Inspectors find 35 pages of deficiencies at Gooding care center

GOODING — A state agency has found 35 pages of deficiencies at a Gooding long-term care facility and is preparing to conduct an unannounced inspection to see if they have been corrected.

Green Acres Care Center was found deficient in several different areas, including inappropriate restraints of the elderly and inadequate training for

workers, according to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

"The deficiencies which caused these requirements to be unmet substantially limit the capacity of Green Acres Care Center to furnish services of an adequate level or quality," said Loyal Perry, supervisor of licensing for Health and Welfare, in a letter to Green Acres Administrator Julie Conrad.

The Dec. 11 letter gave Green Acres until last Tuesday to correct dozens of

deficiencies that inspectors say they uncovered during a four-day survey in November.

The state will now perform an unannounced inspection of the nursing home, Perry said.

"The state has a hard job to do, but on this survey I did not agree with their findings," Conrad said Thursday. "I feel when the state comes back in they will find everything in total compliance."

"We would stand by our findings," Perry

said. "We feel we have substantial documentation to support the deficiencies cited."

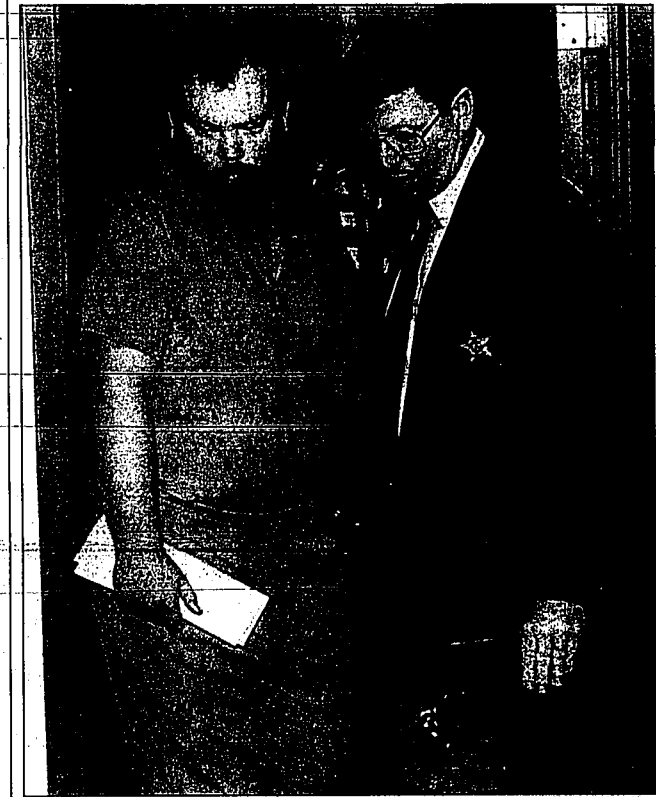
If the deficiencies have not been corrected the state could recommend termination of Green Acres' Medicare and Medicaid provider agreements, Perry said.

"Hopefully they have everything corrected and we don't have to do that," he said.

Green Acres failed to evaluate some of

Man charged with slaying child, 2

TWIN FALLS — Two-year-old Amanda Marie Hostetler's obituary says she died of a sudden illness. Prosecutors say it was murder.

One day after an autopsy revealed that Amanda Hostetler died of internal bleeding from a severe blow or blows to the stomach, her mother's boyfriend was charged with first-degree murder.

Donnell "Bud" Stradley, 28, was ordered held in the Twin Falls County Jail without bond by 5th District Magistrate R. Michael Redman.

Stradley, a burly 5-foot, 10-inch man with unruly blond hair and a beard, shook his head in disbelief as Redman read the complaint against him.

Prosecutors charge that Stradley killed the baby and "did inflict extreme and prolonged acts of brutality with the intent to cause suffering and/or to satisfy a sadistic inclination," Redman read from the criminal complaint.

Several of Stradley's family members and Amanda's mother, Jodie Hostetler, sat together during the hearing, weeping and holding hands.

Stradley did not enter a plea Thursday. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Feb. 6 after which Redman will determine if the state has enough evidence to take the case to trial in District Court.

After he was arrested Wednesday night at the home where he lived with Jodie and Amanda Hostetler in the 300th block of Fourth Avenue East, Stradley told police the child was injured when he tossed her onto a waterbed while playing with her, according to an affidavit signed by Twin Falls police Det. Ron Roberson and included in Stradley's court file.

It was just before 3 p.m. Monday when Stradley called 911 and reported the baby was not breathing, said Lt. Jim Kistler of the Twin Falls police department.

An officer was there within two minutes and began performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), but "the baby was already dead," Twin Falls County Coroner Cal Edwards said.

Stradley later told police that he had given the child "an airplane ride," swinging her around the house, according to Roberson's affidavit.

He then tossed Amanda 10 to 11 feet onto her waterbed, but Stradley said her abdomen landed on the solid wooden corner of the bed and she slid onto the floor, the affidavit says.

"He advised that he knew something was wrong with Amanda due to her not being able to breathe as a pain," Roberson's statement says.

Jodie Hostetler was washing clothes at a nearby coin-operated laundry and stopped by the house a couple of times between the time Amanda was injured and when emergency personnel were summoned by Stradley, Kistler said.

Stradley said "he placed Amanda in her bed and concealed the fact of the injury and the child's condition from her mother on her two arrivals back on her later and only to check on the residue, found her not breathing," Roberson's affidavit says.

When Jodie Hostetler returned to her house, an ambulance crew was there picking up her dead daughter, Edwards said he doubts the severe internal damage to Amanda Hostetler can be

47 nations line up effort to feed hungry ex-Soviets

WASHINGTON — Forty-seven nations large and small agreed Thursday on a massive "global effort" to rescue millions of "hungry people" in the former Soviet Union with humanitarian shipments of food and medicine.

The United States will airlift supplies to the 12 former republics with 54 sorties beginning Feb. 10. The food aboard will include 38.4 million pounds left over from the Persian Gulf war, enough for 16 million

meals. A million doses of Desert Storm antibiotics will be carried by the C-5 and C-141 cargo planes, as well.

The airlift will "vividly show the peoples of the former Soviet Union that those who once prepared for war with them now have the courage and conviction to use their military to wage a new peace," Secretary of State James A. Baker III said.

The NATO alliance, set up in 1949 to confront the Soviet Union, will undertake complementary deliveries. "Nothing could better symbolize the end of the Cold War,"

NATO Secretary-General Manfred Woerner said.

Baker, who organized the two-day conference on coordinating aid efforts, said several countries had offered contributions in the closed sessions after President Bush pledged an additional \$645 million at the opening Wednesday.

He said Saudi Arabia would release \$1.5 billion it had held up. Japan pledged \$50 million in grants to purchase medicine and U.S. officials said South Korea had offered \$800 million and Thailand \$450 million in

low-interest loans. Argentina offered to take in 100,000 refugees.

"Countries are responding in large measure in proportion to their ability," Baker said. The United States has pledged more than \$5 billion, mostly in farm credits while the 12-nation European Community, led by Germany, has contributed billions of dollars more in credit, loans and grants.

The conference came up with outlines on how to assist the republics in the areas of food, shelter, energy, medicine and economic reform.

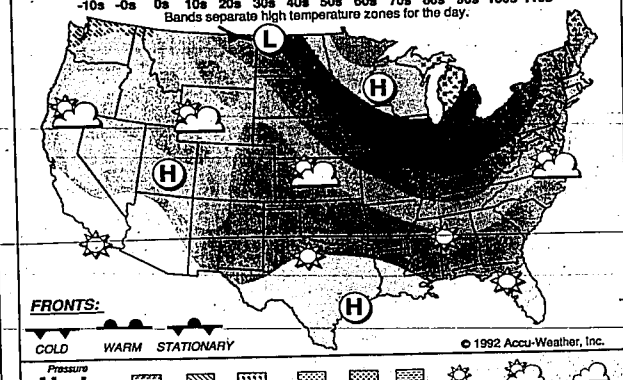
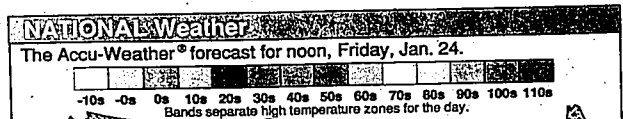

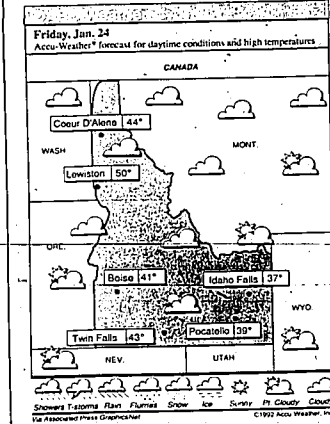

Wyoming, Atlantic coast bear brunt of gusty winds

Heavy wind gusted along the Atlantic coast and in Wyoming on Thursday, and snow fell in the upper Midwest and Rockies.
Gusts from thunderstorms damaged large trees in Charleston, S.C., and shattered windows of homes at Isle of Pines, S.C. Gusts reached 60 mph over the Laramie Range in southeastern Wyoming.
Rain showers with occasional thunderstorms extended from Virginia to southern New England. There was freezing rain across southern and central New England and snow across central and northern New England.

Rain reached from the Tennessee Valley across the lower Great Lakes. Blowing and drifting snow remained over the upper Mississippi Valley, across North Dakota, the upper Missouri Valley and the northern Rockies.
Rain also extended over the Pacific Northwest.
Grangeville, Fla., received 1.5 inches of rain Thursday morning. Greensboro, and Fort Bragg, N.C., received almost an inch.
The sun returned to Barrow, Alaska. It had set Nov. 19.
The low temperature for the lower 48 states was 24 degrees below zero at Alamosa, Colo. A low of 38 degrees in Oakland, Calif., tied a record for the date. It was 82 degrees at Avon Park, Fla.

Nuclear weapons cuts directed at faster Russian disarmament

WASHINGTON (AP) - New nuclear weapons cuts under study by the Bush administration seem designed to entice republics of the former Soviet Union to eliminate — not just reduce — their most powerful nuclear missiles, analysts said Tuesday.
Sources said President Bush was considering reducing or eliminating long-range nuclear missiles with more than one warhead, a move that would include cuts in the submarine-based nuclear warheads that most concern the Russians.
Up to now the United States has refused to consider cuts in the Trident submarine force, which is the most modern and survivable part of the U.S. strategic nuclear force.
"I think the administration recognized that if they really did want to get rid of multiple-warhead missiles, they were going to have to include submarines in there," said Jack Mendelsohn, a former U.S. strategic arms negotiator and

currently deputy director of the private Arms Control Association.
Asked about published reports that Bush was considering new cuts in the strategic arsenal, Pentagon spokesman Bob Hall declined comment beyond saying, "We're looking at all of our programs, including strategic programs, in the context of changes in the world" and the prospect of continually shrinking defense budgets.
Cuts in the Trident nuclear force would be as much a bow to the reality of a breakdown in the U.S. nuclear production system as a willingness to give up firepower. Because of safety problems in the system, no new warheads are being built for the Trident II missile, and the Pentagon confirmed last month that it was considering dropping plans for future production.
Bush is likely to discuss nuclear arms reductions in his State-of-the-Union address next Tuesday. A reciprocal action to the cuts said to be under consideration might be the scrapping of the SS-18 heavy missiles, or the SS-24 mobile missiles by Russia and the three other republics with strategic nuclear weapons on their soil, Mendelsohn said.
Both the SS-18 and SS-24 carry 10 warheads per missile.
Overall, the U.S. plan could result in scrapping up to about 20 percent of the long-range nuclear arsenal that would be left under the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty, or START, which has not yet been ratified by the Senate.
Bush proposed a ban on land-based multiple warhead missiles last Sept. 27, but he did not suggest cuts below the levels set by START. He also excluded the Trident submarine force, and his defense secretary, Dick Cheney, said then that it would be uneconomic to deploy Trident submarines with only one warhead per missile.

Iran buys nuclear bombs as USSR falls apart

LONDON (AP) - Iran took advantage of the chaos in the crumbling Soviet Union last year to purchase three nuclear weapons from a Soviet republic for about \$150 million, an Arabic-language magazine reported.
The story in the Dec. 27 issue of the weekly Al-Watan Al-Arabi, which was made available in translation this week, said Iran nuclear experts at salaries of \$5,000 monthly to assemble the bombs.
Yuli Y. Gromtsov, the Russian Ambassador to the United Nations, denied Thursday that nuclear weapons were sold to any foreign country.
He also told The Associated Press that it was not government policy to send nuclear specialists to work abroad, but could not rule out the possibility of their doing such work.
The magazine did not say which republic sold the alleged bomb parts, but said it was an "Islamic" republic, Kazakhstan is the only Central Asian republic in the former Soviet Union that is known to have nuclear weapons.
There has been no independent confirmation that Iran possesses nuclear weapons.

Dutch cleared laser for Libya

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) - The government acknowledged Thursday it allowed U.S.-made laser equipment to be shipped to Libya, but said the parts were not on a list of restricted goods with strategic military applications.
Germany said Wednesday it seized the equipment last month because it could be used in military-related nuclear work. It also said the laser equipment could be used in building missiles.
The American manufacturer, Oriol Corp. of Stratford, Conn., said Thursday that the equipment was designed for research work and did not require a U.S. license for export.
Libya ordered the laser equipment through Eurabic International BV, a Dutch firm.

their residents for restraints that would allow the residents much freedom as possible, the report says.
Conrad said Greer Acres makes decisions about resident restraints based on doctors' orders and family requests. By comparison, the facility uses fewer restraints than most nursing homes, she said.
The survey said, "resident records, staff and resident interviews, and resident observations on all four days of the survey identified problems in the areas of respect and dignity, accommodations of residents' needs, activities, social services, and clean, safe, comfortable and sanitary environment," the survey report said.
Conrad said Green Acres' residents are well-cared for and loved. Green Acres is far superior to many nursing homes and the staff is proud of its care, she said.
The survey said while an aide was feeding a resident, she would coax her to open her mouth by instructing her to talk. When the resident opened her mouth to speak, "a large amount of food was placed in her mouth," she said.
"No resident was found on two different days wearing no underclothing, hanging over the side rail of her bed, exposed from the waist down," the survey said.

While another resident was being fed, an aide would roughly wipe the resident's face with a large towel over his mouth, nose, eyes and forehead as the resident protested and resisted, the survey said.
Other residents were consistently seen wearing soiled clothing, the survey said.
Seven of 15 residents reviewed were not involved in an activity program that would meet their interests and physical, mental and psychosocial well-being of each resident, the survey said.
Green Acres responded that its activity programs are divided into two separate and distinct programs to accommodate the diversified needs of its residents.
Inspectors revisited Green Acres' companion facility, Green Acres Training Center, after they had previously found several deficiencies, and found the facility completely in compliance, Conrad said.

explained by Stradley's version of events.
"It's possible I can't rule it out," he said. "But I don't think that's what happened."
"I think it was from somebody hitting her," said Edwards, who watched a forensic pathologist perform the autopsy in Pocatello Wednesday.
While Stradley remains in jail awaiting his hearing, police say they will continue to investigate evidence that Amanda was abused.
Amanda had many bruises on her chest, flanks, buttocks, arms, back and shoulders, according to Edwards' report. The difference in color in the bruises indicates the wounds happened over a long period of time rather than all at once, the report says.
In April 1991, Amanda was in Magic Valley Regional Medical

Center for four days due to a head injury caused by falling out of bed, Roberson said in his affidavit.
Edwards' report says the autopsy revealed a past skull fracture and a possible injury to the left arm; much of her hair also had been pulled out.
On Tuesday, relatives David and LaDonna Johns told police that Amanda's eyes, nose and forehead had other bruises on her face when the Johns visited Hostetler and Stradley on Christmas Day.
Amanda Marie Hostetler's funeral will be at 1 p.m. Saturday at White Mortuary.

Senate votes down plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate defeated Bush administration proposals Thursday to give poor families tax credits to send their children to private or parochial school or include such schools in demonstration projects.

The 57-36 vote against the tax credit amendment, by Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, ended a heated one-hour debate on an idea that had been the centerpiece of President Bush's school restructuring plan, known as America 2000.

Ashland's philosophy adds up to more bikes, less urban sprawl

ASHLAND, Ore. (AP) — Most cities with a downtown parking problem would put in more parking lots. But this southern Oregon community takes pride in doing things differently.

They built bicycle racks instead.

"We in this city will not compromise quality of life in the name of development," said Mayor Cathy Golden. "It is not the will of the people."

Ashland's population, now just over 16,000, has grown only 1.5 percent in the past 20 years, but it is thriving. Housing prices are up. School levies pass while nearby districts struggle. The feeling of community is strong.

The accent here is on quality, not quantity.

Wary of California's unbridled growth, Golden tells discount stores with visions of huge parking lots that they'd be happier someplace else.

Along Main Street, beneath Elizabethan-style banners inspired by Ashland's popular Oregon Shakespeare Festival, are bike racks, with lots of bicycles in them.

"Government's responsibility is not to help move cars, but to move people," Golden said. "When you change even that dynamic, change that approach, suddenly you have more options."

The bike-rack idea is also good economics, said Planning Director John Fregonese. One evening, he counted 72 bicycles on racks that cost the city \$2,000. That many cars would need an acre of parking worth \$500,000, he said.

The city bought three bikes for city inspectors to use on their rounds. It saves time and money, especially when summertime visitors to the Shakespeare Festival make parking scarce downtown.

"By the time you walk back from parking the car, you could have

ridden the bike twice," said building inspector Mike Broomfield.

Ashland has always attracted people who like new ideas. Decades ago, farmers and merchants gathered at the Chatauque ground to see traveling cultural shows. The counterculture landed hard in the 1970s, and the city remains an island of New Age religions, naturopathic medicine and art galleries in our southern Oregon.

The place reminds Golden of a "Twilight Zone" episode, in which someone rides a train back in time to a small town where people are smiling and life is good.

"Imagine a tourist coming from Los Angeles, where there are gang wars and drive-by shootings, to a concert in the park where happy children are bounding about to John Phillip Sousa while their parents are having a picnic dinner," Golden said. "It's just magical and enchanting."

Acid rain quandary develops

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cutting the pollution that causes acid rain may be a major environmental victory, but will make the job of dealing with global warming more difficult, a group of scientists said Thursday.

The findings, published in Friday's issue of Science magazine, concluded that sulfur dioxide and other sulfate pollutants, which cause acid rain, have shielded much of the earth from the increased warming of the so-called "greenhouse effect."

"In part this may mean that we already have a far worse problem with global warming than we realized because the effects of the

greenhouse gases have been masked," said James Coakley, a professor of atmospheric science at Oregon State University and an author of the study.

But the authors do not suggest that efforts be abandoned to reduce acid rain causing pollutants.

"Acid rain clearly has bad effects," Robert Charlson, the lead author of the report, said in a telephone interview. "What we have to do is cut back on the totality of the (greenhouse) emissions."

Charlson, a professor of atmospheric science at the University of Washington, first reported his preliminary findings on

the connection of sulfate emissions and global warming in a paper published last year in Europe.

The new report amounts to an endorsement of the earlier findings by a larger field of global-warming experts, including leading government scientists on the global-warming issue.

Many scientists believe that man-made pollutants, mainly carbon dioxide from burning fossil fuels, is creating a gaseous atmospheric barrier that traps heat much like a greenhouse. They predict that if these "greenhouse gases" are not reduced there will be a significant increase in world temperatures.

boundaries around each of the state's 241 cities — not to stop growth but to shape it, concentrating development in already urbanized areas while preserving the open land that attracted so many people in the first place.

It's too soon to tell if the law is working across much of Oregon. Most urban growth zones have yet to fill in with development.

But in Washington County, west of Portland, a population boom has pushed development right up to the growth boundary, providing one of the law's first critical tests.

Traffic now clogs the four-lane Sunset Highway between Portland and Beaverton, the county's largest city with 53,000 residents. The Beaverton School District — already 2,000 students over capacity — recently opposed a new housing subdivision that will add about 250 students. The district lost.

Here the urban growth boundary is more than just an imaginary line on planners' maps. In some areas, hundreds of new houses cover the rolling land on one side of the boundary, while on the other, meadows and freshly plowed fields are marked only by the occasional weathered barn.

Washington County has grown by 11,000 people a year since 1988, but the growth boundary has helped keep more than 90 percent of its 31,500 residents concentrated on about 15 percent of the land.

The rural land is supposed to be reserved for agricultural or forest use. But that hasn't stopped developers from snapping up farms just outside the urban growth zone, gambling that the land someday will be included within the zone. Such farmland is selling for as much as \$10,000 an acre, triple the price of land farther away.

"Nobody is building new barns, nobody is planting orchards," said Greg Malinowski, whose 80-acre organic farm straddles the urban growth boundary. "What will happen, I'm afraid, is it will all be bought up by speculators."

One developer bought 200 acres of forestland outside the boundary, cut down the trees and then argued the land should be zoned for housing

because it was no longer forested. The state ordered the county not to rezone the land.

Ethan Seltzer, land-use coordinator for the regional Metropolitan Service District, said all the jockeying for position shows the boundary is working.

"Urban growth boundaries are not meant to be great walls of China. They're meant to be as big as you can demonstrate a need for urban land. The boundary is intended to move," he said.

Indeed, some believe the boundaries are not flexible enough.

"The system has Oregon in a straightjacket," said Bill Moshofsky, an attorney for Oregonians in Action, a group seeking land-use reforms to preserve the rights of private landowners. He said planners have set aside more rural land than the law originally intended.

"While rural living is being outlawed, more and more people are being crammed into cities, thereby increasing traffic congestion, using up green space, driving up the cost of land and destroying the quality of life for many urban dwellers," Moshofsky said.

Others believe the law has done too little, especially inside the urban growth boundaries.

While the 1974 law has slowed the spread of suburbia across rural Oregon, it has not stopped inefficient land use within growth boundaries, said Mary Kyle McCurdy. She is an attorney with 1,000 Friends of Oregon, a land-use watchdog group often at odds with Moshofsky's organization.

In Washington County, she said, homes go up where schools, sewer lines and good roads have yet to be built. Commercial strips stretch for

miles, with each one-story store sitting behind a vast and usually half-empty parking lot.

Very few cities are forward-looking enough in instituting zoning and land-use ordinances to prevent such sprawl, McCurdy said.

Until recently, concerns over unchecked growth in Oregon were largely theoretical. The early 1980s recession kept Oregon's overall population growth during the decade to 7.9 percent, a small increase compared to California's 26 percent jump.

But Oregon is catching up fast. Since 1987, the state's population has grown by almost 2 percent a year, with growth concentrated along the Interstate 5 corridor west of the Cascade Range.

The current recession has slowed migration from California, which supplies up to 40 percent of Oregon's newcomers. But the long-term outlook is for growth, and plenty of it. Demographers predict Oregon's 1990 population of 2.8 million will increase by at least 20 percent by the year 2000.

That has old-timers pining for when a trip to the store didn't mean an epic battle with traffic and stoplights. But for many newcomers to Oregon, these are still the good old days.

Michael and Tracy Henderson moved last year to Washington County from California. They sold their

1,000-square-foot condominium in Pasadena for \$200,000 and paid half as much here for a house twice as big.

"We love it," Tracy Henderson said. "The people are very friendly. It's not crowded. Everything sparkles. This is paradise."

Red Cross relief fund \$28 million in red

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Red Cross disaster relief fund is \$28 million in debt after two straight years of record-breaking numbers of storms, floods and other disasters, the organization said Thursday.

"We have a very difficult situation," said Elizabeth Dole, president of the Red Cross, in issuing the organization's second major appeal to the public for funds in less than a year.

In February, 1991, the Red Cross

set a goal of \$30 million in announcing a fund-raising campaign for Gulf War relief. This time no figure is being announced as a goal.

Mrs. Dole said that in addition to seeking contributions, the organization has put a freeze on hiring, restricted travel and ordered a moratorium on new equipment purchases. She said further steps now being undertaken will include elimination of some Red Cross functions, but she could not say yet what they will be.

Mrs. Dole said there were more than 8,000 of what are classified as major disasters last year. The total cost of disaster relief to the organization in the 1990-91 fiscal year was \$184 million.

The figure included \$7 million to help 8,800 Louisiana families displaced by rains and flooding, \$2.2 million to assist 15,000 victims of a freak spring ice storm in western New York, \$2.2 million for Kansas tornado victims and \$4.7 million for 4,700 Texas families flooded out.

VA opens door to non-veterans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration will open two veterans' hospitals to non-veterans as part of a test program unveiled Thursday to improve rural Americans' access to health care.

The project will also allow veterans to use government-funded community health clinics in the two areas of Alabama and Virginia.

Veterans hospitals in Tuskegee, Ala., and Salem, Va., will continue to provide health care on a priority basis to veterans with service-related disabilities and to low-income vets, but the facilities will also begin offering medical services to non-veterans.

Veterans' groups, which oppose opening Veterans Affairs hospitals to non-veterans, were unconvinced.

December deficit hits half-year low

WASHINGTON — The government posted a \$2.64 billion deficit in December, the smallest in six months and 6.6 percent less than the gap in the same month of 1991, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

Economist Kathleen Stephansen of Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette, a New York securities dealer, said the improvement was due to light spending on the savings and loan bailout and continued contributions from U.S. allies in the Persian Gulf war.

Revenues totaled \$103.7 billion, up 1.7 percent from December 1990. That boosted receipts for fiscal 1992 to \$254.9 billion, 2.2 percent more than the first three months of fiscal 1991.

At the same time, spending totaled \$106.3 billion, 2.7 percent less than December 1990 outlays. So far in fiscal 1992, the government has spent \$338.1 billion, 0.7 percent more than during the first quarter of fiscal 1991.

Scientists report AIDS vaccine progress

WASHINGTON — Scientists said Thursday that for the first time they have successfully vaccinated monkeys against an AIDS-related virus by using bits of the virus' outer coat — a method similar to one that has produced encouraging preliminary results in humans.

A team headed by Dr. Shiu-Lok Hu of Bristol-Myers Squibb Pharmaceutical Research Institute in Seattle vaccinated four macaque monkeys against the simian immunodeficiency virus, which is related to HIV, the human AIDS virus.

Dr. Dani Bolonchak of the Center for AIDS Research at Duke University, which was involved in the study, said it was "clearly supporting evidence" that such a method could achieve success against the HIV virus in humans.

Report urges fight against diseases

ATLANTA — Mumps and rubella can be wiped from the planet, perhaps in 10 years with a concerted effort, a global health task force said Thursday.

The International Task Force for Disease Eradication said the common but potentially serious childhood diseases are "potentially good candidates for eradication," chiefly through intensive worldwide use of the measles-mumps-rubella vaccine.

The prospects for wiping out other childhood diseases such as diphtheria and pertussis, or whooping cough, are not as good, the task force concluded.

Eradication was achieved with smallpox in 1978. The World Health Organization and the International Task Force for Disease Eradication have since said polio and dracunculiasis, a parasitic infection, also can be eliminated.

Bush, Yeltsin to meet after U.N. summit

WASHINGTON — President Bush and President Boris Yeltsin of Russia will confer at Camp David on Feb. 1, the day after both attend the United Nations Security Council summit, the White House said Thursday.

Bush has invited Yeltsin to the Maryland mountaintop retreat for a meeting and luncheon.

Both presidents will join heads of state from a dozen other countries at the Jan. 31 Security Council summit in New York to discuss the challenges facing the post-Cold War world following the collapse of Soviet communism.

Ship sinks in Gulf of Mexico; 3 missing

GALVESTON, Texas — A Venezuelan offshore supply ship sank in the Gulf of Mexico Thursday. Three crewmen were rescued from a life raft, but five other crewmen are missing, U.S. Coast Guard officials said.

The 150-foot supply ship, Diana, began taking on water 115 miles southeast of Galveston at about 5:30 a.m., said Coast Guard Chief Clark Lednum of Group Galveston. Lednum said survivors told officials the ship began flooding and sank within five minutes.

Tests try to make astronauts sick

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Discovery's astronauts were spun in a chair, strapped blindfolded onto a lurching sled and jolted by electrodes high above the Earth on Thursday in a study of space motion sickness.

The tests were conducted on the second day of the mission, typically a queasy time for space travelers. More than half of all astronauts are nauseous and dizzy during their first few days in orbit.

"We're going to do whatever it takes to get the science," astronaut David Hilmers said before the flight. "Maybe if someone does get ill because of the experiments, that will be good data."

Researchers hope to learn more about space motion sickness by analyzing how the nervous system reacts in weightlessness.

Tough judge draws power-abuse concerns

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Judge Walter Williams is one tough cookie.

He says his unorthodox style and innovative sentences are designed to give people "a push." Some say he's pushing too hard.

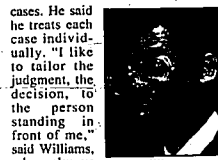
Assistant Public Defender Hank Hill says Williams has told unwed mothers appearing before him that they should be "spayed."

Williams, 39, denies using that term. He said he merely told them to stop having children. He also denies a sort of — that he once came into Chattanooga City Court packing a pistol.

"I never carried a gun to court. Not one time," he said in an interview last week.

But he doesn't deny he once had a gun in court. "That's a different story," he says, eyes twinkling. "I had a gun brought to me one time."

Williams, who grew up in a housing project and is Chattanooga's only black judge, hears everything from traffic violations to murder

cases. He said he treats each case individually. "I like to tailor the judgment, the decision," to the person standing in front of me," said Williams, who always quizzes defendants about their jobs and education.

Last year, he allowed about 200 teen-age offenders to avoid fines or jail, by raising their grade-point averages. Most of them did. He often orders high school dropouts to take equivalency exams, welfare recipients to get jobs and teen-age boys to get haircuts. "Some people won't do anything unless you give them a push," he said.

Williams says the media has sensationalized his actions, including the reported paddling of a teen-age gang member in his chambers last

spring. Williams won't confirm or deny the paddling, but said the boy's mother approved some sort of discipline and that "the boy had a new walk and a new talk when he went out."

Hill says the judge often oversteps his authority. "I don't know what his goals are," Hill said. "All I know is he trounces the Constitution on a regular basis."

Williams once threatened to jail a man who called him "a little Hitler" outside the courtroom. The man got an earful from the judge when he returned to court days later.

"You try that again and you'll be in jail so fast — What time is it now? Twenty after 2? You'll be jail by 20% after 2," Williams told him.

"I don't think he comprehends the limits of his authority," said attorney Rick Mabce. "He has said many times he can do whatever he wants to in court. That's simply not true."

Former Chattanooga Times reporter Beverly Carroll, who covered Williams' early months on

the bench, said the judge has good intentions but his methods "leave a lot to be desired."

"He runs roughshod over people and treats them like they're dogs," she said.

Williams also has pushed E-nself. He put himself through Morehouse College and through Howard University Law School, where he graduated Phi Beta Kappa. He practiced law in Chattanooga for 11 years before being elected judge last spring.

"You're not dealing with some kook. ... I do have reasonable credentials," he said.

Williams got 56 percent of the vote when he was elected.

In a recent poll by the Chattanooga Bar Association, Williams got a favorable rating from 53.52 percent of 71 lawyers surveyed. Only one of the city's 19 federal, state and local judges received a lower rating.

No matter, says Williams, who insists he is more popular than ever among voters.

Low-income families fail to claim special tax credit

WASHINGTON (AP) — At least 2 million low-income working families with children are failing to claim a special tax credit worth up to \$2,020 a year, the Internal Revenue Service estimated Thursday.

"This is a law that really does do good things for working families," IRS Commissioner Fred T. Goldberg Jr. said in joining a nationwide public-service campaign to publicize the earned-income credit. But it can't help if it isn't claimed. Many of those who miss out on the credit earn so little that no tax is withheld from their paychecks and, thus, they don't even file a return, Goldberg said.

Many workers who lost their jobs or worked only part time last year because of the recession may be eligible for the credit for the first time.

At least some of the credit may be available to a family until earnings exceed \$21,250.

The credit was enacted to offset a portion of Social Security taxes and to give low-income parents with children an extra incentive for working and staying off the welfare rolls. It has been expanded regularly, most recently in 1990.


Most working families with earnings between \$6,000 and \$13,000 qualify for a credit of at least \$1,000. The maximum basic credit is \$1,192 for a one-child family and \$1,235 for a family with two or more children. A new supplement provides up to an additional of up to \$357 for a child who was born in 1991 and another \$428 maximum to help buy health insurance.

Father doubts friend killed daughter

TWIN FALLS - The man charged with killing a 2-year-old Twin Falls girl is an unlikely murder suspect, the girl's father said Thursday.

Ronald Phipps, the father of Amanda Hostetler, said in a telephone interview from his home in Pocatello Thursday that he doesn't think Donnell "Bud" Stradley killed Phipps' daughter.

Stradley was charged with first-degree murder Thursday and ordered held in jail

without bond.

"Buddy's a good friend of mine," said Phipps, 24. "He don't want to hurt anybody."

He said the two have been friends for about 10 years.

Phipps said he didn't see his daughter much, especially after moving to Pocatello last summer.

"I just tried to let her live her own life and take care of Amanda," he said of Jodie Hostetler, the baby's mother.

Phipps said he felt badly when he heard of Amanda's death Monday night.

"It's a real bummer thing," he said. "But you can't do anything about it."

Police say they are still investigating evidence that Amanda may have been physically abused.

Phipps said a friend told him on Thanksgiving that Amanda had two black eyes from falling out of bed.

At Christmas, Phipps visited Twin Falls and found Stradley at work. Phipps said he asked where Amanda and Jodie Hostetler could be found so he could deliver some Christmas presents.

Stradley told him then that Amanda's

eyes were blackened by a fall into the bathtub, Phipps said.

He asked if Amanda, his only child, had received medical attention and Stradley said that she had.

Phipps said he went to see his daughter at her home, stayed for 10 to 15 minutes and left, comfortable in the knowledge that she was under a doctor's care.

On Monday, Phipps said Jodie Hostetler called to tell him Amanda had died.

Hostetler said she had put Amanda down to sleep and she never woke up, Phipps said.

Stallings says plant at INEL will shut down

TWIN FALLS - The facility at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory that reprocesses spent nuclear fuel will soon be history, Congressman Richard Stallings said Thursday.

"It's going to close down," Stallings said after speaking to a meeting of the Twin Falls Optimistic Club. ("Deputy Energy Secretary Henson) Moore said so yesterday. The kinds of programs that require what it produces (highly enriched uranium) are being phased back."

Stallings and the rest of the Idaho congressional delegation met with Moore and Gov. Cecil Andrus at the INEL Summit Wednesday, a meeting arranged by Sen. Larry Craig in the wake of the simmering controversy between the state and the federal Energy Department over storage of radioactive waste at INEL.

Moore told reporters Wednesday that the future of the Chem Plant would be decided later this year, but Stallings said he had no doubt that it would be shut down.

He predicted the 625 jobs will not all be lost. "The construction jobs are probably gone, but the site workers will probably be absorbed in other projects," he said.

Trucker hauling missile parts pleads innocent to DUI charge

TWIN FALLS - A California man who was hauling missile engines was cited Wednesday night for driving under the influence of alcohol.

Jerry R. Hale Jr. pleaded innocent to the misdemeanor in Magistrate Court Thursday and was later released after posting a \$2,500 bond.

Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor Tracy Post said the missile engines Hale was hauling are explosive. Hale said in court the engines are not explosive.

According to an affidavit by Cpl. Salena Stanley of the Idaho State Police, Hale said he had a few drinks after stopping in Jackpot before driving into Idaho.

Hale also pleaded innocent to misdemeanor charges of drug possession, driving while disqualified and a federal count of consuming intoxicants. He pleaded guilty to one count of failing to maintain his log book.

Fish and Game seeks another bird farmer for Jerome farm

JEROME - An exotic bird farmer is needed in Jerome County.

The bird farm, southeast of Jerome, is owned by the Idaho Fish and Game Department and is leased to private company operators and Carl Jerome, Fish and Game regional supervisor.

Farmers fear pipeline project would hurt crops, damage soil

TWIN FALLS - Local farmers fear pipeline construction through the Magic Valley will disrupt their operations.

Building new pipeline during the irrigation season would be the worst possible time for farmers, several people said Thursday at a hearing on a proposal by the Northwest Pipeline Corp. to lay additional pipe through the Magic Valley.

A draft environmental impact on the proposal, compiled by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, lists critical times to avoid construction in certain wildlife areas.

"I think farmers should have the same consideration," said Dave Carter, U.S. Department of Agriculture research soil scientist.

He recommended the pipeline be built in the fall, which would not interfere with crops and would give soil time to settle. It also would give time to check for and repair canal leaks, he said.

The proposed pipeline would cross the

Twin Falls Canal Co.'s canals in three places and laterals in 31 places.

Canal company manager Dick Haumann said digging under the canals when they are full of water is not a good idea. The wet soil is weak and digging risks a canal break that could cut off water to 200,000 acres - nearly all the land irrigated by the system.

"Digging" under canals - running at capacity risks washouts and lawsuits, said Jim Bright, manager of the Milner Irrigation District. "It's the most sensitive time the pipeline can go through," he said.

"We have not firmly set out building schedule," said Harold Gillet, manager of project engineering for Northwest Pipeline. The company will evaluate the comments and try to avoid bad timing for the farmers, he said.

Some were concerned about the effect of disrupted operations on crop contracts. Others were worried that blasted rock used as backfill in the pipeline trench would work its way to the surface, reducing the quality of the topsoil.

Farmers would be compensated for any

losses connected with the pipeline project, including losses away from the actual construction site. But many were skeptical about how much and how timely that compensation would be.

Northwest Pipeline proposes to increase existing pipeline capacity by adding 30 miles of 24-inch pipe through Twin Falls County and about 60 miles of 24-inch pipe through Cassia County.

In addition, a compressor station would be built about 12 miles northwest of Burley. The new pipeline would run from north of Filer, across U.S. Highway 30 east of the Curry Crossing, south of Twin Falls it would cross Orchard Drive and the South Blue Lakes Vista Subdivision. It would continue east past Murtaugh into Cassia County. Another new segment of pipeline would run from Burley to Pocatello.

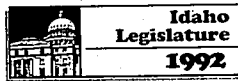
Budget committee chairwoman calls CSI funding request 'wishful thinking'

BOISE - College of Southern Idaho President Gerald Meyerhoeffer asked the Legislature's budget-writing committee Thursday for about \$355,000 more in state funding for next year.

The committee's co-chairwoman called that wishful thinking.

Meyerhoeffer went before the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee to make his case for more state help in handling the combination of soaring enrollments and flat



or falling property valuations.

"We recognize the scarcity of funding," said Meyerhoeffer, who testified along with North Idaho College president Bob Bennett. But, he added, "I urge you, in this year of very tight dollars, to treat all education in an equitable manner."

IFAC Co-chairwoman Kitty Gurnsey, a

Boise Republican, said the community colleges would get the same budgetary consideration as public schools and the state's four-year institutions.

But with only \$50 million in new revenue expected next year and no budget surplus cash to dole out, Gurnsey said, they shouldn't expect too much.

"The governor's budget is reality," she said. "The request they're making is wishful thinking. You have to separate needs from wants."

The state's two community colleges have

Illness forces Dan Alban from bench

KETCHUM - After serving Blaine County for 17 years as a magistrate judge, Daniel L. Alban is resigning from the bench.

Instead of making legal decisions for other people, Alban's No. 1 priority now is taking care of his health in what has been a long battle against multiple sclerosis.

"I simply couldn't do my job," Alban explains with regret in his voice. "I couldn't do it the way a judge has to do his work - that is with full attention to the job."

Even though his resignation was effective Dec. 31, of last year, Alban is being recognized by the community and has been named honorary co-chairman of the 1992

MS is a degenerative disease affecting the central nervous system and brain, characterized by increasing disability. There is no cure.

Alban, 46, received his law degree from the University of Arizona Law School in 1971. Arriving soon after in Sun Valley for a little rest and relaxation from the rigors of law school, Alban took a job as a law clerk in

Twin Falls, driving daily to Sun Valley.

In 1974, he set up his own law practice in Ketchum. That same year at age 29, he was appointed to replace a retiring magistrate judge.

"It was scary because I knew I didn't know enough to present myself as a learned, wise judge that we all have this image of," Alban recalls.

To prepare himself, Alban used the four months before his tenure on the bench began to educate himself on the intricacies of judgeship.

Alban traveled all over Idaho, sitting in with other judges, watching the proceedings in open court and then witnessing what took

Kniewel sees no evil for a 2nd jump

TWIN FALLS - Riding a rocket across the Snake River Canyon would be a "wild deal ... a crazy shot," Robbie Kniewel said Thursday night.

But it's been his dream and for \$10 million he'll take the chance, possibly leaving the Twin Falls area with a pile of money too, he said.

Kniewel fielded questions from Magic Valley residents on a KMYT-TV call-in program. A few callers expressed concern about potential security and crowd problems, but most said the 29-year-old Kniewel should get the chance to do what his father could not in 1974 - clear the canyon in a one-man rocket.

"I don't want to get in and risk my life unless I'm going to make a bunch of money," Kniewel said.

He set that figure at \$10 million.

In return, the local economy would gain and the city and county would get an as-yet undetermined piece of the action - a prospect that Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman and Twin Falls Mayor Howard Allen, who joined Kniewel on the show, clearly liked.

Kniewel promised to bring an anti-drug message to the schools as part of his feat, and said that he will work with local and state authorities to provide security.

Asked what he would like the people of the Magic Valley to gain from the event, Kniewel responded:

"I would like them to gain my honesty ... and accumulate all that revenue."

Kniewel would like to try his jump on or near the 20th anniversary of his father's attempt - Sept. 8, 1994.

Welfare official won't stand trial

Economist touts capitalism

TWIN FALLS - The environment and capitalism are compatible, a conservative economist asserted Thursday, but he isn't as sure about former communist countries.
 Randy Simmons, who worked for four years under James Watt, in the U.S. Department of the Interior, used Zimbabwe and England as examples.
 "In Zimbabwe, landowners own their wildlife on their land. They manage their land for wildlife so they can charge hunters up to \$25,000 to hunt elephants, Simmons told a crowd at the College of Southern Idaho.
 Fishing clubs own the streams in England, and they sue if the somebody pollutes their streams.
 "Most of the world's environmental problems are caused because people don't pay the costs of their actions," he said.
 He believes free markets and capitalism protect the environment better than government regulations.
 "If you have property rights, you manage things better," Simmons said.
 What Simmons didn't have a stab to solve problems like Middle Snake River pollution. If somebody owned the Snake, lawsuits could stop polluters quickly, he said.
 "I don't know if there is a system where you can own the Snake, but I would like to try," he said.
 The problem with public ownership is that large groups - such as the public - don't act in concert as well as small groups.
 He also predicted problems in former communist countries moving into capitalism. He wasn't sure those societies were ready for the risks of capitalism.
 His speech was part of CSI's 1992 Snake River Symposium on the World Economy.
 On Feb. 6, a radically different view will be presented by E.K. Hunt, who helped organize the Union for Radical Political Economics.
 He asserts that the U.S. government is a system in which the wealthy and elite control the economy for their advantage and destroy the environment and other people in the process.

Teams head downhill to raise MS funds

SUN VALLEY - This Saturday, 22 teams will race to the slopes of Dollar Mountain for the 6th annual Jimmie Heuga's Mazda Ski Express.
 The fund-raising event will give local teams an opportunity to compete in a downhill challenge in a nationwide effort to help those with multiple sclerosis meet an uphill challenge.
 Staged at 33 resorts across the country, this is the primary fund-raising vehicle for The Jimmie Heuga Center, a non-profit scientific research center that develops personalized health and fitness programs for people with MS.
 Last year, 25 teams competed at Sun Valley raising \$147,000, the largest sum of any of the participating resorts. The nationwide effort raised more than \$1 million, with a quarter of that amount remaining in the communities.
 Team Laurent Perrier of Sun Valley raised nearly \$55,000 - the highest individual amount nationwide - earning each of the three team members a Mazda four-wheel-drive vehicle.
 Sun Valley has earned respect on the Heuga circuit, often topping all other resorts for total dollars earned. This year's goal for all Sun Valley teams is \$60,000.
 The race's honorary co-chairmen are Larry Flynn of KSKI radio and the Honorable Judge Dan Alban who

recently retired from the bench due to his challenge with MS.
 Cheering the participants on at the Sun Valley race will be Jimmie Heuga as well as SKI Express spokespersons, three-time Olympian and World Cup Champion Tamara McKinney.
 Heuga, founder and president of The Jimmie Heuga Center, contracted MS at the height of his ski racing career. Heuga was the first U.S. mar in 1964, along with teammate Billy Kidd, to win an Olympic medal in alpine skiing.
 McKinney, a former woman's U.S. ski team stand out, won more individual World Cup races during her 14-year career than any other U.S. skier.
 Races begin at 8:30 a.m. on Dolla Mountain with the four-hour marathon race at 9 a.m. A spectator may view the Giant Slalom.
 The grand prize will be an expense-paid trip to compete in the national finals in Vail/Beaver Creek, Colo., Apr. 8-12.
 Parking is limited, but KART buses provide free transportation, arriving at Dolla Mountain from downtown Ketchikan every 20 minutes. Buses can be taken from the Sun Valley Lodge Circle every hour, 20 minutes after and 40 minutes after the hour.
 Proceeds retained from the Heuga Ski Races will benefit the Sun Valley SKI Education Foundation, a non-profit organization which provides ski training and competition for both alpine and nordic skiers.

 requested a total of \$9,039,400 in General Fund money for the next fiscal year. That's \$605,300 more than Gov. Cecil Andrus' budget recommendation. The fiscal year 1992 appropriation for both colleges was \$8,223,100.
 Under an agreement between the two schools made several years ago, CSI receives 48.5 percent of the community college appropriation, while NIC gets 51.5 percent.
 On Thursday, Meyerhoeffer asked for a \$250,000 "equity enhancement" on top of that allotment to help make up for lagging property tax revenues.
 That, combined with CSI's 48.5 percent share of the requested \$216,300 increase for community colleges, would give the school about \$355,000 more in General Fund money in fiscal 1993 than it received for the current year.
 The college levies a tax on property owners in Twin Falls and Jerome counties. The levy provides about 28

percent of CSI's operating revenue, Meyerhoeffer said.
 But outside the city of Twin Falls, property valuations have stayed flat or fallen, he said, and CSI's levy rate has reached its legal limit. As a result, Meyerhoeffer said, the college lost \$300,000 in property tax receipts between 1989 and 1991.
 While property tax revenues have been going down, CSI's enrollment has been going up. In fact, it's risen 37.7 percent in the last five years. Enrollment now totals about 3,400, Meyerhoeffer said, including 2,200 full-time students.
 "When 28 percent of your budget is going the wrong way, especially with the way we've been growing, that's not a good thing," he said.
 Gurnsey suggested that NIC and CSI could alter their distribution formula so that they split evenly whatever funds the Legislature ends up appropriating.

Rupert parents plan non-alcoholic party for graduates

RUPERT — Several Rupert parents are organizing an \$18,000 party for their graduating seniors, though not everyone in town is happy with the gambling that is planned.

Carol Dorman, who heads a committee of parents called "Senior Celebration '92," said the chemical-free party that is slated to last all night will feature high-ticket prizes, such as microwaves, electric hand mixers, dishes and games.

The party that also will include a continental breakfast and all-night dancing has an estimated budget of \$18,000, Dorman told the Minidoka School Board at its recent meeting.

Dorman said to entice kids to attend the committee hopes to run a casino — with "phony" money — including games such as a football toss, pingpong and chess.

She added there also will be plenty of chaperones and food. She said so far the location has been narrowed down to two places, either the Rupert Elks or the Burley Mall.

Board member Bill Hepworth told Dorman that the committee would not be getting School Board support for the party.

"We are not asking for your support," Dorman answered.

"I am here to fill you in on how the plans are going and to let you know what we are trying to do to raise the money for the party. The committee plans to distribute a letter to area merchants asking them to help support the new tradition."

Hepworth said later he did not wish the celebration committee to think the school district backed the party.

"We cannot lend our name to something that we cannot have our hand in," Hepworth said.

Karla Jensen, who is also on the committee, said the group is trying to start a new tradition in town that will help put an end to the tragedies associated with substance abuse.

"What is the alternative?", Jensen asked.

"We don't want the kids to do what is normally done, by some, on graduation night — drinking and driving. We are trying to plan a party that will entice the kids to come, and stay, and have a good time doing so."

Teacher talks about heart disease

RUPERT — Statistics show that 40 percent of children five to eight have a higher-than-expected risk from heart disease, according to the physical fitness instructor from Big Valley Elementary School.

Vickie Neiwert, a second-year teacher, reported to the board at its recent meeting that children most at risk are overweight, have a low activity level, have high blood pressure or have high cholesterol.

"This is alarming to me, and I think it should be alarming to the community as well," Neiwert said.

"It has been noted that if you get a child involved in physical activities that it builds their self-

esteem, which in turn helps them in other ways also."

"We want our kids to participate, and feel confident in what they are doing," she said. "Physical fitness is very important, so here at Big Valley we have P.E. twice a week. Each of the children are improving as the year goes along."

With the help of two students Justin Pinther and Laura Shadduck, Neiwert explained how students prepare for the national and the presidential fitness award tests. The two students demonstrated sit-ups, pull-ups and a running exercise, which are all part of the tests Neiwert gives during the year.

She said that last year 11

percent of the students at Big Valley passed the national and eight percent passed the presidential. Neiwert said she hopes for even higher numbers this year, due to the level of activity in the P.E. classes.

Wendell patrons will vote again on new high school

WENDELL — On March 10, voters in the Wendell School District — for the second time — will decide the fate of a \$9.83 million bond issue.

"The situation is desperate," Facilities Committee leader Katie Cutler said Monday at a trustee meeting. "We do not have space for our kids."

Cutler said the district has more than 100 students beyond its capacity.

The bond, she said, would fund a new high school, removal of a 70-year-old section of the existing High School and an addition to the Elementary School library.

Last September, the first bond issue request got a 64-percent "yes" vote, just short of the two-thirds majority needed.

Cutler said she is hopeful that the bond will pass this time.

"We think people realize that it is very much needed," she said.

Architect Jim Coles of Design West said the proposed high school has the same square footage as presented last year, but the floor plan has been refined.

Read Miller of Ormond Builders

said the cost of the bond, set at \$9.83 million last year, had to be raised because of higher building rates.

Cutler said voters can register at the Wendell City Hall until Feb. 21, and at the Gooding County Courthouse until Feb. 28. Those who voted in the city election in November are already registered, she said.

The recent trustee meeting lasted from 7:30 p.m. until about 2:15 a.m. "It was just a long night," Superintendent Larry Manly said.

The meeting included two closed sessions on staff evaluation reviews, and on a student enrollment request.

Lynn Hughs was hired as a grant writing consultant, to be paid a fee only if Wendell receives a grant.

Elementary Principal Colleen Larson and High School Principal Bert Deglow explained new procedures to evacuate students from school buildings to nearby churches in case of bomb threats or fires.

Trustees renewed the three-year contract of Manly but did not set his salary. Principal contract evaluations are scheduled for next month.

The February board meeting day was moved ahead one week to Feb. 10.

Opinions vary on outcome of INEL Summit meeting

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus said he is satisfied with promises that nuclear waste will be used or moved and more jobs will be created than cut in coming years at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

In the wake of Wednesday's long-anticipated INEL Summit between Andrus and Deputy Energy Secretary Henson Moore on the future of the eastern Idaho nuclear reservation, Andrus was expressing optimism.

"We made tremendous progress," Andrus said.

But that was not a universal view. "We were underwhelmed," said Kerry Cooke, executive director of the Snake River Alliance. "What we heard from Moore was nothing that we haven't been hearing from the Energy Department for years. From the standpoint of what was accomplished, it is a waste of the taxpayers' money."

Moore told reporters that the Energy Department was committed to the long-term future of the INEL. And the former Louisiana congressman was adamant that the

government is committed to removing the nuclear waste now stored at INEL once permanent repositories are opened.

He said the government would stop reprocessing nuclear waste at the Chemical Processing Plant at INEL, and that a decision about the facility's future would be made later this year.

But he offered only vague assurances about plans for tons of spent fuel from Public Service Co. of Colorado's mothballed Fort St. Vrain reactor.

"All we ever asked on that waste is a guarantee that it's going to be reprocessed and not just stacked up. I heard (Moore) say that they will give us in the future all of their criteria as to where it comes from and what they're going to do with it," Andrus said.

Idaho Rep Richard Stallings said in Twin Falls Thursday he didn't expect Idaho's border would open anytime soon to shipments of radioactive waste from outside the state, but that at least Andrus and the Energy Department are talking now.

Planned rate boost for Elko cut

CARSON CITY (AP) — A proposal by Sierra Pacific Power Co. to boost electric rates of its Elko customers by 24 percent has been cut to a 14 percent increase by the state Public Service Commission.

The new electric rates, effective Feb. 1, will generate \$4.5 million in new annual revenues for Sierra Pacific. The Reno-based utility had hoped to get \$13 million.

Reductions by the PSC included a denial of the 12.7 percent profit level sought by the utility. The ceiling was set at 12 percent.

The commission also rejected interest expenses accrued on money set aside for the utility's early retirement program, and eliminated \$2.4 million in costs stemming from a dispute with a Utah coal supplier, Coastal States Energy Co.

Aim high in selecting Jim Munn's successor

Jim Munn predicts a tear in his eye when he steps down as Twin Falls County sheriff at the end of this year. County residents will be a little saddened, too.

Munn, 67, has been a good sheriff. In the 12 years he has held office, he has raised the level of professionalism in the sheriff's department. Under Munn, the department is a thoroughly modern police force.

His deputies, though notoriously underpaid, are efficient and courteous. Misconduct is largely unknown. The new jail built during his administration is secure and free from abuse.

(Coincidentally, among today's letters to the editor is a testimonial from an inmate who says the jail is the finest of the many he has visited. Always ask the man who knows.)

While the community is thanking Munn for his service, however, we also should be thinking about his replacement. We must be sure to elect a successor who will maintain or even raise the standard Munn has set.

That's not as easy as you might think.

Building and maintaining professionalism in a department run by an elected sheriff can be difficult. If a candidate is popular, he may be elected despite weak law-enforcement credentials and poor administrative skills.

That's one reason why we'd like to

see Idaho's Constitution amended to let county commissioners hire a chief law officer, just as city councils hire police chiefs.

We don't foresee that happening anytime soon. Short of such a reform, however, citizens should ask hard questions of sheriff candidates.

In the 1990s, citizens of a fairly urbanized county such as Twin Falls have the right to expect a sheriff with extensive law-enforcement experience, with an administrative background and perhaps with a college degree.

They have a right to expect someone independent of influential groups, free of conflicts of interest and possessing a professional attitude that transcends the good-ole-boy approach of some small-town departments.

That's a lot to demand for only \$31,000 a year. Compare that figure with the nearly \$45,000 that the city of Twin Falls pays its public safety director; the county is shopping for professionalism on the cheap.

Even so, two decent candidates already have come forward, and a couple more are rumored. It remains to be seen which, if any, of these candidates is the right choice.

The decision merits close attention from voters. With Jim Munn, Twin Falls County has moved forward. Let's not allow those gains to slip away.

Modern dogs have been bred to bark rather than howl, but the volume is still there. Some breeds, especially the hounds

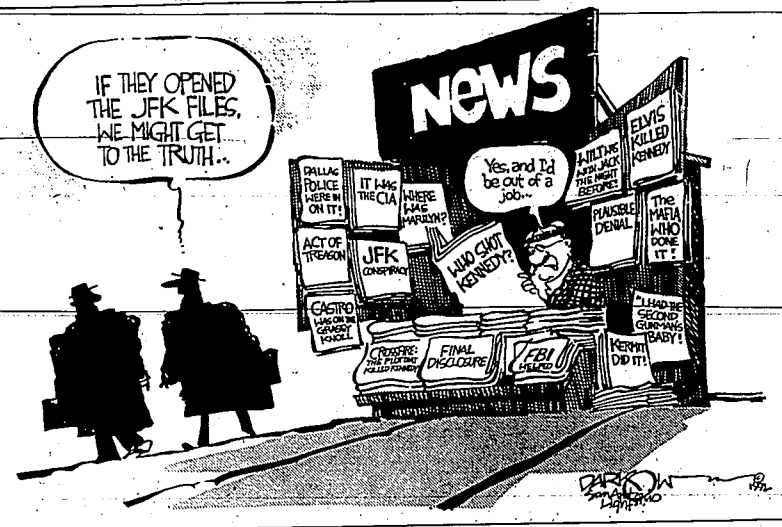

Court boosts pro-choice's agenda

Abortion-rights activists had their back-to-the-back-alley-butchers rhetoric ready to roll this week, minutes after the Supreme Court announced it would rule on the case of Planned Parenthood vs. Casey.

But some of them aren't as unhappy as they sound.

The Supreme Court's move fits neatly into a complex and convoluted scenario that would leave pro-choice groups not only triumphant but richer and more politically powerful.

Technically, what's at issue is a Pennsylvania state law that nibbles around the edges of the legal right to abortion. It requires a physician to describe to a woman requesting an abortion how a fetus develops and to inform her about alternatives to ending the pregnancy. She must then wait 24 hours before the procedure can be carried out.

A married woman must decline in writing she has told her husband she plans an abortion (unless she has been a victim of abuse reported to police). A minor must have permission from a parent or a court. Records must be kept.

Never mind that the restrictions sound rather reasonable. A woman seeking an abortion should be fully informed about what she is doing. A husband, who is legally required to support a baby after birth, should have the right to know if his unborn child is to be destroyed. Parents, who must give permission for all other medical treatment of their minor offspring, should be involved in abortion decisions.

But these aren't really the issue. Abortion-rights activists argue - and some anti-abortion leaders agree - that if the Supreme Court upholds the Pennsylvania law, it will have effectively overturned Roe vs. Wade.

Either the right to abortion is a fundamental right or it is not, the activists insist. If the high court upholds the Pennsylvania law, it will be saying, essentially, that the right to abortion is not fundamental, that it can be

restricted. The door will be open for other states to heap more constraints on abortion. Roe will, essentially, be overturned.

Said Kathryn Kolbert, of the American Civil Liberties Union, who will argue the case before the Supreme Court this spring: "The court can easily overrule Roe just by deciding the Pennsylvania case."

Lamented Kate Michelman, executive director of the National Abortion Rights Action League: "With the court's announcement that it will hear the Pennsylvania case, the days of safe and legal abortion in America are numbered. We are on the edge of a legal precipice, facing a future without a right to choose. Losing this fight is no longer distant and inconceivable. Because of President Bush, it is immediate and inevitable."

Michelman added, "Back-alley abortions are about to be a tragic American reality once again because George Bush is the most anti-choice, anti-woman president in history."

But wait. Abortion-rights activists have a plan. And the Supreme Court is playing its part right on cue.

Pro-choice groups know that they can now count on sure on only two high court justices to support abortion rights in all instances: Harry A. Blackmun, who wrote the Roe vs. Wade decision, and John Paul Stevens.

So, they want to get the issue out of the courts and into the legislative process. And they want to do so in the most critical time of an election year.

First, they will try to convince the nation that Roe vs. Wade is essentially dead, whether the high court actually overrules it or, more likely, just upholds most of all the Pennsylvania law.

Then they intend to persuade members of Congress to pass a "Freedom of Choice Act"

that would give abortion rights the protection of federal law.

According to the scenario, Congress passes the bill. It lands on George Bush's desk in midsummer. He vetoes it. Congress is unable to override. Angry voters, persuaded they are losing a fundamental right and that thousands of women will die in back-alley abortions, throw pro-life legislators - and Bush - out of office in November.

A pro-abortion president ends up in the White House. (All five Democratic candidates now say they are pro-choice, although not all of them have consistently been so.) He signs the new abortion-rights legislation that a new Democratic Congress quickly passes. He names pro-choice justices to the high court when the next vacancies occur. And state legislators, packed with pro-choice politicians, stop passing restrictive laws intended to nibble away at Roe vs. Wade.

There are, however, several problems with this scenario. Even if the Pennsylvania law is upheld by the Supreme Court, much of the American public may not view it as the end of the right to abortion. They may not react with the fury - and the funds - the pro-choice forces are counting on.

Members of Congress will be less than eager to vote on abortion in an election-year summer. Most polls show that a clear majority of Americans support abortion only in cases of rape, incest, danger to the mother's health or abnormalities in the unborn child.

Far fewer people approve of abortion because of economic circumstances, interference with career or lifestyle, inconvenience or as a means of contraception. The issue can still be a no-win morn for pro-choice as well as pro-life politicians - as well as a tired irritant for millions of voters.

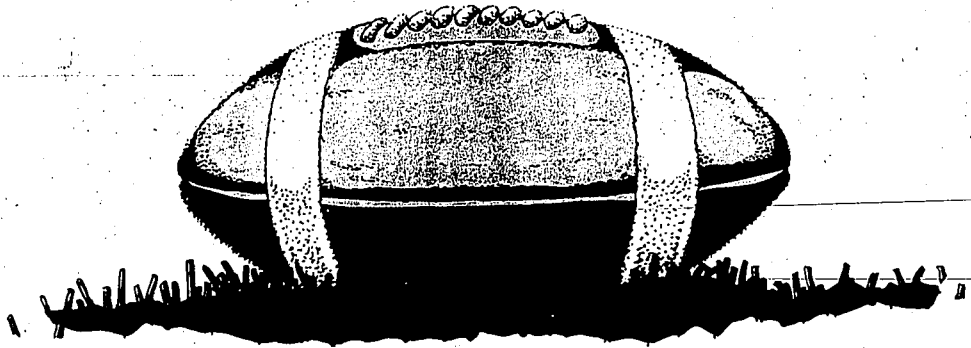

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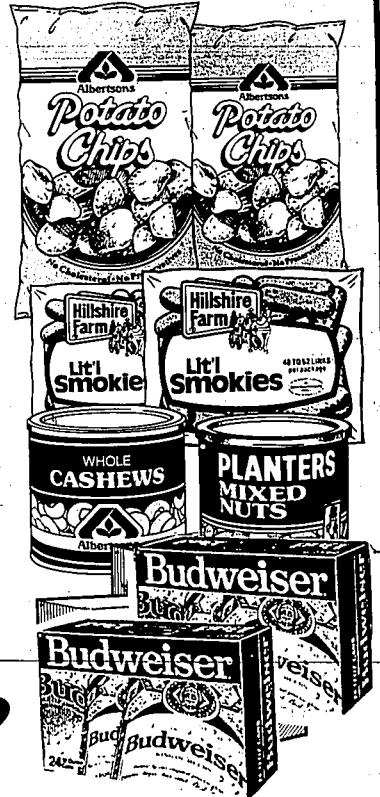
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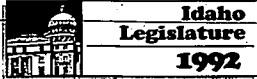

Senate begins review of INEL's impacts on health

Former chief waives preliminary hearing

BOISE (AP) — The next study of health risks at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory needs a broader scope and public involvement, Snake River Alliance board member Kerry Cooke says.



"If we're going to have a study that merits respect, it needs to look at all the subjects ever used at the INEL," Cooke said. "The chemical risks as well as the radiological ones."

She appeared Wednesday night before the state's 14-member Dose Evaluation and Risk Assessment Panel, which is conducting a "dose reconstruction study" of radiation exposure to people living near the INEL.

The panel — composed of technical people, farmers, tribal government, business and environmental group representatives — was formed in response to a 1990 study by the U.S. Department of Energy that estimated radiation doses to people living near the INEL over the past 40 years. That study concluded that the

highest estimated dose of airborne radiation in the INEL's history was 1,350 millirems to the thyroid of a hypothetical infant who might have lived in a building at the site's northeast border during 1956. That was 90 percent of the maximum 1,500-millirem dose deemed safe at the time, but 18 times higher than 1989's 75-millirem safety standard.

As a measure of how much things appear to have improved at the INEL between 1985 and 1989, the 1990 federal study estimated that doses to a person's most sensitive organs never exceeded 3 percent of the latest, more stringent standard.

But scientists who reviewed that study for the state last year recommended a more extensive one. The new study will be done independently under the direction of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control. It will be patterned after similar studies at the Energy Department's Hanford, Wash., and Fernald, Ohio, sites.

During the new study, nuclear and chemical engineers will look at processes used at the INEL. Environmental scientists will examine monitoring data and release pathways when constructing models to estimate doses, and epidemiologists will determine possible health effects.

Panel: Is common sense lacking in health agency?

BOISE (AP) — Senators grilled Health and Welfare Board Chairman Wylfa Barsness on Thursday about the board's handling of regulations to implement state laws.

The lawmakers contend that all too often common sense fails to prevail.

But Health and Welfare Committee Chairman Rex Furness, R-Rigby, said members of both parties were simply venting their spleen over the Health and Welfare Department's regulatory practices. He said Barsness' confirmation to a third-four-year term on the board was not in jeopardy.

Still, Furness and others, including Democrat Mary Lloyd of Pocatello, maintained the citizen board members rely too heavily on the recommendations of professionals in the department.

"Employees in the Department of Health and Welfare are not always in the real world," Furness said.

"That's when your board should step in... But I believe you people put a lot more weight on what the department says than on what we say as representatives of the people."

And Lloyd said the board needs to investigate the huge volume of citizen complaints about its regulatory activities.

"Ninety percent of the phone calls I get are complaints about Health and Welfare," she said. "That's not an exaggeration. That's a fact... I would really appreciate if some of these things were looked into."

Sen. Russell Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, convinced the committee to delay its vote on recommending reconfirmation of Barsness earlier this month.

He was dissatisfied with answers he was provided about what the department is doing to help fish farmers and other producers in the Magic Valley reduce pollution in the Snake River.

Attorney general takes aim at drug traffickers

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Larry EchoHawk, declaring Idaho a likely target for drug traffickers, wants state lawmakers to enact sweeping changes in racketeering laws.

"Large scale drug trafficking, with its state-of-the-art technology, is now a reality," EchoHawk said on Thursday. "We've got to attack drug dealing in this state on all fronts."

He specifically proposed:

- A state Money Laundering Act that subjects those concealing drug or racketeering profits subject to up to 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine or twice the value of the profits involved.
- Expansion of the state Racketeering Act to allow forfeiture of property or proceeds used in racketeering with the money diverted to state and local law enforcement and to classify as criminal racketeering tax evasion, evidence tampering, witness intimidation, wiretapping, money laundering and battery.
- Unification of the civil forfeiture provisions of the state drug and racketeering laws to include power in breaking a criminal enterprise to take out-of-state assets or substitute assets for those that have been hidden, transferred or co-mingled.

MINNEAPOLIS — The Buffalo Bills are at it again.

Scoring by the bunches? Dominating defenses? Not quite.
Complaining. Making headlines off the field. Dare we say it — bickering?

Things haven't gotten nearly as bad as in 1989, when the Bills were ravaged by internal strife. One-of-the-league's more talented teams back then, as now, the Bills went 9-7 and lost their first playoff game.

Those Bickering Bills were hurt by disputes between Jim Kelly and Thurman Thomas, Andre Reed and Ronnie Harmon, and several factions within the team, some comprised along racial lines.

These Bills are getting the reputation as complainers, even crybabies. The most notable news during Super Bowl week has emanated from the AFC champions. And, it hasn't been pretty.

The most recent incidents involve Thomas, the NFL's most valuable player this season. Thomas should be a least likely candidate for complaints. Or disappearances.

But, as if this were 1989, Thomas is feeling unappreciated and unhappy. On Tuesday, he talked about being bypassed for the Super Bowl MVP award last year, an injustice Thomas had been claiming for nearly a year.

Then he bypassed Wednesday morning's media session, calling it "a misunderstanding."

"I was scheduled to go on at 8:30," he said. "I was in the breakfast room until 8:45 and no one came and got me. I was upset, went to my room, had some things to do, some people to call."

That about rumors that Thomas was upset because offensive coordinator Ted Marchibroda called Kelly the Bills' Michael Jordan?

What about allegations that Thomas stormed out of a mandatory team breakfast and then skipped the media sessions — the NFL can fine him for doing so — in protest?

"I am the Michael Jordan. I think we have two Michael Jordans," Thomas said. "Maybe we have two, me and Jim. He does a lot of things for this football team and so do I."

2 super sets of receivers will be difficult to catch

MINNEAPOLIS — Ricky Sanders of the Washington Redskins, who has set some Super Bowl records himself, looks woe at James Lofton and Art Monk.
"They're like my grandfathers," he says. "That's what they are. Grandpas."

The Redskins and Buffalo Bills enter Sunday's Super Bowl with super-sets of receivers, none more so than the 34-year-old Monk and the 35-year-old Lofton.

Each is within a couple of games of two of Steve Largent's career receiving records. Each is flanked by a remarkably similar duo that threatens to make Sunday's game into a shootout.

How similar?



Start with Lofton (Stanford) and Monk (Syracuse), the only two of the six to play Division I-A and the only two who were first-round draft choices. Monk, who has 801 career receptions, should pass Largent's 819 early next season, while Lofton is just

55 yards behind Largent's record of 13,089.

Continue with Andre Reed of the Bills and Gary Clark of the Redskins, two of the NFL's most dangerous over-the-middle threats and two of the best runners after a catch. Both went to small colleges (Reed to Kutztown State, Clark to James Madison). Both entered the league unheralded (Reed as a fourth-round draft pick in 1984 and Clark from the USFL). And both go to the Pro Bowl regularly.

"Not quite," Clark complains. "Andre goes to Hawaii every year. I just go once in a while."

And finish with two more small-college guys, Buffalo's Don Beebe (Chadron, Neb. State) and Washington's Sanders (Please see CATCH/B2)

Skins find success against gimmick offenses — so far

MINNEAPOLIS — Every bizarre offense the Washington Redskins have faced, they've solved. They say their toughest test will come in the Super Bowl against the no-huddle blitzkrieg of the Buffalo Bills.

The Redskins, who finished the regular season with the NFL's third-ranked defense, went 5-0 against pass-happy run-and-shoot teams.

They were 1-0 against the no-huddle, but it was hardly easy. They beat the lowly Cincinnati Bengals 34-27, almost blowing a 14-point lead.

The no-huddle makes it extremely difficult to make the dizzying defensive switches that Washington likes, so the Redskins are working on a scheme that has as many versatile players on the field as possible.

"It's definitely tough to substitute against a no-huddle, and that's what we like to do," said Richie Petitbon, Washington's assistant head coach for defense. "These guys get into a little groove where they have 30-40 guys on the field. That's not the case with Buffalo. It's boom-boom-boom-boom-boom. It wears the big guys out."

"I'll be lying on the ground after a play, and if I look up and see someone sprinting in to replace me, I'll get up and sprint off," defensive tackle Eric Williams said. "You

train for this game by running on a treadmill."

Buffalo's offense is anything but one-dimensional, and that also has Washington concerned.

"They remind me of a run-and-shoot team, but then, the minute they remind you of a run-and-shoot team, you look at their statistics," defensive end Charles Mann said. "They can run the football, too."

But first headaches first: Jim Kelly and his trio of receivers.

Kelly threw for an NFL-best 33 touchdowns during the season, spreading the scoring strikes primarily among wideouts James Lofton, Andre Reed and Don Beebe. Lofton had just eight touchdowns, but gained 1,072 yards. Reed had 81 catches for 1,115 yards and 10 touchdowns, and the sure-handed Beebe added 414 yards and six touchdowns on 32 pass receptions despite missing five games with a broken shoulder.

And Mann pointed out that the Bills also have a tight end to throw to as well. So far in the playoffs, their leading receiver isn't Lofton, Reed or even Beebe — it's tight end Keith Mckellar, who has caught eight passes for 73 yards.

"Kelly is a veteran quarterback, and he's real smart," defensive end Jumpy Gathers said. "He checks off at the line, and that's

Japanese-led group offers to buy M's

SEATTLE — A group of investors headed by the president of Japanese videogame maker Nintendo offered \$100 million Thursday to buy the financially troubled Seattle Mariners.
But Commissioner Fay Vincent immediately said it was "unlikely" the group's offer would be approved because it was headed by foreigners.

"Baseball has addressed the issue of ownership of its franchises and has developed a strong policy against approving investors from outside the United States and Canada," Vincent said in a statement issued in New York. "It is unlikely foreign investors would

receive the requisite baseball approval." Under the proposal, the chief investor would be Hiroshi Yamauchi, 63, president of Nintendo Co. Ltd. of Kyoto, Japan. He would own 60 percent of the franchise.

The offer must be approved by 11 of 14 American League owners and seven of 12 National League owners. Yamauchi has been listed by Forbes magazine as one of the world's richest men.

Jeff Smulyan, the Mariners' owner the past two seasons, put the franchise up for sale for \$100 million on Dec. 6 to local owners. Local bidders have until March 27 to make offers. Smulyan was facing fiscal pressure

when he put the Mariners up for sale. Security Pacific Bank was demanding he either repay a loan of nearly \$40 million or find a buyer.

"We're ready to close as soon as possible," said Howard Lincoln, senior vice president of Nintendo of America Inc., based in suburban Redmond. "We have sent a letter to Mr. Smulyan and we're hopeful we can proceed immediately to meet with him and get this letter of intent executed."

Lincoln is not among the investors, but spoke at a news conference for the group.

Lincoln said the group intended to raise \$125 million, with the remaining \$25 million used as operating money.

Traditional bad weather stalls Phoenix Open's opening round

Karl quit Sunday as coach of Spain's Real Madrid after apparently being offered the job on the telephone by Whitsitt. After clearing up personal business in Spain, he arrived at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport after midnight and was whisked early Thursday.

He watched as Kloppenburg conducted a one-hour practice Thursday morning.

Kloppenburg, 64, the team's scout, coached the Sonics to a 2-2 record after Jones was fired. Kloppenburg will remain on the bench to assist Karl, the Sonics announced.

Karl said he had watched videotape of the Sonics' play under Kloppenburg, a defensive specialist,

and was happy with the team's defense.

Under Kloppenburg, the Sonics have been trying to go to a fast-paced offense. The Sonics were more of a slow-down, half-court team under Jones.

"Offensively, there's a little bit of adjustment period going on right now," Karl said.

Karl said he knew he would have to be patient with his new team.

"I have to learn a lot, a lot of new terminology and a lot of calls, before I can have an impact on the team," he said.

Karl coached the Cleveland Cavaliers from 1984-86 and the Golden State Warriors from 1986-88. His career NBA record is 119-176.

should not pose any health risk to Magic or the other participants."

He said the Western Conference team would include 13 players, rather than the traditional 12, with Tim Hardaway of Golden State, the second-highest vote-getter among the active Western guards, also being named to the squad.

Johnson was the second only to Portland's Clyde Drexler in voting for guards. Besides Drexler, the other West starters will be forwards Karl Malone of Utah and Chris Mullin of Golden State and Chris

David Robinson of San Antonio.

The Eastern Conference starters will be Jordan, who led with every-one with 1,049,573 votes, Detroit guard Isiah Thomas, forwards Charles Barkley of Philadelphia and Larry Bird of Boston and center Patrick Ewing of New York.

The East team will be coached by Phil Jackson of Chicago and Don Nelson of Golden State will coach the West.

Seven more players will be added to each squad through voting by the head coaches in each conference.

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Edberg will meet Courier in final

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Not much effort by Stefan Edberg, nor by Jim Courier.

The two top men in tennis placidly set up a seemingly inevitable confrontation in Sunday's final of the injury-wracked Australian Open with an abbreviated afternoon of action Friday.

The No. 1 Edberg, who played impeccably to crush Courier in the U.S. Open final last summer, looked only slightly less perfect in stopping upstart Wayne Ferreira, the conqueror of John McEnroe, 7-6 (7-2), 6-1, 6-2.

Courier, who has a chance to sharply narrow the gap against Edberg, never had to hit a ball to make the final. His semifinal opponent, Richard Krajicek, a Dutchman with fast-flying serves, defaulted before the start because of tennisitis in his shoulder.

Ferreira held two set-points on Edberg's service at 6-5 in the first set. But after Ferreira blew them both with forehand errors his confidence and game drifted away.

Ferreira, who faced McEnroe 15 times, double-faulted nine times in six games starting at beginning of the second set. At 4-1 in that set, he double-faulted to give Edberg a 5-1 lead. Ferreira managed only

one ace in the last two sets after hitting four in the first set. He also committed 58 unforced errors to Edberg's 21.

"Once I got the first set I got on top of him, and his game fell apart," Edberg said. "He started making errors. I took advantage of that. I'm playing good tennis."

Ferreira, who played under a closed roof at night against McEnroe, said that in this match "the sun was a major factor for me" while serving, making it difficult to see the ball when he tossed it.

He also read all the chances he lost on Edberg's serves.

"I had a lot of breakpoints. I just didn't use them," he said. "He played really well on big points, and that's only from experience. If I'd gotten that first set under my belt, I'd probably have been a bit more on top of him. It was a bit of a letdown."

"But I can look back at this week and really be proud of what I've done," added Ferreira, who also beat David Wheaton and Mark Woodforde. "It's going to make me more confident. I'll be going into matches knowing I can beat anybody."

Looking forward to the final against Courier, Edberg said, "It's going to be good — No. 1 against No. 2. I like that."

The Australian Open this year has been plagued by injuries and health problems. Steffi Graf, the women's No. 2 seed, pulled out before the start because of a viral infection and German "measles." No. 9 — Manuela Maleeva-Fragniere defaulted in the quarters because of a toe injury.

Men's No. 6 Pete Sampras dropped out just before the start because of a shoulder injury, and now Krajicek had to quit for a similar reason.

"Jim is a good player," Krajicek said. "Because I couldn't play 100

percent, it would be almost impossible to beat him, and I could have made (my shoulder) worse. It was one of the hardest decisions I've ever had to make. It was the chance of a lifetime to play the semifinals in what ever happens again. I hope it will. This is the worst possible way to go out."

Krajicek served 22 aces in a five-set quarterfinals victory over Wimbledon champion Michael Stich, but fell sore by the end of the match. The shoulder got worse on Thursday, and Krajicek quit in the middle of a doubles semifinals match, saying he felt pain on the follow-through of his serve.

"To make the semifinals in singles and doubles, and to have to default, is unbelievable. It's almost tragic," Courier said. "The upside is I'm in the final. The downside is I don't get to play. You like to be in a rhythm going into the final of tournament."

Krajicek treated the shoulder with ice Thursday night, but said there was no improvement.

"I feel like an ace," Krajicek said after his default in a match with compatriot Jan Siemerink when they led 6-4, 1-3 against the Australian team of Mark Woodforde and Todd Woodbridge.

Ed Board OKs TV, radio deals for BSU coaches

BOISE (AP) — A divided state Board of Education has decided encouraging openness about how much Boise State University coaches are paid is more important right now than questioning whether they deserve the money.

The board voted 5-3 on Thursday to approve payments of \$13,700 to Boise State head football coach Skip Hall and \$10,150 to basketball coach Bobby Dye as part of the school's TV and radio contracts for coverage of BSU sports.

Earlier rejected a bid to hold consideration of the payments until the board reviews a report expected in March on an independent audit it ordered last fall on Boise State athletic programs.

The audit also includes the office of former Boise State president John Keiser, who was fired last September after board members said he had failed to deal openly with them on university issues including payments to himself, BSU coaches and the school's athletic director by the BSU Foundation.

Board members Karl Shurtliff of Boise, Roy Mosman of Moscow and Diane Bilyeu of Pocatello pushed for delaying approval of the TV and radio contract payments to Hall and Dye. Mosman said the coaches could afford to wait.

"From what I understand about the income situation of these people, they're not up against the financial hot pipes, so to speak," he said.

But other board members questioned whether they could stop payments called for in contracts between the university and KTVB-TV and radio station KBOI, and even if they could how Hall and Dye would react to the action.

"If I were Bobby Dye, I wouldn't show up for the broadcasts," board member Keith Hincekley of Blackfoot said.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans said part or all of the money paid coaches to do pre-game and post-game interviews and weekly wrapup programs should go to the university.

But since Boise State never before had even asked the Board of Education to review the payments, Evans said it was more important for now to

continue the progress started by at least having the information on the table.

The board eventually should consider a policy change cutting the amount of money coaches get from the TV and radio contracts, he said, but later.

"It's really not the coaches' money, at least not in my judgment," Evans said. "I think it's all the university's money and this board's responsibility."

Acting Boise State President Larry Selland said the university president and athletic director previously approved the coaches' payments under TV and radio contracts on their own.

Selland said the school decided to ask the board for approval after a policy was adopted last year requiring independent foundations that raise money for Idaho's college and universities, including the BSU Foundation, to disclose their finances.

A document provided by Boise State shows Hall will get \$32,800 and Dye \$34,200 from the school's TV and radio contracts during the budget year that began last July. The payments approved Thursday were for January through June.

Dye's annual salary is \$79,292. An audit was filed Thursday from \$58,410 to \$60,000, effective Feb. 1.

Meanwhile, the board heard a report Thursday showing the University of Idaho is the only school in the state's college and university system expected to spend more on intercollegiate athletics this year than last.

The report shows Boise State's athletic budget of \$4.7 million in the fiscal year through June is Idaho's largest, but that the University of Idaho expects to hike its athletic spending to more than \$5.34 in fiscal 1992 from \$2.9 million last year.

Overall, athletic budgets for Idaho's college and university system are expected to increase 1.3 percent to \$11.39 billion this year.

Athletic programs at Boise State and the University of Idaho are in the black. But Idaho State University and Lewis-Clark State College reported deficits of \$218,804 and \$34,657 for the current budget year — \$10,000 less than last year for Lewis-Clark and the same as last year for Idaho State.

'Nice guy' attacks woman

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska running back Scott Baldwin used to baby sit for his high school coach's children. He was working toward a degree to become a youth counselor.

Now, the player plagued last season by injuries is undergoing tests at a state mental hospital after attacking a Lincoln woman.

Friends, teammates and coaches struggling to understand how it happened described the 22-year-old from Roselle, N.J., Thursday as a quiet, hard-working overachiever.

"He is very much a very nice kid," said Roger Grooters, director of athletic academic programs for Nebraska. "He was around our area for four years and we never saw anything but a very positive, happy-go-lucky kid."

"Everybody who knows Scott, loves Scott," said Charles Chretien, athletic director at Roselle Clark High School in New Jersey. "In the 23 years I'd been associated with athletics at Roselle Clark High School, he made me proudest. He made everybody's job around here

so much easier. He was such a hard worker."

Co-captain and All-Big Eight cornerback Tyrone Legette said Baldwin always was an encouraging, hard-working teammate. He said the 20-year-old arrived in Lincoln about the same time and helped each other work through homesickness and other emotional problems of being away from home for the first time.

"He wasn't the type of person to hurt anybody. It's a shock to me," said Legette, who was out of town last weekend and learned about the incident when he returned to Lincoln earlier this week.

Friends, teammates and coaches are anxious for mental and drug test results to help them understand what happened last Saturday.

Baldwin was being evaluated at the Lincoln Regional Center to determine if he is competent to stand trial on assault charges stemming from Saturday's attack on 23-year-old Gina Simacek. She is listed in serious condition with head injuries.

Seles ready to give everything to defend title

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Strategy doesn't mean much to Monica Seles, who says the key to winning championships is found in the heart not the head.

Rather than worry about how to cope in the Australian Open final Saturday against the new net-attacking ace of Mary Joe Fernandez, Seles simply looks inside herself to raise her game.

Champions, she said, know how to play the big points in every match and the big matches in every tournament.

"I just really let myself. This is the last match of the tournament and give it everything you've got," she said. "That's probably why I play so well in the championships."

Seles also is trying to ignore the pressure of defending her title here and the ranking points that go with it.

"The first Grand Slam title I had to defend was the French Open, and it was really difficult," she said. "I never really felt that type of pressure until then. But I got used to it. I can't think about defending the points. I'm just going to have to play great tennis, and take it as a new year. That's what I promised myself — to forget '91, and in '92 forget defending your points. It's just too much pressure, and in this year it's not worth going through all this pressure."

She said too many champions and the players who chase them focus on the rankings, and miss out on the enjoyment of the game.

"I'm just trying to be the same as when I was No. 6, and play the same way," she said. "You can't stop and smelt the roses, because the No. 2 player wants the ranking of No. 1 so badly that if you stop you could end up being No. 5 pretty soon."

Fernandez, who reached No. 4 in the rankings after getting to the Australian Open finals two

years ago, finished 1991 ranked No. 8. At 20, she's been chasing the top players for a long time with a style fashioned after the baseline slugging of role model and fellow Floridian Chris Evert.

Now, Fernandez has turned to an unlikely coach to make her game more aggressive.

Harold Solomon won 22 tournaments in a long pro tennis career, and rarely ventured to the net. As a coach, he is teaching Fernandez to rush to the net frequently and volley with authority.

Fernandez showed the benefits of Solomon's wisdom with a surprising 6-1, 6-4 victory over No. 3 seed Gabriela Sabatini on Thursday in the semifinals, just after Seles beat Arantxa Sanchez Vicario 6-2, 6-2 from the baseline.

Fernandez hooked up with Solomon only last month but says he already "has influenced me a lot. He told me I had to take chances if I want to achieve a higher goal."

"I think Harold made me realize that I had no choice if it was to be my goal to be the best and improve my game," Fernandez said.

Solomon was among the top 15 money winners on the men's tour from 1974-80 but played his game almost exclusively from the baseline because at 5-foot-7 he lacked the physical stature to match his rivals for power.

Now, he is urging Fernandez, 5-foot-10, to practice what he preaches but never did himself.

"It is hard to change when you have been playing a certain way forever," Fernandez said. "It is these matches that you look back on and say, 'Hey, I did it. I won and now I have got to keep on doing it.'"

Fernandez calls Solomon "three coaches in one." He not only advises her on tactics, he also practices with her, and the pair work out in the gym together.

"I think he is a very smart person," she said. "He knows what it takes to reach the top. A lot of people think that he played, very defensive. He didn't have the resources to cover the net, but he tried to take the ball early and pressure his opponent."

Fernandez lost to Seles 9-7 in the third set in the semifinals of last year's Australian Open and was beaten by Steffi Graf in the 1990 final. She never has won a Grand Slam title.

Any medal may be miracle for U.S. hockey team

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — The United States Olympic hockey team has set itself up for Miracle II.

If the United States had whizzed through its exhibition cross-country tour in grand style, it might have raised expectations to where it would be realistic to expect the squad to win a medal at the 1992 Winter Games.

Instead, the team went 17-31-8, including 4-14-3 against NHL opponents. There is only one more cut still to be made — forwards David A. Jensen and Bill Gadsden were left Thursday before the team left for Europe — so the squad that boarded

the plane for France is essentially the one that will try to capture America's first hockey gold medal since the Miracle of 1980.

Someone in search of an optimistic note can point to the team's 3 victory over the Washington Capitals on Wednesday night. Four months earlier, the Capitals beat the United States 6-2.

"They're more of a team now," Washington coach Terry Murray said. "They're coming together at the right time. Their speed, chemistry, patience, poise and execution is better today than it was in September."

It was the U.S. team's first victory against an NHL team since Nov. 17, when it beat the expansion San Jose Sharks. But many of the games have at least been close, giving coach Dave Peterson hope.

"I like what's happening," he said. "You can look at our record and say 'Hey, they're not very good.' But I don't think the kids feel that way. We've played very well."

It should be noted that the Capitals on Wednesday used minor-league goalkeepers and rested several of their regulars. But Peterson has been doing the same thing — a lesson he learned after his 1988 team wearily

struggled to a seventh-place finish in the Winter Games at Calgary.

"As frustrating as it may be to the players and the coaching staff, we've used more young players during the course of the year," he said. "As a result, we've been able to stay fairly healthy. We've never had to play anybody who was tired or hurt."

By the time the United States opens its Olympic schedule against Italy on Feb. 9, it will have endured 62 exhibition games on rinks of all sizes and against competition ranging from Harvard to the defending Stanley Cup champion Pittsburgh Penguins.

U.S. skiers rank as medal contenders

LONDON (AP) — Less than a year after limping away from the World Championships in disarray, American alpine skiers are turning into medal contenders at next month's Winter Olympics.

They were shut out at the 1988 Calgary Olympics and last year's World Championships, but will be among the favorites in at least two Olympic events: men's downhill and women's giant slalom.

"Certainly we have the momentum going in the right direction now," said Paul Major, head coach of the U.S. women's team. "It's been a long-term process, but I think we're getting things turned around."

The nation that won five medals at the 1984 Sarajevo Olympics may not be threatening to surpass Switzerland or Austria as the leading alpine skiing nation. But at least it isn't being pushed around by tiny nations such as Liechtenstein and Luxembourg.

Liechtensteiner's Paul Frommelt won a bronze medal in the men's slalom at Calgary, while transplanted Austrian Marc Girardelli won the men's downhill title for Luxembourg at the 1991 World Championships.

Major said American skiers are building confidence with good recent results in World Cup races, and hoping to translate that confidence into good performances at the Olympics.

"You have to ski well in the World Cup races to have a chance in the

Olympics," he said.

The U.S. revival began last December with the surprise victory of A.J. Kitt in a World Cup men's downhill at Val d'Isere, France. Kitt, 23, followed that with a second-place finish in a World Cup downhill at Kitzbuehel, Austria, earlier this month.

Then the women got in on the act. Three Americans placed in the top six

in a World Cup women's giant slalom this week at Piancavallo, Italy, one of the strongest team showings in years.

Eva Twardokens and Diann Roffe, both recovered from serious knee injuries during the last few years, placed third and fourth in the race. Julie Parisien, who won a World Cup giant slalom last season at Waterville Valley, N.H., was sixth.

PARK CITY, Utah — Anyone depressed about the current state of moviemaking need only look to this Utah ski resort town for a lift.

Sundance sends out rays of hope to filmmakers who are tired of standard multiplex fare. This is the place to see challenging films that might not make a lot of money but will succeed on other terms.

Park City's atmosphere during the festival is part church, part carnival. In the city's five film auditoriums, the mood is serious and audiences pay rapt attention to every detail. But later, animated conversations spill across sidewalks as film fans and students gleefully debate the merits of each movie.

Sponsored by Robert Redford's Sundance Institute, the festival — originally known as the United States Film Festival — is now in its 14th year.

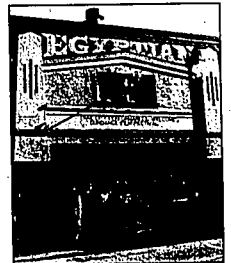

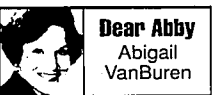

Adults who would like to go into a library or children's bookstore armed and ready can do so without spending a lot of money to find out what some experts recommend.

In her book "How to Write a Children's Book and Get It

Published" (Scribner, \$12.95) children's author Barbara Seuling offers an appendix of several book lists, including the following, which are free:

- Caldecott Medal books and Newbery Medal books. Caldecott Medals honor the best illustrated picture books for children published in the previous year. Newberys, the most coveted American award for children's literature, are given for "most distinguished contribution." Judging is by members of the American Library Association.
- A list of winners, updated annually, is available from the Association for Library Service to Children, 50 E. Huron St., Chicago, Ill. 60611. A single copy is free with a stamped, self-addressed envelope.
- ALA Notable children's books. This annual listing of ALA Notable books, selected by the American Library Association, also is available from the Association for Library Service to Children, 50 E. Huron St., Chicago, Ill. 60611. A

single copy is free with a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

- Children's Choices. Annotated list of books chosen annually by children: "Children's Choices," a joint project of the International Reading Association and the Children's Book Council, compile about 100 titles picked by 10,000 children, ages 5-13, nationwide.
- For a free single copy, send a stamped 9x12-inch envelope with 98 cents postage. Write: "Children's Choices," IRA Public Information Office, Dept. C, 800 Barksdale Road, Newark, Del. 19714-8139.
- Also, many books on children's literature include recommended readings for various age groups.

In addition, Seuling advises, your local library or bookstore might have its own list or periodical to give you.

Most books are available from local libraries and bookstores or can be ordered from the publisher (add postage and handling charges). Many bookstores will order a book if it is not in stock.

Springsteen to release 2 albums



Springsteen

The long wait for new music by Bruce Springsteen is almost over. Columbia Records and Springsteen's publisher, Shore Fire Media, announced Thursday that not one, but two albums from Springsteen would be released in early spring. "The Boss' most recent album, "Tunnel of Love," came out in 1987.

The simultaneous release of "Human Touch" and "Lucky Town" marks the second time in a year that a superstar act has chosen to issue two single-length albums rather than one, more expensive multi-volume set. Guns N' Roses employed the strategy with "Use Your Illusion I" and "II," and has experienced great success: Both albums have spent weeks in the top 10 of the Billboard 200 albums chart, and each has sold in excess of three million copies.

The Springsteen releases represent the most new material the New Jersey native has ever loosed on the

marketplace at one time. "Human Touch," "Tunnel of Love," "Gloria's Eyes," "With Every Wish," "Roll of the Dice," "Real World," "All or Nothing at All," "Man's Job," "I Wish I Were Blind," "Long Goodbye," "Real Man" and "Pony Boy."

The same guest-artists were not involved with "Lucky Town," which was presumably recorded more recently and features drummer Gary Tallbor and singers Lisa Lovell and Soozie Tyrell. "Lucky Town" is referred to as Springsteen's 11th album, and will include the songs "Better Days," "Lucky Town," "Local Hero," "If I Should Fall Behind," "Leap of Faith," "Big Man's Job," "Loving Proof," "Book of Dreams," "Souls of the Departed" and "My Beautiful Reward."

Scialfa, whose own album was delayed by her second pregnancy — daughter Jessica Rae was born three weeks ago — sings on both "Human Touch" and "Lucky Town."

"I'm excited about being finished," Springsteen said in Thursday's statement. "And I'm looking forward to getting out on the road."

and he said he annually spends about a week at the festival, "going to as many films as I can see." It's possible to view as many as six films a day in Park City, with screenings set from 10 a.m. to midnight.

"I think it's wonderful to have it in Park City as opposed to a very large city where you get lost," he said. "Here you have a wonderful film community, almost an artists' community. The atmosphere is festive; it's very Western. For a lot of people who are from out of state or out of the region, it's very exotic."

"I think the public is delighted the festival is in Park City," Saperstein said. "The small-town setting allows and facilitates interaction between filmmakers and audiences. You'll see studio heads in the Egyptian Theatre lobby munching popcorn. They're approachable."

Their studio, excess visit. Sundance to discover new directorial talent, and they find it in abundance. In recent years, "House Party," "Straight Out of Brooklyn," "Paris is Burning" and "Slacker" all played at Sundance before going on to great critical acclaim.

- "Gas, Food, and Lodging," a film by Allison Anders with Brooke Adams and Ione Skye.

Idaho films absent at Sundance

Despite its relative proximity to Park City, Utah, Idaho is not playing even a supporting role in the Sundance Film Festival.

Peg Owens, Crist runs the Idaho Film Bureau in Boise, and she said she is not aware of any independent Idaho filmmakers exhibiting at or attending Sundance this year.

"At least one Idaho-based filmmaker has benefited from Robert Redford's Sundance Institute programs, however. Michael Hoffman, who grew up in Payette, made his 1988 "Promised Land" through Sundance's support. Hoffman now lives in Boise, and he most recently directed "Soapdish" starring Sally Field.

Although Idaho has several local film festivals including the one now under way in Twin Falls, Crist said she does not think the state could compete with the major

"marketplace" festivals such as those in Park City, Utah, and Telluride, Colo.

"It would be nice if Idaho had some kind of event to bring in filmmakers," Crist added. "But it probably wouldn't be a festival. It seems like every state already has one."

Crist said she attended an Oregon event called the Portland Creative Conference. "They were able to bring in heavy hitters just to discuss the process of creativity," she noted.

But Oregon has a busy, long-established film industry. Idaho, by contrast, suffers from a lack of major motion picture film education programs and support services for film crews.

Still, Idaho is getting its share of the spotlight. Four years after the state film bureau's start, Crist said she now gets calls from industry folks on a regular basis. "They know who I am and they know where we are," she added.

The state also serves as a part-time home for many film figures, with northern Idaho's joining Kelchum/Sun Valley as a favored celebrity hideout.

Ketchum resident David Hemmings, who starred in such films as "Blow-Up" and "Cameleot," recently directed "Dark Horse" in the Wood River Valley, and it's set for a spring premiere.

"He's extremely interested in bringing more work to Idaho," Crist said of Hemmings, adding "The best thing that brings in filming is filming."

Crist sounded one more hopeful note. Last summer, Kevin Costner was spotted vacationing with his family near McCall. Crist speculated he probably was simply trying to escape his newfound superstardom, but there is always the chance he'll decide to return on business.

"We're still waiting for our 'Dances with Wolves' or 'Field of Dreams,'" she added.

Alison Redman, a 13-year-old seventh-grader at Robert Stuart Junior High School, said she liked the magazine a lot because it had stories about dancers and performances.

"I'm going to try and con my mom into subscribing to the magazine," she said.

Alison, who takes ballet from Beverly Hackney, said she thought Rhythms! was written out of town and would like to see more dance stories about Twin Falls girls.

The next issue of Rhythms! will include information about a performance in February to raise scholarship money for summer dance camp, Sursely said.

Sursely's interest in dance came not only from her daughter but also from seeing the need in the world for people to put their energies some place else that is not destructive, she said.

"I feel like if everyone was dancing it would be a totally different world without fighting," Sursely said. "I would like to see something that isn't just something girls go to on Wednesday afternoons but something that becomes part of their whole life."

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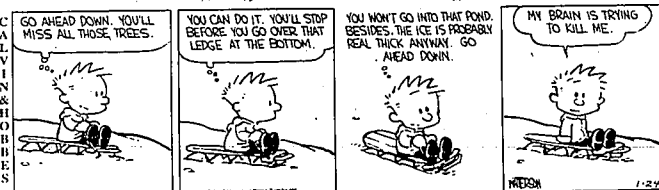
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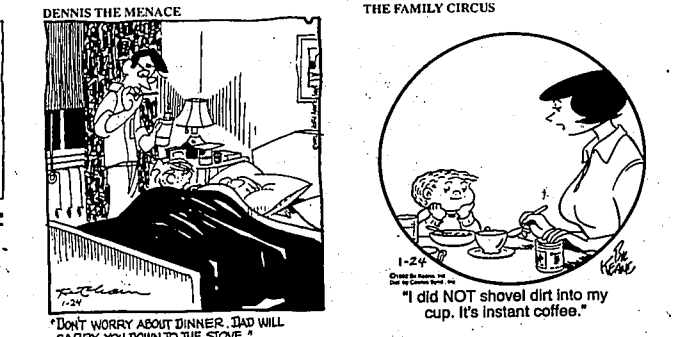
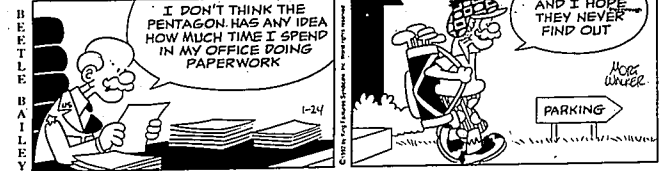
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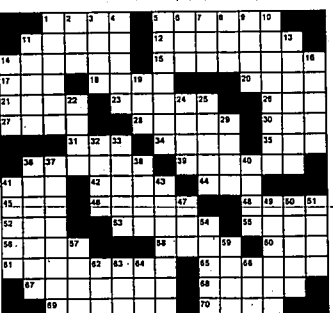
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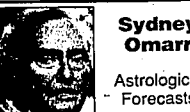

'Kuffs': Mayhem over credibility

HOLLYWOOD — "Kuffs" shows Christian Slater's antic sense of humor and demonstrates his ease in carrying a genre film, but it is otherwise a routine and violent action-comedy. Bruce A. Evans, making his directorial debut, strives mightily for a breezy anarchic spirit, but he and his longtime writing partner, Raynold Gideon, served "Starman" and "Stand by Me" infinitely better than they did this picture.

We're told that since 1851 the San Francisco Police Department, then desperate for recruits in the Gold Rush era, has engaged in the practice of selling off districts to private

enterprise to establish what are called Patrol Specials, which to this day continue to augment the city police force. In short order, he's out to avenge his brother, although his grief is breathtakingly fleeting, and take over his business,

aided in part by a San Francisco cop (Tony Goldwyn, good comic sleep for Slater) who's been caught sleeping with the chief's wife.

The idea is that this bright and nerdy kid is out to achieve what are two missions impossible, given his total lack of qualifications. There's not an ounce of credibility in either endeavor, even though it is obvious that he's going to succeed at both.

It's hard to enjoy those moments of humor amid so much casual destruction and mayhem. Although Evans clearly tried to put a fresh spin on a formula exploitation plot, he ended up turning out just another movie fantasy that tends to desensitize audiences to violence.

Movie critic describes unusual occupation

Contrary to popular belief, the life of a movie critic is just 10 Oscar predictions and Raitings.

Every so often, I find myself standing behind a lectern, addressing the members of a civic group, a professional organization or a college class on the topic of my puzzling (to the most interesting part of the talk is the question-and-answer period, during which I learn a lot more than the audience ever does.

Here are 9 questions I've culled from recent talks ... and my attempts to answer them.

Q: How do you decide which movies to review?

A: Easy. If a film stars Steven Seagal or anyone under 20 named Kirk or Corey, I pass.

Kidding, just kidding. Actually, the selection process is rather complicated. One way to think about it is that I sit down with my editor every week and make two lists. At the top of one list are the movies that we suspect will be of greatest interest to our readers. At the top of the other are the movies that interest me the most based on their subject matter, creative team, stars, potential news value. (Often these lists are the same, incidentally.) I start at the top of each list, reviewing as many films as I can until it's time to make up the next week's list.

Q: When and where do you see movies?

A: Because the newspaper generally likes to publish my review on opening day if possible, I'll often see a movie at a special screening held before the film officially premieres. These screenings may take place at almost any time of day, from before 9 in the morning to after midnight, usually at regular movie theaters. Sometimes there's a large invited audience. Sometimes I'm the only one in the theater. If there is an advance screening for a particular film (which, incidentally, usually means the studio doesn't have much confidence in it), I see a regular showing of it at the earliest opportunity.

Q: How many times do you see a movie before you write about it?

A: Once is all I usually have time for — even though I occasionally wish I could take a second look before reviewing a film, sometimes to check the details and sometimes because there's a technical problem. Recently, for example, I saw the exceptional, emotionally complex "Europa, Europa" at a screening at which someone accidentally switched two of the reels. Not a good way to see a movie.

Q: Does the popularity of a movie affect your opinion of it?

A: No, and if you think about this, you'll realize that it couldn't. In virtually all cases, I review a movie before the public has rendered its verdict. Maybe the Amazing Kreskin knows in advance what the public

will like, but I'm just not that amazing.

Q: Do you ever changed your mind about a movie?

A: Yes, but these changes are rare and tend to be a matter of degree, rather than the oh-what-a-fool-I've-been sort of changes that I suspect some readers are hoping for when they complain about reviews. To take a recent example, I was very impressed by "The Fisher King" when I first saw it, and the more I think about it, the more impressed I am. Another example is "Naked Lunch," which I disliked initially and which gets worse in my mind with time.

Q: Do you ever watch movies on VCR?

A: Never to review them. In fact, I resisted getting a VCR for a long time because I don't especially enjoy watching movies on a TV screen. The colors aren't nearly as subtle as they are in a theater, the shape of the picture is usually wrong and, of course, the image is way too small. (In my home, movies sound pretty good because my TV is hooked up to stereo speakers.)

Actually, I use the VCR mostly for time-shifting television programs. (Yes, like everyone else, movie critics sometimes watch TV shows.) The few movies I see on videocassette are usually for research purposes. For example, before I reviewed the recent "Father of the Bride" remake, I got a second look at the original 1950 movie to refresh my memory about it.

Q: Speaking of television, are you the same Jay Boyar whose reviews are regularly quoted on E! Entertainment Television?

A: Guilty.

Q: Do you ever read other movie reviews?

A: In most cases, it's not possible for me to read other reviews before I've written mine because I usually write my review at the same time that other critics are writing theirs. When it would be possible, I make a point of avoiding other reviews: It's not that I think that my opinion will be influenced, it's that I'm afraid I might unconsciously borrow a particularly nice phrase from someone else's writing.

After I have written my review, I do enjoy reading a sampling of responses of other critics. The reviews I value the most are the ones written

from an informed perspective. Of absolutely no value to me are reviews by dilettantes who want to "try their hand" at film criticism but who lack a true sense of the form and field of movies. Such lofty twaddle — which was actually quite common even as late as the mid-'70s — now, happily, seems to be going the way of the mimeograph machine and the LP record.

Q: Do you get into movies free?

A: If the audience is being charged to see a showing of a movie that I'm attending, I pay my own way and am later reimbursed by the newspaper. I buy my own snacks.

NEW YORK — Metropolitan Opera star Joyce Guyer travels the world, earning praise and winning awards for her performances. She says she owes it all to her Twin Falls voice teacher Marty Mead.

"Marty was my primary teacher for several years, inspiring me and giving me a role model for a beautiful woman," said Guyer in a recent telephone interview. "She gave me such a foundation for technique that I still use the things she taught me when I was 13 years old."

Guyer is 38 years old now, and Mead still travels to see her perform whenever possible. This year, other area residents can hear Guyer sing without ever leaving their own living rooms. She is the featured soprano on a newly released CD: "Concert, Theater & Parlor Songs of John Philip Sousa."

Another chunk of her time is spent in twice-a-week voice lessons and a number of coaching sessions. "One never stops practicing," she said.

Guyer's favorite role is generally her most recent one. These days, it's Pamina of "The Magic Flute." Guyer likes playing the character, she said, "because she is pretty, full of truth and honesty — and dresses really well."

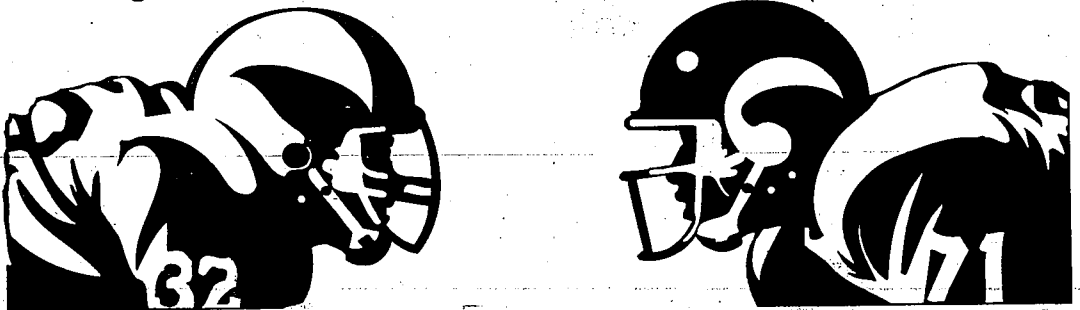

Stock prices fall, reflecting renewed economic worries

NEW YORK — Stock prices fell Thursday, reversing the rally of the previous session under pressure from worries about corporate earnings and interest rates.
The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up 32.42 on Wednesday, fell back 29.07 points to 3,226.74. Declining issues outnumbered advances by about 7 to 6 on the New York Stock Exchange.

The market has been wavering uncertainly in recent days after its New Year's upsurge to record highs.
Analysts say investors have been caught up in competing urges to participate in the bull market and to protect some of their paper profits by cashing them in.
Most observers agree that stocks have been anticipating a marked improvement in the economy as 1992 progresses.
They also note that little concrete evidence of a recovery has materialized so far.

Some other issues sold off on earnings disappointments.
Data General tumbled 3 1/2 to 12 1/2. Centel Corp. jumped 9 to 46 in active trading after the company said it hired investment bankers to offer a series of options including its possible sale.
Unisys led the active list, up 1 1/2 on turnover of nearly 14 million shares. The company reported fourth-quarter earnings of 31 cents a share, compared to a loss in the corresponding period of 1990.
Data General tumbled 3 1/2 to 12 1/2. Centel Corp. jumped 9 to 46 in active trading after the company said it hired investment bankers to offer a series of options including its possible sale.

Other losers that contributed to the Dow Jones' decline included Philip Morris, down 1 1/2 at 76 1/2; International Business Machines, down 2 1/2 to 93 1/2; United Technologies, down 3 at 50 1/2; and Minnesota Mining & Manufacturing, down 2 1/2 to 93 1/2.
On Wednesday Minnesota Mining reported fourth-quarter earnings of \$1.18 a share, down from \$1.34 a share in the corresponding period of 1990, and said it hadn't yet seen signs of a meaningful economic recovery.
Energy stocks posted broad losses, beset by worries over slumping world oil prices. Mobil dropped 2 to 66 1/2; Exxon 1 1/2 to 60 1/2; Chevron 1 1/2 to 66 1/2; Atlantic Richfield 3 1/2 to 107 1/2; and Exxon 1 1/2 to 59.

U.S.-Japan relations head in right direction

TOKYO — For many Japanese, 1992 was supposed to be the year that lifted U.S.-Japan relations onto a lofty new plateau.

So far, it's been more like a descent into the New Year from Hell.

Worse, what's on the horizon for the world's two largest economic powers looks even bleaker.

One of the most ominous signs was the decision announced Wednesday by the Los Angeles County Transportation Commission to cancel a \$122 million rail-car contract with Sumitomo, Japan's trading giant, under strong political pressure to save American jobs.

The move could signal a growing grass-roots protectionism that Japan fears might lead to a trade war.

Early last fall, Tokyo's assessment of relations with Washington was full of promise. Japan acquired a savvy, internationalist prime minister. The bilateral trade imbalance was shrinking, the U.S. economy expected to recover.

But the U.S. recession, linked by President Bush in part to Japan's trade practices, is lengthening, the hoped-for recovery postponed at least this year, if that. The U.S.-Japan trade imbalance slightly worsened in 1991, according to figures just released.

The New World Order so hoped for here has turned into a whole new order of U.S.-Japan tensions.

The first three weeks of 1992 have seen little but political gaffs, diplomatic embarrassments and rising acrimony on both sides, much of it triggered by President Bush's contentious Jan. 7-10 trade summit.

And in the absence of an overseas security threat, Japan and its trade policies are being thrust into the center of America's political dialogue this election year as never before.

This became apparent last week when controversial comments by Japanese politicians — one of whom ridiculed U.S. workers in response to Bush's demands that Japan buy more American cars — set off a wave of U.S. anger. The American reaction dominated headlines in both countries and shook Japan with its fury.

"It is necessary to realize that a slip

of the tongue by a politician can easily make worse the already shaky relationship between Washington and Tokyo," the Yomiuri, Japan's largest newspaper, editorialized Thursday.

"Both nations should be responding to each other more calmly and make far greater efforts to build up rather than tear down the relationship."

Events in the last few days have deepened the chill. On Wednesday, House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt and 27 other Democrats introduced a bill that would require Japan to reduce its trade surplus by 20 percent a year. The bill is backed by the Big Three automakers.

The same day, Sumitomo Corp. of America learned it was losing the Los Angeles rail-car contract. Sumitomo immediately contended it was a victim of protectionist Japanese television Thursday showed groups of U.S. construction workers waving signs reading, "American jobs for American workers."

Particularly worrisome for Japan was the fact that California has been considered more friendly to Japanese business than any other U.S. state. The Los Angeles area may also cause concern by U.S. manufacturers of rail-cars and heavy vehicles who export their products to Japan.

Meanwhile, U.S. Embassy officials accused bureaucrats at the Agriculture Ministry of violating Japan's market-opening agreement by asking traders to curb beef imports.

However, in a conciliatory gesture, Japan's Parliament announced Thursday it was buying two Buicks as part of its effort to persuade reticent Japanese to buy American cars.

Still, the U.S.-Japan dialogue has grown so frigid that increasingly, both Japanese and Americans are reminded of a period both nations would like to forget: the 1930s and early '40s.

This reminds me of the fall of 1941 when Japanese were saying that America is decadent because it is filled with other races and falling to pieces," said Robert Orr, head of the Stanford Japan Center in Kyoto.

"That sentiment caused Japan to make some tragic miscalculations."

Cuban Communists lash out at critics

MEXICO CITY — Cuba's Communist Party lashed out at critics from the Vatican to the ranks of Nobel laureates Thursday, defending the execution of a Miami man for plotting to overthrow President Fidel Castro.

The execution has provoked an outcry that threatens to deepen Cuba's isolation — and a crackdown on Castro's internal opposition.

Cuba is in the throes of a desperate economic struggle as it battles the loss of Soviet subsidies. Castro has confronted the crisis by trying to woo new trading partners abroad while tightening political control at home.

The Cuban government has been handing out thousands of guns and exhorting people to defend the nation against "counterrevolutionaries" — official shorthand for those who disagree with Castro.

"We're defending the revolution," Gen. Sixto Bata Santana said on national television Wednesday night. "We're not playing around."

Gorbachev spending practices probed

MOSCOW — Russia's deputy prosecutor wants to question former Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev about the hundreds of millions of dollars spent to finance Communist parties abroad, a newspaper reported Thursday.

A former Central Committee official, Anatoly Smirnov, said the now-defunct Soviet Communist Party actually used state, rather than party, funds to finance the overseas Communists, and that criminal charges should be brought against those responsible for the diversion.

In an interview with the Rossiiskaya Gazeta, deputy prosecutor Yevgeny Lisov said "hundreds of millions of dollars of funds over the past decade" were funneled to Communist parties abroad.

Muslim fundamentalists face hurdles

ALGIERS, Algeria — Muslim fundamentalist officials met Thursday to choose a replacement for their arrested leader and consider responses to the military-backed government's broadening crackdown on their movement.

Officials of the Islamic Salvation Front provided few details on the executive bureau meeting. They said a communique would be issued when it ended.

On Wednesday, the government arrested the front's acting leader, Abdelkader Hachemi, who the previous day had urged the army to "rid the people" of authorities now in power.

The government also issued a ban on all gatherings outside mosques.

The moves came 10 days after the new government canceled the final round of the country's first free parliamentary elections, which the Islamic Salvation Front was on its way to winning.

Woman linked to Belushi death fined

VANCOUVER, British Columbia — The woman who pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter in the 1982 drug-overdose death of comedian John Belushi has been fined \$2,000 for heroin possession.

Cathy Evelyn Smith was arrested July 23 with 2 grams of heroin in her purse. She was acquitted of a trafficking charge after she testified she had a serious heroin habit and intended to use the drugs.

Provincial Court Judge Kenneth Scherling on Wednesday rejected a prosecution request for a jail sentence. "I'm of the view that this court should place more emphasis on rehabilitation," Scherling said. He also placed Smith on 12 months' probation.

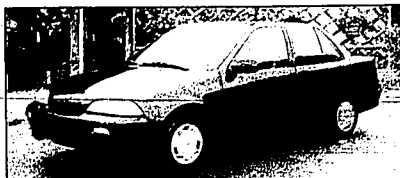

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Consider the little mouse, how sagacious an animal it is which never entrusts its life to one hole only." — Plautus.

West's belated entry into the auction advertised length in hearts and clubs, but that was little cause for a premature commitment by South. He could have done better had he concentrated on cinching nine winners.

Luckily for South, West led a club instead of a heart. Against a heart lead, he would have had no chance to score nine tricks before the defenders got five.

Convinced it was his lucky day, South took East's 10 with his king and led a diamond to dummy's queen and East's ace. Dummy's clubs told East there was no future in that suit, so he switched to the jack of hearts. Dummy's king won and South led a diamond, confident-ly finessing to his 10 and losing to West's jack. Back came a heart to knock out the ace, and the game was doomed. South could win only seven tricks without the spades, and when he led a spade, the defenders cashed out, sending the game two down.

Was South's diamond finesse a poor play? Not so much poor as impulsive. West had advertised distribution and he might well have had a singleton diamond.

After dummy's heart king is dislodged, South should knock out the spade ace. He wins the next heart and cashes dummy's spade queen to discover that West started with only one spade. Now since West's distribution is more likely to be 5-2-2-1 than 6-5-1-1, South cashes his diamond king to score two overtricks.

Old-timer remembers bowl blunders

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Putting on the Super Bowl is no snap, says an NFL old-timer who's witnessed super botches and blunders when the game plan fell apart.

Don Weiss, in charge of the first 13 Super Bowls, remembers the fiasco of the hot air balloons used in the 1970 Super Bowl at Tulane Stadium. The Vikings were facing the Kansas City Chiefs.

The two hot air balloonists were in their baskets, dressed like their team mascots. The Kansas City balloonist took off and went straight up as planned. But the Viking balloon got caught in a downdraft and started moving sideways, never getting more than 5 feet off the ground.

The balloonist tried frantically to raise the balloon but failed, and the basket struck a woman, breaking her leg.

"That was the last time we used hot air balloons in the Super Bowl," Weiss said.

At the 1972 Super Bowl VI, also in New Orleans, organizers had re-created the Battle of New Orleans from the War of 1812, complete with cannons. But when the cannons fired, the blasts scared the horses, which started running wildly. Several people were thrown from their saddles and injured.

"We did not try to re-enact history after that," said Weiss, who now takes charge of the Super Bowl from a control booth on game day.

The Millen view: Linebacker Matt Millen, who has spent a lifetime accumulating grass stains with the Raiders, 49ers and Redskins, looked around the Metrodome with its roof and artificial turf and seemed to sneer a bit.

"It's kind of septic," he said. Did he meant antiseptic? "No," he said. "Septic. You know, like septic tank."

Close call: Buffalo defensive end Bruce Smith hates fireworks football. So he was turned off by the Bills' 51-3 AFC title game blowout of the Raiders a year ago and loved the 16-7 victory over Denver for the championship this season.

"Last year, the championship game got out of hand," he said. "This time, we had to work on every aspect of the game to win the championship. It went down to the wire. You appreciate it more when it happens that way."

Unless you're the coach.

What are you doing New Year's Eve: Marv Levy says he knows Joe Gibbs only casually, adding he didn't think he would spend New Year's Eve with the Washington coach. For the last two years, Gibbs has spent New Year's Eve hard at work, reviewing film and plotting strategy for playoff opponents.

When midnight rolled around this year, Gibbs wanted to take a break to mark the new year. He was expecting his wife, Pat, to arrive at Redskins Park, "but she stood me up. I think she went to sleep, that's how exciting she is," Gibbs said. "I called her at about 12 o'clock, but she didn't show up, so I had to kiss (offensive line coach Jim) Hanifan. One of the low moments of my coaching career."

Now playing: So how did Buffalo linebacker Carlton Bailey celebrate the interception touchdown that helped the Bills back to the Super Bowl?

"Going back to my apartment and watching 'The Lost Boys.' ... It's a vampire movie.

"Some people would characterize it as the best play of my life and I just ended up going home, watching a movie and going to bed."

Madden backs 2-week break

A lot of variables have to come together to produce a thrilling Super Bowl game like last year's 20-19 title win by the Giants over the Bills, but CBS's John Madden doesn't believe the length of time between the conference championships and the Super Bowl has anything to do with it.

Madden joins Pat Summerall in the broadcast booth at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis.

Traditionally, the Super Bowl has been a game that falls spectacularly short of its hype, and the two-week break that has been taken before 22 of the previous 25 games is frequently blamed.

The charge was given credence by last year's game, which was played after only a one-week break.

"I like the long break," says Madden, who was an assistant coach for the Raiders in Super Bowl II, helmed the Raiders to a win in Super Bowl XI and is set to broadcast his fifth NFL championship game. "I know last year's game was close, ... it had more to do with the matchup."

According to Madden, there are so many non-football-related details for a team to take care of before a Super Bowl that the longer break is justified.

"You've got tickets," he begins. "How many tickets does each player get? Then the player has to get the tickets and give them out. Are you going to take the players' wives, and when is that plane going to leave? These are things you don't want your players to think about during the week of preparation."

Madden has a theory about why people — especially those in the media — have tended to pay so much attention to any supposed relationship between the two-week Super Bowl buildup and the string of boring games.

"Because the Super Bowl is so big, and there is only one game, that two-week thing becomes very vulnerable," he says, building up to his own analysis of the situation. "It's something that everyone who wants to can jump on. It's just sitting out there like a dangling participle. And if you want to jump on someone's participle, you jump on the one that dangles. So it dangles out there, and everyone jumps on it. It's easy."

Further, he points out, there was not a murmur of concern over the long break that Washington, Detroit, Buffalo and Denver got while the wild-card games were played.

"You know, the funny thing is, the same two-week break happened when the wild-card games were played, and you never heard a mention of it. Detroit, Washington, Denver, Buffalo — all those teams had two weeks off, and they all won. But when you dangle it out there individually as a Super Bowl, it's jumped upon. If it didn't deserve a mention after the wild-card games, I don't think it's such a big thing for the Super Bowl."

time 60 minutes, it will continue in sudden death overtime. The team scoring first (by safety, field goal, or touchdown) will win.

At the end of regulation playing time, the referee will immediately toss a coin at center field, in accordance with rules pertaining to the usual pre-game toss.

The captain of AFC team (the visiting team) will call the toss.

Following a three-minute intermission after the end of the regular game, play will continue by 15-minute periods with a two-minute intermission between each such overtime period with no halftime intermission.

The teams will change goals between each period, there will be a two-minute warning at the end of each period.

Officials

There will be seven officials and two alternates appointed by the Commissioner's office.

Trophy

The winning team receives permanent possession of the Vince Lombardi Trophy, a sterling silver trophy created by Tiffany & Company and presented annually to the winner of the Super Bowl.

The trophy was named after the late coach Vince Lombardi of the two-time Super Bowl champion Green Bay Packers prior to Super Bowl V.

The trophy is a regulation silver football mounted in a kicking position on a pyramid-like stand of three concave sides.

The trophy stands 20 1/2 inches

tall, weighs 6.7 pounds and is valued in excess of \$10,000.

The words "Vince Lombardi" and "Super Bowl XXV" are engraved on the base along with the NFL emblem.

Attendance

To date, 2,027,503 have attended Super Bowl games.

The largest crowd was 103,985 the 14th Super Bowl at the Rose Bowl.

A: An interesting but implausible idea. Fact of the matter is that you have your generations mixed up. The only ex-actress in Wagner's life these days is his wife, Jill St. John. MacGraw is writing books and playing the field romantically. The relevant connection here is between Joshua Evans — Ali's son by her first marriage to producer Robert Evans — and Wagner's daughter Natasha. They are a steady item these days.

Q: It was funny to read that Zsa Zsa Gabor, while presenting the Sour Apple Awards recently to Alce Baldwin and Sinead O'Connor, gar-

Fox challenges Super Bowl, Olympics

MARINA DEL REY, Calif. — Fox is stunting and it just might work.

The fourth network, 4½ years old, doesn't have the rights to either the Super Bowl this month or the Winter Olympics in February.

But network president Peter Chernin said he intends to use each to attract viewers to his network through some imaginative — make that outrageous — counterprogramming.

No, Chernin noted, his programmers won't be so foolish as to think they can lure anyone away from the football contest on Jan. 26, which traditionally is the most-watched television event of the year.

But look out at halftime.

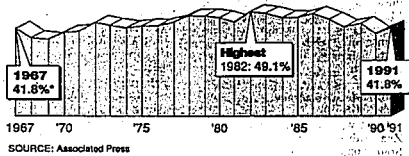
The "In Living Color" gang will break in with a live 30-minute special — no matter when the halftime begins — to offer an alternative to marching bands with horns out of sync and field patterns that can't quite be seen, Chernin said with a Cheshire cat grin.

"Rather than give up against the event, we're going to try something fun and irreverent.

"Would you rather watch CBS' Tribute to Snowflakes during halftime or Blaine and Antoine do 'Men on Football' — and do it live?" Chernin

wondered mischievously.

And during one week of the Winter Games broadcast from Albertville, France, Chernin will modestly offer the Fox Summer Games.

"While the rest of the world is freezing its butt off watching the ice-cold Winter Olympics, we'll offer a hot alternative: a week of fun-in-the-sun-themed, prime-time programs with palm trees and beaches," Chernin said.

Scheduled from Feb. 17 to 23, the Fox Summer Games will run directly opposite prime-time athletic coverage. Chernin chuckled that his lineup should easily attract more attention

than such sports as the luge or the ski-in-shoot competition.

Super Dave Osborne, the accident-prone adventurer who is the human equivalent of Wile E. Coyote, will be the host of the Summer Games, including opening and closing ceremonies conducted in sunny Hawaii. In between will be special summery episodes of Fox's regular shows on five nights (the network doesn't yet broadcast seven nights a week): 8 to 10 p.m. EST Feb. 17 plus Feb. 20-22; and 8 to 11 p.m. EST Feb. 23.

"The Fox Summer Games Special" itself is 9-10 p.m. EST Feb. 22.

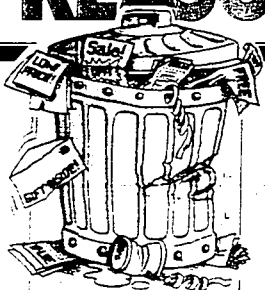
