


Christmas in City Park, Twin Falls annual outdoor Sunday afternoon-in-December, songfest, legins its four-week run today.



# Duke looking to 'keep issues alive' by challenging Bush in primaries

WASHINGTON-(AP)—Former-Ku Klux Klan leader David Duke, who—two—wekla—ago—lost the Louisiana governor grace, plans to challenge-President Bush in several 1992 Republican primaries, a "cop adviser said Saturday," "He doesn't count on winning the minimation or anything; but he wants to keep the issues alive and he wants to keep the issues alive and he wants to keep the issues alive and he wants to have some influence on the grocess," the adviser said in a telephone interview.

Duke will concentrate on a handful of Southern states, but also is considering runfing in Michigan and Maryland and hopes to raise enough money to qualify for federal matching funds, the tadviser said. Duke, 41, a Louisiand, state representative—whose term expires this year, scheduled a Monday, news conference in Washington to announce his plans. # 50 years after Pearl Harbor, we've no excuse for myopia

It-was-a-cold, hard-edged Sunday caricatures Mr. Moto, truck farmers, afternoon in the Magic Valley, the 'day laborers, short guys with Cokekind of late-autumn sabbath in which bottle glasses who bayordeed babies showers of spent autumn leaves come riding the brow of a biting southwest wind.

Here and there, Christmas wreaths had already sprouted from doors and lamppasts; but most of Twin Falls—lahoans,—like most Americans—wore-a scrubbed, threadbare-look swore we'd never forget it.

But we did, of course, Today.

There was, after all, a depression on,
and people couldn't afford much
holiday display.
Most had been to church that day,

Most had been to church that day, where perhaps they had been told to count their blessings. There were wars in Europe and Asia, and rumors of war in the Pacific, but all those places were a long way from the Magie Valley.

The economy had been on the mend for two years. Although one Idahoan in 12 was still without a job, the farmers on the Twin Falls Tract who land managed-to-ride-out-the-30s were starting to make a dent in their mortgages.

Over at the Old Times-News Building, Gus Kelker had gone to his office to prepare his Christmas cards. At about 2:30, the United Press teletype machine in the comer began clanging like a runaway trolley.

"BULLETIN: JAPANESE ATTACK HAWAII."

Kelker didn't know it, and neither did his neighbors, but their world had changed just as surely as if a Zero righter had come screaming down Main Avenue.

Gone that Sunday afternoon was the illusion that the Magic Valley was safe, separated by space and time from a world that most people who lived here had never known.

Their parents, or their grandparents, had fled such a world and thought they were free of its mean-spirited complexities in Idaho's breathaking

But we did, of course. Today, though we may own Toyotas and Sony big-screen TVs, we're no closer to-understanding Japan than we were in 1941.

in 1941.

Our misperception 50 years ago cost the Magic Valley, a region of fewer than 50,000 people at the time, 300 dead in faraway places such as Tarawa and Kasserine. Our current failure to comprehend Japan is costing us jobs; income, economic freedom and perhaps eventually our lifestyles.

A half-century ago we underestimated the Japanese to our sorrow. Now we overestimate them at

Sorrow Now we overestimate them at our peril.

In 1941, the conventional wisdom in coffee shops and bars around Twin Falls, as in the rest of country, was that-the Japanese managed to crush the U.S. Pacific Fleet only because they sneaked up on us. Now the conventional wisdom is that they requiring America's economy by conspiring to overwhelm it.

The truth is, Japan's successes and failures are pretty much like America's. Hard work, vision and sacrifice work by both sides of the International Date Ling; arrogance, corruption and jingoism are as short-sighted-in-Vokohami-as they are in-Twin Falls.

Grandma and Granddad didn't

Their parents, or their grandparents, had fied such a world and thought they were free of its mean-spirited understand that, driving their packard complexities in Idaho's breathtaking emptiness.

Japan? If those second-generation Idahoans thought of that faraway global village.

We have no such excuse.



- The Austrian nobleman who discovered SUN VALLEY — The Austrian nobleman who discovered.
Sun Yalley was an urbane, globerothing visionary and worldclass sportsman who opened the door to the development of
the American ski industry.

He was also a Nazi.

And by the time Fearl Harbor, was attacked by the Japanese
in 1941, Count Felix Schaffgotsch was back home, wearing a
Wehrmacht uniform.

Some of his countrymen, whom he recruited to teach
skiling to celebrities and other wealthy guests at Sun Valley,
went home with him.

By that time, home had become Nazi Germany, Austria ceased to exist when a fellow Austrian, Adolph Hitler, marched into the country at the head of German army in 1938.

# **Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder -Unwanted Thoughts and Behaviors**



Some suffer only obsessions, which are repeated, intrusive, unwanted thoughts that cause distress and extreme anxiety.

In an effort to reduce their anxiety, people with obsessions often develop compulsions, which are involuntary, ritualized, repetitive ac

Obsessions

The most common obsessions are uncontrollable thoughts of harming others, usually a specific person, Many others become obsessed with the fear of being contaminated from environmental sources, such as door knobs.

Some are haunted by doubt. repeatedly wondering whether they performed an act, such as turning off an appliance, locking the front door or affixing postage to a letter.

Others with this disorder may con stantly fear they could violat social norms by swearing or making inappropriate sexual advances, or ruminate on religious or philosophic issues

Compulsions

Compulsions are repeated, purpose ful, often irrational activities, intended to reduce the anxiety caused by obsessive thoughts,

One of the most common comput-sive behaviors involves cleaning.



Some people become, so provoked by the constant fear of dirt and germs, they will spend hours, cleaning themselves. They may shower for an entire, day, wash their hands until they bleed, or scrub paint froin walls in an effort to purify their environment.

Another common compulsive behavior involves repetitive checking. Por example, some people may check their appliances and doors before leaving home, drive for a short distance, become drive for a short distance, become, anxious, return home, check again; leave, return to check again.

A person may repeat this process so many times they are hours late for appointments and may even tually refuse to leave the house.

Others may repeatedly check routes they have driven to mak sure they did not hit anyone or cause an accident.

Some will-horde useless items which they repeatedly stack and coufn. They might collect anything from newspapers to empty cans to the point where rooms and hall-ways are filled. with professional help, many people have been able to lead lives unhampered by the unwanted thoughts and repetitious behavior that characterizes this disorder.

# **Walk-**

Surgery that used to involve a stay in the hospital can now be done on an outpatient basis

When many people think of sur-gery, they envision loss of control over their bodies. They think of days, even weeks, spent lying in a hospital bed. Most of all, perhaps, they fear the unknown.

But ambulatory surgery known as outpatient, walk-away, same-day or one-day surgery-has changed all that. You walk in for surgery, and a few hours later you leave, ready to recuperate at home.

Most people aren't aware of what ambulatory surgery can.do these days, says Francis E. Rosato, M.D. -chairman of the department of surgery at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia.

Cysts, skin lesions, cataracts, impacted wisdom teeth, tonsils, adenoids, bunions, corns and warts are routinely removed, for example. Dilation and curettage-removal of the tissue lining the uterus-can be done. Torn ligaments and tendons are repaired. Lungs-are-examined-and-tissue samples taken through a bronchoscope, a flexible tube that goes down the throat

"In the last decade, we've made significant strides in anesthesia that allow us to extend what can be done under local anesthesia, Dr. Rosato says. "And we have improved monitoring now so that we can keep a good watch on heart activity and blood oxygenation operations/

The growth and popularity of ambulatory\_surgery\_are\_understandable for several reasons:

A local or regional anesthetic is frequently used, which deadens the area to be operated on. The patient remains awake and retains a sense of\_control. Short-acting general anesthetics may be used to tempo rarily put a patient to sleep for more complex surgeries.

People often wonder whether they'll feel any pain with a local anesthetic. Says Dr. Rosato: "We can assure them that they will not have pain. They must appreciate that they'll still feel pressure. They may feel movement. But they even though they're awake.

## storm in the brain Epilepsy:

In America, 2 million people have epilepsy. But strides in diagnosis and treatment now allow most to lead normal, active lives.

The victim utters a sharp, sudden cry and collapses unconscious. on the ground, his body rigid. The young man's arms and legs jerk uncontrollably. Saliva bubbles at

his mouth. Minutes pass. The young man awakens—humiliated disoriented, exhausted.

This is the indelible image of epilepsy that most people carry. It is a hauntingly correct image-but only of a single form of epilepsy,

the grand mal attack.

All told, epilepsy has more than

30 different forms, each with a unique set of symptoms that can range from the classic, convulsive seizures of a grand mal attack to blank staring.

Fifteen-year-old Lisa, for in stance, has suffered from "absence seizures since early childhood. When Lisa experiences a seizure, she merely stares vacantly and suf-fers a brief break in consciousness. In her own words, she is "out of it." In seconds, however, the seizure

passes, and she can resume normal activity—until the next attack.

On any given day, Lisa will suffer several hundred such episodes.

In centuries past, these bizarre behaviors were often blamed on demons. And "treatment" in-cluded boring holes into the heads of yictims to let the evil spirits

But today, scientists know that epilepsy in all its forms stems from disturbed nerve-cell activity in the brain.

Instead of firing discrete, minibursts of electricity, nerve cells in the brain generate a storm of electrical impulses with machine-gun rapidity. A normal nerve cell sends out electrical impulses up to 80 times a second. But an epileptic nerve-cell-can-fire at-rates of 500 times every second, triggering the seizures of epilepsy

Roughly I percent of America's

population-or 2 million individuals—suffer from the condition. After stroke, epilepsy is the second most common neurological disor-der in the United States.

. High fever, pregnancy, diabe tes and withdrawal from drugs can all bring on isolated seizures that are not related to epilepsy. In fact, roughly one in 10 people will experience a random, non-epileptic seizure at some point in his life.

"What makes epilepsy a unique disorder is that seizures usually recur without a trigger," says Ann Scherer, director of information and education for the Epilepsy Foundation of America.

The disorder can be brought on by literally hundreds of different causes. Any severe blow to the head; for example, can potentially damage the brain's delicate electrical system and result in epilepsy. Injury to an infant's brain during a difficult delivery can also trigger the disorder. And so can lead poisoning, brain tumors, stroke and severe infections, such as meningitis.

Where and to what extent the bmin is damaged helps determine just what kind of a seizure an individual with epilepsy will

Grand mal-also called generalized tonic-clonic-seizures and absence seizures are among the most common. But the following types of seizures are also widespread:

Simple partial seizure. The victim experiences intense jerk-

arm, a leg, his face. Though he may suffer mild hallucinations, he remains conscious.

Complex partial seizure. An individual slips into a trancelike state and then moves about aimlessly, chewing his lips or fidgeting with his clothes. He appears drunk: drugged or confuser

Atonic seizures or drop attacks.-The sufferer suddenly-loses consciousness and falls to the floor. Within seconds, however, he can stand and walk.

Today's advances in technology have allowed physicians to map the landscape of the brain and bring the diagnosis of epilepsy to a new level of precision.

For instance, a CT scan-a computerized x-ray image of the brain-may reveal a culprit cyst ortumorthat is triggering seizures Magnetic resonance imaginganother tool for looking inside the human-body—can also help pin-point precisely which sections of a person's brain sputter with the disturbed electrical shythms of

At the same time, a diagnostic coupling of the familiar EEG machine and a television camera is helping people whose seizures are difficult to classify. While electrodes placed on the head track any telltale disruptions in the patterns of brain waves, a video camera captures all seizure antivity over the course of a day. The result: the increasingly accurate diagnosis of once-baffling symptoms.

Such diagnostic strides are crucial. Anticonvulsant drugs are the primary treatment for epilepsy, and the 16 different anticonvulsant drugs now marketed in the United States are prescribed according to the type of seizure.

For the most part, anticonvul-sants work exceedingly well." Roughly half of all people treated with drugs completely control their seizures. And still another 30 percent report a sharp drop in attacks once treatment begins. "What this means is that the vast

"Obviously, if the part of the brain in question controls speech, memory or another important behavior, a surgeon will be reluctant to operate," says Roger J. Porter, M.D., deputy director of the Na-tional Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke.

Despite advances, much mystery still cloaks epilepsy. In half of all cases, for example, even the cause of the disorder eludes physicians

But as all individuals with epilepsy invariably discover, the conition is not merely a medical problem with clean-cut parameters; it is a complex social problem as

# Research explodes 6 myths of aging

They call themselves "the original mythbusters." They're conducting research on the largest-group of

Americans ever to participate in a long-term study of human aging. They say notions of oldness-that generate negative stereotypes are myths.

They're from the Baltimore Longitudinal-Study-of-Aging (BLSA) headquartered in Maryand. They've been doing this for 30 years.

The study has shown that aging is a highly complex process with tremendous variation among individuals. Researchers say they can declare that various changes may occur with age, or are likely to occur, but they are unable to predict with certainty that changes will occur. Some older men, for instance, have physical or mental abilities comparable to average younger men.

Both lifestyle and heredity can play a part in how well we age Changes that occur with aging are usually gradual; any sudden or unusual change is likely to be as-sociated with disease, but aging itself is not a disease.

Organized in the late 1950s

under the auspices of the former gerontology branch of the U.S. Public Health Service, the BLSA has operated since 1975 as part of the National Institute on Aging. Women first entered the testing program in 1978. Of 1,800 men and women who

have participated in the study, about 1,000 unpaid volunteers are currently active. They spend 2/2 days every two years at the testing center in Baltimore. More than tor the full range of each participant's physical and mental abilities, including appraisals of heart and lung function, bone status, nutrition; the senses and personality.

One has only to look at fitness guru Jack LaLanne to shatter this premise. Recent studies have shown that even nursing-home residents can increase muscle strength with regular exercise. According to the NIA, the fact that, muscle mass decreases with age is less important than the fact that one can increase muscle mass with exercise despite age. Waning strength and flexibility can be deferred with a regular exercise



program. And progressive musclestrengthening exercises can help restore lost function.

Myth #2: Lung power declines with age.

Normal lungs will serve us well into late life, the NIA says-Studies of men show that loss of lung function does occur-with age, about I percent per year. Breathing capacity is decreased due to loss of elasticity in the joints of the rib cage and in the lung tissue itself, as well as in weakened

Exercise can improve heart and lung function, staving off normal age-related changes by as much as single most effective measure one can take to maintain healthy lungs is to avoid breathing smoke. Specifically, never start smoking. If you do smoke, quit-even if you're an older person.

Myth #3: Old hearts don't

function as well as young hearts. The BLSA has found, through careful screening, that the cardino output of older, disease-free hearts is comparable to that of younger people: Although the older heart is unable to increase its pumping rate during exercise as much as a younger heart, it appears to compensate by delivering more blood per heartbeat, According to scientists at the NIA laboratory of cardiovascular science, the healthy, exercising older heart increases its output somewhat differently from



the younger heart-but just as

ficiently.

One obvious fact has emerged from the research: Cardiovasc fitness in old age is affected, at least in part, by good health habits established early in life.

Myth #6: Senility and mental incompetence await us as we age.

Unless an individual is afflicted with an irreversible case of mental impairment, such as Alzheimer's disease, what appears to be senility or dementia may be caused by something far different. As many as 100 reversible conditions can mimic these disorders, including minor head injury, high fever, poor nutrition and adverse drug reac-tions, which may respond to

The phrase "use it or lose it" applies to mental capabilities, says the NIA. As people age, they slow down a little and are more likely to be forgetful, but in general they remain as intelligent as

More than one-fourth of subjects tested in the BLSA over a six-year period showed no decline in memory function after age 70,



and some individuals continued to perform well in cognitive ability. as they moved into their 80s.

Studies show that until age 70, the average person experiences little or no decline in the ability to logically solve problems. An older person may compensate for some forgetfulness by drawing on a reservoir of experience.

People are more likely to retain mental function if they engage in mentally stimulating hobbies, remain socially active and maintain a positive and flexible attitude.

The healthy human spirit has the ability to accept and compensate for age-associated shortcomings, says psychologist Paul A. Costa Jr., Ph.D., chief of the NIA laboratory of personality and cognition.



Scene I. A couple of generations ago, doctors could do little more for people who survived heart attacks than advise them to take it easy, prescribe a few timeworn drugs and hope that damaged heart muscle would soon mend itself.

Eventually, new equipment and drugs allowed doctors to pluck more and more heart-attack victims back from the aws of death. Defibrillators delivered electric jolts that shocked wildly beating hearts back into normal patterns. Monitoring devices helped nurses keep careful watch over patients in CCU, the hospital's coronary (or cardiac) care

Coronary bypass surgery used a blood vessel, typically a prescription: He coupled a low-fat diet with vein from the leg, to reroute blood flow-around clogged coronary arteries, which supply oxygen and nutrients to the heart muscle. Angioplasty introduced a small balloon into blocked arteries through a catheter, then inflated the balloon to press artery-clogging material flat against vessel walls and free blood passage. Perhaps the most dramatic advances were heart and heart-lung transplants.

#### Act 3-The experiment

Scene 1: Diet. The experimental diet derived only 10 percent of its calories from fat—a full 20 percent less than the control group and nearly 30 percent less than the typical-American diet. The only animal products allowed were one cup daily of non-fat milk or yogurt, and egg whites, which are cholesterol-free.

The control group received standard medical care, which included the diet recommended by the American Heart Association. This diet allowed consumption of dairy prodicts, small amounts of red meat, and fish and chicken. While the experimental group received only-5 milligrams daily of cholesterol, the controls could have 200 to 300.

Fruits; vegetables, grains and beans composed most of the experimental diet, which concentrated on limiting fat calories rather than total calories. And although the diet contained adequate vitamins and minerals as designed. cople in the study group consumed a vitar

supplement to ensure safety.

The experimental menu ranged from oaumeal, skim milk, grapefruit and herbal tea for breakfast to whole-grain breads, brown rice and pea salads, vegetable soups and pasta for lunch and dinner. This diet and lifestyle program is available in Dr. Dean Ornish's Program for Reversing Heart Disease (Random House, New York, 1990, \$24.95).

"Some people consider it a radical diet," Dr. Omish says. "But it is the way most of the world eats." Japanese, who consume very low-fat diets in Japan, have low rates of heart disease. But when the Japanese move to the United-States and begin consuming a high-fat diet, their heartdisease rates increase.

Scene 2. Stress management. The study subjects learned stress management in the form of yoga techniques—stretch-ing, breathing and relaxation—as well as meditation. Other esearchers had already demonstrated that emotional stress could adversely affect the heart and circulatory system. In addition to learning relaxation. Dr. Omish's experimental patients were also able to "de-stress" through support groups he and his colleagues led.

Scene 3. Exercise. The final component of the study was moderate exercise, which had been shown to lower heartdisease risks in several studies. Patients in Dr. Omish's program were asked to walk about 30 minutes a day to ensure the benefits of exercise without the health risks that

In his own medical practice, Dr. Ornish still prescribes drugs for people who do not wish to follow his comprehensive lifestyle program.

"Cholesterol is very important, but it is not the wholestory," Dr. Ornish emphasizes. "Neither is blood pressure... neither is lack of exercise, neither is stress." The most effective regimen, he believes, is one that takes aim against

The system is comprised of more than 125 computers networked together with Meditech, the nation's largest hospital information system vendor, to provide instantaneous access to patient information for obysicians, nursing personnel and the support staff.

In addition to the access made possible by these 125 computers,

MVRMC has recently installed 1 nals throughout the hospital with access to Meditech. Physicians practicing at MVRMG will have access from their homes or offices to their patients' information, giving them the ability to res more quickly to changes in their patients' conditions.

Six-months ago, the computer system at the hospital had 27 terminals with access to only the pa-tient financial information. Now our new system allows 210 hospi-tal personnel and physicians potential access to not only the financial data on patients, but also the best possible health care ser there are another 85 color termi- the clinical information about each vices available.

mient Despite the larger number of personnel having access, security-and-patient-information confidentiality are enhanced with the new system, ensuring that only MVRMC personnel with a need for patient information will be al-

If you own stock which is paying you low-dividends. maybe 3 percent to 4 percent or less, a "life-income", gift may be an appropriate year-end gift. You could transfer the stock to us and establish a charitable remainder unitrust or charitable remainder annualty trust that would provide you with a 5 percent or greater annual ret ome would be paid to you and/or a loved one for life, fter which the assets would be distributed outright; to us. Through such an arrangement, you would be increasing your income and making a meaning-ful (and tax-deductible) contri-

bution to us at the same time.

EXAMPLE: Suppose Mrs.

Jones 70, purchased some stock
many years ago for \$10,000 and that stock is now worth \$100,000, But she receives only \$3,000 per year in dividends or a 3 percent yield. By trans ferring the stock to a charitable der unitrust and specicent return for life; she could: Mincresse her annual income by 100 percent the first year (from \$3,000 to \$6,000).

REAL ESTATE GIFTS A gift of real estate can also be tax-wise at year end. A resi-dence, vacation home, farm, acreage or vacant lot may have so appreciated in value through the years that its sale would mean a sizeable capital gains tax. By making a gift of this property instead, you would avoid the capital gains tax; and, at the same time, receive a char table deduction for the full fair-

market value of the property.

It is also possible to make a gift of your home, farm or va-cation home, so that you and your spouse can continue to use. it for your lifetimes.

EXAMPLE: Mr. and Mrs. Smith own a vacation home in mountains that they would like to continue using its fair-market value is \$100,000. By contributing the home to us now but retaining the exclusive right to use it for the rest of their lifetimes, the Smiths are able to achieve a current income tax-charitable contribution deduction of some \$25,000. (The pre-cise amount will depend upon their ages, the useful life of the house and other factors.)
