## B-52s, secret missiles hit initial gulf war targets

WASHINGTON — The Defense Department disclosed Thursday that B-52 bombers attacked Iraq in the opening moments of Operation Desert Storm with a new type of cruise missile whose existence until now had been kept secret.

Seven B-52s from the 2nd Wing of the 8th Air Force, armed with the cruise missiles, took off from Barksdale Air Force Base, La., at 7:35 a.m. EST on Jan. 16, 1991. They fired 35 of the guided missiles at high-priority targets inside Iraq in what the Pentagon called the longest air combat mission in history.

It was known that B-52s dropped tons of gravity bombs on Iraqi ground forces in Kuwait and southern Iraq throughout the

Gulf War, but the Jan. 16 mission was secret. It lasted 35 hours and covered 14,000 miles with four aerial refuelings.

Pete Williams, a Pentagon spokesman, told reporters the B-52s were the first planes launched in the war. Until now it had been believed, based on acknowledged U.S. warplane missions, that F-117A stealth fighter-bombers which attacked downtown Baghdad were the first to kick off the air campaign.

Williams said he could not explain why the U.S. government waited a full year to disclose the B-52s' mission from Barksdale and the use of the new missiles.

Air Force ceremonies were scheduled for today at Barksdale to recognize the men and women who contributed to the historic flight.

## Oust Saddam, U.S. tells Iraq

WASHINGTON — The White House marked the one-year anniversary Thursday of Operation Desert Storm by once again urging the Iraqi people and military to overthrow president Saddam Hussein and pledging support for a new regime.

The message appeared designed to signal to Saddam that the United States was working with Iraqi insurgents to force him out of power, although administration officials would not say so publicly.

"We salute the efforts of thousands of

brave Iraqis who are resisting Saddam's rule both inside and outside of Iraq," said President Bush in a written statement. "The United States reiterates its pledge to the Iraqi people and the Iraqi military that we stand ready to work with a new regime."

Departing from his normal procedure, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater read Bush's statement before live television cameras. An official said the move was designed to reach Saddam personally. "It comes right into the living room of Saddam and puts him on notice," the official said.

## Bill would let 20% of taxpayers block tax hike

BOISE — One-fifth of taxpayers would be able to cancel any property tax increases under legislation introduced Thursday by a senior Republican on the Idaho House of Representatives' tax-writing committee.

Rep. Mike Simpson of Blackfoot also introduced a constitutional amendment that would require any tax increases the Legislature approves to be OK'd by two-thirds of all lawmakers — not just those present and voting.

The tough anti-tax proposals came from the principal backer of last year's Truth-in-Taxation Law, the measure whose passage touched off the current drive to put the 1 Percent Initiative on the November 1992 ballot.

The 1 Percent Initiative, opposed by Simpson and many other elected officials and by most of the state's business and

labor groups, would limit taxes to 1 percent of market value.

Simpson denied his bills were intended to take the steam out of the 1 Percent Initiative.

"I don't even know that the 1 Percent's plan with Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus anyway."

"What we need is a plan that is evenly drawn and is fair," Democrat John Peavey of Carey said, and Democratic Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston declared, "Until we get something that comes out much more even, I intend to vote 'No.'"

## Economy keeps lid on inflation

WASHINGTON — Americans in 1991 enjoyed the second-lowest inflation in 24 years, a beneficial byproduct of the stagnant economy and the end of the Persian Gulf War.

Consumer prices rose 0.3 percent in December and 3.1 percent for the year, the Labor Department said Thursday.

Two-thirds of the improvement over 1990's 6.1 percent rate came from a 7.4 percent drop in energy prices.

The cost of gasoline and fuel oil had skyrocketed in 1990 when Iraq invaded Kuwait and then fell after Saudi Arabia increased its production to compensate.

Food and beverage prices, held back by a sharp drop in meat costs, rose a modest 2.5 percent last year, the smallest increase since 1976.

But even excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, inflation still declined. The so-called "core" rate was 4.4 percent in 1991, down from 5.2 percent in 1990.

The 1991 inflation rate for all consumer items was the best since 1986 when prices rose 1.1 percent and the second lowest since 1967.

The various changes in the month put the index for all consumer items at 137.9. That means a hypothetical selection of goods that cost \$100 in the 1982-84 base period, cost \$137.90 in December 1991. They cost \$133.80 a year earlier.

With most analysts expecting only a weak economic recovery this year, the prospect is good for only moderate inflation, between 3 percent and 3.5 percent.

During last year's economic stall, consumers were reluctant to borrow and spend. That's forced retailers to hold the lid on prices or watch already lackluster sales erode.

Meanwhile, rising unemployment has kept wages — and thus the price of services — up from advancing as strongly as in 1990.

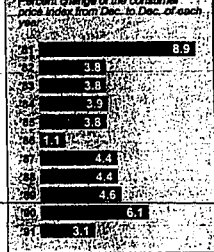
At the White House, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the administration was "especially encouraged by the sharp deceleration in price increases." But, he acknowledged, "Obviously the unfortunate side of it is a good deal of that is because of the economic slowdown."

Fitzwater said the administration would welcome lower interest rates to stimulate the economy, but most economists think the Federal Reserve, following a "big rate cut" just before Christmas, will not reduce rates much further.

Separately, the Labor Department said first-time claims for unemployment insurance fell to 403,000 for the week ending Jan. 4, down from 452,000 the previous week.

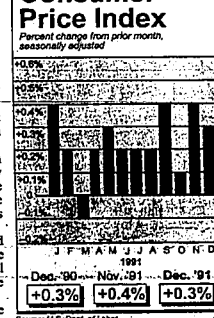

## MVRMC cuts back after ending '91 in red

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley Regional Medical Center finished last year \$1.1 million in the red, and the hospital has begun a round of cost-cutting.

The hospital will trim travel, overtime and advertising expenses, and if the Twin Falls County-owned facility's financial position doesn't improve it will cut back in other areas, Administrator John Bingham said Thursday.

Magic Valley Regional's board of trustees and administration have become concerned about the hospital's financial position in light of the national health-care crisis and the recession, he said.

The hospital will re-examine its procedures for dealing with its contractual customers, including Medicare and Medicaid patients, Bingham said. It will

also cut back on redundant services, he said.

"The trick is not to compromise quality," Bingham said. "The fear is that we'll start making shortcuts. And that is what we have to avoid."

The next step may be a hiring freeze, he said, but no layoffs are planned.

The Salt Lake City accounting firm, Deloitte & Touche performed the audit that showed that Magic Valley Regional's total operating revenue was \$36.3 million for the fiscal year that ended in October.

Last year the hospital had an operating budget deficit of \$138,596. Expenses increased by almost \$5 million from 1990 to 1991 to \$37.4 million, the report said.

When including income from investments in the 1991 budget, the hospital had a \$78,921 gain over expenses, compared to a \$1.9-million increase the

## Panel splits over reapportionment bill

BOISE — A House-passed legislative reapportionment plan was stalled in the Senate State Affairs Committee Thursday after the panel split 5-5 to block a final Senate vote.

The party-line vote had been expected after all House Democrats, joined by four Republicans, opposed the bill a day earlier.

Democrats claimed the 35-district map is weighted in favor of Republicans. The solid Democratic opposition in the House had doomed the

plan with Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus anyway.

"What we need is a plan that is evenly drawn and is fair," Democrat John Peavey of Carey said, and Democratic Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston declared, "Until we get something that comes out much more even, I intend to vote 'No.'"

They maintain the plan puts more people than the targeted per-district number of just under 29,000 in the districts covering traditionally Democratic voters, while traditionally Republican voters would be

to take the steam out of the 1 Percent Initiative.

"I don't even know that the 1 Percent's



going to be on the ballot," he said.

But 1 Percent supporters have bitterly denounced the Truth-in-Taxation Law, which requires taxing districts to take out newspaper ads announcing proposed tax increases and to hold public hearings on them before the increases can take effect.

The idea, Simpson said, is that bringing people into the taxing process will help keep rates down and restrain the growth of government.

That, he said, is also the idea behind his proposed amendment to the Truth-in-Taxation Law.

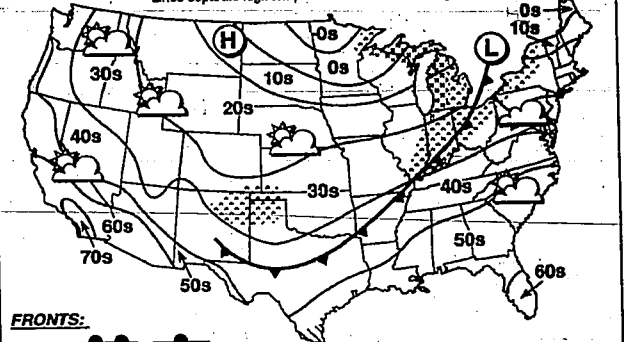

Lines separate high temperature zones for the day.



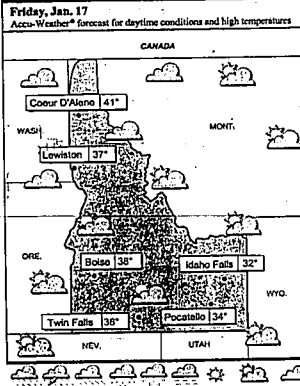

# Path opens to 2-way TV

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission cleared space on the airwaves Thursday for two-way television.

Soon, you should be able to shop, bank, pay bills, take classes and answer surveys through your TV set, no telephone necessary.

The FCC says it will start taking applications in three to six months from companies who can build these systems for each broadcast area.

As early as next year, some consumers could be signing up.

The action taken by the FCC — just the first step in a process that will take years to complete — stems from a petition by TV Answer Inc., of Reston, Va., which has a two-way system ready for market.

It's "the next logical generation of advanced television," said Fernando Moron, president of the firm.

The concept has been under development for many years and used minimally by some cable companies. But the FCC's action provides space near Channel 13 on the public airwaves available for two-way action, which will make it available to more people.

# Police kill burglary suspect, young hostage

PORTLAND (AP) — Police early Thursday shot and killed a burglary suspect and his 12-year-old hostage.

The burglar appeared to be cutting the boy's throat when three officers opened fire, authorities said.

The officers were pulled back by a burglar on a basement as he was leaving pending an investigation, police spokesman Derrick Foxworth said.

Officers responded to a report of a burglary in progress at a northeast Portland home. The man had fled the house by the time police arrived, and a police dog led officers to a nearby home, where a basement window had been forced open, police said.

Police waited to see if the suspect would come outside, then knocked on the door to tell the family to leave the house, Foxworth said.

When he went to awaken her son, Nathan Thomas, Martha McMurray found the man in his bed, holding a 12-inch knife to the boy's throat. She screamed, and officers ran upstairs to the room, Foxworth said.

"The suspect was extremely irrational, extremely angry," Foxworth said.

Officers backed downstairs and continued to talk with the man, Foxworth said.

Two officers outside the house said they thought they had a clear shot at the man through a window, and each fired one shot, Foxworth said. It was unclear whether the man was hit, and three officers in the home moved upstairs, he said.

"At that time, the suspect appeared to be about to start slicing the boy's groin, and the three officers fired — fatally wounding the suspect and also striking the boy," Foxworth said.

any taxing district's registered voters who voted at the district's last election signed up a petition, a referendum on whether the rate increase should be retained or repealed would be held.

But if 20 percent of a district's registered voters who voted at the last election signed up a petition, the rate increase would be canceled outright.

In either case, petitions would have to be filed within 28 days of adoption of the tax hike.

Although Simpson doesn't expect the 20-percent provision would be used, he said it would nonetheless give people an extra weapon against property tax increases.

"Frankly, if you have 20 percent

of the people signing a petition on anything, you probably should really consider whether they're doing the right thing," he said.

Simpson's proposed constitutional amendment would require two-thirds of all the members of the House and the Senate to approve any increases in the personal income tax, corporate income tax and sales tax.

He defended the supermajority requirement, noting that seven other states — Arkansas, California, Delaware, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Dakota — have similar requirements for tax increases.

"It's 50 percent plus one sufficient protection for the 50 percent minus one when you're talking about someone else's pocketbook?" he asked. "Quite simply, this legislation

is intended to make it more difficult to raise taxes."

Rep. Harold Reid of Craigmont, the senior Democrat on the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, said he was concerned that a supermajority requirement would increase pressure on local property taxes.

But Rep. Celia Guld, R-Buhl, who also sits on the Rev and Tax Committee, said Simpson's amendment wouldn't prevent the Legislature from giving cities or counties the power to impose local-option sales or income taxes, so any pressure wouldn't have to fall on property taxes.

Both bills were introduced by Rev and Tax, which will also consider and possibly amend them before any vote by the full House.

Republicans on the panel rejected the idea that they would gain an advantage. But GOP President Pro Tem Michael Crapo of Idaho Falls supported the partisan division over the map could lead to compromise.

"Given the developments of today, we'll have a caucus that will be willing to look at some new approach," Crapo said.

Under a resolution passed by both houses, the Legislature has until Jan. 31 to resolve the reapportionment dispute or it will be turned over to the courts.

Both Sweeney and Crapo said their caucuses would have alternative plans within the next day or two. Sweeney, however, predicted the Democratic proposal would be summarily rejected by the GOP members of the committee.

"When we'll have to sit down and see where we can go," he said.

Lawmakers have been struggling

for the past 10 months to redraw the legislative districts in the state to reflect population shifts during the 1980s and a 1986 voter-mandate to reduce the size of the Legislature from 42 to no more than 35 districts.

But there has been little progress in ending the partisan conflict that Andrus described as a "vicious, counterproductive battle over political power."

It has, however, generated several attempts to give a bipartisan job to an independent panel.

In the House on Thursday, Democrats introduced a proposal to let a panel of retired judges handle reapportionment in the future. In the Senate, Democrats Ron Bettelespacher of Grangeville and Tim Tucker of Portville proposed legislation immediately turning the task over to a citizen's commission that would have until Feb. 21 to resolve the battle.

## Snow, wind, bitter cold chill East, South

Snow, strong wind and bitter cold gripped much of the nation east of the Rockies on Thursday while temperatures dipped into the teens and below in parts of the South.

At midday, snow was falling in parts of New York state, western Pennsylvania, western Michigan, northern and central Minnesota, central and western Montana. Snow changed to freezing rain over west and central Montana, and rain was scattered over the Pacific Northwest.

The mercury fell to 4 in Gilbert, Ark., breaking the record for the date. Shreveport, La., tied a record with 17. Temperatures ranged from the teens to the lower 30s across Georgia.

Freeze warnings were posted for Thursday night in central Florida.

Wind chills in northern Maine ranged from minus 35 to minus 45 degrees.

Wind gusts to 80 mph at Bordeaux, Wyo., in the southeastern corner of the state.

Gale warnings were posted along the Atlantic Coast from South Carolina through New England.

There were no reports of a half inch or more of rain during the six-hour period at 1 p.m. EST. Snowfall during the same period included 5 inches at Helena, Mont., 2 inches at Great Falls, Mont., and an inch at Grand Forks, N.D., and Rochester, Minn.

The low temperature for the Lower 48 states was 21 below zero at International Falls, Minn.

Temperatures at 10 a.m. EST ranged from 30 below zero at Burlington, Vt., and Limestone, Maine, to 77 at Oceanville, Calif., and San Diego.

# U.S., China settle dispute

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and China reached agreement late Thursday in a contentious trade dispute involving protection of American copyrights and patents; negotiators for both sides announced.

The agreement came only hours before the Bush administration had said it would begin imposing tariffs of up to 100 percent on a range of Chinese exports to the United States.

**Nation's AIDS cases exceed 200,000**

ATLANTA — The nation's AIDS epidemic has reached another grim milestone: 200,000 cases, with the second 100,000 coming four times as quickly as the first.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday that the nation's AIDS count now stands at 206,392 cases, with 153,232 deaths. It was August 1989, eight years into the epidemic, when the first 100,000 cases were reported; the next 100,000 cases took just 26 months, the CDC said. If current trends continue, the next 100,000 cases could show even faster as the epidemic continues to spread, said the CDC's Dr. Larry Slutsker, an AIDS epidemiologist.

**Majority leader calls for military cut**

WASHINGTON — Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell called Thursday for cutting \$100 billion from the Pentagon budget and putting aside deficit constraints to heal the ailing economy.

"The cold war is over. It's time to take down the artificial budget walls which prevent us from shifting our priorities from abroad to here at home," Mitchell, D-Maine, said in a speech to the National Press Club. The number of troops, including those abroad, should be reduced, the B-2 Stealth bomber should be eliminated, the Star Wars missile program reduced, and other strategic programs cut in order to invest in education and the infrastructure at home, he said.

**Feds slap fines on financial institutions**

WASHINGTON — Nearly 100 of the nation's top banks and securities firms will pay a total of almost \$5.2 million in fines for widespread inflating of customer orders for quasi-government agency bonds, federal regulators said Thursday.

The companies, which neither admitted nor denied wrongdoing, agreed to halt any violations in the sale of bonds issued by government-sponsored agencies such as the Federal National Mortgage Association, or Fannie Mae.

**Hobbled Hubble still relays data**

ATLANTA — Despite its flaws, the orbiting Hubble Space Telescope has revealed what may be a powerful black hole that is collapsing the core of a distant galaxy, researchers reported Thursday.

The telescope also has surprised researchers by revealing infant versions of globular star clusters believed to be among the oldest objects in the universe.

The black hole, in a galaxy called M87, may be 2 billion to 3 billion times as massive as the sun, suggesting it may be the remains of a dead quasar, said researcher Tod Lauer. Quasars are mysterious and extremely bright objects now seen at the far edges of the universe. The other finding, clusters of young stars within a different galaxy, may bolster the idea that spiral galaxies can merge to form elliptical ones.

**Military recovers body of U-2 pilot**

WASHINGTON — The body of the pilot of an American U-2 spy plane lost at sea near the border separating North and South Korea was recovered Thursday by a South Korean navy vessel, the Pentagon announced.

The pilot was identified as Air Force Capt. James M. McGregor, 33, of Flagstaff, Ariz. He was the only crew member aboard. McGregor was assigned to Detachment 2 of the 9th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, based at Beale Air Force Base, Calif., said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams. Williams said McGregor's detachment was stationed at Osan Air Base in South Korea.

The South Korean navy vessel located the downed spy plane at about 10:45 P.M. EST on Wednesday, Williams said; in the Sea of Japan about 10 miles off the coast of South Korea and about 40 miles south of the demilitarized zone between the Koreas.

Cause of the crash remains under investigation.

**Deadly crashes halt Air Guard flights**

WASHINGTON — The Air National Guard Thursday temporarily suspended all training flights for its fighter, reconnaissance and forward air control planes after a series of crashes that have killed six people.

The suspension, effective immediately, is expected to last through the end of next week, said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams. Air Guard and active-duty Air Force officials will meet next week to discuss ways to "determine the proper course" for resuming flights, Williams said.

**Busing plan mixes needy, affluent kids**

LA CROSSE, Wis. (AP) — Hundreds of elementary school pupils in this Mississippi River community must transfer to new schools next fall so children from different economic backgrounds will be more evenly mixed.

The plan, approved this month by the La Crosse Board of Education, has angered some parents who say reassigning most of the district's 3,800 elementary school pupils won't improve needy children's education.

"The only concern for this 'balance' comes from the administration, and possibly the teachers," said parent Dan Lange. "This is forced, mandatory busing based on economics, and we don't see how that will improve a child's education."

Lange said he is angry his son will be bused to a school five miles away, instead of being allowed to attend his neighborhood school 1.4 miles from home. The boy is among an estimated 2,100 students who will be transferred.

Backers of the plan, to begin next fall in this brewery town of 97,000, say its opponents are isolated. "Opposition is coming from one area, a vocal minority, you could say, are the silk-stocking crowd," Schools Superintendent Richard Swantz said.

Poor students under the proposal are defined as those who qualify for the free school lunch program. No parents of such children have spoken up publicly in favor or opposition to the plan.

National education experts describe the La Crosse plan as a new strategy

to tackle an old problem once answered with race-based busing. But race is not much of an issue here, with the school population including 12 percent Hispanic from Asia, 1 percent black and 1 percent American Indian.

Some experts say three decades of integration in an attempt to improve

education have been inconclusive. "Some has had positive effects, some negative; some, none," University of Chicago researcher James Coleman said.

Coleman said this is the first plan he has come across in his studies of school desegregation that would bus elementary school pupils for socio-economic equality. He warned that one pitfall is that it could reduce involvement of parents whose children will be bused farther from home.

Harvard University professor Gary Orfield said mixing pupils with different lifestyle and economic backgrounds helps poor children, and does not hurt others.

Julie Underwood, a University of Wisconsin-Madison professor and public school law expert, said having rich and poor schools in the same district is a problem throughout the country. She said the La Crosse program is the only one of its kind she knows of.

Statistics show the number of pupils who qualified for the free lunch program range from 4 percent in some La Crosse elementary schools to 70 percent in others, Swantz said.

**Pedophiles urged out of library**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — For two years, members of the North American Man-Boy Love Association met quietly at a city library.

Then came reports about the monthly gatherings. Now, angry parents are demanding the ouster of the group, which advocates legalized sex between men and boys.

"These are really sick people. They should probably be meeting in a mental health facility, if at all. I'm sorry to sound so adamant, but ...," said Principal Judith Kell, whose Potrero Hill Middle School of 720 children is a short walk from the library.

The meetings first came to light

after KRON-TV took an undercover camera to the library Monday night. Newspaper stories followed and by Wednesday, more than 60 people turned out for a meeting at the Potrero Hill branch library, demanding the group's ouster.

"We've certainly been in the hot seat," said community relations librarian Marcia Schneider.

One thing that has set parents on edge is the fact that during the past five years, about a dozen people associated with the group have been arrested on child molesting charges, according to Inspector Tom Eissaman of the San Francisco Police Department's juvenile division.

"We can't really attack the

organization — NAMBLA, because the organization isn't molesting children. It's the individuals. This group attracts individuals who have a sexual interest in children and some of them molest children," Eissaman said.

But library officials say they can't guarantee. "We may think that they are despicable in terms of what they are speaking of or the stands they are taking. However, they do have the right to use our meeting room as a First Amendment issue. It's a public open space," Schneider said.

Meetings have been closely monitored and NAMBLA members do not have to walk through the main library to reach the room, she said.

**Senate aide killed near Capitol**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A young Senate aide was killed Wednesday after being struck by a car in the Capitol Hill area.

The 26-year-old aide, identified as Tom Harris, was walking to work when he was struck by a car on a street near the Capitol.

The car was driven by a man who was not identified. The driver was arrested and charged with manslaughter. Harris was pronounced dead at a hospital.

## B-52s, secret missiles hit initial gulf war targets

WASHINGTON — The Defense Department disclosed Thursday that B-52 bombers attacked Iraq in the opening phase of Operation Desert Storm with a new type of cruise missile whose existence had long been kept secret.  
The B-52s were the first of the strategic bombers to be used in the war. They were armed with the cruise missile developed by Barksdale Air Force Base, La., and launched at 11:30 a.m. EST on Jan. 16. The missiles hit 14 of the guided missile launchers targeted inside Iraq, in what was the longest air combat mission in the war.  
Air Force ceremonies were scheduled for today at Barksdale to recognize the men and women who contributed to the historic flight.

Gulf War, but the Jan. 16 mission was secret. It lasted 35 hours and covered 14,000 miles with four aerial refuelings.  
Pete Williams, a Pentagon spokesman, told reporters the B-52s were the first planes launched in the war. Until now it had been believed, based on acknowledged U.S. warplane missions, that F-117A stealth fighter-bombers which attacked downtown Baghdad were the first to kick off the air campaign.

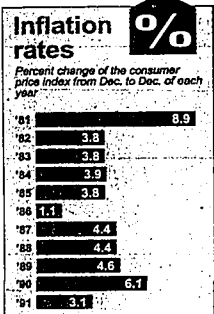

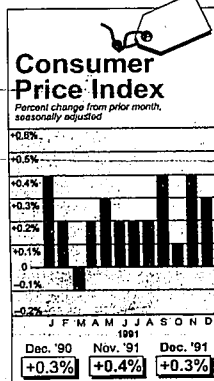
## Economy keeps lid on inflation

WASHINGTON — Americans in 1991 enjoyed the second-lowest inflation in 24 years, a beneficial byproduct of the stagnant economy and the end of the Persian Gulf War.  
Consumer prices rose 0.3 percent in December and 3.1 percent for the year, the Labor Department said Thursday.  
Two-thirds of the improvement over 1990's 6.1 percent rate came from a 7.4 percent drop in energy prices.  
The cost of gasoline and fuel oil had skyrocketed in 1990 when Iraq invaded Kuwait and then fell after Saudi Arabia increased its production to compensate.  
Food and beverage prices, held back by a sharp drop in meat costs, rose a modest 2.5 percent last year, the smallest increase since 1976.  
But even excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, inflation still declined. The so-called core rate was 4.4 percent in 1991, down from 5.2 percent in 1990.  
The 1991 inflation rate for all consumer items was the best since 1986 when prices rose 1.1 percent and the second lowest since 1967.



The various changes in the month put the index for all consumer items at 137.9. That means a hypothetical selection of goods that cost \$100 in the 1982-84 base period, cost \$137.90 in December 1991. They cost \$133.80 a year earlier.  
With most analysts expecting only a weak economic recovery this year, the prospect is good for only moderate inflation, between 3 percent and 3.5 percent.  
During last year's economic stall, consumers were reluctant to borrow and spend. That's forced retailers to hold the lid on prices or watch already lackluster sales erode.  
Meanwhile, rising unemployment has kept wages — and thus the price of services — from advancing as strongly as 1990.  
At the White House, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the administration was "especially encouraged by the sharp deceleration in price increases." But, he acknowledged, "Obviously the unfortunate side of it is a good deal of that is because of the economic slowdown."



Fitzwater said the administration would welcome lower interest rates to stimulate the economy, but most economists think the Federal Reserve, following a big rate cut just before Christmas, will not reduce rates much further.  
Separately, the Labor Department said first-time claims for unemployment insurance fell to 403,000 for the week ending Jan. 4, down from 452,000 the previous week.  
Analysts cautioned against reading too much into weekly fluctuations in the highly volatile

## MVRMC cuts back after ending '91 in red

The hospital will trim travel, overtime and advertising expenses, and if the Twin Falls County-owned facility's financial position doesn't improve it will cut back in other areas. Administrator John Bingham said Thursday.  
Magic Valley Regional's board of trustees and administration have become concerned about the hospital's financial position in light of the national health-care crisis and the recession, he said.  
The hospital will re-examine its procedures for dealing with its contractual customers, including Medicare and Medicaid patients, Bingham said. It will

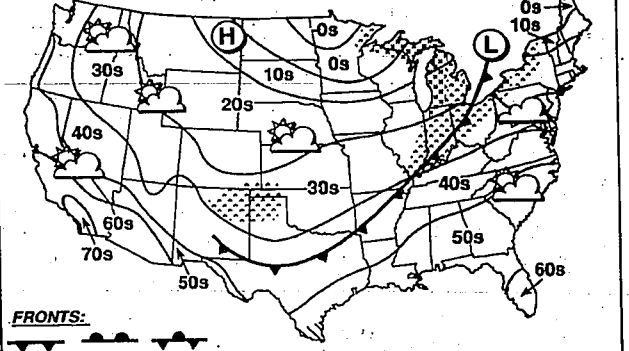
also cut back on redundant services, he said.  
"The trick is not to compromise quality," Bingham said. "The fear is that we'll start making shortcuts. And that is what we have to avoid."  
The next step may be a hiring freeze, he said, but no layoffs are planned.  
The Salt Lake City accounting firm DeRite & Touche performed the audit that showed that Magic Valley Regional's total operating revenue was \$36.3 million for the fiscal year that ended in October.  
Last year the hospital had an operating budget deficit of \$138,596. Expenses increased by almost \$5 million from 1990 to 1991 to \$37.4 million, the report said.

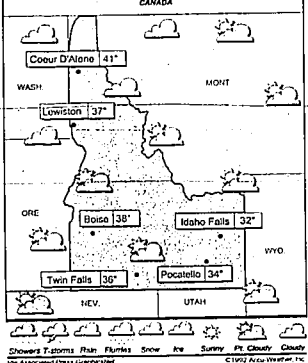

any taxing district's registered voters who voted at the district's last election signed a petition, a referendum on whether the rate increase should be retained or repealed would be held.

But if 20 percent of a district's registered voters who voted at the last election signed such a petition, the increase would be canceled outright.

In either case, petitions would have to be filed within 28 days of adoption of the tax hike.

Although Simpson doesn't expect the 20-percent provision will be used very often, he said it would nonetheless give people an extra weapon "against" property tax increases.

"Frankly, if you have 20 percent

of the people signing a petition on anything, local officials should really consider whether they're doing the right thing," he said.

Simpson's proposed constitutional amendment would require two-thirds of all the members of the House and the Senate to approve any increases in the personal income tax, corporate income tax and sales tax.

He defended the supermajority protection for the 50 percent minus one when you're talking about someone else's pocketbook?" he asked. "Quite simply, this legislation

is intended to make it more difficult to raise taxes.

Rep. Harold Reid of Craigmont, the senior Democrat on the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, said he was concerned that a supermajority requirement would increase pressure on local property taxes.

Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl, who also sits on the Rev and Tax Committee, said Simpson's amendment wouldn't prevent the Legislature from giving cities and counties the power to impose local-option sales or income taxes, so any pressure wouldn't have to fall on property taxes.

for the past 10 months to redraw the legislative districts in the state to reflect population shifts during the 1980s and a 1986 voter-mandate to reduce the size of the Legislature from 42 to no more than 35 districts.

But there has been little progress in ending the partisan conflict that Andrus described as a "vicious, counterproductive battle over political power."

It has, however, generated several attempts to give the reapportionment job to an independent panel.

In the House on Thursday, Democrats introduced a proposal to let a panel of retired judges handle reapportionment in the future. ### Nation's AIDS cases exceed 200,000

ATLANTA — The nation's AIDS epidemic has reached another grim milestone: 200,000 cases, with the second 100,000 coming four times as quickly as the first.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday that the nation's AIDS count now stands at 206,392 cases, with 133,232 deaths. It was August 1989, eight years into the epidemic, when the 100,000th case was reported; the next 100,000 cases took just 26 months, the CDC said. If current trends continue, the next 100,000 cases should come even faster as the epidemic continues to spread, said the CDC's Dr. Larry Slutsker, an AIDS epidemiologist.

### Majority leader calls for military cut

WASHINGTON — Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell called Thursday for cutting \$100 billion from the Pentagon budget and putting aside deficit constraints to heal the ailing economy.

"The cold war is over. It's time to take down the artificial budget walls which prevent us from shifting our priorities from abroad to here at home," Mitchell, D-Maine, said in a speech to the National Press Club. The number of troops, including those abroad, should be reduced, the B-2 Stealth bomber should be eliminated, the Star Wars antimissile program reduced, and other strategic programs cut in order to invest in education and the infrastructure at home, he said.

### Feds slap fines on financial institutions

WASHINGTON — Nearly 100 of the nation's top banks and securities firms will pay a total of almost \$5.2 million in fines for widespread inflating of customer orders for quasi-government agency bonds, federal regulators said Thursday.

The companies, which neither admitted nor denied wrongdoing, agreed to halt any violations in the sale of bonds issued by government-sponsored agencies such as the Federal National Mortgage Association, or Fannie Mae.

### Hobbled Hubble still relays data

ATLANTA — Despite its flaws, the orbiting Hubble Space Telescope has revealed what may be a powerful black hole that is collapsing the core of a distant galaxy, researchers reported Thursday.

The telescope also has surprised researchers by revealing infant versions of globular star clusters believed to be among the oldest objects in the universe.

The black hole, in a galaxy called M87, may be 2 billion to 3 billion times as massive as the sun, suggesting it may be the remains of a dead quasar, said researcher Tod Lauer. Quasars are mysterious and extremely bright objects now seen at the far edges of the universe. The other finding, clusters of young stars within a different galaxy, may bolster the idea that spiral galaxies can merge to form elliptical ones.

### Military recovers body of U-2 pilot

WASHINGTON — The body of the pilot of an American U-2 spy plane lost at sea near the border separating North and South Korea was recovered Thursday by a South Korean navy vessel, the Pentagon announced.

The pilot was identified as Air Force Capt. James M. McGregor, 33, of Flagstaff, Ariz. He was the only crew member aboard.

McGregor was assigned to Detachment 2 of the 9th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, based at Beale Air Force Base, Calif., said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams. Williams said McGregor's detachment was stationed at Osan Air Base in South Korea.

The South Korean navy vessel located the downed spy plane at about 10:45 p.m. EST on Wednesday, Williams said, in the Sea of Japan about 10 miles off the coast of South Korea and about 40 miles south of the demilitarized zone between the Koreans.

Cause of the crash remains under investigation.

### Deadly crashes halt Air Guard flights

WASHINGTON — The Air National Guard Thursday temporarily suspended all training flights for its fighter, reconnaissance and forward air control planes after a series of crashes that have killed six people.

The suspension, effective immediately, is expected to last through the end of next week, said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams.

Air Guard and active-duty Air Force officials will meet next week to discuss ways to "determine the proper course" for resuming flights, Williams said.

LA CROSSE, Wis. (AP) — Hundreds of elementary school pupils in this Mississippi River community must transfer to new schools next fall so children from different economical backgrounds will be more evenly mixed.

The plan, approved this month by the La Crosse Board of Education, has angered some parents who say reassigning most of the district's 3,800 elementary school pupils won't improve needy children's education.

"The only concern for this balance" comes from the administration, and possibly the teachers," said parent Dan Lange. "This is forced, mandatory busing based on economics, and we don't see how that will improve a child's education."

Lange said he is angry his son will be bused to a school five miles away, instead of being allowed to attend his neighborhood school 1.4 miles from home. The boy is among an estimated 2,100 students who will be transferred.

Backers of the plan, to begin next fall in this brewery town of 97,000, say its opponents are isolated. "Opposition is coming from one area, a vocal minority you could sort of say are the silk-stocking crowd," Schools



La Crosse, Wis., students will be among thousands of their classmates who will be assigned to schools based on family income.

Superintendent Richard Swartz said. Poor students under the proposal are defined as those who qualify for the free school lunch program. No parents of such children have spoken up publicly in favor or opposition to the plan.

National education experts describe the La Crosse plan as a new strategy

to tackle an old problem once answered with race-based busing. But race is not much of an issue here, with the school population including 12 percent Hispanic from Asia, 1 percent black and 1 percent American Indian.

Some experts say three decades of integration in an attempt to improve

education have been inconclusive. "Some has had positive effects, some negative, some none," University of Chicago researcher James Coleman said.

Coleman said this is the first plan he has come across in his studies of school desegregation that would bus elementary school pupils for socioeconomic equality. He warned that one pitfall is that it could reduce involvement of parents whose children will be bused farther from home.

Harvard University professor Gary Orfield said mixing pupils with different lifestyle and economic backgrounds helps poor children, and does not hurt others.

Julie Underwood, a University of Wisconsin-Madison professor and public school law expert, said having rich and poor schools in the same district is a problem throughout the country. She said the La Crosse program is the only one of its kind, she knows of.

Statistics show the number of pupils who qualified for the free lunch program range from 4 percent in La Crosse elementary schools to 70 percent in others, Swartz said.

# Pedophiles urged out of library

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — For two years, members of the North American Man-Boy Love Association met quietly at a city library.

Then came reports about the monthly gatherings. Now, angry parents are demanding the ouster of the group, which advocates legalized sex between men and boys.

"These are really sick people. They should probably be meeting in a mental health facility, if at all. I'm sorry to sound so adamant, but ..." said Principal Judith Kell, whose Potrero Hill Middle School of 720 children is a short walk from the library.

The meetings first came to light

after KRON-TV took an undercover camera to the library Monday night. Newspaper stories followed and by Wednesday, more than 60 people turned out for a meeting at the Potrero Hill branch library, demanding the group's ouster.

"We've certainly been in the hot seat," said community relations librarian Marcia Schneider.

One thing that has set parents on edge is the fact that during the past five years, about a dozen people associated with the group have been arrested on child molesting charges, according to Inspector Tom Eisenman of the San Francisco Police Department's juvenile division.

"We can't really attack the

organization NAMBLA because the organization isn't molesting children, it's the individuals. This group attracts individuals who have a sexual interest in children and some of them molest children," Eisenman said.

But library officials say they can't flout constitutional free speech guarantees. "We may think that they are despicable in terms of what they are speaking of or the stands they are taking. However, they do have the right to use our meeting room as a First Amendment issue. It's a public open space," Schneider said.

Meetings have been closely monitored and NAMBLA members do not have to walk through the main library to reach the room, she said.

### Senate aide killed near Capitol

WASHINGTON (AP) — A young Senate aide died Wednesday after being shot less than a block from his Capitol Hill apartment.

Tom Baraco, 25, from Tuscaloosa, Ala., died four days after he was found unconscious in an intersection less than a mile from the Capitol. He had been shot once just below the left ear, and never regained consciousness.

A spokesman for the District of Columbia Police Department said Thursday authorities have no suspects.

# Salvadoran sides sign historic pact

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Salvadoran government and rebel leaders signed a hard-won pact Thursday pitting a formal end to 12 years of civil war that left at least 75,000 people dead.

In San Salvador, church bells clanged and celebrations broke out at news of the signing. In the flag-draped ceremony room at Mexico City's historic Chapultepec Castle, some rebel and government representatives hugged or shook hands, and a few wept.

"The long night of El Salvador is ending," said U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali before the signing. "It is a time to rejoice and celebrate."

The pact calls for a Feb. 1 ceasefire, the eventual dismantling of guerrilla forces, the reduction of the military by half, reforms in the judicial and electoral systems and land reform.

An agreement was reached after nearly two years of United Nations-mediated negotiations.

"Now there must be justice and truth and later this will be crowned with pardon and forgiveness," said Msgr. Arturo Rivera y Damas, the archbishop of San Salvador.

"In this new era we must make an effort in favor of rebuilding the Salvadoran family," said the churchman, who was a key link between the government and the rebels in the early stages of the peace process.

Heads of state of 10 countries attended the signing, seated at a green-covered table.

Red, white and yellow roses decorated the space between the

visiting dignitaries and the signers, who included five rebel leaders and five government representatives headed by Presidency Minister Oscar Santamaría.

After the signing, Santamaría referred to the guerrillas as "countrymen" and predicted "a new stage in the history of the country will be written."

Schafiq Handal, who headed the rebel negotiators, said the rebels had "tried time and time again to try to change the country through pacific means but this way was closed to us."

"We had to pick up arms," he said. "It was necessary and legitimate."

"Long live peace. Long live El Salvador. Long live Mexico," he concluded.

Some were solemn, some smiled as the treaty was passed from signer to signer.

Guests included U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III.

The Salvadoran war is the last major conflict in the region, where instability began in 1979 with the Sandinista uprising against the Somoza dictatorship in Nicaragua and quickly spread to El Salvador.

In Guatemala, a smoldering uprising has continued for more than three years, but it has been at a much lower level than the fighting in El Salvador or Nicaragua.

Negotiations have been held between the government and rebel groups there recently.

Guatemalan President Jorge Serrano, who attended the signing Thursday, said peace could be reached in his country this year.

# Rival block parties celebrate Salvador peace

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Workers got the day off, church bells pealed and technicians wired downtown plazas for sound Thursday in preparation for rival block parties celebrating the arrival of peace.

Much of this small Central American nation was glued to radios or TV sets at midday, witnessing long-distance the signing in Mexico City of a treaty ending 12 years of civil war.

By mid-afternoon, tens of thousands were gathered in or heading toward the central Plaza Civica or Plaza Libertad. The guerrilla Farabundo Martí National Liberation Front and leftist organizations had called supporters to the former.

The rightist government of Alfredo Cristiani, who took part in the treaty signing in Mexico, summoned its followers to Plaza Libertad to

welcome home "the president of peace" Thursday night and dance until dawn.

Though separated by only 100 yards of pavement, the two plazas were worlds apart. The figurative chasm underscored the magnitude of the task of reconciliation awaiting the country.

The conflict killed at least 75,000 people, wounded twice that number and laid waste to much of the nation's productive infrastructure.

By afternoon, the Plaza Civica was jammed with leftists, among them hundreds of guerrilla combatants who'd left their guns and fatigues in the hills.

Several urban guerrilla chiefs were also on hand. The facades of the National Cathedral and the National Palace bordering the square were ablaze with banners and flags hailing the insurgent army.

"Our rifles are the guarantee of the campesino's land," said one banner.

A 45-by-20 foot canvas was painted with a dove, a rainbow and a huge portrait of Farabundo Martí, a Communist who led an uprising here in 1932. It was a bloody failure.

The cathedral and palace are both unoccupied. The palace was severely damaged in a 1986 earthquake; the cathedral has been under construction for years.

Red flags were as abundant as white ones — for peace — or blue-and-white national banners in the Plaza Civica.

# Israeli premier loses majority as 2nd party withdraws

JERUSALEM (AP) — A second right-wing party announced Thursday it was quitting the government, wiping out Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's parliamentary majority and increasing the likelihood of an early election.

The fall of Shamir's government would probably freeze the U.S.-brokered peace talks during the election campaign. A minority government would be unable to claim a popular mandate to make key decisions on the peace process.

"That was, the goal of the Molelet party as well as the right-wing Tehiya party, which announced its resignation Wednesday. Both consider the Arab-Israeli peace talks a recipe for disaster. "We decided to leave the government

immediately," Rehavam Zeevi, leader of Molelet, told the television after a party meeting.

The television predicted the election would be moved up from Nov. 3 to May or June, according to Crisiani.

Tehiya has three seats in Parliament and Molelet two. They must formally tender their resignations at Sunday's Cabinet meeting, and their departure will reduce Shamir's coalition from 64 members to 59 in the 120-member Knesset.

Zeevi, a retired general and a minister without portfolio in Shamir's Cabinet, advocates the mass expulsion of Arabs under Israeli rule.

Before the announcement, Housing Minister Ariel Sharon of Shamir's Likud Party said, "If the government loses its majority in Parliament we have no choice but to hold earlier elections."

# Japanese leader apologizes

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — In his first trip abroad since becoming Japanese prime minister, Kiichi Miyazawa was greeted in South Korea on Thursday with protests over World War II atrocities.

New reports about the enslavement of tens of thousands of young Korean women to service the sexual needs of Japanese troops have renewed demands that Japan atone further for cruelties during its 1910-45 colonial rule of Korea.

At a state dinner, Miyazawa apologized for the "tragic period when Japanese actions inflicted suffering and sorrow."

"As prime minister of Japan, I would like to declare anew my remorse at these deeds and tender my apology to the people of the republic of (South) Korea," he said.

But many South Koreans, angry at what they consider Japanese indifference to historical injustices, are demanding compensation.

One South Korean official,

speaking on condition of anonymity, said President Roh Tae-woo demanded that Japan do more to address the abuses of colonial rule during his talks with Miyazawa. The two were to meet again Friday.

Millions of Koreans were forced to work for Japan as soldiers and laborers during the war.

"Despite close economic and political ties, anti-Japanese sentiment runs deep among the 42 million Koreans."

# Yeltsin defends reforms; others predict troubles

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris Yeltsin, caught in a maelstrom over economic reforms, berated his critics Thursday for resisting changes and said the people were taking the hardships better than lawmakers.

Two weeks after Russia lifted most price controls in a drastic attempt to start conversion to market economy, the shelves of most food stores were bare and buyers could barely afford what was left.

Leaders of the Commonwealth of Independent States met behind closed doors Thursday to debate economic reforms, although Yeltsin said they would concentrate on working out control of the former Soviet military, a dispute that has distracted the republics from their reconstruction.

Earlier Thursday, Yeltsin told the Russian legislature that citizens have taken the reforms courageously. "It is simply blasphemous at this point to speculate over the difficulties connected with the first step of the reform for the sake of petty political aims. The reform isn't irreversible yet, and it won't be very difficult to wreck it."

Conservatives and some officials in the Russian leadership, including Vice President Alexander Rutskoi

and parliament speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov, have criticized Yeltsin for raising prices without breaking up the old system of state-run industries and shops.

That criticism was echoed by economist Abel Aganbeyyan, who gained wide regard as one of the first Soviet critics to push for changing to a market economy.

"I fear that every month of delay in making real changes puts off the settlement of the crisis until 1993," Aganbeyyan told the newspaper Exchange News, according to the Tass news agency.

Aganbeyyan said Russia must reform its banking system and exercise control over the monetary supply before economic health will take hold. Tass said,

"Apparently trying to defuse the criticism, Yeltsin acknowledged troubles — with price — and privatization reforms, and laid blame on everybody from nationalists and black marketers to bureaucrats and ex-Communists."

Store and factory directors "continue to wait for directives from the top, and even when they receive them, they're not in too big a hurry to implement them," he said in the chamber packed with journalists and visiting officials.

## Walsh returns to teach football at Stanford

STANFORD, Calif. — Bill Walsh became the coach at Stanford University on Thursday, declining a chance to rejoin the San Francisco 49ers to return to the scene of his happiest coaching days.

Walsh, 60, wound up at Stanford less than a week after all but signing a contract with the 49ers to become a full-time consultant for the NFL team. Walsh coached two seasons at Stanford before taking over the 49ers in 1979, a team he led to three Super Bowl championships in 10 seasons.

"We have work that we do and I feel that I am still my best relating to people, teaching the game of football to players and the coaches," Walsh said Thursday at Stanford. "I thoroughly enjoy the development of a young athlete and then putting the components together in an equation and then competing."

Walsh replaced Dennis Green, who left Stanford after three seasons to become the head coach of the Minnesota Vikings, and left the 49ers without someone who was expected to play a key role in their player personnel staff.

49ers owner Ed DeBartolo, team President Tom Fitzroy and coach George Seifert attended the news conference introducing Walsh at Stanford, as did running back Roger Craig of the Los

Angelus Raiders who formerly played for the 49ers. "I had a gut feeling that he was going to come back (to Stanford)," said DeBartolo. "Every time I would talk to Bill he would say how much he likes to be around kids. He always talked about his days at Stanford."

"He would have been a big help with our offensive coordinator, but I'll think we'll be all right."

Choosing Stanford over the 49ers was by no means easy for Walsh.

"It was very difficult," Walsh said. "I love the 49ers. I love those men. I care very much for the players, Jerry Rice and Joe Montana, every one of them, but there is a time and a place for those things."

After spending three seasons as a television analyst for NBC, Walsh took over a Stanford team that finished its 1991 season with an 8-4 record after losing 18-17 to Georgia Tech in the Aloha Bowl. The Cardinal tied for second in the Pac-10 with a 6-2 mark.

Walsh said he will tackle every aspect of the job as the Cardinal's head football coach, even overseeing recruiting, a chore he did not enjoy in his first stint at Stanford. He began calling recruits Thursday morning before his introduction.

"The best you are going to get out of is hopefully an adequate replacement for Dennis Green," Walsh said. "Don't expect better. You're not going to get it. Danny has done a masterful job bringing this program from mediocrity to national prominence. ... You've got a replacement for Danny Green who is going to do everything he can to sustain the program, and hopefully ... we can take it another step."

#### Record-setting long jumper wins Jesse Owens Trophy

NEW YORK — Long jumper Mike Powell, who broke Bob Beamon's 23-year-old world record at the World Championships in August, was named winner of the 1992 Jesse Owens International Trophy Award on Thursday. In smashing Beamon's record by two inches with a leap of 29 feet, 4 1/2 inches in Tokyo, Powell also ended Carl Lewis' 10-year, 65-meet winning streak in the long jump.

Powell received 150 votes in the award balloting from an international panel.

Lewis, who set a world record for the 100 meters of 9.86, anchored the U.S. 400-meter relay team to a world record clocking of 37.50 and long-jumped 29 feet three times at the World Championships, and Ukrainian pole vaulter Sergei Bubka, who broke the world record a total of eight times — four indoors and four outdoors — tied for second in the voting with 131 votes each. Hungarian swimmer Tamás Darnyi finished fourth with 19 votes.

#### ISU defensive coach resigns to take job at East Carolina

POCATELLO — Idaho State defensive coordinator Chuck Pagano has resigned to take a defensive coaching job at East Carolina.

Pagano had joined the staff of first-year head coach Brian McNelly less than a month ago, coming from Nevada-Las Vegas.

Pagano has worked at eight different universities since graduating from Wyoming in 1983, including East Carolina where he coached defensive backs in 1989.

## Aussie keeps it going at Hope Classic

BERMUDA DUNES, Calif. — Just as he did a week ago, Steve Elkington is attempting to follow the advice of his mentor, old champion Jack Burke.

"Your clubs don't know what you did last week. Keep it going," Burke told Elkington by telephone Monday, the day after he had scored a playoff victory in the Tournament of Champions.

Elkington took heed, converting a fast finish at Indian Wells into a 66 and a share of the second-round lead Thursday in the five-day, 90-hole Bob Hope Classic.

"It's hard to say, but I'm trying to do something here this week," said Elkington, an Australian native who now resides in Houston on Burke's Champions Golf Club.

"Steve Jones did it a couple of years ago, winning at La Costa and following up here," Elkington recalled.

"I've got that in my mind. I'm playing well now. I've always had a tendency, after I've had a good tournament, to play well the next week."

"It's an attitude thing," he said. "It was very exciting and everything last week. I loved it. But I'm over it now and I want to see if I can do something here."

He paused and smiled.

"I guess I'm getting greedy," he said. Elkington, however, was in danger of falling off the pace until well after the turn at Indian Wells.

He was only one under par for the day, then birdied five of his last six holes and tied Neal Lancaster for the 36-hole lead at 133, 11 under par. Lancaster also had a 66.

And his finish was even stronger than Elkington's. Lancaster played his back nine in 29 and had a string of five birdies and an eagle on the 12th through 17th holes.

"The best I've ever done," said Lancaster, now in his third season on the pro tour. He, too, played Indian Wells, which Elkington called "the easiest course in the rotation."

Arnold Palmer, the 62-year-old, five-time winner of this title, generated some excitement Wednesday when he shot a 66 at that course. But he slipped to a 74 at La Quinta and was seven strokes off the pace at 140.

Gene Sauers, Brian Clair, Nolan Henke and Kenny Perry were a single stroke behind the co-leaders at 134.

Clair, who has yet to win in seven seasons on the PGA Tour, moved up with the best round of the tournament, a 63 at Bermuda Dunes. He did not make a bogey, did not have a "5" on his card and closed his round with a 30-foot eagle putt.

Sauers and Henke each shot a 65 at Indian Wells and Perry had the same at Bermuda Dunes.

Fred Couples continued a string that has seen him finish sixth or better in 14 of his last 17 starts around the world.

Couples shot a 67 at La Quinta and led a

group at 135, two strokes off the pace, that included Mark O'Meara, Tom Lehman, Ted Schulz, Davis Love III, David Peoples and Gil Morgan.

Schulz shot 67 and O'Meara, runner-up in this event a year ago, had a 69. Both were at Bermuda Dunes. Lehman had a 65 at Indian Wells. Love shot 68, Morgan 69 and Peoples 71, all at La Quinta.

All will change courses Friday under the format that has the 128 pro playing one round on each of four desert-resort courses, each day with a different team of amateurs, before the pro-only finish at Bermuda Dunes on Sunday.

Lancaster, Elkington, Sauers and Henke will go to La Quinta Friday. Clair, Perry, O'Meara and Schulz will be at Indian Wells. Love, Couples, Peoples and Morgan will be at PGA West.

## Husky coach has Bryant award all to himself

HOUSTON — Washington coach Don James didn't have to share anything with Miami's Dennis Erickson on Thursday night.

The Football Writers Association of America has presented the coach of the year award since 1957. Since 1986, the award has carried the name of Paul "Bear" Bryant, the former Alabama coach who died of a heart attack in 1983.

## Coach signs 5-year pact to stay in Miami

CORAL GABLES, Fla. — Coach Dennis Erickson, who has repeatedly said he'll stay with the Miami Hurricanes rather than take an NFL job, put the pledge in writing on a new five-year contract Thursday.

Erickson has led the Hurricanes to the national championship in two of his three seasons at Miami. In the past month he has been mentioned as a candidate for nearly every vacant NFL job.

This season, the Hurricanes shared the national championship with Washington. The Huskies were No. 1 in the coaches poll.

"It's important to me to stay here for the players at the University of Miami and to maintain the stability of the program," Erickson said in a statement. "My family and community, and the South Florida community, and hope to remain here a long time."

The new agreement extends Erickson's contract through 1996. Other terms weren't disclosed. Erickson's old contract, which was scheduled to expire in 1995, paid him an estimated \$250,000 a year.

Erickson, 44, has a three-year record of 33-3 at Miami. The team finished 12-0 in 1991.

## Threats of violence may cancel prep game

HOUSTON — A high school basketball game scheduled to be played in secret, now may not be played at all.

The threat of violence unrelated to the athletic rivalry between the neighboring East Texas communities of Corrigan-Camden and Woodville caused school officials to schedule the game in secret at an undisclosed location.

Under the plan announced Wednesday, coaches and players would be told as they

boarded their buses where the games would be played. There would be no spectators.

But that plan changed Thursday.

The host school called us and requested that they bring in their community and so the game has been rescheduled," Woodville Superintendent of Schools Dorman Jackson said. "We will play the game at the end of the season if it has a bearing on the standings."

Tension has mounted since Dec. 27 when confrontations between rival groups

in Corrigan and Woodville resulted in the shooting deaths of Tracy Bernard Foster, 15, a Woodville High School student, and Floyd Samuel Brown Jr., 22, of Woodville.

Kenneth Mitchell, 18, of Corrigan, is free on \$60,000 bond after being charged with two counts of murder.

Jackson sympathized with officials at the host school for withdrawing their invitation.

### A modest idea to help Magic Valley's needy

A Boise church has an idea that the Magic Valley might be able to borrow: a "pocket shelter" for homeless families.

The valley has taken some good steps lately on caring for the homeless among us. Last month the Homeless Shelter Task Force opened the first of 14 apartments in a downtown Twin Falls building. And the Idaho Housing Agency has begun taking applications for 24 subsidized studio apartments, open to all kinds of low-income tenants.

But not all the news is good. Because of United Way allocation cutbacks, the Salvation Army says it may have to put off plans for an emergency shelter. For the same reason, the Red Cross may be unable to help families that are burned out of their homes.

So part of the local need likely will go unmet. Such is the experience of many American cities, where existing homeless shelters often can't house all those who need help.

Boise's All Saints Episcopal Church recently decided to tackle a small part of the problem. On New Year's Day it

opened a "pocket shelter" in a couple of rooms at the church.

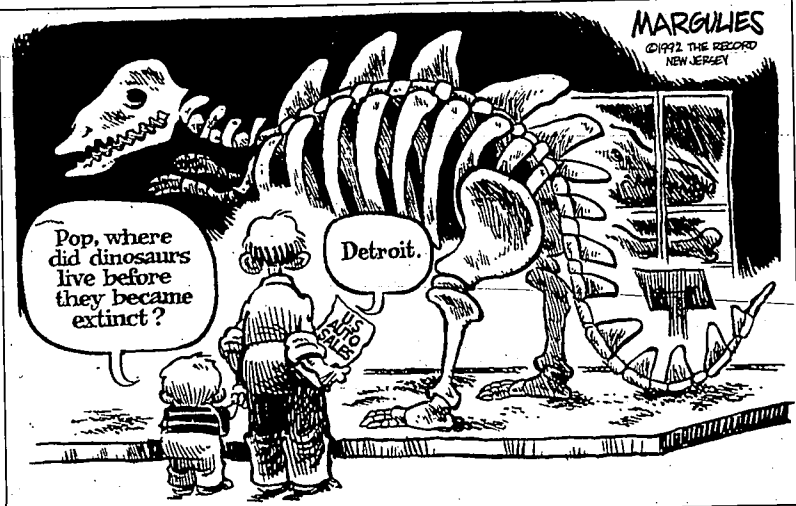
Although the tiny shelter can serve only one family at a time, that's not necessarily bad. The church's rector told the Idaho Statesman newspaper that the shelter's size allows more dignity and privacy for the family being served.

It also gives the church's members an opportunity to put their faith into action. Of 450 members, 100 have volunteered for the shelter. One member or couple stays there every night, and another provides a hot meal.

One of the organizers, Viki Richins, told the Statesman that the shelter represents "the difference between being an admirer of Christ and truly being a follower of Christ."

Could Magic Valley churches do the same thing? We don't see why not. We don't see why every valley community, no matter how small, couldn't have one church that offers short-term shelter to a needy family.

The idea deserves at least a place on the agendas of church governing boards.



## Blame mismanagers for poor economy

NEW YORK - Like many out-of-towners, I enjoy coming to New York: the cultural and financial capital of our country, with so much of the cheerful vulgarity and vitality that made this "the American Century."

As the century nears its end, however, the signs of corporate ruin are everywhere. The pale blue Pan Am sign still lights up the night sky over Park Avenue, as if someone had forgotten to turn out the light.

The pioneer of aerial navigation and transoceanic flight, for whom Charles Lindbergh blazed the way to the Orient in the morning of the air age, seemed the very symbol of Yankee ingenuity and enterprise.

Only the subsidized Imperial Airways of Great Britain and the Deutsche Luft Hansa approached it in size. Fortune magazine wrote 60 years ago: "Careless management and failure to remain competitive brought Pan Am down."

Rockefeller Center - again a name that once symbolized rock-fisted American enterprise - has passed into the hands of the Japanese.

Down on Wall Street, many of the would-be J.P. Morgans of the 1980s have been exposed as criminals and con men who have left nothing but wreckage in their junk-bond-strawed wake.

Over on Sixth is the Time-Life building - the house the late Henry Luce built. The founder of the world's biggest publishing empire coined the phrase "American Century."

His company is now a hollow shell of the journalistic force it once was. Taken over by

a rapacious entertainment conglomerate, led by an ever-avaricious management, the company is debt-ridden and enfeebled, waiting to be bailed out by the Japanese.

Chairman Steven Ross is far richer than many Rockefeller, but he will leave behind the pickled bones of a once-great institution, rather than passing on a great enterprise as did old John D. or Andrew Carnegie - no less greedy or ruthless, perhaps, but builders, not wreckers.

Recently, Time-Life laid off 600 people to save money. But I am told that the entire sum of the salaries saved does not equal Ross' annual remuneration.

The widening gulf between what American workers and their mismanagers make is the wonder of the free-market world and a sure sign that the social contract is being stretched, if not broken.

The inflated salaries of some of America's industrial captains came into the news recently during President Bush's ill-conceived, badly planned and embarrassing Asia trip, when leaders of our automobile companies confronted their lower-paid but competitively superior counterparts in Japan.

No doubt American automakers do have a problem cracking open Japan's insular economy, but one has to sympathize with the head of Honda, who said he couldn't lower the quality of his cars to please Detroit.

What do the Big Three offer the Japanese

but the sickening whines and blustering of Lee Iacocca and his ilk? There is an industry that has done zero market research on what the Japanese might or might not want in a car.

I read that even Japanese gangsters have given up their once-favored Cadillacs for Mercedes-Bentleys.

Presumably it is easier making a getaway in a car with the steering wheel on the right side, which Mercedes is willing to provide and Detroit is not.

The Wall Street Journal recently wrote: "After the party's over, the Big Three chairmen will have to face an unpleasant fact."

For all their considerable improvements during the past decade, their companies still don't consistently turn out cars as appealing - in cost, quality and technology - as the Japanese.

What American auto chiefs really want, of course, is not to face that unpleasant fact. What the Big Three want is to artificially limit Japanese car sales in this country, to the detriment of the American consumer - "international affirmative action," as Jesse Jackson correctly called it.

Is it really the Japanese who are to blame for the tens of thousands of American workers who are being laid off?

Or is it the inefficiency of American managers, whose greed and incompetence have done so much to ring down the curtain on the American Century?

## Before vaccinating kids, gather together the facts

I read Dr. Fineberg's comment on childhood vaccination with great interest. I am a lawyer here in Twin Falls, and I represent more than 50 children and young adults who have suffered very serious injuries due to childhood vaccinations - usually due to the DTP vaccine. Fortunately, these injuries are fairly rare. My clients live all over the United States, but I live in Idaho.

I am afraid that Dr. Fineberg's comments underestimate the dangers posed by childhood vaccinations and what can be done to lessen those dangers. You should know that:

- DTP vaccine (and specifically the "P," or pertussis part of the DTP vaccine) is more dangerous than Dr. Fineberg has acknowledged.
- Dr. Fineberg neglected to mention that one in 650 children will suffer a seizure and that one in 650 children will collapse (the shock condition mentioned in Dr. Fineberg's letter) within 6 weeks of his or her DTP vaccination.
- Dr. Fineberg also failed to quote the most widely recognized figure, one in 310,000, for the frequency of encephalopathy (brain damage) after DTP vaccination.
- Finally, Dr. Fineberg's committee was unable to determine whether the inconceivable cry that 6 million children experience after DTP vaccination was not related to permanent brain damage in some cases.
- Parents need not expose their child to the risk posed by the current DTP vaccination to protect them from these diseases or to get them into school.
- The Food and Drug Administration recently approved the use of a far less dangerous DTP vaccine for children 18 months of age and older. (The manufacturer of this vaccine had not requested permission to use it with younger children.) This vaccine has been used in Japan for 10 years and has proven very safe.

### Curtis R. Webb Reader comment

Parents and pediatricians should urge the manufacturer of the safer DTP vaccine to request and the FDA to approve its use with 2-year and 6-month olds (the age at which DTP vaccine is usually given to children).

The manufacturer of the safer vaccine, Lederle Laboratories, a Division of American Cyanamide Co., One Cyanamide Plaza, Wayne, N.J. 07470, also makes the DTP vaccine being used today. Lederle is very slow to seek permission to sell the safer vaccine for use with 18-month-24-month-olds; perhaps it can be convinced to accelerate its efforts to replace its old vaccine with the safer alternative for younger children.

One of the reasons Lederle has been so slow to improve its vaccine has been the complacency of the medical community. The benefit vaccines have produced for a vast majority have blinded many to the tragic harm they cause to the few.

I agree with Dr. Fineberg's statement that childhood vaccination saves many lives, but we should do anything we can to reduce the risks associated with them.

Finally, Dr. Fineberg's comments are valuable in the recognition of the federal government's program to compensate children who suffer catastrophic reactions to DTP and other childhood vaccines. The program under this program provide for the future needs of vaccine-injured individuals in the form of lump-sum payments or the purchase of an annuity. Many of these awards have been substantial and have allowed the parents of injured children to provide for their future needs.

# Nation Planned Hopkinson execution puts to rest 12-year murder saga

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Wyoming's first execution in 26 years, if carried out Wednesday, will end what has become perhaps the state's most intriguing murder saga but will not bring to justice the actual killers.

If Mark Hopkinson is put to death as scheduled before dawn Wednesday the state will have executed a man "convicted of ordering the deaths of an Evanston attorney and two members of his family, as well as the slaying of an acquaintance set to testify against him."

But since the state first painted the sordid picture against Hopkinson 12 years ago, it has failed to bring to justice the murderers who used cigarettes as pokers on Jeffrey Lynn Green and burned more than 100 holes in his body before shooting him.

Even though the jurors who handed Hopkinson the death sentence were promised that the killers would be behind bars, they are still on the loose.

The case has spent the past dozen years traveling from state district court up the legal runs to the U.S. Supreme Court and back several times. It has consumed reams of paper in appeals and opinions and of late has generated international pleas for clemency.

Ironically, Gerry Spence, the famed Jackson lawyer and special prosecutor who convinced jurors to sentence Hopkinson to death, has urged Gov. Mike Sullivan to spare the 42-year-old Hopkinson.

All the while Hopkinson, like most death row inmates, has maintained his innocence.

But while the justice system has not believed him, a nagging question remains: Who actually killed Jeff Green?

Hopkinson's first death penalty was overturned on appeal to the Wyoming Supreme Court because the jury was given erroneous information about Hopkinson's past criminal record.

Another jury reimposed the death sentence during a second penalty phase hearing in 1982. It was at that second hearing that former Uinta County Sheriff Leonard Hysell said he knew who the killers were and that their arrest was imminent.

Wyoming Public Defender Leonard Munker has said the state either botched the investigation, gave the killers immunity, or is not bringing them forward because their testimony could exonerate Hopkinson.

"We've known where they are and the names for a long time," Munker has maintained. "They haven't been

apprehended, they haven't been caught and everybody sort of misses the point — the point is why?"

Munker contends the prosecutors "don't want the case to unravel on them. Without the killers — they'd just as soon leave that stone unturned. If we did discover who the killers were, we might find there's no link with Hopkinson."

Grand jury testimony, where details of the murder were disclosed, have also been kept secret from the defense and the public. Time and again Munker has pleaded with

judges, both state and federal, to let him review the transcripts, certain that evidence exists that will clear Hopkinson. But the judges, including one who personally reviewed the transcripts at the request of the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, have refused to give Munker access.

Shortly before Hopkinson's last execution date, in September 1990, Munker recalled that the state once told Hopkinson it would drop the death penalty if he would say how Green's murder was arranged and who did it.

"He said take it and stick it where you sit," Munker said, explaining that Hopkinson maintains he had nothing to do with the death, therefore doesn't know the killers.

The Hopkinson case began in August 1977, when the home of Evanston attorney Vincent Vehar was leveled by 30 sticks of dynamite. Killed by the blast were Vehar, his wife, Beverly, and a son, John.

At the time, Hopkinson was jailed in Lompoc, Calif., for ordering Green to plant a bomb in the car of Phoenix lawyer George Mariscal, who apparently owed money to Hopkinson.

On his way to Arizona, Green was pulled over for speeding. Two sticks of dynamite were found in the car and he was arrested, although he went undisciplined. Hopkinson was subsequently arrested and convicted on six felony charges relating to making, transporting and conspiring to detonate an explosive bomb.

In an unusual twist Spence, a friend of the Vehar family, asked and was granted the opportunity to prosecute Hopkinson for the Vehar bombing. In prosecuting Hopkinson the state, behind Spence's lead, succeeded in combining the Vehar and Green murders into one trial at which Spence convinced the jurors that Hopkinson ordered the deaths by telephone from his California prison cell.

He argued that Hopkinson's hatred of Vehar over a dispute to extend city sewer lines to Hopkinson's trailer park spurred him to order the bombing.

## Train robbers steal models

WEST HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — In one fell swoop, thieves made off with 450 model train engines and Gary Clark lost a collection he's doted over for six years.

The missing American Flyer models vanished from Clark's home earlier this month in what may be the nation's biggest such theft, police said.

The burglars who broke into the house knew exactly what they were after, Clark said. Only diesel engines were stolen, which are more valuable than the steam engine mod-

els left behind. The "missing" trains are worth at least \$120,000, he said.

"It feels like my heart's been ripped out," said Clark, a real estate broker who had no theft insurance for the prized collection he said he's worked on practically every day for six years. The models disappeared either Jan. 4 or 5, he said.

"I've heard of maybe \$40,000 worth of stuff being taken, but never this much," said Frank Hare, who estimates train values for the Train Collectors Association's insurance program.

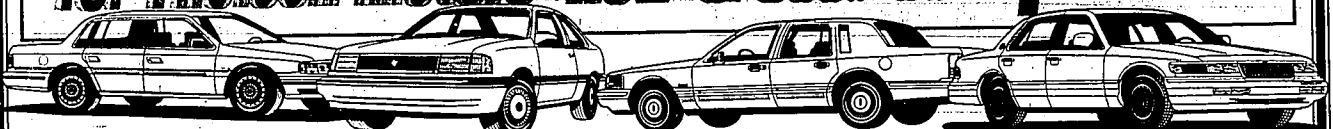

Harbaugh was arrested at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday after an undercover officer bought marijuana from a man at a home in Jerome, Alonzo said.

An undetermined amount of marijuana and cash was seized, he said.

Harbaugh appeared in Magistrate Court Thursday, and was later released after posting \$5,000 bond, Alonzo said. A preliminary hearing should be scheduled within three weeks.

### Sides reach pact on cleaning up waste at Air Force base

**BOISE** — State and federal officials Thursday signed a pact for cleaning up hazardous wastes at Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The agreement among the Air Force, the Environmental Protection Agency and the state of Idaho establishes deadlines for investigation and cleanup of hazardous waste sites at the base.

Wastes identified at the site include jet fuels, lubricants, solvents pesticide residues and organic chemicals, including trichloroethylene found at low levels in several drinking water wells at the base.

### First Security doubles net income in 4th quarter

**SALT LAKE CITY** — First Security Corp. announced Thursday that its 1991 fourth-quarter net income doubled over 1990.

Declining interest rates allowed the Utah bank to slightly increase its interest margin, and several acquisitions have contributed to the increase in income. The bank earned \$15.6 million in 1991's last three months, compared to \$7.8 million in 1990.

First Security's net income for the entire year jumped from \$45.7 million to \$59.6 million. Earnings per share increased 24.3 percent to \$2.51.

It was another eventful year for the bank that merged with the First Bank & Trust in 1990. First Security's various subsidiaries bought three Utah banks, a Utah insurance company, and announced the plans to buy The First National Bank of North Idaho and an Oregon bank.

### Refunds for Gem residents on the way from Mitsubishi

**BOISE** — An anti-trust settlement with Mitsubishi Electronics of America means 244 Idaho residents will get refunds of \$9,820.

Attorney General Larry EchoHawk announced Thursday that the anti-trust suit by all 50 states against the electronics giant was recently settled. Mitsubishi was accused of illegal price setting.

"It's a good settlement," EchoHawk said. "Consumers will get refunds, the state will be reimbursed, and the marketplace will work more freely, as it should."

## Kempthorne: Keep insurance private

**TWIN FALLS** — Republican U.S. Senate candidate Dirk Kempthorne says the federal government has no business in the health-insurance business.

"I don't think a nationalized health-care system is the answer, and I wouldn't support a system that would require employers to provide health insurance to their employees," the Boise mayor said Thursday during a campaign swing through the Magic Valley. "We do need a national health-care strategy, but we don't need a government-run system like those in Canada, Great Britain and Sweden."

The 40-year-old Kempthorne, running against

two other Republicans for the nomination to succeed Sen. Steve Symms, was responding to two Democratic proposals to cover the one-third of Americans who can't afford or obtain health insurance.

Some Democrats back the so-called "pay-or-plant" system, a plan that would force those employers who don't offer insurance to pay a "health-care" tax. Others favor a single-payer program, similar to Canada's government-sponsored cradle-to-grave health coverage.

U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings, the only announced Democratic candidate for the Senate, hasn't taken a position on either plan.

"I would much rather see the federal government work on solving problems like our shortage of physicians here in Idaho,"

Kempthorne said. "By using the system of Medicare reimbursements, it would be possible to attract and keep doctors in small towns in Idaho."

On other issues:

Kempthorne said he supported President Bush's free-trade position with regard to Japan, but would insist on reciprocal guarantees for access to markets.

"I don't think trade barriers benefit anybody," he said. "Americans can outproduce anybody in the world if they get the opportunity to do so, but they can't compete with other countries' treasures. I believe in a level playing field."

He would oppose the congressional effort to overturn the Supreme Court-mandated

## Murtaugh students find extra mileage is a snap with mousetrap

**MURTAUGH** — Two Murtaugh High School students have built a better mousetrap — a mousetrap car, that is.

Brady Adams and Trevor Stanger took some Styrofoam and some plastic wheels and put a new spin on an old idea.

The two juniors took a week designing and building their mousetrap car and recently managed to snare the top spot in "the great mousetrap car race" contest against 50 other high schools in three states.

The car, powered by a mousetrap, traveled nearly twice as far as the next fastest car built by a four female mechanically minded students from Alaska.

The students entered their car in a "Star Step" contest, an instructional program televised by satellite from Spokane, Wash.

The federally funded program is mostly used in smaller, rural schools that may not have the funds to staff applied physics or language courses, according to Rod King, the Murtaugh high science teacher who also serves the mousetrap project.

The series creator, George Miller, challenged students in his viewing audience to build a car powered by a mousetrap.

"When we called our score in, (Miller) said, 'Are you sure? You wouldn't try to put something over on me, would you?'" King recalled.

Adams says the class finally videotaped the car trip and sent the tape to Miller as proof.

Adams says he was pretty much the designer, while Stanger served as his parts man.

The two, though, had their problems as a team at times.

King noted, in fact, that every time Stanger touched the delicate vehicle, it broke.

Adams says he was excited to win the contest mainly because the competition involved so many other schools from Idaho, Washington and Alaska.

He added he pretty much knew the car would win anyway.

"We took the time to do it right," he said. "I had confidence. We had a good feeling about it."

King said he was proud when Miller announced over TV the Murtaugh students had won.

"They worked hard on it, and even stayed after school," King said. "Either one of them could do anything they wanted to do. They have the ability to do that."

The winning vehicle was the one with the highest score after the number of feet it traveled was divided by its weight.

For Adams and Stanger, the design was simple: a piece of shaped Styrofoam with some fins, plastic wheels and, of course, the mousetrap.

Adams and Stanger won in both categories, designing the lightest car (152 grams) that traveled the farthest (up to 43 feet).

The girls from Tanalian School in Alaska came in second with a car that only traveled 26 feet and weighed a few grams more.

There was such a wide variation in scores between the two schools, in fact, that Miller didn't at first believe the Murtaugh car traveled as far as it did.

## Jerome schools prepare alternative for teens who don't fit standard role

**JEROME** — Teen-agers in Jerome are going to get a second shot at their high school diploma.

An Alternate High School for teen parents and dropouts needing additional credits to graduate will open soon in Jerome.

Classes are scheduled in the evening, while course offerings include English, history-American government, math and parenting classes. The new school will open Feb. 3 at the Jerome High School.

"There are all kinds of reasons teen-agers need a night school," said Curriculum Director Karen Fraley. "Some

pregnant teen-age girls choose not to attend school and drop out. Some students have daytime jobs and some need to get additional credits in order to graduate with their peers."

Fraley was instrumental in starting the Magic Valley Alternative High School in Twin Falls.

But Fraley said the school is filled to capacity and has a waiting list.

Currently, 100 students — the school's capacity — are taking classes, while another 112 students' names fill a waiting list, she said.

Meanwhile, Jerome has filled its quota of 20 students at the Magic Valley School.

"Opening a night school in Jerome is a drop-out prevention step," Fraley said.

Eighty percent of pregnant girls drop out of high school, while many young fathers often quit school as well to obtain a job, she said.

Holding night school classes at Jerome High School also will save funds, Fraley said, since there will be no costs for rent, furniture, and most books and materials.

Some teachers also have agreed to instruct the night courses. A teacher for the history-American government course is still required.

Fraley estimated the total cost this year for the Alternative School would be about \$2,000.

State funding could be made available when 12 or more students are enrolled, she said.

## Feds seize Burley bar over drugs

**BURLEY** — Two years after a missing tape syrimed a Cassia County Sheriff's Office probe into drug activity at the Cold Duck Lounge, federal agents have seized the defunct Burley bar and convicted its owner of conspiracy.

Stan Zielsinski, 58, was convicted in U.S. District Court last week on one felony count of conspiracy to deliver cocaine, said Maurice Ellsworth, U.S. Attorney for Idaho.

The jury found Zielsinski innocent of 15 money laundering counts, Ellsworth said. His sentencing is set for March 23.

The Cold Duck Lounge, which sits in the 300 block of East Main Street in Burley, first came under the scrutiny of law enforcement officials two years ago, Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said.

Someone called the local Crime Stoppers telephone number and left a message that enabled authorities to get a search warrant, Crystal said.

Deputies found a small amount of cocaine and \$75,000 in cash inside the bar, and criminal charges were filed against Zielsinski, who owns the bar.

But when the case went to a preliminary hearing, the tape-recorded message left by the anonymous tipster had either been lost or erased, Crystal said.

The case was thrown out because officials could no longer justify the search warrant.

The U.S. Marshal's office stepped in and continued investigating the Cold Duck Lounge, finally gathering enough evidence to file charges.

Since the bar was named in the criminal complaint for which Zielsinski was convicted last week, the U.S. Marshal's office will take control of the bar as soon as a U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge signs the necessary paperwork, Ellsworth said.

That should come at Zielsinski's sentencing in March, Ellsworth said.

When property is seized by law enforcement agencies, it is either put into government service or sold, Ellsworth said. The proceeds are then distributed to all the agencies that assisted in the investigation, he said.

## Blaine County race heats up

**HAILEY** — The winds of change may be blowing through Blaine County.

In what is certain to be a hotly contested race, two contenders have stepped forward to challenge two seasoned incumbents for seats on the Board of Commissioners.

In a race for the District 3 seat that will be decided in the May primary, ex-chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission Leonard Harlig has announced his intention to run in a Democratic ticket against Commission Chairman Alan Reynolds, a longtime Democrat.

# Court transfers Hansen lawsuit to Pocatello

POCATELLO (AP) — A Pocatello couple's lawsuit against an ex-associate of former congressman George Hansen is being moved to Bannock County.

In the civil complaint filed Oct. 9 in Twin Falls District Court, Pocatelloans Scott and Barbi Harris want former Hansen associate Robert Gillespie to repay \$25,000 they invested in a loan program Hansen operated between 1985 and 1990.

Last February, Hansen and associate John Scoresby of Idaho Falls were sued by the Idaho Department of Finance for selling unregistered securities without making proper financial disclosures or being licensed. As part of a judgment, Hansen and Scoresby admitted they were not licensed and that the notes were securities. They also agreed to stop sales and make their best efforts to repay investors.

The Harrises allege that Gillespie represented Hansen in selling them

such a note on June 27, 1990, and should be held liable for its repayment. The suit was filed in Twin Falls to prevent local publicity. But Gillespie's attorney moved the proceedings to Bannock County last month.

Allegations in the Harris suit against Gillespie are similar to those in the state's complaint against Hansen and Scoresby. The Harrises say Gillespie sold them the note without disclosing that new loans were being used to repay earlier investors and that Hansen defaulted on repayment of several previous loans to the program since 1985.

The complaint also charges that Gillespie breached a trust relationship with the Harrises by selling them the promissory note after acting as their longtime insurance agent and serving "in a position of leadership in their local church congregation."

# Media airs strengths, foibles before group

TWIN FALLS — Misspelled words, factual errors, misleading headlines, biased stories, a tendency to publicize dirt — wants and all, the media went before a Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce leadership panel Thursday.

Perhaps the only consensus after an hour-long discussion was that people owe it to themselves to learn about issues. Several Twin Falls-area media executives said that despite complaints about trashy, sensational journalism, the public is getting what it wants.

"Don't let us think for you," KMTV General Manager Lee Wagner told people gathered for the conference.

"Read a couple of newspapers, watch a couple of television broadcasts."

Everybody should read at least one national weekly news magazine, he said.

Former speaker of the Idaho House of Representatives Tom Stivers of Twin Falls agreed. Stivers, who jokingly told the gathering he was

born in Illinois, not in a log cabin but in a manger, said he reads several publications, national and local, for his information.

"Be sure to get the whole spectrum," Stivers said. "I never canceled my subscription to *The Times-News*."

Stivers found himself mentioned in, if not the subject of, numerous *Times-News* editorials during his career in the Idaho House. The media have good and bad values, with their good values approaching 30 percent, he joked.

After listing news-paper stories with misleading headlines and factual and spelling errors, Stivers cautioned the group: "All isn't as it appears in the media."

*Times-News* publisher Stephen Hartgen bemoaned the public's

appetite for "trash media." People watched the Clarence Thomas Supreme Court confirmation hearings on television because they wanted to, Hartgen said.

"That's a reflection not of the media, but of the country," he said. Hartgen said his experience shows that reporters, indeed, are more liberal than the public at large. But that doesn't mean reporters deliberately slant news stories, he said.

Producing news stories under time pressures and space constraints produces a "natural distortion" of news accounts, he said.

Kelly Klaas of KEZJ Radio said the media get a bad rap sometimes, perhaps unjustly. The Thomas hearings are a good example, he said. "If viewing hadn't doubled, the

networks would not have put that on the air. ... The responsibility of what goes on is yours. The people determine what goes on," Klaas said. Wagner said TV stations would run more in-depth programs on issues, but that such programs are poorly watched.

"What does that tell us? It tells us you don't care about the details," he said. As the discussion waned, a man in the audience asked where the public's right to know ends.

He cited the dismantling of President John F. Kennedy's image as an example of the media tearing down a hero.

But Wagner responded by asking how many people want a president who allegedly is having affairs in the White House. No one raised his hand.

"You're asking us to make moral judgments for you," he said. Hartgen said that building up leaders just to tear them down is nothing new and that it is not restricted to the press.

"Why are we doing that as a country, I don't know. But people have been doing it for a couple of thousand years," he said.

### INEL supporters rally in Andrus protest

IDAHO FALLS — About 200 Idaho National Engineering Laboratory supporters rallied in freezing weather to protest Gov. Cecil Andrus' legal battle with the U.S. Department of Energy over nuclear waste.

Andrus walked briskly past the crowd of protesters to address local leaders on education reform Wednesday night, stopping only briefly to talk to reporters. He said he understood why some INEL workers were worried about their jobs, but that many of demonstrators seemed to be "politically motivated."

The hastily arranged rally drew business people, retired scientists and rank-and-file INEL employees. Concern about the impact of the governor's opposition to shipping in more out-of-state waste for storage at the site was summed up by one protester's sign that read, "Future Welfare Recipient."

### EchoHawk receives human rights award

WASHINGTON — Idaho Attorney General Larry EchoHawk has been awarded the Martin Luther King Medal during ceremonies at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

The medal, given for outstanding work in the service of human rights, was presented Wednesday night by university President Stephen Trachtenberg.

Trachtenberg called EchoHawk "a freedom marcher who is forging his own vision of human rights." EchoHawk was recognized as the first Native American attorney general, his work in settling tribal-state disputes and his leadership on children's issues.

Trachtenberg said the awards honor leaders who embody the values of King's ministry, including commitment, conscience, integrity, non-violence and community service.

### Property taken in porno raid returned

GARDEN CITY — A Garden City man has reclaimed property confiscated during a Garden City Police raid last November of alleged pornographic materials at a local motel.

Robert Loya, who lives at the Desert Skies Motel, picked up his property at Garden City City Hall after an agreement Wednesday between city prosecutor Kent Day and Loya's attorney, Garden City Police Chief Willard Heaps said.

Police said after the raid they had seized videotapes containing "sexually explicit material," as well as tape players, televisions and other property.

### Woman who drank blood dies at 109

FORT HALL — Nellie Pabawena drank bracer blood when she was in her early 20s believing the ancient Indian practice would keep her young.

It must have worked. Pabawena died Tuesday at the age of 109. Her age was documented by tribal enrollment records. Death came from complications from a broken hip.

# Resort urges protection for Henry's Fork

BOISE (AP) — A House committee has heard the other side of a development-versus-conservation controversy from an Island Park resort operator.

Janice Brown calls the Henry's Fork of the Snake River the "gem" of Idaho's recreation areas.

Although Idaho has many scenic recreation areas, "The Henry's Fork is our gem," Brown told the House



Resources and Conservation Committee Wednesday afternoon.

She's executive director of the Henry's Fork Foundation, a group of sportsmen and conservationists

working to protect parts of the Henry's Fork Basin in the upper part of eastern Idaho.

Earlier in the week, the committee heard from a pro-development delegation. A hydroelectric generating plant has been proposed for a stretch of Fall River at Hatchery Creek and sponsors said it eventually would give Fremont County \$3 million per year in tax revenue.

It wasn't a hearing, but only pro-development testimony was presented. On Wednesday, Chairman JoAn Wood, R-Rigby, allowed Brown to present an opposing viewpoint.

Brown said there are 3,000 miles of rivers, streams and creeks in the basin and protection is under consideration for only 146 miles. She

said the fishermen and other sportsmen who come to the area because of fishing on the Henry's Fork generate significant income for people of the area.

"Farmers have nothing to fear from protecting the Henry's Fork," she said.

The pro-development speakers contended there is no information to support the conclusion that allowing a dam would hurt fishing. Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg, pressed Brown with the same question Wednesday.

"Fishermen feel any further dewatering of the Henry's Fork is unnecessary and would be detrimental to fish," she said. It would be particularly bad in winter when stream flows already are low.

## Crapo promises to make news service source clear

BOISE (AP) — Senate President Pro Tom Michael Crapo, under fire from Democrats and a fellow Republican, promised on Thursday to make explicit the fact that his public relations operation is clearly a GOP project.

"I am a Republican, and the things I do are done as a Republican and under the auspices of the Republican Party," Crapo said. "I will be making sure it's clear."

Democratic Caucus Chairman John Peavey of Carey accused the Senate leader on Wednesday of trying to mislead the public by labeling the media operation the "Idaho Legislative News Service."

Peavey claimed that name gave the impression the service provided information from the entire Legislature when it actually offers broadcasters around the state only quotes from GOP lawmakers, and mostly from Crapo himself.

And conservative activist Gary Glenn, who is challenging Crapo for the Republican congressional nomination in the 2nd District, quickly jumped on the Democratic complaints. Glenn claimed Crapo was using the news service to rewrite a history of supporting higher taxes, more spending and an increase in his own legislative salary.

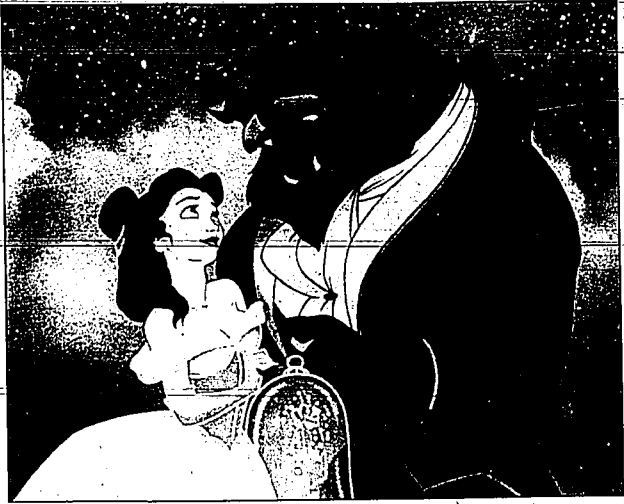

## 'Beauty and the Beast' - sitting pretty for Oscars?

LOS ANGELES (AP) - It dazzled critics. Bowled over children. Brought tears to adults. But can "Beauty and the Beast" impress Oscar voters? No animated film ever has nominated for the best picture Academy Award, and a G-rated movie hasn't won the top prize since 1969. Oscar voters tend to prefer serious, politically correct adult dramas such as "Gandhi," "Dances With Wolves" and "Driving Miss Daisy."

Nevertheless, the Walt Disney Co. — and much of Hollywood — believe the animated tale of a beautiful girl and a charming brute has a shot at the best picture nomination. The nominations will be announced Feb. 19.

Whether or not we get nominated, which is ultimately up to the movie gods, it is really gratifying to have outsiders and critics actually discussing it seriously," said Peter Schneider, senior vice president of Disney's feature animation division.

Ballots for the 64th Academy Awards will be mailed today, and Disney is mounting an intense campaign to win votes. The studio sent the 4,966 voting members of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences a copy of the "Beauty and the Beast" soundtrack and a five-minute videocassette highlighting the movie's wizardry.

In addition, academy members were shown a work-in-progress version of the movie in October. And in trade newspaper advertisements, Disney urged votes for best picture, director, adapted screenplay, art direction, film editing, original score, original song score, original song, sound, sound effects, editing and visual effects.

The actors who provided the voices for the animated characters are ineligible under academy rules.

It is likely one or both of the songs "Beauty and the Beast" and "Be Our Guest" will be nominated; lyricist Howard Ashman and composer Alan Menken previously won the best song Oscar for "Under the Sea" from 1989's "The Little Mermaid."

The factor in favor of "Beauty and the Beast" is 1991 was not considered a great movie year. Favorites for the best picture nomination include "The Silence of the Lambs," "Bugsy," "JFK," "The Prince of Tides," "Thelma and Louise," "The Fisher King,"

"Grand Canyon" and "Fried Green Tomatoes."

Beyond that, though, the film's chances are murky and history is not in its favor.

"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," the first feature-length animated film, received an honorary Oscar in 1938 for "a significant screen innovation." The academy presented a certificate to conductor Leopold Stokowski and his associates in 1942 for "Fantasia." More recently, "Who Framed Roger Rabbit," a live action-animation hybrid, collected six nominations, winning Oscars for editing, visual effects and sound effects editing.

"Oliver!" was the last G-rated best picture winner. There are several theories why animation gets short shrift.

One holds that academy voters — whose largest branch is 1,336 living, breathing, three-dimensional actors — don't like voting for two-dimensional drawings.

Another maintains that animated movies of the last several years — such as "Robin Hood," "The Aristocats," "The Black Cauldron" and "All Dogs Go to Heaven" — were so inept the whole genre was relegated to the backwaters of Hollywood.

There's the academy bias for the "serious" movies.

All the same, there are few limits to the popularity of "Beauty and the Beast."

It already has made more money than any other animated film in its initial release, passing the \$84.7 million record set by "The Little Mermaid." It is on track to sell \$130 million in tickets domestically, company officials say.

Film critics praised "Beauty" and called on Oscar voters to bury it with Academy Award nominations.

Gene Siskel of the syndicated review show "Siskel & Ebert" said, "It's on a level with Broadway stage productions and it's a legitimate candidate for Oscar consideration as best picture of the year."

The Hollywood Foreign Press Association, which will present the 49th Golden Globe Awards on Saturday, nominated "Beauty and the Beast" for best picture. Unlike the Oscars, the Golden Globes separate films into two categories: drama and musical or comedy.

## Theaters hit 15-year low in attendance

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Despite a record holiday box office, the number of movie tickets sold in the United States last year hit a 15-year low of 988 million.

The final box office tally for 1991 was \$4.85 billion, down about 3 percent from the \$5 billion take the previous year, when 1.06 billion tickets were sold, according to figures compiled this week by Daily Variety.

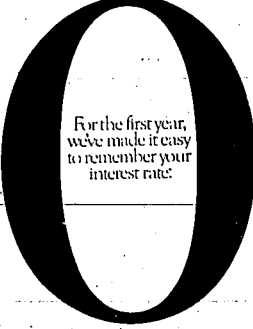
A 5.5 percent rise in the average ticket price helped to minimize the damage and the 1991 dollar receipts were still the third-highest on record. Daily Variety said the national average ticket price rose from \$4.75 in 1990 to \$5.01 last year.

By mid-December, ticket sales were off 10 percent. But the year-end resurgence led by such hits as "Hook" and "Father of the Bride" narrowed the gap to 8 percent.

Daily Variety said several factors could explain the drop in movie attendance, including lower quality films and the recession.

# 'Cradle' brightly thrills, chills

**HOLLYWOOD** As Peyton Flanders, the demented nanny in "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle," Rebecca De Mornay has a picture-perfect prettiness. She's so perfect she's creepy: With her taut alabaster features and blank, lustrous eyes, Peyton is like a sci-fi version of the scientist of her generation. She's trans-gender and soulless; the only time you register a real person ticking behind-the-mask-is-when-her-eyes-glaze-over-in-rapt, crazed-calculation.

## Review

As '90s movies heroines go, the murderous nanny is a great sick joke. She craves the perfect all-American family so much that she's willing to kill for it. Peyton is the right temptress for the post-yuppie generation, the generation that supposedly sacrificed family for career.

In the serpentine way in which she insinuates herself into the placid home life of Michael and Claire Barne (Maie McCoy and Annabella Sciorra), Peyton is like the bad science of her generation, a living nightmare of what can happen to parents who allow their children to slip away from their controls. She's also a parody of those controls — she thinks she can murder her way into the American ideal.

At its best, "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle" is a bright, nasty psychological thriller with a joker up its sleeve. The director, Curtis Hanson, has a wicked flair. He uses the pristine rural Tacoma, Wash., location for their Norman Rockwell-ish overtones, but, like Peyton, everything looks just a little bit too perfect: the picket fences and trimmed lawns and birdhouses are storybook bright. When Peyton is ensconced in the Barne's old, restored, beauty of a house, its higgledy-piggledy charm turns sinister.

This switcheroo is a well-worn

tactic in thrillers ranging from Hitchcock's "Shadow of a Doubt" to Joseph Ruben's "The Stepfather," and "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle" (rated R for violence, sex and language) isn't in their class. Amanda Silver's script doesn't have the anything-will-or-the-devilsiness of those films; from moment to moment it's surprising but the overall design is predictable.

But the film isn't just a well-made TV-style thriller either. It's on to something — the way upwardly mobile parents, hoping to make their lives more professionally fulfilling, unwittingly bring the danger of the unknown into their lives. Peyton's reasons for striking out against Claire are twisted yet comprehensible. She holds Claire responsible for the loss of her own family and child (the reasons for this are spelled out in the film's first 20 minutes) and so her awesome skills as a nanny are

double-edged.

If the movie had demonstrated how the Barnefs could so blithely bring a stranger into the inner sanctum of their lives, it would have been even creepier — and funnier. The movie would have been richer if there had been the suggestion that, perhaps unconsciously, the Barnefs secretly craved this horror.

Is there something reactionary

about that combat? In "Fatal Attraction," to which this film is being compared, the point was: If you fool around you'll pay the piper. In "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle," the fact that both women are, in a sense, victims, doesn't really factor into the fireworks. There's no irony underpinning their torments, and in the end, the audience can feel relieved because a beast has been felled.

But De Mornay's performance is so fiercely felt that she makes you sympathize with the beast. When the Barne's 5-year-old daughter (Madeline Zima) tells Peyton in confidence that a boy at school has threatened her, Peyton's response is heroically cracked: Showing up at the schoolyard, she strides Terminator-style up to the pipsqueak bully and puts the fear of God into him. It's a child fantasy and a parent's fantasy all rolled into one. You've got to admire a woman like that.

# Oliver Stone speaks out in defense of 'JFK'

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Oliver Stone waged a vigorous defense of his controversial film "JFK" as saying his detractors were failing to re-examine history.

In a spirited address before 450 Washington journalists and other luncheon guests at the National Press Club Wednesday, Stone said

the lack of evidence confirming that Lee Harvey Oswald single-handedly assassinated President John F. Kennedy gives his popular movie credence.

"I have been accused by a number of people of producing a distortion of history," Stone began. "This criticism has come at me from all corners, but it ignores that there is no accepted history of these events, and that those terrible times remain the

most undocumented, un-researched, un-agreed upon non-historical period of our history.

Stone said the majority of Americans distrust the Warren Commission's "single gunman" theory that Oswald acted alone in Dallas.

"But that theory, from the day it was issued and put forward in 26 unindexed volumes by the Warren Commission, was never even believed by a majority of Americans," Stone said. "And the number of people who disbelieve it increases each year."

Before a packed room of reporters and other guests, Stone blamed the media for failing to question the commission's findings. "One might ask of the journalists who have suddenly emerged as the defenders of history... what is their sense of history?" Stone asked.

"Will Tom Wicker and Dan Raitner spend their retirement years examining closely the possibility of a second or third gunman? Or will they content themselves with savaging those who do?"

Tom Wicker, a recently retired CBS Times columnist, and Dan Raitner, a former Dallas Times Herald reporter, were both covered Kennedy's assassination, but according to Stone have failed to investigate it fully.

Stone said that as long as critics of the "lone gunman" theory are dismissed by the media establishment as "kooks and cranks" and authors of "obscure books," not much defense of the U.S. government's theory will be needed.

denied by many Washington journalists and politicians, whom Stone has aggressively courted.

Wicker told Time magazine the film is "paranoid and fantastic," full of "wild assertions," and promoting an idea that, "if widely accepted, would be contemptuous of the very constitutional government Mr. Stone's film purports to uphold."

"The film is filled with gross lies," said Susan Lamontagne, spokesperson for Republican Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania, who was a young investigator on the Warren Commission during the late '60s.

"Let them say what they will; but at least start asking questions," Stone said. "There is more truth seeking going on now in Russia than there is in our own country."

He added, "What my film has brought out is that those who talk the most about history have no commitment to it."

# Weak markets hurt Boise paper company

BOISE (AP) — To a great extent, Boise Cascade Corp. relies on the strength of the pulp and paper markets for its performance.

"And those markets let down the Boise-based company in the fourth quarter and all of 1991," officials say. There is room for a little optimism in some sectors, but a complete recovery could be long in coming.

For the fourth quarter, Boise Cascade posted a loss of \$15.8 million, compared with a net income of \$4.8 million in fourth-quarter 1990 and a loss of \$14.3 million in third-quarter 1991.

For the full year of 1991, the company reported a net drop of \$79.5 million. In contrast, it earned an income of \$75.3 million in 1990. Sales for 1991 were \$4 billion, down from \$4.2 billion the year before.

Boise Cascade's paper and paper products segment suffered as prices for newsprint, coated papers and market pulp continued to drop. There were some modest improvements in containerboard and uncoated white paper, however.

The weak national economy continued to plague the office products segment, although sales volume in the fourth quarter was up slightly from year-ago levels. This month, the company expects to complete the sale of its wholesale office products operations for about \$90 million to reduce debt.

Income from the building products segment was up sharply from the fourth quarter of 1990. Although the national housing industry is sluggish, prices for lumber and plywood on average were up higher by concerns about the shortage of timber available from the Pacific Northwest.

Boise Cascade predicts the wood and paper markets' condition will continue to be difficult.

"A strengthening U.S. economy will be required in order to see meaningful improvement in demand for the company's products, and to date, very little sign of that strengthening has been noted. As a result, the company's performance in early 1992 will continue to be disappointing," Boise Cascade officials said in a news release.

## Bank chairman retires after 44 years

BOISE (AP) — The chairman of Key Bank of Idaho has resigned, ending a 44-year career in Idaho banking.

Ted Ellis, 64, who had been chairman since 1988, will continue to hold the title but will no longer be active in managing the bank's affairs. His resignation was effective Dec. 31.

Ellis began his banking career in Rexburg with First Security Bank of Idaho in 1947. In 1977, he joined Key Bank, formerly Idaho Bank and Trust, as executive vice

president. He was promoted to president and chief executive officer in 1981.

Ellis served in that position until three years ago when Albany, N.Y.-based KeyCorp acquired IB&T. Ellis was made chairman at that time.

Ellis helped guide IB&T and Key Bank through the biggest growth in their histories.

IB&T's assets were \$350 million in 1977. Key Bank's assets will exceed \$1 billion later this year when it completes its merger with Valley Bank in eastern Idaho.

## Developer plans 17-story tower

SPOKANE (AP) — A Spokane developer said it would begin construction this month on a 17-story tower at Cavanaugh's Inn at the Park.

The addition would make the inn the largest hotel-convention facility in the Northwest, with a total of 57,000 square feet of meeting and banquet space, hotel general manager Jim Burns said.

The development will include 148 guest rooms and a 15,000-square-foot ballroom that could be

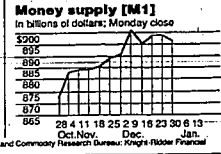
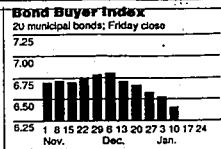
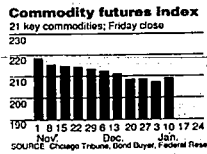
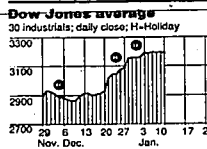
divided into nine individual meeting rooms, officials at Goodale & Barbieri Cos. said.

The project also will have a two-story parking garage.

Don Barbieri, G&B president, said the development will let Spokane seek conventions on a national scale.

The Inn at the Park currently has 266 rooms.

Barbieri declined to say how much the expansion would cost.



## Signetics plant in Orem plans closure at end of '92

OREM, Utah (AP) — Sunnyvale, Calif.-based Signetics Co. will close its Orem plant by the end of the year, ending a 26-year presence in the Utah County community.

Signetics officials said the plant's 980 employees will be offered retraining, job placement and in some cases transfers to company operations outside Utah.

The Orem plant, produced about 1 billion circuits last year, with sales of about \$630 million.

During the closing months of 1991, sales of integrated circuits declined, forcing implementation of a restructuring plan that did not include the aging Orem plant.

"The Orem facility has been a workhorse for many years, but by today's standards it is an almost outdated facility, and it is in the best inter-

est of our customers that we streamline operations," said Signetics President James Dykes.

The Orem plant has been a high-volume producer of 3- and 4-inch electronic wafers since it first opened in 1966.

Rep. Bill Orton, D-Utah, said the closure in his district shows Utah "is not isolated from economic hardship in this recession."

"I hope that this is not an indication of a down-shift of the high-tech companies in Utah County," he added.

Orton said he planned to introduce legislation encouraging companies to update their plans with American-made equipment.

"We need to make it as easy for a company to update a plant as it is to close it," he said.

## Iron Inc. makes meter deal

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Iron Inc., which makes remote data management systems, has reached a preliminary agreement to acquire EnScan Inc., a supplier of automated meter-reading systems.

EnScan is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Arkla Inc. of Shreveport, La. Iron said it will issue stock to Arkla in exchange for all outstanding shares in EnScan, making Arkla the second-largest shareholder of Iron.

Washington Water Power Co. is Iron's majority shareholder.

EnScan manufactures the AcuRead meter reading system, which uses radio technology to remotely collect utility meter read-

ings. The company employs about 100 people at its headquarters at Eden Prairie, Minn., with operations at Waseca, Minn.

Iron makes automated meter-reading, field service and distribution systems installed at more than 700 utilities and telephone companies nationwide.

Iron employs about 650 people at its Spokane headquarters, with subsidiaries in the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Australia and Canada.

The acquisition, subject to a definitive agreement, is expected to be completed by next month, Iron said.

# Sweep miniseries queens, 'Bed of Lies,' Susan Dey under the rug, critic suggests

Women in jeopardy, start your engines ... it's almost sweeps month. One early warning signal is the ABC movie "Bed of Lies" airing Monday, Jan. 20, which stars Susan Dey as a Texas woman who fights for custody of her children as she is put on trial for murdering her no-good, abusive husband.

This past November saw a virtual chorus line of series leading ladies and miniseries queens playing either victims or misunderstood perpetrators of violence. On one end of the spectrum, Jaclyn Smith was the victim in "The Rape of Dr. Willis," and Donna Mills was wrongly imprisoned in "False Arrest." On the other end, a psychotic Judith Light actually mowed down a series of family members in "Wife, Mother, Murderer."

In "Bed of Lies," "L.A. Law"'s Dey trades in Grace Van Owen's conservative attorney's wardrobe for an endless parade of tacky country micro-minis. Dey's Vickie Daniel is a woman whose social position is best described by the phrase "poor white trash." She shouts her violent husband, the son of a former governor, to death. She then must fight her powerful in-laws for custody of her children, even before she's put on trial for murder.

"Bed of Lies" is based on a real killing that took place in Texas in the late '70s, although almost all of the names have been changed. It begins as a Cinderella tale, when handsome attorney Price Daniel Jr. (played by Chris Cooper) arrives at the ice-cream stand where tight-uniformed Vickie works. "Don't marry me; I'm white trash," Vickie says repeatedly, caressing her sunset-orange nail wrap. (Miraculously, the nails make it without a chip all the way through the five-year time span

of the movie.)

Over the protests of his patrician family, Price marries Vickie and lives with her and her two children by an earlier marriage in a suburban ranch house. But right after the wedding, Price begins to hate his wife for no apparent reason. ("I told you not to marry me; I'm white trash," Dey whines.)

With each new baby, Vickie's skirts get shorter, and Dey's even shown exposing a well-muscled midriff immediately after the birth of baby No. 2. Price becomes totally withdrawn and eventually turns violent.

One of the couple's confrontations turns deadly. But why did Price grow to hate his new wife after courting her so fervently? Although there are intimations at the trial that

Price was a drug abuser and perhaps had homosexual encounters, the camera is so fixated on Vickie throughout every scene of the movie that Price's true character is never explained. (Could that be because Bernard Sofronski, Dey's husband, is the executive producer of "Bed of Lies"?) Outside of the self-defense killing, we never get to see anything of Vickie's character that would make her believable, let alone admirable.

Instead of clearing these issues up via a murder trial (which is never seen), there is a concluding custody trial. Her high-priced lawyer, Richard "Racehorse" Haynes (played by Fred Dalton Thompson) is asked why he got involved in the case by a reporter: "It's a challenge," he says.

# Matthau revives Cobb role again

LOS ANGELES — Walter Matthau, squinting in the outdoor sunny glare under a straw hat, says there's something about his manner that makes him believable as a lawyer.

Matthau, who's played lawyers more than a dozen times, including his Academy Award-winning performance in "The Fortune Cookie," reprises his role as Harmon Cobb in "Against Her Will: An Incident in Baltimore." KMYT and CBS televise the movie at 8 p.m. Sunday.

"I guess I look and sound like a lawyer," he says. "Maybe I look like I'm lying. I've certainly played a lot of them."

Matthau first played Cobb three years ago in the movie "The Incident"—and the script for a third film is being written.

"The thing I like about him is that he's such a representative of Mr. Average Man," Matthau says. "He's not very good at his job. He thinks in a rather mundane, ordinary, stupid way. He's an ordinary jerk, and he's put into circumstances that exacerbate his ordinariness."

"I don't think he was ever a good lawyer. He does some research and comes up with remarkable things now and then. He's like a man who suddenly discovers he can play the piano."

Wearing a yellow sweater, Matthau is sitting on the patio at a tennis club while a quartet of duffers slam the ball around in a doubles game. Behind him, the pool reflects the sun's rays.

After several minutes of swatting at bees, he decides to move indoors. He orders a salad of vegetables and canned salmon, but settles for tuna fish.

Matthau's 1966 role in "The Fortune Cookie" represented his first collaboration with Jack Lemmon. Matthau played Whiplash Willie. He also played

lawyers in "First Monday in October," on the stage in "On a Bright Day" and in an estimated dozen television shows.

# NHL takes yearly bow in All-Star game

The fall sports season has an underside. Hockey. And this weekend the National Hockey League gets its once-annual broadcast-television exposure in the United States when NBC airs the NHL All-Star game live from Philadelphia, Saturday.

KTVB and KIFI begin their coverage at 11 a.m. Marv Albert calls the action, and former players John Davidson and Bill Clement provide analysis.

Expect Brett Hull (St. Louis), Al MacInnis (Calgary), Wayne Gretzky (Los Angeles), Luc Robitaille (Los Angeles), Chris Chelios (Chicago) and Ed Belfour (Chicago) to see plenty of ice time for the Campbell Conference; and Ray Bourque (Boston), Mario Lemieux (Pittsburgh), Jaromir Jagr (Pittsburgh),

It's a long wait between games for many hockey fans in the United States, where there are basically three ways you can pick up NHL action: First is to live within range of a broadcast station that carries the games of an NHL club; second is to be wired for cable and receive one of those broadcast channels as part of your basic service; third is to have cable and to pay for a premium channel that carries NHL hockey. No matter how you cut it, that's not a lot of exposure.

Going into this season, the NHL

didn't have a U.S. television contract, period. Its \$51 million three-year deal with SportsChannel America expired after last year's Stanley Cup finals, and when the league finally re-upped for a considerably less \$5.5 million one-year deal just after the 1991-92 season got underway, it became the first professional league to take a rights cut.

But the NHL, which takes in about two thirds of its revenue through gate receipts, is less reliant on television than the leagues of nearly all other professional sports. The league is currently looking into the possibility of direct satellite transmission of games. That would give those fans with a satellite dish unlimited access to professional hockey and cut out the middle man.

The bottom line is: Don't look for the NHL to be appearing regularly on network television anytime soon.
