Freed 5 help light yule tree

WASHINGTON — Five former American hostages — heralded as "brave and wonderful men" — stood beside President and Mrs. Bush Thursday as the president illuminated the national Christmas tree and officially ushered in the holiday season.

"In behalf of our loving country I say to them... welcome home," Bush said before a large crowd that had gathered on the Ellipse, the broad expanse of lawn behind the White House, for the annual lighting ceremony.

"These men have come out of darkness," Bush said, adding that even in captivity "they were guided by that stubborn spark that cruelty could not extinguish: the spark of the human spirit."

The freed men — Terry Anderson, Allan Steen, Joseph Cicippio, Thomas Sutherland and Boissan Jon Turner — and their families attended the outdoor pageant and returned to the White House for a Christmas party.

Earlier, they met at the White House with Bush, U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar and U.N. special envoy Giandomenico Picco, who were honored with presidential medals for their role in the men's release.

The lighting of the tree, Bush said, "should serve as a reminder of what they and their companions... have done to light our nation's soul."

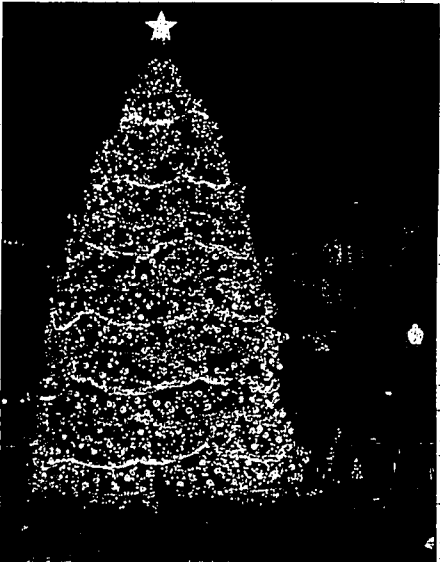
For a few moments it appeared as if the tree would remain unlighted. Anderson, at Bush's urging, flicked the switch that was supposed to turn on the lights — but nothing happened. Bush shook the switch box, then pushed the switch himself a few times before the tree finally exploded into light.

Before the pageant, Bush presented Perez de Cuellar with the nation's "highest civilian honor," the Presidential Medal of Freedom, and to his deputy, Pico, the Presidential Award for Exceptional Service.

In accepting, Perez de Cuellar called the ex-hostages "brave and wonderful men, who at this moment understand more fully than we possibly can the true meaning of freedom."

Idaho may get Taiwan hot waste

IDAHO FALLS — A federal court has ordered the Department of Energy to take another look at the possibility of storing high-level nuclear waste from Taiwan at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus says Idaho isn't interested in taking it.

DOE wants to send spent nuclear fuel to the Savannah River Site in South Carolina, as it has since the mid-1980s. But in a ruling Monday, a federal court in Washington, D.C., ordered Energy to study other options for storing the waste, including storing it at INEL, an erstwhile Idaho nuclear research center.

Andrus and others have been battling the Department of Energy over shipping nuclear waste to INEL for storage.

"If it's for storage, no place in the United States, with the international situation as it is, should accept foreign waste," Andrus said.

"To bring it into America for storage from overseas, is ridiculous."

Andrus said nuclear waste should be stored on the site where it is generated because even though the risk of an accident involving a nuclear waste shipment is small, it's still a risk.

The ruling involves 118 spent nuclear fuel rods from a research reactor in Taiwan. The spent fuel is categorized as high-level waste.

The Energy Department planned to ship the waste from Taiwan to a port at Hampton Roads, Va., and then truck it to Savannah River, a defense plant on the South Carolina-Georgia border.

In an environmental study completed in June the agency considered shipping the waste to ports in Oregon, North Carolina and South Carolina, and then trucking the waste to Savannah River, but made no mention of the possibility of storing it in Idaho.

That's one of several flaws in a "legally defective" DOE study, according to U.S. District Judge Royce Lamberth. Ruling on a lawsuit filed by the Sierra Club, Lamberth said the DOE study did not mention fuel from Taiwan until it rewrites its environmental study.

The new study will have to look at the health risks of shipping the waste from Taiwan, and also explain why the DOE does not want to store the waste in Idaho.

Since the mid-1980s, some 1,500 spent fuel rods have been sent from the Taiwan reactor to Savannah River. Energy Department Phil Keif said Wednesday. Keif didn't know if Energy planned to rewrite its environmental study on the Taiwan waste.

The federal agency is considering a 10-year extension of its foreign shipments policy. Over that

Backers, foes of 1% duel over tax equity

—BOISE — One percent initiative backer Ron Rankin compared Idaho's tax structure to someone with a bad toothache.

One of a dozen speakers Thursday at a tax equity summit summoned by Gov. Cecil Andrus, Rankin said favorable comparisons of Idaho's tax system to other states are like saying, "If I've got a bad toothache, and the guy next to me has an abscess, I'm supposed to feel better."

"Well, that guy with an abscess isn't

going to make my toothache feel any better."

Rankin and fellow 1 percent supporter Rachel Gilbert, a former Republican state senator from Boise, beat the drums for property tax relief. But during a freewheeling debate over Idaho's tax structure, most speakers supported the current balance while suggesting small ways to improve or "tweak" the system.

Andrus, who called a who's who of public officials and business leaders together to talk about Idaho's tax structure on the eve of the Legislature, lauded

Idaho's tax structure as one of the fairest in the nation.

It's divided roughly into thirds, with property, sales and income taxes sharing the load almost equally.

"Idaho should feel very comfortable with its tax system," said Robert J. Kleine, a senior economist with Public Sector Consultants of Lansing, Mich. "I'd say other states are going through root canals and Idaho has a little teeth cleaning."

But senior citizens and large landowners such as farmers tend to favor property tax relief because they feel they pay a

disproportionate share of taxes. And in years when potato prices fall to \$2.50 per 100 pounds, as they have this year, "farmers can't afford to pay increases in spending," Gilbert said.

Property taxes may provide a dependable source of income, but they should not be relied on so heavily for public education, added David Bivens, an Idaho Farm Bureau Federation public affairs officer and a former Republican state senator from Emmet. "Farmers shouldn't be responsible for putting our children through school."

The best tax is the tax someone else is.

Yeltsin ends Gorbachev's dream

MOSCOW — By creating a commonwealth, Boris Yeltsin is seeking to bring the disparate republics together in many of the same initial areas his rival Mikhail Gorbachev had proposed. But with one major difference: no created "center."

Yeltsin had been fighting the central government for months, and finally lost patience and ended the worn out Soviet Union-Gorbachev

had tried to salvage.

With his Commonwealth of Independent States, Yeltsin has moved to keep the Soviet Union's commonwealth together, but out of the hands of the central government. He no longer considers capable of taking care of it.

In a major address Thursday, Yeltsin told Russian lawmakers that central government structures could not be reformed.

"Just the opposite, the command system threw its last resources into the fight to preserve its omnipotence; it became the main obstacle to the reforms," Yeltsin told Russian lawmakers, who then overwhelmingly backed his plan.

Yeltsin, ending the central government, Yeltsin did away with the remnants of the Communist authority, which refused to die. But he has stressed that the commonwealth would retain a common armed forces, centralized

U.S. calls conference on aiding Soviets

WASHINGTON — President Bush will convene an international conference, early next month to coordinate the flow of food, medicine, fuel and shelter to the people of the collapsing Soviet Union as winter closes in, the White House said Thursday.

The industrial Western countries, and oil-rich Arab kingdoms and the

newly emerging democracies in Eastern and Central Europe all will be invited along with worldwide financial institutions, Secretary of State James A. Baker III said in elaborating on the move in a speech at Princeton University.

Bush, meanwhile, signed legislation on Thursday to provide \$400 million in Pentagon funds to help the Soviets dismantle their nuclear and other weapons, and \$100 million for

transportation of humanitarian assistance to the Soviets.

As the Soviet Union splinters, Baker pledged the United States would work with republics that are committed to democratic principles but would not help those on an opposite course.

Georgia, for instance, is creating an authoritarian government, and Azerbaijan is arming itself for war against other republics, Baker said.

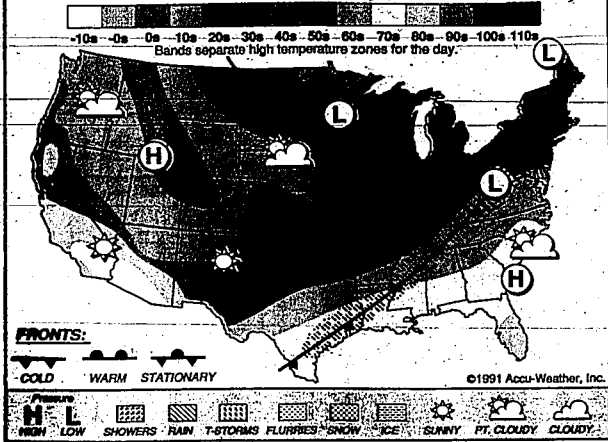

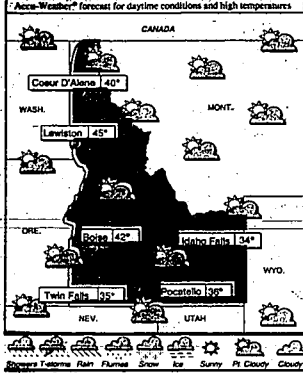

Continental, TWA discussing possible merger

NEW YORK (AP) — Trans World Airlines and Continental Airlines, troubled carriers that have held unsuccessful merger talks with rivals, said Thursday they are now talking marriage to each other.

There are no specifics. It's just some very exploratory talks. Continental spokesman Art Kent said.

Analysts said the two could make a good fit, blending Continental's extensive domestic route system with TWA's collection of trans-Atlantic routes.

Continental is in bankruptcy and TWA is ready-to-file-for-Chapter-11 protection from creditors.

going to pay," said Russ Westerberg, a tax lobbyist and former Democratic state representative from Soda Springs.

"With property taxes funding only 25 percent of the school budget, it shouldn't be that big of a burden."

Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans said the state has a \$329 million backlog in school construction needs; a \$50 million matching fund has failed to keep pace.

Terril Donich, superintendent of schools in Twin Falls, said the growth of students has outstripped funding now new schools.

"Every classroom is full," he said, adding that his district uses 12 portable classrooms. "If our bond issue fails again, we figure we've got to use three to five new portables each year."

The Twin Falls School District will ask voters to approve a \$9 million bond issue election in May to build a new elementary school and make other improvements.

Noting that a Boise State University study showed that education spending should be the No. 1 priority, Donich said, "If we want to have better education, that's fine, but we're going to have to pay for it—it's really simple concept."

decade, up to 481 foreign waste shipments could come to Idaho and the Savannah River site.

But it's possible that the DOE will study the overseas shipments in more detail, including a closer look at the environmental risks, or not adopt the 10-year foreign waste policy at all.

"The foreign nuclear fuel is either made in the United States, or made with American highly enriched uranium."

Energy wants to take back the spent fuel, which still contains highly enriched uranium, for security reasons. It wants to store the fuel so foreign nations could not recover the uranium and use it in nuclear weapons.

Weather summary

High winds blowing through the panhandle and north-central Idaho much of Thursday were expected to ease by this morning, the National Weather Service said.

The peak gust at Lewiston was 63 mph, which occurred around 1:30 a.m. P.S.T. Strong winds were common from the eastern portions of Oregon and Washington, across northern Idaho and into western Montana.

Those strong, gusty winds moved into the Magic Valley late Thursday afternoon as the storm front passed across the state. Snow and dust were stirred up during their passage, making highway travel hazardous in some areas.

Light precipitation was widespread over the state.

Afternoon temperatures were mainly in the 30s and 40s. The extremes ran from 32 degrees at Halley to 50 at Lewiston.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 85 degrees at Naples and Fort Myers, Fla., and McAllen, Texas. The lowest was 10 degrees below zero at Pinedale, Wyo.

Rain splatters much of nation; temperature marks fall

Rain splashed much of the United States on Thursday, with high winds over the Great Lakes, Rockies and Pacific Northwest and flash flood warnings in eastern Tennessee. In northern Alaska, a blizzard raged.

In the Midwest, high temperature records fell or were matched in half a dozen cities.

Rain at 1 p.m. EST extended over the Great Lakes and much of the lower Ohio Valley, much of the Mississippi Valley and northeast Texas. Rising waters threatened an isolated earthen dam on Oosterneck Creek in Tennessee, officials said.

A flash flood warning was in effect for Monroe County in eastern Tennessee. A storm warning was posted for blizzard conditions for the Bering Strait coast and St. Lawrence Island in Alaska. Storm watches were in effect for northern Seward Peninsula and the lower Kobuk

Valley. High wind warnings covered the southern Seward Peninsula and eastern Norton Sound section of Alaska.

Cale force wind warnings were posted over Lake Erie, Lake Huron and Lake St. Clair. Snow advisories were in effect for parts of eastern Idaho.

High wind warnings were posted over the eastern slopes of the Washington Cascades. Similar warnings were posted over parts of Wyoming.

Heavier rainfall totals of the 6 hours ending at 1 p.m. EST included .66 inch at Fayetteville, Ark., .63 at Mason City, Iowa, and .63 at Wausau, Wis.

control of nuclear weapons, and a coordinated banking and financial system.

Gorbachev's proposed Union Treaty, recycled after the coup, would have kept central control over the nuclear arsenal as well as the military, atomic energy, and over coordinating the collapsing economy. But even after the failed August coup, Gorbachev clung to the idea of preserving a commanding role for a central government, which has been disgraced and discredited for its part in trying to overthrow him.

But during months of tedious negotiations, Gorbachev could not persuade the distrustful republics to sign his proposal. They had declared independence after the botched coup, and wanted to keep it.

"We were literally beginning to sink down in various negotiations...but we weren't cut off completely. All that took on a character of some sort of sick eternity," Yeltsin told the lawmakers.

The talks kept Gorbachev in the political arena, but the country was collapsing. The foreign exchange bank was insolvent, the stores were empty, and the army restless.

Republics began withholding goods from each other. Blockades were imposed. Wars were being fought between desperate ethnic groups and the central government was powerless to stop the bloodshed.

"The only possible formula was found for the life of the new circumstances: Commonwealth of Independent States, rather than a state in which no one was independent," Yeltsin said.

While Gorbachev tried to breathe life into obsolete union structures,

Yeltsin returned to a centuries-old common Slavic heritage of Russia, Ukraine and Byelorussia as his starting point.

Yeltsin scrapped the word "union" with its implication of tight links, and used a new word in the Soviet context — "commonwealth" with its idea of sharing and friendship.

The agreement is a foundation for dynamic development of a new type of ties between the sovereign states. An end has been put to the main obstacle to the union center, which proved incapable of ridding itself of the traditions of the old system," Yeltsin told his legislature.

Yeltsin secured in two days what Gorbachev had failed to obtain after months of threats — Ukraine's consensus to preserve its links with Russia and Byelorussia.

"The Slavic heart of the commonwealth does not appear to have any other republics, and Armenia, which rejected Gorbachev's Union Treaty, quickly announced it would join the commonwealth.

Kazakhstan and the four Central Asian republics of Kirgizia, Turkmenia, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan met to decide whether to join. Yeltsin offered to fly to Kazakhstan for talks on the new commonwealth.

And Yeltsin has won a nod of approval from the United States, whose ambassador to Moscow says Washington must now deal with Yeltsin.

Yeltsin and the other commonwealth leaders have yet to decide what to do about Gorbachev, who has yet to signal that he is ready to leave the Kremlin. But the centralized system that has blocked the chances for his union are gone.

Wholesale prices fall; retail sales up barely

WASHINGTON (AP) — The faltering economy kept wholesale prices under control in November, while retail sales managed a slight gain, the government said Thursday.

Merchants resorted to aggressive price-cutting to lure pre-Christmas shoppers into stores.

The Bush administration told Congress that the economy, after besting growth weakly in the final three months of this year and predicted growth would remain sluggish for several months.

Private economists generally agreed with that assessment, although the most pessimistic continued to insist that the economy may yet topple into another recession, especially if the Federal Reserve does not do more to cut interest rates to spur demand.

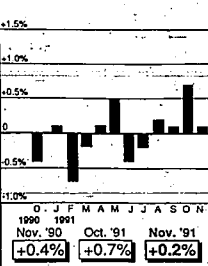
Economists viewed Thursday's reports as a green light for further easing by the central bank. Some said another reduction in rates is likely Friday, after the government releases its November retail price report. That report was expected to show that inflation well-behaved at the retail level as well.

The Labor Department said its Producer Price Index for finished goods fell 0.4 percent in November, a lackluster 0.3 percent in November.

For finished goods

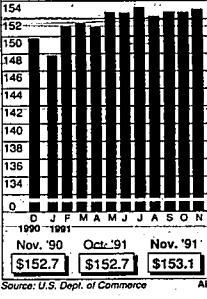
Seasonally adjusted change from prior month

Analysis said the tiny gain, which followed a flat October performance, did nothing to change their view that consumers, worried about daily reports of job layoffs, would keep Christmas spending under tight control.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attention, whistleblowers:

You can stop sending documents over the transom. Forget about disguising your voices over telephone hotlines. Just find a computer with a modem, give yourself a secret password and maybe a pseudonym — and dial 202-225-5527.

The House Government Operations subcommittee on government information, justice and agriculture is bringing whistleblowing into the electronic age.

Call the number and your computer will be linked to the subcommittee's Whistleblower Bulletin Board, which went on line Thursday.

Anyone with knowledge of government fraud, waste and abuse is

welcome to call and have congressional investigators check out the complaint.

Anyone with access to a personal computer with a modem can send messages any day, any hour, said the subcommittee chairman, Rep. Bob Wise, D-W.Va.

The committee will check for messages daily and will get back to callers, whether they use their real name or want to be known as Daffy Duck.

"The most important feature of the board is the ability to receive computer files and messages in an environment that permits continuing communications, while fully protecting the identity of those providing information," Wise said.

Michael Boskin, the president of the Congressional Budget Office, told Congress Thursday that "the data available thus far for the fourth quarter suggests that growth, if any, will be slight."

Boskin testified along with Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady and Budget Director Richard Darman before the Senate Finance Committee. Democrats urged the administration to join with them in offering middle-class tax cuts to jump-start the economy.

Low inflation remains the one silver lining for the economy. Through the first 11 months of the year, prices at the wholesale level have risen at an annual rate of just 0.2 percent. That was far below last year's 5.6 percent increase as retreating world oil prices and the weak economy have combined to give Americans the best price news since 1986.

Analysts expect consumer inflation for November, to be reported Friday, would show a modest increase as well — of around 0.3 percent. Some said this might trigger another round of credit easing by the Federal Reserve.

For November, food prices at the wholesale level actually fell by 0.1 percent, reflecting a big 12.4 percent drop in fresh fruit prices and smaller declines for meat, poultry, fish and eggs. The food price decreases were

offer somewhat by a big 23.6 percent jump in vegetable costs, which was blamed in part on the white fly infestation in California.

Energy prices were unchanged in November, their best showing since a decline in July, as a 0.7 percent drop in electricity costs offset price increases for gasoline, natural gas and home heating oil.

Excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, the so-called underlying rate of inflation edged up 0.3 percent in November. This moderate increase came in spite of rather hefty jumps of 1.3 percent for passenger cars and 1.2 percent for tobacco products.

Authorities see rising use of LSD

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — More than two decades after Timothy Leary urged flower children to "turn on, tune in, drop out," authorities say U.S. teenagers are increasingly following his advice.

They're gobbling LSD, now a cheap and easy-to-find drug.

"I never really died away, it just seems like it's been rediscovered," said Maurice Brown, a spokesman for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration in San Francisco. "It's fairly inexpensive and it's another high, something different, and they are trying it."

The agency sponsored a conference in San Francisco this week on the hallucinogenic drug, and released data showing a steady climb in the number of "acid" related arrests and hospital visits among teens.

The average "hit" of LSD — short for lysergic acid diethylamide 25 — costs about \$5 and can dip down to as little as \$1, heightening its appeal to cash-short teenagers, according to the agency.

However, some drug researchers dispute the DEA's claim that teenage LSD use is on the rise.

"I think they are overblowing it," said Gant Galloway, a researcher with the Haight-Asbury Detoxification Clinic. "We're not seeing a big increase."

Dee Gagnon, director of admissions at Oakland's Thunder Road teen drug and alcohol treatment center, agreed.

LSD, which can intensify feelings and cause hallucinations, was popular among the hippie generation of the 1960s. Discovered by Swiss chemist Albert Hoffman in 1938, it was first mass-produced by Augustus Stanley Owsley III of Berkeley, a counterculture legend for the purity of his product.

Today's acid appears to be much weaker, according to federal officials. While the average dose in the 1960s was about 250 micrograms, the average dose now is 100 micrograms, or less.

Trial targeted Kennedy, attorney says

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Sen. Edward Kennedy was the real target of the prosecutor in William Kennedy Smith's rape trial, Smith's lawyer said Thursday.

But he said she blundered by putting the senator on the stand. Roy Black, basking in his victory, also said Smith joined his family in prayers for his accuser after he was acquitted Wednesday.

"When we went back to the house, we said a number of prayers," Black said, "and one of them was for her." He felt she had a tough time. We felt she was disturbed. Will has no bitterness toward her. Part of the prayer was that she be able to get her life together and start a new life with her child."

A Kennedy family friend, Jesuit seminarian Charles O'Byrne, led the session, which also included "a prayer

for Will to put his life back together," Black said.

Black maintained that the Kennedys' legendary status led authorities to prosecute the case and the decision backfired. "I tend to think it wouldn't have gone as far as it did if he wasn't a Kennedy," Black said. "They put Will on trial, but they really wanted to prosecute Ted."

"People may criticize Ted Kennedy. But when he comes into a courtroom and sits 10 feet from the jurors, they can't help but be impressed. This is a piece of American history."

Black said prosecutor Moira Lasch's fatal mistake was calling the senator as a witness. "I was watching those jurors. They were transfixed. They had tears in their eyes."

Kennedy testified about taking his nephew and son Patrick to a nightclub where Smith met the woman who said he raped her a short time hours later. But he also reminded jurors of the Kennedys' tragic family history.

Black acknowledged that Smith had the best defense money could buy. "I feel all over the country for this case, William Smith was fortunate. He had a family that could provide the money to do these kinds of things or he would be in prison."

Unequal justice? No, Black said. "It just reflects our

society. We are a capitalist society. For Black and his legal team, Thursday was a day for basking in the limelight. TV crews crowded his office and phones rang. The lawyer refused to surrender to exhaustion and appeared on virtually every major TV network.

On Wednesday, a four-woman, two-man jury acquitted his 31-year-old client in 77 minutes of deliberations. Across town at the state prosecutor's office, the mood Thursday was dismal. Palm Beach State Attorney David Bludworth was out of town but issued a statement praising Mrs. Lasch and her co-counsel Ellen Roberts, calling Mrs. Lasch "one of the finest prosecutors I have seen in my 20 years of experience."

Mrs. Lasch was making no comments. She had declined to speak to the media throughout the trial.

Most jurors also shied away from public comments. One who did speak, Lea Hays, said she drew significance from the fact that the dress Smith's accuser wore the night of the incident wasn't torn or stained — a point Smith's lawyers hammered at.

"The dress was an issue for me, no evidence on the dress," Hays said. Bludworth said he had no doubt the charges of sexual battery and battery against Smith by the 30-year-old woman should have been prosecuted. "There is absolutely no question that the evidence met the standard of probable cause to file the charges."

Despite public criticism of Mrs. Lasch's style, Black praised her as an opponent. "I don't like Mrs. Lasch," he said. "We don't even say good morning to each other. But I think she was a worthy adversary. She was tough, aggressive and it would be a serious mistake for anyone to underestimate that woman."

Her most potent witness, he said, was the accuser.

"Her testimony was the most dramatic I've ever seen, virtually impossible to cross-examine," he said. "Whoever prepared (her) for her testimony deserves a supporting Oscar. As one lawyer to another, I take my hat off to them."

The comment raised the question: Was Smith heavily coached? Was Smith his colleague, Mark Seiden, insisted there was minimal preparation of their star witness.

"We really didn't need to do anything with him," said Black. "I told him where I was going to begin and end. ... The question was whether he would survive cross-examination."

Black was asked if he was satisfied that his client doesn't have "a problem" with women, a quote once attributed to Smith's cousin Max Kennedy.

Spacecraft finds huge windstorms

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A satellite launched by a space shuttle has discovered surprisingly violent, continent-size windstorms in a rarely studied part of the atmosphere nicknamed the "ignorosphere," a scientist said Thursday.

"They're like large ocean waves. They're very large — the size of the United States" and bigger, said Paul Hays, scientist in charge of one of 10 instruments on the Upper Atmosphere Research Satellite.

The \$740 million satellite was launched from Discovery on Sept. 15. It detected the global-scale windstorms 30 to 60 miles above Earth's surface when Hays' instrument started fully operating on Nov. 6 and 7, he said during the American Geophysical Union's fall meeting.

An ocean wave is relatively short in height on the open sea. But as it approaches a beach, the wave becomes taller and eventually breaks on shore. Hays said the newly detected "that big" windstorms are somewhat similar.

Weather in the lower atmosphere — called the troposphere — generates small wind waves that become bigger and bigger as they spiral upward through the stratosphere. Thin air in the next layer — the mesosphere — acts like a beach, making the wind waves break in turbulent 200-mile windstorms 600 to 6,000 miles wide, Hays said.

But the air that high is 1 million times thinner than at Earth's surface, so a person standing in the high-altitude wind wouldn't even feel them, he added.

The biggest storm spotted by the satellite stretches from western Australia across southern Africa and halfway across the Atlantic Ocean.

The mesosphere has been known as the "ignorosphere" because it is too high to be reached by airplanes and too low to be studied by most spacecraft, said Hays, chairman of atmospheric, oceanic and space science at the University of Michigan.

Stroke not expected to impare columnist

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Syndicated newspaper columnist James J. Kilpatrick is recovering from a mild stroke he suffered last week.

Kilpatrick, 71, was stricken while traveling to the Gridiron Club dinner in Washington. He spent several days at Culpeper Memorial Hospital in Culpeper, 50 miles southwest of Washington, before returning Wednesday to his home in Charleston, S.C.

He said he suffered some paralysis on his right side that impaired his speech and the movement of his right hand. He said doctors have told him he should be fully recovered in six to nine months.

Nation Mideast talks not producing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israeli and Arab negotiators registered faint progress Thursday in Mideast peace talks, but all sides agreed to a second week of meetings.

"Cautiously optimistic" was how Israeli's chief spokesman Benjamin Netanyahu summed up his country's views of the first round of talks which began Tuesday.

He said the Israelis would stay until the middle of next week and would seek to convene the next round some where in the Middle East — a demand so far rejected by the Arabs.

Another Israeli official predicted the talks would recess next week and not resume until mid-January.

For the third straight day, Israeli officials met in separate State Department rooms with delegations from Lebanon and Syria. The Arab side again staked claims to lands held by Israel. Israel again rejected calls for an unconditional return of territory and proposed, instead, peace treaties with Lebanon and Syria.

"Again no progress today to report to you," said Syrian negotiator Muwaffak Allaf emerging from three hours of talks with Israel.

Nonetheless, they agreed to meet again Monday, Netanyahu said Syria's approach hinted at some flexibility and "I think that's progress."

The attempt to end 43 years of animosity in the Middle East began with mainly ceremonial talks in Madrid Oct. 30-Nov. 4. The second round, devoted to bilateral issues, opened here on Tuesday.

Syria wants Israel to withdraw from the Golan Heights, which it captured in the 1967 Mideast war. In return, said Allaf, Syria is willing to offer peace "and all the attributes to that peace" — an apparent reference to Israel's accusations that Syria is unwilling to consider a full peace agreement with the Jewish state.

But the issue is somewhat of a "what comes first — the chicken or the egg" question.

Israeli negotiator Josef Ben-Aharon said Syria must first accept Israel's legitimacy in the region by agreeing to a full peace, and then the sides could negotiate about territory.

The Israelis also raised the plight of Syria's 4,000 Jews, saying their basic human rights were being denied. Syria refused to discuss the matter, saying it was an internal matter.

Scientists make virus in test tube

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers say they have created a virus in a test tube, an advance that could help in the search for new treatments for the common cold and for other little-understood viruses.

A team at the school of medicine at the State University of New York at Stony Brook reports Friday in the journal Science that polio virus formed itself in a test tube after they mixed components of a polio viral particle with some of the proteins and enzymes from a human cancer cell.

Neither the virus nor the cell was intact at the beginning of the experiment, but at the end, whole, fully active viruses appeared, the researchers said.

"This is the first time that a virus has been grown in a cell-free environment," said team leader Eckard Wimmer. The process is much simpler than other techniques used to study of viruses, he said, and is expected to give insights into previously hidden areas of the viral life cycle.

Prior to the SUNY experiment, it was thought that viruses could reproduce themselves only in whole, intact cells.

Angry dinner guest pleads no contest

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A man who LOAGUE attacked his hosts after learning of the racist name of their cat pleaded no contest to battery and was placed on two years' probation.

Keovan Thompson was a guest of two women at their home last month when he noticed their black cat, police said.

"I hope this doesn't offend you — my cat's name is Nigger," one of the white women told Thompson, according to police Officer Phil Quarunaro.

Thompson, who is black, then tried to choke one of the women, and grabbed a knife and lunged at the other, police said. Neither woman was seriously hurt.

Van Nuys Municipal Court Judge Kenneth Freeman ordered Thompson, 26, of Canoga Park to perform 100 hours of community service, no contest with no plea and never to use force or violence on anyone.

Aspin says Bush hasn't followed through in Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush has failed to follow through on putting Saddam Hussein out of the nuclear weapons business, and Iraq may yet succeed in acquiring an atomic arsenal, House Armed Services Committee Chairman Les Aspin said Thursday.

Bush, Aspin said, "is playing a game of threat and terror" by failing to follow through on his earlier warnings to Baghdad. "That sends the wrong signals to a despot like Saddam, and all the would-be Saddams," he said.

At the same time, Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Claiborne Pell issued a staff report on the continued suffering of Iraq's Kurdish minority and called for limited U.S. military aid to Saddam's opponents to enable them to defend themselves.

Pell, citing widespread sanctions busting through Iran, Turkey and Jordan, also called for stricter enforcement of the trade barrier.

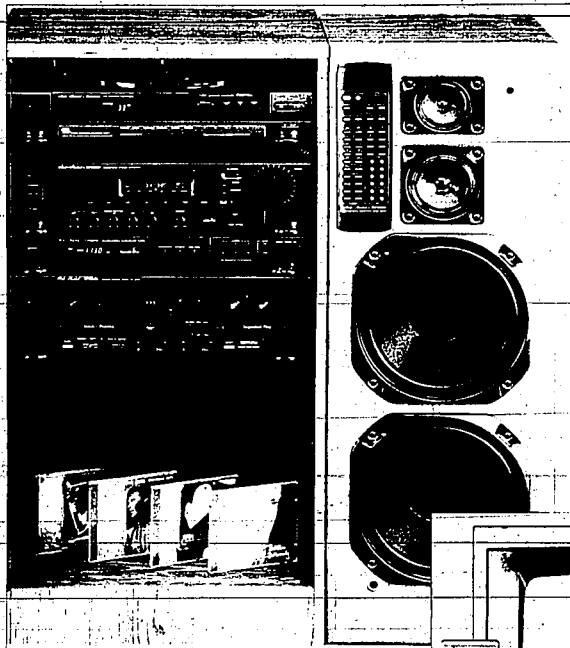

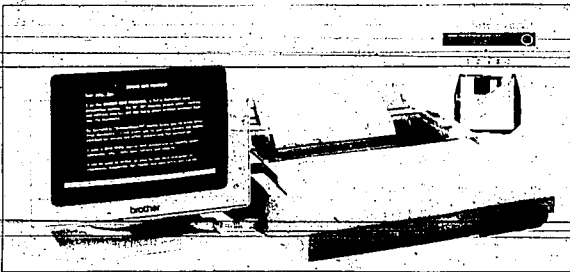

Keepers of Kennedy flame have fumbled their torch

William Kennedy Smith may have been judged innocent by a jury, but the tawdry events in Florida have assured one thing:

The Kennedy legacy has reversed itself.

It's been an article of faith for most Americans since John Kennedy was elected president that the best and the brightest-Americans had an obligation to lead, and that by that leadership they would inspire the country to great things.

The Kennedys' politics long since went out of style for most Americans, but the legend has lived on.

John Kennedy's ideas - Medicare, Medicaid, Head Start, the Peace Corps, food stamps, the Civil Rights Acts of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 - are so much a part of America 28 years after his passing that even conservatives support them as a matter of routine.

Check any list of the most admired Americans of the past half-century, and you'll find John and Robert Kennedy near the top, even after revisionist historians have gotten through with them.

The Kennedy legacy survived JFK's dalliances. It survived Chappaquiddick. It may not survive Palm Beach.

The national fascination with this rape case goes beyond titillation. A collective article of faith is being unraveled strand by sordid strand before our very eyes.

A generation ago the name Kennedy was associated with words like courage, wisdom, honor, duty. Mention it now, and people smirk.

Willie Smith's uncle Edward Kennedy, supposedly the guardian of compassion and justice in the Senate, behaves like a bar-hopping teen-ager and impedes a police investigation. His son and nephews, heirs to the legacy, do the same.

When you combine dynamic political leadership with sophomoric skit-chasing and subtract the dynamic leadership, what's left?

Camelot is dead, and that is, in every sense, a national tragedy.

The Republicans who have run this country since 1981 have given us a long-overdue appreciation of the limits of government and of the dangers of exceeding those limits. But they've far fallen short on what President Bush used to call "the vision thing."

"Most men see things as they are and ask why," Robert Kennedy said in 1967. "I see things as they might be and ask, why not?"

What is America? What should it be?

The Kennedys used to ask those questions. They don't anymore.

Clarence Day wrote that when eras die, their legacies are left to strangers to protect.

That, perhaps, is the saddest thing of all about the Kennedys.

What must women do to be believed?

Any woman who has cause to accuse a man of sexual misconduct - and is wondering how to comport herself - the "dos's" - will get cold comfort from two major public dramas that have played out on our television screens of late.

There, unfolding in our living rooms, were two compelling stories in which women charged powerful men with sexual offenses. Law professor Anita Hill claimed that Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas had sexually harassed her when she worked for him years earlier in Washington.

A woman in West Palm Beach, Fla., charged that William Kennedy Smith, nephew of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., raped her at the Kennedy estate.

The background, demeanor and behavior of the two women involved was markedly different. But both were roundly condemned.

They seemed to be viewed, by the media and the general public alike, not so much as individuals but as differing female archetypes - both very dangerous.

Anita Hill was seen as composed, coolly professional - answering probing questions about such subjects as public hairs in Coke and Long Dong Silver with crisp aplomb.

The result? She was seen by the public and the men of the Senate alike as Medusa - the mythological lady with a stare so cold it turns men to stone.

Republican senators suggested that this young woman from a strict Baptist family was so vindictive and canny that she pored through old law cases to uncover pornographic references and read Gothic novels to find smut. Even after she passed a lie detector test, people accepted the notion that this cool, competent professional was, underneath, the vengeful woman of "Fatal Attraction."

The alleged-rape victim in Florida was quite different. She wept as she testified that she had been tackled, held down and violated at a place where she thought she'd be safe from harm. She freely displayed her pain and outrage. And how was she portrayed?

As a sniveling mass of raging hormones, mentally unstable, who had neurotic reasons for crying rape and who couldn't even remember what happened to her. Callers to talk shows branded her an actress, a crazy, a woman who "asked for it." And she lost. In one case, a woman is seen as strong, cool, vengeful. In another she's perceived as emotional, weak, unstable, control her fantasies. Weak or strong, weeping or keeping a stiff upper lip, a graduate of a Law school or a young single mother, when you accuse a high-stakes male of sexual

misbehavior, you become a walking catalog of age-old myths about women.

The fact is, we do not believe women who seem to have no apparent motive for lying and not much to gain, either. But we do believe powerful men even though they have a lot to gain from not telling the truth.

Is it more logical to think Anita Hill invented the stuff about porno talk because she is a nutty scorned woman, or that Clarence Thomas - who was known to be a viewer of such films - in fact borrowed some language from flicks he watched?

Somewhere, from the depths of mythology about women, the suspicion always arises that women are just not reliable. Even when they are talking about what happened to them: And listen, do you really want to wreck some guy's career for some dirty broad?

Women have to be prepared for this kind of thing when they step forward, no matter who they are, but step forward they must. Fantasies about women breed in the shadows, and it's only when they are exposed that they can be seen as the bizarre, twisted-creatures-that-they-are.

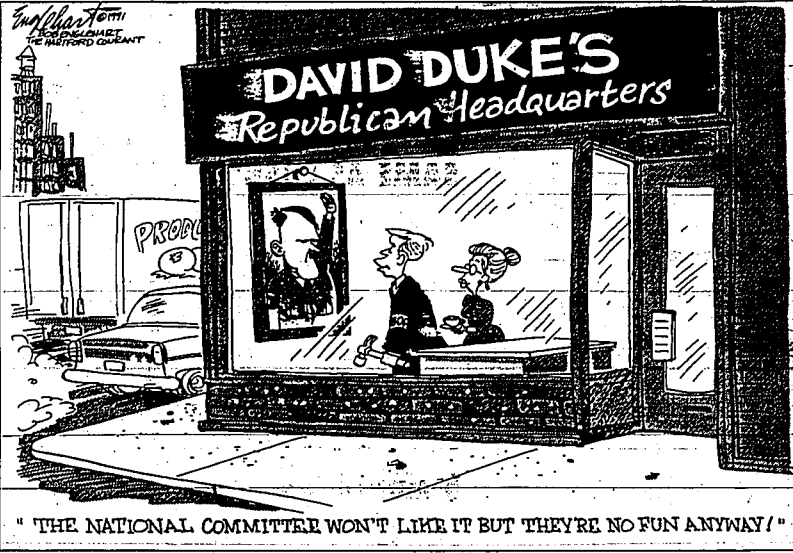

Nothing to apologize for

Regarding the Dec. 5, editorial "America can't explain its actions to World War II internees," America or Americans do not need to apologize to anyone for winning World War II.

When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, their latest intelligence from Pearl Harbor giving precise information on the anchorage of the ships, the number of planes at Hickam Field, the submarine nets and the status of several Army camps was less than four hours old. Within hours, several hundred Americans died as a result of that information. In the days following, the chatter of shortwave radios never ceased.

On the Today show the morning of Dec. 6, 1991, a Japanese man at a reunion of the "survivors" of the Gila River Internment Camp in Arizona read a statement attributed to an American general during 1943. I will quote as closely as I can.

"When you have a tight-knit ethnic group strongly united by tradition, training, family loyalty and religion and largely unassimilated into the culture where they reside, strong loyalty to their ethnic homeland will probably exist. Further, when the ethnic group is widely dispersed over the very land that is most susceptible to attack from their ethnic homeland, drastic measures must be taken to prevent subversion by this group."

The Japanese committed very little sabotage after Pearl Harbor, but I believe it was only because they had very little opportunity.

I lived on a farm near Jerome during the construction of the Hunt Camp, and I would like to shed a little light on that. One of our neighbors who worked on the camp told us of being told by the internees, "Soon we will be out there and you will be in here." The same man told us how the internees would cheer when they would hear of a big Japanese victory on the radio.

This fellow said, "You could hear them cheer a half mile away." This same thing was told to me by two men from Jerome, two from Wendell and one from Eden Shibly near the west end of the Japanese.

So much for those loyal Japanese-Americans - loyal to whom?

The only apology in order concerning the Japanese interned during World War II

would be by the legions of misguided do-gooders, including the editorial staff of The Times-News, to the many brave Americans who fought and died defeating Japan and whose supreme sacrifice does not receive the gratitude it deserves.

U.S. economist says Russia needs \$15 billion for reform to work

MOSCOW (AP) — The Harvard economist who helped design Poland's "shock therapy" economic program said Thursday that Russia needs \$15 billion in Western aid to succeed with free market economic reforms.

Jeffrey Sachs, who arrived in Moscow earlier this week at the invitation of the Russian president to discuss economic reform, said "one does not need a doctorate in economics to know that the economic situation here is catastrophic."

President Bush on Thursday said Washington would hold an international conference next month on aid to the Soviet Union.

Sachs said aid is an important element in his proposal for the republic of Russia. The plan includes removing price controls, rapid privatization of state enterprises, free trade, a free-floating ruble, a halt in state credits to major industries and limited welfare programs to protect those hardest hit by reforms, including retirees.

Sachs said he and a group of leading economists from Chile, Poland, Hungary and other countries presented the program Wednesday to

Yeltsin and several top Russian economic officials.

The response was not immediately clear. Yeltsin was expected to meet with the group again on Friday, Sachs said.

"Our philosophy is that if a man goes into a hospital with a sore tooth, he doesn't have to decide to take one week to pull it out," Sachs said. "He would prefer to get the pain over with quickly so that normal life can start again."

"That is like economic reform as well."

The U.S.-sponsored international conference on aid to the Soviets will focus mainly on coordinating the shipment and distribution of aid, said White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III, due in Moscow on Sunday, said the Soviet Union has "changers too grave for any single nation to alleviate by itself."

The Soviet government urgently requested help to offset severe shortages of food, heating fuel and basic consumer goods.

Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman Vitaly Churkin welcomed

the U.S. plan but urged the West to move quickly.

"We have seen in the past many rounds of discussion, and I would not want another conference to slow down any efforts which might be forthcoming in terms of humanitarian aid," he said.

Sachs said Western aid was a crucial part of his program because it would give the republic breathing space to make deeper reforms. The aid would be earmarked for three uses, he said.

First, his program advocates an immediate allotment of \$5 billion to \$6 billion for emergency food and medical assistance in Russia. Second, he calls for "balance of payments support," consisting of \$5 billion in loans and grants to enable the republic to boost imports of critical goods.

Finally, Sachs proposes a "stabilization fund" of \$5 billion, essentially a hard currency loan to stabilize the ruble.

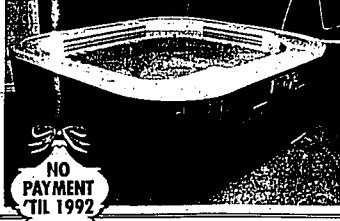
He also said Russia must be given time to repay its debts, and that creditors must be "more generous" than in the past.

Rival Koreas reach historic agreement on rapprochement

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North and South Korea, whose tense peninsula is considered the last theater of the Cold War, Thursday took a major step toward reconciliation with an accord for peaceful coexistence.

The agreement, reached after breakthrough talks that lasted into the night, calls for the Communist North and capitalist South to drop mutual hostilities and discuss a first formal peace to their 1950-53 war.

"It's a historic night," North Korea's premier, **Yon Huk Myk**, said in a dinner toast after the two-day talks at a hotel outside Seoul.

"A new light has been thrown on our national unification," said **Yon**, whose country's growing international isolation because of its economic bankruptcy were seen as integral to its willingness to agree to the accord.

Despite its strides, however, the accord to be signed Friday apparently failed to address the problem of North Korea's nuclear arms development — a secret program that has drawn international fire.

Korean officials from both sides said nuclear issues would be dealt with separately, as was agreed earlier. Also, when asked how the South could sign any agreement with an enemy state without resolving nuclear issues, South Korean spokesman **Lee Dong-bok** answered: "Without assurances, would we have agreed?"

South Korea's news agency **Yonhap** said that the Koreas would announce a joint declaration for a nuclear-free peninsula on Friday.

Both sides proposed a nuclear-free peninsula on Wednesday, and the South also made a surprise offer to accept North Korean demands for inspections of military and civilian facilities, including U.S. bases in its territory.

This was widely interpreted as indicating that U.S. nuclear weapons deployed in South Korea have been removed, as North Korea also demanded.

Pact calls for talks on permanent peace

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Here are highlights of the reconciliation accord between North and South Korea, according to officials at prime ministerial talks in Seoul. A text of the agreement was not issued.

NON-AGGRESSION: In this section — the most sensitive of the agreement — the two sides agreed to issue a joint declaration of non-aggression. As confidence-building measures, the countries will give advance warning of troop movements and exercises and install a hot-line between top military commanders.

PEACE TREATY: North Korea agreed to negotiate with South Korea on a peace treaty to replace the armistice that ended the 1950-53 Korean War. In the past, North Korea insisted the peace treaty be signed between it and the United States.

NUCLEAR INSPECTIONS: The sensitive issues of nuclear development or deployment will be discussed by a joint military committee to be formed within a month after the agreement is put into force.

TERRORISM, OVERTHROW OF GOVERNMENT: Both sides agreed to ban terrorist activity and attempts to overthrow the other's government. North Korea's Constitution still carries a commitment to convert the south to communism by force, and it has not publicly renounced terrorism.

LIAISON: The two nations agreed to set up liaison offices at the border village of **Panmunjom**; a move that will help reunite 10 million families separated by the division of the peninsula and the Korean War. The North also for the first time agreed to call for efforts to reunite such families.

LEGAL RESTRAINTS: North Korea dropped its demand that South Korea repeal laws restricting contact with the North. South Korea had maintained the laws were for national security and were internal matters.

FREE TRAVEL, CORRESPONDENCE: Both sides agreed to promote free travel and correspondence. Details will be worked out at future talks.

Designed as a broad framework for peace, the agreement, Thursday's reconciliation accord could lead to talks on economic cooperation, humanitarian and eventually unification of the divided Korea.

Observers attributed the speed of the agreement to the north's eagerness for an accord to end its growing international isolation and its need for economic aid to help its bankrupt economy. It has said it desires better relations with Japan and the United States.

The north's eagerness for such help, however, made South Korea growing wary of the agreement and its potential for leading to unification.

"Their primary concern, I think, is not on exchanges with South Korea, because that would be like a suicidal act for them," said **Dr. Han Sung-joo**, a political science professor at Seoul's Korea University. "Their real purpose is to improve ties with Japan and get their money."

In the capital, news of the breakthrough surprised many South Koreans, who have grown blasé over the on-and-off talks between the rivals since the early 1970s.

Among other things, the agreement calls for the two Koreas to renounce terrorism, hostilities and efforts to overthrow the other's government. A telephone hotline will connect both sides' top military leaders.

Both sides also agreed to set up liaison offices at the border village of

Panmunjom to help reunite 10 million families separated by the division of the peninsula.

North Korea also agreed to discuss a peace treaty with South Korea to replace the armistice which ended the Korean War, officials said.

The two nations are technically still at war, and share the world's most heavily-guarded border. Relaxed relations could speed the withdrawal of the 40,000 U.S. troops stationed in South Korea.

The momentum of the last two

weeks seemed to surprise both sides, which had agreed to work toward a joint accord last October and met five times at working level sessions later without much success.

On Wednesday morning, however, the South's nuclear-free proposal and acceptance of simultaneous inspections appeared to provide a needed boost to the talks.

At the same time, both sides offered a series of small but significant gestures on reconciliation.

New World Order draws fire

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — China and India on Thursday accused the world's richest nations of trying to dictate world economics and the emerging political order.

The sharply worded denunciation was aimed at the United States and Western Europe, although no country was mentioned by name.

It came on the second day of Premier **Li Peng's** six-day visit to India, the first by a Chinese premier to India in 31 years.

Li and India's Prime Minister **P.V. Narasimha Rao** condemned "international oligarchies," and

that no country or alliance "should be permitted to manipulate world affairs and practice power politics."

They agreed to work for "a new world order where all countries, irrespective of size, have the right to formulate their own views and decide their own destinies in the political and economic fields," said Indian Foreign Ministry spokesman **Afrah Seth**.

While directing their attention to the West, Li and Rao barely touched on the unresolved border dispute that led the two countries to war in 1962.

Communist leaders begin hunger strike

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) —

The leader of the Czech Communist Party said Thursday he had begun a hunger strike to protest an amendment of the penal code that he said unjustly targets communists. **Jiri Svoboda** said he began the

strike on Wednesday, after Parliament approved the amendment allowing up to eight years in jail for anyone who distributes fascist or communist ideology "aimed at suppression of citizens' rights and freedoms."

Homeless might find shelter here soon

TWIN FALLS — Plans should be firmed up within two weeks for a homeless shelter to help families that have "lost their dream."

The Homeless Shelter Task Force is negotiating for a building that will provide 10 to 14 rooms, task force Vice President Jeanne Wilson told the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club on Thursday.

The shelter is not intended as a flophouse for transient men, Wilson said. Although some single men may stay there, the top priority will be housing families with children — a serious need in the Magic Valley, she said.

"If you've ever stood in front of a child who's 5 years old and says, 'Am I going to have a house, where Santa

came?' ... it makes you want to cry," Wilson said.

Wilson said the task force would not disclose the prospective shelter's location until a contract is signed. The task force expects to make an announcement within the next week and a half, she said.

The task force hopes to have two rooms available for homeless families next week, but eight families need housing immediately, she said.

The people the shelter hopes to serve are not the streetwise panhandlers who hold up signs at prominent intersections, she said. Rather, they are people who turn up at social-service agencies desperate for help.

"These people have a lot of pride," she said. "They've just hit rock bottom."

Without a homeless shelter, they stay in motels, cars and even vans, she said.

"These people have lost their dream," she said.

The shelter will provide temporary housing while working with people to obtain permanent housing. Shelter workers will help homeless people find jobs, teach them to handle money and help them save enough for first and last months' rent, she said.

The goal will be to put the homeless people back into the work force and back into homes as quickly as possible, and no one will be allowed to stay more than 18 months, she said.

Wilson spoke to the Kiwanis Club in an appeal for donations to the task force. The task force needs money as well as household items, she said.

The task force is seeking non-profit status, but in the meantime it is accepting donations via the South Central Community Action Agency, she said.

Rupert teen-ager dies in auto accident

RUPERT — A 16-year-old Rupert girl was killed in a traffic accident Thursday morning, and her sister remained in critical condition at a Pocatello hospital Thursday night.

Lynnette C. Hawker died when the car she was riding in was hit by a pickup just after 8 a.m., Idaho State Police dispatcher Tammy Clark said.

The car was driven by her sister, 17-year-old Tina L. Hawker, who was taken to Minidoka Memorial Hospital in Rupert and stabilized before being flown to Bannock Regional Medical Center in Pocatello, Clark said.

Tina Hawker was driving west on 300 North Road about three miles northwest of Rupert when she failed to stop at a stop sign, Clark said.

The pickup, driven by Steven L. Buck, 32, of Rupert, slammed into the passenger side of the car, she said. Buck was wearing a seat belt and suffered only minor injuries, Clark said. Neither of the Hawkers wore a seat belt.

Single-truck accident kills Missouri resident on I-84

BURLEY — A Missouri man died shortly after midnight Thursday in a one-truck accident on Interstate 84 near the Utah border.

Carl R. Straub, 56, of Malden, Mo., was thrown through the windshield of his tractor-trailer rig when he drove off the left side of the highway and hit a ditch, Idaho State Police dispatcher Tammy Clark said.

Investigators had not determined the cause of the accident Thursday, Clark said, noting that there were no slick roads or other adverse conditions present. Straub was not wearing a seat belt, she said.

Buhl teachers, board near pact

BUHL — Buhl teachers and board members are still at loggerheads over a contract, but they may have inched closer.

The board's negotiating team made its final offer to teachers, making two concessions in a meeting Thursday night.

A spokesman for the Buhl Education Association said she is still displeased with the offer, but would make no prediction on how it would be accepted by teachers.

A sticking point in the now four-month-old contract talks has been over

guaranteeing teachers more outlets to improve themselves.

The district's teachers have asked for a professional development committee, while the board has said they already have one.

BEA President Sue Melanson said she was unhappy with the board's refusal once again to budge on the issue.

"I'm disappointed that they asked for job finding, and then they reject what they ask for," she said.

The teachers last month agreed to abide by a fact-finding report, while the board has refused to.

Teachers have said the report was a fair compromise.

At this point, Melanson said she is not sure when teachers would gather again to comment on the latest offer — mainly because the holidays are keeping them especially busy.

If the offer is eventually rejected, the teachers could vote on whether to strike.

"We (will) look at our options and determine our course of action, and that is one option," Melanson said.

The negotiating team decided Thursday to allow the teachers to carry over two paid personal days, instead of one, to the

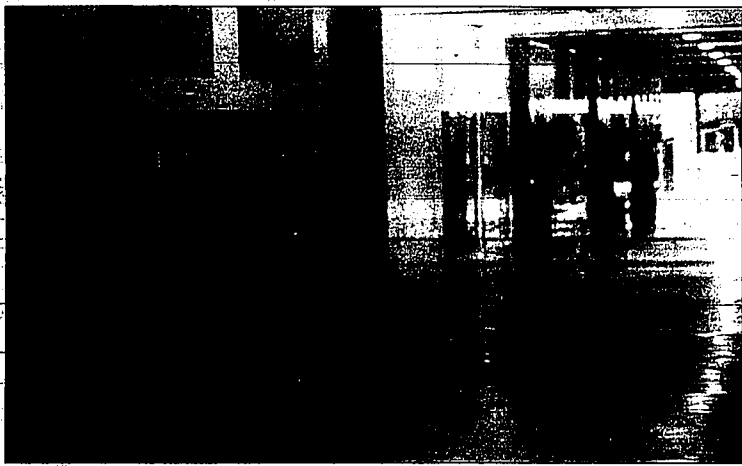
following year. Board members also agreed to lower the limit on their fund balance to 3.5 percent from 5 percent, allowing them to make a possible larger future disbursement of funds to teachers.

The move was taken in case the district receives some unanticipated state funds.

Meanwhile, a board spokesman said he wished the stalemate was over, as well.

"The community wants this settled," said Armand Echert, who is vice chairman of the board and has served on its negotiating team. "They want us to put an end to it, and hold the line at the issues at hand."

Bomb threat clears school

Students dismissed early, but lost time will be made up

TWIN FALLS — A bomb threat phoned into Twin Falls High School sent students home early Thursday, but the missed class time will have to be made up — probably on a Saturday — the principal said.

At 1:05 p.m., a male caller told a student secretary that there was a bomb in the building, according to a police report by officer Gary Rinehart. The girl replied "You're kidding" and the caller hung up, Rinehart's report said.

Just three minutes later, the same person called back and told school secretary Linda Stands, "God -- it I mean there's a bomb," the report said.

After several hours of searching, officials found nothing and Principal Carl Snow said classes will resume as scheduled Friday.

The bomb threat came almost two

months after an explosion ripped apart a metal garbage can in a high school hallway. That Oct. 14 blast was followed by a bomb threat.

That incident has left school officials exceptionally wary of bomb threats, Snow said.

"After having one go off, we would rather err on the side of caution," Assistant Superintendent Ken Olson said.

"Needless to say, we're a little spooked by it," Snow said as police and fire department investigators scoured the empty halls looking for anything suspicious.

Whenever a bomb threat comes in, school administrators must determine if a real threat exists, Olson said.

"In part, I think it's a judgment thing, but when you've already had one go off, you don't look at it quite in the same light," he said.

As soon as Thursday's warning came in, students were sent home, Snow said.

The school doors were locked to keep people outside while school and safety officials looked for an explosive device.

The state requires the two-plus hours of missed class time to be made up, Snow said. That means students and teachers will likely have to spend half a Saturday in class later in the school year, he said.

Although Thursday's caller sounded like an adult, Olson said he hopes the Saturday makeup policy will discourage student pranksters from calling in bomb threats just to get out of school early.

Police received a call Thursday afternoon from a counselor at the Family Counseling and Learning Center who said one of his clients — a 17-year-old high school girl — had reported

overhearing a man say there was a bomb in the boy's rest room at the high school.

That information was passed on to detective Gene Ritchie, who is investigating the bomb threat.

Chief deputy takes over in Lincoln

SHOSHONE — Chief Deputy Steve Southwick of Dietrich has been chosen to replace Darwin Mills as Lincoln County sheriff.

Mills, 52, died of a heart attack while attending a meeting in Boise on Nov. 12.

Southwick, 46, was the unanimous choice of the three Lincoln County commissioners who met to choose a replacement. He was elected by the Lincoln County Republican Central Committee. Mills was a Republican.

The commissioners interviewed the three candidates before making their choice, Lincoln County Commissioner Jerry Nance said.

"Based on his experience and the interview, we felt Steve was the most qualified," Nance said.

Southwick has been a deputy sheriff in Lincoln County for more than 10 years, serving the last seven as chief deputy.

He has a bachelor's degree in electronic engineering and an advanced certification from the Peace Officers Standards and Training Academy.

Mills, who was first elected in 1980,

would have been up for re-election next year. Southwick, a Republican, will serve the remainder of that term and said he plans to run for election in 1992.

Southwick moved to southern Idaho from Utah in 1978. He lives in Dietrich with his wife and five of his seven children.

He was chosen over Robert Quiroga and Jerry Conklin, both of Shoshone. Quiroga is a former Lincoln County sheriff's deputy who now works for the Shoshone Police Department.

Conklin is a former Shoshone police chief and formerly worked as an officer in Mackay.

Fee or tax? Gooding residents wondering

GOODING — At the Gooding County treasurer's office, telephones have been ringing off the hook.

County employees have found the big question from callers to be: "What are a few weeks' worth of landfills? What's the difference between a tax and a fee?"

And officials are scrambling to come up with some answers.

The brouhaha among property owners is over a fee being charged by Gooding County commissioners to help pay for a new landfill.

The bill for the landfill fees arrived in the same envelope with property tax notices several weeks ago.

And ever since homeowners discovered their landfill bills, they've been busy protesting the payments and asking questions. Many have said the fee is really a tax, and they shouldn't have to pay both.

The swell of unrest has been so strong, Gooding County Treasurer Helen Faulkner said Thursday, that the question on the legality of requiring payment of the landfill fee at the same time property taxes are paid has been referred to Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson.

"The prosecuting attorney will issue a written opinion on this issue on Monday and will issue a press release at that time," Faulkner said.

Sales-tax law likely to be revoked early in session

TWIN FALLS — An unpopular sales tax law most likely will be changed early next session.

State Rep. Lee Barnes, R-Buhl, said Thursday that a law passed by many state legislators and farmers would be changed, or repealed early in the session.

But he defended the intent of the law at a question-and-answer session with the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

"The Legislature's intent was good," Barnes said. But the state Tax Commission wrote rules that apparently nobody likes.

"I think in the first two weeks of the Legislature the law will be repealed," rescinded or changed," Barnes said.

At issue is a law that shifts

the burden of proof over whether a purchase is exempt from sales tax from the seller to the buyer. The chamber supports the theory but not the implementation.

"The burden on the retailer hasn't been lifted," said Jeff Gooding, who runs a Twin Falls property management company and serves as chairman of the Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission.

Barnes and chamber members said the State Tax Commission wrote confusing, burdensome rules to implement the law, which the commission didn't want passed.

The law is slated to go into effect Jan. 1. Businesses don't want it to go into effect at the beginning of the year.

So many don't want it, in fact, that Barnes said he has received more calls from constituents on the subject than on any other.

Fight continues against shipments

BOISE (AP) — Andrus administration attorneys urged the federal appeals court on Thursday to reject the Energy Department's attempt to resume disputed shipments of high-level nuclear waste from Colorado to Idaho.

The petition asked the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to deny the department's request that a Nov. 1 order by U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge temporarily barring further shipments be lifted pending the government's appeal of Lodge's ruling against it.

"DOE contends it is not limited in any way by leaving the injunction in place," the state's petition said.

"Lifting the injunction would pose risks to the environment and human health. ... Indeed, the priority to be afforded the enforcement of environmental laws is of the highest order within the 9th Circuit."

Lodge blocked further waste shipments to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory from Public Service Co. of Colorado's decommissioned

Fort St. Vrain reactor until the Energy Department obtained a state air quality permit for its high-level waste storage facility at INEL.

But instead of applying for the permit, which Andrus has said would take at least six months to process, the government asked both the 9th Circuit Court in San Francisco and Lodge himself to lift the injunction while they appealed the requirement for a state air quality permit.

The Energy Department maintained the state is improperly applying its environmental law, and federal lawyers claimed the delay in resuming shipments is costing the Colorado utility millions of dollars.

Without immediate resumption of shipments, the government said, the utility will be forced to begin storing the waste later this month at a new facility it built on the Fort St. Vrain site near Denver.

The Energy Department has asked Lodge to decide whether he will lift the ban by Friday,

just three days before a panel of the appellate court will consider its request.

The state maintained that Lodge's ruling is sound, based on precedents set by both the appellate court and the U.S. Supreme Court, and it contended that in any case, the appellate court should give Lodge the opportunity to decide whether to reverse himself in a case he has thoroughly reviewed.

"Simply stated, allowing DOE to proceed unencumbered while the legality of its conduct is debated on appeal is unnecessary," the state petition said.

The Fort St. Vrain waste, some 244 more truckloads of it, is the center of Gov. Cecil Andrus' running battle with the Energy Department over the future operations at INEL.

Andrus maintains the department is trying to convert one of its top research and development facilities into a nuclear garbage dump so it does not have to cope with developing a long-term permanent policy for radioactive waste management.

Coroner: Driver in Hollister accident was drunk

TWIN FALLS — The only legally drunk person involved in a weekend accident that killed five people was the man driving the car that caused the wreck, the Twin Falls County Coroner said Thursday.

Gary Smith, 24, had a blood alcohol level of more than twice the legal

driving limit of 10 grams per liter when he drove a Nissan Sentra head-on into an oncoming car on Dec. 7, Twin Falls County Coroner Cal Edwards said.

Smith and his three passengers died instantly. The driver of the other car, 74-year-old Peter Tracy of Kimberly, died Wednesday morning of a heart attack brought on by his injuries.

Any of Smith's passengers could

have safely driven the car, Edwards said. Neither Vicky Jones, 26, or Jolene Moore, 33, had been drinking, he said. Alcohol was found in the system of David Moore, 29, but at a level well within the legal limit, Edwards said.

Smith was driving south on U.S. Highway 93 just north of Hollister Saturday afternoon when he pulled out to pass a truck and collided with

Tracy's nonbound vehicle.

Idaho State Police officers at the scene reported finding alcohol in the Smith vehicle.

The three passengers, all from Twin Falls, died instantly of broken necks, Edwards said. An autopsy revealed that Smith also died instantly when he smashed into the car's steering wheel, pushing his sternum into his heart, he said.

Wall said Walker apparently was using lighter fluid to start a tire against a wheel rim. He placed the

tire and wheel on a partially filled 55-gallon gasoline drum, and when he lit the lighter fluid, the flames ignited the gasoline as well.

The resulting fire and explosion killed Walker and caused heavy damage to the shop building, Wall said.

Schultz said counties are responsible for providing a wide range of services, and so they have the authority to collect taxes or fees to provide those services.

"The process of collecting the solid waste fee along with the tax bill has been tested through the Idaho Supreme Court in Kootenai County, so it gives local government that ability and that authority," Schultz said.

Commenting on a related issue, Schultz said that public entities, including city governments and schools, should not be exempt from the user fees because they, too, are users.

"The solid waste system is basically a utility that needs to be paid," he explained. "The public entities" also have to pay for water.

power." Schultz said there is a natural tendency for people to "bristle" the hair on the back of their necks" at a new fee.

But, he said, counties are moving to a system of transfer stations and federally approved landfills, and the new costs must be met.

"The key is to get people to be more responsible for the volume of waste they are throwing away," Schultz said.

Lafferty has no remorse over murders of sister-in-law, baby

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) — Ronald Watson Lafferty, who spent six years in Utah's death row for the murders of his sister-in-law and her infant daughter, said the woman got what she deserved.

But Lafferty, 48, whose convictions and death penalties were overturned by the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver last week, denied killing the woman and said he wants to be free.

The appeals court ruled the judge used the wrong legal standard in determining whether Lafferty was competent.

The decision means Lafferty likely will get a new trial.

room, apparently trying to rescue her child.

Ron Lafferty and his brother, Dan, both members of a fundamentalist religious group called the "School of Prophecy," were charged after police learned from other members that Ron had received a revelation calling for the victims to be "removed."

"I don't mean to seem cold because I'm not," he said. "Quite frankly, I watched that particular sister-in-law destroy my brother (Allen) and watched her destroy my mother's home."

"I saw a very uncaring, a very selfish individual and I don't really care about her and, quite frankly, I don't care if Santa Claus did whatever was alleged," Lafferty said. "As far as I'm concerned they ought to find out who did it and give them a purple heart. They deserve it."

"I have no remorse whatsoever. None whatsoever," he said. "As far as I'm concerned it was just a matter of casting a bad apple out of a bushel."

Parkinson appointment may heal wounds

Governor's choice not a BSU grad, but credentials are impressive

BOISE (AP) — Boise business executive Joe Parkinson has drawn a lot of support for his appointment to the State Board of Education.

Gov. Cecil Andrus on Wednesday announced that he has picked Parkinson, 46, co-founder, chairman and chief executive of Micron Technology Inc., to the board.

Although he disregarded the wishes of Boise State University supporters, who wanted a graduate of that school named to the eight-person board, Andrus said Parkinson will be good for the system.

"No, he is not a graduate of BSU, but he certainly has strong ties to BSU," the governor said Thursday. "He has assured me he wants to improve education throughout the state of Idaho."

Boise State supporters said the appointment would help heal wounds left by the Sept. 20 firing of BSU President John Keiser.

"It's definitely a very curious appointment for the governor," said state Sen. Karl Brooks, D-Boise. "It will go a long way toward showing that people who care about Boise State are on that board."

Parkinson, 46, a Boise resident born in Texas and reared in Blackfoot, will succeed Gary Fay of Twin Falls, who resigned effective Jan. 1.

Fay's term was to run until March 1. But he announced last month he was stepping down early, in part to avoid controversy in the

Legislature about Keiser's firing, which he supported.

Board member Jerry Evans, the state superintendent of public instruction, said he agreed with Andrus that it was not important to name a graduate of a specific school to the board.

"That idea has been given too much credence," Evans said. "What we need are board members who look at the entire state and the needs of this state."

Rayburn Barton, executive director for the Board of Education, said, "I think he will be a tremendous addition to the board."

Dyke Nally, former director of the BSU Alumni Association, said Parkinson has been interested in the Idaho educational system for years.

"He particularly understands Boise State, but he understands the rest of the system," Nally said.

The appointment is to a five-year term and is subject to confirmation by the Idaho Senate.

Micron Technology employs about 4,100 people at its manufacturing complex of about one million square feet on the outskirts of Boise.

In its latest fiscal year, Micron reported sales of \$425 million with a profit of \$5 million.

Idaho man faces federal felony charges for smuggling of ivory

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — An Idaho man has been indicted on federal felony charges that he smuggled 220 items of ivory art objects and jewelry handcrafted from tusks of endangered African elephants.

The four-count grand jury indictment alleges Jeris Dean Lee, 45, of Pocatello, knowingly imported the ivory in violation of the Endangered Species Act and the African Elephant Conservation Act.

"It is outrageous," U.S. Attorney David Jordan said Thursday. "We want to emphasize how very seriously the U.S. Customs Service and Fish and Wildlife take this violation."

He pledged to continue to "vigorously prosecute" such crimes, believing that "the depletion of this resource and of endangered species is a crime that must be stopped."

The seized ivory items included art works depicting animals and humans, African drums, chess sets, bracelets,

necklaces and 10 carved, full-length elephant tusks.

Jordan said there was no estimated value for the items, but the government has employed an expert appraiser to determine their worth.

Although the ivory was seized by Customs officials in July 1990, the grand jury didn't hand up its indictment of Lee until Wednesday. Jordan said he could offer no explanation for the delay except to say "it takes time to prosecute these cases."

The seizure was the result of an undercover investigation involving Customs and Fish and Wildlife agents, and was conducted in cooperation with the government of Zambia, he said.

Jordan declined to offer further details on the case due to its sensitive nature, and he asked that federal

investigators present at the conference not be photographed or filmed to protect their identities.

Lee was not in custody Thursday, and no arrest warrants had been issued. Jordan said investigators knew Lee's whereabouts, but he was not at liberty to discuss that information.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Stewart Walz said no court appearance had been scheduled for Lee, but he was expected to appear before a federal judge "in the near future."

Jordan said Zambia has not sought Lee's extradition, and no further arrests or charges are anticipated here.

In addition to the three felony smuggling and unlawful importation counts contained in the indictment, the grand jury also charged Lee with a federal misdemeanor for allegedly violating Zambian and international law protecting elephants.

Year-round school likely to open '92

MERIDIAN — The chances look good that Pioneer Elementary School will open in August as the Meridian School District's first year-round school.

More than 125 parents had called the school district by Wednesday afternoon to say they wanted to send their children to the new school, district officials said.

The Meridian School Board approved the proposal Monday night. Assistant Superintendent Bob Haley said the calls indicate that the district should be able to pick up the 500 volunteers it would need for the school to use the year-round schedule.

District told splitting would be costly

MOSCOW — If the Whitepine School Board splits the district into two subdivisions, it will cost district schools a lot of money, a consultant has advised.

Mark Fox, who has been studying the cost of dividing the school district, told the school board this week the district could lose up to \$200,000 if the district divides. Whitepine should expect to lose \$40,000, Fox said.

The subdivision option, supported by at least two board members, would create two subdivisions in the district, each with the ability to pass its own bond issues.

The idea came out of controversy this fall over a proposal to educate all Troy, Deary, Bovill and Elk River high school students in Troy, and all middle school students in Deary.

Democrats seek converts for 1992

POCATELLO — Leaders of the Idaho Democratic Party hope to bring more Idahoans into the fold in 1992.

Breaking with tradition, the party will conduct statewide public hearings next spring gathering input on positions the party should take in its 1992 party platform. In the past, delegates to the state convention have hammered out platform planks.

State Chairman Mike Wetherell said the hearings are consistent with his goal of bringing more people and more ideas into the Idaho Democratic Party.

Idaho Republicans are conducting similar meetings around the state, called Project STRIDE but Wetherell said the Democratic game plan is to respond to Republicans.

Basalt will chlorinate water as test

BASALT — City officials plan to chlorinate the water system at this small Bingham County community after water samples showed traces of bacterial contamination.

Since Saturday, residents have been urged to boil drinking water. A routine test showed traces of coliform or intestinal bacteria. The bacteria can cause diarrhea and nausea.

The system will be tested again after chlorination. Mayor Michael Young said the tests show that the bacteria apparently is growing somewhere inside the system, which may indicate a breach. He said it would be difficult to locate a breach this time of year.

Death feared as car plunges into river

CLARK FORK — Authorities fear at least one person was killed when a vehicle plummeted off Idaho Highway 200 into the Clark Fork River.

Darkness and the river's swift current forced emergency crews to give up efforts to rescue possible victims of the crash, reported shortly after 4 p.m. Wednesday about a mile and a half east of Clark Fork.

Bonner County Undersheriff Nick Krager said Thursday an effort would be made to restrict water flow through the upstream Cabinet Gorge Dam, to lower the river's level.

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Ranchers, miners and loggers need to quit apologizing and confront environmentalists head on, says a Montana community organizer.

Dennis Winters, who has organized loggers against wilderness plans in Montana, said Wednesday that resource user groups need to band together to increase their power in the fight against environmentalists. "We transform commodities into a way of life," Winters said at the annual meeting of the Greater Yellowstone Association of Conservation Districts. "Never is it pretty, but we'll pay the (family) denial bills."

The association is meeting here this week. Winters said environmentalists are using the Endangered Species Act and the Greater Yellowstone Vision plan to set the debate over public land use. "These environmentalists are playing you like a cat and mouse," he said. "We don't have a resource problem. We have a political problem."

Resource users shouldn't sit down with environmentalists until they have organized and can negotiate from a position of strength, Winters said. Environmental groups, like the Greater Yellowstone Coalition, that speak moderately on such issues as grazing on public lands, mask more radical agendas of other environmentalists, he said.

"The truth is, so-called environmentalists don't want any of us here," Winters said.

The Greater Yellowstone Vision plan was a blueprint written by federal agencies for management of the greater Yellowstone ecosystem. The scope of the plan was narrowed after residents packed hearings because they thought the first draft favored environmentalists. Winters

Move could boost cost of food

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — If excessive environmental restrictions are heaped on America's farmers and ranchers, the result could be more expensive food and other goods, says a member of the Greater Yellowstone Association of Conservation Districts.

Delbert Winterfeld, Swan Valley farmer, said farmers and ranchers are the original conservationists and are unfairly criticized by environmentalists. "We have 10,000 different insects, 1,500 different plant diseases, 1,500 different weeds and 1,500 different nematodes. We must deal with in agriculture," Winterfeld told a crowd of about 75 Thursday at the group's annual meeting.

"Agriculture must play a key role in feeding the world's hungry, but with the bashing of agricultural chemicals, I don't see how the American farmer can continue to supply food and fiber for two-thirds of the world's population, which he said is a real threat.

"I think there is going to be some deep hurt," he said. "We can't afford it. The national media would like nothing more than to portray us as county bumpkins out of control."

Winters said that a Montana wilderness plan negotiated between environmentalists and labor unions on the Kootenai National Forest would have led to increased child abuse and wife-beating because 3,000 jobs would have been lost. He was widely criticized for the comment in Montana but he stuck by it Wednesday.

Tapping the emotions of people facing the loss of their jobs or their land is an important organizing tool, he said. But he warned against people going too far and getting violent,

U of I president says 1% plan would hurt

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser has come out in opposition to the controversial 1 Percent Initiative, saying it would hurt the state's college and university system.

"We would lose money," Zinser said Wednesday before traveling to Boise to attend the tax equity summit organized by Gov. Cecil Andrus. "If we lose money, there is no question, we would lose quality."

But her announcement did not concern the property tax limitation measure's leading proponent. In fact, Idaho Property Owners Association President Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene said he could think of no one he would rather have opposing the initiative than Zinser.

"That is the greatest of the big spenders and high rollers," he said of Zinser, who is the highest-paid state employee at about \$124,000 a year. "She is all people, when she doesn't pay 1 cent of property tax."

But Karl Shurtliff, a Boise attorney and vice president of the state Board of Education, disputed Rankin's statement.

Shurtliff said Idaho is a community property state, and he suspects Zinser's husband, Moscow businessman and former state senator Don Mackin, has paid more in property taxes than Rankin has ever paid.

This year, Mackin paid \$6,931 in property taxes and the company in which he owns a partnership, Palouse Properties Inc., paid \$9,939 in

property taxes in Latah County, according to the Latah County treasurer's office.

In contrast, Rankin paid \$499.80 in property taxes this year in Kootenai County, Kootenai County Assessor Thomas Moore said.

property taxes at 1 percent of market value, would slash budgets of local government and schools by about \$113 million.

Zinser said most people believe the state's budget would cover some of those local services, cutting into the revenue available for other state agencies, such as the state's four-year higher education institutions.

Lawmakers allocated \$141 million to the state's four-year schools for the current fiscal year.

Rankin contends passage of the initiative, which backers are trying to get on the November 1991 ballot, would force colleges and universities to be more accountable but would not necessarily cause budget cuts.

Spotlight on Lincoln Savings, Keating moves to federal court

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Former Lincoln Savings owner Charles Keating Jr. and four ex-associates were charged Thursday in federal court with fraud and conspiracy in the firm's collapse two years ago.

The 77-count indictment accuses the five of a pattern of racketeering to obtain money through Lincoln for their benefit. The charges include conspiracy, bank fraud, interstate transportation of stolen property, falsification of funds and securities fraud.

Almost simultaneously with the indictments, a civil suit was filed accusing Keating and eight others of securities fraud and insider trading.

The suit, filed by the federal Securities and Exchange Commission, said the nine participated "in a scheme that systematically and deliberately defrauded thousands of investors."

Keating also was accused of repeated acts of illegal insider trading in the sale of \$7.5 million of his company's stock.

The SEC lawsuit, which could hit Keating with massive financial penalties if proven, alleged that the earnings of Lincoln Savings' Phoenix-based parent company, American Continental Corp., were overstated by more than \$120 million between 1985 and 1988.

In the criminal case, Keating and the co-defendants turned themselves in to federal authorities Thursday morning in anticipation of an appearance before a U.S. magistrate in the afternoon.

Keating was convicted on all counts in the new indictment. Keating faces a maximum penalty of 510 years in prison, at least \$17 million in fines and forfeiture of about \$265 million in assets.

The 64-page indictment was unsealed eight days after Keating was convicted of securities fraud in state court. The latest indictment contains similar allegations of deceiving investors who bought Keating's junk bonds.

Government may acquire Virginia City

VIRGINIA CITY, Mont. (AP) — The National Park Service says it will begin a study next summer on the possibility of including all or part of Virginia City within the national park system.

Virginia City Town Clerk Patty Pedula said Park Service officials told residents at a Tuesday night meeting they are interested in the historic town.

But officials cautioned that doesn't mean Virginia City will be included within the park system.

"This isn't a commitment... It's nothing close to congressional approval," said Marcella Sherfy, Montana state preservation officer.

Concern about the future of Virginia City surfaced a couple of years ago after Ford Bovey, owner of many of the historic buildings in town, began discussing the possible sale of some or all of the buildings.

"We don't want foreign ownership... for Japan to come in and buy it all up," Pedula said. "This is Montana history." She said residents understand the need to relieve Bovey's property burden without losing the historic integrity that makes Virginia City unique.

ACLU settles on fees with firm that defended anti-abortion law

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union has reached a \$10,000 settlement on legal fees with a private law firm that withdrew from defending Utah's anti-abortion law due to a conflict of interest.

Michele Parish, executive director of the Utah ACLU, said Thursday the out-of-court settlement ended a dispute that began when ACLU attorneys discovered that the firm represented one of the plaintiffs in the federal lawsuit challenging the law.

The ACLU, which is backing the suit, filed a motion to have Jones Waldo Holbrook & McDonough removed from the case, and the firm withdrew in October. The state subsequently advertised for bids and hired attorney Mary Anne Wood to take up the defense.

The ACLU petitioned U.S. District Court Judge J. Thomas Greene for \$26,000 in fees and expenses resulting from the motion, a sum criticized by some state officials as exorbitant due to cost of meals and the \$375 hourly rate charged by lawyer Janet Benschhof of the ACLU's New York-based Reproductive Freedom Project.

But Parish said the meals were for several attorneys and clients over several days, and that the original request also included plane fares and long-distance telephone calls.

She added that Benschhof's fees are commensurate with her expertise in abortion law and with those of other New York lawyers. As an ACLU staff attorney, Benschhof is not paid the full \$375, Parish added.

She said the ACLU agreed to the settlement to move the case along. "It

was very unfortunate all around, and our main interest in settling that issue was to move on with the case. That's what we've pressed for all along. Every time you file a motion, it adds to the cost and the delay."

Former governor Calvin Rampton, one of the Jones Waldo attorneys involved in the case, was not immediately available for comment Thursday.

The Legislature enacted the anti-abortion law in January, and the ACLU filed suit just before it was to take effect in April. After a series of skirmishes over technicalities, Greene scheduled trial for next April.

Jones Waldo has been paid \$95,000 of an estimated \$200,000 in legal costs, but the firm has agreed to deduct Wood's start-up fees to get up to speed on the case.

Duke seeks a spot in Colorado primary

DENVER (AP) — Supporters of David Duke say he will seek a spot on the ballot for the Colorado presidential primary next March, according to a Denver television station.

Meanwhile, the American Civil Liberties Union announced plans to battle Gov. Roy Romer's cancellation of a Ku Klux Klan rally planned for the west steps of the Capitol.

KUSA Channel 9 reported on Wednesday that campaign workers for the Louisiana lawmaker and former Grand Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan said the paperwork for his primary bid is complete and lacks only Duke's signature.

They said Duke will sign before the Jan. 2 deadline. Duke had 75 registered Colorado supporters for his recent bid for the Louisiana governor's office.

Once an ardent racist, Duke has renounced his racist views and was elected as a Republican to the Louisiana legislature in 1987.

He ran unsuccessfully for the U.S. Senate in 1990 but polled 44 percent of the vote. More recently he ran for governor of Louisiana but lost in a runoff election.

Duke will need to file a petition with at least 5,000 signatures or pay a fee of \$500 and a notarized letter of intent with the secretary of state's office before the deadline to get on the presidential primary ballot.

Also on Wednesday, ACLU spokesman James Joy said Romer's decision to cancel a permit to the Klan for a rally on Martin Luther King Jr. holiday violated First Amendment guarantees of freedom of speech.

ACLU Legal Director David Miller met with Shawn Slater, a Klan organizer, to reach an agreement on how the ACLU will proceed, Joy said.

Romer canceled a permit issued to a group calling itself Christian Revival, which claimed to be anti-racist, after learning it actually was the Klan.

Joy said the ACLU is not endorsing the KKK's views but is defending the First Amendment.

Romer's press secretary, Cindy Parmenter, said the governor's office had no comment on the ACLU's announcement.

Sullivan gives conditional OK to study for possible dump site

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Gov. Mike Sullivan says he will not object to a study of possibly building a temporary nuclear waste storage site in Fremont County.

But Sullivan said he has attached several conditions to his letter saying he would not oppose the study. Any study of locating the Monitored Retrievable Storage facility in Fremont County must be objective, and answer several questions about the impact.

"You must clearly understand that this action should not be interpreted as an endorsement of the MRS or its potential location in Fremont County," Sullivan said in a letter to commissioners Wednesday.

"While I am not satisfied sitting an MRS is a wise decision, I am willing, given your

interest, to allow a thorough public review and discussion to take place."

Fremont County commissioners told Sullivan in October that they wanted to apply for a \$100,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Energy to learn more about temporary storage of nuclear waste.

The DOE requires a letter of "no objection" from governors before it will consider grant applications.

Sullivan said his decision not to object shows his recognition that the country needs to discuss alternatives to dealing with nuclear wastes.

After the study, Wyoming would be able to better respond to the request for a temporary site, he said.

"Pause." "And 'Indian Love Call' was a very funny song."

"A puff of the cigar."

"I like show business," he says, a phrase he never tires of repeating, as if he still has to pinch himself that all this good fortune really happened to him.

"Here I am, 95 years old, and I get out of bed and I like what I'm doing. I like getting out of bed to be interviewed. If I was making felt hats, you wouldn't be sitting here."

Back to the stage, the glory days of Hollywood's Hillebrand County Club, when on a given night you could find yourself dining with Edward G. Robinson, George Jessel and, of course, Groucho Marx.

Burns does not consider Groucho the greatest comedian he ever saw. That honor belongs to Charlie Chaplin, a man who could make him both laugh and cry.

The greatest entertainer, Burns says, was Al Jolson.

To say Scott Rudin is elated by what's going on with his movie is to underestimate things considerably. "I'm in awe," says the producer-who-makes-movies that he calls "The Addams Family" happen to have topped \$70 million to date because... and happens-to have become the year's pop-cult phenomenon.

Rudnick retooled the Caroline Thompson/Larry Quindlen script, but a sequel of Miramax's rules, his name can't be credited.

And what about Raul Julia, Anjelica Huston, Christopher Lloyd and the wonderfully deadpan Christina Ricci - are they game for a reprise?

Utah opera breaks new ground for deaf

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — During the Utah Opera Company's holiday production of "Hansel and Gretel," opera goers could think they're seeing double — two Hansels, two Gretels and two witches in identical costumes on the stage.

A second look makes it all quite clear: One group is singing, the other isn't.

The opera, which ran for three performances last week at the Capitol Theater, was "shadow-cast" in each role with actors using sign language to interpret for the deaf.

With fluid, expressive signs, they tell the familiar tale of two children who get lost in the woods and find themselves nibbling on a gingerbread house built by a wicked witch.

But unlike most interpreters for the deaf, these don't stand off to the side of the stage. They wear costumes, interact with other characters and intentionally were cast to resemble their singing counterparts.

Gretel is played by Laurel James and Kristi Nelson, the first Miss Deaf Utah and the only one of the signing actors who is deaf.

"We are just singing with our hands," Nelson said through an interpreter after a rehearsal.

Martha Perry, a spokeswoman for Opera America, says the idea is revolutionary. "What Utah Opera is doing is really unique. It's quite a bit different than having someone on the edge of the stage."

Some companies have used interpreters or relied on projected titles — slides of the production's script projected onto a screen to accommodate deaf devotees.

But Ann Ewers, general manager of the Utah Opera, changed that when she first produced opera for the deaf in Boston in 1987. She brought the idea to Utah and figured, since the story was so well known, the annual Christmas production was a perfect beginning.

The Boston project was the only other opera interpreted in a "main stage" production, Perry said, although a Texas company has done limited productions specifically for the deaf.

With the double casting, it took

long hours of tedious work to bring "Hansel and Gretel" to life on the Utah stage. Dale Boont, a local theater enthusiast and signer who envisions future productions for the deaf, designed the script's translation — some words of the fairy tale just didn't exist in sign language and finger spelling on stage was out because the audience couldn't see it.

With a bit of imagination, the problems were solved. Gingerbread children became "delicious-spice cookie children." Scenes were altered to free signers' hands. In one, a broom was magically made to stand on its own next to the signing witch while she performs a song. A signer introduces the signs he will use for the names Hansel and Gretel to the audience before the show.

Hansel's name-sign becomes a variation on the letter "H" — the index and middle fingers held up to the forehead, Gretel's is made with fingers forming the letter "G" — index finger

and thumb positioned as if to pinch and tracing make-believe ringlets of hair cascading to the actor's shoulders.

The witch uses variations of the sign for "magic" to translate the word "hocus-pocus."

"There is a form of poetry in sign language," Boam said. "They are all beautiful signers."

For Nelson, performing without hearing music is especially challenging. At times, she relies on keen lip-reading skills and cues from others on stage. Occasionally, she glances at Boam, seated in front of the orchestra pit ready to sign cues as needed.

Nelson has acted before, in a children's production of "Peter and the Wolf" at Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C., the world's only four-year liberal arts college for the deaf. But when she told friends she was performing in a production with the

Utah Opera Company, they thought she was joking.

"I told them I wasn't interpreting, that I could sing without a voice," she said.

Laurel James accepted the role of the speaking Gretel before she learned of the plans to shadow-cast.

"I thought it would be confusing. I thought the impression would be that there were too many people on stage. But Kristi is my link to the deaf audience and I am her link to the hearing audience. It is an incredible way to communicate," James said.

The signers see their signing shadows as foils who heighten the drama, James said. It gave them more options to act and react.

"I am her alter ego," Nelson said. "It's like she can step out of herself and I can portray what she's feeling. There won't be any conflict for the audience. They won't miss anything."

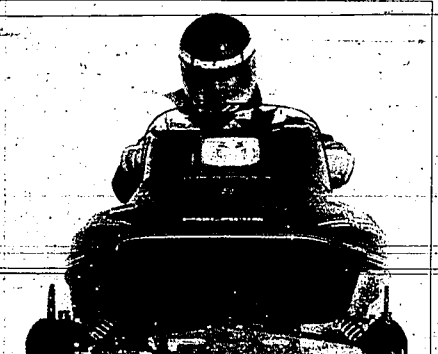

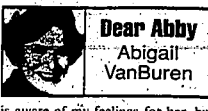

Publicity-shy Streisand endures media blitz for 'Prince of Tides'

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Elizabeth Taylor has avoided interviews most of her career. Barbra Streisand has staged a turnaround. She's enduring a media-blitz for her new movie.

Why the change of heart? "I felt bad because I didn't do one thing on 'Nuts,'" she said. "I did one Gene Shalit interview and no other American press."

"Why? I don't like being misquoted, I don't like things taken out of context, I don't like hidden agendas. There's too much I don't like. I don't like going to opening nights. I don't enjoy the fuss. I enjoy making the movie. I enjoy making the product for the public, striving for excellence for them and for myself. But I don't enjoy any hoopla."

"So I didn't do anything for 'Nuts' and it hurt the movie." After reading interviews with other stars and directors, she realized that they encouraged her to see their movies. So she agreed to a publicity whirl for "The Prince of Tides."

Included was a Mike Wallace interview on "60 Minutes," in which he stressed her age (almost 50) and said she was "self-absorbed" when he knew her 30 years ago.

"It wasn't fun," she said. "But what was wonderful was the response. I've heard of letters being written by an outraged public in my defense...."

"I did not love being attacked by him. What I really hated was when he went on camera the week afterward and they read one of the letters that called him mean-spirited and unkind, and he said, 'Well, Barbra loved it.'"

"That hurt my feelings; that was putting words in my mouth. It made me sound silly. So I just wrote him a note saying, 'I did not love being at-

tacked by you, Mike. And I did not enjoy your putting false and self-serving words in my mouth that misrepresented my feelings to an angry and supportive public."

Streisand covered a wide range of subjects in an interview with The Associated Press. She said she was touched when she read Pat Conroy's novel "The Prince of Tides" and felt "I had to make it."

As co-producer and director, she chose Nick Nolte as the troubled

Tom Wingo, who tries to sort out the tragic past of his Southern family ("I liked his macho male quality, also the pain behind the eyes").

She plays Susan Lowenstein, a New York psychiatrist who tries to help Tom and has a romance with him. Psychiatry is something Barbra knows about.

"I have a woman therapist and a male therapist," she said. "But when I make a movie I can't see them for almost a year at a time. But I talk on the phone."

Rare Stephen Crane manuscript found

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) — A rare Stephen Crane manuscript depicting life on death row at a New York prison has turned up in a newspaperman's scrapbook contained in the archives of the University of Wyoming.

Titled "The Devil's Acre," the short story describing death row at the New York State Prison at Sing Sing, was published by The New York Sun during the summer of 1896.

The work was uncovered at the university's American Heritage Center, a repository for private collections from individuals and industries, by John Browner, a graduate student conducting research for a friend.

Browner's research centered on the life of David Gray, a newspaperman and U.S. ambassador to Ireland who published some of Crane's works in the Sun in the mid-1890s.

"I was going through his collection in the scrapbook and I noticed the pages that didn't look like Gray's handwriting," said Browner, who found the manuscript about a month ago.

"I looked at it and saw the 'Stephen Crane' in the upper corner, but at first I was a little skeptical," he said.

However, research into Crane's handwriting verified the author, he said.

Crane, who died of tuberculosis at age 28 in June 1900, is best known for "The Red Badge of Courage" and "Maggie: A Girl of the Streets." The Wyoming manuscript, written in pencil with numerous editing marks, describes Sing Sing's electric chair and other aspects of death row. Crane wrote that the death cham-

ber was too simple for its deadly task.

"There should be an effect a thousand times more hideous. For the room is the place for the coronation of crime and the chair is the throne of death," he wrote.

Tom Winkler, associate director of the American Heritage Center, said

most of Crane's works are housed at Syracuse University; the University of Virginia and Columbia University.

Winkler said the piece was overlooked when the university took custody of Gray's writings and notes because donated collections are not catalogued in detail.

'The Last Boy Scout' out' delivers the goods in basic buddy picture

Though most of its values are questionable and its methods are thoroughly calculated, "The Last Boy Scout" stands as a monstrously efficient entertainment machine in a paradigm of the new, low-balling Hollywood professionalism.

Through the screenplay, by Shane Black of "Lethal Weapon," went for a record-setting price widely reported as \$1 million—the film contains practically no original elements.

Instead, it's a by-the-numbers buddy picture—tracing the burgeoning bond of affection between a down-and-out detective (Bruce Willis) and a cashiered-pro-quarterback (Damon Wyans) as they investigate a murder linked to a sports-betting scheme—that's distinguished mainly by its shrewd exploitation of the deepest fears and fantasies of the action audience.

No simple shoot-'em-up—though both the deceitful level and body count are dauntingly high—the picture is a poster for the American working class in crisis.

At the scene of a wreck, Joe Hallenbeck (Bruce Willis) and his wife (Chelsea Field) discover when he returns from a business trip that his best friend and partner (Damon Wyans) is in bed in a bedroom closet. But that's not all.

He has lost the utter contempt with which he is treated by his daughter, Darian (Danielle Harris), bitterly resentful of his father's welcome obstruction of the television st.

It's this breakdown of discipline within the nuclear family that seems to disturb "The Last Boy Scout" most profoundly. As in both "Cape Fear" and "Hook," the protagonist must recover his jeopardized masculinity, not so much for heroic, ide-

alistic reasons as to re-establish his credentials as a parent.

Everything else is icing on the cake, as Hallenbeck becomes close pals with the quarterback he once admired—on television and even helps him overcome similarly melodramatic problems—the football player lost both his wife and unborn son in a car accident one fatal Sunday, while he was half a continent away from the best passing game of his life.

When it isn't bonding with one-dimensional positive figures, Hallenbeck is expressing his anger against one-dimensional negative figures, including Taylor Negron as a sexually ambiguous hit man, Cheice Ross as the corrupt politician who cost Hallenbeck his Secret Service post and Noble Willingham as the coldhearted "prod of" boy who owns the L.A. tallions—and who becomes the film's image of that ultimate, universal villain, the greedy boss.

ably producer Joel Silver, whose double mark of extravagant destruction and—imagine—brutality—has previously appeared on "Lethal Weapon," "Predator" and "Die Hard" —though nothing in "The Last Boy Scout" equals the polish and symmetry that director John McTiernan brought to "Die Hard."

For Willis, whose cynical, solo-voice wisecracks bring a sometimes needed, sometimes distracting sense of humor to the ultraviolet proceedings, "The Last Boy Scout" should re-establish his own authority after the disastrous trifecta of "Hudson Hawk," "Beverly Hills Cop III" and "Beverly Hills Cop II." Billy Blanks' Damon Wyans, moving over from the Fox TV show "In-Living Color," also demonstrates some big-screen presence and occasionally tops Willis in withering sarcasm. "If you drive any faster," he hollers at his partner during a car chase, "we'll go back in time!"

"The Last Boy Scout" will win no year-end awards, but at least it delivers the goods—which is more than can be said for most of this year's holiday releases.

'Star Trek VI' enjoys best premiere of series

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country" was the top movie in its premiere weekend, the best opening ever in the series about the aging intergalactic warriors.

Bette Midler's marathon musical "For the Boys" became the first big-ticket bomb of the holiday season.

According to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc., "Star Trek VI" surpassed the previous "Trekkie" debut record of \$17.4 million set by 1989's "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier."

The instant animated classic "Beauty and the Beast" enjoyed another strong weekend, collecting \$6 million for fourth "Cape Fear," the thriller remake from director Martin Scorsese, claimed fifth with receipts of \$4.9 million.

In limited release, "At Play in the Fields of the Lord" opened to lackluster business, drawing \$118,162 in 11 screens.

1. "AN AMERICAN TAIL: FIEVEL GOES WEST" (G). The veteran directors Phil Nibbelink and Simon Wells have created a relentless fast-paced entertainment that over the top old Warner Bros. cartoons and Westerns than it does the previous film. Once plucky Fievel Mousekewitz and his family try to move West, the story devolves into a series of contrived gags and coincidences. "Tail" will probably please kids who've been parked at the mall multiples while their parents attend to holiday shopping. However, small children may feel left behind as the scenes whiz by so quickly, the projector seems stuck in fast-forward mode.

BEAUTY AND THE BEAST (G). Disney's 30th full-length animated feature is the studio's most successful attempt in decades. Managing to be at once wise-up and traditional, it combines a strong story line, based on the classic fairy tale, with an exceptionally alive score by lyricist Howard Ashman and composer Alan Menken. Though the beast is a splendid creation, and Belle is a model of self-reliance, the film is just about stolen by the fatuous, square-jawed presence of Gaston, the most comically conceived of swains. If you don't walk out singing his song, go back in and try again.

Manley retires after failing drug test

TAMPA, Fla. — Dexter Manley, once suspended for a year by the NFL for drug use, said Thursday he is retiring from the Tampa Bay Buccaneers after failing another drug test.

At an emotional news conference arranged by the team, Manley said he had "suffered a setback" in his battle against drugs.

With tears streaming down his face, he said, "I knew what was at stake. I used poor judgment. I think what's important now is my life, not the material things that football has given me, but fighting to stay alive, to lead a productive and to take care of my family."

There was no indication what drug was involved.

Manley, accompanied by his

attorney, Bob Woolf, and Buccaneers general manager Phil Krueger, read a short statement.

"Nobody knows better than I do how difficult it is to try day by day, week by week, to draw upon one's deepest reserves and strengths to dig in and fight this insidious disease that had plagued me and so many others," he said.

"I recently have had a setback and the fact that it has happened, even if only once, shows me that I am in trouble and that I must renew my battle with this disease. Therefore, it is with a heavy heart that I have come here today to announce my immediate retirement from the NFL."

Asked if Manley could be reinstated at some future date, Joe Browne, the league's vice president of communications and development, said, "at this time, I cannot foresee

any circumstance under which Manley will ever play again in the NFL."

Woolf said Manley has no intention of playing in the league again. His plans now are to attend out-patient drug treatment in the Washington, D.C. area and pursue a career in radio and television; the attorney said.

WTVT-TV in Tampa, which has employed Manley since September to do sports commentaries, said his contract states that he can no longer work for the station if he tests positive for drugs.

Bucs head coach Richard Williamson said he broke the news to the team after some players questioned why Manley wasn't at practice.

"I just told them the significance of the press conference so they would be

New motions complicate UNLV suit

RENO — In a flurry of court motions filed Thursday, defendants in the NCAA's suit against Nevada opposed an injunction to block a new state law the organization claims stalls its infractions case against UNLV.

Motions filed by the attorney for Tim Grigulich, assistant UNLV basketball coach, and former academic advisor Shelly Fischer, maintained they would be "irreparably harmed" if the court grants the NCAA's request.

Legal pleadings filed on behalf of Gov. Bob Miller and former assistant coach Ronald Gabulin, seek to have them dismissed from the suit entirely.

No motion was filed early in the day on behalf of coach Jerry Tarkanian, who also is named in the lawsuit.

Oral arguments in the case are scheduled Dec. 19 before U.S. District Judge Howard McKibben.

A law passed by the 1991 Legislature requires the NCAA to follow due process when investigating Nevada schools for alleged rule infractions.

In its lawsuit filed last month, the NCAA maintains the law is unconstitutional and is hampering efforts to resolve a four-year pending case against UNLV's basketball program.

Among other things, the statute requires defendants be given an opportunity to meet with witnesses and requires an impartial hearing officer, not the Committee on Infractions, be selected to hear disputes and issue rulings.

Grigulich and Fischer's lawyers said the committee has "prejudged" their guilt and that their rights to a fair resolution of their case would be impaired by the injunction.

"There's little question that the hardship to Tim Grigulich as a result of an adverse finding by the NCAA Infraction's Committee greatly outweighs the NCAA's interest in maintaining their antiquated and unfair procedure," Grigulich's attorney, Roy Smith, wrote.

Grigulich could be suspended or banned from college basketball if found guilty, court documents said.

The association's pending case against UNLV involves 29 allegations that focus on the recruitment of Lloyd Daniels, a former New York City prep star.

NBA players claim league violated pact

NEW YORK — The NBA Players Association began legal proceedings against the NBA on Thursday, claiming salaries were lowered by accounting practices that violated its collective bargaining agreement.

The union filed a brief with Merrell E. Clark, a special master appointed by the U.S. District Judge Dickinson R. Debevoise, charging that teams systematically under-reported income. The NBA agreed in 1983 to give players 53 percent of the league's gross revenues in exchange for a salary cap.

A variety of questionable accounting practices have been employed, both by the NBA and various teams, effectively short-changing the players out of tens of millions of dollars otherwise due them under the so-called "salary cap" agreement, NBAPA executive director Charles Grunthan said.

Gary E. Bettman, the NBA's general counsel, said the complaint was "simply an accounting dispute."

"I'm sure that it will be satisfactorily resolved, as have all our prior disputes," Bettman said.

Once Kimberly got out to its big lead in the late first and early second quarters, the outcome was settled. The Bulldogs got out to 25 points at 42-17 late in the third quarter before Pilot Shawn Phelps hit seven points to close the gap to 17. But Kimberly replied with the next seven points of the game to re-establish the prohibitive margin.

The Nets scored the first seven points of the second quarter on a 16-0 burst that made it 43-18 at the 6:20 mark. New Jersey closed the first half by outscoring the Nuggets 10-2 behind six points by Petrovic.

High school coach approaches 1,000th career victory, says 'boys did all the work'

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Ralph Tasker is on the brink of his 1,000th career coaching victory and should become the nation's winningest high school basketball coach within two years.

But the 72-year-old Tasker maintains a modesty that contrasts with his success. He coached at the University of New Mexico for 10 years, winning three national titles. He also coached three years at nearby Lovington, winning one state title, and one year at Sulphur Springs, Ohio.

Tasker also teaches economics, government and sociology. "I still enjoy teaching, and I feel I'm still a good teacher," he said. "I

do the best I can, just like I've always done in basketball."

With only two coaches ahead of him, Tasker needs 28 wins to take over the national top spot. The late Leslie Gaudet of Pine Prairie, La., had 1,026 victories, and the late Buck Van Huss of Kingsport, Tenn., had 1,021 wins.

Tasker downplays his accomplishments. "I don't think about things like that. I know I've been blessed to teach and coach as many years as I have. I'm enjoying this season so far, and I don't want to look any farther than Friday night."

If — as Tasker says — the players deserve all the credit for the victories, then it's no surprise Hobbs has accomplished so much.

Some of Tasker's players who went on to standout college careers include Bill Bridges of Kansas, Kim

Nash of Southern Methodist, Kent Williams of Texas Tech and Larry Williams of Kansas State.

"Another former Hobbs basketball player became a standout in pro football. Timmy Smith gained 204 yards in Super Bowl XXII for the Washington Redskins.

"When you've got good kids, you win basketball games," Tasker said.

Many of the team's coaching responsibilities have been given to assistant Don Abbott, a former player. Still, the focus will be on Tasker when Hobbs wins its next game.

A gracious winner who indignantly resists defeat, the inevitable national attention may place Tasker in an awkward position for a man who steadily downplays his significance within the community. But Tasker said he wouldn't still be coaching if he didn't enjoy it.

"I have enjoyed it immensely," Tasker said.

After 45 years, he is as attached to Hobbs as Hobbs, a town in southeast New Mexico. And he plans to stick around a while longer.

"I would like to coach forever," Tasker said.

For SuperSonic Pierce, 4 more free throws is the magic number

NEW YORK (AP) — If Calvin Murphy has any ideas about trying to psyche Ricky Pierce out of missing a free throw, he can forget it.

In 1990, when Larry Bird was closing in on Murphy's NBA record of 78 consecutive free throws without a miss, the former Houston Rockets guard boldly predicted that Bird would choke before reaching the record that Murphy cherishes.

Bird, one of the best clutch performers in NBA history, stopped at 71 with the miss coming at Houston.

Pierce, a Seattle SuperSonics guard who has made 87 percent of his free throws in a 10-year NBA career, doesn't want that to happen to him. Pierce went 7-for-7 from the free-throw line Wednesday night against the New York Knicks, giving him 75 straight.

"Calvin knows about this, he'll try to call, and if he calls, I won't

talk to him," Pierce said. "I'll tell him it's a wrong number."

Pierce said he first noticed Murphy when Pierce was at Rice University in Houston while Murphy was on the Rockets. Murphy set the free throw record for Houston in 1980-81 when Pierce was a junior at Rice.

"He was such an outstanding shooter and competitor," Pierce said. "We're good friends, but I don't want to mess with him about the record."

Bird always has been aware of basketball's numbers; he surprised the media with his ability to keep track of his score while shooting in the NBA's 3-point contests.

Pierce, however, is not a numbers freak, and didn't count his seven free throws Wednesday.

"I wasn't keeping track of how many I had," Pierce said. "I figured someone would tell me if I reached the record."

Pierce likely will get the

opportunity to make three more free throws Friday night at Boston Garden against Bird and the Celtics. "I try to shut out all thoughts of breaking the record when I'm on the line," he said. "If I get it, I get it. But I just hate to miss free throws."

Pierce, who missed seven of his first 42 free throws this season, but now trails only Cleveland's Mark Price among NBA leaders, said he first heard of his streak when he broke Jack Sikma's Sonics record of 50. "Concentration is the most important thing," he said.

Pierce's coach on the Sonics, K.C. Jones, also coached Bird on the Celtics. Jones, a 63 percent foul shooter as a player, agreed that concentration is what sets apart outstanding free-throw shooters like Pierce and Bird.

"I never experienced anything like that when I was playing," Jones said. "My longest streak probably was single-digits."

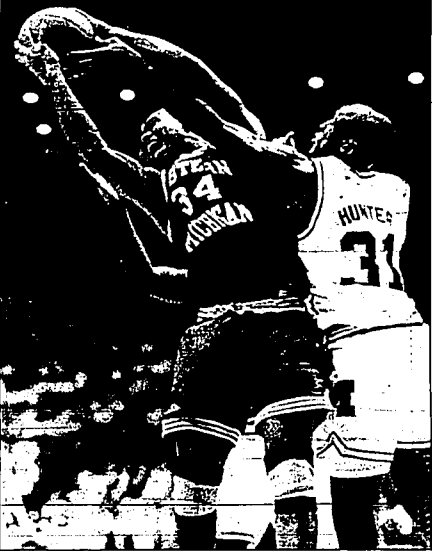

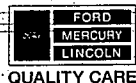

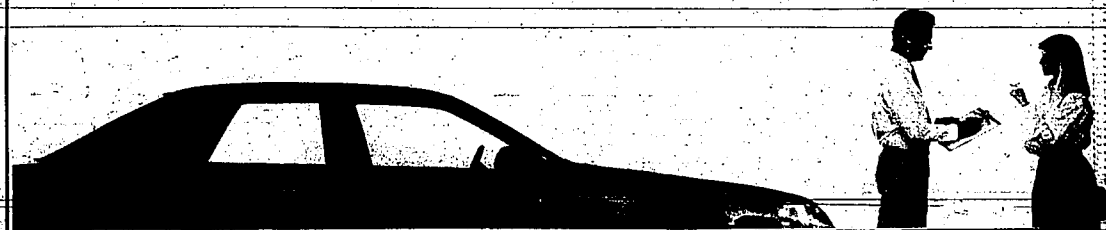

'51 Heisman winner took another path

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP)

Dick Kazmaier won the Heisman Trophy in 1951. This is how long ago it was.

I considered professional football, but I knew what players were making," Kazmaier said. "It really wasn't a financially rewarding endeavor. I just decided football was not a career path."

The NFL has changed a lot in the past 40 years. So has the game that Kazmaier played so well at Princeton, where he was a triple-threat, single-wing tailback.

The Ivy League was a prestigious conference then. Princeton was regarded as a national powerhouse and received an invitation to play in the Orange Bowl, which it declined.

The Heisman wasn't as heavily hyped as it is now. The Downtown Athletic Club announced Kazmaier as college football's best player in a press release.

He later went to New York to pick up the trophy, which since 1952 has been on display at Princeton.

Instead of an NFL career, Kazmaier opted for Harvard Business School. Today he is president of Kazmaier Associates Inc., which owns two sports marketing companies and four sporting goods businesses, including those that make Pony and Bike athletic equipment.

Kazmaier travels a lot. He's bald and a bit thin in the middle now, but many people he meets remember his name from 1951.

"The Heisman Trophy will be the thing they all associate with most," said Kazmaier, 61, during a recent interview near his home in Key Largo, Fla.

Princeton is a lot of them will know. Single-wing tailback a lot of them will know. All-American. Some of them will be fuzzy — "Oh, yeah ... football."

The third-and-most-recent Ivy Leagueur to win the Heisman, Princeton's No. 42 coach, passed and punt. He came from Maumee, Ohio, and led the Tigers to 22 consecutive victories in 1949-51.

"I viewed the Heisman Trophy as a representation of the tremendous success and accomplishments of a player who plays the game to the very best of his ability. I got to win it."

In the single wing, Kazmaier took the snap 4 to 6 yards behind the line, often to the left or right of the center. Princeton coach Charles Caldwell employed a spread formation with motion. Kazmaier took a lot, three passes while sprinting and, though just 5-foot-11 and 170 pounds, dared to run between the tackles.

"I ran wide often enough that the defense would get spread out and it would give me opportunities to run up the middle," he said.

Kazmaier wasn't really taking his life in his hands, because most players weren't much bigger than he was.

A guy 220 was a behemoth then. He had 42 credits. He included Willie Myers and Ben Hogan, but it was Kazmaier who was named male athlete of the year by The Associated Press.

Today, Kazmaier also plays tennis, rides his stationary bike, swims and likes to gamble. He is a Princeton trustee and a member of the President's Council on Physical Fitness. Business takes him to Hawaii, California and Europe. He and his wife have six daughters and five grandchildren.

His list of accomplishments includes, but did not end with, the Heisman Trophy. "I view that as something very meaningful and very important, but within a very limited compartment of my life."

Quarterbacks' hazardous duty continues

Two more NFL quarterbacks got sacked this week by their own coaches, not by the other team — and the list of super sibs is growing.

Mark Vlasic will start for Kansas City on Saturday against San Francisco in place of Steve DeBerg, and Kelly Stouffer will be Seattle's starting QB at Atlanta instead of Dave Krieg.

As backups cast in a starting role, Vlasic and Stouffer have lots of company this year — the Jeff Kemps, Steve Bonos and Phil Simms of the world — but most of these guys took over because of injuries.

Vlasic and Stouffer have the spotlight because their predecessors didn't get the job done.

"Steve's been struggling," Kansas City coach Marty Schottenheimer said.

"My feeling is for us to win against San Francisco, Mark gives us the best opportunity."

The Chiefs (9-5) clinched an AFC wild-card last Sunday when Vlasic replaced DeBerg in the second half and rallied Kansas City to a 30-17 overtime victory over San Diego.

DeBerg, who threw only four interceptions last season, has eight in his last four games.

Seattle coach Chuck Knox is also trying to get some spark back in his team. "We've been struggling a little bit, and we just made the decision that Kelly's worked hard and is throwing the ball better in practice. So we're going to start him."

The Seahawks (6-8) are virtually eliminated from the playoffs for the third year in a row. In a 24-22 loss to San Francisco last week, Krieg committed his 107th career fumble, an NFL record.

Kemp was Seattle's starter when Krieg was injured earlier this year, but he was released and picked up by Philadelphia, another home for wayward QB's.

The Eagles lost starter Randall Cunningham in the first game of the season, and his replacement, the always-fragile Jim McMahon, has been up and down a couple of times. They also have used Brad Goebel and Pat Ryan, but now Kemp is their man.



Giants quarterback Jeff Hostetter was injured Nov. 25 but his season officially ended Thursday when New York placed him on injured reserve.

Kemp will start against Dallas on Sunday since McMahon has four fractured ribs now. The Eagles (9-5) have a six-game winning streak.

"I've been through a lot and I think I've learned a lot of things, so I'm thankful I'm able to handle sitting on the bench, getting thrown in and then getting put back on the bench," Kemp said.

If Philadelphia's QB situation looks confused, take a gander in Phoenix's direction. The Cardinals again named Chris Chandler as their starter for Sunday's game against Denver.

Tom Tupa, the starter for most of the season before being demoted, moved up to No. 2 and three-game starter Stan Gelbaugh fell to No. 3.

Chandler, waived by Tampa Bay on Nov. 4, has been trying to learn the Cardinals' system in a hurry. "I have a pretty good handle on things," Chandler said.

All this resulted from an injury to Timm Rosenbach a long time ago.

Quarterbacks also have fallen in New York-Houston, San Francisco, New York, Green Bay, Detroit, New Orleans, and Dallas, and NFL clubs must be wondering: Who's next?

The 49ers lost Joe Montana so long ago it seems like last season, and then Steve Young was hurt. Enter Mr. Bono.

On Wednesday, Jeff Hostetter's season officially ended when the New York Giants placed him on injured reserve. Hostetter won the starting job from Phil Simms last season when Simms was injured. Now, Simms is starting again because Hostetter's hurt.

What comes around goes around.

In Green Bay, Mike Tomczak will start at quarterback for the sixth straight week for the Green Bay Packers because Don Majkowski is still bothered by a leg injury. Neil O'Donnell has replaced the injured Bobby Brister in Pittsburgh. Erik Kramer is starting in Detroit for the injured Rodney Peete. Steve Walsh took over in New Orleans when Bobby Hebert got hurt, and Dallas has hardly missed a beat since Troy Aikman went down, replaced by Steve Buerlein.

Vinny Testaverde of Tampa Bay, who was hurt earlier this year, might be the list again with a sore back. He's not sure when he was hurt, but he knows where it hurts.

"I'm trying to be positive and hoping everything will work out," he said.

Testaverde can't play. Jeff Carlson will make his first pro start on Saturday at Chicago. Welcome to the club, Jeff.

Sunday's schedule has Cincinnati at Pittsburgh, Dallas at Philadelphia, Seattle at Atlanta, Detroit at Green Bay, Houston at Cleveland, Los Angeles Rams at Minnesota, New England at the New York Jets, the New York Giants at Washington, Miami at San Diego, Phoenix at Denver, and Buffalo at Indianapolis.

On Monday, the Los Angeles Raiders are at New Orleans.

Sparkling offense, solid defense meet Saturday

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — Bowling Green's stingy defense will face its toughest challenge when it tries to contain Fresno State's potent offense in Saturday's California Bowl.

The Falcons have given up only 13.4 points per game on average this season. 10th-best in the nation. But the homebuilt Bulldogs have scored 44.2 points per outing, tops among Division I-A teams.

"If we're going to have a chance, our defense is going to have to rise to the occasion and play the best football game that they're capable of playing," first-year Bowling Green coach Gary Blackney said.

Offensively, the Falcons are led by quarterback Erik White who threw for 2,204 yards and 17 touchdowns. "He literally went from last in our conference a year ago in every statistical category to first," Blackney said.

White's main target is Mark Szlachetko who Blackney says has the best pass-catching hands he's ever seen. Szlachetko caught 65 passes for 943 yards during the regular season.

Partly because of that combination, the team's record did an about-face from 3-5-2 in 1990 to 10-1, the same mark Fresno posted this season.

The Falcons won the Mid-American Conference and Fresno the Big West to gain automatic Cal Bowl berths. The last time it will match the champions of those leagues. Officials are seeking sponsors to finance an open bowl in 1992, with one of the teams, probably from the Western

Athletic Conference which Fresno State joins next year.

Fresno coach Jim Sweeney said he will emphasize his running attack Saturday despite the Bulldogs' long reputation for big passing plays.

"We're going to have to make the ground game go in order to get big plays," Sweeney said. "Everything you do in football is based on whether you can run the ball, particularly against zone defenses."

Actually, the Bulldogs' passing yardage of 241.6 yards per game trailed the 300.3 yards the team averaged on the ground this year. That was largely because starting quarterback Mark Barsotti missed the last five games with a broken left leg.

Barsotti will be back for the Cal Bowl, but a partial cast may limit his mobility. So, Sweeney may play backup Trent Differ part of the game.

Both Barsotti and Differ have completed more than 63 percent of their passes this season with split end Kelvin Means and tight end Marty Thompson their favorite receivers. Each has gained more than 400 yards.

The ground game is led by tailback Ron Rivers, who gained 984 yards, and fullback Lorenzo Neal, who gained 759.

"They have so many weapons, and they come at you in so many different ways that it's really hard to focus in and say 'if we stop him and we stop this guy and we stop that guy, we've won the game.' That's not the case. They're really well balanced."

As the season for NFL honors arrives, three questions arise.

1. Why not just name the Buffalo offense and the Philadelphia defense All-Pro and leave it at that?
2. If you do leave it at that, what do you do about Washington's offense? Maybe make the Hogs the offensive title for allowing only five sacks all season.
3. What do you do about coach of the year when there are 10 guys who deserve it? (and 10 other guys who probably will get fired).

Many cases, here's one unofficial session.

Wide Receivers — Michael Irvin, Dallas; Andre Reed, Buffalo. "We didn't count on him at all in training camp," owner Jerry Jones of the Cowboys says of Irvin, who came off last year's injury in season receiving record in Dallas, which has only been bereft of receivers in the past. Reed is the beneficiary of the league's best offense, but he's also good.

Rice — Rice isn't there although he's one of the best in the game and Atlanta's Michael Haynes and Andre Rison aren't too far behind.

Tight End — Has anyone heard of Marty Cook? He plays for New England and has 76 catches in 14 games. The Eagles' Keith Jackson is probably the league's best tight end. (See Rice above.) He's had no one behind him the last.

Quarterbacks — Mike Kenn of Atlanta is having his best year (or maybe it's that he's always been good) and the Raiders are finally having a good

year.) And Jim Lachey of the Redskins, the best of their dominant bunch.

Guards — Mike Munchak of Houston makes it every year; Jim Ritcher of Buffalo never makes it; Steve Wisconsin of the Raiders is the best wise young guard in the league and William Roberts of the Giants actually had a good year despite Ray Handley, Munchak and Wisconsin.

Center — Herderty. The current incumbent is Kent Hull of Buffalo and there's no reason to vote him out. Besides, he's a good guy. Courtney Hall of San Diego may be up there someday.

Quarterback — With all the injuries, it's a short list topped by Jim Kelly of the Bills. Followed by Dan Marino, Warren Moon, John Elway and (Steve Bono? Erik Kramer? Steve Buerlein? Jeff Kemp?). A bow to Jim McMahon, who's managed to live Philadelphia some semblance of an offense despite a medical record fit for an octogenarian.

Running backs — Thurman Thomas, Buffalo and Barry Sanders, Detroit, who give Oklahoma State a presence. Ad Emmitt Smith of Dallas has a wishbone because he's too good to keep off.

Defensive end — Reggie White and Clyde Simmons, Philadelphia. Greg Townsend of the Raiders is No. 3 and Leonard Marshall of the Giants rates a bow because he's the only guy on that defense having a good year. Jeff Lageman of the Jets joins Marshall as All-Meadowlands and Chicago's Trace Armstrong might be there if he hadn't missed six weeks with a knee injury.

Nose tackle-tackle — Who knows

who plays what position? Jerry Ball of Detroit, Michael Dean Perry of Cleveland, Steve McMichael of Chicago and Jerome Brown, Philadelphia. Plus Doug Smith and Ray Childress of Houston. Make it Perry and McMichael on top, the latter for the sake of old guys. And don't forget Michael Dean's oversized down-packer (Walt Miller) or mis-tackle (Roger Johnson). Vincent Brown of New England may be the best of the bunch.

So here are four: Seth Joyner, Philadelphia; Wilbur Marshall, Washington; Pat Swilling, New Orleans and Derrick Thomas, Kansas City, all outside guys. And add Tony Bennett, who left his heart in, well ... Green Bay.

Cornerbacks — Darrell Green, Washington and Eric Allen, Philadelphia, each of whom can play man-to-man against the best. Chris Dismus of Houston had a great first half and a good second half and Atlanta's Deion Sanders and Tim McKeyer are good as well as loud.

Safeties — Dishman gets headlines but his teammate, Bubba McDowell, is as good as they come. And of course Ronnie Lyles, who had a great first half and something to prove to the 49ers and did. Tim McDonald of the Cardinals was great early, got hurt late.

Punter and kicker — Two Raiders and two Dolphins. Give it to the

Raiders, punter Jeff Gossett, with the league's best lead, and Jeff Jaeger, of Cleveland, and Pete Stanovich of the Dolphins right behind.

Kick returner — Brian Mitchell, Washington; Plus Mel Gray, Detroit and Dave Meggett. Giants, just because he always scares people.

Within moments, the Royals told everyone they had moved seven more players. And yet, they had traded Bret Saberhagen, the pitcher who said he thought he was a fixture in the franchise, a player who felt he'd stay in Kansas City forever.

"That's the part you hate, telling someone who has meant so much that he has to leave," Royals manager Hal McRae said hours later, when late Wednesday night had turned into early Thursday morning. "But baseball is a business, and the business is to win."

And boy, did the Royals and Reds ever show it.

In just two weeks, they've completely turned over their rosters. Forget that homebrewed stuff — instant is in.

The New York Mets and California haven't stood still, either.

They also were big reasons why 51 players, a winter meetings record, were on the move this week. That included 14 trades, seven of them Wednesday.

On Thursday, a day after the meeting officially ended, there was a brief flurry.

Atlanta re-signed free agent Ots-Nixon, guaranteeing him two years for \$5.6 million and giving him the option for an additional season at another \$2.5 million.

Nixon was leading the majors with 72 stolen bases when he was suspended last September for using cocaine. He missed the Braves' run to the World Series, and the penalty will carry over 18 days into next season.

Thanks to some moves by

Harazin, New York had some quality players to trade.

Just before the end of the season, Cashen stepped down as general manager and Harazin moved in. A fifth-place finish (77-84) and a nearly empty Shea Stadium in September called for drastic measures.

Harazin moved fast to keep the Mets from sinking to the bottom of the NL East by hiring Jeff Torborg to manage and signing first baseman Eddie Murray for \$7.5 million over two years and outfielder Bobby Bonilla for a record \$29 million five-year deal.

"When we got Bonilla I knew we would be trading McReynolds," Harazin said. "We want to win this

year and I knew there was no guarantee Viola would be back or Doe will be ready."

Consumers stretch thier dollars

Middle-class shoppers flock to secondhand stores during recession

DOVER, Del. (AP) — More middle-class consumers worried about the recession are turning to thrift shops, long a mainstay of the poor.

Doris Porter started shopping at Goodwill stores about three months ago for her husband and two daughters. She had never shopped in a secondhand store before.

"We're middle class but we've got to save like everybody else. We've got to get out here and get the bargains. I'll never be ashamed to shop in places like these," she said.

"It's cheaper and the money is tight. Plus you get name brand clothes," she said, noting that she was buying designer jeans for \$3 rather than the \$30 she used to pay. "You can really get some nice things here. Take them home, wash them and they look like new."

Mrs. Porter said she makes the 20-minute drive from her home in Goldsboro, Md., to shop at the Goodwill in Dover. Her husband, a harness racing driver, gives her about \$300 a week for household money and "we still can't make it. ... I don't know how (families) do it with four children."

At a Goodwill store in affluent Marin County, north of San Francisco, manager Judy De Bow said shoppers are middle class, upper middle class and "people who have money. Everybody's looking for a bargain."

Sales at the store have increased from about \$600,000 in 1987 to more than \$1 million last year.

It's difficult to measure just how successful thrift shops have been during the recession because they are usually privately owned or run by non-profit organizations, said Terence McEvoy, a retail industry analyst with Janney Montgomery Scott Inc. in New York. But Edward Johnson, an analyst with Lynch, Jones & Ryan, also in New York, said he believes thrift shops are making a comeback. Consumers are no longer trying to

bring these out. "People are trying to save money. ... They're getting the best value for their dollar."

Trudy Miller, president of the National Association of Resale & Thrift Shops, based in Chicago Heights, Ill., estimated there are at least 15,000 privately owned and non-profit thrift shops nationwide. She said that in the last five years,

new shops have been opening at a rate of 10 percent to 15 percent a year.

Salvation Army and Goodwill officials said Christmas is not their peak sales time because consumers prefer to give new instead of used merchandise.

But at thrift shops in economically depressed neighborhoods, a gift is a gift, new or used.

At the Harlem Restoration Project in New York, which caters to surrounding low income neighborhoods, business has been up about 25 percent since the spring "and it is very mostly an economy related," manager Joseph W. Moore said.

Clothing, including new items, generally ranges from 50 cents to \$10, although some items are as much as \$300.

Business has been brisk since Thanksgiving. Moore said people looking for gifts got sticker shock at mainstream retailers.

"They look there and buy here. A lot of people even ask for a suggestion for such-and-such an age, so you can tell generally that they are buying for Christmas," Moore said.

The Catholic Thrift Center in Wilmington, Del., was mobbed after word spread through a public housing project across the street that its inventory was available.

The shop also has been holding a two-for-one sale — buy a men's or women's shirt for \$1.50 and get one free.

Trading cards feature WWII battles, soldiers

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Forget hockey and hoops, football and baseball. When it comes to trading cards, this is the team to beat.

Big names? Try FDR, Churchill and Hitler. Heavy hitters? How about the Messerschmitt Me109, the B-17 Flying Fortress, the P-51 Mustang.

The World Series and Super Bowl? Small time compared to Midway, D-Day and the Battle of the Bulge.

After all, those other trading cards are only about games. This latest set, from Pacific Trading Cards, is about war.

And not just any war. It's the history of the Big One, World War II, neatly captured on 110 2 1/2-by-3 1/2-inch slips of cardboard.

Officials at the Lynnwood, Wash. company think there's an untapped market for this kind of collectible.

"We did a Desert Shield set earlier this year and that was a huge success," Pacific's Ann Hicks said. "And the war is going to be the subject of major media focus for the next few years. That

was a big factor in our decision to bring these out."

Pacific has a toll-free number, 1-800-551-2002, for buyers who wish to order the full set. Ten-card packs are to go on sale in some parts of the country in the next week or so at supermarkets and gift shops, and in hobby stores that already sell other trading cards.

But Pacific expects most of its buyers to be people who have never bought trading cards before, Hicks said. "Most will be from the generation of people who remember World War II," she said. "Basically, it will be people who have never bought a card in their lives."

The company won't give out expected sales figures, but Hicks said Pacific sold more than 20,000 sets of Desert Shield cards.

Networks want piece of cable system's pie

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission opened a public debate Thursday over whether it should discard a 21-year-old prohibition against television networks owning cable systems.

The unanimous vote to consider the matter came as commissioners look for ways to help the big-three broadcast networks, which fear that stiff competition from cable, satellite dishes and video rentals and sales will make them also-rans in the home entertainment industry, they once dominated.

"I'm not neutral on this matter," said FCC Chairman Alfred Sikes, who previously had suggested he was ready to scrap the "cross-ownership" rules. Sikes has taken the side of CBS, NBC and ABC against local broadcasters, who strongly favor keeping — the prohibition in place.

Other commission members said they're willing to hear more on the subject, but are not so sure about abandoning the rules.

"We have to seriously weigh the concerns of local broadcasters, both network affiliates and independents," said Commissioner Sherrie Marshall, who brought the matter before the commission.

Independent television stations fear that a network that owned a cable system could squeeze independents out of the system.

"It terrifies the hell out of us to have the thought of ABC owning a major cable system and being able to screw all the other stations in the market that are not an ABC affiliate," said James Hedlund, president of the Association of Independent TV Stations. "That's just too great a temptation to resist."

The National Association of Broadcasters, whose membership includes network affiliates, also wants to keep the rules in place,

believing that cable operators — the beneficiaries of TV broadcasters' — would benefit.

ABC has led the charge to toss out the regulations.

"We're certainly pleased with the opportunity to make our case before the FCC," said ABC spokeswoman Julie Hoover. "We think it's an important issue and we will be filing comments."

Spokesmen for two media watchdog groups voiced differing opinions on the issue.

Gigi Sohn of the Media Access Project said it could provide a check on the burgeoning power of cable television, although she was concerned about the possibility of a large cable operator buying a network.

But Jeffrey Chester of the Telecommunity Project, a group that opposes Ralph Nader, asked the decision to consider the issue, saying repealing the rules would "undoubtedly reduce even further the number of corporations in control of all of the nation's media."

"If such concentration is allowed to continue, consumers can expect further increases in cable rates and less diversity in programming choice," he said.

But Hoover said discarding the rules "can serve the goals of competition and diversity, which programming viewers need."

The FCC first adopted its prohibition against networks owning cable systems in 1970 but considered dumping the rules in 1982 after two of its own studies and one by a House subcommittee suggested they weren't needed.

The commission took another look at the rules in 1988 after questions about them were raised in a fourth report from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, a Commerce Department agency.

Horizon Air expands service to Calgary

SEATTLE (AP) — Horizon Air will offer service from Seattle and Bellingham to Calgary, Alberta, starting March 8.

Horizon said it would be the only airline to fly nonstop and direct between Western Washington and Calgary, which is 400 miles

northeast of Seattle.

Calgary will be the 35th city to be served by Seattle-based Horizon and the third in Canada. Service from Seattle to Vancouver and Victoria, British Columbia, began in 1989.

Horizon Air is a wholly owned subsidiary of Alaska Air Group Inc.

Test your thinking before 1992's elections

NEW YORK — The 1992 national elections may be decided on the general issue of the economy and the operating of pocketbooks, which means voters should prepare for a cascade of promises and programs...

And bombast and rhetoric too, of a sort that might disguise rather than reveal and confuse rather than clarify, compelling voters to hone their own thinking just to see through it all.

Here are a few of the challenges to your own thinking.

Do you want economic stimulus, or economic relief?

A subtle distinction exists, but it is no always made by candidates or voters. Stimulus implies overt government efforts to recharge the economy, even by direct intervention, while economic relief might mean the opposite.

The topic is a perennial. Ronald Reagan made it a campaign issue when he promised to get government off the backs of people, a reference to what many people perceived to be too much

government regulation and activity in the private sector.

Reagan's concept was to free the private sector to do what it seeks to do naturally, which is grow. In contrast, George Bush talks of stimulating the economy, jump-starting it, suggesting more active government intervention.

Relief might involve lower taxes, less red tape and an end to regulations that have lost meaning and effectiveness, which might have become more security blankets for taxpayers, or it might be hindering productivity.

Stimulus might also involve lower taxes and interest rates, but past attempts at stimulus also have involved government programs concerning jobs, health-care costs, housing, and, in addition, small business and much more.

Is it your intention when advocating tax cuts to include spending cuts as well?

Experience in the past two decades indicates that when taxes rise, spending also rises, but that when taxes are cut spending goes right on, eventually requiring tax increases.

To the chagrin of Ronald Reagan, it happened during his administration. One of his first acts was to lower taxes, but the entire impact of that initial tax cut was erased before he left office by repeated annual increases.

One reason for the increases was that spending also grew and, of course, budget imbalances too. They're continued growing. Many economists blame those imbalances — and tax increases aimed at lowering them — for this recession.

Tax cuts are relatively easy to enact, spending cuts almost impossible. Collectively, voters and their representatives may be for spending cuts, as individuals who might be affected, they find spending cuts hard to accept.

Do you believe that the rich must be made less rich in order to help the poor? Some candidates believe they can

win votes by attacking the rich, but the issue is probably more complex than that. To begin with, taking from the rich does not necessarily mean enriching the poor.

Do Americans abhor the rich, or do they aspire to that financial level themselves? Do they seek destruction of the entrepreneurial spirit that builds great enterprises and in the process throws off wealth?

It is the resentment against those whom they feel have acquired wealth without economic contribution, or who have acquired it illegally, or are using it without benefit to society, or who are seen as selfish and greedy?

It's a tricky issue, but many of those who've dissected it contend that a candidate worth the vote should have ideas on how to make the economy bigger, so that wealth could be distributed without taking from someone else.

Bake a bigger pie, they say, and everyone can have a bigger piece.

Morrow's latest movie effort on the homeless engulfs spirit of Christmas

Writer-producer Barry Morrow knew the kind of filmmaking he would be doing from the first time he sat behind a camera — as an employee of a university department of social work.

"The issues and themes they were interested in were the bedrock for all I've done since," he says.

His social concerns have manifested themselves in such critically acclaimed work as the TV movies "Bill" (about mental retardation) and "The Karen Carpenter Story" (an examination of anorexia), as well as his Oscar-winning screenplay for "Rain Man."

Most recently, he turned his attention to the plight of the homeless, and the result, "Christmas on Division Street," starring Hume Cronyn as a homeless 80-year-old and Fred Savage as a young boy he befriends, will be broadcast Sunday, Dec. 15, on CBS.

"I first saw a line of homeless men standing outside a mission when I was a boy," recalls Morrow, a product of St. Paul, Minn. "I wondered who they were and where they came from and why they didn't have what I had."

Thirty years later, Morrow read the story of a Philadelphia youngster, Trevor Ferrell, who in 1983 began a campaign to help his city's homeless.

"I went to visit this kid and his family and spent some time with them at home and on their evening runs into the city, when they distributed food and clothing to homeless men and women," he says.

Inspired by Trevor's commitment, Morrow began to work on a fictional story of an adolescent and his relationship with a homeless man, naming the young boy Trevor in honor of Ferrell and retaining the Philadelphia setting.

The focus of Morrow's story is "two individuals, rather than a movement."

Trevor Atwood (Savage) is a newcomer to Philly, finding his way in a strange school and town, when he encounters Cleveland Meriwether (Cronyn), an eccentric but wise man who lives in an alley in the central city.

The story, Morrow notes, is "a tale of friendship and giving," appropriate to Christmas in an America whose homeless men, women and children number in the hundreds of thousands.

As in "Rain Man" and "Bill," "Christmas on Division Street" is fundamentally about the growing closeness of two radically dissimilar people, one of whom doesn't fit into mainstream society.

Morrow admits that he may be

accused of repeating himself. "But when you get two people in a car or a room or an alley, there's no excuses; they've eventually got to be themselves."

Even if it is good drama, can a TV movie help the homeless?

One thing it can do, Morrow would argue, is give voice to those too often left silent.

He says, "To really feel the full loss (experienced by) the Meriwether character, you have to get his story, give him his time, reveal his pain."

It's the only kind of filmmaking Barry Morrow knows. He says, "I feel better when the picture has an important intention behind it."

"As much work as it is to make a film, if you don't feel you're doing something to help somebody, it's hard to carry it through."

Seattle anchor will host ABC's overnight newscast

ABC News has selected a Seattle anchorman to co-anchor its overnight "World News Now" program, which will be launched shortly after the first of the year.

Aaron Brown, who until Friday anchored the 11 p.m. news on CBS affiliate KIRO, hasn't signed yet but it's a done deal, network sources said Friday.

ABC is seeking a woman as co-anchor on the four-hour overnight news service.

Brown, a native of Minneapolis, joined NBC affiliate KING in Seattle in 1976 and eventually anchored the No. 1 11 o'clock news in the 13th-largest TV market.

In 1986 he was lured away by

KIRO, but he never recovered the same level of popularity, according to Kit Boss of the Seattle Times.

Brown is fortysomething. His wife, Charlotte Raynor, who has been a reporter at KING, will soon be apartment-hunting in New York.

Brown and Raynor have a 3-year-old daughter.

NBC News announced Friday it was eliminating some 20 staff jobs — all under the jurisdiction of the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians (NABET) — but the network said reassignments should keep the actual layoff total to fewer than 10.

The cuts were announced after a recent buyout offer fell short.

But, will Eileen Davidson fans from "Y and R" switch channels to catch up with a once beloved personality?

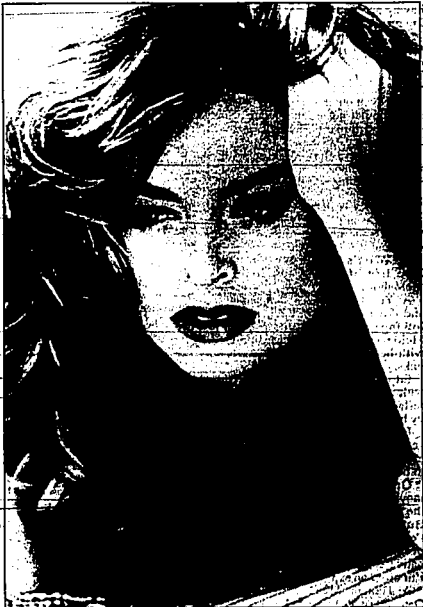
Miss Davidson won't go that far. "The Young and the Restless" is a group show," she says.

TV news guilty as charged in trial reporting

Television news came of age during extreme trials and tribulations for America and the Kennedy family.

A generation later, a trial of an entirely different order finds a Kennedy and his accuser as fair game twisting in television's snare.

Network TV provided an immeasurable public service by shepherding America through the trauma of the assassination of John F. Kennedy. This week's televised coverage of the rape trial of William Kennedy Smith has been a series of blows to the entire concept of public service. Not to mention due process, presumption of innocence and other legal niceties.

NBC continues to identify the victim. "A Current-Affair" hires its own jury. CNN employs an analyst to keep score.

CNN's continuous live coverage, reaching about 65 percent of the country, has included play-by-play commentary from trial lawyers Greta Van Susteren and Abbe David Lowell.

Van Susteren all but convicted Smith during her all-day stint Thursday. It's one thing to decode legal terminology for viewers. But it's quite another to say that Smith's alleged victim has "done a fabulous job" of testifying while defense attorney Roy Black was "picking at a lot of little things, but it's really much ado about nothing."

Van Susteren repeated essentially the same refrain throughout the day. Near the close of Thursday's cover-

age, she resorted to a soap-opera term, calling the trial a "cliffhanger."

Viewers are perfectly capable of making their own judgments without any cues from a paid referee who often blabbed while testimony was in progress.

CNN's other commentator, Lowell, tended to side with the defense during his tour of duty Friday.

Smith's uncle, Sen. Edward Kennedy, was that day's marquee witness. Called by the prosecution, he testified for about 45 minutes early Friday afternoon.

Kennedy's appearance was "antidramatic," but nonetheless "a net gain for the defense," Lowell deduced.

Meanwhile, CNN's on-site reporter, Charles Jaco, has used sports-related terms such as "a break in the action" and "scorecard," if one can be slightly flip about it.

Jaco arguably reached a career nadir Friday morning, when the alleged victim's underthings were being passed among jurors, to the seeming delight of a zoom lens.

"While the jurors are examining the bra, we'll take this break for these commercial messages," said Jaco, who was ducking Scud missiles in Saudi Arabia at the beginning of the year.

Close-ups of a gesturing Smith are being used as "bumpers" leading to and from CNN's commercial breaks. It's all just a show after all, a "cliffhanger" for our amusement.

The tabloid show "A Current

Affair" has hired its own jurors, five of whom sided with Smith after Thursday's testimony from his alleged victim. Three of the "jurors" believed her version of events, and one still was undecided. "Current Affair" delights in showing them arguing vociferously about whether she's a tramp. Reporter Steve Dunleavy delights in creating a spectacle. It boils down to a "case of which rich kid is lying," he informed viewers.

"NBC Nightly News," for its part, continues to be the only national television program to identify the alleged victim by name. Reporter Deborah Roberts used her name twice on Thursday's report, the second time during an accusatory conclusion to her story.

NBC News president Michael Gartner has said the public is entitled to know the accuser's identity. However, he seldom talks any more to reporters who want to question him about his management of NBC News.

The TV coverage of the William Kennedy Smith trial is yet another case study in the cheapening or erosion of standards. Where is all of this headed? Certainly not toward any curbs or restraints. Television is far more encompassing than it was a generation ago. Our television choices are multiplied well beyond what anyone foresaw in the mid-1960s. The increasingly fierce and sometimes desperate competition for viewers is leaving few standards unturned.

In this latest case, the supposedly blind scales of justice are being blindsided for all to see.
