Ministers fretting over Red Army

MOSCOW — Facing a restless army that no longer has a country to fight for, the defense ministers of the former Soviet republics met Thursday to consider reorganizing or dismantling the powerful Soviet military.

A day after Mikhail S. Gorbachev's resignation as Soviet president, the transition from the highly centralized Soviet state to a loose commonwealth of sovereign nations was moving quickly, despite economic friction between the republics and the sticky question of the military.

Inside the Kremlin, a few diehard lawmakers dissolved the Soviet legislature, whose speaker told them in a farewell: "Until we meet again, wherever that may be."

Gorbachev told reporters at a goodbye party that he was going on vacation for two weeks in the Moscow area, but declined to

Bush wants to meet with Yeltsin

WASHINGTON — President Bush said Thursday he'll "stay in very, very close" touch with Russian President Boris Yeltsin and proposed an early summit to discuss the fate of nuclear weapons and other pressing issues.

Bush also suggested at a White House news conference that future arms-control agreements might be easier — not harder — to reach with the independent republics than they had

been with the old Kremlin leadership.

"We don't have the concept on their part of viewing the United States as an enemy, as happened over all the years of the Cold War," Bush said a day after the Soviet Union passed into history with the resignation of President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Bush said he is satisfied with assurances he has received from Yeltsin — who now has control over the some 27,000 nuclear warheads that formerly

talk about what he would do next. He flatly ruled out becoming an opposition leader. Disputes among commonwealth leaders were already surfacing, particularly in regard to economic policy.

Yeltsin, the Russian Federation president who is clearly first among equals in the new commonwealth, on Thursday appointed former Gorbachev adviser Yevgeny Primakov to head Russia's

foreign intelligence agency.

The sprawling Russian republic, with 147 million people, is inheriting the bulk of the Soviet Union's central government, including its foreign ministry, intelligence network and military-industrial complex.

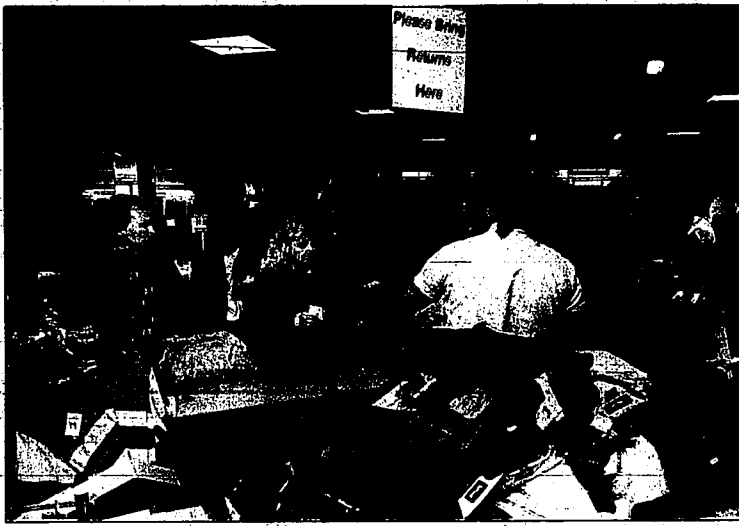
The top item on the agenda of the new Commonwealth of Independent States is how to share, or divide, the 3.7 million troops and huge arsenal of the former Soviet armed forces.

Defense chiefs and parliamentary representatives of all 11 republics in the new commonwealth met behind closed doors Thursday at the former Soviet Defense Ministry.

A spokesman, Col. Ivan Skryinik, said they were considering "problems of mutual defense" and drafting proposals for consideration by the presidents of the republics at a meeting Dec. 30 in Minsk, the Belarussian capital.

No other details of the talks were available.

Recession didn't scare Christmas business away, retailers report

TWIN FALLS — All things considered, this year's holiday shoppers were good to southern Idaho retailers.

Those shoppers shrugged off national economic problems and continued to spend money in a local economy that continues to be strong.

Twin Falls merchants interviewed Thursday said that spending was up or at least as strong as 1990's booming times. "From all indications, we did break last year's figures," Magic Valley Mall

Manager Don Chandler said. "And last year was an incredible year, so to meet or beat those figures is satisfying."

Chandler estimated the mall's holiday sales were up 5 percent from last year.

Some area retailers said they entered the season expecting holiday spending to be down from last year, given worries over the national economy. They left it satisfied.

"A lot of them were pleasantly surprised they did as well as they did," said Betsy Florence, manager of Twin Falls' Downtown Business Improvement District.

Chandler said that mall shoppers did have sporadic buying patterns and kept retailers guessing.

"We expected a real rush the first week after Thanksgiving because we had fewer shopping days between Thanksgiving and Christmas," Chandler said. "But that didn't happen. It came the last two weeks before Christmas."

Reports were much the same in Boise, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

The manager of Idaho's biggest shopping center, the Boise Towne Square Mall, said several merchants reported a

War, breakup top '91 events

The enormous bang that began 1991 — the rout of Saddam Hussein's Iraq by a U.S.-led international force — was the year's top news story, according to an Associated-Press poll of news editors and broadcast news directors.

And the whimper that ended 1991 — the swift collapse of the empire of cards that was the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics — was runner-up. The Senate confirmation of U.S. Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas was third, followed by the release of American hostages in Lebanon, the recession and the end of the Cold War; according to the 153 news executives who voted.

The rest, in order, were AIDS; the arrest of an unemployed Milwaukee factory worker in the mutilation deaths of 17 young men, the Middle East peace talks, and the video-taped beating of a motorist by Los Angeles police.

From the top:

1. The buildup that followed Saddam's invasion of Kuwait was the top story of 1990; the subsequent Mother of All Battles was the headline story of 1991.

deadline for Iraq's withdrawal from Kuwait, the United States and its allies unleashed more than five weeks of air strikes. On Feb. 24, the ground war began.

Fears that U.S. forces would be trapped in the desert sands; choked by poison gas, were never realized. Instead, America's superior troops and firepower unleashed a punishing offensive that ended Feb. 27 with Saddam's army in tatters. The toll—148 American lives—upwards-of-100,000 Iraqis.

There were yellow-ribbon-festooned victory parades for the returning heroes, but there was unease. Nearly a quarter of American combat deaths were caused by friendly fire. Saddam remained in power, Kurdish refugees in terror, and the full extent of Iraq's remaining nuclear capability in doubt.

2. On Jan. 1, 1991, the Soviet Union was a troubled colossus, beset by economic and ethnic problems but still a superpower. On Jan. 1, 1992, the Soviet Union will not exist.

In the blink of history's eye, the 74-year Soviet experiment was swept away by the gang that couldn't putch straight — a conspiracy of

Andrus says Colorado utility move 'logical'

BOISE — Citing "the latest legal letdown" in efforts to stop waste to Idaho, Public Service Co. of Colorado has decided to start moving spent nuclear fuel from its Fort St. Vrain reactor into an on-site temporary storage facility.

Gov. Cecil Andrus welcomed Thursday's announcement from the Colorado utility he has been battling over shipment of high-level radioactive waste to the U.S. Department of Energy's Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But A. Clegg Crawford, vice president of nuclear operations for Public Service, said in a news

release that it was a disappointing — if not a surprise — decision.

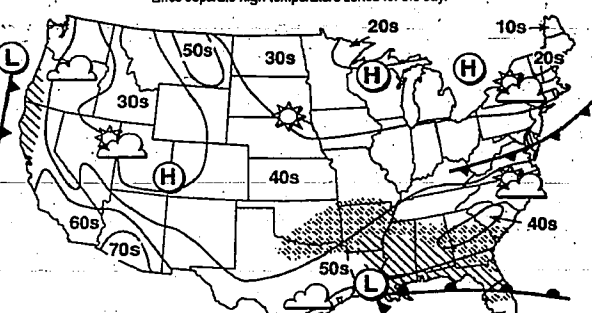
He said it costs the utility about \$2.5 million a month to maintain plant systems and personnel while the spent-fuel rods remain in the mothballed reactor near, Platteville, Colo., north of Denver. Public Service contends its 1965 contract with the Energy Department calls for shipment of spent fuel to the INEL.

"This is the logical move to make and it's really the move that should have been made months ago," Andrus said. "The waste was generated there. The people of Colorado got the benefit of the electricity that was generated by the use of this fuel."

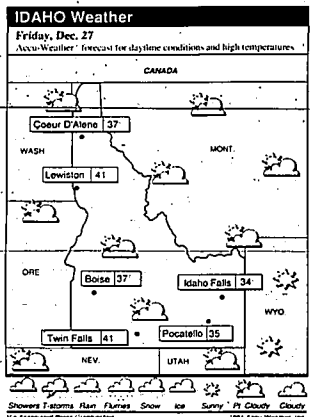

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says high pressure remained in place over the Great State on Thursday, resulting in another foggy, smoky day for a few valleys, mainly southeast.

Sunny skies were present elsewhere around Idaho. The sunnier spots were also a little breezy Thursday, which helped to clear out the pollutants near the surface.

While the stagnant air situation is easing a bit each day, a Pacific cold front near the West Coast was expected to push inland this weekend, which could effectively scour out the remaining foul air and bring a little rain or snow as well.

Temperatures statewide Thursday afternoon ranged from the teens into the 20s at the foggy locations and in the 30s to 40s for the rest of Idaho. At mid-elevation, Boise had 37 degrees, Coeur d'Alene 35, Lewiston 44, Mountain Home Air Force Base 44, Twin Falls 39 and Pocatello 33. The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 49 degrees at Hagerman. Sunley reported the coldest at 11 degrees below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 82 degrees at Fort Myers, Fla. The lowest was 17 degrees below zero at Houlton, Maine.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours ending at 1 p.m. EST included 3 inches at West Palm Beach, Fla., and more than an inch at Houston. Snowfall during the same period included 4 inches at Amarillo and Daltart in Texas.

The low temperature for the Lower 48 states was 17 below zero at Houlton, Maine.

Rain, snow increase flood danger across Texas

Rain and snow fell in Texas on Thursday, increasing the threat of flooding along rivers and creeks already swollen by days of heavy rain.

Flooding has killed at least 15 people, covered farmland, drowned livestock and caused millions of dollars in damage since last week.

Heavy rain was reported in Houston and more than 2 inches of snow fell near El Paso, Texas.

The Brazos and Little Brazos rivers were more than 4 miles wide in a rural area near Bryan, Texas, about 70 miles northwest of Houston. The Brazos was at its highest level since 1957 when it was installed upstream, the National Weather Service said.

Record flooding also was reported on the lower reaches

string-of-record-breaking days of sales in the final week of the Christmas season.

Bob Mitchell estimated 50,000 people visited the mall Monday and the crowds hit a peak on Saturday with 75,000 people.

"It's been a good season for us, without question," Mitchell told The Associated Press. "Boise has a strong economy and we're not seeing problems like in other areas."

"If there is a recession in Pocatello, I haven't seen it out here in our store," Bon Marche store manager Steve Higginson told the AP Thursday. "I had a great year, much better than last year."

"I think the people in this area have won," said Cliff Brady, owner of Brady's in Idaho Falls. "They refuse to participate in the recession."

Brady said sales at his home appliance store are up 28 percent this year. He attributed the increase to strong farm prices in 1990.

"You hear all the commotion about the recession, but things are going fine right here," said Mike Doyle, manager of a PayLess Drug store in Idaho Falls. "I think the spud crop was good and everybody wants to have a merry Christmas."

In downtown Twin Falls, two merchants had varying reports.

Roper Clothing Co. manager Dennis Blevins said sales, especially in December, were "a bit finitely" higher than last year. Monday was the busiest day ever for the Roper's stores in both Twin Falls and Burley, according to John Roper, retired board chairman.

"A few steps down Main Avenue, Kathy Harris of the clothing store that bears her name said she sold less than last year, when the Paris Co. closed its doors.

"We had such a super year last year," Harris said. "But her sales were better than in the years before 1990," she said, as cautious consumers picked their way through the store.

"They were watching the amounts they were spending pretty carefully," Harris said.

Shoppers were also price-conscious in downtown Boise.

Wire service spelling reflects Soviet changes

As a result of government and name changes in the former Soviet Union, The Associated Press has changed its spelling for some of the former Soviet republics and its style for datelines from those republics.

The AP no longer uses "U.S.S.R." in datelines, but the name of the individual republic. A story from the Far East port of Vladivostok, for instance, which used to begin "VLADIVOSTOK, U.S.S.R.," would now begin "VLADIVOSTOK, Russia."

"MOSCOW" continues to stand alone in datelines.

The AP is not using "Commonwealth of Independent States" in datelines because its member republics have described it as a loose commonwealth of sovereign states similar to the British Commonwealth or the European Community, not as a superstate that stands above it.

extended diplomatic recognition to Russia and to five other independent republics in a remarkable Christmas Day address from the Oval Office in which he also cited a "potential for instability and chaos."

Asked about that concern on Thursday, Bush said he was worried about "economic deprivation," and "consumer woes out there," in the rocky shift to a market economy. He cited reports of oil shortages in the Baltic states as well.

"I am not predicting disaster. I am just saying we have got to be alert to the pressures that are going to be brought to bear on the republics," Bush said.

He promised to "stay involved" with the new republics and to try to

Bush says he can't understand deep recession blues

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush expressed consistent Thursday about the public's deep anxieties over the economy. He said confidence is far lower than it was in the last recession when conditions were "a heck of a lot worse."

At a news conference, the president also defended his decision to take no action on his forthcoming trip to Japan and three other Asian nations. He is to be accompanied by the chief executives of the Big Three automakers and 18 other corporate leaders.

"We've got some ideas that I think will be stimulative," he said, but at the same time he wanted to "find the answers that will really help the economy without doing long-run damage."

Recession makes mark on colleges

WASHINGTON (AP) - College enrollment is rising in most states, but less expected concern about the nation's colleges are doing better than four-year schools, the American Council on Education reported Thursday.

ported the number of high school graduates had declined. Rich Novak, director of the Center for Higher Education Policy and Finance at the American Association of State Universities and Colleges, said, "All indications are that we will have substantial growth in the college age population by 1996."

The survey by the council covered private and public institutions in 15 states that the council said constitute more than 40 percent of the nation's enrollment and can be taken as a general indicator of national trends.

Meanwhile, some states have imposed enrollment caps for budgetary and other reasons. Minnesota, for example, tightened entrance requirements and limited the enrollment of undergraduates at the University of Minnesota.

Total enrollment this fall rose in 12 states and dropped in three: Connecticut, Minnesota and New York.

Periods of economic distress usually see rapid increases in two-year college enrollment, said Bill Reinhard, a spokesman for the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges.

The recession was having an impact, the council said, as half the nation's colleges and universities and two-thirds of public four-year institutions suffered midyear cuts in their 1990-1991 operating budgets and this trend has continued into the current fiscal year.

Community college enrollment increased in 14 of the 15 states surveyed, with only Connecticut recording a decline. The increases generally ranged from 3 percent to 6 percent, Louisiana posted a 21 percent gain.

Christmas mail back to normal with late surge

WASHINGTON (AP) - A surge of last-minute cards and letters brought the volume of this year's Christmas mail back to normal, the U.S. Postal Service said Thursday.

Until last weekend, postal officials had expected this year's volume of Christmas mail - typically more than 3 billion cards and letters sent over a nearly six-week period - to be unusually low this year.

"We had been down for 23 days compared to last year, but then it really surged," said U.S. Postal Service spokesman Leo Feyerherd.

The Postal Service reported handling 417 million letters and cards from last Friday until Christmas Eve. More than twice as much Christmas mail was handled Monday than the same Monday a year ago, officials said.

Before the final deluge, which began Friday, the volume of Christmas mail was about 10 percent less than the same time a year ago, officials said.

The Postal Service estimated that about 3.4 billion cards and letters were sent during the official Christmas mailing period that began Nov. 16. In recent years, the volume has fluctuated between 3.2 billion and 3.3 billion pieces.

Presidential contenders to divide funds

WASHINGTON - Eight 1992 presidential contenders will divide nearly \$6.4 million in federal matching funds - the first distribution of the 1992 elections - with President Bush receiving the largest amount, the Federal Election Commission said Thursday.

The commission said the payments, to be made after Jan. 1 to the eight certified candidates, will total \$6,372,788. Additional payments will be made as the election progresses and candidates raise more money.

President Bush's re-election campaign will receive \$2,629,366. The Democratic candidates who will receive payments are: Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa, \$1,075,189; Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, \$579,364; Sen. Bob Kerrey of Nebraska, \$574,597; former Sen. Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts, \$456,535; former California Gov. Jerry Brown, \$234,926; Virginia Gov. Douglas Wilder, \$198,315.

In addition, independent candidate Lenora Fulani, who runs on the National Alliance Ticket, will receive \$624,497.

Toll-free number targets grave robbers

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. - A toll-free telephone number that takes reports of poaching and hunting violations in Arkansas has been expanded to include grave robbers.

A new state law bans pothunting, as it is called, in any unregistered graves, including those of Indians, Civil War casualties, pioneers and slaves.

It also prohibits the purchase and sale of items removed from such graves.

The Arkansas Historic Preservation Program and the state Game and Fish Commission announced the toll-free number this week, saying it will ensure swift notification.

Shipment to Haitian refugees delayed

NEW YORK - A shipment of clothing, toys and food that was originally intended to reach Haitian refugees by Christmas was delayed another 24 hours as organizers struggled Thursday to pick tons of donated goods.

"People who have provided these donations have simply delivered a Barbie doll in a paper bag or a glass jar of peanut butter, and we can't move them that way," said Walt Wheeler, a spokesman for the New York State National Guard.

The goods, collected in a drive by New York radio stations, were scheduled to arrive Saturday at the U.S. Navy base in Guantanamo, Cuba, temporary home for 7,000 refugees who fled Haiti after a military coup Sept. 30.

Group trades teddy bears for war toys

LOS ANGELES - A peace group announced Thursday it will once again trade teddy bears for war toys.

"War is not a game," said Jerry Rubin of the Alliance for Survival. "War toys are desensitizing children to the harsh realities of war." Since 1988, when the program began, the alliance has traded more than 3,000 teddy bears for war-related toys sent in by people across the country, Rubin said.

Country singer's son commits suicide

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - Billy Nelson, the son of country singer Willie Nelson, hanged himself with a cord in his home authorities said. He was 33.

A friend found the body Wednesday and Medical Examiner Dr. Charles Harlan ruled the death a suicide.

Willie Nelson was in Abbott, Texas, when told of his son's death, police said. A spokeswoman, Evelyn Shriver, said Thursday he "is very sad and trying to deal with it."

New law could hurt academy recruitment

AIR FORCE ACADEMY, Colo. (AP) - A new law that will require Air Force Academy graduates to compete for a regular commission with other officer training graduates is unfair and may hurt recruiting, some observers say.

Force reserve officers, instead of regular officers. The change is part of a new defense authorization bill signed Nov. 26 by President Bush.

The Senate Armed Services Committee proposed the change, tenting all new service-academy graduates should prove themselves first as active-duty reservists before receiving regular commissions. The change applies to graduates of the Air Force Academy, the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., and the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.

Beginning with the freshman class of 1993, academy graduates will be commissioned for one year as Air

Force reserve officers, instead of regular officers. The change is part of a new defense authorization bill signed Nov. 26 by President Bush.

After serving for a year as reservists, academy graduates will compete with Officer Training School and ROTC graduates for regular commissions.

Fighting stops in Georgian city

TBILISI, Georgia (AP) — Fighting halted Thursday between militants loyal to President Zviad Gamsakhurdia and opposition forces besieging the Parliament building, an official said. It was not known whether the two sides had agreed to a formal truce. More than 40 people have been reported killed and 260 wounded in five days of fighting in Tbilisi, Georgia's capital city. Earlier Thursday, gun battles raged and both sides were pressing for more weapons from the army, which so far has taken no part in the fighting. A fire also destroyed an apartment building near the Parliament. Later in the day, Nodar Alakhadze, a spokesman for the Georgian Mission in Moscow, said "the two sides have stopped shooting. Everything is headed toward stabilization." But he refused to say what he meant by "stabilization" and reported no formal cease-fire. The fighting pits Gamsakhurdia loyalists against the opposition, which demands he step down. The president has said that he is willing to

open a dialogue with his opponents, but claimed he has enough weapons to withstand the siege of the Parliament building, where he is holed up with about 1,000 loyal troops. At the burning apartment building next door, people struggled to save possessions, fleeing with furniture, household goods and even holiday decorations. One woman screamed, "Gamsakhurdia is Satan!" The Ministry of Health said Thursday the death toll in five days of fighting stood at 42. Telephone and telegraph communication to Georgia were working only sporadically, and the opposition continued to keep radio and television off the air. Gamsakhurdia has the strong support of the working class and of people outside Tbilisi, while the intellectuals tend to back the opposition. The power struggle has paralyzed Georgian politics throughout much of September and October. Gamsakhurdia won a landslide victory in May's presidential elections. Since then, his critics

have accused him of acting dictatorial, and his power base has eroded. Gamsakhurdia claims the opposition is guided by Russian and former Soviet officials in Moscow who are bent on stopping Georgia's independence. Besides the three Baltic states, which became independent earlier this year, Georgia was the only former Soviet republic that did not join the new Commonwealth of Independent States. Both sides say the fighting has nothing to do with the commonwealth formed over the weekend by 11 former Soviet republics. Although opposition fighters are determined to overthrow the president, they appear outnumbered, with only about 600 fighters visible in the city center from the units loyal to rebel commander Tengiz Kitovani. Gamsakhurdia has claimed to have up to 3,000 men scattered throughout the city of 1.5 million, in addition to those at the Parliament building. He claims to have 10,000 reservists.

Kidnappers call for release of 2 Shiites

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Kidnappers said Thursday that two German relief workers would be held until two Shiite Muslim brothers jailed on terrorism charges in Germany are released. The announcement came in a statement released by the Holy Warriors for Freedom, a pro-Islamic Shiite group, to a Western news agency in Beirut along with a videotape showing the two German captives. The group said the only solution to end the plight of Heinrich Strubeig and Thomas Kempfer, kidnapped together on May 16, 1989, is to release Mohammed Ali Hamadi and Abbas Hamadi. The tape, less than one minute long, was the first released by the captors showing Strubeig and Kempfer, appealing to the Bonn government to resolve their plight.

Chilean court frees 2 secret police chiefs

SANTIAGO, Chile — The Supreme Court on Thursday freed two secret police chiefs pending their trial for the 1976 killings in Washington of a former Chilean ambassador to the United States and his American aide. The court voted 4-1 to release Ret. Gen. Manuel Contreras and Brig. Gen. Pedro Espinoza on \$2.7M bail each. No trial date has been set for the top chiefs-of-the-secret-police under Gen. Augusto Pinochet, whose military government ran Chile from 1973 to 1990. Both officers were charged in September with killing Orlando Letelier and Romni Moffitt with a remote-control bomb as the couple drove through Sheridan Circle in downtown Washington on Sept. 21, 1976. Letelier had been a Cabinet member and envoy to Washington during the leftist government of President Salvador Allende, who died during the bloody 1973 coup led by Pinochet.

Small avalanche kills 2 students

TIMARU, New Zealand — Two Australian students were killed Thursday and one rescued when they were swept into a crevasse by a small avalanche on the South Pacific's highest mountain. Officials said the slide occurred only 50 yards from the area of a huge avalanche several weeks ago on Mount Cook. That slide extended four miles down to New Zealand's Tasman Glacier and lowered the 12,100-foot peak by several feet, the Conservation Department said. Police spokesman Senior Constable Bill Apes said the men, aged 20 and 21, were in a group of seven Australians climbing in Mount Cook National Park. They were on their way down the mountain when the avalanche swept three of them into the crevasse, burying them. One of the men was rescued by other skiers in the group, Apes said. A helicopter was used to recover the bodies.

Turkey vows to wipe out terrorism

ANKARA, Turkey — Turkey pledged on Thursday to wipe out Kurdish terrorism without trampling civil rights. But a firebomb attack blamed on separatists raised concern of more restrictions against the minority. A Kurdish leader based in Syria, meanwhile, denied ordering the attack Wednesday on an Istanbul clothing store but would not rule out similar attacks if Turkey doesn't halt military action against the Kurds. The attack on the store set off a blaze killing 11 people and injuring 17. It came a few hours after the announcement that Kurdish guerrillas had slain 10 soldiers at an army post in southeastern Turkey. The Turkish Kurds, under the banner of the outlawed Kurdish Labor Party, have been launching guerrilla strikes since 1984 to try to win a separate Marxist state in the region that borders Iran, Iraq and Syria. But until the attack on the store in Turkey's largest city, the violence had been largely in the distant southeast provinces.

Group sets loose research animals

PADUA, Italy — A group protesting experiments on animals broke into a research laboratory and set loose hundreds of mice, rabbits and hamsters, police said Thursday. The raid on Padua University's Institute for Experimental Surgery was claimed by Animalistic Counter-attack, the same group which said it freed 1,500 mink in October from Italy's largest mink farm, the Italian news agency ANSA said. After breaking into the university lab either late Wednesday night or early Thursday, the protesters left a sign affixed to the gate saying "It's not right to make animals suffer," police said.

Israeli army unit blows up house

JERUSALEM — An Israeli army unit blew up a house in southern Lebanon that allegedly served as a base for Arab guerrillas, the army announced Thursday. The house was near the village of Yattar, just north of Israel's self-declared "security zone" in south Lebanon, the army statement said, and Israeli army radio said no one was in the house when it was blown up overnight. Hundreds of villagers left the area after the explosion, fearing there would be further Israeli attacks, the radio said. The villagers returned before dawn Thursday, the report said. Israel and its militia allies have been trying to push Shiite Muslim guerrillas out of villages north of the security zone, blaming them for a rash of attacks on Israeli targets in recent months.

Spanish coal miners clash with police

OVIEDO, Spain — Coal miners barricaded roads and clashed with riot police. The unions and union leaders were hoted up in the shaft of a mine at the start of a two-day strike. The miners in the northern region of Asturias are pushing for new jobs to replace those being phased out in the pits. All but a few hundred of the 25,000 miners in the region heeded the strike call by 36 trade union leaders, union and government officials said. The union leaders began the fourth day of a lock-in deep inside a shaft of the state-owned Hunosa mine in the town of Mieres. Compiled from wire reports

Hard-line opposition turns focus on Yeltsin

MOSCOW (AP) — The Russian right, shifting its wrath from Mikhail S. Gorbachev to Boris Yeltsin, lashed out Thursday at the Russian president and labeled his economic reforms just "another grand experiment." Yeltsin's opponents were moving quickly after Gorbachev's resignation Wednesday. Communists in St. Petersburg, birthplace of the Bolshevik revolution, urged the Russian government to give them the Soviet flag that was removed from the Kremlin after Gorbachev quit. "We pledge to rehoist it over the Kremlin in the near future," the Russian Communist Workers' Party said in a statement. Though divided and somewhat distrusted, hard-liners and conservatives in Russia could be in a prime position to capitalize on the discontent expected to swell after prices soar on Jan. 2. Their support is hard to gauge. The right wing ranges from enigmatic hard-liners such as Vladimir Zhirinovskiy to the moderate Russian vice president Alexander Rutskoi, an ex-Communist reformer who sided with Yeltsin last summer. They are united by opposition to harsh market reforms. Yeltsin himself warned Wednesday that people who supported the failed August coup were hoping to ride a public backlash against his plan to liberalize prices, "which is extremely unpopular with the people." The right-wing forces might use popular dissent and resentment during this period. Therefore we have to be vigilant," Yeltsin told Russian lawmakers. Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze made a similar warning. Yeltsin long has been the target of hard-line attacks. But his critics have grown in recent days. Several thousand pro-Communist demonstrators staged a mock "hunger line" in Moscow on Sunday to denounce Yeltsin and the new Commonwealth of Independent States.

Yeltsin's reforms the same day in St. Petersburg. Yevgeny Kogan, founder of the once-powerful Soyuz bloc of hard-liners in the defunct Soviet Parliament, told The Associated Press on Thursday "it is unclear whether Yeltsin would be able to withstand the popular pressure after taking the unpopular decisions." Kogan said he doubted "Yeltsin will be able to play the role of the man who will re-unite the country split up by Gorbachev. In trying to remove Gorbachev, Yeltsin has driven too many wedges into the foundation of the state." A Russian Parliament commission said Thursday that conservatives are overestimating their numbers. It said that, for example, Zhirinovskiy's Liberal Democratic Party has only a fraction of its claimed 5,300 members. The newspaper Iavostik said Thursday that Zhirinovskiy's supporters fought with hecklers in Minsk after he told a rally to dump the commonwealth and become "a Russian province." Zhirinovskiy also reportedly was beaten. One of Yeltsin's biggest opponents may be Rutskoi. Yeltsin had picked the Afghan war veteran as vice president in June in a bid to tap Rutskoi's support in the military and among Communist reformers. "Now there is neither government nor democracy in Russia, and if there is anarchy in the country, this can lead to unpredictable consequences," Rutskoi said Thursday, the Interfax news agency reported.

North Korea promises to sign agreements

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North Korea promised Thursday to sign nuclear safeguards agreements that would be a first step toward allowing international inspections of its suspected nuclear facilities, South Korea said. South Korea has sought the dismantling of Communist North Korea's reprocessing facilities, which intelligence experts say could produce atomic weapons as soon as 1993. Many see the moves as an important step to ease tensions on the heavily armed peninsula, divided at the end of World War II. The Korean have recently been at war since the 1953 Korean conflict. Some South Koreans suspect the conciliatory moves by hard-line North Korea could buy them time to develop an atomic bomb. As international pressure escalated on North Korea to sign the safeguards and allow inspections, it had previously maintained it would never open itself to outside inspections unless Washington formally confirmed that U.S. nuclear weapons had been removed from South Korea. The United States refuses to do that. But in a turnaround, North Korea said Thursday it now believes South Korea's announcement last week that no nuclear weapons remain in South Korea, and would not demand separate U.S. verification before signing the agreement. The breakthrough came at a border meeting focusing on nuclear disputes that threatened to scuttle the rival Koreas' historic accord of Dec. 13. The Koreans signed the accord setting out a framework for reconciliation and non-aggression to end 46 years of hostilities, but nuclear issues were not covered. Instead, the two sides issued a joint statement pledging to work toward a nuclear-free peninsula.

Italy orders driving on alternate days

ROME (AP) — Major Italian cities are betting they can lower dangerous winter pollution levels by limiting the number of cars on the road — odd numbered license plates one day, even the next. This government game of roulette runs counter to Italians' view of driving as a divine right, and has kept police busy writing up thousands of citations. At least 11 Italian cities have imposed alternate-day driving rules this winter on high pollution days, including Rome, Milan, Naples and Turin. Venice even ordered restrictions on the motorboats plying its canals. The lagoon city's old-fashioned, hand-paddled gondolas are exempt, however. Some motorists have tried to evade the odd-even rule by using paint, tape or mud to cover or alter the last number on their plates. Such dodges reflect the traditional flouting of traffic laws in a country where most sidewalks double as parking lots, where the right-of-way on chaotic streets appears to be determined by courage alone. But losing at the latest traffic game can be costly. Fines range from \$44 for driving around with the wrong plate to \$888 for altering plates. One day alone this month, police in Rome wrote a record 12,983 such citations. Environment Minister Giorgio Ruffolo is behind the restrictions. He has pressured the cities to reduce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide, sulfur dioxide and nitrogen dioxide, which cause health risks and eat away at public monuments. Ruffolo maintains rigid odd-even enforcement can lower pollution levels 20 to 30 percent. Italians aren't so sure. "The only effect is there is less traffic, fewer people moving around, fewer customers for the shops," complained Hebe Koifmann, the owner of a leather goods store in Rome. Many Italians with two cars can defeat the rules if the cars have odd and even plates. Others arrange to borrow a car with the correct plate. They usually obtain exemptions because of work or political clout. "It is a useless, temporary measure to combat pollution," said Maurizio Corressi, a Roman taxi driver. "But it has been good for taxi drivers." Italy has been slow to impose long-term measures. Only one car in 100 has a catalytic converter that allows it to burn less polluting unleaded gasoline.

Sikh separatists fire on train passengers

AMRITSAR, India (AP) — Sikh separatists halted a train in Punjab Thursday, opened fire on its passengers and chased others down as they fled, killing 55 people and wounding 73, police and a doctor said. Most of the victims were Hindus, who are a majority in India but a minority in Punjab, where Sikh militants have long been trying to win an independent homeland. The killers separated the Hindus from the Sikhs and shot them at close range, said the area's police chief, Hardeep Singh Dhillon. United News of India reported a higher death toll of at least 60 dead.

Aquaculture Association will help with discharge permits

JEROME — The Idaho Aquaculture Association will help fish farmers file applications for federal permits to discharge waste water into Idaho rivers and streams and assist them in staying in compliance after the permits are granted, says its director.

It's illegal to discharge waste water without a permit, Executive Director Don Campbell said. And it can be expensive to be found out of compliance.

Any operation with a discharge pipe into a river or stream is required to have a pollution discharge elimination system permit issued through the federal Environmental Protection Agency. A fee of up to \$10,000 per day could be charged for a business operating without a permit, Campbell said.

The permits are issued before construction of a new industry and must be renewed every five years, Campbell said.

8 people in Magic Valley test positive for HIV, 1 for AIDS

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Valley has had eight HIV-positive tests and one new case of AIDS so far this year, according to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

That compares with 32 new AIDS cases statewide and 55 HIV-positives in 1991, according to the agency's next-to-weekly report of the year.

Health and Welfare also reported that south-central Idaho has so far largely escaped the epidemics of measles that have hit eastern Idaho and the Treasure Valley.

The South Central District reported 10 cases of measles for the year, compared with 223 for the eight-county District 7 that covers the upper Snake River Valley and 26 cases for the Central District, centered on Boise.

Statewide, only one new case of measles — in Adams County — has been reported in the last two weeks.

The Magic Valley has had the third-largest number of new cases of venereal disease for any region of the state so far in 1991, including 294 cases of chlamydia, 25 of gonorrhea and one case of syphilis.

Police say girl admits to robbery involvement

TWIN FALLS — Police here say a Twin Falls girl recently arrested in Utah has admitted she was involved in a gang-related armed robbery last week.

The girl, 17, was arrested in the Sandy, Utah, area with two Utah boys when police there stopped a car that had been reported stolen in Twin Falls, Det. Ron Roberson of the Twin Falls police department said Thursday.

After questioning the girl Thursday, Roberson said she apparently was involved

in a recent visit from a Utah-based Asian gang called the Oriental Crips.

On Dec. 19, four Asian males carrying handguns entered the Poun Pin house, on the 400 block of Seventh Avenue East in Twin Falls and forced the family to lie on the floor, Roberson said.

The four males, at least three of whom were probably juveniles, ransacked the house and took about \$19,000 of family heirloom jewelry, he said.

One shot was fired into the floor during the robbery, but nobody was injured, Roberson said.

Earlier that same night, the Somphou

Phommahas home in the 500 block of Fourth Avenue North was burglarized.

Nobody was home at the time. The thieves made off with a safe containing about \$10,000 in gold jewelry and other family valuables, plus \$840 cash, Roberson said.

The car that later was stopped in Utah with the girl inside was also stolen that night, he said. The two boys have not yet been brought to Twin Falls because juveniles are not extradited until formal charges have been filed against them, Roberson said.

The thefts appear to be the work of the Oriental Crips, who have made three forays

into the area this year, he said. Although all the incidents have been burglaries, this latest episode with drawn guns and a family held at bay was the most violent, Roberson said.

He anticipates arresting five more Asian males in connection with the robbery. The fact that the Asian gang is striking Oriental families is not unusual, he said. This group tends to hit families of the same nationality because gang members know valuable family heirlooms are likely being kept in the house, he added.

Some of the stolen property has been recovered, Roberson said, but police are still looking for more.

10-year-old Jerome boy seems tailor-made for sewing business

JEROME — Scott Gardner doesn't mind being called a sew-sew kid.

In fact, Gardner isn't a kid who is cut out of the same pattern as other children.

The 5th grader has been stitching up a storm ever since he can remember and today designs and sews his own wardrobe.

Gardner, 10, is so deft at the sewing machine, his creations have captured the interest of his teachers and classmates, including his assortment of gay pants and suits.

His mother, Terri Lyn Gardner, is the only one who complains. Gardner says her son's passion for sewing is so strong, she has a hard time getting near the sewing machine anymore.

The young tailor doesn't get needed at school by classmates for his sewing prowess, either.

"They think my clothes are neat, and they want me to make them some," Scott said.

Scott said he started his sewing career so long ago he can't remember how old he was.

"I was just a little kid," he said, adding now he can thread a needle and cut out a pattern quicker than his mother.

Scott specializes in making jams, a popular long short. But, he also can do more sophisticated projects. A recent creation was a two-piece corduroy suit.

The pants and jacket were black, and Scott added bright red sleeves on the jacket. Glass western-type snaps were used on the jacket, because "snaps are easier to do than buttonholes," he said.

The young tailor usually makes a matching pair of pants or shorts for his little brother, Jared, who is 2.

"He's so little it doesn't take much to make him a pair of pants out of what's left from mine," Scott said.

Gardner said her son has always been interested in sewing.

"When he was real little he would sit on the sewing machine pressure foot and make the machine go real fast," Gardner said. "He still likes to sew fast, sometimes almost sewing through his finger."

She added her son's passion has caused her some inconvenience.

"I hardly could get near the sewing machine; Scott and the other kids kept it running all summer," Gardner said.

Scott's skill gets taxed a lot. With five sisters and two brothers, he says he tries to stitch up something for everyone.

"I don't want to leave any of them out, especially my sisters; so Luce up my scraps and make them little pillows for their Barbie dolls," he said.

With 10 in Scott's family, plus 15 to 20 aunts, uncles and grandparents, Scott sews something for each one for Christmas.

"My Mom and me made stuffed bears now for all our aunts and uncles," Scott said.

Beach pants, big baggy ones, the louder the better are favorites of the young tailor.

Blaine drug task force head resigns

HAILEY — The head of Blaine County's drug task force has resigned and the Idaho attorney general's office is looking into possible drunk driving charges.

Blair Hawkins, 28, was stopped in Hailey the morning of Dec. 14, not long after being driven to his motel room following a Christmas party, according to a statement issued by Blaine County Sheriff Walt Fleming.

Shortly after quitting, Hawkins was hired as a non-paid reserve deputy in Jerome County, and has long aided that county in drug investigations, Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold said.

Gold said Hawkins' resignation was not tied to the drunk driving investigation. Hawkins told Gold that he was en route to Fleming's house to resign when he was stopped by two Hailey police officers, Gold said.

Hawkins, a Twin Falls resident, was unavailable for comment Thursday.

Fleming and Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williamson declined to release details of the traffic stop that gave rise to the investigation.

No charges have been filed against Hawkins, who took over the Blaine County Drug Task Force in September 1990. The case has been forwarded to the attorney general's office to avoid a potential conflict of interest, Williamson said.

Any time a law enforcement officer is the subject of a criminal investigation, it is common practice for an independent agency such as the attorney general's office to handle the case, Williamson said.

Michael Kane, chief investigator for the attorney general's office, was not available for comment Thursday.

Gold said Hawkins will be suspended only if criminal charges are filed.

Unless that happens, Gold said he fully supports the newest member of his department.

"I would not hire a person who I believed was going to be subject to arrest," he said.

Investigators suspect arson in house fire

Lisa Barini-Garcia was on vacation when firefighters rushed to the house she was renting, located at 184 Rose St. S., shortly after 4 a.m. Tuesday.

After the fire was put out, Battalion Chief Wayne Campbell walked through the two-bedroom apartment to the kitchen, who was watching the place while Barini-Garcia is out of town.

The woman noticed several things were missing, including a television, VCR, compact disc player and jewelry, according to a report written by police department investigator Jack Freeman.

Cambridge suspects a burglar may have started the fire to cover his tracks, Freeman's report says.

"It certainly looks suspicious," Battalion Chief Jerry Hafer said Thursday.

The fire apparently started in one of the bedrooms and spread to the kitchen, which is owned by Carol Marshall of Twin Falls.

Investigators have not made a positive determination as to the exact cause of the blaze, said Dennis Chambers, investigator with the Twin Falls police department.

Barini-Garcia lost just about everything she owned in the house, including her two autos, said Twin Falls County Public Defender Mike Wood.

He said Barini-Garcia is visiting her family out of state and will finish her vacation before coming back to Twin Falls.

Hafer said the house sustained structural damage and he doubts if it can be rebuilt.

CSI can't keep up with nursing demand

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley Regional Medical Center has nine openings for registered nurses, but the College of Southern Idaho's nursing program can't fill them all.

The reason? Like other Idaho colleges with nursing programs, CSI cannot train

nurses fast enough to keep up with demand.

Two of the reasons are a shortage of teachers and not enough clinical facility space, said Marilyn Blackburn, an adviser at CSI.

Unlike Lewis-Clark State College in Lewiston, where three alternates were accepted into the nursing school, CSI was not able to enroll any alternates into its nursing program this year, she said.

"Some students who met the criteria did not get a space in the program," Blackburn said.

To boost the number of students CSI can handle, more faculty will have to be hired and clinical time will have to increase, she said.

Health care issues carry over from '91 session

TWIN FALLS — Unfinished business from last session will dominate the 1992 Legislature's health-care agenda, Magic Valley legislators and others say.

The first item on that agenda will be appropriating money to transfer the indigent health care program's catastrophic fund from the counties to the state.

Counties pay the medical bills of people certified as indigent up to \$10,000. Medical

expenses above that threshold that were incurred before Oct. 1 are paid from a catastrophic fund. Each Idaho county

contributed to the fund based on its population; the money came from property taxes.

A bill passed last year dissolves that fund as of Dec. 31, 1992, and sets up a new one to be funded by the state. The idea was to transfer the costs of indigent health care from the property tax to the state's general account, which is funded through income taxes, the sales tax and other taxes and fees.

But Gov. Cecil Andrus used his line-item veto power to slice from the indigency bill Please see HEALTH/AS

City will talk with engineering firm about master plan update

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls City Manager Tom Courtney will talk with J-U-B Engineers Inc. about a contract to update the city's master plan.

J-U-B, a Boise-based engineering consulting firm, was one of four companies that bid on the job and talked with the City Council, Planning and Zoning Commission and city staff earlier this month.

After talking with the Planning and Zoning Commission and city staff in mid-month, the City Council decided this week to negotiate with J-U-B.

After presenting their plans in early December, J-U-B and Hofman Planning Associates/Lee Nellis Consulting Planners emerged as the two favorites for the job.

J-U-B's representatives are based in Boise. Lee Nellis is from Idaho Falls, with some of the team members based in San Diego.

At a recent meeting with the City Council, most Planning and Zoning Commission members favored Lee

Nellis, although several said they liked J-U-B.

City Community Development Director Lamar Orton said either firm would do good work. Lee Nellis offered innovation and "a fresh look," Orton said. But he wondered if residents would accept a group from California.

Courtney agreed, adding said that J-U-B's presentation and background work had impressed him.

City Engineer Gary Young said he would be happy with either firm.

Young is primarily concerned with traffic and transportation, which mean "life and death to the community," he said.

Twin Falls attorney Jeff Rofe said commission members "liked Rofe said he liked both companies. A group experienced in working with a big city like San Diego might be good for Twin Falls, Rofe said.

"A totally fresh perspective may well be the best thing for us," he said. J-U-B has an office in Twin Falls, has several contracts with the city and Councilwoman Pam Dodd questioned whether the firm should get another one. But Councilman

Gale Kleinkopf said he liked the idea of spending city money locally.

Council members unofficially favored Lee Nellis, 2-2, but Councilman Doug Vollmer was absent and Councilwoman Mary McClusky abstained because of a potential conflict of interest, Councilman Jim Vickers, who leaned toward Lee Nellis, said he liked both firms.

Monday, Vollmer said he favored J-U-B. To break the deadlock, Vickers gave the nod to J-U-B.

J-U-B has estimated the cost of the nine-month job at \$90,000 to \$135,000. Lee Nellis estimated a cost of \$84,000 for an eight-month study. CH2M Hill, a Boise engineering and consulting company, and Science Applications International Corporation, also of Boise, made bids on the job.

The city adopted its master plan in 1980, but recent growth has left the plan outdated. Council members want a plan emphasizing population and economic development for 5- and 10-year periods, land use, public service and facilities, transportation and housing.

Court order closes parking lot

KETCHUM — A court order closed a new Sun Valley Co. parking lot at the base of Bald Mountain this week pending a Dec. 30 hearing in a lawsuit by neighboring property owners.

The Gresham Hill Master Association, which protested the additional parking because of its impact on the Warm Springs neighborhoods, filed suit in district court against the city of Ketchum over its recent decision to grant a one-year conditional use permit for a 140-car parking lot near the resort's ski lifts.

The homeowners contend the city failed to provide adequate public notice of the Sun Valley Co.'s

appeal of a decision by the Ketchum Planning and Zoning Commission denying the permit.

Fifth District Judge James May issued a temporary restraining order Dec. 20, preventing the Sun Valley Co. from using the property it purchased this fall.

"We will contest the temporary restraining order," said Jim Jaquet, Ketchum city administrator.

The Ketchum City Council met in executive session Dec. 23 to discuss its strategy on the litigation, according to Jaquet, and decided to hold another public hearing on the matter.

The public hearing will be held at 7:15 p.m. on Jan. 21 at Ketchum City Hall.

"We will send notices in writing to everyone within 300 feet of the

property," Jaquet said.

Public hearings on the same issue were held before the Ketchum Planning and Zoning Commission on Nov. 25 and Dec. 9 before the commission voted unanimously to deny Sun Valley Co.'s proposal for a 300-car lot with 160 day use spaces.

On appeal to the City Council, the resort asked for 140 reserved spaces, only 70 for employees and 70 for skiers with season passes. None of the day-use parking was appealed.

The City Council granted the appeal at its Dec. 16 meeting, without making public notice of the appeal.

Ketchum's ordinances do not require public notice of appeals on conditional use permits, Jaquet pointed out.

\$3 million that was to go into the new catastrophic fund. The result, Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said, is an empty fund, and catastrophic bills incurred since Oct. 1, when the new law went into effect, haven't been paid.

The county is holding onto those bills, Hempleman said, in hopes that the Legislature will appropriate money to start up the new catastrophic fund and Andrus will approve it.

"I sure hope they do it fast," said Hempleman, who sits on the boards that administer both the old and new catastrophic funds. "This is literally a life-and-death matter."

At least three Idaho residents have been denied bone-marrow transplants by a Seattle hospital because the facility doesn't know whether it will be paid for the expensive operations, he said.

Not as immediate, but still pressing, is the problem of how to help the estimated 160,000 Idahoans who lack health insurance.

Last session, the Legislature authorized a task force to investigate the issue. It will report back during the first week of the session, which

begins Jan. 6.

Among its recommendations will be to expand eligibility for the federal Medicaid program, which the task force estimates could provide coverage for between 20,000 and 25,000 people.

Sen. Russ Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, a physician and member of the task force, has proposed a plan that would offer basic health insurance to people who earned less than \$30,000 a year, employers whose workers made an average of less than \$30,000 a year, or people who were classified as uninsurable.

Newcomb's plan would limit benefits to \$50,000. Employers, insured persons, insurance agents and health-care providers would share the costs of the program, which the state would guarantee.

Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, said he thought his brother's passage had a reasonable chance of passage if actuarial research determined it would pay for itself.

"But Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, said he believed the \$30,000 benefit limit was too low.

Newcomb's plan also makes no provision for deductibles," said Cameron, an insurance agent.

Any health insurance bill this session will run up against a tight budget, said Rep. Lee Barnes, R-Buhl, although there might be enough money for an actuarial analysis of Newcomb's plan.

Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, said she would work to win funding for the medical-student loan repayment program approved by the Legislature last year.

The program would pay back up to \$50,000 in student loans to doctors, nurses and nurse-practitioners who agree to practice in rural Idaho for three years.

McRoberts said, the Legislature authorized \$100,000 for the program, she said, but the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee did not appropriate the money.

"I'm going to work hard to encourage IFAC to fund the program this year," McRoberts said.

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Governor wants INEL conference open to press, public

POCATELLO (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus wants Democrats, Republicans and the U.S. Department of Energy to agree to open a planned summit on the future of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to the press and public.

The governor has said no way will he attend unless it's open to the press," Andrus spokesman Scott Peyron said Thursday. "I think that's the way Senator Craig feels."

The Boise summit, tentatively scheduled for Jan. 22, is being organized by Sens. Larry Craig and Steve Symms, R-Idaho, to help clarify what role the INEL will play in future Energy Department programs.

Craig's offices were closed Thursday and he was unavailable for comment.

Questions about the INEL's future arose in recent months as a result of legal battles between Andrus and the federal agency over the storage of nuclear waste at the eastern Idaho facility. The fall of communism and end of the Cold War also have put the nation's nuclear weapons production plans in flux.

Andrus and the senators have been at odds over the governor's opposition to storing high-level radioactive waste at the INEL from Public Service Co. of Colorado's mothballed Fort St. Vrain reactor.

Additional shipments were blocked last month by a federal judge in Boise until the Energy Department gets a state air-quality permit for the INEL's waste storage facility. The agency has yet to apply for a permit.

Peyron said for Andrus to attend, the INEL summit must include:

- Some guarantee of public involvement.
- Participation by Democratic Congressmen — Richard Stallings and Larry LaRocco.
- Participation by a high-level Energy Department official such as the company's James Watkins or Deputy Director Henson Moore.
- That the governor's questions on the future role of the INEL be on the agenda.

Montana congressmen may face each other

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — It's a rare day when Montana's two congressmen agree on anything.

Rep. Ron Marlenee, a conservative Republican opposed to big government and environmentalists, represents the eastern plains. Rep. Pat Williams, a liberal Democrat critical of Reagan-Bush economic policies, represents the mountainous west.

Now, as reapportionment threatens to erase one of the state's two congressional seats, the incumbents are poised to run against each other, unless the U.S. Supreme Court decides against making Montana the largest House district in the nation.

Marlenee and Williams agree on this: The election would be close, costly and a clear-cut choice between polar opposites.

"I would say that Pat and I are diametrically opposed," said Marlenee. "A vast majority of the time we cancel each other out on the House floor."

National party groups are waffling and plan to spend ample money on the race.

"There are going to be few races in the country that will be higher priority, I'll tell you that," said Les Francis, executive director of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee. "It's very important."

Marlenee has been in Congress for 15 years and Williams for 13. Neither man has faced much of an electoral challenge — until now.

They were thrown against each other because of the 1990 census, which found too few people in Montana to justify two seats. Under reapportionment, Montana would be one congressional district with a population of 800,000 people covering 145,000 square miles — nearly 20 times the size of New Jersey.

Montana went to court, arguing such a populous district violates the state's constitutional right to equal representation. A three-judge federal panel agreed and the U.S. Supreme Court said Dec. 16 it will hear arguments in the case early next year.

The uncertainty has left state lawmakers scrambling. A special session of the Legislature may postpone the state's June 2 primary election to see what the high court does.

Meanwhile, Marlenee and Williams are charging ahead with their campaigns.

Polls show the race dead even or Williams with a slight edge. Who they show that most Montanans already know who they are supporting, with as few

as 7 percent of those polled saying they are undecided.

"You may be assured that I will hedge my bet and run with a full-court press on a statewide basis," Marlenee said.

"I think the way to win this election is door-to-door, town to town, debate to debate," said Williams. "It's going to be very close."

Williams, 54, is a former teacher from Shute, a mining town and union stronghold in the shadow of the Continental Divide. Adamantly pro-labor, Williams believes government can help better citizens' lives. He consistently criticized former President Reagan's economic programs — in the 1980s.

"I want the federal government to be an aggressive partner — that benefits individual citizens in our state," Williams said.

First elected in 1978, Williams is one of seven deputy majority whips in the House. Last year, as chairman of the House subcommittee that oversees the National Endowment for the Arts, he fended off critics who complained the endowment subsidized sexually explicit works.

Marlenee, 56, owns a grain farm near Scobey, on Montana's eastern plains. First elected in 1976, Marlenee has doggedly promoted mining, timber, farming and other business interests and fought anyone who got in their way.

"If you want somebody who votes for less regulation and less government and less taxes, instead of as my opponent has ... I think the choice is clear," he said.

Los Angeles police crack down on deadly New Year's Eve gunfire

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Authorities have banned ammunition sales for a week to try to persuade New Year's Eve merry-makers not to fire guns into the air, a celebration that has killed and injured bystanders in years past.

It was the second consecutive year that ammunition sales in Los Angeles have been banned during the week before New Year's.

A special session of the Legislature may postpone the state's June 2 primary election to see what the high court does.

"We've reduced the problem by 90 percent," police Lt. Bruce Hagerty told reporters Thursday. The ban went into effect Wednesday.

Before the crackdown began in 1989, at least one death and dozens of injuries were reported each year.

Since then, the number has dropped sharply and nobody has been killed or wounded by a stray bullet in the city on New Year's Eve, Hagerty said.

But two men firing weapons in the air last New Year's Eve were killed in separate confrontations with a police officer and a sheriff's deputy.

Several others were arrested last year for shooting firearms indiscriminately.

Idaho Supreme Court reverses judge's order

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has reversed a judge's order granting a new trial in a lawsuit filed by the widows of two men killed in a 1987 plane crash.

The high court ruled unanimously on Thursday that 7th District Judge H. Reynold George should not have ordered a new trial after a jury decided the women could not sue the widow of the plane's pilot since all three men worked for the same Idaho Falls construction company.

John Walter Chaffin was flying the Robert V. Burggraf Co. plane on May 20, 1987, when it crashed near Cody. Chaffin and Burggraf employees Stephen S. Burggraf and Gary Cain were killed. They were on their way to submit a bid on behalf of the company.

Linda Burggraf and Laurie Cain filed lawsuits against the company in January 1988, alleging that negligent operation of the aircraft by her husband was responsible for the crash.

But Mrs. Chaffin argued that Mrs. Burggraf and Mrs. Cain were only the worker's compensation beneficiary under Idaho law, since the three men were co-workers.

Chaffin's primary business was as owner of an Oldsmobile dealership, but he also piloted the airplane that crashed both for Burggraf Co. business and in charter service.

Evidence at the trial showed that Chaffin had an oral agreement with Burggraf that he would have personal use of the plane one hour for every 10 hours he flew for the company. He also was paid for the time he flew for Burggraf and was responsible for servicing and maintaining the plane at the company's expense.

The jury agreed with Mrs. Chaffin's contention that her husband was a Burggraf employee, but George granted a motion from Mrs. Burggraf and Mrs. Cain for a new trial.

The judge said the weight of the evidence indicated Chaffin was not a Burggraf employee. He cited the absence of any payroll record and the fact that the company gave him a tax form for "non-employee compensation."

George also ruled that Burggraf had paid worker's compensation insurance premiums only on the company's "air crew," but not Chaffin specifically.

Chief Justice Robert Bakes, writing for the Supreme Court's majority, said the judge overlooked the fact that Chaffin himself had submitted worker's compensation claims listing himself as a Burggraf employee. Evidence also indicated that income Chaffin reported on the tax form as non-employee compensation was for charter flights — not his work as a corporate pilot.

Music festival organizers battle financial problems

SANDPOINT (AP) — Despite a bleak season in which attendance dropped, an executive was ousted and an old budget deficit was discovered, officials of the Festival at Sandpoint remain upbeat about next year.

"We've gone through a painful transition, but I think we are coming out on the other side of all the problems," Executive Director Connie Berghan said. "The festival will not only survive, but it will thrive."

The year ended with a \$138,000 budget deficit. Tim Hunt was dismissed as executive director after disagreements with the board of directors and artistic director Gunther Schuller.

The problems forced the festival to go through a much-needed transition. President Bobbie Huguenin said changes have been made in management, board members, accounting procedures and attitudes, she said.

Huguenin said she's convinced the turmoil last season has made the festival stronger.

"I don't think the future of the festival has ever been in question," Schuller said from his Boston studio. "I don't see that last year's problems have caused any major rift except for this financial deficit. That is just something we will have to work through."

A review of the festival's books from 1990 discovered a \$39,617 accounting error that, added with this year's \$26,592 shortfall, pushed the festival's total deficit to \$138,000.

Berghan said creditors are understanding and remain supportive.

Foundation Northwest, a Spokane, Wash., group that helps manage nonprofit organizations, has been enlisted for next season. The foundation contributed \$2,000 to the festival to organize a management team and has offered a \$7,500 matching grant.

Training, employment facility receives national accreditation

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Development Workshop, which provides job training and employment for disabled people in eastern Idaho, has received national accreditation.

The Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities accredited Development Workshop along with services offered by its affiliates, Upper Valley Industries in Rexburg and Salmon River Industries in Salmon.

"This important achievement is a further indication of your dedication and commitment to improve the quality of the lives of the disabled," said Allen Schuller, the commission's executive director.

The accreditation extends through

December 1994. Development Workshop serves 410 people and has an annual budget of \$4.1 million.

Caldwell family survives 3 drive-by shootings

CALDWELL (AP) - The occupants in a white-clapboard house in Caldwell survived three separate drive-by shootings on Christmas morning.

In the town's latest brush with teen-age violence, police said a sawed-off shotgun and a pistol were fired at seven people in the home.

Stunned family members inside were forced to duck for cover as bullets splintered the walls, but no injuries were reported. Three people were subsequently arrested.

"It was scary watching bullets flying through your house," said 16-year-old Francisco Sanchez. He said seven people were in the house, including his mother, grandfather, and a visiting woman and her young child.

The suspects were arrested at 2:45 a.m., moments after allegedly being seen by police firing a final five rounds at the house from a car. Nearly a dozen drive-by shootings were reported in the town of 18,000 people this summer, prompting Caldwell to establish a youth gang advisory committee and step up law-enforcement efforts.

Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris on Wednesday vowed to deal harshly with the defendants in hopes of deterring more incidents.

"When you're dealing with these macho-type gang situations, it just drives itself. We'll try to put a stop to it, and the only way is to make the ones we catch pay."

The latest shootings began about midnight Tuesday when Sanchez heard "a big blast" and discovered an 18-inch-wide hole in a front window.

A 2-year-old boy was sleeping on a mattress only five feet away, he said. The family called police, but an hour later, shots again rang out.

One bullet pierced a bedroom wall within inches of Sanchez's sleeping 15-year-old sister, Angie.

Police staked out the neighborhood, and were waiting when the suspects returned a couple of hours later. Officer Terry Day gave chase, stopping the car without incident two blocks away.

The alleged driver, 18-year-old Elsa Chapa of Caldwell, and two juvenile passengers were charged with attempted first-degree murder and possession of a stolen shotgun.

The juveniles were identified only as a 16-year-old male and a 17-year-old male, both of Nampa. While they are expected to be prosecuted as adults, their names were withheld by authorities.

They were slated to be arraigned Thursday in Canyon County Magistrate Court. All three were held without bond.

Chapa and the older juvenile also are charged with first-degree burglary. They are accused of stealing cases of beer from a convenience store shortly early Wednesday.

Authorities declined to speculate on a possible motive for the shootings.

Sanchez, a Caldwell High School sophomore, said he knows the suspects and is mystified by the whole thing. He said the shootings are not gang-related.

"I don't know why it happened," he said. "They might have just been having fun, thinking, 'Let's give 'em a Christmas present.'"

When the third attack came, Sanchez said he and his older brother, Jesus, 18, were engaged they decided to run outside and confront the shooters.

But as Sanchez grabbed the front door knob, bullets pounded the wood. One splintered the door near his knees. The two boys dropped to the floor.

Sanchez's mother, Maria, who owns the home, described the shootings as "ugly." She fears the suspects will try to harm them again if they are released from jail.

Sheriff hopes ruling helps clear jails

POCATELLO - Bannock County Sheriff Bill Lynn said he hopes an Idaho Supreme Court ruling will help counties get the Department of Corrections to agree to more quickly clear their jails of state inmates.

The five-member high court ruled unanimously last week that Corrections must remove state prisoners from the Ada County Jail in Boise as soon as guards and transportation are available.

The department had argued "as soon as possible" meant as quickly as space could be made available for the inmates in the state's crowded prison system.

Bannock and Kootenai counties also have lawsuits pending against Corrections over the timely removal of state prisoners. Lynn said his jail has been holding state inmates an average of seven or eight months, and sometimes as long as a year.

Utah store pulls alcoholic beverages

BOUNTIFUL, Utah - Unable to control beer purchases and thefts by youths, Food-4-Less has ordered the alcoholic beverage pulled from the shelves of its store here.

Store owner Don Simpson said the discount food chain removed beer last week despite "substantial" revenue generated from its sales. Simpson did not specify how much revenue will be lost.

The decision was made after Food-4-Less determined that stringent hiring practices and employee training couldn't stop juveniles from purchasing beer, he said.

During four routine police checks this year, underage police decoys bought beer on two occasions. Food-4-Less employees who sold the beer were fired, Simpson said.

Northern Utah not ruling out drought

OGDEN, Utah - Northern Utah reservoirs are holding plenty of water for next year, but officials are not ready to declare Utah's five-year drought over.

In many cases, local reservoirs are awash with twice the amount of water they held at this time a year ago.

"We're exactly where we want to be," said Ivan Flint, general manager of the Weber Basin Water Conservancy District. "We have a nice holdover."

Holiday visitors flock to derailment

SPOKANE - Leaving the toy train sets under the tree, residents and their holiday visitors flocked to the site of a train derailment near here. "I was here three times yesterday. It fascinates me," Doris Nelson said Wednesday as she surveyed the derailment site on a trellis a mile west of downtown.

Her grandson, Brent Nelson, was among the dozens of amateur photographers who snapped roll after roll of film of wrecked train cars.

Railroad cars spilled off the concrete-and-steel trestle 80 feet above the freeway during the accident Tuesday morning. Three cars fell on or near the interstate and two others that dangled from the side of the bridge were later dropped to the roadside.

Study shows little threat from wastes

COEUR D'ALENE - A new mining industry study shows recreational use of the Lake Coeur d'Alene drainage poses little health risk, despite heavy-metal contamination from mining wastes.

It concludes that water in the Coeur d'Alene drainage is safe to drink and swim in. The fish are edible and children can play in what had been considered lead-contaminated dirt around the Cataldo boat ramp.

The study was conducted by Seattle-area consultants Parametrix Inc. and Environmental Toxicology International, for the recently formed Council for Mineral Information.

But the Coeur d'Alene Indian Tribe and an environmental health expert dispute the report, released this week. They point to data showing that Silver Valley mining activity over the last century poured tons of metal-laden mine tailings into the drainage.

Nampa man dies in Owyhee accident

MURPHY - A 24-year-old Nampa man was killed when he lost control of his pickup truck on a rough Owyhee County road near Murphy.

Vernon Darrel Tate Jr., 24, died shortly after 9 a.m. Tuesday, about 3 1/2 miles from Silver City Road's junction with Idaho Highway 78.

Owyhee County Sheriff Tim Nettleton said Tate's brother, a passenger in the pickup, was unhurt and walked out of the hills after the crash.

Health insurance reform ideas don't go far enough, critics say

BOISE (AP) - A task force created by the legislature says it has some good ideas to help Idahoans without health insurance.

But critics charge it is little more than a Band-Aid for a serious problem: The high cost of care.

About 160,000 people lack health insurance, or 16 percent of the state, the Idaho Hospital Association reports, compared to 13 percent nationwide. Nearly one-third of Idaho's children are not covered.

If the task force has its way, 1992 will see progress for at least some of the uninsured.

"It's a beginning," said George Neumayer, task force project coordinator. "We've talked to a number of people in the executive and legislative branch, and they're very interested in our findings."

The 30-member task force is expected to submit a final report to the Legislature before it convenes Jan. 6.

It suggests expanding Medicaid coverage to pregnant women and children up to 6 years old. It would add 2,586 women and an equal number of infants to the Medicaid rolls. The plan, estimated to cost \$15.7 million, would allow women to qualify for Medicaid even if their incomes are 185 percent of the poverty level. Currently, the cutoff is 135 percent.

Idaho would pay \$4.3 million, and the federal government would supply the rest.

Funding Medicaid's "medically needy" program would improve benefits for low-income people who are elderly, blind, disabled or from impoverished families with children. Last year, the Legislature approved this expansion, but did not fund it.

Despite the task-force recommendation, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare - which runs Idaho's Medicaid program - plans to ask the Legislature to put off funding the "medically needy" agenda until July 1993 because of the cost, said Jean Phillips, administrator of the Welfare Division.

"The word that we're getting is that funding is going to be awfully tight this year," she said, adding the Medicaid caseload has grown 31 percent in the past year.

Another suggestion is reforms for insurance companies that serve small employers which cannot afford health insurance benefits.

The task force does not recommend any sweeping changes.

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Lawyer sees little hope for appeal in Wyoming's first execution since 1965

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) - Wyoming's first execution in 26 years is scheduled for next month, and the condemned man's lawyer said there is little more that can be done to save him.

"We've put in 10 years and nothing's happened," said Leonard Munker, a public defender for murderer Mark Hopkinson. "We've reached the end and why lie about it?"

Hopkinson is scheduled to receive a lethal injection Jan. 22. He would be the first inmate executed in Wyoming since December 1965, when a 22-year-old laborer, Andrew Piskley, was put to death in the gas chamber for the rape-murder of a 12-year-old girl.

Hopkinson, 42, is the only person on death row at Wyoming State Penitentiary in Rawlins.

U.S. District Judge Richard Matsch had halted Hopkinson's execution, previously scheduled for Sept. 23, 1990, to review questions surrounding the death sentence and possible new evidence.

But Matsch dismissed the appeal last week, saying most of the claims had been ruled on earlier and the others were insufficient to overturn the sentence.

Munker said Monday he would continue pursuing motions and appeals, predicting he can delay the execution for months. But he said he doesn't believe "there's any viability left."

Despite Munker's pessimism, other death penalty opponents said they still hoped to stop the execution.

The 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which would hear an appeal of Matsch's ruling, is "probably in the same frame of mind (as Matsch) and they're not going to do anything to disturb (Matsch's findings)," Munker said.

Hopkinson, who lived in Fort Bridger, was convicted in 1979 of four counts of first-degree murder and two counts of conspiracy.

He was convicted of ordering the 1977 bombing deaths of Evanston attorney Vincent Vihar, his wife and a son, and of ordering a witness in the case, Jeffrey Lynn Green, to be killed two years later.

Hopkinson was sentenced to death in the Green slaying.

Rick Hayes, Wyoming representative of Amnesty International, said he hoped Gov. Mike Sullivan would intervene and grant clemency to Hopkinson.

"There's a very real possibility of innocence," because Green's actual killers have never been found, and since the 1977 reinstatement of the death penalty in the United States, no one who was not physically present at a murder has been executed, Hayes said.

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Nampa firm accused of safety violations

BOISE (AP) - The Occupational Safety and Health Administration has proposed \$50,000 in penalties for two citations alleging federal safety rule violations at Pacific Hide and Fur in Nampa.

The U.S. Department of Labor agency alleged Thursday that Pacific Hide and Fur failed to keep the workplace clean, orderly and sanitary, exposing employees to serious injuries from falls, infections or fire.

Ryan Kuehmichel, OSHA's Boise area director, said Pacific Hide and Fur has 15 working days to contest the citations and proposed penalties before the independent Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission.

Kuehmichel said the citations were the result of an employee complaint.

A Pacific Hide and Fur spokesman declined comment.

There were just 14 seconds left when Shawn Jones went one yard for the touchdown. Tech went for the two-point conversion and won the game when Jimmy Lincoln scored around right end.

In Wednesday's off-the-postseason game, quarterback Will Furrer of Virginia Tech led the Gray to a 20-12 victory over the Blue.

Three bowl games are scheduled for Sunday with No. 24 Georgia (8-3) playing Arkansas (6-5) in the Independence Bowl at Shreveport, La., Air Force (9-3) facing Mississippi State (7-4) in the Liberty Bowl at Memphis, Tenn., and No. 19 Virginia (8-2-1) against No. 20 Oklahoma (8-3) in the Gator Bowl at Jacksonville, Fla.

Mississippi coach Jackie Sherrill has agreed to use a play suggested by a fan in a write-in contest conducted by the school. Air Force is sticking to plays from the coaches.

There are two games set for Monday with No. 7 Iowa (10-1) against Brigham Young (8-3-1) in the Holiday Bowl at San Diego, and No. 23 Tulsa facing San Diego State (8-3-1) in the Freedom Bowl at Anaheim.

On Tuesday, Illinois (6-5) plays No. 22 UCLA (8-3) in the John Hancock Bowl at El Paso, Texas and Baylor (8-3) meets Indiana (6-4-1) in the Copper Bowl at Tucson. Lou Tepper, replacing Texas-bound John Mackovic, will make his head coaching debut with Illinois.

That sets up Jan. 1, a morning-to-night marathon. It begins before noon with the Peach Bowl at Atlanta matching No. 12 East

Carolina (10-1) against No. 21 North Carolina State (9-2). Then the Hall of Fame Bowl at Tampa has No. 16 Syracuse (9-2) vs. No. 25 Ohio State (8-3). At the Citrus Bowl in Orlando, No. 14 California (9-2) faces No. 13 Clemson (9-1-1).

In the Cotton Bowl at Dallas, No. 5 Florida State takes on No. 9 Texas A&M (10-1). The Fiesta Bowl at Tempe, Ariz., has No. 6 Penn State (10-2) against No. 10 Tennessee (9-2).

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Colts grab top 2 picks in 1992 NFL draft

NEW YORK — The order of the 1992 NFL draft was announced Thursday with the Indianapolis Colts holding the top two picks and Washington, Miami, Dallas and Green Bay also getting two picks each in the opening round.

After the first 14 selections, the order is subject to change depending on the playoff results.

Following Indianapolis with 1-2, the No. 3 choice belongs to the Los Angeles Rams. Then it's the Cincinnati, Green Bay, Washington, with a pick acquired from San Diego; Miami, using a pick obtained from Phoenix; New England; Cleveland; Seattle; Pittsburgh; Miami; Dallas with a choice from Minnesota and the New York Giants, who pick 14th.

Other picks are subject to change in the playoffs.

Broker: UNLV student sold more than 100 tickets

LAS VEGAS — A Los Angeles ticket broker says he bought more than 100 sets of choice Final Four basketball tickets from a UNLV source in Indianapolis last spring despite a scarcity of the tickets.

The Las Vegas Sun said the broker, who requested anonymity, bought them from a student who purchased them through the school's athletic department.

Dennis Finfrock, who was interim athletic director at the time, said he would be 'upset and disappointed' if the allegations prove to be true.

The broker said the Indianapolis tickets were purchased from Sean Foster, student manager of the basketball team. Foster told the Sun that he got the tickets from UNLV ticket manager Debbie Barentine.

Ted Williams reportedly recovers nicely after stroke

MIAMI — Ted Williams suffered a minor stroke recently, but is recovering nicely, close friends said Thursday. "In a general conversation I had with him yesterday, he said he had a little stroke," said a friend who asked not to be identified. "I asked him what the results were. He said, 'It didn't amount to anything.'"

"He said he was going to have some treatment where they would open the artery. Apparently he had no effect from it."

NFL players earn 18 percent more this year on average

ATLANTA — NFL players salaries increased more than 18 percent this year, with veteran quarterbacks and untested rookies getting big money, according to a survey by the players' association.

The average player earned \$422,149 in 1991, an all-time high, said the NFL Players Association's annual salary survey, reported Thursday by The Atlanta Journal-Constitution. That is 18.5 percent higher than the 1990 average salary of \$356,382.

End of an era

After 4 Super Bowl rings but less success in recent years, Steelers' Chuck Noll calls it quits

PITTSBURGH — For years, Chuck Noll has urged his former players to get on with their life's work. After 23 years, the Pittsburgh Steelers will try to get on without Noll.

Noll, the Steelers' coach since 1969 and to only coach to four Super Bowls, retired Thursday at an emotional news conference at which he and team president Dan Rooney seemed near tears.

"The end has to come sometime for everyone," Noll said. "For me, this is it. This is when it happened."

He is one of the great coaches of the game," Rooney said. "He ranks up there with Halas, Landry and Lambeau. Chuck is a great man and he hasn't changed from day one. He brought dignity and integrity to the coaching profession."

The Steelers will immediately begin the search for their 15th coach, but Rooney said there is no timetable. Noll, who will turn 60 on Jan. 5, said he will play no role in choosing his successor.

Defensive line coach Joe Greene, the first player drafted by Noll, has been mentioned as a successor, but Rooney wouldn't comment on any specific candidates.

"This is a day to remember Chuck Noll and what he has meant to the Pittsburgh Steelers," he said.

"Like Noll, the Steelers' next coach is expected to be conservative, fundamentals-oriented and reliant on the draft to build his team."

Noll's retirement, rumored for several weeks, ends one of the longest and most successful coaching careers in NFL history. He ranks fifth with 209 victories and second in postseason winning percentage, and no coach has matched his four Super Bowl victories in six seasons from 1974-79.

Noll, the seventh NFL coach to retire or be fired since the 1991 season began, is 209-156-1, a .573 winning percentage.

"He taught the Steelers and the city of Pittsburgh what it meant to be special," Rooney said. "He and my father (founder John Rooney Sr.) made the Steelers special."

Noll, then a relatively unknown Baltimore Colts' assistant, was named the Steelers' coach on Jan. 27, 1969, a week after President Richard Nixon was inaugurated and six months before man walked on the moon. Until Thursday, his tenure with the same team was the longest

of any current coach or manager in major U.S. sports. Noll and wife, Marianne, have discussed retirement for months, but he didn't make up his mind until just before his Thursday morning meeting with Rooney. Noll, who has rarely showed emotion

during his 39 years as a player and coach, was red-eyed and appeared near tears several times during a 15-minute news conference.

"There is some emotion. It is sad," Noll said. "It's much easier coming in than going in, and it does seem like yesterday" when he was hired.

The Steelers were laughable, lovable losers when Noll succeeded a long line of unsuccessful Steelers coaches — Bill Austin, Mike Nixon, Buddy Parker, Walt Kiesling, Joe Bach — but it took him just five years to transform them into Super Bowl champions.

When they started winning, they didn't stop until they'd won an unprecedented four Super Bowls in six years. It took the San Francisco 49ers nine years to win their four Super Bowls.

NFL writers choose Broncos linebacker as defensive rookie

NEW YORK — Mike Croel did not start in six games for the Denver Broncos. In the other 10, he was such a dynamic force that the linebacker has been selected The Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Croel was a landslide winner in voting by 82 media members that was announced Thursday. He had 68 votes, while nose tackle Mike Gastner of Atlanta had seven.

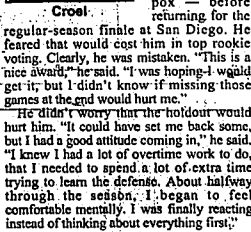
The fourth pick in the 1991 draft out of Nebraska, Croel missed four weeks of training camp as a holdout. He did not start the first three games, then Tim Lucas broke his leg. The Broncos turned to Croel and he turned in sensational performances every week. "I expected a lot of hard work, considering I was one of the first picks," Croel said. "I felt I had to help out the team and be an impact player."

"Which is exactly what Croel was. The Broncos have not had an outside linebacker with his pass-rushing skills in years. The coaches want me to beat a guy with my speed first and then counter with a move," he said of his quarterback-hunting, which got him 10 sacks. "You don't want to have a lot of moves in your pass rush. You don't want more than one or two moves. You don't have time. I could have had more sacks this season, but my technique hasn't been good enough."

Croel also was distracted by pursuit of the rookie sack record of 124 by Leslie O'Neal of San Diego in 1986. "I put a lot of pressure on myself to get it. I thought about it a lot. I was probably too hyped up about it, because I guess I forgot about my technique some."

Late in the year he missed three games — two because of a sprained left foot and the third with a case of chicken pox — before returning for the regular-season finale at San Diego. He feared that would cost him in top rookie voting. Clearly, he was mistaken. "This is a nice award," he said. "I was hoping I would get it, but I didn't know if missing those games at the end would hurt me."

"He didn't worry that the holdout would hurt him. It could have set me back some, but I had a good attitude coming in," he said. "I knew I had a lot of overtime work to do, that I needed to spend a lot of extra time trying to learn the defense. About halfway through the season, I began to feel comfortable mentally. I was finally reacting instead of thinking about everything first."



School officials appear to stress academics

OVERLAND PARK, Kan. — Legislative proposals ranging from stricter academic requirements to a new football classification received significant support in a poll of chief executive officers at NCAA schools.

The proposals, being sponsored by the Presidents Commission, will be up for consideration at the 1992 NCAA convention Jan. 7-10 in Anaheim, Calif.

Each of the proposals was supported by at least 60 percent of some 600 respondents out of more than 800 NCAA colleges and universities.

Most of the proposals received support from 70 percent to 100 percent, according to results made public this week.

The closest margin in Division I academic proposals involved an amendment to increase the minimum required grade point average from 2.0 to 2.5, or grades of C to C-plus, in the high school core curriculum.

The proposal was supported by 64.3 percent of the Division I chief executives and opposed by 35.7 percent. Division II chief executives favored

academic proposals by percentages ranging from 79.6 percent to 98.7 percent.

In Division III, the basic proposals sponsored by the NCAA Council or the commission were generally favored by more than 90 percent.

A proposal to establish a Division I-AAA classification in football, for those Division I institutions that now play in Division II or III, attracted widespread support.

It was favored by 66.4 percent in Division I, 66.7 percent in Division II and 91.6 percent in Division III.

A proposal dealing with financial aid during the summer for incoming student-athletes received the smallest margin of support.

With half of the nearly 300 schools in Division I responding, 60.3 percent supported the financial aid plan, while 35.7 percent opposed it.

The measure has been offered twice before. The poll was conducted for the commission by Wilford Bailey, former NCAA president, from Auburn University, and John Ryan, president emeritus of Indiana University.

Murphy's law: NFL playoffs expand to accommodate teams

You could have fried an egg on the top of Mike Ditka's head in the middle of the Bears' Monday night mega-embarrassment at the hands of the 49ers. But really, you should have been steamed by game's end?

San Francisco coach George Seifert, of course. His team had just beaten Chicago 52-14 for its sixth straight victory, the best season-ending run in the NFL to close out at 10. But while Ditka and the chastened Bears went home to prepare for this weekend's first round of the playoffs, like the similarly rebuffed Eagles, the only place the 49ers went was home.

As things turned out, San Francisco and Philadelphia scored as well on the regular-season exam as one of the three wild-card entrants (Atlanta) from their own conference, the NFC, and as good or better than all three from the AFC (Kansas City, 10-6; Los Angeles, 9-7; after three consecutive losses; and New York, 8-8). Fat lot of good that did them.

Remember last year when the NFL added a third wild-card slot in each conference under the guise of making sure no deserving teams got left behind? Remember when they added the second wild-card team in 1978 with the same stated purpose? Well, for anybody who still believes the NFL's postseason is strictly about competition, it's a bell in Philadelphia and a bridge in San Francisco that the league's power brokers would like to have you bid on.

From 1978 until this season, a dozen teams have been excluded from the playoffs despite winning at least 10 games. In the first few years following the addition of a second wild-card slot, five of the six teams that were sidelined in 10 games all bailed from the one-peat AFC.

But the pendulum swung the other way in the mid-1980s. The last seven Super Bowl champions all have come from the NFC — which, not coincidentally, also has been the home of all six of the wronged (10-win) teams since 1988. And the NFC isn't getting any weaker: in interconference matchups this year, it enjoyed a 33-19 edge.

But just taking the best teams (regardless of conference) would do damage to the conference identities and you'd lose something that's very important to preserve, Finks said.

"You finish lower, you pick high when you play," he added. "You don't stay down for long." Of course, that's speaking relatively. Indianapolis and Phoenix and Tampa Bay aren't going anywhere anytime soon, but fans in those towns should stay tuned in anyway. Somehow, some way, the NFL will find some excuse in the next few years to bring the playoffs to a town near you.

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Bobcats hold surprising spot in Big Sky

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Even Montana State coach Mick Durham is a bit surprised that his Bobcats have the second best record among the nine Big Sky Conference teams in an 18-team poll of league coaches and media. The Bobcats were picked to finish seventh at best. But that was following a 12-16 season and a 6-10 conference mark in Durham's first year as head coach after serving as an assistant for six years. This season, Durham returned with a year of experience and eight players from the 1990-91 squad — although three are red-shirt freshmen.

"What has surprised me the most is we've played pretty well on the road, with wins over Dayton and St. Louis," Durham said Thursday in a telephone interview. The Bobcats are 6-2, including a 10-3-1 victory over Southern Utah. A team that has beaten Big Sky members Montana and Weber State. Durham scouted Southern Utah's 74-65 victory Dec. 16 over Montana. The Grizzlies' only loss in 11 outings this season. "Montana was very sluggish and very tired, and Cedar City, Utah is a very tough place to play," Durham said. "From our standpoint, I still thought we could beat Southern Utah even after they played UM. There's no question that it helped playing them at home."

Durham said his team has had good luck at Worthington Arena. They are 4-0 at home, 1-2 on the road and 1-0 at neutral sites. And Friday night the Bobcats have the opportunity to avenge one of their road losses. They play Wisconsin-Milwaukee, which edged the Bobcats 77-75 on Dec. 12. "I'm a little concerned that our players think we're playing at home," Durham said. "They press, they're very athletic. They're a team that has a record of being very solid on the road."

Montana State plays its final non-conference game on Monday when it hosts Appalachian State before opening Atlantic City at home Jan. 2 against Idaho State.

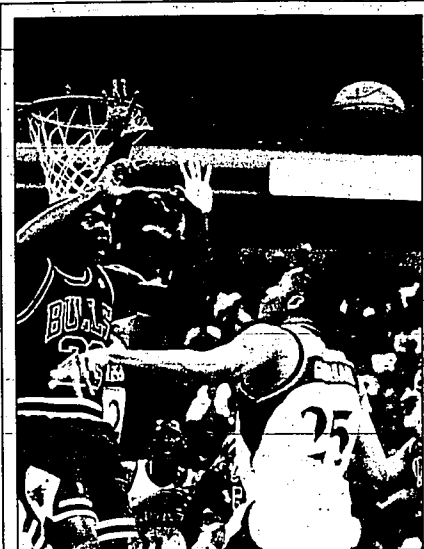
Beathard want Ross a Charger

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Georgia Tech coach Bobby Ross is the leading candidate to replace Dan Henning as the San Diego Chargers' head coach, general manager Bobby Beathard said Thursday.

"Everything points toward Ross," said Beathard, who added that "there's no done deal." "I don't want to get cocky and think we have the guy we want," Beathard said. "There's still a lot of people (that) until I do some more talking I'm not going to have as good a feel as I'd like."

Beathard also said he may name Henning's successor by next Wednesday. MILWAUKEE (AP) — John Williams had 16 points and 15 rebounds as the Cleveland Cavaliers rolled to their fourth straight victory, 111-94 over the Milwaukee Bucks on Thursday night.

Brad Daugherty and John Battle also finished with 16 points for the Cavaliers, who improved to 7-1 when holding their opponents under 100 points. Alvin Robertson led Milwaukee with 20 points and Moses Malone finished with 17. "John Battle and Terrell Brandon each scored at the start of the fourth quarter to give the Cavaliers an 88-72 lead. Detmer wants record-setting career to end with Holiday win

PROVO, Utah (AP)—Little has eluded by Detmer during his unrivaled stint as Brigham Young's quarterback — not the Heisman Trophy, nor 59 NCAA offense and passing records.

Facing his final game in a Cougar jersey, just one game remains unrealized. "You are about to get a winner, and we were fortunate to do that in the regular season," Detmer says in his south Texas draw. "But we haven't won a Holiday Bowl — yet."

Twice before, Detmer has played in the San Diego bowl game, losing 50-39 to Penn State in 1989, and 65-14 to Texas A&M last December.

But the senior from San Antonio is optimistic about his third Holiday Bowl in San Diego Monday against No. 7 Iowa (10-1).

Detmer thinks he's coming off his best year at BYU, even better than 1990s Heisman season.

"I'm more in control of what's going on out there. I'm more of a leader, a coach on the field," he said.

In guiding the Cougars (8-3-1) to their third consecutive Western Athletic Conference championship, Detmer became the NCAA's all-time leader in career passing

yardage (15,031) and TD passes (121). He also was the first collegian to have two 4,000-yard passing seasons.

Behind his arm, BYU ranked second nationally in passing (343.75 yards per game) this year. Individually, Detmer led the NCAA in total offense (333.42 ypg).

But he's happier about having slashed his interceptions from 28 last year to a mere dozen this season. In so doing, Detmer finished 1991 with 35 touchdown passes — just six less than 1990.

"I've been more patient. I realized this year I couldn't force the ball as much," he said.

After the Holiday, Detmer will play in the BYU Bowl, Jan. 4. He will then return to Japan to wrap up a degree in recreation administration, probably by April.

By then, Detmer hopes he'll be hearing from the NFL. He's convinced he can make it, indignantly denying criticism that he's too small — at 6 feet, 185 pounds — to withstand the rigors of professional football.

"I've heard that every step I've made. First, I was too small to play college ball, and now I'm supposed to be too small for pro ball," he barked. "I don't know why they question my toughness. I've never missed a game."

Detmer's only serious injury came against Texas A&M in last year's Holiday Bowl, where he suffered twin shoulder separations. Surgery and therapy helped him fully recover in time to start this season.

"There's no question in my mind that he'll play in the NFL," says coach LaVell Edwards, who has watched former Cougar

passers Jim McMahon and Steve Young go on to pro careers. "He'll be on somebody's roster."

Detmer believes whatever he lacks in size he can make up with his acknowledged ability to read defenses, scan downfield receivers quickly and hit the open part of hands.

He wants a chance to prove he can do the same in the NFL, but knows he first must pay his dues. "I expect to sit and watch and learn and kind of get a feel for things," Detmer said. "Rookies have a tough time playing, especially at quarterback. I'd like to go in and sit and learn for maybe a couple years."

It may not take that long, Edwards believes. "Someone will come out; or get hurt, and then he'll have his chance," the coach said. "I'm excited about what's waiting for him."

Year's unbeaten team could end up No. 2

Unbeaten, untied and uncrowned. For the first time in 16 years, a major college football team could end a perfect season with no win at least a share of the national championship.

Arizona State was the last team with that dubious distinction, going 12-0 in 1975 but finishing second behind once-beaten Oklahoma. This season, it could happen to Miami or Washington, who could end up 12-0 with a victory on New Year's Day.

Miami holds a slim 14-point lead over Washington in The Associated Press writers' poll and the teams are coaches' favorites. So it comes down to what they do on Jan. 1: when Miami meets No. 11 Nebraska in the Orange Bowl and Washington plays No. 4 Michigan in the Rose Bowl.

If one of them wins and the other loses, the winner will be the undisputed champ. But if Miami and Washington both win, there could be a split title for the second straight season. Or one of them could go home with no trophy at all.

"If that happens, it would be a shame," said Washington coach Don James. "If there's two unbeaten teams, they both deserve something."

Then there's Miami's motivation. The Hurricanes know that Washington beat Nebraska in Lincoln 36-21, so they won't hesitate to run up the score to impress voters.

Washington (minus 7) vs. Michigan

Finally, a Rose Bowl that matters. The granddaddy of postseason games hasn't produced a consensus national champ since Southern Cal in 1972, and hasn't had a matchup of top 5 teams since No. 3 Southern Cal beat No. 1 Ohio State 17-16 in 1980.

Now it's got two teams going for

the national title in the most glamorous game on New Year's Day.

Washington breezed through its regular-season schedule, outscoring opponents by an average of 42-9 with a versatile offense and a dominating defense. The defense, anchored by Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy winner Steve Emtman, is No. 2 in the nation against the rush. No. 2 in points allowed, No. 2 in turnover margin and No. 3 against the pass.

Quarterback Billy Joe Hobert, All-American receiver Mario Bailey and talented tailbacks Beno Bryant and Jay Barry led a balanced attack, which averages 232 yards rushing and 240 yards passing per game.

Michigan has been just as impressive as Washington since suffering an embarrassing 51-31 home loss to Florida State on Sept. 28. Since that game, the Wolverines have won eight straight by a combined score of 316-91.

Quarterback Elvis Grbac and Heisman Trophy winner Desmond Howard provide the offensive punch.

The former high school teammates combined on 19 touchdown passes this season, tying an NCAA record for most scores by a passing-receiving duo.

The Wolverines led the Big Ten in rushing and averaged 39.5 points in league games, third-highest in conference history. And their defense, which features Butkus Award winner Erick Anderson, hasn't given up a rushing touchdown in 22 quarters. ... WASHINGTON 24-21 ...

Browns owner gives new coach encouraging word

BEREA, Ohio (AP) — With NFL coaches topling at an astounding rate, Cleveland Browns owner Art Modell said Tuesday he would be around for his head coach who will be around for years.

Despite the Browns' 6-10 record this season, Modell commended rookie coach Bill Belichick for restoring order to a team that went 13 in 1990. "I think Bill Belichick is a winner, and I haven't been this happy with anybody since Blanton Collier," Modell said at a news conference. "I think he did a miraculous job, with the disarray we were in during 1990 and the injuries we had during 1991."

Collier, who took over after Modell fired Paul Brown following the 1962 season, coached the Browns to a 79-38-2 record from 1963-1970.

"I think the end result will be there very soon, sooner than later," Modell said.

The 39-year-old Belichick, who was defensive coordinator for the New York Giants' two Super Bowl championships, signed a five-year contract with the Browns last February. He quickly established a reputation as a workaholic with little

patience for reporters, answering their questions brusquely and cutting off news media interviews after only a few minutes.

— He closed the Browns' practices to the media during the second half of the season, becoming the first coach to do so on a regular basis.

He won over many fans, however, when he gets to know you during the first half of the season and remained in contention for a playoff spot until the 15th game.

Modell said Belichick's relationship with the media would improve over time. "Bill is one of 10 coaches that don't have their practices open including the Redskins, who are on their way to the Super Bowl," Modell said. "He's a warm person. He's a polite person. He comes off sometimes as being brusque and curt, but that's not his true personality. I think he gets to know you and develops confidence in you, things might ease up. Tom Landry was a spinhead. Same thing with Joe Gibbs. Bud Grant, every three years he'd say hello. I think with the passage of time, things will develop in a positive way."

Bucs' leader reported out soon

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Richard Williamson, familiar name to fans on Thursday, waiting to learn his fate as coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers while owner Hugh Culverhouse dangles millions of dollars in the face of a potential successor.

Bill Parcells is Bill Walsh. This time, it's Bill Parcells who tops Culverhouse's wish list.

All Williamson and his staff can do is stand by and watch after Tampa Bay's ninth consecutive losing season. "He's going to fire Richard, and I think he wants to give the assistants as much time as possible to find other jobs," an unidentified source told The Orlando Sentinel.

"Richard must know he's gone."

Culverhouse and the Bucs' front office remained tightlipped about the owner's plans. He reportedly hasn't discussed the coaching search with anyone in the organization, including team president Gay Culverhouse, who released a two-paragraph statement saying a meeting with Williamson took place and would conclude today.

Williamson replaced Ray Perkins in December 1990 and has led the Bucs to a 4-15 record — including a 3-13 mark this season. Attendance dwindled steadily during the year, and some fans not only called for the coach's ouster but also urged

Culverhouse to sell the team.

Parcells, who led the New York Giants to two Super Bowl championships before becoming a commentator for NBC-TV this season, reportedly has been offered a five-year contract worth about \$6.5 million. Culverhouse reportedly would like an answer by this weekend from Parcells, who also is

under consideration for the Green Bay Packers' coaching vacancy.

Williamson, 50, has one season remaining on a two-year contract that will pay him about \$250,000 in 1992. He was not available for comment on Thursday, but told The St. Petersburg Times on Christmas Day that he had not spoken to Culverhouse since last weekend.

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Kansas coach drops from Gophers' hunt

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — University of Kansas football coach Glen Mason has withdrawn as a candidate for the University of Minnesota head football coaching job, Kansas officials said Thursday.

Mason informed University of

Kansas athletic director Bob Frederick of his decision Thursday morning, athletic officials said.

He was among four persons who had been interviewed for the job with the Big Ten school.

Mason had also told Minnesota officials of his withdrawal, said assistant athletic director and sports information director Doug Weaver.

Mason had earlier taken his name off a list of possible Maryland coaches.

Minneapolis Christian coach Jim Wacker, Boise State's Skip Hall and Denver Broncos assistant Mo. Forte met recently in Chicago, with the Minnesota search committee.

Minnesota plans to interview Mark Duffer of Holy Cross, Bill Lewis of East Carolina and Bill Snyder of Kansas State. "We hope to have a coach in a couple days," Bob Stein, law school dean and chairman of the search committee, said Wednesday.

Changing world brings opportunity, risk for INEL

Next month's so-called summit meeting on Idaho nuclear issues seems to gain importance with each passing day.

This week brought news that the federal Office of Management and Budget opposes restarting the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant, an operation that supplies more than 1,700 jobs at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

At the same time, the communist empire that has been America's bogymen for almost half a century has disappeared. Not with the bang of nuclear war but with the whimper of internal disintegration.

Now more than ever, Idaho political leaders and federal energy officials need to cooperate on reassessing INEL's role in the nation's nuclear future.

when he branded the memo as "economic blackmail." As we read the memo, it's less a threat than a realistic review of options.

More significant is the federal budget office's recommendation to restart the chemical plant. The plant has been an important part of INEL's contribution to national security, and the new recommendation re-emphasizes the inevitable shift in INEL's mission.

The world of 1992 and beyond seems unlikely to include an arms race. Who's left to race against? Certainly we'll always need a strong national defense, but nuclear arms production looks increasingly irrelevant.

That prospect means change for INEL and the rest of nation's nuclear complex. And it changes the political discussion between the state and the Energy Department.

Rather than talking about whether this or that new weapons project will be at INEL, much broader questions about INEL's purpose will be on the table.

That's not necessarily bad for Idaho. Environmental cleanup, waste management and alternative energy research hold a potential for job creation that could keep INEL bustling for decades.

(Consider: The chemical plant has an annual budget of \$350 million; a proposed cleanup project for a single waste pit at INEL carries a \$115 million spending proposal.)

There is, of course, risk - risk that as weapons production recedes in importance, the Energy Department will try to turn INEL into nothing more than a national nuclear dump.

The combination of opportunity and risk means Idaho's leaders must be both receptive to creative cooperation and assertive about environmental concerns. That's a delicate balance, and it will be hard to keep if the past year's partisan bickering continues.

The Jan. 22 meeting is an opportunity to begin rebuilding trust and planning for INEL's future. Whether it fulfills that potential or dissolves into political rhetoric is up to the participants.

DOE playing its only ace

December has seen some important events on Idaho National Engineering Laboratory issues.

The Department of Energy went to court to try to quickly overturn the temporary ban on Colorado's nuclear waste shipments. Showing their true colors, Admiral Watkins torpedoed ahead with his "let's waste Idaho" plan, but lost his first appeal.

The DOE and Sens. Craig and Symms desperately want the high-level waste from Colorado inside Idaho because it scientifically and economically stacks the deck for Idaho's version of the New Production Reactor.

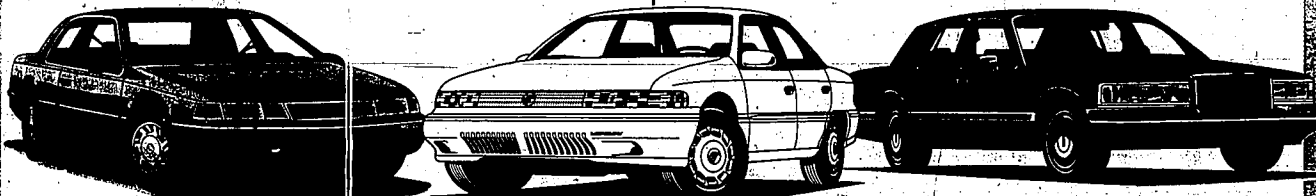

Colorblind artist projects simplicity, order ... Moore or less

Simple is better. It is a tenet artist Robert Moore can work by. But simple is not always easy to come by. "Order is what gives truth to the painting," Moore said. He said he sees that order in the world around him and catches it in his impressionistic paintings.

"It is the order that people relate to," he said. "There are natural color systems and there is natural color order. If I understand that order, almost arbitrarily, I can make a decision about the overall color. From that point on, it is a matter of relationships."

Making the color decision is a step that few other painters face in the same way. Moore, 34, of Burley, is colorblind.

"It has forced me to be strong in the values of painting, dark and light design," Moore said. "The relationship of the dark and light is the most important."

Being colorblind does have advantages for Moore. He said that shapes are the first thing the eye sees in a scene. The colorblindness is actually a help in emphasizing shapes first for him.

"I'm constantly making corrections," Moore explained. "The colors, I do put down, are different from what other artists put down."

"I think that is why my paintings have a market," he said. "A lot of hard things in life can be a blessing."

The mechanics of coping with the colorblindness have been helped by a pair of glasses specifically designed for Moore by a doctor in Los Angeles.

"It gives me the ability to tell what color I'm looking at," Moore said. He still does not see the color but he can tell what color it is.

Moore received his first degree from East Oregon State College in La Grande.

"That certified me to teach in the secondary high school in art," Moore said. "I taught for one year at Minico. I wasn't prepared for it. I had to create my own curriculum. It wasn't good for me or the kids."

Moore went back to school in Pasadena, Calif. at the Art Center College of Design. After finishing at the College of Design, Moore has pursued a career as an artist rather than as a teacher.

"That is a tension inside of me," Moore said. "I should be teaching full time. A career on one hand or helping young lives on the other hand. At this point, the direction I have now is to continue with the art."

Moore shows his work in galleries from Naples, Fla. to Carmel, Calif. and internationally, as well. His paintings can be found at Trails West in Sun Valley and Trailside Gallery in Jackson Hole, Wyo.

"I'm eliminating galleries and turning them down," Moore said. "It simplifies things. The simpler the better. If three galleries can sell everything I do, I can get along."

A gallery's potential is important to Moore.

"If they have a local clientele or collectors across the nation is important," Moore said. "You just don't want to ignore small galleries. But those that have national advertising, as far as my career goes, are important. It's a balance between looking at my needs and small gallery owners' needs."

Moore believes that anyone can learn to paint.

"If you can see or tie your shoes you can learn to draw and paint," Moore said. "The gift is in the desire."

Moore teaches students once a week and does workshops in the future.

"It's a break for me," he said. "It's not a financial need. It's, more or less, to make sure that

I can still talk to people."

Moore paints on location through all kinds of weather. His ATV is equipped with his painting gear on the back.

"I like working from life," he said. Moore copes with cold weather by wearing four layers of clothes. The problem is keeping his paints warm enough to work.

"The paints stiffen up in the cold around zero," Moore said. "I'm trying to heat my palette with a battery pack. That is my next challenge."

Moore's artistic career is a family project. His wife, Rebecca, has become his best critic.

"She can critique my work and see areas that I can't see from working too close on it," Moore said. She helps build the frames and paints them, adds gold leaf, and helps with the shipping.

While Moore hasn't stayed in a garret for his art as the old masters did, he learned to barter his work for the necessities of life. One winter early in his career, he lived on pizza he bartered for his paintings at a local pizzeria.

Today, Moore paints six days a week. Recently, he cleaned out his attic, making a bonfire out of 300 canvases. He kept about 150 paintings.

Simplicity, order and a constant quest for knowledge are an integral part of Moore's life. "Everything that is beautiful has order to it," Moore said. "The wider the base of my understanding, the higher the pyramid can go."

Television news became America's entertainment in '91

If you had to give the year in television a name, you might call it "America's Ugliest Home Videos."

Reality and television intermingled in provocative and frequently unsettling ways in 1991, beginning dramatically in January with the Persian Gulf war.

News, talk and even entertainment shows

— from "Nightline" and "Frontline" to "Donahue," "Entertainment Tonight" and "Major Dad" — found the war unbearable programming, postponing or blowing out hours of their regularly scheduled lineups.

But CNN was the clear TV victor, setting records for itself and scoring an unprecedented public relations coup. The 24-hour news network kept such minute-by-minute tabs on events, some people called it The War Channel. Some weary viewers

syndicated on it all and complained of "CNN Syndrome." Ironically, viewers saw little of the conflict — in part because the Pentagon maintained such a tight reign over the press and because Operation Desert Storm was largely conducted from the air. And still, we

watched: military briefings, reporters donning gas masks, waiting for "Scud" missiles to fall. At times it played like a video game; at other times like the life-and-death drama it was.

TV had no trouble finding or creating stars, of course. CNN's Wolf Blitzer became a household name and the butt of jokes on "The Tonight Show." Female viewers warmed to NBC's Arthur Kent, the so-called "Scud Stud." And, too, there was the commanding presence of Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf and hundreds of stories about local heroes for TV newscasts.

It was a strangely sanitized war, at least on Please see NEWS/B2

DEAR ABBY: May I add a few words to the letter from "One

Hopeless Guy? who decided to chew tobacco instead of smoke it? Let me tell you what "dipping snuff" will do to you:

Byronson longs for own identity

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - Peabo Bryson in black-leather for a searing action-adventure? Not exactly the image of a smooth, soulful balladeer, but the singer was trapped in many guises as he sought success in the music business. Now, though, he wants only to be himself.

For his 1984 Elektra Records single, "Take No Prisoners," which included an Eddie Van Halen solo, Bryson made a video for the title tune in which he was cast as a leather-clad adventurer.

"I'm in a speed boat, women hanging off my arms, explosions going off," he said, laughing, "but we were promoting me as a rock artist, and I could sing the music, but it wasn't me."

What also wasn't him was singing in the style and upper register of Prince on "Let's Apologize," and doing an Eddie Van Halen solo.

Bryson said his Elektra experiences taught him that, "I have to make music without giving up who I am — not for any pop dream or for any promise of greater success."

He signed with Columbia Records last year, hoping to grow as an artist. The result is "Can You Stop the Rain," which already has gone gold and hit No. 1 on the rhythm and blues charts.

With Columbia's promotion campaign, he's anticipated a new visibility, appearing on national television with Arsenio Hall and Johnny Carson, and making the rounds of the morning TV talk-show circuit.

"Everything that was hot at the time they threw on that record," he said, "I didn't write. I didn't produce. It might have been my voice on the record, but it wasn't me."

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Changes at Peabo Bryson's record company have boosted the balladeer's career.

But Bryson, 40, is still trying to catch up with such high-powered balladeers as Luther Vandross and Freddie Jackson.

"I'm making up for lost time, he said. "I never had a hit record, not successful that he has become most people in his category. But Epic records gave him the care and attention needed for that kind of success."

Bryson is also getting a lot of attention because of his duet with Selina Dion of the title track of the animated hit "Beauty and the Beast." This gives him a chance to prove himself after losing out on the theme to another animated movie, "An American Tail."

Bryson recorded the Grammy award-winning song "Somewhere Out There" with Linda Rondstadt but it was James Ingram who ended up on the finished cut.

Bryson said he's been fighting career obstacles since he signed with Capitol Records in 1977.

"The Capitol years produced such hits as "Feel the Fire," "I'm So Into You," "What You Won't Do for Love" with Natalie Cole, and "Tonight I Celebrate My Love," a duet with Robert Flack.

But Capitol didn't spend very much to promote his records, Bryson said, "not because they didn't believe in the music, that's just the way they did business."

Bryson switched to Elektra in 1984 for a chance to reach a wider audience, recording four albums for the label and hitting the Top 10 pop charts with "If Ever You're in My Arms Again." Unhappy with Elektra, he jumped back to Capitol in 1989 before signing with Columbia and making "Can You Stop the Rain."

The album includes such songs as "I Wish You Love" and "You Don't Have to Beg," a warning to women that they don't have to suffer in destructive relationships.

"So often when we go through bad times, we feel like we're the only one who's ever been through it," he said. "But I want them to know that the experience is universal, that I've been there."

Americans got a far more graphic look at police brutality in March when Los Angeles police officers were caught on amateur home video-beating a man named Rodney King. Similar homemade video exposes popped up around the country, including on the West coast at Santa Clara, campus of University of Hartford, where a police officer was captured on videotape slugging a handcuffed student during a riot.

Perhaps as a result of such grim realities, the three major networks cranked their prime-time '91 lineup with escapist sitcoms. Quality dramas — ABC's "thirtysomething" and "China Beach" — were considered "downers," and canceled. Instead of looking ahead, ABC, NBC and CBS burrowed deeper into their own nostalgic past, dredging up old stars (James Garner and Red Fox) old formulas and, particularly in the case of CBS, classic episodes.

But nothing compared with the real thing. And again, in October, it was really that stepped into a world at what cost, we're not sure television from its own boring self (Of the new fall series, only ABC's "Home Improvement" proved to be a hit). This time, it was a congressional hearing in the form of a television soap opera. The Clarence Thomas-Aba Hill show.

The story line? A woman comes forward, years after the fact, and charges a Supreme Court nominee with sexual harassment. America finds itself riveted, once again, to the screen — drawn to sometimes

outrageous dialogue (and profanity) by politicians, and unusual plot twists and cast of characters.

Viewers couldn't get enough of it. If nothing else, the Thomas-Hill confrontation prepared the country for the William Kennedy Smith trial. The trial, carried live on CNN and the fledgling Courtroom Television Network, pushed to new limits the boundaries of what is and is not permissible on television.

A nation of viewers shifted gears easily from talk of sexual harassment to the alleged rape of a Supreme Court nominee. The Kennedy, still the subject of movies and miniseries.

Though the Soviet Union was crumbling and the last American hostages were coming home, the Smith trial dominated the airwaves.

Both Smith and his accuser Patricia Bowman gave graphic testimony about an encounter he called sex and she called rape.

Until recently, Bowman's face and name had been withheld by most television outlets in the country. During the trial, she was heard but not seen, a woman wearing an electronically created mask. This week, in the wake of Smith's acquittal, Bowman took off the mask and spoke on the record with Diane Sawyer, which helped set Prime-time Live's highest-ever ratings.

Which real-life horror show becomes television's next big hit one can only imagine. The problem, especially when you look back on 1991, is: Will we call it news or entertainment?

'Terminator 2' tops money-making list

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Arnold Schwarzenegger's cyborg adventure "Terminator 2: Judgment Day" was the highest grossing film of 1991, with more than \$204 million in ticket sales, according to preliminary figures released Thursday.

"Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves" finished second with a North American theater gross of \$165.5 million. Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc. reported.

Third was "The Silence of the Lambs," followed by "City Slickers" and "Sleeping With the Enemy."

"Terminator 2" is still in theaters, so its receipts will grow slightly before year's end. "The Addams Family" was the only other movie on the company's top 10 list to still be in theaters.

In sixth place was, "The Naked

Gun 2: The Smell of Fear, \$22.5 million; "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles II: The Secret of the Ooze," "The Addams Family," "Backdraft" and "Hot Shots!"

The trade newspaper Daily Variety said this year should be the third best in box-office history.

Despite the success of "Terminator," the film's producer, Caroleco Pictures, is in financial distress. Orion Pictures, the maker of "The Silence of the Lambs," is in bankruptcy court.

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The video industry in '91

Study expects rental, sales to level out, begin decline

If you sense that you've rented and bought fewer videocassettes during the year, you've got a heap of company. In fact, 1991 is going out as the slammed on the brakes, much to the consternation of store owners.

Overall videocassette spending (rental and sales) in 1991 is expected to reach \$10.5 billion, up \$1 billion from 1990. That 10.5 percent increase is no disaster, but it's a far cry from the 30 percent and 40 percent annual increases typical since the mid-1980s.

The stagnation is underscored more dramatically in a recently concluded national ranking of the 100 retail outlets in the business, conducted by Video Store, a retailing magazine that has been gathering such data for more than six years.

This year's Top 100 retailers grossed \$2.3 billion (32 percent of the business realized by video specialty stores), a number that is virtually unchanged from 1990. The phenomenon of no overall growth is a first in this survey, and a rather sobering outcome in view of the general economic doldrums and home video's presumed casket of being "recession-proof."

Observers seeking a home-video weather vane tend to closely follow the fortunes of the largest chain, the 2,000-store Blockbuster outfit. Once again it dominated the year, with estimated revenues of \$1.4 billion and a market share of 19 percent among specialists. If you factor in the array of non-specialists dealing in video (mass merchants, music chains, grocery stores and so on), Blockbuster

still controls 13 percent of the business. In fact, for the second consecutive year it outgrossed the total revenues of the 99 stores ranked beneath it.

But just being big is no guarantee of success. West Coast Video, the second-ranked chain with more than 400 outlets, suffered a decline in revenue to \$120 million, down from \$130 million in 1990. Two other chains in the top 10 also grossed less from year to year, for the first time: RKO Warner Video and Palmer Video.

Considering all 100 retailers listed (representing 4,500 storefronts), fully a third failed to earn more this year than last. To get an idea of how shocking that is, bear in mind that the Top 100 reported a revenue decline.

Why is the bloom off the video rose? The Persian Gulf War and the sickly economy are handy culprits. Store owners also tend to fault Hollywood on the ground that filmmakers are not producing enough "must see" movies. In actuality, though, there's probably no single answer other than the truism that what goes up must come down.

Here are some other findings from the magazine's survey:

- In the first half of 1991, 20 percent of all VCR households did not rent or buy a single tape.
- Customers of stores in the Top 100 rented more than 661 million cassettes, down 4 percent from 1990.

Books capture the power of photography. This season's collections range from lavish retrospectives through social documentary and onto views of our shifting world.

Photography frames year's vast changes

BOSTON — Lavish retrospectives and sweeping views of the changing world loomed large among photography books in 1991, but the year also was distinguished by looks at things ordinary and American.

It was also a year in which the camera, which for so long stopped at the doors of our homes, was shown inching beyond the threshold to take some looks inside.

The establishing shots of this trend appear in "Pleasures and Terrors of Domestic Comfort" (\$22.50, 128 pages), distributed by Abrams for the Museum of Modern Art and based on an exhibit now finishing there.

Peter Galassi, exhibit curator, deserves much credit for eyeing this look home. He has culled from 62 prominent photographers — the majority under the age of 50 — a fascinating montage of kitchen and clutter of people at the kitchen table, in bed, looking for a snack, making meat patties or just hovering about home.

Many of these portraits of the middle-class suggest disillusionment and sadness, and they often appear more as reflections on days past, of the photographers' own youths when family snapshots were so ubiquitous.

Galassi suggests approaches to the photos, but much will be left to the viewer. And appreciation will be enhanced by referring to the larger body of works of this gener-

ation of photographers, who, in sneering at another tradition and idiosyncrasy as they are, have provided a fresh focus and brought photography closer to home.

The most upsetting finds are in "Living With the Enemy" (Aperture, \$24.95, 175 pages), Donna Ferrato's catalog of domestic violence that began 10 years ago when her cozy notions of home were shattered by seeing a man strike his wife. This is one of those compilations almost too much for a book. But Aperture, photography's vanguard publisher, has provided for serious photography and sociology students a work that will long cry out from any shelf.

There is a sense of home in the delightful "Photographs, Annie Leibovitz, 1970-1990" (Harper Collins, \$60, 232 pages), a compilation of her well-known magazine portraits of famous people. Leibovitz opens with a few scenes of her own family, and freely acknowledges the influence of her mother's shutterbug family chronicles.

And in her work for Rolling Stone and Vanity Fair, Leibovitz seems to delight in reversing the roles, in playful manipulations of big people for the camera. In that way, she often reduces them, makes them more like a recalcitrant child forced to pose, and the results are always provocative, be it Roseanne Arnold and her husband wrestling in mud or Donald and Ivana Trump wallowing in gold.

Brown slaps 20th Century Fox with infringement suit

WASHINGTON — James Brown says he loved "The Commitments," this year's hit movie about an Irish soul band, but claims the filmmakers took a piece of his soul without paying for it.

His James Brown Enterprises recently filed a \$3 million suit against 20th Century Fox, Beacon Communications and Alan Parker, respectively the distributor, producer and director of "The Commitments." The suit also seeks to enjoin release of the movie as a home video or in any broadcast.

The suit, filed in U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, charges that the film uses the likeness, music, persona and film clips of Brown "throughout the film, without his permission or consent." The suit also claims that Brown's film clips and personal identity were used to market and promote the film, which has grossed more than \$20 million.

"I thought the idea for the movie was great," said Brown, reached in Atlanta, where he was receiving a NASA award from the crew of the latest shuttle mission (which used "Put a Little Love in Your Heart" as an orbital theme song). "It's a fantastic movie and they did a fantastic job ... showing the music is universal to

everyone. But I thought they just took advantage of a very humble and unknowledgeable man. ... I was being taken; and the things that I would want to sell in the future I would not be able to sell if I continually let this kind of thing happen."

Spokesmen for 20th Century Fox, Beacon Communications and Parker could not be reached for comment. The plot of "The Commitments" seems to have more to do with Wilson Pickett than Brown, but according to Washington attorney Thomas Hart Jr., who represents Brown, in a Nov. 6 letter to 20th

Century Fox executives, Hart cited Parker's use of a performance of "Please Please Please" from the 1965 "T.A.M.I.—Show." In the film, Brown's kinetic performance is used by the hustling manager Rabbit to establish the level of professionalism and "soul" he's looking for from his band of Irish soul revivalists.

Hart's letter notes that "indeed, (Brown's) status as an icon is well-represented in "The Commitments." It is the consummate professional entertainer with that distinctive style of music, signature vocals, drop-dead dancing and signature showmanship in his collapse and resurrection finale. ... Mr. Brown must protect the commercial use of his artistic expression and persona through music, dance and performance."

Hart had asked that Fox et al. immediately cease production, marketing, advertising and distribution of the film and provide an accounting of the movie's expenses, costs and revenues.

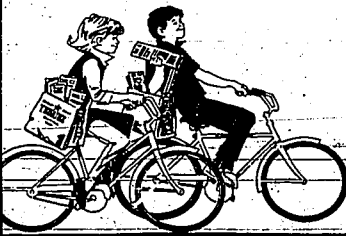
Responding to Hart's letter, 20th Century Fox attorney Marcy S. Morris noted that the "T.A.M.I.—Show" clip was licensed by "The Commitments" from Dick Clark Productions and was one of only two references to Brown in the film.

"Any alleged infringement of Mr. Brown's rights was unintentional," Morris wrote.

Williams takes fast walk down movie aisle

One night last spring, 19-year-old Kim Williams called home to announce, "I'm getting married tomorrow. Wish you could be here."

A prescription for parental heartache? Hardly. Just an excited daughter in Hollywood telling her parents in Westchester, N.Y., what seems about to be shot in "Father of the Bride," the new Disney remake of the 1950 MGM comic confection by the same name.

In its first incarnation, a young Elizabeth Taylor played the sweetly traditional bride-to-be and Spencer Tracy the harumphing father, beset by doubts and mounting wedding costs.

In the remake, Williams plays the very '90s bride, an architecture student who wears sneakers, under her wedding dress and views a blender as a symbol of kitchen slavery. Steve Martin is the father whose fear of losing his daughter leads him to ever-greater heights of hysteria. And Diane Keaton is her mother, determined to stay sane in the face of pre-nuptial chaos.

That's not bad company for a young actress plucked from near anonymity to make her feature film debut. Especially one who nearly did not come to the audition.

"I was in Chicago, at Northwestern University where I was a sophomore, and I heard about this audition from a friend of mine," said

Williams, now a junior majoring in performance studies. Through the audition was an open casting call right in Chicago, she hesitated to try out.

Williams said because she was convinced she was wrong for the part.

"It was the part of a bride, and I was a 22-year-old and I was 19 and looked younger, and marriage was the farthest thing from my mind," she said.

Her audition pieces were also nearly derailed by the EI — or at least by the prospect of negotiating the train system from the suburban university campus to the heart of the city for the casting call.

But, in what we now know was a fateful decision, Williams tackled both the EI and the audition. If what followed does not quite match those old Hollywood stories about being discovered at the counter of Schwab's drugstore, it still has enough serendipity to make many a struggling actress grind her teeth.

A tape of Williams' Chicago audition was viewed by Charles Shyer and Nancy Myers, co-screenwriters and, respectively, director and producer of "Father of the Bride." Shyer and Myers' credits include "Private Benjamin" and "Baby Boom" — both hit comedies about women.

Trying to find the right actress for the Elizabeth Taylor part in "Father of the Bride," Shyer had them stumped. Early on, serious discussions with actress Phoebe Cates ended when the prospective "bride" be-

came pregnant. With Cates out, the director-producer team cased Hollywood for a replacement. "We auditioned hundreds of young women from 18-to-25, and we just couldn't find anybody close to what we were looking for," Myers said in a recent phone interview.

Their "bride," they knew, would have to combine young womanhood with a still evident, almost girlish girliness. The movie's "Annie Banks" is the sort who plays one-on-one basketball with her dad, and who copes with pre-wedding jitters by shooting some baskets the night before her marriage. And when Annie wistfully calls it "my last night as a kid," the audience, as Myers said, has to "buy it."

A surplus of "very sophisticated, sexy" young actresses in Hollywood had led Myers and Shyer to fan out with open casting calls in cities from

San Francisco to London.

"We got tapes from all the different cities," Myers said. "On the Chicago tape, we saw Kim Williams in baggy jeans and a floppy old sweatshirt and no makeup, but adorable. She really seemed to capture something that we were looking for."

Williams is back in school — following a three-month shooting schedule and a publicity tour — studying for final exams. Meanwhile, there are many thoughts about the heady, incredible experience she has had, with some especially fond ones of her co-star Keaton.

"She said to me on the set once that she was going to keep an eye on me," she'd be watching me," Williams said, smiling. "That's what I think of sometimes. Diane Keaton is watching me."

'Father of the Bride'

Script fails in attempt to mix high, low comedy

Spencer Tracy, Joan Bennett and Elizabeth Taylor did a much better "Father of the Bride" in 1950, but the new version, starring Steve Martin, Diane Keaton and Martin Short, has its laughs.

The film's basic flaw is that it mixes high comedy with low comedy, and the melange doesn't quite work.

Martin, doing the role originated by Tracy, plays the father of a 22-year-old woman who arrives home to announce that she is planning to marry a young man she has met in Rome.

Dad is nonplussed. This is his little girl. She is still 7 years old to him, despite the fact that she has been away to college and has been living in Europe for a number of months.

You might expect him to behave otherwise, react normally to the fact that his daughter is now a young lady and rejoice in the fact that she has found a nice guy.

But no, this is his little girl, and rather than accept the young man, the father is openly jealous of him.

Someone should tell him, long before he hears it, that he is behaving like a fool, that his daughter, one he hasn't seen all that much, is old enough to leave the nest.

The situation, however, continues for too long, which is one of the things wrong with this film.

Another is the slapstick. One sequence has the father visit the groom's parents at their home. He snoops through the man's desk and ends up in the family pool when two Dobermans attack him.

Those Dobermans are too much. They would be put away for the day under normal circumstances, but no, we're deeply into silliness here, and anything goes.

When the wedding finally takes place, the father is busy tending the cars that have jammed the road outside his home; another unlikely situation.

Preparing for a daughter's wedding has enormous comic potential.

You don't have to go for the broad brush.

When "Father of the Bride" gets down to the basics of cost and preparation, the film is very funny.

When Martin Short, as the wedding coordinator, appears, the film is hilarious. Of course, we could use subtleties with Short, but that might diminish the comic effect of this portrayal.

He is so good he threatens to take the

film from Martin.

Short doesn't, however, threaten to take the show from Diane Keaton, who plays the mother of the bride. Only a short time ago (1977), this woman won an Academy Award for "Annie Hall." What happened? We'll tell you what happened. Keaton is a fine actress who has had her share of misses in recent years. So here she is, doing what amounts to a supporting role but doing it quite well. The Keaton charm will not be doused.

Kieran Culkin, brother of Macaulay, is younger brother to the bride, played by Kimberly Williams, who may not be the "looker" Taylor was but is good enough to make us believe in her. She is far more rational than her father.

"Father of the Bride," rated PG, was directed by Charles Shyer, his first directorial assignment.

He does quite well. It is the scriptwriters who have failed him.

The new "Father of the Bride" does have sociological significance. Forty-one years ago, you could do a comedy about a formal wedding.

Twenty years ago, you wouldn't have dared.

Today, apparently, you can, again.

Los Angeles (AP) — The expensive pirate movie "Hook," which nearly walked the plank in its first week of release, held onto first place last weekend on the box-office charts.

Director Oliver Stone's controversial assassination work "JFK" performed moderately well in limited release. "Bugsy," starring Warren Beatty, failed to attract capacity crowds.

According to figures released by Entertainment Data Inc., director Steven Spielberg's "Hook," a Pat Pata update starring Robin Williams and Dustin Hoffman, grossed \$9.6 million and has made \$30.7 million to date.

The \$80 million movie premiered to average business of \$12.5 million for first place the weekend before.

"Hook" has little chance of earning \$100 million by the end of the New Year's holiday. TriStar Pictures, the film's maker, had predicted it would pass the milestone by year's end.

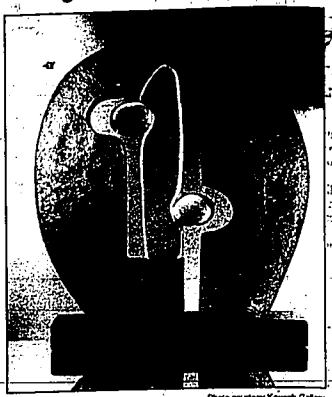

TV movie about homeless faces reality

It's easy — and not at all inappropriate — to knock Hollywood types for being a bad series has stars like Sarah Jessica Parker, Nell Carter, Joan Rivers and B.B. King on three new videos: "Discovering the Hebrew Alphabet," "Passover: Jerusalem Jones and the Lost Arkfoman" and "Kids Sing Israel."

While Duvall isn't the only star in the field, she's essentially the queen. Hollywood is a world of images, but when you put Gene Rowlands and Tyné Dally in a movie directed by Claudia Weill, it's not those images you get. Rather than even chance of connecting with reality, the payoff comes Sunday night in CBS' "Face of a Stranger."

This is not a perfect movie: it has its share of clichés and some odd plotting, but quite often it strikes a chord of deep resonance.

Rowlands plays Pat Foster who has married well, dresses well, eats well and lives well. She has one daughter, a go-getter '80s type named Tina who runs an antique decorating store and seems much more connected to her businessman father than to her mother, whom she treats with a touch of paternalism.

Pat lives in a nice apartment in a Seattle high-rise that comes complete with a kindly doorman. But across the street, a homeless woman has set up housekeeping in a stairwell. Dally plays the woman, variously known as Dolly or Bo Peep.

Despite the efforts of her daughter, husband, and even the doorman to discourage her, Pat takes an interest in this woman. She brings her an umbrella. Then a pair of boots. Before you know it, Dolly is bargaining in an gathering with the parents of Tina's new fiancé. It's just say she doesn't dies right for occasion.

Somewhere along the way, Pat's

husband dies suddenly and she learns the precariousness of her own financial situation that increases her sympathy for Dolly. As Pat moves out of the high-rise to a more modest apartment, she looks for work for the first time in decades, she finds herself almost inexplicably trying to keep up with this homeless woman, which is not an easy task because she has no fixed address.

One major factor that lifts "Face of a Stranger" above the ordinary is that Dolly is not some romantic heroine of the streets, a contemporary equivalent of the noble savage.

No, this Dolly is a pain in the neck. She is demanding and selfish. She

does not trust you and gives you little reason to trust her. This is based on a true story, and it is clearly in part a cautionary tale, telling you know that if you get involved with the homeless, the road you travel will have its share of potholes.

And, beyond that, "Face of a Stranger" is no happily-ever-after fairy tale. Oh, it has one major stroke of melodrama — the new widow immediately meets an old high school boyfriend who's available and interested. The film is not afraid to leave its situations unresolved, the participants in the story older and wiser, perhaps, but equipped with no particular answers to the questions they have faced.

The movie is never able to integrate its two stories of Pat's personal life and her relationship with Dolly. At times the response of the daughter Tina to her mother's situation seems odd, she seems to be just there as a materialistic counterpoint, not as an actual character.

But the performances, as you might expect, are superb. Rowlands is one of our greatest living actors and she handles Pat with a natural subtlety that works even after scenes.

Dally might have the world's most unpleasant voice — it sounds like a bad Katharine Hepburn impersonation at times — but she is able to make Dolly a real, substantial presence. Cynthia Nixon as Tina and Harris Yulin as Pat's new boyfriend are standouts in the supporting cast.

Disney's own label got Ziggy Marley, Paul McCartney, Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen, Bette Midler, Paula Abdul, Barbara Streisand and others

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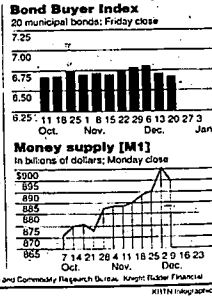
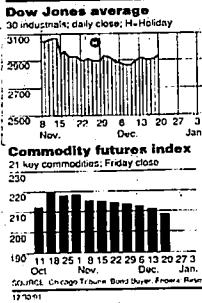

balance you carry from month to month, your credit cards? "It doesn't make sense to borrow at a whopping 18 percent to 22 percent, especially since the interest isn't even deductible anymore," says Esther Berger, a vice president at PaineWebber Inc. who has written a book titled "Money Secrets Men Never Tell Women."

Or, failing that, at least consider shifting the burden to a card with a lower interest rate.
"If you are stuck for a way to get a better savings effort started, many advisers suggest looking for a structured asset that provides a lot of built-in discipline.
One prime candidate is employer-sponsored 401(k) retirement plans, which have grown rapidly in recent years. These offer current tax benefits, and generous upper limits — currently almost \$8,500 — on how much you can contribute each year.

"Starting early certainly makes it easier to save for a comfortable retirement," says the investment firm of Shearson Lehman Bros. Inc.
The traditional first building block of a financial self-improvement effort is a family budget, to enable people at least to know a little better what they make and where it goes.
Budgeting is also where many well-meaning resolves come to grief.
But if "getting organized" is too ambitious a goal, perhaps merely tidying up a bit is a more achievable proposition.

"If you have multiple bank accounts, brokerage accounts, mutual funds and retirement plans, keeping up to date on your investments can be a 'primal scream' experience," says Ms. Berger.
"Consolidate accounts where it makes sense, and review your statements at least quarterly.
"With interest rates declining," she adds, "it's time to take stock of where your money is and how hard it's working for you."

As personal as that decision may be, advisers on matters of personal finance have several suggestions to offer.
For instance, if "cut down on spending" is too broad, how about zeroing in on a target such as the

South saw only one chance, and it involved some trickery. He ruffed his low heart in dummy and called for dummy's club jack, hoping for a silly duck by East. It didn't work. East hopped up smartly with his ace to drop South's king, and South had to concede a diamond to West for one down.

Instead of trying such a crude play, South should have found a legitimate way to success. After unweaving the 3-1 diamond split, South should have cashed his heart king, discarding a club from dummy, and ruffed his last heart. Then the club jack is led from dummy, and East is stuck. If he ducks, South's king makes. If East wins, he must give South a ruff and discard for his 12th trick.

National Championship: Will be the only thorn in Huskies' dream season?

Carrying capacity.

To sailors, it's the amount of weight their ship can hold before it falls into danger of foundering and going under. To geographers, it's the maximum number of people who can subsist on the resources of a given region. To television sports programmers, it's the hours of a single sport that can air before viewers shout, "Enough!" and turn off the set.

It wasn't too long ago that the college bowl season was stretched out over the better part of December. You may remember; starting after the yearly Army-Navy game, there were a couple of games a week, mostly syndicated by such independents as Raycom and Mizlou to UHF channels.

In recent years, though, the endurance of all but the most staunch viewers has been pushed to the limit by cramming more and more games as close to New Year's Day as possible. This year, 15 of the 19 bowls will be played over the four days from Dec. 29 to Jan. 1 — eight of them on New Year's Day.

The number of bowl games had been fairly stable, and manageable, for many years, featuring the Big Four — the Rose Bowl (first played in 1902), the Orange Bowl (1935), the Sugar Bowl (1935), the Cotton Bowl (1937) — and later on, several others.

But beginning with the Fiesta Bowl in 1971, nine new bowls were added to the mix in the 1970s and '80s. And since they've shown up on the scene, there has been a tendency for them to gravitate to New Year's Day.

ON THE COVER: Beno Bryant and the Washington Huskies meet the University of Michigan in the Rose Bowl at 2:45 p.m. on KKKV (Channel 35, Cable 6). The game is one of many college bowl games airing on Wednesday, Jan. 1.

The biggest reason for the crush is the prestige that comes with playing in front of the huge national television audience on New Year's Day. All those viewers translate into exposure for the bowl and the teams invited to play, and that translates into a cash bonanza from the broadcast networks that have come to dominate bowl coverage.

This year, a total of more than \$66 million will be paid out to the 38 schools involved in post-season play. And more than \$54 million of that will be awarded by bowls covered by the three broadcast networks.

The bowl lineup on Wednesday, Jan. 1:

The biggest payday — \$6.5 mil-

lion to each conference — is still the Rose Bowl (airing on ABC), which this year actually has some importance in the national championship picture.

Beno Bryant and the Washington Huskies (11-4; No. 2) could end up No. 1 in the nation if they can beat the Michigan Wolverines (10-1; No. 4), but they'll need the Nebraska Cornhuskers (8-1-1; No. 11) to upset the Miami Hurricanes (10-0; No. 1) in the Orange Bowl (airing on NBC).

The Florida Gators (9-1; No. 3) also have a shot at the title — if they can defeat the Notre Dame Fighting Irish (8-3; No. 18) in the Sugar Bowl (airing on ABC), and if Washington and Miami lose.

Brazilians: 'They'll Do Anything for Money'

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Television game-show host Silvio Santos flashed a sly grin at the contestant, Christiane Maciel, and held an egg above her head. The studio audience gasped. "How about it, Christiane?" Santos coaxed. "I'll give you 900,000 cruzeiros (\$10) if you let me smash this egg on your head."

Maciel, 18, an unemployed maid, refused. "How about 20,000?" said Santos. "No? How about 40,000!" She studied the audience, then nodded, embarrassed.

Down came the egg. The yoke dribbled down her head. The audience went wild.

"Yes, ladies and gentlemen, she'll do anything for money!" boomed Santos, as the band played and Maciel was escorted off under a barrage of laughter.

The scene was typical of "They'll Do Anything for Money," a game show on Brazil's SBT network, the nation's second-largest, that has zoomed to the top of viewer ratings polls.

The program, which pays audience members money to be the butt of pranks, has touched off a ratings battle that has all Brazilian networks thinking up new ways to ridicule contestants.

The new crop of shows has also sparked debate over what's funny and what's simply cruel.

"Brazilians have a certain sadistic streak," said Helio Chiari, the show's stage director. "When we see someone fall, we laugh instead of helping. Our show laps into that black humor."

Some observers say the public's appetite for cruel humor is growing as Brazil's economic crisis worsens.

Rising crime, high inflation and unemployment have "killed confidence in the government and society, making people jaded and cynical," said sociologist Helio Jaguaribe.

"If the economy keeps getting worse, these types of shows will multiply," said Jaguaribe.

"Humor is a mirror of a nation's heart, and ours is now dark."

De Niro opted for practicality in 'Cape Fear'

'90210' is, like, unbelievably popular

LOS ANGELES (AP) — There are T-shirts, calendars, trading cards, backpacks, pillows (yes, pillows) and, come next year, 12-inch dolls from the makers of Barbie.

There are screaming, fainting, panting (in short, hysterical) young women packing shopping malls and jamming phone lines. There are full-page cover spreads in TV Guide, People, Rolling Stone and Entertainment Weekly, not to mention Seventeen and every other pubescent magazine known to teenkind.

The success of Fox Broadcasting Co.'s "Beverly Hills, 90210" is, like, totally beyond belief.

You know the show. The one about those white kids who live in Beverly Hills, Calif., those rich and beautiful kids whose parents let them stay out all hours of the day and night? That show where life is a soap opera and vice versa?

It's the series where teen-agers contemplate the complexities of life, including AIDS, suicide, alcoholic parents, peer pressure and the heart-break of cowlicks.

Since it debuted barely two years as a neglected stepchild of Fox, the show's ratings have nearly doubled. "Beverly Hills, 90210" is the nation's No. 1 show among teen-agers, and a respectable contender in the weekly Nielsen ratings.

"The Brady Bunch" had nothing on this group.

The adulation accorded "Beverly

Hills, 90210" surpasses all other teen shows to date. The frenzy displayed by female fans for the show's two male leads, Jason Priestly and Luke Perry, is more reminiscent of the crying, gnashing and hysterics exhibited by Beate fans.

Such excitement resulted in five girls suffering injuries ranging from sprained ankles to hyperventilation last May when Perry (who plays the James Dean-esque Dylan McKay) made an appearance — or rather, tried to make an appearance — at a suburban Washington shopping mall.

Perry was whisked from the mall hidden in a hamper. Bellevue police Capt. William Baker called the scene "something out of those English soccer games."

What is it that makes this show so popular? Money? Good-looking girls? Well-built guys?

Sure. That and more. "BH 90210" or "90210" or "That Show with All the Numbers in Its Title" (as hip people call it) has the best of both worlds when it comes to teen-age storytelling: Good clothes and deep emotions.

The series' popularity surprises even its creator.

"I don't think anyone expected this much success," said the 30-year-old Darren Starr, who also is the show's supervising producer. "I think it's tapped into a reality about teen-agers' lives. It's not mindless entertainment. They believe it's real."

"I mean, they know it's not," Starr

said, "but they connect to it in a way that they don't to other shows."

That connection, Starr said, is predicated on "a message that the trappings don't change the people. Teen-agers are still going through the same, emotional crises as anyone else."

The show also makes the very relevant point that "the nuclear family is not the norm, anymore," Starr said. "The fact that they're rich is less important than the fact that a lot of the kids come from a single family home."

The plot of "Beverly Hills, 90210" concerns a recently transplanted Minneapolis family whose twin kids (Shannen Doherty and Priestly), now attend fictitious West Beverly High School.

Friends are the ultimately cool Perry (whose dad is in the hammer) and whose mom lives in Hawaii), Tori Spelling, Gabrielle Carteris, Ian Ziering and Brian Austin Green.

How close to reality the TV series is to actual life at Beverly Hills High School (where students really do drive Porsches, Jeeps, have movie-star parents and cellular phones) is something real-life Principal Ben Bushman won't discuss.

"We're really not making any comment about the show," Bushman said. "It doesn't have anything to do with Beverly Hills High School."

Indeed, exteriors for the series' campus have to be filmed at a considerably less affluent school, some 15 miles away.

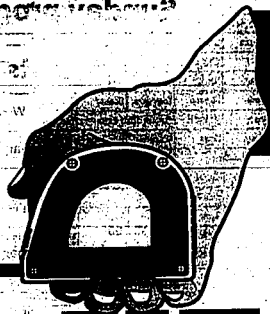
