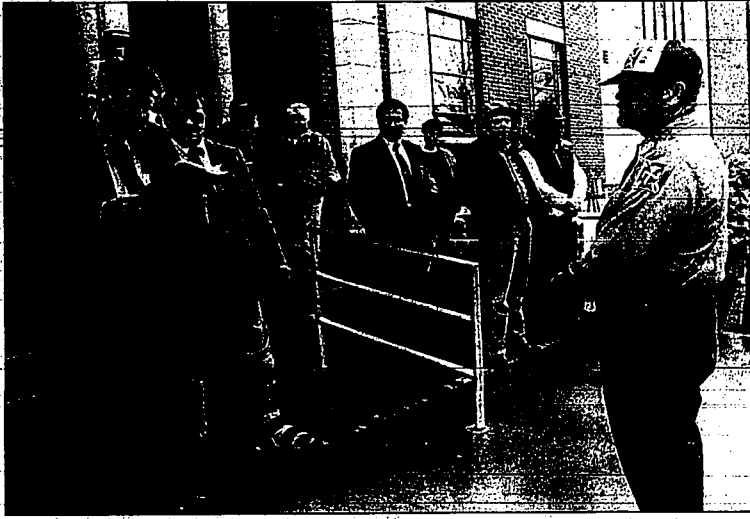

Miller loses farm but buyer may let him stay on

JEROME — In less than 30 minutes Thursday, white supremacist John E. Miller lost the farm on which he used to be host to Ku Klux Klan-style cross-burnings.

But he'll continue to live in a house on the land if he chooses, the new owner said.

Miller's property, located at 200 West-83 South, was auctioned off by federal marshals because Miller and his wife, Mary, owed the government more than \$200,000 in back taxes they refused to pay.

Members of the Aryan Nations, the anti-black, anti-Semitic, neo-Nazi group of which Miller claimed to be a leader, mingled among the crowd of about 80 people that gathered on the front steps of the Jerome County courthouse for the sale.

But the auction came off without incident after Miller attempted to challenge the sale. He was interrupted by a Senior Deputy Marshal Dave Hunt, who began the proceedings precisely at 1 p.m. under the watchful eyes of Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold and his deputies.

The final bid of \$95,000 for the 120-acre property was made by Allen Ploss, 32, of Jerome. Ploss and his wife, Carrie, have lived on the Miller property for 5 1/2 years, renting one of the houses on Miller's farm.

Ploss said he has known the Millers all his life, but that he didn't share Miller's philosophy.

"They are like a father and mother to me," he said. He's an excellent neighbor and landlord, Ploss said.

"And with the sale, Ploss is now Miller's landlord. 'We made a good buy, but we have a lot of butterflies about this,' Ploss said after the sale. He added he didn't expect any trouble from his new tenants.

"At least I hope not," Ploss said. The federal government sued the Millers in 1987 for not paying federal income taxes from 1974 to 1982. After numerous delays and appeals, the case finally went to trial last year, and a six-member jury was unanimous in supporting the government.

The Millers were ordered to pay a total of \$200,706.19 and

Police say Oasis robber in cahoots with barkeep

TWIN FALLS — When a masked gunman walked into The Oasis restaurant and bar Feb. 8 and ordered the bartender to empty the cash register, the barkeep may have been the least surprised fellow in the place.

According to a detective's affidavit filed in 5th District Magistrate Court Thursday, the man charged, with the theft says he and the bartender planned the theft together.

John D. Eastman, 18, of Twin Falls was charged Thursday with grand theft and the use of a deadly weapon. He was released after posting a \$5,000 bond.

It was just after midnight on a Saturday when a man wearing a ski mask and carrying a gun entered The Oasis and

screamed "Give me all of your money, and don't ... with me," according to the affidavit, filed by Twin Falls police detective Jack Freeman.

The masked man then asked bartender Jim Brubaker if he thought his request was a joke, and fired a shot into the wall, Freeman's affidavit says.

Although there were several patrons in the bar, located at 1007 Blue Lakes Boulevard N., nobody was hurt.

Brubaker put \$1,650.14 in cash and checks in a bag and handed it to the gunman, who fled out the back door, the affidavit says.

Scientists locate MD gene

BOSTON — Researchers said Thursday they have pinpointed the gene that causes the most common adult form of muscular dystrophy.

It is the latest in a series of discoveries that should lead to early diagnosis and perhaps eventual treatment.

The discovery already provides more clues about why this inherited disease gets worse as it is passed from generation to generation.

The disease, called myotonic dystrophy, affects about one in every 7,000 to 8,000 people worldwide.

Three research teams with members in the United States, Canada and Europe discovered the gene almost simultaneously. One of their reports will be

published in today's issue of the journal Cell. The other two will appear March 6 in the journal Science.

"The new results will permit very precise methods for diagnosing the disease prenatally and before symptoms appear and identifying carriers" of the gene, said Dr. Henry Epstein, a member of one of the research teams.

Experts caution, however, that the discovery does not immediately suggest any obvious ways of stopping or preventing the disease, which causes weakness and wasting of muscles.

However, the findings at least help scientists begin a search for therapies.

Knowing the gene permits one to work toward that goal," Epstein said. "It doesn't necessarily tell us we could design a specific drug right now, but it may offer that possibility."

Experts rule out cosmetic implants

BETHESDA, Md. — A panel of experts unanimously recommended Thursday severely restricting silicone gel implants for breast enlargement but allowing easy access for women needing reconstructive surgery.

Minutes later, an officer of Dow Corning, which developed the implants, said it may stop making them.

If the Food and Drug Administration follows its panel's advice, implants would be allowed only for women who have lost a breast to cancer or have a breast deformity — or for women in tightly controlled clinical trials.

Women wanting breast enlargements represent 80 percent of the one million who now carry implants in their bodies. The rest have implants because their breasts had been deformed or were removed because of cancer.

Asked if the company was getting ready to sell its implant business, Robert T. Rylee, chairman of Dow Corning's health care businesses, said: "That may be an appropriate thing for us to do."

The decision, he said, will be made "fairly soon."

Nancy Dubler, a lawyer and one of nine voting members of the 24-person panel, said the recommendation of restrictions "responds to science on the one hand and compassion on the other."

Initially, five of the nine voted for the proposed restriction. The other four did not vote. But the committee then discovered that six votes were needed for passage.

The issue was reopened and, after several minutes of discussion, another vote was taken. That tally: 9-0.

An earlier vote rejecting an outright ban was also unanimous.

The panel recommended that more studies be done on the implants and on the possible effects of the silicone gel on living tissue.

While the recommendations are not binding on the FDA, the agency usually follows the recommendations of such committees. The FDA plans to issue its final decision within 60 days.

Dr. Juleen Harris, a voting member, said the evidence he has seen this week did not "provide the basis to conclude that silicone gel breast implants are safe and effective."

"I do not find this evidence convincing but disturbing," Harris said.

Through their questions and statements over the course of the hearings, the members indicated more sympathy for women needing breast reconstruction than for those who just wanted bigger breasts.

Exports hit record high, gain ground on trade deficit

WASHINGTON (AP) — America's trade deficit improved dramatically in 1991, falling below \$100 billion for the first time in eight years.

That was the result as exports hit a record high and the recession held down imports, the government reported Thursday.

While the 35 percent drop in the deficit to \$92.5 billion represented America's best trade performance since 1983, analysts saw plenty of problems ahead.

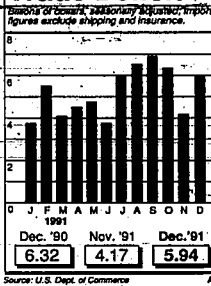
For one thing, America's deficit with Japan actually rose during 1991, climbing by 5.7 percent to \$43.44 billion, representing two-thirds of the total imbalance.

And the overall deficit worsened considerably in December, rising by 42 percent to \$5.94 billion as U.S. exports fell for a second straight month and imports climbed 7.3 percent.

Analysts have forecast that the trade gap will widen considerably this year as export growth falters because of weakness in many of America's major overseas markets.

That would represent a setback for

the Bush administration, which is expected to help lift the stagnant U.S. economy.

In another worrisome economic development, the Labor Department reported Thursday that the number of newly laid-off workers filing claims for unemployment benefits rose to 452,000 in the first week in February, an increase of 18,000 over the previous week.

Analysts viewed the increase as further evidence of a weak labor market beset by continuing layoffs in autos, electronics and other manufacturing industries.

However, the Bush administration hailed the sharp improvement in the 1991 trade deficit as proof that American industries are competitive once more internationally. Export gains were recorded in virtually all parts of the world.

"The success of U.S. exporters in international markets continues to be the bright spot in the U.S. economy. Exports will make a strong contribution to the economic recovery this

year and to the expansion of U.S. jobs," said Acting Commerce Secretary Rockwell Schabel.

But David Wyss, chief financial economist for DRI-McGraw Hill, said he expected 1991 would represent the high-water mark for America's trade performance for years to come. He said that the deficit would be approaching \$100 billion again by 1994.

With the United States struggling to mount a sustained recovery from the recession, the loss of jobs to foreign competitors has become a major political issue.

Republican challenger Patrick Buchanan and the Democratic candidates have all attacked Bush for failing to do enough to dismantle foreign trade barriers.

Bush's critics have charged that last month's trip to Japan was an embarrassment that failed to extract meaningful concessions.

But Wyss said the real difficulty was a lack of investment in the United States to make the country more competitive.

"Until we get U.S. productivity up to where it ought to be, we are going to have a trade problem," he said.

Much of last year's improvement reflected stronger sales in Latin America and Europe, where America's trade surplus registered a four-fold increase to \$16.13 billion.

Imports from Japan were recorded with China, an imbalance of \$12.69 billion, up 22 percent from 1990. The \$66.2 billion trade deficit for

all of 1991, the lowest since a \$52.4 billion 1983 deficit, was \$35.5 billion below 1990's trade gap of \$101.7 billion. The record deficit was \$152.1 billion set in 1987.

Much of last year's improvement reflected the effects of the U.S. recession, which dampened demand for

foreign goods. Imports fell by 1.5 percent to \$488.06 billion. Oil imports dropped by \$10.3 billion while car imports were down \$2 billion.



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Pentagon war scenario spotlights Russia

WASHINGTON — A classified study prepared as the basis for the Pentagon's budgetary planning through the end of the century casts Russia as the gravest potential threat to U.S. vital interests.

It presumes the United States would spearhead a NATO counterattack if Russia launched an invasion of Lithuania.

U.S. intervention in Lithuania, which would reverse decades of American restraint in the former Soviet Union's Baltic sphere of influence, is one of seven hypothetical roads to war that the Pentagon studied to help the military services size and justify their forces through 1999. In the study, the Pentagon neither advocates nor predicts any specific conflict.

The Lithuania scenario contemplates a major war by land, sea and air in which 24 NATO divisions, 70 fighter squadrons and six aircraft carrier battle groups would keep the Russian navy "bottled up in the eastern Baltic," bomb supply lines in Russia and use armored formations to expel Russian forces from Lithuania. The authors state that Russia is unlikely to respond with nuclear weapons, but they provide no basis for that assessment.

Other scenarios include a reprise of the Persian

Gulf War, a major war with North Korea, simultaneous wars against Iraq and North Korea, and attempts in Panama and the Philippines, and the re-emergence of a hostile superpower — Russia, with or without other former Soviet republics — capable of threatening U.S. interests around the globe.

Elements of the Pentagon document, a copy of which has been obtained by The Washington Post, were first reported this week in the New York Times.

Drafted at the direction of Paul Wolfowitz, undersecretary of defense for policy, and Adm. David E. Jeremiah, vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the seven scenarios were prepared as a major part of the "defense planning guidance," the cornerstone document in a complex process of Pentagon force planning and budgeting.

The scenarios were issued to service secretaries and defense agency chiefs on Feb. 4 and will be used by Assistant Defense Secretary David S.C. Chu to measure the adequacy of 1994 budget requests.

Since the collapse of the Soviet empire, the Pentagon has proposed cutting U.S. forces from 2.1 million personnel to 1.6 million, but has resisted pressure for further reductions, saying the United States must remain prepared to respond to

"regional contingencies" around the world. The planning document, which was not intended for public disclosure, is by far the most concrete description of such regional contingencies to date and thus appears likely to become a lightning rod for congressional debate.

An unclassified draft preface to the seven scenarios describes them as "illustrative" of the demands that might be placed on the U.S. military in coming years, adding, "They are neither predictive nor exhaustive."

The Lithuania scenario judges the likelihood of war with Russia as "low," but goes on to say that economic and political tensions "could compel political leaders to make decisions that appear irrational" and asserts that a Russian invasion of Lithuania "is plausible in light of recent events in the former Soviet Union."

More striking to analysts inside and outside the government has been the Pentagon document's description of Lithuania as a "U.S. vital interest." The language of vital interests traditionally denotes something that the U.S. government would use military force to protect.

Though applying the term to Lithuania, the document, titled "1994-1999 Defense Planning Guidance, Scenario Set, for Final Coordination," does not purport to represent current U.S. policy.

Lawmaker hints at support for 20 stealth bombers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Armed Services Committee chairman indicated Thursday that Democrats and Republicans who have opposed the B-2 stealth bomber may be willing to accept President Bush's plan to build 20 aircraft.

"You get good value for the money if you're interested in hearing it because we might be interested in adopting your position," Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., told Air Force Secretary Donald Rice.

Lawmakers in the House have sought to stop production of the radar-evading bomber at the 15 aircraft under construction, citing the \$865 million per plane pricing as excessive in times of recession.

The Pentagon, faced with strong congressional opposition and the collapse of the Soviet threat,

has cut its purchase target from a high of 132 to 20.

In the fiscal 1993 military budget, the Air Force has proposed spending \$4 billion to buy four planes and complete the program in 20 years.

Rice argued that the B-2 program is \$4.8 billion but by spending \$2.6 billion more — a total of about \$44 billion — the Air Force can purchase 20 bombers and increase capability significantly.

A fleet of 15 planes would allow the Air Force to execute, for example, a raid on Libya as the United States did in April 1986, but impose some limits on the service, Rice said.

"We would have had a very difficult time sustaining a sortie rate that would make a difference

day after day after day," Rice told the Armed Services Committee.

With 20 planes, "you can now seriously talk about sustained operations, sustained numbers of sorties," he said, citing the incremental cost of \$2.6 billion.

"You've got a good case if it is \$2.6 billion," Aspin said.

Working against Bush's proposal in the House is the desire among some lawmakers to reduce significantly military spending and use the money for other programs.

The administration's fiscal 1993 proposal of \$4 billion for the B-2 bomber represents a substantial amount of money that could be used for other defense projects.

Court orders efficiency vs. safety study

WASHINGTON — A federal appeals court has ordered regulators to study whether automobile fuel-efficiency standards can lead to more highway deaths by forcing manufacturers to make cars less crashworthy.

The panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals ruled 2-1 the government had not adequately considered whether requiring new cars fleets to average 27.5 miles per gallon would force automakers to "downsize" cars. The industry contends smaller cars are less able to protect occupants in crashes than larger cars.

"When the government regulates in a way that prices many of its citizens out of access to large-car safety, it owes them reasonable candor," the court said in an opinion released Wednesday. Instead, it said, the regulators were "covering behind bureaucratic mumbo-jumbo."

The ruling came in a lawsuit filed by General Motors Corp. and the Competitive Enterprise Institute, a Washington-based research group.

Samuel Pierce's friend pleads guilty

WASHINGTON — A longtime friend of former Housing Secretary Samuel Pierce entered the first guilty plea Thursday in the probe of influence peddling in the Housing and Urban Development Department.

Samuel Pittman Singletary of Pleasantville, N.Y., pleaded guilty to a felony tax-evasion charge before U.S. District Judge Stanley S. Harris, admitting that he gave the Internal Revenue service a false 1985 return.

The return said he and his wife earned \$37,762 that year, when he knew they had earned substantially in excess of that sum, Singletary admitted. The court documents did not say how much they were alleged to have earned that year.

The plea agreement with Independent Counsel Arlin Adams says Singletary will cooperate fully with Adams in his investigation of influence peddling at the HUD during the Reagan administration.

Abortion-rights backers promise rally

WASHINGTON — Abortion-rights activists on Thursday promised their biggest march yet in Washington to mobilize support to combat legal setbacks in abortion rights.

"Our reproductive freedom has never been so imperiled," National Organization for Women president, Patricia Ireland said. "If the current Congress won't deliver, we have the will to elect women and men who will."

NOW, the National Abortion Rights Action League and a host of other groups said they plan to send a strong message to candidates this election year with an April 5 march and rally on the Washington Mall.

Karl Michelman, president of the National Abortion Rights Action League, refused to estimate numbers, promising only that the march would be several times bigger than any anti-abortion event.

Michelman said the coalition was focusing on electing "anyone but Bush" to the White House and a veto-proof Congress willing to legislate abortion rights.

Arab American hate crimes rise sharply

WASHINGTON — Hate crimes against Arab Americans increased dramatically in 1991, largely because of the Gulf War, the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee said Thursday.

The report followed a similar survey by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, which found a number of anti-semitic incidents during the year. That group also linked the surge to the war.

The Arab group listed 119 hate crimes last year, compared to 39 the year before. Incidents listed in the report range from minor vandalism and threatening phone calls to the bombing of businesses and homes owned by Arabs.

Aaron Cohen joins NASA as 2nd chief

WASHINGTON — Aaron Cohen, director of the Johnson Space Center in Houston, was appointed Thursday to the number two position at NASA and will serve as interim head until a replacement is found for outgoing Administrator Richard Truly.

The appointment of Cohen as acting deputy administrator was announced by Truly, whose forced resignation was announced last week. Truly will leave NASA on April 1.

In the announcement, Truly said Cohen will assist him in daily operations until his departure, and also provide for continuity in the transition period as the president nominates and the Senate confirms a new administrator and deputy administrator.

Court gives letter writer 16-month term

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — A man who wrote a letter threatening Gov. Pete Wilson has been sentenced to 16 months in state prison.

David Canter, 61, of San Francisco was sentenced after pleading guilty Wednesday to threatening a state elected official.

Canter's letter was delivered to the state Capitol last month. State police say Canter is not linked to a package bomb found in the Capitol mail room on Dec. 28.

Grid coach's comments spur task force

BOULDER, Colo. — A top University of Colorado official said he will set up a task force to address alleged bias toward gays after a football coach called homosexuality an abomination.

"I'm deeply saddened about the feelings of intimidation, fear and distrust which seem to be swirling around this current controversy," Chancellor James Corbridge said. "We must do everything we can to replace such an environment with one that is open, supportive and welcoming of people."

Football coach Bill McCartney last week called homosexuality a "sin" and "an abomination of Almighty God."

Officials select site for regional airport

CHICAGO — Illinois officials agreed Thursday on a site for a new regional airport that could bring 200,000 jobs to the city's economically depressed Southeast Side and ease traffic at O'Hare International Airport.

The agreement between Illinois Gov. Jim Edgar and Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley should give the city straddling the Indiana-Illinois line near Lake Calumet the winning edge for the \$10.8 billion airport.

Indiana officials prefer a site in Gary, Ind., about 10 miles away. But Edgar and Daley between them control seven of the 11 votes on a two-state commission that will recommend the final site to the U.S. Transportation Department.

"This agreement marks the start of the economic revival of Chicago, Illinois and Indiana," said Daley, an early backer of the site.

Returns prove losing isn't all bad

WASHINGTON (AP) — In New Hampshire, winning is one thing but not the only thing.

Sometimes the loser can win the battle of perceptions — and it looks like Republican Patrick Buchanan is doing that this time around.

Challenger Buchanan, wearing a cat-who-swallowed-the-canary grin, on election night proclaimed: "The battle of New Hampshire is over and won."

You can tell he's a wordsmith. President Bush, wearing a long face throughout the primary election day, put out a statement that said, "I understand the message of dissatisfaction."

Perceptions can make winners of losers and losers of winners. After all, it was the winner who did what losers usually do and announced he was changing tactics. No more nice guy; he would take off the gloves.

"I've been in tough fights before," said Bush the morning after. "Roll up my sleeves and go after them. It's a new ball game...."

If Buchanan manages to pull symbolic victory from the jaws of numerical defeat, it won't be the first time that's happened in New Hampshire.

President Lyndon Johnson, lofly not campaigning, beat antiwar maverick Eugene McCarthy in New Hampshire in 1968, winning even as a write-in candidate.

No matter, McCarthy's strong and unanticipated showing was such a vote of non-confidence in Johnson's stewardship of the Vietnam war that LBJ a few weeks later chose not to seek re-election.

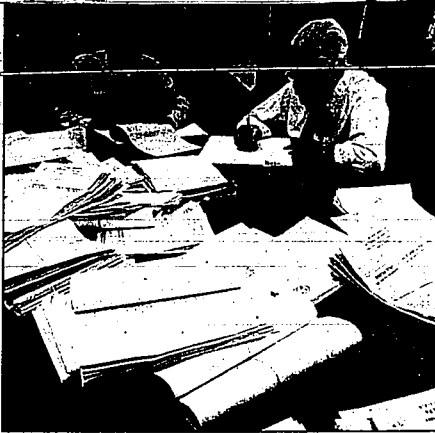
Four years later, Democratic Sen. Edmund Muskie beat George McGovern in the New Hampshire primary, 47-37 percent. The margin was so narrow that New Englander Muskie, the favorite son, found his victory hollow and was soon out of the running altogether.

This time, a few twists heightened the impression that Bush took a pasting. Exit polls exaggerated Buchanan's showing.

For a time on Tuesday, acting on wrong readings from the polls of voters, the White House staff was so narrow that New Englander Muskie, the favorite son, found his victory hollow and was soon out of the election.

After the polls closed but before the vote was counted, the exit polls gave the impression that Buchanan had won over 40 percent of the vote.

Only late Wednesday did the official result come in, showing

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Buchanan had polled 37 percent to Bush's 53 percent.

The war isn't a lot better than the 30-35 percent that the Bush people

Buchanan in advance. Buchanan beat expectations, but only by a whisker.

Bush won, but bloodily. More than four out of every 10 Republicans and independents in the Republican primary preferred someone else — or at least wanted to send Bush that "message of dissatisfaction."

Across the nation, Wednesday's headlines strengthened the perception that Bush had been "Bush Whacked!" as both the Boston Herald and the Plain Dealer of Cleveland put it.

Other headlines: "The Pittsburgh Post-Gazette: 'Buchanan Jolts Bush.'"

"The McAllen (Texas) Monitor: 'Buchanan Sneaks Up on Bush.'"

"The Fresno (Calif.) Bee: 'Buchanan Stuns President.'"

"The Daily Press of Newport News, Va.: 'Bush Takes Big Hit.'"

"The Chicago Sun-Times: 'Bush Staggered by a Solid Right.'"

And even at the scene of the fact, the Valley News of Lebanon, N.H.: "President Ambushed at the Polls."

Those headlines caught the nuances, but Rich Bond, the Republican national chairman, said the public didn't miss the news. "Everyone knows the Redskins won the Super Bowl three weeks ago, but nobody remembers the score," said Bond.

Three weeks from now, he hopes, people will remember who lost the Buffalo Bills and Patrick Buchanan.

Senate Demos will offset tax cuts with tax hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democrats reversed themselves Thursday and said they would pay for their developing tax-cut package not with defense slashes but by raising taxes elsewhere, perhaps on the wealthy.

The change announced after Senate Democrats met behind closed doors, removes what could have been a major difference with a House Democratic tax bill, which would boost taxes on the rich to finance a tax credit for most other Americans.

The senators' decision steers congressional Democrats onto a clear election-year collision course with President Bush, who has indicated he would veto any bill that raises tax rates.

House Democratic leaders, meanwhile, pleaded with their members for support when the legislation comes to a vote, probably next week. But they conceded that the measure could be changed beforehand in a search for votes.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, and Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, of the tax-writing Senate Finance Committee, announced their decision after a closed-door meeting of Senate Democrats.

"I stated ... any tax cuts that would be made would be balanced with tax increases, that we'd not look to the peace dividend, that we'd stay within the tax structure," said Bentsen.

Bentsen added that one of his priorities would

be "to retain tax fairness in the system" — a phrase Democrats often use for tax hikes on the wealthy accompanied by tax cuts for others.

He said another goal would be to encourage "productivity and competitiveness" — a catch phrase for tax breaks for business.

Asked if his bill would boost taxes on the rich, as the House Democrats' measure would, Bentsen said, "That's obviously one of the options."

He provided no further details.

He criticized that while Democrats have made no final decisions, the tax measure would probably be just a portion of a "comprehensive program."

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Heart disease deaths drop

ATLANTA (AP) — The death rate from heart disease, the nation's leading killer, has fallen more than 6 percent in just one year, federal health researchers reported Thursday.

Overall, the nation's death rate dropped 2.3 percent from 1988 to 1989, the latest statistics available, the national Center for Disease Control said.

The decline in heart disease mortality was a major reason: heart disease accounts for about a third of U.S. deaths. The death rate, from heart attack and heart failure, has been declining in the United States since the 1950s. But the 3.7 percent drop in one year came as a surprise.

"That's extraordinary, isn't it?" said Dr. Anthony DeMaria, past president of the American College of Cardiology and a professor of medicine at the University of Kentucky.

The death rate from stroke, which can be caused by the same factors as heart disease, also declined, by 5.7 percent in one year and 32.7 percent in a decade. Stroke is the third leading cause of death in the United States, behind cancer.

The death rate from cancer rose 0.2 percent from 1988 to 1989, and 1.7 percent for the decade.

The CDC report was based on reporting from death certificates; 2,150,466 deaths were reported nationwide in 1989, 733,867 from heart disease. Cancer killed 496,152, and stroke killed 145,551.

Israeli armored force pushes into south Lebanon

TYRE, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli troops and tanks breached U.N. barricades in south Lebanon Thursday, going after Shiite Muslim guerrillas who have been firing rockets into Israel.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said Israeli would keep up the attacks "until we quiet them."

The Israeli incursion, just north of its self-declared security zone, drew a sharp protest from U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali, who called for an immediate pullout. The Bush administration expressed "deep concern."

U.N. sources said it was the first time since 1985 that the Israelis had crossed the security zone and taken up positions. Before smashing the U.N. barricades with a bulldozer, the Israeli troops got in fistfights with the peacekeepers, a U.N. spokesman said.

Despite fears that escalating violence would derail the next round of peace negotiations, the State Department said all parties had indicated they would be on hand for talks beginning Monday in Washington.

Still, there was a threat the fighting could widen. Syria's military chief, Gen. Hekmat Sbeihat, said Thursday his country would help defend Lebanon against Israeli "trespassing."

In the Israeli thrust into the villages of Yater and Kafra, two Israeli soldiers and four Shiite guerrillas were killed; 33 people were wounded, including three Israeli soldiers. Four Fijian U.N. peacekeepers, five civilians and 21 Shiite guerrillas, security sources said.

The incursion involved 36 tanks and three armored personnel

carriers, and Israel said its aim was to find Katyusha rocket launchers and "terrorist nests." It said the operation was limited in scope and did not presage a larger incursion.

The action came after three days of attacks on northern Israel by Hezbollah guerrillas using Katyusha rockets, and those attacks continued Thursday.

Shamir said that if the rocket-fire continued, "We will certainly attack them (Hezbollah) ... and I hope that this will continue until we quiet them."

But two liberal Israeli lawmakers demanded an urgent session of Parliament's Defense and Foreign Affairs Committee to review the ground thrust into Lebanon.

By Thursday evening, the Israelis had withdrawn partially from Yater but still held the southern edge of the village.

They also held Kafra and a hill overlooking the entire terrain.

Hundreds of Shiite militiamen from the fundamentalist Hezbollah and its one-time Shiite rival, the secular pro-Syrian Amal movement,

jammed traffic on Lebanon's southbound coastal highway, heading for the battle front.

assault rifles, and some wore red-and-green headbands inscribed with the battle cry of "Allahu Akbar," or God is Great.

By nightfall some Hezbollah guerrillas were reported moving in by foot toward Yater, despite the heavy Israeli shelling of the area.

An Amal communiqué said its militiamen in Kafra had destroyed an Israeli Merkava tank with an armor-piercing rocket, but the claim could not be verified.

Yater and Kafra face the narrowest strip in the security zone, from which most of the 126 rockets fired since Monday were unleashed.

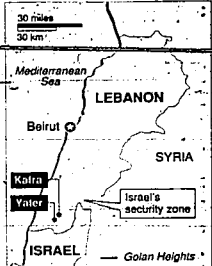
The latest round of fighting followed the killings of three Israeli soldiers at an Israeli army camp on Saturday and the assassination of Hezbollah leader Sheikh Abbas Musawi in south Lebanon on Sunday.

Shiite Muslim leaders have vowed to avenge Musawi's killing. His successor, Sheikh Hassan Nasrallah, on Thursday declared a "general mobilization and maximum alert" of all mujahedeen, or Islamic-holy warriors.

In Saddiqin, a Hezbollah stronghold three miles northwest of Yater, local gunmen tried to overrun a U.N. peacekeeping post. But U.N. troops fired over the gunmen's heads, driving them back.

"I'm very afraid," one U.N. peacekeeper, a Fijian, told an AP reporter from behind a sandbagged position.

"I want to go home. Too much boom-boom here. No good, no good."



U.N. spokesman Timur Goksel said two Fijian peacekeepers were wounded by gunfire as they were getting out of a vehicle, but it was not known who fired the shots.

"We don't at the moment know how or why they were shot, or what the circumstances were," Goksel said. Both peacekeepers were in serious condition, one shot in the stomach and the other in the chest, he said.

Two other Fijians were wounded at a checkpoint in Ullit, eight miles west of Kafra on the coastal highway. They were shot by gunmen, believed to be Hezbollah guerrillas, who refused to stop at the checkpoint, security sources said.

Only about 100 elderly inhabitants of Yater and Kafra remained in the villages. The rest fled to the pan-cities of Tyre and Sidon along with an estimated 8,000 inhabitants of 12 neighboring villages in the past three days.

White-only vote set on end to apartheid

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — President F.W. de Klerk stunned the nation Thursday by announcing a whites-only referendum on ending apartheid, and he promised to resign if defeated.

The move came a day after his ruling National Party lost its second special parliamentary election to the Conservative Party, which wants to reinstate apartheid and create a separate homeland for whites. The vote had been seen as a test of white support for political reforms that have been moving the country toward multiracial democracy.

New de Klerk will put the issue of apartheid to a whites-only vote. "If I lose that referendum, I will resign," clearing the way for a whites-only general election, de Klerk told Parliament.

"It's a question of honor," he said at a later news conference. De Klerk did not set a specific date for the referendum, but he indicated it could take place by the end of March.

His action was seen as an attempt to outmaneuver pro-apartheid forces while he still retains white support.

Polts say the is supported by a majority of whites. But the government's power base has been crumbling rapidly because of white unease over the rapid pace of political change and ending apartheid, the policy of racial separation in a country of 5 million whites and 30 million blacks.

If de Klerk were forced to step down, his departure would throw political reform into chaos. He has been the driving force in dismantling apartheid and negotiating a non-racial constitution to give the vote and other political rights to the black majority.

Black groups would resist any attempt to reverse reforms.

Market reforms draw Chinese like magnet

CANTON, China (AP) — They come by the hundreds of thousands from villages and towns hundreds of miles away and converge on the busy railway station, holding fast to tattered cloth bags and big dreams.

They are China's unemployed. More than 500,000 of them have come this year alone to search for work in this booming southern capital, turning streets into sewers and the railroad station into a tent city.

Tens of thousands more have descended on other cities.

Wanzhou, an eastern boomtown, has held a "crisis meeting" to cope with its 50,000 arrivals; the Liberation Daily said Wednesday. Shanghai receives almost 2,000 people a day.

These "mangliu" — or blind drifters — flock

annually to China's southern cities, searching for better jobs and wages.

The mass migration illustrates the growing gap between areas in China where market reforms have been allowed — such as in Canton — and others still reined in by central planning.

In Canton, the capital of Guangdong province, people wander for days without food or rest, searching for opportunities. "I came here looking for construction work because I know there's a lot of building to be done," said Han Dengji, a 34-year-old man of 30 who left food-starved Anhui province in central China.

"But I'll do anything for anyone so long as I can make money," Han said. "I haven't found anything yet, but I won't give up."

It's a story heard over and over in the city's rail

station, littered with rice boxes, orange peels and sugar cane sticks.

According to the official China Daily, Canton's railway station has absorbed roughly 250,000 people since earlier this month. But Western observers in Canton estimate the actual number is probably two or three times higher. The worst year in memory was 1989 when 2.5 million people came to Canton.

The migrants' heart of golden opportunities in textile, toy and other factories set up largely with capital from the British colony of Hong Kong, which borders Guangdong. "I heard from people that there are many jobs here and that wages are ten times higher," said a man who gave his last name as Lee. As he spoke, 15 fellow villagers from Sichuan province crowded around him.

Japan nixes 'comfort women' aid

TOKYO (AP) — Japan will not pay compensation to Korean women forced to serve as prostitutes for Japanese soldiers during World War II, the prime minister's office said Thursday.

Foreign Minister Michio Watanabe (old Parliament) on Wednesday said Japan is seeking other ways to apologize for the much-criticized practice, but did not intend to pay compensation.

The statements reaffirm Japan's position that the issue of war

reparations was settled in 1965 when Japan normalized relations with South Korea.

Documents discovered last month proved for the first time that the army was involved in forcing Korean and other Asian women into prostitution for Japanese troops during the war.

The practice had been common knowledge, but the government had previously claimed the brothels were run privately.

Political ends deprive junior colleges of educational means

The Legislature, after a breathtaking binge of spending on public schools and higher education, has once again turned on one of its favorite targets of opportunity in order to make ends meet.

Monday, the budget-writing Joint Finance Appropriations Committee cut the College of Southern Idaho's state appropriation by \$242,000.

It's part of a \$500,000 reduction in the amount of money the state spends on CSI and North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene - a 6 percent cut.

Can you imagine what would have happened if JFAC had lopped 6 percent off Boise State University's budget this year?

No such danger with CSI and North Idaho. The former's constituency extends no more than 50 miles in any direction from Twin Falls, and the latter's covers only Kootenai County.

Only two of the 24 members of JFAC are from Twin Falls, Jerome and Kootenai counties, the three counties that support junior colleges with property taxes. The outcry is limited; hence it's no-risk budget-cutting.

Except, of course, at CSI and NIC, which are trying to build academic programs - part of their mandate from the state.

The conventional wisdom in Boise is

that lawmakers needn't worry overmuch about the junior colleges, paid for by taxpayers in just three counties out of 44.

And, after all, they're just junior colleges.

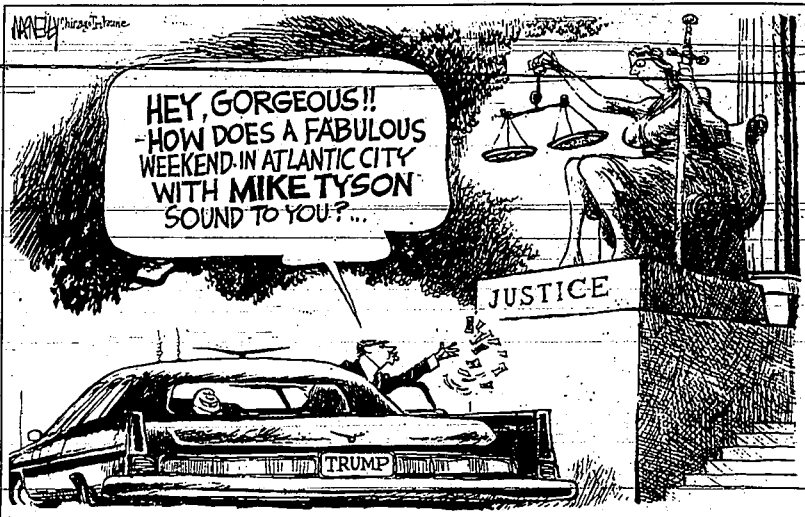
Never mind that property taxes account for only about half of the two schools' budgets, or that they educate Idaho's kids for a fraction of what it costs the state to teach someone at the three universities.

Never mind that CSI has the fastest-growing enrollment in the state, or that the JCS bring education to Idahoans who could not, for reasons of logistics or finances, attend one of the four-year universities.

Too often, CSI has been the victim of political geography, located in the middle of a Republican-dominated valley while a Democrat sat in the governor's office.

But this time, it was the GOP that put the junior colleges on the back burner in their furious game of budgetary one-upsmanship with Andrus.

Good politics. Lousy education. Don't the students of the Magic Valley and Kootenai County deserve as good an education as students who attend institutions that are politically untouchable?

Cries against inhumanity sound same everywhere

It was years ago on my first trip to New Orleans and on one of my first visits to the South.

It was a business trip, but I was determined to experience Bourbon Street and old Creole and let the sounds of a little jazz fill my soul.

One night I found me at the legendary Pat O'Brien's, where the drinks are famous and returning home with a monogrammed hurricane glass is a must.

It was packed and the only place with any air for breathing was outside, in a fenced-in, grassy area out back.

It was dark and music was playing and people were laughing and shouting, and whatever it was that had been refilled two or three times in my souvenir hurricane glass had me feeling no pain.

But sobriety came quickly as I noticed rows of little structures around the perimeter of the yard. They looked like cages with bars. Closer inspection showed they had been holding pens for slaves.

During a bitter and despicable chapter of U.S. history, people had strolled around this yard, maybe with drink in hand - and waited for human beings to be unceasing and sold to the highest bidder.

These involuntary U.S. immigrants were placed on the auction block solely because of the color of their skin.

Pat O'Brien's wasn't fun anymore. I left and left my souvenir glass behind, but the voices of the betrayed and abused left with me.

Now, they are always there, reminding me of the cruelty that is a recurring theme in the history of this nation.

Tuesday night, the voices were loud as I walked through an exhibit at the Wing Luke Museum in Seattle entitled "Executive Order 9066: Fifty Years Before and Fifty Years After," a history of Japanese Americans in Seattle.

The exhibit - which runs through July - chronicles the lives of thousands of innocent Japanese Americans who were uprooted and placed in concentration camps because the United States was at war with Japan.

On Feb. 19, 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the order that forced more than 110,000 Japanese Americans living on the West Coast - as many as two-thirds born in the United States - to lose their homes, farms, businesses and freedom just because of their ancestry.

The indignity of internment is graphically depicted in the recreation of a barracks like the ones in the Minidoka Internment Camp near Hunt, Idaho, where most Japanese Americans from Seattle were sent.

The stark lack of privacy and space are painful to look at. Equally painful were the hysteria and hatred that was rampant across the nation.

A life magazine told "How to Tell Japs from Chinese, How to Tell Your Friends From the Japs." The Seattle Times ran a

syndicated column by Henry McElmore that said "this is war, stop worrying about hurting lap feelings."

Washington Attorney General Smith Troy noted "we feel we know the Germans and the Italians a lot better ..." and "the first problem is get the Japanese out of here ..."

The Japanese were first "gotten to" Camp Harmony, the livestock pens in Puyallup where the annual Western Washington State Fair is held.

Even in 1992, there are families of Japanese ancestry living in this area who refuse to attend that fair. It is because the voices of the past are too loud.

Those voices speak not only to internment, but to the racism that preceded it. They speak to not being able to own land or live in certain areas or become naturalized citizens, or attend certain schools.

They speak of having to sit in theater balconies, being denied admittance to public buildings and being paid less than their white counterparts for doing the same job. They speak of being hated and despised in what was often the land of their birth, because someone saw difference as reason to discriminate.

The voices sounded so similar to the ones I heard on that hot night in New Orleans. I realized it was not only the sound of African Americans I had heard.

The same voices were probably heard where Native Americans and Mexicans lost their lands and their lives and where Jews were murdered in Eastern Europe and innocents were slaughtered in Cambodia and Argentina.

It is that same universal chorus crying out against injustice and inhumanity and pointing to similarities in the callous disregard for human rights that exists whenever governments are allowed to run wild and when the governed forget that as long as one person is not free, no one is free.

Would-be U.S. parents flock to Russia, find adoption hurdles

MOSCOW (AP) — Lynn Weterberg came to Russia hoping to adopt a child, but she was disappointed. But the Chicago accountant quickly discovered Russians want to give up only children nobody else will take.

"At the adoption center, they told me there may be a problem because my son is healthy," Weterberg said angrily. "And they said that healthy children are not allowed to be adopted by foreigners no matter what age."

More Americans who are fed up with waiting years to adopt an American baby and who want to rescue a child from what they perceive as a lifetime of economic misery are flocking to Russia.

A U.S. Embassy consular official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said 35 visas were processed all of last year for Soviet orphans, while 26 already had been processed in the first seven weeks of 1992.

But like Weterberg, who adopted a daughter from Romania last year, many find the process far from easy. Many also learn that only children Russians don't want — those who are either mentally or physically handicapped or non-white — are available to foreigners.

The stigma of adopting a disabled or non-white child is the greatest in Russia, such children usually spend their entire childhoods in institutions.

"When I went in to the adoption center, the first woman told me there was no way I could adopt a healthy child, period," Weterberg said.

She said later she was offered a healthy black baby. The majority of black children in orphanages are born to African fathers and Russian mothers who give them up because of the stigma.

Weterberg eventually found a healthy 7-year-old white boy. She thinks the adoption is going through because of the boy's age.

Two men in line to give away children that wouldn't fit in with Russian families, children whose names are missing some fingers for missing a hand or something," said Alla Zuyeva, on the Committee for the Social Protection of Childhood in the Russian Education Ministry.

Zuyeva said Russia has no agency to deal specifically with foreign adoptions, and her committee fears people from overseas may start arriving in droves.

"We are very worried that we might be facing the Romanian situation here because we have no good controls right now," she said.

After the fall of Romania's Communist dictatorship, Westerners flooded into that country seeking to adopt orphans. A black market in baby selling sprang up, leading the government to suspend adoptions by foreigners while stricter rules were enacted.

Eight U.S. agencies that charge high fees to arrange adoptions are now operating in Russia, according to the newspaper Komsomolskaya Pravda.

"A Soviet baby on the Western or American market costs from \$10,000 to \$50,000 on up," the newspaper said Tuesday. "But the children must be healthy with a twinkle in their eyes and be less than a year old."

Phil Edelen, who also adopted a child last year in Romania, came this month to take two new daughters home to Park City, Utah. He avoided the American adoption agencies.

"All the agencies care about is money," he said. Edelen said he decided to adopt a Russian after reading about the deteriorating economy and lack of food. He said he was thrilled with his baby girls, both of whom are mildly handicapped.

"My mission from God is that if we don't help the children, we don't have a future. I'd adopt everyone here if I could," he said.

Pope offers help to Muslims

ZIGUINCHOR, Senegal (AP) — Pope John Paul II offered friendship to Muslim leaders Thursday on the second leg of a pilgrimage aimed at strengthening Roman Catholic relations with the Islamic world.

He promised his church's help in improving relations between Muslims in this West African country and the small Catholic minority.

This region near Senegal's southern border with Guinea Bissau has been torn by separatist violence fed partly by religious differences. But security appeared light except for camouflaged paratroopers patrolling the airport.

"It's a memorable day," a Muslim cleric, Alioune Aidara, told the pope. "This is part of a tradition of harmony and peace between the Senegalese people."

The pope, who is visiting three predominantly Muslim nations in West Africa during a week-long tour, has often expressed alarm at the rise of religious fundamentalism in the world and its potential for violence.

Ancient conflicts between Islam and Christianity in Africa have led to armed conflict in several nations.

The pope arrived after meeting in Dakar with President Abdou Diouf, a Muslim who is married to a Catholic.

Thousands of Senegalese stood six deep along sunbaked dirt roads to greet John Paul as he drove into town past thatched huts and shacks with corrugated roofs.

He met with Muslim leaders at a Catholic cathedral shaded by coconut palms.

"On this dear continent as in other areas of the world, bloody conflicts have caused immense suffering," the pope said. "Shouldn't African wisdom provide an example and teach that parties in conflict must meet, talk and reconcile their differences?"

Among those at the cathedral was the Rev. Augustin Diamacoune Senghor, a Catholic priest and top leader of the separatist Casamance movement, which is a predominantly Christian group that also includes some Muslims.

Senghor spent five years in prison for subversive activities but was freed last year under a general amnesty and cease-fire agreement that ended several years of fighting between the government and Casamance.

Armenia, Azerbaijan say talks needed

MOSCOW (AP) — The foreign ministers of feuding Armenia and Azerbaijan agreed Thursday on the need for a cease-fire to halt their bloody ethnic conflict in the mountainous enclave of Nagorno-Karabakh.

The seven hours of talks, which were mediated by Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev, marked the first high-level effort to end the fighting since Russia and

Kazakhstan attempted to broker a peace settlement in September.

Armenia's foreign minister, Rafi Ovamsyan; his Azerbaijan counterpart, Gussein Sadykhov; and Kozyrev agreed to seek negotiations to assure that a cease-fire could be observed.

In a four-point communique issued after the talks, the three parties also agreed to consider the possibility of United Na-

tions peacekeeping forces being invited to the region to help resolve the conflict.

Fighting began four years ago for control over Nagorno-Karabakh, an area populated mainly by Armenians but located inside the borders of Azerbaijan which has controlled it since 1923. More than 1,000 people have died in the bloodiest ethnic dispute in the former Soviet Union.

HIV-infected Haitians seeking political asylum pose dilemma

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration is trying to decide what to do about at least 250 Haitian refugees who may be eligible for political asylum but who also have tested positive for the AIDS virus, officials say.

Immigration officials have granted the refugees preliminary asylum, meaning they have convinced immigration authorities they may be persecuted if they are returned to their homeland.

Left unanswered, however, is whether the Haitians will be allowed

to pursue their asylum claims in the United States or at the U.S. naval base in Guantanamo.

American-born State Department spokesman Margaret Tutwiler confirmed without comment Thursday that no decision had been made on the disposition of the HIV-infected Haitians.

Another official said the issue has been a divisive one. "There's been a tremendous debate," the official said.

Normally, aliens found to be infected with the HIV virus are not allowed to emigrate to the United

States; but officials said the law permits exceptions.

The refugees are among more than 4,900 Haitians who will not be repatriated to Haiti because they may face persecution by Haiti's four-month-old military-dominated regime.

With the exception of the infected Haitians, all are being allowed to pursue their asylum claims in the United States.

Over the past several weeks, a steady stream of these Haitians has been flown to Florida.

Banana, latex allergies may cause post-surgical shock

LONDON (AP) — Scientists say people who are allergic to bananas or latex products including condoms may be predisposed to suffer rare reactions following surgery.

That points to the presence of a common substance—possibly a protein, in latex and some types of fruit, the researchers said.

Doctors have long suspected that the use of latex gloves during surgery sets off severe post-surgical allergic reactions in some patients. But it has been difficult to identify those patients at risk prior to surgery.

The recent reports suggest patients with known allergies to bananas or condoms may be most likely to suffer from rubber-glove

allergies, said Dr. Jans Ceuppens, an investigator in the Department of Medicine and Dermatology at Catholic University of Leuven, Belgium.

The allergies can trigger anaphylactic shock, in which breathing tubes swell and block air flow, the researchers said.

The findings are reported in two letters in the Feb. 22 issue of the Lancet, a British medical journal.

In one letter, Ceuppens cited the case of a 50-year-old nurse who developed allergic reactions at different times after wearing rubber gloves, having sex or eating bananas, and a 12-year-old boy who had an allergic attack after eating a banana and a swollen lip after blowing up a rubber balloon.

U.N. chief: Send forces to Cambodia

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali Thursday recommended the Security Council send thousands of peacekeepers to Cambodia, which is emerging from a dozen years of war.

A Security Council source said, on condition of anonymity, that the council would probably discuss Cambodia sometime next week.

The body rarely rejects recommendations made by the secretary-general.

Earlier this week, Khieu Samphan, president of the Khmer Rouge, and a member of the reconciliation body guiding Cambodia toward elections, called for speedy deployment of U.N. peacekeepers to prevent the collapse of Cambodia's peace pact.

Abortion case heads to Ireland's top court

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — The family of a 14-year-old girl who has been forbidden to seek an abortion in Britain plans to appeal to the Supreme Court, Prime Minister Albert Reynolds said Thursday.

Reynolds said he hoped the decision could help avoid a repetition of a divisive 1983 referendum that put an anti-abortion clause in the Constitution.

"I have asked the attorney general's office and indeed independent outside advisers to look at various aspects of

this as soon as possible to find a resolution without going to a referendum," Reynolds said in an interview with RTE television.

Opposition parties called Wednesday for a new constitutional referendum on abortion.

It was not known when the Supreme Court would hear arguments.

The girl says she became pregnant after being raped in December by the father of a friend, after more than a year of sexual abuse by the man.

Irish rock star Sinead O'Connor called for a referendum after meeting with Reynolds.

"It was the people made the law and the people of Ireland who boxed themselves into a corner."

"They must change it themselves," Ms. O'Connor said.

"There is nothing on the constitution that says an Irish woman may not travel to England to have an abortion," added the singer, who has said she had two abortions.

2-day smog alert prompts fan plan

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Officials who extended a smog alert into Thursday were hoping factory slowdowns, limits on driving and other emergency measures would help clear the capital of a gray haze this

enough to make it safe for people sick. Pollution soared Wednesday to near-record levels over one of the world's most polluted cities, generating new debate over a bold idea: perch 100 huge fans on the mountains around the capital to blow the stuff away. City officials have approved the proposal for study.

But Armando Baez, of the Science Institute of the National Autonomous University of Mexico, said it would only turn the city into a pollution exporter, the news agency Notimex reported.

City officials called the smog alert Tuesday after stagnant air over the Valley of Mexico allowed pollution to build to dangerous levels.

Emergency measures were imposed Wednesday and the alert was extended until Thursday afternoon. Windy winds were expected to bring relief to city of 16 million.

The city's air pollution control commission ordered about 5,000 factories to cut production by 30 percent Wednesday, asphalt plants were closed and half the government's cars were banned from the streets.

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West Minister will serve 3 months

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — A former Richland minister and convicted wife-killer will serve three months in an Illinois jail for skipping parole, but will not be charged in the death of a Massachusetts woman he once lived with, officials said.

Ed Lopes, 56, told the Illinois Prisoner Review Board this week he hopes to eventually return to Washington state to be minister for a group that broke away from his former congregation at West Richland Baptist Church.

Lopes told board members that leaving Illinois without permission after he was paroled in 1983 was an honest mistake. He had served nearly 12 years for murdering his wife and trying to kill a girlfriend.

But the three-member panel didn't buy the minister's explanation, board chairman James Williams said Wednesday.

Lopes has been taken to a Menard Correction Center in Chester, Ill., to serve three months as punishment, the Tri-City Herald reported.

Lopes took into consideration that he didn't try to hide his identity in all these years, but the fact is, he absconded after being fully informed of his responsibilities while on parole, Williams said from his office in Springfield, Ill.

In a separate decision, deputy district attorney Joe Gaughan in Plymouth County, Mass., said Lopes will not be charged in the death of Helen Hanson of Brockton, Mass. Massachusetts officials reopened an investigation into Hanson's death after Lopes told the Herald he beat a woman to death in Brockton in the 1960s and fled.

Lopes has said he will not talk to Brockton authorities about the death of Hanson, with whom he had a daughter. Without his confession, Gaughan said Brockton has no case.

Lopes, a Plymouth, Mass., native, had passed himself off in the Tri-Cities as a reformed Mafia hit man.

Utah smoking ban receives initial approval

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Smoking lounges in the Utah Capitol and other state government buildings will close their doors under legislation passed by the House Thursday.

Sponsor Evan Olsen said he decided to push for a smoking ban after Idaho's statehouse sustained \$4 million damage in a New Year's Day fire blamed on a hot cigarette but lit inside a state's legislative building. "I saw the smoke coming out of Idaho's capitol, and I thought it was Utah's they look so much alike," said Olsen, a Young Ward Republican.

He said a ban on smoking in government buildings would bring Utah into line with states like Idaho, Colorado and North Dakota, among others, as well as local government buildings, schools, hospitals and many jails.

But smokers and non-smokers alike in the House balked at the bill. "I'm not one of those people here, and I'm not proud of it," said Democrat Arlo James of Kearns. "But we do not have to pass a law. The governor can (ban smoking) by executive order."

Olsen said Gov. Norm Bangert said he would sign the bill. Rep. Ray Short, R-Salt Lake, said he emigrated from England to embrace American liberties.

"I've never smoked a cigarette and I never will," he said. "Smoking is dumb, but I'll defend the right of someone to smoke."

The vote was 47 to 23. The bill now goes to the Senate.

Supremacist to run for office in Idaho

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A spokesman for the white supremacist Aryan Nations said he will return to northern Idaho from Tennessee and will run for public office in Kootenai County.

Floyd Cochran said Wednesday he hopes to return to the group's Hayden Lake compound by late March and possibly seek a school board post.

"Granted, I'm not your basic Republican or Democrat, so my hope is to run on the 'Aryan Nations' ticket," Cochran told The Spokesman-Review and Spokane Chronicle newspapers in a phone interview from Murfreesboro, Tenn.

Cochran, 36, said he is spending the winter at a 20-acre site near Murfreesboro known as "Aryan Nations-South."

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Rupert auto service shop appeals taxes

RUPERT — The owner of an automotive service agency in Rupert is asking the state to reduce his property taxes.

Buckley, part owner of Finish Line, a lube and car wash business in Rupert, is seeking a reduction in his Minidoka County assessment during 1990 and 1991.

Buckley's appeal was heard before Lowell Daniel, a member of the State Board of Tax Appeals, this week. The proceedings will next be reviewed by the total State Board of Tax Appeals and a decision handed down in 10 to 12 weeks.

Buckley said that Finish Line has been wrongly assessed in comparison with his competition. Finish Line had been assessed at \$103,000. "I'm not asking for favoritism," Buckley said. "All we are trying to do is stay in business and stay competitive."

Former County Assessor Launy Hansen assessed the new business based on the construction costs received from Buckley's partner, Dean Condie.

"It is our opinion that no real assessment took place," Buckley said. "The information was given in the hopes of re-assessment, to use that information for tax uniformity, not a stick to beat us with."

"The state Tax Code allows property assessment to be based upon one of three things — market value, income and expenses or market replacement value. Buckley would prefer the assessment be based on the income approach, which would help him compete in his business."

But Scott Erwin, district supervisor for the state Tax Commission, said he had to assess Buckley's business differently.

Erwin said that in comparing the properties an assessor looks not at the business housed within, but examines the property, its location, condition and age. "It is the assessor's job to assess property, not business or management," Erwin said.

"While Buckley's business is new, his competition is housed in buildings constructed in the 1940's, and all show physical depreciation, some obsolescence and have inferior locations," Erwin said.

"Because of a lack of like businesses to compare Finish Line to, an evaluation based on market value was used, according to Erwin. Minidoka County Assessor Max Vaughn showed records of other new commercial construction of the county being assessed in a similar manner."

Because of few sales in commercial properties, it is impossible to use a replacement evaluation. A lack of information from other property owners also makes it difficult to assess on an income and expense basis alone. Erwin said that similar practices are being assessed across the state," Erwin said. "You make an assessment on the information that is most reliable."

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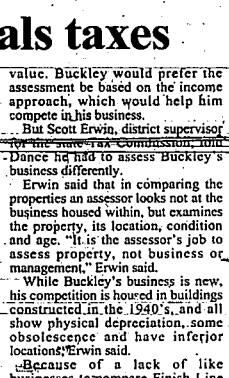

Rupert finances in good shape

"We feel that the city is in a good financial position," said auditor Dean Copley. "You were well under the amount that you had to spend, and everyone stayed well within their budgets." Copley suggested closely watching the water and irrigation water department because it is not generating enough cash, while expenditures have been high. "Perhaps there is a need to increase the fees. It has been two years in a row that there was a deficit." The council raised the irrigation water fees last fall. Part of the problem may be due to replacement of some wooden water lines by the city, said Councilman Dwinelle Allred. Copley further cautioned the council that their surplus carry over is almost half of what they had estimated. "If you are under budget again this year, you should be fine," Copley said. The council approved payment of \$10,500 for Copley's audit fee. In other business, Misy Turner, head life guard for the city's swimming pool, approached the council about a pay raise for

lifeguards. "The pool employees are some of the highest trained and the lowest paid," Turner said. The mayor and council asked Turner to submit the request and information she had collected through the head of the Recreation Department Les Hutchinson and Public Works Director Don Dustin. Turner said a request for wage increases had been turned down for the past two years and that was why she had decided to approach the council directly. Allred assured Turner that the council would review the request, but needed it to come through the proper channels. The council approved changing the reimbursement fees for use of the pool for city business to be concurrent with state mileage payments. Ordinance 708, pertaining to the unified building codes, was read for the third time and passed by the council. The council and mayor had received comment on the codes by one resident, The Planning and Zoning Board will hold a public hearing on the codes in March. A tort claim, filed by Annette Ingkraf for \$21 on a car accident involving a city vehicle driven by Dave Cantrell on February 3, was denied and turned over to the city's insurance company.

Conservationists seek amended forest plan

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) - Conservation groups asked the U.S. Forest Service Thursday to reopen a 10-year plan for managing northern Idaho forest so its timber cutting levels could be reduced. In a telephonic "oral hearing," representatives of the Sierra Club and Inland Empire Public Lands Council asked associate Forest Service Chief George Leonard to reopen the management plan for the 2.5 million-acre Panhandle National Forest. Leonard will rule on the request within 60 days, a spokeswoman said from his Washington, D.C., office.

The request stems from 24 unresolved issues in an appeal of the plan in 1988. "The Forest Service is killing the patient. The malpractice of the federal officials knowingly overcutting the Idaho Panhandle National Forest is criminal," Lands Council president John Osborn, a Spokane, Wash., physician, said in a press release. The conservationists asked for a significant drop in the annual timber harvest on the forest, as well as a moratorium on logging in the

North Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River until the Forest Service studies the cumulative effects of logging in the drainage, Osborn said. The groups are seeking similar actions in mixed ownership lands, especially those owned by Plum Creek Timber Co., Osborn said. The conservationists contend timber sale targets set by the Forest Service headquarters in Washington are politically driven and well above what employees in ranger districts recommend. The Forest Service sales quota

for the Panhandle forest is about 250 million board feet a year, although slightly more than 200 million board feet are actually cut. To back their claim, the conservationists submitted an November 1991 letter from former Panhandle Forest Supervisor William E. Morden to his superiors, recommending annual cuts of 150 million to 170 million board feet a year.

Education board OKs 'guidelines' for increases in nonresident tuition

BOISE (AP) - The state Board of Education has agreed to 25-percent increases over each of the next two years as a "guideline" for how much nonresident tuition should be raised at Idaho colleges and universities. But some board members said even the cumulative 56-percent hike that would result would not be enough to stem the tide of out-of-state students taking advantage of Idaho's bargain-basement higher education system. Others questioned how figures for the proposed increases were reached and whether the board was trying to raise revenue or ease a worsening enrollment crunch. "I think we're flying blind right now in terms of this raise," board member Roy Mosman of Moscow said at Thursday's meeting. "I don't know why it's 25 percent or even what we want to accomplish." The board also put off until Friday a decision on whether, and at what level, to cap enrollment of nonresident students who pay reduced tuition through an exchange program some contend has grown out of control in recent years. Nonresident enrollment at Idaho's four-year schools has grown twice as fast as in-state enrollment in the past decade, and recent tuition hikes in surrounding states promise to make the situation even worse, said Rayburn Barton, executive director of the Board of Education. "Because of increases in our neighboring states, we are having an

influx of students and we need to bring that back into line," he said. The proposed nonresident tuition hikes will be discussed at public hearings on each of the college and university campuses. The board will act on recommendations from each institution at its April meeting in Pocatello. Under the proposal, nonresident tuition would increase to \$3,138 a year next fall at the University of Idaho. The fall 1993 increase would push nonresident tuition at the Moscow school to \$3,765. Boise State University's nonresident tuition would jump to \$2,750 a year next fall and \$3,440 in 1993; Idaho State University's to \$2,630 next fall and \$3,310 in 1993; and Lewis-Clark State College's to \$2,546 next fall and \$3,182 in 1993. Nonresident students at all four schools would still be required to pay student fees, the same as Idaho residents. They currently are \$1,236 a year at the University of Idaho and Boise State, \$1,210 at Idaho State and \$1,198 at Lewis-Clark. The average nonresident tuition at four Oregon colleges and universities used as examples by the Board of Education is \$3,941, at three Utah schools \$3,038, at three Washington schools \$4,046 and at three Montana schools \$2,451. Additional student fees at the Montana schools average \$1,499. But Mosman said, beyond the fact that similar increases have been adopted in other states, he saw no reason for 25-percent hikes if the

resulting nonresident tuition would still be among the lowest in the West. "Twenty-five percent is still low way low," he said. "If we need to do better, let's do it." Board member Keith Hinkley of Blackfoot agreed, but Lewis-Clark President Lee Vickers said even a 25-percent increase would cost the state some nonresident students. Mosman said he could not support any increase that did not include a "grandfather" clause exempting nonresident students already enrolled at lower tuition levels from the hikes. "To me, that's just fundamental fairness," he said. Mosman and board member Diane Bilyeu of Pocatello also opposed a proposal to cap admission of nonresident students to Idaho colleges and universities under the Western Undergraduate Exchange program. Almost 1,100 students from outside Idaho now are enrolled at the state's four-year schools through the program - up 68 percent from the fall of 1990 - while only 437 Idahoans attend institutions in other states. University officials, under pressure from legislators for seeking more money to keep up with their growing student populations, proposed capping the program's enrollment at 900 starting with the fall semester in 1993. Hinkley, Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans and board member Karl Shunliff of Boise pushed for a cap of 600 starting this fall.

Board members plan strong fight against 1% plan

BOISE (AP) - The state Board of Education has decided its proper role in the debate over the One Percent Initiative is educating the public on the impact limiting property tax collections will have on education. The decision came Thursday after board members reviewed a staff report summarizing how public schools and higher education institutions would be affected by the proposed ballot measure. The report also included a survey of a Boise State University survey from last fall that found almost half the people interviewed had no opinion or had never heard of the One Percent Initiative. "If it's really true that 57 percent of the people in this state have no opinion or have never heard of the initiative, then we're in deep trouble and we ought to do something very specific about it," said board member Roy Mosman of Moscow. On his recommendation, the board did limit collecting university officials to collect and distribute information on how they and local school districts throughout Idaho would be affected if property taxes were capped at 1 percent of actual market value. Former state senator Rachel Gilbert of Boise backing the initiative, said any information distributed by state education officials was sure to be slanted against the measure.

The measure goes to the Senate. The subsidy is a 4-cent per gallon cut in the state fuel tax — is scheduled to expire at the end of April. Several House members said it should, so the state can collect more fuel tax for highway work.

Sponsors of the legislation, led by Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, said if the tax break is dropped, it will translate into higher pump prices for any gasoline-ethanol mix, without encouragement for Idaho production, gasoline might not be available in the state.

State may try to block bank opening

BOISE (AP) — State Finance Department attorneys on Thursday continued putting together their case against an Oregon-based bank setting up shop in Idaho. Finance Director Belton Patty contended the new U.S. Bancorp branch in Coeur d'Alene violates state and federal laws. "They pretend they're not doing so, but they are," he said. "Anders' Glitvedt, corporate development spokesman for U.S. Bancorp in Portland, Ore., said the bank believes it is operating within the law. U.S. Bank of Idaho, the U.S. Bancorp subsidiary with \$1.9 billion in assets, has temporary headquarters

in Coeur d'Alene, and President Gary Schmitt said the bank will apply soon for permanent headquarters in that city. State law permits bankholding companies from other states to move here only by buying or merging with existing Idaho banks or thrifts. But the Comptroller of the Currency rejected Patty's objection to U.S. Bancorp's plan, announced in 1990, to relocate a small Spokane, Wash., subsidiary called First National Bank to Coeur d'Alene. U.S. Bancorp has maintained that as a federally chartered bank it doesn't need Idaho's permission to establish operations here. Also, it

contends federal law permits banks to move within a 30-mile radius, which would allow the move from Spokane to Coeur d'Alene. The Idaho Bankers Association has filed objections with federal regulators in support of the Department of Finance. "If they want in they should buy their way in," said Dan Nelson, chairman and chief executive officer of West One Bancorp, the largest Idaho-based bank holding company. An attempt to get into Boise. Glitvedt acknowledged that U.S. Bancorp is looking at all of Idaho for future expansion.

Speeders can pay to keep clean record

POST FALLS (AP) — The administrator of Idaho courts is trying to stop Post Falls from allowing speeders to keep their driving records clean by avoiding fines and instead paying a more expensive bond. "This smacks of cash-register justice," Carl F. Bianchi said from his Boise office Wednesday. Hundreds of drivers caught speeding in Post Falls have opted to pay a \$60 bond forfeiture offered by City Attorney Rollie Watson in exchange for a clean record. The Spokesman-Review and Spokane Chronicle newspapers reported in a copyright story Thursday. Speeders normally pay a \$43 fine.

State law allows the northern Idaho town to receive 90 percent of the bond forfeitures for traffic violations, excluding drunken driving. When fines are levied, cities receive less than half of the money, splitting the total with courts, counties and the state. Post Falls Police Chief Cliff Hayes credits the bond forfeitures for boosting city revenue from fines and fees last year. The increase occurred although traffic citations fell from about 2,100 to 1,800 from 1990 to last year. Bianchi has urged 1st District Court magistrates to reject attempts by Post Falls to allow bond forfeitures. But Magistrate John Luster said Post Falls isn't doing anything illegal. "I won't go as far as saying I'm totally comfortable with what they're doing, though," he said.

Bianchi testified on the issue Wednesday before the Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee. He said the law should be changed so proceeds of the bonds are distributed as though there were convictions.

Bill would increase taxes on cigarettes

BOISE (AP) — A House committee has approved printing and introduction of a bill aimed at boosting the state cigarette tax to increase funding for cancer research. The bill addressed Thursday by the House Revenue and Taxation Committee would raise the 18-cent-per-package cigarette tax to 26 cents. For a two-pack-a-day smoker, the increase would cost \$1.12 a week or \$58.24 per year. The bill's sponsor, Rep. Con

Mahoney, R-Idaho Falls, estimated the increase would raise \$6 million a year to expand the Boron Neutron Capture Therapy cancer research programs at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The legislation says it is state policy to encourage the "growth, development and expansion" of technology which holds the promise of new jobs in Idaho. INEL operates the world's largest boron neutron capture therapy

research programs in the world. Boron neutron capture therapy uses nuclear reactors to treat certain types of brain cancer. "The BNCT cancer research program at INEL is beginning to show that BNCT has considerable promise as an effective treatment for deep-seated brain cancers," the bill says. After deductions for administrative costs, the bill provides for grants for related cancer research.

Baby's drug death sends mom to prison

BOISE (AP) — A prison sentence of at least three years is not unreasonable for a young Canyon County mother convicted of killing her baby by giving him a "gigantic" amount of cocaine, an Idaho appeals court says. The appeals court Thursday unanimously upheld the prison sentence of three to six years ordered for Maria Reyes for felony injury to a child in a Canyon County case. The woman's nine-week-old son died in April. The death first was diagnosed as sudden infant death syndrome, SIDS, but after an autopsy disclosed a large amount of cocaine in the baby, Reyes was charged.

But court records said blood tests showed "almost a gigantic amount of cocaine" in the baby and witnesses identified Reyes as a regular user of the drug. Court records said the woman, age 23 at the time, had four other children ranging in age from 9 to 5. In a decision written by Judge Cathy Silak, the Court of Appeals rejected the woman's claim that she did not know how the baby died. "The trial judge stated that he found it extremely hard to believe that Reyes had no knowledge of how the cocaine got into the infant's body. In light of the evidence of the record, the trial judge's incredulity was justified," the court said.

Californian brightens 'Dark of the Moon'

CSI production gains from New York break

TWIN FALLS - With her Screen Actor's Guild card in hand, Kimberly Schoenauer is taking a break from her fast-paced life in New York to light up the Twin Falls stage in "Dark of the Moon."

Schoenauer will play Conjur Woman in next week's College of Southern Idaho production. The play, written by Howard Richardson and William Berney, is based on the legendary tale of a "witchboy" who falls in love with a young girl in rural America.

Schoenauer has the credentials to bring Conjur Woman to life.

"I began my acting career in a play called 'Exit Stage Right' in Santa Rosa," said the 33-year-old California native: "Six years ago, I got a Pepsi commercial in which I played a waitress at a spring wedding." In between, Schoenauer studied at H.B. Studio in New York, acted in Off-Off Broadway plays and settled into a Manhattan apartment with her two cats.

Schoenauer is in Twin Falls to take a break from the "difficult, lonely and very expensive" New York lifestyle, though she believes everyone should visit the city at least once. "Going out for coffee with friends is the big actor thing to do in New York," she said, "because most of us can't afford a whole dinner."

In Twin Falls, Schoenauer has begun working on a teaching degree. She plans to complete her education in New York toward the end of her four-year plan. "Someday, I'd like to combine teaching and acting," she said.

Her father, Lloyd Schoenauer, came to Twin Falls from California, and her mother, Jo Montelli, also retired here. Her sister, Karen Schoenauer, moved to Twin Falls, too, shortly after experiencing her own taste of life on the movie set. "Karen was a makeup artist in Hollywood," Schoenauer said, "and I'm going to get her to help me with my makeup for this play."

A sizable task: Schoenauer is playing the part of a tough old mountain woman. She will have to change not only her face, but also her voice. "My natural voice is this little girl voice, so there's always a chance I could slip back into it," she said, "but once I'm in character, I'm usually OK."

"Dark of the Moon," which has had several runs on Broadway, tells the tale of the popular mountaineer ballad: "Barbara Allen." John (the witchboy) wants to forsake the mountain heights and become a human being because he is smitten by Barbara. Conjur Woman effects the desired change, but with a string attached. The fair Barbara, whose congeniality is something of a scandal in the Big Smoky Mountains, must remain faithful for a year.

The story evolves through scenes of laughter, pathos and drama as John struggles bravely, Barbara bears him a witch child and a fearful community forces Barbara into infidelity so the witchboy may be returned to the mountains.

Schoenauer is learning a lot about the Smoky Mountains, but she's also learning a lot about the Magic Valley. She characterizes Twin Falls as light years away

'Boyz N the Hood' director carves out 2 roles in Oscar history

LOS ANGELES (AP) — John Singleton's senior project at the University of Southern California has earned him a spot in Oscar history.

The 24-year-old Singleton became the youngest filmmaker and the first black ever to be nominated for a directing Oscar for "Boyz n the Hood," the coming-of-age story set in a gang-ridden section of Los Angeles.

Singleton also was nominated for best original screenplay for his first film, which he wrote as his final 1990 project — at USC's undergraduate Filmic Writing Program.

The nominations at such a tender age put Singleton in the same company of one of Hollywood's most renowned wunderkids, Orson Welles, who was 26 when he directed "Citizen Kane."

The best director nomination also gives Singleton the kind of Hollywood recognition that has proved elusive to black directors, from Oscar Micheaux and Emmett J. Scott of the 1920s and 1930s to the highly touted new wave led by Singleton, Robert Townsend, Warrington Hudlin and Spike Lee.

"It's great just to be recognized by people I look up to," said the soft-spoken Singleton after he watched the nomination ceremony on television from his Las Vegas hotel room. "I think it's great for me. It's a great start for what I think is going to be a really long career."

"John stands as a superb model to other young people — especially African-Americans, Hispanics and women who have been traditionally excluded from this industry — because he's done it," Daley said.

Made on a shoestring budget of less than \$8 million, "Boyz n the Hood" follows three young men as they struggle through neighborhoods of broken homes and gang violence. The film stars Cuba Gooding Jr., Larry Fishburne and rapper Ice Cube.

Mark Canton, chairman of the film's producer, Columbia Pictures, said studio officials were "elated" by the nominations, noting it was "far more impressive" because he is the first black director to be nominated.

"As for Singleton, the milestones don't put any more pressure on him," he said. "What I do ... is in my heart, I don't do this for anything else outside of my love for the medium," he said. "It's like I don't do a film unless my heart is in it."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Susan Sarandon, Jodie Foster and Warren Beatty were awakened by telephone calls Wednesday morning with news of their Oscar nominations as Hollywood agents made calls around the world to find lucky celebrities.

Nick Nolte was boarding a plane for Spain, Anthony Hopkins was on a movie set in Geneva and Barbra Streisand was in London watching CNN when she learned her movie "The Silence of the Lambs" got seven nominations.

Beatty, who won a directing Oscar for "Reds," was awakened by a jubilant telephone call from "Bugsy" co-producer Mark Johnson.

"No, it doesn't get old because when you are in a community — with people who do a kind of work — your level of caring about that community increases, it doesn't decrease. It's a cheerful thing to happen," Beatty said in a telephone interview.

Beatty, who will turn 55 on March 20, the day of the Academy Award presentations, said he was disappointed his actress-girlfriend Annette Bening was not nominated for her "Bugsy" role as small Virginia Hill.

"I was definitely in my bed when the phone rang," said Foster, nominated as best actress for "The Silence of the Lambs."

"I had one of the best experiences of my life making 'Thelma & Louise' because I was so passionate about it and because ... of my beautiful partner in crime," Davis said. "Getting acknowledgement like this is icing on the cake."

Oscar nominees are almost unfailingly polite, but Barry Levinson, whose "Bugsy" got 10 nominations, had pointed words for the rival "JFK," which was second with eight nominations.

Asked why Oliver Stone's film drew more criticism than "Bugsy," Levinson said: "We (Hollywood) can take certain liberties, but 'JFK' was a political piece and doesn't have that much room. Also, when you point the finger, there's trouble."

To this reporter, the nominations seemed a celebration of the political. All the best picture nominees were well made, but they were filmed by major studios

Vanilla Ice, 'Hudson Hawk' rank with worst

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Vanilla Ice's "Cool As Ice" scooped up seven Golden Raspberry Awards nominations earlier this week and Sean Young got two bids for playing twins badly as Hollywood prepared to salute the worst of 1991.

Bruce Willis' "Hudson Hawk" and Dan Aykroyd's "Nothing But Trouble" both picked up six nominations for the Oscar-spoofing Razzie trophy, a golf ball-sized gold-plated raspberry with an estimated street value of \$1.79.

The Razzie nominations came just two days before the announcement of the Academy Award contenders.

The 12th Annual Golden Raspberry Awards, determined by more than 350 voters from 26 states and five countries, will be meted out March 29.

Getting the biggest raspberry reception for 1991 was "Cool As Ice," nominated for worst picture, worst actor (Ice), worst director (David Kellogg), worst screenplay (David Kellogg), two worst new star nominations (including one for Ice) and worst original song.

Other worst picture nominees were "Dice Rules," "Hudson Hawk," "Nothing But Trouble" and "Return to the Blue Lagoon."

In an unprecedented double nomination for the same film, Young was nominated as worst actress in "Kiss

Before Dying" as the twin who survives and for worst supporting actress as the twin who's killed in the first reel.

Razzie officials cited Young for her "pathetically puppet-like portrayal of two twins stalked by a psychopath in the risible murder mystery."

John Candy was nominated for worst supporting actress for appearing in drag in "Nothing But Trouble."

Last year's worst actor winner, Andrew Dice Clay, was again nominated in the same category for "Dice Rules." Another past winner, Sylvester Stallone, was nominated for the eighth consecutive year, this time for "Oscar."

Competing with Young for the worst actress award are past Razzie winner Madonna, for "Truth or Dare," Kim Basinger for "The Morning Man," Sally Field for "Not Without My Daughter," and Demi Moore for "The Untouchable's Wife" and "Nothing But Trouble."

The awards are organized each year by John Wilson, a Los Angeles-area writer for movie advertising trailers and television commercials. Voters include film-industry professionals, journalists, publicists, Wilson's friends and other people who have heard about the foundation, Wilson said.

Crass comedy 'Babysitter's Dead' is kind of fun

A teen hit and comedy with an identity problem lead this week's list of new videos.

DON'T TELL MOM THE BABYSITTER'S DEAD 2½ stars. (1991) (HBO) \$94.99. 103 minutes. Christina Applegate, Joanna Cassidy, Keith Coogan, John Getz. Equal parts "Home Alone" (parental figure leaves kids to fend for selves) and "Working Girl" (unscrupled miss connives her way up the corporate ladder), this title-says-it-all youth comedy is crass, cynical and kind of fun. With Applegate — the slutty daughter of Fox's smart-com "Married... With Children" — in the lead role (a deadbeat daughter, she becomes her sibling's surrogate mom), the movie is guaranteed to offend conscientious parents and tweak all the right buttons of its key demographic group: teens and teen wannabes. PG-13 (profanity, teen anarchy).

THE POPE MUST DIET 2½ stars. (1991) (MGM) \$92.98. 87 minutes. Robbie Coltrane, Beverly D'Angelo, Alex Rocco, Paul Bartel. When in theaters, this film, originally titled "The Pope Must Die," had an extra letter added to its title by distributors in response to protests. Despite its provocative title, it is the gentlest of mistaken-identity farces (in which a clerical error leads to the wrong man being named to the papacy). But even the crass comedy's attempt to make a point, a script that dies as often as this overrated humor-sketch does. One of the problems with this Vatican rag is that St. Peter looks like an aban-

doned parish church. This gives the impression that its actors are refugees from some Harvard Hasty Pudding parody. R (nudity, sex, profanity, irreverence).

BINGO! 2 stars. (1991) (Columbia TriStar) 90 minutes. Cindy Williams, David Rasche, Bingie. It might have been easy to dismiss "Bingo!" as a real bow-wow — a clumsy satire of the romance between a boy and a circus dog — but a 6-year-old companion thought the movie was "fun." She points out that kids and adults have different tastes and that, while they didn't like "Problem Child 2," she liked it just fine. That said, she also pointed out that the sequence of the pet-shop fire "might be too much for little kids" (PG puppy love, below-the-belt punches, cartoon violence). (This video supplier does not set suggested retail prices on titles it deems primarily for rental.)

HARLEY DAVIDSON AND THE MARLBORO MAN 2 stars. (1991) (MGM/UA) \$94.99. 98 minutes. Mickey Rourke, Don Johnson, Chelsea Field, Tom Sizemore. A lonely biker (Rourke) and a lonesome cowboy (Johnson) team up to fight a corporate banker in 1996 Los Angeles. Both stars look unusually relaxed and demonstrate that they can do something other than act de-bauched on screen. First attempt by the two performers to jump start their stalled careers is a not-very-good but never-boring catalogue of manly men-doing-manly-things, such as riding-bucking

broncos and robbing banks. R (profanity, nudity, violence). (Available on videotape.)

Attendance shows success of Foreign Film Festival

TWIN FALLS — The members of the Magic Valley Arts Council have deemed their fourth annual Foreign Film Festival an outstanding success.

"The series has developed a larger and larger following each year, as our community becomes aware of the wonderful talents of the international film community," said Paul Miles, chairman of this year's film committee. The five-week festival concluded Wednesday, with more than 125 series ticket-holders, a 25 percent increase from last year.

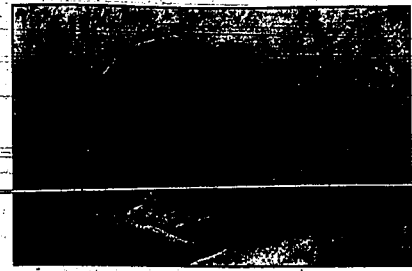

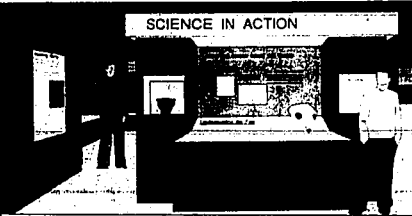
All three students qualify for judging in the national finals this spring in New York. Awards will range from gold medals to college scholarships.

\$1 million in renovations move museum to mall

POCATELLO—The Idaho Museum of Natural History will set up shop in a mall this summer. The nine 6,000-sq-ft museum at Idaho State University will close down to allow for completion of a \$1 million renovation project, begun this month. The exhibits and gift shop will be moved to an available space in the nearby Fine Ridge Mall until the end of the year. The mall has designated the space.

"We are happy to have the space in the mall so that we can continue to accommodate visiting school groups through the fall season," said Richard Holmer, museum director. "The museum's recent dinosaur exhibit was viewed by 200,000 people over a three-year period, and last year's science carnival attracted nearly 30,000 children." A number of Magic Valley school groups made the trip to Pocatello.

Holmer hopes to start moving the museum exhibits back into the renovated museum shortly after Christmas, but he is not sure exactly how long the move will take. Right now, he is busy heading up fund-raising activities for the project.

"We have submitted proposals to the National Science Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities, asking them to furnish new storage, and research areas for us," Holmer said. "We have also talked

to a number of science and history teachers to determine what we should offer in the way of new exhibits for children.

The result is a plan to build hands-on science areas for elementary students. The area for permanent exhibits will be increased from 3,000 to 6,000 square feet, with the 3,500-square-foot space allotted to changing exhibits remaining the same.

"The museum is housed in an old library building, so there have always been drawbacks we have wanted to improve," Holmer said. "This renovation will give us extra storage space for state artifacts in addition to nearly doubling our exhibition hall."

The museum recently opened an archaeology exhibit, created by the Herrett Museum and Art Gallery at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls. Holmer plans to keep the exhibit on display until the big move in June.



'Wayne's World': Most excellent - not!

HOLLYWOOD - What have they done to 'Wayne's World'?

Not that the ongoing "Saturday Night Live" skit this new film is based on had the emotional resonance of the complete works of Shakespeare. Or that the big screen version is a horrific blot on the cutchion of world cinema. It's just that when something that was fine and clever exactly where it was gets awkwardly transplanted just to make a fast buck, well, it's enough to make you spew.

For those who need a crash course, "Wayne's World" is literally a bargain basement knockoff of "The Tonight Show," hosted by a cheery pair of high school head-bangers whose heavy metal motto is "Party On!"

Broadcast over Aurora, Ill., public access cable from a below-ground rec room by totally affable Wayne (Mike Myers) and his borderline dweeby pal Garth (Dana Carvey), the talk-show parody has featured everyone from metal gods Aerosmith to the coolest guy in high school (played by Bruce Willis), in the process adding words like "Not!" (as in "this is an awesome movie - Not!") to contemporary vocabularies.

When confined to a slot on "Saturday Night Live" (where it debuted in 1989), "Wayne's World" has an undeniable "shaggy-dog" charm, helped considerably by the comic clan of Myers (a Second City alumnus who created the concept) and Carvey. Yet nothing about these guys, amiably wacky though they may be, cried out for expansion to feature length. Well, almost nothing.

Obviously, the pair's enviable

popularity, the fact that the words "Wayne's World" on a marquee would guarantee a tidy sum at the box office whether the film deserved it or not, made questions of suitability irrelevant. Myers and fellow comedy writers Bonnie Turner and Terry Turner set to work on a screenplay and Penelope Spheeris, whose pair of "Decline of Western Civilization" documentaries were among the best ever done on the rock world, was hired to direct.

The plot everyone came up with has Wayne out of high school but still living at home and still doing the show from his basement. But more is going to change for our guy than his scholastic status. In short order, he falls so madly in love with Cassandra (Tia Carrere), a Chinese-American rock singer, that he hears "Dream Weaver," whenever he sees her. And his show catches the eye of a slick Chicago television executive (Rob Lowe), who improbably sees

"Wayne's World" as a way to make some easy money, if he can just get the boys to cooperate.

Given the motives that got this project off the ground in the first place, there is a certain irony in that "Wayne's World" is a film so uncontrived by big bucks one of the main lines of the movie's plot. Otherwise, the film has the same unobjectionable wide-eyed innocence that animated such Frankie Avalon and Annette Funicello movies as "Beach Blanket Bingo" and "How To Stuff A Wild Bikini." Who says Hollywood doesn't remember its roots?

And, from time to time, in sequences like Wayne and his pals breaking into a back-seat chorus of Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" or Garth doing a passionate doughnut shop pantomime to Jimi Hendrix's "Foxy Lady," "Wayne's World" (rated PG-13) does catch comedic fire and become genuinely funny.

More often, however, one is conscious of how unimaginatively filtered this movie feels, how little the filmmakers have found for Wayne and Garth to do. Even with three different endings, not to mention several musical numbers for Cassandra and even a guest solo for

Alice Cooper, there is not nearly enough satisfactory plot and incident to fill the film's bare bones 95 minutes.

The "Wayne's World" concept, which, egged on by a rabid studio audience, works so beautifully in "skit" format, ends up feeling dragged out and energy-less at feature length. Though failed transitions to film sometimes seem like wasted opportunities, the point to remember about "Wayne's World" is that, except where dollars are concerned, there was never very much of an opportunity here in the first place.

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Movie admissions decline 7% in 1991

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Movie ticket sales in North America fell last year, dragging receipts down with them, a film industry group reported this week, giving a clear measure of the recession's impact on the entertainment business.

Despite a record last-minute surge, movie ticket sales fell 7 percent in 1991, while the year's receipts tumbled 4.4 percent from the year before to \$4.8 billion, the Motion Picture

Association of America said. Meanwhile, for the second time in 12 years, the average cost of making a feature Hollywood film declined, down to \$26.1 million, from \$26.8 million, reflecting efforts to control costs.

"It will be a difficult journey," Jack Valenti, president of the group, told thousands of theater owners at their national convention in Las Vegas, where he also announced the results.

Turner's Cartoon Network set to debut in October

ATLANTA (AP) — Ted Turner is launching his fifth cable channel. The Cartoon Network, set for an October debut, will show cartoons around the clock.

The new channel will feature cartoons from the Turner Broadcasting System's vast stock of animated shorts, which was boosted by last year's \$320 million purchase of the Hanna-Barbera library.

"We think we'll be competing with everyone programming for young people," Turner said in announcing the venture. "Like with CNN (where) we're competing with anyone running news or information."

The cartoons-only channel joins Turner's TBS Superstation, which runs general entertainment; TNT, which mostly offers vintage films; Cable News Network and CNN Headline News. He also owns Sportsouth, a regional network.

Turner acknowledged these are shaky economic times to launch a new network, but added savings because TBS already owns most of the cartoons it plans to show.

The new network comes during a shakedown in cartoon land. Faced with declining ratings for its Saturday morning shows, NBC will end five decades of cartoons in August.

Meanwhile, children-oriented network Nickelodeon

holds a sizable chunk of the cable cartoon audience.

But TBS said its research found a large potential audience, among children and adults alike, for an all-cartoon channel.

"One of the misconceptions is, there's a lot of cartoons on TV right now," said Scott Sassa, president of Turner Entertainment Networks.

TBS owns 3,800 half-hour blocks of cartoons, between the Hanna-Barbera library that includes "The Flintstones" and "The Jetsons" and Turner's earlier acquisition of the MGM film library, which came with "Tom & Jerry" and pre-1940 Warner Bros. cartoons, featuring such characters as Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck and Porky Pig.

TBS and TNT also show cartoons and Turner said that would continue.

Turner officials refused to say how wide The Cartoon Network launch would be though ultimately they hope to deliver it worldwide.

TNT began in 1988 with 17 million subscribers. It now reaches 56 million.

Betty Cohen, a senior vice president at TNT, will head The Cartoon Network.

Turner said TBS has no commitments from cable operators to run the Cartoon Network, though advertisers generally favor the idea.

Nuclear threat isn't far from VCR

The world's superpowers would have us believe that the nuclear threat is over, thanks to arms reductions. Hollywood has always believed otherwise. There's a range of movies about the nuke threat, from the sober treatise of "The Day After" to the pop psychology of "WarGames," the possibility of nuclear war will never be further away than your VCR.

Here's a sampling of some of Hollywood's most memorable doomsday thrillers:

BY DAWN'S EARLY LIGHT (1990) — Even though it was made for cable's Home Box Office, this hard-edged thriller can compete with the best of theatrical films. Starring Powers Boothe and Rebecca De Mornay (the civil nanny from "The Hand that Rocks the Cradle"), this is a taut thriller that set aboard a military bomber over the Soviet Union. When a nuclear war breaks out, killing the president, the crew is told to systematically destroy key Russian cities. Like "Fail-Safe" (see below), "By Dawn's Early Light" is tough and realistic, even though it loses some of its edge toward the end.

THE DAY AFTER (1983) — It may have been The television event of the '80s (next to "Who Shot J.R.?"), but Nicholas Meyer's version of what would happen after a nuclear war is dramatically weak. There are some stunning moments, but the movie's

good intentions can't hide the same distasteful feeling that comes with most disaster movies: You keep wondering when, and how, the characters are going to die. As a curiosity-piece, though, the movie serves as a grim reminder of how close we have been to the end of the world.

FAIL SAFE (1964) — Perhaps the most tense and suspenseful movie ever made, "Fail Safe" stars Henry Fonda as the president (that sounds like a bad Irwin Allen disaster movie, but it's not) who must decide what to do when a nuclear bomb is accidentally detonated over the Soviet Union. It also features a rare serious performance by Dom De Luise. Unforgettable.

THE TERMINATOR (1984) — It begins in a post-nuclear world ruled by machines. And when Arnold Schwarzenegger arrives in L.A., his goal is to wipe out the only man who can prevent the war, even though he hasn't yet been born. Part anti-war film, part religious allegory, the movie is better than its sequel because it has a hallucinatory, surreal feel. No message, just a lot of fun.

THEM! (1954) — The wildest of all the paranoid fantasies of the 1950s, "Them!" stars James Whitmore in a very weird and still-frightening tale of the aftermath of a nuclear test: Giant ants invade L.A. (boy, the City of the Angels can't win when it comes to the Bomb). In the sewers, in the streets, the ants are

everywhere — and they're mad. In a twist repeated 32 years later in "Alien," there's one little guy who holds the key to the awful secret: "Them!" borders on the silly, but it's always entertaining.

2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY (1968) — Perhaps the most ambiguous and ambitious anti-nuke movie ever made, there's one scene in the movie that makes its political intentions known: A prehistoric ape discovers that a bone can be used as a weapon of destruction. He (or she?) throws it into the air and, as the bone falls through the sky, director Stanley Kubrick cuts to a nuclear warhead orbiting the Earth. Man has discovered the ultimate weapon, which, according to Kubrick, means it's time that man also discovers his destiny. The movie loses most of its impact on video (laserdisc owners, try the superb Criterion Collection disc that's letterboxed to preserve the image), but it's still extraordinary.

WARGAMES (1983) — Director John Badham's bubble-gum thriller shows nuclear war as the ultimate video game: A teen-ager begins a harmless game of "Global Thermonuclear War," not knowing that his computer has linked up to the U.S. nuclear arsenal. The philosophies are a little heavy-handed and obvious, but Matthew Broderick and Ally Sheedy make it an entertaining way to teach kids about a threat that once seemed insurmountable.

Soap fans suspend disbelief so their favorite stars can return

There was a time not so long ago that when soap opera stars left their respective shows for the Next Big Thing, their characters were killed or sent off to live forever on some remote island. And that was that.

Not anymore.

In a recent trend unique to daytime television, characters who die in plane crashes, tossed over cliffs or eaten in acid and somehow pop up years later — alive and little the worse for wear.

The latest examples of longtime serial stars returning to the shows from whence they gained popularity are Emma Samms — who last month resumed her role as Holly Sutton-Scorpio in ABC's "General Hospital" after six years away (including a stint on "Dynasty") — and Joanna Johnson, who in December revived the character of Carolin in the CBS series "The Bold and the Beautiful."

They follow in the footsteps of Deirdre Hall, who returned to the "Days of Our Lives" fold as Dr. Marlena Evans-Brady in July after five years away, and fellow "Days" alumna Wayne Northrop, who resuscitated his Roman Brady in August.

And perhaps the most publicized daytime comeback of all was that of Anthony Geary, who in the 1980s earned enduring fame as half of the red-hot Luke and Laura pairing on "General Hospital."

The hitch in Geary's return a little more than a year ago, after taking a six-year hiatus from "GH," was his decision to inhabit another character. Now, Geary is Bill Eckert, Luke Spencer's identical cousin. (Shades of "General Hospital" show.)

How the programs explain the reappearance of these long-missing actors and characters has proven an exercise in storytelling that makes Bobby Ewing's sudden materialization in Pam's shower on "Dallas" seem downright plausible.

It had, for example, been detailed on "General Hospital" that Holly (Samms) died in a plane crash. But to facilitate Samms' return, the air fatality turned into a serious (but not deadly) car accident. And that unrecognizable body found on the plane wasn't Holly's after all.

"Holly was in a coma for two years," explained Marlena Laird, a line producer and director for "GH." "When she came out of it, she was in

another country and read in the paper that (her husband) Robert (Tristan Rogers) was involved in a car relationship and didn't want to disturb that. So she stayed out.

"If we want to blend an actor back into a show, there's always a way," Laird added. "You can generally find a way to twist and manipulate something. You rarely see a dead body, but hey, even if you do, he or she can always come back to play the civil identical twin."

In the cases of Dr. Marlena Evans-Brady (Hall) and Roman Brady (Northrop), the "Days of Our Lives" creative brain trust concocted a pilot line that had the pair kidnapped and kept imprisoned by their captors for several years in an induced coma.

"Days" executive producer Ken Corday said the Brady duet was shackled in a building "in the Bermuda Triangle, somewhere between Florida, Cuba and the Bahamas."

At least it wasn't all just a dream.

"In hindsight, we may have gone a little bit too far out with that one," Corday said. "But as long as you explain everything, it's amazing what the fans will accept."

If viewers want to welcome a longtime favorite back to a show, the means are relatively unimportant, Deirdre Hall said.

"Soap fans are so loyal, and so forgiving," said Hall, who had logged 11 years in "GH's" Laird, before taking a five-year leave to conquer prime time. "If people love a character, they will suspend disbelief to almost any level for that character." Hall recalls how one popular

daytime performer met his demise by "getting stabbed, choked and scalded in a vat of acid...yet he survived it because the writers needed him back."

The reasons why actors are drawn back to the familiar and often lucrative terrain of daytime TV are easier to accept than their survival/revival abilities.

"When our more popular actors leave the show, it's sort of like kids leaving the nest," said "GH's" Laird. "They can go out and do a movie or two, maybe a sitcom, and they have the comfort of knowing the door is always open and they have a home here. That's attractive to them. It can be irresistible."

TWIN FALLS — After a close loss Wednesday night at the hands of the Jerome Tigers, the No. 1-rated Burley Bobcats turned things around Thursday night against Wood River.

Leading by only two points entering the second half Moreton made sure there would be no repeat of the previous night.

“It seemed like every time they made a run he (Moreton) and Jeremy (Toner) answered back and helped build up the cushion,” Cowell said.

In the second half Moreton collected 17 of his 33 points, and Toner picked up nine of his 15. Burley extended its lead to five midway through the third quarter before the Wolverines made a comeback. Bruins lose narrowly to Pocatello

POCATELLO — The Twin Falls Bruins haven't won a Region III Class A-1 title or gone to state since 1985.

Thursday night, they appeared to get their foot in the door, but they couldn't pull it off, missing three consecutive front end free throws in the closing 51 seconds to drop a 34-53 decision to the Pocatello Indians.

The coup de grace was an old fashioned three-point play off the offensive glass by 6-6 Pocatello center Rob North with seven seconds remaining.

The loss sends the Bruins back to their home court at 7:30 p.m. Saturday when they will host Highland, a winner over the Indians on Tuesday.

Pocatello will rest until Tuesday night when it will host Saturday's survivor.

A win Saturday night would guarantee the Bruins a second chance to get to state in a one-game playoff next week against the Region 4 runner up.

The missed free throws were the high-profile reasons Twin Falls lost the game, but the real culprit was a five-minute agony in the second quarter when the Bruins completely disintegrated on both ends of the court.

Twin Falls was holding a 17-12 lead when things turned upside down. Pocatello jumped into a 1-2-2 zone, and that brought the offense to a complete halt. The Indians exploited Twin Falls' passing weaknesses with interceptions on six of the next seven possessions.

At the other end, Jack Moser highlighted a sudden offensive flash that had the Indians outscoring the Bruins 15-0.

Twin Falls did score the final three points of the half to end a seven-point second quarter. They trailed 27-20 at that point.

In the third period, Pocatello had three follow shots that broke open a 12-point lead in a six-point trip down the court got the Bruins on track.

That started when Paul Rasmussen scored and a Pocatello defender was called for grabbing the rim. Rand Stover hit both technical free throws, and Rasmussen scored on the inbounds play to cut the deficit to 41-37.

Parisien fades to 4th; U.S. record still in sight

The Associated Press. ALBERTVILLE, France — A golden opportunity vanished like a snowflake in the sun. A loser on the slopes Thursday, the United States can still match its winter Games record of 12 medals if it finishes with a flourish.

If everything goes right in figure skating, hockey, bobsleds and short track speedskating, the Americans could even leave the Alps with a new record — about a devalued one, with three of the eight medals so far coming in new Olympic sports.

The latest gold to get away was in one of the showcase events.

Slalom skier Julie Parisien, who vowed to take “every risk I can” before Thursday's race, sped to the lead in the first run, then turned cautious and slow as she gave the gift of gold to Austria's Petra Kronberger.

“I knew that I had handed my medal away,” Parisien said after a sluggish second run in which she stood lazily back on her skis and failed to build speed over the flatter lower sections.

A wide turn about five gates from the

end was the final, critical mistake that dropped her to fourth and kept her from giving the United States its third Alpine medal of the Olympics.

Parisien slammed her ski poles into the ground in anger.

“This is never going to happen to me again, no matter what,” she promised, punching each word into her memory.

“The pressure's never going to get to me like that again.”

That second run was all the more surprising because of Parisien's aggressive, fighting spirit. She lost four teeth in a practice accident last month and wears a cast on her broken left wrist, but still keeps skiing.

“I've been through so much in the past month, I feel like I'm 40 years old already,” said the 20-year-old Parisien, of Auburn, Maine.

In the giant slalom Wednesday, she slammed face-first into a gate on the first run and came away with a fat lower lip. Yet she left the course saying she was “totally fired up” for the slalom, hoping to become the first American woman since Barbara Cochran in 1972

JEROME — A baseball team for Jerome High School received a vote of approval from the School Board with a few contingencies attached.

UNLV basketball world is topsy-turvy

LAS VEGAS (AP) — UNLV in the NCAA tournament? Jerry Tarkanian back for another season as coach?

In the troubled, topsy-turvy world of UNLV basketball, where attorneys have become major players and courts have a double meaning, nothing is impossible.

One attorney says Tarkanian may withdraw the resignation he submitted last June after three of his former players were pictured with convicted sports fixer Richard Perry.

As for Tarkanian remaining as the Runnin' Rebels' coach, UNLV president Robert Maxson says:

"Coach Tarkanian submitted his resignation, the university accepted that resignation, and the matter is

closed," Maxson said Thursday. "There is no need for any additional discussion."

Attorney Alan Jones revealed he had sent UNLV administrators a letter charging them with breaching Tarkanian's resignation agreement. That scenario could open the door for Tarkanian to fight to keep the job he is scheduled to leave when the season ends March 3.

Tarkanian says he isn't sure he's up to yet another fight.

Sutton still in hospital; condition is good

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma State coach Eddie Sutton was in good condition Thursday at a Tulsa hospital after suffering chest pains Wednesday night.

"We found a small problem in one of the arteries, but it is something that can be treated with medicine," Dr. David Brewer said in a release issued by the university's sports information department. "Coach Sutton is fine, comfortable and does not

have any pain. He will be back on his feet and back in normal activities very soon."

A spokeswoman at St. Francis Hospital in Tulsa referred all calls about Sutton's condition to Mike Strauss, associate sports information director.

Oklahoma State, which dropped from second to eighth in the rankings on Monday, lost to Oklahoma on Friday in Stillwater, hours before

Sutton was taken to the hospital. The loss was the third in a row for the Cowboys and the fourth in the past five games after a 20-0 start.

Strauss said Sutton, 55, complained of chest pains after he had finished his radio show following the game.

Sutton found the team's trainer and then was taken to Stillwater Medical Center, where he was examined.

LA LECHERE, France (AP) — It could be a Star Spangled Friday for the United States, already waving the banner over what might become its best Winter Games medal showing since Lake Placid and the Miracle on Ice.

U.S. hockey team seeks to continue its Miracle-at-Meribel with a semifinal showdown against the former Soviet Union competing here as the Unified Team. And Kristi Yamaguchi and Nancy Kerrigan go into the finals of the women's figure skating running 1-2 for the gold and silver medals.

The hockey showdown, with its parallels to 1980, was so eagerly anticipated that CBS televised it live Friday morning. Hockey highlights, including the semifinal between Canada and Czechoslovakia, and the women's figure skating, were the centerpiece of the network's evening show along with tape of the

Ito's arsenal includes the difficult triple axel she and American Tonya Harding are the only two women ever to land the jump in competition. But practice problems convinced Ito to replace the axel with the easier triple lutz in Wednesday's program — and she fell executing that jump.

It was fourth and Harding, who tied the triple axel and missed, was ninth in sixth place.

Yamaguchi was gratified to get through the short program. "The original program is where most of the attention is because of the required elements," she said. "It's not as easy to do."

Critics charge excessive commercialism destroys Olympic spirit

LA LECHERE, France (AP) — Corporate sponsors pay millions of dollars for an Olympic tie-in. Television rights for the Games cause a bidding war. Even the athletes' outfits prominently feature company logos.

The last bastion of Olympic non-commercialism remains the venues, the places where the games are played. Can advertising there — on the world's most visible billboards — be far behind?

"I'd certainly have to say it's a possibility, although not necessarily a probability, in the near future," said Richard Pound, the International Olympic Committee's marketing chief.

Selling ad space at an Olympic stadium could bring in untold millions. But for now, the International Olympic Committee is sticking to its strict policy against signs at competition sites.

"I think it makes a statement for us to be able to say we're leaving money on the table and letting the focus of the Games be on the athletes, not on the trade show character," Pound said.

There's no denying the Olympics have become a big-money show, an international advertising bonanza for businesses ranging from candy-bar makers to credit card companies.

Twelve international corporations paid more than \$170 million for the right to be official sponsors of the 1992 Winter and Summer Games. Total marketing revenues, including television fees, approach \$2 billion.

The figures are expected to increase substantially for the 1996 Summer Games in Atlanta.

"I don't think commercialization is getting out of hand or taking over the Games," said Pound, an IOC member from Canada. "The injection from the private sector is absolutely essential."

Critics, however, contend the cash boom is eroding the Olympic ideals.

Marielle Goetschel, a former two-time Olympic skiing gold medalist, wrote a scathing column in the French newspaper *Le Figaro* this week about the IOC of hoarding its money in Swiss banks.

Christian Neureuther, spokesman for the German Olympic team and husband of former Olympic ski champion Rosi Mittermaier, launched a similar attack.

"Everything in the Olympics is controlled by money," he was quoted as saying by a Hamburg newspaper. "They're only looking for money, whether there are more dollars."

Twenty years ago, commercialization was considered anathema by the Olympic movement.

Avery Brundage, the American IOC president, labeled Alpine skiers at the 1972 Winter Games the "trained seals of merchandisers" and banned Austria's Karl Schranz for allegedly taking money from ski manufacturers.

In 1972 Summer Games in Munich, Brundage was touring the athletes' village when he spotted a flight bag emblazoned with the name and logo of an airline.

"We'll have none of that at the Olympics Games," he said.

The IOC loosened in 1976 under Brundage's successor, Lord Killanin. With Juan Antonio Samaranch as IOC president, commercialization was embraced at the 1984 Summer Games in Los Angeles.

Here, at the Albertville Games, the pressures of commercialization have given rise to a nasty marketing war.

The IOC publicly accused American Express of using "ambush marketing" to undercut Visa, one of the official sponsors, and the French organizing committee went

to court to safeguard the use of the Olympic rings.

"We can't approach this just as if we were a charity," Pound said. "We have to stand behind and protect all of our sponsors."

There has also been controversy over commercial logos worn by athletes.

Last week, the French team protested that the labels worn by the Italians who finished 1-2 in the men's Alpine combined skiing event were too large. Officials agreed the logos exceeded the limit of 50 square centimeters, but Samaranch brushed aside the protest.

"Medals are won on the slopes, not in an office," he said.

After initial confusion over car company logos on the helmets of some bobsledders, the IOC ruled the insignias were acceptable as long as they were under the size limit.

While the IOC has shown some flexibility on the clothing front, it has remained adamant against any form of publicity at competition areas.

Jamaican bobsledder attended U. of Idaho

LA PLAGNE, France (AP) — In 18 years as track coach at Idaho, Mike Keller has coached just one Olympic athlete. A Jamaican? A marathoner? A decathlete?

Chris Stokes, 28, is competing in his second Winter Games as brakeman for the Jamaican bobsled team. Stokes was a sprinter for coach Keller in the mid-1980s; he works in the school's business office when he's not skidding down icy tracks.

"We have less than 10,000

students, and if you look at the odds of having someone make the Winter Olympics — hey, we don't even have a ski team," Keller said from Moscow, Idaho.

Stokes would have been represented by two bobsledders, but assistant track coach Trond Knoplund — who took a leave of absence to train as a driver didn't make the cut when Norway entered only one two-man sled.

Stokes' transition to bobsledding was rather sudden. He was training for the 1988 Summer Olympics

when his brother Dudley called less than a week before the four-man competition at Calgary. Another team member hurt himself pushing, and the Jamaicans needed help.

Stokes had the choice of competing in an indoor track meet or joining a group that brought a reggae beat to an icy sport.

"I don't mind, Chris, this is the Olympics. You're over Yandall (Indoor-Mark) (we're) over here," went to the Olympics," Stokes said.

Speed skiing: Faster than falling

LES ARCS, France (AP) — It's the fastest way a human can travel without motorized power — faster even than free-falling from a plane, say those who say so.

It's called speed skiing, and the sport is trying to make a name for itself at the Olympics.

There's nothing new about speed skiing; it's been around for some 120 years. But with their Darth Vader helmets and airtight ski suits, modern-day speed skiers race alone at 130 mph — for all of two seconds.

Stepping from a plane will hurtle you toward earth about 10 mph slower, and for a considerably longer time.

With no gates, turns or bumps, speed skiing becomes a simple business: zipping down a smooth 70-degree slope as quickly as possible, with the skiers' speed measured between two points only 100 meters apart.

That's why a run only lasts two seconds.

The skiers spend 500 meters building up to maximum speed and another 800 trying to slow down. That's assuming they don't crash.

The Olympics is having its first look at the sport, which is a demerit-rated, one-kilometer race at Albertville Games. Though staged at the most popular speed-skiing venue, it did not get off to a good start Thursday.

Swiss skier Valerie Gomez was first down the slope. She crashed into the middle of the 100-meter stretch.

Gomez slid some 60 meters, far enough to cross the line and collect a score. She was taken off on the course on a stretcher towed by a

snowmobile, but reported later she had suffered little more than friction burns and lost pride.

American skier Dale Womack, from Vail, Colo., said competitors didn't worry about getting injured. They don't have time to.

"You don't worry about the tire

blowing when you drive the car. There are far too many other things to think about," he said.

"All you think about is keeping your skis flat on the snow and keeping your back position as low as possible. If you slip and your skis leave the snow you lose time," Womack said.

Gravity is a skier's main ally in speed skiing, although technology helps.

American ski coach Jack Nance explained how the skiers seek the most aerodynamically helpful helmets and suits, but are restricted to using skis that are a maximum 240 centimeters long.

"We actually get very little help from the ski industry, but it's a sport that's only just gathering speed," Nance said.

"And it's not that these skiers are wild, young people. They are regular guys usually 25 or more, normal people who just want to ski fast. Some people can go fast. Others can't," Nance continued.

"These people not only want to ski fast. They want to ski even faster," Nance said.

The United States had the world's fastest speed skier in Steve McKinney until he died in a car crash. McKinney was the brother of Tamara McKinney, who won the combined Alpine ski title at the World Championship at Vail in 1989.

Now the world record holder is Frenchman Michael Pruffer, whose mark is 139.03 mph. He also won last year's World Cup and is favored to retain it when it starts up next month.

Parisien certainly looked fired up in his first run, tearing down the course in 48.22 seconds. She blamed a four-hour wait for draining her energy and confidence, but Kronberger had no such problems.

"I think this run I have only every hundred years," Kronberger said.

Kronberger, who also won the Alpine combined event, edged the Southern Hemisphere's first Alpine medalist, Annellee Coger of New Zealand, by 42 seconds. Spain's Fernandez Ochoa claimed third place. 45 seconds ahead of Parisien.

The United States also failed to claim a men's speedskating medal for only the fourth time in Olympic history as its three entrants in the 10,000 meters race took a back seat in the pack. Bart Veldkamp of the Netherlands won, upstaging world record-holder Johann Olav Koss of Norway.

The missed chances only increased the pressure on the rest of the Americans to match the medals record set in 1932 and tied in 1980, both times in Lake Placid, N.Y.

The United States earned its eighth medal in short-track speedskating, which is making its debut as a medal sport. Two new Olympic sports — mogul skiing and World champion Canada won the



Korean short-track skater Kim Ki-Hoon leads the pack.

Olympic women's 3,000-meter short track relay, with the United States taking the silver and the Unified Team the bronze.

Kim Ki-Hoon won the men's 1,000-meter race in a world record 1 minute, 30.76 seconds, giving South Korea its first gold medal in Winter Olympics history.

Germany has virtually locked up the medals race with 25, including 10 gold. The Russian-led Unified Team has 20 has an outside shot of surging to the top with medal possibilities in eight events.

Russian Evgeni Redkine surprised nearly everyone in the 20-kilometer biathlon. The 22-year-old Siberian was a last-minute addition to the Unified Team and a last-minute starter. "The coaches felt younger blood should join the team," he said.

The gamble paid off as Redkine shot clean in his Olympic debut and skied to a 6.4-second victory over Germany's Mark Kirchner, who was trying to sweep all three biathlon events.

"I think it's good with new faces emerging. We should have a constant supply of new athletes in our sport. I'm very happy for him," Kirchner said.

The glamour sport of the Games, women's figure skating, won't produce a medal for either the Germans or the Russians.

Yamaguchi and Kerrigan, one-two entering Friday night's free skate, cap a busy day of big hopes for the United States. The U.S. hockey team faces the Unified Team in the semifinals, the winner-guaranteed a gold or silver.

Williams: Hitters are less smart now

NEW YORK (AP) — Ted Williams was recalling when Joe Cronin, his former teammate and manager on the Boston Red Sox, looked at would regret not being a fast runner.

Dick Allen, sitting a few feet from Williams, whispered to Rollie Fingers, a new member of Baseball's Hall of Fame: "If he could have run, he would have hit .600."

As it was, Williams was one of the most remarkable hitters in baseball history, finishing his brilliant 19-year career with the Red Sox with a .344 batting average, including .406 in 1941 — the last major league to hit .400 or better.

Williams doesn't think today's hitters will hit that high often, because they are not as intelligent as the hitters of his era, from the late 19th to the 1960s.

"The average hitter of today doesn't know the little game between the pitcher and the hitter,"

Whoopi! It's Grammy time!

Alternative music moves into mainstream's spotlight

At Grammy time 1990, a whole lot of Americans had never heard, or even heard of, a blueswoman by the name of Bonnie Raitt.

Grammy nominees have traditionally been, to put it bluntly, mainstream — Michael Jackson, Paul Simon, Linda Ronstadt ... that kind of people.

But on that Grammy night, Raitt walked away with nearly everything in sight for the songs and performances from her album "Nick of Time," and she accepted it all with great surprise and modesty.

For the jaded music lover, this was a supreme moment. We hope that such magic occurs this year, at "The 34th Annual Grammy Awards," airing Tuesday, Feb. 25, on CBS, live from Radio City Music Hall in New York City. This year's awards are hosted by comedian Whoopi Goldberg.

There could be a few surprises when it comes time for the winners to step forward. R.E.M., which has been thought of as a non-commercial "alternative" band even though it sells millions of records, is nominated in seven categories for its work on the "Out of Time" album.

And Raitt is nominated in five categories this year for her work on "Luck of the Draw," the follow-up to "Nick of Time."

The Grammys have 78 categories, but you won't get to see most of the classical and technical winners on TV.

You will get a glimpse of the winners in the Polka category, but the rest of the non-mainstream awards are relegated to a brief "awarded earlier" segment.

Fox doubles kids shows; NBC eases

Earlier this month, the Fox Children's Network announced it was expanding its current 10.5 hours of programming to 19, beginning in September. Tops among the new series rolled out by President Margaret Loesch was "Batman," which borrows some of the Warner Bros. film's tone and is made by the studio's animation division.

Cable's Nickelodeon and Disney's pay channel offers daytime cartoons and live-action shows.

Late last year NBC — faced with being the bottom-ranked network on Saturday mornings — announced it was getting out of the cartoon business altogether.

Beginning in August during the Summer Olympic games, the network will debut a long-touted, live week-end version of the "Today" show called "Saturday Today," followed by a teen sitcom named "Saved By The Bell."

ABC and top-rated CBS have said they have no immediate plans to drop their kiddie shows.

NBC's departure only emboldened Fox. Ms. Loesch said last week that doubling her network's programming volume is just the first step.

"This will probably be a seven-day-a-week service in the next few years," she said.

It already is a 6-day-a-week service, with animated programs currently running in the afternoons and for three hours on Saturday mornings.

In the November sweeps race, Fox ranked No. 3 in children's programming, despite having a smaller number of affiliated stations than its competitors at the Big Three networks.

For that period, CBS was first and ABC was second. NBC was last.

Fox also is planning to grab a significant share of an estimated \$50 million to \$60 million in advertising revenues that will be up for grabs when NBC departs the market.

But, Ms. Loesch said, it will take at least five years for Fox to realize a profit from expanding its kiddie viewing hours.

"By then we should have turned a nice little profit," she said. "We're not out of the woods yet."

The children's network, started in 1990, has not been without problems. Delays caused by bad weather at overseas animation houses pushed back premiere dates for some series. The high costs of making such series, which can run as much as \$500,000 per episode, also have caused problems for fledgling Fox.

But cartoons have proved an overall plus for Fox. Its ratings from the November sweeps period were 22 percent higher than those from the preceding year.

Now Belinda is married to Republican Party activist Morgan Mason (son of the late actor James Mason). They are expecting their first baby in June. Although domesticated, Belinda might occasionally yearn for her free-swinging earlier days. The title of her latest solo album is "Live Your Life, Be Free."

Even Meryl Streep had to take a pay cut in these hard times — a \$2 million cut, to be exact. After the box-office failure "Defending Your Life," Streep will be earning a mere \$3 million for her next film, "Death Becomes Her." And you thought movie stars led charmed lives!

Q: Can't Brigitte Nielsen get any acting breaks now that she's divorced from Sylvester Stallone? — T.B.

Relive the DC-10 'Crash Landing'

On Wednesday afternoon, July 19, 1989, a United Airlines DC-10 carrying 296 passengers cartwheeled along a runway in Sioux City, Iowa, and burst into flames. Those who watched on the ground thought no one could survive.

The crash killed 112 persons, but 184 survived, thanks largely to emergency workers stationed along the runway who rushed all the survivors to local hospitals in 46 minutes.

The stories of the struggle in the plane's cockpit to land the disabled plane, which was en route from Denver to Chicago, and the rescue efforts on the ground are told in ABC's "Crash Landing: The Rescue of Flight 232" Monday night. KKVI and other affiliates will air the program from 8-10 p.m.

Charlton Heston plays Capt. Al Haynes, the pilot. His words were scripted from investigation transcripts or remarks made to the press at the time. A spokesman for executive producer Dorothea G. Petrie said that United Airlines asked Haynes not to participate in the production or give interviews concerning the crash because of pending lawsuits.

But the story has other heroes,

among them the man who co-ordinated the ground efforts, Gary Brown, played by Richard Thomas. Brown, who had seen an unfinished copy of the movie, said, "I think it makes our community look very good."

Brown, 34, a native of Sioux City and director of Woodbury County Disaster and Emergency Services, co-ordinated efforts in the three-state area. But as the movie relates, his efforts to form a disaster unit were frustrated by lack of co-operation.

"We had a lot of very unsuccessful drills," he said of the early days. "But you've got to keep trying."

The script seems to point a finger at Jim Hathaway (James Coburn), chief of the Air National Guard Fire Station at Sioux Gateway Airport, implying that he was one of the intransigent officials.

But Brown said "things are written differently for TV than real life. Jim's known me and my family since I was a small child. He's a nice guy, a lot nicer guy in real life than he comes across in the movie."

According to Brown, the area's disaster team began taking shape shortly before the crash of Flight 232. Sioux City had a new fire chief and a new airport manager, both eager to improve emergency planning, and to co-operate with other local groups. "Little pieces of the

puzzle came together about the same time," he said. Brown said he didn't see television coverage of the airplane crash, because he stayed on the job Wednesday and Thursday nights, arriving home about midnight Friday.

He said he had not visited either hospital, obliged instead to work with the medical examiner, and Federal Aviation Administration officials. He was so out of touch with news coverage that he recalled thinking, "I bet we're going to get eaten alive on this one."

But Sioux City had risen to the occasion. Without prompting, some 400 residents went to the local blood bank to donate blood for the injured. National Guard units and emergency squads from several surrounding counties appeared at Sioux Gateway Airport — so many that some were positioned along a little-used runway and had to move when it appeared that Flight 232 would have to use it.

During the crash sequence, news footage of the conflagration taken by KTIV in Sioux City is superimposed over the faces of aghast rescue workers.

"We thought it was going to land, but it was going to go off the runway," said Brown. "I think we were numb when it crashed, just dumbfounded. We didn't think anybody would live through that."

'Unsolved Mysteries' clues in on public appeal

The real unsolved mystery is the success of "Unsolved Mysteries."

The little reality program that chugged into prime time with its 100th episode last Wednesday with a special two-hour edition.

Five years ago, "Unsolved Mysteries" was born amidst zero hoopla as a series of occasional specials. But quietly something clicked.

Host Robert Stack and the show's real-life mix of stories on missing persons, unexplained deaths, lost heirs, fugitives, mysterious treasures and legends have proved to have broad viewer appeal.

Television critics routinely ignore the show, but the public loves it.

In fact, coming into the February sweeps, "Unsolved Mysteries" ranked 10th among all TV series for the 1991-92 season. It has been averaging an impressive 16.7 rating and 27 audience share in its strongest season yet.

That makes "Unsolved Mysteries" the No. 1-rated weekly reality program by far, easily topping such fact-based brethren as "Rescue 911," "Top Cops" and "America's Most Wanted."

The viewer allure obviously goes beyond mere geek chic. Each week, viewers play a key role in the show's success by calling the "Unsolved Mysteries" toll-free number (1-800-876-5353) with various leads and information. And many of those leads have resulted in a solved mystery.

For the 100th episode, Stack introduces stories about two fugitive bank

robbers, an investigative reporter obsessed with tracking down a serial killer and one man's bizarre UFO odyssey. Hmmm, two bank robbers, a serial killer and a UFO?

So maybe the geek appeal is for real.

But even as TV critics yawn, "Unsolved Mysteries" merrily rolls on. Like so many TV shows subjected to critical disdain, nobody loves it but the public.
