Ruling opens schools to religious clubs

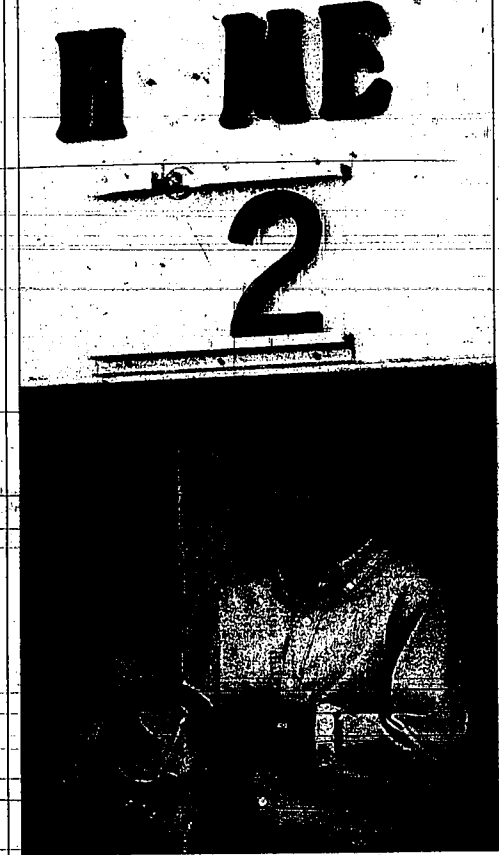

 BOISE — Even though it's an apparent violation of the Idaho Constitution, a federal judge says the Twin Falls School District must allow a religious club to use school property for a Bible study club.
 U.S. District Judge Marion Callister ruled this week that the Twin Falls schools must treat a student group that wants to pray just as it would any other extracurricular organization and allow it to hold Bible study sessions at school during noninstructional periods.
 Twin Falls Superintendent Terrell

Donicht said Thursday the district acted immediately to comply.
 "We will certainly carry out the instructions of the court," Donicht said. "The only reason we got into this was to get clear direction. We got it and that's fine."
 The School District does not plan to appeal, said its attorney, Fritz Wenderlich.
 The parents of students Ellen and Patricia Hoppeck and Sheila Slaughter, Robert Stuart Junior High School ninth-graders last year, filed suit in January to force the school district to allow a Bible study club use school facilities.

"I think it's great," said Patricia Hoppeck, now a sophomore at Twin Falls High School. She said she and others would talk to the school's principal, Carl Snow, within the next two weeks about starting a club at the school.
 "I'm thrilled that the court has shown that they have a right to do this," said the Rev. Dave Hoskins, youth and music director for the First Assembly of God Church in Twin Falls. Hoskins was the adviser for Youth Alive, a group that had hoped to meet for prayer and Bible readings at Stuart.
 The Twin Falls School Board turned

them down last December, saying allowing religious groups access to the schools would violate the state's Constitution.
 But Callister ruled that under the 1990 Equal Access Act, public secondary schools must provide student religious clubs the same access to school facilities that other student clubs have.
 Although that's in direct conflict with Idaho's charter, which forbids any use of public money or property for religious purposes, Callister said the Federal law takes precedence.
 He called it a federal law "that empowers

Democrats accuse Thomas of hedging

WASHINGTON — Judge Clarence Thomas, weathering Democratic charges that he was dodging the abortion issue and abandoning his past positions on natural law, appeared to edge closer Thursday to Senate Judiciary Committee approval of his nomination to the Supreme Court.

Democratic sources close to the committee said they believed they could count no more than five members of the 14-man committee who would vote against Thomas.
 "Tranquilly testifying for a third day, Thomas, 43, took unexpectedly moderate positions by endorsing strong separation of church and state, backing public housing and grudgingly supporting the right of unmarried people to use contraceptives.
 Moreover, he appeared to retreat further from his previously stated positions on natural law, the theory that there is an unwritten set of fundamental rights that supersede written laws. The theory is so flexible that both conservatives and liberals have used it to support their views.
 "He's moved to the middle, there's no doubt, and extreme right-wingers will be very concerned about it," Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., said in an interview.
 "The concern was that he'd be

advocating all sorts of applications of natural law, and it caused fears. But now he's almost eliminated the possibility that he'd ever apply it," said Heflin, a former chief justice of the Alabama Supreme Court who often casts a pivotal vote on the Judiciary Committee.
 "During a long exchange with committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., Thomas said he would use natural law only indirectly to help explain what the framers of the Constitution had in mind. Then he said he would consider their ideas not as concepts frozen in time but in the context of the nation's history, traditions and cultural values."
 When Biden asked whether privacy rights extended to the use of contraceptives by unmarried people, Thomas sought to avoid a response, provoking Biden to say:
 "Well, judge, I think that is the most unfuneral dodge that I have heard."
 Biden pressed for an answer, and Thomas finally gave one. Asked again, whether he agreed that single people have the same right of privacy as married people to use contraceptives, Thomas replied:
 "I think that the (Supreme) Court has so found, and I agree with that."
 But Thomas repeatedly spurned efforts to coax an opinion from him on whether a

Lobbyists pay for many trips for House members

WASHINGTON — Every year, almost like clockwork, many of the nation's most vigorous lobbies pack up droves of House members — some with their families — and fly them off, mostly to balmy climes, for a few days of meetings, golf, tennis and other recreations.

The lobbies make no secret of what they're after: The undivided attention and sympathetic ear of members who can help them most.
 In the last Congress, for instance, House members took nearly 4,000 trips paid for by corporate, labor, academic and other lobbies with interests in legislation, according to a report compiled by Public Citizen, a public interest research group. Entitled "They Love to Fly ... and It Shows," the report questions the ethics of House members' accepting expense-paid getaways, particularly in light of congressional criticism earlier this year of White House Chief of Staff John Sununu

for doing essentially the same thing.
 "When lawmakers accept gifts of travel from groups that are actively lobbying Congress, a clear conflict of interest is created," the report asserted. "Special access, which is unavailable to the average citizen, is bought by wealthy interests who can afford to fly members of Congress to remote vacation spots for personal meetings-and-lobbying-sessions—that kind of access can buy influence and legislative results."
 Joan Chynoweth, president of Public Citizen, told reporters Thursday, "The public has gotten more and more turned off by their representatives in Congress because they believe they are unduly influenced by special interests who take them on these expensive trips. This privately paid travel is a stain on Congress and undermines all the good work that members do."

Unlike official travel—often derided as "junketing"—but Thomas repeatedly spurned efforts to coax an opinion from him on whether a

Federal agency wants to probe Shriver's hiring by nursing home

TWIN FALLS — A federal agency wants an investigation into the hiring by a Twin Falls nursing home of a parolee who served time for an aggravated battery.
 Hours after Donald Shriver left his job taking care of patients at the West Magic Care Center on Aug. 29, police say he stabbed his mother.

The Federal Health Care Financing Administration prohibits nursing homes from employing personal care workers who have been convicted of violent crimes, said Linda Miles, the agency's regional senior program specialist in Seattle.
 "The way that the regulation reads, it is a potential violation," said Linda Ledbetter, the agency's representative for Idaho and Washington. "We are going to ask for more information."
 Shriver has been charged with one count of "aggravated assault for allegedly stabbing his mother and two counts of battery on a law enforcement officer for allegedly attacking two officers in the Twin Falls County Jail.
 West Magic hired Shriver on July 26, two days after

his release from the Idaho Maximum Security Institution in Boise, where he served time for an aggravated battery.

Before that, he spent five years in prison for battery against a law enforcement officer, completing the term in September 1989, state records show.

The Federal Health Care Financing Administration, which certifies nursing homes to ensure residents receive safe and clean care, can request corrective actions or withhold Medicare payments to nursing homes that violate its rules, Ledbetter said.

Keith Holloway, president of Western Health Corp., which owns West Magic and 10 other nursing homes, said Thursday that West Magic would not have hired Shriver if it had known more about his background.
 "The difficulty we had with this case is the parole officer did not give us the full story," he said.

Mudlyn Shepherd, West Magic's director of nursing, said she hired Shriver knowing that he had been convicted of "fighting."
 However, the nursing home did not contact the Probation and Parole Department until two days after.

Tree rings support greenhouse theory

WASHINGTON — Growth rings taken from ancient trees in Tasmania show the climate there has been unusually warm since 1965, a finding that may support the theory that greenhouse gases are causing the Earth to warm.

American and Australian scientists collected corings from the trunks of 23 huon pines, a tree that lives for thousands of years, and found that the growth rings formed between 1965 and 1988 were larger than at any other time in the last 1,089 years.
 "This growth increase... supports claims that a scientist who adds another layer to the outer part of the trunk... influenced by greenhouse gases, is in progress," the scientist said in a report to be published Friday in the journal Science.
 Tasmania is an island off the southern coast of Australia and the trees were growing on a remote mountain.
 "These trees are in an isolated area that hasn't been touched by man," said Peter Tans, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration scientist who helped gather the samples.
 The huon pine is a conifer that grows slowly and can live for 2,000 years or more. During each growing season, supports claims that a scientist who adds another layer to the outer part of the trunk...

Wholesale prices edge upward, but food prices take another dip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wholesale prices edged up a tiny 0.2 percent in August as a third straight drop in food costs helped to offset the biggest jump in energy prices since October.

The Labor Department said higher prices for new cars and tobacco products also played a role in pushing the Producer Price Index up for the first time since May, when it posted a 0.4 percent gain.

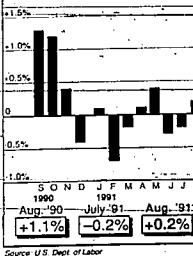
But the slight August increase, which was well within expectations, did nothing to jar economists' view that inflation is well under control. Inflation at the consumer level, which the government will report on Friday, was expected to show a similarly small gain. Many analysts said that the two inflation reports should be enough to give the Federal Reserve the green light to cut interest rates further to boost economic demand.

The good-inflation news also cheered financial markets with both stocks and bonds posting gains as investors expressed a similar belief that a Fed rate cut is imminent.

While many economists believe the 1990-91 recession ended sometime in the spring, there is a widespread concern that the recovery is so weak that the country could topple into another recession without further boosts in demand.

A second report Thursday showed that new claims for unemployment benefits barely budged in the final week in August, dropping by just 1,000 to 420,000.

That level of unemployment claims indicates continued layoffs

with little rehiring being done, analysts said.

The 0.2 percent August increase in wholesale prices followed declines of 0.3 percent in June and 0.2 percent in July. So far this year, prices at the wholesale level have been declining at an annual rate of 1.1 percent, the best showing since 1986.

The small increase in August was led by a sharp jump in energy prices, which shot up 1.8 percent. It was only the second increase in energy costs this year and the biggest jump since a 9.1 percent surge last October, during a period of rapid increase in world oil prices following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

Gasoline prices, which had been falling for most of this year, shot up 4.6 percent in August and home heating oil prices rose 4.7 percent. However, natural gas prices edged down 0.7 percent.

Overall, food costs dropped 0.4 percent in August, the third monthly decline as fruit and vegetable prices, which had been up sharply earlier in the year, continued to retreat.

Vegetable prices dropped 6.9 percent last month following a 24.5 percent decline in July, while fruit prices were down 3.1 percent. Beef prices fell 4.7 percent last month while pork prices dropped 1.1 percent. The underlying inflation rate, absent the volatile food and energy categories, was up a modest 0.2 percent in August, the same as the July increase.

The increases in this area were led by a 1.1 percent jump in the price of new cars and a similar 1.1 percent increase in tobacco products.

S&L bailout money is running low

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration said Thursday that the savings and loan bailout will run out of money by the end of October, but some lawmakers balked at doubling the taxpayer cost of the program to \$160 billion.

Deputy Treasury Secretary John Robson and L. William Seidman, chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., told the House Banking subcommittee on financial institutions that Congress must soon appropriate more money for the bailout agency, the Resolution Trust Corp.

"If loss funds run out and the RTC is unable to close money-losing thrifts and pay off their depositors, the costs of the cleanup will simply grow, and we would risk ... creating runs," Robson said.

Pentagon admits Stealth not invincible

WASHINGTON — Although contending that the B-2 Stealth bomber is still "the most survivable aircraft in the world," the Pentagon acknowledged Thursday that the plane, meant to be nearly invisible on radar screens, isn't.

Test flights on July 26 revealed problems with the plane's radar signature, or the reflection of the craft on radar, said spokesman Pete Williams. But he refused to define the trouble any further for reporters, saying that classified information was involved. Asked if the problem can be fixed, the spokesman said, "I don't think anybody knows yet."

Killer bees attack 65-year-old Texan

McALLEN, Texas — Africanized bees attacked and stung a 65-year-old man more than 300 times in the first major attack by so-called "killer bees" in the United States, authorities said.

Adan Garza was listed as stable Thursday at Mission Hospital, said nursing supervisor Kathleen Mowery.

Garza was attacked Wednesday about 10 miles west of McAllen while clearing brush near an abandoned shack where the bees had built a hive, said Kathleen Davis, a spokeswoman for the Texas A&M Department of Agricultural Communications.

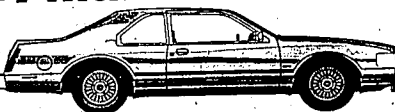
Surviving scout released from hospital

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. — The most seriously injured survivor of a CIT Securibus crash July 31 that killed seven people was released from the hospital this week, an official said.

Jenny Libert, 15, who spent 24 days in an intensive care unit, ten days in hospital on Tuesday for the road trip with her family home to New Orleans, said hospital spokesman Randy Beyluequin. The girl, the last of 47 injured survivors to be discharged, had suffered a collapsed lung, cracked hip, broken arm and other injuries.

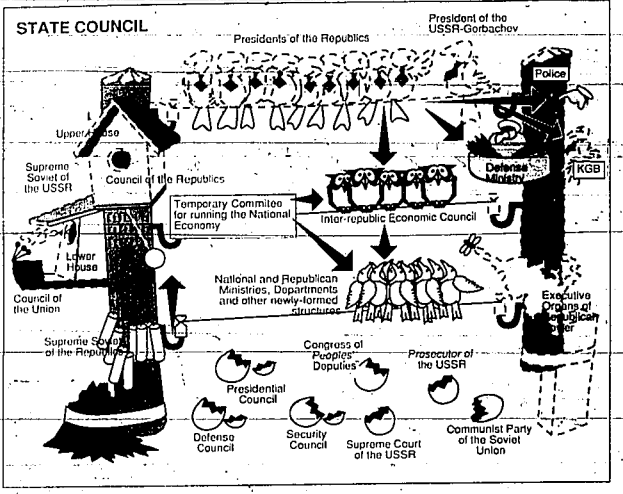

Leaders: Ranks, ethnic tension threaten a peaceful transition

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet reformers told Secretary of State James A. Baker III Thursday that disarray in their ranks and ancient ethnic tensions are the greatest threats to a peaceful transition to democracy in the Soviet Union. Moscow Mayor Gavril Popov said too that the forces that backed the three-day coup against Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev in August "will always be a threat." But he quickly added that "the biggest threat" however, is not so much the reactionary forces, but the inability of reformers to really come together and work out all problems.

The wary, somewhat pessimistic view of the future was echoed by former Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze and Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev. Kozyrev talked of the danger of "excessive nationalism," a reference to the tensions between the republics as they break the once strong hold of the Soviet central government. Their emphasis on the dangers that lie ahead was in sharp contrast to the upbeat statements the day before by Gorbachev and Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin. Gorbachev and Yeltsin talked of progress toward political and economic change.

Their warnings of hard times ahead were in the context of a need for massive aid from the West — short-term to meet the challenge of the harsh Russian winter and long-term to rebuild the crumbling national economy. Shevardnadze also talked of a need for aid, saying dire consequences would follow if "astronomic" sums of money are not provided by the West. "If we fail to improve, at least, at minimum, the living conditions, then we have to face this reality and it's quite possible another attempt at a coup could be made," he said.

Soviet prisons improve, U.S. prisons worsen

MOSCOW (AP) — Over the past 10 years, conditions in Soviet prisons have improved while those in the United States have gotten worse, the U.S. Helsinki Watch Committee said Thursday after lengthy surveys of superpower jails. Both countries still have the highest incarceration rates among major nations of the world, with 1 million people each behind bars, Helsinki Watch said in reports published to coincide with an ongoing 38-nation human rights conference in Moscow.

The human rights monitoring group issued separate reports on the United States and the Soviet Union plus "six other countries" including prison conditions in five other countries belonging to the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE) — Poland, Czechoslovakia, Turkey, Spain and Britain. "In most cases, the conditions under which people are confined are very bad. In many cases, they are really intolerable and inhumane," said Prof. Herman Schwartz of American University Law School, chairman of the Helsinki Watch project.

In all seven countries, people awaiting trial are held in conditions that are far worse than those for convicted murderers and rapists, he told a news conference. "Those awaiting trial are denied the most basic rights — no letters, no visits," he said. "They just sit in cells for 23 and sometimes 24 hours a day... for as long as four years."

U.N. told to admit Baltics

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — A festive U.N. Security Council recommended U.N. admission for the newly freed Baltic republics on Thursday, hailing their return to the family of nations after 51 years of Soviet domination. The General Assembly is expected to follow the recommendation of the 15-member council by admitting Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia by declaration when it convenes Tuesday. "This is an important and glorious day for the Baltics," said Stasys Lozoraitis of Lithuania, spokesman for the three nations and Lithuania's charge d'affaires in Washington. "The support of all members for our admission is a very important basis to begin work, collaboration, for building something new, better and brighter in the future," Lozoraitis told reporters after the council vote.

The Baltics, which ended 51 years of Soviet domination this year, will be admitted along with North Korea, South Korea, the Marshall Islands and Micronesia. There are currently 159 members in the assembly. The United States and most Western nations never recognized the Soviet Union's annexation of the Baltics in 1940, and the three states have maintained interest sections in Washington and New York. "The Baltic republics were independent nations between World War I and World War II, and were active in the U.N.'s predecessor, the League of Nations. But in 1939, Hitler and Stalin secretly decided their future with a Nazi-Soviet pact that divided eastern Europe into spheres of influence. The Baltics were given to the Soviet Union and Poland was divided between the two countries. Last year, the three republics began independence drives that were forgetfully opposed by the Kremlin."

Demonstrators vow continuance of protests until leader resigns

TBILISI, U.S.S.R. (AP) — A broad range of Georgians stepped up their attacks on President Zviad Gamsakhurdia on Thursday, vowing not to let up until his government crumbles. "The president will have to resign," he said in an interview.

H football veterans file suit against NFL

WASHINGTON — Eleven veteran football players filed a class-action suit Thursday against the NFL, alleging that team owners are fixing salaries during the season, weekly pre-season, costing them tens of thousands of dollars.

The suit, being brought under the guidance and financial support of the NFL Players Association, asks for treble damages, which if successful could cost the 28 teams an estimated \$50 million.

At issue is how much veteran players get paid during the seven-week pre-season. The issue is especially important for veteran players who get cut during training camp or early in the season.

SAN ANTONIO — The city will file an application Monday asking that San Antonio be awarded an NFL franchise, Mayor Nelson Wolff said.

City leaders have discussed the possibility of trying for an NFL franchise since construction began on a new 65,000-seat domed stadium.

MINNEAPOLIS — While the Minnesota Twins likely will be in the American League playoffs, it's also likely that many of their fans won't find accommodations at downtown hotels.

The city's downtown hotels are booked solid for next month's playoff dates and two of the four World Series dates.

During the first two games of the AL playoffs, about 9,000 police chiefs will use all the convention hotel rooms in downtown Minneapolis and St. Paul.

During the next two games, most of the 4,000 downtown hotel rooms in Minneapolis and the 1,500 in St. Paul will be filled with normal business in what traditionally is a busy month.

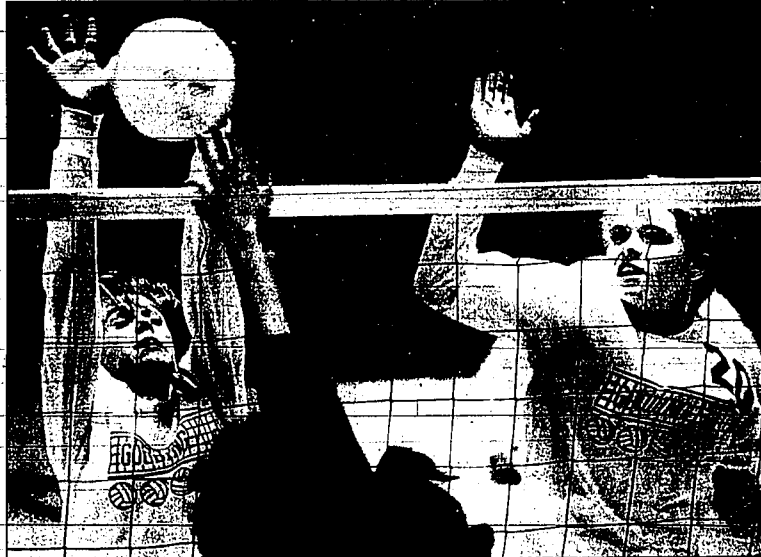

Braves work hard not to add fuel to Dodgers' fire

ATLANTA — The Los Angeles Dodgers have had a few things to say about the upstart Atlanta Braves. But as the two teams prepare for a three-game weekend series that could help decide the NL West, the Braves are choosing a low-key approach.

"It's no big deal," said team leader Terry Pendleton, the third baseman who is having an MVP-type season. "We've got to go out and play baseball. I hope we can do that instead of worrying about all this hype."

The series has been sold out for weeks as the teams have played each other seven times down the stretch. They will meet again next weekend in Los Angeles.

Friday night's game will be televised by ESPN. Saturday's game was switched from 7:10 p.m. EDT to 3 p.m. so CBS could televise it.

"I'm looking forward to it. The fan support has been great. This place will be rocking and rulling" and the townhalls will be flying," said Braves catcher Greg Olson. "This is what it's all about. It's not often you get a chance to play in a big series like this."

Manager Bobby Cox, however, said he wasn't going to make a big deal of the series.

"I'm not even thinking about it," he said. "Not one bit."

The Braves have said very little to fire up the rival Dodgers, who hold an 8-4 edge in their series this year. Some of the Dodgers, however, have tried to stir things up.

"I'm not concerned about the Braves: Earlier this week, Brett Butler said, 'Head-to-head, we're going to beat them because, basically, we've done it all year.'"

Shula would rather coach than celebrate 300th win

MIAMI — A news conference with Don Shula is winding down, and the Miami Dolphins' coach tries to explain how he has won 299 games in the NFL.

"Coaching is teaching," Shula says. "It's not what I know — the Xs and Os — it's what I can transmit to the people I'm responsible for that have to execute under heavy pressure. That's how you're judged."

Shula looks at his watch. He has limited patience for questions about the looming 300-victory milestone.

"Whenever you spend too much time trying to figure out how you've won," he says, rising from a chair, "you might not be spending enough time trying to figure out how to win Sunday. So I'll see you guys."

It was time for another practice, time to coach and teach and encourage and cheer out his players as they prepare for Sunday's game at Detroit.

With a win, Shula would become the only NFL coach other than the late George Halas to reach the 300 mark. But Shula would rather be on the practice field or in the film room than bask in anticipation of his achievement.

"Now is not the time for me to enjoy it," he says.

There's so much work to do; at 61, Shula remains one of the most intense and organized coaches in a league known for them.

"He's such a hard-working man," marvels receiver Jim Jensen, the senior member of the Dolphins with 11 seasons under Shula. "He's so dedicated to the game. It's incredible, the work

"Our line was the whole story," said Hansen Coach Terry Dowd. "We just had them completely shut out."



Ex-cons on the night shift: an inevitable fact of life?

You probably wouldn't invite Donald Shriver home to dinner. You probably wouldn't want him working for you, and you probably wouldn't want him living on your block.

He's a three-time violent criminal with a psychiatric problem. The last time he got out of prison, he is alleged to have stabbed his mother with a kitchen knife.

But, this summer, until the day Shriver allegedly lost control and attacked his mother, he had a job caring for patients in a Twin Falls nursing home.

Maybe you were shocked to read that fact in the newspaper earlier this week. But it really isn't so surprising.

Shriver's story is one of the repeated tragedies of a society that does a poor job of facing some of its responsibilities. Specifically, our responsibilities toward two groups: the infirm elderly and the chronically criminal.

When Shriver left prison in July, he didn't have a lot of career options. At 25, he had spent his whole adult life in prison on assault traps. Should he become a Wall Street trader? Apply to law school?

He ended up working the graveyard shift at West Magic Care Center. He changed bedpans. He fetched prune juice. He helped the patients roll over.

Not the most pleasant work, and not the best pay.

But for Shriver and the other ex-cons working in nursing homes, it was a step toward returning to respectable life.

The families whose uncles and grandmothers are patients at West Magic probably would have been alarmed to know who was working that night shift.

It should be a surprise? Even as backbreaking as the cost of nursing care may seem to a family, and even with all the tax dollars this country pumps into Medicare, nursing homes

can't afford Harvard graduates. Most nursing homes do a reasonably good job of caring for their patients. But we're kidding ourselves if we think our elderly receive anything close to the best care possible.

Instead, economic realities dictate that "reasonably good" is often the best they can hope for. Most of us try not to think about that.

We also try not to think about the people coming out of our prisons.

Lots of people would prefer to lock criminals up forever, but of course that's neither humane nor practical. So we parole them.

We give them at least nominal supervision, and we hope they'll find honest ways to support themselves. Some land in nursing home jobs.

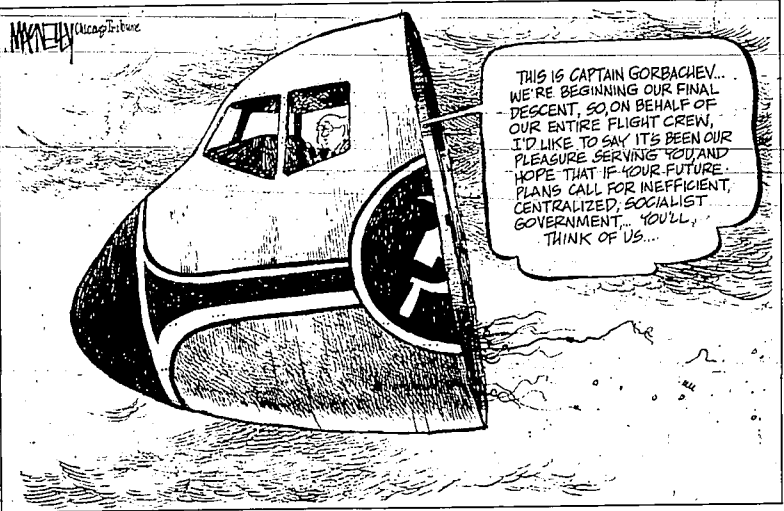
People who know say parolees often do well in those jobs. They work dutifully, and the chance to serve other people may help them turn their lives around.

Clearly, the system goofed in Shriver's case. He was too violent, and too disturbed to be put in a position of trust with elderly invalids. Both his employer and state parole officials failed in their responsibilities.

But what of the three non-violent offenders who reportedly work at the same home? What of the other ex-cons who work at other nursing homes in America, and those who work in countless other jobs where their presence might alarm as law-abiding folks as we know?

Fact is, we have to fit them into society somehow. And someone has to change those bedpans.

As long as we're unwilling to spend big money on rehabilitation and education, and as long as we're unwilling to sink many millions into caring for our elderly ex-cons on the night shift may be just one more worrisome aspect of growing old.

Initiative faces newspaper bias

Despite the majority of newspapers with the blasting editorials and biased news pages against the 1 percent initiative, nine out of 10 people polled at the Eastern Idaho Fair in Blackfoot are for the 1 percent initiative. The public wants this important vote on the ballot next year.

We voted in the 1 percent in 1978 and the legislators took it out against the will of the people. Our county commissioners can now raise our property taxes with no limit and we have no say-so.

The 1 percent initiative is important to every taxpayer in Idaho, including renters. Landlords pass their property tax increases on to rent.

Surprisingly, broadcast media has presented both viewpoints while newspapers have been prejudiced. The print media has refused to run many stories and letters to the editor in favor of the 1 percent and, in many cases, slanted the news.

If a favorable 1 percent story gets in the papers, it's several days after appearing on TV or radio and usually buried in the gutter of the last news page. All opposition stories are on prime news pages.

Students, don't overlook small, intimate colleges

During my senior year in high school, people kept asking me which college I planned to attend. University of California? Stanford? Harvard? Yale? Princeton? Sincerely, I had applied to Brown and Duke.

But my answer always evoked a little surprise. "Carleton?" they would ask, looking confused. "Where's that?"

"Minnesota."

Since Carleton is not a brand-name school, my inquirers wanted to know if it was any good. I assured them that Carleton's record is outstanding, its programs wonderful, its departments fantastic, its teachers superb and its atmosphere friendly.

"That didn't, however, ease their disappointment. They apparently expected me to be going to a big-name institution.

Many high-school seniors have discovered the values of a liberal-arts education. Early in my search for a suitable college, I was drawn to such schools as Antelope, Western State, and the University of Kansas and Carleton when I discovered that there is little at an Ivy League school or a state-run university that can't be found at these smaller schools.

The facilities may be better, the libraries bigger and the prestige higher at some of the large institutions. But small liberal-arts colleges offer the student the invaluable benefit of a personal, individual education.

When I visited the smaller campuses, I noticed a sense of family and community pervading them. In contrast, when I walk across the UCLA campus to the library, I always feel alone. How could I spend four years at a place that made me feel insignificant and isolated?

One of my high-school teachers, who also teaches at UCLA, told me that if I attended a large school like UCLA, I would have to fight to be known, to avoid remaining just a number and a seat assignment. Others who had attended large schools told me similar stories.

I soon discovered that in the larger

universities and colleges, the individual is almost non-existent. Class size may reach 200 students; professors are rarely accessible; phone numbers, you really must fight to assert your individuality.

That is why I found the small liberal-arts colleges so attractive. None had more than 3,000 students. With fewer students in a class, the lecture is replaced by personal interaction between students and teachers.

Another advantage of small liberal-arts colleges is that teaching is the main concern of the professors. It's hard for me to imagine taking classes from professors who do not care whether their students pass or fail, because securing tenure is their priority.

But in a college like Carleton, professors do care. When things go wrong, or you find yourself in academic trouble, you cannot simply "hide in a corner and hope no one notices you. The individual's education is what matters at these institutions, and the system will seek you out and help you. To the school, you are not just a number. You are not just a student. You are an individual.

I spent my six years of junior high and high school in a caring academic environment. I would not leave that warmth behind to go to a large, ice-cold university where I do not matter as a person.

It makes no difference to me whether the college I attend has a big name that my parents can use to impress their friends.

I am not going to college for my parents' sake or for my grandparents' sake—but for my sake. My undergraduate education should be for years of education and social discovery, not four years of battle for recognition.

Environmentalist disputes cleanup progress

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An environmental activist is taking issue with the state and federal governments' positive assessment of the initial progress on cleaning up nuclear waste at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The Energy Department, Environmental Protection Agency and the state maintain they are ahead of schedule in the early phases of the cleanup project that is expected to take 30 years and cost as much as \$2 billion.

But Beatrice Brainsford of the Snake River Alliance claims the agencies are doing their easiest work first and delaying the tougher, high-priority cleanup jobs.

The cleanup project is being outlined in a series of hearings across the state that opened Wednesday in Idaho Falls and continued Thursday in Pocatello. The plan should be finalized by December.

"We collectively think we have a

good product here," said Jerry Lyle, the Energy Department's director of environmental restoration for Idaho.

The plan would give the agencies the next 10 years to determine just what needs to be cleaned up at INEL and how to do it.

But several restoration projects are already under way on a waste ditch at the Naval Reactors Facility, a waste pond at the Test Reactor Area and a pad of plutonium-contaminated waste at the Radioactive Waste Management Complex.

When the work begins in earnest, hundreds of old contaminated sites could be involved.

The proposal specifically allows EPA and the state to review the Energy Department's budgets before they are sent to Washington, D.C.

Wayne Pierre of the EPA's office in Seattle.

It will still be up to the White House to set the cleanup budgets with advice from the Energy Department. And while the agreement would allow the department to blame delays in cleanup on a lack of money, the state and EPA would have to agree on any delays in the work.

"Extensions will not be granted without good cause," Pierre said.

The state Department of Health and Welfare will take written comments on the plan until Oct. 8, 60 days before the three agencies hope to sign a cleanup agreement. So far, it has rejected the Snake River Alliance's request to extend that deadline another 30 days.

Hayden named to corrections post

BOISE — Boise businessman John Hayden has been appointed to the state Board of Corrections in a move Gov. Cecil Andrus indicated would further bolster the panel's ability to match prison system needs with available financial resources.

John Hayden is a successful businessman, who understands the importance of the Board of Corrections' fiscal responsibility," Andrus said on Thursday in announcing the appointment. "He is committed to responsible protection of society from those members who have no respect for the rights of their fellow man."

Hayden, 49, owner of Hayden Beverage Co., replaces Phil Presnell, who resigned after moving out of the state from Lewiston. The appointment, running through 1992, must be confirmed this winter by the state Senate.

Fisherman's suit dropped by judge

LAPWAI — An Indian fisherman's lawsuit against the Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee has been dismissed by tribal judge David Bunga.

The suit, filed in July by tribal member Jesse Greene, alleged that Nez Perce officials failed to protect treaty fishing rights when they closed a chinook salmon season on the Rapid River south of Riggin.

Among other things, Greene alleged that tribal leaders' action helped fuel "cultural genocide" against the Nez Perce.

Greene, who was the only plaintiff in the suit and represented himself, was asking for an undetermined amount of money to pay for his expenses in traveling to the Rapid River to fish. He said he went to the river expecting to fish, only to find the season had been closed.

Marsing residents install water filters

MARSING — The state has recommended that residents install a high-quality filter to remove arsenic from water after tests near Marsing showed 12 of 24 private wells contained levels at or slightly above the federal standard.

Tests were conducted recently after retired farmer Lawrence Knighten's toes went numb last year. A neurologist told him he had too much arsenic in his body and his numbness could be a symptom of poisoning.

Knighten, 80, tested the drinking water from his deep well and discovered it contained arsenic levels slightly above federal drinking water standards.

Tests showed .08 and .09 milligrams per liter, compared to the federal standard of .05 milligrams per liter.

Pocatello delays parking ban decision

POCATELLO — The Pocatello City Council has delayed a plan to ban parking and throwing candy at parades, but parking restrictions could be imposed next year.

The decision to delay action came in the wake of a discovery that there were only two parades left this year: the Kids' Day parade later this month and the Idaho State University homecoming parade next month.

Councilman Greg Anderson proposed the ban as a means of improving safety at parades. A Pocatello child was injured while chasing candy at a parade earlier this year. But he said Thursday if some sort of parking restriction can be drafted, he won't push a ban on throwing candy.

Eastern Idaho hit by power outage

IDAHO FALLS — Power line problems shut down a coal-fired generating plant in western Wyoming early Thursday, causing a brief power failure throughout much of eastern Idaho.

The Utah Power and Light Co. service area from Blackfoot to Ashton was without power for 15 to 30 minutes, spokesman Dave Eskelsen said. Southwest Wyoming and Bonneville Power Administration customers in the Idaho Falls area were also affected.

Power lines were grounded in eastern Idaho, Eskelsen said, and that placed so much voltage on other lines going to the Jim Bridger generating facility in Rock Springs, Wyo., that it shut down.

Campbell pleads guilty to sex charge

BOISE — Former Meridian high school teacher Daniel Campbell has pleaded guilty to a third sex charge involving young girls, even though his attorney maintains he is innocent of the charge.

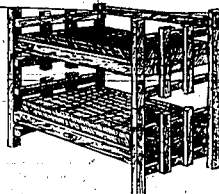

Environmentalists might pull out of negotiations

TWIN FALLS. — Environmentalists have threatened to give up on mediated Idaho wilderness negotiations by the end of September unless livestock interests advance a "realistic" proposal.

In a letter to the Mediation Institute, which is overseeing the talks, the Wilderness Society, Idaho Conservation League and Sierra Club also accused farmers and ranchers of dragging their feet.

"We are quite frustrated that one interest group with a debatable role in this process is holding negotiations hostage in southern Idaho," said the letter, dated Tuesday.

In response, Idaho Farm Bureau and Idaho Cattle Association officials criticized environmentalists, saying they want to set the terms of the wilderness negotiations.

Supporters of adding to Idaho's wilderness system have

blamed mediators and livestock interests in the past for stalling negotiations.

"I think they're looking for a way out, and they're trying to pin the blame on livestock interests. It's not fair and it's not right," said Betty Munis, Idaho Cattle Association executive vice president.

"They're trying to intimidate or impugn us a little," Idaho Farm Bureau spokesman Jim Yost added. "Sometimes when the game doesn't go your way, you have to strike out at somebody."

But Yost and Munis agreed that the livestock industry has been slow to craft a wilderness proposal.

"It has taken us longer than we thought to pull this together," Munis said. "But it's a whole new ball game for us."

Yost and Munis said the livestock industry has prepared a specific wilderness proposal, but won't unveil it unless

environmentalists guarantee that livestock grazing will continue in newly designated wilderness areas.

Such a guarantee should be incorporated into an Idaho wilderness bill, they said.

In their letter, environmentalists said the livestock proposal will not be realistic unless it exceeds a U.S. Forest Service recommendation for protecting about 1 million of the 9 million roadless acres being considered.

"Yost said the proposal exceeds the agency's in some places and is smaller in others."

About 10 Idaho interest groups have met twice this year — without success — to negotiate a wilderness compromise involving 10 national forests. The Seattle-based Mediation Institute is being paid \$300,000 by the state to coordinate development of a plan by the end of the year.

Idaho environmentalists support adding about 3.9 million acres to Idaho's wilderness system, which at 4 million acres already is larger than any state's but Alaska and California.

Twin Falls commission approves hydro project

TWIN FALLS. — Cogeneration Inc. can build its hydroelectric project on Augur Falls in the Snake River if the Army Corps of Engineers approves.

The Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission granted a conditional use permit Thursday night, almost 10 years after the idea was born.

The Corps of Engineers still must issue a permit to build the project in the river, but that's the final hurdle before construction can begin.

In approving the conditional use permit, planning commission members said Cogeneration, a Twin Falls-based hydro development firm, must provide public access to the canyon as part of the finished project.

Only one member of the commission

Steve Koopman of Twin Falls, voted against the project. Koopman wanted Cogeneration Inc. to follow new methods in determining minimum stream flows.

"I'm surprised no one else on the board is concerned with minimum stream flows," he said as the commission prepared to vote.

But other commission members said basing the vote on stream flows would exceed the board's authority. Basing the vote on an easement dispute between Cogeneration Inc. and two canyon landowners also was beside the point, commission members said.

Lawyers representing Cogeneration Inc. and the owners of 20 acres near the proposed project talked to the board. Both men agreed that an easement for public access to the canyon was a major block to reaching an agreement.

Former Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones asked the board to delay the vote so both sides could talk things over.

"I can't see why there wouldn't be a possibility of accommodating everyone's interests," Jones said. He suggested the possibility of using a Bureau of Land Management road on the north side of the canyon.

His clients, Joe Shelton and Bill Mason, do not like the idea of Cogeneration Inc. granting public access on a road that runs through their land. Last month, they talked the commission into delaying a vote on the permit so the two sides could talk.

Mason said the talks did not go well. He and Shelton wanted to know where a parking lot would go and where the diversion dam would sit in the river. But they could not find that out in the past week.

Blaine County schools call bond issue election

HAILEY. — A \$12.5 million bond issue election to build a new middle school is off at least for now.

The Blaine County School District had planned to ask voters on Sept. 24 to approve the money for a new facility for

sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders and to renovate other schools in the county.

Negotiations between the school district and Elliot Caplow, owner of a piece of land in Hailey's Northridge subdivision that the district wanted for the school, were not completed in time for the required three-week publishing of the notice of election.

Kathy Zaccardi, clerk of the Blaine County School Board, said the trustees were still hoping for resolution of the land issue, in time for a bond election later this fall.

Caplow is asking the city of Hailey to rezone other land in the same subdivision before the sale to the school district is complete.

Politics clash with state's commitment to salmon plan

BOISE. — Idaho interests facing the biggest waves should Northwest salmon runs be formally designated as endangered seem to be working through their difficulties with a plan to save the fish.

But while farmers and ranchers, power utilities and industry, conservationists and resource developers are coalescing behind the so-called "Idaho plan" to rebuild the runs, a political conflict is threatening the chances for their success.

Next spring, the Northwest will hear whether the Snake River sockeye is added to the federal endangered list and the chinook runs gain threatened designations.

The fear in the region is that altered operations of the Snake and Columbia rivers and the economic shock wave that would follow will make the upheaval created by the



designations of the spotted owl as endangered pale in comparison.

In March, Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus presented the Idaho plan to Oregon Sen. Mark Hatfield's Salmon Summit, a failed end run around the federal listings. Andrus wants to draw down four Lower Snake River reservoirs in this spring to speed the current through the waterways when the young salmon smolts are making their way to the sea.

Republican Sen. Larry Craig got into the debate last week, convening his own salmon forum, he said, to build upon Andrus' drawdown scheme.

But the Democratic governor had fiery words for Craig, warning those at the forum that the senator was doing little more than showing "a think in our collective armor" to

down-river interests opposed to his plan.

Craig contended the Idaho plan isn't the governor's but all of Idaho's. And he puts the current process of bargaining the smolts around the dams high on the recovery list along with limiting downstream salmon harvests and improving hatchery operations by forging a partnership between public agencies and aquaculture companies.

"There is no guarantee that an annual 60-day drawdown will solve the problem," Craig said. "On the contrary, the drawdowns themselves may well be detrimental to the fish, will damage communities relying on river transportation and cause a host of other problems."

But aside from the friction between Andrus and Craig, the forum had a decidedly "us against them" tone toward BPA, the Army Corps of Engineers, which operates the dams, and the state of Oregon and Washington.

And now Andrus has picked up a major ally from downstream. Washington Gov. Booth Gardner said he

Enrollment questions in Jerome

JEROME. — Student enrollment in the Jerome School District has been higher in some grades and lower than expected in others.

All in all, the figures have officials trying to determine the reasons behind the changes.

Based on the previous year's enrollment, the district had projected a total of 195 students in the kindergarten.

Yet this year, 160 kindergarten children showed up, for a loss of 35, said Mike Gibson, school business manager.

Last year's enrollment totaled 209 students, he said. New private kindergarten schools opening up this year could account for some of the reduction, Gibson guessed.

However, the new Canyonside pre-school and kindergarten school has 5 kindergarten students, with none enrolled at the new Liberty Christian Academy nor the First Baptist Church day care center in Jerome.

Still, a drop of 35 kindergarten students will not make an additional classroom available to help with the overcrowded elementary classrooms, Gibson said.

He added it will help reduce class sizes and meet the state minimum ratio of 20 students per teacher.

At the Jerome High School, 80 students have enrolled as of this week with more coming in every day, according to Principal Carl Matthews.

The total is 161 students more than were in the Jerome High School at the end of last year. The District had projected an enrollment of 724 based on eighth grade graduates and prior year statistics, Gibson said. In looking at the number of eighth grade students graduating into the ninth grade, 41 additional ninth graders showed up for class than the number graduating from eighth grade last spring.

Gibson and Matthews agreed quality education could have contributed to the sharp increase.

"We try hard to make each kid feel he or she is important and I think the kids appreciate that," Matthews said. "Also, the district has poured a lot of money and time in improving the appearance of the school. There have been additional training classes have been an added incentive for students desiring to prepare for a career or to get a head start on college courses to enroll, officials added.

In the vocational department, taught by Terry Adams, 110 students have enrolled as compared with 78 last year. Sixty-four of the students attend the high technology courses being taught for the first time this year, Matthews said.

A lot of former drop-outs are back in school this year, he noted.

Enrollment in the elementary grades remained at about the level projected, Gibson said.

Since last year, enrollment increased 13 students for a total of 1,844.

The new Jerome School had 8 more students than the spring enrollment figures. Seventh and eighth grades are down 15 students from what the District had projected.

It's too early to calculate these figures and know the net effect on state funding," Gibson said.

Public will voice opinions Tuesday on INEL

TWIN FALLS — Since 1972, the federal Energy Department has been promising Idaho it would clean up waste buried at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.
Not a barrel has been removed.
Two years ago the Environmental Protection Agency listed INEL as a federal Superfund site for toxic cleanup under the watchful eyes of that agency and state officials.
Now, after two years of negotiations, the department, the EPA and Idaho have agreed on a cleanup plan — mandated by the Superfund law.
But before the agencies sign that agreement, the public will have a say. A public hearing is scheduled in Twin Falls on Tuesday at the Canyon Springs Inn.
Nearly 400 waste sites from more than 40 years of operations as a nuclear research and disposal site have been identified at INEL. One of those sites is the place where the government built the long-lived radioactive wastes from a federal

weapons production plant in Colorado from 1952 to 1970.
That buried waste includes more than 2 million cubic feet of waste contaminated with plutonium, which has leaked into the ground below the burial site.
Hearings on the agreement also are scheduled in Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Boise and Moscow.
Critics contend the agreement, hatched in a series of behind-the-scenes meetings, is too confusing and complex for the public to comprehend in the short time allowed.
"A workshop a couple of hours before a hearing and a citizens' guide a day before the hearing are valueless," said Beatrice Brailsford of the Snake River Alliance, a state-wide group promoting nuclear disarmament and responsible waste cleanup.
"The group has asked the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare to extend the comment period 30 days."
"We're not the only people confused in Idaho," Brailsford said.
Officials from the state, the EPA and the Energy Department, which operates the INEL

site, will be on hand at workshops to answer questions and help explain the cleanup agreement from 3 to 4:30 p.m. and from 6 to 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday.
Public participation and a good, workable agreement are vital to any effective cleanup program at INEL, Brailsford said.
"The public has a right to know what's going on and arguments later on," she said. A bad agreement will mean a fight at every step of the process, she said.
The biggest stumbling block is that the department can't be made to obey the law, despite all assurances, she said.
The Superfund law requires federal agencies to cooperate on cleanup of hazardous waste sites.
A federal facility agreement among the department, the EPA and the state establishes respective responsibilities and is meant to insure that the department complies with all state and federal environmental laws.
The Superfund law also requires the public be informed and involved in the cleanup decision making process.

Study indicates mining debris has killed lake organisms

POST FALLS (AP) — Mining wastes settling in Lake Coeur d'Alene over a century of Silver Vein mining have killed almost all bottom-dwelling organisms in two-thirds of the lake, a scientist says.
"The metals concentrations in the northern part of the lake are high enough to kill off all the organisms at the bottom of the lake," Paul Woods of the U.S. Geological Survey told members of the Spokane River Association.
"That is not good," he said. Heavy metal concentrations in the lake were found around Tubbs Hill, whose coves are popular swimming areas, and several bays in the lake's northern reaches.
The finding is part of an ongoing \$1.36 million study of pollution at the lake. It's producing direct

evidence of the effect of decades of pollution from mining.
Since mining began more than a century ago, the Coeur d'Alene River has carried tons of lead, zinc and other heavy metals from mines into the lake. Woods' finding comes as federal, state and local agencies are showing new concern for the contamination.
On Tuesday, the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality launched a study to determine the long-term effects mining wastes have had on

concern, but the question has been raised so much in the last year, we decided we should find out."
High concentrations of lead and other heavy metals can be toxic to fish, wild animals and humans.
The metals can be particularly dangerous to young children, who can suffer neurological disorders.
Wells could have become contaminated as heavy metals leached through the soil into underground water, Tanner said. If analysis shows the wells are contaminated, residents would be instructed to drill deeper or find another source of drinking water.
The Geological Survey's study is more sophisticated. It involves lake-bed borings, computer models and satellite surveys.
Woods said the study is progressing well.

WIPP has enough containers for test phase waste

CARLSBAD, N.M. (AP) — The Waste Isolation Pilot Plant has accepted delivery of all the containers necessary to haul radioactive waste for tests at the facility, another step on the road to opening the repository.
Lamar Trego, general manager of the Westinghouse Waste Isolation Division, said Thursday that Westinghouse completed all quality

assurance reviews earlier in the week. Westinghouse is the management contractor for the repository.
Trego said 15 of the hauling casks, officially known as TRUPACT-2, were turned over to WIPP by the cask's manufacturer, Nuclear Packaging Inc.
The casks will be used to transport waste from the Idaho National

Engineering Laboratory to the southeastern New Mexico dump site first for testing the dump and then for permanent disposal there. Some 2 million cubic feet of low-level nuclear and transuranic waste is currently being temporarily stored at the eastern Idaho complex.
The Nuclear Regulatory Commission certified the double-walled, stainless steel TRUPACT-2

unveil a plan at the Northwest Power Planning Council meeting, that opens Tuesday in Coeur d'Alene, which closely mirrors Andrus'.
Gardner said the failure of regional projects to back dramatic spring drawdowns on two of the Lower Snake River dams is one of the ideas really works.
The eight federal main-stem dams are the most of the cheapest electricity in the nation, but the concrete barriers eventually choked off the salmon and steelhead. Under an endangered species designation, the dams would be operated to let the fish to the ocean and back to their Idaho spawning beds.
Industry depends on the dams for power and the calm reservoirs to move large loads of grain and wood products from Lewiston to Portland.
Andrus' plan, barge traffic would halt for weeks in the spring and the reservoirs would be too low for power generation.

AMA urged to oppose nuclear dump site

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Nevada doctors are seeking the support of the American Medical Association for a resolution opposing federal efforts to locate a high-level nuclear waste dump at Yucca Mountain.

The Nevada State Medical Association recently approved the resolution, which will be presented to the AMA when it meets Dec. 7-11 in Las Vegas.

"The health and safety of our patients could be dramatically effected by this outcome of this process to deal with the very real issue of nuclear wastes," said Dr. Heather J. Allen, association president.

"We believe the AMA, as the most important voice of organized medicine, should take a stand

on this matter. It's too important to be left to the bureaucrats, politicians or the engineers."

The resolution condemns the Department of Energy's targeting of Yucca Mountain as being politically motivated without regard for public safety or scientific findings.

"The selection of Yucca Mountain as the only site to be investigated as a location for the proposed nuclear waste repository reflects a political, rather than a scientific, choice and (is) being pursued with federal disregard for the integrity of states and the health of Americans," the resolution says.

"The manner in which the problem of high-level nuclear waste disposal is being handled in the United States may result in serious health,

safety and environmental impact with unforeseen, long-term consequences to the health of Americans."

The resolution calls on the DOE and Congress "to cease its dangerous efforts" at Yucca Mountain and to halt a site-selection process which is "scientifically indefensible and assures maximum safeguards of the public health and safety."

Congress singled out Nevada as the lone contender to house the repository in 1989.

The state has been fighting an uphill battle against the DOE and attempts by lawmakers outside Nevada to speed up the project at a site 100 miles northwest of the Las Vegas gaming mecca.

Idahoan has his doubts about Clifford's testimony

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fedisman Rep. Larry LaRocco, D-Idaho, has serious reservations about the "story" told by top Washington banker Clark Clifford to the House Banking Committee.

"Plausible," LaRocco said Thursday. "But whether it was possible is another question." LaRocco and other committee members spent nine hours on Wednesday grilling Clifford, described by some as the ultimate Washington insider, and lawyer Robert Altman about their connections with the foreign-owned Bank of Commerce and Credit International.

Lawmakers told Clifford they found it hard to believe he didn't know that the foreign-owned bank had exercised illicit control over the big U.S. bank he headed, BECI — founded by Pakistanis,

owned by Persian Gulf investors and based in Luxembourg — is at the center of a global scandal involving alleged massive fraud, laundering of drug money and support of terrorists.

"The hearings raised more questions than it answered," LaRocco said. "I have to say that we didn't get the answers from these two people."

"He called Clifford, who served as advisor to nine presidents, a 'real public servant' for this country."

"We need to determine what they knew, and when they knew about it," LaRocco said.

"They made a very sophisticated defense, well-orchestrated throughout the nine hours of hearings, but it left everybody, including me, scratching their heads."

Jail term nabs youth in Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — An 18-year-old who led a group of youths in burning a cross at the home of a black family in suburban Bothell has been sentenced to 90 days in jail.

"It was a dumb, stupid act. There was no justification for it," King County Superior Court Judge Ljem Tuai said in sentencing Brian Thomas Cole on a conviction of malicious harassment.

Tuai converted 30 days of the sentence to community service. Prosecutors had asked for a nine-month sentence.

But Tuai granted a "first-offender waiver" that allowed him to keep the sentence at the low end of the sentencing range.

"There's a chance for this young man to be a person who can contribute to society," the judge said during Wednesday's hearing. Tuai, of Chinese ancestry, said he has been subject to discrimination but would not allow his personal feelings to interfere in sentencing.

Cole, who with several others set the cross on fire on April 16 on the lawn of Leonard and Jean Elton, sentenced once again after sentencing.

"I deserve the punishment I was given," said the recent Woodinville High School graduate.

Elton said he favored a longer jail sentence but understood the judge's reasoning in limiting the term.

Seminar aims at women in high office

BOISE (AP) — The YWCA is bringing two nationally recognized political consultants to Boise to teach Idaho women how to run for high office.

Idaho has a higher proportion of women legislators than most states — about 28 percent — but women still only rarely win top statewide and federal offices.

"Men tend to roll over and say to their wives, 'Oh, I think I'll run for Congress today,'" Daryl Glenney, a consultant with a bipartisan Washington, D.C., training firm and one of those conducting the seminar, said Wednesday.

"Women tend to think, 'OK, now, in a lawyer, I'm involved in all these community organizations, I know about all these issues, so maybe in 10 years, when I'm perfect, I can run for Congress.'"

own preparedness, knowing that they can catch up as easily as men can," Glenney said.

Carol Whitney, Glenney's partner in The Woman's Edge, also will conduct the sessions Friday and Saturday. She also is a former director of field operations for the Republican National Committee.

"We're getting more and more women interested in actively considering running for office," Whitney said. "Change isn't going to happen unless we do it ourselves."

The workshop is one of seven sponsored this year by the YWCA Institute for Public Leadership. It includes separate tracks for those considering running for office and those interested in managing campaigns.

Glenney, a former deputy director of Voter Registration for the Democratic National Committee, said the seminar can help women make the step from the Legislature to statewide or federal office. Only one woman in Idaho history, Gracie Pflot, has been elected to Congress. Pflot represented the 1st District from 1953 to 1963. No woman has been U.S. senator, governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general or secretary of state. Several have been school superintendent and treasurer.

Since 1986, three women have run for governor, lieutenant governor and Congress — all lost.

'Death with dignity' issue addressed

SEATTLE (AP) — A measure that would permit doctors to help end a terminally ill person's life amounts to barbaric "contractual killing of one person by another," a leading opponent of Initiative 119 said Thursday.

But a chief architect of the proposal said terminally ill people are only asking for freedom of choice.

Dr. Peter McGough, chairman of the advisory committee of the Washington Physicians Against I-119, and the Rev. Ralph Mero, president of the Washington State Fellowship Society, debated the issue at a luncheon forum sponsored by CityClub, a civic organization.

Initiative 119 would expand the state's 1979 Natural Death Act, which allows individuals to draw up a "living will" instructing doctors to withhold life-support should they become terminally ill.

Initiative 119, often referred to as

the "Death With Dignity" initiative, would:

- Specify that "terminal condition" includes patients in irreversible coma or vegetative state;
- List artificial feeding and hydration as life-sustaining procedures that could be withdrawn or refused;
- Allow mentally competent people who are terminally ill to ask their doctors to help end their lives.

It is the latter "aid in dying" aspect that has split camps and caused a furor in the medical community and elsewhere.

If the initiative is passed by voters on Nov. 5, Washington would become the first state in which active euthanasia would be legal and provided by doctors.

Physician-assisted euthanasia is not legal anywhere in the world at present, McGough and Mero agreed.

McGough, a family physician,

argued that the initiative does not provide for independent oversight or safeguards against abuse.

"Everyone wants death with dignity," he said. "The key issue is whether Washington state is prepared to legalize something we have not seen since the 10th century — private, contractual killing of one person by another."

McGough said Initiative 119 wrongly assumes that people have "all the reasonable alternatives for care available in a given and they are merely choosing the ones they wish the most."

He said millions of Americans don't have health insurance or are underinsured.

Sportsman's coalition appeals timber sale

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Sportsman's Coalition has appealed a timber sale on Cuddy Mountain near Teton Canyon, charging the Forest Service is selling off some of the best wildlife habitat in the state.

The group filed an administrative appeal to stop the harvest of nearly 10 million board feet of timber in two pristine basins of the mountain. The project would involve building 21 miles of logging routes into the roadless area.

"The Forest Service has demonstrated once again their determination to sell off to their masters in the giant timber corporations the public forest recreation lands of Idaho," said Ron

Mitchell, coalition executive director, on Thursday.

Evergreen Lumber Co., of New Meadows and Boise Cascade Corp. are eyeing the Grade-Dukes sale approved by the Payette National Forest. In a time of tight timber supplies, Boise Cascade officials say that sale could keep the Council mill operating for nine months and employ 180 people for a year.

Mitchell said the Idaho Department of Fish and Game considers Cuddy Mountain as the best undeveloped wildlife habitat and hunting area in southwestern Idaho. Its elk herd has a ratio of 14 bulls per 100 cows; the roadless feature maintains that healthy split.

Zoning commission denies permit for center locale

AMERICAN FALLS (AP) — The city's Planning and Zoning Commission has rejected a request from the Mormon Church to construct a religious education center in a residential area across the street from the high school.

Clara Johnson, the lawyer representing the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, said the decision will be appealed to the city council.

"All I will say is there does not appear to be any legal or factual basis to deny this permit," Johnson said, refusing to characterize the commission's action as religiously motivated.

The decision Wednesday night was a complete reversal of the commission's position in July when it approved a conditional use permit authorizing construction of the seminary. That permit was later revoked because of a technical error in the regulations.

American Falls is the only southeastern Idaho community without a seminary near the high school. Under state law, students can be released from school for an hour a day for religious training.

But commissioners Marj Linscheid and Rick Volkweiler agreed with the critics that there is insufficient off-street parking in the seminary plans.

"We could be setting a precedent to allow other buildings in without adequate off-street parking if we pass this," Linscheid said. "We already have a parking problem all over American Falls as it is. We don't need to compound it."

Other commissioners also raised questions about whether the center would actually be used in view of a change in the state law permitting students to be released from school each day.

Two motions to approve the plan failed, and the case was set for a public hearing on Sept. 14.

Commissioner Steve Kautzman finally broke the tie by joining opponents of the plan.

"I think this was the right decision, and my critics are happy with the result," said attorney John Ingelstrom, who represented critics of the center. "I think it is a good example of the democratic process at work."

Supremacist pamphlet outlines requirements

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — To become an "Aryan Warrior," a white supremacist must kill 1,000 Jews, three reporters or a politician, according to a pamphlet obtained in northern Idaho and presented to a human-rights inquiry here.

An "ordinary Jew" is worth one-thousandth of a point, a journalist one-third of a point, and senior politicians one point. It takes a full point to reach the top Warrior level, according to the booklet written by Texas Ku Klux Klan member Louis Beam titled "Understanding The Struggle (Or Why We Have to Kill the Bastards)."

The booklet was studied in a documentary film shown at the inquiry being conducted by the Alberta Human Rights Commission. The commission is investigating complaints about a white-supremacist rally held a year ago near Provost, about 150 miles southeast of Edmonton.

Calgary, Alberta, filmmaker Lawrence Ryckman testified he picked up a copy of the booklet in 1983 while shooting his documentary "The Aryan Nation" at the group's compound outside Hayden Lake, Idaho.

Present Canadian Aryan Nations leader Terry Long was appointed an Aryan Warrior Priest in 1984 by Idaho-based international leader Richard Butler, with orders to set up a compound for whites in Alberta, Ryckman testified.

Long was not specified what Long had done to win the appointment.

Long, the Aryan Nations church and Ray Bradley, owner of the property where the rally was held, are accused of breaching Canada's Individual's Rights Protection Act by publicly displaying signs or symbols discriminating against a person or group.

The inquiry attorney argued against admitting parts of the film as evidence, but Robert Abells, an attorney for the Canadian Jewish Congress, said the film was important.

"These signs and symbols and the context in which they are displayed are a call for white Americans to rise up to create a racial nation, to exclude blacks, to exclude Jews," Abells said.

Abells clashed with Long at one point after refusing to call Butler a pastor.

Book tells lives, times of Magic Valley people

TWIN FALLS — Jimmy Yamamoto slipped from a ship in the dead of night to enter America in 1915. Clara Brose welcomed pioneers traveling the Oregon Trail at her parents' ranch. Kate Knight was working in her hilltop antique shop at age 90.

What do these people have in common? They and 39 others like them fill the pages of Lorayne Orton Smith's first book, "Zest for Living."

Smith compiled the profiles of Southern Idaho senior citizens from "The Elders," her weekly column which appeared in *The Times-News* between 1978 and 1986.

"People have always encouraged me to put my columns into a book," said Smith, 66, who retired from the newspaper two years ago and decided to do just that. Smith had to select her profiles from over 400 people interviewed during an 8-year period of time. No small task. She tried to choose particularly interesting people, she said, and people who represent areas throughout the Magic Valley. "A cousin's wife in Maryland offered to do the computer work for the book. So Smith spent much of the past year shuttling copy back and forth between Idaho and Maryland.

Now that the book is complete, with a design of the Perrine Memorial Bridge on the cover, Smith will market it through senior centers and by arranging speaking engagements.

"I feel the people in the book show us how to age gracefully and live successfully in our later years," Smith said. "And, with our growing elderly population, I think they can become important role models for us."

Smith expects her book to have regional appeal from a historical standpoint, though

the individuals who are profiled, some of whom are still living, would provide interesting reading for anyone. Take Phomia Sliman, for example. She came to America from Syria facing a language barrier and eating nothing but bananas for five days. Many years passed before Sliman could look at a banana again.

Much different from the tale of Stella Perrine Haight, daughter of I. B. Perrine, the moving force behind the development of the Twin Falls tract. Haight recalled a storybook childhood, accompanying her father on business trips to Chicago and being deposited in the Marshall Field's toy department at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel. Smith writes about farmers and mechanics, drummers and actors, always shining a light on the ties that bind them together — optimism and zest.

Her own inspiration for the book, she said, was her father, who remained active running his lawn mowing business in Minneapolis through his 95th birthday.

Smith grew up in Minnesota and attended Hamline University in St. Paul. She joined the staff of *The Times-News* in 1945 and spent most of her 44-year career at the newspaper, serving as a reporter and a regional and features editor.

music at the Berkeley Jazz Conservatory and at Boston University.

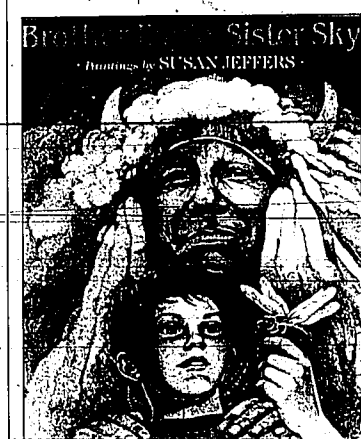
Drummer John Ditrlich came from New York as an accomplished jazz drummer and was hired in Nashville by Little Jimmy Dickens.

Illustrator to autograph 'Brother Eagle, Sister Sky'



'Big Brother, Sister Sky' is the latest book by illustrator Susan Jeffers. The popular artist will talk about her experiences and autograph books at the library and a book store in Twin Falls September 20.

TWIN FALLS — "Brother Eagle, Sister Sky" is hot off the press, and its critically acclaimed illustrator is coming to town to talk about the book — and to autograph it.

Susan Jeffers has illustrated 20 popular children's books. She will share her experiences on Sept. 20, in two free programs at the Twin Falls Public Library. The programs are scheduled to run from 1:45 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. and 4 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Jeffers will end the afternoon at Judi's Book Store, where she will autograph any of her books, some of which are available in paperback from 5 p.m. until closing.

Jeffers said she is excited about "Brother Eagle, Sister Sky" because she has always been fascinated by the Native American culture.

"I think people are starting to acknowledge Native Americans and their relationship to the earth," she said. "I grew up loving the outdoors, with a mother who named all the animals and flowers."

Jeffers' book brings to life the moving words of the great American Indian Chief Seattle, spoken more than 100 years ago.

Today, Jeffers lives in what she terms a "beautiful area of Westchester County, N.Y., which we are always fighting to save." She lives amid the wildlife and nature with her husband, a conservation officer who shares her love of the environment, and their 11-year-old daughter.

Jeffers, 48, seldom strays far from her family, agreeing only to a limited number of book tours and seminars. She works in pen and ink and has, for the

past 20 years, practiced her craft only on the pages of children's books. "With children's book art, I can choose exactly what I love to draw," she said. "But I'm preparing for my golden years, when I will paint."

Actually, Jeffers has been "painting" since she was 4 years old. She knows, because her mother saved all her drawings. "My mother was an artist who encouraged my sister and me to use different mediums in our art," Jeffers said. "My father encouraged our creativity, too, through his interest in the dramatic arts." Jeffers explained that her father was a versatile performer who often entertained his children with bedtime stories interpreted in tap dance.

Jeffers eventually left her New Jersey home to attend Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, where she earned a degree in art, despite her ambivalence about it.

"If you are a brain surgeon, it's important to have a degree," she said. "For an artist, it is questionable."

After graduation, Jeffers worked for three publishing houses, where she gained a practical education in the book business.

Combining her interests in both art and literature, illustrating children's books was the logical next step.

Jeffers creates her drawings by making thousands of little lines with her pen. This looks hard, she admitted, but insisted it is actually the easiest and most relaxing part of her work.

"The most difficult part for me is telling the story with the right relationships of composition and character," she said. "This requires many, many little drawings and combinations until the drawing says what you want it to."

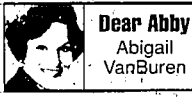

Judge settles ex-roadies versus Springsteen dispute

A seemingly modest lawsuit by two ex-roadies against rocker Bruce Springsteen dragged on for four expensive years, friends say, largely because Springsteen felt his honor had been challenged.

In the civil suit settled last week, ex-roadies Mike Batlan and Doug Sutphin claimed Springsteen failed to pay them overtime and fined them illegally.

Batlan also charged that when he was hired in 1973, Springsteen promised he would always pay Batlan almost as much as members of his band, but then reneged.

The fine claim was small and the overtime claim also turned out to be relatively modest.

After Springsteen's attorney Peter Parerher agreed that Bruce was bound by overtime laws, Batlan's and Sutphin's attorney, Stephen Schueler, estimated their claim at \$104,000.

The whole case, however, and Batlan's claim of a broken promise in particular, portrayed Springsteen as a hypocrite, talking about the working man while acting like a rich boss.

Bruce said he never made any such promise and declared "no retreat, no surrender," even when it cost millions in legal fees — far more than it would have cost to settle early.

"Challenge his word and Bruce gets his heels in," suggests Charles Cross, editor of the Springsteen

could get into "character issues" like his temper or treatment of employees and women.

Springsteen counter-claimed that Batlan had stolen tapes from him. He said in depositions that Batlan and Sutphin carried marijuana on tour, and that his manager wanted them fired.

The settlement, then, had advantages for both sides. It definitely pleased a third party, the courthouse staff in Freehold, N.J., where the trial would have begun Wednesday.

Threats had been received, so they were putting in metal detectors and sealing entrances.

Still, the settlement did not come easily. Stephen Hays, a Springsteen attorney, said Bruce had agreed to settle only after "there was no longer a matter of principle involved."

Specifically, Hays said Judge Pesko was prepared to accept Springsteen's version of his agreement with Batlan.

Even then, Springsteen's first settlement offer of \$250,000 was re-

jected, sources say, and the Newark Star-Ledger quoted a courthouse source as saying the final figure was \$350,000.

While Schueler characterized the settlement as "amicable," court papers suggest little else in the case was. The suit clearly infuriated the Springsteen organization, which considered the ex-roadies as first-class intruders.

In court arguments, Springsteen attorney Parerher quoted Springsteen: "It's like these guys had the best job in the business. We played four shows a week, tops. There's guys in Iron-Maidens — you're in a bus six nights, six days a week. Those guys don't see hotels. It's like I had the best, the fairest organization in the business."

Batlan and Sutphin agreed many roadies get bad deals, and said they despised their suit would force other musicians to treat roadies better.

Christo makes rules for giant sculptures

In Christoland, the countdown had reached Day 138.
That many days remained before the flowering at Garmisch, Calif., of the latest gigantic environmental sculpture by the artist Christo.

Toiling on it on a sunny Thursday not long ago were workers in offices, factories, classrooms, rice fields and on mountainsides.
They were in Tokyo, Toronto, San Diego, Ft. Worth, Bakersfield, the German city of Bayreuth, the little Japanese town of Hitachi-ota and on the Grapevine along Interstate 5 in Southern California.

Come October, Christo plans to adorn a 19-mile stretch there with 1,760 big yellow umbrellas. Each will be as tall as a two-story house, wider than a boxing ring, weighing in at 448 pounds. They will run single-file up mountainsides, cluster in fields and dominate small-town streets.
Simultaneously, a 12-by-14-mile area of rice paddies and villages in Japan will be ornamented with 1,340 big blue umbrellas.

spectacle that will burn into the memories of millions of people expected to see the three-week "exhibition."
Some will love it. Some will belittle it. Hardly anyone in its vicinity will be able to ignore it.
Meanwhile, 2,000 people will be employed making it. Before the beauty and light come the laborers and lawyers.
Whatever its merit as art, a Christo work is a construction job. With his government permits, international suppliers and teams of engineers, Christo seems more like a condo developer than an artist in a studio.
He cheerfully proclaims as much. At the moment a painter is mixing paint, Christo said he is a chemist: "If it is too thick, he must add turpentine."
"I am the same," Christo said, "except that my chemistry is made up of landowners, politicians, engineers, workers, attorneys, fabric, steel, mountains, trees, roads, houses, bridges, rivers, wind and light."
"All the umbrellas, they are bigger than my imagination," the bespectacled Christo said, gesturing as widely as possible in the compact car in which he rode toward Bakersfield.

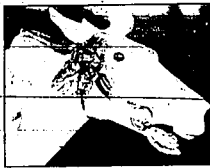

The front passenger seat was empty. Christo sat in back, as always. It is a rule for the 56-year-old Bulgarian-born artist, whose life has many rules. The back seat, he says, is safer.
"Many times when a sculptor makes a drawing to plan a sculpture, it looks much better than the final hard object," he said.
"But on my projects, no drawing I make can ever match the real thing. The project is so much more exuberant."

Painted ponies are a dying breed

Horses, pigs and roosters are fixtures on the farm. But carve these animals from wood, give them rich histories and put them in America's parks or amusement centers, and they become a dying breed.
So turns the world of the antique carousel.

Born of competition between America's immigrant craftsmen in the late 19th and early 20th centuries and numbering as many as 6,000 before the Great Depression, the hand-carved carousel has fallen prey over the past 70 years to disasters, changing tastes and the collectible craze of the 1980s. Today, only about 160 carousels remain; the rest have been destroyed or sold piecemeal to collectors.
While a sluggish economy may have slowed the pace of carousel sales over the past year, the antique merry-go-round still may be in the tide of its life. New carousels with Fiberglas or aluminum figures — far less expensive to buy and

maintain than the real McCoy's and more vandal-resistant to boot — are becoming so popular in shopping malls and other attractions that enthusiasts say future carousel memories may ring hollow, and not just because the new pieces are cast from metal or synthetic instead of popular wood.
"We don't have too much culture left in this country," said William Manns of Millwood, N.Y., co-author of "Painted Ponies" (Zion Inter-

national Publishing, \$39.95), a guide to American carousel art. "The carousel is one of those very special, unique, artistic elements that add to the culture."
"It's sort of like tearing down the old courthouse," Manns said of the demise of the antique carousel.
"To preserve any piece of historic architecture is the responsibility of governments to future generations."
In a way, the antique carousel is a study in American ingenuity.
Although Manns traces the earliest carousel-style rides to A.D. 500, America indirectly grabbed the brass ring when Gustav Dentzel of Germany, Marcus Illions of Lithuania, Russian Solomon Stein, Harry Goldstein and Charles Carmel, and others immigrated to the eastern United States, many of them during the late 1800s.
Personal signatures are unmistakable: Daniel "Miller-hung military memorabilia" from his horses because he was infatuated with the cavalry, for example, while Dentzel liked to decorate his saddles with birds.

Stand-up comedy routine inspiration for new sitcom 'Home Improvement'

Does your spine tingle when you read advertisements for power tools? Does a summer hardware sale make you foam at the mouth? If so, ABC's new sitcom "Home Improvement" (premiering Tuesday, Sept. 17) is for you. But don't expect the calm, precise tones of Bob Vila. Get ready. Instead of Tim Taylor (played by comedian Tim Allen), the host of the fictional cable show "Tool Time." On camera, Taylor's eyes maniacally gleam at the prospect of using a giant drill bit. "More power!" he squeals.

But when Taylor goes home to his formidable wife, Jill (Patricia Richardson, who starred in "Elsenhower and Lutz"), he's far from powerful. When he fixes the dishwasher, it blows up.

"That bit (with the dishwasher), says Allen, "is something the network made up. They wanted the character to be a zany guy." But other than that, Allen says, "the show's stayed very close to the original idea." And Allen, who had been on the road as a stand-up comic for the last 11 years, knows his tool shtick well. "One night in Akron, Ohio, I was losing my audience, so I went ahead and made jokes about what I know, which is tools and hardware," Allen recalls. "A bunch of guys started laughing their (derrieres) off. When I left, there were (derrieres) all over the floor."

The response to Allen's tool jokes tends to be intense, as was strikingly illustrated in his 1989 Showtime special, "Men Are Pigs." It was taped in Kalamazoo, Mich., where Allen went to college. What made the audience

react so strongly? "I think what I do is basically non-threatening humor," Allen says. "It's humor for fun's sake, something about men that isn't to be ashamed of." Allen says his humor is not just about tools, but also about the nature of men, and the differences between the way men and women look at life. In "Home Improvement," Taylor often goes to his neighbor Wilson (Earl Hindman, formerly of "Ryan's Hope") for advice.

Over the fence, this weird Zen master in a fishing hat dispenses platitudes that sound strikingly like the philosophy of Robert Bly, the poet who helped found the men's movement. "Maybe my show can be a conduit for these ideas, for men to learn a little bit about finding themselves," says Allen, who says he had been talking about the nature of men long before Bly gained a following.

Allen went on the road after col-

lege "because I hit rock bottom and needed something I could do." He combined his traveling with scores of commercials, some of which he produced.

His big break was the Showtime special. Disney officials Jeffrey Katzenberg and Michael Eisner also saw the special and signed him to a development deal. Matt Williams, who was one of the key producers of "Roseanne," helped him develop "Home Improvement."

"They had this wild man who had been on the road running wild all these years, and now they're domesticating me," Allen says. "The challenge of all this is not to dilute me."

NFL game helps ABC lead ratings as summer rerun season winds down

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Led by the premiere of "Monday Night Football," ABC won the weekly network ratings race with five television shows in the top 10 as the summer rerun season headed for a close.

ABC won with a 10.1 average rating, followed by NBC with 9.8 and CBS with 9.6, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

The most-watched television show last week was ABC's season premiere of "Monday Night Football," featuring the San Francisco 49ers against the New York Giants.

The Fox show "Married... With Children" placed second in its season premiere.

The network also debuted the series "Herman's Head," which placed 22nd in its premiere episode with an 11.9 share.

With a few exceptions, the fall television season starts next week.

ABC occupied four other spots in the top 10, including "Roseanne" in third, "Coach" in sixth, "Full House" in seventh and "Who's the Boss?" in eighth.

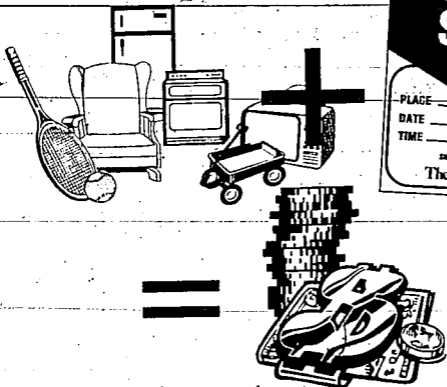

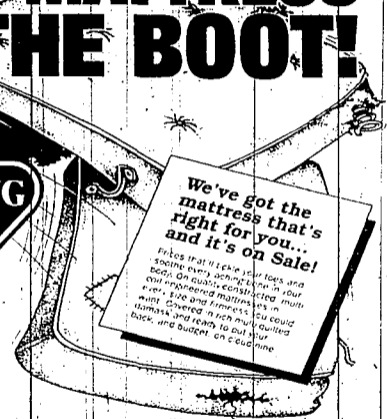
