WASHINGTON — New Mexico and Idaho House members Thursday introduced a Senate-backed version of legislation to open the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant for experimental storage of radioactive waste.

## Spring start on Singing Bridge job

TWIN FALLS — A four-lane bridge will be built beginning next spring to replace the Singing Bridge over Rock Creek. The Idaho Transportation Board this week approved the \$3 million bridge replacement project along with about \$102 million in other highway and bridge projects for next year, said Jim Carpenter, assistant district engineer of the Idaho Transportation Department.

The state's plans assume the House and Senate will iron out their differences soon on competing versions of the five-year federal highway bill they approved earlier this year.

Idaho's construction program is based on the state transportation department's estimate of how much money the state will receive from the federal government. The federal Surface Transportation Act expired Sept. 30 and a House-Senate conference committee is trying to work out a compromise bill to replace it.

# Common ground seen amid tough talk

MADRID, Spain — Israel, Jordan and the Palestinians, addressing the world audience, appeared to talk past each other at the Mideast peace conference. But beneath the tough talk lurked the hint of common ground.

On the other hand, Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa, the day's final speaker, was uncompromising.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, for instance, suggested a willingness to talk about territory. Jordanian Foreign Minister Kamal Abuzaber implied his country was ready to recognize the Jewish state, and Palestinian leader Arafat registered a willingness to live alongside Israel.

"Peace and the occupation of the land of others cannot coexist," he declared. "This means every inch of Arab land occupied by the Israelis by war and force — the Golan, the West Bank, Jerusalem and the Gaza Strip — must be returned in their entirety to their legitimate owners."

TWIN FALLS — A former Twin Falls police officer accused of sexually harassing four dispatchers says he never intended to offend anyone.

The four dispatchers say they were subjected to sexually suggestive statements and acts for several months while under DeVall's command.

Students also were asked if they'd skipped meals to lose weight during the week before the survey; 49 percent of all girls, and 73 percent of those thinking themselves fat, had done so.

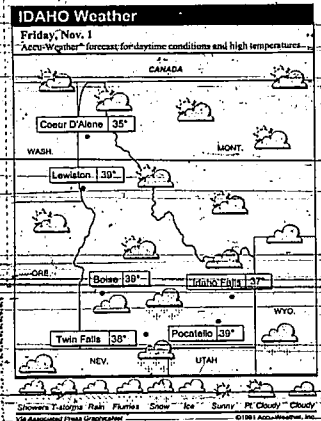
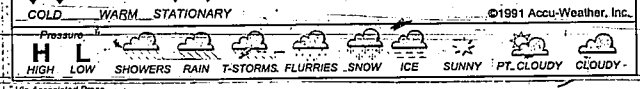
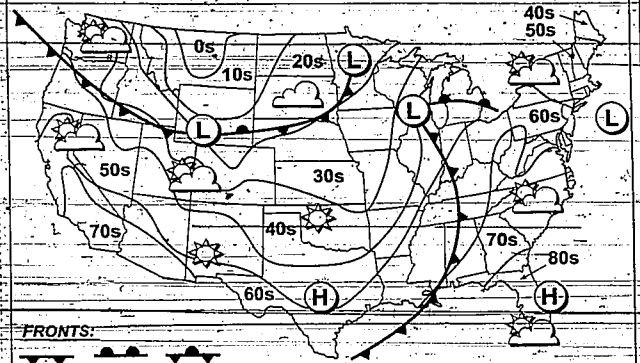

## Snow, rain fall across Midwest, Rockies

Mark Stubbs said all the women wanted was for the inappropriate behavior to stop and that they be protected from any retribution.  
But the city took about six weeks to respond and then investigated only after Stubbs wrote a letter to City Attorney Fritz Wenderlich on their behalf, Stubbs said.  
After an investigation, a disciplinary action report was given to Public Safety Director Paul Du Fresno, and DeValle was given a chance to respond before any disciplinary action was taken, Wenderlich said.  
Although the accusations contributed to his decision to quit, DeValle said he had other personal reasons for leaving.  
Wenderlich and Du Fresno said the city responded promptly to the situation, and officials handled it the best way they knew how.  
No city officials questioned could remember another sexual harassment complaint ever being lodged by a city employee.  
After they complained, the dispatchers told Stubbs the atmosphere at work became hostile, as other officers and supervisors became resentful, the tort claim says.  
The officers "avoided and would

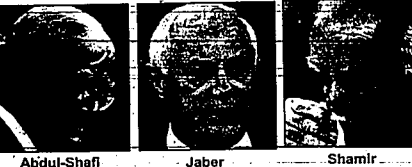
not talk to the claimants, except to make sarcastic and cruel remarks, or tell obscene stories, intending that the claimants hear those things," says the claim, which was written by attorney Tom Kershaw for Stubbs.  
Both attorneys interviewed all four dispatchers, Stubbs said.  
The ongoing harassment continued long after DeValle's departure, the claim says.  
On Aug. 18, Soliz opened her locker and it had been booby trapped so a number of items came crashing down and hit her on the head.  
The next day a man called her unlisted telephone number twice and refused to say who he was, according to the complaint.  
The dispatchers had hoped to handle the situation within the police department, but the city's inaction and the resulting hostile work environment left them with no choice but to file the complaint.  
Meanwhile, the Twin Falls Police Association has decided to drop Stubbs as its legal counsel to avoid the appearance of a conflict of interest.  
Association President Bill Haney said the group voted about a month ago to find another attorney because it did not want to appear to be taking sides in the controversy.

# New USAF uniform out

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Air Force is turning its back on polyester double knit and dropping a new 6-foot-2-inch uniform that reflects a "trim and tougher" military of the future, its leader said Thursday.  
Chief of Staff Merrill Meigs, sporting a prototype blazer and slacks, did a stiff walk-about for photographers and journalists.  
"I'm not the best model," the general said, as he pulled at the front of his three-button jacket to show its slimmer cut, new full lining and poly-wool blend fabric.  
Dropped from the old uniform were its collar insignia; four patch pockets; two epaulets, the name tags and pockets; the metal rank insignia and the officer's braid.  
Meigs pointed to his newly designed rank insignia - a broad row of tiny, silver-embroidered clouds.  
Meigs sported a name tag, three general's stripes - now located on the sleeve cuff.

Shamir even polite applause at the end of his half-hour speech. And the Israelis sat on their hands when Abdul-Shafi finished. A few applauded Abu-Jaber.  
And yet the Jordanian foreign minister quoted an appeal for peace by Albert Einstein, a Jew and committed Zionist, and the Arabs agreed to begin Friday's session two hours early to ensure Shamir could get back to Israel in time for the Jewish Sabbath.  
Shamir, who lost his family to the Nazis, recounted in his speech the expulsion of Jews from Spain, the Holocaust and the attack by seven Arab states on Israel in 1948.  
He blamed the Arabs for permitting hundreds of thousands of Palestinians to suffer in squalid refugee camps and said only Jews have lived without interruption in the land that is Israel.  
"Abu-Jaber, by contrast, focused on the 'new world' emerging and declared 'our innocence of the crimes against the Jewish people.'"  
He said the Palestinians and Jordan "have paid the price" of the passions unleashed by the Nazis. "God only knows the price we



continue to pay for the sins of others," he said.  
Abdul-Shafi, taking a tougher line, insisted on Jerusalem as the capital of a Palestinian state and an end to all Jewish settlements on lands once controlled by the Arabs.  
Even so, Shamir, Abu-Jaber and Abdul-Shafi appeared to hint at conciliation.  
The Israeli leader seemed to open the door to considering a primary Arab demand - the return of land he did this indirectly by saying, "It will be regrettable if the mlks focus primarily and exclusively on territory" - perhaps indicating that could be one issue discussed.

left over from 45 years of nuclear weapons production.  
The agency also has proposed WIPP legislation, passed by the House Interior Committee earlier this year, is opposed by the Energy Department because of its strict controls on environmental standards governing the disposal of radioactive waste.  
The agency also has proposed a 4,200-ton limit placed by the House bill on drums of radioactive waste bound for WIPP.  
Rank-and-file members of the 435-person House may not be motivated to bring a WIPP vote to the chamber's floor this year because of a lawsuit filed by the state against the Energy Department, according to New Mexico Democratic Rep. Bill Richardson.  
Richardson opposes the Senate legislation.  
Sponsored by Richardson, Pennsylvania Democratic Rep. Peter Kostmayer, Utah Democratic Rep.

Wayne Owens, and three environmental groups, the lawsuit alleges that the Energy Department has failed to conduct a thorough study of New Mexico by testing radioactive waste at WIPP. The U.S. District Court of the District of Columbia on Nov. 16 will hold a hearing on the suit.  
"With the inauspicious kind of bit people have got the hang of on WIPP," said Richardson, "those like committee chairman, that deal with the legislation, they say, 'why do I have to act on this if it's going to be decided in a way other than legislation.'"  
But a spokesman for New Mexico Republican Sen. Pete V. Domenici said the lawsuit puts an imperative on Congress to pass WIPP legislation. If Congress has not passed legislation and the Energy Department wins the lawsuit, the work item will be sent to the House waste to WIPP without financial compensation and safety guarantees

to New Mexico.  
"If Congress does not do its job, nobody wins," said Ari Fleischer, a spokesman for Domenici.  
Domenici and New Mexico Democratic Sen. Jeff Bingaman this week sent a letter to twelve key House members - all on the three Energy panels with jurisdiction over WIPP - urging support for the Senate version of WIPP legislation.  
Subcommittees from the House Armed Services Committee and the House Energy and Commerce Committee, two out of three panels with jurisdiction over WIPP in that chamber, next week are expected to hold hearings and make recommendations on WIPP legislation.  
The House Armed Services Committee is expected to embrace the Senate version of the bill. An Energy and Commerce subcommittee will act on the House Interior Committee's version of the bill, a key congressional aide said.

# Kennedys under microscope as jury selection commences

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Seven months after a woman said she was raped by William Kennedy Smith, lawyers Thursday began questioning potential jurors about his famous family, from its scandals to its tragedies.

Smith watched intently and took notes during the questioning. "I'm innocent of the charges," Smith told hundreds of reporters as he entered the Palm Beach County Courthouse. "And today the court will begin to try to find six people who have an open mind, who will look at all the evidence in the case."

"I'm confident that when the process is completed, I'll be found innocent," he said. "I look forward to putting this behind me and getting on with my life and my career, which I miss a great deal."

The 31-year-old Georgetown medical school graduate, a nephew of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, was accompanied by his mother, Jean Kennedy Smith, aunt Patricia Lawford, sisters Amanda and Kym Maria, and his brother Stephen.

Smith is accused of raping a 30-year-old Florida woman at the Kennedy's Palm Beach estate March 30.

He and his attorneys contend the woman, who lives in Jupiter, consented to sex, then fabricated the accusation. If convicted, he could face 4 1/2 years in prison.

The woman who accuses Smith of rape was not in court. Black grilled potential jurors about what they knew of the highly publicized case and their attitudes about the Kennedys.

"Basically, I know a woman came forward and said she was raped," said 44-year-old Priscilla Roper.

Through nearly 45 minutes of questioning, she said she followed the assassinations of John and Robert Kennedy, she accident at Chappaquiddick, the health of a family patriarch, Rose Kennedy, watched a recent television miniseries on the Kennedys and knew "some of the Kennedy children used drugs."

# EPA plan attacks pesticides

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency unveiled on Thursday a position-oriented strategy to manage pesticides that pose a risk of contaminating the nation's groundwater supplies.

The strategy also gives states a primary role in tailoring programs to local conditions.

Current findings do not indicate a public-health problem, said F. Henry Habicht II, EPA's deputy administrator.

"However, monitoring studies, including EPA's national pesticide survey of drinking water wells released last November, have shown that pesticide residues are occurring in some public and private wells in various locations around the country," Habicht said.

The survey found pesticide residues in 10 percent of the wells tested, but less than 1 percent exceeded health levels.

But the fact that residues are appearing, Habicht said, "makes it essential to focus on preventive approaches to minimize threats to groundwater resources associated with pesticides."

The strategy issued Thursday, while not a regulatory measure, describes how EPA intends to regulate some pesticides in the future. Habicht said it is too early, however, to say what chemicals could be targeted.

If the agency determines a pesticide has or is likely to contaminate groundwater under normal use, and that labeling and other national-level restrictions are insufficient to ensure adequate protection, EPA could require state management plans as a condition of continued use.

# Bush checks damage to home

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will fly to his Maine vacation home on Saturday, after inspecting a political trip to inspect heavy damage from storm-driven waves that battered his beloved seafaring property.

"It's not good news," Bush said Thursday before leaving on what would be an abbreviated trip to Texas.

Bush's home on Walker's Point was one of many that suffered severe damage when a powerful Atlantic storm swept the coast on Wednesday.

There is extraordinary damage inside the home and the other buildings," of the Walker's Point compound. "There are reports of windows and walls being caved in and a disastrous situation there with regard to their personal property," Bush's press secretary, Marjorie G. White, told reporters.

Another White House source said the first floor of the house was partially washed away and that water had covered the entire Bush property with his house sticking up like an island. The driveway to the house was impassable, littered with boards and debris tossed up by the powerful waves. Bush's tennis court also was covered with seaweed, rocks and branches and shingles were torn away from a Secret Service guard house.

In his last start, Unbridled finished second to arch-Please see BREEDERS/A6

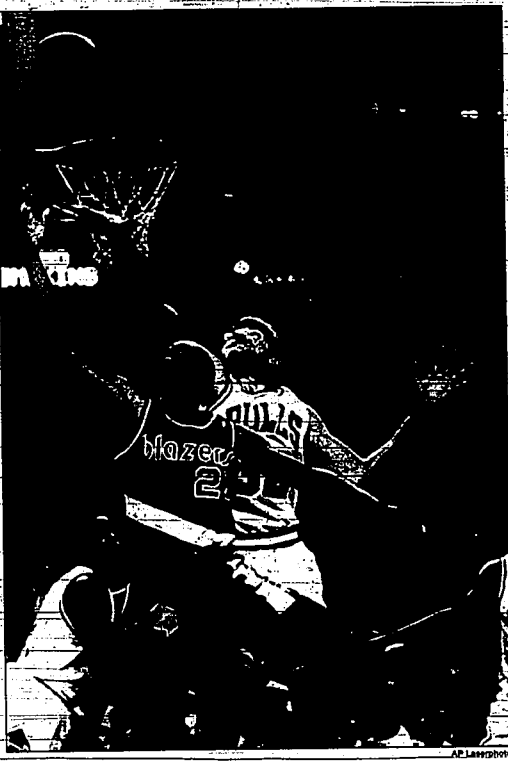

After a dream championship series that pitted Magic against Michael, the NBA opens its new season Friday night with Johnson among the missing and Jordan among the mysterious.  
Johnson is missing, all right, recovering from the flu and scheduled to sit out the Los Angeles Lakers' opener in Houston. "I'm just resting because of the fatigue and as a precaution," he said.  
"I'm not aching or hurting. I just don't feel like myself."  
The Jordan mystery concerns recurring tendonitis in his left knee. Much to the relief of the champion Chicago Bulls, Jordan said Thursday he does not anticipate surgery to deal with the problem. ## Success of Bruins' defense seems natural to coach

the field) was seeing their offense set and then yelling out 'watch screen, watch draw, watch sweep' and usually, in the defense of their established preferences."  
Jund said another strength of this defense is its willingness to go through the time-consuming and monotonous film watching. "When I first came to Twin Falls, we might get eight or 10-up to watch the first film but usually they were gone before long and didn't come back. So during a game you'd ask a player why he wasn't prepared for a screen or draw or something because they were in a certain set. They didn't

### U of I has right to demand quality from its applicants

The University of Idaho is thinking about toughening up its admission requirements. Though the Moscow school already has the toughest standards in the state, it's not likely to be invited to join the Ivy League soon.

If the U of I faculty and the State Board of Education approve, Idaho will abandon its old stipulation that applicants must be among the top 75 percent of their high school graduating classes—reasoning that such a requirement is practically meaningless.

Instead, you'll need a 2.5 grade-point average in high school to be admitted to Idaho, along with at least a 19 on the American College Test or at least 830 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test.

That's an improvement, but keep in mind that you get 600 on the SAT for doing little more than showing up and signing your name.

And it begs the question: Does somebody who can't meet such basic requirements even belong in college? We don't think so, and we think it's time the state's higher-education establishment realized it.

The simple fact of the matter is that lower-admission requirements devalue education. They demean the quality of instruction for the best students and they force colleges and universities to spend their scarce resources on remedial education, a job that should belong to high schools.

The crisis in American higher education extends beyond the fact that students aren't learning what they need to know to hold their own in an increasingly competitive world. It goes to the heart of what they're being taught.

They're being taught what their Japanese counterparts learn in the 10th grade.

Rigorous education does take place on the Moscow campus, and on campuses in Boise, Pocatello, Twin Falls and elsewhere in Idaho, but not enough of it. We, as a state and as a society, have lost our taste for demanding the best of our best and brightest.

That's a recipe for national disaster. Everybody in this country should have an opportunity to go to college, but nobody should have the right. The quality of what students learn at Moscow is a direct proportion to the quantity of what they learned before they got there.

The university not only has a right to just say no, it has the responsibility to do so.

As members of the Jerome County Historical Society we urge our friends and neighbors to support us in our efforts to form a museum district in Jerome.

The maximum levy allowed for the museum district would be \$15 for each \$50,000 of assessable valuation per year. Many other counties in Idaho already receive tax money to support their museums but we have not been eligible for such help and that is unfair.

Formation of the museum district will eliminate the unfairness and make it possible to hire a professional person with expertise in the museum field to supervise the development of the museum and the acquisition of grants for its construction.

We have worked 10 years to build an agriculture museum that will preserve our history and tell the story of agriculture on the North Side Irrigation project in Jerome County. Thanks to the Bureau of Land Management, which has made almost 100 acres of land available, and many other individuals and businesses many of the obstacles to success have been met, except the building and parking lots.

Idaho Farm and Ranch Museum is planned as an educational institution that will be visited by busloads of school children as part of their study of Idaho history. It is estimated as many as 1,000 cars per day will visit the museum, which translates into a positive economic impact on the county. We feel a maximum of \$15 per \$50,000 of assessable valuation per year is a very small amount to pay to get a project started that will be such a big economic benefit to Jerome County.

We thank the many, many people, businesses, and agencies who have helped us in the process of developing the museum.

Now we ask the people of Jerome County to become partners in the final phase of our project to preserve and interpret our rich and unique history.

## Lewiston woman teacher of the year

**LEWISTON** — Lewiston educator Margaret Duncan is the "heart and soul" of her school, and has been selected Idaho's teacher of the year.

Mrs. Duncan, 48, a sixth-grade teacher at McGhee Elementary School, choked back tears during the Wednesday ceremony.

Mrs. Duncan is Idaho's nominee, with a national teacher of the year to be announced in April.

The Idaho award includes a \$1,000 honorarium from the Legislature, a \$500 honorarium from the Neighbors of Woodcraft, a copy of "Britannica World Data Annual," and an opportunity to speak to the Legislature.

Mrs. Duncan has taught for about 25 years, working in the Lewiston School District since 1973.

## Trio convicted of fraud, tax evasion

Three people connected with a Garden City book store and motel face lengthy prison terms and millions of dollars in fines for their conviction on federal tax evasion and fraud conspiracy charges.

U.S. District Judge Spencer Letts in California has set Jan. 6 for sentencing of Betty Osco, 63, of Boise, her son William Osco, 43, of Malibu, Calif., and their longtime business partner Robert Lova, 44, of Garden City.

The three were convicted earlier this week in federal court in California in what prosecutors said was a scheme through which William Osco concealed assets and skimmed money from the Niks and Naks Bookstore and Desert Skies Motel in Garden City.

## Snake aquifer declared 'sole source'

**IDAHO FALLS** — The federal government has declared the Snake River Plain Aquifer a "sole source aquifer," a decision that could have significant effects on federally funded projects in the area.

The Environmental Protection Agency made the declaration earlier this month after a nine-year study.

The agency determined that 225,000 Idahoans, more than a quarter of the state's population, rely on the aquifer as their sole or principle source of drinking water.

The designation will lead to tighter regulation of the 10,800-square-mile aquifer and the areas that drain into it. The government will have approved every federally assisted project in the drainage to make sure that it protects the quality of the ground water.

## Court upholds drunk driving sentence

**BOISE** — Seven drunken driving convictions justifies a prison term for the offender, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Thursday refused to change the prison sentence of one to five years ordered for Salomon Jimenez in an Ada County drunken driving case.

Jimenez asked to have the sentence reduced so he could take part in alcohol rehabilitation programs.

But the court said Jimenez has a long record of alcohol and drug-related offenses, including seven DUI convictions.

## Incumbents accept funds from vendor

**IDAHO FALLS** (AP) — Challenges in next week's Idaho Falls City Council election are blasting two incumbent councilmen who reportedly accepted re-election campaign contributions from a company the city is doing business with, apparently in violation of state law.

The Idaho Falls Post Register reported in its Thursday edition that Councilmen Wes Deist and Art Chandler each accepted \$250 from the political action committee of the International engineering and construction firm Morrison Knudsen Co. in San Francisco.

That deal would require council approval. State law prohibits public officials who exercise discretion in connection with contracts, purchases, payments or other pecuniary transactions of the government from soliciting, or agreeing to accept any monetary benefit from anyone known to take part in such transactions.

# Coeur d'Alene activist goes after Boise mayor

**LEWISTON** (AP) — Coeur d'Alene tax activist Ron Rankin is currently taking aim at Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne, saying there is little difference between the Republican tax-Senate candidate and Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings.

Kempthorne recently stepped out in opposition to the 1-Percent Initiative, which Rankin is promoting. Stallings, the state's 2nd Congressional District representative and Kempthorne's rival, also opposes the measure.

Kempthorne's GOP primary opponent, Boise stockbroker Milton Eppert, supports the tax.

The launching pad for Rankin's attack was a fund-raising letter in which Kempthorne accuses Stallings of being a "clone" of the (Sen.-Joseph) Bidens and (Sen. Edward) Kennedy and a pawn of the national union and Democrat leaders.

Says Rankin, "I'm not defending Stallings, because what he said about him is true. But what difference is there between him and a guy who throws in with the AFL-CIO, the IEA (Idaho Education Association) and the Democrat governor (Cecil Andrus)?"

All three have come out against the 1-Percent Initiative, Kempthorne contended he is not a one-issue candidate and the problem is federal budget

deficits, not local government spending.

"At the outset, some proponents of the 1 Percent have tried to establish that it's a litmus test but many, many disagree with that, including the honorable chairman of the 1 Percent Initiative, Sen. Steve Symms, who says that is not a litmus test for him and he is not a single-issue voter," Kempthorne said.

In past elections, Rankin's efforts against moderate Kootenai County Republicans have helped elect Democratic candidates in that region.

Asked whether he will actively work against Kempthorne's candidacy, Rankin said, "It's not a matter of actively going after him. It's a matter of what we are not going to do is tolerate somebody who claims to be a conservative, attacking the 1 Percent with impunity."

### Construction of single-family homes continues to rise

**BOISE** - Favorable economic factors continue to fuel Idaho's single-family home construction while commercial building took a slight upturn last month, First Security Corp. economist Kelly Matthews says.

Healthy job growth, low interest rates for mortgages and increased property values are keeping homebuyers active, he said.

The number of the single-family permits issued last month was 48 percent above September 1990. The construction value was \$36.1 million, 7 percent better than the same month last year.

Through the first nine months of this year, permits for 3,300 single-family homes have been issued statewide. That is 13 percent more than the 2,918 secured in the same period of 1990.

Commercial construction turned upward last month. But the increase was slight, and Matthews said the sector still is in a slump.

The total value of commercial building across Idaho last month was \$15.6 million, or 3 percent higher than September 1990.

## Symms: Bill undermines civil rights

**WASHINGTON** - Sen. Steve Symms defended his lonely vote against the Civil Rights Bill of 1991 Thursday, saying the compromise legislation passed by the Senate Wednesday would discriminate against employers and make it difficult for employees to sue for reverse discrimination.

"The bill violates the very premise of civil rights," the Idaho Republican said. Symms was one of five senators to vote

against the bill, the product of negotiations between the White House and Senate Republicans. It passed 93-5 and will go to the House Representatives, where approval is expected next week.

The legislation increases workers' opportunities to collect compensatory and punitive damages from employers for sexual or religious

discrimination. It also increases chances for workers to win anti-discrimination suits, a departure from several recent Supreme Court decisions in which the conservative court had limited those chances.

Symms complained that two key Supreme Court decisions will be overturned by the bill - one requiring a discrimination claimant to show more than statistical disparity to prove his claim and the other allowing an employer to defend a hiring decision on grounds the discrimination claimant would not have

been picked for the job under any circumstances.

But possibly most troubling, Symms said, was a section of the bill that he claimed would effectively prevent any court claims for so-called reverse discrimination - generally filed by white male workers contending they were denied jobs simply so a woman or a minority worker could be hired.

"An employer can say to an honest American worker, 'I don't care if you're qualified. I don't care if you're more

## DOE: No Ohio 10 candidates vie for 4 council seats

### waste transfer set for INEL

**WASHINGTON** - Contrary to earlier reports, the Department of Energy has not targeted the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to store nuclear waste from an Ohio nuclear facility, according to DOE officials.

In a letter dated Oct. 30, DOE Deputy Secretary Henson Moore reassured Idaho's Republican Sens. Steve Symms and Larry Craig that, "Despite any claims to the contrary, the department has no intention of shipping any of the waste presently at Fernald to INEL."

DOE spokesman Fred Lush said Thursday that DOE has never had any plans to ship that low-level waste to Idaho. The Fernald uranium production facility, located about 20 miles northwest of Cincinnati, closed two years ago and is under contract to ship its waste to Nevada or Utah, he said.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said last spring that the Fernald officials had told him that DOE was planning to store Fernald's waste at INEL.

Andrus spokesman Scott Peryon said Thursday that the governor "appreciates these efforts to stop future waste shipments, but the real issue is what's being shoved down Idaho's throat right now, and that's the Fort St. Vrain waste."

The Fernald agreement is the most recent promise to stem from renewed negotiations that began in earnest between Idaho's U.S. senators and DOE and White House officials a few weeks ago.

In an Oct. 24 agreement, DOE said it had "no intention" to carry out previous plans to send waste from a West Valley, N.Y., facility to INEL.

Dave Pearson, a spokesman for Symms, said Symms and Craig are continuing discussions with DOE to ensure that INEL is not targeted for other out-of-state waste.

He said the senators will not negotiate the current shipments from Fort St. Vrain until a U.S. District Court in Boise decides whether DOE may transfer the Colorado waste across the Shoshone-Barinock Indian tribe's reservation and store it at INEL.

Controversy continues to surround the West Valley agreement because New York officials have maintained that they have a "binding agreement" with DOE to remove the material.

DOE spokesman Samantha Williams said Thursday that DOE still has no plans to ship the waste to INEL. The department is re-evaluating the West Valley contract to determine whether DOE can pay the facility to keep the waste on site, she said.

## Education advocate garners Jerome's citizen-of-the-year

**JEROME** - It was July of 1969. Jody Craig was in the sixth grade, and that night her father pulled the TV out onto the patio.

LoRoy Craig turned on the set and pointed to the moon. It was the night Astronaut Neil Armstrong landed on the moon.

"He always had a way of making learning fun for all of us," said Jody about her father.

Lots of Jerome residents have other things to say about Craig. Some say they see him on the streets of Jerome before sun is up, watering the flowers in planters and the trees lining the downtown.

Others say he has devoted his life to others and has been particularly committed to education and helping the less fortunate.

Recently, Craig was honored as citizen of the year by the Jerome Chamber of Commerce that includes many College of Southern Idaho board members.

"He has helped more people than anybody will ever know about," Forrest Hymas, a Jerome businessman, "I have never known a man like this. He has done everything from helping families and kids to getting computers at CSI and our high school. He's kept businesses from pulling out of Jerome and is a friend of us all."

Craig joined the CSI's board in 1974. After serving three months, he was elected chairman, a position he retained the next 17 years.

"That speaks of the kind of man LoRoy is," said CSI President Jerry Meyerhofer.

A longtime supporter of education, Craig established a scholarship in memory of his son, Brad, who was died in

an automobile accident. The fund is for students who would not qualify for other scholarships because of having to work and raise a family.

"Some people don't have the money or time to get the education they want; so we want to help them out," said Craig. "Their education makes a difference for the whole community."

Craig's wife, Joyce, says her husband always wanted to help others with their education after he struggled getting his own.

While working towards his degree at Olympic College in Bremerton, Wash., Craig went to school only half days and worked the other half as a laborer in the shipyards.

Craig's service to the community has been varied. He has been active with his church, has helped with the bond drive to construct the new Jerome High School, and worked to update the technology equipment at both CSI and the high school.

As president of the Idaho Jaycees, Craig traveled more than 65,000 miles in one year. He is International Senator of the Idaho Jaycees and has served as vice president of the state Jaycees.

He also has served with St. Benedict's Family Medical Center Board and Foundation, the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club and the Jerome Library Board.

Born in Shoshone in 1934, Craig traveled with his parents during World War II while his father was a Federal government employee.

The Craig family moved to Idaho in 1950. LoRoy Craig is owner of the Prestcott and Craig Insurance, an independent property and casualty insurance agency. His office is known as a cornerstone of Jerome.

He is the father of Jody, Barrett, Julie and Bryan, an associate in the family insurance business.

qualified than the best guy. Because of the color of your skin, you cannot work here, and there's something legally you can do about it," Symms said.

"That's ugly. That's wrong," Symms' Idaho colleague Sen. Larry Craig, voted for the legislation, saying the bill would assure that "workers are given a job based on merit, not on race or sex."

Craig said he wanted to make sure "workers were protected

without unfair quotas or opening the floodgates to costly and frivolous lawsuits that would harm businesses. This vote will help guarantee fair treatment for both employees and employers."

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., and other Republicans crafted the proposal as a compromise from a earlier version. John Danforth would require employers to use a quota system when hiring.

Symms was joined in his

opposition by fellow Republicans Dan Coats, Ind.; Jesse Helms, N.C.; Robert Smith, N.H.; and Malcolm Wallop, Wyo. Democratic Sens. Harris Wofford, Pa., and Bob Kerry, Neb., were absent. Joining Symms against the bill were Republicans Dan Coats of Indiana, Robert Smith of New Hampshire, Kestel Helms of North Carolina and Malcolm Wallop of Wyoming. Democrats Bob Kerrey of Nebraska and Harris Wofford of Pennsylvania did not vote.

# Board 'regrets' embarrassment of firing Keiser; stops lawsuit

TWIN FALLS — The State Board of Education passed a resolution Thursday stating it regrets the firing of John Keiser and that it regretted any embarrassment the action caused him.

The resolution passed 4-3 with one abstention during a teleconference meeting Thursday.

While insisting that the resolution could no way be construed as an apology, board member Karl Shurtliff said the action was to prevent a lawsuit.

The language of the resolution was worked out through negotiations with Keiser's attorney. In exchange, Keiser agreed not to file suit against the state.

"Keiser 54, threatened a lawsuit against the board after the trustees fired him at a board meeting on Sept. 20."

The resolution also referred to various public comments made by board members after the firing.

"Among other things, board members said Keiser has bypassed the board on bids to secure millions of dollars in state support for academic programs and buildings, including a vocational technical college, the \$10 million Micron Technology Center and a classroom center in Canyon County that Andrus voted in April."

"Any comments from board members were not intended to impugn Dr. Keiser's integrity nor imply any dishonesty or impropriety on his part," the resolution says.

The board regrets any embarrassment that may have occurred to Dr. Keiser and his family and recognizes his many accomplishments and contributions to Boise State University over the past 14 years," it says.

It also said the terms of Keiser's original agreement would be honored, including his status as a tenured member of the school's history department.

Some board members strongly disapproved of the resolution.

"I don't want to be involved in anything that causes this board to give the appearance that we're changing our mind about what we did," board member Roy Mosman of Moscow said. "I have no reason to regret what we did."

Keiser's threat did not cause much merit, he said. "I think we should've given him a break first," Mosman said.

Board member Keith Hinkley of Blackfoot said he objected to the resolution because it implied the firing was over a difference in style.

He also objected that a clause which said the board had cause to fire Keiser was deleted from the final resolution.

"There was cause," he said.

# Wilderness negotiations back on track

BOISE — Idaho's wilderness negotiating committee reports some headway after a stormy spring.

The group has struggled so far to map out how many of Idaho's 9 million acres of roadless land will earn the federal protection.

But the panel's progress will be scrutinized by the Legislature this winter to gauge whether the state is getting its money's worth.

Committee members admit they may not reach a consensus on wild lands, or their efforts could be scuttled by Congress.

The effort took traction in April as the agricultural segment resolved to oppose wilderness in forests where federal permittees historically have run livestock. Environmentalists then threatened to walk out on the committee.

"I think we have to do the best we can for Idaho and then convince the nation it's the best thing," said Jim Yost of the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation.

His aides they're making progress. They've done a lot of mediation institute, which is coordinating the discussions. "We push them as hard as we can but the bottom line is we can't make them negotiate."

In a general review several weeks ago, observers noted that timber proponents, cattlemen and other members backed the effort enough

to continue their deliberations this fall, said state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee.

"It appears to be full steam ahead," Noh said.

The Legislature appropriated \$150,000 for the institute in the last fiscal year and \$140,000 for the current period. About \$11 million contained earlier this month.

A couple of gatherings last spring were anything but harmonious. Ranching representatives came to the table expecting to solidify their position.

But environmental and timber groups had deliberated long and hard in the past decade on how many acres they would battle for what mountain ranges and logging roads they wanted for their own.

"When it was first brought up, it was kind of a shock to the system," Yost said. "After the original flare-up, everybody has their head down and are working away."

Yost and the ranchers worry about the extent of Forest Service restrictions on grazing allotments in the wilderness areas.

Conservationists work out language that is going to assure those people they're grazing in the future," said Betty Munis, executive vice president of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association.

Mike Medberry, Idaho Conservation League public lands coordinator, said he could understand the stockmen's frustration.

"They feel they're under siege. The woolgrowers have a weak market right now. They have riparian areas government says must be protected."

But by law, grazing is allowed in the wilderness. If ranchers have used roads to transport their livestock on public lands, language could be included in Idaho's legislation to keep those routes open.

The Idaho Conservation League and the Wilderness Society follow a guideline of 4 million acres of new wilderness in addition to the 4 million already carved out. Medberry said.

Crowley says he is running again so he can work toward betterment of the city. He is employed as a truck driver.

**Lynn Crowley**  
Lynn Crowley is seeking Pinkston's seat on the council. Crowley, 41, is a lifetime resident of Castleford. She and her husband have three children, all who attended the Castleford schools.

Crowley says she is satisfied with the way the city council has managed things in Castleford, and she would like to help keep things "on line and running."

She has a small lawn with a small budget, but the city has done a good job," Crowley said, citing the city's water and sewer systems as examples.

Crowley is employed as a school bus driver in Castleford.

# Man pleads not guilty in slayings

BOISE (AP) — Accused double-murderer Edward-Dee Palmer has pleaded innocent in the May 1990 execution-style slayings of a Boise man and his girlfriend in Idaho County.

Fourth District Judge Gerald Schroeder set April 21 for the beginning of the three-week trial in Idaho City. Palmer, 35, faces a possible death sentence if convicted on the first-degree murder charges.

Palmer, who is being held at the maximum-security prison south of Boise, is accused of killing David Middlemist, 24, and Cathy Enoch, 27, within several hours after they delivered a game machine to the Clear Creek Lodge southwest of Idaho City.

Burdick is a consulting teacher with the Twin Falls School District. A job, she said, that demands good communication skills, presentation of new information and finding viable solutions to tough problems.

The Burdick family has lived in Jerome for more than 15 years. "We have enjoyed quality education and a quality of life that would be difficult to duplicate," she said.

"I want to see new businesses who will support our community spirit and pride," she said. "We need to get the word out to prospective businesses about how great we are. And we need to continue to work to make Jerome the best city in the Magic Valley to live in."

### Janice Jan' Coleman

A newcomer to city politics is Janice Coleman, 45, a three-year Jerome resident, who is employed as activities director at St. Benedict's Family Medical Center.

Being able to give fair decisions for the people is one qualification, Coleman said. "I am a top priority."

"If people ask questions, they'll get answers in return. I'll promise that," she said.

"Jerome has a lot of possibilities, like growth of industry, more housing, improved education facilities and a lot of community spirit," she said.

She said her goals are to make Jerome a good place to live, work and "raise kids."

As activities director, Coleman handles the center's annual budget and finds other means to supplement the budget, such as obtaining assistance from local businesses and clubs.

She is chairwoman of Women of the Magic Valley, treasurer of the Extension Homemakers Council and belongs to County Neighbors Extension Club and the Optimist Club.

Rocky Jackson, 39, has served on the council for four years.

City support people have given an important part of his four years on the city council, Jackson expressed his gratefulness to the people for "coming out in strength when we needed to help each other either financially or when workers were needed to do a job."

He said he hopes to help with the growth of Jerome with new residences to be built at 16th Avenue and possibly 15th Ave. E. and to assist in promoting Jerome so new businesses will come to the area, not only within the city limits, but in the surrounding areas.

"What is good for the city is good for the county and growth is good for both," he said.

"What I want most is a great education for our children and a place where our children can call home, get jobs, raise a family and have grandchildren who can also find jobs. I came from a time when no jobs were available so people had to leave the Valley. One thing that gets me is the kids. They deserve every chance we can give them."

Handling the requirements for a new sewer and water lines in the city are projects Jackson is presently working on. He directs the Parks and Recreation Department for the city and was an avid promoter to repair and put the city pool into operation last summer.

### Hyong K Pak

Hyong K. Pak, 28, is an attorney with his own law office in Twin Falls. Prior to going into private practice, Pak served 15 months as prosecuting attorney with the Jerome County Deputy Department.

Being involved in decision making, a well-rounded education and public service work were listed as some of his qualifications for the job of

councilman. Pak said he had "high expectations" for Jerome. "You see that big sign 'Discover Jerome' at the entrance to our city," he said. "Everytime I see that billboard, I ask myself, 'what is there to discover in Jerome?' At this time, there isn't much to discover, and my goal is to expose Jerome and improve businesses and the welfare of our community."

"There is growth in the future of Jerome, and I want to be a part of making that happen," Pak continued. He said he misses being a public servant and wants to get back into serving the people.

Pak graduated from the College of Idaho in 1987 with a degree in Political Science. He obtained his law degree from the University of Idaho in 1990.

Six candidates are running to fill the two positions on the council for two-year terms.

### Diane G. Adams

Diane G. Adams, 55, said she feels qualified for office based on her "many years in the business world, from broadcasting to working as a receptionist in my husband's dental practice. My job has been to communicate and I love it."

She said she would like to maintain the quality of life in Jerome which is so important to the family unit, as our population increases.

Helping the Jerome area promote and manufacture more products to be sold outside the area and thereby establish a broader economic base for Jerome is a major issue on her agenda.

She said she would like to see interested residents become more involved in the city's future growth.

Adams said she could see a "great

influx of population. We have many people raised in the big cities who find our lifestyle appealing. They are tired of the traffic, lack of personal safety and the huge costs of living. More and more of our children and grandchildren are returning home to raise their families here. They realize the assets we have. If we want to preserve our wonderful lifestyle, we'd best know where we're headed with our goals and directions."

Adams has been a resident of Jerome for 26 years. She owned and operated an Oregon radio station, and worked for KMVT and KEEF television stations.

### Ernest Brooks

Ernest Brooks, 58, is a 33-year law-enforcement veteran who moved to Jerome from California three years ago. Since law enforcement is a part of the city of Jerome, Brooks feels he can help in not only the "police work" but in making the city a safe and pleasant place for young and old.

As chief of police in Ilesoto, Calif., Brooks attended and participated in city council meetings a month, which "gave me a lot of exposure to what running a city is all about," he said.

Being retired, Brooks said he was ready to give 35 days a week, "whatever time it takes to do what needs to be done."

"I expect to get out and talk to the people, the business owners and anybody who is interested in Jerome," he said.

A business property owner in Jerome, Brooks said he was especially interested in developing businesses within the city.

"But it's hard to give an intelligent answer to what is going to happen in

Jerome," he said. "Until a person gets on the council, you can't know all that needs to be done. I expect to learn a lot and listen a lot before I take action."

Seeing Jerome as a growing community, Brooks said the council could help with many community programs such as home checks and neighborhood watch projects.

### Ross Bateman

Born and raised in Jerome, Ross Bateman, 32, has established his own welding business in Jerome after receiving training from the College of Southern Idaho.

As a qualification for a council position, Bateman said he has a desire to help young people and to have more for the young people to do in Jerome.

"He said he has 'learned a lot about the council business' by attending city council monthly meetings. He expects to promote and advertise the city through signs and by talking to people about our town."

"Jerome is a good town to live in because I grew up here, but I want to help make it an even better place to live," he said.

Bateman said he is especially interested in helping the Jerome Fire Department and in finding out from other city departments and organizations what they need from the council.

### Eliza Hall

Incumbent Eliza Hall, 66, has served as city commissioner for 18 months and was the Jerome County sheriff for 16 years. He also served in law enforcement in Buhl and the Jerome Police Department. He has been in law enforcement for 28 years.

Completion of getting the Jerome Cheese Co. into operation, putting in sewer piping from the Industrial Park to the Jerome Wastewater Treatment Plant and putting in new water lines along Main Street are immediate goals for the councilman.

Hall is retired and states he has time to devote to city business and the people. "I want to help our people all I can," he said.

He stated he saw nothing but growth in Jerome's future.

Born and raised in West Plains, Missouri, Hall served in the U.S. Army for two and one-half years. He came to Jerome in 1946.

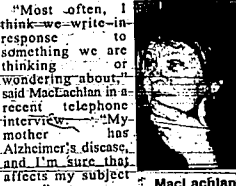

Like Sarah, Hall and Tall, which won the 1986 Newbery Award and went on to become the Hallmark special starring Glenn Close, "Journey" is about a family trying to fill the gaping void left by the loss of a mother.



MacLachlan

MacLachlan has always loved books. "When I was young, my mother would load me home from the library as I read, her hand on my neck, guiding me across streets and up and down curbs," she said. Still, she

didn't begin writing books until about 20 years ago, when she was in her 30s. As she put it, "I was finally at an age when I didn't mind revealing myself in books."

Before that, MacLachlan was busy teaching English and raising three children with her psychologist husband in Williamsburg, Mass. Her oldest son, a photographer, is currently collaborating with her on a book for Delacorte Press. It's about writers - their lives, literature and landscapes.

MacLachlan spent about two years writing "Journey," weaving the tale of an 11-year-old boy who refuses to believe that the mother who walked out on him will not return. The book is geared to readers in the 8 to 14 age group, though it is being sold to readers of all ages.

The author writes her books in her home office on a mountain-top overlooking a rural landscape. The view inspires her, she said, though it sometimes inspires her to spend too much time looking out the window. In her spare time, MacLachlan juggles speaking engagements and works as a visiting lecturer on children's literature at Smith College.

Not long ago, MacLachlan completed a picture book for children featuring her father, who was a teacher in a one-room school house on the prairie of North Dakota. The book, entitled "Three Names," sells for \$14.95 and will be available during Tuesday's autograph party.

"Journey," an 83-page hard cover book, sells for \$13.50.

# Drunken husband gave life full of harsh lessons

DEAR ABBY: Twelve years ago, I received a personal letter from you in response to my frantic plea asking how to handle my alcoholic husband. You became my special friend. When my mother died, you called me home. You will never forget that I now want to give something back. It's some advice to your readers from my own experience.



Dear Abby, Abigail VanBuren

In a recent column, a John C. Seaman, referring to his personal experience with alcohol and drug abuse said, "I recommend intervention to anyone who is frustrated by another person's drinking." You said, "You can't help him, for someone to 'hit bottom,' which could ultimately be death." Those words hit close to home!

My husband's alcoholism ultimately led, although indirectly, to his death. For 12 years I tried to help him, and finally, was agreed that he should enter an alcohol and drug abuse program in an area hospital. Six weeks after his release, he resumed drinking. I tried "tough love" and moved him out of our house, saying he could return when he got back on the program and quit drinking.

Well, he wasn't strong enough to quit drinking, nor was he strong enough to fight off the killer who knifed him to death in his motel apartment. It happened in the early hours of April 10, 1991. A drug-crazed man forced his way into my husband's apartment and stabbed him 14 times, then stuffed him into a closet.

Now I have to live with the fact that I let him down. I failed him. It is too late for intervention. So, Abby, please tell your readers to keep trying! Keep trying to rehabilitate your alcoholic or user. Where there is life, there is, at least, hope.

After death, you will want him back so badly, drunk or high, but alive. I too recommend intervention along with Mr. Seaman, not out of professional knowledge, but from harsh life experience. Call a treatment center, as he suggests. Please do not give up! Kindest regards to you, Abby, and love to all of your readers. You may print my name.

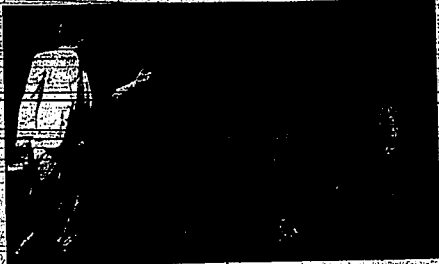

# Founder of NY Shakespeare Festival dies

NEW YORK (AP)—Producer Joseph Papp, the man who brought "A Chorus Line" to Broadway and other productions of Shakespeare in Central Park died Thursday after a long illness, according to his personal aide. Papp died at home in his Greenwich Village apartment, said spokesman Richard Kornberg.



Papp was the founder and guiding spirit of the New York Shakespeare Festival, which he started in 1954 in a church basement on the Lower East Side and later developed into one of the country's leading non-profit theaters.

The festival, a complex of five theaters and one movie house housed on the former Astor Library at Lafayette Street, has sent more than a dozen productions to Broadway.

Papp's productions that won the Pulitzer Prize for drama were "A Chorus Line," the longest running show in Broadway history, and "Top Girls," which won in 1973. Other successes include a revival of "The Pirates of Penzance" with Linda Ronstadt and Kevin Kline; "Plenty," a musical version of "Two Gentlemen of Verona"; "Sleaze and Boogie" for "Colored People"; "Foxy" and "Cubs and His Teddy Bear."

"He probably was the most charismatic figure our theater has known. He was not beyond getting up and performing a cappella," said Merle Debutsky, who was Papp's press agent for about 30 years.

"He was blessed with the elements that make for a prominent image," on top of his other qualities: aggressiveness, pugnaciousness, tenacity, acute theater knowledge," Debutsky said. "He was not dumb but he was fearless. He knew the consequences and was willing to face up to them as if he became necessary."

At the company, also known as the Public Theater, Papp produced such notable plays and musicals as Larry Kramer's "The Normal Heart," one of the first dramas to deal with

AIDS; the original production of "Hair," before it was revised and then taken to Broadway by a different producer; George C. Wolfe's satire, "The Colored Museum"; "Top Girls" and "Serious Money" by English playwright Caryl Churchill; and "Tracers," about soldiers who fought in the Vietnam War.

Among the playwrights Papp worked with are David Mamet, Sam Shepard, John Guare, David Rabe, David Hare, Caryl Churchill, David Henry Hwang, Notzake Shange, John Patrick Shanley, George C. Wolfe and Vaclav Havel. He was born in Brooklyn on June 2, 1921. He began his career as a stage manager in small off-Broadway companies.

In 1956, Papp started the Free Shakespeare Summer Festival in the East River Park Amphitheater. It moved to Central Park when it had a truck that had toured city parks with Papp's productions, collapsed near the park's Belvedere Lake.

When the Delacorte Theater was built in Central Park in 1962 on the same site, Papp's company moved in, presenting Shakespeare for free.

Jeff Goldblum, Mandy Patinkin, Christopher Walken, Morgan Freeman, Dezell Washington, F. Murray Abraham, Christopher Reeve and Tracey Ullman.

In August, Papp appointed Anne Akalitis to succeed him as the Public's sole artistic director, and she planned the current season with includes works by Shakespeare, Brecht and Lorca. Akalitis is a well-known figure in New York's avant-garde theater scene and had directed several productions at the Public Theater over the last 15 years.

Papp's death occurred at a time of financial cutbacks at the theater. The operating budget for the current season was scaled back to \$10.5 million, down from \$13.5 million the previous year.

A funeral service will be held today for family and friends at the Public Theater. Kornberg said. A public memorial service will be held at a later date.

Papp was married four times, his first three marriages ending in divorce. Survivors include his wife, Gail, and four children—Susan, Michael, Barbara and Miranda.

# World Flotilla arrives in Dubrovnik, fighting kills 9

DUBROVNIK, Yugoslavia (AP) — A flotilla bringing badly needed food and medicine sailed through a federal navy blockade into this ancient port Thursday, as Serbian-led federal forces attacked elsewhere in Croatia.

Thousands of people jammed Dubrovnik's dock to greet the Slavic ferry and 28 other boats carrying 850 people, including Croatian refugees, delayed by gunfire and a search by federal authorities.

Crowds waving olive branches and Croatian flags, cheered as Stipe Mesic, the Croat who heads Yugoslavia's virtually dormant federal presidency, walked down the Slavic gangplank, miles from the federal army's hilltop positions overlooking Dubrovnik's stone walls.

Rousing "Stipe!" — the emotional march was greeted with slogans such as "Welcome to our Croatia, Dubrovnik." They sang Croatia's anthem and wept.

Dubrovnik, a peacetime tourist mecca, became a symbolic prize in Croatia's war after federal troops and gunboats laid siege a month ago. Mesic's success in negotiating a safe passage with the military through the Navy blockade was a morale booster for Croats in their four-month-old war with Serb insurgents and the Serb-led military that flared after Croatia declared independence.

Apparently mindful of world opinion, an increasingly isolated Serbia prepares for European Community-sponsored peace talks Tuesday, the Navy led the flotilla enter Dubrovnik.

The EC has set a Nov. 5 deadline

for Serbia to accept a plan to turn Yugoslavia into an association of sovereign republics within their present borders.

Serbia, the most powerful of six republics, rejected the plan, saying it amounted to dismantling the Yugoslav federation it wants to protect ethnic Serbs in Croatia.

Italy said Thursday the EC peace process should be wrapped up by mid-December, leading to recognition of all Yugoslav republics.

That would effectively mean Serb guerrillas and the army would be pressured to relinquish the one-third of Croatian territory they have conquered.

Serbia's already ravaged economy faces threatened EC sanctions if Slobodan Milosevic, its hard-line president, rejects the plan.

A State Department official said Thursday in Washington the United States is prepared to support such sanctions.

But Milosevic is also under pressure from nationalist extremists not to give up Croatian territory.

Milan Babic, leader of Croatia's ethnic-Serb enclave of Krajina, rejected pressures from the "highest Serbian authorities" to accept the plan, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported.

EC special envoy Henri Wisniewski was expected Thursday in Belgrade, the Yugoslav and Serbian capital, and Sarajevo, the main city of the central republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina, Tanjug said.

The Dubrovnik flotilla was the first to bring returning residents to the Adriatic port since the siege began.

## Guard: Removal of Lenin from historic tomb would be tragedy

MOSCOW (AP) — Removal of Vladimir Lenin's body from its mausoleum on Red Square would be a tragedy, the commander of the guards protecting the remains said in an interview published Thursday.

Vladimir Kamennyykh, in charge of security at the red granite landmark, told the newspaper Pravda it would be a "wrong" to want to remove Lenin's remains and rebury them in St. Petersburg.

"That would be a mistake, a tragic mistake," he said.

On the last day of a parliamentary session following the August coup attempt, radical St. Petersburg Mayor Anatoly Sobchak proposed removing the body from the mausoleum for burial in his city — formerly Leningrad.

The mausoleum draws millions of Soviet and foreign tourists annually.

Kamennyykh said his guards confiscate an increasing number of weapons from Soviets who want to desecrate Lenin's remains.

After the failed Aug. 18-21 coup, statues to Bolshevik leaders were pulled down or defaced in Moscow and elsewhere in a backlash against the Communist Party.

## Marcos Jr. first of clan to return to Philippines

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The son of late President Ferdinand Marcos on Thursday ended nearly six years in exile to return to the Philippines, where he and his family face tax-related charges.

Former first lady Imelda Marcos and the rest of the family were expected Monday from Hawaii.

Ferdinand Marcos Jr. arrived aboard Singapore Airlines, and was greeted at the airport by several officials who had served under Marcos.

Outside the airport, dozens of Marcos followers, who learned of his planned arrival from news reports, waited for a glimpse of the 34-year-old Marcos Jr., a former governor of his home province of Ilocos Norte.

"It's wonderful, amazing," Marcos Jr. said as he waved to reporters, photographers and well-wishers. "I can't believe I am home."

On Wednesday, the government gave landing rights to a Boeing 747 to bring Mrs. Marcos home.

## Vietnamese are now eager for ties with U.S.

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Le Ngoc Thy drew aside a soiled curtain across his altar to reveal fading photographs of his wife and their three children.

They died, he said, when U.S. bombers destroyed their neighborhood 19 years ago.

"If I had not fled the pilot's search for those bombs right after the attack I would have killed him by any means possible. I was crazed with grief," said the 78-year-old man, sadness etched in his eyes.

They described the night of Dec. 26, 1972, the so-called Christmas bombing of Hanoi, when he lost his family instantly as he sought shelter next to their brick home that also was obliterated.

"But if that pilot were in front of me now?" he said. "Well, I have become calmer. I know every one on both sides had to do their duty — they had no choice. And the war has been over for many years. Now we must look to the future."

At a wedding in Hanoi, he has cause for bitterness against the United States it is Thy's neighborhood along Kham Thien Street, a working-class area, through which American warplanes cut a deadly swath.

Several hundred civilians perished in a campaign by President Nixon to pressure Hanoi into a peace agreement to end American involvement in the Vietnam War.

A memorial to the Kham Thien Street bombing says 283 people were killed and 266 wounded there on Dec. 26.

## British Parliament opens with fanfare

LONDON (AP) — Big Ben chimed and fanfares blared Thursday as Queen Elizabeth II opened a new session of Parliament, the last before the July deadline for Britain's next election.

With the Conservative government trailing in opinion polls, the monarch was barely back at her palace before lawmakers turned on each other in the House of Commons.

"We have a queen's speech today because we have a government that is afraid to face the British people," said Neil Kinnock, the Labor Party leader, who has repeatedly called for a fall election.

Labor is about six points ahead of the Conservatives in opinion polls, and could stand to gain from an early election.

Prime Minister John Major and other members of the 650-seat House of Commons stood at the back of the House of Lords while the queen, wearing a jewel-encrusted crown, read a 10-minute speech to the seated Lords, who were dressed in ermine-fringed scarlet robes.

The arrangement follows an ancient tradition of keeping commoners in their places during the annual opening of Parliament.

The queen's speech, which was written by the government, promised cooperation with a more-united European Community, but insisted NATO remain the cornerstone of Britain's defense.

British Party lawmaker Tony Blair said the 12 new pieces of legislation outlined in the speech lacked subtlety.

remember the war's horrors and hatreds — as do the survivors of Kham Thien Street — towards Vietnam," said Dinh Ngoc Duc, a 77-year-old retired doctor who lost his eldest son in the Christmas air raids.

"Every war creates tragic consequences. But I am not angry anymore. It's been long enough to forget," he said.

Thy lives in a narrow, fetid alley behind Duc's coffee shop. His leaky roof is made of thatch and the walls from bricks he salvaged from his destroyed house. He says he has never recovered — economically or emotionally — from the bombing.

Incense sticks and flowers grace the one bright spot of his shanties — the Buddhist altar where he prays for his lost family. On the day of their deaths, Thy had gone to the countryside to bring food to his grandchildren, who had been evacuated along with many Hanoi residents.

At sunset, on the rim of Hanoi, children played outside a primary school. In front, the twisted remains of a U.S. B-52 bomber jutted from a plain otherwise lush with vegetable beds. A plane said the plane had been downed Dec. 27, 1972.

Girls with flowers in their pigtails and rambunctious boys hung little about this mangled steel. They were more interested in teasing a reporter and practicing foreign languages.

"I am an American," one boy proudly declared. "We like Americans."

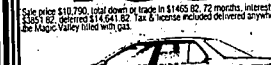

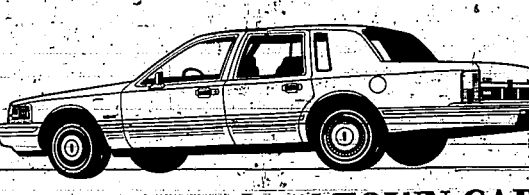

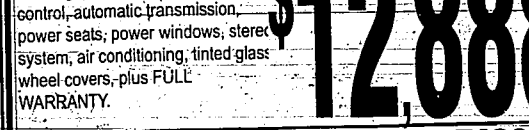

# Real-life stories luck of the draw for Mills

CBS's recently aired "Runaway Father," based on a true story, starred Donna Mills as Pat Bennett, a woman who tracked down her husband after he deserted his family.

And in ABC's "False Arrest" (airing Sunday, Nov. 3, and Wednesday, Nov. 6), also based on a true story, Mills stars as Joyce Lukezie, a woman who is imprisoned for a murder she didn't commit. It would seem that Mills likes to concentrate on real-life scenarios, but she begs to differ.

"It's funny these two just happened in a row like that," Mills says. "It wasn't by design; it just happened that way."

"False Arrest" is based on Joyce Lukezie's book of the same name. It recounts her ordeal in prison after she was accused of murdering her husband's business partner.

She subsequently spent three years in jail, where she was assaulted by fellow inmates.

"Mills feels that the movie taps a general fear of arrest, among the American public."

"I just fear being arrested for no reason, for something you didn't do

and going to jail for something you didn't do," Mills explains.

"I think most people, most law-abiding citizens, are like that."

Mills professes a fascination with jurisprudence, and that also attracted her to the role.

"You know, what always interests me is injustice, how in this society, in probably the best justice system in the world, there still can be things like this that happen," she says.

"There are a lot of people in the system that use it to their advantage, rather than to procure justice."

After a successful nine-season run as Abby Cunningham Ewing on CBS's "Knots Landing," Mills left the show to start her own production company.

"That was a great time and I loved doing it," Mills says, "but I wanted to do other things. I didn't want to play just one role for the rest of my life."

"As much as I love that character and even sometimes miss the character, I don't miss doing the show, because I'm doing so many other exciting things now."

Mills feels that Abby helped pave the way for stronger female roles on television.

"It's a female-driven medium right now," she says.

"Most of the major stars are women: 'Designing Women,' 'Murphy Brown,' 'Roseanne.' The list just goes on and on. I think a lot of that came from women putting their foot down and wanting to play stronger characters."

"I think Abby was one of those stronger characters in the beginning of the '80s that helped perpetuate that."

Mills feels that playing both Pat Bennett and Joyce Lukezie was consistent with her desire for more inspirational female roles.

"These women had something bad happen to them; they were victims to begin with, but they got themselves out of their troubles," Mills says.

"They turned around and became winners through their own inner fortitude. I like putting that out there."

## Series scores big points for CBS in ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — Victory in the seven-game World Series was a narrow, 10th-inning squeaker for the Minnesota Twins, but a resounding blowout for CBS.

"We're estimating at this point that some 83 million people saw Game 7," said Michael Eisenberg, CBS vice president for audience measurement, projecting the national audience with overnight ratings from 25 cities.

By comparison, football's Super Bowl gets 112 million viewers and the final National Basketball Association game gets about 54 million viewers.

For those 25 markets representing 33.1 million of the nation's 92.1-million TV households, the baseball game earned a 32.1 rating and a 47 share, Eisenberg said. CBS calculated its numbers up to the end of prime time, 11 p.m.

EST. "You can add 10 percent on top of anything I give you," Eisenberg said. "We figure there was another 10 percent that were watching out of home, in bars, college dormitories and elsewhere."

A rating point equals about 431,000 TV homes in the 25-city market; a share is the percentage of sets tuned in.

The seven-game Series is expected to bring in \$50 million more than last year's four-game sweep by the Cincinnati Reds, but is not expected to stem CBS' already big losses in its four-year, \$1.06 billion baseball contract.

Nielsen Media Research tracked the game's ratings from 8:30 p.m. to 12:05 a.m. Monday. The game garnered a 31.4 rating, 47 share and attracted 13,542,068 households, said Nielsen spokeswoman Jo LaVerde.

In Atlanta, home of the Braves, the final game rolled up a 58.2 rating and a 74 share, and was seen in 840,635 households; in Minneapolis, it earned a 66.2 rating and an 84 share in 892,959 TV homes, Nielsen said.

CBS' Eisenberg said the audience kept building as the game continued. By 10:30, it was drawing 50 shares in many cities.

Saturday night's Game 6 also was a ratings success for CBS, earning a 24.2 rating and a 41 share, he said.

There was no question that CBS would win the ratings for the week and widen its lead in the season-to-date standings, Eisenberg said. The weekly figures are released Tuesday.

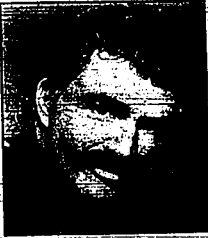

# Tymchysyn: Mark of excellence on soap

Mark Tymchysyn has no vowels in his seemingly unpronounceable last name but the actor, who is playing the powerful wheeler dealer Gavin Kruger in "As the World Turns," says he never thought of changing it. Coming from a family in which his father is a professor of theater at the University of Illinois, it seemed inevitable to Mark that he would end up acting or directing or working at some job in the acting profession.

Mark confessed that his first love was and is baseball but he admitted to himself early that he wasn't good enough for the big leagues so he remains an amateur player but totally dedicated to the sport.

"I've done a lot of theater," said Mark, "and I really didn't think about soaps until I got to appear in 'One Life to Live' and realized that there were some fine actors making a good living doing soaps. Before my present role in 'As the World Turns,' I played a recurring role as a lawyer in 'Santa Barbara' but Gavin is the first meaty part I've played in soaps. He's quite a guy, manipulating and grasping but not without some charm. I get to wear the villain's black hat one day and then change to a white one for awhile."

Mark says that after watching him on the soap his mother said he made her skin crawl. Mark's best friend's mother also finds Gavin despicable. These comments are music to Mark's ears because that's what he's supposed to evoke from the viewers. However, like all soap villains, he may not remain as hateful as he started out. If the writers feels he is redeemable, his character may go through a softening process.

With a bit of reluctance, Mark owns up to having been a Grand Prize winner on "Star Search." No, he didn't sing or do a stand-up comedy routine, he won his title for acting, way back when the producers had such a category on "Star Search."

"It was really funny," said Mark, "I did a terrible scene with an actress who was really emoting all over the place. I think I kept it low

"All My Children" fans are wondering where they have seen Dondre Whitfield, the new actor currently in the role of Terrence Frye (Akili Prince used to play the part but was let go, it was as Robert for over two years on "The Cosby Show." Actually, Dondre also played Jesse for six months on "Another World" and had a role in the ABC Afterschool Special titled "All That Glitters," in addition to appearing in many TV commercials.

# Roddenberry: Science fiction at its finest

HOLLYWOOD — In person, Gene Roddenberry, who died at the age of 70, seemed as comfortably and contentedly earthbound as a prosperous, small-city merchant. Yet, in creating "Star Trek," he had done more than anyone else in television's time to unleash the deep-space imaginations of millions of watchers everywhere in the world.

The fact is that Roddenberry ranks with Jules Verne, H.G. Wells and his ongoing admirer Ray Bradbury in his proven power to conjure up another world where the impossible (or the not-yet-possible) is daily routine and humans can experience their fondest hopes — and now and again their scariest nightmares.

Roddenberry had the profound satisfaction, denied to all but few creators in or out of television, of seeing his creation triumphantly vindicated by the concerted will of the entertained who, in the case of "Star Trek," forced the decision-makers to reverse themselves and give the show a new life on screens both large and small.

Science fiction at its finest has always been less a matter of gadgetry and bug-eyed monsters than a setting for commentaries on what and who we are, seen from a fresh perspective. It is a universal metaphor, with an uncommon number of foot-pounds of thrust.

Many of Bradbury's stories are moral tales, set on Mars instead of Manhattan. Some of the most engaging episodes on "Star Trek" took the crew to far places where historical Earth dramas were being played out again, as if

there were a second chance to get it right and so avoid the torrows and the catastrophes.

It was sometimes as if the "Enterprise" had never left home. The remembrances of things future, as somebody once called the world of science-fiction fantasy, were in fact remembrances of things past — understood, and even unstated parables, on 20th-Century folks who never left Earth.

The immense and universal appeal of "Star Trek" was never hard to explain. At an obvious level, its characters are likable and appealing and the splendid gadgetry fulfill our not-so-secret dreams of flight, adventure and wondrous surprise. Who would mind being beamed up by Seattle, if the opportunity presented itself?

But there is as well a deeper level of appeal. As the Earth seems ever more a cacophonous, cluttered, polluted, corrupted, overcrowded, snarling and tawdry mess (dreams of Eden receding comet-like into the past), deep space has come to be — in the imagination at least — a place of new beginnings. (The last images of an embryo in Stanley Kubrick's "2001: A Space Odyssey" were telling in this regard.)

Space, Bradbury once said, is the new focus for human idealism, very nearly a kind of extraterritorial religion, and we stand at the edge of it, as Columbus stood at the verge of a new world in 1492.

There are now, of course, devastatingly negative opinions on what we've done to Columbus' new world. And Gene Roddenberry, to his credit and in the interest of livelier stories, never said everything was swell two millennia or so down the line. It was just that out there the good guys always won in the end; perfect intelligence was not an unrealizable dream, and all good things were possible.

It is wonderful to see for a little while that all good things really are possible, somewhere. And accordingly, it is likely that for years to come there will continue to be grateful passengers aboard Gene Roddenberry's star ship, looking for that somewhere.
