Bush to express regrets to internees

WASHINGTON — President Bush is expected to express regrets at Pearl Harbor this weekend for the U.S. internment of Americans of Japanese ancestry during World War II, White House officials said Thursday.

In speeches to mark the 50th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Bush will also "relive his own World War II experiences while talking about the current state of U.S.-Japanese relations," said the

officials, speaking on the condition of anonymity.

Bush has said he will not apologize for the atomic bombs the United States dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki to end the war.

But apologizing for the internment of 120,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry, mostly in camps in California and other Western states including the Minidoka

Relocation Center east of Jerome, is another matter, said one official.

In his remarks at Pearl Harbor, Bush will say "the whole thing is something that offends our own principles of justice and it won't happen again," the official said.

The government has made \$1.25 billion in financial restitution to survivors of the camps after a 1988 finding that the government violated their civil rights.

Japanese citizens living in Hawaii who were also rounded up and put in camps will be included in the president's expression of

regrets, the official said.

The issue of whether Japan should apologize to the United States for the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor won't be addressed by the president, the sources said.

Japanese Foreign Minister Michio Watanabe earlier this week expressed "deep remorse" over the suffering Japan inflicted by its "reckless" decision to start the war.

A resolution, expressing regret for Japan's World War II aggression was also

Teachers at Buhl OK strike vote

BUHL — Buhl teachers are one step closer to a strike.

Members of the Buhl Education Association voted overwhelmingly late Thursday night to authorize the group's head to hold a vote on whether to strike.

No date was set for the vote, and the district's 65 teachers are hoping to resolve differences with the School Board.

"A strike authorization delivers a message of conviction," said BEA president Sue Melanson in a speech to teachers Thursday. "If a vote is taken this evening, I will vote in favor of a strike authorization."

However, Melanson said the board could still prevent a strike.

"All they have to do is accept the fact-finding report," she said.

Melanson added she has requested a meeting with the board Monday night hoping to end the stalemate.

Superintendent Eugene Pyles said the decision of whether the district would make further concessions with the teachers was in the hands of the board.

"The board and myself were hopeful that the teachers would consider their offer which we felt was very fair," said Pyles said. "We're hopeful there won't be a strike."

Negotiations broke off Tuesday after a 14-hour meeting. The board has no recommendations to a three-member fact-finding committee on a new contract.

Board members requested the panel, but then rejected part of its findings even though teachers had to compromise more than the district did, Melanson said.

The association voted last August to work without a contract while the panel met.

A resolution passed out to teachers Thursday stated the board has continued to display an attitude of disrespect for its professional staff.

"It is apparent six months after the start of our contract, the board has unduly prolonged and delayed the process of negotiations," the resolution said.

The only area where the two sides have agreed was to accept the fact-finding panel's recommendation to raise teachers' base salary 1.85 percent to \$17,215.

Melanson said she would like to see the budget if the district qualifies for money set aside for unanticipated statewide enrollment increases.

The district proposed a distribution formula that would come into operation only if the district ended its fiscal year with a balance more than 5 percent over general fund expenditures.

Pyles said the district's offer includes a 13.4 percent increase in the amount in premiums it pays for Blue Cross medical and dental insurance.

Anderson spends day with daughter, receives doctors' OK after checkup

WIESBADEN, Germany — Terry Anderson, free at last after 2,455 days of captivity, Thursday spent his first day with his 6-year-old daughter, ate and did as he pleased, and was pronounced remarkably free of physical trauma from his ordeal in Lebanon.

Anderson, the chief Middle East correspondent of the Associated Press and the last American to be released by Shiite Muslim kidnapers, stood with fellow ex-captives Allan Stein and Joseph Cleipio on the balcony of the U.S. Air Force medical center here, all smiling broadly.

"It was a day for gratitude and public joy as the former hostages met one another, families and were greeted by colleagues and hospital workers," Anderson fairly

pegged toward his "incredible sister" Peggy Say — who worked relentlessly to keep her brother in the public eye — as he approached the hospital steps on arrival Thursday morning. They stood between a military helicopter and a crowd of well-wishers, hugging and saying only a few whispered words.

"What can I say?" the 44-year-old reporter shouted to his colleagues. "It's just great. It's been so long."

"Longest field," said one banner hanging from the hospital balcony. "Least forgotten," said another.

"To be able to sit there with three families who have worked so much together, who are so close, and actually have them watch the final one walk in was really, really a special moment," said Virginia Stein, wife of Allan Stein. But

mostly this was a private day, a time to hold children and rediscover relatives. The Steens said they woke at 3:30 a.m. and tore open the pack of Hydrox cookies — his favorites — that Virginia had brought her husband. They sat in bed, downing cookies and milk.

Anderson slept a bit and spent hours going through a battery of physical and psychological evaluations — perhaps the last time the Wiesbaden facility will be used for hostage repatriation before it is shut down next year.

A military statement Thursday night said Anderson is suffering from an easily treatable sinus infection and a mild lung inflammation that is also expected to be cured quickly. Otherwise, doctors said, the reporter requires care only for dental problems and for a knee injury.

Symms, Stallings agree INEL may face changes

IDAHO FALLS — Republican Sen. Steve Symms and Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings predict that substantial cuts in federal defense spending could mean the end of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

In eastern Idaho, Symms, who is retiring from the Senate next year, said reductions in the Pentagon budget could mean the Navy will decide not to rent the chemical processing plant at INEL and instead spend hundreds of millions of dollars now allocated to reprocessing its spent nuclear fuel on developing new submarines.

And Stallings, who is campaigning for Symms' seat, said Thursday he is hearing the same things.

The fuel reprocessing operation, with an annual budget of \$350 million and over 1,700 employees, has been shut down for the past two years to correct environmental problems.

"With the entire defense establishment feeling the impact of the reassessment in spending priorities, Symms said the Navy is facing some difficult choices.

"People who are responsible for a thing of wonder, the Navy, they say we have enough enriched fuel to run our fleet on, what we'd rather do is take our money — and plan a prototype of an engine for the next level of submarines," Symms said.

Tax cut plan likely in '92

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration pledged Thursday to work with Congress early next year on a tax reduction to spur the economy but rejected a Democratic idea regarding the rich to finance a cut for middle-income families.

"We must adopt measures that create jobs and stimulate savings and investment," Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady told a politically tinged hearing before the House Ways and Means Committee. But he emphasized that formula will not accommodate a tax increase on anybody — or any action that would force up interest rates.

At a news conference, President Bush declined to say what his tax plan will contain, beyond the capital-gains tax

reduction he prizes. But he promised he would not allow the plan to languish in Congress like the capital-gains cut has done for three years.

"We want to — get a package which I will take directly to the American people, over the heads of the subcommittees in Congress and say, 'Please help us get this passed,'" Bush said.

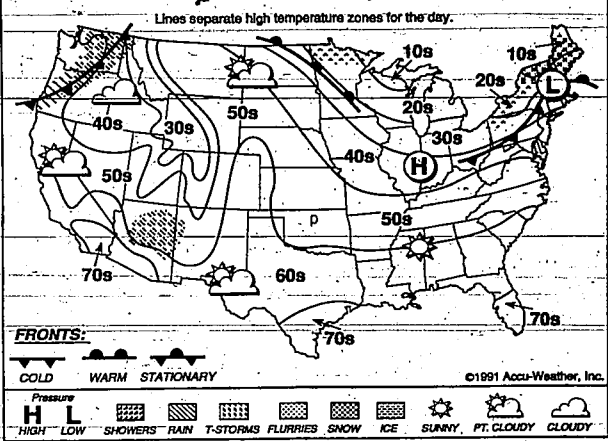
Bush, responding to a question, said he thinks middle-income people, like all Americans, deserve a tax cut. But he cautioned that any plan must be economically sound and not set off a new round of interest-rate increases.

Democratic leaders have fought Bush on the capital-gains tax, which applies to profits from the sale of investments, on grounds most of the tax cut would go to the wealthy.

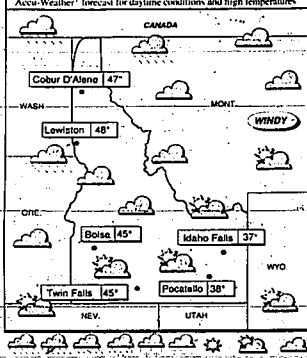

Gold seekers inundate mall after taking spoof seriously

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Hundreds of people converged on a swank shopping mall hoping to stake a claim to what turned out to be fool's gold — a Mother Lode of ore that a newspaper said lay beneath the shopping center.

The suburban gold rush was set off by the cover story in The New Times, a free weekly tabloid whose editor said he was shocked to hear anybody took the spoof seriously.

About 250 to 300 people showed up at the Scottsdale Galleria Wednesday morning hoping to stake claims, said Sgt. Tony Markos, spokesman for the Scottsdale police department. A strike appeared Thursday, said Audrey Wims, manager of The Coffee Beanery Ltd., where where the spurious strike was made.

"We had no idea that was even being printed," said Wims, whose store actually sits atop a two-story parking garage. "It's completely fabricated obviously from someone who is a very bored individual."

Amram Kulkhinsky, a partner in the glitzy mall, said he'd been bargained with calls and had to add extra security.

"I talked to one man who said he realized it was too good to be true, but was hesitant to pass it by," said the angry businessman. "This is a prank for All Fool's Day, not for December."

Twenty to 30 people spent the night outside the mall hoping to be first to stake claims among businesses like Amici's Italian clothing, the Art Circle Gallery and TGIFridays, Markos said.

The state Bureau of Mines also reported a deluge of phone calls.

Markos said most of the prospectors — per the New Times instructions — had cut out a little sheet from the paper, colored it red and pinned it to their stoves as the Bureau of Mines personnel could distinguish them from shoppers and mall employees.

The spoof documented the fabulous luck of the fictitious Sergio Reynaldo Alonzo, an illegal alien, who discovered the Mother Lode while fixing some floor tile at the coffee shop.

Photos showed Alonzo posing with a palm-sized nugget before being deported by immigration officials, and leaving the gold to go up for grabs. Other photos showed a supposed gold expert pointing to an elaborate staircase over a vein of gold — rich — it would make — Nevada's — legendary Comstock Lode look like very small potatoes.

New Times' editor, David Bodney, said Thursday he and his staff were shocked the article was taken seriously.

"In our wildest dreams we never imagined that many people would get so giddy for gold," Bodney said. "It was intended to be humorous piece but economic times are and how desperate many Arizonans have become."

The editor said the story's byline, Manfred Bury, was a pseudonym, but refused to identify the author or authors.

Tears flow as accuser testifies

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — William Kennedy Smith's accuser shook her finger at him in court Thursday and said she told police he raped her because, "I don't want to be responsible for him doing it to someone else."

The remark, which came in response to a prosecutor's question, drew an objection from the defense and Circuit Judge Mary Lupo then ordered jurors to disregard it.

The dramatic statement came near the end of a grueling day in which the woman wept uncontrollably at times during nearly five hours of cross-examination that featured questions about intimate sexual details.

Under redirect testimony by prosecutor Moira Lasch, the woman complained about public notoriety surrounding the case and about Smith calling her a liar in the media.

"Everybody in the world knows what happened to me," she cried. "How am I going to let my daughter grow up?"

She said she had feared calling the police after the Easter Weekend encounter because of the Kennedy family power. Asked why she went ahead and accused Smith of rape, she turned to look at the jury, but waved her finger in the direction of Smith.

"What he did to me was wrong," she said. "I don't want to live the rest of my life in fear of that man and I don't want to be responsible for him doing it to someone else."

Near the end of the day, Black said Smith hadn't called her a liar but did call the charges "damnable lies."

"Didn't he say the charge of rape was a damnable lie?" Black asked.

"I'm the person he raped," the woman snipped. "Isn't it a fact he lied to me because it wasn't true?" asked Black.

The woman glared at Black and said hotly: "Your client raped me!"

The answer ended two emotionally riveting days of testimony that captured the attention of TV viewers worldwide.

She had spent nearly 10 hours on the stand repeating her detailed story of Smith's alleged Jekyll-and-Hyde transformation from a gentleman to a rapist pursuing her across the lawn of the Kennedy estate under a full moon.

As he left the courthouse, Smith was asked if he thought the woman had convinced the jury.

"We'll find out," he said.

The woman sobbed so hard at various times on Thursday that recesses were ordered in the proceedings.

Black suggested she had encouraged sex-by-taking-off her panty hose in front of Smith. She adamantly denied it, saying she didn't know where or when the panty hose came off.

Ms. Lasch retrieved the tattered panty hose from an evidence envelope and held them up to the witness, who uttered a high-pitched gasp.

"Do you know how your panty hose got all these rips?" asked Ms. Lasch.

"No," the woman said, breaking into tears.

The woman had been composed until Black sought sexual details of her encounter with Smith.

before Japan's parliament but officials said it might not be ready for Saturday's Pearl Harbor observances.

Bush will give three separate speeches Sunday, the first at the National Cemetery of the Pacific to an expected 4,000 Pearl Harbor survivors and their families, the second at the U.S. Arizona Memorial and the third to a large pier-side gathering of World War II veterans.

"We go to Pearl Harbor with the view of commemorating the bravery and the loyalty and the dedication of American forces at that point in history," said presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater. "But we look to the future of Japan as one of intense friendship and competition. And we will continue to try to improve these relationships."

Bush, a World War II pilot, was shot down in the Pacific by Japanese gunners during a bombing run.

Sources said Bush's first speech, at the cemetery, would be a broad address looking back at the war, the one at the memorial over the water, Arizona would focus on Bush's personal experiences and views of the war, and the final speech at the pier would be forward-looking, including comments on future U.S.-Japanese ties.

Bush will mention regrets at the interment of Japanese-Americans in at least two of the three speeches, sources said.

The sources said the speeches were being carefully developed so as not to offend Japanese sensibilities. At the same time, one official said, Bush did not want to appear to be too solicitous to the Japanese because "there are a lot of these vets who still have bitter memories about Japan."

President Bush names White House, campaign aides

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush named a team of trusted advisers to lead the White House and his re-election campaign Thursday.

He also boasted he could win a second term even if the battered economy remains in a slump.

With polls showing him with the lowest approval ratings of his presidency, Bush said that "when the economy goes down, a president takes the hit." Yet, he said, "This economy is not going to stay down forever."

Trying to steady his administration after a series of embarrassing mistakes, Bush appointed Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner, a skilled trouble shooter, to replace John Sununu, whose abrasive style had alienated many Republicans.

The president presented his new team at a news conference where he also announced he was speeding up \$9.8 billion in various government payments and benefits as a "shot in the arm" to spur the economy.

On a separate foreign policy question, Bush said that even though all American hostages had been freed in Lebanon, "I don't consider the chapter closed."

He called for the return of the remains of William Buckley and Lt. Col. William Higgins, two Americans believed killed in captivity, and said

Some conservatives complained that Bush's team was composed exclusively of pragmatists who will be too prone to compromise.

"He has appointed some clones of himself, some very non-threatening country-club Republicans that are not conservatives," said Richard Viguerie, a leader of the right. "These are people conservatives don't know, and they don't know conservatives." Skinner, 51, has earned a reputation as a top trouble shooter for the administration. A skilled manager with good relations on Capitol Hill, Skinner was the government's point man in the Exxon Valdez oil spill and the San Francisco earthquake and helped nail down a compromise with Congress on a \$151 billion transportation bill.

Skinner and Sununu stood side by side as Bush announced his new chief of staff.

Bush said Skinner would be "a firm right hand at the time when the nation's economy presents a difficult challenge."

Although he made clear that he is running, Bush said he will not make a formal announcement of his campaign until January, presumably after

the State of the Union address late in the month.

Bush said he would use that address to unveil new initiatives to spur economic growth.

He said the Democratic-controlled Congress has ignored his economic proposals for "three years and promised to take his new proposals directly to voters 'over the heads' of Congress. He said he will ask Americans, "Please support us in helping this economy."

The Arabs jointly requested a new starting time as a way of avoiding an appearance of giving in to Israel, which boycotted the talks this week and notified the State Department it would send negotiators here to talk on Monday.

U.S., Kuwait plan military exercise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Parachute assault troops from the United States and Kuwait will conduct a five-day exercise beginning next week in Kuwait, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The exercise, dubbed "Iris Gold," is being held as part of the U.S.-Kuwait defense cooperation agreement signed in the wake of the Gulf War against Iraq.

The maneuvers will focus on combined general military combat training between the Kuwaiti armed forces and the U.S. Special Operations Command Central, the Pentagon said in a statement.

Special Operations forces refer to the Army's Green Berets or Navy SEALs.

About 900 soldiers, sailors and airmen from the U.S. Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force will participate, the statement said.

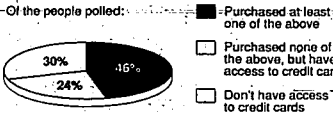
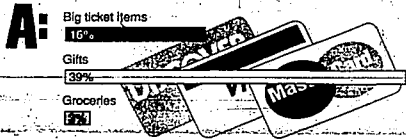

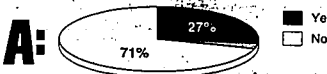
Q: This year, have you used credit cards for...

NEW YORK (AP) — The Christmas shopping season that began with a whimper last week won't end with a big credit bill for most Americans, an Associated Press poll indicates.

Two in five said they plan to spend less money on gifts this Christmas compared with the last few years. And 71 percent said they do not expect to use credit.

Only 27 percent said they expect to use store credit, a bank card, loans or extended payments to help pay for presents. Yet 39 percent of all respondents, and 55 percent of those with credit cards, said they used credit cards for gifts sometime this year.

The poll was taken Nov. 26-Dec. 1, which includes the long Thanksgiving weekend that retailers rely on to kick off their most crucial selling season.

ICR Survey Research Group of Media, Pa., interviewed 1,003 adults by phone. The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 3 percentage points, and slightly larger for subgroups, such as the 70 percent who say they have credit cards in their household.

Of those with credit cards, only a third expect to use them for holiday gifts. Through comparable figures are not available for prior years, this finding confirms what economists have described as widespread nervousness about taking on new debt.

"This Christmas is not going to be very jolly. It's a bare-bones, tight-fisted, short-list Christmas," said Donald Ratajezak, director of the Economic Forecasting Center at Georgia State University.

Retailers who wish to sound cautiously optimistic note that this year's sales are marginally better

than last year's, which were terrible. And bargain hunters may not be able to resist heavily promoted discounts.

"I anticipate there's some slippage between what you say you're going to do and what happens when you walk into a store and see something you just have to have for your loved one," said Jack Schultz, president of the National Retail Federation, a trade group.

Only 7 percent said they would spend more money on gifts this Christmas season than the past few years. Three years ago, toward the end of the long '80s boom, an AP poll found 21 percent planning to spend more money, 23 percent planning to spend less.

In another sign of weak consumer confidence, 16 percent said they had used credit cards this year to buy big-ticket household items like furniture, a refrigerator, stove or television. Economists say these discretionary purchases of durable goods are crucial in the short-run for economic recovery.

The current poll indicated caution about holiday spending is related more to fears about the future than immediate distress.

Only a few respondents said they had fallen back on credit cards to cover grocery bills. And there was no sign that those with credit cards were more anxious about debts than those who get by without plastic.

Overall, 72 percent said they were comfortable with their ability to pay the bills they currently owe. The 27 percent who said they were uncomfortable fell disproportionately in the lower-income categories.

"Most people right now don't feel they're in trouble but they sense that they could get into trouble," Ratajezak said.

Friends and relatives of his victims expressed relief and bitterness.

"I think that it's a shame that it's taken this long for him to leave this Earth," said Betty to Pervis, sister of victim Patricia Ann Matusek.

"Judgment Day has finally arrived for that sucker," said retired police officer Jack Wallenda, one of the first on the murder scene.

"And he died an easy death... he should have suffered a lot more than he did."

Mrs. Pervis said she was happy that she will no longer have to attend periodic parole hearings for Speck.

Speck was pronounced dead, one day shy of his 50th birthday, at Silver Cross Hospital, near the Stateville Correctional Center where he had been held for nearly 24 years, Corrections Department spokesman Nic Howell said.

Will County Coroner Duane Krieger said autopsy results were not immediately available, but noted that Speck had suffered chest pains Wednesday night.

The then-24-year-old, tattooed driver apparently suffered a heart attack after his arrest for the July 14, 1966, killings at a Chicago nurses' residence. He was in guarded condition for several days after police confronted him in his hospital room with the only survivor, nurse Conazon Amurap.

Scientist: Anti-abortionists hinder research

WASHINGTON (AP) — The French scientist who developed the abortion pill RU486 said Thursday the anti-abortion movement is severely hindering medical research on other uses of the drug in the United States.

"The real problem is the political atmosphere," Dr. Etienne-Emile Baulieu—a Paris-based researcher and consultant for Roussel-Uclaf, maker of RU486, told members of a congressional subcommittee.

One result, he said, is the company's decision to choose Canada as the site of a large-scale study to test the effect of the drug on breast cancer. That study is expected to begin next year.

Researchers in the United States have wanted to study the drug not only as an abortion pill, but also as a possible therapy for breast cancer, Cushing's syndrome and other diseases. However, because of the abortion conflict, they have been unable to persuade the company to supply them with the drug.

"In a pluralistic and democratic society there is no reason to preclude a product of modern research from being freely available, and practically it is discrimination against women not to make it available," Baulieu said in testimony submitted to the House Small Business subcommittee on regulation.

Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., subcommittee chair-

man, said the drug's opponents in the Bush administration, Congress and elsewhere "have a lot to answer for."

"They have helped spike lifesaving medical research for Americans in order to service their own political ends," he said.

RU486 has been used by about 100,000 women worldwide, most of them in France where the drug was approved four years ago. It was approved earlier this year in Great Britain.

The drug, an antiprogesterin, blocks the gestation process at an early stage, preventing an embryo from attaching to the uterine wall. It can be taken up to nine weeks after conception.

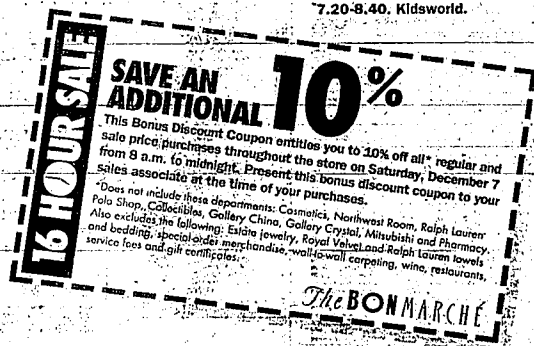

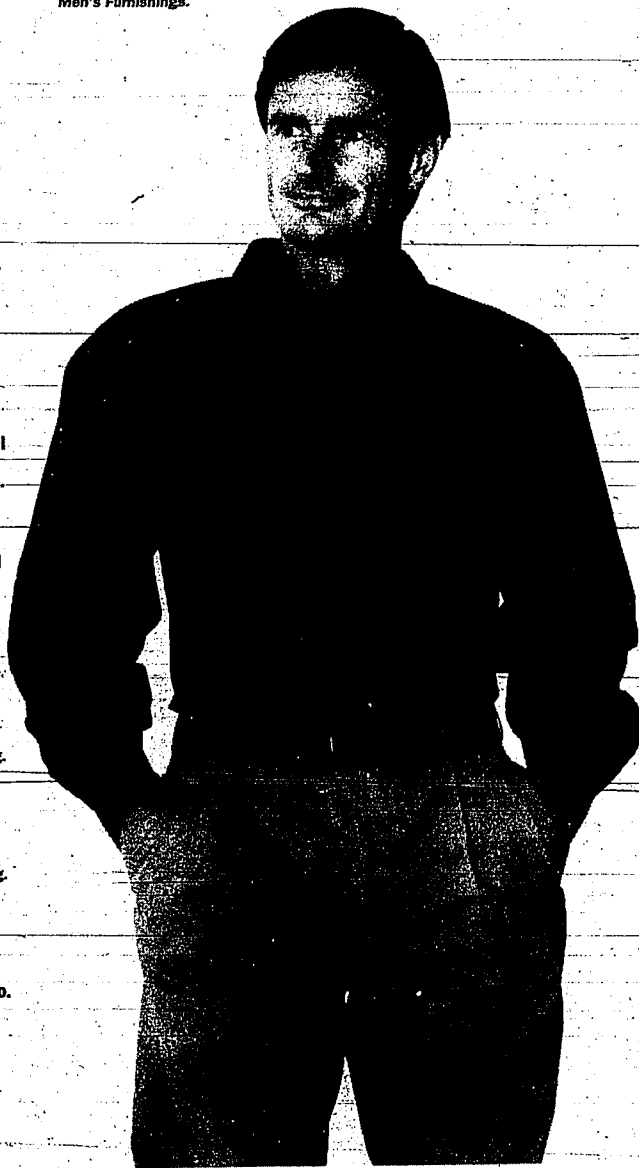

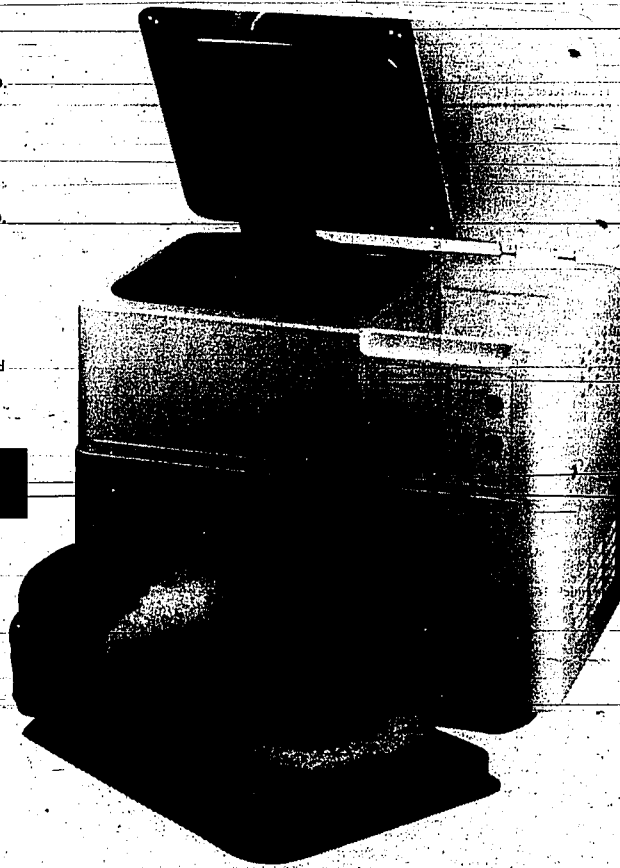

Howard, Detmer head All-American list

Heisman Trophy favorite Desmond Howard of Michigan, freshman phenom Marshall Faulk of San Diego State and all-time passing leader Ty Detmer of Brigham Young were named to the 1991 Associated Press All-America college football team on Thursday.

Howard, who is nicknamed Magic, lived up to his billing with a spectacular season. The triple-threat wide receiver averaged 159 yards per game and was the nation's second-leading scorer with 23 touchdowns, many coming on his trademark diving catch. Two of his TD's came on a 93-yard kickoff return and a 93-yard punt return.

Faulk led the country in rushing and scoring, the first freshman to finish on top in either category. He is only the third freshman to make the AP first team since they became eligible for varsity competition in 1972. The others were Georgia's Herschel Walker in 1970 and Pittsburgh's Tony Dorsett in 1973.

Despite missing three games with a 2,996, is the squad's all-purpose back. His total yardage for rushing, receiving and kick returning was the second highest ever behind Barry Sanders' 3,250 in 1988. Benjamin is the first Pacific player to make the AP's first team.

Mario Bailey of Washington is the other wide receiver and Kelly Blackwell of Texas Christian is the tight end.

Detmer, last year's Heisman Trophy winner, is the only repeater from the 1990 team. He is the first quarterback to make the first unit in consecutive years since Notre Dame's Johnny Lujack in 1946-47.

Rounding out the offense are center Jay Leeuwenger of Colorado; guards Jerry Ostroski of Tulsa and Jeb Flesch of Clemson; tackles Greg Skrepenak of Michigan and Bob

Earlier, Doughty said he would talk trade with West Coast-based teams even before the winter meetings, but he now wants to determine if Bonds would consider re-signing with Pittsburgh.

Even though Bonds' \$29 million contract with the New York Mets has likely expired, Doughty still wants to determine Bonds' asking price before he tries to make a deal.

General partner for Yankees resigns

NEW YORK — The power structure of the New York Yankees was jolted again on Thursday when Robert Nederlander announced he will resign as managing general partner on Dec. 31.

Nederlander had been in control of the team since Aug. 20, 1990, when he succeeded George Steinbrenner as managing general partner. However, in the last month the team's decision-making process deadlocked as Nederlander and chief operating officer Leonard Kleiman clashed over the decisions of general manager Gene Michael.

"The managing general partner, in my opinion, is virtually a full-time position," Nederlander said in a statement. "Because of my expanding roles in my other business ventures and enterprises... I felt that I could not continue as managing general partner and give sufficient time to that very demanding role."

Steinbrenner, who controls 55 percent of the team's stock, did not propose a replacement for Nederlander.

Braves seek talks with Nixon, Pena

NEW YORK — The Atlanta Braves offered salary arbitration to outfielders Otis Nixon and reliever Alejandro Pena on Thursday, which means they may continue to negotiate with them through Jan. 8.

Nixon and Pena became free agents following the World Series. If the Braves hadn't offered arbitration, they could not have re-signed between Saturday night's midnight deadline and May 1.

The only other players who have been offered arbitration so far are Pittsburgh third baseman Steve Buechele and Pirates catcher Mike LaValiere.

Padres, Santiago disagree on contract

SAN DIEGO — Benito Santiago's agent said Thursday that he wants a five-year contract for San Diego's All-Star catcher, who is eligible for free agency after the 1992 season.

The agent, Scott Boras, asked for a four-year, \$16 million deal last January, but Padres general manager Joe McIlvaine countered \$11 million for four years. Santiago was paid \$1.65 million in 1991 after losing in salary arbitration. "They may find that our proposal was a deal compared to what the Padres are going to have to pay him now," Boras said Thursday. "He is a fine defensive player and a fine offensive player, but there has not been a catcher hit the free agent market in modern times that has his skill level."

Knight bars reporter from interviews

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Coach Bob Knight was following Indiana University policy when he barred a woman Associated Press reporter from the basketball locker room, officials said.

Reporter Beth Harris said she was prevented from entering the men's facility Tuesday night, while attempting to get player comment following Indiana's game against Notre Dame. "It's our policy to deny access to members of the opposite sex to all locker room areas," said Knight's spokesman, a team director for IU.

Harris, a sports writer from the AP's Indianapolis bureau, said it was the first time she had ever been barred from the dressing room.

Klingelhoff said Knight "probably was not aware" that Harris had previously been in the locker room.

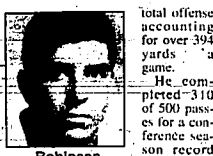
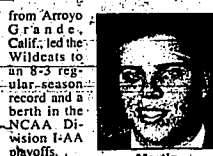

BOISE (AP) — Weber State's record-setting quarterback Jamie Martin has become just the third Big Sky Conference player to be named MVP for the most valuable player in offense, for a second consecutive season.

Martin, who claimed the MVP honor on Thursday, directed the most potent offense in NCAA Division I-AA this fall.

In 11 games, Idaho defensive end Jeff Robinson was named most valuable player and Nevada wide receiver and return specialist Bryan Reeves was recognized as the Big Sky's "Top Newcomer" of the 1991 campaign.

Martin, a 6-4, 210-pound junior



from Arroyo Grande, Calif., led the Wildcats to an 11-2 regular-season record and a berth in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

In 1991-regular season, Weber State led the nation in passing offense with 389.1 yards a game and total offense with 578.5 yards a game. The Wildcats were second in scoring offense, averaging 45 points a game. Martin was the nation's leader in

yards and 35 touchdowns.

Also receiving votes for the award were Idaho senior wide receiver Kasey Dunn, Montana senior center Chad Grimm, Boise State senior runningback Chris Thomas, Eastern Washington senior tackle Kevin

total offense accounting for over 394 yards a game. He completed 310 of 500 passes for a conference season record of 4,125 yards and 25 touchdowns.

Robinson, a 6-5, 225-pound junior from Spokane, Wash., was recently named to the all-Big Sky defensive first-team for the second straight campaign.

With yet another season to play, he is already Idaho's all-time quarterback leader with 43. During the 1991 season he had 77 total tackles, including 19 quarterback sacks for 143 yards in losses.

Others nominated were Nevada senior linebacker Matt Clifton, Boise State senior cornerback Frank Robinson, Montana junior linebacker Chad Lembeck and Montana State sophomore free safety Morgan Ryan.

Bonilla snubs principal of his high school

NEW YORK (AP) — He's coming home \$29 million richer and eager to give something back to his old Bronx neighborhood. But the recipients of Bobby Bonilla's largesse apparently will not include his old school, because the old-graduate is irked at his old principal for easing out his old coach.

"Bonilla, who signed with the New York Mets this week, has ignored numerous requests to visit or otherwise bless the school were he signed in the early 1980s."

"I assume he's unhappy about the

situation with his coach," said Robert Leder, principal of Lehman High School.

He assumes right.

"I'll go back to my old high school if Joe Levine is with me," the highest paid athlete in team sports said Thursday at Shea Stadium. "He was a very important part of my success, and I feel he was mistreated."

Joe Levine coached the young outfielder at Lehman, but three years ago he left the school to replace him as baseball coach and give him a "less

than competent" evaluation as a physical education teacher.

In one game, Levine allegedly allowed a student to play even though he had been suspended for slugging a school guard. In another, he argued with the same student's father after the youth threatened an umpire during a game.

But many teachers at the school insist Levine's move was personal and political, not professional.

"He was always very well-liked and respected by the staff and the students," said Rose Marie Arnetta,

the head of the school's teachers' union chapter. "It was more than a job to him. He really fathered his players — looked out for them, made sure they did their schoolwork."

Leder's battle with Levine was merely one of many between the principal and his teachers. The teachers' union accuses him of virulent anti-union bias and general despotism.

Basically, he's the worst principal in New York City," said Neil Rosenfeld, spokesman for the United Federation of Teachers.

It's time for explanation of child abuse statistics

More than three months have passed since the report revealed a pathetic Twin Falls County record for prosecuting child sexual abuse.

Three months, and—still—no explanation of the report's perplexing statistics.

Three months, and still Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter shows no interest in accounting for her apparently shoddy performance.

Twin Falls County's abused children deserve an explanation.

We say "apparently shoddy," because we really don't know the truth. We can't tell whether Baxter has failed in her responsibility, or whether the statistics distort the real picture.

All we know is that the picture they do show is grim.

From July 1989 to June 1990, Health and Welfare officials recorded Idaho's second-highest number of "substantiated" child sexual abuse cases—104.

Yet during the same period the county had one of the state's lowest prosecution rates for those crimes. Only 15 such cases were prosecuted.

Seven of those cases involved adult offenders; the other eight defendants were juveniles. Baxter's office won convictions in six of the seven.

Only one of those convicted molesters served time. What happened to the cases that Baxter didn't prosecute? Repeatedly this fall, The Times-News has asked Baxter to explain them. Repeatedly, we have been brushed off.

In late September, a full month after the report came out, Baxter said she had "significant questions" about the report. She didn't want to comment on it until she could meet with Health and Welfare officials.

Now she says she sent one of her deputies to the meeting in her place and hasn't had a chance to talk with the deputy. Another delay.

This is a prosecutor who has styled herself as a champion of abused children. Throughout her tenure, the county's taxpayers have believed that protecting children was a priority in Baxter's office.

Maybe it is. As we said earlier, the statistics may not tell the whole story.

For example, although we know how many cases Health and Welfare classed as "substantiated," it's not clear how many cases it actually sent to Baxter.

Furthermore, two Health and Welfare officials said they thought Twin Falls County's performance was good—much better than the report indicates. They blamed poor coordination of record keeping for the dismal tally.

If that's true, we have to ask why the state bothered to publish a report. In any case, something obviously is wrong: Either criminals are getting away with abusing children, or officials are keeping lousy records.

Either way, K. Ellen Baxter needs to come out of hiding. County taxpayers have waited long enough for an explanation, and so have the children.

With Sununu out, Bush faces the problem: Bush

When the owner of a baseball team fires the manager, usually the pennant is already lost. The thinly veiled dismissal of John Sununu as House chief of staff likewise suggests continued trouble ahead for the Bush administration.

Lyn Neffizer, a former assistant to former President Reagan, told the Washington Times that "Sununu made an excellent scapegoat, giving Bush the chance to start all over again and prove it was indeed Sununu's fault."

There's not much chance of that happening, of course. The departure of the scapegoat does not auger well for the goat. Almost everyone in Washington knows this.

On the day after Sununu's departure, the Washington newspapers reported a dozen analysts as saying that Bush's difficulties would persist. They stem from the substance of his policies, not the style of his chief of staff.

If Bush really does believe that Sununu's abrasiveness hurt his own popularity, that is only one more piece of evidence that Bush is in the wrong line of business and is ever ready to take the advice of his enemies.

For weeks and months, there has been a great deal of anti-Sununu sentiment inside the Beltway. Even when Bush was popular, Sununu was extremely unpopular. His dismissal is thus one more act of propitiation to buy off criticism, this time by ditching one of the few conservatives in his administration.

There is a good deal of truth to the point made Sunday by House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga.: Sununu "represents the conservative part of the president's agenda," Gingrich said. "And in this city, if you are the conservative spokesman, you're going to get hurt."

he was inside Washington as long as Bush's policies were popular outside it.

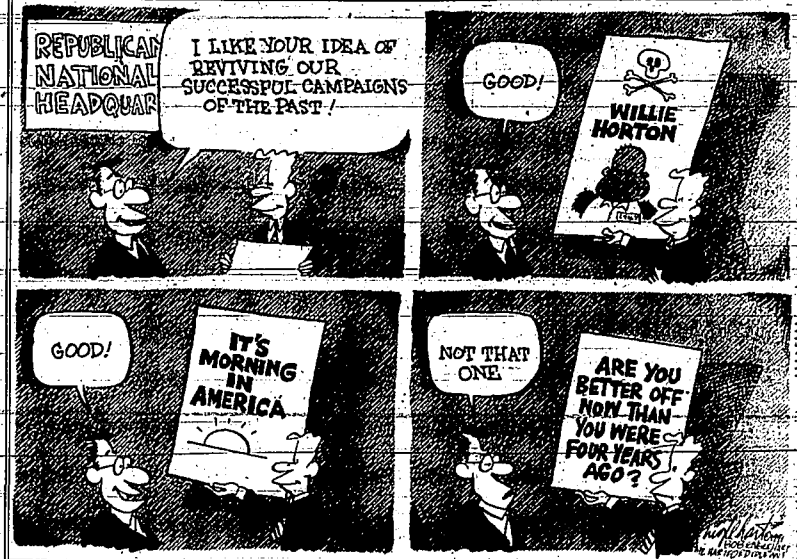
Sununu's real problem was that his job by definition entailed carrying out the will of the president. It's naive of conservatives to blame Sununu, as some have, for "supporting the Bush tax-increase measure last year. Short of quitting on the spot, Sununu had no choice but to agree with it. Sununu will no doubt be replaced by an anonymous chief of staff who treats the press with care and feeding, smiles for the cameras and, for a while at least, will be rewarded with empty praise. He seems to think that his problems are over.

Wrong. His real problem is that he is so tone-deaf politically that he doesn't see, to this day, that breaking his most conspicuous campaign promise, not to raise taxes, cost him dearly with the people. The Washington Establishment does not want. On the issue of tax cuts, the Democrats now have Bush neatly cornered. But he walked into the corner in the first place when he broke his "read my lips" pledge.

Washington conservatives are nonetheless fairly undismissed by Sununu's departure. The reason is that they have already given up on Bush. The latest issue of William F. Buckley's National Review, written in his hands of him—the first time since 1974 that the magazine has reprinted an incumbent Republican president. And that was not an auspicious year for the GOP.

With Sununu gone, more and more conservatives are likely to turn to Patrick J. Buchanan, the conservative commentator, who will be in New Hampshire next Tuesday to announce his presidential candidacy. Buchanan may be the winner here.

Pending tax regulation needs change

At some time in the dim, dark past, the state Legislature had the uncommon wisdom to realize that it doesn't make any sense to collect sales tax on things more than once.

The sales tax is, after all, one of the most time-consuming and expensive taxes to collect, so there is no point in collecting it on an item when it is sold from the producer to the distributor, then again when the distributor sells it to the retailer and yet a third time when the retailer sells it to the end user.

So they created the "resale exemption." To claim the exemption, the distributor or retailer had only to send a single form to each source from whom goods were purchased for resale. This form was kept but filed indefinitely, and could be produced in the event of an audit to show why the seller hadn't collected tax on sales to that buyer.

A similar system applied to producers of goods, such as farmers, ranchers and manufacturers. The dairy farmer would not pay sales tax on feed, for instance, because that was part of the cost of producing the milk that would be taxed when sold retail. Again, all the farmer had to do was to complete a single form for each retailer from whom purchases were made under this "production exemption."

The system worked pretty well, but it wasn't perfect. For some obscure reason, the responsibility for determining a buyer's

eligibility for the exemption was not the buyer's, but the seller's. So if it turned up in an audit that a particular buyer were not eligible for the exemption, the seller then had to pay any tax due. That's obviously not fair, since the seller must rely on the good faith statements of the buyer to determine eligibility in the first place. But such are the quirks that sometimes get into the form of law.

Some of the retail sales people in the state took this problem to the Legislature and asked for a "redress of their grievances." Now, you might think that the legislators, if they saw fit to agree with these retailers, would simply change the wording of the law to shift the liability from the seller to the buyer. No such luck.

Enter now the "all-new, improved production exemption system of the '90s." Now we have personalized "Tax Exemption Card" (only \$10 a year!), a separate form to fill out for each purchase (only nine simple questions to answer!) and a new form for retailers to send to their suppliers each year (up to five on file at any one time, since they have to be kept four years!). Yes indeed!

And that's not all, folks! We also get 50 (count 'em) — 50 — new tax commission employees to keep track of it all! Wow! It truly staggers the imagination that so much could be made of so little; but then, isn't that the amazing thing about government?

Well, strangely enough, at least at the state level, our government may still be sufficiently "of the people" that we can do something about this monstrosity.

First of all, don't quit reading now because this "doesn't affect you." Anytime that our Legislature promulgates a system, this inefficient and this burdensome to people trying to do business in this state (and takes 50 potential taxpayers off the tax rolls to administer it), it does affect you. So call the Statehouse at 334-2852; ask them who your senators and representatives are and then make their phones jingle. Tell them that we're trying to make Idaho a place where people want to do business and want to produce real wealth by farming, ranching and manufacturing. You know, if this legislation actually goes into effect on New Year's Day as planned, we'll be the only state in the union with anything like it. What a distinction.

Light of truth dims glow of 1940s

The 50th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor is occasion for much' nostalgia and historical reflection.

But before we go off the deep end with memoirs, sermons and righteousness indignation over Japan's past sins or present challenge to America's position in the world; perhaps we would do well to ask ourselves which America we are going to remember Saturday — and whom we'll invite to the celebration.

Will we remember the America of the 1940s and thank its past? Or to many, that era is cast in roseate gold. Surely the America of the '40s was preferable to the America of the '90s. Wasn't it a simpler time? People trusted one another and their government. People worked hard then and kept their word. We didn't have so many drugs, drugs, violence. When the Japanese attacked, we all banded together and fought to preserve freedom, democracy and the American way of life. These will be the words and phrases heard Saturday.

But how accurate are they? In 1941 America was still not out of the Depression and thousands of homeless Americans — they were called "hobos" — rode the rails in search of jobs and elusive opportunities.

In 1941 hundreds of thousands of black Americans were languishing in the slums and in rural poverty — their lot in life because of the color of their skin.

Paid less, hired for the lowest positions (if they were hired at all), first to be laid off and buffeted by a majority population that rarely considered them equal partners in the noble democratic experiment, African-Americans

were hardly living in a golden age. If there was no exactly peace, harmony and mutual trust between and among all Americans in 1941, then certainly the relations between the people and their government were more harmonious and more honest.

But most Americans didn't know a half century ago that various naval units had already been engaged in a secret war for several months. President Roosevelt, by executive action (and without informing the public or soliciting authorization from Congress), authorized the use of deadly force against German submarines.

In fact, as early as Dec. 18, 1941 (and still today) people were engaged in callously manipulating the Japanese into attacking Pearl Harbor. His purpose, it was said, was to get the United States into the war so it could save Britain from defeat at the hands of those same Germans.

America in 1941 was still a nation that tolerated slumlordism as quick and effective form of "border justice." Such violence was part and parcel of social and political life in parts of the country. The rights of individuals were constitutionally guaranteed but not as broadly defined as today and certainly not as consistently protected in the case of minorities or women.

And who has been invited to our commemorative events? Undoubtedly the survivors of the disaster at Pearl Harbor will be present. There will be an effort to remember those who died there, or in

the other battles of World War II, or in other battles of the several wars America has waged since. Heroes will be gladly welcomed, but will all the heroes be included?

If the picture in our mind's eye is of American seamen valiantly trying to mount some defense as the Japanese planes circle the harbor, what will they look like?

Will they look like white middle-class Americans, or will they resemble Doris "Dorie" Miller, an African-American who served as mess attendant on the West Virginia?

During the first Japanese assault, the captain of the West Virginia was badly wounded and lay abandoned on the ship's deck, exposed to further harm. Miller dragged him to safety. Then he relieved a wounded shipmate at one of the machine gun emplacements, and with no previous training on how to operate the weapon, he shot down four Japanese planes.

Miller conducted himself heroically and honorably. Still, it took the Navy 65 years to grandly award him the Navy Cross for heroism in battle. A year later he went down with his ship.

Which America we remember this year and who gets invited to our ceremonies depends in part on what sort of country we envision for the future. Perhaps because we cannot really control the days ahead, we fashion what we think was reality in the days past. Sometimes it's a reality of wishful thinking.

Soviets urgently need food

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev warned Thursday night that Moscow needs urgent help to stave off critical shortages of food.

His comments in an interview broadcast on national television came after news media said the capital faced a severe food crisis within two weeks as winter settles in and the Russian republic prepares to lift price controls.



Wearied Muscovites, shopping as snow fell Thursday, said they were running out of patience with the daily search for food.

Gorbachev said food deliveries to Moscow from other republics had been disrupted, creating severe shortages of meat, butter and milk.

"Moscow is in a hard, critical situation regarding food," he said. "I think Muscovites and the Moscow leadership need help and support from the central government and the Russian republic."

"The capital needs urgent help," he added, looking tired following a private meeting with Russian Federation President Boris N. Yeltsin to discuss efforts to link the economies of the splintering republics.

Moscow and St. Petersburg have been hit hard by the growing political and economic collapse of the country since a hard-line coup failed to topple Gorbachev in August but left his power seriously weakened.

Other republics are keeping food within their borders for their own citizens, and fuel shortages are delaying food deliveries. Even agricultural areas within Russia are reported to be holding onto their food rather than sell to industrial centers.

In its Wednesday evening editions, the newspaper Izvestia warned, "Moscow's food crisis can reach catastrophic dimensions in the next 10-15 days."

It said most food-producing regions had stopped delivering food to Moscow, preferring to feed their own hungry residents.

Europe resounds to 'Requiem' 200 years after Mozart's death

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Pilgrims bedecked Mozart's tombstone with flowers Thursday and catfired across Europe resounded to the haunting "Requiem" that the composer called his own dirge shortly before he died 200 years ago.

Scores of newspapers eulogized the musical genius. But as a year of Mozart celebrations drew to a close, dozens of ditties also criticized a sour note — attempts to cash in on his name.

"The months of junketing leading up to today's bicentenary of Mozart's death have induced a condition perilously close to Mozart fatigue," wrote the Times of London.

Mostly, though, Europeans observed the anniversary of the Austri-

an composer's death on Dec. 5, 1771 with music.

Vienna's cavernous St. Stephen's Cathedral reverberated to the mournful pealing of church bells at the outset of a Mozart funeral Mass highlighted by the "Requiem."

The performance, by the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, the Vienna State Opera Choir, four soloists and conductor Sir Georg Solti, was scheduled to be broadcast live by 450 radio and 16 television networks.

Dutch mayor refuses to meet Schwarzkopf

EINDHOVEN, Netherlands (AP) — The mayor of this southern Dutch city has refused to meet retired Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, saying the former commander of U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf War has "too much blood on his hands."

Schwarzkopf was in town Wednesday to give a lecture at the headquarters of the Philips electronics multinational corporation entitled, "Human Resources Management: What I Learned From The Gulf War."

U.S. plane forced down

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — A Venezuelan air force jet fired a warning shot and forced down a plane carrying three U.S. Customs agents on an anti-drug flight, the U.S. Embassy said Thursday.

Venezuelan officials said the twin-engine plane crossed into Venezuelan airspace without permission Sunday over the northern coast and was forced to land by Libertador air base near Maracay, 70 miles west of Caracas.

The incident, which was kept quiet until Defense Minister Fernando Ochoa Antich briefed the Senate's defense commission Wednesday.

Barbara Moore, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Embassy, said the Venezuelan government filed a formal complaint about the incident.

She said American officials were not sure the plane was in Venezuela's airspace when it was intercepted. If the plane did cross into Venezuela, it was inadvertent, she said.

Gadhafi promises new leaf

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Seeking to curb Libya's international isolation, Muammar Gadhafi promised Thursday to stop supporting "liberation movements" turned terrorist.

Gadhafi's comment in an Egyptian newspaper was his most direct offer to end relations with such groups, although Libya has branched the subject before. It said in June it would cut ties with the IRA if Britain restored diplomatic ties, but Britain did not respond.

Britain on Thursday called the pledge "a first step," but reiterated demands for the surrender of two Libyans wanted in the 1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 that killed 270 people. The allegations of Libyan involvement in the bombing of the New York-bound plane and a French airliner a year later have prompted increasing international criticism of Gadhafi from the United States, Britain and France.

"I think he's a worried man," said British Foreign Office Minister Douglas Hogg. "What has been made plain is that we are determined."

Four Libyans are also wanted by France in connection with the bombing of a French UTA airplane that blew up over Niger in 1989, killing all 171 people aboard.

Gadhafi was quoted Friday in the government-owned English-language Al-Ahram Weekly as pledging to "break off relations with movements which were described in the past as movements of liberation but have turned into terrorist movements." He gave no timetable for cutting such relations.

Under his 22-year rule, Libya has been accused of training, supplying or harboring terrorists, including the ruthless Palestinian Abu Nidal and the Irish Republican Army.

Polite robber accords Christmas wishes

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — The masked man pointed a gun at bank workers, collected \$21,000 and called out, "Have a merry Christmas!" Then he rode off on a bicycle. Danish newspapers reported who robbed the bank in Taarbaek, nine miles north of Copenhagen, is the same one who took \$12,500 a month ago from a bank in a town just west of Copenhagen.

Circle K chain will sell, close stores in shakeup

PHOENIX — Officials of the Circle K convenience store chain refused to say Thursday whether their outlets in the Magic Valley and elsewhere in Idaho would be closed in the wake of a reorganization of the troubled company.

Circle K, which has been operating under court supervision since May 1990 when it filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection from its creditors, announced Thursday it would close or sell as many as 1,550 of its 3,700 stores and refurbish the remaining outlets.

Circle K operates 57 stores in Idaho, including three outlets in Twin Falls and one each in Burley, Jerome, Buhl and Ketchum.

"We have too many stores and we need more customers," president and chief operating officer John Antoon told a news conference in announcing a "leaner, stronger, more efficient company."

Some 1,550 stores in the 19 states where the company operates are to be considered for closure, sale or offer as franchises over the next 12 to 18 months said spokeswoman Judy States. Officials have already decided to close 600 of those 1,550 stores, she said, but she refused to disclose which stores or states were involved.

Each of the remaining at-risk stores will be considered individually and could be sold, closed or kept and refurbished, she said.

Circle K, its main competitor 7-Eleven, has been hurt in recent years by competition from oil companies that opened stores at service stations and supermarkets that are staying open later.

7-Eleven is closing its four stores in the Magic Valley.

Van will help sheriff's office with drug education program

JEROME — The D.A.R.E. program run out of the Jerome County Sheriff's Office has acquired a van to be used in teaching drug education to students.

The van was partly paid for through donations by Guy W. Wendland of Twin Falls and Con Paulos Chevrolet of Jerome. Another sponsor of the D.A.R.E. program is Falconhurst Dairy.

The van will provide transportation for Deputy Jim Cleveland as he travels to area schools with his drug education program. It will also be used in parades and for fund-raising events.

"This will be a big part of the program, because the kids can identify it," Cleveland said.

The van, which is painted with the letters D.A.R.E. and contains the names of the sponsors, will be on display at 11:30 a.m. at the sheriff's department. D.A.R.E. stands for Drug Abuse Resistance Education.

16-year-old shot in eye with BB gun not seriously hurt

HAZELTON — A 16-year-old boy who was accidentally shot in the left eye with a BB gun Wednesday night was not seriously hurt, according to the Jerome County Sheriff's Office.

The boy and his brother-in-law were "hanging around" inside his home at Hazelton's Lake View apartments at 7:40 p.m. when the gun went off and sent a BB into the boy's upper left eyelid, Jerome County Under Sheriff Mito Alonzo said.

The brother-in-law, Ramon Hernandez, was able to remove the BB from the boy's eye before paramedics arrived. The boy was treated at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and released with no serious injuries, Alonzo said.

Alonzo declined to release the boy's name because of his age.

TWIN FALLS — Thievery of Christmas light bulbs from trees in City Park has gotten so bad that the Scientologists and the Christmas in City Park Committee are offering a \$100 reward to stop it.

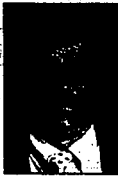
TWIN FALLS — Robbie Knieval can count on at least one "no" vote in his quest to jump the Snake River Canyon.

He and promoter Rod Zundel said the county and city can set the agenda on the program — how big a crowd, if any, watches the jump, no alcohol — whatever officials and city residents want.

Fraley, who lives about three-quarters of a mile south of where Evel Knieval launched his jump attempt, fears more chaos if the younger Knieval tries a jump.

TWIN FALLS — It was only a 40-mile drive, and George Haney had plenty of time to get to his 8 p.m. wedding in Salt Lake City.

So when he knocked off his job as a concrete mix driver in Tooele, Utah, at 5 p.m., he stopped off for a haircut.

Big mistake.

There was a war on, gasoline was rationed and there was a 35 mph speed limit — about 35 mph too slow for Haney to get to the wedding chapel on time.

Haney knew that. The sheriff's deputy who stopped him just as he pulled on to State Route 36 didn't.

"He has stood you up," Ruth Walton Haney said her mother told her. "My parents didn't know him that well."

A five-piece orchestra was playing at

Housing for homeless families to open soon at El Milagro

TWIN FALLS — Homeless families in Twin Falls soon won't have to choose between charity and the streets.

The Idaho Migrant Council will unveil a new duplex apartment today, the first in a series of new housing units at the El Milagro Project designed to give homeless families and individuals a place to call home for up to 90 days.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony is scheduled for 2 p.m.

The duplex is part of what was once a dormitory-style bunkhouse at El Milagro, a low-income and migrant-worker housing complex located at 1122 S. Washington St. It was renovated with

money from the Idaho Housing Agency and labor supplied by the migrant council.

"Renovating these once-unnhabitable buildings has been a dream of the Idaho Migrant Council," said Humberto Fuentes, the migrant council's executive director, on Thursday. "The city of Twin Falls, the Department of Housing and Urban Development and IHA have worked closely with us to help us make it a reality."

The two 675-square-foot apartments were renovated at a cost of \$24,000, HUD of which was provided through a HUD Emergency Shelter Grant and half by the migrant council.

Camas board decides teacher's fate but delays releasing decision

FAIRFIELD — Eyeballs were drooping Thursday morning when Camas County School Board members retired to decide the fate of the wife of their school district's superintendent.

But teacher Nancy Carlson will have to wait a while longer for the news.

The dismissal hearing for Carlson — at which six Camas County School District employees testified that the wife of Superintendent Dennis Carlson was rude, bossy and manipulative — lasted nine hours, until 3 a.m. Thursday.

Board members then took only about 20 minutes to make a decision in executive session on a complaint against Nancy Carlson by Jack Altomose, the principal of Camas' combined elementary school and junior

high school, of insubordination and breach of ethics.

But Stewart Morris, a Boise attorney and hearing officer, said the trustees would not release their decision until he had written a legal justification for the ruling and they reviewed it.

That decision can be appealed to district court, Morris said.

Whatever the board's ruling turns out to be, the hard feelings in the district will not heal easily and probably not without the district losing teachers and administrators, Dennis Carlson said during a break in the hearing.

"At the end of the year, we'll see who picks up and goes elsewhere," Dennis Carlson said. "I very likely will be one."

Even if the board fires the superintendent's wife, Dennis Carlson's contract still runs until June, school district attorney Cumer Green said.

Dennis Carlson is Altomose's immediate supervisor.

"It's going to be an extremely difficult situation," Green said.

Altomose and one-fourth of the district's 20 teachers testified against Nancy Carlson, who taught seventh and eighth grade until her suspension Nov. 11.

Testimony ranged from an allegation Nancy Carlson objected to pooling funds for a gift for Altomose's newborn baby to charges that she interrupted or overruled teachers when they attempted to discipline students in the corridors of the school.

Nancy Carlson denied most of the claims.

First-year teacher Kathy Farmer testified that while she was monitoring the hallway during a recess in early September, she had just given two girls permission to use the restroom when Nancy Carlson inter-

rupted, saying the girls only wanted to talk.

Nancy Carlson then told the girls they had 10 seconds to use the restroom and proceeded to time them, Farmer said.

Nancy Carlson denied the incident. Farmer said her authority as a teacher was "circumvented and she felt demeaned by the incident. She added that Nancy Carlson intimidated her at other times and that Farmer, as a nontenured teacher, was afraid to cross the superintendent's wife.

"I was very uncomfortable," Farmer said. "It wasn't equal. It was like she had a higher authority than me."

But Nancy Carlson said Farmer and the other teachers who testified against her never mentioned their displeasure to her. In fact, Farmer asked Nancy Carlson to be her mentor teacher, she said.

But several parents testified that

Nancy Carlson was the teacher who made a positive difference in their children's lives.

The turf wars and jealousies that apparently led to the allegations against Nancy Carlson will hurt her students, said Sherry Packham, mother of two students in Camas County schools.

"My son is very concerned and upset," she said. "He said I want my teacher back."

The hearing, attended by more than 50 people, was marked by frequent

objections by Nancy Carlson's Boise attorney, Brian Donesley, and by Green.

Altomose testified that when he told Dennis Carlson that teachers complained his wife was rude and bossy, the superintendent said "he would have to tell his wife to keep her mouth shut."

Dennis Carlson remembered that conversation differently. "I don't remember being that direct," he said. "I told him I would counsel with my wife."

GOODING — The new solid waste fee tacked onto the Gooding property tax is not a popular one.

"What the people don't seem to understand," Mayor Gene Heller said, "is the solid waste fee is for maintaining the Gooding County landfill. It is not a tax; it is a user's fee."

Recently, the Hagerman City Council protested paying the fee, saying as a taxing district it shouldn't have to.

Fred Willard, manager of the landfill, told the City Council at its recent meeting he can't understand why the new garbage disposal system was installed when the old system was better and "a lot cheaper to run at the landfill."

Willard said the old garbage truck automatically emptied its contents into the landfill. "The new one doesn't," Willard said. "It has to be emptied manually."

"The thing that really scares me," Willard said, "is the ashes people put in their new containers that shouldn't be put there for at least a week after taken from their houses or other buildings."

Willard told the council a city ordinance should be established stating ashes be put in metal buckets for a period of seven days before the ashes are put into the new trash containers.

"Before that time, hot ashes will melt the containers," Willard said, "but more important, what looks like cold ashes many times will become hot by the time they get to the landfill. After the fire we had last year, we don't want to take any chances of one occurring again."

Heller told the council he personally made trips to other cities with the same garbage system now in place in Gooding.

"Those communities are quite satisfied with the efficiency of the new system. I don't know about their disposal of ashes at their particular

landfills, but they too must have the same problems we do. I feel it's a matter of educating the public of the do's and don'ts of the new system.

Once people understand it better, I'm sure they'll see how efficient a system it is."

Resident complaints about the new garbage pickup have been centered around the fact they must put the containers at the front of their homes and not place them in the alleys as they did before for the weekly pickup.

"We are working on a solution to that," Heller said. "And hope to reestablish the alley pickups in the near future."

"If other council business," Heller told the council of the recurring sewer problems on private property bringing insurance claims against the city.

"We must establish an ordinance that will enforce private property owners to maintain their main sewer lines; so they won't have sewage backups," he said. "The city isn't responsible for private sewer lines and should not be expected to pay their insurance claims."

Friedman Airport will increase tie-down fees

HAILEY — Tie-down fees will increase at Friedman Memorial Airport, but not as drastically as originally proposed last month.

Members of the Blaine County Pilots Association turned out Tuesday night to oppose a proposed plan to increase monthly tie-down fees by 20 percent this year and then by the Cost of Living Index in subsequent years.

In a split decision, Blaine County Airport Commissioners voted 7-4 in favor of increasing tie-down fees annually based on the cost of living rate. The first increase will be effective Jan. 1, 1992 and is assumed to be about a 5 percent increase.

"I have difficulty with the premise

of the whole thing," said Mike Penrose, president of the BCPA, who said users at Friedman already pay 40 percent more than other regional airports and likened the increase to a tax.

"This is not a program to provide (runway) crack rehabilitation. This is a program to provide additional funds for the airport," Penrose said.

Airport Manager Todd Withlin earlier had explained that funds generated from the tie-down fees — approximately \$4,000 a year — would go toward repairing pavement cracks on the runways, ramps and tie-down areas.

No maintenance program had ever been established, resulting in deterioration of the pavement.

The tie-down fee increase was en-

marked for crack rehabilitation, but several commissioners questioned the advisability of tying the fee to a particular use.

With it taking an estimated \$15,000 a year to implement a maintenance program, the \$4,000 generated from the tie-down fee increase would not be adequate to cover the expense.

Pilot Curt Rixon complained about the increase on grounds that Friedman lacked any amenities for tie-down users, such as the ability to wash or hose down planes at the tie-down sites and the basic lack of snowplowing at the sites.

Many of the pilots disagreed with the direct fee increase, but felt more comfortable with an increase based on the Cost of Living Index.

IEA survey shows 25.6% of classrooms with 20 children or less

BOISE (AP) — Only 25.6 percent of Idaho's elementary classrooms have reached the goal of 20 students or less, and the Idaho Education Association wants to create a multi-million-dollar fund to further reduce the number of overcrowded classes.

"We believe the effort to reduce class sizes must be strengthened in the primary grades and must begin in the intermediate grades," IEA President Dick Chilcote said Thursday in releasing the class-size survey results.

"When there are too many students in a teacher's classroom, those students are not receiving the productive educational experience

which they and their parents expect," he said. Chilcote said the teachers' organization would propose creating a pool of \$12 million to \$15 million a year to be disbursed by a state committee to local school districts solely for the purpose of bringing class size down to the 20-student goal.

He declined to be specific about where the money would come from in a year when state cash surpluses have been used-up-and-budgets, even for aid to education, will be tighter than during the past three years.

But while government officials throughout Idaho are fighting a citizens drive to cut taxes

starting with the property tax, Chilcote indicated that lawmakers would be urged to consider some kind of tax increase to underwrite the effort.

"There are avenues to create more funds in this state," he said. "Despite some perceptions, Idahoans are not overtaxed. ... If they are truly committed to assisting and improving education, the Legislature should create that funding."

He acknowledged, however, that there has been no indication of support for the association's scheme from Gov. Cecil Andrus, who has made education his highest budget priority

but who has also said there will be no tax increase in 1992.

"Still, Chilcote said the campaign to finance class-size reduction would be the top priority for the teachers' group, which poured nearly \$300,000 into state legislative campaigns during the 1990 election.

"It's extremely important to us, and we would look kindly at those who thought as well," he said.

The money would be used to hire more teachers, teachers aides or special equipment needed to help students. It would not be available for additional classroom facilities,

which many school officials cite as a major reason for overcrowding. A special state committee has begun work on assessing the need for additional classrooms throughout Idaho.

The class-size survey, covering 90 percent of Idaho's kindergarten through sixth grade students, showed that only 1,167 of the 4,556 classrooms checked had 20 students or less.

Another 433 percent — nearly 2,000 — had between 21 and 25 students and the rest, just over 1,400 classrooms, had more than 25 students. A handful of those had over 35 students each.

Insurance industry lashes out at state insurance fund

BOISE (AP) — Private workers' compensation insurers have lashed out at the Andrus administration for its campaign against a proposed 9.9 percent premium increase, claiming the hike is needed to keep private carriers in business and halt the state from becoming Idaho's only insurer.

"Due to a large, highly competitive state fund, we're heading toward a monopolistic state," Kimberly Insurance agent Jerry Dodds told a Department of Insurance administrative law judge on Thursday.

He urged Judge Merlin Young to guard against letting "politics or public resentment" dictate the worker's compensation insurance rates in Idaho.

Young held a two-hour hearing on the National Council on Compensation Insurance's proposed rate hike that will take effect in 1992, unless rejected or modified by state Insurance Director Harry Walraath.

Young, who was expected to make his report to Walraath next week, said he expected opposition to the hike from businessmen but questioned how relevant that was in reaching his conclusions on the validity of the proposal.

Gov. Cecil Andrus, backed up by key members of his administration and businessmen from throughout the state, has campaigned against the rate hike for more than a month, calling it unnecessary and claiming it will be a severe setback to Idaho's economic expansion. Statewide, it would add nearly \$15 million to the \$150 million Idaho employers currently pay each year in worker's compensation premiums.

Industry officials maintained that even with the increase, Idaho's worker's compensation premiums would still be more attractive to business than those in surrounding states.

Andrus has based his case on the performance of the State Insurance

Fund, which is returning nearly \$72 million of its premiums for 1990 to policyholders because the money was needed to cover claims. The governor maintained the funds effective medical cost containment program and its overall efficiency have led it to pay out only 60 percent of its premiums in claims while private carriers are paying between 75 percent and 83 percent of their premiums in claims.

The state fund covers all government employers and about 75 percent of Idaho's 19,000 private employers, primarily the smaller ones since it collects only half of the premiums.

Andrus said earlier this week that the rate increase is aimed to cover poor real estate investments being made by the private insurance companies.

But industry representatives told Young that by law their casualty companies are prohibited from investing in real estate beyond their

buildings for their offices and that in fact the only insurer that can make real estate investments is the state fund. They suggested that the governor may have been purposely misinformed to help build public opposition to the increase.

Matt Merlino, the Atlanta actuary hired by Walraath to assess the rate increase proposal, said flatly that real estate investments were not included in the calculations, and he told Young he believed the increase was reasonable.

Andrus did concede that the industry was entitled to an increase covering inflationary costs, and Scott Yen of the National Council said 40 percent of the proposed increase was driven by rising medical costs.

"Medical inflation has been going up much faster than general inflation," Yen said. "It has a significant impact."

And the council's Joe Thome told Young that the increase is intended

to provide a rate that will be adequate for all companies. He pointed out that the state fund has an advantage by not paying commissions on the policies it underwrites, although Fund Manager Merle Parsley said the fund began this year paying 5 percent commissions on about 10 percent of its business.

Others claimed the monopoly the state fund has on all government worker's compensation insurance is a major boon even though it provides that coverage at 20 percent less than the standard rate. John Blaine of the Associated Loggers Exchange claimed that discount was not nearly enough, considering how inexpensive it is for the fund to carry such large policies. He also contended that the huge dividend the state was able to pay was in part the result of tax-financed premiums from those governments and amounted to an uncompetitive advantage for the fund over private insurers.

Task force says medically uninsured numbers can drop

BOISE (AP) — An industry task force has reported to a legislative study committee that it doesn't have all the answers on how to provide health insurance to the estimated 160,000 Idaho residents without it.

But the task force says a cost-effective way of reducing that number is expanding eligibility for the federal Medicaid program. With the federal government picking up three-fourths of the cost, the number of medically uninsured people could be reduced by 20,000 to 25,000, the legislative committee was advised Thursday.

"Medicaid could help us reach some of those people (who have no health insurance)," said task force member Jim Peart. "With a three-to-one federal match, it makes economic sense to Idaho."

The task force held its eighth meeting on Wednesday, and on Thursday

presented some preliminary recommendations to a legislative study committee.

Project coordinator George Neumayer said the committee's findings will be submitted to the Legislature in the first week of the session opening Jan. 6, along with the studies, reports and proposals submitted so far.

"It will be a very important series of documents for any action by the Legislature," Neumayer said. The task force estimates that 150,000 to 160,000 Idaho residents about one out of every six persons are uninsured. Two-thirds of the uninsured are children.

The task force report to the legislative committee had no overall recommendation that the task force be continued. But it worked with no public money this time. Snediker said if the

study group is to come up with accurate cost estimates, it will need some funding.

"One immediate step to ease the problem could be expansion of Medicaid eligibility to cover pregnant women and children up to age 6, for families up to 185 percent of the federal poverty level, Peart said.

Children make up "a very important part of our uninsured population," Peart said. "This is one way of getting coverage to them effectively."

He said it costs about \$4.1 million from the state general fund to provide medical coverage for children in their first year, but had no estimate of what it would cost to expand coverage to other ages.

The last Legislature also authorized medical coverage for the "medically needy," starting next July, but

put up no money for it.

The task force said it would ease the problem of uninsured people if the program were funded.

The legislative committee also got its first look at guidelines that might be the basis of legislation next session on the regulation of health care professions.

Rep. Sheila Sorensen, R-Boise, headed a subcommittee that came up with nine elements for health care professional regulation, although she and other panel members said there would have to be some sort of "grandfather" provision to protect people already active in the professions.

Police arrest adult-bookstore owner

Businessman to be released from prison

BOCATELLO — Pocatello businessman Robert Rowland, sentenced to prison more than two years ago for a hit-and-run traffic fatality, will be released on parole next week.

Rowland, 50, former owner of Rowland Dairy, went to prison in June, 1989, but has been held in the Power County Jail in American Falls on a work assignment for several months.

The state Commission on Pardons and Parole approved Rowland's release after he served the fixed portion of a six-year sentence imposed by 6th District Judge Lynn Winnill. He will remain on parole until June of 1995.

UI receives \$8 million federal grant

MOSCOW — The University of Idaho said Thursday it has received an \$8-million federal grant to create a center for research into new transportation technologies.

The three-year grant is part of a \$151 billion transportation and highways package approved by Congress last week. The money will finance the creation of the National Center for Advanced Transportation Technology at the College of Engineering. It will also help pay for a new building to house the center.

The grant will enable the university to reduce its request for state funding for the project from \$15 million to \$7.4 million, UI President Elizabeth Zinser said.

Firm to expand Panhandle bus routes

SANDPOINT — North Idaho Community Express has launched plans for expanding bus routes in the Panhandle.

New bus schedules for the Coeur d'Alene area will begin in January, coordinating director Aaron Knight said Wednesday.

Equipment shortages probably will prevent expanded Sandpoint routes, but Post Falls may soon have a fixed bus path and Bonners Ferry residents will be able to take a bus to North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene starting Jan. 6.

North Idaho Community Express board members also have agreed to establish advisory councils in the state's five northern counties to help define public transit needs in the Panhandle and identify resources to meet them.

Andrus announces job training awards

BOISE — Individuals in Soda Springs and Lewiston and a job training project in Idaho Falls are the 1991 Governor's Job Training Partnership Act award winners.

Gov. Cecil Andrus presented the awards at a Boise meeting Thursday. They recognize achievement under the Job Training Partnership Act, a federally funded program designed to help people get productive jobs.

The 1991 winners are Lisa Sims of Lewiston, Etie Tracy of Soda Springs and a joint project between the Idaho Falls Job Service and Idaho Falls School District 93.

Prosecutor: Posters don't violate state law

MOSCOW (AP) — Area Nationalists posted on the University of Idaho campus do not violate Idaho's malicious harassment law, Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman says.

Earlier this week, the Latah County Human Rights Task Force voted to send copies of the fliers containing racist and anti-Semitic remarks to the Idaho Human Rights Commission for an opinion on whether they violate state law.

"They are offensive. There are a lot of things you could say about them, but they don't fall within the state's malicious harassment act," Mosman said Wednesday. "They don't make a lot of sense, but they don't direct that some violent or malicious act be taken against any person."

Mosman said one of the fliers' prices people pay for living in a free society is putting up with "garbage like that."

Harry Peterson, vice president of university relations and development, agreed that protecting First Amendment rights is more important than protecting students from being harassed by offensive fliers.

Peterson said Wednesday that he was concerned about the Latah County Human Rights Task Force's insistence that Moscow police should have questioned the man who was posting the fliers. A task force

member called police Sunday to report the man.

"Our role at the university is not to protect our students from bad ideas; it's to help them separate fact from fiction and good ideas from bad ideas," Peterson said. "The First Amendment is very clear. It doesn't just protect good ideas. It protects people's rights to express ideas that we believe to be very, very bad."

Moscow Police Chief Dave Cameron said Tuesday that police couldn't have forced the man posting the fliers to identify himself anyway since he was doing nothing illegal.

But task force member Alan Rose, a University of Idaho associate professor of foreign languages and literatures, said police should have responded. Often those who post such fliers are the same people likely to be involved in violent hate crimes, he said.

West Official orders recount for narrowly approved abortion rights measure

OLYMPIA (AP) — Secretary of State Ralph Munro on Thursday ordered a recount of votes on the abortion rights measure approved by a 51-49 vote in the Nov. 5 election.

The mandatory recount was triggered by Munro's official certification of returns that showed 756,653 votes were cast for Initiative 120 to 752,354 against. That's a difference of 4,299 votes, or .28 percent.

The Washington state law requires a recount of all elections in which the difference in votes equaled one-half of one percent or less.

Munro said under state law, canvassing boards in each of the state's 39 counties must begin their recounts within five days of receiving notice of the recount. Munro hopes to certify the recount by Dec. 20.

Initiative 120 would write into state law the basic abortion rights granted under the U.S. Supreme Court's 1974 Roe vs. Wade decision. Lee Minto, head of Seattle-King County Planned Parenthood and chairwoman of the initiative campaign committee, said she believes the recount will confirm passage of the proposal. She said election experts say the change in totals following recounts is normally only 100 to 200 votes.

Kenneth VanDerhof, executive director of Human Life of Washington, said he and other opponents would monitor the recount closely.

Only eight counties — Clallam, Island, Jefferson, King, Kittitas, Pacific, San Juan and Thurston — gave majority votes to the proposal. But it was Seattle-based King County that put the proposal over the top with a vote of 301,894 in favor to 207,087 against.

KKK rally reportedly set for King holiday

DENVER (AP) — It appears the Ku Klux Klan is planning a rally at the Colorado Capitol on the Martin-Luther-King Jr. holiday after reportedly obtaining a permit through another group, a television station reports.

A member of the KKK applied for the permit on behalf of a group called "Christian Revival to Ban Racism" after the KKK was denied a permit for the Jan. 20 rally, KCNC-TV reported.

"I think we played a trick on them and that's in our favor," KKK organizer Shawn Slater said. Maj. Jim Yarrington of the Colorado State Patrol said the state has no plans to revoke the permit because officials cannot prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the Christian Revival group is affiliated with the KKK.

The KKK first sought a permit for the January rally in November, but Yarrington said it was rejected for public safety reasons.

He cited a KKK rally at the Capitol in April which erupted into an angry confrontation between white supremacists and counter-demonstrators. Ten people were arrested for petty offenses ranging from disturbing the peace to throwing objects. One police officer was injured.

Christian Revival stated its purpose for the rally was "the advancement of equal rights and to protest against racism," Yarrington said.

"We do not plan to revoke the permit," he said.

The Christian Revival rally is scheduled to coincide with a parade through downtown in remembrance of the slain civil rights leader.

Official's wife charged with harassment

SEATTLE — The wife of a state assistant attorney general has been charged with harassing a Walla Walla, Wash., family and is being investigated in a similar case involving state Supreme Court Justice Charles Z. Smith.

Sally S. Byrd, the wife of Louis Byrd is the next-door neighbor of the Walla Walla family that has been subjected to phoned death threats since February.

She was Justice Smith's secretary for much of the time he was being menaced by telephone between December 1989 and January 1991.

Byrd, 35, was arrested yesterday and charged in Walla Walla County Superior Court with five counts of telephone harassment and one count of harassment, all gross misdemeanors.

Official ceremonies will honor 'unsung' Pearl Harbor nurses

The first Japanese plane to thunder over the naval hospital at Pearl Harbor was so low that nurse Lenore Terrell Rickett could see the pilot's teeth and mustache.

No one at the hospital was expecting war on Dec. 7, 1941.

But one hour and a massive air strike later, the hospital was filled with the war's first American casualties. Many had been burned, and they called out continuously for water. Others waited on cots in halls for amputations.

And as awful as it was, it also was "one of the most wonderful experiences in my life," said Mrs. Rickett, 77, of Laguna Hills, Calif. "I got the chance to see man's humanity to man in a way unlike I had ever seen before or since," Rickett said. "It was a turning point in my life."

The nurses at Pearl Harbor, whose role was virtually forgotten, will be given special recognition Saturday during official ceremonies commemorating the 50th anniversary of the attack.

"They apparently didn't realize, for the last 50 years, that there were nurses at Pearl Harbor," said Rickett, who will introduce President Bush at the Hawaii ceremony. "But I never felt slighted, and I don't think many of the others did. I think we all got a lot out of it (Pearl Harbor)."

"We found that we could operate in these terribly adverse conditions and keep our heads," she said. "Half of life is having confidence, and Pearl Harbor gave us confidence."

Military records don't indicate how many nurses and other medical personnel were at Pearl Harbor. They were stationed at the main naval hospital and at the Army's Hickam Field and Scofield Barracks, among other facilities.

Veterans say the number of female nurses was small, maybe 100 or so — a tiny fraction of the estimated 80,000 or more military personnel on or near Oahu that day.

Thus, the nurses' stories recall a military far removed from the armed services of 1991, a year that saw female soldiers serving side by side with men during the Persian Gulf war.

In 1941, women's primary military duties were confined to nursing. Rickett, like most of her colleagues at Pearl Harbor, was there for the adventure and the travel.

"We knew war was going on in Europe, but we all thought it was something far away and would have no effect on us at all," she said.

On that Sunday 50 years ago, Rickett was making rounds at the 1,000-bed U.S. Naval Hospital-Pearl Harbor with the officer of the day. Airplanes were prohibited from flying over the hospital, so both rushed to a window when they heard the first Japanese fighter. War was so far from her thoughts, Rickett said, that "I'm ashamed to say the rising sun on its wings meant nothing to me at all. It could have been Chinese."

Others at the hospital knew exactly what the plane was and what its presence meant.

As the officer of the day ran to the brig to release prisoners to their battle stations, Rickett and other nurses hurriedly started drawing and sterilizing water.

Within an hour, the wounded began to arrive — strapped onto Jeeps, in the back of bread trucks, on small boats in ambulances.

And many of the hospital's patients left their beds to make room for those hurt in the raid. Some returned later that day carrying their buddies "and stayed for days to help," Rickett said.

During one wave of bombing, Rickett went outside and looked up to see the destruction being hurled down on Pearl Harbor. Shrapnel from anti-aircraft fire clattered against the hospital windows. At one point, a Japanese fighter plane, its pilot slumped against the windshield, crashed in perilously close and crashed in flames in a nearby field.

USS Utah sailors recall horror of Hawaii attack 50 years ago

Sailors aboard the doomed USS Utah Dec. 7, 1941, in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, recall the horror of the attack. From left, Don Larsen and Milton Maston of the USS Utah City were among the survivors.

But the Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor made them brothers of tragedy when one torpedo sank the Utah in just 12 minutes.

That Sunday morning, breakfast was winding down. Larsen had just finished eating, and Maston was working in the kitchen when two large explosions rocked the ship at 8 a.m.

"The ship had been quiet before that, with many of the sailors hung over from shore-leave activities the night before," Larsen said.

The dining area was two decks

below the quarter deck, and crew members inside the ship could only guess what had happened. Larsen said his first thought was that a tug or other vessel in the harbor had rammed the Utah, a battleship that had been convened 10 years earlier to a target ship.

Hardly any time passed before a voice on the intercom ordered the crew to secure all hatches in the part of the ship where Larsen and Maston were. Moments later Larsen scrambled up a damaged stairway to the deck when the order came to abandon ship. Maston was cleaning up.

"Well, I don't think I'll wash these damn dishes," he remembers saying in response to the order to get out.

Sailors emerging on the deck of the ship discovered they were in the midst of an air raid. Japanese fighters were buzzing the ship, strafing crew members in the water and on the deck, which was rapidly listing to port.

Larsen said he grabbed a mooring line on the starboard side of the ship and slid down the line into the water.

MotORIZED launches soon surrounded the hull, plucking sailors from the water behind the moorings to protect themselves from the strafing attacks.

The men were then taken onto Ford Island, which separated the Utah from the rest of the fleet.

Idaho helps organize ceremonies

BOISE (AP) — Rick Gale is no stranger to big projects, but the fire suppression specialist at the Boise Intergency Fire Center has never tackled anything like this.

He and hundreds of others are part of a team on Hawaii's Oahu Island organizing ceremonies and activities to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor.

"It's fun and it's frustrating," said Gale, 54, who made a planning trip to the island in September and returned Nov. 20 as part of the National Park Service's incident management team.

"We're behind the power curve in getting things done," he said. "It's taken longer to do things than we had hoped. But we'll be there. Rest assured, it'll be done."

His projects included the Tuesday-morning opening of the Remembrance Exhibit at the USS Arizona Memorial. It was dedicated before a crowd of approximately 300, who paid tribute to those killed in the bombing.

Gale's busy week continued Wednesday with Hawaii Remembrance Day and the Arizona Reunion Association program.

On Thursday, a Survivors Day program featured two Congressional Medal of Honor recipients as well as the son of Capt. Franklin Van Valkenburgh — skipper of the USS Arizona.

On Friday, author James Michener is the keynote speaker at a Reflections of Pearl Harbor Day, which also features a presidential honor guard and Alfred Reid, the architect who designed the USS Arizona Memorial.

On Saturday — Dec. 7 — Gale and his crew will join thousands of spectators as President Bush speaks at the USS Arizona Memorial.

Survivors, at awards presentation, remember details of Dec. 7, 1941

WASHINGTON (AP) — When the Japanese planes flew in low over Pearl Harbor, Austin Flack was standing in a doorway waiting for his Sunday paper.

William McLaughlin had just finished breakfast and had stepped outside the mess hall to smoke a cigarette.

Thursday, they were among 22 survivors of the Japanese attack who received the congressionally authorized Pearl Harbor Commemorative Medal in a ceremony in a chapel at the U.S. Soldier's and Airmen's Home.

Similar ceremonies are being held in other parts of the country. McLaughlin, an 18-year-old Marine from San Francisco at the time of the attack, is now a retired Air Force master sergeant. Like most of those honored, he lives at the Soldier's and Airmen's Home.

"The first time they flew over, the gunner in the back of the airplane waved at me and I waved back. The second time he came around, he was waving a machine gun.

Within moments, he said, he and others were returning fire with Springfield rifles. He said they shot down two planes out of more than 300.

"When those planes dived in with that big red circle under the wing, in my mind I said, 'Whoever camouflaged that star did a damned good job of it.'"

Like McLaughlin, he at first believed they were U.S. planes on a practice mission. He knows, however, through almost as soon as that first thought flashed through his mind. "By that time, they were shooting the window lights out of my building," he said.

In his formal response on behalf of those honored at the awards ceremony, McLaughlin said: "Like chief of the recipients, I was there because I was ordered, and did what I was trained to do. We were little more than boys at the time. By the end of the war, few of us would doubt that we had become men."

The medals were presented during the 30-minute ceremony by Eleanor Holmes Norton, the delegate to Congress from the District of Columbia, and retired Army Maj. Gen. Donald C. Hilbert. "We are at Pearl Harbor today because you fought yesterday," said Norton. "We are forever in your debt."

"We dedicate ourselves to the values for which you served," said Hilbert. The bronze medals, 1/2-inch in diameter, bear the image of a ship and the words, "Remember Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7, 1941." On the back is the inscription "For Those Who Served" and "A date that will live in history" — the phrase used by President Franklin D. Roosevelt to describe the attack 50 years ago Saturday.

Pearl Harbor attack changed Hollywood's tack

When the Japanese swept over Honolulu at 7:55 a.m. on Dec. 7, 1941, sinking 19 U.S. Naval ships, they also put a halt to movies about Emerald cities, determined Southern belles and Gothic romance on the moon.

For the next four years Hollywood marshaled its forces for the war effort with as much vigor as the rest of the nation. While celluloid heroes like James Stewart, Clark Gable, Henry Fonda and Robert Taylor joined the armed forces as real combatants, Hollywood's female contingent kept the

G.I.'s' motors running with pin-up pictures, war bond drives and public appearances.

Robert Taylor became a flight instructor with the Navy's Air Transport system. He served as director of more than a dozen Navy training films and narrated the classic documentary, "The Fighting Lady." Gable gave up Rhet Butler's brocade waistcoat for an Air Force uniform, rising to the rank of major and capturing the Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medal for flying several missions over Germany.

Stewart flew more than 20 bombing missions over Germany, eventually becoming a full colonel. When he retired from the Air Force reserves in 1968, Stewart

was the highest ranking entertainer in the U.S. military. Fonda was awarded the Bronze Star and a Presidential Citation for his work as an assistant operations and air combat intelligence officer in the Pacific.

Hollywood's female stars did their part on the home front. Betty Grable's fabled legs were insured by Loyds of London for \$1 million, and the blonde singer-dancer was voted the most popular pin-up by America's doughboys. Rita Hayworth, Dorothy Lamour and Lana Turner were favorites — their likenesses often adorning the exteriors of America's fighting planes.

Carole Lombard, who was married to Gable, was one of America's first celebrity

casualties when her plane crashed on the way back from a war bond drive, killing everyone aboard.

World War II saw the ascendancy of the documentary film.

Many filmmakers got their starts on the rash of documentaries that were being produced as fast as Kiltroy buttons. Frank Capra's "Why We Fight," a series he produced for the U.S. Signal Corps, became a classic among the informative and engrossing documentaries.

And documentary techniques developed during the war found their way into feature

In 1859, the Great Handel Commemoration Festival to celebrate the centenary of his death used a chorus of 2,765 and an orchestra of 460. In other words, the more the merrier on Saturday night.

Featured soloists for this "Messiah" are Camille Cox of Twin Falls, soprano; Violet Lundgren of Twin Falls, soprano; Delores Lovett Smith of Bliss, alto; John Mauldin of Jerome, tenor; Roger Vincent of Filer, bass and Dennis Heider of Twin Falls, trumpet. Although Handel's oratorios take biblical texts, they are not church music. They were performed in theaters or secular halls, not consecrated buildings. A candlelight performance with popular Christmas carols will begin the Magic Valley Chorale performance.

The Chorale last performed the "Messiah" three years ago, before a sold-out crowd.

'Sesame Street' writer says he likes kids just the way they are

It could be said that Jeff Moss writes what he knows. He knows children. He's no self-proclaimed expert; mind you, just a gentleman who takes a genuine interest.

"I've always liked talking to children," says Moss, who has spent his adult life writing for them. He was formerly the head writer and continues to write for "Sesame Street." His songs, familiar from the show and the Muppet movies, have earned him an Academy Award nomination and four Grammys. "Rubber Duckie," sold more than a million copies as a single.

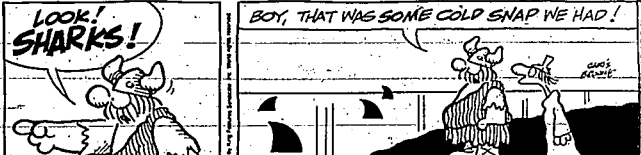

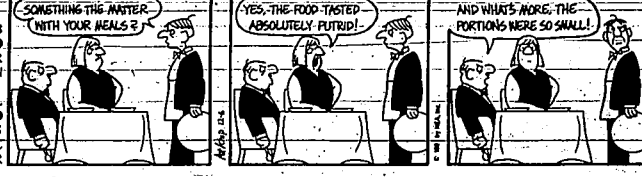

'Beauty and the Beast' a 'giant step' for animation

'Modern fable' has all qualities of box office hit

Disney's new full-length animated feature, "Beauty and the Beast," is more than a return to classic form. It's a delightfully satisfying modern fable, a near-masterpiece that draws on the sublime traditions of the past while remaining completely in sync with the sensibility of its time.

This is a giant step forward for Disney's animation unit — and a

quantum leap past its blandly diverting work in "The Little Mermaid."

For the first time in a Disney cartoon, you don't feel as though you've slipped into a time warp. The sense of humor, even the obligatory, moral subplot, seems fresh. There's even a kind of impudence in the comedy; you don't feel clobbered with wholesomeness.

And yet nothing is lost in bringing a contemporary spirit to this familiar tale of love triumphing over physical imperfection. The storytelling is brisk and engaging, the animation imaginative and deeply textured, the music and the production numbers subtle.

Let's not mince words — it's great.

The animators — led by producer Don Hahn and directors Gity Drouadine and Kirk Wise — have truly outdone themselves, not just in the richness of the visual detail they've provided but in the deeper pleasures of characterization and conception.

It's been a long time since a Disney animation project has had such an invigorating directorial style.

Throughout the film, the creators give a startling perspective on the action; our eye is always

excited, always surprised by what's put up on the screen. This picture was made by people who know movies and movie history.

The opening segment, in which a spoiled prince is transformed into a beast, who can only be rescued by love, visually evokes the opening shots of "Citizen Kane." And, in the musical numbers, particularly "Be My Guest," the filmmakers have referenced — and then topped — the lavish eccentricity of Busby Berkeley.

Added to that, the music by the composing team of Howard Ashman and Alan Menken, who also worked on "The Little Mermaid" — is the most memorable since "Lady and the Tramp."

The main characters, too, are more compelling than in recent years. The elegant Belle (whose voice is provided by Paige O'Hara) isn't insipid and Barbie doll cute the way The Little Mermaid was. She's a more worldly girl than Ariel, a bookworm, with gumption and a mind of her own. Physically, she seems more mu-

ture, more womanly and less blandly asexual. Her suitor, the handsome but conceited Gaston (read by Richard White), has an almost overbearing physicality; everything about him is comically exaggerated and satirized to the point that you feel as if the cleft in his chin might swallow you whole.

The chorus of town beauties that follows him around, is hilariously over-the-top; more like Vargas girls than the usual Disney damsel. The real stars of the show, though, are the supporting players, in particular the dusky, magical candelabra, Lumiere (Jerry Orbach), and the warmhearted talking teapot, Mrs. Potts (Angela Lansbury).

The model for Lumiere seems to have been Maurice Chevalier, and the idea is so choice, and so deftly executed, that it places him immediately among the top rank of Disney characters. Though less inspired, Mrs. Potts is indelibly realized. Their numbers are the movie's best.

If the movie has a flaw, it's the Beast. Perhaps the image of the glorious Beast in Jean Cocteau's 1946 version of the classic French fairy tale is too vividly perfect to allow anything but a literal transcription, but this Beast, who is drawn to resemble a sort of scowling bison, seems completely lacking in pathos.

He's a lunk without either mystery or pathos. And for the character to earn our affection despite his ugliness and to appear deserving of Belle's love — he needs some of both. As it is, he's precisely what the rest of the movie isn't: dimensionless.

Though this is a major component, it's not a major drag on our enjoyment. The rest of the film is nearly flawless. And the marriage of computers to the time-tested and painstaking hand-drawn animation process only enhances our amazement. What "Beauty and the Beast" gives us is the best of the old and the best of the new. We watch the screen with constant wonder.

Voices provide the soul of Disney's latest creation

ORLANDO, Fla. — Asked to reflect on her resemblance to Mrs. Potts, the enchanted teapot in the animated feature "Beauty and the Beast," Angela Lansbury demurred.

"The prime requisite for Mrs. Potts, I think, is a large rear end," the actress joked during a recent visit to Central Florida to promote the Disney film. And that's one thing the actress doesn't have.

Still, the popular star of "Murder, She Wrote" has to agree that Disney animators captured some of her physical expressiveness when they created the motherly cockney character whose voice she provides. Indeed, Lansbury is there — in the chin, the cheeks, the way Mrs. Potts smiles, the way she moves her head.

"Beauty and the Beast" required the talents of almost 600 animators, artists and technicians, including all 80 at Walt Disney Animation Studios in Burbank, Calif. MGM Studios, they contributed about 10 minutes of the 90-minute film.

Although the role of the animators in making the film's characters witty, warm and real can't be overemphasized, the actors who provide the voices have a distinct influence on their characters' personalities, looks and sometimes even their prominence in the story.

"You can't draw the characters until you know who is cast. The voice is sort of the soul," said Will Finn, the supervising animator for Cogsworth, a wind-up mantel clock whose voice was provided by David Ogden Stiers of "M.A.S.H." fame.

"Beauty and the Beast" is the fifth classic fairy tale studio has animated. In Disney's adaptation, the beautiful Belle comes by tragic circumstances to the enchanted castle of the Beast, a temperamental prince who must

learn to love and be loved if he is to break the spell he is under. The castle is inhabited by a winning troupe of enchanted objects who function as the beastly master's servants.

Cogsworth and Mrs. Potts keep company with a smooth-talking candelabrum, designed with Maurice Chevalier in mind and vocalized by stage and screen actor Jerry Orbach ("Grines" and "Misdemeanors"). Nine-year-old Bradley Pierce is the voice of the teapot Chip. Mrs. Potts' precocious child.

Actor Robby Benson is the voice of the Beast, and Paige O'Hara speaks for Belle. Like O'Hara, virtually all the actors cast in "Beauty and the Beast" have had extensive stage experience.

The work of the voice actors, who also sing the songs in "Beauty and the Beast," began several months before that of the character animators.

During recording sessions, in which they worked alone without the benefit of interaction with other actors, their performances were videotaped for the animators who wished to see them. (Some prefer to rely completely on their imaginations.) In many cases, the actors' humorisms and expressions wound-up in the animated characters.

The character of Mrs. Potts was in fact created for Lansbury, who expressed an interest in participating in a Disney animated feature after she saw "The Little Mermaid."

"I thought how lovely it would be to be associated with something that will be so widely associated with children," she said. "I just thought, Why not?" Stiers, who auditioned against many others for his part as Cogsworth, notes a "satirical likeness" to himself in Cogsworth, the stuffy, mantel clock who serves as the castle's chief of staff.

AN AMERICAN TAIL: FIEVEL GOES WEST (G). First-time directors Phil Nibbelink and Simon Welles have created a relentlessly fast-paced entertainment that owes more to old Warner Bros. cartoons and live-action Westerns than it does to the previous film. Once plucky Fievel Mousekewitz and his family decide to move West, the story develops into a series of contrived gags and coincidences. "Tail" will

probably please kids who've been parked at the mall-multiplex while their parents attend to holiday shopping. However, small children may feel left behind as the scenes whiz by so quickly, the projector seems stuck in fast-forward mode.

THE ADDAMS FAMILY (PG-13). This visualization of the wicked cartoons Charles Addams wrote decades for the New Yorker is doubtless something to see; but all that visual splendor serves only to point up how lacking this film is in any other ways to hold our interest. Raul Julia and Angela Huston look perfect, but their arch dialogue veers thin rather fast.

CAPE FEAR (R). This is a film as sadistic as its star player. What venomous psychopath Max Cady (played as only Robert De Niro can) does to the lawyer (Nick Nolte) he has a grudge against exactly parallels what director Martin Scorsese

does to his audience. We squirm, we squeal, we squawk — for mercy. Though it's all done with the expert-ness of a contract-killing, it is not something we necessarily feel like applauding.

Computer finesse helps Midler, 'the boys'

Music editor put latest technology to good use

Watch her lips. Is she singing live or isn't she? "For the Boys" supervising music editor Curt Sobel knows for sure.

Sobel, 38, has been music editor on "La Bamba," "The Doors," "Eddie and the Cruisers" and "Taps."

But he says editing Midler's movie was much more complex than any of those because of the variety of music and locations.

Making his job easier was a wizard computer and music editing software program, Post-Pro, that he says revolutionizes the art of editing lip-synce.

"We could expand or compress words and whole sentences," Sobel says.

"Ordinarily you record all music ahead of time, the actor practices lip-synce, and then has playback running through earphones and

monitors, and they try to match."

Instead, Sobel and a computer engineer matched it all by computer, and he says it's so precise you can't tell what's live and what isn't. So Sobel will tell us.

Booze sings," he says, "is all playback." "Come Rain or Come Shine" and "In My Life" are live takes, he says, except for the last line of "In My Life," which was finessed by computer. "The very last line, where she doesn't quite sing the last note, is a playback line done months earlier."

Sobel says Midler "was wonderful, very demanding, very opinionated. She knows what she likes and dislikes, and has no hesitation in letting you know."

Sobel graduated from the University of Michigan and the Berklee College of Music in Boston. Lately, he's been busy composing for the movies.

He scored "Alien Nation," "Backtrack," "Defenseless" and an HBO movie, "Cast a Deadly Spell."

But he says he went back to music editing on "For the Boys" because he wanted to work with Midler and with director Mark Rydell. "Here's a film made from the heart," he says. "Mark is a man who loves his children and he really wanted to make a statement about war and children."

films later. The gritty realism of movies like "The House on 92nd Street," "D.O.A.," "The Killing" and "Naked City" traced their roots to the advances developed in these documentary movies.

But it wasn't a hard sell: World War II was a total war, a war that impassioned everyone.

Films of the era reflect that unity. Sacrifice, a devotion to brotherhood and the team effort became the themes of movies like "Bataan," (1943) "The Story of Dr. Wassell" (1944), "So Proudly We Hail" (1943) and "Guadalcanal Diary" (1943).

Sacrifice was ennobling. And the supreme sacrifice was enacted in movies like "The Purple Heart" (1944) and "They Were Expendable" (1944).

There were inspired performances that, even to this day, linger in the memory like a recurrent dream: There was little Margaret O'Brien as the tearful orphan of the London blitz who is adopted by an American newspaperman (Robert Young) in "Journey for Margaret" (1942). Who can forget the stoic Irene Dunne in "The White Cliffs of Dover" (1944) as the brave woman who loses both a husband in World War I and a son in World War II?

There was unforgettable Skippy Homeier, as the vernal personification of Hitler Youth in "Tomorrow the World" (1944). And, of course, John Wayne battling in various campaigns in "The Fighting Seabee" (1944), "Back to Bataan" (1944), "Flying Tigers" (1942) and "They Were Expendable" (1944).

Jobless claims surge again; factory orders rebound sharply

The Associated Press... WASHINGTON — Seasonal auto layoffs and other industrial cutbacks threw men to half-million workers into the jobless ranks in late November...

The Commerce Department... said factory orders increased 1.9 percent in October to a seasonally adjusted \$242.12 billion...

But much of that gain came from a 55 percent bounce in the volatile Pentagon sector, and reflected little improvement in the sagging consumer market so critical to the economy...

And even with the military boost, demand for factory products in October was below the level reached in July...

As the Treasury chief economic advisor, Michael Boskin, told Congress that the economy is likely to remain sluggish until spring...

Budget Director Richard Darman said Bush would take "strong action" to stimulate a recovery. The claims report also had crated the previously reported decline of 80,000 to 414,000 in the number of new claims...

That's a worrisome number, they said, especially when compared to the fall work average of August and September. When it was a "much, more moderate 400,000..."

Also Thursday, the nation's retailers reported mixed sales results for November, with some of the big chains up to a good start for the Christmas shopping season but others pinched by cautious shoppers...

The claim rate hit 7 percent, that would match the highest level of the recession, when unemployment hit a five-year high of 7 percent in July...

Economists also think Friday's report will show that U.S. companies are still pulling their work force. The number of payroll jobs could tumble by up to 75,000, analysts said.

GNP and GDP — alphabet soup for the economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government this week will push one of the most famous of all economic indicators — the gross national product — out of the spotlight.

In the process, the recession will probably appear much deeper than it had.

Since 1941, the Commerce Department has published the GNP, considered the broadest measure of the country's economic health because it measures the total output of goods and services.

Starting Wednesday, the GNP will not be emphasized. The GDP — gross domestic product — will.

What's the difference?
* The GNP measures all the goods and services produced by workers and capital supplied by U.S. residents or corporations, regardless of location.

* The GDP measures all the goods and services produced by workers and capital located in the United States.

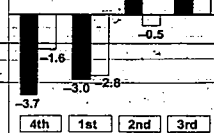
Thus, profits a U.S. company receives from its overseas operations are included in the GNP while profits foreign-owned businesses made in the United States are excluded.

The profits on the overseas operations of U.S. companies are excluded from the GDP while the earnings of foreign companies in the United States are included.

world that hasn't gotten around to making it," said Michael Evans, head of a Washington forecasting firm.

"No one measure is perfect," Evans said, "but a far better measure of how the U.S. economy is doing is what is produced inside our borders rather than what is produced all around the world."

The Commerce Department will still publish the GNP figure, but the first look at GNP in any given quarter will come a month after the comparable GDP report. Most economists said they planned to switch along with the government to emphasizing the GDP.

In practical terms, the change will not make all that much of a difference over the long term. It will mean that U.S. output will be reduced by around \$40 billion each year — out of a total of more than \$5.5 trillion.

However, the change can make a particular quarter look dramatically different, depending on the mix of growth in that period.

For instance, the fourth quarter of 1990 under the old GNP measurement showed the economy dropping at an annual rate of 1.6 percent.

However, a preliminary GDP figure already released by the Commerce Department puts that decline at 3.7 percent.

The first quarter figure for this year under the GNP was a drop of 2.8 percent at an annual rate, compared with 3 percent decline under the GDP.

While the GNP was still declining in the second quarter, at a slight 0.5 percent rate, the GDP showed the economy began growing again, at a rate of 1.2 percent.

Thus, the GDP paints a picture of a recession that was steeper but shorter than under the GNP measurement.

They noted that the official arbiter for when recessions begin and end, the National Bureau of Economic Research, bases its decisions on monthly data and not the quarterly growth rates.

The bureau has designated July 1990 as the starting point for the recession but has yet to pinpoint an ending date.

Economists are split into three camps: One group supports the administration's position that the recession ended in the spring, probably in May, and that the economy has launched into a sustained period of growth.

Another group believes that the recession has not ended and the country is in the 17th month of the downturn, making it the longest slump since World War II.

recession did end in the spring but that the recovery has faltered and will turn down again in the current October-December quarter, producing a double-dip recession.

The government is also switching its base year for measuring price changes from 1982 to 1987 and including data on the economy obtained since the original growth estimates were made.

All of those changes will be disclosed Wednesday, when the government issues its first official GDP report.

Analysts said that even with all the various changes in the economy's favorite benchmark, the argument is likely to continue over where things are headed.

"There was some sort of a jury in the spring but the jury is still out on whether it was a recovery in the true sense of the word," said Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co. "And no matter what these numbers say, the state of the economy at present is not good."

Pan Am's losses may mean gain for others

MIAMI — The airline industry's survivors circled the carcass of Pan American World Airways Wednesday, as federal officials prepared to put the most valuable pieces — the Latin routes — up for auction, possibly as early as Sunday.

But the biggest winner, no matter the outcome of the auction, is American Airlines. On routes to Latin America, Pan Am was the only major challenger to American, which has established a dominant presence in Miami.

The biggest losers: Airline passengers, who will probably face higher fares, particularly on the heavily traveled Miami to New York route.

Even before Pan Am's shutdown Wednesday morning, the government began hunting for carriers to step in temporarily on Pan Am's international routes.

Fearful that Pan Am would not survive the week, officials at the Transportation Department began calling airlines Tuesday after the failure of the Pan Am-Delta deal was revealed in court.

The department issued an emergency notice to the industry, with a Wednesday afternoon deadline, offering to grant temporary rights to Pan Am's routes to Mexico, Central and South America, the Caribbean and Paris.

Seven airlines filed bids for nine temporary routes, with American seeking four Miami routes while United Airlines, American Trans Air and World Airways sought three each. In three cases, American sought additional service to cities it already serves.

The temporary route authorities may provide for service until a bankruptcy court action of Pan Am assets, tentatively scheduled for Sunday, proceeds. From the assets sales will go Pan Am's creditors.

Also for sale at the auction: take-off and landing slots at congested airports, spare parts, ground service equipment, computers and flight simulators.

The government was expected to begin announcing interim route-by-route decisions Thursday. On routes where there are competing bids, decisions could take longer.

"We're not awarding anything to anyone on a permanent basis," said Robert Marx, a Transportation Department spokesman. "But we want to transfer these routes immediately. We're talking about passengers stranded with the holidays coming."

Analysts suspect no one will want all of Pan Am's routes, since no carrier has the stomach or the wallet to mount a serious challenge to American's dominance of Miami International and Latin America.

"American has built up such an overwhelming domination of the Latin American market that in some cases it will not be worthwhile for another U.S. carrier to assume the Pan-Am routes," said Karen Firestone, who watches airline stocks as manager of Fidelity Investments Select Air Transportation Fund.

She also predicted an end to routinely low fares on the Miami-New York route, the fourth busiest air route in the country.

The presence of weak airlines such as Eastern Airlines and Pan Am has had to cut fares to attract passengers, had kept fares low for years.

are low because there's too much capacity, American spokesman said. "If I were an airline, I would want to see fewer flights, not more flights."

Don Pevsner, a Miami attorney and consumer advocate, predicted the cost of flying between South Florida and the Northeast will rise dramatically.

"Watch American Airlines fares to and from Miami bust out of sight," Pevsner said. "Excursion fares will cost more and will be difficult to get because their number will be drastically limited."

Russell Thayer, vice president of the New York consulting firm Airline Capital Associates, said a domino effect that began with Eastern's shutdown in January led quickly to Pan Am's demise.

He said that if Eastern had survived, American would not have taken over its Latin American routes in 1989. Unlike Eastern, American had the money to expand in Latin America, and to acquire some routes already served by Pan Am.

When former Pan Am President Thomas Plasket began implementing a survival strategy based on Latin America, "He went right into the hornet's nest, in a place that was being rapidly developed by an enormous competitor," Thayer said.

Robert Popkin, a Washington lawyer who represents Latin American airlines, said that some Latin carriers are considering seeking bankruptcy court permission to lease Pan Am planes during the upcoming holiday season.

"The Latin carriers are heavily booked at this time of year, and don't know if they can take care of the passengers flying to North America because they don't have the capacity," he said.

In the long run, Popkin said, competing with strong carriers like American and United threatens Latin carriers far more than competing with weaker carriers like Eastern and Pan Am.

He said Pan Am's best routes — to Brazil, Buenos Aires and Caracas — are likely to draw the most interest from U.S. airlines.

Latin carriers that serve less lucrative markets such as Guatemala City, or overcrowded markets such as Costa Rica, could benefit if no one steps in to replace Pan Am, he said.

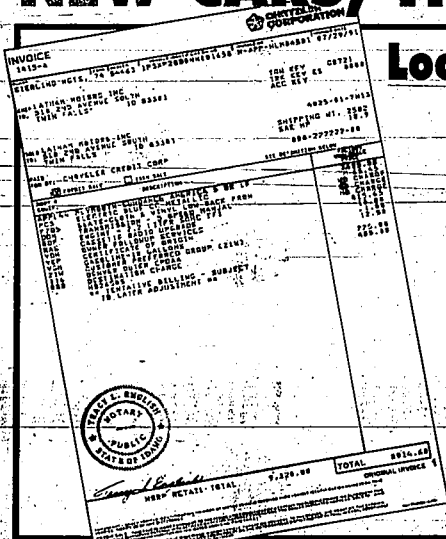

East had one brief opportunity to beat today's game but he muffed it. Instead of doing something positive himself, he encouraged partner to do what he could not do.

West led a dutiful heart Jack, and East signaled pitifully with his 10. This would have been fine had West held a second heart, but he didn't. And when South made the final play of refusing the first trick, the defense was finished.

West shifted gamely to a low spade, and South captured East's jack with his ace. The clubs were started, and even though East took two club tricks, he had lost the timing to beat the game. South lost only two clubs and a heart, chalking up an easy overtrick.


It would have been another story had East made sure of a heart continuation by overtaking West's jack at trick one. If East continues hearts at every opportunity, then with normal play, South is the big favorite to lose his game. (If South guesses the distribution right, he can execute an endplay against East.)

Drama addresses age-old question, 'Is there a Santa Claus?' Yes, Virginia

"Dear Editor, I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in the Sun, it's so.' Please tell me the truth. Is there a Santa Claus?"

So began one of the most famous letters to the editor in history, spurring an answer that became one of the most famous newspaper editorials — that of Frank P. Church, writing the response to Virginia O'Hanlan. It contained the highly quoted line, "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus."

Modern reaction to this piece may range from cynicism to affection, but Andrew J. Fenady is banking on the latter. He is the co-writer and executive producer of "Yes, Virginia, There Is a Santa Claus," airing Sunday, Dec. 8, on ABC. The movie, starring Charles Bronson as Church, Katharine Isobel as Virginia, Richard Thomas as her father and Edward Asner as New York Sun publisher Edward P. Mitchell, dramatizes the story behind the 1897 editorial.

"I added a lot of the newspaper stuff," Fenady explains. "The script originally was more like a Saturday children's show."

That Fenady should be involved with something that may even once have been perceived as a children's show might be surprising, considering that he admits he has a reputation as "kind of a tough-rough guy." Fenady has written and/or produced such television series as "The Rebel" and "Branded," as well as TV movies with such titles as "Mayday at 40,000 Feet!"

One of the many things Fenady waxes rhapsodic about in his current TV movie is the casting.

"The script was the star before Charles Bronson came along," Fenady jokes. "We sent it to him and he loved it."

"I think he really related to (it)," Fenady explains. "It was so against type — he throws only one punch in the whole movie."

Richard Thomas also plays against type — he plays an unemployed Irish immigrant. "We got someone to teach him the manly art of self-defense," Fenady laughs. "He did a lot of the stunts himself."

But Fenady says that the trickiest role to cast was that of Virginia herself.

"We lined up every 8-year-old in (Los Angeles)," he says. "We had a casting director up in Vancouver

(Canada), where we shot, and he asked us to look at a tape of (Isobel). When we saw it, we knew we had found (Virginia)."

Although Fenady found his star in Vancouver, one thing he did not find was Christmasy weather. "We shot in June and July, when it was 95 degrees," he laughs robustly. "We had to use \$40,000 worth of ice, and we literally snowed in Stanley Park and the other places we shot."

Fenady hopes that viewers will be watching this movie for many Christmases to come.

"You really felt like you were doing something worthwhile," Fenady says.

"I think that this is something that will be on for years."

NBC may surrender in Saturday cartoon wars

This time, it looks as if Papa Smurf isn't going to come to the rescue.

It was about a decade ago that those little blue creatures kept NBC from getting out of the Saturday morning children's cartoon business. "The Smurfs" became a huge hit and plans to put on a Saturday version of "Today" went back on the shelf.

Now, the network executives have dusted those plans off and are presenting them to a meeting of some of its affiliate stations this week in Palm Springs, Calif.

It is expected that in the next year or so, NBC will launch a two-hour "Today" that will run Saturday mornings, followed by two hours of programming aimed at a teen-age audience or a slightly younger group that NBC likes to call "twens."

"I think it's a good idea," Arnie Kjelner, general manager of WMAR, NBC's Baltimore affiliate, said before leaving for Palm

Springs. "I don't think we're serving the audience we're going after very well now, and I think there is another audience we could be serving."

A decade ago, CNN was barely a blip on the media radar screen, but it was already getting its biggest ratings on Saturday morning.

In the years since, it has only gotten tougher out there in the world of kiddie TV. Back then, kids had little place to go other than the three networks on Saturday morning to see fresh, new, fairly high-quality cartoons.

Now, with Fox in the Saturday morning game, the Disney and Fox packages on independent stations every afternoon, the Nickelodeon basic cable channel, the Disney premium channel, as well as regular cartoon packages on USA and TBS cable channels, more and more animation on premium channels such as HBO and Showtime, and the increasing proliferation of kids' home videos, there are plenty of alternatives.

In "As the World Turns," Allyson Rice Taylor says she enjoys playing a strong woman with definite ideas of what she wants out of life. Allyson has been playing Connor Jamison for a little over a year now and she says the plot is really beginning to heat up.

Q: Nicollette Sheridan certainly looks good on the tube in "Knots Landing." But is it true that she can't act her way out of a paper bag? — C.W.

A: Sheridan, a former teenage model, drew more press for her choice in husbands than for anything she's ever done on TV. Yes, she's a "Knots Landing" regular (she plays Paige) who squares off with William Devane. But she's in no sense considered an acting heavyweight. Things may change, however. Her marriage to hunky Harry Hamlin of "L.A. Law" has apparently stiffened Nicollette's already ramrod posture. She'll soon be seen surrounded by a top-notch cast in "Noises Off," a feature starring Carol Burnett and Michael Caine.

Q: Isn't the career of Jerry Lewis going down the tubes? He doesn't seem to get hired for anything other than TV telethons. — Y.O.

A: Jerry Lewis remains a world-renowned comedian — the French still love him. But in Hollywood, Lewis has had to face tough reality. He's a performer on the other side of 65. Jerry's most recent setbacks include the shelving of a major stage revival of the musical "Sugar Babies," in which Lewis was supposed to have been the star. (A major investor pulled out at the last minute.) And Jerry's biggest movie deal — a sequel to his 1963 comedy "The Nutty Professor" — is going nowhere. Things look grim, but don't count Lewis out yet. He's a remarkably resilient character.

Q: I was quite surprised to see former President Jimmy Carter at the ceremonies for the opening of the Reagan Library. Wouldn't you guess there's no love lost between the two ex-chief executives? — A.A.

A: Carter didn't want to attend

and was in Africa poll-watching during the Zambian elections. However, Lou Wasserman, a millionaire and big Democratic fund raiser acted as mediator, and someone else offered Carter the use of his private jet to fetch him. So Carter finally agreed to attend.

Q: So much has been printed about Grace Kelly's very busy love life back in New York during her modeling and early acting days. I can't help but wonder, how come all this didn't emerge at that time or during her Hollywood heyday? — G.E.

A: The reason's twofold: First off, the morals of the day precluded any shockers printed in the press regarding Grace's active sexual life. This, coupled with her rather prim, lady-like image, worked in her favor. One man about town in her circle told me, "Sure, we all knew that Grace was sleeping around and was always seeking to further her career. But she was nice, and we had a code among us back then. We may have known — but nobody talked."

Q: An article about Gene Tierney, the late glamorous movie star, suggests a possible feud between her and Hedy Lamarr. Were they rivals professionally, or romantically? — H.D.

A: Any friction between these two actresses was based more on coincidence than a feud: Their careers contained a series of ironies beginning when Tierney, then a Hollywood newcomer, was image-modeled as a sort of Lamarr clone, with much the same exotic look and makeup. Next came the fact that Hedy turned down the script of "Laura," which became one of Gene's biggest hits. Lastly, both were married to Howard Lee, the Texas oil man (nbt at the same time, of course).

Q: Can you tell us something about Rebecca DeMornay, the sexy actress who ignited the screen as a prostitute Tom Cruise in "Risky

Business"? Has she dropped out of sight? — Y.V.

A: It sometimes seemed that way to Rebecca. After making a big splash in "Risky Business," she made a couple of notable flicks including "Runaway Train" and "The Trip to Bountiful." She married Hollywood screenwriter Bruce Wagner. Then things came apart. The marriage went bust. Rebecca's roles — in a remake of "And God Created Women" and "Dealers" — went nowhere. A tornado lifted her trailer, with her still in it, on the location of "The Slugger's Wife." But Rebecca endured and bounced back in the TV miniseries, "An Inconvenient Woman," and on the big screen opposite Kurt Russell in "Backdraft." Rebecca feels she's on the right track.

Q: What happened to the lawsuit Esther Williams was going to bring against the fancy Los Angeles country club that threw her out because she was wearing pants? — E.J.

A: Williams decided against calling in her lawyers. When asked why, she explained, "Zsa Zsa has ruined suing for all the rest of us." The onetime MGM glamour girl, now 68, has a close family despite marriages and divorces. Her two sons, daughter and stepson surprised her with a moon-lit supper birthday celebration for family and friends earlier this year.

Q: I caught Burt Reynolds on a TV talk show, and he really looked great with his receding hairline and a touch of gray at the temples. It sure didn't look like a toupee to me. — K.D.

A: It's known in entertainment industry circles that Burt Reynolds wears hairpieces of various styles in his public appearances. If they appear more natural looking and less bushy than previously, it's a tribute to Burt's taste in toupees, not in any sudden hair growth, and that seems to be the bald truth.

CBS confirms 17% of Olympics ad time unsold, but professes no alarm

NEW YORK (AP) — The CBS Television Network confirmed Monday it is still seeking buyers for 17 percent of the commercial time in its coverage of the 1992 Winter Olympic Games, which start in about two months.

But CBS spokesman George Schweitzer said the network was confident that it would find buyers for all of the time at "good pricing."

CBS has agreed to pay \$243 million for the right to broadcast coverage of the games. It plans to provide about 116 hours of programming from the games over 16 days starting Feb. 8 in Albertville, France.

The Wall Street Journal, which reported on the unsold inventory in Monday's edition, said TV ad time

was all but sold out months in advance of previous Olympic games and that analysts expect CBS will lose money on the 1992 games.

Schweitzer declined to comment on whether the network expects to make a profit on the games, but said that ad sales are "on schedule."

He conceded, however, that the depressed state of the economy and sluggish demand for ad time in sports programming has made it more difficult to sell the Olympic commercials.

"The value of the Olympics has changed. It is still the premiere television event. What has changed in four years is the advertising economy," he said.

He said "a lot of advertisers" are

still considering plans for buying time in the Olympics, and that CBS is selling time on the games in combination with time in other sports programs and its regular prime time schedule, which has attracted higher ratings than NBC and ABC for the season to date.

He said CBS has rejected proposals to sell the time for less than the network feels it is worth. Industry sources said CBS is asking for an average of \$250,000 for a 30-second commercial in Olympic coverage carried in the prime evening viewing hours. Schweitzer declined to comment on that estimate.

"Seventeen percent is not a long way to go between now and the Olympics," Schweitzer said.

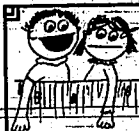

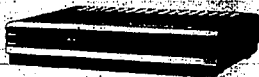

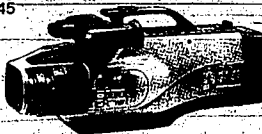
