at 8 p.m. "I would encourage anyone who wants to come and read to take advantage of the open mike at the poetry in the park event," Sites said. "It's a great opportunity for new cowboy poets, and the audiences are always so receptive."

TWIN FALLS - More than 100 talented young people will make the world come alive when Up with People hits the stage Tuesday.

Video makers offer self-cleaning VCR heads

It used to be that the best way to combat dirty heads on a videocassette recorder was either inserting a head-cleaning cassette into the unit or having it serviced professionally. Now there is another, easier option: self-cleaning VCR heads.

Several companies, including Sony and Panasonic, are marketing VCRs with this feature.

The heads are the vital, minuscule electromagnetic points that make contact with the tape and "read" the magnetic impulses, a key step in getting the picture to the screen. They are vulnerable to dirt and the residue of deteriorating tape. Dirty heads reduce picture quality, damage tapes and are a major reason for VCR repairs.

Originally used on professional machines, self-cleaning heads finally have filtered down to less expensive models, including Sony and Panasonic units that are discounted for less than \$400.

"Here's how they work," said Jim Bonan, vice president of home audio products for Sony, which includes self-cleaning heads in all its VHS models. "A small foam roller about a quarter of an inch in diameter touches the head for a few rotations and it then backs away. This happens when you put a tape in and take it out. It gets rid of whatever dirt is there on the heads."

Bonan predicted that in the future, self-cleaning heads will be a staple on all VCRs.

Dylan is master of expressing societal complexities with rock

Bob Dylan is the primary reason we can still listen to and be inspired by rock 'n' roll. More than any other single figure, Dylan the enigmatic singer and songwriter who turns 50 today — turned the teen-oriented energy and celebration of Elvis and Little Richard into an art form in the '60s. He showed that rock could express complexities about society and relationships with the intimacy and insight of films or books.

Without that added dimension, rock may have largely disappeared as a social force as quickly as parents in the '50s had predicted it would.

Like the rock pioneers, the Hibbing, Minn. native loved the raw, honest emotion of country music and the blues. He even started out in rock, but he found the style too limited.

"The thing about rock 'n' roll is that for me anyway, it wasn't enough," he once said. "Tutti Frutti" and "Blue Suede Shoes" were great catch phrases ... and you could get high on that energy, but they weren't serious or didn't reflect life in a realistic way. I knew that when I got into folk music, it was more of a serious type of thing.

"The songs are filled with more despair, more sadness, more triumph, more faith in the supernatural, much deeper feelings ... needed that. Life is full of complexities and rock 'n' roll didn't reflect that. It was just a happy face and ride and ride ... If I did anything, I brought one to the other."

Signed by Columbia Records after just a few club appearances in Greenwich Village, Dylan was 20 when his first album, "Bob Dylan," was released in the spring of 1962. Though it brought him some critical acclaim, his commercial breakthrough did not come until the summer of '63. It was then that folk trio Peter, Paul & Mary recorded a Dylan song that he would include on his second album, "Blowin' in the Wind" hit No. 2 on the pop charts.

The trio's high profile and the song's success directed attention to Dylan, pushing his second album, "The

Freewheelin' Bob Dylan," into the Top 25 on the charts that fall. Flash ahead two years and three albums: The Byrds recorded an electric version of a new Dylan acoustic song off his fifth album, "Bringing It All Back Home." The Byrds' single, "Mr. Tambourine Man," went into the Top 10.

Later in 1965, Dylan's fusion of folk commentary and rock energy fueled "Highway 61 Revisited," arguably the most absorbing album of the modern pop era and the centerpiece of his legend. By this time, he didn't need others to put his music on the radio. His version of "Like a Rolling Stone" hit the national Top 5, making the darling of the underground a national rock hero.

Dylan heard boos during that period from the old folk crowd when he walked on stage with a rock band rather than just his acoustic guitar — former loyalists who thought he had sold out. But it didn't deter him — and that's where his courage and strength came in.

It takes immense ambition and vision to become a great artist, but one of the lessons of Dylan's career is that it takes an almost unattainable will to remain a great artist, because you have to be ready to sacrifice all that you have gained in popularity and acclaim to keep moving into new creative areas.

He has heard the boos many other times over the last three decades as he moved in unexpected directions, yet he has proved amazingly resilient. Every time he has been written off after a disappointing album or seemingly indifferent show, Dylan has rebounded with a work or performance of imagination and heart.

Over the decades his birthday, the image of Dylan that is freshest in the public mind isn't flattering; a snarling, full-throated performance of the old "Masters of War" dur-

ing February's Grammy Awards telecast that many viewers found impossible to decipher. But there was more to Dylan than night.

as if searching for something meaningful to say — rather than the usual show-biz acceptance speech.

"Well my daddy didn't leave me too much he was a very simple man," Dylan said, shifting uncomfortably.

"But he did say, 'Son ... it's possible to be as satisfied in this world that your own mother and father will abandon you. And if this happens, God will always believe in your own ability to mend your ways.'"

If he was more awkward at the podium than the others on a night when mostly soul-less pop figures were honored, the words of an endearing and heartfelt piece of advice: a warning about the loneliness and self-doubt that surround anyone brave enough to be true to an ideal rather than succumb to the popular currents.

Anyone who didn't recognize the tenderness and relevance of the remark in light of Dylan's own history, probably also didn't understand Dylan's music over the last 30 years because the words summarized much of the struggle chronicled in his songs.

Even on a night when he was honored by the record industry, the quintessential outsider remained a step apart.

After 28 albums and more than 300 songs, Dylan stands as second only to Elvis Presley as the most influential figure in the history of rock.

The rock scene may be polluted these days by hundreds of acts that recycle or exploit the music's original, liberating tenets. Yet there is still the thrill of hearing occasional voices who speak with the individuality and insight that remind you of the music's early purpose and power.

Invariably, these voices — from introspective rocker Paul Westerberg of the Replacements to young urban folk singer Tracy Chapman — owe a debt to Dylan.

A weird tale of a Vietnam vet's descent into madness and a British crime drama top this week's list of new videos.

Chronicler of outdoors to sign newest book

"Why is it no one ever invented a compass that points in a useful direction — toward the place where you parked your car, for example?" asks Patrick F. McManus in his new book, "Real Ponies Don't Go Oink!"

McManus will be accepting answers to that question in person at Judi's Book Store from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

He will also be autographing his book. McManus has been tagged America's most beloved chronicler of the occasionally not-so-green, but always surprising, outdoors.

He is a prolific one, too. "Ponies" is his ninth book. His last collection, "The Night the Bear Ate Goo-baw," was on the national bestseller list for 13 weeks.

The author's new book contains 26 humorous foibles and fables and brings the "old gang" back.

Cumudgeon Rancid Crabtree is found trying to hide a freshly-caught beauty of a 20-inch rainbow trout inside his vest from the local game warden. Retri-Sweeney appears with young Pat — the two "Teenagers from Hell" — as they embark on a wild and ill-fated fishing trip. And, of course, there's Blyn, who prefers camping in "She likes a little something extra between her and the hard, cold ground, preferably several floors of a luxury hotel."

"I'm not really offended by the term humorist," said McManus in a phone interview from his home in Spokane, Wash. But I tend to think of myself more as a general writer who uses humor in a lot of his stories."

McManus, 57, and his wife have four children and six grandchildren. The couple divide their time between their Spokane townhouse and their mountain retreat on an island near Hope, Idaho.

But they are not always at home. "We have driven about 2,000 miles on this year's book tour," McManus said.

"A few years ago we drove across country for three months and traveled 15,000 miles."

McManus says it takes him a year

to write a book. He also contributes a monthly column to "Outdoor Life."

He is considered a master at finding humor in the wilds of the Pacific Northwest, but he didn't always plan to write about it.

"McManus was raised in Sandpoint."

His father, a sawmill worker, died when he was six. His mother was a school teacher. McManus started out studying to be a cartoonist, but found himself uninterested in the abstract art of the day. He earned an M.A. in English from Washington State and accepted a teaching position at Eastern Washington State. By 1972, he was making more money from his freelance writing than from teaching.

McManus estimates his readers range in age from 8 to 80, male and female.

"I hope to have my next book, completed in the collection, completed this summer," McManus said. "It's already half done."

After that, McManus plans to move into a different kind of writing. "Probably novels," he says.

"Real Ponies Don't Go Oink!" is published by Henry Holt and Company Inc. and sells for \$16.95.

Bill Murray movie is top money-maker for week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bill Murray's psychiatric comedy "What About Bob?" grabbed first place at the weekend box office with \$9.2 million in ticket sales, according to weekly figures released today.

The comedy, pairing a paranoid Murray with Richard Dreyfuss as his unappreciative therapist, made its strong showing a week before the summer movie season's official start. Today will be the busiest of the vacation period, with "Backdraft," "Hudson Hawk," "Only the Lonely" and "Thelma and Louise" all set to debut.

In second place, down 30 percent from its No. 1 debut last week, was the special effects sequel "T-2 Zed 2." It had ticket sales of \$3.8 million, Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc. said.

The Madonna documentary "Truth or Dare" placed third, playing well in its first weekend of wide release. It played on 538 screens, up from 16 in its debut last weekend, and grossed

\$3.4 million. In fourth was "Switch," a gender-reversal comedy that netted \$3 million. Former football standout Brian Bosworth's "Stone Cold" made \$2.8 million in its premiere for fifth place.

Sylvester Stallone's falling comedy "Oscar" slipped from third to sixth place on a gate of \$2.1 million. The "Silence of the Lambs" took seventh with admissions of \$1.9 million.

The sequel "Mannequin 2: On the Move" opened very poorly, with sales of just \$1.7 million for eighth place. "A Kiss Before Dying," pairing Matt Dillon and Sean Young, earned \$1.58 million for ninth.

Audiences gave up on Michael Keaton's "One Good Cop," which grossed \$1.57 million in its third week for 10th place.

'Bob' is all about sweet revenge

Sometimes a movie is just a movie, but not in the case of the cheerfully psychoanalytic "What About Bob?" Bill Murray and Richard Dreyfuss star in this hilarious brain-teaser about a patient who suffers acute separation anxiety when his psychiatrist goes on vacation. For all the time patients have paid \$115 for 45 minutes of "What do you think it means?" this is sweet revenge. Murray is the driving force as the multi-phobic Bob, and Dreyfuss is driven to his wits' end as his pompous new doctor. A farce in the tradition of "Down and Out in Beverly Hills," the story turns on the amiable neurotic's ability to insinuate himself into the hearts of Dr. Marvin's neglected family — son Siggy (Charlie Korsmo), daughter Anna (Kathryn Erbe) and wife Fay (Julie Hagerty).

The doctor is an emotionally barren man whose obsession with his work has distanced him from his loved ones. As the author of a new self-help book called "Baby Steps," he is even more self-absorbed than usual. He's scheduled an interview with "Entertainment Tonight" during the family vaca-

tion at idyllic Lake Winnetka. The flowers are arranged, the pantry stocked, everything is perfect when, along comes Bob. Like ALF, he's the thing that won't leave.

Though director Frank Oz takes his own sweet time in setting up the premise, the funny-business between Bob and the Marvins is well worth the early ride.

The doctor treats his family as if they were patients, but the childlike Bob can approach the kids as neurotic equals.

Written by "Dead Poets Society" scribe Tom Schulman, the screenplay borrows the piddled myth from "Harvey" that crazy is nicer than cured.

Even though he is agoraphobic, claustrophobic, hypochondriac, Bob is better off than his psychiatrist because he is capable of expressing his needs.

Above all else, "What About Bob?" addresses the way many a patient feels when his psychiatrist has the nerve to go away without giving a thought to his problems. Perhaps it is just one desperate cosmic cry for help. Then again, maybe it's a threat.

Swiping at golf is grist of new humor video mill

Something about the sport of golf — the act of whacking a little white ball with a stick — inspires humor. Comedian Tim Conway seized on this fact about five years ago and came up with "Dorf on Golf," a collection of slapstick skits that take place on the links. It became a popular gag gift among duffers and is still a brisk seller.

The success of "Dorf" overshadowed all comers, including a 1988 release from Paramount Home Video called "Tom Sharp's Golf: Hate This Game," but now Sharp's tape is getting a second chance. This month, Paramount is dusting it off for re-release (perhaps with an eye on Father's Day next month) and re-doling the suggested price—\$5 to \$19.95. Running time is 35 minutes.

Sharp is no Tim Conway, which can be a plus if Conway's muggings and pratfalls are not to your liking. Bold, affable and mild-mannered, Sharp looks like the classic guy next

door. His brand of humor relies on word play and awkward situations rather than on outrageous person-

The premise is nothing more than partaking in a typical day at the golf course — Condo Vista Country Club, home of the Sammy Davis Jr. Quad Cities Mitsubishi AT&T Danny Thomas Atlantic Classic Open — with Sharp showing us the ins and outs of his favorite pastime.

Every aspect of golfing — the equipment, the wagering, the hazards, the snack bar and pro shop — is grist for Sharp's wit. His giant golf bag is big enough to accommodate Junior (represented by a doll's upraised hand) in a side pouch. When he tries to heave it — along with a cooler of beer and huge bags of peanuts and corn chips — onto a cart, the front wheels lift off the ground.

Golf is a time-consuming game, and Sharp recognizes that one's job may have to suffer. Hence he offers sure-fire excuses for work absence such as: "Boss, some guys from Is-

lamie Jihad kidnapped my wife. Guess I have to get her back. I should be in after lunch."

A visit to the pro shop in search of golfing attire turns up a rack labeled "Colors Not Found in Nature," and Sharp reminds us that cotton is, of course, not permitted at country clubs.

Other golfers are fair game as well. The obnoxious player is embodied by a confident character who assures Sharp that "through-strobe-scope motion analysis I discovered I was pronating my wrist on the takeaway, and I was causing my backswing to deviate from the proper arc." Then he takes a swipe at the ball that lands him on his back.

The same comically overstated style of instruction crops up again when Sharp advises us on the proper way to hurl a club after it "does something bad." The right way is to keep it low to the ground and twist it heli-copter fashion so as to minimize damage. "Never do this," he says, borrowing a hapless chum's iron

and striking it against a tree. Sharp attributes his skill to the practice time he puts in at home, or more precisely at his neighbor's house, where his spiked golf shoes pull-up-the-kitchen-linoleum-and-his-fellow-through-swing-puts-holes-in-the-ceiling.

Whether resorting to his "chainsaw wedge" to remove an obstructing tree, shopping for new clubs in the unattended bags of other golfers or jangling \$9 worth of nickels in his pockets during his opponent's put on the 18th hole, Sharp maintains the serenely innocent air of a genteel sportsman. Naturally, he cheats on his score.

"Hate This Game" is as professionally produced as any home-video original on the market. In fact it surpasses many, if only because it was shot on film, not videotape, giving it a richer look. It may not have star power, but it has real humor.

Greene said he was thinking back to a conversation he once had with Leo Mazzone, a pitching coach in Atlanta's minor league organization. "I had three no-hitters that I lost with two outs and two strikes in the last inning," said Greene, who was soaked with beer in the Phillies clubhouse. "And I remember after the last one, Leo Mazzone telling me, 'When are you finally going to get one?' Well today, I finally hung on to it."

Tennessee senator wants 4-team NFL expansion

MINNEAPOLIS — Sen. Al Gore, D-Tenn., is leading a group of at least nine senators to convince the National Football League to expand by four teams in 1994, instead of the recently approved two and to allow Congress to monitor the entire expansion process.

Gore plans to mail a letter on Friday to NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue and other senators to set up a meeting among all interested parties "as soon as possible," according to Gore's chief of staff, Roy Neel. In other news on the final day of the NFL owners' meetings, the 1995 Super Bowl (XXIX) was awarded to Miami, a surprise that angered many in the delegation from Houston, the favored city. One of the deciding factors was Joe Robbie Stadium's larger seating capacity, which holds more than 73,000 people and has 215 executive boxes and 10,200 club seats. The Houston Astrodome has about 60,000 seats. Several owners said the difference in seating would account for about \$13 million.

"It is (awarded) because of the capacity," said Jon Lindsay, a member of the Houston group who helped make the 15-minute presentation to owners, "then the owners got a little greedy."

Houston has held only one, at Rice Stadium in 1974. Regarding Gore's plan for increased expansion and oversight of the process, Neel stressed that a possible meeting "with Tagliabue would be cordial" and that there would be "no arm twisting" on the part of the senators. Neel also emphasized that some senators might become bitter toward the NFL and move to eradicate the league's anti-trust protection granted by Congress in 1966 should they feel the selection process was not a fair one. That protection allowed the league to bargain with networks as a group for television contracts and to merge the NFL and NFL without being subject to federal statutes that might have otherwise affected these deals.

"I knew it all along. I just wanted to make sure that we got the truth out," he added.

More than 800 submit claims for collusion damages

NEW YORK (AP) — More than 800 players submitted claims for the \$20 million in collusion damages as Monday's deadline, the Major League Baseball Players Association said Thursday.

The union, which will divide the money into awards for individual players, said it would not know for weeks how much the claims totalled. Under the collusion settlement last fall, the 26 clubs agreed to pay the money, which began accumulating interest on Jan 2.

Individual awards are not expected to be issued until 1993, and players may appeal the union's decision to arbitrators Thomas Roberts and George Nictolau.

Bulls forward wants to dish out headaches to Pistons this year

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP)—The Detroit Pistons aren't laughing about Scottie Pippen's headache anymore. Chicago Bulls lead the Pistons in search of the aspirin bottle.

Pippen and the Chicago Bulls lead the Pistons 2-0 in the best-of-7 Eastern Conference finals. The Pistons, trying to become the third team to win three consecutive NBA titles, play the next two games at The Palace, their home court, where Pippen suffered his worst nightmare.

Last year, in the final game of the conference finals, Pippen developed a migraine and sat with his head wrapped in a cold compress. He made only 1-of-10 shots as the Bulls lost 93-74. A Chicago columnist wrote "Hello, Missing Pippen's Bureau? I mean Missing Persons' Bureau? I'd like to report a lost forward. An all-star."

The comments hurt Pippen. "That (reputation) is always going to be there. But that's in the past, and I don't look back on it."

He has focused on the present. Pippen is enjoying his finest NBA season. He averaged 17.8 points, 7.3 rebounds and six assists during the regular season. And the 6-foot-

7 forward has turned it up a notch while helping Chicago go 9-1 during the playoffs. He has averaged 21.5 points and more than five assists. He also has 24 steals and 11 blocks. His play has helped the Bulls eliminate New York 3-0 and Philadelphia 4-1, and lead Detroit 2-0. In the clincher against the 76ers, Pippen was 13 of 14 in the first three quarters.

"I've been waiting for this since last year," Pippen said. "This is a chance to get back."

He is getting back with a vengeance. In Game 1 against Detroit, he had 18 points and seven rebounds as the Bulls won 94-83. In Game 2, Pippen had 21 points, 12 rebounds and five assists as Chicago won 105-97.

That got the Pistons' attention, especially Dennis Rodman, the NBA defensive player of the year, for the second consecutive time.

"That headache stuff is blown out of proportion," Rodman said. "I don't know if he had a headache then, but he sure hasn't shown any signs of a headache in these two games. He's a great young player who's already a star. I just try to do my best to contain Scottie Pippen."

Chicago's Michael Jordan said Pippen's pride was hurt by the criticism.

"He certainly wants to come through this year and make believers out of people who have doubted him," Jordan said. "That's just the competitive player he is. He's excited about trying to help us to another level. He's playing exceptionally well. Each year he has improved."

"He's playing with a lot more confidence and that's what you need in a playoff situation."

Pippen wasn't the only one who yelled against the Pistons last year. Craig Hodges shot 3-for-13 in that climactic game, Horace Grant was 3-for-17 and B.J. Armstrong, then a rookie, was 1-for-8.

"What happened last year, the headache, that happens to everybody, in every job," Armstrong said. "You don't always feel well. Sometimes you go to work with a headache. The real problem was the timing when it happened."

That's exactly how the Pistons see things this year. The titling of Pippen's big reversal could cost them a shot at NBA history. Seven times in their history, the Pistons have fallen behind 2-0 in a playoff series and each time they lost the series.

The teams play Saturday and Monday at The Palace.

Old putting touch helps Calcavecchia earn share of Colonial tourney lead

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP)—A return of his old-time putting touch and confidence propelled Mark Calcavecchia into a three-way tie for the first-round lead Thursday in the Colonial tournament.

Calcavecchia did not have a bogey on his card and did not make a 5 on a 5-under 65. He shared the top spot with Peter Persons and Fred Funk.

More important than the lead, Calcavecchia said, was the return of that special feeling, the putting touch and brass confidence that once marked his play.

"That's probably the best I've felt on the golf course this year," Calcavecchia said. "It's sort of reminded me of a couple of years ago, when I was playing great. It wasn't much of a struggle—I was just swinging the club and doing it."

"I know that's the way you're supposed to play golf, but it's hard to do when you're playing head and something," said Calcavecchia, whose last victory came in the 1989 British Open.

The big turnaround, Calcavecchia said, was in his putting. Only a week ago, it was his biggest problem.

"Last week I finished, absolutely finished, on five putts of six feet or less," he said, and, as an aside, added: "I was a little older you'd call 'em the yips."

Immediately after that nervous experience in the first round of the Memorial, Calcavecchia put in a three-hour practice session with one of the elongated, 50-inch putters so popular on the Senior Tour.

"I'd gotten too wristy," he said. "I had to quiet down my hands a little. The long putter is a shoulder stroke and that's what I needed."

"I even put it in my bag for Friday. Took out the 1-iron and carried my old putter, too."

"I didn't pull the Long Daddy, but it was there if I needed it," he said. "He abandoned it over the weekend, however—and said he has no intention of using it for the next 15 or 20 years."

Using his shoulders' muggy and his hands less on this hot, more day, he began to see some results that have been missing for two years.

"This was kind of like the way I used to play," he said. "I didn't have to think about it, just kind of put it on auto-pilot."

Bruce Lietzke led a group at 66, 4 under par, and a single stroke off the pace.

Also at that figure were Jim Hallet, Gene Sauers, Mark Lye, Dave Edwards and Chris Perry (no relation to Kenny Perry, the winner of last week's Memorial tournament).

Wayne Levi, a four-time winner last season, was in a large group at 67 and had a share of the lead until he double-bogeyed the final hole.

PGA titleholder Wayne Grady was one stroke higher—Defending champion Ben Cronshaw matched par 70.

Calcavecchia birdied the first from 25 feet, and hit short irons inside of 10 feet for the other birds on Nos. 6, 9, 11 and 12.

But, he said, "I kind of had to switch to my scramble mode coming home."

"He was able to do that, too. He was bunkered on three of the last five holes, each-time coming out of the sand within up-in distance."

"A really big boost to the confidence," he repeated. "Maybe I got enough confidence out of this day to play some good golf the rest of the way."

Blazers hope to cool off Scott's shooting

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—The key to the Portland Trail Blazers regaining the homecourt advantage in the Western Conference Friday night may be to cool off the shooting of Los Angeles Lakers guard Byron Scott.

And most likely, if the Lakers are to maintain their advantage, they'll have to hold their own on the backboards.

"Byron's on fire," Portland guard Clyde Drexler said after Game 2 of the best-of-7 series, which the Blazers won 109-98 to give the teams one win each in Portland. "Someone's got to pour water on the guy."

The Blazers cooled Scott off in the fourth quarter, holding him to one shot, which he missed. That made Scott 17-of-24 in the two games including 5-of-6 from three-point range.

"It wasn't designed and they weren't really preventing me," Scott said after practice Thursday.

When asked how he would feel about one shot in the final-12 minutes Tuesday night, "It just happened that way, it was just one of those things."

When asked if he thought he should have gotten more shots late in the game, Scott smiled and said, "Not necessarily. I don't have any say so in the matter at all. I'm just shooting the shots I get."

And shooting them awfully well. Scott has made a rather unbelievable 16 of his 24 three-point shots in the 70-67-49 overall in the Lakers' 10 playoff games, eight of them wins. Most of those 130 attempts have been long-range jumpers.

"I don't remember a time in the playoffs where I've been in such a groove, shooting as well as I am now," Scott said.

"When Byron hits his outside shots, we are unbeatible," reserve Lakers center Mychal Thompson said. "Byron is the key."

Lakers coach Mike Dunleavy said the Lakers don't plan to set Scott up for more shots than he has in the past.

"We want to run our plays and try and get him good shots," Dunleavy said. "When they take those

shots away from him, it leaves someone else open to score."

According to Drexler, the Blazers did a better job on all the Lakers, not just Scott, in the fourth quarter of Game 2.

"The key for us was on the defensive end," Drexler said. "We were very aggressive and contested every shot. This is how we've played 99 percent of the time."

The Blazers mangled the Lakers on the boards Tuesday night, outrebounding them 31-28, yet Los Angeles stayed in contention until the final minute. Portland led by only four points with two minutes left.

"If we can stay down on the boards, we can shut down," Scott said. "We didn't play well at all in Game 2 and we still had a great chance to win it."

Lakers center Wade Davis, who was pushed all over the court by the Blazers, let it drop down only two rebounds in each game of the series.

"We've talked with all the guys, not just Vladie," Dunleavy said. "The guys who aren't rebounding know who they are."

Said Davis: "I know what's going on. I have to tell myself, 'It's the playoffs, I have to play every game hard.'"

"I just have to push myself in the game, play physical and I'll be OK. If you want to play physical, you can do it, you can learn."

Davis, who has gotten hammered several times in this series, smiled when asked how he felt about banging on the Blazers.

"I don't like it, but if somebody hits me first, I have to return it," he said. "We're not going to play dirty in the game, just physical and very hard."

Sam Perkins, who had 10 of the Lakers' 28 rebounds in Game 2, said he plans on being more physical Friday night.

"If you foul you quickly in a bad way and knock-you-down, we're going to have to do the same thing—a slip for a slip," Perkins said. "The refs aren't calling anything."

"We'll try to box out, lay a body on somebody, get a foul to send a message. They are beatable. Each team knows it can win in the other team's backyard. We're going to try and make a stand on our court."

NBA names Rockets' Chaney coach of the year

HOUSTON (AP)—Don Chaney, who led the Houston Rockets to a franchise-record 52-30 record despite playing 25 games without head coach Olajuwon, received two awards Thursday for his coaching.

Chaney held the Rockets together after Olajuwon suffered an eye injury Jan. 3, guiding them to a 15-10 record during the absence of his star center. When Olajuwon returned, the Rockets continued to roll, winning 13 straight games from March 3-28.

"The key was that great March we had even though we were short-handed," Chaney said. "There was even mention that we might be a lottery pick next season because of the negative comments and jelled as a team."

Houston was 14-1 record during March, setting a team record for victories in a month, and Chaney won the NBA coach of the month award.

Chaney, asked how many years he got on his contract, replied "many." Chaney, who was drafted by for-

second with 11 votes, followed by Boston's Chris Ford with seven. Chicago's Phil Jackson won four. San Antonio's Larry Brown and Milwaukee's Del Harris with two each and Detroit's Chuck Daly with one.

The Rockets were 29-9 over the final three months of the season, the 10th time in NBA history a team lost fewer than 10 games during that span.

Chaney said the Rockets, swept by Los Angeles 3-0 in the opening round of the playoffs, should compete for the NBA championship next season.

"We are on a direct mission toward the championship," he said. "I'd like to see us stay together."

Chaney said he was pleased to get his contract settled on the same day he earned the NBA's highest coaching honor. Chaney was unhappy early last season that his contract had not been renewed.

"That's something that I was very concerned about," he said. "This is a team of the future, and with the players from last year and improvements we'll make, we're on the way to the championship."

"I had started to prepare myself for disappointment, but things picked up, and I'm happy things worked out."

Last week, the Minnesota Timberwolves asked for permission to talk with Chaney concerning their coaching vacancy.

"It never hurts to have outside interest, but at the time they called our negotiations already had started to pick up here," Chaney said. "I don't think interest from the Timberwolves sparked negotiations with the Rockets."

The Rockets improved by 11 games over their 1989-90 record of 41-41; the second biggest improvement in the league, behind Orlando's 13-game jump—Houston led the league in road record improvement, from 10-31 to 21-20.

Chaney is the second Houston coach to win the honor. Tom Nisslake was coach of the year in 1977.

Packers QB expects to sign 1-year contract before training resumes

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—Quarterback Don Majkowski, recovering from shoulder surgery, said he expects to sign a one-year contract for less than \$2 million before the Green Bay Packers resume training July 15.

Majkowski was a training-camp holdout for 45 days last year, leaving him short of full readiness when the playing season began.

Working with his teammates during this week's three-day minicamp, he said "there's no doubt" he will sign sooner.

Coach Lindy Infante said he may not know for weeks whether Majkowski, who underwent rotator cuff surgery, will return to his starting status but that he is optimistic.

"I know I'm going to be 100 percent," Majkowski said. "There's not even a question anymore."

His agent Robert Vathala said talks were initiated by Mike Reinfeldt, the team's chief financial officer. The Packers made the first offer. Vathala said Thursday he was preparing a response.

"I've got a real good feeling about it," Vathala said. "I'm pretty sure we seem to be on the same page. Everything so far has been upbeat. Both sides are very reasonable and rational."

He indicated the Packers' proposal covered options for one and two years but that Majkowski intended to stick with another one-year deal.

Asked about a \$2 million base salary, Majkowski said: "I'm not even looking for that much. It's close. Things are rolling."

Majkowski has not played since the 10th game of the 1990 season. "He's the leader of this team," wide receiver Peter Kemp said after Wednesday's workouts. "He looked good. I'm happy to see him."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Many players suffer a blind spot when faced with familiar card combinations. Instead of asking, "How many tricks do I need in this suit?" they rush headlong to make a routine play.

With eight easy tricks in sight, South needs to develop one more to make his contract. Since hearts offer better chances to develop a ninth trick in hearts than in spades, South attacks that suit. How should he proceed?

Many would cash the heart ace and lead a low heart to dummy's king, accepting the 50 percent chance that the king is with West. East captures the queen, and now South has no chances left for a ninth winner.

Had South needed three heart tricks instead of two, his play would have been acceptable. Needing only two tricks from the suit, he has two safer ways to play the suit.

He can play a low heart from both hands initially and then cash the ace. In today's layout, East's king drops and he has his ninth trick. Had it not dropped, he could still lead low toward the queen, winning against any 3-3 split or K-x-x with West. As an alternative, he can cash the heart ace and then play low from both hands. If nothing good happens, he leads low toward the queen, once again winning against any 3-3 split or K-x-x with West.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Many players suffer a blind spot when faced with familiar card combinations. Instead of asking, "How many tricks do I need in this suit?" they rush headlong to make a routine play.

With eight easy tricks in sight, South needs to develop one more to make his contract. Since there are better chances to develop a ninth trick in hearts than in spades, South attacks that suit. How should he proceed?

Many would cash the heart ace and lead a low heart to dummy's queen, accepting the 50 percent chance that the king is with West. East captures the queen, and now South has no chances left for a ninth winner.

Had South needed three heart tricks instead of two, his play would have been acceptable. Needing only two tricks from the suit, he has two safer ways to play the suit.

He can play a low heart from both hands initially and then cash the ace. In today's layout, East's king drops and he has his ninth trick. Had it not dropped, he could still lead low toward the queen, winning against any 3-3 split or K-x-x with West. As an alternative, he can cash from both hands. If nothing good happens, he leads low toward the queen, once again winning against any 3-3 split or K-x-x with West.

Baldwin cutting loose while creating version of old west hero in ABC series

"I live to act, but I look to do material that you can really have fun with," says Stephen Baldwin, who plays William Cody in "The Young Riders," airing Saturdays on ABC. "You really have to believe what you're doing."

Baldwin first discovered acting in high school and, inspired by the success of his older brother Alec, began planning his own acting career at the age of 16. He often draws parallels between his days growing up as the youngest of four acting brothers (William and Daniel are the other two) and his portrayal of the comical, carefree and self-confident Cody.

"The way Cody was written, I was very similar in my personal life to the character," says the actor. "A lot of the outgoingness, the craziness, the cute and cunning con artist, is like when I was a kid. It's a tough character to play because he is this comic relief, but at the same time I don't want him to be a total goofball, because that's not who he was. But obviously, when the script calls for it, and the goofiness has to come out, I could carry it off. I think Cody would probably chuckle if he could watch me now."

Cody, of course, later became famous as the star of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. "I'm glad I got to play him, because there is not a lot of documentation of who he was at the time that I'm playing him," Baldwin says. "So it enables me to do whatever I want. I think that's when they found out my range as far as playing a nutty character, and making him believable. If you believe, if you can justify what it is that you're saying, or what it is you're feeling, there's no stopping you from how far you could go."

Cody is Baldwin's first regular TV role. "I never wanted to do a series," he says. "A friend of mine was casting 'The Young Riders,' and my agent really wanted me to go in on it. I said no, because at the time I had a real attitude about myself, my career and my ability as an actor, and I didn't think that tele-

vision was something that I wanted to be doing.

"So I went in and deliberately tried to sabotage my audition by going over the top with the character," he continues. "Well, if these guys want a cowboy, well, boy, I'm going to give them a cowboy that they've never seen before. I'm not going to play some network cowboy. So I was spitting and burping and doing all that good stuff. They went, 'Great. Exactly what we want.' I found out that was really the way they wanted us to be."

Baldwin likes filming the series in Arizona. "We're not in a studio in New York or Los Angeles; we're in Tucson," he says. "It's a very spiritual place. I've met other actors who said they would give one of their fingers to do our show. At that time I started to realize really how

lucky I was to be doing 'Young Riders.' I think it would just drive me nuts if I was doing a show that shoots in a studio every day."

There have been a few naysayers, of course. "We've had some critics call us hunks on horseback and studs on stallions," says Baldwin. "But this is a good show because it's not phony. The concept of the show — the fact that we are Pony Express Riders — is a tough one to stay in. There's only so much you can do. But at the same time, it's a wonderful situation to create a lot of possibilities for story lines."

For the first time, the Daytime Emmy Awards presentation will be seen in prime-time, broadcast live from the Marriott Marquis Hotel in New York City on CBS, Thursday, June 27. The awards were traditionally broadcast during the afternoon hours, but the producers of the Daytime Emmy Awards feel more people will tune in a prime-time telecast of the proceedings. With the use of VCRs, many fans who work or are otherwise busy during the day tape their favorite soaps and watch them later.

ABC cut 'thirtysomething,' others

NEW YORK (AP)—ABC's sensitive, Emmy-winning "thirtysomething" and "China Beach" series got the ax Tuesday. So did the surreal "Twin Peaks." At Fox, "Babes" and "Top of the Heap" got the gate.

But Dabney Coleman, absent from series life since ABC's "Slap Maxwell," will return as a reluctant schoolteacher on Fox's "Shut Up, Kids." James L. Brooks, producer of Fox's "The Simpsons," also has a new ABC comedy, "Grownups," starring Marsha Mason in a show about fibbers.

The new arrivals and the casualty lists came as Fox and ABC announced their new prime time schedules, with one big change at Fox.

Fox Chairman Barry Diller said his network no longer will hurl all its series into the networks' annual fall fight for viewers.

Of Fox's five new shows, two will premiere in September and a third in October. Under the new plan, new series will be introduced throughout the year at the rate of one or two a month, Diller told a news conference.

"It makes utterly no sense to have a system that debuts 35 series within a couple of weeks," he said.

As part of its new look, Fox in January plans to drop its Friday night broadcasts, moving its schedule on that night to Mondays. The movies shown in that time slot will be broadcast Wednesday nights, and


