Cassia board hears demand to separate school, sex

BURLEY - Some Mini-Cassia residents say they want separation of school and sex.

More than 30 residents attended a meeting at the Cassia County School Board, many saying they oppose any move by the School Board to start teaching sex education in grade or high school classrooms.

"I am violently opposed to sex education being taught in the schools," said Ralph Rasmussen of a forum called by the board to listen to residents' opinions on Thursday. "I am a

grandfather and I feel sex education should be taught in the home and in the church."

Henry Baker, who said he is a father of six and came to the meeting dressed in a tan scout uniform, concurred.

"I would suggest that you recommend that sacred and morally sensitive subjects be addressed by parents on a private and family basis. I realize there is sexual activity in this community," Baker said.

"The classroom teachers do not have the ability to teach with a spiritual or moral conviction."

Cassia County's School Board appointed Health and Human Relations Committee has met since last summer,

studying various sex education curriculums.

"The committee consists of two practicing physicians, a nurse, clergy from the LDS faith and a Methodist minister, school teachers, parents and a grandparent from the community."

When the committee first opened its meeting Thursday, members refused to admit the media, saying they did not wish to upset people who came to let their opinions known. After some discussion, committee members changed their minds, telling speakers they could ask that their names and viewpoints be kept out of local newspapers.

City, feds ask that deputy be charged with planting device

TWIN FALLS - A makeshift bomb found beneath a Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department car Saturday morning may have been planted by the deputy who reported it, Twin Falls police said Thursday.

Twin Falls city police detectives and the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms asked that Deputy James D. Clawson, 36, of Twin Falls be charged with false report of explosives in a public place, according to a statement released by Twin Falls Public Safety Director Paul Du Fresno.

Clawson, who joined the sheriff's department in September 1988, was

unavailable for comment Thursday.

On Saturday, he reported spotting a cylindrical object that appeared to be a bomb resting on the chassis of his patrol car near the gasoline tank at 12:20 a.m.

A police report describes the object as an eight-inch length of galvanized pipe with a cap on one end and two wires dangling from one end.

Although it has not been completely analyzed, powder found inside the pipe appears to be gunpowder, Lt. Jim Kistler, Twin Falls police detective, said.

Clawson reported seeing the wires hanging from the left rear bumper area and looked under the car and found the object, according to the report by Twin Falls police officer Mike Covington.

Computerized mail-sorting center has Twin Falls home

TWIN FALLS - A computerized mail-processing center in Twin Falls has found a home and in a few months plans to start hiring its work force of an estimated 250 employees.

Unibase, a Salt Lake City company, last year won a Postal Service contract to open a mail-coding facility in Twin Falls. President Jim Blodgett said Thursday that the company will open a facility in a 10,000-square-foot building in the American Plaza on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, next to Fabricland. Unibase will start remodeling in a

couple of weeks, Blodgett said, and probably will be ready to start recruiting employees in May. The facility is contracted to start operation in the end of July.

It's a new-fangled concept for the Postal Service that Unibase will be executing. In Pembroke Pines, Fla., a Postal Service mail-processing center computer will read addresses or bar codes on mail.

A bar code is a series of lines that a computer can read, similar to those used by grocery stores for price scanning. Letters that a computer can't read will be taken aside and photographed.

Tsongas tsuccumbs to debts

BOSTON - A frustrated, debt-laden Paul Tsongas pulled out of the Democratic presidential race on Thursday.

That action narrowed the field to two and left Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton the clear favorite to capture the nomination.

The unexpected announcement sent shock waves through party circles and stunned Clinton, who said he thought the three-way race "would be going on much longer."

Clinton's sole remaining opponent is former California Gov. Jerry Brown, who is running an outsider's campaign against the corrupting influence of special interest money on politics. Brown promised a head-to-head battle with Clinton "for the soul of the Democratic Party."

Tsongas blamed his campaign's downfall

on a shortage of cash for expensive primaries coming up in New York and elsewhere and said he did not want to remain in the race in the "role of spoiler."

"That is not what I'm about, that is not worthy," said Tsongas, a cancer survivor. "I did not survive my ordeals in order to be the agent of the re-election of George Bush."

Party Chairman Ronald Brown said that with Tsongas' departure, "there are a lot of people making the case that Bill Clinton has an insurmountable lead. The question is if Governor Brown reaches that same conclusion, does he want to carry on the campaign?"

Brown said he was not calling on Jerry Brown to quit but would do so if Clinton won Connecticut, New York, Kansas and Wisconsin - the contests between now and April 7.

Tsongas' withdrawal "makes Clinton the nominee, basically," today, said Democratic consultant Victor Kamber.

The party is now going to try to coalesce around Clinton as quickly as possible.

"He is, barring something totally new and unexpected, the nominee," said Ann Lewis, another Democratic consultant.

Tsongas, 51, said he left the race "deeply fulfilled. The obligation of my survival has been met."

He said his campaign was too broke to compete in New York, which votes April 7, and that his commitment to the Democratic Party was too strong for him to stay in the race at less than full speed.

Tsongas congratulated both Clinton and Brown, and said he was looking forward to helping elect a Democratic president.

Brown has waged a low-cost outsiders' campaign.



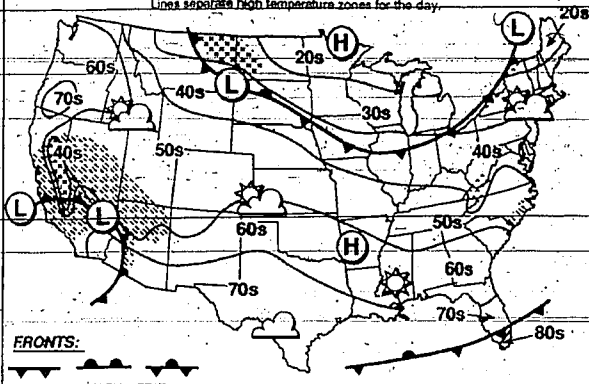
A somber Paul Tsongas pauses while announcing his withdrawal from the Democratic race.

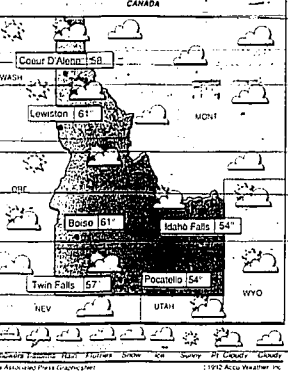

All-told, committee members heard comments from about 38 of the 32 people who had signed up to speak during the three-hour forum.

Many of the speakers repeated the same theme: no more sex in the schools. But some felt differently. Minidoka County's School Nurse and a Cassia County resident Nancy Kuna said she did not feel the school was doing enough to make students aware of the dangers of teenage sex.

"Health education needs to be more than what is dealt with in a seventh grade textbook," Kuna said. "Skirting the issue is not the answer; facilitating open and factual information is the answer. Cassia County penalizes young people by not informing them and educating them of the consequences of growth and development."

But one parent Vivian Waymet said children could learn about sex too soon, which could be a harmful experience.

Waymet said while living in New York, a teenager taught her four-year-old how to masturbate. "I believe sex education should be taught in my home," Waymet said. "Each one of my children have different needs; I don't think I would teach them all the same way."

Victi Noel, who is a volunteer at Birthright, a nonprofit organization that offers free pregnancy tests and counseling in Rupert, said she is pleased to see the district opening up the channels of communication.

"I'm glad we're looking at other options than just throwing condoms at them and telling them that they're going to be safe," Noel said. "That is probably the great myth right now. They fail 47 percent of the time for married couples who are using them consistently and using them correctly. I don't see how we can tell children this will provide safe sex for them."

Dr. Mark Dowdle, a member of the committee and an gynecologist, said whatever the decision, any sex education program should be satisfactory to everyone.

"I think the program that should be implemented into this school district, should be one that is acceptable to the community at large. It should offer parents the spectrum of education that would address the needs of community, not just a narrow view."

The committee plans to meet next week to discuss its options further and choose a plan to present to the school board.

Home town honors Korean War era general at age 100

POLK CITY, Fla. (AP) — Schoolchildren, military officers and diplomats paid tribute Thursday to retired Army Gen. James A. Van Fleet on his 100th birthday anniversary.

Intermittent rain dampened the celebration, canceling the Army Golden Knights parachute team and an Air Force flyover. But it didn't drive away the more than 1,000 well-wishers in the central Florida town of 1,520.

Van Fleet, the oldest living four-star general, was praised as a hero, a soldier's general, a combat commander whose campaigns remain models today in war colleges and the men who helped stopped communism in Greece and Korea.

"And many-of-us feel he won the war in Europe as well," said Gen. Edwin H. Burma Jr., noting that Van Fleet spearheaded two famed World War II battles — the Landing at Utah Beach on D-Day and the Battle of the Bulge.

"Mostly, he'll be remembered as one of the great generals of all times," said Burma.

He often gave a knowing nod to the approving smile of a proud salute. A stroke a few years ago affected his right side and sometimes he used his left hand to help raise and hold up his right to form a salute.

Investigators questioned the deputy at the Twin Falls police station Wednesday, and some parts of Clawson's story didn't add up.

The deputy said he parked his patrol car in the lot next to the courthouse at 10:35 p.m. Friday and went inside the sheriff's office, Covington's report says.

He later started his car to let it warm up, then saw the wires, the report says.

Kistler said Clawson reported the find to the county dispatcher, who relayed the information to the city police dispatcher.

The device had no fuse, so city and county officers removed it using a special explosives blanket and a long rope, the report says. A bomb squad from Mountain Home Air Force Base was then called in to defuse the device.

The device would have fallen if

the car had begun moving. Kistler said if the power in the pipe were indeed exploded under the right conditions, he said.

Kistler offered no explanation for why the bomb was placed beneath the car.

No charges were filed Thursday, but Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said that when the case comes to his desk, she will forward it to Minidoka County Prosecutor Charles Cronson, who has agreed to handle the case.

"It is common for an outside prosecutor to handle a case involving a law enforcement official to avoid a conflict of interest," Clawson has been placed on administrative leave, and continues to draw his \$1,733 per month salary. A charge of falsely reporting explosives in a public place carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

Those pictures will be transmitted to Twin Falls over telephone lines, where they will pop up on computer screens. Computer operators here, humans, this time — will read the address and type it into the computer.

The computer will generate a bar code, send it back to Florida where the code will be stamped onto the letter and it will be sent on its way. About 20 percent of the nation's mail will go through this process, the Postal Service estimates.

The Postal Service has opened

nine mail-processing centers like the Pembroke Pines one across the nation. It then gave contracts to four companies for six encoding facilities like the one in Twin Falls.

Blodgett said the company will hire employees for 2½ shifts on its 125 work stations. Wages, when fringe benefits are added in, will be about \$8 an hour.

The company's \$7.4 million contract is a four-year contract that will be reviewed every two years. Blodgett said he expected Linbase will have few problems obtaining renewals.

Storms spread rain, snow, hail over broad reaches

A storm system spread rain and snow from the Mississippi Valley to the East Coast on Thursday, with heavy snow in parts of the Northeast.

At midday, rain extended from the eastern portion of the Mississippi Valley across the lower Ohio Valley, and over the central Atlantic Coast from central New Jersey across Delaware.

Showers and thunderstorms extended over the southern Appalachians and the Tennessee Valley.

In North Carolina, a funnel cloud was reported by Mecklenburg County officials in Charlotte, where some trees were downed. Trees also were downed elsewhere in the state. Power to nearly 30,000 customers was knocked

out, said Duke Power Co. spokesman Randy Wheelock.

Funnel clouds also were detected on radar in South Carolina, where thunderstorms generated wind approaching 70 mph and 1-inch hail, officials said.

Hail as big as golf balls fell at Greenback, Tenn., and Newton, N.C., the National Weather Service said.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours up to 1 p.m. EST included 1.06 inches at Charleston, W. Va.

Snow fell across over the upper Ohio Valley, the central Appalachians, the Atlantic Coast from central New Jersey across southeastern New York state, and over southern and central New England.

Elsewhere, snow also fell on northwestern Kansas, western Nebraska and southeastern Wyoming. As much as 12 inches fell near Phillipsburg, Kan.

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Mail privilege draws criticism

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — Voters in this Washington suburb recently received a taxpayer-financed mailing from Rep. Jim Moran asking for their opinions on subjects from health care to transportation.

He's not their congressman — but he hopes to be.

In fact, Moran, a Democrat, didn't even send the questionnaire to voters in his own congressional district, which lies south and east of here. His apparent intent was to pave the way for reelection in a redrawn district that now includes Arlington.

As the redrawing of congressional lines shifts district boundaries, House members are using their free mailing privileges to cultivate voters in new territory. Critics complain that that amounts to a publicly funded election campaign.

"It completely destroys their argument about mailing being for representational purposes," said University of Virginia political scientist Larry Sabato. "It explodes the argument in favor of the frank."

Free mailing is by far the most expensive of congressional perquisites. The budget was \$30 million last year and rose to \$80 million in this election year.

Lawmakers have always defended the practice as a bulwark of democracy, a way to keep open channels of communication with those they represent. They consistently deny political motives.

House rules on franking recently were tightened to rein in the most flagrant abuses. But at the same time, the rules left what some regard as a gaping, incumbent-promoting loophole: allowing House members to mail into counties that

Lawmakers' perks include mail, travel, many services

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of Congress are coming in for increasing criticism for the perquisites they enjoy. Here's a list of some of the best benefits:

- **The frank.** Free mailing of newsletters, town meeting notices, news releases, letters and packages with the lawmaker's signature has existed since 1772. Rules for its use for mass mailings have recently been tightened, resulting in substantial budget savings.
- **Foreign travel.** Lawmakers are permitted to travel at government expense to learn firsthand about legislative matters for which they are responsible. Critics charge many of the trips are unnecessary.
- **Personal services.** A gymnasium, swimming pool and tennis courts are available for \$100 a year, as well as free prescriptions, parking at the Capitol and at National Airport, and

discounts on some merchandise at in-house stationery shops. The Botanic Garden provides arrangements of fresh-cut flowers.

• **Professional services.** Official photographers, radio and television studios and income tax help all are available to members of Congress.

• **Some perks have fallen by the wayside** in recent times, including:

- **Ticket fixing.** A longstanding practice of erasing parking tickets for lawmakers on official business has been ended.
- **Honoraria.** In exchange for a pay raise to \$125,000 a year, lawmakers gave up their right to make speeches for up to \$2,000 each.
- **The House bank.** The subject of a major check-kiting scandal, the longstanding salary disbursing office was closed last year by Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash.

victim of red-drawn lines, sent a mass mailing into Rep. Alan Mollohan's First District. It told readers they had been placed into a new district including "the true economic success story of West Virginia — the Eastern Panhandle," Stagers' home base.

• **California Republican Rep. Dana Rohrabacher** sent out a mailing, featuring a map of the new 45th District and including samples of articles from his old 42nd District newsletters. He added: "I look forward to becoming acquainted with you in the upcoming months."

• **Rep. Edward Feighan, D-Ohio**, mailed his January newsletter to constituents of his retiring neighbor, Rep. Dennis Eckart. He's hoping those areas of Lake County, east of Cleveland, will be added to his 19th District. A potential Republican opponent, Lake County commissioner Robert Gardner, condemned the mailing as "an abuse of power."

Asked Thursday about the practice, House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said only that members are obliged to follow the rules.

As to whether the rules are proper, he said, "I'm not going to pass judgment on that at this point."

Thomas contends that the leadership is seeking to delay action on his bill until after incumbents milk the current rules for all the political benefits they can get. "They want reform, but only after the abuse is completed," he said.

Postmaster of House announces departure

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Postmaster Robert V. Rota resigned Thursday, becoming the second House official in a week to quit following allegations of "mismanagement."

Rota, who resigned on his 57th birthday, ran a mail facility that has seen three former employees recently plead guilty to embezzlement and a fourth awaiting trial on that charge.

The Washington Times reported Thursday that there was an illegal check cashing operation at the post office, a contractor for the U.S. Postal Service. It said congressional and law enforcement officials found that members reportedly cashed personal checks and campaign checks at the postal facility.

Last Thursday, House Sergeant at Arms Jack Russ, who ran the chamber's former bank, resigned after the ethics committee found he misused

and failed to make promised drafts have ensnared House members in a messy scandal.

The chamber's ethics committee plans to release, in two stages, the names of 355 current and former House members who wrote bad checks at the bank during a 39-month period. Russ was in charge of the now closed bank the entire time.

Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., told reporters that Rota "had been talking for some time" about retiring. "I don't think there's any connection at all" with the latest news reports.

Rota gave Foley a two sentence resignation letter that mentioned none of the facility's problems. "It has been an honor and pleasure to serve the members of Congress and this institution for these many years," Rota wrote. He became postmaster after an elected position in 1972. His current term would have continued through the end of the current Congress.

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Personal physician says Helmsley too sick for prison

NEW YORK (AP) — Leona Helmsley is too ill to go to federal prison for income tax evasion because she has extensive blood vessel disease and probably has "substantial coronary disease," her personal physician said Thursday.

Mrs. Helmsley, 71, was admitted to New York Hospital on Wednesday, suffering from palpitations and chest pressure. Four hours earlier, she was resuscitated to four years in prison.

Dr. Rees Pritchett told reporters Mrs. Helmsley was in tears and depressed when he saw her during the morning.

Pritchett, an internist, said none of the completed tests indicated a heart attack.

But he said she is a prime candidate for heart disease based on family history and her personal

history as a former three-pack-a-day smoker with high cholesterol and high blood pressure, and who has suffered three minor strokes.

He said there still were tests to perform on her coronary arteries but the condition of arteries elsewhere in her body put her at risk "for gangrene in her lower extremities and cardiac events."

"In my opinion, the stress of prison is very likely to have a very deleterious effect on her and could result in a fatal termination," Pritchett said.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Griesa ordered Mrs. Helmsley to surrender April 15.

Pritchett said that if the surrender day were Friday instead of next month, Mrs. Helmsley would be unable to comply "and I don't believe it preferable for her to do it on the 15th, but she may not have any choice."

Asked if she might be faking illness, Pritchett replied that she had been "at substantial risk" Wednesday.

He said Mrs. Helmsley's condition had improved overnight and described her as stable.

She was in a private room in the coronary care unit, hooked up to a heart monitor, said Dr. David Miller, the cardiologist in charge of the unit.

Noriega's attorneys claim they can show witness lied

MIAMI (AP) — Manuel Noriega's attorneys pleaded with the judge Thursday to reopen their case, saying they can prove a last-minute prosecution witness lied on the stand.

Felipe Pena had testified he drove a Medellín cocaine cartel trafficker to Manuel Noriega's summer home the first weekend in May 1984.

"We can show he lied," attorney Jon May said. "Fortunately, he picked the one weekend where we are best able to prove our case."

Panama held its first free presidential election in 16 years that weekend, said May. Noriega gave a televised national speech that Saturday, and voted and held a news conference on Sunday.

May said Noriega's whereabouts were followed by journalists and international election observers that weekend.

"We have two witnesses who will be able to detail where General Noriega was on these two days," said May.

U.S. District Judge William Hoeverler noted that reopening the defense after prosecution rebuttal witnesses is extremely rare, but said they would consider the request.

In another development, Noriega attorney Frank Rubino confirmed the ousted Panamanian leader has hired literary agent George England to approach publishers about a possible book deal.

"There is no deal yet," said Rubino. He would not comment on reports Noriega has asked for several million dollars for a book contract.

State Department officials, meanwhile, said they could not comment immediately on a Drug Enforcement Administration investigative report read Wednesday at Noriega's drug smuggling trial.

The Jan. 18, 1985, report by DEA agent Thomas Telles in Panama said pilot Floyd Carlton was "trafficking in cocaine and is presently laundering money" between Miami and Latin America.

Surface blast kills 2 at coal mine

BLACKSVILLE, W.Va. (AP) — An above-ground explosion at a coal mine where workers were preparing to seal a deep shaft killed two people and injured at least three others Thursday, authorities said.

The explosion at the Consolidation Coal Co. Blacksville No. 1 mine could be felt at least 15 miles away.

The blast at the mine, which straddles the West Virginia-Pennsylvania line about 60 miles south of Pittsburgh, ripped apart a seven-story building containing two empty coal bins. The sides of a nearby building were buckled and one sheet of corrugated steel was seen on a hillside about a quarter-mile away.

Company officials said the cause of the mid-morning explosion wasn't known.

Hugh Lindsay, Monongalia County's medical examiner, has a search party look for any other possible victims in the mine shaft and general area.

The workers, who were using "tylenic" torches, were employed by unidentified contractor hired to prepare the mine for sealing, said Joe Poliss, human resources director for the company's northern West Virginia operations.

No one was inside the mine, which has been idle since June because of poor economic conditions, company spokesman Thomas F. Hoffman said.

Trade deficit narrows despite 3rd straight decline in exports

WASHINGTON (AP) — The merchandise trade deficit narrowed slightly to \$5.27 billion in January even though American exports, the economy's main performance indicator for the past two years, fell for a third straight month, the government said Thursday.

The Bush administration called the weakness in exports temporary, but private economists worried that the pull could prove more lasting and impell chances to mount a sustained recovery.

In another economic report Thursday, the Labor Department said that the number of newly laid off Americans filing for unemployment compensation totaled 433,000 in the week ending March 7, a decline of 27,000 from the previous week.

The Bush administration said the drop in jobless claims was just one of a number of reports in recent weeks pointing to an economic rebound.

Labor Secretary Lynn Martin noted that the weekly claims level is now 30,000 below where it was a year ago during the depths of the recession and she said this improvement was a "good sign of growing labor market stability."

But private economists said they were still looking for the overall jobless rate, currently at a six-year high of 7.3 percent, to rise to around 7.5 percent by mid-year before starting a gradual improvement.

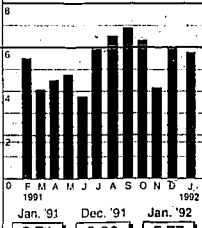
The Commerce Department said the January trade deficit was 3.9 percent lower than December's \$6 billion imbalance. Imports, held down by weak demand in the United States, dropped 1.4 percent to \$41.30 billion while exports fell 1 percent to \$35.54 billion.

The administration, attacked on the campaign trail for failing to do enough to fight unfair foreign trade practices, hailed the January improvement in the overall deficit.

bara Hackman Franklin insisted that the long-term trend for American exports was still bright because of "growing U.S. competitiveness" in world markets.

Last year, the merchandise trade deficit fell to an eight-year low of \$66.26 billion, down from \$101.72 billion in 1990.

But many economists are forecasting that the deficit will resume its upward climb this year as the recovery spurs Americans' demand for imports and spreading weakness overseas cuts into export growth.

"The good news is that our economy has hit bottom and is coming out of the recession, but one of the costs of that rebound will be a wider trade deficit," said Jay Goldfinger, an economist at Capital Insight, an investment firm in Beverly Hills, Calif.

John Eidean, a vice president

with the American Business Conference, a trade group for mid-size corporations, said that U.S. companies will face growing competition from countries trying to make up for weak domestic demand by export sales.

"Japan and Germany are making no secret of their intention to ignite their faltering domestic economies through more exports and less imports," he said.

As usual, the country's largest deficit was rung up with Japan, \$3.82 billion in January, or two-thirds of the total, although that was down by \$645 million from the December deficit. The second biggest imbalance was with China, a deficit of \$1.4 billion.

Japanese officials, concerned about an anti-Japan backlash in the United States, announced that they were lowering their voluntary limit on passenger car shipments to the United States to 1.65 million a year, down from the current 2.3 million.

But U.S. automakers blasted the announcement on Thursday, saying it would do little if nothing to lower the trade deficit between the two countries.

American's surplus with the 12-nation European Community climbed by \$713 million to \$1.88 billion in January. This gain was cited as an encouraging development by Stephen Cooney, trade expert at the National Association of Manufactur-

ers.

"A strong performance by U.S. exporters of industrial supplies and materials, the basic building blocks of industry, indicates that U.S. exports may regain upward movement in the near future," Cooney said.

The 1 percent drop in exports followed a 2.8 percent December decline and a 2.3 percent November drop. The decline was led by a \$270 million decrease in sales of aircraft and parts and a drop of \$285 million in farm shipments, reflecting weaker demand for soybeans in particular.

Senate panel OKs bankruptcy review

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate panel Thursday approved a bill creating an independent body to review federal bankruptcy laws and encourage more individuals to seek court-supervised reorganization of their finances.

The measure, approved unanimously by the Senate Judiciary Committee, would set up a commission to study the federal bankruptcy code and make recommendations for changing it.

The bill would also expand the number of individual debtors who

could qualify to file for court-supervised reorganization of their personal finances under Chapter 13 of the bankruptcy code.

That provision allows debtors to keep most of their income, matching assets while they come up with a plan to pay off their debts. It applies the provision to debtors who raises the debt limit for Chapter 13 filings from \$350,000 to \$1 million.

An amendment by Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, makes clear that retired workers would continue to receive health and pension bene-

Ventriloquist sues Diet Pepsi over ad jingle

BALTIMORE (AP) — A ventriloquist has sued the makers of Diet Pepsi for more than \$130 million, claiming they ripped off his signature line, "You've got the right one, uh-huh!" for a jingle.

Arthur Takeall said PepsiCo Inc. added "baby" at the end, as sung by Ray Charles in commercials.

Takeall, 45, said in the U.S. District Court lawsuit he sent the company a jingle with the phrase in 1989 when he sought funding for an educational program with his dummy, Scooter.

"Scooter, or Scooter and I, developed what we consider our trademark," Takeall said Wednesday. "It distinguishes us from other ventriloquists."

"He said he has used the phrase and the less-grammatical, 'You got the right one, uh-huh' since he began doing a nightclub act with the dummy in 1983.

Dow Corning stops making implants, will fund removals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Dow Corning Corp. called it quits Thursday for the production of silicone gel breast implants, a business it pioneered and led for three decades.

An estimated 1 million American women have silicone gel implants. But the safety of the devices is under review by the Food and Drug Administration, and the industry has observed a voluntary moratorium since it was sought by the FDA in early January.

While saying it would never again manufacture a silicone gel implant, Dow Corning promised to spend \$10 million on research into the safety issue. And it said it would contribute up to \$1,200 per patient, based on financial need, for any woman to have her implants removed if her doctor deems it necessary.

The company, whose implant business has never accounted for more than 1 percent of its revenue, already is beset with lawsuits potentially worth hundreds of million of dollars. The firm has \$250 million in liability insurance.

Dow Corning, a Midland, Mich., firm that is a joint venture of the Dow Chemical Co. and Corning Inc., said it still is not aware of any proof that the gel-filled implants are unsafe. Some critics have blamed the devices for health problems that include cancer and autoimmune disease.

"I don't think it will be fair to say that Dow Corning was hounded out," Chairman Keith McKennon said at a news conference. "This is a decision that we have thought through very carefully as we considered the likely size of the future market, our relatively modest market share, and the even smaller size of this business relative to our other operations," McKennon said.

"After considering all of these factors as well as many others, we have decided that Dow Corning will not resume the production or sales of breast implants," he said.

The business has been at a standstill since Jap. Gov. Dr. David Kessler, the FDA commissioner, asked for the moratorium on new installations of implants while his agency pursues the safety issues.

The questions turn on what happens to the body when it comes in contact with the silicone gel that fills the implants. To one degree or another, the implants leak. That could mean anything from a minuscule amount seeping out through the plastic envelope to a rupture in which all of the gel is spilled into the body.

An FDA advisory panel last month heard evidence that the silicone causes problems ranging from simple soreness to fatal conditions such as cancer and autoimmune disease — in which the body's immune system is triggered into attacking its own tissue.

But so far, that evidence has been anecdotal — not enough, according to the government scientists, to make a final ruling. They have called for additional studies, and Dow Corning said Thursday it contribute \$10 million toward the effort.

In the meantime, the FDA panel recommended that the agency allow continued use of silicone gel breast implants, but under tight restrictions. The FDA has said it plans to make a final decision by April 20.

McKennon refused comment when asked whether he thought the company's liability insurance was enough to cover potential losses from the lawsuits.

He said the company would not require women to give up their litigation rights in exchange for the financial to have implants removed.

"Dow Corning controls about 30 percent of the national implant market. Bristol-Myers Squibb Co. quit the business last fall, and last week Bioplasty Inc. said it would also stop making gel implants.

Dow Corning's departure would leave two manufacturers in the market. The Mentor Corp. and McGhan Medical Corp., both of Santa Barbara, Calif., make saline-filled and silicone gel-filled implants.

Second-hand smoke harmful

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Exposure to second-hand cigarette smoke significantly narrows the arteries of non-smokers, increasing their risk of heart disease, a researcher reported Thursday.

The study is the first to use ultrasound to examine arteries directly to look for the effects of second-hand cigarette smoke, said its principal author, George Howland of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine in Winston-Salem, N.C.

"The point is to get a more direct measure of the process" that leads to a heart attack, Howard said at the annual American Heart Association meeting on heart disease epidemiology.

Exposure to second-hand smoke is an established risk factor for lung cancer, but its role in heart disease has only recently become clear, researchers said.

Last year, a study in the American Heart Association's journal *Circulation* found that second-hand smoke caused an estimated 37,700 heart disease deaths per year among non-smokers in the United States.

The link between second-hand smoke and narrowing of the arteries — by virtue of a thickening of the artery walls — "is a strong effect," Howard said.

Howard said the researchers also found that the more hours per week a person was exposed to second-hand smoke, the narrower the arteries. Although that effect was smaller than the overall association, it helped give the researchers confidence they were correctly assessing the data, Howard said.

Also boosting their confidence in the findings was a consistent pattern when they compared non-smokers to smokers.

"People who had never smoked and who said they were not exposed to second-hand smoke had the least artery narrowing. The degree of artery narrowing was greater in those exposed to second-hand smoke, and highest in current smokers," Howard said.

Narrower arteries are more prone to clogging by cholesterol deposits and clots. Blockage of those arteries causes heart attacks and strokes.

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House rubber-check artists bounce a few words too

WASHINGTON (AP) — When is a bank not a bank? When does a rubber check not bounce?

When it's the House bank and when members of Congress are writing the checks.

The flap over the bank's practice of honoring lawmakers' checks when they didn't have enough in their accounts to pay them has spawned a separate controversy over terminology.

Take Rep. Duncan Hunter, R-Calif., who proclaimed last fall: "Nobody has ever had a Duncan Hunter check returned for insufficient funds."

When it turned out that Hunter wrote 407 bad checks totaling \$129,225 over a three-year period, his Republican primary opponent, Eric Epifan, called Duncan's assertion "a lie."

But Hunter is standing by his words. Because no check was returned, technically

none bounced, he maintains. To the person receiving the check, they were as good as gold.

John Hall of the American Bankers Association, with the help of "Banking Terminology," a fat book published by the ABA, offered some guidance: A "bad check," he said, is a broad term that includes checks written on accounts with insufficient funds, checks without proper signatures and checks with marred magnetic codes.

About 1 percent of the 50 billion checks written each year are bad, he said, and about three-quarters of those, or 375 million, are drawn on accounts with insufficient funds.

Bankers define "bounce" as "the result of a check that is written on ... insufficient funds," meaning that funds aren't credited to the payee because there's not enough money in the account. But, with the House bank, there

was no such bounce, since the bank made up the difference and paid the checks anyway.

"Rubber check" is a little closer to the mark, even though many people, understandably, equate the phrase with "bounced check."

Actually, a rubber check is a check that could bounce, not one that does bounce, much as a rubber ball only becomes a bounced ball if it's dropped. And at the House bank, it wasn't dropped.

Hall's advice: "It's all slang and it's all subject to interpretation. If you want to be accurate, use overdraft."

Ah, overdraft. But even there, House members have their own definition. Witness this exchange, in the wee hours last Friday morning, between Rep. John J. LaFalce, D-N.Y., and Rep. Mickey Edwards, R-Okla., who led the campaign for "full" disclosure of the abuses.

LaFalce: "The gentleman has frequently referred to overdrafts. I am not sure that the gentleman intends by the use of that word, is it the face value of the check, \$50,000, or is it the deficiency which if you had \$19,900 in your account, is simply \$100."

Edwards: "That is a very valid question. ... It is my personal view ... that the overdraft is the extent by which you exceed the amount that you had. Mr. Speaker, if a member had a \$50,000 and had \$49,000 in the bank, in my opinion that is a \$1,000 overdraft."

Ordinary Americans might find their bank — or a store to which a bad check is written — has a different view. Try arguing to either that its bad-check charge should be based on the difference between what might have been good and what was in fact bank charges are, and you won't get very far with that one. The

grocer who finds your \$50 check returned is still out his \$50 payment, regardless of whether a \$49 check would have been paid.

Whatever the case, Rep. Matthew Rinaldi, R-N.J., maintains his account was never

overdrawn, even though five checks were written against insufficient funds. By his reckoning, the checks were returned because the bank's policy was to hold all posting checks until money was deposited to cover them.

Meanwhile, bankers, sensitive to seeing the words "Bank Scandal" in headlines, are quick to point out that the House bank is, in fact, not a bank. By federal law, a bank is an institution that both accepts deposits and makes loans. The House Bank, at least formally, did not make loans — though that was the net result of its generous check-handling policy. And those informal loans were interest free.

Wisconsin professor, Nader group sue for access to Nixon recordings

WASHINGTON (AP) — The once-secret tapes of Richard Nixon's White House are valuable historical records that the public has the right to hear, said a lawsuit filed Thursday seeking to force the government to release the tapes.

"Let's have the whole record out," said University of Wisconsin Professor Stanley Kutler, who filed the suit along with Ralph Nader's Public Citizen. The Watergate affair, he said, "remains very contested ground as to the actions of Nixon and the president's men."

The lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court said the National Archives has taken long enough to catalog the 4,000 hours of Nixon tapes, including about 200 to 400 hours related to the Watergate break-in June 1972 and the

cover-up that led to Nixon's 1974 resignation.

The archives has released only 60 hours of Nixon Watergate tapes despite a 1974 law that required them to be opened to public access at the "earliest reasonable date," the lawsuit said.

A spokeswoman for the archives declined comment on the lawsuit.

John Fawcett, assistant archivist for presidential libraries, said in a January letter to Public Citizen's attorney that "seventeen years is not an unreasonable time for public access to sensitive presidential materials."

Fawcett noted the tapes first must be reviewed for privacy and national security concerns, adding that Nixon "is likely to pursue all legal steps

necessary" to protect his privacy rights. Fawcett said he could not give a schedule when the tapes would be released.

Months after Nixon's resignation, Congress passed a law directing the archives to take custody of the tapes secretly recorded in his office. Three years later, the Supreme Court rejected Nixon's challenge to the law.

"The underlying activities discussed in the Watergate-related Nixon tapes comprise an important chapter of United States history" and are "invaluable historical records," the suit said.

In 1981, the archives released 60 hours of tapes that had been admitted into evidence during the special prosecutor's investigation of Watergate.

Report: '91 violence against gays grew

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anti-gay violence surged 31 percent last year, nurtured by a climate in which homosexuals were vilified by government leaders, the right wing and entertainment media, according to a five-city survey by a homosexual rights group.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Policy Institute said there were 1,822 reported incidents of anti-gay violence in 1991 in New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Chicago, Boston and Minneapolis-St. Paul. They ranged from verbal assaults and threats to physical attacks and murder.

That compares to 1,588 reported incidents in 1990, the report says. "Anti-gay and lesbian violence

continues to be a widespread and critical problem, provoked by official gay-bashing in politics and popular culture," said Kevin Berill, director of the institute's Anti-Violence Project and author of the report. "Each attack sends a message of hatred and terror intended to silence and render invisible not only the victim but all gay people."

The report complained about what it termed anti-gay remarks by Republican presidential hopeful Patrick Buchanan, insulting jokes by Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Nebr., and David Boies with Vice President Dan Quayle's press secretary, so-called traditional values groups making gays out to be evil, and "destructive stereotyping" in films.

Countries seek to counter Libya

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States, Britain and France will ask the U.N. Security Council to impose a mandatory air embargo against Libya, the State Department said Thursday.

The U.S. government is also strongly advising the 500 to 1,000 citizen believed to be in Libya to depart immediately, State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said.

In making the announcement, Tutwiler said Libya had ignored a Jan. 21 U.N. resolution demanding it provide a "full and effective response" to U.S. and British requests for the surrender of two Libyan agents wanted in connection with the bombing of Pan Am flight 103 in 1988.

Venezuelans demonstrate for rights

CARACAS, Venezuela — Police battled with hundreds of students who defied a government ban and tried to march Thursday to protest the suspension of some civil rights after last month's failed military coup.

At least four injuries and dozens of arrests were witnessed by an Associated Press reporter during the clashes in a poor neighborhood of the capital. Injuries and arrests were expected to go higher.

The violence was the second in nine days. Twenty-five people were injured March 10 when protests over the installation of a new coalition Cabinet by President Carlos Andres Perez turned violent.

Philippine quake causes stampedes

MANILA, Philippines — A strong earthquake rocked Manila and many parts of the main Philippine island of Luzon on Thursday, causing stampedes in one city that left 25 people slightly injured, authorities said.

Burt Bautista, a seismologist at the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology, said the quake measured 5.8 on the Richter scale. It was centered near the mountain town of Bontoc, 170 miles north of Manila.

In Baguio, 50 miles south of Bontoc, 15 students at Saint Louis University were slightly injured when they stampeded out of their classrooms. Ten other people staying at the Strawberry Inn suffered bruises in a similar stampede.

Switzerland suffers 2nd mass killing

MUTTENZ, Switzerland — In the second mass killing in Switzerland in two weeks, a man shot and killed three people and seriously wounded a fourth on Thursday before shooting himself in the head, police said.

The killer opened fire with a handgun after ringing an apartment doorbell. Antonio Poivetto d'Arigo, 55, his wife Nunziata, 45, and daughter Patrizia, 23, were killed. D'Arigo's 24-year-old son, Salvatore, was rushed to a hospital with chest and stomach injuries.

Police said the suspect, 26-year-old Vito Compierchio, was later found with serious head wounds in a vineyard near Muttenz. He had shot himself in the eye but was expected to survive. Officials said Compierchio was formerly engaged to Patrizia and was threatened by a family dispute.

Crew arrives to relieve cosmonauts

MOSCOW — A Russian-German crew docked with the Mir space station on Thursday and will relieve a Russian cosmonaut who has been orbiting while his nation went through drastic political changes below.

The ITAR-Tass news agency reported that the TM-14 capsule docked on schedule.

Cdr. Alexander Viktorenko and Flight Engineer Alexander Kaleri will replace cosmonauts Sergei Krivalev and Alexander Volkov, who are scheduled to return to Earth on March 25.

Krivalev has been in orbit for 10 months, through all the political upheaval in his homeland. Volkov went aboard the space station in October.

Soldier shoots Israeli dressed as Arab

JERUSALEM — An Israeli who dressed as an Arab to celebrate this year's carnival-like Purim holiday fell victim to the tensions over Jewish-Palestinian clashes when a soldier shot and wounded him.

The army officer, identified as Avshalom Serf, who was carrying a club and wearing an Arab kuffiyeh, ignored orders to stop as he walked through the coastal town of Herzlia on Wednesday. The victim's brother said there was no warning.

Serf was reported in stable condition Thursday with wounds in the foot and neck. The army officer, Lt. Yifrah Yair, was detained for questioning.

The shooting came a day after a Palestinian killed two Israelis and wounded 20 in a stabbing spree in Jaffa. Some of the victims said they did not run away because they thought the attack was a typical Purim stunt.

Russian government says worst is over

MOSCOW — The Russian government is satisfied with the first three months of radical market reforms and believes the threat of complete economic collapse has disappeared, Boris Yeltsin's economic adviser said Thursday.

"There is no longer a danger of economic catastrophe, of a total collapse of the financial system," Alexei Ulukayev said at a news conference.

His remarks reflected the government's growing confidence that it can carry out the market reforms without setting off riots or bloodshed — and that the most dangerous period already may be over.

Ulukayev said inflation has slowed since a burst of more than 350 percent in the first few weeks after Yeltsin removed most price controls on Jan. 2.

But another bout of inflation, averaging 60 percent to 75 percent, is likely when energy prices are freed next month, he said.

Hindus cremate relatives shot by Sikhs

LUDHIANA, India — Waiting men and women on Thursday cremated their Hindu relatives who were shot by Sikh militants in a crowded bazaar in Punjab.

On Wednesday night, a group of gunmen had walked into a market and three of them calmly opened fire until all bullets were spent. Then a fourth man, in his late teens, asked "Shall I start now?"

He emptied a magazine. The men walked to another street where they again fired randomly and fled before police could react. Officials said 18 people were killed. News agencies put the toll at 21.

On Thursday morning, militants shot and killed four police bodyguards in a rose garden in Ludhiana, police said. At least eight more were killed in other parts of Punjab. Press Trust of India said.

Mandela, de Klerk support rapid change

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — Bolstered by white support for reforms, President F.W. de Klerk and Nelson Mandela said Thursday they would move quickly to negotiate an end to apartheid.

"We should not waste any time," de Klerk told reporters two days after whites voted in favor of talks with black leaders on ending white-minority rule.

"The uncertainty that bothers so many will only go away if you put a negotiated solution on the table," he said.

Mandela, at a separate news conference, repeated his African National Congress' demand for an interim government to oversee the transition to multiracial democracy, and he said it should be installed this year.

"The purpose of the interim government will be to supervise the transition from an apartheid to a democratic state... we are demanding that should be done as soon as possible," the black leader said.

De Klerk has abolished major apartheid laws in the past two years and called Tuesday's whites-only referendum to gauge support for continued reforms. Whites voted

68.7 percent to 31.3 percent in favor of change, giving de Klerk the mandate he needed to carry out his most

important move: negotiating a new constitution to give the black majority voting rights.

Major issues still must be resolved between de Klerk and black leaders, and there is not likely to be a swift transfer of power.

De Klerk refused Thursday to put a time frame on a negotiated settlement with the black majority.

He has agreed to the concept of an interim government but disagrees with the ANC on how long it should rule. De Klerk also says the new constitution should contain guarantees protecting rights of whites and other minorities. The ANC opposes this.

Difficult transition still ahead

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President F.W. de Klerk's victory in the apartheid referendum gives his reforms tremendous momentum, but it by no means solves the country's political problems. Here's a look at what's likely to happen next:

NEGOTIATIONS: De Klerk's National Party and the African National Congress are among 19 groups that have been negotiating a new constitution since December. There could be agreement soon on the general principles, but the actual document is likely to take many months.

INTERIM GOVERNMENT: If the constitutional talks go well, there could be an interim government this year that would include blacks for the first time. However, de Klerk has stressed that he would still be in control.

MULTIRACIAL ELECTIONS: De Klerk does not have to call an election until 1994 and considers that his deadline for having a new constitution.

In addition, both sides face opposition from right-wing conservatives who have vowed to fight rather than live under a black government.

However, their rousing Tuesday campaign of the conservative credibility, and de Klerk told Cable News Network in an interview Thursday he would not allow right-wingers to upset the reform process.

Israel faces prospect of less U.S. support

JERUSALEM (AP) — One out of every \$10 spent in Israel comes from the United States, but there are growing signs that such largesse won't last forever.

The Bush administration's refusal this week to provide \$10 billion in loan guarantees has rekindled the debate over whether the Jewish state can — or should — cut the economic umbilical cord and begin striving for economic independence.

"There are signs that people are recognizing there has to be a change," Robert Loewenberg, president of Jerusalem's Institute for Advanced Strategic and Political Studies, said Thursday.

"The denial of the loan guarantees could turn out to be a blessing, but only if Israel takes this opportunity to reform, to move away from socialism and toward a truly free-market economy," he said.

But weaning itself from foreign aid could be difficult for Israel at a time when it is struggling to deal with a wave of immigration from the Soviet Union.

Israel had sought the U.S. guarantees to get favorable interest rates on international loans to build housing and create jobs for the newcomers.

About 350,000 Soviet Jews already have arrived, and Israel hopes to draw up to 1 million by the middle of the decade.

The United States linked the guarantees to a freeze on Jewish settlements in occupied Arab lands. Bush sees the settlements as an obstacle in the Mideast peace process. But Israel argues the two issues are separate and refused the trade-off.

The guarantees, at a rate of \$2 billion a year, would be over and above the \$6 billion a year that Western nations and Jewish charities already pump into Israel's \$52 billion economy.

Last year, more than \$5 billion came from the United States. The U.S. government provided \$3 billion in military and economic aid, a special \$650 million grant to compen-

sate for Gulf War expenses and \$400 million in loan guarantees to help with the immigrants. About \$1 billion came from private American contributions to Israel bond drives and Jewish charities.

Despite the massive foreign aid, Israel's economy is struggling. Per capita income is falling, unemployment is 11 percent and rising, and inflation is stuck in the double-digits.

Israeli politicians increasingly believe that the solution won't be made in America.

Benjamin Netanyahu, an adviser to Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, noted that the stubborn recession in the United States and a growing federal debt have made Americans increasingly antagonistic to foreign aid, even to traditional allies like Israel.

"We are entering a decade in which we will no longer be able to depend on American aid," he told an army radio earlier this week.

Israel, instead, will seek more funds outside of the United States and look at economic reforms that will make Israel more self-sufficient, government officials say.

Finance Minister Yitzhak Modai told Israeli economic reporters on Wednesday that his ministry is approaching European governments, European and Japanese banks and Jewish financiers worldwide to fill the gap left by the Bush administration's rejection of the guarantees.

The task will be made harder by competition from many needy countries, including those if the former Soviet bloc, and by the loss of what Israel's Central Bank Governor Jacob Frenkel refers to as the "American calling card."

Frenkel said U.S. approval of the guarantees would have been "a positive signal to the markets" of Israel's ability to pay back loans.

Now, he said, the Jewish state will have to fight alone to get credit at favorable terms.

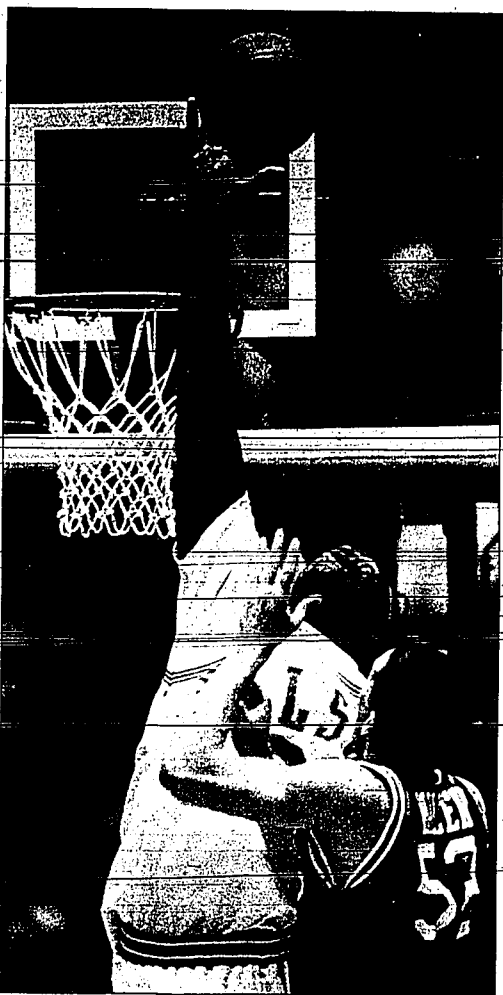

Lowly Ivy League school scares them all

WORCESTER, Mass. - Princeton has to be the only basketball team to ever gain its reputation as a giant-killer without ever winning a game.
The Tigers are making their fourth consecutive trip to the NCAA tournament as Ivy League champions. The last three resulted in hand-wringing near losses for some of the country's larger programs, but the key word is near.
"It's odd we get the respect we do and have never won, but that's how things work sometimes," Tigers senior forward Matt Eastwick said.
Syracuse is Princeton's opponent in the final of four games in the East Regional on Friday, the third Big East team in the Tigers' non-winning magical run.
It all started in 1989 when the Tigers, seeded 16th, came within 20 seconds and a possible final-second foul call of beating top-seeded Georgetown before falling 50-49.
The nation's attention was caught.
Next was Arkansas, a fourth seed, which squeaked past the 13th-seeded Tigers 68-64.
Princeton was actually one seed higher at No. 8 than Villanova was last year, but the most dramatic of endings, a jumper with 1.3 seconds left, gave the Wildcats the victory and kept the mystique intact.
"Princeton is no longer a surprise," Syracuse coach Jim Boheim said Thursday night.

Among the winners were top-ranked Duke, No. 3 Ohio State, No. 5 Indiana, No. 8 Southern Cal, No. 9 Arkansas, No. 13 Alabama, No. 16 Missouri, No. 18 North Carolina, No. 19 Seton Hall, No. 20 Florida State, No. 22 Georgetown and No. 25 LSU. Also advancing were four unranked teams - Iowa, Georgia Tech, Connecticut and Memphis State - ninth-seeded Iowa, which beat eighth-seeded Texas 98-97 in the East, was the only team to beat a higher seed.
Although they won, Seton Hall, North Carolina and Alabama struggled.
Terry DeHare made a 17-foot jumper with 1.8 seconds left as Seton Hall rallied to beat La Salle 78-76 in the East.
In the Southeast, Dean Smith became the winningest coach in NCAA tournament history when North Carolina edged Miami of Ohio 68-63, and Latrell Sprewell scored 18 second-half points as Alabama slipped by Stanford 80-75.

In the Midwest, Arkansas beat Murray State 80-69. Memphis State defeated Pepperdine 80-70. Georgia Tech downed Houston 65-60, and Southern Cal stomped Northeast Louisiana 84-54.
Georgetown overpowered South Florida 75-60, Florida State beat Montana 78-68, LSU beat BYU 94-83, and Indiana routed Eastern Illinois 94-55 in the West.
Missouri eliminated West Virginia 89-78 and Duke routed Campbell 82-60 in the East, while Ohio State routed Mississippi Valley State 83-56 and Connecticut crushed Nebraska 86-63 in the Southeast.
La Salle (20-11) led Seton Hall for most of the game and was ahead 70-62 after Randy Woods made a 3-pointer with 4:13 left. But Seton Hall (22-8) closed to 74-71 when John Leahy made the last of his four 3-pointers with 2:38 remaining.

Jack Hurd's basket with 48 seconds left tied the score for La Salle, but Seton Hall worked the ball for the last shot, passing around the perimeter until Bryan Caver found DeHare in the left corner for his game-winner.
"We ran the same play about 30 seconds before and we weren't successful," DeHare said. "We felt confident I would get the same open shot and I was confident that I was going to hit it."

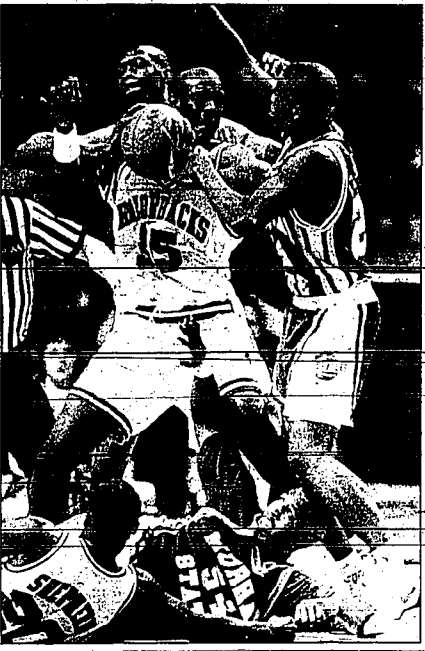

Time for Bush to show his strength on foreign affairs

Paul Tsongas' exit means the November presidential race will pit the glad-handing governor of Arkansas against a president whose credentials and experience in world affairs are second to nobody's.

This contest will take place in a year when enormous stakes depend on how the West reacts to events in Russia. A year of risk and opportunity for the twin causes of peace and democracy.

So why is President Bush continuing to let domestic issues dominate the campaign?

Bush has been a passive target long enough for the likes of Patrick Buchanan, the gadfly GOP challenger who routinely hammers the president with his "America-first" nonsense.

Of all years in U.S. history, 1992 is not the year for isolationism. George Bush can, if he dares, lead America toward a broader, bolder, wiser view.

So why doesn't he?

There's no denying that Buchanan's jingoistic volumes are striking a chord with voters. But, as Richard Nixon points out, "the true mark of leadership is not simply to support what is popular but to make what is unpopular popular, if it serves our national interest."

Nixon sounded an urgent wake-up call to the president and the nation last week. In a speech and in articles printed in national media, the former president chided Bush for doing "too little for the former Soviet states."

"If we fail to step up to this issue, the West risks snatching defeat in the

Cold War from the jaws of victory," Nixon said.

He argued that the West must do all it can to ensure the success of Boris Yeltsin's democratic government, or else risk the rise of a new dictatorship. Such a dictatorship could propel the world back toward the abyss of arms proliferation and nuclear terror.

Nixon's called for both emergency and long-term aid, greater access to Western markets for Russia's exports and creation of a "free enterprise corps" of Western managers to teach Russians about free markets.

Cynics may say that Nixon is seizing this issue to help rehabilitate his image. Let them. Whatever Nixon's motive, he's right.

American response to Russia's need so far has been pathetic. A little leftover food from the Gulf War. Two hundred Peace Corps volunteers. A pittance.

When Bush replies that, "there isn't a lot of money around," he is shrinking the greatest opportunity of his career. Why? Is he that afraid of Buchanan and Bill Clinton?

Domestic issues such as health care and "jobs, jobs, jobs" are important, yes. But when history looks at the 1990s, the date the recession-ended will be a footnote. The outcome of a "new Russian revolution" will be a central theme.

The Iron Desert Storm has been timid too long. Show American voters some leadership in the international arena, and they will be smart enough to respond.

Senators didn't back Andrus

Recent comments in *The Times-News* indicate there may be a need to clarify recent Senate actions on the public school funding bill. The vote of three GOP senators to block passage of the House bill was not a vote in support of the governor's budget.

It was a vote in support of the efforts of Idaho legislators, the superintendent of public instruction, a bipartisan group of legislators and the governor to bring about basic accountability and reform of the school system. Such reform in recent years has been high on the Republican legislative agenda.

Two years ago, the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, including the leadership of Boise Cascade, Hewlett-Packard, Micron, U.S. West and others, committed some \$400,000 of private funds for a thorough review of Idaho schools.

Legislative funds hired Dr. Terrell Bell, U.S. Secretary of Education under President Reagan, to work with a broad-based group

of Idaho citizens and educators to devise basic changes which would strengthen parental involvement in the schools, shift to a performance-based system, focus on early intervention for high-risk students and incorporate advanced technology in the classroom and management systems. The education portion of the governor's "strong start" program is included.

The appropriations bill which passed the House of Representatives targeted no funds for school reform. Because of that deficiency, two other senators and I voted to block the House measure. We also voted to amend the House bill to add ineffective reform language or to simply add more dollars. The move to amend failed on a party line vote of 21-21.

Discussions are under way for an appropriations bill which contains adequate reform language and can make its way through the legislative process. SEN. LAIRD NOH Kimberly

Pressure officials to act on juvenile center

The five-county board developed "to find a more permanent solution" for juvenile delinquents has really screwed up. They up and spent \$119,000 of our money on a facility, not knowing for sure if it was even zoned for this use. After finding out they could not use it, they have it underwritten (for \$45,000, I understand) and try to sell it.

Twin Falls County owns a large piece of property across the street from the new jail. This is zoned correctly and would be an ideal location.

I asked a commissioner if this had been considered. His answer was that this property was needed for future expansion of the existing jail. A new jail, I might add.

Well, as I see it, the future is now and in the form of a juvenile detention center. Any new jail expansion (adult) would be to extend the existing pods of the new jail, should this ever be necessary. Lt. Ron Atkinson, who is heading the city's public protection team, is very concerned about street gangs. We all are, of course. He said, "A major factor is the completion of a juvenile detention center." Forget it, Ron, no room there!

The five-county board is only considering a detention center to house 12 juveniles. Twin Falls County alone has more than 12 juveniles in custody right now. They want to spend money on a facility that won't even take care of our own needs.

If we build a facility, we need to build it large enough to house at least 20 juveniles. Granted, this would cost more, but we could maintain capacity by leasing out any extra beds to other counties needing help. Twin Falls County pays dearly to have excess juveniles housed in other facilities.

The county has contracted with Health and Welfare for \$29,000 per month to house the eight juveniles at the fairgrounds, because the sheriff doesn't want the responsibility or have the manpower. I think we could get a lot of additional manpower for \$29,000.

They have already wasted \$119,000. We need to put pressure on them to use the property we already own. We also need a facility

large enough to house all of the counties needs now and in the future.

U.S. government should have to balance its books

The Idaho Legislature is engaged in its annual tug-of-war with the governor over funding public education within the constraints of projected revenue. Regardless of the

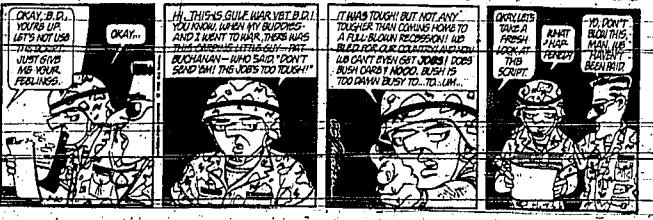

Utah suggests session to legalize prayers

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A Utah County lawmaker has asked Gov. Norm Bangerter to consider calling a special session to amend the state constitution to allow for prayer at public government meetings.

Rep. John Valentine, R-Orem, said he has support from numerous colleagues upset over a recent court ruling that restrictive language in the Utah Constitution prohibits prayer at city council meetings.

Bangerter's chief of staff, Steve Meacham, said he spoke with Valentine and has passed the suggestion on to a receptive Bangerter.

"The governor said he would seriously consider it, just like he would seriously consider any other request for a special session," Meacham said.

provide ample time to place the issue on the ballot in November.

A constitutional amendment requires a two-thirds majority in both houses in order to place on the ballot, where it would have to be approved by the voters.

The controversy results from a recent ruling in a lawsuit filed by a group opposed to the Salt Lake City Council opening its meetings with a prayer. Third District Judge J. Dennis Frederick found the state constitution, whose language is stricter than its federal counterpart, prohibits any mixing of religion and government.

It says, in part: "No public money or property shall be appropriated for or applied to any religious worship, exercise or instruction, or for the support of any ecclesiastical establishment."

The Salt Lake city council voted this week to appeal the decision to the Utah Supreme Court.

The American Civil Liberties Union has threatened to sue city councils that continue to flout Frederick's ruling.

Grouse find home on Yakima firing range

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — The state's dwindling population of sage grouse, which once flourished across the Columbia plateau, has found a home on the range — the firing range.

Sage grouse in Washington live only at the Army's Yakima Firing Center and on private land in Douglas County. The bird is a candidate for listing as a threatened or endangered species.

"It looks like it's in pretty bad shape," said Jim Michaels of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which will survey the birds in June.

The Army hired Battelle Northwest four years ago to study the bird's habitat needs and learn how to train without harming the grouse.

"Current Department of Defense policy is to treat it as though it's already been listed, even though it's just a candidate," said Col. Richard Nelson, firing center commander.

The Battelle study has identified where the

grouse mate, nest and raise their young. The Army avoids heavy use of grouse areas during those times, Nelson said.

Les Eberhardt, director of the Battelle study, estimates 300 to 500 grouse make their home in the hills and valleys of the 260,000-acre firing range.

"Half the population lives in a small valley and a fire could wipe them out," he said. "There is very little suitable habitat left."

The Washington grouse may have become isolated from larger groups in Oregon, Michaels said. The smaller population could become extinct without an influx of new grouse.

Some researchers believe at least 20,000 acres are needed to maintain even a small number of grouse, said Dave Ware of the state Wildlife Department.

Sagebrush is the staple of the bird's diet, making up about 80 percent of what it eats, Eberhardt said.

"If you don't have sagebrush, you don't have sage grouse," he said.

Ironically, the bird has been able to survive at the firing center — where troops drive tanks and test the latest weaponry — because of the Army's presence.

Grouse lost much of their habitat in recent decades as sage lands in Eastern Washington were developed for agriculture, ranching and urban use, Eberhardt said.

The firing center preserved large areas of sagebrush.

"Had the firing center not been there, the grouse would not be there," Eberhardt said.

The Army and the Fish and Wildlife Service are close to signing an agreement that would help rehabilitate parts of the range and protect grouse breeding and brooding grounds, Nelson and Michaels said.

ACLU questions Mormon teacher revising sex ed

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union Thursday asked the state Board of Education to reverse its hiring of a Mormon theology teacher to revise a proposed sex-education curriculum for public schools.

Michele Parish, executive director of the Utah ACLU, said at a news conference at West High School that the board's action may violate constitutional provisions separating church and state.

She called the hiring last week of Utah Valley Community College LDS Institute teacher Wayne Brickey a "clear effort by the board to indoctrinate students with (board members') own moral beliefs."

The board has come under fire from other groups as well for dismissing a broad-based panel of citizens and health experts who wrote the sex-education guide and hiring Brickey to add abstinence-based values.

Parish said the proposed curriculum already is "value laden," and the addition of more abstinence-based material would slant it too far towards Mormon beliefs.

"It would clearly put it outside the beliefs of mainstream Utah and move it from a secular, nonsectarian guideline squarely into church doctrine," she said.

Parish also questioned the credentials of Brickey, who is a doctoral candidate in morals and

values. "I believe it is inappropriate to hire someone whose sole credentials are 20 years of teaching Mormon doctrine," she said.

Parish sent a letter to Scott Bean, new state superintendent of public instruction, criticizing the dismissal of the original panel.

"Most Utahns want accurate sex education information made available to Utah students. This is not possible if what they are given is church doctrine in its stead," the letter said.

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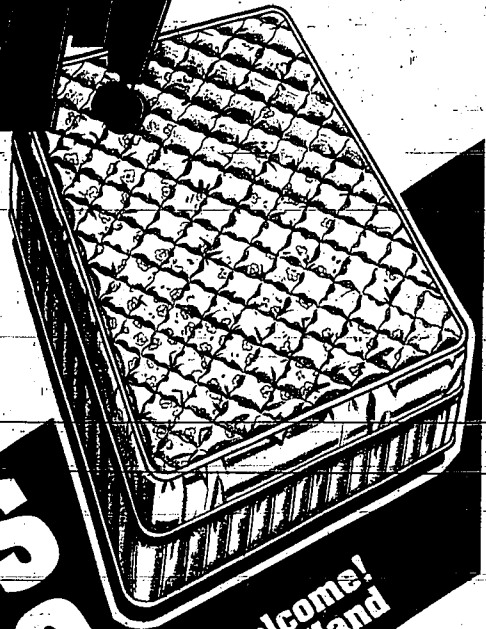

House kills student free-speech bill

BOISE - The state House on Thursday narrowly defeated a bill intended to protect students' freedom of expression rights. The bill, sponsored by Rep. Millie Flandro, D-Pocatello, would have strictly limited the ability of principals, superintendents, and other school administrators to censor student publications and otherwise limit student speech. It was intended to reverse a 1988 decision

by the U.S. Supreme Court that expanded powers of administrators to limit speech that was "inconsistent with (the school's) basic educational mission."

Flandro said some people had asked her to limit the bill's scope to school newspapers,

but she decided that would create "an elite set of students who have rights and others who do not. There are more rights than those given to the student papers."

But the focus, both of the bill and the House debate, was on student journalists, whom Flandro said have borne the brunt of censorship attempts by school administrators.

The bill would have prohibited speech that was obscene, libelous or slanderous, or which incited students to commit crimes or violate lawful school regulations.

In the case of school papers, a journalism adviser would have been responsible for making sure students stayed within those limits.

Several lawmakers, including Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, opposed the bill because, they said, it would give students too much freedom without enough restraint.

"I'm not sure you can cut the strings as much as this bill is proposing to do," Black said.

Arsonists torch home of BLM fire lookout

KIMAMA - A fire in eastern Lincoln County destroyed an empty mobile home Wednesday night that serves as seasonal shelter for a Bureau of Land Management fire lookout.

Two Minn-Cassia area youths will be charged with first-degree arson in connection with the blaze, said Lt. Randall White of the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office.

A farmer noticed a flash from the fire, which was near the Kimama lookout post on the Lincoln-Minidoka County border, at about 8:30 p.m., White said.

The farmer called authorities from his cellular telephone, and deputies arrested a 16-year-old Acquia boy and a 17-year-old Burley boy, White said.

Cheese plant official ponders rehiring some employees

JEROME - An official with a dry cheese manufacturing plant in Jerome remains "hopeful" that he will soon be able to hire back the 30 employees laid off in February due to lack of business.

"The economy is picking up a little bit and we're doing everything we can to pick up new sales," Director of Manufacturing Dan Carrico said. "We have no plans of closing our doors," he said.

The cutback in employees was required due to reduced customer orders for dry cheese products.

Contamination threat spurs quick cleanup at INEL

TWIN FALLS - The threat of exposure to chromium and radiation has prompted state and federal officials to take quick action on cleanup at an idled reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The federal Energy Department, Environmental Protection Agency and the state of Idaho believe the exposure threat mostly to plant employees at INEL's Power Burst Facility are high enough to warrant "imminent action" cleanup.

Quick action on cleanup of contamination at a Corrosive Waste Sump, Evaporation Pond and associated transfer pipes would reduce exposure risk to human health and environment, officials say.

The facility was used from 1972 through 1985 to test commercial power reactor fuel rods under simulated accident conditions. It now is in standby, but no future use is anticipated.

The corrosive sump, transfer pipes and evaporation pond are contaminated with organic solvents, metals and radioactive materials during reactor operations. The cleanup would involve about 100 cubic yards of material. The proposed plan evaluates two alternatives for cleanup.

Public meetings are planned at 6:30 p.m. April 8 at the Westbank Inn in Idaho and April 9 at the Burley Inn in Burley. Both meetings will be preceded by a one-hour informal discussion period.

Information on the Power Burst Facility Interim Action is available at public libraries in Boise, Moscow, Pocatello, Twin Falls and Idaho Falls.

Kniewel still hangs in mid-air

TWIN FALLS - Robbie Kniewel must wait to hear those magic words: Go take a flying leap.

A meeting Thursday among city, county and state officials shed light on a jump that Kniewel made a couple of weeks ago in California. But the gathering didn't produce a decision about letting him jump the Snake River Canyon.

Nor do officials want to decide yet, Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said.

"Rather than make a hasty decision, we decided to study the matter," he said.

Part of this study included a trip by Commissioner Jim Fraley, City Councilman Jim Vickers and Deputy Prosecutor E. Scott Paul to Cerritos, Calif., a city of about 60,000 in Orange County.

Between 12,000 and 15,000 people watched Kniewel try to jump 25 pickups, they said.

He fell short but was not seriously injured.

The three said the trip gave them a good glimpse of how such an event is staged. Vickers said the trip also shed light on the 29-year-old Kniewel's organization.

"There's a real question as to how much Robbie can do and what his capabilities are," Vickers said.

The California jump was managed by a promoter and everything from security to concessions were planned by someone other than Kniewel, Fraley and Vickers said.

While the trip raised questions about Kniewel's organization, Vickers said it also convinced him that the Twin Falls-area community could stage a Kniewel jump.

residents want to do so. "I think the event could take place and probably be handled well," he said.

"He was not coming out for or against the jump," Vickers said.

Generally, Fraley said, Robbie jumped a clean-cut crowd that probably was from the Los Angeles area, he said. Alcohol was not allowed.

Four deputy sheriffs were on hand along with 24 large, private security guards, he said. "If the jump did happen, we should investigate hiring those gentlemen to come up," Fraley said.

From talking with the promoter and others, the Fraley, Vickers and Paul said they learned a few tips on how to stage an event.

Hold it early in the day to discourage people from drinking alcohol. Keep the gates moving to keep the crowd happy. Free events cause fewer security problems.

Steve Leroy, a public relations consultant whom the Twin Falls County Commission hired for advice on the matter, said he believes a Kniewel jump could be "highly marketable." But Leroy advised

House panel kills measure seeking local-option tax for Blaine County

BOISE - A bill that would have allowed Blaine County to impose a local-option tax on real estate transfers died a quick and relatively painless death in committee Thursday.

But Blaine County Commissioner Tom Blanchard said the county will probably try again next year.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, would have allowed "resort counties" to impose a 5 percent tax on real estate transfers within the county, if 60 percent of the voters casting ballots approved it.

The money raised by the tax would be split between the county and the

incorporated or chartered cities within it. The two could spend the money only for purposes identified in the ordinance establishing the tax.

Any such tax could not rise more than .5 percent a year, to a maximum of 2 percent, and could last no more than six years. The first \$50,000 of a property's value would be tax-exempt, a provision designed to weed out moderate-income homeowners.

"Resort counties" were defined as those having 30,000 or fewer people and at least 1,000 hotel rooms or other "short-term rental units."

Blaine and Bonner counties would be the only applicants to qualify under that definition, Stennett said, although Valley County would also fit the proposed Val-Bois resort is built.

Blanchard, along with other Blaine County officials and business people, told the House Revenue and Taxation Committee Wednesday that the county needed a local tax to help it meet the needs created by the massive annual influx of tourists and part-year residents, many of them from out of state.

Citing figures from the Blaine County sheriff's office, Blanchard said that accidents on county roads have increased 56 percent over the last three years, traffic volume on Idaho Highway 75 has increased 30 percent in the same period, and the number of bookings annually into the county jail has risen from 400 to 900.

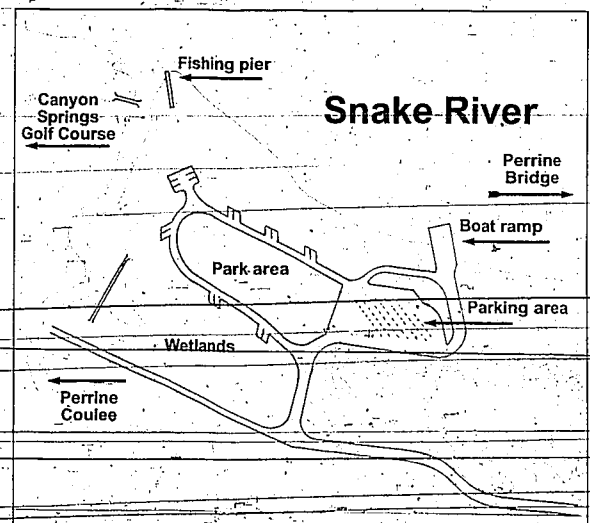
"This is just in the discussion phase," said Steve Ellis, BLM's Monument Resource Area manager. The discussion didn't include any live ammunition or aircraft, Ellis said.

"They (the tanks) just drive around." But "those tanks don't need highly," said state Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, who held a BLM grazing permit in the proposed tank training area. If the livestock industry had as heavy an impact, it would have been gone a long time ago, he said.

The National Guard has had a special-use permit for the area north of Kimama since 1968. The permit was amended in 1972 to include three areas totaling about

In other middle school news, a community tour of the new facility is set for 2 p.m. today. Garner said construction at the new school is now

about 75 percent complete.

High school librarian Connie Parkson gave trustees a guided tour of the new Career Information System on line in the library. With it, students can retrieve information on career opportunities and possible financial aid sources. The system is delivered via new computer hardware purchased with a technical assistance grant from the state, and Parkson said students are finding many other uses for the system.

She showed how the computer can access a fully illustrated encyclopedia, thesaurus, dictionary and grammar check, and said students have used it to research a variety of reports.

"The word is spreading really fast," Parkson said. "I'm delighted there's a lot of use."

In other business:

Trustees received a letter from Mari Calhoun of the Kimberly Education Association, which is seeking recognition as exclusive bargaining agent for the district's teachers.

In her letter, Calhoun said the association has polled all teachers and received signed statements from 76 percent agreeing to the association's

representation. The association asked the board to set preliminary negotiations "as soon as possible."

The board agreed to advertise for a new high school principal to replace Don Loughmiller, who resigned last month.

The administrator will be hired under a new job description also approved by the board Thursday. Garner said district job descriptions probably had not been updated in 20 years, and he is taking the opportunity to revise them as positions come open.

The district has applied for a \$39,000 grant from the Idaho Department of Water Resources to upgrade heating systems at the high school and elementary school.

Dwayne C. Sudweeks of Engineering Systems Associates Inc. in Pocatello assisted with the grant application, and he said Kimberly has a 90 percent chance of landing the funds. A decision should be made by April 15.

The board heard from Kimberly Parent-Teacher-Student Organization co-chairwomen Linda Johnson and Kris Burbank, who said the group's annual carnival raised \$5,338 after expenses.

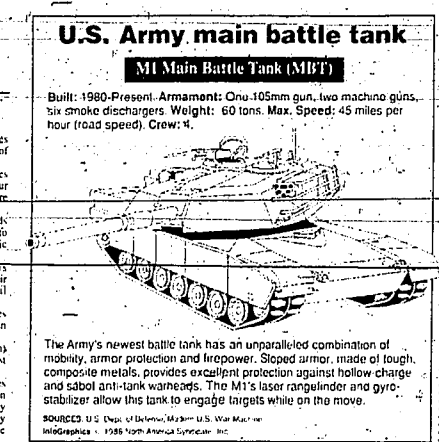

23,500 acres and a compound that has been used to store old tanks. A lone armored personnel carrier now sits there, rusting in the sun.

The use by "tracked vehicles," such as tanks — is an accepted use of BLM's current resource management plan for the area.

"But they haven't made much use of it in the past few years," Ellis said.

Peavey suggested training be combined with the operation of the Orchard range — or move it an area east of Minidoka that has no fences because it was mostly by sheep.

The National Guard proposal would drop the northernmost of the three areas and expand the other two to make up for the reduction in acreage. And it would bring in no more than 18 M-1 tanks.

But with the new tanks, the compound will need a 24-hour armed guard, Ellis said.

Guard units from Twin Falls, Burley and Rupert would use the area only on weekends during the summer, Ellis said. More serious training will be done at the Orchard Training Area within the Snake River Birds of Prey Area in Ada County.

The change in use, however, would require a change in the resource management plan, Ellis said.

But the BLM no longer issues

special use permits so it can't just amend the current special use permit, Ellis said. The National Guard and the BLM will have to work out just to authorize the change in use — through a military land withdrawal or a land lease.

The northern area — about 6,000 acres — includes some good range land and some native grasses. It borders three Wilderness Study Areas recommended for wilderness status: the Great Rift WSA to the east, the Sand Butte WSA to the north and the Sand Butte WSA to the west.

But the southern areas — about 9,000 and 7,000 acres, respectively — are less valuable. "It's a lot of cheat grass," Ellis said.

The BLM plans full public participation and full environmental review according to National Environmental Policy Act, he said.

"The National Guard will have to foot the bill. We don't have the funding or the people to get through a NEPA process," Ellis said.

Peavey said federal restrictions to multiple use on the Snake River Plain — with the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, Air Force bombing ranges, the Orchard training area and now the tank range — are growing. "It's getting to be quite expensive," he said.

No one at Idaho National Guard in Boise was available to comment.

cities," already levy local-option sales taxes to help fund their transportation-related infrastructure needs. But those taxes don't help the county as a whole, Commissioner Alan Reynolds said.

And passing bond issues is becoming less and less a viable option, he added. Although Blaine is one of the lowest levy rates in the state, he said, sky-high property values mean voters are increasingly wary of anything that would increase property taxes.

"Our infrastructure and capital needs have been identified," Reynolds said. "Our revenue source has not. That's why we're here."

But Mark Dunham, executive vice president of the Idaho Association of Realtors, said a real-estate transfer tax was the wrong way to raise revenue.

"Not only would it be an undependable source of revenue, given the real-estate price swings in recent Wood River Valley history, but it would affect lower-income people the most," Dunham said. Given home prices in the area, he said, the \$50,000 exemption

wouldn't help much.

Randy Nelson, president of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, added that although the measure was titled "the Resort-County Property Tax Alternative Act," it would not require counties to use all or any of the money raised by a real-estate transfer tax to lower property taxes.

Blaine and the panel turned thumbs down on the proposal, deciding to hold it in committee on a voice vote.

"The concept of a real estate transfer tax — I just don't want to see that camel's nose under the tent," said Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg, explaining his opposition.

Blanchard and Stennett were underfunded after the Thursday morning vote, saying they would probably bring back a different version of the same idea next year.

Noting that it took two or three attempts before the Legislature passed local-option tax legislation for resort cities in the 1970s, Blanchard said, "You come down here and try to find out what they really want and then you come back. Sometimes it takes a few tries."

Jami Mitchell, co-editor of Twin Falls High School's Brum News, said the letters were written as part of a class exercise.

"We were exercising our free speech rights," she said. "The legislators should be rewarding us, not complaining about our writing them."

Rep. Jim Kempton, R-Albion, said he was concerned that the bill was too vague and would not give administrators enough power to prevent disruption of school activities.

Under the bill, school officials would have been able to ban speech they thought would "materially and substantially disrupt" normal school activities based on "specific facts, including past experience, and current events influencing students' behavior and not on undifferentiated fear or apprehension."

"How in the world does anyone separate intuition based on past experience from fear and apprehension?" Kempton asked.

But Rep. Mike Simpson, R-

Blackfoot, said opponents were "reading a lot more into this bill than is really there."

"Responsibility is not something you're born with, it's something you learn," Simpson said. "I submit that in order to teach responsibility, you have to give students some latitude to make mistakes."

And Rep. Mark Stubbs, R-Twin Falls, said the bill created defined and allocated rights, responsibilities and liabilities between students, journalists, teachers and administrators.

Right now, Stubbs said, should a student paper libel someone, administrators can be sued along with teachers and the students' parents, removing their liability, he said, would also remove any need for them to review papers before publication.

The final vote was 37-42. Besides Stubbs, the only major Valley legislators who voted for the bill were Doug Jensen, R-Filer; Patrice Neffler, R-Wendell; and Clint Stumacher, R-Ketchikan.

Brum News advisor Mary Lou Heider said she was disappointed by the bill's failure, but added, "I'm happy we had so much support as well. I was surprised to tell you the truth."

Added Mitchell: "It's pretty depressing, but I guess we can try again."

Castleford teachers retire, head to school

CASTLEFORD — The Castleford School Board accepted resignations from two teachers at its meeting earlier this week.

After 35 years in front of a classroom, fifth-grade teacher Richard Jeppesen is retiring.

Jeppesen told the board in his letter of resignation that he has enjoyed his years at Castleford and will miss the students and teachers, but that he is ready to spend a few years relaxing.

The board also accepted the resignation of sixth-grade teacher Richard Dykes.

Dykes plans to enter the counselor education program at Idaho State University and says he would like to return to Castleford as school counselor when he is finished.

Third-grade teacher Garlandy Kyles will move to the fifth grade; the school will advertise for a third-grade and a sixth-grade teacher.

After a second reading, the board adopted its new student worker policy.

The policy states that any high-achieving students in grades 9 through 12 who receive failing grades in three or more classes in any quarter must improve their grades over the next quarter or be classified as a non-worker.

When three or more failures occur for two consecutive quarters, the student will be excluded from regular classes and will be counseled into an alternative program with the principal and parents involved if possible.

The board moved to enlarge the computer room by moving the east wall further east into the math room, at a cost of \$4,000, and to complete two classrooms on the west side of the elementary, for under \$17,000.

Funds will come from lottery money, and monies left in the physical plant fund.

In his teacher's report, band instructor Dennis Heidel gave trustees an overview of his current band program and expressed concern that the cost of band instruments is causing many beginning band students to drop out of the program.

Heidel suggested that the school look into the possibility of budgeting for the purchase of horns.

Heidel also reported that he would like to add an introductory guitar and keyboard class to the curriculum.

In other business:

Chairman Fred Schaefer commended Superintendent Henry Kistner, Principal Kelly Murphy and District Clerk Brenda Thomson for their excellent work for the school district.

Vocational-agriculture instructor Andy Wiseman will receive the State FFA Honorary membership award at the State FFA Conference to be held in Twin Falls next month.

Guests in attendance: Megan Proksa, Paetelie, will be at the Castleford Schools for two weeks beginning March 30 and another two weeks beginning April 27, to work with students in grades kindergarten through 12.

The board moved to accept Bill Garrison, Castleford, as a student teacher next semester and to hire him as an English and history teacher when he receives his final degree.

The board moved to lease out five unused shares of the school district's irrigation water. Sealed bids will be accepted until April 7.

The board will hold a special board meeting on April 7. The spring band concert will be held on April 21 at 7:30 p.m.

Senate OKs CSI, Gooding school funds

BOISE — The state Senate Thursday unanimously approved funding for the 1993 fiscal year for two Magic Valley educational institutions: the College of Southern Idaho and the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind.

CSI will receive about \$4,108,400 under the community college appropriation bill, said Sen. Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, who carried the measure in the Senate. It now must be approved by the House.

The total appropriation for CSI and North Idaho College was \$8,441,400. That's \$7,300 more than Gov. Cecil Andrus asked for in his budget proposal, but \$381,700 less than the colleges are slated to receive during the current fiscal year.

CSI President Gerald Meyerhoefer said the appropriation was "about as good as one could expect this year."

"We understand things are tight, but we feel we've been treated very fairly," said Meyerhoefer, who was in Boise to check on the progress of CSI's request for funds to start building a new library.

That request is on hold in the joint House-Senate budget committee until the two chambers vote on a capital improvements bonding bill.

The Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind, located in Gooding, will receive \$4,976,100 in the next fiscal year under another funding bill passed by the Senate Thursday.

Again, that represents an increase — \$85,600 — over Andrus' request, but a cut — \$20,900 — over the current year's appropriation.

That's because one-time money that was available last year for all the various education budgets wasn't there this year.

Jim Rainier, superintendent of the Gooding school, said the budget was tight, but it could have been worse.

"We realize the state has a money crunch this year, but we'll accept it," he said. "I'd rather know up front, so we can plan for it, than get hit with a holdback in the middle of the year."

The school employs the equivalent of 117 full-time workers, Rainier said, and all their salaries will be frozen. The school will also put off replacing some old computers.

Telecommunications devices for the Deaf (TDDs) and other equipment.

The current budgets for the two schools would be shaved under a bill before the House. The bill reduces every general fund account in the fiscal 1992 budget, except the one for public schools, by 1.1 percent.

It is intended to help eliminate a budget shortfall of nearly \$11 million.

If passed, that "negative supplemental" bill would cut the 1992 appropriation for the two community colleges to \$8,726,300 and the School for the Deaf and the Blind appropriation to \$4,940,500.

The board will review the report and discuss the proposal again at its next school board meeting.

If the board decides the trimester proposal is acceptable, it will be put into action with the next school year.

McGrew also presented what he called "Phase 2" of the trimester technology proposal, which is a five-year plan.

McGrew said the plan calls for computers in all classrooms, networking equipment, and proper training for teachers so they have the necessary tools to instruct students in the latest in technological equipment.

McGrew said the cost for this phase of the proposal ranged from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Superintendent James Fisher told board members this kind of expense was not unreasonable over the course of five years.

McGrew said he would bring the board more information as he continued to explore it.

In other business:

Test drilling to determine the fate of the drain field and septic system at the school in Hollister is complete, and the results are not encouraging.

Scott McClure of McClure Engineering told board members the ground may not be deep enough to meet the requirements of the Department of Health and Welfare and the Department of Health and Welfare.

McClure said if the two weren't satisfied with the depth for the drain field, other more costly alternatives would have to be considered.

High school athletic director LaRell Patterson asked the board to raise athletic fees and board passes for families and individuals for the next school year.

The board agreed to make a decision at the next meeting.

Howard Moon was given a plaque in appreciation for his 27 years with the school district. Moon is the high school counselor, and he will retire at the end of the school year.

Filer schools agree to lower grading scale

FILER — The Filer School District adopted a new grading policy after a number of parents asked the School Board to consider lowering the grade scale.

The board is also considering changing to a trimester system and is looking at a proposal to put computers in classrooms.

Parents expressed concern at the last School Board meeting about the higher grade point standards, limiting some students' ability to win scholarships.

Filer's grade scale was: 92 and above: A; 84 to 91: B; 74 to 83: C; 64 to 73: D; and below 63 was a failing grade. This scale was higher than many other school districts in the area.

Now the grade scale will be: 90 or above is an A; 80 to 89: a B; 70 to 79: a C; 60 to 69: D and below 60 is a failing grade.

The decision to change the grading policy was made by board members at Tuesday evening's meeting.

Board members also agreed to consider two new proposals presented by high school Principal Bob McGrew.

McGrew said numerous other schools in Idaho have recently switched to a trimester class system. The trimester would consist of three 12-week periods during the school year.

Each day would have five 70-minute periods for classes. There are currently four one week periods each year, with seven 50-minute periods for classes.

"It is an excellent program for science and math classes," he said. "High school students can easily handle the longer period during the day."

Some other benefits mentioned include: improved student test scores for schools that now have the new system, fewer drop outs, and better opportunities for students to take elective classes while still meeting graduation requirements.

The board will review the report and discuss the proposal again at its next school board meeting.

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Rupert delays decision on mental health clinic

RUPERT — The Rupert City Council made no decision to rezone property to allow a Paul mental health clinic to move to town.

Lessor John DeThomas asked the council at its recent meeting to rezone the land from residential to commercial so the Idaho Mental Health Services could move into a larger facility.

The service desires a more modern building and a more convenient location on property in Rupert, according to Councilman Ron Klebe.

DeThomas hopes to purchase the land that is a half-block deep on the north side of Eighth Street and stretches for three lots that face west on 1 Street.

DeThomas said he would build the facility and lease it to Mental Health Services under a five-year contract.

Allan Goodman, representing DeThomas, said that area residents expressed concerns about the project at last week's Rupert Planning and Zoning Commission meeting.

He said the original proposal asked for rezoning on only the north side of the street. For consistency's sake, the request was made at the zoning board hearing to include a half-block on the south side of the street, creating a corridor for future development.

Residents also worried about increased traffic in the area, particularly in the alley at the back of the proposed building on the corner of K Street and Eighth Street.

Goodman said the alley provides access to property owners and is a place where neighborhood children play.

Residents suggested the property be barricaded along the north side, directing traffic towards K Street rather than giving access onto the alley and that it be posted "No Through Traffic," he said.

Klebe said that a 15-mile-per-hour sign could be posted in the alley, but that it could not be restricted to the general public.

Residents also wondered if such a facility would damage or harm the children in the neighborhood.

Goodman will meet with neighbors for dining with mental illness based on their efforts to treat these people locally," adding he doubted the facility would pose increased risks to residents in the area.

"I don't want any development down there," Dennis Perkins, an area resident, said. "It's a quiet neighborhood."

Councilman Steve Porch questioned the rezoning.

"Why are we planning the city and then unplanning it," Porch asked.

"The proposal was tabled until further information could be gathered from area residents."

In other business, Gordon Fong informed the council that this is Rupert's 75th anniversary of its incorporation date, and the July 4th parade theme will be "75th Diamond Anniversary."

The Parks and Recreation office is working on an expanded swimming season with the Minidoka County School District.

A two-week session for beginners and life saving is being planned.

Nevada alleges waste violations at Beatty dump

CARSON CITY (AP) — US Ecology has been hit with a state Division of Environmental Protection order alleging improper waste storage at its low-level radioactive waste dump near Beatty.

The DEP said Thursday its order was issued because Louisville, Ky.-based US Energy kept barrels of contaminated run-off water in 55-gallon barrels this winter longer than the 90 days allowed by state and federal rules.

Verne Rosse, the DEP's waste management chief, said the barrels have since been removed but the order must be issued anyway.

The administrative order requires the corporation to submit a report on container storage by March 23 and to attend a conference to discuss the alleged violation.

The order is the latest in a series of hassles for the dump, which is scheduled to close next January. After that, low-level waste from Nevada and other states in the Rocky Mountains compact region will be buried at US Ecology's Richland, Wash., facility.

Nevada Human Resources Director Jerry Christopher has said the dump will close ahead of schedule if the U.S. Supreme Court rules this month that amendments to the federal waste policy act are unconstitutional.

Christopher and Gov. Bob Miller made it clear that the state isn't taking a low-level radioactive waste dump.

US Ecology spokeswoman Constance Parrish said she doubts Nevada would take such an approach, adding: "Automatic closure of the Beatty site is not responsible."

In addition to the pending U.S. Supreme Court case, US Ecology filed suit in state and federal courts for injunctive relief. The suits rule that boosted fees for dumping hazardous waste at the Beatty site.

The state has asked for dismissal and argued that individual members of the Environmental Commission are immune from the suit.

COEUR D'ALENE — Children's Village and the Kootenai Humane Society will split the lion's share of an \$80,000 bequest left to Kootenai County by an out-of-state donor.

County commissioners awarded the two organizations \$30,000 each this week to help fund major expansion projects. Commissioners reserved the rest of the money for a natural resources project.

More than a dozen organizations and individuals applied for the money. Commissioners said they favored projects that would benefit the entire county and have something to do with Fillmore Murphy's three loves: children, animals and the outdoors.

Magazine honors Cascade High School

CASCADE — Cascade High School has been named Idaho's "Best of the State" by an article in the April issue of Redbook magazine.

The story, "America's Best Schools," also recognizes Garden Valley High School for its athletic achievements, Mackay junior and senior high schools for their community service efforts and Coeur d'Alene High School for its programs for special needs students.

"We're excited," Cascade High Principal Bill Leaf said of the recognition. "Obviously this is a real honor to be recognized by a nationally circulated magazine. That gives some real legitimacy to our feelings of having a really good school."

Schools honored as part of the project were initially nominated by state education departments and national education organizations.

Moscow hospital disputes Landers

MOSCOW — Only 15 percent of Gritman Medical Center's emergency room cases involve alcohol-related injuries, not the 80 percent advice columnist Ann Landers recently quoted, hospital officials say.

As a result, the University of Idaho is getting a bum rap on the issue, Gritman and university officials said. "The Landers article made it sound as though Alcohol 101 is a required course at the university," Margaret Deas, Gritman's director of education, wrote last week to Bruce Pitman, the Moscow school's dean of students.

"It hurts us," Pitman acknowledged.

Between Sept. 1 and Jan. 1, Gritman saw 60 students with alcohol-related injuries, hospital emergency room director Cathy Mabbitt said. They made up about 15 percent of the roughly 400 emergency patients at Gritman during the five-month period, she said.

Officials battle Preston area vandalism

PRESTON — Franklin County and the city of Preston have assigned additional sheriff's and police patrols at night in an effort to curb an increase in vandalism in the rural southeastern Idaho area.

Preston Police Chief Duane Griggly said most offenses have been relatively minor, involving a rash of dumpster fires, stolen signs and hood ornaments there. But a few weeks ago, vandals smashed lights at a railroad crossing near Dayton and others cut down trees in a resident's yard.

Last week, someone started a tractor at Valley Implement and Motor in Preston and backed it into a repair shop, ripping a large hole in the metal siding. The tractor was left running overnight and its spinning tires dug a hole in the ground until it eventually ran out of gas. Damage totaled approximately \$6,000.

Ucon lawmaker takes aim at county

IDAHO FALLS — Four-term state Sen. Lee Staker, R-Ucon, has decided to give up his seat in the Legislature to run for the Bonneville County Commission.

The Idaho Falls florist will be the second experienced state senator representing Bonneville and Teton counties to leave the Legislature after his current term.

Lawmakers debate higher education

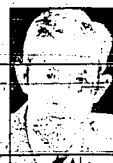
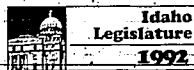
BOISE (AP) — There have been many studies of higher education over the past decade, and proposed changes should be put before the voters this year, a state legislator says.

The Senate on Wednesday approved a resolution calling for another study on higher education. But at a meeting of the House and Senate education committees Thursday, Rep. Pam Ahrens, R-Boise, urged action instead of another study.

"A whole pile of studies have been done for 10 years," she said. "We should make an effort to get it on the ballot this time around."

The committees have a number of bills on education, some proposing a split of the Board of Education to make separate governing panels for public schools and higher education.

"The general public wants education to be more accountable," Ahrens said. Although most of the

bills pending before the Legislature deal with higher education, Ahrens said there's also considerable concern about the operation of public schools.

In any event, voters shouldn't have to wait until the general election of 1994 to decide education issues, Ahrens said.

"We should make an effort to get it on the ballot this time around," she said.

Political science professors from the University of Idaho and Boise State told committee members the legal issues involved are complicated, especially if the University of Idaho is involved.

"We have got a bit of careful analysis to do first," said Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

In related development, Brad Hall, attorney for the Board of Education, said in a report that if governance of all of the state universities and college is placed under a single board of regents of the University of Idaho, it wouldn't make the other three four-year schools "land grant" institutions.

The University of Idaho was established in 1862 with 90,000 acres of land set aside to support its college of agriculture, Hall said the legislation stipulated that earnings from the land was to be used for no other purpose.

"Thus, none of the Morrill Act land grant funds may be used except

at the University of Idaho, College of Agriculture," he said.

Later in the day, the House did make a small step toward changing the system, although some members said the bill wasn't likely to be approved in the Senate.

The House voted 52-30 for a bill sponsored by Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, requiring appointees to the Board of Education to be confirmed by the House as well as the Senate.

"I recognize it will be more popular in the House than in the Senate," Hansen said. But he said legislators must recognize that the Board of Education is unique among state boards in that its members are not accountable to anyone.

"We know when it goes to the Senate, it will be killed. It will save everybody a lot of time if we just kill it now," said Rep. Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise. "I think the Senate does an 'excellent' job of confirmation."

Budget committee puts prison in bonding plan

BOISE (AP) — Trying to balance diminishing resources with increased construction demand, the Legislature's budget committee on Thursday expanded its bonding plan to include the women's prison in Pocatello.

On a 13-11 vote, the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee incorporated the \$10 million prison with its earlier decisions to use long-term financing for a \$2.4 million 100-bed men's prison unit south of Boise and an \$8-million facility at State Hospital North in Orofino.

The scheme, if approved by the full Senate and House, would permit \$6.2 million the state had already set aside for the new women's prison to be reallocated for other projects.

It does free up some other money that we need desperately," Democratic Sen. Marguerite McLaughlin of Orofino said.

The state would have to shell out about \$2.2 million a year for the next 20 years to pay off the bonds on those projects. That would be on top of the \$4.5 million it is currently paying out annually to cover the bonds used to finance four other projects, including the maximum security prison and the technology school at Boise State University.

Legislative leaders were expediting floor votes on the bonding plan, hoping to have it ratified or rejected by the weekend some budget committee could resume deliberations on the public works bill.

If the plan is defeated, the committee would have to fit both prison projects and probably the Orofino project into the \$8 million to \$10 million it will have for new construction.

But adoption of the bonding scheme, which has been endorsed by Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, would not only eliminate the need to use available cash for those three projects, but increase the pool of cash by over \$6 million.

More than \$100 million in proposed construction is pending before lawmakers.

Dworshak-drawdown seen hurting Montana farmers

LOWER GRANITE DAM, Wash. (AP) — Montana members of the Northwest Power Planning Council slammed a federal proposal to store more water in northern Idaho's Dworshak Reservoir to help migrating salmon.

And John Brenden said interests in his state may consider a court challenge of proposed drawdowns of Montana and lower Snake River reservoirs.

Meanwhile, Idaho officials spent Wednesday morning trying to convince a National Marine Fisheries Service committee in Boise that increasing stream flows by drawing down reservoirs on the lower Snake River will save endangered sockeye salmon runs.

The panel is charged with finding a way to save the fish.

Brenden and fellow Montana council member Stan Grace on Wednesday toured the Lower Granite Dam in eastern Washington, where a test drawdown is currently being conducted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The region needs proof before drawdowns become reality, Grace said. "We're willing to be good neighbors but we're not willing to be stupid," Grace said. "There's a lot of emotion and a lot of supposing and damn-little evidence."

Montana farmers are being hurt in the current drawdown of the Little Goose and Lower Granite reservoirs, Brenden said.

Party will miss Tsongas

Idaho Democratic Party leaders said they were surprised and disappointed Thursday by former Massachusetts senator Paul Tsongas' decision to drop out of the race for president.

"I thought that Tsongas was a very, very fine man," said Anna Wilson of Wallace, vice chairman of the state party. "Although I realize it was a difficult situation for him, I feel that it gives the voting public less of an opportunity to have a choice."

But even though Tsongas' departure virtually assures Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton the nomination, Wilson, party Chairman Mike Wetherell of Boise and Democratic National Committeeman John Greenfield of Boise all said they plan to be uncommitted delegates at July's Democratic National Convention.

Former California governor Jerry Brown remains in the race, and Wetherell said party rules require him to remain uncommitted "as long as there is any kind of contest."

Wetherell applauded Tsongas for his class and courage. "He and his people should be very proud of the showing that he made and the guts that he had to get into this early and be a very good advocate for his views," the Boise City Council member said.

He agreed with Greenfield that Tsongas dropping out makes it more likely there a large slate of delegates will go uncommitted to the convention.

Meanwhile, Idaho House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee, and Senate Republican Caucus Chairman Mary Harung, of Payette announced formation Wednesday of a "Legislators for Bush-Quayle" organization.

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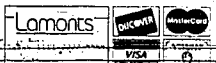

Paper works

Twin Falls artist starts creations from scratch

TWIN FALLS - Some people use paper to make airplanes. Jean Swartling uses it to create works of art. Swartling even makes her own paper. The 52-year-old artist caught the papermaking bug during a conference in Oregon. Before that, she had worked in stained glass for 25 years, selling her wares and teaching classes on the subject.

"I'm entranced with handmade papermaking," said Swartling, noting that the field is still new but is making inroads into art departments across the country. "It all started with collectors of rare books who wanted to find ways to restore or recreate ink and paper."

Swartling fashions everything from earrings to wall hangings to note cards to sculptures out of paper. But, prior to all that, she fashions the paper itself.

Working in a newly built studio at the College of Southern Idaho Art Department, Swartling starts with a raw product - wheat straw, iris leaves, even grass clippings. The raw material must be cooked, mashed, ground, and beaten with water to hydrate it. Then it is dipped out of a vat into a mold and "deckle," a sort of square frame. The mold shapes the material on which designs or engravings can be pressed.

Next, the square of "paper" is covered with fabric pieces called "felts." After that comes the "couching" (pronounced kooching), which means "to lie down." At that point, with the "paper" flat on the table, Swartling can toss off some leaves, feathers or colored yarn. Papermakers have wonderful collections of such items, she explained.

The "paper" is then put into a press, and water is pumped out of it. Swartling calls this process "very wet work," and she always wears an apron. The finished product is dried gradually, over a period of several days, after which it is put into a special kind of dryer for another 24 hours.

Swartling likes to use various paint processes and surface treatments on her paper, giving it color or a marbled texture. Sometimes, she adds sparkle. Most of her work contains at least a few black Labrador hairs, she said, compliments of the family dog. She added, "My new thing is embossed paper."

Swartling was a history major in college, but her main interest today is art history. "The oldest form of papermaking dates from 200 B.C. in China," Swartling said. "It's an oriental art form."

But it's a long way from China to Twin Falls. Swartling's new passion, popular in California, isn't taking Twin Falls by a storm, the artist said. At least not yet.

"My husband (local physician Dr. Rodney Swartling)

likes it," Swartling said, with a laugh. "He lets me hang out on the walls at home, and he says 'Oh, that's nice, dear.'" Her two children are grown and have their own homes, so she is starting to create some paper artwork for them, too. Swartling sold some of her work at the Episcopal Christmas bazaar last year, and she hopes to have a spot at the Sun Valley Arts and Crafts Festival in the fall. Larson Arts is carrying the line. Swartling's earrings sell for \$12, and her collage type wall hangings can cost upwards of \$300 to \$400 framed. Her one-of-a-kind note cards are priced at \$3.

Psychiatrist portrayals don't sit well with therapists

The current flood of films dealing with psychiatrist-patient relationships doesn't wash well with many therapists and counselors.

It's not difficult to see why. Two of the dominant films among Academy Awards nominees are "The Prince of Tides" and "The Silence of the Lambs."

In the first, Barbra Streisand plays a lonely, unhappy married psychiatrist who has an affair with Nick Nolte, playing the brother of a suicidal patient. She invites further intimacy by asking Nolte, whose character is a high school coach, to teach her alienated son the basics of football.

In "The Silence of the Lambs," Anthony Hopkins portrays one of the screen's most vivid villains, Hannibal "The Cannibal" Lecter. Once a skilled and sophisticated psychiatrist, Dr. Lecter is now understandably behind bars. It seems he couldn't control his cannibalistic instincts and devoured some of his more boring patients. During the course of the film, he indulges in sadistic mind games with an FBI trainee played by Jodie Foster.

In "Final Analysis," Richard Gere plays a somewhat repressed psychiatrist whose libido is instantly unleashed by Kim Basinger, portraying the sister of one of his more difficult patients. Furthermore, Gere is now behind the cameras in "Jones" as a manic-depressive who has an affair with his psychiatrist, played by Lena Olin.

"Writers take different aspects of their fantasies about their own psychoanalysis and put them in movies," says Dr. James Knoll, chairman of the Department of Psychiatry, Presbyterian Hospital and associate professor of psychiatry at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School.

"Consciously or not, writers project their own feelings," says Dr. Harold B. Caslinck, professor at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, world authority on hypnotherapy and a clinical psychologist in private practice.

"We call it transference fantasies," Knoll says. "If the writer has dealt with a

psychiatrist he perceives as mean or threatening, we wind up with Hannibal Lecter. But if the writer perceives the psychiatrist as a romantic figure, we wind up with Richard Gere.

"It happens all the time," Knoll says. "People work out their internal conflicts through art, literature, films and theater."

However, Knoll and other therapists say, they think that Hollywood frequently treats psychiatrists in an overly romanticized manner.

"Spellbound" was the first film I'm aware of to really cross the boundary," he says, referring to a popular Alfred Hitchcock 1945 mystery in which Ingrid Bergman plays a psychiatrist who tries to cure another doctor, played by Gregory Peck.

"The romantic attraction between Peck and Bergman took precedence over everything else. And certainly there's a great deal that's unethetical about the behavior of the psychiatrists in both 'The Prince of Tides' and 'Final Analysis.'"

All the therapists interviewed mention "Ordinary People," in which Judd Hirsch

Hollywood has been giving therapists "the treatment" for years in movies of wide-ranging films:

• "PRIVATE WORLDS" (1935):

One of Hollywood's first sympathetic studies of psychotherapy, with Claudette Colbert and Charles Boyer as earnest doctors who, of course, become involved with each other. It won Colbert

plays a psychiatrist who helps guilt-ridden Timothy Hutton address his relationship with his cold mother, as their favorite film dealing with psychotherapy.

"Ordinary People" represented a significant shift," says Dr. Irwin Gadol, a clinical psychologist in private practice. "Judd Hirsch's character was presented as real, reasonable, knowledgeable, patient, kind, considerate and - most important of all - an effective therapist who made a difference."

Caslinck also cites "The Three Faces of Eve" as being "realistic in terms of the type of treatment shown."

"Despite the heavy emphasis on the romance in 'Spellbound,' the manner in which Ingrid Bergman tries to get Gregory Peck to recall repressed information is true to therapy, particularly the type of therapy being done in the 1940s," he says.

The therapists all express reservations about the doctor played by Streisand in "The Prince of Tides." Although she is presented as a sympathetic character, Caslinck says her actions are selfishly motivated.

"What her character did is taboo," he says. "You just don't do it. She put not only her own feelings but also the feelings of her son ahead of those of her patient. She's lost her neutrality, and the emotions of the therapist must be controlled. The scene where she loses her temper and throws an art object at Nick Nolte should never have happened."

Gadol is gratified that at least the Streisand character is "not presented as a travesty or a

burlesque when so many movies present therapists as buffoons. But she does things that are unethical for any counselor, therapist or pastor. In this day of professionals being so aware of ethical issues, no one is going to be involved with a relative of a patient."

Hollywood's preoccupations with psychologists is not over. Two upcoming films present therapists who flirt dangerously with the law. In "Sessions," due out in August, Annabella Sciorra, the threatened mother, in "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle," plays a psychiatrist who falls in love with a murder suspect. And in "Raising Cain," which will open later this year, a child psychiatrist played by John Lithgow kidnaps his own daughter.

Even the most heroic, romanticized analysts have their quirks, according to film scenarios. In "Final Analysis," Richard Gere visits a bar and instantly freezes like the proverbial bumbling schnobly upon seeing his former girlfriend.

"That's not particularly unusual," Knoll says. "Psychiatrists are very human people. That's why we have colleagues."

Knoll recalls a meeting of the American Psychiatric Association at which Richard Dreyfuss, having just played a pompous, self-promoting psychiatrist in "What About Bob?," was a guest speaker.

Dreyfuss acknowledged that psychiatrists always complain about how they are treated in movies. "But Hollywood treats all professions badly," he said. "Why should therapists be any different?"

an Oscar nomination and put Boyer on the road to major stardom.

"NOW, VOYAGER" (1942): One of Bette Davis' most popular films presents one of Hollywood's noblest depictions of psychiatry. Claude Rains, in a departure from his customary villainous roles, plays a gentle, loving shrink who in three months turns Eric (John Kildare) from "old maid aunt" (he phrases it that way) into a vibrant, self-reliant woman of the world. In subsequent interviews, Davis said her character should have wed her psychiatrist instead of pining away for unavailable Paul Henreid.

"SPELLBOUND" (1945): Producer David O. Selznick was in therapy, feeling guilty over leaving his longtime wife for actress Jennifer Jones. One of his emotional outlets was to produce "Spellbound," the most romantic movie ever made about psychotherapy. The movie's Salvador Dali dream sequence and the lingering close-ups of Ingrid Bergman and Gregory Peck made therapy seem like a terrific romantic exercise of all problems. But the disclosure of the real culprit — another psychiatrist played by Leo G. Carroll of "Tupper" fame — could be seen as a blight on the profession.

"THE THREE FACES OF EVE" (1957): Joanne Woodward won an Oscar for portraying the lady with multiple personalities. Lee J. Cobb is the wise shrink who tries to unravel each and every one of them. The actual scenes of therapy are well-acted, but they seemed to bore mainstream audiences at the time.

"SPLENDOR IN THE GRASS" (1961): When Natalie Wood goes berserk from sexual frustration and an overbearing mother, she is placed in a mental institution. There she meets another patient, who suffers from having had an overbearing father. They would seem to be the perfect match, but poor Natalie's sweetly venomous mother has one last trick up her sleeve: "Are you sure this is OK? After all, you did meet him in a mental hospital."

"BOB & CAROL & TED & ALICE" (1969): Just as uptight suburbanite Dyan Cannon makes an important breakthrough, her psychiatrist informs her that he's run out of time. Otherwise, he's a perfectly nice, caring shrink.

"ONE FLEW OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST" (1975): One of the triumphant films of the 1970s featured the most sympathetic group of patients seen on screen. It also featured one of the most memorable villains, in the form of Nurse Ratched (Louise Fletcher). Everyone else encountered Nurse Ratched in life: consider yourself blessed if it wasn't your therapist.

"HIGH ANXIETY" (1977): Mel Brooks as a shrink with vertigo.

For this comic homage to Alfred Hitchcock, Brooks borrowed heavily from three of the suspense director's most psychological thrillers —

"Spellbound," "Psycho" and, of course, "Vertigo."

"ORDINARY PEOPLE" (1980): Judd Hirsch as a screen shrink even a therapist could endorse. When angst-ridden Timothy Hutton expresses impatience with the slow process of therapy, Hirsch breaks into a chorus of "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden."

"LOVESICK" (1983): Dudley Moore, who often discusses his own happy experiences with therapy in interviews, ironically plays one of Hollywood's most ludicrous psychiatrists. He falls hopelessly in love with one of his patients in this dim comedy. And he shows incredibly bad form by poking fun at an unattractive woman in a restaurant.

"SEX, LIES, AND VIDEOTAPE" (1989): And MacDowell plays a frigid yuppie who is deflected more by a handsome, impotent stranger than by the efforts of her psychiatrist. In the television interview, Dr. Ruth Westheimer made much of the way

in which the heroine sat in a sexually aggressive manner during therapy.

"WHAT ABOUT BOB?" (1991): Screen shrinks took a step back when Richard Dreyfuss, another actor who has claimed successful psychiatric treatment, played a self-absorbed shrink whose main goal was to be on "Good Morning, America."

"THE SILENCE OF THE LAMBS" (1991): Aside from being a cannibalistic mass murderer, Dr. Hannibal Lecter also seems like a Trifling snob. He taunts Jodie Foster about her working class background and her less-than-designer bag and shoes. Bad form, all the way around.

"THE PRINCE OF TIDES" (1991): Streisand manages several professional transgressions in one film.

"FINAL ANALYSIS" (1992): Aside from the fact that psychiatrist Richard Gere becomes a pawn in the hands of two beautiful, confident sisters, there's a secondary character — a slushy psychiatrist who gets so nervous on the witness stand that he stutters, stammers, sweats and malapropals all over the courtroom.

Out of the Valley

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Prince returns atop charts with rejuvenated power

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — His crown may have slipped, but Prince still reigns. He has a new band, a new album, a new "gangster" look and his own comic book. His next video is being done by Spike Lee. And he'll collaborate with the Joffrey Ballet on a full-length ballet program to have its premiere next year.

All are signs that Prince is on the rebound from the midcareer slump epitomized by his 1990 movie bomb, "Graffiti Bridge."

Last year, he released "Diamonds and Pearls," his biggest-selling album in years, and a No. 1 single, "Cream." He assembled a new band, the New Power Generation, and began aggressively marketing the album by holding closed concerts for the media and music industry insiders.

Prince and the N.P.G. even scored a Grammy nomination for best rhythm-and-blues performance by a duo or group with vocal for their single, "Gett Off." But they lost to Boyz II Men, who won for the album "Cooleyhighharmony."

His first manager, Owen Husney, says "Prince may never match the peak of his 'Purple Rain' period of 1982-86, but instead may be on his way to writing standards such as the Beatles' "Michelle."

"I just feel that he's a modern-day Tchaikovsky or Chopin. It's real," Husney said. "And when it's real over the years, it falls into the Beatles thing."

Prince, of course, isn't talking. He routinely rejects interview requests. But the Purple One played cuts from his new album for reporters at Paisley Park Studios, his \$10 million recording complex that opened in 1987 in the Minneapolis suburb of Chanhassen.

All the promotion has paid off. "Diamonds and Pearls" has sold close to 3 million copies worldwide since its Oct. 1 release, making it Prince's best-selling album since 1989's "Batman," which sold 6 million copies worldwide.

But it still has a way to go to match his breakthrough "Purple Rain," the soundtrack to his 1984 hit movie. That sold 14 million copies worldwide.

And another album is likely this year. Prince has released an album each year except one since 1978. Three of them — "1999" (1982), "Sign O' the Times" (1987) and "Graffiti Bridge" (1990) — were double LPs.

The prolific songwriter has 450 unpublished tunes in his vault, said Jill Willis, executive vice president of Paisley Park Enterprises, Prince's umbrella organization.

"He's always working," Gilbert Davison, president of Paisley Park Enterprises, said. "If we get a call from Warner-Bros. saying 'We need an album tomorrow,' we'd have it on their desk this afternoon."

N.P.G. drummer Michael B. calls Prince a workaholic.

"It's only because he has so much music in him and has to get it out," Michael B. said.

But Warner Bros. Records, parent company of Prince's Paisley Park Records, says

the company did talk to Prince about concerns that he may be saturating the market.

"You don't want to fall into that place where you're offering so much (that) people shut down," said Benny Medina, senior vice president of artist and repertoire and general manager of Warner Bros.' black music division.

Prince, 33, exploded on the national music scene in 1980 with "Dirty Mind," his third album. Critics dubbed the funky mix of hard-edged guitar and synthesized drums the "Minneapolis sound."

He was born Prince Rogers Nelson to John and Mattie Nelson in Minneapolis on

June 7, 1958. His father was a jazz pianist and his mother was the group's singer until her marriage. Prince was named after his father's combo, the Prince Rogers Trio, but his mother called him Skipper.

While in high school, Prince formed a band called Grand Central, later renamed Champagne. The band was trying to make a record at a local studio when the studio's owner offered Prince a chance to collaborate on songs.

Warner Bros. eventually signed the fledgling rock star, and his debut album, "For You," was released in 1978, when he was 19. Prince was a one-man band for his

'My Cousin Vinny' ultimately satisfies

In Alabama, Vinny isn't a fish out of water, he's the lawyer from another planet. The planet he's from is Brooklyn, and it might as well be Mars.

Vinny is played by Joe Pesci in a combination of brio, bullet-sweating despair, street cunning and occasional idiocy. In "My Cousin Vinny" he's summoned to defend his college-age cousin (Ralph Macchio, who must be about 40 by now!) from a phony murder rap. Now! his surprise when he learns lawyers are expected to wear coats and ties in court!

The movie, rated R, is mildly amusing, particularly as it allows Pesci enough room to let his considerable comic talents explode, and also as it gives a new actress named Marisa Tomei a nice, big part, of the kind of which stardom is made. And despite one's fears that it would be another exercise in anti-southern sanctimony, it generally gets around to being fair to everybody and not too hard on anybody.

The set-up is remotely believable. In a roadside convenience store, Macchio and his buddy Mitchell Whitfield load up on junk food and forget to pay for a can of tuna fish. A few minutes later they're pummeled over by a cop, and Macchio immediately confesses, saying it was an accident and he's sorry it happened. The next day he realizes that he's been busted for murder, not tuna fish. Somebody sank a 357 magnum bullet in the clerk's head. In despair he calls his mother who in despair calls the only lawyer she knows, the great Vinny.

Vinny shows up in mafioso-soldier's cowboy boots and Ray-Ban Wayfarers; he looks and sounds like he should be testifying against John Gotti. But he's an un-wise guy; it turns out he knows from nothing about the law. It took him six years to pass the bar. He's never been in a courtroom. (The movie never explains why, or what he's been doing.) He's not sure of the rules of evidence. He thinks everybody who doesn't pronounce "them" "idem" is some kind of redneck bigot, and everytime he opens his mouth, the judge — Fred Gwynne, and wouldn't it be nice if the film hired a real

Southerner? — sends him to jail for contempt. "My Cousin Vinny" dithers for a while, for after setting up its situation, nobody's quite sure where it's going, and poor Pesci has to carry it on pure slapstick schtick. He slips, he slides, he eats grits. Is this funny? If depends on your Pesci threshold (mine is high) and your slapstick threshold (mine's low). The movie finally starts clicking as Pesci masters the rudiments of his craft and begins to engage the fairly clever mystery that's at the heart of the movie. This turns on some neat subtleties regarding auto-

native topography and the script, by Dale Launer (who wrote the better "Ruthless People" and the worse "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels") develops a nice line as it reveals Tom, initially a fairly standard issue, am-decoration, to be sharp as a tack and quick as an adder. She knows cars in the way Vinny doesn't know the law and in the movie's best scene turns the prosecution's case inside out. I don't want to oversell "My Cousin Vinny." It's hardly brilliant. But it's easy-going and occasionally quite funny and ultimately satisfying.

Pesci's no longer just an ordinary Joe

Oscar-winning actor Joe Pesci, out for a rare day of relaxation recently at his local golf course, marched up to the first tee and prepared to whack the ball down the fairway. He drew back his golf club, hesitated in midswing and then slowly lowered his club. With a dazed expression on his face, he stepped back from the tee and began shaking his head as if to clear it of mental cobwebs. His puzzled golfing partner asked him what was wrong.

"I didn't know who the hell was about to hit that golf ball," Pesci told him. "Was it Leo Getz or David Ferry or Tommy or Harry or Joe. I've spent so much time as somebody else, and so it fits as myself. I lost sight of who I was for an instant."

"People don't realize that you give up your life for success; some mornings I look in the mirror and say, 'Who is that old guy?'"

Stuck in the down side of being one of the hottest actors in the business. It's 12-hour days, six-day weeks and one movie project after another. But the payoff of working continuously for 24 years without a lengthy break is that you get showered with acclaim, your pockets get filled with money and your name appears on movie marquee no less than five times in 1992.

"Did I say I was complaining?" Pesci said with a shrug of his shoulders during an interview last week in his Los Angeles hotel suite. "I wasn't complaining; I was just telling you that when you work at a job too long without a break, it eats your life up."

"And that's not just acting; that's any job. You go to work every day, come home, eat and go to bed. Then you get up and do it again. You've got to spend some time with yourself."

Pesci is taking that long-awaited break right now, having just completed filming "Public Eye" with Barbara Hershey, which is scheduled for a fall release. That will follow the release this summer of two other Pesci films: "Lethal Weapon 3" and "Home Alone 2: Lost in New York."

He's already in the nation's theater playing the notorious David Ferry in Oliver Stone's controversial "JFK," and his newest film, "My Cousin Vinny," just opened.

"Joe's an extraordinary character actor and he has no problem carrying the whole movie as a leading man," said the film's director, Jonathan Lynn.

"He has no trouble making that transition from supporting player to leading man because he has that one quality that all leading men possess, and that quality is called talent. Look at all of the leading men who have ever lasted in this business and that's the one thing they all have — talent."

Pesci, a native of Newark, N.J., is that rare actor who not only can shift between supporting and leading roles but between drama and comedy.

"He has no other actor who, in the same year, could have played the bumbling burglar in the biggest comedy hit of all time ("Home Alone") and the chilling, murderous gangster Tommy in "GoodFellas," for which he won the Oscar."

Pesci started in show business as a singer at age 5, and continued working as a nightclub entertainer into his 20s.

During that time, he also sang and played guitar on a local TV show called "Star Time Kids."

After recording some albums under a variety of aliases, Pesci briefly tried acting but gave it up to manage a friend's restaurant in the Bronx. Then he got a fateful, late-night phone call from Robert De Niro, who had seen his work in an earlier film and wanted him to play his brother-in-law "Raging Bull."

Pesci thought the call was a prank, but De Niro, with the help of director Martin Scorsese, convinced him that it was on the level. Pesci was nominated for a best supporting actor Oscar for "Raging Bull."

It would be almost a decade later (1989) before audiences would notice him again, as the irritating accountant Leo Getz in "Lethal Weapon 2." He doesn't like doing sequels, but said he has agreed to appear in the third installment of the successful cop series as a paycheck to the film's producers, whom he credits for reviving his career in 1989.

Pesci attributes his career success to luck — "Anybody who makes it in this business is lucky in the roles they get and the roles they turn down," he said — but he's not putting down his talent, and he's not making light of his new leading-man stature.

He is, in characteristic straight-forward fashion, that he has as much right to be a leading man as anybody.

"They always want to put the young, tall, handsome guy in the leading-man roles, but that isn't what real life is all about. This is what real life is all about. We know who gets the girls. It's guys like me."

'Invisible Man' director 'sort of made it up'

Audiences seem not to mind the gimmick, off again Chase.

"My big concern was, does this bug anybody?" Carpenter says. "But they've totally accepted it. Totally."

'Boyz' laserdisc features commentary

For nearly a decade now, laserdiscs have provided commentary by filmmakers, actors and critics.

These special discs, usually priced at \$80 to \$125 apiece, have been reissued mostly to established classics on the order of Orson Welles' "Citizen Kane." But the Criterion Collector is now offering a timely, lower-priced exception: a \$50 disc of John Singleton's, 1991 critical-commercial smash, "Boyz n the Hood."

Just 24, Singleton recently displaced Welles as the youngest filmmaker ever to win an Academy Award nomination for best director. He provides an unusually candid and detailed account of how he ended up writing and directing the movie for Columbia Pictures, less than two months after graduating from film school.

Sheepishly admitting that he did poorly in a sound-recording course that he had to take it over again, he calls attention to the fact

that he finally did learn how to use the non-linear expressive possibilities frankly about his troubles with the child actors, the potential preachiness of Larry Fishburne's character, the low budget and hurried shooting schedule, and he shows two deleted scenes and explains why he dropped them.

Much of Singleton's script is based on his experiences growing up in South Central Los Angeles (including a grippingly recreated confrontation with a racist black policeman) as well as his adolescent erotic fantasies ("Remember, I was still in college when I wrote this").

Much of it is also the result of careful observation of the work of other filmmakers; he feels that Lee Tor Babenco's "Pixote" and the late Sergio Leone's "Once Upon a Time in America" were particularly influential.

Occasionally, Singleton gets carried away with telling the viewer what to think ("This is a very powerful scene") and he isn't above making bravado statements. But what comes through on disc is a modest,

thoughtful, almost shy artist who can keep his perspective as a film that he regards as "maybe not a bull's eye but close." Singleton's second movie, "Poetic Justice," begins shooting next month.

Like most special laserdiscs, Criterion's "Boyz n the Hood" uses the "letterbox" or "VideoScope" process to present the film in its original wide-screen dimensions, and it makes uses of four audio tracks. The original Dolby stereo track is presented in digital, a mono version in analog, while Singleton's commentary turns up on the other analog track.

Voice of Woody Woodpecker dies at 88

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — Gracie Lantz, who conceived the Woody Woodpecker cartoon character and gave the bird its contemptuous "Heh-heh-heh-HEHHEH-heh" laugh, has died at age 88.

Lantz, wife of animator Walter Lantz, died of spinal cancer Tuesday at St. Joseph Medical Center, said Faith Frenz-Heckman, president of MCA Animation and a family friend.

Woody was inspired by a woodpecker that disturbed the Lantz's honeymoon at California's Lake June in the early 1940s. Lantz suggested her husband create an animated character based on the bird.

The late Mel Blanc was among a host of voice actors that became the bird's voice over the years. But Lantz was forced to hunt for another Woody voice when Blanc signed an exclusive contract to do the voices

of Bugs Bunny and other Warner Bros. characters in the late 1940s.

Lantz's wife asked to audition for the part, but Lantz refused. She then secretly made a recording and placed it among the audition tapes of seven other applicants. Lantz picked her.

During the next 40 years and about 200 cartoons, she put the words in Woody's beak. "Woody wasn't cute until I took over," she

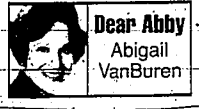
said in a 1981 interview with The Washington Post.

During appearances on talk shows or at schools, Lantz would invariably be asked to perform the Woody laugh. When she did, her husband would shake his head and say: "No dignity. She used to be very proper."

In addition to her husband, who turns 92 in April, Lantz is survived by two brothers. No funeral or memorial service was planned.

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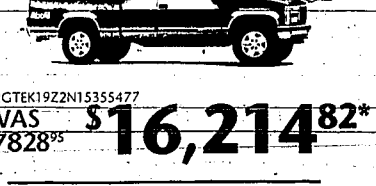

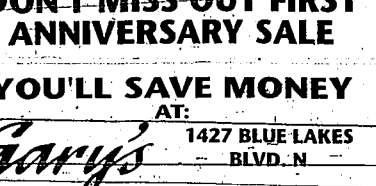

Today's declarer was a parsimonious soul. He would never commit a nickel if a penny might do. It was this trait that led to trouble in today's doubled game.

Dummy's heart ace won, and declarer led a low trump to his nine so he could ruff his last heart with dummy's jack. He cashed dummy's trump ace and led the diamond king to East's ace & duck by East would have been technically superior, West starting a high-low with his 10. Since West had played high-low in trumps to show three cards, East led a second diamond (the nine) to stick the lead in dummy. When a club was led from dummy, East hopped up with his ace to lead a third diamond, and the defenders scored the setting trick via the diamond ruff.

It was South's stinginess that did him in. Instead of ruffing his low heart with dummy's trump jack, he should have ruffed with his ace. He could have then overtake the trump jack to draw the trumps, and the defenders would have been held to only one diamond and two clubs.

The trump ace is the most powerful card in the deck. Nevertheless, there are times when it must be played early to get it out of the way.

NBC anchor Tom Brokaw gets his own documentary series, "The Brokaw Report" will kick off with an hour about families in crisis at 7 p.m.-MST tonight on K3BAS and other NBC affiliates. NBC News says there will be six "Reports" this year, "framing some of the crucial problems facing our fast-changing nation and focusing on the substantive social and political issues facing Americans in this election year." In conjunction with the first broadcast, Gannett-owned USA Today plans a full week of stories related to "families in crisis" that week. No word on whether all six programs will have such a tie-up.

Rivera retraction? Tell-all lover Geraldo Rivera says he's "sorry" he ever wrote "Exposing Myself," the autobiography in which he not only named names but graphically detailed his former conquests. His sorrow, he claims perversely, made him agree to star in NBC's upcoming "Perry Mason: The Case of the Reckless Romeo" as a talk-show host murdered after disclosing names of the kind he wrote about in real life. "Playing this part" he said, "is my most profound apology. I'm murdered for naming names." The show airs Tuesday, May 5. Rivera goes before the cameras next week in Denver, where "Perry Mason" TV movies are filmed.

Court comes to close. NBC recently confirmed that its long-running "Night Court" was not going to be renewed. In case someone else picks up the show, its producers don't want to wrap things up too neatly when the show leaves the air in May. But there will be some sense of closure for the show's fans. Dan Fielding (John Larroquette) has a frightening nightmare that changes his life; clerk Mac Robinson (Charles Robinson) goes to film school; and bailiff Bull Shannon (Richard Moll) thinks he's being followed by aliens.

Tesh fine tunes musical career — too!

Q: Was John Tesh of 'Entertainment Tonight' ever a reporter for CBS News?

A: You're close. Tesh spent five years (1981-86) at CBS Sports, where he not only reported on events for the network but also flexed his muscles as a music composer, winning Emmys for best original composition for his work on the Tour de France bicycle race and the Pan American Games.

Music has, in fact, played a large part in his career. He composed the music for the CBS children's show "Inside Out," the Fox children's show "Bobby's World," CBS News' "Sportsbreak" and the theme music for NBC Sports football and basketball coverage.

Tesh was named best new artist by the readers of Keyboard Magazine, and won two New York Music Awards (best jazz instrumentalist, best jazz album) for his album "Garden City." He is composing music for NBC's coverage of the 1992 Summer Olympic Games.

As a broadcast journalist, he began as a weekend anchor at Durham, N.C., in 1970 and followed that with stints in Orlando, Fla., Nashville, Tenn., and New York.

Q: When did "Hogan's Heroes" originally run? Where are the cast members?

A: This popular comedy series originally was broadcast on CBS from September, 1965, to July, 1971. Bob Crane (Col. Hogan) and John Banner (Sgt. Shultz) are deceased (Crane was murdered in 1978; Banner died in 1973), but viewers still see co-stars Werner Klemperer (Col. Klink), Robert Clary (LeBeau), Ivan Dixon (Kinchloe) and Larry Hovis (Carter) in guest appearances on series, movies and commercials.

Richard Dawson (Newkirk), of course, became the most well-known alumnus of "Hogan's Heroes," because of his long association with the game show "Family Feud."

Q: We were wondering, is Natalie Cole married? — A.R.

A: Natalie's recent success with her "Unforgettable" album, a high-tech tribute to her father, Nat King Cole, has had an eminently forgettable personal history. The 42-year-

old singer has fought and won a battle with drug abuse, and survived a broken marriage. Cole is now married to Minneapolis-born Andre Fischer, the man who produced her hit record album. "Unforgettable" is a memorable labor of love, in more ways than one.

Commercial networks shun pro-choice TV movie; HBO, Sissy Spacek latch on

When nervous advertisers dropped out of the television movie "Roe vs. Wade," based on the Supreme Court decision on abortion, NBC's losses mounted to more than \$1 million. Last season's "Law and Order" episode about the bombing of an abortion clinic has not been rerun, again because of fearful network executives facing fearful advertisers.

So, it should surprise no one that the fact-based "Miss Sherri" won't be coming to a commercial network near you. The pro-abortion drama, which stars Oscar-winner Sissy Spacek ("Coal Miner's Daughter") as a Phoenix TV children's host fighting for an abortion in 1962, fell into the hands of cable's Home Box Office.

HBO "is the only place that would make this movie," said Ronnie D. Clemmer, executive producer of "Miss Sherri," which will premiere in April. "There is no question about that in our minds. The experience of NBC in doing 'Roe vs. Wade,' and losing over a million dollars of advertising, was the definitive answer about that controversial a topic on advertising-supported television.

"There are plenty of people in television, including several of our close friends, who are development executives at the networks, who would love to have made this film ... but there was no question that these networks were not going to touch it."

Spacek plays Sherri Chessen Finkbine, who was the Phoenix "Romper Room" host in 1962. While expecting her fifth child, Finkbine learned that a sedative she took, Thalidomide, was causing severe birth defects.

Having decided on an abortion and hoping to warn others about the drug, she took her story to the Arizona Republic. She was promised anonymity, but a rival newspaper revealed her name.

In the firestorm of publicity that followed, Finkbine was fired from the TV station and her husband lost his high school teaching job. The FBI was called in to protect the family when

death threats were made.

"I didn't do it for any political reasons, but I am pro-choice," Spacek told critics in Los Angeles last week. "But this movie is about just a normal, everyday woman whose tragedy is public knowledge and she's put in a fishbowl."

Although "Miss Sherri" does take a stand, the producers hope viewers will see the person behind the decision.

"We're expecting controversy," Clemmer said. "But it is not our intention with this to make any political statement. It definitely takes a pro-choice stance, but it is not, in any radical sense of the word, pro-abortion. It is about the fact that, faced with these tragic and terrible circumstances, (Sherri Finkbine) knew that, no matter what choice she made, there would be pain and heartache for the rest of her life.

"That is true, Sherri, the real person, was watching some of the scenes and had to leave the set because it again brought up all the pain and all the intensity of that decision."

Clemmer's partner, Bill Pace, said that they "were determined not to politicize the story." "It is extremely important to us to de-politicize and re-humanize this issue about abortion, to try to get people out of the two absolute camps and get them back into looking at the human beings involved.

"The points of view of all the sides of the issue are articulated with intelligence in this film, and no one will say we dodged the issues."

The actress is no stranger to playing real people.

Her acclaimed portrayals include country singer Loretta Lynn in "Coal Miner's Daughter" (1980), a determined woman searching for her husband in "Missing" (1982), a Tennessee state employee exposing corruption in "Marie" (1985) and prosecutor Jim Garrison's wife in director Oliver Stone's "JFK" (1991).

"All I can do is try to capture their essence, portray what they felt as honestly as I can," Spacek said. "I don't know how else you could do it, because, even when I did 'Coal Miner's Daughter,' I was playing Loretta, and I'd see her over there.

There's Loretta. Well, if that's Loretta, who am I? You obviously feel a little bit like ... What's the word? Imposter!"

Each time, though, Spacek seeks out the person she's playing.

"I would have been embarrassed to come here today and say I played these parts and never met those people," the actress said. "You get some nuances, I'm able to ask intimate questions.

"It's very odd because you don't really know the person, but you're diving as deep within them as you can. You meet them in hopes they can shed more light on what you're about to do."

Spacek knows all about life in the fishbowl.

She has been a Hollywood star ever since "Carrie" (1976), confirmed the promise of her 1972 screen debut, "Prime Cut," and a chilling 1973 teaming with Martin Sheen, "Badlands."

In search of a more normal lifestyle, Spacek moved her family to a farm in northern Virginia.

"I just felt it was the life that I wanted my children to have, something I had as a kid," said the star of such films as "3 Women" (1977), "The River" (1984), "Crimes of the Heart" (1986), "Night, Mother" (1986) and "The Long Walk Home" (1990).

"I was a little chagrined about 10 years ago when I read, shortly after I'd moved there permanently that I'd sold my home out here, that I had retired. That was a little distressing."

Yet Spacek doesn't believe that her fishbowl experiences offer any kind of parallel to Finkbine's ordeal.

"One is about celebrity, one is about having your innermost horrors exposed to the world," Spacek said. "They're very different."
