Communist Party near death

MOSCOW — Soviet lawmakers dealt a potential death blow Thursday to the Communist Party, suspending the crippled and discredited organization and freezing its bank accounts because of the party's leading role in last week's coup.

In Kazakhstan, there were rallies and protests amid fears that the Russian Federation, led by an increasingly powerful Boris N. Yeltsin, could try to seize parts of the Central Asian republic's territory where most of the inhabitants are ethnic Russians. Amid concern about who controls the many nuclear weapons in Kazakhstan, the republic's president shut down its huge Semipalatinsk testing range. President Mikhail S. Gorbachev sent a delegation to Kazakhstan to "keep things from snowballing."

Ten days after the announcement of the coup that hastened the demise of the central government, Yeltsin went on the radio to calm the people.

Soviets lower nuclear guard

WASHINGTON — The Soviet Union has put some of its nuclear weapons capable of striking the United States in a lower state of readiness, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Private U.S. analysts said the move, which started during last week's failed coup, probably was intended to signal to the United States that the Soviet strategic nuclear arsenal was under control during the political upheaval.

Pete Williams, the chief Pentagon spokesman, declined to say exactly what actions the Soviets took to make their strategic, or long-range nuclear weapons less ready. He said the Soviets did not directly tell the Bush administration about the change, meaning it probably was detected by U.S. spy satellites.

"During the coup the Soviets lowered the profile of their strategic weapons," Williams told reporters at the Pentagon.

Yeltsin welcomed the destruction of "that powerful, bureaucratic system" which has for six years stood in the path of

transformations" during Gorbachev's rule. Capping nearly a week of attacks on the Communist Party for its role in the coup, the Supreme Soviet legislature halted party activity nationwide.

The step — taken near the end of three

days of marathon debates — was part of changes that restructured the pillars of Soviet society and raised fears of further economic turmoil, ethnic unrest and political chaos.

Without drama, legislators voted 283-29, with 52 abstentions, to suspend the party that had ruled the nation by fear and intimidation for 74 years, with a presence in every factory, school and city hall. They also froze its bank accounts and halted its financial operations, meaning party operatives cannot be paid.

"I frankly rejoice in ... the demise, the fall of the totalitarian non-democratic party," President Bush said in Maine.

Party archives were sealed, which could hurt party officials seeking jobs elsewhere.

The resolution urged the Soviet prosecutor to turn over evidence of official involvement in the coup to the national Supreme Court, which would then determine whether the party can resume operations.

But it appeared unlikely the party could reassert the control it once had.

Area residents purchase Walker Center, restore non-profit status

GOODING — A group of Magic Valley residents has bought the Walker Center and plans to return the alcohol and drug-abuse treatment facility to its original, not-for-profit status.

Rita Larom of Twin Falls, president of the new Walker Center board of directors, announced the purchase from HealthTrust, Inc., of Nashville, Tenn., on Thursday.

The center will resume its non-profit status Sept. 1. "We purchased the assets from HealthTrust, Inc., and now we are owned and governed as we originally were in 1976," said Larom, who is

director of the Center for New Directions at the College of Southern Idaho.

Under the terms of the sale, the names of the buyers and the price they paid for the center were not made public.

The facility will be overseen by a board that includes Larom, Walker Center founder Archie Walker of Bliss, Earl Reed of Reed Grain in Gooding, retired banker Sam Yost of Twin Falls, attorney Rob Williams of Jerome, accountant Tom Jones of Gooding and Walker Center physician Dr. D.O. Smith.

The Walker Center is a 22-bed center in Gooding with outreach programs in Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Burley, Ketchum and Boise.

It also sponsors family counseling sessions for addicts and their families.

HealthTrust, which operates acute-care hospitals throughout the United States, announced on June 7 that it was no longer interested in running the center.

"They really didn't have a need for us," said Martin Mueller, chief executive officer of the center. "We were the only alcohol and drug-abuse treatment center they owned. We were their only square peg in a round pile."

Walker said he approached HealthTrust about the sale last month. A recovering alcoholic who founded the center in 1976, he said he arranged the deal because he feels the Walker Center is vital to the health of the

Twin Falls mayor, council set to hike their pay 27%

TWIN FALLS — City Council members say they have not had a pay raise in six years and that it's time to change that.

So City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich will write a resolution to raise the mayor's salary by \$200 a month and council members' pay by \$135 a month. The raise would give the mayor a \$950 monthly salary, while council members will make \$635 a month.

That's a 27 percent pay hike. The council cannot give itself a pay raise within 60 days before an election, so it must vote on the resolution by Tuesday and, if it passes, publish it by this Thursday.

Council salaries are not supposed to become a second income, Councilman Jim Vickers said. In fact, Councilman Art Frantz said, when he ran for the job he did not know the position paid anything.

But after six years without a raise, the council members say it is time to catch up to the cost of living. The salaries help cover expenses such as gasoline and oil for cars, telephone bills and other expenses that come with the job. But Vickers said council members do not always seek reimbursement for expenses for which they could get reimbursed.

"The Twin Falls City Council is one of the best dollar values in any city, state or federal spending," Vickers said.

The cost of living has risen about 27 percent since the council last got a pay raise, city Manager Tom Courtney said. The proposed raises were based on that figure, and city Finance Director Gary Evans said the raises for the mayor and rest of the council would cost a total of \$11,340 a year.

The council has no policy on pay raises but council members said they would like to set up one to review the cost of living every year or two.

Brain differences found between heterosexual, homosexual males

WASHINGTON — A cluster of brain cells that may guide the sex drive of men is twice as large in heterosexual males than it is in homosexual males, suggesting that homosexuality could be a matter of biological destiny, a researcher reports.

In microscopic examinations of the brains of 41 men and women, including 19 homosexual men, Simon LeVay of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies, San Diego, Calif., found that a specific cluster of cells

was always larger for heterosexual males than the other specimens.

LeVay cautioned that while the evidence demonstrates a strong link between the size of that group of cells and the sexual preference of males, researchers still aren't sure which is cause, which is effect. But he made clear that, based on his own findings and earlier animal studies, he believes the odds are that there is a strong biological determinant of

homosexuality — something long argued by many within the gay community. His research focused on a cluster in

the interstitial nuclei of the anterior hypothalamus, or INAH, which has been identified in animal studies as a principal root of male sexual behavior.

LeVay said he found a difference in a cluster called INAH 3, which is one of four INAH groups of cells.

In the brains of heterosexual men, he said, the INAH 3 is "about the size of a grain of sand." In homosexual men and in women, the structure is "small to vanishing."

The study, to be published Friday in the journal Science, did not include specimens from known homosexual women.

Richard Kerr named acting director of CIA

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard J. Kerr, the deputy director of the CIA, will take over next week as acting director to replace William Webster, who is retiring from government service, the agency said Thursday.

The CIA public affairs office said Kerr will become acting director on Sept. 2, and will serve until the new director is chosen.

Webster announced his retirement in May and said he would leave the agency at the end of July to go into private law practice. But he extended his service, at the request of President Bush, after the Senate held up confirmation of his designated successor, Robert Gates.

The Senate Intelligence Committee, which was supposed to start its Gates confirmation hearings on July 15, postponed them until September 16 to pursue new information regarding Gates' role in the Iran-Contra affair.

The information stems from testimony by former CIA officer Alan Fiers, who pleaded guilty earlier this month to two misdemeanors in connection with the diversion of Iran arms sales profits to the Contra rebels in Nicaragua.

Fiers said he reported the diversion to three of his superiors, one of whom told him to withhold the information from Congress. During some of that time, Gates was deputy director to William Casey, becoming acting director of the agency in December 1986, when the late CIA chief became too ill with a brain tumor to work.

Gates served in that capacity until Webster became agency director in the spring of 1987.

Citgo will pay out \$6 million

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Citgo Petroleum Corp. will pay a record \$6 million to settle federal claims that poor training and equipment caused an explosion that killed six people, officials said Thursday.

Citgo denied any fault or liability in the March explosion near Lake Charles, but agreed to pay \$5.8 million in fines and up to \$200,000 safe money into an industry-wide safety training program.

OSHA Director Gerard Scannell, who toured the southwestern Louisiana plant a few days after the March 3 explosion, announced the settlement in Washington, D.C., and talked afterward with victims, their families and lawyers in a telephone conference call.

One of them, Charles Savage lost his 25-year-old son, Larry.

"I felt like OSHA did what they should have done," said Savage of Lake Charles.

Ray faces 5 manslaughter charges

NEW YORK — Even as he cleaned out subway cars, Robert Ray dreamed of one day driving them. His dream came true — until it ended in a nightmarish wreck beneath Manhattan, with an allegedly drunken Ray blamed for the death of five people.

Ray, 38, was ordered held without bail Thursday after his arraignment on five counts of manslaughter. He was arrested a day earlier, hours after he fled the scene of the accident, authorities said.

Ray joined the Transit Authority in January 1983, starting as a car cleaner. Ray's lot at the agency eventually improved. In 1988, he passed a civil service exam and landed the job he'd really wanted: motorman.

Safety belt use up, so are fatalities

ATLANTA — The use of car safety seats for children has soared in the last eight years, but child fatalities have not decreased, probably because kids are riding around more, federal researchers said Thursday.

"It's our suspicion that children are spending more and more time in cars, so more kids are exposed to risk for longer periods of time," said Dr. Julie Russell, an epidemiologist with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control's Division of Injury Control. "The restraints are very effective, but you have more kids in cars more often."

About 500 to 700 children under age 5 have died in U.S. traffic accidents each year since 1983. In the same period, as mandatory safety-seat laws spread to all states, use of the seats rose from 38 percent to 84 percent for children ages 1 to 4 and from 60 percent to 83 percent for children younger than age 1, the CDC reported.

States show no signs of recovery

NEW YORK — There were no signs of an economic recovery in the latest batch of tax revenue figures from state governments, according to a study released Thursday. But its author said revenues should begin picking up soon.

Second-quarter tax revenues rose a meager 2 percent over the same period of 1990, the Center for the Study of the States reported. If tax rates hadn't been raised in some states last year, the nationwide revenues would have declined by 1 percent, the center said.

Not surprisingly, the center found New England to be the hardest-hit region, with state tax revenues declining by a sharp 8.3 percent between the second quarters of 1990 and 1991.

The healthiest region was the Southwest, where revenues rose by 7 percent in the April-to-June period. Revenues were down 3.8 percent in the mid-Atlantic states, down 2.1 percent in the Far West and down 0.5 percent in the Southeast. They were up 0.4 percent in the Great Lakes, up 4.3 percent in the Plains and up 5.8 percent in the Rocky Mountain states.

Muppet museum honors Henson

LELAND, Miss. — Kermit the Frog was on hand to help cut the ribbon and open the Jim Henson Museum in the city where the Muppets' creator spent his early years.

"We've been working on the museum since May of 1990, shortly after Henson died," said Faye Stovall of the Jim Henson Memorial Committee. "The interest has always been there, we just needed to get things going."

The museum, which opened Wednesday, will boast three original Muppets and photographs of Henson.

Koop says AIDS is misunderstood

WASHINGTON — Former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop said Thursday the public is "concerned and confused" about the AIDS hazard, even though there is "essentially no risk" of getting it from a doctor.

Officials of the American Medical Association, the Centers for Disease Control and the Society for Hospital Epidemiology of America joined Koop in arguing against mandatory testing of physicians or other stringent measures.

"I have found that the public is both concerned and confused about the real risks of getting AIDS," said Koop. "There is essentially no risk...of transmission from a health care worker to a patient," he said.

American military numbers down

WASHINGTON — The number of U.S. military personnel on active duty has dropped to the lowest level since shortly before the Korean War, the Defense Department said Thursday. As of July 31, there were 2,018,361 members of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps on active duty, the lowest total since 1950.

Survivors rescued after 10 days adrift

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Two men and a pregnant woman who lost their sailboat to Hurricane Bob, said they drifted in a life raft for 10 days, surviving on dried fish and sea water as sharks circled nearby.

A Coast Guard helicopter spotted their orange raft Wednesday about 80 miles off Cape May, N.J. One of the three was hoisted to a Navy helicopter, and a crewman swam through shark-infested waters to reach the others.

All three were flown to an aircraft carrier, where a doctor treated them for dehydration and exposure.

The Navy's Atlantic Fleet headquarters in Norfolk said they were being taken to a hospital in New York on Thursday.

"They are all in good shape, despite being severely dehydrated," said Capt. Jerry Rogers, the carrier medical officer.

The health of the fetus was not immediately known.

The three — skipper Marc Dupaulin, 26, of Calabash, N.C.; Edward Provost, 35, of Pawleys Island, S.C.; and Allison Wilcox, 32, of Austin, Texas — had been in the raft since Aug. 18.

They told rescuers they survived on dried fish and drank sea water for three days after their fresh water ran out.

Their trip aboard a 38-foot sloop began Aug. 16 at Little River Inlet, S.C. They were scheduled to reach Newport, R.I., on Aug. 21. They were reported missing Aug. 23 by the boat's owner and the Coast Guard launched a search.

The three told rescuers they had been sailing a few hours when they ran into rough weather associated with Hurricane Bob. The sailboat began taking on water, and they abandoned ship minutes before it sank.

They said they grabbed three gallons of fresh water but had to drink one gallon quickly and use the jug to bail out the raft, which was tossed about in the high seas.

"The sea rolled our life raft 10 to 15 times," Provost said, "I lost count."

They ate dried fish stored in the raft and rationed the rest of the fresh water.

Wilcox, who is six months pregnant, considered the trip "the last chance she'd have to get away before the baby came," said her boyfriend, Steve Voorhees of Austin. "She was very much excited."

The search, which included Coast Guard and Navy vessels, spanned 80,000 square miles from South Carolina to New York's Long Island.

From the air, the raft looked like the orange fishing buoys searchers had been seeing all morning.

"Then I saw them waving," Petty Officer Bill Dudley said. "I had been kneeling down beside that window praying. This definitely was an answer to a prayer."

Diplomats expect new foreign minister to follow Shevardnadze

MOSCOW (AP) — Western diplomats said Thursday that new Soviet Foreign Minister Boris Pankin is expected to follow the tension-reducing policies established during Eduard Shevardnadze's five-year tenure.

But given the changing relationship between the Soviet republics and the central government, Pankin's role in shaping foreign relations remains unclear.

The little-known Pankin, the chief Soviet envoy to Czechoslovakia, was appointed on Wednesday to take over the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Pankin last week distinguished himself as the Soviet Union's only

ambassador to condemn the coup against President Mikhail Gorbachev before it collapsed.

That was apparently enough to earn him the job of succeeding Alexander Bessmertnykh, ousted for keeping silent until the three-day coup had failed.

Diplomats admitted not knowing much about Pankin, who is not a professional foreign service officer and whose early career revolved

around the Communist youth organization, the Komsomol. He served as ambassador to Sweden before being posted to Prague to sort out relations with the democratic government that took power there in 1989.

But what diplomats do know about Pankin they generally like.

Pankin "does not belong to the old Soviet diplomatic school," said the Czechoslovak prime minister, Marian Calfa.

"We could speak privately (with Pankin) about anything," said that country's foreign minister, Jiri Dienstbier.

Western missions in Moscow said the policies associated with She-

vardnadze and Gorbachev — including dramatic progress in disarmament and a shift from confrontation to partnership with the West — would dominate Pankin's agenda.

They said they do not expect new foreign policy initiatives while the balance of power between the Soviet central government and the individual republics remains unclear.

Despite repeated statements by Russian President Boris Yeltsin that there would be no contradictions in foreign policy between the republics and whatever center emerges shape, there is some discord among one diplomat said.

And a shift in emphasis in foreign relations should be in evidence

Monday when British Prime Minister John Major becomes the first Western government leader to visit Moscow since the failed coup. He plans talks with Yeltsin, and the meeting will take on more importance than before.

"Now there is a change in the weight of forces in foreign affairs between the center and the republics," said Andrei Zyrinov, a spokesman for the foreign ministry of the Russian federation.

Russia, for instance, is thinking about establishing its own diplomatic missions. This would require the agreement of host countries, Zyrinov said.

How this would affect Pankin's

job is unclear. One mission awaiting him is rebuilding the stature of the Soviet Foreign Ministry, which fell when Bessmertnykh replaced the strong-willed Shevardnadze in December.

Bessmertnykh never attained Shevardnadze's stature, one diplomat said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

While Pankin also will lack that stature, he has a certain moral authority because of his anti-coup statements, said the diplomat.

Zyrinov said the appointment of Pankin and the foreign policy that will grow out of last week's failed coup will be "better for all the world, except for a very few totali-

Communist president now Russian

MOSCOW — Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin issued a decree Thursday that said all national and Russian Communist Party property and assets within the republic now belong to the Russian government. The decree, issued before the national legislature voted to suspend the party's activities for its role in last week's coup, applies to "all real estate and property... including investments in rubles and foreign currency... on the territory of the Russian Federation and abroad."

The Tass news agency said Yeltsin signed the decree Sunday, two days after he signed another one suspending the activities of the Russian Communist Party. No explanation was given for why the decree on property was not made public until Thursday.

Kuwait warplanes sink Iraqi boat

KUWAIT CITY — Kuwait warplanes sank an Iraqi gunboat and coast guard units captured 46 disguised Iraqi soldiers who landed on Bubiyan Island to scavenge abandoned ammunition, Western security sources said Thursday.

The clash erupted Wednesday afternoon when Kuwaiti coastal forces intercepted five fishing boats loaded with ammunition as they started to leave the island, the sources said.

"The infiltration of the Persian Gulf island, which Baghdad long has sought because of its strategic location at the mouth of the Shatt-Ar-Arab waterway, was the most serious infraction against Kuwait since U.S.-led coalition drove Iraqi troops from the emirate in February, Kuwaiti officials said.

The security officials, who insisted they not be named, said Iraqi soldiers dressed as civilians had landed on Bubiyan and landed ammunition onto five fishing boats. The Iraqis were spotted by Kuwaiti forces as they started to sail away about 1 p.m. Wednesday.

Kuwaiti troops opened fire on the fishing boats, and four Iraqi gunboats were rushed from Fao island in southern Iraq to rescue the boats, the sources said.

Envoy says feds siding with rebels

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — A senior European envoy on Thursday accused the federal army of siding with Serbian rebels in their war with Croatia and said only foreign observers can guarantee peace in the breakaway republic.

The war between the ethnic Serbian minority and the Croats appeared to have entered a lull, although sporadic sniper fire was exchanged in several areas and tensions ran high, the Croatian news agency Hina said.

Both Croatian and Serbian media said a tense calm prevailed in the besieged eastern Croatian town of Vukovar, on the border with Serbia, where much of the fighting has raged in past week.

Factory town doesn't see a radiant future

PODOLSK, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Mayor Alexei Umansky rushed to side with Boris Yeltsin when hard-line Communists tried to seize the Soviet government.

But he doesn't like what he has seen since, and other residents of this Russian factory town near Moscow doubt better days are ahead.

Yeltsin, leader of the powerful Russian republic and at least the equal of Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev since last week's coup, has proven fond of issuing decrees about everything except the issues that really matter — human rights and the economy, Umansky said Thursday.

"A leader at that level can't allow himself to do that," the 51-year-old Umansky said. If Yeltsin's decree-making continues at such a pace, "the people won't accept it."

Podolsk, where Lenin's family lived while the future Soviet leader was in exile in Siberia, is better off than most provincial Russian cities. Packed with defense industries, it attracts relatively well-educated and well-paid employees.

But near the peak of summer harvest season, its stores are nearly empty. In a fruit and vegetable shop, watermelons are piled in the corner and a couple of dirty crates of eggplants line the floor.

A food store had a few dozen packs of cigarettes in its display case instead of food, a bit of bread, children's cereal, and canned fish that a customer said was eight years old.

Vladimir Shdrin, a 43-year-old engineer walking his toddler son, said it doesn't look like there is anyone to organize the economy.

"I think it will get worse," he said. "Maybe it will be better for him," he said, bouncing his little boy. "We're already a lost generation."

Since the failure of last week's coup, Yeltsin has issued decrees suspending the Russian Federation's Communist Party, taking control of its archives, claiming the property of federal ministries and firing old-guard newspaper editors.

Yeltsin has wide support in Podolsk, where he captured 62 percent of the votes in June's presidential elections.

Umansky, who described himself as a former "iron conservative" Communist, said he gradually changed in six years of Gorbachev's perestroika reforms. On the first day of the coup, when the conspirator's decrees were about the only available information, he made sure Yeltsin's statements were published in the local Podolsky Rabochi newspaper.

"The coup was 'immoral,' Umansky said, but many Podolsk residents were potentially attracted to the conspirators' promise to improve the economy.

"Many normal people mixed up two concepts — improving the economy and declaring the state of emergency," he said. "They did not heed Yeltsin's call for a general strike because they thought, 'Our economy is falling apart...'"

Americans walk for peace in Vietnam

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Thirty-eight Americans, including three veterans of the Vietnam War, began a "peace walk" Thursday in the Southeast Asian nation, the official Vietnam News Agency reported.

It said the group left the capital, Hanoi, in the north for Hue, the central Vietnamese city where some of the fiercest battles of the 1968 Tet Offensive took place. The Americans plan to continue on to Ho Chi Minh City in the south.

The group flew to Vietnam on Saturday from Thailand.

Motorized canoe sinks, 9 tourists missing

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A motorized canoe with 15 Italians aboard sank near a central Philippine island and nine of the tourists were missing, the Coast Guard said Thursday.

Lt. Cmdr. Amado Samante said local fishermen and a passing Coast Guard patrol boat rescued six of the tourists on Tuesday and that the search for the missing continued.

Police continue search for juvenile at large

TWIN FALLS - Police were still looking for a 17-year-old Twin Falls boy Thursday who escaped from juvenile detention two days earlier.

The county is keeping juvenile detainees in a Twin Falls motel until after the Twin Falls County Fair, when the boys will be moved back to the Flowers and Produce Building.

Citing security concerns, Lt. Bill Tilson of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office would not say which motel boy escaped from.

The youngster crawled out a bathroom window, Tilson said. When the two security officers on duty decided the boy had been in the bathroom long enough, they opened the door and he was gone, Tilson said.

The boy was being held for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare until a space opened up at the Idaho Youth Ranch, Tilson said. He had been in detention since August 13.

The boy, who spent his 17th birthday in detention Saturday, is described as 5-foot, 9-inches tall, 150 pounds, with shoulder-length blond hair. When last seen, he was wearing standard orange jail coveralls.

According to sheriff's department records, the boy's father was seen in the motel parking lot shortly before the escape. Tilson said the boy's father was renting a room at the motel, and officers don't know if he had anything to do with the escape.

The escape is the fifth this summer. All previous escapes have been caught.

Shoshone woman dies when car rolls over on Highway 26

SHOSHONE - A Shoshone woman was killed late Wednesday night or early Thursday morning when her car rolled over east of Shoshone, according to the Idaho State Police.

Nanette Hamby, 27, was thrown from her car when it went off the left side of U.S. Highway 26 between Shoshone and Gooding, Idaho State Police dispatcher Tammy Clark said.

Hamby was not wearing a seat belt, Clark said. Police do not know exactly when the accident happened or why Hamby's car left the road, she said.

Autopsy shows man in ATV wreck died of natural causes

MALTA - The man earlier thought to have been killed in an all-terrain-vehicle accident Tuesday probably died from natural causes, a coroner said Wednesday.

George A. Twitchell, 55, died around 10 a.m. Tuesday in a field northeast of Malta in the Raft River area, Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said. Police initially reported the incident as a fatal ATV accident. But an autopsy revealed Twitchell died of natural causes just before the four-wheeler crashed, Cassia County Coroner Paul Young said. He said it will be two or three weeks before the final autopsy results can pin down the exact cause of death.

Study group receives grant for river management plan

Survey: 94 of 100 employers violate law

TWIN FALLS - A new state survey indicates 94 of every 100 Idaho employers is violating the 1986 federal Immigration Reform and Control Act, mainly out of ignorance.

Officials of the Idaho Human Rights Commission said Thursday that ignorance puts as many as 25,000 employers at risk of incurring fines that could wipe out weeks and even months of profits, and they are moving to fill the information gap.

"Even though in many cases, this may be due to a lack of adequate information rather than any intent to violate the law, these employers are at risk," Gay Spelzer of Boise, the commission's president, said.

The new information campaign is being launched in the wake of the government's decision to intensify enforcement of the five-year-old law without the past requirement that immigration agents talk with employers

potentially in violation of the law before actually issuing citations.

"In the first attempt by any state in the nation to fill the information void, the commission is sponsoring workshops throughout the state to provide employers with all the information they need to comply with the law and avoid any accusations of employment discrimination."

One of them is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 10, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the Canyon Springs Inn.

"I urge all Idaho employers to attend these workshops," said Robert Teresie, personnel manager of Hewlett-Packard in Boise and vice-chairman of the human rights commission. "It is essential that we understand how IRCA impacts people and business all over the state."

The survey was conducted in May by the Department of Employment and involved responses from 402 employers statistically representative of Idaho's economy by region, size and industry. The state has about 27,000 employers. It found that 94 percent of employers have personnel

practices that do not comply with all provisions of the immigration law while 88 percent said they never received any information on verification of employment eligibility from the Immigration and Naturalization Service, which is charged with educating employers about their responsibilities under the law.

About two-thirds of the survey respondents said they experienced little or no impact from the law on the operations of their businesses and that they did not feel the law's requirements made it risky to hire certain types of workers.

In fact, over 70 percent of the respondents found a diverse labor force valuable and that it is desirable to hire Indians, Hispanics, Asians or persons with foreign accents or physical appearances.

Only people with limited English-speaking skills were found as generally less desirable as employees, and then by 35 percent of the survey respondents.

ISP will use no restraint - you better

TWIN FALLS - Accidents are bound to happen during the traffic-heavy Labor Day weekend, but preventing a serious injury or worse can be as easy as buckling your seat belt.

That's the message from the Idaho State Police Lt. Glen Schwartz, who says state troopers will be out in force this weekend enforcing speed limits and Idaho's seat belt law.

All of the 26 available ISP officers will be on duty, Schwartz said. They will concentrate on the high-traffic areas, such as Interstates 86 and 84 and U.S. Highway 93, both north and south of Twin Falls.

"Most police officers are really frustrated that something as simple as reaching over and fastening a seat belt isn't being done, and it's causing the deaths, the injuries and the carnage on the highways," Schwartz said.

Of the 16 motorists killed on Magic Valley roads so far this year, only one is known to have been wearing her seat belt properly. Twelve wore no safety belt and another was wearing it improperly, he said. Police don't know whether or not the other two were wearing seat belts.

Government figures estimate that traffic deaths and serious injuries could be cut in half if everyone wore a seat belt, but Schwartz says the impact in the Magic Valley could be even greater.

The long, open roads common in this area result in more rollover accidents than elsewhere in the state, Schwartz said. Seat belts are especially important in that type of accident, he said.

When a car rolls over, the driver or passengers are likely to be thrown out of the vehicle and crushed if they are not wearing seat belts, Schwartz said.

The safest place to be during an accident is inside the car, he said.

Schwartz added that, in 18 years with the state police, he has never seen an accident in which a person would have been better off without a seat belt.

Recent surveys have shown 50 to 58 percent of freeway drivers in this area are wearing their seat belts, Schwartz said.

TWIN FALLS - Summer vacation ends Monday with neither a bang nor a whimper.

In fact, only silence will greet shoppers who show up at most Magic Valley businesses and offices on Labor Day.

The vast majority will be closed. The exceptions will be gasoline stations, convenience stores, a handful of supermarkets and a few major discount stores open to handle the last-minute back-to-school traffic.

Banks and schools will be closed, as will most specialty shops and service businesses. The post office and all federal, county, state and local offices will take the day off, including Twin Falls' two state liquor stores.

Enough gas stations will remain open to handle the holiday rush, according to the Idaho chapter of the American Automobile Association, but motorists are advised to take along a little extra cash.

The price of a gallon of self-serve

unleaded gasoline is up six cents since the Fourth of July, according to AAA's Labor Day Fuel Gauge Survey.

Still, Labor Day motoring in Idaho will be cheaper than a year ago when spiraling Midwest tensions following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait pushed the average price of self-serve unleaded gas to \$1.329.

This year, the average pump price is \$1.191, almost three cents higher than the national average of \$1.162, the Idaho AAA said.

"Gasoline prices were stable during most of the summer and lower than some expected during this peak driving period," spokesman Dave Carlson said.

Some of the higher pump prices occurred during the Soviet coup attempt last week, Carlson said, but prices already had been climbing for two weeks.

Idaho's average price over the Fourth of July weekend was \$1.136.

Southeastern Idaho reported the highest pump prices in the Labor Day Fuel Gauge Survey, with self-serve unleaded averaging \$1.218. Southwestern Idaho

had the lowest average price per gallon at \$1.158.

The average pump price at a half dozen Magic Valley stations surveyed Thursday was \$1.1851.

The Idaho AAA said the statewide average is \$1.289 for self-serve premium unleaded, \$1.348 for full-serve unleaded and \$1.478 for full-serve premium unleaded.

Elsewhere in the West, average prices for self-serve unleaded gas were \$1.106 in California, \$1.203 in Colorado, \$1.154 in Montana, \$1.175 in Nevada, \$1.139 in Utah, \$1.146 in Washington and \$1.128 in Wyoming.

AAA said 86 percent of the 94 Idaho gas stations it surveyed will be open at least part of the Labor Day weekend; 34 percent will be open 24 hours a day.

Nationally, the AAA said Labor Day weekend traffic on U.S. highways is expected to increase about 1 percent over last year and about 22.9 million Americans will travel 100 miles or more from home.

Jones says work center needs special-use permit to operate

The state's proposal for a 54-bed work release center on Washington Street South

brought howls of protest from nearby neighbors who don't want "convicts" of felons living in their neighborhood.

Those neighbors recently took their complaints to Boise, but were rebuffed by state Department of Corrections officials who said their opposition to the center is based on misinformation.

Corrections officials say the facility will house non-violent felons who are either on probation and having trouble adapting to community life or who are nearing parole dates and need to be gradually reintegrated into society.

Look for ag books at fair

FILER — For the first time this year, the Twin Falls County Fair and Rode has offered free booth space to agriculture groups, said Fair Manager Cindy Demoney. "We ordinarily charge for these spaces, but this year we are trying something new," said Demoney. "This is to get people who have not been involved in the fair before, a chance to provide information. We also want to build up our area we call Agri-acres."

"We're trying to keep agriculture involved in the fair," she said. "So many organizations that are involved in agriculture are non-profit groups and can't afford a booth, and so this is our way of helping."

Demoney said groups that will set up booths at Agri-acres are restricted from using the space to make-a-profit in any way. The booths will be set up just like any other exhibitor at the fair and there will be someone to man the booth and hand out information and recipes from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. each day of the fair.

So far, several groups plan to set up booths at Agri-acres, including the Idaho Bean Commission, the Idaho Grain Producers Association, Idaho Horse Breeders Association, the Greater Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce's agriculture committee, the Twin Falls County Weed Bureau and the University of Idaho's College of Agriculture.

Timber acres at stake in owl controversy

SEATTLE (AP)—The Endangered Species Act sets a minimum rather than a maximum level of protection for the northern spotted owl on 88,000 acres of forest, a federal appeals court panel was told Thursday.

Nothing shows "Congress intended to cut back on protection" through the law, said Victor M. Sher, a Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund lawyer representing more than a dozen environmental groups.

Instead, "Congress imposed an additional burden" on the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management to assure protection, he said.

But lawyers for government, logger's and timber-dependent Oregon counties said the Endangered Species Act supersedes the National Forest Management and Migratory Bird Treaty acts. The latter two laws have been cited by environmentalists in seeking immediate action.

The government interpretation was made by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in a case involving the gray wolf in Wisconsin six months before the owl was listed as threatened last year, said Ann Almy of the Justice Department.

"The Endangered Species Act is tailored to protecting habitat in just the sort of way we are talking about here," said Louise Milkman, another Justice Department lawyer.

Only on Tuesday, however, was that interpretation issued as a proposed regulatory change by assistant agriculture secretary James Moseley.

"Certainly a proposed regulation cannot be used to support a claim of what the law is today," Sher said.

In the two years it might take to impose systematic logging restrictions under the Endangered Species Act, the bird could be pushed past the brink of extinction, he added.

The Fish and Wildlife Service delayed last year that excessive logging threatened the remaining estimated 3,000 pairs of northern spotted owls.

The owl is considered an indicator species in measuring the overall vitality of the old-growth forest ecosystem in Oregon, Washington and northern California.

The role of the Endangered Species Act in protecting wildlife from becoming extinct was the central issue as a three-judge panel of the San Francisco-based 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals heard arguments on two cases brought by the Audubon Society. No timetable has been set for a decision.

"This is probably the leading environmental issue. It certainly is in this part of the country," Sher said.

In a case brought by eight groups, the government has appealed a decision by U.S. District Judge William L. Dwyer of Seattle to ban timber sales covering 66,000 acres in national forests in Washington, Oregon and northern California.

Dwyer ruled in May that the Forest Service violated the management law by failing to develop a satisfactory plan for protecting the owl.

Agency officials have said the ruling will block the cutting of all but about 800 million board feet of the 3.7 billion board feet of timber set for harvest in Oregon and Washington this year.

"We want the balance that Congress set up in the Endangered Species Act," said Mark Rudzick, representing the Washington Contract Loggers Association. "This injunction overrides the Endangered Species Act and disregards it."

In the other case, 17 groups are trying to overturn a ruling by Judge Helen J. Frye, who dismissed their bid for a similar logging ban covering lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management in Oregon.

She held that a provision of the 1990 fiscal appropriations bill, which prohibited court bans on logging in the affected areas, remained in effect although the fiscal appropriations measure expired last Sept. 30.

Buhl woman stabbed

BUHL — A 51-year-old Buhl woman was hospitalized for multiple stab wounds Thursday afternoon, and her son has been charged with aggravated battery.

Loretta Shriver was in surgery Thursday evening and was listed in serious condition at Magical Valley Regional Medical Center.

Police were called to Shriver's home east of Buhl just after 4 p.m., where they found the woman bleeding from several wounds. Twin Falls County Sheriff's Deputy Don Hall said.

Donald P. Shriver, 25, was arrested at the scene and taken to Twin Falls County Jail, Hall said. Donald Shriver had been released on parole from the Idaho State Penitentiary in Boise just four weeks earlier, Hall said.

After being questioned by officers Thursday evening, Shriver was being led back to his jail cell when he tried to punch a jail officer, Hall said.

Shriver was charged with vehicular manslaughter, a criminal offense in connection with the incident, he said.

Efforts to find victims of serial killer come up empty in desert

BLACK CANYON CITY, Ariz. — A backhoe, a metal detector and a body-sniffing bloodhound brought in Thursday by law-enforcement officers failed to find any bodies in the desert northeast of Black Canyon City in a search for one or more victims of a self-proclaimed

serial murderer.

Despite the extra help in looking for remains reportedly buried in Arizona by Donald Leroy Evans, 34, FBI agents and Yavapai County, Ariz., sheriff's deputies came up empty for a second day.

They will resume the search Friday. "We haven't turned up any

evidence of anything yet," said Larry McCormick, the FBI's assistant agent in charge of the Phoenix office.

A crew of eight deputies relied primarily on long-handled shovels Thursday as they continued to punch holes in the sandy desert.

They worked under a scorching sun, searching in an area split by a

heavily rutted, rock-studded road crossed by power lines about two miles northeast of Black Canyon City.

Within the area, overgrown with mesquite, saguaro, palo verde and ocotillo, the deputies focused on two areas within 30 feet of each other, said Laurie Berra, a spokeswoman

for the Yavapai County Sheriff's Office.

During the morning, the searchers used a metal detector in hopes that it would find metal objects buried with a body or bodies. They also brought in a bloodhound, a correctional officer that BerF said "has a great track record in being able to sniff out deceased bodies."

The third member of the committee has not yet been agreed upon. The school had sought an appointment through state Superintendent of Schools Jerry Evans, who refused to make an appointment, saying it was against the law.

Jones said Thursday he disagrees with Orton's reading of the zoning ordinance and plans to ask the City Council for a hearing on the matter.

"First, the zoning ordinance does not make any reference to correctional, detention, jail, or other types of governmental security facilities," Jones said in the letter. "That is understandable since a correctional facility is something that should be handled on an individual basis," he said.

Similar facilities have been required to get a special use permit in the past, Jones said.

Citizens would be allowed to offer comment to the City Council before a special use permit could be granted.

He pointed out that the work release center in Nampa, which correctional officials say is much like the one to be built in Twin Falls, had to get a special use permit.

And officials in Kootenai County, where the state plans to build its next work release center, also say they will require a special use permit, he said.

Orton said in his letter that the work release center can be a "governmental protective facility," and thus be allowed in the M-1 (light manufacturing) zone along Washington Street South without a special use permit.

But Jones argues that any "governmental facility" must be owned and operated by a governmental agency for the benefit of the general public, according to Twin Falls zoning rules.

on his own property across the street from the Norco Windows factory. He will then lease the facility to the state.

"From a zoning and land use standpoint, it is really irrelevant whether the government actually owns the property and facility or whether they have a long-term lease for the facility," Orton said in his reply to Jones.

The work center will be a

Ranching families put lands on the block

BOISE (AP) — Two old Stanley Basin families are putting ranches up for sale, but the properties should remain much the same, Forest Service officials say.

Both ranches have easements, which basically limit their use," said Ranger Carl Pence of the Sawtooth National Recreation Area. "When the land passes on, new owners won't be able to subdivide."

The 1,787-acre Stanley Basin Ranch, owned by Piero and Bruno Piva, is listed for \$4 million, and the 566-acre Stanley Ranch, owned by Tom and Marie Ocamella, goes for \$1.25 million.

Real estate agent Ed Thomas of Boise, who is representing both properties, said the Piva land can be divided into three parts and have five more dwellings.

The neighboring Ocamella land cannot be split, but can have another ranch style dwelling, he said.

"I've been ranching continuously here since 1940, and don't want to sell," said Piero Piva, 75. "It's reached a point that I have to because of estate reasons."

Piva said he and two partners run 1,000 head of cattle on the ranch and national forest land.

"We have 995 cows on national forest land," he said. "National forest people have been giving us a bad time, which has some bearing on our wanting to sell."

"They've told us they're going to get us out one way or another. It seems that if a tourist steps in cow manure, that's a big deal. Tourism and recreation are all that count any more."

Forest Service officials recently notified the Stanley ranchers that they could lose the lion's

share of their public grazing parcels because biologists concluded ranching was harming salmon spawning habitat.

Ranchers deny that claim and say the federal government has failed to come up with more federal parcels they could use, forcing them out.

Pence fended off Piva's charge. "I'm not sure how that's related to the sale of his private property."

"He does have an allotment for cows. We're re-evaluating allotments in the Stanley Basin, and there is a potential for a significant reduction."

Thomas packaged the ranches and made a presentation to Joe Albertson, hoping the supermarket magnate would purchase them and turn them into a state park within the national recreation area.

Albertson showed interest, but turned him down, Thomas said.

U.S. recognition is the next step

KEELOGG (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, said Thursday that the time has come for the United States to recognize the independence of the Soviet Union's Baltic republics.

"America is identified with freedom. It is time for us to support the aspirations of the people of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania for the same kind of freedom we so often take for granted," Stallings said during a stop in Kellogg. "These states have demonstrated they are serious and they have proceeded responsibly. We should respond."

Stallings, who is running for the U.S. Senate seat

being given up by Republican Steve Symms next year, said the Bush administration can either align itself with the forces of progress and change or, with silence, support the status quo.

The four-term congressman said the administration's approach so far has been to argue that since the United States never accepted the annexation of the Baltics by the Soviet Union, there was no real need to recognize them now as independent nations.

That ignores the current realities, Stallings said. "The time to stand on the sidelines making technical arguments is past," he said.

Other clients have included Texas Gov. Ann Richards, former Colorado Sen. Gary Hart, former Indiana Sen. Birch Bayh, Virginia Sen. Chuck Robb and Illinois Sen. Paul Simon.

Elving said Squier has a name for toughness that has prompted some Republicans to paint him as a hired gun.

But Andrus said Squier's specialty is responding to rough attacks.

"Some people back East say he's got a reputation of being a mean guy," Andrus said. "No, he's got a reputation of winning. If somebody

else starts it, he's going to play by their rules. He's the best there is."

His firm, Squier, Eskew, Knapp Communications, of Washington, D.C., was named the top political consulting group in the nation in 1986, 1988 and 1990 by the National Journal public affairs magazine.

In addition to his 1966 Emmy for a TV series, Squier has made documentaries on major literary figures.

In 1978, he won the gold medal at the New York International Film and TV Festival for his biography of William Faulkner.

His Herman Melville biography aired on public TV in 1985.

Junk bond buyer points his finger at Keating

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An 80-year-old man who lost \$101,000 buying a junk bond at Lincoln Savings testified at Charles Keating Jr.'s fraud trial Thursday that he thought the risky investment was insured like a certificate of deposit.

Leon Bonan, the first witness to testify, hobbled to the witness stand and said he wouldn't have bought a junk bond had he understood the risk.

"Never... I don't take those chances," Bonan told Deputy District Attorney William Hodg-

man at the trial. Under cross-examination Bonan—acknowledged—that the prospectus he was given stated that bond buyers should rely on it alone in deciding whether to buy the bond, and not on the advice of salesmen.

Bonan and his wife were the first in a parade of investors scheduled to testify. Prosecutors put a pitiful human face on the collapse of Keating's Lincoln Savings and Loan, which cost taxpayers a record \$2.6 billion.

State agency owes apology to family divided years ago

Dwight Eisenhower was in the White House the last time Carleen Johnson saw her mother, brother and sister.

They'll be reunited on Labor Day, but the long delay raises some serious questions about the agency apparently responsible for keeping them apart for 31 years.

Johnson, a 38-year-old disabled resident of an Idaho Falls shelter home, was taken from her Buhl home by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare in the summer of 1960, when her mother was sent to State Hospital South in Blackfoot after suffering a nervous breakdown.

Since then, she has lived under the care or supervision of Health and Welfare - in orphanages, in the Idaho State School and Hospital in Nampa and in shelter homes.

And for the past decade, Johnson says state social workers have been telling her that her parents and seven brothers and sisters were dead.

You could chalk that up to a cruel misunderstanding were the truth not so easy to check. One of Johnson's brothers is listed in the Twin Falls telephone directory.

The regional director of Health and Welfare's Idaho Falls office says she doubts social workers ever told Johnson her family was dead. Even if she's right, it's obvious nobody in the agency ever made much of an effort to find them.

And it begs the question of how many of the thousands of Idahoans in Health and Welfare's care haven't

been given the facts about their own relatives.

The agency has to deal with fractured families such as the Johnsons every day, and there's no question the Johnson children needed help and protection 31 years ago.

But it's hard to escape the conclusion that in Carleen's case some overburdened social worker took it upon himself to simplify his own life and Johnson's by telling her she had no family to return to.

It's an echo, perhaps, of the paternalism that dominated the profession for so many years. Back when Johnson and her brothers and sisters became wards of the state of Idaho, the prevailing wisdom was that a benevolent and enlightened social bureaucracy knew what was best for the people it served.

When Johnson's parents went looking for their kids at a Boise orphanage in the early 1960s, they were told they would never get them back. No explanations were offered.

None, it would seem, were deemed necessary.

Health and Welfare, like most social service agencies, does things differently nowadays. Clients, whenever possible, make their own decisions.

But that doesn't change what happened to Carleen and her family. Health and Welfare owes the Johnsons an explanation, an apology and the assurance that the same thing won't happen to somebody else who depends upon the state of Idaho for the truth.



Triumph of politics in the Soviet Union

Seeing the birth of a new baby brings a person back to an elemental renewal of the essence of life itself. So does seeing the pangs of a people in the heretofore Soviet Union struggling to give birth to democracy, economic freedom and self-determination.

It causes each of us to reflect on some elemental truths about our own republic which they so want to emulate.

I saw the first president of the Moscow Millionaire's Club on TV a month or so ago. There he was in his small Moscow apartment being interviewed about what he wanted most in life having achieved economic success.

"What one thing would you most like to buy?" he was asked. Without hesitating he said, "I'd buy my wife an American passport."

We seem to appreciate those who would imitate us more than we do the same people in our own society. Politicians, for example, consistently rate at the bottom of our opinion polls, yet we admire and electize them from other countries - Boris Yeltsin, for instance. He has come to symbolize the aspiration and courage of an entire nation. His charisma and determination have captured our imagination, as well they should.

It's hard to remember that he has spent his entire life as a politician.

It is, therefore, ironic that the triumph of Moscow is, in reality, the triumph of politics over guns, secret police and ideological indoctrination. Politics that of disagreeable notion that people have the right to disagree with our opinions. That, indeed, we may not always be right. And that what I believe may be good for me but not good for someone else.

In short, like their other Eastern European neighbors, citizens of the Soviet Union want

politics. The right to speak up. The right to be wrong. The right to disagree. The right to compromise. The right not to compromise. The right to champions of their own choosing. The right to dislike someone else's.

This and much more make up politics American style. But, most of all, politics is one of the prime ways that free democracies are brought together.

In a nation of many interests, religions and nationalities, it is the coming together inherent in political dialogue that teaches us what we all have in common. Common hopes for a common future. Common dreams for our children. Common aspirations for ourselves.

That is what they seek and what we cherish as well. With the upcoming 1992 election cycle just around the corner here in Idaho, or perhaps already upon us, it might be helpful to reflect on what all this means to us. Whether it is the issue of abortion, the INEL's wilderness or the 1 percent initiative, a sense of comity (and maybe a little "comedy") too on all sides would be more helpful than the typical denunciations which each side hurls at the other.

Serious issues require serious discussion. Solutions seldom emerge from bumper stickers. The give and take of politics, the political disagreement over problem definition and solutions, the compromises which are essential for a broad-based society composed of many different people with interests and aspirations of their own, these are the things of which politics are made.

And these are what the people of Moscow

and Leningrad have finally demanded.

Rather than reduce every position to an eight-second sound bite or a three-word headline, we would be better served by seeking the broadest audience for diverse ideas. And, by the elevation of these ideas in ways in which the public becomes a part of the debate rather than the recipient of the stage-managed 30-second commercial.

We have learned what the leadership cadre of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics is just discovering: no one has a corner on wisdom, even leaders. Wisdom in a free society comes from the informed judgement of the people or, as President Eisenhower put it so well, the "enlightened self-interest" of the people at work.

So, let's give thanks for politics of all stripes here in Idaho - from conservative to liberal and from Republican to Democrat. And to those who care enough to expose themselves and what they believe to public scrutiny and to sometimes ridicule.

But, in this election year, let's also make politicians live up to the ideals that we the people share: open policy that is openly disclosed in campaigns that focus on ideas, beliefs and values rather than sound bites, bumper stickers and headlines.

Maybe we'll find Boris Yeltsin or two here in Idaho as well.

Castleford volunteers just want adequate equipment

In response to the letters and articles written in the past, I would like to express my opinion on the Castleford Fire Department.

I joined the fire department this spring when I got home from college. Before I joined the department, I was under the same false impression that most of the people in Castleford are. I thought that the fire protection in the community was adequate and that the equipment that the volunteers had to use was safe.

But after I talked to some of the other members and walked through the fire station, I found that I was sorely mistaken. The fire truck that belongs to the city of Castleford is a 1950 model and almost all of the equipment on it dates back to that time period. A few weeks ago, we did a test burn on a house and it hose broke. That date on that hose was May 1951. If a situation like this had occurred at an actual emergency, we would have been in big trouble.

At this test burn, we had to borrow equipment from a larger department. At a real fire, we won't be able to borrow anything. The pump on the truck is about worn out; and if we fill the truck with water, it leaks and floods the station. The County Mutual truck is in a little better shape. It is a 1970 Ford 600 two-ton truck. The pump that it is equipped with is way too small to put out a very big fire. The truck is too small for all of the equipment it has to carry, and the top speed is just a little over 45 miles per hour.

That translates to a long time before arriving at the scene, and when we get there, our pump probably won't save what is on fire anyway. We aren't asking for "state-of-the-art equipment," it would be nice to have some updated equipment. The turnouts that I

wear (jacket and pants) were donated to us by a larger department because they considered them unsafe to use.

I don't find these conditions adequate. Some of the people in the community of Castleford stated that "the equipment has worked for this long, why do you need new now?" I don't see too many people driving around town in their 1950 Chevy.

The equipment was good when it was new, but now it's 30 to 40 years old. The buildings that we protect now are much bigger and require updated equipment.

I couldn't believe that County Mutual said that they could be around for another 20 years. If they are, Castleford will probably have the same equipment and the same terrible protection.

It is a shame that the bond issue did not pass. The community wasted a \$185,000 grant. I can understand that it was expensive, but when your house is on fire, the Castleford Fire Department will show up and roast marshmallows with you.

Most of the volunteers, including myself, are resigning because of this. I don't want to, but the conditions are inadequate. The volunteers are not covered with sufficient liability or disability insurance. Why should we stick our necks out for a community that does not support us?

I'm not pointing the finger at County Mutual, but something has got to be done or Castleford will find itself with a major fire and no one to put it out.

Regulators OK continuation of surcharge for round-the-clock

BOISE (AP) — State regulators have agreed to extend for another year the surcharge electric customers in Atlanta have been paying since the failure of the Kirby Dam last May.

But in agreeing to allow Atlanta Power Co. to continue levying the 100-cent-per-kilowatt-hour surcharge, the Public Utilities Commission on Thursday directed the utility to provide electric service around the clock unless it specifically receives commission approval to curtail operations.

"We do believe the obligation of the company is to provide full-time power to its customers and should not deviate from that obligation without approval of the commission," Commission President Joe Miller said.

The power company was forced to switch from its low-cost hydroelectric

system to a diesel generator when the 86-year-old Kirby Dam failed over the Memorial Day holiday weekend, washing out the bridge on the main route to the small mountain community as well.

The government plans to have a new bridge in place by December, but it could be years before the dam is rebuilt and hydro power restored.

The company is, however, committed to providing power to Atlanta through diesel generation until hydro power can be restored," Atlanta Power General Manager Lynn Stevenson told the commission.

"The company policy is to stay there for the long haul."

Repairs had been made to the weakening dam last November, but Stevenson said the design was flawed because it did not fully consider the flows in the Middle Fork of the Boise, and it was the repaired

portion of the dam that failed last spring.

The company financed that repair project with a long-term loan from the state, which agreed earlier this month to a one-year moratorium on repayment of that money. The repayment extension is contingent on Atlanta Power providing the state by September 1992 with a plan to restore hydro power.

The company has purchased a more efficient diesel generator to help keep the additional costs of interim power down, and its 47 customers have generally supported the surcharge.

While the surcharge has been effective in meeting higher costs through the summer, Stevenson said the company could be forced into curtailed generating operations during the winter because it loses nine customers at the end of week.

Cities embrace property tax relief as part of local option tax

POCATELLO (AP) — The Association of Idaho Cities hopes to reverse years of rejection by state lawmakers of their bid for local option taxing authority by tying new plans directly to property tax relief.

"That's the one thing we've missed adding in our tax package," association

Director Bill Jarocki told local officials in southeastern Idaho this week. "Our 1992 tax bill will mandate property tax relief."

By connecting the municipal campaign for authority to seek voter approval for local income, sales or fuel taxes to property tax relief, the association

hopes to cash in on the desire of policy makers to blunt the initiative drive to cap property tax collections at 1 percent of assessed value. Most local government officials have come out in strong opposition to the initiative, contending it would force severe cutbacks in services or increases in other taxes.

Pocatello poised for piece of the rock

POCATELLO — After years of sitting on the sidelines watching the rest of Idaho enjoy an economic resurgence, the state's second largest city may finally be claiming its piece of the boom.

And it is enjoying pressure on the city's resources, particularly its housing stock.

"There's very little out there that's available," Larry Atkinson, president of the realtors board, said. "Demand is far exceeding supply and I know of a couple of instances where people wanted to move here but just couldn't find housing."

One-time rental houses are now being sold as owners scramble to cash in on the real estate boom, and officials realize it will be some time before new developments are ready for occupancy.

Mormons, neighbors butting heads

AMERICAN FALLS — The attempt by the Mormon Church to build a religious education center in a residential neighborhood across the street from the high school has neighbors in the area butting heads.

The immediate neighborhood appears to be all but evenly split over whether the seminary building should be allowed, and critics are relying on the American Falls zoning ordinance that designates the lot as residential to block the project. But there is a religious undertone to the debate.

One building permit was rescinded earlier this summer because of a legal error, and the Planning and Zoning Commission is now reviewing the church's renewed request to build what the ordinance labels a commercial building in the residential area.

Idaho Falls dubbed 'urban center'

IDAHO FALLS — Idaho Falls is growing fast, and it's forcing motorists to slow down.

The U.S. Census Bureau has declared Idaho Falls and vicinity, with a total population of 56,356, an official "urban center."

That means drivers on Interstate 15 will have to slow from 65 mph to 55 mph in the area. Idaho Falls joins Boise and Pocatello as Idaho's only cities where federal law requires the lower speed limit on interstate highways.

But the designation also means Idaho Falls will be eligible for more federal grants, particularly for transportation. The city is among 33 new urbanized areas recognized by the Census Bureau. Last year's head count put the population of Idaho Falls itself at 43,929.

Bonneville teachers get 4% pay hike

IDAHO FALLS — Teachers in the Bonneville School District will get a 4-percent pay hike this year.

Members of the East Bonneville Education Association ratified a one-year contract Wednesday that gives beginning teachers a \$17,575 salary, up from \$17,200 last year.

The contract was approved by 76 percent of the association's membership.

Shirley Barrie, association president, said she was satisfied with the pay hike.

Drinking nets deputy reprimand

SANDPOINT (AP) — A Bonner County deputy has been reprimanded for responding to a call after drinking while off duty.

Deputy Randy Lemburg had consumed "one to two beers" while celebrating his 32nd wedding anniversary, Sheriff Chip Roos said Wednesday.

Lemburg was not on call but agreed to help out when a dispatcher asked him to go to the scene of a boating accident, Roos said.

"He was expecting to be off, but he gets called and he goes," the sheriff said.

White was a natural reaction for an officer, "he should have said he had been drinking and could not respond," Roos said.

It took 90 minutes for a deputy to arrive after Gary Ramelow of Spokane reported that his 76-foot boat was struck by another boat last Friday night on Priest Lake, police reports show.

Ramelow said it took too long to get a deputy to the scene and that when one did arrive, "he was obviously drunk."

Roos said Lemburg had had a beer or two but denied being drunk.

The driver of the other boat was in the resort's bar and had several drinks by the time deputies arrived. A breath test indicated the man was legally drunk but no charges were filed because authorities were unable to determine if he had been intoxicated while on the boat, Roos said.

The sheriff said the delayed response was because a dispatcher was unable to reach the deputy on call. Radio communications are often scrambled because of the mountainous terrain around the lake, Roos said.

The dispatcher contacted Lemburg, who lives at Priest Lake, and he took a sheriff's boat to the accident scene, Roos said.

Alarm fiddling prompts offer

DENVER (AP) — The operator of the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant has posted a \$2,500 reward for information leading to conviction of anyone involved in continuing incidents of meddling with the plant's plutonium alarms.

EG&G, a contractor that runs the plant northwest of Denver, for the U.S. Department of Energy, posted the reward Wednesday.

Plant manager Jim Zane said the alarms are crucial to employee safety at the plant, which manufactures plutonium. Detectors and nuclear devices. In June, DOE officials said there had been 20 incidents of meddling with the alarms, which detect radioactive dust in the air.

Zane said a memo was distributed on May 2 warning the plant's more than 7,000 employees that tampering with the alarms is a felony punishable by up to 10 years in prison. Still, at least six tampering cases have been reported in the past month.

Theives take rare macaw from store

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) — An endangered scarlet macaw was among \$7,000 worth of exotic animals and supplies stolen from a pet store, authorities said.

Also discovered missing Wednesday from the Peaslee Kingdom Pets were two tarantulas, a parrot, two iguanas, eight parakeets, three ball pythons, an albino rat snake and a male cockatiel, Detective Jeff Bury said.

"There's a heck of a black market for the big animals, especially in the larger cities," he said. The macaw, an endangered species, was worth \$3,000, Bury said.

"This macaw can't be sold legitimately without papers, a permit from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service," he said.

Emmylou savors a brand new dance

JACKPOT — On KBSU-FM public radio a week ago, a lovely, vaguely familiar voice began singing that old Beatles' song, "Here, There and Everywhere."

With just a guitar behind her, the woman's voice was pure, rich and captivating. It flowed easily with controlled emotion from note to note.

What a surprise at the end when this great singer was introduced as Emmylou Harris of country-western fame.

Although she has carried that C & W label for almost 20 years, Harris has recorded in many other styles including honky-tonk, gospel, bluegrass and classic pop tunes.

"Having a routine, a family, gives you the time and structure to do your work," Harris said in a recent People magazine story. "You can talk about quality time all you want, but it's a crock. You also need quantity time or you're not going to know who your kids are."

Since Ricky Scaggs, Rodney Crowell, Vince Gill and other former members of Harris' legendary Hot Band have moved on to stardom of their own, she has hand-picked a new band that meets her high standards.

Called The Nash Ramblers, this band features Randy Stewart on acoustic guitar and harmony vocals, Sam Bush on fiddle and mandolin, Al Perkins on dobro and banjo, Roy Husky, Jr. on upright bass and Larry Atamanuik on drums.

Harris also has new music from her latest album, "Brand New Dance."

In a press release accompanying the album, Harris says she gave up being the producer this time and concentrated only on singing.

In "Rollin' and Ramblin'," her plaintive soprano voice tells the story of Hank Williams' haunted life, and "Tougher Than The Rest," is a forceful song written by rock star Bruce Springsteen.

Springsteen was a country music singer and writer in disguise," Harris said in the press release. "His phrasing, his sense of melody, the straightforwardness of the things he writes about have always impressed me as being from an artist on the real poetic side of country music."


In 1970, she surrendered to her musical gifts and ended up in New York City, singing in Greenwich Village folk clubs.

Why game shows are fading: The price is wrong

HOLLYWOOD — The category is Dying Breeds. The clue: "A once popular form of daytime television that has all but disappeared from the networks."

Don't forget to phrase your answer in the form of a question. If you said, "What are game shows?" you're correct.

Next month, NBC will bid farewell to "Wheel of Fortune" and "Classic Concentration," its last two game shows. Just a few weeks later, ABC cashed in its remaining game show, "The Match Game." That leaves just two survivors for next season: "The Price Is Right" and "Family Feud," both on CBS.

"In the 35 years that I have been on television, I have seen game shows behave differently," said longtime "Price Is Right" host Bob Barker. "Right now the market is down, way down."

Morning network schedules, once filled with buzzers, bells, whistles and lights, are fast becoming the territory of talk shows, news and information. "It's like a hurricane came and wiped them all away," said Mark

Goodson, whose company produces "The Price Is Right" and "Family Feud."

"Part of this is the attitude networks have toward game shows, and part of it is economics," said Bob Lloyd, senior vice president of sales and marketing for Reg Grundy Productions, which produced "Scrabble" and "Sale of the Century."

"The attitude is that game shows skew old and networks are looking for younger audiences," he said. "The economics is that networks can do reality shows in-house, with their own production staffs, and do them cheaper than they can buy game shows."

The trend toward reality programming does not, however, signal the end of game shows.

They are still popular in syndication, and

new ones are being developed for cable-TV audiences.

In fact, few game shows still on the air are among the most successful programs on television. "The Price Is Right," the longest-running game show in TV history after 19 years, is currently the No. 2 program on daytime television, behind "The Young and the Restless." And the two top syndicated shows for the 1990-91 season were "Wheel of Fortune" and "Jeopardy!," both from Merv Griffin Productions.

"I can't look at the success of 'Price Is Right,' and the audience it continues to draw, and say the form is dead," said Lucy Johnson, vice president of daytime programming for CBS. "Program forms go in cycles, and they fall in fashion and out of

fashion." In dropping their game shows, ABC and NBC claim they are merely following the trend toward reality programming. ABC dropped "Match Game" to existing the magazine-style "Home" show from 60 to 90 minutes.

On NBC, meanwhile, fewer than 75 percent of the network's affiliate stations air "Fortune" and "Concentration," choosing instead to broadcast syndicated talk shows.

"You have to look at what's working in the syndicated market," said John Miller, NBC's executive vice president of daytime programming. "Those sort of personality-driven shows that deal with reality or talk or information are what seem to be working. And no one wants to create a glut of them, but they do seem to be attracting the salable audience right now. So that's where we're headed."

To that end, NBC has hired "Entertainment Tonight's" John Tesh to host a new morning interview show, "One on One," beginning Sept. 9. "The hope is, over time, to find our own Donahue or Oprah, and have a franchise for some time to come," Miller said.

"Father of the Bride," a remake of the 1950 matrimonial comedy, stars Steve Martin, Diane Keaton and Martin Short; "Bugsy," a film biography of the infamous gangster Bugsy Siegel, stars Warren Beatty, Annette Bening and Harvey Keitel; and "Cape Fear," director Martin Scorsese's remake of the 1962 thriller, stars Robert De Niro, Nick Nolte and Jessica Lange.

And, no, let's not overdo it. "The Prince of Tides," this adaptation of Pat Conroy's best-selling novel about a family crisis features the work of Barbra Streisand the actress, Barbra Streisand the director,

"Fievel Goes West" and Disney's "Beauty & the Beast" are undoubtedly aiming for the family-entertainment market with colorful adventure-fantasies. These animated features, incidentally, are going head-to-head (or is it tail-to-tail?) with Nov. 2 openings.

Like the 1989 Batman blockbuster, new

movies based on "The Adams Family," "Cat 54: Where Are You?," and "Star Trek" are counting heavily on nostalgia for TV shows of the '60s to sell tickets. (The latest "Star Trek" picture is subtitled "The Undiscovered Country," but I think it should have been called "Star Trek VI: We're Really Sorry About Star Trek.")

And if star power is the big whoop of Demi Moore's new comedy, "The Butcher's Wife," it's a very specialized variety of star power indeed. Interest in the film seems inspired not by Moore's fame as such but, rather, specifically by the publicity resulting from her recent pregnant-and-naked appearance on the cover of Vanity Fair.

The lure of other films on the fall/winter schedule is not easily fathomed in advance. "Prayer of the Rollerboys," which features Corey Haim in a thriller about futuristic skaters, doesn't exactly have megahit written all over it. And I'm definitely taking a wait-and-see attitude about "Blame It on the Bellboy," a mistaken-identity farce starring Dudley Moore and Bryan Brown, and "Cool as Ice," which features Vanilla Ice as a motorcycleist stranded in a small town.

As for "Ernest Scared Stupid," I'm not able to evaluate its possible appeal because I just can't get past the title. Like the guy was some kind of brain trust before he was frightened?

"Thelma & Louise" has changed all that. Forever. Provocative, poignant and heartbreakingly funny, this neo-feminist road movie is a pointed look at what is timely called the war between the sexes as we have had in quite some time. And it manages its success almost off-handedly, with a casual grace that makes everything look as easy as well, falling in love. "Thelma & Louise" (rated R for strong lan-

guage, violence and sexuality) does not seem a likely candidate to be this pleasingly subversive. Its writer never had a script produced before, its director made his reputation doing totally different kinds of movies, its stars, though more than able, are not the types who usually surprise us. If you were handicapping this film, you'd be hard-pressed to justify putting \$2 on its chances. But wait. In reality, writer Callie Khouri, whose last job was producing videos, has an exceptional ear and an enviable understanding of character. Her gritty, raunchy dialogue has the welcome tang of authenticity, and it is also achingly amusing as it delineates two characters so disparate they just about have to be best friends.

Thelma Dickinson and Louise Sawyer, only live in the same small Arkansas town, but their minds are planets apart. Louise (Susan Sarandon) is a waitress with tidy hair under a starched white cap. When she plans a weekend trip to the country with her good buddy, she makes sure to clean every dish and leave her place immaculate. Thelma (Geena Davis), on the

other hand, is a walking nervous breakdown, submissive to the point of cauteria, whose idea of packing is casually emptying an entire drawer into a waiting suitcase.

Besides relaxing, these women have another agenda for their trip: They want to make a point to the men in their lives about being taken, for granted. Louise's boyfriend, Jimmy, is a musician who travels a lot but never gets into Louise's Thunderbird convertible and his road. Determined to have some fun, even if just for this weekend, Thelma persuades Louise to stop at a raunchy roadside honky-tonk.

Suddenly, on the proverbial dime, something happens in that honky-tonk that changes the whole nature of Thelma and Louise's trip, turning it from a jaunt to a nightmare, and one that keeps getting more and more frightening.

These two women, who started out to escape their problems, suddenly find themselves in the worst trouble of their lives.

BINGO (PG). A movie that shouldn't happen to a dog — or an audience, either. A sort of '90s style "Lassie Come Home," transplanted to the era of "The Simpsons," "The Texas Chain Saw Massacre" and "Terry Gilliam," directed by Matthew Robbins with a cast full of muggers and a script full of howlers. Bingo, the dog star, easily steals this movie. He probably should have buried it, too.

BILL AND TED'S BOGUS JOURNEY (PG). That most excellent, bodacious, non-helious, "party on" pair, Bill and Ted (as impersonated by Alex Winter and Keanu Reeves), the guide of San Dimas and writer Ed Solomon and Chris Matheson, have been most egregiously killed and sent to Hell, Heaven and Paris beyond — besides being replaced with evil Bill and Ted robots and subjected to other awesome Big Sequel indignities. Much better than the first movie — though the fantasy and visual style (modelled partially on Terry Gilliam, Tim Burton and Michael Powell) may be too incandescent and a sort of fans of the original's what-the-hell throwaway humor.

CITY SLICKERS (PG-13). The old gambit of setting a bunch of citified nincompoops loose in the wide open spaces is not a fresh one, but it's still funny. There are enough laughs in "City Slickers" to get you through the wishy-washing male-bonding stuff.

Billy Crystal, Bruno Kirby and Daniel Stern are the three buddies who take a two-week vacation as cattle herders.

DOG HOLLYWOOD (PG-13). Michael J. Fox plays a hot-shot plastic surgeon who travels west to the nip and tuck heaven of Beverly Hills but gets waylaid in South Carolina, where he learns the value of the simple life. The knockabout cominess and scenery-stealing makes a TV show just "Green Acres" seem almost Shavian by comparison.

HOT SHOTS! (PG-13). Though it doesn't seem like a much more engaging couple than the pairing of "Naked Gun 2½," in fact this is the funnier movie. For one thing, it is a specific parody (of "Top Gun") and even pitiful humor works better when there is a reason for the fall. For another, Charlie Sheen has an enviable deadpan panache and he and Valeria Golino are a much more engaging couple than the pair in Brand X.

REGARDING HENRY (PG-13). Sleek, self-confident New York lawyer Henry Turner (Harrison Ford) wakes up in the hospital after being mugged to discover that his brain is back at square one: like a blackboard that has been wiped totally clean, he remembers nothing and of no one. Harrison and Annette Bening as his wife give fine performances, and though this film has the makings of a genuine exploration of what matters in life, under Mike Nichols' direction it ultimately turns into a too-slick Hollywood shuffle.

ROBIN HOOD (PG-13). A case where more is less, this new version of the venerable tale of outlaws in Sherwood Forest can't decide if it's a traditional action adventure, a New Age fable or a Monty Python farce.

There is nothing like having the good fortune to have a movie project dealing with a subject that suddenly appears on the front pages of almost every newspaper throughout the world.

Video stores hope for boost

Deep into a killer year, the video-rental industry would like to convince itself that its dwindling audience hasn't defected forever but has merely become more selective.

Yet, even the first authentic home-video event of 1991 — the release coming days of the wildly popular comedy "Home Alone" and the multi-Oscar winner "1917," "Dances With Wolves" — is just half a test for the rental business.

The problem is that home video is two businesses — sales and rentals. People are buying videocassettes and laser discs — especially kiddie and self-improvement categories — in unprecedented numbers.

For example, hundreds of thousands of copies of the 50th-anniversary edition of "Citizen Kane" go on sale next week for \$20 apiece.

Yet, fewer people are renting movies than they did a year ago. The major releases on the fall home-video lineup are equally divided between movies intended for sale, the Disney animated features "Fantasia" (Nov. 1) and "The Rescuers Down Under" (Sept. 20), and movies intended for rent, "Silence of the Lambs" (late October) and "Terminator 2" (mid-December).

The second half of 1991 has to be better for home video than the first half, says Amy Innersfield of Alexander and Associates, a New York-based entertainment-industry analyst.

"There are some great titles coming out. Retailers will make a lot of money on the first two, and then they'll be able to invest in the next batch of videos."

About 8.5 million copies of the all-time No. 3 box-office hit "Home Alone" went on sale recently in 120,000 discount outlets.

"Dances With Wolves" was released Wednesday in 100,000 rental stores at the nation's 24,000 rental stores.

Trouble is, only the biggest video chain, Blockbuster, will benefit from both releases, because it not only rents movies but also sells them at prices competitive with non-specialist discounters like K. mart.

JEROME — The mourning dove and forest grouse seasons will open Sunday, not Saturday as reported in Thursday's Times-News outdoor section.


The grouse opener will run from Sept. 1 through Dec. 31.

Leading the Bruin march

Tai Gordon returns at running back, a year wiser, talking title

TWIN FALLS — The only tie that the Twin Falls Bruins want to see this year is a Tai in the end zone.

Tai Gordon, a 5-foot, 8-inch, 180-pound running back will help key the Twin Falls offense this season when the Bruins take the field for the first time Saturday against Highland.

Gordon was a big part of the offense gaining close to 1,000 yards as the main rusher for the Bruins last year.

"This year, Gordon's role for the Bruins won't change, but he's changed his attitude. 'I feel a lot more excited,'" he said. "Last year, I was kind of tentative. I feel we have a chance to win a lot of games. I'm pumped up and ready to go."

The 1990 season is going to help Gordon this time around. He worked on weights this summer and went to the University of Washington football camp in Seattle to fine tune his skills.

"That one year of maturity makes all the difference in the world," said Twin Falls Coach Jon Jund. "Tai has speed and he reads blocks very well."

A good running back either is fast, has a good front line or finds the open hole. Gordon thinks that he not only possesses one of those skills, but has a combination of those traits.

"I think I have pretty good speed,"

said Gordon. "Our line this year is quick. We could be a little bit bigger. I'm also reading holes better."

Gordon's speed may pay off two ways for the Bruins. The first payoff will be big yards and touchdowns and the second payoff may come in tackles and interceptions as Gordon may go both ways for Twin Falls this year.

"I've been playing defensive end," said Gordon, who'll take a shot at going both ways this weekend. "As a sophomore, I ran and played defensive end. As a junior, it was strictly offense."

Gordon's speed may also put him into the Bruins' secondary later on in the season.

The two-sport athlete for Twin Falls is equally skilled in both football and baseball, where he plays outfield for the Bruins and the American Legion Cowboys in the summer.

When people think of the Bruin offense, they think of Gordon. He doesn't feel like he'll be scrutinized this year and be analyzed by spectators. He realizes his role on the team. "I think I've got to be a leader," said Gordon, who is a leader when talking about team goals this year.

"We all want it a little more this year," he said. "We're starting to think about a state championship. We didn't do that until it was too late last year. We've got a winning attitude."

'Old-timer' still alive at U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Jimmy Connors has some unsolicited advice for John McEnroe: Don't quit.

Connors, four days shy of 39 and in the third round of the U.S. Open, says McEnroe is way too young to think about retiring next year.

"He is 32 years old and if he thinks that he has passed his prime, I wish he would come sit down and talk to me, because I played my best tennis, my absolute best tennis, when I was 31, 32 years old," Connors said. "I won here twice in a row and I won Wimbledon."

"I think you're just really reaching your prime when you are 30, 32, 33 years old. I really do. Tennis-wise, maturity-wise, concentration-wise. You are able to elick on and off a little better, instead of just going on a float for a couple of games."

Connors waved his fluorescent yellow racket like a wand and brought his magic back to the Open on Thursday night. He frolicked like

a teen-ager in his 21st Open with a 6-2, 6-3, 6-2 romp over Michiel Schapers.

...Through it was only a match between a wild card ranked No. 174 — Connors — and a qualifier ranked No. 430 — Schapers — this was another of those special nights for the more than 19,000 fans packing the stadium.

Certainly the match lacked the drama and brilliance of Connors comeback from two sets down against Patrick McEnroe in the first round. But at a tournament that Connors has won five times, the crowd of nearly 20,000 roared for him with affection from the moment he stepped on the court.

Connors played to the crowd throughout the match, even leading it to waves around the stadium after he won the second set. He smacked 42 winners, 18 more than Schapers, and rarely made mistakes.

But Connors next faces a tougher opponent in No. 10 seed Karol Novacek, and even Connors' son

Florida State downs BYU

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Casey Weldon threw for 268 yards and two touchdowns, outplaying Ty Detmer in the contest of quarterbacks as top-ranked Florida State whipped No. 19 Brigham Young 44-21 Thursday night in the Pigskin Classic.

Heisman Trophy winner Detmer was 19-for-32 for 229 yards with one interception. But kept his 24-game TD passing streak alive when he hit Eric Drage with a 30-yard shot with 7:22 remaining.

But the effort came far too late for the 19th-ranked Cougars, whose inexperienced offensive line made Detmer an easy target all night.

Behind Weldon, the Seminoles' explosive offense rolled up 543 yards, and he completed 21 of 28 passes with no interceptions. Leading 28-14 at halftime, the Seminoles continued to roll in the third quarter, marching 86 yards on 11 plays to score on a 2-yard run by Edgar Bennett with 7:10 left in the quarter.

Detmer threw for only 16 yards in the third quarter while being sacked for an 8-yard loss. The Cougars' ground game was even worse, posting a 13-yard loss during that span.

A bad snap on a punt by Florida State resulted in a 40-yard loss and set up the Cougars' second touchdown of the half, a 6-yard pass from Detmer to Eric Hughes.

Pro sports face potential long-range problems

Even as sports sail through a golden age, riding a crest of profits and popularity, there are faint warnings that the whole thing is in danger of sinking like the savings and loan industry.

"I think spectator sports are going away," John Naisbitt, the futurist and author of two "Megatrends" best sellers, says bluntly. "Sports are being replaced by the fine arts as the dominant leisure activity of the society."

Naisbitt isn't alone with his dark vision of pro sports.

Some of the reasons that brought down so many of the thrifits in the past few years — greed, mismanagement, overconcentration — are given by many sports insiders as reasons why the pro teams could get into similar trouble.

In a series of interviews with agents, TV advertising executives, team auditors, sports marketers and corporate sponsors, the warnings are clear that spectator sports will face serious challenges in the next decade. Among the chief worries:

• Apathy caused by cultural or economic changes will lead to a big turnout of sports.

• Soaring salaries and lower TV ratings, tugging sports in opposite directions, will leave the leagues stretched thin and reduce the values of franchises.

• Golf, tennis and other individual sports will suffer as sponsors back out.

• Massive losses by the television and cable networks, already evident at CBS and ESPN for baseball, could bring lower contracts with the leagues and colleges in the mid-1990s. If pay-per-view TV, the long-touted airwave of the future, isn't ready to fill the void, player salaries and team profits may plunge or at least cease to grow.

That, in turn, could trigger strikes and the demise of some clubs.

Even if pay-per-view becomes the cash cow its proponents think it will be, bringing in hundreds of millions of dollars for single events, and billions each season, it could set up the collapse of pro sports later on.

"Long term, pay-per-view threatens the popularity of sports," says Leigh Steinberg, the Cougars' general manager. "It could create a disaster because it would not be apparent in the first few years as sports

Bubka had trouble with his feet on Thursday. To curb the pain, he was given an injection 90 minutes before the competition and another late in the competition.

After clearing his first attempt at 18-3/4, he passed until 19-4/8. He missed his first try at that height, then passed, and missed again in his first shot at the next height, 19-6/8.

At that point, he was sixth. And he had been unsuccessful on his next attempt, he would have finished there and Ivan Bagyula of Hungary would have won. But just as he did in the '88

Olympics, the world record holder won on his final jump, clearing 19-6/8 and breaking the championship record of 19-2/8 he set in 1987.

"Today's victory was very hard for me," Bubka said. "My confidence level was 50-50."

Bagyula, who attends George Mason University, figured Bubka would pull out the victory.

"I would be unrealistic to beat Bubka even if he had his injuries," Bagyula said. "First place is given him. It's decided before the competition. Second place is what we are going for."

Like Bubka, the 33-year-old Foster is unbeatable in World Championship finals, and just like the Soviet, he set a championship record.

Both he and Pierce were timed in 13 06 seconds, but Foster outleined him and was declared the winner.

Pierce asked for an "official" review before conceding.

"I couldn't tell who won," Pierce said. "I thought it was a photo finish. It looked dead even."

"I didn't think I had won," Foster said. "When I looked up at the scoreboard, I wasn't sure who had won."

"This was definitely the best, the toughest, of the three titles."

While Foster's career is still prospering, Floyd's probably is over.

She became the first athlete suspended for four years by the IAAF after the world governing body's Congress charged the mandatory suspension for a positive drug test from two to four years last week.

The test followed Floyd's last-place finish in the semifinals of the 800-pace on Sunday.

"The amphetamines were found to be performance-enhancing, which led to the stiffer penalty," said Ollan Cassell, executive director of The Athletics Congress, the sport's governing body in the United States. For minor amphetamines, the ban is three months.

Pettigrew, a senior at St. Augustine's College in Raleigh, N.C., and the 1989 and 1991 U.S. champion, scored the biggest victory of his career in the 400, clocking 44.57, just ahead of Britain's Roger Black and American Danny Everett.

Lewis, already the winner of the 100-meter dash in a world-record 9.86 and winner of seven gold medals in seven world championship events, served notice that he was on target for another gold by leaping 28-1 in the long jump qualifying.

The best previous qualifying jump was 27-4 1/2 by Randy Williams at the 1972 Olympics.

"Technically, I'm as sound as I've ever been," Lewis said. "There's no question that I'm ready."

Becker wouldn't mind making the U.S. Open his second home. He won here in 1989 and is looking strong this year, reaching the third round with a 6-0, 7-6 (7-4), 6-1 victory over Alexander Volkov.

Aaron Krickstein, who upset Andre Agassi in the first round, also reached the third round.

Continued from B8 reap the benefit of high-income viewers able to pay for specialized products. But in the long run it will wipe out high percentages of younger fans, lower income fans, and drastically cut the base of viewership.

Because in a sport like football, it already is not accessible live (in person) to most fans."

Naisbitt attributes the eventual decline of pro sports to cultural factors — an increase of women in the workforce and a shift in the economy from heavy industry to information and technology.

In the 1970s, Americans spent twice as much money attending sports events as they did on the performing arts, he points out. Then the arts caught up and passed sports in 1985. Last year Americans spent well over \$1 billion more on theater and concert tickets than on sports events.

"Probably sooner than later, we Americans are going to spend twice as much on arts events as we do on sports events. This shift from sports to the arts makes a lot of sense if you step back and take a longer, broader view," Naisbitt says.

"When we were an industrial society, the entertainment of the workers, who generally had all men, were the gladiators. In the '20s, '30s and '40s, the most popular sport in America was boxing. Football, with its 22 gladiators out on the field, each a kind of precise part of the machine, became the quintessential American sport."

"But that industrial period is well behind us. In the last couple of decades, women have flooded the workforce and they are much more likely to be arts fans than sports fans. Of course, many are both. Education levels also are higher and some more sophisticated entertainment is required."

Steinberg sees a lucrative future for

sports, and higher salaries for athletes, regardless of any competition from other forms of entertainment, as long as network television rights fees and ticket prices keep climbing.

"Television is the straw that stirs the drink. It's television that's pushing this modern salary spiral," he says.

"I believe we'll see the emergence of new sports, built for television with tremendous action that will be dredged by the same sort of people who design video games. TV-ready sports will have every aspect of them worked out in front, from ownership of the franchises to merchandising rights. The rules will be simple enough to follow and there will be a high-degree of violence and action to them. You will see it."

But Steinberg also worries about

the Big Turnoff, a sudden revolt by fans, that could hurt all sports.

"In the next 10 years, we're going to have to watch very carefully that the fantasy element of sport not be destroyed," he says. "Because to the extent that the sports page reads like the business section, or even worse the crime beat section, then fans will lose their fascination for sports."

"You could see amazing amounts of fan anger, tumoff and eventually, if it became too intense, a threat to the fan base."

The PGA may be an early victim of greed and mismanagement, says William Sherman, vice president of New York-based McCann-Erickson Worldwide, who helps pay the costs of sports by buying millions of dollars in TV advertising time for his clients.

"The golden goose is dead," he

says. "Some major corporate clients are not renewing their title sponsorship. It's not surprising. All (PGA Commissioner Deane) Beman did was cannibalize his own product."

He expanded the seniors' tour tremendously, even putting it opposite his own tour on TV a few times. I think greed got the better part of him.

"I know he drove a couple of long-entrenched entitled advertisers out of past tournaments simply because he pushed the ante significantly. If you were a title sponsor, you had to pay a certain amount of money to CBS to get it on the air. And if you didn't fork-up that money, he supposedly had other corporate advertisers wanting to put their names on other tournaments that would replace them very fast. One of those was K Mart with the Greensboro Open."

Reregulation in air and growing apace

NEW YORK — With the dying echoes of deregulation still faintly heard in the background, the spirit of reregulation is entrenching itself. The federal regulatory apparatus is larger than ever and growing swiftly. What happened to deregulation, the 1980s movement to get government off the backs of the public? Its proponents fought hard for a while but were swallowed up, as are most challenges to bureaucracy, before the decade was ended. With reregulation, more money and more people than ever are needed for the watchdog activities of the federal government, and it is estimated that in 1992 more than 122,400 workers and \$13 billion will be required.

Both those figures would be recorded according to a study by the Center for the Study of American Business at Washington University in St. Louis. Even after adjusting for inflation, the 1992 dollar total is 2.7 times that of 1970. While the center's study shows that the regulatory dollars budgeted for 1992 represent a 6 percent increase over 1991 — fast growth at a time when cost containment is supposed to have top priority — it may only hint at reregulation's momentum.

Later this year you'll hear arguments in Washington "as loud as those in Moscow" — and maybe as accurate, too — when a House subcommittee holds hearings on a bill that seeks to expand Food and Drug Administration authority. The so-called Food, Drug, Cosmetic and Devices Enforcement Amendments of 1991, introduced by Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., is viewed by a large segment of American industry as unprecedented intrusion into their affairs.

Opposing the bill are some 40 national trade and professional groups, powerful organizations, including the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association and the Grocery Manufacturers Association of America. They are outraged. In contrast, Rep. John D. Dingell, D-Mich., already has issued a statement of support for the bill, expressing his disappointment "that a large segment of industry has fallen into a position of myopic opposition."

He argues that the FDA, which regulates products accounting 25 percent of the country's gross national product, is in serious need of new additional authorities, and resources to protect public health and safety. "But let's not trample on sacred rights, such as due process, private

property and the distinction between prosecutor and judge, say the manufacturers. They are as angry as proponents are eager. Various congressmen also have expressed reservations. Rep. Norman F. Lent, R-N.Y., said the legislation "would put in force the sort of investigatory procedures that Mr. Gorbachev is now trying to phase out in the Soviet Union."

What do they fear? What makes them so angry? Overall, they contend that the bill would not merely strengthen FDA enforcement authority, as claimed, but provide it with sweeping new powers that could be used in unspecified and uncontrolled ways. They point to aspects of the bill they say would grant powers to conduct warrantless electronic surveillances, embark on fishing expeditions with open-ended subpoenas, and order product recalls without hearing or appeal.

They contend also that the bill would allow even low-level FDA bureaucrats to impose product embargoes on fishing expeditions, and that it would impose extraordinary civil penalties for even minor technical violations.

Under the bill, they say, even low-level FDA employees, not just the Secretary of Health and Human Services or the FDA commissioner, would have power to impose 20-day embargoes on any product regulated by the agency.

They point to wording in the bill that they feel could be exercised by any "officer or employee of the Department (who) has reason to believe that a food, drug, device or cosmetic is in violation" of the act. Gerald Mossinghoff, Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association president, suggests that even worse than civil penalties — up to \$250,000 on individuals and \$1 million on companies for each violation — is what the bill omits. "It does not provide for more scientists, modern computers, better management, improved facilities or working conditions," he said. "It does not provide for more investigators or better training and management..."

Roles in S&L collapse lead to convictions of 4

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Four federal securities of Midwest Federal Savings and Loan were convicted Thursday on charges stemming from its collapse, which is expected to cost taxpayers \$1.2 billion. The four each were acquitted on some counts but all were convicted of the most serious charge, racketeering. Among the defendants were chairman Hal Greenwood Jr., a daughter of Greenwood's, and a former Minnesota banking commissioner.

The jury had deliberated since July 25 after a five-month trial. Greenwood was found guilty on 25 of the 27 charges. The convictions included conspiracy, several securities fraud counts, misapplication of funds, filing false reports to government regulators and racketeering. Prosecutors said the defendants conspired to conceal the S&L's financial woes from regulators and investors while paying themselves steep salaries and fancy fringe benefits. The S&L collapsed in 1989. Defense attorneys asserted the government was looking for scapegoats for failing S&Ls and other financial institutions, and that prosecutors failed to show evidence of a conspiracy in the management of the S&L.

Before the case went to the jury, U.S. District Judge Paul Magnuson dismissed about a third of the original 49 counts. Under the racketeering conviction, the government will be allowed to confiscate some money that the defendants had earned during their employment at Midwest Federal.

The racketeering count carries a sentence of up to 20 years, and most of the other counts have maximum terms of five years, said defense attorney Doug Thomson. No sentencing date was set. Charlotte Mascia, the former managing officer, was convicted on 13 of 21 charges.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

'I think, therefore I am.' - Rene Descartes. East-West did well to push South to a five-level contract. At five diamonds doubled, East-West would have been penalized only 100 points. On West's lead of the diamond king, East made a routine play. He signaled encouragement with his 10. West continued (there was no other effective defense) and South ruffed. Trumps were drawn, ending in dummy, and a club finesse lost to West's king. But South didn't have to risk the heart finesse. He discarded his heart loser on dummy's long club. When you are looking at all four hands, it's easy to see that East should have overtaken the diamond at trick one and shifted to hearts. Why should East have seen this need at the table? The bidding offers the revealing clues. Would West have been so quick to sacrifice with only a five-card diamond suit? And would South have been so confident to push to five spades, holding two small diamonds? What about the dangers of dummy's long club suit? After asking himself these questions, East should reach a tentative decision: overtake the diamond at trick one and shift to hearts. Doing so guarantees the defense a trick in each side-suit and a just reward for pushing South a notch beyond his safest depth.





Richard Lewis enjoys his sitcom role, but stand-up comedy is his first love

By Evan Levine

The first thing we notice about Richard Lewis is that it's apparently never too early for him to start a stand-up routine — even over the phone. At 8 a.m. Los Angeles time, Lewis is already in overdrive. "I'm on sitcom time," he says in explanation.

The sitcom in this case is Lewis' "Anything but Love," airing Wednesdays on ABC.

Here's a sample of Lewis' crack-of-dawn humor. "This sitcom schedule is pretty fatiguing. I guess the only time things were pretty constant was in the womb. How do I remember that? Well, rumor I guess. I based all my childhood memories are based on rumor."

Dating, Los Angeles, earthquakes: You name it, Richard Lewis is anxious about it. But he sounds almost relaxed and happy about "Anything but Love." "I love the cast," he says earnestly, "as actors and individually, as people."

Being alone so much, both as a comic and socially, they really are like a family (to me). And I'm really proud of the show. I don't watch much TV, but I think it really is a cut above other stuff that's on."

As for future developments between Marty (his character) and Hannah (Jamie Lee Curtis' role) Lewis will only say, "I hope our getting married is in the cards — but not too soon. I want to explore the whole dating process."

Before, "Anything but Love," Lewis was probably best known to viewers for appearing on "David Letterman" more than 50 times. Stand-up appearances still remain crucially important

to him. "It's like when I played Carnegie Hall," he says with a mixture of fear and pride. "It was one of the biggest nights of my life. I knew that it could be awful, or I could get all the glory, which I did." Lost this sound like bragging, Lewis modifies it somewhat by explaining how important it is to him to be recognized not just by audiences, but also to be singled out by his peers. "It's like working with George Hamilton (in a movie)," he explains.

"I remember my mother and sister sitting on the couch and watching him on TV and going, 'Oh, could you just die?' Another person like that is Steve Allen. I grew up watching him, and he became sort of a friend. One day there was a message from him on my (answering) machine, asking if I could have lunch!"

Lewis goes on, excited, about others he grew up admiring who now

admire him. (It comes across as endearing, mostly.) "Once I went backstage at a rock concert, and Bonnie Raitt told me she'd been following my career for 15 years. "It's people like that who were part of my life, that mean so much to me, moments like that blow my mind. I meet a lot of people, but there's always someone around the corner who makes you pinch yourself."

So, after all this, what would Lewis like to say that he hasn't? He pauses for a moment. "Ask me what's important," he urges. "OK, what's important? To dedicate more time to 'Comic Relief,' (the comedy benefit for the homeless), which is truly a cause we need to be aware of."



Emmy awards make strong showing in television ratings with 11th ranking

NEW YORK (AP) — Panned by some as dull, Sunday night's Emmy awards show on the Fox network made a strong comeback from last year, tying for 11th place in weekly A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings released Tuesday.

ABC, with five shows among the nation's 10 most-watched programs last week, won by a slight margin, averaging a 9.4 rating.

NBC, which had two showings of its hit "Cheers," was second with a 9.2. CBS averaged a 9.1.

The summer-viewer doldrums seemed apparent; the networks' combined share of the prime-time audience last week dropped to 52 percent. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

Fox's three-hour Emmy telecast, which tied with a rerun of ABC's "Doogie Howser, M.D.," averaged a 12.5 rating — a considerable jump from last year's lowest-ever 8.2.

The week's most-watched show was a rerun of ABC's "Roseanne," followed by CBS' "60 Minutes," NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries," ABC's "Coach," NBC's "Cheers" and ABC's Sunday movie, "Sudden Impact," a 1983 release starring Clint Eastwood that proved the chief competition for Fox's Emmy show.


