Evacuees return home as fire battle continues

SPOKANE, Wash. — Evacuees began returning to their scorched homes Thursday as firefighters pressed the battle against scores of wildfires that destroyed more than 100 homes and killed five people across four states.

Officials said more than 100 fires totaling about 250,000 acres were burning in Washington, Idaho, Montana and Oregon. More than 6,000 firefighters were battling the blazes.

Gusting winds eased Thursday, helping more than 2,000 firefighters in Eastern Washington and hundreds more in northern Idaho to gain the upper hand on a few small blazes. Most of the large fires remained out of control.

Washington Gov. Booth Gardner spent an hour touring the devastated area near Spokane in a military helicopter. He declared a state of emergency in four counties.

"There is no more that can be done now

than what we are doing," Gardner said. "There is a whole series of burns. It's hard to contain them all with the resources we have."

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus declared a state of emergency in two northern counties, activating the Idaho National Guard for assistance in fire fighting and emergency services.

Montana Gov. Stan Stephens also declared a state of emergency and authorized use of Montana National Guard troops and equipment to battle the fires.

Montana fires scorched more than a quarter million acres. As many as a dozen homes were destroyed by a fire in the Chinook, Mont., area.

Killed were an Eastern Washington woman fleeing her burning home, two people crushed by heavy equipment in Idaho and Montana and an air tanker crew.

"Many of the grass, brush and timber fires in Washington, Idaho and Montana were ignited Wednesday by power lines downed by wind gusting to more than 60 mph.

Save for Symms, Idahoans set harassment policies

WASHINGTON — Before any of them heard of Anita Hill, none of Idaho's congressmen had a formal office policy against sexual harassment.

In the wake of Judge Clarence Thomas' bruising confirmation battle to the U.S. Supreme Court and the sensational charges by Hill, a University of Oklahoma law professor, that Thomas sexually harassed her a decade ago, Idaho Republican Sen. Larry Craig ordered up an office policy this week.

Democratic Rep. Larry LaRocco signed a suggested sexual harassment policy circulated by the Capitol Hill Women's Political Caucus last week and Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings is considering it. Only Republican Sen. Steve Symms has



no formal office policy against sexual harassment and is not contemplating implementing one. "If you know much about Steve Symms, you'd know he's not much of a paper-pushing policy kind of guy," said Bill Powers, a Symms spokesman, explaining why Symms has not signed the caucus' policy. "Everyone on the staff, including the interns, can get in to talk to the senator" about any issue concerning them, he said. When the women's caucus circulated its recommendations in April, the response was lukewarm. Through the next five months, fewer than half the members of the House and Senate — 30 senators and 170 representatives — had signed onto the policy.

House rejects assault rifle ban

WASHINGTON — The House rejected a proposed ban on semiautomatic assault weapons and large ammunition clips Thursday, spurning the appeals of gun control advocates who seized upon the Texas shooting rampage to make their case.

By 247-177, the lawmakers voted to strike from a broad anti-crime bill a provision that would have banned 13 models of assault-style weapons, along with 17-round ammunition clips such as those used by a gunman Wednesday to slay 22 people and himself in a Killeen, Texas, cafeteria.

Idaho's congressmen, Richard Stallings and Larry LaRocco, voted to reject the ban.

Supporters of the gun control measure had taken heart when Rep. Chel Edwards announced that the massacre in a cafeteria in his home district had persuaded him to drop his longstanding opposition.

But gun control opponents noted that the proposed list of weapons that would be banned did not include the models of pistols the gunman used.

"This is a feel-good measure," said Rep. James Sensenbrenner, R-Wis. "It is not going to affect criminals in any way, shape or form."

Supporters of the ban contended a proposed seven-bullet limit on ammunition clips might have saved some people

because the gunman would have had to stop shooting to reload more often.

"The killer was in the cafeteria for over 10 minutes," Sensenbrenner countered. "He had plenty of time to change clips, and apparently he did."

Still, supporters of the ban, many of them hunters, said the Texas shootings emphasized a need to prohibit possession of weapons and clips designed to "spray" bullets.

President Bush, asked about limiting gun sales in light of mass shootings, said, "Obviously, when you see somebody go berserk and get a weapon and go in and murder people, it troubles me. But what I don't happen to have the answer to is can you legislate that behavior away."

The author of the proposed prohibitions, covering sale or possession of 13 models of assault-type semiautomatic weapons as well as ammunition clips with more than seven rounds, acknowledged being the voice that he faced an "uphill battle."

"The tragedy yesterday added some momentum in our direction, but at this point I don't think it is enough," said Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y.

Neither the Glock 9mm semiautomatic pistol nor the Ruger P89 that police say were used by George Hennard to kill 22 people and himself are among the weapons that the measure would ban. However, the 17-round clip used in the Glock is

'Problem with women' may be key to massacre

KILLEEN, Tex. — Attention turned Thursday from the bloodied cafeteria, where George Hennard did his killing, to the quiet town of Belton 18 miles east.

There the apparent loner spent his last days, mowing the lawn, washing his pickup truck and making obscene gestures at women.

Police offered no motive for Wednesday's catastrophe, which left 23 people dead including Hennard. Police said he shot himself in the head with his last bullet. Seventeen others suffered wounds; eight were otherwise injured.

"Hennard is the only one who truly knows, and he can't communicate with us now," said Killeen Police Chief F.L. Giacomozzi. "The whos, whys and whats

— we may never be able to figure them out."

But police did say Hennard, who turned 35 Tuesday, appeared to have "a problem with women." Federal specialists in criminally deranged personalities are being consulted, Giacomozzi said.

In a rambling four-page letter, dated June 6 and mailed from Nevada to two women who are sisters and were Hennard's neighbors in Belton, he referred to "treacherous female vipers who tried to destroy me and my family."

Neighbors described him as meticulous and neat, constantly cleaning his truck and

State troopers spread thin across Mini-Cassia area

BURLEY — Minidoka and Cassia county sheriff's deputies may be in for a long, hard winter without the usual complement of Idaho State Police officers to back them up.

With half of the area's usual staff of six state troopers out of commission, the Minidoka and Cassia county sheriff's departments have been shouldering an extra burden, said ISP Lt. Lamont Johnston.

"We're lucky we've got a good sheriff's office over there," Johnston said.

Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said his department has been able to

handle the absence of three state troopers on the accident-prone stretches of Interstates 84 and 86 so far.

Including I-84, I-86 and U.S. Highway 30, there are more than 100 miles of primary federal highways in the two counties.

"Up until now, I couldn't say it's had a tremendous impact, but once the weather turns bad and we get some slick roads, we could run into problems," Crystal said.

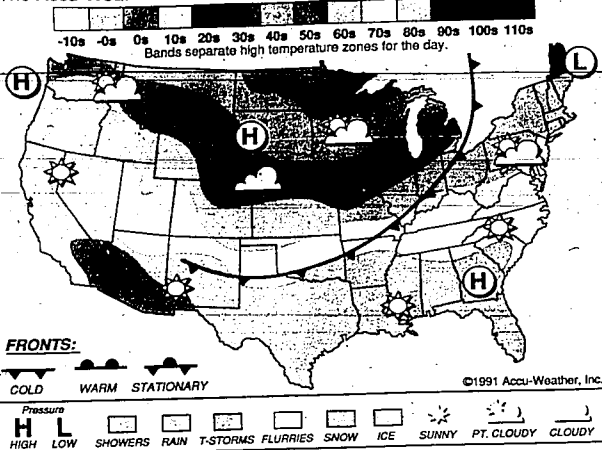
Deputies frequently rely on state troopers for backup, especially in remote areas of the county, Crystal said. When winter weather makes driving more treacherous, the reduced number of active highway patrolmen on the road

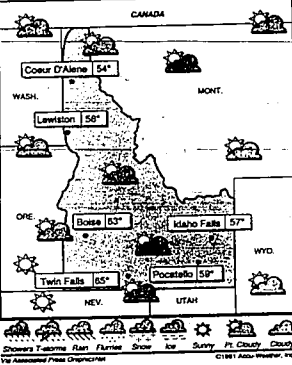

Rough stuff moves east as mountain states cool down

Temperatures were cool Thursday in the snow-dusted West and heavy rain was accompanied by high wind in the mid-Atlantic states.
Light morning snow fell in the Big Horn mountains of north-central Wyoming.
Norfolk, Va., reported more than 3.17 inches of rain since noon Wednesday. Heavy rain caused flooding in Annapolis, Md., and lightning started several fires in Harford County, Md. Wind gusted to 40 mph at the Baltimore airport.
At midday, rain stretched from southern New England and southeast New York state to eastern Virginia.
Heavier rainfall during the six hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT included 1.07 inches in Wrightstown, N.J., 1.03 in Dover, Del., and 1 inch in Baltimore.
Temperatures were as much as 40 degrees colder than

Wednesday in parts of the West. Glasgow, Mont., was 42 degrees colder. Lewistown, Mont., and Sheridan, Wyo., were 45 degrees colder, and Havre, Mont., was 49 degrees colder than their Wednesday noon readings of 81 degrees.

doing yard work.
"He wasn't lazy," said Pauline Kelly, who lives two doors away. "He was a real worker, always keeping everything up. But what happened inside that boy's head, I don't know."
Details about Hennard are sketchy. He is believed to have been unemployed, though he once served as a merchant seaman. He was arrested for, but not convicted of, marijuana possession in 1981 in El Paso. His parents are divorced - his mother, Jeanna, lives in Henderson, Nev., and his father, George, is an orthopedic surgeon in Houston.
For several years, Hennard had been living in a large, two-story

brick colonial house owned by his parents, according to neighbors in Belton. The house, where he spent most of his last hours, has been for sale for two years.
As police continued to probe for a motive, men and women who survived the lunchtime rampage at the popular Luby's Cafeteria told and retold their stories.
One of the most unusual involved Luby's employee Mark Mathews, 19, who climbed inside a 15-foot-long dishwasher and spent the night, afraid to emerge because he could hear people moving about but could not see what was happening. Police

found the 6-footer stiff and sore Thursday morning.
Police said Hennard was armed with two 9mm semiautomatic pistols - a Glock 17, a model favored by many law-enforcement officers, and a Ruger P89. The Glock holds 17 bullets and the Ruger 15. Police said they were bought in February and March 1981, while Hennard was living in Henderson, and legally registered. Giacomozzi said that police "found nothing to indicate he was capable of or intended to commit such a crime and that Hennard may not have owned other weapons."

will be noticed, he said.
Occasionally a Twin Falls-based trooper can be sent to a traffic stop, but patrol forces are stretched thin all over the ISP's District 4, Johnston said.
A string of incidents left the area short on troopers:
• In June, Cpl. Steve Hobbs of Declo was shot during a traffic stop. Hobbs is to help out at home undergoing therapy, but it isn't known when or if he will be able to return to patrol duties.
• Cpl. Richard Hooker has been off for nearly three months after undergoing back surgery. He may be back in uniform by the end of October, Johnston said.
• Robert Connor of Rupert was fired in September after allegations of sexual misconduct surfaced. The state attorney general's office is investigating Connor in connection with an incident involving a 13-year-old girl.

responsibility of female employees to be constantly complaining of unfair treatment," he said. "It should be the supervisor who ensures that doesn't happen. In the case of Congress, that's the Senator's or House member's responsibility."
There is little doubt the women's caucus has created some Capitol Hill peer pressure in the wake of the Thomas hearings and the nation's attention to sexual harassment in the workplace.
On Oct. 10, the day before Hill's testimony before the Senate Judiciary Committee, the women's caucus circulated a letter to all Senate and House offices. It contained a copy of its suggested sexual harassment guidelines and an "honor roll" against sexual harassment.
Some critics say they already had signed the suggested policy.
"It's something that organization is promoting," said W. Raymond Colley, deputy House clerk in charge of the House Office of Fair Employment Practices. "That has nothing to do with official policies of the House," which prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex, race, age and other traits, he added.

That case has been turned over to investigator Michael Kane, who is tied up with a lengthy murder case in eastern Idaho, said Allan Cerialle, the Idaho attorney general's office.
Kane likely won't get a chance to look closely at the case until November at the earliest, Cerialle said.
A permanent replacement won't be hired until spring, Johnston said. Candidates currently going through the state Peace Officers Standards and Training Academy will enter the state police academy in January, he said.
Future troopers must spend 13 weeks in that academy before hitting the road with a field training supervisor, Johnston said.

Navy offers apology on Iowa blast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two years after the Navy accused a sailor of causing a deadly explosion aboard the USS Iowa, the service said Thursday there was no "clear and convincing proof" that Clayton Hartwig was the time and apologized to his family.

"There is no certain answer to the question of what caused the tragedy, which killed 47 people, said Adm. Frank Kelso the chief of naval operations. "I extend my sincere regrets to the family of (gunner's mate) Hartwig," Kelso said at a Pentagon briefing. "We're sorry Clayton Hartwig was accused of this."

Family members said they were pleased with the apology. "They gave us the words I wanted to hear," Hartwig's mother, Evelyn, said in Cleveland. "I think they were sorry the way things went."

Kelso, reporting on a second round of investigation into the blast, said he rejects the finding that the explosion "most probably" was an act of suicidal sabotage brought on by Hartwig's despondency over a failed relationship with another sailor.

Such a finding, Kelso said, is "not conclusively established by the evidence." But he said the Navy's initial investigation was "an honest attempt"

to weigh all the evidence it had at the time. He said he doubted anyone would ever know exactly what happened inside the second gun turret of the World War II-era battleship.

The investigation into the explosion, which occurred during a training exercise about 300 miles north of Puerto Rico, cost about \$25 million, Kelso said.

He said two years of analysis and thousands of tests conducted by Navy and independent scientists could not find — nor rule out — "an intentional act nor an accidental cause" for the April 19, 1989, explosion.

Navy experts and independent scientists at the Sandia National Laboratories in Albuquerque, N.M., who

have conducted hundreds of experiments to try to replicate the explosion, don't agree on a specific cause for the blast, Kelso said.

"Without clear and convincing proof, an opinion, no matter how equivocally stated, that an individual may have intentionally brought about his own death and the deaths of 46 of his shipmates is inappropriate," the admiral said.

That "qualified opinion" was interpreted by many as a conclusive finding of wrongdoing," Kelso said. "For this, on behalf of the U.S. Navy, I extend my sincere regrets to (Hartwig's) family."

He also apologized to the families of the others who died in the blast,

saying he regretted that "such a long period has passed, and despite all efforts, no certain answer ... can be found."

Kelso, asked why he was making an apology even though the initial report was made under his predecessor's watch, said, "I'm doing what has to be done. It's part of the job. I think it was the right thing to do."

Kelso's move amounts to a stunning reversal of the Navy's initial investigation of Hartwig. Navy officials said that in recent memory, they could not recall such an action by a top Navy official.

In September 1989, some five months after the blast, the Navy released a report that accused Hartwig of putting "some type of detonation device" between gunpowder bags as he supervised the loading of one of the ship's 16-inch guns.

The service admitted it had only circumstantial evidence, but the report touched off heated denials from Hartwig's family and criticism from several members of Congress.

In June 1990, Navy Secretary H. Lawrence Garrett III ordered the service to reopen its investigation after the unexpected ignition of gunpowder occurred during the new series of tests that had been ordered.

Social Security benefits increase just slightly

WASHINGTON (AP) — Social Security recipients in January will see the smallest cost-of-living increase in their benefits in five years: 3.7 percent, the government said Thursday.

The average check for the nation's 43 million beneficiaries will rise just \$2.24 a month to \$629, reflecting more moderate price inflation this year because of the sluggish economy.

That was disappointing news for the roughly 60 percent of Americans older than 65 who rely on Social Security for at least half of their income and the 15 percent who rely on it for 90 percent or more of their income, according to Evelyn Morton, a lobbyist for the American Association of Retired Persons.

But even the relatively affluent elderly are hurting this year because income from their savings has been pinched by the steep decline in interest rates.

The elderly, and other savers as well, are finding interest income on bank certificates of deposit averaging around 30 percent lower than last year, according to the Bank Rate

Monitor, a North Palm Beach, Fla.-based newsletter.

The adjustment in Social Security benefits will be the smallest gain since January 1987, when benefits rose 1.3 percent. Last January's increase was 5.4 percent, the biggest in 8½ years. The 1990, 1989 and 1988 raises all were 4 percent or higher.

The maximum monthly benefit for a worker retiring in 1992 at age 65 will rise \$66 to \$1,088.

The percentage increase announced Thursday also applies to Supplemental Security Income, the welfare program that provides a minimum income for poor people who are aged, blind or disabled.

The maximum SSI payment will rise to \$422 from \$407 for an individual and to \$633 from \$610 for a couple.

Thursday's increase will show up in the Jan. 3 benefit checks to Social Security recipients and the Dec. 31 checks to SSI recipients.

The change was calculated by comparing the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index for the July-September quarter to the same quarter the previous year.

Through September, the annual rate of consumer inflation in 1991 has been 2.9 percent, far below last year's 6.1 percent rise. Economists say the recession and subsequent sluggish recovery have dampened consumers' appetite for new goods and services, thus dramatically lessening the pressure on prices.

"For over 43 million people... this cost-of-living adjustment will be their assurance that those benefit checks will continue to allow them to pay for needed goods and services," said Gwendolyn S. King, commissioner of Social Security. Retirees, however, complain that their costs have risen faster than overall inflation.

"Even with Medicare, the elderly pay more out of pocket for medical costs than any other portion of the population," said Bert Seidman, 72, a retired AFL-CIO official and a board member of the National Council of Senior Citizens.

Medical care, up 8.4 percent in the 12 months ending in September, is the fastest-rising component of the consumer index.

The Social Security Administration gave these examples of how the

3.7 percent increase will affect average monthly benefits:

- Aged couple, both getting benefits, up \$38 to \$1,067.
- Widowed mother and two children, up \$44 to \$1,252.
- Disabled worker, spouse and children, up \$38 to \$1,056.
- All disabled workers, up \$22 to \$610.

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Groups urge continued international ban on ivory trade

WASHINGTON (AP) — Environmental and animal rights groups argued Thursday against lifting the two-year-old international ban on ivory trade, saying Africa's elephant population has not yet had time to recover.

"Reopening of the ivory trade would mean extinction for the elephant," said John Fitzgerald of De-

fenders of Wildlife. "It is too soon to see a recovery of the African elephant."

The trade ban has sharply reduced the amount of ivory being exported by poachers now unable to find extensive markets, the groups said at a news conference.

But they said the African elephant population, now estimated at

about 600,000, has not grown since the ban took effect.

Craig Van Note, executive vice president of Monitor, a conservation and animal rights consortium, noted that the gestation period for elephants is more than two years, meaning that few elephants could have been born since the moratorium went into effect.

Iraq's nuclear program said advanced

WASHINGTON — Iraq's nuclear know-how is so sophisticated that it could resume its shattered atomic weapons program unless blocked by constant foreign inspections, a senior U.N. inspector told senators Thursday.

If the allied bombings had not interrupted its ambitious program during the Persian Gulf war, he testified, Iraq would have manufactured sufficient fuel for a nuclear bomb within 12 to 18 months. The assessment was furnished by David Kay, the American deputy leader of the international inspection team that is searching out and destroying the Iraqi nuclear program.

Kay, who works for the International Atomic Energy Agency based in Vienna, Austria, reported to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee about his team's seven missions to Iraq in the past four months.

He said intelligence information provided by the United States and its allies has been invaluable to the United Nations' project.

Report: Physician-owned labs well-used

WASHINGTON — Physician-owned laboratories and diagnostic imaging are more expensive and used more often than facilities in which doctors have no financial interest, a study presented to Congress on Thursday showed.

The two Florida State University professors who conducted the study said they found some of the same patterns caused by physician ownership in other parts of the country. "It is not (just) a Florida problem," said Jean M. Mitchell, associate professor of economics and co-author of the study.

GOP pushes plan to stimulate economy

WASHINGTON — Top Republicans urged President Bush on Thursday to propose an economic-stimulus package that includes tax breaks for the middle class, saying the economy is doing worse than predicted.

White House officials said Bush was considering offering such a package to Congress, but the president himself was noncommittal. "Parts of it are already there (in Congress). Trouble is, they're not listening too well," Bush said.

GOP leaders emerged from an earlier meeting with Bush to say the president had agreed to join them in proposing a package to Congress that would include new tax cuts and other measures to "spur" the economy.

Anti-abortion leader to enter race

WASHINGTON — The Rev. Patrick Mahoney, a leader of the Operation Rescue protests against abortion, said Thursday he would enter the presidential race as a Democrat, stressing support for the American family.

Mahoney, 37, who lives in Boca Raton, Fla., said he would formally declare his candidacy on Saturday in Wichita, Kan., the site of massive Operation Rescue protests at abortion clinics earlier this year.

He said his campaign would appeal to millions of Democrats who oppose abortion and to other middle-class Americans whose values aren't reflected by the current field of candidates.

Study: Quarter of 18-year-olds smoke

ATLANTA — A newly released survey of Americans ages 12 to 18 finds that 12 percent are smoking regularly — few at age 12, but one-fourth by adulthood.

The national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday that less than 1 percent of the 12-year-olds questioned in the survey said they had smoked in the preceding week, compared with 12 percent of the 15-year-olds and 25 percent of the 18-year-olds.

Occasional smoking — at least once in the preceding month — was reported by a total of 16 percent of the respondents. That ranged from 2 percent at age 12 to 31 percent at 18.

The findings, from a 1989 telephone-mail survey, were similar to those of a recently released 1990 national survey of high school students. In that survey, 13 percent said they smoked often — at least 25 of the preceding 30 days — and 32 percent said they had smoked at least once in that time period.

Water main breaks, flooding NYC Street

NEW YORK (AP) — An 87-year-old water main burst Thursday near Grand Central Terminal, buckling Manhattan's busiest streets and flooding the subways just before hundreds of thousands of commuters arrived in the morning rush. "I hate coming into the city," said Susan Orzechowski, a music production manager from Bronxville. "I don't like coming in and things like this make it worse."

Gushing water cascaded into the subway station at 42nd Street and Lexington Avenue, knocking out service on five subway lines and turning the train platform into a diving platform. The water flooded the tracks and was 1 foot high at the token booth.

A driving rainstorm further soaked pedestrians and slowed traffic. Workers scrambled to stop the spewing water, digging through 12 feet of asphalt, concrete and dirt to locate the leak. But the process took eight hours as officials first misidentified which pipe was responsible.

The area's normal conditions — choked traffic, packed trains and rushing herds of pedestrians — were not expected to be restored until at least next week, officials said. Hardy New Yorkers and hardened

commuters mostly coped quietly as they crossed a plywood bridge over a 5-foot-wide babbling brook on 42nd Street. A vocal minority grumbled about the inconvenience. "I don't know how I'm going to get there — I may have to walk," snapped Al Tripoli, 39, an engineering manager who got off a train from Brewster and was headed across the East River to Long Island City in Queens.

"These kind of things are going to happen. Our infrastructure is old. We need to recognize that," Mayor David Dinkins said.

The 20-inch cast-iron main, placed in 1904, broke around 5:30 a.m. Hours later, the water from the main was reduced substantially, but a stream still flowed into the subways. Police reported just a single injury attributed to the water.

Judge rules hospital must not pull plug

ATLANTA (AP) — A judge ruled Thursday that a hospital may not terminate life support to a comatose 13-year-old girl unless it obtains her parents' permission.

Fulton County Superior Court Judge Leah Sears-Collins ruled that the rights of the parents are paramount in the case. The father of the girl holds out hope for a miracle, but doctors say she will never recover.

The girl, identified in court as Jane Doe, has been in Scottish Rite Children's Hospital since May with what doctors said was an irreversible brain disorder.

The hospital's attorneys asked the judge Tuesday to grant permission for the girl's life support to be removed. Doctors testified that the only sensation she feels is pain and that keeping her alive constitutes child abuse.

Her father, however, insisted in testimony Wednesday that God could restore his daughter's damaged brain. "I don't believe there's such a thing as no hope," he said.

Before issuing her ruling Thursday, the judge visited the girl's bedside Wednesday.

Doctors had told the judge it would be in the girl's best interest to take her off her respirator.

"There is an element of pain and suffering going on," said Dr. Howard Schub, who has treated the girl for the past six years.

He said she could live a year or more in her current state; but not without life support.

Dr. Edward M. Goldstein, who has treated the girl since she was admitted to the hospital, said she is suffering from a degenerative brain disorder that cannot be reversed. "It's reached the point I find it ethically and morally unconscionable," he said.

"It's to the point the patient is being abused through medical technology."

The father, however, said he refuses to believe she cannot recover because doctors have been unable to tell him exactly what is killing the girl.

Contractor fraud reported

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Energy Department paid for liquor and golf tournament fees during years of delays in auditing billions of dollars' worth of outside contracts, congressional investigators said Thursday.

The General Accounting Office, in a report obtained by The Associated Press, said the department's auditing system was so starved for funds and staff that it will take 20 years to complete audits that were supposed to be completed in five years.

The contractors that escaped monitoring for potential fraud, waste and abuse included operators of U.S. nuclear weapons facilities, the GAO said.

The investigators said their sampling of several dozen of more than 1,300 contracts over the past 10 years showed the government was charged for liquor, unauthorized travel by spouses, registration for golf tournaments, first-class airline tickets and unspecified entertainment costs.

In some instances, excessive billings went unnoticed for more than a decade because audits were not conducted, the GAO said.

The Energy Department lacks assurance that its audits "will deter and detect potential fraud, waste and abuse," the report concluded.

Bush to visit Far East, Australia

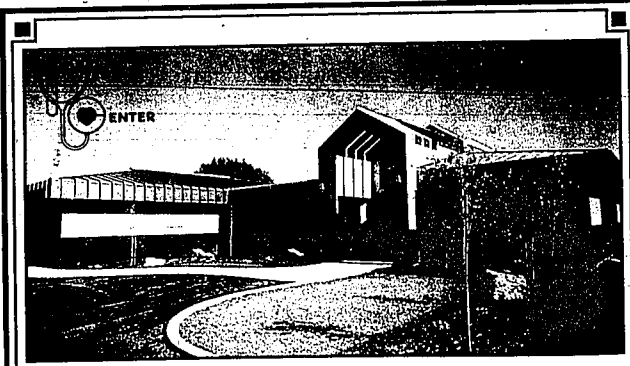
WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will visit Japan, Korea, Singapore and Australia on a nearly two-week trip to the Far East starting in late November, the White House said Thursday.

Bush is expected to leave Nov. 26 or 27 and will wind up the trip in Hawaii on Dec. 7 where he will attend ceremonies marking the 50th

anniversary of the Japanese attack on the U.S. fleet at Pearl Harbor.

He will return to Washington later that night, deputy press secretary Judy Smith said.

Bush will be in Japan on Nov. 28, Thanksgiving Day, making this the second year in a row he has spent the traditional American feast day abroad.

Pope criticizes birth control programs

CAMPO GRANDE, Brazil — Pope John Paul II on Thursday attacked widespread birth control programs in Latin America's most populous nation and accused officials of undermining the Brazilian family by promoting them.

Brazil's 155 million population has recently been increasing at a somewhat slower rate because of the use of condoms and the growing popularity of volunteer sterilization programs.

Speaking at a morning Mass attended by over 100,000 people, John Paul described Brazil's birth control programs as "gravely illicit" and blamed politicians, doctors and social workers for an "alarming rate of sterilizations" among men and women.

Philippine officials denies murder plan

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippine foreign secretary said Thursday that a taped conversation in which he purportedly offered money to an American mercenary to kill enemies of President Corason Aquino was a fake.

But Jack Terrell, who once worked as a mercenary for the rebels in Nicaragua, insisted the tape was genuine. He said he backed out of the alleged deal because he was afraid his targets would include civilian politicians.

Yugoslav army launches offensive

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — The Serb-dominated federal army launched an all-out onslaught Thursday on parts of Croatia, and thousands of Croat fighters and civilians fled strongholds in the secessionist republic.

Warplanes bombed a marina on the northern outskirts of the tourist mecca of Dubrovnik, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said. A gunship assisted in that attack, while mines and grenades exploded on hills above the well-known Hotel Belvedere and at the entrance to the nearby port of Gruz, Tanjug and Serbia's Radio Belgrade reported.

The attacks on Dubrovnik, on the eastern city of Vukovar and on several nearby areas appeared to represent a final push by the army and ethnic Serb rebels to occupy large areas of Croatia before the start of serious negotiations on Yugoslavia's future structure.

Hostage-prisoner swap moves ahead

UNITED NATIONS — A U.N. envoy's efforts to arrange a trade of Western hostages for Arabs held by Israel is moving forward, Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar said Thursday.

The U.N. mediator, Giandomenico Picco, held a marathon 20-hour session of talks in Lebanon with representatives of Lebanese kidnappers and returned to Damascus, Syria, on Wednesday, sources in Lebanon said. One of the security sources in the Mideast characterized the talks as "tough and complicated," but would not elaborate on the substance of the session, which began Tuesday.

Ukraine rejects pact with republics

MOSCOW — The Ukraine said Thursday it will not sign an agreement to form an economic union with other Soviet republics, producing a major crack in the agreement on the eve of its signing.

After weeks of intense negotiations, 10 republics had been expected to sign the document in a ceremony at the Kremlin on Friday. The Ukraine, an industrial and agricultural powerhouse of 53 million people, was considered a key participant.

Since defeating a coup attempt by hard-line Communists in August, President Mikhail S. Gorbachev has spent most his time working on the agreement to preserve strong economic ties between the republics.

Train crash kills at least 16

MELUN, France (AP) — An overnight passenger train from the Riviera to Paris smashed head-on into a freight train on Thursday, killing at least 16 people, injuring dozens and littering a freight yard with twisted metal, smashed luggage and bloody bedding.

Railway officials said the freight train rolled into the passenger train's path while switching tracks about 6:30 a.m. near the station in Melun, 30 miles southeast of Paris.

Jacques Fourrier, president of the French national railway, said both trains were traveling 35-45 mph.

Fourrier said the freight train passed by a signal, but he did not know whether the light was red or green at the time. He said the signal was in working order.

The passenger train from Nice, made up of four sleeper cars and several cars carrying automobiles, was knocked off the rails by the force of the collision with the 12-car, 900-ton freight train loaded with metal cables and beams.

The front sleeping car was hurled atop the passenger train's engine, and the crash left a 550-yard trail of buckled metal.

Fourrier told a news conference the railroad was "fully responsible for the accident and must draw the necessary conclusions" regarding safety.

Among those killed was the engineer of the freight train. Most of the other casualties were in the lead sleeper car.

"I was in the corridor in the second car when I felt a violent shock and was thrown against the compartment wall," said one passenger, who did not give his name. "Most people were still asleep."

Iraq holds documents from team

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Iraq refuses to return documents about its secret nuclear program that it took by force last month from a team of U.N. inspectors, diplomats said Thursday.

U.N. inspectors now in Iraq seeking more evidence on its nuclear program have demanded the return of the documents, the diplomats said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The documents include technical drawings on Iraq's designs for a trigger mechanism for its atomic weapons, they said.

The U.N. team, led by American David Kay, seized the documents Sept. 23 in a raid on Iraq's central records storage building. But Iraqi guards forcibly retrieved the papers and ejected the inspectors hours later.

Many of the papers were returned to the inspectors the next day, but Kay said the Iraqis failed to return 45,000 pages. The most sensitive volumes — identified by a red spine on the binder — were missing.

However, "We had photographed the cover pages of the documents," Kay said, and the International Atomic Energy Agency presented Iraq with a list of the missing documents.

The Iraqis are cooperating with the current inspection team on other matters, the diplomats said.

In another matter, Iraqi Ambassador Abdul Amir al-Anbani circulated a letter Thursday saying Kuwaiti naval vessels entered Iraqi waters twice on the night of Oct. 10-11 and captured 42 to 50 Iraqi fishermen who are still being held.

NATO will slash nuclear weapons

TAORMINA, Sicily (AP) — NATO defense ministers approved plans on Thursday to slash their nuclear arsenal in Europe by 80 percent, the largest percentage reduction in alliance history.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and other defense chiefs of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization decided on the cut at strategy talks in this resort on the eastern edge of Sicily.

They agreed to eliminate four-fifths of their arsenal of nuclear-armed artillery shells, short-range

missiles and gravity bombs based in Europe. It amounts to the largest cut in nuclear weapons since the alliance began deploying the arms in the early 1950s. "It will leave the current nuclear arsenal at one-tenth of what it was 10 years ago," said British Defense Minister Tom King.

NATO cut the number of warheads deployed in Europe by half during the 1980s.

The new cuts would leave NATO with a short-range nuclear arsenal of about 700 bombs that are carried by warplanes. Long-range missiles on American and British submarines are not affected by the plan.

Italian Defense Minister Virginio Rognoni said the reduction would be carried out rapidly, with the timetable to be set at a NATO summit in Rome on Nov. 7-8.

Why the budget monster? Ask Democrats in Congress

It was just a year ago next week that the Democratic leaders of Congress struck a budget deal with the White House, agreeing to a plan to gradually reduce the country's gargantuan deficit by taking a new approach:

Self-control.

So much for self-control.

Congress passed a damn-the-budget, \$6 billion, 20-week extension of unemployment benefits last month, despite the threat of a veto from President Bush. Bush put the bill out of its misery with his veto stamp earlier this month, and the Senate upheld him by a two-vote margin Wednesday.

The exercise was another example of why the federal government is out of control.

Organized labor put on a full-court press on this unemployment benefits extension, calling in all its chits from the members of Congress.

And its clients in Congress delivered, as usual.

The House approved the 20-week extension by a better than 2-to-1 ratio, and the Senate followed suit, but a few votes short of a two-thirds majority. It turned out that was the narrow margin by which Bush's veto was sustained when the measure came back around an override.

The president had offered as an alternative a 10-week extension that would have fit within the parameters of the budget deal.

But this dispute was not really about unemployment benefits. Nationwide, joblessness is falling and

total employment is at near-record levels.

The dispute was about power. Old habits die hard in Congress, and the hardest habit of all to break is saying no to the special interests that come back time and again for another dip in the honey pot.

Organized labor has been using the federal treasury as a balm against the hard edges of capitalism for three generations. It doesn't see why it should stop just because Congress and the president have agreed that a \$250 billion budget deficit is a national obscenity and a millstone on the economy.

But big labor isn't busting the budget. Democrats in Congress are.

Nationally, the Democratic Party — the party of Jefferson, Wilson, Roosevelt, Truman and Kennedy — has degenerated into a balky tool of the fragmented interests that control it.

That's a tragedy, and not only for those who share Democratic ideals but for the country. Democrats in Congress no longer hold the balance of power, but they do control the levers of obstruction.

The irony is that the more the budget-deficit balloons, from things like unneeded supplementary unemployment benefits, the more American jobs are in jeopardy.

A former Democratic senator and current presidential candidate, Paul Tsongas, is fond of saying the Cold War is over and the Japanese won. He should know.



Hill-Thomas mire may yield benefits

A besmeared and besmirched Clarence Thomas has finally been confirmed to be an associate justice of the Supreme Court by one of the thinnest margins in history. The political spin doctors are already picking over the dregs of the hearings, making what was a mean and messy process even uglier.

Now, how do we get over the national hangover this binge of sex, politics and who's lying has caused?

The spectacle of two successful, outstanding black individuals forced to try to discredit each other in the pillbox pit of the televised Senate Judiciary Committee hearings leaves a bad, morning-after taste in everyone's mouth. The process needs to be re-evaluated. And so, certainly, do the players who used it so shabbily.

Both Thomas and Anita Hill have been irreparably damaged. As Thomas noted during the hearings, he will never outline the accusations of sexual harassment. Millions of people will always consider him to be guilty and distrust his ability to be impartial on some of the cases he must help decide on the high court.

Hill has been hurt much less, even though contradictions and questions in her testimony will continue to be pointed out by those who sevenge through the hearing transcripts. She will always be a hero to feminist and civil rights groups who were looking for her name to keep Thomas off the high court. Her name is now a household word, her face recognizable, her TV star-quality proven.

If she chooses, she can profit handsomely from the book contracts, lecture opportunities and mini-series deals she will be offered. Whether she does or doesn't, she still has a tenured faculty position.

How do we go about trying to repair other damage from that televised binge of accusations and character assassinations? At a minimum, this is essential:

The weight of public opinion that eventually swung away from Hill to Thomas should not be allowed to deflect attention

from the issue of sexual harassment. Women must be assured — by workplace policies, by law and in practice — that they will be protected from sexual harassment. That isn't easy to do, as this miserable episode has demonstrated.

What constitutes sexual harassment needs to be made perfectly clear. Considering anything that creates a hostile environment in the mind of a single worker to be actionable sexual harassment makes a mockery of the problem. (I had a call this week from a woman complaining that allowing newsmen in an office building's lobby to sell soft-porn magazines is sexual harassment.)

There must also be clearly established ways to report sexual harassment and to protect persons who bring such charges from hostile repercussions. There must also be clear — and better publicized — time limits on when such accusations can be raised. However difficult it may be psychologically for a victim of harassment to come forward, it is impossible to evaluate such allegations fairly years after the offenses are said to have occurred.

More attention must also be paid to how persons accused of sexual harassment can defend themselves. It is easy to imagine how much damage false charges of harassment against a Clarence Thomas or anyone else could do. His only defense may be to challenge the veracity of the accuser, as Thomas' supporters did. But fears of such a reaction inhibit many victims of sexual harassment from speaking up, and the terrible injustice of sexual harassment persists.

Finding fair, realistic and practical ways to balance these rights and protections is major unfinished business for Congress, employers, women's groups and the nation as a whole. Women — and all voters — must recognize

the urgent importance of electing more women to national office. Women should stop being fund-raisers and envelope-stuffers for male politicians who ignore their concerns. Instead, they should run themselves and work for other female candidates.

The pipelines are now full of women in state and city offices — elected and appointed — who are well-qualified to move up.

Holding power themselves is women's best and most reliable defense against sexual harassment.

Voters need to pay more attention to the qualifications and character of the people they are sending to Congress. Ted Kennedy's posing as the defender of American women against sexual harassment makes a mockery of the issue and the Senate. Several other members of the Senate Judiciary Committee could not begin to stand the kind of scrutiny to which they subjected both Thomas and Hill, and their moralizing posture is blatant hypocrisy.

The whole process of how Supreme Court justices are appointed and confirmed needs to be cleaned up. The president should pay more attention to the "advice" function of the Senate and not try simply to arm-twist it to "consent."

The president is entitled to pick a nominee whose views parallel his; that is a matter voters should consider in choosing a president.

The Senate has a right to oppose a nominee for political reasons as well, or for lack of qualifications. But it needs to conduct the process so that distinguished jurists like Robert Bork are not destroyed, so that nominees can feel free to answer questions without evasions, abortion is the hidden agenda and proceedings don't deteriorate into mud-slinging sideshows.

And then all of us will continue to pay — with both our money and our peace of mind — for the waste to be stored for its remaining life of thousands of years.

Limit congressional terms

Restoring competition and restricting career politicians are the two basic goals of the term limitation effort currently underway in Idaho. Contrary to *The Times-News* editorial on Sept. 9, these changes are desperately needed.

Currently, congressional incumbents have so many advantages — free mail, publicity, huge staffs — that they nearly always win. In the U.S. House of Representatives, there is a 98 percent return rate. Limiting incumbency is the only way to level the playing field.

Limited terms would change the way lawmakers view themselves and their jobs. Public office should be viewed as a leave from private life to which a legislator will soon return — not a career.

Firm stands on controversial issues would be more likely and catering to special interests for votes or campaign contribution less likely.

Our founding fathers would be appalled at the professional politicians we have today. One of the concerns Thomas Jefferson had initially with the proposed U.S. Constitution was its failure to include a term-limit provision. Jefferson wrote a letter to James Madison stating, "The second feature I dislike, and strongly dislike, is the

abandonment in every instance of the principle of rotation in office."

Term limits were omitted in the Bill of Rights not because the founding fathers thought them to be a bad idea but because they thought they weren't necessary. They felt that individuals would serve and then return to their profession and live under the laws that they helped make.

We have witnessed recently the abuses of career politicians in providing advantages to themselves not allowed their constituents. Career politicians begin to serve the interests of party rather than the needs of the country. The battle between parties wastes time and money as well as good legislation for our country. I suggest that we would solve some of these problems by limited terms. Our legislators need this message from their constituents.

The president is limited (by the 22nd Amendment) to two terms, and the governors of 29 states are limited to one or two terms. At the same time the 22nd Amendment passed, President Truman endorsed, and President Eisenhower proposed, and President Eisenhower endorsed, a 12-year limit on terms for congressmen and senators.

At that time, Congress amended the Constitution to limit the presidency but refused to limit their own terms. It is time to correct that oversight. We need to send a clear message: Elected positions are for public service, not life tenure. The time for term limitation is now.

It is now evident that he passed many such checks and that the amount exceeded \$1,000 on at least two occasions. It is important for the public to know how completely our congressmen have insulated themselves from the rules and laws which their constituency must live by. It is typical of our Democrat-controlled Congress to exempt its members from the everyday rules of society. For instance, Congress requires the public to closely adhere to hiring and promotion policies, such as guarantees of equal opportunity. Then they exempt the lawmakers from these provisions. They treat themselves like royalty.

It's really no surprise that "King Richard" Stallings has demonstrated a careless posture toward personal overdrafts. His voting record indicates the same cavalier attitude toward public indebtedness.

It's time that the American electorate removes the regal status of Congress and insists that its members subject themselves to the same rigors and constraints of the general public. A good start would be to require Mr. Stallings to give up his throne.

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Indiana man to face murder, robbery charges

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — An Indiana man was being held in the Bonneville County Jail in Idaho Falls Thursday for the robbery of a Soda Springs bank and the shotgun slaying of a teller.

Charges of first-degree murder and robbery were filed Thursday against Timothy Alan Dunlap, 23, of Sellersburg, Ind., Soda Springs Police Chief Blynn Wilcox said.

"It's a serious tragedy for a small community," Wilcox said. "It affects almost everyone. We're gratified with the help we've had from other agencies."

Dunlap was scheduled to appear before a Bonneville County magistrate Thursday afternoon in Idaho Falls before being returned to Soda Springs for arraignment before Caribou County Magistrate Ron Hart.

Caribou County Prosecutor Clyde Nelson said Dunlap would be returned Thursday night to Bonneville County, which has a more secure jail.

Dunlap, who also is wanted for questioning in an Ohio homicide, was arrested about 2:15 p.m. Wednesday in the rugged Jack Knife Creek area of the Caribou National Forest, about 40 miles northeast of Soda Springs.

He allegedly robbed the Security State Bank in Soda Springs about 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, and during the robbery allegedly shot and killed teller Tonya Hunsaker Crane, 24, of Soda Springs, with a saved-off shotgun.

"She cooperated fully with him," Soda Springs Police Lt. Joe Rice said. "Rarely do we have a violent crime like that. I've been here 17 years and we've never had a bank robbery."

Dunlap allegedly fled northeast after the robbery with an undetermined amount of cash in a silver-colored car. A manhunt was launched, including local, state and federal law enforcement officials from Idaho and Wyoming.

An abandoned car was found on the edge of the Caribou National Forest, near the Wyoming border. Police said they found a crossbow and shotgun in the car.

Wilcox said Dunlap was apprehended later without incident.

"That area is heavily populated with hunters," since deer season opened in northern Caribou and southern Bonneville counties on Tuesday, Rice said. "He could easily have taken a high-powered rifle and vehicle. We were fortunate."

ISU head calls for support

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho State University needs the support of eastern Idaho lawmakers to expand higher education programs in Idaho Falls, ISU's president says.

"If you don't have a unified eastern Idaho delegation, you don't have a chance," said Richard Bowen following a meeting Wednesday with legislators from the Upper Snake River Valley.

Bowen said he thinks area lawmakers will support completion of a \$7.5 million Higher Education Center at University Place. The center received \$3.2 million from the Legislature last year.

ISU also is requesting \$264,000 to expand lower-division programs in Idaho Falls next year.

Lawmakers say there's a good chance ISU's requests will be granted, but money will be tight.

Fraternity under fire

MOSCOW (AP) — The Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity at the University of Idaho center will be closed for providing prospective pledges alcohol this fall while under probation for hazing last year, UI's Intrafraternity Council Tribunal says.

The SAE house will be expelled from the Greek system unless it agrees to implement 18 wide-ranging measures.

The tribunal also will ask school officials to request the fraternity's national office close the house unless the members agree.

Michael Lincoln, the chapter president, said the house intends to try its best to comply.

Humiliation can trigger massacres, California psychiatrist tells Idahoans

MOSCOW (AP) — The gunman who killed 22 people in Texas before shooting himself Wednesday was a man unable to deal with humiliation any other way, says one of the nation's leading forensic psychiatrists.

"It's usually some specific event that triggers it," said Ronald Markman, who spoke to a crowd of about 200 Wednesday night at the University of Idaho.

"In every homicide case you examine, you find the same thing: a humiliating experience. And the killing is usually an act of retribution," Markman said.

Before opening fire on the luncheon crowd in Killeen, Texas, Wednesday, the George Hennard, 35, shouted, "This is what Bell

County has done to me!" Investigators received a letter sent to a neighbor in which Hennard described women as "mostly white, treacherous female vipers...."

This evidence of a catastrophic event is typical of mass murders, said Markman, a Los Angeles lawyer, author and psychiatrist. After the event, the person's social connection completely breaks down.

Markman said the 1984 massacre of 21 people in a California McDonald's restaurant by James Oliver Huberty, happened right after Huberty was fired from his job.


"That rejection is so destructive to the person's identity and ego that the only way to reconstruct it is to play the role of God," he said. "After the ego disintegrates, killing is therapeutic (to these people)... by controlling the life of another."

Only a few people are affected so dramatically by humiliation that they would turn into a killer, Markman said.

But homicidal killers come from all socioeconomic groups. "They are our next door neighbors, our friends.... We are all capable of homicide," Markman said.

"We'll see more (homicides) because we have the means and the freedom... (and) our society is developing an anti-family bias."

Markman said more than 65 percent of the nation's children live in single-parent families, and are more prone to develop anti-social personalities and other psychological problems.



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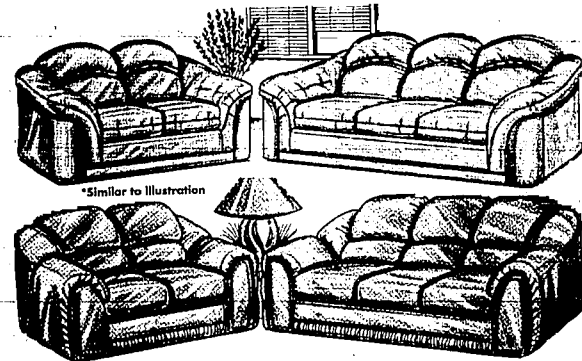
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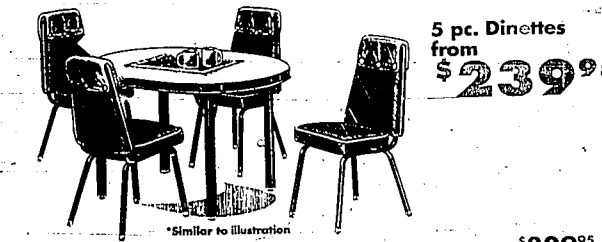

Public pitches in to battle brush blaze

RIVERSIDE — When a fast-moving brush fire threatened some expensive homes along Thomas Road Wednesday afternoon, friends, neighbors and relatives pitched in to help firefighters from four agencies fend off the 250-acre blaze.

Black, emerald and fanned, a fire which authorities believe started as a small, smoldering blaze along the Snake River. It wasn't contained until late evening, when the winds died down.

Blackfoot Fire Department Battalion Chief Doug Rosin said Bureau of Land Management crews patrolled the burned area Thursday to put out hot spots. The fire was a few miles west of Blackfoot.

Review possible for death penalty law

BOISE — It appears Idaho will have to revise its death penalty law to more closely define what "utter disregard for human life" means.

The U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals on Wednesday upheld its earlier decision striking down the death penalty ordered for Thomas Eugene Creech for a 1981 killing at the Idaho State Penitentiary. It was a rehearing of a decision announced in March, which produced the same result, overturning Creech's death penalty. But this time, the Idaho death penalty law drew some defenders.

Engineers study ways of toxic clean-up

BOISE — Boise National Forest officials intend to contain tons of toxic sediment behind the failed Kirby Dam near Atlanta, but the big question is how.

Some 160,000 cubic yards of sediment containing heavy metals from years of mining still lurk above the old wooden dam in Elmore County. The top half failed on Memorial Day weekend, spewing the chemicals into the Middle Fork of the Boise River.

Engineers will examine their options this week and make a final decision by next, forest spokesman Frank Carroll said Wednesday.

Fledgling private school shuts down

PAYETTE — A nine-week struggle has ended between officials of the Payette School District and local residents trying to establish a private school.

The school's mathematics and science teacher moved out of town last week and Joe Fairbanks, a founder of the now-defunct Indigo Academy of Arts and Sciences, said the school's nine students will have to choose between public, private or parochial schools in the area. A lack of money and personnel was Indigo's undoing, Fairbanks said.

Panhandle schools mull consolidation

TROY — The Whitepine School Board has decided to hire a consultant to help decide whether to unify the district's schools, or move toward further splitting.

"We need someone to help answer some of the questions residents of the district have been asking," school board member John Porter said.

Nuke waste travels through Utah to Idaho

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Hundreds of truck loads of highly radioactive waste have begun rolling through Utah, carrying core rods from a decommissioned nuclear reactor on their way to Idaho for storage.

Some environmentalists are worried, but state officials don't see a threat.

Three of an expected 247 shipments have passed through northern Utah. The most recent was Wednesday.

The rods come from the Fort St. Vrain reactor north of Denver. They will be stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Idaho Falls.

The radioactive loads are carried on specially designed trailers pulled by semi-tractor trucks. Each shipment is approximately 1,800 pounds and contains bundles of fuel rods.

Environmentalists worry rural counties along the route are unprepared to deal with an emergency in the event of an accident involving radioactive waste.

Transport of any kind of hazardous waste is a worry," said Ivan C. Weber, vice chairman of the Sierra Club's Utah Chapter. "I think the potential for road disasters is significant enough that you wonder whether the environmental response teams in all these counties along the way are capable of handling this."

However, Utah Highway Patrol Capt. Dan Fallows, commander of the Motor Carrier Safety Bureau, said many other shipments are more troubling. With nuclear material, he said, extra safeguards are taken. "My personal opinion is a gasoline tanker is much more dangerous than this," he said. "The potential for danger is astronomical for a gasoline tanker."

When the nuclear shipments reach populous areas, UHP cruisers accompany them. "We escort them through the Ogden area, through Weber County," Fallows said.

The shipments are also guarded by the federal government, Fallows said the routes, types of ship-

ments and schedules are secret. They are tracked by satellite and are in constant communication with federal officials.

The transports also have areas mapped out where they can pull off the road in the event of an emergency, bad weather or traffic hangups.

However, Fallows said that so far, there have been no glitches.

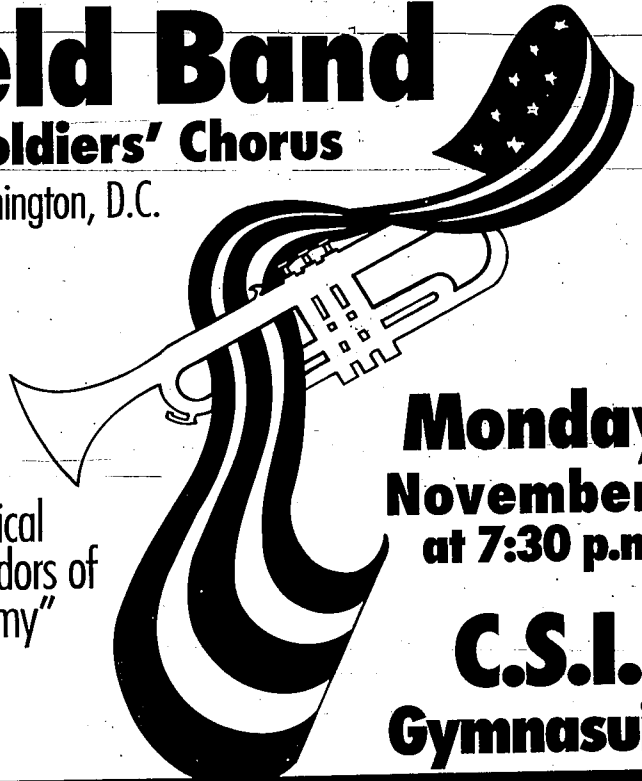
The trucks are well maintained and are inspected by the Utah Highway Patrol, as well as highway agencies in Colorado, Wyoming and Idaho.

Glenn Goodrich, director of the state's division in charge of motor carriers and ports of entry, said no special permit is needed for the loads to move through Utah.

Still, not everyone is satisfied with the safety measures. "The risk from these transports come from collisions — collisions with other vehicles that have volatile materials on them," said Jan Beyer, a nuclear physicist who is chief scientist for the National Audubon Society, New York City.

Congressional committee kills '91 grazing hike

WASHINGTON — A proposal to increase four-fold the amount ranchers pay to graze their livestock on federal land was rejected by a House-Senate conference committee Thursday, effectively killing the issue for this year.

A clash over a proposal to strengthen prohibitions against federal funding of art that is deemed offensive had threatened Thursday morning to derail the committee's agreement on the bill, reached Wednesday. After some confusion, the committee adjourned later in the day with the grazing-fees deal intact.

The action came during a conference on the Interior Department appropriations bill. The House earlier this year had approved the increase, but the Senate had defeated it. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-I Idaho, who urged conference committee members to strike down the fee hike proposal, praised the panel's decision.

"I reminded them that the vast majority of the 31,000 ranchers who graze cattle and sheep on Western public lands run small family-owned operations," Stallings said Thursday.

"They simply could not afford this kind of increase. This amendment would have put them out of business."

The Idaho Cattle Association estimates that 87-percent

of the cattle in Idaho graze at least part of the year on public land.

"This decision represents a real victory for Idaho ranchers — and all who depend on the multiple use of public lands," Rep. Larry Larocco, D-Idaho, said. "The proposed grazing fee increases would have been devastating."

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said Idaho livestock producers wouldn't have been able to shoulder the proposed hikes.

"If you raise grazing fees in Idaho, you might as well ban milk in Wisconsin or wheat in Kansas," he said. "We simply cannot afford to raise those fees and drive more ranchers out of business and undermine our local

Witnesses turned the vehicle back over and attempted to revive Cunningham, the dispatcher said.

She was wearing a seat belt, and Belk concluded no speed or alcohol was involved in the accident.

Water Resources Board hearing at 2 p.m. today

The hearing is over whether the board will exempt Twin Falls County from a provision of a state interim protection for the Middle Snake River that prohibits construction of docks and boat ramps.

The hearing is scheduled for the Twin Falls office of the Idaho Department of Water Resources, 222 Shoshone St. E.

The county is awaiting permission from the Bureau of Land Management to use part of a BLM-administered parcel of land to build the park. The agency's approval is expected later this month.

Niagara Springs conference conducted today at 1 p.m.

TWIN FALLS — A conference on an application to build a hydroelectric project at Niagara Springs will be held at 1 p.m. today.

The meeting will be held at the Grand Grange Hall, 2148 S. Main St. Rim View Trout Co. wants to use the water discharge from its fish farm to generate electricity. Rim View, owned by Boise businessman Earl Hardy, has been embroiled in a controversy over water rights from the springs.

Niagara Springs is the site of a state park. The Idaho Water Resources Department will explain the process Hardy's request will go through. The public is welcome.

"We make sure we have community resources available with free screenings," Chestnut said.

This year, nearly every school district in the valley will hold some drug education program for children from first grade through high school. Many older students will attend seminars featuring drug awareness speakers, while younger children will get red ribbons to tie on car antennas or stickers to paste on their textbooks. The national Red Ribbon campaign begins in Twin Falls Saturday.

Chestnut also says she has seen enthusiasm grow for the program by leaps and bounds over the last three years it has been in the valley.

"While a lot of kids will pooh, pooh it, there's a lot of kids who don't," she said. "Every year the number of groups

Blaine hillside ordinance receives additional fine tuning

HAILEY — Concerns of farmers and ranchers in southern Blaine County are being taken to heart as county commissioners struggle with ways to make a controversial hillside ordinance fair to all residents.

The commissioners planned to go on a site inspection Wednesday to see firsthand what concerns the agricultural community.

"What's scenic up here is not what's scenic down here," said rancher Nick Purdy during a public hearing Tuesday before the commissioners.

Purdy argued that the draft recommended by the county's Planning and Zoning Commission should not apply to agricultural land in the south county near Pizabo unless a

property owner wants to put in a subdivision. Saying the ordinance should only be created if a need for it is demonstrated, Purdy went on to say "just leave us alone, and let us operate the way we've been operating."

The ordinance has been in the development stage since the past spring after several incidents occurred in which property owners carved access roads across steep hillside.

The ordinance was developed to preserve the natural character and aesthetic value of skylines, ridges, terraces, knolls and steep hillsides.

Its other goals were to regulate scarring of hillsides, to maintain soil stability and to promote active fire management for emergency vehicles.

The ordinance defines a Mountain Overlay District as lands with slopes exceeding 25

percent and those slopes which are between 15 and 25 percent in which the proposed structures of roadways are visible (regardless of distance) from a height of up to six feet above the roadway of a scenic corridor.

Highway 75 is designated as Scenic Corridor 1 and Center Road and Highways 20 and 93 are designated as Scenic Corridor 2. The ordinance fully applies to both corridors with two exceptions.

One exception is that lands used for agricultural purposes in Scenic Corridor 2 have non-residential roads which are less than 25 percent slopes if they comply with permit requirements. The other exception is that agricultural structures to be built if they are not "skinned."

People at the meeting also were concerned with the lack of limitation on how far the

structure of road is visible from a highway or scenic corridor.

"I think that 'as far as you can see' is unreasonable," said Jerry O'Connell, a local landowner who is trying to build a home on a lot in the Indian Creek Subdivision north of Hailey, said he is trying to work within the spirit of the ordinance, but finds it "very cumbersome" to deal with.

"For the poor guy who's got an acre of land he wants to put on a house and doesn't want to spend \$5,000 before he can break ground, I would think he's got a problem," Hoff said, explaining that an architect, an engineer and a lawyer had to be hired before he could begin his home.

Disagreement reigned amongst the commissioners themselves over the ordinance. "I'm kind of ashamed of the ordinance,"

said Commissioner Rupert House. "To me all it does is make a lot of hoops for people to jump through."

House went on to criticize the county's planning and zoning commission, but offered no solution.

Recognizing a few shortcomings of the ordinance, Commissioner Tom Blanchard said he's like to do something on the books and see where the real problems lie.

Anxious to lift a building moratorium for hillside development, Blanchard said he would be willing to amend the ordinance later to address minor issues and what to do about remote canyon areas. The commissioners will renew the ordinance again on Oct. 29. The final draft must then be accepted and published before the moratorium can be lifted and the ordinance becomes effective.

Without federal highway bill, state's dollars will run out

BOISE — Even though Congress has yet to pass a new federal highway bill and the old bill expired two weeks ago, the Idaho Transportation Department hasn't run out of money — yet.

But the department will only be able to bid construction contracts with federal money through November, said Deputy Director Hugh Lydston.

The department has just about finished "letting" road repair contracts with federal money during the fiscal year 1991, the last year covered by the old highway bill, Lydston said.

After that, he said, they will be able to tap into \$6.5 million that Congress withheld from the highway appropriation. Every year, he said, Congress withholds part of

the highway money to help finance the federal budget deficit, but states use some of the withheld funds if there is no highway bill.

The old bill expired Oct. 1, Congress authorized the transportation department to use \$6.5 million of the \$16.3 million that was withheld from its fiscal 1991 appropriation.

That money will allow the department to award contracts on a few more projects, Lydston said, including repaving several miles of Interstate 84 between Mountain Home and Hammett.

After that money is spent, the department will have some state funds left. But since federal money makes up 90 percent of the department's operating funds, the state money won't go very far, Lydston said.

However, he doesn't expect the department will go begging.

The Senate passed a highway aid bill this summer, and the House Public Works Committee Tuesday approved a different version of the bill. That bill is scheduled to go to the full House sometime next week, but transportation department workers may meet to resolve differences between the two bills the first week of November.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, was one of the main sponsors of the Senate bill, and Lydston said the transportation department worked closely with Symms' office on the legislation, especially on the provisions affecting Idaho.

The two bills differs in several respects, said Taylor Bowlden, Symms' legislative director.

The Senate-passed bill provides a total of \$762.3 million in highway money to Idaho over a five-year period, Bowlden said. By contrast, the current House bill gives Idaho

\$535 million over six years, he said.

If discretionary funds and money for demonstration projects are excluded, that bill would give Idaho \$564 million over five years. By contrast, he said, the old bill gave Idaho \$356 million in "formula apportionment" funds between fiscal years 1987 and 1991.

But, Bowlden said, the House bill does not include two Symms-sponsored amendments that are part of the Senate bill.

Those are the Private Property Rights Act, which would require federal agencies to review proposed projects with a view toward minimizing their impact on property rights, and a provision setting up a Recreation Trails Trust Fund.

The trust fund would give money to states for building and maintaining recreational trails. It would be funded from taxes paid on purchases of non-highway recreational fuel. That money is now paid into the Highway Trust Fund.

Another House-Senate difference that must be resolved involves taxes. The House Ways and Means committee Wednesday approved a measure extending half of the nickel-a-gallon fuel tax increase for four years.

The 26-cent tax that was extended goes into the Highway Trust Fund. The other half, which goes to the federal government's general fund, would expire as scheduled in 1995.

The Senate Finance Committee, of which Symms is a member, will have to come up with its own gas tax bill before the two can be reconciled in conference committee, Bowlden said.

DUI suspect pleads innocent to charge

TWIN FALLS — A college student suspected of eluding officers after an accident and charged with drunken driving pleaded innocent in court Thursday.

Twin Falls hires 2 new police officers

TWIN FALLS — The city of Twin Falls will add two full-time police officers by the end of the year and hire an extra traffic cop too.

Twenty-five men showed up to apply for the two new positions Monday, and 16 of those made it past the written exam and physical ability test, said Susan Harris, the city's personnel administrator.

The remaining would-be officers were interviewed Tuesday and Wednesday. They were called back before they make the department's short list of potential hires, Harris said.

"We still have a ways to go before we have our

pool of candidates," she said.

The two new positions were added to the City Council's annual budget and will be filled in December, Harris said.

Public Safety Director Paul Du Fresno said those additional positions must receive a final OK from City Manager Tom Courtney.

The city already has one vacant position created by the resignation of Sgt. Ed Devall last month. Du Fresno said someone from within the department will be promoted to sergeant and a new hire will fill the empty position, he said.

It has been several years since the city added extra patrol positions, Du Fresno said.

There are currently 30 officers on the city roster, but only 24 of those are on regular duty.

INEL before (the Waste Isolation Pilot Project) was opened," he said, referring to the storage facility for low-level nuclear waste scheduled to be opened in New Mexico.

Even though the Fort St. Vrain fuel rods, as high-level waste, will not be stored at WIPP, Kempthorne said nuclear shipments should be halted until WIPP opens.

"Idaho should not have to bear the heavy burden" of storing the nation's nuclear waste, he said.

Kempthorne, who in the past has supported a project that would concentrate nuclear weapons production at INEL, seemed to back off that support Thursday.

In response to a question on whether he continued to support locating the proposed new production facility at INEL, despite environmental concerns, Kempthorne said that as a senator, he would "insist

that any new mission ensure the public health and safety to the highest degree, as well as the safety of the environment."

However, he refused to say specifically whether he supported or opposed the NPR.

But Kempthorne-blamed both sides of the abortion controversy for reducing a complex question to "a battle of bumper stickers," and refused to categorize himself as "pro-life" or "pro-choice."

He does not support unrestricted abortion," he said. "But rape, incest, life of the mother and severe fetal deformity are exceptions."

Kempthorne said that when a television interviewer asked what he would do if his wife were raped and became pregnant as a result, he replied, "I would support her decision."

He added that as a senator, he would not vote to allow federal money to be spent on abortions.

On the proposed 1 percent initiative, Kempthorne said he supported the goals of the initiative, movement but not the means.

Even with no additional increase, the fees on some 268 million acres federal rangeland will go up automatically next year to \$2.12 under a formula based largely on livestock prices, Synar said he was "flabbergasted and disappointed" by the committee's vote.

this is what we're having," she explained.

"On nights when the kids cook, they usually fix their own favorite dishes — and lots of them of their Spaghettis, for example, is prepared in a six-quart kettle."

"We don't have much in the line of leftovers," Judy said with a laugh.

Her weekly grocery shopping involves more than one cart. She uses 25 pounds of flour per week and 25 pounds of sugar in two weeks.

"I buy the specials," she said, "and budget to buy extra to help build a food storage."

The family goes through 12 gallons of milk a week. Judy Allen skims the milk, which she buys from

her sister's dairy, and makes butter.

The annual late-summer ritual of canning is an economic necessity at the Allens, and they make it a family project.

"Each of the kids has their own job," Judy said. This year, they put up 250 quarts of beans and froze 100 quart bags of corn.

"I can eight to 12 bushel of peaches each year, depending on the price," she added.

The Allen children aren't involved in a lot of extracurricular activities, and there is no extra money for private lessons. But six of the kids have taken band in school.

"There is a lot they do have to sacrifice," Judy said of her children, "and sometimes they complain, but not much."

The older boys work at local dairies and the older girls worked last summer for Magic Valley Youth Services. Some of the kids also mow lawns.

Judy said her kids have their disagreements, but she said she has seen some remarkable acts of generosity.

"One of my older daughters bought glasses for her younger sister," Judy said, a hint of tears in the corner of her eye. One daughter also loaned her sister \$700 to buy a new flute.

"The older kids buy with their own school clothes and help out with the younger ones," Judy added. "They also help with each other at Christmas, too."

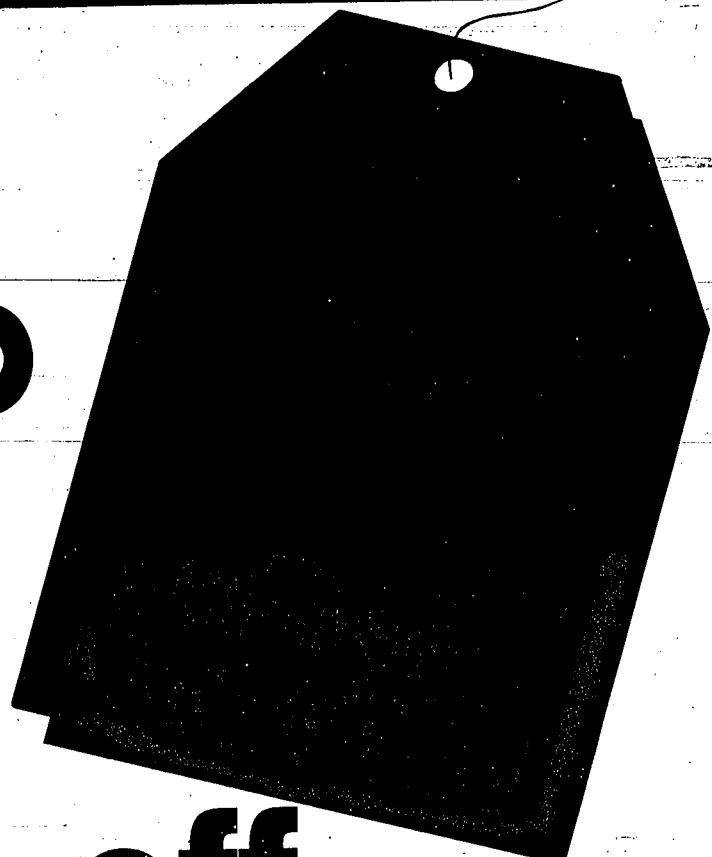

TWIN FALLS - This year the members of the College of Southern Idaho Department of Drama are doing a play they can really sink their teeth into.

"Dracula" will hit the stage just in time for Halloween. "We are trying to make the show as spooky as possible, but it's actually going to be more fun than scary," said the play's director Tony Mannen, whose bag of tricks include howling dogs, eerie music, gunshots and mood lighting.

"We could have made this play very stylized, but we decided to make it as realistic as possible within the genre," Mannen said. Still, he did choose to use Romanian accents and to play up some of the laughs.

Take these lines, for example, where Dr. Seward introduces the vampire Dracula to the rest of the group.

Seward: Count, can I get you a drink?

Dracula: No thank you; I don't drink (dramatic pause) wine.

The story of Count Dracula is loosely based on the life of Vlad the Impaler, a reportedly ruthless man who lived in the 12th century and who was immortalized through folklore. Vlad actually resided in what is now Romania, and the stories that surround him suggest that he had a penchant for drinking blood.

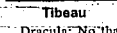
A novel was eventually written about him and the original play about him opened in New York in 1927 with Bela Lugosi in the title role. "Bela Lugosi became so attached to his role that he was buried in his Dracula outfit," Mannen said.

"Dracula" was revived in 1977 on Broadway and in a eloped along the way. Mannen is using the original version, by Hamilton Dean and John Balderston.

To enhance the mood of the play, a massive 18th century style set was created by CSI faculty member Laine Steel, who appeared in "Dracula" when it was presented at the college in 1978. The set is a large, single, reaching all the way to the ceiling of the room where the play is being performed. Costumes are on loan from the University of Utah.

Freesthan Lloyd Tibeau, a business management major, is the only student appearing in "Dracula" who is not enrolled in drama classes. He came to CSI from Tacoma, Wash., on a track scholarship and decided to audition for the play in order to meet people.

Tibeau plays Jonathan Harker, a handsome and pompous Englishman. "Jonathan is an outsider in the play, but no one in the cast has ever treated me like an outsider," he said. "This is a great group of people."

Mannen already knew that. He is proud of his student actors; he explained, and he expects to run out of tickets every performance. "We couldn't get the Fino Arts Auditorium because it was already booked, so we only have seating for 140 people," Mannen said. "I would encourage everyone to buy tickets early."

NEW YORK - The fight over Walden Woods, Henry David Thoreau's 19th-century sanctuary, measures up as a heavyweight match Don King could produce.

In one corner: millionaire builders, painted by opponents as uncaring developers out to strip the world of beauty.

In the other: Don Henley, the shaggy-haired California rock 'n' roller out to preserve it.

Walden Pond itself has long been converted into a state park, overrun by weekend visitors from Boston and its suburbs. But the woods are the land where Thoreau once roamed, the place that inspired "Walden" and spawned Thoreau's theories on conservation and non-violent civil disobedience.

Henley, the ex-Eagles singer-drummer whose Grammy-winning solo career includes the hit album "End of the Innocence," was here to promote three Madison Square Garden benefit concerts and a book of celebrity essays titled

Heavy metal musicians latest to pick up on golf craze

The group out on the Los Verdes golf range in Palos Verdes, Calif., isn't your typical golfing foursome. The men have long hair pulled back into ponytails; one is wearing a Ratt tour T-shirt, a tattoo that reads "BLOTZ" on his left arm and a pair of white golf shoes.

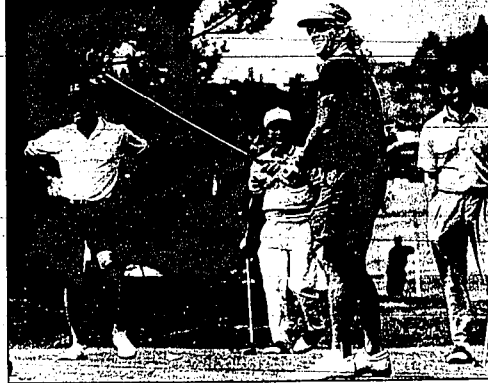
Their conversation isn't about IBM stock or the latest BCCI scandal. It's about what happened when the tour bus accidentally left some band members stranded at a truck stop and the mixes Axl is doing on his new album and was he really pulling those stunts on tour just for publicity?

This is golfing for the '90s, where the greens populated with rock musicians, young studio executives and other atypical types who have discovered a love for a game whose traditions are solidly steeped in the world of retired Republicans and lime-green patchwork pants.

The list of rockers who have taken up the game includes Alice Cooper (considered one of the best, if not the best, golfer in the rock world), Tommy Lee and Vince Neil of Motley Crue, members of the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Warnat, Glenn Frey, Huey Lewis (who named one of his albums "Fore!") Eddie Van Halen and Janet Gardner of Vixen. They play with each other, their road crews, and with their managers and record company execs at home and on the road.

Even on tour, after a band has stayed up till 4 a.m., they still somehow manage to make tee-off time. Tee-off time is sacred.

The current crop of players also includes Bobby Blotzer, the possessor of the "BLOTZ" tattoo and the drummer for the

band Ratt, who was out on the course one day recently with drummer Glenn Symmonds, who tours with singer Eddie Money's band; Gary Lee, bass guitarist of the band Neverland, and Lonn Friend, editor of RIP magazine, the heabanger's bible.

so savvy enough to "make exchanges," as Symmonds put it, swapping course time for backstage passes. "It's amazing what backstage passes will get you," he says. "The incongruity of golfing rockers may not seem so strange when they start to rhapsodize about how great it is to ditch the

other band members for a few hours and escape to a beautiful setting.

"It relieves a lot of stress," says Blotzer. "Maybe it adds to your stress when you're hitting bad shots, but three shots later you're hitting a couple of killer shots. It also has a little prestige to it. It's interesting to be out hacking with doctors and lawyers."

Not every player is as much out of the closet as Blotzer. Eddie Van Halen's manager declined to let his client be interviewed for this story, even though the musician was happily willing to talk about his game when approached a few days earlier.

"That's not the image I want to project right now," said Van Halen's manager.

Is golfing that much of a dirty little secret? Do managers and publicists really think fans will smash their favorite bands' CDs if they find the musicians play golf?

Janet Gardner doesn't think so. The lead singer of the all-female rock group Vixen says her fans are well aware of her longtime love affair with golf, and so far it hasn't hurt record sales.

"People always want to me and ask questions about it," she says. "We spend so much time in rehearsal studios with no windows, and I'd much rather go out and play golf than go to a gym. And you can do your own thing. It's sort of an art in a weird kind of way. You can swing however it feels right to you."

Gardner, who has been playing golf since she was 10 and living in Bozeman, Mont. (her whole family plays), admits there is "a weird stereotype about golf that it's something for the old folks' retirement home. But it's a pretty hip and really challenging thing to do."

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'Ol' peapicker' Tennessee Ernie Ford enchanted viewers with mellow charm

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Tennessee Ernie Ford, whose mellow charm and bottomless bass voice on songs like "Sixteen Tons" and "The Ballad of Davy Crockett" enchanted a generation of TV viewers, died Thursday. He was 72. Ford, whose mischievous, grin accented an ever-present mustache, died at HCA Reston Hospital in Reston, Va. He had been admitted there Sept. 28 because of advanced liver disease.

Ford recorded more than 80 albums during a singing career of more than 40 years. He sold more than 24 million gospel music albums, some of them still advertised on TV in the 1990s. He won a Grammy in 1964 for "Great Gospel Songs."

Ford was the friendly next-door-neighbor type with homespun humor, who was invited into the homes of millions of TV viewers embraced by his wholesomeness. "Bless your ill' peapickin' heart," he told viewers every week.

Ford, known affectionately as "the ol' peapicker" and "ol' Ern," was host of network TV shows in the 1950s and 1960s that made him a pioneer of the small screen. He was host of a nighttime variety show on NBC from 1956 to 1961, then had another program from 1962 to 1965, on ABC in the daytime.

His "Sixteen Tons," written by Merle Travis, was a sensation in 1955, becoming an anthem for coal

miners with its famous phrase: "You load 16 tons, and what do you get?"

"Another day older and deeper in debt," "Saint Peter don't you call me, 'cause I can't go," "I owe my soul to the company store."

"Every artist dreams of a song like this," Ford said in a 1990 interview with The Associated Press. "It's an everlasting hit. You get the gamut of the audience with it or with something like 'White Christmas' or 'Stardust.'"

Richard Trumka, president of the United Mine Workers in Washington, said the song "helped bring the coal miners' story to families worldwide."

"His music offered a glimpse into a way of life few Americans ever experience first-hand, and we owe him a tremendous debt of gratitude," Trumka said.

"The Ballad of Davy Crockett" rose to No. 5 on the pop charts in 1955.

When Ford's TV shows came on, families across the country gathered round the tube, watching as the easygoing performer with a deep drawl choked back laughs in comedy skits.

He usually changed the tone as the show drew to a close with a heartfelt hymn like "The Old Rugged Cross."

Don Everly of the Everly Brothers rock 'n' roll duo said Thursday he and his brother Phil are indebted to Ford for putting them on his show when their career was getting started.

"He was one of the first TV hosts to treat the Everly music as a worthy form of music," Don Everly recalled.

Actor George Lindsey of "The Andy Griffith Show" and "Hec Hatt," a close friend of Ford, recalled that Ford enjoyed mischief.

"We used to call each other and just say a joke and then hang up. He'd say, 'We lived so far out in the country nobody lived behind us.'"

"We went to church together once in Kansas City and slipped in the back. Finally the preacher said, 'I can't stand it any longer. Tennessee Ernie Ford and George Lindsey are here. Come on down and lead us in a song.'"

"I think he was everybody's friend."

Ford became ill at Washington Dulles International Airport as he was about to fly home to San Francisco following his attendance at a White House dinner.

Ford was born Ernest Jennings Ford in Bristol, Tenn. After playing trombone in his high school band, he began his career as a radio announcer for \$10 a week in Bristol in 1937. He also worked at stations in San Bernardino, Calif., Knoxville, Atlanta and Pasadena, Calif.

He studied voice at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, but was mostly a country music singer with a pleasant, relaxed style, that also embraced sacred songs.

During World War II, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps and flew heavy bombers and was a bombing instructor.

In 1984, President Reagan presented Ford with the Medal of Freedom.

In the last few years of his life, he did a few concerts a year, a little recording and some TV specials.

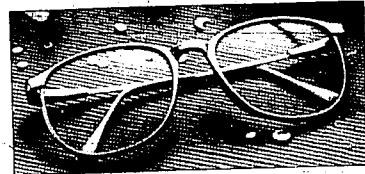
He was married for almost 50 years to Betty Heminger, who died in 1989. They had two sons and lived most of their adult life in California, first in Los Angeles and later near San Francisco.

Later in 1989, Ford married his second wife, Beverly. Funeral arrangements were incomplete, but at a hospital spokeswoman said she understands Ford will be buried in Palo Alto, Calif.

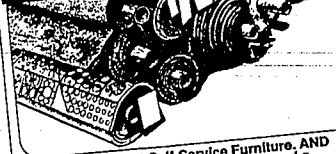

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Winans do it their way despite gospel label

NEW YORK (AP) — Soul music came out of the church. Arrangements and vocal styles were lifted from gospel standards. Change a few words and "You Send Me," "Stand By Me" and other hits would have been hymns to a very different kind of love.

In the last 20 years, however, gospel singers have turned the tables, and among the most successful are siblings BeBe and CeCe Winans, the Grammy-winning duo who emerged from a musical family a decade ago.

"Different Lifestyles," their fourth album, has the same funky, upbeat groove as R&B teams Ashford and Simpson and Womack & Womack. The harmonies are more Delfonics than Dixie Hummingbirds and song titles such as "Depend On You" and "Can't Take This Away" suggest any number of smooth, romantic ballads.

But BeBe (Benjamin) and CeCe (Priscilla) don't seek salvation in the secular world. Their sound may be more Saturday night than Sunday morning, but when they sing about loneliness and being "lost without you," it's not a runaway spouse they're looking for.

"The mainstream failed to realize that," CeCe said during a recent interview. "They think gospel should just be an organ."

"When they thought BeBe and myself came up with something new and different, that was strange to us. We just did music we love. We felt people could relate to it. It's a professional sounding production so right away people think it's a more secular sound."

"It has something to do with the individual," added BeBe. "I've had some people come to me and say, 'Boy, when you sing my mind don't go nowhere near the church.' Well, that's you and what you hear. You really can't control what individuals feel. They'll label you no

matter if you're a gospel singer or whatever."

Soul, rap and gospel performers all appear on the new record. Whitney Houston and Luther Vandross contribute backing vocals. M.C. The Winans plays a cameo on "The Blood," and Mavis Staples is featured on a remake of the Staple Singers' "I'll Take You There." Sisters Debbie and Angie Winans perform on "Addictive Love," which topped the R&B charts.

All but one of the seven brothers and three sisters have broken into the music business, many with the help of gospel star and family friend Andre Crouch.

Four brothers put together the Winans, another successful crossover act. Daniel Winans is a Grammy-winning solo performer

and CeCe, Debbie and Angie have formed the Sisters.

BeBe, 28, and CeCe, 26, first gained a wide following in 1987 when their self-titled second album won a Grammy for best gospel record and CeCe's vocals on "For Always" was cited for "Best Gospel Solo Performance, Female." The follow-up, "Heaven," won two more Grammys and also became the second gospel record ever to be certified gold, selling nearly a million copies.

They see nothing sinful about their earthly rewards and don't begrudge others. In the early 1980s, they sang for Jim and Tammy Faye Bakker's ill-fated PTL, the multi-million-dollar evangelical empire that collapsed in 1987 after revelations of fraud and sexual blackmail.

If for many the PTL is a symbol of greed, BeBe and CeCe, who left the organization in 1984, are more forgiving. They say they knew of

no wrongdoing and offer no apologies for the Bakker's lavish lifestyle.

"It was sad the way everything ended up," CeCe said. "It was a great place when we were working there."

"When you compare what they made to someone like Johnny Carson, it was night and day," said BeBe. "It was harder work that they did and they didn't get as much as they deserved, to be perfectly honest."

"No matter if you're religious or not, you don't allow the materialistic things to take your focus. You don't allow those things to rule you, but if I work hard and I want to go buy a Mercedes? I should be able to go buy a Mercedes and not be talked about because I am a religious person."

"If there's anything negative or bad the media zeros in on it," he added. "I saw the good things that happened, the blessings we were able to give out. So, mixed emotions, Jim and Tammy were two wonderful people who made two big mistakes."

BeBe and CeCe say they've kept their ambition in check, concentrating on a different kind of upward mobility. They are determined, but resigned to taking a slower road to success than pop stars have to travel, aware their audience is large by the Ward Singers' standards but modest in comparison to New Kids on the Block.

"We still have to struggle," CeCe said. "There are so many people we want to teach and we feel we have something to say."

"You have a lot of things against you. You're black and that's always been a problem. It's gotten better, but still you have to fight your way through sometimes. We know we have something good. We know we believe in good music, quality, success and until we've gotten that across we're going to struggle."

Challenging films top this week's list of new videos: a painfully accurate portrait of artist Vincent van Gogh, a powerful tale of one man standing against overwhelming odds and a quirky tale of suddenly poor yuppies.

VINCENT & THEO 4 stars. (1990) (Hemdale) \$92.95, 140 minutes. Tim Roth, Paul Rhys. Just as a van Gogh landscape almost physically pulls the viewer into the artist's vision, Robert Altman plunges us into the tortured spirit that produced the immortal paintings. Shunning the pat portrait of the artist and the conventions of screen biography, Altman reveals van Gogh through his symbiotic relationship with his brother, Theo, and his tumultuous dealings with the painter Paul Gauguin. PG-13 (adult themes).

THE FIELD 3 stars. (1990) (LIVE) \$89.95, 113 minutes. Richard Harris, Tom Berenger, John Hurt, Brenda Fricker. A commanding performance from Harris as an aging Irish farmer trying to save a plot of land from developers more than atones for the melodramatic climax and the overstated attempt to turn the contested field into a metaphor for Ireland's tragedy. PG-13 (violence, adult themes).

THE OBJECT OF BEAUTY 3 stars. (1991) (LIVE) \$89.95, 105 minutes. John Malkovich, Andie MacDowell, Peter Reiger, Lolita Davidovich. This wry romance of money stars Malkovich and MacDowell as a '90s version of Nick and Nora Charles. Michael Lindsay-Hogg's comedy about newly poor brats stranded in London boasts

the moral scope of a 19th-century novel. It contrasts a couple for whom 100 pounds is pin money with a Cockney chambermaid and her street-punk brother for whom 100 pounds is a fortune beyond all dreams of avarice. While not likable, able in that infectious way that egotists seduce you with the surplus of their own self-love. PG-13 (discreet nudity, violence, sex-ed lecture).

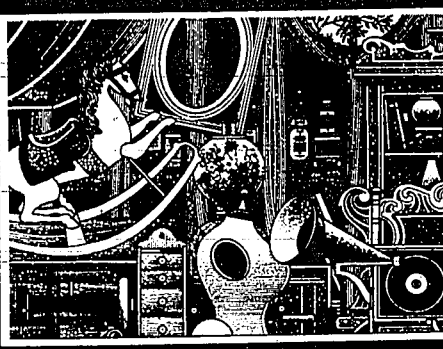

Drug-user, AIDS victim hopes cries of pain reach teens' ears before it's too late for them

Broad, sentimental 'Super' seems tailor-made for lead actor

HOLLYWOOD — Joe Pesci has the title role in the good-natured yet persistent comedy "The Super," and the fit is so perfect it must have been tailored especially for him. He's Louie Kritski, the dutiful son of a New York slumlord (Vincent Gardenia), who has given him his very own building — one of the handsome Beaux Arts structures in the East Village of New York City. Gardenia's Big Louie, who owns 27 such tenements, has a very simple business philosophy: "When a Kritski gets a building, what does he do with it? Nothing!"

Neither Big Louie nor his son is prepared for the implacability of Madolyn Smith Osborne's Naomi Bensingner, a housing authority attorney who actually succeeds in prosecuting Louie, who is sentenced to living 120 days in his own building, during which time he is expected to bring it up to code.

undergo a change of heart, and director Rod Daniel and debuting screenwriter Sam Simon know that we can't see on his to make Louie's transformation as plausible as possible beneath a non-stop flow of knockabout comedy and in-your-face banter, involving him gradually with his neighbors.

With his broad slapstick humor, "The Super" calls attention to the very real evil of slumlords, but the way in which it does so is admirably shrewd. For at its core, the film is the story of a middle-aged man who, inadvertently escaping his father's uncles' authority for the first time in his life, has a real opportunity to think for himself.

The film's lighthearted scene shows care and judgment on the part of the filmmakers. Up on the apartment roof, Louie, who has unconsciously

started to change, is trying to help a bright young boy, Tito (Kenny Blank), understand why his grandmother won't let him keep the bicycle his father has purchased from money made in drug peddling. Louie explains that the father is dealing in misery — only to have Tito point out that in that case their fathers are the same. For an essentially broad and sentimental comedy aiming at the widest crossover audience possible, "The Super" has been thoughtfully thought out.

Even at his most obnoxious and unfeeling, Pesci's Louie, comical as he most often is, commands a certain respect. If Big Louie has passed on to him his gift for street invecitive and an initially reflexive indifference to others he has also made him fearless. In a Pinetop-style Louie gives into a neighborhood basketball game with the confidence of a Wilt Chamberlain and pursues the impervious Bensingner with equal verve. Pesci is a genuine pleasure throughout, as is the rest of the cast, which includes Robert Blades as one of Louie's cantankerous tenants, "The Super" (rated R for language) may be a relentlessly unabashedly commercial entertainment, but it accomplishes quite effectively what it sets out to do.

'Necessary Roughness' slight but genial comedy

NECESSARY ROUGHNESS (PG-13) Scott Bakula has a winning role as a 34-year-old farmer persuaded to play college football in this slight but genial comedy. With Hector Elizondo, Robert Loggia.

SHOUT (PG-13) John Travolta is a music teacher who emphasizes the liberating power of music in this '50s musical. Also starring Jamie Walters, Richard Jordan, Heather Graham and Linda Fiorentino. Directed by Jeffrey Hornaday.

DOC HOLLYWOOD (PG-13) Michael J. Fox plays a hotshot plastic surgeon who travels west to the hip and tack heaven of Beverly Hills but gets waylaid in South Carolina, where he learns the value of the simple life. The knockabout corniness and condescension makes a TV show like "Green Acres" seem almost shavian by comparison.

ROBIN HOOD (PG-13) A case where more is less, this newest version of the venerable tale of outlaws in Sherwood Forest can't decide if it's a traditional action adventure, a New Age fable or a Monty Python farce. Making things even more muddled, star Kevin Costner

doesn't have the moxie to play an outlaw king. The action is fine, but at two hours and 23 minutes, everything else begged to be cut.

BOYZ N THE HOOD (R) A strong, striking debut by 23-year-old writer-director John Singleton, who clearly feels passionate about exposing and changing the grim gang-infested life of young men in South-Central Los Angeles. Though the plot of the intertwined fates of three friends seems a bit predictable at times, Singleton's gift is to make us care about his people, and to present a convincing panoply of life as it is lived there. Like a jazz ensemble, Boyz slowly involves us in an almost sensual mélange of moods, images and situations that take us inside the inner city where the mainstream films almost never do.

THE FISHER KING (R) Terry Gilliam's new phantasmagoria set in Manhattan is a buddy movie swathed in mythological hoo-ha. Robin Williams plays a deranged homeless person and Jeff Bridges is the fallen-from-grace shockjock who befriends him. As a modern-day Holy Grail scenario, it is too overloaded with grand-scale grunge, but it has its affecting moments and its visionary look. Mercedes Ruehl and Amanda Plummer co-star.

TERMINATOR 2: JUDGMENT DAY (R) Are two Terminators better than one? They are when James

Cameron, the most gifted action director of his generation, is in charge. Equally at home in small-scale skirmishes and complex, bravura effects, Cameron flamboyantly underlines (with a lot of help from Arnold Schwarzenegger) why the pure adrenaline rush of motion picture live for long without this. This is one hell of a wild ride, a Twilight of the Gods that takes no prisoners and leaves audiences desperate for mercy.

HOT SHOTS! (PG-13) Though it doesn't seem possible that there could be a pinhead's worth of difference between this off-the-wall comedy and "Naked Gun 2½½," in fact this is the funnier movie. For one thing, it is a specific parody (of "Top Gun") and even pratfall humor works better when there is a reason for the fall. For another, Charlie Sheen has an enviable deadpan sneeze and he and Valeria Golino are a much more engaging couple than the pair in Brand X.

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History gets the needle on 'Saturday Night Live'

NEW YORK (AP) - It's still being talked about, that Senate Judiciary Committee hearing aired by NBC. Some also recall February's classic press briefing by the also on NBC.

It should be noted, however, that each started a show called "Saturday Night Live." They were not the real thing, according to Western analysts. But sometimes, it's hard to tell, considering the real thing.

In case you missed either, SNL's gulf war briefing, written by Jim Downey, had a Marine lieutenant colonel facing a room full of civilian correspondents. Some seemed to be graduates of the University of Dufus. (There weren't any reporters...like...that covering the war, of course.)

The colonel began by saying he wouldn't discuss certain information that "might be useful to the enemy." Whereupon one bright-eyed scribe raised his hand: "What date are we going to start the ground attack?"

Next question, "Knowing what you know, where would you say our forces are most vulnerable to attack, and how could the Iraqis exploit those weaknesses?"

But the questions got better: "Are we planning an amphibious invasion and exactly where would that be?"

It was a very democratic briefing. Why, even the man from the Baghdad Times - he believed that "whore is good news - got to ask, 'Where are your troops - and can I go count them?'"

Last Saturday, the show's committee hearing concerned another major topic in the news: the Senate hearings on Anita Hill's allegations of sexual harassment by her former boss, Clarence Thomas. Kevin Nealon, as committee chairman Sen. Jim Biden, asked Thomas (Tim Meadows), if he had ever asked Hill out for a date.

Phil Hartman's Sen. Ted Kennedy was moved to ask in his full Massachusetts accent: "Were you, ah, drunk at the time?"

Said Hartman's Kennedy: "Another good thing is to get them out on your boat for some reason because, ah, because then it's really hahhh for them to get away."

Later, Al Franken's Sen. Paul Simon asked Thomas about a Justice Department secretary named Sandy: "Do you think she'd go out with me?"

Lorne Michaels, the show's executive producer, said Saturday's committee session was written by staffer Jack Handey before the real hearings began Friday and that "it was continually updated up until airtime."

He said the SNL troupe also did a dress rehearsal of a "Not Completely Fair Theater" sketch in which Thomas made overtures to Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor.

But that was dropped, not by a decree from censors but by Michaels. "We felt that it didn't play well enough because the thing had heated up almost to a white heat by Saturday night. We felt the first piece was more than enough. It looked like we were hitting a wall."

The gulf war briefing, which according to one report heurched Pentagon officials under fire for their sharp restrictions on reporters covering the war, drew only 24 calls of complaints by viewers to NBC's New York headquarters.

In contrast, Saturday's Senate committee sketch prompted 132 calls of gripe. Seven other callers approved. Any complaints from NBC's New York headquarters were filed with the "Saturday Night Live" has done several other pieces pegged to the senator's reported fondness for younger women and frog.

Classic cartoons earning some respect

SARATOGA - SPRINGS, N.Y. (AP) - Mickey Mouse and Pluto are mounted and framed with price tags of \$13,500. Elmer Fudd sings "Kill Da Wabbit!" on Broadway to the strains of Wagner - it's only a matter of time before academics proclaim Bugs Bunny an existentialist. Call it Cartoon Culture.

Animated films regarded as sort of entertainment when produced decades ago are extolled more and more for their aesthetic quality. Somehow, Goofy and Porky Pig have become highfalutin' cultural icons.

"That's ridiculous, but it's a pleasant kind of ridiculous," said Chuck Jones, who as a young cartoonist helped create Porky, Bugs, Road Runner and other Merrie Melodies characters. "If someone wants to call my work art, that's OK with me, but I never thought it was merited."

Jones, 79, has lived to see his creations go from being shown before movie features, to Saturday morning television and now onto gallery walls and even the Great White Way.

The Looney Tune gang, accompanied by a full orchestra, has been mining in-front of audiences across the nation in cities like Saratoga Springs. The show, called "Bugs Bunny on Broadway," is a Warner Bros. homage to the sometimes stately, usually loopy, music accompanying the old Merrie Melodies shorts.

Featured are classic music-oriented cartoons like Bugs and Elmer getting married in "The Rabbit of Seville," a clever subversion of Gioacchino's opera "The Barber of Seville." Other classical composers given cartoon accompaniment in the show include Liszt, Wagner and Strauss.

No, the idea is not to trivialize the original classical compositions. Rather, it's to pay overdue homage to composers like Carl Stalling, who scored the cartoons, according to the project's progenitor, George Daugherty.

"Given the material he was working with, no one was as brilliant as

Carl Stalling," said Daugherty, who also conducts the road orchestra.

The music is much more than just orchestral whizzes and bangs, he said. "Carl did not put in a little snippet of classical music just to do it." Daugherty said. "He did it to ultimately to accentuate what was happening on the screen to the maximum effect."

Daugherty said audiences have been eating it up across the country and the show will soon tour overseas.

Jones is heartened by the late attention given to his departed colleagues. But are these cartoons really art?

He's more apt to think of them as the work of professionals, working under rigid constraints.

"Like any professionals we had disciplines to work under," he said. "One of the disciplines of ours -

that we had to make (the cartoons) six minutes long."

It's what's packed into those six minutes that make the cartoons so special, said Jack Nachbar, professor of popular culture at Bowling Green State University in Ohio.

"Thoughtful books on animation have been published in the past decade - 'The Great Cartoon Directors,' 'Of Mice and Magic' and 'The History of Animation.'"

Nachbar said film professors will often dissect Depression-era cartoons like "The Three Little Pigs" the way they would an old Charlie Chaplin film.

"People can relate to these stories that were told in the '30s and '40s because they are still fresh in the '90s," offered Peter Schneider, Walt Disney Co.'s vice president for animation features.

Jones reckons his works have become timeless because people relate to the characters. People will always respond to the fact that Bugs, Daffy and the Grinch all have very human attributes and foibles, he said.

"In terms of my characters, every one of them represents something I am or would like to be," Jones said. "Bugs dwells within me, Daffy dwells within me, the Grinch dwells within me."

Nostalgia might have something to do with it, too.

Baby boomers weaned on daily doses of televised cartoons often have found more sublime reasons to appreciate the animated shorts they watched as children.

"If you think about people in their 40s and 50s who have clout in the art scene, this is what they grew up on," Nachbar said.

That would go a long way in explaining success stories like the Gallery Lantzberg. In 16 years, this Iowa-based business has evolved into the largest seller of cartoon art in the world, according to gallery President Ron Rich.

Connoisseurs of animated art can order a Wilma Flintstone production set for \$115. Bullwinkle for \$445 or Snow White for \$11,500.

Even cels from more recent Saturday morning productions - which are to the old Disney productions what Elvis on black velvet paintings are to Norman Rockwell - can fetch more than \$100.

All this fuss would come as no surprise to the late Walt Disney, who compared his studio's sight, and-sound masterworks, "Fantasia," to the refined art of ballet.

Back in 1941, Disney said he wanted to make a new version of the film every year. "We would keep adding to it and change the program just like ballet does," he said.

Decades later, the Disney studio intends to do just that. A new movie, "Fantasia Continued," will contain refurbished pieces from the original movie along with new experimental segments. It's due in 1996 or 1997.

"We're challenging the masters with new work," said Disney's Schneider. "One must have reverence but you can't be scared of it."

Braves blank Bucs in NLCS

PITTSBURGH — The Atlanta Braves finally shucked their loser's image, shutting out Pittsburgh in Game 7 of the NL playoffs and setting up the most unlikely World Series ever.

The Braves made winning look easy Thursday night as John Smoltz pitched Atlanta past the Pirates 4-0 for its first pennant.

Now, a season full of surprises ends with the biggest one yet. The Braves, baseball's poorest team last year, and the Minnesota Twins, the only other team this century to go from worst-to-first, meet in the World Series starting Saturday night in the Metrodome.

Brian Hunter's two-run homer capped a three-run first inning, and that was all Smoltz and the Braves needed. The Pirates' big hitters again went poor, and Pittsburgh was shut out for the second straight game.

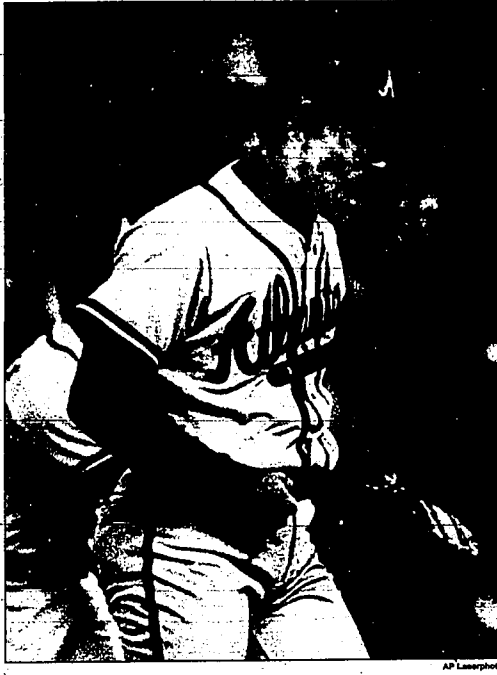
"This club came a long way from spring training," the Braves' Terry Pendleton said. "People said we were out of it at the All-Star break, but we kept battling. They said we couldn't catch the Dodgers and we kept battling. This is a team that won't give up."

A day after NL playoffs MVP Steve Avery and Alejandro Pena shut down Pittsburgh 1-0, Smoltz won his second game of the series with a six-hitter. In reversing their history, the Braves also stopped the Pirates' series of Game 7 successes — Pittsburgh had played five previous deciding seventh games, and won them all.

"I'm glad this is over," Smoltz said. "I was a little nervous at the start."
It really was over early. After the Braves knocked out 20-game winner John Smiley in the first inning, the Pirates had their best chance when Orlando Merced and Jay Bell led off the first with singles.

But the big three of Andy Van Slyke, Bobby Bonilla and Barry Bonds each made outs, failing for the umpteenth time. They were a combined 0-for-33 with runners on base until Bonilla singled in the eighth.

AP chooses Cox year's top manager

PITTSBURGH — Bobby Cox went into this season believing the Atlanta Braves could win a few more games.

They did, and because the Braves showed so much improvement, Cox won something else. On Thursday, he was named the Associated Press Manager of the Year.

"It's an honor, but I don't really know what I brought to the team," Cox said. "You can't do what we did without good players and good coaches, and we have the best."

The Braves had one of baseball's best records, going 94-68 and winning the NL West after finishing last season with the worst record in the majors at 65-97.

Atlanta and Minnesota became the first teams ever to rebound from last place to first.

Cox received 91 votes in nationwide balloting by newspapers. Minnesota's Tom Kelly, who has the Twins in the World Series, was second with 49.

Pittsburgh's Jim Leyland got 15 votes for performing a tough task, keeping the Pirates in first place with no dropoff, and St. Louis' Joe Torre was fourth with 13 after helping transform the Cardinals into contenders. Voting was completed before the playoffs began.

Cox and his team went into Thursday night's Game 7 of the NL playoffs against Pittsburgh-hoping-to put the Braves into the World Series for the first time since 1958.

Win or lose, it already was a great year for the Braves.

Cox was the first team in major-league history to go from the worst record in the major leagues to first place. They captured the imagination and interest of fans everywhere.

Cox, who managed Atlanta from 1978-81, is in his first full season back with the Braves. He returned to their dugout in June 1990 after Russ Nixon was fired, and also maintained his job as general manager.

Cox came back to the Braves from Toronto. In 1985, he was named Manager of the Year by the Baseball Writers' Association of America after guiding the Blue Jays to their first-ever AL East title.

No one considered the Braves contenders going into last winter.

Ripken named top player

BALTIMORE — Cal Ripken, who proved this season that he could play every day without a dropoff in performance, is the landslide winner as the Associated Press Player of the Year.

The Baltimore Orioles shortstop achieved career highs with a .323 batting average, 34 homers and 114 RBIs. He also won the Most Valuable Player award in the All-Star Game and became only the sixth American League player in the last 50 years to get at least 40 doubles and 30 homers in the same season.

Ripken, 31, received 80 votes from a panel of sportswriters and broadcasters. Cecil Fielder of the Detroit Tigers was second with 37 and

Pittsburgh's Barry Bonds finished a distant third with 14. Atlanta's Terry Pendleton had 12, two more than Frank Thomas of the Chicago White Sox. Pittsburgh's Bobby Bonilla got seven votes.

"Obviously, it's a big honor and I feel very good about it," Ripken said. "Most people measure our season, at least I do, on how the team has done. It was not the best year for the Orioles, but I got back to the consistency that I had before. That was the best thing about this season."

Mother's memory keeps Puckett going strong

MINNEAPOLIS — Catherine Margaret Puckett, a lively and lovely 13-month-old, will never know the deprivation that tried to claim her father during his youth.

"A lot of guys I grew up with are dead or in jail," Minnesota Twins center fielder Kirby Puckett said calmly here Thursday, not intending to shock.

Catherine Margaret will know luxury, the kind that buys the frills and bows she wears in the picture adorning her father's locker in the Twins' clubhouse.

She will also know the riches of boundless love, the kind bestowed on her father by his mother, also named Catherine, who gave birth to nine children, then helped them develop the strength to conquer the desperation of the South Side Chicago ghetto.

The elder Catherine Puckett died two years ago of heart disease, even as her son pursued the American League batting title. But she lives on in name and in Kirby's unique and generous spirit.

"There's not a day that goes by that I don't think of her," said Puckett, whose family lives in a three-room apartment in the Robert Taylor Homes, a housing project not

far from Comiskey Park. "Every day that passes, she's on my mind. But I know she's in a better place and she's looking over me."

"She was a great person. You talk about sports heroes, but anybody that can raise nine kids and keep them out of trouble, that's something. My dad was working two jobs and wasn't around much, so she taught us to be responsible."

It's a lesson Puckett lives daily. This squat, stocky, high-shoulder outfielder is nothing less than the soul of the Twins, a leader by example and his ever-present smile.

A career .320 hitter, Puckett was only 1 for 7 in the first two games of Minnesota's American League Championship Series against the Toronto Blue Jays. Questioned about his lack of production, he answered with an 8-for-14 spree that included a double, two homers and five RBIs, and won the series MVP award.

"It always feels good to do something positive and help. That's my job," Puckett said Thursday at the Metrodome, where the Twins worked out for Saturday's World Series opener.

"When you're used to carrying the club and you don't do it, it can get to you a little bit. But we've gotten to this point and we

Bears tiptoe by sleeping Pack; fans boo Majkowski

GREEN BAY, Wis. — The Chicago Bears managed only one touchdown Thursday night. It was plenty against the Green Bay Packers.

The Bears shut down and shut out Green Bay's sputtering offense in a 10-0 victory. It was Chicago's 11th victory in the last 13 games against its longtime rival.

Jim Harbaugh's 8-yard touchdown pass to James Thornton late in the second quarter and Kevin Butler's 22-yard field goal early in the fourth sent the Bears (5-2) to a victory after two straight losses.

The Packers, who had 138 yards total offense and made just five first downs, fell to 1-6 with their fourth straight loss and 11th in 12 games dating back to last season.

Don Majkowski, in one of the worst performances of his career, completed only three of 16 passes for 32 yards before he was replaced by former Bear Mike Tomczak in the fourth quarter.

The Packers' deepest drive all night only reached the Chicago 43.

Majkowski fumbled a snap out of the shotgun and Richard Dent recovered for the Bears at the Green Bay 14 with 30 seconds to go in the third quarter.

Chicago just missed a first down and settled for Butler's 22-yard field goal with 43:48 to play.

Trailing 10-0, the Packers apparently recovered a fumble on a punt return early in the fourth quarter. But a whistle while the ball was loose blew the play dead and

allowed Chicago to maintain possession. Harbaugh then scrambled for 15 yards and Neal Anderson broke loose on a 27-yard run to the Packers' 25. Butler then missed a 47-yard field goal with 7:45 to go.

The Bears, whose first two possessions ended on a fumble and interception, finally scored when Harbaugh hit Thornton for a

touchdown with 1:44 left in the first half. The scoring pass capped a nine-play, 66-yard drive, featuring a 16-yard pass to Anderson, a 14-yard run by Brad Muster and a 10-yard pass to Thornton. Harbaugh's touchdown pass was his first ever to a tight end.

Harbaugh completed 78 of 29 passes for 142 yards.

The Packers, meanwhile, continued to struggle. Green Bay still has not scored in the first quarter this season.

Majkowski was only 3-for-10 in the first half and the Packers left the field to boos at the end of the half and end of the game.

Broncos' Humphrey ends holdout

DENVER — Running back Bobby Humphrey reported to the Denver Broncos on Thursday, ending a sometimes-acrimonious 97-day holdout.

Humphrey, a 1,000-yard rusher the past two seasons, walked out on the first day of training camp in July, demanding renegotiation of his four-year contract, which had two years remaining and which was to have paid him \$315,000 this year.

The Broncos insisted that Humphrey report to the team before any contract adjustments would be considered, and a stalemate ensued.

Denver entertained numerous trade offers for Humphrey and appeared on the verge of unloading the three-year pro, but ultimately the team rejected such offers as inadequate. When the NFL trading deadline passed last week, Humphrey either had to report or sit out the rest of the season.

Giants allow pitcher to file for freedom

SAN FRANCISCO — The San Francisco Giants said Thursday they will not exercise their \$1.3-million contract option on pitcher Don Robinson and will pay him a \$300,000 buyout instead.

Robinson, 34, has been with the Giants since July 31, 1987, when he was acquired from Pittsburgh for Mackey Sasser and cash. He was 5-9, 4.38 in 34 games and pitched 16 starts in 1991.

Robinson appeared in 170 games for the Giants, including 92 starts, posting a 43-53 record. He has a 107-102 career record with a 3.75 ERA in 513 games. The Giants had until Nov. 10 to decide whether to exercise the option. The move allows Robinson to file for free agency after the World Series.

Padres hire black scouting director

SAN DIEGO — The San Diego Padres hired their first black executive on Thursday, naming Reggie Waller to the vacant scouting director's job.

Waller, 36, spent the past 14 months as an assistant to Woody Woodward, the Seattle Mariners vice president of baseball operations. Waller "has spent a great deal of time in the game as a player, scout, manager and executive," said Padres general manager Joe Mervino.

"We feel comfortable putting our future in his hands as the scouts talent on the amateur level. It is the most important aspect of baseball operations."

Waller, who grew up in San Diego, lives in the nearby city of El Cajon. He downplayed the fact he was the Padres' first minority executive.

Trevino seeks rebound in Transamerica

NAPA, Calif. — Lee Trevino has misplaced his killer instinct. Trevino, struggling through a season most Senior PGA Tour golfers would call a successful year, will be looking to regain his winning touch beginning Friday at the \$500,000 Transamerica Senior Golf Championship.

Trevino, who has won three Senior PGA Tour events and nearly \$600,000 this year on the Senior Tour, can't shake the fact that in six other tournaments he was in a position to win but came up short in the final round. "I've been getting out of the box this year and I haven't been able to finish," Trevino said. "I'm really looking forward to coming back to defend my title."

O'Meara takes 2-shot lead in Disney

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. — Mark O'Meara turned in his second straight 6-under 136 Thursday and took a 2-shot lead over rookie Jeff Maggert after two rounds of the \$1 million Walt Disney World Golf Classic.

O'Meara, who has not won a tour event this year, had seven birdies before taking his only bogey at the 18th hole on the 6,957-yard Palm course, one of three courses being used to play the tournament.

"Easiest I just wanted to putt better," O'Meara said. "I made a few putts today."

Maggert, last year's Ben Hogan Tour Player of the Year, shot his second straight 67 in his first PGA Tour Championship, and this week's \$180,000 winner's share.

Series means good, bad news for city

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Sure, the World Series will be a boon for hotel owners, restaurateurs and T-shirt merchants.

The fall baseball classic that opens here Saturday also is expected to mean a temporary respite from crime and divorce, but may prove tough on nightclub and theater owners.

"It's going to kill us," said Steve Antenucci, executive director of Theater in the Round Players, a small theater near the Metrodome, where the American League champion Minnesota Twins play.

When the Twins were last in the World Series in 1987, attendance for the Theater in the Round's presentation of Tennessee Williams' "Summer in Smoke" dropped by 30 percent, Antenucci said. Such losses, he said, have a long-term effect on



small theaters. "We go from struggling mildly to struggling badly," Antenucci said.

While interest in the Twins probably will hurt theaters and other entertainment establishments, it is expected to benefit some Minnesotans.

St. Paul police said the number of complaints received during the 1987 Series dipped significantly during that two-week period.

"People really were preoccupied with the games," said police spokesman Paul Adernum. "We didn't see the Series had a positive impact on the crime scene."

The Series also was bad news for divorce lawyers.

Calls to the Mid-Minnesota Legal Assistance office for family law services dropped dramatically during October 1987, said Jerry Lane, the organization's executive director.

Some office reported that their calls were down 30 percent, said Mary-Lahr Schier, a spokeswoman for the Minnesota State Bar.

"Who wants to bring up something unpleasant when the Twins are doing so well?" she said.

But the exhilaration over the Twins probably didn't heal any deep marital rifts over the long term.

"That euphoria just brought peo-

ple a little holiday from domestic stress," Lane said. "After a white things go back to the bad old days."

Theater owners, meanwhile, are hoping for a four-game sweep so they won't lose a second weekend to Twins fever.

The "Ordway Music Theatre already is suffering from the Twins' success. The theater was only 80 percent full for a jazz concert that usually sells out but was scheduled for the same day as the American League playoff opener, said Mike Brand, the Ordway's vice president of programming and marketing.

Making matters worse, Brand said, 60 percent of its ticket buyers also are Twins season-ticket holders. The Ordway tried to keep everyone happy in 1987, posting the score of the game and providing radios at the bar.

Fans dig into cookie jar for playoff tickets

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The increased price of playoff and World Series tickets is turning the all-American pastime into amusement for the well-heeled and sending many families scrambling to the cookie jar.

Steady worker Van Copenhaver used bond money from the mill to take his son to one of the National League playoff games in Pittsburgh, but his wife and two other children stayed home.

"It was just too much for the five of us to come," said Copenhaver of New Bethlehem, Pa.

Mary Klein of Pittsburgh spent the money set aside for a trip to visit her grandchildren in California on

playoff and World Series tickets for herself and her daughter.

"I'm sitting on my airline tickets," she said at one of the games at Three Rivers Stadium.

Reserved seats for the playoffs cost \$30 and box seats \$40 — an increase of \$5 and \$10, respectively, from last year.

Reserved seats for the World Series are \$60 and \$45 this year compared with \$50 and \$40 last year.

The baseball commissioner's office said the price hike is a matter of supply and demand coupled with the increased cost of operating a baseball franchise.

"Everything is expensive," said David Dzedzic, director of special

events for Major League Baseball. "We don't indiscriminately raise prices. We work to keep them down. But we also need to keep up with what we need in baseball."

"This is the culmination of our season. It's the four best teams of baseball playing. There's a high demand for tickets, and we're setting the prices accordingly."

Don Steele dug deep into his pockets this year to take his wife and three children to one of the playoff games. "It's hard on us, and they made us scrape for it," said Steele, a machine inspector from Trafford, Pa.

"We'd like to go to the World Series, but we can't afford it."

Steele remembered going to the

playoffs in 1974 when he paid \$5 for a reserved seat. That's when he earned \$15 an hour. Now he makes \$7, and there have been a lot of "hotdog and spaghetti dinners" to save enough for five tickets, parking, gas, snacks — bought outside the stadium — and souvenirs.

"We saved for this. It's one of those family things," he said.

"You don't go to Pizza Hut for it while. But this is history. It's worth it. I just hope my children will later appreciate it."

Florida heavyweights should breeze at home

Gollath doesn't take chances. Florida's three college football powerhouses — No. 1 Florida State, No. 2 Miami and No. 6 Auburn — against less formidable foes this weekend in games so lopsided that the oddsmakers won't even quote a line on them.

And in each case, the heavyweights will have the added advantage of playing at home.

Florida State (6-0) faces Middle Tennessee State (4-1) at Tallahassee, Miami (5-0) welcomes Long Beach State (1-5) into the Orange Bowl, and Northern Illinois (1-5) journeys to Gainesville to play Florida (5-1).

At least the visitors are coming in with their eyes wide open. Middle Tennessee State coach Boots Donnelly considered his team's task against Florida State and reached a simple conclusion:

"It is a 100 percent total mismatch," he said. "It's no doubt about that. What we hope to do in that game is get a first-down. Just one. That's our goal."

Florida State coach Bobby Bowen recognizes the pairing for what it is — a schlemmy breaker against a Division I-A team. "We've got to be realistic about it," he said. "I think you've got to have somebody on there that you're superior to. It's there that you're all faced with. It's not attractive."

Unless, of course, you're the t-

surer at Middle Tennessee State. The school, plugged in as a replacement on Florida State's schedule for Auburn, earns \$175,000 for the game.

And before you start beating on Bowen for scheduling a lightweight, consider that Auburn replaced Florida State on its schedule with Georgia Southern.

At least Middle Tennessee State comes into the Florida State game with a winning record.

The same can't be said, however, for Long Beach State and Northern Illinois. Each has one win for the season and the prospects for getting No. 2 this week are less than scintillating.

Long Beach State goes against Mi-

ami in the Orange Bowl, where the Hurricanes have won 41 in a row. Last week, Long Beach challenged Fresno State's 25-game home winning streak and lost 42-14.

Northern Illinois, which goes against Florida in Gainesville, has lost four in a row, the most recent 22-10 decision to Western Michigan. And that was playing at home.

Now you know why there is no line on the three Florida games.

In other games involving ranked teams, No. 3 Washington is at No. 7 California; No. 4 Michigan plays Indiana; No. 5 Notre Dame visits Air Force; No. 8 Tennessee is at No. 14 Alabama; and No. 9 Nebraska hosts Kansas State; and No. 10 Penn State plays Rutgers.

Air-oriented Wildcats face tough pass defense

When unexpected success and the top passing attack in NCAA Division I-A football meets home field advantage and one of the best pass defenses in the Big Sky Conference, something's got to give.

Weber State takes its unbeaten Big Sky record and new No. 17 ranking into the unfriendly confines of Montana's Washington Grizzly Stadium on Saturday for the second game in a three-game trial by fire.

Saturday's other Big Sky games include top-ranked Nevada (3-0 Big Sky, 6-0 overall) at Eastern Washington (1-2, 2-4), Northern Arizona (1-2,

3-3) at No. 13 Boise State (1-1, 4-1), and Idaho (1-2, 3-3) at Idaho State (1-2, 2-3). Montana State (0-4, 1-6) has the week off.

After beating their 19th-ranked Idaho 45-17 last week at home, Weber State (4-0, 5-1) faces Montana (2-1, 3-3) this week in Missoula and travels next week off before traveling to Nevada to take on the No. 1 Wolf Pack.

Weber State was picked in the preseason polls to finish seventh in the nine-team Big Sky. But with their only loss coming in the season opener at F-A Air Force, the Wildcats now look more like world beaters.

They lead the Big Sky in every major offensive category except scoring, where Nevada has an advantage. And with quarterback Jamie Martin's passing, tight end Alfred Pupun's receiving and running back Geoff Mitchell's rushing, Weber seems to have all the bases covered.

But Montana's defense ranks third in the league overall and second only to Nevada against the pass.

Meanwhile, Nevada plays only its second road game of the season at Eastern Washington. The Wolf Pack beat Idaho in its first game away from Reno this season.

For Boise State, Saturday is both homecoming and a chance for redemption after losing in its first road

game of the season at Montana. They will be hosting a Northern Arizona team with a new, untested quarterback but with a strong rushing attack.

Second-year coach Steve Axman suspended junior quarterback John Bonds indefinitely on Monday for breaking team rules by staying out late drinking. The starter against Boise State will be junior Ed Bricker, who has thrown only eight passes in his career but reportedly is more mobile than Bonds.

In Pasco, Idaho State hopes to keep the blood flowing from the gaping wounds that have been inflicted on Idaho's title hopes. The Vandals have fallen out of the I-AA poll.

Women 'vipers' to frightening loner

The Associated Press

BELTON, Texas — He referred to women as "treacherous female vipers," and some neighbors complained of bizzaro and frightening behavior.

But the question of who was George Hennard remained as much a mystery Thursday as it was methodically gunned down 22 strangers.

Hennard, 35, a former merchant seaman and the unemployed son of wealthy, divorced parents, led behind an angry letter venting hatred toward women. But authorities said they had few clues about what triggered the worst mass shooting in U.S. history.

"It's like a jigsaw puzzle," said Killean Police Chief F.L. Giacomozzi. "We may never know the answers."

Neighbors described Hennard as a handsome loner who obsessively mowed his yard and washed his blue pickup truck. On Wednesday, he drove the truck through the front window of a Luby's Cafeteria in nearby Killean at lunchtime, then opened fire on the crowd with a pair of semiautomatic pistols.

Police said they are investigating his feelings toward women, largely because of a letter a neighbor turned over to authorities June 19. The letter said in part:

"Did you and your sister find new flames yet? Do you think the three of us could get together someday? Please give me the satisfaction of someday laughing in the face of all those treacherous female vipers from two towns who tried to destroy me and my family."

After Hennard smashed his pickup through the plate-glass window at the cafeteria, witnesses said, he screamed something about Belton and "This is what Bell County has done to me!"

A diner who escaped unhurt, Susan Robinson-Hester, said Hennard screamed "Look at what Belton's done to me!" Later, the shooting continuing, Hennard said: "Tell me, was it worth it? Tell those f—ing women in Belton see this!"

wonder if they'll think it was worth it!" His letter to the neighbors contained an eerily similar passage.

Fourteen of the 22 killed in the cafeteria were women.

Police searched the two-story colonial mansion Hennard lived in, but "nothing

speeding ticket in May, police were called to his house on a disorderly conduct complaint from a neighbor who said Hennard had yelled obscenities at her, but no charges were filed.

Police in Belton said Hennard called them Sept. 22 to report harassing tele-

hibited and you'll be hugged if you do so."

Hennard was usually aloof and unfriendly, according to people in the middle-class neighborhood of modest homes where the Killean mansion and its hot tub tree-filled yard, complete-with hot-tub and swimming pool, stuck out.

"We just lived in fear of the man," said Jane Bugg, a 46-year-old medical secretary who gave police the letter addressed to her two daughters, Mrs. Bugg is a cousin of Gov. Ann Richards.

James Dunlap, 32, told WFAA-TV that he and his wife were roommates in 1982 in Temple, about 15 miles northeast of Belton. He remembered an angry, hostile person.

"He had a very explosive temper, a very violent temper. He'd throw things when he'd get mad, put his fist through a wall, hit things, knock things over," Dunlap said.

"He'd yell and scream at people a lot. He did that quite a bit. He made several references about wanting to kill people. He was a very prejudiced person," Dunlap said.

Mary Mead, who runs a convenience store near the home, said Hennard was of 5 a.m. opening. On Wednesday morning, he charged a few dollars worth of merchandise and said he'd be back in the afternoon.

She, too, had received a cryptic warning. "He said if they didn't stop messing around his house, something bad was going to happen," Ms. Mead said.

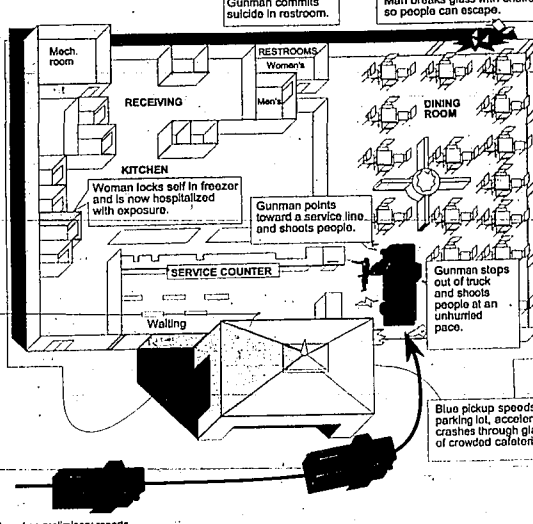
Hennard's mother, Jeanna Hennard, told the Dallas Morning News that she had spoken to her son on Tuesday, his birthday, and that he sounded fine.

Efforts to reach Hennard's father, George Hennard, an orthopedic surgeon in Houston, have been unavailing. He was believed to be in Killean on Thursday.

"This is so frightening, so devastating," the killer's mother said from her home in Henderson, Nev.

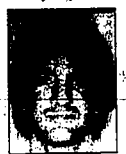

Here are excerpts from a letter by Texas mass-shooter George Hennard to "Stacey" and "Robin," the names he mistakenly attributed to Jill Fritz, 23, and Anna Jemigan, 19, two sisters who lived near his Belton home.

Dear Stacey and Robin?
Surprise surprise. Can you guess who this is writing to you?
Well just take a look at the enclosed pictures to help you figure it out. They are for you and your sister? Robin? I never did learn her name for sure. Believe it or not, to this day, 6/6/91, not one single person ever come forward and volunteered one bit of information that would help me lead to your capture.

Maybe your mother saw me at the wolf in sheep's clothing. Was she afraid I would act irresponsibly with her two precious girls and then run and hide?
Your mother made a miscalculation in her evaluation of me. There was no place to run and hide, then or now. I worked and sailed on ships for 17 years. When there was a problem, conflict, or a crisis, no place to hide or sit on the ship. We all just tried to correct it or fix it and it did.

Do you think the three of us can get together some day? Please give me the satisfaction of someday laughing in the face of all those treacherous female vipers from two towns who tried to destroy me and my family.
It is very ironic about Belton, Texas.
I found the best and worst in women there. You and sister are the one side. Then the abundance of evil women that make up the worst on the other side.
I would like to personally remind all those vipers that I have civil rights too. Just because I did not hire an attorney they have carte blanche to do what they want in violation of these rights.
I will not matter what prevail over the female vipers in those two rinky-dink towns in Texas. I will prevail in the bitter end. In conclusion, I ask you do not disclose the contents of this letter to anyone other than immediate family members. It is no one else's business but ours anyway.
I've seen sisters.
Love you both, George. Your fan. How about sending me your nice pictures. Ha ha.

When 'Dynasty'-land returns to TV expect realities of '90s to weigh in

In the spring of 1989, the '80s ended. When television screens across the country darkened on the last episode of "Dynasty," America's champagne wishes and caviar dreams went flat and sour in an instant. Or did they?

On Sunday and Tuesday, Oct. 20 and 22, ABC airs "Dynasty: The Reunion." For eight years, Dynasty was one of a half-dozen nighttime soaps (including "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest") that crowded into the American consciousness. Filled with cars, clothes, demonic women and dynamic men, those weekly dramas took turns outdoing each other in outrageous behavior and extravagant decor.

"Knots Landing" and "L.A. Law" had humor, quality writing and an earnest following. But "Dynasty" was another world — a world in which a character could be crazy one day and sane the next, where another character could be gay one day and straight another. In this world, siblings and children materialize out of nowhere when necessary and vanish when not. In "Dynasty"-land, any character can have a double, so of course actors are interchangeable. Actors who played characters we grew to love left for greener pastures and were replaced by similar actors with flimsy explanation.

But "Dynasty" viewers rarely needed explanation. The camp factor was a given; grand gestures and snippy dialogue were expected. Viewers could jump in anywhere, at any time, and quickly join in the trashy fun.

Our fascination with and envy of the super-rich could be stoked weekly. Fans could pretend that they had ascended that video Olympus, where they shared the foibles and drop-dead glamour of the inhabitants of a defied Denver.

Can that magic live again in a 1991

miniseries? Get the glasses. Pop the cork. As you take brief, appreciative sips of the finest champagne in the house, you see them as you last saw them — in total chaos. Blake Carrington (John Forsythe) had been shot by a policeman, who was in turn shot by someone else. (Blake has been framed for the murder.) His wife, Krystle (Linda Evans), is in Europe, in a coma from a rare, terminal brain illness. Meanwhile, back in Denver, Blake's ex-wife Alexis Morell Carrington Colby Dexter Rowan (Joan Collins) is verbally carving up her cousin, Sable (Stephanie Beacham). The fighting reaches a critical mass, and everyone falls from a hotel-lobby balcony. Freeze frame. Take another sip.

The miniseries will resume three years after these momentous events.

Alexis has survived her fall. Blake, having served time for murder and lost his company, returns home. We can expect the never-tiring Alexis to continue her endless quest to destroy any shred of happiness. Blake Carrington can muster — all the while managing to change her clothes a lot.

The realities of the '90s weigh in, however, as we see Blake, penniless, without a company to run. But can this recessionary era accommodate "Dynasty"? Executive producer Aaron Spelling says that if the miniseries does well, "Dynasty" might well be back as a series of movies or miniseries. So we are to pass judgment on our TV friends ... deciding their fate, if you will. Pass the champagne, please. Oh heck, it's the '90s — forget the glasses.

Comedian's death multiplies programming woes at CBS

NEW YORK (AP) — The death of comedian Redd Foxx, star of CBS' "Royal Family," puts the future of that Wednesday night sitcom in doubt.

And the departure of "Princesses" co-star Julie Hagerty has shut down production of that low-rated CBS Friday night comedy for 3½ weeks while producers seek another character to replace her.

Foxx, who died Friday, was making his prime time comeback as Alex Royal, a retired Atlanta letter carrier whose grown daughter and grandchildren move back to the family home.

On Monday, CBS spokesman Michael Silver said "Royal Family" would not air on Wednesday. Instead, CBS will air two episodes of "Teach," which follows it on the schedule. On Oct. 23, CBS will broadcast a World Series pregame show.

"Royal Family" will return Oct. 30, Silver said.

There are three unaired shows

remaining of the seven already produced, but whether the show would be reorganized around co-star Della Reese remained unanswered.

At Universal Television, "Princesses" co-creator and co-executive producer Mark Ganzel said the show, envisioned as a vehicle for Miss Hagerty, had changed as the characters developed. Miss Hagerty's character, Tracy, was the mild, ingenious, somewhat breathless romantic she is famous for creating.

"I think Julie was very frustrated. She could only do occasionally what she was great at," Ganzel said. "We started to realize that we needed a new character."

The creators envision a character who is more down-to-earth than Tracy.

'LA Law' premiere, 'Cheers' boosts NBC into network ratings' top spot

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC dominated the weekly A.C. Nielsen Co. television ratings released Tuesday with "Cheers" and the season premiere of "L.A. Law" leading the network's best-performer list.

ABC had four prime-time shows in the top 10, led by "Roseanne" in first place. CBS also had four, driven by its Monday night powerhouse lineup "Murphy Brown" in second place, "Designing Women" in fifth place and "Major Dad" seventh.

NBC had a 13.4 prime-time average last week, followed by ABC's 12.5, CBS' 12.3 and Fox Broadcasting Co.'s 7.6. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

Thursday's Atlanta Braves-Pittsburgh Pirates contest was the highest-placing baseball playoff game for CBS. It has a 14.5 rating to tie for 25th place with ABC's "America's Funniest People."

The National League's Atlanta-Pittsburgh matchup Wednesday had a 14.0 rating to place 28th, and Sunday's Atlanta-Pittsburgh game was 37th with a 12.7 rating.

The American League's Toronto Blue Jays-Minnesota Twins matchups showed up in 44th, 52nd and 64th place.

"Cheers" finished third for CBS

Hearing tops toons in ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — Cartoons for kids were easily beaten by Supreme Court history for all on CBS, NBC and ABC on Saturday morning, according to overnight A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings made public Monday.

The 25-city tally showed that ratings of the morning's Senate hearings on the confirmation of Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas were up 42 percent from those for the networks' usual cartoon fare the previous week.

The larger audience for the hearings was primarily adult, said Alan Wurtzel, ABC's senior vice president for research.

The networks, which pre-empted their Saturday cartoon shows to air Thomas' testimony live, averaged a combined rating of 16, compared with an 11.3 the preceding week.

The overnight ratings represent 47 percent of the nation.

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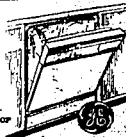
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
