Snake sockeye on endangered list

SEATTLE — The federal government on Thursday listed Idaho's Snake River sockeye salmon as an endangered species, making it the first Columbia River water will be diverted from generating electricity, farming and shipping.
Just four of the fish returned to their ancestral spawning ground this year.
"What this means now is that the region is going to be held accountable for protection of the sockeye salmon, and that is a legal accountability," said Bill Bakke of Oregon Trout, which has petitioned for listing other salmon species as well.
The National Marine Fisheries Service listed the Snake River sockeye as

endangered under the Endangered Species Act, forcing the government to act to save the fish from extinction.
"At one time, these fish were so abundant that Native Americans and early miners depended on them for food in several locations within the Snake River basin," the agency said in a statement in Washington, D.C.
The designation of the salmon was not unexpected.
"The good news is that the region has been preparing itself for this listing for

Water users fear lost rights

TWIN FALLS — Thursday's listing of the Snake River sockeye salmon is an endangered species left Magic Valley water users shuddering at the prospects of lost water rights and higher electricity costs.
The action by the National Marine Fisheries Service to protect the migratory fish and its Columbia Basin habitat presents a real threat to water

rights of southern Idaho users, said Mike Tracy of Boise, spokesman for the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation.
"Absolutely, especially in the Magic Valley" with its dependence on irrigation for farming, Tracy said.
"Everybody in the Magic Valley should be concerned about this," he added.
And an Idaho Power Co. spokesman said customers may pay higher electricity rates, depending on the

They're back

Coeur d'Alene returns after memorable visit in 1982

TWIN FALLS — Running back Corky Federico knew he was in trouble that day when the Coeur d'Alene High School football players took their helmets off for the national anthem.
"They were huge — some of them had beards and mustaches," recalled Federico of the last time the Vikings came to Bruin Stadium. "We took one look at them, and I think we were beaten before we started."
"I thought I recognized some of them from the post office wall," recalled teammate Curtis Gambrel.
Federico, now a welder for Intermountain Gas Co., and Gambrel, currently a Twin Falls city policeman, and their teammates were on the winning end of a 35-13 pillage by the Vikings that November day in 1982, losing the Idaho Class A-1 state championship in the process.
Coeur d'Alene returns for the first time since then for the semi-final game of the state Class A-1 Division I playoffs tonight at 7 p.m.

U.S., Britain charge Libyans with Flight 103 attack

WASHINGTON — Two Libyan intelligence agents were charged Thursday by U.S. and British authorities with planting the bomb that destroyed Pan Am Flight 103 in 1988, killing 270 people.
Bush administration officials said high-ranking Libyan officials were deeply involved in the plot and left open the possibility of action against the Moammar Gadhafi government.
"We find it very hard to believe this could have been carried out without the active involvement of higher ups within the government," White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said.
The indictment of the two agents

returned here by a federal grand jury and the British charges capped what FBI Director William S. Sessions called "the largest international terrorist investigation ever conducted."
The charges against the agents of Jamahiriya Security Organization, the Libyan intelligence service, were announced simultaneously in Washington by Acting Attorney General William P. Barr and in Edinburgh by Scotland's Lord Advocate, Lord Fraser of Carmyllie.
The Dec. 21, 1988 bomb blast killed all 259 people aboard the New York-bound Boeing 747 plus 11 people on the ground

when debris from the explosion fell on Lockerbie, Scotland, and the surrounding countryside.
Fitzwater did not rule out the possibility of using military force to arrest the suspects, who are believed to be in Libya, saying, "we are considering action and I'll leave it at that. We don't rule out any option."
Fraser said the two are presumed to be in Libya and are unlikely to be "arrested in the normal way."
Barr, awaiting Senate confirmation to be attorney general, vowed that the investigation would continue. "We will not rest until all those responsible are brought to justice. We have no higher priority."

The two suspects are Abdel Basset Ali Al-Megrahi, 39, a high-ranking ISO official, and Lamen Khafra Fhimah, 35, a covert ISO operative who posed as station manager for the Libyan Arab Airlines in Malta.
Abdel Basset is first cousin to Said Rashid, whom Boucher described as "a leading architect and implementer of Libya's terrorist policies."
Rashid, who was identified in the indictment as the ISO's operations director, also ordered the timing devices in the Swiss firm of Meister et Bollier in Zurich.
"Abdel Basset was involved in the operation of ABH, a Libyan company that leased space from the Swiss firm, the indictment said."

The National Weather Service says a ridge of high pressure pushing in from the Pacific was bringing dry and cooler air into western Idaho late Thursday.

Light snow fell over the Magic Valley much of Thursday, but there was little if any accumulation. Temperatures remained near freezing most of the day and winds were light.

Heavy snow falls across Wyoming, other parts of West

A major storm had dropped as much as 20 inches of snow on Wyoming as of Thursday, and threatened to spread snowfall far south as the high country of Arizona and New Mexico.

Rain was scattered from Oregon to Tennessee.

At midday, snow was falling over the central Rockies and west of the Rockies.

The storm had dumped 20 inches of snow at Arrowhead Lodge, Wyo., for a total of 26 inches on the ground, and Bear Lodge reported 15 inches of new snow for a total of 23 inches on the ground, the National Weather Service said.

House defeats bill replenishing deposit fund

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Thursday defeated the bill to replenish the deposit fund that insures the nation's \$110 billion bank depositors.

The 227-191 rejection came despite appeals from President Bush and congressional leaders of both parties. The House Banking Committee immediately scheduled a meeting for next Tuesday to craft a new version.

Before adjourning later this month, Congress must enact the legislation or risk seeing the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. unable to protect depositors with accounts in failed banks.

The bill would have required the FDIC to repay up to \$70 billion in taxpayer loans from insurance premiums charged banks.

Keep implants, FDA panel says

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Food and Drug Administration panel unanimously recommended Thursday that silicone-gel breast implants remain available to women despite finding that safety data submitted by four manufacturers was inadequate.

The panel recommended that more safety data on the devices be gathered.

Panel members expressed concern about the lack of safety and durability data on the implants but said they were equally concerned that denying these devices to women could also have harmful consequences.

Several panel members urged the FDA to monitor the use of the devices closely, to assure that women who want them are informed of their risks and to prod the manufacturers to improve the implants.

This should send the manufacturers a message that it is no longer business as usual," said Mary E. Davis, a member of the committee and an associate professor of pharmacology and toxicology at West Virginia University.

She told the FDA, "You have a stick. Use it. American women deserve to have this information."

Committee members said they could not conclude the safety of groups of women had a greater need for breast implants than other groups.

For example, they said they didn't believe that the implants should be available only to women who have lost a breast to cancer or who want to enlarge their breasts.

"We must allow people to choose what they want to do their body," said Dr. E. James Potchen, chairman of the radiology department at Michigan State University.

Quite the contrary for Coeur d'Alene.

recovery plan that the fisheries service officials, but probably not for a while.

"This could reduce the availability of hydropower at various times of the year and require us to rely on other sources," Jeff Beaman said.

The ripple of the fisheries' service decision was felt from one end of southern Idaho's irrigated cropland to the other Thursday, bringing warnings from state officials of court action amid fears that downstream interests would try to undo the expected severe economic impact on electricity consumers and irrigators.

"We've got to take a balanced approach. Unfortunately, a lot of downstream users are looking at upstream interests," Beaman said.

A balanced approach would include sending more water down the river, but also lowering reservoir levels downstream of Idaho and eliminating the salmon harvest, he said.

"Bald eagles are an endangered species and we don't hunt them. Why should we harvest salmon?" Tracy said.

Twin Falls attorney John Rosholt, one of Idaho's top water-law experts, said the living presents the potential of taking a lot of water out of Idaho. He questioned whether the sockeye can be saved, and added that if the spring, summer and fall chinook salmon runs are also listed as endangered, the whole Snake River system might be affected.

Federal and state studies show that it would take all the water in Idaho dams, and more, to increase water flows to help the smolts, said Lynn Tominga, Boise, of the Idaho Water Users Association.

chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee. An attorney representing county interests also was consulted.

Council member Ned Bowler of Hayden Valley Citizen Alert Inc. voted for the plan. But he questioned what he said seemed to be the disproportionate influence of industry on the panel's decisions.

"Is there any question but what Bowler asked, 'I think we're kidding ourselves if we don't recognize that the composition of this council was loaded from the beginning at the direction of the Legislature.'"

A draft of the Ground Water Quality Plan issued in June recognized that "One set of state regulations cannot encompass every circumstance everywhere in the state" and that local governments should "protect the health, safety and general welfare of the public they serve in ways that do not duplicate" state or federal law.

The final version states only that local governments "should assist in the implementation of the Ground Water Quality Plan to meet local needs," but should take no actions that conflict with the plan.

Johansen said the original language received broad support at public hearings throughout the state on the draft plan. If anything, she said, citizens said the local involvement provision should be stronger.

But Johansen said opposition led by Lyman undermined that position, resulting in language not as stringent as industry would have liked but weaker than supported by local government representatives.

Post office, workplace shootings on the rise

The rampage at a suburban Detroit post office is part of a bloody trend that has seen an increase in workplace shootings during the past decade. And while no place is immune from the danger, postal workers seem to face an added risk. "Postal workers have a high stress job, they get no respect and if they're fired, there aren't many options for them," said James Fox, dean of the college of criminal justice at North-eastern University. On Thursday, a 31-year-old fired postal worker went on a shooting spree in Royal Oak, Mich., killing three co-workers. The gunman, Thomas McIlvane, was in critical condition after shooting himself. The rampage follows last month's killings of four people by another fired postal worker, Joseph Harris,

35, is charged with shooting his former supervisor and two of his friends here, then gunning down two employees at the Ridgewood, N.J., post office. One of the nation's worst massacres occurred at an Edmond, Okla., post office in August 1986 when Patrick Sherrill, part-time letter carrier, killed 14 people before fatally shooting himself. During the past eight years, postal workers fired on colleagues at at least five other post offices in Alabama, California, Louisiana, New York and South Carolina, showing that these flames of workplace violence haven't been confined to postal workers. In the 1970s, there was an average of 10 incidents a year where an angry employee shot a supervisor at work. In the 1980s that number doubled, Fox said.

Bystanders often are caught in the killing spree. "You don't kill your fellow workers because you're mad at them, you kill them because they are associated with the place where you've been working. You're angry and you want to get back at your employer," Fox said. Fox said such workplace rampages are likely to increase as the nation's worker population ages. Studies of mass murders show that the killers are generally middle-age men, frustrated with their lives and often moved to murder by the loss of a job or the end of a marriage. Postal workers run a greater risk because their jobs carry more stress and tension than most are often criticized by the public. The loss of a \$30,000 a year post office job is often hard to replace.

Safety Commission casts warning about potentially dangerous toys

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly two dozen children died last year while playing with unsafe toys, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said Thursday in its annual warning to parents about potentially harmful playthings. "Many parents are not buying the appropriate types of toys for their children's skills and ages," said commission Chairwoman Jacqueline Jones-Smith, adding that youngsters should not be given toys with small removable parts. The CPSC said 23 children died last year and estimated that 129,000 were injured by toys. A year earlier, the agency had attributed 33 deaths to hazardous toys.

The commission issues the warning each year before the Christmas season, the biggest toy-buying time of the year. But consumer groups criticized the federal agency for not being tough enough on toy makers. "The commission obviously needs to improve its regulations," said Lucinda Sikes of the U.S. Public Interest Research Group. "They're definitely not doing enough." Sikes said the number of children injured in toy-related accidents increased 11 percent from 1989 to 1990. She said many injuries involved small balls that met federal standards designed to weed out objects that can lodge in a child's throat.

CPSC issued its warning a day after Boston lawyer Edward Swartz, 165 years this year, named for the country's first dangerous playthings, issued his annual list of most dangerous toys. CPSC does not compile such a list, but noted that the agency has recalled 165 toys this year ranging from teddy bears and dolls in trucks and trains to tools and cooking utensils. Last year, 252 toys were recalled. None of the toys on Swartz's list was recalled; some were no longer in production. Jones-Smith said the commission has "had to do a lot more digging and a lot more searching" this year to find unsafe items.

Dangerous toys buyers guide

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here are suggestions from the Consumer Product Safety Commission for parents to use in deciding which toys to give their children. When deciding which toys to buy, the agency says: • Avoid giving young children toys with small parts. Youngsters can choke on them. Also stay away from toys with sharp edges and points. • Never buy a toy for a child to "grow into." Toys that are too advanced may frustrate and confuse a child and may also contain

parts that can injure small children. • Don't buy electric toys with heating elements for children under 8. • Buy safety equipment such as knee pads and helmets for use with bicycles. • After toys have been bought: • Keep toys for older children away from younger kids. Teach older children to store their toys out of the reach of younger brothers and sisters. • Always supervise young children during playtime.

based on reports from consumers, lawyers and coroners. She said the injury figures were based on the number of children treated in hospital emergency rooms nationwide. Jones-Smith said the commission has increased its efforts to keep foreign-made toys that don't meet U.S. safety standards from entering the country. She said CPSC, cooperating

with the U.S. Customs Service, had seized 1.7 million toys in the last year. Sikes said three-fourths of the toys that her public interest group considered dangerous were made overseas, and that foreign manufacturers are "not getting the message that there are these safety standards that they must meet."

Educational TV hits classrooms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly 10 million high school students have access to commercial-free educational programming in school, and cable officials predicted Thursday that the number will double in a year. Anne B. Hester, cable executive heading a nationwide initiative known as Cable in the Classroom, said the industry spends \$53 million annually to provide the services in high school classrooms. The goal, he said, is to provide educational programming to every public high school by December 1992 and to every state-accredited private secondary school by September 1994.

Programs run the gamut. The Discovery Channel daily provides an hour for documentaries that focus on science and technology, social studies, world events and contemporary issues. CNN offers a 15-minute news program, while PBS stations contribute "Reading Rainbow" and "3-2-1 Contact." Cable in the Classroom is a non-profit group spearheading the cable industry's effort to provide educational programming to schools. Members include 45 national cable companies that serve more than 80 percent of all cable subscribers; and 20 cable programs.

House approves unemployment benefits bill, Senate comes next

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House roundly approved a \$5.2 billion measure Thursday giving extra benefits to the long-term jobless as Congress neared an end to its four-month duel with President Bush. Lawmakers said the first checks could be in the mail by Thanksgiving. By a 396-30 vote, the House sent the Senate the compromise measure, which was crafted after Bush joined a Democratic effort he long resisted. Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, promised to rush it to Bush "as fast as we can." The president's promised signature meant that 3 million people who will have used up the standard 26

weeks of unemployment benefits during the recession could qualify for up to 20 more weeks of coverage. The action came as the Labor Department announced the highest number of people filing for new jobless claims in six months. Claims for the week ending Nov. 2 reached 454,000, a 33,000 increase over the previous week and a figure that experts said meant that layoffs were continuing. After a four-month battle that saw Bush kill two earlier versions of the bill, congressional Democrats and the president hailed the measure but blamed each other for the delay. Democrats said Bush had changed his stance after noting his popularity was dropping. "Heek, if there's an-

other drop in the polls in the next round, we may pass our whole legislative agenda," Mitchell said. "Better late than never." House Whip David Bonior, D-Mich., said of Bush during the floor debate, "Welcome aboard." Bush countered that the initial bills had violated last year's budget agreement by relying on emergency borrowing that would have increased up the deficit. He also said those bills were "simply attempts to embarrass him by forcing him to authorize such borrowing, an action that would have proven uncomfortable for a president who was arguing that the recession was over. "We could have had it last summer if certain leaders up there hadn't tried to inflict a political defeat on me," the president said. In the end, Democrats relented on the question of financing. The final version of the bill would be paid for largely by forcing people with high, quickly-rising incomes who pay estimated taxes to make their payments faster. "We wanted to sign a bill that is paid for," said Bush. But Democrats noted that the bill's benefits package was nearly identical to the measure Bush killed last month.

Conservative writer might challenge Bush

WASHINGTON (AP) — Commentator Patrick J. Buchanan plans to challenge President Bush next year as a voice for disaffected conservatives, friends and party activists said Thursday. "He's serious," said longtime Republican operative and Buchanan friend Edward Rollins, "He's 99 percent certain he's going to do it." Rollins said Buchanan told him he expects to make a final decision near the Thanksgiving holiday. Any Republican would have a hard time wresting the nomination from Bush. But Buchanan could stymie the White House's goal of focusing on the fall general election while Democrats bloody themselves in the primaries. "I haven't paid much attention to that yet," Bush said with a smile when asked about the potential challenge. Buchanan, a former Reagan and Nixon White House aide, now writes a syndicated column and is a regular on CNN's "Crossfire" and other political shows. He is a favorite among conservatives who loathe Bush, and believe Buchanan would make a credible showing in New Hampshire's kickoff primary Feb. 18. "I don't have any doubt there is going to be a campaign," said Chris Tremblay, a New Hampshire conservative who said he was asked by

Buchanan's sister, former U.S. Treasurer Angela Buchanan, to plan a primary campaign in that state. "She told me that Pat told me it's a done deal. It's a go," Tremblay said. Attempts to reach Buchanan and his sister were not immediately successful. Messages left on their answering machines were not immediately returned. The Union Leader, a conservative newspaper in Manchester, N.H., urged Buchanan to run in an editorial last Friday, and Buchanan was quoted in the newspaper's Saturday editions as saying he was considering the race. It is not the first time talk of a Buchanan challenge has surfaced. Buchanan said he was mulling the race last year after Bush abandoned his no-new-taxes pledge. But the talk soon faded and was viewed more as a vehicle to vent conservative anger at the White House than a serious exploration. Recently, conservatives have renewed their attacks on Bush for compromising on civil rights legislation and for failing to lobby for tax cuts to spur the economy.

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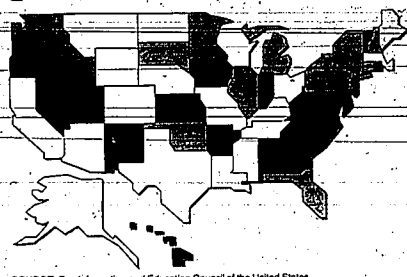

ATLANTA (AP) — The number of U.S. AIDS cases could nearly double in a federal proposal Thursday that would expand the definition of the disease to include 160,000 people infected but not yet seriously ill.

The case count stands at 195,718, but 1 million more Americans are believed to be infected with HIV, the virus that causes the disease. Health officials estimate 160,000 of those many of whom don't know they're infected would fall under the new definition.

AIDS activists said the expanded definition would make more people qualify for disability payments, but warned that more officially recognized AIDS patients could mean a bigger battle for treatment resources.

The current definition, adopted by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in 1982, is based on conditions that prey on HIV-infected people, such as a rare pneumonia and a rare skin cancer.

The proposal goes out Friday for comment from health experts.

The CDC hopes to release its final version in January, with state and local health officials using it to report AIDS cases by April.

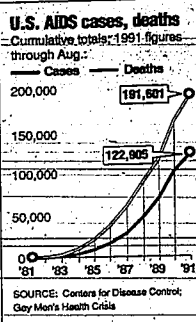
The new definition would add patients who aren't necessarily sick, but whose immune systems are already under severe attack by the virus.

"We recognized that the current definition was missing people who had severe HIV disease," said Dr. John Ward, reporting and analysis chief at the CDC's Division of HIV and AIDS. "To get a more accurate representation of the total population of severely infected people, we're adding this immunologic criteria to the case definition."

The new definition will mean thousands more AIDS patients will qualify for disability, either from their jobs or with Medicaid, said Peter Uitenbosch, treasurer of the National Association of People With AIDS. "That, in the worst case, could mean even more of a battle for treatment dollars."

"What the government is trying to create in this case is people who have the disease fighting among each other, all fighting to the last dollar," Uitenbosch said.

"People declared with full-blown AIDS ... can go on disability, which is automatic for Medicaid. And there are no more dollars available."

Sun spurs cancer by crippling gene

NEW YORK (AP) — Ultraviolet light in sunlight encourages development of a common skin cancer by disabling a protective gene, says a study that revealed the sun's chemical fingerprint in the altered genetic material.

The study is the first to report this direct evidence of sunlight-induced damage in a human skin cancer, said study co-author Douglas Brash.

Researchers noted that multiple genetic changes are needed to produce cancer, and said that since people tend to get most of their sun exposure during youth, the damage to the protective gene

might occur more than 50 years before the cancer appears.

"It's one step along the way to the cancer," said Brash, an assistant professor of therapeutic radiology at the Yale University School of Medicine.

It is not clear whether sunlight is responsible for any of the other mutations needed to produce the cancer, he said Thursday.

The general connection was already well established between sun exposure and the cancer, squamous cell carcinoma, which is expected to strike more than 100,000 Americans this year and kill 2,000.

Heart disease prevalence same despite less deaths

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Contrary to widely held belief, the prevalence of heart disease in this country has remained almost unchanged during the past generation, even though it's killing far fewer people according to a study.

The findings suggest that better medical treatment — not healthier lifestyles — are largely responsible for the vastly improved heart disease outlook.

Researchers say this means there should be even more effort aimed at preventing heart disease before it occurs as well as keeping people alive after they already have had hearts.

"Deaths have gone down, but the heart attack and angina rates have not," said Dr. Peter Wilson. "The proportion of people with heart disease is as big as it's ever been."

The new data was based on the Framingham Heart Study, a landmark review that over the years has revealed much of the world's information about what causes heart trouble.

The findings were presented at the annual scientific meeting of the American Heart Association. Despite the decline in deaths, heart disease remains by far the nation's biggest killer.

Stress test a good tool

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — A new technique using a drug to mimic the effects of exercise on the heart can accurately diagnose all forms of heart disease in the many patients unable to take the stressful treadmill test, researchers say.

It is low cost, versatile and portable," said one of the developers, Dr. Pamela Marcovitz of the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.

The technique uses an ultrasound scanner to view the heart

while the drug dobutamine is administered intravenously to make the heart beat harder and faster and to boost blood pressure — precisely duplicating the effects of exercise.

Changes in movement of the heart during the chemically induced stress test help measure the health of the heart muscle, the coronary arteries, the heart's valves and other structures.

The technique is referred to as dobutamine echocardiography. It has been experimented

Bishops OK policies, reject birth control

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Catholic bishops Thursday urged Americans to campaign for the environment and children's rights while rejecting mandatory birth control as a means of curbing overpopulation and "safe sex" as a way to combat AIDS.

The National Conference of Catholic Bishops overwhelmingly approved an initiative on youth that deplores the high poverty, abortion and infant mortality rates in the nation, rejects "safe sex" approaches to combating AIDS.

"Instead of promoting the illusion of 'safe sex,' we need to warn our children and society of the dangers of sexual promiscuity and drug abuse," the bishops said.

The bishops' document on "Renewing the Earth" their first major foray into the environmental debate criticizes the "voracious consumerism" of the West and encourages natural family planning to ease the population crisis.

"The easiest approach is to say there's too many people so let's get rid of some of them, whether by abortion or artificial contraception," Archbishop Daniel Pilarczyk of Cincinnati, the conference president, said after the vote.

"What we're saying is that's too facile. We could get by with lots more people if guys like you and us used a lot less."

On the final day of their fall meeting, leaders of the nation's largest religious denomination also voted 165 to support a statement urging the church to address the social justice concerns of American Indians as it commemorates the 50th anniversary

of Christianity in the Americas. In addition to calling for the just resolution of treaty disputes, the bishops' statement supports giving the nation's estimated 250 million Catholics a greater role in the church.

But the document, which proposes the establishment of a national Committee on Native American Catholics, was somewhat of an embarrassment to the prelates because so many left the meeting early they lacked a two-thirds quorum.

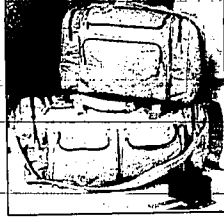
Pilarczyk said later it will be a "shoo-in" once absentee ballots are received.

The environmental statement encourages further research into species extinction, deforestation and global warming, and urges the U.S. church's 55 million Catholics to consider their moral obligation to preserve the planet.

Among its general policy recommendations, the statement says population control is an environmental concern.

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Evangelist's ministry to sell major holdings

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Jimmy Swaggart Ministries is selling a \$1 million, 14.9-acre estate, a \$175,000 house and \$3.2 million worth of television equipment.

Swaggart's brother-in-law used to live on the estate, which backs onto the large houses owned by Jimmy and Frances Swaggart and their son, Donnie, and his wife.

The Swaggarts once lived in the \$175,000 house but sold it to the ministries in 1985 for \$197,000, court records show.

The television equipment is being sold by a Las Vegas-based broker, and includes a 48-foot mobile television truck priced at \$1.6 million.

Jimmy Swaggart Ministries officials did not return telephone calls about the sale of the houses and the television equipment. Swaggart resigned from the board of the organization after he and a prostitute were pulled over for traffic violations Oct. 11 in California.

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Prince returns to welcome, problems

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Prince Norodom Sihanouk, regarded by many as Cambodia's savior, returned from a 13-year exile Thursday to a rousing welcome and a host of awesome problems in a country shattered by civil war.

As head of an interim government, the 69-year-old prince must mediate among four bitter foes that have yet to lay down their arms, and pave the way to U.N.-supervised elections in 1993.

There are fears the Khmer Rouge, a faction that killed hundreds of thousands during a brutal three-year rule, will lunge for power and, once again, the world will do nothing to stop its murderous ways.

Foreign officials have said they are afraid of the Khmer Rouge, and one said the country was a mess.

Still, the return of Sihanouk, Cambodia's head of state until a 1970 coup ousted him, is a bright spot in a dark past of agony and future troubles.

Tens of thousands of Phnom Penh residents waved flags as Sihanouk glided by in a 1963 Chevrolet Impala from the airport to the Royal Palace where he will again reside. Onlookers raised photographs of him, while some chanted "Long live the return of the prince."

"I'm very happy to have seen Sihanouk before I die," said Sek Touy, 70, a barefoot peasant who waited for Sihanouk's arrival at the Royal Palace.

At the palace entrance, the prince held hands with accompanying Prime Minister Hun Sen in a gesture of triumph, blew kisses and pressed his hands together in the Buddhist sign of respect.

The Sihanouk-led Supreme National Council will meet later this month although a date has not been announced. This interim body in-

cludes the Phnom Penh government and the guerrilla factions that fought it for 13 years — two non-communist groups and the widely detested Khmer Rouge.

A small Khmer Rouge advance team is in the capital, but the government says a key Khmer Rouge leader, Son Sen, will not arrive until Sunday. Representatives of the two non-communist factions are here.

The return of Sihanouk, who led

the guerrilla coalition, was made possible by a peace treaty signed last month in Paris after years of negotiations.

The accord has set in motion the United Nations' most expensive peace-keeping operation, a \$1 billion project designed to monitor the cease-fire and help administer the country pending elections.

In a possible sign of things to come, Gen. Preap Tom of the Phnom

Penh Defense Ministry accused the Khmer Rouge of violating the truce. On the eve of Sihanouk's arrival he warned that "the war is not over."

Phnom Penh radio also said Wednesday that guerrillas of the Khmer Rouge and the Khmer People's National Liberation Front, one of the two non-communist factions, attacked government positions Nov. 10 and 11.

To keep the peace, the several thousand U.N. peacekeepers must try to disarm 150,000 soldiers and prevent cease-fire violations.

But other problems also remain — millions of mines, 350,000 refugees along the Thai-Cambodian border, and the economic and social havoc of two decades of war. By almost every yardstick — per-capita income, child mortality, prevalence of disease, the country is among the world's most deprived nations.

Many in Phnom Penh aren't optimistic. A bicycle repairman, who gave his name as Sophan, said: "With the Khmer Rouge, the only thing I ate was rice soup. Now, it is the same."

Cambodia's slide into agony began in 1970 when a rightist coup ousted the prince, who had ruled Cambodia first as king and later as civilian head of a one-party state.

Phnom Penh's new leaders, backed by the United States, took on the Vietnamese who were then building up the Khmer Rouge. After a savage five-year war, during which the United States dropped 200,000 tons of bombs on Cambodia, the Khmer Rouge entered Phnom Penh in triumph in 1975.

Returning from exile in Beijing, Sihanouk underwent house arrest while the Khmer Rouge enacted a revolution far more radical in ideology and execution than those in the Soviet Union and China.

Skinheads ravage homes of Vietnamese, stab man

LEIPZIG, Germany (AP) — Neo-Nazi skinheads burst into the homes of two Vietnamese families, smashed their belongings and stabbed one man, police said Thursday.

The separate attacks in the east-German city of Leipzig were the latest and among the boldest in a surge of violence against foreigners in Germany.

Six intruders on Wednesday kicked in the door of one apart-

ment, beat and kicked the husband and threw him in a cellar, where he was stabbed with a knife. Police said the 43-year-old man was hospitalized with serious injuries.

Also Wednesday, four rightists broke into another apartment and threatened the Vietnamese couple inside with baseball bats and gas pistols. The intruders demolished the apart-

ment.

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Salvador rebels announce unilateral truce

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Salvadoran rebels announced a unilateral truce on Thursday, calling off all military action until a U.N.-brokered peace accord is signed with the rightist government.

Leaders of the leftist Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front said the announcement to cease combat starting Saturday was made because it appeared an agreement to end the 11-year-old civil war was near.

At least 75,000 people have died in the bitter conflict, most of them civilians.

The current U.N.-mediated talks have focused on the thorny topics of purging the armed forces of human rights abusers and the creation of a non-military national police force.

In El Salvador, President Alfredo Cristiani welcomed the move as a "signal of good will" but made no reciprocal truce offer.

The guerrillas' announcement came at a news conference in this capital, where a round of U.N.-mediated talks is under way. All five members of the rebel high command were present.

"We have to create the right atmosphere for signing a peace accord and rebuilding the country," said rebel commander Eduardo Sancho.

In New York, U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar praised the decision but warned that "important points still remain to be negotiated."

"This initiative should provide a much-needed

boost in confidence in the negotiating process as the end draws closer," he said.

Another guerrilla commander, Joaquin Villalobos, said the guerrillas would fight only "in case of an extraordinary attack." He said his fighters would confine themselves to guerrilla-controlled territory.

"We hope for a reciprocal attitude from the government and the Salvadoran armed forces," said guerrilla commander Schafiq Hamdi.

Cristiani said the government "will be analyzing the situation beginning Saturday in order to take corresponding unilateral measures with the objective of definitively ending the war in the shortest time possible."

Satanic hysteria obscures very real case of 'Baby X'

The debate over whether there is satanic activity in Minidoka and Cassia counties is getting out of hand. Residents are justly concerned that the case of the 1989 killing of an infant whose burned and mutilated body was found at the Minidoka County landfill — "Baby X" — has not been solved.

But the devil-behind-every-burning-bush paranoia that has arisen in its wake just isn't supported by the facts. In the past two years, nobody has been charged, much less convicted, of any crime related to satanic activity in the Mini-Cassia area. Although stories abound among law enforcement officers, social workers, school counselors, clergymen and teen-agers about ritual activities in the Magic Valley, so far they're just that: stories.

Stories like these have lives of their own, as they have had for centuries. Fear of the unknown, of the devil, of dark forces that manipulate the everyday lives of people have been part of Western civilization since the beginning. It was only with the Enlightenment nearly three centuries ago that people began to look at them critically.

Critical thinking demands dragging fear and superstition into the harsh light of the truth, and that's often a painful process.

There was a time when colonial Americans burned their neighbors at

the stake in the fervent belief that we were destroying witches. From Nathaniel Hawthorne to Arthur Miller, our writers have chronicled the hypnotic, destructive power of superstition and the conflict between truth and fear.

If we've learned anything in the process, it should be that illusions, half-truths and rumor are the stuff of ignorance, tyranny and mob rule. We can't afford the luxury of surrendering to it.

Is there satanic activity in the eastern Magic Valley? Maybe, but if so, it's practiced by a few people who are seeking refuge from reality. There's nothing illegal about dancing around campsfires and howling at the moon, and those who do so should be seen for what they are: the lunatic fringe.

Satanic activity isn't the issue here. The murder of Baby X is.

There are serious questions about how Minidoka County has dealt with that investigation so far, and how the county and the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare responded to the case of a boy who said he saw crimes committed during satanic rituals.

Those Magic-Valley residents who are promoting a satanic conspiracy theory may have a different agenda, long on hysteria and short on facts.

It's time for more of the latter and less of the former.



Sign on the dotted line for higher truth

Wall Street and the banking industry are keeping a nervous eye on the latest fund-raising pitch from Carl Roberts, who has a million God-fearing Americans rushing \$500 checks to Tulsa to head off "a satanic conspiracy" that could endanger us all.

Actually, considering the recession, I'm not sure all of the chosen million are responding immediately to the TV preacher's appeal. Though they are not by nature the skeptical type, it is possible that a few may stop and think before they mail their checks.

If they do, the good Rev. may not be as successful this round as he was the last time he said terrible things would happen unless his TV flock came through with the right amount of cash. In 1987, he warned that God would spirit him away if he did not raise precisely \$8 million. He said the money was for scholarships for medical missionaries.

The money came in. Whether the result has been a sharp uptick in the number of ministers holding a heather, I cannot say. But with the support of the faithful, Roberts' Oklahoma empire has survived nicely, thank you — until lately.

Lately, there has been a dropoff in contributions.

Roberts' son, backup preacher and spokesman, Richard, blames the fact that one of Olm's competitors, Jimmy Swaggart, got caught with a hooker again last month.

Exactly how this cause-and-effect worked is not explained. To reporters in Tulsa, young Roberts said news of Swaggart's having a prostitute in California when stopped by traffic police in California "has broken our hearts. We continue to pray for his

brother. And yet, our finances have dropped."

That "and yet" conjunction is curious. Does he mean the mere act of praying for his brother should have brought the Roberts conglomerate enough favorable notice from the bell tolls, it tolls for thee and me, any broadcast evangelist should be sorry when any other gets into public trouble. The Swaggart escapades, the conviction of Jim Bakker and the fishy odor about some other such business enterprises taints the credibility of them all.

On the other hand, in this recessionary year, the struggle is kept for contributions from a finite number of the gullible. With Swaggart twice caught, Bakker out of business and times tight, it would seem the swarms still out of jail would be glad of any development that shrinks the competition.

The Tulsa World broke the story about the new Roberts fund-raising letter that says "We've got to have a financial breakthrough or all hell is going to break loose against this ministry." There is "a satanic conspiracy to stop God's healing ministry in the earth," the letter says.

Despite the apparent imminence of the threat, Roberts is not sounding the alarm via that mass media, his spiritual home,

television. He can't issue the appeal by TV "because of the enemies of this ministry," he explains. Interviewed, Richard admits that he is upset at talking about it "with the secular media." It's a private matter, he says, involving the Roberts "family" of a million proven genes.

By "the enemies of this ministry," he obviously means outfits like the conservative World, which keeps a close eye on the Roberts empire. Once such "secular media" get onto something like this appeal, they start asking questions, and it's all downhill from there.

This is a brilliant example of how the topsy-turvy illogic of the religious right promotes fears of a permanent conspiracy. The alleged conspiracy is not the operation trying to raise half a billion dollars out of public sight, for purposes impossible to trace — it is instead the rest of the world, which asks too many questions about such operations.

Why questions are so annoying is made clear in Richard Roberts' reluctant interview, in which the impending satanic disaster is reduced from planetary to local scale. The money, he concedes, is needed to pay the Roberts ministry's business debts and finance its television shows.

Any true believer will understand how the chance of failure in Tulsa equals, in the Roberts vocabulary, "a satanic conspiracy to stop God's healing ministry in the earth."

For the harsh facts, too scary for the general public, you may send a check to you-know-who. That will put you on the mailing list for higher truth, forevermore.

Nuclear weapons plants an unnecessary expense

Mikhail S. Gorbachev introduced perestroika to save an ailing Communist system; instead, he unleashed political forces that eventually overwhelmed him.

Likewise, President Bush, with his unilateral ban on tactical nuclear weapons, might be unwittingly setting into motion forces that will bring down his administration.

Bush is a shrewd politician. By eliminating 3,000 short-range battlefield weapons, he could spare the really big-ticket items, such as the long-range strategic nuclear weapons, the "Star Wars" program, and the B-2 Stealth bomber. This plan, however, may backfire.

Bush is suddenly vulnerable. His proposal has emboldened Congress to clamor for deeper defense cuts in a Pentagon budget that currently soaks up \$300 billion, one quarter of every tax dollar. Once sacred nuclear weapons programs are now up for grabs.

Recently, for example, Congress dealt the B-2 bomber a mean and hard blow by blocking the purchase of any new bombers this fiscal year.

But perhaps one of the most vulnerable items is the plan to build new reactors to replace 17 aging, highly contaminated nuclear weapons plants. The Department of Energy has decided to delay for two years the decision on building the proposed Savannah River plant reactor in South Carolina, which is to replace five decrepit reactors shut down since 1988. Perhaps a wise decision would be to cancel it entirely, instead of delaying the inevitable.

Closing down the Savannah River plant and other reactors will yield enormous dividends to hard-pressed taxpayers. By contrast, dramatically eliminating the 24-hour nuclear alert system may grab the headlines, but it saves very little money. Cutting the Savannah reactor alone would net \$5 billion in construction costs and billions more in operating expenses. Ending plans to restart one of the closed, aging reactors would also save several more billions of dollars.

With 30,000 nuclear bombs in the U.S. arsenal, even proponents are hard pressed to justify spending billions to produce tritium fuel for more hydrogen bombs. Battlefield nuclear weapons, which exist to serve a useful purpose, they became obsolete because they were to be fired from West Germany into East Germany. Likewise, this reactor may be obsolete before it is completed early in the next century.

The strongest defense of the reactor, however, is that the political situation is always fluid. The United States, the proponents point out, might face a new adversary. They advocate building this new reactor as an insurance policy against unpleasant surprises.

Having an insurance policy is sound national policy, but there is a much cheaper insurance policy. This is to simply recycle the tritium from existing bombs. Tritium from about 20,000 active bombs can be recycled. (This is nothing new. The United States has been recycling tritium for decades as older bombs were phased out. Since 1988, for example, the Pentagon has been getting its tritium by recycling. This recycling may continue for 10 more years, when the new Savannah reactor is expected to go on line.)

There is enough tritium in the stockpile to last several decades. This is because only 5 percent of the tritium stockpile decays every year. Even in an emergency, there are still enough hydrogen bombs that can be recycled to annihilate any adversary.

The new reactor may also have a shorter useful lifetime than expected. Physicists now realize that the steel in any reactor vessel degrades from the intense radiation, which is called neutron embrittlement.

Because of the fierce radioactivity generated in any reactor core, the neutrons cause small, but frequent, micro-fractures in the steel. Over a period of several decades, they might grow and eventually burst the reactor vessel. Recently, several physicists have issued disturbing reports that the controversial, commercial Yankee Rowe reactor in Massachusetts is too dangerous to clean up. Tens of thousands of workers at these sites were carelessly exposed to dangerous levels of radiation. A new reactor might simply create more contamination, leaving the Savannah River plant resembling the West Valley site in New York, an eerie, nuclear ghost town near Buffalo so thoroughly contaminated that it is littered with leaking cans of highly radioactive waste.

Now that the Savannah reactor and the modernization program is under review, the time has come to carefully rethink its purpose. The 17 nuclear weapons plants were born out of the darkest days of the Cold War. Now that the Cold War is over, perhaps the time has come to end this sad legacy, not modernize it.

7 of 12 Soviet republics reach tentative accord on union treaty

MOSCOW (AP) — Seven of the 12 Soviet republics reached tentative agreement Thursday on a new political union, but the powerful Ukraine refused to back President Mikhail S. Gorbachev in his effort to hold the nation together.

Gorbachev has threatened to resign unless the republics agreed to halt the disintegration of the Soviet Union and work together to create a market economy. An earlier Union Treaty was scheduled to be signed Aug. 20, the day after the coup by hard-line officials was announced.

Many key details of the accord are unre-

solved, but it appears the Kremlin will be restricted to foreign affairs, strategic nuclear arms and some monetary policies. It also would renounce the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics the "Union of Sovereign States" and replace the old constitution.

The republics will be allowed to introduce their own currencies; many already are taking steps to create their own moneys.

The accord needs parliamentary approval of each republic.

"It's difficult to say how many states will enter the new union, but after today's discussion, I am firmly convinced the union will ex-

ist," Russian federation President Boris Yeltsin said. Russia by far is the richest and most populous Soviet republic.

Economist Grigory Yavlinsky, an adviser to Gorbachev, also warned that the agreement did not settle such key issues as how to finance the national army and whether to maintain a single currency and banking system.

"There's a list of questions without which there can be no movement forward," Yavlinsky said.

The Ukraine, an agro-industrial powerhouse of 53 million people, was the most important of three republics to boycott Thursday's meet-

ing at a government dacha, or country house, outside Moscow. The smaller independence-minded republics of Georgia and Moldova also refused to send representatives.

Uzbekistan and Armenia did not participate in the negotiations, but they also did not formally boycott the meeting. Armenian President Levon Ter-Petrosian was in the United States, and Gorbachev said Uzbek President Islam Karimov was ill.

Ukrainian officials said they would not participate in the negotiations on a new union until after the republic's presidential election Dec. 1, state television reported.

The new name drops the words "Soviet" and "Socialist," but adds "Sovereign States" to emphasize the growing power of the republics. A name change had been expected, but several alternatives had been proposed, including the "Union of Sovereign Soviet Republics."

The Soviet Constitution, though formally still in effect, has become nearly meaningless since the failed Communist coup. After the coup, the Communist Party was suspended, the three Baltic republics were granted independence, and power shifted rapidly from the central government to the remaining republics.

Indictments leave questions, suspicions: Is Syria cleared?

LONDON (AP) — The indictment of two Libyans in the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 is the first tangible result of a 3-year-old hunt that has cast suspicion on extremists tied to Syria, Iran and, inevitably, Libya.

British and U.S. officials were adamant there was no evidence to link anyone but Libya to the bombing.

But others said the charges were an attempt to divert attention from Syria, whose cooperation is vital to U.S.-sponsored Middle East peace talks.

What British lawmakers asked Thursday, about Ahmed Jibril's Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command?

"Just two months before the 1988 Pan Am attack, Jibril's terrorists were caught in Germany with bomb-making equipment similar to the radio-cassette device that destroyed Flight 103 over the Scottish town of Lockerbie."

Foreign Secretary Douglas Hurd said that despite the similarities, inquiries "failed to reveal any direct link between this group and Lockerbie."

He told the House of Commons Thursday there was "no evidence to support suggestions of involvement by other countries."

"There's a Syrian involvement,"

countered Edward Luttwig of the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington.

"They definitely don't want to have the Syrians accused," he said. "They are now the people to be treated nicely so that they refrain from sabotaging the peace process," Luttwig said.

"It's not a coverup, Tom and Harry both did the crime. Tom gets indicted, Harry doesn't, because it's convenient to indict him."

Israeli terrorism experts concurred. "I suspect something about the timing and the Middle East peace process," said Anat Kurtz, a researcher at the Jaffee Center for Strategic Studies in Tel Aviv. "The current evolving cooperation in the political arena between Damascus and Washington might explain the headlines given to these new discoveries."

Ariel Merari, a terrorism expert at Tel Aviv University, said: "Without better proof it does smell like an attempt to bury the case and declare Syria kosher, an attempt to get Syria off the list of supporters of terrorism."

Relatives of the 66 Britons among the 270 Lockerbie victims said they

still believed the attack was in retaliation for the U.S. downing of an Iranian airliner five months earlier.

In the long investigations, the most widely held suspicion was that Iran hired Palestinian terrorists to down the 290 people killed when the U.S. missile cruiser Vincennes shot down the airliner in the Persian Gulf July 3, 1988.

"These men [the two Libyan intelligence agents indicted] may well have been involved in the planning and carrying out of the attack," said Ian Geldard, a British expert on terrorism. "But it still leaves the question, 'Who is behind these names?' Who sanctioned the operation?"

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Baker to discuss human rights, trade possibilities with Chinese

SEOUL (AP) — Secretary of State James A. Baker III headed for China Friday to "sit down and talk" with Beijing's hardline leaders in the highest-profile American since the June 1989 crackdown on democracy demonstrators in Tiananmen Square.

Baker's visit is the most visible result of the Bush administration's stance that the United States must maintain a dialogue with this nation of 1 billion people in spite of outrage over its human rights record.

Human rights, China's trade practices and North Korea's nuclear weapons program will be among the main agenda items during the three-day visit.

"Great uncertainty still clouds our relations," Baker said of China during a speech this week laying out U.S. policy toward Asia.

That uncertainty was demonstrated during a two-day economic meeting in Seoul during which Baker tried hard to sell the idea that an international coalition including the United States, China, Japan and the Soviet Union was the best way to confront

North Korea on the nuclear issue.

The Chinese, North Korea's longtime protectors, weren't buying. Foreign Minister Qian Qichen said, "We do not wish to see any international pressure."

Baker responded that his proposal for a multi-national approach "does not necessarily involve pressure."

"We need to somehow deal with it," he said. "I would hope we could deal with it politically and diplomatically."

For his part, Qian also sought to keep the disagreement to a minimum by saying that China believes "there should be no nuclear weapons on the Korean peninsula, whether in the north or in the south."

But how to prevent North Korea from developing a nuclear capability has become a major issue for the talks. Baker will hold talks with Chinese leaders.

Ironically, while seeking China's help in blocking a North Korean nuclear program, Baker also planned to talk to the Chinese about reports they are selling technology to Iran that could be used for a weapons program.

Baker has had some harsh things to say about the Chinese leadership and its suppression of the democracy movement. But during Thursday's news conference he never used the words "human rights."

He referred to "the tragic events of Tiananmen Square," and said, "We have some problems that we want to discuss and work on and work out and it is our view that you cannot work out or solve problems if you are not willing to sit down and talk to people."

The Bush administration has resisted attempts by Congress to eliminate Chinese trade privileges or link the continuation of lower tariffs to the Chinese now enjoy to an end to human rights abuses.

On trade questions, Baker will discuss the rapidly growing deficit in U.S. trade with China.

Serbs within 100 feet of Vukovar center

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Serb-dominated forces fighting house-to-house closed in Thursday on the center of Vukovar, a bombed and battered Danube river city where Croat rebels have been under siege for three months.

As fighting flared on several fronts in separated Croatia, the European Community's chief negotiator said all sides in Yugoslavia's civil-war agreed that peacekeeping

forces should be called in to stop the relentless bloodshed.

The Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said the Serb-dominated Yugoslav army and Serb rebels were moving into Vukovar along central Marshal Tito street to within 100 feet of the last Croat defenses.

Vukovar's desperate defenders are relying only on manual snipers and sniper fire to prevent the Serb rebels and the federal soldiers from capturing

the city. Some Croatian militiamen have dug trenches between tombs at a central cemetery, Tanjug said. About 12,000 people, including 2,000 children, have spent virtually three months in Vukovar living in cellars without heating and light and with increasingly little food.

A defense official reached Thursday in Vukovar said patients in the cellar of the heavily damaged hospital had begun dying of infections.

Jackpot casinos show healthy gain early on

CARSON CITY (AP) — Nevada casinos posted a meager 2.2-percent gain in winning \$1.45 billion from gamblers during the first three months of fiscal 1991-92, the state Gaming Control Board said Thursday.

The GCB's report also showed a key reason for the slight gain: a statewide decline of 0.04 percent in the clubs' winnings in September, the last month of the quarter.

The report also showed the quarterly-winnings have generated \$117.7 million in revenues for the state. Adjusted to delete the impact of new taxes, the revenues are only 5.6 percent higher than the revenues for the same quarter a year earlier.

Budget drafters had hoped for a revenue gain of 7.5 percent over the entire fiscal year in order to balance Nevada's spending plan approved earlier this year by lawmakers.

Clubs in Elko County, on the Idaho and Utah borders in northeastern Nevada, took in nearly \$35 million over the quarter for a 16.6-percent gain — the strongest of any area listed in the GCB report. That included a September win of \$11.9 million, up 9 percent.

Control Board spokesman Harlan Elges said reasons for the big increase includes casino expansions in Jackpot and some expanded flight service into Elko.

The concerns over big revenue sources such as casino and sales taxes have prompted cost-cutting efforts that include a controversial delay in pay hikes for government employees.

Elges said the September figures show "basically a no-growth, flat month statewide. It certainly reflects the national recession and the poor economy in California."

A breakdown of the quarterly and monthly winnings shows that the Las Vegas Strip clubs accounted for \$630 million of the total first-quarter revenue, for a 1.8 percent loss.

That includes \$220 million of the

September revenue, down 3.7 percent.

Downtown Las Vegas clubs accounted for \$170 million over the quarter, down 0.9 percent. That includes \$56.3 million in September, down nearly 2 percent.

Laughlin clubs on the Colorado river accounted for \$113.8 million over the quarter, up nearly 15 percent. That included \$37.6 million in September, up 8.5 percent.

Elges said that with the exception of booming Laughlin, the southern Nevada clubs were hurt by the recession. He also said many Las Vegas clubs were restricting their credit play during the period because of economic concerns.

In northern Nevada, results were mixed with the Reno-North Tahoe area showing quarterly winnings of \$242.4 million, up 6.6 percent. That included a September win of \$82.4 million, up 4.3 percent.

Elges said the popular Reno Air Races helped to keep the area's casino revenues up. He also cited more air traffic into the area.

Runner seeks post

SEATTLE (AP) — Attorney General Ken Eikenberry, an avid runner, sprinted into the crowded marathon race for governor on Thursday.

The conservative Republican — a former FBI agent, prosecutor, state lawmaker, state GOP chairman and three-term attorney general — told a news conference he'd be a penny-pinching foe of taxes, crime and red tape as governor. He said his campaign will stress education at all levels, health care and crime-fighting.

is under attack, with a clear call for reform," Eikenberry said.

Before Gov. Booth Gardner's surprise decision last month to retire from public life, Eikenberry, 59, had been planning to run for re-election. He said Thursday he was "reluctant to bail out" of a post he has enjoyed enormously, but that he was intrigued by the governor's office and the power to create change.

Eikenberry's entry gives the Republicans their third major candidate for the post being vacated by the popular two-term Democratic governor.

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Spokane mulls Coliseum future

SPOKANE (AP) — City leaders deciding whether to tear down the Spokane Coliseum or sell the old building want to hear about the plans of possible buyers.

The City Council is asking for "letters of interest" from individuals or organizations who might have a plan for the 8,000-seat coliseum, which is unofficially known as "The Pink Lady" and "The Boone Street Barn." The deadline for submitting letters is Dec. 2. Voters in September approved a financing plan to build a new \$44 million arena with a capacity of between 12,000 and 14,000.

Earlier this year, Spokane's First Assembly of God Church proposed remodeling the Coliseum into a worship hall with classrooms.

But city planners say it might be better to tear down the old building, which is near the proposed site for the new structure. If it stays up, the two buildings might be too close together, they say.

Alternate site for center on hold

TWIN FALLS — Representatives of six Magic Valley counties decided Thursday not to pick an alternate site for a regional juvenile detention center until after their first choice has been sold.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Blass said the Snake River Youth Center Board will begin taking bids for the old O'Bar building on Addison Avenue East.

Those bids will be opened Dec. 4, but the board can reject all the offers if it chooses, Blass said.

"We'd like to sell it and move on," Blass said. "The neighbors don't want it there."

The board paid \$119,000 for the building in July only to have the Twin Falls City Council rule that the site's commercial C-2 zoning doesn't allow juvenile detention centers in the facility.

City Planning and Development Director LaMar Orton ruled earlier that the center would be allowed at the proposed site. A flurry of protests by area residents led to a hearing before the City Council, which overturned Orton's decision in August.

That decision has been appealed, and 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbut will make the final decision. No date has been set for that hearing, although the judge will hear a motion on behalf of the building's neighbors Monday.

The motion, filed by attorney Jeff Roig, asks that the neighbors be allowed to testify and that their opinions be considered when the judge makes his decision.

No matter what the final ruling, Blass said the board has decided it would be best to sell their building and start from scratch.

"I think all the counties are aware of the feelings of the people that live nearby," Blass said. "It's real hard to go into an area where you're not wanted."

Board members watched a videotape of 10 other possible sites during Thursday's meeting, but decided to hold off on choosing one until the Addison Avenue site is resolved.

All but two of the sites are in or near Twin Falls; the others are in Jerome County. Eight plots are privately owned, with another being owned by Twin Falls County and the final one is Bureau of Land Management property.

Many potential sites are now unavailable because of the Twin Falls City Council's decision to rule out commercial property for the project. Planners must now concentrate on industrial or rural property.

Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding, Blaine, Camas and Elmore counties have joined forces to build the center with a \$740,000 state grant.

The Magic Valley has been without a juvenile detention center since the Southern Idaho Youth Center closed 14 months ago.

Erhart pushes ethanol plan

Candidate also defends 1% initiative

TWIN FALLS — Oil companies should be required to buy a percentage of their fuel in the form of ethanol made with grain produced by American farmers, U.S. Senate candidate Milt Erhart said here Thursday.

Speaking before the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club, Erhart said his plan would help American farmers, reduce the nation's trade deficit, and create thousands of jobs.

Such a requirement, he said, would directly create at least 45,000 jobs, including between 2,500 and 5,000 in Idaho. It would also reduce the U.S. balance-of-payments deficit by \$20 billion and wipe out \$9 billion in feed grain subsidies, he said.

"We have made the Arab nations wealthy beyond their wildest imaginations for the past 20 years, and at the same time rural America has been suffering," he said.

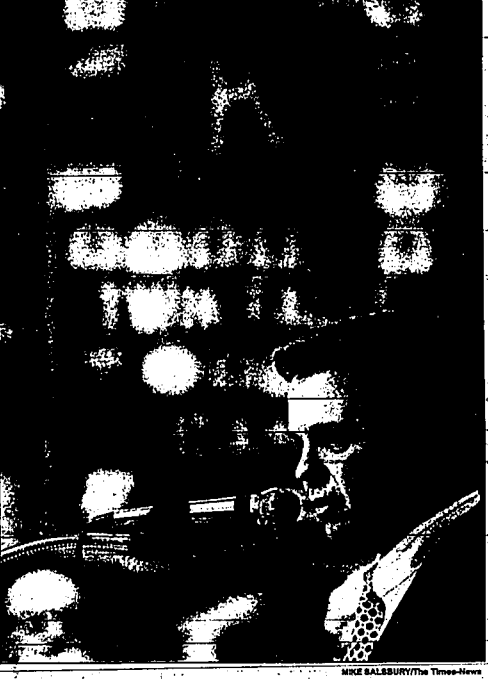
Erhart, a Boise stockbroker, said the ethanol plan is an example of the creative approaches he would bring to the Senate.

He also explained his support for the proposed 1 percent initiative, which would limit property taxes to 1 percent of the property's market value.

Opponents of the initiative have charged that it would cripple schools, local governments by depriving them of property tax revenue. Taken as a whole, local government—which includes cities, counties and school districts—gets about a third of its money from property tax receipts.

But Erhart said the key to it would be instead of hurting schools, the initiative would help them by making school funding a state concern and shifting it from the property tax to the state income tax or the sales tax.

Having the state, instead of local school districts, pay teachers' salaries would eliminate pay inequities between rich and poor districts, he said.

rich and poor districts, he said.

With schools taken off the property tax, he said, enough money would be left over to adequately fund cities and counties.

Passage of the initiative also would spur local government to cut waste out of their budgets, he said, citing as an example the city car assigned to Boise's librarian.

Triumph residents tested for exposure

TRIUMPH — Residents within a mile-and-a-half of the Triumph Mine tailings in Blaine County were tested for lead and arsenic exposure this week.

According to Cheryl Becker of Idaho's South Central Health District, 39 people with the greatest potential for exposure to the heavy metals have been given blood and urine tests. Samples were shipped to ESA Laboratories in Bedford, Mass., which has promised results within 30 days.

The Triumph Mine tailings are a candidate for the EPA's Superfund cleanup program.

Results on the blood and urine screening will be mailed directly to the persons tested, according to Becker, and a report on the findings will be sent to the Environmental Protection Agency.

"The information will be used by EPA to help determine if there's an imminent health threat," Becker said.

Triumph is a small, unincorporated community located six miles east of Highway 75 along the East Fork of the Big Wood River, about halfway between Ketchikan and Hiley. Approximately 27 acres of mill tailings from the old Triumph Mine are layered near some two dozen residences.

An EPA contractor's study of the tailings last summer found high levels of lead and arsenic in Triumph's air and soil, prompting site assessment by state and federal health authorities.

A sample of one of the community wells taken in midsummer showed high lead content. But a subsequent test performed by EPA scientists last month showed no sign of lead.

Chris Field, head of EPA's emergency response team, said further soil, groundwater and atmospheric tests will be conducted at the Triumph site next spring after the winter snowpack has receded.

Twin Falls woman killed while crossing Addison

TWIN FALLS — An 80-year-old Twin Falls woman was killed Thursday morning when she was hit by a truck while crossing Addison Avenue East.

Doris Alexander died of a broken neck when she was struck by a westbound tractor-trailer truck about two miles east of town at about 5:45 a.m., Twin Falls County Coroner Cal Edwards said.

It was dark and the woman was wearing dark clothing, investigating officers said.

Police say they aren't sure why Alexander was in the road, but her footprints and a letter were found on the far side of the road.

Edwards said the woman may have gone outside to put a letter in the mailbox, which is on the same side of the road as the house.

The letter may have blown out of her hand and Alexander crossed the road to retrieve it before being hit on the way back, Edwards said.

The driver was Boyd Williams, 51 of Pocatello, Idaho State Police dispatcher Tammy Clark said. Williams was not injured and was not at fault in the accident, Clark said.

Alexander was a nurse in Oregon for many years before retiring in 1976. The widowed mother of five daughters moved to Twin Falls earlier this year, where she was living with her daughter, Faye Featherly.

Gooding commissioners halt livestock feeding operations

GOODING — Gooding County Commissioners declared a moratorium Thursday on new livestock confinement feeding operations or their expansion.

The action comes on the heels of a court order that questioned the legality of the county's zoning ordinance and other land-use regulations.

The order was spurred by a complaint by Wendell resident Jim Nafziger, who

challenged the county's zoning after he was barred from selling land for a dairy located near a residential subdivision.

The emergency ordinance calls for a ban on confinement operations for 120 days and takes effect Nov. 14.

Commissioner Bob Muffley said the county has to rework its zoning and comprehensive plan to protect residents in the future.

The court ruling, he said, caused "imminent peril to the public safety, health

Physicians: Small towns need to give doctors time

POCATELLO — A country doctor thought of himself as neighborly.

But when families started bringing their sick, lame and halt to the golf fairway where he was trying to tee off, he'd had enough.

Pocatello physician Dr. Andrew McRoberts' story illustrates a common dilemma in Idaho, he told about 100 health-care providers and legislators Thursday who attended the Idaho Conference on Health Care.

Falls earlier this year, where she was living with her daughter, Faye Featherly.

Doctors need time for themselves and their families, he added.

It may be a bigger concern than the lower reimbursements doctors receive working in rural Idaho, Malad family physician Dr. Steve Johnson said.

Rural doctors are isolated professionally, are constantly on call, receive less in federal Medicaid and Medicare payments than their urban counterparts and don't get many vacations, Johnson said.

"Without rest, doctoring in a small town can be dangerous," he said.

"If you do go on you're going to hurt someone," Johnson said.

The health-care professionals discussed an avalanche of problems related to Idaho's dwindling ranks of

doctors, nurse practitioners and doctor's assistants. Idaho has the fewest number of doctors per capita in the country, said Jim Blackman, director of the Family Practice Residency in Boise.

"We anticipate that it will only get worse," he said.

State Rep. Reed Hansen, an Idaho Falls Republican who serves as chairman of the House Health and Welfare Committee, gave little credence to expanding rural health-care issues.

"The plan is so full, it's hard to deal with all the issues," he said. "We have to balance the budget."

Rep. Robert Geddes, a Preston

FERC reverses decision that lessened protection for fish

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal energy regulators on Thursday reversed a controversial regulation that would have made it easier to license dams while giving less protection to migratory fish.

But one dissenting commissioner said the more stringent licensing, resulting from the face of President Bush's national energy strategy and will restrict expansion of hydropower.

On a 3-2 vote, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission decided that operators of hydroelectric projects must protect both the upstream and downstream travel of migratory fish such as salmon.

The panel earlier had ruled that only upstream travel was included in its definition of "fishways" subject to protection measures.

Under the old policy, hydroelectric projects seeking federal licenses no longer would have been required to build costly fish screens or other bypass facilities to prevent ocean-bound fish from being swept into dams and turbines.

The new decision resulted partly from heavy pressure from environmentalists, the National Marine Fisheries Service and several Northwest lawmakers who feared the old policy would have contributed to the extinction of troubled salmon runs in the Columbia River basin.

Salmon hatch in fresh water, swim downstream to the ocean and then return to fresh water to spawn.

FERC's vote coincided Thursday with the National Marine Fisheries Service's announcement that was adding the Snake River sockeye salmon to the federal list of endangered species.

FERC Chairman Martin Allday said he was "troubled" by his earlier support for the rule mandating only upstream protection.

He and Commissioner Brando Terzic reversed their earlier stand

and supported the new definition including travel both ways.

"I finally came to the conclusion that you can't put the fish up there... and not get them down," Allday said. "It just seems to me it makes sense."

Thursday's ruling will not become permanent until the expiration of a 30-day period allowing requests for still another reconsideration.

Commissioner Jerry Langdon cast the third vote in favor of the new policy. Commissioner Elizabeth Anne Moler opposed the old policy and advocates protection of fish travel in both directions, but cast a dissenting vote on Thursday's order because she wanted even broader fish protection.

Upstream protection is mandated because dams create hurdles for adult salmon migrating from the ocean toward their freshwater spawning grounds.

But the downstream protection said the dams also slow the water flows that carry young salmon back out to sea.

For example, the 900-mile migratory trek sockeye smolts once made from Idaho to the Pacific Ocean in a span of about two weeks now takes much longer due to the dams. The lengthier travel means the smolts' gills prematurely begin their adaptation from fresh to salt water before they reach the ocean.

Commissioner Charles Trabandt voiced dissent, saying it puts FERC at odds with Energy

Secretary James Watkins and the Bush administration's national energy strategy. Trabandt said the new policy makes it unlikely there will be an expansion of hydropower through dam relicensing, as is called for in the strategy.

He argued that FERC had to stand firm because NMFS and the Fish and Wildlife Service will undercut the energy strategy by exploiting the new language to provide excessive fish protection.

"We'll end up with less power as a national matter from existing hydroelectric facilities, there will be interference, there likely will be interruptions and so forth with regard to the operation of those projects," Trabandt said.

Charles Gavin, executive director of Trout Unlimited, praised FERC's decision but said it was "truly amazing" that Trabandt failed to understand "the Newtonian principle of downstream fish passage."

"That principle is really very simple — what goes up must come down," Gavin said.

Moler, who was highly critical of the policy protecting only upstream travel, opposed a part of the new policy mandating fishway protection "only when passage of the population is necessary for the life cycle of a species of fish."

Moler said she wanted the protection mandated to apply to all fish travel. She also challenged Trabandt's claim that the Commerce Department's NMFS and the Interior Department's Fish and Wildlife Service will undercut national energy policy.

"The last I checked those were cabinet level agencies and part of the administration," she said. "I don't believe they are out to ruin hydropower development."

Langdon, along with Moler, had voted against the old rule. He supported Thursday's new policy, including restricting the application to migratory fish.

Environmentalists file new lawsuit

WASHINGTON (AP) — A lawsuit filed by four environmental groups contends the U.S. Department of Energy lacks necessary permits to dump waste at the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant because it was late in filing permit applications.

The lawsuit filed late Wednesday in U.S. District Court here came two days before a scheduled hearing on a lawsuit by the state of New Mexico alleging the DOE illegally took possession of the WIPP site from the Interior Department.

The environmental groups' complaint alleges the DOE violated the 1976 Resource Recovery and Conservation Act, which governs disposal of hazardous waste, and thus lacks necessary permits to dump hazardous material at WIPP near Carlsbad.

WIPP is a DOE project designed to bury plutonium-contaminated waste from the nation's defense industry southeast of Carlsbad.

2,750 feet below the surface in salt beds 26 miles southeast of Carlsbad.

Fred Lash, a DOE spokesman, said he was unfamiliar with the lawsuit and could not comment. But he said the DOE followed all necessary permit procedures.

Jim Werner, environmental engineer for the Natural Resources Defense Council, said the late-application allegation was nothing new.

"I think it's something we've contended for quite some time. It's not something we just pulled out of our hats," he said.

Plaintiffs in Wednesday's lawsuit include the Natural Resources Defense Council, Environmental Defense Fund of New York, the Albuquerque-based Southwest Research and Information Center and Santa Fe-based Concerned Citizens for Nuclear Safety.

The lawsuit contends the DOE should have filed an initial application for hazardous waste disposal with the state by March 1989, and a more extensive application in February 1990.

Instead, the lawsuit alleged the DOE filed the first application in January 1991 — nearly two years too late — and the second nearly one year later.

"This is a fundamental requirement that any private facility would be required to meet," Werner said.

On Oct. 3, Energy Secretary James Watkins transferred the 10,240-acre WIPP site from the Interior Department to the Energy Department.

Power Council resists setting goals on spring, summer chinook salmon

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Plans to "buy back" permits from commercial fishermen along the Columbia River and a study of new methods for harvesting salmon were among salmon protection measures tentatively approved Thursday by the Northwest Power Planning Council.

The action came on the final day of the council's three-day meeting as the group wrapped up its preliminary work on the protection plan.

The council is scheduled to take final action at its Dec. 10-12 meeting in Portland, Ore.

The plan aims to revive salmon runs along the Columbia and Snake rivers in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Also on Thursday, the federal government declared the Snake River sockeye salmon an endangered species — a move expected by council and state officials.

"The region has been preparing itself for this listing for nearly a year-and-a-half, and we are way

ahead of the game," said Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore.

The council Thursday also endorsed using "brood stock" — fry born to wild fish kept only a year — in captivity.

Supplement to natural salmon populations.

Ed Sheets, executive director for the council, said the idea is to use hatchery fish to supplement populations without losing the genetic diversity of wild fish.

The study on harvesting scheduled for completion by 1995, would examine what methods anglers could use to catch healthier species of salmon and leave the endangered species alone.

Pilot projects would be funded to test the new methods, and fishermen should participate.

The "buy back" proposal for commercial fishing permits would be voluntary and aims to permanently reduce fishing levels on the rivers. No substitute permits would be reissued after a permit is "retired."

The council earlier set

population "rebuilding" goals for fall chinook salmon on the Snake River but resisted a call from Washington council member Tom Trulove to set the same goals for spring and summer chinook on the Snake.

"Let's take this group of fish as a class and say, here's our rebuilding schedule," Trulove said.

"I would very much like to see us pick some numbers. I just don't like leaving blanks lying around the table."

"This is so open-ended it simply invites the National Marine Fisheries Service or someone else to come in and fill in the blanks," he said.

Council staffers said they didn't feel comfortable recommending a population goal without more biological information, and promised to provide some by spring.

The rebuilding goal for fall chinook is 1,000 spawners by the period 2004-2009, or after four "brooding cycles." Sheets said the current population is 78 spawners.

Judge mulls death penalty for murderer

BLACKFOOT, Idaho (AP) — Whether 20-year-old Larry "Tyke" Justesen will get the death penalty for killing another man during a January party is up to 7th District Judge James Herndon.

After a two-day sentencing hearing at Blackfoot, Herndon took the first-degree murder case under advisement Thursday afternoon. His office said the judge expected to prepare a decision late this week or next week.

Justesen, Blackfoot, pleaded guilty to first-degree murder. Prosecutor Tom Moss agreed to recommend a fixed life sentence. But Herndon rejected the recommendation and said he would decide Justesen's fate after the sentencing hearing.

The only options in first-degree murder cases are fixed life, with no possibility of parole, or death.

Wade Stears, 24, Blackfoot, was shot to death with a crossbow on Jan. 19. Officers said he was struck in the abdomen by a single arrow.

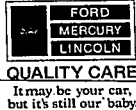
Witnesses at the sentencing hearing said Stears made passes at a number of girls at the party. When he pleaded guilty, Justesen said he became annoyed by Stears' behavior, went out to his car to get the crossbow, and returned to the trailer to shoot Stears.

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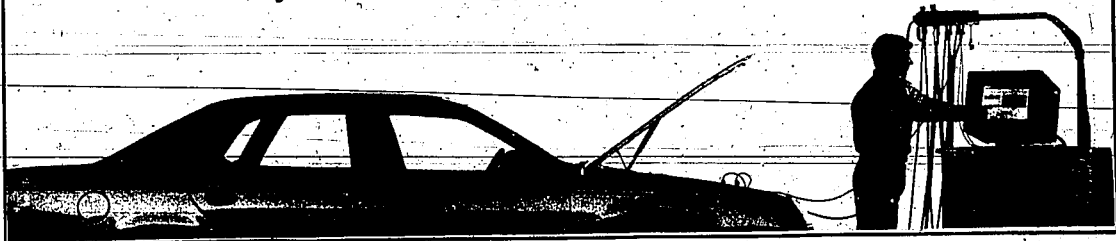
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Democratic Party disputes complaints from Hispanic leaders

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Hispanic leaders say the Democratic Party has done enough to protect their interests in legislative redistricting but Democratic leaders dispute the claim. "We are gravely disappointed in the plan put forward by Democrats at the last legislative redistricting committee meeting in Boise," said Humberto Fuentes, vice chair of the Idaho Hispanic Caucus, in a Statehouse news conference Thursday.

State Democratic Party Chairman Mike Wetherell said Fuentes must have a misunderstanding of what went on in the committee meeting and a key Democrat said it was her party that pushed to give Hispanics fair elec-

tion representation, not the Republicans. "I think the record clearly shows that it was the Democratic Party that attempted to give fair and equal treatment to Hispanics," Wetherell said. After months of meetings, the redistricting committee dissolved without agreement on new boundary lines for legislative districts, although it did agree to circulate four plans to the full Legislature.

Republican-approved plans call for three legislative districts in Canyon County. Lawmakers were advised that one of them would have a Hispanic concentration of just over 20 percent.

Democrats also prepared a plan, Sen. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, a member of the redistricting committee, said after an earlier mistake was corrected, the Democratic plan produces a Canyon district with nearly 21 percent Hispanic population. To Fuentes' complaint that Democrats weren't working hard enough for Hispanics, McDermott said, "I don't think that's a fair observation."

"The Democrats were the ones who tried to get their plan in and that got defeated, even though the Democrats voted for it," she said. "The Democratic plan put forward on Oct. 29 hopelessly splinters the Hispanic vote

especially in Canyon County," Fuentes said. Fuentes said a consultant says with a little effort, a district with 33 percent Hispanic population could be created in Canyon County. He did not have such a plan, but passed out a proposal rejected by the legislative committee creating a district of more than 27 percent Hispanic population. McDermott said she would like to see such a plan. "I would be very interested in looking at one to see if that is possible to do," she said.

Fuentes said Hispanics feel Republicans worked harder on the committee to protect Hispanic voting rights, coming up with a dis-

trict of nearly 21 percent Hispanic population. "I don't mean to suggest that we're happy with the Republican plan. We are not," he said. "But we are, at least for the moment, getting much better treatment from the GOP than we are from the state's Democrats."

He said for too long, Democrats have felt they automatically will get Hispanic votes. "I think that for the most part there is a common belief that the Hispanic community is in the back-pocket-of-the-Democratic Party. We want to tell them that is not the case. I think they have taken us for granted far too long and we are very dissatisfied with that attitude," he said.

Cloud-seeding plan to be abandoned

POCATELLO — The small, rural counties of southeastern Idaho don't want to take part in a cloud-seeding project this winter, so Bannock County says the plan will be dropped.

"We were very much in favor of cloud seeding," said Bannock County Commissioner Val Arvas. "But in order for Bannock to participate, we needed the other counties to participate. They've decided not to."

State meetings with officials of Bear Lake, Caribou, Franklin and Oneida county officials didn't produce any commitments for the \$11.950 each county would have to pay to hire North American Weather Consultants, Salt Lake City, to seed clouds this winter.

The region has been plagued by five years of below-average winter snowfall. North American meteorologist Don Griffith predicted snowfall would increase 10 to 20 percent with cloud seeding.

Bird center addition in the works

BOISE — There are so many requests for tours of the World Center for Birds of Prey south of Boise that half of them have to be turned down.

That may change a \$600,000 addition to the visitor center and education facilities was announced Thursday, to be called the Velma Morrison Education Center.

The major sponsor is the Harry W. Morrison Foundation with a grant of \$150,000. Other major contributors include West One Bancorp and the H.J. Heinz Co.

The new center is expected to be ready by next summer. Official say it will provide more people with the opportunity to learn about birds of prey and see one of the world's largest collections of endangered birds of prey.

Train speed rocks Rathdrum residents

RATHDRUM — Despite a decade-old city law that sets a speed limit of 40 mph on the railroad tracks in Rathdrum, trains routinely roar past the town's schools at twice that speed or more, Police Chief Bob Moore says.

Speeding Burlington-Northern freights cause the earth to shake and make communication within 100 yards of the tracks nearly impossible.

But that's not what bothers Moore. It is the kids. "What always has me concerned is the tracks are so close to the schools," Moore said Wednesday.

Mining company, county settle case

COEUR D'ALENE — Bunker Hill Mining Co. and Shoshone County have reached agreement in bankruptcy court, which will secure more than \$500,000 for back taxes and wages owed workers at the defunct lead and zinc mine.

"The great war is finally over," county Commissioner Don Hayman said Wednesday.

Shoshone County will receive \$80,000 in cash by the end of the week toward back taxes, and will get either additional cash or large amounts of real estate by year's end.

Among the properties Bunker Hill has agreed to sell or relinquish are the main office building, concentrator, power plant, water system, a boat launch, lab building and a machine shop.

Students pencil out 1-Percent Initiative

MOSCOW — Student leaders at the University of Idaho and Lewis-Clark State College are penciling out the 1 Percent Initiative drive, saying it could rob higher education of money and raise their fees.

Student senates at both schools have approved resolutions against the measure to limit property taxes to 1 percent of fair market value. Lewis-Clark State College President Lee Vickers said he, too, opposes the measure.

But University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser announced she will not take a stand on the issue because that would be interpreted as a "political position."

The Idaho Tax Commission estimates the measure would slash up to \$164 million in property taxes from the public schools and local government if approved by voters next fall.

UI interested in buying piece of gallery

MOSCOW — The University of Idaho is interested in buying a second chunk of Moscow property in the Pritchard Art Gallery for \$212,000.

The school wants to purchase it from Leon Neunschwander, an associate forestry dean, and his wife, Betty Neunschwander. It has leased the gallery from them for the past six years.

The university currently leases the popular art gallery for \$2,640 a month. UI officials will ask the state Board of Education to approve the purchase during the Nov. 22 meeting in Boise, according to a copy of the UI's meeting agenda.

Court won't overturn Rhoades' conviction

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has declined an invitation to overturn the conviction of Paul Ezra Rhoades on an argument that a jury instruction left the panel hopelessly confused over what "reasonable doubt" means.

The court on Thursday voted 4-1 to uphold previous decisions sustaining Rhoades' first degree murder conviction and death sentence for killing Idaho Falls teacher Susan Michelbacher.

Although the court earlier upheld the conviction and death sentence, it granted a rehearing on a single point, a jury instruction.

The majority said it continues to approve a California jury instruction on "reasonable doubt," as approved earlier. The court said although it was wrong for the judge to add a couple of para-

graphs, "...the instruction that was given did not misstate the law and was not so confusing and arguementative as to mislead the jury."

Dissenting Justice Stephen Bistline argued it was confusing and misleading to use words such as "actual" or "conscious" to describe degrees of doubt.

"One worry is that ordinarily reasonable persons performing jury duty on seeing such an abundance of 'doubt' may well turn into twelve doubting Thomases," he said.

"It is impossible to conclude that the above compilation of ambiguous terms served any purpose other than to confuse the jury," Bistline said.

Rhoades has been sentenced to death, but the execution date was vacated so the U.S. Supreme

Court can review his case. Bistline also dissented from a second decision released Thursday. The court upheld the drug conviction of Jaime Gallegos, also known as Daniel Trujillo.

The majority approved the process used to stop Gallegos from questioning after he was under surveillance for three days, and the subsequent finding of 10 packets of cocaine in his car's trunk.

As it has in other cases, the Supreme Court dismissed a conviction for failure to buy and affix a state drug stamp.

The law was found unconstitutional and was replaced with a new law in 1990.

But the old law was in place when Gallegos was convicted and the charges must be dropped, the court said.

Lamm: Drastic steps needed to curb health costs

POCATELLO (AP) — The former governor of Colorado, Richard Lamm, says health care is turning into a "fiscal black hole" draining the nation's resources, and drastic changes are needed in the system.

In a speech at Idaho State University Wednesday night, Lamm said America has too many doctors and lawyers, too many empty hospital beds and spends too much of its health care money on too few people, including the elderly.

Lamm, Colorado's governor from 1975 to 1987, was keynote speaker for the Idaho Conference on Health Care. He's director of the Center for Public Policy and Contemporary Issues at the University of Denver.

Drastic measures must be taken to curb the

increasing cost of health care, he said. In the United States, it costs \$2 billion per day for health care, 12 cents of each dollar earned.

He said medical advances have contributed to the growth of the fastest growing population, the elderly, and that group which uses a large share of the health care dollars.

"We've cured all the easy ways to die. Now we have the worst left like Alzheimer's Disease or cancer," he said.

Being able to add three months each year to the life expectancy of Americans is a success story of sorts, but seniors, who constitute 12 percent of the American population, use 61 percent of the federal social program spending.

"That's not good public policy," Lamm said.

Ultimately, holding down medical care costs

must involve a decision to better balance preventive and "curative" medicine.

For example, he said, providers will have to decide whether it is cost effective to pay \$60,000 in Medicare coverage for a knee replacement for an 85-year-old or spend the money to provide basic health care services and programs such as prenatal clinics for low-income mothers.

Lamm said saving a very premature infant but not providing basic prenatal care to women is a way of life only in the United States.

"We are the only nation in the world that doesn't prioritize health care," Lamm said. He said this country has more doctors per capita than any other country and two-thirds of all the world's lawyers live in the United States.

KIMBERLY — Yes, Virginia, Santa Claus has some secrets to share.

Just ask author Bev Stone or her husband/illustrator Gary. Their newly released book, "Santa + Martha," tells the story of Santa's first and only love — from their disastrous meeting on the golf course in the land of Faraway to their union high in the sky over Magic Valley. As the story unfolds, readers learn some secrets about Santa's friends, the Snowie Elves, and their chief, Flower Blue.

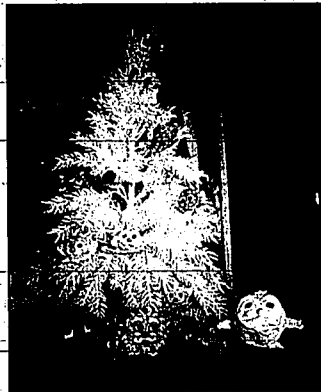
The Stones will be autographing their book, which sells for \$12.95, at various locations in the Magic Valley during the holiday season. They will also be selling Snowie Elf cookies, candles and collectibles, priced at \$1, \$5, \$6.50 and up. Sweatshirts, music boxes and a children's song are in the works.

"We have so much fun with these books, and the characters have become so real to me," said Bev Stone, who works with her husband in several studio workrooms of their home near Kimberly and the Snake River Canyon. Though Santa Claus has requested that real names be changed in the books, Stone tells her audiences at the many workshops she leads, he is allowing the Stones to reveal the secrets of his life and his family.

"Santa + Martha" is the second in a series of Christmas books that began with the 1987 publication of "The Secret of Santa Claus." The first book details Santa's life from boyhood to young manhood, while "Santa + Martha" delves into the mysteries of love.

"No magic can make Martha love you," Flower Blue tells Santa. "Love must be earned."

"In fact, Stone's books were born out of love. "I wrote the first book for my grandkids, to answer their questions," said the grandmother of five. "I soon found that Santa is a great teacher." Among the many lessons Stone hopes to convey to young children is the lesson of respect for older people. "The Old One, a wise old Snowie, is bald," she said. "His bald head is the sign of wisdom."

The Stones plan to introduce a new book in the Santa series each Christmas. Their third book, "When Santa Giggles," is nearly complete. The fourth is in outline form, and the fifth and sixth are, as Bev Stone put it, "still mulling around in my head."

Stone spends several months writing each Santa Claus book. She does her homework carefully because, she explained, she is writing for children — the toughest critics in the world. "A few of the words in each book are calculated to make the children ask, 'What does this mean?'" Stone said. One such word, found in the pages of "Santa + Martha," is "smitten."

After Bev Stone pens her words, her husband applies paintbrush to palette and brings her characters to life. "We sometimes argue about what the characters should look like," Bev Stone said, with a chuckle, "but everything comes out fine, because I always win." Gary Stone has worked as a full-time artist for 18 years. Bev Stone began doing some free-lance writing

Movie industry wishing desperately for big holiday season

For movie lovers, Hollywood has a little something for everyone on its Christmas list this year. The question, as the economy continues to sag and expendable income becomes less expendable, is whether anyone will care.

On the face of it, the coming wave of holiday pictures looks as varied as any in years. There are promising family movies, a couple of pictures aimed specifically at youngsters and a surprising number with strong adult appeal. Comedy, adventure, romance, political intrigue, action. Major stars, major directors.

"If we don't turn business around in the next two months with these films," says an executive with one national theater chain, "then the entire industry's in trouble."

Certainly, much is at stake this season. Normally, movies released during the six to eight weeks before the end of the year account for about 25 percent of the industry's annual box-office grosses. But

January and February at the box office, is the year's most fragile ticket-selling period, even in the best economic times. Crimped personal finances, bad weather, good football and other events all conspire to keep people away from movies. Last year's holidays were enriched with the surprising late fall hit "Dances With Wolves" and by the quick, unexpected and ultimately blockbuster reception to "Home Alone."

There is no "Dances With Wolves" carrying over from this year's weak fall season. The summer movies ran out of gas long ago, and there hasn't been a major hit among the September-October releases. Terry Gilliam's critically praised film "The Fisher King" was the most popular film in the country for three straight weeks yet has barely earned enough to cover production costs.

How well this year's Christmas movies do ought to give film analysts a true barometer of the country's moving mood, as well as test the ability of the current studio leadership to respond to

Filmmaker plans to turn homicide book into series

Academy Award-winning filmmaker Barry Levinson has optioned the rights to David Simon's recent book "Homicide: A Year on the Killing Streets," which chronicles a year in the life of Baltimore homicide detectives, and plans to turn it into a series for NBC.

Levinson says he plans to begin shooting episodes of the hour-long series in Baltimore late next summer and that "if all goes well" the show would "probably be a mid-season replacement" in the 1992-'93 season.

The project would be the first under an arrangement announced last March between the network and Levinson, a Baltimore-born filmmaker whose movies based on the title in his hometown include "Diner," "Tin Men" and "Avalon."

Levinson said he had not yet

thought about a name for the series, nor would he play the lead roles. "The first thing is to develop the scripts," he said by telephone from his Los Angeles office.

What appealed to him about the book, he said, was that it was a police story "without all the flash and the hype" of most crime books. "What I'm fascinated with is the guys in the unit — what they do and what they're about."

He said he opted to turn "Homicide" into a TV series rather than a movie "so we can stay close to the book."

Simon, a Sun reporter who spent 1988 with the city homicide unit, said he was "very pleased" with the plan.

"This is Barry Levinson. He's very good with human-scale drama," said Simon, whose book was published by Houghton-Mifflin in May.

Highlighting the evening will be the performance by "Variety," a barbershop quartet from Downey, Calif. "This quartet has more than 100 years of membership and singing in the barbershop harmony society. In addition, each of them was a part of the 1990 International barbershop harmony chorus champions, Masters of Harmony." Bob Parkinson, Magichords president, said.

The Magichords chapter was born in Twin Falls in 1966. Hulsh, a local State Farm Insurance agent, was a barbershop harmony enthusiast in Twin Falls when he was driving to Idaho Falls one night a week to sing with other barbershoppers.

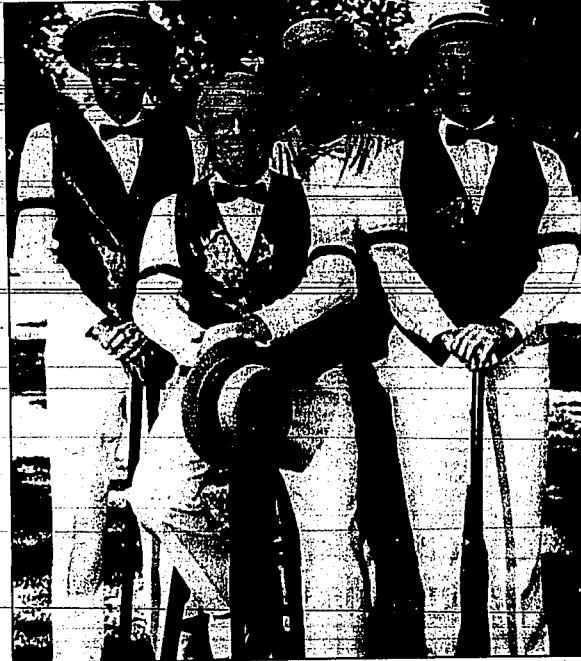
A year later, Hulsh brought a group from Idaho Falls and a quartet from Salt Lake City to put on a show in 1966. More than \$1,000 was raised from the first show for a church-building fund. Importantly, 23 men signed up to express their interest in forming a local barbershop harmony chapter. The next week, 27 men showed up at the YMCA building to form what is known today as The Magichords.

The group has met at 8 p.m. every Tuesday since 1972 at the First Baptist Church at the corner of Ninth and Shoshone streets. The group welcomes new members.

Barbershop harmony is a style of unaccompanied male singing with three voices for harmonizing to the melody. The voice parts are tenor, lead, baritone and bass.

Today, there are still seven active members who were charter members back in 1966. They include Hulsh, Fred Burkhalter, John Crawford, Jack Francis, Joe Hutchinson, Bill Rappleye and Morris Sattgast. Other active early members include Wes Beeson, Ben Carl, Leo Campeau, Kulon Carpenter, Chuck Lehman and Ormond Smith. The Magichords have an active membership of 45.

The Magichords is one of more than 800 chapters in the United States and Canada of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America Inc. Currently, there are more than 38,000 members in the Society.

Hulsh has served as the international president of the Society in 1981 and he has been the only president of the Society that has come from the Northwest.

Funds from these activities go to support chapter activities such as chorus and quartet competition and training and the Society's service project. The Institute of Logopedics in Wichita, Kan.

Each year, The Magichords and quartets within the chapter, donate a share of their funds to the Institute, a residential center for the communicatively handicapped. The Society adopted the Institute in 1964 as its service project. Since that time, barbershoppers have donated more than \$2 million. Cowboy poet finds national success

BRIGHTON, Colo. (AP) — Baxter Black, the switch-thin cowboy poet with a top-heavy moustache, is developing a strong television presence these days. So strong, in fact, that he has just released "Baxter Black's 1st Video."

Black, 46, a retired veterinarian who still works on his own cows and horses, occasionally has earned a comfortable living as guest speaker and performing poet at such events as the West Texas sheep raisers, California dairymen and Iowa corn growers banquets.

But the bright lights, five interviews on the "Johnny Carson Show" and appearances on The Nashville Network have Black looking into other fields of opportunity.

He now is holding an offer to become a regular on a planned country TV variety show. In early October he was in Nashville for an appearance on Ed Bruce's TV charity show.

The television exposure, although heady and opening a large national audience, has done little to change Black's family life. There's no television set in the living room at the Black ranch 20 miles northeast of Denver and family members had to drive five miles one evening in September to see Dad on the tube.

He still considers the banquet circuit, 100 nights a year, his bread and butter. He's used the banquet appearances for several years to sell books and cassettes of his poetry.

"There's something magical about a live show," Black said. "But I knew sooner or later I would have to do a video. People kept asking

"When are you going to do a video?"

"Baxter Black's 1st Video" is here, the result of a friendship with independent producer Mike Drumm of Denver. It was financed entirely by Black, who produced it.

Appearing with Black are Bruce, cowboy cartoonist Ace Reid, rodeo cowboys Leo Camarillo and Larry Mahari, country swing group Riders in the Sky and others.

It's a 62-minute, stereo, hi-fi, aced-on-location-at-and-near-Brighton presentation of 10 of Black's poems, including "The Vegetarian's Nightmare," "Serious Robin" and "The AARP!"

The video was entered in regional Emmy competition, since segments had aired on Drumm's TV show in Denver. The show garnered seven nominations and two awards.

Black has managed to stay in touch with agriculture, which he mines for material, despite a workload that includes a weekly column appearing in 100 newspapers, the banquet circuit, television guest appearances and a regular program on National Public Radio.

He currently is feeding cattle at a Muleshoe, Texas, feedlot and considers himself a steel roper with memberships in winter and summer roping clubs.

"I truly enjoy working, whether it's building fence or cutting wood," he said.

"As soon as I do my bookwork (each day), I ease outside. I trim my own horses' feet and keep this place supplied in wood."

As for a possible sequel to his video, "There are no immediate plans, I have to see how this goes."

Ducks Unlimited chapter auctions local artists' work

BUHL — Three local artists' work will be auctioned off to the highest bidder at the Ducks Unlimited annual fund-raiser.

The 11th annual banquet sponsored by the Thousand Springs Chapter of Ducks Unlimited will be held Thursday at the Catholic Church parish hall. The evening begins with no host cocktails at 6:30 p.m., with dinner at 7:30 p.m.

A hand-crafted hunting knife by Buhl artist Scot Horton, a stained glass wall hanging of a mallard duck by Hagerman artist Geri Warren and a watercolor painting of a scene on the Snake River at the mouth of Riley Creek by Wendell artist Roy Mason will be auctioned off.

Horton has been interested in knives all his life and over the past two years his interest began developing into a business. This summer, Horton reached a point where the business became a full-time job.

Horton uses sheet metal patterns to scribe out the blade of the knife in steel. Once he has his

pattern on steel, he begins the long process of free hand grinding with a belt sander. He first shapes the blade and then hollow grinds the curvature. His knives are full tang.

The handle is created by attaching the two handle pieces to the tang using inset bolt sets at the front and back. The only process Horton does not do himself is the heat treatment and tempering of the blade. Once this process is done he works the blade again.

He silver solders all his guards and brass work and also etches some blades. His knives come with a custom-made leather sheath which he also makes himself.

Horton works out of a shop located behind his home in Buhl and can be contacted weekdays by phone.

Warren has 12 years experience with glass work and has been in business for herself since 1985. She was also a finalist in the Artists Magazine Wild Life Competition in 1990.

Warren works with handmade and mouth-blown glass and puts her artwork together using a

tiffany copper foil technique. This involves wrapping each individual piece of glass and soldering the panels together. She also works with beveled glass, sand blasting and etching or carving glass.

Warren's business, in downtown Hagerman, Advance To Go Art Glass Studio, is open noon to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

Mason has been painting all his life and took up water color painting while in college. He says his specialty is Idaho landscaping. He is noted for his original works of the Snake River and Thousand Springs.

Mason operates a part-time business out of his home in Wendell from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. by phone.

The proceeds raised from the auction will go directly into Ducks Unlimited projects. Ducks Unlimited strives to put 20 percent of funds into habitat programs.

Horror director serves up maximum gore

HOLLYWOOD—No matter how negatively you may have felt about such landmark Wes Craven horror films as "The Last House on the Left," "The Hills Have Eyes" and the original "Nightmare on Elm Street," you find yourself unable to deny that "The People Under the Stairs" is anything but a terrifically effective scare show, a virtuoso work of cinematic terror incorporating superior cinematography and production design—and, most important of all, comic relief.

Review

Still, it's absolutely not for youngsters—even though it stars two engaging young people. Spunky Brandon Adams plays a smart, resourceful ghetto kid who has a 13th birthday he'll never forget. His mother will die unless there's money for cancer surgery, his family is being evicted from its tenement for a redevelopment project, and he's pressured into accompanying his older sister's boyfriend (Ving Rhames) and his pal (Jeremy Roberts) into breaking and entering their slumlord's splendid but decayed Edwardian mansion to steal a collection of gold coins. As the title implies, there's more in the cellar than hidden treasure.

It doesn't seem possible that any youngster could be worse off than Adams' Fool (who's anything but). Yet upstairs in the mansion, which turns out to be more fortified than Fort Knox, is a pale, pretty teen-ager named Alice (A. Lange), who has never been out of the house and is routinely beaten for the slightest infraction by her crazed parents from hell, the slumlord (Everett McGill) and his wife (Wendy Robie).

In essence, the film is "The Old Dark House" plot—complete with secret passages and all manner of mechanical trickery—reworked up for the '90s with maximum gore and fright tactics via superior special effects, and presented as an allegory on the evils of greed, racism and child abuse. Craven displays a genuine and all-crucial mastery of shifts in tone: the mansion everything is very real, as represented by the desperate plight of Fool's family; inside everything is a nightmarish, bizarre in the extreme, sparked by McGill and Robie's deliberately hilarious over-the-top performances.

Balancing these exceptionally monstrous adults beautifully are Adams and Langer's appealing and courageous young people. On one hand, Langer makes Alice credible, even though we know in real life a teen-ager in her lifelong situation would be profoundly physically and mentally damaged; on the other, Adams carries the film on his small but sturdy frame. But be warned: don't go to "The People Under the Stairs" (rated R for terror and violence) unless you like your horror pictures with very few holds barred.

'Curly Sue' climbs to top of box office

LOS ANGELES (AP)—"Curly Sue," the feel-good comedy by the maker of "Home Alone," rose to the top of the box-office charts in its third week of release, while the holiday film "All I Want for Christmas" fizzled.

Collecting \$5 million for the weekend, "Curly Sue" has now made \$17.2 million and slipped only 7 percent from the previous weekend, according to figures released by Entertainment Data Inc. The film stars Alison Porter as a mopper cut artist.

In second was Wes Craven's horror film "The People Under the Stairs," which made \$4.4 million and fell out of first place from its debut a week ago. Dustin Hoffman and his gangster release "Billy Bathgate" landed in third with sales of \$3.7 million.

"All I Want for Christmas," the \$13 million movie rushed to the screen by new Paramount Pictures chief Brandon Tartikoff, opened in a weak fourth place with a gross of \$3.6 million. Starring Ethan Phillips and Thora Birch, the movie follows two children as they try to reunite their estranged parents.

Fifth place went to director Jodie Foster's "Little Man Tate" on ticket sales of \$3.1 million. It was followed in sixth by "Highlander 2: The Quickening," delivering \$2.8 million in its second weekend, down nearly 50 percent from its premiere.

The Wall Street story "Other People's Money" was seventh with a gate of \$2.6 million. "Strictly Business," a new film about two real estate brokers, opened poorly in eighth, making just \$2.5 million.

"House Party 2" was ninth with revenues of \$2.1 million and "Frankie & Johnny" took 10th on collections of \$1.7 million. "Black Robe" is a new film about an Indian missionary among

Canadian Indians in the 17th century, did average business of \$361,389 on 70 screens.

FRANKIE & JOHNNY (R). Al Pacino and Michelle Pfeiffer star in a short-order cook and a waitress who go through the most protracted courtship ritual this side of "Wild Kingdom." A cute and clever but undemanding piece of business from director Gary Marshall and writer Terrence Malick, who have created a coffee shop ambience so rife with lovable eccentrics you half expect the Fonz himself to wander in and order an egg cream to go.

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Jackson's back with new album, video

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Eccentric entertainer Michael Jackson, who moon-walked to stardom and a \$50 million recording contract, is emerging from two years of professional dormancy with a new music-video Jackson's 11-minute "Black or White" video, rumored to cost \$4 million, debuted Thursday in 27 countries, including Fox Television and cable's MTV and VH-1 music video channel in the United States.

His long-awaited "Dangerous" album, coming four years after his "Bad" LP, is being released Nov. 26 by the Sony Corp., which signed him to record and movie pact worth an estimated \$50 million-plus.

Director David Lynch's 30-second commercial for the "Dangerous" album is already running on television and in movie theaters.

The well-crafted media campaign for Jackson's newest exploits is matched by America's fascination with the private Jackson—whose childlike obsessions and dysfunctional family garner tabloid headlines and whet the appetites of fans and detractors alike.

The 33-year-old bachelor has grown into an androgynous-masculine cloaked in secrecy and a white sequined glove, and has had to cope with snickers about his altered appearance, strange lifestyle and enigmatic sexuality.

"He's just lost touch with reality," Jermaine Jackson said while promoting his own album, "You Said," which takes a biting musical swipe at his estranged younger brother.

A bootleg version of Jermaine's "Word to the Badd!!" single criticizes Michael for allegedly bleaching his skin and undergoing plastic surgery. Sister-LaToya Jackson has said her father abused her and Michael when they were children.

"The family situation is so sad," said Jackson's movie director and friend, John Landis. "Michael has a very difficult life. Granted, Michael does strange things that people like to speculate on."

"But you see, it is ultimately up to the public and it doesn't matter what the media says."

Over the years, newspapers have reported Jackson's alleged use of an oxygen chamber and his \$1 million bid for the supermodel Tyra Baccus. John Merrick, Katharine Hepburn, Elizabeth Taylor, Nancy Reagan, Paul McCartney, Madonna and a chimpanzee named Bubbles are said to be among his closest friends.

Jackson's obsession with the late Walt Disney has led him to seek out

everyone who ever knew him, including Disney's widow, Lillian, and their daughter, Diane Miller. The singer's home features a Disney shrine, complete with portraits of Walt Disney collectibles.

Peculiar as he may seem, however, Jackson's accomplishments are breathtaking. President Bush recognized him as the artist of the decade during a 1990 White House ceremony. He has sold more than 110 million albums. He owns the 215-song Beatles collection.

The "Dangerous" album deal came on the heels of another multimillion-dollar contract that failed to deliver.

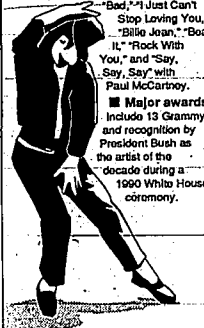
Jackson was signed by the athletic footwear company L.A. Gear to design a line of shoes, but the back-to-back, hot-line sneakers didn't thrill shoppers and the company suffered a loss.

No 'Fantasia' shortage foreseen

A shortage of "Fantasia" A more expensive "Fantasia" These were considered possibilities when Disney announced recently that it was longer taking orders for the 1980 feature, which combines animation and classical music. But industry executives said this week that neither scenario seems likely.

So far, Disney has shipped 9.25 million tapes — both the basic \$24.99 version and the deluxe \$39.99 edition — to retail outlets. But the demand is much greater than anticipated, Disney spokesman Steven Feldstein said. Reorders total more than 1 million, he said. "Making additional copies is much more time-consuming than usual because 'Fantasia' has its special audio track — dubbed Fantasia-Sound — requires reworking of the duplicating facility and a special duplicating technology."

Ron Castelli, senior vice president of the Blockbuster video chain, said he doubted that shortages would surface. "There are enough out there to hold the retailers until more copies are made," he said. "We have plenty."

But how about the small stores? "They may have some problems," Castelli said. "If they weren't able to buy in volume, they might run out." Meir Hed, co-owner of the Videothèque chain, said that shortages wouldn't drive up prices in the long run. "People will be buying this for Christmas," he said. "There will be enough time for Disney to fill orders."

In the short run, though, Hed speculated that prices may rise here and there. "We were close to running out of copies before we got (another) shipment and we started selling at a higher price," he said. "If there is actually a major shortage which I doubt — there may be isolated cases of the price going up. If the demand is high and the copies aren't there, retailers may charge more because they can get it."

Rice faculty calls for school to eliminate big-time sports

HOUSTON — Some Rice faculty members are calling for the school to withdraw from big-time sports in the wake of a cheating scandal that involved 28 students, many of them athletes.

"The great majority of faculty members considers this just one more illustration of the reason why a university like Rice should not be playing in the Southwest Conference," history professor Thomas Haskell, a frequent critic of the athletics program, said Wednesday.

The cheating was detected earlier this year when a suspicious professor decided to change the questions to a quiz in a particular section of a lower-level science class, the Rice Dean of Students' office said. "The students, who apparently had some communication with students in an earlier section of the class, filled in answers which corresponded directly with questions posed on the earlier version of the quiz. The professor then accused them of cheating.

Twenty-eight students admitted guilt.

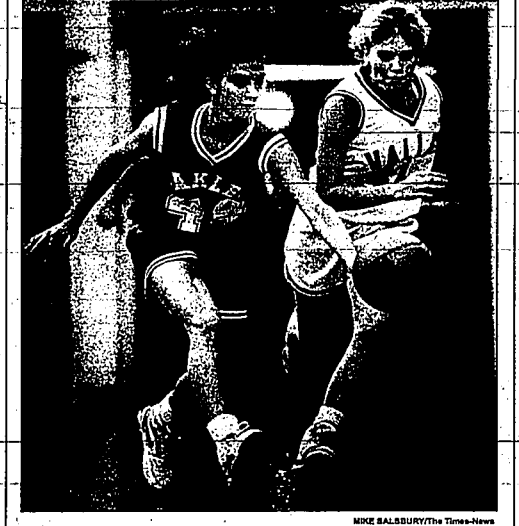

Best offense, defense vie for Big Sky playoff spot

Something will give Saturday, when the Big Sky Conference's best offense runs into the best defense, with a Division I-AA playoff berth at stake.

Nevada, the nation's top-ranked I-AA team with a 10-0 mark, already has locked up the 1991 football title, and can say goodbye to Big Sky competition Saturday with a perfect 8-0 league mark this season if it beats Northern Arizona at Flagstaff.

But the most important game is at Ogden, where Weber State plays Boise State. Both teams have 4-2 Big Sky marks. The ninth-ranked Broncos are 7-2 overall and 17th-ranked Weber State is 6-3 with playoff hopes, and the coaches look on it as a game for a playoff invitation.

Montana, 6-4, is at Idaho and Eastern Washington is at Montana State in other league games. Idaho State is at Cedar City for a game against Southern Utah State in a game that could lead to a playoff invitation for the Division II Thunderbirds.

"Unfortunately, we're out of the race for the Big Sky Conference title, but we're still every bit in the race for a berth in the playoffs and a chance for the national title," said Weber's Dave Arslanian. "It's going to be a great matchup, the best offense in the conference against the best defense. But the ballgame may very well come down to the other matchup...our defense against their offense," he said.

If so, Boise State may be in trouble, because the game is being played in Ogden.

The Broncos swept all seven home games this season, averaging nearly 40 points per game. But they dropped both road games, scoring just 21 points in losses at Montana and Nevada. In the five years Skip Hall has been at Boise, the Broncos haven't won a road game against a team with a winning record.

Boise State tops the Big Sky in all defensive categories and Weber State has the best offensive in I-AA, averaging 563 yards per game, 44.4 points and nearly 370 yards per game passing. Quarterback Jamie Martin is on a record-setting pace and running back Geoff Mitchell already has broken the Big Sky scoring record with 140 points in nine games.

"The flow of the game can take a couple of different directions," Hall said. "It could turn into what they play, which is fast-break football. I would prefer not to get caught up in a mee-horse type of game," he said.

A key may be the ability of Boise State's secondary to contain Martin. Led by Frank Robinson's eight interceptions, the Broncos have 12 interceptions this season, leading the nation and just five under the Big Sky record.

"I hope our defense can dictate the speed

HAGERSTOWN, Md. — It didn't take long for the first major test of College of Southern-Idaho's No. 1 national ranking to show up on the schedule.

The 2-0 Eagles will be facing their first two junior college teams in the Hagerstown Classic tonight and Saturday. And the Eagles have drawn the home teams for the opener. They will go against Allegany regardless of tonight's outcome.

Jerome's air attack takes on defending champions

POCATELLO — And now for the rubber match of the Idaho state football Class A-2 playoffs in a rematch of the throwing vs. the power-ground team.

That would be the No. 1-ranked Jerome Tigers meeting the No. 2 Snake River Panthers in the state semifinals at 5:30 p.m. Saturday in Idaho State's Holt Arena.

It is a case of the defending champion — Snake River — against a team that feels perhaps all the recognition it is due has not been paid.

"What it boils down to is a power-option team against a throwing team," says Jerome Coach Elmer Musgraves. "Two years ago the throwing team won, last year the power team. Now we're going to see about the third year."

"We are hearing a lot of questions about whether Jerome is for real," the coach continued. "I had an eastern Idaho writer tell me he had voted us No. 1 a week ago but after seeing against Marsh Valley he wouldn't do it again."

"There is the feeling that Snake River kicked Salmon (47-7) while Jerome just barely got away (35-26). All I can tell them is Jerome is 9-1 and its only loss came at Twin Falls, which is ranked No. 1 and in the same division."

It isn't like Jerome was totally unprepared for Snake River. The way the scheduled worked out, the Tiger coaching staff shook free to scout the Panthers four times.

"We kinda figured they'd come out of their district," Musgraves said. "We felt if we won we would see them in the first or second round."

Snake River is impressive statistically — especially last week when its two running backs averaged better than 10 yards per carry against Salmon. But the runningbacks take their cue from senior Jeff Dalley who Musgraves calls "a tremendous option quarterback."

"He lets them run all facets of the option, not just one or two phases and that makes them very difficult to defend. But we feel that in order to contain Snake River's offense we have to get after the quarterback. He's the key."

Although Snake River lists several 200-plus pounders — including two at 250 — on the roster, Musgraves said "in reality it appears that among the starters the biggest is about 220. Our biggest is 215. We feel we match up right across the board with them."

That line has been the key for Jerome, holding things together for an offense that usually has been much better late than early.

The Tigers have been particularly successful offensively in the final quarter, showing the ability to hang in when necessary and finish strong.

"They are the defending state champions with the confidence that goes along with that and they are very well coached. They have talent and size. But we feel good about our chances," Musgraves said.

Top official tries to nudge NCAA in right direction

As executive director of the NCAA, Dick Schultz mostly wields the power of persuasion.

He can suggest the 1,050 member schools try something differently, but he can't change much by himself.

"I can't make a rule, and I can't vote," Schultz said at Idaho State University Wednesday. "The schools make the rules, and they pass the rules."

"The NCAA is what it's members want it to be."

When the soft-spoken Schultz talks with groups, like a seminar and press conference at ISU Tuesday, he handles questions with ease.

He should. He goes over the same material at colleges across the country.

It seems, at first, that Schultz tries to avoid responsibility on the issues. His replies often begin with phrases like: "I've never had that interpretation," "I've tried to work it, I would hope to see..."

But Schultz, a former baseball and basketball head coach at Iowa, doesn't know what rules he'll deal with in a year or five. That's up to the member schools. Schultz, who also served as athletic director

at Cornell and Virginia, tells administrators what he thinks is needed. What they do is up to them.

He does have a first choice in changes he'd like to see. He wants the impossible tangle of existing rules made sensible.

"My goal before I get out of here, and I may not live that long, is to see a simplified version of the rules," Schultz said. "We have way over-legislated. I've really tried to work hard at deregulation. The last four years I found out it's a lot easier to go to the book than it is to get one out of the book."

Schultz brought coaches from all sports to NCAA offices in Kansas City to get an idea what was needed. He grouped the coaches by sports and assigned a couple of

NCAA staffers to each bunch. After two days of consultations, the football and men's and women's basketball coaches wanted all the rules to stay the same and the penalties for violations to be tougher. Coaches Olympic sports wanted to deregulate everything.

"I think one of our next focuses needs to be federating rules by sport," Schultz said, noting that most of the recruiting rules now are aimed at football and basketball. "It's frustrating to run, and it's frustrating to a lot of people, but getting people to change those rules."

Money beyond tuition, room and board, for athletes on scholarship has been

Cubs shuffle front office; Frey loses control of club

CHICAGO (AP) — Jim Frey lost the struggle for control of the Chicago Cubs on Thursday and was replaced by former Chicago White Sox general manager Larry Himes.

Frey, who took over as general manager after the 1987 season, had seen his power erode in a battle with former club president Don Grenesko. Frey, who has one year remaining on his contract and had reported to Himes, was forced by Grenesko to fire manager Don Zimmer, Frey's close friend.

"I've had better days, I've had worse," said Frey, who learned of the move Wednesday night. "There are good changes and bad. I have great memories in Chicago."

Himes built the White Sox into a contender, but was fired after the 1990 season. He was given the title of executive vice president of baseball operations while Frey was promoted to senior vice president. "It's probably the first time in history that a general manager was dumped by one organization and had an opportunity to stay in Chicago with another," Himes said.

The Cubs, who finished fourth in the NL East at 77-83, still don't have a manager or president. The

president's job opened Oct. 17 when Grenesko was promoted to chief financial officer of the Tribune Co., the team's corporate parent. The manager's job opened a day later when Jim Essian was fired. Grenesko had forced Frey to fire Zimmer on May 21.

"I want a guy who has the personality to step in, a guy who I feel will be here for a long term," Himes said. "The manager will be the high focus of the team, not me."

Himes, 51, had been a scout for Texas and Cleveland since the White Sox fired him. While he was with the White Sox, they drafted pitchers Jack McDowell and Alex Fernandez, third baseman Robin Ventura and first baseman Frank Thomas.

"Larry is a hard-working, dedicated individual with an extensive background in all areas of baseball," said Tribune Co. chairman Stanton R. Cook said. "He brings a great deal of knowledge to this job."

Frey, 60, joined the Cubs after the 1983 season as manager. He guided Chicago to the NL East title in 1984 but was fired in 1986. He then worked as a radio commentator before becoming general manager.

Chiefs will confront Elway Factor again

The Elway Factor has gotten the best of Kansas City coach Marty Schottenheimer over the years. Those are the odds the Chiefs are bucking when the Broncos come into Arrowhead Stadium on Sunday for a game that gives the winner sole possession of first place in the AFC West. The oddsmakers figure, it's about time for Schottenheimer to win again — his Chiefs are 64-point favorites.

— But that doesn't account for the Elway Factor.

A month ago, he beat Kansas City with a 71-yard pass on third-and-17 that set up a game-winning field goal. Last season, it was a 49-yarder on fourth-and-19.

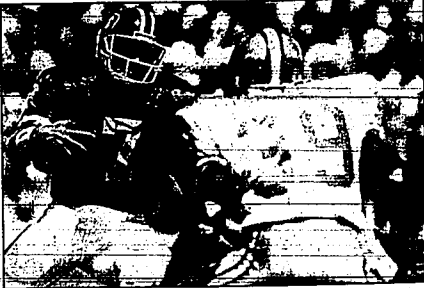

Scott Davis blocked an extra-point attempt and Elway came up just short on a final drive, forcing David Treadwell to try a 48-yard field goal that was also blocked.

Southern senators back NFL bid from Memphis

WASHINGTON (AP) — Southern senators gathered Thursday with backers of an effort to bring an NFL expansion franchise to Memphis, touting the city as a logical, sure-bet choice for one of 120 teams that would begin play in 1994.

"We have, I think, the strongest position now, the strongest ownership group and ... the best demographics," said Sen. Albert Gore Jr., who organized the meeting between the prospective owners and lawmakers from his own state, Mississippi and Arkansas. "Those of us who have been working with you are beginning to get very excited."

Memphis is one of two expansion hopefuls — Charlotte, N.C. is the other — touting a regional approach to fielding a team.

Businessmen William B. (Billy) Dumasant Jr. and Paul Tudor Jones want to base the team in Memphis but also play regular-season games in Knoxville and Nashville, and are discussing the possibility of scheduling

exhibition contests in Arkansas and Mississippi.

Their strategy could affect the chances of a group from Nashville that is also seeking a team, but Dumasant denied that the regional approach was merely a way to eliminate a regional competitor from consideration.

The Green Bay Packers, who play several games each season in nearby Milwaukee, are the only NFL franchise with home games outside of their host city. The practice is more common in other sports; for example, the Boston Celtics play several of their NBA games at Hartford, Conn., each year and the Washington Bullets play some of their contests in Baltimore.

In addition to having the 62,425-seat Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium, complete with luxury skyboxes, ready for use, the group said that the 2.5 million people in the Memphis area television market represent the largest market in the country that does not currently have an NFL team.

Offensive lines keep Redskins out of trouble

"It's what's up front that counts," went the line in the old cigarette ad. The same can be said of the NFL, where nothing is as important — or unheralded — as the offensive line.

Consider the Washington Redskins. When the season began, the Redskins were solid everywhere except at quarterback, where Mark Rypien was considered suspect under pressure.

He still may be, but no one will know because of an offensive line that's allowed only four sacks and is 10-0 in its year likelihood to protect the passer if you have a big passing game," says coach Joe Gibbs after Rypien threw for 442 yards and six touchdowns last week against Atlanta. "Our linemen have been exceptional."

With few exceptions, the teams that have dominated have almost always had exceptional offensive lines that

have stayed together for a half-dozen years or more.

"Who do I worry about?" asks Jim Finks, president of the New Orleans Saints (9-1). "I worry about the Redskins and Bears because they've got the offensive lines that win for you."

They also tend to win for long periods. Chicago (8-2), headed for the NFC Central title, has just about the same unit they had when they won the Super Bowl in 1985. Keith Van Horn, Tom Thayer, Matt Bortz and Jay Hagenberg all started on that unit, which is missing only Jimbo Covert (knee injury).

San Francisco's 1988 and 1989 Super Bowl teams had an offensive line that included Harris Barton, Jesse Sapolu, Guy McMillen, Blanton Sims and Steve Wallace. All joined the team in the early '80s and were groomed to

replace an equally stable unit that included Randy Cross, Fred Quillan, John Ayers and Keith Fahnhorst.

Houston and Buffalo, the AFC's top front end — the Oilers include Bruce Matthews and Mike Munchack, both long-time Pro Bowlers; the Bills have similar quality in Kent Hull, Jim Ritcher and Will Wohlford.

Last year's Super Bowl winner, the Giants, included on their offensive line three players who were drafted in either the first or second rounds — Eric Moore, William Roberts and Junno Elliott, plus center Bart Oates, the only holdover starter from the 1986 championship team.

"I'm a 'sore the whales' guy," says general manager George Young, who drafted them. "To me, if you can move the other guys, you're halfway there."

Back to Washington, which is more than halfway to the playoffs — a win this Sunday in Pittsburgh and they clinch a playoff spot; six more wins and they become the first team since the 1972 Dolphins to finish a season unbeaten.

The Redskins are a blend of new guys, and old Hogs, the guys who opened wholes for John Riggins on the 1982 Super Bowl team and the 1983 AFC champions.

Left tackle Joe Jacoby, center Jeff Bostic, utility man Russ Grimm, and blocking tight end Don Warren all remain from that team.

They are augmented by a younger group that includes Raleigh McKenney, Mark Schlereth and the best of all — Jim Lachey, the All-Pro obtained in a trade with the Raiders for Jay Schroeder.

No sale closes airline

CHICAGO (AP) — Midway Airlines, the nation's 12th-largest airline, shut down Thursday after Northwest Airlines backed out of a deal to buy it, leaving as many as 4,300 employees jobless in an already-troubled industry.

"I've got four kids," said Perry Rush, who loaded planes for Midway. "It will be really hard to tell my kids I'm not going to work tomorrow."

Midway, which was under bankruptcy protection, ceased operations at midnight, closing its gates at Midway Airport, its hub, after its last planes in the air arrived.

The last Midway flight arrived from Los Angeles at 5:30 a.m. today.

"The crew worked through it — way above the call of duty," said Marilyn Greenfield, a passenger on board. "It was very difficult for those people."

Northwest, the nation's No. 4 airline, said it backed out of the \$153-million deal Wednesday because Midway gave it false information about its past business. Midway denied the allegation.

David R. Hanson, Midway chairman and chief executive, said the airline couldn't continue selling tickets with an uncertain future. "Moreover, we have an obligation to preserve as much value as possible for Midway's creditors," he said.

A recording on Midway's reservations line advised ticket holders to contact their travel and credit agencies. United and American airlines said they would honor some Midway tickets.

Workers for the city's Aviation Department handed out fliers at the airport today and information brochures to help travelers reschedule their flights with other carriers.

The department offered free shuttle service today and Friday to Chicago's biggest airport, O'Hare International. Fliers for Midway ticket holders who may have to extend their stay in Chicago.

Midway, with a fleet of 62 planes, operated 196 flights a day to 41 destinations in the continental United States and the Bahamas. The 12-year-old airline carried nearly 400,000 passengers last month.

Last month, the judge overseeing Midway's Chapter 11 reorganization had approved Northwest's proposed purchase of Midway.

Sears wants suppliers to help reduce packaging materials

CHICAGO (AP) — Sears, Roebuck and Co. has enlisted 2,300 suppliers to cut the amount of packaging used for its merchandise by up to 25 percent within three years, the company announced Wednesday.

The giant retailer aims to reduce packaging by about 1.5 million tons annually by 1994, saving about \$5 million a year starting in 1992. The company also is promoting the use of recycled materials.

Sears' effort is important because it's one of the most visible and recognizable U.S. companies, and the change will have a ripple effect on other producers and users of throw-away paper and plastic, recycling experts said.

Kmart contacted suppliers two years ago to encourage "environmentally responsible" packaging, including minimizing materials, and has recycled 5 million auto and marine batteries since then, said Kmart spokeswoman Susan England in Troy, Mich.

Wal-Mart by early last year had established itself as a leader in pushing suppliers for more recycled and recyclable products. It also has encouraged customers to recycle by putting up information tags about environmentally safe materials and placing recycling containers in its parking lots.

Sears initiated its program earlier this year with requests to 5,175 source companies to reduce by 10 percent the volume and weight of packaging by the end of 1992. It also asked them to increase recycled material in corrugated containers to 25 percent by the end of 1992, and in plastic containers to 20 percent by the end of 1995.

Bank wants Idaho mall bankruptcy case dropped

SPOKANE (AP) — A bank owed money by a partnership that owns a Sandpoint shopping mall has asked a judge to dismiss the partnership's bankruptcy case.

An attorney for Spokane-based U.S. Bancorp Mortgage Co., the primary creditor, told Judge Alfred C. Hagan that the Bonner Mall Partnership's draft reorganization plan was flawed.

The mall would continue to operate and the bank would improve the retail mall's deteriorated roof and interior, U.S. Bancorp attorney Dale Higer said in a U.S. Bankruptcy court hearing on Wednesday.

Ford Elsaesser, attorney for the partnership, argued against dismissing the case, saying the reorganization plan can be amended to address the bank's concerns.

Hagan said he would consider the request to drop the case but will in the meantime allow the partnership to fine-tune its reorganization plan.

The partnership assumed a \$6.2 million loan when it acquired the shopping center in 1986.

In their draft reorganization plan, partners H.F. "Harry" Magnuson and Lloyd Andrews propose to dissolve their partnership, form a new corporation and then offer stock to creditors.

Do consultants encourage employee gripes?

NEW YORK — A question for chief executives: Do you have a "fifth column" in your company?

A long-time adviser to corporate leaders says more and more employees are being encouraged by outside consultants to complain about their workplaces. Surprisingly, it is occurring not only under management's nose, but often by invitation.

Eugene Jennings says he was alerted to the development by an angry chief executive who related to him a story about how a training program offered by a consultant led to a surge of employee complaints.

Jennings, professor emeritus of the Broad School of Management at Michigan State University, said the executive said his human resources vice president sought advice from the local chapter of a nation women's organization.

The company, which had been seeking a training program for women managers, was advised by the women's group to hire a consultant for a training program on empowerment. They specified a consultant.

The company, which had contributed to the chapter over the years, accepted the recommendation, in part as a goodwill gesture but also because it believed the recommendation was informed and probably impartial.

Jennings said the chief told him: "We thought it was a course in which managers would be encouraged to delegate authority to listen to the ideas of workers and develop work groups that would share in decisions on how to do things."

During the time in which the \$200,000 seminar was offered, the executive said he heard rumblings of discontent from some of managers, but he was unprepared for what followed. "It has our managers all screwed up," Jennings quoted the executive as saying. The CEO said that about a year after the seminar the company was besieged by complaints and even some lawsuits.

Jennings said the executive accused the consultant of establishing within the company a network of "true believers" who encouraged workers to complain about discrimination, harassment, inequality and arbitrary use of power — like a "fifth column" behind enemy lines in wartime.

Jennings checked with current and former clients, finding a similar occurrence. He said it identified a recurring pattern that begins with the company seeking advice from special interest groups and receiving a referral to a specific consultant.

Rather than being strictly management oriented, he said, the consultant shares an aggressive agenda with the special interest group, training employees to become the group's eyes and ears within the company.

In effect, Jennings said, they turn the company into a battleground for what he calls politically correct thinking, in so doing weakening cooperation, communication and relationships needed to further corporate goals.

Often, he said, politically correct thinking seeks to exalt a nurturing type of management, and puts down management tinged with any degree of authoritarianism. Some ideas may be antithetical to good business practices.

The irony, Jennings said, is that some companies hit the hardest have been those most supportive of the organizations that set the process in motion. "They allowed themselves to be infiltrated," he said.

Jennings is a consultant himself — as well as pioneer in the development of management mobility studies and author of books on corporate activity, management and leadership — is wary of branding the consultancy business.

Among those damaged by the hide-agenda consultants are sound business advisers who deal in stress, power, empowerment, leadership, harassment and related specialties. For them, the consequences are unfortunate, he said.

However, Jennings added, caution should be limited only to these buzzwords. He said businesses should have been more careful and discriminating in the past, and that in the future they must be.

Facility passes up Salt Lake City

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Alaska Airlines has rejected Salt Lake City as the site for a planned hangar and maintenance facility that could have employed 2,000 workers.

The airlines' short list of finalists for the site was Seattle; Spokane, Wash.; Portland, Ore.; Tucson, Ariz.; and Phoenix.

The facility is expected to cost \$50 million to \$70 million facility.

"It was a pretty tough selection process that we put all the cities through," said Alaska Airlines spokesman Greg Witter. "In the final analysis, the five remaining cities just made us better offers."

Originally, Salt Lake was among 30 cities the Seattle-based airline was considering. In August, Alaska Airlines said Salt Lake was one of nine possible locations.

Phillips 66 will keep, improve by \$50 million, Woods Cross Refinery

WOODS CROSS, Utah (AP) — Phillips 66 Co. will continue to operate its refinery here, having turned down what it characterized as six "serious" purchase offers.

The company's Wednesday announcement means jobs are secure for 129 at the refinery and 118 marketing employees in Salt Lake City. Further, Phillips 66 gasoline stations will retain their corporate identity.

With the announcement, the company has made a commitment to spend \$50 million to bring the plant up to new safety and environmental regulations.

Charlie Bowerman, senior vice president for petroleum products based in Bartlesville, Okla., said Phillips considered the offers, but didn't feel any bid was a "fair market price." "Our decision to continue operating the Woods Cross facilities demonstrates that... we will sell selected assets only when they are worth more to someone else than they are to us," Bowerman said in a prepared statement.

million-in-improvements will be made over the next five years. Minter said more than 20 companies expressed an interest in the properties.

Besides the refinery, the company was offering the truck-loading rack on the site, and its 50 percent ownership of two product terminals in Boise and Burley, Idaho.

The company also included its 12 retail gasoline outlets in the Salt Lake City area.

The facility and surrounding marketing properties were part of the company's campaign to sell \$500 million in assets by the end of 1993. That plan was announced last June.

In addition to the Woods Cross facility, the company has sold or offered to sell several of its oil tankers, a pipeline, a line of plastics and its advanced-composites business.

The Woods Cross facility has a processing capacity of 25,000 barrels of crude oil a day, which is 8 percent of the company's U.S. refining capacity.

But no role took more coaxing than her latest one, in the four-hour miniseries, "In a Child's Name," based on the book of the same name by Peter Maas. It airs Sunday, Nov. 17, and concludes Tuesday, Nov. 19, on CBS. "I had just had my son Wolf (7-month-old Wolfgang Van Halen, Bertinelli's son with her husband, Eddie Van Halen, of the rock group Van Halen), and I didn't want to work until he was at least 7 months old," says the actress.

"There was no need for me to rush back in front of a camera, because I wanted to be a mother. But this role came up, and they (the producers) were very persuasive. They said, 'This is about a mother that didn't get a chance to raise her child.' They continued to work on that. "But mainly it was seeing the picture of Teresa Taylor with her baby — that kept me thinking that I had to do this."

In the miniseries, Bertinelli stars as Angela Chimarelli (the names have been changed in the film to protect the surviving family members), the married sister of Teresa, a young mother who was brutally murdered by her husband, Dr. Kenneth Taylor (Michael Onkeman), who dumped her body on a roadside. (Earlier in the Taylors' marriage, Teresa had survived a brutal beating.)

Teresa's bludgeoned body is found some time later, and Taylor eventually confesses to killing his wife but says it was a case of self-defense; he insists that he was preventing a drug-crazed

Teresa from sexually abusing her son. An unconvinced Angela begins to search for the true facts.

"We're just going to stick with the facts," says Bertinelli. "Just from reading the book, I dislike the man. So the facts are, he did this and this and this. They had to bring his facts in as well. What is so scary is I don't think you can imagine anything as bizarre as what happened to Teresa. And yet it happened."

During the headline-making trial, Taylor is convicted of murder, but still, Bertinelli insists, "he got away with murder. There's no way you can come away liking Ken Taylor. He was vicious. And he's still getting away with murder, because Teresa is dead. He's in jail, but her child doesn't have his birth mother anymore."

Angela faces additional anguish

when, from his prison cell, Taylor tries to maintain control of his son's life. With paperwork pushed through the system by his friends, Taylor manages to have his parents adopt the child legally and raise him. Distraught that Taylor will control the life of her sister's son, Angela and her husband, Jerry (Christopher Meloni), decide to fight for custody of the child.

"There is so much story that we had to condense a lot of stuff," says Bertinelli. "I don't think Angela's relationship with his parents was very good. But you know, it's such a helpless feeling that Angela and her husband must have gone through, because of the court system. Hopefully this miniseries will say a lot about the system too. Luckily, Angela had someone who was on her side."

Judith Light leaps to dark side

LOS ANGELES — After more than seven years of the hit comedy series "Who's the Boss?," viewers have come to know actress Judith Light.

Now it's time to see if they're ready for Judith Dark.

They'll find out Sunday night, when Light takes her most daring leap yet off the ledge of sitcom security to play an evil, soul-less real-life murderer — a woman so radically different from the cheerful, sophisticated and caring Angela Bower of "Who's the Boss?" that thousands of starved viewers may call the network to find out if that was really Light.

The vehicle is a TV docudrama called "Wife, Mother, Murderer," in which Light plays Marie Hilley, a diabolical Alabama woman who poisoned her husband and daughter for insurance money and led a bizarre double life while hiding out from suspicious authorities.

"Lots of people want to know why I would play a character like

that, why we'd want to show that to people," Light said in her dressing room after rehearsing with the cast of her ABC sitcom.

"But until we see it, we can't stop it."

Light says the show is of value because it allows viewers to see how far a charming sociopath can go and how much damage she can do by just taking advantage of people's goodwill and willingness to trust an attractive woman.

More personally, though, Light found herself fascinated by the complexity of Hilley's character and was hungry for a really challenging part.

"I'd never played anyone like that — which is why it was so difficult," Light said.

"I think she was a consummate actress. I don't have to be comfortable playing someone who's not likable, but I found out Marie was very likable in many ways. She was charming and had slept with a lot of people in town, so she wasn't unattractive. But she used people for her own means."

TV not immune to double standards

LOS ANGELES (AP) — In the shifting, sometimes arbitrary world of television standards, it's now OK to positively depict teen-agers having sex and women bearing illegitimate children.

It is not OK, however, to positively depict gay couples having sex or women having abortions.

Network broadcast standards executives say such guidelines reflect the tastes of American audiences.

But television producers say those precepts really reflect the networks' desire, not to lose money — i.e., homosexuality and abortion are the two subjects most prone to advertiser pullouts and, consequently, lost commercial revenue.

The best example of how TV broadcast standards can be confusing is evidenced by recent episodes of several popular comedy series. Teen-age stars were shown having sex for the first time and a preponderance of women over the age of 30 stared at bright blue pregnancy sticks.

Whizkid Doogie Howser, 18, lost his virginity in the much-trumpeted fall premiere of ABC's "Doogie Howser, M.D."

CBS' single, 41-year-old career woman "Murphy Brown," played by Candice Bergen, learned she was pregnant last season in a cliffhanger ending. In the fall opener, she decided to have the child.

Although many lines of dialogue referred to Murphy's "choice," the word abortion was never uttered.

But when TV shows tackle homo-

sexuality and abortion, "those seem to be the two subjects where you're almost damned if you do and damned if you don't," she said.

"Those are two issues that most divide people," she said. "And advertisers want their message to appear in an environment that is considered good taste."

Producers and network executives agree that all of the above rules can be bent if your show is considered hot — hot meaning high ratings, critical acclaim and big-name stars.

"I don't have proof of it, but I really believe that Bill Cosby, in his heyday, could have gone on TV naked and no one would have said anything," said Linda Bloodworth Thomason, co-creator of CBS' hit series "Designing Women."

Broadcast standards used to reflect "the fear of getting objectionable letters to the network," said Don Bellisario, executive producer of NBC's "Quantum Leap."

The show got a taste of life outside Thomason's league when he began shooting an episode that depicted a gay, teen-age military cadet contemplating suicide. When NBC learned of the subject matter, network executives said they had never approved the script and would not pay for the show in its current form.

"Lately, that's taken on a more ominous tone because (network executives) now think 'does this offend advertisers?'"

In 1989, when ABC's "thirtysomething" broadcast an episode showing

two gay men in bed talking, advertiser defections cost the network \$1 million. Fearing additional financial loss, the network did not repeat the installment during summer reruns.

ABC spokesman Bob Wright said network standards dictate that any depiction of abortion or homosexuality "must present both sides."

Scripts dealing with abortion must contain pro-life as well as pro-choice views. Showing the other side of homosexuality means depicting "a great number of people in this country who believe that homosexuality is not only a violation of societal beliefs, but a violation of their religious beliefs," Wright said.

Richard Jennings, executive director of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, expressed surprise at ABC's homosexuality standard.

"God, that's awful," he said. "There used to be a large segment of the country that had very strong opinions about African-Americans. For TV to have catered to those racist and bigoted views would have been a disservice to society."

Jennings, whose group monitors television programs for their portrayals of gays and lesbians, added "it's been an evolution just to get gays and lesbians on TV. For decades, we've been invisible. Unfortunately, along with abortion, we've become public enemy No. 1 to these conservative groups that have continuously bombarded sponsors for over a decade with threats of boycotts."



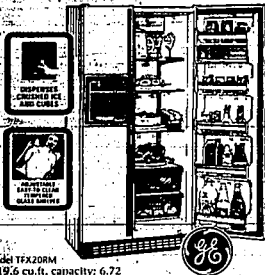
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
