# Idaho census may have been short

WASHINGTON — The Census Bureau released figures Thursday estimating Idaho's population in 1990 was 1,035,000, 2.7 percent higher than the original estimates. Last December, the Census Bureau reported that Idaho's official population count was 1,006,749. Although that is still the official tally, Secretary of Commerce Robert Moshbacher may elect to use the adjusted numbers released Thursday instead of the official count when he delivers the Census results to the president on July 15.

The Census Bureau did not release a breakdown of the new population figures by county. Many other Western states bordering Idaho showed high undercount rates. Wyoming, with an official population of 435,588, was undercounted by 2.7 percent according to the adjusted numbers. Montana's official population of 799,065 was undercounted by 2.8 percent. Howard Hogan, a Census Bureau statistician, offered a theory to explain why the count is so many Western states came up short. Idaho and other Western states were

polled differently than the rest of the country for the Census, Hogan explained. Elsewhere, Census Bureau enumerators searched an area for dwellings, jotted down the addresses, and sent out Census surveys to those addresses. If a household didn't mail in its survey, a Census enumerator personally paid a visit. But the West, with its vast distances and sparse population, is polled entirely differently, Hogan said. After the surveys are mailed out, enumerators don't "pre-list" or travel around the state to personally follow-up on households that did not respond.

Hundreds of millions of dollars in federal aid to states, counties and cities are tied to the Census figures. The results of the Census are also used to figure how many representatives each state has in the House of Representatives. Currently, Idaho has two seats in the House. The state most likely will not lose or gain any seats because of the Census, said Melodie Rydlich, a spokeswoman for Rep. Richard Stallins, D-Idaho, but the Census could change the borders of Idaho's two legislative districts. "Most people assume part of Ada County will be shifted between the two districts," Rydlich said.

# Yeltsin will confer with Bush

WASHINGTON — The White House said Thursday that Boris Yeltsin will meet with President Bush next week during a victory trip following his triumph as the first popularly elected president of Russia. Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the election was "a good sign in the sense of reform and democracy. Elections are always a symbol, a hallmark of the democratic process. This is the first election in Russia and we're happy to see it."

and factories to individuals, was declared the winner Thursday. His trip to Washington, at the invitation of members of Congress, will help demonstrate his independence from Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Fitzwater said Bush wants to discuss with Yeltsin "his new position and to discuss the future of the Russian Republic as well as any other matters he wants to talk about."

The spokesman said his remarks should not be taken as attempt to draw comparisons between Yeltsin and Gorbachev.

"President Gorbachev of course leads the Soviet Union and all the republics and Yeltsin now becomes (elected) president of the Russian Republic... So their relationship is pretty well established by law in that system," he said.

"We don't want to get into a comparison of the two men. But in terms of the process, this election is very important."

Yeltsin visited the White House in 1990 as part of a tour of the United States. Fitzwater indicated the new invitation had been extended before Yeltsin was declared the winner of the first popular election for president of the Russian Federation.

Meanwhile, Fitzwater said that there were still obstacles to a summit in Moscow between Bush and Gorbachev to sign a nuclear arms-reduction treaty.

"We're interested in seeing them sign the START treaty," Fitzwater said. However, he said that U.S. officials including

# Philippine volcano pauses, trembles

MANILA, Philippines — Mount Pinatubo blew a cloud of ash and pumice 80,000 feet in the air Thursday, coating tropical villages and mountainsides with a thick carpet of snowy debris.

The volcano was quiet early Friday but its magma dome was rising, indicating more eruptions were likely, said geologist Julio Sabit. The ground shook with continuous tremors from the crater.

Nearly 50,000 people, many of them primitive Aeta tribesmen, have jammed refugee centers to escape the volcano's fury. Aetas worship the volcano as a god and believe it is angry because of geothermal development projects in the area.

Thursday morning's eruption was one of the strongest of seven that have shaken the 4,795-foot volcano since Wednesday. White ash three inches deep covered tropical areas as far away as Olongapo, 25

miles to the southwest, vehicles that stalled under a deluge of ash dotted the roadside.

"What we are seeing now are phenomenal eruptions," said Raymond Punongbayan, director of the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology. "The story of Mount Pinatubo is not quite over yet."

The Manila weather bureau reported, meanwhile, that a depression was forming in the Pacific Ocean east of Luzon island and could strengthen into a tropical storm by Friday.

Punongbayan warned that heavy rain would increase the threat of devastating mudflows that could send giant boulders and tons of ash crashing down Mount Pinatubo into lowlands as far away as 25 miles.

Thursday's explosion sent thousands

more refugees streaming into evacuation centers, and looters ransacked offices at a U.S. military garrison on Clark Air Base that was evacuated Monday. In all, 50,000 people have been evacuated from areas near the volcano since last week.

The latest eruption occurred Thursday morning and lasted a half-hour. It unleashed giant mudflows down the jagged, ash-covered western slopes of the mountain and into the Marella River.

The eruption sent a gray avalanche of deadly ash and molten rock down the slopes. The billowing cloud and pumice the size of hailstones turned day to dusk.

Debris from the eruption covered roads, and huge boulders, some the size of cars, littered gullies and riverbeds.

Associated Press reporter Claro Cortes, who was 10 miles west of the crater when the eruption occurred, said residents fled on foot in panic, some clutching chickens and holding handkerchiefs over their faces.

# Circus bleachers collapse; 15 hurt

TWIN FALLS — About 15 people, mostly children, received minor injuries Thursday night when a section of bleachers collapsed during the Reid Brothers Circus.

Paramedics at the scene behind the Blue Lakes Shopping Center reported only cuts and bruises among spectators, but those injured were taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center for treatment at about 8:30 p.m.

Circus officials stopped the show briefly when police requested an announcement asking everyone who was injured to go outside the circus tent, where a pair of ambulances, a police car and a taxi took people to the hospital.

"There weren't even any broken bones that I saw," Twin Falls Police Officer Curtis Gambrel said. Circus officials checked the remaining bleachers and decided they were safe, Gambrel said.

Within minutes, the show continued and spectators seemed unfazed by the incident.

"I just heard it. There was a big crash," said Alan Morris of Twin Falls, who was sitting right beside the felled seats.

Morris said he and his young nieces and nephews first sat on the bleachers that later collapsed, but moved because there wasn't enough room.

"They were packed full," he said. Several disappointed circus fans milled around the waiting area outside the hospital emergency room shortly after the incident.

Three-year-old Sheldon Westwood went to see the circus, but didn't get the chance. His brother, Wade, was brought in by ambulance, complaining of a sore neck, said their grandfather, Wade Kincheloe of Jerome.

Sheldon nodded that he wasn't hurt and felt OK.

"It broke," said Shelly Lampo of Twin Falls, who was sitting about five rows up in the bleachers with her husband and children. The show had barely started. "The lions were walking out to the ring," she said.

When the bleachers leaned and began to collapse, Frank Lampo grabbed the three kids to get them out of the way.

They weren't hurt, but Lampo's left ankle was caught in the joiners of the bleachers and his jeans ripped.

The family got its money back; Lampo said, and a circus owner paid him for his ruined trousers.

It hasn't been a good week for the Oregon-based circus. A truck carrying generators and electrical equipment crashed through a brick wall in Lewiston Tuesday after the brakes failed.

Two men were injured in that accident and the crash delayed the two Twin Falls circus performances scheduled for Wednesday.

A man who said he was one of the Reid brothers who own the circus said the bleacher mishap was the first he had witnessed in 25 years.

"It wasn't really a big deal," said the man, who refused to give his first name. "It was a big deal, you can bet it would be putting on a circus right now."

The section of bleachers, six rows high and 20 to 30 feet long, collapsed sideways rather than falling straight down, preventing serious injuries, Reid said.

# Declaration copy brings \$2.4 million

NEW YORK — A copy of the Declaration of Independence that a flea-market hunter found concealed in the frame of an old painting he bought for \$4 sold for \$2.42 million at auction Thursday.

The document, printed in Philadelphia the night of July 4, 1776, was bought by an Atlanta fine arts investment company after intense bidding at a Sotheby's auction of rare books and manuscripts.

Donald Scheer, president of Visual Equities Inc., was the high bidder for the copy of the declaration.

"I feel very proud to own this American treasure," he said. "I think it a bargain, given what's going on in the world today."

Scheer said his company hadn't decided if it would exhibit the document.

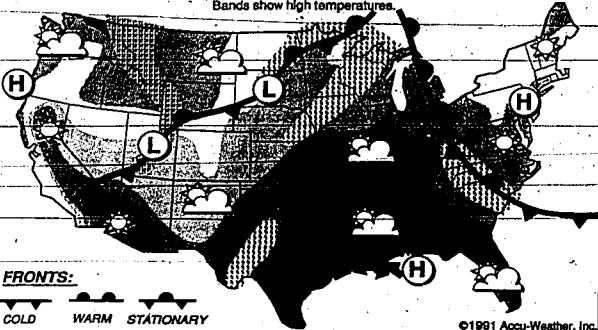

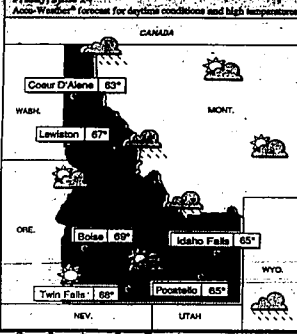

### Weather summary

The National Weather Service says satellite photos showed a broad band of clouds lying diagonally from southern Oregon up through central and northern Idaho again Thursday.

The cloud band closely followed the upper level air flow and also was evident in weather observations around the Gem State, which was mostly cloudy in the north and sunny in the south.

### Thunderstorms develop as rain falls in midlands

Thunderstorms developed Thursday in several areas across the country and rain fell across the nation's midsection.

Lightning killed a spectator and injured five others during the U.S. Open golf tournament at the Hazlet National golf course in Oklawaha, Fla.

Thunderstorms were developing ahead of a weather system crossing the south-central United States; ahead of a cold front crossing the north-central states; and along a warm front curving through the upper Mississippi Valley.

Showers and thunderstorms extended from eastern Nebraska into southwestern Minnesota. Widely scattered showers and thunderstorms were over Missouri and eastern Kansas.

Showers and thunderstorms also were scattered from coastal Texas to Georgia, with more widely scattered showers and thunderstorms from Arkansas and northern Mississippi to Tennessee and western Kentucky.

### Well explosion spews fumes

PAHOA, Hawaii (AP) - Toxic gases smelling like rotten eggs spewed unhooked Thursday after a well exploded at a geothermal energy plant on the island of Hawaii.

Some residents were evacuated but no serious injuries were reported.

Geothermal energy opponents said the explosion at the Puna Geothermal Venture showed the subterranean power source is unsafe. Supporters said there are risks, but the underground heat is stable enough to harness.

Trade winds spread hydrogen sulfide gas and steam released from the plant under construction in the Puna rain forest.

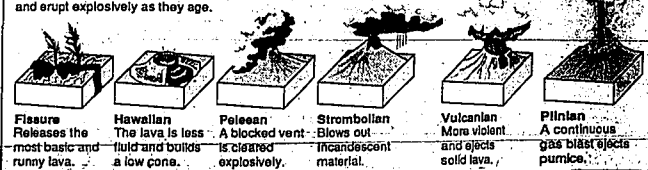
# How a Volcano is Formed

Volcanoes are found along cracks in the Earth's surface called subduction zones and along edges of crustal plates. Most active volcanoes are along the "Ring of Fire," the boundary that forms the Pacific plate.

A subduction zone is created when an oceanic plate crashes against a continental plate, and is pushed or "subducted" underneath.

Many volcanoes tend to discharge liquid lava in their youth and erupt explosively as they age.

# Weapons at Clark base secure

WASHINGTON (AP) - The munitions stored at the evacuated Clark Air Base in the Philippines are "safe and secure" despite the threat from a nearby erupting volcano, a Pentagon spokesman said Thursday.

Pete Williams, speaking with reporters, refused to confirm or deny that nuclear weapons were among the armaments stored at the base.

A member of the Philippine parliament had demanded that the United States reveal whether any such weapons are stored at the base, a located some 60 miles north of Manila.

"Some 15,000 Americans evacuated the base prior to Mount Pinatubo's eruption, which has continued in recent days. A 1,500-member skeleton staff and security force remains at the sprawling air base."

Williams, asked about the nuclear weaponry, would only say that "We neither confirm nor deny the presence of nuclear weapons at any of our facilities."

The spokesman did say, however, that there are "3,300 short tons of munitions" stored in "earth-cored igloos." He said he could not be more specific about the makeup of the armaments.

"Even if those bunkers were covered with lava, or ash or cinders, or anything else that could come out of an erupting volcano ... there is a very low probability it would damage the contents of those igloos," he said.

"We are very confident that the weapons are safe and secure. They don't pose a threat to the surrounding area," Williams said.

In Manila, Sen. Leticia Ramos-Shahani, a sister of Defense Secretary Fidel Ramos, said

United States should tell the Philippines whether it stores nuclear weapons at an air base threatened by a volcano.

"There must be action because this may be affected by Pinatubo," Mrs. Shahani said in a radio interview. "This policy of neither confirming nor denying must be changed. They should remove these nuclear weapons. It is very dangerous with this (volcano) and I believe it would be OK to change the policy."

The lease for Clark, Subic Bay and other bases used by the United States runs out in the fall, but the two sides remain in disagreement in talks on a new contract.

Williams said that four break-ins have been discovered at Clark, which apparently occurred while the U.S. guards left their posts during the volcano's initial explosion.

# Senators report road bill accord

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate managers of a \$105 billion transportation bill said Thursday they had reached a compromise with the Bush administration on creating a National Highway System but the Transportation Department said there was no deal.

"This is a major compromise," said Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, the co-manager of the floor debate on the five-year, \$105-billion transportation authorization bill.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., announced on the Senate floor that the compromise had been reached.

But Bill Moseley, a Transportation Department spokesman, said later: "There is no compromise."

Some senators said agreement was near on a compromise that would sweeten the effect of a spending formula to satisfy senators who have demanded more money for states that contribute more in federal gasoline taxes than they get back from the federal government in highway money.

Others said they were suspicious of the arrangement because it did not actually change the formula, which they said had shored up their states in the past.

The administration and the Transportation Department have sought a national highway system limited to no more than 150,000 miles, as a focus of federal highway financing efforts.

Senior administration officials said this week they would advise President Bush to veto the bill in its present form. One of their principal objections was its failure to include a national system of designated principal roads.

Until now, Moynihan and others resisted attempts to include such a system in the bill. They said the administration had yet to identify all the highways to be included.

As written, the bill permitted a study of such a system but asked for no money for it.

Moynihan announced to the Senate that agreement had been reached on a system to include 184,871 miles of roads, including the 43,000-mile Interstate Highway System and 140,000 miles of other principal interconnecting federal highways.

# Last combat unit leaves

DOHA, Kuwait (AP) - With the squeal of desert boots on asphalt and a brief song, the last U.S. unit that saw combat in the Gulf War handed over its duties to fresh American troops Thursday.

The 5,300 soldiers of the 3rd Armored Division, deployed in December, will be gone by June 19, replaced by 3,700 from the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment from Germany.

Col. William L. Nash formally handed over the command to Col. Andrew J. Bacevich. The fresh troops were clad in desert camouflage that had the sheen of new cotton - unlike the dull, battered cloth of the departing troops.

"I feel very confident that the force that has been here and the force that will be here now can handle anything," Nash said.

Kuwait's government, still edgy about the threat from Saddam Hussein, has asked U.S. troops to stay at least through September.

The 3rd Armored Division arrived in late December, trained for a year and then, in a major ground war, organized the chaotic flood of refugees from southern Iraq after Iraqi forces were driven from Kuwait, and provided security for the emirate.

Many soldiers said their main memory would not be the brief exposure to combat.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney remain concerned "about the pace of their missile development program."

"We're deeply concerned about their continued investment in military hardware," Fitzwater said.

He said that Bush would listen with interest to Gorbachev's personal appeal for Western economic aid on July 17 when the Soviet leader appears in London before leaders of the seven-nation Western economic summit.

"We are considering various economic assistance efforts," Fitzwater said. "We won't be bashful in pointing out" U.S. concerns about Soviet missile development, Fitzwater said.

Separately, Bush signed a proclamation designating Friday as Baltic Freedom Day, declaring that the United States will never recognize the forced annexation of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia by the Soviet Union.

He said the resumption of negotiations between Moscow and the Baltic states was a positive step but that "there is much reason to be concerned about recent Soviet actions against customs posts in Lithuania and Latvia and the ongoing Soviet occupation of broadcast facilities in Vilnius - acts that are incompatible with the process of peaceful change."

"Good faith negotiations cannot go forward in an atmosphere of threat and intimidation," Bush said.

He signed the proclamation before an audience of several dozen Baltic supporters gathered in the Roosevelt Room. Calling out to Bush, a woman invited the president to join them in picketing the Soviet Embassy on Friday. "I hope you'll excuse me," Bush replied.

# Defector says bombing missed Iraqi reactor and nuclear stocks

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Iraqi defector says the United States missed a store of weapons-grade uranium and a related nuclear facility when it bombed Iraq, U.S. officials said Thursday.

The officials said they were surprised to hear about the secret project, based on 1940s uranium-enrichment technology, which the defector said was used to make nearly 50 pounds of weapons-grade uranium.

After the Gulf War, Iraq declared to the United Nations that it had only 48 pounds of enriched uranium, which had for years been regularly inspected by the International

Atomic Energy Agency to ensure it wasn't diverted for military use.

Under terms of the March cease-fire, international inspectors are preparing to remove the enriched uranium from Iraq.

The defector's contentions follow a growing body of complaints about the intelligence information given U.S. commanders before and during the war about Iraq capabilities.

The allied commander, Gen. Norman H. Schwarzkopf, complained in congressional testimony Wednesday that military leaders lacked fresh, clear intelligence information during the six-week war. Other defense officials

have criticized the intelligence community for overestimating Iraq's capabilities and misreading its intentions.

But U.S. officials say that while the Iraqi defector has provided new and useful information, he hadn't changed their conviction that allied bombings did destroy Iraq's nuclear weapons capability. It was that capability that President Bush cited as one reason for going to war with Iraq.

"I'm confident we put their program out of commission," said one official.

The Iraqi, a government scientist who turned himself in to U.S. troops in northern Iraq several weeks ago, said Iraq had produced enriched uranium at a facility in northern Iraq using an electromagnetic process known as calutron, said the officials.

Based on shipments to Iraq intercepted from West Germany, England and the United States, U.S. officials had believed the Iraqis were developing a much more advanced uranium-enrichment process based on gas-operated centrifuges. Iraq was acquiring the expertise from Pakistan and other countries.

Allied bombers destroyed some of the Iraqi facilities where that work was being conducted, including a research complex called Sade 16 at northern Iraq and another

called Taji, said one official. Allied bombers also knocked out a hydroelectric plant near the northern city of Mosul, in a mountainous area where Iraq was mining uranium and building related facilities 40 miles south of the Turkish border, officials said.

What the defector was "talking about (is) a primitive, very inefficient technique," said the official.

No country with a serious nuclear program has used it since the United States abandoned the technology in the mid-1940s after using it to make the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima, he said.

# Bush still thinks gulf intelligence was tops

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush still feels the intelligence from the Persian Gulf War was excellent, despite the "minimal concerns" that Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf had, the White House said Thursday.

Bush stands by his earlier glowing assessment of the intelligence provided by the Central Intelligence Agency and the Pentagon, press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said.

Schwarzkopf, testifying before the House and Senate armed services committees Wednesday, spoke out about the intelligence "void all of us felt existed out there."

The general said the overall intelligence efforts were good, but the field commanders could not get photographs of Iraqi targets in less than 24 hours old and battlefield damage assessment was "one of the major areas of confusion."

The Desert Storm commander also said intelligence analysts produced reports so "watered down" that they were almost useless.

But Fitzwater said, "As far as we're concerned at the White House, it all worked and it worked very well."

He claimed there were "no differences between us and the general on this matter."

"The general is talking about some tactical intelligence that he would have liked to have had. I'm sure that we all would have liked to

have better damage assessment," the spokesman said. "But the president has said before and still believes that our overall intelligence was excellent."

"It was a short war. The intelligence was good. The tactics they adopted on the basis of it worked. He may have had some minimal concerns," said Fitzwater.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney told reporters at a breakfast Thursday that he believed Schwarzkopf was referring to a dispute over how much damage the air war had inflicted on Iraqi armor inside Kuwait.

Cheney called it "an honest difference of opinion based on what kind of information was available to different participants in the process."

Intelligence analysts in Washington discounted pilots' damage reports, while commanders in the field believed the air attacks had done enormous damage to armor, Cheney said.

# New Army chief opposes women flying in combat

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush's nominee for Army chief of staff told Congress on Thursday that he is opposed to women flying combat missions although they performed extremely well in the Persian Gulf War.

The comments from Gen. Gordon Sullivan came two days after the retiring Army chief, Gen. Carl Vuono, said he saw no "immediate change" in the Army ban on women in combat.

"My personal view is, the exclusion of women from some specialties, based on the way we operate with those specialties, is right," Vuono told reporters Tuesday.

Sullivan, chosen by Bush to succeed Vuono when he retires on June 21, said Army women do fly most of the service's aircraft with the exception of the Apache and attack helicopters. The policy is based on the combat exclusion rule, Sullivan said at his confirmation hearing.

by Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Sullivan told the panel: "My recommendation at this juncture is women should not fly in combat aircraft."

Under current law, women in the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force are barred from serving in combat roles. The Army is not covered under the same statute but has written its own regulations in line with the law.

The House, in its version of the military budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, adopted a provision allowing — but not requiring — the secretaries of the Navy and Air Force to assign women to fly Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps aircraft in combat.

The Senate Armed Services Committee will hold a hearing on the issue next week and will weigh the measure when it crafts its version of the defense budget the week of July

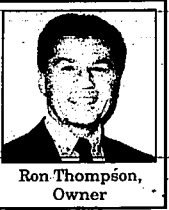

### A recipe for summer fun - and lifetime enjoyment

This editorial is for children only, so you grown-ups can skip it and go read the letters to the editor.

Go on, beat it. Are they gone? OK.

Kids, now that summer vacation has been here for a few days, you already may be figuring out that summer can be boring. You can only spend so much time riding your bike and going swimming. Then what?

Of course, you can't admit this to your parents, because they would think of plenty of things to do. Like cleaning the garage, taking out the trash, helping with laundry - yuck!

So here's an idea for a great way to spend some free time: reading.

Yes, we know - you just finished a whole year of reading at school. But summer reading is different.

In the summer, you can pick whatever books you want. Fact or fiction. Long or short. Adventures, mysteries, dinosaurs, history, space aliens.

Inside the covers of a book, you can travel to places you've never seen and meet people you've never met. You can even go places that don't exist, and meet people who were never born.

Summertime books don't need to be "educational." They just have to be enjoyable. The point is, once you get into the reading habit, you can't help learning something. Finding books that are fun to read is easy. Your public library is crammed with them. Here's a goal: Try to read one book every week this summer. If you do, by the time school starts you'll be at least 10 books smarter than the kids who didn't.

Mostly, though, you'll have fun. And, with any luck, you'll pick up a habit that will give you pleasure for the rest of your life.



## National testing can be dangerous

The most controversial part of President Bush's new "America 2000" education plan is the call for a national test.

Although the test is supposed to be voluntary, the administration is urging colleges to require the test results in admissions - and employers to consider them when making hiring decisions.

This is very much like the president's "voluntary" national and community service proposals - they're only "voluntary" if one does not want to go to college or have a job, a sort of "mandatory" voluntarism.

The test is supposed to be based on "national standards" to be set by a panel of administration officials and governors.

In other words, this process could be placed in the hands of those who have been in leadership positions while U.S. education has been going downhill.

And this effort will be led by Lamar Alexander, the secretary of education, who, like most of our previous education secretaries, has never been a public school teacher, principal, superintendent or administrator.

The administration says that a national test is necessary because there are certain basic things students should know. The inevitable result would be the homogenization of education into a national curriculum.

What if a curriculum like the "now math" of the 1960s were used as the criterion for a national test in mathematics? Instead of only a few students' math education being fouled up, an entire generation could be adversely affected.

The fact of the matter is we already know what is wrong with U.S. education and how to solve our problems, but we just are not doing it.

For example, research clearly indicates that intensive phonics is the best way to teach reading, but only about 15 percent of our schools use this approach.

Also, we know that homework is very important, but about 53 percent of our high schools have no policy requiring homework.

What is needed is not a national test, but rather a national investigation by Congress to determine why our schools are not doing the job with educational tools we know are effective.

# Economic problems are the real cause of illegal immigration

During the 1980s the United States fought desperately to stem the tide of illegal aliens crossing its southern border. The Reagan administration and Congress committed themselves to reducing the flow through tougher immigration laws, the use of more sophisticated border surveillance and an increase in manpower.

Those efforts were no match for the "push factor" of a deteriorating economy in Mexico. That may change with a U.S.-Mexico free-trade agreement, which offers the possibility of drastically reducing the number of illegal immigrants pouring into the United States from across the border.

After serving for six years as commissioner for the Immigration and Naturalization Service's western region, I leave to realize the limits of law enforcement in this area. New laws and tighter enforcement cannot address the root cause of most illegal immigration: economic problems in the immigrant's home-lands.

That is why I strongly support a free-trade agreement with Mexico, home of an estimated 80 percent of the immigrants crossing our southern border illegally. Providing jobs for

Mexicans in Mexico would do more to halt the illegal flow than spending billions on U.S. enforcement measures.

Free trade and free markets have created enormous wealth for once-impooverished

countries like Taiwan and Korea. There is no reason to believe that the "Asian miracle" cannot be repeated in Mexico, a country filled with hard-working, entrepreneurial people.

However, Mexico's President Carlos Salinas de Gortari and his free-market team face a daunting task of turning around an economy weakened by decades of central plan-

ning. Strong leftist and anti-American groups in Mexico are fighting to return the country to a protectionist, centrally planned economy. Much of Salinas' success in countering those forces will rest on his ability to develop millions of jobs.

A free-trade agreement will go a long way toward strengthening the economy that will provide those jobs. An estimated \$40 billion in Mexican flight capital might be repatriated. For a country with a gross national product of only \$201 billion, a return of \$40 billion would be a tremendous spur for development, providing jobs for the millions that now seek them north of the Rio Grande.

Opponents of free trade with Mexico fail to grasp the enormous opportunity the United States now has to help Mexico pull itself out of poverty, and thereby secure our southern border.

A decade ago, Mexico was dedicated to a central-planned economy and a foreign policy that hindered closer political and economic ties with the United States.

In this environment, law-enforcement measures were the U.S. government's principal response to illegal immigration, which

had risen dramatically. In 1965, 610,000 border apprehensions in 1986, compared to 759,000 in 1980. Around that time, we saw a change in Mexican politics. More and more political leaders were promoting closer ties with the United States as part of the solution to their economic problems. We began to hear less talk among Mexicans about socialist solutions and protectionism, less nationalist

Yankee-bashing. Since President Salinas took the helm in 1988, we have seen an acceleration of liberalization efforts in trade, tariffs, investment and so on. A free-trade treaty will significantly solidify these gains.

Some opponents argue that free trade will actually increase illegal immigration by drawing even more Mexicans from the rural interior toward the border. In fact, it will promote growth throughout the country by giving the same tax and ownership benefits to industries in the interior as the border-area export industries now have. Border patrols and interdiction efforts are a necessary part of securing our nation's territory. However, without economic growth in Mexico, U.S. law-enforcement measures along our southern border will be largely a failure. President Salinas has said, "We want to stay in our country, not people." Mexicans want to stay in their own country. Their best chance for doing so lies in free trade. If we fail to give them that chance, we will have passed up our own best chance for reducing illegal immigration from Mexico.

The Blue Ribbon Coalition secured a major victory recently when the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee voted to favorably report the National Recreational Trails Fund Act in spite of opposition of several "anti" recreation groups. The coalition has been working with Sen. Symms on the proposal for two years and feels it has an excellent chance on the Senate floor this summer.

This endorsement by the most environmentally sensitive committee in the Senate proves that the Idaho Conservation League, Wilderness Society, Sierra Club and other opponents of the bill didn't have their facts straight. They were likely behind an amendment designed to kill the bill that

was expected to be introduced by Sen. Metzenbaum from Ohio.

When Sen. Metzenbaum realized he had no support for it among his fellow committee members, he didn't even bring it up. Expecting our efforts to have failed, the "anti" recreation groups' legislation in the past will think twice before championing their cause again.

This is a victory for the grass-roots trail users nationwide.

They made the phone calls and sent the letters to the committee that prompted this favorable vote. Sen. Symms has indicated that the Blue Ribbon Coalition support for this proposal is the most impressive grassroots lobbying effort he has ever witnessed. Equestrians and hikers joined with motorized users and state recreation management agencies all across the country in support of the NRTFA. It was a cooperative effort by the entire trails community.

One of the reasons we feel so strongly about the NRTFA is because of its potential to unify the entire trail recreation community. That unity is building in spite of the "antis." We expect this national trail-user movement to lead to passage of the environmentally responsible legislation.

# Biggest cities say they're overwhelmed by AIDS cases

SAN DIEGO (AP) — AIDS has overwhelmed America's biggest cities, and many can't meet growing demands for health care, drugs and prevention education, the cities reported Thursday.

"There can be no debate on the impact of AIDS in our cities. This year is worse than last, and next year will be even worse," said F. Thomas Cochran, executive director of the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

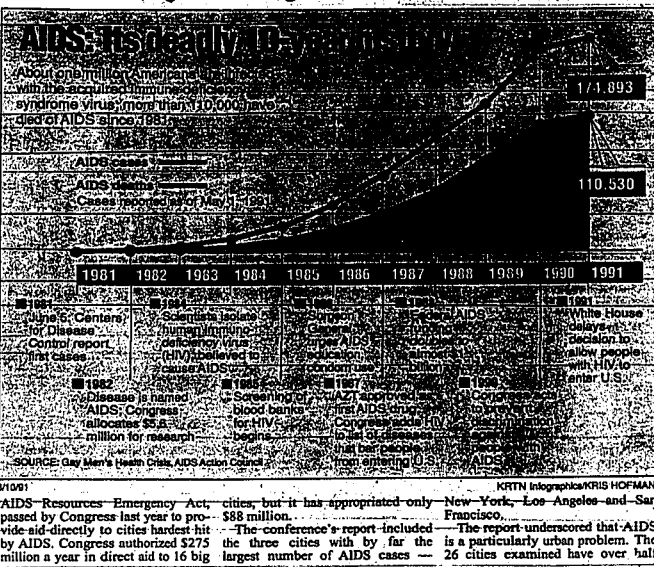
The nation's mayors said the 10-year-old AIDS crisis has severely strained their city governments, and that federal programs aren't enough to care for the disease's poorest and longest sufferers.

Many cities say they have limited prevention education — the key to halting a deadly disease for which there is no cure — in order to provide health services to indigent patients.

The organization of big-city mayors released its study of the impact of AIDS on local governments as mayors prepared to begin their annual meeting this weekend.

The report, examining how 26 cities have coped with the AIDS epidemic, said none of the city governments expect to be able to meet projected future demand for prevention education and health services for people infected with HIV, the AIDS virus. The report didn't say how many cities were spending to care for AIDS patients.

Many of the cities were counting on an increase in federal aid through the Ryan White Comprehensive



the nation's more than 179,000 AIDS cases, but only 17 percent of the nation's population.

As many as 657,000 people in those cities are estimated to be infected with the HIV virus that has yet to develop into AIDS. Among them, New York City estimated 125,000 to 225,000 people with HIV infections; Los Angeles, 41,000; and San Francisco, 28,000.

Among other cities, San Diego estimated 15,000 to 20,000 people infected with HIV; Houston, 30,000; Atlanta, 50,000; Baltimore, 20,000; and Newark as many as 27,000.

The type of needed services varies in each city because of the differing nature of its sufferers and methods of contracting the disease, the report said.

For instance, gay and bisexual males comprised 59 percent of cases nationally in 1990, and as many as 85 percent in cities such as San Francisco and Seattle. But they comprise only 13 percent of the total in Newark, where most cases were attributed to abusers of injectable drugs.

Among the report's other findings:

- Three-quarters of the cities said federal aid earmarked for drug reimbursement for poor people with AIDS won't meet demands this year. Many cities distribute expensive drugs such as AZT to infected patients at city clinics, and half the cities surveyed said they used local money to make up the difference. The drugs are expensive and can to-

tal \$2,000 to \$3,000 per year for one patient.

"It's generally accepted that program is taking care of the lower income needy people with AIDS. What the survey shows is that in three-fourths of the cities, it's not," said Richard Johnson, assistant executive director and author of the report.

Cities reported up to one-third of their AIDS cases were among people with no public or private health insurance, leaving local governments with uncompensated care costs.

Half the cities said they had waiting lists for people seeking early identification and treatment of HIV; the public clinics in New York City, the wait for an appointment ranges from two to six weeks. New Orleans reported a 32-week wait for federal and state funded services.

The competition for services plus health care against prevention. Prevention often loses; half the cities said AIDS prevention education spending has been held constant or decreased.

Cities examined in the report were: Anaheim, Calif.; Atlanta; Baltimore; Boston; Chicago; Cleveland; Dallas; Denver; Fort Lauderdale; Fla.; Houston; Indianapolis; Jersey City, N.J.; Kansas City, Mo.; Los Angeles; Minneapolis; New Haven, Conn.; New Orleans; New York; Newark; Philadelphia; Phoenix; San Diego; San Francisco; San Juan, Puerto Rico; Seattle; and Tampa, Fla.

AIDS Resources Emergency Act passed by Congress last year to provide aid directly to cities hardest hit by AIDS. Congress authorized \$275 million a year in direct aid to 16 big cities, but it has appropriated only \$88 million.

The conference's report included the three cities with by far the largest number of AIDS cases — New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The report underscored that AIDS is a particularly urban problem. The 26 cities examined have over half

## AIDS summer camp for youngsters: Arts and crafts and AZT

ASHFORD, Conn. (AP) — They look like any children at camp, splashing in the pool, pulling on life jackets before a paddleboat ride on the pond, singing exuberantly around the campfire.

Until a counselor points out they're small for their age, and frail. "Munchkins," she calls them.

These 23 young campers are infected with HIV, the AIDS virus. They just spent a week in the woods of eastern Connecticut at what's believed to be one of only two camps in the country for AIDS-infected children.

Seven-year-old Eddie is shorter than his 3-year-old brother. He is exhausted after his arts and crafts classes, where he decorated a T-shirt with glitter, and a morning dance lesson.

His counselor carries him down the dirt path to the boat dock for some fishing before lunch. After the counselor baits the hook and casts the line, Eddie takes over and hauls in four bass. He throws them all back to live another day.

The children are here with their

families, including 10 mothers who also carry the virus. They passed it on to their children while they were still in the womb, which is the way most children with AIDS were infected.

The other adults are foster parents, or grandmothers who took over after their daughters died of AIDS or chose a life of drugs on the street over parenthood. This year, 19 healthy siblings joined the HIV-infected children.

Herbert G. Birch Services, a children's agency in New York, has run the week-long camp for the past

three summers. The camp has grown from nine families the first summer to 24 this year.

This year, they set up at the Hole in the Wall Gang Camp, established three years ago by actor Paul Newman for children with cancer.

The name refers to the motley gang of troublemakers in Newman's movie "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid." The camp is right out of the Old West, with log cabins for bunkhouses and a Main Street like the one Wyatt Earp walked a century ago in Tombstone, Ariz.

The first two years, Phyllis Sussner, the agency's executive director, rented a camp in northern New Jersey. But the camp's owners were uneasy about having campers with AIDS and would not have them back.

Newman's camp opened a week early and gave Sussner's group the run of the place for free.

Most of the sick children don't know they have AIDS. They only know they are sick. Four times a day, they troop back to the center of camp and line up at the OK Corral,

also known as the infirmary.

Nurses hand out AZT pills. Some of the children don masks, to breathe in penicillamine to forestall infections in their lungs.

"He knows he's dying," a woman named Alba said of her 6-year-old foster son, Raymond. "He'll say, 'I'm standing here now, but soon I'll have to go up there,'" pointing heavenward.

But she won't tell him the name of the affliction that brought him chronic ear infections, vomiting and swollen lymph glands. She is sure he would innocently tell his little friends, and then he would be taunted mercilessly and probably slain.

Life was bleak for these families

even before AIDS entered their lives. Most are from blighted sections of New York City's Bronx borough. Some live in crime-infested public housing projects; others in homeless shelters.

"I like the feeling of security," said Linda, a former crack addict infected with HIV who is at camp with her two sons, one sick, the other free of HIV. "I can scream the word 'AIDS' and nobody is going to run away."

The volunteer counselors have their own reasons for being there.

Allan Stinson, a bearded educator who tested positive four years ago, says AIDS sufferers are made to feel guilty because of the kinds of activities associated with the virus.

homosexual sex, IV drug use. But who could be more blameless than these children?

"As a person with AIDS, you feel like you did something to get the disease," he said. "I wanted my innocence back."

Amid the fun at camp, there are lessons. At a ninth-birthday party for camper Abdul, a counselor commands, "Everybody kiss!" Healthy children and sick, young and old, embrace.

There were a couple of crises during the week. Nine-year-old Erica developed a high fever and was sent to the infirmary. A mother who arrived alone after her daughter died of AIDS was sent home for using drugs.

**Hostages want rumors investigated**

WASHINGTON — Eight Americans held hostage in Iran demanded Thursday that Congress investigate allegations that the Reagan-Bush campaign delayed their release in 1980.

"The question of whether there is evidence of wrongdoing must be answered by an unbiased, bipartisan congressional investigation with full subpoena power," the former hostages said in a letter to lawmakers.

"Unless this happens, speculation and unanswered questions will erode public confidence in our electoral system," they said.

The former hostages joined 75 Democratic lawmakers who have called for an investigation to determine if the Reagan campaign promised the Iranians weapons in exchange for keeping the hostages until after the election.

**Court ruling gives police more power**

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court ruled Thursday that a jailed suspect represented by a lawyer in one criminal case sometimes may be questioned by police about another crime without the lawyer present. The 6-3 ruling in a case from Wisconsin gives police more power to question people outside the presence of their lawyers, but the court said its decision does not weaken suspects' Miranda rights.

The landmark 1966 court ruling in *Miranda v. Arizona* — decided 25 years ago Thursday — requires police to tell suspects they have a right to remain silent and be represented by a lawyer.

**Astronauts work to save space samples**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Columbia's weary astronauts worked feverishly on troublesome freezers Thursday to save blood and urine samples collected during their nine days in space. They interrupted their sleep and just full day of orbital research to fix one overheating icebox, then another, and to shuffle the frozen specimens. Shuttle commander Bryan O'Connor called it "playing musical refrigerators."

The biomedical research mission, which began June 5, was expected to end Friday. Columbia is scheduled to land at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., at 11:40 a.m. EDT.

Mission Control awakened the astronauts four times late Wednesday and early Thursday — three times to work on the freezers and once to fix a water-cooling system for some of the rat cages. There are 29 white rats aboard Columbia as well as 2,478 tiny jellyfish.

**Man dies after choking on plastic bag**

AUBURN, Wash. — A man died after choking on a plastic bag containing marijuana while he was chased by police, but he was not the one police sought, officers said.

Alvin C. Euell, 33, of Auburn, died Tuesday at Seattle's Harborview Medical Center of lack of oxygen to the brain, the King County medical examiner's office said.

Police records in this suburb between Seattle and Tacoma said Euell tried to swallow a plastic bag of pot when officers arrested him Saturday.

An initial report indicated he threatened to stab someone outside a tavern, but later interviews with witnesses showed he was not the man with the knife, officer Bill Waldroop said.

**Abortion-rightists horrified by signs**

LIVONIA, Mich. — Patients entering an abortion clinic here last weekend saw the usual array of signs by anti-abortion protesters: "Don't Kill Your Baby," "It's Not Too Late."

But the signs were different from the usual ones in one respect. They included the names of two patients scheduled to undergo abortions that day.

The tactic, not surprisingly, has horrified abortion-rights advocates who see it as a gross invasion of the patients' privacy. Anti-abortion activists defend it as an extreme, but justified, weapon in their battle against abortion.

"It's very unusual, very rare," said Randall Terry, the head of Operation Rescue, a national anti-abortion group that has engaged in numerous clinic demonstrations — although not, apparently, this one — "I think that in certain circumstances it is appropriate. Absolutely."

**Rebels may have missiles from Cuba**

WASHINGTON — President Alfredo Cristiani of El Salvador said Thursday the Salvadoran rebels have acquired high performance surface-to-air missiles in a shipment that he believes was sent by Cuba.

Cristiani, who ended a state visit here Thursday, said the Soviet-made SAM-16s are more sophisticated than the SAMs obtained previously by the rebels in their 11-year war against the U.S.-backed government.

The State Department agreed with Cristiani that the SAM-16s were provided by the Cubans.

**Inflation up, but overall economy improves**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Big increases for gasoline, vegetables and tobacco pushed wholesale prices up a surprising 0.6 percent in May, the government said Thursday.

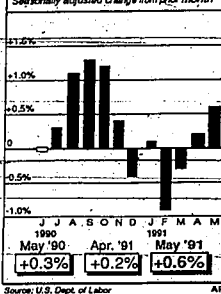
But in more-favorable economic news, retail sales mung up a broad-based gain last month while Americans' new claims for unemployment benefits posted a fourth straight weekly decline — developments seen by some economists as proof that the recession is over.

Analysts were especially heartened by the large 38,000 decline in the number of Americans filing for jobless benefits, dropping the total to a seasonally adjusted 401,000 for the week ending June 1.

The last time new unemployment claims had fallen for four consecutive weeks was in October 1983, just before the end of the severe 1981-82 recession.

"If there were any doubts that the recession ended in May, today's jobless figures should put them to rest," said Irwin Kellner, chief economist at Manufacturers Hanover Trust in New York.

Other analysts were more cautious, however. While agreeing that rising spending by consumers and fewer job layoffs were hopeful signs, they said it was too soon to declare with certainty an end to the recession.



One encouraging sign was May's 1 percent gain in retail sales — led by a 1.7 percent advance for autos — following a 0.4 percent drop in



following the uncertainty caused by the recession and the Persian Gulf War.

May's increase in wholesale prices was the largest since a 1.2 percent jump last October. It followed a 0.2 percent April increase and two straight months of declines.

The May gain was led by a 2.4 percent rise in energy prices, reflecting a jump of 5.2 percent in gasoline costs. It was the first time energy prices had increased since last November. But analysts noted that gasoline prices have started to come down again and they said these declines will be reflected in price moderation in coming months.

Food prices at the wholesale level rose by 0.2 percent in May, even though vegetable prices continued to skyrocket, reflecting adverse weather in many farm states. Vegetable prices shot up 22.7 percent in May following a record 34.3 percent April increase. Lettuce prices were more than doubled from April to May, and prices for tomatoes, celery and cabbage also were up substantially.

These price gains were offset somewhat by declines in the price of fruits, meat and eggs.

The underlying core rate of inflation, excluding the volatile energy and food categories, rose a moderate 0.4 percent last month.

**FCC adopts new cable regulations**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission voted Thursday to allow local governments to regulate the prices charged by more than half the nation's cable TV systems.

The cable industry criticized the decision, saying it focused on "price to the exclusion of quality." Members of Congress, city officials and consumer groups said it failed to give consumers relief from rapidly rising cable prices.

"If anyone thought the FCC would do the job of protecting consumers, they just need to look at today's ruling," Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., said at a news conference attended by several lawmakers who said the FCC vote demonstrated the need for legislative action.

The Bush administration-backed revision in commission rules would allow only systems facing competi-

tion from at least six over-the-air broadcast stations or another multi-channel operator to avoid local price controls.

The revised rules take effect 90 days after being published in the Federal Register.

The commission voted 5-0 to overhaul the rules, under which about 97 percent of the nation's 9,600 cable systems are exempt from regulation. The changes will give local governments control over the prices charged by about 60 percent of cable systems.

The commission stopped short of forcing cable companies that escape regulation to carry the TV stations, instead voting to seek additional public comment.

Under the revised rules, an alternative multichannel provider would be considered a competitor only if it was capable of reaching half the homes in the primary cable system's

service area and if at least 10 percent of the area's households were subscribers.

The change in the rules will inject "a healthy dose of reality" into the FCC's rules of competition, said Commissioner Sherrie Marshall.

But James Mooney, president of the National Cable Television Association said the decision would hamper the ability of cable systems "to provide diverse programming, up-to-date technology and first-class customer service."

"None of these things is inexpensive," he said, "but the government seems totally focused on price to the exclusion of quality."

Jeff Chester of the TeleDemocracy Project, a group affiliated with consumer advocate Ralph Nader, called the rules revision "completely ineffective in preventing the cable industry from continuing to hike up its rates."

**Feds argue over camp site**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The federal government and the city are feuding over plans to create a national historic site at Malibu near the World War II internment camp for Japanese-Americans.

The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power refuses to turn the land over to the government without a guarantee that city water rights in the Mono Basin will be unaffected.

The city's water authority, which owns the 550-acre property in the eastern Sierra desert, about 250 miles north of Los Angeles, also won't give up the land for free.

"We do not have authority to give away the city's property," Mike Goss, president of the DWP board of commissioners, said Wednesday.

**Bush, Reagan to play golf**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will play golf with Ronald Reagan on Saturday in Los Angeles during a four-day western trip, it was announced Thursday. Bush will fly to Los Angeles on Friday and deliver the commencement address that day at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

On Saturday, he will play golf with Reagan and Hollywood producer Jerry Weintraub and then attend a private dinner at Weintraub's house.

On Sunday, Bush will address a noon gathering of Asian-Americans at Mile Square Park in Fountain Valley, Calif., then speak at a Holocaust memorial dinner.

## Counties seek compromise on indigent care

**TWIN FALLS** - Idaho county commissioners and clerks want to talk with Gov. Cecil Andrus and others to settle disputes about providing indigent health care.

The potentially ruinous cost of paying the medical bills of those who can't pay their own dominated discussion as the state association of clerks and commissioners ended its annual conference Thursday.

The group passed a resolution addressing two major points of indigent health care:

• Members of the board that oversees the catastrophic health care fund should be determined by the respective contributions of the county and the state into that fund.

• A request of the state to make money available so counties can prepare their budgets based on paying the first \$10,000 of each indigent client's medical bills.

Indigent health care and the 1 percent property tax initiative apparently gaining momentum among Idaho voters emerged as the two issues most worrying county officials at their three-day conference.

Commissioners and clerks hoped that

Latah County Commissioner Mark Solomon's proposal will open the way for state, local and medical representatives to discuss the problem and find a solution. In conjunction with the resolution, the Idaho Association of Counties will invite people from Andrus' office, hospital and medical associations and the Legislature to discuss indigent health care.

Finally, Thursday, the commissioners and clerks passed a resolution urging counties not to levy for more than the \$10,000 per-client for they are required to pay for indigents under current law.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman, a member of the board that oversees the catastrophic health care fund, said after the meeting that Solomon's resolution sounded workable.

"I'm not in favor of giving up the whole ship," Hempleman said, "and I don't think we did that here."

Based on current contributions catastrophic health care fund, the counties likely would have a majority on the 12-member board, Hempleman said after the meeting.

## Burley Airport awarded \$1 million

**BURLEY** - The Burley Airport is getting a facelift.

The Idaho Aeronautics Board announced Thursday it has approved a \$51,890 state grant to the Burley facility. It will be combined with local funds to match a federal grant financing just over \$1 million in improvements.

Officials said the money will be used to resurface runways and aprons - the area where the planes park on temporary basis - and to relocate runway lights.

"The runways, they're not unusable by

any means but are deteriorating quite badly," said Airport Manager Glenn Hall. "There is defined cracking along both runways."

Hall said the two-runway airport will remain open during the project because crews probably will work on one runway at a time.

"It actually will be quite an extensive project overall," he said.

Work will start in the spring, Hall said, and could be completed in about four months.

The Federal Aviation Administration will pay for 90 percent of the project, with the state grant paying for another 5 percent and the city covering the last 5 percent.

Hall said the city probably will pay most of its bill with in-kind work, with some cash expenditures.

A variety of small private aircraft, smaller executive jets and crop dusters use the airport. No commercial airlines use the facility.

The Idaho Transportation Department's Bureau of Aeronautics also awarded a grant of \$7,600 to the Jerome County Airport to finance \$152,000 in improvements such as the rehabilitation of the runway, taxiway and apron.

The bureau awarded \$293,000 in grants, which will create more than \$4.2 million in airport improvements.

## East end of Jerome County finally has ambulance

**JEROME** - A mutual agreement between Jerome County commissioners and the Valley Quick Response Unit Inc., was signed Thursday, paving the way for the Eden/Hazelton area to have its own ambulance.

"It's finally done! This is a great thing. After a lot of work, we've been rewarded," said Ben Rust, president of the Ambulance Advisory Committee, as Mark Schwarz, Valley Quick Response Unit president, and Carl Montgomery, county commissioner chairman, signed the agreement.

"This heralds a new era in Jerome County," said Richard Bennet, coordinator of the South Idaho EMS Region. "You now have a new and increased ambulance service."

The ambulance will be owned jointly by the county and the response unit for five years. At the end of five years, the Idaho Emergency Medical Services will release its security interest and the response unit will become the sole owner of the ambulance.

Funds to operate the ambulance service will come from the Jerome Ambulance District budget, a taxing district funded through property taxes.

And Jerome County will pay for liability

insurance coverage for both the vehicle and response unit personnel. The county also will be in charge of dispatching the ambulance.

Rates charged for the ambulance service will be equivalent to those of the Jerome County ambulance operating out of Jerome.

The response unit has been trying to get an ambulance for the Eden/Hazelton area for three years, according to Shirley Schute, 15-year veteran of the volunteer unit.

About \$25,000 had been collected by the Valley Quick Response Unit from east Jerome County residents. The donations will be combined with an \$18,000 grant

from the Idaho Emergency Medical Service Bureau.

The grant will be issued by Monday, according to Bennet.

Members of the Valley Quick Response Unit plan to pick up the ambulance in Florida and have it inspected, insured and ready to show to the community by the fourth of July celebration to be held in Hazelton.

The new ambulance will respond to an area bordered on the north by the Lincoln County line, on the east by the Minidoka County line, and on the west by 600 North.

This area includes parts of Highway 25, Highway 50 and Interstate 84.

## Will Hailey take over Friedman?

**HAILEY** - Relations between the city and Friedman Memorial Airport, have soured, and the only solution may be for the city to take over, say Hailey City Council members.

At its meeting this week, the council discussed the possibility of eventually taking control of Friedman Memorial Airport.

"It's our land, we suffer the impact, we should take control," said Councilman Steven Kearns.

Current relations between the Airport Commission and the city have turned into an "us/then" situation, according to Kearns, and this relationship would be laid to rest by taking control of the airport, he said.

Mayor Keith Roark expressed the same concern over the "schizophrenic" relationship and concluded that the ultimate solution would be consolidation.

The current agreement between the city and the Airport Commission expires in 1995.

Also at its meeting this week, the City Council tabled an ordinance that would prohibit public consumption of alcohol, but will consider a revised version next month.

During discussion of the alcohol ordinance, three council members said they would not support the ordinance as it was written.

"I'm not sure that Hailey is ready for this," said Councilman Joe MacCarillo. "We just don't have the need for something like this in our town."

The proposed ordinance would make public consumption a misdemeanor and would allow a maximum fine of \$300 or 90 days in jail.

Chamber of Commerce President Marilyn Simmons voiced her concern over the proposed ordinance. She said it would effect several special events in the city.

Simmons told the council that the Chamber of Commerce raises money through the sale of alcohol at these events. She added that "people like their beer in the sun."

The ordinance will be revised and pre-

## Blaine County cuts speed limit

# Despite results, cold fusion closing down

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — Promising experimental results have come in the last three months before the National Cold Fusion Institute closes its doors for good, Director Fritz Will said Tuesday.

Will said even though cold fusion's early potential as a clean, new energy source is unrealized, the research will continue on a much smaller scale in Utah, Will said.

It is very upbeat, and that's almost strange about two weeks before the institute is scheduled to close, Will said at a meeting with reporters. "That of course could be prevented if you say you're willing to write us a check for a few hundred thousand dollars."

The center is to shut down on June 30, nearly two years after it was established with a \$5 million state appropriation. The Legislature gave money to the University of Utah after electrochemist B. Stanley Pons announced in March 1989 that he and a colleague had discovered the key to a sustained nuclear fusion reaction.

Since then, Pons and Walter Fleischmann of England's University of Southampton have left the institute to

... pursue much of their work abroad. They communicate primarily through their attorney, Gary Triggs of North Carolina, who could not be reached by telephone late Wednesday.

The \$4.5 million dedicated to fusion research — \$500,000 was earmarked for patent applications — has been spent. Will has been unable to convince private corporations or the federal government to help finance the work.

The institute has been beset by problems from the start. A disgruntled science faculty member last year demanded an independent scientific audit of the research.

The auditors were asked only to evaluate the institute's methods and declared them sound. But they said they found no evidence fusion actually was occurring.

When Pons and Fleischmann first reported their experiments, they said they had produced more energy, in the form of heat, than was put into the simple tabletop devices they contrived to test their theories.

In fusion, the power of the sun and the hydrogen bomb, atoms are fused rather than split as in conventional nuclear fission. Scientists long have sought its secrets in order to produce safe, inexpensive energy.

Laboratories around the world have tried to duplicate the Pons-Fleischmann results. Few have succeeded, although many scientists have said they detected byproducts suggesting a nuclear phenomenon.

But critics remain unconvinced. In March, James F. Decker, the U.S. Department of Energy's director of energy research, concluded there was "no future energy source" in cold fusion.

The recent book "Too Hot To Handle," by British physicist Frank

Close, charged that critical evidence in Pons' and Fleischmann's claim was "skewed," an allegation the electrochemists denied.

Will, however, said the latest round of experiments at the institute involved eight vacuum-sealed devices that produce tritium, considered a telltale sign of a nuclear reaction, up to 50 times above background amounts.

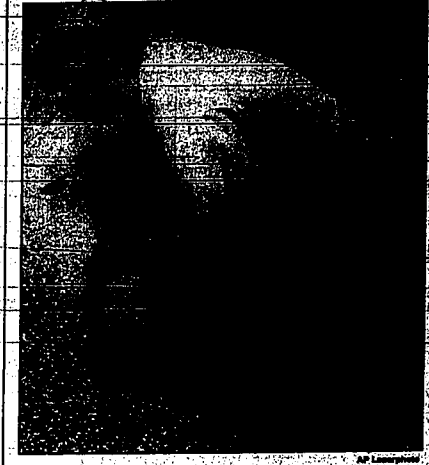
More importantly, Will said, he and other researchers had found a way to reproduce the tritium regularly. He would not disclose the triggering mechanism, citing potential patent conflicts.

The University of Utah has obtained nine patents related to fusion through the work of Pons and Fleischmann and the institute.

Will said the tritium-producing experiments also generated at least one, possibly two, episodes of excess heat, but Will said they were considered to be flukes. He also said evidence of neutrons also had been detected.

"We are pretty confident that a nuclear phenomenon is going on," he said.

## U of I water safe again to drink

**MOSCOW (AP)** — A boil order in effect for a week has been lifted for the University of Idaho water system after tests on two consecutive days showed an unacceptable level of coliform bacteria.

The order was imposed last Friday when routine testing showed coliform readings above federal drinking water standards. It was the third boil order in the past year at the school.

"Having the notice lifted took several days longer than we'd hoped," university spokesman Terry Maurer said Thursday.

The unacceptable tests were isolated to a small portion of campus and additional flushing of the water system was required.

Coliform bacteria can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea and possibly jaundice, as well as headache and fatigue.

## Seattle plans week for gulf troops

**SEATTLE (AP)** — Mayor Norm Rice announced plans Thursday for a "Sea-Tac Salute to the Home" Persian Gulf troops, including having servicemen and women march in the annual Seafair Torchlight Parade.

Rice's announcement comes a week after plans collapsed for a privately funded parade on June 22. That proposal was plagued by divisiveness and failed to attract enough money from sponsors.

Rice said up to 1,000 servicemen and women are to march in the Aug. 2 Seafair parade. "This will be an opportunity for everyone in the community to express their support for the men and women who served in

the Persian Gulf and stay, 'We love you and we're going to honor you.' And they would kick off a week-long celebration. Among events tentatively planned:

- Free tickets for military families to the Aug. 11 Seattle Mariners game, with a concert to follow.
- Free admission to the Seattle Aquarium and Woodland Park Zoo on one or two days, for veterans of any war and their families.
- A day of merchant discounts for service personnel.
- An ecumenical church service.
- At least 1,000 free tickets to the Aug. 3 Seattle Seahawks exhibition football game.

Free admission to the Seafair by-drones on Aug. 4 for active-duty service people.

Last week, Alan Silverman, promoter of the June 22 parade, said he was unable to raise the \$250,000 needed for the event. Peace groups have taken over the planning because military hardware was to be included in the event, and Democrats were offended when it appeared that primarily Republican officials and candidates were to be present as dignitaries.

Rice said that by agreement with Seafair, no tanks, armored personnel carriers or other weapons would be displayed in the parade.

## Suspect silent on latest bomb incident

**PROVO, Utah (AP)** — Police want to question a suspect in connection with a bomb discovered at Brigham Young University on Tuesday, but the man won't talk.

"We're quite convinced we know where it came from," said Capt. Duane Fraser. The explosive device is similar to three others found in Provo and Orem since January, he said. The bomb's components will be studied at a forensics lab.

Fraser said police won't be able to question Jim D. Bowcut, 33, about the bomb found in a book at the school's library. Bowcut is undergoing treatment at the Utah State Hospital after a judge determined he was incompetent to stand trial.

Fraser said Bowcut is exercising his right to remain silent. Bowcut was arrested six weeks ago in connection with the construction and attempted detonation of the

three other devices. Only one of those pipe bombs exploded, causing minor damage to a Mormon Church.

Bowcut was charged with three counts of placing an infernal machine and four counts of constructing an infernal machine. The charges are second- and third-degree felonies.

A BYU student employee at the Herald building was charged with the latest bomb disguised as a book on a book shelf Tuesday afternoon.

## Prosecutor faces options as mystery disease abates

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Set against a window in Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman's office is a black tile with his last name and the number five printed in white.

It was to be the 32-year-old attorney's seat in the Idaho Senate before a mysterious disease forced him to turn down the post after winning it in a tough election. But Mosman's health has just as mysteriously improved.

"It was very disappointing," Mosman said. "That was something I worked at very hard. And people had worked hard to help me. In spite of an unpopular pro-life stance on the abortion issue, Mosman won Latah County's state Senate seat in a three-way race against

former Moscow Mayor Gary Scott and former 2nd District Judge Andrew Schwam of Moscow.

It was a premiere race in a year when every state Senate campaign counted. In the end, Republicans and Democrats split the 42-member chamber.

But beginning in March 1990, Mosman started to experience a small amount of internal bleeding. He checked in with doctors, but admits he was casual about the malady.

"I guess I just viewed it as part of life," he said. "I was just going to wait it out." After the Nov. 6 election, Mosman's pain had become severe. He was often dizzy from the loss of blood and occasionally collapsed.

Jerome County Commissioner Veronica Lierman, however, said the counties should take no action on the issue because the state is legally responsible for paying independent medical costs above \$10,000.

"It's not a political issue. We're getting down to the dollar amount," Lierman said.

Ada County Commissioner Gary Glenn of Boise said the counties have been wronged enough. He agreed with Lierman that taking no action would be the best course.

The state was supposed to take over indigent health care from counties next month. But when state officials learned it would cost an estimated \$44 million to run the program, legislators devised a plan that would cut the cost to \$11.5 million.

This plan still would have relieved counties of property taxpayers of an estimated \$10 million to \$12 million cost for the program.

Trouble brewed, however. Andrus wanted the switch from county to state control of the program to be delayed one more year, proposing an interim plan of federally funded increases in health care for the needy. That would cost the state less money and provide about the same amount of property tax relief, Andrus said.

Legislators disputed that claim. Andrus also wanted the state to control the program, but legislators wanted county officials to remain in control.

The state, according to a law already passed, is supposed to pay for indigent medical costs above

\$10,000. But Andrus cut out nearly \$3 million of \$6 million in state money the Legislature approved for that purpose last year.

Counties now worry that health care providers might sue them for bills that go above \$10,000.

Solomon's resolution urges the state make money available to make up that \$3 million difference.

As of Oct. 1, the counties are not supposed to accept any indigent medical bills above \$10,000. The state was supposed to take over the program on that day, Hempelman said.

If the state does not make money available to pay the bills above \$10,000, other cash is supposed to be available through the catastrophic health-care fund until the Legislature meets in January.

On another issue, Glenn had hoped to get commissioners and clerks to pass a resolution endorsing people's right to vote on the 1 percent initiative. But as the conference and time ran short, the best he could get was a seven-member committee to study the initiative.

## Arson-caused house fire claims 2 children

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — A fire that roared through a residential home early Thursday, killing two children and critically burning two others, was arson-caused, fire officials said.

"There are multiple points of origin," said Salt Lake City Fire Battalion chief Gordon Nicholl. "It's a double homicide."

Nine-year-old Andrew Lawrence, the nephew of homeowners Sam and Leslie Ortega, was pronounced dead at the scene of the early morning blaze. Another child, 13-year-old Christian Ortega, died Thursday at a temple at LDS Hospital.

June Ortega, 7, was in critical condition at the Intermountain Burn Center at the University of Utah Health Sciences Center. Crayton Lawrence, 11, a brother of the dead boy, remained in critical condition at LDS Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Ortega and another daughter, Rosanna, 8, were under observation at LDS Hospital but were not seriously injured, Nicholl said.

Nicholl said the fire started in several 70-foot-wide areas both inside and outside the home. In addition, a large "pour pattern," indicating the use of an accelerant, was found in a family room in the rear of the home.

Nicholl said the investigation has been turned over to the Salt Lake City Police Department's homicide squad.

Police Lt. Jim Bell said detectives have questioned several people, but have no suspects or motive.

"We're talking to a lot of people, but we haven't keyed in on anybody," he said.

Firefighters got the call about 3:07 a.m.

## Mayor unrepentant over screen near Zion

**SPRINGDALE, Utah (AP)** — The crusty mayor who rammed through a permit allowing construction of a glass-screen theater next to Zion National Park thumbs his nose at the environmentalists who oppose him.

"They're not going to get rid of me," Mayor Bob Ralston said Thursday. "I got a plot in the cemetery here."

Ralston and the Springdale Town Council voted unanimously Wednesday night to grant a conditional use permit to California-based World Odyssey for construction of a 300-seat, big-screen indoor theater at the entrance to the most popular of Utah's five national parks.

Company officials said they expect construction to begin immediately.

In addition to the theater, the developer plans a 12,000 square-foot

retail complex and a 169-stall parking lot across the Virgin River from the park's main campground. Ralston doesn't think that's too close.

"I'm originally from New York. I came here to breathe the fresh air, not to breathe the smoke from camp fires," he said.

"Look, we're not carpetbaggers. We live here 365 days a year," Ralston added. "We're not going to ruin our town. And there's no way our city bitny town is going to hurt that great big park."

Proponents hope the project will breathe life into the economy of this tiny community of 275 in southwestern Utah.

The approval came despite a storm of protests from environmentalists and others worried that the project would detract from the majestic

scenery of the 146,000-acre park, which drew 2.3 million visitors last year.

At one point, members of the House Interior Committee, led by Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, offered to lead the search for an alternate site.

A spokesman for the National Parks and Conservation Association in Washington, D.C., said the advocacy group might sue to halt construction. "We're more than disappointed," said NPACA public affairs director Nicole Clark. "The NPACA and its nearly 300,000 members nationwide feel this is just another example of a very few looking at short term gains, when we're dealing with a long-term issue."

The theater, which will be mostly underground and tucked into a hill-

side, would feature a 59-foot-high and 70-foot-wide screen showing a film entitled "Treasures," a chronicle of the historical and natural attractions of the area.

Plans for an 80-room hotel were dropped during a series of public hearings and negotiations with the town's planning commission. World Odyssey attorney Rand Beacham said the hotel might be reconsidered.

Park officials have said they don't oppose the theater, but would have preferred it be built away from the campground.

"However, the message we got from the town council is that is where they want it to go," said acting park superintendent Larry Wiese. "We will continue to work with them to make sure the park and its resources are protected."

Christian businessmen guilty of fraud

GRANGEVILLE — In what may be the largest sum ever awarded by an Idaho county jury, a group of Christian businessmen were found to have defrauded former partners and ordered to pay more than \$600,000 in damages. The jury ruled Wednesday that James and Josephine Howell, Clifton and Roberta Powell and Jerry and Dennis Lausman, all of California or Oregon defrauded Charles and Barbara Spence. The Howells, Howells, and Lausmans are all officers and members of the Full Gospel Businessmen's Association. The Spences, who were the plaintiffs, bought a ranch at Elk Creek south of Riggins in the late 1970s, planning to convert it into a Christian retreat. Because of their lack of experience in the enterprise, they became business partners with the defendants, who were said to know about such matters and who contributed money to the project.

Birds pecking out tree seeds at nursery

BOISE — Birds are wreaking havoc on the Boise National Forest's Lucky Peak Nursery, eating planted tree seeds intended for use in reforestation of timber-safe areas or lands burned by wildfires. Doves, finches, sparrows and buntings have eaten about 148,000 Ponderosa pine and Douglas fir tree seeds planted this spring. The Forest Service estimates the loss at about \$26,000. "This seems to be a worse year than normal," Dick Thatcher, manager of the Lucky Peak Nursery, said this week. "There's been more birds this year than I've seen in the last 10 to 15 years." The birds pick the seeds out of the ground before they germinate and clip them off stems once they grow through the ground.

Prosecutors drop drug kingpin charge

MOSCOW — Federal prosecutors have dropped their allegation that a northern Idaho drug kingpin used a machine gun while trafficking his wares. Deputy U.S. Attorney Ronald Howen on Wednesday backed down from his accusation against Charley Burnes, who pleaded guilty Monday afternoon to four counts of dealing cocaine and methamphetamine, and to two federal firearms violations. Burnes, who was arrested last July at his Terror Gulch home near Kellogg, was slated to stand trial in U.S. District Court in Moscow on the last weapons charge. "It was a charge my client could not plead guilty to because he didn't do it," said Moscow attorney Ray Barker, who defended Burnes against a string of charges stemming from Burnes' alleged international narcotics business.

Dad kills lion cub found near his land

COEUR D'ALENE — An African lion cub left to roam around the neighborhood in Bonner County has been shot by a father who intended to protect his kids and dog. The 16-week-old female was a pet of Jonathan Chapman of Koole-na. He often brought the animal to the Careywood residence of his mother, Leslie Stephenson. Stephenson said her family has previously raised lions and her son was keeping the cub as a pet. Frank Willford Jr., the Careywood resident who shot the lion, told sheriff's investigators he had warned the owners not to let the animal come near his property.

Plans begin to repair boat-ramp road

BOISE — Salmon National Forest officials have embarked on a six-year, \$6.5 million project to improve the teeth-rattling dirt road leading to popular boat ramps on the Salmon River. Doug Tims, president of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association who lobbied for the project, applauded the U.S. Forest Service for moving ahead. More than 18,000 people who float the wild and scenic Middle Fork of the Salmon River or the Main Salmon must drive the bumpy road to enter or exit the canyon each year. Forest officials have budgeted \$500,000 this year to begin the project. They will study the archeological values of the 35-mile river corridor, conduct a preliminary engineering survey, and write an environmental analysis on the project.

Falls man charged with manslaughter

IDAHO FALLS — An Idaho Falls man has been charged with vehicular manslaughter for the June 6 accident that killed Lyle-K. Frety of Salt Lake City. Frety, 40, was a passenger in a car driven by William R. Harvey, Jr., 36. Sheriff's Lt. Gordon Boyle said Harvey was arrested Wednesday and was being held Thursday in the Bonneville County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond. According to a criminal complaint, authorities contend Harvey was driving southbound on a county road when his vehicle veered off the road, rolled and ejected Frety.

Education officials will review decision

MOSCOW (AP) — The state Board of Education erred when it overhauled one of its key research panels two months ago, two board members now say. And the acting chairman of the board's advisory committee for the Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research, or EPSCoR, says he is encouraged the state regents intend to huddle with his panel later this month. For the past three years, the state has landed \$1.8 million through EPSCoR and Idaho matched the contribution. The University of Idaho received about 90 percent of that as the state's primary research institution. Two months ago, the state board opted not to reappoint Kirk Sullivan, a Boise Cascade vice president who headed UI's centennial fund-raising campaign, and Hewlett-Packard member Rex James to its 11-member EPSCoR advisory committee. Both were aligned with the UI. That move enabled the board to appoint five new members next spring, since William Griffith resigned earlier this year and two positions open next year. Board President Colleen Mahoney of Lewiston said the board did the right thing in revamping the EPSCoR committee to allow more input from the state's other universities and colleges. She doubted it would affect Idaho's competition with other states to attract the EPSCoR funds. But Bruce Deiss, of the National Science Foundation, which operates the EPSCoR grants, warned the board's intention to place an official from each four-year school on the panel indicates the state board misunderstood EPSCoR's goals and it could threaten more funding. Board member Roy Mosman of Moscow said Wednesday he now believes the board made a mistake in restructuring its EPSCoR panel. He said a conversation with a Science Foundation official set him straight. Mosman said the panel should not appoint two well-qualified people to the EPSCoR committee that the Science Foundation approves of: James and Sullivan may be the ones. Board member Gary Fay of Twin Falls agreed the panel should not have restructured the EPSCoR panel, because it is designed for the major research institution in the competing states. Fay said he believes the board should use its Higher Education Re-

search Council, with representatives from Idaho's four-year institutions, to attract research dollars from federal agencies beyond the National Science Foundation. Meanwhile, Sen. Laird Nob. R-Kimberly, chairman of the EPSCoR advisory committee, said Thursday he is pleased the state regents will meet with his panel June 26 in Moscow. "At least some board members want to communicate and get this derelict train back on track," Nob said. "The most important immediate need of the board is to develop a structure that meets the needs of the NSF."

Tribe views scant runs with dismay

LEWISTON (AP) — One special tribal fisherman and one chinook salmon may be the only way for the Nez Perce Tribe to celebrate its religious rite to the migrating fish this year, tribal officials say. Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee members Wednesday repeated a grim outlook for this year's spring chinook salmon run. Committee members have been under fire by some segments of the Nez Perce Tribe, who are salmon fishing in traditional areas used by the Nez Perce, such as the Rapid River at Riggins. The committee has no choice but to ban fishing, committee Chairman Pete Hayes said, although its members are considering an option to give advocates of traditional treaty rights their way, too. "We'd like to express our feelings that we are having among our people here. The tribal council is really agonizing over these decisions because of the treaty right versus the low fish runs." The National Marine Fisheries Service on Friday concluded a year's study of Snake River spring, summer and fall chinook runs. Service biologists recommended lumping the spring and summer runs together and declaring them and fall chinook as threatened species. About a third of this year's spring

chinook salmon migrating up the Snake River are expected to return to Rapid River. One-third of a run that is now numbering among the lowest on record at Ice Harbor Dam on the Snake River is too small to allow fishing and still maintain the tribe's conservation goals, Hayes said. Hayes said Nez Perce leaders have been watching with interest moves by other neighboring tribes to select a traditional fisherman to exercise treaty rights. The chosen fisherman catches one fish to serve as the focus for traditional ceremonies held each year to mark the salmon's return.

Nampa firm folds up after embezzlement

NAMPA (AP) — One of Nampa's oldest businesses has been forced to shut down, after an employee embezzled up to \$300,000. Jerry L. Brown, 51, former controller and accountant for Graybill Wholesale Co., was sentenced by 3rd District Judge Wayne P. Fuller this week for one count of grand theft. Brown was ordered to pay back Graybill more than \$178,000 he stole during his seven years with the company. A hearing is scheduled for July to determine if more restitution is due company shareholders. Brown, who now lives in Sandpoint, was sentenced to 14 years in prison. But the jail time was suspended and he was ordered to serve six months in a county jail with work privileges. Fuller also told Brown he could not work in a job where he was in direct control of another person's money or property. Despite the conviction and sentence, Graybill will be unable to stay open. "I put us out of business," said Fred Christensen, Graybill president. "We think that \$250,000 to \$300,000 was taken and that was the amount of money we needed to continue in business." He said overall damage to the company was more like \$1 million.

Caldwell couple pleads innocent paying for businessman's murder

CALDWELL (AP) — A January 1992 trial is scheduled for a Caldwell couple who pleaded innocent to paying two men to kill local businessman Troy Vance Jr. 12 years ago. William Howard Olson, 59, and Barbara Joanne Olson, 56, entered their pleas to first-degree murder charges Wednesday before 2nd District Judge George R. Reinhardt III. Reinhardt was appointed by the Idaho Supreme Court after all four

3rd District judges in Canyon County excused themselves from the case. Prosecutors contend the Olsons paid Robert Richard Jones, 47, and Jose Alfonso Martinez, 61, to kill Vance, who was Olson's business partner. Both Jones and Martinez have been convicted of first-degree murder for what Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris has called an execution-style slaying.

Board OKs prayer group as school club

SANDPOINT (AP) — A high school prayer group will receive club status, which lets the organization sponsor dances, hold money-raising activities and appear in the yearbook. The Bonner County School Board's new policy grants religious clubs the same opportunities as other non-curricular school groups such as ski and chess clubs. "It's a precedent," said Kevin McArthur, a member of the Rising Generation prayer group, who graduated from Sandpoint High School last week. "I stood up for what I believed in, and through a lot of prayer and trust in God, it came through," McArthur said Wednesday. The school district will let religious clubs meet before or after school on the grounds and will assign a faculty member to supervise. Earlier this year, McArthur used a 1990 U.S. Supreme Court decision granting a Nebraska school prayer group the same access to school property as other non-curricular clubs to bolster his argument. The Bonner County board had banned the group from meeting on campus, citing separation of church and state. The school district's attorney Nick Lamanna reviewed the Equal Access Act and urged the board to reverse its policy. "With students wanting to form religious clubs, it has changed the way the district needs to look at its policy," said school district Superintendent Ed Humble.

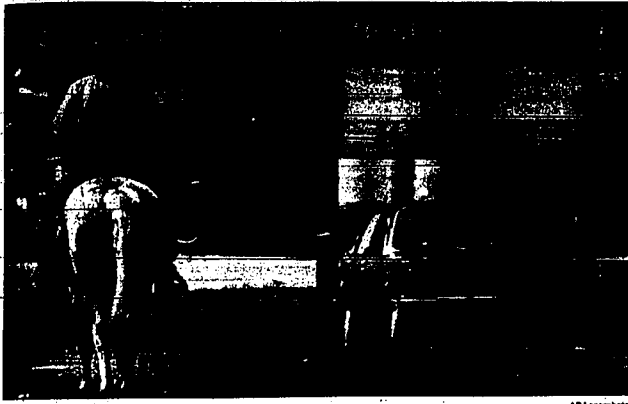

## Struggling logging community: White supremacists unwelcome

FORKS, Wash. (AP) — A white-supremacist group that has been seeking recruits among loggers in depressed Northwest timber towns won't find any converts here, community activists say.

The neo-Nazi message of the Aryan Nations and their "skinhead" allies isn't welcome in this Olympic Peninsula community of about 3,000 people, said Collin King of American Loggers Solidarity.

King's grassroots group unites area timber workers whose jobs are threatened by recession, automation and efforts to protect the old-growth habitat of the northern spotted owl, listed as a threatened species by the federal government last year. Logging restrictions aimed at protecting the bird are expected to wipe out tens of thousands of jobs in the Pacific Northwest.

Aryan Nations public affairs chief Floyd Cochran, trying to capitalize on the workers' bitterness and despair, made a recruiting swing through Oregon and Washington two weeks ago.

"Aryan Nations supports the right of the White logger and all hard-working White taxpayers to make a living," said a flier on the spotted-owl issue distributed by Cochran in Oregon.

But King's group says Cochran and his ilk are not welcome here.

"While there may be some in the white supremacist movement that would like to take advantage of the anger and frustration being felt in our battered communities, those attempts will be met with nothing but the same contempt the rest of America has for them and what they stand for," said a statement distributed by the loggers' group.

"Aryan Nations has nothing to offer us," said Mayor Dick Haberman, one of about 100 people at a Wednesday night meeting of American Loggers Solidarity.

Bob Hughes of the U.S. Justice Department's Community Relations Service spoke to the gathering about the white-supremacist group and its pitch to loggers.

"This is some of the verbiage designed to appeal to people in a desperate state economically — people concerned about their jobs. They are trying to come in from the outside and take advantage of people," he said, citing a flier from the group.

But concerns were raised that the Aryan Nations' message of disdain for the federal government might appeal to some disgruntled loggers.

"The Aryan Nations prey on people that are hurting," said Phil Kitchel, chairman of the Quillayute Valley School District. "This is a good, family community. The bulk of the people will reject this extremism out of hand," Kitchel said.

"But my fear is — and I can feel it and sense it because people are losing their jobs; homes, families — that this radical group will appeal to a small sector of this community."

The Aryan Nations is the political arm of the Church of Jesus Christ Christian, based in Hayden Lake, Idaho.

### Pet still missing, along with \$100

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — A Pasco woman eager for the return of her lost Yorkshire-terrier was duped into paying \$100 to fly her pet home. The dog never arrived.

Marianne Wash said a man called claiming to have the 2-year-old dog, named Danny Doodlebug, in Medford, Ore. He offered to "put the pooch on an airplane if she would wire him money for the 350-mile flight."

She did.

"And I'm heartbroken," Wash said Wednesday. "Only the worst kind of criminal would play on someone's emotions."

Danny Doodlebug dashed out the door June 7. The Washes put an ad in the paper for the 6-pound-dog wearing a gold choke chain.

On Tuesday, a man who identified himself as Robert Robertson called Wash and said he was a long-haul trucker who had purchased the pup for \$100 when he passed through Pasco.

Wash said her husband, Earl, would drive to Medford immediately to pick up the dog. But the caller said he was en route to Los Angeles and could not wait.

Robertson asked for \$73.76 for an airline ticket and \$25 for a kennel. Wash wired \$100 and waited for a call telling her what flight Danny Doodlebug was on.

Neither the call nor the dog ever came.

Wash sent the money on a "will call" basis, which meant it could be picked up at an Western Union outlet in Oregon.

Western Union confirmed the money was received but could not tell her where.

The caller had told Wash she wasn't interested in a reward and didn't even want the \$100 he said he'd spent to buy the dog.

"I thought that was so nice," Wash said. "He sounded so credible to me, I couldn't imagine anyone would be this mean."

She had asked the man for an address to send a thank-you note, but later discovered the Wichita, Kan., street address he gave her does not exist.

The \$400 dog is like her child, Wash said.

Medford police are investigating.

"But this one will be real tough, it's not likely we'll find anything," said Officer Tim Lytle.

### 'Join the Klan' messages recorded on movie video

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — The messages "Save our land" and "Join the Ku Klux Klan" were taped over a video of the movie "Lock Up" while it was checked out of a suburban library, officials said.

A local address and telephone number for the Northwest Knights of the Klan also appeared on the "Lock Up" video and were taped onto a video of the movie "Commando," said Peter Schmitt, Pierce County Library assistant director for administrative services.

Three copies of a white supremacist publication, The Truth At Last, were found within the past two weeks at the University Place branch, and the video vandalism was reported to sheriff's deputies last month, Schmitt said.

"Whether it's a prank or malicious," he said, "regardless of what they said, recording over the tape damages the material, just as if you had torn out pages of a book."

Kim A. Badynski, a Klan organizer who moved to the area from Spokane in 1989, denied that he or the group was responsible.

"We have our own videotapes that we lend or sell. We don't need to attach to somebody else's video," he said.

Badynski also denied placing any newspapers in libraries. He said library officials had ignored his hand-delivered and mailed requests to place literature.

### Home fire kills Lewiston child

LEWISTON (AP) — A 6-year-old Lewiston boy has died in a fire at his family's home.

Brandon F. Campbell, the son of Cecilia and Chris Wilman, was found in a crawl space Wednesday in an upper portion of the house, said Lewiston police Sgt. Allan Sharp.

He was discovered by a firefighter and taken to St. Joseph Regional Medical Center, where he was pronounced dead.

The child's parents and brothers and sisters were home at the time of the fire, but no one else was injured, Sharp said.

Sharp said Brandon apparently went into the house about 10 minutes before the fire was discovered to change clothes for a baseball game.

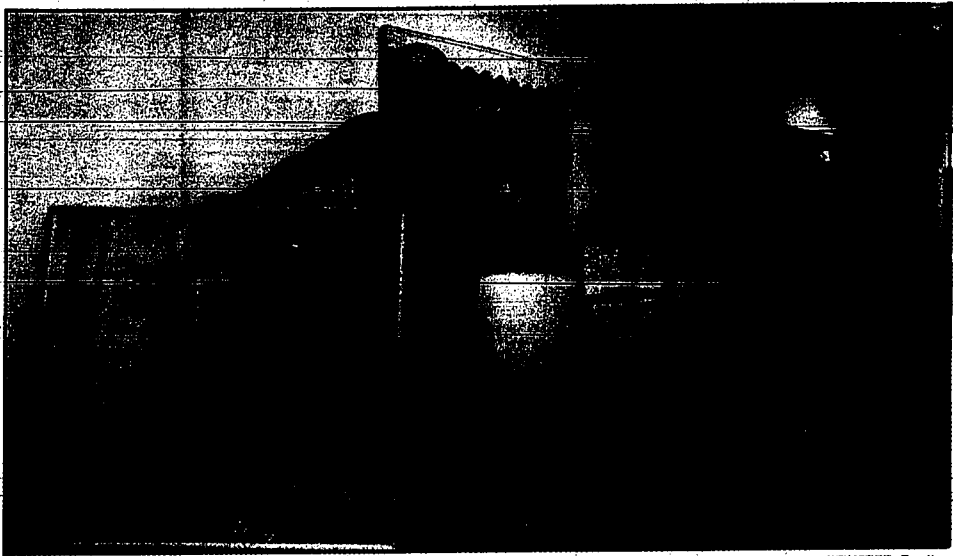

## Sun Valley solitude inspires artist

KETCHUM — A self-proclaimed "creator of visual opportunity," artist Joseph Kinnebrew is a modern interpreter of symbolism, myth and history.

An artist of national and international prominence, Kinnebrew chose to move to Sun Valley full time four years ago to pursue his work, seeking the solitude which he needs to carry it out.

He found that solitude in a mountain cabin in Stanley Basin.

"Painting a picture all the time is very different than painting a picture occasionally," Kinnebrew says. "The all-the-timeness of it is reflective, to a certain degree, of compulsive behavior — and it's not easy."

For Kinnebrew, 48, painting means 12- to 16-hour days, five days a week.

The intensity of the canvas is broken only as Kinnebrew steps back to pick up a book to read, regenerating for another session with the paintbrush.

Until 10 years ago, Kinnebrew sculpted monumental-scale sculptures and large public works paintings.

He then turned toward abstract paintings. More recently, Kinnebrew's creations have been surrealistic. Surrealism makes Kinnebrew happier than painting abstracts, but the process is "infinitely more difficult."

"Abstract painting, for me, was an exercise in self-expression — basically I created images that were very much of the moment and very expressive of transitional feelings."

At the opposite end of the spectrum, surrealism

tends to be more cerebral and far less physical, Kinnebrew says.

Kinnebrew's interest in myths and ancient history manifests itself in his art work.

Man began to communicate with visual imagery roughly 50,000 years ago and Kinnebrew says he is interested in the spiritual and philosophical evolution of man.

His work does not necessarily denote an interest for contemporary religion, but rather, Kinnebrew says his interest lies in the effect religion has on us and the need we all seem to have for it.

The checkerboard — an early symbol of life and death — is prevalent in many of his paintings in the form of a sphere.

This ancient symbol is complemented by modern symbols which Kinnebrew has developed.

A red shoe, for example, stands out in several of his works; its meaning left to the viewer's imagination.

For most people, surrealism is a very difficult imagery to cope with, Kinnebrew explains, saying it is difficult to understand and becomes an intellectual exercise.

Frequently, its imagery is not especially soothing and tends to be provocative, he says. And while sur-

realism has existed in man's history for hundreds of years, it has only recently been identified as such.

"If you're looking for a day at the beach, this ain't it. If you're looking for something to match your sofa, this ain't it."

Kinnebrew says surrealists have to be people with a fair amount of personal conviction because there isn't a lot of reaffirmation in the market place for this type of art.

He also paints floral images, and once in a while symbols will crop up in those more traditional scenes.

"As I've gotten older, in many respects I've gotten more focused," Kinnebrew says.

Kinnebrew's energetic and explosive colored paintings will be displayed at the Charles Grant Gallery (formerly the CODA Gallery) at 380 Leadville today through July 3. He will have a one-man show during the month of July.

Kinnebrew's work is also shown in galleries in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Palm Desert, Calif., Sedona, Ariz., and Atlanta, Ga.

His work is also being shown by portfolio in Japan, and prints are sold as far away as Italy, with originals in major collections across the country.

Two new serigraph editions have just been published and will be released soon.

"Boys Will Be Boys" is a floral serigraph with an impressive total of 56 colors overlaid to produce the final product.

"I like to think my work is always changing," Kinnebrew says, as he continues forward with his personal compulsion to express his understandings or address his unanswered questions on canvas.

## 'Prince of Thieves' star seems content amid success

NEW ORLEANS — A myth persists, nurtured by films as venerable as "A Star Is Born" and as recent as "The Doors," that great professional success somehow breeds personal misery.

If this were true, Kevin Costner would have to be extremely unhappy.

At the moment, the lanky Costner probably could get any project he wanted off the ground. He won an Oscar for his directorial debut in "Dances With Wolves," a prestigious box-office smash in which he also starred. He plays the title role in "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves," which is expected to be one of the summer's biggest hits. And he's now playing crusading attorney Jim Garrison in "Oliver Stone's hotly debated 'JFK,'" currently before the cameras in New Orleans' French Quarter and surrounding area.

But Costner seems perfectly content with matters. Well, almost.

"Fame has caused me to move more inside now," he says. "My family is more important to me now. I try even harder to make my own life as much like anyone else's as possible."

Costner made two trips to the Oscar podium this year, accepting for best director and best picture. On one trip, he took note cards with him. It seemed a disarmingly honest touch.

"I took cards because I forget things easily," he says. "Even now I wish I could have said more about my parents. I wish everyone could have a relationship with their father like I had with mine."

"I'm very romantic about this business. To be up there accepting the Oscar and to look out at the audience and see someone like Gregory Peck — that can overwhelm you. The impact of winning the award didn't hit me until two days later, when I was driving home on the freeway. Then I couldn't believe that so many of us connect-

## Songs, stories, films tackle legend of Robin Hood

The rogue of Sherwood Forest began as the hero of ballads in the mid-19th century, the English ballad collector Francis J. Child compiled a list of 39 songs dealing with Robin Hood. According to the William Rose Benet's "The Readers Encyclopedia," Robin is first mentioned in print in either a history by the Scot Fordun, who died in 1382, or in the "Vision of Piers Plowman," Book V.

As legend has it, Robin Hood was born around 1160 at Loxley, Nottinghamshire. It is also said that he was the outlawed Earl of Huntingdon, Robert Fitzooth, in disguise. Because of his habit of robbing from the rich and giving to the poor, and generally outthinking and hoodwinking the forces of repression, he became perhaps the greatest English folk

hero. The most important collection of ballads about him were the quantity titled "Lytell Geste of Robyn Hode," printed by one Wynkyn de Worde around 1500.

Soon Robin Hood became a stage character as well, in Morris Dances and May Day revels — the lusty month being a time for revolutionaries.

In the 19th century, during the flowering of the English novel, Sir Walter Scott insinuated the ever-popular Robin Hood into both "Ivanhoe" (1820) and "The Taming of Shrew" (1825).

This last novel — about Richard the Lion-Hearted, the Crusades and a brilliant Moor called El Hakim, or Saladin — probably inspired the writers of "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves" to invent Azeem, Morgan Freeman's character. Alfred, Lord Tennyson, Queen Victoria's poet laureate, also contributed to the 19th

ed with the film had won. I thought it was a very generous vote."

He had always had faith, he says, in "Dances With Wolves" but thought the film would be lucky to earn \$50 million in the United States.

"After all, it is a three-hour Western," he says. "But now it's done close to \$400 million worldwide and over \$170 million in the United States." Among films released during the past 12 months, it will surpass "Pretty Woman" in domestic gross but not "Home Alone" or "Ghost."

Hollywood took note of the fact that after the Oscar ceremonies, Costner didn't go to

the traditional party at Spago. Instead, he gave his own party at a popular but less status-conscious restaurant.

"Loyalty is important to all of us," Costner says. "Not going to Spago was not a thumb at the people who like going to Spago. I just wouldn't have been able to take my friends with me. I had 300 people at my party."

Costner's thoughts rekindle the idealistic murmurings of James Stewart and Henry Fonda. Yet it was the tense relationships in the final "Robin Hood" script that appealed to him.

At one point, three Robin Hood scripts

circulated through the offices of three studios. Tri-Star stepped out of the picture when Costner signed with Warner Bros. And 20th Century Fox signed Patrick Bergin as the Sherwood Forest bandit and will release it theatrically overseas. In the United States, it was shown on Fox 33 and telecast to a mild response on May 13.

"The first time the (Warner Bros.) script came to me, I didn't want to do it," Costner says. "In fact, I passed on both this script and the script that was finally done by Fox. I felt they just missed something. And there's no way I would attach my name to a script."

Robyn Hood does not turn up in Shakespeare, but his friend Ben Jonson put the man in Lincoln Green in his "Sad Shepherd." The Puritans drew Robyn into everything else from the stage, but Robyn Hood became a familiar stage figure during the 19th century, especially in English Christmas pantomimes.

In 1893, "Robyn Hood" entered the world of musical comedy. The Harry B. Smith Reginald De Koven opera considered the first great masterpiece of the American musical stage, contained songs ranging from "Brown October Ale" and "Oh, Promise Me," and was regularly revived for nearly half a century.

It was a short jump, or vice-winging, from the Broadway stage to film, where Robyn Hood was both popular and in the public domain, and therefore free. Great Britain took it naturally, in 1909 and 1912, according to the English film historian Leslie Halliwell.

American Robyns sprang up in 1912 and 1913, with another English version appeared. Such a plethora of Robyn Hoods makes it clear how popular a hero he was. Much of the impetus came from the 1883 "The Merry Adventures of Robyn Hood," an entertaining children's classic by the great illustrator Howard Pyle, also known as the teacher of N.C. Wyeth, also a Robyn Hood illustrator.

Any child who grew up in the first half of the century knew Robyn Hood through the Pyle book, or later through retellings by Weimer and others.

Clearly the Pyle book inspired the first great Robyn Hood to reach the screen—the 1922 Douglas-Fairbanks version with Wallace Beery as King

Richard. For that version, the prolific Hollywood director Alan Dwan drew upon his engineering background to create a huge castle whose walls could open to the camera—the largest set even built for a silent film, except for the Babylon of D.W. In 1938, Warner Bros. challenged the memory of Fairbanks with a Robyn nearly as athletic as the great silent screen acrobat hero. "The Adventures of Robyn Hood," starting as a dash but too juvenile Errol Flynn as Robyn Hood, Olivia de Havilland as Maid Marian, Bastian Rathbone as Guy of Gisborne and Claude Rains as Prince John. This superb easy to watch yet hardy early Technicolor production by William Keighley and Michael Curtiz and surprisingly scored by Erich Wolfgang Korngold, is thus far the definitive Robyn Hood movie.

In the late '40s and through the '50s, Hollywood continued to play with Robyn Hood, his son, even his daughters. The Robyns included Cornel Wilde and Jon Hall, even Don Taylor, and John Derek played Robyn Jr. Probably the best Robyn Hood actor was Burt Lancaster, who flashed his teeth and trapeze techniques through a sort of Italian Robyn Hood in "The Flame and the Arrow" in 1950.

Richard Todd lacked the needed class in the first Disney version "The Story of Robyn Hood and His Merry Men," filmed in Sherwood Forest in 1952. The decline in the romance of the once-magical character continued in the lackluster television version with Richard Greene, and Mel Brooks' "When Things Were Rotten" had its admirers but promptly perished during three months of 1975. The British tried "Robyn of Sherwood" in 1984, with little effect in America.

Matters of a more personal nature have bothered Costner as well. In previous years, the media and the actor enjoyed a mutually cordial relationship. After the triumph of "Dances With Wolves," national tabloids started publishing stories that presented him as an egotist and less-than-perfect family man.

"It was a very interesting time in the final script, the fact that not everyone was so buddy-buddy in Sherwood Forest. Friar Tuck fights with Azzem (a Moorish aristocrat who becomes Robyn's close companion) when they leave the Crusades." Will Scarlett, for reasons that seem perfectly valid to him, does not turn Robyn's motives and is resentful of his desire to lead the band.

"Having agreed to play the legendary role, Costner found himself faced with a rushed shooting schedule to accommodate the film's summer-release plans. The tense filming of Robyn Hood: Prince of Thieves was vividly recorded in the current issue of Premiere magazine.

"The premiere article was accurate," Costner says. "The time restraints were very difficult. But the hardships were on a professional level, not a life-force level. It wasn't Kuwait. When you take an overview, it gives you a certain perspective on making a movie.

"Still, I would have preferred not to have been so rushed. When I tried on my costume was the first day of shooting. I didn't know what in the world to do with it."

"And Costner's not entirely happy with what he calls the film's "very traditional" final scene.

"I would have loved to end it with more interaction between Robyn and Azzem," he says. "That, to me, was the heart of the story."

The premiere article also was accurate, he says, in stating that the lavish production strained the long-time friendship between Costner and director Reynolds.

"I don't know the status of our friendship right now. We haven't had a chance to speak to each other lately," Costner says. "My feelings run out to much into this movie. I understood his unhappiness if he felt the film didn't reflect his entire vision. I think he's a very wonderful filmmaker."

# Costner's 1st-rate supporting cast makes 'Robin Hood' work

At various times in his long and colorful life, Robin Hood has been called a rogue, a rascal and even a bandit.

But he's been a rogue, rascal and bandit with a twinkle in his eye, and therein lies the major flaw of the eagerly awaited "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves."

Kevin Costner plays the legendary hero in the manner of a high school student-council candidate crusading for your vote. Not since his vanilla portrayal of Elton West in "The Untouchables" has Costner's limited range been so apparent. There's so much self-conscious earnestness in his eyes, no room is left for a twinkle.

Costner's lapses are not fatal to the film and may not even be noticed by his devoted following. As a result, "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves" probably will be the box-office smash the movie industry anticipates. It delivers entertainment on a broad and sometimes sweeping level.

The movie works by virtue of a first-rate supporting cast and the sheer momentum of its venerable story. The scriptwriters have elected not to confuse the audience by concentrating on two villains. Wicked Prince John is scarcely mentioned, while the Sheriff of Nottingham commands the screen.

As played in a grand, over-the-top performance by Alan Rickman, he's a thoroughly evil, carnal being, who practices black magic and is advised in all matters by a very ill-mannered witch. Rickman camps it up almost to a point more suitable for Captain Hook than the Sheriff of Nottingham in "Robin Hood." Nevertheless, he has a great time doing so.

Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio is a Maid Marian of grit and determination, although — in script — short-changes her in the final scenes by turning the heretofore tough-talking heroine into a conventional distressed damsel. Christian Slater is so effective as a moody, tormented Will Scarlet, you'll wish he had more footage.

The screenplay's major addition is

the character of Azeem, a Moorish aristocrat who befriends Robin Hood while both are languishing in prison during the Crusades. The way Morgan Freeman plays him, he seems like a variation of Hoke in "Driving Miss Daisy"; he's taciturn, sharp-eyed and handy in difficult situations, as when Little John's wife experiences a complicated birth. Freeman's performance is solid but inspired.

Considering the complexity of the production, director Kevin Reynolds does a serviceable and sometimes commendable job. The opening sequence involving dungeons and skeletons is chilling, and the final 20 minutes constitute rousing, fight-for-the-underdog adventure. The dialogue awkwardly attempts a contemporary lilt, but Reynolds' visual style is solid. He is not as good at this sort of thing as a young Steven Spielberg — but at this point in his career, neither is Spielberg.

The film's production values and cinematography are elegant, but the musical score is a disappointment. Even the most avid reader of closing credits is advised to leave the auditorium before the final theme song is heard.

Ever since "Dances With Wolves" became the prestige smash of 1990, "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves" has been awaited with heightened expectations. Lower yours to a more moderate level and have a good time.

## Tragedy spreads pall over U.S. Open

The Associated Press

**CHASKA, Minn.** — Golf became an 'after-thought' Thursday when tragedy and death scarred the opening round of the 91st U.S. Open.

"It was almost like we weren't playing the U.S. Open. People were hurt and killed out there. So how can you be upset or concerned about a bad hole or a bad score," Curt Byrum said.

Byrum came back from a lengthy storm delay, birdied two of his last three holes and took the early lead with a 68, a secondary consideration to the killer storm that struck the course.

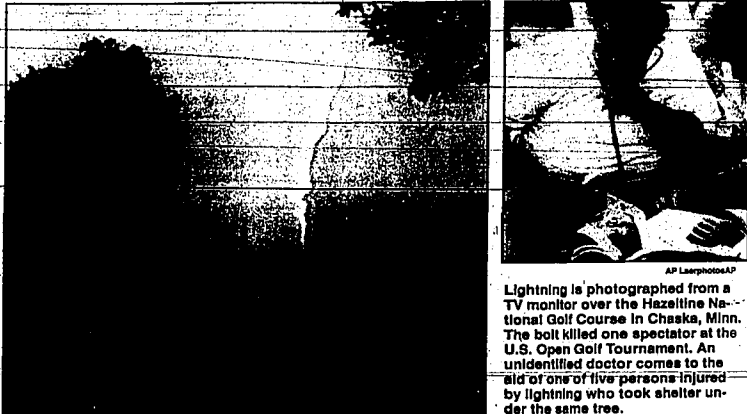
"The nightmare you hope you'll never have," U.S. Golf Association executive director David Fay said in describing the brief, violent storm that lashed 40,000 confused, exposed spectators, killing one and injuring five.

All the casualties were struck by lightning as they huddled beneath a solitary willow tree near the 11th tee at the Hazeltine National Golf Club.

The family was identified as William John Fiddell, 27, of Spring Park, Minn.

"With that amount of lightning, there could have been a lot more injuries," said Dr. Bob Nordland, co-medical director of the tournament. "We feel lucky there weren't more."

Fathers, their wives and caddies were hustled to shelter of one fashion or another. Some went to the clubhouse. Defending champion Hale Irwin and others dashed to a maintenance shed. Davis Love III and others boarded a parked school bus.

"But where," asked Irwin, "do you hustle 40,000 spectators?"

They were, largely, left to their own devices in the rain and wind and lightning. Some simply huddled under umbrellas while sitting on metal bleachers.

"It's a very, very scary situation," Irwin said. "I wasn't quite so concerned with my golf game after such a tragedy," said

**HARTFORD, Conn.** — NHL teams are lining up to try to put together a package for highly touted prospect Eric Lindros, who has said he doesn't want to play in Quebec. Hartford Whalers' general manager Ed Johnston said Thursday.

And a published report in a Montreal newspaper indicated Lindros doesn't want to play in Canada.

"He was MVP during the year and MVP during the playoffs — as an individual he's unbelievable," said Johnson, who had 16 points, 20 assists and 11 rebounds for the Los Angeles Lakers' 108-101 loss in Game 5 on Wednesday night.

# How does a curve curve? Supervision can show how

**BALTIMORE** — The question dates back to shortly after Abner Doubleday discovered what you could be had with four bases, a bat and a ball. The answer lies in the futuristic technology of computer graphics.

Past and future will be brought together Friday when the Discovery Channel's invention series takes over National Stadium to prove once and for all that a curveball is more than an optical illusion.

The proof comes courtesy of supervision, a computer graphics system created by the California-based Sportlight Inc.

With the aid of its graphics, Yale professor Robert Adair and former Orioles Jim Palmer (the pitcher), Brooks Robinson (batter) and John Stefiaro (catcher), the Discovery Channel will take a half-hour look at the pitch that has been baffling hitters for centuries. The series premieres in October.

Adair, author of the book "The Physics of Baseball," says "a baseball curves just about the way it looks."

Adair uses the example of a righthanded pitcher throwing a "sawdlog curve," one that does not have the dramatic vertical drop that a major-league pitcher can produce.

The pitcher spins the ball as he throws, on the right hand side, the third base side, is going forward, and the left hand side, the first base side, is going relatively backward.

To illustrate the point further, Adair asks us to imagine a bug on either side of the ball.

"The bug on the third base side feels a strong breeze, caused by air resistance, while the bug on the first base side feels no breeze," according to Adair, when the pitcher spins the ball, much more force is being exerted

ed on the third base side than on the first base side and that pushes the ball sideways, toward first base, making it curve.

Orioles Ben McDonald and Gregg Olson, both of whom throw curves that can make opposing batters look foolish, admit to rarely thinking of the physics that contribute to their success. But when asked to discuss exactly how they throw a curve, both sounded somewhat technical in their explanations.

"The rotation causes it to go down," said McDonald, who has been throwing the curveball ever since a fellow little leaguer taught it to him when he was 12. "Some curves have a 12 o'clock to 6 o'clock drop to it, like Olson's, but most are like mine, they have a kind of 1 o'clock to 5 o'clock or 2 to 4 o'clock drop."

According to Olson, the key to his is "keeping his arm up..."

"In laymen's terms, when you throw a curveball, whether it be hard or slow, you need to stay with it. Usually, when people throw curveballs, and try to throw it hard, they don't compensate with their body, and it just spins."

In order to throw the curveball you need to keep your arm up, because the curve is slower through the body. When I throw my curveball I step

maybe six inches shorter in my stride than when I throw my fastball, which allows me to get over the top of the ball so I can throw it for a strike."

Amateur physics aside, Adair thinks—that players are better left in the dark about what it is that they actually do.

"Of all the ways to learn to throw and bat better, the worst way is to study the physics of it," Adair said.

Brian Harris, president of Sportlight Inc., however, has to hope that major league baseball teams do not feel the same way. Supervision, the brainchild of Harris' brother, Michael, an aerospace engineer, can instantly capture the path of a thrown ball, calculate its velocity from the moment it leaves the pitcher's hand to the time it crosses the plate, call catches its lateral and vertical movement, and display it all graphically on a computer 1.5 seconds after the ball is thrown.

All of this is done using a process called triangulation, a process similar to a missile-tracking system. In the case of the curveball, Supervision can display two paths, one showing the way the ball would have traveled had the pitcher not applied any spin, the way a batter might see it, and another, displaying the way the curveball diverges from that path.

Supervision also can store every pitch of a game for instant replay, display the location of every pitch thrown by a pitcher, and the way a batter has been pitched throughout an entire game.

As a teaching tool to up-and-coming ballplayers, Sportlight Inc.'s senior systems engineer Mike L.W. Lim, thinks Supervision is a product of its time.

# U.S. meets Spain in Davis Cup

**NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)** — With its top player nursing a back injury and the rest of the team more suited to clay than grass, the Spanish Davis Cup team knows it's got a tough quarterfinal ahead.

But don't be surprised by some surprises, the Spaniards say.

"I know no one expects it but I hope to give some surprises," said Tomas Carbonell, whose initiation into Davis Cup play will be his opening day match against John McEnroe.

"I'm a young guy. I have to go for it."

The success of the Spanish team rests with Emilio Sanchez, who will play all three days in the quarterfinals. He is today's opening match before teaming with Sergio Casal in Saturday's doubles match against Rick Leach and Jim Pugh.

On Sunday, Sanchez meets McEnroe in the reverse singles.

Asked if he was up to the chal-

# South Africa nears return to Olympics

**BIRMINGHAM, England (AP)** — The International Olympic Committee took another step Thursday toward allowing South Africa back into the Games after a suspension of more than 20 years.

The IOC will invite South Africa to compete in the 1992 Olympics on the condition that the last pillars of apartheid be dismantled.

South African IOC vice-president Keba Mbaye said.

To clear the way for quick reinstatement, IOC members gave the 11-member executive board and president Juan Antonio Samaranch the authority to return South Africa to the Games once the condition has been met.

"Everything is going in the direction of the fulfillment of our conditions," Mbaye said. "There is reason for hope and we have hope."

"Mbaye said IOC members were gratified at the progress on South Africa but didn't want to rush into a decision.

"Almost everyone said we must not allow ourselves to be bound by deadlines," he said. "We must let ourselves be guided by events and circumstances. It is necessary to proceed with care, not to act in a precipitous fashion which could compromise all that has been done until now."

South Africa last competed in the Olympics in the 1960 Summer Games at Rome. It was expelled from the IOC in 1970 for its policies of racial segregation.

weeks after a key meeting between IOC officials and South African sports leaders at Lausanne, Switzerland, on July 9.

"This will be a very important meeting," Mbaye said Thursday. "It will allow us to evaluate exactly where South Africa stands in abolishing apartheid and unifying South African sports bodies."

Mbaye didn't rule out the possibility of South Africa sending a team to the Winter Olympics at Albertville, France, in February.

"It is very difficult to say right now, because those Games are not very far away... I don't see why it could not be done," he said.

Mbaye, a native of Senegal, is the head of the IOC's Commission on Apartheid and Olympism. He led a

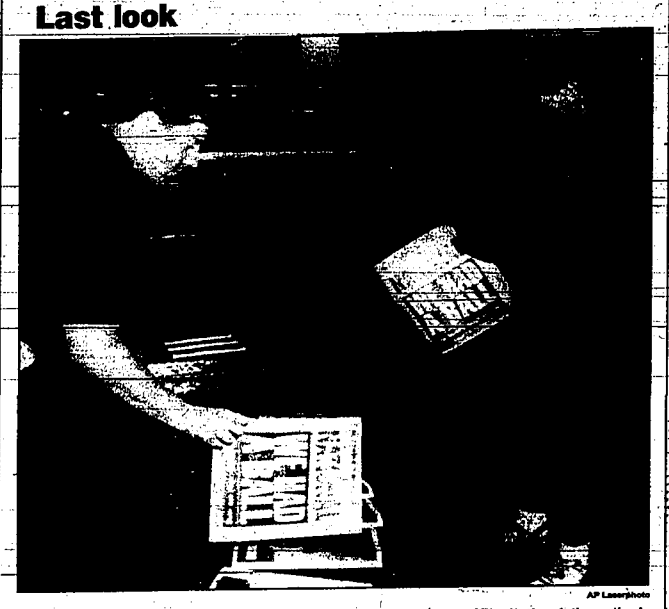
delegation to South Africa in March which granted provisionally recognition to an interim national Olympic committee and set the conditions for full reinstatement.

Mbaye presented his report on South Africa during the 97th session of the IOC, whose members are meeting at Birmingham to choose the site of the 1998 Winter Games.

Mbaye said the IOC was concerned only with the struggle against apartheid in sports in South Africa.

"The IOC is not a political organization," he said. "If we determine that apartheid is abolished in sport, the task of the IOC is over."

"The IOC cannot get involved in the political or economic side of it. That is up to others."

# Russian voters impart mandate for reform to republic's leader

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris Yeltsin rose from a provincial Communist bureaucrat to the Russian republic's first president, winning a place in Soviet history and a mandate to pursue radical reform.

Preliminary results Thursday showed Yeltsin, 60, easily won the race to become Russia's first popularly elected leader, adding legitimacy to his power and magnetism.

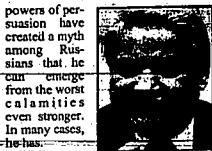
He has won what Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev has never faced — a direct election.

Critics and Communists have called Russia but never a democratically elected president. The election has brought the Soviet Union's largest and most populous republic into the tradition of Western democracy.

Like those of many of his countrymen, Yeltsin's life was turned upside down when Gorbachev came to power in 1985 seeking to open up and reform the Soviet political and economic system.

Yeltsin's career has been rocky. He soared to dizzying heights, only to lose power, and start over. All along he has had the Russian people's faith and support. His appearances draw crowds enchanted by the Siberian's blunt speech, thick silver hair and lumbering physique.

Tales of Yeltsin's mischief-making as a boy, hard living as an adult and

powers of persuasion have created a mystique among Russians that he can emerge from the worst of the worst calamities even stronger. In many cases, he has.

While some Russians see him as a savior, some Western countries prefer dealing with Gorbachev and worry that Yeltsin could threaten the Soviet president and his reforms.

Yeltsin came to Moscow in 1985 as a member of the Communist Party's Central Committee after more than two decades as a party bureaucrat in the central Siberian city of Sverdlovsk.

He quickly became one of the most vocal supporters of perestroika, Gorbachev's term for social, economic and political reform. He was named Moscow party leader soon after his arrival, but was bumped from the prestigious job in 1987 for criticizing the pace of reforms at a closed party meeting. He lost his non-voting membership in the Communist Party-Politburo in 1988.

Earlier, such an ouster would have

ended a Communist's career. But in an era of political reform, Yeltsin won election to the national parliament in 1989 by appealing to the people rather than party apparatchiks.

His victory stunned Communist Party officials, who had written base, Yeltsin fought his way back to the top.

In 1990, Yeltsin was elected to the Russian legislature and became its chairman. He quit the Communist Party, taking along many reformers, last July and left Gorbachev with the conservatives.

In his yearlong tenure as parliament chairman, Yeltsin has been a tireless campaigner against the privileged lifestyle enjoyed by senior party and government workers.

In a television interview during the election campaign, he said his family lives "like other Moscow families, like workers and clerks that have no privilege," and that his wife stands in line for groceries three or four hours a day.

He won the respect of striking coal miners by promising them more control of the pits and a greater share of profits.

Yeltsin has pushed Gorbachev, his former patron and current rival, to adopt more radical reforms.

# Soviets say they still have some nuclear weapons in Germany

BONN, Germany (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Alexander Bessmertnykh acknowledged Thursday the Red Army has not removed all its nuclear weapons from eastern Germany.

Bessmertnykh promised the weapons would be "rapidly" withdrawn, but did not say when.

Bonn officials previously had said they were led to believe all Soviet nuclear weapons had been removed. The weapons are deployed along with Red Army troops in former Communist East Germany, which merged with West Germany in October and became part of the NATO alliance.

During a news conference in Bonn, Bessmertnykh also said he was worried that vastly improved East-West relations could unravel, and cautioned against letting the Cold War return.

"The main danger is that we have not yet guaranteed that all the positive developments are irreversible," said Bessmertnykh.

He contended the Cold War had nearly returned in January and February, when some in the West harshly criticized Moscow's military actions in the Soviet Baltic republics.

Bessmertnykh also said Moscow

accepts the existence of NATO for a "transition period" but that it must eventually give way to "European security structures." The East bloc has disbanded the military structure of the Warsaw Pact alliance.

He said the 34-nation Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe "must play the chief stabilizing role." Foreign ministers of CSCE members — the United States, Canada, the Soviet Union and all European countries except Albania — meet next week in Berlin to consider measures to defuse future conflicts.

Bessmertnykh half-jokingly said organizations stemming from the Cold War, like NATO, "must not be condemned to eternal existence."

German Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher, sitting next to Bessmertnykh, disagreed. He said NATO "can be an important element for the stability of Europe also in the future."

In saying not all Soviet atomic weapons had been removed from eastern Germany, Bessmertnykh cleared up confusion that has occupied the German government the past two weeks.

Earlier this month, the German government said Moscow had stated all the weapons were removed. But

on Wednesday, the government said it may have "misunderstood."

Bessmertnykh told reporters "there is still a certain number of nuclear weapons on the territory of former East Germany" but that they will be quickly withdrawn according to a schedule whose details he did not disclose.

Bessmertnykh did not identify the weapons. But they are believed to be either short-range rockets or artillery shells.

The Soviets also had intermediate-range nuclear rockets in East Germany, but both the United States and the Soviet Union agreed in 1987 to scrap all those weapons by June 1 of this year.

Bessmertnykh said the Soviet atomic arms in eastern Germany were not "burdening our relations" with Bonn.

Genscher did not contradict his Soviet counterpart, and the German government appeared to be trying to play down the issue.

A government official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the only bilateral agreement covering the Soviets' short-range nuclear weapons is a treaty under which Moscow is removing its 380,000 troops from former East Germany by 1994.

# British diplomat leaves hostage talks encouraged

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — A high-ranking British official said Thursday he had received encouraging signs that Western hostages in Lebanon would be freed but there was no word of an immediate release.

The two-day visit by Foreign Office Minister Douglas Hogg coincided with an Iranian newspaper report of "hectic activities" to secure the captives' release.

"The hostages have not been freed yet, but I am quite certain, for example, that the government of Syria is working hard to achieve that objective," Hogg said before departing for London. He is the second-ranking official in the Foreign Office.

Hogg, who arrived Wednesday in Syria after a three-day trip to Beirut, said he was "encouraged" by his meetings with Syrian officials, including Foreign Minister Farouk al-Shara.

"We discussed hostages," the ques-

tion of the peace process in the Middle East, and we also, of course, discussed the question of Lebanon," Hogg said of his talks with al-Shara.

Syria is the major powerbroker in Lebanon. It has 40,000 soldiers there under a 1976 Arab League mandate to try to reduce peace during the country's civil war, which claimed 150,000 lives over 16 years.

Damascus and Beirut last week ratified a friendship and cooperation treaty that is expected to expand Syria's role in Lebanon's internal affairs.

There are 13 Westerners missing in Lebanon, including six Americans, four Britons, two Germans and an Italian. The longest-held hostage is Terry Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press. He was kidnapped March 16, 1985.

## Voters want city to be St. Petersburg

LENINGRAD, U.S.S.R. (AP) — In a symbolic blow to the country's Communist legacy, voters in this former imperial city narrowly endorsed restoring their city's name to St. Petersburg, election officials said.

Preliminary results showed nearly 54 percent of voters want to change the city's name for the third time this century, said Yuri Lyovin, an election commission member.

The referendum is not binding, and it was unclear whether approval was required for the Russian republic's legislature, the national legislature, or both.

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — King Hussein planned home Thursday after being treated for a heart ailment, but doctors said he should avoid work for awhile.

Smiling broadly, the 55-year-old monarch emerged from the Hussein Medical City, accompanied by his wife, American-born Queen Noor, to the cheers of thousands of Jordanians. Women cried out of joy. Men shouted "Long live Hussein!"

Hussein's doctor, Youssef Qous, said the king was in "perfect health condition and the rate of his majesty's heartbeat is normal now. But his majesty must be kept away from work and any type of exhaustion."

Qous, a cardiac surgeon, said Hussein has suffered from atrial fibrillation for a decade. The ailment is

a rapid, uncoordinated series of contractions of the heart muscle that cause an irregular heartbeat and some ineffectual pumping of blood.

It is the same condition that afflicted President Bush in May.

Jordanians had kept a vigil outside the hospital since the popular monarch was admitted Monday with an irregular heartbeat.

Hussein said he was moved by their concern. He assured them he

would follow the doctors' instructions. "But I would like to emphasize that the country should not depend on any one man," he added.

Hussein said he would spend "some peaceful and quiet days this week away from work as I have promised my doctors."

The monarch then climbed into the front seat of his car next to the queen, who drove the metallic-gray Mercedes-Benz to the royal palace.

### Kuwait court hands out death sentence

**KUWAIT CITY** — Kuwait's martial-law court Thursday sentenced a Lebanese woman to death after finding her guilty of turning her Kuwaiti husband over to the Iraqi military for execution.

It was the second death sentence handed down by the court since it started hearing cases May 19, and the first against a female. The woman, Fatima Ramez Taifa, was silent for a moment, then burst into tears after the judge read the sentence. She had said in earlier testimony that her father-in-law fabricated the story against her.

The Iraqis targeted military and police officers, especially those believed active in the resistance, for execution.

### Reporter arrested on spying charges

**FRANKFURT, Germany** — A reporter for the German-language service of the Reuters international news agency has been arrested on suspicion of spying for the former East German secret service, the company said Thursday.

The Federal Prosecutor's Office in Karlsruhe said a 43-year-old journalist had been arrested on suspicion of spying. The office identified the suspect as Peter Carter W., without giving his last name or affiliation. But Reuters confirmed that the suspect was Peter Wolter, a correspondent for the agency's German-language service in the Hamburg bureau. He was hired in 1982.

The prosecutor's office said the man was suspected of delivering information to East German intelligence since the early 1980s.

### Aspirin can lead to healthy babies

**LONDON** — Small amounts of aspirin taken daily during pregnancy can help some women deliver healthy babies that might otherwise have been dangerously small, French scientists reported in this week's *Lancet*. The finding came from a study of 229 women conducted from 1985-1989 by France's National Institute of Health and Medical Research. All of the subjects had already had two pregnancies with dangerously small fetuses.

Babies who are abnormally small are more likely to die.

The study published in Saturday's issue of *Lancet* is the largest to show benefits of aspirin on select pregnant women. Doctors said that women not at risk for having fetuses with growth problems still are advised to avoid aspirin during pregnancy.

### Smog emergency idles Chile capital

**SANTIAGO, Chile** — A smog emergency has been declared in Chile's capital, idling factories, banning vehicles from streets and suspending classes for about 500,000 elementary students.

The pollution-reducing measures were introduced Wednesday in Santiago, a city of 4.5 million people, and are to continue Friday, according to the government's Anti-Pollution Commission.

The group said 40 percent of Santiago's 550,000 vehicles would be banned from streets Friday and 188 factories in its industrial belt would be temporarily shut.

"If we have to stop the entire city to clean its air, we will do so," said the commission's secretary, Eduardo Arriaga.

### Gays, lesbians call off convention

**MEXICO CITY** — The International Lesbian and Gay Association has canceled the convention it had planned for Guadalajara after months of anti-gay marches, death threats and local government pressure. Despite the intervention of the National Human Rights Commission, the international association was unable to find a site for the meeting, which was to begin June 30 and last for a week, and unable to guarantee the safety of participants.

More than 1,000 delegates from 30 countries had signed up for what would have been the Brussels-based association's first convention in Latin America, said organizers Pedro Preciado and Jorge Romero.

### Iranians arrive for pilgrimage to Mecca

**TEHRAN, Iran** — More than 100,000 Iranians have arrived in Saudi Arabia to take part next week in the annual pilgrimage to Mecca, known as the hajj, after a three-year boycott of one of the pillars of Islam.

Reliable sources said 102,000 Iranians out of 115,000 authorized by the Saudi Arabian government to undertake the hajj were in the kingdom with more than half present in the holy city of Mecca — birthplace of the Prophet Mohammad.

## Jetfighters help open 39th Paris Air Show

**LE BOURGET, France (AP)** — With supersonic jetfighters and widebodied passenger planes swooping above, the 39th Paris Air Show opened with thunder in the sky Thursday.

Hundreds of aircraft from pilotless drones and one-man helicopters to the Stealth fighter-bomber and huge Soviet Albatross amphibious plane crowded the tarmac at Le Bourget Airport just north of Paris.

Security was tight, with scores of police stationed about the tarmac, while others perched atop nearby buildings. Visitors to Israel's pavilion walked through a metal detector and had bags searched thoroughly.

At the center of attention were the black F-17 Stealth fighter of the U.S. Air Force and blue-and-beige MiG-31 advanced fighter from the Soviet Union.

While the Stealth fighter got worldwide exposure during the Gulf War, little is known about the MiG-31, the Soviet Union's most advanced fighter, which is making its 25th anniversary.

**DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP)** — Hundreds of protesters smashed vehicles and exploded homemade bombs Thursday to protest a 10-year prison sentence against deposed President Hussain Mohammed Ershad.

At least 25 people were injured, witnesses said.

Police used steel-tipped batons to disperse the crowd of about 2,000 who marched in a heavy downpour and attacked cars and buses with rocks and steel rods in central Dhaka. Some exploded crowd bombs.

"Ershad is innocent!" chanted the demonstrators, most of whom belong to the former president's Jatiya Party. Some shouted: "We shall break the jail and release Ershad!"

Saltsmanhood awards, and government officials crowd the displays, sometimes initiating multimillion-dollar deals.

## Baghdad reaches accord with Kurds

**DOHUK, Iraq (AP)** — Under pressure from the United States, Iraq has agreed to help the Kurds harvest 120,000 tons of wheat growing around the allied-occupied zone, an American official said Thursday.

It was the first agreement between the government and the Kurds since the Kurdish rebellion in March.

A Kurdish official said meanwhile that Saddam Hussein's government had presented a proposal for a Kurdish autonomous zone and that its leaders planned to meet to discuss it.

"We must meet very soon, in a week I hope," said Fadhil Merani, a top official of the Kurdish Democratic Party. "We must grasp the time and make peace with Baghdad."

Iraqi deputy Prime Minister Tariq Aziz, visiting Turkey, said an agreement on an autonomous Kurdistan was not ready, however.

"We made great progress," Aziz said. "But there are remaining issues and we need some more time to reach an agreement."

Fred Cuny, an official with the U.S. State Department's Disaster Assistance Relief Team, said Baghdad only agreed to help with the harvest after the United States threatened to gather the wheat itself and give it all to the Kurds.

Iraq faces a severe food shortage

and wheat is a staple of the Iraqi diet. "The Iraqis had no other choice," Cuny said. "It was consistent to our demands or lose it all."

If the agreement had not been negotiated, the Kurds might have sold their wheat to another country, such as Syria, officials said.

About 120,000 tons of wheat, or one-third of Iraq's total crop, is growing in fields around the allied-controlled "security zone" in northern Iraq, according to State Department and United Nations figures.

The area is Iraq's breadbasket, and agriculture is so vital to the government in the number of people it employs. Iraq's Board of Grain will buy the wheat for 800 dinars, about \$150 on the black market, per metric ton — a good price, Cuny said.

Arab absentee landlords will get half the profits, Kurdish farmers 40 percent and the Kurdistan Front, a coalition of Kurdish political parties, 10 percent, said Merani, who helped negotiate the plan.

He said the agreement means Baghdad was ready to accept Kurdish demands for a return of their traditional lands.

During the 1970s and '80s, the Iraqi army destroyed scores of villages in the Zakho and Dohuk valleys.

## Iraq shows marshes to reporters; No evidence of attacking troops

**HAMMAR MARSHLANDS, Iraq (AP)** — Foreign reporters on a government tour of Iraq's southern marshlands found no evidence Thursday to support Iran's claim that troops were massing to attack Shiite Muslim refugees.

To visiting reporters, the part of the region they were allowed to see seemed largely empty.

Fishermen paddled tiny marsh canoes through waist-high grasses as they have for centuries in the swamp region at the convergence of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers.

Water, buffalo grazed. Shrieking birds swooped for prey. Shoppers crowded street markets of nearby villages.

But a few gutted tanks beneath village palm trees and frequent

checkpoints manned by troops with mortars and anti-aircraft guns indicated continuing government concern about the Shiite rebels who rose against President Saddam Hussein after the Gulf War.

The reporters saw only a fraction of the region.

The trip did not include the area between the highway and the Iranian border, torn by fighting during the Iran-Iraq conflict.

It was near the area that allegedly housed hundreds-of-thousands-of Shiite refugees since the March rebellion.

The villages themselves bore few, if any, portraits of Saddam — a notable omission in a country where his visage seems omnipresent.




Institutions' interest in small stocks grows

NEW YORK - It is taking less and less time for emerging growth stocks to be discovered, which helps explain why small-stock indexes have soared this year. As recently as a few years ago, institutional investors all but ignored the shares of extremely small companies. Now, many mutual and pension funds regularly invest in small-stock lists in search of bargains. That list is growing. In spite of recession and accompanying news of business failures, entrepreneurial efforts have been strong in the past few years, resulting in many new companies that grow swiftly and profitably. Some of these companies, many grouped in electronics, computers and health care, have created their own niches. Some have grown so explosively in sales and earnings that they are likely to be big companies within a decade. In the past, many institutions paid no attention to upstarts. The amount of stock available in such companies was too limited to interest them, and perhaps too volatile for their tastes. Management's sometimes were un-

considered to be those with equity of under \$100 million - institutional buying power could produce an opposite effect. Just a small increase in demand for small-company stocks, with small amounts of stocks available for trading - can push their prices sharply higher. Of course, an institutional reliance to sell could undermine prices. Gerald W. Perritt, editor of investment -Horizons, a small-stock newsletter, estimates that the entire small-stock market is \$100 billion, or equal to just one month's trading volume on the New York Stock Exchange. The amount available for trading is even less, Perritt says, since about one-third of the outstanding shares remains in the portfolios of operating management, bringing the theoretical amount to about \$67 billion. A small change in the demand for small-firm stocks can result in a significant change in price, he says, and he continues to believe that the pressure is upward. Blue chips, Perritt says, may have gotten ahead of themselves, but he believes small-company stocks remain reasonable value in terms of earnings, dividends and book values. There are hundreds of small companies out there waiting to be recognized, he says. These are companies with sales growing at double-digit rates and with operating earnings rates 20 percent to 40 percent below those of larger companies. They would have remained unrecognized by institutions a decade ago. Big brokers would have thought it a waste to research them, preferring instead to buy until they had grown to sufficient size, a minimum of \$100 million. By then, of course, these small companies would have multiplied their sales and earnings many times, greatly enriching their shareholders and approaching a size where such rapid growth couldn't be maintained. In the old days, that's when institutions made their move - that is, a bit late. Now they want to get in earlier. They want to share in the explosive growth, and probably contribute to it, too.

Thrifty Drug Stores plans to close 2 stores in Idaho

BOISE (AP) - Thrifty Drug Stores is closing its two Boise stores, possibly by the end of the month. Thrifty's Hillcrest and North Cole Road stores each employ about 15 people. Workers were told Monday about the pending closures. It was Larry Schell, manager of the Hillcrest Thrifty, said Tuesday. "But we were kind of prepared for it. They had told us several times this might happen." Schell said he had been told the company wanted to close the stores by the end of June, but he has not been given a firm date. Los Angeles-based Thrifty operates 622 stores in California and Nevada. The closest to Boise are in

Reno, Nev. Thrifty corporate officials did not return calls Tuesday. "There are a lot of factors" for the closures," Schell said. "These two stores are a long ways from any other stores." The Hillcrest store has been open for about 28 years and the Cole Road store for about 16. Schell said both were profitable, but advertising in Idaho cost Thrifty more per store than in California. "We run the same amount of advertising here but it only covers two stores," he said. "The same ad there covers 30 stores." Schell said several employees will transfer with the company, but most will find other jobs in the Boise area.

State levies fines against promoters

BOISE (AP) - Texas oil promoters face state fines of \$10,000 for unlicensed telemarketing in Idaho. The Department of Finance said a court judgment has been entered against Entex Equity Group and its president Paul Farreta, both of Plano, Texas. The state lawsuit alleged that the company and Farreta made unsolicited, high-pressure telephone sales and sent materials offering oil and

gas investments without being licensed. The state suit also claimed the company engaged in conduct which acted as a fraud on investors. Fourth District Judge Deborah Bell signed a judgment against the company finding that Entex Equity and Farreta violated state securities laws with the sale of \$2,000,000 of stock. The company also must pay the state \$5,000 for attorney fees and costs and make restitution of \$6,000 to Idaho customers.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"How much easier it is to be critical than to be correct." Benjamin Disraeli.

"Your mistake was in drawing trumps too soon," said North after the spade game had gone down. See if you agree with that analysis.

West ruffed the third heart, drew trumps, and led the diamond ace and another diamond. West made a shrewd duck, and dummy's Jack won. (Had West taken the King, South would have enjoyed two diamonds on dummy's diamonds.) After a second was ruffed, three rounds of clubs followed, but when the suit failed to break 3-3, declarer lost two clubs for a one-trick set.

"Had you not drawn the trumps, you could have ruffed a club," alleged North. "That would have countered West's smart duck in diamonds."

"That wouldn't have worked either," said East. "If he does that, West wins the second diamond and leads a third for me to ruff. South then gets only one discard, and he's done one anyway."

What's the winning line? South should lead a low diamond after ruffing the third heart. If West takes the King, there is no ruff by East. And if he ducks, dummy wins and South can play three rounds of clubs, ensuring a ruff in dummy.

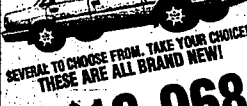

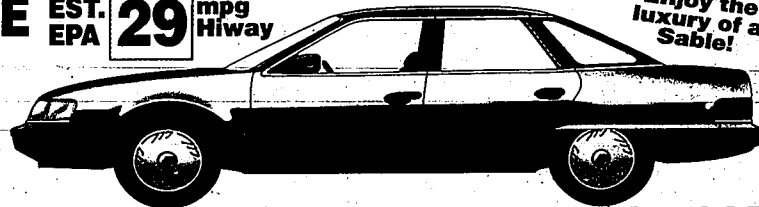

# Super-doctor checks America's health and availability of quality health care

C. Everett Koop, surgeon. C. Everett Koop, government official. C. Everett Koop, television star?

That may seem like an improbable progression, but those are just a few of the titles that can be correctly applied to C. Everett Koop, who served as Surgeon General of the United States during the Reagan administration.

On Sunday, June 16, NBC airs "Listening to Teenagers," the third installment of the five-part health-care series, "C. Everett Koop, M.D." (Episodes four and five air June 23 and 30.) And although there is nothing in the title, except perhaps fame recognition, to distinguish this program from any number of previous medical dramas — "Marcus Welby, M.D.," "Trapper John, M.D.," "Doogie Howser, M.D.," "Julie Farr, M.D." — Koop's efforts on this series go well beyond the purely dramatic.

The original idea for the programs came from NBC's former entertainment president, Brandon Tartikoff, who envisioned a five-part series that would examine state-of-the-art medicine in the United States. When the idea was brought to him, Koop immediately became involved, but when he began to do the research, he discovered that a change of focus would make the series much more timely and relevant.

"I was making preparations for the treatments of the five shows," Koop recalls, "when I realized that there were 30 million Americans who never see state-of-the-art

medicine, because they don't have access to health care. So, with NBC's permission, I shifted the focus to health care, because that is a much bigger problem than anything else I would encounter. And I'm pleased that we went the way we did, because nobody else has done this in quite this way."

One might take issue with whether the actual number of Americans without access to adequate health care is indeed 30 million — some think the number is much larger than that — but the seriousness of the situation is clear. Koop's travels in making the series brought him into contact with a variety of serious needs and a number of ways in which people are attempting to meet those needs, some of which have proven to be much more successful than others. Although potential solutions are an integral part of the spe-

cial, Koop insists that his intention is not to try to identify a single "right way," but rather to offer viable options.

"I'm not offering suggestions in the sense that I'm giving you a cookbook that tells you what to do," Koop says.

The series shows you what reality is bad about the way that we deal with our children, our adolescents and our elderly. The first episode dealt with the difficult choices we have to make about rationing care, malpractice insurance, insurance companies raising premiums in the middle of an illness and that sort of thing.

Proof is that each actor receives billing in the list of professional stuntmen, as does Scott Glenn (who appears in a smaller, but key role) in the movie. A stuntman screen credit is very rarely given to star types.

**Q:** What's the dark secret about his parents that Jack Nicholson has tried to keep hidden? — G.M.

**A:** Nicholson did not try to keep the facts hidden: The truth is he only found out a few years ago that his sister was actually his mother.

**Q:** Do you have any inkling of what Sting's real name is? It never seems to be mentioned in all of the stories about him. — F.M.

**A:** Sting, who became famous when he masterminded the rock group The Police, was born Gordon Sumner — a nice quiet English name that obviously didn't radiate the pizzazz of his unique, adopted show business name.

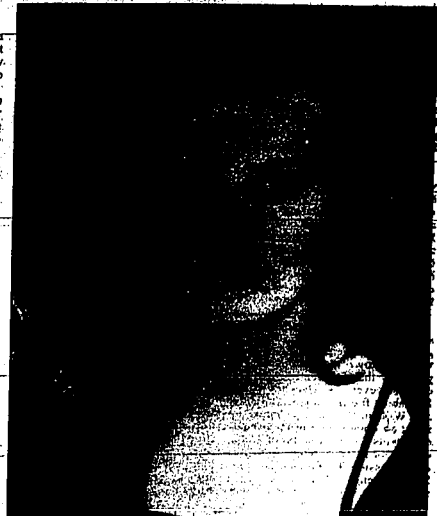

chances. With new producer Paul Rauch, boss of "One Life to Live" for seven years, replacing John Gouby, summer-time can be a chance to structure new plots.

Wagner was not enthusiastic over the return of Gloria Monty, and "SB" beckoned with promises of a high flying character.

So "Santa Barbara" loses Marcy. Walker and gains a Jack Wagner. Will A Martinez leave next?

Don't expect that move, Martinez knows the score. Hollywood doesn't think Latin — and it's our loss. That's why "Santa Barbara"

deserves a cheer for pairing Marcy and A in the first place.

# Basketball bounces NBC to top rims of this week's Nielsen ratings contest

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Basketball shot NBC over the top, giving the network a first place finish in the latest ratings battle.

Games two, three and four of the National Basketball Association draft between the Los Angeles Lakers and the Chicago Bulls finished first, second and fourth respectively, in weekly rankings released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

NBC far outdistanced the competition with an overall average rating of 11.5, a figure that represents a lead of 2.1 million viewers over ABC, which scored a 9.3 average this time. CBS' average for the week was 8.6.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

A repeat of ABC's "Roseanne" was the No. 3 show. In fifth place was a rerun of NBC's "Cheers."

Repeats of CBS' comedy hits "Designing Women" and "Murphy Brown" finished sixth and seventh. ABC's "Coach" was No. 8.

In a two-way tie for ninth place were NBC's drama series "In the Heat of the Night" and the CBS newsmagazine "60 Minutes."

## Letterman salary too stiff for ABC

NEW YORK — David Letterman's agents approached ABC-TV two months ago about the talk-show host jumping from rival NBC but was rebuffed because his salary demand of \$6 million a year was too high, a person familiar with the discussions said Friday.

The talent company that represents Letterman, Rollins & Joffe, told ABC that when Letterman's contract expires next April, he might be available for \$6 million per year, which is believed to be the same salary he is earning as host of "Late Night With David Letterman," the source said.

However, ABC immediately

rejected the salary requirements as unreasonably high.

Both Letterman and his agent, Jack Rollins, who is also the executive producer of "Late Night," declined to comment. "He (Rollins) doesn't want to make any statement or talk about it," his assistant said.

According to industry speculation, the talk-show host was angered by NBC's announcement last week that comedian Jay Leno would be installed as permanent host of the "Tonight" show next May, although the selection was not unexpected.

It was unclear, however, whether Rollins and Letterman approached ABC in early spring because they

believed even then that the Leno appointment was a foregone conclusion and wanted to explore other opportunities. It also is not unusual for agents to put out feelers to see what the market will bear.

ABC has long wanted to establish a successful show to follow "Nightline" at midnight, but the network hasn't been willing to pour huge amounts of money into it.

Popular Los Angeles radio disc jockey Rick Dees reportedly earns \$1 million a year as host of "Into the Night with Rick Dees" on ABC. The network is unhappy with the ratings performance of the show and a change is expected.

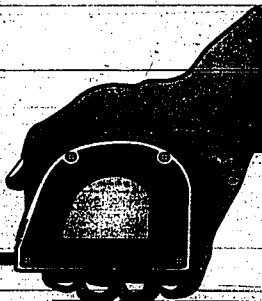
