Protest set; 2nd waste truck unloads

The second truckload of high-level radioactive waste from Colorado was being unloaded at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory Thursday, and attorneys for the state made no progress in the latest court attempt to block further shipments on air quality grounds.

"These two shipments violate state law because the Department of Energy is not in compliance with Idaho air quality

regulations," Gov. Cecil Andrus said. "We are anxious for a court to act to stop the shipments since the Department of Energy will not acknowledge its responsibility to follow the law."

The truck, carrying 1,800 pounds of spent fuel from Public Service Co. of Colorado's decommissioned Fort St. Vrain reactor near Denver, cleared the Idaho Port of Entry at Inkom well before dawn, just as the first shipment did last Saturday.

"Everything went very smooth," Idaho

State Police spokeswoman Marilyn Richardson said. "There were no violations. There were no protesters."

A third shipment was imminent, some officials said, but under federal law the transport schedule is confidential. Using three trucks to ferry the waste, the utility has said it plans to move all 300 tons — 247 truckloads — to INEL within a year.

Bill Chisholm of Buhl, who will be arraigned next week on a misdemeanor charge after standing in front of the first

truck at Inkom on Saturday, said he and other protesters tried to catch up with the second shipment but failed.

He said a demonstration was being organized for Twin Falls today at noon in front of the INEL office, 233 2nd St. N., possibly coinciding with the next shipment from Fort St. Vrain.

The latest shipment came just hours after Andrus, in a speech to defense contractors meeting in a Washington, D.C., suburb,

Power of positive living

Dyer expounds his beliefs for breakfast crowd

TWIN FALLS — Thank Wayne Dyer for rock superstar Michael Jackson's next album.

One of Dyer's pop metaphysics books had made its way into Jackson hands. An inspired Jackson invited Dyer and his family to Jackson's ranch getaway, where the two talked about Dyer's philosophy.

Jackson sang "Happy Birthday" to one of Dyer's sons Wednesday, and his next album will carry some of Dyer's themes. Dyer, a noted author, psychotherapist, college professor and lecturer, preaches the power of the mind and changing beliefs.

Dyer spoke Thursday to an audience that nearly filled the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium. He spoke after the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce's Success Breakfast.

Dyer's philosophy revolves around believing, Hockey superstar Wayne Gretzky, he said, succeeds because his mind sees the puck slamming into the net before every shot.

He congratulates people who have lost jobs. Such an experience is only detrimental if a person believes it is, he said. Instead, "bad" experiences are part of what happens to a person as he goes through life.

"Life is an exam," he said. "If you don't pass the tests, then you keep repeating."

Dyer is an associate professor at St. John's University in New York, and holds a degree in counseling psychology from Wayne State University/University of Michigan. His books include "Your Erroneous Zones," "Pulling Your Own Strings" and the novel, "Gifts From Eykis."

His speech matched the theme of the chamber's breakfast, where the chamber names its "Person of the Year," an award given to reward volunteer and professional work. Dyer, who once counseled at a hospital, said he never heard anybody on a death bed regret not spending more time at work.

"You come into this world in a naked little body and you leave in a wrinkled old body," he said. "The measure of your life is not in what you accumulated, but in what you gave away."

Dyer also means. He says it is a way of accomplishing things, and Jackson came into his life after Dyer concentrated on finding a popular public figure to publicize his beliefs.

Dyer, author of at least four books and guest on 5,200 radio and television talk shows, hopes Jackson's records and popularity spread his beliefs beyond the millions of people who bought his books and listened to his speeches.

Panel calls 2 women to testify

WASHINGTON — A woman who says Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas once made "unwelcome advances" will be called to testify at Senate hearings on sexual harassment accusations against him, a source said Thursday.

The witness, Angela Wright, was identified as a former Equal Employment Opportunity Commission public affairs spokeswoman who now is an editor at the Charlotte (N.C.) Observer.

An administration source familiar with the investigation said Wright was prepared to testify that Thomas made the unwelcome advances on a date before she went to work for the agency.

Thomas is chaired — the agency during the Reagan administration.

The hearings set to start Friday also will pit Thomas against University of Oklahoma law professor Anita F. Hill, who has said he sexually harassed her when she was his assistant at the EEOC.

The White House issued a statement confirming that another witness had been called to testify.

The White House has been notified by the Judiciary Committee staff that they intend to call another witness to testify against Judge Thomas. White House spokesman Sean Walsh said Thursday night. "We cannot discuss the details of this matter, but Judge Thomas will deal with the allegations in the course of the hearings."

Walsh complained that the committee had not requested or pursued an FBI investigation of Ms. Wright's complaints, "as is normal practice."

Ms. Hill, the former aide to Thomas at EEOC is expected to be the lead witness when the hearings begin Friday morning. At stake in the proceedings is Thomas' bitterly fought nomination to the Supreme Court.

"He knows it's been terribly damaging but he wants to do what he can to clear this cloud off his character," said Sen. Orrin G. Hatch, R-Utah, who will act as Thomas' chief Senate defender in the hearings.

Drunken driving worst highway safety problem

WASHINGTON — Drunken driving is considered the nation's most serious highway safety problem by a plurality of Americans, according to a survey commissioned by Mothers Against Drunk Drivers.

The survey of 9,028 drivers across the country, conducted by the Gallup Organization, also showed that a large majority of Americans who drink say they have changed their behavior over the last few years, with many embracing the designated driver system.

George Gallup Jr., the organization's president, said at a news conference that the survey shows there is a wide perception that teenage drivers are a major group involved in driving after drinking.

Micky Saddof, president of MADD, said the organization will use the results of the poll to focus its efforts to push for laws permitting the administrative revocation of

the licenses of drivers found to be under the influence of alcohol, to lower the legal blood alcohol limit for drivers over 21 to .08 percent, to set the legal limit at zero for drivers younger than 21 and to push for sobriety checkpoints.

The random telephone survey was paid for by the State Farm Insurance Co. and the Gallup Foundation. The margin of error was plus or minus 1 percent.

Major conclusions based on the survey were:

- Thirty-nine percent cited drinking and driving as the most serious highway safety problem, followed by speeding, 22 percent; poor highways, 8 percent; poor drivers, 6 percent; not wearing seat belts, 5 percent; and heavy traffic, 5 percent.

- Forty-eight percent said they thought penalties for first offense drunken driving were not severe enough. But that margin increased to 59 percent who felt the penalty for second offense drunken driving was not severe enough.

Now Congress' ambulance at center of controversy

WASHINGTON — Congress' medical office on Thursday tried to defuse a controversy over its ambulance, saying it is not for lawmakers only but for anyone with a life-threatening illness or injury.

In separate incidents, congressional authorities refused to transport two injured women in the vehicle and told Roll Call — a Capitol Hill newspaper — the ambulance was for members of Congress only.

One of the injured lay bleeding just a few feet away from the ambulance and both women had to wait a considerable time for Washington's much-criticized ambulance system to respond.

The controversy broke out just as House members came under fire for writing rubber checks at the lawmakers' bank and stifling the restaurant system. Senators were scolded by constituents

this week for their slow initial response to sexual harassment allegations against Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas.

The statement on the ambulance Thursday was issued by the office of Speaker Thomas S. Foley in the name of the Office of the Attending Physician.

It said the office responds to a medical emergency "whether it be for a member of Congress, congressional staff, or any of the more than one million tourists who visit the Capitol each year. Some 90 percent of the emergencies ... are for non-members, and 90 percent of those cases do not require any transportation to a medical facility."

However, in the event that transportation is required, the office's ambulance is available at the discretion of the physician on the scene for life-threatening emergencies.

More rain for Florida while Southern California bakes

Heavy rain produced some flooding Thursday in Florida, but most of the region received a break from two days of downpours.

A heat wave pushed temperatures past 100 in Southern California.

As much as 2 inches of rain fell in Melbourne, midway up Florida's east coast, and some streets filled with as much as 3 feet of water, the National Weather Service said.

While southern Florida residents were inconvenienced by up to 14 inches of rain on Tuesday and Wednesday, the deluge gave plants and animals relief from a three-year drought. The Everglades system was back to its soggy natural state.

"This is just what the park needed," said John Ogden, a biologist at Everglades National Park.

"At midday, showers and occasional thunderstorms were scattered over southern Florida, the Georgia coast, northern Alabama, southeast Tennessee, northwest Pennsylvania and western New York.

There were no reports of more than a half inch of rain during the six hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT.

Southern California was in the grip of a heat wave. Temperatures around San Diego reached the low 90s in the morning, and at midday the mercury had soared to 112 at Gillespie Field east of the city.

But in Alaska, a few snow flurries reached the lower elevations of the Anchorage and Eagle River areas — their first flakes of fall.

The low temperature for the Lower 48 states was 22 at Craig, Colo.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EDT ranged from 46 at Houghton, Mich., to 112 at San Diego's Gillespie Field.

Searing personal questions face accuser, accused in public forum

WASHINGTON (AP) — For Anita Hill and Clarence Thomas, accuser and accused, the questions will be intensely personal in a rare and riveting televised forum.

Interrogators from the Senate Judiciary Committee won't be asking about two legal experts' constitutional opinions. The questions will concern details of Thomas' and Hill's past behavior, talked about in front of her, her allegations and his denials that he sexually harassed her when she was his assistant at two government agencies.

"I feel sorry for both Judge Thomas and Professor Hill," said Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, one of Thomas' stoutest defenders. "Neither one is going to walk out of there a whole person," he said. "They're both going to be badly damaged."

The eight Democrats and six Republicans on the Judiciary Committee will return to Thomas' nomination to the Supreme Court at 10 a.m. Friday. Their assignment is to examine and evaluate — "ventilate" in the word of Chairman Joseph R. Biden — the allegations Hill has lodged against her former boss.

Those allegations exploded into public view last weekend, forcing the Senate to postpone the vote that was to send Thomas to a lifetime seat on the nation's highest court.

Hill, a former assistant to Thomas at the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, alleges that when she refused Thomas' request for a date he harassed her with talk of X-rated movies and descriptions of pornographic scenes of bestiality.

Even before the procedural details of the hearing were set, strategies were taking shape. Both parties will try to exploit inconsistencies in the public record so far.

For instance, Thomas' chief supporters in the Senate, Hatch and John Danforth, R-Mo., say he denies ever asking Hill to go out with him. But published reports have also said Hill told the FBI he did ask her out.

Hill will have to respond to Thomas' strongest piece of evidence so far — telephone logs he says show she telephoned him 11 times after she left her job with him in the EEOC. The implication is that she calls evidence a continuing cordial relationship that seems inconsistent with her story of harassment.

She told The Washington Post, however, that the logs were "garbage." She said that if there were messages, they were merely her attempts to return telephone calls from him. She pointed out calling him to offer congratulations on his marriage, as one of the logs indicates.

Hatch said the secretary who logged the calls for Thomas may appear as a witness.

There is also the question of why she followed him when Thomas moved from the Department of Education to the top job at EEOC in 1982, if he had harassed her. Hill said she was young, then 25, inexperienced, and fearful of being without a job. His harassment had stopped for a time, she said, and she didn't have the option of remaining at Education.

But others have suggested a job was available to her at the department, and that in any event as a Yale-educated lawyer work would have been available elsewhere.

For Thomas' partisans, the task is to pick apart Hill's story without appearing too heavy-handed. They must avoid seeming to brutalize her and make her appear to be victimized a second time before a national audience.

"We're going to be very, very firm with her, but treat her with the utmost respect," said Stan Cannon, the spokesman for Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo. "We don't want to attack her character, we want to attack her story."

Still, any such approach will easily get into questions of character. To establish that sexual talk amounted to sexual harassment, something must be known about the vice's capabilities — how easily offended she was.

Hill spent Thursday consulting with her newly formed legal team, said Louise-Hilsen, a publicist retained to be her spokeswoman during the hearings. Hill's parents and two brothers were among those with her in the hearing room Friday.

President Bush, meanwhile, continued to express support for his choice — to succeed Thurgood Marshall on the nation's highest court.

"I support him 100 percent," the president said. However, he added: "I'm simply not going to inject myself into what's going on in the Senate."

"Let's see the Senate get on with this business in a fair fashion, get this matter resolved," Bush said.

The panel could hear testimony through the weekend before the Senate votes at 6 p.m. Tuesday on the troubled nomination.

The hearing's format will be different from the usual committee arrangement in which the 14 members take turns asking questions.

Sen. Joseph R. Biden, D-Del., the panel's chairman, and Sens. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., a former prosecutor, and Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., a former judge, will ask questions for the Democrats.

Hatch will question Thomas while Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., former Philadelphia district attorney, will

question Hill, aides said.

Two witnesses whom Hill once told her allegations of sexual harassment were among those subpoenaed to testify, said sources familiar with the arrangements.

Susan J. Hoercher, who was graduated from Yale Law School in 1980 with Hill, has told investigators that Hill once confided to her that she had been sexually harassed at the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, said sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Joel Paul, an American University law professor, another witness, has told investigators that when Hill interviewed in 1987 for a teaching position she said she left EEOC because she had been sexually harassed.

As the committee's staff prepared for the hearings, Thomas' Republican defenders tried to rebut the charges.

At a Capitol Hill news conference, Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., Thomas' mentor and chief Senate champion, introduced several women who vouched for the nominee's character and sensitivity to the issue of harassment.

Thomas' attorney worked with Danforth's Senate staff, said that when she suffered sexual harassment "outside my immediate family, no one exhibited more

compassion (was) more caring about what was happening than Clarence Thomas."

Pamela Talkin, who was Thomas' chief of staff for three of the eight years he chaired the EEOC, said she was a feminist and a feminist understanding of sexual politics.

"I saw his outrage when he had even a whiff of impropriety by the men or our agency," Ms. Talkin said. Thomas took tough measures to ensure that harassment and would have been even tougher "if castration were legal."

As subpoenas went out, committee staff members were also interviewing witnesses either in person or by telephone.

Ms. Hilsen, Hill's spokeswoman, said the legal team representing the law professor includes John Frank and Janet Napolitano of Phoenix, Washington lawyer Michele A. Roberts and Georgetown University law professor Susan Deller Ross.

Hatch acknowledged he had not read the FBI report of the allegations before the Senate Judiciary Committee voted and sent the nomination to the Senate floor — a move that drew a sharp rebuke.

"I should have, there is no question about it," Hatch said. But the senator said he relied upon what turned out to be accurate descriptions of the FBI's findings to make his decision about what he conceded were troubling allegations.

The tribal council also voted renewed his attack on the federal government, accusing it of "immense neglect" of the nuclear waste storage problem.

And he predicted an open revolt among western states if the government's quick-fix waste management tactics persist.

"A court has to insist that the federal government adhere to state law," the governor declared Thursday.

Leaders of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes, whose reservation must be crossed by the waste transports, said tribal authorities were never notified of the shipment so they could make good on the warning they issued to drivers of the first truckload that future shipments would be in violation of reservation law.

"Last night our officers were not notified by Idaho State Police of the second shipment, and Tribal Council member Marvin Osborn is furious. If we knew it was going to be done, why didn't they tell us about it? The way the communication ball is rolling it doesn't seem like we're connecting right."

The tribal council also voted unanimously to ask a federal judge in Pocatello to enforce the Shoshone-Bannock ban on nuclear waste shipments crossing the reservation, hoping to "halt the shipments permanently."

That petition could be filed as early as today.

State attorneys gained little ground Thursday in pressing the governor's bid to force suspension of the shipments at least until the tribes obtain a state air quality permit for its storage facility. The Energy Department, which has already won two earlier federal court confrontations over the waste shipments, claims no permit is needed.

The state petition has been moved into federal court, and attorneys have yet to get a hearing on the matter.

The second truck, tracked by satellite during the 750-mile trip, was expected to arrive at about an hour at the port of entry before the State Police let it complete the final 80 miles to INEL.

After trucks on two practice runs

earlier this year failed to clear the port because of deficiencies, inspectors have found no reason to turn them back since resumption of waste shipments for temporary storage.

"We inspected it very carefully as they did the others," Andrus said. "The dry runs paid off for them."

Andrus has been battling the Energy Department for the last three years over its failure to open permanent waste dumps while insisting INEL be used for additional temporary storage. In the last three decades millions of cubic feet of radioactive and hazardous waste, generated outside Idaho, have piled up in storage above and below ground at the eastern Idaho facility.

The governor warned the commercial waste from Colorado is just the beginning of new shipments for storage at INEL. He said the government plans to begin shipping similar material from reactor in New York in the next several years followed by radioactive waste from a defense plant in Ohio and from generators overseas.

Half of American women due child support get short-changed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Half the American men required to pay child support deliver less than ordered and one-fourth pay their ex-wives nothing at all, the Census Bureau said Thursday.

Men are more likely to pay if they have the right to visit their kids.

"In some cases, there probably is a genuine inability to come up with the necessary funds," said Larry Jackson, Virginia's social services commissioner and head of the American Public Welfare Association's task force on child-support enforcement.

But there are cases where men just flat

leave," he said. "They don't want to pay. They're angry at their spouse. Often they couch this in terms of, 'If I can't see my children, I'm not going to pay child support.' That's what we hear most often."

The bureau said that in 1989, eight out of 10 fathers with visitation rights paid child support, and nine out of 10 with joint custody paid. Fewer than half those without such rights paid support.

A little more than half of the fathers without custody had the right to visit their children in 1990. Fewer than one in 10 had joint custody.

Fathers were also more likely to pay if they lived in the same state as the mother.

"The easiest way to avoid paying your child support is to go someplace else, to go across state lines," Jackson said. But a fathers' rights activist said Jackson's explanation ignored the hardship that child-support payments can cause fathers who don't make much money. "Payments are too high. They can't be paid in full," said Paul Robinson, president of the Virginia Chapter of Fathers United for Equal Rights. "The source of the problem begins with the custody award."

When the child-support check fails to show or comes in short, "it's a disaster for children in many cases," said Cliff Johnson, family support director of the Children's Defense Fund. "The economic strains on families are such that any child without the support of both parents is in great jeopardy."

On average, a mother got \$2,995 in child support in a year. In some cases, Johnson said, that money makes the difference between having a place to live or ending up on the street.

About a fourth of the 4.9 million women who are supposed to receive child support in

1989 lived below the federal poverty line. That year, the cutoff for a woman and two children was \$9,885 in income, before taxes. The Census Bureau findings were based on surveys conducted in 1989 and 1990. The surveys also found:

- There were 10 million fatherless households with children in 1989. That's up 30 percent from 10 years earlier.

- Nearly two-thirds of women who wanted the court to order child support didn't get it. A mother who had married, even if divorced, was three times as likely to be awarded child support as a mother who had never married.

Council: Teach what came after Columbus

WASHINGTON (AP) — America's teachers were asked Thursday to offer their students a broad account of Christopher Columbus' deeds that does not conceal one of its consequences — "the most extensive depopulation of a group of peoples in the history of humankind."

The National Council for the Social Studies said it would distribute to 3 million educators a position statement laying out guidelines for teaching about Columbus.

The statement resulted from a year's deliberations and has been endorsed by 29 education groups. The council said it wanted to keep "important facets of history" from being obscured "in the public heroizing over the 500th anniversary of Columbus' exploration."

"We're just trying to be honest with the kids," said Charlotte G. Anderson, president-elect of the council.

President Bush took a more traditional view of Columbus at a White House ceremony where he signed a proclamation designating Monday as Columbus Day.

"What Columbus discovered has helped chart the course of exploration and opportunity — sailing freedom's ship to every corner of the earth," Bush said.

The educators' guidelines ask that Columbus be portrayed as the explorer who "brought two old worlds into permanent contact" rather than as the discoverer of America.

Cocaine seizure in Utah result of highway stop

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A state trooper who pulled over a pickup truck for weaving said he found more than 270 pounds of cocaine and arrested two men who face federal drug charges.

The Utah Highway Patrol said the 123 kilograms of cocaine would be worth about \$25 million on the street. Trooper Lancer Bushnell said that high estimate — more than \$5,700 an ounce — was based on the cocaine's high purity, up to 98 percent.

U.S. Magistrate Ronald N. Boyce on Wednesday ordered Edermio Augustin Fernandez, 45; and Juan Bianchi, 38, held without bail until a detention hearing Friday. The two were charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute, and aiding and abetting.

If convicted, each could be sentenced to prison terms of 10 years to life and fined \$4 million.

Fernandez is 6-year-old son, Ryan,

who was with the men, was turned over to the state Division of Family Services, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Dave Schwendman.

The two men had drivers' licenses from Santa Ana, Calif. Troopers believe they were traveling to Chicago when Bushnell pulled over the truck Tuesday on Interstate 15 near Nephi.

The truck was weaving in and out of the emergency lane, had illegally tinted windows and no front license plate, Bushnell said.

Lt. Brent Shelby said Bushnell gave Fernandez a warning citation and asked if he could search the vehicle. Shelby said the officer had "probable cause," but would not elaborate "because this is going to be a lengthy court process."

Bushnell said 33 kilograms were found in a compartment behind the truck seat and an additional 90 kilograms were hidden in a false truck bed beneath the truck.

Pentagon: No response to Gorbachev, yet

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration has neither accepted nor rejected Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev's proposal that NATO put its arsenal of air-launched nuclear bombs in central storage depots, the Pentagon's spokesman said on Thursday.

"We're looking at it," Pete Williams told reporters when queried about the suggestion.

President Bush's recent proposals for sweeping cuts in nuclear arms did not deal with the alliance's arsenal of nuclear gravity bombs based in Europe. Among other things, the president proposed the removal from Europe land-based tactical nuclear weapons — nuclear artillery shells and nuclear warheads for Lance short-range missiles.

However, Gorbachev not only matched Bush's reductions in several types of weaponry, he added the proposal that both sides withdraw all air-launched, tactical nuclear weapons from air bases to central storage depots.

"We haven't rejected it. We haven't accepted it," Williams said of the proposal.

Williams spoke one day after Gen. Colin Powell, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, reiterated Washington's pledge to carry in Europe U.S. aircraft that can carry nuclear bombs.

Powell is expected to deal with the issue during meetings Saturday in Vienna with Vladimir Lovov, the chairman of the Soviet general staff. It will be the first, high-level U.S. and Soviet military meeting since the abortive coup against Gorbachev in August.

The air-launched weapons have in past years become a source of some friction among alliance members — particularly among some factions in Germany — who oppose the placement of any modernized version of air-launched nuclear weapons on their soil. In a separate interview with reporters in Washington, the general in charge of the U.S. Air Forces in Europe, Gen. Robert Oaks, said he could now envision "the day when even air-launched tactical nuclear weapons could be negotiated out of existence."

Bush: Fight porn

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush declared pornography Thursday and exhorted a religious coalition to "keep up the good fight" against obscenity.

"This horror must stop," Bush told the Religious Alliance Against Pornography at a White House finale for its two-day national conference.

Poll: College important to adults

YORK — The percentage of adults who see college as vital to their careers has risen sharply in the last five years, according to a poll released Thursday.

Seventy-three percent of adults surveyed by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education agreed that a college degree is "very important" in getting a job or advancing a career. A similar survey in 1986 found only 58 percent thought so.

But the new poll also revealed mounting discouragement over soaring college costs, only in one-fourth adults believe that "most can afford it," compared with 32 percent asked the same question five years ago.

Alaska cracks down on child support

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — Serogoes beware! Alaska is cracking down on parents who don't pay child support.

More than 32,000 parents owe \$203 million in unpaid child support, state officials said Wednesday. About 80 percent are men who owe money to their ex-wives.

In a program it calls "SCROOGE" — "Support Children, Remember Obligations Or Get Embarrassed" — enforcement officials on Friday plan to mail letters to thousands of deadbeats giving them until Dec. 1 to ante up.

Rats might spill over onto coast

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — A federal official says he's worried that a South-Korean cargo ship grounded in the Aleutian Islands could spill something worse than oil rats.

"If rats ever get established on ... these islands, you could just forget it. You could just write these off, ecologically," Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Ed Bailey said. "Except on very tiny islands, once rats are on an island, there is no way to get them off with today's technology."

Judiciaries asked to reject Bush plan

WASHINGTON — A group of judges, attorneys general and lawyers asked the House on Thursday to reject a Bush administration effort to sharply trim the rights of state prisoners to challenge their convictions in federal court.

The bill's avowed aim is to curb death-row appeals.

But Nicholas DeB. Katzenbach, attorney general in the Johnson administration, told a news conference that the provision — part of the crime-bill-to-be-considered-by-the-House next week — would "just restrict the right to habeas corpus to virtually nothing."

President OKs refugee admissions

WASHINGTON — President Bush has authorized the admission of up to 142,000 refugees to the United States in the year ahead, including 61,000 from the Soviet Union, the White House said Thursday.

In both instances, it's 11,000 more than the ceiling set on refugee admissions for humanitarian reasons during fiscal 1991.

The increase for Soviet refugees makes up for a shortfall in the number who actually arrived in this country in the past year, said Pam Lewis, a spokeswoman for the State Department's Bureau of Refugee Programs.

Education association hammers Bush

WASHINGTON — The National Education Association, a 2-million-member teachers union that has never endorsed a Republican for president, continued its tradition Thursday by issuing a biting reproach to President Bush.

"George Bush may be called many names ... but he cannot truthfully be called the education president," said NEA President Keith Geiger. "He does not warrant the NEA seal of approval."

Dentists' group opposes mandatory AIDS testing

SEATTLE (AP) — The nation's largest organization of dentists has approved a resolution opposing mandatory AIDS testing for health-care workers.

The American Dental Association also voted Wednesday to back the use of precautions in treating patients, including use of surgical gloves and sterilized equipment to prevent exchanges of blood between dentist and patient.

And the association approved a resolution to encourage voluntary testing of health-care professionals in high-risk groups. Such groups include those who use needles, engage in unsafe sex or have had a blood transfusion or accidental needle puncture.

The association's rule-making gates, adopted the resolutions on the fourth day of the association's five-day convention. The association, which includes dentists and dental workers, has more than 140,000 members.

The AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power is an activist group that has resisted mandatory testing.

McDonald's boss big on disability hiring

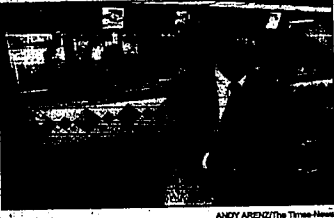

Waste gets by, but protester has plans

TWIN FALLS — The second shipment of nuclear waste got past him and fouled up an attempt for a border protest, but a local nuclear protester will still protest.

Activist Bill Chisholm of Buhl says he and an informal network of people are organizing a protest to take place at noon today in front of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory office in Twin Falls. The office is located at 233 2nd St. N.

"We've been saying all along that we're only going to get this thing turned around by the demonstration of our willpower," Chisholm said.

Chisholm was the only protester when the first truckload of waste arrived from the decommissioned Fort St. Vrain reactor in Nevada.

He was arrested when he refused to move out of the truck's way at the state's border.

He was trying to organize a protest for the second shipment, but failed to discover when it was destined to arrive in Idaho. Federal regulations erect a wall of secrecy around nuclear-waste shipments.

Accidental shooting victim recovering well at MVRMC

KIMBERLY — The 15-year-old Kimberly boy who was shot Wednesday afternoon was recovering well at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Thursday, his father said.

Christopher Jordan was shot in the stomach by a friend while the two were playing at Jordan's home. Police have ruled the shooting no accident. Jordan's father, Rod Boss, said the boy is in good spirits and doing well. He will likely be in the hospital for another three to four days, Boss said.

A single slug from a .38-caliber revolver entered Jordan's stomach and came out his lower back. Police say the boys thought the guns they were playing with were unloaded.

CSI fish hatchery dedicated to late conservationist

TWIN FALLS — The College of Southern Idaho fish hatchery formally dedicated this week to the late Twin Falls conservationist and businessman Walter R. Priebe.

Priebe, a retired jeweler who died at the age of 106 in 1987, was responsible for establishing the hatchery in Rock Creek Canyon in 1926.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game managed the facility from 1931 through 1977 and CSI's aquaculture program has run it since.

A Twin Falls sportsmen's club bought the property when the hatchery stands at Priebe's request, said Les Hazen, a Twin Falls businessman and former president of the Idaho Wildlife Federation. Priebe sanitized the ponds and spent nights and weekends caring for the fish, Hazen said.

The facility raises sturgeon, among other fish, and educates 10 to 12 students a year, almost all of whom find employment at Magic Valley commercial hatcheries, according to Rick Parker, director of the CSI aquaculture program.

Employers must enforce immigration

Workshop focuses on obeying the law

TWIN FALLS — It's not just a question of obeying the Immigration Reform and Control Act. Employers must learn how.

That was the word Thursday from a consultant at a workshop designed to educate Magic Valley employers about the law, which prohibits employers from discriminatory hiring and firing practices and requires them to keep meticulous records to prove their compliance.

"Probably 94 percent of all employers are violating IRCA," consultant Richard Mabbutt said.

"That's your big firms as well as the moms and pops."

Under the law, employers must make sure they have adequate verification of a prospective employee's identity and work eligibility.

But it's illegal for an employer to suggest that a prospective employee show him his driver's license or Social Security card.

These little-known specifications are the main reasons very few Idaho employers actually comply with the five-year-old law.

And non-compliance can be costly. Employers in the audience cited fines ranging from \$500 to \$3,000 for mistakes such as forgetting to date I-9 forms (documents kept in employers' files that verify work eligibility) and treating employees in different ways.

Getting informed is the best insurance against these fines and federal investigations, Mabbutt said.

Employer handbooks, agency hotlines and local Job Service offices are resources employers can use.

If they do their homework, employers will learn that failing to copy both sides of I-9 forms is illegal.

So is copying specific documents such as certificate of United States citizenship and certificate of naturalization.

It is also job discrimination if one employee's verification documents are copied and another's are not.

Employers must have verification for every employee on file, including part-time and temporary workers — even for a guest worker who regularly babysits in your household.

"When in doubt, fill it out," Mabbutt said.

"That's safe and conservative strategy. They won't penalize you for filling it out. They will penalize you for not filling it out."

If an employee cannot prove work eligibility within three days of starting on the job, the employer is required to terminate the employee, Cam Weech, IRCA project coordinator, said.

The employee must also be paid for those three days worked.

Former Ketchum mayor considers running for 2nd Congressional seat

KETCHUM — Gerald "Jerry" Seiffert, a former three-term mayor of Ketchum, says he expects to run for the Democratic nomination in Idaho's 2nd Congressional District.

"I'm at the trial balloon stage and the balloons haven't come back shot full of holes," Seiffert said Wednesday. "If all continues as it has, I expect to be a candidate."

He said he expects to announce his plans by the end of the year.

Four-term Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, is giving up the 2nd District seat to run for the U.S. Senate position being vacated by retiring Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho.

Seiffert is among three Democrats who have said they are considering the race. He joins state Auditor J.D. Williams and Boise lawyer Bill Mauk.

Idaho Senate President Pro Tem Mike Crapo of Idaho Falls is the only Republican candidate for the 2nd District seat so far.

"I would just like to give my fellow Democrats some choices," said Seiffert, a 52-year-old real estate broker.

Seiffert was mayor of Ketchum from 1976-88 before losing a bid for a fourth term. He is president of the executive committee of Ketchum's weekly newspaper, The Idaho Mountain Express. His wife, Pamela Morris, is publisher and managing editor.

"It's just like gun control," he said. "Nobody likes the government telling them what they can do."

Elsewhere in Idaho politics, the leaders of the Legislature's redistricting committee are working to find a date to reconvene the 20-member panel.

"It's adjourned late Saturday night after adopting a proposed legislative reapportionment plan, but only on a series of party-line votes."

Gov. Cecil Andrus said the panel will have to come up with something with broader support before he will call a special session for reapportionment.

Chairman Rep. Pam Bengson Ahrens said Thursday an Oct. 21 meeting was proposed, but Democrat-

ic senators Mike Burket of Boise, Patricia McDermott of Pocatello and Ron Beiletsbacher of Grangeville said they couldn't make it.

The Legislative Council staff is looking at other dates later this month and polling committee members to see who could attend, she said.

Tribal officials hope to collect from tax

FORT HALL — Officials of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes say they hope to collect \$450,000 per year from a new tax on utility and mining companies doing business on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

The Interior Department approved the tax Wednesday, overturning an earlier ruling that the tribes didn't hold adequate public hearings on a new tax code.

SHELLEY teachers protest contracts

SHELLEY — Teachers in the Shelley School District have turned in their contracts in protest of the district's decision to issue them before a settlement was reached for the 1991-92 school year.

Jim Young, president of the Shelley Education Association, said Thursday teachers signed the contracts, but turned them in at the district office to show that provisions are subject to negotiated changes.

Contract talks broke off last month over salaries. Teachers are seeking a 5 percent pay hike. The district has offered 3.5 percent.

A federal mediator is scheduled to meet with negotiators Monday night.

Valley County citizens to appeal plan

BOISE — Attorneys for Citizens for Valley County contend they have found a way to challenge a decision on the proposed Valbois resort that a federal agency has called unappealable.

But U.S. Bureau of Reclamation officials maintained Wednesday that their decision allowing developers to proceed with master planning can not be appealed. Valbois is a proposed \$120 million four-season resort near Cascade.

"We looked into the rules, and in our view, there is a way you can appeal a decision to the commissioner of Reclamation," Boise attorney Hugh O'Riordan said.

John Keys, Bureau of Reclamation regional director, said, "If I get an appeal, I'll write back and say there is no appeal process, and that we'll consider their concerns as part of master planning."

'Misunderstanding' leads to life term

LEWISTON — Robert L. Brown was unaware he could be sentenced to a five-year life-prison term when he pleaded guilty to raping, stabbing and robbing a Lewiston woman in her office, Brown's attorney contends.

William Fitzgerald of Lewiston told the Idaho Supreme Court on Wednesday that Brown had a "considerable misunderstanding" with his court-appointed attorney and did not understand he could not readily withdraw his guilty plea to rape, robbery and aggravated battery.

But Idaho Solicitor General Lynn Thomas said during oral arguments on Brown's appeal that Brown had plenty of chances to let 2nd District Judge Ronald Schilling know he didn't understand the consequences of a guilty plea.

Kellogg kids have less lead in blood

COEUR D'ALENE — New tests show a "significant drop" in lead levels in the blood of Kellogg-area children, the Environmental Protection Agency's Bunker Hill Superfund project manager said.

The improvement is due in part to a year-long cleanup of soil contaminated with lead and other toxic heavy metals in the yards of homes near the defunct Bunker Hill smelter complex, John Meyer said Wednesday.

He said soil in the yards of some 300 homes has been replaced, including all known residences of children 9 years old or younger.

Meanwhile, Meyer told officials at a multi-agency meeting on water quality that Silver Valley residents should know by next spring what they will be involved in cleaning up the Bunker Hill smelter site itself.

Rook asks for Hagadone investigation

COEUR D'ALENE — A competitor of northern Idaho businessman Duane Hagadone has asked the Justice Department to investigate whether the Hagadone family's control of newspaper and broadcast outlets in the region violates federal antitrust laws.

Rook Broadcasting of Idaho, which owns KCDA-FM in Coeur d'Alene, also wants the government to determine if KVNI-AM radio and the Coeur d'Alene Press newspaper, both controlled by the Hagadone family, compete unfairly and promote Hagadone political and business interests.

Better late than never for derailing gravy train

Is it any wonder so many citizens think Congress is a bunch of fat cats who need to be taken down a peg? The past couple of weeks have brought revelations about House members who bounce checks on their congressional accounts, and who run up outrageous tabs at congressional eateries, and who rely on staff members to fix their parking tickets. And guess who pays the bill.

Last week our own 2nd District congressman, Rep. Richard Stallings, confessed that he had bounced seven checks at the House Bank last year. He said it happened because he had assumed his paycheck was being deposited on the last day of the month, when in fact it wasn't being deposited until a day later.

(Sen. Larry Craig, who moved from the House to the Senate this year, announced this week that his banking and dining record is clean.)

Slap Stallings on the wrist for not keeping better track of his money. But what's really interesting is that he only found out about the practice last week. Before that, he said, the bank hadn't bothered to tell him.

Maybe that fact reduces Stallings' personal embarrassment. But it's a further indictment of the congressional gravy train.

If you, an average citizen, bounce a check, the bank sends a notice and charges a penalty. If you run up a tab at a restaurant, the restaurant demands payment.

For most folks, bouncing a check or hearing from a collection agent would be a painful and mortifying event.

But the people responsible for running the country (and balancing the government's books) are too important to worry about rubber checks and unpaid tabs.

So the congressional perk system made sure they didn't have to.

Is it any wonder so many people want to enact term limits that will throw the "rascals" out? Public perceptions of a fat-cat life-style, combined with midnight pay raises and special-interest contributions, create a recipe for resentment.

House members are scrambling to clean up their banking and banqueting messes, but they may be too late. Their born-again frugality won't do much to cool the nation's term-limit fever.

The one positive aspect of the whole distasteful episode is this: If the fat cats do without some of their perks, they'll have a little more empathy for the poor taxpaying slob who represent.

Iraq denies it is building H-bomb

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Iraq denied Thursday that it planned to manufacture a hydrogen bomb, insisting that any materials it possessed that could be used to produce such a weapon were purely for scientific research.

The official Iraqi News Agency, monitored in Nicosia, quoted an unnamed deputy chairman of Iraq's Atomic Energy Organization as saying United Nations officials have "grossly exaggerated" Iraq's nuclear potential.

U.N. officials and experts at the Vienna-based International Atomic Energy Agency said Wednesday that Iraq has manufactured some lithium-6, a material used only in hydrogen bombs, and that it was kept at the Al-Athir weapons facility, 40 miles south of Baghdad.

Indians using drug to kill themselves

NEW DELHI, India — An alarming number of Indians are committing suicide by eating an 8-cent pesticide tablet that spews lethal gas inside the stomach. Doctors worry that the tablet has made death easy in India.

"Instead of being used, it is unfortunately being misused by humans," said Avinash Rajwanshi, a leading toxicologist.

Social workers blame the easy availability of the aluminum phosphide pesticide, or ALP, which is meant to be sprinkled over sacks of grain. It is supposed to be sold only to government granaries, agriculture departments and approved pest-controllers.

Israeli activist in jail for meeting Arab

RAMEL, Israel — Peace activist Able Nathan began serving an 18-month prison sentence Thursday for meeting PLO leader Yasser Arafat in violation of Israeli law.

It was the second time he has gone to prison for meeting Arafat. He was twice convicted under a 1986 amendment to Israel's anti-terror law that prohibits meetings with members of terrorist groups. Israel considers the Palestine Liberation Organization a terrorist group.

Nathan, 64, was sentenced last Sunday for a 1990 meeting with Arafat in Tunis.

Iranian drug sweep nabs 682 people

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Iranian officials arrested 682 people for drug smuggling as well as 1,006 addicts in a two-week nationwide sweep, Tehran television reported Thursday.

The broadcast, monitored in Nicosia, said 2,524 pounds of various drugs were seized, as well as 17 guns and 24 vehicles used to transport narcotics.

Last week, Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency said 35 people charged with crimes ranging from drug smuggling to armed revolt against the state were executed in Mashhad, in central Iran, and in Zahedan, in the southeast.

S. African violence erupts, kills 6

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Gunmen fired on a commuter van in a black township outside Johannesburg and set it ablaze Thursday, killing six people and wounding one person, police said.

A seventh victim was found stabbed in a nearby Tokoza township on Thursday, bringing the death toll in a new outbreak of black faction fighting to 24 since Monday.

The factional fighting, largely between supporters of the African National Congress and the rival Inkatha Freedom Party, has claimed more than 6,000 lives in the past five years.

Soviets, Austrian return from space

MOSCOW — Two Soviet cosmonauts and the first Austrian in space returned to Earth Thursday after a mission in which they studied the effects of weightlessness on plants.

The Soyuz TM-12 landing vehicle touched down safely in the Kazakhstan republic in Central Asia, the Tass news agency said.

The report said Austria's first cosmonaut, Franz Viehboeck, along with Soviet spacemen Anatoly Artschbarski and Toktar Aubaitirov, were "feeling well" after the eight-day mission which began Oct. 2.

Yugoslavs pledge withdrawal from Croatia

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — Yugoslavia's army agreed in principle Thursday to withdraw from Croatia within a month, and Croat militants pledged to lift their blockades of army barracks in the secessionist republic.

At the same time, the combatants agreed to negotiate a political settlement to the civil war that would address the grievances of the Serb minority in Croatia, said Dutch Foreign Minister Hans van den Broek, who announced the agreement.

Van den Broek spoke after five hours of talks with the leaders of Croatia, Serbia and the federal military at a European Community-led peace conference in The Hague.

The accord appeared to offer the best chance yet for halting the 34-month-old civil war in Croatia, which has pitted Croat militants against ethnic Serb guerrillas supported by Serbia and the Serb-dominated federal army.

But it was unclear whether the latest peace agreement would be observed by fighters in the battlefield, who have ignored eight previous cease-fires.

More than 600 people are known to have died since June 25, when Croatia declared independence along with neighboring Slovenia. Croatia reported more casualties from clashes Thursday in the eastern part of the republic.

Croatian President Franjo Tudjman and the federal defense minister, Gen. Veljko Kadijevic, both said they accepted the agreement. But Tudjman insisted Croatia be treated as a sovereign republic in the negotiations, and Kadijevic linked the army pullout to progress on the political front.

"As the political decisions are taken, the army will follow suit and respect them," said Kadijevic.

"If what was discussed today is translated into reality there is a good chance for the settlement of the Yugoslav crisis to be done by political means," he added.

Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic called the one-month deadline "a realistic framework," but added that all parties in the crisis must "fully contribute to the settlement." Milosevic indicated that a final settlement must give some kind of autonomy to Croatia's Serb minority, which doesn't want to be part of an independent Croatia.

Van den Broek said both the army pullout and the lifting of the blockades should be carried out immediately, on both sides, as we speak. "In the meantime, he said, the EC would discuss whether to recognize the independence of republics wanting to break from the Yugoslav federation."

Ararat seeks Arab summit on conference

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — PLO chairman Yasser Arafat appealed Thursday for a summit of Arab leaders to work out a unified position for the proposed Middle East peace conference.

In a statement carried by the Palestinian news agency Wafa, Arafat said there should be closer coordination among the Arab countries in advance of the peace conference.

The United States and Soviet Union hope to convene the conference by the end of this month to bring together Israel and its Arab neighbors.

The Palestine Liberation Organization is demanding Israel give up the Gaza Strip and West Bank.

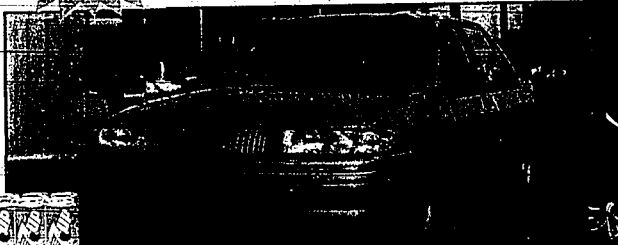

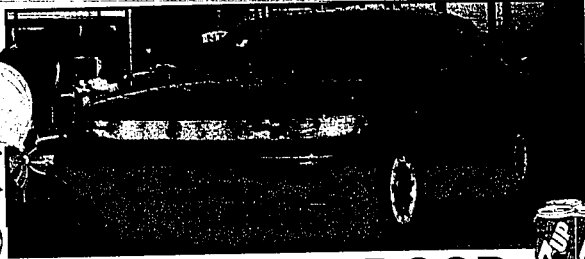

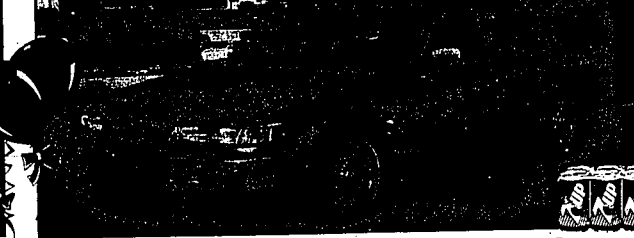

Country music riding wave of summer success

HOLLYWOOD — If you believe everything that's been printed in our daily journals you would think show business was down the tubes this summer: dismal ticket sales at movie houses, depressed record sales, dreary concert business.

For some, the sun never shone. But other journals of truth report nothing but good news about one form of popular entertainment.

We're talking country.

Consider:

- With 26 million adult listeners last year, country music was No. 1 in radio listenership, ahead of adult contemporary, ahead of rock.
- Another study last spring showed that in all radio markets, country tied with Top 40 music in popularity.
- What has turned country into a winner — at least so far this year — is both a instant power of television. Marlboro Man has met the Suburban Cowboy.
- When country music was young and trying to break into national sales and network radio in the '20s and '30s, its hustlers had to be inventive. Record companies and radio rarely open their doors to "hillbilly" music. Guilelessly the record promoters paid railroad porters to place country records into the juke boxes of saloons and diners near train stations.
- Now the selling job has less guile but a lot more slick. It has taken a few years, but it's paying off. Ten years ago, the Nashville Network tried something daring: a cable service featuring country performers and musicians, talk shows like the now-venerable, 90-minute "Nashville Tonight," dance shows like "Club Dance" and even a cooking show, "Country Kitchen," featuring "The Brady Bunch's" Florence Henderson. More recently, Country Music Television started up, like

MTV, devoted to music videos.

By getting country music on cable, country's marketers finally found the teen-agers and young adults that all television programmers lust after.

Some more kernels of truth:

- Nielsen research shows that last year's Country Music Awards show drew 60 percent more teen viewers than in the previous year.
- A recent Billboard-Arbitron study indicated strong gains in radio listenership for country music, especially among teenagers and 18- to 34-year-olds.
- When rock music took over radio in

National children's book sales skyrocket in 1990s

ALBANY, N.Y. — Ninja Turtles are racing with Peter Rabbit. Curious George has gone commercial. And The New Kids on the Block are moving in next door to Charlotte's Web.

An unprecedented \$1 billion will be spent on children's books this year on the mountain of titles that are filling store shelves across the country.

There's plenty of proof of the national book-buying binge:

- Children's-only bookstores that numbered about 50 a decade ago now total about 400.
- Book sales that were at \$148 million in 1970 spiraled close to \$1 billion last year.
- Industry experts predict sales will top \$1.5 billion by 1994.

Some 5,000 new titles will be published this year alone. Factors credited with fueling the book frenzy include a boom in the number of children under age 5 in the last decade. In addition, baby boomer parents with disposable income place a strong emphasis on education and reading.

Credit also is given to the whole language approach to teaching reading in American schools, where textbook tales of Dick and Jane are thrown out and children's literature, or trade books, are used.

Another factor is marketing, in which such characters as Ninja Turtles are sold in books, videos, games, etc., leaving kids clamoring for the latest Ninja book — or anything. Characters like Curious George are merchandised and new versions of books, or spinoffs, are created.

This boom in book sales is really the second since the 1960s, according to Tom Engelhardt, a former editor at Pantheon Books who is writing a book on children's culture.

The first boom, Engelhardt said, came in the '60s when federal funding was pouring into libraries so fast that librarians had trouble spending their entire budgets.

But by the 1970s when library funding began to decline, a second boom began to emerge.

"It's a real market-driven boom and with that you get the

 published. "The Illustrated Dictionary of Sucker for Young People." Thirty-two books later, Koss said he still doesn't have a magic formula to get editors to like his books. His biggest seller was "The Book of Hugs," which sold more than a half million copies since it was published in 1980.

As a former schoolteacher and university professor who is now a bookstore owner, Frank Hodge has earned a reputation as a good judge of children's literature.

Publishers send him rough drafts of books before they're even published to get his feedback. He's on an advisory board for Penguin USA.

He also gets manuscripts from would-be children's book authors. "I must get 20 a week," he said, pointing to a pile of unopened envelopes on the floor of his tiny office.

One most notable manuscript was from a woman who wrote about the life of a boy in 14th-century Spain who lived in a cave with his family. Every night the boy's father would come home and the child would fetch his father a martini from the refrigerator.

"From the refrigerator," Hodge said. "And the woman couldn't understand why the book wouldn't get published."

It's difficult to get published, "even if you're good, because the field is so filled with trash," Hodge said.

Kids want books that don't talk down to them, Hodge said. But aspiring writers often assume that writing for children is simple.

"It's the hardest writing there is to do today because every word has to count," Hodge said.

Even one of the most successful children's book authors and illustrators, Mercer Mayer, says he can't explain whether one of his books will be a success.

"You kind of know if it works or not. It just feels right," said Mayer, whose paperback best sellers in 1990 sold almost 2.3 million copies.

Author Patricia Reilly Giff spent years as a reading teacher before she began writing children's books.

"I tried to write what goes on in school and in children's lives," she said.

She wrote "The War Began After Supper" during the Persian Gulf War, but drew on the experiences she had as a 6-year-old when World War II began.

"It had to do with children and their feelings and their fears about war."

 arrival of a different sort of book — books that are styled more for the modern consumer child," Engelhardt said.

Engelhardt points to a Publisher's Weekly survey that lists the best-selling new paperbacks for kids in 1990.

Nine of the top 20 were Ninja Turtle books, followed by four titles from the Baby-Sitter's Club series geared for pre-teen girls, and two titles from The New Kids on the Block.

Engelhardt said children's culture is being confined in such series books. "Children don't know that they're being shortchanged, and the stuff is glibby," he said.

Children's bookstore owner Frank Hodge doesn't carry the Block.

"With this boom in children's books, we're getting a lot of quantity, but not much quality," said Hodge, a former university professor who taught on children's literature.

As the children's book industry has become more profitable, it has become more like the adult publishing industry, said Neal Porter, a vice president and publisher for children's books at MacMillan Publishing Co.

"A certain amount of pressure has been put on publishers to increase their output," Porter said. "Material that wouldn't necessarily have been published before has been making its way on the scene."

At Publisher's Weekly, children's book editor Diane Roback disagreed that best sellers for kids are all a result of marketing.

"The True Story of the Three Little Pigs" has sold a quarter-million copies, Roback said. "That's not a piece of junk."

Publisher's Weekly compiled lists of the best-selling paperbacks and hard-cover books for last year, both frontlist — or new releases — and

backlist. Dr. Seuss' "Oh the Places You'll Go" topped the hard-cover frontlist. The top new paperback was "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles," with sales of 1.7 million copies. In all, nine Ninja paperbacks sold more than 8.7 million copies.

When it came to previously released books, "The Great Waldo Search" was the top hard-cover book at almost 1 million copies. The best-selling paperback "Charlotte's Web" sold more than half a million.

But what about the classics, such as the all-time, best-selling hard-cover book, "The Tale of Peter Rabbit," which has sold 9 million copies since 1902? And the best-selling paperback of all time, "The Outsiders," which sold more than 5.8 million?

"The classics are still there and they're selling, but kids have Reading Rainbow. Those will be the classics of the future," Hodge said.

Reading Rainbow, a daily public television children's program which promotes reading for enjoyment has proven to be a major sales booster for books it airs.

At Reading Rainbow, books are screened by experts in the fields of children's literature and education psychology based on the creative quality of their content and illustrations, according to Twila Liggett, executive producer and a former elementary school teacher.

"There are some books called children's books that are written by adults for other adults that just look like kids books," Liggett said.

Interesting and active female characters are hard to find in books, Liggett said.

"You might even have a story where there are all animals and they're all male," Liggett said. "I don't know why."

 the late '50s and '60s, there were only 65 country radio stations in the United States and Canada. Today there are 2,200.

The only country went on cable — almost a whole generation of Americans were lost to country music. The young radio listeners of the '60s and '70s were largely captured by rock and pop music performers.

The only consistently ongoing country show on TV during those years was "Hee Haw" with Roy Clark and his group of country, almost stereotypical performers. Now "Hee Haw" has faces reality and is about to undergo cosmetic surgery. More about that later.

The only time country music captured some national audience was in the brief "Urban Cowboy" craze of the '70s, a dress-up fad based upon a forgettable movie.

What we have now is country junk. The lyrics are pretty much the same. The music is a bit more dynamic, a lot more amplified. And the look is clearly more Guey than young artists have become the major record sellers, concert attractions and TV stars, people like Travis Tritt, Vince Gill, Trisha Yearwood and Kelly Willis.

While Willie Nelson was off fighting the Internal Revenue Service, a new generation of performers came along.

People like Ed Benson of Nashville's Country Music Association believe that the new popularity is more than the filling of one void with another musical style.

"Like the nation as a whole," he says, "country music reflects a return to basic values. It's the most eloquent statement of American traditional values."

It's a misconception, he and others say, to think of country music as rural. Country's demographic scientists have research showing that the "country music" audience equates the total U.S. population better than any other form of music: It appeals to all age groups and to all socioeconomic classes.

That's arguable. There is still a scarcity of minority performers, among the traditional (Charlie Pride and Johnny Rodriguez are exceptions) and even among the neo-traditionalists.

The syndicated television show "Hee Haw" has been the most apparent, enduring image of country entertainment. It may even start to reflect basic American audience changes.

The one-hour show has been on television 23 years; it has 20 syndication. It's on 52 weeks a year, half live, half repeats.

Its performers and its audience, however, have aged. That's why next January almost everything about the show will change, according to its longtime producer, Sam Leavelle.

In its 23 years, "Hee Haw" has failed to capture new viewers, while holding onto its older audience spread across 205 stations in 187 markets. With the exception of Roy Clark, everything about the show will change. The set will look like a Las Vegas, Nev., showroom rather than the back 40.

Band still gets nitty gritty after 25 years

NEW YORK (AP) — When the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band played at the Paradox Club in Orange, Calif., on May 13, 1966, "there were three or four little mikes and a tiny P.A. system, pretty low-tech," guitarist Jeff Hanna recalled.

On the band's 25th anniversary tour, Jimmie Fadden, who also was there at the beginning, has a drum kit with 10 microphones and a small mixing console with its own power supply.

Not so low-tech.

In March, the band recorded its 24th album, "Live Two Five," in Red Deer, Canada, its first live album in 17 years.

"Our roots were folk and bluegrass," Hanna said. "Country rock used to be part of rock 'n' roll. Now it's part of country music...."

"Country has been our radio exposure for almost 10 years now, so most of our fans are country. The Nashville Network has kept us in front of folks with our videos. We can still get in the studio once a year and make new records and have some new music to play live."

They still do "Mr. Bojangles," a big hit for the band in 1971, but nostalgia isn't key to their act, he said.

"We'd get vapor lock if we went back through all our stuff," Fadden said.

That first night at the Paradox Club, Hanna recalled, "I think it held 150 or 200. We had a pretty good following. We used to play the talent night at the place. This was the first time they paid us."

"We started out in the Southern California folk scene. The first few months, Jackson Browne was in the band."

Fadden interjected, "He wrote 'These Days' in the alley behind this place between ever know."

"We were all teen-agers then," Hanna said. "Our band played music from the '20s and '30s. We did a couple of ragtime ditties he wrote, but his great songwriting wasn't reflected in us."

Since the summer of 1988, the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band — which has been based in Nashville since 1982 — has consisted of four people: Hanna, Fadden, guitarist Jim Ibbotson and keyboardist Bob Carpenter.

Asked the high points of the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's quarter-century, Hanna said:

"Traveling around the world has been great. We've been to the Soviet Union and Japan two or three times. We would like to tour Australia and China. We've been pretty much everywhere else. Playing with Johnny Cash in Europe was great. Doing the 'Circle Be' records was a high point."

The first "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," a three-record set released in 1972, had the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band in the recording studio with Doc Watson, Mother Maybelle Carter, Roy Acuff, Merle Travis, Jimmy Martin and Earl Scruggs.

"Will the Circle Be Unbroken Vol. 2," in 1989, had Acuff, Scruggs, Cash, Bruce Hornsby, John Hiatt, Chris Hillman, Roger McGuinn, Emmylou Harris and Levon Helm.

The group plans to cut the next album in January.

Hanna said that the group, which called itself the Dirt Band from 1976 to 1982, has been lucky because "we've never been so hot that when it cools down it is that cold."

"We took a few months off one time. I think we thought we were breaking up. It wasn't long before we realized we weren't."

Moreover, he's optimistic that the best is yet to come.

"We still seem to get better," Hanna said.

"We were slow developing. If we were a bunch of geniuses, we would have peaked 10 or 15 years ago. We haven't peaked. We're not kids anymore, but as far as music goes I think there is still some real good work ahead of us."

freedom — and an escape from communism.

"We were prosperous in Moscow but we couldn't live with the communist system," Zavalov said.

Getting out, though, was not easy. Zavalov and his wife, Marina, had to go through bureaucratic red tape, paid 500 rubles per person to leave the country and eventually lost their citizenship in exchange for tickets to the United States.

"We paid a price to get here," Zavalov said. "If you think you just bought plane tickets, you are wrong."

Zavalov even had to pay to bring his artwork to Idaho. The Department of Culture in Moscow required that every piece of art was stamped and paid for in order to be taken out of the country. Zavalov said he paid the fees in order to keep some of his artwork with him.

"We brought from the Soviet Union, our kids, works and books," Marina Zavalov said.

"Other people brought blankets and pillows, we took none of that," Vladimir Zavalov added.

When they left, Marina was preparing artwork for a display in a Moscow museum. She never finished it.

"Now all I'm doing is moving stones in a potato field," Marina Zavalov said.

Vladimir Zavalov also left behind a successful career. His works were sold in Moscow art saloons to neighbors, tourists and international buyers. His art is currently displayed in Canada, Spain, the Soviet Union and now the United States.

Vladimir Zavalov said they probably won't pursue a full-time art career here because the demand isn't as great as in Moscow. Painting will continue to be a hobby.

Though he mostly draws scenes of his faraway country, Vladimir Zavalov said he will one day paint landscapes of the Magic Valley.

"Here there is a special beauty, a beauty of its own," he said. "Of course, I will continue to draw Moscow. Before I can draw Twin Falls, I have to feel it."

He has already begun to capture the Magic Valley, drawing the South Hills from his yard.

"Since I can't drive a car, I can't get closer to the South Hills so I paint them from here."

'Ricochet' succeeds as scary, suspenseful

HOLLYWOOD - What are Denzel Washington and John Lithgow, two of our most distinguished screen actors, doing in "Ricochet," a hard-action thriller that opened a week ago without press previews? They're giving the all-stops-out performances of their careers, that's what.

Review

As for the film, it's exploitation-pictorial violent, that's also for sure, but "Ricochet" is genuinely scary, suspenseful and disturbing in the best sense. It marks yet another collaboration between co-producer Joel Silver and writer Steven E. Zaillian, who worked together on "48 HRS," "Commando," "Die Hard" and "Die Hard 2."

Washington plays Nick Styles, a handsome, trim Los Angeles Police rookie going to law school. He's not entirely kidding when he meets the young woman (Victoria Dillard) who'll soon become his wife and tells her that she could be the first black first lady - if Jesse Jackson doesn't beat him to the White House.

After only nine months on the job, this arrow-straight preacher's kid's career gets a tremendous boost when he collars professional hit man Earl Talbot Blake (Lithgow).

It's too bad that Styles does not shoot Blake fatally, for now this enraged psychopath has years to exact revenge - but to fuel his vengeance, Styles becomes a star prosecutor, a celebrated assistant district attorney (under tough D.A. Lindsay Wagner) with a fine home, two adorable daughters and

What happens is not all that predictable, for De Souza, working from Fred Dekker and Menno Meyjes' story, in making Blake as brilliant as he is demoted, has the opportunity to comment on how TV has made Styles a star, fueling Blake's hatred simultaneously and also inspiring Blake to attempt to use the media in turn to destroy Styles.

Judged as physical as this film gets - and Washington and Lithgow are in fact required to go as if Schwarzenegger and Stallone were going toe to toe - it makes the

point that if the proud, cocky Styles is to save himself he's going to have to figure out how to manipulate the media to his advantage.

Undemured Styles and Blake's duel of wits (and twists) in the film uncovers the maelstrom in Blake's compelling sense of horror of a James Ellroy novel.

While maintaining an increasing tension, hard-driving pace, director Russell Mulcahy gives Washington and Lithgow the confidence to dare and Lithgow flourishes they both have the talent and intellect to sustain.

But then, "Ricochet" (rated R for violence, language, sex and drug-taking) is risky through and through, teetering on the ludicrous, throwing in darkly comic touches yet always holding on to a thread of credibility that is chilling in effect.

"Ricochet" certainly exaggerates, gets glibly sentimental about Styles' new-found bond with a childhood friend (Ice T), who's now a top crack dealer, yet leaves us feeling that all that it depicts with such unflinching zest and punch could actually happen to anyone in the public eye.

Freddy dies an uninspired death in 'Final Nightmare'

FREDDY'S DEAD: THE FINAL NIGHTMARE (R), There's no reason to believe the producers' claim that this is the weakest in the "Elm Street" horror series - it really is the last, except that it's so lackadaisically imagined, unsuspenseful, underpopulated and underbudgeted you suspect they really had no intention of generating further enthusiasm for the franchise. The claustrophobic sequence is pretty primitive, colorless stuff, all washed out save for red and blue.

LATE FOR DINNER (PG), Director W.D. Richter's first film since the marvelous "Backdraft" is this tale of erotics and time travel, is a wistful romance that meditates on lost time and the persistence of love over the years. The problem is not that Richter has tried something new in opting for poignance over outrageousness, it's that this surprisingly ordinary movie hasn't tried very much at all.

THE SUPER (R), Joe Pesci has a field day as a New York slumlord sentenced to live in his own derelict East Village apartment house. At its core this broad but perceptive comedy is the story of a middle-aged man who, inadvertently escaping the unquestioned authority of his father (Vincent Gardenia), a slumlord supreme, starts thinking for himself for the first time in his life. With Marilyn Smitz-Ostrome, Ruben Blades.

THE FISHER KING (R), Terry Gilliam's new phantasmagoria set in Manhattan is a buddy movie swathed in mythological hoo-ha. Robin Williams plays a deranged homeless person and Jeff Bridges is who's behind him, a backblock who befriends him. As a modern-day Holy Grail scenario, it is too

overloaded with grand-scale grunge, but it has its affecting moments and its visionary look. Mercedes Ruehl and Amanda Plummer co-star.

ROBIN HOOD (PG-13), A case where more is less, this newest version of the venerable tale of outlaws in Sherwood Forest can't decide if it's a traditional action adventure, a New Age fable or a Monty Python farce. Making things even more muddled, star Kevin Costner doesn't have the movie to play an outlaw king. The action is fine, but at two hours and 23 minutes, everything else begged to be cut.

'Fisher King' hangs on to No. 1 box office spot

LOS ANGELES (AP) - "The Fisher King" held onto the top spot at the weekend box office despite a strong showing from the debuting "Ricochet."

The latest Top 10 list was notable for what it didn't include: The \$197 million-grossing blockbuster "Terminator 2: Judgment Day" finally fell off, as did "Robin Hood," fable of "Leaves," which has grossed \$160 million.

"The Fisher King," a Holy Grail allegory starring Robin Williams as a homeless lunatic and Jeff Bridges as an abrasive talk-show host, grossed \$6.1 million from Friday

The football comedy "Necessary Roughness" was fourth with a take

of \$4.5 million - a 31 percent drop from the week before.

"The Super," a comedy starring Joe Pesci as a New York slumlord sentenced to live in his own rundown apartment house, made \$3.7 million in its debut to occupy fifth place.

"Paradise," the Melanie Griffith-Dan Johnson drama about an ex-

tranged couple forced by a young visitor to confront their problems, grossed \$3.6 million.

"Suburban Commando," with wrestling star Hulk Hogan as an inexperienced mercenary looking for a quiet vacation on Earth, got hold of \$1.9 million and seventh place in its debut.

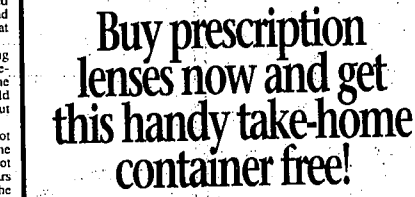

Atlanta evens NLCS

PITTSBURGH — Steve Avery is too young to know the Braves aren't supposed to win in October.

The 21-year-old again pitched with poise and Atlanta bounced back Thursday night to beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0 — with a chop, naturally — to send the NL playoffs south tied at one game each.

Mark Lemke's two-hopper eluded surer-handed third baseman Steve Buechele for an RBI double in the sixth inning, and that was enough, barely. Avery and Atlanta stopped the Braves' 10-game postseason losing streak, one short of the Philadelphia Phillies' record skid.

"All we could've asked for was a split," Avery said. "We didn't score a lot of runs, but we won."

Avery gave up six hits in 8 1-3 innings, struck out nine and, unlike Tom Glavine in the opener, shut down Pittsburgh's middle of the order for the most part. Plus, he was at his best when it really counted in the late innings.

"It was just too much Steve Avery," Pirates manager Jim Leyland said. "We probably could've played two more hours and not scored against him. It was the best stuff I've seen this year."

Avery retired Game 1 hero Andy Van Slyke on a grounder with runners on first and third to end the eighth inning. Then in the ninth, Bobby Bonilla led off with a double, making him 6-for-12 lifetime against Avery. That brought up Barry Bonds, and with the Pirates' star showing no signs of bunting, he popped up to shortstop.

Braves manager Bobby Cox felt that was enough for Avery and summoned Alejandro Pena from the bullpen. Pena put himself in further trouble with a wild pitch that sent Bonilla to third, but then showed why he has been the Braves' savior, and savior, since they got him from the New York Mets in late August.

Pena, 12-for-12 in save situations, got Buechele on a grounder back to the mound and, struck out pinch-hitter Curtis Wilkerson on three pitches to end it. The Braves rushed to the mound to celebrate and ran off the field signalling with tomahawk chops.

Avery, as he did all during the stretch, when he beat the Los Angeles Dodgers twice in five days — including his only

Surgeon predicts Montana could return to football

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — A doctor who treated Joe Montana's elbow also found an unstable and weakened shoulder that might hinder the San Francisco quarterback's attempt at a comeback next season.

"There are some problems with his shoulder," said Dr. Ben Kibler, the attending physician for the U.S. Tennis Association who examined Montana on Tuesday. "He could get by with it with a good elbow. Now that his elbow is not 100 percent."

A torn tendon to Montana's right elbow was reattached in a 90-minute procedure Wednesday night by Dr. Michael Dillingham, the team physician.

Dillingham said the surgery was technically successful and said there is "a good chance" Montana will play again, although he probably won't be able to throw until next May.

"We've always said there's a chance that he's going to have problems. I think that's about as much comment as it needs," Dillingham said. "There's also a chance he'll be perfectly fine and he won't know the difference."

Dillingham said he had spoken to Montana Thursday morning.

Bo doesn't pass tests with Raiders

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. — Bo Jackson fumbled his physical with the Los Angeles Raiders and will not play football this season or maybe ever again.

The two-sport star, who played the final month of the baseball season for the Chicago White Sox while recovering from a hip injury, failed the examination earlier this week, the Raiders said Thursday.

"Our doctors are not optimistic," Raiders executive assistant Al LoCasale said. "His doctor has not closed the door on 1992, our doctors are less optimistic."

Jackson sustained the injury to his right hip in a playoff game last January 13 against Cincinnati. He is in the final year of a five-year, \$7.4 million football contract.

The Raiders also issued a statement on Jackson. "There have been conversations among numerous doctors involved in his case. The results are that Bo Jackson is not able to play professional football. He will continue the physical rehabilitation program that he has been going through. His rehabilitation will be monitored."

Jackson reportedly earned \$100,000 for merely reporting to camp, and also could get an estimated \$4 million from a disability insurance policy. The Raiders will owe him his salary, thought to be around \$1.6 million for this season, but that also will be paid off by an insurance policy taken out by the team.

SEATTLE (AP) — Baseball's manager-firing frenzy continued Thursday when the Seattle Mariners dismissed Jim Lefebvre, the man who just guided them to their first winning season.

Lefebvre, 49, became the fourth manager to be fired in four days and the 12th since the season began. The New York Yankees fired Stump Merrill on Monday. Joe Morgan was fired by Boston Tuesday and Tom Trebelhorn was let go by Milwaukee on Wednesday.

There was speculation Lefebvre could be in line to manage the Chicago White Sox. Jeff Torborg resigned there on Thursday to reportedly become manager of the New York Mets next season.

Bucky Dent, who managed the New York Yankees from Aug. 18, 1989, through June 6, 1990, is believed to be a leading candidate to succeed Lefebvre in Seattle. Dent, 39, was the third-base

Torborg, who lives in Mountaintide, N.J., played for Los Angeles and California for 10 years, managed Cleveland in the late 1970s and coached with the Indians and the New York Yankees. His career managerial record is 407-436.

He began talking with the Mets after the White Sox said they wouldn't stop him from leaving.

"The main thing that interests me is the location," Torborg said Thursday morning. "I've spent almost 50 years here. My mother, who lives here, is 80 years old. We're about an hour and 15 minutes from Shea Stadium. I would not have thought about another team in another location."

Torborg said he met Wednesday with New York general manager officer Frank Cashen.

"We talked for 3 1/2 hours and I told them if I were to do it, what I would require of the ball club and what I would do to try to improve the ball club," Torborg said.

New York fired Bud Harrelson with a week left in the season in Cashen's final act before giving the GM title to Harzin.

Infamous 5th down will haunt Big 8 rematch

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — Bill McCartney reads his mail.

"Tons of correspondence — most of it scornful, some profane — has convinced him that Missouri hasn't forgotten."

While Missouri coach Bob Stull insists last year's infamous fifth-down game with Colorado has no relevance to Saturday's rematch, McCartney knows otherwise.

"I know what those people think," McCartney said. "I feel like I've gotten to know some of them personally. They think they were cheated last year. And you can be sure the Missouri coaches and players think the same thing, no matter what they say publicly."

"We've felt the wrath of this thing for almost a year. Too much has been written, said and reported. To say it's not a factor in this year's game is nonsense."

In fact, the Colorado coach and Missouri graduate, believes the fifth-down controversy won't begin to subsides for at least another year, after Colorado returns to the scene of the crime in Columbia in 1992.

"There's some bad blood now between these two schools as a result of last year's game," McCartney said. "The rivalry has intensified, heightened."

Then, unable to resist a slap at the slippery turf of Missouri's stadium. Stull, Niticed in trying to justify last year's victory, McCartney added, "I don't think it will be resolved until we go back there next year — and slip and slide."

METAIRIE, La. — Vaughn Johnson knows what other NFL teams see when they study film of the New Orleans Saints' defense.

"Hitting, hitting and more hitting," said Johnson, part of the Saints' superb linebacker corps. "We send a hard and we're going to hit you often."

"I'm sure we intimidate some people," the 6-3, 235-pound Johnson said with a smile. "Looking at the films. All those shots, (toppling players)

have got to be thinking, 'Uh-oh.'"

"We do it shovellout and we don't talk," said Pat Swilling, the blitzing right linebacker. "We're just solid and tough as hell."

The Saints have built a 5-0 start this season on the strength of their punishing defense, which has not allowed a point — none, zero — in 12 quarters.

Sunday, they meet the Philadelphia Eagles (3-3) at Veterans Stadium in a matchup — mismatch, really — of the league's best rushing defense (the Saints) and the worst rushing offense

(the Eagles at 2.6 yards per carry).

(Question: How will the Eagles move the ball against New Orleans?)

Answer: Painfully, very painfully.

"We have 11 guys around the ball on every play; it looks like a swarm bees," said the 6-3, 242-pound Swilling. "You don't see any standing around, waiting for the other guy to make the hit. Everyone wants a piece of the action."

"We had a fourth-and-1 stop on (Minnesota tailback) Herschel Walker where literally every guy on the defense had a hand or an arm in the

stop. (Linebacker) Sam Mills made the hit, but there were 11 guys on the football. That's team defense."

The results speak for themselves. Through five games, the New Orleans defense has allowed just three touchdowns, all on passes. The Saints have not yielded a touchdown rushing in 31 quarters dating back to last year.

In the last three games, the Saints' opponents have converted only four of 34 third-down plays. That's a chilling thought for the Eagles, who are a clueless 5-for-27 on third down in the last two games.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

The mathematician has reached the highest rung on the ladder of human thought. —Havelock Ellis.

Today's declarer could recite the odds for or against almost any occurrence. Unfortunately he lost his slam because he failed to count to 12.

Dummy's diamond ace went up at trick one, and the slam was down before South got started. East ruffed the diamond ace, and with no way to avoid the spade loser, South lost the laydown slam.

"The odds against West's having all six diamonds were more than 100 to one," exclaimed the mathematician. "Sorry, but I have no way to fight against that kind of luck."

He was right about the odds; but he was wrong about the luck. There is practically no way to lose this slam if South counts his 12 tricks and makes sure he can get them.

Since the diamond ace is South's 12th winner, there is no reason to risk losing it at trick one. Instead of playing the ace on West's king, South could duck. If West continues, South can ruff it. On the diamond ace he ruffs his losing spade, and instead of elting odds, he can busy himself with scoring up the slam and rubber bonuses.

Jackie 'overdose' produced 'nothing but admiration' from Roma Downey

America's seemingly unending demand for details of the life of Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy Onassis will be further satisfied when "A Woman Named Jackie" airs Sunday through Tuesday, October 13-15, on NBC. The miniseries stars Roma Downey in the title role, Stephen Collins as John F. Kennedy, William Devane as John Bouvier and Joss Ackland as Aristotle Onassis. Based on C. David Heymann's best seller, it follows Jacqueline Onassis from her birth through the birth of her first grandchild in 1988.

"I was a little shocked — and very excited," Downey says of her reaction to winning the role. "And, of course, I felt panic over the enormity of the role and the apparent lack of time to research it as thoroughly as I'd like."

But Downey coped: "I watched videotapes, interviews, anything I could find (on Jackie)," she explains. "And most important, I had a dialect coach, so I could get the approximation of the way she sounds."

"I kind of overdosed," Downey adds ruefully. "I had to throw it all away and approach the role the way I was capable and hope that enough of the information had been absorbed."

Playing a figure who is still alive was difficult for Downey. "There were all these people around who had a firsthand memory," she explains. "You set yourself up for comparisons — which you wouldn't do if you were playing someone like Mrs. Lincoln."

But perhaps even more difficult was shooting out of sequence. "I play her from '68," Downey explains. "That's a lot of years to keep in your head. And we were forced to shoot by location, and I felt myself leaping around from decade to decade."

One of the most dramatic examples, she says, was when the scene of John Kennedy's requiem Mass was filmed. "We filmed that scene in the morning," she says, "and on top of all the changes with makeup, it was emotionally draining to have to film his proposal that afternoon. I felt rather schizophrenic."

But there were compensations. "The wedding to JFK was lovely to shoot," Downey says. "Everyone, the costume and set designers, did a great job. And I got to be the bride finally," she adds with a laugh.

Even so, Downey feels a sense of achievement in just having survived

the experience. "We were filming in Richmond, Virginia, and it was so hot you felt like you were in Vaseline," she says. "I couldn't imagine getting through it. There's an enormous sense of well-being to being done, to having lived to tell the tale."

Of the end result, Downey says, "Before I read the script, I thought it would be a sensationalist piece, an expose. To my great relief, it was a strong attempt at dramatizing a life. She comes out of it a real survivor. As the one who played her, I have nothing but admiration for her."

Soap opera scene

Time to learn what makes Clarke tick

"It's hard to believe, but that ambitious cad Clarke Garrison is actually seeking professional help on "The Bold and the Beautiful."

Along with Dan McVicar's Clarke Garrison, fans may learn what drives the fashion designer to the point where he walks away from a conceived child, raises hell with wife and business partner Sally, gives mistress Julie fits and watches his designing skills erode.

Boss Bill Bell believes it's time to find out what makes Clarke Garrison tick, as the harried man becomes a patient of Dr. Taylor Hayes. Like most know-it-alls, Clarke feels his problem is simple stress, and he can solve his own case. Yet Garrison keeps returning to Dr. Hayes, thus beginning a relationship between a wise woman in love with a man she can't have and a bright and troublesome patient.

Boss Bell is exploring the subject of ambition and why men are often consumed by it. "Clarke wins and loses, wins and loses. We don't know why," says actor Dan McVicar. "There's a lot of mystery to this man. A lot more for me to uncover. We are about to learn some of his secrets. Secrets drive the performance and the story. I like secrets."

Will they love 'Tonight' tomorrow?

HOLLYWOOD — A year from now, in NBC's fondest dream, Jay Leno will be sailing along smoothly as the new host of the network's "Tonight Show."

Well, maybe.

Two major program developments this week served as abrupt reminders that the late-night talk-show scene has become TV's suicide alley.

ABC canceled its "Into the Night" series effective Nov. 14, after a disastrous run that originated in 1990 with Rick Dees. And the bright, new syndicated entry "The Ron Reagan Show," plagued by poor ratings, will cease production Oct. 23, with optimists claiming it may yet be revived for another time slot.

Furthermore, Johnny Carson's Thursday prime-time special marking his 29th anniversary on "Tonight" must have been a rather daunting sight for all of the pretenders seeking to claim his late-night television domain when he retires from the NBC series on May 22.

That includes Leno because, despite his comedy gifts, it is by no means a sure thing that he will retain Carson's late-night ratings lead, say, a year from now. Although Arsenio Hall's ratings have slipped a little on his syndicated series, he is still

regarded by many as the late-night host to beat when Carson leaves.

If Leno shows a swift, strong ability to handle Hall, NBC will heave a collective sigh, and the new "Tonight" host may well be going strong on the series into the 21st century — if the network doesn't collapse first under its financial pressures.

The intriguing question, of course — one that NBC will have to start thinking about realistically just eight months from now, when Leno takes over — is what to do if he can't fight off Hall. Under Steve Allen, Jack Paar and Carson, "The Tonight Show" has been unbeatable and, in many ways, the backbone of NBC.

In Leno's favor is "The Tonight Show" itself, which at this point is a bigger TV star than he is. It is network TV's premiere showcase. Also in his favor is history — the fact that each of the past "Tonight" hosts has

been vastly different in approach than the other, and each has had to prove himself in the face of doubters.

ABC now hopes to develop a "home-run program" to throw against Leno. CBS apparently will continue to program against him, with its current late-night crime series. Hall remains the hurdle for Leno, who, as Carson did for yelps, must prove his worth against all competition.

If he doesn't, it may well reopen the argument of whether David Letterman should have gotten the "Tonight" job.

NBC took the conventional approach by choosing Leno, clearly surmising that viewers wanted someone in the Carson mold — and perhaps not thinking through the fact that there is only one Carson.

Nothing is more important for Leno than to make "Tonight" totally his own and give it a new look — as Allen did, as Paar did, as Carson did, and as Letterman would have done. No one wants a carbon-copy format.

In a way, Hall is also on the spot. Leno is a superb performer. But if Hall can't beat Carson's replacement, his own stardom will be affected.

Letterman, however, is sitting pretty. He still has his own series, and if "Tonight" suddenly springs a serious leak in the post-Carson era, who else would NBC dare turn to?

NBC's 'Today' to repay Disney freebies

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC says it will reimburse the Walt Disney Co. and Delta Air Lines for free hotel rooms and plane tickets the "Today" show accepted to cover Disney World's 20th anniversary.

"Today" was the only one of the three network morning talk shows to originate from Disney World during 20th anniversary ceremonies. It disclosed the freebie arrangement on the air during its coverage.

"CBS This Morning," which sent weatherman Mark McEwen and a crew to Disneyworld for two days,

paid for their air fare and lodgings, CBS said.

ABC's "Good Morning America," the only morning show produced by a network entertainment division, sent weatherman Spencer Christian and a crew there for a day and paid for their costs, a spokeswoman said.

Cable News Network said it paid all expenses for its coverage of the Disney anniversary by Bill Tush, its "Showbiz This Week" anchor, and a news crew.

The "Today" delegation included Bryant Gumbel and co-anchors

Katie Couric and Joe Garagiola. NBC initially defended its acceptance of its two-day trip in a recent statement. It said the trip coverage was "not hard news or journalistically significant" and that the freebies for more than 30 hotel rooms and air fare were disclosed on the air.

NBC News president Michael Gartner and other officials later reviewed the trip and decided that "it went beyond what the guidelines allowed," said NBC spokeswoman Peggy Hubble.

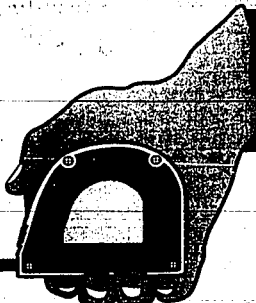

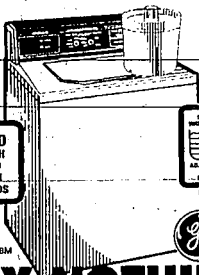
