Diplomatic acrobat Bush hails Yeltsin

WASHINGTON — President Bush hailed Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin on Thursday as a historic symbol of reform but vowed to maintain "the closest possible" relationship with Yeltsin's onetime rival, Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.
In a delicate balancing act of diplomacy, Bush sought to establish new ties with the first popularly elected president in the Russian republic's history without appearing to undercut Gorbachev's central authority.
To accomplish that feat, Bush welcomed Yeltsin to the White House with warm praise for his commitment to democracy and free-market economics. He then applauded Gorbachev and stressed that he has no intention of driving a wedge between the leaders of the Soviet Union and its largest republic.
"I want to publicly congratulate President Yeltsin on a truly historic victory

in this election last week, which made him the first democratically elected leader in the long and rich 1,000-year history of Russia," Bush told reporters in the Rose Garden with Yeltsin at his side.
"We look forward to working with him," Bush added. "But at the same time — I want to be very clear about this — the United States will continue to maintain the closest possible official relationship with the Soviet government of President Gorbachev."
Bush, who later met privately with Yeltsin for about an hour, lauded Gorbachev's "courageous policies" that launched the Soviet Union on a path toward reforms that led to an end to the Cold War.
"Bush also downplayed the rivalry between Yeltsin and Gorbachev, saying Yeltsin had assured him in a brief chat when Yeltsin arrived at the White House that he and Gorbachev are "working cooperatively together" to bring democratic

and free-market reforms to the Soviet Union.
Nevertheless, the high-profile welcome Bush accorded Yeltsin made it clear that the U.S. government considers him a major political force — perhaps the future leader of the Soviet Union, although Yeltsin has repeatedly denied any interest in the job.
During his last visit to Washington in September 1989, when he had no high office and was Gorbachev's harshest critic on the left, Yeltsin received a lukewarm reception from the White House.
"Denied a formal meeting with Bush in the Oval Office, he had to settle for a meeting with national security adviser Brent Scowcroft, although Bush dropped in for a few minutes to chat.
But as president of the Soviet Union's biggest, richest and most populous republic, Yeltsin was granted meetings Thursday not only with Bush, but also with Vice President Dan Quayle, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and Commerce Secretary Robert Moshbacher.

Dispute flares among ISP troopers over radio 'dead zones' along I-84

TWIN FALLS — The question of radio communications to a remote south-central Idaho valley where an Idaho State Police patrolman was shot last Saturday has flared into a debate between some state troopers and their boss.
Warren Lundquist of the Service Employees Union Local 687, told the Associated Press the union plans to file a grievance with the state police to get them to improve radio communications

to and from the Juniper Valley astride the Utah-Idaho border.
"It's a hell of a problem," he said.
The union represents about 30 troopers out of a force of 189 people. Lundquist said, but ISP Superintendent Col. Ron Moore said the local did not represent the troopers and has no bargaining rights.
And Moore wasn't ready to concede Thursday that radio communications south of Sweetzer Summit on Interstate 84 are that poor.
"It's not a clear-cut issue that radio contact was a problem," he said.

ISP Cpl. Steve Hobbs of Declo was shot and wounded Saturday night while making a routine traffic stop on I-84 two miles north of the Utah border.
Because the Black Pine Mountains that surround the valley, on the north and west, sometimes block radio transmissions, Hobbs did not radio the ISP's Twin Falls regional dispatch center before he made the stop.
Shot four times, he climbed back into his cruiser and attempted to pursue his assailant before losing consciousness due

Hostages-arms deal possible

WASHINGTON — Former CIA Director William Casey may have been told by Iranian representatives in Madrid in the summer of 1980 that release of U.S. hostages would be delayed until Ronald Reagan took office if Casey helped them get arms, ABC News said Thursday night.
ABC's "Nightline" program interviewed Iranian arms dealer Jamshid Hashemi, who supplied a detailed description of what he said were two sets of meetings in July and August in Madrid with then-Reagan campaign manager Casey and two other unidentified men.
Hashemi, who refused to go on camera, said Casey asked whether Iran was ready to deal with the Republicans and hand over the hostages, according to ABC, whose investigation is being made in cooperation with the Financial Times of London.

Insomniacs have plenty of company

NEW YORK — Feeling pooped? If it's from lack of sleep, you're in the same bed with more than one-third of U.S. adults.
A Gallup Poll released Thursday found one in three Americans can't sleep — and that affects concentration, memory, daily tasks and relationships.
The poll also found that few insomniacs seek professional help even though insomnia cripples their abilities, including conversation.
Sleeping disorders affect 36 percent of American adults, with 27 percent of them suffering occasional insomnia and 9 percent reporting chronic problems snoozing, according to the poll.
The insomniacs among 1,000 adults interviewed in the study during the second week of May most often complained that they woke up in the morning feeling drowsy or tired. A majority of them also said they awoke during the night and had difficulty falling asleep.
The study also found that insomniacs struggle to remember and that they have significantly more

Campers flee floodwaters in Glacier National Park area

Campers fled advancing floodwaters in Montana, tornadoes touched down in Texas, hail pelted southwestern Kansas and the Dakotas, and rain fell in the Southeast and Northwest on Thursday, the final day of spring.

Temperatures in California were unseasonably cool.

Up to 3 inches of rain in Montana caused creeks in Glacier National Park to swell, forcing the evacuation of campers. Rising water on the Two Medicine River threatened a bridge in the park.

Tornadoes touched down in Texas south of Tivoli and near Refugio. No injuries or major damage were reported from storms.

Hail one inch in diameter fell at Bismarck, N.D. and east of Johnson, Kan., while hail nearly as large fell near Sublette, Kan. Hail the size of golf balls fell east of Big Bow, Kan. and near Victor, S.D.

Cool temperatures spread across portions of the West Thursday morning.

A record low for the date was set in Redding, Calif., where a 53-degree reading was one degree lower than the old mark set in 1943.

The low temperature for the Lower 48 states Thursday morning was 53 degrees at South Lake Tahoe, Calif.

At 3 p.m. EDT, rain showers and thunderstorms ranged over Minnesota, the eastern Dakotas and most of the Southeast. Rain also fell in Montana, Idaho and the Pacific Northwest. Rain showers also were scattered over New Mexico.

Heavier rainfall during the 6 hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT included almost an inch at Watertown, S.D. and Mobile, Ala.

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Berlin chosen to become capital of unified Germany in close vote

BONN, Germany (AP)—Lawmakers voted Thursday to return Germany's seat of power to Berlin, its historic home.

That move would strip Bonn of the status of provisional capital it has held since the end of World War II.

The narrow vote, a finishing touch to last year's reunification of Germany, followed months of bitter debate. While many Germans promoted cosmopolitan Berlin as the natural capital in a prosperous united Europe, others feared the choice would threaten Bonn economically and evoke memories of Berlin as the former Nazi capital.

Berliners poured into the streets to celebrate with champagne and fireworks. Cars jammed the Kurfuerstendamm shopping boulevard, honking their horns. Some Germans rode on the hoods of cars, and others leaned out the windows to hoot and holler their happiness.

In Bonn, a crowd of 10,000 people jamming the tiny market square watched sadly as the vote was broadcast on a giant television screen.

Lawmakers in the Bundestag,



to 10 to 12 years.

Parliament's upper house, the Bundesrat, will remain in Bonn, as will thousands of ministry workers and other bureaucrats.

Lawmakers considered five proposals Thursday. One called for remaining in Bonn; others included splitting the seat of government between Bonn and Berlin. The four other proposals were either defeated or withdrawn.

Berlin was the seat of German power from 1871 until 1945. It is a teeming metropolis of 3.4 million people with some of the best music, drama and cuisine in all of Europe.

In contrast, Bonn is a sleepy city of about 300,000 with no major museums, a few good restaurants, no notable theaters, and a nightlife so dull many local residents drive to nearby Cologne for entertainment.

When West Germany was created in 1949, Bonn was named its provisional capital, mainly through the influence of the late Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, who is buried not far from the city.

Berlin Mayor Eberhard Diepgen said: "The vote was a very happy moment, and I felt like a heavy burden had fallen from me."

to loss of blood. His patrol car veered into the median and caught fire, but Hobbs was rescued by some passing motorists.

Hobbs remained in serious but stable condition Thursday at McKay-Dee Medical Center in Ogden, Utah.

ISP patrolman Robert Connor, a veteran of the Twin Falls district, told the AP Wednesday that stopping cars on I-84 near the Utah border is not worth the risk.

"I don't think I'll stop anybody anymore in those 'dead areas,'" he said. "In the past I didn't worry about it. That's changed."

Dead zones are areas where radio transmissions cannot be made or received.

A 21-year state police veteran, Connor said the shooting of Hobbs convinced him something needs to be done.

He added that having more officers nearby could be even more

helpful than improving radio transmission.

Moore said he doubts the radio transmission problem south of Sweetzer is that severe, adding that he traveled the stretch this week when Hobbs made the traffic stop and had "excellent" radio contact with police dispatchers.

The ISP will investigate whether that area has more dead zones than other parts of the state, he said.

"Certainly we'll look at that and look at the cost involved," he said.

In any radio communication system, dead spots are inevitable and they exist all over the state—including five miles outside of Boise and in some cities, Moore said.

"If officers are in a dead spot they should drive until they have radio contact before stopping motorists," he said.

Until radio contact is improved, Connor said he will be more careful about stopping people and only pull them over when he can call in on the radio.

Moore said there could have been several reasons that Hobbs didn't make contact before the stop: the person he stopped got out of his car, the radio was busy, stopping created a traffic hazard, or he was in a dead zone.

Connor said I-84 south of Sweetzer, cited as one of the "deadliest" in the nation by USA Today, has had accidents frequently. Police may have to drive past the scene of an wreck to call for help.

The problem could be taken care of by putting a radio signal repeater nearby to maintain radio signals, Connor said.

The state could put up several repeaters all over the state and not eliminate all the dead spots, Moore said.

Putting up more transmitters could help out, but at \$200,000 a shot, it is not a realistic approach, he said.

"The bottom line is as I perceive it is we have an adequate radio system," Moore said.

There have been reports for the past decade that the 1980 Reagan campaign made a deal with Iran's ruling cleric to delay until after the election the release of the 52 American hostages seized in the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran in 1979. Those reports were revived with the publication earlier this month of an article by Gary Sick, a member of the National Security Council staff in the Carter administration.

Sick said he found considerable circumstantial evidence that the Reagan campaign had brokered such a deal with Iran.

In the Madrid meetings, Iran was represented by Iranian cleric Mehdi Kharoubi and his brother, Hassan, while Hashemi said he and his brother, Cyrus, who has since died, acted as interpreters.

Casey also has died. He succumbed to a brain tumor in early 1987, at the height of the tumult over the Iran-Contra affair.

Hashemi's account went like this: In the first set of meetings, Casey asked would the hostages be released to President-elect Reagan, after the election?

The Iranian side replied that it would need time to get specific confirmation from the Ayatollah

Khomeini.

If a post-election hostage release occurred, Casey told them, the Republicans would be grateful and would arrange for the release of Iran's frozen assets and military equipment for Iran that had been held up.

ABC said it found hotel records that show the Hashemi brothers in Mexico in a late July as well as August 1980, in the hotels that Jamshid Hashemi said they were in, the Ritz and the Plaza.

A set of meetings in August, again with Casey, focused on the delivery of weapons to Iran from Israel and release of the hostages.

difficulty with minor irritations.

Other findings

- To try to get to sleep, 28 percent of insomniacs have used alcohol, 29 percent tried over-the-counter medication, 12 percent used both and 40 percent have taken neither.
- One in five have taken prescribed medications.
- Chronic insomniacs are 2½ times as likely as non-insomniacs to report vehicle accidents in which fatigue was a factor.
- One in 10 chronic insomniacs fall asleep while visiting friends.
- One in five percent of insomniacs have visited a health professional specifically for their sleep problem.
- Also, family and social relationships are harmed, tasks

become difficult to complete and physical health is worse than for those who can sleep well, the study noted.

The study noted that the results don't differ much by age, education, income and race.

Dr. Thomas Roth, president of the Los Angeles-based National Sleep Foundation, which commissioned the poll, said the results are common sense.

"If you don't sleep at night, that's going to have consequences the next day," he said.

Yet, many people refuse to attribute their problems during the day to lack of sleep.

"People don't realize that if you don't sleep adequately, you will

sleep during the day," he said.

The foundation recommends the following ways to sleep better:

- Avoid caffeine within six hours of bedtime. Avoid alcohol and smoking one to two hours before bedtime.
- Exercise regularly. Get vigorous exercise in the late afternoon. But strenuous exercise before sleep may actually impair sleep.
- Don't nap.
- Establish relaxing pre-sleep rituals, like a warm bath or a few minutes of reading.
- Do not use the bed as an office or a place to watch television.
- Get up about the same time every day, regardless of when you fall asleep.

Army special operations officers describe rescue missions in Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Army special operations officers described on Thursday during rescue missions inside Iraq under enemy fire during the Persian Gulf War.

"It was a harrowing experience," Army Chief Warrant Officer R.F. Balwanz said, recounting how he and seven men were trapped in a chest-deep canal near the Euphrates River in Iraq.

"We held off a company of Iraqi soldiers plus some armed Bedouins that joined in the fracas for approximately six hours until we could be rescued," he told a Senate Armed Services subcommittee.

The enemy numbered about 150, said

Balwanz, who headed a reconnaissance team. With soldiers in the trench, American F-16 planes flew overhead providing air support.

Eventually, the Americans were rescued by Black Hawk helicopters.

Balwanz was among a group of officers who testified publicly for the first time about the role special operations played in Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

A special operations command, an elite group comprised of Air Force, Navy and Army personnel, handled many of the riskiest, most secret jobs in the war: deception operations along the Kuwait coast; recon-

naissance missions inside Iraq and rescue operations.

They often used sophisticated equipment such as satellite radios that allow reconnaissance men to transmit up-to-date details back to headquarters, satellite equipment that reads land terrain and night-vision equipment.

Another Army chief warrant officer, Jim Crisafulli, told the senators how he flew Black Hawk helicopters 200 miles into Iraq to extract another special operations team under attack.

Because of the need to act quickly, the pilots moved across enemy territory in day-

light, a deviation from normal nighttime operations.

The pilots rescued their colleagues from a ditch just 35 feet from enemy positions, Crisafulli said.

Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, called the special operations men heroic.

Gen. Carl Stiner, head of the military's special operations command based at MacDill Air Force Base near Tampa, Fla., said equipment and operations worked excellently in the war.

But he said there was room for improvement.

The Navy is concerned about shallow

mines. "It's a real problem and poses significant risk and we don't have an adequate way to deal with it," he said.

Another shortcoming are the submarine boats that carry Navy SEALs to enemy territory. Because the men are exposed to the water, often for as many as eight hours, they arrive at shore often with their body temperature down.

As a result, they are not in top form, he said. The military has proposed building dry submersible boats in 1995, he said.

Soldiers must carry between 140 pounds and 150 pounds in their packs when they leave for missions of five days or so.

Biological immune system stunt raises hopes for diabetes cure

WASHINGTON (AP) — A biological trick that deceives the immune system may one day make it possible to cure diabetes with the transplantation of insulin-producing pig cells, a Harvard Medical School researcher says.

Dr. Denise Faustman reports in Friday's edition of the journal Science that she and her team have developed a way to transplant cells, and perhaps whole organs, from one species to another without having to use drugs to block rejection by the immune system of the recipient.

She proved the technique by successfully transplanting human insulin-making cells into laboratory mice.

"We did it without having to treat the mice with drugs to prevent rejection of the cells," said Faustman. "This has a major advantage over the current way of transplantation where the whole immune system has to be suppressed with drugs. We're treating the tissue, not the patient."

Faustman said the trick is in hiding the presence of foreign tissue from lymphocytes, which are the patrolling cells of the immune system.

The lymphocytes, the white cells in the blood, seek out antigens on the surface of foreign tissue. When the white cells find these antigens, they attack by coating the cells with antibodies and calling in other lymphocytes. This starts the rejection process.

"What we've done is make it so the lymphocytes can't recognize the antigens," said Faustman.

This is done by coating the foreign cells with a modified antibody before the cells are transplanted into the recipient.

In the mouse experiment, Faustman and her team got human pancreatic islets, cells that produce insulin, and immersed them in a solution of the modified antibodies. The antibodies blocked the foreign tissue antigens that normally would be spotted by the white blood cells.

The treated human cells were then inserted into the kidneys of 40 laboratory mice. A similar number of mice received untreated human pancreatic islets.

At 30 days and then again at 200 days, some of the mice were sacrificed and the kidneys with transplanted cells were examined.

In the mice that received the untreated transplants, the human cells had been destroyed by the mouse immune system.

In the mice with the treated transplants, however, the human cells were alive and secreting insulin.

Faustman said that, in effect, the coating of antibodies on the transplants had fooled the mouse immune system. The mouse lymphocytes did not recognize the human cells as being foreign.

The study, said the scientist, shows "it's quite feasible" that insulin-making cells from other animals, probably pigs, could be transplanted into diabetic patients to replace the failed human cells.

The pig cells then would produce insulin and correct the diabetes.

Faustman said it will take at least five more years of research, including experiments on larger animals, before the technique could be tested in human clinical trials.

The researcher said that the antigen that triggers rejection, known as HLA Class I, is common to heart, lung, kidney, liver and insulin-making cells.

As a result, said Faustman, the masking technique she used in the experiment might also eventually be feasible for use in all major organ transplants.

This could enable patients to receive new organs without having to take anti-rejection drugs for a lifetime, she said.

Faustman's co-author in the study was Chuck Coe, the chief lab technician at Harvard Medical School.

Science, which published the study, is the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

BLM joins Bristol-Myers Squibb in agreement on Pacific yew bark

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bureau of Land Management followed the Forest Service's lead Thursday in granting Bristol-Myers Squibb Co. the right to the bark of Pacific yew trees that may be effective in treating cancer.

The pharmaceutical company will pay BLM an estimated \$2 million to \$10 million over five years to count, conserve, research and collect the bark containing the anti-cancer drug taxol, BLM officials said.

"This agreement presents a unique opportunity to use our public resources to benefit cancer research and to save lives," BLM Director Cy Jamison said.

Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan signed a similar agreement with Bristol-Myers Squibb on Wednesday for exclusive rights to the bark of an estimated 23 million yew trees on about 8 million acres of national forests in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Montana and Alaska.

About 6.5 million yews, which until recently were discarded as waste in the process of logging more valuable trees, are scattered across about 3 million of the 50 million acres the BLM manages in the West, BLM spokeswoman Suzanne Stevenson said.

The government's arrangement with Bristol-Myers Squibb will be the target of a congressional hearing on July 29.

Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., chairman of the House Small Business subcommittee on regulation and business opportunities, said Wednesday he fears the deal hands the giant drug company "almost a competition-killing advantage."

"I want to know whether this particular agreement has eliminated any kind of competitive pricing for taxol-derived drugs," Wyden said in an interview. "Virtually any other drug company is economically precluded

now." Wyden said there are also environmental concerns about the Pacific yew.

"We want to know whether the company's huge need for taxol is going to devastate the species. I don't know of any other precedent where the federal government has given anyone virtual control over any species. This is an extraordinary advantage," he said.

The Environmental Defense Fund, the Center for Marine Conservation and others petitioned the Fish and Wildlife Service to declare the yew a threatened plant species, but the request was denied in January.

"Based on the relative abundance of the Pacific yew and the conflicting and not-experimental nature of the data on the species, no substantial data exist to show that any historical reduction in yew abundance has seriously depleted the species," the service concluded.

Equatorial Pacific water temperatures warming

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Sea-surface temperatures in the equatorial Pacific Ocean continued a general warming trend through May, according to the May Climate Diagnostics Bulletin.

The Climate Analysis Center division of the National Oceanic and At-

mospheric Administration and the National Weather Service issued the bulletin.

It said two predictive models used by CAC indicated a continued rise in ocean temperatures the next two to three seasons. This rise will lead to what the center describes as a warm episode, popularly known as El Niño.

Charts from the publication show a gradual rise in equatorial Pacific Ocean temperatures has been under way since mid-1988.

The fall in temperatures from a peak in late 1987 was believed by some to have caused the U.S. drought in the spring and summer of 1988.

House could nix abortion rule

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Appropriations Committee on Thursday approved an amendment that would effectively overturn the Bush administration's rule barring abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics.

The measure, offered by Rep. John Porter, R-Ill., was passed on a 35-20 vote after much parliamentary maneuvering, including an unsuccessful attempt to kill it by attaching a parental notification requirement.

The Supreme Court ruled last month upheld the ban on abortion counseling, referred to by critics as

the "gag rule."

President Bush has promised to veto any bill that weakens current restrictions on abortion, and the Office of Management and Budget rejected that warning in a letter to the committee before its vote.

However, Porter said the committee vote shows there is strong, bipartisan support for the bill and he hoped Congress would be able to muster enough support to override a veto. "This is an issue that concerns the relationship of the government to its citizens," Porter said. "Can the government withhold information in


regard to a constitutional right? Can the government withhold that information and lie to that woman about her constitutional rights? My answer is no."

"People have to be told the truth — not part of it, all of it," Porter said. "They should be provided all the information they need."

Porter's amendment was added to a bill that would appropriate money for the Department of Health and Human Services. It would prohibit the administration from spending any money to implement the gag rule.

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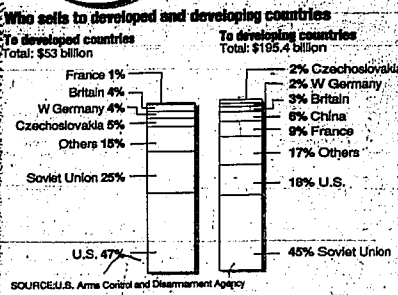
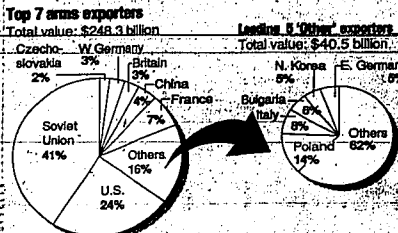

Researchers: Sales weakening controls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Major arms-exporting countries are losing control over who gets their weapons technologies and how they're used, congressional researchers said Thursday.

The loss of control has come gradually as developing nations such as South Korea and Brazil bought old and new weapons technology from the United States, Europe or the Soviet Union to create their own defense industries, the study said.

Those countries, in turn, have become arms exporters, the Office of Technology Assessment said in the growing number of arms producers made it harder to limit the spread of modern weapons, including tanks and ballistic missiles, to unstable regions.

"The proliferation of the ability to produce modern arms — emanating principally from the United States and Europe — has led directly and indirectly to the arming of our adversaries as well as our friends," the study said.

It said Iraq's invasion of Kuwait was an example.

"If advanced weaponry continues to proliferate at present rates, it is likely to be the last," the report said.

President Bush last month called in the major arms exporters to exert "collective self-restraint" in sales of conventional weapons to the Middle East. At Bush's request, the five biggest exporters — the United States, the Soviet Union, China, France and Britain — will meet next month in Paris to discuss the matter.

Joseph Hoar may succeed Schwarzkopf

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will nominate Marine Corps Lt. Gen. Joseph P. Hoar to succeed Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf as commander-in-chief for the Central Command, the Pentagon said Wednesday.

Schwarzkopf, the commander of allied military forces in Operation Desert Storm, is scheduled to retire this summer.

The nomination puts Hoar, the deputy chief of staff for plans, policies and operations for the Marine Corps, in line for appointment to four-star rank. The nomination must be approved by the Senate.

The Central Command is based at MacDill Air Force Base in Florida. A native of Boston, Mass., the 57-year-old Hoar is a Vietnam veteran who served as a battalion and company adviser to the Vietnamese marines. He commanded the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit, which participated in three Indian Ocean deployments and nine amphibious exercises.

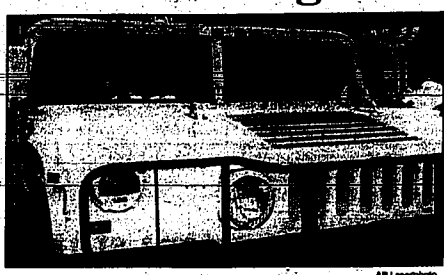
Anyone can now own a genuine humvee

MISHAWAKA, Ind. (AP) — In the market for a rugged car that can climb hills and conquer sand dunes? How about a humvee — the military four-wheel-drive vehicle that won raves in the Persian Gulf War.

As of Wednesday, the humvee, or hummer as it is affectionately known, is available to the public.

"We believe there is a strong market for the hummer for both business and pleasure," said James A. Armour, president of AM General Corp., a division of LTV Corp.

One humvee already has been sold to actor Arnold Schwarzenegger, who signed a lease agreement for a customized model before it was available to the public, Armour said.

The company plans to offer three models of the High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle priced between \$40,500 and \$44,000. The government pays \$26,000 for the basic vehicle.

The commercial version will substitute standard headlights for blackout lights, add interior safety padding and stronger steel doors, include doorlocks, and replace the bullet-resistant roof with a conventional hardtop.

The changes won't affect the humvee's homely appearance, or its performance, Armour said.

"We won't try to beautify the hummer with styling changes at the risk of sacrificing superior off-road performance," he said.

The vehicle's four-wheel drive and eight-cylinder diesel engine enable it to climb a 60-degree grade and maneuver under extremely difficult conditions. It has a top speed of 65 mph.

American car buyers switched loyalty to import models, says economic study

WASHINGTON (AP) — During the 1980s, American consumers developed a new loyalty to cars made by Nissan, Toyota and Honda and weaker attachment to Detroit's products, an economic study said Thursday.

In a report on brand loyalty, transportation engineer Ered Manning of the University of Washington and economist Clifford Winston of the Brookings Institution, a think tank, said American automakers will have trouble regaining old customers.

Even if American cars now are just as good as their foreign competitors, people are likely to perceive them as inferior and continue to prefer Japanese cars, Manning and Winston said.

Chrysler's cars are every bit as good as the Japanese, but nobody knows it," complains Chrysler's Lee Iacocca in one of his company's commercials.

The major source of the U.S. makers' problems is attributable to vehicles that were of worse value and quality than the Japanese.

Winston said in an interview. "That's something they can make progress on, but loyalty is something that is, to some extent, out of their control."

The researchers drew their conclusions from the "vehicle ownership histories" of 488 households over the last several decades.

They define brand loyalty as more than just buying the same

maker's car each time. Instead, they said it reflects such factors as vehicle ownership experience, word from friends, news and advertising which together cause a customer to think of his brand as the standard against which to judge competitors' cars.

The study said that if old customers had remained loyal during the 1980s, General Motors would have sold 4.3 million more cars, Chrysler would have sold 2.8 million more and Ford would have sold 107,000 more.

Without any change in today's loyalty patterns, the authors predicted that GM's market share will fall during the 1990s to below 31 percent, a decline of more than four percentage points.

Jury convicts 2 executives in data case

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — A federal court jury has convicted two former executives of Litton Data Systems of illegally obtaining confidential Pentagon procurement data to help their company get three Navy contracts.

Thomas D. McAusland, Litton's former vice president for business development, and Christopher Palfors, former director of business development, were found guilty Wednesday of conspiracy, illegally converting government property and wire fraud.

The two were charged with obtaining sensitive procurement information from Navy officials, who passed it to defense consultants they had hired to help Litton Data Systems get the Navy contracts.

The jury verdicts by a federal court jury that deliberated eight hours are the latest in the four-year-old investigation of military procurement: fraud — nicknamed "Operation Ill Wind."

The company will begin taking orders immediately and plans to begin deliveries next June, Armour said. Projections call for selling 1,000 humvees on the commercial market — the first year, with sales estimates ranging from 3,000 to 5,000 vehicles after that.

About 80,000 humvees have been built for the Army since 1984. Approximately 20,000 were sent to the Persian Gulf where they won high praise during the war.

LTV Corp. has been in financial trouble for years.

Last month, David Hoag, LTV's president and chief executive officer, said selling its aerospace and defense division would help the company.

Armour said taking the humvee commercial wasn't intended to improve the prospects for selling the division, but conceded it might be more attractive if a prospective buyer believes in the commercial market, as we do," he said.

LTV entered Chapter 11 in 1986, facing a \$3 billion liability to justify underfunded pensions plans of its steel subsidiary.

Snowmobile needs snow

OIL CITY, Pa. (AP) — Weather may have been a factor in a teen-ager's snowmobile accident — namely the temperature being 68 degrees.

Joseph Schall, 14, lost control of his snowmobile Wednesday while making a left turn and struck a parked car, state police said.

Schall and some friends had been working on the snowmobile in a garage and wanted to haul it to another garage, Trooper Bernie Loll said. Instead, Schall decided to drive the snowmobile. The trooper said it was not known why Schall lost control, but said conditions were less than ideal for a snowmobile ride.

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Girl sues to become Cub Scout

MIAMI (AP) — Eight-year-old Margo Manke didn't find the Girl Scouts challenging.

So she's challenging the Cub Scouts for entry into the all-male organization.

"Girls were art and crafts and sometimes we had to make little puppets," the third-grader said of her experience with the Girl Scouts. "I was kind of bored."

The girl's attorney, Mark Rubin, sued the organization in federal court Tuesday, charging sexual discrimination. Rubin argues that the Boy Scouts is not a private organization because it was given federal recognition by the U.S. Congress in 1916.

A hearing will be held Friday to determine whether Margo can attend summer Cub Scouts camp, which begins Monday.

"Keeping girls out of the Boy Scouts deprives them of the opportunity to get the companionship and the competition that they need in order to be able to prepare themselves for the future," Rubin said.

Margo is believed to be the first girl to challenge the Cub Scouts in court for the right to join, said Blake Lewis, spokesman for the Dallas-based Boy Scouts of America.

Girls have never been allowed in the 81-year-old Boy Scouts or the Cub Scouts, a group for younger boys that is more than 60 years old.

"Our feeling is that the Cub Scouts and the Boy Scouts were specifically designed to meet the needs for young boys. And the needs for young boys are very different from young girls," Lewis said.

Being recognized by Congress doesn't make the Boy Scouts a public organization, he said.

Local Cub Scout Pack 350 let Margo join in January and she purchased her uniform, cap and yellow kerchief. But Boy Scouts of America sent her a letter the following month, saying no girls were allowed.

Margo's family said the child didn't really mind until she was told she couldn't attend summer camp, along with her two brothers, both Scouts, and her mother, Cecile, an assistant Scout leader. Her father, Barry, is a Scout leader.

Rewards cite foes of Klan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two people who have opposed the Ku Klux Klan are splitting a \$10,000 prize awarded in recognition of their courage, a private foundation said Thursday.

Elizabeth Riskey, a member of the Louisiana Republican State Central Committee, is sharing a Cavallo Prize with Stetson Kennedy of Jacksonville, Fla., who infiltrated the Klan in the 1940s.

Ms. Riskey called on her party to censure David Duke, a former Klan leader, who holds a seat in the state legislature as a Republican.

The foundation also gave prizes to people who objected to unsafe or improper conditions where they worked.

Jim and Ritki Pomerencek of Yakima, Wash., were honored for their role in developing a federal law regulating the safe transportation of food.

Reasoner still on 'critical' list

NEW YORK (AP) — Veteran CBS newsman Harry Reasoner remained hospitalized in critical condition Thursday following surgery last week to remove a blood clot from his brain.

The 68-year-old Reasoner, who retired from "60 Minutes" in May, entered Norwalk Hospital in Connecticut on June 11, reportedly after falling down the stairs at his home in his Westport, Conn.

Several newspapers quoted anonymous sources about the fall but did not make it clear if it caused the clot. CBS spokesman Roy Brunett refused to comment on the reports. He said only that Reasoner was operated on June 12 and was recovering from the surgery and subsequent pneumonia he developed.

He remains in intensive care and his condition has not changed, Brunett said.

Phone pitchmen making unauthorized checking withdrawals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some boiler-room firms hawk credit cards and dream vacations over the telephone and withdraw money from their would-be customers' checking accounts without written authorization, investigators say.

Consumers make the withdrawals possible sometimes even without oral consent by disclosing their account numbers during the course of such calls, according to congressional, banking industry, and law-enforcement authorities.

Investigators said the unethical operators

are encoding customers' checking account numbers on demand drafts — forms that can be used to withdraw funds quickly — and often don't deliver the promised product.

Such drafts are used routinely by legitimate insurance companies, mutual funds and other businesses that have a customer's signed authorization on file, enabling oral transactions and expedited payments where speed is important.

Meanwhile, victims of unscrupulous firms often don't learn of such a withdrawal until they spot it on a monthly bank statement or

if in fact they have orally agreed to a charge they fail to receive the promised product.

Typical pitches involve a low-fee, low-interest credit card, a dream vacation, a fur coat or even help in selling a used car, investigators have found.

"Direct debiting is the cutting edge of telemarketing fraud," Diana Maure, a Colorado assistant attorney general, said in an interview.

Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., chairman of the House Small Business subcommittee on regulation, said the newly discovered and appar-

ently wide-ranging fraud technique shows the growing sophistication... of boiler-room con artists to the new, electronic technologies which form the nervous systems of modern financial institutions.

A recent FBI letter warned banks of losses that could easily cost financial institutions and consumers millions of dollars in a very short period of time.

Banking officials said that in some cases financial institutions have absorbed the losses, but other times consumers never got their money back.

Drug testing is a legitimate weapon in today's society

Guess what's the real growth industry of the '90s in the Magic Valley? Agriculture? Aquaculture? Light manufacturing? Retailing? All are expanding rapidly, but none can match the pace of drug testing.

Magic Valley Regional Medical Center now administers drug tests for about 150 employers in the Twin Falls area — and that's just one hospital.

Hundreds of employers in the Magic Valley, thousands statewide, hundreds of thousands nationally now test for drugs as part of routine pre-employment screens or random on-the-job checks.

It's becoming a sad necessity of everyday life, but a necessity nonetheless.

As drug use has spread throughout American society, it has invaded the workplace with vengeance. Some studies show that one worker in seven nationwide comes to work under the influence of drugs and alcohol.

While the crisis isn't of that magnitude in southern Idaho, it's a significant problem nonetheless.

On-the-job safety suffers, productivity suffers, quality of work suffers. Companies whose workers are stoned, drunk, strung-out or hung-over are less competitive.

The upset is that our standard of living suffers, and we all suffer as a result.

More and more employers are recognizing that, and adopting a tougher stance on drug use. We support the

trend toward zero-tolerance-of-drugs in the workplace.

Its guiding philosophy is that an employer will do everything he can to help an employee get treatment to overcome a drug or alcohol problem, but that the employer will not accept any use of drugs or alcohol whatsoever in the workplace.

Drug testing is part of that. Although relatively few employers now demand drug testing of employees once they are on the payroll, that's surely the wave of the future.

Workers who are drug-free have the right to expect that their health, well-being and livelihoods won't be jeopardized by co-workers who aren't. Consumers have a right to similar guarantees.

Drug testing, to be sure, is a two-edged sword. Although the state of the art is improving, there still must be safeguards for accuracy and confidentiality.

Any employer who requires drug tests assumes responsibility for their results, and understands that if they are wrong he is liable for damages under federal law.

The American Civil Liberties Union and much of organized labor oppose job and drug testing because they believe it is unreliable at best and contrary to privacy rights at worst. We disagree.

What's really at risk here is society, and the right of its members-to-live, work and be productive in a drug-free environment.



Abortion pill: Politics and science collide

The term "orphan drug" usually denotes a drug found to be effective against a rare disease. Since the potential market, and profit, are so small, the manufacturer elects not to distribute the drug.

The new French drug RU-486 is also an "orphan drug," although it is effective in treating a very common condition: pregnancy. But it has been orphaned by politics, not unprofitability.

The most frequent means of elective abortion in the United States is suction curettage. In this simple procedure, the cervix — the entrance into the uterus — is stretched open to a small diameter, and the contents of the uterus are removed by suction through a small plastic tube.

This procedure has been found to be extremely safe and effective, but no substantial improvement in the technology of early abortion has been made in more than 20 years. Hence, RU-486, or mifepristone, is a development of great importance.

RU-486 is the first of a new class of compounds, the anti-progestins. It is a steroid that blocks the action of the naturally occurring hormone progesterone on the internal lining of the uterus. Since progesterone is required to sustain an early pregnancy, if this support is blocked, the products of conception separate from the uterus and are expelled.

Developed in France, the drug has been used with great success by tens of thousands of French women. Several hundred women in Los Angeles have also taken part in early trials. From 1984 to 1990, volunteers received RU-486 for abortion at Women's Hospital under research protocols. Our experience with the drug corroborates that of other scientists around the world: RU-486 is safe, effective and popular.

Marketing of RU-486 is anticipated soon in the United Kingdom, and its use in other European nations is expected to follow. The California Medical Association and many other medical organizations support the drug. Why, then, is RU-486 not on the horizon for American women?

A small but vocal minority opposed to abortion is keeping the drug at bay. Rousell

soften and open the cervix, which may induce labor for childbirth or facilitate surgery inside the uterus. When given in larger doses, RU-486 blocks the action of a hormone made by the adrenal glands. Studies at the National Institutes of Health have shown RU-486 to be effective medical treatment for a serious disease caused by excessive secretion of this hormone. Some breast cancers may also be treatable with RU-486.

For several decades, scientists have known that methotrexate, a highly effective drug used in chemotherapy for certain cancers, could also be used to induce abortion. What would have happened had anti-abortion activists persuaded its manufacturer not to market that drug merely because they disagreed with one potential use?

To the extent that politics muddles with medical science, all Americans suffer. Induced abortion is one of the most common operations performed in the United States. Each year, 2 percent to 3 percent of all women of reproductive age undergo elective abortions — about 1.6 million per year.

Those of us in women's health are working hard to reduce the number of abortions required. However, because of dwindling contraceptive research and development, misconceptions about the safety and efficacy of current contraceptives, and human fallibility, the need for abortion will not disappear. Moreover, abortion will remain essential for women whose fetuses have severe genetic or metabolic defects, and for women whose lives would be threatened by continuation of pregnancy.

Abortion has always been with us, and it always will be. Since abortion is a fundamental part of women's health care, our societal responsibility is to make it as safe, inexpensive and compassionate as possible. RU-486, currently denied women in this country, promises to be an important step in that direction.

RU-486, which induces a miscarriage, is apparently not sufficiently noxious. In our trials with RU-486 in Los Angeles, most volunteers had had a prior suction-curettage abortion. These women reported that abortion with RU-486 was "2,000 times better" and "far less violent" than the surgical alternative.

RU-486 has a number of potentially important medical uses aside from abortion. By blocking the action of progesterone, it helps to

Math teachers work hard but need public's support

Your editorial of June 10 concerning the recent NAEP test administered nationwide in which Idaho mathematics students ranked eighth had many valid points.

Certainly, we as mathematics teachers agree that attitudes and practices must change so that more students learn more mathematics and are able to use this knowledge more effectively. We must teach to the intellect rather than teach computational skills needed by a shopkeeper in a pre-computer age.

To quote a recent article in the Idaho Council of Teachers of Mathematics newsletter by Tom Farley, State Department of Education math coordinator, "In its most simplified form, the reform movement boils down to a clarion call sounded by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics: 'Shift the emphasis from a curriculum dominated by an emphasis on memorization of isolated facts and procedures and proficiency with paper-and-pencil skills to one which emphasizes conceptual understandings, multiple representations and connections in math begins and ends with the number of time-outs left in a quarter.'" This is an unfair-blame judgement which I've read in your editorial columns more than once.

I question if the editors are aware of the 3-year-old grass roots movement known as Math Net, the Twin Falls School District Mathematics Network, which has been nominated for a national award for its accomplish-

This teacher-driven network, which has been responsible for the acquisition and purchase of over \$60,000 worth of supplies and inservices to our teachers, is led by 30 unpaid volunteers, several of whom are coaches.

As a leader of Math Net, I have not seen that these coaches are any less dedicated than the other Math Netters.

The nation is at risk mathematically. I challenge the editors and readers of The Times-News to become part of the solution by supporting good teachers like my fellow Math Net leader, LaRon Smith who is not a coach, and the other good teachers who are coaches.

As has been suggested by previous writers to the newspaper in response to such accusations, I urge the editors to single out and approach teachers whose intentions toward mathematics are in question and encourage them to become part of the mathematics reform movement.

Soweto is not a slum ghetto

Your article on South Africa (June 18) interested me, and I wish to give you another side of the South African picture — one never seen or heard of in the U.S. media, nor in the histories of the African National Congress, yet fully verifiable.

The media here depict Soweto as a huge slum ghetto with filth and shacks, but Soweto is actually a large, carefully planned and fully serviced township adjacent to Johannesburg. There are thousands of houses and large residential districts of lovely homes and small mansions. (Nelson Mandela's multi-level mansion is valued at \$280,000.) There are many, many affluent black people in Soweto, including millionaires.

There are more than 1,500 businesses in the commercial sector run by black businessmen. The BMW and General Motors franchises are owned by blacks and Shell Oil Co. operates

extensively through its dealers who all reside in Soweto.

Educational facilities have increased by 300 percent in the last 15 years.

Today, Soweto has 323 schools (many burned and vandalized by the ANC youth gangs), four technical colleges, 13 comprehensive schools with courses offered in electronics, motor mechanics, technical drawing, etc.

Medically apart from private practitioners and a private clinic, Soweto is served by Bargwanath Hospital and 20 fully comprehensive clinics throughout the township.

Medical care is free for those who cannot pay and minimal for others (a \$5 fee levied at first attendance pays for all treatments required). There are another eight first-class 1,000-bed hospitals for the black work force in and around Johannesburg. Recreation in Soweto is catered for with many parks, sports clubs, tennis clubs, athletic tracks, 13 full-

There have been wrong things done in the past which need to be put right, but the much maligned "white minority" has paid the lion's share of the tax burden without complaint so that a black population which has quadrupled in the last 40 years can be uplifted and enabled to enjoy such a high standard of living as they do.

any other component of the federal budget, including defense.

The numbers may be incomprehensible but the cost to the American people — and to state and local governments — is painfully clear. Take the interest on this year's \$318 billion deficit and just ask yourself: How many affordable homes could that money finance? How many children could it educate? How many polluted waterways could it clean up?

Financially, the states are barely keeping their heads above water. But instead of throwing us a lifeline, Uncle Sam has tossed us a bag of bricks. Federal revenues for major programs have dropped or stagnated in actual dollars, without even considering the effects of inflation.

Former President Reagan was a proponent of the trickle-down theory of economics. But all I have seen trickle down to the state and local levels are programs the federal government started and then dumped on the states without the financial resources to pay for them.

You don't need a Ph.D. in economics to know that massive federal borrowing drives up interest rates for businesses and governments alike.

Because most states can't operate with a budget deficit, some 30 states are cutting spending or raising taxes, or doing both, to balance their budgets.

Now, the federal government can — and must — do the same thing: by giving one individual a big enough sword to slay the dragon.

Unfortunately, the federal government has no high-level chief financial officer, no one with the authority to make fiscal decisions and make them stick. The federal buck doesn't stop anywhere anymore.

My counterparts across the United States are determined to solve this problem. As members of the National Association of State Auditors, Comptrollers and Treasurers, we know the need for a national chief financial officer for the United States of America. We need a powerful individual who can help establish sound financial practices and reliable financial data. The federal government

must start to follow the example that the states have set.

Will the next generation struggle under a mountain of debt created by the federal government's indecision, deception and cowardice? Or will we start to solve the problem, now?

One great precedent has already called for a simpler federal financial system, one that members of Congress and the citizens of this nation can both understand. Unfortunately, the call that President Thomas Jefferson issued in 1802 hasn't been heeded yet. How much longer can we afford to wait?

U.S. and Soviet Union remain divided over arms control treaty

BERLIN (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union failed Thursday to overcome the remaining hurdles to a landmark arms control treaty, clouding prospects for a summit in Geneva.

The summit between Presidents Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev.

But Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Alexander Bessmertnykh, emerging from nearly two hours of talks, gave differing assessments of the progress they made on the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty.

Baker said "three major issues" are holding up completion of the treaty, which would reduce by 30 percent the number of

missiles, bombers and submarines that can span the distance between the United States and the Soviet Union.

President Bush has made completion of the treaty, which has been under on-and-off negotiation for nine years, a condition for a summit with Gorbachev.

"We are right, where we were when we last met, with respect to a summit," said Baker, answering reporters' questions with

Bessmertnykh at his side in the garden of the U.S. ambassador's residence. The two foreign ministers, meeting at the end of a 35-nation Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe, last held talks on the treaty in Geneva on June 8.

Bessmertnykh, however, said he and Baker "made considerable progress" on the treaty. And he added, "I think we can close all the outstanding issues in the coming weeks."

The Soviet minister said he and Baker had discussed an agenda for a summit, once it's held, and some agreements that would be signed there.

The differing views appeared to reflect Gorbachev's strong desire for a summit to dramatize his need for Western aid, as well as Bush's reluctance to rush into one before the arms control agreement is nailed down.

Bush is suspicious of Soviet promises on arms control after being embarrassed before Senate conservatives when it appeared the Soviets were rolling back on parts of another treaty signed last November which will cut the number of troops, tanks and other non-nuclear weapons in Europe.

The problems over that treaty were recently resolved but Baker said Thursday they had sidetracked progress on the START

agreement.

He also sought to hold the Soviets to promises given by former Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze at a meeting with Baker last December, saying the outstanding issues could not be ignored because "they constitute part of a broader package" agreed to at the time.

Baker identified the three problems as having to do with what types of reconfigured missiles would be allowed under the treaty, how warheads removed from certain missiles would be counted, and how information would be shared from missile flight tests.

Question to ask in Colombia: What price for social peace?

MEDELLIN, Colombia — President Cesar Gaviria insists his government is still resolutely fighting drug trafficking, but there's no guarantee Pablo Escobar won't continue to run his violent cocaine trade from prison.

By surrendering to the same authorities he tried to intimidate and control for years, the world's No. 1 drug boss may have closed the most violent chapter of his criminal career.

Gaviria and the popularly elected government panel that banned extraditions provided the incentive.

Escobar gave himself up only after the government promised a reduced sentence and agreed to house him in a comfortable prison under security arrangements dictated by the Medellin cocaine cartel boss.

The surrender could be seen as a victory by Gaviria in his campaign to put traffickers behind bars by offering them reduced prison terms. But critics wonder whether Gaviria isn't paying too high a price for social peace.

"Too many people have been hurt. If Escobar tries to buy himself out of this, it just won't wash with us," said the wife of a man killed in a bombing blamed on the drug cartel. She asked to remain anonymous.

equal commitment. There must be an equal commitment from the producers and consuming nations," he said.

But he also insisted Colombia is still fighting the drug war. "We have not, nor will we, negotiate with criminals."

He said Escobar would receive no special treatment and pointed to his government's program to bolster the effectiveness of courts by giving anonymity to judges, who have in the past been subject to intimidation.

Gaviria also noted that the military has seized a record 48 tons of cocaine this year.

His strategy has resulted in the surrender of Colombia's top four drug traffickers — Escobar and the brothers Jorge Luis, Juan David and Fabio Ochoa. Its credibility will depend on the punishment those four receive. A court official consulted by the Associated Press said Escobar would probably spend no more than eight years in jail even if convicted of both drug-trafficking and murder charges.

And anti-drug official said cutting a deal with Escobar would only bring an illusory, temporary peace.

Speaking on condition of anonymity, like most of those in the security forces, the official said Gaviria should have pressed the "total war" waged against the Medellin gang by his predecessor, former president Virgilio Barco.

"It would have required a lot of sacrifice, but the traffickers would have been beaten once and for all," he said.

Allies consider Kurd protection as combat troops exit from Iraq

ZAKHO, Iraq (AP) — Allied combat troops are leaving northern Iraq, military sources said Wednesday, but the coalition partners have developed contingency plans in the event the Kurds need protection when the allies are gone.

The sources described two plans to create up a rapid reaction force that could defend the Kurds if they were attacked by Saddam Hussein's forces.

A U.S. plan, codenamed Operation Poised Hammer, would place the force in southeastern Turkey; the sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity. They said U.S. troops would join Western European forces at a location within minutes of northern Iraq.

Another European initiative would position French and British forces just inside Iraq, backed by American air support, according to British military sources.

Both plans envision an allied presence of about 3,000 men in the region until at least the autumn. Allied officers generally agreed that the bulk of their forces now in Iraq will be home at least by early August.

Nearly half the 21,700 coalition troops who were in northern Iraq and southern Turkey in mid-May are gone now, said Lt. Col. Bob Flocke, a U.S. Army spokesman. The number of troops in Iraq has fallen to 17,182 — 30 percent fewer than five days ago.

U.S. Army Lt. Gen. John Shalikashvili, commander of the relief operation for the Kurds, said he would "not be surprised" if allied governments were considering a contingency plan to protect them.

But allied officers stressed that there was considerable debate about the initiatives within military and diplomatic circles.

"A lot of options are being considered," said Flocke.

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American buys replica of ship

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — An unidentified American on Thursday bought an 18th-century-style square-rigger ship that was the centerpiece of the 1984 movie "The Bounty."

The three-masted vessel, built by filmmaker Dino De Laurentis for about \$4.5 million for the remake of "Mutiny on the Bounty," was sold at auction for \$610,000.

A syndicate had bought the 133-foot ship five years ago for \$1.5 million and used it for long trips and cruises off Sydney Harbor. Attorney Tony Latimer said The Bounty would leave Australia for the United States, where it would be used "for maritime purposes." Auctioneer John Letwich was shocked that no Australian buyer was prepared to bid more for the ship.

U.S. troops withdraw as Philippine eruptions continue

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — U.S. officials here said the U.S. Air Force decided Thursday to withdraw most of its troops from the Philippines because of damage to Clark Air Base caused by eruptions from Mount Pinatubo.

The decision cast further doubt on the future of American bases in the Philippines, and suggested that Clark was extensively damaged by the volcano and will be inoperable for months.

The 4,795-foot volcano spewed more ash over Clark, 10 miles to the east, during five explosions Thursday. The death toll from more than two weeks of eruptions rose to 268.

Also Thursday, officials announced that Manila's international and domestic airports would be closed between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Friday so workers could clear ash and debris.

Navy spokesman Lt. Cmdr. Kevin Mukri announced that 4,500 of the 7,000 Air Force personnel would be returned to the United States until repairs are completed at Clark.

About 1,500 airmen will remain at Clark to guard the facility and another 1,000 will stay at the Subic Bay naval facility, Mukri said.

In Washington, Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said he could not confirm the Air Force troop withdrawal. "The Pacific Command, nobody knows where that number came from," Williams said, adding that it "could be incorrect."

A U.S. Air Force spokesman in Washington, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said discussions are under way about possible withdrawals of many active duty military personnel, but that "no decisions have been made."

Nearly 15,000 American troops, dependents and civilian employees moved from Clark to Subic on June 10. But until Thursday, the evacuation of Americans from the Philippines affected primarily military de-

China floods kill 49 people, injure 175

BEIJING — Flooding caused by nearly two weeks of torrential rains has killed 49 people and injured 175 others in coastal China, the official Xinhua News Agency reported Thursday.

The latest deaths bring to more than 319 the number of people killed by violent rainstorms that have hit wide areas of China since mid-May.

Severe storms and flooding have hit Anhui province, on China's eastern coast, for the past 12 days, destroying 35,000 buildings and inundating 4 million acres of farmland, Xinhua reported. Rainfall has been the highest Anhui has seen in 70 years.

"A provincial agriculture official said the province, a leading grain and rapeseed producer, has lost 4.4 billion pounds of grain and 660 million pounds of rapeseed, equal to about 20 percent of last year's harvest."

Shootout in England broadcast on TV

BUSTFIELD, England — A former steelworker facing eviction from his home fatally shot a council official and wounded a reporter and policeman Thursday in a shootout that was broadcast on national television.

The footage, on the British Broadcasting Corp.'s One O'Clock News, showed Albert Dryden, 51, calmly leveling a pistol as council officials tried to persuade him to abandon his home so a bulldozer could move in.

The unemployed steelworker fired shots randomly into the crowd of 20 people. Harry Collinson, the Derwentdale district planning chief, staggered and fell to the ground dead.

In the aftermath, the BBC showed its reporter Tony Belmont, whose forearm was grazed by a bullet, and police officer Stephen Campbell, 22, who was shot in the back. Neither man's condition was serious, police said.

Wedding guests suffer food poisoning

NEW DELHI, India — Health officials ordered an investigation Thursday into the deaths from food poisoning of 24 guests of a wedding party. Another 1,500 were taken seriously ill.

A preliminary medical report said some of the food at the wedding feast had spoiled, said Lalit Kishore Chaturvedi, health minister of the state of Rajasthan.

Hundreds of people were suffering convulsions, diarrhea and dehydration. A team of doctors rushed to the village of Moroli-Gang near Bharatpur, where the wedding was held earlier this week. Press Trust of India reported. In India, country weddings are massive affairs, often attended by all the residents of several villages.

Strike results in news blackout in Italy

ROME — A three-day news blackout began Thursday as Italian journalists walked off their jobs after contract negotiations broke off.

It was the latest in a series of strikes called by the National Press Federation, the journalists' union, in support of demands for a new labor contract.

News agencies suspended their transmissions early Thursday and said they wouldn't resume service until Sunday morning. Newspapers will not appear Friday, Saturday and Sunday, while television and radio news will be limited to a bare minimum.

The union is seeking an average monthly increase of \$740 while the publishers are offering about a quarter of that. The average monthly salary is \$2,200, plus fringe benefits.

Archaeological dig sparks enthusiasm

TOKYO — Thousands of relics, some dating back 2,000 or more years, have been found at an archaeological dig on the outskirts of Pyongyang, North Korea's official media reported Thursday.

The Korean Central News Agency said ancient graves on the southern fringes of North Korea's capital city have yielded numerous bronze objects, including daggers and spearheads.

The report said some of the bronze objects had not rusted, although they had been buried for more than 2,000 years.

It said glass and gem beads, crystals and amber found in a wooden grave also believed to be about 2,000 years old were seen by archaeologists as an important find.

Debate surrounding Nazi remembrances

MOSCOW (AP) — A revisionist historian who says Soviet leaders made tragic and fatal mistakes during World War II is sparking debate at a time usually devoted to platitudes.

Instead of remembering Saturday's anniversary of the Nazi invasion with speeches about the heroism of those who suffered during the war, hard-liners are finding themselves in the unusual position of justifying the role of the military.

The battle is over the first of 10 volumes of a history of the war written under the guidance of retired Col. Gen. Dmitri Volkogonov, an authoritative military historian who had unprecedented access to Kremlin archives.

The editorial commission overseeing the work, headed by Defense Minister Dmitri Yazov, has rejected the first volume.

The evacuation announced by Mukri Thursday did not include Navy and Marine Corps personnel stationed at Subic Bay naval base, 25 miles southwest of the volcano.

But U.S. officials said damage to Subic was also extensive, and the presence of additional Air Force troops made it difficult for the Navy to organize an effective cleanup and perform its own mission of supporting the U.S. Pacific fleet.

At least 160 buildings at Subic were damaged by the eruptions, according to additional Air Force officials. Damage at Clark has not been totally assessed, but Air Force officials and journalists who visited the base Tuesday said it looked like a desert, with ash-

es at least six inches thick on the ground.

Air Force officials must decide whether it is cost-effective to repair Clark if the volcano remains active, as scientists predict, and if the Philippines refuses to allow American forces to stay after the lease on their bases expires Sept. 16.

Talks on an extension broke down in May over issues of compensation and over the duration of the agreement.

The president of the Philippines' Senate, Jovito Salonga, said an agreement had nearly been completed just before the volcano erupted, with the only outstanding issue being Philippine jurisdiction over American service members.

The eruption of Mount Pinatubo has also sabotaged plans to convert Clark into an international airport and commercial center if it was not returned by the U.S. military.

The volcano has had other adverse effects on U.S.-Philippine ties. In Olongapo, the home of the Subic Bay naval base, Mayor Richard Gordon has sharply criticized the installation commander, Rear Adm. Thomas Mercer, for allegedly refusing to allow Filipinos to pass through the garrison to escape the volcano last weekend.

Gordon accused Mercer of "calculated insensitivity," and refused to accept a shipment of supplies from Mercer for distribution to Olongapo residents.

Imperfect Symms says he'd win re-election

BOISE — "I've never claimed to anybody that I am perfect," Sen. Steve Symms said Thursday in his first interview with Idaho reporters since a *Times-News* profile of his ex-wife last week.

"No matter what people have been saying about me, I have never lost sight of my love for Idaho and my love for America," the Idaho Republican said in a telephone conference call with selected members of the Idaho media.

Symms was asked whether the interview with his ex-wife, Fran, hurt his chances of re-election to a third term in 1992. The two

stances of the breakup damaged Symms politically.

"I love my state and I love my country

and I am doing a good job as a senator," he said. "I don't have any comments to make about my personal life."

As he has in the past, Symms refused to say whether he will run for a third U.S. Senate term next year. He's expected to announce no later than Labor Day whether he will make the campaign or retire after 20 years in Congress.

"I am doing a better job than I ever have, and I feel good about it," he said.

Symms had reason to feel good. He was Republican floor manager for the 1991 highway bill, and capped days of negotiations and debate Wednesday night by helping win a 91-7 vote for the bill.

"I feel very good about the bill. It is very, very flexible so states for the most part can spend the money the way they think will best ease their traffic problems," he said.

He said it will be hard to get the transportation bill through the House intact, because that chamber is dominated by big-city Democrats.

The measure will provide \$123 billion in federal highway funding to the states over the next five years.

"The big push in the House will be for a bigger bill," Symms said. "I think the House may even try to add to the fuel tax to put another \$25 billion to \$30 billion out of the Senate bill to fund the National Highway System."

Minidoka Dam power plant replacement gets go-ahead with 'no significant impact' finding

RUPERT — The \$44 million power plant replacement project at Minidoka Dam has cleared its last major hurdle. Federal Bureau of Reclamation said in a report this week that the project will not significantly harm the environment of the Snake River.

The agency's Northwest regional director, John Keys, approved a "finding of no significant impact" Tuesday after reviewing an environmental assessment of the project.

The Minidoka Dam was built by the Bureau of Reclamation shortly after the turn of the century. It's part of the agency's 1.2 million-acre Minidoka Project in southeastern Idaho and western Wyoming.

The Minidoka power plant was the first federal hydroelectric project in the Pacific Northwest. It began generating electricity in 1909, and the power plant and dam were added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1974.

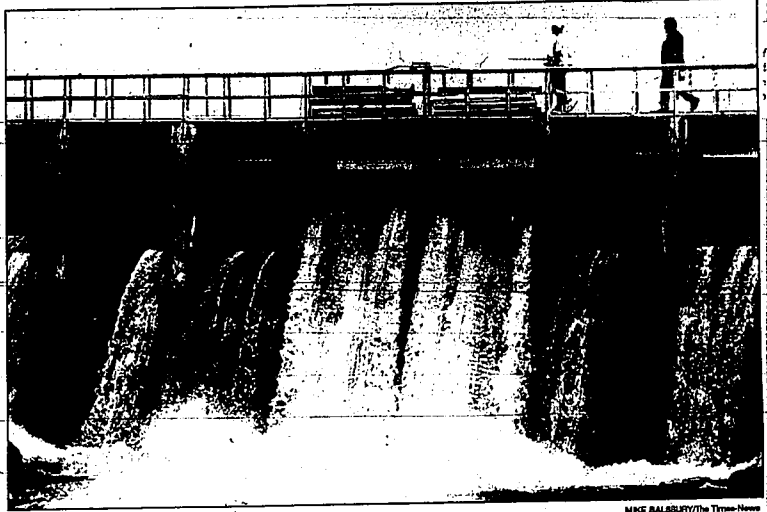
Bureau of Reclamation spokeswoman Deborah Schwarz said replacement of the generators is scheduled to begin in January 1993 and be complete in early 1996. Work on an assisted access bridge to the power plant will begin this fall.

The finding of no significant impact includes copies of letters from people, organizations and agencies received during mental assessment in April and May.

"We're just moving water from one place to another," said project superintendent John Dooley.

But the agency will have to replace wetlands below the Minidoka Dam that will be damaged by the project, as required by federal law.

The power plant replacement project

State honors Friends of Stricker Ranch volunteers

BOISE — The only Oregon Trail stagecoach stop between Fort Hall and Fort Boise almost disappeared six years ago, when a group of Twin Falls volunteers took action.

The Friends of Stricker Ranch restored and maintained the Rock Creek site south of Kimberly. And they received one of 51 Lake Pride in Idaho awards, presented by Gov. Cecil Andrus at the Idaho State Historical Museum in Boise.

The result of the Stricker effort?

"We have visitors at the ranch almost every day, and on weekends school groups come out," said John Meyers, board president of the Stricker volunteers, who number about 75. The work involved roof replacement, painting, garden and orchard restoration.

"This is an era of Idaho history we often forget," said

John Barnes, executive director of the Idaho Heritage Trust.

"In 1993 the 150th anniversary of the Oregon Trail will occur. There will be renewed interest and attention given to the trail. The Stricker Ranch is a national, not just a state treasure. People came through to reach the fertile valleys of Oregon. It was an oasis in the desert."

Award winners were selected by the trust, a non-profit corporation established by the Idaho Centennial Commission to support historical, environmental, recreational and scientific projects.

Other winners included:

• The Rotary Club of Twin Falls, for purchasing river-front property along the Snake River which will be developed into Centennial Waterfront Park. Donations raised \$110,000 through a community-wide campaign.

• Magic Valley Grotto, an affiliate cave group of the National Speleological Society, performed cave invento-

ries, made management recommendations, patrolled areas against vandalism, removed graffiti and trash, promoted cave ethics and developed a cave brochure stressing conservation. The group provided more than 2,500 hours of volunteer support to the Bureau of Land Management in helping preserve the more than 100 caves in the BLM's Shoshone District.

• Cassia County Water Ways, a coalition dedicated to developing the waterfront marina on the Snake River near the Burley Municipal Golf Course. Several communities, the county, state and various civic organizations have worked cooperatively on the project over a 10-year period.

• Stephen Langenstein, biologist, and Paula Perletti, volunteer coordinator, both with the Shoshone District of the BLM. Langenstein, a biologist with the BLM, has given dozens of presentations to elementary schools about wildlife and the environment. Perletti supervised a large group of volunteers with the Magic Valley Grotto, a model cooperative volunteer program.

Buhl School District requests mediator to help negotiations

BUHL — A federal mediator has been requested by the Buhl School District to assist with current teacher negotiations.

In a prepared statement, Ammand Eckert, chief negotiator for the school district, thanked the Buhl Education Association's negotiating team for its proposals and voiced regret that the School Board would not be able to comply.

Eckert said a balanced budget must be adopted by the board and that the district expects to have slightly less money to operate with for the 1991-92 school year than it had for 1990-91.

The School Board's final proposal offered teachers a 4 percent increase in benefits and wages. Eckert said a number of cuts were made in many other areas of the budget to cover this increase.

The Buhl School District's negotiating team is hopeful that bringing in a federal mediator will provide positive assistance in reaching a settlement, according to the statement.

In a telephone interview Thursday, Buhl

Education Association President Sue Melanson said she is "hopeful that through mediation the negotiations will proceed to a conclusion amicably."

Melanson said the teachers would have preferred to continue on with negotiations, especially in certain areas, before calling in a federal mediator.

For example, Melanson said, the School Board could have given more consideration of a program called "Formative Assistance," a program that allows teachers with a weakness in a particular area of teaching to travel to other districts for a day. There, they can observe techniques used in the classroom by teachers with greater expertise, and receive counsel and advice from them.

Melanson also said teachers wanted more consideration of a "professional development account," which would help pay for teachers to continue their education.

Teachers also would like to see salary negotiations opened back up in October when the school district has a better idea about how much state funding it will receive.

Melanson said she thought the federal negotiator could possibly be available within a month.

Proposed Filer school repair projects total \$96,719

FILER — The school district has a list of repair and maintenance projects that totals 43 items.

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Twin Falls police seek donations to fund drug-education program

TWIN FALLS — Police here are looking for donations to get their newest drug-education program off the ground.

The grant won't be enough to properly fund the department's DARE program, officer Curtis Gambrel said.

DARE — Drug Abuse Resistance Education — targets fifth- and sixth-grade students and teaches them to handle the negative peer pressure that comes with moving into junior high school, Gambrel said.

The police department applied for

\$190,177 in state grant money to pay for two police officers, vehicles, program materials and a project manager.

But the state awarded only \$86,000, forcing the department to eliminate at least one position and a vehicle, Gambrel said.

Gambrel and another officer will travel to Blackfoot July 22 to begin two weeks of training administered by officers from the Los Angeles Police Department, which originated the program in 1983.

Two new officers will be hired to replace them as they conduct the 17-week DARE program throughout Twin Falls County's public and private schools.

As part of the fund-raising effort, Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course is sponsoring July 4 golf tournament, with all proceeds going to the DARE program, Gambrel said.

The Twin Falls police department has established a fund to accept donations from individuals or businesses, he said.

Donors should make checks out to DARE, in care of Gambrel, and mail or deliver them to the Twin Falls police department.

Sonya Samuels of Lapwai wants to become a doctor or a physical therapist, even though she knows the schooling required for both professions is difficult.

"I just want to work with people and help people," said the 18-year-old graduate of Lapwai High School at the Nez Perce Indian Reservation.

Sonya is one of five students participating in the University of Idaho's Minority High School Student Research Apprentice Program this summer. They can earn up to \$2,000 in stipend through the program, funded by the U.S. Department of Human and Health Services.

Meanwhile, Boise State University student Diana Garza remembers looking around her junior high school classroom in Glenns Ferry and realizing she was the only Hispanic.

University of Idaho earns \$300,000 challenge grant

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho and National Endowment for the Humanities have announced creation of a \$1.25 million endowment to support undergraduate humanities education at the Moscow school.

For its part, the National Endowment for the Humanities is providing a \$300,000 challenge grant requiring three-to-one federal matching funds. The University of Idaho was among 14 institutions selected from 54 applicants to receive the competitive grants.

They are aimed at promoting and rewarding excellence in teaching undergraduate humanities, identifying outstanding teachers as models and mentors for others and balancing the emphasis on research with recognition of the importance of teaching, the university said Thursday in a news release.

The school said it will supplement the grant with private and corporate contributions of \$50,000 over the next four years.

The endowment will support instruction in the humanities classes taught in the school's

core curriculum of art, English, foreign languages and literatures, history, music, philosophy and theater.

"This endowment will give us the opportunity to center the energies of the outstanding teachers in these fields and to generate a program from which all students will benefit," said Thomas Bell, University of Idaho vice president for academic affairs and research.

A unique feature of the program is establishment of a Distinguished Teaching Professorship in the Humanities. The two-year, rotating professorship will reward outstanding teaching as an incentive to the undergraduate humanities faculty.

The university also plans to appoint three "faculty fellows" to work with the professor holding the humanities chair, conduct an annual faculty seminar to strengthen the humanities curriculum and underwrite related faculty and student projects through the Fund for the Enrichment of Teaching.

The school also will appoint a visiting professor in the humanities.

"There was a point that I wished I wasn't Hispanic. I felt caught between two worlds," she said. "I think that encouraged me to become bicultural."

Biculturalism is one of the topics being discussed at the Hispanic Women's Issues Conference which started Thursday at BSU.

To further stimulate her interest in medical and physical therapy careers, Sonya is spending her third straight summer working in the university's research labs and getting paid for the work.

"I have a lot of experience in the labs," she said. "It has helped a lot. The program is in its 11th year."

This summer, she is comparing two salt solutions with serum from cows to determine whether the less costly solution can be used for freezing white blood cells of mice and a hybrid of these cells.

Mark DeSanis, a zoology professor, uses the hybrid to make antibodies to study the nervous system.

Her sister, Sybil Samuels, 16, is participating in the program for the second year in a row. She is learning to make a 3-D reconstruction of the pituitary gland of a ferret. Zoology professor Rodney Mead said he needs to know the shape of a small

part of the pituitary in order to isolate it for his research.

"I am learning a lot," she said. "It's a lot better money, too."

Minority program director Isabel Bond said most of the students in the program have gone onto college and good percentage of those have studied science-related disciplines.

Josie Romero, a psychiatric social worker in San Jose, Calif., is the keynote speaker at the Boise State conference. She said Hispanic women have the power to make or break a cultural chain.

"Women are the primary transmitters of culture, so they must identify what is important from their own culture, as well as the dominant cul-

ture," she said.

The high school dropout rate for Hispanic students is 48 percent, according to the 1990 Census. Garza is the first in her family to break the cycle, working on a communication degree.

Her father, Rudy Garza Sr., said he realized moving the family around the nation for field labor was hurting his children's grades, so they decided to put down roots in Glenns Ferry.

"Education seems impossible to reach for many Hispanic women," Romero said. To escape the poverty cycle, women have to believe in themselves, then plan a strategy to accomplish their goals, she said.

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Panhandlers seeking for spare change may soon hear the rustle of paper instead of the clinking of coins.

Vouchers, worth 25 cents and redeemable for goods and services, will soon be available at various outlets in the city's two busiest shopping districts where panhandling is most pervasive.

"It's just incredible," said Jeff Leiter, president of the Berkeley Downtown Association, "not one merchant I've asked has turned us down."

The voucher system will be tested for six months beginning about mid-

July. If successful, it will be extended throughout Berkeley.

It provides an alternative for people reluctant to hand out cash for fear the money will be used for alcohol or tobacco, said Rebecca Rhine, executive director of the Telegraph Avenue Merchants Association.

Dozens of merchants have agreed to sell and accept the vouchers, including small markets, laundromats and social agencies. Vouchers cannot be exchanged for tobacco or alcohol.

Tax-deductible "direct" giving coupons will also be available from participating merchants. The cards

cost \$1 and the money, minus a small administrative fee, goes directly to social agencies who work with the homeless.

Nevada Taxation Committee OKs \$113 million plan to tax businesses

CARSON CITY (AP) — A \$113 million plan to tax Nevada businesses, a key element in a three-part plan to overhaul the \$300 million funding shortfall, was approved Thursday on a 9-2 Assembly Taxation Committee vote.

The committee approved AB303, a bipartisan measure that would levy taxes on Nevada businesses based on the number of workers they employ. It's the first major tax bill to emerge from committee this session.

AB303 levies a minimum annual \$100 fee on the state's smallest businesses, including hotel-casinos and mining ventures, would pay a top \$400,000 fee.

Thursday's vote followed four days of hearings, which included criticism from small business owners and lengthy debate on which formulas to use in figuring the tax.

Two other tax bills are expected to emerge from the committee within a

day or two, according to Taxation Chairman Bob Price, D-North Las Vegas. Those bills, AB295, and AB296 would raise the state sales tax rate, and add a 6 percent tax to some services that companies provide.

Price called for a vote on the business tax after frustrated members demanded action. Assemblyman Lou Bergvin, R-Gardnerville, threatened to stop action on all other bills until AB303 moved.

"I'd like to take some action...I think we've talked this thing to death," added Assemblyman Matt Callister, D-Las Vegas.

Callister, who heads the Assembly's budget committee, said that lawmakers could spend several more hours deliberating on the plan, but some would still think the plan was unfair.

"In the end, what's fair depends on where you're standing at the time," Callister argued.

He added that the broad-based business tax is the fairest means for the state to get off the "revenue roller coaster," which depends on sales and gaming taxes. "The fundamental problem is that growth doesn't pay for itself under the present tax code," he said.

Callister and Bergvin crafted much of the \$314 million tax package, with the help of some top gaming industry lobbyists. Bergvin said after the hearing that AB303 was as fair as a tax can be.

The panel amended the plan to impose the \$100 fee that would be imposed on thousands of self-employed business persons. The committee was told by state tax experts that tracking down "every little Avon lady" would be costly and difficult.

Assemblywoman Gaylyn Spriggs, R-Hawthorne, voted against the plan, saying only that "it's a little too much for me." Assemblyman Phil Stout, R-Henderson, also opposed the tax.

Witness says he saw defendant near Snowbowl ski resort vandalism site

PRESCOTT, Ariz. (AP) — A witness in the conspiracy trial of five environmental activists testified Thursday he saw defendant Mark Davis on a trail near a chair lift which was vandalized in October 1988.

Shane Townsend, then a student at Northern Arizona University, testified in U.S. District Court that he and friend were hiking at the Snowbowl ski resort near Flagstaff when they encountered Davis and another man on a trail.

Davis' companion walked off the trail and the witness Townsend said Davis remained on the trail and talked with the hikers.

"Davis is one of four defendants charged in attempts to damage support towers for the main cable chair lift at Snowbowl in October 1987 and October 1988."

All five defendants in the case are current or former members of the radical group Earth First! and are charged with plotting to sabotage nuclear facilities in Arizona, California and Colorado.

Besides facing the nuclear-safety conspiracy charges and sabotage charges stemming from the Snowbowl incidents, Baker, Davis and two other defendants also are accused of sawing through power poles and trying to topple power lines.

About half an hour before Townsend testified in the jury hearing, Judge Robert Bromfield held a hearing on whether to let Townsend and his hiking companion testify.

In that hearing, which excluded the jury, Townsend also identified Davis.

The witness said he could not identify for certain Davis' trail companion as anyone in the courtroom, but he said defendant Marc Baker had similar characteristics.

Later, under questioning by prosecutor Daniel Fromstein, Townsend told the jury Baker was the man who was with Davis on the trail.

But under cross examination by Baker's attorney, Skip Donau,

Townsend again conceded he could not identify Baker for certain.

In other testimony, a Snowbowl manager gave detailed accounts, illustrated with photographs and charts, of the damage to the main chair lift in 1987 and 1988.

"It appeared to me that the towers had been cut with a torch," said J.R. Murray, a resort manager.

During questioning from prosecutor Thomas Simon, Murray testified that repairing the lift after the incidents cost the resort's owner, Fairfield Communities Inc., approximately \$26,000.

The company spent an additional \$30,000 to increase security in the area, he said.

Murray testified that the company received letters after the incidents from a group called EMETIC, claiming responsibility for the damage.

EMETIC is an acronym for the Evan Mecham Eco Terrorist International Conspiracy. Taken as a medical term, conspiracy is an agent to induce vomiting.

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Fish advocates say power panel's efforts not enough

BOISE (AP) - Labeling the Northwest Power Planning Council's efforts inadequate and sure to lead to extinction of native Idaho salmon, advocates Thursday called on the panel to address the real problem behind the region's dwindling chinook and sockeye runs - hydroelectric dams.

If not, "We're going to lose all of these fish," Ed Chaney, executive director of the Northwest Resource Information Center in Eagle and a participant in the recent salmon summit convened by Oregon Service Mark Hatfield, said at a news conference.

The council held the first of four public hearings Thursday in Boise on habitat and production proposals aimed at adding salmon runs to the National Marine Fisheries Service has recommended for federal protection.

It has given Northwest Indian tribes and fisheries agencies until Aug. 9 to submit recommendations for amendments to its Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program. A decision on changes is expected by November.

Chaney said improving habitat is fine as far as it goes. But the eight-member Northwest Power Planning Council appointed by the governors of Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Montana has ignored damage caused by the eight dams on the river system for more than a decade, he said.

His group, Idaho Steelhead & Salmon Unlimited, Salmon Survival Watch and other conservationists are developing an alternative plan based on a proposal first set forth earlier this year by Gov. Cecil Andrus. It calls for drawing down reservoirs behind the four lower Snake River dams to increase the flow through otherwise stagnant pools that trap salmon smolts trying to migrate through the Snake and Columbia systems.

That would restrict power production at hydroelectric dams and barge traffic on the rivers for a few weeks each spring, but Chaney said those problems could be overcome and forecasts of economic doom if federal or endangered species status is ordered are overblown.

Plans backed by utilities and the Bonneville Power Administration to transport more salmon from Idaho hatcheries for release below Bon-

neville Dam amount to "an extinction plan," he said, since most salmon making it to the ocean now already are trucked from upstream and runs are still dying out.

Instead, salmon advocates will pursue "a national political and legal strategy to bring these people to heel," he said, and press ahead with petitions to the Fisheries Service for emergency protection orders for sockeye and fall, spring and summer chinook runs.

So far Chaney said the agency has followed "the path of least political resistance" by failing to recommend endangered status or emergency protection, especially for the fall chinook run that returned only 75 fish to Idaho last year.

Salmon Survival Watch said 6,614 adults reached Lower Granite Dam — the last dam they encounter before entering Idaho waters — in the Snake River spring chinook run that ended Monday. It was the third-lowest count ever.

Cable company takes action to compete

HARRISON (AP) - A California-based cable television company has taken preliminary steps to force the northern Idaho town of Harrison to allow it to operate locally.

The case pits WestStar Communications' right to compete for cable TV customers in the growing area against local residents' view of Lake Coeur d'Alene.

WestStar, based in Sacramento, filed a \$57,000 tort claim with the Harrison City Council recently after it denied the company permission to install a cable line on utility poles.

The city has until the first week in September to respond or face a possible lawsuit.

Coeur d'Alene attorney Steve Wetzel, who represents WestStar, said he could seek monetary damages as well as a court injunction forcing Harrison to allow WestStar to compete in the local cable TV market.

Harrison already is served by TeleSystems Inc. of Kellogg, which provides cable to about 70 local customers. WestStar competes with TeleSystems—in the Silver Valley

from a regional office in Osburn. "This seems to be an attempt by the city of Harrison to have exclusive rights," Wetzel said. "That's where the problem lies."

The Harrison City Council denied WestStar access to local utility poles last October and again on April 2 when the company reapplied for permission. Mayor Dean Christiansen said the six-member council's decision was based primarily on complaints from about a dozen residents over the impact of overhead wires on their view of Lake Coeur d'Alene.

Idaho Senate leaders ask members to hold down state-paid travel costs

POCATELLO (AP) - With requests mounting to attend meetings outside the state, leaders of the Idaho Senate are asking members to hold down their state-paid travel expenses.

Idaho's 42 senators have been sent a letter urging them to hold down requests for the state to pay several to regional and national organization meetings.

The message was signed by Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo of Idaho Falls, Republican floor leader Jerry Twigg of Blackfoot and Democrat leader Bruce Sweney of Lewiston. It also said travel requests should be made in writing 45 days in advance, a change from the previous policy of oral requests.

"It is not required that you attend regional and national committees because of assignment to that committee," the letter stated. "Your involvement will depend on the time you wish to devote to the committee. We urge you to limit requests by limiting meetings pertaining to your committee assign-

ments (in the Idaho Legislature)." Crapo said there's no indication that travel or these agencies are being abused, but costs are going up because more meetings are being held.

"With increased costs, we just thought it was appropriate to remind everybody not to go to everywhere," he said.

There are no restrictions on the amount of money legislators spend on travel, although juries made by senators must be approved by the pro tem. House Speaker Tom Boyd of Genesee supervises travel in that chamber.

Senate travel expenses jumped from \$264,337 in fiscal 1986 to \$320,996 in fiscal 1990, the legislative auditor's office said. Travel expenses for the 84 House members increased from \$480,112 in fiscal 1986 to \$540,704 in fiscal 1990.

Expenses for both chambers decreased slightly between 1988 and 1989.

Boyd said he hasn't clamped down on travel requests. But he

asks that when House members return from a trip, they explain in writing whether it was a necessary meeting.

"Quite frankly, I've never been a very strong believer that you learn an awful lot in most cases," Boyd said. "By and large, I think we are up against the front end of traveling, of overdoing it."

Several lawmakers attend meetings of the National Conference of State Legislatures, which this year scheduled two gatherings in Washington, D.C., and at Orlando, Fla.; Portland, Maine; and Lincoln, Neb. Other organizations include the Western Legislative Conference and the Council of State Governments, as well as several special interest groups.

Twigg, who drafted the Senate letter, said legislative leaders wanted to get a jump on any potential problems.

"We're just trying to clean up our procedure a little," Twigg said. "We don't see it as a big problem. It's just something we didn't want to get out of hand."

Educators say vocational education's poor image in Idaho needs to change

IDAHO FALLS (AP) - With nearly half of Idaho's new jobs requiring vocational or technical training, educators say the state won't meet its labor demands until attitudes about vocational education change.

"I think the greatest challenge that we face is a general mind set on the part of many kids," said Jerry Jacobson, superintendent of the Idaho Falls School District. "The kids look past these (jobs) and I don't know why."

The administrator of the state Division of Vocational Education attributes the negative image to public attitudes about blue-collar jobs. Vocational education has a poor image because some of the workers who train workers get their hands dirty, Trudy Anderson said.

That's unfortunate, she said, because vocational schools today train more than welders and auto mechanics. They also prepare workers for technical and paraprofessional jobs that sometimes pay more than those requiring four-year college degrees.

Regardless of what anyone thinks, vocational-technical jobs are among the fastest growing in the state. A report by the Division of Vocational Education shows nearly half the jobs created in Idaho through the end of the century will require more than a high school diploma and less than a bachelor's degree.

The problem is few students are pursuing vocational careers. Last year

more than 28,000 full-time students were enrolled in academic programs at Idaho's public colleges and universities. Only 3,200 were pursuing a vocational-technical degree or certificate.

Michelle Hansen, vocational coordinator for Bonneville and Idaho Falls school districts, said programs are being developed in eastern Idaho to encourage more students to train for vocational jobs. One program, called Tech Prep, will expand technical preparation courses in high school. Another will allow students to earn credit toward vocational degrees.

Because they are run by college graduates, public schools have done a good job preparing students for academic careers, Hansen said. They haven't done such a good job counseling students on job opportunities in vocational-technical fields.

"Many parents grow up with the American dream and inspire their children to go on to college," she said. "They don't even think about sending their kids to technical school."

More students isn't all vocational-technical schools need. They also need money.

Grace Gueppler, director of Eastern Idaho Technical College in Idaho Falls, said the school needs money to start new programs but doesn't even have enough space to expand existing ones.

Gov. Cecil Andrus this year vetoed \$250,000 to plan construction of a \$3.2 million classroom building at Eastern Idaho Technical College.

The Legislature appropriated more than \$191 million to state colleges and universities for academic programs this year. Vocational education got \$30 million.

Rep. Dick Davis, R-Rexburg and chairman of the House Education Committee, said the Legislature has been supportive, regularly increasing vocational spending and this year replacing lost federal funds.

The underlying problem, Davis said, is that American education isn't keeping pace with technological changes.

"Even the vocational jobs now require a greater degree of math and science proficiency than they used to," he said.

The new president of the state Board of Education said she won't support shunting money from academic to vocational programs until more students make the switch. When that happens, the state will be forced to spend more on vocational education, Colleen Mahoney of Lewiston said.

"The infrastructures at the four-year institutions are there," she said. "The faculty is there, the students are there and we have an obligation to serve all students who require training after high school."

Prisoners seek damages for 'humiliating search'

BOISE (AP) - Six male Idaho prison inmates have filed a complaint in federal court, claiming they were strip-searched in front of two female correctional officers.

The complaint filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Boise alleges the officers violated policy at the state prison when they ordered the "humiliating search" on Jan. 14. The inmates seek \$50,000 in punitive damages.

The complaint was filed by the American Civil Liberties Union and attorney Philip Gordon. Corrections officials declined comment.

On that day, plaintiffs Michael Robinson, David Pruitt, Raul Salazar, Jerry Campbell, Scott Lind and

Michael Wharton were working in the prison laundry, the complaint says.

George Bernick, deputy warden of operations, ordered a female officer into the inmates' observation. Another woman officer joined her, according to the complaint.

Mining town will pay big electric bills

BOISE — The remote mining town of Atlanta already has the highest electrical rates in the state, and will rise 40 percent temporarily under a decision by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission. Atlanta Power Co., plagued by a failed hydroelectric dam on the Boise River and loans for last year's dam repairs, on Wednesday was granted a three-month 10.23-cent surcharge per kilowatt hour of power use. The money is to defray the cost of producing electricity with an aging, Army-surplus diesel generator. The rate hike will cost each of the company's 48 customers between \$10 and \$50 monthly. PUC spokesman Gary Richardson said the temporary surcharge will replace a current 4.5 cent-per-kilowatt hour surcharge, which helps repay an Idaho Water Resources Board loan.

Authorities find bullets on county hill

IDAHO CITY — A bullet virtually identical to those in a black-powder pistol owned by Edward Dee Palmer was found on a Boise County hillside where a young couple was slain, authorities have testified. Meantime, after two days of testimony and 15 prosecution witnesses in Palmer's preliminary hearing, Ada County Magistrate John Dutcher on Wednesday delayed until July 5 ruling on whether to order him to stand trial on two counts of first-degree murder. Boise County Public Defender Robert Chastain requested the continuance, claiming he could not adequately cross-examine a government witness because he lacked copies of taped interviews between Palmer and authorities. Palmer is accused of shooting David Middlemist, 24, and Cathy Enoch, 21, in the head with a .44-caliber, black-powder pistol.

'Dream' failing to see the light of day

ASHTON — Hydro developer Grant Durchi expected to begin building his "dream" project on the Fall River by autumn, but he's run into a roadblock. Durchi, of Hibbard, had a license to build the \$10-million hydroelectric project 11 miles west of Ashton, and some certainty that it would move forward. But now the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has denied him the needed wetlands permit, which means more studies and delays. "Now we have to take it a step at a time," he said. The project represents Durchi's dream of using the existing Marysville Dam and canal instead of building new facilities. "When you compare this resource for the water with the impacts of other sources, this is a great project," he said.

Lawmakers oppose 1% property initiative

A Democratic state senator and a Republican House member both say they are against the "unwise, unneeded and unworkable" 1 percent property initiative.

Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Blackfoot, sponsor of a bill in the 1991 session that triggered the citizen initiative, said if voters support it, they must tell lawmakers whether they want to cut government services by one-third or if the lost revenue should be made up by new taxes.

"I need to have some idea when I go over to Boise of what the will of the people really is," Simpson told the Blackfoot Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday.

At Moscow, Sen. Karl Brooks, D-Boise, called the initiative "unwise, unneeded and unworkable" in a speech Thursday to the Association of Idaho Cities convention.

"The 1 percent initiative is a misguided missile

aimed at the heart of the state-local partnership that educates our children, builds our roads and keeps our streets safe," Brooks said.

The initiative, backed by the Idaho Property Owners Association, would limit property taxes to 1 percent of market value. It also would require two-thirds of all registered voters to approve before property taxes could be increased.

Supporters hope to get the measure on the ballot in 1992.

Last session, Simpson sponsored the so-called "truth in taxation" bill. That law, which takes effect next January, repeals the 5 percent cap on annual increases in local government budgets funded by property taxes.

It requires local governments to prominently advertise proposed property tax increases, and to hold public hearings.

Ran Rankin, president of the Property Owners Association, announced plans for the initiative in March, as soon as it became clear the "truth in

taxation" measure would pass.

"It cuts the most efficient use of your tax dollars and leaves the bloated government budgets in Washington, D.C., untouched," Simpson said.

"It's not my intention to tell people whether to support the One Percent Initiative or not, but rather to inform them of the differences so that they can make up their own minds," Simpson said.

Blackfoot School Superintendent Steve Norton said passage of the initiative would make already infeasible funding more unfair.

"We have disproportionate funding already in this state and the One Percent Initiative would just compound the problem," Norton said.

Brooks told local officials at Moscow that sponsors of the initiative are trying to peddle "fools gold," promising tax cuts but no deterioration in the state's quality of life.

"They have a valid point when they claim the property tax is unloved and overused, but they offer nothing constructive in its place."

Highway bill could help Idaho

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho will receive more than twice as much back in federal highway funding as the state pays in taxes under the new highway bill approved by the Senate.

Sen. Steve Symms, its Republican floor sponsor says.

"This is a good bill for the nation, and it's particularly good for Idaho," said Sen. Steve Symms.

"I'm very pleased with the overwhelming vote we won in the Senate tonight."

The Senate Wednesday night approved by a 91-7 vote a \$123 billion Surface Transportation Efficiency Act, effective for the next five years. It now goes to the House.

Symms said Idaho stands to receive \$739 million under the measure, or \$2.07 for every gas tax dollar paid in Idaho into the Highway Trust Fund.

He said it's the most Idaho ever has received under a federal highway bill, and many of the strings attached to the funds have been removed. "I'm especially pleased that we've removed the federal strings from a good share of those funds," he said.

Federal officials contend public needs to support cleanup efforts

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Federal officials say the success of environmental cleanup plans for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory will depend on public support and involvement.

But some people at a meeting sponsored by the Department of Energy Wednesday questioned whether public opinion will really have any impact on the multi-billion-dollar effort to clean up contaminated sites by the year 2019.

The two-hour meeting, the first of five to be held around the state this month, drew about 50 people. It was held to explain the process the DOE is going through, and to encourage public comment.

The second meeting was scheduled Thursday night in Pocatello.

"We don't think we're going to be successful in our cleanup program unless the public accepts what we've done," said Walt Sato, DOE environmental restoration specialist.

INEL officials said they are close to choosing a method for interim cleanup at two contaminated

sites at Test Area North — the Warm Waste Pond, which has been used for 40 years for disposal of radioactive water, and the "perched" water that has collected beneath the pond.

The INEL is considering several options, including chemical removal of the contaminants and pumping the water into an evaporation pond.

Each option will cost roughly \$5 million, but that estimate could be off by as much as 50 percent, said Andy Baumer, project manager.

Several people questioned how much of a role public opinion will actually play.

Several people said the INEL Reporter, a newsletter available to the public, should publish specific examples of how public input has made a difference in DOE activities and decisions.

Others said the DOE should focus more effort on the sources of the waste to minimize the need for environmental restoration.

Some said the public wants more input in policy decisions.

Tempest in Lewiston packs lightning and rain

LEWISTON (AP) — A brief, but ferocious, summer storm swept through the Lewiston area Wednesday afternoon, packing lightning and heavy rain which flooded some neighborhoods.

The flagpole atop the Astoria County, Wash., Courthouse was struck by lightning at the height of the tempest. It downed some electrical wires, but caused little other

damage, said Howard Winroth, Astoria street department chief.

A lightning strike was also reported in Lewiston. Fire officials say it caused electricity to arc underground and come up along an aluminum back-splash guard in the bathroom of the home of John Kovach.

Damage was estimated at a few hundred dollars, but no injuries were reported.

Residents in a basement apartment in Lewiston were rescued by police after water poured in and reached waist level. The National Weather Service said Lewiston received a half-inch of rain in 20 minutes. Washington Water Power and Clearwater, Power Co. reported some outages from wind gusts or downed trees.

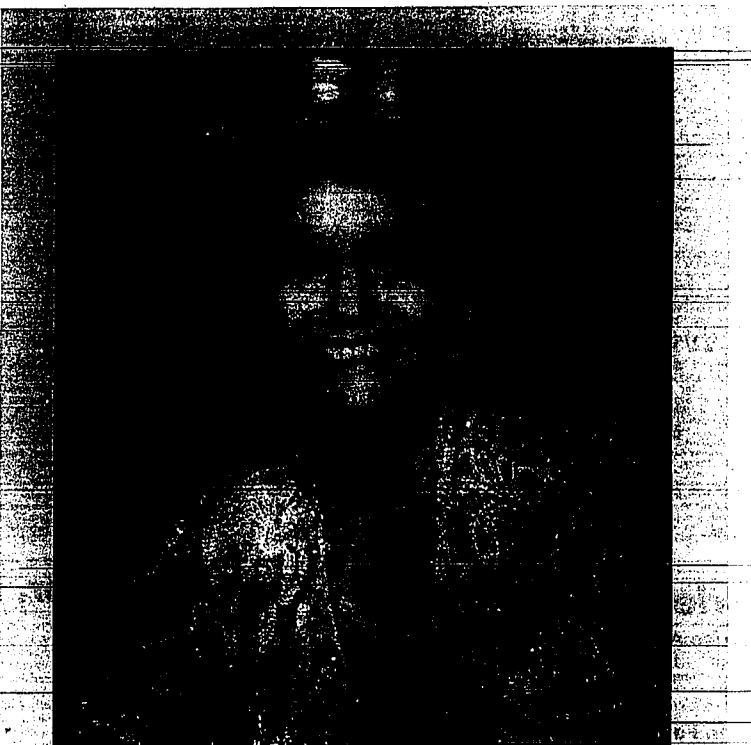
"I've been in show business since I was 16. This is really what I enjoy doing."

30-second Robin Hood shot seen 'round the world

LOS ANGELES — The shot moviegoers may remember longer than any other this year wasn't even in a movie... at first.

If you've been in a theater in the last six months, you can't have missed it: An archer draws his bow and suddenly you and his arrow are flying at dizzying speed through Sherwood Forest as the razor-sharp missile hisses toward its target. At the end of the 30-second spot for "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves," the arrow splinters the shaft of another already embedded in an oak tree, and the camera cuts to the bowman, Kevin Costner, wearing an understandably satisfied look.

If they handed out Oscars for trailers, this teaser — or

the longer, two-minute "Robin Hood" come-on that began playing in February — would be the can't-miss favorite on the big night. Its creator is Tony Seineger, head of Seineger Advertising, a company that specializes in the use of producing trailers and posters for film ad campaigns.

In the last 20 years, the man charged with selling the sizzle for steak that can be anything from filet mignon to chuck calculates that he has made 200 trailers. None has prompted more praise in Hollywood and more how'd-they-do-that? gasps from the audience than his brilliant pitches for "Robin Hood." The film's two trailers have won deserved attention for an obscure but necessary corner of the film industry.

The shot seen round the movie world is such a breathtaking piece of screen wizardry that Warner Bros. and the

producers of "Robin Hood" immediately found a place for it in the finished product (when Robin gives the merry men an archery lesson).

The long-awaited \$50 million return to Sherwood with a carefully orchestrated blare of publicity. But the first notes of that fanfare were heard in the fall as "Robin Hood" went into pre-production in England and Costner's "Dances With Wolves" began attracting the wide praise and long lines at the box office that culminated in his big night at the Academy Awards.

The problem then was how to capitalize on Costner's star, which had gone from rising to meteoric, before filming on "Robin Hood" had begun. How do you make a trailer without any footage to show?

It was a major break for a young actress whose only major screen credit was in the female coming-of-age film "Mystic Pizza" the year before — and placed her in the midst of some pretty heavy hitters.

Surrounded by Shirley MacLaine, Sally Field, Olympia Dukakis, Dolly Parton and Daryl Hannah, Roberts was surely the lowest paid and least-recognized — by a long shot.

Three years later, however, she has surged to the top, leaving them all in the dust. The 23-year-old Roberts commands more money than any other actress in Hollywood, a whopping \$7 million per picture, at last count.

When "Pretty Woman" became Disney's top-grossing film ever, the nation's theater-owners — at their annual convention, ShowWest — selected her "1990 Performer of the Year." And, with only six major movies to her credit, the actress has twice been nominated for an Academy Award and twice won a Golden Globe.

Roberts, despite her very brief track record, is considered the Movie Star of the Moment: the only actress in a male-dominated business who can be counted on to bring in audiences. That is what Twentieth Century Fox Chairman Roth is banking on when the studio releases her latest movie, "Dying Young," which is the story of a woman (Roberts) involved with a man fighting leukemia (Campbell Scott) — today.

"When you have Julia's name on the marquee, you

"And she's arguably the only actress on the list. That's what's so exciting about this phenomenon: at least at this moment, there's someone who broke the taboo about gender. Julia is up there with Costner, Gibson, Schwarzenegger. She can carry a picture regardless of genre, domestic or abroad."

"Basically, I've learned on the job," Roberts said, taking a break from "Hook," Steven Spielberg's twist on the Peter Pan fable. Sitting in her trailer, her recently shorn auburn hair tucked under the strawberry blonde wig she wears as Tinker Bell, she adds: "It's an imaginative thing with me. I don't quite know what I'll be doing until it's done." It was not until her performance as the fiery Portuguese waitress in 1988's "Mystic Pizza" did the public and industry take notice.

"A lot of people went up for the movie," says Elaine Goldsmith of the William Morris agency's West Coast office. "But when Julia wants something, she goes after it. Julia's got passion. She's very focused. To look more the part, she put black mousse in her hair for the callback the next day."

Roberts admits that she is ambitious. "I wouldn't be in this business if I wasn't," she says. "But ambition has a bad connotation. People don't understand all the hues. It's not just money, greed, fame. My ambitions are to seek out challenges, to discover new things about myself... maybe some things I haven't wanted to deal with, I also want to be part of a group I respect from whom I can get an influx of ideas and creativity."

After "Mystic Pizza" came "Steel Magnolias." It was her first major studio film, and Roberts was paid \$90,000, well above what she had received for "Mystic Please see ROBERTS/C2

Pizza.

Goldsmith believes the smartest move her client has made was taking time off after shooting "Pretty Woman" to wait for the right next movie, which turned out to be "Pretty Woman," the movie that propelled Roberts into the stratosphere.

When "Pretty Woman" was released in March 1990, it became the third highest-grossing movie of the year and turned Roberts, who received \$300,000, into a star. "The movie was like an amalgam of her," says Joan Hyler, an agent at the William Morris Agency. "After the film took off, she got every script in the business. There was Julia Roberts ... and everyone else."

Critic and film historian Richard Schickel questions all the fuss. "Without taking anything away from Julia Roberts, there were doubtless 25 other actresses who could have played the 'Pretty Woman' role and played it fine," he says. "It wasn't exactly a stretch. There was nothing inherent in what she did that made her a star. It did make the film a \$100 million-plus grosser. It took off because the public wanted to plug into the fantasy."

Roberts' next film, 1990's "Flatliners," performed pretty well at the box office. If the film was not a boon to Roberts, who snatched

\$50,000 for the part, neither was it a setback.

"She was 'Sleeping With the Enemy,'" though, that confirmed Julia as a box office star," says Mike Simpson, co-head of the motion picture division of William Morris. "It showed that she could open a movie that is part of the 'B' range and that the movie can go big."

"Sleeping" was for Julia what 'Cocktail' was for Tom Cruise," he adds. "An actor doesn't want too many of these in his wallet, but one Tom Cruise film that gets you the high money deal."

"Dying Young" was developed for Roberts by Sally Field from a book by Mari Leimbach she found when "Steel Magnolias" was in post-production. The film puts Roberts' salary at the \$3 million level, which is on a par with a Michelle Pfeiffer or a Meryl Streep. And, as a serious film coming out in the summer, it will be another test of her drawing power.

"Dying Young" marks two years of "B" movies for Roberts. Burnout, Roberts has found, is a clear and present danger, balance very hard to come by. In a town that ravages relationships, she's determined not to be a statistic. After "Steel Magnolias" she's proudly, she is taking a year off to recharge.

When she resurfaces again next June, she will tackle the role of a

half-breed in "Renegades," to be produced by Rite Star and distributed by Carolco. It's a project she describes as a "Western with heart ... a dream opportunity for me."

With good reason. That is the one for which she will need \$7 million after several renegotiations. And her leading man will be Sutherland, who will be receiving a larger-than-usual \$2.3 million to \$3 million for the part.

Critic Schickel says a flop or two would not hurt Roberts' career. "What's so bad about falling back and being one of two dozen young leading actresses - talented, attractive, but not expected to carry a picture?" he asks. "It's the tremendous pressure on this young woman and those attending her career to keep picking pictures grossing at this level or the studios will go after another actress for one-quarter of her price. Why not opt for a situation where the pressures are less, the choices freer?"

Roberts may be wondering that herself. For, despite the perks, being Star of the Moment has its tradeoffs.

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Rarely seen John Wayne movie to air in 3-D

The appearance of a 38-year-old John Wayne movie in a syndicated package sold to television stations around the country hardly seems like big news. But the story behind "Hondo" is a bit different.

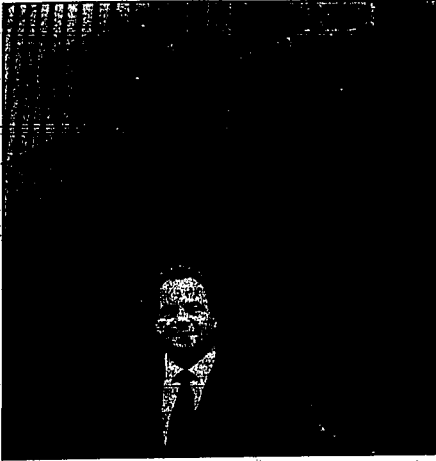
This 1953 Wayne film will be shown Monday night on ABC (KXVI Channel 35 at 8 p.m. locally) in its original version. That doesn't mean uncut footage has been restored, that means it's in 3-D.

As Michael Wayne, the Duke's son, explained over the phone from Los Angeles recently, when "Hondo" was made, 3-D was enjoying one of its periodic surges of popularity. By the time the film was released, however, the thrill of wearing two-tone glasses to the movies had worn off.

"I think it only ran about a week and a half in a couple of theaters in 3-D," Wayne said. "Then there was a great demand for it and they sent it out to the other theaters in regular prints."

Well-reviewed at the time, "Hondo" was based on Louis L'Amour's first best-seller. It featured Geraldine Page, in a role that garnered her a supporting actress Oscar nomination, Ward Bond and a young James Arness. It is being rerun to its 3-D format in a new process called Naturalvision, which requires its own particular type of glasses.

"I think it was shown once on the network and maybe had one syndication and one cable showing, if that," Wayne said. "The way you make the most money on something like this is to release it on cassette first, then sell it to cable, then to syndication. But we saw an opportunity to do something for the Leukemia Society doing it this way."

Wayne said that the 3-D process being used does not make the film unwatchable without the glasses, always the main drawback to 3-D on television.

"If you had a regular print next to the Naturalvision print, you could tell the difference. But just watching it without anything to compare it to, I don't think you'll notice," he said.

But, Wayne also noted that the 3-D process will not be picked up by videocassettes because the tape can't capture all the information needed.

Cheever's widow wins dispute over publications

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — After a bitter three-year court fight, the Illinois Supreme Court today ruled in favor of the widow of author John Cheever in her effort to control publication of a collection of his short stories.

The state's highest court ruled that a contract between Mary Cheever and a Chicago publishing house seemed to be void because it didn't say how many stories or pages would be in the collection.

"If the essential terms are so uncertain that there is no basis for deciding whether the agreement has been kept or broken, there is no contract," Justice James Heiple wrote for the court.

Cheever won the Pulitzer Prize in 1979 for "The Stories of John Cheever," a collection of short fiction works, and died in 1982 at the age of 70.

His other works include "The Wapshot Chronicles" and "Falconer."

Mary Cheever had sought to invalidate the 1987 contract with Academy Chicago Publishers Corp. because, she said, the publishers had violated an understanding that she be allowed to choose the stories to be included in the collection.

She complained that after signing the agreement, the publisher had moved without her permission to publish a collection of 68 stories, including some of Cheever's earliest

works. Mary Cheever said publication of some of the stories would have "horrified" her husband because they weren't up to his later standards.

Academy Chicago filed a lawsuit in 1988 in Cook County Circuit Court to have the contract declared valid and bar Mary Cheever from interfering with publication of the collection.

She obtained a federal court order in New York barring publication.

A Cook County judge ruled in November 1988 that Mary Cheever could fulfill the contract by presenting a manuscript of 10 to 15 stories, 150 pages or more in all.

Mary Cheever offered a collection of 15 stories totaling 243 pages.

Academy appealed, saying the collection was too small and that too many of the stories offered were already in the public domain.

An Illinois appellate court upheld the key points of the trial judge's ruling.

But the Supreme Court said today that the trial judge erred in setting terms under which Mary Cheever could fulfill the intent of a vague contract.

"The publishing agreement contains major unresolved uncertainties," the court said.

"It is not the role of the court to rewrite the contract and spell out essential elements not included therein."

Mickey Mouse Club looks for 'hipper' audiences

ORLANDO, Fla. — When the Mouseketeers returned to Orlando last month to resume production of "Mickey Mouse Club," they found 50,000 fan letters awaiting them.

It has been almost a year since the young performers left Disney-MGM Studios on an extended hiatus from the show. But "Mickey Mouse Club," which continued to appear in reruns at 3:30 p.m. MDT each weekday on the Disney Channel, only seems to gather more momentum. The channel, in fact, is considering producing a syndicated "Mickey Mouse Club" special that would be seen by far more than the Disney Channel audience.

Disney seems to have succeeded in transforming a tired old institution of the 1950s into a hip, smart show of the '90s that speaks to the kids who think they're "way cool."

While the Disney Channel, which reaches 5.6 million cable subscribers, will not reveal audience ratings, it will say that the show is the highest-rated afternoon series on the channel. Since its debut in April 1989, "Mickey Mouse Club" has received more than 250,000 letters from young viewers.

Indeed, even the response to nationwide auditions for new Mouseketeers last November, December and January showed how high the profile of the show has risen. More than 20,000 children showed up for the auditions in 20 U.S. cities, compared with the 5,000 who tried out for the show's debut.

There has been a dramatic change of perception among children about the show, says Steve Clements, executive producer.

"They knew they were auditioning for this hot show that was great to get on," he said.

The show returns with 10 new

Mouseketeers representing a cross section of America. They hail from such cities as San Jose, Calif., Indianapolis, Chicago and Dallas, and bring the "Mouse Club" cast to 24 members — up from a high of 15 in the last season of production.

"I think it's the best mix we've ever had in terms of kids to relate to in many ways," Clements said.

The Mouseketeers now range in age from 12 to 16. The older ones in the crew, of course, represent the returning cast members. Producers were under no pressure to graduate any of the Mouseketeers because they have found that as the show gained popularity it caught on among teenagers as well as preteens.

"The thing that's actually happened is that as the show has gone along, the viewers have grown in age," said Steve Fields, senior vice president of original programming for the Disney Channel. "Partly it took a while for

them to become aware and accept the fact that the show is for them. We have tremendous teen viewing, and we never really expected it. We expected 8-to-12-year-olds."

Disney Channel will produce 35 episodes of the show between now and Labor Day, and then take a hiatus until after the first of next year. The shows will begin airing this fall.

"Mouse Club" will be taped every other week, Tuesdays through Saturdays, before a studio audience of some 160 kids chosen from the theme park, area schools and from those who request a spot in the stands. (Kids aged 12 to 17 wishing to be in the audience may call (407) 560-8492 between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. MDT for information.)

In addition to new faces in the cast, "Mouse Club" welcomes a new co-host. Terry Misner, a New York actress and former Miss Texas, replaces Mowava Pryor, who left the show to pursue other interests.

Goldsmith believes the smartest move her client has made was taking time off after shooting "Steel Magnolias" to wait for the right next movie, which turned out to be "Pretty Woman," the movie that propelled Roberts into the stratosphere.

When "Pretty Woman" was released in March 1990, it became the third highest-grossing movie of the century, earning \$300,000, into a star. "The movie was like an avalanche for her," says Joan Hyler, an agent at the William-Morris Agency. "A RE film took off, she got every script in the business. There was Julia Roberts — and then there she was."

Critic and film historian Richard Schickel questioned all the fuss. "Without taking anything away from Julia Roberts, there were doubtless 25 other actresses who could have played the 'Pretty Woman' role and played it fine," he says.

"If the movie was nothing inherent in what she — or Richard Gere — did that made the film a \$100 million-plus grosser. It took off because the public wanted to see the next big thing."

At the end of 1990's "Flatliners," performed pretty well at the box office. If the film was not a boon to Roberts, who snagged \$550,000 for the part, neither was it a setback.

"It was 'Sleeping With the Enemy,'" though, that confirmed Julia as a box office star," says Mike Simpson, co-head of the motion picture division of Warner Bros. "It showed that she could open a movie that isn't very good — and that the movie can go big."

"Sleeping" was for Julia what "Coalition" was for Tom Cruise. "It was a post-post-actor doesn't want two more of these in his wallet, but one or two of them is what gets you the high money deal."

When she resurfaces again next June, she will tackle the role of a

half-breed in "Renegades," to be produced by Ray Stark and distributed by Carolco. It's a project she describes as a "Western with heart" — a dream opportunity for her.

With good reason, that is the one for which she will receive \$7 million — after several negotiations. And her leading man will be Sutherland, who will be receiving a larger-than-usual \$2.3 million to \$3 million for the part.

Critic Schickel says a flop or two would not hurt Roberts' career. "What's so bad about falling back and being one of two dozen young leading actresses — that's what's so bad — not expected to carry a picture," he asks. "Right now, there's tremendous pressure on this young woman and those attending her career to keep picking pictures grossing at this level or the studios will go for another actress for one-quarter of her price. Why not opt for a situation where the pressures are less, the choices freer?"

Roberts may be wondering that herself. For, despite the perks, being Star of the Moment has its drawbacks.

By all accounts, staying at the top is considerably more difficult than getting there.

"They say I've had it easy," she says a bit defensively, straightening her hair and checking her makeup in preparation for "Hook's" last shot of the day.

"But 'easy' based on whose account? True, I haven't slept in the car. I haven't struggled to the bone. I've had a check-out, I've had to critique or judge? Making movies to me, is the best thing in the world. But, at the risk of sounding ungrateful, it's very, very hard."

"The Wayne family has been very active in the fight against cancer, especially since the death of my father," Wayne said. "We were looking for something to do along those lines, and then we heard about this new 3-D process and it all came together at the right time."

"Hondo" is one of four John Wayne films that the family controls because they were made by his family company, Batjac Productions. As with the others — "McClintock," "The High and the Mighty" and "Island in the Sky" — the distribution of "Hondo" has been very limited.

"I think it was shown once on the network and maybe had one syndication and one cable showing, if that," Wayne said. "The way you make the most money on something like this is to release it on cassette first, then sell it to cable, then to syndication. But we saw an opportunity to do something for the Leukemia Society doing it this way."

Wayne said that the 3-D process being used does not make the film unwatchable without the glasses, but the main drawback to 3-D on television.

"If you had a regular print next to the Naturalvision print, you could tell the difference. But just watching it without anything to compare it to, I don't think you'll notice," he said.

But, Wayne also noted that the 3-D process will not be picked up by videocassettes because the tape can't capture all the information needed.

Cheever's widow wins dispute over publications

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — After a bitter three-year court fight, the Illinois Supreme Court today ruled in favor of the widow of author John Cheever in her effort to control publication of a collection of his short stories.

The state's highest court ruled that a contract between Mary Cheever and a Chicago publishing house seeking to publish the stories wasn't valid because it didn't say how many stories or pages would be in the collection.

"If the essential terms are so uncertain that there is no basis for deciding whether the agreement has been kept or broken, there is no contract," Justice James Heiple wrote for the court.

Cheever won the Pulitzer Prize in 1979 for "The Stories of John Cheever," a collection of short fiction works, and died in 1982 at the age of 70.

His other works include "The Wapshot Chronicles" and "Falconer."

Mary Cheever had sought to invalidate the 1987 contract with Academy Chicago Publishers Corp. because, she said, the publishers had violated an understanding that she be allowed to choose the stories to be included in the collection.

She complained that after signing the agreement, the publisher had moved without her permission to publish a collection of 68 stories, including some of Cheever's earliest

works. Mary Cheever said publication of some of the stories would have "horrified" her husband because they weren't up to his later standards.

Academy Chicago filed a lawsuit in 1988 in Cook County Circuit Court to have the contract declared valid and bar Mary Cheever from interfering with publication of the collection.

She obtained a federal court order in New York barring publication.

A Cook County judge ruled in November 1988 that Mary Cheever could fulfill the contract by presenting a manuscript of 10 to 15 stories, 150 pages or more in all.

Mary Cheever offered a collection of 15 stories totaling 243 pages.

Academy appealed, saying the collection was too small and that too many of the stories offered were already in the public domain.

An Illinois appellate court upheld the key points of the trial judge's ruling.

But the Supreme Court said today that the trial judge erred in setting terms under which Mary Cheever could fulfill the intent of a vague contract.

"The publishing agreement contains major unresolved uncertainties," the court said. "It is not the role of the court to rewrite the contract and spell out essential elements not included therein."

Mickey Mouse Club looks for 'hipper' audiences

ORLANDO, Fla. — When the Mouseketeers returned to Orlando last month to resume production of "Mickey Mouse Club," they found 50,000 fan letters awaiting them.

It has been almost a year since the young performers left Disney-MGM Studios on an extended hiatus from the show. But "Mickey Mouse Club" at 3:30 p.m. MDT each weekday on the Disney Channel, only seems to gather more momentum. The channel, in fact, is considering producing a syndicated "Mickey Mouse Club" special that would be seen by far more than the Disney Channel audience.

Disney seems to have succeeded in transforming a tired old institution of the 1950s into a hip, smart show of the '90s that speaks to the kids who think they're "way cool."

While the Disney Channel, which reaches 5.6 million cable subscribers, will not reveal audience ratings, it will say that the show is the highest-rated afternoon series on the channel. Since its debut in April 1989, "Mickey Mouse Club" has received more than 250,000 letters from young viewers.

Indeed, even the response to nationwide auditions for new Mouseketeers last November, December and January showed how high the profile of the show has risen. More than 20,000 children showed up for the auditions in 20 U.S. cities, compared with the 5,000 who tried out for the show's debut.

There has been a dramatic change of perception among children about the show, says Steve Clements, executive producer.

"They knew they were auditioning for this hot show that was great to get on," he said.

The show returns with 10 new

Mouseketeers representing a cross section of America. They hail from such cities as San Jose, Calif., Indianapolis, Chicago and Dallas, and bring the "Mouse Club" cast to 24 members — up from a high of 15 in the last season of production.

"I think it's the best mix we've ever had in terms of just having all types of kids for kids to relate to in many ways," Clements said.

The Mouseketeers now range in age from 12 to 16. The older ones in the crew, of course, represent the turning cast members. Producers were under no pressure to graduate any of the Mouseketeers because they have found that as the show gained popularity it caught on among teenagers as well as preteens.

"The thing that's actually happened is that as the show has gone along, the viewers have grown in age," said Steve Fields, senior vice president original programming for the Disney Channel. "Partly it took a while for

them to become aware and accept the fact that the show is for them. We have tremendous teen viewing, and we never really expected it. We expected 8- to 12-year-olds."

"Disney Channel" will produce 35 episodes of the show between now and Labor Day, and then take a hiatus until after the first of next year. The shows will begin airing this fall.

"Mouse Club" will be taped every other week, Tuesdays through Saturdays, before a studio audience of some 180 kids chosen from the theme park, area schools and from those who request a spot in the stands. (Kids aged 12 to 17 wishing to be in the audience may call (407) 560-8492 between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. MDT for information.)

In addition to new faces in the cast, "Mouse Club" welcomes a new co-host, Terry Misner, a New York actress and former Miss Texas, replaces Mowava Pryor, who left the show to pursue other interests.

GOODFELLAS 4 stars. (1990) (Warner) \$94.99. 146 minutes. Robert DeNiro, Joe Pesci, Ray Liotta, Lorraine Bracco, Martin Scorsese. Based on Nicholas Pileggi's bestseller, this is a blistering power and stinging irony that put it on the lonely top shelf with Francis Coppola's "Godfather" films. But where Coppola's saga explored the chasm between what is legal and what is just, Scorsese considers a world of random viciousness where such matters are irrelevant. The movie is built on the conflicting claims of the family and The Family in a world of justified paranoia and reflexive betrayal. The crime is the show of \$6 million and the punishment don't matter. Scorsese finds profound meaning on the streets where other filmmakers see only mindless violence. Pesci won an Oscar as best supporting actor.

METROPOLITAN 3 1/2 stars. (1990) (RCA/Columbia) \$89.95. 98 minutes. Edward Clements, Carolyn Farina, Christopher Eigeman, Isabel Gillies. They're rich. They're bored. But they are not boring. You expect the privileged characters of "Metropolitan" Park Avenue debutantes and their escorts — to be insufferable twits. Instead, they are utterly captivating in this charming first feature by rookie John Whittier Stillman. Initially tentative, the film's

performances grow in authority as each character achieves a degree of self-awareness. Likewise Stillman's direction, which is at first bristly funny, in the style of Philip Barry, then more flexible and naturalistic, in the style of Jean Renoir.

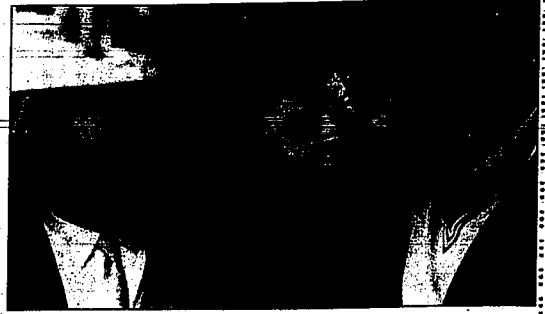

Cafe becomes pop culture institution

DALLAS — On June 14, 1971, two young Americans opened the first Hard Rock Cafe after deciding that there were no good hamburger places in London.

Twenty years later, the Hard Rock Cafe has developed into a veritable institution of pop culture. This month, the 13 branches around the world are celebrating two decades of their unique and successful combination of food, music and memorabilia.

This lucrative connection with the music industry no doubt has had restaurateurs everywhere wondering, "Why didn't I think of that?"

But according to Diane Brandon, the Dallas area's first and only Hard Rock Cafe in Dallas, there was no blueprint for success.

"In the London restaurant," she says, "the story has it that it was Eric Clapton that bought one of his guitars in the store. Here, hang it on the wall." Then Pete Townshend came and brought his guitar — it was like, "If you can put his guitar on the wall, you can have mine, too." It's just memorabilia from there.

Today, the Hard Rock Cafes are visited by millions of tourists annually. "There isn't anywhere else like it in the world," says Hard Rock Cafe

president Robert Earl, who bought the restaurants four years ago. "It's a living museum. Staff enjoyment is second to none. And it's classless. It doesn't matter who you are or where you're from. Anyone can get in."

But no one can say for certain why it's worked so well. "If you know what made it so successful, we'd have a hundred spinoffs all over," says Brandon. "It's just a fluke."

Imitators apparently haven't found out either. Although the ubiquitous T-shirt has been copied widely, she says, "So far we haven't had any problems. They can put musical things on the wall and play loud music and call it 'Whatever Cafe,' but it's not the same." Both Earl and Brandon speak proudly of the Hard Rock's many events and pieces of memorabilia that have helped build this mystique. The list of visitors is a who's who of the music industry. Phil Collins ate at both the London and Philadelphia Hard Rock Cafes during his dual appearances in the Live Aid

concert. Rock stars regularly show up when they are in town for concerts.

The Dallas restaurant, which opened in 1986, owns more than 1,000 pieces of memorabilia, including Jimi Hendrix's only surviving Gibson Flying V guitar. Brandon adds, "A couple got married under it. They traded earrings and everything. They come for their Robbins Music Clinic. The clinic incorporates music into the therapy of disabled children.

To top it all off, on June 30 the Fabulous Thunderbirds and the Arc Angels will perform at the Dallas effort to benefit the North Robbins Music Clinic. The clinic incorporates music into the therapy of disabled children.

This dedication to public service is nothing new. Says Earl, "We coined the phrase 'Save the planet' in the '70s, and we've been raising money and making people aware of environmental issues since."

few suggestions on financial matters.

"It's usually advice of warnings, you know, concerns that I've gone through in my life that I don't want to see them have to go through," she said. "Advice is not something that children take from me anyway, so I toss it out very sparingly."

Three years ago, Reynolds penned her autobiography, "Debbie, My Life."

"I wrote the book before I die so that my children and other people won't write a book about my life and write false statements. That seems to be the craze," she said.

In another venture, Reynolds made an exercise video, "Do It, Debbie's Way," that has gone platinum twice in sales.

To keep in shape, Reynolds said she exercises to her own video every day.

"It works for me," she said. "It's for out-of-shape women over 40 who really hate to exercise and just need to get their figures in tone."

In another personally motivated activity, Reynolds has saved Hollywood memorabilia for 40 years, gathering thousands of costumes, props and mementos of Hollywood's greatest movies and stars.

"I have the largest collection in the world," she said. "I have a warehouse, 20,000 square feet, full. Many of us here in this community think the memorabilia should be saved before it's all just sold to the four corners of the world."

Unfortunately, she said, heads of studios today are new in the business and they are not interested in preserving Hollywood history.

"So it's a fight all the way," she said. "They keep auctioning things off and liquidating everything, and those of us that care keep buying and accumulating a bigger collection."

Reynolds said her goal is to establish a Hollywood museum, that features generations can see sofas and chandeliers in the exact original settings of famous movies, or can compare the dresses worn by Claudette Colbert in the first Cleopatra movie and by Elizabeth Taylor in the second.

"It's a dream," she said. "It's something I hope that I live long enough to get done."

Group upset with Disney's wolves

Wolves are not as harmless as the Walt Disney Co. would have viewers of their "White Fang" movie believe, according to the Mountain States Legal Foundation.

"At the end of the movie on Jack London's book of the same name, which chronicles a young man's adventures in Alaska during the gold rush, is a statement telling viewers that 'there has never been a documented case of a healthy wolf or pack of wolves attacking a human in North America.'"

Perry Pendley, president and chief legal officer of the Denver-based legal foundation, has written Disney's chief executive officer, Michael Eisner, to take issue with that statement. He also asked Eisner to remove the statement from the movie.

"While uncommon, attacks by wolves upon humans have, indeed, occurred, both in the early years of the settlement of this country and more recently," Pendley said.

Disney officials were not immediately able to comment on Pendley's request, which was contained in a press release issued this week.

The attacks cited by Pendley included some dating to 1830 and others as recent as 1987 and 1989.

The more recent attacks occurred

in Algonquin Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada, where a 16-year-old girl was bitten by a wolf and in Minnesota; where two children were attacked, one fatally, by wolves kept as pets. Pendley said some of the accounts were reported to James Audubon, the renowned painter, and noted historian George B. Grinnell.

In his letter to Eisner, the lawyer asked that the wolf statement be removed from the movie before it is released for home video.

"Prior to releasing 'White Fang' in video format, I urge you to remove the incorrect statement regarding wolves and mankind," Pendley wrote.

Lots of fire but not enough heat to sizzle audiences in 'Backdraft'

with ads that read, "They Laugh! They Love! They Fight Fire!" Stars pop up everywhere, but putting them to good use is something else again. "Backdraft" (rated R for language) tells the tale of the battling McCaffreys, Stephen (Kurt Russell) and his brother Brian (William Baldwin), a pair of knowledging hotheads, constantly at each other's throats. Even as the movie rages in the film's prologue, they find something to good-naturedly bicker about, but their laughter turns to (yes) tears when their heroic firefighter dad dies in the line of duty in front of Brian's horrified eyes.

GetAway To Pair-A-Dice

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Audiences hot about 'Robin Hood' despite poor reviews

LOS ANGELES (AP) - "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves" catapulted over mixed reviews to make an estimated \$25.6 million in its premiere weekend, the second-best opening of a non-sequel in Hollywood history.

Starring Kevin Costner in his first role since the hit Western "Dances With Wolves," the \$50 million update of the Sherwood Forest legend made its debut on 2,369 screens nationwide last week in the most anticipated summer release since 1989's "Batman."

"Batman" holds the record for a non-sequel premiere, according to Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc. It grossed \$42.7 million in its debut and went on to collect \$251.2 million in North-American movie-theaters.

Arnold Schwarzenegger's "Total Recall" netted \$25.3 million in its first weekend.

Although "Robin Hood" failed to please many critics, audiences seemed to adore the swashbuckling-adventure film.

Surveyed, commissioned by Hollywood's movie studios and conducted in Los Angeles, Las Vegas, Orlando, Fla., and Salt Lake City, showed moviegoers gave the film an "A" rating.

The testing service CinemaScore further found that audiences couldn't wait to see Costner's version of the cinema classic. By a 12-point margin, patrons said they "couldn't wait" to see it as opposed to those who "just came along."

Musician looks to jazz for roots of banjo

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Matt Flinner is among the best of a generation of "postmodern pluckers" who regard the five-string banjo as far more than a folksy back-up for floggers, Clamettes or good ole' boy car chases.

In their hands this uniquely American instrument leaves the mythic realms of riverboats, minstrel shows and moonshine to reclaim its identity in the roots of modern jazz.

That's not to say Flinner doesn't know his bluegrass. At 22, he headlines with Powder Ridge, a "New Grass" group whose acoustic blend of country rock, soul, jazz, and blues, captured the blue ribbon of bluegrass at the Telluride Bluegrass Festival two years ago.

Last year Flinner won the National Banjo Championship at Winfield, Kan. — "the Wimbledon for pickers," says Steve Block, who writes a column on jazz banjo for the trade magazine Banjo Newsletter. "But musically, Matt's on his way home," Block said. "He's stepped in (Earl) Scruggs, but his fingers are shot through with jazz."

Flinner, who moved here with his family as a child, is studying jazz guitar at the University of Utah, but only because the school does not consider the banjo worthy of academic pursuit. The banjo is his "primary instrument," and he insinuates it into compositions by such jazz greats as Charlie Parker and Thelonius Monk.

"Matt's as hot as they come. He's one of the nation's great pickers and he hasn't even started," says Dixie Band banjoist John McEuen, whose renditions of Bach etudes and "Mr. Bojangles" have become banjo standards.

Flinner credits folksinger Pete Seeger with bringing the banjo down from the mountain. But Seeger himself credited Earl Scruggs, a North Carolinian who almost single-handedly "invented" banjo technique.

In 1967, Scruggs' fast, fluent three-finger picking style reached millions on television's "The Beverly

Hillbillies." "Post-modern pickers — that is, post-Earl — are a different breed," Block said. "They developed a melodic style to pick out the melody note-for-note like a violin does. If you can do that on the banjo, you can theoretically do anything."

But the banjo's contribution to jazz is three-finger picking. While jazz guitarists mostly play single notes with a flatpick, jazz banjo incorporates bluegrass techniques and that idiomatic fifth string.

"This is an exciting time," Flinner says. "The comparison to the time when the guitar came into its own, when tuning was standardized and when people like Segovia came along and started to write and render works of art for the guitar."

Something like that is going on with the banjo, he said. "It's gone beyond the province of parking lot pickers."

Jazz forces banjo players to take technique seriously and set a new standard of performance.

"Improvisation is the heart of jazz, but improvisation takes discipline. You take this happy-go-lucky attitude about the banjo and it just doesn't translate," Flinner said.

"You can't take that attitude with jazz. You really have to understand what you're doing. You have to be able to say to yourself, 'OK, I have to play this scale over this chord change.'"

Flinner smiles when he recalls the first jazz lick he ever heard on the banjo in a recording by Bela Fleck, "and I couldn't find the notes anywhere on my banjo." Today, he can find them, and is finding more every day.

"I try to use the banjo as a complete instrument," Flinner said. "It's all new. It's a wide-open door. There are thousands of things hidden in this instrument, new things that I can't play yet. And it's frustrating not to find them."

opposed to the steak — end of the business, he rejoins: "We're not selling sizzle. We're selling ingredients. A good trailer should walk the audience's appetite and take them to a point where they're hungry for more."

"The studio always wants to take the best moments in the movie and put them in the trailer," Joe Johnston, whose "The Rocketeer" opens today, explained. "But when the film finally opens, you don't want an audience in the theater that's seen all your good stuff. The director wants to hold things back."

"We get involved in a picture as soon as it's green-lighted and (in the case of "Robin Hood"), that was last summer," said Seineger, a voluble, restless executive who likes to roam the floors of his busy West Hollywood domain, filled with exotic video and sound equipment.

"The studio wanted something showing in theaters before Christmas while the movie was still in production. We had to come up with something that was outside the movie. A guy at Morgan Creek (the company that co-produced the film with Warners) brought up the speedbikes in "Return of the Jedi." He said wouldn't it be great if we could see Robin's ar-

row fly through the forest (from the same perspective)."

Turning that suggestion into a shot was, to put it mildly, easier said than done. The teaser opens with an overhead view of Sherwood, then closes in on Costner's profile. As he draws back the bowstring, we look along the arrow and see his clenched fist holding the bow. Then he looses the arrow on its giddy flight.

There is a lot more to this beginning than meets the eye. To make the shot appear in scale, the camera is looking down on an arrow that is actually 8 feet long. The hand made of latex is 3 feet wide and the bow is so big that not even the gigantic Little John could fire it.

After the camera tracks down the shaft, the fun — and the illusion of flight — begins. Seineger clutches his forehead and laughs (he can afford to now) at the trouble that went into next 29 seconds of film. The arrow arrives precisely on line and on target with a little device Robin could have used against the Sheriff of Nottingham — a laser.

"What you see (when the second arrow splits the first) is the combination of a model of the tip of the arrow on a motion-control stage in California and a real arrow in a real tree in a

forest in England," explained the man whose ingenious crew spliced and edited this transatlantic piece of movie magic.

"The hardest thing to do technically was to make the arrow go absolutely straight, so we lined it up with a laser. You see, they did the forest sequence in "Jedi" by strapping Steadicams on dirt bikes. There's a lot of up and down motion. You can't have that with an arrow."

The segment was shot last October in Birnam Forest, a jealously guarded national preserve outside London. Seineger wanted to dig a trench of 300 feet for the required dolly shot — in which the camera is mounted on a hydraulically powered platform that moves forward.

"The ranger wouldn't let us do that," recalled Seineger. "So we had to find 300 feet of level ground, which, believe me, isn't easy in a forest. Then we had to lay a track, make sure it was absolutely level with films and cover it with leaves. We filmed at one frame a second with the camera moving forward at 8 miles an hour and two grips frantically clearing the leaves (from the track) in front of it. So all the drama and comedy in "Robin Hood" that comes from the spoken word is yet to come when they see the film."

Illinois wants to tax visiting professional athletes

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — The next time Magic Johnson meets Michael Jordan on a Chicago basketball court, a state lawmaker wants to make sure that Illinois tax officials are waiting in the locker room.

Under a proposal tentatively approved Thursday by the state Senate, many out-of-state professional athletes such as the Los Angeles Lakers star would have to pay Illi-

nois income tax when they play in the state. Sponsoring Sen. John Cullerton, D-Chicago, said it would only target members of sports teams from California, Wisconsin, Ohio and anywhere else where a similar tax is imposed on out-of-state professional athletes.

Cullerton said he got the idea after reading that Jordan and other members of the Chicago Bulls had to pay California income taxes when they played the Lakers

for the NBA championship. "It's just a matter of equity," he said of his proposal. "If nobody voted for a tax before, this is one tax we should all vote for," added Sen. Robert Raica, R-Chicago, in endorsing the measure.

It was approved 55-0 as an amendment to a pending bill.

Cullerton had no estimate on how much the tax would generate from the many millionaire athletes, but he said it would be

"substantial and growing."

At present, Illinois loses revenue when Illinois visiting athletes pay income taxes elsewhere. The bill would become eligible for taking a deduction on their Illinois taxes.

The amount of the tax paid by the out-of-state athlete would be based on the number of games he played in Illinois as a percentage of his annual player's income, Cullerton said.

Race to win

After just 4 years, Jerome's Eddie McKean breaks into regional NASCAR top 10

TWIN FALLS — Race car driver Eddie McKean may live in Jerome, but he's just as comfortable in the winner's circle.

In his fourth year of driving, McKean has dominated the field this year finishing first in six out of the eight pro stock races at the Magic Valley Speedway. His victories have put him into the top ten of the NASCAR Great Northern Region standings where he currently sits in fifth place. The eight drivers in front of him have raced at least one more race at McKean.

He remains the region's top winner with his six victories.

"It's nice to see a local boy do well," said Speedway promoter Steve York. "It's a surprise from our track to break into the top 10."

"We've just adjusted, tuned and adjusted and it's just seemed to work," said McKean of his early success this year. "I'm just getting around a little faster. I've learned the feel of the car. We tape all of the races and watch the other cars," he continued.

His success reaching the winner's circle has all been by his driving skills.

"I feel real fortunate with the yellows (caution flags). There's three races that I wouldn't have won if it wasn't for the yellow flag. There's lots of good nights. There's four or five there every night," said McKean.

"He's a good driver," said driver Willey Goby of Twin Falls. "He's got a real good car, a good crew behind him and good sponsors."

McKean's sponsors, Cactus Pete's and Wickham Pipeline, help him keep his streak going. The racer puts about \$4,000-\$5,000 into his car each year.

His four-year racing career began during the inception at the Magic Valley Speedway. McKean's first year was driving street stock's for half the year and pro stock during the last half of the season.

In his first full year of pro stock driving, McKean finished fourth in points and was named Rookie of the Year. He was second in points in his second year of pro stock driving and last year, he finished on top.

Since going to a NASCAR track at the

start of the racing season, McKean feels good about the changes that occurred with the switch, especially in the higher insurance for drivers.

"I feel a lot more safer," he said. "The money is also good."

The payoff for McKean's 1990 points performance came out to about \$200. The NASCAR Winston Racing series offers \$25,000 for the top driver in the Great Northern Region. The national prize for the top driver is worth an additional \$45,000. Winston also gives the local winner \$1,000 and a helmet. But every driver at the Speedway, including McKean, realizes that the season is still young.

McKean, who works as the Manager of Rocky Mountain Industries in Jerome, has time to work on his car during the slower summer months at his employer.

"We built it three years ago. This year we built an enclosed trailer for it," said McKean.

His goals are big, but reachable. If he continues to work on his car during the first place in the Great Northern Region and he would like to also capture the national crown as well.

'Mac' says he's realistic about Wimbledon chances

His plan was to play at Queen's Club in London — as part of his Wimbledon warmup, but the Gulf War meant the Davis

It's one more time for Erica Kane as Susan Lucci wins a nomination

Have'n't you seen this cliffhanger before? This year, Susan Lucci, who plays Erica Kane Montgomery on ABC's "All My Children," is nominated for the twelfth time as Best Actress on "The 18th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards" (airing in prime time Thursday, June 27, on CBS).

It's one more time for Erica Kane as Susan Lucci wins a nomination

Haven't we seen this cliffhanger before? This year, Susan Lucci, who plays Erica Kane Montgomery on ABC's "All My Children," is nominated for the twelfth time as Best Actress on "The 18th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards" (airing in prime time Thursday, June 27, on CBS).

Are her nominations cheaper by the dozen? Lucci's annual Emmy loss (which she herself lampoons in a currently running commercial for a sugar substitute) has become so legendary that it now serves as the best advertising and promotional bait the Daytime Emmys could ever ask for.

But apart from all that, the self-possessed, cartoonish Erica did have a story line this season that was serious and socially relevant: the kind that the Daytime Emmys were founded to reward. Also, partially because of this story line, "All My Children" is a nominee for Best Show, and the soap's writing team — led by head writer Agnes Nixon — has been nominated for Best Writing.

Erica's husband Travis Montgomery (formerly played by Larkin Malloy) had conceived a child, Molly, with Barbara Cudahy (formerly played by Susan Pratt) while he was separated from Erica. Baby Molly subsequently developed leukemia, and the doctors advised the anxious parents that only a bone-marrow transplant could save the child. A matching donor could not be found, so the doctor told Travis and Barbara that the best hope was to conceive another child who could

Basketball dunks network competition as NBC scores the Nielsen ratings' hit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Basketball shot NBC over the top in the latest network ratings showdown.

The deciding game of the National Basketball Association Championship was the most watched program on television last week. The Chicago Bulls' 108-101 victory over the Los Angeles Lakers helped NBC win the week with a 9.5 average rating.

CBS was second with 8.8 and ABC was third with 8.3. Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

With the exception of basketball and ABC's "20-20" newsmagazine, the top 10 list was populated by reruns.

In the No. 2 slot was ABC's "Roseanne," followed by NBC's favorite comedy "Cheers."

The No. 4 show was CBS' "60 Minutes." In fifth place was ABC's "Coach."

NBC's hour-long drama "In the Heat of the Night" was sixth. The reality series of CBS' "Rescue 911" and NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries" tied for seventh place.

"20-20" was the No. 9 show. ABC's "Family Matters" was 10th. The network news battle was

ABC busy testing 8 late-nighters

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC is using New Haven, Conn., the fabled trout town for Broadway, to test eight new late-night programs, the network said Wednesday.

Beginning July 15, the ABC affiliate WTNH in New Haven will broadcast shows starring comedian Joy Behar, Guardian Angels founder Curtis Sliwa and his wife, Lisa, and members of the Chicago-based Second City TV comedy troupe.

The unusual programming maneuver is aimed at either finding a replacement for "Into The Night Starring Rick Dees" or an idea for an overhaul of the show. ABC announced Tuesday at its annual affiliate convention that Dees is

giving up his host spot in July.

Philip Beuth, ABC's president of early morning and late night programming, told the affiliate officials that "We are not there at all, ratings-wise, and Rick knows that. He has elected to step aside."

Dees, a Los Angeles disc jockey, will become an executive producer for the talk show. He is remaining with the program, because he is a part-owner.

ABC lost \$8 million to \$10 million this fiscal year on late night programs, Beuth said. The midnight time slot following ABC's successful "Nightline" news show is dominated by NBC's "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson" and

David Letterman's "Late Night."

The Sliwas, founders of the citizen patrol group and hosts of a popular call-in radio show on WABC in New York, will incorporate that format in their television show. It will examine issues ranging from abortion to dispensing condoms in schools.

Behar's segment will feature "high-concept comedy," Beuth said.

ABC will broadcast the eight new shows in New Haven for one- to two-week intervals for 10 weeks. New Haven was chosen because it is the closest affiliate to Beuth's New York base that will sell ABC the one-hour time slot that begins at midnight.
