House lists 303 hot check writers

WASHINGTON — The House ethics committee dropped a political depth charge Thursday when it released the names of 303 current and former lawmakers who had overdrawn their accounts at the now-closed House bank.

Already the scandal has killed off several political careers and the damage is sure to affect the November elections. Challenges have been handed a potent, made-for-TV issue: portraying bad checks as the emblem of all that is wrong with Congress.

As the report was released, the Capitol became a swirl of excuses and explanations. The contention from Democrats, whose leadership oversaw the bank and whose House majority stands to suffer most because of it, was this: It

wasn't really a bank. No taxpayer money was directly lost. The "bank" was an anachronism, a mom-and-pop operation gone awry.

Republicans, who demanded that voluminous information be released, were noticeably more subdued, realizing that any incumbent named was vulnerable.

Public interest groups such as Common Cause called for voters to judge members individually about whether abuses have occurred. For instance, the committee found that some overdrafts were the result of bookkeeping errors by the bank staff.

The ethics committee earlier had released the names of 22 members who it said had abused the bank by "repeatedly and routinely" overdrawing their accounts by several thousand dollars a month. Some overdrafts were in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Rep. Ronald Dellums, D-Calif., topped Thursday's list with 851 overdrafts, followed by Rep. Gerry Sikorski, D-Minn., with 697.

Bell: Idaho schools are good, but they need to be better

TWIN FALLS — Idaho schools need to change the way they operate in the future, even though they're not bad compared to other states, Terel Bell said Thursday.

The reason, Bell said, is that "not bad" isn't good enough, especially when other states are moving forward with restructuring their public schools.

"If you drift along complacently, Idaho will be left behind," he said.

Bell, who served as U.S. secretary of education during Ronald Reagan's first term as president, now is a school-reform consultant. He helped write the "Schools for 2000 and Beyond" reform plan that is the subject of public hearings throughout the state.

Bell, a graduate of the old Albion Normal School, spoke at a leadership conference sponsored by the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

In 1989, the last year for which Bell had figures, Idaho's high-school graduation rate was 78.8 percent, making it 14th best in the nation. That same year, the state placed ninth in scores on the American College Test, he said.

At the same time, though, Idaho was near the bottom in terms of teacher salaries, dollars spent per student and the ratio of teachers to students.

"I wonder how you do it on the amount of money you spend per student," Bell said.

Bell noted, however, that nearly a quarter of Idaho students don't graduate. He said Montana and Wyoming students both score higher on the ACT.

"Are they smarter than Idaho kids?" he said. "Don't be so damn complacent."

Bell discussed several of the "Schools for 2000" plan's key recommendations: early childhood education, parental involvement and integrating computers and other high technology into the schools.

He emphasized the importance of beginning a child's education before the child begins school. Stimulating a child's mind during the first five years of life, when the brain is growing rapidly, will help the child learn better later, Bell said.

Elementary schools should take the lead in teaching parents about the importance

Alternative mid-school may be next

TWIN FALLS — School district officials are thinking about starting an alternative middle school to complement the existing Magic Valley Alternative High School.

Dale Thornsbury, principal of O'Leary Junior High School, said he and Roger Golden, counselor at the alternative high school, will soon send questionnaires to schools throughout the Magic Valley, asking whether an alternative middle school is needed.

Thornsbury said he also plans to visit Pocatello's alternative middle school to see how it works.

An alternative middle school, like the alternative high school, would serve "at-risk" students, such as those who have been expelled from regular school or who are pregnant or parents.

Wiley Dobbs, the alternative high school's principal, said there is "definitely" a need for a corresponding middle school. Even if enrollment were limited to the Twin Falls district, he said, two classrooms would be needed.

Thornsbury agreed that the need exists. "The earlier we can get some intervention in the form of alternative education, the better our chances of keeping (at-risk students) in the school system," he said.

But even if the response from area schools is positive, he said, an alternative middle school probably would be a couple of years away.

"Right now we have no funding and no facilities," he said, adding that detailed site plans would also be needed.

Dobbs said one possibility would be a new building for the alternative high school, which now meets in the First Presbyterian Church, and putting a middle school in the church.

About 100 students currently are enrolled in the alternative high school, Dobbs said, and 50 more are on a waiting list.

Dobbs added that he plans to visit Cedar Rapids, Iowa, to see what district is Project CDA, an alternative education program that puts high-schoolers and middle-schoolers in different parts of the same building.

Yeltsin bans germ warfare

MOSCOW — President Boris N. Yeltsin has signed a decree committing Russia to an international treaty banning germ warfare, his spokesman said Thursday.

Yeltsin also signed an agreement with Ukrainian President Leonid Kravchuk for resuming the transfer of Ukraine's tactical nuclear weapons to Russia for destruction, the ITAR-Tass news agency said.

Ukraine earlier this week had said it would resume transferring the arms after getting assurances it could monitor their destruction.

The United States, which has long claimed that the Soviet Union maintained a secret biological weapons program, had pressed Russia to meet a Wednesday deadline to reveal the scope and history of the program.

U.S. intelligence officials say they have discovered more than 20 sites in the former Soviet Union for germ-warfare research and production.

Doolittle's Raiders honor memories of comrades in reunion ceremonies

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Doolittle's Raiders — the men who conducted the first air raid on Japan during World War II — publicly toasted their comrades' memories Thursday, two days before the attack's 50th anniversary.

"To those who have gone," 32 of the 40 surviving raiders said in chorus as they held up silver goblets.

The toast was a partial enactment of a ceremony the raiders hold annually, but always in private.

During the full ceremony, to be held Friday, the names of the 40 who died during or after the April 18, 1942, raid on Tokyo will be called. Surviving crew leaders will answer "present" for them, and goblets are turned upside down in their honor.

That is always done in private because of its emotional nature, said retired Brig. Gen. Dick Knobloch, chairman of the raiders' board of directors.

"The sensitivity of the ceremony is very close to our hearts and passions and stuff," Knobloch said. "So when we do it for real,

we don't want the circus attending. You see, grown men cry."

Eight survivors are not attending this year's ceremony, including the raid's

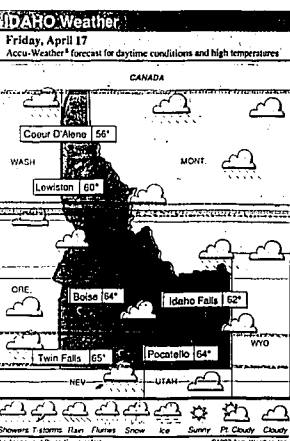
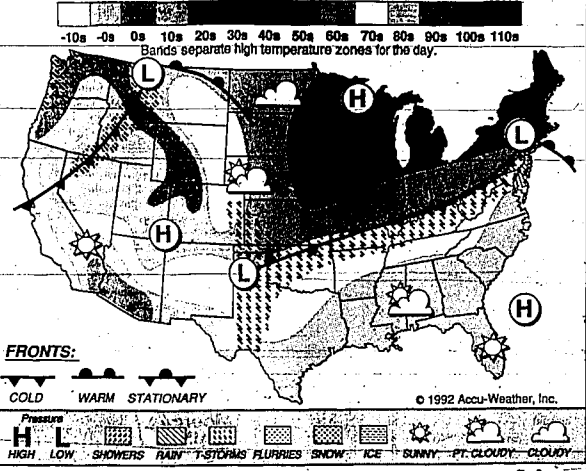

Weather summary

A strong cold front developing along the West Coast will move inland across Idaho today, the National Weather Service says.

Spring rain splashes across nation; snow for New York

Springtime rain splashed parts of the Pacific Northwest, Atlantic coast, Midwest and South on Thursday, and snow fell in upstate New York. More than a dozen mobile homes were damaged by high winds in suburban Detroit.

Thunderstorms were widely scattered from west-central Texas through northern Arkansas to Illinois. Showers and a few thunderstorms also extended from western Louisiana to northwestern Mississippi.

Residents of a mobile home park in Plymouth Township, Mich., said a funnel cloud caused several minor injuries and damaged more than a dozen homes. Weather forecasters said they didn't know if the storm was a tornado.

Showers were scattered from southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois to the Carolinas, the central Atlantic Coast region and New York state. Three inches of snow was reported near Booneville, N.Y.

Showers fell across parts of Washington, Oregon and northern California. Strong winds behind the cold front prompted high wind watches for Friday for eastern Washington state and northern Idaho. Rain also fell over eastern Colorado and southeastern Wyoming.

Brisk southerly winds ahead of a cold front prevailed from southern Texas to the Ohio Valley. Temperatures were in the upper 70s and lower 80s across much of the southeastern quarter of the nation by early afternoon. Strong northerly winds led cold air into the upper Midwest.

Libya blasts sanctions

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libya, showing no signs of backing down in the face of U.N. sanctions, on Thursday began ordering the expulsions of diplomats representing countries that supported the measures against it.

The sanctions, which took effect Wednesday, are meant to pressure Libya into turning over suspects in the 1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103.

Meanwhile, Arab nations, while largely complying with the sanctions, criticized the United States and its allies for lack of statesmanship.

The sanctions prohibit all flights to and from Libya, ban arms sales and call for the expulsion of most Libyan diplomats abroad.

The United Nations in New York, sources said Thursday that Egypt inquired whether it would be allowed to send a plane to pick up Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi and fly him to Egypt.

The purpose of such a trip was unknown, but it seemed likely Gadhafi wants to meet with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak, said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

In Cairo, a foreign ministry official denied the report.

The Libyan Foreign Ministry said at least "six" heads of embassies had been ordered to cut staff in retaliation for similar action by their governments.

The United States has no diplomatic relations with Tripoli. But as host of the United Nations, it was expelling three of the 12 diplomats at Libya's U.N. mission.

Italy said Thursday that six of its envoys had been ordered to leave Libya and Belgium, which looks after U.S. interests.

Republican Sen. Steve Symms. The report from the Ethics Committee covers 39 months through last Oct. 3.

The congressman, facing political newcomer to Idaho in the May primary, had originally acknowledged eight overdrifts last October when the House banking scandal began developing.

Following his review, the Ethics Committee found it had counted one check twice and agreed with Stallings that his \$1,309.92 home mortgage check on Jan. 4, 1991, was counted as an overdrift only because the bank credited Stallings' earlier deposit to cover that check to another account.

The total of Stallings' eight overdrifts was just under \$7,600, and he said in October that the problem resulted from checks being cleared at the end of the month when the automatic deposit of his pay check was not credited to the first of the month.

Craig acknowledged the existence of his overdrifts a month ago, saying they apparently occurred during a two-month period in late 1988. But he has provided no details on those checks.

Utah, was a lieutenant and navigator when he was captured by the Japanese. He was held prisoner for 42 months, and was the only one aboard his plane to survive.

"Don't ask why I've been the only living member of my crew for 50 years," Nielsen said tearfully. Every year he answers "present" for each of the four members of his crew who never made it back.

The ceremony was one of several events being held throughout Columbia this week to commemorate the anniversary. Doolittle, then a lieutenant colonel, met his pilot on the first time at what was the Columbia Army Air Base.

Doolittle and his men took off from the USS Hornet in 16 B-25 bombers, each with a crew of five. Their surprise raid over Tokyo was the first time Japan was hit after the attack on Pearl Harbor four months earlier.

Three of the 80 airmen died when their planes crash-landed. Eight were captured by the Japanese; of those, three were executed, one died in prison and four were released when the war ended. Thirty-three others have died since the raid.

The raiders have reunited nearly every year since 1945, in different places during the years. Next year's site has not been selected.

A bottle of vintage cognac follows the set of silver goblets to every reunion; waiting to be opened when the last two surviving raiders make the final toast.

C.V. Glines, an honorary raider who has written several books on the raid, said he thought Doolittle was the last to survive.

Doolittle's response: "I don't know, who do you think the other guy is going to be?" Glines said.

Groups challenge gag rule

WASHINGTON (AP) — Family planning organizations filed lawsuits Thursday to block the Bush administration from enforcing a new rule that allows doctors but not nurses to counsel women about abortion in federally financed clinics.

The lawsuits contend that the guidelines issued last month are invalid because they were not promulgated through formal rulemaking procedures under the Administrative Procedures Act.

The Bush administration issued the new guidelines last month to modify a broader "gag rule" that barred doctors as well as nurses in the clinics from giving abortion counseling.

The new rules said doctors could refer women patients to abortion clinics for medical but not social reasons.

In separate suits filed here and in Denver, Planned Parenthood and other organizations representing the 4,000 health clinics sought injunctions against enforcement of the new rules, which they charge were issued in violation of the law.

The rules were first promulgated by the Reagan administration but have never been enforced because of protracted litigation.

Cat Inc. to recall workers

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Caterpillar Inc. announced Thursday it will recall all 12,600 members of the United Auto Workers union who defied a company ultimatum to end a strike and return to work.

The company said it had determined it no longer needs 1,350 of its union workers, but that it will not follow through on its threat to trim the ranks of the group by up to 15 percent. Instead of recalling some of the workers workers now that the strike is over, Caterpillar will cut jobs through attrition and an early retirement offer, the company said.

"We are taking these actions out of genuine concern for the well-being of our employees and the company's long-term need to remain globally competitive," said Caterpillar Group President Jerry Flaherty in a news release.

UAW spokesman Jim O'Connor said the company had no choice and that the recall was a "classic case of giving us something that's already on the table."

The world's leading builder of earth-moving equipment said its relationship with the UAW and therefore will offer jobs to all strikers in good standing.

On Tuesday, at the end of two days of talks in the offices of federal mediators, officials announced UAW had agreed to end the strike without conditions and resume contract negotiations.

On April 1, Caterpillar had issued an ultimatum that strikers return to work starting April 6 or risk losing their jobs. It added that it had streamlined its operations during the strike, which started Nov. 3, and might eliminate up to 15 percent of union jobs.

Clinton fires jabs at Bush over economy

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Democrat Bill Clinton attacked President Bush's record on the economy Thursday as the worst in 50 years and said his own candidacy offers the best hope for a domestic revival.

Bush, also touching down in this potential battleground state in next fall's campaign, renewed his support for allowing Americans to borrow against future earnings to pay for college and job training.

Whether by coincidence or design, Bush and Clinton spoke just minutes apart in Philadelphia. Clinton's remarks were a direct challenge to Bush's unveiling a plan to aid the former Soviet republics just as the Arkansas governor was about to deliver a foreign policy address in New York.

Clinton, his voice clear and firm after almost a week's rest ordered by doctors, outlined the UAW economic package and his own economic plan.

"Our president does not have a strategy," Clinton said. "His strategy is doing nothing. The only time he changes is when the polls change or the pressures mount."

Clinton said Bush's "single driving strategy" has been low taxes on corporations and upper-income individuals and keeping government out of the way.

"George Bush's presidency has produced slower economic growth, slower job growth and slower income growth than any administration since the Great Depression — and the biggest deficits... of any administration in history," Clinton said.

"It is not a Republican or a Democratic issue," he said. "It's America against the rest of the world. Every other advanced nation is governed by a strategy for increasing growth."

FDA policy OKs implants only for women with breast cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many women who want to enlarge their breasts with silicone gel implants won't be able to get them, under a government policy announced Thursday that will allow implants for women with breast cancer.

The Food and Drug Administration's new policy will allow use of the implants only through controlled clinical studies designed to answer safety questions, including the health effects of implant leakage and rupture.

"The central aim of FDA's decision is to significantly limit the use of silicone gel breast implants while vigorously pursuing the necessary research about their safety," FDA Commissioner David Kessler told reporters.

He said he was "highly conscious" that some women who have lost a breast to cancer or traumatic injury or who have a breast deformity need implants. "This policy is meant to be compassionate toward these patients," he said.

But Kessler cautioned, "No one should think we're resuming business as usual."

Kessler's announcement lifts a moratorium on use of the implants in effect since Jan. 6. The new policy follows the recommendations of a panel of experts that concluded in February the implants should remain available to women with breast cancer and deformities. And, he said, the agency has taken steps to monitor the implants' continued use.

Dr. Norman Cole, head of the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons, welcomed the FDA's decision to allow use of the implants for women with breast cancer and deformities. And, he said, the agency has taken steps to monitor the implants' continued use.

"This is the first sign that science, logic and compassion are being reviewed in the review process for these devices," he said.

But he said that by restricting use

of the implants for women who want them for cosmetic reasons, "the government has placed itself in the role of judging the morality of a woman's reasons for choosing breast implants."

The moratorium will be lifted in three stages, Kessler said.

The first stage will go into effect next week and will make the implants available to women who need them the most — those whose reconstruction began before the moratorium with placement of a temporary tissue expander and who are awaiting a permanent implant, and women whose implants have ruptured.

The second stage will take several months to set up and will consist of clinical studies open to breast cancer patients and women who have had serious trauma to a breast or a disease or congenital disorder that causes breast abnormality.

The third stage will be more intensive research studies that will be open to a limited number of women, both those who want the implants for reconstruction and those who want them for cosmetic purposes.

Pentagon says Iraqi movement 'should cease'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The radar tracking of allied aircraft by Iraqi missile crews in southern Iraq is "provocative and should cease," the Pentagon's spokesman said on Thursday.

The Iraqi military has been told "in no uncertain terms" of the U.S. displeasure over the use of target acquisition radar at the missile sites, Pete Williams told reporters.

Pilots in allied aircraft are armed with defensive mechanisms that tell them they have been monitored — or "painted" — by such radars, or that a missile has been targeted in their direction.

Iraq's culture and information minister, Hamed Yussef Hammadi, said in a statement issued in the Iraqi capital that the missiles are intended only for self-defense and Iraq has "all rights" to use them.

Baghdad also hinted in an official statement that it would not move the anti-aircraft missiles, as demanded by the United States, France and Britain. The countries have warned that Iraq risks a military confrontation by keeping them there.

Perot drops H. from his name

DALLAS (AP) — Forget the "H" — he'd rather be known as just plain Ross Perot.

Aides to Henry Ross Perot say the Texas billionaire has grown accustomed to people referring to him as "H. Ross Perot," but prefers to skip the first initial.

Perot, who is thinking of waging an independent bid for the White House, grew up using his middle name, in person and on the telephone, he introduces himself as Ross.

He traces the "H. Ross" moniker to a 1968 Fortune magazine profile. The reporter learned his first name was Henry and abbreviated it.

Conversations with Perot would indicate he's more concerned about spelling. When calling reporters, he often begins, "This is Ross Perot, P-E-R-O-T."

Clinton said Bush has been taking credit for the economic gains of the past and from Clinton himself — including Thursday's remarks on education.

He said the president's advocacy of measures to help pay for education and job training has long represented a centerpiece of his own campaign and added that until now the administration has waged "an all-out assault on college aid to middle-class students."

"They say I'm slick?" he said, winning applause and laughs from the auditorium packed with students.

NATO head retires to teach at USMA

BRUSSELS, Belgium — U.S. Gen. John R. Galvin, who led NATO military forces during the tumultuous period when the alliance made friends with its Warsaw Pact foes, said Thursday he will retire in June.

Galvin, 62, said he will become a professor at the U.S. Military Academy at West-Point, N.Y., and will write books on security issues.

"I know myself and I think it is about the right time," he said after the North Atlantic Treaty Organization announced his departure as supreme allied commander in Europe.

He has held the post since June 1987. In stepping down, he will also relinquish his duties as chief-of-the-several-hundred-thousand-U.S. soldiers in Europe.

Taiwanese lawmakers, opponents fight

TAIPEI, Taiwan — Fistfights broke out Friday in parliament between lawmakers from the governing Nationalist Party and the opposition. Two deputies were injured, including one who was hit with a portable phone.

The melee started when deputies from the opposition Democratic Progressive Party accused the Nationalists of trying to block political reforms. The lawmakers pushed over the podium, stamped on chairs and shouted for direct presidential elections.

Nationalists then tackled their opponents, and the lawmakers rolled in the aisles, pummeling each other.

The parties have come to blows on several occasions.

Israel asks Egypt for citizen's release

JERUSALEM — Israel has appealed to Egypt to free by the start of Passover on Friday an Israeli businessman held on suspicion of spying for the Jewish state, the government said Thursday.

The appeal was contained in a message sent Sunday by Israeli Foreign Minister David Levy to his Egyptian counterpart, Amr Moussa, Foreign Ministry officials said.

Israel is seeking the release of David Ovitz, who has been held since January, the ministry said. Ovitz is one of four Israelis held by Egypt on suspicion of espionage.

Parliament votes Russia as new name

MOSCOW — The Russian parliament voted Thursday to change the name of the country from the Russian Federation to Russia, the third name change since August.

President Boris Yeltsin and some top aides had proposed retaining the name Russian Federation, as the country has been known since the Soviet collapse last year. Before then, the country had been called the Russian Soviet Federative Socialist Republic, one of 15 republics in the Soviet Union.

After 25 minutes of debate and a series of straw votes, the Congress of People's Deputies voted 871 to 30, with 30 abstentions, to amend the constitution to make the name Russia, "Rossiya" in Russian.

Japanese editor pays for harassment

TOKYO — A court on Thursday for the first time penalized a Japanese company for on-the-job sexual-harassment by one of its employees, a relatively new concept in male-dominated Japan.

In Thursday's ruling, a district court in Fukuoka in southern Japan said a 34-year-old woman had been harassed by her boss at Kyu Kikaku, a publishing company. She said the editor, Hidenori Hirotsu, 40, spread rumors the woman was having illicit affairs, depriving her of dignity and driving her to quit in 1988.

The court ordered the company and Hirotsu to pay 1.65 million yen, about \$13,000, in damages.

Leader asks U.S. to monitor unification

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea President Roh Tae-woo said Thursday that U.S. troops should remain in Korea even after the reunification of the North and South, which he hopes will come in this decade.

In an interview with The Associated Press, Roh said Communist North Korea seems unlikely to make new terrorist attacks against South Korean targets, and that he has "never considered" military force necessary to pressure the North to accept international nuclear inspections.

Roh's comments on U.S. forces sharply differed from the views of North Korea, which bitterly opposes the American presence in the South. Both Koreas are committed in principle to reunification, but have yet to decide how it might occur or whether U.S. troops would leave.

On Wednesday, North Korea leader Kim Il Sung declared that foreign "imperialists," a reference to the United States, were still scheming to dominate the Korean peninsula.

The United States has 39,000 troops in South Korea and plans to reduce the number to 36,000 this year. It has postponed further reductions until North Korea resolves nuclear weapons issues.

A senior official at North Korea's Ministry of Atomic Energy, Choe Jung Sung, told reporters this week that international inspection of North Korean nuclear facilities could start any time after the end of May.

The Communist North's long delay in accepting inspections has led to suspicions in the South that it was trying to buy time to complete development of nuclear weapons. Western intelligence reports have suggested that North Korea could be capable of producing nuclear arms by next year.

The North denies its nuclear program is aimed at making weapons.

"For the maintenance of peace in the Asian region, I believe the presence and role of the U.S. military is invaluable," Roh said, speaking through a translator in a spacious reception room of the Blue House, South Korea's presidential mansion.

Noting Korea's strategic position between Japan and mainland Asia — a location that has made Korea a victim of many foreign invasions — he said the long-term presence of

U.S. troops is "effective, logical and economical."

Asked if he expects North Korea to stage new attacks against South Korean targets, Roh expressed doubt, citing recently increased contacts between the two Koreas and the improving international climate.

North Korean agents-assassinated members of the South Korean Cabinet in Burma in 1983 and bombed a South Korean airliner in 1987.

"North Korea is still there, but I am quite certain North Korea could

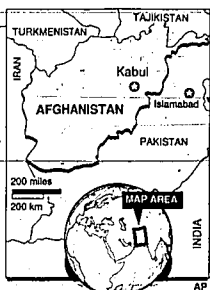

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP)—President Najibullah tried to flee the country early Thursday as rebels advanced toward the capital, but he was stopped and then stripped of power, a senior government official said.

His whereabouts were a mystery. There were unconfirmed reports that he had been arrested, and another that he had escaped the country.

It was not immediately clear who was running the government. It appeared some generals and at least one rebel leader might be in charge, but officials provided conflicting details on the size and composition of the leadership coalition.

The toppling of the Soviet-installed dictator had appeared increasingly likely in recent days. It also raised fears that Afghanistan could collapse in chaos and a bloodbath unprecedented in the 13-year-old civil war.

Pakistan, which has provided haven for Afghan rebels, called for an immediate cease-fire by the numerous and often antagonistic Muslim guerrilla groups. The United States, which once provided arms for the rebels, and U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali also urged restraint and said the rebels should work to implement a U.N. peace plan.

"Fighting is violence, fighting is death," State Department spokeswoman Margaret D. Tutwiler said in an impassioned call to avoid more bloodletting in a land that has seen war kill an estimated 2 million people.

But some rebel groups declared the U.N. plan dead, and one radical organization vowed to continue fighting the government—and rivals unless a strict Islamic fundamentalist government was installed.

If Najibullah's fall provokes fighting among the guerrilla factions, Iran could find an opening to try to spread its brand of fundamentalism in Afghanistan. A few of the smaller guerrilla groups have ties to Iran, but the largest factions do not.

Kabul, a city of 1.5 million people, was calm despite several days of rumors that Najibullah had fled or tried to flee. State-run Kabul Radio did not report the change in power until Thursday night.

Speaking to reporters, Foreign Minister Abdul Wakil said Najibullah tried to escape with a brother and a close aide but was stopped by rebel militiamen at Kabul's international airport about 2 a.m. Thursday.

Wakil, a former supporter of Najibullah, denounced the former president for cowardice. He said Najibullah feared "he would have to answer for some of his past deeds," referring to Najibullah's six-year reign as the head of the feared secret police known as KHAD.

Wakil said the current head of the secret police, Ghulam Farouq Yaqubi, killed himself Thursday after learning of Najibullah's escape attempt.

There were conflicting reports on Najibullah's whereabouts, but he would not comment directly, but he was being held by non-governmental forces. Russia's ITAR-Tass said he was arrested. Agence France Presse said the leader had successfully fled the country, but officials in nearby Pakistan and India said he had not gone there.

Members of the presidential guard prevented people from entering the U.N. compound in Kabul, leading to reports Najibullah was taken there. U.N. officials in New York said they could not confirm the reports.

The government's position has deteriorated severely since Najibullah promised last month to step down in favor of a neutral interim government that would rule until elections could be held under the U.N. peace plan.

Once loyal troops began defecting and low-level leaders began making secret deals with the guerrillas, that apparently emboldened seven allied rebel groups to launch the offensive that has overrun the government's biggest military base, two garrison towns and the supply road to the former Soviet Union.

Wakil said presidential power had been taken on by a group of 45 generals and 17 officers from "other armed forces."

Chernobyl workers lacked protection

KIEV, Ukraine (AP)—Tens of thousands of soldiers and workers ordered to clean up the 1986 Chernobyl nuclear accident had no protection against radiation, according to secret documents published Thursday.

The documents from the once-powerful Communist Party Politburo, then led by Mikhail S. Gorbachev, appeared in the daily newspaper Prava Ukrainy, or Ukrainian Truth. They indicate the Soviet leadership was well aware of the implications of the disaster, while publicly distorting the potential impact.

The April 26, 1986 explosion and fire at the Chernobyl nuclear power station was the world's worst nuclear accident.

Soviet authorities claimed only 31 or 32 people died as a direct result of the accident, although Western experts say 5,000 to 7,000 people have died from cancer and other radiation-related illnesses over the past six years.

Following the accident, about 300,000 people were contaminated by radiation and another 200,000 must receive medical attention every year. Nearly 200,000 people were evacuated from a 50,000-square-mile zone around the reactor.

Following the accident, about 229,000 people, including soldiers, workers and drivers, sent to clean up the area around the Chernobyl plant.

A memo by the science editor of Prava—a newspaper that was the former mouthpiece of the Communist Party—says totally unprotected soldiers were sent within 800 yards of the damaged reactor.

Army generals and other top officials also approached the reactor in regular uniforms with no special clothing or other protection against the effects of radiation, it said.

U.N. envoy attempts to negotiate peace deal in Bosnia

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP)—The Serb-led federal army reportedly crushed Muslim resistance in a key town in Bosnia-Herzegovina on Thursday, even as U.N. envoy Cyrus Vance sought to negotiate peace in the area.

Old feuding ethnic groups that peace "cannot be found at the end of the barrel" of a gun.

In Helsinki, Finland, the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe accused Serbia and the federal army of fomenting violence, and Germany threatened Serbia with serious steps "if it doesn't halt the bloodshed."

U.S. Secretary of State James Baker pressed support for a U.S.-backed proposal to send Serbia's membership in the security association if Serbia and the Serbian-dominated army do not follow recommendations of the United Nations, the European Community and the CSCE itself aimed at ending the violence.

Several hundred people have died in Bosnia since Muslims and Croats voted for independence on Feb. 29. They have clashed with Serbs, who oppose Bosnia's statehood.

The battles escalated after the United Nations Security Council imposed a last week, with the federal army increasingly supporting armed Serb irregulars.

After talks with Vance, Gen. Milutin Kukanjac, commander of federal troops in Bosnia, denied his army was the aggressor.

The army will not hurt a fly in Bosnia, but in case of attacks on its troops, the army will have to retaliate around," he told reporters.

In Belgrade, Gen. Blagoje Adzic, the head of the army, said after meeting with a Muslim Bosnian leader, Fikret Abdic, that a cease-fire had to come before any political solution in Bosnia.

In the latest fighting, the federal

army entered the predominantly Muslim town of Visegrad on Thursday, the Belgrade-based Tanjug news agency reported. It said the army marched from the neighboring Serbian town of Uzice and "took control of the whole area."

The army said it had captured several Serbs from Bosnia itself—have captured several predominantly Muslim towns near Bosnia's border with Serbia. They appear to be carving out a swath of Bosnian territory, as they did in Croatia, with the idea of linking up with Serbia, the largest of the six former Yugoslav republics.

Town out of immediate danger from Mount Etna

ZAFFERANA ETNEA, Sicily (AP)—The flow of lava from Mount Etna slowed to a crawl Thursday half a mile from this farming village, and a government minister pronounced the community out of immediate danger.

The lava has flowed over earthen barriers, and destroyed two small farmhouses and dozens of fruit trees since the volcano erupted in December. In the last 40 hours, however, it has advanced only yards.

"God and the Madonna were good to us. But we must also thank the volcanologists and the soldiers. They also helped a lot," said Mayor Alfio Leonardi.

He referred to continuing efforts to divert the lava away from the community of 7,000, which specializes in honey and fruit production.

Civil Defense Minister Nicola Capria said although the town was out of immediate danger, the state of emergency was not over.

On Thursday, Italian soldiers used about 350 pounds of explosives to blast tunnels into hardened lava 4,000 feet above ground in an effort to cause molten lava to surface, cool and solidify.

However, strong winds and a sudden snowfall delayed efforts by the U.S. military from pressing on with another plan to divert the lava from inhabited areas.

The soldiers plan to use helicopters to drop 50 connected cement blocks onto a metal slide on an upper slope of the volcano. If all goes according to plan, the slabs would form a lava barrier.

Hikes spark panic buying

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP)—Thousands of Bulgarians lined up to buy sugar, rice, flour and vegetable oil on Thursday after the government announced sweeping price hikes that take effect May 1.

Media reports said energy and heating prices will rise 35 percent, prices on many foods will jump by as much as 50 percent and the costs of services will increase by up to 30 percent.

The reports said President Filip Dimitrov's Cabinet had decided to liberalize most prices to meet conditions set by the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund for economic aid.

Allegations of magazine deal rattle Duke's pristine image

DURHAM — Duke's pristine image was called into question Thursday by a taped diary Christian Laetner kept for GQ magazine after the university determined the project wouldn't violate NCAA rules.

Laetner and the university said they "categorically deny" a newspaper article that said the three-time All-American signed a contract his senior year with GQ magazine.

"I have never signed any contract with GQ magazine," Laetner said in a statement issued by Duke. "The only agreement I made was to submit a diary to the magazine after my senior year for a possible fall issue. I am shocked and hurt by the allegations that the newspaper has written."

The Winston-Salem Journal reported that Laetner's agreement with GQ during the 1991-92 season may have been a violation of NCAA rules. Those rules say a student athlete's eligibility is jeopardized if he makes an agreement for professional services or promotes a product while still eligible.

The All-America center has used up his college eligibility. Any violation

could result in retroactive penalties and subject Duke to sanctions that range from a letter of reprimand to forfeiture of all games, including the NCAA championship, the second straight for the Blue Devils.

"We checked into all the rules," said Mike Cragg, Duke's sports information director, who said the checks found nothing wrong with the agreement between the magazine and the star center, the college basketball player of the year.

Coach Mike Krzyzewski, in Atlanta where Laetner was to accept the Naismith Award, said he would not comment beyond what was in the school's release.

The university's statement said Duke's NCAA contact Chris Kennedy contacted Atlantic Coast Conference compliance officer David Thompson and the NCAA for a ruling.

The statement said Duke "was given an interpretation which did not prohibit Laetner from preparing a diary for future post-eligibility publication."

Earlier, Cragg said he didn't know if the NCAA had been contacted. Kennedy told the newspaper he didn't check directly with the NCAA.

The NCAA wouldn't confirm or deny an investigation into the report. Duke officials said no rules were violated because Laetner didn't sign a contract.

"I think that we would look at the facts overall, but I don't think we would distinguish between an oral or written agreement," NCAA official Rick Evrard said. "An agreement is an agreement."

A spokeswoman for GQ said Thursday that Duke and GQ were careful to follow the rules.

"Our manager Eliot Kaplan went to great pains to work with Duke to make sure there were no violations ... and Duke got permission from the NCAA," GQ's Cathy O'Brien said.

Kaplan, now editor at Philadelphia Magazine, had a different version. He said Thursday he never discussed with Duke whether the agreement with Laetner might violate NCAA rules.

The Journal reported that Kaplan said Laetner signed a standard writing contract. Other magazine officials denied that. Kaplan said other magazine officials denied that because it was standard procedure to mail one to all writers.

Olympic schedule trips up runner

BARCELONA, Spain — With just 100 days left before the Olympics, world track officials and local Olympic organizers remain locked in a battle over a timetable that could keep Michael Johnson from his quest for two gold medals.

As the schedule stands now, the finals of both the 200 and 400 meters are set for the evening of Aug. 5. Johnson is the world's fastest man at both events.

The International Amateur Athletic Federation has tried for months to change that schedule to give Johnson a chance for two gold medals. Such a move would require organizers to move five finals.

But Barcelona organizers say it is too late, since tickets and programs already are printed. Though they privately acknowledge the IAAF probably will get its way in the end, they continue to publicly stick by the present schedule.

"We don't want to change this calendar which was discussed for two years," said Sixte Cambra, who will supervise track and field events at the Olympics. "We have a calendar published and we have sold tickets, and the program is approved by TV and the broadcasters. It is difficult for us to change it."

The IAAF Council decided in November to move five finals — the men's 200 meters and the women's 200 meters, 400 meters, 400-meter hurdles and 800 meters — and has renewed its call for such a move several times in the last few months.

An official at the IAAF headquarters in London said Thursday that the federation was sticking to its decision. Officials of the International Olympic Committee have indicated they would support the IAAF's position.

Such a change would push the men's 200-meter final back by a day to Aug. 6. IAAF President Primo Nebiolo has defended such a move to help Johnson, saying a similar change was made at the 1976 Montreal Olympics for Cuban Alberto Juantorena.

Idaho State lands prized Gem recruit

POCATELLO — Idaho State University head basketball coach Herb Williams announced Thursday that USA Today All-American prep player of the year Justin Jones of Malad signed a letter of intent to join the Bengals.

Jones led the Dragons to the Class A-3 state basketball title in April. He joins Chris Roberts, a 6-10 transfer from Hutchinson Junior College and early signee Tony Roberts, a 6-10 center from Murfreesboro, Tenn., to complete the Bengals' recruiting class.

For the past two seasons, Jones was voted the state's top A-3 player by coaches.

"One of the commitments we made was to try and find the best players in the state every year, recruit them, and convince them that Idaho State is the place to go in the state of Idaho," Williams said. "Signing Jim Potter (of Bishop Kelly) and Justin Jones is a very positive step in telling people in the state we want in-state players to help build our program."

In the 1991-92 season, Jones, 6-3, averaged 26.3 points, 10 rebounds and 8.1 assists per game. He shot 58 percent from the field, including 56 percent on 3-point attempts, and 91 percent at the free throw line.

He is also a 4.0 student and

Malad's student body president.

While playing for his father, Coach Terry Jones, Justin scored 1,975 points in four seasons. His career high was 40 points. Malad's record was 97-9.

"Justin will bring some things to the program we need from the good position," Williams said. "He's a versatile player who will blend in well with the players we have. He can shoot the three. It's another step in the program that we are building with young players and have them mature."

Roberts was the third-string center at Hutchinson, which reached No. 1 in the JUCO poll at Christmas, but lost in the regional championship game to Butler College, the eventual national runner-up.

The two centers at Hutch ahead of Roberts signed with Minnesota and Middle Tennessee State. Roberts played 14 games, averaging 2.1 points and 1.8 rebounds.

"We were looking for someone who runs the court well and can catch the ball, rebound and play good defense. Chris can do all those things," said ISC assistant coach Don Evans, who recruited Roberts, evaluating him "by watching him play." Chris gives us added size and depth we didn't have this year. He will take the pressure off the guys playing on the perimeter."

Celtics gain chunk of lead without Bird

BOSTON (AP) — In the last two weeks, Larry Bird hasn't played, and the Boston Celtics haven't lost. They've wiped out New York's five-game lead and surged to the brink of a division title.

There have been seven straight wins, some sparked by unlikely heroes John Bagley and Kevin Gamble. More predictably, Reggie Lewis has led the offense.

Bird has been sidelined for all seven games with recurring back problems, and Doc Brown has missed the last four "with the flu." It's not known when Bird will return.

"We know we can win without Larry," Lewis said. "It just takes everybody picking up their game another notch. And it can't be just one or two guys. It has to be everybody on the bench."

On April 3, the Knicks beat Atlanta by 21 points and the Celtics, in Bird's last game, lost to Indiana by four. That left New York on top of the Atlantic Division at 48-26 and Boston in second at 43-31. Each had eight games left.

Since then, the Celtics are 7-0 and New York is 2-5. They are tied for the division lead at 50-31, but Boston would win a tiebreaker because it won the season series against the Knicks, 3-2.

The Celtics, 14-1 in their last 15 games, can win the division if New York loses in Milwaukee on Saturday night or they beat Miami in Boston on Sunday.

The reward for the division champion? The earliest it could meet the NBA champion Chicago Bulls would be in the Eastern Conference final. The

runners-up could face the Bulls one round earlier.

"Our goal is to get into a good groove for the playoffs," Boston coach Chris Ford said. "We're in one now and we have to take care of business. We're very focused, and it's great for our confidence."

"Sunday is still an important game. We have to be businesslike."

The Celtics' success is all the more remarkable because of the series of injuries to key personnel.

Brown missed the first 45 games following knee surgery. Bird missed all 28 games in January and February because of his back. And Kevin McHale was sidelined for 26 of the first 60 games.

Robert Parish has been steady at center, and Ed Pinckney has taken up the slack along the frontline. "They've got Parish and McHale and Pinckney has become a monster of an offensive rebounder."

Detroit coach Chuck Daly said after Wednesday night's 92-89 loss to Boston. "They've got a great roster. They've done it all year. They've plugged whoever they have had to into it. They've got a lot of people who can play."

"Lewis is an unbelievable offensive player, almost unstoppable."

Lewis had only 13 points Wednesday night, but he and Pinckney teamed up for a big block as Joe Dumars drove for the potential tying basket in the final seconds.

Bagley, overweight in training camp and a longshot to make the team, led the way with 18 points, nine assists and seven rebounds.

"I've been trying to contribute enough to take the pressure off Reggie, McHale and Chief (Parish)," he said. "Now we have to stay focused on what we have to do and now that it is to win one more game."

If the Celtics finish second in the division, they will play Detroit in the first round. Wednesday's win assured Boston of homecourt advantage in that series.

If the Celtics win their division, the opponent would come from a group that includes Indiana, New Jersey and Atlanta.

"Our main concern right now is to get ready for the playoffs and get healthy. It's now back in our hands," Ford said. "I'm proud of these guys. They have overcome a lot of injuries."

"I think these guys have really handled this season as professionals," he added. "They'll all have come through for me at one time or another."

Health and Welfare panel report smacks of excuses

If you were looking for news, you didn't find it in an Idaho Department of Health and Welfare committee's report on the death of Amanda Hostetler and its handling of other child abuse cases.

Amanda, the 2-year-old Twin Falls girl who died of injuries in January after what police say was a severe beating or series of beatings, galvanized attention on child abuse.

It also prompted Region 4 Health and Welfare Director Steven Woodworth to appoint a committee, chaired by Jerome County Sheriff Larry Gold, to look into Health and Welfare's practices relating to child welfare.

The committee's report concluded, among other things:

- Health and Welfare caseworkers are overworked and spread too thin.
- Communication between caseworkers on the one hand and police and prosecutors on the other is spotty.
- Follow-up on child abuse complaints is limited by manpower constraints.

So tell us something we don't already know.

The Amanda case gave Health and Welfare a powerful argument for the resources it says it needs, but the Gold committee report isn't it.

Instead, the report's "ain't it awful" and "we all need do better" tone smacks of excuses.

When the lives of kids are at stake, no excuses are acceptable.

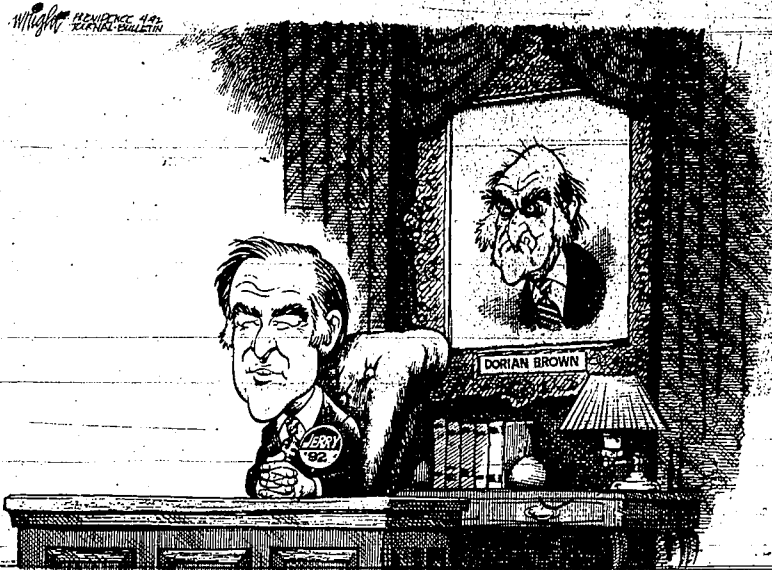
"I did not see any glaring breaches of policies and procedures" in Amanda's case or any others the committee looked at, Gold said.

Swell. Health and Welfare followed its own rules, and a child is dead. What happens when someone really goes off?

Three weeks ago in this column we called for an independent review of the case, and the Gold committee's report only reinforces the need for that.

Gov. Cecil Andrus, the ultimate boss of Health and Welfare, said Wednesday he's not satisfied that state law and Health and Welfare regulations are strong enough to provide the protection a child is entitled to.

Now let's see what he does about it.



10 reasons why Clinton has 50-50 chance

"A 50-state landslide," "Worst fiasco since George McGovern." They'll beat on him like a drum. "Unelectable."

These are just quotes, you'll hear them. Democrats who mourn Bill Clinton's chances - slim and none - against George Bush.

Don't tell me an incumbent president who's been losing one-third of the Republican vote to a talk-show gabber is King Kong. Or a president with a 49-41 lead (CNN) over a scandal-battered challenger is invincible.

No prediction. But 10 reasons why Clinton has at least a 50-50 chance against Bush:

1. "Are You Better Off Than You Were Four Years Ago?" Ronald Reagan's devastating 1980 question will haunt Bush. So will Bush's promise of 30 million new jobs. The economy may be trending upward. But

fade. With voters' anxiety concentrated at home, Bush won't be as convincing in his economic promises.

2. "Throw the Bums Out" Syndrome. Anger toward Washington blows like a sirocco through every primary. Bush shakes his fist at Congress's gridlock and check-bouncing. But White House passivity and perks are equal targets. Bush, Washington insider for 23 years, could get swept in the bums' rush.
3. "Time for a Change" Rebellion. Most dangerous poll number for an incumbent President is the 75 percent who worry that "America's on the wrong track." It's amusing to hear Bush use the word "change" 25 times in one speech, as if he had "invented" the White House 12 years. How can Bush hype himself as a reformer with fresh ideas?
4. The Two-Way Mud-Slinging Contest. Sure, Bush brags he'd told his campaign, "Stay out of the sleaze business." He must be kidding. Republicans have piles of glop to throw at Clinton. But Bush's family and associates are open to scrutiny, including the S&L shadow over Neil Bush and business deals by Bush's brothers. Top Bush campaign aides - as Buchanan roared in TV ads - are lobbyists connected to Japan, Detroit automakers and the dreaded BCCI. In what Kevin Phillips calls the "mother of all dirty campaigns," Bush won't go unmentioned.
5. "The Russians Aren't Coming." The Cold War's end defangs the Red Scare weapon Republicans brandished for 40 years. Bush's Desert Storm triumph

6. Young Turks vs. Old Warhorses. Clinton's campaign staff is smart, flexible, tested in a New Hampshire-to-New York madhouse. Bush will miss '88 gunslingers Roger Ailes and Lee Atwater. His campaign is run by pollster Bob Teeter, who helped Dick Thornburgh blow a 40-point lead in Pennsylvania. Edger, Clinton.

7. Playing the Race Card. Republicans since Nixon won elections with racial code words and Willie Horton-type ads. Many not be as simple as Clinton, a Southerner who emphasizes racial healing. Subtracting Jesse Jackson from the 1992 equation helps Demos.
8. "What Do Women Want?" Sigmund Freud's question may be '92 key. Bush's anti-abortion stance and Clinton's pro-abortion-rights position could energize the women's vote if the Supreme Court undermines the abortion battle.
9. The Rose Perot Wild Card. At the least, Perot may knock Texas from Bush's sure-win column. If Clinton wins 10 states Mike Dukakis took in 1988, plus the dozen Dukakis lost by under 10 points, Bush may plan a long fishing trip.
10. Personal Character vs. Political Character. The biggie. So Clinton's "integrity" is doubted? Bush is shaky for flipflops, lack of conviction, failed vision. Whose baggage is heavier? He helped them to find their strength; to find out who they are and what they can do. He loves this earth and is a conscientious and responsible person.

For the past several years, Rick has been dedicated to stopping the insanity of the nuclear weapons complex. Bill and I had told him of our Holy Week trips to the Nevada Test Site, about the peaceful, prayerful demonstrations and our subsequent arrests.

Rick later founded the 100th Monkey organization. The 100th Monkey principle is basically that if enough people (or monkeys) believe and make a stand, then at some point there will be a dramatic, widespread change... a kind of simultaneous chain reaction of thought.

He has spent a great deal of time planning the events that have happened in Nevada this week, even though we hear little about them. He has faced many frustrations, including the government's efforts to thwart their plans.

I do not advocate violence and neither does Rick Springer. I know from experience that it is not easy to spend years so impassioned by one's

beliefs. Christ, too, lost his patience and threw the money changers out of the temple. Just as Christ does not preach violence, neither does Rick.

I believe that Rick had something to tell us. I wish we could have heard what it was. I believe that Rick wanted to tell us to stop this destructive madness. I have prayed at the Nevada Test Site for the same reason. I have participated in the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday on a hot, lonely, desert road leading to the site along with prayerful people of all religions, races and ages. I have been arrested and I have attended Easter services at sunrise out there in that desert. We all hoped with all our hearts that the madness would stop.

Unfortunately, we were unable to join Rick and the others this year, but I am thinking about Rick and all those who have given up their freedom or their lives for what they believe is right and to send you a message. It is the same as Christ's message... there is another way. I look for hope this Easter. It is hard to find, but Rick has made it a little easier for me. My hope is that together we can make a difference.

U.S. needs to show it's serious about arms control

Even with the demise of the Soviet Union, the United States Department of Energy has continued its planning for a new nuclear

weapons complex for the 21st Century.

The time for a comprehensive study of all long-range weapon options is long overdue. Environmental cleanup, weapons dismantlement and proliferation control seem to have taken a back seat to continued nuclear weapons production.

Significant change seems to be hampered by bureaucratic inertia and corporate greed by the DOE's contractors.

Citizens must pressure Congress now to cut the weapons complex budget to reflect current changes in the present world.

Six of us from the Wood River Valley, including myself, are lobbying to Washington, D.C., to lobby members of Congress the last week of April. Letters from other concerned citizens can help us break the cycle and put our tax dollars to better use as we struggle to save our planet from continued environmental destruction.

There are some excellent bills in congress now that need our support. The Nuclear Testing Moratorium Act (HR-3636, Gephardt, Missouri) currently has 211 co-sponsors, including Stallings and LaRocco. It says we will not test a nuclear weapon for a period of one year unless the former Soviet Union or its successor states continue to test. The former Soviets already have discontinued testing, mainly because its citizens said no more.

The United States of America is the only country in the world that continues testing at this point. The latest test on March 26 was necessary, according to the

Department of Defense, for the purpose of "ensuring confidence in the stockpile." That's hardly a justifiable reason.

Our commitment to end testing would be understood around the world if the United States is serious about arms control and nuclear weapons reductions.

Also, the DOE Defense Nuclear Work Force Restructuring Plan (Senate-2056, Wirth, Colorado) would provide retraining, educational, relocation, economic and medical assistance to workers and communities affected by the shutting down of nuclear weapons facilities.

Two excellent bills, with letters and personal lobbying, can make the difference and provide for a sane future for the world.

Authorities evacuated a few homes downwind from the leak and diverted traffic while Intermountain Gas workers repaired the damage, Tucker said.

Utility workers also were called to locate buried high-tension lines in the area, but repair workers were able to fix the gas leak without turning off the electricity, he said.

Cederstrom likely will be billed by the gas company for the two-hour repair job, Tucker said.

Blaine County residents OK new school trustee boundaries

HAILEY - New school board trustee county boundaries were overwhelmingly approved Wednesday as 200 Blaine County residents went to the polls to vote.

Only eight votes were cast against the new zones.

District Superintendent Phil Homer attributed the large turnout to voter awareness. "We tried to advertise and tell people we needed their support," he said. "It's a step in the right direction."

The re-zoning of trustee districts was done due to shifts in population, Homer says he feels positive about two remaining elections the district will face this spring.

The next is April 28 when voters will be asked to "approve" a \$2.6 million supplemental tax override. Board of trustee members will be elected on May 19.

Building permits hit all-time high in Jerome County

JEROME - Issuing building permits for Jerome County has hit an all-time high.

Six applications for building permits have been submitted to the county Planning and Zoning Commission this week. Since January, 23 permits have been issued with 30 applications awaiting approval, according to commission records.

A total of 53 permits for the three and one-half month period since January 1, 1992 compares with 80 issued in 12 months last year and 77 issued in 1990. About a 45 percent increase is anticipated for the year, according to the county records.

Commission administrator Glenn Elwell attributed the increase to a lot of younger families building homes in town and low interest rates. "Besides, Jerome's a nice place to live," he said.

Lawyer questions landfill plan process

TWIN FALLS - Former Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones has taken up the fight of Hansen-area residents who oppose plans for a landfill on Hansen Butte.

"There are just a lot of unanswered questions," Jones said Thursday.

The Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission issued a conditional-use permit for the landfill on April 7.

But Jones questioned whether the counties seeking the permit followed

county rules in submitting the application. Information that should have been available to affected property owners and other citizens was not made available before the public hearing, he said.

"The basic consideration of due process is to let people know," Jones, who practices in Boise and Twin Falls, represents a group of Hansen-area landowners who oppose the landfill site.

County rules require that all plans and specifications of the proposed facility be submitted with the conditional-use application, Jones said.

"It does not appear that was done." No set transportation route for garbage trucks was drawn up, and the site's legal description on the application was inaccurate, Jones said.

"If you don't know what the transportation route is going to be, how can you make an informed decision?"

Jones also questioned whether the landfill would affect farming operations within the 2,300 acres that the six-counties want to buy. The counties - Twin Falls,

Say it, read it

JEROME - Big Bird has captured the attention of children for many years. Now Big Book takes center stage amid the applause of children and educators.

"Big Book is coming!" and "I can read Big Book" are comments from students at Washington Elementary School in Jerome, as teachers employ a new theory of making learning to read a "whole-living" adventure.

"A child learns to talk by hearing words, sentences and conversation every day. Why not use the same principle with reading?" is the foundation behind the Early Literacy In-service Course, or ELIC, training, Principal Ann Reynolds said. The concept teaches that, "If you can say it, you can read it and write it."

Students read from a "Big Book" that the entire class can see.

"Children tend to watch a lot of TV that is a passive pastime," Reynolds said. "They don't play, games, don't read, don't do things together. They don't have to interact with each other," she said. ELIC and Big Book are helping to fill that gap, she said.

The ELIC method "does a lot of predicting what words will be and attaching meaning to those words," Reynolds said.

Washington is the only Idaho school whose entire staff is being trained in ELIC, funded through the state Education Department. In-service training is given state early-literacy consultants, files to Jerome every Thursday to train the school's staff.

The Jerome district plans to send a teacher to Iowa State University this summer to learn how to train other staff members.

Movie quotations may have tainted verdict against vet, lawyer charges

TWIN FALLS - With a little help from movie star Harrison Ford, the attorney for Twin Falls veterinarian David J. Stafford is trying to get a felony conviction against his client thrown out.

One of the jurors who convicted Stafford in March of defrauding a client admitted in court Thursday that she bought copies of a quotation from the movie "Presumed Innocent" into the jury room during the trial.

Cheryl Rossler said she brought the brightly colored slips of paper as a "conversation piece."

Defense attorney M. Lynn Dunlap has asked that Stafford be given a new trial, saying that the quotations may have tainted the jury's verdict.

But special prosecutor Michael Henderson of the Idaho attorney general's office said

the quotations don't carry any more weight than a conversation among jurors about a book they read recently.

Fifth District Magistrate John P. Varin said he will make a written decision on the request.

The movie centers on a deputy prosecuting attorney, played by Ford, who is wrongly accused of killing an assistant public defender.

In the movie, Ford says, "I am a prosecutor. I'm part of the business of accusing, judging and punishing. I explore the evidence of a crime and determine who is charged, who is brought to this room to be tried before his peers."

"I present my evidence to the jury and they deliberate upon it. They must determine what really happened. If they cannot, we will not know if the accused deserves to be freed or to be punished. If they cannot find the truth, what is our hope of justice?" Those

lines are "a drastic misstatement of the law," Dunlap said.

Since the case was so closely contested, Dunlap said any influence, no matter how slight, could have swayed the jury.

The 12-member panel determined that Stafford had wrongly charged a dog owner for a surgery that Stafford did not perform.

"There is no evidence that jurors used the lines from the movie in their deliberations, Henderson said. "The idea that the jury is silly enough to rely on these slips of paper and disregard the court's instructions is far-fetched," he said.

If the verdict is allowed to stand, Stafford will be sentenced April 24 for grand theft by deception. The state Veterinary Medical Examiners also has been looking into Stafford's conduct.

Dunlap said Stafford will voluntarily surrender his vet's license but will have the right to reapply for that license at any time.

Blaine officials reject smaller units

HAILEY - The Blaine County Commissioners overruled the county's planning and zoning administrator this week, forcing costly changes in the plat for the proposed River Sage Subdivision along East Park Road.

Although the planning administrator, Ralph Ciseo, had ruled that the property was zoned R-1 (allowing one-acre lots or larger), close inspection of the county's zoning map revealed that approximately one-third of the land just east of the Big Wood River was zoned R-2 (two-acre minimum).

Bob Dreyer, owner of the property,

complained that he purchased the land and invested in plans for the subdivision with the understanding that it was all zoned R-1.

"I never thought any part of that property was R-2, ever," he told the commissioners. "As a landowner, you shouldn't have to go all the way through the subdivision process before you can find out what the zoning is."

Jerome County workers begin to pocket back pay

JEROME - Jerome County employees will soon receive paychecks for working without pay during the past two years - getting lump sums ranging from \$130 to nearly \$3,000.

A total of 20,832 will be dished out at the end of the month to 20 county employees who had not been paid properly. The employees didn't get paid for hours

worked in excess of a normal 160-day work month. Nineteen of the employees worked in the sheriff's department, and one was employed in the County Extension office.

"We're using the current expense fund to pay for the hours; if that runs short we'll have to borrow. And I think we will run short," said Jerome County Commission Chairman Carl Montgomery.

An investigation by the U.S. Department of Labor uncovered the unpaid wages. A similar investigation by an auditor hired by

the Jerome County Commissioners confirmed the findings.

The investigators had recommended that the county use a different form for reporting hours worked by employees, especially for the sheriff's department where employees work on a 28-day work month.

The new form is being prepared by the auditor, and it should be available for use by the end of April, Commissioner Veronica Lierman said.

"We're keeping overtime as low as

possible and giving time off instead of paying overtime," said Undersecretary Mito Alonzo.

Other county employees work 37 and one-half hours a week but are paid for 40 hours.

"We're working on revising the hours, but will probably end up keeping them the same as they have been," Lierman said.

An hourly rate will be established for use when an employee does work overtime, she said.

Former valley man murdered in Seattle

TWIN FALLS — A former Twin Falls man was shot to death in a Seattle-area restaurant Tuesday in front of 50 witnesses, and his killer remained at large Thursday. David Lawrence Tippett, 46, was shot to death by a man who had just asked for a job at Tippett's shipyard. After a career on the seas fishing, Tippett had opened a shipyard where marine and fishing boats were overhauled. According to stories in Seattle newspapers, Tippett was eating at Fremont Dock Restaurant, near his shipyard, when a man approached him. Calling Tippett by name, the man asked if any jobs were open at his shipyard. Tippett said he had no openings, but told the stranger to go ahead and apply. The man left, but he returned a few moments later and shot Tippett twice with a handgun. The man

left the restaurant, and although a few patrons followed, he disappeared before police arrived. Tippett grew up on a family farm in the Magic Valley. He is the son of real estate agent L.S. "Tip" Tippett and Verna LaCroix Tippett. He attended the University of Idaho and Idaho State University, during six months of active duty in the Army Reserves, he met an Alaskan fisherman and moved to Kodiak, Alaska, where he fished and operated crab boats until the early 1980s. During off seasons, Tippett would repair fishing boats, operating out of the back of his pickup. In 1987 he leased dock space on Lake Union, in Seattle, and established Tippett Marine Service. He married Mary Petach in 1987, and last August had a son, Bryce David Tippett. The funeral will be held Saturday in Seattle.

Gooding schools expect funding shortage

GOODING — Early estimates for the 1992-93 school year show a \$100,000 drop in Gooding School District revenue. Superintendent James Cobble told School Board members Tuesday that he expects a drop in federal funding of about \$20,000, a drop in state funding of more than \$30,000, a drop in local funding of at least \$30,000, and decreased interest revenue of \$20,000. "There are no bright lights in here," he told the board. "But we're not alone in this dilemma. It's common all over the state." To compound the situation, Cobble said, the district faces increased costs for transportation, health care benefits and salary schedule raises. "So we're going to have less revenue and greater expenditures unless we can analyze a way to make significant cuts," Cobble said. The obvious cuts, he predicted, will be made in purchase of equipment, supplies and anything else the school can get along without. More drastic measures, he said, might involve cuts in staff or school programs.

Youth center board takes another stab at facility

JEROME — The Snake River Youth Center Board held off on disbanding the five-county cooperative effort to build a juvenile detention center because of a new offer to buy the beleaguered Addison Avenue property. After an executive session the board told Jerome County Commissioner Veronica Lierman to make a counter offer on the bid to buy the property. The board did not disclose the potential buyer or the amount of the offer. The board had previously purchased the Addison Avenue site only to learn later that it was not zoned properly for a juvenile detention center. Since that time, the Youth Center has been troubled with lack of funds and talk by some counties of pulling out and leaving Twin Falls to run a detention center itself. At its Thursday meeting in Jerome, the board also rejected another earlier offer by Byrd Golay, who wished to purchase the Addison Avenue property in exchange for a parcel of land he owned. Golay offered to build the center for the group. The board decided that since any purchase and construction contract would have to go out for bids, the

swap with Golay would not be possible. Meanwhile, former Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williams stepped down as a voting member of the board saying he wished to serve only as an adviser. The board decided to hold a meeting May 15 with county commissioners to review the counter proposal for the Addison property. "If the Joint Board can't come up with something firm, Twin Falls wants to move ahead," Lierman said. "We're looking at financing an 18-bed facility." Lombard-Conrad Architects estimated the cost of a 12-bed facility at \$1.2 million. But Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn said that size center was not adequate. If the board decides to build a 12-bed center, Twin Falls would add an additional six beds for exclusive use by Twin Falls, Munn said. Kurt Friedlander, administrative director of the Youth Services Center in St. Anthony, said it would be cheaper for some counties to pull out and let Twin Falls build the facility. The smaller counties would do better to pay for upkeep of their juveniles on a per night basis, he said. County commissioners will decide whether to disband and give the project to Twin Falls or commit to the project at its May meeting.

DOE signs pact to improve INEL waste handling

POCATELLO (AP) — The Energy Department has agreed to improve the handling and storage of chemical and radioactive wastes at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The agreement signed with state and federal health officials requires the department to correct 28 violations of state hazardous waste laws at the eastern Idaho facility. The major ones involve the container storage of waste. The department has agreed to build another layer of concrete and stainless steel containment structures to bolster protection against leaks

where 11 vaults hold radioactive liquid wastes. Those vaults are located at the INEL's fuel reprocessing site, where enriched uranium is extracted from spent reactor fuel. The government had already planned to replace the vaults as the liquid is pumped out and transformed into a powder. But the entire overhaul plan is contingent on whether Energy Secretary James Watkins decides to shut down the reprocessing plant because of a "significant" enriched uranium. Depending on that decision, INEL spokesman Brad Bugger said the tanks could be upgraded or replaced to meet state standards or they could be completely removed once they are emptied. "We will meet the deadline in some fashion," Bugger said. "But we just

don't know which of these options we'll follow right now." The agreement requires the government to build four new storage houses — 35,000 barrels of mixed hazardous and radioactive wastes can be restacked to make them easier to inspect for leaks, corrosion and proper labeling. Currently those barrels are now on pallets five tiers high on a concrete pad about the size of a football field.

U of I College of Agriculture-dean plans to step down next year

MOSCOW (AP) - The dean of the University of Idaho's College of Agriculture has announced he will resign next year.

Larry Branen said Wednesday that 10 years as an administrator will be enough, and that he was concerned teaching, service, extension and applied research no longer are a "central theme" at the College of Agriculture.

Branen said his brief stints as vice provost for extended university services and interim director of the Idaho Research Foundation in

the past year were a big influence in his decision to resign as dean.

He said he was concerned about how higher education is viewed in Idaho and the lack of focus at the university, although not specifically concerned with President Elisabeth Zinser.

Agriculture extension now is a priority primarily for the College of Agriculture alone, rather than the entire university, Branen said, and there now is more support for basic agricultural research than for research directly applicable to the agriculture and food industries.

Zinser said Wednesday that there is no question the College of Agriculture plays a central role in Idaho's land-grant, research institution.

She said Branen has helped the school look at "fresh ways" to use the agricultural research and extension system throughout Idaho by delivering courses in the arts, business, English and engineering, and how to apply it in new and evolving fields such as biotechnology.

"I wouldn't call that a lack of focus or a lack of interest in that agricultural system," Zinser said.

Branen said another disappointment was the university's tenure and promotion committees and central administrators turning down or delaying eight faculty members he recommended for tenure or promotions this spring.

His resignation is effective in July 1993. He then will resume full-time teaching and research duties at the Moscow school.

Zinser said Branen decided to resign before tenure and promotion recommendations were considered. She said reviews for tenure and promotion have become more rigorous at all levels of the university in the past year.

"There is no rubber stamping going on," she said.

"I am a team player and that's one of the reasons I think I better change (jobs)," he said. "I'm concerned where the university is headed. We need to have some focus. I don't think we have a grasp of what we are going to accomplish."

Judge delays sheriff's racketeering trial

BOISE - U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge has delayed the federal racketeering trial of Shoshone County Sheriff Frank Cmkovich until mid-September so his attorney can adequately prepare the defense.

Defense Attorney Sam Eismann complained that both the FBI and the Justice Department have been slow to provide details of the charges and evidence against Cmkovich.

Newly Nancy, one of the two federal prosecutors on the case, declined to comment on Eismann's charges.

Cmkovich was scheduled to go on trial April 22 on charges of accepting bribes to shield an illegal gambling ring from outside law enforcement. But Lodge rescheduled the trial to Sept. 14. If convicted, the veteran sheriff would face 10 years in prison.

Weekly paper starts up in Silver Valley

KELLOGG - The former publishers of the Kellogg Evening News have launched a new weekly newspaper for Idaho's Silver Valley.

The first edition of The Valley Sun was mailed this week to 6,400 Panhandle residents.

The paper is being published by Gary and Cricket Corbell, who sold the Kellogg Evening News in 1985 to the owners of the North Idaho Press and agreed to stay out of the newspaper business in the region for the next five years.

Corbell said the new newspaper is designed to serve the needs of local readers and advertisers from the Shoshone-News-Press. He admitted the economy will still not support two dailies.

2nd cougar dies at Pocatello zoo

POC. - ELLO - The second of two cougars found at the Pocatello zoo last weekend has died.

Officials said the six-month-old male died late Wednesday at a local animal hospital. The female, also about six months old, died earlier this week.

The pair was found in a cave last Sunday within 50 feet of the zoo's cougars. Zoo Supervisor Ray England said they were probably looking for their mother to bring them food.

"They would have died in that tree," he said, because they had not yet been taught to hunt. Both were dehydrated and weighed only about half as much as they should have, he said.

Boise woman may face fraud charges

BOISE - California wants a Boise woman to face welfare fraud, perjury and forgery charges there if first-degree murder charges against her in Idaho are dropped.

At a magistrate court hearing Wednesday in Boise, authorities served Robin Lee Row, 34, with a "governor's warrant" signed by California Gov. Pete Wilson and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Mrs. Row faces an April 22 arraignment in 4th District Court on three counts of first-degree murder for allegedly starting the Feb. 10 duplex fire that killed her husband and two children.

But if she is ever released from the Idaho charges, she must return to California to face charges there under the governor's warrant.

Kootenai United Way to withhold dues

COEUR D'ALENE - The Kootenai County United Way chapter will withhold its annual dues from the charitable organization's national office, which has been accused of mismanagement.

The board of directors of United Way of Kootenai County on Wednesday agreed that it would not send \$3,700 in annual dues and won't pay 1993 dues unless United Way of America reorganizes.

Pledge to name woman justice irks some

Gov. Cecil Andrus' public commitment to name the state's first female Supreme Court justice if he has a chance has raised the ire of some in Idaho's legal community.

"I'm interested, but the governor told me I'm the wrong sex," said Lloyd Webb, 60, a Twin Falls attorney who applied for a seat on the high court in both 1987 and 1989.

"I think I will probably apply," Webb said, "but if he is true to his word, I think it's kind of futile; I think it's kind of reverse discrimination."

The state Judicial Council has set May 27 as the deadline for filing applications for the vacancy created earlier this month when Justice Larry Boyle resigned to become a federal magistrate.

The applicants will then be subjected to an evaluation by lawyers throughout the state, and the council will hold its formal interviews with

the candidates in July or August.

Based on that process, the council will send Andrus a slate of two to four nominees - from which the governor will pick Boyle's successor.

Andrus said last week that if a woman is among those nominees she will get the appointment since anyone nominated by the council is presumed to be qualified.

Currently there is one woman on the Court of Appeals and two on the District Court bench. Eight women are serving as magistrates.

State Sen. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, who has applied for the court in the past and may apply again this time, backed the governor's stand.

"I know there's been a real feeling by a lot of the women in the state that there's something lacking on the Supreme Court without any input at all by a woman," McDermott said.

But some members of the Judicial Council conceded that the governor's position could limit the number of qualified men who apply.

In fact, council member Nick Ifrit of Pocatello said, "My initial comment is no men need apply. Gender has never made any difference to me, but it seems to me it just ties the council's hands."

Mike McNichols, a council member from Lewiston, maintained Andrus' statement would not affect his deliberations.

"I don't have any problem with the governor saying that," McNichols said. "I think we'll just try to send the names of the most qualified people, regardless of their sex."

Phone conversations detail alleged robbery

BOISE (AP) - Federal prosecutors on Thursday played taped telephone calls planning an alleged drug robbery which resulted in the arrest of Idaho County Sheriff Randy Baldwin.

After conversations monitored by federal agents were played for the jury of nine women and three men in Boise, Assistant U.S. Attorney Kim Lindquist planned to air a videotape of the arrests of Baldwin and Monte Duane Jack in the Nampa "sting" operation.

Baldwin and Jack are accused of conspiring to break into a Nampa home and steal cocaine and cash from a drug dealer. Authorities say they did not suspect Baldwin was involved until shortly before the arrests.

Lindquist on Thursday morning played three Drug Enforcement Administration tapes between Jack, 45, and drug informant Dean Lady of Boise on Dec. 19, the day before the early-morning bust.

As part of a deal to get out from under a \$2,000 debt he owed Jack, Lady said he provided a Nampa address supposedly where the alleged drug dealer, identified by Lady and

Northwest prepares for what might be disastrous fire season

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Smoke-jumpers, "hotshot" crews and aerial tankers are being deployed to be ready for a forest-fire season that some fear could rival the year Yellowstone burned.

Parts of nine states in the West and Northwest have drought conditions, increasing the danger, said Arnold Hartigan of the Boise Interagency Fire Center in Idaho.

In Montana, the state Drought Advisory Council was told this week that the mountain snowpack is a third gone — four weeks ahead of schedule.

This year's precipitation stands at 73 percent of normal, down from 85 percent two months ago.

The National Weather Service's Charlotte Camp told the council precipitation is expected to be only half of normal through midsummer and temperatures above normal.

"We expect no relief," she said.

"We're looking for the heat to come in and stay," Rick Ochoa, a weather forecaster with the Boise fire center, said the situation in Oregon is of particular concern. Winter precipitation was only 23 percent of normal, and snowpack in one area is only 4 percent of normal.

Neal Hitchcock, fire coordination center manager in Missoula for the U.S. Forest Service's Northern Region, covering Montana and northern Idaho, said conditions are similar to 1988.

That year, wildfires blackened 6 million acres in the Northwest and West, including 1.4 million acres in and around Yellowstone National Park.

Hitchcock and others attribute the warm, dry weather to El Nino, a weather phenomenon off the west coast of South America where warming ocean water influences upper atmosphere wind. The result is abnormal weather patterns over North America.

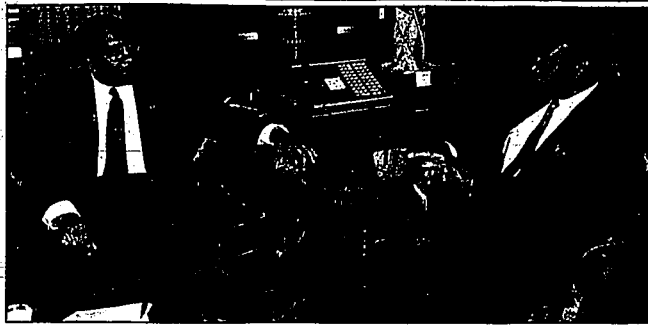
Twenty-five additional smoke-jumpers are being trained at the Missoula base, bringing the total assigned there to 85.

Others are being assigned to bases in Idaho, Oregon and Northern California, Hitchcock said.

An additional air tanker will be deployed at West-Yellowstone, Mont., and helicopters and crews are being dispatched to Dillon, Mont., and Grangeville, Idaho.

Five 20-member "hotshot" teams, the firefighter version of police SWAT teams, are being activated May 1, six weeks early, in northern Idaho and western Montana.

The Montana Department of State has begun organizing state prison inmates as a standby fire crew, and state officials plan to meet in early May with the National Guard to coordinate possible use of guardsmen.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Philadelphia Police Commissioner Willie L. Williams, taking over a Los Angeles Police Department wracked by allegations of racism and brutality, said Thursday he will work to restore confidence and morale.

"I fully understand and realize the concerns, the worries, the needs and, most importantly, the love and affection that each and every one of you has for this city and this outstanding police department," Williams told a City Hall press conference.

Williams, 46, will be the city's first black police chief and the first chief in more than 40 years from outside the department, whose image was tarnished by TV shows such as "Drugnet" but damaged by the videotaped beating of black motorist Rodney King. He will earn an annual salary of \$160,000.

Williams was picked to replace Chief Darryl F. Gates, who in the aftermath of the beating agreed under pressure to resign.

The new chief said he would address the recommendations of the independent commission that investigated the Police Department after the 1991 videotaped beating.

But he also pledged to improve department morale, saying too many of the department's officers had been "painted with a broad brush" of accusations.

Williams' selection was hailed by civil rights activists and proponents of police reform in the nation's second-largest city.

"He has the qualities, he has the capabilities, he has the knowledge to lead this department in ways to make us very proud," Mayor Tom Bradley said.

Williams' chief of Philadelphia's 6,300-member force since 1988, Williams is known for being tough on rogue cops and promoting cooperation with the public by way of storefront "volunteers," where police and ministers work together on crime.

"He's the best," said Police Commission President Stanley K. Sheinbaum. "We saw him, the people he worked with, the people below him. He's very impressive. He's very smart."

Williams had stops scheduled later today at a youth center, a community meeting and the Van Nuys division of the police department.

But the timing of the succession was not clear. Gates previously said he would step down this month.

This week, he said he would retire by July.

Under the city charter, the police chief is protected by civil service rules, making it virtually impossible to fire him.

Voters in June will decide on an amendment to give the mayor and the City Council powers to hire and fire the chief.

Williams made it clear that Gates remains in authority for the time being.

"You have one chief," he said. "I am the chief-designee. Decisions are currently being made up until the time I am sworn in by the current chief of Los Angeles."

Gates described Williams as "a nice man" but said it was "difficult to understand" why the commission went outside the 3,400-officer department.

Williams was the lone LAPD outsider among six finalists and one of two blacks considered.

"Everyone that comes into the department hopes that they have the opportunity to ascend to the top, and it's a bummer to find that you can't," said Gates, who has been chief since 1978.

Guam anti-abortion laws struck down

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal appeals court Thursday overturned a law of the U.S. territory of Guam that would have prohibited almost all abortions.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said Roe vs. Wade remained the law of the land, despite several recent high court rulings upholding state restrictions on abortions.

Despite criticisms by individual justices, the Supreme Court itself has declined to overturn Roe vs. Wade, said Judge William Canby in the 3-0 ruling. "It would be both wrong and presumptuous of us now to declare that Roe vs. Wade is dead."

The Guam law, in effect only four days before it was blocked by a federal judge in March 1990, is one of several measures aimed at challenging the Supreme Court's 1973 Roe vs. Wade ruling that proclaimed a woman's right to an abortion.

The law would make it a felony to perform any abortion except those needed to preserve the woman's life or prevent grave health danger, as certified by two independent doctors. The only other exception covers ectopic pregnancies.

Similar laws in Louisiana and Utah are being challenged in lower federal courts. A less-restrictive law in Pennsylvania has been accepted for argument by the Supreme Court later this year.

Canby said the Guam law clearly violated the Roe vs. Wade standard, which found abortion decisions to be protected by the constitutional right to privacy and forbade any state restrictions in the first three months of pregnancy.

Judges Herbert Choy and Dorothy Nelson joined the ruling, which upheld a decision by U.S. District Judge Alex Munson striking the law down.

Guam, an island 3,700 miles west of Hawaii, has a largely Catholic population of 133,000.

Cheyenne's 'howdies' lead to No. 1 ranking

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — Don't let the threats of hanging made jokingly to the tourists fool you.

People say Cheyenne is really the most polite city in the country.

Each year the mayor encourages folks in this high Plains town of 50,000 to say "howdy" instead of hello to out-of-town visitors.

And out-of-towners who park illegally don't get tickets, they get tongue-in-cheek warnings telling them hanging is the usual punishment.

It all adds up to old-fashioned politeness, says Marijabelle Young-Stewart, who has been listing the country's most polite cities for the last 15 years. "I think it's the wholesomeness. There's a feeling of great integrity," Young-Stewart said after a recent visit to the Cowboy State.

Second on this year's list of polite cities was Charleston, S.C., followed by Washington, D.C. Rounding out the top 10 were Portland, Ore.; Seattle; Mobile, Ala.; Pensacola, Fla.; San Diego; Denver; and Pittsburgh, Pa.

Young-Stewart, of Kewanee, Ill., compiles the list from nominations made by executives who attend elite classes or schools she sponsors. This year she received about 26,000 nominations, with Cheyenne cited most often.

"Out here you can still find when a lady enters a room people stand up, they still open doors and pull out chairs for a woman. A handshake will cut a deal and you can count on it," Cheyenne Mayor Gary Schaeffer said.

Japanese physicist tells of cold fusion experiment; U.S. remains skeptical

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — A Japanese physicist who says he may have performed a successful cold fusion experiment presented his findings to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology on Wednesday, where he found some believers.

Osaka University scientist Akito Takahashi's work has triggered debate in Japan since he reported recently that the experiment produced 70 percent more power, in the form of heat, than it expended in electricity.

Scientists in the United States have been skeptical of cold fusion claims since being unable to duplicate the results of a 1989 Utah experiment in which two researchers claimed to produce fusion energy at room temperature.

But the step-by-step details of his experiment that Takahashi presented to dozens of scientists at MIT Wednesday were generally well received.

"There is evidence that something is going on," said Michael Stecker, a materials research engineer who has followed Takahashi's progress.

Takahashi stopped short of saying he had produced a nuclear fusion reaction.

"This may be nuclear energy, but I can not say. So I call it new hydrogen energy," he said.

Fusion is the force that powers the stars and hydrogen bombs through merging atoms, rather than splitting them as in nuclear fission, which powers nuclear weapons, engines and utility plants.

Scientists have been searching for ways to harness fusion at room temperature — so-called cold fusion — as a cheap, safe and virtually inexhaustible source of energy.

But many scientists believe that fusion can only be achieved at very high temperatures, which requires expending large amounts of energy.

Takahashi's experiment has been running for more than two months, and he said at one point last February he reduced the electric current when the water began to boil. Nonetheless, the excess heat persisted, he said.

"I am very confident of these results," said Eugene Mallove, an MIT engineer who wrote a book on cold fusion.

But Stan Luckhart, a research scientist at MIT's Plasma Fusion Center, remained skeptical.

"I haven't seen anything that made me think there was anything to this cold fusion," he said.

He said Takahashi must do more studies of how the heat may have been produced. Takahashi said he planned to do that.

Mein Fleischmann, who conducted the 1989 Utah experiment with B. Stanley Pons, said he supported Takahashi's findings.

"I have no reason to doubt that what he says is correct," Fleischmann said from his home in Tibury, England. "It is really related to what we have been doing all along."

Lamoille man's body located east of Elko

ELKO, Nev. (AP) — The Elko County sheriff's office said Thursday it has recovered a body and made two arrests in the disappearance of a Lamoille man over the weekend.

Sheriff Neil Harris said the body of Terry Tomera, 23, was found early Wednesday along a dirt road through the Humboldt Mountains about 35 miles east of Elko.

He said he held off on reporting the discovery until after the arrests were made.

Gaylen George Thompson, 18, of Ely was being held without bail for investigation of murder with the use of a deadly weapon.

Harris said another 18-year-old, Joshua Rexroad of Elko, was arrested in Las Vegas following a minor traffic accident. Rexroad was driving a stolen Carlin fire department van, he said.

The sheriff said Rexroad was being held in Las Vegas until Elko County authorities could return him to Elko. He added that Rexroad was armed when he was arrested, but did not say what kind of weapon it was.

Tomera was last seen leaving an Elko bar shortly after midnight Sunday. His blood-covered pickup truck was found later that day near the South Fork Dam.

Harris said the man had been shot several times, apparently in a robbery, and the killers tried to throw deputies off their scent by dumping his body one place and leaving his truck in another.

CSI's 'As You Like It' takes a fresh approach

TWIN FALLS — To recycle or not to recycle: That is the question.

In the College of Southern Idaho's production of William Shakespeare's "As You Like It," the characters are not cardboard, but just about everything else is. The scenery consists of more than 1,000 cardboard boxes, stacked, lined, shaped into tubes, representing rocks, walls, trees and mountains. The actors made their own costumes — out of paper, cardboard, burlap and baling twine.

Shakespeare in cardboard was the brainchild of the play's director, Laine A. Steel. "The boxes give the suggestion of freedom and springtime and romps in the woods," he said, "and they help us put the emphasis on

the play in a way that helps you understand it." Shakespeare "has always been a challenge," explained Steel, who chose "As You Like It" because it is one of the Bard's more accessible plays. "This play is Shakespeare's commentary on spring and new birth and love, approached from several angles," Steel said, "it addresses brotherly love, paternal love, true love, infatuation, even lust."

No one knows a lot about Shakespeare's personal experience with love. "He was apparently happily married," Steel said, "but there is some question about who he wrote the sonnets to." At least the playwright's birth date is well documented. And Steel timed his production to coincide with that date (April 23).

Fort Hall dancers keep their heritage alive

—DECLO—Randy West grew up on the Fort Hall Shoshoni Bannock Reservation in Idaho. His wife grew up on the Mountain Ute Reservation in Colorado. They met at a regional powwow; today, they join hands to share their heritage with others.

Randy and Vanessa West are members of a Native American dance troupe based at Fort Hall. Several years ago, they moved away from their reservations to make their home in Declo; but they retained a love of their culture and the dances they learned growing up.

"We like to perform for schools," said Randy West, 35, a father of three. "When children are studying Idaho history, what's better than having a real Native American in the classroom?"

During shows, West and 15 of his friends dress in native costumes and perform dances from both old and new traditions. Their Men's Grass dance, West explained, was derived from the practice of sinning grass down to make a place to camp. The Men's Fancy dance is fast-moving, colorful and filled with plenty of foot coordination.

"Everything we do has a meaning," Randy West said. "When we wear a porcupine headdress, we wear it in honor of the young warrior who protects his family, like the porcupine hair protects the quill on a porcupine." Deer

hair, West continued, represents the swiftness of a hunt. And wearing fine feathers on top of the head is symbolic of being a provider, hunter and protector. West has had lots of practice coordinating Native American costumes. In the winter, he runs cattle, but the rest of the year, he works as a model. He has worn a

variety of Native American costumes during photo shoots, and several of the photographs in his portfolio show him dressed for action, atop his trick riding horse, Apache. The summer 1990 issue of Sun Valley Guide magazine features a picture of West on its cover. When the members of the Fort Hall tribe perform in Burley next week and in Twin Falls the following week, they will hand out pamphlets explaining their dances. The dances recently represented the United States at the International Dance Festival in Rextburg, and they will travel to Leningrad for a two-week performance tour next month. Proceeds from the Magic Valley performances will help defray expenses on the trip.

Disney wants to exceed sales of 'Fantasia' video

The Walt Disney Co. hopes to repeat the success of "Fantasia," its home-video hit last year, by releasing "Beauty and the Beast" to the home-video market on Oct. 30, the company said.

In a statement, Disney said it expects "Beauty" to sell better than "Fantasia," the classic Disney animated movie that has sold a record 14.2 million video units.

"Fantasia," first released in movie theaters in 1940, was the single biggest contributor to Disney's profit growth during its first business quarter, which ended Dec. 31.

"Beauty and the Beast" is the highest-grossing animated film of all

time. The home video cassette of the movie will be priced at \$24.99.

"Disney is very bullish on 'Beauty and the Beast,' and I think the company has every reason to be," said Bruce Thorp, an entertainment analyst with Provident National Bank in Philadelphia. "Beauty" should be a big-profit product.

Plans to release "Beauty and the Beast" on video were announced as part of a planned additional thrust

into the video sale market by Buena Vista Home Video, Disney's video distribution arm.

Disney said it believes there will be strong growth in the market for so-called "sell-through" tapes, those priced for sale as opposed to rental.

Disney also disclosed plans to sell other video cassettes from \$12.99 to \$24.99 this year, including "The Rescuers," another Disney animated movie.

Magic Valley Fellowship Hall serves as place for members of recovery groups to socialize.

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Valley Fellowship Hall is a building clothed in anonymity.

The structure, near the corner of Ard and Second Avenue North, houses a private, nonprofit corporation. Its owners are members of 12-step recovery groups. Such groups take great care to keep their membership lists anonymous.

"We bought the building in 1987, and it is a place of recovery," said building manager Jack Hartline. "Just about any time, you can find people sitting around drinking coffee and talking with their new friends." Emphasis "new."

Hartline said he works hard to give his members a "social" life. "Most newly recovering people don't know how to socialize without being destructive," he said. "A lot of people don't know that life does exist after use."

In the main social area of the hall on a recent weekday afternoon, several men and women were lifting their coffee mugs off a pegboard and settling in for some friendly banter. One man wore a message T-shirt: "Of all the things I've lost, I miss my mind the most." In general, group members say, they have gained much more than they have lost.

Max, who must keep her last name confidential at the request of 12-step recovery groups, just entered her 24th year of sobriety. In gratitude, she volunteers at the hall five days a week. Everyone says she makes the best coffee in town (25 cents a cup).

"People come to me for advice or just to talk," said Max, 74. "Alcohol is a lot bigger problem now than it was in my day."

That is a fact to which the 136 dues-paying members of the hall can attest. They are involved in various recovery programs, from Alcoholics Anonymous (both Spanish and English) to Alanon to Narcotics Anonymous to Cocaine Anonymous. Some attend ACA (Adult Children of Alcoholics).

Hartline describes the typical hall member. We'll call him Harry. Har-

step recovery, he began working hard to put his life together. He comes to the hall at least twice a week to see his new friends, and he attends meetings in the building several evenings a week.

The age range of a hall member spans the years from 15 to 75. The male/female ratio clocks in at about 50/50. Some claim that recovery programs have a 95 percent success rate, but Hartline contends it's closer to 25 percent. "God doesn't have a 95 percent success rate," he said.

To raise money, Hartline rents out meeting rooms to groups. He also plans fund-raisers, like family potlucks and dances. Members pay \$7.50 a month, with the first 30 days offered free. Visitors toss in \$1 a day.

Some people get to know each other pretty well at the hall.

"There is a lot of camaraderie around here," Hartline said. "If I need help with something, I don't have any trouble finding it. Then he added with a smile, "After all, our middle name is fellowship."

Country singer Janie Fricke expands into gospel, movie themes

"JACKPOT - After 15 years in mainstream country music, Janie Fricke is heading out on her own with gospel and movie theme albums.

The gospel record, due out this spring, is Fricke's first work as a producer. In addition to her favorite "Amazing Grace" and songs of Malita Jackson, Fricke sings, "Tears In Heaven," written by Eric Clapton, who has made it a current hit on pop charts.

"It's a beautiful song, written about his little boy who fell out the window 40 floors of a building, to his death," Fricke said. "Eric sings about seeing him in heaven: 'Would you hold my hand if I saw you in heaven? Would you help me stand if I saw you in heaven?' And it's talking about him, as a daddy, if he went to heaven, if he saw his little boy, would his little boy help him. It's a real strong song."

"It really hit me when I saw him (Clapton) do it," she said. "That's when I decided this would be a perfect song for a gospel album."

On her Great Movie Themes album, Fricke said she enjoyed recording 21 great old songs from classic movies such as "Casablan-

ca. "Stompy Weather" and "The Way We Were." From other movies, she uses "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," "Singing In The Rain" and "Days Of Wine And Roses."

"It was really fun to work on it, because I grew up singing all those songs," Fricke said. "I went to all the movies with my dad, and then, Mother played the piano. I learned all these songs and sang them while she played the piano, so this album was really a fun project to do."

sale through telephone order (800-238-6600), rather than through record stores, she said.

Fricke's tour bus pulled into Jackpot this week after a 48-hour drive from Indiana. After her last show here on Sunday, the singer and her band will drive straight through to Texas for a show in Dallas as soon as they arrive. Usually, Fricke's husband, Randy Jackson, travels along and works as manager for his wife's show.

This summer, after a west coast tour, Fricke will stop for 18 days in the nation's country music hot spot, Branson, Mo., where she will share top billing with Conway Twitty at Lowe's Theater.

Fricke said Wednesday in a telephone interview from her room in Jackpot that she spends most of the year touring.

"We're going to rehearse every-

day while we're out here and add some more new tunes to the show," she said.

On stage with a harmonizing five-man band, slender 5-foot-9 Fricke plays guitar and mandolin as she sings her hits, including "I'll Need Someone to Hold Me When I Cry," "Do Me With Love," "It Ain't Easy Bein' Easy," "He's A Heartache," "Tell Me A Lie," "Always Have, Always Will," "Let's Stop Talking About It," "If The Fall Don't Get You," "Down To My Last Broken Heart," "Don't Worry 'Bout Me, Baby" and "She's Single Again."

One of her newest songs is, "I Want To Grow Old With You."

"It's a real pretty song," Fricke said, "and we dedicate it to couples that are having anniversaries in the audience, which we've had every night at the shows here now so far."

After singing communal jingles and background vocals for other stars, the farm girl from Indiana went solo in 1977 and was named "Best New Female Vocalist of the Year" in 1979 by Music City News.

In 1982 and 1983, she was chosen as Female Vocalist of the Year by the Country Music Association. At home in a 120-year-old farmhouse south of Dallas, Fricke enjoys cooking blackened catfish, pasta dishes and lowfat stir-fry meals. One of her hobbies, at home and on the

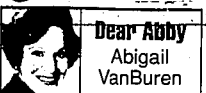
Man's disregard for AIDS risk upsets friend

DEAR ABBY: I never thought I would be writing a Dear Abby letter, but I am so angry I have to vent, or I will explode!

I have a very close male friend of more than 30 years. We have no secrets and have shared wonderful experiences and trips together. Jim is openly gay. For decades I begged (and even tried to bribe) him to give up cigarettes, but to no avail. He pleaded "hopeless addiction" and refrained from smoking in front of me. But his clothes and car smelled strongly of smoke, so he didn't kid me.

Abby, about a month ago, Jim suddenly gave up smoking! I asked him if it was on doctor's orders, and he said, "No, I just don't feel like smoking." Then, a few weeks ago, I saw him and he looked absolutely green. He was breathless; as though he had been running, and said he felt "just terrible." I told him he didn't look too well, either, and urged him to see his doctor.

To make a long story short - he

paid a visit to the doctor, who ordered him immediately into the hospital. The diagnosis is pneumocystis pneumonia.

Abby, I am furious with him! When all the publicity about AIDS came out 10 years ago, he told me he hadn't had contact with anybody "in ages." And over the years, as mutual friends became sick, I asked him if he had been tested for AIDS. He just repeated that he hadn't been near anybody in almost 10 years and, if he was, HIV-positive, he would rather not know it!

How could anybody be so selfish? How could he have had so little consideration for the people who love him? If he cared so little for his own health - couldn't he have at least made sure he was all right for MY

sake, and for the other friends who treasure him as I do? I am heartbroken.

If he had only confirmed he was HIV-positive, he and his doctor could have monitored his immune system, and he would have had advance warning that he was in serious trouble. Instead, he wasted precious weeks!

The doctors "think" they can pull him through this "episode" - but what if they can't? This is so unfair! Why, oh why would an intelligent person who knows he is at risk refuse to be tested when it is so important that people know their status?

DEAR HEARTBROKEN: Your friend is lucky to have such a caring friend as you. His is a classic case of "denial."

It is very difficult for some people to face the possibility that they might be infected with an incurable disease and have to deal with the

discrimination and rejection they might encounter.

And you are absolutely right - especially today with the advances that have been made in treating HIV-infection and its effects. Persons who know they are at risk should be tested so that they can benefit from what help is available. With proper treatment and early intervention, the quality (and quantity) of life is far from hopeless.

CSI to offer postal courses

'Boyz' leads video rentals

TWIN FALLS - Courses to prepare people for employment with the Unibase Data Entry system with the U.S. Postal Service are being scheduled at the College of Southern Idaho.

In June, Unibase-Data Entry will be hiring approximately 200 employees from Twin Falls to fulfill its Remote Bar Coding System contract with the postal service.

The RBCS will use video imaging technology to automate the processing of hand-addressed letters that now are kicked out of the automated mail stream. Unibase employees will key in data obtained from the video images so mail can be properly processed.

To qualify for employment with Unibase, potential employees will need a typing speed of 45 words per minute (10,000 keystrokes per hour) and a 10-key touch speed of 140 strokes per minute. Unibase employees will be paid a base wage of \$5.81 per hour plus \$2.07 per hour in federally-mandated fringe benefits.

Courses offered at CSI will include keyboarding, skillbuilding and 10-key proficiency. Students will be given typing and 10-key tests to determine their beginning level before training. After training, they will receive a certificate of their typing and 10-key speeds, along with a course grade.

Cost is \$42 per class plus books for students interested in receiving credit. Non-credit cost is \$10 per class. No books are required for the 10-key class, and cost of books for the keyboarding and skillbuilding classes will be approximately \$20 each.

Each class will meet for one hour one day per week for five weeks. Students will be required to go to the computer lab to do assignments and work on skillbuilding on their own time.

The first session of lectures is set to begin this week.

Keyboarding is planned for 6 to 7 p.m. Mondays, April 20 through

May 18. A second class is set for 8 to 9 a.m. Thursdays, April 23 to May 21. Both classes will meet in Canyon 119, and enrollment is limited to 50 students per class.

Skillbuilding is scheduled for 6 to 7 p.m. Tuesdays, April 21 through May 19, and again from 10 to 11 a.m. Wednesdays, April 22 through May 20, both in Canyon 119. Enrollment is limited to 50 per class.

The 10-key class is set for 7 to 8 p.m. Tuesdays, April 21 through May 19, and again from 4 to 5 p.m. Wednesdays, April 22 through May 20, in Shields 201. Enrollment is limited to 30 students.

Testing and registration for these classes is set for 2 to 3 p.m. and again from 6 to 7 p.m. Friday in Aspen 131.

Other lecture sessions will be scheduled the first week of May. For more information, call Kathleen Drown or Rosemary Vaughn at 733-9554, Ext. 100 or 119.

'FernGully' makes animation political

"FernGully... The Last Rainforest" is an animated feature with political agenda — a didactic message about environmental interference with its being a whopping good time.

The message here is a simple one — an evil is being done to the natural wonders of the world, namely the rain forests — and it's dealt with in simplistic, kiddie terms. All that's needed is a little magic and faith in the miracle of nature.

The naive of this ecological fable can be easily forgiven because it's so benignly innocent and so softly pedaled. It's a gentle, entertaining commercial for environmental awareness.

The film is set in a verdant paradise — filled with fairies, singing lizards, an insect motorcycle gang and one slightly askew but Robin Williams — which is being threatened by a smoke-choking, tree-eating machine called a Leveler. The principal character is a foxy young fairy named Crysta (Samantha Mathis), who, despite the urgings of her fairy master, Magi Luni (Grace Zabriskie), frequently drifts off into a pubescent fog. Her mind, as they say, is not on her work.

According to forest legend, the humans find centuries ago and are thought to be extinct. The humans here aren't really seen as malicious demons. The filmmakers — director Bill Kroger and screenwriter Jim Cox — have rather cleverly sidestepped the issue of human evil. Or at least in individual responsibility.

The human characters are rather hapless and bumbling, especially a young sun-burnished California blond named Zak (Jonathan Ward), whom Crysta, in a panic, shrinks down to fairy size. A good portion of the story is devoted to Zak's indoctrination into the ways of the fairies and the glories of FernGully. Also, there's something of a budding romance between him and Crysta, which turns her fairy

boyfriend, Pips (Christian Slater), green with jealousy.

But before any real lovey-dovey romance develops, there's a threat to the forest must be dealt with. Unwittingly, the humans have unleashed an ancient volcanic demon called Hexxus (Tim Curry), who once before tried to destroy FernGully until Magi was able to trap him in a tree. Now that he's been released, and gaining strength from the toxic exhaust of the Leveler (assuming a song titled "Toxic Love"), he sets out to take his revenge on his fairy enemies.

Moral lessons aside, the animators do a marvelous job of making the forest seem like a candy-colored Eden. As dazzling as it is, the film may not have the gravitas and depth that Disney animators achieve — it's flatter, less-dimensional, eye-catching palette is brighter and the aura of enchantment is still there.

The songs, as well as Alan Silvestri's score, are more influenced by rock than Tin Pan Alley, which is something of a mixed blessing. You do get Tori Loe, an arid-omnivorous striped lizard, singing "If I'm Gonna Eat Somebody (It Might as Well Be You)" and Robin Williams, who supplies the wigged-out personality for the Batty Koda, doing his inspired "Batty Rap," but beyond that the songs don't stick much in your mind.

Most of the characters are blandly conceived in that Mattel assembly-line way, though at times Crysta does resemble a cartoon Joan Jet. She's got a little funk in her. Tim Curry's smog monster is genuinely and deliciously scary (perhaps too much so for some younger toddlers).

Williams's bat is by far the picture's most memorable creation, chiefly because, well, he's Robin Williams in bat drag. I'm not sure how much of his nerve-jangled, channel-switching patter the kiddie audience actually caught, but they loved every minute he was on screen. Even out of the inkwell, he steals the show.

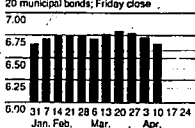

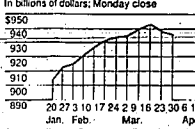

Union Pacific nets \$64 million income

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Union Pacific Corp. Chairman Drew Lewis said the firm's future should be solid with 1991 net income of \$64 million after a special after-tax charge of \$575 million for major restructuring.

Lewis said the restructuring will help streamline major segments of the corporation, particularly its chief subsidiary, Union Pacific Railroad. "Without the special charge, the corporation would have logged 1991 earnings of \$639 million, up 3 percent over 1990, the company's report said. UPR split its stock two-for-one last year and raised its quarterly dividend 9 percent to 34 cents per share.

"Our outlook appears bright (in 1992)," Lewis said in a report published this week. "If (the United States) has a relatively flat year in GNP growth, we will expect Union Pacific's earnings to increase."

Lewis, former transportation secretary under President Reagan, and other UPR board members will be in Salt Lake City on Friday for

the company's annual meeting. Lewis said the Union Pacific Railroad "weathered the most difficult operating environment in a decade" last year while logging record traffic levels — 7 percent above the industry average.

The railroad had earnings of \$110 million for the year, but without the one-time charge it would have reported \$602 million or an 8 percent gain over 1990.

Train loadings were up 4 percent for the year, despite the sluggish economy, while coal haulings increased 6 percent and food products 4 percent. The railroad predicts coal traffic should rise steadily through this decade as the impact of the Clean Air Act

Wyo. River Basin "exerts" a more attractive nationwide.

Lewis said UPR is currently implementing a variety of programs in which employees are encouraged to "take their work in their own hands" and become their own bosses.

KeyCorp posts record 1st-quarter net increase

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — KeyCorp reported a record 46.8 percent increase in profits during the first three months of this year, pushing net income to \$57.2 million.

And the multi-regional bank holding company said new acquisitions in the Northwest should further enhance its growth potential.

The January-March earnings compared to \$38.9 million in net income for the first quarter of 1991.

The quarterly earnings translated into 74 cents a share of common stock, up 23.3 percent over the 60 cents for the same period a year ago.

An average of 71.2 million shares were outstanding for the first quarter of 1992, compared to 64.2 million shares outstanding in the first quarter of 1991.

The quarterly figures reflect the company's three for two stock split, approved in February. "The New York-based holding company reported assets of \$22.9 billion.

KeyCorp's income before taxes for the first quarter of 1992 was \$86.6 million, compared to \$55.7 million for the first quarter of 1991.

"This exceptionally improved earnings performance comes on top of substantial events which positively impacted KeyCorp and its shareholders during the first quarter," said KeyCorp Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Victor Riley Jr.

"We believe the addition of Puget Sound Bancorp and the former Security Pacific branches will enhance future earnings growth," Riley said.

First Security early '92 income boost hits heights

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — First Security Corp. reports net income of \$18.47 million for the first quarter of 1992, a record 31.4 percent increase over the same period last year.

First security spokesman Scott Ulbrich said the increase amounts to \$4.41 million, giving the company the highest quarterly net operating income in its history. "Our earnings are now in their sixth consecutive year of sustained growth," said Spencer F. Eccles, First Security president and chief executive officer.

"For the first quarter of 1992, this has

been primarily due to a combination of higher balances in earning assets, lower funding costs and increased noninterest incomes," Eccles said.

For the quarter, fully-diluted net income per share was 72 cents, an increase of 11 cents from 1991.

Net interest income was \$80.89 million, up 18.9 percent, or \$12.87 million, from a year ago, Ulbrich said.

"The increase was due to 'significantly higher' consumer loan volumes and investment securities balances combined with lower interest rates

Potlatch profits up 65%

LEWISTON (AP) — Rising demand for housing and environmentally-imposed constraints on timber supply are being credited for a 65 percent increase in first-quarter profits for the Potlatch Corp.

"Looking ahead, we expect good market conditions for wood products to continue during the second quarter but weak markets to continue for the pulp-based products," Chairman Richard Madder said.

Hewlett named to Utah PSC

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Stephen G. Hewlett has been appointed to the Utah Public Service Commission by Gov. Norm Bangert.

The PSC is responsible for regulating the state's public utilities, which have combined revenues of more than \$1.5 billion.

Hewlett served as an auditor and budget officer for the commission from 1983 to 1986, when he took over duties as commission secretary.

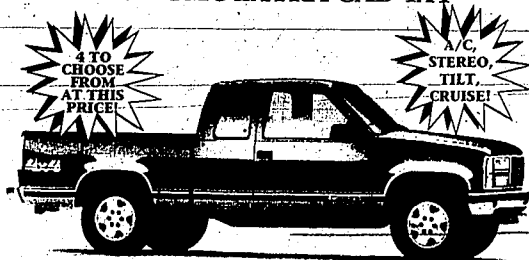

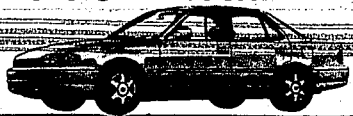

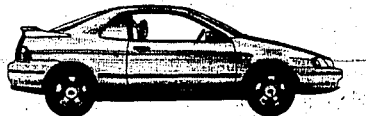

Bernard takes step back in time

"I just saw a clip from the movie!" squeals Crystal Bernard. "I looked like a lady. Usually I feel like a girl!"

This is Bernard's first look at herself in "Lady Against the Odds." The movie is a period piece, set in a Philip Marlowe-esque Los Angeles of 1943.

Bernard plays Dol Bonner, who, along with her best friend, Sylvia Raffray (played by Annabeth Gish), operates a detective agency. Bernard, who also plays Helen Chappel in the NBC Thursday-night series "Wings," has never before

seen herself dressed in anything but

"I love the '40s!" says Bernard. "Everything was just so lovely then! People just didn't speak their minds; they held their tongues. Facades were put up. Today's actors just put their cards on the table right away. Everyone in old movies seemed so moody and fabulous. It's really interesting. I did get a real good feel for the era — it was 50 years ago, you know?"

In the movie, when heiress Sylvia's rich guardian, P.L. Storr (played by Roy Thinnes) is found hanging from a tree, it's Dol who becomes the chief investigator of the crime. The murder suspects range from P.L.'s slightly daft widow (played by Polly Bergen) to a shadowy con man (played by Steven Flynn) who's blackmailing the widow, to a hilariously seamy gossip columnist (played by Dan Castellana, who supplies the voice of Homer on "The Simpsons").

Most of the main characters are extremely wealthy, so the movie was filmed in mansions all around Beverly Hills and Bel Air, Calif.

"Who could afford to live like this in Hollywood? Certainly not anyone anymore!"

Bernard says she got the role because "NBC is really good about using its (series) stars in movies. Dol's a really strong character, and that's one of my traits. Certainly on 'Wings,' I'm kind of strong and feisty and angry most of the time."

Dol, Bernard says, is an unusual woman. "She's up against a lot; being a working woman in the '40s getting no respect in the workplace.

All the men were away, fighting in World War II. Before Dol's boyfriend went to war, he asked her to take over the agency."

Bernard says that, if this movie is successful, she may star in a series of Dol Bonner TV movies, a prospect that clearly pleases her. Not that she's dissatisfied doing series work, mind you. "I love doing 'Wings,'" she says enthusiastically. "We get a lot of attention from NBC, but not much from the press." Bernard adds that she especially enjoys the network attention after starring for five seasons on "It's a Living," a syndicated show with a much lower profile.

ABC's 'Prime Time Live' earns top honors

WASHINGTON (AP) — ABC's Prime Time Live carried off top honors in the 24th annual Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Awards Monday, winning the grand prize and taking first place in both the television and international categories.

The grand prize went to the ABC program and reporters Diane Sawyer, Mark Lukasiewicz and Eugenia Harvey for "True Colors," a report about attitudes toward blacks. It also won in the television category.

Prime Time Live and John Quinones and Robert Campos won in the international category for "Bitter Harvest," a report on the use of Haitian children to cut sugar cane in the Dominican Republic. First place in the print category

went to The Miami Herald and reporters Jacquee Petchel and Andres Viglucci for a series on poor people without health insurance.

The winner in the radio category was Minnesota Public Radio, whose reporters, Stephen Smith, Bill Catlin and John Scherf, reported on problems of children who were "crack babies."

In the student category, the staff of the North Idaho College Sentinel won first place for a series on prejudice and discrimination on and off the campus.

The first place in photo journalism was awarded to Suzanne Kreiter and The Boston Globe for a report comparing institutions and group homes for people with mental retardation.

DESIGNING DUMPS DUFFY: Linda Bloodworth-Thomason, co-executive producer of CBS' "Designing Women," confirmed that the

high-rated series would return for a seventh season next fall, but without Julia Duffy, who joined last fall as the whiny, snobbish Allison Sugarbaker. Bloodworth-Thomason said Duffy "did a spectacular job in a very difficult role. If it didn't work out, it was our fault, not hers. She pedaled that bike as hard as she could.

However, the network didn't feel the chemistry was right and asked

that she be released from her role." Said Duffy: "Since the character of Allison was so poorly developed, I'm not surprised to discover at the producers' decision to do without her. Bloodworth-Thomason hopes she hopes to bring back original cast member Jean Smart, who left after last season.

BAD YEAR: How bad was the broadcast TV business last year? So bad that advertising revenues fell for the first time since 1971, when cigarette ads were banned from the airwaves. Total TV ad revenues for the year, as reported by the Television Bureau of Advertising, were \$21.4 billion, off 5 percent from 1990. That broke down into network revenues of \$9.5 billion (off 6 percent), spot (national, non-network) revenues of \$5.2 billion (down 9 percent), local revenues of \$5 billion (off 4 percent) and national syndication revenues, which includes Fox, of \$1.9 billion (up 19 percent).

WHAT'S NEW? Roberta Baskin, who once won prizes for local station WJLA in Washington D.C., as an investigative reporter, has been named a Washington-based correspondent for CBS News. She will reportedly be assigned to several CBS News broadcasts, including "CBS Evening News with Dan Rattler."

BYE BYE BROWN: Downtown Julie Brown, who was dropped recently from her role as host of the MTV series, "Club MTV" (weekdays, 6:30-7 p.m.), will continue to work for the music channel on special projects, according to an MTV spokeswoman. Brown, who was imported from Britain with much fanfare six years ago, also has been a contributing reporter for the syndicated "Inside Edition." "Club MTV" is now on hiatus and being revamped, with a new format and host to be announced. On radio, Brown will take over as host of Westwood One's syndicated countdown series, "American Dance Traxx," effective April 12.

SCHEDULING CHANGES: Craig T. Nelson's "Coach," on hiatus, will return to its original 9:30 p.m. Tuesday slot April 21 with fresh episodes.

ON TAP: When Susan Dey leaves "L.A. Law" after this season she'll star in "Love Is Hell," a new CBS sitcom from the "Murphy Brown" creators, Diane English and Joel Shukovsky. She'll play a newly divorced restaurant owner who dates an "outspoken newspaper columnist."

Q: Please settle a bet. I say that "Happy Days" was a spinoff from "Love, American Style." My wife says it was a spinoff from the movie, "American Graffiti." Who's right?

A: You are. "Happy Days," originally an unsold 1971 pilot, became a segment of a "Love, American Style" broadcast in February 1972. The segment, titled "Love and the Happy Days," featured Ron Howard, Anson Williams, Marion Ross and Harold Gould. But, following the huge success of George Lucas' "American Graffiti" in 1973, ABC took another look at that unsold pilot and asked producer Garry Marshall for a series, which premiered in January 1974. It has been written that George Lucas was influenced by that unsold pilot and was thus inspired to make "American Graffiti," even casting Ron Howard in one of the key roles.

Q: We were wondering what happens if a contestant on "The Wheel of Fortune" doesn't want, or can't use his or her prize. Can they exchange the car or piano for money?

A: No, they can't. However, in the

case of "Wheel of Fortune," TV's most popular and one of its most lucrative game shows, there are options. If a contestant can't use the prize and wants to avoid paying taxes on it, he or she can forfeit it within three working days. The contestant gets nothing in return, but does avoid a tax bill that could seriously cut into cash winnings. The second option is to sell the prize privately to a third party, as long as the contestant doesn't promote the item as coming from the game show. Incidentally, to answer a question that readers have asked from time to time: There is a combined cash prize from "Wheel of Fortune" and "Jeopardy!" (the closing credits). During the game, contestants can "win" as much as they can, but are allowed to keep only \$125,000 as a result of a mutual agreement between the production company and the broadcasting network. Anything in excess of that is donated to charity.

Q: We hear that Johnny Carson plans to become a full-time actor once he gives up his late-night TV talk show. Can that be true? —G.L.

A: When I recently asked Carson about his post-TV show plans, he responded that after he leaves after the May 22 show, he intends to take six months devoting himself to "special things." And he wasn't referring to TV specials.

Baio bounces back from teen-age fame

TV viewers have known Scott Baio for a long time, first as teen-ager Chachi on "Happy Days," then as college student Charles on "Charles in Charge." Now, he is playing "someone my own age," a building superintendent on "Baby Talk."

There's one thing that has remained constant, though: the groups to whom Baio, now 31, appeals. "You know, it's really weird," he says, "but my demographic has not changed since I started. It's kids 4-7, then women 18-34."

Baio has been in show business a long time, and he admits that it has caused him to miss out on a few things. "You know what I think I missed?" he says. "Doing the college thing. I always wonder what that would have been like. I think I missed that. But I was lucky enough to do a show (Happy Days) where nobody had any egos, nobody did any drugs, everybody had a great time. Every single day I wouldn't change anything to be perfectly honest. I've had a fairly good life."

But dealing with fame can be difficult for any teen-ager.

"Listen, I got arrogant for a while," Baio says. "It's impossible not to."

Of course, it's a rare teen-ager, in or out of show business, who doesn't at some point develop an attitude.

"Yeah, but I had the money to back it up," says Baio. "I never did drugs, and I never bought anything I didn't need to buy, but with that money comes a strange sense of


