### U.S. offers boost in aid for ex-Soviets

WASHINGTON — President Bush offered a \$645 million increase in U.S. assistance to the former Soviet Union on Wednesday but Japan said that it would not provide additional help until it settled a territorial dispute with Russia left over-from-World-War.II.

Opening a 47-nation conference on aid to the former Soviet Union, Bush called on the world community to show the newly independent states that it "cares about them

and supports their hard struggle to build new societies on the ruins of communism."

He said that he would ask Congress to approve S645 million in outright grants for dod, medicine and other humanitarian assitance. If approved, the aid would boost the U.S. committenent to more than S5 billion, but most of that is in loans to finance the purchase of U.S. agricultural products.

Although most nations at the conference paid at least lip service to the need for more assistance, Japanese press spokesman Seiji rejecting any large-scale aid programs.



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

But beforethen, tax and finance provisions must be dealth with by the Senate Finance Committee.

Republicans opposed the plan, with most saying the cost would be too high and that the government had no business taking over such a large share of the health care insurance business.

Reporting on the results of tests in which two dozen cars were deliberately ranmed into a variety of barriers at 5 mph, the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety said it is clear that the auto industry has bumped damage resistance to a secondary concern.

The tests included running the front and tear of the cars into a flat barrier, running the front end into an angle barrier and backing the rear end into a pole, all at 5 mph.

#### 36 million were without health coverage

WASHINGTON - Nearly 36 million Americans under the age of 65 were without public or private health insurance in 1990, a private research organization reported Wednesday.

The report by the Employee Benefit Research Institute said the figure increased to 35.7 million from 34.4 million in 1989. The percentage also rose, from 16.1 percent in 1989 to 16.6 percent in 1990. Persons, 65. and over xwer-not counted because 96 percent of them. have Medicare coverage.

#### Analyst believes POWs sent to U.S.S.R.

WASHINGTON – A former National Security Agency analyst said Wednesday he believes American prisoners of the Victnam War were sent to the Soviet Union although he has no evidence to support his claim.





### Americans, Filipinos stay behind to fight

### Bataan survivor becomes U.S. citizen

SEATTLE (AP) — A Filipino survivor of the Bataan Death March received his U.S. citizenship more than a half-century after the government first promised it to him. Benjamin Escano, 69, was among an estimated 30,000 cligible Filipino reterans to receive American citizenship for their wartime service in the U.S. armed forces.

"They forgot about us," said Escano, who was swom in Tuesday as a U.S. citizen." Imean, I've waited 51 years to get my citizenship. We were promised it back in 1941. Now I've got it, I want to stay in America." Bataan Death March received his U.S. citizenship more than a half-century after the government first promised it to him. Benjamin Escano, 69, was among an estimated 30,000 eligible Filipino veterans to receive American citizenship for their wartime service in the U.S. armed forces. Filipino truops were told that as members of the U.S. military, they would be eligible for American citizenship. We were promised it back in 1941. Now I've got it. I want to stay in American.

Escano, a first lieutenant, was among about 60,000 prisoners forced by the Japanese to march 70 miles to prison camps in what has come to be known as the Bataan Death March. During his capitivity, Escano was interrogated, beaten, bayoneted and left for dead. He said quards then dumped him in a morque, where a Filipino worker noticed he was still alive. The worker had him smuggled out of the camp to a hospital. After recovering, Escano joined a guerrilla band that fought the Japanese.

performance audits.

Even though Democrats would be

Even though Democrats would be equally represented on the committee, they don't like that idea. That's because in Idaho, government auditing is strictly territorial.

Every county has an elected auditor, even though it's far from certain that a county employee hired by the commissioners and supervised by a county administrator wouldn't do a betteylob.

betteriob.

The state has an auditor too, but by virtue of long-time Auditor Joe Williams' tenure in that position, in effect, the office is the Democratic auditor.

auditor.

The Republicans have their own auditor, the legislative auditor, because they control the Legislature.
There are a lot of people watching a lot of books in Idaho, but very little evidence that government is running more efficiently as a result.

That's where Newcomb's plan.

would come in. The legislators, who vote the money to run executive agencies, would be in charge of making sure those appropriations are spent as the Legislature intended them

to be.

They would also see whether there are more efficient or economical ways for state agencies to go about their

are more efficient or economical ways for state agencies to go about their business.

A legislative oversight committee – could determine whether a state agency had too much or too little middle management, whether it was underfunded or understaffed, or whether it had the tools to perform the tasks the Legislature assigned it.

Those are judgments that neither the state auditor nor the legislative auditor is in a position to make. Auditors are number-crunchers whose job is to prevent fraud, embezzlement and misuse of public funds. As long as the numbers in the ledger columns line up, the state agencies they monitor are doing their jobs.

Nobody is watching those agencies to make sure they use their money wisely or efficiently, and we think it's time somebody did.

State government employs twice as many people as it did when Andrus first took office 22 years ago, and state agency spending in Idaho is growing-faster than the economy.

Making sturthar money is spent well is worth the investment. Newcomb's idea deserves a closer look.

### Money could be found to help republics of the former Soviet Union

When Old Mother Hubbard went to her cuphoard, her dog was probably hoping for more than a display of concern. This week, leaders from 60 nations will gather in Washington at President Bush's invitation to coordinate humanitarian relief to the republics of the former Soviet Union. Unless the United States and other industrial nations search their cupboards more thoroughly, there will be no international effort to coordinate, and the republics will likely remain as hungry as the dog in the musery rhyne.

Across the former Soviet Union, cupboards are bare and winter is deepening its grip. When the people of the republics stood up to the tanks in August, the West cheered and exhorted them on to free markets. But as the larsh realities of free prices and failing production begin to bite, the people found they had been stranded in the cold.

The United States has extended agricultural credits and approved \$100 million to assist distribution of relief, but the bulk of assistances in a has come from the Germans. They plan to make it clear that Washington needs to back up its sympathy with more material support.

Unfortunately, this historic opportunity to help a former enemy comes at a time of growing domestic malaise. We don't have to look across the ocean to find empty cupboards and people left out in the cold.

Are great needs at home and great needs at abroad irreconcilable?

Not necessarily. The demise of the Soviet Union created new demands for American help, but it also eliminated the primary justification for much U.S. budgetary spending. The Cold War has ended, but our budget is still fighting it. Phasing out Cold War programs from both the defense and forcign-aid budgets could free significant funds for pressing needs at home and abroad. The administration has begun to cut the defense budget, and has proposed an additional S50 billion reduction over five years. Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell has called for cutting \$100 billion, and many analyses suggest that even greater cuts could be made without jeopardizing national security.

national security.

Most of what we save must go to meeting domestic needs and reducing the deficit, but some funds might logically be applied to maintaining stability in the republics. Having spent \$12 \text{ trillion} (in 1992 dollars) since World War II to destroy them as enemies, we should be able to spare a tiny fraction of that to feed them as friends.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III has said that the only source for additional funds for the republics would be cuts in assistance to developing nations: "There is no other choice."

There are other choices, of course, Some of them present a wonderful opportunity to help new friends by getting rid of programs that made sense only when they were enemies.

We continue to give foreign aid for the rights to maintain bases in Portugal, Greece and Turkey (the cruption of Mount Pinatubo cole care of the Philippines). These cost US. taxpayers \$1.5 billion a year. The threat that justified these bases no longer exists. These "rent" payments should be climinated. If the United States desires a continued presence these continued presence the pres

Overall, 30 percent of the foreign-aid budget is military assistance. Military expenditures belong in the defense budget. If the programs are worthwhile, let them compete with other defense expenditures. Savings: \$33. billion annually.

Another prime candidate for cuts is broadcasting aimed at the former Soviet Bloc. Radio Free Europe has done its job: Eastern Europe is free. (Ted Turner is doing them one better, anyway.) Ending broadcasting activities for Eastern Europe would save \$1.3 billion over five years.

The United States has advocated IMF and World Bank membership for IMF and World Bank membership for republics that demonstrate commitment to economic reform, but has yet to authorize funds for a 50 percent capital increase that would help the IMF to undertake these new-activities, even though it would involve no net budgetary outlays.

Communism has been discredited in the former Soviet republics, But democracy and free markets have not yet triumphed. America's "cupboards" aren't empty, but they do need some serious cleaning (and we can't wait for spring).

Restructuring our defense and foreign-aid spending in response to the Soviet Union's demise would allow us to take better care of our own and to throw our friends more than a bone.

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) – The government arrested the leader of Algeria's Islamic party Wednesday and banned all gatherings outside mosques, trying to break the back of the Muslim fundamentalist movement.

The moves came to days after the military-backed government canceled Algeria's first free parliamentary elections that the fundamentalist Islamic Salvation Front was expected to win easily. Troops were sent into the streets and hundreds of fundamentalist reportedly have been arrested.

The Islamic Front said its acting president, Abdelkader Huchani, was arrested Wednesday in the suburb of Bachjara, a stronghold of fundamentalist support.

The official Algerian news

called on members of the army to revolt.

The Islamic Front issued a statement, signed by Hachani, on Tuesday that urged the army to "rid the people" of the authorities now in power.

Milk has all but disappeared from the Russian capital in recent weeks, creating despair among parents with small children and discomfort among a populace accustomed to using milk as a primary ingredient in many recipes.

The price of milk has tripled since President Boris Yeltsin lifted price controlsin-Russia on Jan 2, but other food items are as much as 10 times higher. Milk is one of the few goods whose price remains controlled by the state.

Muscovites are anxious to buy it—it forly illey could find it.

Harvard economist Jeffrey Sachs, who is advising the government on its transition to a market economy, said last week that state stores had refused shipments of milk because they could not charge their customers as much as they had to pay distributors. He said price controls on milk should be liftled.

Municipal authorities say the shortage stems from transportation problems. The Interfax news agency said the city produces enough milk to satisfy the population, but more trucks are needed to haul the milk in from dairies.

Dual use refers to technology that has been designed for civilian use but can also be used in arms production. Another German official said U.S. officials had asked Germany to intervene shortly before the plane left Frankfurt for Tripoli Dec. 10. The official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the cargo contained "lots of parts," mostly laser equipment used in building rockets. He said the cargo was addressed to a Libyan organization known to be working on the country's rocket program.

In Washington, State Department press officer Joseph Snyder said the administration was aware of the transaction and has been in touch with the German government. Other officials said the administration was not surprised by the German disclosure. There was no elaboration.

The German government source said a U.S. company, in apparent violation of export law, sent the goods to Amsterdam, the Netherlands, where a Dutch firm served as an intermediary. The goods, were then flown to Frankfurt for the last leg of the journey, the source said.

The cargo seizure came to light during the German government's regular news briefing Wednesday. Vogel was briefing reporters on a new regulation in German export law that the Cabineth ad approved earlier in the day.

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

The department intends to move radioactive waste out of Idaho to a "proper repository." Moore said.

That includes high-level waste, spent

Moore, a former Republican congressman from Louisiana, told the INEL Summit arranged by U.S. Larry Craig that the government is still committed to removing the waste once permanent repositories are opened.







### Wyoming execution 1st since 1965

RAWLINS, Wyo. — Wyoming conducted its first execution in 26 years Wednesday with the lethal injection of a man who had a couple and their son killed, then ordered the murder of a witness against him.

him.

Mark Hopkinson went to his death after the
Wyoming Supreme Court, a federal judge and the
U.S. Supreme Court rejected last-minute appeals.

"You got the wrong man," the 42-year-old Hopkinson declared in a final statement before his execution at the Wyoming State Penitentiary. Before Wednesday, Wyoming's Isat execution was December 1965. The NAGE Legal Defense Fund said his death marked the first time since the U.S. Supreme Court allowed resumption of capital punishment in 1976 that a person who arranged a murder but wasn't present at it was executed.

Hopkinson returned to Wyoming to stand trial for the Vehar bombing and the Green murder and was convicted of both. While the Vehar bombing resulted in three life sentences for Hopkinson, the Green killing produced the death sentence.

On initial appeal the Wyoming Supreme Court upheld Hopkinson's convictions but ordered a new sentencing trial on the death penalty. In 1982 that trial reaffirmed the death sentence.

Throughout the years he spent on life.

death row, Hopkinson steadfastly maintained his innocence in the Green killing, saying he was framed by Jackson attorney Gerry Spence. Hopkinson told anyone who would listen that Spence, who prosecuted Hopkinson for the Vehar and Green killings, offered Mike Hickey immunity in the Vehar bombing if he would implicate Hopkinson. During an interview with reporters last Friday the condemned man was asked what caused the downfall of his life.

"I met Jeff Green and Mike Hickey," he replied. While Hopkinson's brashness never disappeared during his years on death row, it seemed to temper a bit to the row!

death row, it seemed to temper a bit at the end.

In October 1980 the immate claimed he could blow the state's case against him 'wide open' if he wanted.

'If they came up here and offered me immunity, I could blow this whole thing wide open. but even if they offered me immunity, I wouldn't

testify against anybody. Not even if it meant my life," he said in a copyrighted interview with the Casper Star-Tribune.

In the interview he also boasted that he would "beat this case."

"I'll bet anything on that," Hopkinson said, "They won't see the day when I'll have to die..."

Shortly before his scheduled execution in September 1990 the inmate tried to avoid the death penalty by offering to name Green's killers in return for his freedom. That offer never was accepted by the state, and. Hopkinson later said his information was wrong.

Early this week, as his execution again said he knew who Green's kilter, were and they could absolve him of any connection if authorities would question them.
The immate identified the men in petitions to the Wyoming Supreme and the U.S. District Court in Cheyenne, but on Tuesday both courts rejected the information and refused to stay the execution.

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

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

But that time of trust may be slipping away. With the increases in crime and the increased liability threats of owning

away. With the increases in crime and the increased liability threats of owning firearms. It is becoming increasingly important to secure and protect our firearms.

Firearms can be protected from theft or misuse by either locking them up or biding them. Probably the most common method is the use of a locking gun cabinet made of wood with a glass door. These cabinets work well for keeping the casual visitor and children from handling the guns but will do little to discourage the burglar. In fact such a display case often attracts the attention of a thief.

A metal safe is a much more secure solution. The range of products available run from \$100 to \$1000 or more. Even the lightest of these safes require some effort to gain access such as the use of a crowbar. The heavier "vault" type safes are all but burglary proof.

The more expensive safes also offer adegree of fire protection which is work consideration.

Another approach is to bide the

Another approach is to hide the firearms. It is not a difficult project to build a hidden storage area in a wall or ceiling especially at a time when other remodeling is taking place.

### 12 more bison shot near park; tally up to 184

BOZEMAN, Mont. — Federal and state officials shot a dozen more bison on the edge of Yellowstone National Parks on Tuesday, bringing the tally to 184. The buffale are killed when they enter Montana because the state contends they can transmit brucellosis to eattle. Brucellosis can cause cattle to abort. Activists protested the killings were being hidden from public view. Kris Maenz of Missoula, a University of Montana student, said the bison were shot after they had been herded behind a hill on Church Universal and Triumphant land at daybreak. "They shot off flares to chase them further up into the hills, and chased them behind a hill so we couldn't take photos," Maenz said. Bob Martinka, regional supervisor of the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, said however that the bison were herded to get them away from buildings in the area, not to avoid cameras. DULUTH, Minn. — It's easy, here in the firm grip of winter, to begin thinking about a big getaway.

A four-day fling for the fishing opener.

A week at the place up north.

Maybe even a couple of weeks on a Canadian river.

That's good. We need to play. We need to dream.

But the fact is, those big trips come plong all too rarely for most of us. What we need, in the meantime, is the little trips.

this. We need places to go, things to do, that put us in touch with the natural world on almost a daily basis. And to do that, we have to keep it simple.

How simple?

Take a walk.

Right out your front door. Down the street. Around the

Right out your front door. Down the street. Around the corner.

No, it isn't the Northwest Territories. But the air you're breathing is real air. Heavy and wet. Maybe dry and crisp. Some days sunshine. Some drys fog. Sure, you'll see cars and hear your neighbor blowing snagw out of his driveway and observe other evidence of civilized life.

But if the birds are singing, you'll know it. If the peepers are peeping, you'll hear 'em. And if the only signs of natural life are squirred tracks leading to an old maple tree, you'll have at least come away with a feel for the season that's upon you.

The beauty of a daily walk is not only what you see and hear and feel that day. It's the cumulative satisfaction that comes with having, made, the walk in all kinds of weather, on all kinds of days, through the seasons. There comes, after a time, a feeling of being at home where you live.

I remember when we had a dog, and I would take him on our regular circuit late each evening. For quite a while, I thought I was doing it for him. He needed to go out and reclaim the territory that had been invaded by other neighborhood dogs who had been out walking their owners.

After a year or so, though, I came to realize that those

After a year or so, though, I came to realize that those strolls were as meaningful to me as they were for Dave, our old black hound. They gave me a chance to see the set

of the stars, to smell — in the grass or the trees or the air — the unfurling of the seasons, to take the pulse of the night and speculate on what morning might bring. I miss old Dave, and I miss those walks. In different places we have lived, our little trips have taken different forms. When I lived in Ely, I would often run down the Lucky Boy Trail at the edge of town. It had humble beginnings, from a gravel pit behind the hospital. and a. hockey. rink. The footing wasn't great, and you'd often see where someone had abandonded a sofa along the gravel roadway. Burl loved those runs:

They were the quickes tway to get into the woods. You were apt to flush a couple of wood ducks off the old manmade ponds along the trail, and although I never saw a moose or a wolf or a bear on my runs, the possibility of that occurring was real. It flavored my jounts on Lucky Boy.

We're lucky, now, to have an undeveloped piece of eity parkland not far from our home. It comes with some good sitting rocks, a beaver pond and nesting ducks. I have happened upon a red fox and been startled by ruffed grouse more than opec.

But the most redeeming benefit of the park is that it's within walking distance of home. I can get there fast and often.

### U.S. agents score salmon sting successes

SEATTLE (AP) — Faced with tight budgets and limited resources, reasted oriticals have been unable to-shout down the international salmon black market.

U.S. authorites, nevertheless, have scored some successes against the worldwide criminal onterprise, focusing on undercover investigations and sting operations that have greated in the seizure of over one million pounds of drift-netted salmon since 1986.

"Sting operations have been the most effective tool we've had to deal with the high-seas illegal fishing." said Wayne Lewis, National Marine Fisheries Service special agent in chatge of the Pacific area. 
