Weather summary

The National Weather Service in Boise says high pressure remains over Idaho today. At the same time wide circulation of cloud moisture around a low center off the southern coast of California brought increasing clouds up into the interior northwest.

Variable mid- and high-level clouds spreading into the Gem State may bring a few snow flurries to the highest peaks in southern and central Idaho over the next day or two. Elsewhere, skies will be mostly fair with dry and mild weather expected to continue.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 57 degrees at Hagerman. Stanley reported the coldest at 17 degrees below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday's highest temperature was 76 degrees at Gilie Bend, Ariz. The lowest was 19 below zero at Massena and Saranac, N.Y.

Snow, rain fall over West; rivers overflow in Texas

Snow and rain hit parts of the West on Thursday and more was on the way.

A day of downpours brought mudslides in California and flooding rivers keep rising in Texas.

Mt. Charleston, Nev., got 2.5 inches of snow overnight and snowfall advisories were posted for the Sierras in California. Four inches fell at Lake Tahoe.

Wet weather was expected to continue across the Southwest on Friday, with rain turning to snow at higher elevations.

Mudslides were reported in mountainous Frazier Park in California, south of Bakersfield. Nearly 3 inches of rain fell in the area from Wednesday to Thursday afternoon.

In Texas, flooding continued on the Colorado, Guadalupe and Trinity rivers, forcing road closures in Victoria and threatening low-lying homes near Wharton.

The Colorado was expected to crest 3 feet above flood stage late Thursday. The Guadalupe and Trinity rivers were likely to peak Friday, at 12 feet and 4 feet above flood stage, respectively.

Flood warnings also were posted along sections of the Pearl River in Louisiana. Strong winds caused flooding at Manasota Key near Sarasota, Fla.

In Michigan, heavy rain extended over Upper Michigan and northern Minnesota. Freezing rain reached across northern Lower Michigan. Rain extended over the southern Atlantic states and Alabama.

proficiency training mission. Guard spokesman David Alton said.

Nine people died in the crash and two others were found dead in the wreckage, said Rick Woods, chief deputy coroner for Vanderburgh County. He said no additional victims were expected to be found.

At least 19 people were injured. The plane's crew was using Evansville Regional Airport, about 10 miles from the restaurant, to practice landings; said airport public relations director Sandy Appler.

Alton said: "They were doing exercises known as touch-and-goes, where they touch down and fly out immediately. They did two touches. And they asked permission for a low approach and were taking off when they fell into the 'hoel.' Whitehead said: "It dropped out of the air and into the Drury Inn's pool, and a wing came off and careened into the back of the Jolo's restaurant."

Whitehead said he saw the plane drop vertically, "then all of a sudden there was this humongous fireball and it went down behind the buildings."

Jolo's owner Dennis Sero said the plane "came through the window, I got up and everyone was running toward the door. Walls were falling in, steel was all over the place. One cook was knocked down, tried to get up to get back to the dish washer and just couldn't."

A cook, Michael Kelley, 26, of Evansville, said he was in the rear of the building when the walls crumbled on him and fire erupted everywhere. "There was a girl in the back. We were yelling for her," Lynette Lymeret said. And she was yelling back. "Yeah, yeah, I'm here!" But we couldn't get to her!" he said, weeping.

One-fourth of the restaurant was destroyed by the impact. The four-story hotel was damaged mainly by fire. Only part of the plane's charred rudder was recognizable.

The 24-hour restaurant, part of a chain, had 125 rooms located on the southern tip of Indiana.

The C-130 "Hercules" is a "workhorse" for the military, a "medium-range craft that carries mainly cargo or people on a variety of missions. The four-engine aircraft normally has a crew of five. It has a

wingspan of 137 feet and if it were long, it would be 150 feet.

The plane crashed into the building in 1958, built by the War Relocation Authority for the U.S. Army, Kentucky Air National Guard, said Lt. Col. David Moreman, another Guard spokesman.

The pilot, instructor Maj. Richard A. Strang, 49, of Ft. Rucker, Ala., was highly experienced and had impeccable credentials, Moreman said.

Strang piloted the first C-130 that landed in Panama during the 1989 American invasion, said Maj. Jeffrey Bucher of the 123rd Tactical Air Transport Squadron.

On Thursday, at least five people were treated at hospitals and released, while 14 people were admitted for burns and smoke inhalation. One was flown to the Wishard Memorial Hospital burn unit in Indianapolis and two were taken to Humana Hospital University of Louisville's burn center, said Christine Terry, spokeswoman for the Vanderburgh County Emergency Management Agency.

It was the second time in 44 years that a military plane crashed into a civilian building. On Oct. 20, 1987, 10 people died when a crippled Air Force fighter jet crashed into the Ramada Inn-Airport in Indianapolis. The pilot bailed out before the crash.

The Evansville airport was the site of a crash in December 1977 that killed the entire University of Evansville basketball team.

Miller filed the suit last November against the Legislature's leadership and Secretary of State Pete Coatsman, who is responsible for conducting elections.

Newhouse's ruling came out after a plan drafted by Sen. Russ Newcomb, R-Twin Falls, passed the House on a near-party line vote: Not one Democrat in the House or the Senate voted for the bill, which Gov. Cecil Andrus is certain to veto perhaps as early as today.

In his order Thursday, Newhouse accepted parts of a schedule proposed by Attorney General Larry EchoHawk's office, including a Feb. 24 deadline for interested parties to intervene in the case and a Feb. 24 deadline for submitting proposed plans to the court.

However, Newhouse refused to accept the suggested March 13 deadline for finishing a plan and he said that if the plan gets bogged down in appeals, the primary date would have to be moved.

"If you think the legislative quagmire is a problem, wait till you get into the judicial quagmire," he said.

Newhouse also sent a strong message to legislators that they probably won't like any plan he said, would be equalizing population between districts and protecting minority voting rights.

"It's a waste of time to give me a gerrymandered district," he told the parties. "I'm not going to pay any

attention to incumbencies. I'm not going to pay any attention to Democratic, Republican, Conservative or Green Party lists."

EchoHawk, a Democrat, said his office will submit several plans for Newhouse's consideration. Those plans will have total population deviations of about 1 percent, he said, compared with the 10 percent figures most legislative plans have hovered around.

National Guard airplane crash combines horror, devastation

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP) — Waitress Kaye Durbin remembers hearing earthquake-like rumbling and seeing a tank of exotic fish explode as a plane crash turned Jojo's restaurant into a scene of terror and devastation.

"It got louder and suddenly the ceiling fell in," said Durbin, 29. "Somebody yelled, 'Everybody get out of here.' I saw this tank of fish shatter and the ceiling collapsed on us, and heard screaming."


Sixteen people were killed and 14 others were seriously injured when a Kentucky Air National Guard plane crashed into the restaurant and an adjacent inn on U.S. 41.

Families congregated at the C.K. Newsome Community Center, awaiting word about loved ones. Emergency workers kept them in an isolated area, and ministers and counselors were on hand.

Restaurants donated food, but most of the families appeared too shocked and restless to eat. One woman, crying into a handkerchief, walked into a pole and didn't seem to notice.

At the crash site, Lt. Col. David Moreman of the Kentucky Air National Guard, "which lost five crew members, stared at the rubble."

"Inside, I'd like to find a room where I could cry," he said.

Dan and Suzanne Thompson of Lansing, Mich., who were eating breakfast at Jojo's, said they had little warning before the plane hit.

"I could see a shadow, and I knew in my mind that it was the plane crossing in front of the sun. I turned to say something to Dan, but then boom — it was all over with," said Mrs. Thompson, 40.

"The front of the airplane went straight into the swimming pool. The tail of the airplane was about as high as the hotel," her husband said.

... nine of the victims were found dead. "Otherwise — we would have checked in and been unpacking when it crashed," Mrs. Thompson said. "His procrastination worked this time. I'll never complain about it again."

Fred Pratt of Bozeman, Mont., who also works for the moving company, said the plane appeared to be in trouble just before the crash.

"When he started doing a turn ... I noticed it seemed like the tail wasn't acting right. It started wavering and drifted sideways and then headed straight down," he said. "When I saw it take that extremely steep downturn I knew something was wrong, and then there was this fireball."

Bruce Stallings, vice president of Plumbing and Industrial Supply Co. Inc. in Evansville, said 11 of his employees were attending a business seminar in a fourth-floor meeting room of the Drury Inn when the plane crashed.

Thompson, 35, a moving company driver whose truck was being repaired at company headquarters nearby, said fate postponed their check-in at the Drury Inn, where a private lunch with his boss.

Health care hits milestone

WASHINGTON — The country reached a turning point Thursday: A president and his rivals in the opposition party were agreed that the government has an obligation to assure health care for its citizens.

That doesn't necessarily mean universal health care is coming soon. One expert who has studied the evolution of the issue for years, Joshua M. Wiener, predicted that achieving the goal will still be an issue in the presidential campaign of 1996.

Nonetheless, President Bush's Cleveland speech endorsing subsidized health insurance marks an important moment.

"This is the first time that the president of the United States, his party, and the leaders of the opposition party are saying health care is a problem that has to be addressed by the nation," said Philip S. Birnbaum, who teaches health administration at the George Washington University Medical Center. "Now the debate evolves from shall we do it to what is it we shall do."

Universal health care is bound to cost a lot more than American society now spends on health — \$800 billion this year, rising by 11 percent annually. Paying for it promises to be a problem.

"The dilemma," said Wiener, a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, "is that at the same time that people think costs already are out of control, it is impossible to deal with health care for the uninsured without higher government expenditures."

Health care will cost more whether it is provided by government, as some Democrats propose, or provided by government-subsidized insurance, as other Democrats propose.

In Cleveland, Bush joined those who favor subsidized insurance, saying he wants to "allow all Americans to rest secure when it comes to health care."

The issue finally reached this point — consensus that something must be done — when it became a middle-class issue. Working people feel they can't afford their share of premiums; employers feel they can't afford their share.

Even changing jobs becomes worrisome; the new job might offer a lesser policy.

Health care has been an issue in politics for decades, usually stalemated by an outcry against "socialized medicine."

Franklin D. Roosevelt backed off from proposing health insurance as part of Social Security in 1935, fearing to offer more than the country could swallow. Harry Truman did propose "compulsory" health insurance in the 1948 campaign, saying, "We should have a law to keep people healthy."

In the 1970s, Richard Nixon proposed a system putting the burden on employers (comparable to what Democrats Bill Clinton and Paul Tsongas advocate). Nixon's idea was rejected by Democrats, including Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, who wanted national health insurance.

December factory orders dive 3.8%, quell hopes for recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) — Factory orders plunged 3.8 percent in December, contributing to the annual loss since the previous recession nine years ago, the Commerce Department reported Thursday.

"The sharp decline reinforces the expectation that a broad-based improvement in the economy is not under way and not likely to begin until spring," said Larry Meyer, head of Laurence H. Meyer & Associates, a St. Louis economic forecasting service.

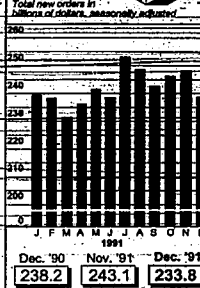
In a second report that analysts said provides more evidence of a stagnant economy, the Labor Department reported little improvement in the number of initial claims for jobless insurance in late January.

Major retailers did report some improvement in sales in January after a dismal holiday shopping season. But the improvement was measured against activity in January 1991, when Larry Meyer, head of Laurence H. Meyer & Associates, a St. Louis economic forecasting service.

The Commerce Department report said factory orders were slashed by 2.6 percent last year, to \$2.8 trillion. It was the largest decline since a 3.5 percent plunge in the recession year of 1982 and the first decrease since a 0.3 percent loss in 1986.

Orders for both long-lasting durable and for non-durable goods suffered annual losses. The manufacturing sector had shown signs of

recovery at midyear but then faltered during the fall.

In December, orders totaled a seasonally adjusted \$233.8 billion, down from \$243.1 billion a month earlier. The 3.8 percent drop was the steepest since orders sank 6.2 percent in November 1990.

Factory orders are a gauge of

manufacturing industry plans. Continuing declines could mean lower production and loss of jobs in a sector representing nearly 25 percent of the nation's economic activity.

Analysts also noted that businesses cut their orders for non-defense capital goods, often a barometer of plans to expand and modernize, including aircraft, these orders fell 1.0 percent in December.

The Labor Department report said 450,000 people filed new claims for jobless insurance in the week ending Jan. 25, down from a revised 460,000 a week earlier.

But because of the weekly volatility, many analysts look more to a four-week moving average which showed claims holding in a 432,000 to 439,000 range.

The department will release January's jobless rate on Friday. It stood at 7.1 percent in December, the highest since June 1986.

Orders for durable goods — items like cars and computers expected to last more than three years — tumbled 5.2 percent in December, even farther than the initial 5.0 percent estimate reported last week. These orders had edged up 0.6 percent in November.

Orders for non-durable goods, like clothing and chemicals, fell 2.4 percent after edging up 0.2 percent in November.

Official: North Korea getting weapons message

WASHINGTON (AP) — North Korea may be "finally getting the message" that the international community will not tolerate its widely reported efforts to make nuclear weapons, a Senior State Department official said Thursday.

But Undersecretary of State Arnold Kanter, in testimony to a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee, cautioned that "there is still a very long way to go before we can have any confidence" that North Korea has abandoned its nuclear weapons program.

Kanter reported to the panel on his 6-1/2-hour talk on Jan. 22 in New York with the international secretary of North Korea's ruling Communist Party, Kim Yong-sun.

Kanter urged North Korea to ratify by mid-February the nuclear safeguards and inspection agreement it concluded on Jan. 30 with the U.N. International Atomic Energy Agency.

That would open the way for North and South Korea to exchange reconciliation agreements at a planned Feb. 19 meeting.

Hispanic study wants more help, self-help

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hispanics need better access to government programs to solve educational and job disparities — but they also need to help themselves, a major Hispanic group said Thursday.

"We, as Hispanics, need to assume some of the responsibility. We do not want to perpetuate a continuing victim mentality," said Paul Yzaguirre, president of the National Council of La Raza.

"We believe government has to play a role, but we just don't believe that all the answers lie in Washington or through another government program."

La Raza, in its "State of Hispanic America — 1991" report released Thursday, advocated a mix of increased government and community-based intervention to address Hispanic problems.

One in every four Hispanic families lives in poverty, with the average earnings for Hispanics being far lower than for non-Hispanics, the study found.

In 1990, the median annual income for Hispanic men was \$14,141 versus \$22,207 for non-Hispanic men, the report said. The trend persisted for women, with Hispanic women earning an average of \$10,099 compared to \$12,438 for non-Hispanics.

The study also found that Hispanic little S&L money is being recovered

ics have the lowest levels of educational achievement of any major population group, and don't have equal access to pre-school and other programs designed to help students at risk of dropping out.

"Hispanics are the most educationally segregated group in this country," Yzaguirre said.

Only about half of Hispanic adults are high school graduates, compared to four-fifths of whites and nearly two-thirds of blacks, the report said. An estimated three in 10 Hispanic adults and four-year-olds are enrolled in pre-school, compared with four in 10 black children and nearly five in 10 white.

"We need to have much greater participation in pre-school programs," Yzaguirre said, adding that pre-school learning is a significant factor in later educational achievement.

The study also found that Hispanics have less access to regular health care, despite being more at risk to contract diseases such as AIDS, diabetes and certain types of cancer.

"Many of our community are forced to choose between working and being uninsured or being on welfare and getting some level of health insurance — and that's a horrible dilemma to be in," Yzaguirre said.

Fighting continues in Algeria

ALGIERS, Algeria — Fighting flared for a third day Thursday in the eastern city of Batna, where authorities said clashes between fundamentalists and security forces have left at least 11 people dead and scores wounded.

Meanwhile, authorities reportedly canceled a national Islamic march set for next week, setting the stage for a new confrontation with the Muslim fundamentalists.

The Batna fighting and similar clashes erupting almost daily in other cities were sparked by the government crackdown on supporters of the Islamic Salvation Front, which was pushed aside last month by a new military-backed government as it was poised to win control of Parliament.

Yeltsin: Dictatorship could return

PARIS — Russia could again fall under the sway of dictatorship unless other nations help it through the hardships of economic reform, President Boris Yeltsin said Thursday.

He said Russia's economy needs time to gain strength as it shifts to the free market system from the collapsed planned economy of the Communists.

"We'll need at least three to five months to stabilize prices, but we'll need a few years to create a really stable economy," Yeltsin told a group of French business executives midway through a three-day state visit.

14 die in Chinese fire; 2 jump to death

BEIJING — Fire killed 14 people in a bar in a city south of Canton, and two others died when they jumped from the blazing building, an official newspaper reported Thursday.

The Yangcheng Evening News said the fire broke out Tuesday night on the ground floor of the building in Zhongshan City and spread to the bar, located on the fifth floor.

The cause of the fire was under investigation, the paper said. Zhongshan is about 60 miles south of Canton.

Prison's last political prisoners to leave

MOSCOW — Russia will release its final 10 political prisoners from Perm 35 Prison on Friday, the Tass news agency reported.

The announcement by Andrei Votinov, chief warden of prisons in the Perm region, came less than a week after President Boris Yeltsin announced their pardons.

No further details were immediately available, and the identities of the prisoners were not known.

Pet-food magnate advances in Ireland

DUBLIN, Ireland — Albert Reynolds, a former finance minister and wealthy founder of a pet food company, was elected leader of Ireland's dominant political party Thursday, putting him in line to become prime minister.

Reynolds won with the support of 61 votes among the 77 Fianna Fail lawmakers in the Dail, the lower house of Parliament.

He succeeds Prime Minister Charles Haughey, who has led the Fianna Fail party since 1979.

Haitian refugees head for home

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The United States resumed its effort to return more than 10,000 Haitian boat people, delivering two shipments of refugees to the capital's wharf Thursday for a bleak homecoming.

The repatriation came amid indications that a U.S.-supported international push for a negotiated settlement of Haiti's political crisis was stalled.

Friday marks the anniversary of the swearing-in of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, Haiti's first democratically elected president, but he was in office less than eight months before being ousted in a military coup.

At Port-au-Prince's oily, sun-drenched pier, small groups of Haitians gathered to watch 508 of their compatriots descend from two U.S. Coast Guard cutters with bundles of clothing and enter a large

concrete-ruined patio for processing. "To see them return like this, truly humiliated, makes me want to give up my Haitian citizenship," said 19-

year-old Nilsson Isme, a high school student.

Under an agreement between U.S. and Haitian authorities reached on Wednesday, Coast Guard cutters will drop off more refugees three days a week. If it proceeds on schedule, the repatriation would take about seven weeks to complete.

Most of Thursday's returnees were young men and women, including a couple with a child about 2 years old who wore a red, white and blue T-shirt with "USA" printed on it. Many of the refugees wore clothing supplied at Guantanamo through charity efforts.

Most of the refugees were expressive, but a few smiled sheepishly for foreign news photographers. Some expressed concern about their future treatment by authorities.

"Will we be beaten?" asked Alfonso Alfred, 34, who is in a village near the western coastal city of St. Marc. He said he had fled Haiti for economic and political reasons, but that he feared the reaction of authorities to international publicity about the refugees' plight.

Immigrations Police Maj. Jacques Denis said the returnees have nothing to fear.

England celebrates queen's 40th

LONDON (AP) — Gulls in Hyde Park and at the Tower of London saluted Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday to mark the 40th anniversary of her reign, but she was far away on another day of duty, visiting a hospice for cancer patients.

The 65-year-old monarch treated the occasion as a minor milestone — of what she called her "job for life" in a BBC television documentary shown Thursday to mark the anniversary.

In the broadcast, the queen repeated that she will remain monarch until she dies and never abdicate in favor of her son, Prince Charles, 43.

Politicians of all parties sang her praises in Parliament, Lord Jenkins of Hillhead thanked her for being the "focal point of sanity and stability over four fluctuating decades."

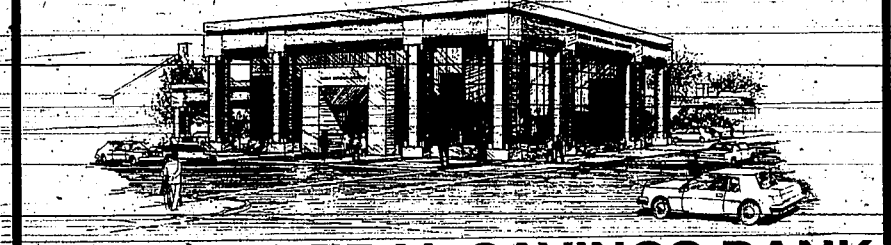

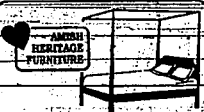

Car bomb kills 5, wounds 7

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A car bomb believed planted by Basque separatists destroyed a passing military convoy, killing five and wounding seven people on the street and in nearby buildings.

Prime Minister Felipe Gonzalez angrily condemned the attack, which illustrated the inability of the government to stop terrorist attacks by Basque militants despite a recent crackdown.

The blast came several days after reports that the separatist group ETA was preparing to stop attacks for several months in hopes of promoting negotiations. Gonzalez has repeatedly insisted that the attack lay down their arms for good before talks could begin between the government and ETA, an acronym for Basque Liberty and Homeland.

Pocatello trio's wrangling torpedoes reapportionment

Discouraging, isn't it, that the politicians we send to Boise can't even settle a political question?

Reapportionment was taken over by the courts Thursday, to the surprise of no one, after the Legislature passed a redistricting bill without the support of a single Democrat and with a promise from Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus to veto it.

If 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse imposes his own redistricting plan, as he is widely expected to do, Idaho will have gone 20 years without a reapportionment plan touched by legislative hands. It was another District Court judge, you may recall, who imposed the widely despised current redistricting formula.

The Legislature has chased its own tail on the reapportionment question for the past six months, costing the taxpayers several hundred thousand dollars in the process. Moreover, because the lawmakers waited so long to resolve it, the issue may end up delaying the May primary election.

All and of it, largely, because three Bannock County lawmakers couldn't settle their differences among the "three musketeers."

At least since September, the main sticking point for redistricting statewide has been how to apportion Bannock County's 66,000 residents.

Bannock County's seat, Pocatello, is a Democratic island in a Republican sea, and Pocatello Democrats very much want to keep their oversized clout in a new, smaller Legislature.

To accomplish that, they wanted three legislative districts for the Pocatello metropolitan area's 55,000 citizens.

Interesting arithmetic, that. Each Idaho legislative district is supposed to have about 29,000 people.

But state Sen. Patricia McDermott and Rep. Pete Black, both Pocatello Democrats, wanted to gerrymander three districts with Pocatello at their center, each containing enough blue-collar, union votes to keep all comfortably Democratic.

Bannock County's only Republican lawmaker, Rep. Evan Frasure, came up with a more realistic plan, arguing that Bannock County was only entitled to two full districts (one Democratic and one mixed) and part of a third, which would be dominated by Republicans.

Last weekend, with agreement on reapportioning every other county in Idaho in the bag, Frasure and the Democrats were still at loggerheads and any hope of a legislative reapportionment solution was dead.

Maybe the 1991-92 reapportionment debacle will prove enough impetus for the Legislature to create a citizens' commission to draw up a new 2000 census. That's something that should have happened long ago.

But that's not going to do us much good when the bill for this year's exercise in bad civics comes due.

Perhaps Sen. McDermott and her colleagues in safely Democratic Pocatello would't mind explaining it to the taxpayers.



Accordianists ready to abandon Bush

When I was a boy growing up in Philadelphia, my parents would force me and my three sisters to watch "The Lawrence Welk Show" every Saturday night.

These were the days when Elvis Presley and the demonic Jerry Lee Lewis were tearing up the charts, days when parents everywhere felt that the only way to combat these agents of Satan was to force-feed their children the revoltingly wholesome entertainment provided by Welk and his band of Merry Music Makers.

Their policy failed miserably. We grew up hating Welk's highlight grin, detesting the saccharine harmonies of the Lennon Sisters, loathing the smarminess of dancer Bobby Burgess and accordionist Myron Floren.

The first time my father and I came to blows, it was not because of the war in Vietnam, the music of Mick Jagger or the strobe lights and black paint on my bedroom walls. It was because of Welk.

During my junior-year-in-high-school, the Welk organization announced that a female regular on the show was being axed. The singer, Natalie Nevins, was the sister of a priest who taught at our school, supposedly the largest Catholic high school in the world.

Colleagues of the priest attempted to organize a letter-writing campaign among the students at Cardinal Dougherty High, who would implore Welk to reinstate her. Otherwise, he was to be warned, 6,500 Catholic high school students in northeast Philadelphia would boycott his show.

But this was the era of The Doors, Timothy Leary and Che Guevara. The attempt to organize a letter-writing

campaign was not successful. Ms. Nevins was on her own.

As should be clear, I hold no brief for Lawrence Welk. Still, when President Bush singled out the Champagne Music Maker for abuse in his State of the Union address last week, it was hard not to feel that a terrible injustice had been done.

Early in the speech, Bush became the first president to acknowledge the existence of Elvis, paying backhanded homage to the porky, paranoid drug addict who died in his bathroom 14 years ago. No such homage was accorded Welk, who is still very much alive, and who has never been a porky paranoid.

Instead, Welk got a boot right in the teeth. Near the end of his speech, the president raved: "I call upon Congress to adopt a measure that will put an end to the annual ritual of filling the budget with pork-barrel appropriations — a Lawrence Welk museum, a research grant for Belgian cndive."

The Welk remark grated, in part because it was so out of character. In Bush's mouth, the words had an utterly false ring. His generation certainly doesn't view Welk with contempt. Mrs. Bush looks to me as if she has the entire Lawrence Welk catalogue on remastered CDs back at the White House and wears holes in the carpets dancing to them.

There is an important issue here, the issue of respect. Most people of my generation despise the music of Lawrence Welk, just as most people of our parents' generation despise the music of Janis Joplin and Jimi Hendrix. But Welk's stature as an American cultural colossus is undeniable.

Love him or hate him, this is a man who hosted one of the most popular programs in the history of American television. This is a man who paid his dues. This is an American institution.

Yet, with one mean-spirited remark, George Bush swept all this away, acting as if the very idea of using federal money to honor Lawrence Welk and the millions of Americans who revere him was beneath contempt.

The way Bush said it, spending \$500,000 on a museum honoring one of the most beloved musicians in the history of the Republic, was stupid. But spending billions on the space station made sense. Repealing the tax on people who need a new yacht made sense.

There will be a reckoning, Mr. Bush. On a cold November evening, when the howling winds shriek down from the Black Hills or wherever and thunder across the Great Plains, the 2 million Americans who play Mr. Welk's instrument of choice — the accordion — will remember how you sneered at them back in January.

This fall, Mr. President, when these Champagne Music Makers launch into their finale, they may no longer be playing your song.

Timken was given a five-day suspended jail term, one year of probation and a \$267 fine for that charge.

Mediator enters Bonner teacher talks

SANDPOINT — A federal mediator has been called in to help with stalled teacher contract talks in the Bonner County School District. New negotiations got under way Thursday. Teachers have been working under the 1990-91 contract since last fall. Joan Head, president of the Bonner County Education Association, said salary and insurance were two of the biggest issues blocking settlement. Contract negotiations, which usually begin in May, were delayed because of turnovers on the school board and settlement of a \$385,000 lawsuit between teachers and the district.

Pair were planning robbery, officials say

POST-FALLS — Federal agents and Spokane County deputies nabbed two men on a rural Idaho farm where highway whom authorities believe were plotting to rob a Post Falls bank. Duane R. Owen, 50, and James Smith, 43, both of Spokane, Wash., were arrested Tuesday afternoon on State Highway 97, north of Post Falls by U.S. Treasury agents and Spokane County sheriff's deputies. Owen was lodged in Kootenai County Jail and charged with being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm, said Mike Kelly, special agent in charge of the federal Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms office in Spokane. Smith was not charged and was released Tuesday, Kelly said.

Elderly woman swims from sinking car

COEUR D'ALENE — A 60-year-old woman whose car slid down an embankment and sank into Lake Coeur d'Alene swam 50 feet to shore and emerged from the accident unscathed. Joy Hodge said her only thought as her sedan fell backwards Wednesday after hitting an icy patch on state Highway 97 was "that I was going to get wet." A passerby drove Hodge to a nearby inn when officers had not arrived after about 10 minutes.

Teens charged with stabbing man

WALLACE — Two teen-agers will stand trial for first-degree murder in the stabbing death of a 50-year-old Elk Creek man after one of them admitted participating in the slaying. Bobby G. McFarland, 18, and Danny H. Graff, 16, were bound over for trial in 1st District Court by Shoshone County Magistrate Neil Walter. The two have been charged with robbing and killing Harold Burd on Jan. 10. Both were being held in the Shoshone County Jail without bond pending their arraignment. During a two-day preliminary hearing that wrapped up on Wednesday, Graff detailed the events surrounding the Bart's death. But public defenders Dan McClee and Hollis Anderson unsuccessfully tried to convince Walter that inconsistencies in some testimony and between testimony and the physical evidence justified dismissing the felony charges against the two. Vote halts school changes - for now

BOISE (AP) — House Education Committee Chairman DICK DAVIS broke a tie vote as his panel refused to tie a proposed constitutional amendment to repeal sweeping changes in Idaho public school and higher education governance. But the Republican said Thursday that he recognizes the issues won't go away, and Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, said he plans to introduce a similar sweeping separate measures by the end of next week. "Maybe the best thing is to have two, maybe three constitutional amendments for the people to pick

appointments made by the governor to state boards and commissions. It's a question the people are re-inventing their prerogative," Hansen said. "I think it's appropriate that House members have a role in evaluating members of the state board." His proposed constitutional amendment would have set up a state Board of Higher Education and a single university system headed by a chancellor. It also would have established a separate Board of Public Education and a coordinating committee of members from both panels to consider common issues. The number of members on each board and the extent of their authority would be spelled out in enacting legislation. If voters approved the constitutional amendment next fall, Hansen said.

The measure also called for the governor to appoint a higher education chancellor and a superintendent of public instruction from among two to four nominees for each position submitted by the Board of Higher Education and the Board of Public Education. The appointments then would be subject to confirmation by both chambers of the Legislature. The Education Committee agreed 9-8 with Rep. Mel Richardson, R-Idaho Falls, that too many issues were included that should be considered separately. "I think this (measure) bites off too much," Richardson said. "We ought to divide the issues and talk about them independently." He also said since the superintendent of public instruction serves on the five-member State Land Board that manages state endowment fund property, replacing the elected, constitutional position with an appointive would give the governor too much power on such an important board. A section of the proposed constitutional amendment considered Thursday would have dropped the superintendent of public instruction from the Land Board. But Hansen said that would raise other problems and he would remove the section before resubmitting separate measures. Senate Education Committee Chairman John Hansen has been leading an effort to draft legislation splitting up the existing eight-member Board of Education's responsibilities.

GOP charges Andrus with neglecting poor

BOISE (AP) — Republican senators on Thursday accused Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus of sacrificing the human needs of poor Idahoans for election-year political advantage on state-aid for public schools. Sens. Russell Newcomb, a Twin Falls physician, and Stan Hawkins of Uboon, blasted out at the governor for seeking a 15-month delay in implementing the so-called medically needy program that Andrus demanded lawmakers enact last year. "The administration maintained enactment of the program is as critical today as it was a year ago. But officials told the Health and Welfare Committee that the state's financial pinch forced postponing from this July to October 1993 the start of an expanded national program providing subsidized health care to 7,200 people a year. Medicaid currently helps some 60,000 people in Idaho. Hawkins and Newcomb, however, claimed Andrus has finally been caught pandering to politically potent education interests at the expense of the poor, despite rising concerns over the 150,000 people who are not eligible for Medicaid. "They suggested the governor shortchanged medical programs to put more cash into public schools and carry favor with the Idaho Education Association, which pumped more than \$200,000 into 1990 legislative campaigns and helped Democrats claim 21 of the 42 seats in the state Senate. "Our money problems continue to hinge on other priorities — namely education and namely environmental programs that we seem to think are more important than human needs," Hawkins said. "This administration made the decision not to deal with these human issues. Andrus, Chief of Staff Marc Johnson called the charge ridiculous. He said the governor's budget includes financing to begin both the medically needy program and state assumption of the costs of catastrophic health care for the poor that counties now bear."

Former college president Chaffee dies

BOISE (AP) — Eugene Chaffee, an original faculty member and former president of what has become Boise State University, died Wednesday night in a Boise nursing home. He was 86. Chaffee was born in Aurora, Neb., and was among eight faculty members hired by Bishop Middleton Barnett when Boise Junior College was founded by the Episcopal Church in 1932. He taught history until being named the school's president in 1936 and directed its move in 1941 from St. Margaret's Hall to the current campus along the Boise River, which previously was the site of the Boise Airport. Chaffee was a former president of the American Association of Junior Colleges.

State judge clears way to restart video games

LEWISTON (AP) — A state judge has ruled that video gaming machines idled for eight months at a Lewiston bar can be plugged in again. Second District Judge Linda Trout struck down an Idaho Department of Law Enforcement decision that banned the Lucky 8 Line games at O'Brian's Lounge for being the same as slot machines. Trout ruled slot machines with stop buttons such as the machines at O'Brian's require some skill and are not entirely left to chance. Bar owner Glenn Johnson said he derived substantial income from the machines but was in danger of losing his liquor license if he disobeyed the state agency ban. "Turning the games back on has re-stimulated business," Johnson said Wednesday evening. "The coin-operated machines have screens on which spinning wheels of fruit symbols appear. The player can stop the wheels by pushing a button or can wait until they stop spinning on their own. Players can win replays but not cash. The state contended in its decision last June that Idaho law bans "any slot machine of any sort or any kind whatsoever," regardless of whether there is a payoff. "The Amusement and Music Owners of Idaho requested the ruling. The group wanted permission to handle a line of video games that have the appearance of slot machines, but do not pay off in cash."

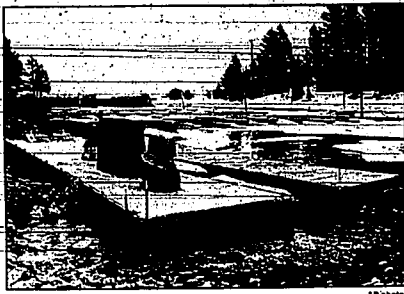

Ferries collide in fog off Vancouver Island

VICTORIA, British Columbia (AP) — Two ferries collided in dense fog in Active Pass off the east coast of Vancouver Island Thursday. No serious injuries were reported.

The Canadian Rescue Coordination Center in Victoria said neither the new Royal Sealink Express — catamaran — Royal Vancouver nor the British Columbia ferry Queen of Saanich was badly damaged.

Both continued under their own power, the catamaran to Sidney, north of Victoria on Vancouver Island, and the larger car ferry to Tsawwassen, south of Vancouver on the mainland.

The vessels were in radio contact "about a minute before the collision" and the smaller catamaran was backing up when they collided, said Graham Clarke, president of Harbor Ferries Ltd., which operates the catamarans.

"We knew about the ferry. We knew he was coming. He knew we were coming," Clarke said.

Nonetheless, "very soon after the radio call" the two captains in the catamaran "saw a collision was imminent as the smaller vessel was about to enter the half-mile-wide passage and threw the vessel into reverse," he said.

All equipment on the catamaran, including an anti-collision radar system, was working, Clarke said.

"A witness aboard the Queen of Saanich, Mark Johnson Thursday, said the Royal Vancouver came out of the fog and collided head-on into the bow of the B.C. ferry.

Bernie Simpson, New Democratic Party member of the British Columbia legislature for Vancouver, was aboard the Royal Sealink Express when the collision occurred.

Simpson said there did not seem to be any serious injuries.

"There's a few people limping around," Simpson said.

"There's stuff strewn all over the place."

At least three people were placed in ambulances after the catamaran docked, Canadian Press reported.

Clarke said he knew of two people who were injured, "apparently not seriously," although "we're considering this to be very serious."

Clarke said the catamaran carried a crew of nine, including the regular skipper and a training captain, and about 60 passengers.

The privately-owned B.C. Ferry Corp. said there were no injuries on board the Queen of Saanich. It said damage was confined to the ferry's bow doors and a bus parked near the doors.

Clarke said damage to the catamaran appeared to be "fairly superficial" with a "gouge" in the pontoon well above the water line and damage to the railing and dodger on the bow.

He said the smaller vessel had been going about 20 knots; roughly half its operating speed, before going into reverse for Vancouver.

Active Pass, a narrow opening between Mayne and Galiano islands, is about 30 miles northeast of Victoria.

Faculty demands ouster of chairwoman at CWU

ELLENSBURG, Wash. (AP) — Faculty members at Central Washington University are trying to stop the reappointment of K. Y. "Koz" Woodhouse as chair of the board of trustees.

The decision is in the hands of the Senate Higher Education Committee, which plans a public hearing on her confirmation Feb. 19 in Olympia.

The reappointment of two other trustees, Sterling Munro and Ron Dotzauer, also will be considered at that time, but no opposition has surfaced.

The committee has received numerous letters and a petition urging its members not to confirm Woodhouse, who is president of the Seattle Metro Urban League.

"We feel Dr. Woodhouse, through her leadership as chair of the board of trustees, has contributed significantly to a serious morale problem which threatens to disrupt the efficient operation of the university," states the petition, which was signed by 27 faculty members.

Central has about 360 full- and part-time faculty, said university spokeswoman Barbara Radke.

Woodhouse refused comment on the faculty's effort to ouster her.

Faculty members say Woodhouse failed to consult them in the search for a new university president.

Families of mentally ill angry at Nevada official

CARSON CITY, AP — Families of the mentally ill are seeking the ouster of the head of the state Human Resources Department, claiming he hid the full impact of mental health budget cuts ordered by Gov. Bob Miller.

Ann Smith, president of the Alliance for the Mentally Ill of Nevada, said HRD chief Jerry Griepentrog also is being targeted for trying to make a scapegoat of the man who runs the HRD.

The 350-member alliance is circulating a petition seeking Griepentrog's replacement.

Both sides to the controversy are uninformed and didn't bother to discuss their grievances with him.

The attack on Griepentrog heightens a debate over the impact of Miller's \$3.8 million in mental health budget cuts.

State Mental Hygiene-Nervousness Director chief Brian Labren is being criticized for not adequately communicating that Miller's cuts hasn't taken away services from those who most need them.

The administration accuses the organization of eliminating non-critical patients from case loads so that the mental health system could absorb 132 layoffs — half of the layoffs ordered throughout state government by Miller.

Missing body found

BREMERTON, Wash. (AP) — The body of a Kitsap County woman missing since early November has been located after sheriff's deputies found a letter from her husband confessing to her killing.

Kitsap County Undersheriff Chuck Wheeler said the body of Sarah Bender, 48, was found Wednesday wrapped in sleeping bags, and dumped at the end of a logging road about five miles from Quilicura on Hood Canal.

She had been missing since Nov. 6 when she failed to report to work. The Benders lived at Squamish, about eight miles north of Bremerton.

HB587 (Reserves and Conservation) — Expands Fish and Game Commission to seven members with election on a nonpartisan ballot.

HB588 (Commerce, Industry and Tourism) — Provides for the investment by banks and trust companies in public funds managed or advised by them.

Introduced in Senate

SB1110 (State Affairs) — Urges Congress to provide the money when it mandates new responsibilities on states or local governments.

SB1111 (State Affairs) — Urges Congress to bar federal agencies from adopting regulations that mandate new responsibilities on states or local governments without clear statutory authority.

SB1350 (Judiciary and Rules) — Allows negligence by a nonparty to be considered in lawsuits.

SB1351 (Judiciary and Rules) — Provides for a social investigation of people applying to adopt a child.

SB1352 (Health and Welfare) — Creates a universal health insurance program for Idaho.

SB1353 (Health and Welfare) — Creates a state office for children to coordinate children's services.

SB1357 (Resources and Environment) — Creates an Idaho Forest Products Commission.

SB1358 (State Affairs) — Makes technical revisions in laws involving secured financial transactions.

SB1359 (State Affairs) — Sets out procedures for breaking ties in school board elections.

SB1360 (State Affairs) — Authorizes new municipal liquor licenses to be issued on the basis of estimate of population growth rather than the decennial census.

SB1361 (State Affairs) — Directs the Legislative Budget Office to keep track of federal legislation that would mandate new duties on state or local government.

SB1362 (State Affairs) — Allows nonresidents to be appointed notary public under certain conditions.

SB1363 (State Affairs) — Prohibits the use of state money for photographs of appointed state officers that are displayed in public buildings or on public right-of-ways.

SB1364 (State Affairs) — Requires state government supervisors to submit twice a year to the Secretary of State certification statements on the out-of-state travel of their subordinates.

SB1365 (State Affairs) — Requires the posting of policies and information on sexual harassment in the workplace of employers with five or more workers.

SB1366 (State Affairs) — Makes charitable bingo legal on a county option basis.

SB1367 (Local Government and Taxation) — Diverts all general treasury allocations from the liquor tax to alcohol and substance abuse treatment.

SB1368 (Local Government and Taxation) — Creates a special event winery permit.

SB1369 (Local Government and Taxation) — Allows interstate shipment of limited amounts of wine for personal use.

SB1370 (Local Government and Taxation) — Exempts charitable sales, donation and purchase of clothes from the sales tax.

Dump junk plan, Hagerman hears

HAGERMAN — Residents trashed a proposed junk ordinance at a recent Hagerman City Council meeting. Residents argued the new ordinance threatens their freedom as well as how they use their private property.

But Mayor Jim Martin countered the ordinance to control junk in town is only an update of an existing ordinance.

"We already have this ordinance," Martin told an audience of about 25 concerned city residents earlier this week. "It's called the nuisance ordinance."

The proposed junk ordinance, read for the

second of three times before a council vote set for Feb. 18, states that city residents cannot store junk on their property.

Junk includes household goods and equipment, "including but not limited to chairs, tables, davenport, beds, refrigerators, stoves, washers, dryers, furnaces, appliances, grease, oil, paint, and their containers," the ordinance states.

Banned "miscellaneous property" includes old rope, iron, brass, copper, tin, lead, rubber, rugs, baggage, bottles, scrap, toys, bicycles or boats.

"Any property or goods upon public or private property within the city in violation hereof may be impounded and removed by the police department and sold at public or private auction by said police department," the ordinance states.

Martin said the ordinance would apply also to the city's impact area outside city limits. The law would be similar to junk laws of other cities, he added.

Resident Walter Bonning said he is concerned about the city having control of his private property.

"Who decides what is junk?" he asked. "Warren Sims also questioned who will decide what the city has a right to confiscate."

Jack Yarbrough said he and his neighbors have antique cars on their property.

"Does that mean we have to get rid of them?" he asked.

Martin said the city will enforce the junk ordinance only if a neighbor signs a complaint.

"When we have a violation in the city, if a person signs a complaint, then the city can take it to court," Martin said.

Economist predicts environmental devastation without political change

TWIN FALLS — Major changes in this country's political system may be the only way to prevent environmental disaster, an internationally known economist said Thursday.

Speaking to a large crowd at the College of Southern Idaho, Professor E.K. Hunt said the earth is on the precipice of the sixth major biological calamity in its five-billion year history.

"There is a difference between this one and the five previous ones," Hunt said. "We're causing this one, and what we're causing, we can cease."

Stopping, or even slowing, the 25

billion tons of pollution that Hunt says American industry spews into the environment each year will be difficult because corporations rather than people control politics, he said.

Hunt called for a grassroots political shift similar to the one that uprooted communism from Eastern Europe during the 1980s.

"If we continue to follow those in power... we're just like lemmings," Hunt said.

He disputes the notion that corporations that are poisoning the planet represent a "level-headed" point of view and that environmentalists are "extremists" or "radicals."

"I don't think it's so extreme or radical

that there should be plants and animals," said Hunt, who helped found the Union for Radical Political Economics in 1968.

Hunt earned his doctorate in Economics from the University of Utah that same year and has published seven books on economics. Many of those texts have been translated into several different languages.

His speech was the second in the five-part Snake River Symposium hosted by the CSI honors program.

The principle of large-scale private property — a sacred capitalist tenet — must be challenged, he said. Owning personal possessions — clothing, a car, appliances

Cheese firm trims force back 40%

JEROME — A Jerome dry cheese manufacturing plant announced a nearly 40 percent cutback in its work force Thursday, citing the impact of the national recession.

EE-DA-HOW Specialties will lay off as many as 20 employees this week, joining 10 others who have either resigned or been laid off in the last month, Director of Manufacturing Dan Carrico said.

"When in full operation, the Jerome plant employs between 75 and 80 people," Carrico said. EE-DA-HOW's Spokane, Wash.-based owners had been "doing a lot of evaluating for several months."

"It's the economics of our times — things are rough all over," he said.

A full range of positions — technicians, supervisors and managers — will be included in the layoffs, Carrico said.

"We feel terrible about this, but it's business — we have to stay afloat," Carrico said.

A slowdown in customer orders left a large inventory that resulted in an evaluation over the past several months and the final decision to reduce the work force, he said.

"Based on our customers' projections, we had to cut back."

Carrico said EE-DA-HOW has no plans to close the Jerome facility. "This is definitely a temporary layoff. We don't anticipate have to close the plant," Carrico said.

The current construction of a new Le Sueur cheese plant in the Jerome Industrial Park will be good for EE-DA-HOW because cheese from the new plant could be used to make dry cheese, he said.

The EE-DA-HOW plant has been processing dry cheese products in Jerome since 1979.

The facility shipped large quantities of dry cheese products overseas in support of Operation Desert Storm last year and employed more than 100 people in January 1991.

Bliss to lose about \$3,000

Air Force casts eye on Idaho's friendly skies

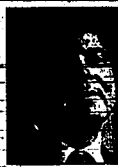
TWIN FALLS — It isn't Idaho the Air Force wants, it's the air above it.

"It's some of the best (airspace) we have," said deputy assistant secretary of the Air Force Gary Vest, in a telephone interview from his Pentagon office earlier this week.

The Air Force plans to put a lot more aircraft in that area.

It has issued its environmental impact statement on establishing a composite wing at Mountain Home Air Force Base. But changes at the base probably won't be noticeable from Boise or Mountain Home, Vest said.

Operations will increase to 21,000 missions annually from the 4,600 now

flow out of the Mountain Home base. That's an 80 percent increase in traffic on military training routes, and a 146 percent increase in southwestern Idaho military operating areas, according to the Air Force's environmental impact

statement.

In addition, the Gov. Cecil Andrus has proposed to combine federal, state and private lands, in his work force or land exchanges, into a 150,000-acre bombing range in southwestern Owyhee County and up to 35 small "omitter" sites scattered across the county. The electronic emitters would simulate enemy air defense installations.

The governor's offer may be attractive, but it's no guarantee that the Mountain Home base won't be closed in the next round of federally mandated base closures.

"We have to treat all the bases equally. That is, with the same criteria," Vest said. "We have no bad bases."

"Further reductions are going to be

Tampering question halts trial

SIMI VALLEY, Calif. (AP) — Possible jury tampering in the racially charged assault trial of four police officers spurred a secret meeting between attorneys and the judge Thursday.

The court was in its second day of jury selection in the trial of Los Angeles officers charged with the videotaped beating of black motorist Rodney King.

Lawyers said the meeting was called after the Star-News of Pasadena quoted NAACP member James H. Smith, 66, as saying he introduced himself to prospective jurors who were among 205 panelists called Wednesday.

Smith told the newspaper he spoke with the prospective jurors before Superior Court Judge Stanley Weisberg told them not to discuss the case with anyone.

When court convened Thursday, Weisberg summoned attorneys to his chambers and spent an hour in secret talks. He ordered the record of that session sealed.

But attorneys said the incident was discussed and said the judge ordered a special inquiry on the matter Friday.

"Everyone is concerned," said attorney Michael Stone, who represents defendant Laurence Powell.

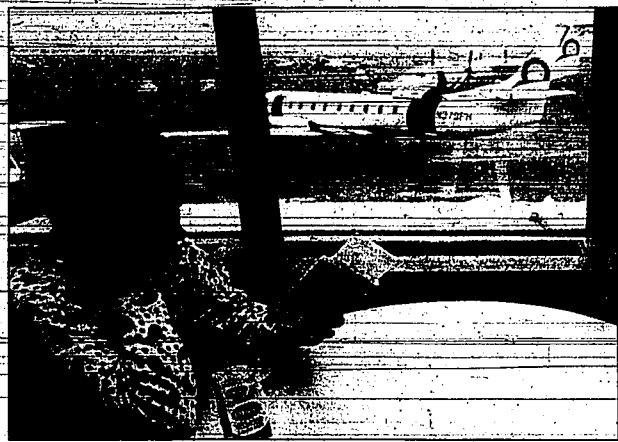
Stone complained Wednesday that NAACP members in court wore black armbands showing the name of their group.

He suggested they were trying to influence jurors.

Deputy District Attorney Alan Yochelein said he wanted to make sure Smith hadn't unwittingly tampered with potential jurors.

Subcommittee submits compromise tax break

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Mike Simpson says if the Legislature tries to approve the governor's plan to expand a property tax break for seniors, it might wind up with nothing.

At the request of the Blackfoot Republican House tax subcommittee agreed on Thursday to introduce a compromise increasing the so-called "circuit breaker" property tax break from its current maximum of \$400 a year to \$800, phased in over the next two years.

Low-income homeowners age 65 and over, along with the disabled, currently qualify for up to a \$400 reduction in their property taxes, and the counties are reimbursed by the state. Gov. Cecil Andrus wants to increase the maximum to \$800 and make all low-income homeowners eligible, regardless of age or disability.

The Andrus plan would cost \$5.9 million extra. He proposes to finance much of the cost through a tax on real estate transactions.

"The governor's proposals might not pass and we would wind up doing nothing," if there is no revenue to pay for the tax break, Simpson said.



His proposal, which does not expand those eligible for the break, would cost an extra \$14 million in the next budget and \$700,000 more the year after.

Even at that level, it would still aggravate already tight budget problems without some source of revenue to cover the extra cost.

But Rep. Wally Wright, D-Bayview, said the Legislature should decide what kind of relief is actually needed and then ways to pay the bill if the Andrus plan is unacceptable. "If this method fails, there are other methods to finance it," he said, indicating he might want to broaden the sales tax base by eliminating some of the exemptions.

He urged fellow committee members to think about "the needs of the people, not just think about reelection."

"I could find several million dollars in worthwhile programs, but we just don't have the money," Simpson said.

Owners take reins at Mustang Ranch

RENO (AP) — Nevada's most famous house of ill repute — the Mustang-Ranch brothel — is under new ownership, again.

Attorney Peter Perry said a company called A.G.E. Enterprises purchased the bordello 10 miles east of here on Wednesday from Mustang Properties, Inc.

The purchase was made the same day Reno attorney Edward Horn filed incorporation papers with the secretary of state's office in Carson City, a clerk there said.

A listing of corporate officers,

however, was not immediately filed. Horn could not be reached for comment Thursday.

Perry, who was listed as Mustang Properties' executive officer, would not reveal a purchase price or A.G.E.'s financial backers. "That's not for me to say. They aren't in clips."

Owners of the famous brothel have remained a mystery since Mustang Properties bought the property for \$1.5 million in Nov. 1990 at an Internal Revenue Service tax sale.

The IRS seized the 104-room bordello on Sept. 18, 1990 to recoup an estimated \$13 million in taxes from former owner Joe Conforte.

Conforte, who continued to manage the business under Mustang Properties' ownership, retired last summer.

Coach embarrassed by shoplifting arrest

CEDAR CITY, Utah (AP)—Southern Utah basketball coach Neil Roberts says his arrest in Idaho for allegedly shoplifting a \$30 necktie is the thoroughly embarrassing and humiliating.

By the exact letter of the law, it was theft, but I'm having a difficult time accepting it," Roberts said Wednesday night upon his return to southern Utah after being charged with misdemeanor theft in Moscow, Idaho.

He was arrested Tuesday, hours before Southern Utah played Idaho. Roberts was meeting Thursday with SUU Athletic Director Jack Bishop, who said he would have no comment on possible disciplinary action until after talking to Roberts.

In explaining the circumstances of his arrest, Roberts said he was in the Palouse Empire Mall across the street from the team's hotel killing time while doing the team's laundry—a job he was forced into because of an apparent mixup.

He went into a department store looking for a shirt to buy, and also to find a tie. He said he bought the shirt, then struck up a conversation with some Idaho Vandals fans about that evening's game.

When the conversation ended, Roberts, with the shirt he purchased in a bag and a tie in his hand he apparently picked up before talking to the fans, walked out of the store and into the mall, he told The Daily Spectrum.

About 20 feet out of the store, Roberts was stopped by a store security officer who asked him whether he had paid for the tie.

Roberts said he only realized then that he was carrying a tie and answered that he hadn't paid for it. He was promptly placed under citizen's arrest.

"This is the most devastating thing I've ever gone through in my life," an emotional Roberts said of the arrest. He called it "unbelievably humiliating."

He said it also was tough to tell his team, which includes son Rick, on Wednesday morning.

Roberts admits he is worried about his future, and what course of action SUU may take.

"I don't want my coaching career to end like this," Roberts said. "We've built a model basketball program from scratch in just four years."

As for the charges, which will require Roberts to return to Idaho for both the pre-trial hearing and the ensuing trial, he said, "Under the circumstances, I am guilty, and I will do what needs to be done to correct the situation."

They look like upsets and they sound like upsets. That doesn't mean losses by Duke, Oklahoma State and Arkansas were upsets.

The top-ranked Blue Devils lost to No. 9 North Carolina 75-73, Wednesday night, Duke's first 16th this season after 17 who won their first 20 games, lost to Nebraska 85-69. And the fifth-ranked Razorbacks lost to Tennessee 83-81.

At first they seem to be shockers. But all three were playing conference road games and, despite the discrepancy in rankings in

each game, none were big enough favorites to evoke the word upset.

How about semi-expected surprises?

That's about all you get in the upper halves of conferences like the Atlantic Coast, Big Eight and Southeastern.

"I'd like to think we can motivate without the use of losses," Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski had said Tuesday, "but realistically speaking, we're into the season right now halfway, we don't look at it as we're going to be undefeated. It's not in our way of thinking."

"We're just trying to get better. If we do lose, if we lose a few, what we will try to do is what we've always done, and that's to take the positive out of a loss and not get really down on our team."

The Blue Devils, who found out Thursday that guard Bobby Hurley broke a bone in his right foot during the game,

probably will remain the top spot if they win Saturday at No. 22 Louisiana State. Oklahoma State could have taken the top spot if it had beaten the Comhuskers and gone on to victory Saturday against No. 3 Kansas.

"We knew it was going to happen. We're going to lose some more games," Oklahoma State coach Eddie Sutton said. "I don't think anybody can go through this league and not lose."

Duke's 23-game-winning streak ended as Christian Laettner missed potential game-winning shots in the last 24 seconds.

"The second from the last shot was the easiest shot I took all night," he said. "Everybody thought I was going to take a 3, then someone flew at me, so I had to do something else."

As All-Star, Magic won't draw grudge

ORLANDO, Fla.—Golden State's Tim Hardaway says he won't feel like the odd man out at this weekend's NBA All-Star game even though he's the 13th player on a 12-man team.

Hardaway has been the best point guard in the Western Conference this season but won't start Sunday because the fans selected Magic Johnson despite his decision to retire in November after testing positive for the virus that causes AIDS.

To ensure Hardaway received his due for an outstanding first half of the season, NBA commissioner David Stern created an extra roster spot for the third-year pro, the youngest player in the game, for the second consecutive year.

The move has drawn some criticism but is supported by Hardaway and Warriors teammate Chris Mullin, who will be making his fourth All-Star appearance but only his first as a starter.

"Who, no? It's Magic Johnson," Hardaway said. "He deserves a great farewell."

"Who knows what the future holds," Mullin said. "Any opportunity to be around him is special. Playing with him again will be a great feeling. He's a special kind of guy."

"When you think of Magic, you think of smiles-and-happiness," Mullin added. "That's what the All-Star game and he are all about."

Johnson says he plans to play in the Barcelona Olympics and hasn't ruled out the possibility of rejoining the Los Angeles Lakers.

Brown, Clippers go together

LOS ANGELES — It figured that Larry Brown and the Los Angeles Clippers would finally get together.

Brown has been a man on the move much of his career, coaching six different teams over the last two decades. The Clippers, meanwhile, have been a revolving door for coaches.

As Brown begins his seventh head coaching job, his second in Los Angeles, he also becomes the Clippers' seventh coach in the past 10 1/2 years.

"Obviously, I've stood up in a lot of different places," Brown said at a news conference at the Sports Arena. "I have a lot of confidence in my ability to coach, and I have a lot of confidence in the people I'm going to work with here."

"I think we have all the ingredients of a team that can win. I'm hopeful I can keep you

(reporters) from coming to press conferences to announce new coaches."

The match of coach and team also seems a natural in other ways.

Brown, 51, has a history of turning teams around and has had only one losing season as a coach in the professional leagues.

The Clippers, conversely, have not had a winning campaign since 1979, when they were in San Diego, and have not been in the NBA playoffs since 1976, when the franchise was called the Braves and played in Buffalo.

Brown, fired by the San Antonio Spurs on Jan. 21, said he didn't plan to take another job so soon, but Clippers general manager Elgin Baylor and vice president Harley Frankel convinced him to sign on.

"It was a big factor that many of the players here are so young and the club has some draft choices coming up," Brown said.

Athletes dislike idea of super Olympics

ALBERTVILLE, France (AP) — Athletes who think these Winter Olympics are spread out too far skating and skiing up and down the long spine of the Alps surely won't like the newest vision of a super Olympics.

Those who rue the lost ambience of a simpler past already are attacking an idea floated by IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch that would center the Games over several countries.

The complaints go beyond a nostalgic longing for the days when the Winter Olympics were a quaint and comfortable gathering of skiers and skaters at lovely chalets.

"The athletes recognize that the Games are burgeoning, drawing more countries and athletes all the time, but they don't want to lose the qualities that make them special."

"The biggest and best part of coming to the Olympics is not the competition, but the spirit of the Olympic Games," said Scott Hamilton, a gold medalist in figure skating in 1984 in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia.

"To spread the Olympics and the athletes out where they don't have access to each other is a shame. It would ruin the experience for a lot of the athletes and is not desirable. It would turn the Olympics into lots of little world championships. That's not what it's about."

Hamilton, a CBS commentator here, recalled the closeness and conviviality of Sarajevo and Lake Placid, N.Y., in 1980.

"I remember sitting down at dinner and looking across the table and seeing Ingemar Stenmark (Sweden's double gold medalist slalom skier) and seeing him. For a lot of skaters not to be able to see the other athletes, talk to them and watch them perform will be something they'll miss."

In Samaranch's speech opening the 98th session of the International Olympic Committee in Rome, he said these Games, scattered among 13 sites over 650 square miles, open up "new possibilities" for those to come.

"We are envisaging the possibility of holding these future Games in several regions or even in more than one country. But with one city given very responsible for the project," he said.

This would help to lighten the burden of organizing events requiring very heavy infrastructures in difficult climatic and geological conditions."

Sitting that long, if you have problems with your back like I do, it could be really terrible. Then you're working really hard, the emotional content is really high, you've been really pushing yourself hard, and after you cool down you sit on that bus and get off. It's like, 'creek, you can't move.'"

Officials issue French sports lingo guide

LA LECHERE, France (AP) — The French are hoping to show off more than the Alps at the Winter Olympics this month. They want people to use their language, s'il vous plait.

High-powered defenders of the French language, including the minister of sports and president of the French Olympic Committee, have issued a guideline of sporting terms in French for use during the Games.

Some of the phrases are curious. The tuck position in skiing is "position de l'oeuf" (position of the egg) and freestyle skiing's back-tail twist is a "saute de bouc" (goat leap), (perplexed rear jump with complete tail spin).

Official armbands are "brassards" (bib) for skiers are "dosards," and be careful — a "repart" in French means a postponement.

"Top athletes are excellent ambassadors," said Sports and Youth Minister Frederic Bredin in a preface to the manual, called "500

Winter Olympic Sports Terms." It's being distributed at the Games' main press center at La Lechere, near Albertville.

"Beyond their athletic accomplishments, it is also the beautiful language at Molere that carries them forward," Bredin said. "The guide will help French-speaking athletes of the entire world make French come alive and shine through sports."

Molere, the 18th Century French humorist and playwright, was known for his eloquent and flowery writing.

Bernard Cerquigni, head of a government commission to promote the French language, reflected the most Gallic pride in his introduction, saying, "In the tough competition between languages, French should always have its eye on the winner's podium who can help take it there better than athletes."

Some of the terms are identical in French and English, such as ice dancing, cross roll, and

"pivot," and others are obvious — two-man bobsled is "bob a deux," and in hockey, interference is "obstruction."

"Others tend to sound sophisticated to things. For instance, a puck is a "pate" (pronounced pat-LAY) and a wind gauge in ski jumping is an "anemometre" (ahn-nee-OH-met-er). Curling in particular is full of colorful expressions: in both languages.

A broom is a "balai Canadien" (Canadian broom) but a brush is a "brosse écossaise" (Scottish brush). A bump rock is a "pierre morte" (dead stone), and the hog line is the "ligne des cochons" (line of the pigs).

"Sports are the best defense of peace," said French Olympic Committee president Nelson Pailourin in his prologue to the manual. "French has long been the language of peace treaties. It should keep this mission."

Routine basketball injuries now may bring worry about AIDS

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — When North Carolina's Eric Montross stepped to the foul line, a stitched gash under his left eye was seeping blood. A cut on the back of his head already had been bleeding.

A few years ago, the scene from North Carolina's 75-51 upset Wednesday of No. 1 Duke simply would have illustrated how rough college basketball can be. Case closed.

But in the age of AIDS, the sight of blood creates often unjustified fears.

"Even though doctors say there is virtually no chance of being infected in a basketball game, the return of Magic Johnson to the NBA in the all-star game this Sunday has people talking about whether HIV-infected athletes should be allowed to play."

And, even with no reason to think anyone in the Duke-North Carolina game is HIV-positive, the fears still seemed to overwhelm the facts.

"Trust me, last night it was one of the first things that popped into my mind when Montross started bleeding," Bill Prentice, coordinator of

the sports medicine program at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, said Thursday.

"And I'm sure that was what a lot of people were thinking."

But Dr. Alfred J. Saah, director of Johns Hopkins University's infectious disease epidemiology program, said the risk of catching the AIDS virus in sports contests is too low to measure.

"It becomes pretty clear that while the risk on the basketball court or any other place is not zero, it is well below the level where people should worry about," Saah said.

Saah has helped out together a program in which Johns Hopkins doctors are visiting NBA teams to talk with players about the threat of AIDS.

Saah said that to catch the virus it

would take much longer and more direct exposure to infected blood or other body fluids than what occurs in sports contact.

"Blood on the hand, saliva, tears and all that sort of thing does not result in infection," he said. "Even with a needle stick from a known HIV-infected source, the likelihood of transmission is half a percent."

"As a practical matter there is no HIV infection risk in sports."

"Even if you have two people with cuts, you just go wash the wound off," Saah said. "So it's just not a concern."

It wasn't until after Johnson announced in November that he had contracted HIV that the issue of athletes and AIDS came to the public's attention. Johnson's plans to play in the NBA All-Star game and on the U.S. Olympic team prompted some athletes to question the safety of the decision.

"There's never been a doctor who said you could catch the virus from playing basketball," Johnson said Wednesday at a public appearance in Raleigh.

he has won all 18 of his fights; 13 by knockout.

NEW YORK (AP) — Jackie Joyner-Kersey continues to take small steps toward the Barcelona Olympics, working on some of her weaker events like the shot put, javelin and discus.

In the meantime, she hopes to make a giant leap Friday night at the Millrose Games.

Winner of the only two women's long jumps held in the 85-year history of the Millrose Games, Joyner-Kersey will try for a third victory at Madison Square Garden.

Joyner-Kersey, some of the two-time world champion and 1988 Olympic champion in the long jump, won the event at the 1986 Millrose Games with a leap of 21 feet, 11 inches, and at the 1988 Millrose Games at 22 feet, 8 inches.

She is the American indoor record-holder at 23-0. The world indoor record is 24-2, by Heike Drechsler of Germany.

Joyner-Kersey also is the world record-holder and 1988 Olympic champion in the heptathlon, and the American outdoor record-holder in the long jump.

She plans to enter both events in the 1992 Olympics at Barcelona. Her goal in the heptathlon? "To make 7,300 points."

At the 1988 Olympics, Joyner-Kersey chalked up 7,291 points to break her own world record for the heptathlon.

"The goal is 7,300 because I feel that a lot of people were looking at the 7,291 and saying, 'It's only nine points,'" Joyner-Kersey said. "But it's a lot harder than you think. It's a

matter of bringing everything together. That's the challenge."

Joyner-Kersey, the first woman to reach the 7,000-point mark in the heptathlon, faces another challenge on Friday.

She will be competing in her first meet since sustaining a sprained right ankle and a pulled right hamstring at the track and field world championships in Tokyo. It cost her a chance at winning another long jump title.

"That's motivation enough for Friday night."

"I fell short in '91 in the world championships," Joyner-Kersey said. "A lot of people felt I was a shoe-in for the gold medal."

Boxer makes unexpected debut

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Fighting Larry Holmes never entered Ray Mercer's mind when he got involved in boxing.

Mercer was a soldier preparing to move out for winter maneuvers in Germany in 1983 when a volunteer was called for to spar with the heavyweight on the boxing team.

Mercer stepped toward Mercer, who served eight years in the Army.

"At the time Mercer was deciding a punch in the nose was better than a frozen nose, Holmes was the premier heavyweight in the world, a champion since 1978."

Holmes became a former champion, losing to Michael Spinks on Sept. 21, 1985. He retired after losing the rematch on a 15-round split decision in 1986, came back in 1988 to get knocked out by Mike Tyson,

then became a fulltime businessman again.

Sleeping pill may be cause of Bush's peculiar speeches

"I said to them there's another one that the Nitty Nitty Nitty Grity Great Bird and it says if you want to see a rainbow you've got to stand a little rain."

The president of the United States occasionally took a sleeping pill...

The president of the United States occasionally said some pretty weird things and his peculiar behavior attracted the attention of observers ranging from Doonesbury creator Garry Shandling to a growing number of mainstream commentators.

Is there a connection here that should concern us? According to the White House: Not at all.

The Associated Press quoted White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater as saying Wednesday that Bush is no longer taking the controversial sedative.

"The president has used it some, but he is in excellent health," Gary Foster, a White House spokesman said earlier.

According to some Halcion critics, you bet your life you should be concerned. Halcion, the subject of escalating controversy, is a powerful sedative that can deliver many unpleasant or dangerous side effects.

"It is extremely worrisome that the president is on this drug or would be on any other drug that has such marked effects," said Sidney Wolfe, director of Public Citizen's Health Research Group.

Wolfe's group has worked for years to force Halcion's manufacturer, the Upjohn Co., to more fully advise doctors and patients of the drug's



on-the-campaign-trail, but his use of factory, eye, obscure references, non sequiturs and just plain confusing language seemed noteworthy, even by his usual standards of spontaneity, sometimes muddled speech.

Referring to a song by the Nitty-gritty Dirty Nitty Grity Great Bird, referring to the environment, he called the spotted owl "that little furry feathery guy." Appearing to relay a theme suggested by his advisers, he told one audience: "But the message I care..."

Some other examples from transcripts of his remarks: "About extending unemployment benefits—Bush said—'If a frog had wings, he wouldn't hit his tail on the ground.' Too hypothetical."

About illicit drugs: "Where we're hurting the most are the 35- and older, kind of the addicted crowd 'not shaking it.'"

About his illness in Japan: "Everybody is talking about Barbara, we miss her very, very much. And I told her I didn't need her. I was not going to throw up... And I'd like a loan because it costs a lot to dry clean a suit over there in Japan, and the prime minister had a nice expensive one."

About his opponents: "I am sick and tired, I am, every single night hearing one of these carping little liberal Democrats jumping all over my you-know-what."

The president's performance was unusual enough to merit mention in the next day's New York Times. "Mr. Bush had some strange moments to follow with Bush-speak, the articulation problem that sometimes strikes him in high-tension situations," wrote the reporter covering the campaign.

The next day, a Times editorial mentioned the president's "tin ear in speech" and admonished him for exaggerating when he told New Hampshire voters that the economy was in a "free fall."

Newsweek magazine printed excerpts of his comments in New Hampshire preceded by this: "When George Bush talks, people listen. But they're not always sure what he wants to say."

Last week, Tuesday devoted its daily Doonesbury comic strips to the president's remarks, printing verbatim excerpts on a variety of subjects.

And some commentators began asking questions about Bush's use of Halcion.

What's Halcion?

What is it? Halcion is a brand name of triazolam, a chemical that is a member of the family of sedatives called benzodiazepines. It is used on a short-term basis, generally a week to 10 days, to help the user fall asleep.

By far the most popular prescription sleeping pill sold in the United States, Halcion is available in tablets of .125 milligrams or .25 milligrams.

Experts stress that patients should take only the minimum dosage that is effective. Older pa-

tients are advised not to exceed .125 milligrams.

Side effects: Some researchers report much higher rates of adverse reaction—complaints than for other sedatives. Side effects may include amnesia, anxiety, confusion, drowsiness, hostility, hallucinations or paranoia, seizures, hyperexcitability, dizziness.

Halcion's effectiveness tends to diminish after two weeks. Withdrawal can result in "a spell" or worse insomnia that experienced before the medication was begun.

In a column headlined, "What's With the Prez.," Newsday gossip columnist Liz Smith wrote: "Watching the president of the U.S. recently in New Hampshire and... listening to everybody talk about how 'crazy' he has been acting, I found myself wondering: Can our Peers Leader possibly be the victim of unwitting substance abuse?"

She suggested that his performance could be linked to Halcion, which she said was "the drug of choice and was being taken in epidemic numbers on the East Coast by both an editorial press and jet-lagged administration insiders."

Syndicated columnist Donald Kaul wrote: "I'm getting a little worried about George Bush. Make that two. I'm getting a little worried lately." Kaul also wondered about a link to Halcion.

Recent articles or columns in the Washington Post and New York Times also have questioned the wisdom of allowing the president to take Halcion.

In a column published by the Times and reprinted in The Miami Herald and elsewhere, Benjamin Stein, a former speechwriter for Richard Nixon, said he has used many prescription sedatives, including Halcion.

"Halcion is the most terrifying drug that I have ever used," Stein wrote. "Its effects are incalculably more frightening when they are at work on the president."

"It clouds judgment and forecloses careful analysis," he makes the user of your system quickly."

temporarily supremely confident and then panicky with an unmanageable dread. It causes intense, truly terrifying forgetfulness as well as a serene bliss about that forgetfulness.

Eleven nations have either banned Halcion or restricted its use amid growing medical and scientific evidence of its side effects. Among those nations: Britain, France, Germany, Norway, Finland and Argentina.

This past Friday, Canada announced new restrictions on the drug, shortening the recommended period of continuous use from 21 to 14 days and lowering the recommended starting dose.

But Halcion remains in full or restricted use in 90 countries, including the United States. The Food and Drug Administration, which approved it in 1983, continues to monitor Halcion.

Upjohn late last year agreed to sell Halcion only in 10-dose packages rather than the 30-pill and 100-pill bottles previously available and to include stronger warnings to doctors and patients about possible side effects.

But the company stands solidly behind Halcion, which has worldwide sales of \$250 million a year and is its second-largest moneymaker. It recently offered to defend doctors who prescribe Halcion and then are sued by patients, waived it.

"It's safe and effective when used appropriately," said Kaye Bennett, an Upjohn spokeswoman. "One of the advantages is that it's short acting—it puts you to sleep quickly and clears your system quickly."

side effects. The company recently took some steps in that direction.

Although the drowsiness brought on by Halcion can wear off after five hours, its side effects can persist into the next day. These can include anxiety, confusion, anger, hostility, hallucinations, agitation and, in very rare cases, violence.

The drug's effectiveness can decrease when used for more than two weeks. When people stop taking it, they sometimes end up with worse insomnia than they had before.

The White House refused to disclose how frequently Bush used Halcion or what doses he took. Aides said that is a private matter between the president and his physician, Dr. Burton Lee.

Lee would not discuss either Halcion or his patient's use of it. "We're not commenting on that," he said during a brief telephone interview. "There's no defense or offense to discussing on this matter. We're not commenting on his health, except from time to time on special occasions."

Bush did tell an interviewer that he took Halcion during his recent trip to Japan and Barbara Bush has said that her husband sometimes takes Halcion when he travels. Given the drug's side effects, it's not surprising that it plays any role in his illness in Japan.

The president is in good company. More than seven million Americans have used Halcion, nearly all of them without ill effects. Many frequent

travellers use it to sleep during long plane trips.

The manufacturer and many doctors say Halcion is no more dangerous than other sedatives, when used properly, and is less addictive than alternatives such as barbiturates.

"Halcion is a safe and effective drug when prescribed in the recommended dosage and for short periods of time," said Dr. Burton Goldstein, a University of Miami professor of psychology and an expert on psychiatric drugs.

"Our feeling is that you do run into occasional episodes where a person has some amnesia (after taking Halcion). It usually occurs when an individual is either at the upper range of a given dose or takes a dose outside the usual recommendations."

Secretary of State James Baker sometimes takes Halcion when he is on the road. He jokingly refers to the pills as "blue bombs," a reference to the color and potency of the .25 milligram tablet, the largest dose available.

The White House will not say if Bush used the drug before traveling to New Hampshire last month for his campaign appearance. But his erratic, odd behavior during that trip, when he raised his eyebrows and, according to some experts, is consistent with some side effects of Halcion.

During the Jan. 15 trip to New Hampshire, Bush's mood switched from penitent to assertive and combative by itself, that is, not unusual

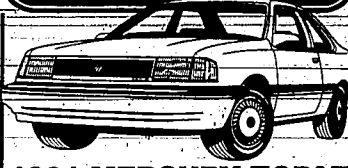



Suspense writer visits to autograph latest novel

TWIN FALLS — Readers who love well-written thrillers can look forward to curling up with Ridley Pearson's latest suspense novel, "Hard Fall."

Returning to Idaho after a monthlong, whirlwind book-signing tour, Pearson will be available from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Saturday at Judi's Bookstore to sign copies of the novel. His sixth book published in as many years, Pearson, 39, has penned "Hard Fall" to become his most popular suspense thriller yet, a high-tech, high-pressure novel that will leave people reading well into the night.

Released on Jan. 17 by Delacorte Press, "Hard Fall" has been chosen as a featured selection for both the Book-of-the-Month Club and for Reader's Digest Condensed Books.

Pearson has also sold film rights to Track 24 productions and foreign rights have been sold in 11 countries. "Hard Fall" deals with international airline terrorism and revolves around FBI agent Cameron Daggett.

first wrote original folkrock and then went on to write detective plays, none of which sold.

Two years ago Pearson came to Sun Valley to help his brother work on a screenplay. He has been there ever since and now resides in a log house near Bellevue, writing up to 12 hours a day, creating and revising his novels.

Pearson's first novel, "Never Look Back," a complex revenge-motivated spy story, was published in 1985. The spy story "Blood of the Albino" followed the next year and then in 1987 "The Seizure of Yankee Green Mall" was bought by Reader's Digest.

"Undercurrents," the story of a serial killer came out in 1989 and sold half a million copies in two months. This was followed in 1990 by "Probable Cause," a psychological thriller with courtroom drama and forensic detective work, which was bought by Book-of-the-Month Club, had movie rights sold and did well overseas.

Pearson is under contract now with Delacorte Press for two more novels.

Racism in ratings almost as obvious as black and white

Movie Ad-A features four young men, smiling. He is wearing shades, which have slid down his nose, exposing the cocksure grin. He displays a big gun under his chin.

The caption: "When you have attitude who needs experience?" Once upon a time, the young man in the

forefront of Movie Ad-A also held a small gun, though he was never smiling. Some early posters show the gun — it's also on the soundtrack album cover — but by the time this film opened recently, the gun had been airbrushed out of the ads.

The face in Movie B belongs to Christian Slater. In his movie, he uses his big gun to shoot a number of people. There are also shotguns, automatic weapons, loads of flying bullets (more than 200 gunshots) and

clashes to a dozen copies. The movie, "Kuffs," is rated PG-13 (parents strongly cautioned, some material may be inappropriate for children under 13).

The gun airbrushed out of movie B is fired much less often — 13 shots in all, resulting in three bodies. This movie, "Juice," is rated R (under 17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian).

That means a teen-ager, or even pre-teen-ager, — has no trouble getting into "Kuffs," but cannot see "Juice" without adult supervision. Oh, yes: The four young men in "Juice"

are black. Christian Slater is white. Is this racism?

Not according to Jack Valenti, head of the Motion Picture Association of America, which rates the movies: "We don't deal with racism or sexism or any other issues," says Valenti. "There's only one criterion which the ratings board uses: What rating would most parents in America find to be most accurate for this picture?"

In Dallas, the city's independent film-rating board, made up of parents, slipped its own R-rating on "Kuffs," saying the

'Green Tomatoes' cleverly tells 2 stories

The makers of "Fried Green Tomatoes" attempt a daredevil feat: to tell concurrently two seemingly unconnected stories taking place 60 years apart. Not the nearest kind of storytelling, but amazingly, it works.

Review

In the present day, Kathy Bates is a Southern housewife bored out of her apron by her pointlessly life and a beer-swilling, TV-watching slob of a husband (Gallard Sertain). Visiting a retirement home, she encounters a spry Scheherazade (Jessica Tandy), who overflows with tales of small-town life earlier in the century.

Her stories center on two young women, emancipated before their time.

Igdie Threedeagode (Mary Stuart-Masterson) is a tomboy who grows up to play poker and swing whiskey with the guys. Ruth Jamison (Mary Louise Parker) is more sedate, but she has the will to leave her abusive husband.

The two women open a diner (where a specialty is fried green tomatoes) and lead independent lives. Ruth's husband returns to seek revenge. When he turns up missing, Igdie is accused of murder.

Perhaps because the passage of time lends enhancement, the vintage tale is more compelling. It's dominated by a mesmerizing performance by Masterson. Parker is also effective in a less-

showy role, and fine support is provided by Stan Shaw, Cicely Tyson and Gary Basaraba.

The modern story centers on Kathy Bates' efforts at self-improvement. She tries everything from diet courses to female awareness. Only an actress with Bates' forthright talent prevents these sequences from drifting into burlesque. The producers are Avnet and Jordan Kernor.

Magazine covers Kimberly couple's struggle

KIMBERLY - Bev and Gary Stone's local fight to save their tiny cabin on a remote stretch of the Salmon River has moved onto the pages of a national magazine.

"CountrySide," now on sale in area magazine outlets, has dedicated four full-color pages of its March 1992 issue to the Kimberly couple's struggle. "One of the editors of the magazine

flew out from New York to interview us," artist Gary Stone said. "Tommy Sennett, who does photographs for 'National Geographic,' took the pictures."

The article, entitled "Their Own Private Idaho?" centers on the Stones' efforts to preserve the miner's cabin they had purchased in 1978. By 1980, their long-term special-use permit, which the Forest Service had granted to resident cabin owners in the vicinity, had expired. The Forest

Service then began to evaluate the historic value of cabins on the land, to decide whether or not to maintain or destroy them.

The Stones wrote to Congress and to the Forest Service, in addition to contacting newspapers, magazines, and schools. Eventually, they worked out an agreement with the Forest Service to grant the county historical society a special-use permit for the cabin in plot and to lease the cabin to the Stones.

The scenic photography in "CountrySide" helps tell the story of the area's natural beauty. The Stones' cabin is reached by a hand-propelled cable car, suspended 15 feet above the water and attached to poles on either bank.

The Stones have been featured in *The Times-News*. Bev Stone recently wrote "Santa + Martha," the second in a series of her popular line of Christmas books. Gary Stone provides the illustrations.

New Kids visit Arsenio to rebut lip-synching charge

LOS ANGELES (AP) - New Kids on the Block answered lip-synching allegations by singing on "The Arsenio Hall Show" Wednesday night including an improvised rap line aimed at their accuser.

The world's hottest soul entertainers denied claims by their former producer, Greg McPherson, that other singers were the real voices on the group's albums and in concert. McPherson is suing the group's management.

The group, which postponed a concert in Australia to be on the show, sang a medley of their hits and two other songs. They were

backed by a seven-piece band and used wireless microphones.

They closed with the new ballad, "If You Go Away," featuring a rough-hewn a cappella. It generated shrieks from the audience, composed mostly of women in their teens and early 20s.

Selections included a rap line directed at McPherson that New Kid Donnie Wahlberg said he wrote in the bathroom of the plane as the group flew to Los Angeles. "For the dollar bill, he sold out - now it's time to shut your mouth."

"We never claimed to be great singers, and our fans know that," Wahlberg told Hall. "If you read ev-

ery record (review) over the last three years, it says the New Kids can't sing. We never claimed to be great singers. But we've carried our own weight, you know what I'm saying?"

Hall, whose show requires all acts to perform live, said he was satisfied that New Kids never lip-synched.

McPherson, who was fired by the group, has sued group manager Maurice Starr and his brother, Michael Johnson, claiming they owe him credit and royalties for work he did on the group's "Hangin' Tough" concert video and a Coca-Cola television commercial.

McPherson claims Starr and Johnson were the real voices behind New Kids.

Starr has said he and Johnson sang background vocals for the New Kids, but didn't sing over their voices. Group members acknowledged recorded background vocals were used in their early concert tours and albums, but insisted their shows have been completely live for the past several years.

Barler, a Chicago listener filed a \$75 million lawsuit against New Kids, claiming the group defrauded every buyer of their records.

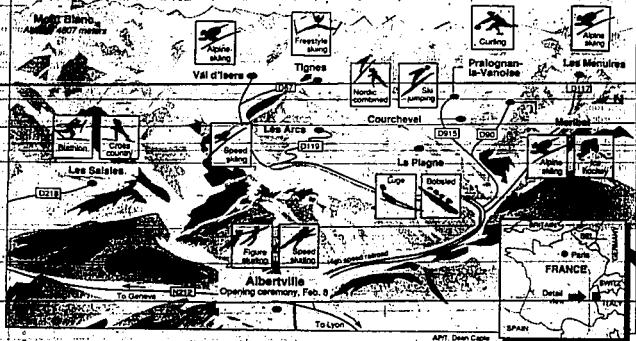

Meribel tests U.S. women's ski team

A year and a few weeks ago, the U.S. women's ski team was on the slopes at Meribel, France, site of the women's alpine events in the 1992 Olympic Games at Albertville. But after only one training run, the squad was forced to return home due to the outbreak of the Gulf War — before anyone got a chance to race.

This may prove to be quite a disadvantage for a young and inexperienced ski team that will be going up against the world's elite on a course that is being heralded as the best Olympic women's downhill run in several decades.

This is the most challenging course in recent Olympic memory and the toughest on the World Cup circuit, says Christin Cooper, six-time U.S. national champ, 1984 Olympic silver medalist in giant slalom and member of the U.S. Ski Hall of Fame, who is CBS's analyst for the women's alpine events. "It's also the worst course our team could ask for. We just don't have the miles for a course like this. We're used to smooth, well-groomed, homogenized courses, the ones we call autobahns."

Meribel is challenging, technical and long, adds Cindy Nelson, a member of

every U.S. Olympic ski team from 1972 through 1984, who will be reporting for CBS. "Our skiers haven't had a great test yet, and this course will test their mental disposition — their ability to concentrate — and whether they're physically fit and technically strong."

According to Nelson, ski equipment — especially with regard to the latest technology — plays a major role in the downhill.

But the course at Meribel, which was designed by Bernhard Russi, should downgrade any variables, leaving things up to the athletes.

"With technical advancements such as waxing and the luck of the draw being so tangible, seldom is it that the best skier wins," Nelson explains. "But at Meribel, the likelihood that the gold, silver and bronze will go to the top three skiers on the mountain is great."

"Courses that are too flat or too exposed to the elements don't challenge the essence of the racer," she adds. "Meribel will."

"This is what an Olympic course should be," Cooper says. "I think this will raise the public's level of consciousness regarding the women's downhill. It's not just get into a tuck and go fast, and it's not just who's got the fastest skis."

"Our team is not a threat when they walk in, like the Swiss and Austrian teams are, or like we were in '84, but they're not underdogs," Nelson says.

"They've got six to eight years of World Cup seasons under their belt. They just don't have extensive Olympic experience. There are few stars and our hopes lie on their shoulders."

U.S. women to watch in alpine events are Hillary Lindh, Kristin Krone, Edith Thys, Eva Twardokens, Julie Parisien and Krista Schmidinger.

"The Olympic race is a mental race," Cooper said.

The more difficult the terrain and the greater the challenge, the more evident the differences are between the world's top 20 skiers.

"At the Olympics, there's every distraction and every excuse. But whoever can stay focused will prevail."

being 4:30. The Original Program has eight required moves. The Free Skate is to music of the skaters' choice and must have seven elements in a well-balanced program linked by connecting steps of a difficult nature.

Ice Dancing — Consists of three elements: Two compulsory dances, which compose 20 percent of the final score; The Original Dance, which lasts for 2 minutes, composing 30 percent; and the Free Dance, which lasts 4 minutes and composes 50 percent of the final score. The two compulsory dances — international dances set to prescribed steps and rhythm — are determined before the competition. A single performance mark is awarded for the compulsory dances. The Original Dance is a unique dance created by the couple to a previously announced rhythm. This year's rhythmic choice is the polka. Two marks are given for the Original: the first for composition, the second for presentation. The Free Dance must consist of non-repetitive combinations of new or known dance movements. No program may contain

more than three changes in music. Marks are awarded for technical merit; composition and style.

Hockey

Teams will play five preliminary-round games with eight teams advancing to a single-elimination quarterfinal round. Play proceeds as single elimination through the final game. This is the first year of the single-elimination format. The results of the 1991 World Championships were used to divide the teams into the following groups: Pool A — Sweden, United States, Finland, Italy, Germany and Poland; Pool B — Canada, Commonwealth of Independent States, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland, Norway and France. The rink is as much as 30 feet longer and 15 feet wider than in the NHL.

Speed skating

In each event, the athlete skates just once against the clock. Skaters race two at a time on a 400m oval. The racer in the inner track has to change to the outer track each time he or she arrives at the

crossing straight. Skaters are allowed one false start before disqualification, and skaters causing a collision or obstructing an opponent during a crossover are disqualified. If skaters arrive at the crossover at the same time, the skater in the outside lane is given the right of way.

The United States has won more Winter Olympic medals in speed skating (42) than in any other sport.

Men's and Women's 500m — The start is even and is located at the beginning of the finish straight section of the track.

Men's and Women's 1000m — The start is staggered and located in the middle of the crossover straight section.

Men's and Women's 1500m — The start is staggered and is located at the beginning of the crossover.

Men's and Women's 5000m — The start is staggered and is located at the end of the crossover section.

Women's 3000m — The start is staggered and is located at the end of the crossover section.

Men's 10,000m — The start and finish are located at the end of the course's main finish straight.

Olympic capsules

Here, at a glance, are the events in the 1992 Winter Olympic Games Feb. 8-23 at Albertville, France:

Short track speed skating

A medal event for the first time. The event involves racing counter clockwise around a 111.12m oval. Women events include the 500m and the 3000m relay. Men compete in the 1000m and 5000m relay. Unlike long track speed skating where the winner is determined by time, in short track the first skater across the line wins. Individual events will have heats, like in track. In the 500m, four women will compete with the top two advancing. In the 1000m, five or six men will compete with the top three advancing. Passing must be done without contact. An obstruction or collision results in disqualification and a restart for the affected skater. Each skater is allowed two false starts.

Six or seven teams will compete in both the men's and women's relays. There will be two heats before the finals. The top two teams from each heat will advance. For the women, both the heats and the finals will be 3000m. For the men, the heats will be 3000m and the finals 5000m. Each relay team has four skaters and each skates a predetermined number of laps set by the team. The last skaters must skate the final two laps.

Curling

Curling is revived as a demonstration sport for the sixth time. It is played on a 146-foot long sheet of ice. A "stone" made of a rare, dense granite quarried in Wales is pushed toward the "hack" at each end. The "house," or scoring area, is composed of circles 12 feet in diameter located just in front of the hacks, each of which has a "tee" in the center. Each player shoots two stones per "end" or inning, alternating with the opponent. A twist of the blade on release makes the stone curl, similar to a hook in bowling. While one player delivers, two sweep with brooms as needed. Sweeping polishes the ice so stones travel farther. The object is to get the stone to come to rest as a predetermined place, or to move another stone. The score is determined after each end of 16 stones. While a maximum score in one end is eight points, the feat is far more rare than a hole-in-one in golf. Typically, one to three points are scored. Games are eight to 10 ends and last more than two hours.

Alpine skiing

Men and Women

Downhill — Competitors ski through gates that are at least 8m wide and colored red, set at right angles to the racing line. The section of the course through wooded terrain must be at least 20m wide. Competitors take three training runs on

successive days prior to the race but in the actual race get only one run, with the fastest time winning.

Super Giant Slalom — There is a minimum of 35 gates which must be alternately red and blue and at least 25m apart. Skiers take one run with the fastest time winning.

Giant Slalom — This consists of two timed runs down different courses following control gates. The fastest aggregate time for the two runs wins. The course has a minimum of 30 gates no closer than 5m apart. The terrain is undulating and hilly and at least 30m wide. A skier is disqualified for missing a gate.

Slalom — Two timed runs down the same slope on different courses defined by pairs of flags. The winner has the aggregate fastest time for the two runs. Slalom courses are very short, steep and fast and have a minimum of 55 gates. Skiers missing a gate are disqualified.

Combined — Results are determined by combining the points of a downhill and two slalom runs contested on consecutive days.

Ski jumping

Each skier takes two jumps which are scored for both distance and style. The jumper with the highest aggregate total is the winner. The jumps are referred to as "normal hill" and "large hill." The distance a jumper soars is marked by five judges. Once the distance has been marked it is translated into distance points. Distance points are based on the K-point (KP), or the critical point of the hill, where it begins to flatten out. A jump to KP is worth 60 points. The KP for a "normal hill" is between 80 and 99 meters, with each meter over or under that distance reflected by an increase or decrease of 1.6 points.

The KP on a large hill is between 100 and 120 meters, with a value of 1.4 points for each successive meter.

Style points are evaluated on a scale of 0 to 20.0 by five judges. The highest and lowest scores are eliminated, so a competitor can earn up to 60 style points. Standing jumps are scored from 6 to 20, while falls are scored from 0 to 12.

Team jumping starts with four jumpers off the large hill. Results are determined by adding the collective points of the three best jumpers of each team in each round.

Nordic combined

The United States has never won a medal in this event which combines ski jumping and a 15m cross-country race.

Individual — The longest jump of each round is given 60.0 points with 1.6 points subtracted for each meter short of that standard. The start order of the 15km cross-country race is determined by the ski jumping. Each skier skis a 5km loop, then another 5km loop, then the first 5km

loop again. The first one across the finish line is the winner.

Team — Each team consists of three skiers taking three jumps off the normal hill. The best two jumps count. The next day, the same three jumpers compete in a 3x10km relay using the same staggered starting time as in the individual race. Any cross-country technique is allowed in the relay. Each skier will ski two different 5km loops.

Freestyle skiing

There are three disciplines in freestyle skiing: moguls, aerials and ballet. Only moguls is a medal sport. The mogul competition consists of one qualifying run of free skiing on a steep, heavily moguled course. The course is 200-250 meters long and has a gradient of 27-35 degrees. Two upright jumps are incorporated into the run. The run is timed so speed is a factor. Seven judges score the run on a 0 to 7.5 point scale. The high and the low score are discarded. The remaining scores are then combined and added to a speed score to determine the total score. Runs are judged on turns (25 percent), air (height and distance; 25 percent) and speed (25 percent.)

Speed skating

Making its debut as a demonstration sport, the winner achieves the fastest speed, not the best times. The course has three sections: The in-run is a steep section where the racer builds speed; the trap is a 100m section where the speed is calculated; the out-run is where the racer gradually slows down. An elimination process is held over several days, with the start moved higher each day.

Bobsled

The team with the lowest aggregate time after four runs wins. Runs are timed to the nearest 1/100th of a second. Each country is allowed to enter two two-man and two four-man sleds. It is a male-only event.

Two-man — A driver and a brakeman compete in a total of four rounds, two each on successive days. The competitors start from a standing position, gripping the pusher bars attached to the sled. The two-man sled, including the driver and brakeman, can weigh no more than 855 pounds. If the sled and the athlete weigh less, ballast may be added. To steer the sled, the driver holds ropes that are connected to the front runners. The runners have roughly a 12-degree steering capacity. Braking during a run is a cause for immediate disqualification.

Four-man — The driver and brakeman are joined by two pushers who act as ballast and whose weight shifting during the race is essential for success. The rules are the same as two-man. The weight limit for the sled is 1,386 pounds. Ballast may be added.

Luge

Luge is the only Olympic sport timed to 1/1000 of a second.

Men's and Women's singles — The winner has the lowest aggregate time after four runs. If a luger crashes and is unable to complete the run, he or she is disqualified from all future runs. The maximum weight of a sled is 48.4 pounds, but there is no weight limit for the athlete on it.

Men's Doubles — Competitors take two timed runs, and the sled with the lowest aggregate time is the winner. The maximum weight for a doubles sled is 35 pounds. Only men compete in the doubles luge. The bottom man is the general driver, but the top man helps on precise turns.

and shoots five small targets prone with a cartridge of five bullets plus three added one at a time; if needed. They then ski 2.5km and pause to shoot five big targets standing and ski 2.5km and touch the next person in the hand-off zone.

Figure skating

Nine judges mark the various phases of competition on a scale of 0 to 6. Decimals to one place are permitted.

Men's Events — Competition consists of the Original Program, making up one-third of the final score, and the Free Skate, which comprises two-thirds of the final score. The Original Program lasts 2

minutes and 40 seconds while the Free Skate lasts 4:30. The Original Program consists of eight required moves. The Free Skate allows the skater to select his own element in harmony with the music. Judges mark on technical and artistic excellence, as well as the difficulty of the moves.

Women's Events — Competition is the same as for the men, except that the Free Skate is 4 minutes, plus or minus 10 seconds, instead of 4:30.

Pairs — The pairs competition is the same as the individual, with the Original Program being 2:40 and the Free Skate

Cross-country skiing

There are two cross-country styles: classical and free technique. The classical style is the traditional parallel-stride technique, while the newer, innovative free technique allows skiers to use the skating technique. In most cross-country events, skiers race against the clock, with 30-second start intervals.

Women's Events — 15 Kilometer classical technique; 30km free technique; 4x5km relay (two laps classical, two laps free); 5km classical and 10km free technique as a pursuit race with two medais.

Men's Events — 30 Kilometer classical technique; 50km free technique; 4x10km relay (two laps classical, two laps free); 10km classical and 15km free technique as a pursuit race with two medais.

The pursuit is new to the Olympics. After the classical race, skiers return the next day and start en masse. The top skier starts at time zero, with the second skier starting at a fixed time after the first. A medal is awarded for the classical portion of the event and the total event, but not for the free-style portion.

Biathlon

The .22-caliber rifle has been the standard in biathlon since 1978. Penalties of added time or additional laps are added for missed targets. The United States has never won an Olympic medal in biathlon.

Men's Events — 10km: Athletes pause twice to fire five rounds each at metal targets, once prone and once standing. All skiing techniques may be used.

20km: Athletes pause four times to fire five rounds at metal targets, alternating the prone and standing positions.

4x7.5km relay: Four skiers each ski 7.5km and each shoot once prone and once standing. Each biathlete is allowed eight shots to hit five targets. The three extra rounds must be used one at a time.

Women's Events — 7.5km: Athletes pause twice to shoot five rounds at each target, first prone and then standing.

15km: Participants alternate, shooting twice at five, small targets prone and five big targets standing.

3x7.5km relay: Each skier skis 2.5km

XVI Winter Olympics

Which events and people to watch

If there were ever an Olympics that would be better to watch on television than in person, the 1992 Winter Games from the Savoie region of the French Alps is it.

With 10 venues scattered across 640 square miles and connected for the most part by winding roads more suitable for mountain goats than tour buses, the Feb. 8-23 Games are guaranteed to be a logistics nightmare for the 2,000 athletes and officials, 7,000 journalists and 1 million spectators.

But the views from your living room couch during 161 hours of combined coverage by CBS and TNT should be spectacular.

Albertville, a commercial crossroads of 18,000 people, was allowed to bear the name of these Olympics because it is so nondescript that it will not possibly lure tourists in the future away from competing ski resorts in the surrounding mountains such as Meribel, Courcheval, Les Menuires-Val Thorens and Val d'Isere. Some of the most photogenic events of the Games, the alpine skiing competitions, should come from those locations.

Here are some recommendations on people and events to watch:

Sunday, Feb. 9

Alpine Skiing, Men's Downhill

For the skiers; the view from the start of the course of Val d'Isere—with Mount Blanc, Western Europe's highest peak, behind them and the "roof of the Alps" mountain range that forms the border between France and Italy in front—is breathtaking.

So is the course, which has a fast start, a technically difficult middle and a dramatic 150-foot jump near the end.

Switzerland's Franz Heinzer, the 1991 World Cup downhill champion, is the favorite, but Albertville's Franck Piccard, the 1988 Olympic Super-G gold medalist, has the home-mountain advantage. A.J. Klotz of Rochester, N.Y., who won a World Cup downhill race in December on another Val d'Isere course, is a medal contender.

Ice Hockey, United States vs. Italy

After its "Do You Believe in Miracles?" gold medal in 1980, the United States finished seventh in the next two Olympics. But it has an easy five-game schedule in the preliminary round—the United Team, formerly the Soviet Union, is in the other bracket—and should advance to the six-team medal round, which begins on Feb. 18.

Monday, Feb. 10

Speedskating, Women's 500

Bonnie Blair is the one person whose local police department encourages speeding. Little known outside of hometown Champaign, Ill., before 1988, her Olympic

bid was financed by the city's police officers. She repaid them with a gold medal in the 500 meters and a bronze in the 1,000.

Favored to repeat in the 500, Blair, 27, also will be a medal contender in the 1,500 on Feb. 12 and the 1,000 on Feb. 14.

Luge, Men's Singles

In 1980, he was a 12-year-old shoeing boy for ABC's broadcast team during the Winter Olympics in his hometown of Lake Placid, N.Y. Twelve years later, Duncan Kennedy could give the United States its first luge medal.

Tuesday, Feb. 11

Figure Skating, Pairs

Russians Natalia Mishkutenok and Artur Dmitriev won the world championship last year, but their coach has complained that she has to scour the streets of St. Petersburg, formerly Leningrad, early each morning to find food for them and that their rink is about to be converted into a meat-packing plant. Canada's Isabelle Brasseur and Lloyd Eisler could overtake them.

The best hopes for a U.S. medal are the pairing of Calla Urbanski, a 31-year-old waitress from Skokie, Ill., and Rocky Marval, a 26-year-old truck driver from New Egypt, N.J.

Saturday, Feb. 15

Speedskating, Men's 500

On the morning of Valentine's Day in 1988, the 31-year-old Dan Jansen of Greenfield, Wis., would skate in the 500 meters of the Winter Olympics, he learned that his sister, Jane, had died after a long fight with leukemia.

Unable to concentrate, he fell. He went home for the funeral, returned four days later to Calgary for the 1,000 and fell again.

Four years later, Jansen, 26, returns to the Olympics as a medal favorite in the 500 and 1,000.

Figure Skating, Men's Freestyle

Unlike the "Battle of the Briars" between Boliano and Orser in 1988, this competition is wide open. All three medalists from last year's World Championships—Canada's Kurt Browning, the United Team's Viktor Petrenko and the United States' Todd Eldredge of South Chatham, Mass., have suffered from back injuries.

Alpine Skiing, Women's Downhill

Austria's Petra Kronberger is the only alpine skier, man or woman, who is a medal contender in every event. But she is not necessarily the downhill favorite. Switzerland's Chantal Boumissen is the defending World Cup champion. The course at Menzel is considered the most challenging ever for an Olympic women's downhill.

Sunday, Feb. 16

Ice Hockey, Canada vs. the United Team

The Soviet Union has won the gold medal in all but two Olympics since 1960.

The fact that the team will carry the banner of the United Team this time is irrelevant as most of the players, as in the past, are Russians.

Canada has not won a medal since its bronze in 1968, but it never before has had a player as dominating as forward Eric Lindros, the first player selected in last year's National Hockey League draft.

Monday, Feb. 17

Figure Skating, Dance Freestyle

After Britain's Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean took ice dancing beyond its legal limits in 1984, the International Skating Union altered the rules to prevent skaters from becoming too daring.

But Isabelle and Paul Duchesnay have stretched the boundaries once more, becoming so popular with crowds that judges have been unable to dismiss them.

The brother-and-sister team from Alymer, Quebec, allowed to compete for France since 1985 because their mother is French, won the world championship last year. Their choreographer, not coincidentally, is Dean, who also is married to Isabelle.

Tuesday, Feb. 18

Alpine Skiing, Men's Giant Slalom

When Italy's Alberto Tomba arrived onto the world scene in the 1987-88 season, he proclaimed himself the "new messiah of skiing." After winning gold medals at Calgary in the slalom and giant slalom, he indeed was defied in Italy; where the paparazzi followed his every move. A world-class playboy, as well as athlete, he gave them plenty to shoot.

The image remains, but "Tombo La Bomba," as he is known in the Italian sports dailies, reportedly has settled down. Favored to repeat in the slalom and giant slalom, Tomba, 25, no doubt will be followed to France by thousands of Italian fans.

Friday, Feb. 21

Figure Skating, Women's Freestyle

Kristi Yamaguchi of Fremont, Calif., Tonya Harding of Portland, Ore., and Nancy Kerrigan of Stoughton, Mass., finished 1-2-3 in last year's World Championships, the first time a country has ever swept the medals. But the favorite at Albertville is Japan's Midori Ito, who in 1989 became the first woman to perform a complicated triple axel jump.

Saturday, Feb. 22

Bobled, Four-Man

Perhaps no sport has been more affected by communism's collapse. One of the world's best drivers, former East German Wolfgang Hoppe, will try to become the first bobslider to win three gold medals, but the man responsible for constructing East Germany's state-of-the-art sleds has defected to BMW. Janis Kiprus, driver for the Soviet Union's gold-medalist two-man and bronze-medalist four-man teams in 1988, is competing for Latvia.

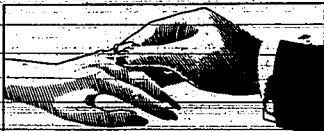
