Deal on hostages could be weeks away

GENEVA — A deal that would free the 10 remaining Western hostages could still be weeks away, but it is nonetheless still likely to happen, U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar said Thursday as he left the latest round of talks and headed for a European vacation.

Both the U.N. chief and Israeli

negotiators said on departing Geneva Thursday that they remain optimistic that a two-stage deal under discussion with Iran and the Shiite Muslim groups holding Western hostages can be fixed now that Israel has signaled its willingness to release large numbers of its Shiite prisoners in exchange for hard information about its seven servicemen missing in Lebanon.

"We now enter into some quiet

diplomacy," he said before leaving for a vacation in Switzerland and Portugal. "We're going to be very much in touch with the Israelis and with the Iranians as a way of getting in touch with the groups who are holding the hostages. Then I hope very much that things will advance. Everything is very clear now."

Perez de Cuellar said he has told Iranian diplomat Kamal Kharrazi to pass word to

the groups with information on the missing Israelis that they need only give Israel concrete evidence about the survival or death of the seven soldiers and the rest of the exchange will fall neatly into place.

Asked how long the remaining talks could take, Perez de Cuellar said, "I don't know. Perhaps days or weeks, I don't know. It depends on how quickly I have reaction from both sides."

Fired casino worker says he got raw deal from Cactus Pete's

JACKPOT — A dispute over blackjack tips has erupted into an attempt to organize a dealers' union at Cactus Pete's Hotel and Casino and a formal complaint to the National Labor Relations Board.

Blackjack dealer Buddy Bowman's complaint alleges he was fired Aug. 7 for working with the Nevada Casino Dealers' Association, Louise Houston of the Labor Relations Board said.

When Bowman was fired, he was collecting signatures from dealers to organize a union. Federal law prohibits firing an employee for union activity.

Bowman plans to organize his own collective bargaining unit, since the dealers' association isn't a union.

Cactus Pete's Personnel Director Jack Sims declined to comment on Bowman's situation. Sims said company policies prohibited talking about an individual employee.

The dispute started with a Cactus Pete's decision to split tips, or "tokens," as they are called in the casino trade — on a 24-hour basis. That means that tokens collected on swing and night shifts, which are normally higher, are divided equally with day-shift dealers.

Cactus Pete's argues that management has the right to do this. Bowman and the association disagree.

Nevada Labor Commissioner Frank McDonald said casinos can divide tips between shifts, but only if dealers agree.

"Management cannot elect to do that without the consent of employees," McDonald said.

That isn't Cactus Pete's interpretation. "Management does have the authority to make a decision on the method on which tokens are divided," Sims said.

The dispute began on a boning point Aug. 6 when Bowman and other dealers met with Tony Badillo, president of the dealers' association. The dealers had already asked the Nevada Labor Commission for an investigation into personnel practices at Cactus Pete's.

Although the association isn't a union and doesn't engage in collective bargaining, it does file grievances within

Pentagon budget drains most cities, report says

WASHINGTON — Three-fourths of the nation's cities provide more tax dollars to support the Pentagon than they receive back through military contracts and other defense spending, says a report issued Thursday.

The report by James Anderson, a Michigan State University economic historian, said 250 of the 335 metropolitan areas designated by the Census Bureau "show a net loss in their balance of payments with the Pentagon."

In a similar study two years ago, Anderson found that most congressional districts also pay more taxes for military spending than they get back.

Pentagon spokeswoman Susan Hansen said the awarding of contracts, location of facilities and other spending decisions are based on military, not geographical considerations.

"Defense is for the common good," she said. "We provide for the whole country rather than for the benefit of one particular area."

Boston Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, president of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, said the report "shows that Pentagon growth means urban loss. Cities all across America are being shortchanged by federal neglect and misplaced federal spending priorities."

But Daniel Mitchell, economist with the conservative Heritage Foundation, said the report envisions the defense budget as "a pork-barrel redistribution device."

Anderson, whose study was published by

Idaho pays more than its military share

WASHINGTON — Idahoans paid \$120 million more in defense-related taxes in 1990 than they received back as military spending in the state, according to a study by a Michigan State University economist.

Idaho tax filers sent \$891.6 million to the federal government in the 1990 fiscal year for "Pentagon tax," or money spent for military operations and support.

Idaho received in turn only \$771.6 million in military spending in this state, reported James Anderson, who compiled a national study of military taxes and expenditures for a non-profit group in Michigan.

Boise, the only Idaho city tracked in the study, fared far worse than the state as a whole. While Boise residents sent \$257.3 million in 1990 to the federal government as a Pentagon tax, according to the study, it received back only \$78.2 million — a net loss of \$2,800 per tax-paying family.

Couple weds 25 years after pregnancy separated them

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A man who was adopted as an infant set out to find his birth parents. The process led to a reunion of the couple, who had spoken in the 25 years since he was conceived, and now the son has officiated at their wedding.

What he found were two people who had never forgotten each other.

"I've always been in love with him," Karen Caldwell told The Courier-Journal in an interview Wednesday in Tallahoma, Tenn., where the newlyweds now live. "I've never been in love with anyone else."

"There have always been sparks," Roger Caldwell said.

The wedding was Aug. 3, with Kitts officiating.

The two had separated in 1966 when Karen Wetherill was a 15-year-old cheerleader at a high school in Anderson County and "one of the prettiest girls in school," Caldwell said. He was then a freshman at the University of Kentucky.

Karen had talked of marriage, but the pregnancy changed everything.

"We didn't talk after she got pregnant," Caldwell said.

Karen's mother told Roger to stay away from her daughter. Karen, who told her mother even then that she

Gusty winds were reported from Mountain Home into the upper Snake River Valley. Elsewhere, winds were light. Mostly, cloudy skies blanketed southern Idaho. The north was partly cloudy.

Temperatures Thursday ranged from the low 70s to the mid-80s.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 94 degrees at Hagerman. Stanley reported the coldest at 35 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 114 degrees at Bullhead City, Ariz. The lowest was 32 degrees at Wisdom, Mont.

Rain scatters across South, up East Coast

Rain was scattered across the South and up the East Coast on Thursday. Rain also fell in places from northern California to the upper Midwest.

At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended over southern and eastern Texas, across western and southern Louisiana, from west-central Mississippi across southwestern Georgia, over northern and western Florida, and from eastern North Carolina across New England and the northern Appalachians.

The heaviest rainfall during the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT was 1.39 inches at Palacios, Texas. Other reported rainfall during that period was less than one half inch, the National Weather Service said.

Showers and thunderstorms also were scattered over northern California, northwestern Utah, eastern Wyoming, north-central Colorado, the Nebraska Panhandle, north-central Nebraska, western South Dakota and southern Minnesota.

Eight water spouts - tornadoes over water were reported on Lake Tahoe between California and Nevada,

Shiite leader calls for information

BEIRUT, Lebanon - With a proposed hostage-release swap hanging on a word of seven missing Israeli servicemen, Lebanon's top Shiite Muslim cleric called on Lebanese groups Thursday to release information about the Israelis.

The plea by Sheikh Mohammed Mehdi Shamseddine - the first by a Shiite leader urging help in accounting for the Israelis - came as diplomatic efforts stalled for a package deal that would include the release of 11 Western hostages.

Israel has demanded a videotape or other solid evidence of the fates of the seven Israelis before it frees any of about 400 Arab detainees, whose freedom has been demanded by a pro-Iranian faction holding Western hostages in Lebanon. The task could be held up because a number of Palestinian and Lebanese groups may be involved.

Security Council OKs Iraqi oil sale

UNITED NATIONS - The U.N. Security Council on Thursday authorized Iraq to export \$1.6 billion of oil in a tightly controlled sale to finance desperately needed food, medicine and emergency supplies for its population.

The vote for the resolution was 13-1, with Cuba opposed and Yemen abstaining.

The council unanimously approved a separate resolution requiring Iraq to pay no more than 30 percent of its future oil revenues to victims of its Aug. 2, 1990, invasion of Kuwait.

A third resolution insists that Iraq comply with inspections to make sure it abolishes its weapons of mass destruction.

Thursday's passage of Resolution 706 means that the standstill law Monday.

gone to Vietnam so he could kill people legally, Williamson said.

Although Odiaga's background gives insight into his mental state at the time of the killings, Estess said it doesn't change his diagnosis. He characterized Odiaga's use of schizophrenia, which probably was made worse by an overdose of cold medicine.

Those two factors likely are the primary cause of Odiaga's rampage through Ketchum last year, Estess said.

Under questioning by Nevin, Estess said his opinion remains that Odiaga was unable to think rationally and make sound judgments that night.

Odiaga "looked as many as 36

Sudafed tablets shortly before the shootings "because he was looking to get high," Estess said.

Sudafed is an over-the-counter cold medication that can produce adrenaline-like effects in large doses.

Defense attorneys have charged Odiaga's use of Sudafed, which began several years ago, as an attempt to "self-medicate" or to escape from the inner voices brought on by schizophrenia.

Prosecutors plan to call about a dozen retired witnesses, some of whom will testify about Odiaga's background.

Whether Odiaga had the ability to think about his actions before pulling the trigger of his .30-06 caliber rifle that night is the trial's central question.

The jury may begin trying to answer that question by the middle of next week.

Much of Thursday afternoon's testimony repeated earlier statements by psychiatrists as attorneys for both sides refined their questions in search of supportive answers.

Defense attorneys say they will wrap up their case Saturday. The state then will call rebuttal witnesses. Final defense witnesses should take the stand late Monday or Tuesday.

After closing arguments and some final instructions from the judge, the jury will begin deliberating on the two counts of first-degree murder, one count of attempted murder and three counts of aggravated assault facing Odiaga.

companies' and lawsuits over employment practices for members, Vice President Oliver Lee said.

"We hope we will be able to help these people there," Badillo said. "They have a little misunderstanding with management."

Bowman said the casino fired him one day after he met with Badillo. Bowman, observing Bowman in a video, said he violated blackjack procedures, Bowman said.

The dealers' association on Monday filed its formal complaint with the NLRB on behalf of Bowman. The board is charged with representing labor practices, usually involving union activities.

But Bowman isn't trying to form a collective bargaining unit under the auspices of the dealers' association. Instead, he plans to ask the NLRB to force an election to form the Northern Nevada Casino Employees Association.

The association would "negotiate in our best interest and attempt to correct some of the working conditions that we find frustrating or intolerable," Bowman said in a promotional letter. "They will be a group of your co-workers and

friends, not some paid outsider that has interests other than our own."

The dealers' association is one of two in Nevada that is working to represent dealers and other casino employees. The other is headed up by Ron Taylor of Las Vegas, who used to be with the dealers' association.

Taylor has formed the Gaming Employees Association and plans to affiliate with a union-local from New Jersey that in turn is affiliated with the AFL-CIO.

Nevada is a right-to-work state, meaning that employees cannot be required to pay union dues as a condition of employment.

Taylor hopes to organize a union at a Las Vegas hotel.

"From there we're going to branch out into the state and grab anybody we can," he said.

Taylor split from the dealers' association because it didn't want to start collective bargaining, he said. Instead, the dealers wanted to lobby and negotiate labor-management disputes.

"That doesn't change the standard of living," Taylor said. "The only thing that is through a union and collective bargaining."

not know the child's birthdate or sex, married another woman, joined the Air Force and left town. But he told his wife, whom he divorced in 1988 after they raised two children together, that he really loved someone else.

Karen eventually would say the same thing to two husbands, she recalled.

Earlier this year, Kitts, who is working on a master's degree in divinity at Cincinnati Bible College & Seminary, obtained a court order so the state social services department could track down his natural mother and see if she wanted to talk to him.

Spokesman Brad Hughes said the agency found Karen Williams, who was married and living in Frankfort where she was working as a secretary. She eventually agreed to meet Mark and to see if Roger would meet her as well.

In June, she called Roger in Tallahassee, where he is director of sales and marketing for Life Sensing Instruments. They agreed to meet on June 22 to discuss Mark Kitts' request.

He came to Kentucky and picked up Karen, and she says now that after she was in his car for five minutes she knew they were in trouble. They argued and talked and started seeing each other. They met Mark on July 2.

Karen, who has a 22-year-old daughter and a grandchild living in Frankfort, filed for divorce something she says she'd been considering anyway, and then Roger asked her to marry him.

Kitts did not linger on thoughts of what his life would have been like had these people married 25 years before.

"I've been very happy with my life," he said. "I don't wish it was different. We're trying to build a relationship on the future, not the past."

Employment Research Associates, a nonprofit consulting firm based in Lansing, Mich., said at a news conference, "Pentagon bloat is eroding our industrial foundations and impoverishing our communities."

Only, does the Pentagon favor a select few metropolitan areas at the expense of others, he said, but the 1980s military buildup deprived all cities of money for education, housing, transportation and other programs.

Anderson did say that base closings and other reductions in military spending should ease the impact in future years on the "net loss" cities.

The study was based on fiscal 1990, during which U.S. military outlays totaled \$299 billion and an additional \$4.9 billion was spent on military categories of foreign aid.

By calculating the portion of taxes paid in each metropolitan area that went to support the military, Anderson found that Pentagon spending provided large benefits for some Sun Belt locations while imposing burdens on city dwellers in the Frost Belt.

In the Midwest, for example, 76 of 85 metropolitan areas had net losses.

But some states in the South and West also didn't get a dollar-for-dollar return on the share of taxes they pay to support the military, he said; California and Texas, which were net gainers from such spending 10 years ago, are now in the loss column; Anderson said.

The South had 89 net-loss metropolitan areas compared to 36 that showed a net gain.

Even the West, which glitters with Pentagon money, has 42 net-loss cities compared with 27 that showed a gain, he said. The net-gain areas are concentrated in Southern California, Washington and New Mexico.

Of California's 23 metropolitan areas, he said, 13 now show a net

Thornburgh readies for Senate race

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Dick Thornburgh ended a stormy three-year reign as the nation's top prosecutor Thursday, defending his record on crime and drugs while setting the stage for a Senate race in Pennsylvania.

"There is much of which we can be proud," Thornburgh told his staff during a farewell ceremony at the Justice Department. "We have done our level best to call 'em as we see 'em without fear or favor from any quarter."

Thornburgh, 69, leaves as the Justice Department is being criticized for dragging its feet in the investigation into the scandal-ridden Bank of Credit and Commerce International.

The department has also come under fire for stepping into a court case stemming from a protracted anti-abortion protest in Wichita, Kan.

This department is constantly at the center of controversy and we reap more than our share of carping and criticism," said Thornburgh, who received a lengthy standing ovation after his speech.

Thornburgh has resigned in the hope of unseating Democratic Sen. Harris Wofford. Wofford was appointed to the Senate in May after the death of Sen. John Heinz, a Republican.

"Thornburgh, who has been tight-lipped about his campaign plans, made only one reference to the race in his farewell speech, saying he was anticipating an "exciting campaign."

"Beginning tomorrow, I'll be out there as a campaigner," Thornburgh told reporters later.

He's expected to make public appearance in Pennsylvania next

week, although he may not formally announce his campaign for a couple of weeks.

A former Pennsylvania governor and federal prosecutor, Thornburgh was named by President Reagan in 1988 as the highly touted replacement for Attorney General Edwin Meese, who was ousted by legal troubles. But Thornburgh's sometimes haughty manner won him enemies on Capitol Hill, and his appointments drew widespread criticism.

His first choice for civil rights chief was rejected as unqualified by the Senate Judiciary Committee. Four aides Thornburgh brought from Pennsylvania eventually left their positions under a cloud.

Task force will investigate case methodically

GULFPORT, Miss. (AP) — Federal and state lawmen, reeling under a barrage of inquiries from 20 states, said Thursday they will proceed deliberately in investigating claims by a self-professed serial killer that he murdered more than 60 people.

"You're not going to see us doing a Henry Lucas thing," Gulfport police Chief George Payne said at a packed press conference. "You're going to see this thing done right, by the numbers, right down the line."

Payne referred to Henry Lee Lucas, a drifter arrested in Texas in 1983 who confessed to 600 murders around the country, but later said he killed only one person, his mother.

Lawmen said a special FBI team specializing in serial killers was expected to arrive later Thursday to begin the task of trying to verify Donald Leroy Evans' claims.

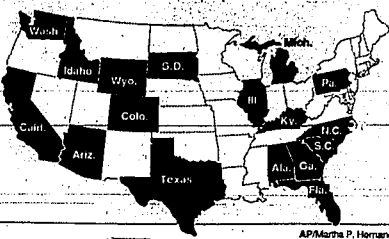
So far, only three of the killings Evans claims to have committed have been confirmed, his court-appointed lawyer said. Those include the rape and strangulation of 10-year-old Beatrice Louise Routh. Evans, who was arrested in the kidnapping Aug. 5, led authorities to her body Sunday, dumped by a Mississippi highway.

Two other killings, both of women, were confirmed earlier this week in Daytona Beach and Fort Lauderdale, Fla., said the lawyer, Fred Lusk. But police in those two cities said the link between the two unsolved killings in their cities and Evans was not yet confirmed.

Evans, of Galveston, Texas, will be arraigned Monday in U.S. District

Court in Biloxi on federal kidnapping charges. Lusk said Evans will plead guilty in return for a life sentence.

In return for his cooperation in the murders, Evans, 34, asked to receive the death sentence if convicted. "The investigation is continuing," said Bob Payne, the county prosecuting attorney. "I'm not going to rule anything out at this time."

The Biloxi Sun Herald reported Thursday that Mrs. Routh pleaded guilty in 1985 to abusing her 15-month-old son, according to court records.

The son, who was not identified, was badly bruised and had cigarette burns on his lips, the newspaper said. The burns were inflicted by Routh and her husband, Reginald Giles, of Augusta, Maine, records show.

Mrs. Routh, Beatrice and another daughter, 7-year-old Melissa, came to Gulfport from Pennsylvania last month. They stayed at homeless shelters while here. Melissa is currently in the custody of county officials.

Evans continued to be interviewed by FBI and local lawmen about what he has described as a 10-year rampage that began in 1977 after he was discharged from the U.S. Marine Corps, Lusk said. "I spend a lot of time advising him of his rights and asking him if he's sure he wants to do this," Lusk said. "I say, 'Donald, I think about it before you open your mouth because this is going to have consequences for the rest of your life, no matter how long that is.'"

Evans, being held in isolation because of threats on his life, gave a videotaped deposition Wednesday but Lusk wouldn't say what he said.

The joint task force, officially inaugurated Thursday, includes about 10 officials from the FBI, the Gulfport police, the Harrison County sheriff's department, the U.S. attorney's office and the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

End of Cold War marks end of noted Army corp

WASHINGTON (AP) — From D-day at Normandy to G-day in the Persian Gulf, the Army's VII Corps completed a celebrated war record. On Thursday, it lost the battle of time.

The VII Corps is pulling up stakes in the sector of Germany it defended for more than 40 years, folding its flag and disappearing into the history books.

The Army announced that as part of a plan to reduce by half the size of the U.S. force in Europe by 1995, the VII Corps will disband next year, leaving its sister unit, V Corps, as the central fighting outfit on the continent.

The VII Corps, commanded in the Persian Gulf War by Lt. Gen. Frederick Franks, delivered the knockout blow to the Iraqi Republican Guard forces in a 100-hour ground offensive that included the largest tank battles in the history of warfare.

To be withdrawn with VII Corps by the end of September 1992 are the four American combat divisions in Europe: the 3rd Armored Division at Frankfurt, Germany, and the 8th Infantry Division (Mechanized) at Bad Kreuznach, Germany.

The two combat divisions that survived the cutbacks are the 3rd Infantry Division and the 1st Armored Division. Other combat units, including one of the Army's two armored cavalry regiments, also will be withdrawn but no decision has been announced.

The VII Corps, with more than 71,000 soldiers, 2,200 combat vehicles and 300 helicopters, has de-

fended a 30,000-square mile section of Germany along the former Iron Curtain since the end of World War II. Now that the Cold War is over, the Bush administration sees less need for a large military presence in Europe.

"We need a force that makes sense for the evolving threat" rather than one tailored almost exclusively to handle a Soviet-led invasion of Western Europe, said Col. William Foster, chief of the Army's war plans division at the Pentagon.

Foster said in an interview that whereas the U.S. military previously planned mainly for global war, it now is structuring its armed forces to respond to as many as two major "regional contingencies," such as the Persian Gulf crisis, simultaneously.

The story of VII Corps began in 1918 when it was assembled in France to train doughboys for combat in World War I.

On D-Day, June 6, 1944, the VII Corps led the bloody allied assault on German positions along Normandy's beaches. Under the command of Gen. J. Lawton "Lightning Joe" Collins, the VII Corps rolled east through France and later fought in the decisive stages of the Battle of the Bulge in the Ardennes.

Astronaut Irwin buried in Arlington Cemetery

WASHINGTON (AP) — Astronaut Jim Irwin was buried with military honors Thursday and remembered for his twin careers as a moon-walker and as a minister whose unmet goal was to find traces of Noah's Ark.

Irwin, 61, is the first to die of the 12 men who walked on the moon. His death in Glenwood Springs, Colo., from a heart attack Friday came one day after the 20th anniversary of his return from the moon.

"He flew because he loved to fly," said the Rev. William Rittenhouse of Nassau Bay Baptist Church, near the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Rittenhouse recalled that while riding across the lunar surface in a motorized vehicle, Irwin's companion, David Scott, commented about the magnificent mountains in the distance. That prompted Irwin to recite a verse of scripture, "I look into the hills from whence cometh my help."

Rittenhouse said. And then, realizing his words were being monitored by Mission Control, the minister added, Irwin said "We're getting a lot of help from Houston, too."

Rittenhouse recalled that on watching that scene on television, Irwin's mother said to him "Listen to him, Brother Bill, he's preaching to the world."

Irwin was born in Pittsburgh and graduated from high school in Salt Lake City. He was a 1951 Naval Academy graduate and a test pilot who rose to colonel in the Air Force. He is the 12th astronaut buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Irwin's widow, Mary, and mother were among the mourners. His grave is next to that of two other astronauts, Virgil I. Grissom and Roger Chaffee, who were killed in a fire during an Apollo launch pad training exercise in 1967.

Judge rules black, all-male schools must admit women

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit public schools must admit girls into three planned all-male academies to offer both sexes an equal education, a federal judge ruled Thursday.

The American Civil Liberties Union and the National Organization for Women Legal Defense Fund sued Aug. 5 to let girls attend the schools, scheduled to open Aug. 27. The groups argued that while focusing attention on the plight of black males was admirable, it denied girls the right to equal education.

U.S. District Judge George Woods ruled that excluding girls from the schools violated federal and state law. The judge said no matter how important the goals of improving education for black males in Detroit, it couldn't happen while girls were excluded.

"There is no evidence the school system is failing males because girls attend schools with them," the judge said. "Girls fall too."

The 170,000-student school district intended to have the experimental schools, officially named Male Academies, open to boys of all races but aimed at blacks. The curriculum stresses discipline, civic responsibility, high academic standards and a curriculum with special emphasis on African and African-American history. The civil rights group filed the lawsuit on behalf of a Detroit mother with three daughters attending public schools. The woman, who requested anonymity, said the application process for the schools and the name Male Academies made it clear girls need not apply.

Bush takes time to vacation; hostage crisis sidelined for now

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine (AP) — President Bush, relegated to the sidelines on the Middle East hostage crisis, has found little to do on his vacation except vacation.

It's an unusual predicament for the hyperactive chief executive. Bush's days are falling into such a pattern of sameness — golf, tennis and boating, over and over again — that aides have been hard pressed to find new settings to make him look more "presidential."

One recent change: Instead of talking to reporters with golf club in hand as he prepares to tee off, Bush's mini-news conferences have been at the clubhouse, a U.S. flag fluttering conveniently in the background.

Bush hasn't had much to say on the hostage crisis, even though he's asked about it every day. The United States hasn't found an active role it can play in efforts to arrange a comprehensive settlement to the crisis.

Instead, the administration is looking to U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar to mediate a hostage swap.

"I think the ball is largely in the constructive hands of Perez de Cuellar, and his team now, which is good," Bush told reporters on the golf course Thursday.

It was the third day in a row he'd praised the U.N. official.

With Bush making little news with comments on the hostage situation or other world events, reporters have been having a hard time finding questions to provoke animated answers.

"Are you going to use Big Bertha?" a reporter asked Bush on Thursday, referring to a driver given him by Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga.

"I'm going to unleash it out here, yes," Bush said. "Keep your head down there and left arm straight and bring it on through, and the results are startling."

Bush's vacation this year contrasts sharply to the one he took last August. Then he was busy on the phone and dashing back and forth between Maine and Washington, assembling the coalition that would eventually drive Iraq from Kuwait.

Apart from Robert Gates, the deputy national security adviser, only a handful of junior aides remain in Kennebunkport to staff the summer White House.

Chief of Staff John Sununu has been in and out — seen behind the wheel of his own car for a change — but mainly he's left the president to himself and his family.

Even press secretary Marlin Fitzwater left on his own three-week vacation after spending just under a week here with the president.

In one of the few breaks from his golf-tennis-fishing routine, Bush flew to Pittsburgh on Wednesday to address the Fraternal Order of Police.

He apologized for not bringing Barbara.

"She's up to her eyeballs in the grandchild business, as we're on vacation over there in Maine," Bush said.

33 cities declared 'urbanized'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hesperia, Stuart and Crystal Lake may not ring a bell today, but keep an eye on those growing communities.

The 1990 census officially put them and 30 other cities on the path to the demographic big time.

The Census Bureau said Thursday it had declared the cities "urbanized areas" — a piece of government jargon meaning they're no longer considered populated patches of rural ground.

Urbanized areas have a better shot at federal dollars than do their country cousins.

For example, federal money for transportation planning and mass transit in cities goes to urbanized areas.

The urbanized area designation also can be a first step toward recognition as a metropolitan area, which means even more money.

To become an urbanized area, a city and its surrounding territory must have at least 50,000 people.

The area includes places outside the city having at least 1,000 people per square mile.

Hesperia, Appleton, Vallejo, Victorville, Calif., was the largest of

Japanese imports hurt U.S. businesses

WASHINGTON (AP) — Japanese sale of two types of advanced laptop computer screens at below-market prices has hurt U.S. manufacturers, the International Trade Commission ruled Thursday, paving the way for immediate imposition of stiff import duties.

The 3-1 decision by the independent commission will benefit the seven small U.S. companies struggling to market the so-called flat-panel displays in the face of heavy competition.

The ruling will hurt some of the largest U.S. computer manufacturers, including IBM, Apple Computer and Compaq Computer.

For consumers, the ruling could mean higher prices for a variety of products including laptop and notebook computers, medical instruments, factory control devices and aviation equipment.

The screens also have potential use in high-definition television.

IBM, in a written response to the

ruling, said, "We cannot see how this action could benefit anyone."

It alluded to the possibility of assembling its laptops overseas to avoid the duties, saying, "Today's action ... is, in effect, an eviction notice from the U.S. government to the fastest growing part of the U.S. computer industry."

Commissioners supporting the duties — Seelye G. Lodwick, David B. Rahr and Donald W. Newquist — said Japanese sale of the screens was squelching the U.S. manufacturing of a product originally developed in the United States.

"I have heard flat-panel displays characterized as the invention that got away, meaning that U.S. firms failed to turn the technology into a marketable product," Rahr said. "But there are a few of these firms still struggling to do just that. And as they are unable to meet Japanese prices, we have seen evidence of lost sales."

He cautioned, however, that the

duties are no guarantee the U.S. companies will succeed.

"Only business savvy, hard work, imagination and luck will do that," he said.

Anne E. Brunsdale, acting chairwoman of the commission, voted against the duties, arguing that American companies haven't been hurt by Japanese pricing and that anti-dumping laws shouldn't be used to shelter them from tough competition.

The commission vote will result in the U.S. Customs Service imposing a 62.67 percent tariff on active-matrix liquid crystal displays and a 7.02 percent duty on electroluminescent screens.

Two other types of screens, passive matrix liquid crystal displays and gas plasma displays, are not affected.

The Commerce Department had issued a ruling July 8 that the active-matrix and electroluminescent screens were being sold in the United States at less than their fair value.

Barge sinking kills at least 12

HONG KONG (AP) — An oil exploration barge carrying 195 people capsized in typhoon-whipped waters Thursday, claiming at least 12 lives and trapping four men in a diving chamber that was running out of air, officials said.

At least 163 survivors were pulled from the sea off southern China in an air-and-sea rescue effort complicated by huge waves and poor visibility. The Singapore-owned barge was lashed by 75-mph winds and 25-foot waves from Typhoon Fred before going down.

Among the 20 people sought by rescuers late Thursday were four men in the diving chamber whose air supply was expected to last until early Friday, said Trevor Berry, spokesman for the Hong Kong Maritime Rescue Center.

The diving chamber was attached to the barge, which was floating just below the surface of the South China Sea, he said.

Two specially trained divers from Singapore were called in an attempt to free the men, Berry said.

The barge was working on an oil exploration project with China about 65 miles east of Hong Kong, which was being hit by the typhoon since Wednesday.

Brenda Lee, an information officer at the Hong Kong Marine Department, said it was not immediately clear if the typhoon was the only cause of the sinking.

Ricko Hong Kong quoted one crew member as saying the ship tried to outrun the typhoon but the report was not immediately confirmed by other survivors.

"I woke up to shouts around 8:30 a.m. saying the barge was going to flip," said William R. Miller Jr., 31, of Houston, the barge's tower operator. "I put on my life jacket and 30 minutes later we were all in the water."

"It started getting real rough last night and there were 14-foot waves around midnight," he said. "The CDs on the side of my bed fell on my face and I thought things were just not right."

Miller said he spotted a shark while floating for 34 hours with other oil workers before being res-

The government said most of those rescued were suffering from shock but were not seriously injured.

The government said there were 155 oil workers on the Panamanian-registered vessel, the Derrick Barge 29, owned by McDermott (South East Asia) Pte. Ltd. of Singapore.

McDermott's parent company is based in New Orleans.

"We do not know why the barge sank," said Brenda Lee, an information officer at the Hong Kong Marine Department.

Rescuers said most of the oil workers had donned life jackets before the barge went down. The sea in the area was warm and raised hopes that some of the missing crew members were alive.

A survivor, Vicente Nendri of the Philippines, said he was sleeping when he was awoken by shouts.

Pope seeks revival in Europe

CZESTOCHOWA, Poland (AP) — Pope John Paul II faced a T-shirt-clad army of more than 1 million youths Thursday and told them to be his apostles and "civilization of love" in Europe.

John Paul rejoiced at the fall of communism in eastern Europe, saying "the church in Europe can now breathe freely with both her lungs." He said the new Europe must be strengthened by Christian values.

The huge crowd, gathered for a Mass at Poland's holiest shrine during the sixth annual Vatican-sponsored World Youth Day, interrupted John Paul for nearly 10 minutes with applause, singing and chants of "Long live the pope!"

The Polish-born pontiff, clad in gold-trimmed vestments and miter, hailed the large delegations from

eastern Europe. Many were able to attend the event for the first time.

Even the Soviet Union opened its borders. The Vatican estimated 80,000 young pilgrims from four republics attended.

It was a joyous crowd, and thousands stayed up until the wee hours, singing folk songs and snaking dancing through the streets of the shrine city.

Many had walked for miles with backpacks, joining hundreds of thousands of Poles in the annual mid-August pilgrimage to reach the green slope of the Jasna Gora sanctuary, home of the jewel-bedeked-Black Madonna icon.

One popular item, along with jeans and sneakers, was an Italian-made T-shirt bearing the words, "Peace 1, Violence 0."

Officials warn of rightist extremism

BONN, Germany (AP) — The government warned on Thursday of growing neo-Nazism in former East Germany and said the days of Cold War spying were not yet past.

A government report said poor economic conditions and an influx of immigrants was sparking rightist violence in eastern Germany, where numerous attacks attributed to rightists have caused injuries and deaths.

The Interior Ministry report also said that despite the disbanding of

East Germany's former secret police, "up to 400 highly qualified agents" were still spying in Germany as agents of the Soviet KGB and other eastern nations.

Neo-Nazis in eastern Germany, called "skinheads" because of their close-cropped hair, have targeted foreigners, homosexuals and former Communists in their attacks.

"In the new (eastern) states especially, the potential for militant nationalist- and racist-oriented skin-

heads is particularly large and shows itself through particularly brutal actions," Interior Minister Wolfgang Schauble said in presenting the report to journalists.

The ministry annually prepares a report on extremists. Thursday's report covering 1990 is the first to include information on former Communist East Germany.

The report estimated that 2,000 skinheads were active in eastern Germany.

Party commission urges expulsion of former aide

MOSCOW (AP) — A Communist disciplinary board on Thursday recommended the expulsion of Alexander N. Yakovlev, once was a contender to lead the party and until recently a top adviser to Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

The Central Control Commission accused Yakovlev of trying to split party ranks by supporting the Democratic Reform Movement, a new group he and prominent reformers like former Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze created in July.

Yakovlev, 67, is considered the architect of Gorbachev's policy of almost total openness. He was the Soviet leader's "strategist and confidante on democratic reforms until he resigned in July. He had been

thought to be a candidate for the top party job during a restructuring last year, but Gorbachev remained in charge. His expulsion would be a major blow to Gorbachev, who has been struggling to weed out hard-liners, not fellow reformers. Gorbachev, party leader as well as president, could be forced into further political restructuring of the party as he faces open presidential elections next year.

Such changes are being espoused already by the newly elected chief of the party's Russian branch, Valentin Kuptsov, who replaced battling Leonid Brezhnev last month, told a weekly newspaper he was seeking to change the "conservative" nature of the Russian party and take a centrist position.

Nigerian World Court justice dies at 77

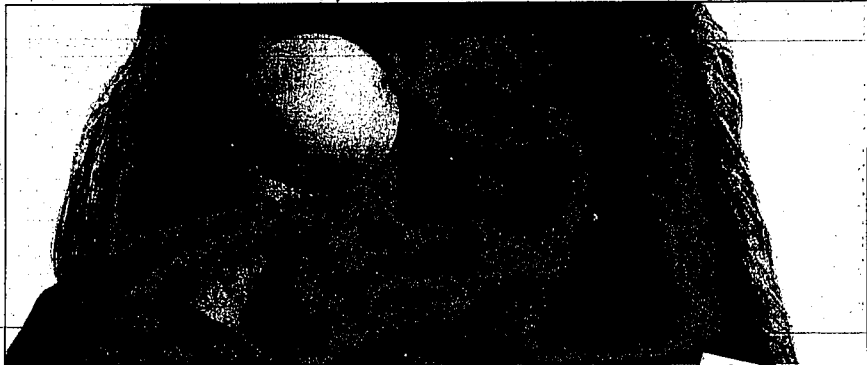
THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — World Court Judge Taslim Olawale Elias of Nigeria died Tuesday in Lagos at the age of 77, the court announced Thursday.

The cause of death was not disclosed.

Elias was appointed to the World

Court in 1976 after serving as his country's attorney general, minister of justice and later chief justice of the Nigerian Supreme Court.

He was also a member of the committee that drafted the charter of the Organization of African Unity in 1963.

A forest farewell, drawing lines and clever politics

Instead of a full-length feature, today we offer three short subjects:

A salute to forest boss

Good-bye and good luck to Ron Stoleson, who is leaving his job as supervisor of the Sawtooth National Forest. All things considered, Stoleson has done a credible job managing an unusual package of real estate.

Unlike many national forests, the Sawtooth isn't a log farm. It comes closer to the "multiple use" ideal that you hear so much about. It has a little logging, a little mining, some grazing and a whole bunch of recreation.

Gauging how well a forest boss has done his job isn't easy. But our subjective opinion is that the forest is in pretty good shape after nine years under Stoleson.

True, the environmentalists complain about overgrazing and trampled streams. But the cattlemen complain about overregulation, too.

When both sides are happy, evenhandedness may be the reason.

Does equal mean equal?

As if Idaho lawmakers didn't have enough problems drawing new districts, the federal Voting Rights Act is complicating things.

The law, written during the civil rights struggle against Jim Crow, says district boundaries can't be drawn to

dilute minority voting strength. Apparently that may rule out some contemplated options. A boundary between Cassia and Minidoka counties, for example, would split the Mini-Cassia area's Hispanic strongholds.

The law's purpose is easy to see: It aims to prevent the white majority from carving up minority voting blocs into defenseless, bite-size pieces.

But did Congress really intend for states to create artificial minority strength by gerrymandering districts that ignore natural boundaries?

That doesn't sound like equal protection.

Good timing

Congratulations should go to the Burley City Council for having the good political sense to postpone its pay raise decision.

Last Monday the council decided to wait for its next meeting. The proposal is to boost each member's pay by \$100 a month and the mayor's pay by \$208 a month.

That's a 33 percent raise for the council — each member will make \$4,800 a year. It's about a 9 percent raise for the mayor — he'll make \$30,000 a year.

The delay was a smart move. Wouldn't look right to bump the council's pay the evening before the city pulled the plug on the community's homeless shelter.

In communications over hostages, U.N. stooped to recognize scum

It should have been enough for world television to show ex-hostage John McCarthy hand-delivering that thick envelope to U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar on the tarmac of London's Heathrow Airport.

That's all McCarthy had promised his former captors he would do. In every region of the globe, he was seen to do it. And this would have been enough.

Perez de Cuellar could have made his expected comments about finding much to ponder in the words of the kidnappers. The network-usual array of television experts could have balanced the U.N. chief's comments by saying the communication from the hostage-holders contained nothing really new.

The envelope's contents would have been filed away as yesterday's non-news. And serious, secret diplomacy could have been resumed.

Instead, the rambling 3,000-word tract has been transcribed in at least four languages and accorded the importance of sacred writ.

While a bunch of petty thugs who call themselves Islamic Jihad, and who were just looking to save a little face before capitulating, now find their dirty little game is still worth playing.

For Islamic Jihad, and for all the other self-named cells of hostage-holders who front for Hezbollah cells are now called detainees.

And by the same arbitrary twist of language, about 375 prisoners of war currently held by Israel or its allied South Lebanese Army are also given the undeserved status of detainees.

Thus, journalists, relief workers and teachers are equated with killers and bus-bombers, while a useful tool like Perez de Cuellar goes right along with it by parroting Hezbollah's line about freeing all detainees.

The measure of integrity in the prolix message Perez de Cuellar received from Hezbollah is that it made no mention of seven missing Israelis for whom Geneva Conventions hold Lebanese Shiites accountable.

The seven Israelis have been

acknowledged in some news accounts, but never in Hezbollah's polemics.

An Israeli diplomat made a good point on CNN the other day. He said the American hostages and even some of their kin are hostages by name only. But he asked if U.S. viewers could name a single missing Israeli.

Yet all Israeli citizens know the names of their missing, and that's a central part of this problem, even if Hezbollah pretends it's not. Although at least four of those missing

Israelis are presumed dead, there can be no exchange of "detainees" unless their mortal remains are returned.

Of the three for whom there is hope, infantynym Yossi Fink and Rachamin Levi Alsheikh were taken by Hezbollah while patrolling the South Lebanon security zone in February 1986.

Their abduction was planned and directed by Sheikh Abdul Karim Obeid, who became somewhat of a household name himself when he was subsequently captured in a daring Israeli commando raid.

With Obeid's terrorist days now behind him, Hezbollah would like the world to think he was no more than a harmless Shiite cleric the Israelis grabbed just for trading value.

The third Israeli believed to be alive is navigator Ron Arad, whose F-4 Phantom jet was shot down while it was on reconnaissance in 1986. Arad was captured by a unit of the Amal Militia, led by one Mustafa Dirini, at a time when Hezbollah had a shooting rivalry with Amal.

Dirini was supposed to aid U.S. Marine Lt. Col. William Higgins in his U.N. duties. Instead, he betrayed Higgins to the Hezbollah cell that killed him and staged his mock hanging for videotape. Kicked out of Amal for his treachery, Dirini formed his own Hezbollah cell, which he had the gall to name itself "Faithful Resistance."

Mustafa Dirini also took his Israeli captives with him, which is why the luckless Ron Arad is now listed as a prisoner of Hezbollah.

These are the scum the U.N. stoops to recognize.

It presently is the intent of the company to continue with fire protection in the future. However, certain towns such as Castelford do have poor equipment and Twin Falls County Mutual trucks and equipment have provided backup protection to them for a long time, including the other day when the city's hose broke.

We also realize that as costs continue to escalate and businesses add further regulations, that it will become increasingly difficult to have "state-of-the-art" equipment, especially for financial cleanup.

This isn't saying that the company will quit offering protection in five, 10 or 20 years. We will offer it as long as it is necessary, possible and feasible.

We have met with Mary Hempleman, a Twin Falls County commissioner, and have also expressed our view on fire districts.

Our position was simply stated to him — that if it is the wish of the people of this county to create fire districts, we would prefer they be organized on a countywide basis or be put under a county umbrella with proper planning.

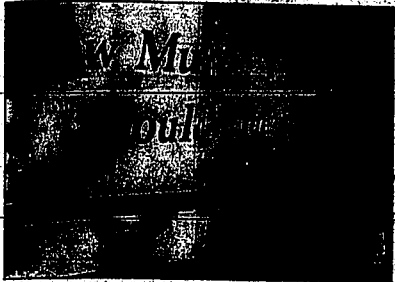
If fire districts are organized on a piecemeal basis, it will become confusing as to what areas are covered and will become extremely difficult for us to ensure that all areas of the county are covered.

Congressman leaves park supporters upbeat

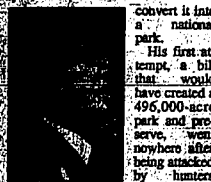
ARCO (AP) — The chairman of a key congressional subcommittee said he was impressed by his visit to Craters of the Moon National Monument, but was not ready to endorse a bid to make it Idaho's first national park.

Rep. Bruce Vento, D-Minn., chairman of the House subcommittee on national parks and public lands, spent about three hours Wednesday on a tour of the monument.

As he left, Vento said he was unsure whether the area's volcanic features are worthy of park status. "I have to rely somewhat on the professionals on this," he said. "Joined by congressional staff and officials from various resource agencies."

Vento flew over last week through the Craters of the Moon lava flows. It was his first trip to the monument.

While Vento's visit was short, supporters say it was a big step toward national park recognition. Vento's subcommittee figures to play a big role in any attempt to get a Craters park bill through Congress. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, is pushing to expand Craters and

convert it into a national park. His first attempt, a bill that would have created a 496,000-acre park and preserve, went nowhere after being attacked by hunters and ranchers.

Stallings says those original boundaries were "unrealistic." He plans to try again with a bill that creates a smaller park. The first park bill would have added several geological features to the 53,000-acre Craters monument. These include Crystal Ice Caves and the Great Rift.

Both areas now are administered by the Bureau of Land Management, which already has recommended that much of the 60-mile-long, 800-foot-deep Great Rift be designated as wilderness.

The National Park Service has been lukewarm to the idea of converting Craters into a park.

The agency contends most of the region's geological features already can be found in the existing monument, and officials are concerned that they would be left to manage hunting and grazing in the area.

Stallings' first bill would have allowed grazing in the park and would have permitted hunting in a Great Rift National Preserve that would have made up about one-quarter of the complex.

The area is populated by a variety of game species, including mule deer, elk, pronghorn and sage grouse.

Craters attracts about 250,000 visitors per year. Many are older couples from Idaho and elsewhere in the Northwest.

They do some sightseeing and

hiking and take some pictures, but only a fraction camp overnight.

"The average stay in the monument is two to three hours," said David Clark, the monument's chief of interpretation. "We are not a destination."

One supporter of a Craters national park thinks that can change. "As evidence," Bill Babcock of Arco points to Great Basin National Park in Nevada, the nation's newest national park. Visitations there have doubled, he said.

A Craters park would bring an influx of tourists — and money — into central Idaho, and help protect the area, Babcock said.

And after fighting for park designation for four years, he thinks it eventually will happen.

Man gives up, tears down mill after city blocks restart efforts

KOOTENAI (AP) — A 74-year-old man who failed to persuade the City Council to let him reopen an abandoned sawmill, says he's given up and is tearing down the place.

Frank Magera, of Libby, Mont., said he's lost about \$100,000 along with his dream of resigning the old Kootenai sawmill.

"If they would have left me alone, I would be up and running by now," Magera said Wednesday.

He bought the abandoned mill near Idaho 200 in 1987 for \$70,000 and began fixing it up.

In 1989, the City Council adopted an ordinance prohibiting the operation of sawmills inside the city limits.

Magera found himself stuck with worthless old buildings and machinery he's now trying to sell for scrap. The 11-acre sawmill property is leased from Glacier Park Co., a subsidiary of Burlington Northern Railroad.

"I'm damn near insolvent now," Magera said. "The city ought to buy me 11 acres in the valley someplace so I can put up my mill."

Magera said.

Symms supports 1% initiative

BOISE (AP) — Taxpayers backing a one percent property tax initiative have a new honorary chairman: outgoing Republican Sen. Steve Symms.

"It should be noted that those who want less government tend to favor the 1 Percent Initiative, and those who like more government tend to oppose the initiative," Symms said.

Symms urged supporters to get behind a petition drive to place the initiative on the November 1992 ballot.

The proposal would limit property taxes to no more than 1 percent of market value.

"We think it's good. Sen. Symms accepted the chairmanship," said Cal Williams, a proponent of the initiative.

"He has always been a fiscally responsible representative for the state of Idaho."

Kayaker paddles around Alaska

BARROW, Alaska (AP) — Not even the "beastly easterlies" stopped a kayaker from completing his trip around Alaska — after his third summer of paddling.

Paul Caffyn, 44, of New Zealand, reached the village of Inuvik on Canada's northwest Arctic coast Tuesday. He had been on the water for 110 days.

1989. Caffyn told radio station KBRV in Barrow he averaged about 30 miles a day and, toward the end, encountered a lot of fog and wind he described as "beastly easterlies."

He also ran out of food, so the first thing he did after reaching Inuvik was eat. "I came in fairly lean," he said Wednesday.

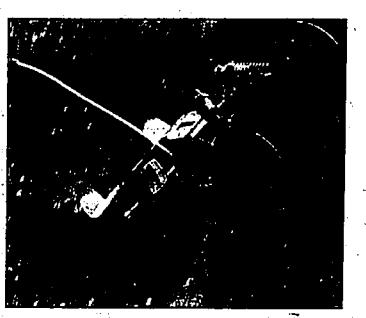

Size of proposed juvenile center up in the air

TWIN FALLS — Behind 12-foot walls and locked steel doors, problem teenagers will be detained, according to planners and architects working on the proposed juvenile detention center in Twin Falls.

The question is, how many?

A six-county board trying to come up with a solution to the Magic Valley juvenile detention problems met Thursday to hear suggestions regarding

programming, space requirements and staff needs for the proposed center.

The committee last month signed an agreement to buy the old O Bar building on East Addison Avenue, but the choice has raised serious concerns and debate from neighbors.

The center will house teens who are repeat property offenders and at a moderate risk to the community, said Kurt Friedenauer, administrative director of the state's Youth Services Center in St. Anthony. Friedenauer is helping the Magic Valley plan the center.

"The center will certainly not serve those youths convicted of serious crime," Friedenauer said.

Board members could not decide on the size of the facility Thursday, however, because a quorum was not present. Only four representatives of the nine-member board attended the meeting.

Instead, the board will make the decision by conference call today.

As soon as the decision is made, architect Joe Conrad will begin drawing up final plans for the center. Construction

Transportation board OKs plan to widen U.S. 93

TWIN FALLS — The State Transportation Board on Thursday approved spending \$400,000 in state money to build a three-quarter-mile stretch of full-lane highway past the Petro/2-Crossroads truck stop on U.S. Highway 93.

The project is designed to ease the flow of

traffic near the truck stop, located just north of the intersection of Highway 93 and Interstate 84 in Jerome County, according to Loren Thomas, district engineer of the Idaho Transportation Department.

The Petro/2-Crossroads developers will contribute \$28,000 to the project, according to Mary Detmar, executive assistant to the transportation board.

"This kind of project is not unusual," said Detmar. "With more and more economic development going on around the state and limited state funds, the board likes to encourage developers to get financially involved in projects like this."

Since Petro/2-Crossroads opened last fall, the

Buhl teachers may start classes without contract

BUHL — The Buhl Education Association met Thursday to reverse a decision made last year that teachers would not start school this fall without a contract.

The association members discussed progress on teacher contract negotiations for the upcoming school year, as well.

In a phone interview, Sue Melanson, BEA president, said that when last year's negotiations were settled, the BEA adopted a resolution stating teachers would not return to work this fall unless a contract was in place.

But the School Board recently requested a fact finding committee to help settle negotiations, a possibility teachers didn't consider last year.

Due to these circumstances, the teachers amended their resolution, and

teachers will return to work without a contract in place.

Melanson also said the teachers are committed to accepting whatever the fact-finding committee decides upon, and will request the School Board do the same, in order to settle negotiations quickly.

Three people are chosen for fact finding committees: one representing each party and one neutral person. The neutral person is selected by the first two committee members, unless they aren't able to come to an agreement.

Melanson said the two representatives already chosen haven't been able to agree on the third person, so State Superintendent of Schools Jerry Evans will appoint the last committee member.

The School Board has chosen former Jerome Superintendent Richard Kugler as its representative and Bob Nicholson, Idaho Education Association research director, will represent the teachers.

School district buys 55 acres

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls School District has bought 55 acres of land northeast of town for future school construction, the district's board chairman says.

"This is land we wanted to tie up for the future," School Board Chairman Steve Tolman said.

The board has authorized the purchase of the \$239,000 property, located north of Highway Drive, from Melvin Sackett.

The money will come out of the district's plant facility fund, which is used to upgrade schools and buy school property, Tolman said.

The \$4,345-per-acre cost of the property was a good buy, Tolman said. Property across the street from the site was selling for around \$10,000 an acre, he said.

The parcel is large enough for any type of school the district wants to build on it including a high school, he said.

However, board members do not have any particular school in mind, Tolman said.

The area northeast of Twin Falls has been growing in the past several years and it was considered a good location for a new school.

"Land prices won't go down," Tolman

said. "If we wait we'll find more property subdivided."

The board needs to be aware of available property to plan for future expansion, he said. A school may not be built on the property for five or 10 years.

In the other hand, it may need to build an elementary school within a couple of years, he said.

Superintendent Terrell Donich said the district will begin the process of planning for a new bond issue election after September when students have settled in. The last school bond election to build a new high school on a piece of land northwest of the city, was defeated by the voters in May.

If the increase in student enrollment materializes as the district projects, school overcrowding will help demonstrate the need for new school construction, he said.

Last year the district paid \$10,000 for 70 acres north of North College Road that was to be the site of the high school.

Gooding Board hires new principal for high school

GOODING — Don Fluharty is the new principal for Gooding High School. The Gooding School Board this week offered Fluharty a starting salary of \$40,059 per year. "We just felt he was the best of the candidates that we had," Superintendent James Cobble said. "He is a sincere, honest, hard-working person. There's no question he is well-prepared." Fluharty most recently worked in Kootenai in northern Idaho as acting vice principal and athletic director of Clearwater High School. He has many years of teaching experience, Cobble said, and also has a master's degree in education administration. "We just like what we saw about him and feel he will complement our community and our educational philosophy," Cobble said. The trustees also gave a contract to the new principal's wife, Mary Jane Fluharty — she will be an

elementary resource room instructor. Also at the meeting, the district's annual audit report showed that the fund balance has dropped to about \$256,000 from \$305,000 the previous year. "The auditor did indicate that this might be the lower level of what we'd want for a fund balance, that it was not an adequate amount of money for an operation the size of Gooding," Cobble said. The 1990-91 total budget for maintenance and operations was \$3,013,885, he said. "The carry-over amount was lower, Cobble said, mainly because of funding reductions from the state. "We just spent more than we made," he said. "Our expenditures exceeded our revenues." In other business: The trustees, contracted with JUB Engineers for design, supervision and testing of the school district's Main Street sidewalk project. The district agreed to pay JUB \$10,565 for the engineering work.

To eliminate traffic and safety problems, the trustees designated Main Street directly west of Gibbons Elementary School as a no-parking, drop-off zone. Trustees decided to appeal the Gooding Police Department's decision to discontinue use of the police officers as crossing guards at the elementary school. Cobble said he and the trustees are concerned about the safety of the children at the crossing because it is a state highway and it also is a mid-block crossing, "which makes it more confusing." A police car and a police officer there "would be more effective and would afford more safety for the kids than volunteers or school district employee crossing guards," Cobble said. The superintendent said he will write a letter to the Gooding Police Department this week to see what can be done. Contract negotiations with teachers will continue in the near future, possibly by next week, Cobble said. The negotiations were recessed last spring to wait for the results of the audit report.

project would have required an additional \$257,732 in state funds from the transportation department for completion. Most of the grant money would have been used to install a traffic light at the truck stop and improve Centennial Spur leading past the proposed Jerome Historical Agriculture Museum and the truck plaza, but some of the grant was earmarked for widening Highway 93.

Twin Falls group asks transportation board to take pressure off Blue Lakes

TWIN FALLS — Weary of ever-increasing traffic on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, a group of Twin Falls businessmen and development officials on Thursday asked the Idaho Transportation Board to do something about it. The Greater Twin Falls Transportation Committee asked the state transportation board to designate Pole Line Road and a stretch of county road west of Twin Falls as U.S. Alternate Highway 93, a move designed to take the traffic pressure off Addison Avenue West and North Blue Lakes. "It's a win-win situation, we think," said Kent Just, executive vice president of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. "Those automobiles, RVs, tour buses and trucks that have no need for services in Twin Falls will be

better served and those who do need services will find it easier to traverse the present U.S. 93." "What we have now is a situation where it often takes 20 minutes to drive across town," said Mike Johnston, manager of the Twin Falls Universal Frozen Foods plant. "That's a lot for a town of this size." The project would involve upgrading existing roads, although the committee wants the state to build an overpass at the intersection of Highway 93 and U.S. Highway 30. "It's certainly something we'll look at," said John Combo of Idaho Falls, chairman of the transportation board. "I'm well aware of what Blue Lakes can be like." State highway projects are planned far in advance, however, so even if the board approved the designation, construction wouldn't

start anytime soon. But the Twin Falls group wants the transportation board to take the first steps quickly. "The problem with Blue Lakes is only go to continue to pile up," said Johnston. Figures supplied by the transportation committee showed that at its peak, North Blue Lakes is one of the busiest streets in Idaho — rivaling the major thoroughfares of Boise in the volume of traffic it carries. And some stretches of the street are the most accident-prone in the state, according to the Twin Falls police. "We've gotten to the point where there are a lot of local residents who simply avoid Blue Lakes," said Bill Kyle, who operates a McDonald's restaurant on the street. "The traffic is so intense, people are just staying away."

neighborhood is against it. "Site and other" opponents recommended alternatives to the Twin Falls site, including the old state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding and the former Southern Idaho Vocational Center near Jerome. That private detention facility was closed last year. The Board of Correction chose the Twin Falls site over a proposal from Coeur d'Alene at its June meeting. Eugene Larson, administrator of five federal community services for the Department of Corrections, said officials hope work can begin within a few weeks and the center will be open by next February or March.

Larson said state public notification and competitive-bidding procedures were followed to the letter, and the Twin Falls site is an area zoned for light industrial and commercial use, including corrections facilities. "More importantly," he said, opponents are ignoring the success of similar centers in Nampa and Boise. They have caused no problems in the community and have provided valuable supervised environments for probationers and parolees having trouble, people sentenced to 120 to 180 days in minimum-security detention to determine whether they should be put on probation, and in some cases, inmates trying to make

the transition to life outside prison. "We need to remember these are community work centers. They need to be part of the community," Larson said. Opposition is "all based on misinformation," he said. "Misinformation is a very hard thing to deal with." To head off a similar problem elsewhere, Larson said he plans to meet with city officials and local legislators in Coeur d'Alene and Post Falls next week. He said he would let them know the state may put another work release center in Kootenai County next year if lawmakers provide funding.

could begin by the first of the year. A nine-bed facility would mean fewer juveniles have to be locked up, along with lower operating costs and more space for the dining area, indoor recreation, counseling and meeting rooms, Friedenauer and Coeur d'Alene said. "Having 12 beds would mean more juveniles can be served at the center, but it would also mean increased construction costs because the building may need to be expanded and because of the need to install an electronic lock system. State juvenile detention regulations require that a facility with more than 10 beds use an electronic lock system — a system, Friedenauer said, that is expensive to buy and even more expensive to operate. "The operational costs will go up for a 12-bed facility because then you will need a staff member to man a system control booth," Friedenauer said. "We're looking at \$75,000 extra staffing costs to operate a booth 24 hours a day, seven days a week. And that's without employment benefits." The lock system requirement is based on a fire safety issue, not security concerns, Conrad said. To expect a staff member to manually unlock 12 or more doors in the case of a fire would be risky, he said. The board also discussed the logistics of catering and laundry services. In order to provide hot meals, the center should be located within a reasonable distance from the catering service, Friedenauer said. "Something the community needs to understand is that we need to be within the city limits, near these services," Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Bliss said. "Most of these kids are Twin Falls kids."

night in order to unlock a juvenile's room and escort him to the rest room. After the meeting, committee members talked about how to calm neighbors' concern about the center. "Some people think that as soon as this place opens there will be rapes and burglaries in their neighborhoods and their kids won't be able to sleep in their yards," Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn said. The City Council meeting is slated for 6 p.m. Monday at City Hall.

2nd salmon reaches Redfish Lake Creek

BOISE (AP) — A second Snake River sockeye salmon returned to central Idaho's Redfish Lake Creek, raising hope for the species' survival.

But Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologists called Thursday's return only a small beginning toward saving the salmon from the species' endangered status by the National Marine Fisheries Service.

Sockeye recovery will be possible only if federal dam operators on the Snake and Columbia rivers change practices to improve Idaho salmon survival rates during migration to and from the Pacific Ocean, biologists contend.

The sockeye was trapped by Fish and Game personnel and placed in a holding tank at the Sawtooth Fish Hatchery with another sockeye that came back to Redfish Lake Creek last Sunday.

The two fish are the first sockeye

to return to Redfish Lake since 1989.

So far this summer, seven sockeye have made it to Lower Granite Dam, a federal hydroelectric project about 40 miles below the Idaho border on the Snake River.

Biologists believe the sockeye that came in last Sunday is a male, but they were unsure Thursday night whether the second salmon was male or female. Anidromous fishery manager Dexter Pitman said Fish and Game would be able to determine that when the fish get closer to spawning in six weeks or so.

"They're arriving in real good condition, and we want to handle them as little as necessary," Pitman said.

All sockeye that make it back to Redfish Lake Creek will be trapped and held until ready to spawn at the Sawtooth hatchery. Shortly before that point, biologists will decide the best strategy for releasing fish into Redfish Lake to spawn naturally and providing for hatchery production.

"When you get close to exhausting a population, the most important thing is to get the greatest number of progeny possible from the few

adults remaining," Pitman said. "This can happen best in a hatchery spawning facility. Releasing one or more pairs into the lake will, however, be a hedge against gene pool changes the improbable but possible loss of fish while in a hatchery."

Idaho's sockeye salmon travel 900 miles down the Salmon, Snake and Columbia rivers, a journey that once took about a week.

But since then, eight hydroelectric dams have been built on the river system and slackwater pools created by the dams have delayed the salmon smolt's migration.

Now it takes six months several weeks to migrate. Some smolts die in the slackwater pools. Others are killed by disease and predators and many others die at the mouth of the Columbia River, apparently because the physiological change allowing them to adapt to salt water occurs before they can reach the ocean.

Blaze forces home evacuations

CASCADE (AP) — A wildfire south of Cascade forced the evacuation of a few homes Thursday evening and drew crews from throughout Valley County. A sheriff's dispatcher said no structures had been damaged Thursday night by the 10- to 12-acre fire near the Cascade airport.

Payette National Forest spokesman Dave Olson said a helicopter with a water bucket and two air tankers were dispatched to help in the battle. Crews were on the scene from fire departments in Cascade and McCall, as well as the Southern Idaho Timber Protection Association.

The blaze was burning through grass and scattered timber, mostly on private land, the sheriff's dispatcher said.

No injuries had been reported. The fire's cause was unknown.

Woman who found slain monks thought they were asleep

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The woman who discovered nine Thai Buddhists slain in a temple west of Phoenix in Arizona said Wednesday night that she thought they were sleeping until a ringing telephone alerted her to blood on the floor and sent her and a friend screaming for help.

All of the victims were lying in a circle, their heads touching one another, Chawnee Borders said, and some had their hands clasped as if "though they were begging for life," according to Sursak Wongsakulung, president of the Thai Association of Southern California, who heard the woman's story.

Borders told her story at a special meeting called at Wat Thai of Los Angeles, a Buddhist temple where \$10,000 was raised for a relief fund.

She related her story in Thai, with her account interpreted by Kwan-chanok Tantivejkiat, secretary of the board of directors for the Wat Thai temple.

Borders' account was given as law-enforcement officials in Arizona said they have no new information on the slaying.

Mariocopa County sheriff's spokesman Duane Brady said earlier Wednesday that deputies are manning telephones 24 hours a day and checking all leads into Saturday's slaughter of six Buddhist monks, a nun, a novice monk and a temple helper.

To date, investigators have re-

vealed that at least two killers thought of wearing latex gloves were involved and that witnesses saw a red-and-white Ford Bronco II in the vicinity of the temple several hours before the bodies were discovered.

They immediately noticed something unusual.

The grounds were so flooded with water from the temple's irrigation system that the two could get in the temple only through a side door, where the nearby ground wasn't as wet, Borders said.

But the two women merely thought the monks had forgotten to turn off the irrigation system, she said.

Borders said the two entered the temple after taking off their shoes, as is the custom. She saw the legs of the abbot sticking outside the monks' living area. But because monks have been known to sleep on the floor, she didn't become alarmed.

Instead, out of respect, she cautioned her friend not to disturb the abbot, she said.

Borders put flowers in front of the Buddha and had brought the lunch from the car into the temple when the telephone rang, she said. She went into the kitchen to answer the pay telephone, but the caller hung up. Thinking that she should have answered the non-pay telephone near the living area, she went to it.

The line had been cut, she said,

according to the interpreter.

Meanwhile, she noticed that the other monks were lying on the floor in the living area alongside the abbot.

And so was the nun. In Buddhism, it is forbidden for a woman to sleep next to a monk, who takes a vow of celibacy.

"I spoke aloud. Why would a nun sleep by the monks?" Borders said she thought at the time, according to the interpreter. "I looked more carefully at the monks."

She noticed that they were lying in a circle and their heads were touching one another. Most of them were face down. Some were on their sides.

Then she saw blood. It was on the floor, next to the abbot.

She screamed and panicked, ran to get her friend and grabbed her by the hand, she said. They ran barefoot to the nearest neighbor in the remote area, shouting in English and Thai all the way. They didn't think about their car. They didn't think about the flooded grounds, she said.

Once at the neighbor's, authorities were called. When Borders and her friend returned to the temple about 30 minutes later, law-enforcement officials would not let them back in. Instead, they quietly escorted them into a patrol car.

The investigation into the biggest mass slaying in Arizona history had started.

The money raised at Wednesday night's meeting at Wat Thai will be used for the temple, including such matters as funeral arrangements, temple officials said. More than 400 people attended the meeting.

Smith Thongkam, owner of Spicy Thai Restaurant in Phoenix and a member of the temple's board of directors, said funeral arrangements still are tentative, in part because police aren't certain when they will be finished at the temple.



POCATELLO — Idaho State, already a near-unanimous pick for last place in the Big Sky Conference football race, announced Thursday it has lost four starters to a variety of problems.

School officials said starting defensive linemen Lance Nazel, Toby Smith and Joe Cunningham are out and starting offensive tackle Todd Blackwell is lost. Nazel and reserve offensive guard Marcus Tolliver have ended their football careers after failing to raise their grades to NCAA academic standards in summer school.

Smith has withdrawn from the team for personal reasons, while Cunningham failed to overturn a disciplinary suspension handed down in the spring. Blackwell left the Pocatello campus to take care of his ailing mother, the school said.

Cunningham started five games for ISU last year, when the Bengals were 3-8 and 1-7 in league.

Nazel's loss will affect ISU the most. The 6-foot-2, 230-pound senior earned second team All-Big Sky honors last year. Nazel, a junior college transfer from Laney College in California, was ISU's sixth leading tackler last year with 48 and was the

Bengals' primary pass rusher. "Lance was an outstanding player for us last year," Coach Garb Hall said. "It's unfortunate. Particularly in Lance's situation, because he had a great future."

Tolliver, a 6-1, 290-pound sophomore offensive lineman, was expected to be an impact player at Idaho State.

"I'm particularly disappointed with the players that had academic problems," Hall said.

"I feel like they let themselves down and they let the team down."

"It's not very hard to maintain eligibility. That's why I lose patience with the guys

who don't do it. They got themselves in the predicament and they don't have enough backbone to buck down in the summer and overcome it."

Smith, a two-year starter at nose guard after transferring from the University of Idaho, was Idaho State's fifth-leading tackler and leading sacker. Smith accounted for 49 tackles, including a team-high 11 tackles for losses.

Blackwell, a 6-4, 285-pound sophomore guard, returned to his Concord, Calif., home and will not rejoin the team. Blackwell's father died five years ago and his mother suffers from multiple sclerosis.

Puerto Rico keeps U.S. from basketball gold

HAVANA — It will be up to the NBA to bring gold to the U.S. basketball.

For the fifth time in as many major international competitions, a U.S. men's team will return without a gold medal. Puerto Rico saw to that Thursday night with a 73-68 victory over the United States in the semifinals of the Pan American Games.

This current U.S. team — the last made up of collegiate players with the NBA set to join USA Basketball for next summer's Olympics in Barcelona — had to face an experienced Puerto Rican team without its leading scorer and playmaker, Jim Jackson. The Ohio State star could only sit on the bench, his left foot in a cast with a stress fracture diagnosed on Wednesday.

Puerto Rico had beaten a U.S. team two of the last three times the countries met. U.S. coach Gene Keady had promised this would be a close game, unlike the last two U.S. victories in this tournament by a combined 104 points against the Bahamas and Uruguay.

When the game ended, Puerto Rican players and fans converged on the court as the U.S. non-gold run stretched again.

Now the United States will play for the bronze medal on Saturday against Cuba, a team it beat in the opening game of the tournament, 92-88.

Mexico, definitely the surprise team of the competition, earned the right to play Puerto Rico for the gold with a 93-87 victory over the host nation behind the 24 points of Oscar Castellanos.

Mexico had a 15-point lead in the second half, but Cuba rallied to tie the game 80-80 with four minutes to play. Mexico got the lead back to five at 89-85 before Leonardo Perez brought Cuba back within two with a 3-pointer with 59 seconds left. Castellanos clinched it with a driving basket with 33 seconds left.

Now the U.S. team must beat the home country a second time to avoid returning home without any medal.

"We're not done yet. We want to win the bronze. That's the American way," Keady said. "We want to be the best."

Yankees send Mattingly to bench over hair length

Stunned slugger thinks it's 'kinda silly', wonders if management wants him out

Mattingly was pulled out of the Yankees' lineup Thursday because he refused to get a haircut. After the game, the first baseman revealed he told the club earlier in the season he wanted to be traded. He hasn't changed his mind about a trade, either.

Mattingly, the last link to Yankee winners, was supposed to be batting third as the designated hitter against Kansas City, but just minutes before the game it was announced he would not be playing. Late in the game, the Yankees said it was for "personal reasons." Most thought he was out of the lineup because of a bad back, but it turned out to be a bad haircut.

The clubhouse was closed for about 20 minutes following a 5-1 victory over the Royals, and manager Stump Merrill then

said Mattingly would be on the bench until he got a trim. The Yankees are scheduled to play Chicago on Friday night.

"He was told to get a haircut before the game," a shaken Merrill said. "He was told about it two weeks ago, too."

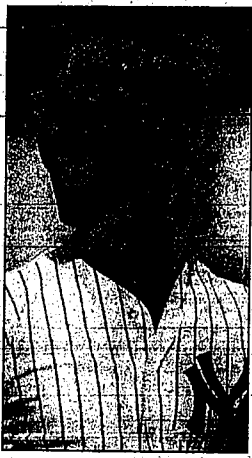
Mattingly said the haircut order was coming from general manager Gene Michael and being carried out by Merrill.

"He asked me if he was in the lineup and I asked him if he would get his hair cut. He said no, so I told him he would not be in the lineup. Why have rules if you don't enforce them. It's in the contract and he signed it."

Mattingly appeared stunned by the whole incident and had a long meeting with reporters. During his news conference, he revealed he had asked to be traded in June.

Tyson's endorsement value on line starting today

Mike Tyson had better have a little money put aside, because that rainy day is approaching fast.

He has not been charged with a crime, but a county grand jury in Indianapolis begins hearing evidence today tied to an accusation of rape that could threaten his ability to make a living in the ring. If he loses, his appeal at the gate could evaporate faster than a stack of chips in Vegas. His endorsement value already is less than zero.

"He'd better beat Evander Holyfield," said Lloyd Kolmer, who heads a New York-based sports and celebrity consulting and negotiating firm, "because that's about the only way he'll ever make another nickel."

"As far as we're concerned," concurred Nova Lanktree, who directs operations for Chicago-based Burns Sports Celebrity Service, "Mike Tyson might as well be dead."

Now those assessments might sound

cold. But try to think of another figure in the wide world of sports whose image right now is nearly as loathsome. Agencies like those run by Kolmer and Lanktree spend a lot of time and effort doing just that — and they can't come up with any names to compile even a short list.

For instance, baseball's Wade Boggs and Pete Rose are both considered untouchables in the advertising and promotional business at the moment. And Jose Canseco, Dwight Gooden and football's Lawrence Taylor often show up

at the head of the class just below that one.

But none of them are thought to be, as Tyson is, irrevocably banished from the ballpark and commercial circuits that provide so many ballplayers with the adulation and walking-around change they seem to need so desperately AFTER they leave the game.

"I wasn't even in this business when Paul Hornung and Alex Karras got caught in that football betting scandal, but look how both of them made it back," Lanktree said.

"And I could even see where Rose,

Idaho officials set fall steelhead regs

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Fish and Game Commission has increased the fall season's daily steelhead limit in the Snake and Salmon rivers from one to two, but eliminated catch-and-release fishing beyond the bag limit.

The commission, meeting Thursday in Boise, set fall steelhead limits on the Snake and Salmon drainages, except the Little Salmon River, at two per day, two in possession and two for the season.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game officials had recommended a limit of one per day, one in possession and two per season. But spokesman Jack Trueblood said the higher bag and possession limits were adopted in exchange for eliminating catch-and-release fishing after reaching the daily limit.

Fall anglers were allowed to catch and release steelhead after filling their one-fish daily limit.

Commissioners accepted a staff recommendation to set limits of two per day, three in possession and six per season for the fall steelhead season in the Clearwater River drainage. Limits in the Little Salmon River were set at two per day, three in possession and six for the season.

The steelhead season in all the drainages begins Sept. 1 and continues through the end of the

year, Trueblood said.

Fish and Game commissioners also lifted a 31-inch maximum size restriction on steelhead caught in the Salmon River. Trueblood said the decision was aimed at keeping a promise made to anglers two years ago.

The regulation was intended to help build a self-sustaining hatchery run of steelhead in the Salmon River.

"That's still the goal, but it's one of those things," Trueblood said.

"That's what we told the public we were going to do and the commission felt that we would be ahead to retain our credibility."

In addition, he said, the run still can be supplemented if needed by steelhead raised at the Duvich National Fish Hatchery on the Clearwater River. Meanwhile, big game hunters lined up at Fish and Game offices throughout the state Thursday for a crack at leftover controlled-hunt permits for deer, elk and antelope.

Trueblood said about 70 people were on hand when the department's headquarters in Boise opened Thursday morning, and about 100 more were at the district office in Garden City.

They lined up to buy permits for controlled hunts still available after applications were drawn for most tags earlier this month.

Browns, Kosar expect improvement

The Cleveland Browns have turned the page on last season's 3-13 nightmare, and Bernie Kosar says he expects this year should be better.

"One of the things I've talked about is how we weren't all on the same page last year," Kosar said. "We're all on the same page now in terms of the routes we're throwing and the protection."

Kosar, who was sacked 37 times for 220 yards in losses in 1990, hopes to see a continuation of the improvements Friday night, when the Browns visit Washington. He's hoping for more of what he saw last week, when Cleveland beat the New York Giants 16-10.

"I don't think there's any question that the (offensive line) is ahead of where it was last year," said Kosar, who was neither sacked nor intercepted against the Giants. "I don't know if that's a stylistic thing, if they are playing better. They're playing as a group, and they're wanting to take people on at the line of scrimmage. That's a good sign. They're enjoying working together."

Kosar said tackle Tony Jones (6-5, 290) and guard Ed King (6-4, 302) are two big reasons for the line's improvements.

"In 1985, the problem with the offense wasn't that we ran the ball, but that we didn't know how to throw the ball now, and that makes it a professional offense."

Elsewhere around the league, Bobby Humphrey remains out of the Broncos camp, but Gaston Green and Robert Perryman continue to soften

Utah golfer tops career score at International

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. (AP) — Keith Clearwater compiled the best score of his five-season PGA Tour career Thursday in the storm-delayed and incomplete first round of the International.

And his 9-under-par 63 doesn't count. It will not go on the books or be figured into his season's scoring average.

Neither will a drive of about 400 yards-by-new-PGA-Champion-and-folk hero Long John Daly.

The weather — which caused a series of delays totaling more than three hours and left 72 players stranded on the course by darkness — had nothing to do with either Daly's drive or Clearwater's score.

It is the format and scoring system. Clearwater's effort will be recorded as 18 points — a one-round record — under the modified Stableford scoring system used for the International.

Medal scores do not count in this unique event. Points are awarded for a player's performance on each hole: 5 for an eagle, 2 for birdie, zero for par, minus-1 for bogey and minus-3 for double bogey and higher.

Clearwater, who hasn't won since his rookie season — of 1987, didn't make a bogey on the 5,750-yard Castle Pines Golf Club course and had nine birdies, including seven over one stretch of nine holes.

"The first round all year that didn't feel it right anything on the golf course," Clearwater said. "I putted better than I have in a long time. Everything that should go in, did go in," he said.

So did a couple that had no business falling into the cup. One was from about 70 feet, "up over a ridge, down and breaking several feet," Clearwater said.

49er owner's mall will allow Raider hats again

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Managers of a local shopping mall wrongly imposed a ban on Los Angeles Raiders paraphernalia, owners of the mall said Thursday.

An assistant manager at the Coral Square mall should not have imposed such a ban, said Marie Cartwright, a spokeswoman for the Edward J. DeBarro Corp. of Youngstown, Ohio.

The corporation is owned by the father of San Francisco 49ers owner Edward DeBarco Jr.

People in Raiders T-shirts, pants or hats shopping at the mall were told to remove them or leave because the clothes and hats are associated with gang activity. The name "Raiders" is used by a Coral Springs gang.

Cartwright said her company has sent out a memo to all mall managers informing them that such a policy is unacceptable.

"The silver and black can be worn at the site," Cartwright said.

"If they become rowdy or boister-

ous we will ask them to leave the mall."

Schools in neighboring Palm Beach County and elsewhere around the country have also tried to implement a similar ban on silver-and-black Raiders items.

The ban angered real Raiders fans. "It's ludicrous," said Ramon Colazzo, a Coral Springs resident. "I said, 'What if they come out with a gang called the Dolphins? You're going to ban everybody from wearing Dolphins hats.'"

Collazo, 48, is a detective with the Broward Sheriff's Office.

Nevertheless, a few weeks ago Coral Square guards told him to take off his Raiders hat, which he had purchased at the mall, or leave.

The ban applies to "anybody old or young, if they have a Raiders hat on," said Todd Horton, manager of the Footlocker, which sells Raiders clothing at the mall. Horton said Footlocker patrons have to keep their Raiders purchases in a bag until they leave Coral Square.

Agassi stumbles in U.S. Men's Hardcourts

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Fabrice Santoro, seeded 14th and playing his second three-set match in less than four hours, upset an ailing Andre Agassi 2-6, 7-5, 6-2 Thursday in the third round of the U.S. Men's Hardcourts Championship.

Top-seeded Boris Becker played 16th-seeded Christian Bergstrom in the evening match. No. 3 Agassi, the sixth-ranked player in the world, never found his power game against his 18-year-old opponent.

Agassi immediately left the Indianapolis Sports Center after Santoro's backhand winner ended the 1 hour, 48 minute match.

ATP Tour spokesman George Rubenstein said Agassi went to his hotel for treatment after he tried to vomit before match point. Rubenstein said Agassi wasn't feeling well, but there was no immediate explanation.

Santoro noticed Agassi's ailing but didn't mention it in the match, but he said Agassi didn't indicate he had a problem.

"Maybe he was underestimating me," Santoro said.

Santoro beat countryman Cedric Pioline 6-4, 5-7, 6-2 in a rain-delayed second-round match completed Thursday. Santoro looked like he'd played too much tennis after Agassi won the first set 6-2 in 33 minutes.

Hardcourts rehires fired ballboy who broke rules, talked to media

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A ballboy at the U.S. Men's Hardcourts Championships was fired for breaking a rule about talking to the media, then reinstated after the firing began to cause controversy.

Patrick Mahoney appeared on Wednesday's Indianapolis Star in a front-page color picture showing him yawning during a match.

The 10-year-old was sacked later that day for talking to the photographer who took the picture.

"I couldn't believe it," said Patrick's father, Gary Mahoney.

"They took what should have been a great moment in his life... and punished him for it. I feel like they made my son the scapegoat."

After much consideration and considerable backlash, tournament director Steve DeVoe offered reinstatement to Patrick later Wednesday.

Patrick said John Gelser, who oversees the ball boys and girls, never asked for his side of the story. "John told me I was being let go not because I yawned, but because I talked to the photographer," Patrick said.

Santoro, the only survivor among five French players in the \$1 million tournament, smashed shots, whiffed an overhead smash at one point, and served 5 feet long.

Santoro stepped up the pace, barely giving Agassi 10 seconds between points.



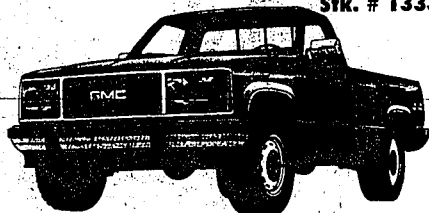

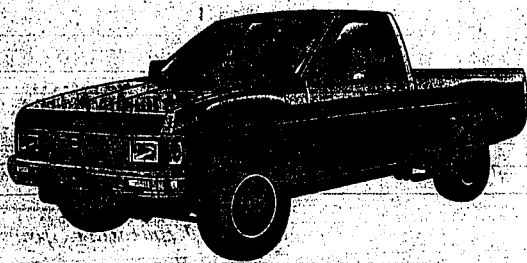

Local musicians highlight folk festival

HAILEY — What could be better than a summer evening in the park, listening to the sounds of folk music of every kind?

How about two days in the park?

The 14th Annual Northern Rockies Folk Festival returns to the Wood River Valley Friday and Saturday, with more than 50 musical artists from the Western United States performing some of the best folk music around.

Many local favorites will join the line-up of festival show stoppers such as Friday night's finale, Rob Quist and Great Northern and the festival's headliner group that closes the festival Saturday night, The Sundogs. The cost for this two-day event is \$3 for adults. Children under 12 and senior citizens are admitted free. Festival buttons may be purchased only at the gate at the Hailey City Park.

The festival, sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, continues to exist in part because of community fund-raising efforts. One major fund-raiser is the Friendship Quilt. For the past 10 years, a quilt has been produced for each festival by Sally Kern and local volunteers.

Food booths sponsored by local non-profit groups will provide a variety of ethnic treats.

The festival begins at 6 tonight with Cindra Palmer, a Hailey singer/guitarist who performs gospel and traditional folk music.

At 6:20 p.m., festival favorites from the valley, Jan Gray and Ken Britton, take the stage to play old-time American folk songs.

Then at 6:45 p.m., Heritage, with Gary Ivie, will play more traditional folk music.

At 7:15 p.m., another festival favorite from years past — The Boulder Brothers — will perform Irish reels and original songs. Brothers Paul and Bill Smith of Hailey are backed up by a terrific band and have recorded albums on the Sheepshead label.

Midnight Flyer, a bluegrass band from Meridian, will take the stage at 7:45 p.m.

The final act of the evening begins at 8:30 p.m. with Rob Quist and Great Northern. Formerly the Mission Mountain Woods Band from Montana, Quist is one of the best country-western acts on the road, says festival director Kit Nemas.

The \$3 festival button gains admittance to both days of music. The festival gets under way again at noon Saturday when Dee Street conducts a children's show, with her singing and guitar.

At 12:45 p.m. — the Sawtooth-Steppers will perform Idaho's official folk dance — the square dance. The group comes together from the Wood River Valley, Shoshone and Fairfield and will give a square dance demonstration complete with caller.

At 1:45 p.m. is local Hailey journalist/guitarist, Sher Brooks. She had produced her first album "Jusst Sher" with the help of Twin Falls

Money matters in new fall season shows

HOLLYWOOD — Two major aspects of American life are rarely depicted on prime-time television programs — watching television and worrying about money.

A recent three-week press tour here, sponsored by the networks, to promote their fall schedules, has disclosed no breakthroughs on the watching television front. But there is considerable evidence that the changing economy has caused programmers to sit up and take notice about the issue of money.

For the most part, prime-time television families have been almost like members of the British class system — economically, they simply were what they were, stuck in their financial slot with no particular hope or desire for advancement. They weren't

moving up, but they weren't moving down, either.

You never knew exactly what Beaver Cleaver's dad did to keep his family the picture of solid middle-class life. The same for Ozzie Nelson. The fathers just went to the office and the house got paid for and groceries appeared on the table.

That the Bunkers of "All in the Family" were working class and destined to stay that way was never a matter of discussion. The same for the upper class status of the Huxtables of "The Cosby Show." Basically, in all these families, except for the occasional episode that uses economic problems as a plot device, money is just not an issue.

Indeed, in recent years when money has been a part of prime time, it has simply been celebrated in passing, in the greed of

"Dallas" and the opulence of "Dynasty," for example.

The situation might be a bit different in the fall, however. Consider the new ABC sitcom "Sibs," which focuses on a relationship between two sisters. It was created by Heide Perlmann. James Brooks, whose credits range from "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" to "The Simpsons," is one of the executive producers.

"I think more than anything else I've ever been around, this show sees money as a factor in people's lives," Brooks said.

"Amounts of money, who has it, who doesn't, what your prospects are of getting it."

In addition, there are two new blue collar sitcoms, Fox's "Roc," which stars Charles Dutton, and CBS' "Royal Family" with Redd Foxx.

There have been plenty of blue collar

shows before, particularly in the wake of "All in the Family." Indeed, Foxx starred in one of them, "Sanford and Son." But both "Roc" and "Royal Family" are set up so that the earning, spending and saving of money should be at the core of their stories.

In "Roc," the title character is a hard-working trash collector married to a nurse. They are saving for their dream house. The thirty ways are challenged by the hustling attitude of "Roc."

Upbeat album reflects changes in Bolton's life

NEW YORK — A hit song isn't necessarily a great song, and a great song doesn't necessarily become a hit.

"What you hope you write is a great hit song," says Michael Bolton.

Some sincere at hit singles as commercial, but Bolton is practical.

"The whole industry revolves around hit songs. No matter how big you are, if you come out with an album and it doesn't have hits on it, people don't know you have an album out," he said.

"You should record songs that you love. God-willing, you're going to perform those songs for a long, long time."

Bolton began touring in July and will tour through 1991.

His first recording for Columbia Records was in 1983. Since then, there has been a recording every two years. From performing hard rock and competing for other singers, Bolton has gone to singing ballads in what one critic calls "a grand technicolor voice."

There were two hit singles from "The Hunger" in 1987 and five from "Soul Provider" in 1989. The latter's "How Am I Supposed to Live Without You?" earned Bolton his first Grammy, as best male pop vocalist.

"The Hunger" kind of put me on the map. It sold about 400,000 albums. After

"Soul Provider" came out, it sold more. It's platinum now," he said.

"Soul Provider," which he says has sold almost four million copies in the United States, is still on the best-selling charts. July 27 marked its 105th week.

It has been joined by the new "Time, Love and Tenderness," No. 11 on Cashbox magazine's July 27 chart. The first single — the upbeat, gospel-tinged "Love Is a Wonderful Thing," sped up the singles chart. "Time, Love and Tenderness," the second single, is doing the same.

Since Bolton is known as a ballad singer, Columbia Records President Don Jenner told him that people wouldn't expect his first single to have an upbeat, Motown feel. "It's like opening up with a big smile."

"It's fortunate that Donny and I are in

sync as much as we are," said Bolton. "I don't have to go through fighting with the company to know how good it feels not going through it."

Bolton said that "Time, Love and Tenderness" is the most upbeat album he's ever written. "Some records have personal problems all over them, somebody's self-absorption, self-indulgence."

But what about his recent divorce? Is that reflected in the songs? He says no.

"The divorce is something that was going on for a long time. I'm feeling a new feeling as compared with dwelling on the past. There's a feeling of embarking on a brand-new chapter. It's a very positive time."

Bolton, born in New Haven, Conn., has acquired a house in Connecticut so he can visit his three daughters. The oldest is 15.

University of Idaho professor's new book full of little known facts about Idaho history

TWIN FALLS - "In Mountain Shadows," a newly published history of Idaho, is packed with little known facts about the state.

The extensively illustrated book is the work of Carlos Schwantes, a history professor at the University of Idaho. He begins with Lewis and Clark's 1805 exploration, describing Idaho's native residents at that time.

He recounts the experiences of missionaries and Mormons, the fur traders and miners who were among Idaho's first non-native residents.

He describes the booms and busts

of mining days, the coming of the railroad and the vigilantism and chronic animosity toward Indians and Mormons during Idaho's territorial years.

Economic downturn, labor unrest and Populist activism figure prominently in the region's history after statehood in 1890, notes Schwantes. Then, powered by the automobile, low-cost electricity and a hearty timber industry, Idaho entered the twentieth century.

Schwantes looks at how the state survived the Great Depression. He profiles several of the state's important political leaders and

entrepreneurs, including Senator William Edgar Borah. J. R. Simplot and Joseph A. Albertson.

Throughout, the author works to capture the flavor of everyday life, colorful personalities, political and economic cycles, raging controversies and current trends that make Idaho unique. The book contains sections about the flu epidemic in Twin Falls in the early 1900s and about Shoshone Falls in the '20s. The founding of Sun Valley comes complete with illustrations of 1940s travel posters from the area. Other sections in the book center on the schools of Rupert and the emergence of the Minidoka Relocation Center.

Pets locked in cars rely on strangers' kindness

DEAR ABBY: I just returned from my vacation and had to write this letter first thing. While vacationing in a national park, I saw several dogs locked in closed (or almost closed) cars while their owners toured museums, rode the tram, ate lunch, etc.

Abby, I recall reading in your column the facts about how fast a car heats up when left locked on a hot summer day. Please publish these facts again soon. Maybe it will cause some thoughtless vacationers to reconsider before taking their pets on vacation with them.

While they may think it's the kind or convenient thing to do, they should decide while planning their vacation whether they are willing to leave at least two car windows

partially open when they stop for even a few minutes. If not, they should leave their pet with a relative or friend, have a neighbor care for it at home, or board it in a kennel. These are by far the kindest options for people who really love their pets. And if other tourists, sight-seeing in a national park, should observe a pet locked in a car with less-than-adequate ventilation, they should report it to the park ranger.

DEAR CONCERNED: Thank you for a timely reminder to well-meaning, but thoughtless pet owners.

The Animal Protection Institute, P.O. Box 22505, Sacramento, Calif. 95822, sells cards that may be placed under the windshield wiper. They sell for only 53¢ per 100 cards.

The message on the card reads: "YOUR DOG MAY BE DYING!"

"We understand you meant to be kind by taking your dog with you today, but you could be risking your pet's life."

"On a hot summer day, the inside of a car heats very quickly."

"On an average 85-degree day, for example, the temperature inside your car — with the windows slightly

opened — will reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes.

In 30 minutes it will go up to 120 degrees. On warmer days, it will go even higher.

"A dog's normal body temperature is 101.5 to 102.2 degrees Fahrenheit.

"A dog can withstand a body temperature of 107 to 108 degrees Fahrenheit for only a very short time before suffering irreparable brain damage — or even death.

"The closed car interferes with the dog's normal cooling process, that is, evaporation through panting.

"If your dog is overcome by heat exhaustion, you can give immediate first aid by immersing him or her in cold water until body temperature is lowered."

Gill, Jackson, Brooks top award nominations

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Vince Gill, Alan Jackson and Garth Brooks — three soft-spoken yet emotional singers — head nominees for the 25th annual Country Music Association awards announced Thursday.

Gill and Jackson have six nominations each and Brooks has five. All are up for male vocalist of the year, best single and best album.

Men dominated the nominations, which are made in 12 award categories.

Apart from the female vocalist category, just 12 of the nominees are women.

Winners will be announced Oct. 2 during a two-hour program broadcast by CBS from the Grand Ole Opry House. Finalists were chosen by the 6,000 voting members of the CMA, mostly singers, musicians, songwriters,

record company executives and disc jockeys.

A couple of top finishers in recent competitions came away empty-handed or nearly so this year.

Randy Travis, who dominated country music awards in the late 1980s, was named just one nomination this year, in the vocal event of the year category.

Hank Williams Jr., entertainer of the year in 1987 and 1988, had none.

Joining Brooks and Gill as nominees for entertainer of the year, the top award, are Clint Black, George Strait and Reba McEntire.

Strait has won the honor the past two years and McEntire won it in 1986.

Bounding out the finalists for best male singer are Black, who won the award in 1990; and the veteran Strait.

Nominated for top female vocalist are McEntire, Patty Loveless, Kathy Mattea, Lorrie Morgan and Tanya Tucker.

McEntire's nominations come five months after seven band members and her tour manager were killed in a private plane crash near San Diego.

Finalists for single of the year are "Don't Rock the Jukebox" by Jackson, "Don't Tell Me What to Do" by Pam Tillis, "Friends in Low Places" by Brooks, "Here's a Quarter (Call Someone Who Cares)" by her newcomer Travis Tritt, and "Pocket Full of Gold" by Gill.

For album of the year, finalists are "Don't Rock the Jukebox" by Jackson, "No Fences" by Brooks, "Pocket Full of Gold" by Gill, "Put Yourself in My Shoes" by Black and "Rumor Has It" by McEntire.

The Judds, a mother-daughter team, are finalists for their fourth straight award as best vocal duo. Naomi Judd will quit touring at the end of the year because she has hepatitis, leaving daughter Wynonna to become a solo performer.

Other nominees for top duo are Baillie & the Boys, the Bellamy Brothers, Foster & Lloyd and Sweethearts of the Rodeo.

Finalists for vocal group of the year are the often-honored Alabama, Diamond Rio, the Kentucky Headhunters, Rostlos-Hart and Shenandoah.

For best music video, finalists are "Come Next Monday" by K.T. Oslin, "Don't Rock the Jukebox" by Jackson, "Fancy" by McEntire, "Love Can Build a Bridge" by the Judds and "The Thunder Rolls" by Brooks.

Van Damme kick-boxes his way to top

NEW YORK — "Do you trust me?"

The voice, slightly taunting, belongs to 30-year-old martial arts superstar Jean-Claude Van Damme, about to demonstrate how close he comes to your face with his deadly high kick.

It sounds like a line from "Double Impact," his latest in a string of kick-boxing blockbuster. But this time it's no movie.

Van Damme flexes his powerful chest, the result of daily four-hour workouts, and gazes down at his pointy-tipped cowboy boots.

He abandons his stance for a

minute and walks over sympathetically.

"I'm pretty good but there's always a chance I hit you," he says in his lilting Belgian accent, flashing a wide smile. Then he moves back. His leg comes up so fast the winds blow by your face in a blur. Reflexes don't work.

"He came this close," says his wife, Gladys, holding her thumb and forefinger about a half-inch apart.

Van Damme throws back his head and laughs.

It's just another delightful moment in the enchanted life of Van Damme, Hollywood's newest action hero and the latest European emigre to land in America and mop up the competition.

He is charming, without appearing too calculating, and intense, grilling those who interview and photograph him.

And to call him a little flirtatious is like saying the Sultan of Brunei has a few dollars in the bank.

"My one weakness is women," he confides in a hotel restaurant, while his third wife eats a plate of pasta a few feet away.

Like Arnold Schwarzenegger, Van Damme arrived in California virtually penniless in 1980.

He navigated his way to stardom by a canny combination of brawn and brains.

Though he was a karate star and health club owner in Belgium, Van

Damme abandoned his career there to pursue a lifelong dream of movie acting.

"I don't care about the money; it's only paper to me," says Van Damme, whose films such as "Lionheart," "Cyborg" and "Death Warrant" have grossed millions.

Like Schwarzenegger, Van Damme speaks with an evangelical fervor.

"When you have two feet and two hands, anything is possible," he says, mouthing a familiar refrain of how a humble immigrant can arrive here with little more than discipline and ambition and easily overtake the soft Americans.

2 Van Dammes make for solid 'Double Impact'

HOLLYWOOD — "Double Impact" offers two Jean-Claude Van Dammes for the price of one, and for fans of the Belgian-born martial arts star, it delivers the goods.

It's a solid, fast-moving action-adventure set largely in Hong Kong, which is dynamically photographed by Richard Kline.

Written by Van Damme with director Sheldon Lettich, the plot is elementary but serviceable.

Back in 1966, a couple of bad guys (Alan Scarfe, Philip Chan-Yan Kin) assassinate a British entrepreneur and his wife in Hong Kong, but their twin sons survive.

One of them, Chad, is rescued by the father's loyal, avuncular associate (Geoffrey Lewis), who raises the boy in France; the other, Alex, is taken by his nanny to a

Hong Kong orphanage, left in the care of a nun with a decided French accent. So much for

explaining away Van Damme's own accent.

Twenty-five years later, Chad

gets a job on Alex, who's become a rough-tough Hong Kong smuggler while Chad lives the good life as a popular Beverly Hills, Calif., aerobics instructor.

Predictably, Chad and Alex don't hit it off initially but join forces to avenge their parents' deaths. In the writing and in Van Damme's playing, Chad and Alex are sharply, believably defined as two distinct individuals.

The dual role offers Van Damme a stretch as an actor, but wisely he and his associates don't let the demands get in the way of slum-bagging action.

Indeed, "Double Impact" (rated R for standard action movie violence and language plus some sex and nudity) ends in a virtuoso showdown sequence aboard a giant freighter in the Hong Kong harbor.

The dual role offers Van Damme a stretch as an actor, but wisely he and his associates don't let the demands get in the way of slum-bagging action.

Indeed, "Double Impact" (rated R for standard action movie violence and language plus some sex and nudity) ends in a virtuoso showdown sequence aboard a giant freighter in the Hong Kong harbor.

The last cut on the new album, "Steel Bars," is by M. Bolton and B. Dylan.

"A woman who works with Bob called me in California and asked

whether I'd like to write with him. She said if I want to, drive to the mountain where he lives," Bolton recalled.

"I've written lyrics I thought were Dylanesque. I've never had the confidence of delivering them."

"I was getting nervous as I was driving up there, getting intimidated. Can I write lyrics with Bob Dylan in the same room?"

"I picked up an acoustic guitar, he had a lot of equipment. I played some ideas I had that I thought felt

like Bob Dylan in the '60s and would be comfortable for my voice."

"He would come up with a line. I'd say, 'How about,' and sing it into another line. We worked a few hours."

Dylan sent Bolton more lyrics.

"The last line and a half he sent me two days before I did the final vocal."

show, "The Torkelsons," which centers around a big, lovable Oklahoma family that constantly and imaginatively struggles to get by. In the pilot, the mother figures out a way to replace the just-possessed washer and dryer, then takes in a border to help make ends meet.

It is not surprising to see the networks sit up and take notice of the shaky economy; after all, they've been affected by it as much or more as any part of society.

The changing competitive landscape with the emergence of cable combined with a depressed advertising market have sent tremors through network television. Layoffs abound.

In Hollywood, people are thinking that they have to be content with

merely huge amounts of money, instead of obscene amounts.

Veteran writers of TV shows who a few years ago would have post-development deals at studios — meaning they get to sit around and think up new programs — instead are scrambling for jobs as staff writers on existing shows.

And with high costs and restrictive union contracts, work is going elsewhere — to Florida, Georgia and Canada.

"And the production of cheaper reality" shows also reduces the number of people employed by the networks.

Indeed, if any spate of programming can be seen as helping us turn our back on the present situation, it would be three nostalgia programs — CBS' "Brooklyn Bridge" about family life in New

York in 1956, ABC's "Homefront" about the years immediately following World War II, and NBC's

"If I Fly Away," set in a small southern town in 1959, at the nascent of the civil rights era.

When times are tough, it's tempting to go back to a simpler era. The irony, of course, is that if the makers of these programs take note of the precarious economy have read the situation correctly and their shows become hits, then they will make so much money they won't have to worry about these matters ever again.

'Robin Hood' muddled version of an old fable

ROBIN HOOD (PG-13). A case where more is less, this newest version of the venerable tale of outlaws in Sherwood Forest can't decide if it's a traditional action adventure, a New Age fable or a 19th-century Python farce. Making things even more muddled, star Kevin Costner doesn't have the movie to play an outlaw king; the action is fine, but at two hours and

23 minutes, everything else has to be squeezed in. **HOT SHOTS!** (PG-13). Though it doesn't seem possible that there could be a pinhead's worth of difference between this off-the-wall comedy and "Naked Gun 2½," in fact this is the funnier movie. For one thing, it is a specific parody of "Top Gun" and even pratfall humor works better when there is a reason for the fall. For another, Charlie Sheen has an enviable deadpan panache and he and Valeria Golino are a much more engaging couple than the pair in Brand X.

Changing relationships, new people mark next season on 'Cosby Show'

By Debbi Oiley

What is left to say about "The Cosby Show"? As it prepares to begin its eighth season on NBC,

"The Cosby Show" (airing Thursdays) ranks as one of the most popular situation comedies in television history. Janet Leahy, who joined Marcy Carsey and Tom Werner as an executive producer of the show, credits the phenomenal success of "The Cosby Show" to the influx of new characters and changing relationships that are a staple of the series.

"Every year there are new characters added," says Leahy, "and with that the relationships grow in the family: The relationships between the new characters and the family members. So we don't seem to be lacking in story ideas." Leahy says writers of "The Cosby Show" are able to hold on to the original vision of the sitcom by closely following character development. "The characters are growing, especially since they've been children on the show and we've seen them grow up," Leahy says. "If you as a writer can aspire to those growth fluctuations and those growth patterns, then I think you can retain at least some of the spirit of the show."

Leahy is particularly enthusiastic when she is discussing new plot lines and ideas for "The Cosby Show"'s eighth season. "Cliff and Clair (Bill Cosby and Phyllis Diller) are now grandparents, and you can see them interacting with their grandchildren. Cliff and Clair's children are now parents, and that

brings up another whole bag of issues: raising children, and the support system and the conflicts. Cliff and Clair are also making changes on the house." Leahy pauses to laugh and adds, "You know how Cliff will get involved in that. He'll be there managing."

Also, Vanessa (Tempestt Bledsoe) has a new man in her life," Leahy continues, "which has created some conflict in the house, because she's 18 and he's 11 years older than her. So there are a lot of things (that will be) going on this year."

Leahy wants to refigure the characters' interactions. "What I'm trying to do this year especially is to put characters together that haven't been together before. A lot of times, you didn't see Theo (Malcolm Jamal Warner) with his mother. He's always been with dad." She also mentions that she'd like to see

Olivia (Raven Symone) interact more with Pam (Erica Alexander).

Leahy exhibits a personal commitment to concentrating on the positive in "The Cosby Show," pointing out that the community center is a venue she would like to include more and more in the series. "We're doing a lot this year with the community center, and (we're) seeing the community center, especially in urban environments, as a real central part of people's lives. I think it plays a tremendous role that people don't recognize in terms of keeping the community together and inspired. There's a support system there. I'd like people to understand that."

Reasoner tribute tops list Fewer tubes in households

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS regained its summer ratings lead with help from Sunday news-magazine "60 Minutes," which included a tribute to former anchor Harry Reasoner.

Reasoner died last week at age 68. In Sunday's "60 Minutes" installment, commentator Andy Rooney used film clips and anecdotes to honor his former colleague.

Reasoner had retired in May to become editor emeritus of the series he helped start in 1968.

The program was the most-watched show on television last week, pushing CBS into first place with a 9.2 average rating, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

ABC was second with 8.9, and NBC was a close third with 8.8.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

CBS' No. 1 finish followed three weeks of ABC wins. Before that, CBS had been on top for a month.

Last week's No. 2 show was a rerun of NBC's comedy veteran,

"Cheers." In third place was CBS' "Designing Women."

In a two-way tie for fourth was CBS' new hit "Northern Exposure" and ABC's repeat screening of the 1985 Arnold Schwarzenegger shoot-em-up, "Commando."

In sixth was CBS' Emmy-winning comedy series "Murphy Brown," followed by NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries."

ABC's "Roseanne" was No. 8. CBS' long-running Angela Lansbury series "Murder, She Wrote" was No. 9.

ABC's sitcom "Family Matters" was 10th.

NEW YORK (AP) — Nielsen Media Research is reducing its estimate of U.S. households with televisions by 1 million because analysts concluded the prior estimate had been overstated, a spokesman said.

Later this month, the estimated number of TV households will drop to 92.1 million, which by coincidence was the same number used by the ratings company and the networks during the 1989-90 television season.

Last season, there were an estimated 93.1 million households. But that is being reduced by 1 million for the coming season after a review of data from the 1990 census, said Nielsen spokeswoman Jo LaVerde.

The company had made its growth projections based on data from the last census in 1980, she said. But when it examined the information from the new census, it concluded that it had overstated the number of TV households slightly, she said.

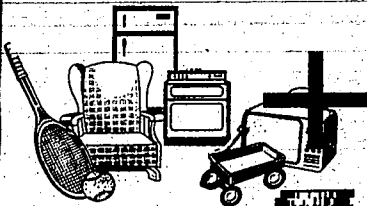

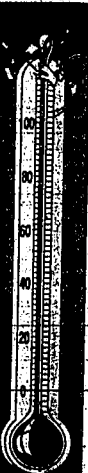
