# Bush, Congress tangle over perks

WASHINGTON — President Bush on Thursday blasted Congress as a "privileged class of rulers," above the laws it passes for others, and pressed lawmakers to revoke their special exemptions.

Seizing on the anti-Congress mood that followed the recent Clarence Thomas confirmation hearings in the Senate, Bush declared that lawmakers' practice of freeing themselves from compliance with many laws "shatters public confidence in government."

"I would wager that the American people do not know that Congress has exempted itself from the sexual harassment laws private employers and the executive branch must obey," the president said in a broad speech attacking congressional practices.

But Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said Bush apparently had forgotten that a bill he signed last year applied the civil rights laws to Congress —

## Senate orders Thomas leak probe

WASHINGTON — The Senate, embarrassed and angered by unauthorized disclosure of sexual-harassment charges against Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas, voted Thursday to appoint a special outside counsel to investigate the leaks and report back to the Senate by early next year.

The Democratic-drafted proposal, which also calls for a probe by the special counsel of leaks about Democratic senators involved in the uncompleted "Keating Five" ethics investigation, was approved by a bipartisan vote of 86 to 12.

A Republican alternative to put the FBI in charge of the investigation, limit it to 30 days and confine the focus to the

political issue to distract people from the sad state of the economy.

But Bush said he was so disgusted with the graphic televised hearings on sexual harassment allegations against Thomas that he is restricting future congressional access to FBI reports on presidential nominees.

"The bruising hearings showed what happens when political factions let agendas overwhelm personal decency," the president told an audience of three good-government groups — the American Society for Public Administration, the National Academy of Public Administration and the Council for Excellence in Government.

Bush also said Congress should set a six-week time limit on confirming his nominees to government posts.

His comments brought a heated response from Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., a Judiciary Committee member who said it was the White House that created a dismal public showing in the Thomas hearings.

"Those who seek to reform others should first seek to reform themselves," Mitchell said. "I respectfully suggest in this case the president begin with applying the laws to his staff as the Senate has already done."

White House spokeswoman Judy Smith

acknowledged that last year's Americans With Disabilities Act had applied several related laws to Congress, but she said it did not give congressional complainants the same legal remedy — the right to sue — that is available to private sector workers.

# Dickering may yield civil rights bill

WASHINGTON — Republican senators bargained with the White House Thursday in an effort to forge a consensus civil rights bill, then presented a proposed revision to Democrats that could avert a veto by President Bush.

Democratic senators, who spent much of the day waiting while the Republicans talked, scheduled a caucus this morning to examine the latest GOP proposal.

"A deal is within our grasp," Senate Republican Leader Robert Dole said shortly before the Senate adjourned.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, after being briefed on the details of the proposal, called the meeting of Democratic senators. Deal or no deal, he said, the Senate will begin formal consideration of the bill Friday.

"The private negotiations have about been completed," Mitchell said. "The question is whether they will be carried forward to agreement, or whether we'll simply reach a point where no agreement is possible and we proceed to resolve the matter here on the Senate floor."

Talks toward a deal that would avert a threatened veto by Bush heightened in

intensity as Dole brought together White House counsel C. Boyden Gray and key GOP senators, including Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., the chief civil rights sponsor.

A Republican source said the GOP agreement centered on a key provision that has been in dispute for months involving unintentional discrimination cases.

"I think the differences are very narrow and it is my hope that in the near future we will have something that will be acceptable both to the White House and a majority of the Democrats," Danforth said after about six hours of negotiating.

# Michigan suicides point to debate on euthanasia

A how-to book on suicide becomes a best seller. Doctors come forward to help patients end their lives.

Voters in Washington state are asked to legalize euthanasia of the terminally ill.

While critics decry the sensationalism of a Michigan doctor and his suicide machines, they say his actions highlight a growing debate over a patient's — and doctor's — right to choose suicide over a slow, painful wait for death.

"It is a serious public policy matter that is not being led by politicians or health care professionals — it is coming up from the public," said Arthur Caplan, director of the Biomedical Ethics Center at the University of Minnesota.

"People are concerned about dying vulnerable and incompetent amid a bunch of medical machinery."

The issue was raised again Wednesday when retired pathologist Dr. Jack Kevorkian helped two ill middle-age women kill themselves at a campground near Pontiac, Mich.

Kevorkian, 63, gained the national spotlight last year by helping an Alzheimer's patient die by hooking her to a machine that delivers a lethal drug when the patient pushes a button.

A judge dismissed murder charges, ruling that Michigan had no law against physician-assisted suicide. But Kevorkian, who recently published a book arguing in favor of such suicides, could face contempt charges for violating the judge's order.

# Nearly 33% of women of child-bearing age smoke

ATLANTA — Nearly one in three women of reproductive age smokes, running a risk of miscarriage, sudden infant death or premature birth if she decides to have children, U.S. health officials reported Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control said a 39-state survey found a median of 30 percent of women ages 18 to 44 were smokers — from 21 percent in Texas to 37 percent in Wisconsin.

In Idaho, the CDC said, 22.7 percent of the women of childbearing age were smokers.

And while 44 percent of the smokers said they had tried to quit in the previous year, they were still heavy smokers: 59 percent smoked more than 15 cigarettes a day.

"That's comparable to the number of women in the general population who are heavy smokers, but that is a problem for this group; they're at higher risk than other groups for smoking-related disease ... and problems to the fetus," said Dr. Luis Escobedo, a CDC epidemiologist.

According to the CDC, smoking during pregnancy increases the risk of low birthweight, miscarriage and sudden infant death syndrome. And if women smoke while using oral contraceptives, they run a greater risk of heart attack, which is rare in younger women.

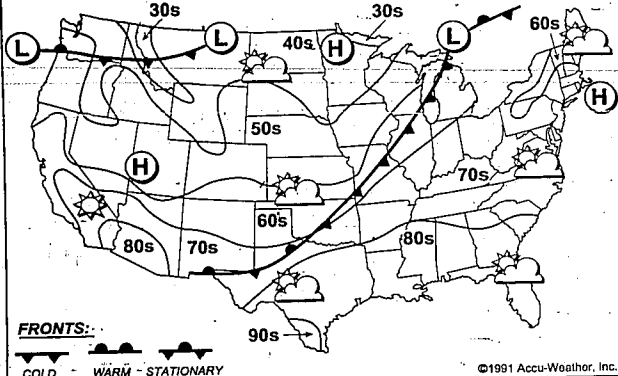
The survey, conducted in 1989, was not nationwide, but the percentages are adjusted for such factors as age and race to allow for state-by-state comparisons, the CDC said.

### Weather summary

The National Weather Service says a broad trough of low pressure will continue over Idaho. The associated air mass is moist, unstable and extremely cool.

This low pressure was expected to remain fairly stationary, though the trough should deepen, extending the cool temperatures and increasing the chance of precipitation for the next several days, forecasters said.

Precipitation Thursday fell mainly over the north central part of the state and dropped about an inch of snow over the higher elevations.

Temperatures Thursday afternoon pushed into the 40s and low 50s. Sun Valley remained chilly with 37 degrees.

Winds were generally from the east to south at 5 to 15 mph.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 56 degrees at Caldwell. Ketchum reported the coldest at 12 degrees.

### Rough weather spread across wide sections of U.S.

Thunderstorms brought high wind and golf-ball-size hail Thursday in Oklahoma, snowflakes were scattered over parts of North Dakota and Colorado, while heavy rain threatened to cause flooding in Wisconsin.

Dense fog blanketed much of the East Coast from Virginia to Maine in the morning. The fog caused delays at airports in Philadelphia and Richmond, Va., and forced schools to open late in Delaware, Virginia and Maryland.

Afternoon snowflakes were scattered over southwest North Dakota and northeast Colorado.

Several highways in North Dakota remained icy as slush-covered roads froze overnight, causing several traffic accidents and some minor injuries, the highway patrol reported.

Thunderstorms brought golf-ball-size hail with 6.5 mph gusts near Mannford, Okla., early Thursday. A tornado was reported to have touched down in eastern Oklahoma.

Heavy rain threatened to cause flooding in parts of southern Wisconsin, where 2.75 inches fell over the town of Oregon in one hour.

An overnight storm left nearly 5 inches of snow in northwest Minnesota and 10 inches in Grand Mesa, Colo. Snow was 14 inches deep at Deer Lake, Colo., following the storm. Overnight snowfall also left up to 10 inches near Fairview, Utah.

Rainshowers, s and thunderstorms also were scattered over the Ohio Valley, the Great Lakes, parts of the Mississippi Valley and the Florida Panhandle.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours ending at 6 p.m. EDT included 1.29 inches at Madison, Wis.; 1.14 at Fayetteville, Ark.; and 1.13 at Pellston, Mich.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EDT ranged from 26 degrees at Devils Lake, N.D., to 93 degrees at Orlando, Fla.

The low temperature for the lower 48 states Thursday was 9 degrees in Elko, Nev.

## 'Star Trek' creator dies

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Gene Roddenberry, the former pilot who created the "Star Trek" science fiction television series followed by legions of "Trekkies," died Thursday. He was 70.

Roddenberry died at Santa Monica Medical Center shortly after suffering a heart attack at his doctor's office across the street, said hospital spokesman Ted Braun.

"Star Trek," which ran in the late 1960s, gained real fame in reruns of its 79 episodes. It led to six "Star Trek" feature films, a new series with different intergalactic characters and a cultural phenomenon of "Trekkie" conventions, books, clothing and lunch boxes.

The original "Star Trek" debuted on NBC on Sept. 8, 1966, proclaiming the most famous five-year mission of all time: "To seek out new life and new civilizations. To boldly go where no man has gone before."

The mission was canceled in 1969. Its highest ratings ranking was 52nd, achieved during the first season.

Roddenberry, an El Paso, Texas native, was nearly well known as a news writer he created. A former airline pilot and Los Angeles police officer, Roddenberry remained in constant demand as a public speaker.

"Star Trek" was reincarnated as a new syndicated "Star Trek: The Next Generation," which debuted in 1987.

Roddenberry is survived by his wife, Majel Barrett, an actress who appeared in the "Star Trek" series as nurse Christine Chapel, his son, Larsen, said he would not attend, and daughters Darlene and Dawn.

any video he would shoot for the family."

Larsen said it was only on Wednesday that KBCI-TV and the network decided that they would let Ronneburg keep the video camera they had provided. When Ronneburg turned the film over to his CBS contact in Germany on Wednesday, Larsen said, he turned over the camera as well.

The film, the first ever of the initial reunion between a freed hostage and his family, was a competitive coup for KBCI-TV, but Larsen said he would not make the same arrangements again "if it was going to result in the State Department savaging this family as they did."

"Everybody feels very sick at heart," he said. "The one thing we never wanted to happen is that Estelle and Eugene Ronneburg would have to go through this."

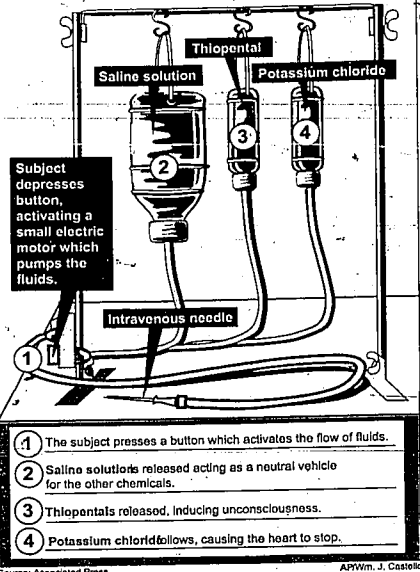
In an interview with the network, Ronneburg said State Department officials "called me aside and started reading me the riot act." But he said no one had set down rules about the camera's use and he had carried it in the open view of government officials.

One source, speaking on condition of anonymity, said he believed Turner was angry because the former hostage had requested his stay in Wiesbaden be kept private.

That source said Ronneburg implied ash was filming the reunion the video was for home use.

prohibiting him from such activities.

Kevorkian's actions drew sharp criticism from experts on medical ethics. Caplan, who testified against Kevorkian in the prior case, accused him of embarking on a "serial euthanasia career."

"It is really unfortunate that Dr. Kevorkian is the person around whom the debate is issued," said George Annas, a professor of health law at Boston University.

Caplan and Annas agree the euthanasia debate extends well beyond the sensationalism of the Michigan cases.

"More and more people are realizing that dying slow deaths in hospitals isn't too pleasant," Annas said.

Last month, a federal study showed that between 1980 and 1986 there was a 21 percent increase in suicides among Americans 65 and older, the group most likely to face terminal illness. Updated figures for 1990 show additional increase in the suicide rate among those 75 and older.

There is the success of the book, "Final Exit," by Derek Humphry, a founder of the National Hemlock Society, which advocates euthanasia.

The how-to primer on suicide lists lethal drug doses and offers other death recipes to patients facing terminal disease and long-term suffering.

The book has been on The New York Times best seller list for 10 weeks with 509,000 copies in print. Interest in the subject extends beyond the book stalls. In Washington state, polls indicate voters may endorse Initiative 119, the "Death with Dignity" measure. The ballot referendum would legalize doctor-assisted euthanasia for patients determined to have six months to live.

Such activities by doctors are states. The American Medical Association is opposed to doctor-assisted suicide, as is the Roman Catholic Church and other major religious organizations.

But more than 223,000 Washington residents signed a petition placing the issue on the Nov. 5 ballot.

The debate over a patient's right to die began 15 years ago when the family of Karen Ann Quinlan, a comatose New Jersey woman, went to court to have her removed from life support systems. It continued this year when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled doctors could remove feeding tubes from Nancy Cruzan, a Missouri woman, if clear and convincing evidence existed that she would not want to continue in a vegetative state.

Thomas case was rejected on a party-line vote of 55 to 43 after a partisan debate. Many Democrats also voted for the Democratic proposal because they knew theirs would be defeated.

Many lawmakers, including Sen. Warren B. Rudman, R-N.H., said it would be difficult if not impossible to determine who leaked the fact that law professor Anita F. Hill had given a statement to the Senate Judiciary Committee alleging that Thomas sexually harassed her in the early 1980s.

Previous efforts to track down leaks on Capitol Hill have not produced much success. A recent General Accounting Office investigation of leaks in the Keating case was inconclusive, according to ethics-committee members.

The Democratic proposal did not target any particular leaks from the investigation into five senators' involvement with savings and loan executive Charles H. Keating Jr. Ethics Committee member Jesse Helms, R-N.C., last summer acted without committee approval to disclose a report, based on findings of special counsel Robert S. Bennett, that called for Senate censure of Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif.

But there were also many other unauthorized disclosures of evidence in the case, some of which appeared to come from the senators being investigated.

Under the Democratic proposal, which was approved after a futile two-day effort to reach a bipartisan agreement on how to conduct the investigation, Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, and Minority Leader Robert J. Dole, R-Kan., will select the counsel. Dole said he thought they would have no trouble making the selection and added that the counsel could probably begin work within 10 days.

The counsel would be empowered to utilize the investigative resources of the FBI and GAO, the investigative arm of Congress, including powers to subpoena witnesses and compel testimony.

# House tax writer reluctant on tax-cut bill

### Former BCCI head says deal was legal

WASHINGTON — Former Defense Secretary Clark Clifford on Thursday described as "legal and proper" a \$33 million deal in which he used a 100 percent loan from the scandal-ridden Bank of Credit and Commerce International to buy stock in the bank he headed.

Clifford turned a \$2.75 million profit when he sold the stock two years later, in 1988. His associate, Robert Altman, netted \$1.35 million.

"The financing, purchase and sale of this stock were completely legal and proper," Clifford told the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on terrorism. He said he and Altman were allowed to buy the stock only after they had put four years of their lives into building up First American Bankshares of Washington.

However, Altman said he understands why the public might be concerned about the deal, since federal investigators are trying to determine how BCCI was able to secretly gain control of First American while Clifford chaired the Washington bank and Altman served as president.

### Judge dismisses charges against tabloid

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — A judge Thursday dismissed as unconstitutional charges against a supermarket tabloid that identified the woman who says she was raped at the Kennedy estate.

Palm Beach County Judge Robert Parker ruled that a Florida law barring the news media from identifying sex-crime victims is unconstitutional on its face and as applied by prosecutors against The Globe.

State statutes, even those addressing legitimate state concerns, must yield to the supreme authority of the federal Constitution's guarantee of press freedom, "Parker wrote."

State Attorney David Bludworth, who defended the law as protecting rape victims, said he'll appeal the ruling. A dozen rights and news-media groups, including The Associated Press, had supported The Globe's arguments that the case should be dismissed.

### Jury clears battered wife of murder

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — A preschool teacher who admitted stabbing her husband to death was acquitted after claiming she was a battered wife acting in self-defense.

Defense lawyers said the case, involving 35-year-old Kathryn Charliaga of Larsen Bay, on Kodiak Island, was believed to be the first time the "battered woman syndrome" defense succeeded at trial in Alaska.

"This was a very big case for us," said Michael Kartavos, Charliaga's public defender. She had been charged with second-degree murder and two lesser counts of homicide.

### Mob sets fire to man's mobile home

WILLIS, Texas — Dozens of angry residents, most of them black, set fire to a white man's mobile home after they said he and his teenage sons used guns to chase black students through the woods, the police chief said.

No one was injured and no arrests have been reported. The whereabouts of the white man, Raymond Roberts Jr., were unknown Thursday.

Roberts, a used car dealer, reportedly started the conflict Tuesday when he and his two sons brandished handguns, rifles and pistols as they chased as many as 17 black students through the woods near C.E. Hardy Middle School with a pickup, witnesses said.

Roberts was angry about a fight between his son, who attends Hardy, and a group of black students, Police Chief Joe Nelson said.

### U.S. defense official to assist Soviets

WASHINGTON — Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald J. Atwood will visit the Soviet Union next week to discuss converting the Soviet defense industry to civilian production, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Seven U.S. industrialists will accompany Atwood on the eight-day fact-finding trip, said spokesman Pete Williams.

They will meet senior Soviet officials and representatives of the republics and visit defense plants in Moscow, St. Petersburg and Kiev, Williams said. Atwood will stop in Helsinki, Finland, en route to the Soviet Union and will brief the representatives of NATO's North Atlantic Council in Brussels, Belgium, on his return trip.

### Department to turn over mail bomber

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department said Thursday it will turn over convicted mail bomber Walter Leroy Moody Jr. to the state of Alabama for prosecution on murder charges which could result in a death sentence.

The department said Alabama's request to prosecute Moody for the murder of U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Robert S. Vance of Birmingham would take precedence over Georgia's request to prosecute him for the murder of Savannah City Alderman Robert E. Robinson.

## FCC won't reconsider rerun ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — A divided Federal Communications Commission voted Thursday not to reconsider its decision to allow TV networks limited access to the highly profitable reruns of some prime-time shows.

The highly charged matter now ends up in a federal appeals court, which has refused to rule on the issue until all "administrative remedies" were exhausted.

Commissioner Sherrill Marshall said there was "fundamentally no new evidence or arguments" to warrant another look at the decision, which gave the networks entry to the rerun business for the first time in two decades.

But Commissioner James Quello said the policy was "difficult to apply, extremely one-sided and, ultimately, anti-competitive."

The commission voted 3-2 to stick by its May decision, which did not completely resolve the squabble between the networks and Hollywood studios and producers over control of rerun rights. The vote split was the same as in July, with Marshall, Andrew Garrett and Ervin Duggan on one side and Quello and Chairman Alfred Sikes on the other.

The commission voted in May to allow ABC, NBC and CBS to own up to 40 percent of their prime-time entertainment shows as of June 15, meaning they also could participate in the \$5 billion rerun market.

Washington (AP) — Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, the House's chief tax writer, expressed reluctance Thursday over fashioning a tax-cut bill this year.

He said he would prefer to wait and see what President Bush proposes.

Rostenkowski, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, emerged from a closed-door caucus of the panel's Democrats to say, "I don't know of one person who was enthusiastic about doing anything this year."

The Illinois Democrat noted he had said several months ago that he would lay out tax proposals later in the year for discussion only.

"I see no reason why I shouldn't continue to follow that format," he said.

Asked what course of action he would prefer, he said, "Wait for the president to lead."

Bush and Republican lawmakers have been discussing a package that might include a cut in the capital gains tax on sales of property, tax breaks for investments and other items.

Rostenkowski has been under pressure from top House Democrats to have his committee work on a bill cutting taxes for middle-income people before Congress adjourns for the year, probably around Thanksgiving.

Many Democrats believe producing such a bill, and voting on it, would boost their 1992 election prospects by illustrating that the party wants fair treatment for the middle class. Enactment of such legislation this year seems unlikely, however.

Rostenkowski is one of the few leading congressional Democrats who have not charged ahead this week with a proposal to give tax breaks to middle- and working-class people.

Because his panel must originate all tax legislation, his participation — willing or otherwise — is needed before such a measure can begin moving through Congress.

"I don't have a reputation of jumping in until I find out if there is water in the pool," he said.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., joined the parade Wednesday when he renewed his nearly two-year-old call for a cut in the Social Security payroll tax. And a Republican, Sen. William V. Roth Jr. of Delaware, countered with a proposal that includes a 3 percent reduction in income tax rates.

Bush and top administration officials have repeatedly insisted that the country's economic doldrums are ending, a view that Democrats have rejected.

"This is a Bush recession, no doubt about that," Rostenkowski added.

Rostenkowski said that at a recent meeting, House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., suggested a "step-by-step" approach in which Rostenkowski might introduce a bill next week and "see what the environment holds for us."

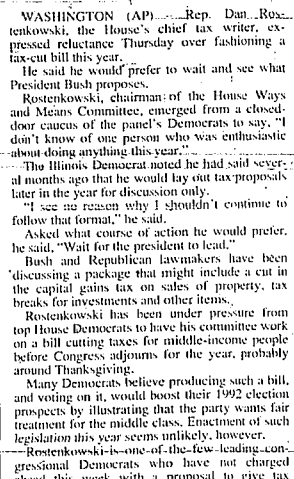
Dr. George Uhl, a scientist at the National Institute on Drug Abuse and associate professor at the Johns Hopkins University medical school, said the finding "could help develop drugs that could block the acute effects of cocaine and might even reduce cocaine craving," he added.

It also may allow scientists someday to identify people who may be at high risk for cocaine addiction, said Uhl, lead author of one study.

Susan Amara, associate professor at Oregon Health Sciences University and co-author of the study, said the finding is "one step in a very complicated pathway." Much more research is needed before a treatment for cocaine addiction can be developed.

"Knowing this and many other steps that will follow, we'll be able to understand the molecular mechanism involved in addiction, and it will allow us ultimately to intervene" and break the addiction process, she said.

## Analysts see fresh signs of weakening economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Factory orders for durable goods plunged in September for the second straight month and claims for unemployment insurance climbed to the highest level since May in what analysts cited as fresh signs of a weakening economy.

"If you wanted to shift the tea leaves in the most optimistic way, there's not much to make you feel good," said Joel Pralben, an economist with Laurence H. Meyer & Associates, a St. Louis forecasting service.

The Commerce Department said orders for durable goods — usually expensive items expected to last more than three years — fell 3.2 percent, to \$12.5 billion, paced by the steepest decline in defense orders in more than seven years.

Orders also sank a revised 4.1 per-

cent in August, to \$125.5 billion, worse than the previously estimated 3.9 percent drop.

The Labor Department said Thursday that new applications for unemployment insurance rose 29,000, to 452,000, during the week ending Oct. 12, the highest level since May.

And the Federal Reserve said Wednesday that a survey by its regional banks, pictured at a "weak or growing slowly" economy in September and early October, with manufacturing "still improving although at a slower pace in some areas."

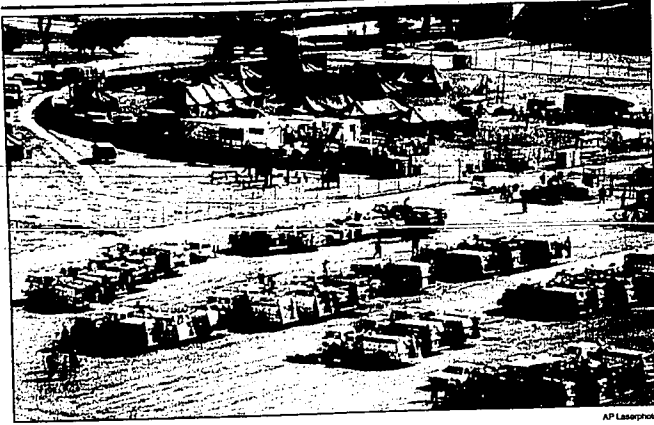

## Illegal brush clearing may have started fire

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) - With rain looming ominously in the weekend forecast, investigators continued searching for victims and clues Thursday in the aftermath of the devastating fire that swept over the Oakland hills.

One or two people remained missing, according to authorities who believe the fire - one of the worst in the nation's history - may have been started by construction workers illegally burning brush.

The blaze began Saturday, was snuffed out but flared up the next day. Before it was brought under control Wednesday, it killed 24 people, injured 148 and destroyed 2,900 houses and apartments. It caused an estimated \$5 billion in damage.

Rain was forecast for Friday and Saturday, and officials worried that the fire might be followed by disastrous mudslides on the vegetation-stripped hills. Workers planned to begin building wood and mesh barriers to catch soil and rocks and protect

homes still standing below.

As soon as authorities finish looking for the remains of the victims - a task expected to take a few more days - fabric is to be placed over hillsides to hold soil in place.

The number of missing was reduced sharply after authorities released a list of people who were unaccounted for. "That really helped because most of them called in," police Sgt. Greg Bingham said.

Thursday swarmed over the site of Saturday's blaze, Fire Chief P. Lamont, Ewell has said that the fire is "suspect" because we've ruled out all natural causes.

Three people who lived in the hill-side neighborhood where the fire began were quoted as saying the fire may have been started by construction workers burning debris.

FBI agent David Williams, one of the three neighbors, said the owner of a home in the area was having a cottage house added to his property and

that the fire was started in debris cleared from the site.

An arson investigator, Sgt. Ron Hanson, said workers building a cabin in near where the fire broke out had been questioned, as has the man who hired them. He said all denied responsibility but will be questioned further.

Open burning is against the law in Oakland. Violators face a misdemeanor fine of \$500 and a jail sentence of six months to one year, according to the fire marshal's office.

As search teams and dogs continued along search for bodies, a few horse-owners wandered through their burnt-out houses. Two street sweepers pushed ash to the side of the street and even a few joggers were out, trotting through the blackened landscape.

John Sauter poked through the ruins of her house, looking for anything that might have survived. A clothes dryer still stood, but when she opened the door to see if her clothes had survived she found only a pile of ashes.

## 'Suicide doctor' draws praise; lawmaker calls him a danger

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) - Two more deaths aided by a suicide-machine inventor known as "Dr. Death" drew praise Thursday from a rights organization and threats from officials to revoke his license and charge him in the deaths.

Dr. Jack Kevorkian, who in 1990 helped Alzheimer's patient Janet Adkins die by hooking her up to a suicide machine he built, called authorities Wednesday night to report another "physician-assisted suicide."

Kevorkian directed police to a cabin about 40 miles north of Detroit. There, they were met by him and found the bodies of two women, both connected to devices apparently used to end their lives.

Sherry Miller, 43, of Roseville had suffered from multiple sclerosis. Marjorie Wantz, 58, of Sodus suffered from a painful but non-terminal pelvic disease.

"I bless the doctor. I really do. I've seen the woman in so much pain," Millie Gast, a next-door neighbor of Wantz, told The Herald-Hopewell in Benton Harbor. "I hope she don't do anything to him."

Wantz received a lethal injection using a device similar to the one Adkins used, while Miller inhaled carbon monoxide through a mask, said Geoffrey Fieger, Kevorkian's lawyer.

ney Cheryl K. Smith added: "This type of ad hoc assistance in suicide for the dying is wide open to abuse because there are no ground rules and no criteria."

A judge dismissed a murder charge against Kevorkian in the Adkins case after ruling that Michigan has no law against assisted suicide. But Kevorkian was barred from helping people commit suicides in Oakland County and could face contempt charges if found to have violated the court order.

Sheriff's Capt. Glenn Watson said it could take two weeks to determine whether to file charges.

State Sen. Fred Dillingham, the sponsor of a bill to outlaw assisted suicide, said he has spoken with the county prosecutor and state Attorney General Frank Kelley about revoking Kevorkian's medical license.

"My feeling is we need to punch Kevorkian's lights out right now," Dillingham said. "He's proven himself to be a danger."

Twenty-five states have laws against assisted suicide. A measure on the November ballot in Washington state would allow doctor-assisted suicide.

Kevorkian, a 63-year-old pathologist, declined to comment as he left the Sheriff's Department early Thursday.

But in an Oct. 5 interview with Britain's Thames Television, Kevorkian said "any law which obstructs a physician in doing something for a needy patient who wants that service is immoral. Therefore, I'll disobey it. I'm disobeying an immoral law. I may go to prison, but then it will change."

Miller, a divorced mother of two, had testified for Kevorkian at a January hearing, saying she contacted him shortly after hearing of Adkins' death.

"I want a sure thing," she told WJBK-TV in Detroit. "I want something and Dr. Kevorkian's idea, yeah, it's fast, it's clean. It's not messy."

## Asbestos compensation hearings start

WASHINGTON (AP) - A House subcommittee opened hearings Thursday on whether to set up a nationwide system to compensate hundreds of thousands of Americans suffering from cancer and other serious diseases from exposure to asbestos.

State and federal judges urged Congress to set up a fund to pay victims' claims to settle the surge of lawsuits that clogs court dockets and has forced some dozen asbestos producers into bankruptcy protection.

Proponents argue that such a fund would speed up and ensure payments to people with cancer and other diseases caused by long-term exposure to lung-scarring asbestos fibers.

The explosion in court claims in the last decade has delayed payment to thousands of victims as their cases are tied up in costly litigation, said Rep. William Hughes, D-N.J., chairman of the House Judiciary courts subcommittee.

"The lawyers' fees, and transactional costs are eating up the bulk of the funds, what resources are out there are being dissipated," Hughes said in an interview.

Hughes said his panel would consider setting up a nationwide compensation system to encourage litigants to seek an early and guaranteed payment as an alternative to costly and time-consuming lawsuits.

Other hearings will be held to study other alternatives to the crisis, he said.

## Author says Truman used racist slurs

NEW YORK (AP) - Harry Truman, who made civil rights a federal priority for the first time since Reconstruction, expressed strong racist sentiments before, during and after his presidency, a historian said Thursday.

Although Truman toned down his racist expressions after entering the White House, he continued to use racial slurs in private conversation for the rest of his life, according to William Leuchtenburg, president of the American Historical Association.

Leuchtenburg, a University of North Carolina professor, is writing a book on Truman.

In a telephone interview Thursday, Leuchtenburg said some scholars have known about Truman's racist utterances since his letters were opened. "But somehow," Leuchtenburg said, "this has not permeated the public consciousness."

Liz Safty, a librarian at the Truman Library in Independence, Mo., agreed that Truman's remarks were familiar to scholars.

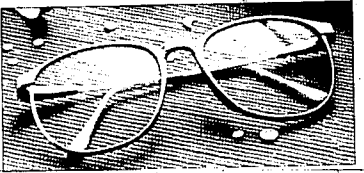
Truman's attitudes toward race were shaped by his youth in Missouri. His grandparents had owned slaves; his mother was interned by Union troops during the Civil War, and remained "violently unconvinced" for the rest of her life.

Young Harry developed "an abiding belief in white supremacy," Leuchtenburg said.

But after succeeding Franklin D. Roosevelt, Truman rose above his prejudices. In 1946, when told of assaults on black World War II veterans in the South, he exclaimed, "My God! I had no idea it was as terrible as that. We've got to do something!"

"Whatever my inclinations as a native of Missouri might have been, as president I know this is bad," he said. "I shall fight to end evils like this."

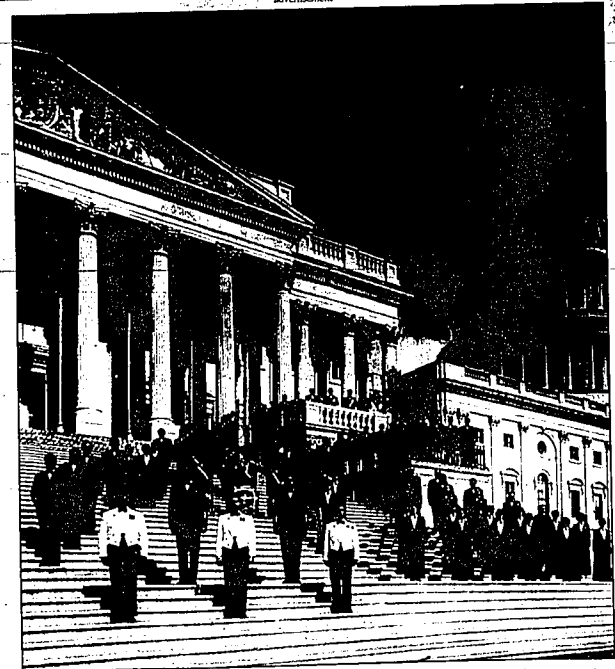

# Vast eruptions likely in Yellowstone, California areas, study says

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A new prediction method suggests volcanoes at Yellowstone National Park and California's Long Valley will erupt within 100,000 years with 500 times the force of Mount St. Helens' 1980 explosion.

The technique involves analysis of the element neodymium in old lava and new measurements of a gas called argon that is unlikely within 100,000 years at Valles caldera, a large crater in New Mexico's Jemez Mountains near Los Alamos. The study was conducted by Don DePaolo, geology chairman at the University of

California, Berkeley, and a senior scientist at Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory. He presented his findings Thursday in San Diego during the Geological Society of America's annual meeting.

Valleys and giant craters at Wyoming's Yellowstone and the eastern Sierra Nevada's Long Valley are known as calderas — the largest type of volcanic crater. Previous eruptions at the calderas were "the biggest ones that happened on the planet," said DePaolo, a geochemist.

He said a big eruption at any one of them would spew 500 to 1,000 times more ash

than the May 18, 1980, Mount St. Helens eruption — "roughly enough ash to cover an area half the size of Wyoming a yard deep. It would be much, much larger than any volcanic eruption that we've ever witnessed."

Such eruptions in prehistoric times wiped out all life in surrounding areas and changed global weather patterns.

The Sierra ski resort town of Mammoth Lakes sits inside the 20-by-10-mile Long Valley caldera, where earthquakes since 1980 have spurred false-alarm eruption scares. Yellowstone's caldera measures 40 miles by 25 miles and contains hot springs

and geysers heated by molten rock. At Yellowstone or Long Valley, the probability of a colossal eruption "in the next 100 years is very low; the probability of an eruption in the next 100,000 years is pretty good," DePaolo said.

"That's a very reasonable possibility," said geologist Robert Christiansen of the U.S. Geological Survey in Menlo Park. "It's a very capable scientist. What he says is consistent with what most of us would conclude on the basis of other geologic evidence."

However, "most people don't need to lose

a lot of sleep over what might happen in the next 100,000 years," Christiansen said. Smaller eruptions — about one-tenth as powerful as Mount St. Helens — happened during the last 10,000 years at Yellowstone and could happen again long before the big blast, said Wayne Hamilton, a National Park Service geologist. The same is true at Long Valley. Gargantuan eruptions happened 730,000 years ago at Long Valley; about 1.4 million and 1.1 million years ago at Valles caldera; and 2 million, 1.3 million and 630,000 years ago at Yellowstone, DePaolo said.

GOLDEN, Colo. (AP) — State budget cuts announced by Gov. Roy Romer will force a halt in radiation testing in the communities near the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant, a state health department official says.

The move will affect air-testing in Broomfield, Arvada and Westminster until at least January, the official said.

In addition, the radioactive waste water in two holding ponds at the plant eight miles south of Boulder will be tested monthly instead of weekly. One on-site air sampler also will be out of use.

The cuts, announced two weeks ago, lopped \$60,000 from the environmental radiation sector of the department's Radiation Control division, a 15 percent cut from its original budget of \$420,000.

In addition, an emergency catastrophe team that would respond to a Rocky Flats disaster was removed and financing for the division that stops illegal dumping of hazardous waste was reduced.

"We hope these cutbacks are strictly temporary," said Robert Terry, a Radiation Control official. "We hope to obtain funding from another source and resume these discontinued services by the first quarter of 1992 at the latest."

Terry said the Department of Energy was a likely source for supplemental cash.

A special Rocky Flats oversight unit within the health department did not have its budget directly cut, Terry said.

"But indirectly, the unit will be affected by the cuts in the radiation control division because it depends on work done there," he said.

The Rocky Flats unit formed in June 1989 to work with the Energy Department to help protect the public from any contamination from the facility.

The unit includes 12 full-time staff members from six divisions of the health department, including members from the Hazardous Material and Waste Management division and the Disease Control division.

## Lands reopen as danger ends

OLYMPIA (AP) — Public Lands Commissioner Brian Boyle Thursday reopened 3 million acres of state-protected lands in Eastern Washington that had been closed to public use because of fire danger.

That means hunting, logging, recreation and other activities can resume on state forest lands and other state-protected lands. Boyle's action affects all Eastern Washington counties except for Benton, Grant, Adams and Franklin, which didn't have any lands that fell under the ban.

The closure was ordered Oct. 16, when a windstorm downed power lines and sparked wildfires that burned about 45,000 acres in Washington.

Boyle said in a statement today he reopened the lands because rain and snow this week in some areas has reduced fire danger. He also said firefighters who earlier had been sent to battle Spokane-area blazes have since left and are again available to fight any new blazes.

### Culvert debacle reveals Idaho counties' weakness

Blaine County officials these days are feeling like the shortstop who boots a routine ground ball and then trying to make up for his mistake — heaves it 100 feet over the first baseman's head.

Last month, they replaced a sagging wooden bridge over Hyndman Creek with a culvert without bothering to get a state — or county — permit to do so. Then they shored it up with fill from the nearby Triumph Mine — fill that's leached with arsenic and lead.

It was bonkers any way around, but you won't find other county officials in the Magic Valley laughing.

Most of them are only too aware that it could have happened to them.

The fundamental problem with this case, as with too many in county government in Idaho, was that nobody was minding the store. The Hyndman Creek bridge debacle arose from a lapse of supervision and a lack of accountability.

In Idaho, county government — a multi-million-dollar operation with

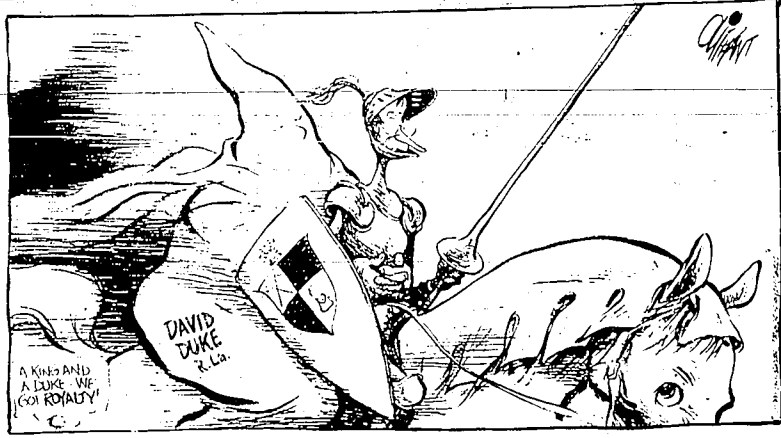
dozens or hundreds of employees — is usually run by three part-time commissioners who look after things while running their own businesses or holding down other jobs.

In most Idaho counties, the commissioners only see the road and bridge director at budget time or when somebody complains about his road not getting plowed.

That's not good enough. It invites miscommunication, mistakes and waste of the taxpayers' money.

We've long argued the need to scrap the commissioner system in Idaho county government and replace it with a county administrator system. The Hyndman Creek bridge fiasco seems to us to be a classic example of why.

If a county administrator had been seeing to the replacement of this bridge, the odds are pretty good he or she would have gotten the required permits first and that the bridge wouldn't be shored up with toxic waste.



## Is civil war next in abortion battle?

For quite some time, the more militant opponents of abortion have maintained that the 1973 Supreme Court decision in *Roe vs. Wade*, which legalized abortion, is the modern equivalent of the Dred Scott decision of 1857, which held that Negro slaves were not human beings but rather property of whites.

It is an ominous analogy, because the Dred Scott case was the catalyst that brought on the Civil War within four years.

But you have to concede that from their perspective, the anti-abortionists' argument does make perfect sense. If you truly believe that a conceived child is a human being in every sense, then killing that human being could hardly be less odious than enslaving a human being. And, it follows, any measure necessary to stop the killing would be justified — even civil war.

For those who do not believe that a fertilized ovum is instantly a human being, the struggle over abortion becomes more analogous to prohibition of alcoholic beverages in the 1920s. They see it as the legal imposition of one's particular moral code on everyone else, even those whose code may be quite different.

Prohibition was imposed in 1920 with adoption of the 18th Amendment to the constitution during a time of xenophobia, Negrophobia and rampant religious intolerance. During that time, not just manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages was illegal throughout the country — and bootlegging was widespread.

If the militant anti-abortionists had their way they would not only overturn *Roe vs. Wade* but would write into the constitution a new amendment prohibiting abortion under nearly all circumstances. It would be the modern equivalent of the 13th Amendment, which bans slavery.

Similarly, if *Roe vs. Wade* were repealed, some states no doubt would prohibit abortion under all circumstances, while others would permit it in varying degrees from the highly restrictive to the very liberal.

Such a patchwork of laws no doubt would create a brisk interstate business in abortion. For instance, women in Pennsylvania, which recently adopted a restrictive abortion law, would get their abortions in Maryland, which recently adopted a state law which in effect codifies the right of choice under *Roe vs. Wade*.

Prohibition of alcohol was repealed after 12 years because a majority of the people came to believe that it just didn't work, that in the end the decision to drink or not to drink had to be left to personal choice.

Public opinion polls today suggest that an increasing number of Americans have tacitly reached this same conclusion with regard to abortion. The emerging view seems to be that no matter what one's own view of abortion may be, the decision in the end must be a matter of personal choice.

After all, what's the alternative? If we accept the Dred Scott analogy, then the alternative could well be another civil war.

Not possible? Well, the recent Operation Rescue tactics in Wichita could be called the equivalent of the Kansas frontier John Brown's assault on Harper's Ferry out of the belief that he was God's instrument to destroy slavery.

And the street battles in Cincinnati between anti-abortionists and pro-choice advocates might be the equivalent of firing on Fort Sumter.

If such a prohibition should be written into the Constitution, either by amendment or by judicial interpretation, abortion would be banned throughout the country — no ifs, ands or buts. Permissive state laws would be unconstitutional. It would be prohibition all over again, and the illegal abortion would no doubt flourish just as bootleg liquor did while the 18th Amendment was in effect from 1920 to 1933.

Simply overturning *Roe vs. Wade*, in practical terms, have the same effect as repealing the Prohibition Amendment in 1933, by throwing to the states the question of how much or how little abortion to permit. After repeal of Prohibition, some states elected to remain completely "dry" (even though Mississippi charged a sales tax on bootleg whiskey), while many others regulated liquor sales in varying degrees.

## Safety measures would reduce fears of flying

Flying on a regularly scheduled airline is the world's safest mode of travel. But in the rare airline accident when your Boeing, McDonnell Douglas or Airbus transport impacts the ground, you have to survive fire and smoke to exit the plane.

Now, as reported on ABC's "20/20" program last week, the Federal Aviation Administration says you can survive. You can get out alive. But the cost of your safety is high.

You have to be in the right aisle seat within three rows of your first-choice window exit, acting to save only yourself, not wasting time to help anyone else. You have to get out of the plane in 90 seconds.

That's not exactly the American way — abandoning your wife, children or friends who are flying with you. Just push through anyone crying for help — you only have time to save yourself.

Is this cruel message what Barbara Walters, Hugh Downs, ABC or the Federal Aviation wanted to tell us?

Maybe they were telling the engineers who have built the amazing jet transports that have transformed the world into a much smaller planet that they would have to forgo a little of their profits, change priorities and make jet airliners truly safe.

The first manufacturer to build a plane that could be guaranteed not to burn would profit enormously. Not only would the passengers be free of fear. Think of the improvement in the life span and morale of the pilots and flight attendants.

If you question the presence of fear now, just look at the hands of the people seated near you the next time you are in an instrument landing pattern in clouds of fog when you are circling western Massachusetts in a storm, waiting your turn to make that night instrument landing at Boston Logan Airport.

But how do you construct that jet that won't end in life-threatening flames? The techniques probably already exist with the plane manufacturers, the Air Force, the Navy or NASA, but they are not being used because of the wrong economic reasons. There has to be a corporate board of directors that will decide on the essential commitment to safety.

If the methods are not currently available, try these:

- Improve the fuel tanks — the wet wings and the fuselage tanks — so that no fuel will slosh into the cabins.
- Remove everything combustible except the passengers from the cabins. Renovate the interiors and seats with fireproof materials. Further cover or isolate carry-on luggage.
- Develop and install fire extinguishing equipment. Investigate assistance available from Underwriters Laboratories, which has helped eliminate fear of fire from stores, office buildings and homes equipped with sprinklers. Investigate methods of the U.S. Navy, whose damage control personnel eliminated fear of fire in ships except during temporary Kamikaze attacks in World War II.
- Make necessary everyday commitments to safety-first operations.

If the general public were free of fear of flying on the nation's airlines, travel expansion and demand for more jet aircraft would surely follow.

# 1-time menace Vietnam now looks toothless

WASHINGTON — In showing a readiness to move toward friendlier ties with Vietnam, Secretary of State James A. Baker III is acknowledging the obvious: Vietnam is not the same country it was in 1975 or even a year ago.

By one, the reasons for not normalizing U.S. relations with Vietnam have been evaporating, and Baker said Wednesday in Paris that the two old foes should see if a more congenial relationship is possible.

How different Vietnam looked in 1975, when, with its defeat of the American-backed government in Saigon, that country emerged as the third largest of the expanding empire of Marxist nations.

With its large, battle-tested military and the prospect of continuing largesse from its chief patrons, the Soviet Union, Vietnam seemed to many here to be poised for additional conquests in Southeast Asia.

establishing normal relations with Vietnam.

"The prospect of a new era in Southeast Asia lies before us," he said, asserting that normal ties after years in prospect with Cambodia and Laos as well.

Nowadays, Vietnam has become an economic basket case, its backwardness seeming all the more incongruous when compared with the economic vitality of its avowedly capitalist neighbors. Beyond that, the Soviets, newly isolationist, no longer buttress Hanoi with large-scale assistance.

Far from looking for new worlds to conquer, Vietnam has withdrawn its troops from Cambodia. The main interest of its embattled Marxist leadership is survival.

That means expanding ties with the West, particularly the United States. Besides American trade and investment, which have been barred since 1975, Vietnam wants help from the World Bank and International Monetary Fund. The United States has been able to use its clout in both institutions to prevent them from assisting Hanoi.

The one sticking point blocking full normalization between Hanoi and Washington relates to what perhaps the last unresolved issue of the Vietnam War: the more than 1,600 American servicemen still unaccounted for.

Baker said the way Washington relates to Vietnam "will be governed by the degree to which Vietnam continues to cooperate with the United States on the very, very important issue of our prisoners of war and our missing in action."

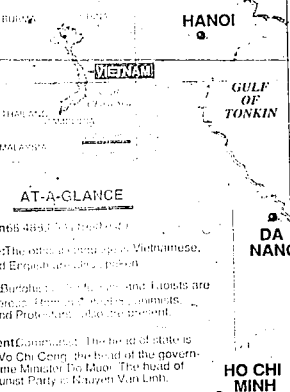
U.S. officials acknowledge that Vietnam has been much better cooperative in recent years, but they are wary of information that is just a year ago.

But MIA/POW support groups believe the United States should move slowly in normalizing relations with Vietnam, arguing that Vietnam still has little incentive to cooperate once those ties are established.

That is the message the groups have been passing on to the administrations and Baker thinks they have a point.

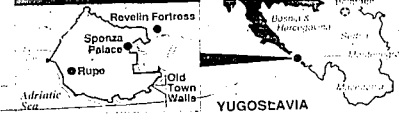

# Fighting reported despite cease-fire

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (AP) — Serb-dominated Yugoslav forces pounded Croatian defenses around the Adriatic jewel of Dubrovnik on Thursday and captured a key resort just to the south before a cease-fire in the area was announced.

European Community observers said federal army and Croatian defense officials agreed to the cease-fire in the Dubrovnik region, effective early Thursday evening.

But these fighting was reportedly continuing elsewhere in secessionist Croatia. Radio Zagreb said two civilians were killed in clashes that appeared to signal the collapse of an EC-negotiated truce for the republic as a whole that went into effect Saturday.

Croatia declared independence from Yugoslavia along with Slovenia on June 25, but Croatia's ethnic Serb minority wants no part of an independent Croatia. The federal army, with a Serb-dominated officer corps, has sided with the Serb rebels. More than 1,000 people have died in the fighting.

In the latest battles, Croatian defense officials said the federal army resumed shelling of the eastern Croatian stronghold of Vukovar, which has been besieged for about two months.

In a no-man's land outside Vukovar, dozens of unburied corpses of both Croats and Serbs lie on a dirt track leading through cornfields, gnawed on by stray dogs and hungry pigs.

Zagreb, came under fire from multiple-barracked rocket launchers. Croatian defense officials said, and Zagreb reportedly heard fighting on the central front near Pakrac, 70 miles southeast of the Croat capital.

One villager was killed and several wounded in nearby Plopkopaka, and another civilian was killed in Danjari, just north of Pakrac, it said. Shelling was reported in Osijek, 140 miles east of the Croatian capital, and fighting was reported near the strategic town of Sisak, directly south of Zagreb, and near Vinkovci, a Croatian town 30 miles west of Vukovar.

Earlier in the day, after one failed effort, federal forces made a successful amphibious assault on Kupari, a resort four miles south of Dubrovnik, both sides said. Zagreb talked and federal army troops had advanced on land to within 2 miles from the east side.

Refugees fled the hillside and suburbs around the city and were taking sanctuary in the city's historic heart, said EC observer Simon Smith. Croatian officials said shelling of the Adriatic port continued from the land and sea.

Wednesday marked the first time in three weeks of fighting that shells had fallen within the thick old walls of the city, an architectural gem. EC officials, angered by the federal attacks on Dubrovnik, summoned Gen. Andrija Raseta, deputy commander of the fifth federal military district, to their Zagreb hotel headquarters for an explanation Thursday morning.

## Filipinos await Imelda's return

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Newly six years after driving Imelda Marcos and her husband into exile, Filipinos are casually awaiting the return of the former first lady whose massive shoe collection became a symbol of the Marcoses' excesses.

Plans for Mrs. Marcos' visit next month have not been announced, but it could include a stop at the Malacañan presidential palace, where her 1,700 pairs of shoes and other personal items are on public display.

So far, the only sign of the scheduled visit has been a drive to collect donations for Mrs. Marcos, once among the world's wealthiest women.

"Our understanding among ourselves is to welcome Mrs. Marcos with solemnity and quiet dignity," said retired Brig. Gen. Pacifico de Leon, one of several former army officials handling security for Mrs. Marcos.

# Hard-liners stack delegations

DAMASCUS, Syria — The hard-liners to the Middle East conflict have stacked a united hard-line stand on the table. Palestinian radicals opposed to any peace deal and the Lebanese offices of the PLO have rejected the Shammir decision.

Israel has repeatedly said it will not discuss Jerusalem or the settlements, and Israeli negotiators reported Thursday that the Israeli delegation now would be stacked with hard-liners.

They included confidants of Shammir, hard-line legislators from his Likud bloc and possibly a representative of Jewish settlers in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, the reports said.

The prime minister's move threatened to split his government, the most right-wing in Israel's history. Levy met with Likud supporters on Thursday, and some backers said the foreign minister would now wage an all-out campaign against Shammir for leadership of the party.

One of the Arab conference sources in Damascus, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the participants had differed widely on some points, but after Shammir's decision they felt their best stand would be "total harmony." The source spoke on condition of anonymity.

The move by Shammir to head up the Israeli delegation will likely split Arab negotiators, who grade the delegations as well, which were mutually set at the foreign minister level.

The Syrians had been pressing the other Arab states who will attend the peace conference to agree not to sign separate peace accords with Israel. They do not want a repeat of Egypt's 1979 peace treaty with Israel, the first and only one the Jewish state has with any of its Arab neighbors, shattered the Arab alliance and neutralized the Arabs' major military power.

# Regional strongman willing to take on Russia

GROZNY, USSR (AP) — He flew nuclear bombers and led a general in the Soviet air force. He pulled off a coup in Chechnya and he calls his men "the Russian national liberation army."

They included confidants of Shammir, hard-line legislators from his Likud bloc and possibly a representative of Jewish settlers in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, the reports said.

The Chechens were organized into an autonomous region in 1922. Two years later, the ethnically identical Ingush were given similar autonomy. They merged in 1934.

Chechens now account for about 62 percent of the 1.3 million people in the area roughly the size of New Jersey. Russians make up 25 percent and the Ingush about 17 percent.

Retired Gen. Dudaev took control of the Muslim enclave by ousting Soviet troops and declaring an independent republic. He has since taken control of the region.

Dudaev took control of the Chechen-Ingush republic on the southern slopes of the greater Caucasus Mountains on Sept. 6 when his supporters occupied government buildings and ousted the Communist government for purportedly supporting the failed August coup.

Chechen-Ingush is one of 20 autonomous Soviet republics created to give ethnic large national minorities but not given full republic status.

### Legislation would enlarge tribal scope

**FORT HALL** - The scope of Indian tribal courts would be enlarged under legislation on its way to President George Bush.

The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes support a measure approved Tuesday by the U.S. House of Representatives, returning to tribal courts jurisdiction over misdemeanor crimes committed on their reservations by Indians from other tribes.

Sho-Ban officials want to assume jurisdiction over all offenses committed on the reservation.

The bill, endorsed by the U.S. Senate on Oct. 17, is a response to a 1990 U.S. Supreme Court decision that tribal courts lacked such jurisdiction.

"I very much support the legislation," said Shoshone-Bannock Chief Judge Louise Dixey. "It has been worked on for over a year. We've had our input throughout the entire process."

Because Indian tribes are not subject to the same regulations as municipalities or states, tribal judicial authority has expanded as various tribes assume more jurisdiction over reservations.

### Residents on Teton express concern

**DRIGGS** - The proposed state plan for the Henry's Fork of the Snake River does not protect the Teton River and that has longtime and new residents along that stream concerned.

And the chairman of the Idaho Water Resources Board says the critics have a point.

"From the input we've had, I'm sure we're going to have to do something," said Dave Rydatch of St. Anthony after a Wednesday hearing on the Henry's Fork. A final hearing was slated for Thursday night in St. Anthony.

The Henry's Fork Basin Plan, if approved by the water board and the Legislature, would restrict hydroelectric development, water diversions and other projects on more than 60 miles of the Henry's Fork, and portions of several other streams in Fremont and Teton counties.

More than 100 miles of the Henry's Fork and the Falls River would be protected as "natural" or "recreational" under the present draft, but no stretches of the Teton River made the list.

### INEL officials eye minority recruiting

**IDAHO FALLS** - Officials at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory have wrapped up a two-day session with leaders of seven major black universities that they hope will lead to better recruiting of minority scientists and engineers.

"The bottom line of this gathering is to establish networks with the faculties, administrations and students of these schools," said James Jefferson of the Department of Energy's Idaho office.

"Once we establish these ties, no one will be able to say we can't find enough qualified African-American males and females," Jefferson said during the session that ended on Thursday.

James N. Harris, director of Career Development and placement at Tuskegee University in Alabama, said he will take back information to his school's engineering, computer science, math and physics students about the INEL's cooperative education and internship programs.

### Man convicted for beating deaths

**BOISE** - Keith Eugene Wells was convicted Thursday on two counts of first-degree murder for the beating deaths of a bartender and her friend last December, and the family of one victim quickly called for the death penalty.

"He took my brother's life, and we're never going to get him back," Jan England, the sister of John Justad, said after the verdict was read.

"He doesn't deserve to live."

A seven-woman, five-man jury, which adjourned after more than nine hours late Wednesday, deliberated only another hour Thursday morning before convicting Wells in the Dec. 20, 1990, slayings of Justad, 23, and bartender Brandi Rains, 20, at the Rose Pub in Boise.

Wells, 29, a Boise door-to-door salesman on parole for robbery at the time of his arrest, showed no emotion when the verdict was rendered.

### Boise man receives 7-year sentence

**BOISE** - A Boise man who admitted holding a bank employee hostage at knife-point in an attempt to locate his father has been sentenced to up to seven years in prison.

Jeffrey Swift Jr., 20, will be eligible for probation in four to six months, 4th District Judge Alan Schwartzman said Wednesday.

Swift said he held the worker hostage June 7 to draw attention to an unsuccessful two-year search for his father, who left his family 15 years ago. Swift surrendered without incident inside a Boise West One Bank branch after holding police at bay for several hours.

It released on probation, Swift plans to end his search and return to his native Philippines, where his mother lives, Ada County Deputy Public Defender Amil Myshin said.

# Farm faces huge fines for illegal dumping

**HAMER (AP)** - A Clark County farming and potato processing company faces hundreds of thousands of dollars in fines and cleanup costs in connection with illegal dumping of hazardous waste on federal land.

Officials said groundwater may have been contaminated.

"More than 130 tons of contaminated material has already been removed from an illegal dump on Bureau of Land Management land 11 miles north of Hamer."

The Environmental Protection Agency ordered Larsen Farms Inc. in August to remove asbestos-contaminated material it says the potato processor dumped on BLM land. And the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare also is expected to issue a notice of violation against Larsen Farms, charging it with 28 violations of state water quality laws.

"It's going to be very expensive," said spokeswoman Armina Nolan of the Environmental Protection Agency. More than \$50,000 has already been spent on cleanup, she said.

BLM officials told a legislative committee earlier this week that illegal dumping remains a major problem in Idaho. They estimated that there are currently 500 illegal dumps on government land throughout the state.

"We do have a tremendous load of toxic waste coming through, and it's cheaper for a manufacturer to dump it than to pay to have it disposed of properly," bureau hydrologist Carl Gephardt said. "Illegal midnight dumping is going to occur more frequently as our hazardous materials laws come up."

At the Clark County site so far, 660 bags of insulation containing asbestos have been removed from the 30-acre gravel pit that also contained empty pesticide containers, liquid and solid fuel by-products, household waste and animal manure.

In addition, BLM officials found 430 cubic yards of rotten potatoes, enough to fill about 45 dump trucks.

Aerial photographs also showed a manmade ditch connecting the gravel pit to three waste water ponds at Larsen's nearby potato processing plant.

Blaine Drews, a water quality specialist for the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality, said proposed state citations against an unnamed Clark County company include illegal dumping, improper disposal of waste and possible contamination of groundwater. But he would not identify Larsen Farms, the only major manufacturing plant in the county, because the notice has yet to be issued.

Groundwater below the illegal dump has not been tested because there are no wells there. But the state found contamination in groundwater below the processing plant. manganese levels there were 35 times higher than state standards.

"We have data that shows certain operations may have contaminated groundwater," Drews said.

Blaine Larsen, principal owner of Larsen Farms and Earth Sciences Ltd. of Pocatello, which he hired to handle the cleanup.

Idaho Falls attorney Kevin Sullivan said Wednesday that Larsen Farms had hired consultants two years ago to conduct an environmental audit and was given "a clean bill of health."

"They were not aware of the problem initially because a third party contractor told them there wasn't a problem," Sullivan said. "Once they became aware of the problem they have made every effort to resolve it."

### Parks and Recreation needs new member

### Twin Falls residents can get rid of leaves starting Saturday

**TWIN FALLS** - Area residents can get rid of those pesky autumn leaves and help the environment too starting Saturday.

All they'll have to do is leave their leaves at one of three stations the city has set up to collect them, said Twin Falls Sanitation Inspector Sherry Jeff. The city will use the leaves for composting in city land, Jeff said.

For the composting to work, the leaves must be left unbagged in the three areas, she said. She urged residents to bring only their leaves - not other yard wastes - to the three areas.

People can take their leaves to the west side of Harry Barry Park, Harmon Park at Harmon Park Avenue, and on Sixth Avenue West just east of the Animal Shelter, Jeff said. The areas for dumping the leaves will be clearly marked, she said.

Residents can dump the leaves for four weeks starting Saturday. Those who wish to bag their leaves still can do so and the city trash hauler, Parks and Sons Inc., will pick them up.

But leaves picked up in bags will be taken to the county landfill. A big reason for composting leaves is to save space in the landfill.

### Idaho truckers slow to apply for new commercial licenses

**BOISE** - Idaho truckers are being encouraged to apply for their Commercial Driver's Licenses, or CDLs, well in advance of the April 1, 1991, deadline.

Idaho Transportation Department officials say they fear an onslaught of late applications will swamp their offices in the spring.

Drivers who apply after January may not receive their licenses before the deadline and they won't be able to drive legally until their applications are processed.

### Today is deadline to register for Nov. 5 Twin Falls election

**TWIN FALLS** - Today is the last day city residents can register to vote in the Nov. 5 city election.

City residents who want to register can do so at City Hall or the Twin Falls County Clerk's office in the County Courthouse, said Sharon Bryan of the city clerk's office.

City Hall and the county clerk's office will stay open until 8 p.m. for people to register, Bryan said.

To register, voters must be 18 years old and must have lived in the city of Twin Falls for at least 30 days, she said.

On election day, the polls will open at noon and close at 8 p.m. Absentee voters have until Monday, Nov. 4, to vote, Bryan said.

### 2 men enter guilty pleas in Minidoka County drug cases

**RUPERT** - Two defendants in a slew of drug indictments handed up in August by a Minidoka County grand jury have pleaded guilty.

Darwin Carter and Russell A. Frazier entered those pleas before 5th District Judge William Hart on Monday, Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. said.

Both men are charged with delivering marijuana.

A third case set to begin this week was transferred to Cassia County and a fourth was postponed to give the defendant's attorney more time to prepare, Creason said.

Drug cases in Minidoka and Cassia counties stemming from grand jury indictments there are scheduled to continue through the end of the year.

# Health and Welfare rejects activist's petition

**BOISE** - The state Board of Health and Welfare has rejected the petition of Twin Falls podiatrist and nuclear activist to deny state air quality permits for two proposed radioactive waste facilities at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But while approving those permits over the objections of Peter Rickards on Thursday, the board in a narrow vote effectively expanded the ability of citizens to challenge issuances of such permits in the future.

"It's a thing that has people concerned in

the state," board member David Mead of Twin Falls said.

"I agree," member Donna Parsons of Nampa said. "I'm for a more liberal approach."

It was unclear exactly how much the opportunity for citizen appeals had been expanded, although it appeared citizen appeals will now be more likely as the potential health threat from the facility increases.

During a tedious review of the findings

and conclusions from a formal top bearing on Rickards' appeal last March, the board adopted with only minor modifications the recommendations of hearing officer Jerry Jensen.

Rickards had claimed that the Energy Department was not using the most effective technology to prevent radioactive emissions in its facilities to dispose of radioactive water from INEL's test reactor area and restore barrels of radioactive waste in a new storage facility.

Jensen found that in most cases Rickards' claims either were unsupported by the evidence or were factual but of no

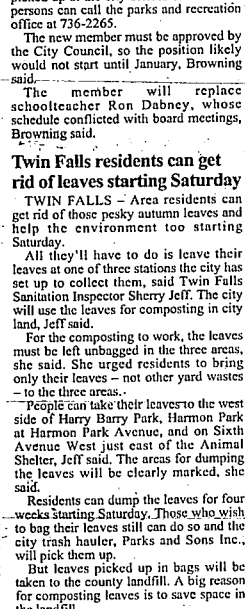
consequence to the validity of issuing the air quality permits.

Rickards maintained, however, that the permits should at least be delayed until the current environmental assessment of the INEL's overall long-term waste management program is completed.

He contended that environmental assessment is required before any new waste management facilities could be built. By granting the permits before its completion, the board was abetting the INEL's illegal act, he argued.

The board agreed it had no direct

# Teacher, classmates lend helping hands to quadriplegic student

**BUIH** - Children used to snicker as wheelchair-bound Leslie Clark and two other disabled students traveled through school hallways to their isolated trailer.

Now some of those children are now Leslie's classmates. They laugh at her mischievousness and vie to assist her.

Popplewell second-grade teacher Norma Kinyon helped make that transformation by bringing Leslie into her class full-time.

Idaho Parents Unlimited Inc.'s board of directors has given Kinyon its 1991 Outstanding Individual Award for "improving the quality of life for a person with a disability." Kinyon received a plaque in Boise Saturday.

Leslie, 13, is a quadriplegic with cerebral palsy.

Before Leslie joined Kinyon's class she would spend most of her time with two

other disabled children in a portable classroom outside the school. The three children would pick up their lunches in the cafeteria and take them back to the trailer to eat.

"She would fuss, fuss, fuss," said Leslie's mom, Diane Clark. "She didn't want to go to school."

When Leslie entered second grade two years ago, she occasionally attended Kinyon's class, and Kinyon noticed the girl perked up around other children. Kinyon started having her students take turns helping Leslie learn when they finish their own work. Kitty McNeil, Leslie's full-time aide, adapted the curriculum so that Leslie could understand and respond.

Last year, Leslie moved into Kinyon's class full time.

Third-grade teacher Elaine Conner has Leslie in her class this year along with some of the girl's former classmates. They are continuing Kinyon's system.

Leslie sits in a special chair, with a cord tied around her to keep her from sliding out.

The children held Leslie's hand while they together cut pictures out of a magazine and pasted them on construction paper.

Virtually everything she does in class is done with help from a peer tutor.

Leslie can't speak, but she has other ways of expressing herself.

"I hold out my hand," said Kara Lively, 8, who is Leslie's cousin and classmate. "If she looks away, that's yes. If she looks at the hand, it's no."

On Thursday, when asked whether she sometimes gets the other kids in trouble she quickly turned her head away from an outstretched hand. She grinned broadly.

Leslie's impromptu chortling sometimes starts a wave of laughter through the classroom.

"She's a real ham," Librarian Priscilla

# Idaho Grangers hear debate over 1 Percent Initiative

**TWIN FALLS** - The debate over the proposed 1 Percent Initiative came to the Idaho Grange convention Thursday, when one of the initiative's chief backers faced off against a local legislator.

Former state Sen. Rachel Gilbert, vice president of the Idaho Property Owners Association, called the initiative a simple tool to force all levels of government to limit their spending. Rep. Jim Kempton, R-Albion, said the initiative is flawed and the wrong way to solve a real problem.

The problem, both agreed, is overreliance on property taxes.

The initiative, if approved by a majority voters in November 1992, will limit property taxes to 1 percent of the property's actual market value. Any taxes in excess of 1 percent would have to be approved by two-thirds of the registered voters in a given city, county or other taxing district.

Kempton assailed the two-thirds rule.

### AMC Theatres experiments with newsreels at movies

AMC Theatres, the folks who brought you sixplexes and those fifty armed-revolutionary idea newsreels. Produced in conjunction with CNN, the 10-minute programs are currently playing before the feature attraction on many of AMC's 1,600 screens.

Before the growth of television, newsreels — short films dealing with current affairs — were shown before the feature movie and were seen by more than 40 million Americans a week.

"Originally we were showing cartoons, which people said they were getting sick of," AMC's Marjelen Fenton says. "We did a survey and the majority of people said they wanted to see newsreels."

Unlike the newsreels of the '30s and '40s, the current crop isn't produced specifically for theaters. Most of the material is recycled from CNN stories — sometimes several months old — already broadcast on the tube. "We can't afford to go out and shoot original material on film for the theaters," CNN's Rick Salcedo admits.

Because the newsreels run for three months before they're changed, Salcedo chooses stories with the longest shelf life.

Recent examples: the plight of the American Indian, roller-blading and the popularity of discount shopping malls. They're re-edited, given new titles and new narration and since all the CNN material is shot on tape, the stories must be transferred to 35-mm film.

The newsreels are rotated like the films. "Hopefully you won't see the same one twice," says AMC's Fenton. "They don't wear well."

# Tips help kids have safe Halloween

There are things you can do to protect your child from being injured this Halloween.

Most Halloween injuries involve environmental hazards such as steps, uneven pavements and other obstacles that may cause falls in the dark. Flammable and curbs, mats and motorists who are unable to see are also dangerous.

The Magic Valley Safe Kids Coalition and the National Safe Kids Campaign offers the following tips to help make your children safe this Halloween injury free.

Falls are the leading cause of injury on Halloween. The fact that children wear costumes and walk in the dark in unfamiliar neighborhoods increases the risk of a fall. There are a few precautions you can take to reduce that risk.

- Apply face paint or cosmetics directly to the face. It is safer than loose-fitting masks that obstruct a child's vision. If a mask is worn be certain the mask fits securely. Cut the eye holes large enough to allow full vision.
- Give trick-or-treaters flashlights.
- Make costumes short enough to avoid tripping over them.
- Secure hats so they will not slip over children's eyes.
- Dress children in shoes that fit. Mom's heels or dad's work boots are not safe for trick-or-treaters.
- Allow children to carry only flexible knives, swords or other props. Anything they carry could hurt them if they fall.
- Teach children not to cut across yards. Lawn ornaments and clotheslines are invisible in the dark. Tell your children to stay on the sidewalks.

**Traffic injuries**  
Costumed kids walking through dimly lit streets are difficult for drivers to see. You can help make your kids more visible by doing the following:

- Decorate costumes with reflective tape.
- Decorate bags and sacks with reflective tape.
- Use Halloween costumes that are light or bright enough to make them more visible at dusk.
- It is especially important to remind children to practice traffic safety.
- Remind children to stop at all corners.
- Tell them to look left, right, left before crossing.
- Tell them never to dart out from between parked cars.
- Motorists driving on Halloween, including parents and baby sitters who are chauffeuring kids around the neighborhood, need to take precautions.
- Slow down in residential neighborhoods.
- Obey all traffic signs and signals.
- Watch for children walking in the street or on curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleyways carefully.
- Clean your headlights and make sure they work.
- Teach children to exit and enter the car on the curb side, away from traffic.
- Burns**  
Burns and fires are the second leading cause of preventable injury to children. By taking a few precautions, you may reduce your child's risk.
- Look for "flame resistant" la-

bels on costumes, masks, beards and wigs.

- Use fire-resistant material for all homemade costumes.
- Avoid costumes made out of flimsy material and outfits with big, baggy sleeves or billowing skirts.

These are more likely than lighter-fitting costumes to come in contact with an exposed flame such as a candle.

The Magic Valley Safe Kids Coalition and the National Safe Kids Campaign recommends adults do the following to help make Halloween a safer holiday.

- Accompany young children on their trick-or-treat sounds.
- Attach the name, address and phone number (including area code) of children under 12 to their clothes but not in an easily visible place.
- Teach your child his or her

phone number. Make sure your child has change for a phone call in case they have a problem away from home.

- Instruct children to travel only in familiar areas and along a pre-established route.

- Set a time for children to return home.

- Restrict their trick-or-treat visits to homes with porch or outside lights on.
- Remove breakable items or obstacles such as tools, ladders and children's toys from your steps, lawn and porch.

- Keep candle lit jack-o'-lanterns away from landing or doorsteps where costumes might brush against the flame.

- Tell children to bring their treats home before eating them. Parents should check treats to ensure that items have not been tampered with and are safely sealed.

Halloween is a time for fun. You can take the fright out of fright night and help protect your child by taking these precautions.

ATLANTA — The Atlanta Braves made it look easy for a change. Now comes the hardest part.

The Braves breezed within one game of the World Series championship Thursday night, blowing away Minnesota 14-5 when Lonnie Smith and David Justice homered again and Mark Lemke hit two more triples.

Justice drove in five runs, Smith became the first player since Reggie Jackson in 1977 to homer in three straight Series games and Brian Hunter also homered as Atlanta ripped 17 hits in taking a three games-to-two edge.

It was the third-highest score in Series history and the biggest offensive show in 31 years, since the New York Yankees beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 16-3 in Game 2 of 1960. It followed two straight games in which the Braves won in their final at-bat on close plays at the plate, and it gave the 50,878 fans one last chance to chop, chant and cheer. They did it all night in a three-hour celebration.

"This being the last home game of the season, we felt we owed the fans something," Ron Grant said after getting three hits and scoring three times. "This is the kind of game we needed. We needed to break out."

Now, though, the Braves have to leave the Southern comfort for Minnesota's great indoors as they aim for their first Series championship since they were in Milwaukee in 1957. Minnesota is 0.9 in Series road games and the Twins have lost 14 straight dating to the 1925 Series, when the franchise was in Washington, but they are 6-0 at home in the Metrodome, including two wins last week.

"We know it's going to be tough," Justice said. "There's a different team at home. Now they'll have the DH. But I think we can win one of two up there."

The Braves became the eighth World Series team to win three in a row after dropping the first two. Six of those previous seven teams went on to win the title — the glaring exception being the 1987 St. Louis Cardinals, who went to Minnesota and got stung twice by the Twins in the only World Series where the home team won every game.

"All I know is it's the same scenario

setting up as in 1987." Twins manager Tom Kelly said. "Hopefully, it will be the same thing."

Steve Avery, the NL playoff MVP, will face Scott Erickson in Game 6 Saturday night. They were the starters in Game 3, and neither got a decision on a day the Braves won 5-4 in 12 innings.

The Braves led 5-0 after five innings before the Twins chased a suddenly wild Tom Glavine with three runs in the sixth.

Atlanta broke it open with a six-run seventh triggered by Smith's leadoff homer, and added three more in the eighth with

Hunter's homer putting an exclamation point on the evening.

Justice's homer, off the top of the left field fence and just beyond Dan Gladden's leap, touched off a four-run burst in the fourth that saw the Braves hit for the cycle in a span of only five batters. The spurt featured a single that hit a runner, a triple off Chili Davis' glove in right field and Rafael Belliard's rally-capping RBI double.

Atlanta added a run in the fifth on Justice's RBI grounder, giving Glavine two more runs than he got in his previous three postseason starts combined.

But Glavine, after pitching like a 20-game winner for five innings, suddenly fell apart in the sixth.

And it was Glavine, not the Twins' hitters, who was the biggest culprit — he walked four batters, including two with the bases loaded.

Kent Mercker relieved with the bases still loaded, one out and Atlanta ahead 5-2.

He got an RBI groundout from Kent Hrbek, now 0-for-6 with runners in scoring position in the Series, but the Braves escaped.

## Hits that sparked romp not all that impressive

ATLANTA — The Launching Pad lived up to its name at last, rockets flying in every direction, but the two that got the bombardment started could just as easily have fizzled out.

Two catchable balls — a homer that plunked off the yellow rim of the fence and a triple that ticked off a glove — sparked Atlanta's 14-5 romp over Minnesota Thursday night.

They won't go in the record book as errors, but both of the Braves' big hits in their four-run fourth inning of Game 5 could just as easily have been tuckered away by the Twins, changing the course of the game.

Instead, the Twins were left to think about the ones that got away in Atlanta-Fulton



County Stadium and the two games they must win to come back at the Metrodome.

The fourth inning began innocently enough in a scoreless game as Ron Gant singled to left. Dave Justice, a left-handed hitter, then lofted the first pitch to him by

Kevin Tapani to the opposite field. Left fielder Dan Gladden ran back to the fence with a chance of catching the ball, but he mistimed his leap slightly, jumping too soon. As his glove came down from the top of the fence, the ball bounced off the yellow edge and bounded over for a two-run homer.

"I knew I hit it well," Justice said. "I was saying, 'Don't catch it.' I didn't think it was a home run. I thought it was going to bounce (back) off the wall."

It was the first of three homers by Atlanta in the ballpark known as The Launching Pad, where balls seem to fly out at an altitude of 1,057 feet, highest in the majors.

Sid DREAM followed with a walk but was out going to second when he was clipped on the heel by Greg Olson's ground single.

Mark Lemke, making a strong bid for the

MVP award, drove a deep shot to right-center that Chili Davis tracked down at the wall after a long run. But Davis, a designated hitter all year for Minnesota who was making his first start in the outfield since Sept. 26, 1990, had the ball glance off his glove just before he crashed into the wall.

"When I got there, I thought I had it," Davis said. "I nicked the glove. I thought I had a chance to double up Olson."

Kirby Puckett picked up the ball, but threw it too late to get Lemke as he pulled into the third with the first of his two triples in the game. Rafael Belliard then doubled down the left-field line, driving in Lemke and completing the cycle. "Chili must have run a long way for that ball," Olson said. "He almost made a great catch. He doesn't, I look great, and Lemke looks great."

## BSU, Nevada agree to 4-year series; starting date undecided

BOISE — Boise State University and University of Nevada officials have agreed on a new four-year home-and-home football series, but whether it will begin in 1993 or 1994 remains up in the air.

"We will definitely be playing by 1994 with the hope of continuing it indefinitely," Boise State athletic director Gene Bleymaier said Wednesday.

Unbeaten Nevada hosts 10th-ranked Boise State in Reno on Saturday in the final Big Sky Conference meeting between the Wolf Pack and Broncos.

Nevada moves to the Division I-A Big West Conference next season.

Nevada originally agreed to play in Boise in 1993 and '95, with Boise State to play in Reno in '94 and '96. But Bleymaier said scheduling problems made that impossible. "We're cooperating and we're trying to work it out," he said.

The two schools couldn't reach an agreement to play next year, but Boise State is one Big Sky school Nevada wants to keep on its schedule.

"The community of Boise, we have some strong ties with that community and that university," said Chris Ault, Nevada athletic director and head football coach.

What seemed to have swayed this year's preseason selections, however, is the perpetual motion of NCAA Division I recruiting by assistant coaches. As soon as the "fall" portion of the open season hit the calendar, CSI started getting heavy visitations from those coaches.

First, they knew that Trenkle and CSI usually have a pretty good amount of talent and, second, a lot of them knew

that Craig Tyson had brought his not inconceivable talents to the Eagles.

Once the NCAA recruiters started seeing the Eagles on the floor, they began to realize that Trenkle had amassed a rather impressive group of young men.

In fact, so many impressive young men that even today Trenkle isn't sure how to proceed with putting this team together: more on that later.

# Renewed worries about economic health spook stocks

**NEW YORK** — Stock prices staged a broad retreat Thursday, faced with new signs of economic weakness.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials dropped 24.60 points to 3,016.32, extending its loss since the start of the week to 60.83 points.

Declining issues outpaced gainers by more than 2 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange.

Big Board volume came to an estimated 178.99 million shares as of 4 p.m. EDT, against 185.43 million at the same point in the previous week.

The Commerce Department reported that new factory orders for durable goods took an unexpectedly large 3.2 percent drop in September.

Separate government data showed a 29.000 percent increase in initial claims for state unemployment insurance during the week of Oct. 12.

The two sets of figures provided scant encouragement to investors who had been looking for signs that the economy's bid to recover from the recession was gathering strength.

Meanwhile, hopes on Wall Street that the Federal Reserve might take further steps to stimulate the economy have so far gone unfulfilled.

Harley-Davidson plunged 1 1/4 to 40 1/2 after falling 6 1/4 the day before. Late Wednesday the company issued its third-quarter report, showing an earnings gain sharply below analyst expectations.

The stock soared from as low as 13 1/2 late last year to a recent peak of 63 1/2 on excitement over heavy demand for the company's motorcycles. When an earnings disappointment hit, analysts said, it prompted a rush of selling to cash in profits on the shares.

Citigroup led the active list, down 1/4 at 10 1/2 and trading at 10-year lows for the second straight session. The stock has been under

heavy pressure since last week, when the bank holding company reported a large third-quarter loss and suspended its dividend.

## Measure would allow abortion by state statute

SEATTLE — Washington citizens vote Nov. 5 on an abortion initiative that backers call "a harbinger for the nation" and foes lambaste as a radical expansion of abortion rights.

Abortion rights activists, anticipating that the U.S. Supreme Court will declare abortion no longer protected by the Constitution, are pushing for passage of a citizen initiative that would permit abortion by state law.

There already is a 21-year-old state law permitting abortion, but abortion rights activists consider it too restrictive because it requires spousal consent and contains a residency requirement, among other things.

The citizen attempt to preempt an expected Supreme Court reversal or modification of the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision is not the first. Nevada voters last year, by a 2-1 margin, approved a similar measure.

Meanwhile, legislatures in at least two states, Connecticut and Maryland, recently put into statute abortion rights provided under the Roe v. Wade decision. The decision said a woman's right to privacy includes the right to an abortion unless the fetus is determined to be "viable" or capable of surviving outside the womb.

### Washington State initiative has 4 major provisions

OLYMPIA — Here are the main elements of Initiative 120, authorizing abortion by state law:

- Abortions are permitted in cases where the fetus could not survive for long outside the womb without "extraordinary medical measures," or an abortion is needed to save the "life or health" of the woman.
- A fetus "unable to survive outside the womb," "viability," means "the point in the pregnancy when, in the judgment of the physician ... there is a reason-

able likelihood of the fetus' sustained survival outside the uterus without extraordinary medical measures."

The standard under which fetus viability or risk to the mother is decided is the "good faith judgment" of the physician performing the abortion.

- The state cannot refuse to fund abortions for low-income women if it provides other services related to pregnancy or maternity care. In effect, it would guarantee the current state practice of funding abortions for low-income women.

"We think we will send a message to the nation that people want the right to choose no matter what the Supreme Court might want," said Belle Taylor-McGhee, a spokeswoman for the Yes On 120 Campaign. She said women also realize that Washington could become one more haven for those seeking abortions should the high court strike down abortion rights and a flood of states then outlaw the practice.

Backers, who have raised nearly \$1 million and are outstanding foes by about six to one, are confident of victory.

They note Washington voters in 1970 passed the nation's first referen-

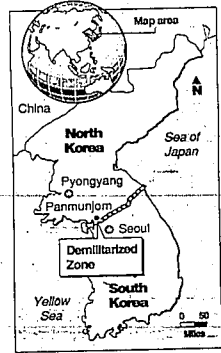

## North Korea agrees to work toward unity with South

SEATTLE — South Korea — North Korea, whose 1950 invasion of South Korea started a war that has never formally ended, agreed Thursday to start trying to overthrow its neighbor and accepted a framework for seeking reconciliation.

Although specific language remained to be worked out, North Korea also pledged to release prisoners and to work toward uniting millions of Koreans separated since the Korean Peninsula was divided after World War II.

Officials of both sides hailed the agreement as historic and expressed hope for more progress at the next round of high-level talks in Seoul in December. But differences between the rivals are wide-ranging and mutual distrust is deep. Negotiations on a single document could take many months.

Both Koreas have been under pressure from their allies to defuse tensions on the heavily militarized peninsula, long considered a flash-point for hostilities in northeast Asia.

It was the second move toward peace on

long-standing Asian conflicts in as many days. On Wednesday, the four warring factions of Cambodia signed a peace treaty that is designed to end a 13-year-old civil war and bring free elections under U.N. supervision in 18 months.

The Korean agreement came in talks held in North Korea's capital, Pyongyang, between the prime ministers of the two Koreas, which have been bitterly divided into Communist North and capitalist South since 1945.

"Precious momentum for a breakthrough in the deadlocked talks has been generated," South Korean Prime Minister Chong Won-shik said at a dinner Thursday, according to South Korean press reports.

Chong and his North Korean counterpart, Yon Hyung Mok, presided over two negotiating sessions. The breakthrough came at an unscheduled working meeting early Thursday in which both sides agreed to a framework and some key items for a comprehensive accord on easing tensions.

"I believe that the South and North have now opened the door wide for all of their long-

standing mutual mistrust and confrontation," said Chong, who is to return to Seoul, the South Korean capital, on Friday.

Ahn Byung Su, spokesman for North Korea, described the developments as "very positive."

"I gave us hope that there will be progress at the next meeting," he said.

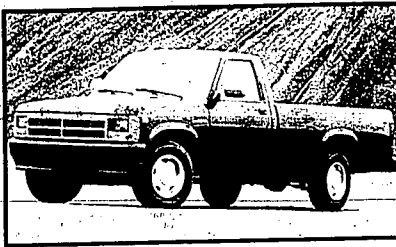

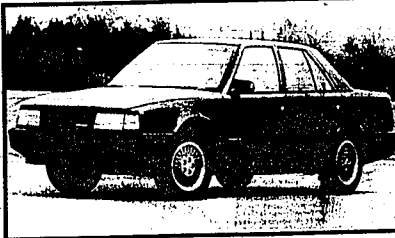

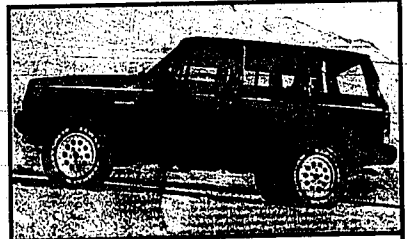

"How could you risk the club shift?" asked a kibitzer. "I would have thought it was the most dangerous lead of all."  
 "On the contrary," replied East. "My holding and the bidding made it the least dangerous of all."  
 After a long and painful study, South played a low heart from dummy and East won the king. Quickly perturbed when South won the ace, South then fiddled around trying for miracles, but there was no escape. He had to concede a diamond, and the slam suffered one down.

Why was East so nonchalant about his club shift? The bidding recd that West had the ace for the setting trick, so where was the danger? Trade South's club ace for West's diamond ace and see what happens with any return but a club. South wins and draws trumps, and his singleton club goes away on one of dummy's hearts. Making six spades.  
 With the club suit under control, East's club return was correct. It would beat the slam regardless of where the club ace might be. The question East asks himself is "Which of South's losers can disappear?" Clearly the answer is a club loser: one diamond discard should not help him at all.

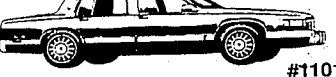

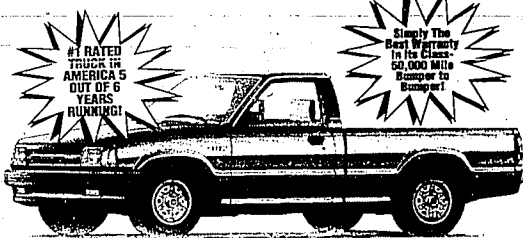

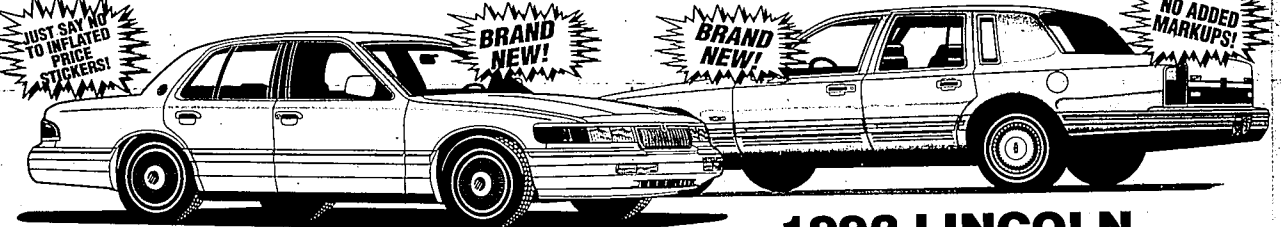

# Marcy Walker making the move from daytime to prime time in 'Palace Guard'

The debonair reformed jewel thief meets the ice blonde: not a bad concept for a movie, as Alfred Hitchcock demonstrated in 1955's "To Catch a Thief," which starred Cary Grant and Grace Kelly.

And maybe not a bad concept for a television comedy-adventure series, as executive-producer Stephen J. Cannell hopes to demonstrate in his new CBS Friday-night series, "Palace Guard," starring D.W. Moffett and Marcy Walker.

It has been reported that Grace Kelly in real life was far from the ice princess she usually portrayed on screen.

This is likewise true of Walker, whose career millions of daytime soap fans have followed over the past decade on both "All My Children" and "Santa Barbara."

On "Palace Guard," Walker's Christy Cooper is the public-relations chief of a hotel chain and a former movie star. "Movie star!" cracks Walker. "Yeah, sure! She made movies like "Seven Sluis for Hell" and "Karate Chopping Cuties."

Moffett plays Tommy Logan, a former thief who has been made the chain's security chief. A protesting Cooper is assigned to supervise him. "Isn't he a doll?" Walker gushes of her co-star.

"He's charming and handsome and intelligent, the cutest!" Then she jibes, "I told him if the show takes off he's going to be in Tiger Beat (a teen fan magazine)."

Walker's warm personality was a contributing factor to her rise to daytime soap superstar status. Most blondes hired on daytime soaps during the '80s had little more to offer than their looks.

"All My Children," which she joined in 1981, Walker's Liza Colby was initially a nasty spoiler in a teen

love triangle. Sensing her talent, the writers transformed Liza into a pained victim — her mother and her boyfriend had an affair. In 1984, Walker jumped to the new soap "Santa Barbara," where she played Eden Capwell Castillo.

Over the years, heroine Eden was sliced, diced and chopped by a million bad guys.

Only the intelligence of Walker's performance made the situations believable. She won a 1989 Daytime Emmy as Best Actress. She left the soap last spring to begin her current prime-time role.

"It was very, very hard for me to leave, because when you work with people 16 hours a day for years they become your family," Walker says.

Walker had one of the most unusual exits of any soap star. A chauffeur, played by Cannell himself, arrived in Santa Barbara to personally drive

Eden away.

"Wasn't that wild?" Walker says. "I like him a lot. Even with all his successes, he doesn't carry any attitude with him. He's a lovely family man. And he comes up with great concepts for series."

Walker tips that, despite their argumentative relationship, Tommy and Christy become romantically involved later in the season.

Walker, who was born in Paducah, Ky., and grew up all over the Midwest, has taken up residence in Vancouver (where "Palace Guard" is filmed) with her 2-year-old son, Taylor.

"It's a beautiful town, and the people are amazingly friendly," Walker says.

"It's someplace I don't want to leave, and I wasn't expecting that. I mean, you'd think you'd only feel that way about a place like Maui."

## CBS, NBC announce schedule changes

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS is moving its highly touted but low rated "Brooklyn Bridge" series to Wednesdays beginning Nov. 13.

"The Royal Family," starring the late comedian Redd Foxx, will be seen a half-hour later on the same night, the network said Tuesday. The 30-minute sitcom was pulled from its original time slot of 8 p.m. EST Wednesdays after Foxx suffered a fatal heart attack on the set two weeks ago.

Three episodes completed before Foxx's death will be broadcast beginning Oct. 30. CBS has not decided whether the series, which also stars Della Reese, will continue after the episodes are aired.

"Brooklyn Bridge," produced by "Family Ties" creator Gary David Goldberg, was one of CBS' most publicized new

series. In its current Friday night time slot, however, Goldberg's autobiographical program about growing up in 1950s Brooklyn earned poor ratings.

In the latest A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, "Brooklyn Bridge" finished 85th of 89 prime-time shows.

In other scheduling changes, NBC says it is dropping "Cover to Cover," a half-hour daytime series by NBC News, in its place beginning Monday will be "Classic Concentration," reruns of the game show.

"Cover to Cover," which premiered in July, was an informational program on women's lifestyles and interests. Two other news series: "A Closer Look" with Faith Daniels and "One on One With John Teah," remain on the network's daytime schedule.

Streisand has also dated Don Johnson and composer James Newton Howard, who are both eight years younger than she. Streisand's view is that younger men are "more in touch with their emotions." That she can more readily dominate a younger man is also a plus in her view.

# Beck: A good judge of 'Santa Barbara'

What's going on with John Beck's Judge David Raymond on "Santa Barbara"?

Judge Raymond, on the bench since June, appears to be eying D.A. Julia (Nancy Gräh) while ignoring his own wife. Besides attempting to clean up the mess left by former D.A. Keith Timmons, David Raymond looks like Julia's new love interest.

Until lately. Sore at ex-husband Mason, Julia is now having second thoughts. Mason is still in the picture, and who knows where Judge Raymond is going. Perhaps he's just the town's cleanup man, a judge who can't be bought.

The only member of the cast who lives in Santa Barbara and commutes, actor John Beck makes his soap debut after years in primetime, going back to "Nichols," the 1971 series with James Garner.

After living in four different houses over an eight-year period in Santa Barbara, the actor knows a little about the wealthy town and its huge Mexican population. He admits the soap has nothing to do with the town history, thinks that's a pity, and as the new actor in black robes, he keeps his mouth shut.

"I'm turning into an ogre as the judge," Beck explains. "I'm splitting up with my wife, and it looks like I don't care. I'm not too happy with that. Also my interest in Julia isn't working out. I really don't know where the judge is going."

Julia's Nancy Gräh, a show veteran, calls the shots on what Julia will or will not do. Often Beck's judge must change on the spur of the moment.

But Beck is fascinated by the work, the hard work, the use of every minute off camera, running lines or talking to walls. Keeping up is his problem. Jed Allen, known as C.C. Capwell since the soap began, urges patience: "Give yourself a year, John. Things fall into place."

In a new game, John Beck studies the genre, and he thinks the soap formula is way overdue for change. "All the soaps are shot in the same manner," says Beck. "All use too many closeups since most of the show is dialogue. But no one is changing. It's hard to get out of a rut, and I don't

blame the writers, directors and producers for sticking to formula. To do a show a day for 52 weeks is madness, yet no one blows sky high."

From the sound of it, the experienced actor might be directing some day. He recently made a low budget film by Joe Cardone with Katharine Ross, "A Climate for Killing," now on the video market, and wants to direct Cardone's next project, "A Rope of Sand," about a cop and an evil Indian medicine man.

Beck has ideas, and the hard, intensive work two and three days a week on "Santa Barbara" only sharpens his skills.

Watch him, a student of Woody Allen and of the skilled big screen

director Robert Wise, learn the soap ropes.

## NBC news shows shelved — for now

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC, facing continued low ratings for its "Expose" and "Real Life With Jane Pauley" series, temporarily threw in the towel for the two-half-hour Friday night news programs.

It said it is bringing back Andy Griffith's "Matlock" series in their place for the time being with a two-hour version of that higher-rated series that NBC put on the shelf after last season.

NBC's move came as it tried to shore up its schedule before the Oct. 31 start of the fall ratings "sweeps" race, a key period for local TV stations. They use the ratings results to set their advertising rates.

"Expose" and "Real Life" began last season as Sunday programs and also were ratings flops then. They were near the bottom of the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings last week, each averaging a 5.9. Each point represents 921,000 homes.

The shows now will be merged and return as an as-yet untitled one-hour series on Fridays, starting March 6, NBC said.

"NBC Nightly News" executive producer Steve Friedman, who had

NBC said the new program has been given a 52-week commitment

by the network.

But Tom Brokaw, who had co-anchored the "Expose" investigative series, won't return in the new effort.

He instead will appear next year in "Brokaw Reports," a series of prime-time specials on issues facing America in that election year.

Pauley, whose series profiled ordinary Americans, will co-anchor the new show with a colleague to be named later.

"Real Life" and "Expose" will have one more showing this fall on Nov. 1, when Pauley's show is entirely devoted to an interview with Candace Bergen, star of CBS' hit "Murphy Brown."

NBC News president Michael Gartner, in announcing what amounts to the first prime-time casualties of the season, said the merged shows would allow for more flexibility, particularly during breaking news.

"Our belief is that in their current half-hour formats, these programs are somewhat constricted and too narrowly defined," he said in a statement.
