## Demo plan: Hit rich, give middle class break

WASHINGTON — House Democratic leaders lined up Thursday behind a new initiative to top their 1992 election-year agenda: a tax credit of up to \$200 a year per worker, paid for by upper-income Americans. Ninety million couples and individuals would get tax cuts in 1992 and 1993 while the richest 1 million would pay more permanently. "It runs to the heart of what Democrats

stand for," said Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and author of the proposal. The plan was promoted as good medicine for a sluggish economy and as a major effort to make the tax system fairer. The Democrats, who control Congress, emphasized that no action will be taken on the proposal until early next year, even though they promised that the tax relief would be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1992.

While action must wait, said House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., the mere fact that the top two tax-writers in Congress — Rostenkowski and Senate Finance Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas — have called for middle-income relief should be "pretty convincing information" to Americans uncertain about the economy. Bentsen's tax-cut proposal would benefit fewer people than Rostenkowski's, but the most striking

## HIV takes Magic out of NBA

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — In an announcement that rocked the sports world, Erwin "Magic" Johnson retired Thursday after testing positive for the HIV virus.

Johnson, 32, the marquee name for the Los Angeles Lakers and the National Basketball Association for 12 years, learned he had the virus several weeks ago from a test administered by a life insurance company. Suddenly upbeat at a somber press conference at the Forum, flashing his trademark smile readily, Johnson vowed to become a spokesman for AIDS prevention.

"I just want to make clear, first of all, I do not have the AIDS disease," he said. "My wife's fine. She's (tested) negative."

"I plan to go on living for a long time ... He did not say how he contracted the virus, but he said: 'I'm going to be a spokesman for the HIV virus. I want young people to realize they can practice safe sex. Sometimes you're a little naive about it and you think something like that can never happen to you. It has happened but I'm

Johnson said he called his best friends in basketball, including Larry Bird, Isaiah Thomas, Michael Jordan and former coach Pat Riley to tell them. He told his current teammates in the Laker dressing room before the press conference.

Johnson had not played in this season's three games, sidelined by flu. Mellman said this illness was coincidental and not related to the HIV virus.

Thursday's announcement brought to a sudden end the playing career of one of the brightest of storybook careers. The self-described shy youngster from East Lansing, Mich., led Michigan State to a championship in 1979 at age 19.

A year later, he was the point guard on a Laker team in the NBA finals.

## Speedy ruling sought

WASHINGTON — Abortion rights advocates, hoping to ignite a major political fight in next year's elections, asked the Supreme Court on Thursday to state definitively whether it has abandoned its 1973 ruling that legalized abortion.

The groups said they expect the increasingly conservative court to overturn its 18-year-old ruling in Roe vs. Wade and spark a heated election-year battle.

But they said that even if their appeal in a Pennsylvania case still were pending before the justices next November, the issue would be on the front burner for candidates and voters in 1992.

Meanwhile, the Democratic-controlled Congress sent to President Bush legislation allowing abortion counseling at federally subsidized family-planning clinics.

The Senate vote Thursday was 72-25, more than enough to override a veto. But the House vote Wednesday fell short of the two-thirds majority that would be needed to enact the bill over Bush's objections.

Idaho's Republican senators, Steve Symms and Larry Craig, were among 21 members of their party and 4 Democrats to vote against the legislation. Fifty-one Democrats and 21 Republicans voted for the measure.

Abortion rights groups held a news conference to announce that they had asked the Supreme Court to review a federal appeals court ruling that upheld a new Pennsylvania law restricting abortions. The groups asked the high court to use the case to decide whether it still believes abortion is a fundamental right for women.

## Colorado utility receives license to store spent fuel

PLATTEVILLE, Colo. — Public Service Co. of Colorado has been issued a license from the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission to store spent fuel from its Fort St. Vrain reactor in a new building at the Platteville power plant.

The license allows Public Service to store up to 1,482 fuel elements in the new facility for 20 years. Circulating air will cool the fuel elements, which now are kept in the power plant's reactor, utility officials said.

Fort St. Vrain stopped generating electricity in 1989, and the company wants to convert the plant to natural gas.

Public Service has a contract with the U.S. Department of Energy to ship the thorium and uranium-235 fuel elements to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, but those shipments were halted by a federal judge last Friday.

U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge said the Energy Department must get an air-quality permit from the state of Idaho before shipments from Fort St. Vrain can resume. Obtaining the air-quality permit is expected to take at least six months.

## The devil, you say

### Tales of satanism persist in Mini-Cassia area 2 years after Baby X killing

RUPERT — Robed figures stood beneath the full moon in the eastern Magic Valley anymore. A dog howled. A woman screamed. A gunshot cracked.

Quiet. Within 10 minutes, the group packed up and left. "I thought it was something out of a B movie," said a woman who saw the scene from across the Snake River. "I thought, 'This can't be happening in my backyard.'"

The scene stunned the woman and her husband, residents of the Mini-Cassia area who do not want their names used for fear of harm from the people they watched on the river bank that autumn night two years ago. The couple watched the same group for most of 1989 — they say. Each full moon, the group gathered at a large Russian olive tree by the river bank, they say.

Stories like this couple's aren't hard to come by in the eastern Magic Valley anymore. The discovery of a baby girl's burned, dismembered, mutilated corpse at the Minidoka County landfill two years ago this month started the rumors.

Since then, hearsay and fact have compelled the attention of a public puzzled by reports of satanic cults flourishing in Minidoka and Cassia counties and beyond. Local Christian ministers, inspired by the "Baby X" case, will hold a vigil tonight for victims of ritual crimes.

Are friends of the devil at work in upstanding, solidly Christian south-central Idaho? This couple didn't think so until they went hunting raccoons by the Snake River that chilly autumn evening in 1989. The couple first saw the group, which they

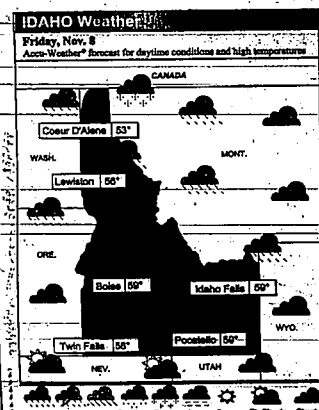
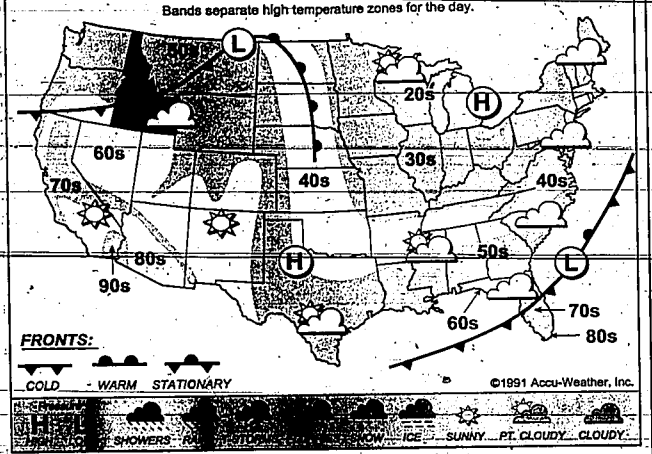

NATO says it wants U.S. help

ROME (AP) — President Bush won assurances Thursday from NATO leaders that they still want America's help in defending Europe. In a landmark summit, NATO agreed to invite old Warsaw Pact adversaries to join them in "a new era of partnership."

# Consumers fretting over joblessness

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush is betting that skittish consumers will realize it's a good time to buy a house or a car with interest rates lower.

Maybe it is, but don't count on the consumer coming back anytime soon.

There are simply too many stories about people out of work.

"A lot of people have seen their neighbor laid off, and they're scared," said David Wyss, chief economist at DRI-McGraw Hill.

"People just don't have the income, they don't have the jobs" to significantly lift consumer spending, he and other analysts said.

All the chaos in Washington of late hasn't boosted confidence, either. Clarence Thomas' check-bouncing in Congress and lawmakers stuffing the House restaurant probably shook many Americans, economists said.

"They got that old feeling again: Washington doesn't know how to run the railroad," said Robert Dederick, chief economist at the Northern Trust Co.

"Usually Washington is out there trying to make things easier for them," he said. "But most people may be thinking, 'Those guys and gals don't look as if they know how to help us out, or as if they care.'" Dederick said.

In turn, Michael Boskin, chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, blames the

news media for the sorry state of the consumer's psychology and business confidence. He says all the negative economic news has been "hyped by the media."

Plunging consumer confidence — it skidded sharply in October — is a huge menace for any economic rebound because consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of overall economic growth.

On Thursday, many of the nation's biggest retailers reported that they remained mired in a sales slump in October. Sears, Roebuck and Co. reported a marginal improvement, with overall business up 0.5 percent. But J.C. Penney Co. Inc. continued to falter, reporting a 2.9 percent drop.

The Federal Reserve moved to help consumers spending again by pushing a key interest rate to an 18-year low. Major banks quickly followed with a cut in their prime lending rate, pushing the benchmark for many consumer and business loans to a five-year low of 7.5 percent.

Analysis, though, doubt that the latest round of rate cuts will do much to get nervous consumers building up during the 1980s and fears about further job layoffs.

About 20 percent of American households have had a family member lose their job in the past year, according to a study compiled by the Conference Board, a business research organization.

The average job loss has lasted nearly six months, the group said.

"That does an awful lot of damage to not only the pocketbook, but also the psyche," said Fabian Linden, who heads the Conference Board's research division.

It all makes for a vicious cycle. People fretting over a potential job loss are afraid to spend money, but employers can't start hiring again until business picks up.

To make matters worse, this recession has hit not only factory workers, but also high-paid, white-collar employees on Wall Street and at banking and other service firms around the nation.

People tossed out of executive jobs have had to settle for lower-paying ones.

"Americans who have kept a steady paycheck haven't enjoyed much of an income gain over the past year, analysts said, and therefore don't have as much money to spend."

Already, Americans are saving less than 4 percent of their after-tax earnings, so it's not as though they could spend much more if they wanted to, analysts said.

"The consumer is spending his little heart out. How much more can we expect him to do?" said Wyss of DRI-McGraw Hill.

All of the negative news about consumer confidence is worrisome with the Christmas shopping season right around the corner, analysts said.

### House passes major civil rights bill

WASHINGTON — Ending two years of charged debate over racial quotas, the House on Thursday overwhelmingly passed a major civil rights bill that makes it easier for victims of job discrimination to sue and collect damages.

The passage, on a 381-38 vote, sends the measure to President Bush, who has said he will sign it.

Speaker Tom Foley, D-Wash., hailed the House action as "a historic moment."

"The struggle to enact civil rights legislation in 1991 has engaged us for a very long time," he said.

The House vote was to accept the same bill passed by the Senate last week. It was the product of long negotiations between Bush aides and Senate sponsors.

### Emphysema claims actress Tierney

HOUSTON — Actress Gene Tierney, who played the enigmatic victim in the murder mystery "Laura" and was nominated for an Academy Award for "Leave Her To Heaven," was died, a funeral home spokesman said Thursday. She was 70.

Tierney, who had suffered from emphysema, died late Wednesday at her home. Funeral arrangements are pending.

She had lived in Houston since 1961, when she married Oliver W. Howard Lee, who died in 1981.

The actress' striking, high-cheekboned good looks helped propel her to stardom before the age of 20. But she battled a series of tragedies, including the birth of a daughter who was mentally retarded because Tierney had German measles during her pregnancy.

### GAO claims war profit figure wrong

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon took issue on Thursday with a General Accounting Office report that said the United States would have an \$800 million cash profit from the Gulf War after it collects the pledged war profits.

Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said the GAO was "incorrect" in its analysis.

Williams said that the Pentagon estimates its "cash cost" in the war effort at \$51 billion, and that the allies have pledged \$48.2 billion.

"That leaves a \$2.8 billion shortfall... that we will have to get in a supplemental appropriation from Congress," Williams said.

### Feds prepare Soviet winter aid plan

ROME — The Bush administration, in a move to help the Soviet Union through a tougher winter, is preparing to offer up to \$1 billion in food assistance and about \$35 million in medical aid, officials said Thursday.

An issue that must be resolved first is whether some of the humanitarian aid will be distributed to the 12 republics, said the administration officials, who discussed the package on condition they not be identified. The aid would be in the form of loans to be repaid on easy terms. However, the Soviets are having trouble paying off old debts. So, the officials said, the Soviets also be get help in servicing their debts.

### Pee-wee strikes deal, pleads no contest

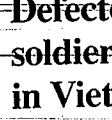
SARASOTA, Fla. — The actor who plays Pee-wee Herman pleaded no contest Thursday to indecent exposure charges in a plea bargain that requires him to make an anti-drug public service commercial.

Prosecutors said Paul Reubens' plea, if successfully completed, would leave him with no criminal record.

"Why go through a trial when this can be resolved... in a plea that's extremely fair and reasonable with his life?" asked Reubens' attorney, Richard Gerstein.

Mr. Reubens continues to insist upon his innocence — it was a plea of convenience.

## Defector: No soldiers held in Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Communist defector who once accepted the surrender of South Vietnam in 1975 Thursday said that no living U.S. soldier is held by Hanoi government, nor is it warehousing the remains of any Americans for bargaining purposes.

"Not only under oath, but more importantly, on my honor as an officer, I categorically state that there are no Americans or POW alive in Vietnam today," Bin Tin testified to a special Senate committee.

Tin, a former colonel in the Vietnamese Peoples Army who went into exile last year, also told the panel that American prisoners were interrogated by Cuban and Soviet officials during the war.

"The Soviets were especially interested in questioning electronics experts who had been aboard B-52s that were shot down on bombing missions," he said.

There have long been questions about Soviet involvement with American prisoners and some have charged that U.S. servicemen were removed to the Soviet Union.

"I do know that some Cubans and Russians interrogated some American prisoners and treated them badly," Tin testified before the special Senate committee investigating the fate of Americans missing from the Vietnam War. "But I do not know any information about Russia and Cuba keeping Americans."

Tin served in a variety of positions with the Hanoi government, including time as an editor of Communist Party newspaper. In 1975 he commanded the charge to the presidential palace in Saigon and as the ranking officer there accepted the final surrender that ended the government of South Vietnam in the small world department.

Tin also spent some time visiting camps to interview prisoners of war for a book he was writing.

## Smoking down, so is age of those who do

ATLANTA (AP) — Smoking in the United States is down again, to its lowest level ever, and the age of those who start smoking also has dropped, according to two federal surveys released Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control reported that the U.S. smoking rate has fallen to 28 percent, down a percentage point from a year earlier. That rate includes 31 percent among men, 26 percent among women, 28 percent among whites, 32 percent among blacks and 24 percent among Hispanics.

Smoking is significantly higher among those who have gone through bad marriages, the CDC noted.

Among separated or divorced people, 43 percent smoke, compared with 27 percent of married or single Americans, and 20 percent of widowed Americans.

"Separated and divorced persons (are) less likely to have quit smoking," the Atlanta-based CDC said.

"Social support provided in marriage may increase the probability of cessation," white stress — from marital discord may decrease the likelihood of quitting."

The CDC also reported that the least educated Americans smoke the most: 34 percent of high school dropouts smoke, compared with 16 percent of college graduates.

The CDC report, based on a 1988 survey of U.S. adults, points to an overall smoking trend that has been in place since the surgeon general's landmark warning against smoking in

1964. At that time, 40 percent of the nation smoked. By 1985, it was 30 percent.

Meanwhile, the CDC reported that those who do smoke are starting younger and younger.

A study of five decades of smokers found that those born in the 1950s, on average, started smoking at the age of 17.4 years — compared with 18.2 years for smokers born in the '30s, and 19.7 years for smokers born from 1910-1919.

The CDC did not report the average starting ages for Americans born after 1959. But other data show the trend toward younger smoking is continuing, said Dr. David Nelson, a CDC smoking research specialist.

"If anything, it appears people born from 1960-64 are even more likely to start smoking at younger ages."

The CDC study also found an increasing gap between "nices" in the time smokers start smoking. Blacks and whites born from 1910-1919 started at the same average age. By the time smokers born in the 1950s got started, there was more than a year's difference; whites started at an average age of 17.2, blacks at 18.3 years.

Tendency of white smokers to start younger has been seen in other studies of high-school-age Americans. Possible explanations include black and white social attitudes, health beliefs and socioeconomic ability to afford cigarettes, Nelson said.

Three pupils were admitted, one in fair condition and two in satisfactory condition, hospital officials said.

The school district said the driver reported being cut off by a tractor-trailer truck.

**Bush offers challenge at NATO summit**

ROME — President Bush said Europe's political union to state its intentions Thursday in a bold challenge that would have been inconceivable during the four decades of the Cold War.

"If, my friends, your ultimate aim is to provide independently for your own self-defense, the time has come today," Bush said in a statement inspired in part by U.S. pique at a French-German proposal for a European military.

The statement was so tough it didn't appear in the text distributed to the international press corps.

But now, with the Cold War ended and the Soviet's military might declining, NATO's purpose — even its very existence — is being assessed.

A European plan for a separate combat force is gaining support. France and Germany announced last month their intention to enlarge their 5,000-man brigade into a military corps and invited other European

Community nations to join.

And, without any potential enemy to confront them across an Iron Curtain, the more than 300,000 American troops in Europe will be reduced to 150,000 by 1994.

Sill, Bush is determined not to quit Europe. "The United States will not — because it cannot — abandon its responsibilities, its interests, and its place in Europe," he said.

The former World War II Navy pilot, recalling how isolationists had inhibited U.S. preparedness more than 50 years ago, said solemnly: "We have learned one of this bloody century's most painful lessons."

In fact, the isolationist forces in Europe and in America are by no means as powerful as they were when Bush's own Republican Party thought the wide Atlantic was security enough for America against Nazi Germany.

Americans get anxious about U.S. troops being abroad mostly when

they get bogged down in wars like Vietnam. They defend Europe without firing a shot never very controversial.

And in the alliance, itself, the United States is still considered a valuable asset.

Still, current polls show growing sentiment at home against Bush's emphasis on world affairs in the face of a persistently weak domestic economy.

Before coming here, Bush called off an "Asian trip" ostensibly to keep close tabs on Congress while it tries to doctor the economy.

France, as so often in the case, has cast itself in the proud Gaullist role of not being dependent on others.

President Francois Mitterrand, speaking before Bush, stressed NATO is important. But he said it is not a "holy grail."

Bush, according to U.S. officials, did not insert the most striking sentence in his challenge in order to reply to the French leader.

The sentence was in his text but not in the version distributed to re-

porters because the National Security Council considered it to be "too confrontational," according to a U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Word got out, however, as members of several delegations reported what Bush had said. Pio Mastrobuni, the spokesman for Italian Prime Minister Giulio Andreotti, summed up Bush's approach as being: "If you don't want us, say so."

But Italian Foreign Minister Gianni De Michelis made plain — NATO wants the United States to stay.

"I do think that when you read tomorrow the Rome (closing) declaration you will see a clear and unambiguous answer to President Bush's question," he said.

"Europe does want to maintain the trans-Atlantic partnership, including the military aspect."

"The President's message was that we want to continue only if you want us," another U.S. official said. "The President is not demanding that we be in NATO. If you are not interested there is no pressure to be here."

**Smith criticizes his prosecutor; judge restricts access to jurors**

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — William Kennedy Smith on Thursday described the prosecutor in his rape case as incompetent, a term he had used to describe a prospective juror.

During the heated sixth day of jury selection, Circuit Judge Mary Lupo took steps to shield prospective jurors' identities after a tabloid television show purportedly offered an outspoken juror "a girl."

However, the judge again upheld live television coverage of the proceedings.

Smith, a 31-year-old medical school graduate, told reporters he objected to prosecutor Meigs Lasch's criticism of the 76-year-old juror, whose television appearance led to the new arguments about banning cameras in the courtroom.

Ms. Lasch had described Florence Orbach, whose colorful and salty answers to questions about the Kennedy on Tuesday rocked the courtroom with laughter, as "borderline incompetent" and asked that Ms. Lupo dismiss her from the jury pool, which the judge did Wednesday.

Smith, nephew of Sen. Edward M.

Kennedy, D-Mass., said he had worked with older people in hospitals and found "anybody of any age can be incompetent."

"The way I feel today ... I'd say Meigs is walking proof of it," Smith told reporters outside court.

Ms. Lupo revealed that Mrs. Orbach had called her Wednesday by calls from reporters around the country and offered "a girl" by the tabloid television show "Hard Copy."

Kim Wilder, a spokeswoman for Hard Copy, said no immediate response.

The judge said most reporters covering the trial have been cooperative. However, she said,

"The problem here is not the honesty of the jurors, it's the unscrupulous conduct of certain members of the media."

The judge refused defense attorney Roy Black's request to start jury selection without cameras and to dismiss the 20 people who remained in the jury pool after the first five days of questioning.

However, she said Mrs. Orbach's call prompted her to take steps to shield jurors. Among other things, the judge dropped her practice of calling prospective jurors by their names.

The judge began emphasizing to prospective jurors they should not discuss the case with anyone and advised them that they would be on television.

Court officials will investigate any contacts to prospective jurors made by journalists.

Ms. Lupo warned that she would be yanking the press credentials of violators.

"I think the judge made a reasonable compromise," said Martin Reeder, a lawyer representing the Courtroom Television Network and other media groups. Courtroom Television is providing live coverage of the Smith proceedings to cable television subscribers across the country.

## Are satanists practicing locally?

RUPERT — Perhaps not everyone in the Mini-Cassia area believes that satanists worship in the rolling farmland of southern Idaho.

But a walk through downtown Rupert produces no skeptics when the question is posed: Do you believe satanists are practicing in the Magic Valley?

Yes, people say. But most won't give their names.

One who would, Art Smith of Burley, says, "There's no doubt that there are people of that caliber in the area."

How does he know this?

"I haven't seen ... but I've heard enough evidence that those elements exists here," Smith said.

Worshipping the devil is not against the law. But if people are sacrificing babies, as some suggest, the practice goes beyond religion to murder.

Since Baby X was found in November 1989, just about everyone in the area, it seems, has heard stories of mutilated animals and covers holding rituals, hidden in the darkness. Some say they have seen satanists at work.

For the record, law enforcement officials say they believe satanic activities take place in the Mini-Cassia area, but they don't know to what extent. The 2-year-old Baby X investigation continues, now with the help of an Idaho attorney general's investigator.

One woman, who would not let her name be used, said her eyes were opened a year ago when she saw a group dancing around a roaring bonfire on an island in the Snake River.

They weren't roasting marshmallows.

"I thought I was nuts. The hair on the back of my neck stood up," the woman said.

TWIN FALLS — A seminar for injection-well users is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 19, at the Weston Plaza.

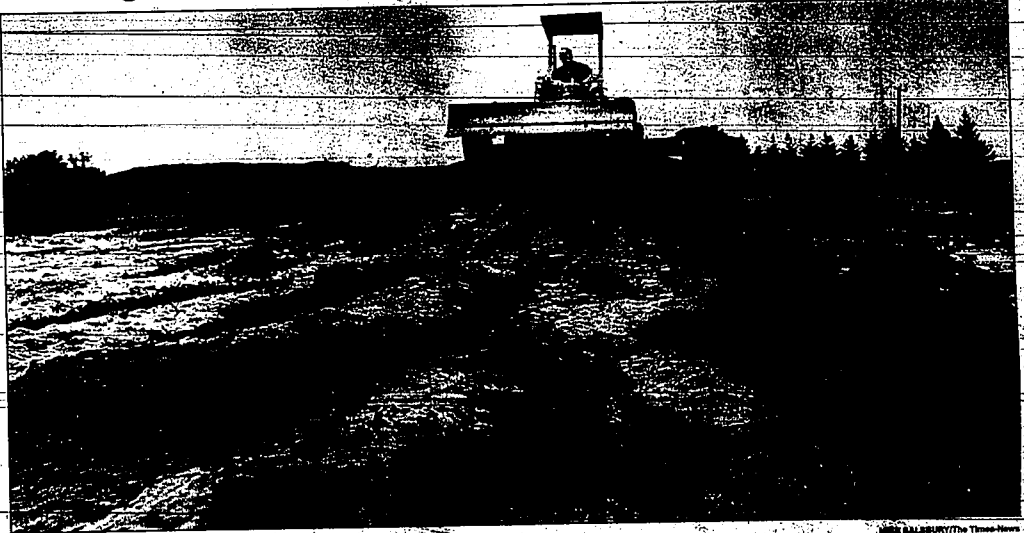
The Idaho Department of Water Resources will conduct the workshop at 9 a.m. at the Weston Plaza.

## Work center construction begins; fight is on

TWIN FALLS — The heavy equipment finally got moving this week on a controversial work release center destined for south Twin Falls.

Area residents opposed to the idea continue to fight the project, which they say will decrease property values and expose the neighborhood to dangerous criminals.

Idaho Department of Corrections officials have said the 54-bed facility will house only non-violent felons who either need additional supervision on probation or are nearing a parole date. No sex offenders will be eligible for the program, officials say.

Construction crews have begun preparing the foundation and concrete could be in a week or so, said

Jack Miller of J&M Building Systems.

Weather could pose problems, as the concrete will need 36 hours of above-freezing temperatures in order to set properly, Miller said.

Once that is done, however, most other construction can proceed, he said.

Meanwhile, former Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones has found yet another avenue to appeal the project before filing suit to stop it.

Jones, now a Boise attorney, represents several residents that live near the Washington Street South project site.

He says an appeal to the joint Twin Falls City-County appeals board is scheduled for Nov. 26.

The city already has given its blessing to the project, voting 6-0 that the work release center is allowed in the light industrial zone.

Jones says that ruling is incorrect.

In doing research for a possible lawsuit, Jones found the provision that allows people directly affected by the city's decision to appeal.

Following that avenue may enable his clients to solve the problem out of court and avoid more legal costs, Jones said.

His clients have paid him about \$1,000 so far, he said.

Another round of objections to the project is tentatively set for Dec. 5 before the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council in Boise.

That council must approve plans for all state buildings. Private developer Reed Gould, who owns the property across from the Norco Windows factory, and J&M Building Systems will lease the building to the state.

## Rupert family faces immunization roadblock

RUPERT — A Rupert woman wants to protect her granddaughter's health, but the state has thrown a roadblock in her way.

Norma Kay Thompson recently took 2-year-old Jessica to the South-Central District Health Department office in Burley to get a diphtheria-perussis-tetanus booster shot and was turned away.

Thompson said health officials told her she couldn't get the immunization because

she was not the child's legal guardian.

Thompson says the state is discriminating against her and may even threaten the health of her child.

"I just want to protect Jessica from childhood diseases, and I can't even seem to do that," Thompson said.

Thompson is raising her daughter's children. She said her daughter, who lives in Salt Lake City, cannot care for them.

"I am trying to raise her the best I can, and I want to protect her by getting her shots she needs," Thompson said.

haven't gone to an attorney yet, but I feel that I am in the process of getting legal custody of Jessica. I feel they should give her the shots she needs."

Cheryl Becker, immunization coordinator with the South-Central District Health Department in Twin Falls, said it is the state's policy to have a parent or legal guardian present when a shot is given. She added that policy has not changed for the last 11 years.

"A grandparent may not know the child's medical history," Becker said.

She added the department sometimes bends the rules if a person is going through the courts to obtain custody of a child.

It can take anywhere from a day to years to get legal custody of a child, according to Rupert attorney Charles Creason.

He said Thompson must consult an attorney, file the proper papers and attend a hearing. Then, if the child's parents are willing, Thompson may be able to obtain custody, Creason said.

## Jerome museum group persists 'full-steam-ahead'

JEROME — Backers of an agriculture museum have not been daunted by their defeat at the polls Tuesday.

"Everyone is full-steam ahead," said Virginia Ricketts, a member of the Agriculture Committee and organizer of the project. "We're still going to get it done. There wasn't a person on the Executive Committee who backed down at all."

On Tuesday, voters turned down a proposition to establish a Jerome County Museum Board to manage the proposed 100-acre museum. A total of 1,096 voted against the museum, and 386 cast ballots in favor of it.

Setting up a museum board would have cost property

owners about \$15 per \$50,000 in assessed property valuation.

The group endorsing the museum will now hire a professional fundraiser to help set up the museum. Ricketts added that organizers perhaps should have concentrated on getting support from the Magic Valley and not just Jerome County.

She added there were enough backers that signed the petition to put the issue on the ballot to give her encouragement.

"We're not too concerned about the 1,000 people who voted against the museum, as we are about the 300 who showed up. We had more than 1,000 to vote for it," Ricketts said. "We had more than 1,000 signatures on the petition supporting the museum, with 900 of the signatures validated as eligible to vote. We think

enough of the supporters of the museum just didn't get out to vote."

One Jerome official, though, said he felt the proposition failed because residents are taxed to their limit.

"It's not that people don't want the museum; it's not that people don't want a new fire truck; it's not that people are against a new school; it's just that they have their financial responsibilities," said Jerome Fire Chief James Auclair.

Others in town have said that Jerome needs a new school more than a museum.

Without a county museum board and taking district control and maintenance of the 100-acre of land leased to Jerome County by the Bureau of Land Management will now be the responsibility of the Jerome County Commissioners.

said, "I could hear chanting. It sounded like far-away humming." She saw people, dressed in what looked like dark robes, darting in and out of the fire. When she grabbed a pair of binoculars for a better look, they stopped.

The woman thinks they might have stopped because they saw her, she said. She did not call the police because she was afraid the people could identify her.

"Before then, I honestly didn't think it was happening here," the woman said. "I'm not going to say they were sacrificing. But they were practicing something."

One type of Satanism that appears to be practiced in the Magic Valley descends from the Middle Ages, said a Rupert-area minister. Families pass it down from one generation to the next, he said.

Oglevie learned about Satanism from talking to people who endured ritual abuse, from seminars and by reading about it, he said.

"It's been going on in our area for at least 30 years," he said. "I suspect much longer, but I can't prove it."

Oglevie believes Baby X might have died in a ritual, but does not say it was satanic.

"I'm not convinced it's satanic. But the manner of mutilation is consistent with a ritual," he said.

Wesley said he believes in spiritual battles. There is a battle for the soul being fought on a daily basis. Is it more severe here than in other places? I don't think so," he said.

"But there appears to be a genuine spiritual warfare."

## Mormons probe 'satanic abuse'

**SALT LAKE CITY** — Top officials of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints say they are investigating reports from members that, as children, they witnessed human sacrifices and suffered "satanic abuse" at the hands of renegade Mormon-affiliated cliques.

allegations of widespread satanic abuse. He appeared to share that view.

Glenn L. Pace, a member of the church's three-man presiding bishopric, reported in a memorandum dated July 19, 1990, and made public last week, that an "internal" church investigation detailed 60 cases in which Mormons described undergoing ritualized abuse in Utah, Idaho, California, Mexico and other locations.

"It seems to me that even though one actual case is tragic and is one too many, the reports are of ritualistic killings and are likely overblown whether they be in connection with members of our church, of other churches or any other segment of society, none of which is immune," LeFevre said.

Pace said that he is personally convinced at least 800 church-affiliated Satanists now are practicing occult rituals and devil worship in the Salt Lake Valley.

Sgt. Don Bell, chief of the Salt Lake City police department's intelligence unit, said his office receives about a half dozen reports alleging satanic abuse each year. But there are no reports of finding the body of a sacrifice victim.

Many of them, he added, pose as devout Mormon leaders and church bishops, diocese presidents, patriarchs, temple workers, members of the church's Young Women and Young Men groups, and even members of the world-famous Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

"I have no doubt whatsoever that these people who describe enduring satanic ritual abuse are victims of some very profound type of abuse," Bell said. "But I do not believe that there is an inter-generational network of Satanists active in this valley."

Church officials say some of the perpetrators represent a cross section of the Mormon culture, but sometimes the abuse has taken place in our own meetinghouses.

"In 20 years of doing law enforcement work in this city I am unaware of any case where we had seen or heard of such a ritual as ritual was to sacrifice children, conduct human sacrifices, drink human blood or any of those bizarre things."

Pace wrote to the committee set up by patriarchs to investigate behavior that weakens the 8-million-member church.

"On the other hand, I can cite case after case where we have contact with mental health-care professionals who have a patient who tells them that they witnessed a sacrificial killing or something and have convinced the psychologist or whoever that it really did happen."

However, Pace wrote, he made a point of asking the victims to identify their tormentors only by their church rank. He gave no reason for this.

"The letter, which Jerald Tanner exposed as a forgery, made it appear that church founder Joseph Smith had been involved in folk magic and satanic rites in the 1800s when he wrote the Book of Mormon."

Church spokesman Don LeFevre said he did not know if Pace reported his findings to law-enforcement officials.

Pace, he added, is traveling in South America and is not available for interviews.

Pace's memo, marked "Do Not Reproduce" at the top, was made public last week by anti-Mormon crusaders Jerald and Sandra Tanner, who also played a key role in publicizing the so-called "White Salamander Letter."

Worthington took eight hostages, including two newborn infants, and held them for more than 18 hours before releasing them unharmed and giving up. One of the women hostages gave birth on the floor of a doctor's office during the ordeal.

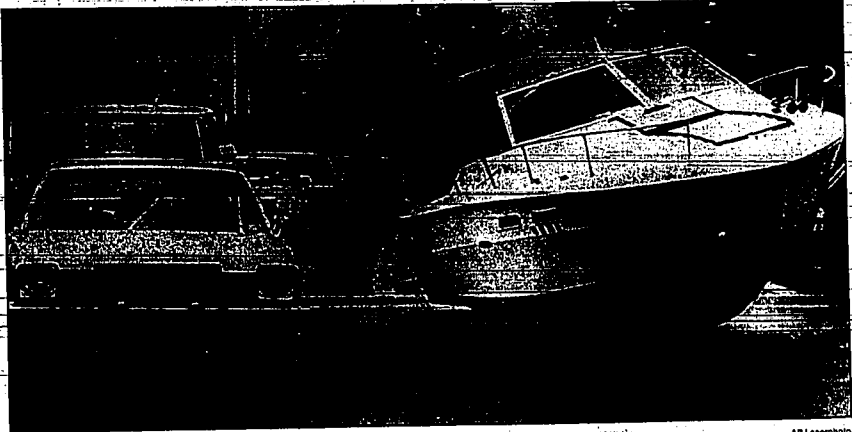

# Crystal Springs cleanup has drawback

TWIN FALLS — Fishermen, picnickers and other visitors flocked to a dredged-out and cleaned-up Crystal Springs Lake this summer. But the lake started to fill with moss, its recent nemesis. After three years of negotiating, a massive dredging project, and several meetings, another and more promising solution emerged Thursday: Make the water in the lake flow the other way.

If the Twin Falls Resources Board can get some water from a government fish hatchery, the water flow in the lake can be changed around to flush nutrients and sediments out into the river. At a hearing Thursday, the board asked for a minimum stream flow through the lake.

Crystal Springs Lake is within walking distance of Niagara Springs Park, south and a little east of Wendell. Crystal Springs was once a 7.8-acre lake with water so clear the lava-rock bottom was visible.

Earlier this year, the lake was dredged, the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation developed docks and a picnic area. With trout

as large as 2½ pounds planted by Clear Springs Trout Co., the area was popular.

"There were so many people down there using fishing access points, we couldn't accommodate them all," park manager Kevin Lynott said.

Over the years, fish hatchery effluent and less water flowing through the lake apparently have combined to create a nutrient mix that spawned moss and algae growth. Before Clear Springs Trout Co., which discharges its effluent into the lake, dredged the lake earlier this year, kids would get stuck in the muck near shore.

The problem isn't gone, Lynott predicted that moss will grow past the state's new docks on the lake if something isn't done.

But a proposal to make the water flow the other way is possible, a state official said Thursday.

Clear Springs discharges its water into the head of the lake. That water flows all the way through the lake, slowly depositing sediment and nutrients.

Even though Clear Springs discharge water meets federal standards, "it has just enough nutrients to cause problems.

Much of the lake runs roughly parallel to the Snake River. A recently completed engineering study said it is feasible to build outlets along the river side of the lake, said Jim Colla of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Environmental Quality.

Then the hatchery effluent can be forced out into the river before it can grow moss in the lake.

"That solution, however, hinges on the outcome of a Water Resource Department's decision. The Water Resource Board, an appointed body, has asked for 126 cubic feet per second from a Corps of Engineers steelhead hatchery.

The board wants the corps to flush its water through the lake in the summer months when it isn't raising fish and the lake is growing moss. Also, at the hearing, the parks department argued that it should be granted rights to about 56 cubic feet of water that bubbles into the lake right at its shore.

If it works, more people like Ruby Crosby can take their kids to a Crystal Springs Lake somewhat like the old.

"You could see the bottom any place you wanted to," Crosby said. She testified at the water resources

hearing Thursday that she took her grandchildren to the lake a few days ago.

"They didn't catch anything. The water is a little scary to take children around, because it is so mossy and appears mucky," she said.

# Craig: 'I oppose' Colorado waste

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican Sen. Larry Craig said Thursday he will oppose further shipments of high-level radioactive material from Colorado if the only purpose is to indefinitely store it at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But in an eight-page letter transmitted to Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus earlier in the day, Craig the governor has said he is, that the U.S. Department of Energy plans only to store the spent commercial fuel from a decommissioned Fort St. Vrain reactor near Denver at the INEL.

Andrus, whose recently successful court crusade to block the waste shipments has been lambasted by Craig, was in eastern Idaho campaigning for education reform and had no immediate comment.

A spokesman said the two talked by telephone about midday.

The governor has maintained that because of their reluctance to fully support his anti-waste campaign Craig and GOP Sen. Steve Symms were, they make the INEL the nation's nuclear waste dump.

St. Vrain is potentially very valuable. Although it is lumping them together makes great press, they aren't the same thing. We cannot have a constructive discussion of INEL without making the distinction that not all nuclear material possesses the same threat to our environment or the health of Idahoans," Craig wrote. "In some cases, in the case of the material now in question, the real risks are fairly minute."

Andrus, who has allowed nuclear material to continue flowing to INEL for research and reprocessing, including high-level material from the Three Mile Island reactor meltdown, has rejected the government's claim that the Colorado shipments are for research. More than 100 truckloads of the Fort St. Vrain material was shipped to INEL between 1980 and 1986, Andrus said, and no research has been conducted on it yet.

In what appeared to be a concession to mounting public opposition to the waste shipments, the senator said he asked Energy Secretary James Watkins to place an indefinite moratorium on further shipments until state and federal officials reach agreement on the future role INEL.

## Environmentalists boycott stream protection effort

LEWISTON (AP) — Environmentalists say the state's effort to protect water quality in its special streams is so flawed they will boycott the process until it's fixed.

But state officials attending a Wednesday night hearing on Idaho's anti-degradation effort argue it has its problems, but works.

The Lewiston meeting was one of several statewide sponsored by the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality.

Idahoans were asked to nominate stream segments of concern.

Latah County Commissioner Mark Solomon said he represented both the Idaho Conservation League and the Inland Empire Lands Council.

Solomon said both would boycott nontrading streams for protection because of several imperfections.

One was government employees' jobs included attending meetings to consider river protection. As a result, the meetings were made to fit their schedules, said Gerry Snyder of the conservation league.

"I'm a volunteer and I don't get paid to attend meetings during the week," he said.

He also called for writing the state Department of Lands out of the

process. The agency has too many ties to the timber industry and its focus on clean water is "clouded by its mission to sell logs," Snyder said.

Solomon was a member of a working group hashing out water quality protection for the Little North Fork of the Clearwater River and nearby Buck Creek.

"Where the rubber met the road and the whole process came to a screeching halt was access to timber," Solomon said.

Jim Bellamy, the DEQ regional water quality chief at Lewiston, admitted trying to standardize ways of tracking water quality in streams faced the same hurdles.

"Just getting everyone on the same wavelength has not been an easy chore to be honest," he said, but the good news is more attention is being paid to the biology of the streams.

For the Idaho Fish and Game Department, fishery biologist John Heimer said, it has decades of information about the numbers of fish and salmon spawning use of many streams.

The focus for Fish and Game in designing stream segments has been how many fish survive.

"We feel the bottom line if you're a bean counter or a fisherman is the

fish in the stream. We feel if you can keep the silt on the hillsides and not in the streams, that will take care of the fish," Heimer said.

Jim Colla of the Department of Lands at Coeur d'Alene said the agency began work on the project with two employees assigned to it.

The demands of supporting two dozen committees focusing on separate streams forced the agency to reassign three more people, he said.

All those who joined the working groups agreed clean water should be the goal but they couldn't agree on how to achieve it, he said.

Nonetheless, the Lands Department still has hope for the process.

"The bottom line is it's cumbersome but it does have potential," Colla said.

# Idaho Term group coping with internal strife

BOISE (AP) — A bipartisan Idaho group seeking limits on government service by Idahoans is undergoing some internal stress from both political parties because of the drive to restrict congressional service.

Pat Kolo, the GOP's unsuccessful candidate for attorney general last year, has offered to resign from Idahoans for Competitive Government because he wants to campaign for congressional office.

But Kolo, whose new initiative submitted by Citizens for Political Reform.

Within hours of that initiative's submission to the Secretary of State, Larry Eastland of Idahoans for Competitive Government announced that his group was dropping its non-binding advisory on congressional term limits.

But a month earlier, two key Democratic members of the bipartisan organization pressed Eastland, a Republican, to abandon the congressional term limit advisory. The group is also planning a separate initiative for binding limits on state elected officials.

Former Attorney General Tony Park questioned the constitutionality of a state limit on congressional service, and former Gov. John Evans said he detected partisanship aimed at unseating Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings and Larry LaRocco.

And in a letter to Eastland last week, Kolo wrote: "I said I'd like to be a member of both groups, but if one group thinks that it's incompatible, my heart probably lies with the group advocating the congressional term limit as a binding measure."

Eastland said he was "working to keep a bipartisan effort together. I don't see this as any critical crack in the movement. When there's a bipartisan effort, there's

Evans said there was "was some implication that some politics were being played against our congressional candidates," citing

Eastland's possible challenge to LaRocco.

"There's a national political movement being led essentially by the conservative Republican block," Evans said. "If I'm being duped into supporting a program that is in conflict with the national Democratic party and the national legislators, then I have some reservations."

Eastland denied the suggestion, claiming national bipartisan support for limits.

Park said his position was based on an attorney general's opinion finding the advisory unconstitutional. But he also said he expects the campaign for term limits on state officeholders to move ahead.

"I don't think it would be fair to call it a weakening as far as state term limits," he said.

Washington voters on Tuesday rejected an initiative which would have limited state legislators to 10 years total service and members of the congressional delegation to 12, including no more than three two-year terms in the state or U.S. houses.

Because of its retroactivity, it would have forced all eight U.S. House members, including House Speaker Tom Foley, to retire after 1994.

# Tax activist retaliates against house speaker

LEWISTON (AP) — Coeur d'Alene tax activist Ron Rankin says House Speaker Tom Boyd's comment "is just plain balderdash."

But the Genesee Republican says he will wait for an Idaho attorney general's opinion on the property tax initiative, and counters that Rankin just likes media attention.

Addressing Lewiston School Board members Monday, Boyd said the initiative may face a legal challenge if voters pass it next year.

Boyd noted the measure's requirement for passage of a property tax override is so strict that it is virtually impossible, and possibly unconstitutional.

The measure, which would roll property tax rates back as much as half to 1 percent of market value, requires that two-thirds of qualified voters approve an override. Under current law, the tougher standard for approval requires two-thirds approval of those coming out to vote.

Critics of the 1-Percent Initiative contend its

override standard would be impossible to meet because it would include voters who stay home as well as inactive voters whose names have not yet been purged from the rolls.

Later, Boyd said he had heard "casual" discussions of challenging the initiative in court on that basis.

But the Idaho Property Owners Association president argued the two-thirds standard, while difficult, is not impossible.

"As long as it's possible to do that, it's not unconstitutional and number two, there's no constitutional requirement that you be able to pass overrides," he said.

Rankin added the initiative is written so it would sustain a constitutional challenge. For instance, if the two-thirds provision is found to be unconstitutional, the rest of the initiative would be implemented.

"That is standard for legislation, he said. "He (Boyd) knew it was there when he said it was fatally flawed," Rankin said. "That is just plain balderdash. It's beneath him."

Boyd said he will wait for a legal opinion on the issue.

"He (Rankin) is just fighting for it. I don't make much of what he says," Boyd concluded. "He's getting a lot of press. He likes that."

# High court blocks tri-murderer's execution

BOISE (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court has granted a stay of execution for condemned triple murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades.

Lee Sims, Rhoades' Lewiston defense attorney, said Justice Sandra Day O'Connor signed the stay Thursday morning, putting off the scheduled Nov. 18 execution for the 34-year-old Idaho Falls man.

O'Connor, in effect, told state authorities to postpone executing Rhoades until the full court acts on a formal appeal filed in his behalf. The Idaho Supreme Court after refusing the planned execution Tuesday after affirming Rhoades' death sentence earlier this year for the February 1987 slaying of Blackfoot convenience store clerk Stacy Baldwin.

The court order ended the state appeals open to Rhoades.

Sims said the U.S. Supreme Court stay, requested immediately after Idaho court action, will be followed by a petition formally asking the justices to review Rhoades' case.

If that's denied, his case still could be appealed through the federal system, starting in U.S. District Court.

Rhoades is among 20 convicted murderers on Idaho's Death Row, but the state hasn't executed an inmate since 1957.

Rhoades was convicted of killing Baldwin and two other people in eastern Idaho in less than five

weeks during the winter of 1987. He was given two death sentences in connection with the murder of Baldwin, 24, who authorities said crawled away from Rhoades as he was shooting her and then lived for more than an hour before dying in the snow.

Two more death sentences were imposed for Rhoades' conviction in the murder of Idaho Falls teacher Susan Michelbacher, 34, who was sexually molested and raped before her body was riddled with bullets.

Rhoades also pleaded guilty to two first-degree murders in the death of Blackfoot convenience store clerk Nolan Haddon, 21, of Idaho Falls; and was sentenced to life in prison without parole.

# Stallings wants approval of repository bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, urged the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Energy and Power to take immediate action on a land withdrawal bill to open the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico.

Stallings, whose district includes the U.S. Department of Energy's Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, said he hopes the subcommittee will report a bill similar to one approved by the Senate.

A House version of that bill was introduced last month by Stallings and Rep. Joe Skeen, R-N.M.

"While I recognize there is disagreement on specific provisions, I hope that today's discussion clearly indicates those concerns so that we can complete action on a compromise proposal," Stallings said Thursday.

## Financing problem for building

BOISE (AP) — With future new construction revenue just half that available this year, the state's Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council has reluctantly endorsed a plan for long-term financing of \$24.3-million in new state buildings.

But in adopting its capital improvements recommendation for the state budget year that begins next July, council members on Thursday expressed concern about the developing pattern of turning to bonds to meet building needs.

The bonding recommendation was the only second ever made by the five-member council. The last was to finance renovations at the state school for the Deaf and Blind in Gooding in the early 1980s.

The proposal for the new budget calls for 20-year financing of the \$10.9 million Department of Law Enforcement headquarters and training facility in Boise, an \$8 million facility at State Hospital North in Orofino, and another 190-inmate unit at the state prison farm south of Boise.

If approved by the Legislature and Gov. Cecil Andrus, bond repayments would siphon just over \$2.1 million a year from the dwindling revenues available for state building construction. The state is already making \$4.5 million a year in bond payments for the Gooding project, the maximum-security prison and the technology building at Boise State University.

# California seeks to assure river states on its water needs

PHOENIX (AP) — California water officials are trying to convince the six other states that they're working to solve their water shortage and stop relying on leftovers from Arizona and Nevada.

"We're moving as aggressively as possible because the alternatives are not palatable to the governor," Doug Robotham, assistant to California's resources secretary, told a meeting of the Colorado River Basin States.

"I think there's a true desire to get something in place ... by early next year," Robotham said.

Water officials from Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming met on Wednesday to discuss drought-plagued California's request to increase its annual allotment of 4.4 million acre-feet of river water to 5.2 million acre-feet starting next year.

Officials in the state have also suggested siphoning water from Idaho's Snake River to ease their drought problems.

Representatives didn't reach a consensus on the plan, but all agreed to reconvene Jan. 10 in Newport Beach, Calif. to discuss the proposal further.

In the meantime, California officials plan to contact individual states to clarify their concerns about how the plan would affect future water supplies.

The plan calls for a temporary increase to help supply the burgeoning population of Southern California. The state's share gradually would be reduced back to 4.4 million acre-feet after 2010. An acre-foot is 325,851 gallons.

Representatives from some states suggested that California isn't doing all it could do to solve its water shortage.

Wilson has established a task force on the issue that's looking at conservation measures as well as better groundwater use.

Jim Lochhead, a Colorado water official, said he recognizes California's moves toward change, but the state needs to be "held to the fire" to take substantive action.

Betsy Rieke, director of the Arizona Department of Water Resources, said Arizona is taking a hardline position against the proposal because it risks the state's future water supply. "We have some very serious concerns based on our junior position to California," Rieke said.

That low priority of river water use which puts Arizona behind California — is one indication of the longstanding water battle between the two states.

Arizona's took the low-priority as a condition to get approval of the Central Arizona Project in 1968.

The proposal also suggests reimbursement to states for using their surpluses and the establishment of an interstate water bank. For decades, California has been consuming the unused parts of Arizona's annual share of 2.8 million-acre-feet and Nevada's annual allotment of 300,000 acre-feet.

## Realtors eye economy at gathering

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Declining interest rates, a commercial credit crunch, the sputtering economy and presidential politics are on the agenda for 20,000 Realtors who began their annual meeting here Thursday.

Wednesday's announcement of a drop in the prime interest rate is a major topic at the 84th annual convention of the National Association of Realtors.

Other items on the agenda include the 1992 presidential election and the make-up of the 102nd Congress, 1991 tax legislation, the outlook for the economy and real estate, and international real estate in the 1990s.

Another topic at the six-day convention is the issue of mandatory seller disclosure, a provision mandating that a seller disclose any known problems with a property he or she is selling.

Democratic presidential candidate Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts and Defense Secretary Dick Cheney are among the featured speakers. President Bush was invited to attend but declined, an NAR spokeswoman said.

With home-mortgage rates hovering in the 8 1/2 percent range, the lowest in 14 years, NAR officials weren't certain Wednesday's drop in the prime would produce a rush of new homebuyers.

NAR President Harley E. Rouda, a Columbus, Ohio Realtor, said the drop might nudge home mortgage rates down slightly, but he wasn't sure how many more buyers it would produce.

Rouda said the real estate market is being flooded with first-time buyers while second- and third-time buyers, mainly Middle America, are on the sidelines waiting out a shaky economy. "The problem is on the commercial side," Rouda said. "We still don't have money available for people who want to build apartments and housing developments."

## Fight brews over Spokane annexation

SPOKANE (AP) — Suburbs west of the city may have to wait for water and sewer extensions until an annexation agreement with the city is reached, a Spokane County commissioner says.

That could jeopardize plans by the town of Airway Heights for a state prison complex. The first 400-inmate unit is scheduled to open by the end of 1992.

A key to the project is extension of city sewer lines to serve the prison.

Commissioner Pat Mummy on Wednesday said commissioners will reject requests for water and sewer extensions until officials in the West Plains suburbs reach an annexation agreement with the city of Spokane.

Mummy said stopping right-of-way approval for water and sewer lines is the only leverage the county has to ensure city annexation practices change. Commissioners are upset that the Spokane City Council won't extend utilities unless customers promise not to fight annexation.

## Silver Mountain won't open early

KELLOGG (AP) — Silver Mountain Ski Resort officials say an early ski season opening is out of the question because of a problem with a gondola used to ferry visitors up to the site.

Opening will be delayed until workers can replace a \$100,000 motor used to drive cable lines for the gondola, said Peter Forsch, Silver Mountain general manager. The motor burned out during high-speed tests of the cable lines last week. A replacement may not be ready for another two to three weeks, he said Wednesday.

A storm last week left snow deep enough for skiing on a few Silver Mountain trails. Had snow continued this week, the ski hill could have opened this weekend, he said.

### Naming school for grocer wouldn't benefit either one

The College of Idaho is thinking about renaming itself after the man responsible for its growth, and perhaps for its very survival.

We think that's a bad idea for the school and a disservice to Joe Albertson.

The Caldwell institution's board of trustees will decide today whether to change the name to the Albertson College of Idaho, in honor of Idaho's most famous grocer, an alumnus who just happens to have given \$35 million over the years to the college.

Albertson deserves all the monuments the College of Idaho can build to him — more than once, he's kept the liberal arts college of 580 students in the business of quality education.

The Kathryn Albertson International Center stands near the J.A. Albertson Activities Center on the campus, and there is barely an academic or extracurricular program at the College of Idaho that Albertson hasn't touched.

So why not put his name on the door?

Because for all the bricks and mortar for which he's responsible on campus, it's not Joe Albertson's school.

The College of Idaho belongs to every one of the thousands of students and faculty who have made its elm- and oak-covered campus of red-brick buildings an independent center of learning. Albertson was an important part of that, but only a part.

Changing the name would leave the unmistakable impression that the College of Idaho has a price tag. That's — bad policy and worse education.

Attaching the Albertson name to the College of Idaho would

fundamentally change how the world sees the school, and how the institution sees itself. It would by perception if not in fact become an extension of the Albertson's corporate empire.

Ironically, it would also be unfair to Albertson, one of Idaho's most distinguished citizens who runs one of the state's most successful businesses. The question will be asked and asked again: Did you hear about the college that Joe Albertson bought?

College of Idaho President Bob Hendren says the switch would give the school a stronger identity. He says college keeps getting confused with those state schools in Moscow, Twin Falls and Pocatello.

Forgive us, but we're skeptical. We know of no high school senior in Idaho who has any trouble figuring out where — or what — the College of Idaho is.

College administrators and trustees often don't see how their actions play outside the ivory towers of academia. Perhaps they should ask the College of Idaho's own students, most of whom seem to be critical of the change.

They understand what the Rev. William Judson Boone, who scratched the College of Idaho campus out of the sagebrush in 1891 had in mind. He meant the school to reflect the values he taught: hard work, faith and faith in the boundless possibilities of Idaho — and the American experience.

Those were exactly the values Albertson, who attended the school in the 1920s, parlayed into a \$2 billion nationwide retail empire.

The College of Idaho could never give anything more valuable than to Albertson. We suggest it not try.

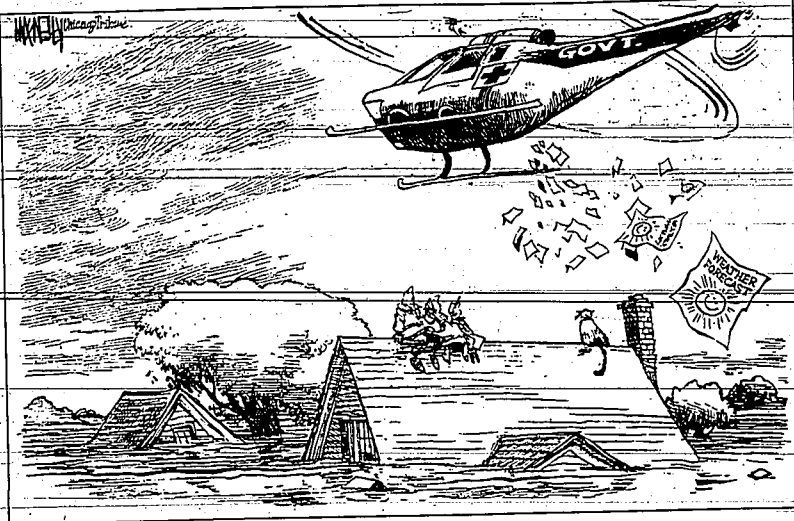

## Supplies run low for survivors of Philippine islands landslides

ORMOC, Philippines (AP) — A wall of water swept up Shirley Erlado, destroyed her home and killed most of her family — among more than 3,000 people who perished in the floods and landslides that struck two Philippine islands.

She joined other dazed survivors Thursday, wandering the streets of this devastated port. Officials were still burying the dead from Tuesday's disaster, and said they were concerned of the threat of disease and low food stocks.

"We are so busy burying the dead and taking care of the living that we don't have time to assess the damage," said Maria Victoria Loesin, the mayor of the once-prosperous harbor and shipping center of about 160,000 people.

Officials said Thursday that 3,009 died in Ormoc, on the central island of Leyte, and about 350 died elsewhere — on Leyte and on the neighboring island of Negros. More than 2,000 are missing in Ormoc and presumed dead elsewhere.

Hundreds of bodies have been bulldozed into mass graves after no one claimed them. Officials believe families were wiped out and there will be no one alive to claim many of the bodies.

with the fourth major natural disaster to strike the country in two years.

The disaster came as Tropical Storm Thelma swept over the region southeast of Manila, dumping nearly six inches of rain in 24 hours.

After the daylong rains, a wall of water surged unexpectedly, as streams swollen by mountain landslides flowed into high tides and strong ocean waves whipped up by Thelma.

"I was on my way home when I was met by water-neck-deep," said Mrs. Erlado, a 34-year-old market

vendor. "When I got there, we no longer had a house."

Her husband, Wilfredo, had been preparing lunch for the children, and her 8-year-old son Gilbert was able to scramble to safety on a roof.

But her husband and three of her children died, and three others are missing.

Rep. Carmelo Loesin, the mayor's husband, blamed the degree of devastation on the fact that illegal logging had depleted vegetation — nature's protection against landslides — in the nearby mountains.

As evidence of illegal timber operations, freshly cut logs could be seen amid the debris in Ormoc. Such logging is a nationwide problem.

"I have been warning against illegal logging," he said. "The people are now suffering for it."

The damage was severe: homes and offices were shattered, cars and trucks were strewn about, slammed into walls or swept into the sea.

Watery mud littered with garbage and other debris was ankle deep throughout the commercial district. Along the shore, thousands of human bodies protruded from the litter of furniture, appliances and power poles.

The devastation was so great that authorities have had problems compiling accurate casualty lists.

The floods wiped out three coastal shanty communities, each with a population of about 3,000.

Two days after the disaster, survivors wander through the streets searching for the bodies of their loved ones. Others sort through the piles of bodies outside makeshift morgues.

## Soviets' joy expounded on holiday

ST. PETERSBURG, U.S.S.R. (AP) — The birthplace of the Bolshevik Revolution cheered the demise of Communist power with skydivers, fireworks and concerts Thursday.

But the festivities contrasted starkly to the angry lines at food stores across the country.

In Moscow and elsewhere, people foraged for food in continued panic-buying before steep price increases take effect in the new year.

The day that once was the most sacred holiday in the Soviet calendar was marked in the capital by two small rallies, kept 200 yards apart by police in gray greatcoats.

Communist supporters carrying Lenin placards marched through Red Square, denouncing Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and Russian President Boris Yeltsin.

"It's not a holiday for me!" declared one older woman at the Communist rally in front of the Lenin Mausoleum. "Hunger! Hunger!"

A subdued rally of anti-Communist demonstrators, led by Russian Orthodox priests, mourned the victims of the Soviet regime.

The traditional Red Square parade of soldiers, tanks and missiles that gloried Soviet power was canceled by Gorbachev after the failed coup discredited the party and forced the suspension of its activities.

Less than a mile away from the Kremlin, hundreds of people lined up glumly for bread — the capital's largest bread store — for milk and bread formed elsewhere in the city early on the holiday morning.

Despite the nationwide economic crisis, the mood was upbeat in St. Petersburg, where more than 10,000 people massed in front of the Winter Palace to cheer the official rechristening of the city after more than half a century of being called Leningrad in honor of the founder of the Soviet state.

"You, the residents of this great city, must have pride in your city and do everything you can to make this a place of beauty and culture," popular Mayor Anatoly Sobchak told the crowd in front of the 200-year-old pastel-palace.

## Saddam ditches son-in-law

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Two weeks ago, amid great fanfare, Saddam Hussein pinned medals for distinguished service on Gen. Hussein Kamel Hassan, his son-in-law and defense minister — and the man widely seen as heir apparent.

On Wednesday, Iraq's official news agency reported in a terse dispatch from Baghdad that the high-flying Kamel had been sacked. It was the third time the Iraqi president has changed his defense minister in the last year.

The move marked the fall of a man who had made a meteoric rise to the top in Baghdad over the last decade. It also showed Saddam's continued taste for changing his top aides, apparently an effort to maintain his hold on power following his Persian Gulf War defeat by playing one coalition off against another.

The Iraqi News Agency dispatch gave no reason for Kamel's abrupt dismissal, and what has happened to him is not known. It is difficult to determine whether Saddam had come to perceive his ambitious son-in-law as a threat.

Given the secretive nature of the inner workings of Saddam's regime, it may take some time before the truth is known. Maybe it never will be known.

Saddam named his hard-line intelligence minister, Gen. Ali Hassan al-Majid, a cousin of Kamel and the president, to take over the defense ministry as well. The promotion of al-Majid, who already controls much of the regime's all-pervasive internal security apparatus, could signal a major crackdown on rebellious Kurds and Shiite Muslims.

The beleaguered Saddam has shuffled Iraq's political and military leadership a half-dozen times since his ill-fated 1990 invasion of Kuwait.

The survival of Saddam's regime rests in the closed, microscopic world of the ruling clans who make up Saddam's elite — the al-Majids from his father's side, the al-Tulfahs from his mother's and their close cousins.

Kamel is luckier than others whom Saddam has turned on when they became too popular, too successful or crossed him.

Scores of senior army officers are reported to have been executed in recent months for either plotting against Saddam or voicing dissent against his disastrous policies.

Another cousin, Gen. Adnan Khairallah, a close friend whose father brought up Saddam, died in a helicopter crash in 1988 under mysterious circumstances while he, too, was defense minister.

The official version was that his helicopter crashed in a sandstorm. But it was widely believed Saddam had Khairallah killed.

The two were feuding at the time because Saddam's wife, Khairallah's sister — had been humiliated by Saddam's affair with an Iraqi Airways official's wife, who bore him a son. Saddam's wife had asked her brother to intercede.

Saddam has always used his children — two sons and three daughters — to weave dynastic loyalty nets. But being linked to Saddam by blood or marriage is no guarantee of staying on top, as Kamel and others have found out.

## Palestinians bombed by Israeli military

NABATIEH, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli helicopter-bombed Palestinian guerrilla bases Thursday in two separate air raids in southern Lebanon, and Israeli-allied militiamen pounded Shiite Muslim villages for a third day.

One man was killed and four people were wounded in the first air attack on two bases of the Marxist Democratic Front for the Liberation of Palestine, police said. The bases were in the Palestinian refugee camp of Rashidiyeh near the southern port city of Tyre.

The second raid hit the farming Ein el-Hitweh settlement on the outskirts of the port city of Sidon. There was no immediate word on casualties, police said.

The Israeli military command, which also reported the raids, the second attack was aimed at a headquarters belonging to the Palestine Liberation Organization's mainstream Fatah organization.

The repeated attacks raised fear that the Lebanese army, which was only recently deployed in the south, would get involved in fighting with Israeli troops. A statement released in Beirut by the Democratic Front for the Liberation of Palestine said the Israeli attack was "proof that Israel does not want peace."

## Firearm measure gets OK

OTTAWA (AP) — Lawmakers approved tougher gun control measures Thursday, including a ban on imports of military assault weapons.

The action came amid growing public concern about rising crime and availability of guns.

The 184-14 House of Commons vote comes nearly two years after the massacre of 14 female engineering students in Montreal and government reports showing a steady increase in violent acts.

The proposal now moves to the Senate, but no date on a vote was immediately set. Justice Minister Kim Campbell urged senators to take up the bill as soon as possible.

The plan also would make it harder for potential gun buyers to obtain a firearms acquisition certificate, and requires weapons to be locked up when not in use.

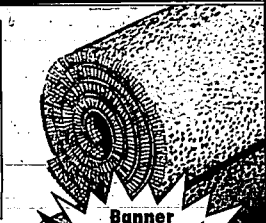
But many gun owners said the proposed changes

in the law would hurt law-abiding hunters and target shooters. Many western lawmakers said tougher gun control measures would be impractical or unenforceable in rural areas.

The governing Conservatives and opposition Liberals and New Democrats supported the bill as a compromise. The debate over gun control in Canada intensified following the slaying of 14 female students at the University of Montreal in 1989.

**TWIN FALLS** - The New York Times characterizes Max Morath as "a philosopher of American pop culture with Mark Twain's gift of gab."

Morath will be in Twin Falls Nov. 15, compliments of Arts on Tour, to perform his new one-man show "Living a Ragtime Life." The show blends Morath's talents as pianist, singer and comedian.

"I take my shows on the road about 100 days a year," said the 65-year-old Morath during a recent telephone interview. "I've been earning my living doing this since I was 17."

When asked if he is starting to think retirement, he gave a two-word answer: "No way."

Spreading the ragtime revival of the 1970s, Morath's show "Max Morath in the Turn of the Century" played New York for a season and then toured for many years. It was followed by the equally successful "Ragtime Years." His new show comes fresh from an acclaimed off-Broadway run.

"My shows are a lot more than just ragtime music," Morath said. "I can't imagine anyone sitting still for two hours to listen to ragtime piano playing."

## From dropout to dancer to art director, success is easy for Madonna's brother

**NEW YORK** - He designed the sets for one of 1990's biggest pop music tours. His first interior decorating job made the cover of Architectural Digest. And a solo show of his paintings opens this week.

Not bad for a college dropout with no formal training in art. But then Christopher Ciccone has a unique advantage: he's Madonna's brother.

"I suppose if I wasn't here, you wouldn't be here," Ciccone told a reporter at the Manhattan gallery where his show opened Thursday. "Art doesn't get that much play."

The 30-year-old Ciccone has worked for his 33-year-old sister since 1983, going from dancer in her early "Lucky Star" video to art director on last year's "Blonde Ambition" tour.

Along the way, he put the finishing touches on her Los Angeles home and designed from scratch her Manhattan apartment - a low-key yet glamorous sanctuary. Architectural Digest raves in November's issue.

Completely self-taught, Ciccone admits that having a superstar as his main client has spared him the poor-and-starving phase most young-time artists must endure.

He says it's pointless to speculate about where he'd be without her, and instead concentrates on overcoming the resentment and doubts about his talent he encounters.

"I'd rather not be known as that," he says of the "Madonna's brother" label. "But I'll always be ..."

"I'd like to think I know how to deal with it. I mean, it'd be one thing if I were that and not able to produce anything, or produce something badly. But I think, and I'm not trying to sound really full of myself, I think I'm pretty good at what I do."

Madonna apparently agrees. One of his early paintings hangs in her apartment alongside works by Pablo Picasso and Salvador Dali.

But he doesn't know if she'll be attending the opening at the Wessel O'Connor gallery in SoHo.

## Movie mix-ups come with the territory, author says

NEW YORK (AP) - He's the Sherlock Holmes-of-movie-mistakes, the Hercules Poirot of film. Like past screenland-movie-writer Bill Givens steps up when Hollywood messes up, picking out errors in box office hits from "GoodFellas" to "Home Alone."

"It's the nature of movie-making that these things pop up," says Givens, who is writing his third book on the subject. "There are 100 people working on a movie set, so many jobs intermeshing, that there's a lot of places for a slip between the cup and the lip."

Lots of places, indeed. Givens located flubs of varying degrees in 14 of 1990's top 20 grossing movies, including the top-rated "Home Alone," Academy Award winner "Dances With Wolves," the thriller "Ghost," the thriller "Presumed Innocent" and action-packed "Die Hard 2."

"I call it the 'A-ha!' factor. You're watching a movie, and it's

"A-ha! There's the mistake!" says Givens, who last year saw about 130 first-run films and rented 430 videos in his quest.

Givens' first found flub was in "Star Wars," where Mark Hamill addresses Princess Leia as "Carrie" - the name of the actress playing the role.

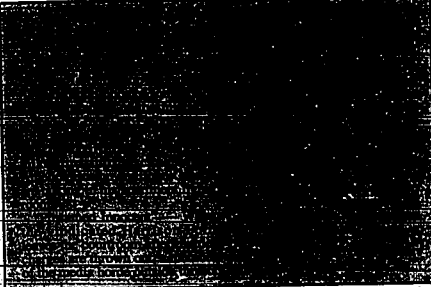
Things have snowballed since. Givens just completed his second book on cinematic screw-ups, "Son of Film Flubs," and a third is in the works.

He receives about 1,000 letters a year from eagle-eyed moviegoers who want to share what they've seen go wrong on screen.

The flubs run the gamut from minor to major to nearly unbelievable. Editing in "Pretty Woman" had Julia Roberts pick up a croissant, then take a bite from a pancake.

Mix-ups happen easily because films are not shot in the order in which they are shown.

Director Kevin Costner wound



up with egg on his face because shot, the egg is gone; in the one of his actors in "Dances With Wolves" didn't. The film features a wagon driver taking a hearty bite from a pickled egg, leaving pieces all over his mustache. In the next

Dulles Airport from a terrorist attack in "Die Hard 2," he walked up to a bank of pay phones clearly labeled "Pacific Bell."

Givens has seen about every mistake a movie can contain, although he's quick to say that he's not perfect.

He was recently watching a video of "Awakenings," with Robert De Niro and Robin Williams, when he noticed what he initially thought was a mistake was actually correct.

On first viewing, Givens believed a scene where De Niro got out of a chair and walked away out back to show a paper bag on the seat just vacated by the star. Turns out the paper bag was actually on the chair next to De Niro.

Unfortunately, Givens had already included the alleged error in his second book.

"It fooled me," he said. "It's my own little flub."

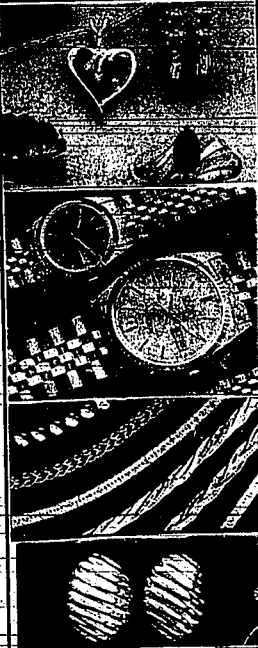

**DEAR ABBY:** Our 17-year-old daughter, "Marcie," is going steady with "Brad." They are both seniors in high school.

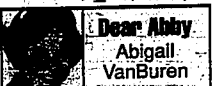
During Marcie's junior year, she ran with the wrong crowd, made some bad decisions about smoking and drinking and, yes, evenally.

# 'Sesame Street' family grows this season

**NEW YORK** — The Manhattan street where you find "Sesame Street" isn't just a place where you might expect. Actually, it's a bit scrappy.

But once you get beyond the Ninth Avenue studio doors and onto the set, it's a different world — warm and welcoming, with familiar sights such as Big Bird's nest, her "Big Bird's nest" and that front-stop fans know well.

It's where you'll find Bob (Bob McGrath), Luis (Emilio Delgado), Maria (Sonia Manzano), Gordon (Roscoe Orman), a host of Muppets — Bert, Ernie, Grover, Cookie Monster, Oscar the Grouch, Big Bird and more — and superstar guest hosts.

On this recent morning, the cast and crew of the Children's Television Workshop are working on show No. 2,984. It's the one where they'll make this season — this one brought to you by the letters H and S and the number 7.

A voice cries out from in front of The Fixit Shop.

"Captain Adventurrrrrrrr." "Everyone smiles. It's Elmo.

Overcome by some superhero bravado he picked up from his favorite comic book, the bright red puppet (originally manipulated and now operated by puppeteer Kevin Clash) is trying to lift a box several times his size.

Clash, stretched out on the floor, his hand in one of five Elmos he uses on the show, fines the action of education and entertainment, the program kicks off its 23rd season Monday.

The program will introduce several new puppet characters this year

(Roxy Marie from Canasie, a Latino monster named Rosita; a vegetarian lion named Chicago) and continue its four-year curriculum on race relations, with the 1991-92 focus on the American Indian. Among the guest stars this season: Isham Thomas, Gloria Estefan, Gregory Hines and Tim Allen. And up for discussion: such topics as ecology, voting and divorce.

The most heavily researched and certainly most acclaimed children's series on television, the English-language version of "Sesame Street" is missed in 85 countries.

Some things, however, have changed through the years. It's been a little over a year since the death of Muppet master Jim Henson, whose characters Kermit and Ernie are now silent except in name. ("His presence is missed — most by the new performers, the new puppeteers," says Clash. "My heart goes out to them because they really won't experience the way he taught us.")

And, laughs director Jon Stone,

who has been with the show from the beginning, there are always people who for one reason or another want to change the show. But he says, "I think if they're smart enough not to fool around with a winning game that it'll go for quite a while."

All of us who've worked on "Sesame Street" have these shelves and shelves full of Emmys, he continues. "And it's not that we're that hot. It's just that we're the only show of any quality out there. Basically, there is no competition."

It could quadruple the ratings tomorrow by doing a show that's 90 percent animation and 10 percent Muppets and get rid of the live people, make it extremely violent and slant it entirely toward boys instead of a mixed audience of boys and girls," he adds. "But we don't want to do that."

Created with black inner-city children in mind, the show — in large part because it became such a hit — expanded its base.

It became a rainbow coalition of characters so inclusive that director Stone jokes that the show has to "try not to look like the paratroopers in World War II, where there was a Ginsburg and an O'Hara and a Kowalski, one of everything. As we expand, it becomes an impossibly integrated set — a street that doesn't exist anywhere in the world, though we wish it did."

# Experience Buddhist heritage Thursday when monks perform in 'Sacred Music, Sacred Dance'

**BAILEY**— Sacred Music and Sacred Dance: The Mystical Arts of Tibet will be offered at 8 p.m. Thursday at the Wood River High School.

Adopted in richly textured and masks and 12 to 14 trumpets, cymbals, drums and traditional instruments, 40 monks from Drepung Loseling Monastery in south India will perform a series of rituals, including awareness of the culture by performing sacred music and dance from their Buddhist heritage.

They will be performing rhythmic dance movements and displaying their ancient vocal technique requiring many years of study and practice to perfect.

Sometimes called "The Aveson Voice," monks create a unique separate note simultaneously with rich bass tones that two octaves below middle C as well as many complex overtones.

Founded in 1416, Drepung Monastery was one of the most renowned centers of scholastic and spiritual teaching in Central Asia. It was also the largest monastery in world history, housing upwards of 10,000 monks at its peak.

However, after the Chinese invasion of Tibet in 1959, 80,000 resident monks were either killed or put into concentration camps.

The 250 fled to exile in India with the Dalai Lama, Tibet's spiritual and temporal leader, and later re-established Drepung Monastery on land donated by the Indian government.

Although Drepung was very important spiritually, historically,

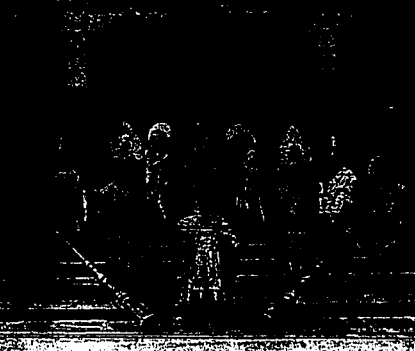

losing Loseling Monastery monks foster world peace with their rarely seen music and dance. They will perform Thursday and artistically, never in the past had allowed members of its monastery to publicly demonstrate its sacred music and other arts in the West.

When it came as a surprise in 1989, a request to allow monks to perform in Canada was a great success. That tour of 108 major U.S. and Canadian cities was a great success and led to a follow-up request to tour Central and South America and the Caribbean.

The monks earned during both the 1989 and 1991 tours will be funneled into improving conditions at the rapidly growing monastery. Targeted projects are an educational trust to aid young

refugee monks, a health care clinic, securing a safe drinking water supply, improving farm facilities, developing alternative energy systems and creating a school for modern studies.

Tickets for the Hailey performance are \$8 in advance and \$10 at the door and \$5 for senior citizens and students.

## Spiritual leader lecture

Ripke, an abbot of the Holy Cross (4th Dalai Lama) monastery in India, will be speaking at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church. The free public lecture is titled "Seeking the True Meaning of Peace."

Chogyi Rinpoche was born in eastern Tibet in 1929 and entered a nearby monastery at age 6. At 17 he was sent to a nunnery for a year. Then, where he was admitted to Drepung Tsawo Khagpor. After the brutal 1959 invasion of Tibet by China, he accompanied the Dalai Lama to India, where he worked at the Buddhist Cultural Academy, helping to re-establish the Tibetan Buddhist traditions threatened by the invasion and subsequent exodus of scholars and spiritual teachers.

At the request of the Dalai Lama, he undertook a rigorous studies leading to the Geshe Lharampa Degree (Doctor of Buddhist Philosophy). After completing a number of exams and a 16-day debating series with "honors," he was awarded a bachelors of Gyumed Tantric University.

He is currently serving as spiritual leader for the Drepung Loseling monks who are touring the United States and Canada celebrating the International Year of Tibet with their cultural presentation, "Sacred Music, Sacred Dance: The Mystical Arts of Tibet to heal and protect the planet."

# MacMurray: The nice guy that finished 1st

**HOLLYWOOD** - The Hollywood of betrayals, scandals, nightclub fistfights, power-abuse, substance-abuse and other aspects of conspicuous consumption did exist and still exists. But that noisome Hollywood was never the whole town, only its most notorious neighborhood.

Fred MacMurray, dead this week at 83 after a ravaging illness bravely borne, qualified as honorary mayor of that other Hollywood, which played by the same ground rules that were endorsed in Kankakee, Ill. and Beaver Dam, Wis., where MacMurray was born and raised.

Like Jimmy Cagney (and a crowd of others, men and women alike), MacMurray regarded acting as something you did for a living. It might not have been accounts receivable, but it was work. Cagney once said, "When I finished a picture, I couldn't wait to hop on a train and get out of town."

For years, MacMurray recreated to a cattle ranch in Northern California, where the fishing was also prime. His love for the bright lights tended to favor the sun glinting on a trout stream, or on the sleek greens of a golf course.

He was the perfect disproving of the idea that nice guys finish last. The idea went even on target for baseball, about which Leo Durocher is supposed to have said it: Lou Gehrig and Stan Musial gave the lie to that.

And if Hollywood has had a first commandment for the screen, it is that nice guys and nice women finish first.

The concept of the good guy doing worse than breaking even (except when noble self-sacrifice was involved) never had much

or attempt other heroics, but far from a clown or a buffoon. Absent-minded, maybe, a portrayal that enriched the best of Disney's live-action comedies.

The movie camera, with its undeniable capacity to see past the characterization to the player's soul, saw the nice guy that MacMurray really was. Later, and not without anxiety

snacks, MacMurray let himself play the nice guy image, creating that small but indelible gallery of bad guys, as in "Double Indemnity." The villainies seemed more villainous, or more sinfully, as in the philandering boss in "The Apartment." Because it was Fred MacMurray, for crying out loud.

He was too tall, at 6-foot-3; to have played Andy Hardy, but he could have.

In his Midwest origins he was Andy Hardy and the impression he conveyed never having left behind the small-town virtues of Beaver Dam — thrift, hard work, loyalty, civility — was part of his appeal as a performer.

The impression was not wrong, although it was true, as it was of Cary Grant, that there was a kind of two-way stretch, in which the roles created or enhanced the image, even as the actor was fleshing out the roles.

He was tough-minded and nobody's fool, but that's OK in Kankakee, too.

MacMurray knew, better than anyone, his strengths and limits as a performer. The stage and the sound stage were his acting schools and he was a quick study.

Naturalness on camera — which is as much an illusion as tears of rage — seemed easy for him, and from early days he was a good actor (as the nervous suitor in "Alice Adams," for example) and he turned out to be one of Hollywood's most expert light comedians.

The miracle of Hollywood in its early days was that it kept finding the men and women who could help to define the movies' possibilities. Fred MacMurray was one of the men.

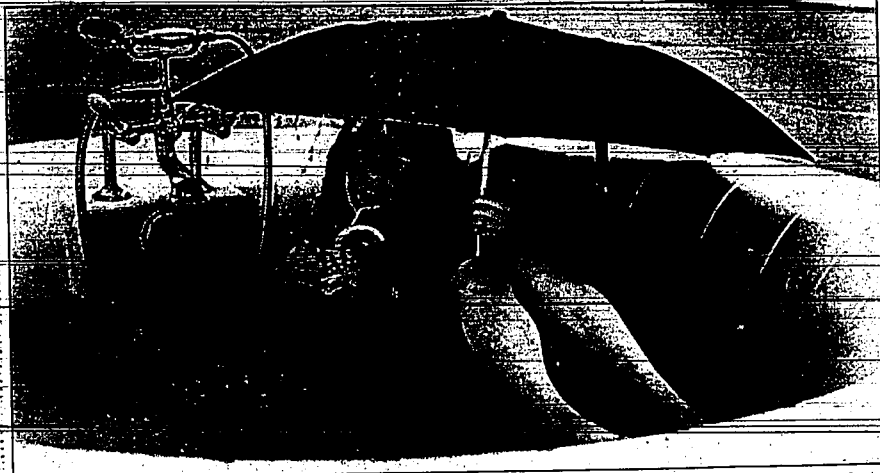

# 'Curly Sue' aims for the tear ducts

HOLLYWOOD's print ads for "Curly Sue" feature the aggressively cute mug of a treacly moppet named Allsan Porter. Since this is a John Hughes production, we're primed to think of "Home Alone," but the companion isn't really justified. "Home Alone," which was directed by Chris Columbus from a Hughes script, was a Roadrunner cartoonish clonk-a-thon, though it lacked that cartoon's rascally wit. "Curly Sue," which was written and directed by Hughes, is intermittently knockabout, but mostly it mainlines Hughes' Dickensian weepie mode. It's a mode that perhaps only Charles Dickens should attempt.

When Bill takes getting hit by a car driven by an ice-water-in-her-veins divorce lawyer (Kelly Lynch), it's not long before everybody starts weeping. The lawyer, appropriately named Grey, shucks her ruthlessly career-tracked mind-set and her obnoxious corporate lawyer boyfriend (John Getz) and gets all maternal and womanly. (In this movie's universe, successful career women are by definition unmarried, childless, and frosty.) Bill may be a scrounger but he's no thief, and he's no heel, either. Curly Sue has her scruples, Spying a billfold of hundreds in Grey's apartment, she sighs and resists temptation. Is Hughes consciously cashing in on recession-era sentimentality, or does he just come by this sort of

exploitation naturally? Although there's a disconcerting amount of body-bashing in this PG-rated film, people get clubbed with planks, run into concrete columns, bounce off car windshields—its main energies are directed at our tear ducts. And yet, it's hard to imagine anyone weeping up at this display. Whatever its origins, the film's enforced innocence is just too calculating. Belushi isn't the heartwarmer he's intended to be—he's too stolid and dour. Porter, while not quite sugary enough to send one into insulin shock, has the kind of gipsy-pizzazz that would be best served in roadshow productions. Lynch, in her pricey designer duds, looks like a sleek knockout most of the time, but she's too good an actress to fit comfortably into this supper show. Her face freezes into heartfelt poses of transparent phoniness. By the end of filming, her smile muscles must have ached.

# Controversial film takes top honors for new video releases

## Bulldog turnovers save Bruin win

**TWIN FALLS** — Timely turnovers. If the No. 1-ranked Twin Falls Bruins hadn't benefited from six of them Thursday night, their tenure in the state Class A-1 Division I might have been of short duration.

But the luckless Nampa Bulldogs couldn't maintain possession at critical moments, and it allowed the undefeated Bruins to slip to a 22-13 victory and advance to the semifinal round next week.

Just six days after they had thoroughly handed the Bulldogs, Twin Falls saw its domination of the defensive line shattered. Nampa, which had just 14 yards rushing on its home field last Friday, sprung Rob Morris for 23 yards on the first play, and Twin Falls had trouble containing him all night.

But the thing that bothered Coach Jon Jund most was the mental breakdown on offense, on defense and on the coaching staff.

Eight times the Bruins jumped the snap count on offense — once with first and goal in the first half. The Bruins came away from that with nothing and held a precarious 14-13 intermission lead.

The coaching miscue came when the Bruins, getting two first downs and moving to their own 41, tried a pass on first down and saw a deflection picked off behind the line of scrimmage with under four minutes remaining.

But in the end, sophomore tackle Jeff Pierce intercepted a pass and returned it to the Nampa 21 to nail it down with 1:41 showing.

"Now you know why there are upsets. When you take a team for granted, you'll make the mental and physical mistakes," Jund told the team immediately after the game. "We made more mental mistakes tonight than we have all year."

"That's the problem of playing a football team twice in a season, let alone twice within six days. We knew Nampa would play well down here. But we couldn't convince the players they really weren't ready for this one. We had signs all week. The starters didn't bring in their tapes and we had to force players to look at their plays."

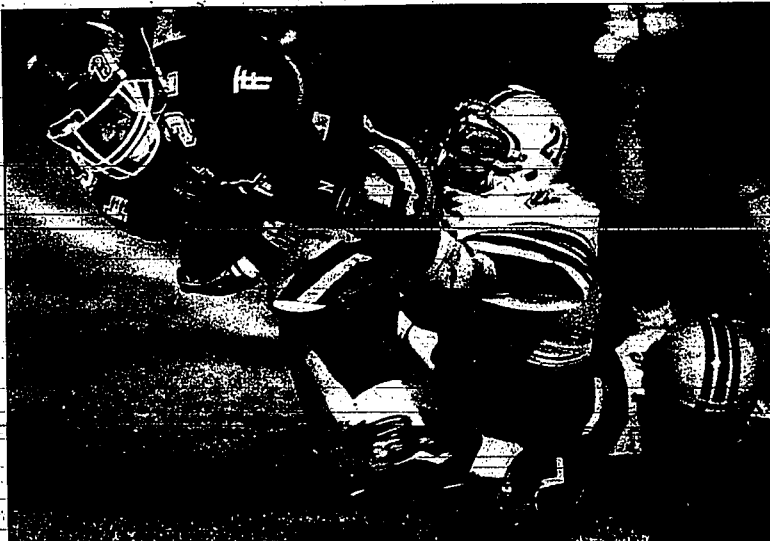
"But we played well enough to win. We came up with the turnovers that let us win."

The Bruins will play the winner of the Borah-Coeur d'Alene game that is set for 6 p.m. today at Bronco Stadium in Boise.

"We are happy to be in the semifinals and we'll be happy to play whichever team wins. But because of the problem we saw tonight, if I have my druthers I would take the team we haven't played."

Twin Falls beat Borah 29-0 in Boise in early October.

Senior Tai Gordon's performance was the exception to the rule against Nampa as he picked up 158 yards rushing (14 less than last week), scored once, threw a two-point conversion pass, recovered a fumble, intercepted a pass and accounted for Twin Falls' only quarterback sack.

Twin Falls' lethargy was evident early when Morris uncollected that early first run to put the ball on the Twin Falls 23. Four plays later, Blake Wolf's 38-yard field goal attempt hit the crossbar and bounced back into the end zone.

The Bruins then jumped into the lead, going 80 yards in five plays with quarterback Jim Horner getting the last 42 on a scramble. John McClusky hit the first of two conversions.

But for the next several minutes, Nampa accounted for almost all the offense. Phou Phimmisone's great interception turned them back at the Twin Falls 17. Early in the second quarter, however, Nampa made one mistake. Morris covered the final 20 yards of a 73-yard drive.

A reply drive by Twin Falls ran out of downs on the Nampa 20 and McClusky's field goal was short. Two plays later, the Bruins went behind when Nampa finally — after two games of trying — hit a wide open receiver over the middle. The 79-yard pass and run went from Aidan Graham to Morris. After a penalty, Nampa's conversion kick sailed right.

## Johnson brought Magic to the game

**INGLEWOOD, Calif.** — In his first professional basketball game, Magic Johnson leaped into teammate Kareem Abdul-Jabbar's arms like a joyful child just given a puppy.

From that moment on, Johnson's innocent, almost juvenile enthusiasm transformed the sport and transfixed millions of spectators worldwide. Even as he announced he was retiring from the game Thursday because he tested positive for the virus that causes AIDS, Johnson beamed and joked, smiling a mile wide.

When he came to the NBA in 1979 as a 20-year-old, the league was deflated. Attendance was stagnant, television viewers disinterested and the game dominated by talented yet humorless giants such as Moses Malone, Jack Sikma and George Gervin.

There was no spark in that first game against the San Diego Clippers — which Abdul-Jabbar won at the buzzer with a desperate sky-hook — Johnson's leap immediately gave the NBA the charisma it had never seen and so desperately needed.

It was clear, too, that Johnson's aptitude for basketball was nearly boundless. He dropped jaws, threading passes, spinning defenders and making the most difficult of shots.

The Lakers won five championships with him. His appeal reached far beyond Los Angeles. He was mobbed recently when the Lakers played in Paris, and children around the world wear T-shirts bearing his image.

Although a superstar, Johnson was the consummate team player. In the sixth game of the 1980 NBA Finals, with Abdul-Jabbar sidelined, Johnson as a rookie played all five positions on the floor, scoring 42 points, grabbing 15 rebounds and handing off seven assists.

The Lakers won that game, the title and Johnson won everybody's heart.

Although he is one of the league's highest-paid players, Johnson took salary cut last season so the Lakers could afford guard Terry Teagle.

**DETROIT** — There will never be a sadder story than this, and if there is, I want no part of it.

Like many Americans, I began to shiver Thursday just after 4 p.m., when Earvin Johnson stepped to a microphone in Los Angeles. I am shivering even as I write this. The world, it seems, has become a terribly cold place.

"Because of the HIV virus I have contracted," Johnson said, "I will have to retire from the Lakers today."

In a medical sense, it was a blip on the screen, just one more victim of a tragic disease. I don't know what we were all thinking up to this point, but I know Friday morning it is not the same.

"I want to make it clear I do not have the AIDS disease," Johnson said. "A part of my life is gone now, but I'll go on ..."

What was this? Magic Johnson? America's hero? Mr. Only Good Things Happen? And suddenly, flanked by his friends Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Michael Cooper, his NBA commissioner, David Stern, and his doctor, he was saying goodbye to the sport he revolutionized and hello to

# ABC will not charge for Notre Dame-Penn State matchup

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC Sports was put in the awkward position on Thursday of finding something we didn't do when it came to plans to put Notre Dame-Penn State on pay-TV had been abandoned.

"We never announced anything," ABC Sports spokesman Mark Mandel said, "so we don't feel we really need to" unannounce something.

Tuesday, Mandel confirmed statements by Notre Dame officials and the College Football Association that ABC was looking into the prospect of putting the game on

pay-per-view television. Mandel warned at the time, however, there was a distinct possibility the deal would collapse.

The Notre Dame-Penn State game is part of the regionalized second half of ABC's college football doubleheader on Nov. 16. It will be shown to about half the country, and the other half would have been able to buy it on a pay-per-view basis for about \$10.

Mandel said there were a variety of reasons for not putting the game on pay-TV, but he said he could not be specific. Notre Dame sports information director, John Heisler said

ABC might not have had enough time to make the arrangements. "They have had to do enough things were in place to make that be the case," Heisler said.

The pay-per-view deal would have involved Showtime Entertainment Television, which does regular boxing shows on pay-TV.

"Unfortunately, our price negotiations and private dealings were made public by some other sources, and we're in a kind of awkward situation," Mandel said. "These negotiations are not unlike other negotiations and proposals in other areas that we have ch-

osen not to go through with. It's just that you don't know about the other ones."

Asked if ABC Sports might try to put together another pay-per-view deal for college football in the future, Mandel said: "We're not going to speculate at this point."

Heisler said neither the schools nor the CFA, all of whom supported the project, had any connection with the deal's collapse.

Officials from ABC and the CFA at Boulder, Colo., held a teleconference call Wednesday to discuss the project, and CFA executive director Chuck Neinas was awaiting the go-

ahead from the network. "I know Chuck Neinas is disappointed," Heisler said.

Athletic directors Dick Rosenhal of Notre Dame and James Tarmann of Penn State supported the project, a \$37 million contract with NBC to televise its home games for five years under the CFA contract.

# Dickerson draws suspension over practice

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Eric Dickerson, suspended for six weeks last year for refusing to take a physical exam, was excited for four weeks on Thursday after refusing to practice with the winless Indianapolis Colts.

"He took himself out and, basically, it was a refusal to take a physical," Indianapolis coach Rick Venturi said after Thursday's practice.

Venturi said he made the decision to seek Dickerson's suspension, a move supported by the Colts' management.

"He was asked to come back in and refused to finish the practice. That refusal becomes conduct detrimental," the coach said. "It is a coach-player deal. I took the action."

The unhappy running back finished fourth in NFL career rushing, was suspended "for insubordination and conduct detrimental" to the team, according to a brief statement released by club. He was suspended for four weeks, without pay, and fined an additional week's pay.

The action came four days after Dickerson said he was insulted by the team's decision to pull him from the offensive unit on several key plays in Sunday's 10-6 loss to Miami.

"I took definitive action because I believe it's the right thing to do for this football team," Venturi said. Venturi said he met Thursday

is in practice," Venturi said, adding that the suspension and fine came only because of Wednesday's incident.

Venturi said Dickerson never complained to him about his playing role or told him that he was injured.

"I said I expected to see him Dec. 11 really ready to play," said Venturi, declining to discuss specifics of Dickerson's refusal to practice or their conversation on Thursday.

"This matter is between the club and the player and we will have no further comment," general manager and vice president Jim Irsay said Thursday.

Dickerson needs 63 yards rushing to move past Jim Brown for third place in the NFL's career rushing list.

"It's out of the players' hands," said quarterback Jeff George, who was unable to shed any light on the incident. "I know losing him, it's tough because he's such a talent."

The players were told of the suspension in a meeting before practice.

"It was a shock to everybody," George said. "I really don't know the details. I don't know what was involved."

Dickerson's teammates said they weren't aware of the refusal.

"I didn't know about it," George said. "I don't know what went on so it's hard for me to comment."

# Fired MSU coach takes parting shots at school

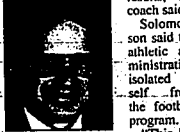
BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) — Montana State football coach Earle Solomonson took some parting shots when he announced he won't be back next year, but said he's not bitter.

"We had our chances," he said. "We didn't achieve the level of success I'm happy with. If anybody pays the price for where we're at, I do."

Solomonson, in his fifth season at MSU, said the school won't be renewing his contract for next year. The Bobcats are 2-7 this year and haven't had a winning season since Solomonson took over in 1987.

At a news conference Wednesday in Bozeman, Solomonson said the MSU football program suffers from a lack of funding, outdated facilities and equipment, difficult academic standards and a lack of leadership in the athletic department.

"Changing football coaches without making changes in financial support will yield little or no positive



results," the coach said.

Solomonson said the athletic administration isolated itself from the football program.

"This has been a difficult working environment for me and my staff," he said. "My hope is that the new coach is given an opportunity to feel part of a team and receive the support he needs when he faces difficult times."

He also said other Big Sky schools have made major renovations in their football facilities, but MSU has not. In particular, he cited the University of Montana's new stadium.

Lastly, he charged that MSU's stiffer admission policies give other Big Sky schools a recruiting advantage.

"Fred's still No. 1," Ault said.

But while Vargas-led Nevada was facing the Big Sky, it will face stiffer resistance against the Grizzlies. Montana ranks third in the league, behind only Boise State and Nevada, in pass defense, total defense and scoring defense.

It is allowing only two more points and less than eight more yards per game than the Wolf Pack.

But Solomonson wasn't the only league coach in the hot seat this week. Big Sky Commissioner Ron Stephenson reprimanded Idaho State head coach Bob Hill for defensive coordinator Land Jacobsen on Tuesday and Weber State's Dave Arslanian on Wednesday for criticizing officials' calls last week.

Idaho State (2-6, 1-5) travels to Eastern Washington (4-5, 3-3) on Saturday and Weber State (5-3, 4-2) tries to keep its hopes for an I-AA playoff alive when the Wildcats host Division II New Mexico Highlands in a nonconference game.

And in Flagstaff, Northern Arizona (3-6, 1-5) tries to climb out of the Big Sky cellar against disappointing Idaho (4-4, 2-3). The Vandals were the preseason favorite to win the Big Sky, but now are out of the I-AA playoff picture for the first time under coach John L. Smith.

## Cross-check draws 25-year suspension

PRINCE GEORGE, British Columbia (AP) — Now this is a ban.

Amateur hockey player Everette Rose can't play in the city's recreation league until the year 2016.

Rose was handed a 25-year suspension this week during an emergency meeting of the league's executives. The decision means Rose won't be able to play until he is 51.

He was suspended after a cross-checking incident Nov. 3 when referee Ralph Wood was struck in the mouth with a hockey stick.

The suspension was one of three handed to members of the Prince George Lumber Kings. It was basically a lifetime suspension, league president Wes Scott said.

Wood was struck during the final minutes of an 8-5 win by T-Bird Construction over the Lumber Kings. He was sent to hospital with mouth injuries and received 10 stitches to his lower lip after losing two front teeth and chipping a third.

Rose, a six-year veteran of the Lumber Kings and a perennial league scoring leader, could not be reached for comment. The incident is under investigation by Prince George RCMP.

The suspension is the longest in league history, Scott said. The severity of the suspension was based on recommendations from chief of referees Al Hines.

"It's the (Rose) picked another player it would have been in another light," Scott said. "Unfortunately he picked a referee."

Also suspended were Lumber King coach Harley Chingee and player Scott Machan. Chingee was handed 20 games for slashing with a hockey stick and Machan received 10 games for abusive language to an official.

## Holmes prepares for next comeback step

NEW YORK (AP) — Larry Holmes wasn't climbing his office walls, but they were closing in on the former heavyweight champion of the world.

"I don't want to sit in my office," said Holmes, who owns an office building, a hotel and other properties in and near his hometown of Easton, Pa.

"All I've got to do is sit there and wait for the damn checks to come in. I was bored."

On Tuesday night in Jacksonville, Fla., Holmes, who turned 43 last Monday, will box for the fifth time in a comeback that began last April.

This is Holmes' second comeback. He ended a 20-month retirement by challenging Mike Tyson on Jan. 22, 1988, and was knocked out in the fourth round.

"I wasn't ready for Tyson," Holmes said. "They didn't give me time to get ready. I did it for the money (\$3 million) to build an office building."

At the time the Tyson fight was offered, he was bitter about two controversial losses by decision to Michael Spinks. Holmes had been champion for 7 1/2 years until the first defeat by Spinks.

Holmes had gone into that fight with a 48-0 record.

After Holmes was knocked out by Tyson, most thought Holmes would have to settle for a fulltime business career.

The boxing itch wouldn't go away, however. In fact, it had to grow worse every time Foreman won a fight.

"I just want to be a fighter, that's all I ever wanted to be," Holmes said.

But even a fighter as good as Holmes once was gets only so many scratches.

"I'm not naive," Holmes said. "I give myself seven or eight months. If somebody kicks my butt, I've got to get out."

The 30-year-old Mercer is slow, but possesses strength and stamina. He will be favored to beat Holmes.

"After Ray Mercer, then I'm ready for Evander Holyfield," Holmes said.

### Tyson's attorney seeks dismissal

INDIANAPOLIS — Mike Tyson's attorney has asked a judge to dismiss rape and sexual deviate conduct charges against the former heavyweight champion, but the prosecutor said Thursday he is confident the charges will stand.

The prosecutor said he fully anticipated these motions would be filed, and we're confident they will be denied," Rob Smith, spokesman for Marion County Prosecutor Jeffrey Modisett, said Thursday. "It's not uncommon for motions like this to be filed on broad issues."

Tyson, 25, is scheduled to stand trial Jan. 27 on one count of rape, two counts of criminal deviate conduct and one count of confinement for sexual battery on an 18-year-old Miss Black American contestant in July. Prosecutors allege that Tyson forced himself on the woman after she rejected his advances July 19 in a downtown hotel. Tyson claims the woman consented.

If convicted on all charges, he could face up to 63 years in prison.

### Bedrosian, Leach join free agent crowd

NEW YORK — Right-handers Steve Bedrosian and Terry Leach of the Minnesota Twins and Seattle outfielder Tracy Jones filed for free agency Thursday, raising the free agent total to 91.

Thirteen players remain eligible to file by Monday's deadline. Teams may begin making offers to players on Tuesday.

### Tommy John to lead Sunshine League

BOCA RATON, Fla. — Tommy John, a three-time 20-game winner, was hired Thursday as commissioner of the Sunshine Baseball League.

John, 48, assumes responsibility for player development and base-ball operations at the league's Boca Raton headquarters. The SBL plans to begin play in November 1992 with six teams and a 56-game schedule. The league is designed to develop players seeking exposure to major league baseball.

John pitched 26 years and was 288-231 with six major league clubs. He spent eight seasons with the New York Yankees and seven each with the Los Angeles Dodgers and Chicago White Sox. He was the winningest pitcher in baseball from 1979 to 1981.

### Denver's Rockies nail stadium deal

DENVER — The Major League baseball stadium agreement, a document negotiators said was hard fought, was in fact written by the Colorado Rockies lawyers and each demand by the team was met.

In negotiating the lease deal, the stadium board gave the team every stadium revenue source, from hot dogs to parking spaces to concerts in the ballpark, the Rocky Mountain News reported Thursday.

The Colorado Baseball Partnership, this week issued a news statement defending the stadium lease, describing it as "competitive with the lease terms offered by other cities in the expansion derby."

John Antonucci, chairman of the Colorado Rockies, said he and other general partners in the team "never would have agreed to invest \$25 million in this franchise and to personally guarantee an additional \$40 million of debt without the ability to preserve the value of our investment and the long-term prospect of a reasonable return."

Public concern over the lease agreement has mounted in the past month, with county commissioners in Arapahoe, Jefferson and Adams counties registering complaints with the governing body. Voters in the six-county area in the 1990 district approved a special tax in August to finance the stadium. Before the election, they were assured they would pay only \$100 million of the project's cost.

Because the team got so much, taxpayers will now pay \$156 million toward the cost of the \$180 million stadium, officials have estimated.

### Nebraska coach upset with officials

OMAHA, Neb. — An assistant Nebraska football coach blasted Big Eight Conference officials Thursday, saying they missed "calls" in the Cornhuskers' 19-19 tie against Colorado.

"The league needs to get more young officials," Milt Tenopir told about 200 people at a Cornhuskers football breakfast gathering. "It's like a fraternity. Once they're in, you can't get rid of them."

Tenopir, offensive line coach, has been assistant at Nebraska 17 years. Tenopir said officials missed a clipping and an unsportsmanlike conduct call against Colorado in the No. 14 Buffaloes' 19-19 tie against No. 11 Nebraska last Saturday.

Nebraska athletic director Bob Devaney said Tenopir should not have criticized the officials.

There is a conference rule that coaches shouldn't publicly criticize officials.

### Thorpe leads tourney for older golfers

BLUFFTON, S.C. — Jim Thorpe fired a course-record 64 Thursday and took a 3-stroke lead over Bobby Wadkins in the \$750,000 Amoco-Centel Championship.

Thorpe birdied five of the first seven holes en route to a 31 on the front-side-on-the-par-72, 6,761-yard Hilton Head National Golf Club course. He had three birdies on the back nine, completing a bogey-free round.

Thorpe is winless on the PGA Tour since 1986.

Seven players were tied at 68, including Tom Kite, Andy North and Mark McCumber.

The tournament, which is approved by the PGA but not sponsored by the organization, features 32 golfers between the ages of 40 and 49.

# Stocks post slight rally with help from strong bond market

**NEW YORK** — Stock prices put together a moderate gain Thursday with encouragement from a strong bond market.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 15.65 points to 3,054.11.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by more than 9 to 5, and the New York Stock Exchange's Big Board volume came to an estimated 205.46 million shares as of 4 p.m. EST, against 167.40 million at the same point in the previous session.

Long-term interest rates fell as the bond market gave an unexpectedly warm reception to an auction of 30-year bonds by the Treasury, which completed a three-day, \$38 billion financing.

Prices of Treasury bonds rose nearly \$10 for each \$1,000 in face value, lowering their yields to about 7.92 percent.

Stocks managed only a small gain Wednesday after the Federal Reserve announced the fifth reduction in its discount rate over the past 11 months.

International Business Machines was a

standout, rising 3 1/2% and accounting for a big chunk of the Dow's gain. John Akers, the company's chairman, said the fourth quarter would probably be IBM's best this year.

Several retailing stocks posted point-plus gains, bolstered in part by volume increases in stores open more than a year.

Among the most active Big Board stocks, The Limited climbed 2 1/2% to 26 1/2; Toys R Us to 28 1/2; Merry-Go-Round Enterprises 1 1/2 to 13 1/2, and Wal-Mart Stores 2 1/2 to 48 1/2.

Wal-Mart Stores reported earnings of 31 cents a share for the

fiscal third quarter ended Oct. 31, up from 25 cents a share in the corresponding period a year earlier. Elsewhere in the group, Gap Inc. gained 2 to 48 1/2; Kmart 2 1/2 to 41 1/2; Federated Department Stores 2 1/2 to 108 1/2; and Sears Roebuck 1 1/2 to 17 1/2.

Banking and mortgage issues showed some notable benefits from the decline in interest rates. J.P. Morgan rose 1 to 63 1/2; BankAmerica to 40 1/2; Chase Manhattan 3 1/2 to 18 1/2; Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. 2 1/2 to 108 1/2; and PaineWebber added 1 1/2 to 33 1/2.

investment firm declared a 3-for-2 stock split and raised its cash dividend.

Bank & Jerry's Homebased class A, traded in the over-the-counter market, fell 2 1/2 to 36 1/2. The ice-cream producer reported higher third-quarter earnings, but said it expected its results for the fourth quarter to "slow down considerably."

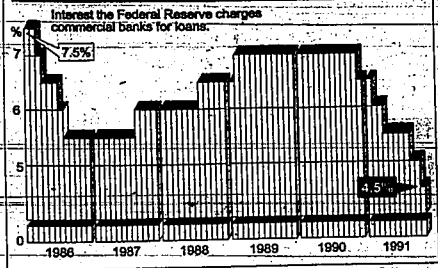

Why the federal cuts fail to aid economy

NEW YORK — The task of building a recovery from the recession that began in the summer of 1990 has fallen almost entirely to the Federal Reserve, but the central bank may not be equal to the job.

The latest move came Wednesday, when the Fed dropped its discount rate to 4.5 percent from 5 percent. The rate, at which the central bank lends to member banks of the Federal Reserve System, is the lowest since 1973.

But the effect has been limited. Manufacturing picked up earlier in the year, but the pace has slowed again recently. Burdened by debts and job insecurity, consumers have been reluctant to spend, and weak retail sales have forced producers to cut output.

White banks responded by dropping some lending rates, they have been cautious lenders at best, concerned about non-payment of existing loans and their shaky balance sheets. Many reasons are offered for the economic gridlock. Some, including the White House, claim markets have been hamstrung by tighter government regulations imposed in response to the savings and loan crisis.

The national average rate for 30-year fixed-rate loans, more than 10 percent a year ago, is less than 7 percent now. A one-year adjustable rate mortgage that cost more than 8 percent last year is now well under 7 percent. In effect, many households have received a pay raise, often amounting to more than \$100 a month, but rather than spend they have been paying old bills instead.

Experiencing a deep slump, automotive companies with financing arms have offered their own below market rates to little avail, and so

through its control of money in the banking system. The Fed set a new target for federal funds to 4.75 percent, down a quarter of a percentage point.

Prime rate: Sometimes called the "reference rate," the prime rate is a base rate on corporate loans at large banks. It is used to describe the rate banks charge their best customers, but bankers now use it as a basis for calculating loans to businesses and for determining many types of fixed and adjustable-rate consumer loans. Mortgage rates aren't included in that category.

The prime reflects a bank's costs of borrowing money, including interest it pays on savings accounts or certificates of deposit, and trails more subtle changes in other interest rates.

Explanation of lower rates

NEW YORK (AP) — Here are definitions of the interest rates that declined on Wednesday:
• Discount rate: The interest the Federal Reserve charges member banks for loans. A decrease in the Fed's discount rate often signals that the shorter-term loans—such as adjustable-rate mortgages and car loans—will be less expensive. The Fed on Wednesday lowered this rate a half percentage point to 4.5 percent.
• Federal funds rate: The interest commercial banks charge each other on overnight loans. It derives its name from the bank's excess reserves held in accounts at Federal Reserve banks.

The rate is closely watched as a leading indicator of interest rates, and the Fed can make it rise or fall

## IS FRONT-WHEEL DRIVE REALLY BETTER THAN REAR-WHEEL DRIVE?

There has been a spate of publicity and advertising which has led many people to think there is a revolutionary car development that is ushering in a new automotive era. It's called "front-wheel-drive," a term often followed in print by exclamation marks or uttered in reverential tones on radio or television.

Well, front-wheel drive (often abbreviated as FWD) is not new. It has been under the sun a long time since the earliest days of the auto industry. In fact, all the "hype" aside, it is not necessarily best for all cars.

If an engineer's assignment is to produce a race car, the design requirements dictate the use of rear-wheel drive. Virtually all Indianapolis 500 race cars are powered by the rear wheels. If an engineer is working on a new specialty car, such as a Mercury XR7 or Cougar LS, or large luxury car, most like the preference also would be rear-wheel drive.

However, if the engineer must come up with an intermediate, small or mini-size car, front-wheel drive becomes the preference - and the smaller the car the keener the preference. In fact, with mini cars, FWD is virtually a necessity.

What factors move the engineer to choose one system over the other? Basically, the design turns on how the two systems meet the 20 or so design criteria used to design a specific vehicle.

## PRO FRONT-WHEEL DRIVE

First, let's look at the considerations for selecting front wheel drive. A key one is the importance of attaining the best possible interior roominess. Inherent FWD provides more interior room than RWD. With the engine and transmission up front, the engine and transmission on front powering the front wheels, the connecting link between engine and driving wheels does not pass from one end of the car to the other. There is no drive shaft, hence no large tunnel taking up floor space.

Second, if the engineers want minimum weight in a small car, they can achieve it best with front-wheel drive. It is some 50 to 80 pounds lighter than a rear-wheel drive layout. The reasons:

- No driveline or driving rear axle
- No driveshaft tunnel
- No transmission rear support or sound suppression material to cover the driveshaft tunnel.
- There is reduced rear suspension weight.

And because a FWD car can be made smaller and lighter than a RWD car for a given amount of interior space, it's easier to get better fuel economy.

## FRONT-WHEEL DRIVE OR REAR-WHEEL DRIVE

To meet three other design criteria (and not counting some proposals that could that could involve out-of-the-ordinary engine placement such as mid-ship location), either FWD or RWD could be the choice. The three criteria are:

**COST** - Rear-wheel drive components inherently cost less, but

that advantage disappears or actually reverses if independent rear suspension is used because of the engineering and manufacturing complexity.

**TRACTION** - When a car is at less than full acceleration and on icy, snowy, wet or sandy surfaces, front-wheel drive provides better traction when the surface is level. On the uphill climbs, however, FWD is a disadvantage. At full acceleration RWD is vastly superior because you floor the pedal, traction increases as the weight shifts to the rear.

**NUMBER OF PASSENGERS** - For a small car designed for two or four passengers, FWD is better. For five or six passengers, RWD generally provides better ride and comfort levels; in part because of the superior front-to-rear ride balance.

## PRO REAR-WHEEL DRIVE

The design considerations that offer advantages for rear-wheel drive are more numerous and relate primarily to larger or performance-oriented cars.

For example, in the very important area of aerodynamics, the rear-driven car would in all likelihood have a narrower track, a lower hood weight, and therefore would offer less frontal area to wind. It also would be easier to design in the highly styled and aerodynamically efficient wedge shape.

Several of the design factors that engineers consider in the area of performance likewise tilt the balance toward rear-wheel drive. In working for maximum acceleration, for instance, the weight shift toward the rear wheels provides better

traction. In braking, too, the edge goes to rear-wheel drive. Although the two configurations offer equal braking capability, front-wheel drive braking is more difficult and costly to develop because there is more weight at the front end.

For hard cornering of high-performance cars, RWD gets the nod because there is better front-to-rear weight balance, and the front tires can provide only so much cornering grip. (In FWD, some of the grip is used to propel the vehicle, some for steering.) Again, in high-performance steering and handling, the weight distribution factor favors the steering and driving functions on different wheels.

When the engineer looks for flexibility - so that in later models he can install longer engines, diesels, or other different powertrain components - RWD will be favored. This holds true whether he considers powertrain packaging, function (in the sense of noise, vibration and harshness) or the cost of making those later changes.

The RWD car tends to cost less to service and repair because some of its powertrain components cost less. It is less expensive to repair front-end collision damage, and both brakes and tires tend to last longer. Similarly, the rear-wheel-drive vehicle should be less costly on general damageability. However, it is possible to achieve equal levels of durability, quality and reliability in either of the two systems.

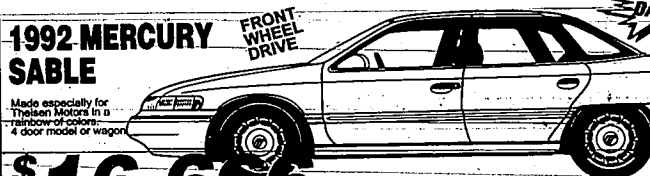

# Powerful, emotional script about sibling violence captures Lee's attention, time

By Connie Passalacqua

We are just beginning to ask Michele Lee why she has chosen to assume the gritty role of a mother whose harassed younger son murders her violent older son in the CBS movie "My Son Johnny," when Lee blurts, "Wait a minute. May I just preface everything by saying it's really an extraordinary movie — a very powerful one and a very emotional one?"

Like Karen Mackenzie, the outspoken, right-as-rain character she has played on CBS's "Knots Landing" for 12 seasons, Lee has fluck. Not to mention staying power — she is the only cast member to have appeared in every episode since the 1979 premiere.

Lee says that she was preparing to take her first vacation in three years when the script for "My Son Johnny" was sent to her. "I was turning the pages," Lee recalls, "and I cried to my husband (CBS executive Fred Rappoport), I can't go on vacation. I gotta do it!"

In the movie, which airs Sunday, Nov. 10, Lee plays Marianne Cortino, a blue-collar Baltimore widow who overlooks a pattern of violence in her home. It culminates when her younger son, Anthony (played by Corin Nemec), kills her older son, Johnny (Rick Schroder), who had been beating him regularly.

According to statistics cited by CBS, more than 19 million adolescents each year inflict severe beatings on their siblings. "I was really drawn to the issue," Lee says. "Sibling violence is a problem that's really startling. And it's a lot more common than any other kind of family abuse we hear about, like wife abuse. What drew me to the mother is that this is a universal problem for all parents. We can share it."

"And, as women," Lee adds, "I

think we're taught not to see the bad. My character can't see that Johnny (Schroder's character) is anything but normal.

"Very often with kids and problems — with things like alcohol or drugs — we think it's something they'll grow out of. That's a mistake. It's the same with this."

Of her character, Lee says, "Marianne is an extraordinary woman in that she thought she could fix everything alone. She's well-meaning and simple and has a good heart. She struggles."

Lee has high praise for co-stars Schroder ("He's terrifying in this!"), Nemec ("He was nominated for an Emmy for 'I Know My First Name Is Steven'"), and Rip Torn ("He's always great"), who plays family defense attorney Brian Stansbury.

Lee also feels that a good case is the secret of the longevity of "Knots Landing," the last surviving nighttime soap from the '80s. "The actors genuinely like each other, and that transmits to the audience somehow," Lee says. "They sense our joy, our fun and our love for the characters."

After all these years, Lee says that she still likes playing Karen, an always-harassed heroine. Lee enigmatically predicts "good drama, for Karen and Mac (played by Kevin Dobson) and Greg Sumner (played by William Devane)" for the rest of the season.

Lee has already directed one episode this season and is scheduled to direct the season-ending cliffhanger.

"After that," she says, "maybe I'll take my vacation."

## NBC tries its hand again at overnight news

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC television — re-entered the overnight news war at 2 a.m. Monday with a pre-dawn news service for affiliates called "NBC Nightside," its first such foray since axing "NBC News Overnight" in 1983.

ABC plans a similar pre-dawn service for its affiliates, "World News Overnight," starting Jan. 6.

CBS broadcasts "Nightwatch" in the pre-dawn hours but may drop that 9-year-old interview series; possibly for a news service similar to those of its rivals, CBS spokesmen have said.

The pre-dawn news operations are the networks' effort to compete with 24-hour Cable News Network, and with CNN material broadcast by some of its affiliates.

CNN says more than 140 of its television station affiliates are also affiliates of the major networks.

NBC's service, operated by the NBC News Channel in Charlotte, N.C., will have a rotating team of three anchors. News Channel President Robert Homer said.

Only one, Sara James, was specifically hired for the service. The others, Sandy Gilmore and Diana Korick, are in their slots temporarily until two permanent anchors are found.

Gilmore works for the News Channel in Washington and Korick at the NBC News bureau in Burbank, Calif.

"Nightside" will operate seven days a week, from 2 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. EST.

It offers affiliates up to 4½ hours of news programming in each time zone during the period when the NBC television network is "dark" in that time zone.

The network's regular programming stopped after "Later with Bob Costas" and resumed with "NBC News at Sunrise."

**Q:** What's this I hear about Al Pacino being fed up with making movies he doesn't like and now wants to do only meaningful films he feels personally strong about? — P.M.

**A:** There is truth to the fact that Pacino is weary of starring in pictures he's paid huge sums for but doesn't care about personally. **Q:** Isn't Ann-Margret something of a hermit? Is she anti-social? — H.J.

**A:** Ann-Margret is not your aver-

age Hollywood social butterfly. She hardly ever appears as a non-performer in public. The 50-year-old star isn't really anti-social so much as she's super private. She likes to attend an occasional football game (the L.A. Raiders are a favorite). However, she admits she finds it a pain to go out in public. Truth is Ann-Margret is a bundle of nerves and is most painfully shy. Still in all, she likes to entertain small groups but very much in the privacy of her own home.

**Q:** Veteran actor Mickey Rooney likes to present himself as a big gambler. Is that really true? — I.P.

**A:** I'll answer this with an anecdote told to me by Esther Williams, Hollywood's reigning swim queen of the '40s and '50s. Esther made her movie debut in the early '40s with Mick in an Andy Rooney flick. "He was always on the phone calling his bookie," she recalled. Rooney, born as Joe Yule 70 years ago, tells me he's still always on the phone to his bookie. Yes, Mick loves to play the horses. It's a lifelong passion.

**FILM FLIM-FLAM:** When the movie comedy, "The Pickle," starring Danny Aiello, Shelley Winters and

Dyan Cannon, began filming just outside New York City's Central Park, the production crew realized that all the foliage hadn't yet turned into the bright fall colors required by the script. Not to worry: Within hours, fake fall leaves had been attached by unseen wires to the existing trees by an army of workers, lending a surprisingly autumnal look to the shoot.

**Q:** What's this about wholesome Pat Boone making sexist and anti-Semitic remarks in public? Can that be true? — G.S.

**A:** Pat Boone, at 57, fully retains the wholesome, clean-living image that he established early in his career. He is not a sexist and certainly not anti-Jewish. Boone, in fact, volunteered to mediate problems of alleged anti-Semitism involving a cable TV show called "Animated Stories From the New Testament." Boone is also an ambassador of tourism for the state of Israel — or "the Christian ambassador," as he puts it.

# Gales of November sweeps blow in a mix of nostalgia and ennui

It used to be you could count on being swept away by the sweeps.

The networks would load up for the big ratings game in the quest for higher ad rates by offering splashy events like "Lonesome Dove," "Winds of War" or "The Thorn Birds." There was actually a sense of excitement and anticipation when November, February or May rolled around.

No longer. Belied by the return and a lack of imagination, the networks are playing it mostly tame and lame for November sweeps 1991. The price is right.

We'll get two-part episodes of regular series. And there will be the gimmicks — hurricanes go whizzing through the Miami settings of "The Golden Girls," "Empty Nest" and "Nurses" (NBC, Nov. 9).

And, surprise, surprise, nostalgia is still big. It's also worth a bit of excitement, since CBS is going back to the recycling bin for another "Classic Weekend." This time we'll get "The 20th Anniversary of the Bob Newhart Show," "The Very Best of 'The Ed Sullivan Show' II" and "Memories of M.A.S.H." Nov. 23-25.

But aside from the possibilities for some retrospective bliss, most of November is chockful of ruts.

The main rut is malus, time-drenched schlockudramas based on true stories. "Wife, Mother Murderer" (ABC, Nov. 10), "Deadly Medicine" (NBC, Nov. 11) and "A Mother's Justice" (NBC, Nov. 25) are just three of the headline-inspired examples of this increasingly tedious trend.

There's also the comfort of old faces in familiar roles. Kenny Rogers returns as Old West gambler Brady Hawkes in "The Gambler:

The Luck of the Draw" this Sunday on NBC. And a week later on the same network, Robert ("The Untouchables") Stack pops up in "The Return of Eliot Ness."

Two other November events that should create above-average viewer interest: the celebrity-drenched "A Party for Richard Pryor" (CBS, Nov. 23) and MTV's 10th anniversary special (ABC, Nov. 27), which will feature live performances by both Michael Jackson and Madonna.

But getting into the real November sweeps groove just isn't the same anymore. It's going to require some slap-happy couch potato-to-self-delusion.

So pass that remote control and let's get busy.

You say Aretha Franklin and Candice Bergen are going to unleash a dizzy duet of "A Natural Woman" on "Murphy Brown" Nov. 11? Well, awright. Shake it up, ladies. And sweep me away.
