New air rules target INEL waste

BOISE — The Health and Welfare Board has unanimously adopted emergency regulations to force federal compliance with state air quality rules for any new commercial nuclear waste it stores in Idaho.

The board's action on Thursday implements legislation Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus pushed through the Legislature earlier this month to counter a federal appellate ruling that exempted the Energy Department from compliance with rules Andrus had been using to block new waste shipments to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The legislation easily cleared the House

but ran into problems in the state Senate in the final days of the session until the INEL announced that it had experienced an accidental radioactive emission from its waste reprocessing facility. The announcement came as a Senate committee was deciding the fate of the bill.

The campaign for new state power over waste storage was in response to the department's attempts last fall to begin shipping nearly 250 truckloads of high-level commercial waste from a decommissioned nuclear reactor near Denver to the INEL for storage. Three shipments got through before Andrus attempt to force the department's compliance with air quality regulations threw the battle into federal court.

Despite its victory in the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, the department has said it will not attempt to resume shipments before this summer when a new environmental assessment of the shipment plan is completed.

The board's action, required by the legislation, came over the objections of INEL manager Augustine Pitrolo, who called the emergency regulations "selective enforcement against the federal government."

"This type of rule-making may constitute discrimination against the federal government and thus may be unconstitutional," Pitrolo said in a letter received by the board just an hour before the vote.

But Andrus, in proposing the bill, emphasized that it would impose no additional burden on Idaho businesses and simply force the federal government to live by the same rules those businesses do.

Adoption of the emergency rule will be followed by a more thorough and much longer, normal rule-making procedure during which the board will take full public comment on the regulation.

The board's action came as Republican Sen. Larry Craig opened the first meeting of his INEL Citizens' Advisory Committee with a call for "broad-based knowledge and understanding" of the eastern Idaho nuclear site.

More than 30 people have agreed to be interviewed by the board just an hour before the vote.

Perot could make history, Symms says

TWIN FALLS — Steve Symms won't vote for H. Ross Perot, but the Republican senator from Idaho says the billionaire from Texas could make some history this fall.

"I support the president," Symms said Thursday. "But there's no question Perot has a lot of appeal right now with the mood in the country. He could throw a close election into the House of Representatives."

Perot, a Texas entrepreneur, says he'll launch an independent bid for president if supporters get him on the ballot in all 50 states. That, said Symms, could mean trouble for both President Bush and Democratic front-runner Bill Clinton.

Under the U.S. Constitution, if no candidate receives a majority of electoral votes — the House of Representatives decides the winner.

"I think it's interesting that in that case each state gets one vote," said Symms, who celebrated his 54th birthday Thursday with an easier recess swing through the Magic Valley. "That

will mean Idaho's vote counts as much as California's."

Symms, who will retire in December after two terms in the Senate, said Bush "wrecking on his no-new-taxes pledge two years ago and his conciliatory approach to congressional Democrats have put his re-election in jeopardy."

"The same voters who elected Reagan in '80 and '84 elected Bush in '88," Symms said. "The president ran on the most conservative platform that any Republican has ever run on for four years ago. Then he held out an olive branch, and the Democrats turned around and shafted him."

"The president doesn't like confrontation, but he's going to have to run against the do-nothing 102nd Democrat Congress. If he does that, he'll get elected."

Symms, who said Wednesday in Pocatello he would consider running for governor sometime in the future, predicted Thursday that Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne would succeed him in the Senate "if he's the Republican nominee," by beating Democratic U.S. Sen. Frank Lautenberg.

'Texas billionaire' Perot catches fire in Magic Valley

KETCHUM — A lot of people still don't recognize the name, but the lights go on when H. Ross Perot's campaign workers mention "billionaire from Texas."

"They know what he stands for," said

Connie Heddens, the unofficial Wood River Valley coordinator for the petition drive to get Perot's name on Idaho's November general election ballot. "And they know he's not a politician."

Perot, flirting with an independent bid for the White House, is hot right now in southern Idaho — so hot that mid-as-hell voters are lining up on post office patios

and in shopping center parking lots to give him their autographs.

"I've been at this three weeks, and I would guess we have well over 1,000 signatures by now," Heddens said. "It's increasing, and this is slack (the tourist off-season) here."

Barbara Marsh, Perot's Pocatello-based coordinator for Idaho, estimates his

supporters will easily have the 4,070 signatures of registered voters necessary to get the Texan's name on the November ballot.

Plans are to file them on May 29, three days after the Idaho primary election and the electorate's first verdict on President Bush and the Democratic front runner, Bill Clinton.

'Rational basis' may be key to abortion decision

WASHINGTON — One possible outcome of the Pennsylvania abortion case would be a Supreme Court decision letting states restrict abortions as long as legislators have "a rational basis" for their action.

Under that approach, urged by the Bush administration Wednesday and previously backed by four justices, "practically any restriction — even banning all abortions — could be constitutional."

Some legal scholars and partisans on both sides of the abortion debate think at least one more justice — making a majority — is likely to adopt such a standard that would implicitly overrule the court's 1973 Roe vs. Wade ruling.

"Roe is history," said American University law professor Joel Paul. He said Wednesday's argument session before the court "was like being at the wake of an old relative you've expected to die for some time."

The court, in private, will take its first vote in the Pennsylvania case Friday, and is to announce its final decision by July.

The court's 1973 ruling, in an opinion written by Justice Harry A. Blackmun, conferred upon women a "fundamental" right to abortion based on individual privacy.

The court first articulated the concept of fundamental rights in 1942 when it struck down an Oklahoma law permitting sterilization of some criminals.

Clouds traces of 'big bang'

LOS ANGELES — A spacecraft has discovered the largest and oldest structures in the universe, wispy clouds that show how creation's "big bang" led to formation of stars and galaxies, scientists said Thursday.

"If you're religious, it's like looking at God," said research team leader George Smoot, an astrophysicist at Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory and the University of California, Berkeley.

The discovery was made by NASA's Cosmic Background Explorer (COBE) satellite during its \$400 million mission to study the universe's origins.

Researchers say more than 300 million measurements by the spacecraft answer a question that has long vexed scientists: How did matter that was

uniformly spread out in the newborn universe start clumping together to produce stars, galaxies and clusters of galaxies?

If the research is confirmed, "it's one of the major discoveries of the century. In fact, it's one of the major discoveries of science," said physicist Joel Primack of the University of California, Santa Cruz.

Smoot and his team presented the findings at an American Physical Society meeting in Washington, D.C. NASA also issued an announcement.

"We have observed what we believe are the largest and most ancient structures in the universe," extremely thin clouds or ripples that represent the earliest stages of matter starting to clump together in the newborn universe, Smoot said during a news conference.

Day-care operator receives 12 life terms

FARMVILLE, N.C. — A small-town day-care operator was sentenced to 12 consecutive life prison terms Thursday as children who testified they were molested by him watched from the front row, clutching dolls and teddy bears.

"I am innocent. I have not done these things," Robert F. Kelly said before Judge D. Marsh McLelland ordered one life sentence for each victim, ages 4 to 7.

Some of the children yelled "I hate you" as guards escorted Kelly to a police car to begin the trip to Central Prison in Raleigh. "See you in a million years," yelled a young girl.

Kelly, 44, will not be eligible for parole for 240 years. Prosecutors urged the sentence.

Watchdog group pans election spending

WASHINGTON — The government's backlog of campaign finance investigations reached a new high in 1990 and is evidence the Federal Election Commission needs to be overhauled, a watchdog group said Thursday.

The non-partisan Center for Responsive Politics said its study found the FEC resolved just 35 percent of the cases it handled in 1990 and finished the year with 258 open matters, up from the previous record of 220 in 1988. The backlog grew even though the commission, the government's main enforcer of campaign finance laws, faced its lowest caseload since 1986, the group said.

Clinton: U.S. needs 'challenge, change'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — An exasperated Bill Clinton got sidetracked by a new round of questions about his candor Thursday as he tried to preview his full campaign themes against President Bush.

At a luncheon fund raiser, Clinton offered a spirited critique of President Bush's economic and domestic policies and promoted his own ideas "to challenge and change this country."

But when the Democratic front-runner tried to take the same message to a forum at Florida A&M University, Clinton faced new questions about his explanations of his Vietnam draft status and college experimentation with marijuana.

'Prank' ended with donkey's death

BELEVUE, Wash. — All they wanted to do, the three young men told police, was take the donkey for a little nighttime ride — sort of like a prank. They never intended to hurt him, they said. Things just got out of control when the donkey balked, they said.

The violence that followed that night of April 15 eventually led to the "brutal beating and death of the donkey Pasado at Kelsey Creek Farm park in Bellevue, just east of Seattle.

The three arrested — ages 16, 18 and 20 — weren't able to explain some things about the beating, said Deputy Police Chief Gary A. Cand. Police released few details on what they learned from their investigation. Police also did not release the names of the suspects.

Barry leaves prison, is greeted warmly

SCALP LEVEL, Pa. — Former Washington Mayor Marion Barry was released from prison Thursday after serving six months for possessing cocaine, and told supporters who greeted him he's a stronger man.

About 300 people rode buses from the nation's capital to meet Barry after his release from a federal prison at nearby Loretto. They held a revival-style prayer meeting in his honor in a motel parking lot.

Study: More women raped than reported

WASHINGTON (AP) — A government-funded study released Thursday found 683,000 American women were raped in 1990 — a far higher number than other government reports have said — and that 12.1 million women have been raped victims at least once.

In addition, the National Women's Study said almost 62 percent of the rape victims said they were attacked when they were minors, with about 29 percent saying they were younger than 11.

"Rape does seem to be a tragedy of youth in America," said Dean Kilpatrick, who directed the research and is co-author of the report called "Rape in America."

The study, funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, involved female interviewers talking to some 4,000 women by telephone about rapes in the previous year and earlier.

The survey also found that: • Of the estimated 12.1 million women who have been raped, about 6.8 million were raped once, 4.7 million more than once and about 600,000 were unsure of the number of times.

• Twenty-nine percent of perpetrators were non-relatives known to the victim such as neighbors or friends. Twenty-two percent were strangers, 16 percent were relatives other than immediate family: 11 percent father or stepfather; 10 percent boyfriend or ex-boyfriend and 9 percent husband or ex-husband. Three percent were not sure or refused to answer.

• Twenty-four percent of rape victims were unharmed, while 24 percent suffered minor injuries and 4 percent were seriously hurt. The survey did not ask about the physical harm.

Man convicted of raping wife

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — A man accused of raping his estranged wife in front of their two young children has been convicted under Louisiana's 2-year-old spousal rape law. He faces a mandatory life prison sentence.

A jury deliberated about 90 minutes Wednesday before finding Willie Williams Jr. guilty of aggravated rape, aggravated crime against nature, and aggravated burglary in the July 22 attack on Janice Williams, who divorced him in February.

Orders for durable goods increase slightly

WASHINGTON (AP) — Applications for unemployment benefits fell to a six-month low this month, the government said Thursday.

Factory orders for expensive, durable goods advanced moderately in March.

The fruits of the recovery are now reaching American workers and their families, Labor Secretary Lynn Martin said.

Economists said the reports confirm that the recession has ended. They cautioned, however, that growth so far has been strong enough only to stem layoffs, not to put the unemployed back to work.

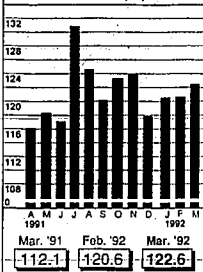
The number of Americans filing first-time unemployment insurance claims fell to 404,000 for the week ending April 11, down from 416,000 a week earlier and the lowest since early October.

It was the third consecutive weekly decline. The latest drop was unexpected and marked a clear departure from the first three months of this year when new claims averaged just over 450,000 a week.

The Commerce Department said durable goods orders, for items such as trucks and urbins expected to last at least three years, rose 1.6 per-

cent a decline. Orders were unchanged in February, a revision from a previous report showing a small decline, and up 2.4 percent in January. Despite recent gains, however, orders still have not regained the ground lost by a 5 percent drop in December.

Much of the strength in March was concentrated in a 6.3 percent surge in orders for transportation equipment, particularly aircraft. But most other categories also posted increases. Orders for items other than transportation equipment edged up 0.1 percent, only the second advance in eight months.

Although pleased with the increase in new orders, economists noted that the backlog of unfilled orders slipped 0.6 percent to \$480.6 billion, the seventh drop in a row.

The backlog is a measure of whether the current workforce and production facilities can keep up with demand. A decline means there is less pressure on factories for rehiring.

Manufacturers' first response to rising demand usually is to ask existing employees to work overtime. Factories normally expand their payrolls only after sustained increases in

orders. The unemployment rate in March, as reported previously, remained at a 6 1/2-year high of 7.3 percent.

Economists are not expecting substantial improvement until the second half of the year, and then no more than half a percentage point.

For all of last year, durable goods orders fell 4.6 percent for the worst performance since 1982.

In March, orders for military goods rose 7.8 percent. Excluding military goods, orders rose 1.3 percent, the same as in February.

Non-defense capital goods excluding aircraft rose 1.2 percent after a larger decline in February. This category is considered a good barometer of businesses' expansion and modernization plans.

Orders for industrial equipment and machinery were up 1.1 percent. Orders for electrical equipment rose 1.5 percent. Orders for primary metals, such as steel, fell 5.6 percent, only partially offsetting a strong gain in February.

Shipments of durable goods, a measure of current production, increased 0.3 percent in March to \$125.7 billion after a 3 percent rise in February.

U.S. estimate of Iraqi troops was off by half

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and its allies faced a demoralized Iraqi military of 183,000 troops, less than half the force estimated by the Pentagon, when the ground war in the Kuwait began, according to a congressional report.

The House Armed Services Committee, in its own bipartisan review of the Persian Gulf War, estimated Thursday that U.S. and allied troops field an overwhelming 5-to-1 advantage at the start of the ground war on Feb. 23, 1991.

The Pentagon said repeatedly during the war that Iraqi forces in the region totaled more than 500,000.

The congressional report agrees in many respects with the Defense Department's 1,300-page study of the conflict, giving high marks to the decisive aerial attacks, the role of sophisticated technology and the performance of the 540,000 U.S. men and women.

But the committee's assessment addresses the one major issue the Pentagon has avoided in its post-mortems — the size of the Iraqi military.

The panel estimated that 183,000 Iraqi troops remained after enduring constant bombing attacks from the allied air campaign. The number is based on the 63,800 who were captured in the ground war, and the panel's calculation that 120,000 either

escaped or were killed. The report also said 17,000 Iraqis were injured and 9,000 were killed in the air war.

The study provided no total figures on either Iraqi military or civilian deaths.

The 89-page committee report is based on interviews with some 1,000 people who fought the war, including those who questioned captured Iraqi commanders.

The chairman of the House panel said the Pentagon's failure to tackle the issue of Iraqi troop strength prevents a complete accounting of the war.

Committee figures "can't help us know more about how air power worked — whether it devastated ground forces by killing them or by hurting morale so they deserted," Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., said in releasing the report at a Capitol Hill news conference.

The Pentagon has never released formal estimates on the total number of Iraqi deaths, although some officials have said it could have been as many as 100,000 while Air Force Gen. Charles Horner has suggested the figure is as low as 10,000.

The congressional study, "Defense For A New Era: Lessons of the Persian Gulf War," provided the information for a successful defending Saudi Arabian military sites and keeping Israel out of the war.

Bush plans Poland visit in July

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will visit Poland early in July en route to a summit meeting in Germany, and also will stop in Helsinki for another international gathering before returning home.

At the invitation of Polish President Lech Walesa, Bush will go to Warsaw on July 5 to meet with government leaders. Later that same day he will fly on to Munich for the annual economic summit of the United States, Germany, Britain, France, Italy, Canada and Japan.

He will spend four nights in Munich for the July 6-8 meeting.

Bush plans Poland visit in July

From Munich, Bush will go to Helsinki, Finland, for a summit July 9-10 of the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe. He is to return to the United States on July 10.

Ban on medical use of marijuana leads to suit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Advocates of medical use of marijuana filed a court challenge Thursday to the government's latest refusal to allow the drug to be given to people suffering from AIDS, cancer and other diseases.

Two organizations asked a federal appeals court to review the March 19 decision by the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Kevin Zeese, attorney and vice president of the Drug Policy Foundation, said his group and the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws want the court to order marijuana reclassified so it may be prescribed by doctors.

Zeese said, "There is overwhelming evidence that marijuana is effective" in easing the ill effects of cancer chemotherapy, AIDS, glaucoma and certain neurological conditions.

Indians win, clinch diamond title for Bruins

RUPERT — Minico found slippery footing in the victory column Thursday, letting Pocatello rally for a 10-7 win in a Region III baseball game.

The Minico loss clinches the Region III regular season title for Twin Falls at 5-1. Pocatello, 9-4 overall, takes over second with a 3-2 mark in the region.

The Spartans, 9-5, 1-2, can still claim second place and a first-round home game for the tournament by defeating Pocatello Tuesday and Highland twice in Pocatello Saturday, May 2.

Through two errors, two walks and two pitchers, the Indians scored six times in the

top of the sixth inning to take a 10-6 lead on Minico. The Spartans had owned leads of 5-0 and 6-4.

"We had a couple miscues that led to a big inning," said Spartans Coach Cory Bridges. "High school kids are going to make errors, but we got to learn to play through them."

Four hits and a couple walks guaranteed Pocatello would score a few runs in the sixth. Two infield errors with the bases loaded upped that total, it finally took diving catch by right fielder Brandon Harkness to get the Spartans out of the inning.

down the next four Minico hitters to end the game.

The Spartans took a 2-0 lead in the second when Rod Fairchild smacked a curveball into left field with the bases loaded. Jason Snow was hit with a pitch after a walk rounded the bases for a 3-0 draw-in Pocatello's five-run inning.

Pocatello came back with three runs in the third and one in the fifth, just missing more in between.

The Spartan defense that failed in the sixth bailed Minico out of a jam in the fourth. After a leadoff single, Harkness gunned down the runner at third on another base hit. Then, pitcher Andrew Alexander

snared a line drive and doubled the runner off second.

"We didn't hang our heads after we went down 5-0," said Pocatello Coach Gino Mariani. "We battled back each inning until we finally got the lead."

Minico added one run in the third on singles by Harkness and Brandon Wilcox, and a sacrifice fly by Fairchild.

Harkness ended up with three hits, a walk and two stolen bases in four trips to the plate.

The Spartans have an 11 a.m. doubleheader with Skyline at home Saturday.

Cavs dump Nets in playoff opener

RICHFIELD, Ohio — No need to double-team Brad Daugherty, the New Jersey Nets figured, because he's no bigger than they are.

Bad idea.

Daugherty set a Cleveland playoff record with 40 points and missed a triple-double by just one assist Thursday night as the Cavaliers beat the Nets 120-113 in the opening game of the NBA playoffs.

It's the first time in eight playoff appearances that the Cavaliers have won their opening game, New Jersey, which split the regular-season series with Cleveland 2-2, hasn't won in Richfield since 1986.

Daugherty had 16 rebounds and nine assists, just missing Cleveland's first playoff triple-double.

"I was just taking whatever was coming out of our offense," Daugherty said. "They match up well with us, so there wasn't much need for them to double-team me, although they did a little bit later on."

The Cavaliers, who haven't won a playoff series since 1976, won it at the free-throw line, where they outscored the Nets 39-15 in the game and 21-6 in the fourth quarter. Cleveland made all 21 of its fourth-quarter free throws.

Kevin McHale scored 21 points, Gamble 20 and Robert Parish 19 as the Celtics posted their ninth consecutive victory and 16th in the last 17 starts — with the only loss in Indiana on April 3.

With Reggie Miller and Micheal Williams hitting from all over the court, the Pacers outscored the Celtics 24-0 on 3-point shots.

After an 87-87 tie at the start of the fourth period, Indiana took a 106-103 lead with 5:22 remaining. However, Gamble hit a short jumper and McHale followed with a 16-footer, putting Boston ahead to stay.

After Miller was harassed into a 24-foot shot that bounced off the rim, Lewis drove for a layup and converted a free throw for a three-point play. Chuck Person then was forced to take another long shot and McHale was fouled going for the rebound, making two free throws for a 112-106 advantage with 3:05 left.

Stallings is mostly right with 'vision for INEL'

When President Woodrow Wilson unveiled his famous 14 points for peace at the end of World War I, one cynic remarked that Wilson's plan had four more points than God's did.

Congressman Richard Stallings, with a 25-point plan for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, has one more point than Wilson's list and the Ten Commandments put together. In fact, he'd have been better off with 24.

Stallings outlined his "INEL Vision for the 1990s" this week. It sets an aggressive tone for Stallings' U.S. Senate campaign by staking out a key position: the need to shift INEL away from weapons production and toward more reasonable, responsible projects for the 1990s and beyond.

"Idaho's future is not in weapons production," the Rexburg Democrat said. "The INEL must chart a new course and steer away from a defense-oriented mission."

That's exactly right. We have maintained for years that weapons projects equate to a future of economic uncertainty and further waste storage above the Snake River Plain. Aquifer, waste cleanup and civilian research are far more suitable ventures.

That view is gaining ground in the changing world of 1992.

In these days of a shattered Soviet Union, a downsizing U.S. military and doubts about the federal budget, Idaho politicians are realizing that nuclear weapons production is a shaky economic enterprise. The patriotism pitch sounds hollow when there's no Evil Empire.

Even Stallings' opponent in the May primary, Matt Schaffer, has backed away from his previous support for consolidating the nation's nuclear-weapons production there.

Unfortunately, though the central theme of Stallings' "vision" is on the mark, not all of its elements are.

He is correct, for example, to say that cleanup and removal of nuclear waste should be INEL's top priority (item No. 1), and that efforts should continue to open the Waste Isolation Pilot Project in New Mexico (item No. 2).

But what's this, buried way down in item No. 22?

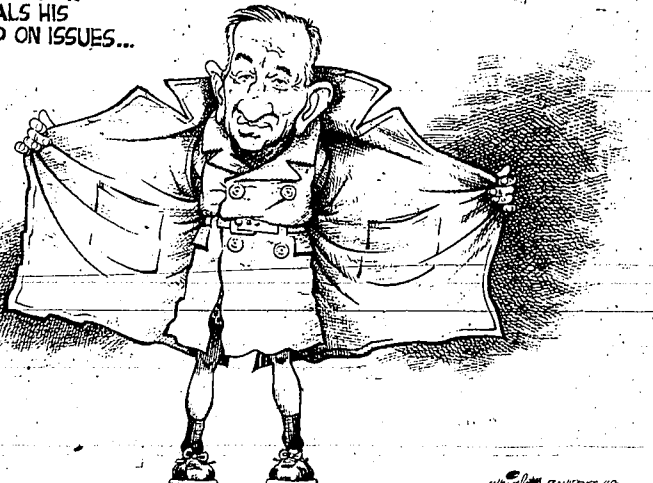
"Support designation of the INEL as the preferred site for the New Production Reactor if the need for such a facility can be justified in today's changing world."

The New Production Reactor, if it ever is built, would produce tritium, a key component of nuclear warheads. How Stallings can call for shifting INEL away from weapons production while supporting a bomb plant there is unclear.

Perhaps the key is that final clause: "if the need for such a facility can be justified in today's changing world." With the current oversupply of warheads, Stallings knows that's not likely to happen. Maybe he is merely appealing the NPR's diehard supporters by giving lip service to a dead issue.

Maybe. But the NPR's presence on Stallings' list is a blind spot in his "vision." He'd have been better off with an even two-dozen.

Problem with Snake is serious

The Middle Snake River is in serious trouble. Return flows from agriculture, hatchery effluent runoff from animal feeding operations and current and proposed hydropower facilities all threaten this critical resource. Without real efforts to cut nutrient and sediment loading, the river will continue to sicken and die. Yes, the Snake is a "working river," but if we continue to abuse it in the future as we have in the past, it simply won't work anymore.

Fortunately, some people are trying to help. The Middle Snake River Study Group has developed a proposal for a coordinated water resource management plan for the river as it passes through Twin Falls, Jerome, Lincoln and Gooding counties. Members of this group are to be commended for their efforts and initiative.

As citizens around the state seek to address the problem of securing both our natural resources and economic stability, they can look to the Middle Snake Group as an effective model. Their efforts demonstrate the possibilities for local control and inter-agency cooperation. If they can establish a working water resource management plan, it will be a major victory for the Magic Valley. Of course, a great deal of work remains, but at the very least, this group has made significant progress in moving local resource management from rhetoric to action. This is no small accomplishment.

I urge citizens in the four-county area to participate in the plan with their attendance and testimony at the public hearings scheduled to begin next week. I urge county commissioners and local government officials both up and downstream to play close attention to these efforts and to begin developing plans of their own.

The need for resource management is critical all along the river. I hope others will find the courage and commitment that members of the Middle Snake group have demonstrated. Our past was defined by our use of the Snake River; our future will be determined by our willingness and ability to protect it.

Don't make forest any worse

Once upon a time in the Twin Falls Ranger District of the Sawtooth National Forest, there was a small campground called Bear Gulch. A unique dirt road wound through the campground, there were groves of trees and a stream meandered down one side. There was a hand pump where sometimes you could get water. There were two old toilets up on a little knoll. You could camp among the trees on the grass. If there was a group, you could all park together in a grove of trees and share a campfire.

A few years ago, the Forest Service decided that Bear Gulch needed a facility. They thought it needed to be fancier and, of course, the vegetation needed to be protected. They assured us that you and your friends could still camp together and that it would be a no-fee campground. We grumbled and griped but did not lodge any formal complaints. The project was approved and a contractor was hired. He brought in bulldozers. He plowed wide swaths

through the campground and removed trees. He hauled in tons of gravel and truckloads of rocks to make sure the public didn't damage the vegetation.

The Bear Gulch Campground should have been renamed Bear Gulch RV Park. You now drive in on a wide gravel road, you follow the one-way signs, you park in a numbered spot on gravel in the sun away from the campfire and trees. Your friends will be camped at least 50 yards away.

If this is not bad enough, the Forest Service is now planning on bringing in more grading and moving equipment and putting in more little numbered parking places. Guess what? They are also now considering making this a fee campground to pay for the expense of making a park the people didn't want.

There's more. They are planning on spending thousands and thousands of dollars on the Porcupine Springs Campground to turn it into another park. They are also planning on building more little recreational vehicle parks in the Sawtooth Forest. I have talked to many people lately and have not found anyone who wants these parks built. Most people seem to favor the idea of being able to find a spot to get away from the crowds and camp in primitive campgrounds.

In these times of reduced funding to the Forest Service, it would seem prudent to abandon the idea of building fancy, expensive RV parks that the public doesn't want and instead allow camping to be dispersed in many small informal campgrounds. If you feel the way I do, I would suggest you write a letter to the Sawtooth National Forest and let them know how you feel.

Working together helps do away with excuses

In regard to the editorial on Friday, April 17:

The Department of Health and Welfare Family and Children Services team obviously doesn't need any "excuses." As the editorial pointed out, we already know (and have for some time) that their staffs "overworked and spread too thin" and that "follow-up of child abuse complaints is limited by manpower constraints."

So, what's the community's "excuse" for not seeing that the resources needed to protect children are available? Where were we when the Legislature passed one more budget without additional funding for child protection? Where were we when repeated requests for additional foster parents fell on deaf ears?

Indeed, where were we when many of us had an "uncasy" feeling about Amanda (or any other child)? Did we take the time to befriend her parents? Offer to provide care or encouragement when life got tough? Did we even call our legislators to let them know we want adequate funding?

According to news reports, there were four reports made to the Department of Health and Welfare. Does that mean that no one else suspected a problem? No other service — "provider," physician? "Crisis" center? Casual acquaintance? Family member?

Where were we? What's our excuse? Several groups in our community have developed innovative and effective programs to provide assistance to families identified as high risk for abuse and/or neglect. Federal funds are obtained to start the projects and test their effectiveness, then local funding must be secured.

I am thinking of South Central Community Action Agency's "Family Advocacy Project" and the Department of Health and Welfare's "Crisis Nursery Program" in particular. Both of these were found to be extremely effective in preventing abuse and in strengthening fragile families. They may be used as "models" for other communities around the nation, but state and/or local funding was "not available" for continuation here.

Some of us feel guilty because we know that we are not providing the best possible care for our community's "greatest treasure." We find that "we don't have time!" We tell ourselves that the case workers will take care of this responsibility and don't even notice the irony when we rail about paying higher taxes!

I know just how hard the Department of Health and Welfare staff works to protect

individual children. They are well aware of the potential for even more harm to a child if they make a mistake in judgment.

I appreciate them responding to calls on weekends and at night; for the long hours and for sleepless nights, when a legal loophole means that they must return a child to a home they know is unsafe when there isn't a choice about removing a child because no foster home is available.

Very few people can handle the stress of a job like theirs. My sincere thanks also to law enforcement staff, prosecutors, Guardian ad Litem volunteers, Community Child Protection Team members and those volunteers who participate in Department of Health and Welfare's "six-month reviews." These dedicated and compassionate members of our community deserve a helping hand instead of apathy periodically punctuated by anger when the system breaks down.

Sometimes we may avoid personal and professional involvement with families in trouble because it's painful to acknowledge our own reluctance to "get involved." We prefer to remain blind to the need and then lash out at whoever is handy when the "unthinkable" does happen.

We need to understand the frustrating pressures brought about by limited resources and legal constraints. Let's work together to make our community a safe place for children instead of alienating those on the front line.

As you said, "When the lives of kids are at stake, no excuses are acceptable."

4 groups sign truce in Bosnia-Herzegovina

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Leaders of Bosnia's three warring ethnic groups and the federal army signed a truce Thursday and agreed to resume talks on the republic's future.

The truce, negotiated by European Community envoy Lord Carrington and Portuguese Foreign Minister Joao de Deus Pinheiro, followed the fiercest fighting in Sarajevo in seven weeks of warfare across the republic.

Fighting in Bosnia has claimed more than 200 lives since the republic's majority Muslims and Croats voted for independence on Feb. 29. Serbs, who make up about a third of Bosnia's 4.4 million people, fiercely oppose independence, claim-

ing it will make them a minority in a Muslim state.

The fighting ebbed Thursday as leaders of Bosnia's Muslim, Croat and Serb factions, as well as the Serb-dominated federal army, gathered at Sarajevo's airport.

But sniper fire resumed as the signing commenced, forcing reporters and U.N. observers to take cover under parked cars. The shooting, from a predominantly Muslim district, appeared aimed at disrupting the signing.

Bosnia's president, Alija Izetbegovic, made an emotional appeal for peace as he signed the agreement on behalf of the republic's Muslims.

"I will do my best that the people respect" the cease-fire, Izetbegovic said. "It is my plea and my order."

In the agreement, the leaders pledged to respect an April 12 cease-fire that has been repeatedly violated, said Pinheiro, who currently holds the EC's rotating presidency.

Serb leader Radovan Karadzic told reporters after meeting with Carrington, that Bosnia's Serbs were "ready to sit down even in hell to get peace for this country." Karadzic has said he wants to form a separate state from Bosnia's Serb-populated areas.

South Korea issues warning

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea will limit trade and other exchanges with North Korea as long as the Communist state refuses to open its nuclear facilities to outside inspection, a top government official said Thursday.

The warning came amid growing strains between the two countries over the nuclear issue.

North Korea has promised to

open nuclear facilities to international inspection but has refused any inter-Korean inspections — a stance that Seoul says is aimed at hiding the development of nuclear weapons. The north denies it is working on atomic arms.

South Korean officials regard inter-Korean nuclear inspections as the most effective in deterring any nuclear development by North Korea.

de Klerk proposes elections

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — In a plan that would guarantee South Africa its first black leader, President F.W. de Klerk proposed Thursday to hold multi-racial elections for an interim presidency.

Saying the plan contains "the backbone of democracy," de Klerk provided the greatest detail yet on how he envisions moving from white domination to power-sharing with the 30 million black majority.

He told Parliament each political party would be able to nominate one candidate for a ruling Executive Council.

The top three to five vote-getters in national elections would sit on the council, with the chairman serving as state president. Chairmanship would rotate every six months, de Klerk said.

A multi-racial election would give the black majority voting rights for the first time and guarantee popular black leaders, such as Nelson Mandela, a seat on the council and thus the presidency.

There was no immediate comment from Mandela's African National Congress, the main black movement. The group's offices were closed for the day.

The ANC has traditionally opposed calls for a coalition government, saying a party that wins a majority should rule by itself.

The ANC and several other political groups negotiating with the government must agree before any transitional phase can go forward. Leading black and white parties have been working on a new constitution and plan to make a progress report next month.

De Klerk did not give a time frame for his proposal.

Russian strikes reveal medical system in crisis

MOSCOW (AP) — Doctors and ambulance medics staged warning strikes across Russia on Thursday and were threatening a full-scale protest against low wages, decrepit equipment and a shortage of medicines.

The strikes stem from a general collapse of the medical system as Russia struggles to move from a centrally planned to a market economy.

Russians, who for decades have been given free medical care, may now be forced to pay, and few have the money to spare. Government authorities are unable or unwilling to cope with the crisis, doctors say.

Strikes began Monday in eastern Russia, and on Friday, doctors from Moscow, St. Petersburg, Smolensk and Kaluga plan to picket the legislature in the capital, according to organizers and reports.

Ambulance workers in Moscow also plan to strike starting Monday, said Mikhail Kuzmenko, chairman of the Union of Medical Workers.

Dr. Leon M. Akopov, an organizer of the Moscow doctors' protest, said the city government had refused to negotiate doctors' demands to reorganize medical services.

Storms batter India

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — Storms tore through northern Bangladesh and northeastern India, killing at least 32 people and injuring 350 others, news reports said Thursday.

Winds of up to 80 mph damaged more than 5,000 tin-roofed houses, uprooted trees and knocked over electricity poles Wednesday in the Bangladeshi town of Mymensingh, 70 miles north of Dhaka, United News of Bangladesh reported.

The storm, which lasted about 25 minutes, left 20 people dead.

Man gains acquittal in accident deaths

BOISE — A Desmet man has been acquitted of federal manslaughter charges for the deaths of his wife and three Washington residents in a two-car accident on the Coeur d'Alene Indian Reservation.

George Alan Manybears, 28, was found innocent by a jury Wednesday after a trial before U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan in Boise. He faced up to 12 years in prison and \$1 million in fines if convicted on four felony counts.

Federal prosecutors accused Manybears of drunken driving in the Sept. 27, 1991, accident that killed his wife Nadine and Spokane residents Grace, Lynda and Diana Sittler. Mrs. Manybears was 7½ months pregnant at the time of the crash, and the unborn child also was killed, according to court documents.

State abandons part of Interstate 90

COEUR D'ALENE — The Idaho Transportation Department is abandoning a portion of Interstate 90 along Lake Coeur d'Alene in favor of another route.

At a hearing Wednesday, the Transportation Board heard a suggestion that it use the five miles of highway for recreation, including a bike and pedestrian trail.

During a presentation to the board, Idaho Falls consultant Dick Schwarz outlined his recommendations for the 5-mile stretch bordering Lake Coeur d'Alene's north shore.

Above all, disabled people should have adequate access to facilities or improvements along the roadway, Schwarz said.

Students favor detailed sex education

BOISE — Juniors-to-be at Centennial High School have been given their choice of sex education classes, and school officials say a majority selected the most-detailed option.

School officials said Wednesday 270 students, 53 percent, selected a class offering the most detailed instruction, including information about birth control and how some birth control methods reduce the risk of transmitting AIDS.

Less than half, 132 students, picked a track that won't offer detailed information about birth control and will teach that abstinence is the only sure way to avoid acquiring AIDS.

Woman pleads guilty to manslaughter

SANDPOINT — A 20-year-old Painhandle woman has pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter in the shooting death of an Okanogan man. The plea came after she married the victim's brother.

Karmanaha Jordan entered the plea after striking a bargain with Bonner County Prosecutor Phil Robinson that he will seek a sentence of just five years in prison, a third of the maximum allowed.

First District Judge James Michael accepted the plea over objections of relatives of victim Benjamin Meyers, saying there appears to be justification for the deal.

Stress disorder affects abuse victims

BOISE — Victims of violence and sexual abuse make up the largest population of "post-traumatic stress disorder" sufferers, a disorder usually associated with the Vietnam War.

"It's overwhelming to think we have that many people who are that potentially vulnerable and don't even know it," Rose Moore said Wednesday. She's executive director of the Ada County Abuse Prevention Program, a domestic violence treatment program.

In the last decade, specialists have noted similarities between PTSD and rape trauma syndrome and battered woman syndrome.

Micron wants action on dumping of chips

BOISE (AP) — Micron Technology Inc. has asked the U.S. government to block competitors in South Korea from dumping memory chips in this country.

The move Wednesday by the Boise microchip manufacturer is similar to action it pressed in mid-1985 against Japanese chip makers — a move the company says saved it from certain ruin.

Micron alleges that South Korean companies are engaging in illegal trade tactics by selling chips in the United States below production costs to gain market share and damage competitors.

"We believe certain Korean companies have targeted the U.S. market and have been selling below costs," said Micron spokesman Kipp Bedard.

He said Micron has invoices and other data to support its contentions. Bedard said memory-chips account for about 65 percent of Micron's annual sales, which were \$425.4 million in fiscal 1991.

Halting the alleged dumping "is

critically important for Micron... there's a lot at stake here," said Daniel Nelson, analyst with Seattle's Regen & MacKenzie.

Micron has eked out marginal profits the past two years while making enormous investments in new technology and processes, he said. Low prices could prove disastrous.

The effects of dumping — and resulting drop in prices — can be dramatic. After the Japanese began flooding U.S. markets with below-cost memory chips in 1985, nine of 11 domestic manufacturers of the chips quit the business.

The computer chips in question are called dynamic random access memory chips, or DRAMs. The slivers of silicon are the building blocks of a computer.

Micron officials find it particularly galling that South Korean companies might be dumping their products in the U.S., because the South Koreans tightly control their own market. High tariffs make South Korea virtually inaccessible to U.S. companies.

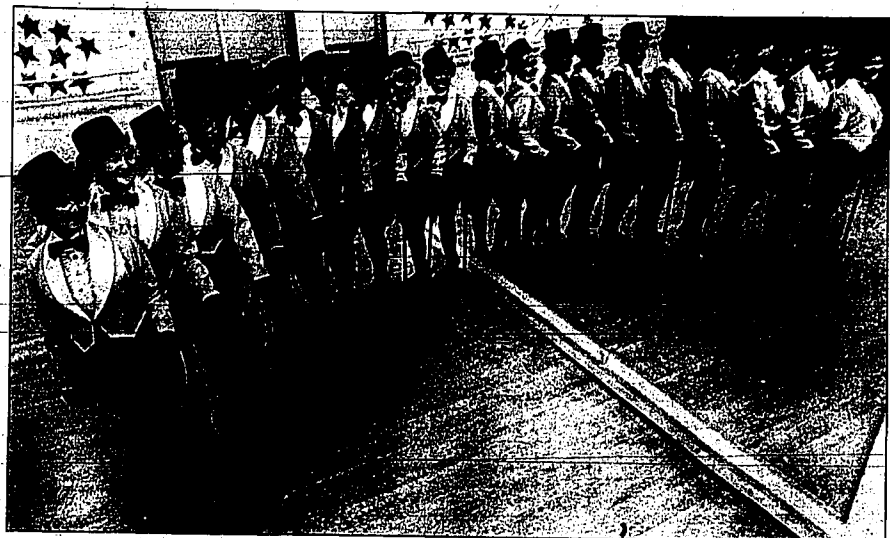

Elementary students flock to hear stories read aloud

KIMBERLY — Debbie Ginder doesn't play the fife, but kids in her neighborhood still consider her somewhat of a Pied Piper. A gaggle of grammar-school kids flock to her house nearly every day to listen to her read aloud from their favorite books. Although Ginder didn't intend to have a reading club when she began reading aloud to her son eight months ago, she's thrilled with her band of happy readers.

"I started out trying to read to my own son," Ginder recalls, "but he was always wanting to go out to play. I thought if I could just get all the other kids interested in it, my son would be more interested."

"So I invited his friends to come in and listen to the stories, too, and pretty soon I had a big group of the neighborhood kids coming in."

Some days I have three or four kids, some days I get as many as nine or 10," Ginder said. "There's one kid who is very faithful. He comes nearly every day."

Ginder's son, Marty, age 8, was having problems with reading when Ginder began her daily reading routine, said Kimberly Elementary School Chapter One reading

teacher Kathy Noh. But since his mom began reading aloud to him, his skills and way Marty responds to reading, Noh said. "He has increased motivation to learn.

When he gets stuck on something, he says, 'Wait, let me figure it out.' His vocabulary has improved, he understands story structure much better now, and he has a much stronger imagination."

Ginder said she, too, is impressed by how quickly Marty's skills improved once she began reading to him. And she thinks those skills have been augmented by the interest his neighborhood pals have shown in the after-school reading sessions.

"I think seeing other kids enjoy reading has really helped him," Ginder said. "He's really starting to take an interest in books and is much more interested in having me read to him."

Ginder said she reads about anything the kids ask for. A popular source of material has been the Boxcar Children mystery series, and a group of fourth-grade boys, led by her older son, Matthew, recently requested the Bo Jackson autobiography. She's currently reading aloud a biography of baseball great Jackie Robinson.

"But Ginder thinks the reading material is secondary to the experience the kids get of having someone take the time to read to them, and she said she feels the time out of her day is well spent.

Defector from Disney hails boom in animated films

LOS ANGELES — A golden age of animation is here, asserts Don Bluth, who broke away from Disney in 1979 to form his own company.

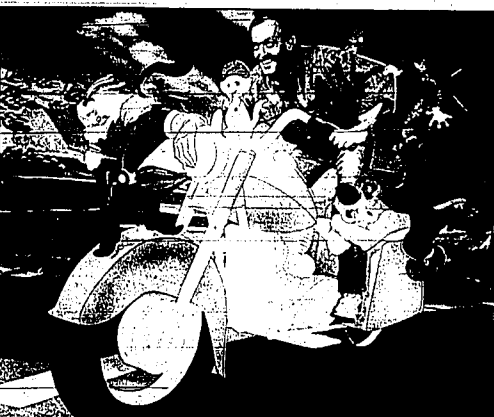
"I think animation is rejuvenated right now," the filmmaker said. "Basically, we as animators have started making better films. 'Beauty and the Beast' is the best example of that."

"Another thing is happening, and I think it's significant. We've always had the children's audience, the 4- to 10-year-olds. The second audience is their parents, who have always been loyal."

"With the last few Disney pictures you're seeing another audience: dating couples, who are now experiencing that romantic element, plus the music, which is right off the Broadway stage. It fills your soul with a lot of energy."

Teen-agers, however, typically consider such films "kids' stuff." Bluth hopes to corral that bunch with his new release, "Rock-a-Doodle," which combines the Chanticleer fable with a rock beat.

An important factor in the animation revival is the videocassette. Sales have been enormous. In announcing plans for the Oct. 30 video release of "Beauty and the Beast," Disney predicted it would be the biggest seller ever, passing the "Fantasia" record of 14.2 million.



Don Bluth rides with characters from 'Rock-a-Doodle.' "Parents have discovered that their children like to watch the pictures any time of day or night," Bluth remarked. "When we developed 'All Dogs Go to Heaven,' the initial theatrical release was not what we expected. But then we sold 5 million

cassettes." Bluth, a slender, blond, intense man, might still be a top Disney animator except in 1979 he and a few co-workers became disillusioned by the trend away from the principles established by Walt Disney.

"We felt that animation needed a resurgence, a shot in the arm," Bluth recalled. "We were just artists, we weren't sophisticated businessmen. But we knew that we weren't making those glorious pictures like 'Snow White' or 'Bambi' ... We tried to get it to happen within the Disney walls, but it didn't happen."

"So we decided to go somewhere else. Innocently and probably arrogantly, we jumped out of the studio and joined forces with a company called Aurora and produced 'The Secret of NIMH.' 'NIMH' filed at the box office (though it sold well in videocassettes), and the fledgling Bluth studio nosedived. Bluth recalls feeling "Oh, what have we done? We have sailed away from the Queen Mary in a dinghy in the fog!"

The fledgling studio was saved from extinction by making a couple of popular video games. Then, along came a white knight named Steven Spielberg who suggested joining forces for "An American Tail." Said Spielberg: "If we can keep the budget down to around \$9 million, I think we can make \$30 million."

Books entertain while teaching

Plenty of books are available to help teach young children concepts such as letters, numbers, seasons, colors and basic vocabulary.

"Red Bear" by Bodel Rikys (Dial, \$11) tells in 11 words the story of the cheerful title character's colorful day.

Red Bear wakes and dresses (blue pants, yellow shirt, purple socks, brown shoes), feeds milk (white) to his cat (black), then has a day of fun (with four others colors) until he curls up for sleep beneath a patchwork quilt.

This is a first book for Rikys, who is an artist and interior designer. The full-color artwork was prepared, using India ink and oil pastels.

Reviews

More concepts come to light in "Tail Toes Eyes Bars Noses" by Marilee Robin Burton (Harper-Trophy, \$4.95), a new paperback edition of the 1988 book.

This guessing-game book of 13 words highlights eight familiar animals, first displaying the five, certain body parts of each, then other combinations that build to a cumulative surprise.

Who has a long tail? A pointy nose? Floppy ears? Sharp minds will note the ears (hidden) and tail (?) on two of the animals.

The new "Molly's Seasons" by Ellen Kandoian (Cobblehill Books, \$15) takes on the difficult task of explaining how seasons vary around the world - in rhymed couplets. It's really two stories in one, beginning with "The sun and the snow, the wind and the rain." Bring signs of the seasons to Molly in Maine.

After the year in review, from fall to summer, we find Molly in the classroom wondering, "Are the seasons the same wherever you go?" And the answer is "No."

Kandoian illustrates places farthest north and south, near the equator, and the Southern Hemisphere. A final page offers a more academic explanation, for children who want to know why, why, why.

A simpler, poetic book with images of the four seasons is "Caps, Hats, Socks and Mittens" by Louise Borden (Scholastic, \$3.95 paperback) with illustrations by Lillian Hoban. Simple, straightforward sentences accompany humorous watercolor illustrations of familiar scenes of seasonal activities.

We begin with "Winter is caps, hats, socks and mittens," as children dress to go outdoors. Also red sleds and hot cocoa and snug coats.

Next, "Spring is mud to dig. Mud to dig. Mud on my hands. Mud on my pants. Mud in my pan. Mud in my can. A mud song!"

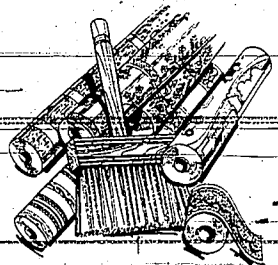
Hard as that pan to dirt is to beat, summer brings hot weather and hot dogs and autumn brings pumpkins and spicy smells and colors. Time flies through the book, but you always can go back to the beginning.

Garrison Keillor brings radio to the stage, fits show to Idaho

BOISE — In our visually-totally-televised world, little is left to the imagination. That is what makes "Garrison Keillor's American Radio Company" such a delight.

"I went into radio because it was my dream since I was a little boy to be infatigable," Keillor told one interviewer. And to another: "There's no romance on television; it's just the Walk-Man of the mind. Radio is infinitely sexier."

So what happens when even Keillor for 15 live, on stage and there before your very eyes? I wasn't sure what to expect last Saturday when Keillor brought his show to the Morrison Center at Boise State University as part of the radio company's 1992-1993 tour.

"Sure, I'd seen pictures of the tall, bespectacled, red-necked" Keillor. Everyone in the sold-out Morrison Center knew exactly who he was when he walked out on stage for a 15-minute "warm-up" before the broadcast began.

But it's that "melodious" butter-scrunch baritone voice that really distinguishes Keillor. Warm and firm, witty and very folksy, he looks at life in the minutiae.

Precisely at 4 p.m., the Coffee Club Orchestra played the show's theme. Keillor tapped his toe in time as he sang the familiar words:

"I hear that old piano from down the avenue,
I smell the onions, I look around for you
My sweet old someone coming through that door

'The Babe' stays too controlled

HOLLYWOOD — George Herman "Babe" Ruth has always seemed too much of a subject for movies to handle: too big, bumptious and prodigiously skilled, too rude and gloriously unfettered. And "The Babe" is only the latest in a line of failed attempts to tame or capture his spirit.

Review

It's a movie somewhat undone by its own hero worship. Intelligent, well-intentioned, highly professional in all areas, it still can't capture its subject — the legendary New York Yankees home-run king — because it's too bent on arguing his case. It tries to clean up the Sultan of Swat — not in the squeaky-clean, bowdlerized fashion of the pallid, pulpy 1942 "The Babe Ruth Story," but in a more knowing, modern manner.

The film doesn't shy away from the "dark" side of Ruth's history: the Rabelaisian gastronomic and sexual orgies that accompanied his first blast of fame. But it sometimes seems to overapologize for those peccadilloes and squelch every bet. These filmmakers want us to "understand" the Babe. But how can you truly comprehend a force of nature, swaggering gifted "natural" — probably the best pitcher in base-

ball before he turned hitter-outfielder and demolished the home-run records — Ruth doesn't need alibi. Watching "The Babe" — with its careful period decor, well-researched script, sumptuous Haskell Wexler lighting and sincere, well-crafted direction by Arthur Hiller — is like watching a highly professional but dull baseball game where the

runners are being bunted from base to base. No one is going for the fences — though John Goodman, who's playing Ruth, is more than capable of it.

In many ways, Goodman is perfect for this role. An athlete himself, he's been made up to an uncanny likeness of Ruth; he's worked hard at capturing the persona, the mannerisms, even the left-handed batting and pitching stances. Ruth was a natural clown and so is Goodman; a graver, more cerebral clown, but someone who really understands the big man's joys and demons, the massive appetites driving him on.

Yet Goodman has a tendency to play against his size, rein himself in. His great movie performances to date have been "Baron," "L.A. Confidential," "Raising Arizona," where he's kept volcanic passions mostly under control — and that reticence sometimes works against him here, because the movie itself is too controlled.

Beginning in the boys school, St. Mary's, where Ruth's Baltimore tavern-keeper dad incarcerated him, allegedly for truancy, "The Babe" tenderly presents his life as a pageant. We see all the famous anecdotes — the "dotted shot" in the 1932 series, the "guaranteed" homer for bedridden Johnny Sylvester — and we meet colorful or famous figures, sometimes for only a second or two.

Bringing Buffalo Bill back to life on stage is work of actor-historian

KETCHUM — One of America's first true celebrities, "Buffalo Bill" Cody helped shape the nation's view of the Wild West, making a national symbol of the cowboy and his independent lifestyle.

Cody was one of the most influential men of his time, a friend of both presidents and Indian chiefs. A Civil War hero and Pony Express rider, he translated his fame into a vast empire of working ranches, resorts and touring theatrical troupes. Yet he died penniless, the victim of unscrupulous businessmen.

"He wanted to be remembered as a pioneer and a developer of civilization," said actor/historian Eric Sorg, a leading Cody scholar who lives in Laramie, Wyo.

Sorg's one-man show, "Cody! An Evening with Buffalo Bill," will be performed Thursday at The Community Library in Ketchum. Sponsored by the Idaho Humanities Council, the 7 p.m. show is free and open to the public.

Since becoming enamored with Cody's story nearly 20 years ago, Sorg, a professional actor and historian, has spent much of his career studying the myths and realities of the famous showman's life. His master's thesis at the University of Wyoming investigated the myths and symbolism of Buffalo Bill.

"Like the precepts of Cody's life—honesty, integrity, duty to home and country, treating all men as equals," Sorg explained.

"His story is set up like a classic tragedy. The very things that made him so admirable—were also the things that destroyed him."

Costumed in a gentlemanly three-piece suit cut to the 1880s era, Sorg portrays the tall and dashing Bill Cody in his life-story-dramatizing how an Army scout and buffalo hunter became widely recognized as the mythological "Buffalo Bill."

Much as actor-celebrities like Madonna and Robert Redford are better known for who they really are, so Cody became known for his Buffalo Bill stage roles and the dime novels that were written about him. "When he started the Wild West

cowboys and Indians, Sorg estimates that as many as 70 million people attended the circus-like performances, which at times featured Chief Joseph, Annie Oakley and Wild Bill Hickock.

The success of the Wild West, and the real estate investments made with its profits, proved to be Cody's undoing, according to Sorg. He became a virtual slave to banks, lawyers and investors for the remainder of his life.

"He was felled by a lot of people, and yet it didn't really bother him," Sorg said. "He still believed in the basic goodness of people. He was the ultimate Boy Scout."

Sorg's two-hour play, which has been reviewed as "a fascinating story told by a riveting storyteller," has had more than 400 performances nationwide. Its 10-city tour of Idaho this spring includes shows in Rexburg, Idaho Falls, Horseshoe Bend, Idaho City and Garden Valley.

Special news shows take kids seriously

NEW YORK — As there is a human skeleton hanging in Peter Jennings' office and, no, it's not the remains of an unlucky producer on his "ABC World News Tonight" broadcast.

Jennings, news anchor for 15 million viewers every weeknight, is too nice a man to do that.

"The skeleton," he explains, "is for the five, 90-minute news special for kids he will moderate this Saturday morning — 'Prejudice: Answering Children's Questions.'"

The skeleton is to show children — and any adults who are watching — that underneath their skin, human beings are pretty much alike.

"We talk about racism all the time. What we should talk about is skin-ism," Jennings said.

Preparing for the program, he said, taught him all sorts of interesting things, including his discovery last week that "transparent" adhesive bandage strips don't really work for people of color.

"I've learned little things about what people have to endure, time and time again," he said.

Why make a news special for a young viewers and risk losing them to the cartoon competition on Saturday morning?

"That's where the kids are," Jennings replied. "And I actually think we'll end up talking to adults."

"One of the things I think we're discovering is that if you deal with children at a fairly sophisticated level, their parents look and listen over their shoulders," he said. "That's what we learned in the Gulf War."

On Jan. 26, 1991, in the second week of the allied air war against Iraq, Jennings moderated a live, 90-minute, Saturday morning news special titled "War in the Gulf: Answering Children's Questions."

Jennings said children had been frightened by a war they saw break out on television, seemingly on their doorsteps. Adults haven't adequately explained that the bloodshed was happening thousands of miles away. Jennings, walking across ABC's huge floor-and-wall map of the region, did just that, "without talking down to his audience. 'Can Saddam Hussein bomb us?' a child asked him."

"No, No, no," Jennings replied. "Do all you kids understand that Saddam Hussein can do a lot of bad things, but he cannot bomb us in the United States. His missiles can't get here. And his aircraft can't get here."

Jennings, the father of a 9-year-old boy and a 12-year-old girl, was justly praised for his unforced, unpatronizing explanations.

Idaho banks have healthy 1st quarter

The Times-News and The Associated Press

Statewide, Idaho's 22 banks earned \$100.89 million during the last quarter of 1991 - a 6.8 percent increase from the year before ...

TWIN FALLS - Locally owned banks continued their strong, conservative performance in 1991, with few signs of weakness and lots of strength. All locally owned banks were profitable in 1991, and most maintained a high core capital to assets ratio, a key indicator of bank stability. Of the state, regional and national banks with branches in the Magic Valley, only Bank of America-Idaho lost money. Statewide, Idaho's 22 banks earned \$100.89 million during the last quarter of

1991. That's a 6.8 percent increase from the year before, which was under the national average. Other measures of growth, however, pointed to continued strength, according to a report from Sheshunoff Information Services Inc., an Austin, Texas, firm that monitors the industry. Nationally, banks earned \$17.6 billion, an 11 percent increase from fourth-quarter

1991, Sheshunoff said. In other areas of growth, Idaho ranked: First among the 50 states and the District of Columbia in asset growth; a 13.7 percent gain during the quarter, to \$9.76 billion. The U.S. average was a 1.3 percent gain. First in percentage change in the total value of loans. State banks reported a 14.1 percent increase in loans, to \$6.59 billion.

National average: down 2.6 percent. Last in the percentage of all loans that are financially troubled. Of the state's total loans, some 0.87 percent were nonperforming. In terms of the total dollar value of troubled loans, the state ranked 48th. Tenth in return on average assets, a key measure of financial health. The state's 22 banks averaged 1.08 percent, far ahead of the 0.53 percent U.S. average. Nineteen of the state's banks, or 86.4 percent, were profitable during the quarter compared with 89 percent across the nation. West One Bank was the most profitable, with \$43.7 million in income.

Ducharme, 35, of Jerome is free on bond awaiting a May 4 preliminary hearing in the death of Jerome resident Lou Cabrera, 43. Authorities say Ducharme found his wife and Cabrera together in a mobile home in Jerome Monday night. Idaho law says a husband or wife is not competent to testify against the other in a criminal proceeding. "Horgan won't say if that will hinder his case, only that he will address the law at the preliminary hearing."

Filer trustees seek tax levy for septic system at Hollister

FILER - Filer School Board members will put a \$60,000 supplemental tax levy before the public on Tuesday, May 19. If passed, the funds will go toward a new septic system at Hollister, which is now estimated to cost \$55,000. The remaining \$5,000 will cover the costs for a fire alarm system in the building housing the elementary school. The condition of the Hollister septic system requires immediate action, according to Scott McClure of McClure Engineering. The district will advertise for bids on the project.

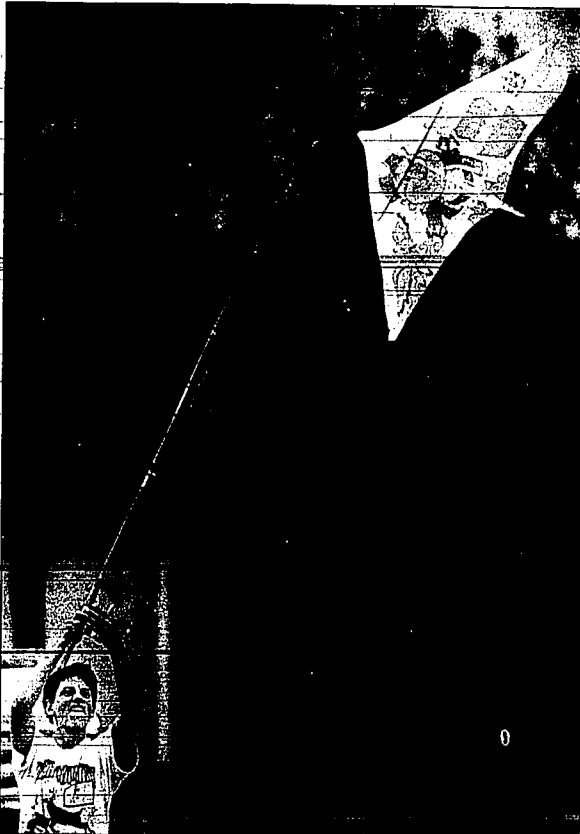

If you're allergic to peanuts, watch that ice cream

PORTLAND, Ore. - Several brands of chocolate ice cream sold in the West may contain a peanut protein that could trigger a fatal allergy and should not be eaten by anyone allergic to peanuts, an industry official said. A peanut product containing the protein may have been inadvertently added to the ice cream batches, which are being recalled by Kraft General Foods, company spokeswoman Linda Eallerton said. A Twin Falls grocer said Thursday they do not know whether the brands of ice cream they sell use Kraft products. "This is one of the most serious food allergies there is," said Dr. John D. O'Hallaren, of the Allergy Immunology Clinic in Portland. Symptoms include

swelling in the mouth or throat, followed by hives. In some cases, the throat swells shut, and the person may go into shock and die, O'Hallaren said. The ice cream is sold under the brands Knudsen, Stater Bros., Stater Bros. Deluxe and peanuts, an industry official said. Knudsen Nice 'n Light ice milk. The ice creams are sold by major food chains in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California, Montana, Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Hawaii, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Utah and Wyoming. Kraft issued the recall Wednesday after engineers discovered the possible mixup. No other flavors are affected, and people who are not allergic to peanuts may eat the ice cream safely, Eallerton said. The recall should be complete by May 15.

Judge rejects Stafford motion; sentencing set

TWIN FALLS - A judge will soon decide whether or not a \$427 scam is enough to send Twin Falls veterinarian David J. Stafford to prison. Fifth District Magistrate John F. Varin of Fairfield denied a request by Stafford's attorney for a new trial. He will preside over a sentencing hearing this afternoon for a charge of grand theft by deception, which carries a maximum sentence of 14 years in prison.

Hearing focuses on Albion school plans

ALBION - Can the campus of Albion State Normal School be reborn as a state park?

The public will be asked on Saturday to generate ideas on how to make a state park of the Albion campus a successful venture at what State Rep. Jim Kempton describes as a combination work session and public hearing.

The hearing is from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Albion Grange and is being sponsored by the Idaho Parks and Recreation Department, which administers a \$25,000 grant awarded by the 1991 Idaho Legislature for a general development plan.

Kempton cautioned that completion of the plan does not guarantee the campus will be designated a state park, but says it is a big step in the right direction.

The city of Albion has offered to give the grounds to the state free of charge if the state will operate a state park there, Kempton said.

Saturday's hearing will be followed by a second meeting in Boise, and the Albion Campus Centennial Commission plans to have a draft of the general development plan ready to share with the school's alumni organization when they meet on the campus in June.

The commission will present the plan to the Parks and Recreation Board at a meeting later in the summer.

The oldest building on campus is being restored and work is being completed on Kempton said.

The 1893 building caught the eye of the director of the Idaho Commission on the Arts when Kempton took her on a tour of the campus.

The commission has funded the restoration with matching funds from the state. The project has cost about \$60,000 so far, and another \$5,000 grant has been requested this year to finish the job.

The building will open next year on the one hundredth anniversary of its construction. It will be used for folk art exhibitions. The only other exhibition center in the western United States which is devoted to folk art is in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Kempton said.

The Albion campus entered the spotlight two years ago when the Cassia County Centennial Commission nominated it to become a state park. The Department of Parks and Recreation and the Albion Campus Centennial Commission funded a feasibility study which was done by the Idaho State University College of Business.

The study determined the campus was within a three-hour drive of more resources than any other location in the northwest.

Resources include the Hagerman Fossil Beds, the City of Rocks, the Snake River Plains area, Fort Hall and Lake Walcott to mention a few, Kempton said.

Through Kempton's efforts, the 1992 Idaho Legislature has asked the federal government to recognize the Albion campus as a National Historic Landmark. The Idaho Historical Society will submit the request, Kempton said, and a decision should be made within six months.

Two of Albion State Normal School's most prominent graduates are Terrel Bell, former U.S. Secretary of Education and Anna Hansen Hayes, who helped restore Japan's educational system after World War II.

Area residents who are working with Kempton on the Albion Campus Centennial Commission are alumni association president Keith Amende, Albion Mayor Don Danner, Norman Hurst, Weldon Beck, Vard Chatburn, John Evans Sr., Shirley Clark, Mybelle Pierce and Al Kempton.

Filer parents, teachers stop trimester idea

FILER - Filer School Board members decided against blurring into a trimester system after parents and teachers complained the proposal just wouldn't work.

One teacher, Larry Larson, who objected to the proposal, said the board had not done enough homework on the proposal to make such a big change in classes.

In fact, so many showed up at the board's recent meeting protesting the switch to trimesters, school officials were forced to move the meeting to the school's library.

The trimester proposal would allow a student to complete 60 credits instead of 56 during high school.

It also would break the school year into three twelve-week periods, instead of four nine-week periods. Each day would have five 70-minute classes, rather than seven 50-minute classes.

Larson, who teaches band, said he had concerns about the longer class periods. Larson goes from the high school to the middle school and also travels to Hollister.

He said he could not reach the number of students he does now with the trimester system because he would have less time to travel.

He also expressed concern that there wasn't enough information from school districts similar in size to Filer currently using the system.

One parent, Rudy Walker, said he agreed with Larson, adding such a large change should be given more consideration than just a month or two.

School Board Chairman Dave Annis said nothing was certain yet.

"Just because we take a look doesn't mean we will cast it in stone," he said. Later in the evening, board members decided to take no action on the trimester proposal.

In other business: Athletic fees and season passes have been raised for the next school year. The fee for an athletic card was previously \$20, with an additional \$5 for each sport. It will now be a flat fee of \$25. A family season pass will go from \$70 to \$100, with a half-

season pass increasing from \$45 to \$70.

Superintendent James Fisher said the school will have to adopt a sexual harassment policy in the near future. He also said Legislators have done away with the 90 percent attendance rule, so the board will also have to make some decision regarding that issue before the next school year.

Three high school girls involved in Future Homemakers of America did well enough at the state competition to qualify for the nationals in Chicago, Ill., this summer.

Students will get out of school two days earlier than anticipated this spring since classes were not cancelled over the winter due to bad weather.

USU smokers burn over measure mandating buildings be smoke-free

LOGAN, Utah (AP) - State Rep. Fred Hunsaker, R-Logan, said he would rethink his support of a bill banning smoking in state-owned buildings if he had a chance.

Hunsaker, vice president for administrative affairs at Utah State University, was confronted by more than 100 angry protesters Wednesday who had learned the measure, which goes into effect Sunday, does not allow for accommodations such as separate smoking areas.

The "indignation protest" was held in The Briar, a snack-bar and popular study area in USU's Taggart Student Center. It is one of the few places on campus smokers can still light up.

Eugene A. Simmons, curator and director of special collections at USU, history was repeating itself. Simmons, a smoker, said he was one of the students who participated in

the great smoke-in of 1965 where USU administrators were pressured to allow smoking in The Briar.

Dangerous Hanford tank vents gas again

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) - A radioactive waste tank considered the most dangerous at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation has vented gas again, the Westinghouse Hanford Co. said Thursday.

A statement by the Energy Department contractor said tank 101-SY released hydrogen and nitrogen without incident for five to six hours Monday night. Less gas was released than in the last burp from the tank in December.

Tank 101-SY is the most dangerous at the site because of the possibility it might explode and release radiation, Westinghouse Hanford officials have said.

Scowcroft touts Bush's new order

PROVO, Utah (AP) - National security adviser Brent Scowcroft says that in the emerging new world order, the United States should remain involved in foreign politics, economics and security.

"The United States has neither the inclination or the ability to be the world's policeman," Scowcroft said.

"But, only the United States can mobilize and lead the world community against acts of international aggression and lawlessness."

Scowcroft spoke before a record crowd of 16,070 at commencement exercises at Brigham Young University Thursday. Degrees were conferred on 4,762 graduates.

Scowcroft, an Ogdan native who was national security adviser under former President Gerald Ford and held the post again under President Bush, was presented an honorary doctor of public service degree by BYU President Rex Lee.

"The United States is affected daily by decisions and events around the globe," Scowcroft said.

"Interdependence is not a policy. It is an inescapable fact of our existence," Scowcroft said.

A new world order will appear, he said. The question is the significance of the United States' role in shaping the nature of that order.

Heyburn city fathers OK new zone for repair, craft shop

HEYBURN - The Heyburn City Council approved the rezoning from residential to commercial property owned by Terry Brinkerhoff at 620 14th Street at its meeting Wednesday night.

Brinkerhoff told the council he wants to operate a small engine repair and wood craft shop adjacent to his home. The council questioned its role in zoning matters and asked Paul Aston, the city's zoning board coordinator, to review the regulations and make recommendations to the council.

The council voted to place guard rails at drain ditches on four streets, O, J, 18th and 21st and to hire Forsgren and Associates of Rexburg to do the engineering work for railroad crossing arms to be placed at three locations in Heyburn.

Mayor Glen Loveland appointed councilman Harry Badger to serve on a committee being formed to build a new

animal shelter in Minidoka County. Loveland and Badger participated in a tour of the shelter at the county landfill last week when Mayor Bill Whitton asked each mayor to appoint a council member to the animal shelter committee.

Loveland, reporting on the shelter tour, said, "It is a sad situation. I certainly wouldn't want to have a dog out there. After 15 seconds in the place, you need a gas mask."

Everyone pretty much decided we don't want to build a "Hound Hilton," but we certainly do need an adequate facility," said Badger. "The conditions there are deplorable. There were about 30 dogs in four cages.

Stan Peters told the council lots of dogs are running around in his neighborhood and suggested all dogs should have their shots and licenses.

City attorney Steven Tuft said the city's limit is three dogs per owner, and people with more dogs must get a kennel license.

Peters said there are residences

in his neighborhood that exceed the three dog limit.

Councilwoman Hurtless reminded Heyburn residents they must purchase a dog license each year. She said some people think they only have to buy a license one time.

Acting Police Chief Earl Andrews reported vandalism has sharply decreased since the city re-established a 10 p.m. curfew.

He said he had the department's shot guns repaired. The guns would hold only one shell and ejected additional shells out the bottom after the first shell was fired. Andrews said the guns had never worked.

City Superintendent Al Hodge reported the city's new sewer treatment plant is working effectively.

He said the plant achieved an 89 percent removal rate after four days, and now the removal is 94 percent.

Loveland appointed Hodge chairman of Heyburn's cleanup day on May 2, from 10 a.m. until 12 noon.

Young fish numbers show huge increase early

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) - Unusually large numbers of young steelhead and salmon are appearing on the Columbia River system collection sites early in the fish-hauling season, the Army Corps of Engineers said Thursday.

Since April 1, 900,000 juvenile fish have been moved by truck or barge on the Columbia and lower Snake rivers, compared with 360,000 a year earlier.

If the trend continues, the total fish year could exceed the 15 million fish that were hauled in 1992 and possibly the record of 20 million in 1990, said John McKern, the passage program manager. "We just don't know. The fish could be traveling earlier this year and the totals could drop off," McKern said.

He estimated there are 25 million to 26 million young hatchery-bred and wild fish above Lower Granite Dam on the Snake River and 40 million between Lower Granite and McNary Dam on the Columbia River.

Young fish taken from collection pens at the two dams are transported by truck or barge to the Bonneville Dam, the last artificial obstacle on the Columbia on the way to the Pacific Ocean.

The fish hauling is intended to increase survival rates of salmon and steelhead.

Informant says case was undercover

BOISE (AP) — Drug informant Lamonte Duane Jack said Thursday convincing another informant he and a "sheriff friend" planned a robbery was the only way to get information needed to stop a Nampa drug dealer.

"He had to believe we'd take the cash," the Boise man said during the ninth day of trial for himself and Idaho County Sheriff Randy Baldwin on robbery, drug and handgun charges before U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge.

Jack, 46, and Baldwin, 37, were arrested last Dec. 20 for allegedly trying to steal marijuana, cocaine and a safe containing \$7,500 cash from a Nampa house where they thought drugs were being sold.

Boise attorney Thomas Borresen closed the defense case Thursday. U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge said he would instruct the jury and hear closing arguments Friday morning and wanted the case turned over to jurors by noon.

During questioning by Assistant U.S. Attorney Kim Lindquist, Jack

said Dean Lady, a Boise man he recruited to be federal drug informant, would only have provided information about "druggies" if money was involved.

In the case of the Nampa dealer, Jack said he believed he needed to pump Lady for information by raising the prospect of sharing whatever cash could be stolen.

He said he never actually intended to take money or drugs, but only to scatter drugs around the house as part of a "911 scheme."

Federal and state officials testified earlier that Lady informed them Jack and an unidentified sheriff had robbed other drug dealers at

gunpoint, tied them up and scattered drugs around for police to find after being led to the address by an anonymous 911 emergency call.

Jack said Thursday that his mistake was telling Lady the friend he had conducted previous 911 operations with was a sheriff, and he agreed with defense attorney Keith Roark that the claim was "a clear, baldfaced lie."

Jack acknowledged that Baldwin "would have probably been upset" if he had known about the lie, but was unsure whether the sheriff would still have traveled from Grangeville to Nampa-to-help stop the drug dealer.

The informant said he called Baldwin rather than local or federal drug agents because the sheriff had treated him better during a previous operation in California than almost any law officer he had known.

"He's the only one I knew who would listen to me," Jack said. "I knew he was the only one who would believe me, instantly."

Jack said he was carrying guns at the Nampa house for "personal security," and assumed, but was not sure, Baldwin also had a gun. But he said neither man intended to take drugs or money from the house.

"That was never even thought of, let alone talked of," he said.

Jack said he was aware Baldwin was interested in getting forfeited assets from convicted dealers to help fight drugs in Idaho County.

But he agreed with Roark that personally, Baldwin was "a man of almost painful simplicity. Not interested in worldly goods in the least."

Board frees woman who dragged man to death

BOISE (AP) — A Caldwell woman sentenced to up to 10 years in prison for dragging her boyfriend to death has been freed after serving just a year of her sentence.

Verna Simons, 49, won commutation of her sentence to time served from the state Commission on Pardons and Parole, which is meeting this week at the prison complex south of Boise. Her release was immediate.

Simons had pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter in the 1984 death of J.D. Jameson, 26. Police said her blood-alcohol content was more than 2½ times the level considered legally drunk.

But she appealed the conviction on various grounds, including a claim that she should have been charged with drunk-related vehicular manslaughter, and at one point sued authorities for more than \$1 million for violating her civil rights.

That court maneuvering finally ended on April 26, 1991, when 3rd District Judge Jim Doolittle revoked her bond and ordered her to begin serving the sentence. She had spent less than a week in jail immediately after her arrest.

The board also slashed 10 years from the 55-year sentence of convicted double-murderer Patrick Hall, 36, of Rexburg. The decision makes Hall eligible for parole.

Even without it, Hall would complete his sentence in five more years.

Hall was convicted of second-degree murder in the September 1982 shooting deaths of Ray Chavez of Sugar City and his son Richard. He was sentenced to 20 years each for the murders, 10 years for injuring a third man and five years for using a gun in the crimes. The sentences were ordered served consecutively.

Hall's previous requests for commutations had been rejected by the board because he had yet to exhaust judicial attempts to reduce his sentence. But 7th District Judge Grant Young recent cut 10 years off the sentences, and the board agreed to reduce them by another 10.

Over the past decade, Hall had an exemplary disciplinary record in the prison system and has obtained letters of support for his release from prominent citizens in the Rexburg area.

His defenders maintained that Hall's judgment was impaired during the 1982 fight by alcohol and drugs and that there is now little or no chance of a recurrence.

They also maintain that Young would be eligible for release after 10 years when he imposed the original 55-year sentence.

South refused the first heart but West was not fooled. East's play of the heart trey told West that there was no future in continuing hearts.

Instead West switched to a club and dummy's queen won. South then cashed his king and queen of trumps, led to dummy's club ace and ruffed a club. A trump to dummy's ace drew East's last trump, and South led a heart to his ace and exited with the heart jack, putting West on lead.

It was now that South made his fatuous claim about the diamonds. Had West cashed his ace and led a diamond, South's dream would have come true. However, West was not about to surrender. Instead he led a low diamond, and when East's diamond jack forced an honor from South, it was South who had to lead away from his remaining honor. This gave West two diamond tricks to go with two hearts — down one, thanks to an alert defense by West.

'Real country music' blazes amazing trail into Country Music Awards

You don't have to be hit upside the head with a two-by-four to know that country music is the hottest thing going. Starting in the mid-'80s with "new traditionalists" like George Strait and Randy Travis, country has been picking up steam and has broken into the mainstream.

We like to think back, not so fondly, to the late-'70s when country had another big resurgence. But most of the fuss then was over the bands on the soundtrack of "Urban Cowboy" and the country-pop sounds by the likes of Kenny Rogers and Dolly Parton. It had more to do with the lifestyle and clothes than the music.

But take a look at 1992: Garth Brooks is on the cover of Time magazine. And it is Garth Brooks with the No. 1 album on the pop charts, not Mariah Carey or Michael

Jackson. It's amazing. And it's all more-or-less real country music, people just singing and playing the guitar.

When you look at the nominees for "The 27th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards" (airing live, Wednesday, April 29, on NBC), you'll see men and women who basically sing and play music. Sure, there's a little glitz, but the event and the nominees are primarily about the music itself. Clint Black, Lorrie Morgan and Travis Tritt host the awards, and all are nominees themselves.

Tritt, whose songs range from blue-collar anthems like his 1989 hit "Country Club" to his current hit "Here's a Quarter (Call Someone Who Cares)," attributes the current popularity of country music to the times he grew up in as well as the times we live in.

"I know Garth and Clint and me all listened to the greats growing up,

George Jones, Merle Haggard, Johnny Cash ... but we were also listening to the Eagles and Fleetwood Mac and Lynyrd Skynyrd, and bands like that," he explains.

"So you have the artists bringing these contemporary influences into their music."

Amanda Plummer: A woman of few words, little rest

—LOS ANGELES— Amanda Plummer's idea of acting heaven? Going straight from her featured role in "The Fisher King" to the Hall of Fame presentation "Miss Rose White."

D "I hate holidays," says Miss Plummer, who stars in the NBC drama airing at 8 p.m.-MDT Sunday. "I like to keep working."

The actress plays Lusia, Rose White's long-lost sister who was killed in the Holocaust. Her identity arrives in New York. Her arrival stirs suppressed feelings of guilt and remorse in a family scarred by Nazi atrocities.

In "The Fisher King," she played the reticent Lydia, Robin Williams' love interest. Lusia is another woman of few words.

"She was sick and her mother stayed behind to take care of her while her father and sister fled Europe," Miss Plummer said. "Her mother died in the Nazi death camps and she has this tremendous burden of guilt. She feels responsible for her mother's death."

She also is holding in all this anger because she doesn't know quite where to point the finger. It's easy to say Hitler is responsible. But it's difficult to speak out when it's another member of your family. Yet she has to confront the fact that she feels her father abandoned them."

Kyra Sedgwick plays the "all-American girl" Rose White, and Maximilian Schell plays their father, Mordechai Weiss. Also featured in the cast are Maureen Stapleton, Milton Seltzer, Penny Fuller and D.B. Sweeney.

Joseph Sargent directed from a screenplay by Anoua Sandor, based on the Off-Broadway play "A Shayna Maidel" by Barbara Lebow.

Many other conflicts come into play in "Miss Rose White." The father has neglected Rose, but is unable to tell her that her physical resemblance to her mother is a painful reminder of his guilt for leaving her behind in Europe. Mordechai is outraged when he learns Rose has changed her name and seems to be abandoning her Jewish heritage.

"There is nothing Machiavellian about these people," Miss Plummer said. "No one knows what's going to come out of someone's mouth next. That's why everyone is reluctant to speak. I think this is a family people can identify with, whether they've been through a war or not."

Lusia has lost her own identity. She became just a number in the camp. She needs to deal with her past by talking about it, but her father doesn't want her to remember the past."

Miss Plummer, a Tony Award winner for her performance in "Agnes of God," joined the "Miss Rose" cast and crew last summer in Richmond, Va.

Calling any idle period between filming a "dry season," she says she prefers to work continually. So from "Miss Rose," she took a role in an American Film Institute student film, "Monkey Park."

She was interviewed on a rainy afternoon while waiting for a night's work on the film, in which she and English actor Tim Roth play brother and sister.

Forsythe won't enter political arena

Q: Is it true that John Forsythe is so involved in his new TV role as a politician that he's actually planning to run for office himself? — V.H.

A: Not likely. For one thing, Forsythe is a 71-year-old veteran actor with a history of heart problems. Despite or perhaps because of John's role — as a weak-willed U.S. senator — in Norman Lear's TV series "The Powers That Be," he openly disavows any political ambitions of his own. Forsythe is more excited by the recent birth of his fourth grandchild to his daughter Page and son-in-law Paul Courtemanche. As for politics and showbiz, Forsythe says that he favors the aspirations of ultra-conservative actor-colleague Charlton Heston.

Q: Will Fox be showing the original "Married ... With Children" pilot any time soon?

A: Fox retained the broadcast rights to air the original "Married ... With Children" pilot only during the series' first season. That episode has now gone into general syndication. So, keep watching and, sooner or later, the episode that started it all back in April, 1987, will air again.

Q: Is it true that Barbra Streisand is such a tightwad that she was once caught trying to sneak into a Hollywood theater rather than pay? — E.C.

A: Here's the story. One night, she and her son, Jason — whose father is Elliott Gould and who is seen with his mother in "The Prince of Tides" — wanted to check out the credits of a movie they were inter-

ested in. They didn't want to see the movie itself, just the closing credits, often a matter of keen interest in rank-obsessed Hollywood. So they asked at a theater in Malibu, the posh coastal community near Los Angeles, if they'd have to pay full price just to catch the credits. The ticket taker explained that if they went through the turnstile, they'd have to pay full price. But they were welcome to go underneath. So Streisand literally crawled into the theater underneath and looked at the credits.

Q: Who were the two famous movie stars who were in a classic film involving spying, then later actually did real-life undercover work during World War II? — T.S.

A: You're referring to Merle Oberon and Leslie Howard, who starred in "The Scarlet Pimpernel," a story of intrigue and spying during the French revolution. Years later, each was recruited for espionage work. Oberon was used as a conduit for transmitting secret information from the United States to Europe on behalf of the Allies. Howard, more directly involved, was ultimately shot down by Nazis in a plane flying over Lisbon. Talk about life-ironically imitating art.

Q: What was happened to Cheyenne Brando, Marlon's daughter, after that scandalous murder at her father's house in Hollywood a couple of years ago? — D.L.

A: Cheyenne has checked into a French clinic in Papeete on French Polynesia while awaiting a Los Angeles court ruling having to do with the tragedy. The court will decide whether she will also be tried on charges in connection with the shooting of her child's father, Dag Drollet. Cheyenne's half-brother, Christian, is serving a 10-year sentence for voluntary manslaughter.

Q: What's this about Danny DeVito having a thing about not eating ketchup under any circumstances? Is he somewhat nutty? — K.M.

A: Danny was in Pittsburgh recently making his latest flick, "Hoffa," with Jack Nicholson. The crew wanted to stage a 1,000-person mob scene in a local plant owned by a famous ketchup-making company. The "Hoffa" request to use the facility was denied. An angry DeVito

responded by telling a press conference that he is "never using ketchup again."

Q: What ever became of Phyllis McGuire, the youngest of the singing McGuire sisters, who is best known for her romance with a gangster? Is she still alive? — G.S.

A: The McGuires are alive, well and still active. They are Christine, 64; Dorothy, 62; and Phyllis, 61. The latter has been living in privacy in the Las Vegas area for years. The singer and actor, who established themselves on the Arthur Godfrey TV shows of the '50s, recently celebrated their 40th year in show business. The occasion was a glossy appearance at a big Las Vegas hotel. Phyllis had been involved at one time with notorious mobster Sam Giancana.

Q: The most recent "Columbo" was totally different than all the previous ones. Are they changing the format?

A: No, but there was a slight change in the way the

"Columbo" script was handled. For the first time, the crime was not murder, it was kidnapping (in this case, the bride of Columbo's nephew). It's the end of an era next week on NBC as "The Cosby Show" airs its final original episode on Thursday, April 30. The show promises to be a real sentimental journey as Theo graduates from college and the Huxtable family reminisces all the way back to its debut.

Series creator and star Bill Cosby is going to produce and host a new show syndicated version of the game show "You Bet Your Life," but it's



hard to imagine that it will have anything resembling the impact of "The Cosby Show." The show struck a chord with viewers because it skillfully combined portrayals of families as the really were and families as we would like them to be.

When the show debuted in 1984, it resurrected situation comedy from the dead. When comedian Cosby in 1984 tried to sell his concept to ABC, which rejected it, then NBC, which accepted, sitcoms were considered a dying breed by network high thinkers.

The only sitcoms in the top 20 in the 1983-84 Nielsen rankings were CBS' "Kate & Allie," starring Susan Saint James and Jane Curtin, and "The Jeffersons," still running on the fumes of being an "All in the Family" spinoff.

By "Cosby's" fourth season, the top seven series were sitcoms — "Cosby," its spinoff "A Different World," "Cheers," "Golden Girls," "Growing Pains," "Who's the Boss?" and "Night Court."

"Cosby" itself was en route to being by far the highest-rated series of the 1980s, and was No. 1 for four consecutive seasons. The sitcom's death report had been greatly exaggerated.

TV brings the draft home

The National Football League draft was the last of the great newspaper events.

For years, fans would besiege sports departments with calls, asking what players their favorite team had selected.

But like nearly everything else in sports, television has taken over. Although its only action is a name being read from a podium every 15 minutes, the draft has become a staple of the all-sports cable network.

"(Television) has taken the draft from a hotel room to the living room," said Joe Browne, the NFL's director of communications. "Back in the early days of the draft, if a newspaperman stumbled into the draft by mistake, the league wasn't sure if they were pleased or concerned."

Coverage of the NFL's 57th draft begins Sunday morning. Mel Kiper,

Jr., Tom Jackson and Joe Theismann will join ESPN's Chris Berman as hosts at the Marriott Marquis Hotel in New York, anchoring a 5½-hour telecast.

Washington defensive lineman Steve Emtman should be among the draft's early choices. Wisconsin cornerback Troy Vincent and Michigan wide receiver and kick returner Desmond Howard also should go early.

Among the other notables available in the draft are: Derek Brown, tight end, Notre Dame; Terrell Buckley, cornerback, Florida State; Ty Detmer, quarterback, BYU; Vaughn Dunbar, running back, Indiana; Carlos Huerta, kicker, Miami; David Klingler, quarterback, Houston; Amp Lee, running back, Florida State; Carl Pickens, wide receiver, Tennessee; Tony Sacca, quarterback, Penn State; Greg Skrepenak, offensive tackle, Michigan.

Network renewals

NBC

The gang at "Cheers" will belly up to the bar again this fall. NBC has renewed its top-rated show for an 11th year. The Emmy-winning program's stars, including Ted Danson, George Wendt, Kirstie Alley and Woody Harrelson, had already agreed to return.

With its all-star cast, "Cheers" is one of television's most expensive shows to make. Squabbles over cost between NBC and the show's producer, Paramount Studios, nearly resulted in its cancellation last year.

Both sides declined to say how much the network paid for next season's shows.

NBC's strong Thursday night comedy, "Wings," has been picked up for a third season next fall. The show, whose ratings are up 31 percent over last year, ranks 19th this

season out of 117 entries. NBC also has given an early renewal to its "Law and Order."

NBC has also renewed: "Empty Nest," now in its fourth season, also for two years (52 episodes); "Nurses," and "Fresh Prince of Bel Air" for a third season.

CBS

CBS has ordered 50 new episodes of its quirky drama series "Northern Exposure," which will take the show through two more seasons.

"Knots Landing," TV's sole remaining nighttime soap, has been renewed by CBS for a 14th season, despite early-season problems that saw the show go on hiatus for a few weeks so the story line could be retooled. The series currently ranks 46th out of 125 shows in the season-to-date averages. (Last year it ranked

33rd.) Most cast members are expected back, with the possible exception of Joan Van Ark (Valene Ewing).

CBS has picked up Burt Reynolds' "Evening Shade" for two seasons.

ABC

ABC has already renewed "The Commish," "Perfect Strangers," "Full House" and "Family Matters."

Fox

Fox has renewed "Beverly Hills, 90210," starring teen heartthrobs Jason Priestley and Luke Perry, for a whopping 90 episodes over three seasons.

Fox has renewed "Heriman's Head," starring William Baggdale, for a full season.
