## Progress made on arms treaty

WASHINGTON — The Soviet Union presented new proposals on Thursday for wrapping up a strategic missiles-reduction treaty, but Secretary of State James A. Baker III said tough issues were still resisting solution.

"If we were 96 percent a couple of weeks ago we are 92 percent now," Baker said after 4 1/2 hours of talks with Soviet Foreign Minister Alexander A. Bessmertnykh. "But we've got to be 100 percent."

Completing the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty would set the stage for President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev to schedule a summit meeting in Moscow.

"At this point," Baker said, "that would be premature." Baker said the proposals brought from Moscow by Bessmertnykh dealt with two of the remaining issues — how much information on missile tests would be exchanged by the two countries and the definition of new missiles.

"I think we have made some progress on these issues," Baker said.

However, he said a third stumbling block was still a serious problem. It concerns how many warheads certain missiles would carry.

"We are no way home free on this issue," Baker said.

Baker and Bessmertnykh will continue their talks Friday. In the meantime, U.S. and Soviet specialists worked on the intricate problems posed in these and other areas.

## Eclipse awes millions in its path

HAWAII — Amateur and professional sky-gazers used devices from pinhole viewers to some of the world's most powerful telescopes to watch the moon pass in front of the sun and create a total eclipse Thursday.

One couple on Hawaii island got married, kissing at 7:28 a.m. — when the eclipse was at its peak.

Guests at an observatory atop this 13,796-foot volcano got one of the clearest views. And Donald N.B. Hall, director of the University of Hawaii's Institute for Astronomy, which runs the observatory, said it was one of the best eclipses he'd ever seen.

"On a scale of one to 10, that was a 10," Hall said.

But from a scientific perspective, with visibility problems hampering experiments, he said, "I think it was pretty bad."

A partial eclipse was visible throughout "much" of the mainland United States — if clouds didn't get in the way. The best views were in

## Senate approves tough crime bill

WASHINGTON — The Senate passed a sweeping anti-crime package Thursday that would impose the death penalty for 51 crimes, curb death-row appeals and require a waiting period for handgun purchases.

The legislation, approved on a 71-27 vote, toughens penalties for drug dealing and using firearms to commit crimes and bans certain assault-style semiautomatic weapons.

Votes against the bill came mainly from Senate opponents of gun control and critics of the

death penalty. Forty-five Democrats joined by 26 Republicans voted for the measure. Ten Democrats joined by 16 Republicans opposed final passage.

The crime package includes gun-control provisions that President Bush said he would sign only if Congress enacted a crime bill to his liking. Bush last week expressed general satisfaction with the measure, which contains many of his legislative objectives.

"This bill contains the heart of the president's crime bill," said Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C.

"There are some troublesome provisions, but they are outweighed by the tough provisions in the bill."

Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., said that "no one will deny this is an extremely tough bill."

"We are talking about significant changes across the board," Biden said. "Some of them I like more than others." But Biden was quick to add: "Clearly this is not the president's crime bill."

## Minidoka, Cassia prosecutors want grand juries empaneled

TWIN FALLS — What they are investigating remains secret, but the Minidoka and Cassia county prosecuting attorneys have taken the rare step of seeking to impanel grand juries in each county.

County officials wouldn't say Thursday if they were working on the same investigation. Jury selection will begin two days apart in the two counties.

"The proceedings are secret and I'll remember them," Minidoka County Prosecuting Attorney Charles Creason Jr. said Thursday.

Grand juries are composed of 16 residents of the county who meet behind closed doors to

consider evidence and decide whether criminal charges should be filed.

Calling grand juries is an unusual procedure. In most criminal cases, the county prosecutor files charges against a defendant and must prove to a judge that enough evidence exists to justify a trial.

Although county prosecutors can call for a grand jury, under Idaho law only a district judge has the authority to impanel one.

Minidoka County grand juries will be picked starting July 24, according to 5th District Court documents. The order to summon 24 possible jurors was signed by Judge J. William Hart on June 20.

"No comment," Cassia County Prosecuting Attorney Stephen

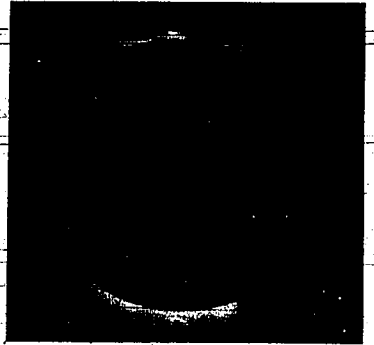
Bywater said when asked if he had requested a grand jury.

But 5th District Judge George Granata said Bywater's office had asked that a grand jury be impaneled. Court documents state that possible jurors in Cassia County will be chosen starting July 22.

Granata signed the order to summon possible jurors on July 1.

Outside of Ada County, which has a standing grand jury, Idaho county officials seldom summon grand juries. Twin Falls County impaneled two grand juries in 1987 in a number of cases involving alleged drug use and sales.

Before 1987, the county had never summoned a grand jury.

"If I were Richard Stallings, I would try to divert the attention of the people in Idaho from my own record and from Symms' record," Symms said.

Understand totally why he is doing it." Symms said the media have been off base in characterizing his former wife as mistreated. He declined to answer questions about whether he cheated on his wife.

He added, however, "You're not going to get me to ever say anything against Fran. We've got four wonderful children, and I have her to thank for that."

It was the first time he discussed his marital situation since Mrs. Symms said

she was doubtful of the senator's fidelity during the 1980s. He had previously refused to talk about his personal life.

Stallings suggested that Symms had been hypocritical by publicly advocating traditional family values and then personally violating that ethical position.

"My voting record with respect to the conservative ideal of promiscuity and all that has never altered," Symms countered. "I personally believe that freedom and liberty and low taxes is the best thing you can do to help families, and I've always said that."

He questioned whether Stallings might not be hurting himself by raising the issue.

Ancient eruption may have extinguished life

WASHINGTON (AP) — A lava eruption that covered more than 100,000 square miles of Siberia 250 million years ago may have caused climate changes that contributed to the near-total extinction of animal life on Earth some 250 million years ago, researchers say.

In a study to be published Friday, Ashish R. Basu of the University of Rochester and Paul C. Reine of the Institute of Human Origins in Berkeley, Calif., said that laboratory dating of rock samples from the Siberian 'lava flow' show the eruption was about the same time that fossil deposits record the extinction of up to 95 percent of all animal species.

The hearings had been tentatively scheduled to begin Monday. Committee sources have suggested a lengthy delay could imperil the nomination, and that the situation is beginning to resemble 1987, when Gates was forced to withdraw his name from consideration for the same post because of the taint of Iran-Contra.

**China reverses policy, appeals for foreign aid for flood victims**

**BELING (AP)** — The government on Thursday appealed for the first time for foreign aid in a disaster-seeking help to cope with flooding.

Foreign governments and U.N. agencies have pledged about \$770,000.

The disaster situation is growing worse. Chen Hong, vice minister of civil affairs, told a news conference in Beijing.

U.S. defense officials in Washington said earlier the United States might abandon Clark because a study indicated it could cost up to \$800 million to repair the damage caused by the volcano.

No final decision had been made, the officials stressed. Talks on the future of Clark and Subic, a major repair yard of the Seventh Fleet, are scheduled to resume in Manila next week.

**MANILA, Philippines** Heavy damage caused by the volcanic eruptions of Mount Pinatubo may cause the United States to abandon its nearby air base, President Corazon Aquino was told Thursday.

Defense Secretary Raul Manglapus said Richard Armitage, the U.S. chief negotiator on the future of Clark Air Base and Subic Naval Station, had informed him a pullout from Clark was being considered.

This is unexpected but this is obviously a development we have to be ready to face, Manglapus told reporters after meeting with Aquino and several senators.

**Strike causes mess**

**HAIFA, Israel (AP)** — Striking municipal workers blocked Haifa's traffic with garbage trucks and let raw sewage pour onto the beaches Thursday, the third day of their walkout.

Garbage piled up in the streets and the Health Ministry closed all the beaches on the Mediterranean port city of 245,000.

**Croatia seeks generals' ouster; EC teams arrive in Slovenia**

**BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)** — Croatia's leader demanded on Thursday that two top federal army generals be fired, and the Slovenian president charged that the army is still acting on its own.

A peace accord reached early this week between the government and the two breakaway republics called for all opposing forces to pull back to their bases so negotiations can be held calmly.

But both sides have been trading daily charges of truce violations.

**Gorbachev plan a mixture of 2 philosophies**

**MOSCOW (AP)** — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev is merging radical and conservative ideas in the economic reform plan he will take to a crucial meeting with Western leaders next week, his prime minister said Thursday.

Valentin Pavlov, considered a skeptic about seeking Western aid, also said outside aid to develop industry and make the ruble a convertible currency would help the Soviets create a market economy faster and less painfully.

The statements by Pavlov, who resigned in April last month, are at odds with Gorbachev, could bolster the president's mandate at meetings next week in London with leaders of the Group of Seven industrialized nations.

Gorbachev's ability to present a strong plan is considered crucial to obtaining the Western aid needed to dismantle the centralized economy. However, British Prime Minister John Major ruled out large-scale aid on Thursday.

Without giving any specifics, Pavlov said Gorbachev was putting together a program merging elements of the government's conservative reform plan and radical proposals by Soviet economist Grigory Yavlinsky and experts from Harvard University.

remained high in Slovenia despite a week-old cease-fire.

A team of 10 European Community diplomats arrived Thursday in Slovenia's capital, Ljubljana, to talk about monitoring the peace accord. The trade bloc is ready to send 40 to 50 unarmed truce observers but is awaiting permission from the federal collective presidency, which is to discuss the accord Friday.

Slovenia, Croatia and the federal premier already have approved the agreement, which was mediated by the European Community.

The chairman of the eight-member federal presidency, Stipe Meslic of Croatia, asserts that the army is now under civilian authority. But the army's attempt to squelch Slovenian independence last month and a battle with Croatian militiamen Sunday has left officials of both republics skeptical about who controls it.

The army is acting as a typical junta, Slovenian President Milan Kucan said in an interview. Despite hiding behind a mask of subordi-

nation to civilian institutions, it is in fact acting autonomously and in its own interest.

Slovenian officials have charged that some federal troops and tanks have not returned to their barracks and about a hundred of reinforcements have been flown into army bases inside the republic.

The army counters that the Slovenes have not removed all blockades of army bases.

Croatian President Franjo Tudjman sent a letter to the federal presidency Thursday demanding the firing of the army's chief of staff, Gen. Blagoje Adzic, and the military commander of troops in Slavonia and Croatia, Gen. Zivota Avramovic.

News reports have said the generals planned to crush the secessionist movements by force, and Tudjman's letter noted neither officer had denied the reports, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said.

As Serbs and hard-liners, both generals are intensely distrusted by leaders in Croatia.

**Philippine official submits resignation**

**MANILA, Philippines (AP)** Defense Secretary Fidel Ramos said Thursday he had resigned from the Cabinet. Sources said he quit to prepare to run for president next May.

Press Undersecretary Horacio Paredes said President Corazon Aquino had accepted the resignation but had not decided when to make it effective.

Paredes said Ramos' replacement will be announced before July 22, when Congress reconvenes.

Ramos, 63, former chief of staff of the armed forces and a West Point graduate, had been credited with crushing at least seven military uprisings against Mrs. Aquino. He was appointed defense secretary in 1988 after retirement from military service.

Ramos has been seeking Mrs. Aquino's endorsement as the government candidate in 1992. But Mrs. Aquino says she will announce her choice on her birthday next January.

# Thomas' pot use won't keep him off court, senators predict

WASHINGTON (AP) — Clarence Thomas' several qualifications for the Supreme Court will not be dented by his nomination to the high court, senators who will vote on his confirmation predicted Thursday.

Thomas said he was sorry he had done it all the same.

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, said, "I don't expect this to be a big deal. Clarence Thomas is not a candidate for sainthood. He's a candidate for the Supreme Court."

Democrats, too, suggested the issue would be of no consequence in their decisions to endorse or reject the nomination.

Thomas, continuing his rounds of courtesy calls on Capitol Hill, told reporters "I express regret" about the illegal drug use. "I think it's pretty obvious that kids should know you shouldn't even try it once," he said.

He declined to answer queries about times and places when he smoked marijuana.

"Oh, that's been dealt with," he said. "I think I'll leave it at that."

A White House statement said Thomas "took several puffs on a marijuana cigarette in college and perhaps once in law school. We view this matter as inconsequential."

Thomas graduated from Holy Cross College and then Yale Law School in 1974.

The White House disclosed his marijuana use in response to a Washington Post query. The announcement seemed to generate an entirely different reaction than the revelation four years ago that Supreme Court nominee Douglas Ginsburg had smoked marijuana while a law school professor.

They also praised Thomas for his candor in revealing his marijuana experimentation during routine FBI checks when he was picked by President Bush in 1989 to be a judge on the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals here.

Ginsburg's use of the drug was discovered by reporters looking into his background after his nomination.

The disclosure about Thomas "won't cost

him a single vote in the Senate," said Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., the primary Senate sponsor of the nomination.

Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., said after meeting with Thomas that the nominee's marijuana use "is no issue and it's of no consequence. Casual use was part of life in college" when Thomas was a student.

The senator said "more than half our Air Force pilots" who helped win the Persian Gulf War "would not be pilots today" if past marijuana use were a disqualification for military service.

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., said he is undecided on whether to support Thomas but said marijuana use will not be a factor.

"Other questions, such as Mr. Thomas' views on the fundamental right to privacy, will weigh far more heavily in my judgment on whether he should be confirmed," Cranston said.

DeConcini said Thomas seems qualified to sit on the high court, but he also said he was withholding final judgment until after Senate hearings on the nomination.

"I'm impressed with him," the senator said. "He has a lot of experience. He's a good writer. He's a conservative. That's positive as far as I'm concerned."

DeConcini, a moderate Democratic member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, is considered an influential swing vote on controversial judicial nominations. He played an important role in opposing conservative Robert H. Bork, defeated in 1987 when Reagan picked him to fill a high court vacancy.

After Bork's defeat in a bruising political battle, Reagan named Ginsburg as his second choice. When Ginsburg withdrew, Reagan turned to Anthony M. Kennedy, who won easy Senate confirmation to be a justice.

Judiciary Committee hearings for Thomas are due to begin in September.

From the beginning of the air war on Jan. 17 until the end of the ground war on Feb. 28, the U.S. military counts 148 deaths of troops killed in action and 458 wounded.

The 11 U.S. "friendly fire" deaths amount to about 7.5 percent of the deaths tallied from combat action.

The British count 24 deaths from combat action. Eleven of those were due to attacks from U.S. forces.

The Central Command, citing the continuing studies of the incidents, did not reveal names or many details.

The Marine Corps also cited ongoing investigations as the reason for not divulging additional information.

In past conflicts, the military has not broken out casualty figures for U.S. troops firing on their compatriots.

Here are the Gulf War "friendly fire" incidents, as reported Wednesday by the Central Command:

- Jan. 24. Two Marines were wounded when an Air Force A-10 strafed a Marine Corps Humvee and a 5-ton truck.
- Jan. 29. Seven Marines were killed by friendly fire when an Air Force A-10 fired a missile that hit a light armored vehicle during a clash with Iraqi forces.
- Feb. 2. A Marine lance corporal was killed and two Marines were wounded during an air attack at the battle for Khafji.
- Feb. 14. Three soldiers were wounded in a small arms exchange during urban clearing operations.
- Feb. 17. Two Army soldiers were killed when a Bradley fighting vehicle was struck by a missile fired from an AH-64 Apache helicopter. A ground surveillance vehicle was damaged in the incident and six soldiers were wounded.
- Feb. 24. A Marine was killed and two Marines were wounded when a missile struck a radar unit. A Marine Corps spokesman said the incident occurred near Al Wafes inside Kuwait.
- Feb. 26. Nine British soldiers died and 11 others were wounded when the armored vehicles in which they were riding were fired on by a U.S. Air Force A-10.
- Feb. 27. Two British soldiers were wounded when a U.S. armored vehicle fired on their tank.

## 'Friendly fire' deaths in gulf expected to rise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigations reveal that at least 20 allied soldiers died because of "friendly fire" incidents during the Persian Gulf War.

The number is expected to grow, U.S. military officials say, because many investigations are not complete.

"It won't be massive, but there will be more," said a senior Pentagon officer, who spoke about the incidents Wednesday on the condition of anonymity.

"Friendly fire" deaths or injuries result when forces mistakenly fire on their own troops.

Several incidents, including one on Jan. 29 in which 11 Marines died, have been under investigation for months by military officials.

In the most detailed description yet released, the U.S. Central Command has reported that 11 Americans and 9 British troops died in "friendly fire" incidents, while 15 U.S. troops and 13 British were wounded.

Four of the 11 deaths in the Jan. 29 incident remain under investigation as to whether they came from enemy or friendly fire, the source said.

"This is our best snapshot so far," said Capt. Jack Fouts, a spokesman for the command in

Tampa, Fla. "As more investigation is done, the numbers could change. ... This is something that certainly will receive lots of study."

From the beginning of the air war on Jan. 17 until the end of the ground war on Feb. 28, the U.S. military counts 148 deaths of troops killed in action and 458 wounded.

The British count 24 deaths from combat action. Eleven of those were due to attacks from U.S. forces.

The Central Command, citing the continuing studies of the incidents, did not reveal names or many details.

The Marine Corps also cited ongoing investigations as the reason for not divulging additional information.

In past conflicts, the military has not broken out casualty figures for U.S. troops firing on their compatriots.

### What's this? A politician being honest about doubts?

Seeing a politician put reason ahead of doctrine in a high-profile issue is a rare treat. That appears to be what Rep. Richard Stallings is trying to do in the "gag rule" debate.

The gag rule, in case you haven't kept up with the abortion controversy's hair-splitting minutiae, is a federal rule that bans abortion counseling by health-care facilities that receive federal funds.

It's a shining example of the push-me-pull-you style of policy making that only government can produce.

You see, under the separation of powers concept envisioned by our nation's founders, we have three independent arms of government, and each of them is all thumbs.

One of our arms, the Supreme Court, decreed in 1973 that women have a constitutional right to have abortions if they want them. But in the 1980s another arm, the administration, wanted to do everything it could to thwart women's attempts to exercise that right.

So it declared the gag rule: If you receive federal aid, don't say the "A-word."

Basically, even though pregnant women have a constitutional right to abortions, the government wants to keep that right a secret.

Amazingly, the first man recently declared that the second arm's bizarre rule was perfectly fine. So now the third arm, Congress, is thinking about passing a law to overturn the rule.

So much for the background. About

Stallings: The 2nd District's Democratic congressman is a well-known opponent of abortion. Except for being a Democrat (a loathsome species to most pro-lifers), his anti-abortion credentials are flawless.

But last week he said he is considering voting to overturn the gag rule. He is concerned, he said, that the rule will straitjacket rural health clinics and make health care harder to come by in some of Idaho's sparsely populated areas.

He wants to discuss the matter with pro-life physicians before voting, he said.

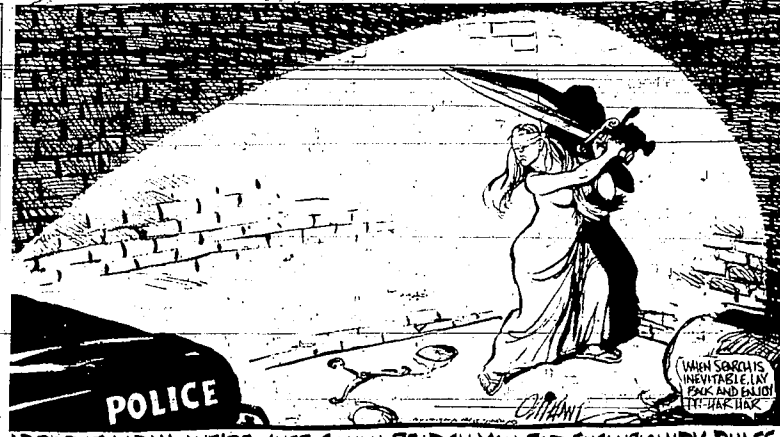
By even suggesting he might break with his pro-life comrades, Stallings is taking risks. The pro-life militia is notoriously harsh with deserters. A flirtation with disloyalty could hurt Stallings in next year's Senate race.

What's more, any politician who changes who his mind, or even shows symptoms of open-mindedness is always an easy target for charges of waffling.

When Stallings makes up his mind, there's good chance we'll disagree with him. But how he ultimately will vote is not the point.

We'd like to praise him in advance for entertaining doubts; for being honest about his uncertainty, and for trying to base his decision on reason instead of a pre-set ideology.

Politicians ought to behave this way more often.

### Carter's 'malaise speech' was prophetic

It seems like many more, but only a dozen years have passed since President Jimmy Carter appeared on national television and gave a remarkable speech.

The subject of Carter's talk on July 15, 1979, (a Tuesday) was the nation's oil shortage. His message, however, concerned the spiritual depletion in American political life.

A generous assessment of Carter's speech was that it didn't work. Meant to set the tone for his last year in office — and to pry it stuck presidency off high center — the speech failed in every respect.

Known as the "malaise speech" (though that word was not in the text) Carter's discussion of a national lack of faith and resolve was ridiculed by the press, by the Republicans and by detractors in Congress.

It was a measure of how correct Carter was in his assessment of the political landscape that his speech was so despised.

The fact is, if there has been one speech by a national politician that summed up what was missing in American public life, it was the address Carter made 12 years ago.

It's important to remember the context of the talk. Inflation, set off by high oil prices, was ripping the economy. Carter's legislative program had been crushed.

the nation's problems.

The nation's political debate, Carter began his speech, had "become increasingly narrow, focused more and more on what the isolated world of Washington thinks is important."

The people Carter talked with, the president said, were deeply dissatisfied with government.

"I feel so far from government," Carter quoted one woman. "I feel like ordinary people are excluded from political power. Another said, "Don't talk to us about policies or the mechanics of government, but about an understanding of our common good."

Carter came to certain conclusions, or so he said in his 1979 speech.

First, "all the legislation in the world can't fix what's wrong with America." There was a "fundamental threat to American democracy" and it was, Carter said, "a crisis of confidence ... Our people are losing that faith, not only in government itself but in the ability as citizens to serve as the ultimate rulers and shapers of our democracy."

The president went on to scold the country for worshipping "self-indulgence and consumption" and for a "growing disrespect" for government and religion.

"This is not a message of happiness or reassurance," Carter said, "but it is the truth and it is a warning."

Recent history tells us that Carter's

warning was wasted. The 1980s were a decade of "self-indulgence and consumption" for which our children will pay.

The scandal of the savings and loan industry (a \$500-billion-plus bill), the Wall Street rip-offs, the takeover mania that ruined ongoing businesses — this is what Carter was warning of in 1979.

Meanwhile, the "narrow" debate Carter complained of in 1979 has been reduced to a blip.

Congress' troubles in passing a budget last year and a civil rights bill this year — two pieces of compromise legislation with no direction and little meaning — have convinced citizens the national government is irresponsible when it is not irrelevant.

And the energy crisis has gone around and come around in a terrible and wasteful war in Iraq that is not over now and, it appears, never will be.

Much of the blame for Carter's defeat in 1979 traces back to this speech. The cocksureness of Reagan stood in such high and enviable contrast to the brooding and searching Carter. We picked the happy ending of Hollywood over the heat and dust of Plains, Co.

The defeat, however, was ours. We ridiculed a man who spoke the truth. We laughed at his piety. And, to our shame, we ignored his prophecy.

### Quitting the communist party difficult, but a relief

Last Wednesday I sent a short fax to Moscow to my Izvestia party cell to let them know that I was quitting the Communist Party of the Soviet Union.

I was a party member for almost 33 years. The decision to quit was painful but morally refreshing. Painful because so many years were wasted, refreshing because at last I severed my umbilical cord from this decomposing body.

Painful because my father was one of the founders of the Russian Bolshevik party; refreshing because my son quit the party ahead of me to help me transfer my life from the past to the future.

The fax meant my formal break with the party.

Here I prefer to omit a vivid description of communism's sins.

It would take too much space, and it would be self-serving and smell of self-justification — and nowadays everybody knows these eternal and ineluctable sins anyway. They are no enigmas and no secret anymore.

Spiritually, I was already out of party ranks after the 20th Congress in 1956, when Nikita Khrushchev denounced Stalin's crimes.

Why did I not quit then? For two main reasons. I maintained an honest delusion that the party could be reformed, and I was hesitantly afraid to challenge the mighty party apparatus.

After Mikhail Gorbachev pronounced perestroika, the fear disappeared, but the delusion remained. Gorbachev's perestroika replaced Leonid Brezhnev's stagnation, but soon it started to stagnate itself.

At that time, I at last shook off not only fear but delusion. But living abroad, I didn't feel myself ready to take the parting step with a clear conscience. My friends as well as enemies would say, "How courageous you are abroad! Come to Moscow and do it there."

After my son quit the party, my party membership became intolerable. How could I any longer poison my flesh and blood?

Chronologically, my break coincides with the announcement by a group of prominent Soviet politicians of the launch of the new Democratic Reform Movement. It would be hypocritical to claim that this event played no role in my decision, but it was not crucial. My relations with the leaders of the new movement are more personal than political.

Frankly, I highly appreciate their initiative, but I have some reservations. I don't think I understand why some main pillars of this emerging party, including Alexander Yakovlev, did not quit the party first.

Why does Yakovlev continue to be Gorbachev's principal adviser? The opportune explanation that he is principal adviser to President Gorbachev and not to General Secretary Gorbachev is too good to be true.

There is a real and obvious danger that the new party can become a Trojan horse of a Communist Party "with a human face," just as perestroika has become a Trojan horse for socialism "with a human face."

There is another reason that I am uncomfortable. Announcement of the new opposition movement was made under the shadow of the approaching G-7 meeting in London.

Everybody who follows developments in my country can easily establish the connection between the looming London summit and the feverish "progressive" activity of the Soviet power structure.

The parliament overwhelmingly approves the emigration law, the law that (at least on paper) breaks the government's monopoly on owning industrial enterprises, the law that allows foreigners to buy and completely own property and some others.

Gorbachev himself became so radical that he fell in love again with Grigory Yavlinsky's economic fantasy-land, struck a deal with his archenemy Boris Yeltsin and even declared a moratorium on his "socialist" rhetoric, and on insisting that he was both and will die a Communist.

Now I am asking an almost Hamlet-like question.

What happens if Gorbachev returns from London empty-handed? Despite the hardship my country now experiences, I would prefer no dramatic breakthrough in London, because the failure of this mission and its reverberations would be the best indication of how serious and profound our swing to the left is — toward democracy and a free market.

As for me, I like Gorbachev, was born a Communist, and unlike him, I now have a good chance not to die a Communist. After 33 years of my life and 33 years in the party, this is, I suppose, forgive my self-trouty quite a remarkable achievement.

people, placing tremendous strain on schools, law enforcement, roads and recreation. Weapons West would be located above the Snake River Plain Aquifer, which provides drinking water for a quarter of all Idahoans and is the lifeblood of southern Idaho's aqua- and agriculture.

What will Weapons West do to Idaho's environment?

The DOE continues to put production above all other concerns. The DOE's recent all-out efforts to restart Rocky Flats — even after the DOE has admitted it needs to be shut down — proves this. Rocky Flats has contaminated groundwater with strontium, cesium and cancer-causing chemicals.

Y-12 has released uranium into the air, radioactive and hazardous wastes into streams and thousands of tons of mercury and cesium into a nearby lake. While environmental impacts from Pantex are a mystery, we do know the "new" Pantex will be the storage site for radioactive materials from bombs. Meanwhile, the INEL will

continue to be a "temporary" storage site for tons of radioactive and hazardous waste — including waste from Weapons West and the New Production Reactor — with nowhere to go.

Are new bomb plants better than old bomb plants? No. Manufacturing nuclear bombs is inherently dangerous and unavoidably produces toxic materials. What Complex 21 really means is the old bombmakers running new bomb plants with the same old assumptions.

Proven future warhead requirements should be the determining factor in "reconfiguring" the DOE complex. We're negotiating treaties to eliminate nuclear weapons and spending billions at the same time to produce more.

Citizens must change the Reconfiguration Study from a blueprint for the next generation to a blueprint for a public referendum on our country's nuclear weapons policies and the relationship between nuclear weapons and real national security.

# Mormons stage annual extravaganza

PALMYRA, N.Y. (AP) — For 20 years in Hollywood, Rick Josephsen has blown up cars, exploded buildings and created earthquakes on the soundstages of movies "with multi-million dollar budgets.

This year, Josephsen is engineering the eruption of volcanoes, the reconstruction of Jesus, and the burning at the stake of a prophet — all in an outdoor, live theater, on-a-shooting-budget and with an unpaid staff of two dozen teen-agers.

"It's a little different for me, with no budget and no crew," Josephsen said in an interview this week, as cast members carrying bundles of wood scurried about behind him, getting ready to enact the execution of the Mormon prophet Abinadi.

Josephsen is technical director of the Hill Cumorah Pageant, the annual Mormon spectacle that is expected to draw more than 10,000 people each night during its seven-day run.

The show opens Friday night on a massive tiered stage on Hill Cumorah, the rural upstate

New York site where Mormons believe the prophet Joseph Smith discovered a set of gold plates in 1827 telling of Jesus' visit to ancient America.

According to Mormon tradition, Smith translated the plates into the Book of Mormon, a companion scripture to the Bible. The story of the Book of Mormon is told in the Hill Cumorah Pageant, now in its 54th year at the Palmyra site.

The show is put together in less than a week by 600 cast members from all over the country and Canada. The performers lip-synch to a score recorded by professional actors, with music by the Utah Symphony, the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and the Salt Lake City Youth Chorus.

Jerry Argetsinger, the director of the pageant, is a drama professor and part-time professional magician with a particular fondness for special effects.

New to this year's show is an erupting volcano designed by Josephsen and an added aerial flight

by the actor portraying Jesus: A storm in the opening scene features a ship sail that rips in the wind and showers of rain piped through the top of the mast.

As always, the pageant promises glittering, exotic costumes and an extensive sound and light show.

"If we did this show on Broadway, this would probably be a \$12 million to \$15 million production," Argetsinger said. But because there are no labor costs, the pageant cost only a fraction of that when it was restaged in 1988, and now costs well under \$500,000 each year, he said.

Josephsen, a former special effects specialist for Disney Studios, donated about six weeks of his time to work on the pageant. The financial loss is well worth it, he said.

"When the pageant music starts to play, it says, 'This was worth it,'" he said. "Your eyes swell and you get this feeling: 'I'm doing the right thing.'"

## Agencies will decide on needle exchange program

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — The state Board of Health will let its individual members decide whether to support a controversial Spokane County needle-exchange program intended to curb the spread of AIDS.

By taking a noncommittal approach, the board tipped around a warning from a state assistant attorney general that the panel should not get involved in a lawsuit challenging Spokane's program.

The program allows intravenous drug users to exchange used syringes for clean ones handed out by county health workers. Sharing contaminated

needles is one way that the AIDS virus can be spread.

Spokane County's program is being challenged in an appeal before the state Supreme Court. The high court's ruling could determine the fate of similar programs in Clark, King and Pierce counties.

At a meeting Wednesday in Yakima, the state health board decided to allow members to individually sign their names to a list of friends of the county who favor keeping the Spokane County program open.

The state attorney general's office last month warned the board against adding itself to the list.

## Measure containing proposal to return wolves 'non-starter'

Draft legislation that would put a federal committee's plan for the return of wolves to Yellowstone National Park into law was never meant to be introduced, according to officials with Wyoming's congressional delegation.

The bill drafted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Interior Department had been requested by Jim O'Rourke, a member of Sen. Malcolm Wallop's Energy and Natural Resources Committee staff.

However, officials in Wallop's office said the Republican has never seen the bill and has no immediate intention to sponsor such legislation.

"The bottom line is Malcolm has not decided if he is going to intro-

duce a bill," said Janis Budge, Wallop's press secretary. "And when he does decide, the Interior Department will not draft it, the committee will."

The Wolf Management Committee is recommending that wolves be returned to Yellowstone on the condition that they be considered members of an "experimental, non-essential" species if they leave the park.

By removing the animals from the Endangered Species List once they leave the park, states surrounding the park would be able to control the animals.

The plan has already been rejected by one congressional committee, which has instead asked the Interior Department to conduct an ongoing mental impact statement on returning the wolves to Yellowstone.

## County seeks 'fanatic' for pollution-control job

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Spokane County officials say they are looking for a fanatic to oversee their pollution-control agency.

At the county Air Pollution Control Authority board meeting Wednesday, member John McBride listed the qualities being sought in applicants to head the organization. In addition to being a negotiator,

leader, coalition-builder and communicator, McBride said, the person should be "a non-smoker who constantly breathes."

County Commissioner Pat Mumme then added, "This guy can have all these godlike qualities," but he also has to be absolutely committed to clean air.

"A fanatic?" McBride asked.

"A fanatic," Mumme said.

The position was vacated last month when Fred Gray resigned. The agency serves as both watchdog and regulator to make sure businesses and residents comply with state and federal clean-air laws. The \$55,000 job was advertised throughout the West and a list of applicants has been narrowed to seven.

## Vet's alibi: Hunting deer, not stealing appliances

TWIN FALLS — Veterinarian David Stafford testified Thursday that he was hunting 20 miles north of Stanley on the day he allegedly stole a client's microwave oven in Twin Falls.

Stafford took the stand Thursday for the first time to present his defense with detailed answers in a strong voice. He said he was walking the mountains looking for deer, not breaking into a client's house.

Stafford's trial should conclude today. He is charged with burglary and aggravated assault.

The charges stem from incidents in late 1989.

Prosecutors say he broke into a client's house on Halloween 1989 and left with a microwave he later

Painted a different color. The client was behind on her bills, according to court testimony.

But Stafford said he left Twin Falls at 4 a.m. to go north on that Halloween. He hunted until about 2 p.m., then stopped to treat some horses at a Sawtooth Valley ranch.

He also stopped at a Bellevue ranch to treat another horse before returning home at 7 p.m. — a memorable day because he missed a Halloween party he was supposed to attend with his wife and children.

She wasn't too happy, Stafford said.

And Stafford said the microwave was given to him by Joann Adams, Adams is the prosecution's main witness.

Adams was Stafford's employee, and testified that she took Stafford to the former client's house. She let Stafford out of the car in front of the Ash Street house, and drove around behind the house.

Stafford came out the back door with the microwave oven, Adams said.

## Senators hear Snake River woes

ON A BUS SOMEWHERE IN THE MAGIC VALLEY — Everyone admitted the pollution problem in the Middle Snake River, but no one accepted responsibility.

On a bus tour to fish hatcheries, agricultural processing plants and dairies on Thursday, state Senate Republicans heard over and over of the Snake River's woes. Everyone pointed fingers to a cause, but everyone agreed new regulations are not the solution.

"Water quality problems are immense in this area and the Snake River is not the problem. It's the symptom," Gooding County commissioner and tour guide Bob Muffley told the crew as they headed down the canyon to Niagara Springs and Crystal Springs Lake.

Muffley sits on a four-county study group working to identify pollution problems and solutions for the Middle Snake River.

Sediment from agriculture, aquaculture and irrigation return flows in water that is stagnant from hydropower development and drought conditions has created "biological disaster," he said. City sewer discharge also contributes to the river and its overload of nutrients.

At the Clear Springs Trout Co., where senators saw a 500-pound sturgeon and donned hair nets to tour the fish processing plant, director of technical services Dave Erickson said the aquaculture industry is "being singled out" as the troublemaker.

The industry is regulated by the federal Environmental Protection Agency and monitors nutrients in the river, he said, and it's "premature" to layer on additional regulations at the state level.

Other industries should be regulated first, and better enforcement of existing regs is needed, he said.

"We haven't had as good cooperation from the aquaculture people at this time," Muffley said. "They're trying to push it off on the dairies. The biggest problem is trying to convince them there is a problem."

Bob Ohlenschelen, Twin Falls County livestock agriculture Extension agent, defended the 576 dairies in the area, saying they reuse their water and sediment on pastures and don't send any runoff into the river.

"Water is just as important to them as it is to anybody out there and they're doing a good job," Ohlenschelen said. "Some of these things are getting blown out of proportion."

He said federal law prohibits dairies from discharging anything into canals or the river, so dairies aren't the problem — "assuming they're all in compliance." Enough regulations are in place, enforcement is the problem, he said.

But Ohlenschelen admitted that a few bad apples may discharge pollutants into the river, giving both the dairy and fish industries a bad rap.

"We're really just beginning to find out," he said.

## Judge quashes some evidence in Odiaga case

HAILEY — Mitchell John Odiaga is scheduled for trial July 22 in the drive-by shootings of two men in Ketchum last year, but the presiding judge has ruled some of his statements made to police are inadmissible.

Odiaga, 36, Boise, is charged with two counts of first-degree murder in connection with the June 22, 1990, shooting deaths of Gerald "Shenandoah" Wright of Ketchum and Bruce Tate Schafer of Burley. A third man was shot at in his car, but ducked before the bullet hit.

Fifth District Judge James May ruled last week that some statements Odiaga made to police were gathered

in violation of his constitutional rights.

Brian Elkins, a public defender representing Odiaga, filed a series of motions this spring to disallow his client's statements and physical evidence at trial.

Odiaga — In a 46-page opinion

criticized how several law enforcement officers handled the questioning of Odiaga after he walked into a police road block near Galena Summit, carrying a rifle, the morning after the slayings.

May ruled Odiaga's initial statements were voluntary. But Idaho State Police trooper Roger Rockwell then asked Odiaga if he had been involved in a vehicle accident and what kind of car he was driving, the ruling said.

"These expressed questions by the law enforcement officials were questions that the officer should have known were likely to elicit incriminating evidence from the defendant," May wrote.

After police advised Odiaga of his rights, he asked to talk "to an attorney," Rockwell testified earlier. The Blaine County prosecutor's office argued that because Odiaga did not name a specific attorney, police could continue to interrogate him, wrote May, who called such a reason "fallacious."

"The response of law enforcement officials, i.e., that the defendant had not disclosed with particularity which attorney he would like to speak with makes mockery of the defendant's rights under the federal and state system," the judge said.

May also wrote Elkins tried to alert police he was the county's public defender for the month of June 1990. In addition, the day Odiaga was arrested, Elkins appeared at the Ketchum Police Department and asked to speak to the defendant, but was twice denied access.

"There is no excuse for the law enforcement community's failure to notify Mr. Elkins if they wished to continue interrogating the defendant after he said that he wanted an attorney," May wrote.

As a result, the statements the alleged killer made to Blaine County Sheriff Walt Felling, Ketchum Police Chief Cal Nevland and other officers, are

"Kerrigan made no other comment during the five-minute hearing

Thursday before 6th District Magistrate William Woodland.

Woodland told Kerrigan he faces a maximum of 45 years in prison and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Kerrigan is scheduled to be sentenced here on Aug. 16 at 9:30 a.m. He was returned to the Bingham County Jail in Blackfoot, while he has been held since June 17.

Kerrigan was arrested in southwestern Oneida County on June 16, the day after Hobbs was shot four times while making a routine traffic stop on I-84, two miles northwest of the Utah-Idaho border.

Hobbs survived, and is expected to be released from McKay-Dee Medical Center in Ogden, Utah, soon.

Investigators have not found the 9mm pistol they believe was used in the shooting.

# Judge tells abortion foes to drop their pseudonyms in Utah case

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)**—Three women used the names Liberty, Freedom and Spouse in their challenge of Utah's restrictive abortion-law. They will have to choose neutral pseudonyms, a federal judge ruled Thursday.

The decision came in the *Mess* hearing on the lawsuit, backed by the American Civil Liberties Union, which seeks to reverse the law on constitutional grounds.

The three lead plaintiffs called themselves Jane Liberty, Jane Spouse and Jane Freedom. They oppose the new law and existing statutes requiring a woman to notify her spouse before an abortion and forbidding use of experimental medicine on the unborn.

The laws are not being enforced pending resolution of the lawsuit. In granting the state's motion to strike the names, U.S. District Judge Thomas Greene said the women should choose names that preserve their anonymity but do not "sensationalize or make a statement" on the case outside the courtroom.

The names, he said, "apparently put the state of Utah against righteousness... liberty and all those good things."

ACLU attorney Janet Banstorf said she would have to consult her clients to decide on new pseudonyms.

In other matters, Greene refused a

plaintiff's motion to split the trial into two parts, the first to consider whether the new law's language is unconstitutionally vague and the second on remaining issues.

He took another decision that would certify the suit as a class action, but permitted addition of the Utah chapter of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists as a plaintiff.

The law bans abortions except in cases of reported or incest, or if the fetus "has deformities or if the pregnancy poses a grave threat to the mother's life or health."

In arguing for a split trial, Banstorf said words such as "grave" would hobble physicians because they would have no way of knowing precisely what the terms mean.

Thus, a doctor who performed an abortion could be subject to a criminal charge if a prosecutor did not agree his professional judgment matched the letter of the law, she said.

The law provides for a three-degree felony, punishable by up to five years in prison for a physician who performs an illegal abortion.

But Calvin R. Rampton, a former Utah governor and attorney hired by the state to defend the law, says the phrase "professional judgment" protected doctors and implied a good faith immunity from prosecution.

He also said the question should be considered in the context of the entire challenge, and that splitting the trial would lead to needless delays as well as piecemeal resolution of some issues at the expense of others.

"You can't describe vagueness in a vacuum," Rampton said.

As for the class-action request, the ACLU wants to represent all women who might seek medical advice, pregnancy options, medical treatment during pregnancy or abortions "precluded by the statutory scheme."

Banstorf said certification was necessary because pregnant plaintiffs either will have obtained an abortion or given birth by the time of trial, which is expected to begin early next year.

If that were the case, more pregnant women, meaning those with legal standing to challenge the law, constantly would have to be added as plaintiffs, she said.

Defense attorney D. Miles Holman said the state would agree not to try to eliminate such plaintiffs on grounds their claims were moot.

He also said that because the plaintiffs were seeking a declaratory judgment on the law's constitutionality as well as an injunction against it, any potential members of the class would be covered.

# Cassia County high schools to receive satellite equipment

**BURLEY**—Three Cassia County high schools have received telecommunication grants. The three schools — Rath River, Delta and Oakley — will receive approximately \$15,000 worth of satellite equipment from the grants, given through a Northwest partnership called "Star Schools."

Star Schools is a partnership formed by the states of Alaska, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Washington. It was formed to meet rural educational needs in the Northwest through telecommunication.

In May, this partnership submitted a grant application to the U.S. Department of Education's Star Schools program. That application led to a \$5,049,000 grant award.

This money then became available to rural schools in Cassia County. The grants are supported by the U.S. Congress, through the Department of Education.

Each of the three schools in Cassia County will receive a satellite receiver and dish, a computer with

software, and a scanner with a modem. Assistant Superintendent Jerry Doggett said the district hopes to have the equipment up and running by Sept. 3.

A second grant will provide \$9,500 to the school. "With this money we will purchase the rest of the equipment such as physical education and membership fees," Doggett said. "This will make it so that there is no cost to the district at this time. The cost will come when we bring in credit classes."

Doggett gave the example of a foreign language class that costs \$650 per student, per credit, for a total of \$4,400 for a class of 30 students, but we will be working with the state department and others to come up with ways to fund the programs," Doggett said.

He said the schools will be getting things ready, provide teacher inservices and work with the system to find the best ways to use the equipment during the first year.

He said that with the system, a teacher from Delta might teach a class to students in Rath River, without even leaving the classroom.

"It's going to be great for the outlying schools," Doggett said.

# Prosecutor moves to close court records on Ammon death case

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — Bonneville County Prosecutor Kimball Mason is asking the courts to throw out the public records about the death of an Ammon man, saying the information they hold could endanger those involved in the case.

"We have information in these records, some of which could subject certain persons to certain risks," Mason said at a Wednesday court hearing on the death of Danny Disney.

His wife, Jeannie, 33, and 17-year-old Michael Boe, 17, were charged with first-degree murder, using a firearm to commit a crime and conspiracy to commit murder. Disney's body was found in his bed on June 23, Mrs. Disney notified police and said the death was caused by a self-inflicted gunshot wound. But authorities' evidence at the home did not bear out her statements.

The two have pleaded innocent in the death and are scheduled for a December trial.

Mason filed 7th District Magistrate Linda Cook wanted a court order to prevent the Post Register newspaper from publishing information it already obtained, including that already published in accounts.

He said he received calls from several attorneys who said details gleaned from the court records by the newspaper would endanger their clients.

Also, the prosecutor charged release of tape recordings of hearings where warrants for Mrs. Disney and Boe were issued will hamper an investigation still being conducted.

The Post Register and KIFI-TV requested access to the tapes to report the case to the public. Cook delayed a decision on the Post Register's request, saying she will inform the attorneys when she rules.

Book's attorney, Steven Thompson, said people who may have facts that would assist his client may not top forward if the case is heavily publicized, fearing their identities will be spotlighted.

# PUC slaps railroad with \$13,000 penalty

**BOISE (AP)** — Union Pacific Railroad has been assessed a \$13,000 civil penalty for failure to maintain a local prevention program in Parma, Idaho. The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has ruled.

In the mid-1980s, the railroad asked to shut down all of its one-man freight offices in Idaho and first transfer their function to Idaho Falls, Nampa, Pocatello and Spokane, and then to a computerized center in St. Louis.

The PUC resisted that trend toward "absentee stewardship" and ordered the railroad to keep open all of its Idaho agencies, as well as reopen the Parma site.

The commission contends the railroad did not operate a Parma office from December 1989 to February 1991. Employees did not come to closing the office, but it had substituted a four-person management team from Nampa and Boise to provide better service to shippers than a Parma employee.

Union Pacific's argument misses the mark, the PUC said. Under Idaho law, failure to comply with a commission order can result in a civil penalty of up to \$2,000 for each day the order is violated. Rather than impose the maximum of \$2,000 daily, or a total of \$800,000, the PUC instead assessed \$2,000 for each month the railroad did not operate in Parma and then cut that \$26,000 in half.

The \$2,000-per-month civil penalty should be tempered by the railroad's actions to provide Parma-area shippers with substitute service by its management team," it said.

The commission said the \$13,000 penalty "should not unduly burden a company such as Union Pacific with gross intrastate annual revenues of more than \$2 billion."

# Sidewalk project costs more than planned

GOODING — A sidewalk improvement project will cost the Gooding School District about \$26,000 more than originally planned.

The additional expense is to widen the street in front of Gibbons Elementary School.

Superintendent James Cobble said at the School Board meeting Tuesday.

He advised the trustees to "bite the bullet" and approve the expanded project to make the school's traffic area safer.

This will be money well spent if it prevents even one accident, Cobble said.

For a long time, he said, the district has dealt with a "less-than-ideal situation."

Trustees approved the project, which will be a joint project with the city of Gooding.

In addition to seal coating the street area, a light pole, a street pole and a fire hydrant must be moved.

Old sidewalks in front of the elementary and middle schools will be removed and replaced with new sidewalks, curbs and gutters.

A new sewer drainage system will be installed and paid for by the city.

Trustees accepted the low bid of \$50,759 from Pieszen Construction Co. of Gooding for the school district's share of the improvements.

"This is quite a little more project than just a sidewalk," Cobble said.

He noted that the school may receive some state funding to help pay for the project.

In other business, Trustees Claire Major and Craig Muchow were sworn in for three-year terms. Major was re-elected as chairman of the board and Mitch Arkosh was named vice-chairman.

The board reappointed Lois Loucks as clerk-treasurer. Cathy Thompson as payroll clerk and the law firm of Hobbey and Hobbey as the district's legal counsel.

The School Board's meeting time was set again for the second Tuesday of each month at 8 a.m. Public notice of meetings will be posted at the administration office and at the elementary school.

Expressing much regret, the trustees accepted the resignation of second-grade teacher Anne Green who was selected over 38 other applicants for a teaching job in Libby, Montana.

"Gooding will be worse off because Anne is leaving us," Cobble said. Green taught in Gooding for two years.

The trustees voted to hire Todd Monet as music instructor for the middle and high schools. Monet is from Lewiston and he replaces John Priest who resigned to accept a teaching job in Utah.

Cobble said the district still has six job openings to fill for teachers and aides. Also, he said, the high school principal position is still open. "We'll probably make a decision in the next few days on that," Cobble said.

# DOE plan to waive safety rules draws fire

Stello said the DOE is not able to meet its requirements at Rocky Flats, it will seek waivers known as "compliance schedule approvals" or CSAs. A CSA acknowledges safety regulations will not be met when operations resume, but lists compensatory measures that will be taken until the regulations can be met.

In some instances, Stello argued that the orders, or standards, be changed.

"DOE orders may be modified if the orders do not permit better and perhaps a safer way to do things," he told the Defense-Nuclear Facilities Safety Board, a board set up by Congress to monitor the nation's defense nuclear plants including Rocky Flats. "One has to question if the order is in need of repair."

John Convery, head of the Defense Nuclear Facilities Safety Board, said in an interview with The Associated Press that he disagrees with the way DOE and officials at Rocky Flats have handled DOE orders.

"We think they may have missed the point on a few things," Convery said.

# Bogus bills send escort to police

NAMPA (AP) — Police on Thursday were investigating allegations from a professional escort that a client cheated her out of \$198 by paying his \$200 bill with a pair of \$1 bills altered to look like \$100s.

The 22-year-old woman said it was so dark when she accepted payment for the two-hour date with the 25-year-old man that she did not notice a full pair had been used to add two zeros behind the ones to make the bill look like \$100s.

She admitted having sex with the client but said it was her choice and not part of her job.

Police declined to release the name of either the man or woman.

After discovering the deception, the woman returned to the residence where she said the date occurred, smashed the windshield of a red pickup truck and confronted a couple inside the house, demanding money, police said. She said the man she had escorted was no longer at the house.

After being questioned by police on leaving the residence, the woman filed charges against her client for failing to pay his bill.

Local authorities did not charge her in connection with the confrontation at the residence, but did put her on an unrelated outstanding warrant for writing bad checks.

China halts driftnet fishing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Chinese government said Thursday it has ordered all vessels under its flag to halt driftnet fishing because of growing international opposition to the environmentally destructive practice.

Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., said the move was the "first step in a long, tough battle to completely stop high seas drifting."

But skeptics said it was more a sign of China's desire to maintain preferred trading status with the United States than a response to concerns about the dangers of the 30-mile nets, which indiscriminately kill fish and marine mammals.

The Chinese Ministry of Agriculture confirmed its ban on high seas driftnets in a telegram to U.S. Ambassador to Beijing, Assistant Secretary of State Janet Mullins said.

Mullins disclosed the action in a letter to Packwood, who is pushing legislation that would force President Bush to levy trade sanctions on compressing driftnets.

## Defending champ a slow starter

FORT WORTH, Texas — Betsy King got away to a stumbling start in her bid for an unprecedented third consecutive U.S. Women's Open championship Thursday while steady Pat Bradley took the first round lead, with 2-under 69 over the sun-baked greens of Colonial Country Club.  
King started bogey-bogey before making eagle on the par-5, 460-yard third hole when she chipped in from 20 yards out. She bogeyed three more holes to finish at 74, three over and five shots behind Bradley, the 1981 Open champion.  
"I might have been a little nervous at the start," King said. "I guess my position is not too bad but it's not up there like I want it to be. I am playing well enough to do something."  
King took 33 putts and blamed the greens, calling them "too slow. They watered four greens in front of us and once watered the green with the balls sitting there."  
She also blasted the pin positions, saying "on a couple of pins you could have let all the USGA staff hit and I would give \$1,000 for anyone who could get within 10 feet of the pin." King added "the course is playing hard. Two-under might be a pretty good score by Sunday."  
Three others have tried and failed to win three consecutive women's Opens, Hottis Stacy, Donna Caponi, and Mickey Wright.  
The 40-year-old Bradley conquered devilish, gusting winds by hitting 17 of 18 greens. A bunkered 6-iron on the 10th hole led to her only bogey.  
She had birdie puts of 8, 6, and 4 feet in what she called "one of the best opening rounds I've ever had in the Open. Not too shabby."  
Bradley, who got a headache after playing in the baking 96-degree Texas sun, said "patience was a tremendous virtue out there. The greens were chopped up and there weren't a lot of putts to be made."  
Known as a slow starter, Bradley said she liked her spot at the top. "My past history is coming from behind but I'll take my position," said Bradley, winner of 27 tour events.  
Meg Mallon, who won the LPGA Championship two weeks ago, shot 1-under par 70 along with Laurel Kean and Joan Pitecock. "I'm still tired from two weeks ago," Mallon said. "My putting kept me in the game. That was a grind out there."

## Alzado's ex-wife paints different picture of Lyle

NEW YORK — Cynthia Alzado knows what people will think. They will call her a vengeful ex-wife — she doesn't care.  
The sun shined down on the tiny backyard of her Cedarhurst, Long Island, condominium Wednesday as her mood swung from regret to relief to rage. She had known Lyle Alzado since she was a teen-ager and classmate at Lawrence High School. They had lived together for 3 1/2 years before marrying in 1985.  
The relationship and 15-month marriage was carried out in the fast lane. It was filled with violence. She said living with

Alzado was both "heaven and hell." She spoke of beatings Alzado administered and of his drastic mood swings. She vividly remembers how her ex-husband first took steroids orally before injecting them. Yes, she remembers injecting him with the juice herself.  
Those memories pale in comparison to the plight of her son, 9-year-old Justin, Lyle Alzado's only child. As Alzado battles brain cancer, his second wife is appalled by what she calls the father's lack of caring for his son. Last week, she saw Lyle being interviewed by ESPN's Roy Firestone. Up to that point, she suppressed her feelings about what she called

Alzado's refusal to take a financial stake in his son's future. She alleges he has missed child support (\$1,500 per month) and alimony payments (\$1,000 per month) for 18 months, but now he was dying.  
"How can you pressure him during a time like this?" she said.  
But when she saw the interview, she snapped.  
"The thing that made me wild was seeing him beg for money during the interview," she said. "Why should anyone help him? He doesn't help his own child. He's broke now. What about when he wasn't broke?"  
Why wasn't something set up for this

child? Why doesn't this child have the home he deserves? Forget about the "don't matter. Why wasn't something provided for his own flesh and blood?"  
Alzado's representative, Greg Campbell, had no comment.  
Reports have indicated Alzado needs the money to pay his doctor bills. Cynthia Alzado doesn't dispute that, but she wonders why Lyle didn't provide for his son when he had money. Before she began living with him, Cynthia, 42, owned her own hair-cutting salon. Now, she provides for her son "week to week" by cutting hair, doing waitress work and "anything else that will keep us above water."

Winston Churchill once called democracy "the worst form of government except all those other forms that have been tried from time to time." The same might be said of college football's new postseason system.

But it's better than the current postseason mess, and it improves the chances of having a clear-cut national championship game each Jan. 1. Like the League of Nations, it's a little shaky. But unlike the League of Nations, I think it can work. ESPN's Beano Cook said of the alliance between four major bowls (Cotton, Sugar, Orange and Fiesta), two conferences (Big East and Atlantic Coast) and Notre Dame.  
Under the agreement, which takes effect in the 1992 season, the champions of the Southwest, Southeastern and Big Eight conferences will continue to get automatic bids to the Cotton, Sugar and Orange bowls.  
Whichever of those bowls has the highest-ranked team would then choose the most attractive opponent from a "free-ent" pool, which will include Notre Dame, the champions of the Big East and ACC and two highly-ranked at-large teams.  
If, for instance, Nebraska is No. 1 and Notre Dame is No. 2 in the final regular-season poll, they would meet for the national title in the Orange Bowl.  
The Orange would automatically get Big Eight champion Nebraska and then be able to select the top-ranked team in the pool, which in this case would be Notre Dame.

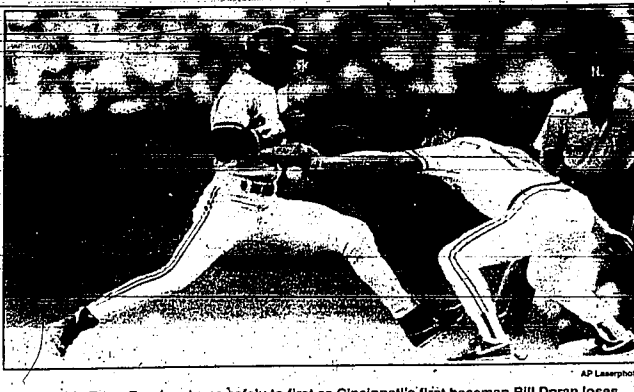

# UNLV officials will present case to NCAA in September

LAS VEGAS (AP) — UNLV officials will meet with the NCAA Infractions Committee in Boston in September to argue their case in a battle over 35 alleged violations by the school's high jumper, Brad Brooke, said a University legal official. Brooke said the school had been told to appear Sept. 27. "We will be ready to go," he said. Brooke said Wednesday.

A prehearing is scheduled in August with the NCAA enforcement staff, Brooke said at that time it will be decided which of the 35 alleged violations will be heard by the committee in September.

Brooke said no date has been set for the prehearing, which is likely to be held at NCAA offices in Overland Park, Kan. Brooke said such meetings are normally about a month before the meeting with the Infractions Committee.

The university was hit in December with a letter of inquiry citing 29 violations, many of them centering in the recruitment of New York City prep star Lloyd Daniels, Daniels was arrested in a drug bust in February 1987 and never played for UNLV.

Since the original letter of inquiry, additional charges have been added, the most recent involving the recruitment of California high school standout Ed O'Bannon. O'Bannon made a verbal commitment to attend UNLV, then backed out when the "Runnin' Rebels" were penalized in a final resolution to a 14-year battle between the NCAA and Rebel coach Terry Turkman.

The NCAA Infractions Committee first ruled that the Rebels, national champions in 1990, could not stand for him in 1991. The committee later amended the penalty and allowed the Rebels into post season play in 1991, with the understanding they would not appear on television or in post season competition next season. The Rebels were undefeated until losing in the Final Four, 79-77, to Duke, the eventual national champion.

Turkman announced last month he would quit after next season. The move was prompted by continued problems in the Rebel program, including the publication of a photo of three former players in a hot tub with convicted sports fixer Richard Perry. Turkman said he repeatedly warned his players to stay away from Perry, who now lives in Las Vegas.

Rembert, 24, missed a Wednesday appointment with Wyche, and the coach hasn't talked to him since. Rembert did not return a phone call to his house Thursday. "I haven't seen him in three weeks," Wyche said. "I spent a lot of time with him early in the off-season encouraging him, but at some point you have to take it upon yourself to put the key in the ignition and drive down to work."

Woods finished his nine-week treadmill program this week by running a 4.45 40-yard dash, the fastest of his pro career.

Receiver Hassan Jones underwent arthroscopic knee surgery for a small cartilage tear and is expected to miss the beginning of training camp, which starts July 22.

Finally, Knicks spokesman John Cirillo interjected, "Let's talk about something else now." The Knicks have said all they are going to say on Ewing.







One munchkin has the chicken pox. A jitterbug has a mandatory drivers training meeting the night of the performance and an Emerald City beauty forgot her hair bow - again.

It's rehearsal night for the JUMP Co. Opening night is a week away, and director Robin McCracken is ready to handle it all.

"Will he still be contagious by Saturday?" "Tell them you have a PERFORMANCE!" and "Just don't forget tomorrow night!" are her replies.

With patience stronger than a kindergarten teacher, she somehow transforms 165 kids into a magical production of "The Wizard of Oz."

It's not easy. Tote won't run off the stage on cue and when McCracken turns her back to consult with

her husband Dennis about the music, one actress can't help but tell another about the actor she's in love with. All the while, Dorothy is practicing her solo.

"It's amazing that I can talk and listen at the same time isn't it?" McCracken says.

Yet the trials of each practice haven't gotten to her yet.

"The frustration is there," she says, "but the exhilaration of watching them all perform makes up for it."

"When I first saw 104 munchkins in bright-colored costumes, I just bawled and I've seen it so many times."

She teaches these children, the lessons of the theater, how to perform for an audience, how to sing at the right pitch and how to be confident.

Her wit makes it fun for the entire group.

"If a munchkin walks on stage in the middle of

your number and throws up, make sure you stay in character."

Everyone laughs, but the point is made. The next time through the scene no one drops out of character. And when someone forgets his lines, she's quick to discipline.

"One more time and you owe me a 12-pack of Diet Coke," she teases.

Through it all, she gains the respect of her actors and actresses.

"Robin has taught us everything," actor Chad Bounous of Twin Falls, said. "How to be energetic and creative and to not just act like the characters but to be the characters."

More important may be that she is teaching them about life.

"She taught us a lot about ourselves," actor Michael Rowe of Twin Falls, said. "In fact she turns into our mother over the summer."

## Quilter can't quite believe she's a national winner

When Shirley Kraus of Paul heard she was the grand prize winner of the national House of Fabrics/So Fro Fabrics Seasons Greetings Quilt contest she sat in disbelief, thinking someone was teasing her.

In desperation, the House of Fabric representative described the quilt hanging in an effort to convince Kraus that she was the winner.

"I still not totally convinced that she had won the contest and its \$1,500 award, Kraus called the company and asked for a list of winners two weeks later. This time she believed when her name headed the list.

Kraus worked on the 46-by-46 inch wall hanging, titled Festival, from September of 1990 until March of this year.

The Baltimore Albums-style basket is filled with holly leaves and berries. Surrounding the basket is a fringe of red and gold fabric. Asymmetrical stars fill the corners, enhanced with stipple quilting.

The original design came together from other quilting projects, Kraus said.

"The basket isn't like anything I have ever seen," she said. "But I don't think there is anything really original."

Kraus credits her winning entry with an unusual use and redesign of old patterns to make a new one.

The visual impact of the quilt is important to Kraus and she spent hours laying out the design in paper until she found the exact look she was striving for.

"That's how I work," she said, "if it looks good."

The quilt judging was 40 percent for visual impact, 20 percent on use of color and 40 percent on workmanship.

The visual distance for judging was 10 feet. That became a dominant factor in the design.

Kraus a professional seamstress for 14 years when her children were young, began quilting ten years ago. The only sewing she does now is related to her quilting.

Curiosity enticed her into the world of quilting.

"I just picked up a magazine," Kraus said. "I'm self-taught. My mom quilted when she was first married, but not when I was growing up."

Kraus is a member of the Mt. Harrison Quilting Guild.

As a Guild project, she helped make a number of small quilts for the Ronald McDonald House in Boise.

When Shirley's husband, Ruben, needed emergency open heart surgery, she had no time to go home to get anything to take with her. She followed the ambulance to Boise.

With no place to stay and worried about her husband, she went to the Ronald McDonald House.

She opened the closet in her room to find one of the Guild's quilts, one that she had set-together.

"I knew everything was going to be all right then," she said.

Kraus has a number of wall hangings in the Burke Care Center.

"I try to have people enjoy them," Kraus said.

Kraus's family is a true quilting family. Her mother has taken up quilting again and Shirley's granddaughter, Erica, is working on a pieced-quilt.

"I try to do something different each time," Kraus said.

"It's good for me. It makes me grow and try new things and branch out into something different."

Kraus's motto?

"Do and do and do. Look and look and look."

## Sides resolve dispute over home recording

**NEW YORK (AP)** — A dispute between the music and electronics industries over the payment of royalties for digital home recording devices has been resolved, experts familiar with the agreement said this week.

The royalty money would go to the music industry, which has long demanded compensation for the near-perfect copies of compact discs and digital tapes that the new equipment can create.

The agreement, if it becomes law, could lead to growth in the key market for home digital tape decks by spurring the release of more prerecorded tapes by big artists.

Eventually, it could lower the cost of digital recording devices once companies offer more digital equipment.

Unlike conventional analog equipment, which produces "distortions" such as "hiss" on tapes, digital equipment records in distortion-free computer language.

"This could lead to a boom because what equipment is being sold," said David Lachenbruch, vice president of Warner Publishing Inc., publisher of Audio-Week newsletter. CDs also are based on computer

language, but they cannot be recorded at home with current technology.

Digital tape machines were introduced in the United States last year by Japan's Sony Corp., but haven't met sales expectations because of their high cost and the lack of prerecorded tapes to play on them. Record companies have been reluctant to make prerecorded tapes without receiving compensation for homemade copies.

The accord could lead to a flood of music on the new-format tapes, which could spur the market for the equipment, industry experts say.

Consumer electronics makers had long resisted paying royalties. But early last month the manufacturers,

represented by the Electronic Industries Association of Washington, agreed to negotiate the compromise. "It is time for this digital recording stalemate to be broken," Gary Shapiro, a vice-president of the trade group, said in a statement issued at the time.

The compromise was included in a draft of copyright legislation to be proposed to Congress. Under the agreement, a 2- to 3 percent royalty would be levied on the manufacturer of digital audio recording equipment, and 5 percent on blank tapes or recordable digital discs, said Lachenbruch of Audio Week, which obtained a copy of the draft legislation.

The legislation provides for a minimum \$1 royalty and maximum of \$8 on single-deck tape machines, and \$12 maximum on dual-deck tape recorders, he said.

"Consumers and retailers would not see the levy directly since it would be added before the products reached them. He said it is impossible to estimate how much would be raised because the eventual size of the market is unknown.

The language of the compromise states that the music industry will

not seek similar royalties on conventional analog tapes or recorders, he said.

The royalties would be distributed through a complex formula to record companies, musicians, songwriters and others in the industry.

"There's going to be discussions for years on how well it works," Lachenbruch said.

Germany has had a royalty plan for thirty years covering blank analog tapes and recorders, he said.

"There's going to be discussions getting to the artists due to the difficulties of administering it," he said.

Besides prodding record companies to release prerecorded digital tapes, the compromise could result in the dismissal of a lawsuit filed last year by songwriters against Sony over its digital tape recorder, Lachenbruch said.

The suit was filed despite an agreement by consumer electronics makers to equip the machines with circuitry that prevents consumers from making copies of a tape that itself was a copy. The recording industry feared consumers would make near-perfect digital copies of tapes from friends, reducing compact disc sales.

## Theaters, police brace for 'Boyz N the Hood'

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — Security at movie theaters showing the new inner-city drama "Boyz n the Hood" this weekend is being fortified over concerns the pacifistic parable could attract gang members and spark violence.

The film that will open at more than 800 theaters today sends the message that violence among black teen-agers in south-central Los Angeles leads nowhere. The film's opening frame is a stop sign and the film ends with this message: Increase the Peace.

But there is anxiety that audience members may clash before, during or after screenings, theater executives said.

Columbia Pictures has volunteered to pay for extra guards. The Sheriff's Department in Riverside County, where there is a long-established gang population, is preparing for a "worst-case scenario," Lt. Dave Russell said.

The general manager of the nation's only black-owned first-run theater has expressed concern that the marketing campaign by Columbia Pictures has targeted youths in the rival Crips and Bloods street gangs.

several theater owners around the country said they anticipate no problems.

An executive at Cinemark Theatres, a national chain based in Dallas, said no special precautions were being implemented at Cinemark screens.

"There's no gang problem in Scottsdale," said Dan Harkins, whose Harkins Amusement Enterprises will

play "Boyz n the Hood" in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Officials at Mann Theatres Corp. of California did not return telephone calls about a report it was contemplating a last-minute move of "Boyz n the Hood" from one of its theaters in Los Angeles' Westwood district.

Westwood was the site of a riot linked to the premiere of "New Jack City." In that melee, an estimated 1,500 people rioted when a Mann theater allegedly oversold tickets. Stores were looted during the 24-hour disturbance and nine people were arrested.

Bennett, of the Baldwin Hills Theater, which is showing the film, said it would be informing if audiences missed "Boyz n the Hood."

Directed by 23-year-old John Singleton, who grew up in the urban neighborhood where the film is set, "Boyz n the Hood" stars gangster rap star Ice Cube, Larry Fishburne and Cuba Gooding Jr.

It has been praised by critics and generated tremendous interest at this year's Cannes film festival, where the novice director was mobbed by fans.

# Nasal spray stinks to reader

DEAR ABBY: You recently said that older people should not be asked to ask their doctors questions about medications prescribed for them. They should know how much to take, how often to use it, what the side effects are, etc.

I wonder why the instructions that are written in language that nobody can understand. For example, my doctor prescribed a nasal spray. The only thing I could understand was, "Shake well before using." Here is a sample of what else came with my medication and instructions.

"Beclothemason 17.2-dipropionate is a diester of beclomethasone, a synthetic halogenated corticosteroid. Animal studies show that beclomethasone dipropionate has potent glucocorticoid and weak mineralocorticoid activity.

"The effects of beclomethasone dipropionate on hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal (HPA) function have been evaluated in clinical studies by other routes of administration. Studies with beclomethasone-dipropionate by the intranasal route may demonstrate that there is more of that there is less absorption by this route of administration. Early morning plasma cortisol concentrations when beclomethasone dipropionate was administered, in a dose of 1,000 mcg/day for one month as an oral

aerosol or for three days by intramuscular injection."

## Immigration plan could put restrictions on foreign performers seeking U.S. entry

The Immigration and Naturalization Service issued proposed regulations Thursday that would clamp significant restrictions on foreign performing artists seeking to enter the United States.

The proposed rules, which in some cases would apply to foreign professional athletes and sports teams, would make it more difficult for most foreign performers — including rock bands, ballet companies, dance troupes, operas companies and symphony orchestras — to get visas to work in the United States and could touch off retaliatory actions against U.S. performing artists by foreign governments.

The new rules represent an attempt to implement a series of changes in visa rules that first came to broad public attention in May.

Before they are scheduled to go into effect in October, the new rules are subject to a 60-day public comment period and arts groups said Thursday that controversy over the rules is certain to intensify.

But in the absence of major revision, the new rules radically would affect serious and popular arts. Under the rules, a British rock band whose drummer had joined the group less than a year before a planned U.S. tour or a French symphony orchestra that changed second chair cello players six months before its bookings could be barred from

entering the United States.

The rules would limit foreign performers in two key visa categories to 25,000 per year and ban the filing of applications for visas until as little as 90 days before a scheduled tour. Those provisions, arts service groups have charged, would have havoc with the existing system of touring by a wide variety of performers.

Foreign artists trying to get U.S. visas would have to prove that they have achieved considerable fame — for instance, by winning a Nobel Prize, Academy Award or Emmy.

The rules, charged Opera America, a national trade group representing opera companies, would have precluded the America debuts of superstars such as Placido Domingo, Luciano Pavarotti and Kiri Te Kanawa.

Jonathan Ginsburg, a Washington lawyer who represents a coalition of major arts service groups, said he was concerned because the INS appeared to have ignored a letter sent to the agency last week by Sens. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., and Paul Simon, D-Ill., that called the approach the immigration agency was about to take as "controversial" and "a radi-

cal departure" from existing U.S. cultural policy.

Kennedy, Simpson and Simon charged that the ramifications of an immigration bill passed last October that provided for the new visa policies were misrepresented in terms of their effects on the arts after details of the legislation were hammered out in a House-Senate conference committee.

In a statement late Thursday, Simon said he, Kennedy and Simpson had asked Attorney General Dick Thornburgh to issue an order lifting the 25,000-visa limit for at least 18 months and permit every foreign performer who meets visa requirements to enter the United States.

At the INS, spokesman Rick Kenney took issue with assertions that the requirements are more specific to (individual areas of the performing arts); then they have to be more carefully met.

Ginsburg confirmed that negotiations between the arts groups and the AFL-CIO to try to resolve differences between organized labor and arts presenters were ongoing.

"I hope that we will be able jointly to approach (Congress) and say, 'There are some real problems here,'" he said.

# Last reel unwinds in film buff's search for lost footage

WASHINGTON (AP) — Eric K. Federer is mad, mad, mad, mad about his favorite movie.

He's spent much of his spare time in the past nine years, not to mention \$3,500 of his own money, searching for 56 minutes of missing footage from the original 1963 version of one of the funniest movies ever made, Stanley Kramer's "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World."

Federer's personal crusade (to call it an obsession is probably accurate, he says) has yielded snippets of "Mad World" outtakes totaling nearly 24 minutes.

A few good scenes, alas, are probably lost forever.

He's also learned something about Hollywood's own obsession with the bottom line, which probably means moviegoers will never see Kramer's comedy masterpiece fully restored and shown in all its wide-screen, six-speaker, 210-minute glory.

The movie, which premiered at the Cinerama Dome in Los Angeles on Nov. 7, 1963, was an Oscar-winning sensation.

The star-studded cast of such comic heavyweights as Milton Berle, Sid Caesar, Phil Silvers, Ethel Merman, Mickey Rooney and Terry-Thomas, Buddy Hackett and Jonathan Winters careened through the film in a madcap race to find a \$350,000 treasure buried by Jimmy Durante.

After the original 70mm print was shown in 14 cities, Kramer trimmed and more drastic cuts. A few months later, the studio had hewed the movie down to 154 minutes.

short enough to permit multiple daily screenings.

Federer says the missing chunks of footage interrupted the movie's continuity—created plot holes—and left some sight gags unexplained.

One of the unkindest cuts, he said,

was an important, three-minute segment between Spencer Tracy and silent film comedian Buster Keaton.

It revealed Tracy's abortive scheme as a deranged chief of detectives on his way to Mexico with the loot.

Federer found 2 1/2 minutes of

missing intermission footage and exit music in France.

His biggest triumph came in 1985, when he learned that film collector Joshua Berman had rescued 21 minutes of "Mad World" outtakes from a Los Angeles warehouse before it

was bulldozed. MGM-UA Home Video recently issued a 183-minute version of the movie incorporating most of the Berman footage. It still lacks the "Tracy-Keaton exchange but restores a hilarious Winters monologue about using his money to buy his landlady a motorized wheelchair."

Federer scoffs at the studio's claim that the video is a "restoration" of the movie.

"You don't go to the National Gallery and crop a Winslow Homer painting, and you don't tear pages out of an Edna Ferber novel, or pull the brass sections out of a Fletcher Henderson jazz arrangement and start calling them originals," he said.

Kramer said in a telephone interview the new video isn't a restoration but is "pretty well what I wanted it to be."

Federer, 31, a bachelor and press secretary to Rep. Norman Mineta, D-Calif., said he fell in love with "Mad World" at age 12, when he saw it for the first time on the TV set in his New York City home.

It wasn't until 1982 that he saw the movie in a theater, at the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum—in Washington, and delighted in the audience's laughter.

His curiosity about the film began to grow. His interest in restoring the 1963 original gradually consumed him.

He founded the non-profit "Mad World Campaign" out of his home and put 400 people on his newsletter's mailing list.

He sponsored charity screenings of the movie, organized letter-writ-

ing campaigns to Hollywood executives and made a futile attempt through Mineta to have the House of Representatives adopt a resolution saluting the film's 25th anniversary.

Federer folded the campaign a few months ago, when he decided "the battle was lost."

"I'd simply run out of ideas," he said.

He concluded the marketing of a new videotape version had doomed any chance Hollywood would restore the original "Mad World" for a theatrical comeback.

George Feltenstein, vice president of MGM-UA Home Video, confirmed Federer's suspicions.

He said the technology doesn't exist to correct the totally faded colors of the 70mm original to produce a new theater print—a print Federer disputes.

Besides, Feltenstein said, a fully restored "Mad World" would lose tons of money at the box office because it would lack the "snob appeal" of a serious work, such as the restored "Lawrence of Arabia."

Federer hasn't given up hope, however.

He's pressing the Library of Congress to include "Mad World" among its next additions to the National Film Registry, which designates important movies worthy of preservation.

"There are still 16 minutes of missing action," he said. "It's out there somewhere, maybe in Italy or Australia. I wouldn't be surprised to find them there."

## Spunky teen captivates viewers, puts studio on sitcom map

America's 15-year-old boys have a new heartthrob.

She's a gap-toothed, freckle-faced, blue-eyed blond bombshell. She has a pet alligator named Elvis, a love-hate relationship with a little brother she calls "Fergface," and a quirky best friend named Sam. He's a boy but not a boyfriend.

The object of this adolescent desire is a girl named Clarissa Darling — the title character of the Nickelodeon series "Clarissa Explains It All." She's 14, she's hip, and she's hot.

Since the series debuted in April, it has become Nickelodeon's top-rated show. If the fun mail is an accurate reading, the passion felt for Clarissa by 15-year-old boys is surpassed only by that of 8-year-old girls who dig not only her attitude but her funky leggings and layered tops.

You might call her an Annie Hall for the "way cool" generation. She's no paper-cutout kind of girl, and that creates tremendous empathy from her young audience, according to those involved with the show.

"She's not bad; she's not goody-goody, she's real," says actress Elizabeth Hess, who plays Clarissa's mother, Jane Darling.

"Clarissa" wrapped production work on its first 13-episode season last week at Nickelodeon Studios at Universal Studios Florida in Orlando. Although a deal hasn't been struck for the show's renewal, the odds are certainly in its favor.

Brown Johnson, Nickelodeon's vice president for production, says the show has managed remarkably good ratings even in a period in which the network must compete with the great outdoors for kids' attention.

"Clarissa" star, 15-year-old Melissa Joan Hart, recently was featured in People magazine and Seventeen. Critics have found the show to be refreshing and intelligent, standing out from the conventional sitcom fare found on network television. The show also represents an advancement in original programming for Nickelodeon, which has been working hard in the last two years to get beyond the goofy game shows that had become its trademark.

"Clarissa" is basically a situation comedy about the producers' saying "the only abnormal child of two perfectly normal parents." She alternately despises and protects her bothersome younger brother, Fergus, and she tolerates her parents, who are caricatures of June and Ward Cleaver.

But "Clarissa" is much more than a sitcom, says Mitchell Kriegman,

the show's creator and producer. The story is told from Clarissa's point of view using an unusual mix of live action, computer animation and special effects. She talks to the TV audience at home. She has the ability to stop the action and roll it forward or backward at will. In short, she explains things.

She tells you the story, Kriegman says, "which gives you a link to the story that you don't frequently have. She is a participant, a narrator and a confidant of the audience. And it gives another dimension to her story. Because you can sort of think for yourself. There's room for the audience to say, 'Well, she's not perfect.'"

She has painted a floral wallpaper because it was too frilly and feminine.

But Clarissa is creative with her solutions as well as her style. In one episode, she faces off against a bully who is blackmailing her little brother. In another, she tries to figure out how to persuade her parents to allow her to take a job at a carnival. She tries everything from whining to being weird.

"This is a really active girl who solves things not by saying no, but by being creative," says Johnson, Nickelodeon's vice president of production.

## When 'Rocketeer' takes off, it soars

'Rocketeer' doesn't take off until it is 30 minutes along, but when it does, it zooms, offering a good time. Based on the comic book series authored by Dale Stevens, which first appeared in 1981, the new film is cast in 1938 when the world was on the brink of war.

The government is experimenting with a rocket pack that will allow a man to fly, so long as he is wearing tire resistant pants.

This device is used in one of the Sean Connery-James Bond movies, and before that, 'Buck Rogers' used it as his principal form of travel, but 'Rocketeer' makes it all seem new and most amusing.

Howard Hughes, played by Terry O'Quinn, is behind the development of the rocket pack, and when a plane holding the equipment crashes, the authorities pick up the wrong apparatus — a vacuum cleaner.

The rocket pack, meanwhile, falls into the hands of a young man, a commercial thief, who learns to fly with it and at the same time leads everyone on a merry chase, one that includes Hughes, the government, gangsters and the Nazis, all of whom would love to get their hands on the thing.

### Review

Timothy Dalton plays a movie star, a hero of action films. He is obviously patterned after Errol Flynn, who, according to one biographer, Charles Higham, may have been working with the Germans during World War II.

The actor isn't called Flynn. He is known as Neville Sinclair, and while the movie he is working on is called 'The Laughing Bandit,' it is obvious that the producers of this film mean to suggest 'The Adventures of Robin Hood,' which Flynn did in 1938.

They go so far as to reproduce — almost to the step — the staircase on which Basil Rathbone and Flynn staged their final joust.

At the same time, the actress playing the lead in the film within the film wears a costume similar to those worn by Olivia De Havilland as Maid Marian to Flynn's Robin.

Interesting, Flynn isn't here to protest, so we'll have to take for what it is, another revelation by Higham, who has made a specialty of these things.

At any rate, most of the action in 'Rocketeer' takes place in Hollywood, and the makers of the film have managed to capture the era

nically. A vocalist does songs of the era, and characters representing W.C. Fields and Clark Gable walk by in the night club to which Sinclair has taken Penelope, girlfriend of the pilot.

The woman, a Hollywood starlet, is kidnapped by the movie star, with the help of a goon who looks like a leftover from the recent 'Dick Tracy' (and has every right to — both these films were done by the same company).

O'Quinn as Howard Hughes has a few good but not-so-inside jokes, and Paul Sorvino is Eddie Valchione, a gangster who agrees to help the film star steal that rocket pack.

But when he learns that it would go to the Nazis, he's appalled. He may be a thief, but he is 100 percent American, he says.

The special effects are superb. They don't call it the Hindenberg, but there is a zeppelin in the film which more than suggests the Hindenberg and aboard which much of the climactic action takes place.

Give 'Rocketeer' about 30 minutes. That's how long it takes to lift off the ground. When it does, you'll fly with it.

Bill Campbell is the pilot, Jennifer Connelly is his girlfriend who hopes to become a star, and Alan Arkin is the scientist who discovers how to use the rocket pack.

## Critics aside, 'Robin Hood' tops summer movies in gross receipts

Despite withering reviews and persistent complaints about its level of violence, 'Robin Hood, Prince of Thieves' is the reigning king of the summer box office.

'Robin Hood' had the strongest three-day opening of the year (\$26 million) and has maintained that pace, earning approximately \$80 million in less than a month. Word of mouth has proven so favorable that unmitigated blasts from 'The New York Times' Vincent Canby, 'The Los Angeles Times' Kenneth Turan and such television reviewers as Roger Ebert and Gene Siskel have had virtually no impact.

Nor has the National Coalition on 'Robin Hood,' which carries a PG-13 rating, 'in an excessively bloody film with nonstop violence from beginning to end.' NCTV states that 'Robin Hood' should have been rated at least R.

'City Slickers,' the only other summer hit that has so far developed "legs," has passed the \$12 million mark and is still drawing crowds. Spike Lee's 'Jungle Fever' and the Julia Roberts drama, 'Dying Young' (which 'Premiere' magazine No. 1 hit), had good openings, but were unlikely to reach \$30 million.

Disney's costly fantasy, 'The Rocketeer,' has been setting records in Los Angeles, where it's playing on five screens in 70mm. But its box office success has been spotty.

Unless attendance drops off quickly in the next week or so, 'Robin Hood' will knock 'The Silence of the Lambs' out of the No. 1 spot for the year. 'Silence' has grossed \$125 million since its Feb. 14 release. There have been no real pretenders to Cosentino's throne, although returns are not yet in on 'Terminator 2: Judgment Day,' which is expected to give 'Robin Hood' its stiffest competition. It's

also too early to tell how well 'The Naked Gun 2½' will hold up.

If there's a sleeper this summer, it's Ridley Scott's feminist road movie, 'Thelma and Louise,' which has been helped along by rave reviews, follow-up analyses of its appeal and a Time magazine cover piece. As Time's Richard Schickel pointed out, it's a movie whose scenes and themes lend themselves to provocative discussion.

'Thelma and Louise' has earned only \$25 million nationally, but in certain cities and theaters, it's holding on in a way that suggests it will be around at summer's end.

The success of 'Robin Hood' seems incomprehensible to some critics, especially those who were never fans of Kevin Costner's previous film, 'Dances With Wolves,' which could end up besting 'Robin' at the box office — that revisionist Western has grossed \$180 million in the United States since November).

But not all of the major reviews for 'Robin Hood' were unfavorable.

# Horror writer creates 7-part TV series

One of the most successful horror writers of our time has created a story specifically for a seven-part television series: Stephen King's "Golden Years" premieres Tuesday, July 16, on CBS as a two-hour movie and will continue in its regular Thursday-night time slot beginning July 18. "Golden Years" stars Keith Szarabjka as Harlan Williams, a man who works for a secret government lab called Falco Plains. When an explosion occurs, Williams is in the wrong place and is exposed to mysterious chemicals. Harlan's wife, Gina (Frances Sternhagen), eventually realizes that her husband is becoming younger than the real intrigue begins.

Frances Sternhagen seems to have an affinity for Stephen King's work: She played the sheriff's wife in the 1990 film "Misery," based on a King novel, and she has recently finished reading the book. "His characters are always interesting," Sternhagen says. "He's always got humor in his stuff, and he also seems to manage to come up with interesting plots." But "Golden Years," she insists, is not particularly humorous. "It's mostly dramatic. It's not primarily comic. There are just a few little Stephen King ironies — the way he puts something once in a while."

Sternhagen feels that the premise of "Golden Years" is more than a simple, good plot device. "We've seen enough evidence that this kind of thing can go on, whether it's with government or corporations," she says. "People are suddenly frightened of what huge amounts of money and power can do without their knowing it."

As an elderly employee, one of Harlan's fears is forced retirement, but Sternhagen doesn't feel that this is a particular concern in her line of work. She just completed a successful two-and-a-half year off-Broadway run in the title role of "Driving Miss Daisy." "I'm very fortunate that I'm aging at a time when there are more (parts) about aging than there ever used to be," she says. "A play like 'Driving Miss Daisy' might not have been written in the '50s. Suddenly, because we've got such a large number of the population that is aging, I think people are writing more about it."

Although live productions are Sternhagen's first love, she is happy that she has had the opportunity to do television and movie work as well. "Lately there are fewer and fewer opportunities to do theater," Sternhagen says with more than a tinge of regret. "I've been spoiled, because for so much of my professional life there was an enormous

amount of theater going on in New York and I always had a job. Now, there is relatively less (work). You really can't earn a living just doing theater in New York, and as a result, I'm very grateful that I can do television and film."

Sternhagen is pleased to be working on one of Stephen King's projects, because she finds a real difference between filmed versions of his work and other horror movies. She doesn't have a high opinion of the latter. "I don't know that they really think in terms of a good plot with good characters and a provocative situation," Sternhagen jokes. "I think they think in terms of blood and gore and makeup and teenagers."

# Daytime Emmys saw drama backstage

Most of the drama took place backstage at the recent Daytime Emmy Awards, held for the first time in prime time and telecast on CBS. The press room was brimming with speculation about Susan Lucci's 12th nomination, and most of the assembled felt she would probably finally win. However, when the big moment came and the nominees for Outstanding Actress in a Daytime Drama were being read, the TV monitors in the press room went off, causing a brief bit of pandemonium as we all scattered to the hallways to find a working monitor. By the time the picture was restored, Finola Hughes (Anna Lavery in "General Hospital") had been announced as the winner. Susan Lucci was passed over once again for the coveted Emmy.

# 'Designing Women' No. 1 for 1st time

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Designing Women" topped the television ratings last week for the first time in the series' five-year history and helped push CBS into a tie for first place in the overall standings.

CBS and NBC tied for first, each scoring an 8.1 average rating, followed by ABC with 7.5, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

CBS also received its highest ratings yet for "Northern Exposure," the quirky, hour-long drama series from the creators of "St. Elsewhere" that details life in a tiny Alaskan community. "Northern Exposure" was the No. 3 series last week.

In second place was the CBS weekly newsmagazine "60 Minutes."

NBC's TV series spinoff of the Oscar-winning film, "In the Heat of the Night," was fourth. CBS' comedy "Murphy Brown" was fifth.

ABC's comedy "Family Matters" was No. 6, followed by NBC's reality series, "Unsolved Mysteries."

In eighth place was ABC's Sunday night made-for-television

## Utah station won't cancel controversial documentary

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - More than 200 Public Broadcasting System affiliates have canceled a sexually explicit documentary about a black homosexual, but the University of Utah-based KUED is not among them.

The award-winning film by Marlon T. Riggs, funded by the National Endowment of the Arts, is part of PBS' weekly "Point of View" documentary series.

Carol Tate, a KUED promotions assistant, said station officials are aware the film may be offensive to some and so will air it at 11:35 p.m., an hour later than usual.

Titled "Tongues Untied," the film chronicles a black man's struggle to deal with his emerging sexuality and uses explicit street language. Male nudity is prevalent, as are drawings of male genitalia.

"I personally found it very distasteful," said Tate, who previewed the film. "The language is rotten, and it was very difficult for me to watch."

"But it's public television's goal to speak to a diverse audience, and this is a portion of the population that many people feel has been silenced and ignored," she said. "If people feel like I do about the film, they can do what I did and turn it off."

Utah's only other public television affiliate, KBYU, does not air "Point of View" at all. Station manager Mel Rogers said the series always has been controversial and doesn't fit the Brigham Young University-based station's family-oriented format.

However, Rogers said he believes the series does address some important issues.

"If we were the only public television station in the market, we might feel a social responsibility to air it," he said. "But since KUED already has the series, we decided not to run it."

Tate said other segments of the series deal with issues such as the Exxon Valdez oil spill disaster and political tension between North and South Korea.

"Tongues Untied" came to the attention of many station managers after groups like the American Family Association of Tupelo, Miss., labeled it an example of what it believes to be the misuse of public money to fund programs it considers obscene.

The American Family Association, an evangelical organization directed by Donald E. Wildmon, has been relentless in his criticism of NEA-funded projects.

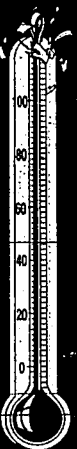

## Utah station won't cancel controversial documentary

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - More than 200 Public Broadcasting System affiliates have canceled a sexually explicit documentary about a black homosexual, but the University of Utah-based KUED is not among them.

The award-winning film by Marlon T. Riggs, funded by the National Endowment of the Arts, is part of PBS' weekly "Point of View" documentary series.

Carol Tate, a KUED promotions assistant, said station officials are aware the film may be offensive to some and so will air it at 11:35 p.m., an hour later than usual.

Titled "Tongues Untied," the film chronicles a black man's struggle to deal with his emerging sexuality and uses explicit street language. Male nudity is prevalent, as are drawings of male genitalia.

"I personally found it very distasteful," said Tate, who previewed the film. "The language is rotten, and it was very difficult for me to watch."

"But it's public television's goal to speak to a diverse audience, and this is a portion of the population that many people feel has been silenced and ignored," she said. "If people feel like I do about the film, they can do what I did and turn it off."

Utah's only other public television affiliate, KBYU, does not air "Point of View" at all. Station manager Mel Rogers said the series always has been controversial and doesn't fit the Brigham Young University-based station's family-oriented format.

However, Rogers said he believes the series does address some important issues.

"If we were the only public television station in the market, we might feel a social responsibility to air it," he said. "But since KUED already has the series, we decided not to run it."

Tate said other segments of the series deal with issues such as the Exxon Valdez oil spill disaster and political tension between North and South Korea.

"Tongues Untied" came to the attention of many station managers after groups like the American Family Association of Tupelo, Miss., labeled it an example of what it believes to be the misuse of public money to fund programs it considers obscene.

The American Family Association, an evangelical organization directed by Donald E. Wildmon, has been relentless in his criticism of NEA-funded projects.

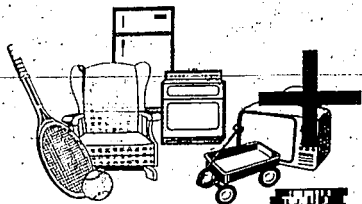
