# Andrus accuses DOE of blackmail

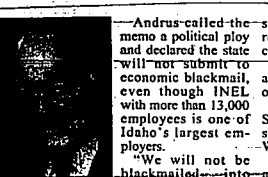
BOISE — The Federal Energy Department is trying to blackmail Idaho into submission, Gov. Cecil Andrus charged Thursday.

An Energy Department task force is studying the possibility of transferring programs from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in what Andrus called economic retaliation for his opposition to starting more radioactive waste in the state.

An internal memorandum from Energy Secretary James Watkins, prompted by a federal court order temporarily barring nuclear waste shipments into Idaho, called

for present and future operations at INEL to be examined.

The "examination" should include possible options for transfer of missions and activities at INEL to other national laboratories and contractor facilities should the current impasses with the state of Idaho and the impacts of the district court decisions prove to be insurmountable," said the Nov. 13 memorandum to Watkins' assistant secretary for nuclear energy.

Andrus called the memo a political ploy and declared the state "will not submit to economic blackmail, even though INEL with more than 13,000 employees is one of Idaho's largest employers."

"We will not be blackmailed into becoming the world's nuclear waste dump,"

Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings, whose district includes the INEL, said he would lodge a strong protest of Watkins' tactic.

"It's an outrageous display of administrative arrogance," Stallings said. "This message will get out and other states will be just as reluctant to deal with them because economic intimidation, economic threats, will not work."

# Government agencies now under Yeltsin

MOSCOW — Boris Yeltsin took control of the Kremlin, including Mikhail Gorbachev's office and all Soviet central government agencies except the defense and nuclear energy ministries, reports said Thursday.

The Russian president's actions, taken by decree, all but buried the Soviet Union, which has been dying a slow death since a hard-line coup failed in August.

NATO and the European Community indicated Thursday they were nearly ready to recognize the Soviet republics as independent states. In Washington, President Bush said U.S. recognition was "just going to take a little bit of time."

In an interview broadcast Thursday night on Soviet TV, Gorbachev accepted the Commonwealth.

"The epoch of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics is being closed, and the first page of the Commonwealth of Independent States is being opened," the Soviet president said.

He said he believed the new entity should be called the "Commonwealth of Independent Euro-Asian States," a formula he said was first discussed by the late Nobel laureate Andrei Sakharov, a long-time Soviet dissident.

Asked if his post will be liquidated, Gorbachev replied, "We are beginning a new life and let it be so."

But "anything should be done within the framework of the law," he said, to "rule out suspicions by part of society, which thinks that something has been done behind its back."

# Suspend pesticide residue testing, GAO recommends

WASHINGTON — The government's newest program for testing pesticide residues in fruits and vegetables is unreliable and won't significantly improve food safety, Congressional investigators say.

The \$24-billion Agriculture Department program should be suspended after current testing is finished and re-evaluated, the General Accounting Office said in a draft report obtained Thursday by The Associated Press.

USDA official Rusty Jessor called the findings "extremely premature," contending the report contained "numerous inaccuracies and incomplete data" on the program that began in April.

Investigators for the GAO, Congress' investigative agency, said the program was "behind schedule, proceeding with a reduced scope, and not producing ... reliable data — a key objective."

"The Pesticide Data Program is not providing expected improvements in pesticide residue data needed to make key regulatory decisions to ensure food safety," the GAO said.

In a major finding, the investigators said the Environmental Protection Agency cannot make immediate use of the test results in its ongoing program to establish safe levels for specific pesticides on food.

Citing the head of the EPA's Office of Pesticide Programs as its source, the GAO said the first-year data from USDA do not cover the chemicals expected to be the subject of pesticide re-registration decisions in the near future.

The investigators recommended that "the secretary of agriculture suspend residue data collection activities beyond the current efforts."

During the suspension, USDA should evaluate the program with officials of the EPA and the Food and Drug Administration, which has its own testing program; and reach formal agreement with those agencies on how the program can provide reliable information.

The report was ordered by Rep. Robert E. Wise Jr., D-W.Va., chairman of the House Government Operations subcommittee on government information, justice and agriculture. Wise said he would hold hearings on the program next year.

# Panel offers \$6 billion plan for better health

WASHINGTON — A divided federal panel Thursday recommended a \$6 billion plan to improve access to health care and reduce costs while various reforms are tested.

The Advisory Council on Social Security suggested its proposal could be financed by doubling taxes on alcohol and tobacco products, and estimated that a comprehensive change in the system could be in place by the turn of the century.

The panel, appointed in 1989 by Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan, estimated that its proposals would provide access to health care for about 20 million of the nearly 35 million uninsured Americans.

But the plan drew immediate criticism for not going far enough.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., said the proposal pays "lip service to the health care crisis." And the American College of Physicians said the report "fails to reflect what the public

increasingly understands: that comprehensive reform of the health care system is needed now."

Four of the panel's 13 members dissented with the majority report, saying the recommended measures were inadequate and that council had "failed in its major mission."

Sen. Edward Kennedy said the proposal "contains valuable suggestions" and "will be carefully considered."

The proposal includes:

- Creation of school-based medical clinics and insurance for children, the addition of 250 community health centers, and other access reforms, at a total cost of \$3 billion.
- Anti-smoking and disease-prevention measures such as elimination of tobacco subsidies and advertising restrictions on tobacco products.
- Small-business insurance reforms to ensure insurance protection when workers change jobs and prevent insurance companies from canceling policies because of claims experience.

# Juvenile detention center cost rises \$460,000

TWIN FALLS — Six Magic Valley counties received some "unwelcome," if not unexpected, holiday news Thursday. A state grant won't be enough to build a regional juvenile detention center.

That means taxpayers will have to shell out about \$460,000 to finish the project, which is still without a home and won't be completed for at least a year.

"Like the Grinch" that stole Christmas," said Blaine architect Joe Courad after unraveling the \$1,227 million

price tag at the Snake River Youth Center Board's December meeting.

Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williamson, who heads the Snake River Youth Center board, said the cost estimate didn't surprise him.

Juvenile detention centers are expensive, primarily due to the rigorous state and federal regulations governing such facilities, Williamson said.

"Another option is no detention," he said. "And I don't think that's acceptable."

portion of unused state funds, about \$26,000, has also been allocated to this region, Williamson said.

Cinrad brought to Thursday's meeting a set of plans and scale drawings to show county officials what the proposed detention center will look like and how it will fit on a couple of pieces of property currently being considered.

With the exception of the bottom line, board members say they liked what they saw. The building design — essentially cross-shaped — allows a central control unit to see all areas of the building and also provides for future expansion.

The plans are just lines on paper, however, until the issue of the old Q Bar building on Addison Avenue East is resolved.

Williamson said the location is tied up in that property, preventing the group from moving forward too quickly, he said.

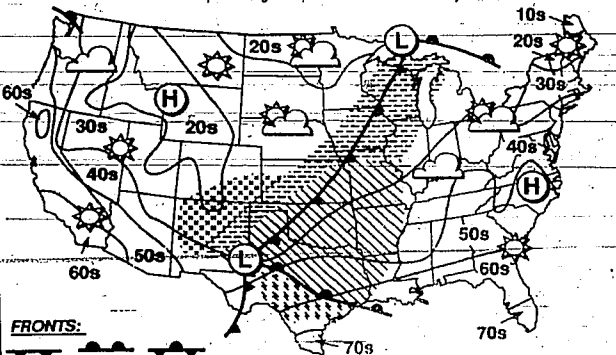
The counties paid \$119,000 for the 5,000 square-foot metal building, but the Twin Falls City Council ruled the location is not properly zoned for a juvenile detention center.

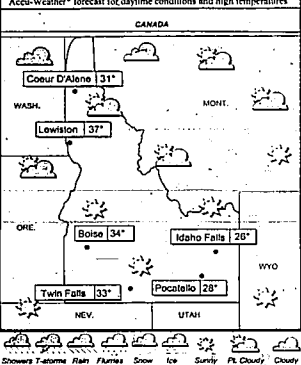

## Weather summary

## Wind, snow disrupt California traffic; rains soak Texas

Snow and strong wind wreaked havoc in California on Thursday, closing an interstate highway and knocking out power in areas of Los Angeles.

Heavy rain fell in Texas, and freezing rain turned roads into ice rinks in South Dakota.

Interstate 5 was closed in the mountains about 70 miles north of Los Angeles for most of the morning. As many as 40 trucks jackknifed or stalled as the area received up to 3 inches of snow and was hit with strong wind, officials said.

The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power reported about 12,000 customers without electricity after wind gusts caused line problems. About 7,000 customers in the Hollywood area lost power for about an hour.

In Texas, more than 6 inches of rain fell in San Antonio between midnight and noon, closing some roads and stranding motorists in low-lying areas.

Schools closed in eastern South Dakota after freezing rain coated roads with ice. Many sporting events and Christmas programs also were canceled due to dangerous driving conditions.

The mercury fell to 14 at New York City's Kennedy International Airport, breaking the record of 15 set in 1973. Bridgeport, Conn., tied a record with 10.

The low temperature in the Lower 48 states was 18 below zero at Hibbing, Minn. That was balmy compared to Alaska, where overnight lows included 47 below zero at Umiat.

Temperatures at 3 p.m., EST ranged from 9 at Caribou, Maine, to 75 at Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

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# Accuser fears rapes will go unreported

MIAMI (AP) — The woman who accused William Kennedy Smith of raping her told a national television audience Thursday night she decided to go public because she wanted to set an example for rape victims.

"I'm not a blue blob," Patricia Bowman, whose face was hidden by an electronic shield during nearly 10 hours of testimony at Smith's rape trial in West Palm Beach, said on ABC's "Prime Time Live."

"I have nothing to be ashamed of. ... I am terrified that victims everywhere have seen my case, and potential victims who have seen my case will not report because of what's happened to me."

Ms. Bowman, of Jupiter, Fla., was interviewed Tuesday by Diane Sawyer for Thursday night's segment. It was her first interview since she said she was raped nearly nine months ago by the 31-year-old nephew of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy. A jury last week acquitted Smith of rape and battery charges.

Ms. Bowman, 30, said news of the verdict literally knocked her off her feet. She was in one of the state attorney's offices when she heard it. She alleged Smith attacked her on the grounds of the Palm Beach estate in the early hours of March 30 after they went there from a nightclub. She said it was "terrifying" for her to testify with Smith in the courtroom.

She denied Smith's testimony that she had been sexually aggressive and led him on.

"It's incomprehensible for me to live every day of my life knowing that someone that night, and to hear what he said on that stand," she said tearfully. "I never did those things."

Watching Smith thank jurors and his supporters afterward, Ms. Bowman said it reminded her she had warned her "no one would believe her accusations."

"That's why I had to fight back from that point and go, 'No, you're wrong.' The police believed me; the prosecutor believed me; the state attorney believed me; there are millions of people out there who believe me. I believe me."

ABC made a transcript of Ms. Bowman's remarks available before the show was broadcast.

"constrained" department operations in Idaho.

Andrus precisely why I have been attempting to convene a constructive meeting between the governor and the Department of Energy," Craig said. "I will continue my efforts to insure that the future mission of INEL be a pure test agenda."

The governor scheduled a Jan. 22 nuclear waste summit in Boise in hopes of settling the long-running controversy. Some officials suggested Watkins was trying to sabotage it.

The governor suggested Watkins' memo had been put up to writing the memorandum by Symms and Craig, who have stridently objected to his confrontational handling of the waste dispute. Both have warned that failure to reach an accommodation with the department would threaten INEL's future.

"The governor's suspicions are totally baseless and I am very disappointed that he views the issue in a partisan political fashion," Craig said.

But the long-running waste battle was not always partisan. The Idaho delegation stood behind the governor's 1988 ban on continued shipments of plutonium-contaminated waste from the department's Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant in Colorado.

The split did not come until the department proposed moving spent fuel from the Fort St. Vrain reactor to Idaho. Symms and Craig feared

of Wright Avenue. It is privately owned, bounded on the east by a flood plain adjacent to a coulee and on the north by the railroad tracks.

Once a location is chosen and the counties give the go-ahead, the bidding process and construction will take about a year, Conrad said.

That means the area won't have a new juvenile detention center until at least the end of 1992 and may be already too late for Twin Falls County, said Norma Blass, Twin Falls county commissioner.

The county now detains male juveniles in a renovated building at the county fairgrounds in Filer. That program is strictly temporary and will have to be moved before the Twin Falls County Fair in September, said Kurt Friedenauer, director of the Youth Services Center in St. Anthony.

including the spent fuel in the ban would alienate the department.

But the senators agreed that a re-evaluation of INEL was only reasonable.

Symms spokesman Dave Pearson, called it "pure practical management," and Craig said it makes sense for Watkins to "seek out other locations in which to carry out the mandates of the Department of Energy if they cannot be done in Idaho."

Andrus has butted heads with the department in a running three-year battle over what he claims is a scheme to convert the INEL from a top nuclear research and development facility into the nation's radioactive garbage dump.

"I want them to tell me what mission is going to be removed, where it's going to move to and at what cost to the taxpayer," Andrus said. "If they want to move something, there's 2.4 million cubic feet of nuclear waste at INEL. I've been trying to get them to move that for 30 years."

But Andrus claimed Watkins was seeking a scapegoat for the havoc being wreaked on his department by a national nuclear policy that is being revised by dramatic new developments that have lessened the need for nuclear weapons production.

"If he thinks he's found himself a patsy to point a finger at, he's nuts," Andrus said.

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# BCCI pleading guilty to racketeering, will pay \$550 million

WASHINGTON (AP) — The failed Bank of Credit and Commerce International agreed Thursday to settle federal racketeering charges by forfeiting all its U.S. assets to pay depositors and shore up troubled U.S. banks it owned.

BCCI, a defunct worldwide banking operation now run by court-appointed receivers, will forfeit about \$550 million in U.S. assets, Justice Department officials said.

Attorney General William P. Barr said the agreement resolves all federal charges against the bank as an institution but that the government would press on with "the pursuit and prosecution of the individuals involved in the bank's wrongdoing around the world."

ing that it engaged in conspiracies to deceive bank regulators in the secret takeovers of Independence Bank of Encino, Calif., First American Bank of Washington and National Bank of Georgia.

It will also admit participating in money laundering, tax fraud and a stock manipulation scheme involving a failed Miami thrift, CentTrust Savings Bank.

Barr called the settlement "the largest single criminal forfeiture in the history of U.S. law enforcement."

BCCI agreed to plead guilty to racketeering charges, admitting that it engaged in conspiracies to deceive bank regulators in the secret takeovers of Independence Bank of Encino, Calif., First American Bank of Washington and National Bank of Georgia.

Almost half the forfeited money will be placed in a contingency fund for federal bank regulators who may need to prop up the two financially troubled banks BCCI now admits it illegally controlled, according to the plea agreement between prosecutors and BCCI's liquidators.

The liquidators also agreed to immediately put \$5 million into Independence Bank, suggesting that the bank was in need of an immediate infusion of cash.

The rest of the forfeited money will be placed in a worldwide fund to compensate depositors, mostly in Britain, and other investors caught in the demise of BCCI. The bank does not have enough assets to pay all claims, which total nearly \$20 billion worldwide against estimated assets of \$1 billion to \$2 billion.

Trustees will be appointed to operate both First American and Independence. The \$265 million contingency fund will be used to either recapitalize the institutions or offset any losses to federal deposit insurance funds if they should fail, officials said.

However, Rep. Charles E.

Schumer, chairman of the House crime subcommittee, said he was concerned that the bank insurance fund's liability for the possible failure of First American Bank, Independence Bank or both would go beyond the amount BCCI agreed to set aside.

Schumer also objected that "Abu Dhabi, at the center of the bank's fate is not a party to the agreement, and nothing in the agreement clearly addresses missing, if not destroyed documents."

In addition to the federal plea agreement, BCCI will plead guilty in New York to state charges of fraud and theft and pay a \$10 million fine.

They were charged last month with racketeering in connection with their alleged role in BCCI's secret takeover of Independence Bank in 1985 and in manipulation of CentTrust stock.

Abedi and Naqvi also face fraud and theft charges brought by Manhattan District Attorney Robert Morgenthau. Abedi is in Pakistan and Naqvi is being held by authorities in Abu Dhabi. Pharoan is being sought. Justice Department officials said efforts are being made to extradite these defendants.

Meanwhile, fresh charges against three former BCCI officials were unsealed Thursday in Miami. Federal prosecutor Marcella Cohen announced a money laundering indictment against BCCI and three Florida-based officials who ran its Boca Raton and Latin American operations in the 1980s.

## Grand jury will decide whether Kevorkian will face murder charge

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) — A grand jury will decide whether to bring murder charges against a doctor who used his so-called suicide machines to help two women kill themselves, a prosecutor said Thursday.

A medical examiner ruled Wednesday that the deaths assisted by Dr. Jack Kevorkian in October were homicides, not suicides.

Oakland County Prosecutor Richard Thompson also said he would seek to have Kevorkian held in contempt of court for violating a judge's order imposed after a 1990 assisted suicide, that he refrain from helping people kill themselves.

The 63-year-old retired pathologist's medical license was suspended after the October deaths. Kevorkian is appealing the suspension.

Kevorkian's attorney, Geoffrey Fieger, exchanged barbs with Thompson in separate news conferences. Fieger accused Thompson of waging a vendetta against the doctor, while Thompson said Kevorkian and Fieger were "attempting to turn these serious proceedings into a media circus."

Thompson refused to reveal details of the grand jury's investigation. Fieger said several family members of the dead women had received subpoenas to testify on Jan. 6, but he predicted they wouldn't talk

to the grand jury unless they were granted immunity from prosecution.

If not, they will read a statement to the grand jury telling Mr. Thompson that he is a buffoon and taking the Fifth Amendment against self-incrimination, Fieger said.

Dr. Ljubisa J. Dragovic, the Oakland County medical examiner, filed amended death certificates Wednesday for Marjorie Wentz, 58, of Sodus, and Sherry Miller, 43, of Roseville, saying their deaths were homicides. The two died Oct. 23 after using suicide devices Kevorkian created.

A first-degree murder charge was dismissed against Kevorkian for his role in helping Janet Adkins of Portland, Ore., commit suicide in June 1990. Kevorkian hooked her to a device similar to the one Wentz used and Adkins pushed a button giving herself a lethal injection.

After her death, Oakland County Circuit Judge Alice Gilbert ordered Kevorkian not to use his suicide machine again or otherwise help anyone commit suicide.

Michigan has no law prohibiting physician-assisted suicide. Several bills have been introduced in the Legislature since Kevorkian boldly announced that he would aid terminally ill people who wanted to kill themselves.

One bill would regulate physician-assisted suicide, another would ban it and a third would create a commission to deal with issues of death and dying.

## Officials urge vaccinating babies

ATLANTA (AP) — Government health experts Thursday added hepatitis B, a potentially deadly cause of liver disease, to a list of immunizations infants ought to get.

The Centers for Disease Control's immunization committee recommended a three-dose series of hepatitis B vaccine between birth and 18 months.

The physicians charge from \$25 to \$50 a shot, so the move would mean higher pediatricians' bills for parents. But it also could mean an eventual end to hepatitis B in this country, the CDC said.

Hepatitis B virus infects 200,000 to 300,000 Americans each year, mostly through sexual contact or

shared drug needles. It also is spread easily from mother to newborn.

An estimated 1 million or more U.S. patients have been left with chronic infections that can be passed to others. In most cases, hepatitis B causes symptoms such as jaundice or abdominal pain. But in serious instances it can cause acute liver disease, cirrhosis and even cancer, and it kills around 5,000 Americans a year.

The vaccination strategy should begin to break the chain of hepatitis B transmission in about 20 years, said Dr. Harold Margolis, chief of the CDC's Hepatitis Branch. This is a long-term strategy, he said.

Dr. Russell Van Dyke, associate professor of pediatrics at the Tulane University School of Medicine, agreed that universal vaccinations would break the chain but warned,

"Those kids are going to have to grow up first."

"It's a good question whether we should be immunizing older kids as well," Van Dyke said. "A lot of people think we should be."

The CDC's Immunization Practices Advisory Committee, in its report, also said vaccinating adolescents or adults would be substantially more expensive, while the recommended childhood shots can be given during already recommended routine doctors' visits.

## Dispatch logs indicate CHP knew visibility was bad before accidents

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — The California Highway Patrol knew dust was obscuring visibility on Interstate 5 three hours before a chain-reaction collision killed 17 people last month, according to recorded dispatch reports.

Sgt. Ted Eichmann on Thursday defended the highway patrol's actions in the Nov. 29 storm and said "we're not doing anything differently" as dust storms that swept over stretches of the highway.

But the state Transportation Department closed the highway near the site of the pileups for 45 minutes during the worst of Thursday's wind, and put out flashing signs that read, "Just storm ahead, proceed with caution."

After the pileups, Gov. Pete Wilson

ordered crews to put out message signs during high wind conditions.

"On the tapes of the November crash, which were checked by The Fresno Bee, one officer reported three hours before the pileups that wind was "probably in the 40 mile-an-hour range at this time and we do have blowing sand and dust with visibility starting to diminish."

Another officer reported about 10 minutes before the 93-vehicle crash:

"At times, we have 50 feet or less visibility, and I can't get traffic to slow down. ... We're going to have more problems if we don't do something."

The tapes also revealed that as many as 10 vehicles were involved in collisions within a half-mile of where

the huge pileup occurred minutes later. Several injuries resulted from the earlier accidents, but no fatalities.

Eichmann said the dispatches from the field that day didn't warrant a closure of the interstate, California's main north-south artery.

"We have to consider what's best for the overall motoring public," he said. "If we start putting them on secondary highways, we have more problems. The interstate is designed to be the safest highway through that area."

John Anderson, the highway patrol's chief for the central San Joaquin Valley, has fended off criticism of the reaction to the November pileup by saying, "We never had a report of limited visibility at the scene of the accident."

## Court rules parked cars OK for sex

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Sex in a parked car is allowed, as long as no one is likely to see you. New York state's top court ruled Thursday.

The Court of Appeals threw out charges of public lewdness against three women arrested in Buffalo in separate incidents in 1989.

The court, ruling in a 6-1 decision, said the parked cars where the women were having sex with men were not a "public place" under state law because it was early morning, it was dark out and the women were unlikely to see what the couples were doing.

The women's lawyer, David Schopp, had argued the lewdness law did not apply because the women were parked where they could not "readily be observed."

"There has to be the real likelihood that someone just walking by can see this thing," Schopp said. "If it's a convertible and it's high noon and it's in a public place, then (the car) is a public place."

Prosecutors in the Erie County district attorney's office claimed the women were guilty of public lewdness because a city street is a public place and the women were visible to passersby.

District Attorney Kevin Dillon said the ruling would help police enforce prostitution laws by defining the limits of public lewdness.

"This will simply give police officers a degree of certainty of what they can do and what they cannot do," Dillon said.

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## Research corrects cholesterol levels

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a pathfinder experiment for human beings expected next year, researchers successfully manipulated genes in laboratory rabbits to fix an inherited disorder that causes lethal levels of cholesterol.

Dr. James Wilson of University of Michigan Medical Center said that rabbits that received the manipulated genes experienced a decrease in serum cholesterol of 30 percent to 50 percent, a result not possible with any other therapy.

"The human experiment is essentially identical to this rabbit experiment," said Wilson. The Food and Drug Administration currently is considering an application for human trials of the gene therapy technique and is expected to give approval by the end of February. The application already has been approved by the National Institutes of Health.

A report on the rabbit study is to be published Friday in the journal Science.

## Bush lobbyist leaves

WASHINGTON (AP) — Frederick D. McClure, the chief White House lobbyist, said Thursday he is resigning to become director of a banking investment firm in his native Texas.

McClure, 37, will step down Feb. 1 to become a director and member of the management committee of First Southwest Co. of Dallas, which specializes in advising government agencies on public financing.

**Tragedy stalks home park**

CLINTON, Conn. (AP) — The Evergreen Trailer Park is a quiet, wooded community with neatly landscaped homes along a river where children skate and feed the mallards.

But death stalks the park. On Tuesday, Michael Raffuse, 5, and his 3-year-old sister, Nicole, were pulled from the Indian River after falling through the ice.

Doctors resuscitated both children, but Michael died Wednesday and Nicole died Thursday.

During the past 10 years, there have now been four drownings, three deaths by fire and a kidnapping-murder. Five victims have been young children. There are a lot of ghosts walking around here," said resident Sue Seabrook.

Authorities don't know how long Michael and Nicole were submerged, and are investigating why the children died outside unsupervised. Their mother, Diana Raffuse, was at work but her live-in boyfriend, Scott Onofrio, and a 16-year-old baby sister were home at the time, authorities said.

Apparently nobody checked on them for a period, said Police Chief Joseph Faughnan. Police said Onofrio, 22, was charged Oct. 24 with risk of injury to a minor after three other young children he was baby sitting were found playing by themselves in a condominium parking lot. The oldest child was 6. Raffuse, 30, also has a 1½-year-old son who was in the trailer when his siblings fell in the river about 75 feet away, police said.

The 100-trailer park, filled with hemlocks, firs and blue spruce, is home to many working-class couples and retirees. In this middle-class, mostly bedroom community of 13,000 on the coast 20 miles east of New Haven, Evergreen and two other trailer parks are the only places where the less well-off can afford to own a home.

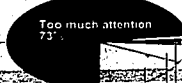
Last December, three siblings, ages 4, 2, and 1, died when a fire swept through their trailer. Residents still recall in horror how the children never had a chance because the trailer burned so quickly.

Elderly men drowned in the river in 1982 and 1986. In 1983, an Evergreen resident kidnapped his neighbor, a 19-year-old woman, and murdered her.

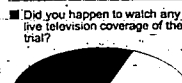

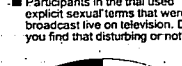

NEW YORK (AP) — William Kennedy Smith's trial, seen by more people than any rape trial in history, may have little impact on people's perceptions of how courts deal with rape accusations, a poll indicates.

The Associated Press telephone poll of 1,003 Americans, taken Friday through Tuesday, found:  
 • A majority, 53 percent, said that they saw or heard of the trial had not changed their level of confidence in the court system as a result of the trial. Ten percent said they gained confidence, and only 27 percent had confidence shaken.

• Most, 73 percent, said news organizations paid too much attention to the trial.  
 • Only 43 percent believed the outcome, in which a jury in West Palm Beach, Fla., acquitted Smith last week, would make a woman less likely to press rape charges.

The poll by ICR Survey Research Group of Media, Pa., has a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.  
 George F. Cole, an expert on the administration of criminal justice, said the trial simply confirmed people's unrealistic notions of courts as places where "the whole 'Perry Mason'-'L.A. Law' scenario is played out."

Instead, most cases are plea bargained, said Cole, a political science professor at the University of Connecticut. "If they could see cases being handled every few minutes, then you would see some loss of confidence in the court," he said.

Everette Dennis, executive director of the Freedom Forum Media Studies Center, said he considered news coverage of the trial generally quite sensible. But he added, "If people think they understand the legal process because they watched two weeks of Court TV, they are mistaken."

Dennis said he saw a fundamental

inconsistency between the high numbers of people who watched, and those who thought there was too much coverage.  
 Among both men and women, and in all age categories, more than seven in 10 adults said news organizations paid too much attention to the trial, which drew about 500 media representatives from several countries.

The coverage was so saturating that 56 percent reported they watched the trial on television. Kennedy Smith's many must have only seen news clips. The cable networks CNN and Court TV, which provided almost all the live coverage, don't reach tens of millions of people, especially during daytime.

Donald S. Kellermann, director of the Times Mirror Center for The People & The Press, said the relatively new availability of live courtroom television was just one of the factors that stirred media competition on the story.  
 "If you were going to construct a hypothetical case of celebrity, sex, crime, you could not have pushed more buttons than this one," Dennis said.

Kellermann, who conducts polls regularly on news interest, said he was not surprised by the big majority faulting the media. Only 18 percent said the media paid the right amount of attention to the trial. "People are somewhat uneasy about following scandal as closely as most of us really can't help but do," he said.

Bickley Townsend of the Roper Organization said she saw a similar "socially correct response" in polls in which people claim to favor public television over the type of shows they really watch.  
 "I think the media has to do its job, which is to cover what editors and producers think is the news and take the rap where the rap comes," Kellermann said.

"I think there is a perfect antidote to too much press coverage. That is, don't watch," said Dennis.

President Bush said Tuesday he was worried that televised trials were subjecting Americans to "filth and indecent material."

The poll found that only among those age 55 or older did a majority find it disturbing that explicit sexual terms were broadcast during live trial coverage.

**Obstruction charge dies**

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A Palm Beach County grand jury declined to return an indictment after investigating possible obstruction of justice at the Kennedy estate, prosecutors said Thursday.

The grand jury, which heard secret testimony from Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., last August, indicated evidence was lacking to return an indictment. Longtime Kennedy family friend William Barry had been identified as the investigation's target.

"Without any new evidence coming forward, this case is over," State Attorney David Bludworth said.

He added that the statute of limitations on the misdemeanor charge is March 30, and he would review any new information that might become known before then.

Palm Beach police claimed that Barry misled them when they went to the estate March 31 and asked to see the senator and his nephew, William Kennedy Smith, Smith left Palm Beach later that day and Kennedy the next day without talking to police.

Smith was later charged with raping a woman at the estate March 30, but a jury last week acquitted him. The senator testified in his trial here, and during his testimony recalled that Barry had wrested the gun from his brother's assassin in 1968.

Barry, who was a close friend and bodyguard for the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, had denied intentionally misleading police.

He didn't immediately return messages left at his New York consultancy firm.

**Daughter's death brings ultimate penalty**

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A fundamentalist Muslim couple were sentenced to death Thursday for killing their Westernized teen-age daughter, whose screams for mercy were recorded secretly by the FBI.

Zein Isa, 61, and his wife, Maria, 48, were sentenced to die by injection for the 1989 stabbing death of 16-year-old Tina Isa at the family's apartment. The FBI had begged the apartment.

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**Ornament sales now nationwide**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Christmas tree ornaments featuring the season's holiday stamps are being sold at post-offices nationwide for the first time.

The over-the-counter sales were expanded after two years of sales in a limited number of offices, plus mail order, postal officials said.

Two silver-plated ornaments are made available each year, one with

the traditional stamp and the other with the contemporary postage enclosed in plastic in the center. They also bear a code on the back indicating what postal division sold them.

They sell for \$14.95 and should be available in most post offices. They may also be ordered from the U.S. Postal Service, Philatelic Sales Division, Box 44997, Kansas City, Mo. 64144-9997.

# Baker says Russia will succeed USSR as nuclear superpower

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The Russian republic, seeing itself as the successor to the Soviet Union, will remain a nuclear power and in that way contribute to keeping the peace, Secretary of State James A. Baker III said Thursday.

However, the three other republics with nuclear weapons on their soil — Ukraine, Byelorussia and Kazakhstan — are to sign an international treaty to prohibit the spread of nuclear arms and technology and eventually get rid of the weapons, Baker said.

There are some 27,000 weapons in the dissolving Soviet Union, Baker said. He received assurances on his trip this week to the four republics, and also to Kirgizia, that the weapons would be put under a single command and carefully safeguarded.

"I would like to see zero weapons targeted on the United States, but I am not prepared today to subscribe to the philosophy of denuclearization," Baker said after reporting that Russia, by far the most powerful of the republics, would retain at least some missiles.

In fact, Baker said, Russia in that way would contribute to deterrence, "the key to peace for more than 40 years."

Some of the missiles are aimed at China, but Baker declined to say which potential attackers would be deterred by the Russian missiles, just as he refused to identify who U.S. nuclear arms would defend against.

Even so, Russia would take on the Soviet Union's commitment to guard against nuclear proliferation, and the overall reduction of Soviet stockpiles "may open up possibilities for further progress in the reduction and elimination of nuclear weapons," Baker said.

He reported his findings on the nuclear situation, and also the danger of social explosion and food shortages, to the foreign ministers of the 16-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The allies decided to make their logistical network and also technical expertise available to the republics to assist in delivering food and medicine. "These problems pose a serious threat to the reform process and to stability in Europe," the foreign ministers said in a communique.

It was another example of the way the military alliance is transforming itself into a political and social organization now that the West no longer feels itself threatened by the Soviet Union.

Manfred Woerner, the NATO secretary-general, told reporters "the al-

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# President not pleased with talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush expressed disappointment Thursday that the Palestinian-Israeli negotiators failed to surmount a procedural impasse at this week's peace talks.

And a senior Palestinian official expressed regret the United States failed to intervene in the talks, which ended Wednesday.

The administration cannot be counted as an "even-handed peace broker" because "of its special relations with Israel," Palestinian spokeswoman Hanan Ashrawi told reporters.

"I would like to make it clear: there was no progress. It was a criminal waste of time," she said.

U.S. officials disagreed, saying they were encouraged by the fact that bitter enemies sat down together after 43 years of war, and felt Israelis and Palestinians would soon resolve their deadlock.

"It is going to be done at the negotiating table," Bush said about efforts to address the Palestinian question. "And thank God it has started."

Bush said he was told "some progress was made."

However, "a lot of time was spent talking about modalities and locations," Bush told reporters at a White House news conference, "and obviously we would have liked to see more progress."

Palestinians, intent on demonstrating their independence as a people and their desire for a country of their own, are demanding that Israel negotiate with them separately, Israel is projecting an independent Palestinian state, and the joint Palestinian-Israeli negotiating umbrella for the talks.

The United States made clear that the joint forum, agreed to before the Oct. 20 start of the Mideast talks in Madrid, would be preserved.

U.S. officials could not say whether the joint talks, under the auspices of the Palestinian-Jordanian "process," further, Secretary of State

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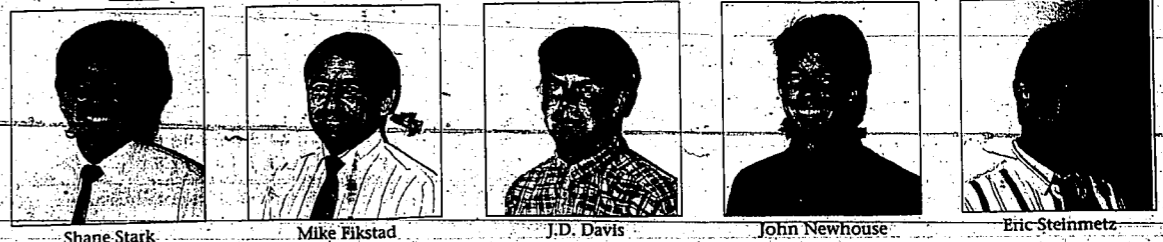

# Jobless claims show dim picture

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly half a million laid off workers filed new jobless claims three weeks before Christmas, the government said Thursday, suggesting at best a stagnant economy and at worst a renewed decline.

But in a rare bright spot in an otherwise gloomy picture, the Commerce Department said record exports shrank the nation's merchandise trade deficit by 2.9 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$7.7 billion for October.

For the week ended Dec. 7, Americans filed—a seasonally adjusted—493,000 new claims for unemployment insurance, 79,000 more than the week before, the Labor Department said.

It's consistent with this evidence that the economy is just sort of hanging in there somewhere between stagnation and slight slippage," said economist Robert Dederick of the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago. "The expansion has stalled and the risks are all on the down side."

An even more pessimistic Bruce Steinberg of Merrill Lynch said, "I think the economy is declining right now. I don't think we're just stalled out."

Economists were cheered by the better-than-expected trade report but warned that economic sluggishness abroad will restrain U.S. export sales through much of next year.

In a move likely to further dampen European growth, Germany's central bank on Thursday raised its key interest rates by half a percentage point. The Bundesbank is trying to head off inflationary pressures as Germany borrows heavily to finance its unification.

Despite the overall trade improvement, the deficit with Japan jumped 11 percent to \$4.64 billion, the biggest imbalance since February 1989.

President Bush on Thursday met with business leaders he is taking on a trip to Asia later this month. Bush hopes to prod Japan into opening its markets to American goods.

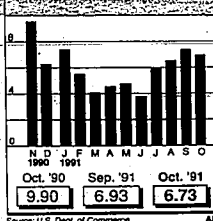
"That means the same three words: jobs, jobs and jobs," Bush said.

Among the executives meeting with the president was General Motors Corp. Chairman Robert Stempel, who announced Wednesday that GM would shut 21 factories and eliminate 74,000 jobs over the next four years.

The number of new unemployment claims during the first week of December matched the 493,000 filed during the first week of November and approached the levels last seen

during the depths of the recession earlier this year. It brought the total number of people drawing benefits to 3.48 million.

The initial-claims level hit an eight-year high in March of 540,000 and then shrank to around 400,000 in July before starting to climb again.

Analysts had expected an increase in the labor support, because the recession had left workers with one less day than usual in which to file claims. But the 79,000 rise was about double what they were predicting in advance.

Economists caution against reading too much into week-to-week fluctuations in the highly volatile claims numbers. But they have watched with concern as the four-week running average has crept steadily higher since midsummer.

The average during the latest four-week period was 449,000, up from 443,500 the previous four weeks.

The five states with the largest increases in initial unemployment insurance claims for the week ending Dec. 7 were California, 30,900; North Carolina, 19,700; Illinois, 19,300; and Ohio, 10,400.

The early December jump could be a harbinger of bad news when the unemployment rate for the entire month is released Jan. 10. The rate was 6.8 percent in November and analysts fear that it could return to the 7 percent level it hit earlier in the recession.

# 1 U.S. household in 5 moves each year

WASHINGTON (AP) — Each year nearly one American household in five pulls up stakes and moves, though mobility has slowed a bit as the economy has weakened, the government said Thursday.

A 1989 Census Bureau survey found 16.9 million households moved in the previous 12 months, making the United States one of the most mobile nations in the world.

Nearly half the nation's households have moved into their present homes since 1985, and nearly three quarters have moved since 1975, the report said.

Fewer than one household in 11 has stayed put since 1960.

The survey found Americans a little less likely to move in the late 1980s, a period in which the economy started to weaken after five years of prosperity.

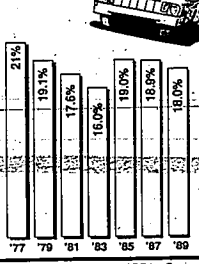
The likelihood of a household moving dropped nearly 5 percent from 1987 to 1989.

"People don't move to find work. They move because they already have a job somewhere else," said Alex deShetler, a geographer with the Population Reference Bureau. "If things aren't good in one part of the country, there's no guarantee things are good elsewhere."

Americans are more than twice as likely to move as people living in other industrial nations, such as France, Japan, Britain and Sweden.

# Man finds remains of million-year-old sloth

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) — A search for a place to skateboard turned up a find that has folks at the Smithsonian Institution pretty happy.

Mike Young, 24, an amateur geologist, went searching for a place to skateboard several weeks ago and came upon a spot he thought might hold fossilized sand dollars or shark teeth, said his fiancée, Heather Smith.

His search yielded bones, then more bones. Ms. Smith said Thursday, Young was out of town and couldn't be reached for comment, she said.

Smithsonian scientists in Washington, D.C., visited the site last week and said the bones are from an emotherium mirabile, a sluggish, clumsy, bear-like animal about the size of an elephant.

The scientists took a thigh bone, foot bones, three large claws, vertebrae, ribs and teeth to Washington for testing, which will attempt to determine their age, among other things.

"They are pretty rare," said the Smithsonian's Dave Bohaska. "We don't know how many of the bones are still there, but it is a pretty significant find."

Although ground sloths, which weighed about 3 tons, were able to stand on their hind legs, they moved about on all fours, feeding on leaves, grass and herbs.

Ground sloths lived about 1.6 million years ago in what's now part of Georgia, South Carolina, Florida and Texas. This was only the second discovery of ground sloth remains this far north, Bohaska said.

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## VA drops mortgage rate to 8%

WASHINGTON (AP) — The maximum interest rate on mortgages guaranteed by the Department of Veterans Affairs was ordered cut Thursday by half a percentage point to 8 percent, the lowest in 14 years.

The reduction, effective Friday, will bring the rate for conventional, 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages a full two points lower than November 1990, when it was 10 percent. The decline was in line with recent rate changes in non-federally backed mortgages.

"The drop in the rate will have the practical effect of stimulating the economy and boosting the housing industry by allowing more veterans to qualify for home loans," said VA Secretary Edward J. Derwinski.

It should also spur veterans to refinance mortgages taken out at higher rates, he said.

The monthly payment on a typical VA loan of \$84,500 will be \$620.05, down from \$741.56 just over a year ago.

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# Santa's helpers seem everywhere in NYC

NEW YORK (AP) — From a laid-back Santa in a Saks boutique who gently lulls "Ho, ho, ho" to a muscle-bound Jolly One at A&S who gets requests for cold cash, there's no lack of variety among department-store St. Nicks this year.

Macy's, the setting for the movie "Miracle on 34th Street," is not alone in insisting that "the real one" can be found only at its Santaland, which is drawing thousands of youngsters each day.

Besides, this is a city where a score of Clauses, some collected for charity, can be spotted during a stroll in midtown Manhattan. Parents are practiced in the old explanation about Santa's helpers.

At Abraham & Straus in downtown Brooklyn, families can choose between a black Santa and a white one, a choice the store says has been available for 25 years.

# Family sends same card for 50 years

LONG BEACH, Miss. — Mickey Gilley must have sung the song for them.

"The old Christmas card," country music star Gilley sings, "brings back memories dear to me."

"It's faded and worn. It's as precious as the moon."

"So pardon me if a tear falls among my Christmas cheer. It's the memory of an old Christmas card."

"Twas a joke back then. The Harrises sent the card back in 1943 and every odd year since, and the Hogans returned it to them in the odd years.

Once the parents died, Ernie Harris took over his side of the family's mailing responsibilities, and David Hogan of Pine Bluff, Ark., did the same. In deference to Uncle Billy's calling, the card is always mailed — usually by certified post — and never hand-delivered.

On the card are chronicled the births and deaths of three generations "in" the family. Standing ready to continue the tradition for at least another 50 years, are Ernie's teen-age kids: Leah and Marc.

Ernie's Uncle Billy — William Hogan, postmaster of Epp, La. — sent the card to Ola Mae, his sister, and her husband, Moise, who was something of a skinflint. The card — actually two cards tied together, a joke borne of wartime austerity — depicts a leaping Scotsman with a penny-pinching message.

"Indeed, for the 50th year in a row, the waggish Christmas card that brings tears to the Harrises' eyes will journey across state lines.

The card exchange began as a gag in 1942, when Ernie Harris was born to Ola Mae and Moise Harris of Pass Christian, Miss.

"Merry Christmas and that goes double," the card says in part. "Far a-verry special friend like ya, I couldna be friendlier."

"And sae I bought two cards instead o' only one."

"Before ye faint frae such a shock ... I must admit that one was free, sae two were just as cheap!"

Just a peek at the card reduces Shannon and Ernie to tears.

"It's just sentimental to me," said Ernie as he exited the living room of his home in Long Beach and went into the kitchen to cry, leaving a visitor to read old newspaper articles about the card he has collected.

The card represents many joys, but also is indelibly stained with tragedy.

In 1970, when Ernie was a fire-fighter in Pass Christian, he was dispatched to a fire late one night. What he didn't know as the fire truck screamed into the night was that his destination was his mother's home. Ola Mae was inside the flaming house; Ernie later picked up her charred remains.

"If you know anything about being a fireman, that's enough to kill you right there," said Ernie.

The Christmas card, which Ernie says he loves as much as he loves his family, was with the Hogans the year of that horrible fire.

# Arkansas couple adorn house with million lights

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — More than a million red Christmas lights adorn the house of a family whose electrifying ornamentation stops traffic in the neighborhood and has even caused a power outage.

"I guess moderation is not in my vocabulary. To me, bigger is better," said 48-year-old Jennings Osborne.

By mid-December, 1,173,180 small lights covered Osborne's house and yard, said Richard McCormack, who oversees the gaudy display.

McCormack figures that works out to 92.1 miles of lights, which by his account isn't enough. "I'm going to add to that," he said last week.

The fiery glow can be seen from blocks away in traffic, sometimes coming to a standstill in the affluent neighborhood. People crane their necks from car windows to gawk, and some get out to take a closer look.

The couple refused to say how much the lights cost at their December electric bill, though Mitzi Osborne said it is lower than at the peak of the summer, when the air conditioning runs all the time.

The display includes three cone-shaped trees made from red lights on the roof of the house; the tallest rises 70 feet. A fourth tree sits atop a large fountain.

There are among our fellow residents of the Magic Valley, a few everyday heroes.

Some of them mold young lives through organizations such as the Boy Scouts, others serve as companion and lifeline to senior citizens otherwise alone in the world, volunteer to help the profoundly retarded or wait out the wrenching final hours with a dying stranger.

And there are a few others who make it their business to help people the rest of us would rather forget.

By now, most of us have grown pretty adept at looking through the homeless as they cross our paths, even here in the Magic Valley.

The ragged man collecting aluminum cans, the family sleeping in a battered car behind a restaurant, the bleary-eyed woman pushing a shopping cart containing a few ragged belongings through the downtown streets.

But Lloyd LeClair and the other volunteers at the St. Edward's soup kitchen in Twin Falls and Hazel Reeves at the Helping Hands Christian Outreach in Burley see them all the time. So do the folks at the

Salvation Army and South Central Community Action.

Having to depend on someone else for your next meal, your next bed, your next coat, the toys for your kids, Christmas is something that isn't supposed to happen in America.

It does happen, though, and the few of our fellow citizens who help these people have to deal as much with that shattered sense of self-worth as with the physical needs of those who need help.

There are, finally, some government-level efforts to provide more permanent solutions to homelessness in the Magic Valley. The Homeless Shelter Task Force is negotiating for a building in Twin Falls, and a duplex unit recently opened at El Milagro housing project, with more units under construction.

But in the meantime, those who have nothing depend almost wholly upon the kindness of strangers.

# BPA chooses 3 sites for geothermal plans

PORTLAND (AP) — The Bonneville Power Administration today announced three sites for joint geothermal energy ventures to explore the Northwest's potential for generating electricity from hot groundwater.

The Cascade Basin and the Snake River Basin have huge potential, but they are relatively unexplored, said George Darr, geothermal program manager for BPA.

"We've got resource estimates that go from 4,000 megawatts to umpteen megawatts," he added. "One of the reasons we're trying to get this program going is to get a better sense of what's going to be available."

After assessing seven proposals from Oregon, California and British Columbia, BPA chose three:

Newberry Volcano, located in central Oregon near the new Newberry Volcanic National Monument, to be developed by California Energy Co. of Omaha, Neb., and the Eugene (Ore.) Water and Electric Board. Cal Energy has estimated the cost of the plant at \$40 million to \$60 million, and development costs at \$8 million to \$12 million.

Glass Mountain, located in Northern California on the Modoc National Forest, to be developed by Unocal Corp. of Los Angeles. Cost estimates weren't immediately available.

Vale, located on U.S. Bureau of Land Management land in Eastern Oregon about 15 miles west of the Idaho border, to be developed by Trans-Pacific Geothermal Corp. of Oakland, Calif. Cost estimates weren't immediately available.

They were chosen for the geothermal potential of the site and the developer's potential to go through what could be a lengthy and expensive process to meet environmental concerns, as well as to drill wells to tap the geothermal energy, Darr said.

## Mayor vetoes plan to jail late rent-payers

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mayor Palmer DePaulis vetoed a proposed ordinance that would have sent tenants to jail for not paying their rent. The City Council chairman said council members may override the veto.

The measure, an amendment to the Theft of Services Act, was aimed at swindlers who have no intention of paying rent, backers said. Opponents likened the plan to debtor's prison, saying it would penalize the poor.

The violation would be a misdemeanor carrying a fine of up to \$1,000 and a six-month jail term.

The City Council passed the amendment two weeks ago on a 6-1 vote. Only five votes are needed for an override. Members are to decide this week whether to schedule a special meeting before Jan. 6 to consider overriding the Wednesday veto.

Council Chairman Tom Godfrey said the six council members who favored the measure, many of whom are landlords, were willing to stand by the measure.

"The members that I have talked to do not seem inclined to change their minds," Godfrey said.

## Thiokol says propulsion system is A-OK

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Thiokol Corp. says it has passed a milestone in rocket motor technology with development of a new lightweight, solid-fuel propulsion system.

The company's Elkiton Division in Elkton, Md., conducted a final test of the unit Nov. 26, after which the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization concluded that a small, high-performance solid propulsion system can be controlled to provide needed thrust, Thiokol said Thursday in a news release.

Thiokol officials said the propulsion package is designed for use on the Lightweight Exo-Atmospheric Projectile, which previously has been powered by liquid fuel.

The LEAP system has 10 small thrusters fed by a single three-pulse gas generator.

The thrusters and the valve mechanisms that control hot exhaust gases propel the projectile forward and sideways while providing smaller pitch, yaw and roll steering forces.

LEAP consists of the propulsion subsystem, sensor and avionics packages and weighs just 13 pounds. The fully integrated projectile will be demonstrated in hover and suborbital flight tests in 1992 and 1993.

Thiokol has been under contract to Boeing Co. for the past three years to develop and deliver the propulsion system. Allied-Signal Aerospace developed the valve mechanisms under contract to Thiokol.

BPA said each site has the potential to produce 100 megawatts, and each project could initially produce 30 megawatts to 50 megawatts, or enough power to serve the needs of 30,000 to 50,000 people. Plans are for the plants to be on line by 1995 or 1996. A major hydroelectric dam on the Columbia River or a goodsized nuclear power plant produces about 1,000 megawatts.

BPA has pledged to buy 30 megawatts from each project at rates elevated to reflect the high development costs.

The rest would be sold to utilities. The Glass Mountain and Vale projects haven't worked out deals, yet, with utilities.

The Oregon Natural Resources Council and Deschutes County Commissioner Tom Troop have raised concerns over locating a power plant near the Newberry Volcanic National Monument, which was created this year with provisions to allow geothermal development. Public opinion killed Cal Energy's proposal to build a geothermal plant outside Crater Lake National Park.

Darr said BPA and the developers are taking pains to answer environmental concerns. Each project will go through hearings.

"The problem with geothermal is that it is located near young volcanoes, which tend to be places people like to go hiking and snowmobiling and things like that," Darr said. "There is concern over introducing industrial activity in these areas. When you look at the environmental impact of this resource compared to the alternatives that are available, that's when it starts becoming more desirable."

# Senator predicts closure of weapons plant

DENVER (AP) — The Bush administration will announce the shutdown of the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant in the next few months as part of a major arms-control initiative, Colorado Sen. Tim Wirth said.

The decision to halt all production of new plutonium triggers at the nuclear weapons plant near Golden will come as soon as January or February, Wirth said Wednesday, citing no specific source.

Resumption of Rocky Flats' nuclear manufacturing operations, suspended in November 1989 because of safety and environmental violations, has been tied to the development of the Navy's submarine-based W-88 nuclear warhead.

"The Navy and the nuclear weapons conference are going to decide within the next 24 to 48 hours that they don't need the W-88," the Colorado Democrat said. "I would say that in January or February that Rocky Flats would be shut down as a nuclear weapons plant."

The No. 1 priority is not to be making new weapons. It's to control the Russian weapons."

When asked to name the source of his information, Wirth, the state's senior senator, said only, "I've talked to an awful lot of people." But he said, "It's very clear that's what's going to happen."

U.S. Department of Energy spokeswoman Deborah Smith said Wednesday night that top department officials "had heard rumors" about the W-88 program being axed, "but we haven't been able to confirm any of the rumors."

Energy Secretary James Watkins said Monday that plans to produce the W-88 now are under review by the top levels of the Bush administration. Production of the W-88, Watkins said, was virtually "the only thing left for Rocky Flats to do."

An independent defense analyst expressed serious doubts that the Navy would continue its emphasis on W-88 development. In the wake of

the Persian Gulf war, the Navy is much more interested in building conventional weaponry than new nuclear missiles, said Brett Lambert, who analyzes Navy defense systems for Defense Forecast, a nonpartisan Washington think tank.

"I find it hard to believe that the Navy would keep (the W-88) as a priority," he said. "I would think the Navy would be much more interested in improving its airlift and blue water fleet and not strategic weaponry."

The W-88 was designed to counterattack heavily fortified bunkers and missile silos after an initial nuclear strike by the Soviet Union, Lambert said.

The W-88, carried by Trident II submarines, packs 475 kilotons of destructive power. By comparison, the atomic bomb that the United States dropped on Nagasaki, Japan, during World War II was 15 kilotons.

A lot of people would suggest the W-88 is overkill," Lambert said.

### Results may come soon from grand jury

**TWIN FALLS** — A Twin Falls County grand jury met in secrecy for three days this week, and word of its findings could come today.

The 16-member panel has not been discharged, but did not meet Thursday after being sent home at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, said 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl.

Grand juries meet in secret to hear evidence in criminal matters and to decide if indictments are warranted. Only prosecutors and witnesses are allowed to speak to the jurors, and court personnel are forbidden by law to talk about the procedure.

Only when the jury has completed its work are officials allowed to talk about the results. Meehl said he will have more to say about the grand jury today.

### 5th District judge orders woman bound over for trial

**GOODING** — Barring a plea-bargain, a Mountain Home woman will stand trial for the traffic death of a 16-year-old Jerome girl.

Fifth District Judge Barry Wood on Thursday ordered Shirley Wersland, 52, bound over for trial Friday on a charge of vehicular manslaughter.

Wood's ruling allows the use of blood-alcohol test results taken while Wersland was in the hospital immediately after the accident; Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson said.

The blood alcohol test was at issue because only blood serum was used in the test, not whole blood, as required by the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement.

Wersland's car collided with the vehicle driven by Angela Jackson of Jerome on Clear Lake Country Club Road six months ago.

Jackson was taken to the hospital, but died shortly after the head-on collision. In charging Wersland, Nelson said she was under the influence of alcohol and negligent.

### Police charge 34-year-old man with aggravated battery

**TWIN FALLS** — A 34-year-old Twin Falls man has been charged with aggravated battery in connection with a fight in which an Eden man was hit in the face with a crowbar.

Police were called to 312 Monroe St. shortly before 2 a.m. Thursday and found John Dewey, 24, sitting unconscious in a car with his face covered with blood.

A woman who was with Dewey, 31-year-old Vera Bivans of Twin Falls, told police that her ex-husband hit Dewey with a crowbar, according to an affidavit signed by Twin Falls police officer Bob Peace.

Peace went inside the house and arrested Norm J. Hanes, who was also charged, according to the report. Hanes told Peace that Richards had beaten him after Dewey was injured, the report said.

Hanes and Dewey were taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and treated for their injuries. Hanes was later booked into the Twin Falls County jail. He remained there Thursday evening in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

### 'Lifesaver' program sends all available police officers out

**TWIN FALLS** — Every available Idaho State Police officer will be on the road this weekend as part of a national campaign to make holiday travel as safe as possible.

The "National Holiday Season Lifesaver Weekend 1991" begins tonight at 6 p.m. and ends at midnight Sunday.

During that period, officers will focus on the two leading causes of fatal accidents — driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol and high speeds.

"We are also encouraging motorists to buckle up," said Col. Ron Moore of the Idaho State Police.

Officers will also be on the lookout for motorists in need of roadside help, Moore said. The effort is sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and 48 states and some Canadian law enforcement agencies.

"This is the season of joy and celebration. We want people to keep it that way by staying alive," Moore said.

## Money needed to study convention center idea

**TWIN FALLS** — Talk about building a convention center in Twin Falls has taken a new turn.

An informal, ad hoc committee is trying to raise \$20,000 to \$22,000 for a study to

settle the question of whether the city needs such a center.

"For years and years, everybody's been saying 'gee, wouldn't it be nice if' and nobody's gone further than that," committee member and KMVT-TV General Manager Lee Wagner said.

A convention center, in its simplest form, would be a building with more seating

capacity and more meeting rooms than currently available in the city, Wagner said. Businesses that would benefit from the center have been reacting well to solicitations.

The study would be conducted by Seattle-based Jinneman and Associates, and would be conducted in two parts. If the first stage of the study determines a convention

center is feasible, Jinneman and Associates would analyze various options for the center.

Convention centers can be controversial. In some towns, they are unprofitable and can turn into "cash drains," Wagner said.

"From the study we will determine if it will be a cash drain and see if we want to accept that as a community," Wagner said.

### After 30 years, city's top detective calls it quits

**TWIN FALLS** — As a young man, Garry Corder promised himself that he would retire at age 50. He almost made it. The 51-year-old commander of the Twin Falls police department's detective division is retiring today after 30 years on the force.

"I don't want to work until I drop dead behind this desk," said Corder, recalling that his father, Paul Corder, died in office while serving as Twin Falls County Sheriff.

When his dad died, Garry Corder was already a city patrolman. Pounding the pavement in those days was a very different job than today, he said. Only three officers worked a shift — two patrolmen and a sergeant.

"If you walked into a bar fight, and the other officer was tied up, you were on your own," Corder said. "There was no backup unless someone else just happened to be around."

The climate on the streets has changed in 30 years, Corder said. "Back then, I could walk into the St. Regis or the Blue Front bar, and if I got in trouble, people would help me out," he said. "They won't help now."

Part of that change is based on sheer numbers; used to be that patrol officers knew every face on skid row and kept track of the troublemakers.

But now there are too many faces, too many people coming from outside the area to know who's who, Corder said.

Corder said his father didn't urge him to enter law enforcement, but watching him help people was encouragement enough.

"When Dad was chief of police in Kimberly, I rode around with him when I was old enough," Corder said. "A lot of times you see the bad side of police work," he said. "But it can be rewarding. Somebody will come back after you helped them and say 'Thank you.'"

But that gratitude has its price. Interrupted dinners, late-night

telephonic calls and missed holidays are high on the list of reasons why Corder's 30-year journey ended three years ago.

"That's another tragedy in law enforcement," Corder said. "The work really takes its toll on a marriage." Corder's ex-wife, Norma, said they parted friends and they still talk to one another daily.

"Garry is a very nice, generous man," she said. "People think he's rough with this tough exterior, but actually he's a teddy bear."

The couple's three sons grew up knowing that when the phone rang, Dad left, Norma Corder said.

"We had a very versatile Santa when the boys were little," she said. "Sometimes Santa would come at night, sometimes in the morning, sometimes he would come in the middle of the afternoon."

His position with the detective division forces Corder to do a lot of paperwork — much more now than in years past — but he has always relished the chance to do street-level police work.

One of his most memorable busts came on a distant street — the Las Vegas Strip — more than three years ago.

Corder and a fellow officer spotted murder suspect Jesse Ray Jagers and brought him back to Twin Falls. Jagers was later convicted of killing Twin Falls resident Virginia Westergren.

In recent years, Corder, who carries the rank of captain, said he hasn't been able to spend as much time on the street, as personnel matters, annual budgets and committee work piled up.

"That often happens in police and fire work," Public Safety Director Paul Du Fresno said. "You get good at your technical job, and you get pulled up and put in the next job level."

Corder has learned to handle that part of his job well, Du Fresno said.

"He has become, in his career, a real professional in his particular field," Du Fresno said.

Even after his retirement, Corder will be no stranger to the law enforcement community. He plans to work full time at his two businesses, an investigations consulting firm and a private security business.

"He deserves it," said Lt. Jim Kistler, long-time friend and co-worker and one of the men who will take over Corder's duties. "He'll still be busy, but we're gonna miss him."

"There will be some travel later," Corder said. And he'll spend time camping and fishing with his sons at his cabin near Coeur d'Alene.

When they spend time together, the Corders can all swap cop stories, all three of Corder's sons are in law enforcement.

"I thought they were smarter than that," Corder joked.

Cloyce Corder works for the Idaho Bureau of Narcotics in Idaho Falls and Todd Corder is an officer with the Ketchum Police Department.

Nathan Corder, 30, heads the local division of the Bureau of Alcohol Beverage Control.

The time his father spent away from home discouraged Nathan Corder from getting a law enforcement job, but as he got older, he was drawn to investigative work.

"And once in a while, you get to help someone along the way," Nathan Corder said.

Even though he is a third-generation law enforcement officer, Nathan Corder said he hopes his own children will find another line of work.

But what does Nathan Corder's 7-year-old son want to be when he grows up? "He says he wants to be a policeman."

## Stallings: 'Pay-or-play' health plan might work

**TWIN FALLS** — A national health insurance plan modeled on the Canadian system is not what the United States needs to solve its health-care crisis, U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings said Thursday.

But a "pay-or-play" plan, which would require employers to provide health coverage for their workers or pay the federal government to do so, might be the answer, Stallings said during a visit to Twin Falls.

The 2nd District Democrat, who is running for the Senate seat Steve Symms is giving up next year, said assuring adequate access to health care is "the most explosive issue I've seen in my seven years in Congress."

House Democrats have held several insurance companies out of business proposals, including one modeled on the Canadian "single-payer" system. In Canada, people choose their own health-care providers and the federal government pays their medical bills.

But that kind of system would put many insurance companies out of business. Stallings said, adding that he doubted the government had the relevant expertise to administer a single-payer system.

Instead, Stallings said he favored some kind of pay-or-play plan. Such a plan would require employers to either provide their workers with a certain level of health coverage or pay into a government insurance fund. The government would then either provide health insurance directly or contract with a private insurance company to do so.

Stallings plans to hold "town meetings" around the state next week, including one Jan. 13 in Twin Falls, to gauge public sentiment for the various reform plans.

On other issues, Stallings said he was skeptical that President Bush could come with a workable plan to spark the nation's sputtering economy.

Bush's proposal to give every taxpayer a one-time \$300 rebate would only boost the deficit, not the economy, he said.

"That's less than a dollar a day — not even enough to buy groceries," he said.

Reducing the capital-gains tax "as a way to encourage investment might work. Stallings said Congress would only pass such a cut if it were packaged with budget cuts elsewhere and higher taxes on the rich.

Given the rapid deterioration of the Soviet Union, he said, the defense budget would be a good place to find the money to pay for tax cuts. "That, however, would mean electricity that would only pass such a cut if it were packaged with budget cuts elsewhere and higher taxes on the rich."

"That budget agreement has got to go," he said. "It's way out of whack with current realities. It's based on a Cold War scenario that no longer exists. Hell, in two weeks the Soviet Union will no longer exist."

Looking at the primary field for the Republican Senate nomination, Stallings expressed confidence that he would defeat Boise Mayor Dick Kempthorne, former state Senate Majority Leader Rod Beck, or Boise stockbroker Bill Ehart next November.

"All three would be interesting, and have different strengths and weaknesses, but I think I could beat all three of them," he said.

After a closed strategy session Wednesday with pollsters and consultants, Kempthorne said a race between him and Stallings would be a toss-up: "but if we do it right, it's winnable."

Stallings questioned that assessment. "If I were him and the polls were that good, I'd release them to the press," he said.

## Irrigation district sues Bureau of Reclamation over dam

**TWIN FALLS** — The Minidoka Irrigation District wants to share in the benefits of power generated at the Minidoka Dam, and it's taken the federal government to court to get them.

The district filed suit in federal court last week against the Bureau of Reclamation over the right to generate power at the dam that MID and the Burley Irrigation District helped pay for.

The bureau generates an average of 93 million kilowatt-hours of electricity annually at the Minidoka Dam, more than half of it sold as surplus power through the Bonneville Power

Administration. But the bureau is not allowed to make a profit on the power it sells.

"If they want to give it away that's their business," said Kent Fletcher, a Burley attorney who represents MID. But "they need to account to us the value of the water going through the dam."

The BPA is the federal agency that markets power generated at federal dams operated by the bureau and the Army Corps of Engineers.

MID, which uses nearly half the irrigation water diverted by the dam, paid for nearly half the construction of the dam that makes it possible for the bureau to generate that electricity, Fletcher said.

And it wants credit for that contribution.

Fletcher said the district wants the credit to help the irrigation district rehabilitate its facilities. Sharing in the value of power would help the districts become self-sustaining, as required by the legislation that established the districts, he said.

The suit will force the recognition of the value of the right to generate power, Fletcher said. Idaho Power Co., for instance, last year paid \$19.5 million for the right to generate electricity from water passing through the American Falls dam.

The 1902 Reclamation Act established the U.S. Reclamation Service, changed in 1926 to the Bureau of Reclamation. The Minidoka Dam was completed in 1910.

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# Sheriff scratches Jerome drug dog from bust because of fees

**JEROME** — The Jerome city police dog was called out Wednesday night to assist in a drug search — but wasn't used. "Sunny Boy" was sent home when county law enforcement officers didn't wish the city to profit on the bust.

Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold requested his office call out the dog, but then refused to put him to work, saying he

didn't wish to compensate the city for use of the dog. That payment would be tied to the value of the items seized in the drug search. "I heard the (city) wants 50 percent of what we get when the dog is used," said handler Officer Jim Baker. Baker arrived to accompany the team in the operation. "Also, who's in charge of the operation when the dog is working, you or me?" Gold asked.

Baker said he was in charge of handling the dog, and he understood the city police

department was to get a percentage of the "take." "That's not acceptable," Gold said. "I can get help from Cassia, Minidoka or Twin Falls at no cost except maybe a cup of coffee or a hamburger. "We'll put in money to buy that dog, and they (the city) has extra money from all the donations; so why do they need us to pay for his use?"

The dog cost the city roughly \$4,000. A narcotics detection dog was then

requested from life Twin Falls Police Department. Upon arrival, the dog assisted in searching the apartment of Jimmie Rodgers Hogue, of Shady Acres on South Lincoln, who later was arrested for unlawful delivery of a controlled substance. "Deputies seized \$1,075, what appeared to be marijuana in baggies, drug paraphernalia and a van. Jerome Chief of Police George Silver III said it was true that the city would take a percentage of whatever was taken at the

scene if the dog had been used. He added a draft policy drawn up by the council would give the city 20 percent of the proceeds from seizures. That policy states: "Every effort should be made by the canine handler to assist outside agencies, with utilization of the narcotics detector canine." Gold said his office has spent \$7,000 since April in purchasing narcotics from dealers, but Gold said the business pays for itself from the proceeds from the busts.

# Buhl elementary multi-purpose room's ceiling tiles to be replaced this summer

**BUHL** — Ceiling tiles in the elementary multi-purpose room will be replaced during summer.

Superintendent Eugene Pyles said there is no danger in waiting, since the loose tiles have been removed. The multi-purpose room is used as a cafeteria, a gym and has a stage equipped with a sound system. Recently, all the tiles began sagging, which presented a hazard.

Now, without the ceiling in place, there is a terrible acoustical problem, Pyles said.

Pyles was hoping the project could be done over spring break, but reconstruction of the ceiling will take at least three weeks to complete.

Repair estimates could go as high as \$15,000, according to Pyles.

The district will begin seeking bids on the work. The School Board

also recommended the company who provided the sound system for the high school be contracted to give a bid on replacing the outdated sound system in the multi-purpose room.

In other business: Pyles said a substitute teacher had virtually been hired every day of the school year to cover for a teacher on professional leave.

A teacher is granted professional leave to attend workshops or visit other schools to observe and learn. A professional development program and an account to help fund further education for teachers have been the major issues stalling teacher negotiations.

Through December, a total of 79 days professional leave have been taken by the Buhl teaching staff. Elementary school teachers took 19 days leave; middle school teachers had 44 days, and high school teachers had 16 days leave.

The School District has a total of \$112,724 in the plant facilities fund from lottery funds.

The district has received approximately \$35,000 to \$38,000 for the last two years. Pyles told the board he felt the fund balance should remain at approximately \$100,000 for emergencies, like the multi-purpose room ceiling.

Feb. 1, May 4, and July 1 were set for driver's education classes. Each class will have 30 students. High School Principal Dennis Oaman said he could provide ample opportunity for all the students who want to learn to drive.

The school district had its annual safety inspection, and Pyles said he was pleased.

He said problems had decreased substantially since he first became superintendent, commending the head of maintenance, Herb Brown, for all his efforts.

## BLM extends comment period

**SHOSHONE** — The Bureau of Land Management has extended the public comment period on a proposed predator control plan for its Shoshone District.

The original Dec. 13, deadline for comment on an environmental assessment released one month earlier has been extended to Jan. 3, 1992.

"We received considerable interest in the environmental assessment and felt that the public may need more time to review the document and formulate their comments," said Mary Gaylord, BLM's Shoshone District manager.

The environmental assessment analyzes alternatives for controlling coyotes, bear, mountain lions and other predators on BLM lands. Trapping, shooting or poisoning of predators is performed by agents of Animal Damage Control, a division of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

"Before making my final decision or selecting an alternative, I want to have public comments for consideration," said Gaylord.

# Help pours in for family hit by burglars

**OLDTOWN, Idaho (AP)** — When Dan and Mary Shepard's home was virtually cleaned out by burglars, down to the Nintendo games their disabled son loved, the family almost hit bottom.

Five weeks later they are overwhelmed by the donations they have poured in from around the country.

"We had no idea whatsoever it was going to go this far," Mrs. Shepard said Thursday. "Some people really do have a heart."

The donations were prompted by news accounts of the case and by a Nov. 26 Associated Press account carried in newspapers from Connecticut to Arizona.

The stories told how the Shepards arrived at their mobile home from an overnight family outing the morning of Nov. 14 to find all but a few pieces of furniture gone. Missing were new clothes, tools, a boat, a wood-burning stove, hunting gear, beds, clothing, financial records,

family albums and some homemade jam.

It was worse in their son Nicholas' room. Toys were strewn about, a television was destroyed, and gone were all the boy's Nintendo video game cartridges.

The video games were more important to the 10-year-old than most kids his age; he has spina bifida, a birth defect that has left him paralyzed from the chest down.

Accounts of the crime prompted sign language how he can zap more space aliens than his 12-year-old brother Daniel.

"It brought him out of a shell," Mrs. Shepard said.

Ripped off a wall was a prized poster commemorating Nicholas' service as North Idaho's 1988 March of Dimes ambassador. It showed him seated in his wheelchair next to two other disabled children.

Accounts of the crime prompted donations from nine states, including such distant places as Brooklyn,

N.Y., Phoenix, Ariz., Nashville, Tenn. and Moline, Ill.

About 25 cards and \$300 have come in from out of state, with few donations as small as \$5. One correspondent even sent a coin commemorating the 1939 World's Fair.

"I usually give to the Salvation Army each year, but I figured they (the Shepards) could use it better," said Vincent McDermott of New Haven, Conn., who gave \$25 with his wife Jean.

He received a thank-you note from the Shepards and has sent them a Christmas card in return.

McDermott said he was especially touched by Nicholas' plight because he also has a disability. The retiree underwent a laryngectomy and must speak through a device that transforms vibrations from his voice box into sound.

The Bureau of Reclamation's purpose was "to make the desert bloom," said the agency's Pacific Northwest regional director, John Keys. It was formed to build irrigation water systems that would encourage people to come west and settle and develop the Western economy, he said.

Power plants installed in the irrigation dunes originally were meant to supply power to the irrigation projects. At first the bureau sold any surplus power, but when the BPA was formed in the 1930s it took over marketing the power.

Money from the power sales goes back to the federal treasury, Keys said. The bureau is not allowed to make a profit from its projects.

Bureau projects were originally paid for largely by taxpayers. Some of the costs were assigned to flood control, recreation and fish and wildlife.

Part is paid back through electricity revenues and irrigators, who pay up their ability to pay, Keys said.

The current capacity of the Minidoka Dam is 13.4 megawatts, which over 20 years averages 98 megawatt-hours annually.

Improvements under way will increase the capacity to 28 megawatts or an average 176 megawatt hours annually.

About 44 percent is used on the project, 25 percent sold as surplus. Most of the surplus electricity is sold to the Burley Irrigation District. The Burley Irrigation District will be the beneficiary of the sale of small amounts of the MID's

# Outside air pumped into sealed glass-enclosed Biosphere project

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Outside air has been pumped into the Biosphere II environmental experiment, its operators acknowledged Thursday, but they denied the move violates the project's goal of creating a sealed, self-sustaining world.

About 600,000 cubic feet of air was pumped in, amounting to about 10 percent of the air in the glass-enclosed world where eight people are sealed for two years, according to Space Biospheres-Ventures official Bill Dempster.

Dempster, director of systems engineering, said the intent was to replace air that had leaked out, and not to deal with rising levels of carbon dioxide that critics say endangers the private experiment.

The Dec. 9 addition "is not like a breath of fresh air," Dempster said. "This is not even approximately that large a breath. This is like a little sip if you will."

The \$150 million experiment, which began Sept. 26, called for a crew of four men and four women to be closed inside a sealed, glass-and-steel-domed 3.15-acre complex for a two-year stint with 3,800 species of plants. They are to grow all their own food and recycle all air, water and wastes in what is portrayed as a prototype space colony.

It was to be physically isolated from the outside world — Biosphere I. But in a telephone interview, Dempster contended that pumping outside air in does not invalidate the experiment.

The air-pumping was vaguely alluded to in a news release issued Thursday through a Beverly Hills public relations firm that begins by describing the Biosphere crew's holiday activities. In a section titled "Atmospheric leakage," the release said "Biosphere II took in an additional 10 percent of atmospheric volume."

Dempster detailed the addition of air only after repeated requests to the project's public relations staff for elaboration.

He said the injection of outside air doesn't change the fact that biological systems inside the experiment are effectively isolated.

"It's only a matter of degree. It's impossible to build anything that is perfect in this regard, and so there's always going to be some degree to which the perfection is not met," Dempster said.

The project, financed in large part

by Texas oil billionaire Edward Bass, has been criticized by outsiders as unscientific. Some who have broken with the tight-knit Biosphere group contend it is controlled by a clique that originated on a theater-oriented New Mexico commune in the mid-1970s and who have hired experts to plan a project they lack the expertise to run.

Within the first month after the airtight doors were sealed at a dawn ceremony, choreographed for the media, levels of carbon dioxide began to rise.

Project directors say the increase was expected, and tourists who pay \$9.95 a head to visit the dome in the desert northwest of Tucson are told it is to be dealt with largely by natural systems.

But a mechanical scrubber, which was installed unannounced shortly before the project was sealed to help clear the carbon dioxide.

Space Biospheres acknowledged the existence of the scrubber in an obscure reference in what they called a monthly "report card" Nov. 1, after being questioned by reporters who had learned the equipment was in-

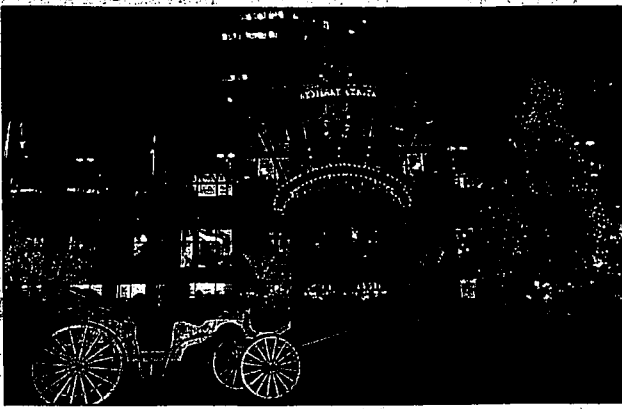
stalled. Officials of the project insist the scrubber didn't invalidate the concept that the experiment operates essentially without outside mechanical intervention. It does have a gas-powered generator for electricity.

News accounts quoting confidential Biosphere reports have said carbon dioxide levels reached more than 2,450 parts per million in late October — well over the level of about 360 ppm in outside air. A spokeswoman for the project at the time confirmed the reports without providing specific numbers, but downplayed the significance.

Installation of the scrubber caused a senior computer programmer to quit the project, alleging a pattern of deception.

Dempster said the additional air was needed to replace that which inevitably leaks out through seals in the geodesic-framed glass-and-steel structure. Leakage had been expected to run about 3 percent per year, but instead is running at a 6 percent annual rate, he said.

"The kids learn that just because it's not a club in Idaho," said Wiseman. "They learn that just because they come from a small school in Idaho that does not limit their possibilities." Attendance reached a high of 27,000 on one day of the convention, said Schaar.

In other business:

The board scheduled high school graduation for May 28. Members of the board will meet with the senior class to plan graduation ceremonies.

Wiseman reported that the school's new greenhouse is up and running. Erecting and using the

greenhouse has been a good learning experience for students and teachers alike, he said.

Teacher Karen Garrison gave the board members a tour of the school's computer lab. She explained that all grades, including the elementary classes, get hands-on experience with computers, and that many teachers use the computers in their classes, including vo-ag, science, home economics, humanities and college English.

Superintendent Henry Kilmer reported that Magic Valley enrollment trends show that the Castleford School District has a higher percentage of vocational-agriculture students as compared with other schools.

Teachers Connie Kinyon, Twila Harder and Ila LaGrone are organizing a drama club.

# Hansen superintendent tells school board proposal to extend hours could be costly

HANSEN — Hansen School Board Superintendent Richard Smith reported on a state proposal to extend the number of hours school children attend classes.

Smith attended a meeting on Dec. 5, with state Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans. Smith said some changes being proposed by the Legislature could be costly to school districts.

(An estimated 4 percent increase or \$38 million will be needed to maintain educational programs just sold steadily," Smith said.

Two of those proposals were:

Raising the number of hours children will be required to attend classes to 1,020 hours, which could cost some Idaho schools an estimated \$650 per teacher per year, Smith said.

Changing the cut-off date for children entering first grade from Aug. 15 to Sept. 1.

Smith said such a change would mean Idaho schools would be more consistent with those in bordering states.

In another matter, the break-in at Hansen High School on Dec. 4, is still under investigation. Hansen Police Chief Gail Watson has no firm leads yet.

"They knew what they were doing," Watson said, adding there was no vandalism.

"As near as we can determine, the estimated loss is \$2,300 in video equipment, recording equipment and an amplifier, from the music and industrial arts rooms," Watson said.

Elementary Principal Linda Rutledge gave a report on a Math Wiz

program begun last week at the school.

"The kids are pretty excited about it," Rutledge said.

Each Friday all the children in grades 1 through 6 take a math quiz with a five minute time limit. The children who complete the quiz within the time limit then go to the principal's office where they put their names on the Math Wiz board.

Over Christmas vacation, the new computers for the elementary students will be installed in the library.

Jan. 9 has been chosen as the next recycling day for the elementary school. A truck will be parked by the school for anyone wishing to drop off recyclables.

A new public address system was purchased by the Hansen PTO for the elementary school.

Espil reported there were 39 students on the school's honor roll this semester.

Espil proposed that honor roll students be given a pizza party with school board members each semester.

Board members agreed, and the first one was scheduled for the end of next month. Espil has also put together bumper stickers to be handed out to honor roll students at the end

of this semester which read "Hansen High School Honor Student on board."

The board voted to pay the Hansen, Murtagh Quick Response Team \$200 for their service at Hansen home football games.

Hansen High School is gearing up again this year for the INEL Scholastic Tournament.

**Indicted brokers included Gem man**

**COEUR D'ALENE** — A Priest River man is among eight "information brokers" from five states indicted for the alleged sale of confidential government information. Michael Hawes, 28, former owner and operator of International Criminal Investigative Agency in Port Angeles, Wash., faces up to 105 years in federal prison and \$3.25 million in fines if convicted on all 13 counts, the U.S. Department of Justice said Wednesday. The indictments cap an 18-month investigation into people who allegedly provide, buy or sell confidential information about U.S. citizens. The information is stored in FBI and Social Security Administration computers, U.S. Attorney Michael Chernoff said.

**ST. ANTHONY** — Seventh District Judge Grant Young has granted a prosecution motion to allow a psychiatric evaluation of an Ashton man convicted of first-degree murder. But at the Tuesday sentencing hearing, Young denied a defense request to let former state prison warden Darrol Gardner present expert testimony at the sentencing hearing of Raviland J. Grube, 28. He was convicted in October of first-degree murder in the 1983 shooting of Amy Elizabeth Hossner. The hearing was the first court action since the defense appealed the verdict last week to the Idaho Supreme Court.

**Tribe sues utilities, irrigation districts**

**BOISE (AP)** — The Nez Perce Tribe wants to be paid for the loss of its access to salmon fisheries — to the tune of \$25 million. The National Marine Fisheries Service listed the Snake River sockeye salmon as an endangered species in November and the fall, spring and summer chinook salmon runs are being considered for threatened species status. On Dec. 5-6, the Nez Perce-Tribe filed lawsuits in U.S. District Court in Boise blaming Idaho Power Co., Washington Water Power Co. and four irrigation districts. "We are hopeful that the tribe can be compensated for the loss of the fish runs that resulted from the construction of various dams and diversions," Rebecca Craven, an attorney for the tribe, said Wednesday. "There's significant evidence that the dams destroyed the fish runs." Idaho Power officials are taking the suit "very seriously," spokesman Jeff

Beam said. "It will be examined and discussed at length." Idaho Power is being sued for the largest amount — \$150 million. The tribe charges in its complaint that three of the utility's dams on the Snake River prevented salmon "from reaching their spawning areas ... and those runs of anadromous fish were destroyed." The tribe also charges in its suit that the destruction of the salmon runs was a violation of treaty rights that allow the tribe to fish in traditional areas. In all, the tribe's suits cover seven rivers and streams in two states, including the Snake, Payette and Clearwater rivers. Washington Water Power is being sued for \$100 million, and the Crane Creek Reservoir Administration Board, Emmett Irrigation District and Lewiston Orchards Irrigation District \$1 million each. The complaint against Associated Ditch Cos. Inc. seeks \$550,000. The Emmett Irrigation District was

caught off guard by the lawsuit, said Roy Maxwell, district manager. "I hope there's nothing that will come of this," he said. "But every time you get something like this, it makes you a little nervous." Maxwell said he believes the district won't be affected by the lawsuit because the dam on the Payette River the suit mentions was

torn down in 1924. The salmon were running strong for years after that dam was taken down, he said. "From all the pictures I've seen, it would have been navigable by the fish even if it were in place today." Craven acknowledged the tribe's three attorneys could be out-gunned by the legal staffs of the utilities being sued.

**High court lets stand Fetterly death sentence**

**BOISE (AP)** — A 1989 Idaho Supreme Court decision on death penalty sentences will not be applied retroactively, the court says. The court on Thursday voted 4-1 to dismiss a petition for post-conviction relief filed by Canyon County slayer Donald Kenneth Fetterly. In 1989, in the Jaime Charboneau case from Jerome County, the court ruled that every mitigating factor must be weighed against each aggravating factor when a judge decided whether to order the death sentence. Donald Kenneth Fetterly, 35, contended in a petition for post-conviction relief that his death sentence had to be vacated under that decision. But the Supreme Court held Thursday that Fetterly's direct appeal was decided before the Charboneau case was decided and it will not apply retroactively. Justice Stephen Bistine dissented, saying the Charboneau decision should apply to the four other death sentences it could affect. "(Albert) Beam's case is currently before the court. The administration of justice

will not come to a standstill if the other three, (Randy) McKinney, (Donald) Paradis and (Thomas) Gibson receive a review of their sentences in light of Charboneau," Bistine said. "In this one justice's view, our time and effort should be spent on ensuring that all defendants sentenced to death have been afforded, and will receive, full compliance, with the sentencing procedure which the Legislature has selected," he said. Fetterly was convicted of the 1983 robbery-murder of Sterling Grammer of Nampa. The Supreme Court upheld his conviction and death sentence in 1985 and denied a petition for post-conviction relief in 1988. He lost a federal court appeal in 1990 and later that year filed a second petition for post-conviction relief. Chief Justice Robert Bakes and Justice Larry Boyle joined in the opinion written by Justice Charles McDevitt that the Charboneau decision does not apply retroactively and that also bars other issues raised in Fetterly's latest appeal.

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# Judge sentences convicted-child molester

MOSCOW (AP) — Second District Judge John Bengtson admits that elderly child molester Jesse Howard Flucy may die in prison under his new sentence.

Flucy, 70, of Juliaetta, was sentenced Thursday to two 15-year concurrent terms after being found guilty this fall of two counts of lewd conduct with minors in his apartment.

"If you died today I would feel cheated," said the mother of a girl who was six at the time Flucy abused her. "My idea of justice would be to sentence you to 500 years in prison and have you serve

all of it... I hope this will finally be enough to keep you from hurting anyone else."

Flucy's girlfriend, Mary Cluff, pleaded guilty to one count of lewd conduct earlier. Flucy was charged with fondling one girl and having the other fondle him with baby oil.

At the hearing, Flucy repeated his claims he was set-up by his hateful ex-wife and son. His attorney said the girls, not he, instigated the conduct.

"They (the girls) came in. They took the initiative. They picked up the oil," public defender Bob Tunnicliff said.

Bengtson called the denials "paranoid ideations," and ordered Flucy to spend 10 years in prison before he is considered for parole.

"I'm taken aback and appalled that he points the finger of guilt, if not the finger of wrongness, at children of tender years," Bengtson said.

Because of Flucy's age and ill health, Bengtson said it may be that he will not survive the jail time.

Flucy will likely be sentenced to even more days in prison, since he was on probation for 1988 Idaho County convictions for lewd conduct when he committed the Latah County crimes. He is scheduled for a

Grangeville hearing later this month for allegedly violating probation.

Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman urged Bengtson to sentence Flucy to the maximum of life in prison for both charges.

"Wouldn't that be nice," interrupted Flucy. Bengtson twice threatened him over outbursts on Thursday.

Flucy is a predator. He's a danger to society. He seeks out young children and their families in order to prey on them," Mosman said. They are suing Flucy—and Idaho County for not keeping a closer watch on him while he was on probation.

# State receives \$300,000 for Boise Water bonds

BOISE (AP) — The state has received \$300,000 for a revolving loan fund as its fee for issuing tax-exempt bonds for Boise Water Corp.

At a ceremony Thursday, General Waterworks, parent corporation of Boise Water, gave the Water Resource Board \$300,000 for issuing \$30 million in tax-exempt bonds.

The Boise company will use the money to finance a variety of water facility improvements and additions. Company officials said

the improvements are necessary to meet requirements of the Clean Water Act. The list of projects includes water treatment capability for the city water system, new water distribution facilities, new wells and production components.

The Department of Water Resources said the money goes into the Revolving Development Account, which provides low-interest loans to public entities such as municipalities, water associations and water districts.

# Congressman says he'll try to block Payette North Fork development

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Larry LaRocco, D-Idaho, said he will introduce legislation to protect the North Fork of the Payette River from hydroelectric development.

LaRocco's said Wednesday that he would sponsor the bill in response to public outcry over a Gem Irrigation District proposal to build a hydro plant on the world-renowned whitewater stream.

Opponents of the plan contend the district is trying to circumvent state law banning hydroelectric on the river by seeking federal approval for the project.

LaRocco said federal protection of the North Fork "is the right thing to do."

"This boils down to a matter of state water rights," he said. "The people of Idaho through their representatives in the state Legislature said clearly they want to keep the North Fork free-flowing. If it takes federal legislation to accomplish that, then that's what we'll do."

A Gem Irrigation spokesman said recently that the district was pushing the project because "it's in the best interest of Idaho to do it."

"A responsibly done project can coexist with visual and recreational aspects of the river," district spokesman Bob Mooney said last week.

The district recently secured a preliminary permit

from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to gather information needed to obtain a federal permit for the project.

Mooney said it would be about five years before FERC decides whether to issue a license.

The proposed project would divert most of the North Fork into a 12.5-mile-long tunnel stretching from a couple of miles below Smith's Ferry to Banks.

Stream flows along that stretch would be reduced from a high of 2,000 cubic feet per second in the summer months to about 200 cfs, Mooney said. The project probably would increase flows on weekends for boaters, he said.

However, opponents contend stream flows would be reduced to a trickle most of the time.

Mark Anderson, co-chairman of Friends of the Payette, endorsed LaRocco's plans to protect the North Fork.

"We're completely, 100-percent behind federal legislation to keep this river from being dammed and to keep it free-flowing," Anderson said.

# Former BSU president plays down trip to Texas for meeting last month

MOSCOW (AP) — The Boise State University Foundation paid for fired Boise State president John Keiser to attend an annual meeting of college and university presidents late last month in Texas.

But Keiser, who was fired by the state Board of Education in September, insists he wasn't job hunting at the American Association of State Colleges and Universities meeting Nov. 24-26 in San Antonio.

Keiser, who confirmed the foundation paid for the trip, says he attended the meeting because he belongs to the professional group, is preparing to write a manuscript on administration and leadership and wanted to participate in sessions on intercollegiate athletics, budgeting and other issues.

"I don't need to go there to look for a job," Keiser said Wednesday. "It is a network. I know them anyway. They are a phone call away."

Charles Blanton, president of the BSU Foundation, said there should be no controversy about financial arrangements between Keiser and the foundation.

"I don't think it is of concern outside of the people involved," he said Wednesday in a telephone interview from his Boise home. "The public isn't interested in whether we are trying to raise funds for Dr. Keiser or not."

The Board of Education has said it fired Keiser partly because he didn't disclose that the BSU Foundation was paying him a \$17,500 annual stipend, Keiser has said the board didn't explicitly ask for that information.

Keiser, who is making \$100,776 a year through June 30, said the BSU Foundation paid for his trip out of a fund that supports faculty activities.

Keiser said he didn't know how much his trip cost.

"It didn't cost me anything," he said.

Meanwhile, Keiser said he still hasn't decided whether he wants to teach history at Boise State University or serve as a university president again.

He said he is talking to about 10 schools about their presidencies, but they won't narrow their lists to finalists until next spring.

"I don't have a major compulsion to tell people what to do or make an extra salary increment," Keiser said. "(But) I'm sure I would consider something that was challenging and wasn't that kamikaze type of thing."

# Pocatello economy fares much better than nation

POCATELLO (AP) — As in other Idaho cities, the national recession has not hit Pocatello as hard as the nation and its recovery has been quicker, Idaho State University researchers say.

A report released Thursday by the ISU Center for Business Research and Services, compiled by center director Joan Zelus and staff economist Jeannette Tokke, indicates Pocatello continues a healthy, if moderate, upturn.

The report tracks Pocatello's third-quarter business, travel and tourism activity as well as consumer prices.

Statistics indicate business activity remained at 1989 levels, or about 100 economic index points, after dipping to 92.2 points in the first quarter and rising to 105.7 thereafter.

"By not falling below 1989 levels, the local economy appears to be more robust than the recessionary national economy," Zelus said.

The two attributed Pocatello's good showing in part to an upsurge in the housing market, up over 16 percent from May to July and leveling off through September. That is mainly because of more Idaho National Engineering Laboratory families living there, combined with record ISU enrollments.

The weaker elements of the local economy, they said, continue to be "stagnant" employment and high consumer debt.

Zelus said there seems to be a sense of powerlessness among area consumers.

"There's a fear of the national economy as a whole ... (Pocatello consumers) feel they are not in control of their economy, and to some extent that's true," he said, however, such feelings seemed mixed with a sense of long-term hope that seems justified.

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# New drilling technique used at INEL

POCATELLO (AP) — A technique called remote sonic drilling is being used for the first time in the United States at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to sample waste in an acid pit.

The pit, holding cleaning solvents and radioactively contaminated acid, is at the INEL's Radioactive Waste Management Complex.

"The project marks the first time interior sampling of an inactive INEL waste pit has been done," said INEL spokesman Mike Coc.

For safety, the person using the drill operates it remotely from a control panel in a trailer 120 feet away. To make the sampling hole less dangerous to the environment and get a

purser sample, sonic drilling uses vibration and limited weight applied to the bit's cutting surface to penetrate soil. That eliminates the need for compressors or mud pumps to keep the bit spinning in the hole.

Another safety device used for the first time is a special drill string invented by EG&G Idaho. It keeps contaminants from escaping when a sample is retrieved by keeping most of the drill rod enclosed.

Doug Kuhn, project cleanup manager for EG&G, said it was put into service in January and is working well.

Kuhn thinks new technology can be used in other cleanups around the

country. "It's a nice way to protect people and the environment by adding safeguards so there's less of a chance to have a release to the environment," he said.

Most pollutants in the pit were dumped in while the pit was officially open from 1954 to 1961. Coc agreed on earlier this month by the Department of Energy, the Environmental Protection Agency and the state. Coc said it will help determine what other cleanup is needed.

# Island Park Water clear to be regulated

BOISE (AP) — Despite complaints from customers, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission will allow the Island Park Water Co. to become a regulated utility.

The PUC has granted the company's application for a certificate of public convenience and necessity to serve some 237 customers in eastern Idaho.

"In spite of the complaints we have received concerning (the company's president Edwin) Stroebel's management style and the system's physical shortcomings, it appears that Island Park is the only entity in a position to provide water service to the customers subject to the application," the PUC said Thursday.

World food production endangers Soviets

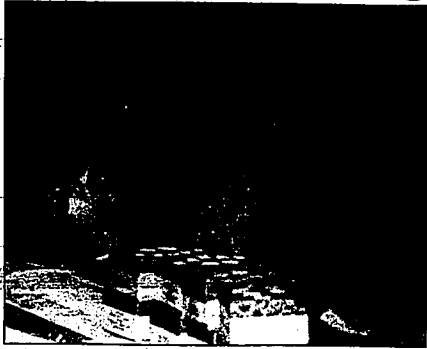
ROME (AP) — For the first time since 1983, annual global food production has fallen, the United Nations said Thursday, and that could worsen the already dangerous food shortage in the Soviet Union.

Figured into the sharp drop in wheat production was a 23 percent decline in the Soviet Union, where drought damaged spring wheat and other losses were caused by "inadequate infrastructure and shortages of spare parts and fuel," said a report by the U.N.'s Food and Agriculture Organization.

FAO said drought, war and "disruption of production and marketing systems," including in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union, combined to cut worldwide food and agricultural yield 1.4 percent over last year.

Eduard Saouma, director-general of the FAO, said the disintegrating Soviet Union and eastern Europe need "major injections of capital and technical aid to avert a potential food aid during the extremely risky period of transition from collectivism to market economies."

Before the fall of Communism in the region, Eastern Europe could move around food surpluses to hungry points. But now, countries with surpluses in Poland, Hungary and Czechoslovakia can no longer take advantage of now-defunct Communist trading blocs, Saouma noted.

Food stocks "will be drawn down to dangerously low levels" in 1992, "particularly in the main exporting countries that provide an important safety net," Saouma warned in his year-end message, based on the FAO report.

"Our food security next year will depend to a large extent on the success or failure of the 1992 harvests," he said.

Early prospects for 1992 harvests are mixed because of "less than ideal" crop conditions, FAO experts said in the agency's latest monthly food production assessment.

Traditional supplier countries suffered. The U.S. wheat crop was off 28 percent from last year's bumper harvest because of less planting and adverse growing conditions. Dry weather in the central plains and northwest United States leaves next year's harvest uncertain, FAO noted.

An Australian drought cut down wheat harvest by 35 percent compared to last year's good harvest. As in other agricultural nations, less acreage was planted in Australia in response to low world prices.

Once again Saouma urged that aid to the former East bloc shouldn't come at the expense of developing nations, especially in Africa, where famine threatens several countries.

Saouma said 60 percent of Somalia's population, or 4.5 million, face starvation. That African country is devastated by civil war.

Civil conflict also disrupts relief operations in Mozambique. Ethiopia's food situation is "still grave," he said, while shortages continue in Angola, Liberia and Sierra Leone.

In Iraq, food prices in the face of a U.N. embargo are 15 to 20 times as high as before the Persian Gulf War, leading to malnutrition and an increasing number of child deaths among the less affluent, Saouma said.

Virus-variation offers clues in vaccine search

DAKAR, Senegal (AP) — A less virulent strain of the AIDS virus discovered in Africa appears to act more slowly, promising important clues in the search for a vaccination against the deadly disease, scientists say.

African researchers at the Sixth International Conference on AIDS in Africa complained that the virus, HIV-2, has been largely ignored by their Western counterparts because victims were African.

"The world has become too small for this. The same effort must be made for the treatment and vaccination of these two viruses," said Professor Souleymane Mboup, the Senegalese conference chairman, who was on the team that first discovered the African strain.

The World Health Organization said at the close of the conference Thursday that more than 7 million Africans are infected with an AIDS virus — more than 1 million more than it projected earlier this year.

Many scientists said after the four-day session that they were disheartened by studies that found little success in AIDS education programs in

Third World nations. The campaigns are designed to persuade people to stop sexual practices that increase the risk of becoming infected with the AIDS virus.

Americans and Africans working on the HIV-2 project said it could answer questions about HIV-1, the virus plaguing the West.

"Because the HIV-2 virus has distinctive immunobiologic properties, vaccine development with this virus will also yield important information to help the development of an effective HIV-1 vaccine," Max Essex, chairman of the Harvard AIDS Institute in Boston, said in a conference participants' Thursday statement.

Harvard University scientists have been working with Mboup at the University of Dakar, in the capital of this West African nation, in collaboration with the University of Tours and the University of Limoges in France.

They presented papers based on a study of 353 prostitutes in Senegal. Mboup said the African strain has existed for decades longer than HIV-1.

Mali, desert nomads agree to truce

BAMAKO, Mali (AP) — Desert nomads and government representatives have agreed to a truce and the release of prisoners, state-run Mali Radio said Thursday.

Hundreds of Tuaregs have died in Mali and neighboring Niger in the past two years. Authorities say they belong to rebel movements fighting for autonomy or independence, but

human rights groups charge most are civilians killed in revenge for rebel attacks.

Mali Radio said in a meeting in the town of Mopti, the desert nomads and the Bamako government agreed that all attacks on civilians should end. A commission will be set up to investigate claims by either side of attacks on its people or livestock.

Little holiday cheer as shoppers hunt for toys

MOSCOW (AP) — Yanina Ivanova hopes her son-appreciate the shiny black bicycle he is getting this holiday.

She spent eight hours standing in line at Moscow's biggest toy store to buy it.

"Some people come here at 6 a.m. and wait outside the store before it opens," said Ivanova, a mother of three, describing the difficulties of finding gifts for New Year's Day, the Soviet equivalent of Christmas.

"You waste a whole day to buy one thing. And you want to put something under the New Year's tree for each child."

Tired and grumpy after a day's waiting without anything to eat, Ivanova fought off a barrage of inquiries from other parents desperate to know if there were any bikes left to buy.

"It's not for sale!" Ivanova snapped, even before a weary woman in a white hat could open

her mouth. "I don't know where you can get one! But this one just isn't for sale!"

The grumbling and cavernous Deski Mir (Children's World) toy store had an epic scene as testy shoppers jostled and shoved each other to buy the few toys left before the New Year's holiday.

In this once atheistic land, the Jan. 1 holiday takes the place of Christmas, although an increasing number of people also celebrate the traditional Russian Christmas on Jan. 7.

On New Year's Eve, Soviet children fall asleep dreaming of Ded Moroz, or Grandfather Frost, a jolly roly-poly old man who looks a lot like Santa Claus. If they are good, he will give them toys he carries in a big sack, delivered on a troika sleigh with the help of his tiny granddaughter Snegurochka, or Snow Girl.

But this year, Ded Moroz's sack won't be

very heavy. And it's not the children who have been naughty; it's the deteriorating Soviet economy.

Deiski Mir's main hall, usually overflowing with brightly colored cheap plastic toys and tightly packed crowds, has been completely empty for weeks. Even the shelves have been hauled off, leaving a dimly lit void scattered with dust balls.

Half the store's second floor also is empty. The other half, which once sold children's clothing and women's lingerie, instead offered tinsel, cheap metal New Year's tree ornaments and garish plastic replicas of Ded Moroz.

"I wanted to buy my grandsons a model plane," said Volodya Zhukov, an electrical engineer in line to buy a small plastic New Year's tree. "But even if I found one, where would I get batteries for it?"

Usually thrifty Japanese choking on credit

TOKYO (AP) — Not long ago, Japanese fleeing anxious bills and credit card debt were usually middle-aged men down on their luck, so overwhelmed by gambling debts that they chose to go into hiding or commit suicide.

Today's debtor is just as often a high school student, young wife or professional. The traditionally thrifty Japanese increasingly are succumbing to the siren call of "buy now, pay later."

The number of credit cards has skyrocketed as consumers helped fuel Japan's recent economic growth. But personal bankruptcies are also on the

increase, a clear sign that some shoppers just can't say no.

As a result, business is booming at the Japan Credit Counseling Association, where staff members try to save out-of-control consumers from financial disaster.

Each time he weans a consumer off credit, a process that can take three years, Kichizo Sakamoto holds a little ceremony. "We cut their credit cards into bits," said Sakamoto, the counseling group's executive director.

But for many Japanese choked on credit, there is no happy ending.

One 35-year-old Tokyo man was so depressed by his debts that he tried to

asphyxiate himself. He failed, but ended up a paraplegic. Another man, in the southern city of Hiroshima, killed himself and his family when he found he couldn't pay his debts.

Unlike Americans, who have long carried cards for purchases and to prove credit worthiness, Japanese usually use cash. They often carry wads of bills to pay home and business expenses, and personal checks are rare.

Older Japanese still view plastic warily. So when restrictions on issuing credit cards were relaxed in the mid-1980s, the more receptive and acquisitive younger generation was targeted.

The number of credit cards in Japan has almost tripled to 166 million since 1983, according to the Japan Credit Industry Association.

Kenju Utsunomiya, a lawyer specializing in bankruptcies, says Japanese who come to him have an average debt of about \$38,760. Many are young Japanese who spent beyond their means as soon as they left home.

Newlywed wives who splurged on clothes and leisure while living with their parents found they couldn't make ends meet on their husbands' salaries. "So they charge it," said Sakamoto.

Toys R Us will become 1st U.S. discount store to open in Japan

AMI TOWN, Japan (AP) — Attention shoppers! After years of struggle against Japan's intricate trade restrictions, Toys R Us is finally set to introduce Japanese consumers to a U.S.-inspired retail revolution.

The opening Friday morning of the discount chain's first outlet in Japan will give local consumers a taste of the deep price cuts and huge selection that have long been denied by the nation's archaic retail system.

U.S. officials believe that liberalizing the retail system will allow more imports into Japan, helping to reduce 1990's \$41 billion Japanese trade surplus with Washington, a trade gap that has been the source of increasing tension between Tokyo and Washington.

It took a three-year struggle and a crucial push by U.S. trade negotiators, however, before the first U.S. discount retailer was able to enter the island nation's market.

# Analysts fear lack of mission's effect on Red Army

WASHINGTON — The Red Army, once a mighty monolith with a clear mission and chain of command, could degenerate into a patchwork of rival republican forces and marauding gangs unless the dismantling of the former Soviet Union is handled with extreme caution, according to U.S. analysts and officials.

Russian President Boris N. Yeltsin assured Secretary of State James A. Baker last week that the new commonwealth would retain central control over the Soviet nuclear arsenal and military establishment. But officials and analysts here, while expressing confidence in the Soviet leaders' determination to bury the Cold War and its weapons of mass destruction, are less certain about what will become of 4 million troops and a vast conventional arsenal as the Soviet empire is replaced by a loose alliance of independent states.

It is widely agreed that the defense forces will be substantially reduced in size and strength under the new arrangement, both because of international arms control treaties and because the emerging republics will find it impossible to finance large standing armies.

Under the 1990 Conventional Forces in Europe Treaty, the Soviet Union agreed to eliminate one-third of its 20,000 tanks and 30,000 armored combat vehicles, along with substantial amounts of artillery and aircraft. In addition, Soviet officials have pledged to reduce troop strength by about 1 million.

However, it is far from clear how those cutbacks will be managed, what will become of the demobilized troops and their equipment, whether the new republics will be able to agree on an equitable division of the remaining forces and whether the new republican armies will present a permanent threat of regional conflict.

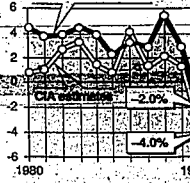
"Everyone is highly sensitized to the Soviet nuclear issue, and making the right noises about it. It is much harder to get consensus on the issue of conventional forces, which are less of an international threat but are usable in a way nukes cannot be," said Jack Mendelsohn of the nonprofit Arms Control Association.

Most indicators show the Soviet economy in deep trouble.

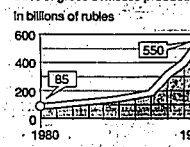

**Official Soviet numbers**



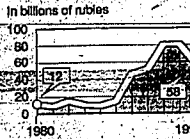

Debt soared 38.2% within a year to 550 billion rubles, or 58% of gross domestic product.

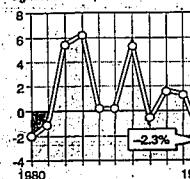


**Budget deficit**

With their ideological mission gone and their cohesive state structure crumbling, specialists said, many officers have either left the military or are trying to adapt by rapidly shifting loyalties and forging new relationships with republican leaders.

"These officials see their country being torn apart, their institution being threatened, their privileges disappearing, and themselves being despised and humiliated by society," said Robert Legvold, a Soviet specialist at Columbia University.

Some specialists disagree with such alarming assessments, suggesting that the Red Army will quietly withdraw, its cashiered recruits gladly returning home and its abandoned weapons rusting in open fields.

"The Soviet military has been collapsing for two years," said Stephen Meyer, a Soviet military specialist at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. "Like Humpty Dumpty, it cannot be put back together again."

The other major unanswered question is how the remaining defense forces will be restructured to fit in with the region's new political configuration, and what the relationship of republican forces will be to neighboring states and to the proposed central commonwealth.

They noted that although Russia will emerge as the region's dominant military force, other armed groups, such as Ukraine and Kazakhstan, might seek to challenge that power or turn on their weaker neighbors.

**U.S., Britain, France seek U.N. council sanctions against Libya**

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States, Britain and France are making plans for U.N. sanctions against Libya for its alleged role in the bombings of Pan Am Flight 103 and a French airliner, diplomats said Thursday.

A total of 440 people died in the two bombings.

The first step would be cutting off commercial air traffic to Libya and banning the sale of planes and aircraft parts, a senior U.S. official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

But in a "phased approach" to pressure Libya into cooperating, the official said, more stringent sanctions are being discussed in

Washington, London and Paris. These might include banning sales of military supplies, dual-use technology that could have military as well as civilian applications, such as chemicals and computers, and a ban on Libyan oil exports, he said.

The ban on air traffic, airplane and parts has the most support among the parties, the official said.

Two Libyan intelligence agents have been indicted in the bombing of Pan Am's Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland, three years ago.

The sanctions are intended to force Libyan leader Col. Moammar Gadhafi to comply

with an American and British request for extradition of the agents and compensation for the Pan Am bombing, which killed 270 people.

French courts also blame Libyan agents for the bombing of a UTA plane over Niger in September 1989 that killed 170 people.

In Paris, a government spokesman confirmed Thursday that officials were working to put together a sanctions plan. "These conversations have been ongoing and are still continuing," said Maurice Gourdault-Montagne, deputy spokesman for the Foreign Ministry.

He did not mention possible measures

against Libya, suggesting no final decision had been made.

Western diplomats at the United Nations said the discussions are being conducted among the three capitals at this stage, and are not expected to be taken up by the U.N. missions in New York until January.

The chances for U.N. approval of sanctions could improve in the new year, when Cuba and Yemen will lose their temporary two-year seats on the Security Council, to be replaced by pro-Western countries.

Yemen and Cuba opposed most of the council resolutions that tightened the sanctions noose in Iraq, until the council finally

authorized military action a year ago in the face of Saddam Hussein's continuing occupation of Kuwait.

The United States, Britain and France have sent cables on their plans to Moscow and Beijing, but have not yet had discussions with the Soviets or the Chinese.

The air travel sanctions would be made difficult in Libya, but would not be economically devastating. Travelers would have to enter Libya by means such as ferry from Malta or overland travel from Egypt.

The U.S. official said the sanctions would be meant to force Libya to obey demands made Nov. 27.

**Talks spur radical activity**

BEIT EL, Occupied West Bank (AP) — The Middle East peace talks have not been entirely without result.

In an effort to upset them, Arab radicals have stepped up attacks in the occupied territories and Jewish settlers have responded in kind.

Palestinian gunmen have killed three Israelis since the peace talks began in late October. Settlers have retaliated by rampaging through Palestinian villages, blocking roads and threatening even stronger actions.

In the latest showdown on Thursday, dozens of settlers blocked Palestinian-owned cars from traveling the Jerusalem-Nablus road, a major West Bank artery, to protest Arab attacks on Israelis in the territories. Army troops convinced them to leave after about an hour.

Militants on both sides admit they want to derail the U.S.-sponsored talks in which Israel and the Palestinians are trying to work out limited autonomy for residents of the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

"We hope the talks will break off as soon as possible without success. We want to exert pressure on our government," settler leader Benny Katzev said of recent settler actions.

On the other side, a leaflet from the Islamic fundamentalist Hamas and the radical Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine urged Palestinians to confront and ambush the Zionist soldiers and settlers.

Radical Palestinians fear any step toward peace will destroy their goal of regaining all Israel and the occupied territories. Settlers worry that autonomy could lead to a Palestinian state on the occupied land where settlers now live.

The Israeli government has admonished settlers against revenge rampages, saying the army is responsible for protecting them and will arrest Israelis who cause trouble.

But Israeli newspapers have quoted police and army officers as saying privately they believe the settlers are being intentionally provocative because they are convinced the right-wing government backs them.

The violence began Oct. 28, two days before the Madrid peace conference, when Palestinian gunmen ambushed a bus transporting settlers, killing two people. On Dec. 1, an Israeli motorist, settler Zvi Klein, was shot dead near the West Bank town of Ramallah.

The deaths created both fear and anger among the 112,000 settlers who live among 1.7 Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

In response, Beit El and other settlements formed militias that have broken windows of Arab-owned cars and homes, blocked roads and cut down Palestinian olive trees.

"We will no longer remain quiet. There is going to be a Jewish intifada here," warned Meir Gross of the Beit El settlement, using the Arabic phrase for the four-year Palestinian uprising.

**Malaria kills 290 in Son La**

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A malaria epidemic has killed 290 people this year in the northern Vietnamese province of Son La, Vietnam's official radio reported.

That is double the number of deaths caused by malaria for 1989 and 1990 combined, the Voice of Vietnam said. The report, dated Wednesday, was seen Thursday in Bangkok.

The report said 41,000 people living in 93 provincial villages were infected this year with malaria, 4,600 of them with acute malaria. The epidemic still is spreading despite efforts to control it, the report said.

The provincial capital of Son La is 125 miles west of the Vietnamese capital Hanoi.

Hundreds more have died of malaria this year in Vietnam, where living conditions and health care are primitive.


Malaria is transmitted to humans by the bite of infected mosquitoes and is characterized by severe chills and fever.

## Viola, Winfield change teams

**NEW YORK** — Frank Viola and the Boston Red Sox virtually completed a \$13.9 million, three-year contract on Thursday, and Dave Winfield and the Toronto Blue Jays agreed to a \$2.3 million, one-year deal.

Rick Sutcliffe and the Baltimore Orioles completed a one-year, \$1.2 million contract, and outfielder Jim Lindeman, who was eligible for salary arbitration, agreed to a \$260,000 contract with Philadelphia.

Viola was among 22 free agents who began the day with a midnight deadline to accept or reject salary arbitration offers from their former clubs.

Minnesota catcher Brian Harper, Atlanta reliever Alejandro Pena and Los Angeles second baseman Juan Samuel had accepted by early evening. Pedro Guerrero's agent said it was 99 percent likely that the first baseman would accept an arbitration offer from St. Louis and Daryl Boston's agent told the Mets the outfielder would accept New York's offer.

Meanwhile, teams began announcing the players they would allow to become free agents by not tendering a contract before Friday's deadline. Seattle said it would not offer deals to pitchers Rob Murphy and Scott Bankhead,

Philadelphia said it wouldn't give a contract to pitcher Joe Bevier and Texas said it wouldn't make an offer to shortstop Jeff Kunkley.

The biggest news of the day was that Viola and Boston had come together on money, if not exact contract language.

"We're very close to getting something done," Red Sox general manager Lou Gorman said Thursday evening. "Hopefully, by tomorrow, we'll have it finished."

Viola, who last spring rejected a \$13 million, three-year extension offered by the New York Mets, must pass two physicals in order for the deal to take effect. The 31-year-old left-hander, slumped to a 13-15 record last season, only his second losing season since 1983.

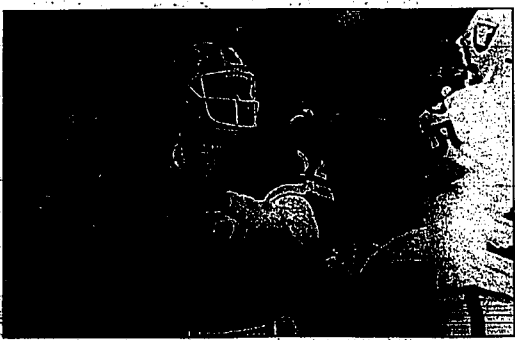

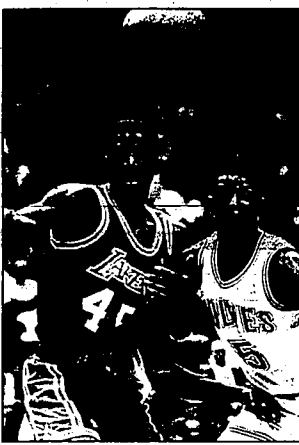

Atlanta is a longshot with a small defensive line that forces them to blitz. They tried that in Washington ... and lost, 56-17.

Detroit? Without Sanders, they lost 45-0 to the Redskins opening night. They're better now, Sanders is back, but they're also without playoff experience and missing five starters, including quarterback Rodney Peete.

That leaves Dallas, which has done miraculous things despite its inexperience. But that's the key. Just about every Redskins rookie — Bobby Wilson and Ricky Ervin, have playoff experience; the only Cowboys who can say that are Jim Jeffcoat, Bill Bates, Isaac Holt, Alfredo Roberts and Ray Horton.

That's the bottom line. And the bottom line for the season? Washington 38, Buffalo 28 in Minneapolis on Jan. 26.

# Tyson fondling suit dropped; motion filed in rape trial

**INDIANAPOLIS (AP)** — Mike Tyson won a round when a beauty pageant promoter dropped a \$607 million lawsuit accusing him of fondling contestants.

His attorneys want FBI interviews with potential witnesses barred as evidence in the boxer's rape trial. A motion filed this week by Tyson's attorneys claims the FBI violated its own policy and acted outside its statutory authority by interviewing at least 22 potential witnesses in 12 states.

FBI policy, the motion said, states that agents can't interview "suspects or witnesses" on behalf of local or state law enforcement agencies.

The motion, filed in Marion Superior Court, asks that any evidence the FBI discovered in investigating rape allegations against the former heavyweight champion be barred from Tyson's trial, set to begin Jan. 27.

Prosecutor David J. Dreyer said there are no grounds for the

motion. "We're not aware of any legal authority that could preclude the FBI from assisting local law enforcement in any case that they deemed appropriate, including this one."

The executive director of the Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys Council on Thursday gave Tyson's attorneys credit for being creative, but dismissed the motion as a longshot.

"They've come up with some creative arguments, like with the FBI, but I don't think it will be successful,"

Dick Good said. "They don't gain anything by all these motions except creating more paperwork. I don't know if it's an attempt to wear down the prosecution."

Tyson's promoter Don King said Thursday "I can't really comment on that."

Meanwhile, the founder of the Miss Black America Pageant said he met with Tyson's attorneys and agreed to drop his lawsuit accusing Tyson of fondling 10 contestants.

J. Morris Anderson would not say

whether any money would change hands, but he said his suit had no basis, accusing some of the contestants of lying. "We settled our differences amicably and agreed not to discuss the terms," Anderson said Wednesday night.

Said King: "This is a blessing that this man has seen the light and recognized the black-on-black crime these women have committed by falsely accusing Mike Tyson."

The federal lawsuit, filed in August, called Tyson a "serial

bastards fondler" and accused him of molesting the 1990 Miss Black America and 10 of 23 contestants at the 1991 pageant, held in July in Indianapolis. The lawsuit alleged Tyson ruined the pageant's reputation.

Good said he doesn't believe dropping the lawsuit will have an effect on the rape trial.

Tyson was indicted in September on rape and three other sex-related charges for an alleged attack on a Miss Black America contestant in his Indianapolis hotel room July 19.

## Owners' confusion adds to Netsmess

**EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J.** (AP) — Even before one owner of the New Jersey Nets began negotiating to hire a new coach, the apparently without authorization from more senior partners — there were signs that owners and management were not always on the same page in the playbook.

Reports he would be out of a job next week, coach Bill Fitch was at practice Thursday, preparing the team for Friday night's home game against the Chicago Bulls.

Team officials had no new comment about minority owner Joe Taub's talks with former North Carolina State coach Jim Valvano about taking over the struggling Nets, who are 7-16.

Principal owner Alan Aulfe said Wednesday night that he and David Gastin were the majority owners and that Willis Reed makes the club's basketball decisions.

Taub was only an adviser and was not authorized to negotiate for the team, he said. Taub did not return calls to his office Thursday.

Reed, senior vice president of basketball operations, said the team was not looking to make any changes. But if Taub prevails, it would not be the first time Reed was overruled on basketball matters.

As the Nets negotiated with Kenny Anderson, the No. 2 pick in

this year's NBA draft, Reed said Anderson would have to accept a contract the club could live with or not play in the league.

But in the end, Anderson got what he wanted, a five-year, \$14.5 million deal.

Reed was ordered to waive center Dave Fells and forward Bud Rasmussen to make room for Anderson in order to keep the club under the salary cap. Four others were asked to defer their salaries.

Fitch complained at the time that Anderson was being paid too much. And he said it was the first time in his 21-year coaching career that players were cut without him being consulted.

"Maybe I've been a lime-chuck coach since the Buechler thing," Fitch said Wednesday night.

Valvano's attorney, Arthur Kaminisky, said only that negotiations were continuing with the Nets.

Nets players tried to stay out of the dispute when questioned after the club's 102-93 victory over Cleveland Wednesday night.

"It's a little different from the others," center Sam Bowie said. "We get used to dealing with things like this."

## Soviet athletes remain without flag, anthem

**MOSCOW (AP)** — The Soviet Olympic Committee said Thursday it still has not decided which flag or anthem its team will compete under during the Winter Games and it may use the Olympic flag.

As the Soviet Union's quickening political disintegration and economic collapse clouds the future of its mighty Olympic squad, sports officials also unveiled a stylized Olympic symbol in a marketing plan to raise desperately needed money for their athletes.

Athletes from Russia, Ukraine, Byelorussia, Kazakhstan and perhaps Uzbekistan will compete on a unified team at the Winter Games that begin in Albertville, France, on Feb. 8, said Alexander Kozlovsky, vice president of the Soviet Olympic Committee.

Athletes from other republics will compete because they are not known for their cold weather sports.

For now, athletes from all 12 republics will compete on the team at the Summer Games in Barcelona, a meeting of the Soviet Olympic Committee's Olympic committee will be held March 9 in Lausanne, Switzerland, when a final decision will be made, said Soviet Olympic Committee President Valery Smirnov.

Kozlovsky expressed fears,

however, that politics may prevail over sport, and former Soviet republics may try to use the Games as a platform for their newly declared independence. "If the desire of this or that personality to be seen on the television screen all over the world parading after his flag will prevail over good reason — of course, it will bring some difficulties," he said.

Smirnov said he hoped the Soviet Olympic Committee would meet in the central part of the year to decide in which flag and anthem the team will use in Albertville.

Under an agreement reached between President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and Russian President Boris Yeltsin, the Soviet Union and the new republics will be dissolved before the end of the year, as the nation moves to a Commonwealth of Independent States.

The symbols of Soviet power, the Olympic flag, are expected to be replaced, and athletes of the now independent republics may refuse to march beneath the hammer and sickle. "If they take down ... the red flag of the state that won't exist anymore, it will be ridiculous in any form," he said.

"We just had a football team that came together this year," Lewis said. "In the past two years, we've had chances to win some big games, but this is the year that we did it."

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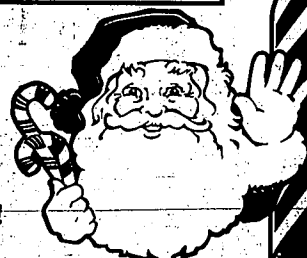

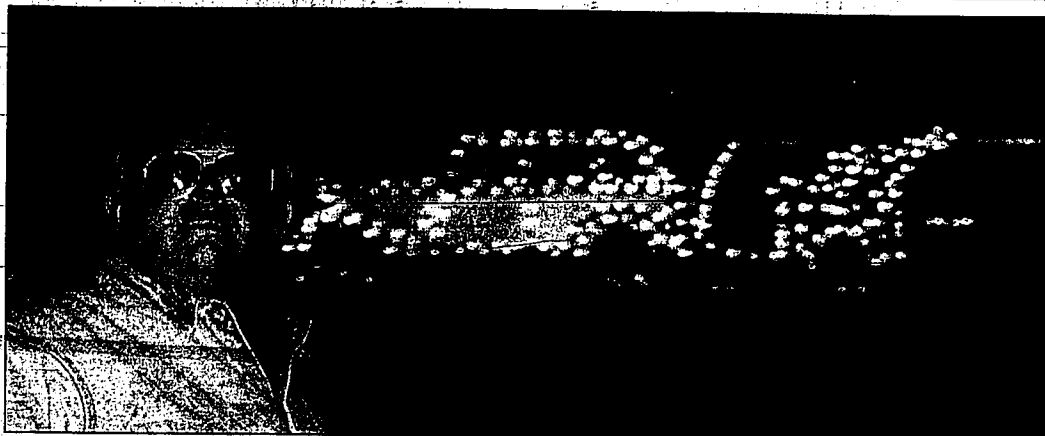
### Sports medicine doctor credited for helping Beatty

Perry said that his contribution was "making sure Beatty had the proper 'look' for his role as the mobster. I helped him develop the specific body attitude that he wanted for the part," says Perry, who has treated Olympic and professional athletes.

## Lighting up the Magic Valley Twin Falls resident brings hobby into splendid setup

Deck the halls — and the doors and the porches and the shrubs. Santa's on his way, and homes throughout the Magic Valley are ready, decked out in Christmas splendor both inside and out.

"I almost cry every time I come home and see them," Higley said of the lighting display constructed by her husband and seven children (ages 5 to 16). "We've never had the time or money for Christmas lights, but this year, they decided to surprise me and have them anyway."

This Christmas, Higley's yard holds Santa in his sleigh with reindeer flying into the air, a star with streamers and computerized lights on the trees. "It's just wonderful,"

Higley said. "You can see them for miles around."

Tom and Barbara Smith, who run a construction business, decorated their home to reflect their interests. They stacked their lawn, at 516 S. Grandview Drive, with giant building blocks.

"I got the blocks from the set of a JUMP Co. play, because no one knew what to do with them after the performance was over," said Barbara Smith. "I just repainted a few and arranged them to say 'Merry Christmas.'"

Originally, Smith, who likes to make dolls, was going to use the blocks in a dollhouse. "But they were too big," she said. So she added a few wooden reindeer and ended up with a Christmas toyland.

"I like to do something different with my outdoor decorations every year," Smith said, "and people are telling me this idea is a really fun way to celebrate the season."

# The Rockettes: Alive and still kicking at 60

NEW YORK (AP) - For almost 60 years, time has stood still at Radio City Music Hall for the high-kicking Rockettes. They are a string of 11 of Americans, one of the world's most enduring dance troupes.

But onstage, none of the 12 Rockettes ever stops moving - especially during the grueling rehearsals for their Christmas show, a tradition as popular as the annual lighting of the tree across the street in Rockefeller Center.

This year's show kicks off the Radio City Music Hall's yearlong 60th-anniversary celebration.

"On count six, girls, don't forget, that's my pet peeve!" bellows Violet Holmes, who has been with the Rockettes for 46 years; first as a dancer and now as senior choreographer.

"Girls! That precision was off! Wrong! Girls! Don't touch your kicks!" she says. A few of the troupe are over 45 but they are still called "girls."

Holding a microphone, Holmes strides back and forth across the broad stage of Radio City, barking repetitive instructions to a line of dancers in sweaters and leggings.

They must learn a complex series of dance routines and kicks with military-like precision and perform them in five shows a day, each lasting 90 minutes.

The backbone of the show are the ever-smiling, eternally young (at least from the house seats) Rockettes. Only

the faces have changed since the Rockettes made their first appearance onstage at Radio City when the art deco landmark opened on Dec. 27, 1932. Rockettes call it simply, "the hall."

The Rockettes were actually born in 1925, when 16 precision dancers debuted in St. Louis as the "Missouri Rockettes." Then they became the "Roxettes" and finally the Rockettes when they came to Radio City.

Like Dolly Parton and Jerry Lewis, they've long since passed from cornball to almost cool. Recently, more than 50 Rockettes (they include alternate dancers) lined the halls of

NBC in a complicated bit for "Late Night With David Letterman." One Rockette pulled a soda from a machine and passed the can down the high-kicking line until it reached her.

"The Rockettes have maintained their prestige over the years because they represent kind of a fairyland," said Holmes, taking a break in one of the empty seats in the cavernous hall.

"It's a tradition the girls themselves love. They're a family and Americans consider the girls part of their family." But the life of a Rockette is not all Cinderella.

It's more like a cross between an

old-fashioned Broadway hooper and a modern-day showgirl.

Susanne Doris has been with the Rockettes more than 12 years but does not like to give the exact figure because it might reveal her age. She needs the height requirement: no taller than 5-foot-8 and no shorter than 5-foot-3. Doris is just perfectly weight.

She is required to maintain a certain weight for her height (between 125 and 130 pounds) and a certain percentage of bodyfat (between 13 percent and 22 percent). None of the Rockettes have individual dressing rooms. They all change costumes in one large room.

"It's become a career," said Doris, who taught dance on Staten Island before she submitted to the rigorous audition process for the Rockettes, in which she thrived on grueling jazz, tap and ballet. "We're demonstrated. You have to love it. There's no other feeling like being part of a troupe that's so well-loved."

Except for the demanding Christmas show, work as a Rockette is casual. There are 1979 when the hall topped showing films. Back then, Doris remembers performing in four shows daily, often seven times a week.

Landing a job as Rockette may be the closest thing to tenure in the dance world where work is scarce and long-term stints are almost nonexistent. It's hard to be fired from the Rockettes. "Performance warnings" are issued to dancers whose work is not up to par but Doris says they're rare.

# Trekies on quest for elusive keepsake

"We heard, via the grapevine, they are already worth \$200. I don't know if that's true, but that's what we are hearing," Hinc said.

"This is the most demand we ever had for a single ornament," said Betty Helgager, spokeswoman for Hallmark Cards. "There are waiting lists in some stores of as many as 300 hundred people."

The 5-inch-long ornament was designed to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the "Star Trek" television show. It also coincided with the pre-Christmas premiere of "Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country."

The death of the show's creator Gene Roddenberry apparently has also boosted interest in the already popular Star Trek paraphernalia.

"Those factors I'm sure had a lot to do with the phenomenon of the ornament," Helgager said.

# Clancy rips Paramount for 'Patriot Games' production

The filming of Tom Clancy's novel, "Patriot Games," has not been completed, but already the first review is in - from the author himself, no less, and what he thinks can't make Paramount Pictures very happy. In a highly unusual move, Clancy says he fears the movie will be so bad and so different from his book that he wants the studio to remove his name from the production.

"I sold them this product in good faith. This request is not being done on the spur of the moment. I told them this was a possibility in late August - the product they are turning out is a disaster."

"Patriot Games" stars Harrison Ford as Jack Ryan, the CIA operative and hero of all of Clancy's novels, who rescues the British royal family from terrorists and the withstands reprisal attacks in the Annapolis, Md., area.

Filming began in late October in London.

Russ Clancy, saying he wishes to preserve his reputation as a novelist with a passion for accuracy, indicated he no longer wants to be associated with the movie. He says the script contains numerous inaccuracies and that key scenes have been rewritten.

Told of Clancy's comments, a Paramount spokesman in Los Angeles, who did not wish to be identified, said the studio "is not commenting on what the film is going to say, or how it's going to be credited when it comes out next summer."

He said the studio would not respond directly to his complaints, nor to published reports that Ford was so upset with the film's director, Phillip Johnston, that he threatened to walk off the set.

Instead, he sent a brief statement: "Paramount is in the early stages of production on a filmed version of Tom Clancy's best-selling novel, 'Patriot Games.' We are pleased with the results so far, and we are confident that audiences around the world, as well as Mr. Clancy, will be very happy with the film when it premieres next summer."

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what would make Clancy's differences with Paramount even more touchy is that the studio owns the rights to another of his novels, "Clear and Present Danger." Clancy said he has done some work with John Milius, the screenwriter, on the script, but "probably will not" be involved with the production of that movie.

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# Commercials using old movie clips steam today's filmmakers

HOLLYWOOD — While Elton John might have opted to hawk Diet Coke just for the taste of it, the three late film stars who appear with him in a new high-tech TV commercial — Humphrey Bogart, James Cagney and Louis Armstrong — had no choice in the matter.

But their bids and the copyright holder of their films' did. And they bargained with Coca-Cola Co. to allow the use of their famous forebears' film work in exchange for a rights fee.

Therein lies the focus of a controversy that began five years ago with the colorization of film classics like "It's a Wonderful Life" and only promises to worsen as technology improves, according to critics. Some filmmakers are crying heresy at the thought of their artworks being cut up and used as commercial fodder.

"An Orwellian notion of what can happen is here, now," said Keith LaQua, executive director of the Artists Rights Foundation. "Can you imagine someone buying a David

Hockney and then cutting it up in pieces to auction off to the highest bidder?"

"Our position is that once the film is made, it's made," said director Joe Dante, speaking on behalf of the Directors Guild of America. "It's not made by machines. It's made by people. For economic gain, the people who own the copyright to these films are doing what they want to with them without regard to the original artist and that is not right."

In the Diet Coke commercial, John appears to be playing piano in a nightclub while Bogart, Cagney and Armstrong pop in for cameo appearances. Armstrong blows a

trumpet riff from a Diet Coke jingle as he stands next to the British popstar's piano, and Bogart walks into the nightclub as though he is actually Rick Blaine, walking in his own club in downtown Casablanca. Cagney not only places an order for drinks but also appears to smile at his modern lady companion as she rests her elbow on his shoulder.

"When you sell your soul to the Hollywood devil, you know that you sell it for residuals," said Jesse Meyers, editor of the trade magazine Beverage Digest, which has tracked the escalation of the so-called "cola wars" for more than a decade. "You should know going in that you are selling your soul as well for commercials or movies that can be colorized by Ted Turner."

The Atlanta television impresario who found himself in "hot water" with film preservationists over colorization is once again at center stage in this latest controversy. His Turner Entertainment Co. owns the MGM and Warner Bros. film libraries, from which the four films with the Diet Coke clips of Bogart, Cagney and Armstrong were taken.

"We must have looked at about 100 to 200 films," said Tony DeGregorio, the Atlanta Worldwide Advertising executive who oversaw the creation of the commercial. "Ironically, we wound up with these four and all of them belonged to Ted Turner."

A Turner spokeswoman said that Coke and Turner's licensing and merchandising division head, Lois Sloan, "worked out a deal which accommodated both of them and, beyond that, I'm really comment."

Roger Mayer, president of the Turner Entertainment Co., said Turner is entitled to experiment "in the same way directors demand that right in connection with novels that they buy and plays that they buy."

"When they want to turn those around — change the title, change the characterizations, cut our large parts of it and change the vision of the author — they do not hesitate for a moment," Mayer said in an interview broadcast over the Public Broadcasting Service.

In the ongoing battle between Coke and Pepsi for market share in the intensely competitive soft drink industry, the celebrity

advertising stakes have climbed higher and higher in recent years. When Pepsi signed up a Madonna or a Ray Charles, Coke counters by contracting for the spokesperson services of a Paula Abdul or a Randy Travis. Pepsi hires a sports figure like Bo Jackson and Coke counters by getting Wayne Gretzky.

Viewers may marvel at the result, but the Artists Rights Foundation — a non-profit group formed this year to protest what it sees as the defacement of artists' work and which is housed at the Directors Guild in Los Angeles — is not pleased.

"Four or five years ago, several filmmakers predicted this would happen," said executive director LaQua. "What this commercial brings into focus is that film art, which has strong ideological and cultural imagery, can be altered for any purpose, and the artists themselves who have sold the copyright have no right to object and no power to seek redress."

"Our ability to manipulate images in the coming years is going to be unparalleled, but it should not be done at the expense of what has been done in the past," said director Dante.

## The artists: Annie Liebowitz and social history of a pair of decades

NEW YORK (AP) — Annie Liebowitz is perched awkwardly on a platform in her enormous, white SoHo studio for what to her is an ordeal, facing the camera and posing for a series of photographs. The models that have served her as both photographer and pop iconographer for the last 20 years are correct, Liebowitz makes an ideal subject.

"The people who scare me the most — are the ones who feel comfortable in front of the camera," Liebowitz says. "The people who feel the most uncomfortable often work out to be more challenging and exciting."

Liebowitz, 41, is a tall woman (a 6-footer) with correspondingly large feet (size 12) and long blond hair, who manages to be simultaneously imposing and engaging. After two decades of photographing some of the world's most famous people, she has become a celebrity herself, often eclipsing her subjects.

"As I get better known, I realized how much I liked not being known so much," Liebowitz says. "I don't really know how it will change what I do. It feels weird to have the attention but it's too early to tell if there's been a backlash."

She's on the publicity trail, somewhat reluctantly, to mark both the publication of a new book, "Photographs Annie Liebowitz 1970-1990," and her first solo museum exhibit, which will travel to U.S. and European cities through 1994.

The photographs include some of her best-known work, such as the picture of a naked John Lennon embracing Yoko Ono, taken just hours before he was fatally shot in 1980, and unpublished shots, like the one of the Rev. Al Sharpton underneath a hair dryer in a Brooklyn beauty salon.

The photographs, from the world of dance, art, rock music, literature and drama, tell a social history of the last two decades. They also chronicle Liebowitz's career, beginning with her raw, untutored work for a fledgling Rolling Stone magazine, and continuing to her glossy, high-concept magazine layouts that have become her trademark.

Liebowitz is cranking interviews in between a ferocious schedule. Her work, which includes regular assignments for Vanity Fair and American Express, among others, takes her all over the world. Her shoots are planned three months in advance and outlined in huge calendars on the walls of her studio, a sweeping loft which overlooks the Hudson River.

Liebowitz seems overwhelmed by her growing fame. She chooses her words carefully and worries about what she's saying.

She plays with her hair and looks relieved when she's briefly interrupted by a phone call about a photo shoot with two young actresses the next morning.

(Liebowitz asks that their names not be printed; Vanity Fair Editor in Chief Tina Brown "would have a fit.")

Liebowitz says her approach to "making pictures" hasn't changed much since her early days at Rolling Stone. She got the job at the magazine when she was a junior at the San Francisco Art Institute. She brought in some pictures of a peace cover and three years later, at age 23, was named chief photographer.

"Part of the thing I did well at Rolling Stone was getting the person," Liebowitz says. "I was amazed when I got them and then I thought — uh, now I have to shoot them."

She apparently has retained that unpretentious quality over the years. To get her pictures, especially some of the more sensational — Debra Winger French-kissing her dog, the actor Ernie "Hurt" in a bathtub filled with milk, Demi Moore nude and pregnant — Liebowitz researches her subjects and collaborates with them.

"I do my homework," says Liebowitz, who likes to visit people at home the day before she shoots them. "I try to be a nice person. I have some ideas and I also listen to

what they have to say. I'm not asking anyone to do anything they don't want to do. Basically, I'm looking for the truth."

When Liebowitz shot camera-shy Diane Keaton, "it was like working with another photographer." Liebowitz got her shot when Keaton "did this kinky little dance for less than a minute."

In contrast, Roseanne and Tom Arnold were totally uninhibited. Liebowitz says the couple approved of the shots of them in Vanity Fair in which they wrestled in mud.

"They really like each other," Liebowitz says. "They're sexy to each other. They couldn't keep their hands off each other, they were rolling on the floor. They were the ones who said you have to shoot us wrestling."

Liebowitz sometimes misses her days as an anonymous photographer but says her current work has broadened her professional scope.

"Portraiture opened things up for me," she says. "It's based on something real to me. A lot of my ideas come from a love of journalism."

Liebowitz always carries a 35mm automatic camera with her, both for "snaps" of family and friends and for the unexpected picture that may come her way.

But no photo session will likely equal in impact the last pictures she took of Lennon.

Liebowitz becomes emotional when the subject comes up. "I think I'm still trying to figure it out," she says slowly. "It was just such an unbelievable situation when he was killed — just a few hours later. For a good six months I wasn't very well. A photograph like that happens only once in a lifetime."

## Disney, Henson Productions form video team

WEST HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP) — The Walt Disney Co. and Jim Henson Productions Inc. announced a home video alliance today, signaling a reconciliation after a contentious Disney buyout plan fell apart last year.

Burbank-based Disney's Buena Vista Home Video will distribute Henson videocassettes, including the "Muppet" programs and films, for five years under the agreement announced at a Le Bel Age Hotel news conference.

The value of the deal wasn't disclosed by either party, but Henson Productions, called it a "multimillion-dollar, worldwide-distribution agreement."

"This is a great business relationship that benefits everyone. Buena Vista Home Video is unquestionably the best video distributor in family entertainment," said Henson President Brian Henson.

"Fraggle" — "Rock" — "The Storyteller" — "Muppet Babies," "The Muppet Show" and "The Muppet Movie" were among the titles involved in the distribution deal. The accord also covers TV rights for the Henson library.

Many of the Henson properties, including the entire Jim Henson Home Video library will soon be available to the public," Brian Henson said.

Call your local police department and explain that you have a weapon from World War II that needs to be safely disposed of. They will either advise you to bring it in, or offer to pick it up.

I advise you not to handle it - lock it up until you either deliver it to the local police or they pick it up. Peace of mind is only a telephone call away.

## Oscar might 'silence' Orion's money crunch

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Orion Pictures thinks its hit film "The Silence of the Lambs" may sweep several Academy Award nominations. But can the studio, which is in bankruptcy court, afford a promotion campaign to sway Oscar voters?

Ballets for Hollywood's top honors will be mailed in a month, and producers are scrambling to win recognition for their pictures, mostly by throwing money around town. It's not that voters beg bribes. Instead, gifts, free screenings and splashy advertisements are essential to remind the nearly 5,000 award selectors of a movie's charms, especially when the film debuts early in the year.

"The Silence of the Lambs," directed by Jonathan Demme, premiered in February. "A well-rounded Oscar campaign can cost more than \$200,000," Orion

Doesn't have any money, and owes Demme \$364,000 and Kevin Costner's production company \$3 million, court records show.

Nevertheless, Orion was able to ship jet-black gift boxes to Oscar voters in late October, containing a "Silence" videocassette, soundtrack,

all program and screening schedule. "We are proud to present for your consideration, in all categories, an advance videocassette of 'The Silence of the Lambs,'" David Forbes, Orion's distribution chief, said in a letter to Oscar voters.

"If you've already seen the film, we hope you'll enjoy this opportunity to see it again. If this is your first viewing, be prepared for a riveting cinematic experience."

Orion also is spending thousands on advertisements for the film in industry trade newspapers. The studio would not disclose exact expenditures for the promotion but it is thought to be in excess of \$100,000.

"In spite of the financial condition of the studio... this is a high priority for us," said Christine La Monte, Orion's senior vice president for publicity and promotion.

Orion believes "Silence" stars Jodie Foster and Anthony Hopkins deserve recognition for best actress and actor, and the movie is a favored candidate for best picture and director nominations.

Earlier this week, the movie, a thriller about the eerie, intellectual relationship between an FBI agent and a cannibalistic killer, swept the New York Film Critics Circle awards in those categories.

In part for vanity and in part because Academy Awards can bring millions to a film's profit sheet, the increasingly tightfisted studios promote their films with abandon this time of year. Nominations will be announced Feb. 19.

TiStar Pictures, which has labored with such mediocre releases as "Hooch" and "Bingo," plugged its "Bugsy" with an unusually long six-page advertisement in Daily Variety.

Orion made such critical and commercial disappointments as "Guilty by Suspicion," "The Untouchables" and "The People's Money."

The pollicking has grown so pervasive the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences now warns members "to be on guard against inappropriate attempts to influence your vote, and to register your displeasure with anyone who might make such an attempt."

No one has accused Orion of manipulating the process. Still, there's a good explanation for the lobbying.

If you get an award, it can mean \$10 million. "La Monte said: 'Oscar would boost the price of the movie's television rights and make

a sequel much more attractive. Home-video sales also might accelerate.

Oscar trophies would deliver a much-needed jolt to Orion, the crumbling home of such directors as Costner, Woody Allen and the late Tony Richardson. Foster is seeking an Oscar as director of Orion's moderately successful "Little Man Tate."

Long considered the most creatively daring studio, Orion filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection last week. The studio won the best picture Academy Award this year for Costner's "Dances With Wolves." Its other Oscar winners include "Platoon" and "Amadeus."

The studio petitioned the court last week to allow it to spend \$4 million to keep operations alive.

# Stone's 'JFK' a controversial, compelling film

Oliver Stone's "JFK," a three-hour and 10-minute probe of the assassination of President Kennedy, opens with real footage of President Eisenhower's farewell address, in which he talks about the dangers of a "military-industrial complex."

Eisenhower's warning is Stone's springboard for his own conspiracy theory about Kennedy's death, which he unspools during the course of this compelling and controversial movie.

## Review

The Kennedy assassination is one of our most perplexing mysteries. Few Americans accept the Warren Commission's official finding that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone. But as powerful as the subject matter is, Stone offers little concrete evidence to support his theories, and even creates factual errors.

Based on the books "On the Trail of the Assassins," by Jim Garrison, and "Crossfire: The Plot That Killed Kennedy," by Jim Marrs; the screenplay by Stone and Zachary Sklar (a former executive editor of The Nation) contends that the military, CIA and corporate defense contractors had John Kennedy killed because he planned to pull out of Vietnam, dismantle the CIA and was "soft" on communism.

Stone's champion is Garrison (Kevin Costner), the former New Orleans district attorney who tried a local businessman, Clay Shaw (Tommy Lee Jones), on charges he conspired to kill the president.

With a brood of Hollywood stars giving cameo turns (Walter Matthau, Jack Lemmon, Ed Asner, Donald Sutherland, Sally Kirkland, John Candy), Stone launches a relentless cinematic attack. The motorcade is shown dozens of times from every angle, in every speed; in color, in black and white, with sound, without

sound. Stone pounds it home again and again like some sort of mantra: believe, believe, believe.

He stages the assassination with three different teams of shooters — some in the school book depository, some on the "grass knoll," some behind a fence. The slain president's autopsy is depicted, with a patch of hair clinging to wet brain material. We also see the sickening underbelly of New Orleans' rough trade, Jack Ruby shooting Oswald, secret meetings in the Pentagon, and "questionable" White House alliances.

Stone tries to prove that Kennedy was on the brink of establishing a new world order, of making some wonderful changes for a better

society. The facts — and history — do not support his thesis.

There is little evidence that Kennedy planned to withdraw from Vietnam. Stone says he did. There is little evidence linking the assassinations of John and Martin Luther King Jr. to one person or group of people. Stone suggests there is a definite connection.

Robert Kennedy, he would have us believe, was shot and killed in the middle of a speech in a Los Angeles hotel after winning the California primary in 1968. Kennedy was shot after the speech as he walked through a passageway near the hotel's kitchen; he didn't die until the next day.

"We knew the Warren Commission was fiction," says Donald Sutherland, who portrays Mr. X, a former Pentagon official. "The organizing principle of any society is war. If Kennedy withdrew the United States from Vietnam, then industrial America loses." The Kennedy assassination, he says, was a "coup d'etat."

Stone's theory of this coup becomes a tangle of deceit that also involves the Mafia, Cuba, the Dallas police department, the press, Lyndon Johnson and the Warren Commission. "JFK" revolves around the acquitted trial of Clay Shaw — who was celebrated — and Garrison's obsessive dedication to proving a Kennedy conspiracy. Garrison himself puts in a cameo as Earl Warren.

Unfortunately, Costner is not very compelling in the film's key role. As the driven DA, he simply isn't forceful enough to maintain the movie's focus. Even his tearful — and far too long — summation to the jury at the end of the movie falls flat.

Sissy Spacek is sorely underused as the supportive and frustrated DA's wife. Indeed, much of the footage of Garrison at home with his family serves only to make the man human, but does little to advance the story. Stone could lose these scenes and shave a good 30 minutes from the film.

Gregory Oldman, who stunned audiences with his terrific performance in "State of Grace," does very well as Oswald, and Jones is a slimy game as Shaw. Joe Pesci, bizarre in wig and painted eyebrows, gives an interesting study of David Ferrie, who figures in Garrison's Shaw conspiracy. John Candy draws some of the movie's laughs as the bombastic hipster Dean Andrews.

Though Robert Richardson's camera work is often effective, John Williams' music is often intrusive.

At more than three hours, Stone's "JFK" is an indulgence. The Warren Commission release could be trimmed, but then what would that do to the conspiracy?

It's like watching a TV set-gone berserk.

**MY GIRL (PG)** Kid weepie-starring spunky, mopey newcomer Anna Chlumsky and a kinder, gentler Macaulay Culkin. It's supposed to portray the grief and helplessness children experience at the loss of a loved one, but it's too twinky and conventional to hit home. Dan Aykroyd and Jamie Lee Curtis provide adult support.

# Dealey Plaza: Spot of assassination its own little Mecca

DALLAS (AP) — Dealey Plaza is much the same today as it was 23 years ago, but the events that happened there changed the rest of us in ways we'll never know.

Visitors trek to this spot on the west end of downtown as if to a shrine. You can see them every day: pointing, looking, wondering.

There's the window. Look, "the grassy knoll." Here, could this chip in the curb be from that day?

Here is where John Fitzgerald Kennedy — and innocent bystanders — "You don't know what really happened," said Arlene Eppinger, standing in the plaza. Eppinger, from Walnut Creek, Calif., was visiting friends in a Dallas suburb and a trip to Dealey Plaza was a must.

"Everyone who comes here, I want to show it to 'em," said her guide, John Sitterma. Dallas also changed that day.

"It shocked the city into growing up. It may have begun a new era of maturity," says Pierce Allman, at the time director of programming and production at WFAA-TV and one of the first to report the shooting.

"It wasn't just a shock felt in Dallas, it was felt regionwide and nationwide," Allman says.

"It was when that fragile tissue of civility that barely holds us together was rudely shattered and it was so real to a lot of people because of radio and television."

There are many theories on who killed Kennedy on Nov. 22, 1963. The official version is that Lee Harvey Os-

wald, acting alone, fired the fatal shots from the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository on the north side of Dealey Plaza.

But there are many skeptics, including director Oliver Stone whose upcoming movie, "JFK," The Warner Bros. release stars Kevin Costner as Jim Garrison, Oswald's old man Lee Harvey Oswald and "Oldman" Lee Jones as Clay Shaw.

Much of the movie was filmed in Dallas. Dealey Plaza, still a key entry point into downtown, was blocked for several days last summer while the assassination was re-created. One newspaper columnist suggested it was a sign of maturity that many in the city were more concerned about traffic problems than Dallas' image.

Kennedy, the youngest man ever elected president, appeared triumphant in his trip through downtown Dallas that day. Cheering crowds lined the streets; a large luncheon crowd awaited at the Dallas Center.

Nellie Connally, Gov. John Connally's wife, had just remarked on how friendly the reception was — maybe the president had forgotten about the newspaper ads that accused him of treason.

The 21-foot-long 1961 Lincoln Continental turned right from Main Street onto Houston Street, and then a quick left onto Elm, right in front of the book depository.

Suddenly, shots were fired. "Just as they turned (onto Elm), I heard the first explosion," says Allman, who is now a public relations consultant.

"That's still the descriptive term. It was a thin, brittle sharp sound. It hit me I was still wondering what was going on, a second and then a third."

In his first radio report, given from inside the book depository, Allman described it as "three loud, reverberating explosions." The Warren Commission concluded

that Oswald fired three shots from the book depository, and Allman says he saw people on the lower floors look up.

But many critics claim the fatal shots came from what is now known as the grassy knoll, a small rise down the street from the corner.

Allman believes the assassination "was a wound that has healed." But, he says, "it was kind of puzzling to me why Dallas bore such a stigma when Los Angeles didn't for the death of Robert Kennedy and Memphis for Martin Luther King."

Perhaps it puzzles Allman, but to others, the 1968 murders of Robert Kennedy and King were just more proof that the insanity unleashed in Dealey Plaza was still loose.

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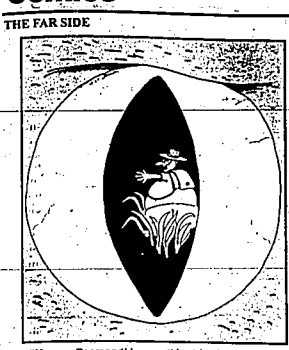
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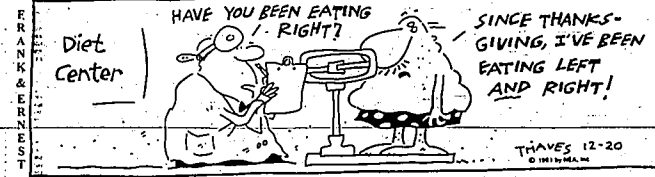
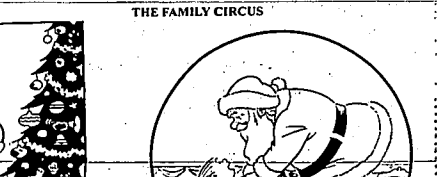
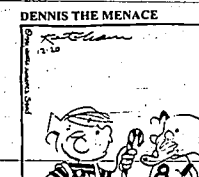
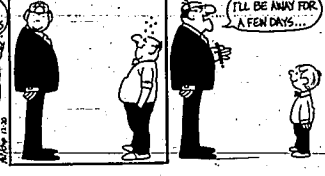
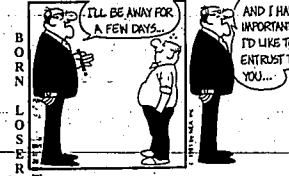
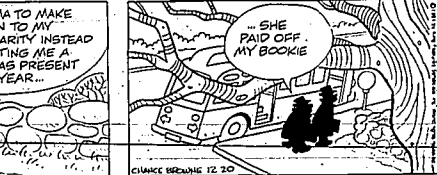
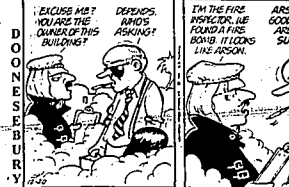
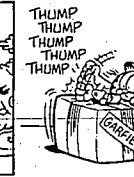
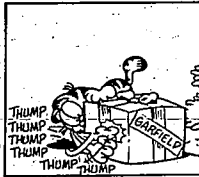

GM cutbacks may signal change for corporations

General Motors set off big signal flares Wednesday when it announced a massive retrenchment that will reduce its workforce by 71,000 employees in the United States and Canada over the next four years.

In the immediate future, economists and employment experts said, it signaled that the economic downturn could deepen and extend worldwide. "Companies in Germany and Japan and everywhere will see GM's cutback and realize that they have to cut back themselves," said Lester Korn, founder of Korn Ferry International, an executive placement company.

"It signals a double-dip recession," warned David Lewin, head of the University of California, Los Angeles Institute of Industrial Relations. "So many companies realize they must go further in their cutbacks."

A sense of profound change characterized many reactions to GM's announcement, which said the company would close 21 plants and reduce office and managerial staff by 20,000.

"It marks the end of the era when the paycheck-based middle-class could count on stable, long-term employment and rising income with a minor exception," said Dan Lacey, a Cleveland-based consultant who publishes "Workplace Trends," a newsletter.

GM's cutback came against a backdrop of announcements from scores of major corporations in recent weeks. In the past few weeks, Xerox, TRW, Tenneco, McDonnell Douglas and state governments around the nation are reducing staff.

Most of those job cuts are permanent — jobs are being eliminated and employees terminated, not merely laid off pending an upturn in business. "It is one reason, said analysts, that interest rate cuts have not reduced the economy and cut-price sales have not spurred Christmas shopping.

Still to be faced are layoffs and cutbacks by all the smaller companies that depend on GM and IBM for business — suppliers and dealers, metals and plastics producers, advertising agencies and media companies.

"We're in for a rough six months,"

said Korn, who sees the economy recovering by next summer. Nonetheless, he notes a ray of hope: "The entrepreneurial spirit of America will produce a host of cottage industries that in time will make us more productive."

Even though thousands of factory workers will lose their jobs, the GM cutback is seen as part of what is called the "white collar" recession because jobs are being eliminated in service industries and among office staff. The banking industry, for example, has lost 25,000 jobs in the last year, 300,000 jobs since 1984, with more cutbacks to come as banks merge and consolidate.

Most analysts see GM's cutback as confirmation that the American standard of living is declining as the United States comes to terms with a changing world. But that did not mean Americans were slipping behind other countries — only coming back to their level.

Germany, for example, may retain lifetime employment in large corporations, but it also supports large numbers of young jobless workers with a social welfare system financed by high income taxes on those who do work.

Japan rigorously stratifies its society and its workforce. For example, Toyota employs fewer than 100,000 workers, compared to more than three times that number for GM. But that is because the workers who make essential parts for Toyota cars are employed by supplier companies that pay lower wages and benefits than the Toyota parent company. GM by contrast must pay higher United Auto Workers scale to more than 300,000 production workers. That is one reason the U.S. company has to cut back.

What lies ahead for the U.S. economy is a Toyota-like pattern of

smaller feeder companies. "When the economy turns up again, it will be peripheral firms doing increasing business," said Lewin. That means big companies will use outside contract suppliers for services such as accounting, security, travel, even research, rather than have corporate departments.

Experts also say there will more contingent work, based on temporary contracts and agreements, continuing

a trend that has been growing for a decade. By some estimates, one-third of the U.S. workforce are now contingent workers — as opposed to permanent company staff — as was the general rule for decades after World War II.

That trend promises some unpleasant realities. "It will have to be faced that salaries can't keep going up in this economy," said Korn. Smaller companies frequently pay

less than larger companies, and almost always offer less generous health and pension plans. The fact that corporate health plans are threatened is one reason demand for national health insurance is rising as a political issue, said analysts.

But the advantage of small companies, analysts said, is that they may help America's productive edge. Many experts Wednesday saw GM's cutback as tolling the final bell on a time of complacency in U.S. business. From here on the world's largest automobile maker would find renewal, as it did in the last decade in

Europe where GM successfully restructured its lagging operations. And by extension, analysts suggested also, that the U.S. economy would emerge, improved once it had worked off the excesses of the 1980s, when corporations, consumers and the government itself expended on much borrowed money.

The timing of that emergence from recession was put "at about next June" by several experts. Meanwhile, it will be less festive holiday period for many at GM and for employees of other U.S. businesses who could read the signals in GM's announcement.

1981 — GM consolidates truck, bus and van operations; GM and Suzuki Motor Co. Ltd. of Japan form joint venture. Worldwide employment at 741,000. Company earns \$333.4 million on \$62.7 billion in revenue.

1983 — GM and Toyota Motor Corp. of Japan form joint venture to build cars in Fremont, Calif. Smith announces Saturn project to build new car to fight growth of Japanese cars in U.S. market.

GM makes \$3.7 billion as employment shrinks to 691,000.

1984 — GM overhauls North American organi-

zation; acquires Electronic Data Systems Corp. owned by billionaire H. Ross Perot, for \$2.5 billion. Earnings rise to \$4.5 billion on revenue of \$84.9 billion.

1985 — Company forms Saturn Corp. subsidiary. GM acquires Hughes Aircraft Co. for \$5 billion; Perot objects to acquisition. Company makes \$4 billion.

Dec. 18 — Stempel announces GM will close 21 plants over the next few years and eliminate 9,000 salaried and 15,000 hourly jobs in 1992 through retirement and attrition, in addition to layoffs at shuttered plants.

Accumulation of too much 'stuff' delays economic recovery

NEW YORK — After one of the longest economic expansions ever during the 1980s, Americans are now slowing through the longest economic downturn since the Great Depression.

The current recession, the ninth since World War II, probably has another distinction too: It is probably the least understood of all the recessions, not just by the public but by "experts" too.

The questions are asked not just by ordinary Americans, but by Congress, the Federal Reserve and the White House. Statistically, they say, this isn't the worst recession, so why is it perceived to be?

Here are clues from some folks who have attempted to penetrate the mystery.

Economist William Dunkelberg, dean of Temple University's school of business and management, in testimony prepared this week for the House Ways and Means Committee said:

"In simple terms, we accumulated too much 'stuff.' Most consumers could go for years without buying a new car, and still not substantially compromise their standard of living.

"Until this stuff depreciates or becomes utilized, there is little economic incentive to create more of it. Viewed another way, the cash flow from economic return building yet another office building is virtually zero.

"No one will rent it, lease it, buy it or even look at it. Even with low interest rates, there is no justification to undertake the projects. Economically, the typical general economy has new gross national product and jobs.

"The present value of zero cash flow is zero regardless of how low interest rates are."

In other sessions, Dunkelberg observed the excesses leading to downturns might have been in business inventories. "This time, the excess assets are of a longer-lived nature."

Lacy H. Hunt, chief economist of Carroll McGinnis & McCreary, a securities firm, in a commentary prepared for clients, said overborrowing may be the greatest of the country's problems.

An analysis of the ratio of total

debt of all components of the U.S. economy relative to gross national product from 1920 to the present suggests that debt levels in this country are extremely unwieldy," he said.

"Over the first half of 1991, debt was almost two and a half times greater than gross national product, and almost 50 percent higher than the long-term average. The only time the ratio was greater was in the 1930s.

"For individuals and businesses, when debt rises repeatedly relative to income, defaults should move higher, and they have. The huge size of these failures... is the hidden impediment to future economic performance."

He says debts — government, business and consumer — present a tremendous obstacle to every financial institution, business and household.

Consumer debt, which over the long term has averaged under 75 percent of disposable income, rose last year to 94 percent. And in the corporate sector, he points out, total debt in the first half of 1991 rose to 20.8 times greater than operating after-tax profits.

And the Tax Foundation, a not-for-profit research organization, in its newsletter, "Tax Topics," says the typical family's federal income tax bill has risen 60 percent since 1980. That comes in spite of major tax rate reductions in 1981 and 1986, leaving purchasing power with anemic gains — or losses.

In that time, it says, inflation and higher federal taxes have taken nearly 90 percent of pay increases achieved by the typical family. It estimates the federal state-local tax take 37.9 percent of the average family's income.

In short, these commentaries tend, to say, Americans and their institutions are buried in debt, taxes and suffering — and that the signs of overdifficulties is recession, perhaps deeper than shown by the usual indicators.

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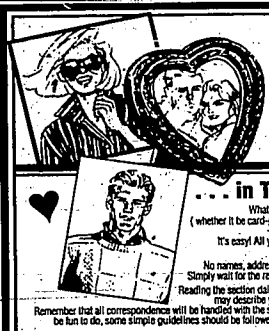

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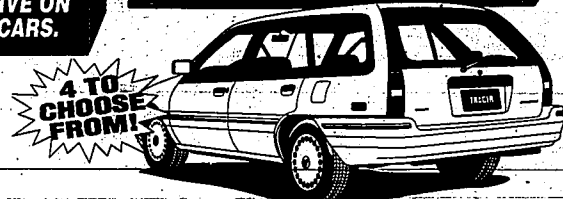
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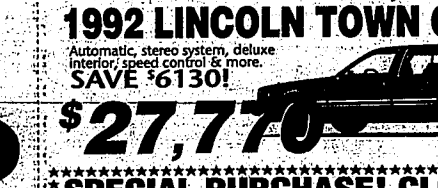

**THE ACES ON BRIDGE** BOBBY WOLFF

The weak jump overall is a relatively modern tool designed to allow the smooth flow of an opposing bidding sequence. While often successful, it can have liabilities. Sometimes it tells declarer how to play the hand.

Routine play will not land today's game. If South wins dummy's club ace and cashes two high trumps, he's headed for a certain set. If he pays heed to West's pre-empt, he will play East for the trump queen and finesse. However, he will still lose the game unless he's very careful.

Suppose he wins dummy's club ace, cashes the trump king and wins a trump finesse. When he concedes a club to West? West leads a third club for East to overruff, and the declarer gets four tricks.

The winning play is to refrain from cashing dummy's trump king, taking the first-round finesse instead. It wins, and South leads a low club to West's eight. If West tries to give East a "trif" in clubs, dummy ruffs with the king and a second trump finesse allows South to draw the trumps. South holds his losses to only one spade, a diamond and a club, and thanks to West's illuminating interference bid, South brings home his precarious game.

# 'L.A. Law' bounds back from last season's losses with hot newcomers

By Bob Remington

As in the world of sports, TV shows that are around long enough must eventually go through what is politely referred to as a "rebuilding" year.

This is such a season for "L.A. Law," airing Thursdays on NBC. To use the sports analogy, this year's show boasts a "new look" team in which a core of seasoned veterans (Harry Hamlin, Michele Greene and Jimmy Smits) has been replaced with up-and-coming actors (Amanda Donohoe, John Spencer and Cecil Hoffman). Also brought on are a batch of rookies (Conchata Ferrell, Michael Cumpsty and Tommy Verica) to develop for the future.

Like any team in transition, it probably isn't going to win the World Series. But with a strong foundation of great characters, strong writing and loyal fans, the franchise is still in good shape.

"People come and go," says Spencer, who is in his second season as lawyer Tommy Mullaney. "I don't think 'L.A. Law' has stars. I think the program is the star and the writing is the star. I think the strength of the show is that people can move in and out, and the show can remain a whole."

Moving out last year were Hamlin, Greene and Smits, who played out their options, as it were, and did not return.

That left regulars Arnie Becker (Corbin Bernsen), married lawyers Ann Kelsey and Stuart Markowitz (Jill Eikenberry and Michael Tucker), office manager Roxanne Melman (Susan Ruttan), former prosecutor Grace Van Owen (Susan Dey) and head honchos Leland McKenzie (Richard Dysart) and Douglas Brackman Jr. (Alan Rachins) to carry the ball. Ready to

fill the vacant spots were returnees Donohoe, whose bisexual character C.J. Lamb was involved in a widely publicized kiss with Greene's character. Also stepping in were Spencer's Mullaney and Hoffmann's deputy district attorney character, Zoey Clemmons.

This year's rookies include Ferrell as entertainment lawyer Susan Bloom, Cumpsty as "killer litigator" Frank Kittredge and Verica as eager young lawyer Billy Castroverri.

The changes have made a kinder, gentler show of "L.A. Law," where things are less fractious this year at McKenzie Brackman than they were in last year's back-stabbing season.

"We got some letters wishing that people in the law firm would be nicer to each other," says co-producer Patricia Green. "I think we can accommodate that. There was strife in the office last year. I think things

will run a little smoother now."

Also somewhat toned down is the sexuality of Donohoe's character. Although still bisexual, C.J. hasn't generated the controversy of last year.

"It hasn't been dropped," Donohoe says of C.J.'s sexuality. "It's an ongoing situation. There are other things we want to explore about C.J."

Of the celebrated kiss between C.J. and Abby, Donohoe says, "I think they handled it very well. There was no salaciousness there, it was just about two human beings interacting. It was a very human condition rather than anything else. And I really admired their courage in doing it. I think the more accessible and the less threatening we can make the idea of gay and lesbian people in society, the better it will be for all of us."

## CNN nets \$3.5 million for campaign coverage

NEW YORK (AP) — Ted Turner's Cable News Network will get a \$3.5 million fee from a non-profit foundation to help pay for coverage of the 1992 presidential election.

The unusual payment isn't a donation but a "contractual arrangement for providing agreed-upon services," Lloyd N. Morrisett, president of the John and Mary R. Markle Foundation, said Monday.

The "services" are more extensive and new kinds of election coverage, he said. The New York City-based foundation won't make money on the arrangement, Morrisett said.

Coverage made possible with the foundation money will include "Democracy in America" programs on CNN and Turner's other all-news cable network, Headline News.

A subsidiary of Turner's cable

empire will provide the shows and curriculum materials free to schools, CNN said.

The \$3.5 million was first reported Monday by The Wall Street

Journal and comes several months after the foundation withdrew a planned \$5 million donation to the Public Broadcasting Service for election coverage. The foundation changed its mind after what Morrisett called "disagreement on the scope of the project ... among people of good will."

PBS cut back its coverage plans and said it will team with NBC News to cover the Republican and Democratic conventions next summer.

# Rivals eye NBC's Thursday line up

**HOLLYWOOD** — The cat-and-mouse game of mid-season changes at the TV networks took some surprising turns late this week in new attempts to weaken "The Cosby Show" and "Cheers."

In a flurry of moves to fine-tune their schedules in the new year, CBS disclosed plans for a one-hour news series, "Street Stories," and ABC said that it would present two-hour "Columbo" reruns — with both of the mid-season challengers taking on NBC's Bill Cosby-led Thursday lineup.

Fox's "The Simpsons" and "Beverly Hills, 90210" already have made their presence felt against NBC's cornerstone Thursday schedule. But the NBC lineup — which also includes "A Different World," "Wings" and "L.A. Law" — is still a potent ratings force.

"Street Stories," a spinoff of CBS News' "48 Hours" — with Ed Bradley of "60 Minutes" as host — will debut Jan. 9, said a top CBS executive, Peter Tortorici.

As a two-hour season premiere of "48 Hours" on Sept. 11, "Street Stories" was a ratings hit with its

collection of urban vignettes.

ABC's "Columbo" repeats will also begin to run weekly on Jan. 9. The Peter Falk police show continues to turn out occasional new episodes — with its season premiere scheduled for Sunday — and the venerable series has been a solid ratings-getter since its revival in 1989.

"Street Stories," which will go head-on against "Cheers" and "Wings," is a tryout that — like other CBS series — will give way to the network's coverage of the Winter Olympics from Albertville, France, during the February ratings sweeps.

But while "Street Stories" may seem like a stopgap measure to help tide CBS over until the Olympics start, it could have a future if it fares well.

"We thought it was a terrific show on '48 Hours,'" said Tortorici, executive vice president of CBS Entertainment.

For CBS, the scheduling of "Street Stories" bumps the much-knocked-around series "The Trials of Rosie O'Neill" out of the lineup again — although the network promises it will return sometime after the Olympics.

"Rosie," which stars Sharon Gless

as a public defender, would have gone up against the second hour of "Columbo," and Tortorici says, "We didn't think that was good."

At the moment, therefore, "The Trials of Rosie O'Neill" has one of the top casts in TV — with Gless, Ed Asner, Dorian Harewood, Ron Rifkin and new addition Robert Wagner — and no place to go. "Columbo," of course, is more likely to draw the older audience. It is replacing the James Earl Jones-Richard Crenna series "Pros & Cons" — which failed and will be run out later — and two new reality shows, "FBI: The Untold Stories" and "American Detective," which move to Mondays on Jan. 6.

"FBI: The Untold Stories" and "American Detective" haven't delivered much in the ratings, either, but like "Street Stories," they are cheaper to produce than entertainment series — an important factor for the financially pressed networks these days.

Even the successful but expensive "MacGyver" series — which reportedly costs about \$1.5 million an episode — is calling it a day.

It will leave ABC after its Dec. 30 outing and then return for its finale on Feb. 3.
