U.N. tells Saddam he can sell oil

UNITED NATIONS — The Security Council on Thursday approved a plan allowing Iraq to sell up to \$1.6 billion worth of oil and use some of the profits for civilian supplies and war reparations.

The six-month arrangement would be the first export of Iraqi oil since Aug. 12, 1990, invasion of Kuwait. But it was not immediately clear if Baghdad would consent to the plan.

The 15-member Security Council approved the plan 13-1, with Cuba voting no and Yemen abstaining.

Under the resolution, Iraq would have no

control over the sale of the oil or the proceeds, to be used for food, medicine and humanitarian supplies.

Up to 30 percent of the revenue can be used to pay war reparations. The United Nations will also use some of the money to cover costs of eliminating Iraq's weapons of mass destruction, as required under the Persian Gulf War cease-fire accord.

Iraq's U.N. ambassador, Abdul Amir al-Anbani, complained to the council that the plan did not provide enough income for humanitarian aid for Iraqis. He later told

reporters the plan "is totally unworkable," but declined to say how Baghdad would act.

Oil industry sources say Iraqi officials have been making inquiries about resuming oil sales.

Iraq has consistently bridled at the directives issued by the Security Council since the end of the Gulf War. This week, the United States warned Baghdad that renewed attacks were not out of the question if it failed to allow U.N. helicopters to fly freely around Iraq in search of biological, chemical and nuclear weapons.

A team of 13 U.N. inspectors planned to go to Iraq Friday to carry on the search for biological weapons, and a group of nuclear experts is ready to go over the weekend, officials said Thursday.

Members of the U.N. Special Committee, which is in charge of dismantling Iraq's weapons of mass destruction, declined to give details on their inspection plans at their regional base in Bahrain, where teams assemble for briefing and training before going into Baghdad.

Dr. David Huxsoll said his biological weapons team had "new leads to pursue" and expected to stay 12 days. "We know they have labs that do biological research and we're interested in looking into these

Checks take big bounce for House

WASHINGTON — Members of the House bounced hundreds of thousands of dollars in personal checks written on their Capitol bank accounts and paid none of the penalties a normal citizen would face, according to the General Accounting Office.

The congressional watchdog agency said House members wrote 8,331 bad checks during the year ending June 30, 1990. That's an average of nearly 19 rubber checks per lawmaker.

And even after new policies were established midway through that year to cut down on the abuses, nearly a third of the 440 House members and non-voting delegates bounced checks of more than \$1,000, the report said.

All of the overdrafts were covered — free "floats" for members — with no charges whatsoever, even though their accounts were being audited, make lawmakers took up to four weeks to clear their accounts with the GAO's report, dated Wednesday.

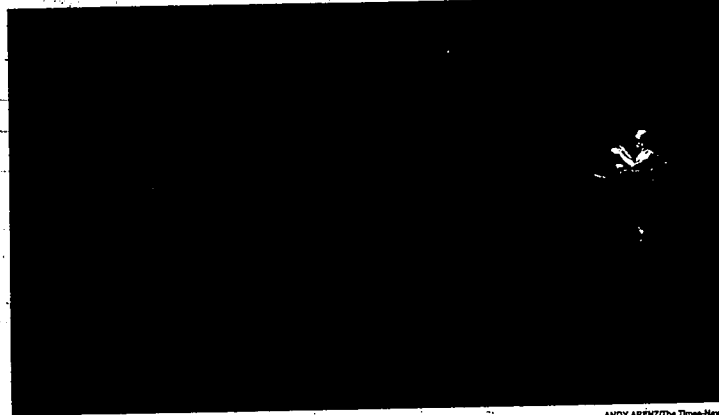
The bad-check number increased 8 percent during the second half of the 12-month period — even though House Sergeant at Arms Jack Russ, who oversees the members-only bank, established policies that were supposed to cut down on the abuses, the GAO said.

And of those who subsequently bounced checks of more than \$1,000, "Twenty-four account holders averaged at least one returned check a month. However, no account holders have had their accounts suspended," as the Russ policy suggested would be done, the GAO said.

One congressional source, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, said some of the bounced checks were in excess of \$10,000.

Russ was off on Thursday, according to his office, and not immediately available for comment. But he told the Capitol Hill newspaper Roll Call that the situation had improved since lawmakers received their pay raises of more than 25 percent.

Twin Falls school planners to offer menu of options to district patrons

TWIN FALLS — Year-round schooling and a new-grade center are two ideas for Twin Falls School District committee is considering to solve classroom crowding.

The 33-member long-range planning committee hammered out an agreement late Wednesday that included three options the district will offer the public in a series of meetings, said Richard Withycombe, a

Portland, Ore., education consultant who helped organize Wednesday's meeting.

"The committee reached some agreements on some alternative ways to solve the enrollment problem," said Withycombe.

The proposals are:

- Convert to year-round schooling at Sawtooth Elementary School and Fernie Elementary, which both have air conditioning and classrooms to Twin Falls High and at Stuart Junior High and/or

O'Leary Junior High.

• Build a new elementary school and expand the high school and the two junior

highs.

• Build a new middle school, expand the high school with a new auditorium, a second gym and 10 new classrooms, convert Stuart into a ninth-grade center and transform O'Leary into a middle school.

• Eventually one of the options will become a bond issue proposal.

Ecologists flay lagging U.S.

NAIROBI, Kenya — Ecology activists said Thursday the United States is holding up progress on an international pact to slow global warming, and accused Washington of being selfish and irresponsible.

"There has been a ... wrecking effect by the selfish attitude of the United States in not conceding the problem as very other industrial country has," said Jeremy Leggett, an earth scientist with the activist group Greenpeace.

He spoke at a news conference during the third round of negotiations to try to fashion an international agreement on global warming.

Delegates at the 116 countries have attended the 10-day meeting, and a treaty is to be signed in Rio de Janeiro,

Brazil in June. U.S. delegates at the conference have not responded to the accusations.

The primary issue at the session, which ends Friday, has been how to control manmade emissions of carbon dioxide, which trap heat and are believed to be the main culprit behind the gradual warming of the earth's atmosphere.

Scientists with the U.N.'s Panel on Climate Change predict that if the carbon dioxide emissions continue unchecked, the gradual warming could cause even worse environmental havoc, such as a sudden and unpredictable increase in ocean levels.

Except for the United States, the world's industrialized nations support the idea of stabilizing carbon dioxide emissions at 1990 levels.

Gates kept his distance from Contra caper, witness testifies

WASHINGTON — Robert Gates, the CIA insider nominated to direct the agency, was portrayed Thursday as a man "sort of on the make" who knew the outlines — but distanced himself from the details — of Oliver North's secret program to supply the Nicaraguan rebels in the face of a congressional ban.

The third-day of Gates' confirmation hearings before the Senate Intelligence Committee provided riveting insights into the shadows of CIA operations — and the mysteries that have persisted since the Iran-Contra scandal erupted in November 1986.

The lead witness was Alan Fiers, head of the CIA's Central American Task Force from 1984-86, who recaptured a Pandora's box last summer by testifying that he had

been one of a handful of CIA officials who knew about a bizarre program, directed by North in Ronald Reagan's White House, that diverted money from a covert sale of U.S. arms to Iran to support the Contras.

Fiers, who pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor for withholding information from Congress, said he informed two of his superiors — neither of them Gates — about the diversion, which came at a time when Congress had banned U.S. aid to the rebels.

At several of his nine meetings with Gates during 1986 before the scandal broke, Fiers said he discussed the aid being provided by a group of private American donors to the Contras.

Survey says 1 in 4 youths thinks 'seriously' of suicide

ATLANTA — A new federal survey of high school students found that 27 percent "thought seriously" about killing themselves in the preceding year, and one in 12 said they actually tried.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control survey also found that 2 percent said they sustained injuries serious enough to require medical attention after suicide attempts.

The survey of 11,631 students was conducted last year. Ninth-through 12th-grade students were questioned in every state, Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, the CDC said Thursday.

Sixteen percent said they had made "a specific plan" and 8 percent said they had tried suicide at least once in the preceding year. That's far greater than the number of actual suicides; the annual suicide rate for the age group is just 11 per 100,000, according to CDC statistics.

Dr. Patrick W. O'Carroll, a CDC suicide researcher, said that while it's "scary" that more than one in four seriously considered

suicide, the 8 percent who tried is particularly worrisome.

"You need to be increasingly wary as you go down the spectrum," said O'Carroll, chief of the CDC's intentional injuries section, noting that almost everyone has had idle thoughts of suicide.

"Every one of us is at risk," he said. "At some point, you have to not worry about that end of the spectrum that approaches the way everybody is. What's more worrisome is the attempted suicides, the medical consequences."

"That 8 percent could be a cry for help," said Robert R. Butterworth, a Los Angeles psychologist who specializes in youth psychology. "A lot of times it's a desperate attempt to tell someone they're in pain ... but sometimes they mess up, and it can be fatal."

The survey findings "add to increasing evidence that most self-reported suicide attempts among adolescents and young adults do not result in injury," the Atlanta-based CDC said in its report.

September shivers for Plains, upper Mississippi Valley

Temperatures plunged to near or below freezing Thursday across the Plains and upper Mississippi Valley, breaking some low-temperature records that had stood for a century. Heavy rain caused flooding in southwestern Texas.
The low for the Lower 48 states was 17 at Valentine, Neb.; shattering a record of 27 set in 1890. Omaha, Neb., dipped to 29, breaking the record of 35 set in 1873. It was Omaha's coolest temperature on record so far in the season, the National Weather Service said.
Other records included 41 in Chicago; 33 in Cedar Rapids, Iowa; 25 in Dickinson, N.D.; 24 in Havre, Mont.; 29 in Lincoln, Neb.; 29 in Lubbock, Texas; 33 in Kansas City, Mo.; 22 in Rapid City, S.D.; 44 in South Bend, Ind.; 35 in Topeka, Kan.; 38 in Wichita, Kan.; and 49 in Wichita Falls, Texas.
Homeowners and campers headed for higher ground after heavy rain drove parts of southwestern Texas and water rose in the Rio Grande and Lake Amistad. Up to 4

inches of rain fell in the area from Wednesday night into Thursday morning.
Strong thunderstorms formed over the mid-Atlantic states.
At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended over the coast of the Carolinas, the northern Atlantic Coast, the Appalachians, northern Florida, the central Gulf Coast, the lower Mississippi Valley, Texas and southern Oklahoma.
Heavy rainfall during the six hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT included nearly 3 inches at Killeen, Texas, nearly 2 inches at Chicopee Falls, Mass., and an inch at Houston.

Senate approves anti-obscenity curbs for federal arts grants

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted Thursday to impose strict anti-obscenity curbs on federal grants for the arts, but refused to cut the budget of the agency that distributes the money.
Sen. James Jeffords said John Frohnmayer, chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, "has done all that is humanly possible" to reject grant requests from artists whose work is deemed obscene and taken action against recipients who violated terms of their grants.
"All these things are being done to preserve the integrity of the system," said Jeffords, R-Vt. "For us to cut his budget now is sending the wrong message; we should be rewarding him."
The Senate voted 67-27 to defeat a measure by Sen. Nancy Kassebaum, R-Kan., to trim the NEA's funds next year by \$17.4 million, or 13 percent.
But it voted 68-28 to tell the NEA that no tax dollars can be used "to promote, disseminate or produce

materials that depict or describe, in a gratuitously offensive way, sexual or excretory activities or organs."
"These artists who have their minds in the gutter are free to do what they want to with their own time and their own money," said Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., who sponsored the measure.
The Helms measure is similar to a prohibition adopted by the Senate last year but dropped in the final compromise with the House in favor of a less-specified ban against "obscene art."
Kassebaum said she was disappointed with the endorsement's handling of grant requests after Congress told it last year to reform its procedures for deciding what projects to fund.
"With respect to the NEA, there seems to be an atmosphere that anything presented as art deserves public support," she said. "We must send a stronger message."
Sen. Claiborne Pell, R-R.I., a chief supporter of the NEA, said

"we should give some time for these reforms to take hold. A cut in funds would be clearly a punitive action."
Helms complained that many of the same "perverted artists" whose depictions of homosexual themes created an uproar last year are continuing to get subsidies from the government.
Among the grants cited by agency critics were \$12,000 for the International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival and \$325,000 to the New York Shakespeare Festival that included a presentation of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" by a cast "clad nude, topless and in G-string."
The House, pleased with the way the NEA had rejected funding requests by performance artists whose routines include smearing their nude bodies with chocolate, urinating on stage and homosexual themes, voted in June to boost the agency's funding by \$1.5 million next year.

Soviets asking for food grains, staples

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union appears to need food grains and staples like butter and sugar to get through the winter, a senior Agriculture Department official said Thursday in predicting food shortages there but no famine.
The official returned Tuesday from an 11-day trip to the Soviet Union with Agriculture Undersecretary Richard T. Crowder and other experts. He said the delegation was still putting together its findings and recommendations for President Bush, who is expected to be briefed next week.
This official, who spoke with reporters on condition of anonymity, declined to describe what kind of aid the United States might offer, and how food much assistance the Soviets are expected to need.
State Department spokesman Richard Boucher

also declined to get into details Thursday on food aid to the Soviet Union.
"At this point, they (the delegation) have to report to the President. We haven't made any decisions on food assistance," Boucher said. "I don't have any of my findings and recommendations for you at this point."
In Brussels, however, a senior Soviet official said Thursday that his country needs \$14.7 billion in food aid and asked the European Community to provide nearly half of it, according to EC officials.
Yuri Luzhkov, deputy chairman of the Soviet Economic Management Commission, said the EC commission that aid was needed to offset a drop of between 10 percent and 30 percent in Soviet food production this year, according to a commission official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

"The sale of Iraqi oil and the procurement and distribution of supplies will be conducted under close supervision of the United Nations," he said.
"If Iraq has any concern about the fate of its people and the hardship that they are facing, this is a way for them to see that the people get what they need," he said.
The Iraqi oil would be sent through the pipeline to Turkey, where it would be stored for sale. The pipeline can carry about 1 million barrels a day.

to ensure they are not doing research for military purposes.
Richard T. Crowder, dean for research and advanced studies in the School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Louisiana, said.
Fellow American David Kay was in Bahrain to assemble a 45-member nuclear inspection team. Kay witnessed Iraqi warning shots against two members of an earlier team when they tried to check Iraq nuclear sites.
Hussell and Kay would not talk

about whether they would need to use helicopters for their inspections.
"It is not a major problem," he said, "with having a U.S. military escort if one is set up to make sure the U.N. helicopters are allowed."
In Washington, State Department deputy spokesman Richard Boucher said the oil sale did not constitute a weakening of U.N. sanctions against Iraq. A key element of the resolution, he said, is that no funds generated by the oil sale will ever pass into the hands of the Iraqi government.

The price tag for any of the three options would be less than the \$20 million the district proposed spending to build a new high school last spring. The voters turned that idea down by a 2-to-1 margin.
All three options would solve overcrowding at all levels in the district, Withycombe said.
Enrollment went up by 167 students this year, or 6.958 — a 2.4 percent increase, the School District says. That's well above the 1 percent increase the district was projecting, Superintendent Terrell Donich said.
People will have ample opportunity to help shape any of the three proposals or suggest a new one, Withycombe said.
He said other communities turning to year-round schooling give students within three elementary school zones the option of attending

a year-round school or the other two schools with traditional September-to-June schedules.
Under year-round schooling, students go to school the same number of days as their counterparts in a traditional school. There are several different year-round schedules, but in many schools students attend class for nine weeks, and get three weeks off.
The schools can accommodate one-third more students on a year-round schedule than on a traditional schedule because part of the student body is on-vacation at any given time.
However, the committee backed away from proposing year-round schooling at the junior highs and the high school, in part because of scheduling problems, Withycombe said.
School districts with year-round

schedules use a different approach to solving overcrowding than traditional schools.
Increased costs for year-round schooling are paid with general funds, while a new school would be funded by raising property taxes after a successful bond issue election, Withycombe said.
The cost of year-round schooling is that related costs are less than for new school construction, he said.
The last proposal — which includes the ninth-grade center — is the same one School Board members rejected last fall after a majority of people opposed the plan.
However, it is the only plan that would change the junior high configuration — grades 7 through 9 — and group sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders together in a middle school scheme, Withycombe said.

O'Carroll said the students who consider or try suicide, without hurting themselves, shouldn't be ignored.
"If somebody tells you they've attempted suicide — and you determine they're not at risk of dying, that doesn't mean you don't have to worry about helping that kid," he said. "There could be a problem with drugs, or child abuse."
Butterworth said, "should wake up parents to the fact they need to sit down and start talking to their kids about their problems."
The CDC found that thoughts of suicide — and actual attempts — are "significantly more likely" for girls than boys. Thirty-four percent of female students said they had seriously considered suicide, compared with 21 percent of boys. And while 10 percent of girls had tried it, only 6 percent of boys had.
Hispanic students consistently reported the highest rate of suicidal thoughts and attempts — respectively 30 percent and 12 percent. Whites were next — 28 percent and 8 percent, followed by blacks — 20 percent and 7 percent.
The CDC's report also noted previous studies showing that

suicide rates among Americans ages 15 to 19 have quadrupled in four decades: from 2.7 per 100,000 in 1950 to 11.3 in 1988.

Aquino backs off on base vote
MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino said Thursday she would give up her plan to call a national referendum to save the U.S. naval base at Subic Bay if it fails to generate public support. So far, it hasn't.
It was the first sign since Aquino may back down on trying to save the 10-year lease for Subic which the Senate rejected on Monday.
"Certainly, if the idea ... does not have the support of the people, it will be abandoned," she said.

Testimony portrays Casey as complex, cagey

WASHINGTON (AP) — The late CIA Director William Casey was a complex, cagey man capable of staging a "charade" meeting with Oliver North to deny agency involvement in the Iran-Contra affair, a former colleague told senators Thursday.

"One-time" operative Alan Fiers also recalled for the Senate Intelligence Committee that Casey once persuaded him there was nothing to the rumors — later proven true — that he was dying of cancer.

"He looked at me with an absolute straight face and convinced me that that was balderdash," Fiers said in a morning of nationally televised testimony at confirmation hearings for CIA nominee Robert Gates.

"Now, that's Bill Casey," Fiers, who worked closely with Casey in the mid-1980s on the agency's support for the Nicaraguan Contra rebels, painted a picture of a man who was brilliant and as per-

ceptive as he was deceptive. Casey often came to Capitol Hill to testify before the committee during his tenure at the spy agency, but remains nearly as enigmatic a figure for the public. He had a habit of mumbling when he spoke to his congressional overseers, which many thought was a tactic to evade sharing information in a process he openly resented. The panel even had earpieces installed at each member's place around the table to help them understand better. "It didn't work very well," says the chairman, Sen. David Boren, D-Okla.

Only after he died was Casey portrayed as the mastermind of the Iran-Contra affair in the testimony of Lt.

Col. Oliver North, who carried out the program from his post at the White House.

On Thursday, Fiers recounted how he resisted doing something for North in October 1984, soon after he took over as Latin American task force chief at the agency and when he knew little of the Contra aid operation. He was later told "there are things going on that you don't know about. Cooperate with Ollie," Fiers said.

He related the conversation to Clair George and another superior. Soon afterward, he, North and the two superiors were summoned to a meeting in Casey's office, where the director asked Fiers to recount what he had been told.

"And the director looked at Ollie and said, 'Ollie, Alan tells me you're operating in Central America. Is that true?' ... Ollie looked at the director and said, 'No, sir, I'm not operating ...'" Fiers testified.

"The director said, 'Good. I want you to understand that you're not to operate in Central America.' We walked out, and Clair and I went back to his office, and we both — I said, 'Alan, you've got to understand what happened in that meeting just there.'"

"Sometime in the dark of the night, Bill Casey has said, 'I'll take care of Central America, just leave it to me. And what you saw going on in there was a charade.'"

"And I looked at Clair, and ... I said, 'Jesus Christ, Clair, if that's true, this will be worse than Watergate if it ever comes out in the open.' And Clair just said, 'Shook his head and he said, 'Essentially that's not a problem.' From that point forward, I knew my universe."

But despite the unusually close relationship between Casey and Fiers, the task force chief never was sure just how much Casey knew.

Reverse genetics leads scientists to find illness

BOSTON (AP) — Scientists say they have for the first time discovered a normal gene, altered it and then found the cause of a mysterious human illness.

The technique, called reverse genetics, is the opposite of the way scientists ordinarily search for defective genes that underlie many disorders, especially those passed through families.

"Typically, scientists start with a disease and try to find the gene that causes it," said Dr. Elizabeth Fuchs of the University of Chicago's Howard Hughes Medical Institute.

In their backward approach, the researchers found that errors in genes that make a common protein called keratin are to blame for a rare skin disorder called epidermolysis bullosa simplex.

"A scientist is always reluctant to say they were the first to do anything, but I am fairly certain it's the first case" of discovering the cause of a disease this way, said Dr. Elizabeth Fuchs of the University of Chicago's Howard Hughes Medical Institute.

A report on her work was published in Friday's issue of the journal Cell.

"It was quite amazing," Dr. Howard Green of Harvard Medical School said of Fuchs' discovery. "It

was very obscure what the problem really was."

Fuchs said her work eventually could lead to a cure for the disease, which makes the skin blister after a mild contact. It is currently untreatable and affects one in 50,000 people.

Fuchs' research began with the discovery in the mid-1980s of a group of genes responsible for making keratin in skin cells. Keratin forms strands that make up about 85 percent of the total protein in the skin.

Despite its abundance, scientists have been uncertain what keratin does, since skin cells do not need the strands to grow. However, the new work suggests that it forms the scaffolding that gives skin cells their mechanical structure.

"Once we isolated and characterized these genes, we wondered if there might be genetic skin diseases that have as their basis defects in keratin genes," Fuchs said.

To find out, they created a mutant form of a keratin gene. Then, they inserted it into skin cells in a test tube. The mixed-up gene interfered with the cells' keratin production.

Zoo official blasts animal rights groups, media for personal gain

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Animal rights groups and the media that report on their criticism of zoo practices are "vultures" that descend on controversy for their own gain, a zoo spokesman said.

"The marrow of emotions draws the drooling carrion crows," Jeff Jouett, spokesman for the Zoological Society of San Diego, said of the media during a convention of zoo officials here Wednesday.

Allegations by animal rights ac-

tivists led San Diego Zoo officials to admit this week they had unwittingly shipped some "surplus" animals to a hunting ranch and to a game farm that has sold animals to hunting ranches to be killed as trophies.

Jouett did not mention the game farm if it ever comes out in the open. But he said the animal-rights groups resembled "carrion-seeking, flesh-eating vultures" who descend on controversy "before the body is cold."

Senate panel might delay B-2 program

WASHINGTON — A Senate panel expressed support for the embattled B-2 stealth bomber program Thursday, but proposed that Congress delay until next year a final decision on spending \$3.2 billion to build four more planes.

The action indicated the depth of concern among B-2 supporters over the program's future in light of a reduced threat of nuclear war and new doubts about whether the B-2 — the costliest weapon ever built — will prove as capable as promised.

The \$270.4 billion defense spending bill for the budget year beginning Oct. 1, approved by the Senate Appropriations defense subcommittee, also eliminated the administration's request to buy one SSN-21 Seawolf attack submarine for \$2.38 billion.

Critics: Bush's education plan lacking

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration's education reform plan fails to address inequalities between rich and poor public schools, critics said Thursday.

Author Jonathan Kozol said President Bush's "America 2000" plan, which stresses more standardized testing and free-market competition among schools, contains "not one word, one hint, one whisper about race, equality or segregation, the central issues in the contemporary American despair." And Gwendolyn Dubose Laroche, director of the education department of the Chicago Urban League, said Bush's idea of giving parents vouchers that could be spent on the public or private school of their choice "is a cruel hoax."

Center recommends AIDS testing

WASHINGTON — Health-care workers and their hospital patients should be encouraged to undergo tests for the AIDS virus, but no mandatory testing laws are necessary, the head of the Federal Centers for Disease Control told Congress Thursday.

"The risk of HIV transmission from an infected health-care worker to a patient is very small, and most medical procedures involve no risk at all of HIV transmission," CDC Director Dr. William L. Roper said, referring to the virus that causes AIDS. Roper defended CDC's voluntary testing guidelines under strong attack from conservative Rep. William Dannemeyer, R-Calif., who said it was an "absurdity" to rely on voluntary compliance.

California forest fire destroys house

REDDING, Calif. — A 1,200-acre fire raged Thursday in Shasta Trinity National Forest, destroying one house and threatening others despite the efforts of more than 1,000 firefighters.

About a dozen homes have been evacuated, and containment efforts were stepped up as the blaze fed on dry brush and timber about 40 miles west of Redding, said U.S. Forest Service spokesman Jim Turner.

Three helicopters, four air tankers and 35 fire engines were assigned to battle the fire, which broke out Wednesday along a state highway three miles south of Hayfork, a town of 2,500, about 155 miles north of Sacramento.

Career of New England banker in air

WASHINGTON — Democratic senators who blame the Treasury Department's top banking regulator for the costly Bank of New England failure said Thursday his nomination to a second term is in trouble.

Sen. Donald W. Riegle Jr., D-Mich. and the chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, called on the Bush administration to reassess its nomination of Robert L. Clarke as comptroller of the currency.

"They've got to take a very long, hard look at the record," Riegle said after the General Accounting Office issued a report criticizing Clarke's regulation of the Bank of New England, which collapsed in January at an estimated cost to the government of \$2.5 billion.

Safety inspectors head to N. Carolina

RALEIGH, N.C. — The U.S. Labor Department has decided to use its own safety inspectors to bolster those in North Carolina, in the wake of a poultry plant fire that killed 25 people, a workers' advocate said Thursday. A federal official said no decision had been made yet.

"As I understand it, what they're going to do at a minimum is accompany North Carolina inspectors on fatality investigations in the future," said Joseph Kinney, executive director of the National Safe Workplace Institute in Chicago.

Biden challenges pro-choicers on words said about Thomas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee challenged abortion-rights activists Thursday when he said Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas would vote to consign American women to the perils of back-alley abortions.

Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr. of Delaware said the abortion-rights activists showed a "failure of logic" in citing a 1987 speech Thomas gave that praised an anti-abortion article.

Biden made the comment as the representatives of abortion-rights groups urged the Senate to reject Thomas' nomination to be the nation's second black Supreme Court Justice.

The record shows that, if confirmed, Judge Thomas would indeed vote to take away this fundamental right — to take this nation back to the days when women had no alternative but the back alleys for health care," said Kate Michelman, director of the National Abortion Rights Action League.

Biden disagreed, saying, "I did not find anywhere in the record on that issue where he evidenced extreme views."

Thomas testified that his praise of the article was a "throwaway line" intended to win support for his ideas on natural law and not an endorsement of its conclusion on abortion.

Biden also rebuked Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., for saying that a possible clue into Thomas' views on the subject was his attendance at a Fairfax, Va., Episcopal church active in the anti-abortion movement.

"I think that's absolutely, totally completely irrelevant as a matter of principle, and I also think it's irrelevant as a matter of fact," Biden said, noting that he was one of three Roman Catholics on the panel who support abortion rights.

Biden's comments were the first indication that he did not agree, with the argument of other Democrats that Thomas was disingenuous when he insisted that he had an open mind on the issue of abortion.

In their testimony, Michelman, Faye Wattleton, the president of Planned Parenthood, and former Vermont Gov. Madeleine Kunin said Thomas should not be allowed by senators to duck questions on how he would vote on abortion.

"It is Judge Thomas' silence on this question that causes such anxiety," said Kunin, a Democrat. "In a democracy, it is a sad day indeed, when silence assures victory."

MIA investigators focus on photo 'at top' of list

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon's MIA investigators are focusing their attention on a clear color photograph that purports to show an American still listed as missing from the Vietnam War, a Defense Department official said today.

In the last few weeks, the government's photographic experts have managed to debunk or at least seriously question the authenticity of a number of pictures that came out over the summer, allegedly showing Americans held prisoner in Southeast Asia.

All of the pictures but one. "This is going to be right at the top of our investigative list," Carl Ford, acting assistant defense secretary for international security affairs, said of a picture said to show Army Capt. Donald G. Carr, who has been missing for 20 years.

"Of all of the photographs we have received, it is quite striking," said Ford, the Pentagon's point man for the POW-MIA issue.

Pentagon officials believe that the picture is no more than 18 months old, and search teams on the ground in Southeast Asia were trying to determine the fate of Carr, who was shot down over Laos. Carr was an observer in the aircraft, neither he nor the pilot were found.

But the picture of Carr isn't like any of the other ones, that have come out. It's in color and it looks like him. Most of the other pictures are grainy, black-and-whites with heavy shadows on the faces. In some the people are dressed strangely and are holding signs with cryptic messages.

Ford said most of those pictures are fakes. Six of the photos came from the same source, and all but one have been proven to have been hoaxes. They were just ripped out of Soviet or Eastern Bloc magazines and doctored, experts have said. But one photo, showing three men holding a sign has not been conclusively knocked down as a fabrication, Ford said.

Attorneys after Castro testimony

MIAMI — Attorneys for Manuel Noriega are making arrangements to get the videotaped testimony of Cuban President Fidel Castro in Havana, according to the lawyer of one of the government's witnesses.

Samuel Burstin, who represents former Lt. Col. Luis Del Cid, said it was his understanding that Noriega's defense team was preparing a court motion that would allow them to take Castro's deposition.

The testimony would center on a 1984 meeting Castro purportedly held with Noriega and leaders of the Medellin cartel over the destruction of a cocaine lab by Panamanian Forces. The prosecution alleges cartel leaders became enraged with Noriega over loss of the lab.

CFCs phased out by EPA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency on Thursday announced a proposed schedule for phasing out chlorofluorocarbons and other chemicals blamed for damaging the earth's protective ozone layer.

The proposal would end production and imports of CFCs, halons and carbon tetrachloride by 2000, as required under last year's Clean Air Act and by the Montreal Protocol, an international agreement.

For another ozone-depleting chemical, methyl chloroform, the deadline is 2002.

Companies making faster progress toward phasing out the chemicals will be able to trade allowances with other companies that would otherwise miss intermediate deadlines.

AP poll: Thomas testimony leaves mostly favorable impression of high court nominee

NEW YORK (AP) — Clarence Thomas' Senate appearance left four in nine Americans with a favorable impression of the Supreme Court nominee, and only one in nine with an unfavorable view, an Associated Press poll found.

Another four in nine couldn't say what impression Thomas made. Yet a 54 percent majority said the Senate should confirm Thomas as a Supreme Court Justice. Sixteen percent opposed confirmation. The rest were unsure.

More than a quarter of the 1,009 adults polled Friday through Tuesday said they didn't know enough about Thomas to have an opinion about his nomination, and others were unsure for other reasons.

The conservative black judge was questioned by senators at televised hearings for four days before the survey began. But the poll shows the repetitive and sometimes arcane exchanges between Thomas and liberal senators failed to create the sort of public backlash that undermined the Supreme Court nomination of Robert Bork four years ago.

On the question about their impression of Thomas, 45 percent said it was favorable, 11 percent unfavorable and 44 percent couldn't say. Of those who didn't

know whether they approved or disapproved of Thomas' nomination, 21 percent had a favorable impression from the hearings, compared with 6 percent unfavorable.

The random-sample phone poll by ICR Survey Research Group of Media, Pa., has a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

Thirty percent in the poll said Thomas should have been more forthcoming about his views on abortion, but 28 percent said he should not have been more forthcoming.

That split reflected the partisan division of the Senate Judiciary Committee, whose Democrats complained that Thomas was unresponsive and was dodging the abortion issue. Committee Republicans argued that Thomas, as a federal appeals judge, had the responsibility of keeping an open mind on issues that could come before him.

One in five of those polled who approved of the Thomas nomination still said he should have been more forthcoming on abortion.

The other main issue that brought Thomas opposition from major civil rights and women's groups was the perception that he wants to end hiring preferences such as affirmative action programs.

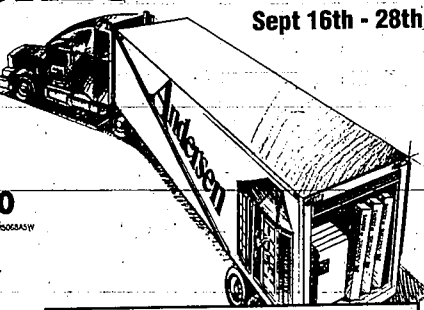

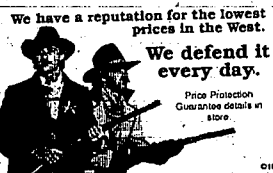

The 31-year-old Schlichter is hoping to catch on with the Cleveland Browns.

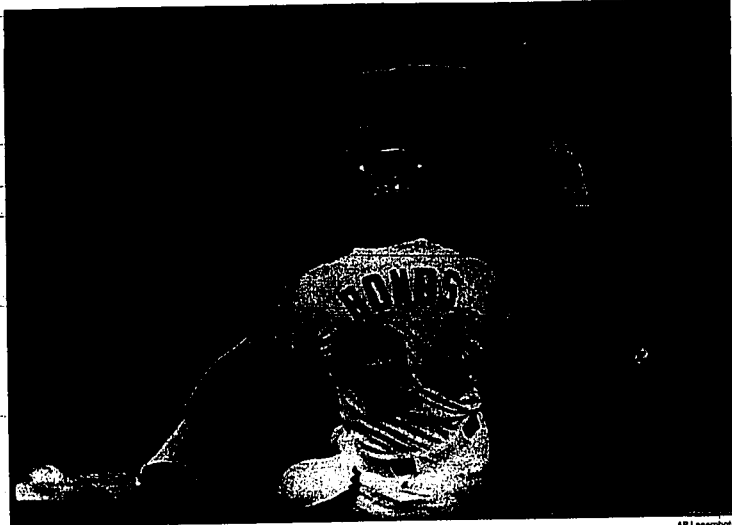
League lessens penalty for tossing football into stands

Measure would compel major league teams to share broadcast revenue

WASHINGTON — Washington lawmakers worried about their financially-cellar-dwelling Seattle Mariners proposed legislation on Thursday that would force major league baseball teams to share broadcast revenue.

Backers said the measure would benefit all but the seven wealthiest teams by tapping into the revenues of those seven — the New York Yankees, New York Mets, Philadelphia Phillies, Boston Red Sox, Toronto Blue Jays, St. Louis Cardinals and Los Angeles Dodgers.

The Yankees and Mets would lose the most, \$21.6 million and \$6.3 million respectively.

"This legislation is necessary because of economic stratification between larger and smaller market teams in major league baseball," Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., said in offering the bill.

The biggest winner would be Seattle with an estimated \$4.2 million gain. Milwaukee, Kansas City, Minnesota and Cleveland also would make at least \$3 million more than under the existing free-market system.

Gorton conceded to reporters that his bill likely would have no impact on the fate of the Mariners, because it probably won't get

Barkley ready to play on history's 'greatest team'

PHILADELPHIA — Charles Barkley has a strong feeling about the basketball team the United States will have for next summer's Olympics.

"The only team that can beat us is our second unit," Barkley said.

The Philadelphia 76ers forward said he is one of 10 NBA players who will be named to the United States Olympic squad Saturday.

"I'm playing for two reasons," Barkley said. "No. 1, it will be a chance to play for the greatest team ever assembled. And No. 2, this is the first time the pros have played for this country. There's great historical significance."

"Besides, I want to be the answer to a trivia question a million years from now." His comments were in a story in

Thursday's Philadelphia Daily News. Barkley had said earlier this year he wasn't very interested in playing for the first U.S. Olympic team to use professionals.

The team to be announced Saturday, reportedly also will include centers David Robinson and Patrick Ewing; forwards Larry Bird, Karl Malone and Chris Mullin; and guards Magic Johnson, John Stockton, Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen. Two college players were expected to fill out the roster.

"People talk about whether we'll have the proper chemistry. That's garbage," Barkley said. "I think the only time people question chemistry is when you've got guys who can't play, and that should be no problem here."

Barkley said he won't mind if he doesn't start. "Everybody can't start."

Ex-Olympic head denies wrongdoing

NEW YORK (AP) — Robert Helmick said the private business dealings that led to his resignation as president of the U.S. Olympic Committee involved no conflict of interest and, in fact, were nothing more than function of his career as a lawyer.

"This is what I do," Helmick said Thursday during an interview with The Associated Press. "It is my dilemma. I represent people and institutions. As president of the Olympic Committee, you question why business comes to you. There is a lot more that you turn down than you accept."

Helmick resigned Wednesday night after seven years as USOC president following revelations that he had received nearly \$300,000 in fees from clients with Olympic interests.

Among the clients cited in various reports were Turner Broadcasting System, which purchased TV rights to amateur events from USOC's Olympic properties and paid Helmick at least \$37,500 in 1990 as a consultant; TIVI Amsterdam, a marketing firm which represented the international Swimming Federation and paid Helmick more than \$150,000 in 1990-91, and Saatchi and Saatchi, which is involved in the sale of USOC's sponsorship rights.

Redskins feeling good about season

Matt Millen, hard-bitter and blunt speaker, is making the point last January when the San Francisco 49ers were preparing for a playoff game against the Washington Redskins.

"The Redskins have the ability to beat anyone," said Millen, playing for the 49ers at the time. "They are a very good team."

So here was Millen last Sunday, pooling off Redskins' uniform No. 57 after his new team had demolished Phoenix 34-0.

"Why do you always seem to end up in the right place?" he was asked. "Because I choose the right place," he replied with a sly smile.

For the first three weeks of the NFL season, Washington is the right place to be playing — so much so that even workaholic coach Joe Gibbs seems loose and relaxed.

Gibbs says the right things, like: "It's only three games. We have a whole season to go." But the feeling is there, the same feeling that existed on

the 1982 and 1983 Super Bowl teams, the last time Washington opened 3-0.

In a sense, this is a last-chance season for these Redskins, who have managed to rebuild on the fly despite only four first-round draft picks in the last two decades.

Of the dozen or so mainstays that any top team must have, only quarterback Mark Rypien and left tackle Jim Lachey, both 28; 25-year-old kicker Chip Lohmiller and linebacker Andre Collins, 25, are an age where they can look forward to a number of good years.

Earnest Byner, the team's first all-purpose running back since John Riggs, is 29, ancient for his position; the best receiving trio, are either over 30 (33-year-old Art Monk) or approaching it (Ricky Sanders and Gary Clark).

And so on — cornerback Darrell Green is 31; linebacker Wilber Marshall is 29; defensive end Charles Mann is 30.

But it never seems to matter with Washington, which always finds holes.

Charlie Casserty, the general manager the past three seasons, seems just as good at it as the departed Bobby Beathard.

Washington remains second in the NFL against the run despite the retirement of Dave Butz and the release of Darryl Grant, the mainstays for a decade in the defensive line and the failure of Tracy Rucker, a third-round draft pick two years ago.

Written rules should cover city's moonlighting cops

Can — or should — the city of Twin Falls prevent police officers from running their own security service on their own time?

It's a difficult question that goes to heart of what we expect from our public servants.

Are we paying them to be round-the-clock protectors of the public interest, or are they just hired for a specific task?

If it's the former, we're not paying them enough. Moonlighting cops are not an exception in the Magic Valley; they're the rule.

But if these are, in effect, just hired guns, do we have the right to tell them what they can't do off the job?

Capt. Gary Corder and Detective Ron Roberson, who run a security service that competes with another service, say no. They don't do personal business on the job, they argue, and they don't use contacts they make in the course of their jobs to solicit business.

Nonsense, counters Lloyd Monroe, one of the rival service's owners. In just doing their jobs, the officers are walking advertisements for their own security service, Monroe maintains.

Monroe argues Corder and Roberson can't serve two masters; they should either be cops protecting the public's interest or security consultants protecting their clients.

The City Council and public safety chief, Paul Du Fresno, back Corder and Roberson, partly because they understand that cops sometimes have trouble supporting families on what the city can pay them.

They also don't see why Corder and Roberson, who have built reputations as good cops, shouldn't profit from those reputations on their own time.

We agree, but we also think Monroe is correct when he says there is potential for corruption. It would be easy for officers less ethical than Corder and Roberson to trade cash for protection.

The city needs a clear set of written guidelines, setting out what practices are ethical and what practices aren't, for cops who do security-related work on the side. It should include a process for complaints and an independent authority, appointed by the City Council, to hear those complaints.

The city should have a record of the clients of security services run by cops, and as a matter of policy those officers should not be involved in police investigations involving those clients.

Most importantly, the process should be open to the public, not like the shadowy internal affairs investigations that characterize most cities' in-house police work. In order for the public to be convinced that honest cops can run their own businesses honestly, it needs to see the process at work.

Public servants should not be penalized for hard work and competence, but the door swings both ways.

The standard of honesty for those who protect the public's interest has to be higher than for everybody else. It can't be any other way.

Labor Day: Recognition is the purpose

Whatever happened to the "traditional" Labor Day edition of our Times-News? There was a time, not long ago, when the working men and women of our nation were honored for a job well done. The labor movement, with its many heroes, received considerable coverage and was given much credit for the gains enjoyed by countless millions of American citizens today (union and non-union alike) who just take for granted such benefits as the eight-hour day, minimum wages, paid vacations, unemployment insurance, public education, Social Security and holidays.

But now the Labor Day edition pays tribute to the likes of Gary Glenn, who is still trying to deceive us into believing the so-called Right to Work law has led to Idaho's resurgence. Hogwash!

The boom in the agriculture industry (no-union members there), when coupled with the "right-to-work-for-nothing" law, has indeed made the rich get richer and the poor get poorer in Idaho — thereby following the national trend of our already top-heavy society.

As for all those glowing statistics on wages (depending on whose perspective), let's look at the 1990 "average" weekly wage figure of \$360, as supplied by the Idaho Department of Employment.

A very small (fictional) company with 12 employees has a weekly payroll of \$4,320, which when divided by 12, averages out at \$360 each per week. Two employees receive

\$1,000 each, totaling \$2,000. Ten employees receive \$232 each, totaling \$2,320. Conclusion: Two employees receive \$640 above the average and 10 employees receive \$128 below the average. (And with a snap of my fingers, I say, "So much for 'average' wages.")

Do those lousy figures on the increase in the number of Idahoans employed include all the working poor whose underpaid, part-time jobs deprive them of any and all fringe benefits? Do all those questionable statistics show that, over the past few years, the numbers of working poor seeking medical assistance and food stamps have increased dramatically in our area?

In response to *The Times-News* question, "Whatever happened to organized labor?" let me assure you that although it might be wounded and bleeding from the dirty "below-the-belt kick" it received from the Reagan/Bush administration, it's not dead yet.

A very sad chapter in the history of our country commenced the day Ronald Reagan fired the air traffic controllers. With a government's hostility toward labor, the business community certainly got the message it was OK to go after the working (middle) class.

Many companies filed for bankruptcy under

Chapter 11 in order to nullify existing union contracts. Some of them subsequently re-opened, hiring scab labor.

The National Right to Work Committee geared up to high speed, probably amassing its biggest war chest ever, to go after any state it could. (Unfortunately, Idaho voters felt victim to the mass amount of deceptive propaganda they churned out under the direction of Gary Glenn.)

Structural changes in the economy have pushed back the blue-collar workers to make way for the white-collar workers of business (in both the public and private sector) and for the gray-collar workers of the service industries.

As a result of the foregoing, there has been a growing shift toward increased reliance on imports and lower-paid, part-time employment, leaving millions of Americans with lower-living standards, no health benefits and no pension plans.

There have been other gloomy periods for labor dating back to the early guilds of colonial America, but somehow, labor has always come back a little stronger.

So let us not yet write the obituary for organized labor in Idaho or any of the other 49 states.

Be of good cheer! Remember; if Delaware, Indiana, Maine and New Hampshire could repeal their "right to work" laws, so can Idaho.

Iraqis scavenge for arms in Kuwait's demilitarized border zone

ON THE IRAQ-KUWAIT DMZ — Since the United Nations cease-fire that ended Operation Desert Storm, more than 150 Iraqis have been arrested in Kuwait territory, many of them caught while scavenging for weapons and ammunition left from the war, say western diplomats and U.N. officials. The Iraqi incursions have taken place despite the presence of 300 U.N. military observers who patrol the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) between these two hostile Arab nations.

To many Kuwaitis and western diplomats, these incidents along the 120-mile DMZ, which extends six miles into Iraq and three miles into Kuwait, illustrate President Saddam Hussein's effort to test the U.N. resolutions that ended the Persian Gulf War. In one instance, Iraqis were arrested as they drove five truckloads of missiles back to Iraq; in another, a couple of months ago, they retrieved Silkworth missiles from Kuwaiti territory within the DMZ near the Iraqi port of Umm Qasr. More recently, Kuwaiti authorities said they arrested about 80 Iraqis dressed in

civilian clothes on Bubiyan island, most of which lies south of the DMZ, after the Iraqis allegedly fired on Kuwait coast guard patrol boats. The Kuwaiti air force then bombed and sank seven of a dozen small boats that reportedly sped from Iraq to assist the captured Iraqis. Most of the arrested Iraqis claim to be civilians. But the Kuwaitis and some diplomats suspect that at least some of them are military personnel. For example, a European diplomat noted, those captured in the Aug. 28 Bubiyan incident apparently had radio contact that al-

lowed them to call in reinforcements by boat. The Iraqi government, as it has with all Iraqis arrested in Kuwait or on the Kuwaiti side of the DMZ, denied any connection with those taken in the Bubiyan incident. These Iraqis said they were fishermen and denied being on the island, claiming they were seized from their boats, according to a source with access to their statements. An initial report on the incident by Austrian Gen. Guenther Griendl, commander of the U.N. Iraq-Kuwait Observer Mission (UNIKOM), did not support all the details

of the Kuwaitis' version of events, and U.N. officials said the prisoners they interviewed were unarmed and were not on Bubiyan when captured. Under the terms establishing the DMZ, both governments can retrieve arms, from their own territory within the zone. Except for U.N. forces, all military personnel are barred from entering the zone. Civilians may travel within it, but they may not cross the Iraqi-Kuwaiti border. Kuwaiti and Iraqi police are permitted within the zone to maintain law and order but are limited to carrying sidearms.

Blazing oil wells cut 3% off reserves

KUWAIT CITY (AP) — Fires set by Iraqi troops during their occupation of Kuwait have destroyed at least 3 billion barrels of the emirate's reserves, the oil minister was quoted as saying Thursday. Hamoud al-Rquba also said he expected the remaining 282 burning oil wells to be extinguished earlier than the projected date of next March.

He made his remarks during a visit Wednesday to the Um-Qadir oil field, south of Kuwait City, where Kuwaiti firefighters were extinguishing a well. His remarks were carried by local papers.

Rquba was quoted as saying that out of Kuwait's pre-war 100 billion barrels in recoverable oil reserves, at least 3 percent had been destroyed. "The question is how much of the 100 billion barrels we will be able to recover," he said. "A study is needed to determine that. But there is no doubt that the reservoirs have been affected."

He said that the losses of the oil sector since Iraq's Aug. 2, 1990 invasion have totaled \$75 billion, including \$43 billion in lost oil. Iraqi troops sabotaged and set fire to 732 of the emirate's oil wells before they were forced out last February by U.S.-led forces, ending a seven-month occupation.

The Kuwait Petroleum Co. is conducting a study to determine the feasibility of installing safety valves on the oil wells in order to reduce future damage, Rquba said.

He said Kuwait was estimated before the war to have 100 billion barrels of recoverable reserves, out of a total of 200 billion. Western estimates before the war put Kuwait's recoverable reserves at 94.5 billion barrels.

Guerrillas hit hometown of Afghan leader

PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — Afghan guerrillas, using Iraqi tanks captured during the Persian Gulf War, tried Wednesday to overrun the heavily guarded hometown of the nation's president, sources said.

The reported assault on Gardez in southeastern Afghanistan began Wednesday following nearly six months of planning, said guerrilla and diplomatic sources, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The mujahedeen, or Islamic holy warriors, have battled the Communist-style government in Kabul for 13 years and control six of Afghanistan's 31 provinces. Seizing Gardez would move the rebels closer to Kabul and be a major symbolic blow to President Najibullah.

The rebels said at least 13 government troops were killed and 15 injured in the first day of fighting. Their claims could not be independently verified.

The sources said an estimated 10,000 fighters were in the hills surrounding Gardez, pounding the city with heavy artillery fire. Diplomatic sources said the government has sent thousands of soldiers to Gardez in recent weeks.

Sources say the guerrillas were given as many as 200 Iraqi tanks captured during the war as reward for sending 200 fighters to the U.S.-led allied coalition.

Police, Maoists clash in India; 11 left dead

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Police shot and killed nine Communist guerrillas during a fierce gun battle in eastern India, a news agency reported Thursday.

One policeman and one villager also were killed in the fighting Wednesday in the village of Sarayya in Bihar state, the most backward of India's 25 states. The region is about 495 miles southeast of New Delhi.

Known as naxalites, for the Naxalbari region where their movement started, the guerrillas espouse a brand of militant Maoism.

Baker, King Hussein urge Palestinians

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Secretary of State James A. Baker III and King Hussein on Thursday jointly urged the Palestinians to attend a Mideast peace conference, saying they have the most to lose by not seizing an opportunity that the Jordanian leader said "may not come again, ever."

Baker said the United States was prepared to go ahead with the conference regardless of Palestinian participation. Hussein, whose populace is about half Palestinian, declined to say whether Jordan would do so — calling the Jordanian offer "premature" but declared "the time has come for people to act."

"We would be prepared to sponsor a conference that could proceed toward peace across the board," said Baker when asked at a joint news conference with the king whether the United States would go ahead if the Palestinians refused to attend.

Jordan was the third Arab country visited by Baker on a trip designed to firm up arrangements for the peace conference in the United States before he convenes in October. He also met with three Palestinians in Jerusalem on Monday immediately after conferring with Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir.

The secretary of state plans to fly

to Damascus, Syria, on Friday for a second meeting with President Hafez Assad. He met Tuesday with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak. At each stop Baker has circulated letters in which the United States lays out positions on a range of is-

ssues related to the peace process. For example, the letter to the Israelis said they would not be required to sit at the negotiating table with any delegation of which they disapproved.

That proviso effectively recognized an Israeli claim to veto power over any Palestinian delegation that continued members of the Palestine Liberation Organization or residents of East Jerusalem.

On the other hand, the letter to Assad reaffirmed U.S. support of Syria's demand for return of the Golan Heights, occupied by Israel since the 1967 Arab-Israeli war. In response to a report that the Palestinians he met with in Jerusalem had refused under PLO pressure to meet with him again in Amman, Baker said, "I would very much like to meet with the Palestinians we've been meeting with in Jerusalem, here or anywhere else."

The Palestine National Council is scheduled to meet in Algiers on Monday and there are conflicting reports as to whether the United States and Israel will endorse sending representatives to the peace conference as part of a Jordanian delegation.

Baker and Hussein appeared determined to send a strong message to the PLO not to torpedo efforts to bring Palestinians to the table.

"I hope they all realize time is slipping away," said Hussein. "The opportunity may not come again, ever."

Hussein said the alternative to a "peace conference" is disaster. Baker used similar language, saying he believes this is the best opportunity that has presented itself in a long, long time, he said. "If the opportunity is missed, in my opinion, the Palestinians have the most to lose because they also have the most to gain."

Prospects for convening the peace conference, to be co-sponsored by the Soviet Union, remain clouded by a range of issues.

Not only is Palestinian participation a question. There also is the dispute over housing loan guarantees, as well as differing interpretations of the meaning of United Nations resolutions calling for return of all occupied territories.

Arab governments and the United States view the resolutions as requiring Israel to give up the Golan Heights, the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. Israel regards the territory as having been annexed in war. The Israelis also have adamantly refused to negotiate any return of Jewish, Christian and Muslim holy places.

Tanks, artillery head toward Croatia

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (AP) — A huge column of Yugoslav army tanks, military vehicles and artillery thundered toward Croatia on Thursday in a show of strength apparently meant to intimidate the secessionist republic's forces.

The European Community, meanwhile, decided against dispatching an armed peacekeeping force to Yugoslavia. But the EC foreign ministers, meeting in the Netherlands, agreed to study the possibility of a later deployment.

In Croatia, scattered but violent outbursts of fighting marred a fragile cease-fire. The first violations of the truce — signed Tuesday by the leaders of the warring republics of Serbia and Croatia as well as the federal government — were reported only minutes after the cease-fire deadline on Wednesday.

The continued fighting called into question just how much control the republics and military leaders have over their fighters. Nearly 500 people have died and the republic's economy has

been nearly wrecked in fighting that followed Croatia's June 25 declaration of independence.

The military convoy that rolled out of Belgrade Thursday was at least 500 miles long, made up of about 100 battle tanks — T-55s and M-84s — armored personnel carriers, and trucks towing 155mm howitzers.

Its destination was not known, but it was traveling on the main highway to Zagreb, the Croatian capital. When asked where they were going, one soldier sitting atop a Yugoslav-built M-84 tank replied: "We're not sure. Probably to beat the Croats."

Thousands of people turned out to cheer the convoy, tossing cigarettes and sandwiches to the soldiers. Some of the trucks in the convoy were apparently requisitioned from Serbian firms because they had license plates of central Serbian cities.

The mobilization appeared to be an attempt by the military to intimidate Croatian fighters, who have blockaded federal garrisons in several key towns.

Israeli leaders question U.S. sincerity in urging Arabs to attend conference

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel accused the United States Thursday of tilting to the Arabs in its eagerness to draw them to a Mideast peace conference, and said that could be an obstacle to peace.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir claimed Washington had triggered "euphoria in the Arab world" by delaying Israel's request for housing loan guarantees for the sake of the peace conference.

"And this fact cannot advance peace but rather distance it," Shamir said in a meeting with Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, according to a statement from the prime minister's office.

Shamir also told the United States to "be objective and not stand on the side of one party," the statement said.

Later, dedicating a street in a Jewish neighborhood of Arab east Jerusalem, Shamir said he hoped the crisis would "pass as a nightmare."

He said he thought recent criticism from the United States would be short-lived. "This is not reality, it is not the American people," he told reporters. "The American people will return to themselves."

His comments underscored one of the worst crises to shake Israel-U.S. ties since Israel's birth in 1948. The tensions flared over President Bush's demand last week to delay Israel's request for \$10 billion in guarantees of loans needed to finance the influx of Soviet immigrants.

Bush's tough stand spotlights Israel's diminishing strategic value to the United States in the aftermath of the Soviet Union's demise as a superpower.

With Moscow having given up its influential role in the Arab world, Israel is less readily seen as a Western bulwark in the region.

Israel objects to Bush linking Soviet immigration to peace moves, and fears Washington is trying to force the Jewish state to agree to

give up Arab land even before peace talks get under way. Shamir's political aide, Yossi Ben Aharon, said U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III also suggested this week that to win the guarantees, Israel should freeze Jewish settlement building in the occupied territories.

More than 100,000 Jews have settled in the West Bank and Gaza Strip since Israel's capture of the territories from Jordan and Egypt during the 1967 Middle East war. These areas are home to 1.7 million Palestinians.

"It has become clear that the delays are only for putting pressure on the government of Israel prior to the negotiations," Ben Aharon said on Tuesday. He added a freeze of settlement construction was "inconceivable."

Harsher reactions were triggered by newspaper headlines quoting Baker as telling reporters on a flight to Cairo Tuesday he would not show another "inch of flexibility."

Twin Falls students' ACT, SAT scores climb in '91

TWIN FALLS - Twin Falls High School students scored well above state and national averages on the American College Testing examinations and Scholastic Aptitude Tests.

But maybe the most encouraging change this year was how much the average Twin Falls High composite scores improved over the previous class, School District officials say.

The 175 local students who took the test in 1991 had an ACT composite score of 22.6. In 1990, 211 local students took the tests and had an average composite score of 21.9. Students in 1991 scored 20.6 nationally and 21.1 in Idaho.

"I think these results speak for themselves," said Larry Watson, district spokesman. "We're very competitive."

On the SAT, students who took the test in 1991 scored 531 on the math section and 519 on the verbal section.

Students scored 474 on math and 422 on verbal nationally and 505 on math and 463 on verbal in Idaho.

SAT scores range from 200 to 800.

High school seniors take the ACT and SAT and direct the scores to be sent to colleges to which they are considering applying. Although both tests are widely used, most Idaho students take the ACT.

It's a four-part exam testing English, math, reading ability and scientific reasoning.

The multiple-choice test is scored on a scale of 1 to 36. The national average on the ACT, administered by American College Testing Service of Iowa City, Iowa, was based on the scores of 797,000 students who graduated from high school last spring.

The composite average of 20.6, was unchanged from 1990. The test is the predominant college entrance test in 28 states, mainly in the West and Midwest.

The average local scores were 22.5 for English, up from 21.7 in 1990; 21.4 for math, up from 20.6 the year before; 23.5 for reading and 22.3 for science. The 1990 scores for reading and science were not available.

Twin Falls High Counselor Laveta Younger said the four counselors at the school have been advising students to take the pre-ACT as sophomores, then the ACTs as juniors before taking the test a final time as seniors.

It's a good self-evaluator for them, she said. Students see their weaknesses and can beef up their skills in those areas, she said.

Watson said two main factors affect student performance on the college entrance tests: availability of advanced classes and a student enrollment in those classes.

"Students really need to extend themselves," he said. "They have to take some risk."

The students who performed the best took a higher percentage of academic classes than students who scored lower, Watson said.

An increasing number of students at the high school are taking advanced classes, Younger said. Younger said seeing students she works with excel is a job perk.

"When you see these kids come in and they are thrilled - I mean this is exciting," she said. "It makes it all worth while."

When the clerk asked the man if he was serious, the robber revealed a knife blade, and the clerk emptied one of the cash registers, the report says.

The man then fled in a newer model gray or silver import sedan, driving south on Eastland Drive, Lt. Jim Kistler said.

Kistler said he isn't sure how much money the man got away with, but the store usually doesn't keep much cash on hand.

The man is described as white, in his mid to late 30s, standing about 6-feet, 3-inches tall, with brown hair and mustache. He was wearing a blue baseball cap, a short-sleeved shirt and jeans.

He is accused of stabbing Dennis J. Beaupre, 28, also of Sun Valley, with a broken beer bottle.

"It is our understanding that the fight started within the bar," said Ketchum Police Chief Cal Nevland. "Then they moved out into the alley to fight."

When police responded to an anonymous call, they found Beaupre bleeding from a deep chest wound. He was transported to Moritz Community Hospital, where he was treated and released.

Upon arrest, Ruh was discovered to have a broken collar bone. He was also treated at Moritz Community Hospital before being booked at Blaine County Jail in Hailey. He is presently being held on \$5,000 bond.

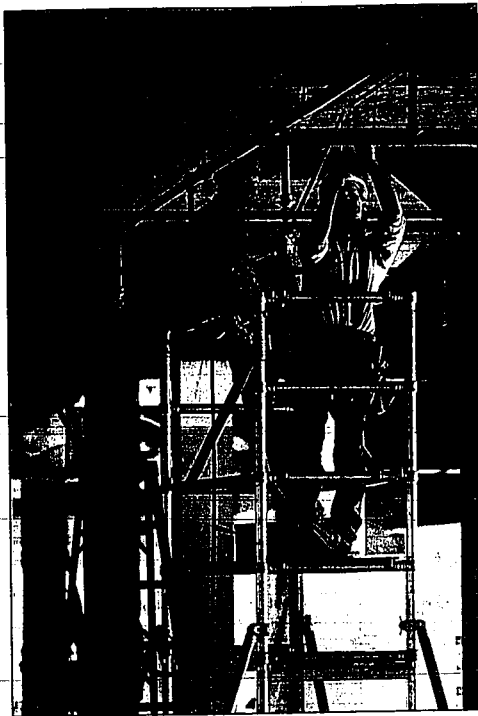
Heller has been mayor for 12 years. Reed replaced Councilman Jim Muscat in July after Muscat's death.

Mother's action has MADD results

BOISE - Four years ago, Betty Stadler killed her daughter Carol for the last time. That was on the afternoon of Jan. 26, 1987. Less than a week later, Carol Stadler Price was dead.

"If someone would have told me that I would never hug or kiss Carol again, except in a dream, I would not have believed them," said Stadler of Boise. Carol, 28, was killed by a drunken driver one Saturday night when she was traveling home after dinner.

But for Carol's mother it was not just one

loss. Stadler also lost her husband, Ben, who died two years later. To this day, Stadler believes her husband died of heartbreak over his daughter's death.

But Stadler decided not to sit back, but to change things. One year after Carol's death, Stadler founded Mothers Against Drunk Drivers in Idaho.

Since then, she has watched as MADD volunteers across the state have grown and are still increasing in numbers.

Through the group, Stadler says, she has kept her daughter's memory alive.

Carol, the mother of two young daughters, died in the middle of an exciting time in her life.

Carol and her husband Kelly had just finished building the home of their dreams. A week before Carol's death, she and her family went to a birthday party for Carol's adopted grandmother "Nana," who had just turned 86.

The whole family was there. Carol's six brothers and sisters, their families and Carol's parents Betty and Ben.

"When the birthday party was over I gave Carol a big kiss and hug because Ben and I were leaving for a business trip, and we wouldn't see her and her family until we got back," Stadler said.

On Saturday, five days after the big party, Stadler said.

Commission sets Auger Falls hearing

TWIN FALLS - Friends and foes of a plan to build a hydroelectric project at Auger Falls on the Snake River will get one last chance to state their views.

The Twin Falls County Commission will conduct a hearing sometime in mid-October on a conditional-use permit for the project, which was approved by the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission Sept. 12.

Since then, enough people have contacted the commission to merit a hearing, commissioners said Thursday.

"We've gotten a lot of letters," Commissioner Norma Bloss said. Under Idaho law, county commissioners have the final say on zoning and land use decisions, but it is unusual for the Twin

Falls Commission to hold a public hearing on a conditional-use permit, once it has been approved by the planning commission.

If the county issues the permit, the Auger Falls project developers need only a permit from the Army Corps of Engineers to begin construction.

The project would be located downstream from the Perrine Bridge, just below the Jerome County Club. The October hearing will give people from both sides a chance to show new evidence, particularly about stream flows, Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said. But Commissioner Jim Frley wondered if

they can stop the project because it is on private land. County Zoning Administrator Lee Taylor said the commission can overturn the conditional-use permit if it receives enough new evidence and testimony. When the planning commission OK'd a conditional-use permit for the project, some of those present at the hearing wanted new minimum stream flows considered in the decision. Two owners of land near the project also objected, saying they did not want road through their acreage used for public access to fishing ponds or a hiking trail that the project developers had promised to build. Cogeneration Inc., the Twin Falls-based hydro development company behind the project, has worked almost 10 years to

Jones presses case for Twin Falls split

2 districts might be the answer

TWIN FALLS - One way or another, Twin Falls County will probably end up with two districts in the reapportioned Legislature, Rep. Doug Jones said Thursday.

However, it's an open question as to what those districts will look like, the Filer Republican told a luncheon meeting of the Twin Falls Optimists Club. The Jones, who serves on the special reapportionment committee, would like to see the city of Twin Falls split between two county districts, with each district sending one senator and two representatives to Boise.

The urban and rural parts of the county depend heavily on one another, Jones said, and having two mixed districts would ensure that the interests of the county as a whole are represented.

Nearly all the redistricting plans submitted so far, though, make the city of Twin Falls one district and combine the rest of the county with parts of neighboring counties to form another district. Rep. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, supports such a plan.

The only other plan that splits Twin Falls city, presented in July by Rep. Evan Frasure, R-Pocatello, would place downtown and most of the city south of Addison Avenue in one district and the rest of the city in another.

Jones said the question of how to divide Twin Falls County, like all the other issues facing the committee, are up for negotiation when the panel meets in Boise Oct. 2 and 3.

"There's no plan that's been presented to this point that will pass," he said. "What we'll end up with is some compromise."

Even Frasure's plan, which some committee members have said is as good as dead, may have some life in it.

"I didn't think it was a particularly good option, but all the plans are still alive," Jones said.

When Jones asked the 30 or so people attending the luncheon to vote on which kind of plan they preferred, most chose the two-district approach.

Under either plan, some Magic Valley legislators will end up running against each other, Jones said. He, Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl, and Rep. Lee Barnes, R-Boise, will likely find themselves in the same district, as will Republican

Reps. Mark Stubbs and Ron Black, both of whom live in Twin Falls.

Republican Sen. Russell Newcomb, from the 1st District, will likely find himself in the same district with either Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, or Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

"Dr. Newcomb's in the middle," Jones said. "He got the short straw. He'll have to run against somebody."

Whether or not Gov. Cecil Andrus calls a special session of the Legislature on reapportionment depends on how the committed fares during its October session in Boise, Jones said.

"If we get a plan that everyone, or almost everyone, on the committee can agree on, I think the governor is almost obligated to call a special session," he said.

"Such a session would allow the Legislature to dispose of the redistricting issue in a few days, without the distraction of the budget and other issues, Jones said. It would also be cheaper than dealing with the issue during next year's regular session, he said, because only a half-dozen or so staff members would be needed.

Even if the Legislature passes a redistricting bill and Andrus signs it, it is very likely to be challenged in court, Jones said.

A court challenge, Jones said, could come from Hispanic or Indian groups if they don't feel the plan protects their political strength. From someone who thinks the plan gerrymanders one party or the other, from someone upset at their county being split between districts, or from "some group of disgruntled voters who don't like the district they're in."

Blaine schools pursue property

HAILEY - Blaine County School District has started eminent domain proceedings to seize property to expand the school.

School officials had given the owner of the parcel, Eliza Caplow, until noon Wednesday to make changes to a contract he had with the school. The district is hoping to buy a parcel of Caplow's land in the Northridge subdivision.

Because of overcrowding, the district hopes to build a new middle school on the site. Student enrollment has risen 171 students in the last year.

When Caplow failed to respond to the Wednesday deadline, school attorney Rand Peebles of Lawton & Peebles of Ketchum proceeded with eminent domain, said Cathy Zaccardi, school board clerk. The state of Idaho allows condemnation of land for the public good.

According to Peebles, the action could result in a jury trial. Jurors would decide whether to award the land to the district and also would set fair market value on the property, he said. Peebles said the court action could cost the district up to \$75,000.

Blaine County voters will have the opportunity to decide a \$12.5 million bond issue for the construction of a middle school and other renovations on Tuesday, Oct. 29.

Attorney: Shriver not stable the night of attack

TWIN FALLS — Strange noises and statements made by Donald Shriver after his release from prison show that the 25-year-old parolee didn't know what he was doing the night his mother was stabbed, his attorney said Thursday.

"The evidence raises sufficient doubt about the defendant's sanity on the night of Aug. 29, Twin Falls County Public Defender Mike Wood said during the first day of Shriver's preliminary hearing in Magistrate Court.

The preliminary hearing will continue Tuesday, and 5th District Magistrate Charles Wood will decide if Twin Falls County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Dan Mink has enough evidence to bind Shriver over for trial.

Shriver is charged with aggravated battery in connection with the Aug. 29 stabbing of his mother, Loretta Shriver of Buhl.

Shriver was taken to a police officer in connection with a fight that took place while Donald Shriver was being booked into jail.

Loretta Shriver said in court that her son reported hearing voices and thinking that someone was trying to send messages to him over the radio in the weeks following his release from prison.

After the stabbing, Loretta Shriver said she was lying in a pool of blood when her son walked past her while another knife and left the house.

"He didn't even see me," she said, her arms banded from the elbows down and resting on a small pillow.

This and earlier testimony that Donald Shriver made guttural sounds and growled is evidence he "was in fact delusional," Wood said. "There is no evidence he knew what he was doing or who he was doing it to," Wood said, asking that the charges be dismissed because Shriver lacked the criminal intent

required under Idaho law.

Mink said Shriver's actions provide plenty of proof that he knew what he was doing.

He grabbed a kitchen knife and said he was going to go outside and kill a calf he had been struggling with, then stabbed his mother repeatedly when she confronted him and ordered him not to kill the calf, Mink said.

He understood what he could do to the calf with the knife, "and he knew what it would do to his mother when he stuck her with it," Mink said.

Brumback took the motion for dismissal under advisement.

Shriver's mother said during the hearing that she and her husband tried to help their son during his earlier troubles with the law and again after he was released.

Shriver served five years in prison for battery on a police officer, and was released with one year remaining on a sentence for aggravated battery. His employment at the West Magic Care Center after his release has started a federal investigation of the Twin Falls nursing home.

The day of the stabbing, Shriver and his parents had lunch together and prayed, Loretta Shriver said. She recalled her son coming to her and holding her hand and her mother's hand and saying how thankful he was to be in their home and to be with his parents.

Wood said he plans to call three or four witnesses Tuesday to talk about Donald Shriver's attempt to stab Shriver will remain in the Twin Falls County Jail until completion of his preliminary hearing.

KART won't stop outside city.

SUN VALLEY — Requests for bus service outside the city limits of Ketchum and Sun Valley have been denied by the Ketchum Area Rapid Transits' board of directors.

During a Wednesday public meeting on 1992 winter routes, the KART board was asked to extend bus service north of Ketchum to the Hulden Meadows subdivision and as far south as Hailey.

Residents of the Weyyakin subdivision along Highway 75 also requested stops in their neighborhood.

"The inclination of this board is not to expand outside the city limits," said board chairman Dick Fosbury.

"KART is largely funded by local option taxes collected in Ketchum and Sun Valley. Fosbury explained. Consequently, its primary mission is to provide tourist transportation in those communities."

Fosbury also pointed out that KART's buses are not designed for commuter service or highway travel. In order to provide regular commuter service to Hailey, new equipment would have to be purchased.

"I'd be adverse to Weyyakin or Hulden Meadows, unless there's a user fee," Sun Valley Mayor Ruth Lieder told the board. She said she felt strongly that her council could not be asked to approve providing service outside the city limits.

"If they (the subdivisions) want to request annexation, terrific; then we'll provide service," she said.

KART Manager Terry Crawford included Weyyakin in his proposed routes for the winter season, but the board opposed any stops in the subdivision.

Buses would stop near the entrance to Weyyakin on Elkhorn Road, but will not continue north on Highway 75 with no stops until they reach Ketchum.

A revised "Blue" bus route will make stops at the newly annexed Lane Ranch subdivision for the first time this winter.

Buses will stop at Lane Ranch twice each hour during the daytime and once each hour in the evenings on a route that also includes The Ranch and Twin Creeks subdivisions in Sun Valley.

Crawford explained that all-bus stops served last year will receive similar service in 1992.

The scheduled KART River Run will continue to receive twice an hour service this winter, although ridership on that route has been sparse.

University of Idaho researchers unveil newest development

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho researchers say they have developed two computer chips that are drawing interest from space station contractors, medical imaging companies and NASA.

The chips, developed at the Moscow school's Microelectronics Research Center, allow roughly twice as much scientific imagery

information to be transmitted by satellite at high speeds without distortion than existing chips, designers Jack Venbrux and Muye N. Lui said Wednesday.

About 700 million bits per second — the equivalent of 40,000 typewritten pages — can be run through the computer chips, the researchers said.

The microchips are the size of a fingernail and are designed to work within a wide range of temperatures.

"I think this is a major advance for NASA in its communication systems," said Gary Maki, director of the Microelectronics Research Center, which is largely financed by NASA.

"It is going to surprise a lot of

people in the scientific community that it can be done so fast,"

The design on the chips took two years and was financed by NASA and its Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland.

Researchers said the space flight center is developing a probe to test the chips in an actual satellite link. But they are confident the chips will

work since thorough tests already have been conducted at the research center.

Venbrux said the new chips already are copyrighted and parts of them will be patented.

The University of Idaho's technology transfer arm, the Idaho Foundation, will make sure someone markets the product.

Coordination is urged for public transportation

BOISE (AP) — Idaho should prepare an overall public transportation plan, and the state Department of Transportation should do it, speakers at a legislative hearing said Thursday.

A legislative study committee is looking at public transportation needs, and spokesmen for Idaho's senior citizens said there's a pressing need for facilities to get the elderly to health care and other services, particularly in rural areas.

The session concentrated on the possibility of coordinating the use of state vehicles, such as school buses, for other purposes.

Some agency spokesmen said that could present problems; because certain types of users don't necessarily want to travel with other users.

Sen. Betty Benson, D-Moscow, urged a greater effort.

"It behooves us to get the best possible use of tax dollars," she said.

Lester Peck, a member of the legislative committee of the American Association of Retired Persons, told the morning session there was more public transportation available in the Nampa-Caldwell areas than there is now.

"Fifty years ago, trolleys ran between Canyon and Ada, and you could catch them every hour," he

said. Now, Canyon County is one of the most heavily populated areas of the state without public transit.

Jack Jones, Mountain Home, chairman of the state Advisory Council on Aging, said the last census showed Idaho has more than 83,000 residents age 70 and over, 19,000 in southwestern Idaho.

"Transportation is the number two need (behind affordable health care) expressed by the elderly in southwestern Idaho," he said. "The need has been at the top of the list for years."

Transportation services, such as taxis and buses, seldom are available in rural areas, he said, and elderly people are finding it increasingly hard to reach necessary services.

"Health care services are being centralized in urban areas," he said, which makes the problem worse because many elderly drivers don't want to drive in congested urban areas.

Ivan Hanson, Coeur d'Alene, another member of the Advisory Council on Aging, said the new federal highway bill will provide more money for public systems, but Idaho has to be able to take advantage of the money.

The Transportation Department should be given adequate resources and staff to do the necessary coordination, he said.

That evening they decided to go out for a quiet, relaxing dinner. They made arrangements to take their two little girls to the home of Kelly's mother; so they could spend some time alone together.

After returning to pick up the girls, they found them asleep; so they decided to show them to spend the night at grandma's house, Stadler recalled.

"I thank God that those little girls were asleep and not with Carol and Kelly," Stadler said.

"Carol and Kelly proceeded to drive the two and a half miles to their home when a man who had chose to spend his Saturday drinking beer drove through a stop sign hitting Carol and Kelly's car," Stadler said.

Carol was killed instantly. While Kelly lay on a ditch bank with a broken neck, the man who hit them got out of his pickup complaining that he needed to urinate, Stadler said.

While the Stadlers were on their business trip their daughter Judy was staying at their home, Stadler recalled.

Judy received a call from a police dispatcher, requesting that she call the hospital.

When she called, she was told that her mother was dead. In shock, Judy called the rest of the family and broke the news. The oldest son, Joe, said that he would notify their parents, who were still on a business trip.

"Joe was always calling me in the morning, just to say hello. But on this morning he said, 'Mom let me talk to dad.'"

"I said, 'Joe what a nice way to start my day hearing from you.' His voice cracked as he again said, 'Mom let me talk to dad.'"

Joe told Ben that there had been an accident, Carol was dead, and Kelly was in the hospital. Betty said that the couple figure out what was going

on through the conversation. After Ben got of the phone they made plans to go home.

"When we arrived we found Kelly partially paralyzed," said Stadler. "I knew that we had to plan Carol's funeral; so I decided to go out to her home to get something nice to bury her in."

Her other daughters tried to persuade me to let someone else do it, but I said that I tucked Carol in every night when she was growing up and I wanted to do it this one last time."

Stadler added her Ben could never forgive his daughter's death.

"He could not handle the senseless loss of Carol's life. Two years and two months after we buried Carol, I buried Ben," Stadler said as her voice quivered. "He died from a broken heart."

Six months after Carol died a friend sent the Stadlers a memorial from MADD.

Betty said that after some deep thought she decided to join the group. She said there was no local chapter. There wasn't one chapter in Idaho, so she decided to start one.

Most recently, Stadler has been instrumental in supporting the most recent MADD chapter in the Mini-Cassias area.

"Without MADD I might be dead. MADD has helped to get me through this. Driving drunk and killing an innocent person is a senseless crime; we have got to try to stop it from happening."

The minimum stream flow estimates on which the project is based were made using methods now several years old. Project engineer Bill Block said changing those estimates would change the economics of the whole project.

As part of its application to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, the developers had to promise public access to recreation area, and the fishing ponds are part of that condition of getting a FERC license.

The project would not require building a dam, but would require Snake River water into a powerhouse to produce 43.6 megawatts of electricity. The diversion wing would jut out into the river, measure 85 feet wide and 180 feet long and be visible from the Perrine Bridge.

Nampa teachers have tentative agreement

NAMPA (AP) — After more than four hours of bargaining Thursday afternoon, the Nampa School Board and striking teachers announced tentative agreement on a new contract.

Teachers struck Tuesday in a salary dispute. That led more than 400 teachers and about 7,700 students. But Thursday's negotiations produced an agreement that could end the walkout.

Thurs. Gilbert of the Idaho Education Association said details of the agreement won't be made public until teachers have a chance to vote on the tentative proposal Friday night. When he asked if it meant an end to the strike, he said, "It looks promising."

Teachers will be back in school Friday, but just for in-service training sessions. Students will remain home until at least Monday. Thursday's bargaining session was the first between the two sides since the strike started.

But in the Parma School District, teacher and school board negotiators met through the night to no avail, and teachers walked off the job at daybreak.

The district, however, conducted a half day of classes as planned, relying on some three dozen substitute teachers and at least seven regular teachers, who crossed picket lines thrown up by their colleagues, district spokeswoman Linda Emery said. About 59 percent of the district's 900 students were at their desks.

"While it's not the best of times, we're kind of excited to draw on the expertise of some members of the community," Superintendent Philip Reiter said. "The strikes are the first among Idaho teachers since a walkout in

Mountain Home during the spring of 1989.

No incidents were reported Thursday morning as Parma administrators tried to undermine the strike over medical benefits and personnel policies by continuing classes.

But Dianne Schutt, president of the teachers association, said, "There are a good number of older students who are driving up and down the street. Some are picketing. They're carrying signs saying, 'We need teachers, not babysitters.'"

No new talks have been set between Parma teachers and the professional negotiators hired by the board, that insists it has already put its best possible offer on the table. Schutt maintained "the board's got to get working with us. These negotiators they've hired are really throwing a wrench into the works."

Money was at the heart of the strike in Nampa with the two sides some \$150,000 apart on a pay schedule that would boost starting salaries by \$1,000 to \$17,000 and push the rest of the scale upward.

Teachers got letters advising them to show up for work Friday or risk being fired.

"I feel discouraged," high school teacher Sandy Russo said. "It's real intimidating. I have two children. I don't have a paycheck. I can't feed them."

Superintendent Steve Schmitz agreed the letter "probably smacks of confrontation. It smacks of going in a direction contrary to our goal."

But, he said, "This is a legal step. Our real priority is focused on settlement."

Canyon lawmakers have no vote regrets

BOISE (AP) — The 10 Canyon County lawmakers who opposed an amendment to increase public school spending by \$5 million earlier this year said they stand by their votes.

Had the amendment passed, the Nampa School District would have received an estimated \$74,000 more this year, according to the Department of Education.

That's about half the \$150,000 separating teachers and the district in the current strike. Salaries were not a major problem in the Parma School District's teacher strike. Both districts are in Canyon County.

Legislators had no regrets Wednesday about shooting down the higher funding, especially in light of the 1.3 percent budget holdback ordered by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"It was a budget buster then and it's even more of a budget buster now," said Sen. Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, who joined Sen. George Vance, R-Parma, in opposing the \$5-million amendment when it passed the Senate 38-4.

"You can't invest money at the state Capitol and that's what they were trying to do," Vance said. The House killed the amendment, 49-32, with all eight Canyon County lawmakers opposing the increase.

Among the 12-member Canyon delegation, only Sens. Atwell Parry, R-Melba, and David Kerriek, R-Caldwell, voted for the addi-

tional \$5 million. Kerriek said Wednesday that he still wanted to see education "get a little bigger piece of the pie." But he said he overestimated the state's revenue in voting for the increase.

"In hindsight, I was wrong," Kerriek said. "The revenue was not there. I think my vote was fine, it's just that perhaps we should have been a little tighter on some of the other budgets."

Operating under much tighter guidelines than, in past year, each of the four schools submitted two budget plans — one intended to comply with requirements imposed by Andrus and the other accommodating the less stringent directives of the Legislative Budget Office.

Andrus mandated that spending proposals submitted for consideration as part of the 1993 budget he will present lawmakers in January eliminate any spending for equipment or other goods, reduce operating expenses by 3 percent and then call for no more than a 5 percent increase over the amount needed to maintain existing operations under those conditions.

Bush: No plans for 'Son of Desert Storm'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Stepping up his warning to Saddam Hussein, President Bush insisted Thursday that he had no plans for a "Son of Desert Storm" operation but will use U.S. air power if necessary to protect helicopters of U.N. weapons inspectors in Iraq.

"To allay the concerns of America, I would simply say we're not talking about massive troop movements. ... What we are talking about, if required, is accompanying helicopters with some air power. And we've got a lot of air power there," he said.

Bush made the comments in an interview with Hispanic journalists from the Los Angeles area after a day of public appearances and remarks concentrated on domestic programs. He had railed at congressional Democrats during stops at a mass transit construction site in California and a political fund-raiser in Oregon.

Thirty people were arrested in protests over a variety of issues at Portland, and police used pepper gas to control the crowd.

The president said he was trying to use the mass media to communicate with Saddam. The White House released a transcript of the Iraq portion of the interview only a few hours after it took place, a departure from the usual practice of withholding transcripts until articles by the interviewing journalists had appeared.

The president said he was sure that his ultimatum to Saddam to permit the U.N. inspectors free access to his country would be "joined by countries all around the world."

Saddam "must comply," Bush declared.

"When a president makes a statement like that, he ought not to do it without being willing to back that up," he said.

"We don't need lots of troops and

to mobilize a whole 'Son of Desert Storm' operation. The way to diffuse it is for Saddam Hussein to do what the U.N. is calling on him to do. One way is to have him understand that if he doesn't, he is going to find that we are prepared to use military action to see that he does comply."

Bush said the United States would

not be alone in military action, but "We'll have others with us."

His stern warning came in language even sharper than he had used the day before when he said he was "fed up" with Saddam and would send warplanes back to the Persian Gulf if necessary to protect the U.N. inspectors.

Bush said that Saddam should recall from the Persian Gulf War last winter that "thanks to our technology and to the ability of our pilots, that we can be very specific as we apply this air power."

At the same time, Bush said he wanted to assure the country that he was not considering a massive mobilization. "That's not what we're talking about here," the president said.

The president said that Saddam had earlier miscalculated an America's willingness to use military force. "He had no idea what was going to happen to him."

"That's now history," Bush added. "He knows what we can do. And so it is my gut feeling that he will do that which he should have done long ago — and that is comply with the letter of the United Nations resolutions."

Then, Bush said he wanted to deliver a personal message to Saddam through the news media:

"I would just like to take this opportunity to say to him ... he should comply. He should not miscalculate again. I've never been more determined," the president said.

Colleges press for hike in state aid in new plan

BOISE (AP) — The presidents of Idaho's three universities and Lewis-Clark College pressed the state Board of Education on Thursday to forward their 6 percent increase in state aid to Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"We have been growing at a very rapid rate and continue to do so," Idaho State University President Richard Bowen told the board.

And Idaho President Ebenize Zinner said the budget was drafted with proceeding existing programs as a top priority and then tapping what is acknowledged to be a limited amount of new state tax money to improve and extend higher education services throughout the state.

The board was expected to review the budget plans and adopt its final recommendations for the spending year that begins next July 1 on Friday.





Coeur d'Alene misses clean air mark

COEUR D'ALENE — Coeur d'Alene apparently has joined Pinehurst, Boise and Pocatello among Idaho cities failing to meet federal clean air standards.

While official designation of Coeur d'Alene's "non-attainment" status by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is a few weeks away, air samples taken by the state indicate Coeur d'Alene has exceeded the federal standard for "PM-10" particulate matter since 1989.

That probably would mean wood stove regulations and curtailment of other smoke and dust once the sources are identified, officials said Wednesday.

Hayden man serves prison term

COEUR D'ALENE — A Hayden man who pleaded guilty to breaking into northern Idaho cabins and taking women's lingerie has been sentenced to a suspended prison term and probation.

Steven D. Burris, 26, also must undergo psychological counseling as a condition of his five-year supervised probation. 1st District Judge Gary Haman said Wednesday.

In addition, Burris will be required to pay a still undetermined amount of restitution to cabin owners and barred from possessing pornographic or sexually explicit material.

Clark Fork resident dies in accident

CLARK FORK — A Clark Fork man was killed when his pickup truck plunged off Idaho Highway 200 into the Clark Fork River four miles east of Clark Fork, Idaho State Police said.

William D. Truax, 38, was eastbound about 5 p.m. Wednesday when his pickup left the road and went down a 30-foot embankment, ISP Cpl. Chris Yount said.

The pickup came to rest in about nine feet of water. Truax was pulled to shore by an emergency medical technician about 20 minutes later. He was taken to Bonner General Hospital in Sandpoint, where he was pronounced dead.

Sewage dumping has residents upset

COEUR D'ALENE — Boaters are pumping sewage from on-board toilets into Lake Coeur d'Alene at night when no one is around, waterfront residents say.

"The dumping is going on," said Pat Ryan, who lives at Rockford Bay. "We can hear the dumping going on."

Several lake-side residents said they frequently hear sewage pumps churning on large boats at night. On Wednesday, they asked the Clean Lakes Coordinating Council to help stop the pollution.

"Dumping sewage in lakes Coeur d'Alene and Pend Oreille is unhealthy and unwholly but not a violation of federal law, council director Ed Javorka said.

Court backs wrongful death outcome

POCATELLO — The U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals has agreed with the decision of an Idaho federal judge against a wrongful death lawsuit filed against the city of Pocatello by a Fran Hall woman.

Debbie Jean Bigger wed after husband, Shannon, was shot to death in 1985 as officers responded to a domestic disturbance call at the Biggers' residence. U.S. District Judge Marion Callister granted the city's motion for summary judgment.

Mrs. Bigger claimed officer Steve Findley used excessive force. The officers testified Shannon Bigger was shot when he lunged at them with a knife.

The federal appeals court said Mrs. Bigger did not allege nor did the record show that police harbored any desire to search the Biggers' residence. Rather, the court said, police went to the residence solely to aid Debbie Bigger in retrieving her clothing.

Man not guilty in manslaughter case

POCATELLO — An Idaho Falls man accused of vehicular manslaughter in the deaths of two men, including his best friend, has been found innocent by a 6th District Court jury.

A jury of five women and one man exonerated John Mucci, 69, of the misdemeanor charges on Wednesday night after deliberating about four hours, Bonneau County Prosecutor Bill Bacon said.

Mucci was charged with the Oct. 25, 1990, deaths of Ernest Hodgson, 57, of Canada, and Carmen Galassi, 80, of Idaho Falls, Hodgson walking on the shoulder of Interstate 15 north of Pocatello to aid the driver of a logging truck that had overturned when it was struck by a car driven by Mucci. Galassi, Mucci's front seat passenger, was killed after Mucci rear-ended a parked vehicle moments later.

Driggs man dies after freak accident

DRIGGS — A freak farming accident has claimed the life of Wayne Wright, 54, of Driggs.

The Teton County sheriff's office said Wright was working with a bucket loader Tuesday and got caught between the moving bucket and the machine's frame. The bucket crushed his chest and he died before rescue workers arrived at the scene.

A sheriff's department spokesman said it was unknown how Wright got stuck in the machine.

Edwards opposes the 1 Percent Initiative, an effort Rankin is leading to cap Idaho property tax assessments, and she contends he released word of her pending trip in retaliation.

"The issue was that he was trying to intimidate me to try to get me to withdraw from my straightforward approach to discussing the real realities of the 1 Percent and its impact on the economy," she said during a swing through Lewiston.

Edwards said she never announces her travel plans in advance since she believes her absence from the office could leave the treasurer's office staff vulnerable to security problems.

As an example, she cited a man living in a bus parked outside the Statehouse in Boise who she contends holds the state responsible for a false arrest as well as personal and financial problems dating back a decade.

"He's not well. He's emotionally charged with revenge," Edwards said. "What I'm trying to say is if people think the treasurer is not doing a better job, there's a greater security risk that the office is more vulnerable, always."

Rankin raised the issue of Edwards' trip earlier this week, questioning whether the treasurer would be using state money and traveling on state time.

"I can't understand for what purpose a treasurer of Idaho would be going to the Soviet Union," the Idaho Property Owners Association president said. "We didn't elect Lydia to go over to Russia to teach them how to bail out a damned bankruptcy."

Edwards said the trip was in keeping with her view that the West should provide the Soviets with expertise rather than a cash bailout.

She was in Lewiston to thank Nez Perce County officials for their support of the Horseshoe Bend Hill highway project. As a state legislator during the early-1980s, Edwards successfully sought federal highway money to improve the winding section of U.S. Highway 55 leading to

Toilet paper charges hit end of the roll

DUBOIS (AP) — It's the end of the roll for the so-called "toilet paper" case. A magistrate judge has dismissed a charge against a man accused of stealing a roll of toilet paper from his employer in Clark County.

Nicolas Carrera, 31, of Oaxaca, Mexico, was arrested June 9 and accused of taking a partial roll of toilet paper from the potato processing plant near Dubois where he worked.

Carrera's arrest sparked criticism from human rights leaders who believe he was the victim of unnecessarily harsh treatment and discrimination. The toilet paper was valued at less than \$7, but Carrera was held in jail for five days before he was released.

He wasn't able to contact the public defender, who was on vacation, or to post the \$2,000 cash bond required by Magistrate Mildred McClure. Carrera was released after bond was reduced to \$500.

Magistrate Colin Luke dismissed the charge last week after a hearing. He said a jury trial "would not promote justice or judicial economy."

The magistrate said he wasn't dismissing the charge because of a motion from Carrera's attorney contending the man was illegally arrested.

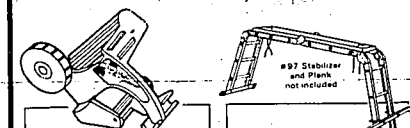

Medley tries to touch on emotions

JACKPOT — Opening for the Beatles was a drag.

In 1964, Bill Medley and Bob Hatfield were just getting a name for themselves as The Righteous Brothers.

In their native California, they had a strong following and had recorded a few songs that were hits on the West Coast.

So when the Beatles made their first tour of the United States, promoters chose the new Righteous Brothers as the opening act.

"That was before we had the big national hits," Medley said this week in a telephone interview. "It was real tough. The audiences were chanting, 'We want the Beatles.'"

Although the job brought a lot of national exposure, Medley said he isn't sure if the publicity was good or bad.

"It was painful, I'll tell you that," he said.

"The Beatles were good guys and it was fun to be out there with them, but it was absolutely impossible to perform," he recalled. "It was so crazy. We left that tour halfway through and went home and made a pilot for a (television) show called "Shindig" that went on the air and became real big."

Medley and Hatfield first began their singing careers as solo artists with their own bands in southern California. Through mutual friends, they met and started singing as a duo.

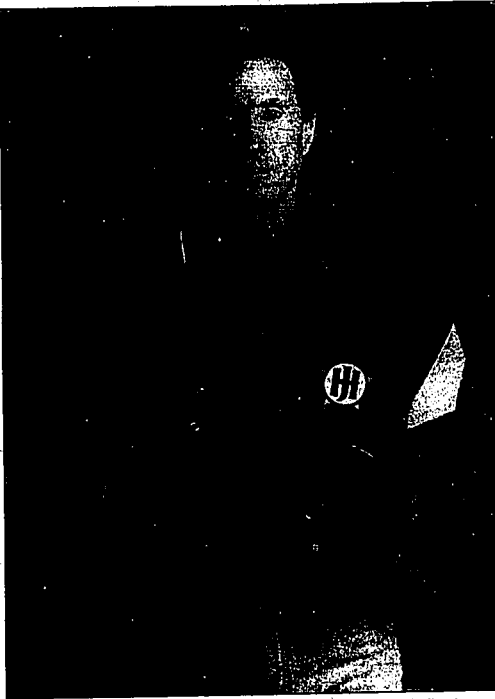
They named themselves "The Paramores," but their audience called them "The Righteous Brothers."

"Some black guys that would come into the club used to call us that," Medley recalled. "You had a nice coat on, they would say, 'Hey, that's a righteous coat,' and if they liked you as a friend, they'd call you 'brother.' So they started calling Bobby and me 'The Righteous Brothers,' which meant good friends."

From 1962 to 1968, the Brothers' sound became known as "blue-eyed soul," and their most famous songs were "Soul and Inspiration," "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling" and "Unchained Melody."

In happier experiences as an opening act, the Brothers toured with The Rolling Stones and, oddly enough, with Jack Benny.

"We were the opening act for Jack Benny for two weeks," Medley said, when asked to pick a highlight of his career. "That was

great. I've always had fun on stage with everybody, but that seemed to be pretty special. He would come out and we would do a monologue together and he would bring his violin."

But by the late 1960s, Medley said, pop music had changed to hard rock played by

long-haired, bearded singers wearing T-shirts and jeans.

"We were, for the first time, having trouble getting our records played," he said.

So the Brothers split up to pursue solo careers. When he wasn't touring on his own, the tall, lanky Medley with his bass

voice opened shows for various artists, including Alabama, Loretta Lynn and James Brown.

"So it's been a variety," he said.

In 1987, Medley recorded "I've Had The Time of My Life" with Jennifer Warnes for the movie "Dirty Dancing." The song won a Golden Globe award, an Oscar and a Grammy for "Best Pop Performance By A Duo or Group." The video from the film, featuring Medley and Warnes singing, was voted the No. 1 video of 1987.

In addition, Medley broke a record held by Aretha Franklin for having the longest gap between No. 1 songs, from her 19 years 10 months to his 21 years 7 months.

More recently, Medley and Hatfield together revived their hit, "Unchained Melody," for the movie "Ghost."

Medley now tours with his own five-piece band about four or five months a year and joins Hatfield two months a year to perform as "The Righteous Brothers."

The rest of the time, he spends with his family, including his son Darin, 26, and his daughter Makinna, 4.

Also, Medley just finished recording a new album called "Blue Eyed Singer." The first single from it, released about three weeks ago, is "Don't Let Go."

Medley describes himself as "just a street singer" who has performed many styles of music.

He explained, "When they say, 'What are you? Are you country, are you this or are you that, I say I'm basically just a rock and roll singer. Kind of a blues rock and roll singer. Well, a blues-country rock and roll singer."

On stage, Medley said he has always tried to make his audiences laugh a little, cry a little and maybe think a little, too.

"I'm an emotional singer and I just try and touch on the emotions," he said. "There's a lot of memories in my show."

Numerous album releases try to fight recession

All summer, it seemed as if everyone in the music industry was singing the same song: the "Business Is Bad" blues. As the fall arrives, few expect to change their tune — but they are changing their tactics.

Those on the concert side are scaling back after a summer that saw ticket sales off by 20 percent and several major tours canceled. There are some stars hitting the road now — soul crooner Luther Vandross, hard rockers Van Halen and dance idol Paula Abdul among them — but many more will be sitting out the season in hope that the new year will bring better business.

Record stores, on the other hand, are facing a veritable avalanche of new albums — a release list that, incredibly enough, seems longer than last year's.

Why would record companies respond to a recession — a time when album sales are down to 10 percent — by pumping out more product? Largely because most in the business believe that the best way to get music fans back into the

stores is to give them something to buy. And there will be plenty to choose from this fall.

Guns N' Roses has unleashed two albums: "Use Your Illusion I" and "Use Your Illusion II." Also due out this fall are potential million-sellers by U2, Michael Jackson, Genesis, Dire Straits, M.C. Hammer, Prince and Bobby Brown. (But still no word on when Bruce Springsteen will deliver.)

Nor will new albums be the only big noise, thanks to a crush of box set reissues, including multidisc compilations by Ray Charles, Barbra Streisand, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Aerosmith, Fats Domino and Glenn Miller.

A number of albums should settle the "Is Rock Dead?" debate.

There are new releases due from a host of old-school rockers, including U2's "Achtung Baby" on Nov. 19, John Cougar Mellencamp's "Whenever We Want To" on Oct. 8, Paul McCartney's oldie-packed "Choba B CCCP" (time-Russia-for-Buck-In-the-U.S.S.R.) due Oct. 15, and an as-yet-untitled Genesis album scheduled for Nov. 12.

Dire Straits' "One Every Street" is in record stores and is reported to be well worth the six-year wait since the group's last studio album, "Brothers in Arms."

There are also live albums from Eric Clapton ("24 Nights," Oct. 10), Keith Richards ("Live Through Bootleg Record," Nov. 26), Neil Young and Crazy Horse (the double-disc "Wrench," Oct. 10) and Paul Simon ("In Central Park," from the HBO Special, Oct. 29).

Still, we can expect rap, R&B and dance acts to maintain their grip on the pop charts, particularly given the release schedule this season. Starting with Mariah Carey's sophomore effort, "Emotions" (out now) we should see new albums from Prince & the N.E.G. ("Diamonds and Pearls," Oct. 1), Public Enemy ("Apocalypse 91: The Enemy Strikes Black"), Tone-Loc (untitled, Nov. 5), MC Hammer ("Releasing Some Pressure," Oct. 29) and Lisa Stansfield ("A Little More Love," Nov. 12).

But the big question is how Michael Jackson's "Dangerous," due sometime in October, will fare against Bobby Brown's as-yet-untitled album due the following month.

Tomorrow arrives next week for 'Gone With the Wind' sequel

ATLANTA (AP) — Tomorrow has finally come for Scarlett O'Hara. Rhett Butler is dumping her — again — only this time he'll pay her \$500,000 to stay out of his life forever.

Scarlett would never go hungry again with that kind of money. But can she live without Rhett? Thousands of die-hard fans of "Gone With the Wind," awaiting the answer to that and other questions, have already reserved copies of the book's long-awaited sequel, "Scarlett."

Others aren't so anxious to see the book arrive in stores next Wednesday. Five writers recently denounced "Scarlett," written by Alexandra Ripley, in essays published in the Atlanta Journal-Constitution.

Other people have proposed their own sequels, including one in which Scarlett becomes a feminist. Her "character" who is exposed by her children.

Meanwhile, Clayton County south of here — the real-life setting for Tara; the O'Hara family plantation is ignoring the whole thing.



This Atlanta house, known as "The Dump," where Margaret Mitchell wrote "Gone With the Wind" may benefit from the book's sequel "Scarlett" in the form of \$1.5 million for restoration.

"In the new 'Gone With the Wind,' attention is drawn away from Clayton County away from the ruins of Margaret Mitchell," said Alison Scholly, marketing coordinator of the county's Convention and Tourism Bureau. Mitchell's family hired Ripley to

write the sequel and hopes it will help raise \$1.5 million to restore the dilapidated Atlanta house in which Mitchell, who died in 1949, wrote the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel.

Writers Books did almost \$3 million for the publishing rights, and thousands of fans are expected at a benefit showing Sunday of the 1939 film version of "Gone With the Wind."

"It's perfect timing," said Mitchell's cousin, Lillian Clarke. "It's a good excuse for us to be playing on, but I don't feel like, even if people don't like the sequel, it will have a detrimental effect on us."

Clarke says she isn't sure she'll like the book herself.

"I'm already disappointed," she said after reading excerpts of "Scarlett" that appeared in this month's Life magazine.

"This is terrible. I shouldn't say this, but — I think everybody has their own personal feeling about what happened to them," she said. "Seeing anything in print is like an invasion of your privacy."

The only thing publicly known

about Ripley's plot is what was revealed in the Life excerpts. They have Rhett reunited with Scarlett in his old hometown of Charleston, S.C., then offering her \$500,000 to leave him. He also saves her life at sea, divorces her and marries another woman.

Other people, responding to a request from The Birmingham (Ala.) News for proposed sequels, had other ideas.

Bernice Downs imagined that Scarlett's two surviving children, Wade Hamilton and Ella Kennedy, took "tales of abusive neglect to the airwaves."

Meanwhile, Scarlett's younger sister, Carreen, became a partner in a restaurant, using a sure-fire recipe for sweet-and-sour chiles.

Pearl Cleage, one of the five Southern writers who wrote opinions of the book based on the Life excerpts, didn't mince words.

Cleage, author of "Mad as Mites: A Blackwoman's Guide to Truth," called the sequel "one of the worst things I've ever read."

she said, "I would definitely urge the person to take up another field."

Nevertheless, 5,000 people are expected to show up for Ripley's first book-signing Sept. 28 at a Rich's department store in Atlanta. Six thousand people have already reserved copies through Rich's.

"People may not read it, but they're going to have the book because it's going to be the most talked-about book since I can't even tell you when," said Faith Brunson, a book buyer at Rich's for 31 years.

"And this is going to be the biggest book-signing by anybody ever," she said.

Well, maybe not that big. Clarke recalls that her cousin autographed enough copies of "Gone With the Wind" to fill two railroad cars and sent them to fans worldwide.

"Can you imagine an author nowadays doing that?" she asked.

"She was so exhausted, her hand was so swollen, that she quit doing it. Then she would write people letters explaining why she couldn't sign their book — and then they had this wonderful letter with her signature!"

New series 'Brooklyn Bridge' recalls a golden past

NEW YORK — It is no accident that "Brooklyn Bridge" is suffused with an absolutely clear, golden light. It is the warm, gentle light of memory and dreams, and it is the special magic of this beautiful little series.

Set in the borough of Brooklyn in 1956, "Brooklyn Bridge" is nothing more significant, or less, than a recollection of the extended family of Jules and Sophie Berger (Louis Zorich and Marion Ross).

They live downstairs from their daughter, Phyllis (Amy Aquino), and son-in-law, postal worker George Silver (Peter Friedman). They help raise their grandsons, 14-year-old Alan (Danny Gerard) and 9-year-old Nathaniel (Matthew Siegel).

In tonight's pilot episode, written and directed by series creator Gary David Goldberg ("Family Ties"), we get to meet the family. Absolutely nothing calamitous takes place. It is astonishingly lifelike.

Sophie plays mahjongg; Jules reads the Forward newspaper; Nathaniel is upset because Alan told him that he, like all mortals, must die.

Phyllis goes to work, the boys to

school. Alan encounters the girl he admires. Classroom scenes ensue. A friendship is tested. Phyllis helps Alan learn to dance. A friendship is mended. George comes home from the post office.

Don't confuse this with nostalgia or its counterparts. This is not a '90s update of "Happy Days," despite the presence of Marion Ross (who played Richie's Mom, Marion, in the long-running ABC sitcom).

"Brooklyn Bridge" gives her the opportunity to show her considerable

talent as an actress. Zorich, as her husband, is a distinguished character actor who evokes a calm, dignified and jolly grandpa.

Viewers may not cotton immediately to 14-year-old Alan, who seems to have more snappy comebacks than a Catskills comedian. He and his friends have dialogue that's a tad advanced for their age, but it's forgivable.

Despite his snappy patter, Gerard's performance is totally guileless. He's not up there playing it cute. The same goes for Siegel. His performance is unforced and natural.

It seems as if Goldberg is trying to create a show out of dozens of tiny details: impressions and shadows. Nothing is wasted. Every detail must contribute to the exposition of character. Plot is secondary.

Consider this fine moment in tonight's pilot when the boys' father comes home from the night shift at the post office.

It's late, he's tired and he's ascending the final flight of stairs to his apartment, his home. He doesn't sigh or slouch or yawn or otherwise "indicate" that it's late and he's tired. Instead, you see it all in his eyes, the set of his shoulders and the barely

perceptible easing of his features as he reaches the landing. Suddenly, we know George as no one else knows him. And we like him.

Goldberg didn't go for "high concept," in which you can explain a series in one breath or less. There's no laugh track. There's not one pit-down-joke.

Inside the everyday framework he created, the actors of "Brooklyn Bridge" are creating beautifully detailed portraits of ordinary people.

Lavish production values make the world of "Brooklyn Bridge" as bright and shiny as a spring morning. The colors of the cars and buildings are bright and beautiful. The streets are clean. The morning air is practically luminous.

You can try to resist that squeaky clean-world full of promise and potential, but it's seductive. So what if the world of 1956 was not all sunshine and sweetness? Let it reside in "Brooklyn Bridge."

After all, this is only a memory of 1956, a waking-dream-of-what-it should have been.

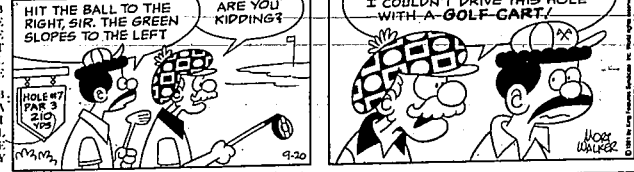

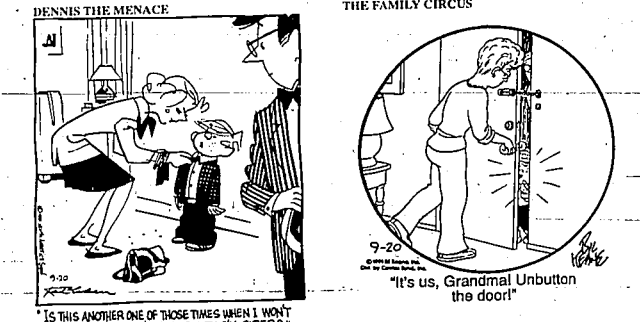
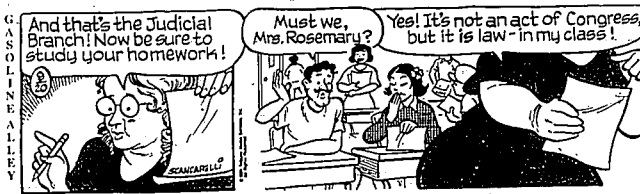

If it weren't for Kathleen Turner, "V.I. Warshawski" could be written off as just the latest in a long, long line of bad film noir imitations, one more shadowy mystery hero who is seduced by a gruff, wisecracking private eye who likes his drinks hard and his women soft.

But Turner plays Warshawski-V.I. for Very Inquisitive-or-Vic, if you are a friend-so this is something altogether new: a very bad film noir imitation about a gruff, wisecracking private eye who likes her drinks hard and her men, too. I would like to be able to report that "V.I. Warshawski" is more evidence that Hollywood is becoming gender-blind, that studios have recognized the appeal of strong female characters and are willing to take more chances with them. But this is nothing more than a stunt designed up by wisecracking studio executives who like their stories obvious and their endings doubled.

Warshawski" is apparently what your money buys from conscientious Disney these days: a script that feels as if it was lifted from the files of "Boston Blackie," a hack director (Jeff Kanew's credits include "Goathead" and "Troop Beverly Hills"), and one star, just one, Charles Durning shows up in a small role as a police lieutenant whose only apparent duty is to keep Chicago's finest from getting in Warshawski's way, but there are few other recognizable faces and no performances worth remembering.

Turner is an actress noted for surviving daring career choices, but she may have gone bungee jumping once too often.

Gender aside, Warshawski is so thinly developed that there is no way an actor could flesh her out. V.I. may have been married, but not that she says that she was a lousy housewife before she became a happy detective. So to whom was she married, Mannix? And when will Hollywood understand that having women characters know sports, talk tough and live like slots does not solve the big-screen gender deficit?

The writers, supposedly working from a set of V.I. Warshawski novels by Sara Paretsky, did come up with a few good, male-baiting lines for her, the best of which is, "Never underestimate a man's ability to underestimate a woman's."

'City Slickers' not original but still funny

A showpiece scene, where Junior speeds up a carnival tilt-a-whirl and everyone vomits. Loud direction by Brian Levant. Be forewarned: even if you liked the "P.C. 1," this one's bad to the bone.

PURE LUCK (PG)—Marin Short can do no wrong in this remake of a French comedy about a terminally accident-prone accountant set on the

track of a similarly afflicted heiness. But funny as he is, Short is not in a position to carry the entire picture, and neither co-star Danny Glover nor director Nadia Tass nor the same screenwriters who penned "Twins" and "Kindergarten Cop" offer very much help.

TWIN FALLS — Suzanne Faust, contract in hand is heading to Nashville to pursue her entertainment career full time in the town where country music stars are made.

Justs said three years from now she would like to have a major album in which she would perform her own music. A single parent, Justs would take her two young children on road tours with her, providing them with home teaching along the way.

2 more Abbott and Costello features released on video

Had the "Who's on first?" routine been the only thing Bud Abbott and Lou Costello ever did, their places as legends in show business would have been secured.

But the comedy team did much more than that. For 15 years, they entertained millions with their movies, radio shows and television appearances. Prior to that, Abbott, the shifty straight man, and Costello, the chubby not-so-bright foil, had done their bits on the vaudeville circuits around the country.

A Universal scout spotted them and in 1939 they made their film debut as supporting players in "One Night in the Tropics." They were immediate hits with the movie-going public and would never have supporting roles again. They went on to star in 35 films through 1956.

Their trademark was the cross-talking banter ex-

emplified by "Who's on first?" which was spotlighted in their 1945 film "The Naughty Nineties," but they were loaned out to such studios as MGM, Warner Brothers and the now defunct Eagle-Lion. After 1955's "Abbott and Costello Meet The Mummy," Universal declined to renew their contract. The boys made one more film together, the disappointing "Dance With Me Henry" for United Artists in 1956.

The two parted company after that and never again achieved the fame they enjoyed as a team. Costello died in 1959 at age 53 and Abbott died in 1974 at age 79.

This month, MCA/Universal Home Video has issued two more Abbott and Costello features on cassette. Both were originally released in 1941 and are part of a trilogy that saw the daffy duo sample different branches of the armed forces.

"In The Navy" obviously has the boys... well... in the Navy. Things get wacky when Lou hallucinates that he is the captain of a battle ship and starts issuing orders. Also in the cast are Dick Powell and the Andrews Sisters.

"Keep 'Em Flying" had Bud and Lou as new recruits in the Army Air Corps. The climax has Lou taking up a plane solo in one of the dizziest flights ever recorded on film.

The two videos are priced at \$14.95 each, as are nine previously released Abbott and Costello films: "Who's on First" (1941); "Bud and Lou" (1941); "The Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy of Company B" (1941); "Abbott and Costello collection: 'Abbott and Costello Meet Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde' (1953); 'Abbott and Costello Meet Frankenstein' (1948); 'Hit the Ice' (1942); 'Hold That Ghost' (1943); 'Who Done It?' 

Poor domestic trade figures seen as bad economic recovery sign

WASHINGTON — America's trade deficit took a sharp turn for the worse in July as imports of foreign cars, clothing and electronics soared while exports showed only a slight improvement...

higher than a revised June deficit figure of \$3.79 billion.
Bush administration officials contended that the report did not shake their belief that export growth will be a major factor helping to lift the country out of the recession.

Imports, reflecting increased shipments of a variety of consumer products, jumped 6.9 percent to \$4.1 billion while exports edged up 0.8 percent to \$35.27 billion in July.
Commerce Secretary Robert Mrosbacher said the increase pushed exports to their highest level ever, a gain that he said reflected in part an administration initiative to get small and medium-sized businesses interested in selling overseas.

But private economists noted that the small July gain followed two straight months of declines and that all the improvement was concentrated in farm products and raw materials, not in manufactured goods.
The boom in exports over the last two years played a major role in softening the severity of the recession, which began in July 1990. But with some of America's major overseas markets showing economic weaknesses, analysts believe that export

growth will slow to a crawl in coming months.
Economists were puzzled by the big jump in imports given the fact that consumer demand has been so weak this year. Retail sales fell in August following a lackluster back-to-school selling period and analysts are "not optimistic of a pickup in demand anytime soon, given persistent layoffs in recent weeks and continued high unemployment levels."



When they didn't, he had a loser in each suit, and the opponents had 100 points.
Can you spot South's mistake? It was in drawing the last trump. Instead of doing that, South should leave the last trump at large and cash the king and ace of hearts. Next a third round of hearts is led from dummy and East is stuck. If he ruffs, South later discards a low club from dummy on his heart queen, and dummy's last trump takes care of the club loss. 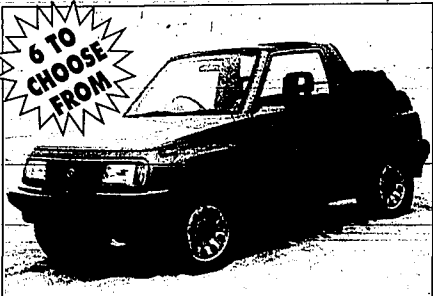

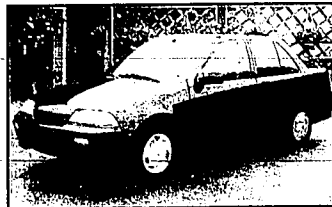

Fine line between 'Good & Evil' draw Whitton, Garr to outrageous sitcom

Margaret Whitton has good and evil on the brain.

Whether the actress is discussing Los Angeles, New York City, writing about baseball or her role in ABC's new sitcom "Good & Evil," which premieres Wednesday, Sept. 25, the fine line between the two extremes comes into — and out of — focus.

When she talks about Los Angeles, she says the residents aren't lazy as they are sometimes depicted, but the smog is so thick that "you can chew it."

When she talks about New York City topics range from violence to her belief that more often than not people are getting along in the Big Apple.

When she talks about her baseball writing Whitton mentions the foreword she will be writing for a book of letters between Ty Cobb and a 12-year-old boy. She finds it fascinating that Cobb, considered moody and unapproachable off the field, took the time to correspond with a young fan.

But "Good & Evil" is what Whitton likes to discuss the most. It is the story of two diametrically opposed sisters: the good Genny, played by Whitton, and the bad Denise, played by Teri Garr.

Denise, heir to her mother's cosmetics empire, delights in exacting revenge for lingering childhood resentments, especially on Genny, a kindhearted, widowed microbiologist.

What drew Whitton to so sweet a part, especially since she is best known for her film roles as the

underhanded Rachel Phelps in 1989's "Major League" and the lusty Aunt Vera in 1987's "The Secret of My Success"?

"I just got tired of playing (mean, rich women)," Whitton says in a telephone interview from her dressing room. "In the theater, I get to play a full range of characters. But here they would only see me if the role was for neurotic, rich women. I said, 'This is nuts!' I'm a real actor."

Similarly, Garr always wanted to land the kinds of roles Whitton had. So both are very happy — and happy with each other. Whitton even has Garr going to baseball games with her.

So will the line between Genny's good and Denise's evil blur in the future?

"The show gets more and more outrageous, interesting and sexy," Whitton says. "I think the premise is

that there is evil in good and good in evil. Not to give anything away, but Genny begins to do bad things, yet for good reasons.

The show is being promoted as "outrageous," a campaign Whitton finds appropriate.

"It's wild stuff," she says. "There's something to offend everyone: the handicapped, the mentally ill. Nothing is sacred."

"It's definitely for the '90s," Whitton adds. "With the way things are in the world, we all (had) better have a really good sense of humor — about everything."

ed that recently and was promptly slapped with a \$25 million lawsuit by Doris herself. Day says her "stomach hit the floor" when she saw what she claims is a fabricated story about her bag-lady lifestyle.

Actually, Doris lives on a meticulously kept estate near Carmel, Calif. and looks younger than her 67 years. Devoted to helping animals, Doris claims the headlines undermine her credibility in terms of fund-raising for her animal causes. "I'm leading a constructive, conservative life," she tells me.

Q: Hasn't Shelley Winters become such an eccentric that her movie career has just about had it? — D.F.

A: Yes, Shelley has become a Hollywood oddity, but a smart one. She has mined a career as a character actress to great effect, not to mention personal profit. In other words, Shelley keeps working in just about any movie that will have her. The latest two are "Weep No More My Lady" and something called "Pickle." She'll play an 80-year-old woman in the latter, a part Shelley tells me she'll play with characteristic abandon.

WHO-AM I? Amnesia, one of the earliest plot devices in the history of film, figures prominently in at least three current movies: Harrison Ford in "Regarding Henry," Emma Thompson in "Dead Again," and Tom Berenger in "Shattered." All three wander-around-trying-to-jog their memories in the course of their respective story lines.

Q: What's become of Ginger Rogers, who starred in so many movies of the '30s and '40s often as the dancing partner of Fred Astaire? — H.V.

A: Ginger, who's 80, lives on her 1,800-acre ranch on Oregon's Rogue River. She spends much of her time in a wheelchair, but is otherwise sprightly and feisty. Her autobiography, "Ginger — My Story," is just out, and Ginger plans to go on the road to promote her book.

CBS leads Nielsen list, but 'Monday Night Football' takes highest honors

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS won the weekly Nielsen television ratings by premiering "60 Minutes," "48 Hours" and "Murder, She Wrote" before the official start of the fall season.

ABC's "Monday Night Football," last week featuring the National Football League's Washington Redskins against the Dallas Cowboys, was the nation's most-watched program for a second consecutive week.

CBS had an 11.5 average, followed by NBC with 11.1 and ABC with 10.2 in the week ending Sept. 15, according to Nielsen figures released Tuesday. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

CBS had four shows in the top 10. The network ended the summer rerun season by debuting "60 Minutes" to tie with NBC's presentation of the Miss America Pageant for second place.

A rerun of "Roseanne" on ABC was fourth, followed by the season debut of "Murder, She Wrote" and a rerun of ABC's "Coach."

NBC premiered its new series "Nurses," which placed seventh, and the CBS special "P.S.I. Luv U Preview" was eighth. In ninth was "48 Hours," with Fox television's

Murphy Brown tackles pregnancy

NEW YORK (AP) — The title character of the news magazine situation comedy "Murphy Brown" is pregnant and has decided to become a single mother at age 43.

CBS spokesman Ed Devlin said there was no public reaction to the hit sitcom's Monday night episode, in which Murphy identified the father: her ex-husband, the activist Jake.

Last season's cliffhanger, in which Murphy learned of her out-of-wedlock pregnancy, gave the series its first-ever victory in the Nielsen ratings.

In Monday's episode Murphy's colleague Corky offers to help her through a "back alley" abortion from "some guy who doesn't even wash his hands."

Murphy protests that in America women still have a right to choose. "I'm sorry," sniffs Corky. "I'm from Louisiana." Louisiana's legislature has passed the nation's most restrictive anti-abortion law over Gov. Buddy Roemer's veto.

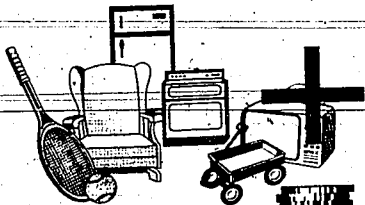

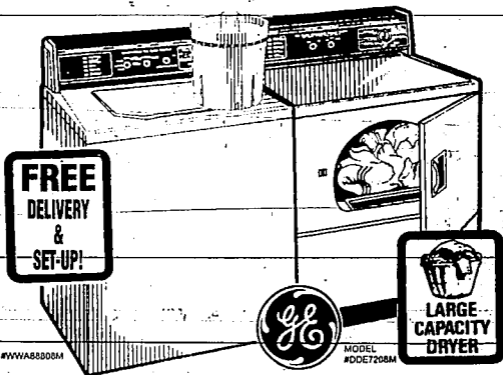
