Tests support Hansen Butte as landfill site

TWIN FALLS - Tests show that soil depths on the east side of Hansen Butte run deep.

That could work to the advantage of Magic Valley counties considering building a regional landfill there.

One of the men who tested the soil, Lynn Askew, told commissioners at a regional solid-waste meeting Thursday that soil depths on part of the east side of the butte run from 25 to 55 feet.

Terry Schultz, environmental director of the South Central District Health Department, said that was good news.

"We were real pleased to find the soil depth in that area. We were hoping for 20 to 25 feet. To find 55 feet was more than we anticipated," he said.

The deeper the soil, the longer the area can serve as a landfill. Phil Newton, an engineer the counties hired to design the regional landfill, said a 200-acre landfill could last 100 years.

The site has another advantage: It lies in

East End-area residents: Not in our back yard

HANSEN - Neighbors of a proposed regional landfill near here would just as soon it be put in somebody else's back yard.

But landfill planners told them Thursday night that the Hansen Butte site is still the preferred choice.

About 40 people attended the public meeting at Hansen Elementary School to further discuss plans for the six-year project.

they were concerned about traffic, roads and litter around the site. But the counties are working on a plan to route the trucks that would use the landfill and meet with residents about it Thursday night.

Litter can be controlled by covering the refuse each night and by installing fences, engineers say.

The commissioners also talked Thursday about the trash-transfer system they will need when the regional landfill opens. With six counties using the same landfill, each county will need transfer stations and other sites where people and trash-hauling companies can take garbage.

The garbage collected at these sites will be taken to the regional landfill from each county.

The commissioners must decide how to finance the transfer system. Thursday they favored designing, building and paying for the transfer system as one solid waste district. That would make the system easier to design and likely would save some money.

But they have a couple of choices in how

Cheney challenges Congress on Guard cuts

WASHINGTON - A combative Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney challenged Congress Thursday to stop wasteful spending on National Guard and reserve programs by eliminating \$30 million in military units and about 140,000 jobs by the end of 1993.

His insistent demand for cuts dovetailed with President Bush's recent election-year effort to keep the Democratic-led Congress on the defensive by spotlighting its pet projects and penchant for fiscal irresponsibility.

The proposed reduction would be the first

Judge sentences Tyson to 6-year prison term for raping teen-ager

INDIANAPOLIS - Mike Tyson, the former heavyweight boxing champion, was sentenced to six years in prison Thursday for raping a teen-age beauty contestant, his protests of innocence rejected by a judge who said she believed that he could rape again.

Superior Court Judge Patricia J. Gifford sentenced Tyson to a 10-year term on each of three counts of felony rape and criminal deviate conduct, then suspended four years from each term, which will run concurrently. That means that even with time deducted for good behavior, Tyson will serve a minimum of two to three years in an Indiana state prison.

"Something needs to be done about the attitude you displayed here," Gifford said.

Tyson, who was also denied bail pending his appeal, showed no emotion at the sentencing, removing his watch and handing it to one of his attorneys, Vincent Fuller. Then he kissed his 81-year-old foster mother, Camille Ewald, goodbye.

He was taken to the police wing on the fifth floor of the Marion County Courthouse for preliminary processing, then was driven to the Indiana Regional Diagnostic Center at Plainfield, Ind., 17 miles west of Indianapolis. There, Tyson will undergo orientation for a period of several weeks before being assigned to a prison by the state's Department of Corrections.

Gifford also sentenced Tyson to a four-year probation period after his release from prison and fined him \$10,000 for each of the three counts. She rejected a motion by prosecutors to fine Tyson an additional \$150,047, to recover the cost of the trial.

Tyson's legal team lost twice in separate pleas to Gifford on Thursday. First, chief counsel Fuller asked the judge to allow Tyson to serve his sentence at an Indianapolis halfway house, the Riverside Community Corrections Corp. Second, the legal team asked her to allow the boxer to remain free on bond while awaiting the outcome of his appeal.

She refused bond, saying directly to Tyson: "I am going to deny your petition for bail; owing to the seriousness of the crime, as to whether you are at risk to commit a crime again, quite honestly I feel you are."

Tyson, dressed in a gray suit, white shirt and pattern tie, was then led away by five sheriff's officers through a rear door.

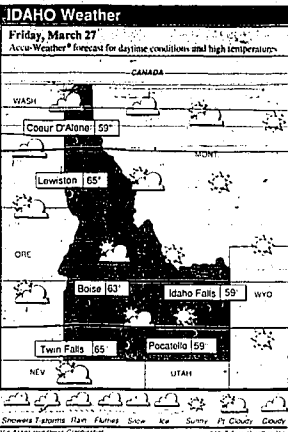
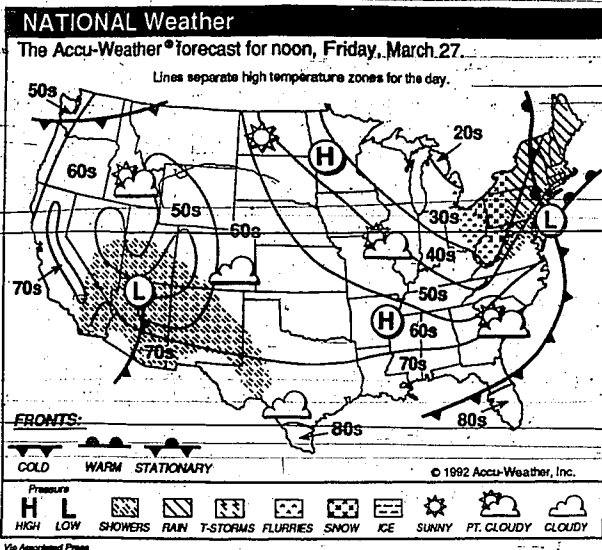
Defense lawyer Alan Dershowitz immediately appealed the bail denial. A three-judge appeals panel set a hearing for Friday on that issue after Chief Appellate Judge Wesley Rutliff denied a request for an immediate stay.

The National Weather Service in Boise says moisture continues to spread into Idaho from Nevada, Oregon and Washington. Lower cloud buildups were reported with showers around Twin Falls and Mountain Home. Lightning also was visible from Twin Falls, with distant showers visible from several other locations across southern Idaho.

A weak disturbance moving through Oregon up into southern Washington did produce isolated showers in the Blue Mountains. But little moisture was left when the clouds associated with that disturbance brushed northward along the Washington/Idaho border. Central and North Idaho were tertiary.

In spite of the thickening cloud layers, the warm airmass continues over the gem state, with the breaks and thin spms in clouds which allowed afternoon temperatures to rise into the upper 50s to 60s. Boise warmed to 60th degree. Mountain Home 65, Lowell 64, Lewiston 63, Milham 62, Coeur d'Alene 60, Idaho Falls 59 and Twin Falls 54.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 70 degrees at Caldwell. Stanley reported the coldest at 13 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 83 degrees at Lubbock, El Paso, Presidio, Wink, Beesville, and Catalla, Texas. The lowest was 6 degrees at International Falls, Minn.

Rain dampens Northeast coast, Midwest

A storm system over the North Carolina coast brought rain to the mid-Atlantic states and parts of New England on Thursday, with snow falling in the mountains. Rain also fell in the Midwest.

Scattered rain fell across Vermont, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and North Carolina.

More than 3.25 inches of rain fell on Cape Hatteras, N.C., during a six-hour period ending at 1 p.m. EST. Jacksonville, N.C., got 1.22 inches.

As the rain continued late Wednesday, a flood watch was issued overnight for upstate New York.

Snow also fell on the central Appalachians, with 3 to 6 inches reported in the higher elevations of western North Carolina.

The storm also whipped up strong wind along most of the north-and mid-Atlantic coast. Gale warnings, for winds of 32 mph to 63 mph, were issued from Maine to North Carolina.

each county would pay for its share in the transfer system - by sharing the costs or by the individual needs of each county.

Twin Falls County's expenses would rise substantially if the costs are shared, something that makes Commissioner Marvin Hjemmenman pause.

"Twin Falls gets stuck for quite a bit more" if costs are shared, he said. He'd prefer that the district finance the system but that the counties pay individually.

Blaine County Commissioner Tom Blanchard, chairman of the solid-waste district, said, however, that just by joining a regional solid-waste district Twin Falls County saves money in the long-run.

If the counties pay for the system as a group, Twin Falls costs of debt retirement would rise \$64,000 a year. The commissioners did not vote on financing the transfer system on Thursday.

county landfill.

It was the second such meeting in just over a month, and although landfill planners answered many of the area residents' earlier questions, several new matters were raised, including the possibility of locating the landfill somewhere else.

The regional solid-waste district includes Twin Falls, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, Cassia and Blaine counties, and they have joined forces to share costs on a new landfill that will meet federal mandates.

The district now holds an option to buy 2,300 acres on the east side of Hunsen Butte for \$500 an acre from the Lincoln Land & Livestock Co.

But Tony Barnes of Hansen suggested that a western Twin Falls County site near Balanced Rock and Salmon Creek would place the landfill farther from population centers and closer to supplies of bentonite, clay and gravel, all needed in landfill operations.

Ruth Stranger of Hansen said planners should take another look at a site four miles south of Dietrich.

There, instead of using Hansen Butte's productive farmland as a landfill buffer, a landfill could utilize "a buffer of sagebrush that nobody cares about anyway," she said.

But Terry Schultz of the South Central District Health Department said it would cost Twin Falls County more than \$600,000 annually to haul refuse to the Lincoln County site.

He said Twin Falls County can't afford such high hauling costs and added that without Twin Falls

County's participation, the entire regional landfill idea could falter.

The same problem exists with locating a landfill in less-accessible western Twin Falls County, planners said.

"The transportation of waste an additional 24 to 30 miles from cause the six-county entity to break apart because of costs," Schultz said.

At last month's meeting, residents expressed concern about increased traffic. Previously, planners intended to send waste haulers straight from the Hunsen Bridge to Hansen. From there, haulers would have traveled backcountry roads to the landfill site.

After that plan drew protest, however, planners met with highway district and Idaho Transportation Department officials to devise new routes. Now, commercial haulers will be routed in a roundabout manner on Idaho Highway 50 to Red Cap Corner, then south to Kimberly and east on U.S. Highway 30 past Hansen.

But several people also criticized that plan, saying that trucks would be traveling through Kimberly's busy warehouse district and adding to the already heavy agricultural traffic on Highway 30.

Planners also addressed the problem of wind and litter at the landfill site. Phil Newton, an engineer hired to design the landfill, said wind fences would be erected to catch blowing debris.

The next public meeting on the landfill issue will be at 7:30 p.m. April 7 at the College of Southern Idaho before the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission.

convincing the Communications Workers of America to endorse the Arkansas governor.

At the same time, New York Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, an influential voice in his state, derided Brown's proposal for a 13 percent flat income tax and said it threatened the survival of Social Security.

New York Gov. Mario Cuomo weighed in, too, saying Brown's flat tax plan was "a big advantage to the people at the top. I'm against the flat tax."

Democratic National Committee Chairman Ronald Brown, meanwhile, criticized Jerry Brown's personal attacks and led a meeting of party leaders and major fund-raisers at which Clinton was treated as the nominee.

The Clinton campaign welcomed the flurry of events, but was careful to portray it as a series of independent developments, mindful of Brown's effort to paint Clinton as the establishment candidate.

"I don't think we can rush this process," Clinton said. "There's a lot of resentment out there. There are a lot of people who believe both parties forgot them."

Brown, campaigning in Wisconsin, dismissed the Harkin endorsement.

"When you run a frontal assault on what you call a decrepiter and corrupt status quo ... you can't be surprised when people in that neighborhood band together in a mutual protection defense," he said.

step in a five-year, post-Cold War plan to reduce the nation's part-time military, though not nearly as sharply as the current effort to cut active-duty forces.

"Reserve strength would decline from 1.15 million to about 920,000 at the end of 1997. By comparison, the active military is being cut from 2.1 million troops to 1.6 million over the same period."

Only two Idaho-based units were among the first 830 National Guard and reserve components targeted by Pentagon cuts.

Together, the 126th Engineering Company in Blackfoot and the 539th Medium Operations Signal Headquarters Company in Rexburg comprise fewer than 240 troops. Both

are scheduled to be deactivated by next year.

Although the plan was outlined more than a year ago, Cheney was required by Congress to report this month on the specific units slated for deactivation over the next two years. With Gen. Colin L. Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff at his side, Cheney seized the opportunity at a Pentagon news conference to make several hard swipes at Congress, which has traditionally balked at cutting the military reserves.

Congressmen pay tribute to memorial

WASHINGTON (AP) — A handful of senators and congressmen stood in a rainstorm under a park ranger's umbrella Thursday and paid tribute to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial as a place that helped heal the nation.

The occasion marked the 10th anniversary of the memorial's groundbreaking.

A decade ago, the project was controversial. Some Vietnam veterans saw its granite wall of names as an anti-war statement, a "black wall of shame."

But the lawmakers said it had become a rallying point, where Americans, whatever their views of the war, could honor the 58,183 service people who died in the war and whose names are inscribed on the wall.

Rep. David E. Bonior, D-Mich., spoke of two of them — Daniel Cahill of Center Line, Mich., and Gerald Mullin of Mt. Clemens, Mich.

Cahill was a poet who by now would have been 45, Bonior said; he planned to attend college after

his tour in Vietnam. Mullin, a Marine, had arranged to meet his brother, Patrick, also a Marine in Danang, but was killed before they could get together.

"Two Americans, whose lives ended almost before they began," Bonior said. "They live on in the memories of their families and friends and in the granite walls of this memorial which, simply by having their names, has helped heal wounds that divided a generation."

Said Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., a former Navy pilot in Vietnam who was a prisoner of war after his plane was shot down: "It is well to remember the average age of those young people on that wall is about 19. As long as this wall is there, we will be able to know of their service and sacrifice. We do not know the circumstances of their birth but we do know the dignity of their deaths."

After the speeches, the lawmakers went to the wall and, again sheltered by umbrellas, made pencil tracings of etched names. Bonior traced the names of Daniel Cahill and Gerald Mullin.

Lawmakers also wrote bad checks at embassies

WASHINGTON (AP) — House members wrote bad checks for cash at U.S. embassies overseas, and State Department employees had to go after them to recover the money, the department's inspector general said Thursday.

"It's been known to happen... I only know the few that came to my attention," Inspector General Sherman Funk said in a telephone interview. "There were a few congressmen who caused a problem. We went back to the congressmen and they paid."

He said there had been no such problems for "a couple of years," but declined to say when the bad checks had been written. He would not name the lawmakers involved.

The lawmakers wrote the checks on their private bank accounts while they were traveling overseas on fact-finding missions and other official trips.

There was no connection with the House bank, where members wrote thousands of overdraws that didn't bounce because they were covered by other lawmakers' accounts.

Former Rocky Flats operator pleads guilty

DENVER (AP) — Rockwell International Corp. pleaded guilty Thursday to 10 criminal counts of hazardous waste and water violations while it ran the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant and agreed to pay an \$18.5-million fine.

However, both Rockwell and government officials said the violations had not resulted in "substantial physiological harm" to people living near the plant outside Denver.

"We believe this is a fair, equitable and just sentence for the people of the United States," U.S. Attorney Michael J. Norton said.

The 10 counts include five felonies — four violations of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act and one violation of the Clean Water Act. The five misdemeanors were for violations of the Clean Water Act.

The counts alleged Rockwell illegally stored and disposed of hazardous wastes at the plant at various times between 1987 and 1989.

FBI agents who took infrared photographs during three night flights over the plant said they found indications that hazardous wastes were being burned in the incinerator of a plutonium reprocessing plant that Energy Department inspectors had closed for safety reasons, according to a 1989 affidavit.

The infrared surveillance also found evidence that hazardous wastes had been placed in an evaporation pond that EPA officials said couldn't be used for that purpose, according to the affidavit.

"With his plea," Rockwell admitted it stored hazardous wastes without a permit, stored the wastes in containers that leaked, and that its actions al-

lowed hazardous wastes to reach reservoirs that supplied drinking water to nearby cities.

"The corporation came to the decision that it is in our best interest to put the matter behind us and enter the plea," said John McNeil, assistant general counsel for Rockwell.

Rockwell said the company operated the plant responsibly.

U.S. District Judge Sherman Kessler said he would not finalize the plea bargain agreement until he could review sentencing reports to be submitted by both sides. He set a hearing for June 1 to announce his decision.

Rockwell, based in Seal Beach, Calif., is a major federal contractor with electronics, aerospace, automotive and graphics businesses. It built the space shuttle and the B-1 bomber.

Prosecutors complete rebuttal against Noriega

MIAMI (AP) — Prosecutors completed their rebuttal case against Manuel Noriega on Thursday after a former Panamanian attorney general testified he was forced to resign at gunpoint as he investigated military corruption.

But in an unusual move, U.S. District Judge William Hoeweler said he will allow the defense to put two alibi witnesses on the stand to testify Nor-

iega could not have met with a Medellín cocaine cartel drug dealer on the first weekend of May 1984, as a last-minute prosecution witness had testified.

That testimony, said the judge, would probably begin Monday and he said closing arguments could begin Tuesday. The government rested its rebuttal case after calling 14 witnesses.

In a broken voice and wiping tears from his eyes, former attorney general Rafael Rodriguez said he was called to military headquarters in July 1983. There, he said, he was confronted by Noriega and the nation's military ruler at the time, Gen. Ruben Paredes.

He said he told them his high-profile corruption probe was threatening the military's commitment to democratize Panama.

He said Noriega demanded he resign or become a friend of the defense forces and cover up everything that smelted.

FEC orders Robertson to repay cash

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Election Commission on Thursday ordered Pat Robertson's 1988 presidential campaign to repay the government \$388,544, mostly for exceeding election spending limits.

The commission also ordered the campaign to repay news organizations more than \$105,000 for overcharging them for seats on campaign flights.

The commission ruled 5-0 that Robertson's campaign exceeded by more than \$2 million the state and national spending limits it agreed to when it accepted a record \$10.1 million in public campaign financing four years ago.

The FEC also accepted the conclusions of government auditors that the campaign got deals on a computer and jet that amounted to prohibited corporate contributions and also wrongly used campaign dollars to pay tax penalties and expenses for attending the Republican National Convention.

The FEC's decision, which comes four years after Robertson dropped out of the Republican race after several primary losses to George Bush, is an initial determination. The campaign has 30 days to appeal to the FEC after which it can go to court if it still disagrees.

Commission says U.S. falls behind in child health

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States "hasn't kept up" with other nations in assuring health care for young children and their mothers, a bipartisan federal commission reported Thursday.

As a result, babies die at a higher rate in the United States than in 21 other nations, the National Commission to Prevent Infant Mortality said.

The United States' poor international standing indicates that "we have made a serious commitment to our children as we have other industrialized nations," the commission said in a report.

It found the United States also lagging in other measures of child health, including low birthweight babies and childhood immunizations.

Government touts new AIDS education

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government on Thursday kicked off a new AIDS education campaign with a collection of ads warning that the disease can strike anyone but saying nothing about safe sex, condoms or drug needles.

Immediately, the campaign was criticized by groups representing AIDS victims and trying to help judgemental drug users. They said the ads should give information on how to prevent AIDS, not just say it is spreading.

Dr. Louis Sullivan, secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, denied that the government was steering clear of controversial subjects, such as homosexuality. "He said the ads concentrate on the basic message that anyone can catch AIDS, and there isn't room for much else."

besides, his organization tried to call the number on Wednesday and couldn't get through.

"Don't tell people to get the facts about AIDS, tell them what the facts are," Hinojosa said.

"Use condoms and a water-based lubricant when having sex. If you must share drug paraphernalia, clean your needles and works with bleach first."

"That's the information that saves lives."

The Drug Policy Foundation, a privately funded organization that

wants drug abuse treated as a health problem instead of a criminal justice issue, said the ad campaign falls flat.

"All it does is say the problem is getting bigger and we should talk about it," said Kevin Zeese, executive vice president of the foundation. "It doesn't provide any solutions."

"The solutions that are out there are viewed as inappropriate to the Bush administration," he said.

Sullivan said, "Today most Americans are knowledgeable about how HIV is transmitted and how transmission can be prevented. Yet

far too many do not believe themselves to be at risk, even when their behaviors indicate otherwise.

The advertisements show young people. One is walking in the countryside, another sitting on a basketball court, still another on a park bench looking out over the sea.

All are alone.

"I'm 19 years old," Peter Zamora says in one ad. "And two years ago I found out that I had HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. Knowing that I could die has been scary. But what's even worse is knowing that my friends didn't learn a thing from all this. They're still doing what I did that got me infected."

That doesn't say what that was. "Americans of all ages need to understand that if they engage in high-risk sexual or drug-use behavior, regardless of who they are or where they live, they can become infected," Sullivan said.

Most cases of AIDS are still found in large cities and among homosexual men, Sullivan said. But the disease is beginning to spread more rapidly among heterosexuals and, in smaller towns.

Dr. James Mason, head of the Public Health Service, said a poll last year found that personal concern about catching AIDS was declining.

"We were disturbed by that," Mason said.

"Based on our research as well as experience with cigarette-smoking cessation efforts, we know that behavior doesn't change appreciably unless people believe they are at risk."

One million Americans are infected with the AIDS-causing virus, he said. Every 13 minutes another person is infected. If we are to control this epidemic, every person must know he or she can be at risk."

The campaign's message is that AIDS is not limited to inner-city drug addicts and homosexuals.

But Ernesto Hinojosa, director of education for the Gay Men's Health Crisis, said the ads, which give a phone number to call for more information, are inadequate, and

Senate debates shifting funds from defense

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate debated Thursday whether to allow a shift of billions of dollars from military to social programs, with Democrats hoping to use the fight to score political points with recession-hounded voters.

The election-year Democratic initiative is to increase dollars to education, health and food-building faces a possible veto from President Bush and has virtually no chance of becoming law.

But polls show that Americans want the government to do something about the recession. Citing the disintegration of the Soviet Union and the anemic U.S. economy, Democratic leaders say it is time to create a multi-billion dollar peace dividend out of the Pentagon's \$200 billion budget.

"We are the only remaining military superpower in the world," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman James Sasser, D-Tenn. "The other military superpower bankrupted itself buying weapons and maintaining an overly large military establishment. Are we not to learn from that?"

Senate debate came a day after the House laid to rest another top Democratic initiative — a middle-class tax-cut that would have been paid for by boosting levies on the rich. The House voted 215-211 Wednesday against overruling Bush's veto of the tax measure, 73 votes short of the two-thirds majority required.

Rep. Charles Stenholm, R-Texas, said that by trying to transfer Pentagon funds to social programs, Democrats were simply trying to satisfy labor and other

groups that support Democratic candidates.

"It's not about investment in America, it's about investment in reelection," said deputy-Minority Leader Alan Simpson, R-Wyo.

Republicans also argued that shifting the money from military to social programs could leave American defenses at dangerously low levels. And they said that any Pentagon savings should be used to reduce record-high budget deficits, as is required under current law.

"It could slow recovery and threaten job creation," wrote the White House's Office of Management and Budget in a letter Wednesday that threatened a veto.

Democrats have a 57-43 majority in the Senate. But Republicans were supported by conservative Democrats

who want to focus on deficit-reduction, and other Democrats who want to protect defense-related jobs in their home districts.

Because of similar defections, Democratic leaders have been unable to line up enough votes to pass the measure through the House. They suspended a House vote on the bill this week, the fourth such delay.

Senate Democrats have not yet decided how much they would shift from defense to social programs.

Bush has proposed spending \$291.4 billion for defense in fiscal 1993, which starts Oct. 1. That is \$4.8 billion less than budget law allows, and Bush wants to use those savings for deficit reduction.

Atlantis 'Beam Team' creates sparkling auroras

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Atlantis' astronauts created sparkling green and red auroras in the night sky over the Southern Hemisphere on Thursday with an electron beam.

It's the first time astronauts have duplicated nature's light shows.

"You can just call us the beam team," payload commander Kathryn Sullivan told delighted ground controllers.

The seven-member crew had little luck on another front as Atlantis whizzed around the world on day three of the atmospheric research expedition.

The astronauts tried several times to communicate via ham radio with the two cosmonauts aboard the Russian space station Mir.

They received sound from Mir, but their signals were not acknowledged. They planned to try again later in the flight.

UP's departure takes a big bite out of Shoshone's past

Shoshone without the Union Pacific Railroad? You might as well pull the Grand Ole Opry out of Nashville.

It doesn't matter how many hay rakes or cattle trucks are parked along Rail Street. Shoshone's soul is the UP, or will be until April 21.

That's the day the Idaho Public Utilities Commission says the railroad can close its one-man freight office, ending 109 years of doing business in Shoshone.

The UP won't disappear from town altogether. The railroad still has a substantial investment in Shoshone, which sits astride the main line from Salt Lake City to Portland, Ore. Maintaining that investment takes money and manpower.

But any Shoshone resident who wants to talk to the railroad will have to pick up the phone and call St. Louis, where UP is slowly consolidating the business that its freight agents used to do in hundreds of small towns between Omaha and Los Angeles.

It's part of the loss, systematic abandonment of rural America by the country's railroads.

Branch line by branch line, freight agency by freight agency, the boxcars are disappearing from America's outback, replaced by flatbed cars loaded with containerized cargo that speed through the countryside in the dead of night.

Lincoln County farmers and ranchers no longer depend on the railroad, though not entirely by choice. UP has effectively reduced its presence in southern Idaho to the point where many shippers have bought trucks or arranged alternative transportation for their products.

But even with only two freight

agents left in the Magic Valley, in Twin Falls and Rupert, hundreds of shippers still use the railroad to send crops to market.

And, according to the PUC, the railroad still makes money here.

Places like Shoshone have always been good to UP. The railroad hauled \$1 billion worth of Wood River Valley silver away from its railroad before the turn of the century, and nobody knows the total value of grain and cattle it has shipped from there since.

But places like Shoshone don't fit the vision of a company that is out to develop an automated, main-track system. Even in towns where it still maintains agencies, the UP discourages their use.

Two years ago, the railroad even persuaded the Interstate Commerce Commission to approve a \$50-a-car surcharge to discourage shippers from using its own agents.

One reason is that those agents, in effect, work for the shipper.

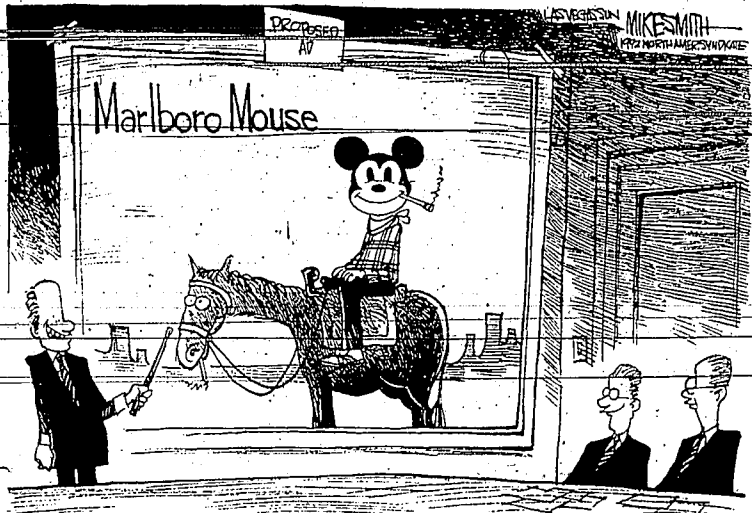
If you have a billing problem, the agent goes to bat for you with the railroad. If you can't get a railcar when you need it, the agent finds one.

And if your shipment doesn't arrive, it's the agent who locates it.

What the freight agent sells is service, and that's the commodity that really made the UP a success. It's a commodity the railroad doesn't seem to want to deliver anymore.

Nobody begrudges the railroad a profit, or efficiencies that will make it a more competitive company.

But the UP's presence will be missed in the places whose food and fiber kept the railroad running—places like Shoshone, where the midnight freight train doesn't stop anymore.

Fed still beating dead horse of inflation

The strong surge in sales of existing homes reported Wednesday would be a lot more encouraging if we had more signs that the Federal Reserve is willing to stoke this trend rather than sit back and assume it will sustain itself into the spring.

Still the idea, or myth rather, that real interest rates are about as low as we dare push them, that monetary policy has shown its wad and that further activism by the Fed would amount to "pushing on a string" has a strong hold on the present proprietors of the Federal Reserve, who continue to insist they must fight inflation.

The February sales performance, reported by the National Association of Realtors, a 16.1 percent improvement over February 1991, is convincing evidence of how effective lower interest rates can be. It can take a moribund market such as real estate and turn it around even without a brisk pickup in employment and incomes.

But trust the present Federal Reserve Board to make the mistake of assuming that this proves interest rates are low enough to continue stimulating the real estate market through March, April and May, that buyers will continue to flow out of the woodwork without additional enticement.

Because the Fed has already, in a relatively short period of time, brought interest rates crashing in nominal terms, people tend to forget that it is real interest rates that matter, that is, interest rates adjusted for inflation.

And since inflation rates tumbled at the same time nominal interest rates were falling, real interest rates remain high, exceedingly high for a period in which economic contraction cries out for monetary stimulus.

Economist James Tobin, the Nobel laureate, has pointed out that real interest rates "that matter to borrowers" are still higher than in 1989.

Why do they matter? Because a low level of inflation means that borrowers cannot count on paying back their loans in depreciated dollars and therefore require relatively more attractive terms to entice them to borrow.

Still, the Fed gang, insisting it's only doing what's best for us, wants to go on beating the dead horse of inflation even

the cost of sentencing us all to a weak and uncertain recovery and to substandard economic growth for the better part of this decade.

If there were any evidence that inflation was merely crouching for another leap, that oil prices were in danger of exploding, that the labor market was tight and we were threatened with a wage-cost explosion, that millions of Americans aren't desperate for work or that there was anything like a shortage of plant capacity, the Fed's caution might be justified.

The Fed's refusal to further feed recovery is particularly wrongheaded because the other policy alternative, a fiscal stimulus, has been effectively ruled out by the need to restrain federal budget deficits.

Even if President Bush and Congress were somehow able to agree on a fiscal package it would be necessary to be inadequate. Clearly, the costs—in lost jobs, in lost production, in lost income, in lower living standards—of carrying on this insane war against inflation far exceed any negligible benefit the Fed can now promise us.

Girl's earache sends wave through Britain

LONDON (AP) - The story of a 5-year-old girl with an aching ear, a Conservative mother and a father who leans to the left has exploded into a national election issue.

Prime Minister John Major and Labor Party leader Neil Kinnock accused each other of using the child to score political points, and of subjecting an unwitting family to the sort of political maneuvering that is devoted to the royal family.

The issue quickly shifted from the state of the health service to a political slugfest over which party publicly identified the girl.

Health Secretary William Waldegrave, who had accused Labor of using "techniques that would not have been out of place in prewar Germany," admitted on Thursday that he had urged a doctor involved in the case to contact a newspaper.

"Nothing wrong with that at all," Waldegrave said at a chaotic news conference.

"The Tory party have done an unforgivable wrong to a little girl by their cynical conduct and everyone knows that now," said Kinnock.

The controversy, the hottest yet in the campaign for the April 9 election, was ignited by a Labor Party broadcast Tuesday night that used actresses to portray two girls with ear infections.

One waited a year for surgery through the National Health Service; the other's parents paid \$340 for immediate private treatment.

Two newspapers subsequently identified the girl on the waiting list as Jennifer Bennett.

The girl's mother, Margaret Bennett, said the broadcast was not about her child, though the cases were similar.

Her daughter waited 11 1/2 months for surgery to remove her tonsils and adenoids and drain fluid from her ear.

Mrs. Bennett said the girl had been mistakenly placed on a "routine" waiting list instead of the "priority" list.

The father, John Bennett, said he wrote to a Labor party official, and that the party had contacted him in preparing the broadcast. Bennett also disclosed a letter from a local Conservative apologizing for the delay and complaining about "insufficient funding."

While he was reading the letter for television crews at his home, his father-in-law, Peter Lee-Roberts, a former Conservative mayor, barged in shouting, "Stop telling lies!"

On Thursday, Lee-Roberts said he had alerted the Conservative Party Central Office in advance of the broadcast, although Waldegrave said the party did not act on the warnings.

The parents disclosed that they were not married, that Bennett was still legally married to another woman.

The story provided something for newspapers of all political stripes. "Doctor's letter damns Tories" said the pro-Labor Daily Mirror, while the pro-Tory Daily Express bannered "The Big Lie."

The Labor Party, which established the health service in 1948, claims that the government's market-oriented reforms will lead to an American-style private health care system.

Libya accused of dodging responsibility for bombing

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) - Britain accused Libya on Thursday of dodging responsibility for the bombing of Pan-Am Flight 103 by going to the World Court rather than surrendering its suspects.

Libya is seeking emergency protection from attack or international sanctions promoted by the United States and Britain to gain custody of the two Libyans sought in the 1988 bombing.

Leading off the proceedings at the Peace Palace, seat of the World Court, Libyan representative Mohamed Al Fattouri, dressed in a white Arab robe, denied Libyan responsibility for the bombing over Lockerbie, Scotland that killed 270 people.

Speaking before a panel of 16 judges in black robes and white lace cravats, he accused the U.S. and British governments of using threats to try to blackmail his nation into releasing the suspects. He warned that a victory for the Western powers would

jeopardize the rights of all weaker nations.

Britain, in turn, accused Libya of involvement in terrorism and said its application to the court was merely a stalling tactic.

"Libya will say anything... which may help postpone the day when it will have to accept responsibility for its actions," said Alan Rodger, Scotland's solicitor general.

Libyan leader Muammar Gadhafi told Arab League envoys on Wednesday that he won't give up the suspects unless ordered to by the World Court, according to Arab diplomats. The court is the judicial arm of the United Nations, but it has no enforcement powers.

Britain opened its presentation before a panel of 16 judges with a detailed account of its investigation, which it said linked Libyan intelligence officials to the Lockerbie bombing.

Israel opens phone lines to Arabs

JERUSALEM (AP) - One Israeli hotel station phoned Qatar to book a room. Another asked a Saudi how the weather was. An Associated Press reporter chatted with the office of PLO chief Yasser Arafat in Tunisia.

Much of the Arab world suddenly came in reach of Israeli dialing fingers for the first time Thursday when the Communications Ministry opened direct phone lines to Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Lebanon, Bahrain, Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia and Yemen.

Because Israel and the Arab world are technically at war, Egypt excepted, such telephone links have not existed since the Jewish state came into being in 1948.

Joseph Chen, a Communications Ministry spokesman, said Israel opened the lines as a show of good faith.

"We want to show that we will do everything that is possible to bring peace," he said.

So far it is a one-way service, and Israelis appeared to have jumped the gun, since the establishment of phone links requires both sides' approval. The calls are placed via satellite to Western telephone systems that have lines to Arab countries.

Jordan sharply protested, saying phone links should wait for formal peace. "This is piracy," said Jordan's communications minister, Jamal Saraymah, and he ordered phone officials to block the calls.

U.N. finds reason for optimism in republics, despite many troubles

GENEVA (AP) — Vaccines are running out. Environmental contamination is unprecedented. Abortions remain a routine form of birth control. Soaring food prices have sent already poor nutrition standards tumbling.

An exhaustive U.N. report on the former Soviet republics paints a grim picture of the

collapsing health system and says funds are needed now to prevent tragedy.

"No other great industrial civilization has so systematically and for so long poisoned its land, air water and people... and no advanced society faces such a bleak political and economic reckoning with so few resources to invest toward recovery," it says.

But the 1,000-page report also offers a glimmer of hope. It says simple reforms, such as switching from expensive infant formula to breast-feeding and the introduction of mass home-gardening campaigns, will make a huge difference to the quality of life — and at little extra cost.

The document — put together by the World

Health Organization and the U.N. Children's Fund, based on visits in January and February to 14 former Soviet republics — blames the crisis on the shock of transition to a market economy and severing of trade links that have disrupted supplies. It appealed for \$418 million over the next 18 months for essential medicines, equipment and training.

The U.N. teams found the rapid increase in food prices meant that in many regions, about 80 percent of the population were now below the poverty line.

Dr. Alexis Coumbaras, a WHO expert, said in many respects Russia and other former Soviet republics now resemble Third World countries.

Rights group pushes peace in Somalia

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — A clan war in Somalia's capital has killed or wounded 41,000 people, two human rights groups said Thursday in warning that the Horn of Africa nation faces a devastating famine.

Africa Watch, a Washington-based Human Rights group, and the U.S. State Department, also accused the U.S. government of not doing enough to promote peace.

Their report said a severe drought and the cutoff of food deliveries because of the fighting has left nearly 5 million Somalis threatened with starvation.

The estimate of 14,000 people killed and 27,000 wounded in fighting in Mogadishu, Somalia's capital, is more than a third higher than previous estimates by the United Nations and other international aid agencies.

The two American groups said they based their estimates on interviews with medics and questionnaires distributed randomly in Mogadishu during two trips by aid workers to the seaside city in February.

The city has been devastated by fighting that erupted Nov. 17 between rival factions of a clan that ousted President Mohamed Siad Barre from the capital last year.

Combat has dropped off somewhat since the factions signed a UN-mediated truce on March 3 but the two U.S. aid groups said the relative calm was due as much to Ramadan, Islam's holy month of fasting, as to the agreement.

An hour-long shootout erupted Wednesday in northern Mogadishu as forces loyal to interim President Ali Mahdi Mohamed tried to disarm civilians in the wake of Tuesday's killing of the driver of a vehicle flying the U.N. flag.

Report: Israeli official can't meet Quayle

JERUSALEM (AP) — The U.S. State Department is limiting contacts between Israeli and U.S. officials and refused to let an Israeli Cabinet minister meet Vice President Dan Quayle this week, Israeli media reported Thursday.

The reports, which were strongly denied by the State Department, came amid worsening relations over Washington's refusal to give Israel \$10 billion in housing loan guarantees unless it stops building settlements in the occupied territories.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's top political adviser, Yossi Ben Aharon, said he believed the reported refusal to let Health Minister Ehud Olmert see Quayle was "an isolated case." He said he knew of no general State Department order to boycott Israelis.

Olmert is spending the week in Washington, where he met Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan. He also wanted to meet Quayle, with whom he is in friendly contact, the media reports said.

The Yedioth Ahronoth daily said Olmert's office was told the State Department turned down the request in keeping with new instructions limiting meetings with Israeli officials to "working sessions" between two direct counterparts.

Asked about the report, State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler called it "100 percent, categorically, absolutely false."

Quayle "meets with Israeli officials all the time," Tutwiler said. "This was nothing more than a scheduling matter."

Killing of neo-Nazi was self-defense

DRESDEN, Germany (AP) — Two men accused of killing a neo-Nazi leader last year were acquitted Thursday by a Dresden court, which ruled they had acted in self-defense.

Greek-born Nikolas Simeonidis, 25, had been charged with manslaughter in the death of 36-year-old Rainer Schmidt. Ronny Matz, 24 had been charged as an accessory for driving the car in which Simeonidis fled the scene after the May 31 shooting.

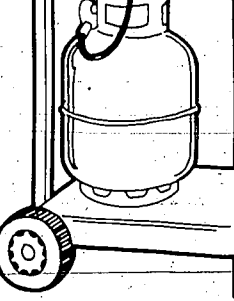
The shooting occurred when about 50 neo-Nazis surrounded Simeonidis and Matz on a Dresden street. Witnesses testified that Simeonidis threatened the group with a shotgun.

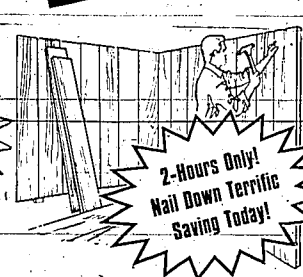

JACKPOT - From his first piano concert 38 years ago to his current headline act at Cactus Pete's, Danny Marona has never gotten tired of performing.



"I still enjoy entertaining as much as ever," said Marona, who spent his childhood crisscrossing the country with his family. His father was a vaudeville performer turned traveling evangelist. Seven-year-old Marona, tickling the ivories in concert, was hailed as a child prodigy.

Next week's return engagement at Cactus Pete's will feature Marona's well-tuned mix of comedy, piano and song. He hesitates to characterize his performance, but does attempt to include something for everyone.

"Before leaving the stage, I really do try, with every fiber of my being, to make sure everyone in the audience is thoroughly entertained," he said.

It is an act that has made him a fixture in the casinos of northern Nevada. Last year, Reno's People's Choice Poll tied him with Tonight Show host Jay Leno as most popular entertainer.

The story began when Marona taught himself to play piano by ear at age 5. Before long, a local music director was knocking on the door with an offer. "The man told my dad, 'Your son really should have nurse lessons,'" Marona said. "Then he added, with a chuckle, 'I guess, at some point, I should have asked him what he meant by that.'"

The Maronas were too poor to afford piano lessons, Marona explained, but the music director agreed to teach the young boy for gas money. By the time Marona was 15, his music career had been launched. Until seven years ago, that career was based in California. Then, one day, Marona was booked at Cactus Pete's.

"I fell in love with Twin Falls when I first arrived," Marona said. "I'm an uptight, tense person, but that all seemed to leave me whenever I came here."

In fact, Marona enjoyed being in the Magic Valley so much that he and his wife, Sherry, recently bought a home on the canyon. Their three children and two grandchildren seconded the move.

These days, Marona spends a chunk of his free time playing golf at Blue Lakes. He likes to refer to Twin Falls as "one of the last places in America where people are not

Oscars: Sublime, tacky, extravagant, even moving

No wonder more than a billion people watch the Academy Awards show every spring. It has everything: money, sex, death, courage, spectacle, song, surprise, sentiment, winners, losers, laughter, tears, fear, triumph, disaster.

On Monday, each of the above is 100 percent guaranteed.

It's the annual madly exciting, nerve-racking, high-wire act of pumped-up Hollywood traversing three hours of live television.

The rewards are so grand, the risks so great, the spectators so familiar and celebrated (and maybe even incinerated) that anything awful or wonderful could happen — and always does.

By the end of the evening, we'll acknowledge the big winner. This year it could very well be Disney for "Beauty and the Beast." It could be Oliver Stone. Or it could be Warren Beatty. Conversely, any of them could also be the big loser.

If Nick Nolte wins the Oscar for Best Actor, we'll most certainly be treated to a very different exclamation of gratitude than if Anthony Hopkins wins it.

In fact, if articulate speeches were the criteria, the ideal slate of winners might well be Hopkins, Jodie Foster, Ben Kingsley, Kate Nelligan or Jessica Tandy. Conversely, consider the emotionally disastrous slate of Beatty, Laura Dern, Harvey Keitel and Juliette Lewis.

Speaking of disaster, will the gay-lesbian protestors make it through security? Several activist groups have threatened to disrupt the

show as a sign of displeasure at the way gays and lesbians are almost always portrayed as psychopaths and killers in the movies.

And will anyone in the spotlight mention the gay-lesbian issue even if the groups who plan to protest are kept off the show?

You can count on something being said about the JFK files, if not by Oliver Stone only because he doesn't get called to the podium, then by someone else. Is there anyone anywhere in the universe who doesn't think "JFK" will at least win the Oscar for Best Editing?

It's going to be great fun, too, to see how best Billy Crystal handles the JFK and gay-lesbian issues as jokes without being offensive.

Here's a peek at what's going to happen next Monday night:


Warren Beatty's recent marriage to Annette Bening and his 55th birthday — celebrated the same day as the 64th Academy Awards — will be a running joke. The new husband and father may even become a shtick that lasts the whole night long. And he'll most certainly be mentioned yet again by the winner of the award for Best Supporting Actor: Harvey Keitel (dubbed) or Ben Kingsley (possible), either of whom will thank Beatty for making "Bugsy" possible.

Those two "Bugsy" nominees could cancel each other out in which case Jack Palance will win the sentimental vote as Best Supporting Actor for "City Slickers."

Like the Academy Awards themselves, disasters usually fall into categories: Inappropriate Costume or Hairdo; Evidence of Substance Abuse; Uninvited Guest or Bomb;

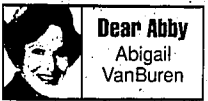

Friends remember Walker as unique talent

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress Nancy Walker, whose roles ranged from the domineering mother of "Rhoda" to Rosie the waitress on paper towel commercials, was mourned Thursday as a rare talent.

"We've lost a deep and dear buddy," said Betty White, co-star of television's "The Golden Girls," on which Walker made guest appearances in 1986 and 1987.

The diminutive, redheaded actress died at her home Wednesday following a two-year battle with lung cancer, she was 69.

Walker's portrayal of Ida Morgenstern, Valerie Harper's mother on

"Rhoda," earned her an Emmy nomination in 1975.

"The loss is intense. I truly feel like I've lost a relative," Harper said. "She was as good as it gets. ... She could get a laugh, as they say, when it was blood from a stone. She was uniquely, absolutely unique."

Walker also was famous as Rosie, the waitress always mopping up after klutzy customers in commercials for Bounty paper towels.

She is survived by her husband of 40 years, vocal coach and writer David Craig; her daughter, Miranda Craig; and a sister, Betty Lou Barto.

Walker's most recent work was a starring role in Fox Broadcasting

Co.'s "True Colors" comedy. She played a Jewish mother whose daughter is married to a black. Family friend Frank Liberman said Walker had just completed the season's final episode.

"She was very open," said Liberman, "a terribly talented comedian, singer and dancer who started as a child star."

Walker's television roles also included Mildred the housekeeper on "McMillan and Wife," for which she received three Emmy nominations (1973, 1974 and 1975).

She also was one of a few women ever to direct and act on Broadway and in television.

In 1956, she made her Broadway directing debut with "UTBU," starring Thelma Ritter and Tony Randall. Beginning in the 1970s, she directed episodes of "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," "Rhoda" and "Alice."

Born in Philadelphia to vaudeville parents, Walker became a New York stage actress at age 19 in "Best Foot Forward." That led to comic roles in musicals including "On the Town," "Look Ma, I'm Dancing" and "Do Re Mi."

She moved to Los Angeles in 1970, and turned to television and film roles.

Brown chides networks for poor coverage

Professor Jerry Brown didn't just teach Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton a valuable lesson in Connecticut, this week. He's also in the process of giving the TV networks a short course in the hazards of smugness.

In almost every TV interview he's done so far this week, Brown has secured the networks about their arrogance in writing him off so early as a serious candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination. His narrow defeat of front-runner Clinton in Connecticut on Tuesday forced the networks to give him lots of free air time to rub their noses in it.

During his "Nightline" appearances, Brown has needed ABC's Ted Koppel about the network's initial reluctance to give him the same sort of attention it gave Clinton, and former candidate Pat Toomey, as he continued to remind Koppel of a Tuesday night in an extended "Nightline" that turned into a lively debate with Clinton.

Then, on NBC's "Today" Wednesday morning, Brown rattled interviewer Katie Couric by suggesting NBC and the other networks have been doing the public a disservice by holding to their own preconceived notions while ignoring the voice of the people. He also put in a

few zingers at NBC's Tom Brokaw, who wasn't even there.

What's going on here? Anybody who follows national politics knows it's suicidal for a candidate to attack the TV networks while desperately needing all the free exposure he can get from them. Brown is behaving like a fitting cautionary tale: With the only gasoline left to sell in Los Angeles on a holiday weekend.

But that, of course, is what his candidacy is all about. He is cashing in on the public's disgust with the political status quo by running a campaign that seeks to throw out the rascals and their system along with them. He wants voters to believe he's the only candidate who's offering honesty and integrity at a time when there's a dire shortage of each.

What's different about this campaign is that Brown shrewdly recognizes the public is just as fed up with the TV networks for a variety of reasons. His sniping at the human gears of TV news seems to be his calculated attempt to link them in the public's mind with the political establishment.

In other words, Brown is not subtly suggesting that the networks refuse to take his disquiet seriously, he is, perhaps unwittingly, becoming part of the conspiracy to maintain the status quo. He even suggests the comfortable incumbents and power

brokers of both parties have formed what amounts to a united front to keep outsiders like him out of Washington. It's not too great a leap to imagine the networks helping them out.

This strategy can work both ways for Brown. If he can make viewers believe he's the little guy, the network and the political fat cats are picking on it, may hurt the credibility of anything anybody says against him. At the same time, he may be raising the consciousness of network pundits, who don't like looking ridiculous any more than the rest of us do.

It may be working already. Koppel no longer looks exasperated by Brown's persistent, hammering style during interviews. In fact, he looks rather amused by Brown's skill at jamming all his slogans into every answer and by his skill at needing people, especially when there are other people on the show, such as Clinton, for Brown to needle.

During their Tuesday "Nightline" debate, Brown was like a torter whose teeth were sunk into Clinton's pants leg. Shake as hard as he might, Clinton couldn't get rid of the pesky Brown. When Clinton tried to argue he wasn't the candidate of the party high rollers, Brown poked that irritating finger at him and challenged Clinton to prove it by agreeing for them both to do without any costly TV advertising for the up-

coming New York primary. Clinton clammed up and seemed to be looking around for the nearest exit.

All that seemed to impress Koppel, who appears to be gaining respect for Brown, at least as a debater. Others at ABC may be coming around, too. On Wednesday morning's "Good Morning America," ABC political analyst Colic Roberts and Hal Bruno conceded Brown's Connecticut victory has to be taken seriously because of exit polls that show public doubts about Clinton's integrity. They pointed out that the "super delegates," who represent the attitude of the party hierarchy, aren't ready to climb on the Clinton bandwagon yet, mainly because of uncertainty caused by Brown's growing success.

Naturally, Brown's ability to snipe at the networks with impunity will come to an abrupt end if Clinton beats him up next month in New York.

In the meantime, though, his strategy has at least temporarily become his greatest liability as a candidate: the constant labeling of him as "Governor Moonbeam," an iconoclastic political amateur whose only real purpose is to give the campaign some comic relief with wacky ideas like that 800 number — which is now bringing Brown's campaign about \$100,000 a day from voters who seem to be taking him quite seriously indeed.

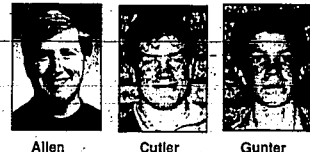

Best actress: Sarandon, Davis garner nominations for 'Thelma' Best actor: Violence is key word in discussing category's nominees

LOS ANGELES — Can a former nominee for the Oscar when a candidate is nominated for the same movie? The issue will be tested at Monday's Academy Awards, for which Susan Sarandon and Geena Davis were both nominated as best actress for "Thelma & Louise."

History indicates the chances are slim. In 1935, Clark Gable and Charles Laughton were nominated for best actor for "Muttiny on the Bounty," Victor McLaglen won for "The Informer."

In 1944, Bing Crosby and Barry Fitzgerald were named as best actor for "Going My Way." Crosby took the Oscar, but Fitzgerald got one as supporting actor. The rules now read that an actor can only be nominated in one category for a single performance.

Bette Davis and Anne Baxter were both nominated for "All About Eve" (1950). And the winner was Judy Holliday for "Born Yesterday." Montgomery Clift and Burt Lancaster of "From Here to Eternity" lost out to William Holden in "Stalag 17" in 1953. Other double flowers include Rock Hudson and James Dean for "Giant," and Anne Bancroft and Shirley Maclaine in "The Turning Point" (1977).

However, Maximilian Schell, bested Burt Lancaster for "Judgment at Nuremberg" in 1961. And Peter Finch was awarded a posthumous Oscar for "Network" (1976) for which William Holden also was nominated. In addition, F. Murray Abraham triumphed for "Amadeus" over Tom Hulse in 1981.

In 1982, Tom Hanks, in which two men enjoy a law-breaking spree through the West, proved the sleeper of 1991.

...and figurative, the name example being Rob Lowe dancing with Snow White in the opening number in 1989.

Beatty himself may not make it up the podium at all, though he has at least two chances.

Nominated as Best Actor for "Bugsy," he probably be edged out by Nick Nolte, who gave an Oscar-worthy performance in "Tides." Nolte is not right now, having recently been named best man in the world by People magazine; he's been behaving himself lately, and he also turned in fine performance this year in "Cape Fear." And Academy members feeling guilty about not nominating Barbara Streisand for Best Director can come clean by saying one big "Hail Nick," thus recognizing her territorial acumen (of other people) without going all the way.

Beatty's second big chance to make a speech will come with the Best Picture award. He is a producer of "Bugsy," a credible front runner for Best Picture. It won't both the LA Critics and the Golden Globe awards; it got the most nominations; it doesn't have so much violence that some people didn't want to see it (like "Silence of the Lambs"); it has actual Hollywood people (unlike "Beauty and the Beast"), and it is all about Hollywood.

"The movie that will win Best Picture is 'Bugsy and the Beast.' One has bodies, the other has soul. Actually, 'Beauty and the Beast' will take the Oscar and probably deserves it since it's the closest to being the best of what it is.

"When 'Beauty and the Beast' wins Best Picture, there will be much chin wagging and tears. Marking the first time an animated feature has ever won Best Picture, it will be a solemn moment, dedicated to the vision of Walt Disney and 'Beauty' lyricist Howard Ashman, who died of AIDS shortly after he completed his work on 'Beauty.' The Oscar TV audience will already be familiar with Ashman because he

The nominees for best actress:

GEENA DAVIS and SUSAN SARANDON played free-hustling women intent on a payback for the indignities they suffered at the hands of men in Ridley Scott's "Thelma & Louise."

Davis, an Oscar winner for her supporting role in the 1985 "The Accidental Tourist," talked of her role as Thelma:

"One kind of great thing that she has in her life is the friendship with Louise. They're like best, total-best friends. Thelma really idolizes Louise and looks up to her as a hero. She kind of leans on her a lot, to help her out and take care of her. ... It's a movie about women finding their power."

Davis was nominated once before as best actress, for "Atlantic City" in 1981. In a magazine interview, she denied that "Thelma & Louise" was anti-female.

"I hope it's not. What's great about the film is that it allows women to be outlaws and heroic. Nobody asked if 'Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid' was an anti-female film."

LAURA DERN makes her first entry in the Academy Awards as the free-spirited farm girl in Martha Coolidge's "Rambling Rose." She grew up in the movie business as the daughter of Bruce Dern and Diane Ladd, who was nominated as supporting actress for "Rambling Rose."

"She's never been raised in a city. Her dad is her character. She comes from the back hills of Alabama, basically an orphan. She had no education and just entered society as the movie begins."

"Society has told her who she is supposed to be. That really doesn't

jell with her own idea of herself. That creates conflict."

BETTE MIDLER has won best-actress nominations for her first movie, "The Rose" (1979), and her latest, "For the Boys." She plays an entertainer of the troops in three wars in "For the Boys," which she also produced through her All-Girl Productions.

"For the Boys" bombed at the box office, and Midler expressed her disappointment in accepting a Golden Globe as best actress in a comedy. Backstage, she commented:

"It was a wonderful picture. I had a wonderful time making it. I worked as hard as I ever have before. It was the top of the line, really an A picture. I'd wanted to do one for a long time. I finally got one going that we actually produced ourselves. It was a big, big thrill. Nobody can take that away from me."

JODIE FOSTER could win her second Oscar as the FBI recruit who matches wits with a maniacal doctor in "The Silence of the Lambs." She won as best actress in 1988 for her role as the victim of gang rape in "The Accused." As a youngster in 1976 she was nominated as supporting actress for her role as the child prodigy in "Taxi Driver."

"I think it's one of the first in a line of cinematic female heroes," Foster said of her "Lambs" roll. "I don't mean it's the traditional heroine, the woman who is escaping the monster or the woman who empowers them by pumping up their muscles or something."

"I think this is genuine female hero. I think it's one of the first times that a woman has had access to that myth, to a folklore connection with what a real hero is. I think it's a big step."

"The Silence of the Lambs."

However, since Foster already has a pair of Oscars and Hollywood may be in the mood for at least one long shot to confound the billions of dollars in bets — this being the biggest betfest after the Super Bowl — Best Actress could go to Laura Dern, daughter of Bruce Dern and Diane Ladd, who delivered a complex and subtle Oscar-worthy performance in "Rambling Rose."

Though newcomer Juliette Lewis was dynamic in "Cape Fear" and Kate Nelligan was wonderful in "Prince of Tides," Best Supporting Actress belongs to Mercedes Ruehl for "The Fisher King." Period.

The category that's too close to call is Best Original Screenplay. The fact is, I loved every single one. Forced to choose if my job depended on it (and it just may), I'd go with "Boyz n the Hood," because it was something astonishing that came out of nowhere. And, like two other movies nominated in this category — "Grand Canyon" and "The Fisher King" — it was more than a screenplay; it was a vision.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Violence dominates the Academy Award race for best actor, the contenders including a vicious gangster, a mass murderer and a vengeful killer.

The other two actors won nominations for portrayals of a man bedeviled by the triple rape of his family and another unhinged by the killing of his wife in a mass murder.

The nominees:

WARREN BEATTY is no newcomer to the awards. He has been nominated as an actor three times previously, for "Bonnie and Clyde," "Heaven Can Wait" and "Shampoo." He has also been named as producer, writer, or director of his films. His only Oscar came in 1981 for directing "Reds."

Some critics have said that Beatty gave his most intense performance as the publicity-seeking mobster in "Bugsy." The film, for which he was also nominated as coproducer, was the result of a longtime fascination with Ben Siegel, who was gunned down after overspending on the Las Vegas Flamingo.

Of the film's reception, he says, "You bring your own interest that you're bringing. If you're interested enough, then (the audience) will be interested. I have found this guy interesting ever since I came out here."

"I don't know anybody who's not interested in Bugsy Siegel. He had this passionate love affair with Virginia Hill. He had this dream that he wanted to bring into fruition; the creation of Las Vegas. He was completely ridiculed for it. Then of course, he has the drama that you're going to get out of an outlaw."

ROBERT DE NIRO is a two-time Oscar winner — as supporting actor for "The Godfather Part II" in 1974 and as lead actor in "Raging Bull" in

1974. He has a total of six nominations, five in the lead category. He has been nominated for his role as the vicious ex-convict seeking vengeance in "Cape Fear."

De Niro is famed for drawing his characters from within.

"In everything you do and in everything you do well, there's always part of you," he has explained. "You use that, you draw on that. That doesn't mean you are that person, because you're just not. You differentiate between what reality is and what nonreality is."

"I'm always dissatisfied in certain things in movies that I have done. ... But you get an interesting feedback from people over the years. That's very satisfying. They tell you things you never even thought of."

ANTHONY HOPKINS is a first-time nominee, playing a history teacher in "The Lion in Winter." The Welsh-born actor created a new dimension in film evil with Dr. Hannibal "The Cannibal" Lecter.

Hopkins admits that the role presented no exceptional challenge: "I approached the role with relief. I found it quite easy to play. I am able to move into those parts with ease, to get into the skins of them."

"My approach to work is quite simple; I learn the lines and think about the part. I've got the whole flavor, the whole essence of the man very quickly for some reason."

"I do actually throw the role off between takes. I'm of that school of acting. ... I admire people like Robert De Niro and Dustin Hoffman and Al Pacino who are great actors who zoom about and live their roles through the period of the film. I can't."

NICK NOLTE is another first-timer in the Oscar sweepstakes. He won the nod for "The Prince of Tides" role as the high school coach

seeking the truths of his family's sordid history. Nolte had another strong role in 1991, as the small-town boyer haunted by a violent former client in "Cape Fear."

At a press conference following his Golden Globe as best actor in a drama, Nolte admitted that he drew upon his own background for his role as the troubled Tom Wingo in "The Prince of Tides."

"I certainly could find enough in my own life. No matter how minor or deep it went, you can find things that the child within you is mad about."

"I've always said that the fool is my best teacher. I don't mean the fool as a stupid man, but a fool who enters into things without knowing all the ramifications. Nobody's that wise."

ROBIN WILLIAMS has defied the Academy's traditional disregard for comedy. He has been nominated twice before as best actor, for "Good Morning, Vietnam" in 1987 and "Dead Poet's Society" in 1989.

"The Fisher King" offered Williams a complex role as a college professor who escapes reality after the mindless murder of his wife and joins the homeless as a kind of medieval knight. The comedian, who studied drama under John Houseman at The Juilliard School in New York, is another actor who searches his role within himself.

"There are parts of myself that are quite disturbed," he told reporters after winning his Golden Globe as best actor in a comedy. "The absurd and being 'The Fisher King' character as having 'at the core of it this very, very painful thing.'"

"Everything was designed to cover up that part, avoiding that and creating a whole other personality. It's a psychological syndrome called post-traumatic stress, where people actually create another personality to avoid a trauma."

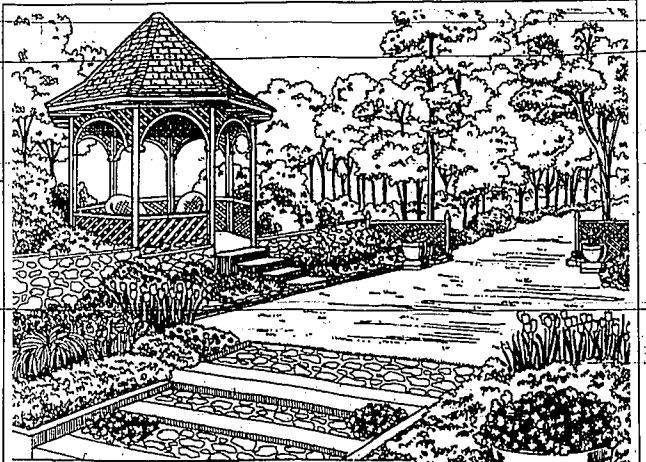

'Gladiator' provides few surprises

HOLLYWOOD—The Western may be dead, the musical may be in partial remission, but the boxing film keeps slugging away. To argue that the slugfests are about as predictable as a presidential campaign primary speech is to miss the point. Predictability is the lifeblood of the boxing film.

The boxing genre, because it is more adaptable to urban, contemporary myths, and because it is easy to slap on a rap soundtrack, has survived into a new generation in a way the Western hasn't.

But this does not mean it has survived with any glory. "Gladiator," the latest "Rocky" esque fantasia, is interesting only as a kind of sociological specimen; it is a Great White Hope scenario that plugs into race-baiting hatreds but covers its tracks by trying for a brotherhood-of-man effect. The R-rated film has a trashy, low-

read, bubble-raising spirit but it also has high-road pretensions. It's a violent movie that wants to make an anti-violent "statement"—the oldest ploy in the boxing film genre.

Tommy Riley (James Marshall) is the new kid on the block on Chicago's tough South Side. Although Tommy was raised in Connecticut in the lap of the middle class, his gambler father (John Heard) has fallen on hard times. Heard looks to be about eight years older than Marshall. No wonder he's in trouble.

To erase some of his father's markers, Tommy agrees to a one-time-only prizefight. Does he win? Does he fight again? Does his scurvy promoter (Brian Dentlby) sink his hooks into the boy? Does his wise old trainer, (Ossie Davis) give him some valuable life lessons? Does Tommy's winsome girlfriend (Cara Buono) urge him to lay down his gloves?

If you answered "no" to any of the above, you probably also think Don King wears a crew cut.

Tommy's main adversary in the ring is a black ganglord named Shortcut (Lance Slaughter). Shortcut is a preening, sociopathic racial caricature, but the filmmakers are careful to counterbalance him with the noble Lincoln (Cuba Gooding Jr.), who fights to lift his picture-perfect wife and child out of the ghetto, and with a Cuban hotshot (Jon Seda) who is so cocky and good-humored that you just know something awful is going to happen to him. Shortcut and Lincoln are mortal enemies, so when Tommy saves Lincoln's life during a gang attack, we are primed for the moment when they, too, will have to face off in the ring.

Because the boxing promoters are in the business of exploiting racial tensions in the ring, that's supposed to buy off the crude exploitation of racial tensions by the filmmakers. They're both in the same business really.

Watchdog group claims film ratings growing lax

BOCA RATON, Fla.—A Boca Raton watchdog group has compiled a list of every "swear word, nude scene and fight in major Hollywood movies" says the Motion Picture Association of America has grown lax in its ratings.

When you take your child to a PG movie and you hear the F-word, you become a little bit concerned," said Dave Winston, editor of Entertainment Research Reports, a bi-monthly newsletter launched last year that's aimed at parents. "The standards seem to be lowering themselves."

After a year spent in movie theaters with pad and pencil, recording every curse, punch and bared bosom on film, the group has compiled a veritable statistical abstract of Hollywood raunch.

Did you know, for example, that the average R-rated movie last year included 22 "F-words," three fist-fights and one scene of female nudity? That four PG-13 films depicted nude sex? Did you care?

"It's a judgment call," said Jack Valenti, president of the Motion Picture Association of America, and a lot of people still think cartoons are too violent. We hope our ratings change with the times.

Despite Winston's objections, Valenti has no intention of altering the basic philosophy of his ratings system: What's important is the general tone of the movie, not the number of F-words or the nude-body count, he says.

The two also have a score to settle over the Michael J. Fox comedy, "Due Hollywood." Winston claims the film contains a shot of a fully nude woman emerging from the ocean. Valenti insists she's wearing a body suit.

"Due Hollywood" crossed a new threshold in the parental guidance warfare," Winston wrote in his newsletter.

Valenti isn't so sure: "I guarantee you, if you see full frontal nudity, you've got laser eyes."

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The new thriller "Basic Instinct" has outraged some homosexuals and feminists, but moviewegers sent it to the top of the box-office charts in its debut weekend.

"Basic Instinct" sold \$15.1 million in tickets, according to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc., and knocked "Wayne's World" out of first place after five consecutive weeks.

"Wayne's World," the movie version of the popular "Saturday Night Live" sketch earned \$7.7 million to finish second.

"Basic Instinct," which has been criticized by some gay and feminist groups as sexist and homophobic, and by some reviewers as dull, stars Sharon Stone as a bisexual murder suspect and Michael Douglas as the policeman investigating her.

In third place was the Joe Pesci comedy, "My Cousin Vinny," which took in \$7.2 million.

BASIC INSTINCT (R). This tale of a tough cop (Michael Douglas) who falls for a sultry murder suspect (Sharon Stone) has been the center of an innumerable series of controversies that turn out to be more interesting than the film itself. Despite liberal amounts of nudity, its sex lacks feeling and its plot is riddled with implausibilities. Instead of firing you off director Paul Verhoeven only wears you out, and while that is something, it is not nearly enough.

audience-friendly performances in a not very involving motion picture. Not only does this film deal with Southern women in straightened circumstances, its very existence makes you wonder how its trapped actresses (Jessica Tandy, Mary Stuart Masterson, Kathy Bates and Mary-Louise Parker) managed to make the best of a dramatically disheartening situation.

THE HAND THAT ROCKS THE CRADLE (R). This psychological suspense thriller about a killer nanny is a cut above the norm. Rebecca De Mornay plays the nanny to a T. Director John Curtis Hanson, who has a wicked flair. This would make a great double bill with "The Stepfather." Both films are about the shocks lurking inside the everyday.

MEDICINE MAN (PG-13)—The destruction of the Brazilian rain forests has become such a key symbol of ecological waste that there seems something "forced" about the premise here: the threatened forests may conceivably cure for cancer. Sean Connery, looking like a cross between the Ginger Man and Tarzan, is fun as a pharmaceutical hermit. Lorraine Bracco is a little shrieky as his partner-antagonist, and director John McTiernan makes the jungle and trees look gorgeous. But he's more at home with high-tech thrillers ("Die Hard") than the mix of message and melodrama required here.

BEAUTY AND THE BEAST (G). Disney's 30th full-length animated feature is the studio's most successful attempt in decades. Managing to be at once wisened-up and traditional, it combines a strong story line, based on the classic fairy tale, with an exceptionally alive score by lyricist Howard Ashman and composer Alan Menken. Though the beast is a splendid creation, and Belle is a model of self-reliance, the film is just about stolen by the futuristic, square-jawed presence of Gaston, the most comically conceived of swains. If you don't walk out singing his song, go back in and try again.

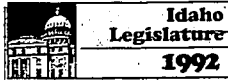

Committee mulls Andrus waste plan

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus' three-year battle to block shipments of spent nuclear fuel to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory reached a House committee Thursday.

The House State Affairs Committee took up a proposal Andrus says would reverse a federal appeals court ruling that opens the way to resumed waste shipments to the INEL.

The 9th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Monday that the state cannot force the Energy Department to get an air-quality permit before storing waste from a shuttered Colorado reactor at an INEL facility.

Andrus' draft bill would amend the

state's Environmental Protection and Health Act to specify that "spent nuclear fuel" permits do not apply to radiocesiums and radiocesiums that buildings which would also specify that buildings which allowed air contaminants to escape into the outdoor atmosphere are also covered under the rules.

The intent is to require the Energy Department to apply for and receive an air-quality permit from the Division of Environmental Quality before bringing in some 440,000 pounds of spent nuclear fuel

from the Fort St. Vrain reactor to INEL's Chemical Processing Plant facility.

Jonathan Carter, Andrus' legal assistant, said the bill would clarify into law what had been DEQ's interpretation of its rules and regulations.

"This legislation does not change the law," Carter told the committee. "It puts us back to where we were before the 9th Circuit ruled."

The state has argued that the stored waste

Jerome man receives jail term in drug case

JEROME — A 40-year-old Jerome man was sentenced to a year in the Jerome County Jail for possession and delivery of cocaine and methamphetamine.

House kills measure aimed at altering school funding

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Patti Nafziger, D-Wendell, directed the Department of Education to develop a cost-of-living index that could be inserted into the distribution formula. That, presumably, would give school districts where it is more expensive to live and work — such as Blaine County District 61 — more aid than they would otherwise receive.

Currently, the main factors in the distribution formula are the number of students and the amount of taxable property in the district.

The bill failed the House on a 38-45 vote. However, Nafziger said she would bring it back next year if she is returned to the Legislature.

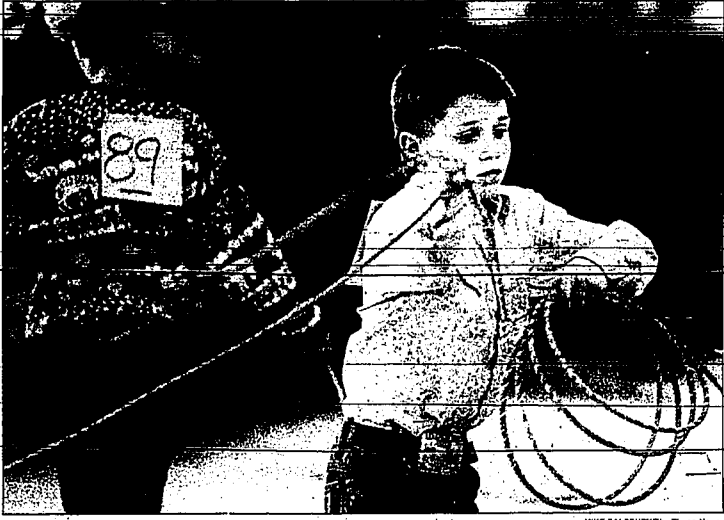

Hospital learns lesson of community involvement, according to new book

TWIN FALLS — Dr. Paul Miles, a Twin Falls pediatrician, had a vision of making Idaho the safest place in the country to have a baby.

But when Miles and other health-care workers tried to improve delivery and intensive-care services around the state, the death rate among newborns didn't improve.

The problem? They didn't have control over circumstances before or after the patient's hospital stay, according to a new book spotlighting Magic Valley Regional Medical

Center's efforts to improve its services.

Hospital Administrator John Bingham gave copies of the book, "Striving Toward Improvement: Six Hospitals in Search of Quality" to representatives of the hospital, library, College of Southern Idaho libraries and the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce at a news conference Thursday.

The book says the hospital's management learned from Miles' experience, realizing that if it was to be successful improving health care it had to involve everyone in the community.

It also demonstrated the need to improve hospital illness prevention and education services, it says.

The book was written by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, which Bingham said has established itself as the preeminent health-care accreditation group in the country.

As a result of Miles' experience, it says, the hospital's board then developed a vision statement that the hospital "will be a standard of excellence and cooperation in making Magic Valley the healthiest place in America."

That "global" goal is one reason the hospital was singled out in the book with five other hospitals all working to

Grocery store owner hopes to rebuild by July

FAIRFIELD — The owner of Camas County's only supermarket and gas station, which burned Tuesday, remains undaunted.

"Gonna rebuild," said Bill Stewart, whose Market Basket was gutted by fire.

He'd like to finish a new store around July 4, he said Thursday.

Meanwhile, he's trying to clean up an old gasoline spill from tanks outside his store.

Fire inspectors decided Tuesday's fire was caused by a short-circuit inside a metal electrical conduit that ran along the store's ceiling to light banks. Camas County Sheriff Harold Lee said.

Stewart said the wiring was installed in 1976, when the store was built, but fire inspectors told him the problem is not uncommon, he said.

The blaze caused about \$500,000 in damage, but it is covered by insurance, said Stewart.

Stewart, who was "born and raised here," said he wants to build the store's back up for his son.



A short-circuit in wiring along the store's ceiling likely sparked Tuesday's fire, officials determined Thursday. The store, whose slogan is, "If we don't have it, you don't need it," was an important part of the community, he said. Although there are convenience stores in

Fairfield and Corral, the Market Basket was the only supermarket between Gooding and Hailey.

Stewart plans to rebuild along the lines of the old 8,000-square-foot store.

"That's big enough for Fairfield," he said.

The store was also the county's only gas supply. And that supply has caused Stewart a big headache.

In 1989, Stewart began cleanup of about 19,000 gallons of gas that leaked from a storage tank.

He started pumping groundwater last summer to clean the gas from it and will have to continue that for four years, he said.

So far, that effort has cost him \$270,000.

Stewart said he hopes to recover some of that money in a lawsuit over a possible faulty pipe installation.

The storage tanks are above ground, but the pipes that lead to the delivery pumps, which were the source of the leak, may have been incorrectly installed.

Stewart has moved his gas supplies to an old gas station he owns in Fairfield and has reopened temporarily.

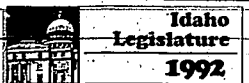
Some see new school bill as last opportunity for reform

BOISE - The Idaho House of Representatives Thursday prepared to pass yet another \$496.9 million public-schools budget, amid warnings that it would be the last bill to contain any specific provision for school reform.

House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee, said he hoped the bill would break the minds of three Senate Republicans who have been holding out for a higher appropriation and a strong commitment to the school-reform effort. "The hope is that they will get that (bill) out of there on a 22-21 vote tomorrow," Boyd said after the House adjourned Thursday afternoon.

He referred to the 21 Democrats and 21 Republicans in the Senate and Republican Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, who presides over the body and can vote only to break a tie.

Twice this session, three of the Republicans - Laird Noh of Kimberly, John Hansen of Idaho Falls and Edward Osborne of Boise - have joined the Democrats to vote down school bills that appropriate \$496.9 million from the state's General Fund. On Wednesday, three Democrats joined Republicans in killing a \$500.5 million bill.

Hansen, Noh and Osborne have said that their main concern is not the bottom-line figure, but that enough money goes toward the ongoing effort to restructure Idaho's schools.

"But with the Legislature approaching its

traditional adjournment date and no schools budget in place, Boyd said Thursday that time was fast running out for reform.

The measure currently under consideration began life Thursday morning as a \$500 million budget bill. But Republicans moved to place it on the House's amending order, with the intent to whittle it down to \$496.9 million.

Like previous House-passed measures, the amended bill will also set aside \$2 million for the school-reform effort and include a "trailer" provision providing up to \$5 million more if the state ends the 1993 fiscal year with a surplus.

If, as expected, the House amends the bill to Republican satisfaction and passes it this morning, Boyd said he hopes two messages to get through to the Senate:

House Republicans, who control the chamber 56-28, will not accept a higher figure.

"We're as solid as we've ever been," Boyd said.

If the Senate rejects this bill, the next one to come down the pike won't have any money for reform efforts.

"This will be our last shot for reform," Boyd said. "I'd be really surprised if our guys would stand still for breaking out \$2 million again."

Local superintendents are pressuring lawmakers pass up reform during this tight budget year, so that every dollar possible can be directed to classroom operations, he said.

"A lot of legislators are convinced that the reform money will all go to big schools," he said.

"I doubt you'd find anyone in favor of it who didn't get a grant last year."

The skepticism is not confined to Republican ranks. During initial debate on the bill Thursday, Minority Leader Jim Stoicheff of Sandpoint, a retired teacher,

said: "Except for making sure that kids have some food in their stomachs, I think that most of this reform is phony garbage."

Even before the House's action, there were signs that its message was getting through.

Hansen, chairman of the Senate Education Committee and perhaps the Legislature's leading champion of school reform, said that if push came to shove, he would vote for a \$496.9 million budget rather than see the reform effort grind to a halt.

"The support for the restructuring effort is unfortunately not as strong as I would like," he said, admitting the possibility it could be killed altogether.

Osborne added, "I don't know that there's never a point where I couldn't accept (\$496.9 million), but it's not this week."

Today is the last working day of the week, though, and with legislators eager to pack up and go home, next week may be another story.

Heyburn increases fees for new sewer system

HEYBURN - Heyburn residents will be paying more for city sewer services.

City Council members raised the monthly user fee Wednesday by \$5 to \$14.90 for a single family dwelling. The fee was hiked to pay for the new city sewer system and its maintenance.

The council also approved spending \$4,100 at the new sewer project to sand and seal the inside area of the concrete structures from the top to the water line.

A health insurance plan for city employees was adopted. City Clerk Ruth Davis explained the two Blue Shield plans available. The council approved a plan including a \$1,000 stop loss provision and a prescription card which changes the co-payment to 20 percent for each purchase.

The plan includes no life insurance and is available to city employees only, not elected officials. Davis said the plan provides for unused premium funds to be returned to the city.

The council will start proceedings to annex the Seventh Day Adventist Church of Alfreco Road into the city of Heyburn.

The planning and zoning committee will be contacted about holding a public hearing. The church, last summer, requested it be annexed in order to obtain a better insurance rate, have police and fire protection and be charged sewer and water rates.

Al Hodges was reappointed by Mayor Glen Loveland to the position of city superintendent.

Hodge said the city is reviewing qualifications for an engineer to work on a federally funded project with the Idaho Department of Transportation and Union Pacific Railroad to install crossing equipment at tracks on 21st Street and O and J streets.

Hodge also announced a new Environmental Protection Agency law effective July 1, will require citizens to sample household water supplies for copper and lead content. Cities the size of Heyburn must take 20 samples every six months and have them analyzed. Hodge said each analysis will cost approximately \$50; so the testing alone will cost the city about \$2,000 a year, he said.

Materials to replace the water lines and service lines which are deteriorating in the Bailey subdivision have been ordered.

Hodge reported, Residents will have the option of replacing their own lines at the same time the city work is done, he said.

Hodge said irrigation water will arrive on April 1. Councilman Art McCall asked that guard rails be installed on drain ditches because of requests from several residents.

The council instructed Hodge to gain check into the purchase of a sound system which he had researched earlier this year. Residents attending Wednesday's council meeting said they were having trouble hearing. Sho-Bans question South Hills grazing

TWIN FALLS - Halting livestock grazing on a portion of the South Hills would not automatically be bad for the ranchers involved, according to the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes.

The tribes have appealed an environmental assessment of Goose Creek Grazing Allotment Management Plan, which they say is "arbitrary and capricious" and ignores Native American treaty rights.

The management plan would direct grazing in part of the Twin Falls Ranger District of the Sawtooth National Forest.

The Shoshone-Bannocks are merely protecting their historical treaty rights to aboriginal hunting and fishing areas they acquired when they agreed to move onto the Fort Hall Indian Reservation, said Marvin Osborne, member of the Fort Hall Business Council.

The reservation is located north and west of Pocatello.

The appeal disagrees with a decision made by Ranger Don Oman, who based his ruling on the social and economic effects of halting grazing, the assumption that guidelines in the forest's 1987 Land and Resource Management Plan could be met with "more intensive grazing," and the fact that grazing is recognized by federal law as a historic use of the area, the appeal documents say.

The only "possible" negative effect of discontinuing grazing would be socio-economic, while other resources would get significant benefits, the appeal says. But the plan does not present a thorough analysis of socio-economic effects.

It does not show that

discontinuing grazing would actually be detrimental to allotment permits," the appeal says. In fact, neither Bureau of Land Management grazing land may be available.

Substituting BLM land if grazing were reduced or stopped on Forest Service land might actually be better for some ranchers.

"Beneficial social effects may outweigh negative effects and permit livestock to graze," the appeal says.

They also would like to see an evaluation of "actual impacts to permittees and communities from elimination and reductions in permitted grazing levels," the appeal says.

The Sawtooth National Forest's analysis of what it take to meet forest plan standards and guidelines is based on a system of "rest rotation," whereby each year a different pasture of the several in the allotment is not grazed, the appeal says.

That method has been refuted by experts, the tribes say.

"Vegetation appears to be more affected by grazing intensity than by grazing systems," the appeal says.

The environmental assessment of

the Goose Creek plan assumes the current management system with the current number of livestock will allow recovery of sensitive riparian areas - those green strips along water ways.

But the tribes disagree with that assumption and want the Forest Service to analyze an alternative that proposes reduced livestock numbers corresponding to numbers that would meet forest standards and strive towards the goals outlined in the Sawtooth Forest Plan.

The Goose Creek plan's assessment acknowledges that under the current management system spring grazing pastures are typically grazed too hard. "And spring is a 'highly desirable use period,'" the appeal says.

But it current grazing during the spring cannot meet forest standards, it may the number of livestock that are causing most of the problems identified in the assessment, the appeal says.

The Shoshone-Bannocks are concerned about land uses that damage the environment. Their interest in the grazing management plan is an interest in stewardship, it said.

trying to ensure sound and safe environmental practices, Osborne said.

The federal government has a "trust responsibility" to involve the tribes in land use decisions on federal land, he said. When Indians moved onto reservations, they were promised they would retain rights to hunt and fish and gather on federal lands, he said.

Forest officials have met with representatives of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes to discuss and clarify the appeal, said Forest Service spokesman Ed Wattapert.

The Sawtooth Forest will be reviewed formally to the appeal by the end of April, he said.

The appeal is an example of the appeal process the Forest Service proposes to abandon in favor of more public comment before decisions. Those who still disagree with decision would have to take their complaint to court.

The Forest Service still would review decisions, but an appeal would not halt a decision from being carried out while the appeal is settled.

Utah judge sentences nurse killer to 35 years in prison

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Richard Worthington, who killed and raped a woman and threatened to blow up eight hostages in a hospital maternity wing, was sentenced Thursday to 35 years in life in prison.

Third District Judge Timothy Hanson heard fearful testimony from Worthington, members of his family and that of victim Karla Roth before ordering the 40-year-old landscaper to Utah State Prison. "Unfortunately, Mr. Worthington invaded that sanctuary and made it a place of terror... and that is inexcusable," said the judge, who called the decision his most difficult in a decade on the bench.

At times weeping uncontrollably during the four-hour hearing, Worthington told Hanson, "I literally,

hour upon hour, day upon day, sat in my cell and cried for Karla Roth and thought what punishment he thought would be fitting. Worthington said only that "somehow the victims need to have peace in their hearts."

Roth was gunned-down in the hospital parking lot at the beginning of an 18-hour standoff last September during which a hostage gave birth. It ended when Worthington released the hostages unharmed.

Worthington had pleaded guilty March 16 to reduced charges, a week before jury selection was to begin for a trial. In a plea bargain, Worthington pleaded guilty to one count of felony murder, eight counts of aggravated kidnapping and one count of aggravated burglary.

Nominees reflect darker side of life

As Hollywood gears up for "The 64th Annual Academy Awards Presentation" (airing 7 p.m. MST Monday, March 30, on KKVI, Channel 35, Cable 6 and other ABC affiliates), let's review the finest that Tinseltown has to offer, as reflected in the Best Picture nominees: a movie about a family so dysfunctional that one member is driven to attempt suicide, another that implies that a vice president of the United States was part of a conspiracy to murder a president, two films about psychotic killers and one in which the hero is a

real beast.

Gee, was it only two years ago that "Driving Miss Daisy" won?

This year's Best Picture nominees — "The Prince of Tides," "JFK," "Bugsy," "The Silence of the Lambs" and "Beauty and the Beast" — might not be the sunniest array you've ever seen; but they do offer at least one beam of hope: The nomination of "Beauty and the Beast" (the first ever in the category for an animated film) marks the return of Disney to animation excellence (a process begun with 1989's "The Little Mermaid" after a long slough of mediocrity. Not only that: "Beauty and the Beast" accounts for no fewer than three of the five

nominees in the Best Original Song category.

It wouldn't be the Oscars without one good, juicy controversy, and this year is no exception. The field of battle this time is over the Best Director nominees, with Barbra Streisand supporters keening and waiting over her omission from the list (which includes Jonathan Demme, "The Silence of the Lambs"; Barry Levinson, "Bugsy"; Ridley Scott, "Thelma & Louise"; John Singleton, "Boyz n the Hood"; and Oliver Stone, "JFK").

How, Streisand's acolytes sputter, can "The Prince of Tides" be good enough to be considered for Best Picture without its maker being among the year's best directors? Interestingly, you don't hear Scott or Singleton counterjive with the logical corollary: How can I be among the year's best directors without my film being nominated for Best Picture? This forbearance alone makes us root for Scott or Singleton to take the statuette home.

So put on the popcorn; pull up a chair; wait for those magic words, "May I have the envelope, please?" and get ready for some arguments on Tuesday morning: It's Oscar time once again.

Your backstage pass to the Academy Awards

Sometimes the best part of an Oscar telecast doesn't take place until the morning after. That's when people gather around water coolers everywhere to comment on the actor who misread his cue cards, the actress who wore an outrageous gown or the director who rambled on incoherently.

Considering the monumental task of putting together a show like "The 64th Annual Academy Awards," though, there's something more amazing than what occasionally goes wrong: how much usually goes right. Consider:

- It's a live show, something few people in TV know how to handle anymore.

- It's major participants — movie stars — frequently had very little experience in front of live audiences.

- Rehearsal time is severely limited because of demanding schedules. Director Jeff Margolis is lucky if he can get presenters like Geena Davis, Kathy Bates, Goldie Hawn, Whoopi Goldberg, Spike Lee, Steven Spielberg and Audrey Hepburn together for one day to rehearse.

So how does Margolis do it? "There are months and months of preparation here," he says. "I do enough homework to give everybody who's involved all of the information that they can possibly have not to make an error."

The show is carefully scripted, but host Billy Crystal will be given a free rein. "He's so clever, and he's so fast," says Margolis. "An awful lot of what he does on the show is ad lib."

The one thing over which Margolis has no control is acceptance speeches. (Winners are asked to limit them to 40 seconds.)

"They've all watched enough award shows," he says. "I'm sure that some of them have been sitting at home in their living rooms saying, 'Gee, I wish that guy would get off the stage.'"

Where is Margolis on Oscar night? Backstage supervising? Setting up camera angles? In the audience enjoying the show?

Margolis laughs. "No, no, I'm the director," he says.

"I'm in a remote truck, looking at a monitor wall, wearing a headset, talking to more than 200 people, actually getting the show on the air. It's an astronomical responsibility."

Sitcoms' warm-ups harbor hot job

Q: I recently went to a taping of "A Different World" in Hollywood and was quite entertained before the show and during breaks. Are the people who do this warm-up actors or professional comics, and do they do other work as well? — H.O.

A: Warm-ups, as they are called, have one of the most coveted jobs in television. They work only three to four hours on the day the show tapes and are free to pursue other aspects of their careers for the rest of the week. In addition, they may earn as much as \$1,500 for a single warm-up. They often go into the writing and/or producing side of television. Some even wind up in front of the camera—as did former warm-up comics David Letterman, Dennis Miller, Bob Saget and Garry Shandling.

Q: I really enjoy watching reruns of "The Avengers" on A&E. But, is there a chance we will ever see the Ian Hendry episodes, or the two seasons with Honor Blackman?

A: The Arts and Entertainment network has the rights to 134 episodes of the classic British action series (airing weekdays). The package includes all the episodes with Honor Blackman, Diana Rigg and Linda Thorson as Patrick Macnee's co-stars. What it doesn't include, unfortunately, are episodes from the first two seasons (1960-61). The first season the series was called, "Police Surgeon," which ran for 30 minutes and starred the late Hendry ("Children of the Damned," "Repulsion," "Casino Royale," "The Mackenzie Break"). In 1961, it was retitled, "The Avengers," expanded to an hour and was given major format modifications. Hendry and Macnee starred. By 1962, Hendry had left and Blackman joined Macnee. The series' final incarnation, "The New Avengers," which CBS broadcast late night in 1976, is also not included in the A&E package. Neither it, nor the Hendry series are currently in circulation.

Q: Why are there two different casts on "Charles In Charge"?

A: Because there were two versions of the Spot-Bright series—one on network and the other for syndication. The first "family" was featured for one season on CBS (1984-85). When the series returned in

1987 in first-run syndication, a new cast and setting were presented. "Charles in Charge" is no longer in production.

TRAVELING MAN: Fans of comedian Jerry Seinfeld will be happy to know he's taking it on the road again. The very popular star of the hit TV series, "Seinfeld," will begin a 17-city tour in Anaheim, Calif. on April 25. As with his last tour, the

sitcom's ratings are expected to rise even further as he cuts across the country delivering his uniquely funny look at life.

Q: We were surprised to learn that Goldie Hawn has her own private vices. Since she's viewed as a real disciplinarian in her personal life, what can those vices be? — V.H.

A: Goldie confesses to some private lapses; she's human after all. But "vice" may be too strong a word. For example, Hawn smokes cigarettes, something of a surprise for a woman so conscious of her body and fitness. But, she adds, she smokes only one a day. The other "vice"? Occasionally, diet-conscious Goldie confesses she succumbs to a high-calorie breakfast, wolfing down cholesterol-rich items such as eggs Benedict. By Hollywood standards, it's pretty mild stuff.

TRAGEDY HAUNTED HOMES: Remember the house featured not long ago on the "Hard Copy" expose on the controversial circumstances surrounding Marilyn Monroe's death? That Brentwood, Calif. home, Monroe's last residence, is now on the market for \$2.3 million. It's hard to predict just how soon and for how close to the asking price the home will sell. When it comes to celebrity ownership, and in this case it's been almost 30 years since Monroe's death, all bets are off. The prime example would be the Sharon Tate house, in which the Charles Manson "family" committed so many horrible murders in 1969. When it came on the market following the tragedy, many Los Angeles

real estate agents said it would never sell and might as well be demolished so something new and untainted could be built on the site. Well, not only did it sell but it sold for well above the asking price after a bidding war erupted among the interested parties.

Q: Since she appeared on "Dynasty," hasn't Linda Evans gotten involved with some real rough biker types? How come? — G.S.

A: What a vivid imagination. Remember that Linda is a woman in her middle years. She was born in Hartford, Conn. on Nov. 18, 1942, and isn't exactly Hell's Angels material. 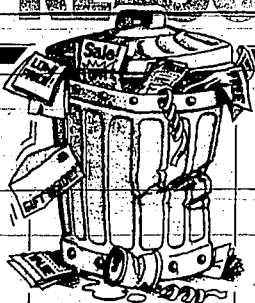
