House rescues NASA space station

WASHINGTON — The House rescued the embattled space station Thursday, voting to spend nearly \$2 billion next year on NASA's centerpiece program well into the 21st Century.
By a vote of 240-173, the House agreed to give President Bush \$1.9 billion that the space agency requested for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1. The money will be taken mostly from other NASA programs.
"If we aim to become a second-class nation, then we should go ahead and kill the space program, kill the space station and kill it all," said Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas, during an impassioned debate that lasted six hours.
Advocates of the space station invoked the names of space pioneer Wernher von Braun, the moon program, the Bible, "Neil Armstrong's Spirit," Daniel Webster and Star Trek.
They warned that America's manned space program would end in mid-decade if the project were cancelled and that America's young people would turn from science and engineering education without a big goal to shoot for.
Those opposed denounced the

withholding of help for veterans, the poor, the environment for the sake of a program that one member called "a budgetary black hole in space" and another "a WPA project for the aerospace industry."
The presentation, to be built and in flight by the end of the decade, is the centerpiece of NASA's plans to meet the president's goal of establishing a base on the moon and sending an expedition to Mars. For such journeys, NASA must gather data on physiological changes that astronauts will confront.
The project, by NASA's estimate, will cost \$30 billion by the time four astronauts can live and work on the station on a year-round basis. Other estimates are considerably higher — \$40 billion from the General Accounting Office, for example.
The bill before the House, strongly opposed by the Bush administration, had withheld money for the station. That would effectively have killed a project that has been in the planning stage for seven years and already has cost \$5.6 billion.
Members adopted an amendment offered by Reps. Jim Chapman, D-Texas and Bill Lowery, R-Calif., to restore \$1.9 billion to the appropriations bill covering NASA and several other agencies.

No raises are included on Twin Falls school administrators' pay schedule

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls School District officials are proposing no increases in the salary schedule for administrators for the next school year.
Any increases will come, because administrators have more experience, according to a letter written by Keith Earnworth, the district's personnel director.
All together, administrators' salaries will increase \$8,000, or 9 percent above last year's total of \$906,455.
That does not include salary increases, if

any, for the principals of O'Leary Junior High or Harrison Elementary School because the current principals are stepping down and their replacements have not been hired.
Classified district employees, or those who do not have teaching certificates, also will get wage increases only for increased experience. They include janitors, teachers' aides, secretaries and cooks.
After 15 years of experience, administrators do not receive raises linked to experience.
Two principals within the district, both with more than 15 years of experience, will receive less money than last year.

Twin Falls High School Principal Carl Snow's salary will decrease \$630 or 1.2 percent to \$51,527, and Morningside Elementary Principal Dennis Sonius' salary will decrease \$315 or 7 percent to \$4678.
Earnworth and Superintendent Terrell Donitch were unavailable for comment Thursday afternoon. Sonius and Snow said Thursday they had not been told why their salaries would decrease.
The salary schedules must be approved by the School Board.
Teacher salaries for the next year will be determined after negotiations between

HUD suit settlement may be near

TWIN FALLS — Thirty-one Magic Valley residents accused in a civil suit of an alleged fraud against the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development might settle the case before it goes to trial, according to federal court documents.
How close a settlement might be was unclear from the documents filed in U.S. District Court in Las Vegas on Monday. But the status reports filed by federal and local attorneys say negotiations have been continuing.
Trial has been scheduled for next February.

Although some few problems remain to be worked out — it is hoped that settlement can be achieved within the next 30 days... Twin Falls attorney Lloyd J. Webb wrote in his report.
A status report by U.S. Justice Department attorneys says talks have been "productive and resulted in an offer that may form the basis of a settlement between these parties. However, there are substantial obstacles to reaching a final agreement, and the matter may have to be submitted for court approval."
The status reports do not say how much money was offered to settle the case.
Webb represents former Twin Falls resident Gordon Beckstead and Camille Beckstead Stockdale but his report says a number of Twin Falls-area people are involved in the negotiations.

Gary Slette, attorney for two of those involved in the suit, City Councilman Doug Vollmer and Twin Falls real estate developer Richard Messersmith, did not return a phone call Thursday. Vollmer said negotiations have been going on for two or three months but that any other comments must come from Slette.
Twin Falls attorney John Hepworth, who represents about 19 Twin Falls-area people, said Wednesday that he still hopes the case will be dismissed. Barring that, Hepworth said he is reasonably optimistic a settlement might be reached, but would comment no further.
HUD sued 31 people from the Twin Falls area last year in a \$10-million, six-year triple damages and civil penalties totaling about \$6.8 million. The Twin Falls investors have contended since the start of

Americans drink younger, marry later

Youthful drinkers claim to battle stress, boredom

WASHINGTON — More than half the nation's junior and senior high school students drink alcoholic beverages, and many "binge" drink to relieve stress and boredom, according to a national survey released Thursday.
"They drink deliberately to change the way they feel," said Surgeon General Antonia Novello. "And we know that the use of alcohol to, in effect, self-medicate is the trap door to full-blown alcoholism."
More than 40 percent of those who admitted drinking said they do it when they are upset; 31 percent said they drink alone; 25 percent said they drink when they are bored, and 25 percent said they drink to get high, the survey said.
Novello said adults need to "pay attention to the strong signal adolescents are sending us" and help them find other

ways to cope.
She said another troubling finding from the survey was that two-thirds of the teen-agers couldn't always tell which beverages contained alcohol, even after studying the labels. On average, students tried to tell the difference three out of 10 times.
The problem emerged when students tried to tell the difference between wine coolers and flavored mineral waters that have "unbelievably similar" coloring, labeling and packaging, she said.
She noted that beer and malt liquor labels do not disclose alcohol content, adding to teen-agers' confusion about which drinks are most potent.
Novello said she was establishing a task force including officials from the Food and Drug Administration, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and other federal agencies to look at alcohol labeling and other issues.
Teenagers need to be educated about alcohol, alcohol facts need to be precise and clear, she said.
Overall, the survey found that 10.6 million of the nation's 20.7 million students in grades seven through 12 drink. Eight million drink weekly and 5.4 million have binged on occasion.

Complexity of life leading couples to delay nuptials

WASHINGTON — Americans are waiting longer and longer to get married these days, the Census Bureau said Thursday. In fact, the average first-time bride is older than at any time in the last century.
Postponing nuptials is one way to cope with the increasing complexity of American life.
Men typically were just over 26 years old when they first married and women were nearly 24, the bureau found in a survey last year. Twenty years ago, men on average were a little over 23 when they tied the knot for the first time, women were nudging 21.
The oldest grooms first married in 1989 at the age of 26.2 — only a fraction older than the average marrying age of 26.1 in both 1990 and 1990.
The survey also found the proportion of

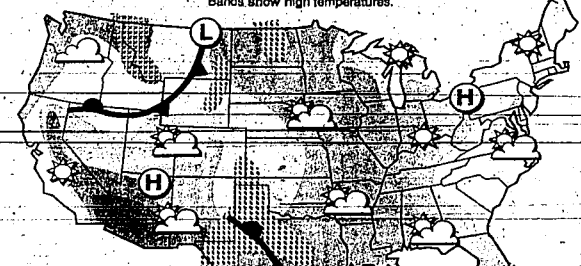
women in their early 30s who had never walked down the aisle nearly tripled from 6 percent in 1970 to 16 percent in 1990.
People are delaying marriage in part because their lives have become more entangled with school, career and other things, said Martha Farnsworth Riche, a sociologist with the Population Research Bureau, a Washington research group.
"All the job growth in well-paying jobs is in jobs that require more education," she said. "Right now, roughly one in two high-school graduates goes on to college."
People also put off marriage because nowadays men and women are both planning careers, and those plans sometimes conflict. "It's just harder to schedule a getting-together," Riche said.
The Census Bureau started compiling statistics on the average age of first marriage in 1890, when men averaged 26 and women 22, when most people farmed, a couple didn't get married until they could afford to buy a house.
But as people moved from farms into cities, they struggled off that custom and began marrying younger and younger.

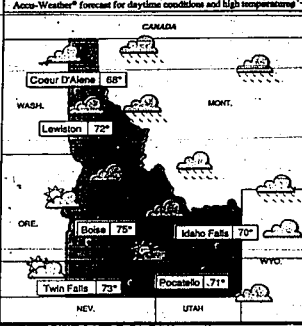

The National Weather Service in Boise says a slow moving low pressure center over Oregon sent bands of moisture across the region Thursday. These bands of moisture were producing showers and thundershowers over most of Idaho. This center was expected to move slowly to the east on Friday for some gradual improvement. But the system may hang around for another day or so. A flood watch was issued for the Henry's Fork near Rexburg. The Henry's Fork was slowly rising to 8.5 feet at noon and flood stage is 9.0 feet. But even at 9.0 feet, no significant damage was expected. Afternoon temperatures around the state were in the 60s and 70s, except locally in the 50s over the north. President shed tears before war

ATLANTA (AP) — President Bush preached a gospel of conservative-political causes to Southern Baptists on Thursday and tearfully recalled weeping in prayer for the American people in the Persian Gulf. Bush won thunderous applause as he deviated from his prepared speech and spoke emotionally about praying with his wife Barbara at Camp David before the start of the war.

It was an extraordinary disclosure by Bush, who shuns personal revelations and guards against attempts by others to analyze him.

"For me, prayer has always been important but quite personal," Bush told thousands attending the annual convention of Southern Baptists, who constitute America's largest Protestant denomination and among its most conservative.

"You know us Episcopalians," he joked.

"The president became anxious," said one of the attendees. "And like a lot of people I've worried a little bit about shedding tears in public, or the emotion of it. But as Barbara and I prayed at Camp David before the air war began, we were thinking about those young men and women overseas."

His voice cracked as he recalled, "I had the tears start down my cheeks. And our minister smiled back. And I no longer worried how I looked to others."

The audience responded with applause and Bush brushed away new tears, confessing, "Here we go."

Resuming his remarks, Bush said: "And I think that like others — a lot of others who had positions of responsibility in sending someone else's kid to war — we realized that in prayer what matters is how it might have seemed to God."

The fundamentalist-dominated convention was the perfect audience for Bush's remarks. Patriotism has been a central theme of the three-day gathering.

Before Bush's speech, the delegates adopted a resolution giving thanks for Operation/Desert Storm and saluting Bush for his role in the war.

Ticking off a litany of conservative issues, Bush renewed his call for a constitutional amendment to permit voluntary prayer in public school, as well as a ban on federally funding for abortions except when a mother's life is endangered.

Bush also nationally supported abortions in cases of rape or incest, but not federal funding.

Financial columnist Sylvia Porter, 77, dies

POUND RIDGE, N.Y. (AP) — Sylvia Porter, a financial reporter and columnist since 1935, died Wednesday at her home in Pound Ridge. She was 77.

Miss Porter died of complications from emphysema, said her husband, James Fox.

Miss Porter's syndicated column on personal finance appeared in The Times-News and in other newspapers and a national weekly. The column, titled simply "Sylvia Porter," had some 40,000,000 readers in 450 newspapers around the world.

Her 1975 book, Sylvia Porter's Money Book, sold more than 1 million copies. A second edition was published in 1980.

Last year she published "Sylvia Porter's Your Finances in the 1990s," and "Planning Your Retirement" is scheduled for publication.

Considered — by many — America's most widely read economic reporter, Miss Porter had to overcome many barriers in a traditionally male-dominated field.

Early in her career, she used the byline S.F. Porter to conceal that she was a woman.

Porter was a freshman at Columbia College in 1917, studying English literature and history when the stock market crashed in 1929. Stunned by her parents' \$30,000 loss, she switched her major to economics.

For the beginning, Porter had a talent for turning the gobbledygook of economics into readable, straightforward and sometimes humorous prose.

She was hired at the New York Post in 1935 to write an occasional financial column and soon had a regular Wall Street beat.

Her first book, "How to Make Money in Government Bonds," published in 1939, was recommended both to students and investors.

In 1942, one year after her second book received favorable reviews, the Post decided to consider her gender an asset and changed her byline to Sylvia F.

Besides her husband, Porter is survived by her daughter, Cris of Norway, Maine; a stepson, Sumner Collins, a nephew and several grandsons. A memorial service will be held in Pound Ridge and Manhattan at later dates, her husband said.

Pentagon lifts wraps on stealth missile

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon said Thursday that it is developing a radar-evading cruise missile that can be launched from the grooves of a bomber plane, including the B-2 stealth bomber.

The cost of developing, testing and producing the program's 8,650 missiles is \$1.5 billion, Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams told reporters. That puts the cost of each missile at about \$1.7 million.

Although the program has been underway since 1986, all information about the missile, which will have a conventional warhead, has been classified.

The stealth missile is designed to be used by the Army, the Navy and the Air Force to hit high-priority targets such as airfields, aircraft carriers, missile launchers, command and communications bunkers, ships, tanks or other armored vehicles, Williams said.

Williams said the secrecy was due to the military's concern that the characteristics, which include the weapon's design and construction materials that help it evade enemy radar.

The high cost of such techniques has fueled the debate in Congress over other weapons systems. In particular, the Air Force has the administration wants to buy 75 of the aircraft, at \$860 million each. The House has approved a fiscal 1992 military budget that would stop production at 15 bombers.

The newly disclosed missile is formally known as the Tri-Service Standoff Attack Missile, or TSSAM.

"Standoff" means that the plane launching the missile may be firing miles from the target, offering additional protection.

The capability "significantly enhances the survivability of launch platforms," says a stealth feature of the missile, allowing it to penetrate enemy air defenses as it navigates to and attacks its intended targets, an Air Force statement said.

The preliminary sketch of the weapon was made available in weights 2,300 pounds, and has a range of "over 100 nautical miles."

the case that they were duped into signing loan documents that they did not know were false.

The agency charged the group conspired in 1986 to falsify applications for HUD-insured mortgage loans on four-plexes in Las Vegas. The suit further alleged that Vollmer and Messersmith played an additional role by soliciting investors for whom they were paid \$10,000 apiece.

The investors allegedly paid \$6,000 to \$9,000 apiece to Las Vegas real estate agent Richard Aley, who helped arrange HUD loans to buy the four-plexes. The investors would own 99 percent of the four-plexes with Aley maintaining 1 percent interest and an option to buy out the investors.

The investors were to make about \$600,000 profit apiece if Aley bought back the condominiums, the suit alleges.

The suit also charges the investors signed documents saying they planned to live in the four-plexes, making them eligible for HUD loans up to 97 percent of the mortgage on the four-plexes.

If they had bought the four-plexes pure as investments, they would be eligible for HUD loans of up to only 85 percent of the mortgage.

Vollmer said in October 1989 that the investors planned to use the four-plexes as vacation homes, but when Aley exercised his option to buy the condominiums back, the investors had to take their profits.

Aley had arranged to pay \$10,000 for each of the 24 four-plexes and helped arrange loans of up to \$140,000 for the investors to buy the condominiums, the suit states. Aley then bought the condominiums back.

The suit reports filed this week indicate Aley is the defendant in a federal criminal case.

The investors contend that the company through which Aley bought the four-plexes, Mortgage Inc., is responsible for misinformation on the loan documents that led to the lawsuit. Mortgage Inc. initially filed the suit and then convinced the federal government to take over.

The government's status report states that Vollmer and Messersmith had been scheduled to give depositions in Twin Falls the week of May 20 but that the depositions were postponed in light of the settlement talks.

Vollmer, Messersmith and the other local defendants asked for a continuance of their depositions, and it was denied, the report says. Government and defense lawyers met to discuss a settlement the week of May 13, it says.

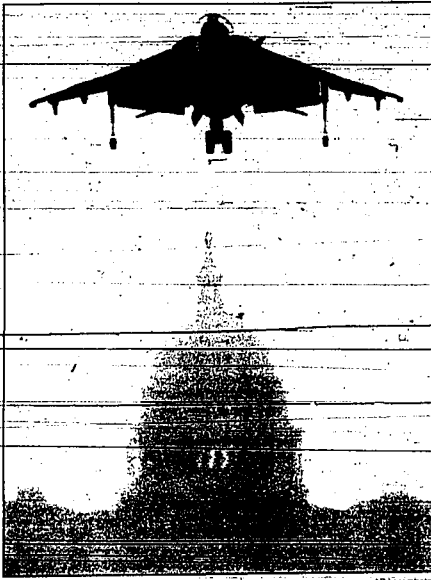

WASHINGTON — No one doubts that Desert Storm, too, 'twas a famous victory.

No one begrudges the victors their parades, although their feet may be getting tired.

On Saturday, a robust Desert Storm parade will move along state-ly Constitution Avenue, with fierce Cobras and Apaches and Strike Eagles, rocket launchers, howitzers and tanks on Kremlinesque display. On Monday, under a blizzard of New York ticker tape and confetti, the troops will march again.

What makes their victory famous is its one-sidedness and, maybe, its consequences. Maybe from it will emerge, as advertised, a world order in which nations can't occupy neighbors on a whim and a dare.

But the parades precede that sort of victory. The new world still looks like the old world, disorderly.

In parades, there's no place for questions, no floats for ambiguities, no call for doubtfulness.

No defeated bands of Kurds or Shiites will join the line of march, their futures more fearful than before the war.

Analysis

No black carbon clouds hang over America, either, as a reminder of the awful environmental damage that Saddam Hussein caused in his spiteful retreat from Kuwait. His oil fires still burn, a mad monument, their ultimate consequences not known but surely not good.

No banner will be unfurled in this parade to recall that Saddam survives.

President Bush compared him to Hitler and his invasion of Kuwait to Hitler's unchecked absorption of neighboring democratic Czechoslovakia on the eve of World War II.

But when Hitlerism was vanquished 46 years ago, so was Hitler.

This war ended with Kuwait liberated but Saddam in power and in command of an army strong enough to smother his emboldened-home-grown enemies.

And the toll of this war is still uncalculated.

Americans know what price they paid. The message went to the homes of 266 servicemen and women, of whom 145 died in combat and the others in accidents. Other coalition allies lost 77.

The Defense Department says it will make no attempt to estimate how many Iraqis died and from what causes.

The 9-cent stamp features the Vietnam War service medal, authorized in March for troops serving in the war.

About 400 million stamps will be printed and will go on sale in early July, the Postal Service said Thursday.

Black student refuses honor

ATLANTA (AP) — A federal judge ruled Thursday that a black senior and his white classmate should share the title of valedictorian at a high school where the dispute over the top graduate has heightened racial tensions.

But the black student said he would refuse to speak at Friday night's ceremony for Newton County High School.

"I refuse to share in what I feel is an injustice," Johnathan Henderson, 18, told reporters after the judge's ruling. He said he didn't believe the decision was "right or fair. I worked hard for this award and I deserve it."

Henderson said he will attend the graduation in Covington, about 30 miles southeast of Atlanta, but other black students said they will boycott graduation if Henderson is not the valedictorian.

U.S. District Judge Marvin H. Shoob said Henderson and C. Thomas Allgood III should share the honor when they graduate.

Allgood, 17, who is white, had completed a slightly higher grade-point average than Henderson. But before transferring to the school, he had earned some of his grades at a private school whose accreditation is in dispute.

Astronauts may have to step outside to fix door

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA told Columbia's astronauts Thursday they may have to make an emergency spacewalk as early as this weekend to fix a loose seal on the space shuttle's cargo bay doors.

A special team of engineers was conducting tests to determine whether the flapping weatherstripping will prevent the doors from closing tightly at the end of the mission.

"We have a lot of good folks working on that, and we're hopeful we can clear-it-by-analysis. If we can't, there's a possibility" of a spacewalk

to replace or remove the twisted seal, Mission Control's Jan Davis said.

Davis told shuttle commander Bryan O'Connor that a spacewalk, if deemed necessary, would not occur before Saturday and would be scheduled so as to have minimal impact on the medical research being conducted by the astronauts.

Two of the seven astronauts — Tamara Jernigan and James Bagian — are trained to perform spacewalking repairs, including manual closing of the two cargo bay doors. Bagian, a physician, is one of four medical specialists on board who are conducting blood tests and other experiments.

The 60-foot-long cargo bay doors must be closed tightly for Columbia to safely make the fiery re-entry through the atmosphere on June 14, after a nine-day mission. Otherwise, the ship could burn up.

Television images sent down shortly after Columbia reached orbit Wednesday showed two crooked strips of reinforced rubber protruding from the edge of the doors. Several white blankets of insulation also came loose in the payload bay, and NASA flight director Randy Stone said the two problems were probably related, possibly caused by the rush

of trapped cargo bay air into the vacuum of space.

"It's all part of that same phenomenon that's disturbing those blankets back there," Stone said.

Official: Mideast arms sales will proceed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration will soon proceed with billions of dollars worth of new weapons sales to the Middle East, a senior State Department official said Thursday.

The sales will be proposed as the world's five largest arms suppliers — the United States, the Soviet Union, China, France and Great Britain — plan a Paris meeting to discuss establishing new mecha-

nisms for restraining conventional arms sales.

But the official, Under Secretary of State Reginald Bartholomew, said the sales aren't at odds with President Bush's goal of halting proliferation of all kinds of weapons in the region.

Bush's plan "is not aimed at preventing peaceful nations from having the ability to defend them-

selves," Bartholomew said at a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing. "It is not aimed at stopping the international transfer of arms."

Rather, he said, the arms-control effort seeks "to ensure that sales that do take place are responsible" and "help our friends meet their legitimate defense and security needs."

Veto-vulnerable bill could be Bush victory

WASHINGTON—House Democrats managed to pass their civil rights bill Wednesday, but the White House claimed a political victory on the issue, which is expected to be used against the Democrats in the 1992 election.

The 1991 Civil Rights Bill was approved and sent to the Senate on a vote of 273-158, more than a dozen votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to override the veto Bush has promised.

In its inception, the bill was designed to reverse a series of recent Supreme Court decisions that made it harder for employees to win discrimination cases.

But the lawyerly nature of the legislation was swamped by fierce rhetoric from the White House and a ferocious debate on Capitol Hill.

Bush was heartened by Wednesday's outcome. "The vote indicates strong support for sustaining a presidential veto," said White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater.

In the end, the Democrats moved no closer to dealing with the knotty problems of race, rights and fairness that have dogged their party for a generation.

They fear that Republicans will continue to define the legislation as "a quota bill" and the Democratic Party as the instrument of special interests and the civil rights lobby.

"The average white American believes civil rights legislation is preference legislation," said Rep. Vin Weber, R-Minn., and many Democrats share his assessment.

They believe that Republican success in five of the past six presidential elections can be tied in part to successful manipulation of racial fears, from Richard M. Nixon's Southern strategy to Ronald Reagan's welfare queens to George Bush's use of prison furloughs and convicted rapist Willie Horton as a wedge issue in 1988.

House Approved Civil Rights Bill

Here at a glance are key provisions of the Democrats' civil rights bill approved Wednesday by the House.

- Reverse six 1989 Supreme Court decisions that made it harder for women and minorities to win job-discrimination lawsuits against employers.
- Return to employers named in so-called "disparate impact" job-bias suits the burden of proving that employment practices with allegedly discriminatory results were based on "business necessity."
- Require employers named in such suits to prove that disputed hiring practices had a "significant and manifest" relationship to the prospects of employees for success in the workplace.
- Allow women, the disabled and religious minorities to collect damages in job bias cases, but limit punitive damages to \$150,000 or an amount equal to the compensatory damages, whichever is greater. Racial discrimination victims would remain eligible for unlimited damages under a separate law.
- Declare hiring according to racial quotas to be an unlawful employment practice.
- Apply U.S. civil rights laws to foreign branches of American companies.

Analysis

Despite continuing Democratic electoral success at the congressional and state levels, increasing numbers of Democrats believe that they are perceived as the party of the federal highway, desegregation busing, affirmative action programs and a host of issues many white voters view as unfair and detrimental to their interests.

In the case of this year's civil rights bill, Democrats spent months crafting an anti-discrimination bill that would garner enough bipartisan support to override a presidential veto.

The bill would formally outlaw job quotas, which is the practice of hiring and promoting according to fixed numbers or percentages based on race, sex or other characteristics.

Using sharp, partisan language, Bush countered that the Democratic bill would force employers to adopt

quotas to avoid costly litigation.

The 273 votes for final passage included 22 cast by Republicans, but the Democrats managed only to maintain the level of support they achieved on a similar bill that was successfully vetoed a year ago.

Wednesday's total forced Democratic leaders to insist that the vote is only the first step in a legislative process that now moves to the Senate and eventually into a House-Senate conference before going to the White House.

"The problem in the Senate," said a House Democrat who reluctantly voted for the bill, "is that there are a number of Democrats who don't want to go near what they see as a form of political suicide."

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said Wednesday: "I believe that we can carry the message to the public when we have to do so in an election. However, the bill was not conceived or written; nor is it being passed, as a political exercise."

But Democratic discomfort over the issue was evident in the remarks of Rep. William D. Ford, D-Mich., chairman of the Education and Labor Committee. When asked about the bill he helped write, Ford chose to talk about the anti-quota aspect of the legislation.

"I'm going home and say I'm voted for a bill that outlaws quotas," he said.

"And that's going to please many white voters in my district in suburban Detroit."

Recent polling data indicate that questions of race and preferential treatment are on the minds of voters, black and white.

A CNN/Time magazine poll in late April found that 77 percent of whites questioned and 49 percent of blacks thought "affirmative action" programs for blacks sometimes discriminate against whites.

In a Newsweek poll the same month, 61 percent of blacks said quotas are necessary for fairness in education and jobs.

Nearly the same percentage of whites, 59 percent, said quotas were unnecessary.

Despite growing concern inside the party, many Democrats believe that the proper approach is to hold Bush and the Republicans accountable for any rhetorical excesses and attempts to polarize voters along racial lines.

"There is a racial center, and George Bush is missing it by far," Jesse Jackson said before the vote. "In the last 50 years, no American president has been quite this bold in the use of race-manipulative language to divide this country."

10 years along: AIDS still mystery

ATLANTA—Ten years after the first mysterious cases were diagnosed in gay men in Los Angeles, the U.S. AIDS epidemic is increasing fastest among heterosexuals and Southerners.

Experts are holding out little hope of improvement in this decade.

The U.S. AIDS case count stands at more than 179,000, with more than 113,000 — six out of 10 — already dead, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

It was 10 years ago this week that the CDC first reported a mysterious cluster of rare pneumonia cases among male homosexuals in Los Angeles. The pneumonia turned out to be a new type of pneumonia called acquired immune deficiency syndrome, which has infected an estimated 10 million people worldwide.

"It's disturbing that the cases are still going up," said Dr. James Curran, director of the CDC's AIDS-HIV division. "We still have not peaked, with 43,000 cases reported last year."

"AIDS has become a major cause of death, with millions of infected people out there, and I don't see us having any serious decline in morbidity and mortality for the next decade."

The number of AIDS cases reported in the United States was up 23 percent last year compared to 1989.

Most AIDS cases have occurred in homosexual men and

abusers of injectable drugs in cities such as New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco. But cases of heterosexually transmitted AIDS were up 41 percent in 1990, while cases among drug-abusing heterosexual men and women were up 24 percent and gay-male cases were up 19 percent.

And AIDS in the South increased by 30 percent, compared with 27 percent in the Northeast, 17 percent in the Midwest and 13 percent in the West.

"That's not surprising," Curran said. "It's a furthering of the trends we've seen in the most recent years."

Curran said there's some comfort that the explosion of AIDS among gay men and drug abusers is at least slowing, compared with the mid-1980s.

He said it was "particularly comforting" to see a decline in the number of AIDS cases related to blood transfusions since 1988.

The World Health Organization estimates that 8 million to 10 million adults around the globe are infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. By the end of this decade, WHO estimates 40 million may be infected. Barring a miracle cure, they may very well be under a death sentence.

"We still want to be optimistic that there may be some exceptions, but it's important that those exceptions not define the rule," he said.

Senate panel says OK to abortion financing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents of the Bush administration at federally funded family planning clinics easily won Senate committee approval Thursday of a bill to lift the restriction.

Democrats were joined by two Republicans in pushing the measure through the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee on a 12-5 vote.

Approval of a similar measure

was expected in a House subcommittee next week.

It was unclear whether opponents of the "big rule" could muster floor majorities large enough to override a promised presidential veto.

"The gag rule is an unfair restriction on the rights of women served by federally funded family planning clinics," said Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass. and the committee chairman.

PMS, not alcohol, considered culprit


FAIRFAX, Va. (AP) — A judge has sided with a woman who says she was suffering from premenstrual syndrome when she used vulgar language and kicked a state trooper who charged her with drunken driving.

Dr. Geraldine Richter, an orthopedic surgeon, said she had four glasses of wine at a party but wasn't drunk when she was stopped last year. She contended that PMS, not alcohol, caused her to react violently when the trooper said her three children, who were in the car with her, might be placed in protective custody.

Market still sputters over uncertainty of interest rates, economy

NEW YORK — The stock market resumed on the defensive Thursday as traders gauged the outlook for interest rates and the economy. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks fell 10.51 to 2,994.86, extending its losses over the past three sessions to 40.47 points.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by 9 to 7 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 673 up, 870 down and 508 unchanged.

Volumes on the floor of the Big Board came to 168.26 million shares, down from 186.56 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 204.55 million shares.

Standard market interest rates rose extending a recent advance that has accompanied signs of a budding recovery from the recession. Prices of long-term Treasury bonds fell about 54 for each \$1,000 in face value, increasing their yields to the 8.42 percent-8.46 percent range.

Analysts say the economic news of late has appeared to bode well for growth and some improvement in corporate profits.

But many traders are apparently questioning whether rising long-term interest rates might not act as a drag on the progress of the recovery, and dampen demand for stocks. This debate is expected to continue this morning as the Labor Department issues its

monthly report on employment. Unless the data show an unexpected degree of weakness in the job market, most observers believe there is little chance that the Federal Reserve will relax its credit policy further any time soon.

Losers among the blue chips included International Business Machines, down 1/4 at 103; and Merck, down 1/8 at 114 1/4.

Endangered Species Act invites wrong decisions

There's a story in Montana about a hunter who came nose-to-nose with a grizzly bear near Glacier National Park.

The fellow beat a quick retreat, but the bear was insistent about making his acquaintance. So he shot the bruin at point-blank range and turned himself in at the local ranger station.

A few days later, the hunter found himself in federal court, being arraigned on a charge of killing the animal in violation of the Endangered Species Act.

The judge asked for his plea, and the fellow admitted his guilt. So the judge asked him why he did it.

"Your honor," he said. "When that bear came after me, I was the endangered species."

That's the problem with the Endangered Species Act. It's often difficult to tell the victims from the perpetrators.

Is the northern spotted owl more endangered than the unemployed lumbermen of the Willamette Valley? Are five species of salmon currently being considered for the list worth the collapse of the Northwest's economy if the dams of the Columbia River are shut down?

Should decisions about saving five species of mollusks in the Bliss stretch of the Middle Snake River hinge solely on the well-being of the snails?

We don't think so. The environmentalists and their allies in the federal bureaucracy disagree.

The genius of the Endangered Species Act was that it made the survival of a species the writer's signature and plants a priority, a matter of national policy. That's also the problem.

Under the law, the decision of whether to list a species as endangered or threatened is an administrative one, made by one of two federal agencies. The law requires that they take into account the economic consequences of saving a species, but the people who make those decisions are by and large biologists. They're not equipped to weigh the survival of a species against the cost of saving

it, nor are they inclined to do so.

Does it require halting a dam project in its tracks to save the snail darter? It's as good as done.

Would the dam have created jobs, made possible new wildlife sanctuaries or recreation opportunities? Would the money made available from such a project — called mitigation by utility regulators — make it possible to promote the survival of other species?

Under the law, those questions are irrelevant. The federal government is required to save threatened and endangered species at any cost.

It would be wonderful if we could assure the survival of the Idaho sockeye salmon and the Bliss valenta snail by simply reversing the actions of man that put those species in jeopardy in the first place. But it's obvious to all but the most extreme environmentalists that we can't.

What we can do is a better job of managing the demands on those resources.

The Endangered Species Act as it is written is an invitation to make all the wrong decisions for all the right reasons. We agree with Oregon Sen. Mark Hatfield that it should be amended when it comes up for renewal next year.

Hatfield, one of the act's most consistent supporters until the spotted owl debate polarized his home state, is right when he says there is growing public disenchantment with "the radical fringe element of the environmental community that feels they don't have to compromise."

Few, if any, environmentalists are using the act for broader goals, and they've admitted as much.

In so doing, they are alienating their natural allies. There is widespread and deep sentiment in the Pacific Northwest for protecting the environment, and a lot of wage-earners in the region don't understand why they are suddenly nature's enemies.

The losers, in the long run, will be the species that need protection. It's time to bring the Endangered Species Act back to earth.

Idaho fares well in transportation bill

It took months of long hours and hard work, but the new transportation reauthorization bill is out of committee and will soon be up for consideration on the Senate floor. It was worth all the work in committee, for Idaho fares well in the bill.

I have always been concerned in making sure the Highway Trust Fund, which pays for the federal-aid transportation program, is spent as efficiently as possible. This fund is built on the user-fee principle, whereby transportation needs are met by the fuel taxes paid by the people of Idaho and the nation. Our taxpayers deserve to get the "biggest bang for the buck" possible, a sound return on their investment in our transportation system.

The Surface Transportation Efficiency Act, S. 965, calls for returning about \$92 billion back to the states over the next five years. Of that amount, Idaho stands to get about \$631 million over the same five-year period. That represents an increase of about \$85 million more for Idaho than the state received in the last highway bill, which itself was a record amount.

A critical component of this year's bill is the element of flexibility for states to determine their own transportation priorities. Now that the interstate highway system is virtually complete, more funds will be available for other projects as determined by the Idaho Transportation Department.

This flexibility for Idaho to analyze their own transportation needs, rather than having to deal with burdensome federal strings, is a cornerstone of the STEA I. I fought hard for and it is supported by Idaho Transportation Department Director Kermit Kleberer.

But not everyone is in full support of this bill. In fact, before the bill was passed by the Environment and Public Works Committee, an effort was made to amend it to benefit wealthy urban states to the detriment of rural states like Idaho. The battle was between so-called "donor" and "donee" states.

The STEA continues the current minimum allocation of 85 cents per dollar contributed to the Highway Trust Fund by each state. Sen. Bob Graham, D-Fla., proposed an amendment that would have changed the formula for allocating about 50 percent of the federal-aid program. This amendment would have meant a substantial loss to Idaho and other Western states where most of our lands are owned by the government.

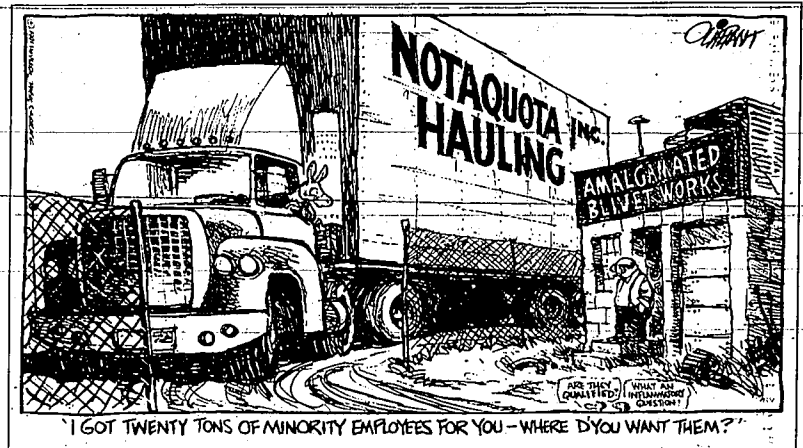
Fortunately, most of my colleagues on the committee agreed that states like Idaho play a crucial role in commerce and de-

velope and, because of our limited ability to fund highways, more wealthy states should contribute to a national transportation system and support more rural states. We won that battle in committee, but I expect Sen. Graham and others to take up the fight again when the bill goes before the full Senate.

While we Idaho will have a long way to go in gaining final passage of the bill, I believe it a winner in terms of record federal transportation funding and the ability for the state to make their own decisions on how to spend those funds. These two factors, combined with the fact that this is a five-year transportation program reauthorization, mean long-term stability for Idaho.

This will be helpful to business and industry leaders who depend on our bridges, roads and highways to earn a living. Although it's almost impossible to create a bill that would meet all of Idaho's transportation needs, the STEA does go a long way. And those most affected by transportation in Idaho will have the opportunity to participate at the state level in the decisions about how to spend federal-aid funds most efficiently.

Labor, not LaRocco owes explanation

Congressman Larry LaRocco has no reason to apologize to Idaho labor leaders for refusing to erect protectionist barriers to free trade with Mexico. These labor leaders should explain to their members why they continue to cling to policies that drive prices higher and destroy more American jobs than are lost to foreign competitors.

LaRocco is in hot water with his union friends for supporting the so-called fast-track talks toward a free-trade agreement between the United States and Mexico. Labor leaders say free trade also frees the export of U.S. farm products to those with lower labor costs.

And it does. But the lower prices that result leave more money in the pockets of domestic consumers, which creates additional jobs at home.

If that sounds coldly clinical, consider the alternative: protectionist efforts to preserve jobs in a particular industry at home. Take the steel industry, for example. When the government put import quotas on steel, domestic steel became so expensive the companies that use it for their own products — automobile makers, say — were put at a competitive disadvantage in marketing their cars.

That hurt this nation's auto industry and helped put thousands of American laborers out of work.

Yet Jim Kerns, president of the Idaho AFL-CIO, talks as if his issue pits Wall Street against working people. Despite labor's justified suspicion that its welfare

matters little to America's management elite, the fact remains that in some spheres, what's good for one is good for the other.

Trade is one of those spheres. Labor's opposition to free trade is another example of its tendency to overlook tomorrow's job market while remaining fixed on today's. That tunnel vision can only make organized labor less relevant to workers in a changing economy.

The economy of this nation, and of the world, is changing more rapidly each year than in kinder days. The demands for labor will occur whether we like it or not, whether this country takes a lead in global trade or lags behind.

Lagging behind will just cost more, to everyone.

Fundamentalist group sees siege as strength

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — The Islamic Salvation Front claims 3 million active members, including a fringe of intellectuals, but gets its broad-based support from merchants and unskilled or unemployed youth.

The front was born in the aftermath of bloody 1988 riots, almost immediately evolved into a powerful force, luring poor Algerians with promises of a better life based on strict piety.

The movement came to life after the adoption of a new constitution permitting political parties in this former one-party Marxist-Socialist state.

It was officially recognized in September 1990, and within months overwhelmingly won municipal elections in Algeria's first multiparty vote.

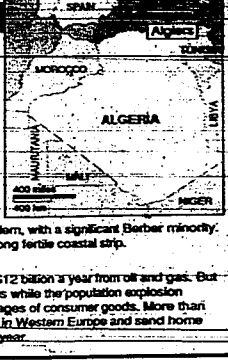
The victory, shook the governing National Liberation Front, which has held all parliamentary seats since Algeria became a nation in 1962, and caused concern in other North African nations and in France, where millions of Algerians reside.

Led by philosophy professor Abassi Madani, the primarily Sunni Muslim front has worked ardently

Synthesizers of the front have been known to use intimidation tactics or even force to close down music halls and chase unskilled women from streets.

A social force whose speedy ascent defied the vast machinery of the ruling party, the front has nevertheless seen a warning in support amid reports of divisions within its hierarchy.

Once able to rally hundreds of thousands of marchers, it gathered only tens of thousands for the protests of recent days.

But front sources said they considered the proclamation of a state of emergency Tuesday by the government and the government's postponement of June 27 legislative elections, as a victory.

The front had been pressing for early presidential elections alongside the parliamentary vote and abrogation of new electoral law.

NATO may widen link with Eastern Europe

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — In an initiative described as "the closest thing" to a Western security guarantee for former Warsaw Pact nations, NATO agreed Thursday to widen military and political links with Eastern Europe.

NATO has been careful not to offer alliance membership to East European nations for fear of provoking Moscow.

But some East bloc countries, notably Czechoslovakia, have urged NATO to prevent a security vacuum in post-Cold War Europe.

In a statement issued Thursday, NATO foreign ministers said "the consolidation and preservation of democratic societies" are "of direct and material concern to us." Officials said the allies referred to all European states.

The ministers also warned they would not accept "any form of coercion or intimidation" aimed at stifling democracy across Europe.

A Dutch diplomat said the initiative was "the closest thing NATO could do to offering a security guarantee" for the members of the now-defunct Warsaw Pact.

Officials said the initiative was not a step toward NATO membership for Eastern bloc countries. Instead, said a U.S. official, the allies were sending "a message to these countries that they are not in a vacuum" after the collapse of the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact.

"Although none of the Eastern European nations will be members of NATO, we do not want to slam the door," a senior British official said.

Algeria's troubles stem from Islam's political rise

Since the Iranian revolution triumphed in 1979, Islam has become an increasingly powerful political force in the world.

Fundamentalist extremists were responsible for the assassination of Egypt's President Anwar Sadat in 1981 and the kidnapping of Western hostages in Lebanon, and have been involved in bloody confrontations as they vie for the political power.

Here is a brief chronological look

at developments involving Islamic political groups in recent years:

1988:
In Egypt, fundamentalists belonging to the extremist Muslim group known as the Islamic Brotherhood, at odds over how to implement Islamic law, clash among themselves and attack police, killing one officer and leaving about 100 people injured.

1989:
Twenty members of the Muslim Brotherhood win the largest bloc in the 80-man Parliament in Jordan's first national elections since 1967.

1990:
In Algeria, the Islamic Salvation Front scores a major victory in municipal elections, the first multiparty vote since the country's independence in 1962.

1991:
February: Military authorities in Turkey force 17 air force officers to retire for engaging in Muslim fundamentalist activities. Turkish officials have been increasingly concerned by the spread of Islamic fundamentalism.

April: In Casablanca, Morocco, a radical student is killed April 18 when police with clubs disperse a crowd protesting the dismissal of fundamentalist student leaders. Thousands of fundamentalists march through Casablanca on May 1 in a demonstration organized by two labor unions.

May: The Pakistani parliament passes legislation to make the Muslim holy book the supreme law of Pakistan and bring all aspects of life under the tenets of Islam. Under it, the shariat, or Islamic law, is to supersede civil legislation.

June 5: President Chadli Bendjedid of Algeria announces what would have been the country's first multiparty parliament elections, declaring a state of emergency in response to nearly two weeks of protests by the Islamic Salvation Front followers.

Major suggests inviting Gorbachev to London

LONDON (AP) — Britain on Thursday proposed that Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev be invited to London after a summit of the world's most powerful economies to make his pitch for massive aid from the West.

Prime Minister John Major's office said messages went out Thursday to the other participating countries suggesting a date immediately after their July 15-17 summit.

Gorbachev has been pressing for an invitation to plead his case before the leaders of the world's top industrialized economies.

Those countries make up the so-called Group of Seven — Britain, the United States, Germany, France, Japan, Canada and Italy.

Support has been growing among Western leaders for Gorbachev to attend their summit. But they also have tried to dispel any expectations that the economic powers would provide a huge infusion of aid at this time.

Gorbachev says his reforms could fall without financial help.

A Downing Street spokesman said Major had received no responses to his proposal by late Thursday.

But earlier in the day, German Chancellor Helmut Kohl spoke as if the invitation had already been extended and accepted.

"I welcome the fact that Gorbachev will come to London," Kohl said, departing from the text of a speech before the German Parliament.

Major's office would not say what arrangements were proposed or whether Gorbachev would meet directly with the leaders of the other nations.

Iraqis make strides in repairing devastation, Gulf War damages

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A massive rebuilding effort is rapidly restoring bridges, power and public services to central Iraq only three months after allied forces ended the intensive bombing campaign in the Gulf War.

The crusade has relied on ingenuity, prodigious work, huge stocks of prewar spare parts and what may be at least a few materials looted from Kuwait.

Devastated refineries are producing enough gasoline to cause traffic jams in downtown Baghdad. Local phone service is slowly being restored. Shattered power plants are serving much of the country — although with periodic power cuts.

The Doura Refinery in south Baghdad, bombed Jan. 19 and Feb. 7, has been producing its "prewar" level of 92,000 barrels of fuel and other refined products daily since May 6, deputy general manager Moufak Ibrahim said on Thursday.

At one unit, a web of newly installed pipes encased in glowing aluminum contained reinstalled pump motors, some of which Ibrahim said were thrown 50 yards by bomb blasts.

Other units remain a mass of charred-and-twisted metal. Workers with cranes and bulldozers clear away ruined pipes and shattered concrete.

Ibrahim said workers had toiled

12 hours a day, seven days a week restoring the plant. He said he had not had a day off in almost five months.

About two miles away, the camouflage-painted Doura Power Station, demolished by bombs and missiles on Jan. 18, is producing 160 kilowatts of power — one-quarter its prewar capacity.

Workers have cleared away the rubble and twisted wires that carpeted the plant's floors in early March. Huge holes blasted by missiles are being repaired. Pillars damaged by shrapnel are being braced in steel and coated with fresh concrete.

Just beyond the turbine room, bricklayers are rebuilding the administration room where one German and six British hostages were held in human shields before being released in late 1990, said Fayik Mustafa, the manager of the reconstruction project.

If the hostages had been held through the war, he said, "believe me, nothing would have happened." As it was, the room was bypassed by a missile.

Mustafa said workmen had relied on spare stocks for much of the repairs and improvised to overcome a shortage of parts caused by the U.N. embargo. He pointed to patched shrapnel holes in the side of the giant German turbine now operating.

"If I tell you we don't need help, it's not true," he said.

Some foreign observers with contacts in Iraq said items taken from Kuwait may have been used in some of the rebuilding, along with the massive stocks Iraq built up during its 1980-88 war with Iran.

At the Doura refinery, reporters saw several arc-welding machines bearing the letters "KNPC," the initials of the Kuwait National Petroleum Co.

Ibrahim said the machines were "hired from the market... From where they (local contractors) have taken them, that's not my business."

Bridges and roads are also high priorities in Iraq's rebuilding mission.

Transport Minister Mahmoud Diab Al-Ahmed vowed in an interview on Thursday to rebuild by year's end the main Jumburiyah Bridge over the Tigris River in downtown Baghdad. Allied forces knocked the bridge out in the early bombing campaign.

Workers have already knocked down several vast, damaged sections and gathered huge new steel girders nearby.

Al-Ahmed said 124 bridges were damaged during the war. His ministry has already replaced 26 bridges and is rebuilding 52 more, he said.

The road from Jordan to Baghdad once again is a sleek six-lane expressway.

U.N. officials: U.S. complaint is exaggerated

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Bush administration complaints that Iraq is diverting emergency food supplies are exaggerated, the United Nations said Thursday.

"The problem has been dramatically out of proportion," said U.N. spokesman Francois Giuliani, citing information from the office of Prince Sadruddin Aga Khan, who is in charge of U.N. relief operations in the Persian Gulf.

Giuliani said he had been informed that some food had been diverted, but "once the World Food Program pointed this out, the (Iraqi) government replenished what had been taken, and there was no major problem."

The World Food Program is a U.N.-administered relief agency based in Rome.

The program is shipping tons of food to Iraq to be used for emergency relief supplies for people displaced by the Gulf War, including Shiite Muslims and Kurds.

The Bush administration said Wednesday that the Baghdad government was diverting emergency food supplies, and that it intended to send to Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit.

We don't think so. The environmentalists and their allies in the federal bureaucracy disagree.

The genius of the Endangered Species Act was that it made the survival of threatened animals, birds and plants a priority, a matter of national policy. That's also the problem.

Under the law, the decision of whether to list a species as endangered or threatened is an administrative one, made by one of two federal agencies. The law requires that they take into account the economic consequences of saving a species, but the people who make those decisions are by and large biologists. They're not equipped to weigh the survival of a species against the cost of saving

it, nor are they inclined to do so. Does it require halting a dam project in its tracks? to save the snail darter? It's as good as done.

Would the dam have created jobs, made possible new wildlife sanctuaries, of recreation opportunities? Would the money made available from such a project — called mitigation by utility regulators — make it possible to promote the survival of other species?

Under the law, those questions are irrelevant. The federal government is required to save threatened and endangered species at any cost.

It would be wonderful if we could assure the survival of the Idaho sockeye salmon and the Bliss valdava snail by simply reversing the actions of man that put those species in jeopardy in the first place. But it's obvious to all but the most extreme environmentalists that we can't.

What we can do is a better job of managing the demands on those resources.

The Endangered Species Act as it is written is an invitation to make all the wrong decisions for all the right reasons. We agree with Oregon Sen. Mark Hatfield that it should be amended when it comes up for renewal next year.

Hatfield, one of the act's most consistent supporters until the spotted owl debate polarized his home state, is right when he says there is growing public disenchantment with "the national fringe element of the environmental community that feels they don't have to compromise."

Fact is, environmentalists are using the act for broader goals, and they've admitted as much.

In so doing, they are alienating their natural allies. There is widespread and deep sentiment in the Pacific Northwest for protecting the environment, and a lot of wage-earners in the region don't understand why they are suddenly nature's enemies.

The losers, in the long run, will be the species that need protection. It's time to bring the Endangered Species Act back to earth.

Idaho fares well in transportation bill

It took months of long hours and hard work, but the new transportation reauthorization bill is out of committee and will soon be up for consideration of the Senate floor. It was worth all the work in committee, for Idaho fares well in the bill.

I have always been concerned in making sure the Highway Trust Fund, which pays for the federal-aid transportation program, is spent as efficiently as possible. The fund is built on the user-fee principle, whereby transportation needs are met by the fuel taxes paid by the people of Idaho and the nation. Our taxpayers deserve to get the "biggest bang for the buck" possible, a sound return on their investment in our transportation system.

The Surface Transportation Efficiency Act, S. 965, calls for returning about \$92 billion back to the states over the next five years. Of that amount, Idaho stands to get about \$631 million over the same five-year period. That represents an increase of about \$85 million more for Idaho than the state received in the last highway bill, which itself was a record amount.

A critical component of this year's bill is the element of flexibility for states to determine their own transportation priorities. Now that the interstate highway system is virtually complete, more funds will be available for other projects as determined by the Idaho Transportation Department.

This flexibility for Idaho to analyze their own transportation needs, rather than having to deal with burdensome federal strings, is a cornerstone of the STEA. I fought hard for it and it is supported by Idaho Transportation Department Director Kermit Kiebert.

But not everyone is in full support of this bill. In fact, before the bill was passed by the Environment and Public Works Committee, an effort was made to amend it to benefit wealthy urban states to the detriment of rural states like Idaho. The battle was between so-called "donee" and "donor" states.

The STEA continues the current minimum allocation of 85 cents per dollar contributed to the Highway Trust Fund by each state. Sen. Bob Cramm, D-Ill., proposed an amendment that would have changed the formula for allocating about 50 percent of the federal-aid program. This amendment would have meant a substantial loss to Idaho and other Western states where most of our lands are owned by the government.

Fortunately, most of my colleagues on the committee agreed that states like Idaho play a crucial role in commerce and de-

velop and, because of our limited ability to fund highways, more wealthy states should contribute to a national transportation system and support more rural states. We won that battle in committee, but I expect Sen. Graham and others to take up the fight again when the bill goes before the full Senate.

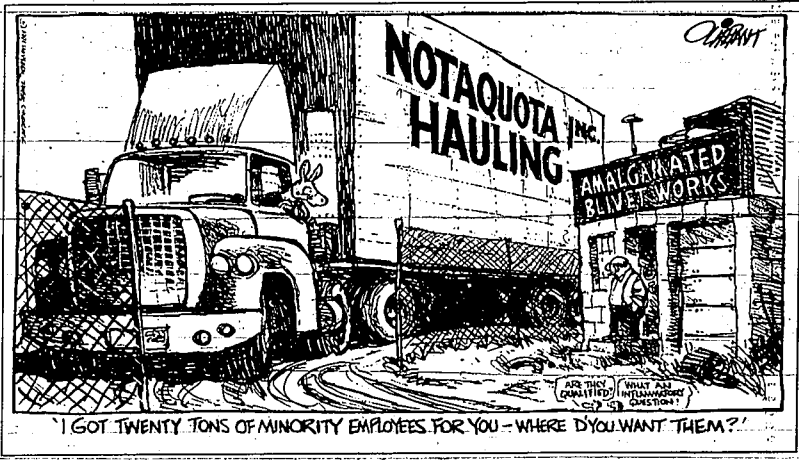
While we still have a long way to go in gaining final passage of the bill, Idaho is a winner in terms of record federal transportation funding and the ability for the state to make their own decisions on how to spend those funds. These two factors, combined with the fact that this is a five-year transportation program reauthorization, mean long-term stability for Idaho.

This will be helpful to business and industry leaders who depend on our bridges, roads and highways to earn a living. Although it's almost impossible to create a bill that would meet all of Idaho's transportation needs, the STEA does go a long way. And those most affected by transportation in Idaho will have the opportunity to participate at the state level in the decisions about how to spend federal-aid funds most efficiently.

Labor, not LaRocco owes explanation

Congressman Larry LaRocco has no reason to apologize to Idaho labor leaders for refusing to help protectionist barriers to free trade with Mexico. Those labor leaders should explain to their members why they continue to cling to policies that drive prices higher and destroy more American jobs than are lost to foreign competitors.

LaRocco is in hot water with his union friends for supporting the so-called fast-track trade toward a free-trade agreement between the United States and Mexico. Labor leaders say free trade also frees the export of jobs from this country to those with lower labor costs.

And it does. But the lower prices that result leave more money in the pockets of domestic consumers, which creates additional jobs at home.

Other views

If that sounds coldly clinical, consider the alternative: protectionist efforts to preserve jobs in a particular industry at home. Take the steel industry, for example. When the government put import quotas on steel, domestic steel became so expensive the companies that use it for their own products — automobile makers, say — were put in a competitive disadvantage in marketing their cars.

That hurt this nation's auto industry and helped put thousands of American laborers out of work.

Yet Jim Kerns, president of the Idaho AFL-CIO, talks as if this issue pits Wall Street against working people. Despite labor's justified suspicion that its welfare

matrons little to America's remaining elite, the fact remains that in some spheres, what's good for one is good for the other.

Trade is one of those spheres. Labor's opposition to free trade is another example of its tendency to overlook tomorrow's job market while remaining fixed on today's. That tunnel vision can only make organized labor less relevant to workers in a changing economy.

The economy of this nation, and of the world, is changing more rapidly each year. The accompanying shifts in the demand for labor will occur whether we like it or not, whether this country takes a lead in global trade or lags behind.

Lagging behind will just cost more, to everyone.

'Invisible' arm causes trouble

Fundamentalist group sees siege as strength

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — The Islamic Salvation Front claims millions of active members, including a fringe of intellectuals, but gets its broad-based support from merchants and disaffected or unemployed youth.

The Front was born in the aftermath of bloody 1988 riots, almost immediately evolved into a powerful force, luring poor Algerians with promises of a better life based on divine precepts.

The movement came to life after the adoption of a new constitution permitting political parties in this former one-party, Marxist-Socialist state.

It was officially recognized in September 1990, and within months overwhelmingly won municipal elections in Algeria's first multiparty vote.

The victory shook the governing National Liberation Front, which has held all parliamentary seats since Algeria became a nation in 1962, and caused concern in other North African nations and in France, where millions of Algerians reside.

ALGERIA is a vast country. Here are some facts and figures on Algeria:

IN THE LAND. On the southern shore of the Mediterranean, it is the second largest African country after the Sudan. Its 919,595-square-mile territory — three times the size of Texas — is mostly uninhabited desert.

THE PEOPLE. Most of the estimated 25.7 million people are Arab and Moslem, with a significant Berber minority. Most live in a narrow, 700-mile-long fertile coastal strip.

THE ECONOMY. Algeria once earned more than \$12 billion a year from oil and gas. But oil prices plummeted in the 1980s while the population explosion continued, causing severe shortages of consumer goods. More than 1 million Algerians live and work in Western Europe, and send home hundreds of millions of dollars a year.

The No. 2 man, Imam Ali Belhadj, speaks in the more radical style of grassroots fundamentalists.

Sympathizers of the Front have been known to use intimidation tactics or even force to close down music halls and chase unveiled women from streets.

In some coastal regions it controls, the Front has forbidden shorts or mixed company on beaches. However, leaders always deny any recourse to violence.

A social force whose speedy ascendancy defied the vast machinery of the ruling party, the Front has nevertheless seen a waning in support amid reports of divisions within its hierarchy.

Once able to rally hundreds of thousands of marchers, it gathered only tens of thousands for the protests of recent days.

But Front sources said they considered the proclamation of a state of emergency Tuesday by the government, and the government's postponement of the 27 legislative elections, as a victory.

The Front had been pressing for early presidential elections along side the parliamentary vote and abrogation of new electoral laws.

NATO may widen link with Eastern Europe

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — In an initiative described as "a crossover thing" to a Western security guarantee for former Warsaw Pact nations, NATO agreed Thursday to widen military and political links with Eastern Europe.

NATO has been careful not to offer alliance membership to East European nations for fear of provoking Moscow.

But some East bloc countries, notably Czechoslovakia, have urged NATO to prevent a security vacuum in post-Cold War Europe.

In a statement issued Thursday, NATO foreign ministers said "the consolidation and preservation of democratic societies" are of direct and material concern to us. Officials said the allies referred to all European states.

The ministers also warned they would not accept "any form of coercion or intimidation" aimed at stifling democracy across Europe.

A Dutch diplomat said the initiative "was the closest thing NATO could do to offering a security guarantee" for the members of the now-defunct Warsaw Pact.

Officials said the initiative was not a step toward NATO membership for Eastern bloc countries. Instead, said a U.S. official, the allies were sending "a message to these countries that they are not in a vacuum" after the collapse of the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact.

"Although none of the Eastern European nations will be members of NATO, we do not want to slam the door," a senior British official said.

Algeria's troubles stem from Islam's political rise

Since the Iranian revolution triumphed in 1979, Islam has become an increasingly powerful political voice in the world.

Fundamentalist extremists were responsible for the assassinations of Egypt's President Anwar Sadat in 1981 and the kidnapping of Western hostages in Lebanon, and have been involved in bloody confrontations as they vie for the political power.

Here is a brief chronological look

at developments involving Islamic political groups in recent years:

1988: In Egypt, fundamentalists belonging to the extremist Muslim group known as Gamaat Islamiya and the moderate Muslim Brotherhood, at odds over how to implement Islamic law, clash among themselves and attack police, killing one officer and leaving about 100 people injured.

1989: Twenty members of the Muslim Brotherhood win the largest bloc in the 80-man Parliament in Jordan's first national elections since 1967.

1990: In Algeria, the Islamic Salvation Front scores a major victory in municipal elections, the first multiparty vote since the country's independence in 1962.

1991: February: Military authorities in Turkey force 17 air force officers to retire for engaging in Muslim fundamentalist activities. Turkish officials have been increasingly concerned

by the spread of Islamic fundamentalism.

April: In Casablanca, Morocco, a medical student is killed April 18 when police with clubs disperse a crowd protesting the dismissal of fundamentalist student leaders. Thousands of fundamentalists march through Casablanca on May 1 in a demonstration organized by two labor unions.

May: The Pakistani parliament passes legislation to make the Muslim holy book the supreme law of Pakistan and bring all aspects of life — from social mores to civil liberties — under the tenets of Islam. Under it, the shariat, or Islamic law, is to supersede civil legislation.

June 5: President Chadli Bendjedid of Algeria postpones what would have been the country's first multiparty parliament elections, declaring a state of emergency in response to nearly two weeks of protests by the Islamic Salvation Front followers.

Major suggests inviting Gorbachev to London

LONDON (AP) — Britain on Thursday proposed that Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev be invited to London after a summit of the world's most powerful economies to make his pitch for massive aid from the West.

Prime Minister John Major's office said messages went out Thursday to the other participating countries suggesting a date immediately after their July 15-17 summit.

Gorbachev has been pressing for an invitation to plead his case before the leaders of the world's top industrialized democracies.

Those countries make up the so-called Group of Seven — Britain, the United States, Germany, France, Japan, Canada and Italy.

Support has been growing among Western leaders for Gorbachev to attend their summit. But they also have tried to dispel any expectations that the economic powers would provide a huge infusion of aid at this time.

Gorbachev says his reforms could fall without financial help.

A Downing Street spokesman said Major had received no responses to his proposal by late Thursday.

But earlier in Kohl spoke at the invitation had already been extended and accepted. "I welcome the fact that Gorbachev will come to London," Kohl said, departing from the text of a speech before the German Parliament.

Major's office would not say what arrangements were proposed, or whether Gorbachev would meet directly with the leaders of the other nations.

Iraqis make strides in repairing devastation, Gulf War damages

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A massive rebuilding effort is rapidly restoring bridges, power and public services to central Iraq only three months after allied forces ended their intensive bombing campaign in the Gulf War.

The curfew has relied on ingenuity. Wrecks of cars, huge stocks of prewar spare parts and what may be at least a few materials looted from Kuwait.

Devastated refineries are producing enough gasoline to cause traffic jams in downtown Baghdad. Local phone service is slowly being restored. Shattered power plants are sending much of the country — although with periodic power cuts.

The Doura refinery in south Baghdad, bombed Jan. 19 and Feb. 1, has been producing its prewar output of 92,000 barrels of fuel and other refined products daily since May 6, deputy general manager Mousafik Ibrahim said on Thursday.

At one unit, a web of newly installed pipes encased in galvanized aluminum connected with reinstalled pump motors, some of which Ibrahim said were thrown 50 yards by bomb blasts.

Other units remain a mass of tangled and twisted metal. Workers with cranes and bulldozers clear away ruined pipes and shattered concrete.

Ibrahim said workers had toiled

12 hours a day, seven days a week restoring the plant. He said he had not had a "day off" in almost five months.

About two miles away, the camouflage-painted Doura Power Station, demolished by bombs and missiles on Jan. 18, is producing 160 kilowatts of power — one-quarter its prewar capacity.

Workers have cleared away the rubble and twisted wires that carpeted the plant's floors in early March. Huge holes, blasted by missiles, are being repaired. Pillars damaged by shrapnel are being trussed in steel and coated with fresh concrete.

Just beyond the turbine room, bricklayers are rebuilding the administration room where one German and six British hostages were held as human shields before being released in late 1990, said Fayik Mustafa, the manager of the reconstruction project.

If the hostages had been held through the war, he said, "believe me, nothing would have happened." As it was, the room was destroyed by a missile.

Mustafa said workmen had relied on spare stocks for much of the parts and equipment to overcome a shortage of parts caused by the U.N. embargo. He pointed to patched shrapnel holes in the side of the giant German turbine now operating.

"If I tell you we don't need help,

it's not true," he said.

Some foreign observers with contacts in Iraq said items taken from Kuwait may have been used in some of the rebuilding, along with the massive stocks Iraq built up during its 1980-88 war with Iran.

At the Doura refinery, reporters saw several arc-welding machines bearing the letters "KNEC" — the initials of the Kuwaiti National Petroleum Co.

Ibrahim said the machines were "hired from the market... From where they (local contractors) have taken them, that's not my business."

Bridges and roads are also high priorities in Iraq's rebuilding mission.

Housing Minister Mahmoud Diab al-Ahmed vowed in an interview on Thursday to rebuild by year's end the main Jumhuriyah Bridge over the Tigris River in downtown Baghdad. Allied forces knocked the bridge out in the early bombing campaign.

Workers have already knocked down several vast, damaged sections and gathered huge new steel girders nearby.

Al-Ahmed said 124 bridges were damaged during the war. His ministry has already replaced 26 bridges and is rebuilding 52 more, he said.

The road from Jordan to Baghdad once again is a stark six-lane expressway.

U.N. officials: U.S. complaint is exaggerated

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Bush administration complaints that Iraq is diverting emergency food supplies are exaggerated, the United Nations said Thursday.

"The numbers have been dramatized out of proportion," said U.N. spokesman Francois Giuliani, citing information from the office of Pritbe Sadruddin Aga Khan, who is in charge of U.N. relief operations in the Persian Gulf.

Giuliani said he had been informed that some food had been diverted, but "once the World Food Program pointed this out, (the Iraq) government repented what had been taken, and there was no major problem."

The World Food Program is a U.N.-administered relief agency based in Rome.

The program is shipping tons of food to Iraq to be used for emergency relief supplies for people displaced by the Gulf War, including Shiite Muslims and Kurds.

The Bush administration said Wednesday that the Baghdad government was diverting emergency food supplies, including flour, intended for Iraqi Kurds that went instead to Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit.

Seattle to substitute Gulf party

SEATTLE (AP) — Controversy killed a parade to honor U.S. troops who served during the Persian Gulf war, but service men and women will still be treated to some sort of welcome home party this summer, the mayor's office said Thursday.

"Even though this parade has fallen apart, we are still committed to some kind of event that would welcome home the troops and recognize the sacrifices that they and their families have made," said Mark Murray, spokesman for Mayor Norm Rice.

The parade and related activities planned for June 22 needed \$250,000 to get off the ground, but only about \$160,000 in cash and in-kind donations had been collected. Alan Silverman, a professional events producer, said Wednesday in a written statement announcing the cancellation.

"The last \$90,000 seems an insurmountable task at this period in time," the statement said.

The "Operation Welcome Home" parade ran into political tiffs and other controversies almost from the beginning. Efforts to stage the event were plagued by fighting between pro-military and peace-group representatives, and by charges that some Democratic Party dignitaries had been overlooked on the invitation list.

In his statement, Silverman appeared to lay much of the blame for the cancellation on the controversy that erupted when representatives of the peace movement withdrew from a planning committee in a dispute over whether to allow military hardware in the parade.

He said those problems scared away corporate contributions for the parade.

Books goofed; students must take test again

SPOKANE (AP) — Some 50 Spokane-area students who sweated out a college entrance exam are going to have to do it again, because the test book was defective.

They are among an estimated 9,000 students nationwide who must retake the three-hour Scholastic Aptitude Test because of a printing error.

"Half of me is upset and the other part of me is happy," said Nadya Lafferty, a Ferris High School junior.

Now she has an opportunity to do better — or worse, she said Wednesday.

"I felt I did rather good on the English section, compared to most of my friends and, if I have to take it over, I'm afraid I'll do worse," she said.

Ray Nicosia, a spokesman for the Educational Testing Service, said about 3 percent of the 300,000 students who took the exam Saturday around the country will have to retake.

He said the problem was limited to about two-thirds of the booklets for one of 20 versions of the exam.

Different versions are administered simultaneously to reduce the possibility of students copying.

Phillips might place refinery on the market

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. (AP) — Phillips 66 Co. said today it is considering the sale of its refinery in Utah if the company gets a good offer.

The Woods Cross refinery, located 10 miles north of Salt Lake City, has a processing capacity of 25,000 barrels of crude oil per day, which is 8 percent of the company's domestic refining capacity.

Phillips' two other domestic refineries are in Texas. The Woods Cross refinery serves Phillips' marketing operations in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada and Oregon.

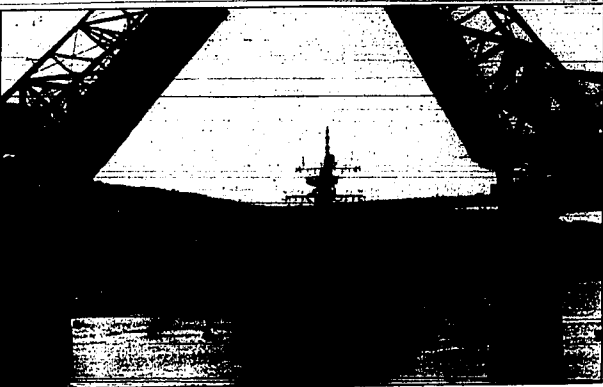
"A number of parties have expressed an interest in purchasing our Salt Lake City area business," said Charles Bowerman, vice president for petroleum products.

Other assets associated with the refinery include the Woods Cross truck loading racking, two product terminals in Idaho of which Phillips owns 50 percent, and 12 retail outlets in the Salt Lake City area.

"The company said it will take offers through October.

"If we have not received what we believe to be a fair market value, we'll keep it and maintain it as a first-class operation," Bowerman said.

Federal judge issues stay in Arizona execution case

PHOENIX (AP) — A federal judge has blocked Arizona from carrying out its first execution since 1963, a process that also had been placed in limbo for a time by air-pollution concerns.

The Arizona Supreme Court had ordered that James Grant Wallace be executed on Friday and reaffirmed that decision Tuesday.

But on Wednesday, U.S. District Judge Stephen McWhinnie issued a stay of execution after prosecutors agreed with defense attorneys that Wallace was far from exhausting his appeal rights.

The judge said Wallace was entitled to pursue federal appeals even if he had "exhausted" some state appeals.

Wallace, now 41, surrendered in 1984 and confessed that he had bludgeoned a woman friend, Susan Insalco, and later two children. He pleaded guilty to first-degree murder in 1985 without going to trial.

The state Department of Corrections had demanded last month that executions be halted because the state Department of Corrections lacked a discharge permit for the cyanide gas that is vented from the gas chamber after each execution. The law requiring such permits did not exist the last time there was an execution in Arizona.

Corrections Director Sam Lewis had agreed to hold off on executions for an estimated 60 days so his agency could get a permit.

Idaho seeks funds for washed-out road

SANDPOINT (AP) — The state of Idaho is applying for a \$500,000 federal grant to rebuild the washed-out road to Schweitzer Mountain.

Some 100 people attended the hearing Wednesday to support the Department of Commerce's application for road-repair money.

The nine-mile road to Schweitzer Mountain Resort was undermined

by heavy spring rain. Dozens of people were stranded at the ski resort overnight when rain washed out part of the road in April.

The resort is the backbone of Sandpoint's tourism industry. Mayor Ron Chaney said limited access to the mountain this summer and winter would create a hardship for local businesses, he said.

Bliss to receive funding to upgrade well system

BLISS — The city of Bliss will receive \$18,000 from the Farmers Home Administration's Emergency Community Water Assistance Grant Program, enough to pay for upgrading its well system and a lifetime lease on water pipes.

Mayer Sam Bishop told the council this week that he had received official notice of the grant on May 27.

The city applied for the grant following an Environmental Protection Agency-mandated upgrade, which the city has estimated will cost about \$12,000. The remainder of the grant will be used to pay for a lifetime lease on city water pipes from Union Pacific Railroad.

In a related matter, the EPA has approved plans and specifications for revisions on the upgrade of the backup city well. Bishop said he had not yet received a copy of the approved plans.

Idaho students score above average in math proficiency

BOISE — Idaho eighth-grade students taking part in a new math proficiency assessment program scored higher than most others in the West and across the nation.

State-by-state rankings were unavailable, but Idaho students tied for eighth among the 38 states and two territories volunteering for the tests, the Idaho Department of Education announced Thursday.

The 2,500 tested students were randomly chosen from among Idaho's 15,600 eighth graders in 1990 to take part in a voluntary "trial assessment" sponsored by the National Assessment of Educational Progress. The 1990 trials were designed to determine whether fair, representative and accurate data could be collected to make state-by-state comparisons.

The department refused to release individual district results. Sally Kester, testing coordinator for the department, said the agency was prohibited by law from doing so.

Red Cross finds blood supply in Idaho at record low levels

TWIN FALLS — Idaho's blood supplies have dipped to new low levels, and the Sawtooth Chapter of the American Red Cross is hoping to refill some of it at a blood drawing here next week.

Ruth Young, the Sawtooth chapter office manager, said the need is especially critical for O-positive blood. The Red Cross Boise Blood Center has just 39 pints on hand. The normal minimum supply for that type of blood is 75 pints.

"The response at blood drawing before and during the Gulf war was great," said Young. "But since the war ended, our drawings have been very disappointing. I guess people assume since there were few casualties, we don't need the blood, but we still have to meet our needs here in Idaho."

Young said the Boise center is also below minimums on A-positive and AB-positive. It is also short on A-negative, B-positive, O-negative, A-negative, B-negative and AB-negative blood.

The Boise center supplies blood to all hospitals in Idaho and several counties in eastern Oregon and eastern Washington.

The drawing is scheduled for the First Presbyterian Church Monday from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and Tuesday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Symms awarded new honor for helping volunteer groups

WASHINGTON — Republican Sen. Steve Symms is the first-ever recipient of the Beacon Award, given to individuals whose work in public policy promotes volunteer organizations, from the American Society of Association Executives.

"In Idaho and around the nation, I've found that great things can happen when people get together for a common cause. We just have to get government out of the way of progress," Symms said.

The group cities Symms' efforts to reinstate 401(k) retirement plans for non-profit organizations and his initiating the Take Pride in America, Working Partners and Operation Humantouch volunteer programs.

"Symms has been a vocal champion for volunteerism and alternatives to government regulation ever since he took office," said Derrick Crandall, a board member of the society.

The organization paid Symms \$4,000 in 1988 and 1989 for two speeches and has also contributed to his campaign coffers.

Official dubs Idaho base 'crown jewel'

WASHINGTON — The embattled Mountain Home Air Force Base was described Thursday as "the crown jewel of what the Air Force is trying to do with the training ranges" by a member of the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission.

The comment by retired Air Force Gen. Duane H. Cassidy came as the commission, an independent group evaluating the Pentagon's base consolidation plan for Congress and the President, met to pare down its list of facilities that may be closed or revamped.

The commission last Friday included Mountain Home AFB, Idaho's third-largest employer, on a list of 36 facilities it said it

would consider closing. The bases are in addition to the 43 that the Defense Department in April recommended should be closed or scaled back.

The commission plans to vote Friday to keep or cut installations from its own list. If the commission drops Mountain Home from its list, the base is out of danger.

Cassidy, who served for more than 30 years, said "Mountain Home is terribly important to tactical air command, training for war time."

In April, Air Force Chief of Staff Merrill A. McPeak chose Mountain Home as the site of a composite wing, which would house many more types of planes and personnel at one site.

The base may get up to \$67.6 million for

the project, which would be completed by February 1996, according to initial Tactical Air Command estimates.

Gov. Cecil Andrus has offered the Air Force a package of federal, state and private land in extreme southwestern Owyhee County for use as a bombing range. The Air Force also "controls" in the "Saylor-Creek range southeast of the base."

Idaho's congressional delegation has mounted a campaign to save the facility and its 6,700 jobs.

After Thursday's hearing, Cassidy said the addition of a composite wing to the Elmore County base and the state offer of an extended bombing range, as well as the good weather near the facility, all improve the base's chances of survival.

"The Air Force has got to find places to train troops well," he said. "That's what Mountain Home is."

But Cassidy cautioned that his enthusiasm did not guarantee the future of Mountain Home.

"I'm only one vote out of seven," he said, referring to his fellow commissioners.

The commission is charged with giving President Bush a list of bases recommended for closure or realignment by June 1. The president then has 15 days to reject the list or pass it on to Congress, which has 45 days to accept or reject it.

Neither Congress nor the president can amend the list. It must be accepted or rejected in its entirety.

Walker Center will close if it can't find a buyer

GOODING — The Walker Center, an alcohol and drug treatment center, will close if it can't find a new owner.

Walker Center officials are scrambling to find a buyer after its parent company Healthtrust Inc. announced plans to get rid of the 15-year-old center. Healthtrust is a spin-off company from Nashville, Tenn.-based Hospital Corporation of America.

"I'm very hopeful that we will be able to sell the center to a suitable buyer and remain open," Chief Executive Officer Gail Aiter said.

Although profitable, the center is facing a difficult financial picture. Other hospitals are moving into Walker Center's coverage area, taking patients and market share.

To remain profitable, Healthtrust would have to invest money and that isn't what the company wants to do, according to a press release.

"The bottom-line mentality is more important than people getting well," said the center's founder, Archie Walker of BHS.

"To have that program closed down would be a catastrophe."

Walker founded the center in 1976 with support from the

Walker Foundation. In 1981, St. Benedict's Healthcare Corp. of Ogden, Utah, bought the center.

Hospital Corporation became the Gooding hospital's owner in 1987, and sold it to Healthtrust in 1989.

Aiter said the center's 33 employees will receive help in finding other jobs if the center closes.

"We will do everything we can for our employees, including providing assistance in writing resumes, contacting other health-care facilities on their behalf, providing letters of recommendation and offering counseling services," Aiter said.

The Walker Center also has an outreach center in Twin Falls.

Jerome middle schoolers face split-session education

JEROME — The die has been cast and Jerome's sixth-graders will join seventh- and eighth-graders in testing out a new middle school concept and a split-session schedule.

"There is nothing good about double sessions. There is nothing good about cutting down teaching time for our kids. But we're doing the best we can," said Craig Ainsworth, Jerome Middle School principal.

Formerly, students received about 6 1/2 hours of instruction per day. That will be reduced to 5 1/2 hours, with a 15-minute lunch break. Sixth-graders will not have recess as they had in elementary school.

Students will have a physical education session every other day.

With the sixth-graders moving up to the middle school, there will be more classrooms for younger students.

Ainsworth talked while dividing sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students into morning and afternoon classes.

Ainsworth split the students by "putting names of the girls in one mug and boys in another mug" for each grade, and then drawing out one name at a time.

Under the middle school concept, teachers and students will be organized into teams — each team will have about 120 students, with 30 students per classroom.

The sixth-grade class will have two recesses.

Residents consider highway expansion proposal

HALLEY — Constructing a four-lane highway down the center of the Wood River Valley may not be an easy proposition.

The idea must win strong public support in order for the Idaho Transportation Department to consider funding the \$17 million proposal.

But at a town meeting held Wednesday

night in Halley, approximately two-thirds of the 75 people present appeared to be opposed to the construction of a four-lane roadway in the valley.

"A super highway through this valley is going to destroy it," said Halley resident Richard Stoppel.

A similar idea proposed in the early 1970s failed when valley residents demanded the state scrap its expansion plans.

Now, nearly 20 years later, Blaine Coun-

ty's population has increased 143 percent. According to the Blaine County Transportation Study, the carrying capacity of the present two-lane Highway 75 between Bellevue and Ketchum is 6,000 cars per day, but 1989 traffic counts revealed an average of 11,000 cars travel the highway daily.

Residents up and down the valley questioned study group member Leonard Jarlig at the meeting about other possible alternatives to four lanes.

Jarlig said during this past year the study group investigated all possible solutions — and it determined that other alternatives to a four-lane highway would not be adequate.

The group determined that ideas such as car pooling, van pooling, buses, and high speed rail systems would be too costly, or insufficient in decreasing the volume of traffic on the highway.

Suspect says beating victims owed him money

BOISE (AP) — Two Boise people were brutally beaten to death at a tavern because they owed the assailant money for cocaine, according to court testimony.

Keith Eugene Wells, 30, twice has confessed to killing both and then one of the victims at the Rose Tavern, Boise Police Detective Dave Smith testified Wednesday at Wells' preliminary hearing.

Brigid Reims, 20, and John Justad, 23, were attacked about midnight Dec. 19, and money was stolen from the bar by a bartender, and Justad, a customer, were reportedly closing the pub when it occurred.

Ada County Magistrate Richard Schmidt ruled there was sufficient evidence to try Wells on two counts of first-degree murder. He will be

arraigned Monday in 4th District Court.

Wells is expected to plead innocent, defense attorneys said.

Justad's sister said Reims and Justad were not involved in a drug deal.

"This is something he (Wells) concocted to give an excuse for being in a fight with him," said Justad's sister, Julie Tolman. "Both of our families are confident it had nothing to do with cocaine."

A customer found them shortly after the attack. They died in a hospital several hours later. Police arrested Wells April 23.

At Wednesday's hearing, Smith said Wells confessed on the day he was arrested to committing the slayings. Smith testified Wells told him in a tape-recorded interview

April 23 that he went to the Rose Tavern alone to get about \$3,000 owed to him by the two for cocaine.

Wells told police he confronted Justad in the bar's bathroom and the two began to fight, Smith said.

Wells confessed to picking up a bar stool leg and beating Justad and Reims, he said.

But on April 24, Wells told police he had lied, the detective said.

In the second confession, Wells said he went to the bar to ask for the money while his two cocaine "suppliers" waited behind the business in a car, Smith said.

Wells said he confronted Justad in the bathroom and Justad gave him about \$875, Smith said. Wells told police he went to his suppliers with the money, and they told him to return to the bar and get more.

Wells confessed to and Justad fought in the bar, Smith said. Wells said he was hit in the head by the drug dealers, who then hit Justad in the head with a baseball bat.

Wells said he was hit in the back and confessed to hitting Justad with it another "three or four times," Smith testified.

He told police the baseball bat was tossed into some bushes. Smith said although no weapon was ever found.

"It is my belief the first confession is the closest to the truth," Smith said after the hearing.

"If you take the confession out of Wells' mouth," said Ada County Public Defender Armi Myshin, "there's no physical evidence in this case that we've been shown. No fingerprints, no weapon, nothing."

Economist predicts growth for Twin Falls, Boise

SUN VALLEY (AP) — Twin Falls should continue to enjoy a healthy and active economy into the next century, a top regional economist told Idaho executives.

John Mitchell, senior vice president and chief economist for U.S. Bancorp in Portland, Ore., spoke Wednesday at Boise State University's Program for Management Development.

"In Idaho, I think Boise and places like Coeur d'Alene and Twin Falls have the chance to experience some 'really' good growth," said Mitchell.

The seven-day intensive management program presented by the Boise State College of Business' Center for Management Development is designed to help "fast-track" managers develop a broadened business perspective.

Thirty-nine executives attended the 1991 conference, which is in its seventh year.

Mitchell said Boise's construction boom that began in the late 1980s has been a primary factor in Idaho's surging economy.

"If you look at Idaho's building permit activity on the strength of the last couple of years, you will see a dramatic contrast in what you see nationally," he said. "Idaho had the most rapid growth in construction payment than any state in the U.S., over 22 percent."

Mitchell, an economics professor at Boise State for 13 years before joining U.S. Bancorp in 1983, said he expects Boise and similar cities in the Pacific Northwest to continue to enjoy a healthy economy.

BLM seeks charges in farm chemical dumping

BLACKFOOT (AP) — If federal charges are brought in the dumping of nearly 900 agricultural chemical containers on public lands, cleanup costs could be over \$100,000.

A jail term is possible.

Bureau of Land Management Ranger Rick Martin said the charges and fines may be the best way to stop longstanding practice of dumping on public lands containers with concentrated residues of toxic pesticides,

herbicides, fungicides and insecticides.

"We feel very confident that we'll come up with something that will result in the prosecution of filing charges in this case," Martin said Wednesday.

The charges would be the first stemming from a case in Bingham County even though BLM officials have discovered eight dumps in the county in the last two years. Six have been cleaned up. BLM officials ex-

pected to pinpoint more dumps from the air later this month and will draft a map by early July.

Workers from Residual Management Inc., Boise, expect cleanup of 820 containers to continue until Tuesday. The containers will be stacked in three times, punctured to prevent reuse and disposed of at the Bingham County landfill in Goshen. But more time will be needed to handle about 70 containers that once contained Dinosol and nearby contaminated soil which must be dis-

posed of at EnviroSafe, a toxic waste dump in Elmore County.

The site is located about 16 miles west of Blackfoot and is surrounded by farm fields. More household garbage and chemical containers are scattered on the land along a dirt road leading to the dump.

"That problem area falls under the jurisdiction of the Idaho Health and Welfare's Division of Environmental Quality, said BLM's hazardous waste manager, Dan Katansky. Landowners may have to pay for cleanup.

To prevent future dumping, Kolansky said distributors of the chemicals must be required to use every container, or containers could be numbered and purchases recorded.

Father arrested for torching home

BOISE (AP) — A Boise man has been charged with arson for allegedly setting the fire that destroyed the home of his wife and children.

No one was at home about noon Wednesday when onlookers said windows and a wall blew out and the house filled with flames within seconds.

Shelley Paul Miller was arrested at 4:50 p.m. in blocks from the scene of the fire. His hands and face were burned, fire investigators said.

LT Jim Spears of the Boise Police

Department said Miller was charged with first-degree arson, second-degree burglary and violation of a protective order.

Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Roger Bourne said Thursday that Miller would be arraigned after being released from the hospital.

Boise Fire Department investigator Wayland Johns said flammable liquids were poured around the house and an electric furnace may have ignited them while the arsonist still was there.

teachers per team and students will rotate between two classrooms. The seventh- and eighth-grade classes will have four teachers per team and to four rooms or more every class. Each team will have an instructional aide to assist the teachers.

Each grade also will have a special education teacher. With this procedure, students needing special attention will not be pulled out of class, but will receive additional assistance on a regular basis within the assigned team of classmates.

Students were notified last week of their assignment to attend school in the morning or in the afternoon. Morning sessions will begin at 7 a.m. and end at 12:15 p.m. Afternoon classes will go from 12:30 to 5:45 p.m. Buses will run accordingly. All students from a family will attend the same session whenever possible.

And the new middle school concept will require the district hire one more counselor.

Property tax drive kicks off in Ada County

BOISE (AP) — A drive to reinstall a statewide property tax initiative has ignited in Idaho's most populous county and proponents expect far more signatures than needed to put it on the 1992 ballot.

"It's important to be able to hold down taxes whether you are on fixed income or just trying to hold your head above water," said Linda Hagmann, a Boise homemaker who signed the 1 Percent Initiative petition sheets which emerged Wednesday in Ada County.

The initiative would limit property taxes on homes to 1 percent of market value. The Idaho Property Owners Association needs to gather about 32,000 signatures by July 1992 to put the question on the 1992 general election ballot.

"They're actually stopping their cars and signing," said Rachel Gilbert, first vice president of the association. "It's just spreading like a Camas Prairie fire."

Gilbert, a Boise real estate broker and former state senator, said 10,000 signatures have been gathered around the state in the month after the drive was started in Kootenai County.

"I think we're going to have over 100,000 signatures by 1992," she said.

She said recent boosts in property assessments are fueling the petition drive in Ada County. Last week, the assessor mailed out tax assessment notices increasing home values by an average of 10 percent.

The new initiative would replace the 1978 1 Percent Initiative. The 1991 Legislature erased its last vestige by dissolving the 5-percent maximum limit on annual budget increases imposed by property tax districts.

Gilbert said the average American worker had to labor until nearly Labor Day to pay all federal, state and local taxes.

Don Chance, an Ada Property Owners Association director and leader of the 1978 petition drive, said 172 signatures were gathered for that drive in Ada County alone, and 100,000 statewide.

Last month, the three Ada County commissioners signed a petition for the initiative.

tion so, several residents objected to the four-lane highway based on environmental and safety concerns.

John Lipsey, who lives north of Hailey along Highway 75, opposed the four-lane proposal and suggested creating a three-lane road with a left-hand turn lane between Hailey and Ketchum. In addition, Lipsey wants to see a no-passing zone the entire length of this 11-mile stretch and the speed limit reduced from 55 mph to 45 mph.

"Equipping the four-lane roadway to a 'kangaroo' on the backbone of this valley," Lipsey said, "is a disheartening way for our lanes would increase safety and said 'old fashioned curbs' would see people into the 21st century."

A four-lane highway would carve a wide swath through the valley.

With four travel lanes plus a center left-hand turn lane, the highway would be 74 feet wide. Then, in order to comply with federal standards, 22-foot-wide shoulders with low-growing vegetation would be maintained on each side of the roadway.

Many median strips for vegetation or concrete guard rails would make the highway even wider. Some pallants like the Lipsey who would widen the road at various points.

Chairman County School Board Chairman Frank Rowland, who owns Hailey property housing the old Union Pacific Railroad right-of-way, stated his opposition at the meeting against routing any or all of the im-

proved highway on the right-of-way. He said that for safety reasons and the significant disruption to town, he opposes any alternative that would bisect Hailey by using the right-of-way, which goes through residential areas.

The Hailey City Council has gone on record many times opposing any increased traffic use of the right-of-way and has zoned the area as a recreational greenbelt. The Blaine County bike path follows the Blaine County highway through town.

Hailey resident Jake Lemmon has a different view. He said a four-lane highway should run along the right-of-way. He said he doesn't think Main Street businesses would be revitalized by routing intense traffic in the downtown core.

Hailey resident Mike Sullivan said he is not convinced a four-lane highway would solve traffic problems.

"A four-lane highway would be the final nail in the coffin of what has been a rural community and what is

becoming more and more an urban community," he said.

Jim Carpenter of the Transportation Department said if a decision were based solely on engineering studies, a four-lane highway would be the answer.

However, in order to proceed with this project, the county must muster up "strong local public support."

Additional town meetings will be held in Ketchum at 7 p.m. on Tuesday at the Presbyterian Church of the Big Wood and at 3:30 p.m. on July 18 at the Sun Valley City Hall.

If there is community support, additional community meetings will be held as well as design workshops with the Transportation Department to determine which specific impacts would be the greatest public support.

In addition to finding funding, the Transportation Department would have to conduct an Environmental Impact Statement and formal public hearings before construction.

Board of Education hires ex-secretary's consulting company

BOISE (AP) — The state Board of Education has picked a consulting firm led by former U.S. Education Secretary Terrel Bell to develop a plan for implementing Idaho public school reforms.

The board, after hearing proposals from the three contractors vying for the job Thursday in Boise, discussed them only briefly before voting 7-0 to hire Salt Lake City and Washington, D.C.-based Terrel Bell & Associates.

Board member Karl Shurtliff of Boise abstained after expressing doubt about whether any contractor was needed to help implement reforms recommended in studies by the business-backed Idaho Education Project and the state Task Force on the Future of Education in Idaho.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans recommended hiring Bell after responding sharply to questions about whether he had a conflict of interest as a

board of directors member for a competing contractor, the Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory of Portland, Ore.

Evans, "calling even the idea of a conflict 'absolutely ridiculous,'" said he gets no compensation as a board member yet is able to help steer Northwest Lab's work on other contracts in a direction that can help Idaho.

Other Idaho board members include Boise School District Superintendent Barney Parker, Idaho Falls Superintendent Jerry Jacobson, Coeur d'Alene teacher Raina Bohanek and Lewiston businesswoman Zola McMurray.

Bell, a southeastern Idaho native and longtime Utah resident who spent seven years as superintendent of that state's public school system, argued his own case before board members Thursday.

"We know American education," he said, "is in a state of crisis. It needs a strong, deliberate, purposeful program" to get par-

ents more involved in their children's education.

Bell, who said he would take charge of the Idaho report personally, emphasized the need to motivate students to want to learn, perhaps by starting academic competitions aimed at making scholarly achievement as socially important as athletics.

He also called for more and better use of technology in the classroom, citing the growing use of interactive video discs in Texas public schools in place of textbooks.

Before making his recommendation, Evans cited language in legislation providing \$900,000 for school reforms in the budget year that begins July 1 authorizing only the state superintendent to spend the money. The board could veto his choice but had no spending authority of its own, he said.

Some board members said they agreed with arguments raised by the third contractor, Idaho Education Initiatives Consortium Inc.,

a Boise-based group created in response to a request for reform plan proposals that the process should be home grown with grassroots support and participation.

But Evans said the 11-member Steering and Evaluation Committee named by the board to work with whichever contractor was hired in developing a strategic reform plan, as well as a 25-member Goals and Testing Commission charged with developing a "performance-based" evaluation system for public schools statewide, more than met the need for an Idaho role in the process.

Bell also said during his presentation that his firm, while insisting on final responsibility for developing an implementation plan, would be willing to tap the experience and ideas of Idaho people.

"It's going to be harder for us in serving you if we don't have some Idaho people," he said.

In an analysis presented to the board last

month, Department of Education staff ranked the Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory proposal the best of the three. Bell ranked second overall, scoring first only in the area of access to outside research on reform measures.

Shurtliff and other board members said they were concerned about Bell's open-ended cost estimate for developing an implementation plan, but Evans said a final cost agreement with any contractor would involve negotiation. He said he hoped to have a proposed contract with Bell ready for action by the board when it meets June 27-28 in Moscow.

Deputy Superintendent Gus Hein said he expects to spend no more than \$150,000.

Bell, who was Education Secretary from 1984-85 during the first term of the Reagan administration, established the National Commission on Excellence that produced the landmark report "A Nation At Risk."

I-70 traffic diverted after truck spills acid

GREEN RIVER, Utah (AP) — Traffic on Interstate 70 was diverted through this remote eastern Utah city early Thursday after a chemical-laden truck overturned and spilled more than half a ton of battery acid, authorities said.

There were no reports of injury in the city of nearly 900 residents following the 4:22 a.m. accident, said Utah Highway Patrol Sgt. Gary Whitney.

UHP dispatcher Marty Estrada said the interstate was re-opened Thursday evening.

"It's been cleaned up and they've got traffic going through again," he said.

Whitney said some 1,150 pounds of highly caustic battery acid spilled onto the roadway and adjacent ground when two trailers turned over just east of the Green River exit at milepost 158.

Containers of other substances, including a possibly explosive acid, were thrown onto the roadway but apparently did not rupture, Whitney said.

Hazardous materials teams and cleanup crews were dispatched. Traffic was detoured through the streets of Green River.

"If we had to have one of these, this was the place for it to happen," Whitney said. "Few miles west and there wouldn't have been any alternative but to close the whole freeway down."

As things stand, Whitney said traffic moved smoothly.

Investigators have not determined why the trailers tipped over. The truck's driver and a passenger, whose names were not immediately available, suffered only minor injuries and weren't hospitalized.

Court overturns conviction on search ruling

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals has overturned the drug conviction of a Boise man, ruling a police officer unreasonably frisked the man for identification.

The court on Thursday concluded that an officer unreasonably stilled a search of Steven Lewis Rawlings to determine his identity, without giving the man a chance to identify himself.

Rawlings did not have any identifying papers or wallet, the court said, but that does not justify the "frisk."

"Where an individual is not carrying such proof (of identification), an identification search, no matter how broad, will not further the purpose of obtaining identification," the court said.

The fact that a citizen happens to be without identifying papers does not provide a reasonable basis for a police search in the absence of probable cause.

Court records said police, responding to a 5 a.m. report that a burglary was in progress at a stereo shop, surrounded the building. Rawlings was spotted a block away, leaving the area.

Rawlings said an officer approached him with gun drawn and asked for identification. The officer said he saw Rawlings throw a small object away, later identified as an aspirin bottle with illegal drugs. He was convicted of possession of controlled substances.

The Court of Appeals said the evidence must be suppressed because the officer was not justified in searching Rawlings, finding that the "bottle of drugs was not 'voluntarily abandoned' under the circumstances."

In other decisions Thursday: The Supreme Court reinstated a claim by Thomas M. Ray that he was improperly fired by the Nampa School District in 1985. Ray contended he was told when he was hired as a maintenance electrician that he would have a job as long as he "kept his nose clean." The district contended he had no employment contract because the Idaho Constitution prohibits school districts from

entering into employment contracts of more than one year.

The court said the constitution does not bar ongoing contracts for "ordinary" and "necessary" purposes. It said there are other issues to be determined at the trial court level.

The Court of Appeals rejected the bid of Alberto Morales Ramirez for post-conviction relief in his Canyon County drug case.

Ramirez contended the prosecutor failed to disclose that two witnesses were charged with misdemeanors. But the court noted that the charges were dismissed, and even if not, only felony charges can be used to impeach the credibility of witnesses.

Boise firm submits low bid for office

BOISE (AP) — Seufert Construction, Boise, has submitted the apparent low bid to build a new Department of Fish and Game Region 3 office and information center at Nampa.

The Division of Public Works opened bids Thursday afternoon and said the apparent low was Seufert's bid of \$517,314. The second-lowest of four bids was \$520,200 submitted

by Newby-Wiggins, Boise, said Sam Grunden, clerical specialist with the division.

Also submitting bids were Scanlon Construction of Boise and Don Young, Kuna. The project estimate was \$560,000.

Work is expected to begin as soon as the paperwork to verify the bid is completed and the contract is awarded.

Teen emerges as hero as murder plot rocks town

CHEHALIS, Wash. (AP) — The teenager who helped police foil a fellow student's alleged plan to murder his parents for money is a hero among his classmates, a top educator in this rural community said Thursday.

Schools Superintendent Gene Sharratt also described the teen-ager who allegedly sought to murder his parents as a "braggart" and non-stop talker "always out to impress everybody with how great he is."

"I was just over at the high school," Sharratt said in an interview, "and a lot of kids told me that they told the informant they really respect what he did and admire what

he did and think he showed a lot of courage."

Police say the 17-year-old informant was among three teens recruited by Mark A. Wood, 18, to slay Wood's parents at their secluded home west of here last Friday so Wood could collect \$500,000 in life insurance.

The parents were warned and the plot was foiled, thanks largely to the informant, police said. Sharratt declined to make the youth available for an interview, or to identify his parents.

Wood was being held on \$500,000 bail after his arrest Tuesday on his 18th birthday. He appeared handcuffed in court Thursday

and pleaded innocent to four felony counts of conspiracy to commit murder and solicitation of murder. No trial date was set.

Chehalis is a farming and logging town of about 6,000 people in southwest Washington, with about 750 students in the high school.

Sharratt said Wood was known to classmates as "somebody who, the more he talks, the less you listen."

Wood was known among teachers as "a manipulator," but "certainly nobody ever thought he was the type who would try to kill his own parents," Sharratt said. "It turns out he didn't have enough gumption to do this himself, but had to recruit other, younger people to do it for him."

The superintendent said Wood's parents "are good people, involved in the community. The dad's an accountant and the mom's a clerk in a store," he said, declining to say where the parents work. They have not been available for comment.

"They were devastated by this," he said.

Jeanne D'Amato, Lewis County Juvenile Court assistant administrator, said two other teens were each charged Wednesday with two counts of conspiracy to commit murder. A hearing is scheduled for June 18 on whether the boys should stand trial as adults.


They were being held in juvenile facilities.

Developer: Project provides best use

ASHLON — The developer who has proposed a hydroelectric generating project on Fall River says it would be the best and most profitable use of the river.

Critics of Bob Lee's Yellowstone hydroelectric proposal said at a hearing Wednesday night that the project would threaten water quality and fishing. Some people didn't know what to make of Lee's offer to share 40 percent of the revenue from his 4.5 megawatt project. "I just think it's a marvelous opportunity to do a lot of good," Lee said. "I hope we can do it without damaging the resource."

Lee wants to expand the Yellowstone irrigation canal along the Fall River east of Ashton, and build a generator at an 83-year-old dam. The project is still in the early planning stages. Lee plans to apply for a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license by July 1992.

Water diversion for the project might take up to 500 cubic feet per second from Fall River, and run it through the four-mile Yellowstone canal. The water would be returned to the river at the end of the Yellowstone canal, where a second hydro project already has been licensed by FERC.

Nurse charged after replacing drugs

POCATELLO — A former Bannock Geriatric Center nurse charged with stealing pain killers and replacing it with saline fluid on June 26 preliminary hearing on 11 counts of possession of a controlled substance.

Kathryn Carter was arraigned Wednesday before Bannock County Magistrate J.W. Crowther, who appointed a public defender and released her on her own recognizance.

Her preliminary hearing is scheduled before Magistrate Gaylen Box.

Ms. Carter, 38, is charged with taking undetermined amounts of codeine, morphine and Demerol from the geriatric center.

Boise schools ban unimmunized pupils

BOISE — Forty-nine unimmunized students have been barred from two Boise schools as the result of confirmed or suspected measles cases in Ada County shut up to 24.

"Anybody that's not immunized should be alarmed," said Bob Medlin, state immunization coordinator, on Wednesday. "Anybody who's not immunized has a really good chance of being exposed to or getting measles."

At Boise High, 40 students who either had signed immunization waivers or were unable to document vaccinations were sent home Wednesday, in accordance with state law on infectious diseases, school nurse Dian Liles said. Most were expected to return with documentation.

At North Junior High, nine students were excluded from school Wednesday. One of the students, who has bypassed shots since childhood for religious reasons, is suspected of having measles, nurse Janell Pfoertner said.

Historical school devastated by blaze

BOISE — The venerable Huston School near Homedale has been reduced to a smoking shell by a fire that collapsed the roof.

Thirty-two firefighters battled more than five hours Wednesday to save the 73-year-old school. The rural school was converted to apartments in the early 1970s.

Owner Duana Bayless was awakened by the odor of smoke about 4 a.m. and evacuated the residents in the five other apartments, said Caldwell Rural Fire Department Lt. Danny Hartwig. No one was injured.

By 9 a.m., unable to contain the blaze, firefighters pulled their equipment outside and the roof caved in, he said.

The last classes were held in the building in 1971 when West Canyon Elementary was completed, said Ken Brocke of the Valluue School District.

Man offers reward to help locate wife

NAMPA — The husband of a Nampa woman missing for six weeks has posted a \$5,000 reward for information that could help locate her.

No information has surfaced from credit card, checking account or medical records, he said, and Susan hasn't contacted family members.

"There's no information, nothing," Coles said. "There's not even enough evidence to speculate on."

Canyon County sheriff's Capt. Dave Rowe said the Coles case is not closed. A reward may help solve the case, depending upon the circumstances of her disappearance, he said.

Her car also has not been located. It is a maroon 1985 Nissan Pulsar with a Canyon County license. The car has damage to its trunk, rear lights and rear bumper.

Symms expected action for immigration stand

BOISE (AP) — Sen. Steve Symms says he long expected federal naturalization officials to "go after" his Caldwell family's fruit ranch because of his criticism of immigration reform.

He also warned his son Dan, the manager of the operation, about being targeted by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Last week, Dan Symms, two family-owned corporations and Patricia Melchor of Caldwell were named in a 74-count federal indictment accusing them of violating the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. All pleaded innocent; the senator was not named in the indictment although he is on the board of directors for the ranch.

The defendants are accused of creating more than 250 fraudulent employment-verification documents for Hispanic laborers between March 1987 and December 1988.

Symms stood short of saying he, or his family, had been targeted, stressing he did not intend to comment directly on the case. But his brother Dick Symms said Immigra-

tion is carrying out a "vendetta" because of the senator's position on the issue. Symms, R-Idaho, was one of a dozen senators who voted against the bill all three years that it came before the Senate: 1982, 1983 and 1985.

But a government lawyer denied the Symmses were singled out for prosecution because of the senator's positions.

"I was not aware that the senator had opposed IRCA," said John Lamp, a special attorney to the U.S. attorney general. "It has no relevance to me."

During the 1985 debate, Symms vigorously opposed the bill and criticized the naturalization service, saying it forced the nation's farmers to ascertain the legal status of the workers and face the consequences if they were wrong.

The bill passed the Senate three

times before becoming law in 1985. Symms was on the losing side each time.

Symms said Tuesday he feared his family could pay a price for his opposition.

"When this law passed, I told people at the ranch, and I told Danny, you guys better have your records in absolutely perfect order, because you will be one of the first people that the government will go after."

"We're a visible company," he said. "They've got a member of the company that is a U.S. senator. We hire a lot of people. We harvest a lot of crops that require a lot of intensive hand labor. And it's just going to be obvious that the immigration people will go after us."

Dick Symms, president of Symms Fruit Ranch Inc. and Sunnyslope Fruit Co., used even stronger words.

"This is a situation where a powerful government agency, the Immigration Service, is carrying out a vindictive vendetta against our family business because my brother, a U.S. congressman and a U.S. senator, voted against legislation giving

that agency more power," he said in a statement.

Dan Symms referred questions to his attorney, Bob Kooner, who said, "The senator's voting record has been relatively consistent in opposing the agency's budgets and the immigration bill. I can't draw a conclusion, except to say it seems suspect."

Lamp said he would not argue the point with Symms.

"I get cases. I look at the evidence. I make a determination as to whether it's appropriate to charge," he said.

The government says its investigation began in 1988 when Boise INS agent Kent Nygaard was told that two Mexican nationals involved in drug trafficking in the Boise-Valley had obtained fraudulent documents aimed at securing permanent citizenship.

Nygaard, the government says, examined the files of those aliens and traced their employment verification forms to Dan Symms.

The trial is scheduled to begin June 27 in U.S. District Court in Boise.

FMC, Simplot sign consent order for EPA study

POCATELLO (AP) — Two of Pocatello's biggest industrial employers will work with the Environmental Protection Agency to clean up contamination that led to a Superfund listing last summer.

A cleanup plan for the Eastern Michaud Flats site west of Pocatello will be completed within 90 days as a first step toward resolving ground water contamination from FMC Corp. and J.R. Simplot Co. phosphate operations.

The companies have entered into a voluntary agreement with the EPA, signing an administrative consent order permitting them to conduct a "remedial investigation and feasibility study" at the 2,530-acre site as required by Superfund regulations.

The process is aimed at determining the type and extent of heavy metal contamination at the Superfund site, establishing criteria for screening the site, identifying and screening cleanup alternatives, and analyzing technology and costs involved in the various alternatives.

"It is unusual for the two companies to be working together, said to Bill Adams, EPA project manager in Seattle.

"The contamination was listed at both facilities so it was all related to one site," Adams said.

"By signing the voluntary (administrative consent order) we've said if there's a problem it's ours and we'll stand up and fix it," said Rick Phillips, public affairs manager for Simplot's Mineral and Chemical Group.

The companies have hired Bechtel Environmental Inc., a worldwide environmental engineering company, to conduct the remedial investigation and feasibility study. Bechtel will work closely with the EPA, which has oversight responsibility for the entire Superfund process.

The companies have 90 days to prepare a work plan for the agency's approval. Actual field work is expected to begin next spring.

Phillips said he did not know how long the process would take.

"If you study the Superfund process across the United States, it's an extremely slow, grinding process," he said.

In adding the Pocatello site to the National Priorities List last year, the EPA cited several conditions, in-

cluding waste water from the FMC and Simplot phosphate facilities being stored or disposed of in unlined ponds. In response, FMC is phasing out the use of unlined ponds and Simplot has implemented a waste water treatment system.

In the summer of 1987, EPA detected elevated levels of heavy metals in sediments of the unlined ponds at both facilities and in waste water at the Simplot plant. Arsenic, cadmium and selenium also were detected in monitoring wells in the deep confined aquifer.

Public and private wells within three miles of the area provide drinking water to an estimated 55,000 people and are used to irrigate over 2,100 acres of forage crops.

Vincent gives AL expansion revenue

NEW YORK — Commissioner Fay Vincent broke with precedent Thursday and gave the American League \$42 million of the \$190 million the National League will get from expansion.

In a seven-page decision, Vincent ruled that teams from both leagues would supply players equally for the 1993 expansion draft and that any future expansion money will be divided equally between all major league clubs. He also chastised the leagues for not resolving the issue themselves.

"There is much to be said, especially in

baseball, for following precedent and for playing by the established rules," Vincent said. "On the other hand, the American League makes the good argument that the allocation to the National League of the entire \$190 million in franchise fees would seriously weaken the American League."

If the NL had kept all the money, each of its 12 existing teams would have received

\$15,833,333. With Vincent's decision, each AL team will receive \$3 million and each NL team \$11,833,333. "We will abide by the decision and we are glad to have this behind us," NL president Bill White said.

Vincent decided each existing major league team will give three players to the pool expansion clubs will select from. Under the previous rules, each NL team would have given six players. This change must be approved by the Major League Baseball Players Association and Vincent said approval is expected.

"I regret that this decision could, and perhaps will, damage the relationship between

the leagues," Vincent said. "One of my principal concerns as commissioner is the trend within ownership toward greater disunity. ... I am disturbed at the apparent unwillingness of some within baseball to rise above parochial interests and to think in terms of the greater good of the game."

The dispute arose because of the escalation in expansion fees to \$95 million a team. When the AL expanded in 1977, Toronto paid \$7 million and Seattle paid \$6.25 million. In 1969, Montreal and San Diego paid \$10 million each to join the NL and Kansas City and Seattle (now Milwaukee) paid \$5.55 million apiece to join the AL.

NEW YORK — Kentucky Derby winner Strike the Gold will be an outsider in the Belmont Stakes — not in the odds, but in the gate.

Strike the Gold, the early 5-2 favorite, drew the outside post Thursday when 11 3-year-olds were entered for the final race of the Triple Crown. Preakness winner Langst was the second choice at 3-1 and will start from the No. 5 post.

Adding a touch of mystery to Saturday's 123rd running of the Belmont will be the appearance of Smooth Performance, who arrived in New York on Wednesday from Ireland. The Kentucky-bred son of Seattle

Slew has nine starts — all on grass — and three victories.

The oddsmaker made the Dermot Weld-trained Smooth Performance the third choice at 6-1, probably based on Weld's last Belmont horse — 1990 Belmont winner Go and Go. Michael Kinane, who rode Go and Go, will be aboard Smooth Performance.

Adding a touch of history is Julie Krone, who will become the first female jockey in the Belmont. She will ride Subordinated Debt.

Strike the Gold, ridden by Chris Antley, was pinned on the rail after starting from the No. 3 hole in the Preakness, where he finished sixth, but trainer Nick Zito was unhappy about drawing the outside post.

There is less than a quarter-mile to establish position before the field hits the first turn. "Simple instruction, 'Take him back to last,'" Zito said. "We've got to save ground. Now maybe we'll see what a special horse he is."

Trainer Frank Brothers agonized over the decision to send Hansel to the Preakness after the colt finished 10th as the favorite in the Derby. Ridden by Jerry Bailey, Hansel won the Preakness by seven lengths.

Brothers apparently had no trouble in deciding to send his colt to the Belmont even though New York bans medication.

Hansel, who suffered pulmonary bleeding during a race in February, has raced on a diuretic, Lasix, in his last five starts.

Lakers return to home court feeling in command

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — The Los Angeles Lakers are saying all the right things after a blowout loss to the Chicago Bulls that tied the NBA Finals.

All we needed was a split in Chicago. We had to forget about Game 2. We're glad to be home.

The Bulls evened the Finals at 1-1 Wednesday night with a 107-86 victory in which they set a championship series record by making 61.7 percent of their shots, including 15-for-18 by Michael Jordan, who scored 31 of his 33 points in the final 28 minutes.

"There will be no carryover from this loss," Sam Perkins said. "We wanted to win two in Chicago, but I guess that was being a little greedy."

Perkins, the Lakers' Game 1 hero with 22 points and a last-minute, winning 3-pointer, managed just 11 points in the second game.

The next three games are scheduled for Friday night, Sunday and Wednesday night at the Forum.

"We'll watch film of this one and correct our mistakes," Perkins said. "We have to play through this type of game and sustain our mental toughness."

"It was a game you rarely see at this time of the season," said James Worthy, who led

the Lakers with 24 points. "It was a game where nothing goes right for one team and everything is perfect for the other. It's not embarrassing, just disappointing."

"They played in desperation," Byron Scott said. "That's exactly what they need. I feel we'll be in good shape when we get back home. We'll forget about this loss and just take care of things at home on Friday."

Scott said he noticed Jordan celebrating and looking toward the Lakers' bench in the second half, something that could come back to haunt the Bulls. "That's not something you do early in the series," Scott said.

The Bulls, leading 48-43 at halftime, outscored Los Angeles 38-26 in the third

quarter while shooting 85 percent from the field, hitting 17 of 20 shots. "We had such energy in the second half that we were able to pull away," coach Phil Jackson said.

Only a fourth-quarter shooting slump by the Bulls' reserves kept them from destroying the Finals record for shooting percentage. They still managed a 61.7 percentage, .002 better than the previous record by the Lakers in 1987 against Boston. "We came out in the second half really pumped up," said Michael Jordan, who made 13 consecutive shots in one stretch. "We didn't do things differently, it was just our energy level was higher and we were more relaxed."

Tarkanian expected to detail his future at UNLV today

Kurdish leaders demand allies pressure Iraq

DOHUK, Iraq (AP) — Kurdish tribal leaders have asked American military commanders to create a demilitarized zone in northern Iraq and pressure Baghdad to agree to Kurdish demands for autonomy, military officers said Thursday. But Army Col. Dick Naab said coalition forces would reject the demands because they would force the allied forces to overstep the bounds of their mission in northern Iraq, protecting Kurdish refugees.

In another development, about 400 Kurds held a peaceful demonstration in the northern city of Zakho, the center of the allied occupation, to protest reports that the United States had begun to scale down its military presence.

U.S. Army Special Forces have all but left the area. Members of the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit, the most American fighting troops, are also preparing to go home.

The demonstration Thursday morning was the first since bloody clashes involving thousands of Kurds rocked the provincial capital of Dohuk, 50 miles south of Zakho, on Sunday.



Police move to drive out protesters

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Thousands of riot police cordoned off a hospital Thursday preparing to drive out militant students blocking an autopsy on a student who died during an anti-government demonstration.

Local newspapers, quoting government sources, said a police raid on the Paik Hospital in central Seoul appeared imminent. Some reported the raid would be made before dawn Friday.

About 300 militant students who have been nursing the hospital morgue received 2,500 teargas canisters and stockpiled rocks and other missiles in preparation for a fight with police. They poured gasoline over barricades erected from wooden planks, trash cans and broken furniture.

"We will fight to the end," said a student leader on guard at one end of a street in front of the hospital.

Hospital officials were busy moving patients to other hospitals and sealing windows with adhesive tape to keep out tear gas. Shops along the streets were closed, with metal shutters down.

Tougher measures by the government are a result of a student mob attack on Prime Minister Chung

Won-shik at a Seoul campus on Monday. Chung was kicked and punched by students and pelted with raw eggs and flour.

The attack turned the tide in the current political confrontation, with previously silent middle-class Koreans joining in a nationwide call for an end to violent protests.

For the first time in memory, about 200 Korean citizens halted fighting between about 600 police and 500 students Wednesday night. "Who are you?" student protesters yelled at the citizens outside Seoul's Korea University.

Gorbachev tells West not to meddle

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — Mikhail S. Gorbachev, stung by criticism of his policy on the Baltic republics, warned Western powers Thursday against getting involved in internal Soviet affairs by encouraging separatist movements.

Gorbachev visited Sweden and Norway, where he delivered his Nobel Peace Prize lecture on Wednesday, but his triumph was clouded by questions about Soviet troop attacks in secessionist Lithuania.

"Compassion by a neighboring country must not take the form of meddling in the affairs of the Soviet Union, especially when it is in the process of reform," Gorbachev said as he emerged from a meeting with Swedish Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson.

The Soviet president, renewing his call for Western aid, said "one should instead support this process, which is being carried out within the framework of the constitution."

OLSZTYN, Poland — Pope John Paul II on Thursday dismissed suggestions the Catholic church seek political power in Poland and warned his countrymen not to abuse their newly gained freedoms by preaching lies and hate.

On the sixth day of his fourth pilgrimage home, the pope took on two issues subject to bitter debate for months in post-Communist Poland. But he also paused to sympathize with children suffering the effects of the Chernobyl nuclear disaster.

John Paul said the support of this overwhelmingly Roman Catholic country for the church through four decades of Communist rule served as a "shield" that helped the church survive.

Now, the pope said, "one can hear fears and criticisms... not infrequently in a suggestive manner, of the church's apparent efforts to come to power and threaten the established autonomy of different areas of government and public life."

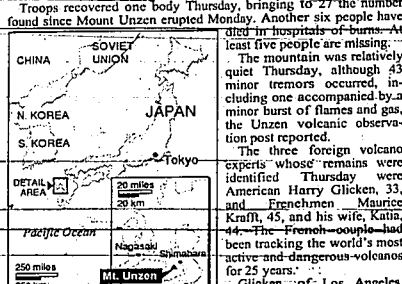
Troops recovered one body Thursday, bringing to 27 the number found since Mount Unzen erupted Monday. Another six people have died in hospitals of wounds.

Glicken, of Los Angeles, narrowly escaped death in the 1980 Mount St. Helens eruption in Washington. He was identified by colleagues from the Tokyo Metropolitan University where he was doing research.

I want to tell other women that if something like this ever happens to them, to report it immediately!

Hiding it was the worst mistake I could have ever made. Now they may never catch the creep who did this to me.

DEAR SCARED: Thanks for giving me this opportunity to tell my readers that if rapes should be reported immediately. (For the record: A person is raped when another person forces her (or him) to have sex against that person's will.)

Many victims of rape fail to report the crime because they are ashamed or embarrassed. That's a big mistake. The rapist is then free to rape another victim.

Letterman miffed that Leno to host Johnny Carson show

NBC officially announced today that comedian Jay Leno will take over as host of "The Tonight Show" when Johnny Carson retires next year.

"We are happy to have Jay Leno, one of the most talented comedians in the business as Johnny's successor," Warren Littlefield, president of NBC, announced and executive vice president of NBC Productions, said in a statement.

Leno, 41, has been exclusive guest host of "The Tonight Show" for the past three years.

"Leno has proven extremely popular with the late-night audience and we are confident that the show will continue its late-night dominance for many, many years," Littlefield said.

Carson, whose last show will be May 22, said through an NBC spokesman: "I wish Jay all the success in the world. He's a bright young performer and I think along with David Letterman — who has proven his staying power for the last 10 years — NBC will have a great late-night lineup."

The New York Daily News said Letterman, once considered Carson's heir apparent, was described by an unnamed source as "fit to be tied" when told of Leno's appointment.

"Late Night with David Letterman" is broadcast immediately after "Tonight."

Carson's company produces "Tonight" and, in association with NBC, the Letterman show.

The News said "Tonight" brings in an estimated \$60 million annually for the network, which is 15 percent of NBC's revenue.

"Johnny's the best at what he does," Leno told USA Today. "I don't think we'll ever see the likes of it again. No one will ever hold an audience for 30 years the way Johnny has."

He said he had a couple of people in mind for sidekick announcer and bandleader, but had not discussed it with them yet.

Carson's crew, Ed McMahon and Doc Severinsen, are expected to retire with him next May.

Shandling will stand up Saturday on HBO

His four-year stint on the hilarious Showtime/Fox comedy series "It's Garry Shandling's Show" tended to obscure the fact that Garry Shandling, one of the mutated lips and nerdy bearing — happens to be one of the funniest stand-up comedians in the business.

The audience at the Irvine Barclay Theatre on the University of California, Irvine, campus discovered that first-hand last winter when Shandling tried out some new material for a cable comedy special.

Saturday night at 11, HBO subscribers can find Shandling culled from that night in Irvine. It's called "Garry Shandling: Stand-Up," and it indeed shows that Shandling is a stand-up guy to be reckoned with.

This is one of the three of four

best solo comedy hours to air on HBO, the others being performances by "Anything But Love's" Richard Lewis and another by ex-"Saturday Night Live" cast member Dennis Miller.

With razor-sharp wit and flawless timing, Shandling emerges from his self-imposed stand-up exile in grand style. He dons his trademark baffled-but-blissful persona to stride uproariously through a well-paced routine that includes anecdotal observations about life, politics and the hazards of being Garry.

Shandling bemoans aging ("Having just turned 41, I can tell you — life begins at 20"), his hometown of Trenton, N.J. ("20 degrees there in the summer. Dogs walk down the street and catch on fire") and the hazards of romance in the '90s ("I practice safe sex. I use an air bag").

He is also a guy who remains loyal to his mother, saying "Even when-

I go out with my mom I don't look at other moms." And politically, Shandling claims to be middle-of-the-road: "I've never burned a flag; but I've never put one out, either."

But Shandling's strength isn't so much his one-liners, good though they are, but his rambling stories like one about how he accidentally met President Bush while on a White House tour and got invited to dinner that night.

Few comedians these days seem capable of keeping the humor flowing effectively without liberally springing their routine with profane phrases for their shock value. But Shandling is one. He's clean, he's hip, he's natural, he's witty.

He's also a little bit underrated. But more specials like Saturday's can't help but shoot Garry Shandling to the front of the comedy pack.

Here's a simple way to dress up videos

It's tempting to think that with today's camcorders, home movies are a simple matter of pointing and shooting.

But the hapless videomaker who potently endures your video creations probably has a second opinion.

Raw footage captivates few people other than the subject of the moment and the camera operator.

But the situation can be improved. One way to spruce up a home video is to use introductory titles and graphics, so that the host of a screening isn't constantly explaining the visuals.

Some of the more expensive camcorders can supply such effects in limited form.

Alternatively, the serious videomaker can choose from many post-production processors that offer a range of visual tricks.

Now, however, there's a simple, inexpensive way to dress up home videos, and it will work with any tape format you happen to have.

Creative Video Images, a small video production company in Voorhees, has released the first volume in its "Network Series" of videocassettes, "Animated 3D Video Titles and Special Effects" (S39.95).

Contained in this one 30-minute tape are more than 50 titles, graphics and sound elements that you can add to your footage during the editing process.

The graphics are "3D" only in the sense that they are designed, like block letters, to give the illusion of a depth.

But on a brief demonstration tape I saw, the illusion was quite good, similar to the professional animated titles on TV that introduce news programs in which the camera seems to move through and around the lettering.

For example, "Happy Birthday" shows a background of confetti and streamers.

To the accompaniment of party noises, shiny letters forming "Happy Birthday" slide across the screen.

To introduce wedding footage, an animated photo album that looks like leather and is inscribed with "Our Wedding Memories" flips up and then flips open to reveal an empty rectangle into which the camera moves.

Other events covered by the tape (in addition to holidays) include vacation, baby shower, engagement, bar mitzvah, anniversary and no less than three birthday titles.

Instructions for copying the desired segments are included on a printed card and on the tape itself.

"Animated 3D Video Titles" is the brainchild of Gary Passanante, who with his brother Mike founded Creative Video Images as a part-time job in 1982. At the time, Passanante worked for RCA in its accessories division.

Several years ago, he became so busy at Creative Video that he left his daytime job to give video production his full attention.

One recent project was to put together the cassette version of Blockbuster Video's Blockbuster Bowl college football game for sale at the chain's stores.

The tape represents the first consumer product to be originated and marketed by Creative Video Image. "My background is in marketing to consumers," says Passanante, "so even though the company deals with corporate clients, I think I know what the consumer wants."

Most consumers, of course, will use the VHS version, but Passanante promises to fulfill any need: Beta, 8mm, VHS-C and even Super VHS.

"We have the material stored digitally," he says, "and we can duplicate it in any format."

The tape is being sold through a toll-free telephone number, but the company hopes to enlist traditional retailers such as mass merchants, department stores and video stores.

Other "Network Series" cassettes in the works include one focusing solely on sporting events. Another will be a child's album with titles keyed to events ranging throughout a young life, from delivery and first steps to prom night and graduation. Passanante hopes to have at least one of these ready by the end of the year.

Some movies will bypass videotape and go directly to laserdisc

Unofficially it's been happening for some time, with operas, ballets, and other relatively obscure movies that haven't drawn a lot of attention on the video market.

But this year it's official. Some movies will bypass videotape and be released only on laserdisc.

It's partly a promotional ploy, in order to draw attention to the laser market — and to a few vintage films that might otherwise pass unnoticed if they were released to tape at the same time.

MGM/UA recently made the announcement that its summer schedule will include exclusive laserdisc releases of a letterboxed edition of Vincente Minnelli's "Two Weeks in Another Town" (plus the vintage short "Big Sur," about Minnelli's filming of "The Sandlot") and the live-action version of the 1945 MGM musical, "Rose Marie" (plus

the vintage short, "Merry Wives of Windsor Overture").

In addition, CBS/Fox has announced the laser release of five Academy Award winners that are not available on tape: "How Green Was My Valley," "Three Coins in the Fountain," "The Three Faces of Eve" (letterboxed), "Gentleman's Agreement" and "A Letter to Three Wives."

The Voyager Co., which has released many laser exclusives — the original "The Godfather" and "The Godfather Part II," "The Third Kind," wide-screen editions of "Silverado" and

"Zulu" — is also preparing the summer release of a special version of Peter Bogdanovich's "The Last Picture Show," including seven minutes of footage that haven't been shown publicly before.

The disc will also include interviews with Bogdanovich, Cybill Shepherd, Randy Quaid, Cloris Leachman and other cast members.

MGM/UA's current Laser release of "How the West Was Won" also offers something that can't be enjoyed on tape: an approximation of the original film's three-screen Cinerama format.

The disc can't quite accommodate the wide, wide look of Cinerama when it took three synchronized cameras to shoot (the separate original negatives have been destroyed), but it comes close.

The Lumivision disc of D.W. Griffith's racist silent epic, "The Birth of a Nation," includes material not available on any tape version, including excerpts from the

black-produced answer to Griffith's version of Reconstruction, "The Birth of a Race."

The film itself was recorded at 16 frames per second (silent speed), runs for 200 minutes, features color tints and the original score by Joseph Breit.

Not exclusive to disc, but likely to find its strongest supporters on laser, is MGM/UA's restoration of "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World," which is due for release in both formats June 26.

Previous video versions have run only 154 minutes, but this 182-minute release comes closer to the 1963 comedy's original 193 minutes.

It will be letterboxed on both tape and disc, but the aspect ratio on the disc release will be wider — and closer to the film's original single-camera Cinerama presentation.

The missing footage, which includes an overture and intermission

United Artists, which originally distributed the film, cut half an hour out of it in early 1964 and had lost all the footage.

Although laser has become the accepted format for letterboxing, some companies continue to release original film's wide-screen proportions.

Most controversial at the moment are Media Home Entertainment's decision to release David Lynch's "Wild at Heart" in a panned-and-scanned version, and RCA/Columbia's cropped discs of two wide-screen westerns, "Jubal" and "MacKenzie's Gold."

'City Slickers' is a man's film

Reports of the demise of the male-bonding movie are highly exaggerated. The art form is splendidly alive and well in Billy Crystal's new comedy, "City Slickers."

Review

Never has the buddy movie been so blatant — or so hilarious. Lowell Gantz and Babaloo Mandel ("Parenthood"), have written a script that is loaded with flip one-liners, explosive sight gags and a few surprises in a predictable plot line. Ron Underwood's direction smoothly contrasts the shallow, claustrophobic urban life with the raw grandeur of the great outdoors.

"City Slickers" begins with a pseudo-macho New York trio — Billy Crystal, Daniel Stern, Bruno Kirby — outunning the bulls in Pamplona, Spain (Crystal doesn't quite make it). This is one of their annual excursions to reassert their sagging manhood.

Back in Manhattan, they return to their humdrum lives.

Crystal is happily married (to Patricia Wettig), has two kids and a boring job as ad manager of a radio station. Stern is unemployed (he's in a mental hospital), has two kids and works for his father-in-law at a supermarket. Kirby is a single swinger who dreams of adventures while selling sporting goods.

Kirby persuades his pals to join a cattle drive from New Mexico to Colorado. The greenhorns report to the

ranch and are taken in hand by a pair of surly wranglers and the awesome cattle driver, Jack Palance.

The other vacationers are father-and-son dentists, a clownish pair of ice cream manufacturers and Helen Slater.

The laughter flows as the city folk struggle to learn the ropes of frontier life. Things turn grim as the New York trio find themselves in charge of the cattle drive.

How that happens is the weak point of the Gantz-Mandel script, but the end result will prove satisfactory to audiences.

Crystal, who has established himself as an energetic Woody Allen, transforms his neuroses into a fine comic portrait. Stern, the tall burglar

in "Home Alone," again impresses as one of the best comedy actors today. Kirby plays much the same character as he did in "The Freshman," and he proves an ideal corner of the triangle.

The humor of "City Slickers" is the leather-fact, soft-speaking Palance. As long as he's on the screen, which isn't long enough, he steals the movie and tucks it in his saddlebag. The women in the film, especially the talented Slater, serve only as plot devices. This is, after all, a man's film.

The Castle Rock film is released by Columbia Pictures and produced by Irby Smith, with Crystal as executive producer. The rating is PG-13, mostly for language. Running time: 117 minutes.

Comedian drives a point and some cattle home in 'City Slickers'

LOS ANGELES — Its comedy is bright and scenery sunny, but a cloud looms above Billy Crystal's "City Slickers": finding meaning at age 40.

Three longtime friends (Crystal, Bruno Kirby and Daniel Stern) fritter away a few weeks every year taking a vacation-adventure together. Chased by the bulls of Pamplona, Spain, on one such jaunt, the three run for their lives.

"When I came up with the idea for the movie, it wasn't three funny guys hit the plains," said Crystal, who also served as executive producer and pitched the film's premise to writers Lowell Gantz and Babaloo Mandel ("Parenthood").

"It was to tell a story about friendship, and to tell a story about trusting. If friends are friends in good times, they are a better friend if they're there when you're not feeling so good."

It's also about men and women at a certain age when they enter "What If?" land, and I should have, could have territories. You sort of forget your purpose in life. You get clouded over. And it's not just an age thing. It's a confusion — a confusion of priorities.

Audiences know Crystal more for his comic reflections than for his insights into the human condition.

Through his work in television's "Soap" and "Saturday Night Live" and the movies "Throw Momma from the Train" and "When Harry Met Sally ...," Crystal has avoided heavy issues in favor of light comedy. Nowadays, though, his jokes seem to carry more weight.

Along with Robin Williams and Whoopi Goldberg, Crystal helps feed, care for and house the homeless through the annual benefit concert "Comin' Right!"

"Sessions," a comedy series debuting this fall on cable's Home Box Office, explores the labor and laughs

of a man in psychotherapy. And then there's "City Slickers."

"I wanted to make a 'Deliverance' with laughs, and I wanted it to be truthful," Crystal said. "If there's no pain in the movie, then I simply have a funny movie. That's OK, but there's so much more to tell."

Jack Palance co-stars in the film as Cully, a veteran cowboy whose prairie wisdom helps Robbins resolve his crisis.

"When Cully says, 'There's nothing like bringing in the herd,' it's a metaphor for the whole piece — finishing something that you set out to do: raising your family, honoring your commitments.

"It's not about cows. It's about yourself and your priorities in life."

"City Slickers" was filmed on location in New Mexico and Colorado. Crystal, Stern and Kirby all learned to ride for the film. Crystal liked his quarterhorse so much he moved him to Southern California after the movie wrapped.

"The movie, I think, has a real beautiful feeling of nostalgia, and there's a simplicity about the West and the cowboys' attitude and point of view about life that helps me in my own life," Crystal said. "I loved being with these guys. I found myself just herding cattle in between takes with the wranglers and hanging out with them. It's simple. It's right to the point."

The film is dotted with small autobiographical details from Crystal's own life — the telephone calls from his mother, his first baseball game. Mitch Robbins (Crystal) exact right, however, does not mirror precisely the real-life predicaments of Crystal and writers Gantz and Mandel.

"We're not as confused as Mitch about where we're going, but there's a little haze there," Crystal said. "We all took turns talking about where we were at. It's a very real."

'Thelma & Louise': A pointed look at the war between sexes

THELMA & LOUISE (R). Provocative, poignant and heart-breakingly funny, this neo-feminist road movie is as pointed a look at the war between the sexes as we have had in some time. Susan Sarandon and Geena Davis scintillate as two pals who take to the road for a calming weekend and end up embarking on a desperate voyage of self-discovery. Screenwriter Callie Khouri and director Ridley Scott seamlessly blend serious concerns with mainstream entertainment.

BACKDRAFT (R). If fires had press agents, the spectacular blazes which energize this film would have their names up in lights and the flesh and blood stars would end up in small print. One-of-a-kind special effects added with a dime-a-dozen story. Too bad the human drama

doesn't grab us emotionally as convincingly as those darn fires.

HUDSON HAWK (R). Bruce Willis not only stars in this wannabe comic caper, he came up with its story line of an ace cat burglar approached to pull off a series of daring thefts for a mysterious cabal of bad guys. The idea may have been OK, but the script doesn't possess a shred of wit. The action sequences are lethargic and everyone involved would have been better off staying in bed.

NEW JACK CITY (R). A modern gangster thriller about the crack cocaine trade in contemporary Harlem, Mario Van Peebles' directorial debut has lots of baroque visual style, kinky violence, an offset cast (Wesley Snipes, Ice-T, Judd Nelson, and Van Peebles himself) and some surprising hip-hop or gang argot. But it's basically a shallow, moralistic melodrama that's cliched at the core. Gang leader Snipes easily steals the film.

ONLY THE LONELY (PG-13). Director Chris Columbus' first

movie after mega-hit "Home Alone" is quieter, smaller: an attempt at a humane, naturalistic comedy about a bachelor cop (John Candy, radiating comic sweetness) and his domineering mother (Maureen O'Hara). The cast is first-rate, but the film's fine moments and humane spirit are caught in a limbo-between-naturalism and archetype, easy yucks and keener perceptions. It takes O'Hara's brazenly sentimental mom—a really stellar comeback—to keep the film on track.

OUT FOR JUSTICE (R). In most ways, the usual rough-and-ugly, slam-bang, cop-vs-psycho (which is which?) vendetta thriller, this new Steven Seagal movie actually has something extra: a Seasese-style heavy, Indo-American lingo and atmosphere and some surprising, in-your-face macho humor. It's mean, but it moves; directed by John Flynn.

WHAT ABOUT BOB? (G). Bill Murray and Richard Dreyfuss are very funny in this spotty but occasionally amusing comedy about a multi-phobic schmo who dogs after his psychiatrist on his summer vacation.

'Backdraft' claims top spot in box office for second straight weekend

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Backdraft" was the nation's most popular film for the second consecutive weekend, and "Hudson Hawk" emerged as the first big-budget bust of the summer movie season.

The firefighter drama "Backdraft," pairing Kurt Russell and William Baldwin, collected \$9.1 million, down a steep 42 percent from its Memorial Day premiere, according to figures released by Entertainment Data Inc.

Ticket sales for "Hudson Hawk" dropped a catastrophic 36 percent in its second weekend, generating just \$3.1 million for sixth place.

The comic crime caper, which cost \$51 million to make, stars

Bruce Willis as a singing cat burglar.

In second place was "Soapdish," a behind-the-scenes soap opera spoof. In its debut, "Soapdish" had ticket sales of \$6.7 million.

"What About Bob?" a comedy with Bill Murray as a psychiatric patient who won't go away, landed in third with proceeds of \$6.4 million.

"Thelma and Louise," a panoramic road movie casting Geena Davis and Susan Sarandon as fugitive friends, held steady in fourth place on receipts of \$4.2 million.

"Only the Lonely," a comedy from the makers of "Home Alone," remained in fifth with a gross of \$3.6 million.

"Hudson Hawk" was sixth and "Drop Dead Fred," a teen comedy,

was seventh on proceeds of \$2.4 million.

The special-effects sequel "FX 2" took eighth with a gate of \$1.5 million.

"Home Alone" was ninth and sold \$1.42 million worth of tickets and "Stone Cold" was 10th by collecting \$1.41 million.

Booksellers hoping 'Gone With the Wind' is mega-hit

NEW YORK — Booksellers across the country are hoping that the recession will be gone with the wind. And if it's not, they hope that "Scarlett: The Sequel to Margaret Mitchell's Gone With the Wind," by Alexandra Ripley, will turn red ink into black as customers line up to buy copies. The long-awaited novel will be published by Warner Books on Sept. 25 with an initial printing of 500,000 copies.

"I'm very curious about it," said Sally Knox, a bookseller from Greenville, Del. "It's the kind of book that my store can sell. After all, everyone loves 'Gone With the Wind.'"

Whether they will love the sequel to the famous 1936 novel is a question on the minds of many American Booksellers' Association annual convention and trade show, which began June 1 at the Jacob K. Javits Convention Center and ended June 4. The event has attracted more than 80,000 people to the publishing industry, about a third of them booksellers getting their first glimpse at what books will be published this fall. The booksellers are counting on books such as "Scarlett" and others by brand-name authors such as Stephen King and Danielle Steel to boost sagging sales.

But booksellers found out more about the forthcoming Steel and King novels than they did about the secrecy-shrouded "GWTW" sequel, which Warner bought three years ago for \$4.94 million. Ripley, the 56-year-old historical novelist, handpicked by Margaret Mitchell's estate to write the sequel, refused to

give any details of Scarlett's further adventures when she chatted with guests at a party in her honor.

"I'm hoping people will like it, but I am a little nervous about it," said Ripley, who then explained why she was leaning on an elegant white cane headed by a carved cockatoo. "I broke my knee earlier this year, just two weeks after I finished the manuscript. I don't think that was very nice of me."

To which one guest whispered, "Maybe it wasn't God but Margaret Mitchell" — an indication that some people are none too happy that anyone has the temerity to continue Scarlett's story, something Mitchell refused to do during her lifetime.

Will Scarlett and Rhett Butler get back together? The burning question will remain unanswered until September, if Warner has its way. Only a handful of people within the publishing news have read the 400-page book, and they all have been sworn to secrecy. Ripley will not do any press interviews until publication date, and Warner is not sending out advance copies to reviewers.

Still, a few plot details have leaked: Scarlett travels from Atlanta to Savannah, Charleston (Rhett Butler's hometown) and Ireland (site of the original Tara). Also, Rhett figures in less than a quarter of the story.

Warner is less shy about its \$600,000 marketing campaign for Scarlett, which will be published simultaneously in 40 countries and is a main selection of the Literary Guild and the Doubleday Book Club. Readers will get their first peek in August when the September issue of Life magazine hits the stands with a cover story on the book and an excerpt.

Norman Lear issues special invitation to brand new type of 'Sunday Dinner'

Twenty years after the premiere of "All in the Family," 16 years after the premiere of "The Jeffersons" and seven years after his last series, the less glorious "A.K.A. Pablo," Norman Lear is again producing a situation comedy, "Sunday Dinner," airing Sundays on CBS. Robert Loggia stars as Ben.

Benedict, a 56-year-old widower and father of three grown children.

"When he brings home 30-year-old Teri Fagori (Teri Hatcher) and introduces her as his fiancée, family relations become a bit strained.

Loggia is confident that kind of age difference is not a problem and is sure that this particular couple will not stretch credibility. "It's part of the culture," he insists. "Whether it's a divorce or a spouse dying, men live longer than they ever have. So you have a lot of men, if they stay healthy, and if they see a lovely lady, they won't mind saying, 'Will you go out with me?' or 'Will you marry me?'"

"I think it's provocative," Loggia says. "I don't think it will be a turn-off. I think if it had been a relationship due to divorce, a lot of women might have been turned off, but the fact that he is a widower won't alienate people."

Loggia waxes enthusiastic about co-star Hatcher. "She's wonderful on and off the stage," he says. "She is just a fabulous actress, extremely attractive—I think she's got it all to be a big star, and indeed a great deal of the show depends on her. I think people will tune in because they

want to look at her and see what she has to say."

TT (short for Thelma Todd) is an environmental attorney with a tendency to spontaneously engage in conversations with a higher being she addresses as "He," "She" and, most often, "Chief." This leads to further conflict with Ben's family. Vicky (Martha Gehman), a slightly dowdy microbiology student, is an atheist; Diana (Karl Lizer), a flake whose religion is dependent upon whomever she's dating, and Kenneth (Patrick Breen) worships only money.

"They're wonderful," Loggia says of the actors who play Ben's family. "They're extremely intelligent. I was proud to have them as my children."

But he reserves most of his enthusiasm for the show's producer. "I've known Norman (Lear) for many

years, 30 plus, and we've never worked together. It's nice that we finally got around to doing just that. I think we've accomplished a really interesting show."

As an actor who moves with ease between television and movies (he was nominated for a 1985 Best Supporting Actor Oscar for his performance in "Jagged Edge"), Loggia fairly bristles when he is asked if he finds films more satisfying than television. "I just don't operate that way," Loggia says emphatically.

"I kind of play it as it lays. I never look down on anything. Even when I was doing episodic TV."

They did, last year, purchase an \$8 million Art Deco triplex penthouse in Manhattan, but they are also very much a part of the Big Orange. They reside in a contemporary home on the water at Malibu's Carbon Beach and recently put their smaller Mulholland Drive home on the market for \$2 million. This was an interim residence during the period when the beach house was under construction.

Q: How many criminals have been caught as a result of people recognizing fugitives they saw on that TV show? — S.I.

A: The program "America's Most Wanted" claims 148 arrests out of 347 of the fugitives shown. However, a similar show, "Unsolved Mysteries," got into trouble when two radio disc jockeys recreated on the TV program an incident from their radio show where a caller (a fellow disc jockey) claimed he murdered his girlfriend. The call was a hoax and, in addition to the station's other problems, the L.A. sheriff's department has demanded more than \$12,000 for money wasted investigating the "crime."

Q: I understand that many celebrities have become major investors in works of art. Who are they and what are their areas of concentration? — P.L.

The magic wand of Gloria Monty isn't performing any miracles in '91 at "General Hospital." Gloria returned in mid-January to put oomph into the show and repeat her lifesaving touches that turned a dullish "General Hospital" into a dazzler.

So far, no fireworks. "GH" struggles for third place in the ratings with "The Price Is Right," and some observers are puzzled.

Where is the old sparkle?

The sudden exit by Jack Wagner (Frisco Jones) to join "Santa Barbara" can't be construed as an improvement. After a seven-year run as Frisco, Wagner seems more concerned lately about his golf stroke as the Bel Air Club champ than he is in Frisco. But fans are conditioned to Jack. Cutting from "GH" to rival "Santa Barbara" in the afternoon to see Wagner means breaking habits, something that hasn't happened to NBC's sassy low-rated soap. NBC fans will see Wagner playing in the Lake Tahoe Pro-Am Tourney during the July 4 weekend, but they're not soap followers.

About the only good news for "GH" fans is the Emmy nomination of Finola Hughes as Anna Lavery in the lead actress division. (The Daytime Emmys will be awarded in prime time on CBS Thursday, June 27.)

Last year Finola was considered an outsider in the actress division because that was supposed to be Susan Lucci's time after a string of unexpected losses. Will Lucci finally break through in '91? Or is Finola going to be the upsetter?

The feeling in Hollywood is that Finola might pull it off. It's just the kind of boost Monty needs for "Hospital." Finola pleases everyone, even the Eastern crowd, who tend to look down on Hollywood hustlers. Hughes and Lucci recently appeared in ABC's TV movie "The Bride in Black," so they would still speak to each other.

A lady to the core, Finola won't talk about competing against Susan or Jeanne Cooper of "The Young and the Restless." She's very polite about the publicity business, maintaining she has nothing of interest to

offer.

An English beauty from the original London cast of "Cats," Finola just doesn't give a hoot about publicity, a Hollywood basic. It's not obligatory in her mind. Work in front of the camera does all Finola's talking.

To be truthful Finola winces at the Hollywood rat race and the idea that the public has a right to know about her private life. She disagrees, and goes her own way.

How refreshing. A lady strong enough to know her talents and keep to herself.

So here's to Finola, refusing to sell out even for an Emmy.

CBS ends up at the top of the Nielsen but fewer viewers are watching tube

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The final episode of "thirtysomething" had the series' highest ranking ever, but the dwindling numbers of net-work viewers confirmed that the summer rerun season has hit full stride.

For the second consecutive week, ratings released by the A.C. Nielsen Co. dropped to single digits. According to figures released Tuesday, CBS finished first with a 9.6 average.

ABC was a close second with 9.4. NBC, hampered by lackluster ratings for its broadcasts of two National Basketball Association Conference finals games, was third with a 9 average and failed to place any shows in the top 10.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

ABC scored a hit with the final episode of its yuppie drama "thirtysomething." The network's recent cancellation announcement helped make May 28's closing episode the No. 4 show on television last week. It was the highest ranked installment in the series' four-season history. The previous week, it finished in 66th place.

Nick, ABC to share new series

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC and cable's Nickelodeon Network will air the same new summer series in an arrangement that both networks call unprecedented.

Each episode will be shown twice a week — first on ABC, then on Nick at Night.

The agreement for "Hi Honey, I'm Home" marks the first time a cable network has sold a prime-time series to a broadcast network, said Geoffrey Darby, Nickelodeon senior vice president for programming. His company is co-producing the show with RiPo Productions.

But it isn't the first time a cable network has sold a show to a broadcast network, Darby added.

He said his company first did it with "Nickelodeon Gets Real Mature," a half-hour special that

ABC aired in prime time May 19. ABC confirmed that the show ran, but under the title, "Real Mature."

ABC earlier said it had no information on Darby's claim that the broadcast network had bought "Hi Honey, I'm Home" for a six-week run that starts in mid-July. It later confirmed it would air the series during the summer, but gave no other details.

The show is about the Nielsens, stars of a happy 1950s sitcom. After their show is canceled, they move to New Jersey and live next to the Duffs, a troubled family of the '90s.

"Hi Honey," Nickelodeon's first original comedy series, was commissioned for Nick at Nick; Nickelodeon's nighttime programming. ABC tried to buy it but was rebuffed, Darby said.

But Nickelodeon changed its mind and made a deal with ABC's West Coast programmers, he said.

He said Nick at Night takes pride in its reruns of such network series as "Mr. Ed" and "Green Acres" and saw this as an opportunity to have fun and "create the first instant rerun." The way his network sets it, "we're actually helping the networks create future Nick at Night programming," he said.

The deal lets ABC "expand our horizons" in buying programs, while at the same time "offering original programming to our schedule this summer," ABC Entertainment President Robert A. Iger said.

If ABC buys the series as a midseason replacement for the 1991-92 season, Nick at Night won't air subsequent episodes, Darby said.
