Demos' tax plan squeaks by House

WASHINGTON — The House voted 221-209 Thursday to approve a Democratic alternative to President Bush's package of election-year tax cuts, but the unusually close margin embarrassed the Democratic leadership and virtually invited Bush to veto the measure.
The Democratic measure was adopted after the House voted 264-166 to kill a rival Republican plan containing a streamlined version of the economic stimulus package that Bush asked Congress to pass by March

20 in an effort to combat the recession.
The Democrats' bill, which features a tax credit for working Americans financed by higher taxes on the rich, now goes to the Senate for consideration. The Senate Finance Committee is scheduled to begin work Tuesday on a similar, albeit smaller, tax-cut package.
President Bush, who was attending a seven-nation drug summit in San Antonio, Texas, quickly issued a statement

reiterating that there was "no question" that he would veto the Democratic bill.
"Instead of voting to provide greater opportunities for all Americans," (the House) voted to saddle the economy with a \$100 billion tax increase," Bush said, referring to some \$93 billion in tax increases on the rich that would be used to pay for other tax cuts.
The narrow victory margin in the House came despite an 11th-hour campaign by Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., and Majority Leader Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., who personally telephoned more than

30 undecided Democrats to plead with them to support the plan.
Even so, 46 Democrats voted against the leadership's tax package, and another three abstained. Some lawmakers waited until House leaders were sure the proposal would pass before actually casting their ballots against the bill. Except for those defections, the vote was essentially along party lines.
The two sides are in a contest to see which will be able to use the tax-cut issue most effectively during the election campaign.

Americans smoke less, eat more

ATLANTA — An annual survey of the nation's health risks has good news and bad: smoking continues to decline, but America may be getting fatter.
The government's Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance survey, which questioned adults in 44 states and Washington, D.C., about things that could hurt them, found smoking rates in 1990 hovering around 23 percent. That's down from 27 percent in the same survey five years earlier, researchers said Thursday.
But the percentage of Americans classified as overweight was around 23

percent, up 2 points from 1987, the first time the survey asked that question. And the percentage getting little or no exercise was 59 percent, the same as in 1986.
"When you look at cardiovascular risk factors, we've made progress in smoking, but there has not been progress in physical activity or overweight," said Dr. Paul Siegel of the Centers for Disease Control, which conducted the study.
Siegel stressed that the survey is not a precise gauge of the nation's behavior. Six states were not included, so the CDC reports the median — the middle score among the states.

National United Way president steps down

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — William Aramony resigned Thursday as president of United Way of America and apologized for "my lack of sensitivity" that led to complaints of mismanagement in the nation's largest charity.
Aramony announced his resignation in a teleconference with local leaders of United Way campaigns across the country. United Way officials said he had submitted it Wednesday but asked him to stay while a successor is sought.
He was due to retire in July anyway.
"I do apologize for any problems that my lack of sensitivity to perceptions has caused this movement," Aramony said.
Recent news stories have reported that Aramony, who has headed the United Way for 22 years, was paid \$463,000 in salary, received generous and traveled in high style — sometimes aboard the Concorde.
Aramony admitted that he had made some mistakes and that he had not paid enough attention to details.
"I don't like it," Aramony said of the criticism directed at the United Way. "I believe we are being seriously damaged by hurts me to see and hear unfair criticism of

a system that has done so much for this country."
"I've never been through something like this in my life."
He admitted he had traveled first class on some of the more than 10,000 trips he has made on United Way business but said he had flown the Concorde only two or three times.
"I probably never should have done it in the beginning, in retrospect," he said of his first-class travel.
Across the country, officials of local United Way campaigns expressed fear that the disclosures would reduce contributions.
In a statement, LaSalle D. Leffall Jr., chairman of the executive committee of the charity's board of governors, said an outside investigative firm hired in December found "no wrongdoing on the part of Bill Aramony in its preliminary investigation."
A followup investigation will be completed in early April, he said.

Magic Valley businesses ignore ADA at own peril

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley business owners are courting an expensive lesson in civility if they think they can get away without complying with a tough new federal law on access for the disabled.
And most south-central Idaho businesses aren't close to being ready yet.
That was the word Thursday from local observers of the Americans with Disabilities Act, the month-old federal statute that requires businesses and public facilities to clear obstacles from the paths of disabled customers, employees and other citizens.
"This law has some teeth in it," said Jeff Crumrine, executive director of Magic Valley Rehabilitation Services following a speech to a building code seminar sponsored by the city of Twin Falls Thursday. "There is some leniency built into it, but there's no question it's going to be enforced."
"It doesn't hit most people between the eyes," said Kent Just, executive vice president of Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. "I think most business owners think it's not going to affect them. They're wrong."

Simply stated, the ADA requires businesses of any size to provide access for the disabled, but the devil's in the details.
Compliance can mean anything from moving a shelf to removing a deep-pile carpet to taking out a curb or installing an elevator, Crumrine said.
Non-compliance can mean anything from a federal court order mandating costly changes to a fine of up to \$100,000.
"If you're not making a good-faith effort to comply, you're eventually going to be forced to," Crumrine said.
Crumrine said he could not estimate how much complying with ADA would cost the average business, but he said many businesses can get into line with the law with little or no added expense.
Whatever the cost, he advised business owners to start planning now.
"If there is a complaint filed and the Justice Department comes in to look at it, your best protection is evidence that you have a plan," Crumrine said. "Maybe that means you're planning to correct the problem over a period of years, but if you can show good faith, you're probably protected."

Symms, Tsongas nurse decade-old grudge

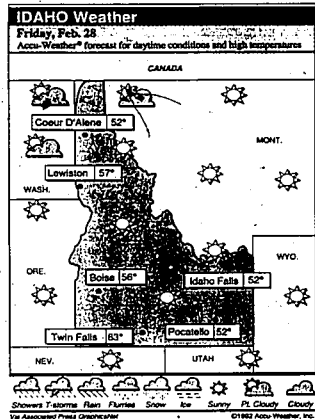
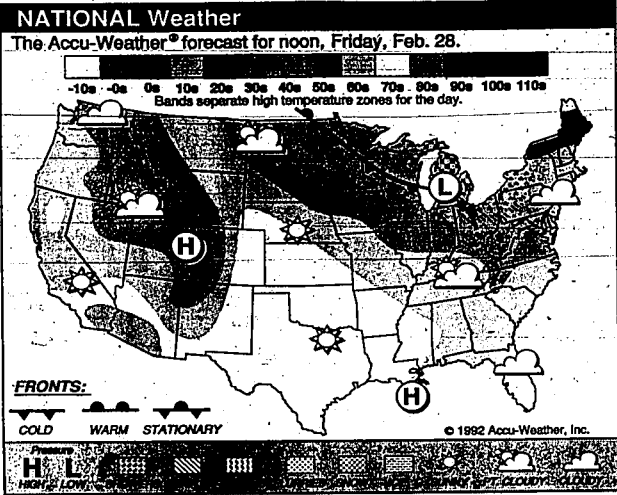

WASHINGTON — If Paul Tsongas winds up in the White House, don't look for Sen. Steve Symms at his inauguration.
The Democratic ex-senator from Massachusetts and his Republican former colleague from Idaho have a history of less-than-amicable relations.
The hard feelings stem from a 1982 hearing of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee of which Tsongas was a member, at which Tsongas ridiculed Symms for introducing a resolution calling for an "offensive" against Cuba.
Tsongas considered the proposal grandstanding.

"This is a good old-fashioned ingoistic resolution that is all talk and no action," Tsongas said derisively after getting Symms to concede that military action against Cuba would be ill-advised.
"The point of the resolution, basically, is to take a very strong anti-Cuba line so that all those members of the Senate who want to go home and say, 'Oh boy, I was really tough,' will have something to vote for," said Tsongas, who was then a freshman senator.

Symms, who was also serving his first term in the Senate, cited a Central Intelligence Agency photo of short-range ballistic missiles displayed in a Cuban military parade to bolster his contention that the Soviets were violating their 1962 pledge not to base offensive weapons in Cuba.
But Tsongas pointed out that the missiles had a maximum range of 20 miles, insufficient to strike the coast of southern Florida, let alone the bulk of the continental

United States.
"You are trying to bring up some technical thing," Symms said, after acknowledging that he did not know anything about the performance characteristics of the missiles.
"The technical thing just happens to be the missiles that were on parade," Tsongas shot back. "I would just say that before I would introduce a resolution, at a minimum I would go to the CIA and ask them what was going on so I would not have to go before a committee and admit that I had not done so."
Symms did not return repeated phone calls seeking comment on his past spat with Tsongas, and a spokesman in Florida, let alone the bulk of the continental

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says a strong ridge of high pressure remained over the Pacific Northwest Thursday. This ridge is expected to drift eastward and slowly weaken today.

Temperature inversions trapped low clouds and fog in the valleys of the north Thursday and locally in the southeast. A weak frontal system will bring a slight change of precipitation to northern Idaho on Saturday.

Sunny skies covered Idaho Thursday afternoon except for areas of low clouds north of the Salmon River. Winds were light and temperatures quite mild.

Afternoon temperatures were in the 50s and 60s except 30s and 40s in the cloudy areas. Extremes varied from 37 degrees at Salmon to 64 degrees at Boise. The 64 degrees at Boise is a new record for this date.

Warm weather prevailed Thursday over the northern portion of the nation, and light snow fell in the Northeast.

Morning temperatures were unseasonably high over parts of the northern Plains and upper Mississippi Valley. Many cities had overnight lows that were as warm or warmer than their normal highs for late February, the National Weather Service said.

Billings, Mont., had a record high for the date of 67, and Casper, Wyo., reached a record 60.

In the Northeast, snow showers extended across northern New York state, northern Vermont and northern Maine. Elsewhere, rain was widely scattered over Arkansas. And light rain extended over parts of the West.

During the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST, there were no reports of one-third of an inch or more of rain, and there were no reports of measurable snowfall, the weather service said.

In Texas, which has had several days of heavy rain, the state Department of Transportation reported Thursday high water still blocked some highways in the eastern part of the state in Navarro-Freestone, Coryell, Bell and Edwards counties. It said numerous rural roads across the state were closed by water.

Thursday's low for the Lower 48 states was 1 below zero at Alamosa, Colo.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EST ranged from 22 at Yellowstone National Park, Wyo., to 87 at Santa Monica, Calif.

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Join push, Bush tells summit-6

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — President Bush and six Latin American leaders concluded a drug summit Thursday with renewed pledges to combat narcotics, but Bush cautioned that "at a time of rather sparse resources" the United States could not give its neighbors all the help they requested.

"These are not easy times for the United States," Bush said at a news conference at the close of the one-day meeting.

Instead Bush and the Latin leaders called on European and Asian countries, singling out Japan in particular, to share in both the financial burden of the war on drugs and to join in cooperative interdiction efforts.

The summit nations will send a delegation, with one member from each country, to visit Europe and Japan and seek bilateral and multilateral agreements on aid and cooperation.

In a Declaration of San Antonio, the participants agreed to a series of steps that for the most part expand upon existing efforts to combat coca production and money laundering, increase training of law enforcement agents and improve the sharing of intelligence.

They also agreed to hold annual high-level follow-up meetings to assess progress in the war on drugs.

Bush called drug trafficking "a new kind of transnational enemy."

"Make no mistake," the president said, "Defeat the traffickers, we will."

"Today's meeting was characterized by total honesty," said President Alberto Fujimori of Peru.

Fujimori has complained that the United States had not provided enough money to help him reverse his country's status as the world's leading grower of coca leaf, the basis for cocaine.

Ecudadorian President Rodrigo Borja said his country currently does not produce coca but it needs more U.S. help "to keep my country from becoming a drug producer."

At a summit-ending news conference, Bush said there had been significant progress during the past two years, saying drug use among young people in the United States was down by 60 percent.

Bush said he and the other leaders had discussed improving efforts to half shipments of drugs from Latin America to the United States and development of alternative crops to give farmers an economic basis for moving away from drugs.

Here's tax bill in brief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here is an overview of the Democratic tax bill passed by the House Thursday:

Size: Tax cuts totaling \$85.4 billion in 1992, though 1997 and later increases of \$93.5 billion. The excess would be used to cut the budget deficit. Prospects: The Senate Finance Committee begins writing a similar bill next week. President Bush has said he will veto any bill containing an income-tax increase, as this one does.

Bush's own short-term plan, which the House rejected, includes a deep reduction in capital-gains taxes; a \$5,000 credit for some homebuyers; incentives for business equipment this year, and special relief for real estate investors.

Individuals: Tax cuts of up to \$200 per wage earner (\$400 for a couple) in 1992 and 1993; 80 percent of workers would get the maximum. New tax credits for students; a new, partially-free Individual Retirement Account withdrawals for home purchase, medical and education expenses; more tax-free home-sale profits for those 55 or older or the disabled. Luxury taxes on expensive yachts, planes, furs and jewels would be repealed; the tax on luxury cars would be eased.

Millionaires would pay a new surtax. Single people with incomes over about \$105,000 and couples over \$185,000 would face a new 35-percent-top tax bracket.

Investors: The maximum tax rate on capital gains would be held at 28 percent, despite the new 35 percent rate on overall income. Newly bought property whose title would be subject to capital-gains tax would be "indexed" adjusted each year so that profits caused by inflation are not taxed. Half of any gain from the sale of new small business stock owned more than five years would be excluded from tax. People who spend at least half their time in real estate could use most of their rental losses to shield wages and other income from tax.

Business: Small business could write off in the year of purchase up to \$25,000 worth of equipment. Any business could get an extra first-year deduction for the price of equipment bought this year after Jan. 31.

These allegations and this publicity," "I'm somewhat relieved that he's retiring because I think if he continued it would have continued to play out in the newspapers," said Brian Hassett, president of the United Way of central Massachusetts, based in Worcester. "I think it was the right thing to do."

Hassett said the allegations had made the charity's work more difficult.

Marian L. Heard, chief executive officer of the United Way of Massachusetts Bay, said Aramony's resignation was probably "prudent," but added, "Bill has been a visionary and a leader and we all have admired what he has done."

At least 21 United Way groups have announced in recent days that they were withholding their voluntary dues from the organization until they get answers to allegations that have been raised in the news media.

The United Way of Magic Valley will decide next week whether to withhold the organization's national dues.

The amounts, usually 1 percent of local collections, ranged from \$3.90 for the Great Douglas United Way in Roseburg, Ore., to \$500,000 for the United Way of the Bay Area in San Francisco.

All figures were not available, but those that were exceeded \$1.7 million.

large employers through July 26, smaller ones until Jan. 26, 1993, but the federal Justice Department "can't conduct an inspection any time it gets a complaint, he said."

A separate section of the law, enforced by the Idaho Human Rights Commission, relates to employment discrimination against the disabled. Even businesses that don't have disabled employees need to be aware of that, Crumrine said.

"Basically it says that not hiring a disabled person because a business can't accommodate him is not a valid reason," he said. "If he's qualified and if he can prove his disabilities were the reason he

wasn't hired, he has grounds for an employment discrimination complaint. The ADA also applies to schools and public facilities; and Twit/Twit City Manager Tom Courtney said Thursday the city is going through a self-assessment.

If changes are needed, they will be figured into capital expenditures in future budgets, he said.

"This is something - that government all over the country are concerned about right now," Courtney said. "Everyone is affected, but I would guess the danger is probably greater for smaller cities that might not have the flexibility to make any changes that are mandated or the money to do it."

Tsongas' national presidential campaign office said Thursday that Tsongas would have no comment on Symms.

Economy of mid-summer could seal president's electoral fate

WASHINGTON (AP) — If you want to be precise, some political scientists say you should know shortly after 8:30 a.m. July 2 who's going to win the election.

That's when the Bureau of Labor Statistics will issue the unemployment rate for June.

If June's rate is lower than January's 7.1 percent, President Bush can relax, fairly confident of renewing his lease on the White House, says Michael Lewis-Beck.

A political scientist at the University of Iowa, Lewis-Beck is a student of the relationship between economic conditions and election results.

Others in the field are not quite so categorical, but they generally agree that the economic tide that

Ohio's Kent State. "If the economy is improving by mid-summer, we expect Bush to win re-election. Then he's got to do something to blow it, it's his to lose."

A mild disclaimer comes from William Mishler, a University of South Carolina political scientist, who sees a four- to eight-month lag between a turnaround in the economy and a broad public sense that better times are at hand.

The economy needs to turn around soon for it to register on public opinion in time for Bush to get a

boost come October or November," Mishler said. "No time is too soon for the economy to turn around for George Bush."

He contends that "if the Democrats nominate an effective spokesperson, he could make a case that the economy is in worse shape than it is, or—in dire straits, even if the indicators suggest otherwise."

"Or, the Republicans could make the case that it is improving, even if the improvement is just a glimmer," he added.

The question could be crucial, because most economists, including those in the Bush White House, expect the early summer to bring a recovery — but only an anemic revival, not the robust growth that usually ends a recession.

Typical is Murray Weidenbaum, head of the Center for the Study of American Business at Washington University in St. Louis and a former adviser to President Ronald Reagan.

He expected a mid-summer recovery to be detectable but weak.

"The economy was weak before we even got into the recession," he commented: Office space still outstrips demand in most cities. And the end of the Cold War means new waves of defense plant layoffs.

Still, by the fall, "people will see that companies are increasing their hiring, production going up, sales going," Weidenbaum said. "It changes the tone. If companies are hiring, you have a more positive attitude."

And, said Mark Tompkins of the University of South Carolina, even if the recession continues during the election season, Bush is still no more than "vulnerable."

"Vulnerable is just that, it may be serious, it may not be," he said; Bush's opponent would still have to persuade voters he can do a better job.

Merrill Lynch, the financial house, noted late last year that real

after-tax income grew by less than 1 percent a year during the first three years of Bush's term.

Based on our economic forecast, real income should grow considerably faster next year than during the final year of the hapless Carter Administration — and more slowly than in 1960, 1968 and 1976 when the incumbent party also lost the presidency," Merrill Lynch said. "If the electorate votes its pocketbook, the election looks like a tossup at this stage."

Of course, other issues play into an election, but these political scientists were convinced the economy will be dominant this time around.

"If Boris Yeltsin were to fall to a group of rightwing crazies who made belligerent noises and the world suddenly looked a lot more dangerous, than the salience of foreign policy might increase," said Mishler. "Something like that would work to Bush's favor to undermine the impact of a lingering stagnant economy."

GOP, Democratic races get nastier by day

The Associated Press Bill Clinton, Bob Kerrey and Paul Tsongas vied to attack one another Thursday in a Democratic presidential race growing testier by the day.

The Bush campaign complained that Patrick Buchanan's television commercials were "disgusting lies." "This isn't a love fest," said Kerrey. And with seven contests and 783 delegates on next Tuesday's Democratic ballots, there was no room for disagreement.

After weeks of an unusually mannerly campaign that did little to establish a front-runner, Kerrey derided Clinton's reasons for not serving in Vietnam as "baloney." Clinton said Tsongas' opposition to a middle class tax cut was "cold-blooded."

And Tsongas went after both his rivals, noting they raised the gas taxes in their states but now were criticizing his call for a similar increase. Clinton, looking for his first win of the primary season, also denied fences with Jesse Jackson after bitterly accusing him of "backstabbing" when he was told erroneously that Jackson had decided to back a Democratic rival. Clinton's comments were picked up by an open microphone and recorded without his knowledge.

The verbal firefights — supplemented by increasingly sharp television ads — came as the five major Democrats girded for next week's primaries in Maryland, Georgia, Colorado and Utah, and caucuses in three other states. The 783 delegates at stake next

week and another 1,287 on March 10 are more than enough to propel one candidate along the path to nomination and doom others to oblivion.

Buchanan, looking to upset Bush in next week's Georgia primary, began airing commercials critical of an IRS ruling that he says would track donations to churches. Another commercial accuses the National Endowment for the Arts of funding "pornographic and blasphemous art too shocking to show," and said "Bush continued to fund" it after people objected.

Bush campaign spokeswoman Torie Clark termed the commercials

service in Vietnam for a second straight day and said the Arkansas governor couldn't win an election against the Republicans.

"I had he wanted to go and serve his country, he could have," said Kerrey, who lost part of his leg in Vietnam. He made his comments in Florida, site of a March 10 primary, but his remarks were also aimed at next door Georgia — where Clinton leads in the polls — and the rest of the southern states voting over the next two weeks.

Clinton received a draft deferment while in college and agreed to join an officer's program. But he later changed his mind about ROTC and received a high lottery number that was never called for the draft.

Clinton had Tsongas in his sights as he sought support for next week's primary in Colorado, where polls show him narrowly trailing his rival. He called the former Massachusetts senator "a candidate of Wall Street" for his pro-business economic policies, noting that Tsongas earned \$200,000 in corporate board fees last year and is a registered lobbyist in Washington.

"I am tired of what is cold-blooded being passed off as 'courage,'" Clinton said, referring to his rival's opposition to a middle-class tax cut. "Tsongas related with what seemed like a reference to the draft controversy: 'Is Bill Clinton now our resident expert on courage?'"

Campaigning in energy-conscious Colorado, Tsongas said the gasoline tax has doubled in Arkansas during Clinton's tenure, and noted the tax rose in Nebraska while Kerrey was governor there.

Tsongas has been hit by his rivals in recent weeks for advocating a phased-in 50 cent-per-gallon gas tax increase. Iowa Sen. Tom Harkin, low on funds, campaigned in Maryland en route to an address to the legislature in Minnesota, where he hopes to win caucuses next week.

'Phantom trees' haunt panel, logging industry

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government loggers and a national forest in Montana are inflamed, based on thousands of acres of "phantom trees" cut years ago but still in Forest Service computers, a mapper for the service said Thursday.

"It's pretty clear what they ended up with in their computer program doesn't resemble what they really have," said LeRoy Lee, who measures and plots trees in the Kootenai National Forest.

In one ranger district near the Idaho and Canada borders, nearly three-fourths of the bureau's clearcut lands are on the books as mature timber, he said.

Lee is a part-time logger and tree planter from Santa, Idaho, who has contracted with the agency to map the forest for about five years.

He presented his map comparisons and aerial photographs Thursday to the House panel that sets the Forest Service's budget and logging targets.

Rep. Sydney Yates, D-Ill., chairman of the Appropriations inflation subcommittee, expressed concern about Lee's findings. "Does that mean there are not as many trees as they say?" Yates asked.

"That's exactly what it means," Lee replied.

A spokesman for the Forest Service regional office in Missoula, Mont., said no one was immediately available to comment. The subcommittee heard from others who alleged similar problems in Idaho's Panhandle National Forest and Washington's Colville National Forest.

Al Isaacson, a scientist who worked 23 years for the Forest Service and now teaches at Washington's "Spokane Community College, said, "Forest plans are a political fantasy, not reality."

"The timber targets on many forests were politically generated due to lobbying pressure from the timber industry," he said.

Congressman says NASA is hiding info

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Michigan congressman is accusing the National Aeronautics and Space Administration of teaching employees how to avoid disclosing controversial information, including resighting documents and destroying them.

Rep. Howard Wolpe, a Democrat, said congressional investigators looking into a program to develop the SP-100 nuclear space reactor, found a 2-page set of instructions on how to deal with the Freedom of Information Act. "This NASA document instructs government employees to 1, rewrite and even destroy documents 'to minimize adverse impact'; 2, mix up documents and camouflage handwriting so that the document's significance would be 'less meaningful'; and 3, take steps to 'enhance the utility' of various FOIA exemptions," Wolpe wrote to NASA administrator Richard Truly.

The document bore no identification other than "director's office" but Wolpe furnished another paper which indicated that it was prepared by Lawrence Ross, director of NASA's Lewis Research Center.

Semanticist S.I. Hayakawa dies

GREENBRAE, Calif. — S.I. Hayakawa, the soft-spoken semantics professor whose dramatic 1968 confrontation with student protesters launched a political career that took him to the U.S. Senate, died Thursday, a hospital spokeswoman said. He was 85.

Marin General Hospital spokeswoman Andrea Kloh said he died about 1 a.m. He had been hospitalized with bronchitis, but she did not have the exact cause of death.

Hayakawa, who lived in nearby Mill Valley, was an internationally known semanticist for nearly three decades.

But his name leaped into the headlines in December 1968 when, on his first day as acting president of San Francisco State College, he scrambled onto a sound truck brought on campus in violation of his rules and yanked the wires from two rooftop speakers to temporarily silence leaders of a student strike.

He retired as president of the college, renamed San Francisco State University, in 1973 and attempted to run for the U.S. Senate the following year.

In recent years, Hayakawa has been active in pushing to make English the official state language and eliminate bilingual education, saying that learning to speak good English is "the most rapid way of getting out of the ghetto."

Shield procedure aids transplants

WASHINGTON — Hearts transplanted between incompatible lab mice can be protected from rejection by a technique that creates a molecular shield against attack from the immune system, a new study shows.

In a work to be published Friday in the Journal Science, researchers report they used two types of laboratory antibodies to prevent the host immune system from recognizing that the transplanted hearts were foreign tissue.

Dr. Mitsuaki Isobe, now with the University of Tokyo, said his research team used two types of laboratory mice that had significantly different immune systems. This means that tissue transplanted from one mouse strain to the other normally would be rejected, just as an immune system would attack and reject an invading bacteria.

Senate defeats line-item veto power

WASHINGTON — The Senate Thursday rejected an effort by conservative Republicans to give President Bush line-item veto authority to ax federal projects he opposes.

The 54-44 vote against the measure followed an impassioned eight-hour speech by Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., defending Congress' power over the purse.

Sponsoring Sens. John McCain, R-Ariz., and Dan Coats, R-Ind., conceded in advance they didn't expect to get the 60 votes needed under a parliamentary procedure to keep their bill alive as part of an unrelated antitrust bill.

But they said a secondary purpose of their effort was to prod Bush into an election-year confrontation with Democrats over "pork-barrel" spending as a way to restore the president's lost credibility among some GOP conservatives.

Pentagon says sub damaged after all

WASHINGTON — Contrary to earlier reports, the U.S. nuclear attack submarine that collided with a Russian sub in the Arctic Ocean was damaged, the Pentagon acknowledged on Thursday.

Two hatches have been found on the vessel's port side ballast tanks, according to Defense Department spokesman Pete Williams.

Williams said the Navy found the damage after sending underwater divers to inspect the vessel, the USS Baton Rouge.

The submarine returned to its home port of Norfolk, Va., on Tuesday, where officials repeated assertions it had not been damaged in its Feb. 11 collision with a Russian vessel.

Health-care spending jumps 10.5%

WASHINGTON — Americans spent \$64.3 billion on health care services in 1990, a 10.5 percent increase over 1989, the Department of Health and Human Services said Thursday.

More than one-third of the spending came from households, which shelled out \$22.7 billion, largely for expenses not covered by insurance, the department said.

Federal, state and local governments spent \$212.9 billion and businesses spent \$186.2 billion on health care, the department said.

Peppard learns tumor not cancerous

LOS ANGELES — George Peppard, who gave up smoking for seven years before picking up a 2-pack-a-day habit a year ago, said he learned this week a small tumor on his right lung wasn't cancerous.

"I am exceedingly grateful that the tumor motivated me to quit smoking immediately, thank God," the actor said Thursday from his home.

Peppard, 63, entered Cedars-Sinai Medical Center as an outpatient on Tuesday for a biopsy after the small tumor was inadvertently discovered on X-rays taken last week during a bout with gastritis in Philadelphia.

Cake decoration would be poisonous

NEW YORK — It may look good enough to eat, but don't. That was the warning Thursday from a book publisher that recalled its "Great Cakes" recipe collection because it suggested decorating the desserts with lilies-of-the-valley.

The petite and fragrant flower is poisonous. Symptoms after ingestion can range from upset stomach to irregular heartbeat and other circulatory problems, said Ballantine Books.

Ballantine said it had received no reports of anyone eating the flowers and becoming sick.

The publisher said it recalled all copies of "Great Cakes" held by wholesalers and bookstores. Consumers who bought the book are asked to cross out the reference to the flower on page 499. Those who wish to return the book for a refund should call 1-800-726-0600.

Desert Storm effort continues

WASHINGTON (AP) — One year after the guns of the Persian Gulf War ceased firing and Kuwaitis began celebrating their liberation, Operation Desert Storm lives on.

The victorious allied coalition has long since dissolved, but American forces in Saudi Arabia are still operating Patriot missile defenses and a potent fleet of stealth fighter and other combat aircraft.

"It's still Desert Storm," said Staff Sgt. Jeff Sammons, a spokesman at U.S. Central Command at McDill Air Force Base, Fla., which is in charge of gulf operations. "And it will be Desert Storm until an undetermined time frame."

Sammons said the Central Command has no timetable for completing a withdrawal from Saudi Arabia. Military officers in Washington said the Bush administration is deliberately keeping fuzzy the question of when it will leave the kingdom.

"We're leaving our options open, and the Saudis are willing to permit that," said one officer familiar with Middle East troop deployment plans. The officer discussed U.S. military involvement there on condition of anonymity.

There are still 24,823 U.S. soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines in the gulf, Sammons said. The wartime peak was 541,000.

Prior to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait in August 1990 the only U.S. armed force stationed in the area was the Middle East Force fleet of about a half dozen ships and 2,000 sailors. It has been in the gulf since the late 1940s.

Pentagon officials have said since the war ended that there was no intent to keep air or ground forces permanently in Saudi Arabia. By April 1 the Army expects to have finished shipping home millions of tons of equipment brought to Saudi Arabia for the ground war.

Yet the continued presence in Saudi Arabia and neighboring gulf states of a sizeable U.S. air armada, probably numbering more than 200 warplanes, belies the public impression left by Bush administration officials last spring that all combat forces would be gone by now.

There are three main reasons for holding up the completion of the U.S. withdrawal, according to U.S. military officers who spoke this week on condition they not be identified:

• Iraqi President Saddam Hussein's continued hold on power and his resistance to complying with United Nations efforts to find and destroy Iraqi ballistic missiles and weapons of mass destruction. The

Bush administration wants to keep alive the option of military force to achieve the U.N. goals.

• The Saudi government's unease about Saddam. The Pentagon last September sent two batteries of Patriot air defense missiles to Saudi Arabia at the Saudis' request. Each battery includes missiles, launchers, radar and fire control units operated by about 690 soldiers.

Continuing U.S. negotiations

with the Saudis on keeping certain military hardware stored permanently in the kingdom. Such "prepositioned" equipment would make it easier for U.S. forces to respond to a future crisis in the gulf.

Originally the Pentagon wanted to store equipment sufficient for a full Army armored division, but one military officer said the focus now was on arranging for storage of equipment for air forces.

Spare parts and other support equipment for U.S. planes — but not the planes themselves — would be kept there permanently if the details could be worked out, he said.

The negotiations are especially delicate due to Saudi sensitivities about having foreign military forces on its soil.

In the meantime, a wide range of U.S. warplanes are operating on the Arabian Peninsula. They include F-15 Strike Eagle attack planes, F-16 Falcon fighters, A-10 Warthog tank killers, E-3 AWACS airborne warning planes, F-117 stealth fighters, U-2 spy planes and EF-111 electronic jammers operated by the Air Force.

The Air Force has 4,608 people in the area, said Sammons of Central Command. Sammons declined to identify specific Air Force or Army units in the area. He also said information about numbers of aircraft could not be released.

The Navy has F/A-18 Hornet attack planes, F-14 Tomcat fighters, EA-6B Prowler electronic jammers and A-6E Intruder attack planes. The Navy's roughly 90 aircraft are accompanying the aircraft carrier USS America off Saudi shores.

The Navy says it has 14,970 sailors on 26 ships in the seas surrounding Saudi Arabia. They include two guided-missile frigates and one destroyer whose crews are intercepting marine traffic to enforce U.N. trade sanctions against Iraq.

Also, the Marine Corps is keeping about 2,100 men aboard five assault ships with AV-8B Harrier attacks jets, transport and attack helicopters, an infantry battalion, an artillery battery and tank and amphibious assault platoons.

Notification of kin ran afoul of technology

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Defense Department official told Congress Thursday that modern communications actually complicated the military's informing families of servicemen killed in battle during the Persian Gulf War.

Friends of those who died used telephones located in distant areas to call home even before the service had begun its official notification process, Millicent Woods told the House Armed Services panel on investigations.

"This, sometimes, resulted in erroneous, unofficial information being

given to families as well as neighbors and friends before the next of kin was officially notified," said Woods, deputy assistant secretary of defense for personnel support, families and education.

But Air Force deputy chief of staff for personnel Lt. Gen. Billy Boles said improved communications also played a positive role.

"As long as there is a telephone, it keeps a lot of honesty in the system," Boles said.

The military's system for notifying next of kin has come under criti-

cism following published reports that the Army delayed informing families of soldiers killed by friendly fire in the war.

Of the 96 soldiers killed and 354 wounded, friendly fire was blamed for 21 deaths and 65 injuries, the Army has said. Among all the services, 35 of the 148 American servicemen who died in the war were killed accidentally by their com-

rades' guns, the Defense Department reported in August.

Last month, a top Army official told the Armed Services panel the service regretted waiting nearly half a year before informing families of soldiers killed by friendly fire.

Officials of the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force who testified Thursday defended the current system, saying it fulfills the goal of notifying families as soon as possible.

Electrical accident kills Marine

QUANTICO, Va. (AP) — Four Marines accidentally touched a power line at the Quantico Marine Corps base, killing one, and injuring the others, authorities said.

The accident occurred Wednesday afternoon while the Marines were putting up a communications antenna in a wooded area of the base, Master Sgt. Marvin Price said.

The four were part of a 60-man unit based at the Infantry School of

Camp Lejeune, N.C. They came to Quantico on Sunday to take part in training, Price said. He identified the dead Marine as Pfc. Jon M. English, 19, of Powder Springs, Ga.

One of the other men was treated at the scene and two were taken to Mary Washington Hospital, Price said.

The accident is under investigation.

Officials: Nuclear experts not likely to leave country

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nuclear scientists who worked in the Soviet weapons program aren't likely to cross the "great moral threshold" required to sell their expertise to Third World countries, senior officials of the Commonwealth of Independent States said Thursday.

"So far, we don't know of a single example" of a nuclear scientist leaving the former Soviet Union, said Yevgeny Avrorin, chief scientist at the Russian nuclear arms complex at Chelyabinsk-70.

"Not only that," he went on, but "we don't know of any proposals being made."

Avrorin was one of several senior CIS officials who met with American scientists to discuss nuclear weapons issues at a seminar sponsored by the Federation of American Scientists and the Natural Resources Defense Council.

One of the officials, Gen. Sergei Zelentsov, said at a news conference that removal of tactical weapons from all former Soviet republics except Belarus and Ukraine is complete.

Zelentsov said the process is running about two months ahead of schedule and should be completed in May.

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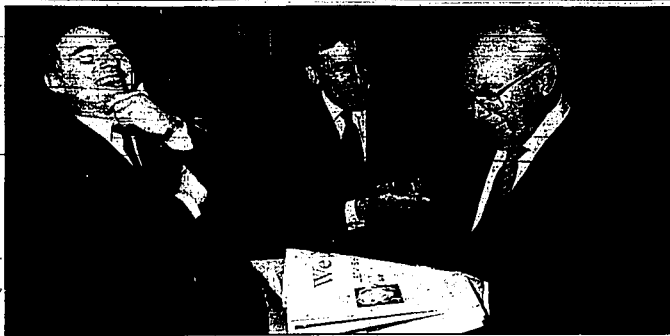

Ukraine, Russia split on forming commonwealth of lawmakers

MOSCOW (AP) — Parliamentary leaders from the commonwealth republics agreed Thursday to coordinate their laws, but Russia and Ukraine split over a proposal to create an assembly of commonwealth lawmakers.

Delegations from 10 of the 11 commonwealth states attended the session to try to improve cooperation in the face of disputes between their leaders over economic and military policy. Uzbekistan did not attend, and its absence was not explained.

Ukraine and Russia, the two main pillars of the commonwealth, have split over military and economic issues, straining the unity and durability of the young association.

Ukraine is creating its own army

and plans to introduce a separate currency. Russian officials say they may also create their own military and may match the new Ukrainian currency with a new Russian ruble.

The legislators debated the one-day meeting's agenda, and some of the nine originally scheduled items were removed at the insistence of individual delegations.

For example, discussion of an "inter-parliamentary assembly" was postponed for a month at Ukraine's insistence so that individual parliaments could consider the idea.

Russia and Kazakhstan have pressed for such a forum because they favor a more centrally controlled commonwealth than Ukraine. The head of Ukraine's delegation, Vasily Durdinez, said

Ukraine favored cooperation through existing parliamentary committees rather than creating a unified body.

Despite the disagreements, delegates at Thursday's session said the meeting was a success.

"There was a spirit of goodwill, of searching and finding agreeable solutions," Durdinez said after the closed-door session.

"It is very easy to slam the door, but we have to leave our former common house in an honorable manner," said the Belarusian delegate, Vasily Sholodovov.

The legislators signed four documents Thursday, including one calling for the states to exchange draft legislation with the goal of coordinating their legal systems.

Shelling shatters alleged cease-fire

MOSCOW (AP) — Shelling by Armenian and Azerbaijani fighters shattered a cease-fire in Nagorno-Karabakh a few hours after it took effect Thursday, and both sides suffered casualties, officials and news reports said.

Armenian President Levon Ter-Petrossian sent a special message to the leaders of 14 countries, including the United States, urging them to dissuade Azerbaijan from forming its own army and to help work out a

peace plan. The brief cease-fire was among the few formal truces achieved in the bloody, 4-year-old confrontation over the mountainous Nagorno-Karabakh, a predominantly Christian Armenian region within Muslim Azerbaijan.

Iran brokered the 72-hour truce, and Foreign Minister Ali Akbar Velayati resumed his mediation when fighting broke out anew.

Iranian interest in the conflict follows its effort, and those by other

Middle Eastern countries, to exercise more influence in Azerbaijan and other mainly Muslim states of Central Asia, which recently gained independence after the collapse of the Soviet Union.

The conflict over Nagorno-Karabakh goes back centuries but flared in 1988 after ethnic Armenians in the enclave began demanding unification with their brethren in Armenia. More than 1,000 people have died in the fighting.

Poor living conditions spur riots

MOSCOW (AP) — Poor food, housing and beatings helped set the stage for riots by hundreds of soldiers at the former Soviet Union's main space center, newspapers said Thursday.

These people were killed in the violence Monday and Tuesday at the Baikonur Cosmodrome, where angry soldiers reportedly looted supplies and burned barracks. The unrest reflects deep problems in the former Soviet army, including falling morale and mistreatment of recruits.

Because the space program was among the Soviet Union's proudest achievements, the riots also were a poignant demonstration of how far — and fast — the country has fallen into disorder.

The rioting at the 37-year-old space center in the barren steppes of central Kazakhstan did not disrupt operations or affect the flight of the Mir space station, where cosmonauts Sergei Krikalev and Alexander Volkov remain in orbit. They are scheduled to return next month.

Krikalev blasted off from Baikonur on May 18 for what was supposed to be a three-month mission, but his return has been delayed by the political and economic turmoil back home.

The riots involved several hundred of the 17,000 soldiers assigned to construction jobs at the cosmodrome, about 1,560 miles southeast of Moscow. Construction troops traditionally are the worst fed, housed and clothed units in the army.

The soldiers stole 17 cars, looted food supplies and warehouses, and burned four barracks, according to the Nezavisimaya Gazeta (Independent Newspaper) and Interfax news agency.

Inside one charred barracks, three bodies were found. Two were identified as Kazakh conscripts, and one remained unidentified Thursday, the reports said.

The spark that set off the rioting was the arrest of a recruit on charges that his fellow soldiers considered unjust, the ITAR-Tass news agency reported. However, "the reasons for what happened go much deeper," the agency said.

Serbian president says Yugoslav civil war over

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — President Slobodan Milosevic of Serbia, who led his republic into a ruinous conflict with Croatia in a failed attempt to hold Yugoslavia together, declared the war over Thursday.

He appeared to be responding to mounting opposition inside Serbia over the war's human and economic toll. Many Serbs have turned against the once popular leader and are demanding his resignation.

"Today we can say that most of the agony in our country is over," and the conditions now exist for the peaceful and democratic solution of the Yugoslav crisis," Milosevic told Serbia's parliament "as a U.N.-mediated truce stretched to nearly two months."

In a rare public speech, Milosevic also seemed to move away from previous insistence that Serb-dominated regions in other republics be united with Serbia. He said Serbia's union with tiny Montenegro in a smaller Yugoslavia was "the best option."

Croat leaders had vowed to fight giving up any territory. The Serb issue also is an explosive one in Bosnia-Herzegovina, which has a diverse mix of Muslim Slavs, Orthodox Serbs and Roman Catholic Croats.

British lawmakers fire back at Australian leader

LONDON (AP) — Legislators fired back at Australian Prime Minister Paul Keating on Thursday, calling him a buffoon, after he accused Britain of abandoning Australia in World War II.

Veterans of Britain's Far East campaign were outraged, but Prime Minister John Major said he'd try to smooth things over.

Queen Elizabeth II, still titular head of state in Australia, maintained her customary silence through the latest salvoes in what is, at the core, a prickly debate over Australia's continuing ties with Britain.

Some Australians want to cut the royal link to Britain and become a republic. Most of the former colonies that made up the British empire recognize the queen only as head of the

loosely associated 50-nation Commonwealth.

Keating, 48, attacked the British war record after opponents in Australia's Parliament accused him of disrespect toward the queen during a visit that ended Wednesday.

Keating had referred to pro-republican sentiment and casually put his arm on the queen's back, while his wife neglected to curtsy.

"I learned about self-respect and self-regard for Australia," said Keating, leader of the Australian Labor Party. "And not about some cultural cringe to a country which decided not to defend the Malay Peninsula and not to worry about Singapore, and not to give us our troops back to keep ourselves free from Japanese domination."

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Industrial ban lifted for women

PARIS (AP) — The French government has agreed to lift a nearly four-decade-old ban on women working industrial jobs at night.

The government announcement on Wednesday was in line with a request from the International Labor Organization, which draws up conventions on labor standards, had adopted the ban in a 1947 convention that was ratified by France in 1953.

In July, the European Court of Justice said the ban conflicted with the principle of equal rights for both sexes.

According to labor union statistics, out of roughly 1 million nighttime workers classified as industrial laborers — mainly factory workers — only 28,000 are women. They obtained exemptions from the ban.

The Edwards brothers are charged with delivery of a controlled substance and possession of a controlled substance, while Espinosa and Estrada are charged with possession of a controlled substance, Crystal said.

The bust was the end result of several months of undercover work by the Cassia County Sheriff's Department, the Magic Valley Drug Task Force and the Idaho Bureau of Narcotics.

Undercover agents arrived at a salvage yard one mile west of Burley where the Edwards brothers were working and brought about 1 gram of cocaine, Crystal said.

During the transaction, Espinosa and Estrada showed up and were also arrested, he said.

A special tactical team was sent in to secure the area because police had information there were weapons inside, but the arrests were made without incident, Crystal said.

With the help of a drug dog, investigators

found about 6 ounces of cocaine, he said. The four cars, the trailer house and the \$5,000 \$6,000 worth of equipment seized in the raid will go through the civil court system and at least part of the stash may go to the financially troubled Magic Valley Drug Task Force.

All seizures are officially the property of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, which handles the legal work in civil court. In most cases, however, the department divides the seized merchandise among the agencies involved in recovering the items.

Jerome deputies look into beating of student

JEROME — The severe beating of a 14-year-old Jerome High School student is being investigated by the Jerome County Sheriff's Department.

Doctors say the boy was struck in the groin with a blunt instrument while at the school the morning of Feb. 18, Jerome County Undersheriff Mito Alonzo said. At least one, and possibly two, other Jerome High School students were involved, Alonzo said. He has spoken to several students and others at the school and is continuing to investigate.

Alonzo said the victim, who is in the ninth grade, received medical treatment for his injuries, but he does not yet know if the boy suffered permanent damage.

The name of the victim and suspects were not released.

Investigation nets drug charges against Twin Falls women

JEROME — A 21-year-old woman was arrested in Jerome Wednesday evening and charged with two felony drug counts. Connie Jo Kucera of Twin Falls was staying with friends in Jerome when she was arrested just before 5 p.m. Wednesday, Capt. Jay Gardner of the Jerome Police Department said.

Kucera was charged with two counts of delivering a controlled substance, and two cars were seized in the bust, Gardner said. The arrest came after two months of investigation by the Magic Valley Drug Task Force, the Jerome Police Department and the Idaho Bureau of Narcotics, he said. Kucera was booked into the Jerome County Jail and held in lieu of \$10,000 bond.

Truck driver aids in arrest of pair after armed robbery

HEYBURN — Two Boise men were arrested after an armed robbery at a gas station near Heyburn Thursday morning.

Gregory Fowler, 23, and Michael Martell, 24, were stopped by an Idaho State Police officer after a truck driver who witnessed the robbery broadcast a description of their car, said Maria Guerrero, a clerk for the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office.

Two men wearing ski masks displayed a small pocket knife and a baseball bat when they took \$273 from the Hub 66 Service Station on Idaho Highway 27, Galindo said.

The two men left in a car at around 2 a.m. Thursday, and the ISP officer stopped Fowler and Martell headed west on Interstate 84 a few minutes later, she said. Both men were charged with robbery and taken to the Mini-Cassia Jail in Burley, she said.

Twin Falls police investigate vandalism inside high school

TWIN FALLS — When officers investigated an open door at Twin Falls High School early Thursday morning, they didn't see any burglars, but they "took all sorts of things," she said.

Desks and chairs were piled high in the hallway leading to the gymnasium. An old car, jacked up and bereft of tires, also blocked the hall. Scattered on the floor were large amounts of bird seed, dog food and potato chips.

According to a Twin Falls police officer, Bob Heister, he talked to a handful of youngsters near the high school some time earlier, and when he contacted them again, they confessed to the prank.

They called their comrades, and soon there were 17 suspects — seniors aged 17 and 18 — at the high school. All cleaning up High School Principal Carl Snow agreed not to press charges if the kids would clean up and pay for the damage, estimated at \$200, according to the report.

Jerome cheese plant seeks variance for height of walls

JEROME — The walls are going up for the Jerome Cheese Co., but a variance approval will be required before the plant can be completed.

According to city regulations, a structure cannot exceed a 35-foot height limit. Plans for the cheese plant exceed that limit.

A special meeting of both the city and county planning and zoning commissions will be held March 5 at 7:30 p.m. at the Jerome City Hall to make a decision on a request from the company for a variance to the regulation.

The main building is designed to reach 40-foot height, and a mechanical tower and milk storage tanks will be 95 feet high. When completed, the tower and tanks will be the tallest buildings in the city, Clay Davis, city building inspector said.

The plant will be located in the county, but within the city limits. The location requires approval from both the city and county commissions.

As position changes, U.S. must learn compromise, Carey-born economist says

TWIN FALLS — Alas, the United States is becoming more normal.

It's our fault. For decades after World War II, we helped other nations develop capitalism and fought communism tooth and nail. We won, for the most part.

But now we're suffering the consequences, a political economist told a Twin Falls audience Thursday night.

"The United States is starting to feel it is a more-normal nation," not the world's preeminent economic and military power, Carolyn Rhodes said. "It's coming back to

haunt us, even though it was what we wanted."

Rhodes spoke about diplomatic struggles, and economic and military battles in a sort of a homecoming. Now a specialist in international trade, she was born in Carey to a ranching and farming family and graduated from Twin Falls High School.

She completed her education with a doctorate in political science from Brandeis University. On Thursday, she completed the College of Southern Idaho's Snake River Symposium speech series.

Her scenario of how the United States developed normalcy goes like this:

America after World War II chased a two-part strategy to fight communism: Build up an intimidating military and surround communist states with strong capitalist economies so communism wouldn't tempt those people.

In the Pacific Rim, Europe and — yes — the Soviet Union, the strategy worked. Europe and Japan have strong economies, and partly because of sky-high military spending to counter the U.S. war machine, the Soviet Union collapsed.

Meanwhile, the United States spent itself into a hole. Over the last 12 years, the

'Amanda group' may finish work in March

"We're not just looking into this case, but into how the department handles all

child protection cases," he said.

Amanda Hostetler was found dead at her home Jan. 20. Her mother, Jodie Ann Hostetler, faces two felony child abuse counts and the man living with her, Donnell "Bud" Stradley, is charged with murder.

Police said after Stradley's arrest that Health and Welfare officials had visited Amanda's home four times but found

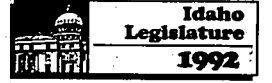

'Haunted house' bill reappears

BOISE — They're baa-ack. For the second year in a row, the Idaho Association of Retailers appeared before a House committee to push a bill that would allow real-estate sellers not to tell potential buyers that a property was "psychologically impacted."

Derisively dubbed the "haunted house bill" last session, the measure received a spirited defense Thursday by Rep. Freeman Duncan, R-Coeur d'Alene, an attorney specializing in real-estate law.

"This is serious," Duncan said after describing the impact the bill would have. "There's nothing funny about what I just told you."

The House Commerce, Industry and Tourism committee demonstrated its grave concern by forwarding the bill to the full House.

The issue behind the puns is whether sellers should have to tell potential buyers of a house or other property whether an event had occurred in the property's history that might reduce its resale value.

Many people wouldn't be bothered about moving into a house where someone had been murdered or had committed suicide, said Mark Dunham of the Idaho Association of Retailers. Those who would mind, he said, should have to ask specifically if the property was psychologically impacted.

The bill defines that term as being the site of a homicide, other felony or suicide, or if a previous occupant had been infected with the virus that causes AIDS.

In 1983, a California court ruled that sellers has to disclose any such psychological impacts to buyers. Since then, California and 19 other states have passed laws making such disclosure voluntary.

The bill Dunham and Duncan presented Thursday would do the same, although they said that if a buyer specifically asks whether a property had any psychological impacts, the seller or his client will have to either disclose them or decline to answer.

"That would tell you something had happened," Dunham said.

The only committee member to vote against the bill was Rep. John Alexander, D-Pocatello. Alexander said he sympathized with the idea behind the bill, but thought disclosure of psychological impact should be mandatory.

Otherwise, he said, an unwary buyer could purchase a property with an unsavory history, discover that history and decide to sell and find that no one wanted his house. "We're setting potential purchasers up for a fall," Alexander said. "They'll be stuck with a monetary asset they can't get a return on."

Counties make it official, form solid-waste district

TWIN FALLS — Call it a trashy relationship, but six Magic Valley counties decided to make it formal Thursday.

The counties — Twin Falls, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, Cassia and Blaine — signed an agreement to form a solid waste district. The moment was two years in the making.

"I kind of think this is exciting we've gotten this far," said Blaine County Commissioner Tom Blanchard as he and commissioners from the other counties signed the agreement.

"It's hard to get six or seven counties working together," he said.

New federal rules about landfills forced the counties to work together. The rules will make putting garbage in landfills much more expensive, so the counties decided to build one regional landfill for all their trash.

To build the landfill and pay for it, the counties had to form a legal entity. Gooding County has not joined the other counties in the regional solid waste plan, but is considering doing so.

The county would like to place the regional landfill near Hansen. At an information meeting Wednesday night, Hansen-area residents voiced concerns about the plan. Traffic, smell, litter and the threat to groundwater were some of those

George Hansen Ready In 2 weeks

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP)—Former Idaho Congressman George Hansen told a federal bankruptcy judge that in two weeks he would be able to begin repaying friends and associates who sunk \$19.5 million into his mansuaking schemes.

But in a hallway conversation Wednesday with the bankruptcy court trustee, Hansen said he might have to convert his Chapter 11 bankruptcy petition to Chapter 7, which would require him to liquidate assets.

Under Chapter 11, Hansen would be allowed to control his assets

while he pays his debts.

Judge Douglas O. Tice agreed to postpone consideration of Hansen's repayment plan until March 11. Hansen filed for bankruptcy 10 months ago.

According to court documents, Hansen plans to make quarterly payments for more than three years to more than 180 Idaho potato farmers and others who invested in his conservative political projects, among them an organization whose purpose was to abolish the Internal Revenue Service.

Hansen, who served nearly a year

in prison in 1987 for falsifying his financial reports to Congress, has said he plans to repay his debt by selling a printing business in Pocatello listed under the name of his wife, Constance, and by using proceeds from a multimillion-dollar consulting contract with a pair of unidentified clients.

Bankruptcy Trustee Jack Frankel said in November he was concerned the arrangement "was not feasible," according to court documents.

In a hallway conversation with the court, Hansen asked Frankel not to transfer the case to Boise.

Frankel had asked Hansen's permission to move the case at the request of a number of his creditors — described by Frankel as being "friends and not-so-friendly."

"It's convenient for some people for me to be in Idaho," Hansen replied. "It's not convenient for some."

Hansen also told Frankel that moving the case across country would "disrupt" his lawyer's ability to represent him.

But George Biondi, who was appointed to the case, has asked the court to let him step down on

grounds Hansen probably will never be able to pay him the \$7,100 he owes in legal bills.

Inside the courtroom, Hansen told Judge Tice he would agree to move the case to Idaho if his case is reclassified as Chapter 7.

But he and Biondi were leaving the courthouse, they downplayed talk of a possible transfer.

"They're always moving to convert or dismiss. It keeps your feet to the fire," Biondi said.

"They like to get rid of all the work they can," Hansen added.

Lawmakers like reapportionment plan

BOISE — Don't hold your breath, but the Idaho Legislature may finally have devised a bipartisan redistricting plan.

No, really, they mean it this time.

Democratic and Republican leaders in the House and Senate said late Thursday that a compromise plan reported out of committee just two days ago enjoys enough bipartisan support that both chambers could pass it today.

"It'll be supported good," said House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee. Asked if that meant a majority of the 56 Republicans in the House would vote for the plan, Boyd replied, "You betcha."

"We don't have unanimity, but we do have a majority," said House Minority Leader Jim Stoicheff, D-Sandpoint, of his 28-person caucus.

The House is scheduled to vote on the 35-district plan this morning. Assuming it passes with strong support from both sides of the aisle, Senate President Pro Tem Mike Crapo said, the Senate would move to suspend rules and vote on the bill immediately.

"We'll run it over here as soon as we can," said Crapo, R-Idaho Falls.

Bipartisan support would be needed to suspend the Senate's normal rules to permit immediate consideration of the bill. Twenty-eight senators — two-thirds of the Senate's 42 members — would have to agree to suspend the rules, and the Senate is split 21-21 between Democrats and Republicans.

But Crapo said he was confident that a strongly bipartisan House vote would be mirrored in the Senate, and Senate Democratic Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston said that between half and two-thirds of his caucus would support the plan.

The only other redistricting plan to pass both chambers did so without a single Democratic vote. It surprised no one when Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed it two weeks ago.

At that time, and again earlier this week, Andrus said he would sign non-redistricting bills that were not supported by a majority of both caucuses in both chambers.

But Thursday, both Sweeney and Stoicheff said they would recommend to Andrus that he sign the bill, should it reach his desk.

The sudden flurry of redistricting activity comes three days before 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse is scheduled to begin his own redistricting hearings.

Newhouse will impose a plan unless the Legislature passes one first and Andrus signs it into law.

The breakthrough came, Boyd said, when Republicans agreed on a Democratic plan — for dividing Bannock County. Disputes among Pocatello-area legislators over Bannock have largely been responsible for the redistricting snail.

"The areas that were heavily



Democratic were drawn by Democrats, the areas that were Republican were drawn by Republicans, and they compromised in the areas that were mixed," Stoicheff said.

Boyd said Republicans aren't especially happy about how the plan divides Pocatello and Bannock County, but the leadership decided that it was more important to try one more time for a bipartisan solution.

That, essentially, meant abandoning Rep. Evan Frasure, the only Republican legislator from Bannock County. Frasure had led efforts to draw a Republican district in Bannock.

"Somebody just has to realize that he's not going to get everything he wants," Boyd said.

Sweeney indicated that Senate Democrats would drop their complaints, that previous 35-district plans have created population-heavy districts in north Idaho, where Democrats are strong, and population-light districts in the south and east, which is largely Republican.

Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, who served on the interim redistricting committee last year, said interest in fixing a solution revived in recent days, as lawmakers realized that Newhouse is likely to favor a 30-district, incumbent-unfriendly plan. More than a dozen proposed plans have been filed with the judge by various interested parties.

Jones said the compromise plan, which creates five Magic Valley districts, is quite similar to the original "Magic Valley plan" he and Rep. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, created last fall.

"I think you'll see it pass with substantial majorities in both caucuses," he said.

At the same time as support for a 1990s redistricting plan was coming together, a House panel was taking steps to remove the Legislature from the redistricting process come the 2000 census.

The House State Affairs voted to introduce, sight unseen, a constitutional amendment establishing an independent five-member redistricting commission.

The House and Senate leaders from both major parties would appoint one retired judge and one other citizen to the commission. Those four members would then appoint a fifth, who would also be a retired judge.

The commission would have to file a plan within three months of receiving the necessary census data, said Rep. Judi Danielson, R-Rouillon. Any legal challenges to the plan would go directly to the state Supreme Court.

That amendment, and an accompanying statute, join a similar proposed amendment passed by the Senate earlier this week.

Hearing planned on land swap near Baldy

HAILEY — The Idaho Land Board has scheduled a March 19 public hearing on land exchange proposals affecting 680 acres of state land at the southeast base of Bald Mountain.

The hearing will take place at 7 p.m. in the conference room at the Blaine County Courthouse in Hailey.

Several land-swap proposals have been suggested for the state land located in Clear Creek Canyon two miles south of Ketchum, including a three-way land exchange involving private landowner Heidi Baldwin, the state and the Forest Service.

Baldwin has offered to trade her Puritan and Crown Point mining claims in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area for 16 to 20 acres of the state land at the base of Bald Mountain.

The state, in turn, would swap the mining claims for Forest Service land in the Lime Creek area west of Fairfield.

Baldwin's trade proposal, which

is sponsored by Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa, was considered by the land board at its Jan. 14 meeting. A decision on the offer was tabled until after public hearings could be held in Blaine County and Boise.

The hearing in Boise has not yet been scheduled.

Another offer before the board is an exchange with the Bureau of Land Management. The federal agency manages lands adjoining the state parcels and has signed a conceptual agreement with the state to trade for BLM land elsewhere in Idaho.

In addition to Cenarrusa, the Land Board members who will decide on the issue include Gov. Cecil Andrus, Attorney General Larry Echo Hawk, State Auditor J.D. Williams and Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans.

The Idaho Department of Lands, in announcing the March 19 public hearing, quoted the Idaho Constitution's charge that state lands be managed "in such manner as will secure the maximum long-term financial return for the state's public school endowment."

Federal government sends Idaho funds for rural development

BOISE (AP) — The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has allocated Idaho \$7.5 million for rural development programs this year.

The 1992 appropriation, through

the Idaho Department of Commerce's Community Development Block Grant, program is \$400,000 more than last year. The money is earmarked for improvements to local sewer and water systems.

Ex-Blaine drug court to face DUI charge

HAILEY — A charge of driving under the influence of alcohol will be filed today against the former head of the Blaine County Drug Task Force, a prosecutor says.

The Idaho attorney general's office has been investigating the case involving Blair Hawkins of Twin Falls for several weeks, and the misdemeanor charge will be filed in 5th District Magistrate Court in Hailey today, said Fritz Haemmerle, Blaine County chief deputy prosecutor.

Hawkins, 28, was stopped in Hailey the morning of Dec. 14, not long after being driven to his motel room following a Christmas party, according to a statement released by Blaine County Sheriff Walt Fleming in December.

The case was handled by the Idaho attorney general's office to avoid any conflict of interest, according to Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williamson.

Hawkins headed the Blaine County task force from September

1990 until resigning near the time of the traffic stop that began the DUI investigation.

Hawkins later was hired as a reserve deputy in Jerome County. Efforts to reach Hawkins since the traffic stop have been unsuccessful, although Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold said Hawkins' resignation was not tied to the drunk driving investigations.

Gold said Hawkins was suspended from his Jerome County job Tuesday after Gold learned the criminal charge would be filed.

He will remain on suspension until the case is resolved, Gold said.

Judge gets 2nd chance

It's usual that a judge gets a second crack at a crook, but Neil Walter made the most of it this week.

Walter, a 1st District magistrate from Wallace, on Tuesday sentenced Richard Timken to six months in jail, a year and a half after he first sentenced Timken to three months in jail for the same crime.

Timken was convicted in July 1990 of shooting and injuring a couple he says he mistook for black bears.

He appealed the sentence because state law bars a judge from imposing both a fine and a jail term for injuring a person with a firearm.

He won that appeal, but much to his dismay his case was sent back to Walter.

As a result, Timken - recently convicted of shooting a fake deer that had been set up by Idaho Fish and Game officers in a crackdown on illegal hunting - won't get a chance to improve his aim when he gets out of jail.

Along with his freedom, he's lost his hunting license for 11 years. Bull's-eye, your honor.

Mum's the word on sex

The speak-no-evil approach to sex education has taken an astonishing turn for the silly in Couer d'Alene.

Under a program adopted by the Couer d'Alene School Board Tuesday, if students ask their sex-education teachers about contraceptives or homosexuality, they'll be referred to the dictionary.

If Webster's doesn't have the answers, they'll be referred to their parents.

The board last month approved use of the abstinence-based curriculum provided by the group Teen Aid, headquartered in Spokane, Wash.

Teen Aid national director LeAnna

Benn said instruction about birth control methods doesn't fit in the Teen Aid curriculum. By giving students options, teachers inadvertently condone sexual behavior, she said.

It hasn't occurred to her, we suppose, that they also might be preventing a kid from getting pregnant or contracting AIDS.

You could look it up.

Shut up and cut the trees

For those who think the Forest Service's ham-handed treatment of Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman two years ago was an aberration, Al Isaacson provided a wake-up call this week.

Isaacson, a scientist who worked 23 years for the Forest Service, said Wednesday he was forced out of his job in 1986 because he complained that excessive logging was damaging water quality in Idaho's Panhandle.

Isaacson was ordered transferred to Atlanta in June 1986, but he resigned instead. "Environmental laws were not taken seriously if they stood in the way of (logging) targets," said Isaacson, who now teaches hydrology at Spokane Community College.

John McCormick, the former special agent in charge of Forest Service whistleblower complaints, told a congressional subcommittee recently of attempts to circumvent the laws, improper political pressure to maximize logging and reprisals against those who stood up for their scientific ethics.

And only last year, Idaho Sen. Larry Craig browbeat the agency into transferring Regional Forester John Mumma because Mumma wouldn't agree to let loggers cut trees fast enough.

Multiple use is one thing, but it's another to alter the concept and squelch those who dissent.



It's time self-esteem overtakes surgery

Week after week in an upscale magazine—a lovely model in a wispy, next-to-nothing tiddly looks out from an ad and purrs, "I used to be that if you looked in the mirror and saw something you didn't like, you had to live with it."

"Thankfully, those days are over. Today, correcting a nose, wrinkles, breasts or other features that make you unhappy is easier than ever."

Another surgeon's ad ticks off the timetable for what should be done: eyelids first, "your introduction to cosmetic surgery." Then in your 40s — perhaps later if you have good bones — a facelift because "gravity takes its toll." And, reassuringly, "I've had patients in their 70s and 80s. It's never too late to feel better about how you look."

A third ad offers to redo faces, eyelids, necks, foreheads and more, to "expose the inner you."

But such persuasions should raise questions that have gone unasked in the current imbroglio over silicone gel breast implants. It has just been taken for granted that of course women have a right to the bra size of their choice and to the surgery that would produce it if nature didn't.

What's rarely questioned — either by those who claim they suffer painful and chronic adverse effects from leaking silicone or by those who say their lives have been enhanced by their expanded chests — is why they feel they must match some artificial standard of beauty to feel good about themselves.

About 80 percent of the estimated million or more women who have breast implants underwent the surgery to improve their appearance, to bring their body into a closer match with some idealized set of measurements.

The women's movement was supposed to liberate women from trying to look like Barbie dolls and feeling inadequate and ugly when they inevitably failed.

All those stacks of books about self-

esteem were intended to free women from judging themselves like beauty contestants parading around in swimsuits and from hating themselves for not measuring up to 36-24-36. We were supposed to be strong and self-confident enough not to let someone else tell us our bodies needed to be "corrected."

But obviously, the idea hasn't worked for millions of women — those who willingly submit to serious surgery and those who are made to feel that their failure to attain Barbie-bimbo proportions subtracts from their total worth.

Cosmetic surgery should be a woman's personal choice, of course, assuming she can be told with reasonable accuracy what the risks and costs really are. But the reasons why she feels less acceptable without such drastic alterations of her body should not continue to go unchallenged.

The real question is why so many women are still accepting, consciously or subconsciously, a standard of physical appearance and agelessness impossible for most of us, even with the help of a surgeon's scalpel. We still let ourselves be spun up to feel bad about what we see in the mirror and still internalize the sexist values that see us first of all as a 36C or a 38B.

Perhaps the current controversy over silicone gel breast implants can move beyond the proposed changes in Food and Drug Administration regulations into broader concerns about conformity to stereotypes about female anatomy.

As the FDA advisory panel made clear, women contemplating having breast implants cannot rely on available information to inform them of possible risks and adverse effects. Adequate data do not exist, even though such devices have been used for 30 years.

No one can say for sure what percentage of women choosing silicone implants will

experience unpleasant hardening of the breasts, or whether individual factors in the patient, the surgical technique or the brand of implant influence such results.

No one can be sure how long an implant will last. The FDA panel did report that recipients should expect the devices to need replacing, perhaps several times over a lifetime.

No one can tell a patient how great a risk she is running that her implant will leak. Or that the silicone could, perhaps, trigger autoimmune responses and serious chronic ailments, as some recipients are charging.

No one can tell women who now have silicone implants how much danger they continue to face if they leave them in place, as the panel now advises most women who now have them.

What the FDA panel now recommends is using women seeking silicone implants as guinea pigs to try to learn some of these necessary answers.

If the FDA adopts its panel's recommendations, women who want the devices after cancer surgery or because of deformity could choose to have them — provided manufacturers keep them on the market in the face of growing risks of lawsuits. But these women would have to enroll in long-term scientific studies of the results. Women who want silicone implants for cosmetic reasons could have them only if they were able to participate in a research study.

Meanwhile, TV talk show host Jenny Jones has made a valuable contribution to the controversy. Her original silicone implants have had to be replaced five times, her hardened breasts have no feeling and doctors say the silicone leakage cannot be removed.

"Learn-to-love yourself," Jones told People magazine. "If I could have learned that, I wouldn't have had to suffer these 11 years of torture."

We need some new people working for us that are for the

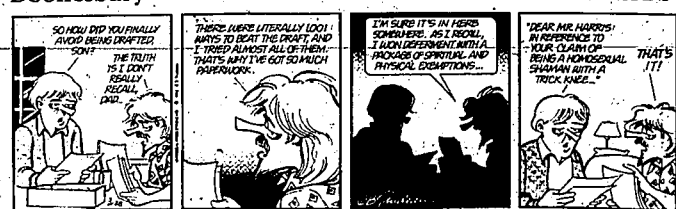

River test to aid salmon won't draw opposition

LEWISTON (AP) — Port officials won't try to stop a test to draw down two Snake River reservoirs scheduled to begin Sunday in southeastern Washington.

"The timing for legal action just isn't right," Port of Lewiston Manager F. Ronn McMurray told reporters Thursday. The port had intended to seek an injunction against the unprecedented experiment.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers plans a month-long lowering of the reservoirs behind Lower Granite and Little Goose dams to test whether increased river flow will reduce losses of rare Snake River salmon by helping them get to the ocean faster.

Lewiston, Idaho's only seaport, is about 35 miles upstream from Lower Granite Dam. Port officials have predicted the month-long loss of their slackwater pool will cause an

economic catastrophe by leaving the water too low for barges to operate.

But rather than debate the potential loss of shipping revenues, port officials criticized the adequacy of the corps' 1,200-page environmental impact statement.

The environmental report lacked biological and scientific specifics, the port officials said. They handed out letters and reports from scientists and consultants which questioned the corps' conclusions for justifying the drawdown.

Lt. Col. Robert D. Volz, commander of the corps' Walla Walla District, said the test will provide environmental and engineering data for possible use in the future, when marginalization of more Columbia and Snake river dam reservoirs might be needed to save declining salmon stocks.

Beginning Sunday, the Lower Granite reservoir will be lowered 2

feet a day while scientists from a number of federal and state agencies watch wildlife, embankments and the dam's hydropower turbines, which are not designed to operate efficiently at lowered levels.

After the pool is drawn down at least 27 feet below the minimum operating level, Little Goose reservoir will be drafted about 15 feet, Volz said.

Water will be passed both over spillways and through turbines, resulting in the loss of \$2 million to \$3 million worth of power, Volz said.

The test will cost the government an additional \$2 million to \$3 million, he said. That does not include any possible damage claims by property owners or jurisdictions affected by the drawdown, he said.

Scientists will be checking for the buildup of gases such as nitrogen, in the rolling waters below the spillways. Too much nitrogen in the water robs fish of oxygen and they die.

Last-minute vehicle registration renewals cause difficulties

BOISE (AP) — People waiting for the last minute to renew their vehicle registrations are causing problems for county licensing offices and customers, the Idaho Transportation Department says.

Herb Kinsey, the department's registration services manager, said putting off renewals until the last day of the month puts too much demand on the state's automatic processing system and causes breakdowns.

The Transportation Department is installing equipment with more capacity and developing more efficient computer software to help solve the problem, but that's still 18-months from completion, Kinsey said.

Senate endorses water legislation

BOISE (AP) — Legislation modifying the Water Resources Board's updated comprehensive state water plan has cleared the Idaho Senate.

The bill, endorsed on a 26-15 vote Thursday, must be approved by the House before March 6 and signed by Gov. Cecil Andrus. If not, the original board proposal becomes policy for the next five years.

The changes to the proposed plan, drafted by Senate Resources and Environment Chairman Laird Noh of Kimberly, temper the movement toward elevating instream water uses to the same level as traditional consumptive uses.

"Water policy evolves over time, and there is a general movement in this state and this

nation to recognize uses of water other than the traditional beneficial uses," Noh said. "This slows down a middle-of-the-road change."

Eliminated is the plan's clause encouraging retention of water right priority dates when a consumptive use is converted to an instream use.

The bill also modifies the provision that emphasizes on conservation of surface water include consideration of the impact on critical groundwater levels. The modification was added in light of the campaign to revive dwindling Northwest salmon runs.

Rock crashes into home of NAACP leader

—BOISE (AP) — The Ada County sheriff's office is investigating what appears to be a racially motivated vandalism early Thursday at the home of the president of the local chapter of the NAACP.

Bertha Edwards, who heads the Boise chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said a rock came crashing through a bedroom window about 2:30 a.m.

Sheriff Vaughn Killeen said she was awakened by her dog prior to the incident and had gotten out of bed to let the dog out. A suspect vehicle fled on Hilltop.

The rock was painted with racial statements, including swastikas, the sheriff said, and had a threatening note attached.

Killeen said he won't release the exact writing on the rock and note for investigatory reasons, but they included racially derogatory terms.

Malicious harassment for racial reasons is a hate crime.

Heavy fog causes multiple collisions

POCATELLO (AP) — A 25-mile stretch of Interstate 86 between American Falls and Pocatello was closed for more than four hours when heavy fog led to accidents involving about 30 vehicles, authorities said.

No deaths or serious injuries were reported as a result of the pileups that began shortly after 7:30 a.m. Thursday near the Pocatello airport, Idaho State Police said.

The freeway was reopened after the fog lifted shortly after noon.

Police and rescue personnel were confused and frustrated trying to penetrate the thick fog. At least one

ambulance had to remain outside the area on standby because officials were afraid it would become another casualty, said Barry Edwards of the Pocatello Fire Department.

A temperature inversion and steam from the nearby J.R. Simplot Co. phosphate fertilizer and FMC Corp. elemental phosphorus plants contributed to the fog, said Dan Keims of the National Weather Service at the airport.

"We're sitting out here in the soup," Keims said.

"It was so thick out here you couldn't even see three feet in front of you," said Dave Olsen of Jerome,

whose compact pickup rear-ended a semi-tanker that was stopped on the freeway.

Tom Bernasek, resident manager at the FMC plant, said the low visibility was due more to naturally occurring dense fog than emissions from the plant.

"This is one of the worst fogs I've seen in my many years of history here," Bernasek said. He conceded that the FMC stacks contributed to the fog, but said they did not create the general conditions.

"That had nothing to do with us," he said.

Cocaine raid brings charges against 3

POCATELLO (AP) — Some prominent Pocatello business people are suspected of being co-conspirators in a continuing investigation of a local drug trafficking operation, a federal prosecutor says.

And at least one business may have reported \$1,000 cash and a laptop computer as stolen when the merchandise actually was used as a "drug payback," Monie Stiles, deputy U.S. attorney, said Wednesday.

Three Pocatello men — twin brothers Dwayne Keith Fitzen and

Wayne Rodney Heim, 43, and John Andros, 38 — were arrested Tuesday as part of a drug raid that netted federal, state and local drug agents some \$200,000 in cocaine.

Fitzen and Heim were separated at birth and raised by different families.

Stiles said a local attorney tipped off the alleged drug dealers that they were under federal investigation.

He made the comments during a detention hearing for Fitzen and Heim before U.S. Magistrate Steve Dunn. Fitzen waived his right to a

hearing but Heim asked for a hearing to determine whether the government had enough cause to hold him without bond.

Dunn refused to release Heim, ruling that court-appointed defense attorney Steve Richert had not convinced him Heim's release posed no threat to the community.

Fitzen and Heim each face a federal charge of conspiracy to distribute or possess more than five kilograms of cocaine. Fitzen also is charged with four counts of distribution of cocaine.

The men face a May 5 jury trial.

Buy Idaho sees attitude change

BOISE (AP) — The new director of Buy Idaho Inc. says a decision last month by Los Angeles County officials to cancel a \$122 million contract with a Japanese company underscores changing attitudes among Americans.

"That really brought to a head the American feeling of buying in our own country," Alan Fitzgerald said Wednesday. "There was a real strong statement made there and the commissioners of LA County heard it real well."

Fitzgerald took over leadership of Buy Idaho on Jan. 23, the day after the Los Angeles County Transportation Commission overturned its decision to award Sumitomo Corp. of America a contract to build 41 driverless, automated rail cars.

Sumitomo had bid \$5.5 million more than Boise-based Morrison Knudsen Corp., which had promised to use more American workers on the project. The commission bowed to pressure from unions and the public to keep jobs and funding at home.

Musical trip back in time

De Organographia performs sounds from past centuries

TWIN FALLS — Most of the children had never heard of a citole or a vielle, but they were thrilled by the sounds. Those sounds were provided by Gayle and Philip Nuemann and Amalie Sorensen, who will unveil their ancient instruments on stage for a community concert tonight.

The Neumanns and Sorensen are an early music ensemble. They call themselves De Organographia, a word which refers to "the German book on instruments." The performers are also music historians, and they build the medieval and Renaissance instruments on which they perform. Thanks, in part, to a grant from the Idaho Commission on the Arts, De Organographia has been visiting area elementary schools this week.

"How many of you have ever played a recorder?" the performers asked the children at Bickel Elementary School. Nearly every hand shot into the air.

"Who can name a modern woodwind instrument?" The voices rang out, "Flute! Bassoon!" The performers were impressed.

De Organographia went on to play and sing songs written hundreds of years ago, on guitar-like instruments played with feathers and on a huge bass recorder that the children thought resembled a baseball bat. The musicians brought 30 instruments with them on the Twin Falls trip.

The Neumanns, both 37, and Sorensen, 25, began building woodwind instruments to make money when

Set designer aims for feel of 'another world'

"My first sketches had windows in the buildings. I learned they didn't have glass in the 1500s," Hale said. "The buildings had shutters which they opened during the day and closed at night. They didn't use much wood, only for the doors and shutters; everything else was stone."

Hale said he modified the use of stone and used more stucco in the set because of empathy for the two women, RaeDean Morrison and Janet Burch, who have spent countless hours painting his design. "One of the backdrops is a 'bedchamber' backdrop. I know that was a real budget to paint."

The goal (in set design) is to totally control the visual environment. I think people will be transported. I want them to feel in another world," Hale said.

When Hale agreed to volunteer as the set designer, the first thing he asked for was a script. He dissected the script and made an outline and a list of what was needed in

each scene. Next, he did conceptual sketches which he calls "quick and-dirties" to get a feeling for the play.

Then, he went to the drawing board to do the mechanical drafting so construction of the set could begin. "You always have physical constraints with the building. This show called for seven or eight backdrops, but there is no fly (storage) above the stage. We reduced the number of backdrops to four and used irrigation pipe to roll them up so above the stage," he explained.

The final step in set design is the painters' elevations, full-color scaled drawings of the finished set. Hale did the set design for the "Nutcracker" production, which is staged every Christmas in Buhl.

"I'll never forget the feeling at the 'Nutcracker' with the first scene change on the first night. We heard audible gasps," he said. Please see HALE/B2

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Grammys extend record of safety first

Want a sure thing in next year's Grammy competition?
Team Natalie Cole and Bonnie Raitt on an album and have Quincy Jones produce it.

Or don't you think there is a pattern to the voting of the 1,000 members of the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences when you see that those three artists have won 16 Grammys in the last three years?

That's more than James Brown, Bob Dylan, Jimi Hendrix and John Lennon won together during the previous 30 years. And those four names weren't just picked at random. Brown, Dylan, Hendrix and Lennon were honored with lifetime-achievement awards in the last two years by the academy, which sponsors the annual Grammy competition.

How embarrassing it must be year after year to keep handing out lifetime citations to artists whose accomplishments were virtually ignored by the Grammys during their most productive years. Yet the voters continue to favor mainstream, best sellers rather than the maverick forces that shape pop music.

No offense to Cole, Raitt and Jones, who are gracious and gifted artists, but they hardly represent the kind of artistic heat that either defines the moment — musically or sociologically — or that seems likely to alter the creative direction of pop in the coming years.

The fact that the same artists keep getting honored year after year — almost everyone who won a key award Tuesday had won before — suggests that the academy membership is far too comfortable with the status quo.

All that Grammy voters had to do to see how far out of step their latest choices were from the creative pop climate of 1992 was to check Wednesday's Village Voice, which contained the results of the weekly's annual poll of U.S. pop critics.

Cole's "Unforgettable" album, the big winner in Tuesday's marathon awards ceremony at Radio City Music Hall, didn't even make the list of the 40 best albums as determined by a vote of approximately 200 critics. Similarly, Cole's version of the song "Unforgettable," which featured the

2-time winner Bolton bites back at critics

Goat to hero: Irving Gordon, whose 41-year-old ballad "Unforgettable" was named best song, appeared at first to be the worst nightmare of the progressive wing of the academy when he remarked during his acceptance speech that it was nice to have a song accepted where you "don't get a hernia when you sing it."

Gordon, while not a big fan of contemporary pop music, explained backstage that his remarks had been chiefly a reaction to Michael Bolton's tortured version of "When a Man Loves a Woman" on the Grammy telecast. Most of the critics in the room have said much harsher things themselves about the overkill of Bolton, a two-time Grammy winner.

Though he declined to criticize Bolton, Bolton did rise to the bait when one reporter asked how it feels to be "hated" by critics. "If I was as insensitive a person as they seem to be, it wouldn't bother me, but since I'm not, it does," Bolton said. "You can take a bunch of chimpanzees and give them a bucket of paint and they'll

destroy a Van Gogh."

Good winner award: Bonnie Raitt continues to be a gracious winner. When she and veteran Texas roadhouse rocker Delbert McClintone won in the best rock duo category, she spent most of her acceptance speech praising her partner — as she did two years ago when she shared a Grammy with bluesman John Lee Hooker. "What an incredible honor... to be up here with one of my heroes," the red-haired singer said. "He's been an inspiration to me and everybody that came up."

Finally, critics' choices: Nirvana's "Nevermind," Public Enemy's "Apocalypse 91" and R.E.M.'s "Out of Time" were followed in the Voice list of 10 best albums by U2's "Rattle and Hum," P.M. Dawn's "Of the Heart" and Richard Thompson's "Rumor and Sigh." Matthew Sweet's "Girlfriend," Metallica's "Metallica," Chris Whitley's "Living With the Law" and the Mekons' "The Curse of the Mekons" also made the list.

The singles list was headed by Nirvana's "Smells Like Teen Spirit," R.E.M.'s "Losing My Religion," Naughty by Nature's "O.P.P.," the Geto Boys' "Mind Playing Tricks on Me" and Metallica's "Enter Sandman."

undergoing duet with her late father, Nat King Cole, wasn't among the year's 25 most notable singles.

The winner in both cases was Nirvana, the Seattle band whose music expresses the youthful alienation and anxiety of the early '90s with the immediacy and passion that has always characterized rock's most compelling voices. Nirvana received one Grammy nomination — and lost in the category.

But you don't really begin to understand just how discouraging this year's Grammy choices were until you look beyond the two top categories.

Under the leadership of President Michael Greene, the academy has tried to add new categories, including hard rock and rap, to better reflect the shifting currents of pop music in recent years. But the voters tend to neutralize that goal by opting for the most conservative choices in each case.

Consider:
• Guns N' Roses, the incendiary Los Angeles band that had two albums in the Voice Top 20, should have been the easy winner in the hard rock category, but voters went with Van Halen, a band that would have been considered too maverick at one

time but now seems a more established part of the musical community — at least when measured against Guns N' Roses.

• Even more scandalous was the rap competition where Public Enemy far and away the most acclaimed and sometimes most controversial rap group — lost out to inconsequential D.J. Jazzy Jeff & the Fresh Prince, probably because of the latter's wholesome image and TV success. Public Enemy's latest album finished second in the Voice poll.

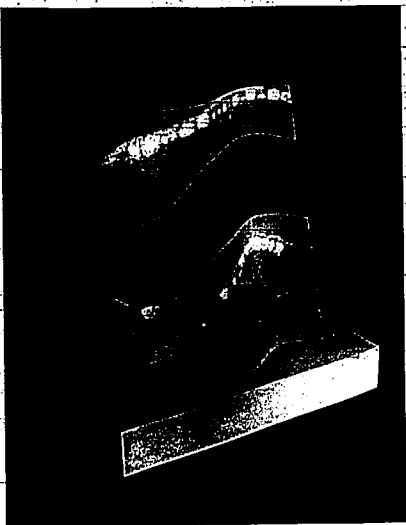
• Instead of saluting R.E.M. in the best album and best record category, where the Georgia group was pitted against Cole, the academy voters went for R.E.M. in the alternative music category, when they should have saluted Nirvana. R.E.M.'s album finished third in the Voice poll.

• Even in the country field, the Grammy voters appear to have caved in to the enormous commercial success of Garth Brooks by giving him the best male singer award over Vince Gill, the superior vocalist. Brooks is a capable country singer, but his strength is the conviction and energy of his shows.

• At least the Grammy voters sometimes learn from their mistakes. There was so much of a howl when tired rock warhorse Jethro Tull won over the infinitely more vital Metallica in 1989, the year that the heavy metal category was introduced to the Grammy competition, that the academy voters seem afraid to vote for anyone other than Metallica for fear of making another mistake.

In winning Tuesday night for the third consecutive year in the category, Metallica drummer Lars Ulrich could be raving having fun with the black-she Radio City Music Hall audience.

"I think the first thing we've got to do, obviously, is thank Jethro Tull for not putting out an album this year, right?" he said, laughing. After a slight pause, he added, "Read between the lines... You know what I mean." Hopefully, Public Enemy or Nirvana or Guns N' Roses or R.E.M. someday will get a chance to make the same joke.

Gallery features BSU professor's monotypes

TWIN FALLS — "Amy Skov: Monotypes and the 3rd Dimension," an exhibition of monotypes and sculptural forms incorporating monotypes by Boise artist Amy Skov, opens Tuesday and continues through April 9 at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery on the College of Southern Idaho campus.

The public is invited to the opening reception set for 7 p.m. March 10 at the museum.

Skov is a professor of art at Boise State University, where he has been teaching graphic design since 1967. In addition to his work as a graphic artist, Skov also works in watercolor, oil and printmaking mediums.

Skov's interest in printmaking began with collagraphs and serigraphs. In 1984, he began working with monotypes, a process that involves lithography inks which are rolled in various viscosities onto a plastic plate which is then printed on paper using an etching press. In 1988 while backpacking in the White Clouds, the idea of adapting prints onto sculptural forms first occurred to Skov. The process of

adhering prints to sculptural forms is unique in his work.

It takes Skov about 200 hours to produce one of his sculptures. The three-dimensional forms are made from a variety of materials such as wood, formica, Styrofoam, PVC pipe, aluminum, steel and plexiglass. After completing the form, Skov makes a tracing of the form to help plan the monotype print design. After the monotypes are printed, he then adheres them to the sculptural forms. The edges of the paper are then trimmed, sanded and re-touched to blend with the whole design. Some forms may take up to 12 prints to cover the three-dimensional areas.

Regular Herrett Museum hours are from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesdays, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Fridays and 1 to 4:30 p.m. Saturdays. The museum is closed Sundays and Mondays and observes college holidays.

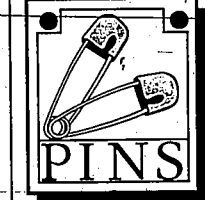

TWIN FALLS — The dances have changed over the centuries, but the basics remain the same: Boy meets girl and they "Dance Through Time."

A San Francisco-based theatrical-dance company is ready to show you how. 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Well-meaning 'Radio Flyer' fails to deliver on its intentions

HOLLYWOOD - Coming across "Radio Flyer" is like stumbling on a massive pile of debris in some desert locale. Are these the ruins of a once great and promising city, the traveler wonders, all that is left, perhaps, of a previously thriving civilization? Or was there never anything but junk here in the first place?

Certainly, the sheiks of Hollywood believed that David Mickey Evans' original script for "Radio Flyer" was promising enough to merit a bidding war that ended with Evans getting paid \$1.2 million by Stonebridge Entertainment and newly cash-rich Columbia for his first produced screenplay. And once Evans, who also snagged the right to direct, proved not to everyone's liking, the studio was willing to set a reported \$10 million in pre-production costs in order to give his replacement, Richard Donner, the auteur's chance to start from scratch with the material.

Donner, one of the losers in that bidding war, had already been entrusted as Evans' script, but, unfortunately, no one watching the finished film will be able to figure out what he or anyone else saw in it. As things now stand, even after considerable tinkering and delays, "Radio Flyer" is a well-meaning failure, a riddled fantasy about child abuse that ponderously attempts to combine the grace of legend with the earnestness of a public-service announcement.

Even figuring this much out about "Radio Flyer" takes some doing, for the film is very slow getting going

and in fact begins with not one but two separate prologues. The first is set in the present with an unbilled Tom Hanks as Mike, tolerantly watching his two young sons engage in a bit of juvenile bickering. Something about their argument makes him decide this is the perfect time to relate the story of his own younger days, circa 1969, with his own younger brother, Bobby.

But before the Mike and Bobby flashback that is the heart of the film begins, another prologue, shot in black-and-white, comes on. This one tells the story of a feisty California kid named Fisher, who electrified his pals by taking his bike down the steepest of hills and attempting to turn it into a flying machine. "His legend," the adult Mike informs us

portentously, "would change our lives forever."

This sense of pompous solemnity never leaves either the voice-over or Mike's retelling of his youth. For one of the problems with the PG-13 "Radio Flyer," is that it relentlessly sanctifies childhood as the most special time on Earth and turns its two protagonists into pint-sized saints who do as much silent suffering at the hands of either ineffectual or downright evil adults as any medieval martyr you can think of.

The kids' mom, Mary (Lorraine Bracco), falls very definitely in the ineffectual, if not criminally negligent, category. After being abandoned by her husband, she takes Mike and Bobby and their dog Shane (yes, Shane) out to California,

where she promptly falls in love with and marries a particularly odious type (Adam Baldwin) who insists that the boys call him "The King."

It's exactly a benevolent monarch, the King turns out to be a craven, beer-swilling lout whose only pleasure in life, aside from intermittently playing Hank Williams "Jambayala," is beating poor Bobby black and blue, something the kids never get around to telling their mother, who is so conveniently mired in double shifts down at the diner she never seems to notice on her own.

It hardly needs to be said that child abuse is a real and serious problem. And whatever else is wrong with "Radio Flyer," Elijah Wood (already a veteran of "Avalon" and "Paradise") and Joseph Mazzello ("Presumed Innocent") are beyond reproach as Mike and Bobby. However, this film is so powerless when it comes to either presenting the problem in a moving way or figuring out how to believably resolve it in story terms that it feels exploitative when it is at its most sincere.

Though he has worked with youthful casts before ("The Goonies") and clearly is at home with them, director Donner has made his reputation with brawnier comedic action films like "Superman" and both installments of "Lethal Weapon." His strong desire to direct "Radio Flyer" indicates that he believes in a light, magical touch as well, the kind Steven Spiel-

berg showed in "E.T.," but he clearly lacks the grace of Hollywood, yet another by-product of seeking that state-of-mind monument to the futility of combining grace. "Radio Flyer" is destined to bring good intentions with leaden execution, without a trace in the cartoon.

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Area gem buffs polish up for Magic Valley show

TWIN FALLS - The Gem State is set to shine at the Magic Valley Gem Show, scheduled for 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday at the Twin Falls Armory.

Once a year, visitors can see for themselves what the gem club's favorite with many area residents. "We have almost 100 members in our local club," said Pete McLinn, assistant show chairman, "and we look forward to our yearly show, where we have displays of stones found in Idaho plus demonstrations which show polishing, cutting and faceting of the stones."

Visitors will be able to purchase several of the finished products. Door prizes, grab bags and a wheel of fortune will round out the event.

"Star garnet and opal are the state's leading commercial stones," McLinn said, "but Idaho has other stones, too, like rose quartz, jasper, amethyst, sunstone and feldspar."

Individuals who are interested in stones are called rock hounds. They search in remote areas for rough stones and they polish, cut and mount their finds.

"We have a shop with the necessary equipment available to members of our club," said Bernice Drury, president of the Magic Val-

ley group. "We provide field trips and information to our members, and we also do presentations for schools and groups." The club sponsors a scholarship for earth science students, too, and it helped to develop a display case in the Capitol building.

One of the club's members, Dr. Ellwood Rees, has a degree from the Geological Institute of America. Rock hounding has been his hobby for years, and he has become a recognized stone factor as a result. Another club member, Jim Sheets, who is chairing this year's show, has also become proficient in the various geological arts.

"We know the minerals and campgrounds involved," Sheets said, "so we can judge quality and grade, and we know how to work the stones."

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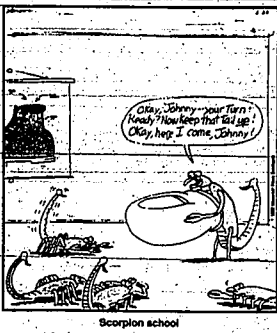

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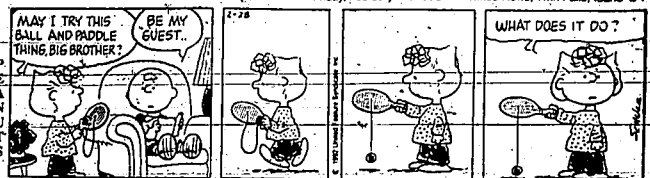

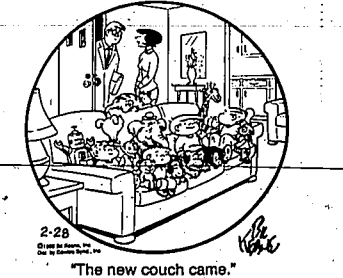

Eagle burst saves 2-OT victory

REXBURG — It was far from pretty, and it became obvious in the waning minutes that a big break — like a steal and

breakaway — was going to decide it. And that's exactly what happened in the second overtime here Thursday night when Trent Rose backed his 3-point goal with a steal that led to a Craig Tyson uncontested slam. And suddenly, CSI had burst into a 90-81 lead.

The Eagles then hit five of six free throws in the closing minute and a half to ice the victory and remain in a tie for their seventh straight Scenic West Conference basketball championship.

The Eagles wind up the season against North Idaho in Coeur d'Alene at 8:30 p.m. MST.

In many respects, this was as poor a game as CSI has played mentally and physically in a long, long time. But the amazing thing was, they were able to pull it out against a Ricks team that couldn't seem to put its game together either.

"I was tired. The players were tired, and we played tired all night," said Coach Fred Trenkle. "We showed no patience against their 1-3-1 zone in the first half — one pass and jack it up. And at halftime we were 1-for-17 on 3-point attempts.

"Our transition defense hurt us at times," he said. "But this is only the second time this year we've ridden the bus in and played the same day. We did that at Salt Lake in December and played the same way there. I'll be glad to get back on our regular routine of travel tomorrow and practice tomorrow night and relax and wait for game time Saturday."

In raising their record to 27-3, the Eagles trailed only twice, but throughout the regulation time, never led by more than eight. They broke away from a 60-60 tie with 8:13 remaining and eventually pushed ahead 75-69 with 2:07 to play. But they didn't score again, and Ricks' freshman Nate Reynolds hit six points to tie it.

The teams traded two buckets each in the slow-moving first overtime and it was 81-81 a minute into the second overtime when Tyson gave CSI a lead.

CSI got the ball back, leading to Rose's 3-pointer. Clayton Johnson's putback expanded that to 88-81 seconds later. And Tyson's slam off Rose's steal made it the biggest lead of the night.

"That was justice," said Rose of his 3-pointer after missing a little inside shot at the end of regulation. "I was fouled on that,

didn't get the free throws and still thought I'd made it until I rolled off the rim."

For the night, CSI shot just 41 percent, and was 4-24 in 3-point attempts. But it saved itself by hitting 17-24 free throws in the second half, 19-of-26 for the night.

Tony Harris had trouble shooting, hitting his 5-for-21, but he picked up 13 rebounds. Taj McFarlane, scoring nine points and six rebounds, was the steadiest Eagle of the night.

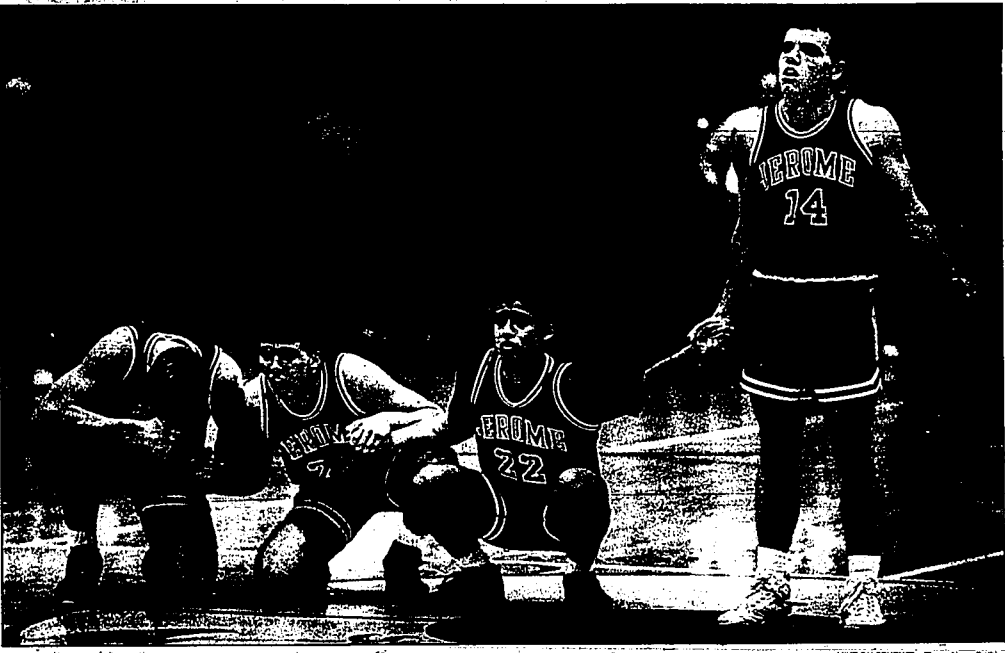

"I'm getting too old (40) and these guys out there are too good for me just to come back and pick it right up like I used to."

"My putting was bad and it's easy to get down on yourself, have a couple of bad holes and just go through the motions the rest of the way. I bet I missed a half-dozen cuts last year by one stroke."

Levi's wife, Judy, helped him get back on the right track.

"My wife just came out and told me, 'You should be ashamed of yourself the way you played (last year), and I think I was, too. She said just play solid and make the cuts. That's what I've been trying to do; I haven't missed a cut all year."

Levi said his irons were the key to his opening round, leaving him with a lot of short birdie putts. He added that, using an old putter he retrieved from his basement, he also had renewed confidence in his putting.

Tewell, whose victory in the 1986 Los Angeles Open was one of just four career wins during his 18 years on the tour, chipped in from 22 feet on No. 18 to finish his round at 6-under.

"When I came up to my approach shot on No. 18, I was thinking that it was the same distance, the same club, even the wind seemed the same, as it was when I hit up on the final day in 1986," Tewell said.

"The only difference was that this time I hit it over the green. But the result was the same, since I chipped in for birdie."

He shot a 1-over-par 36 on the front nine, with a birdie and two bogeys, and he carded all pars on the back nine.

"Right now, I'm proud of myself because I hit the ball terrible and somehow I still scraped around and shot a 72," said Woods, who was invited to play in the tournament because of his outstanding record as a junior golfer.

"I didn't hit the ball very good; I had to scramble for pars all day long. My goal was to shoot 69, so I'm not happy."

Despite feeling nervous at the start, Woods began with a birdie on the first hole and didn't bogey until No. 6.

"It's just a regular tournament," said Woods, mature beyond his 16 years. "I had a little bit of jitters, but that went away. I had them on the first hole, but the more you play, the quicker they go away."

A large gallery — for an opening round — followed Woods and playing partners Robert Friend and Dicky Thompson, and a throng of

reporters and camera crews surrounded the youngster when he finished at No. 18.

Thompson shot a 69 and Friend matched Woods' 72.

On the final hole, Woods hit his approach shot to within 10 feet of the pin, then walked up the fairway to loud cheers, holding his 7-iron triumphantly over his head with both hands.

"The only thing that was really different was the gallery," Woods said of his first tour experience. "That was about it."

"I'm trying to stay unemotional about it all."

Woods' round also was marked by a problem that usually his older golfers — a stiff back.

"I hurt it on No. 11 when I hit out of the trap," he explained. "Then it stiffened up when I had to wait for a few minutes on the last hole."

Woods, who has had trouble with his back before, headed for the fitness trailer after his round to have his back worked on.

His accomplishments thus far include a U.S. Junior Amateur title, three American Junior Golf Association titles, and six Optimist International Junior World titles.

Bob May also played in the LA Open when he was 16, but he was 16 years, 3 months and 18 days old at the time. Eldrick turned 16 on Dec. 30.

After playing in the tournament, Woods has another event coming up on Monday — playing for his school, Western High in Anaheim, Calif., in its season-opening match.

Suspensions, fighting, jail plague usually placid Nebraska program

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A Nebraska football player awaits trial on charges of beating a woman.

Two others were kicked off the team this week for fighting with players on the baseball team.

Two basketball players were suspended this week, one for disciplinary reasons and another for fighting in Wednesday night's loss to Oklahoma State.

And finally, the Big Eight may decide conference co-champion Nebraska has forfeit football victories for using an ineligible player, who was held out of a 22-0 loss to Miami in the Orange Bowl.

So what's happening at Nebraska, for years one of the most well-run programs in the country?

"We've looked at each other, some of us, and wondered, 'When is this going to stop?'" assistant athletic director Don Bryant said Thursday. "I don't know that it's a pattern of any decline in the program. It makes everybody feel bad."

Bryant says the school is embarrassed by the events. Tom Osborne, one of college sports' most respected coaches, says "the public will have to judge us as they see us, some good, some bad."

"It's obviously trouble, but the thing about it is we've probably gone about four or five years without the most serious incident had been a DWI."

While most of the incidents involving Nebraska athletes have occurred at other schools at one time or another, these unrelated episodes have happened over a two-month period.

The most serious involves running back Scott Baldwin. In January, Baldwin was charged with assault in an unprovoked attack on a 23-year-old Lincoln woman, who suffered serious head injuries and was hospitalized for almost two months. She sustained brain damage and is undergoing rehabilitation.

Osborne visited Baldwin in jail and at a mental hospital, where the normally mild-mannered player un-

derwent psychiatric testing. Osborne also sat in court Wednesday when Baldwin pleaded innocent by reason of insanity.

"He is very sorry for what happened and is concerned about the welfare of the person he injured," Osborne had said after visiting Baldwin in jail just after the incident.

"Athletes are human beings and occasionally break down as other people do."

The rash of problems began the day before the Cornhuskers played No. 1 Miami in the Orange Bowl when fullback Omar Soto was ruled ineligible because he apparently had used up his eligibility in 1990. The school is expected to file a report on the incident with the Big Eight next month. The conference will decide if the Cornhuskers must forfeit victories.

Last Friday, police cited seven football players for a fight with six Nebraska baseball players and a former player at a house party in Lincoln.

A Rose by any other name: Pete wants his place in history

NEW YORK (AP) — Although he isn't in the Hall of Fame, Pete Rose thinks he deserves a spot on baseball's all-time greatest team.

"I'd be the utility man because I could play five positions," he said.

Rose, baseball's career hits leader, was always a serious student of the game. So who does he consider the greatest player in history?

"Babe Ruth," he said. "Babe Ruth saved baseball. If Babe Ruth had been a soccer player, soccer would be the national sport."

Rose was banned from baseball in August 1989 by then-commissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti, who said the former Cincinnati Reds star and manager bet on games. Rose, who still denies that he bet on baseball, says he may apply for reinstatement this year.

"It's possible," he said after taping an interview with NBC's Bob Costas. "The longer I wait, the better my chances (of getting reinstated). But I'm sure I'll apply in the next few years."

Rose can't be elected to the Hall of Fame until he is removed from the permanently ineligible list — a decision that's up to current commissioner Fay Vincent, who took over after Giamatti died.

None of the previous 14 people banned from baseball were allowed back in, but Rose said none ever applied for reinstatement. Rose said he deserves to be in the Hall of Fame because of his accomplishments on the field and his contributions to the game.

"I don't think anybody ever had more integrity or character about the game than I did," he

told Costas. "Not only did I play the game as hard as anybody who ever played ... I think I'm baseball's best salesman. I always talk positive about baseball. I never say anything negative about the game."

The two-part interview will be broadcast next Tuesday and Wednesday nights on "Later With Bob Costas."

Rose, who served five months in prison after pleading guilty to tax evasion charges, has admitted that he bet on football and basketball. But he insists he didn't wager on baseball.

"I'm disappointed that baseball didn't give me a fair and impartial investigation," he said. "But I'm not a bitter kind of guy ... I just want to go on with my life."

If he is elected to the Hall of Fame someday, Rose said, "I'll be the happiest guy who ever got in. That's because I appreciate what it takes to get in. I know about the history of baseball. I care about the game."

Rose said getting inducted into the Hall would be one of the most emotional days of his life.

"It would be a real soap opera," he said. "They could probably sell seats at Yellowstone for that one."

Rose said he doesn't bet on sports anymore, although he does occasionally go to the racetrack.

"I'm trying to get into the horsebreeding business," he said. "I'm going to the Kentucky Derby this year and sit with the governor of Kentucky, who's a good friend of mine."

Although he bet on team sports and horse racing, Rose said he never considered himself a compulsive gambler.

South's troubles started when he first saw all those finessing oppor-tunities. They came to a merciful end on the South had tried every finesse but the right one.

East took dummy's spade queen with his king and made the accurate return of a club, South's 10 losing to West's jack. Back came another spade to dummy's ace, and after trumps were drawn, South had one more flosse to try for his 11th winner. But it was too late. Neither the heart finesse nor the second club fi-nesse would work, and South took only 10 tricks. Where did South go wrong?

East's double of three spades should have warned South of the fu-llity of trying the spade finesse. So he had to assume that he had an un-avoidable spade loser. That reduced the problem to limiting his losers in hearts to clubs to only one.

With his problem clearly defined, he should find the solution more easi-ly. Dummy's spade ace should win the first trick, and after dummy's diamond queen draws the trumps, South passes dummy's heart jack for a losing finesse. East now gets a spade to dummy's ace, and after trumps were drawn, South must close shop. South no longer needs any club finesse, two of dummy's clubs going on South's ace and queen of hearts.

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Yawn — 'Young Indy' induces sleep, not inspiration in youngsters, critic charges

Quite a kid, that Indiana Jones. At 9 years of age, he went to Egypt and was at the opening of a tomb that was struck by grave robbers. At 16, he captured one of the same grave robbers in Mexico and recovered the priceless artifacts he had stolen.

By the time he was 20, Indy had ridden with Pancho Villa, gone big-game hunting in Africa with Teddy Roosevelt, traveled to the Belgian Congo and met Albert Schweitzer, was present at the start of the Russian Revolution, had fallen in love with a leading suffragette, learned about the art of erotic dance from Mata Hari and made friends with Degas and Picasso.

These are just some of the far-fetched stories of "The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles," a new ABC series making its debut as a TV movie on Wednesday, March 4. KKVI (Channel 35, cable 6) will air the two-hour movie beginning at 7 p.m. MST.

Each episode of "Young Indiana Jones" opens with Indy at age 92 reflecting back on his life. The stories will feature Indy, either at age 10 (played by Corey Carrier) or at age 16 (played by Sean Patrick Flanery), encountering historical figures.

"Indiana Jones" co-creator George Lucas, the executive producer of the new series, hopes to kindle among children some interest in reading about historical figures. With a per-episode budget of about \$1.6 million — one of the most expensive hours on television — the series is a bold and costly gamble for its producers and the ABC network.

That's all well and good, but the many young fans of the "Indiana Jones" movies are likely to yawn and fall asleep at the adventures of Indy as a boy. Unlike the movies, "Young Indiana Jones" is slow-paced.

The first hour of Wednesday's premiere cries out for the odd tolling boulder or melting Nazi, but no such luck. Instead, we get a Doogie Hoswer, Ph.D. — a wide-eyed kid

learning about archaeology from his dull dad.

The action picks up in the second hour, in which Indy is seen at age 16 and riding with Pancho Villa in Mexico. It is much more in the style of the "Indiana Jones" movies, with chases on horseback, a runaway train, a bullwhip fight and a battle scene during the Mexican revolution.

However, Lucas says the weekly tone of the series will be more like the first hour than the second.

"The truth is, I've burned out (on) writing action-adventure," says Lucas, the modern-film-producing icon who also created the "Star Wars" trilogy. "Unless I get inspired again, which I doubt, we've seen the end of the ('Indiana Jones') features."

Lucas aims to educate

The concept for "The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles" was born from producer George Lucas' desire to liven up the educational system he abhorred as a child.

Lucas' entertainment empire includes an educational foundation, which has been working to develop a prototype for an interactive video textbook for classrooms.

He saw the young Indy character as a way to introduce children to historical figures, famous battles and far-off lands.

But because he could never hope to raise the money to shoot the story strictly as an educational venture, he turned to television.

Lucas' only other network TV projects were a couple of TV movies and Saturday-morning cartoons.

"Young Indiana" retains many of the educational aspects of Lucas' initial inspiration.

The stories take place in different countries, so much of the dialogue is subtitled.

The people Indy runs into as a child, including Gen. George Patton, Norman Rockwell and Pablo Picasso, are designed to pique children's interest. Lucas even had a companion book to the TV series written, but has so far been unable to find an interested publisher.

Aided by a private library of research books, a bank of computer data bases and seven

researchers, Lucas has written all 17 historically rich stories on which the "Young Indiana" scripts are based, including two extra that ABC requested after seeing the two-hour pilot.

In his fervor, Lucas has also completed stories for the next 22 episodes — which his staff of international film writers has already turned into scripts — and 15 more stories after that.

"I'm working on 55 hours of programming right now," Lucas said with a proud smile.

Channel chatter

ABC Entertainment will air "Muhammad Ali's 50th Birthday Celebration" on Sunday, March 1, KKKV (channel 35, cable 6) is scheduled to show the two-hour tribute beginning at 8 p.m., MST. Billy Crystal, Hammer, Whitney Houston and Diana Ross are among the stars who pay tribute to "the greatest," former world heavyweight champion Muhammad Ali, on a special taped at the Willem Theater in Los Angeles as a benefit for the United Negro College Fund.

"Washington Week in Review" will celebrate its 25th birthday this week. Its actual debut was on Feb. 23, 1967 and two years later it became the first locally produced program to air on the spanking new Public Broadcasting Service.

Happy Days are here again. Henry Winkler, who played Arthur "the Fonz" Fonzelli, presides over a 1½-hour reunion of the "Happy Days" crowd with Ron Howard, Tom Bosley, Marion Ross, Scott Baio, Anson Williams, Don Most, Pat Morita and Al Molinaro. The reunion airs at 8:30 p.m. MST, Tuesday, March 2, on KKKV (channel 35, cable 6) and other ABC affiliates.

Tracey Gold returned to the set of "Growing Pains" last week, a little more than a month after checking herself out of a hospital where she was treated for the eating disorder anorexia nervosa. The 22-year-old actress, who plays Kirk Cameron's sister on the ABC series, will participate in the season's four remaining episodes, which will air in May. Gold's weight had dropped from 122 to 90 pounds in recent months.

Tommy Puett, who plays Tyler (Becca's boyfriend) on ABC's Sunday night drama "Life Goes On," says his character will die on the show (in a car accident) at the end of the season and that this will be the show's final year. In an interview airing on Lifetime's "Attitudes" on March 4, Puett says, "They didn't know where else to go with Tyler on the show... I don't think 'Life Goes On' is going to be back next year. That's the word, but we were all very upset about that."

Jay Sharbutt, who covered television for the Associated Press out of New York, was found dead of a heart attack in his Brooklyn apartment Wednesday. He was 51. He is survived by his father, Del, the announcer for "Amos 'n' Andy," "Your Hit Parade" and other shows of radio's golden age; a brother, Bill; and a sister, Mary. And the love of his life, his daughter, Julie, 9.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in New York for **Lawrence B. Hilford**, 57, an entertainment executive who was among the first to see the potential in marketing movies on videocassettes. He was the husband of ABC News correspondent Lynn Sherr.

THE CABLE CONNECTION: Sunday nights on TBS: Jason Robards narrates "One Child — One Voice," the premiere special of TBS's "Save The Earth" season. The one-hour show follows seven children from around the world as they share their hopes and fears for the future in the simple way that only children can. "Tides of War," a film by Middle East expert Michael McKinnon, is on "National Geographic Explorer" as part of TBS's "Save The Earth" campaign. The show deals with the Persian Gulf War's devastating effects on the region's ecology. "When Lightning Strikes" is the featured segment of "National Geographic Explorer." The piece notes that about 300 people are killed each year by lightning and offers some spectacular photography. But the most interesting tales come from among the estimated 700 people who are struck each year but survive. Among them are a blind man who was hit and can now see, and a victim who has felt neither cold nor pain since he was struck. "National Geographic" says that bolts can generate up to 200,000 amps; more than five times hotter than the sun's surface. All three repeat Monday and Saturday mornings.

'Calliope' sparks thinking, action

"Calliope"? Is that a new show for kids?

You may never have heard of "Calliope," but it's cable's longest-running children's show — having recently begun its 14th season on USA (which is longer than most of its viewers have been alive!). The show, hosted by the grandfatherly Gene, an animated character, and his dog, includes a mix of animated and live-action segments from Eastern Europe.

Something for kids

Italy, Great Britain, Japan, Canada and the United States. Many of the films showcased have gone on to win awards.

The series deals obliquely with ethnic and social issues, the arts and nature. It encourages children to participate by writing in with their opinions and answering weekly questions. There's even a segment, "Calliope Photo Album," that features photos of viewers from across the country. It's a recipe for success that obviously works. "Calliope," Sundays, USA. For 2- to 6-year-olds.

"Rin Tin Tin and the Paris Conspiracy" (Friday, Family Channel) is a feature-length film starring the furry hero of the Family Channel's "Rin Tin Tin K-9 Cop" series. For ages 7 and up.

The "Nickelodeon Sports Special" is part an ongoing series of six magazine-type shows (Saturday, Nickelodeon) spotlighting popular sports figures and activities. A team of four kids serves as host. For 6- to 15-year-olds.

When ABC announces its fall Saturday morning lineup in a few weeks, one likely newcomer is a cartoon version of "The Addams Family." Meanwhile, CBS is putting together two Saturday morning series based on "The Little Mermaid" and "An American Tail." And the dumbest idea? It's CBS: a weekly cartoon version of "American Gladiators."

A five-year study of the influence of TV on society claims children are learning racial and sexual prejudices and violent behavior from the programs they watch and are spending more of their time in front of the screen than they are in the classroom.

The study, by nine psychologists, reported that television devalues and stereotypes social groups, especially blacks and women, by either excluding them from shows or giving them negative roles.

The American Psychological Association report, "Big World, Small Screen: The Role of Television in American Society," claims that the average child will have watched 8,000 murders and 100,000 other acts of violence on TV by the time he leaves elementary school.

The study found the violence on television influences viewers, especially children and teenagers, to use violence to resolve conflicts and makes them more accepting of sexual violence and rape.

Saturday morning cartoons designed especially for preschool and elementary-age children have four to five times the amount of violence as programs aired after children are in bed, according to the study.

A: Mick may be bored with the talk of the '60s, when the Stones were formed, and conversations about old girlfriends like Marianne Faithfull. But mention his Stones career and his new solo record album and he's excited.

No wonder. The Stones recently signed a \$45 million deal with a British record company, meaning that Mick, 48, will keep on rocking into his 50s. Movie making — his latest, "Freejack" is out now — will be an entertaining sideline, but strictly a sideline.

Q: Is Ed O'Neill, who stars in "Married...With Children," single? — J.F.

A: The articulate, intelligent, well-read actor, whose television alter-ego, Ed Bundy, is anything but, is not only single, but happily so. Perhaps he got enough of marriage on the hit show. The 45-year-old O'Neill lives alone, has no children or pets, and doesn't want either.

WRITE WHEN YOU GET WORK: This is not been a good time for the various Reagans and their broadcast careers. Ron Reagan Jr. recently saw his syndicated television show terminated for poor rat-

ings. Now, Michael Reagan, Ronald Reagan's son from his marriage to Jane Wyman, has been dropped from the radio show he hosted for two years on San Diego's KSDO-AM. He will be replaced by the nationally syndicated Rush Limbaugh talk show.

Q: Karl Malden was great during a return engagement on the wonderful series "Streets of San Francisco." Will this be back as a series and can you remember who played his sidekick back in the '70s? — T.K.

A: Malden says he'll do an occasional episode as a special but it won't be as a regular series. His sidekick was the now famous Michael Douglas.

The producers did want Malden to ask Douglas to come back for the one-shot, but Malden refused, feeling Douglas was now too big a star and he just didn't want to put him on the spot.

Playing politics with public TV funds

LOS ANGELES — The accusation is a strong one: Republican U.S. Senators, it is said, have exiled a public broadcasting funding authorization bill to congressional purgatory because they are hopping mad at National Public Radio's Nina Totenberg.

Last October, the NPR reporter broke the story of Anita Hill's sexual harassment claims against Clarence Thomas, then a nominee to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Rumors about the NPR funding allegation have been circulating around Capitol Hill for the last two months. But last week, it was broadcast daily as fact by Santa Monica station KCRW-FM, the largest of several NPR affiliates serving the Los Angeles area.

The radio station used the accusation as a rallying cry for donations during a 10-day pledge drive that ended Monday, touting it as the latest instance of government censorship.

"It's outrageous," station manager Ruth Hirschman told listeners. "They may be Goliath and we are David, but the microphone is our slingshot."

But the remarks made by Hirschman and other on-air KCRW commentators have not been echoed by NPR colleagues in Washington. Or by public television officials, who would receive most of the federal money.

The accusations also come smack in the middle of intense debate over Senate subpoenas issued to Ms. Totenberg and Newsday reporter Timothy Phelps. The journalists are being asked to name the sources of their stories, which disclosed the affidavit signed by Hill against Thomas.

Ms. Totenberg appeared Monday before Senate Special Independent Counsel Peter Fleming to refuse to cooperate, citing the First Amendment. Phelps did the same two weeks ago.

But NPR and public television executives say they have no information linking Ms. Totenberg to the senators' actions. "As far as we know," said NPR spokeswoman Mary Morgan, "the hold on the authorization bill has nothing to do with Nina Totenberg."

Nonetheless, KCRW's emotional and vehement broadcasts have begun to anger influential Washington Republicans like Senate minority leader Bob Dole, R-Kan.

"This is being made into an issue even before it's an issue," said an irritated Walt Riker, Dole's press secretary. "Quite frankly, we've got more than a full plate right now and there are a lot of other things, like the deficit, that we need to deal with right now."

It is not known when the bill, which already has been passed by the House, will be brought to the Senate floor. "It will come up," Riker said, "and there will be vigorous debate."

The controversy started late last year when a group of conservative Senators placed a hold on a bill authorizing the release of \$275 million for fiscal year 1994 to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

The bill also allows disbursement of similar amounts to CPB for 1995 and 1996.

Six senators reportedly requested the hold, claiming public television and radio broadcasts contained too much liberal bias. Under Congress' sometimes arcane rules, the names of the Senators are being kept secret.

But Dole, as minority leader, must process the hold request, though his office will say little about his rea-

sons for doing so.

"There's a variety of concerns," said Riker. "I don't want to get into the reasons or the senators who hold them. It's not up to me to speak for the senators involved."

The Corporation for Public Broadcasting is a private organization that distributes federal funding to public television and radio broadcasters in the form of grants.

About 75 percent of government monies go to individual public television stations and the Public Broadcasting Service. The rest is distributed to radio stations and networks such as NPR.

CPB president Donald Ledwig said last week that he was confident "all this will be resolved in the legislative process. I think speculation is always dangerous if it's inaccurate. I don't know how KCRW has any more information than we do."

Ms. Hirschman, KCRW's station manager, said her remarks were based in part on a Feb. 7 interview she conducted with David Horowitz, a conservative media analyst.

Horowitz, who has worked for Dole as a speech writer, has waged an intense Washington lobbying campaign against what he calls the left-wing prejudice of public broadcasting programs.

In the KCRW interview, Horowitz said he believed the hold was triggered by the fact that Ms. Totenberg, after breaking the Hill story, went on to cover Thomas' U.S. Supreme Court confirmation hearings.

In an interview last week with The Associated Press, Horowitz said he was "speculating" that Ms. Totenberg's reporting precipitated the senators' actions. "I was inferring it," said Horowitz, who co-wrote Dole's 1988 Republican Convention speech.

"But I don't think it's inaccurate," he said.

Raymond Burr dusts off his Perry Mason role, returns to TV Sunday

HOLLYWOOD — Raymond Burr is back as Eric Stanley Gardner's intrepid ace attorney-at-law Perry Mason in the Sunday NBC mystery, "Perry Mason: The Case of the Fatal Framing."

This time around, Mason, with the help of his loyal secretary Della Street (Barbara Hale), and investigator Ken Malansky (William R. Moses) must defend a photographer (Mark Moses) who is accused of murdering a painter (David Soul).

A native of Canada, Burr, 74, began acting on stage there in the

late 1930s and came to Hollywood in the 1940s, appearing in such films as "A Place in the Sun," "A Cry in the Night," "Great Day in the Morning" and "Rear Window," as the alleged wife-killer Thorwald.

Burr became a TV superstar and won two Emmys as Perry Mason on the CBS series, which aired from September 1957 until September 1966, and which still airs around the world in reruns. In 1985, he reunited with Hale to star in the NBC movie "The Return of Perry Mason." The movie was such a success that Burr and Hale have appeared in at least three new "Perry Mason" films for

NBC each season since:

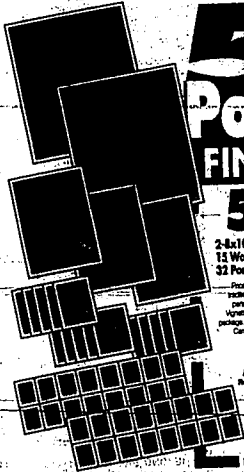
