U.N. accepts offer ending standoff

UNITED NATIONS — The U.N. Security Council agreed Thursday to an Iraqi demand that could resolve the tense standoff in a Baghdad parking lot between U.N. inspectors and Iraqi guards.

Meeting in a closed session, representatives of the 15 member nations of the Security Council accepted Iraq's written offer to free the inspectors as long as an inventory was made of documents, photographs and videotapes in their possession that detail Iraq's secret nuclear program.

Rolf Ekeus, head of the U.N. Special Commission on the Iraqi inspections,

estimated that it could take less than 24 hours to complete the cataloging. He also said it would not take all 44 captive inspectors to finish the job.

Thursday's development appeared to lessen, at least for the moment, the prospect of U.S.-led military action against the regime of Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, which has continued to hamper U.N. efforts to locate Iraq's remaining weapons of destruction.

The Security Council met for a second time Thursday afternoon to agree on the language of a letter to Iraq. After short consultations, French Ambassador Jean-Bernard Merimee, current president of the Security Council, said the document will

reiterate U.N. demands for release of all inspectors with the documents they seized but also agree to the inventory requested by the Iraqis.

The letter and technical details of an inventory proposal drafted by the United Nations were given to Iraqi Ambassador Abdul Amir al-Anbani, who is to forward them to Saddam.

But U.S. Ambassador Thomas Pickering cautioned that the deal could be completed only if Iraq agreed to U.N. conditions for the inventory.

In Washington, Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams confirmed that new deployments of F-111 attack bombers from England to Incirlik, Turkey, have begun.

While asserting the warplanes are to help protect Iraq's Kurdish minorities from attacks by Saddam's military, defense officials said they also could be used against nuclear and other weapons-production targets in northern Iraq.

Williams said it "is certainly a possibility" that Air Force Lt. Gen. Charles A. Homer, who directed the air war against Iraq last winter, will be ordered to the Middle East to prepare for renewed hostilities.

Meanwhile, the first Patriot missile batteries sent from Germany arrived in Saudi Arabia to help protect against any attacks by Iraqi Scud missiles. Williams said Iraq still possesses such missiles.

Residents of north Twin Falls area fear 8-plex project

TWIN FALLS — An Oregon developer wants to build a complex of 176 eight-plex rental units in a north Twin Falls residential area, and some neighbors are hopping mad.

"We're scared to death that they'll push it through," said Bill Von Bergen, who lives at 1526 Juniper St. N. "Our houses won't be worth anything in five years."

The request for a zoning change that would make construction of the apartments possible was filed by Mildred V. Burke, Leifan Orton, the city's community development director, said Thursday he did not have the name of the Oregon company that wants to build the project.

The complex would be located west of the 1200 and 1300 blocks of Locust Street North. The project might be eligible for federal housing subsidies for moderate-income families, Orton said.

A family of four with an income of slightly more than \$21,000 a year might

qualify, Orton said. That's what has residents of the area worried. Von Bergen said.

Property values will fall and the additional cars in the area will make for traffic problems, he predicted.

Von Bergen also said he fears that the people who move to these units will be "rowdies."

To build the eight-plexes, the zoning must be changed from commercial and residential to allow planned-unit development, Orton said. Zoning now in place would allow apartment buildings of more than five units and four-plexes, he said.

The Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission will hold a public hearing on the request on Tuesday, Oct. 8, at 7 p.m. in City Hall.

The developers want to build 160 units on 10 acres, while keeping seven more acres for possible future development, Orton said. Von Bergen said he thinks the developers eventually want to put in a total of 300 units.

"Why can't they put houses there?" asked Von Bergen.

Nation's poverty list now includes 1 of 7

WASHINGTON — The number of Americans below the poverty line rose sharply last year to 33.6 million, the Census Bureau said Thursday.

The increase, the first since 1983, left nearly one in seven people in poverty, and experts said the total was still climbing.

One-fifth of the nation's children and one-third of its blacks were considered poor.

Experts said the higher poverty rate would likely mean more people would lose their homes or succumb to health problems and the strain of trying to make ends meet. Some also predicted increased racial and ethnic tension and more crime.

"Since poverty increased significantly from 1989 to 1990 with just a modest deterioration in the economy, it is likely poverty will increase to a greater extent in 1991, when the economy was in

The number of Idahoans below the federal government's poverty line increased in 1990 as the median household income fell.

Census Bureau figures showed 14.9 percent of Idahoans were below the poverty level last year, compared with 12.4 percent in 1989.

The state's median income was \$25,305 in 1990, down from \$25,986 in 1989. Income figures were adjusted to account for inflation.

Fired ISP officer subject of sexual misconduct probe

TWIN FALLS — An Idaho State Police officer who is being investigated for alleged sexual contact with a minor has been fired, an ISP spokesman said Thursday.

Patrolman Robert Connor of Rupert, a 21-year ISP veteran, was terminated Wednesday "for violating policies and procedures of the Idaho State Police," said Lt. Lamont Johnston, deputy commander of ISP's District 4 office in Twin Falls.

Johnston declined to comment further

about the circumstances surrounding the firing of Connor, who worked in the Burley area.

However, Allan Cerialle, an investigator with the state attorney general's office, said Thursday that Connor was being investigated in connection with a "lewd-and-lascivious-type incident" involving a 13-year-old Cassia County girl.

The incident being investigated occurred July 9 at a large church picnic in Cassia County, Cerialle said.

The Cassia County Sheriff's Office was the first law enforcement agency involved

Biosphere 8 start journey

ORACLE, Ariz. — Four men and four women on Thursday embarked on a two-year journey inside a stationary glass ark — a fast-food-free trip into what they hope will be an environmentally sounder future of planetary colonies.

The eight are stewards of Biosphere II, a self-sustaining environment partially sealed off from the world they call Biosphere I — the Earth. The private, for-profit project is intended to develop technology to colonize space and improve and understand the Earth.

"It is a brave new step," said crew member Abigail Alling, 31, of New York. Her voice cracking with emotion, she called the project "a reminder that our future is not fixed and not final and ever evolving."

At sendoff ceremonies before about 1,000 people, Dr. Roy Walford, the oldest crew member, said, "We are fearful but loving; we court what lurks in the labyrinth, pledging at all odds to make ours an honest destiny."

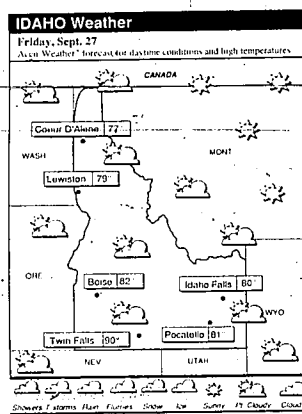
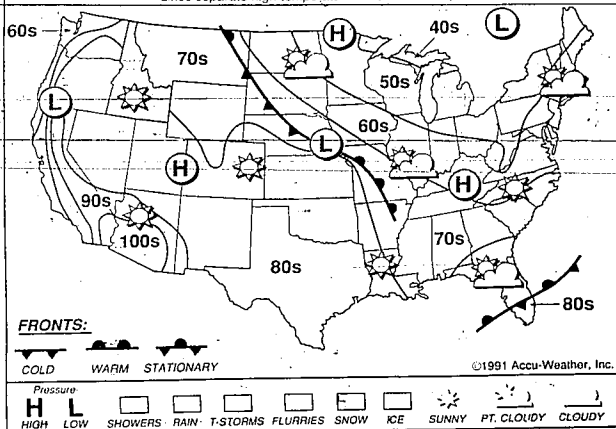
The "closure" ceremony began with a sunrise prayer service performed by a Crow Indian medicine man, a Tibetan monk and a Mexican woman conducting a traditional Baja California dance. A proclamation issued by Gov. Fife Symington extolling Biosphere II's entrepreneurial and environmental initiatives followed.

The sense of adventure was not lost on crew members. Sally Silverstone, 36, of England, recalled watching "the good ship Biosphere II grow ... and now I feel exhilarated to be going out with her on her maiden voyage."

Texans shiver as flooding continues along Rio Grande

Temperatures dipped Thursday in Texas, where the Rio Grande River continued to hit the southwestern section of the state with its worst flooding in more than a decade. Houston to feel its record low for the date at 50 and Brownsville tied its record of 58. Major flooding continued along the Rio Grande in a rural section of southwest Texas — the worst flooding on the river since 1978, the National Weather Service said. Flooding in central Texas, southern Florida, between Pecosville and Lajitas, flooding caused significant damage at Big Bend National Park, closing several roads and campgrounds, the weather service said. At midday, showers and thunderstorms extended over northern California, east-central Arizona, southern Florida, northern lower Michigan, the upper Ohio Valley and New England.

Cartel's top assassin faces extradition

NEW YORK — The man believed to be the top assassin for Colombia's Medellin drug cartel has been arrested in New York and is being held without bail for likely extradition, federal drug officials said Thursday.
Paul Daniel Muzoz Mosquera was the mastermind behind the Aug. 18, 1989, assassination of Colombian Sen. Luis Carlos Galan, the leading presidential candidate, said Robert A. Bryden, special agent in charge of the federal Drug Enforcement Administration's office in New York. Muzoz was arrested Wednesday night as he talked on a pay telephone in the Jackson Heights section of Queens, said Bryden.

Noriega worked tough deal on drugs

MIAMI — The prosecution's star witness against Manuel Noriega testified Thursday that the former Panamanian dictator negotiated a tough deal to protect the Medellin cocaine cartel's first drug flights through Panama.
A drug pilot-turned-informant Floyd Carlton, a longtime Noriega associate, said that in 1982 Noriega angrily spurned the cartel's initial offer of \$30,000 to \$50,000 per 400-kilogram cocaine load flown into Panama en route to the United States. Carlton said he had passed on the offer to Noriega after meeting with cartel chiefs Luis Escobar and Gustavo Gaviria in Medellin, Colombia.

No invitations to peace talks going out

NEW YORK — After a new round of talks with Israeli and Arab leaders, Secretary of State James A. Baker III said Thursday there is no basis yet for issuing invitations for a Middle East peace conference.
Baker said Soviet Foreign Minister Boris Pankin, with whom he met for an hour, concurred.
Even reports from Algeria that PLO leaders supported a U.S. proposal for a joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegation, failed to elicit optimism from Baker, who has been on several trips to the region this year trying to set up peace talks.

Check-bouncers won't be identified

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Thomas S. Foley said Thursday there would be no naming of names or other punishment meted out as a result of free overdrafts and other abuses at the House bank.
"I'm not going to correct the system that way,"

Foley said when asked to release the House members' names attached to the 8,331 checks "bounced" in the year ending June 30, 1990. The General Accounting Office said the members-only House bank covered the overdrafts free of charge.
A group of freshman House Republicans, at a news conference, said anything short-of-full disclosure would not satisfy the voters.

Anti-crime bill clears House panel

WASHINGTON — A sweeping anti-crime bill that would expand the death penalty and ban certain assault-style weapons cleared the House Judiciary Committee on Thursday as Democratic leaders promised House action this fall.
The \$1.1 billion package that would help state and local governments put more police on the streets, improve programs for youthful offenders and give more prisoners drug treatment was passed on a voice vote after 3 1/2 days of debate.
House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said the full House would debate the measure next month.

Big-band musician Billy Vaughn dies

ESCONDIDO, Calif. — Billy Vaughn, a big-band musician who prospered through the beginning of rock 'n' roll with such hits as "Steady as a Rock" and "A Swingin' Safari," died Thursday. He was 72.
Vaughn died of cancer, said Palomar Medical Center spokeswoman Nancy Sayre. Vaughn began his career as a singer with the vocal group the Hilltoppers in the early 1950s. He moved on to become a composer, arranger and big band leader with Paramount Recording Studios.

Minnesota plans video game lottery

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Minnesota plans to become the first to let people play the lottery at home using equipment from a popular video game.
Although there has been criticism from a few state legislators, Lottery Director George Andersen said he plans to press ahead with an experiment to have about 10,000 people test the play-at-home lottery system.
Lottery players would be able to select their lucky numbers by using the control deck from a Nintendo video game and a Minnesota State Lottery cartridge to hook up to the lottery's computer system.
Participants would have to deposit up to \$200 in advance and no credit would be extended.

Senate adopts defense bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate passed a 1992 defense spending bill Thursday that keeps alive the B-2 stealth bomber program but puts off until next year a final decision by Congress on whether to spend \$3.2 billion on four more planes.
The bill, providing \$269.7 billion for the Pentagon in the budget year starting Oct. 1, meets most of President Bush's requests for big-ticket weapons, including \$4.6 billion for the Strategic Defense Initiative to build a missile defense.
The bill was passed on a voice vote.
The measure, which will be reconciled with the already-passed House version of the Pentagon budget, cuts the active-duty military force by 106,000 people and makes other changes to accelerate the shrinking of the American military.
The main element of the bill that conflicts with administration policy is a provision permitting U.S. servicewomen and spouses of servicemen to have abortion care performed at the expense of U.S. overseas military installations.
The House version of the bill contains no abortion provision.

Most Americans would back military action

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Three out of four Americans said they would support military action against Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein to compel him to cooperate with U.N. inspectors searching for nuclear, chemical and biological weapons, according to a new poll.
Roughly an equal number, however, believe President Bush should spend more time, not international affairs, a Los Angeles Times poll found.
Overall, Americans gave Bush an approval rating of 65 percent, a decline from the 80 percent endorsement of Times found he enjoyed after the Persian Gulf War.
The poll reported in Thursday's editions was conducted through Tuesday, among a random sample of 1,597 Americans nationwide. The poll's margin of error is plus or minus 3 percentage points.
But the poll was conducted before the Iraqi soldiers moved in on the 44-member team in a dispute over documents. The three-day siege continued this morning.
The survey also was completed before the United States began moving Patriot anti-missile units to the Persian Gulf on Wednesday in case the Security Council orders military escorts for U.N. teams searching Iraq.
Three-quarters of those surveyed approved of Bush's handling of foreign policy and 56 percent asserted they would strongly support the use of U.N. teams searching Iraq.
Only 20 percent of those polled opposed the use of force. This response was somewhat greater among women and considerably stronger among African-Americans.
The poll found overwhelming agreement and anxiety that the country remains mired in recession.

\$3,359 or less before taxes was considered poor. That definition does not include any property the family may own or some forms of assistance it may receive.
Some 13.5 percent of Americans live at or below the poverty line, that is one of every seven people. That was an increase of 2.1 million from the year before.
The figures were the first to track poverty in America since the nation fell into recession last year.
Daniel Weinberg, the Census Bureau's head of household economic statistics, said, "I think that using all these indicators, economic well-being seems to be worse than it was."
Sociologist Richard Ropers of Southern Utah University, author of

several books on poverty, said, "We can expect to see more homeless people on the streets, more street crime, more gang violence, more domestic violence, more family instability, increasing rates of drug addiction and increasing physical and mental health problems."
Ropers said such problems become worse when poverty increases mainly because of the intense stress of not having enough money.
For the 86.5 percent of Americans who aren't poor, the rise in poverty means higher taxes to pay for law enforcement and social services, an atmosphere of heightened racial and ethnic conflict, he said. "These middle-class people in the suburbs, when they go to town to their jobs, they'll have to step around homeless people on the streets."
The Census Bureau's information was based on interviews with about 60,000 American households.
The figures indicated that being black or Hispanic, a child, a city dweller, a Southerner or a member of a family headed by a woman meant a person was more likely to be poor.
Whites, people in their late 40s and 50s, suburban and rural residents and Northeasterners were least likely to be poor.
Forty percent of the poor were children.
Blacks had the highest poverty rate of any racial or ethnic group at 22 percent. The poverty rate for whites was 11 percent; Hispanics, 28 percent; and Asians and Pacific Islanders, 12 percent.

in the case, Ceriale said, the sheriff's office contacted the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement for assistance, but since it is the parent agency of the state police, the state law enforcement department referred Cassia County investigators to an Ada County sheriff's office who had experience in juvenile sex cases.
The Ada County investigator interviewed the juvenile and did some other work on the case, Ceriale said. The attorney general's office got involved last week after the attorney general's office and the sheriff's office and Cassia County Prosecutor Stephen Bywater.

Bywater made his request, Ceriale said, because Ceriale was a witness in several cases. Bywater's office was prosecuting and he felt there would be a conflict of interest.
Ceriale said that after he finishes his report on the case, a lawyer in the criminal law division of the attorney general's office will decide whether or not to press charges. Either felony or misdemeanor charges could be filed, he said.
So far, he said, investigators have no reason to believe the July incident was not an isolated incident.
Connor could not be reached for comment Thursday.
Connor was in the news earlier this summer, after a fellow ISP officer was charged with a motorist on Interstate 84 near the Utah border.
Connor criticized the department for not having enough officers patrolling that remote area, and for letting it become a "dead zone" — an area where officers cannot raise each other on the radio.

AIDS victim asks Congress to stop the 'hell'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dying of AIDS contracted from her husband, Kimberly Bergalis pleaded with Congress Thursday to require testing for health care workers so others "don't have to go through the hell that I have."

The frail but determined 23-year-old woman, her speech slurred and her voice shaky, addressed lawmakers from her wheelchair for less than half a minute.

"I'd like to say that AIDS is a terrible disease that you must take seriously," she began. "I did nothing wrong yet I'm being made to suffer like this. My life has been taken away."

"Please enact legislation so other patients and health care providers don't have to go through the hell that I have," she concluded, her soft voice sometimes drowned out by a chorus of clicking of cameras.

She was wheeled from the packed hearing room after her testimony while her father, George Bergalis testified.

"I am a father who is profoundly enraged by the impending loss of his daughter, a loss that was preventable," he told members of the House Energy and Commerce Health Subcommittee.

"Enough is enough," he said. "It's time for Congress to get off their duff and to say for 10 years we have treated this issue not as a disease but as a civil rights issue and a protection of privacy issue."

A bill sponsored by Rep. William Dannemeyer, R-Calif., and named after Ms. Bergalis, would require that health care providers who perform invasive procedures be tested for AIDS.

Those found to be infected with the virus would be barred from performing invasive medical or dental procedures, unless the patient is informed and consents in writing.

Dannemeyer's bill would also provide for AIDS testing of patients without their consent.

Bergalis was infected by her dentist with the human immunodeficiency virus that causes AIDS. The dentist, Dr. David Acer, died a year ago from AIDS, and it has not been determined how he passed the virus to Bergalis and four other patients. Those are the only documented cases of patients getting the fatal disease from a health professional.

The American Medical Association maintains that the Acer case is an aberration, and the testing bill is opposed by the medical community and AIDS activists, who say that strict infection control procedures should be sufficient.

The federal Centers for Disease Control's guidelines, which are voluntary, say physicians who perform invasive procedures should find out their AIDS status and refrain from performing these procedures if they are infected.

Bur Barbara Webb of Palm City, Fla., who also was infected with HIV by Acer, said mandatory testing is necessary.

"Yes, it helps if universal precautions are taken," she said, "but needle sticks do occur."

Acer, whose AIDS status was shielded by Florida law, said he followed standard infection-control procedures.

He never told his patients they might be at risk until he warned them to be tested in a letter published after his death last year.

Family pays ransom; daughter not returned

JASPER, Ala. (AP) — Her parents paid out more than \$300,000 in ransom money. Hundreds of townspeople in trucks and on horseback have searched remote areas of this coal mining region, and a \$400,000 reward has been offered.

But no one has heard from 25-year-old Carrie Smith Lawson since

kidnappers on Sept. 13 picked up the ransom money — dropped as instructed in a dark culvert — and disappeared, relying on their promise to return her safely.

The kidnapping took place Sept. 11, when Lawson and her husband, Earl Lawson Jr., were confronted by a gunman.

FCC adopts stricter rules for 1-900 industry

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission adopted strict new requirements Thursday designed to stem growing consumer discontent with sometimes-pricey "900" area code phone lines.

The five-member panel, adopting rules proposed earlier this year, said callers must be told the cost of the call and given other information to help them decide whether to stay on the line. The FCC also will forbid phone companies from disconnecting customers who refuse to pay for calls made to 900 lines.

The new rules will "solve the problems without ruining the industry," said Commissioner James Quello.

In other matters, the commission voted to consider rules governing the controversial Caller ID service, adopted rules designed to help weak AM

radio broadcasters and accepted a proposal designed to boost competition for the cable industry.

The first 900 number appeared in 1980 and the phone lines have since exploded into a billion dollar industry. You can call 900 numbers for stock quotes, sports scores, legal advice or to find out the value of your used car. There also are lines for horoscopes and sexy conversations among adults.

But many consumers, misunderstanding the way the calls work, have run up huge phone bills on chat lines.

Federal officials also have accused some companies of deceiving customers by not telling them up front how much the calls cost.

The FCC's restrictions affect only the phone companies that carry the calls because the agency

has no jurisdiction over the information providers that own the services.

However, Congress is considering legislation designed to protect callers to 900 lines and the Federal Trade Commission has stepped up its policing of the industry.

But the FCC-adopted rules would require a "preamble," telling callers the price of the call, describing the service, giving the name of the information provider and allowing the caller to hang up before charges are incurred. Youngsters must be told to hang up if they don't have parental permission to make the call.

In addition, the commission will require that local phone companies offer customers free blocking of calls to 900 numbers from their phones.

Phone companies may not disconnect customers who refuse to pay for calls to 900 lines.

Research supports theory that 1st human was African

WASHINGTON (AP) — The first human ancestor, the so-called "mother of us all" was a primitive woman who lived some 200,000 years ago in Africa, say researchers who have made a new study of worldwide genetic patterns.

"There was a population in Africa of individuals ... of anatomically archaic humans, whose descendants at a later time underwent the transformation to modern humans," said Mark Stoneking, an anthropologist at Pennsylvania State University.

Among this "group" would have been a single woman who first possessed a genetic pattern that can now be traced, through an endless series of mutations and overlapping similarities, to all humanity, he said.

In a study to be published Friday in the journal Science, Stoneking and his coauthors claim that this common ancestor lived between

166,000 and 249,000 years ago somewhere south of the Sahara Desert in Africa.

Other experts in the field consider the study and its conclusions to be highly controversial and one researcher called the findings "a house of cards" based on assumptions that cannot be proven.

Stoneking said the new conclusions are based on an analysis of genetic information from 189 people around the globe.

The researchers compared the patterns contained in mitochondrial DNA, or mtDNA, a genetic code found in all cells and which is always inherited from the mother. By tracing patterns found in the mtDNA, Stoneking said the researchers could construct branches of a tree of inheritance that leads finally back to the root, or source of the original mtDNA.

Thomas vote may be split

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two more Democratic members of the Senate Judiciary Committee said Thursday they oppose the nomination of Clarence Thomas to the Supreme Court, setting the stage for a close — perhaps evenly split — vote by the panel on Friday.

Alabama Sen. Howell Heflin, often a pivotal vote on the committee, and Wisconsin's Herb Kohl said they had decided against Thomas. But Heflin and other critics conceded he is likely to be confirmed handily by the full Senate, even if he gets mention from the committee.

Thomas was virtually guaranteed at least half the committee's votes, with all six Republicans and Democrat Dennis Deconcini of Arizona having already declared their support for the conservative black jurist. Colorado Republican Hank Brown filled out the solid GOP bloc Thursday.

Meanwhile, a legal newspaper reported Thomas, now a U.S. Court of Appeals judge, may have tried to avoid controversy at his confirmation hearings by postponing the release of an opinion he wrote in an affirmative action case.

The Legal Times of Washington said Thomas has withheld the majority opinion in the three-judge panel's decision that reportedly strips from a woman her licence to operate a new radio station in Middletown, Md.

She had been awarded the license under the Federal Communications Commission's gender preference policy, part of its program to broaden industry opportunities for women and racial minorities.

Heflin said doubts lingered about whether Thomas "might be part of the extreme, right-wing movement."

Plan would promote Watson, 2 others

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls School District wants to hire three new elementary school assistant principals to help several grade schools meet state standards. Superintendent Terrell Donicht said Thursday he'd recommend to the Twin Falls School Board next month that elementary school teachers Judy Watson and John Graham be promoted to assistant principal

and that Morningside Elementary assistant principal Kay Jones also take on the same job at Sawtooth Elementary. Watson, who teaches at Bickel Elementary School, would become half-time assistant principal at both Lincoln and Perrine elementary schools. She is married to School District Community Relations Director Larry Watson, but since Larry Watson does not supervise any other district employees, the promotion would not violate the district's year-old nepotism policy, Donicht said.

The board will vote whether to approve the promotions and the hiring of six new teachers at its next meeting on Oct. 8. Graham, who teaches at Harrison Elementary School, would become half-time assistant principal there. The promotions are in response to action by the Idaho Department of Education's elementary approval process committee, which placed Sawtooth, Harrison, Lincoln and Perrine on "warned" status last year. In the committee's four-level grading

system, warned status is one level below losing approval.

The district would not be penalized by losing state funds if it loses approval, but it is a black mark on the school, Donicht said. "What is says is your schools aren't meeting the standards," he said.

Not having enough administrators at the four schools was the only reason they were on warned status, Donicht said.

Westerly winds blow Fogleman to TV weather job in Denver

TWIN FALLS — Al Fogleman is packing up his weather maps and blowing out of town.

The television weatherman, who for three years has told you whether to grab your coat or get your hat, is moving to Denver. His last Magic Valley forecast will be tonight on KMVT-TV.

The 44-year-old Fogleman says he's trading in the daily desert forecast for some really unpredictable weather.

"In Denver there's a lot of fast-breaking, exciting weather. Some of it can be threatening," Fogleman said.

"If I can be there to alert someone of the danger, that's appealing. It's not out of ego, it's a commitment to the public."

Heat waves, cold snaps, blizzards and tornadoes will fill his forecasts on KWGN-TV, an independent station

in the 19th-largest television market in the nation, according to Fogleman.

"A normal day can be turned upside down," he said.

But the self-proclaimed "weather nut" is ready for the challenge — and the extra money.

"I'm a little nervous. I'd be lying if I said I wasn't, but I'm excited too. I don't want to go out there and pronounce the name of a town wrong, but I probably will."

Since 1988, Fogleman has contributed cautionary tales about umbrella-carrying to the Magic Valley, but he's done more. He's also been involved in all kinds of community awareness programs.

Becoming a sort of activist, he has put his support and on-air presence behind such projects as the Multiple Sclerosis Bike Race, Head Start Program, Red Ribbon Week, Coats for Kids and Christmas Toy Drive.

"He actually cares about the children in the community," said Blossom Mathews, who worked with Fogleman on the Head Start campaign. "He doesn't just say it. He shows it."

Like many TV weathermen, Fogleman was trained in broadcasting, not meteorology, and his wise-cracking patter and relaxed on-air persona are part of what attracted the Denver station, he said.

"I'm pretty easy-going. What they're looking for in Denver is just plain folks."

"I'm like your favorite pair of loafers. I'm not dress shoes, but damn I'm comfortable," he added.

Fogleman's "what-you-see-is-what-you-get" philosophy has created a similar bond between this weatherman and his viewers.

"There's a trust that has to be built with the audience," Fogleman said. "I realize they invest some trust in me. I try not to violate that. I tell them who I am and what I believe in."

"Somewhere along the line I've become a friend to these people. They invite me into their homes every evening."

Magic Valley learned to appreciate wit and wisdom of Captain Lycra

TWIN FALLS — An old Indian man spooned Al Fogleman his first taste of weather excitement.

"He told a group of us kids that it was going to rain," Fogleman said of his childhood days in Alexandria, Va. "I asked him how he knew and he told us to look at the bottom of the silver maple leaves."

"Updrafts were pushing against the leaves, making it possible for a 5-year-old boy to see the leaves' silver undersides. Fogleman said that incident got him hooked on weather."

"I realized that weather impacts everything that people do. Weather became my hobby," he said. "I like being able to do some good."

Now Fogleman, 44, is a television weatherman headed for an independent station in Denver. He's leaving behind KMVT-TV in Twin Falls where he has worked for three years.

Using wire weather reports, Cable News Network, a barometer and a



network of weather observers throughout the Magic Valley, Fogleman prepares his daily forecast.

"It's not an exact science. It's one step above being a rainmaker," he said.

Without a script, Fogleman ad libs his three-minute forecast. The spontaneity and a sense of humor he hopes will set him apart from any dull, scripted competitors. "I've been used to typing by the seat of my pants since I've been in the business," he said.

Fogleman landed his first television job in Idaho Falls in 1976, straight out of Utah State University. From there he moved on to Tucson, Ariz., for another TV weather position and stayed a little over six years.

Wary of the games played in the business, Fogleman said, he abandoned TV to become an afternoon disc jockey in Logan, Utah. But he changed his mind in March 1988 when he moved to the Magic Valley.

Here he discovered a haven for cross-country skiing and his passion — cycling.

Fogleman's friends call him Captain Lycra because it isn't unusual for him to show up at work in his riding gear and helmet, he said.

On an average weekday, he bikes 15 to 20 miles and on some weekends the distance tops 35 to 70 miles. On other weekends, he's driving home to Logan — a seven-hour round-trip — to spend time with his wife and four children.

His wife is finishing up her degree in

Buhl parents question forms needed at sports events

BUHL — Some Buhl School District parents have questioned the use of forms used for students not riding the bus home from athletic events.

At the very least, the parents asked that the form be clearer and easier to turn in.

The parents attended a recent meeting of the board, complaining about the school's use of activity release forms.

The forms require signatures from parents, the coach and the bus driver, if a student will not ride the bus home from an athletic activity.

Parents are concerned that they need to sign the forms prior to the student leaving school.

Some parents said they come to a sports event, want to sign the form while at the game and take their child home with them when the game is over.

Others may have made arrangements for their child to ride home with another parent, and in this case, would need to sign the form before the child leaves school.

Resident Bob Watt said it was very difficult for him to make it to school during the day and find a coach to get this release form signed.

Resident Sue Savers said since the forms

had to be signed before a child leaves school, students may be tempted to forge their parents' signatures, so they can go home from the game with someone else.

Others at the meeting requested the release forms clearly state that a witnessed signature by the parent is required.

High School Principal Dennis Osman said for players the practice is a good one and encourages team unity.

"I personally feel that a player is part of a team, and they should ride the bus to and from the game as a team," Osman said.

Clark Muech, athletic director, said that many schools don't offer the option of a student going home with a parent. Students

must ride the bus to the game and also ride it home.

District Transportation Director Bob Bailey Sr. said many of the forms have not been signed correctly in the past.

He added he has advised the bus drivers not to sign these forms unless the coaches and parents have signed them first.

Bailey said these forms are "a walking time bomb" because in actual court cases, schools have been held accountable for a student's welfare, even when the parents had signed these release forms and then later pressed charges.

Bruins will have to prove they've learned

TWIN FALLS — John Champlin says nobody deserves a diploma who can't prove he's learned something.

"We move kids through the system without certifying that they've learned," said Champlin, executive director of the Phoenix-based National Center for Outcome-Based Education.

Champlin has been lecturing Twin Falls teachers and administrators this week about his new approach to learning that certifies a student's skills.

The current approach means piecemeal learning and failure for many children, he said.

But in an outcome-based education system, students don't graduate until they've demonstrated proficiency in a set of skills, Champlin said.

Over the next four or five years, the Twin Falls School District will adopt the outcome-based model, Champlin helps develop as a school superintendent in Johnston City, N.Y.

Assistant Superintendent Ken Olson said Champlin will train the district's teachers during the coming year about the new program.

Outcome-based education acknowledges that children learn at different speeds, Champlin said. It helps ensure that students master skills before moving on.

But under the current "conveyer-belt" system, teachers — partly out of expediency — move from basic to more complicated concepts before

all their students are ready, he said. A teacher, for example, might move on to division before most students really understand multiplication. But the student who gets a 'D' in multiplication probably isn't ready to learn division.

Failure at one level breeds failure in later levels, Champlin said. A student will see himself as unsuccessful, a perception that can be self-fulfilling, he said.

But under outcome-based education, a kid will work on multiplication until he masters it. It's a system that prevents failure, Champlin said. Each child works at his own pace.

"Schools ought to create opportunities for success," he said.

The system doesn't hold back the gifted learner or water down lessons for the slow learner, Champlin said.

A third-grader, for example, might study second-grade math at the same time he is studying fourth-grade English.

The district will develop achievement standards for graduates. They will include broad expectations about a student's self-esteem, motivation, accountability and problem-solving abilities, Olson said.

A team of teachers and administrators will also work up a series of program expectations for each subject, he said.

Broad requirements for social studies, for example, would include competence in economics, government, history and geography.

Each subject will detail more specific skills in which a student must show competency, Olson said.

BLM to set up climate monitor

HAILEY — The Bureau of Land Management plans to install a climate monitoring station in a proposed wilderness area, northeast of Hailey as part of a long-term study of global warming.

The station is part of a project called the Intermountain Wilderness Area Ecosystem Study. It will be located in the Little Wood River Wilderness Study Area (WSA), providing scientists baseline data on air quality, hydrology, vegetation

and meteorological trends. Steve Ellis, resource area manager for the BLM's Shoshone District, said the station will benefit local land management by providing the means "to monitor for changes in aquatic plants and animals, water quality, vegetation, and soil characteristics."

Ellis also said the data will be important for future wilderness management and monitoring of changes in the environment. Fifteen wilderness locations nationwide have been selected for the monitoring program because their natural processes are relatively

undisturbed. The effects of acid rain, ozone depletion, global warming and other environmental changes are expected to be most apparent in these sites.

The environmental monitoring is being conducted as part of the U.S. Global Change Research Program through the BLM's Environmental Science and Technology Center in Fort Collins, Colo.

After the station is installed next spring, local BLM employees will be responsible for collecting data and providing maintenance.

In other business:

SAT scores don't tell the whole story

Every fall since 1972, the College Board has issued a report showing how the nation's high school seniors scored on the Scholastic Aptitude Test. The SAT is a multiple-choice test that measures part of what students are supposed to have learned in high school. It is a moderate predictor of how students will perform in college.

This fall, headlines throughout the United States echoed the College Board's own summary: "SAT Verbal, Math Scores Decline."

The College Board's data show that the average SAT verbal score has declined from 453 to 422 over the last 20 years, and the average SAT math score has declined from 484 to 474 during the same period.

Are today's students less able than students of the past? Are the nation's schools offering a worse education than they used to?

Actually, the decline in SAT scores is more apparent than real and is mainly because of the increased number of students taking the test. In 1972, 25 percent of 17-year-olds took the test. In 1991, it was 31 percent.

If I am a teacher and want to maximize

the average SAT score of my students, I should select only the best students to take the test. If I encourage a broader group of students to take the test, I am likely to get a few more who will do well, and a lot more who will not. In other words, as more students take the test, the average score is likely to go down.

It is better to compare the number of individuals who got a good score on the SAT to the total number of individuals in the same age group. This comparison yields different and generally more positive conclusions about what our students know.

On the verbal part of the SAT, about 9 percent of all 17-year-olds scored 500 or better in 1972. By 1980 only about 6 percent were scoring 500 or better.

However, during the 1980s the percent of high-scoring 17-year-olds has generally increased and is now up to about 8 percent.

On the math part of the SAT, about 11 percent of all 17-year-olds scored 500 or better in 1972. The percent of good math scores declined throughout the 1970s,

reaching a low of 9 percent in 1978. Since then, the percent of good math scores has risen sharply, reaching 13 percent in 1991. This is the highest level in the 20 years that the SAT results have been reported.

Looking at the number of high SAT scores rather than the average SAT score is better because it doesn't stigmatize our schools or students when more students take the test.

The SAT results do not indicate anything about the skills of young people who are not college-bound. Indicators like the National Assessment of Educational Progress are needed for that purpose.

In summary, the SAT data suggest that today's college-bound students are doing somewhat better in math and somewhat worse in verbal skills than they did 20 years ago. These results are neither as good as we would like nor as bad as some would claim.

Bush executes another agile diplomatic move

Coincidence can be poetic. This week's news brought these three developments:

- President Bush performed a deft feat of statesmanship by calling for repeal of a United Nations resolution equating Zionism with racism.
- The Census Bureau said the number of poor Americans grew to 33.6 million last year, the first increase since 1983. Forty percent are children.
- Seventy-six percent of those surveyed by a Los Angeles Times nationwide poll believe Bush should spend more time on domestic problems and less time on international affairs.

No surprises there. Americans like to see progress on the home front—regardless of how stunningly well things are going in foreign-policy matters.

Bush sidestepped that prejudice earlier this year, with a whopping military triumph. But memories are short; his 85 percent approval rating after Desert Storm has fallen to 65 percent, according to the Times poll.

What is Bush to do? The problems at home resist comprehension, let alone resolution: poverty, drugs, educational mediocrity, a sluggish economy and an inherited debt that hobbles presidential initiative.

He also faces an entrenched Democratic Congress that has no taste for helping a GOP president.

In contrast to the domestic desert, foreign affairs must look like an oasis to a president who has made his

career there. And Bush has made the most of his skills.

This week's challenge to the UN was a particularly nimble political move. Not only was it a friendly gesture to Israel during a tense period, but it confronted each General Assembly delegation with its own share of responsibility for peace.

The General Assembly divorced itself from the practical pursuit of Mideast progress in 1975, when it branded Israel's founding idea as "a form of racism" and a threat to peace. The hypocrisy of that notion apparently escaped the delegates at the time, but is obvious now.

How is Israel's nationalism racist if other kinds of nationalism are not? And how can denying Israel's legitimacy further the interests of peace?

With the Soviet Union backing Bush's play, his call for to repeal the 1975 resolution cannot be ignored. The UN's members must cooperate with the peace process or be exposed as obstructionists.

Meanwhile, Bush is playing patient but stern father figure to Saddam Hussein's rebellious juvenile. That same Times poll shows three-fourths of Americans are ready to back Bush again if push comes to shank.

All well and good. By taking his skills and prestige abroad, figuratively speaking, Bush is focusing his resources where they can be effective.

But sooner or later he has to come home. Those pesky domestic troubles will be waiting.

- You want protection around the house? A 6-pound dog with a 50-pound bark can do the job.
- You want a bodyguard while jogging or strolling the neighborhood? A doberman would be effective and would enjoy the exercise.
- If you want to show off or you have some deep-seated need to prove your machismo, then you shouldn't be allowed to own any dog at all.

The recent furor over attacks on people by wolf dogs and the unpredictable nature that makes them a threat to anybody within fang range raised an obvious question:

Why would anyone want a pet that can easily kill, maim or disfigure a small child or seriously injure an adult?

The owners of pit bulls and rottweilers make a feeble case, insisting that there are no vicious dogs, only bad owners. I don't want any scientific figures, but records indicate that pit bulls must attract more than their share of bad owners.

Those who fancy terror dogs also note that German shepherds bite more people than pit bulls do. What they don't note is that there are far more shepherds than

there are pit bulls and that shepherds seldom leave their victims dead, in intensive care or in need of endless plastic surgery.

As for wolf dogs, there is no case to be made. Owning one in a conventional domestic setting is unfair to the animal and to anyone exposed to it.

Setting up effective restrictions isn't easy. Every time a municipality wants to pass laws banning dogs with documented records of unprovoked attacks or requiring their owners to carry large insurance policies, there is a flap over percentage percentages.

Pit bulls are lovely creatures, their owners say, but the mixed breeds with attitudes give everybody a bad name.

Appearance doesn't count. The most fearsome-looking dog I ever lived next door to was a blue-eyed Siberian husky, a sort of well-dressed wolf. He also was one

of the most playful animals I've ever encountered, always ready to be chased in a circle or to reciprocate.

The meanest thing he ever did was noisily push his empty bowl around his owner's nearby patio at 5 a.m.

On the other side we have a small canine neighbor, a Libsea spaniel named Patches, who is so bright, sociable and entertaining that, if I still had enough character to take care of a dog, I'd buy one.

The title of snottiest little beast is a tie between a former landlady's chihuahua, 32 ounces of yap and nip, and a miniature dachshund who, if there is reincarnation, will come back as Freddy Krueger.

The nicest dog I ever owned while growing up was a mutt with just enough Boston bull blood to have a beautiful black coat, white chest and muzzle and four white paws (hence the name Spats). Cost me two mangos.

Luckily, there wasn't enough Boston bull in Spats' family tree to produce that mashed-in, I-just-blocked-a-punt look.

After I grew up, the prize winner was a stray bag of bones who adopted us, then blossomed into a beautiful Irish setter who tolerated every indignity toddlers could inflict.

The worst sport was a basset hound who, if left alone, got even by unraveling 100 feet of toilet paper, eating drapes and leaving bedspreads. The goofiest was the five-weight neurotic queen, Lucy.

My point is that there are millions of dogs that can fulfill any role a sane person asks. They may be cranky, hyper, stupefied, cute or ugly.

But none of them are inclined to maim or kill.

Idaho to receive \$30,000 to help elderly

BOISE — Idaho will receive a \$30,000 grant to bolster the volunteer work for the state's elderly, Gov. Cecil Andrus says. "We are pleased to receive this funding to increase our volunteer efforts because volunteers have been the lifeblood of Idaho's aging network," Andrus said.

The \$30,000 Eldercare Volunteer Corps project is administered by the Idaho Office on Aging and will include public awareness education. It will develop a training kit on the best use of volunteers. Interested people will be identified, trained and then pass on their knowledge to others through local workshops.

Officials lift water boil plan after 3 days

CHUBBUCK — A boil order for the community of Chubbuck has been lifted after three days, and officials may add a chlorination system to prevent any more.

"We have been sampling all week and all the samples have come back clean," said Chubbuck's public works director Steve Smart as the order was lifted Thursday.

Workers have been treating the water with chlorine to kill coliform bacteria detected last week, Smart said.

The city and the state Division of Environmental Quality are still looking for the source of the contamination, which usually occurs from human or animal waste in the water supply.

Incinerator adversaries air their views

POCATELLO — Adversaries in the battle over a proposed American Falls medical waste incinerator used a legislative committee meeting on waste to air their views. "Not surprisingly, most of the testimony at the Thursday meeting in Pocatello came from the incinerator company, EnviroHealth Inc., and members of the Citizens' Awareness Group, organized in American Falls to fight the burner."

Barbara Orr of Pocatello's EnviroHealth said a moratorium imposed by Gov. Cecil Andrus on the construction of medical waste incinerators was illegal and unfairly targeted "our company." Andrus stopped the project after the state issued an air quality permit. The Legislature later issued its own moratorium.

Court ups bail for alleged child abuser

BOISE — Bail for a Boise man charged with sexually abusing neighborhood children at his mother's baby-sitting service has been increased from \$120,000 to \$500,000.

John D. Munson, 22, who Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jean Fisher described as "a predatory pedophile," was arraigned Wednesday and returned to the Ada County Jail.

Munson faces a possible life prison term if convicted of two counts of lewd and lascivious conduct and one count of child sexual abuse.

The alleged abuse, which reportedly occurred between June and August, involves three young boys, authorities said.

Juveniles arrested in drive-by shooting

CALDWELL — Six juveniles have been arrested for what police said was a gang-related drive-by shooting Tuesday night in Caldwell.

The incident is the latest in a growing number of shootings, stabbings and other gang-related incidents of violence in Caldwell, police said.

Two of the youths have been charged as adults for the shooting that left three bullet holes in a mobile home but injured no one, Canyon County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Timothy Spencer said Wednesday.

August sales tax money up

BOISE (AP) — Payrolls throughout Idaho were fatter than expected last month and that apparently translated into consumers spending at a rate state analysts had not predicted. The Andrus administration reported on Thursday that sales tax collections in August were up dramatically over projections, breaking a five-month string of underperformance in that key revenue sector.

It pulled total state tax receipts for the first two months of the current budget year to within just \$200,000 of the benchmark set by the Division of Financial Management. Actual receipts have not been that close to the monthly targets since February, when the national recession began slowing the rate of Idaho's four-year-old economic expansion.

And except for timing disparities in the crediting of interest on invested state funds, tax revenues would have actually exceeded projections for the first time in seven months.

"The improvement, combined with continued bright economic conditions in Idaho, raise hopes for over-than-predicted revenues," Michael Ferguson, the administration's chief economist, said.

That would help lawmakers restore at least some of the \$14 million Gov. Cecil Andrus ordered cut from the current state budget to avert any possibility of a deficit next June.

That 1.3 percent holdback took its biggest toll on public schools, where state aid was trimmed by \$6.3 million. If that money is not restored by lawmakers in January, it could end up being raised by emergency property tax increases in school districts throughout the state.

Sales tax collections in August ran nearly \$3 million ahead of the monthly forecast, and that gain was augmented by a \$1 million increase in personal income tax collections. The two revenue categories account for over 85 percent annual general tax collections.

"The most recently available economic data show Idaho as one of the fastest growing states in the nation, and this momentum should insure a strong (income tax) filing season later in this fiscal year," analysts said.

ISU president suggests ex-aide for Keiser vacancy

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho State University President Richard Bowen says his former aide, Les Purce, would make a good replacement for John Keiser as president of Boise State University.

Bowen told a media breakfast Tuesday the "battle was over" concerning the Board of Education's decision to terminate Keiser. He said the board would be wise to bring in someone from the outside.

Keiser was fired Friday. The board said it would conduct a nationwide search for a replacement, but it was unlikely a new president would be named before the end of the current academic year.

Purce is president of Evergreen State College in Washington. Purce, former Pocatello mayor and City Council member, was director of Idaho State's cooperative education program. He also was director of the state's largest agency, Health and Welfare, and served as director of the Department of Administration.

Ketchum-Stanley trail plan has compromise on motorized issue

KETCHUM — Proposed routes for a Ketchum-Stanley recreational trail have been mapped and are being prepared for public presentations later this year.

Proponents of the year-round trail system met at Ketchum Town Square earlier this week to review the routes. They agreed that totally separating motorized and non-motorized use of the route appeared impossible.

"When I look at the terrain, I don't think it's possible without having more impact than having them share the same trail in places," said planning team chairman Bill Vanderbilt. As presented by Vanderbilt during Tuesday's meeting, the trail would begin at the Sawtooth National

Recreation Area headquarters north of Ketchum and extend more than 60 miles north to the Stanley Ranger Station.

Separate trails are proposed for motorized and non-motorized traffic along much of the route, but two segments would have multiple uses.

- A nine-mile stretch from Baker Creek to Galena Lodge on the west side of Highway 75.
- The Decker Flat Road, extending approximately 12 miles from Champion Creek to just south of Stanley.

The planning team expects most non-motorized summer use on the route to be mountain bikes.

"It really falls together as a mountain bike route," said forester Ken Britton of the SNRA. In the winter, cross-country skiers

would have a marked trail from the SNRA headquarters to Stanley, following the route of the Boulder Mountain Ski Race and crossing Galena Summit by skiing up Gladia-tor Creek and through the Governor's Punchbowl.

No snowmobile route over Galena Summit has yet been identified. The motorized route, during the summer, would follow the old Galena Highway grade, but that trail will be marred by serious avalanche threats in the winter, Vanderbilt explained.

"In order to make a practical road that could be groomed, we would need a whole new road cut," he said. Vanderbilt said he plans to draft a preliminary proposal for the Ketchum-Stanley Trail next month in preparation for public hearings and an environmental assessment.

Burn aims at spurring growth

STANLEY — Foresters on the Sawtooth National Recreation Area burned 100 acres of sagebrush on Tuesday in the Decker Flats area south of Stanley.

The burning took place in several small patches scattered across 700 acres of sagebrush growth west of Highway 75.

Its purpose is to introduce more

plant diversity and improve forage production in the area, according to SNRA fire management specialist Carol Brown. "Impacts on sage grouse habitat is probably the main resource concern," Brown said.

"We expect this burn will improve brood habit for sage grouse by reducing the sage cover and increasing the diversity of cover. Diversity of cover provides for greater insect populations — chief food sources for young sage grouse."

Prescribed burns are designed to offset the impact of natural fire suppression on the SNRA. Brown explained. The burns are based on plans developed by resource specialists and approved by the Sawtooth National Forest Supervisor.

Tuesday's burn was performed and monitored by fire crews from the SNRA, the Ketchum Ranger District and a helitack crew.

No other prescribed burns are planned for this year, Brown reported.

Andrus pushes education proposal

POCATELLO (AP) — The best way to maintain Idaho's "wave of progress" is by pumping more money into education, Gov. Cecil Andrus says.

The governor said Thursday night Idaho's economy is strong. "How do we sustain it? We do it by strategically putting our money into the most important investment in Idaho's future, the education of our children," the governor said, in a speech prepared for the Pocatello Chamber of Commerce meeting. It was the governor's first appear-

ance stumping for support for an education platform he unveiled last week. The Andrus initiative, "Strong Start: Five Keys to Excellence," will be the cornerstone of the next executive budget.

Andrus said it will take priority over other spending requests. "There are dozens of important social services available from state government that can be integrated into the schools more effectively, and detailed plans to achieve that integration are being made," he said. "I have told state agencies to di-

rect their resources and programs toward this effort," the governor said.

The governor's proposals:

- Making sure that children are properly fed when they come to school.
- Plugging parents and grandparents into education programs.
- More localized decision-making by parents and teachers.
- "Future friendly" classrooms, with the latest technology.
- Better before and after-school programs for children who use day-care centers.

Pocatello eyes huge City Hall bill

POCATELLO (AP) — A West One Bank bill for \$1.6 million on the Pocatello City Hall made for some tense moments, although bank officials say it means nothing. But Mayor Peter Angstadt and City Attorney Dean Tranner are waiting to see what happens. A Monday deadline was included for the considerable sum.

"At first, I was more than a little

shocked," Angstadt said. "I thought we were still negotiating on the building."

Jim Grigsby, West One's chief negotiator, said sending out the notice is standard procedure, particularly if a loan or lease is due to mature.


"We're not demanding the city send us a check for \$1.6 million by Monday," Grigsby said. "The bank

is just wanting to show the city how much is owed on the building."

But City Clerk Pete McDougall said the notice is the first he has seen. The city has already signed a one-year extension on its 20-year lease and a check for \$15,482 will be sent to the bank Oct. 3.


City officials are looking for new quarters for the hall, police department and library.



Lights blaze, cameras roll

'Dark Horse' gallops into Wood River Valley

EAST FORK — "Say it again," commands David Hemmings as young Corey Simpson proceeds for the eighth time to rattle on about adjusting to his new school.

"Ah, they're all a bunch of neeps. They're all on my case because I'm new here." And with that he pulls out his Game Boy and fires away, zapping and exploding imaginary enemies.

The scene closes with his 15-year-old sister reassuring him everything will be all right as they walk toward their house.

Hollywood has once again descended upon the Wood River Valley, with lights blazing and cameras rolling.

From Trail Creek Summit, to Ketchum, Sun Valley, Hailey and Picabo, dozens of valley residents have had the chance to act as extras and advisors, and some even have speaking roles in what is sure to be a hit next spring.

A Sun Valley resident for two years now, Hemmings has brought the movie "Dark Horse" to his own back yard, and everyone associated with the film seems pleased.

"When all the odds were against this film happening, it was the one that made it come through," says David Butterfield, a deaf filmmaker from Ketchum who has been hired to assist with the production. "Dark Horse" is the G-rated story of an architect, played by actor Ed Begley Jr., "St. Elsewhere" fame and his daughter Allison, played by Ari Meyers from the television series "Kate and Allie."

After their move from Los Angeles to a

The shoot went well, with the exception of an incident with an officer from the Ketchum Police Department.

Todd Corder was providing traffic control for the shoot when he fell in the dark over some lumber, severely fracturing both elbows.

Now sitting at home without the use of either arm, Corder says it's just one of those things, but he'll remember "Dark Horse" forever.

In another instance that same night that can only be chalked up to showbiz, a crew spent valuable time and money remodeling the top level of Louie's Restaurant, transforming it into a night club set for the movie.

'The Wayward One' comes to CSI

TWIN FALLS — The Western Opera Theater of San Francisco has played to sophisticated opera-goers in New York City and to school children on remote Indian reservations in New Mexico. At 7:30 p.m. Thursday, the group will perform in Twin Falls, at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium.

Giuseppe Verdi's "La Traviata" is the first presentation of this year's Arts on Tour Committee. It is the popular operatic version of "Camille." The film version starred Greta Garbo. The word "traviata" is, literally, "the wayward one."

The entire score of "La Traviata" is filled with so many varied melodies that many of the world's greatest singers have coveted the leading roles in the opera. Based on real life, the work is known as a heart-rendering and spiritually uplifting examination of the maneuverings of the human heart under the influence of love.

"Camille" is one of the most fascinating figures in tragedy and has become immortal through the media of novel, play, grand opera and film. There's only one problem. Her name wasn't Camille. She has never, even in the Garbo film, actually had the name by which the popular culture identifies her.

The woman who has come to be known as Camille had a love affair, in 1844, with a young man named Alexandre Dumas (His father wrote "The Three Musketeers"). She was a legendary beauty named Rose Alphonsine Plessis, who eventually changed her name to Marie Duplessis.

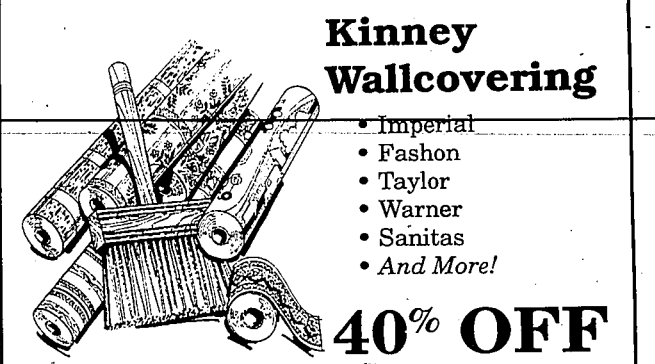

TWIN FALLS — From Brahms to Bernstein, Dvorak to Debussy, the Magic Valley Symphony kicks off its 1991-92 season Oct. 5 with the music of Dr. Alan Stanek, clarinetist and chairman of Idaho State University's music department.

During the concert, set for 8 p.m. at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium, Stanek will perform Debussy's "Premiere Rhapsody for Clarinet and Orchestra" and the "Rondo" from Mozart's "Concerto for Clarinet and Orchestra."

"I've judged young artist competitions for the Magic Valley Symphony, but I've never performed with them before," said Stanek, who grew up in Denver and holds music degrees from the University of Colorado, Eastman School of Music and the University of Michigan. He has appeared as

guest soloist with the Elkhorn Music Festival Orchestra in Sun Valley, Idaho State-Civic Symphony and Idaho Falls Symphony.

Stanek grew up in a musical family and recalls having excellent music teachers when he was a youngster.

"Today, in many places, children are lucky to study music in school for an hour once a week," he said. "We had music class every day. Stanek believes parents should be involved in conveying a love of music to their children, by encouraging them to take private piano lessons early and then moving them toward an instrument."

"Anyone can learn to play something, but when the shinniness wears off the horn and the child doesn't want to practice, the parent must teach him that he needs to finish what he starts — at least to a point," Stanek said.

"This kind of experience transfers to the rest of life." Stanek admitted that he was not always fond of practicing clarinet. "My parents had to make me

practice because I hated it," he said. "Now I understand that music is basic to our being human and that we learn a lot about how to live through music and the arts."

These days, Stanek likes different kinds of music. "I like to listen to jazz when I relax," he said, "and choral music with an orchestra is a favorite, too."

Stanek said he is excited about playing the "Rondo" written about the symphony because this year marks the 200th year of Mozart's death. "The concerto was written in Mozart's last year," he said.

The symphony will also perform "Symphony No. 8 in G Major" by Dvorak, "Fantasia on the Alleluia Hymn" by Jacob and Bernstein's "Overture to Candide" during the Oct. 5 concert. Ted Haddley serves as symphony conductor and music director.

Immediately after the performance, the symphony league invites concertgoers to attend a reception for Stanek and symphony members at the Eagle's Nest in the CSI Taylor Building.

An assistant hid crouched behind the bed to keep an eye on Tiger, a cat who had a cameo role in the scene. Camera crews worked barely two feet away from Meyers and Begley, yet they performed oblivious to the distractions.

Hemmings has amassed a production crew of talented people from across the United States. Many of the crew come from Los Angeles, but several are from New York and Virginia. Local talent has not been forgotten, with help coming from Boise and Ketchum.

Waiting is a major part of the day for the unseen crew.

"The technical term for what we do is 'hurry up and wait,'" says production assistant Susan Pickett, a free-lancer from Richmond, Va. "You sit around mindless and can't do anything" while the scenes are being shot, and then presto, an order goes out and people jump.

As the crew waits between scenes, it's apparent there has been a comradery quickly forged over the short duration of the project.

During one break, Corey — a cute little blond-haired kid from

Ketchum who plays Allison's brother — shows Begley a special hand-slapping routine he has learned.

As Corey and Begley go through the movements, Hemmings jumps in, letting loose with a comical ditty of head thumping, cheek plucking and hand slapping. "This jovial break provides a refreshing pause before the atmosphere turns serious once more."

Filming moves on to Wood River Junior High School this weekend where some 50 students will be used as extras. Crews will then move to Hallie's Judicial Courthouse Building next week and finish up again at the Susie Q Ranch on Thursday.

"Dark Horse" is due for release next March. The producers are hoping to have the world premier shown in Sun Valley.



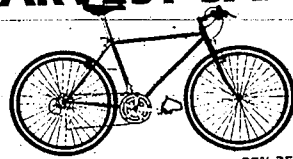

'Boyz:' Disturbing look at city strife

The student artworks hanging in the sixth grade classroom are of dead bodies, of boys fighting, of drive-by shootings... A high school student doing her homework is jolted by the sound of gunfire outside her window, but continues to study... Teen-age boys are "drinking beer and tossing football on the street, while youngsters a few yards away stare at a decomposing corpse... A young couple makes love, for the first time, oblivious to the constant drone of police helicopters patrolling overhead.

It's not such a beautiful day in the neighborhood, not in South-Central Los Angeles where 23-year-old writer-director John Singleton grew up and got his inspiration for the R-rated "Boyz n the Hood," one of the most profoundly disturbing looks yet at life inside an urban American war zone.

"Boyz" is the story of three hoodlum friends — one raised by his father, the other two half-brothers reared by a single mom — whose lives are about to intersect with what newspaper reports routinely label "acts of random violence."

The easiest way to describe this movie is to say it dramatizes what might be a three-inch newspaper story or a quick shot of sheet-draped bodies sprawled on the ground during the 10 o'clock news,

with a reporter shaking his head over the senselessness of another drive-by shooting.

It is that, and much more. Singleton, showing more maturity than anyone could expect from a director fresh out of film school, has struck such a fine balance between story — character — and atmosphere that by the time the movie reaches its violent climax, we are smacked in the midst of its emotional terror. For two hours, this neighborhood is our neighborhood, the people in danger are people we know, and if the tragedies make no sense, we at least come to understand their context.

Singleton's principal characters are The Styles (Cuba Gooding, Jr.), a bright well-grounded kid determined to work his way out of the neighborhood; Ricky Baker (Morris Chestnut), the high school football hero whose college athletic scholarship is dependent only on his passing his SAT exam; and Ricky's older half-brother Doughboy (rapper Ice Cube), an ex-con with a big attitude and little ambition.

Although the story pivots on gang violence, Singleton's mission is not to explore the gang culture; he wants us to know what it is like to live with it, to grow up with it, and to understand how hard it is to avoid.

In the opening credits, we learn that the movie is based on the true story of a young boy who was shot and killed by more than 100 police officers in a drive-by shooting. Yesterday's kids say goodbye to Dr. Seuss

NEW YORK (AP) — Every child knows the unwritten Dr. Seuss prescription for happiness: pick any one of his books and have Mommy or Daddy read it aloud at least once a day, and five times before bed. The children who grew up with Dr. Seuss are now parents with children growing up with Dr. Seuss. Every night before bedtime, they relive their warmest, fuzziest childhood memories by cracking open "The Cat in the Hat" for the 5,000th time for their own kids. "We have three of his books, and we read them A-L-L-L-L-L-L-L the time. You get the emphasis there, A-L-L-L-L-L-L the time," Tina Walton-Virta says. She sounds weary. Her 2-year-old, Olivia, is in "One Fish, Two Fish" overdrive. "It's almost like a mantra for her," her mommy says. "Her little Seuss mantra."

"That's the only book I remember from childhood. By heart. Now. At 28." Her 2½-year-old son is named Sam, as is the persistent protagonist of "Green Eggs and Ham." Sam could be after Sam-I-Am. Sam's mother admits, "Sam was an important name in my life." Sam adores Marvin K. Mooney, the adventurous, annoying anti-hero of "Marvin K. Mooney. Will You Please Go Now?" "There was a time we read that every day," Sam's mom says, and just in case there's any doubt, adds: "I said GO and GO I meant!" "The time had come — So Marvin went..."

Changes are. Olivia will never forget it. It seems few memories of childhood have the staying power of a Dr. Seuss-induced memory. Diane Greenfield remembers loving "The Cat in the Hat" as a child. 30 years ago, but her own 2-year-old, Douglas, is addicted to "Green Eggs and Ham." His favorite line: "Would you, could you, in a box?" "It's got a great message: Try something new. We even start reciting it to Douglas when we want him to try a new food. 'Try it, try it! You might like it, you will see!' And he gets this little gleam in his eye like he understands the point," she says.

Douglas' mom knows the exact number of times she has read "Green Eggs and Ham." "Too many. So many, that I could walk down the street reciting it," she said. But she refrains. So does Glen Miranker, even though he knows every word of "Scrambled Eggs Super."

"I just struck my fancy, even as a little kid," he says. "I remember being very impressed with the intricate rhymes. There's a series of bluffs and special eggs, and several of those have very elaborate internal rhymings which are very cute. Like the ziffs and the zuffs." He pauses for effect. This is not something he does often, even for family or friends: "I went for some ziffs, they're exactly like zuffs, but live on bluffs. And seeing how bluffs are exactly like cliffs, it's mighty hard telling the zuffs from the ziffs."

The key is keeping your bluffs and cliffs straight, lest your zuffs and ziffs become inextricably entangled, he explains. How many times did he read it before it was burned on his brain? "Lord only knows. It wasn't as if it was a conscious effort. I had just read it so many times, it dawned on me one day I had the whole thing committed to memory."

His youngest daughter, Molly, shows a marked preference for "The Cat in the Hat." "She's basically a defl at heart," her daddy says. "And the Cat in the Hat is quite a rogue. I think that he has such imaginative doings and gets away with it secretly appeals to her." Nothing will ever match the appeal of "Green Eggs and Ham" for Lisa Stein. "I will not eat them with a fork. I will not eat them with a fork," she recites spontaneously. She couldn't help herself; it was something she had to do.

SHOSHONE - The lives and values of rural Idaho people are the substance of "Shoshone," a one-hour television program that is part of a PBS-television series, entitled "States of Mind." The world premiere of "Shoshone" will be held at two special screenings Saturday at the Shoshone Showhouse. A 7 p.m. screening is for invited guests, and a 9 p.m. screening is for the general public. Their peaceful lives were disturbed when their grandson was sent to the Persian Gulf War. This war has caused the Barneys to reflect on America's role in the world and Shoshone's role in a changing nation.

Wald Conner, a former sheriff, was forced to evict the last prostitute from Shoshone.

Virgil Cozad holds regular Bible studies in his home and is one of many who believe religion is the basis for American society. Judge Barry Wood, a relative newcomer to Shoshone, combines formal law with western common sense.

Sheriff Darwin Mills, whose biggest problems are speeders and drunk drivers, sees little change in his community. He says he feels America would do well to emulate the values found in Shoshone.

Shoshone and its people - isolated by size, location and economy - deal with the common problems of war, religion, drought, law and order. "Shoshone," the television portrait, is a look at an American small town perched on a "fault line" of social change. It is a picture of rural America today.

Players treat Ryder Cup as 5th major

KIAWAH ISLAND, S.C. — There are the four Grand Slam events. Then, there is what Nick Faldo calls "the fifth major."

The Ryder Cup, a biennial tournament between America's best and the top golfers of Europe, begins Friday with the U.S. team minus one of its regulars. That might add more pressure for the Americans, seeking to return the trophy to the United States after losing it in 1985 and falling again in 1987 before a tie in 1989 left the cup in European hands.

"We are accustomed to the pressure of

competition," said Raymond Floyd, a former U.S. Ryder Cup captain who will be playing for the hosts this weekend. "But we are accustomed to playing for ourselves."

"This is different. Instead of playing for ourselves, we have 11 other teammates and a captain and the United States of America difference adds pressure."

"I'm glad it's here. We're ready to get on with it," American team captain Dave Stockton said after naming the eight players who will play the dominant Europeans in the opening matches Friday.

But Stockton is less happy — and the

American team quite possibly less ready — than a day earlier.

Steve Pate, scheduled to play in the maximum five matches for the Americans, was scratched from the opening round of competition because of injuries sustained in a three-day automobile accident Wednesday night.

"He's a fighter," Stockton said. "I expect him to be available Saturday and Sunday."

Pate said it may be even earlier.

"Right now," he said, "I think I can play" as early as Friday afternoon.

Stockton selected three-time U.S. Open champion Hale Irwin. 46, as Pate's

replacement in the opening foursome matches, in which two-man teams play alternate shots on the same ball.

The Europeans, meanwhile, are relying on their veterans in a rookie-heavy team to continue their success in the competition that for so many years was ruled by the United States.

European captain Bernard Gallacher of Scotland continued the pairings of Spanish ace Seve Ballesteros and Jose-Maria Olazabal, and England's Faldo and Masters champion Ian Woosnam of Wales.

"They've known they'd be playing

UNLV hopes to resolve NCAA charges by year's end

LAS VEGAS — UNLV officials, back from a meeting with the NCAA, say they are hopeful that charges against the school's basketball program will be resolved by the end of the year.

UNLV counsel Brad Bookie said NCAA investigators and attorneys agreed during the meeting to allow the university to review evidence gathered in the investigation.

The case had been temporarily stalled

while the NCAA and attorneys for individuals involved determined how the review of the evidence would violate neither Nevada state law nor NCAA enforcement procedures.

"What this does is it gets the process moving again," Bookie said. "We were in a holding pattern, if you will, waiting for the NCAA to decide how it wanted to handle the issue of the state statute."

Bookie said he hoped the breakthrough will allow UNLV to appear before the NCAA's infractions committee during its

Nov. 15-17 meeting in Kansas City, Mo. If that happens, UNLV might get a final resolution of its case by the end of the year.

"I'm hopeful we can make it in November," Bookie said. "I think now that the parties are all in agreement, it is an attainable goal."

UNLV faces possible probation or other penalties stemming from a letter of inquiry from the NCAA in which it alleges a number of violations in the UNLV basketball program.

Many of the allegations stem from the recruitment of former New York City prep star Lloyd Daniels, who was arrested at a North Las Vegas crack house and never played for the Runnin' Rebels.

UNLV is already banned from participating in next year's postseason NCAA tournament and from appearing on live television under a resolution of a battle between the agency and UNLV coach Jerry Tarkanian dating back to 1977.

Tarkanian announced earlier this year that the upcoming season would be his last.

Montana State appears to face the biggest task. The Bobcats, just 1-3 for the season, travel to Reno for a Big Sky game against Nevada. The 2-0 Wolf Pack is the nation's top-ranked Division I-AA team and has won 17 straight at home.

Nevada also has averaged nearly 56 points per game. MSU Coach Earle Solomonson said defense Nevada will be a problem, but his team has to be able to move the football as well. "Our offense has to come to play, too," he said. "You can't consistently make mistakes against a team like Nevada...and expect to win. But...you can't go out and play tentatively."

Idaho State also must break an eight-year trend. The Bengals travel to Missoula for a game against Montana, and ISU hasn't won there since 1983.

In the only other conference game this weekend, Eastern Washington is at Weber State. In nonleague games, No. 2-ranked Idaho hosts No. 17-ranked Northern Iowa, fifth-ranked Boise State hosts Stephen F. Austin and Northern Arizona is at Akron.

Solomonson called Nevada "an exceptional football team" that deserves its ranking. Nevada's Coach Auli says he's more concerned about the way his team plays than anyone else.

"We've taken somewhat of a different philosophy into this year. Every week we've decided to worry less about who we're playing and worry

more about what we're doing right and wrong," he said.

"We're watching less film of our upcoming opponent and more of our own film. So far, we're doing a good job of taking care of ourselves," Auli said.

Montana's Don Reed, finally back home after a two-weekend road trip to Louisiana that resulted in "100 losses," called Idaho State a "vastly improved team over last year."

"Idaho State absolutely is much better than they've been, that will be clear at the end of the year," Reed said. "They've added a lot of speed in the skill positions and they are much more mobile at quarterback with (Trevor) Cavanaugh."

"We're looking at this as a tough game for us. We have to approach every game that way, especially the way we played last week."

Magic Valley's Jund waits for ISU opportunity

POCATELLO — Joel Jund wants to play.

The former Twin Falls and Jerome quarterback has spent the better part of the last three years watching from the Idaho State sidelines.

Now the senior is hoping that his playing time will head the same direction as the Bengals' record — up.

"When you're second string, playing time is just a shot away," says Jund. "You've got to be ready to play."

When Jund has had the opportunity to play, he has responded with some respectable numbers. He has hit 63 of 99 passing attempts for 735 yards and six touchdowns. He's added three more TDs by rushing.

Outstanding numbers when one

considers that of his eight career interceptions, five came as a freshman and three of those against Oregon which was ranked fifth in the nation at the time.

Stats like that would generally give a quarterback a good shot at starting at most schools but Jund spends his first three years mopping under fourth-year starter Jason Whitmer.

Now, two games into his last season, he finds himself watching JC transfer Trevor Cavanaugh run the offense after the two battled for the starting position in spring ball.

"He does some things better than I do and I'm better at others," Jund says. "I think the coaches just decided to go with Cavanaugh's athletic ability."

Not that Jund's teammates aren't confident with his ability to move the team. "Look at his numbers. He puts points on the board," says center Tom Hebert.

Many of those points have come in big situations for the Bengals. "As a sophomore, Jund came into the last game of the season against Weber State to replace an injured Whitmer and responded by throwing two TD passes to get the Bengals close before falling back 45-35."

"The Weber game and throwing a TD against Utah as a freshman were probably the highlights of my career up to this point," said the senior.

Even if he doesn't get the chance to start, Jund is grateful for the chance to

use his talent to pay for his education. He has one more year before receiving his degree in social studies. After that he plans to pursue a career in teaching while coaching his first love, football.

Jund and his ISU teammates travel to Missoula this weekend to meet Montana (1-2) which just returned from a two-week trip to Louisiana which split with Louisiana Tech and McNeese State.

"I think a lot of people underestimated us in the preseason polls," he says. "We can win this game if we just play like we know we can."

The Bengals struggled offensively at Kansas State and must control the ball if they expect to win.

"We've got to put some points on the board," said Jund, who is hoping he'll have a chance to do so some of that himself.

Murphy fits mold of small, quick Vandal receivers

Two years ago, Yo Murphy was just another Idaho Vandal newcomer whose only claim to fame was a name that struck a chord.

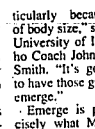
Now Murphy, born Llewellyn Pitts Murphy, is making a name for himself with his bid to become one of the top receivers in the Big Sky Conference while continuing a long line of Vandal receiving clones who keep making headlines.

Early in his career, it was Eric Yarber, a diminutive speedster who went on to play in the National Football League. Then came Neosis Norris, John Jake and Lee Allen. None of all were very big, but all of them etched their names in the Vandal history book.

Murphy isn't even on the same page as his predecessors yet, but his potential for joining them is unmistakable. "They're all in the same mold, particularly because of body size," said University of Idaho Coach John L. Smith. "It's good to have those guys emerge."

An Emerger is precisely what Murphy's done. Since coming out of Idaho Falls High School where he was a USA Today All-American selection at defensive back in 1989, Murphy has fought through two years of getting nowhere. He felt like he was spinning his wheels, working and working but never going anywhere.

"I didn't think I was making much progress," said Murphy, whose No. 2-ranked Vandals are preparing to play host to 19th-ranked Northern Iowa at 7:05 p.m. Saturday in the Kibbie Dome. "I knew I could do it, but in the back of my mind, he had his doubts."

Though he caught five passes in his freshman year, he spent most of his time on the sidelines watching the likes of Allen play to adoring crowds in the Dome. Kasey Dunn, too, is a subject of Murphy's admiration; and he and Allen were both sources of inspiration to the 5-foot-10 junior.

Dunn, who led the nation in receiving last year, "doesn't think" while running pass routes, something Murphy longs to replicate. Allen, meanwhile, ran great routes and had great speed.

He had the benefit of their advice. But it wasn't until last spring that Murphy put all his tools together. All it took was a little confidence.

"I'm getting the ball thrown to me a lot," said Murphy, who has caught a career-high seven catches for 116 yards in Idaho's 40-14 romp over Montana State.

That started in spring practice, said Murphy, when quarterback Doug Nussmeier began throwing to him more often as a way to relieve the pressure on Dunn and tight end Eli

Ala'ilima Daley. Soon enough, Murphy had shaken the jitters and really started to produce.

"When Doug throws me the ball, 99.9 percent of the time I'm going to catch it."

Coach Smith probably won't vouch for those percentages, but he couldn't be much happier with the kid from his own hometown.

"The progress he's made has been great," Smith said. "He's starting to blossom into the type of receiver he can be. He's really turning into something."

In Idaho's three games this season, he's caught 14 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns, including the 44-yard TD number he did on MSU cornerback Reggie Carlton last week.

Entering this week's game against NIU, there seems to be no end in sight for Murphy. Likewise, he sees none for the Vandals.

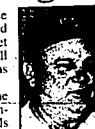
"I don't see us losing here," he said. "I don't see us losing, really."

Ex-Cubs manager accused of gambling on other sports

NEW YORK (AP) — Penthouse magazine said in an article released Thursday that Don Zimmer bet \$3,000 to \$5,000 weekly on football and basketball games while he was manager of the Chicago Cubs.

Zimmer said Thursday night that he had been questioned by Commissioner Fay Vincent last winter and he feels he is in fine standing with baseball.

"This guy that wrote the story, I don't know him," Zimmer told WMAQ radio in Chicago, referring to author Jerome Tuccille. "Supposedly

I talked to him. I don't know the guy. I will say this: the commissioner called me in, I think in the winter of '90... As far as I'm concerned, the meetings were there in the commissioner, he was satisfied with everything I told him and... half of this, I'm kind of giggling at. I've got

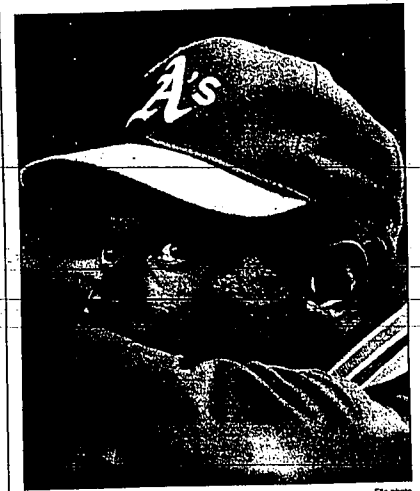
the whole thing in front of me... Some of it, I can't even believe. Somebody's trying to make a paycheck. What can I say?"

Tuccille said in the article appearing in the November edition of the magazine that more than a year ago he met with Kevin Hallinan, director of security for baseball commissioner Fay Vincent, and John Dowd, an investigator for the commissioner's office. Tuccille asked if Zimmer had been investigated by the commissioner's office.

"We can't get into any of that," Tuccille said Dowd told him repeatedly. "We're not at liberty to discuss it."

Hallinan did not return repeated phone calls to his office by The Associated Press on Thursday. Rich Levin, director of public relations for major league baseball, said, "Our policy is not to discuss any investigation that we have conducted or are conducting."

Henderson says he didn't dog it

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Rickey Henderson, breaking a self-imposed silence since his coming baseball's all-time base stealer, says he'd like to stay in Oakland and those suggesting he "dogged" it this season are giving him a bum rap.

"Why would I want to go out going to play, that I don't care? That would be bull," Henderson said in an interview published Thursday in the Oakland Tribune. "You can't lay down. If you're going to lay down, why ask for anything? If I was 100 percent, why would I play like I wasn't 100 percent?"

Henderson, last year's American League MVP, insists his sub-par season is the result of a series of nagging injuries, and not the fact he filed an assault complaint against him in July, and there was a prolonged absence from the club following the birth of his second daughter last month.

Henderson, who makes \$5 million a year, brought some of the criticism on himself with his behavior during his spring training contract squabble. He sulked and suggested he might not be able to play his best because the club's refusal to renegotiate was hard to get off his mind.

"They say 75 percent of Rickey is better than 100 percent of somebody else," he said. "But 75 percent is not the real Rickey. So people write that Rickey's jacking up his mind."

"That has come back to haunt him as he struggled through this season."

Henderson, who was defensive and at times emotional during the Tribune interview, said he hoped to make a fresh start next season. "I know it's a messed-up season, but I would really like to come back," he said.

"I look forward to every year," he added. "I'm looking forward to next year. I'm looking forward to having my mind more at ease."

Michigan-FSU showdown focuses on different QBs

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Bobby Bowden is a history buff. Maybe that's why the Florida State coach sees his team's game with Michigan as a battle between North and South.

The No. 1 Seminoles (3-0) play No. 3 Michigan (2-0) at noon Saturday in Michigan Stadium.

"The quarterbacks in this game are two very interesting players," Bowden said.

Bowden said Florida State quarterback Casey Weldon and Michigan's Elvis Grbac seem to fit the stereotypes of North and South players.

Weldon is 6-foot-1, 200 pounds and quick. He ran 40 yards in 4.6 seconds, one of the fastest times ever for a FSU quarterback. Grbac, at 6-6, 220 pounds, is a plodder.

"Casey is faster, more nifty, has more agility, is more of a snappy thrower," Bowden said. "The quarterback they've got is bigger, stronger, he uses his head good, can throw a mile, but maybe isn't as finessed as ours."

"For the things Michigan is trying to do, Grbac fits in perfectly. For what we're trying to do, this guy fits in better than any I've had."

Weldon, a fifth-year senior, didn't become the starter until the seventh game last season. But the Seminoles have won nine consecutive games since then and Weldon's stock has risen in the Heisman Trophy talk.

This season, Weldon has completed 48 of 64 passes for 628 yards with seven touchdowns and no interceptions.

"I'm pleased with the way I'm playing," Weldon said. "You always wind up having two or three throws back each game, but I think my decisions have been pretty good."

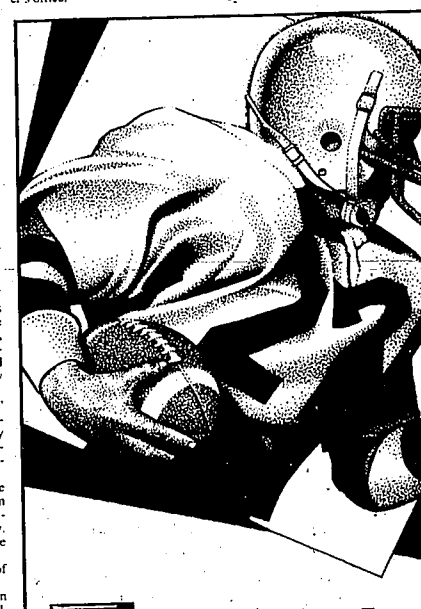
Michigan coach Gary Moeller, naturally, is worried about Weldon. "He makes good decisions when he's running," Moeller said. "With so many guys, it's a 50-50 chance. It's hard to get it to me or you (for an interception). But Weldon is an accurate passer when he's moving."

Grbac has completed 34 of 47 passes for 373 yards with four TDs and one interception. Last week he played his finest game at Michigan, completing 20 of 22 passes, including a 25-yard TD toss to Desmond Howard that sealed a 24-14 victory over Notre Dame.

"I think he's getting better," Moeller said. "He's more comfortable. He's putting more personality into it. He'll be on the sideline hollering now. He gets really emotionally into a football game."

"Elvis used to punish himself if he didn't do things right. That position is always going to have some mistakes. He handles things better now. That's where he's started to make his maturity jump."

Weldon has earned the respect of the Michigan defense. "He has great poise," Michigan linebacker Eric Anderson said. "Weldon is really every weapon on his command. He does a great job of using all of his eligible receivers. He doesn't just concentrate on one receiver."

GNP, jobless reports show no economic weakness

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy showed a worse-than-expected annual rate of 0.5 percent in the spring, and there was a big jump in laid-off workers seeking jobs benefits early this month, the government said Thursday.

The downward revision in the gross national product, the country's total output of goods and services, and the 8.9 percent increase in the number of Americans filing for unemployment benefits were the latest signs of a struggling economy, analysts say.

White House economic adviser David Jones, an economist at Aubrey G. Lunston & Co., a government securities dealer. "The weak spots are employment, consumer spending and housing. Those could be dangerous signs that the recovery will stall out."

But while revising the GNP decline to make it worse, the government said that inflation was subdued during the second quarter with a GNP price index tied to an unchanging

marketbasket of goods and services rising by just 3.1 percent by annual rate. That was down significantly from 5.2 percent in the first quarter.

Before the 0.5 percent drop in the April-June quarter, the GNP fell at an annual rate of 1.6 percent in the October-December quarter last year and 2.8 percent in the January-March period this year. The three consecutive declines left the GNP, after adjusting for inflation, at \$4.19 trillion the second quarter. Analysts had been expecting the GNP

report to show newfound weakness from April through June, but they were surprised that the drop was put at 0.5 percent with consumer and government spending and business restocking of inventories all revised

lower. It marked the second straight downward revision. Originally, the economy was thought to have actually been growing at an annual rate of 0.4 percent in the spring. That was revised last month to show a slight 0.1 percent decline.

The rise in jobs claims to 439,000 for the week ending Sept. 14, up from 470,000 the previous week, was seen as even more worrisome because it showed that layoffs, which should be declining in a normal recovery, were beginning to rise again.

The increase left jobless claims at their highest level in three months. Analysts said only part of the jump could be explained away by the fact that it reflected a rebound in a holiday-shortened filing period in the previous week.

CBS's 'Mission of the Shark' captures tragedy, history of USS Indianapolis

Viewers of "Jaws" (1975) still remember that chilling moment when the wily shark expert (Robert Shaw) told the story of the USS Indianapolis, the ship that delivered the parts of the atomic bomb that was dropped on Hiroshima in 1945. On its way back, it was hit by Japanese torpedoes, and for five days, the survivors drifted in the Pacific, watching their numbers dwindle from approximately 850 to 317, as men fell victim to dehydration, exposure, madness (from drinking salt water) and the circling sharks.

Now a CBS movie, "Mission of the Shark," which stars Stacy Keach as the captain of the Indianapolis and Richard Thomas as the ship's doctor, tells the tale of that fateful voyage. It airs Sunday, Sept. 29.

The tragedy was so horrific that the ship's captain, Charles McVay, became the first U.S. captain to be court-martialed for losing a ship in battle.

"He was accused of failing to zigzag and not abandoning ship in time," says Keach. "He was acquitted of not abandoning ship in time. But he was given a suspended sentence on failing to zigzag."

The moviemakers clearly feel that McVay, who was one of the last to leave the ship, was unjustly accused. "The Japanese submarine had manned torpedoes — kamikaze torpedoes — so even if you were zigzagging it wouldn't have made any difference," Keach says.

And the delay in abandoning ship?

"All of the communication lines were knocked out when the ship was hit," Keach says. "And after it was hit, the motor was still going. What that meant was that as they abandoned ship the men were spread out over about a seven-mile area, which became 27 miles after the fifth day."

Even if the ship had been abandoned earlier, it probably would not have made a difference. "If they had been picked up the next morning, the chances are that 600 men who lost their lives could have been saved," says Keach.

While preparing for the role, Keach talked to some of the survivors. "I was particularly interested in their attitude toward McVay," he says. "They all loved him, and they all feel, to a man, that he was given a raw deal."

McVay's sentence was commuted, and he eventually became a rear

admiral. "But at Christmastime and on birthdays, he would get cards and letters saying, 'Dear Capt. McVay. If it wasn't for you, our son would be with us today,'" Keach said.

"Twenty-three years after, he committed suicide. Now, I think it's presumptuous to say that the tragedy of the Indianapolis is what caused the suicide.

"His domestic life had sort of gone to pieces, and he was not in the best of health. But his life was not all peaches and cream after that. — that's for sure."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Murphy Brown's pregnancy helped deliver a first-place finish for the CBS show and the network during the fall season's opening week.

CBS won the week largely because of its hit Monday night line-up, which occupied four spots on the top 10 list of prime time shows.

The hour-long premieres of "Murphy Brown" and "Designing Women" finished first and second, respectively, according to network figures released Tuesday.

The A.C. Nielsen Co. supplied the networks with the official figures, but delayed release of the numbers to news agencies until Wednesday. The Associated Press obtained the figures from the networks.

Viewers tuned to "Murphy Brown" to find out whether the acerbic TV reporter played by Candice Bergen was indeed pregnant and which of two possible lovers, was the father.

She was, and the responsible party was Robin Thomas's character, Jake.

CBS' "Major Dad," which precedes the hugely popular Monday comedies, was No. 4.

Monday night line-up boosts CBS to 1st place during fall's opening week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Murphy Brown's pregnancy helped deliver a first-place finish for the CBS show and the network during the fall season's opening week.

CBS won the week largely because of its hit Monday night line-up, which occupied four spots on the top 10 list of prime time shows.

The hour-long premieres of "Murphy Brown" and "Designing Women" finished first and second, respectively, according to network figures released Tuesday.

The A.C. Nielsen Co. supplied the networks with the official figures, but delayed release of the numbers to news agencies until Wednesday. The Associated Press obtained the figures from the networks.

Viewers tuned to "Murphy Brown" to find out whether the acerbic TV reporter played by Candice Bergen was indeed pregnant and which, of two possible lovers, was the father.

She was, and the responsible party was Rubin Thomas's character, Jake.

CBS' "Major Dad," which precedes the hugely popular Monday comedies, was No. 4.

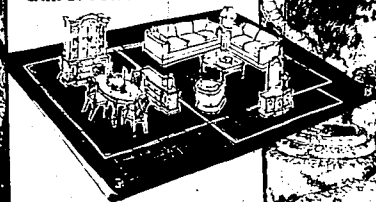
