Moose-eligible play the key

It brought Twin Falls an unbeaten team 69 years ago

TWIN FALLS — Clarence "Moose" Garrity scored the only touchdowns for Twin Falls High School in the 1922 state championship football game.

Turned out to be plenty. The Bruins beat Boise 14-3.

But Moose, who went on to buy six oil tankers from the U.S. government and then sell them back a few years later for millions of dollars in profit, was one test away from becoming academically ineligible for the big game.

"I don't think he was so confounded thick as he was lazy," said Stan "Flash" Crom of Twin Falls, a backup quarterback on the 1922 team.

Crom, now a retired farmer, and Larry "Swede" Jenkins stayed awake with Moose until 2 a.m. the night before, cramming for a critical English test.

Moose, who later was cut from the University of California football team when he couldn't memorize the plays, passed that test — barely — and kept his eligibility. The rest is history, albeit ancient history.

Come the final, Moose balled his way into the end zone on two short-yardage plays in the first and third quarters. Then he intercepted a pass as Boise was threatening to score, preserving the victory.

Not since the TFHS's "glory days" during and just after World War I have the Bruins enjoyed such success on the gridiron.

Until now.

The 1991 Bruins are 11-0. They face Boise's Capital High School tonight in Boise State University's Bronco Stadium for the state Class A-1 Division I football championship.

Undeclared. That hasn't happened for 69 years at TFHS, but it used to happen all the time. The 1922 champs were the last of three unbeaten teams over a span of six years, starting in 1917.

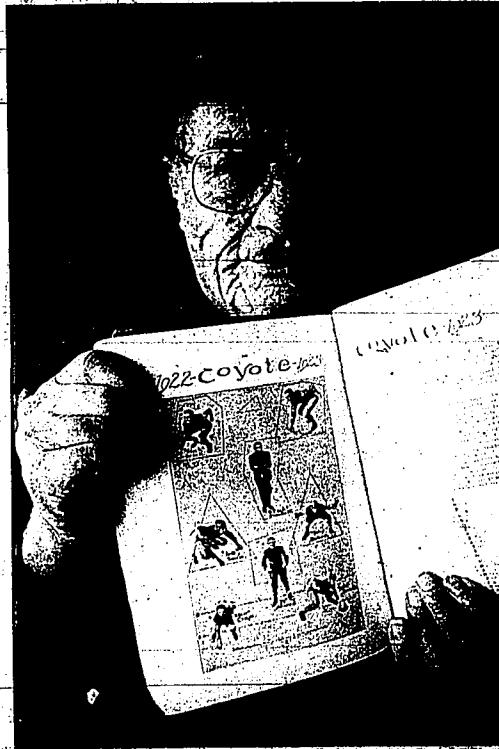
The 1991 Bruins outscored their opponents 94-39 in their first three games. The 1922 TFHS team did better than that in their opener, beating Oakley 106-7.

Five years earlier, the 1917 Bruins defeated Rupert 124-0.

Even the 1951 TFHS squad, considered the "mythical" state champions, lost one game during the regular season.

Until 1979, state championships were strictly mythical, usually decided by the

Idahoans drop crime bill objections

WASHINGTON — After meeting with President Bush and Senate leaders Thursday, Idaho Republican Sens. Steve Symms and Larry Craig withdrew their objections to a 1991 crime bill that they have criticized as a gun-control bill.

Symms and Craig were two of three Republican senators to place holds on the bill by objecting to appointing Senate members to a House-Senate conference committee. The committee, appointed

hours after Symms withdrew his objection, will iron out differences between the Senate and House versions of the crime bill before sending a compromise proposal to the president.

Because the Senate appoints conference committee members by unanimous consent, one senator can delay the appointment process and, in turn, hold up the bill.

The Idaho senators said they will continue to object to a proposed ban on nine types of semiautomatic weapons and both versions mandated waits for handgun

purchases.

At a two-hour meeting called Thursday morning at the president's request, Bush asked Symms to withdraw his objection and allow conferees to begin negotiating a final crime bill, Symms spokesman Dave Pearson said.

The president told Senator Symms if what reached his desk was a gun-control bill, he'd veto it, Pearson said, adding that Bush did not say which firearm limitations he would be willing to approve.

New York governor pressing for West Valley waste move

New York Gov. Mario Cuomo says the federal government has planned to move high-level radioactive waste from his state to Idaho since the mid-1980s, and he is demanding Energy Secretary James Watkins reaffirm that commitment.

In a Nov. 1 letter, Cuomo demanded that Watkins assure him that the Energy Department will live up to "a binding, legal commitment" to remove the waste from the West Valley storage facility near Buffalo by the end of 1994.

In that letter, Watkins said the Energy Department had no intention of moving the West Valley waste to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. Craig announced two days later that the federal government would continue storing the waste at the New York site.

Cuomo spokesman Darrgen Dopp said Thursday that Watkins had yet to respond.

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus has been one of the department's chief antagonists, calling its officials "lying so-and-so's" for repeatedly reneging on promises to remove the millions of cubic feet of nuclear waste temporarily stored at INEL and for trying to add more waste to that stockpile.

Craig spokesman David Fish said neither Craig nor Symms had yet received a copy of Cuomo's letter on Thursday.

Rights bill now U.S. law

WASHINGTON — President Bush signed a civil rights bill Thursday that he said would "fight the evil of discrimination," and tried to silence a new furor over race by withdrawing a tentative order to end government hiring preferences for blacks and women.

"For the past few years the issue of civil rights legislation has divided America," Bush said. "No more."

But the political divisions that sustained a two-year congressional fight over the civil rights bill, and prompted Bush to veto a similar measure last year, remained sharp.

The new law negates Supreme Court decisions that made it more difficult for minorities to win lawsuits charging job discrimination by employers. It also expands the rights of women and religious minorities to sue and collect damages for job discrimination, including sexual harassment.

It was Bush's agreement to support a modified version of the bill, and drop his potent political argument that it would prompt employers to resort to racial quotas, that brought overwhelming congressional passage.

However, Bush signed the Civil Rights Act of 1991 in a Rose Garden ceremony that was overshadowed by the storm of controversy over a proposed presidential affirmative-action order circulated Wednesday evening to government agencies. Most Democrats stayed away from the signing in protest.

The order would have ended preferential hiring and promotions for women and minorities and dropped federal guidelines for hiring practices that the courts apply to private businesses — rules that their start-in-time as the administration and have been in place for two decades.

White House spokesmen said Bush had never seen the document. They said it was

Soviets given debt reprieve

MOSCOW — The world's richest industrial democracies on Thursday gave the Soviet Union a reprieve from the bill collectors, deferring \$3.6 billion in debt payments and offering new loans that would be secured by Soviet gold reserves.

The agreement is aimed at allowing the Soviet Union to save its traditionally good credit rating — a prerequisite for future aid — and gives it time and money to implement vital economic reforms.

"The chance for real reform is now there," said David Mulford, U.S. representative on the Group of Seven talks with republic officials.

A communique signed at the end of the talks said eight of the 12 remaining Soviet republics agreed to repay the entire foreign debt run up by the former Communist central government and to work with the International Monetary Fund to restructure the economy.

Questions remained, however, about the exact size of the foreign debt, with estimates ranging from \$65 billion to \$100 billion.

Deposit protection bills pass

WASHINGTON — The House and Senate approved Thursday differing versions of legislation that would replenish the fund that insures the bank deposits of 110 million Americans.

"The biggest financial holocaust in our nation's history" will result "if one bank fails and we have no money to pay off the depositors," Rep. Frank Annunzio, D-Ill., said in urging approval of the measure of the measure which had been twice rejected by the House. The vote was 348-84.

The Senate version was adopted by voice vote, setting the stage for a joint House-Senate conference to iron out the differences.

Unlike the House version, the Senate bill would sweep away 64-year-old

barriers preventing banks from freely expanding across state lines, a change sought by the Bush administration.

Senators included a cap on credit card interest rates but vowed to delete it in the conference to avoid a presidential veto.

In the House, backers of the measure dropped controversial banking reform proposals proposed by the administration and did not include a credit card cap.

The administration did not oppose the narrower House bill. It expressed hope that a final product more to the liking of the White House would be worked out by the conference committee.

Both bills would allow the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. to borrow approximately \$70 billion in taxpayer funds to protect depositors.

Wetlands proposal under fire

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government wetlands experts have concluded that the Bush administration's proposed redefinition of the term is unworkable, unscientific and would leave "many obvious wetlands" unprotected, say documents obtained by The Associated Press.

After a nationwide field test of the proposed definition, announced in August, members of agencies involved in regulating wetlands have universally chastised the policy in documents summarizing the test program.

Copies of the document summaries, which the White House has barred from release, were obtained by the AP.

The reports describe the proposed guidelines for determining whether an area is a wetland as "inflexible," "scientifically unsound," "unworkable," "unwieldy," "having no scientific basis" and "technically deficient."

Most of the documents urge that

the definition not be implemented. The "sharpest criticism" was universally aimed at a proposed requirement that an area must be saturated for 21 consecutive days or inundated with water for 15 consecutive days to qualify as a wetland. These requirements, as well as new definitions of a growing season and criteria on wetland vegetation, would leave unprotected thousands of acres of legitimate wetlands, the officials complained.

The suggested definition "does little, if anything, to improve on the current policy" and actually deviates from accepted wetland science, concluded an assessment of tests in six Southeast states.

Around the country, the test results indicated that the new definition would sharply reduce wetland acreage.

In many regions, from 30 percent to 80 percent of acreage now classified as wetlands would lose their protection, the summaries said.

A report covering Alaska, Washington, Oregon and Idaho said that of 73 wetlands sites tested "only 18 would be identified as wetlands, using the proposed revised criteria."

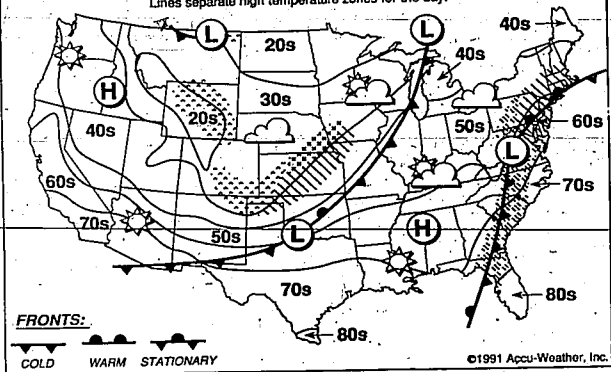
According to the assessment, among current wetlands that would lose federal protection are:

- Millions of acres of hillside swamps and scrublands known as Pocosins, flavescens and coastal swamps from Virginia to Florida.
- Wet pine savannas and bottomland hardwoods in Alabama.
- Bogs and inland salt grasses in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.
- As much as three-fourths of the scrub and shrub wetlands in Wyoming.
- Western riparian wetlands in Colorado.
- Forested wetlands including bald eagle habitats in Iowa.
- Wooded swamps, marshes and bogs in Minnesota and Wisconsin.
- Various swamps and marshes in New England.

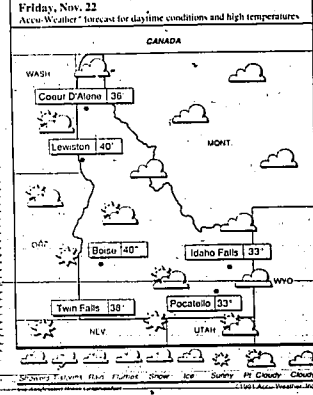

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says showers were decreasing over Idaho Thursday afternoon as the latest in a series of weather systems pushed out eastward.

Snow falls over West while East enjoys record highs

Rain spread from the Gulf of Mexico to New England on Thursday, snow fell on the northern Rockies and Northwest, and temperatures hit record highs across the East.

A winter storm watch was in effect through Friday morning over Colorado's Front Range and the Pike's Peak area. Copper Mountain had received 3 inches of snow by early morning and wind gusts to nearly 40 mph at Berthoud Pass.

Alta, Utah, had 3 inches of snow overnight and reservoirs in the Cottonwood Canyon area also had as much as 5 inches. Also, 4 inches of snow accumulated at the top of Parkley Summit.

Heaviest snow fell during the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST was 6 inches at Limon, Colo. Between 1 and 2 feet of snow fell in Washington's Cascade Range on Wednesday and overnight.

Snow also was scattered over western North Dakota.

At midday, rain extended from the central Gulf of Mexico coast across the Appalachians and upper Ohio Valley into southern New England.

Elsewhere, rain also fell from northwestern Iowa across southeastern Minnesota, and over northwestern Utah.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST included 1.54 inches at Ozark, Ala.; 1.20 at Mobile, Ala.; and 1.01 at Atlanta.

Record highs included 75 at Atlantic City, N.J.; 73 at Baltimore, Md.; 64 at Birmingham, Ala.; 66 at New York's Kennedy airport; 80 at Norfolk, Va.; 64 at Portland, Maine; and 72 at Rouseau, Va. Daytona Beach, Fla., tied its record of 83 and Mason, Ga., tied its record of 81.

Thursday's low for the lower 48 states was 7 at Alamogordo, Cal.

written by his legal counsel, C. Boyden Gray and circulated without Bush's approval.

Gray accused total blame for creating the flap, "I regret it. If it's the only mistake I made, I won't be doing too bad," he told The Associated Press. He said he did not realize how the statement would be interpreted, and that it was never intended to target affirmative action or the setting aside of federal contracts for minorities and women. "That's a mistake I should have anticipated," he said.

"I didn't think it was that big a deal," he added.

White House officials said Bush was unhappy about the incident. "He was clearly distressed that what should have been a fairly clear signing ceremony had been spoiled," one senior official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

After the signing, the White House released a new statement in Bush's name replacing the earlier one and deleting the termination orders for affirmative action programs.

But presidential press secretary Kimberly Fitzwater refused to rule out the possibility that Bush would later rescind the change.

"We support preferences and activities as long as they're consistent with the law," Fitzwater said.

Rights law provisions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The civil rights bill signed by President Bush today would:

- Expand the right of women to sue and collect damages for sexual discrimination or harassment.
- Sexual discrimination laws currently allow plaintiffs to collect only back pay and attorneys' fees, but under the new law they could collect awards as high as \$300,000, depending on the size of the company.
- Offset a series of Supreme Court decisions that have made it more difficult for victims of employment discrimination to sue and collect damages. Among the decisions that would be reversed is a 1989 case known as Wards Cove, which made it more difficult for workers to sue their employers for practices that appear fair on their face but have the effect of screening out certain groups.
- Prohibit the adjustment of employment-related tests, or "race-norming," to boost scores for minorities or other groups.
- Establish a new fair employment office within the Senate as the first step in an administrative process for complaints filed by Senate employees. House employees already have a complaint apparatus.

Like Twin Falls, Boise claimed to be state champion in 1917, even though it refused Twin Falls' offer to play the Braves in Boise and only beat Naampa 14-0. The Bruins defeated the same Bulldogs 56-0.

The game was relatively fast-paced in those days, lasting about 1 1/2 hours, with no timeouts.

But it was a different game. The backfield would line up in a reverse T formation and when the quarterback called the play, the back designated to get the ball — any one of the four — would line up at the peak of a single-wing formation slanted to the left or right.

So close it to say, Joe Montana would have been confused.

Some players manipulated the eligibility rules so they could play football until they were 22. Crom said.

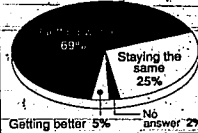

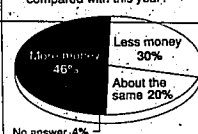

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation is not sliding back into recession although the recovery is abnormally slow, the nation's top economic forecasters said Thursday.

A survey of 45 professional forecasters by the National Association of Business Economists showed a consensus view that the recovery is under way "despite recent disappointing economic news." Only 10 percent said they expected a double-dip recession.

But the early November survey projected fourth-quarter growth in the gross national product at an annual rate of just 2.0 percent, rising to 3.0 percent through 1992. The GNP is the nation's total output of goods and services.

"If realized, this would put the rise in GNP posted during the first full year of the recovery at about only one-half the average gain posted during the first year of other recoveries since World War II," according to the survey summary.

"The health of the economy is pathetic," Lynn O. Michaelis, NABE president and chief economist for the Weyerhaeuser Co. in Tacoma, Wash., told a news conference.

The NABE results were similar to those of another poll in early November.

ber by the newsletter Blue Chip Economic Indicators that found 43 economic forecasters projecting fourth-quarter growth at a 1.9 percent annual rate, followed by 1992 growth of 2.4 percent.

The Blue Chip survey also said the economy would skirt a double-dip recession.

Most of the NABE forecasters attributed the "lethargic recovery" to the high level of consumer indebtedness.

And Michaelis said continuing reports of consumer spending reticence and a shrinking job market suggest the 2 percent growth rate projection for the current quarter "could prove to be optimistic."

Indeed, the Labor Department reported on Thursday that initial claims for unemployment benefits shot up 39,000 to 493,000 during the week ending Nov. 9, the third straight

weekly jump and the steepest in seven months.

The NABE forecasters predicted that unemployment would "remain stubbornly high, falling from 6.7 percent in 1991 to only 6.5 percent in 1992," because of the slow rate of growth in the economy.

In addition to sluggish consumer spending, the NABE survey found businesses likely to cut back on investments as well.

"Non-residential fixed investment is expected to grow 3.0 percent in 1992, about three-fifths the normal rate of growth for this stage of a recovery," the summary said.

The nation's twin deficits, on the other hand, are projected to widen.

The NABE poll projected the federal budget deficit to jump to \$350 billion in fiscal 1992, up from the record \$268.7 billion in 1991. The Bush administration is forecasting a \$348.3 billion gap.

The merchandise trade deficit was projected to increase from \$71 billion this year to \$81 billion in 1992. The deficit was \$101 billion in 1990.

"If there is a silver lining to be found in this otherwise cautious assessment of the economic outlook, the survey found, "it is that the inflation rate is expected to decline."

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Nearly half-million file new jobless claims

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of Americans filing new unemployment claims surged close to the half-million mark in early November, approaching the bleakest levels of the recession, the government said Thursday.

After stabilizing over the summer, the nation's job market is now apparently deteriorating again, at least based on how many out-of-work Americans are new to unemployment lines in any given week.

Those numbers, after hitting an eight-year high of 540,000 in March, improved to around 400,000 in July. Now, they're back to the half-million mark — a worrisome indication, analysts said, that layoffs may be wearing on and that the nation's unemployment rate may be headed higher, too.

For the week ending Nov. 9, the initial-claims level jumped by 39,000, to 493,000, the highest it's been since April 20, the Labor Department said. It followed a 33,000 rise the week before.

Some of the layoffs in early November could have been blizzard-related slowdowns in construction, analysts said. But the weakness was broader, hitting states nationwide and workers in a cross-section of industries.

"We're still talking about a number which has to be viewed as ominous," said Robert Dederick,

chief economist at the Northern Trust Co. of Chicago.

"People are battenning down the hatches again," Dederick said of companies announcing more layoffs. "The expansion started out subdued; it leveled out in the summer. These numbers suggest the recovery has stalled out and may have slipped back into reverse."

The Bush administration sought to put the blame for dismal job conditions on Democrats in Congress.

Labor Secretary Lynn Martin said that if Congress had passed President Bush's capital gains tax cut, banking legislation and a jobs-producing highway bill, the unemployment claims number "would have been dramatically lower."

Pressed on whether the U.S. economy has pulled out of recession, Martin said:

"I know this: Too many people are out of work. There seems to be a consensus... we are in a trough but we're moving up."

Although the economy began growing again in the July-September period, many analysts worry that the nation may be about to topple back into recession.

However, a poll of the nation's top economic forecasters released Thursday showed that only 10 percent expect a double-dip recession.

The survey of 45 forecasters by the National Association of Business Economists showed that most think a recovery is under way "despite recent disappointing economic news."

The jobless claims number can be extremely volatile from week to week and analysts hesitate to read too much into a one-week movement. But the latest rise was part of a three-week upward trend and prompted concern because it put the initial claims level back to a half-million.

"We definitely have the echoes of some pretty bad conditions that we had witnessed earlier this year," said Robert Bruscia of Nikko Securities.

When the recession started in July 1990, the number of jobless Americans who visited unemployment offices to file their claims was holding at around 360,000 in any given week.

That number began climbing steadily as the economy sank further into recession, topping peaks of more than a half-million for several weeks in a row by springtime.

That occurred as the nation's overall unemployment rate climbed steadily, too, from a relatively low, pre-recession rate of 5.3 percent to a five-year high of 7 percent in June.

As jobless claims improved to around 400,000, the unemployment rate moved downward too. By October, it was 6.8 percent.

Americans gloomy about family

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans are generally gloomy about the state of the family but feel better about what goes on in their own homes, according to surveys released Thursday by the National Commission on Children.

In face-to-face interviews with nearly 1,400 adults, including those who are raising children and those who are not, the commission found that 76 percent believe parents often don't know where their children are.

In telephone interviews with parents, however, 88 percent said they believed they knew all or most of the time where their children were and what they were doing when they were away from home.

The surveyors interviewed matched samples of more than 1,700 parents and 900 children, ages 10 to 17.

Two-thirds of the children said they talked with their parents at least once a month about religion or values.

But 53 percent of the adults in the face-to-face interviews said children are worse off than they were, 10 years ago with regard to moral or religious training.

"There is a dichotomy between public perception of what is going on in families and what in fact is going on in families," said David Zwiebel, director of governmental affairs for Agudath Israel of America and a member of the 34-member commission.

Both surveys indicated American families are being by money worries and fear of crime in the streets. In one of every 10 families, parents worry "a lot" that someone will shoot their children, the surveys found.

Among Hispanics, 60 percent expressed such a fear, among blacks 23 percent and among whites 6 percent.

Almost 60 percent of parents surveyed wanted more time with their children.

One in two fathers, one in eight mothers and one in three single parents said they regularly work more than 40 hours a week.

More than half of families earning less than \$10,000 a year worried "all the time" that their income would not be enough. Even among those making more than \$40,000, one family in 20 found this a constant worry.

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Education secretary discusses diversity

WASHINGTON (AP) — Colleges and universities should be allowed to determine their own standards for racial and cultural diversity, not a major educational accrediting agency, Education Secretary Lamar Alexander said Thursday.

Alexander, in public hearings of the National Advisory Committee on Accreditation and Institutional Eligibility, spoke of the "apparent intimidation of quality schools... on matters such as diversity."

Alexander also formally asked the committee to suggest ways to separate a college's eligibility for financial aid from the accreditation process.

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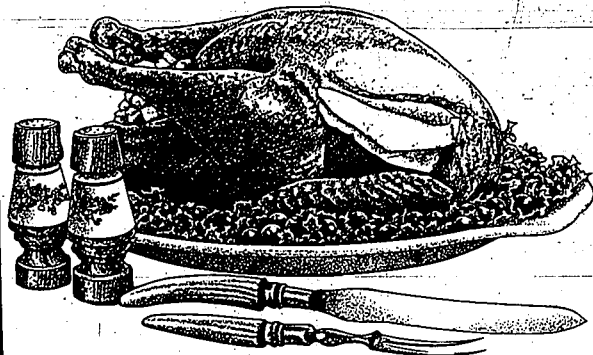

Saving salmon won't come cheaply for Idaho residents

Jack See ought to be a happy man these days.

The owner of the Redfish Lake Lodge, hard by one of the most spectacular alpine lakes in North America, stands to be a big winner from last week's decision by the National Marine Fisheries Service to place the Snake River sockeye salmon on the endangered species list.

Like many other Idahoans, however, he also stands at risk of paying a heavy price for the salmon's salvation.

Redfish Lake got its name from the sockeye, which once turned the lake's waters red with their sheer numbers as they completed their epic, 900-mile annual odyssey from the Pacific Ocean.

This year, exactly four came back. When See's father ran the lodge, the fish attracted hundreds of tourists a year.

They don't come anymore to see the salmon; there's nothing to see. But they do come to fish for trout and run their motorboats over Redfish's mirror-bright surface.

See is worried that in an effort to save the salmon, federal and state authorities will stop stocking trout and ban the boats, putting Redfish Lake off-limits to recreationists and himself out of business.

"I'm sure if it gets to that, we will try to protect whatever we can despite our political beliefs," See said. "It's a real enlightening position to be in."

See's dilemma is likely to be shared by thousands of other Idahoans in the years to come, as the reality begins to sink in. Saving the sockeye, and the four other species of salmon that are candidates for federal protection, is going to involve real pain.

The dwindling supply of upstream Snake River storage, which everyone is counting on as an ace-in-the-hole to solve water quality problems on the Middle Snake, might not be available anymore. It might be appropriated instead to wash the salmon smolts downstream in a one-shot fish flush.

And, as the Snake River Adjudication takes its tortuous course, it's going to become increasingly apparent that the cost of acquiring unappropriated water in the Snake River Basin is going to go through the roof.

That's a perilous position for people who live in a desert in the fifth year of a drought. Saving the salmon is going to take away our margin of error, our options, our Plan B.

It also will almost certainly drive up electricity rates, as the Bonneville Power Administration cuts back its power generation on its Columbia and Snake River dams.

How much? Ten percent? Fifteen? Enough, certainly, to drive some irrigators out of business and force many others to change the way they operate.

Most southern Idahoans support saving the sockeye, even if they've never laid eyes on Redfish Lake. Most are willing to sacrifice something to do it.

But most are uneasy about the potential ramifications, and uncertain about what an obscure federal agency has committed us to.

We almost lost the sockeye without even realizing it. And realizing it too late, we may be in danger of losing our livelihood.

"It's almost like a marriage relationship, how easily you can lose it," See said. "You just wake up one day and your spouse is gone and you say, 'Gee, I didn't realize it was getting that bad.'"

Stop Idaho land takeover

I have lived in most of the Western states, including Alaska, but yet I find myself returning to the Magic Valley. Why? Because of the magic of the surrounding areas - the Owyhee Desert, the Snake River, the Sawtooth Mountains. I have discovered a reassuring fact: Idahoans care passionately about their outdoors and are willing to take action to preserve it.

We Americans, however, have gradually come to realize that our outdoors - like so many of the things we cherish most - is a finite resource that deserves wise rather than careless exploitation. The top recommendation of the president's commission three years ago was a call for a prairie fire of local action spreading from community to community to preserve what we have left.

Fortunately, there now is a major effort helping to light that fire. It's called the National Celebration of the Outdoors.

How does a community go about celebrating its outdoors? Maybe by forming a land trust to acquire title to threatened open spaces, perhaps to turn them into "wildlife corridors" known as greenways, wildlife study areas - not bombing ridges.

The idea of the celebration arises on two strong American traditions - concern for the land and a belief that local action can determine quality of life.

The success of the celebration will rest on individual's realization that a small voice, if it's strong and clear, can be more powerful than a group of people who are silent.

The celebration planners fervently hope that the individual voices will also ring in the halls of our government. Clear thinking and action are urgently needed to reinvigorate the land and water conservation fund, enacted in 1964 to acquire and protect remaining open spaces. The fund has experienced severe budget cutbacks in the past decade. It is more imperative today than ever before.

I oppose the proposed takeover of Bureau of Land Management lands - our land - as a bombing range. Let's keep the Owyhee Desert and Snake River an Idaho gem for future generations to enjoy - not for the Air

Force to destroy. Let's keep the magic from becoming tragic.

Law makes unfair demand

Open letter to Idaho State Legislature: As office manager for a local business in Twin Falls, I have been doing all of the necessary paper work to meet your new requirements for sales tax exempt purchases.

In our business, we make purchases for resale (sales tax exempt), as well as tax-exempt sales to farmers and dealers. We are, therefore, constantly involved with Sales Tax Exemption Certificates.

I can understand your zeal in trying to better monitor sales tax exempt purchases; however, I must admit I am having a big problem with your Sales Tax Exemption Claim Forms.

I am extremely distressed that the person signing the form must give his own Social Security number. This seems out of line for a business. When I say "business," I am not referring to farm corporations but to companies who are retail/wholesale operations.

In the business where I work, I will be signing probably 90 percent of the exemption forms. I am not personally responsible for the business exempt purchases; the business is responsible. Our other employees are not personally responsible either. If we send one of our people in to pick up a purchase, they will not be willing to give their Social Security numbers in order to pick up the materials.

Furthermore, I do not want my Social Security number "floating around" to be misused by someone else.

In requiring the Social Security number, it makes it appear as though the state is incapable of auditing exempt purchases through the use of their own ID number. If you audit our business and find that someone made a non-exempt purchase, we are liable to pay the tax since the purchase was made using our ID number.

I am a citizen who believes in obeying the laws and makes every effort to do so. Nevertheless, I will have to consider long and hard before I put my Social Security number on tax exemption forms for business purchases. ARDEAN DUFFELL Twin Falls

The Boise Statesman editorial reprinted in Monday's paper lauds the great importance of the sockeye salmon to the state through the tourist industry where "those fish caught in Idaho will bring in \$340 for every angler who spends money on local motels, gas, food, equipment, boats and guides." And it welcomes the designation of the sockeye as an endangered species.

Have you stopped to consider what that designation could mean to farmers? I realize that many people, Idaho citizens as well as others from out of state, love to go salmon fishing and that there is economic return to the state and its citizens from a healthy salmon industry. But those who want to save the salmon at all costs seem oblivious to what saving the salmon could do to agriculture in the state as well as to many dependent on a healthy agriculture for their livelihood.

Those who insist on saving the salmon would draw precious irrigation water stored behind dams all across the state, and they don't seem to care if that would eliminate the production of crops on vast areas of fertile farmland - and the livelihood of countless farmers.

And they don't seem to mind that the drawdown of these and other reservoirs would take water stored for generating low-cost electricity for homes and farms. And they don't mind that the management of the Snake-Columbia River system to meet their needs would negatively affect shipping of grain down the system by barge at a cost of millions of dollars to farmers, shippers, workers and many others.

Yes, it is the law that whatever measures are required must be taken to save an endangered species. That law is so biased against people and in favor of a species

threatened with extinction that one has to wonder how our congressmen were able to put it on the books. Are fish, the spotted owl and the snail darter more important than people?

I've said it before and I'll say it again: It is boring, disgusting and downright frightening to realize that legislators far removed from the land and its resources will sit in Washington, D.C., and pass laws that protect a useless snail darter while neglecting to weigh the effects of that action on the human species.

Recycle, don't dump

I just received my current Gooding County tax bill and wish to protest being charged \$72 for "solid waste" disposal. I live outside city limits, am alone, a handicapped senior. Nevertheless, I still manage to recycle my trash to the extent that a total one-year accumulation (mostly clean, flattened tin cans which could also be recycled if there were a place to take them) fills about two 50-pound feed sacks.

Just buying a new dump and indiscriminately "soaking it" to everyone in town (especially people like myself) will not effect a permanent solution to the problem. In a few years, any new dump will again be overflowing in the same situation.

However, if the taxpayers were given the incentive of a reduction, rebate or even an elimination of their solid waste tax for sorting and recycling both organic and inorganic materials, Gooding County (and the rest of the United States) would be well on the way to a permanent solution to a worldwide predicament.

There are at least two recycling centers in Twin Falls and numerous drop-off stations

scattered throughout neighboring counties. Besides aluminum cans, glass containers, plastic No. 1 and No. 2 clear and colored jugs, newspapers and magazines are accepted if clean and sorted.

Rural people do have even more options than city dwellers: food scraps can be fed to pets or livestock and the remainder composted; severe brush can be taken to a mulch and grass clippings to make great fertilizer which is less harmful to the environment than commercial products.

Much of what's left, product packaging and junk mail, can be relatively easily burned and the ashes used in compost or to fill in holes. (The smoke generated in this burning probably does not enter the air as much as all the car engines left running while the occupant is in the post office or convenience store.)

The amount of still usable furniture, housewares and clothing discarded at the average dump is unbelievable. Yet, even though there are places (like Deseret Industries) that'd take these items to be repaired and used for the needy, most people are just too plain lazy to do so.

Most of our waste problems are caused by indifference, inertia and selfishness. However, if people found out that it literally paid them in the long run, either through exemption, reduction or an end-of-year tax rebate to recycle, basic human greed itself could be "recycled" for the benefit of all.

Activists draw fire from chief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Forest Service Chief Dale Robertson said Thursday that nit-picking conservationists are delaying timber production unnecessarily.

"Everybody is suing us," Robertson told a Senate subcommittee. "We can be 99.9 percent perfect, but on one little point they get you."

But Sen. Wycle Fowler, D-Ga., and environmental leaders said the growing legal challenges were prompted by the government's abuse of forest resources.

Robertson said his agency is spending \$100 million to \$150 million a year to fight the challenges and change logging plans.

"We have so many laws and so many substantive and procedural requirements that when you are getting up against people that want to push you right to the edge on every little detail, no one can get a job done that kind of atmosphere," Robertson said.

"In too many cases, there's a soft spot here or there that tends to stick," he said. "It's not substance. It's mostly procedure."

Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., and other Western Republicans called for overhauling the appeals process during a hearing before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources subcommittee on national parks and forests.

Mexico pact aims at truck, bus safety

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and Mexico signed agreements Thursday to expand aviation opportunities between the two neighbors and to enhance truck and bus safety.

The agreements were signed by Transportation Secretary Samuel K. Skinner and by Mexico's transportation minister, Andres Caso Lombardo.

Under the new aviation agreement, each country will be permitted to name an airline to fly between any U.S. city and any Mexican city. It also calls for up to five airlines from each nation to provide U.S.-Mexico air cargo air service, an increase from the present three each.

The two officials also signed a memorandum of understanding establishing mutual recognition of each country's commercial drivers licenses under conditions that will ensure that U.S.-and-Mexican-truck and bus drivers have comparable safety and driving skills.

Under the terms of the memorandum, all drivers of commercial motor vehicles will have to pass comparable skills tests in order to obtain a commercial driver's license. It also calls for exchanging information on license suspensions and revocations.

U.S. officials said it is anticipated the Mexican part of the program will be in effect by April 1, 1992, the deadline date for U.S. drivers to obtain commercial driver's licenses.

Haitians said missing after boat overturns

MIAMI (AP) — Sixteen Haitians drowned and 119 others were missing after a boat carrying 200 refugees capsized off the eastern tip of Cuba, Cuban news organizations reported Thursday.

In Washington, U.S. officials said they were checking into reports that 135 Haitians died when their vessel shipwrecked off Cuba.

Prensa Latina, the official Cuban news agency, said Cuba had mounted a land, air and sea rescue operation. It put the number of confirmed dead at 16, said 119 people were missing and 60 people were known to have survived.

The dispatch, monitored in Mexico City, said the dead included 12 women, two children and two men. Cuban rescue teams were tending to the survivors, it said.

The Cuban coast guard saved about 60 people from the turbulent waters between Haiti and Cuba, reporter Anna Penate of Radio Havana told WINZ radio in Miami.

Reports of Tuesday night's capsizing were slow to get out because the boat capsized off a remote part of the Cuban coast, she said. Hopes were dwindling for the rescue of others aboard the boat, she said.

U.S., Vietnamese open talks on improving relations

NEW YORK (AP) — Diplomats from the United States and Vietnam met Thursday to begin discussions aimed at normalizing relations after nearly 40 years of hostility.

Assistant Secretary of State Richard Solomon and Vietnam's Vice Minister Le Mai smiled, shook hands and joked about the unseasonably warm weather in their respective capitals as the talks began at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations. The diplomats conversed informally in English as the meeting began. U.S. officials said a communique would be issued later.

Although the two countries have had many dealings on specific issues such as refugees and Americans still missing because of the war, it was the first effort toward full U.S. diplomatic ties with Hanoi since 1954, when Vietnam, newly independent of France, split into communist and anti-communist halves. The U.S.-backed South Vietnamese government collapsed in 1975 under a military onslaught by the Northern-led communist forces, ending the war in which more than 50,000 Americans and at least half a million Vietnamese died.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III set the

tone for restoring relations recently by saying the mood of reconciliation in neighboring Cambodia had opened the way for Washington and Hanoi to get back on friendly ground.

"It will take some time, but we will begin that process today," Solomon said as he and Le Mai posed for photographers.

The signing of a Cambodian peace agreement last month is seen as putting an end to Hanoi's military involvement in that neighboring country, and the upheaval in the Soviet bloc prompted Moscow to drastically scale back its role in Southeast Asia.

KETCHUM — What do you give the cowboy who has everything? Idaho photographer David Stocklein has an idea to add to the Christmas list.

Stocklein is ready to welcome the cowboy, just coming in off the range for the winter, with a new book that

Prime time primed with Bly's real men

HOLLYWOOD — Men talking with men. Men emoting with men. Men drumming and chanting with men. And they're doing it on prime-time TV.

Thanks largely to a movement launched by poet-mythologist Robert Bly, who has inspired countless males to go searching for their inner "wild man," the fall TV season to date has been, as John Belushi might have put it, a manly, masculine affair.

Kicked off in earnest by Bill Moyers' 1990 profile for PBS of Bly and his "Gathering of Men" seminars, and even "Star Trek: The Next Generation" have weighed in on the topic. Directly or indirectly, they have invoked Bly's name, debated about male modes of feeling and communication or focused on wilderness bonding rituals and storytelling sessions.

And it isn't over yet. "Anything but Love," an episode slated to air Jan. 8, and "Coach" has a still-unshedded entry about old-style male bonding called "Loonstruck." Mostly, it's been fodder for laughs, especially satire-revered practitioners who meet in American Indian-style sweat lodges, conduct drumming marathons or teach spear-fighting.

"I have a prejudice in that I find all of it a bit silly," said Peter Noah, executive producer of "Anything but Love." In an episode entitled "Call of the Mild," co-star Richard Lewis' character and two cowboys will be sent on an outdoor bonding adventure.

"If there is one group since the dawn of

time that has least reason for complaint," Noah said, "it would be the white American male in the latter part of 20th century."

The sitcom treatments began, by most accounts, with HBO's "Dream On," in which a male-bonding workshop was the focus of a 1990 episode. But the real TV flood came this fall, unleashed by major men's movement features in Newsweek and on ABC's "20-20."

"When we first talked about doing a show on this last April, we were worried that no one knew what it was," said Michael Patrick King, writer of the "Male Call" episode of "Murphy Brown" that aired recently. "But when we came back to work four months later, it had been on the cover of Newsweek and since then it really exploded."

Most sitcoms have shown a degree of respect, however begrudging in some instances; in their views on such men's movement concerns as absent fathers, clingy mothers and corporate pressures for men to compete with one another.

In "Home Improvement," the ABC series in which stand-up comic Tim Allen wrestles weekly with the conflict between male pigheadedness and female lack of respect for power tools, the creators have given an ongoing voice to those and other male issues.

A next-door neighbor, known only as Wilson (Earl Hindman), regularly dispenses pearls of wisdom such as "It is the nature of men to do, and the nature of women to feel," drawn from such sources as Bly and Kegan, said series co-producer David McFadzean. "I wouldn't say this is (exclusively) a male-movement show," McFadzean said. "Some people have asked us, 'What are you going to do when this thing blows over?' I don't think it will be a problem because the core of our show is men and women, male-female issues that have always existed. Those things are timeless."

Author will autograph 'To Albion - With Love'

ALBION - Whether tracing the footsteps of early pioneer settlers or depicting the heyday of a roaring frontier town, Edith Carlson brings the past to life in her book about her beloved Albion.

Carlson will be autographing "To Albion - with Love - A Frontier Town and its People" from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday at an open house at the Albion Library. The author spent several decades compiling Albion's history.

"I have always loved history, and I have kept newspaper articles and photographs for years," Carlson said. "I also take photographs and write poems, which I have included in the book."

The hardbound book recounts the story of Albion, the Albion-Valley, Howell Canyon, Mount Harrison and Lake Cleveland, and of their people and happenings, covering a period of 120 years, from 1868 to 1988.

Pioneers entered the valley in 1868, but Albion didn't receive its name until 1878, Carlson said. In 1878, Albion was named the first county seat of Cassia County, a position it held for 40 years. The old courthouse still stands and is now the home of the AA Mart.

For many years, Albion was the home of the Albion State Normal School and Southern Idaho College of

Carlson, born in Almo, graduated from Albion High School in 1935. She married a rancher, Joseph R. Carlson, and the couple made their home in the Albion Valley. After her husband's death in 1980, Carlson enrolled at the College of Southern Idaho and received her associate degree in education. In May 1988, she graduated from Idaho State University, with a major in English and a minor in history.

Carlson will be signing books from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dec. 7 at the Book Plaza in Burley. She is also available to speak to groups.

"To Albion - with Love - A Frontier Town and its People," Carlson's first book, is published by Caxton Printers in Caldwell and sells for \$24.95. 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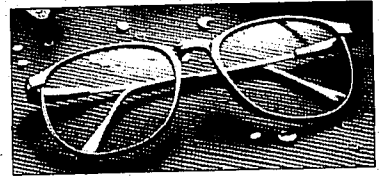
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Some children's books give thanks for holiday

Then she forgets to invite people to dinner. Then she forgets to make dinner. Amazingly, things turn out OK for a bunch of forest friends who have a delicious (vegetarian) dinner.

An I Can Read Book for youngsters ages 4-8. It will have kids giggling and guessing what comes next with every page.

HAPPY THANKSGIVING REBUS, by David A. Adler: Viking (32 pages, \$12.95). In this excellent book, Jason is worried about getting enough cake. The rebus is one of shaggy and customs and the true meaning of Thanksgiving.

What's unusual is the rebus style. A rebus is a puzzle that uses a picture for words or syllables. For example, to "I love you" (love). Some are harder: a tie and knee become "tiny." Recommended for readers ages 3-8, because younger kids can "sound

out" most of the words even if they can't read.

The book includes a complete guide to the rebuses, and repeats the whole story without them, too. Also available from Adler and Illustrator Jan Palmer is "Happy Hanukkah Rebus."

HANDTALK SCHOOL, by Miller and Ancona (Four Winds, \$14.95) is a photo essay about kids at a school for the deaf and their Thanksgiving play. 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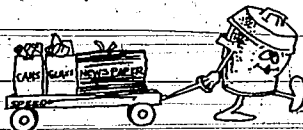

"Orwell: A Biography," by Michael Shelton (HarperCollins; \$25.95; 512 pp.). Political writers, left and right, are a dime a dozen these days, appearing not only in journals of opinion but on national talk shows. They all should read this book, for it shows just how few political commentators have fallen since Orwell's time: the independence, seriousness, and personal commitment that Orwell brought to his work seems sadly lacking in his successors. Michael Shelton, a professor of English at Indiana State, has written a sensible, somewhat defensive biography, and although it won't be definitive — Shelton's discussions of "1984" and "Animal Farm" are surprisingly brief — it captures the close link between Orwell's life and work.

Orwell wrote himself into an early grave (he died at age 46 in 1950, officially of tuberculosis) by publishing more than a book a year for 16 years, and much of that time he had to fight to see them in print — even his 10th book, "Animal Farm." Orwell would no doubt be both amused and horrified to see that today politics are dominated by even shallower thinking than in his time

— by sound bites, punditry and spin control, terms and concepts straight out of "1984." Newspeak.

"John Wayne, My Father," by Aissa Wayne with Steve DeLohn (Random House; \$20; 220 pp.). John Wayne was 49 when his daughter, Aissa, was born, so it comes as no surprise that her reminiscences read almost like those of a granddaughter. Wayne's four children from his first marriage lived with their mother, so Aissa, born to Wayne's third wife Pilar, was something of a love child: few fathers, even those in Hollywood, bring baby elephants to their children's seventh birthday parties.

That sort of gesture was infrequent, however, for Wayne was more demanding, at least when it came to family members, than giving; a repressed, emotionally needy man, Wayne required strict obedience from Aissa and frequent professions of love. Aissa's childhood wasn't particularly happy but when Wayne was around he could be attentive ... to the point of being smothering. Readers looking for gossip will find little to entertain them here, for John Wayne seems to have played his father's role very much in character: tough, straightforward and ultimately sentimental.

Scorsese tries his hand at horror and succeeds

Director Martin Scorsese, who has successfully tried just about every film genre, goes for the horror film this time with "Cape Fear."

He does rather well with it, too, but "Cape Fear" is still a horror film. It isn't in the same category as the "Friday the 13th" or the "Elm Street" movies, but at times it's close enough.

A remake of the 1962 film starring Gregory Peck and Robert Mitchum (who have small roles in the remake), "Cape Fear" takes place in Florida where an attorney is menaced by a former client, a man who has served 14 years for rape and battery.

The attorney (Nick Nolte) withheld a bit of evidence during the trial, evidence that might have lessened the man's sentence. The parolee, Max Cady (Robert De Niro), wants to even the score.

At first, he is brazen in his menace the lawyer, his wife and their 15-year-old daughter. The young woman plays an

important part in the film, and here we get very close to child molestation, something from which Scorsese does not shrink.

De Niro, of course, is superb. The character may become tiring, but the actor makes us forget that. As a point.

The film's ending is typical horror—it goes on and on. And here we are left wondering if there's going to be a sequel.

Because "Cape Fear" is a horror movie, it includes most of the clichés of that cycle. We know who is going to die here, so we just wait for it to happen.

Scorsese might have spared us that, but then he probably chose to be true to the horror form.

In "Cape Fear" (rated R), Scorsese proves he can do this sort of film. Let's hope that it is now out of his system.

'Cape Fear' boosts holiday movie season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The thriller "Cape Fear" delivered a much-needed jump start to the holiday movie season, capturing \$10.3 million in its debut for first place at the box office.

"Beauty and the Beast" premiered in one theater each in New York and Los Angeles to a huge per-screen average of \$81,073, the Walt Disney Co. said. The animated feature, already dubbed an "instant classic," opens nationwide today.

Coupled together, the two films may help resuscitate slumping movie attendance, down about 10 percent from last year.

Starring Robert De Niro as a terrifying ex-con stalking his less-than-perfect defense lawyer, "Cape Fear" is directed by Martin Scorsese and features Nick Nolte and Jessica Lange. The film is a remake of a 1962 release pairing Robert Mitchum and Gregory Peck, both of whom have cameos in the new version.

In second place, according to weekend figures compiled by Entertainment Data Inc., was "Curly Sue." The con-artist comedy made \$4.2 million. "All I Want for Christmas," a syrupy tale of estranged parents and their strangely precocious children, took third place with returns of \$3.3 million.

In fourth was "The People Under the Stairs," which made \$3 million, and in fifth was Jodie Foster's "Little Man Tate," which collected \$2.2 million. "Billy Bathgate," the expansive gangster film starring Dustin Hoffman, slumped to sixth on sales of \$1.9 million, down 50 percent from a week ago.

Danny DeVito's "Other People's

Money" remained in seventh, cuming \$1.8 million.

"Highlander 2: The Quickening" claimed eighth place with ticket sales of \$1.58 million. "Strictly Business" flopped down to ninth on a gate of \$1.57 million and "House Party 2" was 10th on revenues of \$1.3 million.

Among the releases next weekend are "The Addams Family," "An American Tail: Fievel Goes West," "My Girl" and "For the Boys."

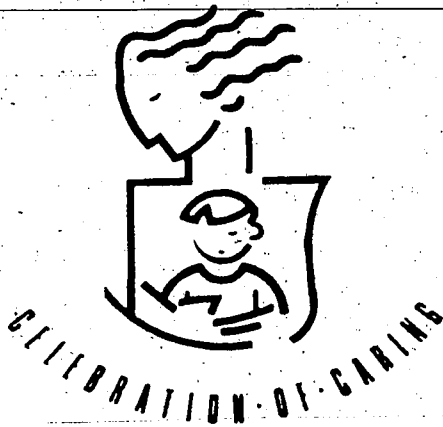

Sign company owner proposes ordinance

TWIN FALLS—The city of Twin Falls' ordinance on free-standing signs is overly rigid, doesn't fit changing trade patterns and needs to be changed, says sign company owner Rex Lytle, so he's proposed an ordinance to do just that.

Lytle presented his plan to a group of Twin Falls business owners Thursday. It would allow each property a maximum of 100 square feet of signage, plus one square foot per foot of street front in excess of 100 feet and an additional one square foot per foot if the property is more than 200 feet deep for each foot over 200.

No business would be able to have more than 600 square feet of total signage and no single sign could exceed 200 square feet.

The current ordinance allows one 200-square foot sign on each street frontage property, with certain exceptions for automobile dealers and gas stations.

The Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission will consider the proposal at its Dec. 10 meeting.

Lytle said on the basis of what he heard Thursday, he thinks an amendment to the ordinance might be needed to accommodate the needs of businesses that are clustered at a single site, such as a mini-malls or satellite stores to a major retailer.

The changes would affect only new signs.

The proposed ordinance would not affect billboards. An effort to limit their size and density is now under consideration by the planning commission.

Twin Falls 1st city in Idaho to reach 70% seat belt use

TWIN FALLS—Twin Falls drivers are buckling up in droves.

According to statistics released by the Idaho Transportation Department, Twin Falls is the first city in Idaho to reach the goal of 70 percent seat belt use set by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Twin Falls has qualified for a special award for reaching the 70 per cent goal.

Twin Falls has been the focus of a buckle-up campaign sponsored by Williams Chiropractic Pain Relief Clinic, KTFI Radio, KTVB-TV, Twin Falls Police department and the Twin Falls Public Health Department.

The program was started two years ago by Twin Falls chiropractor Spencer Williams to promote the use of seat belts. During holiday weeks, Williams, with the help of the police, will stop cars at random and if the driver is wearing a seat belt, award him \$10 and a T-shirt.

The next buckle-up effort is scheduled for Monday.

Police warn businesses to watch out for fake \$20 bills

RUPERT—Police here have warned local businesses to be on the lookout for fake \$20 bills after a local business reported receiving a bogus bill.

The counterfeit bill was passed Wednesday afternoon at the Maverick Country Store gas station and convenience store, Detective Terry Quinn of the Rupert Police Department said.

Quinn said Thursday that police had no suspects and had discovered no other fake bills.

Fire destroys mobile home; damage estimated at \$8,000

BURLEY—Fire destroyed a mobile home at the Moo-View Dairy southeast of Burley Thursday evening.

The mobile home was engulfed in flames when firefighters were called out at 2:31 p.m., said Dick Ranklev, Burley's assistant fire chief.

The structure was owned by the dairy, 400 South and 530 East of Burley, which belongs to the Searle family, firefighter Rod Behr said. Hired hands who work in the milk barn stayed in the mobile home, Behr said.

City loses chance to get \$300,000 road grant

TWIN FALLS—The city of Twin Falls just lost a chance for up to \$300,000 to help build Victory Road because a local company could not provide information needed for a grant application, a city official said Thursday.

"We are not going to be able to apply for that grant," City Economic Development Director Dave McAlindin told the City Council.

"It's a lost opportunity to apply for \$300,000 ... because of circumstances beyond our control," he said.

The city's grant application was tied to the planned expansion of Henningsen Cold

Storage Co. in the Industrial Park. But Henningsen was not able to provide the city with the information needed for the grant application, McAlindin said.

He did not say what information the city needed the company to provide.

"They had their own restraints that didn't allow them to do it," he told council members.

Henningsen's officials could not be reached for comment Thursday evening.

"We did stand a very good chance of getting the money," McAlindin said. "Based on the project and Twin Falls' track record in putting together grant applications."

Henningsen's expansion will increase

truck traffic to the business by thousands of trips a year, McAlindin said. The city could have applied for an economic development grant to widen and thicken the road to meet the higher truck use in front of the Henningsen facility, he said.

The city still can build the road in front of Henningsen's with tax-increment financing, McAlindin said. Tax-increment financing uses property taxes to pay for improvements, such as roads, water and sewer.

Henningsen likely will use tax-increment financing in its expansion, but the city will now have to use \$300,000 of that money to help build the road, McAlindin said.

Construction on Victory Road is set to begin next spring. The state is waiting for

the city to complete the road so work can start on replacing the Singing Bridge.

The grant application would have to be postmarked by Monday, McAlindin said he heard from Henningsen on Wednesday afternoon.

At a special meeting Thursday afternoon, the council also OK'd an agreement with Blue Lakes Country Club to help protect water quality at Alpheus Creek Spring and Blue Lakes.

The city gets drinking water from the springs and Blue Lakes and must give the state a watershed protection plan for the area. The agreement with the country club will not be executed until the state OK's the watershed plan.

Hagerman City Council protests county taxes

HAGERMAN—County taxation of city property is not fair, Hagerman officials say.

The council voted Tuesday to write a letter of protest to the Gooding County Commissioners for a \$266 solid waste assessment on city property.

In a letter with the tax bill, county commissioners stated that the county has adopted an additional landfill budget of \$350,000, and the \$266 fee is Hagerman's annual share of that cost.

But Mayor Gloria Jazwick objected to the charge.

"The city is supported by taxpayers; so the city should not be taxed," she said. "It seems to me this is a double taxation."

Jazwick said she is checking on the legalities of the matter to see what recourse the city has.

County Commissioner Bob Muffley said Thursday, though, that the charge is a fee, not a tax.

"The city is paying for use of the landfill," he said. "It's a fee to pay for disposal of its waste."

He added schools, the state Fish and Game Department, churches and anyone else has to pay the fee.

"They all create waste," he said. "It doesn't matter whether you're tax supported or not because this is not a tax."

Muffley said the county had a choice of charging everyone on their tax notices or charging a fee at the landfill.

He noted the county pays the city of Gooding a fee for water and sewerage and for garbage collection.

In the meantime, Jazwick said Hagerman should send a letter of protest to the county commissioners "to go on record as saying this is very unfair as far as the city is concerned."

The city did not budget for this tax, she said, and money to pay it would have to be taken from some other fund.

"We will continue to pursue it," she added.

The council voted to send the protest letter, she requested by the mayor.

"I think it's double taxation," council member Audrey Hoffman agreed.

Opinion at Glens Ferry hearing opposes changes at Air Force base

GLENS FERRY—The Air Force took it on the chin Thursday evening as people commented on its proposal for increasing and changing operation at the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The Air Force's environmental impact statement on the establishment of a "composite wing" at Mountain Home, changes in air-space over Owyhee County and the suitability of a bombing range proposed by Gov. Cecil Andrus is a "blatant whitewash," said Rod Rees of Glens Ferry.

"The draft environmental impact statement is in my opinion a sham," he told the panel of Air Force officials seated at center court in the Glens Ferry High School gym.

Last hearing today

The last of five public hearings on proposed changes at Mountain Home Air Force Base will be at 6:30 p.m. today at the O'Leary Junior High School auditorium.

"The statement uses incomplete and unclear information, leaves out information and uses vague general statements to hide the true impact of the proposed changes," Rees said.

"The Air Force wants to increase the number and types of planes stationed at Mountain Home, change airspace to make it more usable and examine the suitability of the proposed state bombing range."

The service knows the damage such an increase in operations and proposed additional range space would cause, "and it couldn't care less," said Thelma Black of Glens Ferry.

The Air Force already has plenty of air space and bombing ranges around the country for training, she said.

"Convince me you need more airspace," she said. The last the country of Idaho needs is more space for the daily rehearsals for another war. She suggested the Air Force make plans to do without Owyhee County.

"Others spoke in favor of the proposal, citing economic benefits and needs for a well trained Air Force."

It would be catastrophic for the Elmore County economy if the proposed range, 150,000 acres of state, federal and private

Rupert commission gives OK to rezone lot for apartments

RUPERT—Sixteen middle-income apartments are one step closer to construction in Rupert after a recent Planning and Zoning Board meeting.

The rezoning issue was not without controversy, though.

The commission agreed to rezone the 11-acre lot, which lies between Big Valley Middle School and Big Valley Park, from agriculture to residential. The owners are David and Arnold Patterson.

Patterson said construction on the two 8-plexes will begin soon. Plans call for building in phases and plotting the land for a subdivision.

"This is not something that is going to happen in five years," Patterson said. "As need warrants, we will build more middle-

Castleford board adopts drug abuse prevention program

CASTLEFORD — The Castleford School Board adopted a drug and alcohol abuse and prevention program for grades 1 through 6. The program, called "Here's Looking at You 2000" uses videos, audios, books, posters, activities and games, worksheets and teacher's guides tailored to each grade level.

Teachers children about the dangers of household poisons, alcohol and drugs and smoking and chewing tobacco.

The program also covers topics such as developing refusal skills, making friends and decision making.

In a related issue, Castleford Middle School teachers responsible for presenting a video made by her students to the School Board at its recent meeting.

"Captain Toxic," a 15-minute video, illustrates drug and alcohol problems. Captain Toxic is the hero who shows students the dangers of drugs and alcohol.

The policy states that students who have not received a measles vaccine or have no laboratory proof of immunity or a physician-diagnosed case of measles will be excluded from school if a case of measles is identified in the school.

The exclusion will last 14 days past the onset of rash illness in the last

reported case in the school. The board also conducted the first reading of its new elementary and middle school student promotion-retention policy.

Although the school always has notified parents of student retention, parents now will be informed when students are moved higher or lower in a single subject, such as in the math and reading programs.

No decision was made on whether the school should play 11-man or 8-man football.

"We don't think 11-man football is safe in the small schools," said Kilmer, "but we're not sure at this point. We're still discussing it."

In other business, Roy Helburn, Castleford, was hired as custodian.

A parent coffee hour will be held at the school on Dec. 11 at 10 a.m. All parents are invited to attend.

School will be dismissed at 12:45 p.m. on Nov. 27 for Thanksgiving vacation, and will resume on Dec. 2.

Construction of the school's new greenhouse has been completed, and the new log-structure playground equipment has been installed.

Kelly from her animals, and would like them housed nearby so she could continue to care for them.

"The city owns some property outside of the area of impact," Whitton said. "Something could be worked out to let her have a lifetime estate, and then it reverts back to the city. It will sell her property, it will be cheaper than litigating the thing."

The city needs to take action soon, Ruppel Attorney Rick Bollar said.

"We need to get something formulated," he said. "It's coming down the pike rather quickly."

"It's an issue of compassion," Bollar said. "The city has ignored this too long. They don't wish to be heartless."

Kim Belliston, who lives on the south-side of Kelly's property, signed a criminal complaint against Kelly recently, charged that Kelly disturbed the peace by maintaining her menagerie.

Kelly appeared in court and

pleaded innocent, requesting a trial. The date has not been set.

An ordinance passed by the City Council last summer made it a misdemeanor for any resident to own an animal that makes loud or disturbing noises to neighbors. That ordinance took effect Nov. 1.

Belliston said she just wanted to have Kelly's property cleaned up.

"It's been a nuisance," she said. Kelly, 69, has taken in and cared for all variety of animals, including dozens of dogs and cats, an injured coyote, badgers, pigeons, peacocks and skunks.

Many of the creatures were dumped in her yard, left in her mailbox or tied to her fence.

Whitton said the council's other options included buying Kelly's lot, demolishing her house and cleaning up the property for resale.

Kelly said Thursday she would like to stay on her family homestead and care for the many birds that nest in her trees that could not be moved with her.

Her attorney, James Annest of

Burley, could not be reached for comment.

Whitton added he wanted a solution that pleased Kelly and her neighbors.

"I have a lot of compassion for her; she has a heart of gold," he said. "The people in our community have caused her problems. We have a legal obligation to do something and a moral one."

Whitton stressed the city will need help.

"Any way we go about it, it's going to take the people who support her, and for them to put their money where their mouth is," he said. "They will have to get out and help us. This is going to have to be a community effort. We need to work together."

He added mostly contributions will be needed.

"If it takes \$10,000 to move her into a mobile home for her to live in, and another \$10,000 to build pens for her animals, it isn't right to charge the taxpayer. Then we're paying her for violating ordinances," he said.

Initiative leader blasts attorney general before release of opinion

LEWISTON (AP) — Coeur d'Alene's Ron Rankin is leading the charge on the 1 Percent Initiative effort, and he isn't waiting for Idaho Attorney General Larry EchoHawk to release his legal opinion of the property tax-limiting measure.

The Idaho Property Owners Association president is denouncing the state Democrat for presuming to issue an opinion after publicly downplaying the initiative.

"We categorically reject any opinion from the attorney general's office," Rankin said. "The attorney general's office has a direct, ethical conflict of interest and he above everybody else should know this," Rankin said Wednesday.

Rankin added the attorney general privately told associates the opinion will point out defects with the tax initiative.

"He's already discussed it with other people and told them he was going to have a negative opinion," he said.

But EchoHawk said his office's opinion prompted by requests from state Rep. Michael Simpson, R-Blackfoot, House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee, and others will not be complete until next week. He declined to discuss its findings, nor even the scope of the review.

"It's true that I have, on at least one occasion, expressed an opinion that the 1 Percent should be looked at very carefully because of its impact on services provided by state and local government," EchoHawk said.

"But what they will get out of my office is a legal opinion, not a political opinion. We've had lawyers in this office looking at that very carefully for the past several weeks. I think the opinion will stand on its merits."

Rankin is promoting a measure intended for the 1992 ballot that would limit property taxes to 1 percent of actual market value. It is anticipated it would cut those tax revenues by as much as half in some areas and reduce about one-third the statewide tax base for schools, cities, counties and local taxing districts.

Questions raised on the initiative include whether actual market value can be defined if it does not appear in state code.

Initiative backers have also indicated a portion that would restrict passage of override levies to circumvent the 1 Percent to a virtually impossible standard of two-thirds of qualified or registered voters, not the people who turn out at the polls.

"I question the constitutionality ... if we can count someone's vote who doesn't vote," Simpson said. "That seems to me to be a basic fundamental question of whether you have the right to assume someone votes yes or no."

Meanwhile, Rankin is challenging the fairness of a legal review coming after he submitted the draft initiative to EchoHawk's office last spring before embarking on a petition drive to obtain more than 32,000 signatures.

Under Idaho law, initiative backers must submit to the preliminary review, although they are not bound to follow the attorney general's conclusions. In this case, Rankin said he followed the recommendations, but EchoHawk hinted at some defects.

"I think he anticipates, because they did not follow the advice of the preliminary review, that they're facing some bad news that will come from this opinion," EchoHawk said.

Representative backs Boise VA hospital's care

WASHINGTON (AP) — There's no evidence that care provided at the Boise Veterans Administration hospital is anything but top-notch, Rep. Larry LaRocco says.

"I have been assured by the Boise VA and by the American Legion post in Boise that care for veterans in Idaho remains excellent," LaRocco said Thursday. "I will continue to keep a close watch on the VA and work with them to ensure a high level of care for Idaho's veterans."

A day earlier, a congressional committee was advised that an investigation indicated serious medical problems at veterans hospitals. "Mary Ann Curran, a congressional health care investigator, said she found serious medical problems at all six Department of Veterans Affairs hospitals (not including Boise) that she visited."

"She said a broader examination of records found 30 VA hospitals, including the one in Boise, had high numbers of patient complications and other indicators of substandard care."

VA officials disputed the findings.

LaRocco said veterans officials advised him the only link between the Boise VA hospital and the investigation was an examination of records. It indicated "a high rate of complications" compared with overall medical and surgical admissions for three of the six indicators, and only for 1989.

Insurers want higher workers' comp fees

BOISE (AP) — Should workers' compensation insurance premium rates go up an average 9.9 percent next year, or should insurance companies make do a second year with little or no increase?

Yes, there should be a hike, say many private insurance companies, citing medical costs in Idaho that have soared.

State officials, however, reject the idea as an unnecessary movement of wealth from Idaho employers to insurance companies.

The issue will be debated at a Dec. 5 public meeting before state Insurance Department hearing officer Merlin Young.

Idaho employers pay about \$150 million a year in premiums to insure their workers against job-related medical expenses. Premiums would blossom to \$165 million if the rate hike is allowed to go into effect on Jan. 1.

The average payment of \$7,692 per business would jump to \$8,462.

"We didn't receive any (increase) last year. So it's our position that we need enough to at least stay with inflation and increased medical costs," said Gary Ross, regional vice president for Industrial Indemnity Co.

Industrial Indemnity is the largest private company writing

worker's comp insurance in Idaho. It collects about \$20 million in premiums annually. Actually, there was a small increase approved for 1991 by former Insurance Department director Anthony Fagiano.

But the adjustment of 1.3 percent was a far cry from the 9.8-percent increase proposed by the National Council on Compensation Insurance. It sets rates for worker's compensation insurers, subject to approval by the Insurance Department.

The State Insurance Fund, which insures three-quarters of the state's business, does not like the proposal. It is unnecessary, Director Merle Parsley said.

"Our profit picture in the first ten months of this year was over \$23 million, and we are expecting a total profit of approximately \$28 million," he said.

What's more, the fund expects to issue a multimillion-dollar dividend to policyholders next month that should surpass the \$19.3 million dividend put out last year, he said.

"So it's obvious that the State Insurance Fund does not need an increase."

Excess income is returned to the policyholders by the non-profit fund in the form of a dividend. Gov. Cecil Andrus is set to announce the amount on Dec. 2,

Woman shot while jogging in Boise

BOISE (AP) — A woman jogging alone was shot twice by a man who tried to abduct her, police who arrested a suspect at the Boise Towne Square.

The 37-year-old woman, whose name was not released, was shot in a hand and leg at about 8:30 a.m. Wednesday while struggling with the attacker, Boise Police said. She was able to escape. The attacker fled in a car.

The jogger ran from the Boise foothills area toward town and was picked up by a resident who took her to St. Luke's Regional Medical Center, police said. She was listed in fair condition Wednesday night.

Ronie Lee Fenstermaker, 27, of

Meridian was arrested at 11 a.m. Wednesday outside the mall, Boise Police Lt. Jim Spears said.

Fenstermaker was arrested on charges of attempted murder and battery with attempt to commit rape, Spears said. He is being held without bond in the Ada County Jail.

The lumberyard worker lives with his father, Leroy Fenstermaker, 61. The elder Fenstermaker said his son left the house at about 6:30 a.m. for work in Meridian. But the temporary employee never showed up, said Karla Wolf, personnel manager for Canfor USA.

The woman told police the attacker jumped out of a black and red Pontiac Sunbird as she ran by and tried to drug her back to the car at

gunpoint, Spears said. The handgun was so close it left scorch marks on her hand when it fired, police said. The bullet went through her left hand and a leg.

Police tracked down a 1978 Sunbird at the mall a few hours later. They arrested Ronie Lee Fenstermaker when he walked out of the mall.

Police would not specify the weapon used. They also declined to say if Ronie Lee Fenstermaker has a criminal record.

Leroy Fenstermaker said his son owns a 9mm handgun and has had "a few minor scrapes" with police in the past. He said his son drives a red and black 1978 Sunbird.

Court won't change slayer's life term

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals will not change the fixed life term ordered for convicted slayer Burryington E. Searcy.

The court on Thursday rejected an appeal from the second life sentence ordered for Searcy after he admitted the killing of store owner Teresa Rice. She was shot to death in what Searcy said was a drug-related robbery attempt.

Searcy, now 24, was sentenced to fixed life for murder, plus at least 10 years for robbery and another 10 years for using a firearm. He was sentenced in 1988 to correct a technical flaw in the original sentence. Thursday's decision rejected his appeal from the second sentence.

The Court of Appeals said Searcy attempted to challenge the Idaho law which forbids the use of insanity as a defense, and challenged a sentencing law as "cruel and unusual punishment."

But the Court of Appeals said the insanity argument was covered in his original appeal, and the second issue should have been. The only issue his newest appeal should have covered was the new sentence, the court said.

Consequently, even issues of constitutional dimension may be barred from review in a subsequent appeal if those issues were or could have been asserted in the original appeal from a judgment of conviction, the court said.

In another decision Thursday, the Supreme Court sided with the Industrial Commission in ruling that nurse Helen Taylor was not entitled to unemployment compensation after her 1988 firing by Burley Care Center.

The court said Taylor was terminated after she insisted on bringing her sister, a nurse at a competing facility, at a meeting with her supervisor at Burley Care Center to talk about how she could improve her job performance.

The Supreme Court concluded it was logical for a company not to want someone from a competing company present at a conference to talk about patient care and other confidential information.

Panel: Involve parents more in schools

POCATELLO — Some parents feel schools want them around only to "sell hot dogs in the rain," and not to take part of what goes on in the classroom.

Participants in an educational panel here Wednesday night argued that more than that is needed from parents and increased parental involvement could be the single most important element of school reform.

Terry Anderson, regional PTA representative, said parents are made to feel their part in education is to sell hot dogs in the rain. Parents will not become more involved in education until school personnel make them feel a welcome part of the process, she said.

Roberta Fields, a member of the state Board of Education, said she feels developing high-tech facilities will improve the quality of education. But Chubbuck Elementary School teacher Pat Fearborn said she would much rather have a reduction in class size and questioned why high-tech schools is listed as a priority over class size reduction.

Accident kills, injures Marsing residents

BOISE — A Marsing man was killed and a Marsing teen-ager was critically injured early Thursday when their pickup truck hit a tree off Interstate 84 near west of Boise, Idaho State Police said.

A pickup driven by Michael Lester Nick, 20, left the highway at 2:46 a.m. between the Boise city center exit and the Eagle overpass. It broke through a fence and hit a large tree, an ISP dispatcher said.

Nick was ejected and died at the scene. His passenger, Scott Oatney, 17, was wearing a seat belt but still suffered a broken back and other injuries, the dispatcher said. He was in critical condition at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center.

Power customers will share credits

IDAHO FALLS — Residential electric customers in Idaho Falls will share \$1 million in credits on their municipal power bills next month.

Mayor Tom Campbell said that for a homeowner using 2,000 kilowatt hours of power during a month, the credit will cut his bill from \$78 to \$20. The credit is part of the \$5 million cash payment the Bonneville Power Administration has paid the city, which operates its own hydro-electric generating system.

Under federal law, the BPA must pay power producers like Idaho Falls the difference between BPA's lower costs and their higher costs if the power generator owns its own transmission lines.

Gem historical society director resigns

BOISE — David Crowder, director of the Idaho State Historical Society for almost five years, has announced his resignation.

"I'm just going to change some directions and just pursue other opportunities," Crowder said this week.

The State Historical Society Board will meet Dec. 10 to begin a national search for a new director and perhaps name an interim director, Crowder said.

Crowder was an Historical Society board member when he was hired as director of the state agency. A specialist in Western American history, he formerly was a history professor at Ricks College in Rexburg.

MasterCard charges will help state park

BAYVIEW — For the next few months, people who charge their purchases through catalogs could be helping in the reforestation of Idaho's Farragut State Park.

MasterCard International's "Forests for Our Future" program is financing the final phase of a reforestation project at the Panhandle park.

For each MasterCard purchase made through any catalog, the company has pledged to plant a tree. Steve Apeles, a MasterCard spokesman, said the company plans to plant 1 million trees nationwide.

Rathdrum moves to lure firm

RATHDRUM (AP) — The Boeing Co. refuses to say whether the city of Rathdrum's annexation of 480 acres of industrial property boosts its chances of being selected for a wind tunnel facility.

Rathdrum is one of five finalists nationwide for a \$750 million aeronautical research complex. It would employ up to 300 people.

Paul Binder, Boeing public relations director, Wednesday declined to offer any reaction to the annexation.

"I'm not going to comment at all on any of the sites," Binder said. "I will not be pulled into any quotes on what would be or would not be appealing to Boeing."

"We are conducting very important surveys at this time. One thing we are not doing is handing out juicy tidbits of information" to the media, he said.

Rathdrum Mayor Jim Parker, however, countered Tuesday's unanimous vote by the council will boost the city's appeal to the aerospace giant.

"There are two things they are interested in," Parker said.

"Number one was that it be zoned properly and that occurred during annexation. And second, that the area chosen be inside a city."

The mayor said Rathdrum also offers incentives, including available sewer service and an ample power supply.

Binder said Boeing will announce a decision early next year. The company may hold off altogether on building the wind tunnel.

Parker said most of the people attending Tuesday's council meeting were in favor of the annexation.

He said those opposed were concerned that industries attracted to the site could harm the environment.

But Parker said the City Council has established zoning ordinances for the property which will protect it against pollution.

"Any development, be it Boeing or whoever, would not come at the expense of our people. If it is not a definite benefit to the people of Rathdrum, we don't want the project."

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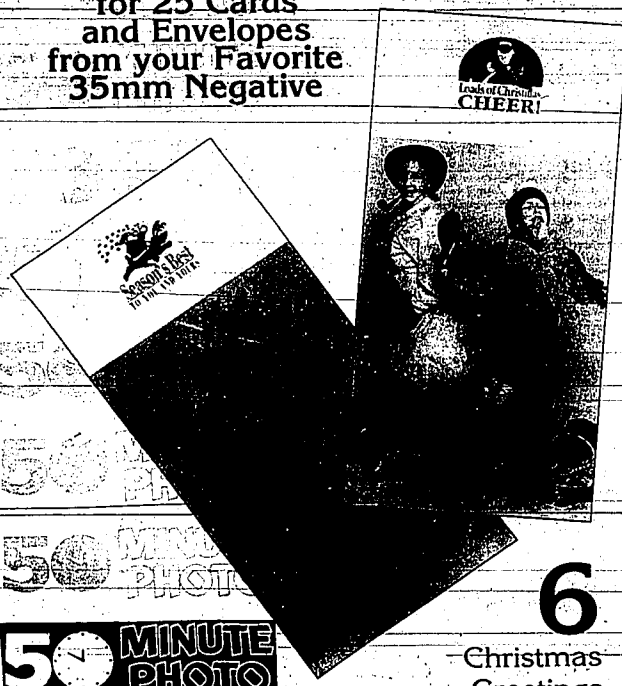

Woman wins court award

VICTORIA, British Columbia (AP) — A woman who became infected with the HIV virus during her unsuccessful attempts to become pregnant through artificial insemination was awarded \$883,000 Canadian in damages Wednesday.

A British Columbia Supreme Court jury deliberated for 10 hours before making the award against Dr. Gerald Korn, a Vancouver artificial-insemination specialist.

Kobe ter Neuzen, 46, of suburban Saanich, sued Korn for medical malpractice after contracting the virus on Jan 21, 1985 in her 35th — and last — attempt to become pregnant through artificial insemination.

The HIV virus causes AIDS. She first visited Korn on Feb. 16, 1981.

Ter Neuzen's lawyer had argued that by 1984, information was available showing that artificial insemination posed a risk of AIDS.

A letter to the editor in a 1983 New England Journal of Medicine and a 1984 Toronto Globe and Mail article linking AIDS and artificial insemination were submitted as evidence.

Ter Neuzen also testified that Korn did not warn her that artificial insemination posed a risk of AIDS.

Korn testified that he knew by 1983 or 1984 that HIV could be transmitted through blood transfusions but did not make the connection with artificial insemination.

The donor whose semen infected ter Neuzen was the only one of 28 donors who tested positive for the HIV virus and women who contracted the virus from that donor, Korn said.

He said he did not know if the other woman who tested HIV positive was still alive but confirmed she was impregnated by another donor.

Panel OKs exploration restrictions

WASHINGTON — Rep. Pat Williams' push to restrict geothermal exploration and development around Yellowstone National Park was approved Wednesday by the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee.

The Montana Democrat's bill would prohibit drilling for geothermal steam sources which feed the park's geysers, including Old Faithful. Drilling within a 15-mile radius of the park would be banned.

Among the groups who would be affected by the ban are members of the Church Universal and Triumphant, who want to use the water from LaDuke Hot Spring for their commune based in Park County. In 1988, the group announced plans to drill underground in order to release the steam from the spring to heat shelters and a greenhouse complex.

Approval of the bill followed a hot debate between Williams and Rep. Ron Marlenee, R-Mont. Marlenee said that the bill amounts to the government taking private property, because it allows the federal government to tell owners what they can or cannot do with their land.

"This committee has been short on compassion when it comes to dealing with private property rights," Marlenee said.

Williams said the church is the only private owner which has drilled a well in the Corwin Springs area. And, he said, the church has told him it would be willing to use the above-ground runoff from the hot spring, rather than opening the well — not with the church and they showed me the spring," Williams said. "I asked what they wanted and they said they wanted the overflow" from the LaDuke Hot Spring. "This bill grants them that."

Williams said his constituents want to see Yellowstone protected. "I am asking the committee to provide to Yellowstone an iron-clad, copper-riveted, no-risk protection guarantee."

Marlenee offered an amendment which members said would have slowed passage of the bill by requiring the U.S. attorney general to approve the measure. It was defeated. The measure goes next to the House floor, possibly as early as next week.

Whale calf eager for tube feedings, gaining weight

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — It started out as force-feeding in a desperate attempt to save the life of an infant killer whale.

Now — the Vancouver Public Aquarium's seven-week-old whale calf races over and opens her mouth open when staff in wetsuits appear for her six daily feedings.

"She's gaining weight at a good rate, approximately 2 1/2 to three pounds a day, which is kind of the target that we're looking for," says Jeremy Fitz-Gibbon, assistant curator for marine mammals.

"She's become much more tactile and friendly. She understands what we're doing now."

The black and white calf, born Sept. 30, was separated from her mother, Bjossa, on Oct. 25 when it became apparent she wasn't getting enough to eat.

Her odds for survival weren't good. Bjossa's first calf died from malnutrition because it wasn't getting enough milk. Of 14 killer whale calves conceived and born in captivity, eight are still alive, Canadian Press reported. In the wild, about half do not survive.

At first it took about eight people to catch the calf and tube-feed her.

Now the tube feedings take only minutes. A slap on the water attracts the young whale. One trainer slides a greased plastic tube into her mouth and down to her stomach. Another keeps the dolphin white wings — put in the pool as a companion from interfering with the feeding. A third pours about 2 1/2 quarts of formula into the tube from the pool deck.

But after "lunch" trainer Victor Biscaro spent about half an hour in the chilly water playing with the whale, who seemed to appreciate the attention.

"She really enjoys the play sessions," Fitz-Gibbon says. "Her teeth are just about to protrude, which could present new problems. They get pretty rambunctious when they're young."

The baby whale has already developed a public following, helped by a contest that aims to give her a name by early next month.

Hundreds of suggestions include Jump-Jump and Oreo, submitted by kids, to Icelandic names Sigga and Swawa to connect the baby to mother Bjossa's home waters.

There are lots of native, Indian names as well, such as Orenda, an

Iroquois name meaning spirit of harmony, and Tikegh, Chinook for affection or love.

Fitz-Gibbon said it's hoped the baby whale can be weaned from the feeding tube in about three months. Attempts to find a nipple from which she can nurse have been unsuccessful.

"We're probably going to begin putting herring into the formula in the next week or so," he said. "Then if her system is taking that all right we'll start offering her small bits of herring, probably in the next three or four weeks."

Since the whale is gaining weight so rapidly — she's up to close to 500 pounds from 456 pounds when she was separated from her mother — aquarium staff are considering cutting back on the number of feedings.

The calf is about eight feet long — a gain of about a foot since birth.

She will be returned to her mother — but not until she's eating solid food.

Fitz-Gibbon said they can't take the chance that Bjossa — who weighs nearly 5,300 pounds and is close to 20 feet long — would keep the staff from feeding the calf.

"The mother would probably take her right back as her calf and not let us get anywhere near her."

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West Man says ban not an insult

PHOENIX (AP) — A veteran and car dealer who's organizing a Pearl Harbor anniversary parade, said Thursday he wanted to ban Japanese and German cars from the event as a patriotic gesture not a racial insult. "It's to re-instill patriotism among our people... It's not meant to create hatred or dissension," said Jim Cox, a World War II Air Force veteran organizing the Bisbee Rotary Club parade.

The idea to include only American-made cars in the line of war heroes and Boy Scouts floating down the main street of the southeastern Arizona mining town on Dec. 7 came from local veterans, who "wanted to make it a totally American parade," Cox said.

The former bombardier said he understood, at least now, that some would see this as yet another racial insult coming from the only state that lacks an official Martin Luther King holiday.

When informed of the parade plans, Joy Morimoto, northern California director of the Japanese-American Citizens League Bisbee parade plans, "That really puts a blanket kind of stereotype on a whole country and to me, that's insensitive."

Jimmy Tokeshi, Pacific Southwest regional director for the league, said, "My initial reaction is that it's their right, it's their prerogative."

But he added that the Pearl Harbor anniversary shouldn't be racially exploited. "It shouldn't be a time to bring up racial fears. It should be a time to remember those who have fallen in the United States," he said.

The move doesn't reflect the sentiments of the Rotary Club, an international civic organization, but only those of the community," said Cox, 67.

Cox said he has gotten 12 calls of support for the idea and one opposing it. But he feels bad about offending the one who spoke out — a local man of Japanese descent whom he respects a great deal.

"I'm not a racist and I don't believe in it. I believe in our American freedoms and why we have them," said Cox, whose car dealership sells only American-made cars.

But he is sticking by his request for a made-in-America parade, although anyone who brings a Japanese or German car won't be denied, he said.



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Ill rancher kills self after vote

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — An ailing cattle-rancher who was in constant pain hoped his doctor would help him die in peace, but two days after a "right-to-die" ballot question failed, he chose a lonely, violent death.

Claude Pendell, 81, who "fared being a blob in a nursing home," killed himself with a shotgun blast to the head, his son Raymond said Wednesday.

The ballot measure, which was rejected by voters Nov. 5, would have permitted the terminally ill, like Pendell, to die with a doctor's help if it was determined they had less than six months to live.

"It was a lonely death that didn't have to be," said Diane McDade, an Initiative 119 leader. "He wanted so much to control the events around his death, and so did his family. This isn't an issue that will go away because the initiative lost."

"It is one tragic incident and I totally sympathize with the family and their anguish," said an initiative-opponent, nurse and state Rep. Margaret Penrice. "But I have to say this is no reason to pass a state law that would apply to situations not as clear-cut."

Raymond Pendell said his father, who suffered constant pain from a variety of illnesses including active leukemia, shingles and diabetes, agreed not to take his own life pending the outcome of the I-119 vote. The initiative failed by a margin of nearly 8 percent.

"Dad and the doctor mutually agreed that if and only if I 119 passed would the doctor help," Pendell said in a telephone interview from Spokane. His father killed himself Nov. 7, Pendell said.

"I don't endorse suicide," he said. "It is a terrible thing to do. But on the other side of that, I do endorse the right to die in a civilized manner."

Pendell "just couldn't stand the pain no longer and knew he was going to die soon anyhow," said a close friend, Floyd Tew. "It didn't make any sense to him to keep on living."

Nevada senator seeks disclosure from DOE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic Sen. Dick Bryan of Nevada wants the federal Department of Energy to make a full disclosure of its ties to the nuclear power industry's planned \$9 million media blitz to promote a high-level radioactive waste dump in Nevada.

Bryan asked Energy Secretary James Watkins for a list of department scientists who have agreed to help utilities with what Bryan termed "an elaborate propaganda campaign" to win support for the dump that would take waste like the commercial reactor fuel rods from the state of Idaho by trying to keep from being temporarily stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

"The public has a right to know which DOE scientists have received political and media training by utility consultants," Bryan said.

"I think this raises a credibility question and also brings into question whether what we're hearing is scientific opinion or a politically orchestrated response."

The utility-funded public relations campaign was detailed in a 22-page outline prepared by two Nevada political consultants and leaked last week by an environmental group.

One of the consultants, Ed Allison,

later resigned as the Clark County, Nev., lobbyist. Allison, a Washington County commissioner had told Allison's firm last June to cease any involvement involving the dump if he wanted to keep his county contract.

Kent Oran also prepared the Nevada initiative plan. Oran was a former adviser to Gov. Bob Miller, a strong opponent of the nuclear dump.

The media plan calls for training scientists to work on a "truth squad" to dispute inaccurate media reports about the dump.

The outline said some scientists already have worked with consultants on the campaign and others have undergone training to help them work with reporters and government officials on nuclear waste issues.

The three-year ad campaign is designed to weaken opposition in Nevada to the government's plan to bury 77,000 tons of high-level nuclear waste at Yucca Mountain, 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

Bryan called it another example of an "unholy alliance between the DOE and the nuclear industry" that undermines the department's claims that the dump program is driven by science and not politics.


Embattled hospital administrator quits

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Pullman Memorial Hospital Administrator Tom Newhof says he will resign, effective May 1.

Newhof, administrator since 1987, announced his intention during a hospital board meeting Wednesday night.

During the recent campaign for hospital board seats, Newhof was criticized for falsifying his academic credentials, for which he apologized, and for arranging "kickback" with a medical equipment supplier during his previous job. Newhof said the agreements were legal.

Newhof said after the meeting that he made his decision to resign in July.



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Clean-up plan OK'd for Utah chemical site

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Entrada Industries will pay for cleaning up pesticides and herbicides left behind at the old Wasatch Chemical site in Salt Lake City when that company went out of business, the Utah attorney general's office said.

Operations at the site from 1957 to 1969 produced bleach, refined chlorine cylinders, packaged acids and other dangerous material and formulated fertilizers, chemicals and cleansers.

Entrada, parent company to Questar, which owns Mountain Fuel Supply Co., agreed in a federal court consent decree to reimburse the state \$9.4 million for past costs and to pay the Environmental Protection Agency nearly \$419,000 for past costs and for future site cleanup.

The site is presently owned by Entrada. Other defendants in the U.S. District Court suit are not parties to the consent decree.

"From our point of view we did not have to deal with those people when Entrada stepped up and agreed to pay for the whole site," said Assistant Utah Attorney General Laura Lockhart.

"This agreement is for the whole shebang. They're going to clean up the whole site."

The agreement was announced by Attorney General Paul Van Dam; Kenneth L. Alkema, executive director of the Utah Department of Environmental Quality; and Robert L. Duprey, director of the EPA's Hazardous Waste Division for Region 8, based in Denver.

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

Senate OKs ban on betting in 47 states

WASHINGTON — A bill that would ban sports gambling in 47 states was approved Thursday by the Senate Judiciary Committee despite some members' objections to granting any exemptions.

Every state except Nevada, Oregon and Delaware would be forbidden to allow wagering on professional and college sports events.

The bill would reach the Senate floor before Congress adjourns for the year, possibly before Thanksgiving.

In the House, a similar ban that exempts those three states and New Jersey is contained in the 1992 crime bill. That House measure would give New Jersey a two-year exemption to allow citizens to decide in a referendum whether they want to sanction sports gambling.

The New Jersey exemption was pushed by Reps. William Hughes and Robert G. Torricelli; D-N.J., to give Atlantic City casinos the same opportunity for additional revenues as Las Vegas gambling halls.

Differences between the House measure and a Senate crime bill that contains no

sports betting ban must be resolved by negotiators from both chambers.

Senate staff lawyer Janice Long said Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., sponsor of the Senate's proposed anti-betting bill, would like to remove the New Jersey exemption from a compromise anti-crime bill.

A Senate measure without any exemptions was supported Thursday by Sens. Joseph Biden, D-Del., the committee chairman; Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, and Bill Bradley, D-N.J., a former member of the New York Knicks basketball team.

Bradley said the committee had approved

"the next best thing" to a complete ban.

"By halting the spread of sports betting, the committee sends the clear message that values of sport cannot be compromised by the corruption of the gambler's game," Bradley said.

Co-founder of the New Jersey Coalition Against Sports Betting, Bradley has led a campaign against the practice while his state's casino industry has lobbied for it.

Gambling opponents also include major league sports organizations. Supporters say gambling revenues could be used to meet pressing state needs.

Holyfield simply wants to fight

ATLANTA — Evander Holyfield, who does nothing but win, finds himself in a now situation approaching Saturday's heavyweight title fight against stand-in Bert Cooper.

In a fight that seems little more than an exhibition before the hometown fans, Holyfield has little to gain outside his \$6 million payday.

"If he knocks him out in four rounds, they say he fought a bum," trainer Lou Duva said. "If this guy makes Evander look bad, they ask what happened."

So why is Holyfield, assuming he's not desperate for the money, even fighting?

"Right now, I just want to fight anybody," Holyfield said.

"I've been training 10 weeks. It's almost like if I don't get a fight, I don't get paid for my work."

Holyfield is an owl who likes to fight. He wants to retain his undisputed heavyweight championship against Cooper, who a week ago was resting on his laurels for having knocked out a fighter named Lou Hippo on Oct. 18 and had no idea he'd be fighting for boxing's biggest title.

Holyfield weighed in at 210 pounds Thursday night, two more than he weighed when he fought George Foreman in April. Cooper weighed 215; seven pounds less than his fight only a month ago against Hippo.

Holyfield is such a favorite, in fact, that only one Las Vegas sports book even bothered posting odds on the fight, with Holyfield a 22-1 pick.

"I believe every heavyweight championship should have odds on it, no matter how marginal it is," said Jimmy Vaccaro, manager of the sports book at The Mirage.

Holyfield's second defense of the title he won 13 months ago with a third-round knockout of James "Buster" Douglas was to have been the biggest and richest prize fight ever.

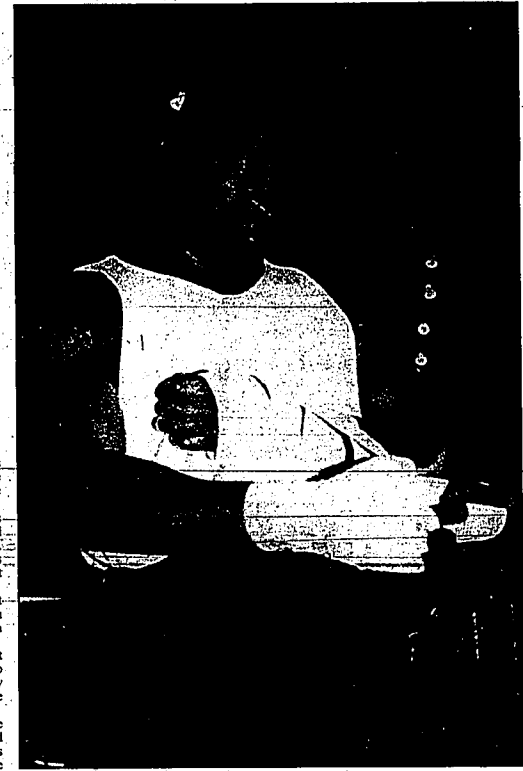
That, of course, was when the opponent was former heavyweight champion Mike Tyson and the site was outside a Las Vegas casino some 3,000 miles away.

"That was an event they would have been talking about for the next decade," Duva said.

He would have found it to be spectacular. He Duva said he was going out if Tyson was the baddest guy in the world or if Evander was a good, good heavyweight. How does Evander prove he is a good fighter if he doesn't fight a Tyson?

Certainly not against Cooper, who got his chance only when the first substitute, Italy's Francesco Damiani, injured an ankle in training last week.

Despite promoter's attempts to portray Cooper as another Tyson, the reality is that Cooper has lost four of his previous six fights — three by knockout — before embarking on a modest four-fight winning

streak this year against a collection of unknowns to up his record to 26-7 with 23 knockouts. Cooper will be paid \$750,000 for fighting Holyfield.

The night Holyfield stopped Douglas to win the title, Cooper was knocked out in the second round by Riddick Bowe on the undercard.

"This is the chance of a lifetime for Cooper," Duva said. "Stranger things have happened. Who would have thought Douglas would beat Tyson in Tokyo?"

Holyfield, who has lost since his controversial disqualification at the hands of Kevin Barry in the 1984 Olympics, has won 26 times as a pro, with eight of the wins coming after he moved up to the heavyweight ranks three years ago.

His biggest problem Saturday night may be the mental adjustment from fighting a huge fight against Tyson to taking on a journeyman like Cooper.

"I was disappointed," Holyfield said of the Tyson cancellation. "But in boxing you get up for each and every fight. Some fighters just bring a little more to the table and are a little more dangerous than others."

Duva said he hopes the excitement of fighting before thousands of his hometown fans at the Omni arena will help motivate his fighter.

"The danger is he will come in flat," Duva said. "My job is to motivate him, have him ready. I may hit him over the head with the stool if he doesn't respond."

Vandals coach taking nothing for granted

MOSCOW — There are some national position holders among Big Sky Conference coaches, that are picking the Idaho Vandals to win the men's basketball championship this season.

Idaho's second-year coach Larry Eustachy isn't sure why.

"If we're going to win this conference this year, our newcomers would have to progress much quicker than I anticipate them to," Eustachy said. "And we're going to have to be much tougher mentally."

The Vandals kickoff their season tonight hosting Sacramento State at 8:35 p.m. (MST).

The game will be carried on the Vandal radio network but the Twin Falls station, KTFI-AM (1270), will not pick up the game until the Twin Falls-Capital state football championship game in Boise is completed. Terry Veis said the Vandal game will be joined in progress.

Idaho was 19-11 overall last season and 11-5 in the Big Sky. That led the conference coaches to rank the Vandals No. 1 in the poll released this week.

Idaho media picked Idaho second behind Nevada, but Eustachy has so far gushed about his team's inexperience in spite of its tremendous raw talent.

"We're just awfully young," he said. "Most of them don't know what to expect. They almost need hands-on experience losing to really make them understand how hard you have to work."

Nevertheless, UI suits up a strong and swift front line including 6-7 sophomore Orlando Lightfoot, 6-8 sophomore Dan Watson and 6-5 senior Otis Mixon with 6-9 sophomore Frank Waters coming off the bench.

"It's probably the strength of our team," Eustachy said.

Lightfoot originally signed to play for Oklahoma but was wooed to Idaho last winter and Watson averaged 6.4 points and 5.6 rebounds last season. Waters, like Lightfoot, followed UI assistant-coach Hugh Watson from Hiwassee, Tenn., JC and sat out last season while Mixon averaged 7 points and 3.9 boards.

The front court will be important considering the loss of big men Sammie Freeman, Cliff Martin, Keith Stewart and Ricardo Boyd. But for once, Idaho's point guard won't be its weak spot.

Historically, the Vandals seldom have a first rounder who also could score. But they may have found one in

In Tucson and Shreveport, Copper Bowl and Independence Bowl officials are at it, watching and waiting, sweating out one more Saturday of games.

If you think they're nervous, check out Indiana and Arkansas, who both need one more win to get to those bowls.

NCAA legislation, in place for the first time this year, requires bowl teams to have resumes that include winning records. Whether Indiana (5-4-1) and Arkansas (5-5) qualify depends on what happens Saturday.

Win and they're in. Lose and it creates some last-minute shuffling.

"This game represents everything this season means for us," Arkansas coach Jack Crowe said. "From August on, our goals have been a winning season and a bowl game."

If Arkansas loses, the Independence Bowl will consider North Carolina, Kansas, Texas Tech and Pitt.

By beating its intrastate rival Saturday, Miami replaced the Seminoles as the nation's No. 1 team.

Athletic director Dave Maggard, who watched the game from the sidelines, said he was hit by a coin and ice and dodged a couple of oranges. No disciplinary action against Caesar is planned, Maggard said.

"I didn't view this as any big deal," Maggard said. "I was just very surprised that this has escalated to becoming an issue."

Campus police arrested Caesar after 40 to 50 students in the crowd said they wanted to make a complaint against him. "Our policy is if we see a student or any person throwing ice, we would prosecute that person and throw him out of the game," campus police Lt. Ted Rivenbark said. The students argued that the incident involving Caesar should be handled the same way, Rivenbark said.

Caesar was the third Miami player arrested this month. Charges were filed by Coral Gables police against running back Martin Patton and receiver Jonathan Harris after

Harris allegedly tried to flee from police on a motorcycle and crashed. Patton allegedly became abusive when police refused to let him get into an ambulance with Harris.

Caesar was served a notice to appear in court. One count of simple battery is a first-degree misdemeanor that carries a maximum penalty of one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

According to a police report and witnesses, Caesar was sitting on the bench when he tossed ice water over his shoulder "with the obvious intent to wet those people," campus police officer C.B. Strickland reported.

So would it be a shock Sunday if Dallas inflicted the first loss on the Redskins, trying to become the fourth NFL team to go 12-0?

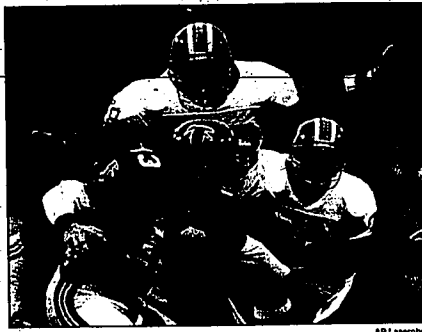

It's one of two games to wind up the 1991 Big Sky Conference football season. In the other, 19th-ranked Northern Arizona (3-8; 1-7) and Montana State (2-9; 1-7).

Montana captured second (7-4; 6-2); followed by Boise State and Weber, Eastern Washington (5-6; 4-4), Idaho (5-5; 3-4), Idaho State (8-0; 1-2), Northern Arizona (3-8; 1-7) and Montana State (2-9; 1-7).

Arslanian, coming off an exciting 35-32 come-from-behind victory

over Boise State that left WSU on the inside-and-Boise-State on the outside of the playoff picture, said his team is "sitting right on the bubble," since Weber is ranked 16th in the latest poll and there are 16 teams invited to the playoffs.

Actually, Weber is in a little better position than that, because two ranked teams won't take part in the playoffs, no matter what, so the Wildcats actually is 14th.

"The most important thing happening this week for us is going up to Pocatello. It should be exciting," Arslanian said.

Even though Weber was predicted to be sixth or seventh, he said he and his coaching staff thought the team would be better. "Honestly, I thought we had the chance to win every football game. We came up short a couple of times...I think the future is very bright for us."

As far as ISU is concerned, Weber's future is bright now.

"Weber turned out to be the surprise team of the conference. They're darned good and have proved it," Hall said. "They may be the best offensive team in I-AA..."

If Boise wins and ISU upsets We-

ber State, the Broncos would finish 8-3 overall, the best record in the Big Sky behind No. 1-ranked Nevada's 11-1. But it would be hard for the NCAA committee to invite Boise State and not Montana (7-4) and Weber (7-3), because both beat the Broncos.

Boise State, which has won nine straight at home, hasn't won a road game since late last season. Meanwhile, Idaho (5-5) hopes to add to Boise's road woes and avoid a losing season, after being picked as the preseason favorite to capture the Big Sky title.

A 17-year-old Big Sky record will fall Saturday, barring total collapse of the Weber State offense. The Wildcats have gained 5,519 yards in 10 games and need only 168 yards in the last game to break Boise State's 1974 total offense record, 5,681 yards and an average of 516 yards per game.

Weber, running back Geoff Mitchell needs 11 points to break the I-AA single-season scoring record of 162 set by Jerry Rice of Mississippi Valley State. He's already set school and Big Sky records with 152 points.

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Pereles removed as Michigan State coach

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — George Pereles is out as coach at Michigan State but may remain as athletic director, university president John DiBiaggio said Thursday. In announcing his decision to split the jobs that Pereles had held for almost two years, DiBiaggio emphasized that he disapproved one man holding both jobs from the beginning.

"I have considered such a dual appointment inappropriate from the start," DiBiaggio said. "The jobs are separate and distinct and a mistake was made when they were joined over my objections."

Pereles apparently wasn't given a choice of positions and the only decision he now faces is whether to hold onto the AD's job alone, effective Jan. 1. The appointment would be for 3½ years.

The board of trustees voted in January 1990 to give Pereles both jobs. The dual appointment led to a nationwide discussion about athlete

versus academics, and raised questions about who controls college athletics.

DiBiaggio echoed that in his statement. "We must view intercollegiate athletics as a part — not apart from — the best interests of MSU," he said.

Trustee Jack Shingleton, who wasn't on the board when it voted to give Pereles both jobs, said he was delighted that the nearly 2-year-old controversy was coming to an end.

"I think that's a major step in settling this whole matter and getting it behind us," he said. "It's the right thing to separate both jobs."

Christine Barbara Sawyer said she hopes the decision ends the controversy.

"We are tired of it. The public is tired of it and I suspect George Pereles is tired of it," she said.

She said she is pleased with the compromise, assuming that Pereles has agreed not to hold the university to his football contract.

Minnesota coach resigns

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — University of Minnesota football coach John Gutekunst resigned Thursday, according to a statement released by the university.

The statement from university President Nils Hasselmo said he has accepted Gutekunst's resignation, which takes effect Jan. 1. Gutekunst was scheduled to talk with the media later Thursday.

The statement said Hasselmo accepted the resignation because "new leadership is needed. This is not because the old leadership is bad, but because new leadership can bring new perspective, new opportunities and new energy to an enterprise."

It was reported this week that Gutekunst would either resign or be fired.

His team is 2-8 this year with Sat-

urday's game at Iowa remaining on the schedule.

Gutekunst is 29-36-2 in his six seasons as Minnesota coach.

The process that led to Thursday's announcement began about two weeks ago when Gutekunst asked Hasselmo for a lift to discuss Gutekunst's future, acting athletic director Dan Meinert said. Hasselmo then asked Meinert to do an evaluation and that led to discussions this past week about Gutekunst's job status.

Both Meinert and Hasselmo said the decision for Gutekunst to resign was a mutual one.

Neither Meinert nor Hasselmo would comment on the content of the evaluation, but they said there's more to it than the team's wins and losses.

Vegas baccarat dealers edge closer to big payday

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Two baccarat dealers say it's getting down to nail-biting time as they eye a potential payout of \$1.36 million they could earn betting on NFL games.

Their odds of the big payout, 30,000-1 at the start of the season, have now shrunk to 16-1 after picking 11 straight winners and parlaying \$80 into \$103,107.

"You bet we're getting nervous," Patty Harris said Thursday. "I think that's only natural."

Harris and Sean Rowland, baccarat dealers at the Las Vegas Hilton, are on a roll that could earn \$1.36 million if they make the right pick on the four NFL games they choose over the next four weekends.

Harris, Rowland and six of their fellow baccarat workers put in \$10 each at the start of the season, agreeing to bet on one game each weekend. They missed the first weekend, but have gone unbeaten since then, parlaying their \$80 into \$103,107.

Despite the temptation to take the \$103,107 and fold, the two women say they're in it for the entire regular season — or until they lose.

"We agreed to it from the very beginning," said Harris, who makes the weekly pick along with Rowland. "The other six have no say. We all verbally agreed not to pull

out until we reached the final week. We can stand the heat."

Everything is riding on the shoulders of the attractive blondes.

"They're still in it with us, all the way," she said.

Harris and Rowland say three close calls have kept them from getting too confident. "It takes expertise, but it takes a lot of luck, too," Harris said. "We definitely had some luck with three games. We went down to the wire on those."

Their most anxious weekend?

"It was the Broncos and the Steelers when it went down to the last couple of minutes," Harris said.

The two went with Denver minus 6 against Pittsburgh. The Steelers missed a late field goal, which helped the Broncos cover the spread by one point.

In week six, the pair took Detroit against Minnesota. The Lions won by 14, just covering the three-point spread, when they scored two late touchdowns.

Three weeks later they went with the Redskins against the Giants. The Redskins trailed 13-0 before pulling out a four-point victory to beat the two-point spread.

The group started off betting at the Gold Coast, an off-strip hotel-casino, but had to switch to a sports book that would handle bigger action when their winnings topped \$7,000.

Last Saturday, Binion's Horseshoe took a \$56,000 bet on the Falcons over the Buccaneers. Joe Mainola, a sports book supervisor at Binion's, said his casino would accept the group's next wager.

Harris is determined she and Rowland will make the next four picks. "I've got some land in the mountains," she said Thursday. "I want that money to build a cabin there."

Talks begin on possibly renaming Braves

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Braves and some American Indian leaders opened negotiations Thursday that eventually could lead the team to change its name.

At a joint news conference, Braves president Stan Kasten described Wednesday's initial meeting with representatives of the American Indian Movement as "a good concrete discussion of all of the issues."

More meetings will be held, he said, but the Braves are a business that would face "complicated and multifaceted" economic issues if it were to change its logo or name.

"As of today, there are no plans to change the name," he said. But he added, "It's fair to say I'm not seriously ruling anything out."

He said he understood that AIM's main objective was to change the franchise name, because without the name the team's fans would no longer be the things Indians find so objectionable.

Indians are offended by the fans' wearing of war paint and headdresses, by the use of tomahawks on the team logo, and by the tomahawk chop and war chant that became famous as the Braves advanced to the World Series in October, said AIM national director Clyde Bellecourt.

But he said he wasn't interested in just trying to stop those things.

"The name has to go," he said. "Nothing is going to change, the behavior ain't going to change until the name changes. And even then, it's going to take a while after that before it will change completely."

Because of the attention the Braves fans got during the postseason, the

chopping and chanting is "almost a crime today," he said. "It's going on in Kansas City with the Chiefs' games, on national television. It's going on in Washington, D.C., at RFK Stadium, where the NFL's Redskins play."

Bellecourt said he was trying to line up a meeting with commissioner Fay Vincent, who had promised during the World Series to meet with him on the issue of Indian-related franchise names.

The Minneapolis-based AIM staged protests during the World Series, which the Braves lost to the Minnesota Twins.

Bellecourt said his group has been trying to change the names of the

Cleveland Indians, the Redskins, college football's Florida State Seminoles and others for years.

And, he said smiling, he was "very grateful" for the Braves' success this year in that it brought considerable attention to the campaign.

Kasten said, "I've been president of the Braves for five years and over that time I've got maybe four, maybe five letters from individuals (on the issue) prior to the World Series."

But he said he doesn't believe the Braves were picked on, even though the protests didn't begin until the team won its first postseason game since moving to Atlanta from Milwaukee in 1966.

"I fully understand that any cause is in need of a platform and attention, and I don't think anyone here will deny that they would be the available platform in the World Series to their best advantage — something I might do if I were in their shoes," he said. "I don't have any problem with that."

U.S. near arms deal with Iran

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — The United States has reached a tentative agreement to pay Tehran \$275 million for impounded weaponry dating from when Washington was the Shah of Iran's top arms supplier, an official said Thursday.

The official at the Iran-United States Claims Tribunal said a final deal may be signed next week, pending last-minute details. The official spoke on condition of anonymity.

Although the final stages of the settlement agreement has come, a flurry of hostage releases in Lebanon by pro-Iranian Shiite Muslims, the Tribunal official denied the two were connected.

American Thomas Sutherland and Briton Terry Waite were released Monday.

Iranian leaders have repeatedly said return of Iranian assets in the United States as a condition for their interest on behalf of the hostages.

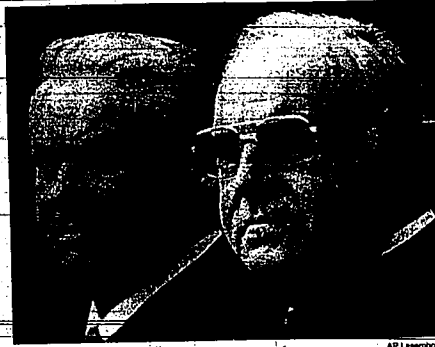
But both Iranian and American negotiators at the tribunal, the only forum for the two sides, have had official contacts, deny that the hostage situation has influenced their negotiations over the years.

The compensation figure had been agreed upon during negotiations last spring, and represents resolution of one of the "B" series of claims, the largest group of claims before the Tehran-Washington arbitration panel.

BI deals with equipment ordered from Washington by Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi's government in the years before his 1979 overthrow, the founding of the Islamic Republic of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, and Washington's soon-to-follow weapons embargo against Tehran.

Tehran has estimated the value of the BI claims at \$11 billion, while the U.S. side at the decade-long tribunal talks has called that figure exaggerated.

The claim about to be settled deals with equipment returned to the United States by Iran before the revolution for modifications or repairs, including a submarine, tanks and missiles.

Yeltsin receives aid pledges in Germany

BOHN, Germany (AP) — Russian Federation President Boris N. Yeltsin asserted his country's sovereignty Thursday as he opened a visit to Germany and received pledges of cooperation and humanitarian aid for the coming winter.

Though the Russian republic leader does not head an independent country, he was treated like a visiting head of state, with flags and flourishes, a military honor guard to be reviewed, and leather-bound joint statements to be signed.

German Chancellor Helmut Kohl said, "With this day, a new chapter in the relations between Germany and Russia was begun."

Yeltsin referred repeatedly to "the new Germany and the new Russia."

The two leaders signed a 12-page document pledging broad cooperation. Germany also promised to aid the radical Russian economic reforms as well as provide an unspecified amount of food and humanitarian aid for the winter.

Russia promised to form an autonomous area for ethnic Germans and thus help dissuade that group of some 2 million people from exercising their right to emigrate to Germany.

The joint statement only made two passing references to the Soviet

Union, and then in the context of Russia assuming most of the burdens of the Soviet foreign debt and all the obligations of Soviet-German treaties.

Yeltsin, in the prepared text of a dinner speech, said the immense changes in the past year "created favorable conditions for the considerable deepening of our cooperation in all areas."

He said, "The widening in this context of the rights and possibilities of our Russian state, including international relations, undoubtedly opened new frameworks for the development of cooperation with foreign partners in economics, politics, culture and other areas."

Earlier, Kohl and Yeltsin smiled broadly and shook hands as they met for the first time in the courtyard of Kohl's office building.

A military band played both national anthems as the flags of the two lands flapped — no sign of the red Soviet flag — and a 90-member honor guard stood at attention as the two men, looking like tall and stout twins, picked along the ranks.

The trip is Yeltsin's first foreign visit since he played a major role in the failure of the August coup attempt against Gorbachev.

Former hostage delays trip

WIESBADEN, Germany (AP) — Former hostage Thomas Sutherland on Thursday was forced to postpone his return to the United States for a week after doctors discovered he has an ulcer.

The 60-year-old American educator, who was released Monday after 6 1/2 years in captivity in Lebanon, had been expected to leave a U.S. military base hospital Thursday for a flight home to Estes Park, Colo.

But after he "woke up with stomach pains, doctors decided that he should remain another five to seven days," Wiesbaden, where he has been staying for medical tests and a reunion with his family. The base is a traditional stopover for released American hostages.

Sutherland's doctor, Uwe Föllmeister, said he was suffering from a peptic ulcer and gastritis, an inflammation of the stomach, but was expected to recover.

"Being in captivity could probably activate this. He had some problems five to six weeks before he came here," said Föllmeister, a colonel in the U.S. Air Force.

Sutherland's wife, Jean, said her husband was at first disappointed by the delay in seeing other relatives and friends in the United States.

Sutherland's father-in-law died just before the former hostage's release, and Sutherland had planned to attend the funeral in Iowa on Friday. Family members there said the funeral would be held as scheduled.

But Mrs. Sutherland said her husband found consolation in the hope that another American hostage would soon be released and arrive in Wiesbaden while Sutherland is there.

"We really want that to happen. His feeling is that it will," she said. When Sutherland and Anglican Church envoy Terry Waite were freed on Monday, both former hostages said kidnappers told them more American captives would soon be freed.

U.N. hostage negotiator Giandomenico Picco took a cautious tone.

"We are working for a solution by the end of the year," said Picco, who was in Milan, Italy, for a meeting with U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar. "But I would like to stress that we are not in a situation of automatic releases."

Negotiations close for ousted Haitian

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — Lawmakers agreed Thursday to talk with ousted President Jean-Bertrand Aristide about his return to power, predicting that a trade embargo will be modified as they had demanded.

It was unclear exactly what the parliamentary negotiators would be able to offer Aristide, Haiti's first-ever democratically elected president, or whether the lawmakers' initiative had the support of the military, which ousted him Sept. 30.

Aristide says he is ready to make concessions, including inviting the opposition into his government.

The embargo imposed by the 34-member Organization of American States has aggravated Haiti's desperate poverty and contributed to an exodus by boat of thousands of Haitians in the past week.

Germany scraps pension cut plans

BOHN, Germany — The German government said Thursday it has abandoned plans to cut monthly pensions nearly in half in former-East Germany for victims of the Nazi regime.

After unification of the two Germanys in October 1990, the government planned to cut monthly pensions to \$470. But following talks between Heinz Galinski, head of the Jewish Community in Germany, and Labor Ministry officials, the ministry agreed to keep pensions at \$875 a month.

About 10,000 people in former East Germany receive the pensions. They include Jews, other victims of the Nazi regime and anti-fascist fighters.

Basque group says it planted bomb

BILBAO, Spain — The Basque separatist group ETA has claimed responsibility for planting a bomb in a car that killed the 2-year-old son of a civil guardsmen.

In a statement published in several newspapers Thursday, ETA blamed the Nov. 7 death of Fabio Moreno on the Spanish government's refusal to negotiate with them — a rationale a terrorist victims' group said was absurd.

"It is totally cynical and unfounded," Association for Terrorism Victims spokesman Paulino Baena said. "There's no reason the government should negotiate with a terrorist gang. We have a parliament in Spain to discuss political demands."

Opposition pushes for housing freeze

JERUSALEM — Israel's main opposition party voted Thursday to freeze Jewish housing construction in the occupied lands and recognize Palestinians "national rights." Its new party platform also drops a longstanding refusal to talk to the PLO.

The Labor Party positions, reflecting an attempt to shore up support among Israeli moderates following the Madrid peace talks, are part of the platform, which the party approved at the close of a three-day convention of 3,000 delegates.

The party managed to overcome an internal split and approve a platform designed to portray it as a credible dovish alternative to Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's right-wing Likud bloc.

Pathologist denies reports on Maxwell

LONDON — A pathologist who conducted the autopsy on Robert Maxwell Thursday denied a news report quoting him as saying a perforation under the publisher's left ear could have been caused by an injection.

"The perforation could have been caused by a syringe filled with some mortal substance. We certainly haven't ruled out the possibility of foul play," Dr. Carlos Lopez de Lamezia of Spain's National Toxicological Institute was quoted as telling the London Evening Standard today.

Salvadoran calls accusations smears

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador - The former air force chief alleged to have instigated the 1989 massacre of six Jesuit priests says the accusation is part of a smear campaign intended to quash his budding political career.

Retired Gen. Juan Rafael Bustillo rejected charges by U.S. Rep. Joe Moakley.

A staunch right-wing nationalist of Prussian bearing and gunmetal gray eyes, Bustillo, 56, was a charismatic linchpin of the armed forces in the decade before his 1989 retirement.

A sector of the right is promoting him as political heir to Roberto D'Aubuisson, who is dying of throat cancer. D'Aubuisson, a cashiered army major, is the founder and kingmaker of the governing rightist Republican National Alliance.

Czechs rally to support president

PRAQUE, Czechoslovakia - Tens of thousands of Czech demonstrators rallied in Prague on Thursday to support President Vaclav Havel's call for a referendum on the country's future.

A growing political gap has grown up between the country's two republics - Czech lands and Slovakia - in the two years since Communism fell, and bickering between each side's leaders threatens to paralyze needed reforms.

Havel and most Czechs favor a federation that would keep Czechoslovakia together under common institutions and international legal status. The president is confident this side would win a majority in a referendum.

Politicians from Slovakia - where only one third of the country's 15.5 million people live - favor a much looser confederation or even outright independence for their poorer, more rural republic.

Kurd official reports attack on Iraqis

ANKARA, Turkey - A Kurd official said Thursday that a Kurdish attack on Iraqi forces east of Sulaimaniya left 100 Iraqis dead, including about two dozen officers.

The report could not be independently confirmed. The official, Serhil Kazaz of the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan in Ankara, also said Iraqi tanks on Thursday were shelling the villages of Kholajo and Qara Bulah, 16 miles south of Kalar, and reinforcing units around Kifri, 120 miles southeast of Sulaimaniya.

Iranian radio also reported Thursday that Iraqi authorities have given residents of Kurdish cities two weeks to surrender their weapons. After the deadline, it said without elaborating, Iraqi troops will conduct house-to-house searches for weapons and severely punish those having guns.

Terrorists say they planted 2 bombs

PARIS - A terrorist group claimed responsibility Thursday for exploding two bombs in the French capital, one at the offices of a newsletter catering to Americans; no injuries were reported.

Police said the bombings late Wednesday and early Thursday were claimed by Gracchus Babeuf, a group that has planted several small, homemade bombs around Paris over the past two years.

Tracts left at the sites of the bombings said the explosions were carried out to protest the French and U.S. policy toward Libya.

Indonesian army plans interrogations

DILI, Indonesia - Indonesian army plans to interrogate dozens of people wounded during its bloody assault on demonstrators in East Timor last week, the military commander of the annexed region said Thursday.

The interrogation of the wounded, and about 40 other people arrested during the Nov. 12 incident, is apparently aimed at backing up assertions by the Indonesian military that its troops fired in self-defense.

Croatians flee towns turned battlefields

VUKOVAR, Yugoslavia (AP) - Hundreds of people killed in the siege of Vukovar were buried in mass graves Thursday and Yugoslav army troops were massing at a nearby town, according to news reports and diplomats.

Elsewhere in the secessionist Croatian republic, refugees fled towns turned battlefields on the Adriatic coast.

U.N. special envoy Cyrus Vance pressed his mission to try to persuade Croatia and its rival, Serbia, to agree on terms for U.N. forces to be sent to Croatia to end the bloody 4½-month-old civil war.

Vance met Thursday night with Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic, but the envoy refused to make any detailed comments.

The Yugoslav news agency Tanjug quoted Milosevic as saying: "We have made a major step toward achieving peace in the country and establishing peacekeeping forces which will protect, above all, the Serbian people in the regions, their freedom and safety."

There were no details of any plan, however, and Croatian officials made no comment. Both sides have agreed in principle to peacekeepers, but disagree on where they should be posted.

The fighting began in Croatia after the republic declared independence on June 25. Since then, Serb militiamen and the Serb-led army have seized a third of the republic's territory.

Serbia says that Serbs living in Croatia face persecution in an independent Croatia. The secessionist republic counters that Serbia is making a grab for territory as Yugoslavia disintegrates.

More than 2,000 people have died in the fighting, hundreds of them in Vukovar.

The eastern city on the Danube River fell to Serb-led forces over the weekend after a three-month siege.

Hundreds die in Somalia fighting

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) - Rival factions fired artillery and rocket launchers for a fifth day as fighting raged Thursday in Somalia's capital.

Relief workers described the situation as "appalling" and said hundreds of people have been killed.

Conflict in the land of 6.5 million mainly nomadic herders erupted over a power struggle between President Ali Mahdi Mohamed and Gen. Mohamed Farrah Aidid, chairman of the ruling United Somali Congress party.

Aidid claimed to have ousted Ali Mahdi Monday, the day after fighting began in Mogadishu. But Ali Mahdi, in a satellite telephone call Wednesday to the British Broadcasting Corp., claimed he was still in power.

The conflict is clan-based, with Aidid and Ali Mahdi representing different subgroups of the country's large, central Hawiye clan from which the party draws its strength.

Aidid, of the Habar Gedir group, long has resented Ali Mahdi, of the Abgal group, holding the presidency.

Ali Mahdi, in turn, has been trying to have Aidid removed as party chairman.

The bodies of most of those killed still lay in wrecked houses and streets this week, and were being collected on Thursday and put in huge graves dug in parks and yards, according to radio reports in Belgrade.

Persistent claims on both sides of massacres in Vukovar and elsewhere could not be confirmed. A photographer, Goran Mikic, who first reported the slaughter of Serb schoolchildren on Wednesday, said Thursday that he had not himself seen any evidence of a massacre.

The federal defense minister, Veljko Kladjevic met with commanders of the Vukovar operation and congratulated them for taking the town, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said.

Zeljko Raznatovic, commander of the chief architect of the defense of the city, Milan Dedakovic, has been detained for an investigation of allegations that he actually undermined the defenses, he built.

The former Yugoslav air force pilot was arrested outside his Zagreb home on Wednesday, his daughter Dubravka said in a telephone interview. Croatian radio said Dedakovic was charged with "leaving the battlefield and failing to report on the (military) situation."

Osijek has been under bombardment almost constantly for several months. Heavy shelling was reported there Wednesday. The city of 140,000 was reported quiet overnight but sporadic shelling resumed Thursday.

Refugees were fleeing the Zadar area on the Adriatic coast after heavy fighting there. Mate Ivkovic, 65, fled to Zagreb from the village of Skabrnja near Zadar.

"They've taken all of our villages now, there is nobody left," he said.

Croatian radio said about 2,000 people had fled villages east of Zadar after shells began hitting the area on Thursday.

EC spokeswoman Renilde Sieghe said officials had unconfirmed reports of mass killings in Skabrnja and had been denied permission by the army to visit the villages.

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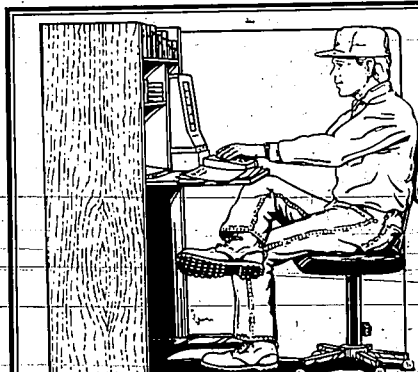

Senators want closer look at big sale

WASHINGTON — Citing concerns about the export of vital U.S. technology, 30 senators are seeking to hold up McDonnell Douglas Corp.'s agreement to sell 40 percent of its commercial airliner business to a Taiwan company.

The senators, all Democrats and led by New Mexico's Jeff Bingaman, asked the White House late Tuesday to review the deal and consider possible steps the government might take — presumably, some form of subsidy — to aid the aircraft builder.

Bush, "that this sale raises the prospect of the transfer of a tremendous amount of aerospace technology to Taiwan (and possibly other Far East equity partners) for a small fraction of the cost it has taken to develop that technology, much of which was paid for by the taxpayers of this country."

"... We have grave doubts," they added, "that this transaction would be in our national interest and would urge you to take the lead in finding a more acceptable alternative."

A government review of the transaction is expected to take no more than 75 days after McDonnell Douglas officially notifies a special review panel of its deal with the Taiwan firm. Under the preliminary agreement announced Tuesday, "Taiwan Aerospace Corp. would pay McDonnell Douglas \$2 billion to gain a 40 percent stake in a new commercial airliner company that would be the successor to Douglas Aircraft Co. in Long Beach, where all airliners currently are built. The Taiwanese gov-

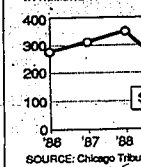

In billions of dollars; total: \$16.3 billion



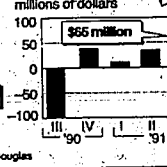
Net earnings

ernment owns 30 percent of Taiwan Aerospace.

Douglas' civilian and military business would be separated. The military side would not be involved in the deal.

The senators said the McDonnell Douglas-Taiwan agreement poses "much more severe problems" in terms of potential technology transfers than an earlier — and controversial — advanced fighter deal with Japan. In that case, the Bush administration placed restrictions on Japanese involvement in a plane jointly developed with General Dynamics Corp.

McDonnell Douglas/Chairman John McDonnell in published reports dismissed concerns over technology transfer as a "non-issue."

White House officials said they had no comment because they had not yet seen the senators' letter.

Bingaman has asked the Joint Economic Committee in Congress for public hearings on the McDonnell Douglas deal the first week of December. He also chairs the Senate Armed Services Committee's defense industry and technology subcommittee.

The company's agreement with Taiwan will be reviewed by a little-known government group known as

the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States (CFIUS).

The panel is chaired by Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady.

Under the procedures followed by other companies involved in transactions with foreign firms, McDonnell Douglas is expected to notify the committee of its agreement with Taiwan Aerospace.

The panel then has 30 days to determine whether the deal has any national security implications.

If the answer is in the affirmative, then the committee has an additional 45 days to conduct a complete investigation and, if necessary, make its recommendation to the president. Deliberations are not open to the public.

Under a new law passed by Congress and a presidential executive order signed Dec. 27, 1988, the president was given the power to overturn foreign business arrangements deemed to be a threat to national security interests.

Since the order took effect, CFIUS has been notified of 650 international transactions, but only 13 have been investigated for potential national security problems.

Of these 13 cases, nine were sent to the White House for a final review, and one deal — involving a Chinese aerospace company's takeover of a Seattle firm — was overturned.

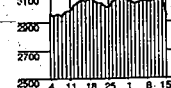
In their letter to Bush, the Democrats said the indirect government subsidies to American aerospace firms and international trade negotiations have failed to create a level playing field with foreign competitors.

The senators called for "a fundamental reassessment of the administration's trade, technology and foreign investment policies."

"Every other large industrialized nation regards its aerospace industry as a strategic industry to be nurtured by a variety of government actions," the lawmakers said.

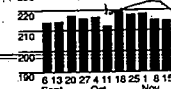
Dow Jones average

30 Industrials; daily close; 11-Monthly



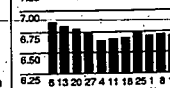
Commodity futures index

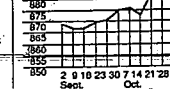

Computer firm profits drop due to plan to lower costs

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) —

Hewlett-Packard Co. on Tuesday reported a 38 percent drop in fourth-quarter profit due to special charges to cover a voluntary severance program and related consolidations — part of the company's effort to cut costs.

Without the previously announced charges, profit would have risen 12 percent, the company said.

"The charges we took this quarter had a major impact on short-term profits, but they should help get our costs in better balance for 1992," said John A. Young, HP's president and chief executive officer.

The diversified computer company reported net income of \$125 million for the period ending Oct. 31, compared with \$202 million for the same quarter of last year. Per-share earnings fell 40 percent, 50 cents compared with 83 cents. There are now about 8 million more shares

outstanding than a year ago.

Special charges amounted to about \$150 million, or 40 cents a share, covering payouts to departing employees and related consolidations and relocations. About 3,300 workers have decided to leave HP voluntarily, leaving the company with 89,000 employees.

Revenue for the quarter totaled \$3.8 billion, a 7 percent gain over revenue of \$3.6 billion for the fourth quarter of 1990. Orders also rose 7 percent, to \$3.7 billion from \$3.5 billion.

"We're satisfied with our overall operating performance and our continued progress in managing operating expenses," Young said. "This performance meets the objective we set last year of growing profit from operations faster than net revenues."

For the year, HP reported profit of \$755 million, a 2 percent gain over \$739 million in fiscal 1990.

Micron will begin shipping memory chips from Scotland

BOISE (AP) — Micron Technology Inc. will begin shipping one of its main products from the company's new Irvine, Scotland, operation.

The assembly and distribution of computer memory chips from Europe, instead of the United States, will cut tariff costs nearly in half,

said Jim Garrett, vice chairman of the Boise-based company.

Micron wants to increase its European sales and the project is its first overseas. Micron will ship finished wafers to Scotland, where the final product is assembled.

The Scottish operation will represent less than 10 percent of Micron's total sales. The net sales for the 1991 fiscal year ending on Aug. 29, were \$123.7 million.

"There's not going to be any significant impact financially," Garrett said. "It's not going to affect the employee base."

U.S. seeks to pressure North Korea on weapons

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The United States will delay withdrawals of U.S. troops from South Korea to pressure North Korea to stop making nuclear weapons, Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney announced Thursday.

The announcement underscored growing U.S. concern about Communist North Korea's nuclear capability and its refusal to allow inspection of its nuclear and reprocessing facilities.

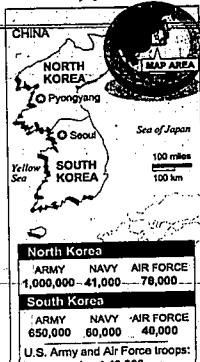
North Korea denies any nuclear weapons program, but South Korean officials say the secretive nation could manufacture weapons-grade nuclear bombs in two or three years. U.S. officials say it could be sooner.

Speaking at the end of two days of security talks with South Korea, Cheney said that troop cutbacks will be postponed "until the dangers and uncertainties of the North Korean nuclear program have been thoroughly addressed."

"We are convinced that North Korea is developing the capability to build a nuclear weapon," said Cheney, whose talks with South Korea officials focused on the North's nuclear weapons development.

He spoke at a joint news conference with his South Korean counterpart, Lee Jong-koo. Under the new troop withdrawal plan, U.S. forces will be cut from

43,000 to 36,000 by the end of 1992 as planned, but further reductions designated for 1993-1995 will be

postponed. Fewer than 10,000 troops will be affected.

North Korea, a bitter enemy of the South since the peninsula was divided in 1945, for years has demanded the withdrawal of U.S. troops. U.S. forces came to the aid of Seoul in the 1950-53 Korean War.

Cheney called on North Korea to publicly forswear the development of nuclear weapons or the ability to produce enriched or reprocessed nuclear fuel that could be used in producing such weapons. He said North Korea must also allow verification of such changes.

He and Lee said they would "pursue all available means" — except military action — to halt North Korea's nuclear weapons development program.

The said they would step up diplomatic pressure on North Korea through the United Nations and major powers, including neighboring China and Japan.

North Korea joined the Nuclear Non-proliferation Treaty in 1985 but has failed to sign a mandatory safeguards accord to open its facilities to inspections.

On Wednesday, it reportedly agreed in principle to a call to rid the Korean peninsula of nuclear weapons. But the reported accord,

in working-level talks between the two Koreas, was not binding. Cheney said that particular concern is North Korea's suspected construction of a nuclear reprocessing plant, that would give Py-

ongyang the capability to produce weapons-grade plutonium — a key ingredient in nuclear weapons.

Cheney said the plant was not needed if the objective of North Korea's nuclear development was peaceful. He said other nations have proven that reprocessing is not a necessary prerequisite to a legitimate civilian nuclear energy program.

In other developments, South Korean news reports said President Roh Tae-woo would announce during President Bush's Jan. 5-7 visit that South Korea was nuclear-free. This would indicate U.S. nuclear weapons had been removed, meeting the North's major condition for opening its own facilities to inspection.

Korean news reports also said the United States had agreed to put in South Korea 16 Patriot missiles, the ground-to-air defense systems used in the Gulf War to counter Scud missile attacks.

A high-ranking U.S. official speaking on condition of anonymity confirmed that Patriot missiles and F-17 Stealth fighters would be brought into Korea for joint U.S.-South Korean military exercises in 1992.

However, the official said the missiles and the fighters would be removed when exercises end.

U.S. decision to postpone troop withdrawals shows resolve

SEOUL, South Korea — By delaying troop withdrawals in South Korea, the United States is letting North Korea know it won't be pushed around.

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney announced Thursday that troop cutbacks scheduled between 1993 and 1995 would be delayed until the dangers and uncertainties of North Korea's nuclear weapons development are addressed.

He called on Communist North Korea to immediately and unconditionally open its nuclear facilities to international inspection and to publicly announce it will halt nuclear weapons development.

Analysis

The immediate effect of Cheney's announcement is to reaffirm Washington's resolve to end nuclear proliferation and to reaffirm its commitment to its ally in the West: South Korea.

It's a message that North Korea's hard-line Communist leadership may not immediately respond to, but is likely to understand.

It will also have wide-ranging reverberations in the Pacific region, giving Washington the chance to show leadership in a part of the world it is widely perceived to have neglected.

Cheney did not make clear whether a cut-

back of other troops in the Pacific region, which could support Korea in case of hostilities, would also be postponed. An informed U.S. official said the decision had not yet been made.

With North Korea, the United States appears determined not to repeat the mistake it made with Iraq, before the Gulf War by underestimating its potential to produce nuclear weapons.

North Korea has denied trying to build nuclear weapons, just as Iraq did.

In recent weeks, Washington and Seoul have become impatient with Pyongyang's reluctance to comply with demands to halt nuclear development. The longer the delay, the thinking goes, the more time the north gains to develop a nuclear arsenal and to build what in-

telligence reports say is a reprocessing plant for weapons-grade plutonium.

North Korea for years has demanded the withdrawal of U.S. troops. For the U.S. to pull back troops while trying to pressure the north to come clean about its nuclear capacity would be unwise, experts agree.

North Korea is unique in that it engages the interests of four of the world's powers — the United States, the Soviet Union, Japan and China. Strategically, U.S. policy has been that no single nation or coalition of nations should control or threaten the region.

Cheney said the four powers are fully supportive of a non-nuclear policy for Korea and are moving along with other nations to pressure the north.

He said the United Nations and the International Atomic Energy Agency would be asked to cooperate.

About 40,000 U.S. troops are stationed in Korea under a mutual defense pact. A plan to reduce troops to 36,000 by the end of 1992 will continue, Cheney said.

But reductions for 1993-1995 will be postponed. The number of troops affected by a 10,000-poneement are probably less than 10,000 and maybe only 5,000.

But the number is not as important here as the unspoken resolve to hold firm.

"North Korea should understand how strong our will is," said South Korean Defense Minister Lee Jong-koo.

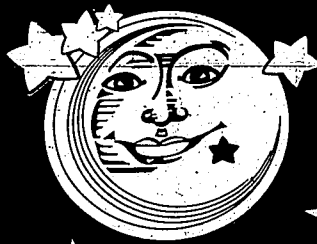

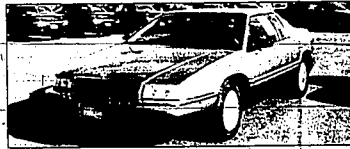

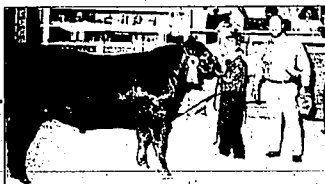

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Don't worry about avoiding temptation as you grow older, it starts avoiding you."
— The Old Farmer's Almanac.
Today's West couldn't resist the temptation of an early overruff. And for that indiscretion, he held himself to one trump trick instead of two.
East took his queen and ace of spades and then led the king, hoping to promote West's trump holding. South refused with the nine and West impulsively overruffed with his jack. West shifted to diamonds, hoping for the best, but the best had already passed him by. South won and took a successful trump finesse, and there were no more tricks for the defense.
Take a close look at that trump position: West's K-J-8—virtually guarantees two trump tricks for him if he doesn't overruff the nine with his jack. If West discards it instead of overruffing, what is South to do?
When South leads a trump, all West has to do is cover to force dummy's ace—and West remains with a winning trump tenace over whatever remains of South's trumps.
Be careful of those good trump holdings. Sometimes a refusal to overruff transforms a good trump holding into a great one.

Look past the title's deception, Weber advises, and delve into a 'serious' story

By Evan Levine

The first thing that Steven Weber wants you to know about "Deception: A Mother's Secret" (airing Sunday, Nov. 24, on NBC) is that it's better than the title might indicate. Weber, who plays a husband and father who fights for custody of his wife's young child after she is killed in a car accident, says that the title — one of many that were considered — is far "pulpier" than the story itself. The movie co-stars Mary Page Keller (ABC's "Baby Talk"), Katherine Helmond ("Who's the Boss") and Robert Gorman ("The Accidental Tourist"). As Terry Milner (Weber) tries to adopt the child, he discovers that things were even less perfect than he had thought.

"You have to titillate an audience," explains the actor, who stars as pilot Brian Hackett on the NBC comedy series "Wings." "But this story goes deeper than your average TV fare. It doesn't go for sensationalism. It's the story that matters. And the title really betrays that. I know that you have to attract an audience, but the movie really is provoking."

Weber says that starring in the movie was largely a matter of chance. "What attracted me was the fact that it was offered to me," he admits. "I don't have the luxury of being able to pick and choose and look for projects, although more and more I'm getting offered things."

Weber quickly amends that he also liked the story. "On a broad note, it was serious, in contrast to the jocular job I have of making America laugh (on "Wings")," he explains, tongue in cheek. "I was struck by the emotionality of the story. It had a real twist. It won't turn your hair white or anything, but

it does try to go deeper than other stuff. It does fall in the parameters of a TV movie, but it takes it a step further.

"As an actor, I'm looking for more opportunities to express myself," Weber says. "I liked this movie because it let me be more available to the material. I had to take things far more seriously than I normally do. And I'd definitely like to do more of those kind of roles."

"I'm fairly hard on myself," he continues. "I'm rarely happy with an entire performance. This might sound ridiculous, but I'm not a deep thinker. When I'm acting, I'm usually hung up on technical constraints. Doing one scene in the movie, there were actually real thoughts racing through my head. Imagine that," he jokes. "I wasn't just standing there. Real thoughts."

Weber says he can chart the exact

moment when he decided to become an actor. "Back in third grade," he says immediately. "We were doing 'Where the Wild Things Are,' by Maurice Sendak. I can't believe I remember all this. I was a wild thing, kind of a dragon, and I became intoxicated, especially after I began to ad lib mercilessly, and I got laughs."

Although Webber says that there's only so much he can do to stretch his abilities on "Wings," he's still pretty happy on the series. "It's a great deal for me," he says.

"It's good exposure, great money, and it offers an opportunity to do TV movies."

Returning to "Deception," Weber says, "This kind of movie falls within certain confines. But I think my favorite thing was having to take things far more seriously than I usually do."

PALO ALTO, Calif. — It lasted only a few minutes, Tom Brokaw says, but he did do it, without even hesitating: Right in the middle of a "Sunday Today" show, he changed the channel. To CNN.

"I had to get my fix," he confessed. "Then I turned it back to Today."

Somewhere, Ted Turner is smiling. Because when you can get the No. 1 news guy at NBC to switch from a show produced by his own network's news department and watch news somewhere else, it's a sign of the times.

"I've been a great admirer of CNN," Brokaw said. "It's extraordinarily useful to the random news viewer. Of course, that's a very small universe we're talking about. CNN is still only the seventh-largest cable channel, with a rating in network terms of

about 1 (roughly 10 percent the size of Nielsen news leader ABC and about one-eighth of NBC's audience). That doesn't mean there isn't a

place for it, but you can't measure everything on the same scale."

Of course, there are some who contend the business isn't big enough anymore for three full-fledged network news divisions and that one of them will eventually drop its evening news show or get out of the news business entirely.

"I think that's a possibility," Brokaw said. "But not in the foreseeable future. It's not going to happen in this decade. And it's not going to happen at NBC."

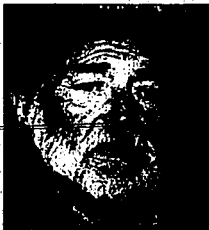

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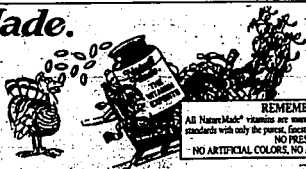
