Thomas: No opinion on abortion

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas Wednesday said he had no opinion on whether the Constitution protects the right to abortion and had not discussed the issue, even in a private setting, in the 18 years since the court decided it.
Elaborating on his views on the right to privacy, the legal underpinning for the court's recognition of a constitutional guarantee to abortion, Thomas said he believed the right to privacy for married couples is a fundamental constitutional right, meaning that government can interfere with it only in extreme cases.
But he did not say whether that right extends beyond the marital setting. He steadfastly refused attempts to pin him

down on the abortion issue, despite complaints by Justice Brandeis Democrats that he was discussing other cases and constitutional doctrines likely to come before the court.
Four of the five Democratic senators who questioned Thomas on the second day of his confirmation hearings expressed varying degrees of concern that the nominee was backtracking from or contradicting earlier statements, primarily about the role of natural law in interpreting the constitution.
Sen. Howell T. Heflin, D-Ala., a swing vote on the committee, told Thomas there was "an appearance of a confirmation conversion," an issue, Heflin pointedly noted, "that can affect the evaluation that members of the committee may give as to integrity and temperament."
Heflin devoted his entire half-hour of questioning to asking the nominee to square his previous statements with his current position that natural law plays no role in constitutional adjudication.
"What I read is somewhat different from the tone" of earlier remarks, said Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill.
Thomas, backed by Republicans on the committee, sought to defuse that concern, saying he had been "consistent on this issue of natural law" and pointing repeatedly to a statement at his confirmation hearings for the federal appeals court in February 1990 at which he suggested he would follow a more traditional approach to constitutional interpretation.
Sen. Alan K. Simpson, R-Wyo., said suggestions of a confirmation conversion were "an act of desperation" by groups opposed to Thomas and that natural law "has been selected as an issue to try to confound people because natural law is an inherently vague concept."
Thomas tangled with Sens. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, and Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., over his refusal to discuss the issue of abortion rights. Thomas insisted it would violate his impartiality as a sitting federal judge.

Road death rates skid

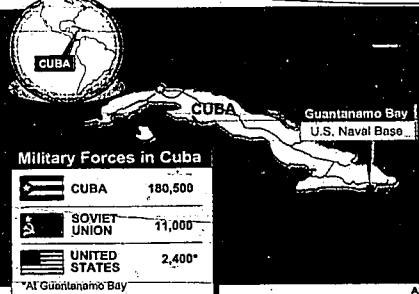

WASHINGTON — The government said Wednesday the nation's highway fatality rate for 1991 may register an all-time yearly low.
Transportation Department officials said that as of April, the rate had dropped to two deaths per 100 million vehicle miles traveled, and that if the trend holds, the figure for the year would be the best since records were begun in 1921.
The 1990 rate was 2.1 per 100 million miles. Highway deaths totaled 44,529, the lowest in five years.
The improvement results largely from states' enactment and enforcement of tougher drunken driving and mandatory seat-belt usage laws, said Jerry R. Curry, head of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
Government regulations requiring that cars be made more crashworthy are of secondary importance, he said.
Death rates have increased in some states. Most have no seat-belt laws or laws with no penalty for non-compliance, Curry said.
Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner said he believes the push for improved fuel economy has lost momentum.
"I think the steam is out of the steam roller," Skinner said.

Auger Falls project reaches big hurdle

Other state and federal agencies have already signed off on the proposal by Cogeneration Inc. of Twin Falls, but it still must secure a permit from the Army Corps of Engineers for the actual construction in the river bed just below the Jerome Canyon Club.
Joe Shelton and Bill Mason, who together own 20 acres of recreation land in the canyon, say the public isn't aware of the ramifications of the project. They're unhappy with the proposal because public access would cross their property downstream of the Twin Falls municipal sewage treatment plant, and no one has asked their permission.
But people have already had a number of opportunities to comment on the Auger Falls proposal.
"We've been dealing with this project since the early '80s," said Mike McMasters, water quality field supervisor with the state Division of Environmental Quality's Twin Falls office. "Had the project come within the last year we would have looked at it differently."
Cogeneration Inc. first submitted its preliminary permit application to build the project to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission last year.

Soviet military ties to Cuba an irritant

WASHINGTON — Some of the bleakest moments of the Cold War, dating to the 1962 Cuban missile crisis, have been the result of Soviet military ties to Cuba.
Now, President Mikhail S. Gorbachev says that remnant of the unpleasant past is being phased out.
Many of the tensions were at least partially the product of Cuba's policy of trans-shipping Soviet weapons to allies elsewhere.
The countries where Soviet weapons supplied through Cuba turned up reads like a roster of Cold War trouble spots: Nicaragua, El Salvador, Grenada, Angola, Ethiopia, to name a few.
With Secretary of State James A. Baker III at his side, Gorbachev indicated Wednesday that Moscow's future ties with Cuba would be limited to the political and economic sphere. He said 11,000 Soviet soldiers would please see CUBA/A2

Long Beach Navy base closing, but prized links make the cut

LOS ALAMITOS, Calif. (AP) — The Navy's second-largest base on the West Coast will not survive the Pentagon budget ax but its prized 27-hole golf course is expected to make the cut.

The course, operated by the Long Beach Naval Station, will be transferred to another command — probably the Long Beach Naval Shipyard — when the station closes later this decade, according to Lt. Cmdr. Steve Chesser.

"We need to maintain certain facilities here to support the ongoing operation of the shipyard," Chesser said Tuesday. "We want to maintain the quality of life for sailors."

There are at least 380 golf courses owned by the armed forces. What happens to those at closing military bases will be decided on a case-by-case basis, said Pentagon spokeswoman Jan Walker.

Some may be turned over to municipalities, others turned into parks, she said.

Home to 35 ships and 17,000 military and civilian personnel with 23,000 dependents, the Long Beach station is the Navy's second-largest West Coast base, after San Diego.

The Long Beach Naval Hospital, which serves area military and dependents, also is scheduled to be transferred or sold as part of cuts that are expected to shrink the Pentagon budget 25 percent during the next five years.

But the fate of the Los Alamitos fairways looks green, pending final approval by Navy headquarters.

The course occupies a good chunk of valued Orange County real estate. It's surrounded by middle-class, single-family homes, gated townhouse

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Actor Ralph Bellamy returned home after a two-week hospital stay for a respiratory ailment, a spokeswoman said.

Bellamy, 87, left St. John's Hospital and Health Center on Tuesday, hospital spokeswoman Patricia Kirk

said Wednesday. He had been hospitalized since Aug. 27.

Bellamy was admitted to the hospital in serious condition, Ms. Kirk said. "She declined to elaborate on the nature of his illness."

Bellamy appeared in more than 100 movies, including "Rosemary's Baby" and "Oh, God."



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Top surgeon slams liquor laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — State laws intended to prevent minors from drinking are "fiddled with loopholes" that make it easy for teen-agers to buy and drink alcoholic beverages, Surgeon General Antonia Novello said Wednesday.

"The federally mandated, 21-year-old minimum age drinking law is largely a myth," the surgeon general said in releasing a report describing the weaknesses of youth alcohol laws and difficulties in enforcing them.

Although all states have set their minimum drinking age at 21 at the

direction of the federal government, loopholes in the federal law and loosely written state laws allow many opportunities for youth to buy, possess and consume alcohol, she said.

Novello noted that:

- Five states and the District of Columbia, while outlawing the sale of alcohol to minors, do not specifically bar minors from purchasing it.
- In 21 states, minors are not barred by law from consuming alcohol.
- Minors in 44 states can sell and serve alcoholic beverages without adult supervision.

"State laws, we have discovered, are riddled with loopholes, with laxity and with lip service," Novello said.

The governing federal law also has some "very big loopholes," she said. The National Minimum Drinking Age Act of 1984 required all states to set their minimum purchase and public possession age at 21 or face a reduction in federal highway money. All states have complied.

But the act does not prohibit mi-

nors from drinking and does not apply to possession of alcohol for religious purposes, in private clubs, for medicinal purposes, when accompanied by a parent, spouse or guardian or in the course of lawful employment.

The act allows states to include these exemptions in their laws, but it does not require them to. Novello said that since the constitutional amendment repealing Prohibition granted states the right to regulate alcohol distribution and sale, "the states are the key actors here."

The report is the third in a series on youth and alcohol prepared by Health and Human Services Inspector General Richard Kusserow at Novello's request.

An earlier report in the series said that 51 percent of the nation's 20.7 million junior and senior high school students had at least one drink in the last year, that 8 million students drink weekly and that 454,000 binge weekly. It also said that nearly 7 million students buy their own alcohol from stores.

Study supports hospital rehab for alcoholism

BOSTON (AP) — Providing hospital rehabilitation for people with drinking problems is more effective — and ultimately not much more expensive — than sending them to Alcoholics Anonymous alone, a study suggests.

"We think we have produced the first scientific evidence that money spent by corporate America to treat employees in inpatient programs for alcoholism is money well spent," said Dr. Diana Chapman Walsh, who directed the study at Harvard School of Public Health.

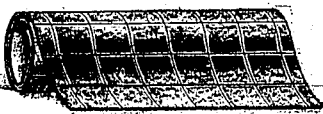
The study largely contrasts two extremes — putting alcoholics in hospital rehabilitation programs, the most expensive option, and requiring them to go to AA, the cheapest.

However, many companies now urge employees to enroll in outpatient treatment programs that are less expensive than residential alcoholism centers. The study did not directly compare these two common options.

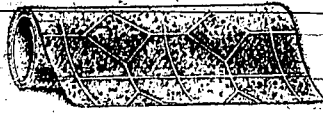

Jazz legend ailing

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Miles Davis, the legendary jazz trumpeter, band leader and composer, has been hospitalized for an undisclosed illness.

Davis' family asked that no information be released about his ailment, his attorney, Dorothy Weber, said Wednesday.

She would say only that Davis was "doing better" and hopefully would be released soon.

The 65-year-old musician, who has a long history of poor health, entered St. John's Hospital and Health Center earlier this month, the Los Angeles Times has reported.

Exxon may use steering as defense

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Court documents indicate Exxon may argue in trials that the nation's worst oil spill was caused by a faulty steering mechanism — and not by a drunken skipper or corporate negligence.

The navigation system used on the tanker Exxon Valdez was "plagued with defects that often caused vessels to lock in autopilot or lose steering control," Exxon said in a status report filed in federal court last week.

Exxon is scheduled to go to trial on criminal charges Oct. 7. No court date has been set for the civil case.

Hearings by the National Transportation Safety Board in May 1989 revealed that the automatic pilot, part of a computerized navigation system designed by Sperry Marine, was turned off minutes before the tanker ripped its hull open on a reef in Alaska's Prince William Sound in 1989.

Third Mate Greg Cousins testified he switched it off, then turned the wheel, but the ship took several minutes to respond.

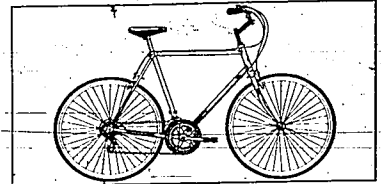
Based on the testimony of the ship's pilot, the NTSB concluded that the steering system was functioning before the accident.

But documents produced in the civil case against Exxon "revealed that over 40 of the 67 Sperry navigation systems that are in use aboard vessels have had serious failures," Exxon wrote in its report.

Exxon notified all the parties to the litigation Monday that it planned to remove the Sperry SRP 2000 Ship Control System from its vessels and replace it with another Sperry product.

Goodwillie ruled the law is constitutionally vague because it is not clear what would be prohibited, and could "serve to chill free speech."

Gregart said he has decided not to appeal the ruling, but he hopes the state Legislature enacts a more specific law.

Testimony: TV influenced North trial

WASHINGTON — Former National Security Adviser Robert McFarlane said Wednesday his testimony at Oliver North's 1989 criminal trial was influenced by North's nationally televised appearances on Capitol Hill. But McFarlane could cite no examples. McFarlane's testimony opened what could be months of hearings before U.S. District Court Judge Gerhard Gesell as Iran-Contra prosecutors try to have North's three felony convictions reinstated. A federal appeals court set aside the convictions, saying prosecutors must demonstrate in court that North's 1987 testimony to Congress, given under a grant of immunity, wasn't used against him at his criminal trial. "There is no question in my mind but that Col. North's testimony brought new information to me," McFarlane said.

Medicaid legislation hurts VA's wallet

WASHINGTON — Legislation intended to cut Medicaid drug costs has resulted in the Veterans Administration paying \$60 million more for drugs, the VA told Congress on Wednesday. "We have experienced price increases as high as 2,300 percent for individual pharmaceutical items," VA Deputy Secretary Anthony J. Principi told the House Veterans Affairs subcommittee on hospitals and health care. "The sudden and dramatic price increases," he said, appear to be the pharmaceutical industry's response to a provision in last year's Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act, the congressional agreement on cutting the budget deficit over the next five years.

Bush pledges support for Baltic states

WASHINGTON — President Bush pledged U.S. support Wednesday for Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania in their newly won freedom as he honored the aged envoys who toiled in exile for independence for more than 50 years. "This is a joyous day," Bush said. "The United States was true to the Baltic states in captivity. We will continue to be true to them as democratic partners in the months and the years ahead." He promised to unfreeze "as soon as possible" the gold reserves and other Baltic assets frozen in 1940 after Stalin forced the three independent states into the Soviet Union, and said the United States will sponsor their admission to the United Nations on Tuesday.

L.A. school district eliminates 2,300 jobs

LOS ANGELES — The nation's second-largest school district has voted unanimously to balance its \$3.9 billion budget by slashing more than 2,300 jobs and increasing class sizes. The Los Angeles Board of Education passed the 1991-92 budget on a vote of 6-0 Tuesday, said district spokesman Patrick Spencer. One board member was absent. The cuts will cover 2,146 probationary teaching positions and 217 non-teaching positions such as clerks or counselors. The jobs will be eliminated by doing away with unfilled vacancies and by layoffs. The plan is expected to save \$21.3 million at the secondary school level and \$33.4 million at the elementary level.

Noriega's attorney drills possible jurors

MIAMI — Manuel Noriega's attorney grilled prospective jurors on fairness Wednesday and many said they would have trouble objecting to charges. A half dozen candidates were called to bench conferences out of earshot of other potential jurors after telling lead defense attorney Frank Rubino they had strong opinions on the case. Anncris Rodriguez, an office manager at an insurance company, said she doubted she could fairly judge Noriega's case. Cesar Cepeda, who has just begun a real estate career after driving a pizza delivery truck, said he had heard much about Noriega. U.S. District Judge William Hoeweler has made no secret of his eagerness to seat a jury quickly. He told the lawyers he hoped to have a panel of 12 jurors and six alternates by Friday morning, the sixth day of jury selection.

Senate sets deadline for AIDS rules

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted Wednesday to give the government less than three months to issue long-delayed rules requiring doctors, dentists and hospitals to wear gloves and take other precautions against the spread of AIDS. On a 99-1 vote, the lawmakers adopted the proposal, which was introduced by leaders of both parties and backed by the Bush administration, unionized health-care workers and AIDS advocacy groups. The provision was added to a \$204 billion bill financing the Department of Health and Human Services and other agencies in the fiscal 1992, which begins Oct. 1. The House version of that bill does not contain the Senate language on AIDS precautions.

Committee calls Clifford 'amiable dunce'

WASHINGTON (AP) — At a private Georgetown dinner, Clark Clifford one evening offered the opinion that Ronald Reagan, then occupant of the White House, was "an amiable dunce." On Wednesday, Clifford, 84, for so many years Washington's power lawyer, adviser to presidents and crisis symbol of propriety, heard his words come back to him. Slowly, fedora in hand, erect with dignity, his lined face wearing a frozen smile, he went before a committee of Congress. He was told in his face that the "amiable dunce" had been Clifford himself — if his account could be believed that without his knowledge the corrupt Bank of Credit and Commerce International had exercised illicit control of the big Washington bank he headed. And his account was not going over well. "It pains me to say so. Others may believe your story but I don't believe a word of it," said Rep. Toby Roth, R-Wis. "You have been in bed with BCCI for at least 10 years; you're telling us all you got was a back rub."



Clark Clifford Doubtied by Congress

It was an experience Clifford never expected in his 63 years as member of the Washington establish-

ment, as an adviser to nine presidents, Democratic and Republican, lawyer for Standard Oil, du Pont and General Electric. "I would have given anything if I could have avoided what I've gone through this past year," he told the House Banking Committee. He had been taken in, he said, duped, by the foreign owners of BCCI, who seemed so reputable to him. Beside him sat his partner, Robert Altman, 44, brash, ambitious, high flying — two men so unlike except for their joint involvement in the law firm and the bank. And behind them their wives: Clifford's gray-haired Margery, his boyhood sweetheart from St. Louis; Altman's glamorous Lynda Carter, "Wonder Woman" on television, offering Clifford a kiss on the cheek, chewing gum while he testified. From the committee came words that must have stung. The congressmen had anticipated his defense and rejected it.

The explanation, said Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., "strains credulity to its breaking point." To believe Clifford and Altman, he said, one would have to believe "what when their house was on fire, they didn't smell the smoke, feel the heat or hear the alarms." "Lucrative inside stock transactions ... profited these gentlemen."

He said the committee chairman, Henry Gonzalez, D-Texas. "The question we have to answer is whether these gentlemen were amiable ... dunces," said Rep. Chalmers Wylie, R-Ohio, "or were they ... sophisticated financial kingpins." Rep. Joseph Kennedy II, D-Mass., said what he saw was "a display of corporate arrogance and corruption." Rep. Jim Buechler, D-Fla., said he had looked forward for years to meeting Clifford, but not under circumstances such as these. "I am sorry you are here today." "I'm thoroughly disgusted with the high and mighty," said Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., "I don't hold anybody in such high regard ... that I am unwilling to send them to jail." Clifford laid out his defense in chiseled words. He went into banking at an age others retire because he wanted "to test myself." He didn't need the money; his wife and daughter "will be taken care of. ... I did not want to sit on the porch and die." At the end he paused. He waited. Then he offered up his self-assessment: Yes, he had been taken in. "My judgment is questionable," he said. "I guess I should have learned in some way. I guess I should have some way sensed it; I did not; I did not."

EPA sets standards for garbage landfills

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency set national standards for garbage landfills Wednesday, issuing rules that could speed a trend toward replacing town dumps with large regional facilities. The regulations, to be phased in from 1993 through 1996, will require monitoring for leaks of dangerous chemicals at nearly all sites. New landfills will have to meet more stringent conditions, including protective liners to prevent pollutants from seeping through the soil. Environmentalists said that many states already have tougher rules and that the EPA's program would leave too many loopholes for landfills in states with looser regulations. Many of the nation's nearly 6,000 landfills "are simply not environmentally acceptable," EPA Administrator William K. Reilly told a news conference. Ten years ago, the United States had 16,000 landfills; the number is expected to shrink to about 3,000 within five years.

"We will see fewer landfills and larger landfills," Reilly said. He said the new rules may accelerate some closings, but other agency officials said their estimate of how many closures would be forced by the new rules ranged from none to 600. Reilly said the nationwide standards would "ensure against the creation of a whole new generation" of hazardous waste sites. About 200 of the 1,200 sites on the Superfund priority cleanup list are former landfills. Robert Peters, director of technical programs for the Solid Waste Association of North America, said new landfills will probably have to cover at least 50 acres to collect enough revenue to cover the costs of the tougher standards. "I think there will be additional impetus for regionalization," Peters said. "In some parts of the country where they don't charge at all or charge low fees, there's going to be some sticker shock."

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2,700 illegal aliens caught by guards

WASHINGTON (AP) — Border Patrol guards have caught more than 2,700 illegal aliens riding in freight cars and atop passenger trains in search of employment around the country, a government spokesman said Wednesday. The guards, who work for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, also caught 33 smugglers who helped move the aliens across the U.S. borders from Mexico and Canada and through the railroads, said spokesman Verne Jervis.

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World Discord threatens agreement

MOSCOW (AP) — Russia and other Soviet republics could reach basic agreement on preserving an economic union within four to six weeks, one of the Soviet-Union's most powerful economic planners said Wednesday.

But signs continued to mount that the Soviet Union's economic powerhouse, Russia, might go it alone economically, deepening the nation's financial crisis.

Also Wednesday, Ivan Silayev, the Russian prime minister and head of what in effect is the Soviet transitional government, announced he would quit the post on Monday, the Interfax and Tass news agencies reported.

Tass said Silayev did not give a reason and no replacement has been named.

The announcement followed accusations at a meeting of the Economic Management Committee, set up after last month's coup, that Russia has threatened other republics in laying claim to what were national resources, Interfax said.

The report of Silayev's resignation could not immediately be confirmed. But it suggested a widening rift between Russia — by far the largest and richest Soviet republic — and other republics over the economy.

Radical market economist Grigory Yavlinsky, meanwhile, asserted Wednesday that his draft plan for a loose economic union of Soviet republics was the only way to stave off complete economic collapse, mass unemployment, poverty and social unrest.

"Economic union is not a choice, it is rather a necessity," Yavlinsky said at a news conference.

Yavlinsky conceded living standards could drop by up to 20 percent and unemployment could reach 15 percent even if the 12 Soviet republics and the newly independent Baltic states accepted his proposal.

But the alternative would be far worse, he said. He predicted chaos as republic leaders vie to protect their resources, and said differences in price structures, tax systems and even currencies could emerge. The resulting uncertainty would mean no aid from the West, he added.

Yavlinsky said republican leaders, who received his proposal on Friday, would need four to six weeks to put the draft to their parliaments for a vote.

"If the republics fail to adopt it within that period, he added, Western aid might be withheld for lack of reliable negotiating partners, and Russia might decide to go it alone economically.

"Russia cannot wait a long time," he said. "If the republics do not show willingness ... Russia is ready to start these changes all by itself."

Yavlinsky's plan calls for republican leaders to agree to a loosely bound economic union for the next five years.

Economic matters would be regulated through a committee of representatives from all participating republics, and a single currency and central bank would be maintained.

Gorbachev gives Bush copy of captivity video

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev added a personal twist to a routine diplomatic gesture Wednesday when he gave the U.S. secretary of state a copy of the videotape he made in captivity last month.

The Soviet leader said the tape was a present for President Bush.

Gorbachev made the tape while he was held captive at his Black Sea summer home by leaders of the failed hard-line coup.

"I would like once again to express my gratitude for the very clear and firm position of the United States and the solidarity with those who suppressed the putsch," Gorbachev told Baker at a news conference that followed their Kremlin meeting.

Softening his voice, the Soviet leader explained how he had secretly recorded the video in the middle of the night, with the help of his son-in-law.

Georgian leader draws criticism

TBILISI, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Georgian President Zviad Gamsakhurdia looks like a man who enjoys power.

He wades into a crowd, his large head erect, gray hair in place. With arms raised, palms inward, he salutes his followers.

At a recent rally, his solemn face melted into a smile as supporters shouted, "Zviad-y! Zviad-y!"

A barricade of buses erected by his police, meanwhile, masked the others who chanted, "Ceau-ses-cu!"

Opponents like the comparison with Nicolae Ceausescu, the deposed Romanian dictator who amassed personal power, abhorred criticism, promoted yes-men, raised a private

army, and fell under the influence of a tough-minded wife.

Gamsakhurdia hates it. "This is a democracy," he said in a recent interview. "Look," he added, holding up a morning newspaper. "They abuse me, they slander me, anything they want." He dismissed criticism as baseless slurs by political parties and vested interests conspiring in a Kremlin plot.

Again and again, he blamed the political trouble on "enemies" of Georgia.

Daily demonstrations by thousands of Georgians are part of the plot, he said. "Why should I resign because a thousand people demand it

when I was elected by 2.5 million?"

While his numbers are inaccurate, Gamsakhurdia has a point: Georgians elected him president by a wide margin in May, seeing him as the man who faced prison to defend human rights — a champion of a free and democratic Georgia.

But according to former comrades-in-arms and his opposition, the huge mandate brought out worrisome tendencies in Gamsakhurdia.

"The power has gone to his head," said former Foreign Minister Georgy Klutsenia, who resigned on Aug. 15 to protest the president's personal rule. Tengiz Secua, who quit as prime minister a day later, agreed.

Israel frees 51 Arab prisoners

TEL AVIV, Israel — Israel Wednesday released 51 Arab prisoners and the corpse of nine Hezbollah fighters in southern Lebanon in a swap for confirmation that one of its missing soldiers was dead.

Israel's leading hostage negotiator said the move could set the stage for the release of one of 10 Westerners still held hostage in Lebanon.

"We hope this will serve as a face-saving device for a Western hostage

to come out," said Uri Lubrani, a top adviser to Defense Minister Moshe Arens. "Don't be surprised if (U.N. Secretary-General Javier) Perez de Cuellar emerges from Tehran tomorrow and a Western hostage pops out somewhere."

The U.N. chief was in the Iranian capital Wednesday to discuss regional issues, including a comprehensive exchange of Israeli POWs and Western hostages in Lebanon for Lebanese and Palestinian prisoners held by Israel.

But Lubrani cautioned that if there is an end to the hostage affair it will happen in stages and take months.

"I don't believe it will happen in one shot. It will happen piecemeal. This is the way they will extract the most," he said.

Pro-Iranian captors of the Western hostages are demanding that Israel free several hundred Lebanese and Palestinian prisoners, including Muslim fundamentalist Sheikh Abdel Karim Obeid.

10 die in eruption of Mount Pinatubo

SAN-FERNANDO, Philippines (AP) — At least 10 more people have died as a result of the eruption of Mount Pinatubo, officials said Wednesday.

The latest casualties bring the official estimate to over 600 dead from the 5,758-foot volcano, which began erupting last June after more than 600 years of dormancy.

Seven children died from disease and dehydration at evacuation centers in Pampanga province in the past week.

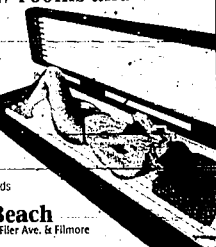
Three people drowned Tuesday when volcanic debris ravaged the nearby Zambales province.

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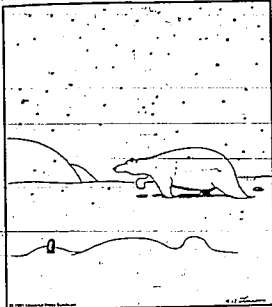
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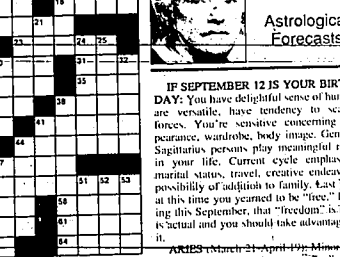
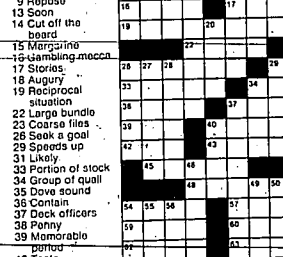
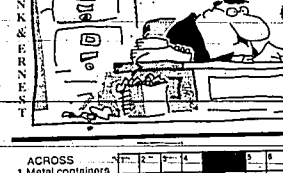
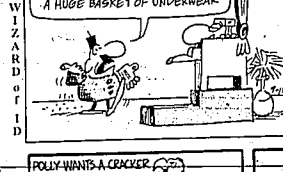
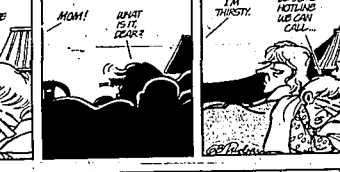
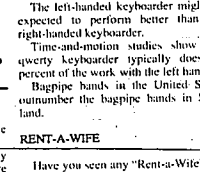
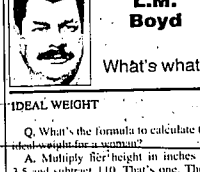
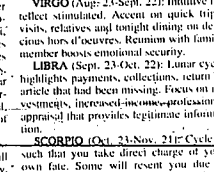
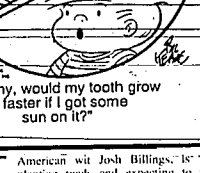
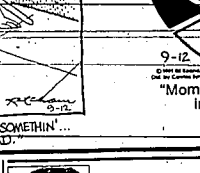
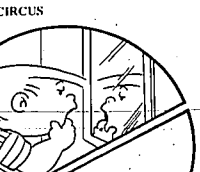
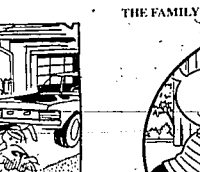
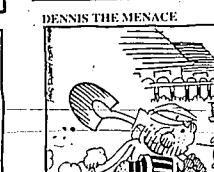
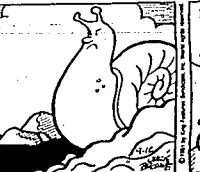
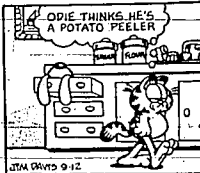
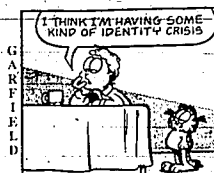
