## King verdict surprises area judges, police

TWIN FALLS — Local criminal justice officials were surprised and some were appalled by a California jury's decision in the case of a videotaped beating by Los Angeles police.

"An absolutely miscarriage of justice," was how Twin Falls police Sgt. Jim Munn described the jury's acquittal of three Los Angeles police officers who were filmed beating Rodney King as he lay on the ground.

"It's a real black eye to the system," he said. Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said she was surprised but not shocked by the verdict, because juries are unpredictable.

"When you take a case to jury trial, it's always a roll of the dice," Baxter said. The jury obviously had more information than the millions of people who saw only the now-famous videotape, but that recording was enough to convince Twin Falls police chief, Paul Du Fresno, that the police officers used more force than necessary.

When the officers stopped King, they may have had reason to use force to subdue him, but they soon went beyond what was needed, Du Fresno said.

"It's always shocking when such clear and convincing evidence is presented to the jury and they don't think it's clear and convincing," he said.

The King case illustrates why juries are kept away from news reports as much as possible.

LOS ANGELES — Riots, arson and looting raged in the Los Angeles area Thursday and the death toll rose to 21 as National Guard troops moved into neighborhoods torn by outrage over the Rodney King verdict.

Gunfire erupted after two dozen Guard soldiers arrived at a video arcade threatened by looters. The machine-gunning soldiers did not return fire.

Bands of people roamed the streets after a dusk-to-dawn curfew took effect. Police said there were no immediate arrests.

About 450 people had been injured and 300 arrested in the outburst of destruction that terrorized vast parts of the city for a second day, from downtown to the suburban San Fernando Valley.

A nightfall Thursday, violence had spread into San Bernardino, 60 miles to the east, where one person died in a gun battle between a security guard and a motorist that police said was not related.

A crowd in Long Beach, south of Los Angeles, attacked two motorcyclists Thursday night. Police said one was killed and the other critically injured.

Vandals descended upon historic Hollywood Boulevard west of downtown, setting fire to at least one business.

About 30 major fires were burning at mid-evening. At least six new major blazes ringed downtown, enveloping the city's skyscrapers in thick smoke.

Arizona Gov. Fife Symington said California Gov. Pete Wilson had asked him for National Guard equipment and told him: "It's out of control." Wilson declared a state of emergency and was flying to Los Angeles from the capital, Sacramento.

Much of the city shut down. Bus service was halted, professional sporting events were postponed, businesses and schools were closed, and some flights were rerouted around columns of smoke. Santa Monica, to the west, closed its beaches.

Shoppers stocked up on batteries and candles, fearing power outages as night approached.

"Why tear down something you own? We all have to make a living here. I just don't understand it," said Miles Taylor, 49, a black man who has lived in South Central Los Angeles since 1965, when the Watts ghetto exploded in riots.

Police spokesman Sharon Michelson said 17 deaths had been confirmed in Los Angeles from the rioting. That was in addition to the death in San Bernardino.

Most of the rioters were black, but whites, Asians and Hispanics took part in some of the violence.

In 18-hour ending at 6 p.m., firefighters responded to 128 structure fires. Officials said they had no damage estimates.

Police arrested six youths in suburban Compton and said they may have been part of a youth gang that was trying to torch 10 buildings an hour. "To them it's a free-for-all," said California Highway Patrol Lt. Bud Shields.

Two firefighters were wounded by gunfire. Near downtown, a security guard was fatally shot in a gun battle with looters outside a store.

More than 100 Korean-owned stores were burned, looted or robbed. Racial tensions between blacks and Koreans have seethed for several years.

## For looters, it's stock-up time

LOS ANGELES — Black, white, Hispanic and Asian. Young, old, male and female.

Mothers carrying babies on their backs. One and all, they went on a gluttonous shopping spree.

They ran past jagged-edged plate-glass windows, ducked under crumpled security gates and squeezed through buckled doors.

Moments later, back out they scrambled, carrying a pair of sneakers under their arms, VCRs, CDE, television sets and tennis rackets. Nintendo was popular among the under-10 set.

Fewer than a dozen police officers stood across the street and watched helplessly.

They were guarding a sporting goods store that had already been ransacked. A block away, a building burned as firefighters, protected by policemen, tried to stop it from spreading.

It seemed as if all of the city was burning, there was so much black smoke in the air in the area of Second and Vermont in the city's Rampart District, a few miles from South Central Los Angeles.

Since mid-morning Thursday, thousands of people had kept up a constant pattern of attack along Vermont Avenue, a street lined with mini-malls and supermarkets.

First they would smash the plate-glass windows and take everything they could carry — some loaded their car trunks — then they would set the store on fire.

# Court will return Becker to bench after suspension

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday gave 5th District Judge Phillip Becker of Gooding a chance to put his alcohol problems behind him and get on with his life and career.

The court rejected the recommendation of the state Judicial Council that Becker be removed from office because of his alcoholism and related problems.

Instead, the court ruled 4-1 that Becker, 56, will be suspended without pay for three months, then can be reinstated if he agrees to alcoholism treatment.

In a telephone interview from his home, Becker said he was pleased to be allowed back on the bench.

"I knew they were at least going to sanction me," he said. The ordeal that he and his family have undergone since his arrest for drunken driving last summer has left him stronger, he said.

"I think I'm a better person for it," said Becker, who has been a district judge in Gooding and Jerome counties since 1983.

"My experience is probably going to make me a better judge. His current term of office runs until 1995.

The past 10 months have been filled with telephone calls and letters from people supporting his recovery, Becker said.

"I'm happy for Judge Becker, and I hope things work out for him," said Sh. District Magistrate Thomas Gushman, who works with Becker in Gooding. The judge must submit to random blood tests, and if it is determined that he has used alcohol, he will be removed from office without further proceedings. Becker must continue to receive alcohol treatment.

Bush vetoed a bill last summer, shortly after he was arrested for drunken driving and entered an alcohol treatment center. He admitted the drunken driving charge, was given a 90-day suspension, fined \$750 plus costs, and sentenced to two days in jail and a license was suspended for six months.

The three-month suspension will cost Becker \$17,303 from his annual salary of \$70,014. Although he is happy to be headed back to work, Becker joked that he may have found finding time to be a judge.

He has been busy with his hobbies, especially snowmobiling and restoring antique furniture, during his suspension. He has lost some weight and takes a long drive home from work.

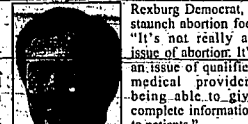
# Stallings backs abortion counseling 'gag' repeal

TWIN FALLS — Reversing an earlier position that has become a campaign issue, U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings Thursday voted to repeal the "gag rule" on abortion counseling at federal clinics.

The rule strictly limits how federally subsidized clinics can discuss abortion with their patients. Stallings said conversations with Idaho health-care workers have convinced him that the rule was unworkable and threatened funding for Idaho's rural health clinics.

"It's a stupid regulation," said the

Rexburg Democrat, a staunch abortion foe. "It's not really an issue of abortion. It's an issue of qualified medical providers being able to give complete information to patients."

The "gag rule" regulations were first issued in 1988. Although the Supreme Court upheld the rule's constitutionality last May, they have not yet been implemented.

Stallings' vote came on a bill authorizing federal funding for family planning programs through June 1997. Besides repealing the gag rule, the bill requires clinics that receive both federal and non-federal money to comply with any state laws requiring parental consent or notice for minors seeking abortions.

The bill passed 268-150, 22 votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to override a presidential veto. Should the Senate also pass the bill, President Bush is likely to veto it.

Bush vetoed a bill last November intended to bar enforcement of the gag rule. Stallings voted to uphold that veto.

In explaining his change of mind, Stallings told The Times-News Thursday that he previously had thought the gag rule would not significantly affect doctor-patient confidentiality or threaten the flow of federal dollars to Idaho's 30-odd rural health clinics.

The Bush administration had agreed to implement the rule in such a way that physicians would be allowed to provide limited abortion counseling, so long as federal money was not used. However, Stallings said the administration has refused to extend the exception to nurses, and the federal/non-

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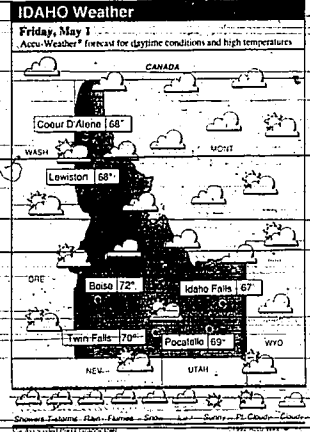
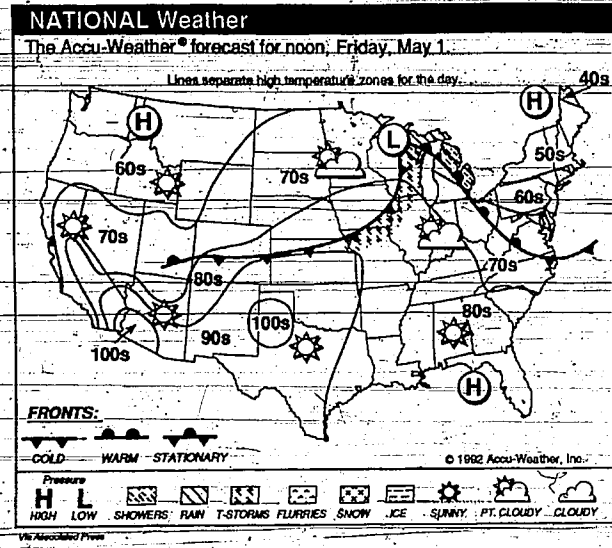

### Weather summary

The National Weather Service reports scattered showers and a few thunderstorms over the Panhandle Thursday afternoon through a cold front that moved through overnight.

The showers were most numerous near the Montana border.

Some clearing occurred in the western part of the Panhandle. Two to four inch rainfall amounts in the north varied from about 1.0 to .80 inch.

The south reported mostly clear but dry conditions Thursday afternoon. Some clearing also occurred in the southwest.

### Heat wave hits Plains as low marks in East set records

Record low temperatures were scattered across the East on Thursday, but a heat wave continued across the Southeast and Plains.

Lows were only in the 30s across most of New England, and in the 40s as far south as northern Florida. Lows were in the 30s and 40s across the Great Lakes region.

Key West, Fla., southernmost point on the continental United States, had a record low of 59; the city's third record low in a row and its coolest reading on record for so late in the season.

Other record lows were 30 at Atlantic City, N.J.; 41 at Augusta, Ga.; 40 at Macon, Ga.; 63 at Miami Beach, Fla.; 53 at Orlando, Fla., and 33, a tie, at Providence, R.I., the National Weather Service said.

Clouds helped keep afternoon temperatures in the 40s across the Great Lakes into the upper Ohio Valley. But

temperatures rebounded into the 70s across the Southeast.

Temperatures soared over much of the Southwest, with readings already in the 80s and 90s by midday.

And strong southerly wind blew warm air across the Valley. Early afternoon temperatures were in the 80s across much of the Plains.

Utah had 19 cities with record highs Wednesday in the 80s and lower 90s.

Showers were scattered from Virginia to New York state.

In the West, showers associated with an upper level weather system were scattered from eastern Washington state to western Montana.

Eugene, Ore., received enough rain during the night to push the total rainfall for the month to a record 7.81 inches. The previous April record was 6.89 inches in 1992.

# King might have Verdict changed decision

SIMI VALLEY, Calif. (AP) — Members of the jury that acquitted four white Los Angeles policemen in the beating of a black motorist said race played no part but the verdict might have been different had the man not testified.

One female juror said she had held out for convictions.

Jurors were interviewed by various news organizations on conditions they not identified.

A female juror interviewed Thursday by CNN denied that the verdict was racially biased.

"In my opinion, based on all of the evidence that was presented to us, it is not a racial thing. I am not unhappy with the verdict; that's the only verdict that could have been reached."

The jury that acquitted the officers of assaulting Rodney King was made up of 10 whites, one Asian and one Hispanic.

A juror interviewed by telephone on the "Today" show said she had absolutely nothing to do with the incident. Had the man been white, she had been anything and acted as Rodney King did, he would have been given the same treatment.

But attorneys for King were not satisfied in court, without considering public opinion or other outside factors, Meehl said.

Either the media did not have a full and accurate account of what happened, or the jury didn't get the whole story, said noting that King was not re-arrested in the case.

"This doesn't mean the system didn't work," Meehl said. "They decided the case on the evidence presented to them."

Although videotaped evidence can be convincing, it is not always conclusive, Twin Falls County Public Defender Mike Wood said.

"The jury gave a verdict, and that verdict should be upheld by Wood said.

Some critics of the verdict have pointed out that no blacks sat on the jury. But Wood said.

News reports of rioting, looting, arson and random violence in Los Angeles clearly show the immediate effect of the Rodney King verdict. The aftermath of the case will go far beyond Southern California and will affect how citizens view police, Du Fresno said.

"How could it not? We live in a countrywide society," he said. "The broad brush will paint all of law enforcement."

McDevitt dissented from the majority.

"I've been terribly busy, and I have lots of projects still to do," he said.

Becker said he plans to spend time this summer fixing up his mountain cabin north of Fairfield.

The Judicial Council recommended removal from office, not only for his drinking but also because he agreed early in June to undergo treatment for his drinking problems, then within two weeks was arrested for drunken driving.

Supreme Court Justice Charles McDevitt dissented from the majority.

McDevitt said Becker contacted a witness to the Judicial Council disciplinary proceedings, and attempted to change or alter that person's testimony.

This action by him strikes at the heart of our system, McDevitt said.

"It's removal is the only appropriate sanction."

The court said until 1989, Becker was considered to be a fair, qualified judge.

"We are convinced that while Judge Becker's conduct detracted from the integrity of the judiciary,

Judge Becker's addition to alcohol, which has been the source of his misconduct, is a disease. It is a disease that cannot be cured, but is a disease that can be treated and controlled," the court said.

The evidence indicates a severe sanction is justified, the opinion said.

Becker's removal would deprive the judicial system of an experienced judge who was elected by the voters of the Fifth Judicial District, and someone who can be a good judge if he can control his addiction to alcohol," the court said.

federal funds distinction has proven unworkable.

"Medical professionals who staff health centers have been placed in an impossible position," he said.

"Although doctors are not gagged, it is nurses who run our state's clinics. It remains completely unclear to Idaho nurses what they are supposed to do to make sure they don't violate some technical prohibition and risk having their funding, and the health delivery system in our rural state, compromised."

A local health-center director praised Stallings' turnaround, but anti-abortion activists were shocked and upset.

"We are very disappointed,

president to say," said Marilyn Scott, president of Right to Life of Idaho's Magic Valley chapter.

"Stallings does have quite a background of voting with us, and when we met with him (last autumn) we were under the impression that he understood our concerns and agreed with us," Scott said. "So this does surprise us."

Family physician Marc Tunzi, medical director of Family Health Services in Twin Falls, said he had urged Stallings to change his mind during a January meeting.

"I don't think Congress and the government should be telling health-care providers what they can and cannot say to their patients," Tunzi said. "I don't think he (Stallings)

had thought of it in that light before."

Stallings' challenger for the Democratic U.S. Senate nomination, Sandpoint businessman and pro-choice advocate Matt Schaffer, praised Thursday's House vote but said Stallings "showed his true colors" in last November's vote.

"I don't trust Stallings for a minute," said Schaffer, who has made the gag rule the main issue in his campaign. "It's going to be very hard to convince the voters that he wouldn't vote for another version of the gag rule in the future."

But Stallings brushed off his opponent.

"I have not taken Mr. Schaffer very seriously, and I don't think this will be an issue," he said.

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# Verdict sparks protests around nation; leaders call for federal probe

Protesters rallied nationwide Thursday to denounce the verdict in the Rodney King beating case, and blacks attacked whites in Atlanta. Black leaders demanded federal civil rights charges against the white Los Angeles officers who beat the black motorist. "The anger is not only in Los Angeles. The anger is all over this nation," Rep. Floyd Flake of New York said at a news conference by black lawmakers at the U.S. Capitol. "When Rodney King was on the ground getting beat, we were all on the ground getting beat."

Demonstrations were held in Atlanta, Minneapolis, Denver, San Jose, Calif., Cleveland, Baton Rouge, La., Kansas City, Mo., Topeka, Kan., Amherst, Mass., and Hartford, Conn., among other places.

Most of the demonstrations elsewhere were peaceful, in contrast to the scene in Los Angeles, where at least 10 people died in rioting that followed the verdict.

But in Atlanta, young blacks left a peaceful demonstration at City Hall and attacked whites at a downtown subway station. Windows were smashed and passersby were beaten.

Dozens of arrests were made. "This is how Rodney King felt," rioters yelled as they stomped on a white man and ripped off his shirt.

About 15 blacks beat a white newspaper photographer and a white woman who had driven past in her car.

Another white woman was beaten and kicked on the steps of a state office building. About 100 young black protesters hurled rocks at buildings and cars.

Police in that area were called to the central transit station and the Capitol, where the violence started.

quantities of gasoline restricted. dust-to-dawn curfew imposed.

Two students were arrested for fighting during a demonstration at a high school in Odenton, Md., where about 75 students protested by refusing to go to class.

Cleveland police arrested a man who disrupted a peaceful rally by twice driving by in a van while waving a flag showing a swastika. Part of the crowd of 100 to 150 people

chased the van, but it sped away in the wrong lane of a road.

And in Madison, Wis., someone shattered the windshields of 34 police squad cars parked at a garage. A note at the scene said "Justice for King" and "All pigs must die."

Few court decisions have prompted such nationwide outpourings. Those denouncing Wednesday's verdict included black leaders, police chiefs, civil libertarians and ordinary citizens.

## Acts of decency, courage mix with seemingly random violence

LOS ANGELES — Not more than 100 feet away from the safety of his front porch on Florence Avenue, James Henry watched a horrific scene unfold.

Five young black men swarmed on a single Hispanic man whose van had broken down in the worst place and at the worst time anyone could imagine.

Florence Avenue near Normandie Street about 3 1/2 hours after the Rodney King verdict.

The five men punched and kicked the man mercilessly, then gleefully bounced away, flashing gang hand signals as they walked. One man came back to rifle the victim's pockets and punch him in the face one more time before walking away.

The attackers were only about 40 feet away from the victim, who was lying in the street, when several cars careened by, one running over the man's legs.

That was too much for Henry. Though the attackers were still nearby, though numerous menacing young men grasping bottles and large rocks

were running amok, though police were nowhere to be seen, the stocky Henry, who is also black, calmly left the security of his porch and took to the street to assist the man.

With the help of another man, Henry pulled the victim to the relative safety of the sidewalk, got him a blanket, got the phone number of his family, and stayed with him until police arrived about 20 minutes later.

Amid the thick smoke of chaps, the anger and the violence that the King verdict touched off, there were individual acts of decency and valor such as Henry's kind of actions that the monkey City of Angels conjures up.

In other instances, people came to the aid of victims who had been pulled from their cars and savagely beaten, pulling them to safety. Others, including Henry and his wife, Barbara, warned people — including reporters — not to go to the corner of Florence and Normandie because they ran the risk of being beaten or worse.

The Henrys allowed a Washington Post reporter who had already absorbed a punch to the face from a

Crip gang member) to stay on their porch to observe the mayhem on the street below, even though they ran the risk of drawing unpleasant attention from some of those who were attacking whichever non-black happened to pass by.

After police finally arrived and put the victim, Raul Aguilar, on a stretcher and took him away, Henry spoke of the victim's attackers in anger and disgust.

"They were so ... bad. Where are they now?" Henry said. "All those guys who were so bad are gone."

Though he was in his own neighborhood, Henry said he felt far from safe when he went out to help Aguilar. "I was afraid I was going to get hit," said Henry, 41. "I didn't feel sure. At least I was moving. He was helpless."

The young man who helped Henry pull Aguilar off the street, who gave his name only as Jerome, said he diverted some of the attackers by pointing them to an abandoned motorcycle and urging them to take it instead of what was left of Aguilar.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush and his top aides spend at least \$63 million a year for travel, and probably much more than that, a House subcommittee chairman said Thursday.

A General Accounting Office study showed that White House personnel, including the president and vice president, accounted for 42 percent of trips made by the 89th Air Wing at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington.

The Air Force wing, which is devoted to transporting top government officials, cost at least \$150 million to operate in fiscal 1991, the GAO found. The White House's proportional share of that cost comes to \$63 million, said Rep. Paul Kanjorski, D-Pa.

He released a chart showing that the White House accounted for 42 percent of the 777 trips made by the Defense Department made, 39 percent and Congress took 16 percent of the trips.

The congressional share of the \$150 million spent by the Air Force wing comes to \$24 million. In addition, congressional members and staff often take official trips on commercial planes, paid for out of Congress' own \$2.7 billion budget.

Kanjorski noted that the figure does not include the cost of fuel used on presidential trips, depreciation or purchase costs for planes, costs for ground support facilities or the costs of the wing's 19 helicopters.

In addition, the White House has access to 390 other military aircraft, and those costs were not included in the GAO study, he said.

"As a result, the actual complete costs borne by the Air Force to support White House travel are likely to be significantly greater than \$63 million," he said at a hearing.

Kanjorski's comments came in the midst of an election-year "perk war" between the White House and Congress, in which each branch is accusing the other of abusing taxpayer-financed benefits.

White House figures show it will cost \$20.6 million this year to operate Air Force One, Bush's specially equipped Boeing 747.

## Facilities can be sold more easily

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — President Bush has made it easier for state and local governments to sell public facilities such as airports, bridges and sewage-treatment plants.

Advocates of privatization hailed it as a major change in attitude. Critics said it could lead to higher costs.

Bush signed an executive order Thursday directing federal agencies that helped finance construction of local facilities to reverse their past practice of demanding a hefty share of profits from the sale of those facilities.

"Facilities now run by government that could be owned and operated by competitive enterprises can thus serve the public more fairly and more efficiently," Bush said in a speech to the Ohio Association of Broadcasters.

"It gives state and local government more freedom to sell or lease their infrastructure to the private sector," the president said.

It was Bush's second trip to the Midwestern industrial state in just over a week, as he focused attention on states expected to be battlegrounds with the Democratic presidential nominee in November.

The privatization change, part of Bush's focus on decreasing government regulation, is intended to help financially strapped local governments find new ways of getting revenue, officials said.

It could affect some \$227 billion worth of bridges, roads, airports, electric utilities, water companies and other facilities, according to one private study.

## Perot clears hurdle

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Supporters of Ross Perot have collected more than enough signatures to put the Texas billionaire's name on the Utah ballot as an independent candidate for president.

Three-hundred signatures were needed on petitions to bring the candidacy about. The lieutenant governor's office said Thursday that porters had gathered more than 8,700 signatures.

## Economic reports point to sustained, moderate recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) — A trio of encouraging economic reports on Thursday flashed a green light for slow but sustained recovery from the recession this year.

The government's chief forecasting gauge climbed for the third straight month in March. New applications for unemployment insurance in late April held at the lowest level since last October. And orders to factories in March rose strongly.

"The statistics all point in the same direction," said economist David Jones of Aubrey & Co., a New York securities analyst. "We have indeed started a moderate recovery. It will be slower and more uneven than a normal recovery. ... But all in all I think we're looking at the foundation for a sustainable recovery."

The Commerce Department's Index of Leading Indicators increased 0.2 percent in March after strong gains of 0.8 percent in February and 1 percent in January.

Although the latest advance was small, the first quarter marked the first time since May 1991 that the index moved higher during three consecutive months. The 1.6 percent rise in orders to U.S. factories was stronger than anticipated by most analysts. It was pulled up by a 2.1 percent gain in orders for durable goods, such as automobiles and furniture.

However, the backlog of unfilled orders at factories fell 0.6 percent, the seventh drop in a row. That shows the current manufacturing workforce is keeping up with rising demand and factory managers likely aren't yet feeling pressured to expand their payrolls. Judging by applications for unemployment benefits, fewer workers are being laid off.

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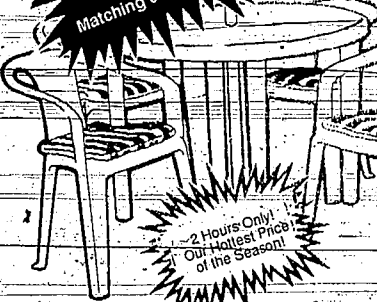
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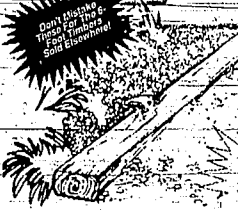
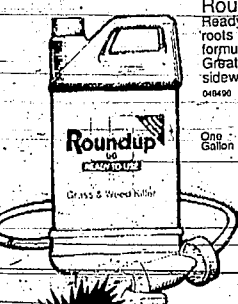


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# U.S. fleet approached as operation started

On May 3, 1942, the Japanese commenced "Operation Mo" by capturing Florida Island (Tulagi) in the Solomon chain.

Vice Adm. Shigeoyoshi Inouye at his 4th Fleet headquarters in Rabaul did not know that the bulk of the U.S. Pacific Fleet was converging on the Coral Sea. The first sign that his plans were going awry was on May 4 when dawn American fighters and dive bombers struck the ships flying off Tulagi, sinking a destroyer, a minesweeper and a transport. The planes were from the carrier Yorktown (Task Force 17) under Rear Adm. Frank Fletcher.

The Japanese Carrier Strike Force, comprising the carriers Shokaku and Zuikaku under Vice Adm. Takao Takagi was supposed to provide air cover for Tulagi. However, Takagi had been delayed by bad weather and a detour to deliver some fighters to Rabaul and was still 500 miles to the north.

Rear Adm. Antonio Gato responded to the attack by bringing his Close Support Force of four heavy cruisers and the light carrier Shoho toward Tulagi from the west. But by the time he arrived in the afternoon, Fletcher had vanished to the south behind a weather front.

Takagi brought his carriers down in a sweep to the east of San Cristobal on May 5 before heading west to cover the flank of the Port Moresby Invasion Group, which was at the center of "Operation Mo." Takagi searched in vain for Fletcher, who had continued south to rendezvous at "Point Buttercup" with Rear Adm. Aubrey Fitch, who had the carrier Lexington.

Rear Adm. Sir John Crace, Royal Navy, joined the party with two Australian cruisers to bring the total armada under Fletcher's command to two carriers, seven heavy and one light cruisers and 11 destroyers. This was the strongest force yet assembled to oppose the Japanese advance.

At this stage of the war, the Japanese had a significant edge in experience. The American pilots had no experience in flying against large,



well-defended naval forces. Though the Yorktown's strike off Tulagi was officially hailed as a victory, more targets had been missed than hit. The next three days would give the U.S. Navy its first real baptism of fire in modern carrier warfare.

In contrast, the Shokaku and Zuikaku had veteran crews. These were the two largest carriers in the Imperial Navy. They were also Tokyo's newest and best design, having only been commissioned in August and September of 1941, respectively.

They had helped start the war at Pearl Harbor. In April, they had been part of the great Indian Ocean raid that had taken the Japanese fleet to Ceylon and driven the British Navy away from India. In the process, the Royal Navy had lost two heavy cruisers and the carrier Hermes, as well as several destroyers and numerous merchant ships. The Japanese had lost no warships and only 17 aircraft.

The Mitsubishi Zero was a faster, more agile fighter than the Grumman F4F Wildcat. However, the American plane was more durable with its self-sealing gas tanks and pilot armor.

However, Japan's real advantage was in torpedo attacks. While both the Nakajima Kate and Douglas TBD Devastator torpedo bombers were able to sink ships, the Japanese had more reliable torpedoes and better skill in putting them on target, as they would soon prove.

# Priceless medieval loot returns to Germany

BERLIN (AP) — Tekan Joe Meador was a G.I. who left Germany with more than memories after World War II.

His souvenir? A priceless medieval treasure and, some say, a lock of the Virgin Mary's hair. After two years of legal wrangling and a nearly \$3 million payment to Meador's heirs, Germany on Thursday welcomed home the jewel-encrusted religious relics of its royal past.

"These are among the most important relics of German history," said Klaus Maurice of the German Cultural Foundation.

The nine items arrived from Dallas on Wednesday and were put on display in glass cases at Berlin's Art History Museum on Thursday.

They include a "rock-crystal reliquary shaped like a fish that some historians claimed holds a lock of hair from the Virgin Mary."

It also includes a 9th- or 10th-century reliquary made of silver, gold and precious jewels with the image of Germany's first elected king, Henry I of Saxony.

Henry's jeweled ivory-and-gold comb, believed to have been used to comb out sin during religious ceremonies, is also in the collection.

Other items include two rare jewel-encrusted missals. The items range in origin from the 8th to the 16th cen-

turies and some were crafted under the rules of Charlemagne (768-814) and Otto I (936-973).

"They had been stored at the Lutheran Church at Quedlinburg for centuries until 1945, when U.S. forces occupied the east German city 120 miles (200 kilometers) southwest of Berlin."

Meador was a U.S. Army lieutenant guarding a mine shaft where the goods were hidden, and apparently took a

chunk of the booty back to White Wright, Texas.

The East German Communist regime that followed the division of Germany had little interest in tracking it down.

But after the Communists fell in 1989, the two Germans teamed to hunt the Quedlinburg treasure, and countless other items that vanished in the wake of the war.

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# NATO OKs nomination of general

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — NATO approved the nomination of U.S. Lt. Gen. John M. Shalikshvili as the alliance's top military commander in Europe on Wednesday.

Shalikshvili will succeed Gen. John R. Galvin, who is to retire in June after five years as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's supreme

allied commander in Europe. Shalikshvili also will become chief of American forces in Europe.

Shalikshvili, 55, is currently assistant to Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff. He received international attention last year when he led Operation Profligate's "Operation's supreme

# Bush condemns Los Angeles violence



WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush condemned "murder and destruction" by Los Angeles rioters on Thursday but at the same time said the Justice Department would intensify its investigation of police conduct in the taped-beating case that ignited the violence.

Bush met at the White House with Attorney General William Barr, who raised the possibility that four officers acquitted of brutality charges in state court could face federal charges. His investigation shows they violated the civil rights of the rioter they beat.

The president also appealed for an end to the street violence that followed the acquittals on Wednesday and continued Thursday.

"The murder and destruction on the streets of Los Angeles must be stopped," Bush said. "Looting, beatings and random violence must be condemned."

Barr said the federal government will move "as expeditiously as possible" to determine whether there are grounds to charge the four white rioters with violating the civil rights of Rodney King, who is black.

Barr sent Associate Attorney General Wayne Rudd, a black former U.S. attorney in Boston, to Los Angeles to meet with officials there. The attorney general said investigators will try to determine "whether there was intentional infliction of excessive force" against King by the officers who had stopped him for speeding.

"In the American conscience there is no room for bigotry and racism," Bush said in a brief statement at the White House.

Arson and looting erupted again Thursday in Los Angeles after nine people were killed overnight.

Neither Barr nor Bush would characterize the acquittal verdict by the California jury in the case. However, White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said Bush felt "the same frustration everyone else does. He saw the videotape, and it's hard to compare that to the verdict and not wonder what happened."

When the videotaped beating of King was made public last year, Bush said, "What we're going to do is look into violations of the law and prosecute any people that are violating the federal law, and speak out against police brutality because what I saw made me sick."

He used similar terminology

Thursday but this time referring to the rioting: "It was outrageous what happened, and we were all sickened by what we saw."

He made that comment in Columbus, Ohio, where he flew after his White House remarks.

In Columbus, he also said, "the nation must condemn racism and violence alike."

"I make no apology for the rule of law or the requirement to live by it," he said. "And yes, in some places in America, there is regrettably a cycle of poverty and despair. But if the system perpetuates this cycle, then we've got to change the system. We simply cannot condone violence as a way of changing the system."

The federal civil rights investigation was put on hold pending the outcome of the state trial of the police officers.

Barr said federal investigators will review the trial transcript and, with counsel, said there "may be some additional evidence" for them to study.

Justice Department officials made

it clear that the investigation was not limited to the four officers. It will also include an examination of the conduct of other officers at the scene of King's beating.

Federal civil rights laws carry a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison for convicted violators.

FBI Director William Sessions joined Barr at a Justice Department news conference in which the attorney general said that since October 1988 his agency has filed charges against 123 law enforcement officers for police brutality and won convictions against 75 percent of them.

In Congress, six black lawmakers urged a vigorous federal probe.

"Some said the violence could spread," the anger is not only in Los Angeles," said Rep. Floyd Flake, D-N.Y. "The anger is all over this nation."

Civil rights leader Jesse Jackson, prior to a meeting with Barr, said the verdict shows "there has been a breakdown in the justice system in black males in the country."

Kingship with Daryl Gates throughout all of this shows his disregard for justice and fairness."

The president has expressed support over the years for Gates, the

Los Angeles police chief who is resigning.

Bush also said he talked by telephone with California Gov. Pete Wilson and Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley and plans to meet later in the week with community leaders from around the nation.

At a state dinner Wednesday night Bush had said, "The court system has worked. What's needed now is calm, respect for the law. Let the appeals process take place."

**Car strikes crowd of children at airport**

CHICAGO (AP) — A car plowed into a crowd of third-graders on a field trip to O'Hare International Airport on Thursday, killing a 10-year-old girl and injuring 88 children and adults, authorities said.

The children had just gotten off two school buses between airport terminals at midday when the car jumped the sidewalk, witnesses said.

Police said the driver was taken into custody.

**Reporter shot during unrest**

FRAMINGHAM, Mass. (AP) — A white journalist who was shot five times while covering violence in a section of Los Angeles said he owes his life to a black family that drove him to the hospital.

Jeff Kramer, a free-lance reporter working for The Boston Globe, said he was attacked in his car Wednesday evening by six youths, one of whom shot him four times in the calf. He was in a stable condition Thursday at the California Medical Center, Kramer said, that after he was shot, he pretended he was seriously injured and slumped forward.

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# Islamic government drives rivals from Kabul, firms up control

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — The new Islamic government consolidated its command over mujahideen factions Thursday, trying to end looting and restore order in Kabul. It drove its rivals from the city and prepared to mop up.

The rival forces, under fundamentalist leader Gulbuddin Hekmatyar, still held pockets around the capital. But they were far outnumbered by various mujahideen groups loyal to the new government.

President Sighbatullah Mojaddidi's government held its first session at the Council of Ministers building and agreed to establish a command over the guerrilla groups that overran Kabul Saturday and ejected the remnants of President Najibullah's government.

Ahmed Shah Masood, one of the most powerful guerrilla commanders and now the defense minister, attended the council session in Kabul, but was seen leaving before it ended. Delegates later said the council failed to de-

cide on its position regarding Hekmatyar and would meet again Friday.

Before its arrival in Kabul on Tuesday, Hekmatyar had been elected prime minister of the transitional government, "but he rejected it," said Gen. Mohammad Khan, a military aide to Mojaddidi. "If he attacks, there will be a response."

Masood and Hekmatyar are bitter enemies from different ethnic groups and disagree on the future Islamic government. Hekmatyar fa-

vors strict imposition of Islamic law. Masood and Mojaddidi likely would apply it moderately.

The new government consists of 20 rebel leaders who fought a succession of Soviet-backed governments for 14 years.

Masood appeared in complete control of Kabul after hard fighting with Hekmatyar.

Additional measures will be taken to provide for the safety and security of Kabul's residents and for foreign diplomats and emissaries,

presidential spokesman Ahmed Ghafari said.

Looting and indiscriminate shooting have terrorized Kabul's 1.5-million residents, although life in the capital was slowly returning to normal after three days of intense fighting in its streets.

"We're not worried now," said 16-year-old Abdul Sabur, manager of a tiny grocery store in the city center. A few stores reopened on the street.

### Ousted dictator, followers flee Somalia

NAIROBI, Kenya — Ousted Somali dictator Mohamed Siad Barre has fled to the arid northeast of Kenya, officials said Thursday. Also Thursday, desperately needed food aid reached the capital of Somalia after a five-month delay.

Siad Barre, who was driven from power last year after 21 years in office, entered neighboring Kenya Wednesday morning with 1,200 followers, said James Simani, a foreign ministry spokesman.

Simani said that Kenya will not offer Siad Barre asylum, but will assist him in moving to a third country. He said he did not know where Siad Barre sought to go, but denied a local report that he had gone to the Middle East.

### S. African cop faces death penalty

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — A white police captain convicted of murdering 11 blacks was sentenced to death Thursday and four black colleagues were sentenced to 15 years each in prison.

It marked the first time a group of police officers were convicted of a mass killing. The African National Congress said the case proved its allegations that security forces instigate violence in black townships.

Spectators packed the courtroom during the trial and about 100 people gathered outside. Pietermaritzburg Supreme Court for the sentencing. The five were convicted last week.

### Suicide rate increases 31% in Japan

TOKYO — Suicides over financial problems jumped 31 percent in Japan last year, despite an overall decline in the number of suicides, an official report said Thursday.

The report by the National Police Agency said 1,660 people committed suicide in 1991 because of financial difficulties. It said a total of 21,084 people killed themselves in Japan that year, down 1.23 percent from a year earlier.

It listed the reasons for committing suicide in order of frequency as illness, mental disorders and drinking problems, family problems, financial problems and office problems.

### Fans pay tribute to late protest singer

TOKYO — Tens of thousands of young Japanese, many carrying flowers or tape players, attended the funeral Thursday of a 26-year-old rock singer known for his protest songs.

Yutaka Ozaki died Saturday after being found unconscious and apparently intoxicated on a Tokyo street. The cause of death was listed as fluid in his lungs.

Japanese youths are not known for mouthing protest. But Ozaki's songs decrying the tight regulations governing high school students' dress, hair styles and after-class activities were highly popular.

Police said 37,500 people gathered in the rain at Tokyo's Gokokuji Temple for Ozaki's funeral. They said thousands waited overnight at the temple gate.

### Sierra Leone situation remains unclear

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast — Soldiers in Sierra Leone, weary of fighting a war without enough money or ammunition, claimed to have ousted the government and forced the president to flee on Thursday. Diplomats said it was unclear who was in control.

Diplomats in Freetown, the capital, reported soldiers were patrolling the streets and appeared in charge, but they did not know to whom the troops reported. The diplomats spoke to colleagues in Abidjan, who spoke to a reporter on condition of anonymity.

One Western diplomat said troops were searching for President Joseph Momoh.

### Red Cross faces '92 funding crunch

GENEVA — The International Committee of the Red Cross faces a deficit of up to \$46 million this year, an official said Thursday, reflecting a cash crisis that is sweeping many relief organizations.

Arnold Blaetter, a Red Cross official, said there was a risk the Swiss-run agency might have to cut its operations if it didn't receive extra money. The shortfall also means the agency is no longer able to plan ahead and must cope with needs in trouble spots like Yugoslavia, Afghanistan and Somalia on a day-to-day basis, he said.

The funding crisis stems mostly from tighter government aid budgets caused by the recession, and many aid organizations are feeling the squeeze.

## Gorbachev has advice for America

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev, preparing for a U.S. tour, said Thursday the United States should give up being the world's "policeman" and focus on building democracies around the globe.

Gorbachev, interviewed by The Associated Press at the offices of the think tank he founded, also said Boris Yeltsin has pushed Russia too quickly toward reform and risks a social explosion.

The 61-year-old Gorbachev was relaxed, rested and energetic — four months after he resigned as president of the Soviet Union, following the failed coup last August and the collapse of the central government in December.



He said he has no plans to return to politics, but sees his "duty in supporting reforms as an individual. Sometimes I may criticize."

"Although he generally endorsed President Bush and Yeltsin's policies, Bush for acting too slowly to support reforms in the former Soviet republics, and Yeltsin for pushing domestic reforms too quickly.

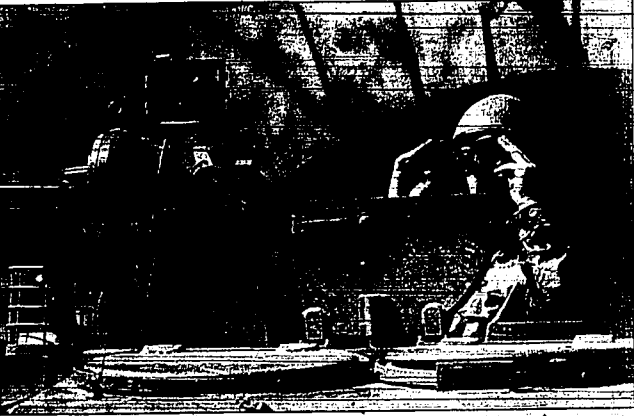
Without mentioning Bush by name, Gorbachev said the U.S. government "has to be reproached." Billions of dollars were spent waging the Gulf War, he said, but money has been harder to find "to support democratic changes which will create new jobs for 100-200 years ahead."

It is narrow-minded thinking, and I cannot understand it."

Looking back on the collapse of the Soviet Union during his own seven-year tenure in the Kremlin, Gorbachev acknowledged he had not pushed reforms quickly enough.

"I think we should not have spent time trying to improve the system. The system, the Stalinist model, the command system, constrained the energy, the thinking of the society, its actions. It was holding the entire country back," he said.

"Political and economic reforms were not synchronized," he said, adding that he wished he had moved more quickly to allow private ownership.

## Bombs destroy key bridges; new Yugoslavia stakes out borders

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Masked commandos blew up the last two bridges linking Bosnia-Herzegovina with Croatia, and reports Thursday said at least 10 people died in the explosions.

The bridges, near Brecko, were the only links left to relatively safe haven for thousands of refugees fleeing embattled northeastern Bosnia for Croatia.

Fighting meanwhile eased in Sarajevo between Serb militias seeking to carve out part of the city and Muslim defenders of the Bosnian capital. Shooting ebbed by daylight and no new major incidents were reported, leaving Sarajevo its most peaceful in days.

Clashes continued elsewhere between Serb forces opposed to Bosnian independence and Slavic Muslims and Croats supporting it.

Three people were killed and seven wounded in Mostar, where federal forces shelled that southwestern city. Belgrade-based Tanjug news agency reported.

About 300 people have been killed and more than 2,000 wounded since Muslims and Croats in Bosnia voted for independence Feb. 29. Fighting intensified after the state

won recognition from the United States and much of Europe on April 7.

Commanders of the Serb-dominated federal army refuse to withdraw from Bosnia, where about 100,000 federal troops are helping ethnic Serbs to battle.

The United States and western Europe threatened sanctions against Serbia if the army and Serbian forces do not quit the ethnically mixed republic.

Croat Prime Minister Stanislav Milosevic arrived Thursday in Belgrade, Serbia's capital. He was expected to warn Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic of possible EC sanctions. Sarajevo and other towns in land-

locked Bosnia have been blockaded by Serbs. The capital's 600,000 residents now have about two weeks of food left. Farmers' markets sell only nettles and dandelion leaves.

The Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe admitted Bosnia Thursday as its 52nd member. All member nations approved, including a reconstituted Yugoslavia now made up only of Serbia and little Montenegro. All four other former Yugoslav republics include Slovenia, voted for independence.

On Thursday, three days after its creation, the new Yugoslavia established border posts with neighboring Croatia, Bosnia and Macedonia.

### 1 percent tax juggernaut begins to look a bit feeble

How do you figure it? In a conservative state where the conventional wisdom says people hate taxes, and during a political season when the conventional wisdom says voters everywhere are hopping mad at government of all sorts, an anti-tax initiative has run out of steam.

Backers of the One Percent Initiative need a modest 32,000 signatures to put the initiative on the November ballot. When they started way last summer, the conventional wisdom said they should reach that goal likeety-split.

But they aren't there yet. How can that have happened?

Three likely explanations come to mind. First, maybe Idahoans aren't all that upset about property taxes. Maybe they realize that this state's property tax burden isn't particularly onerous, and that if some aspects of the system need fixing, the One Percent's blitzkrieg approach isn't the best method.

Second, maybe the initiative's well-documented flaws have cooled interest in it. When the state attorney general predicts that courts would strike down

most of the initiative as unconstitutional, people have to wonder whether it's worth the trouble.

Third, maybe the distasteful tactics of the initiative's chief cheerleader have diminished people's appetites for protest. Ron Rankin, the anti-tax crusader from Coeur d'Alene, has adopted an abrasive, damn-the-facts style of campaigning that relies on personal invective and an insistence that anyone who disagrees with him is corrupt.

That approach has left a lot of people cold. Though the initiative movement has attracted some other high-profile leaders such as former state Sen. Rachel Gilbert, the initiative is still very much Rankin's personal crusade — and that's a handicap.

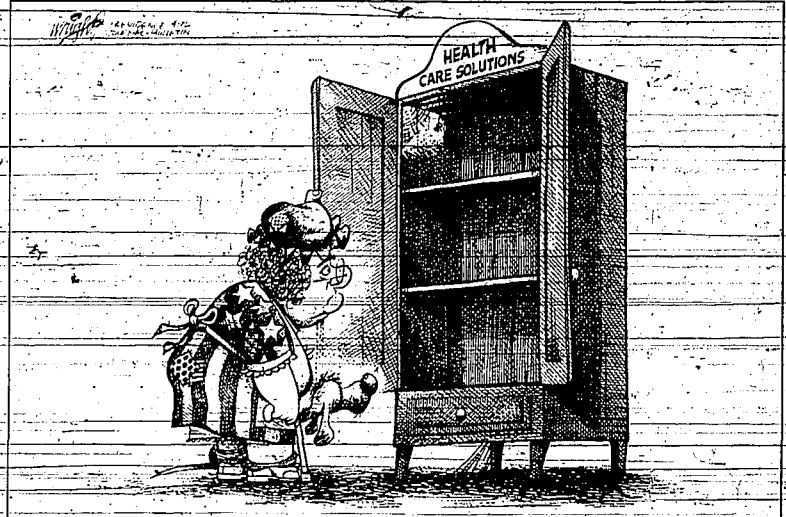
Rankin said this week that his group has more than 30,000 valid signatures. That leaves about 2,000 to collect in two months — presumably a easy task no matter how bad an initiative might be.

So we probably can assume the initiative will be on the ballot. But its prospects in November — when Idahoans will be even wiser about it than they are now — don't seem nearly as strong as they did a few months ago.

# Political problems give kings reason to resurrect royalty

PARIS (AP) — The increasing visibility of eastern Europe's deposed kings has fed the fantasies of France's dethroned royals, who are trading their regal silence for action in a push to restore the throne.

Political turmoil in their own land has buoyed members of the House of France and given new vitality to their quest for restoration of a kingdom that dates back 1,000 years.

The family of France is waking up, said Princess Chantal of France. "More than ever, we must be present so that at the right moment, we are in full gear."

The problem is there are two royal lines — the Bourbons and the Orleans — contending for the non-existent throne, plus feuding within the Orleans branch, or House of France, that dilute the sense of destiny.

The other problem is France's commoners. While bemused by the family quarrels, they don't really seem to care.

"For me, they don't exist," said historian Jean-Pierre Rioux. Royalty represents "dreams of grand families, grand dynasties... with no political significance."

Royal figures appear prominently in picture magazines like Paris Match, and the French have a love affair with the royal family of Monaco.

But the only solid measure of royalty's popularity was the results of the 1974 presidential election. Royalist candidate Bertrand Renouvin garnered only 0.14 percent.

Never mind, say the monarchists, the republic is but an interlude. Some day the people will beckon.

To hurry things along, Princess Chantal, 46, recently refocused

media attention on her family. The result was a scolding from her father, the Count of Paris, Henri Robert Ferdinand Marie Louis-Philippe d'Orleans — the leading pretender to the throne — for transgressing royal etiquette.

In a speech at a private dinner in February, Chantal, the youngest of 11 children, lambasted her brother, the dauphin Henri, Count of Clermont, for a laissez-faire attitude to royal duties. In an angry letter that was

leaked to the press, the Count of Paris rebuked his daughter for flouting "dynastic law that he claimed 'forbids' a royal woman from speaking. He likened her to an 'insurgent.'"

Brother Henri told her, "No woman of the family is authorized to brandish the scepter."

"There is a void and that's why I spoke," Chantal said in an interview. "Just because we're in a republic, it doesn't mean the family of France should be forgotten."

She still "have important powers and are listened to," Chantal's public stand was the culmination of a growing perception within the House of France that the time is ripe for action. The fear is that the Count, 83, may miss the event altogether and his successor, brother Henri, not especially interested in active duty, will be unprepared to take the throne.

The royalists are quick to note the political turmoil in France, where the governing Socialists are at their lowest ebb and small parties are playing havoc with the mainstream.

"People have lost their point of reference," said Renouvin, 48. He heads the New Royalist Action, a political group close to the Count of Paris, and sits on the prestigious Economic and Social Council.

Monarchists believe a king, by transcending political squabbles, can serve as arbiter and unifier in a politically fractured society.

The French monarchy came to a bloody end with the revolution 203 years ago, although the crown was twice restored.

The recent return visit to Romania by King Michael, to cries of "Long live the king," buoyed royalists' enthusiasm.

# Newspaper reports Kazakhstan provided Iran with 2 warheads

LONDON (AP) — Iran has obtained at least two nuclear warheads which had been reported missing from Kazakhstan, The European newspaper said Thursday.

The article, based on a secret report from the Russian Foreign Intelligence Agency, again raises questions about whether the successors to the Soviet Union will be able to control their most dangerous weapons.

The European did not say how it had obtained the intelligence report.

The European quoted the report as saying that several nuclear warheads "vanished" from the Semipalatinsk nuclear test site in Kazakhstan, which the republic's president, Nursultan Nazarbayev, closed in early 1992.

The European said some intelligence sources believe Nazarbayev was behind the secret nuclear

weapons transfer to Iran, trading warheads for oil or hard cash.

Two of the nuclear weapons were smuggled across the border from Kazakhstan into Iran last year and now are under the control of Reza Amirahchi, chief of the Iranian Organization for Atomic Energy, the front-page story said.

It said the Russian report, recently sent to the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency, disclosed that a third nuclear weapon which disappeared has not been traced but is believed to be in the Middle East.

The European said it is "almost certain" that the missing warheads are nuclear shells, which are relatively small and can be easily moved in an ordinary vehicle.

In Vienna, spokesman Hans Friedrich Meyer said the International Atomic Energy Agency had no knowledge of such a transaction.

Iran signed the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty and must report the acquisition of any nuclear material, he said.

The weekly Arabic magazine Al-Watani Al-Arabi reported in December that Iran took advantage of the chaos in the crumbling Soviet Union to buy components for three nuclear weapons for between \$130 million to \$150 million and hire more than 50 Soviet nuclear experts to assemble them.

The magazine said the weapons were purchased in an Islamic republic. This points to Kazakhstan, the only republic in mainly Islamic central Asia with nuclear weapons.

It quoted unidentified intelligence sources in Germany and France as saying they believe Nazarbayev was behind the secret nuclear weapons transfer to Iran, trading warheads for oil or hard cash.

# Bikers denounce rally, restrictions

PARIS (AP) — A bikers' organization on Thursday denounced actions by drunken riders that left nine dead, but also criticized proposed counter-measures as "abusive mistreatment."

Some 10,000 bikers from across Europe descended on the annual 24-hour motorcycle race in Le Mans last weekend. Many were drinking and racing Saturday, when several accidents occurred, killing nine and injuring about 50.

The French Federation of Angry Bikers called the riders irresponsible, but derided State Secretary for Road Transportation Georges Sarre's plan to restrict motorcycle licenses for minors.

Joel Villain, a senior member of the federation, pledged that his movement would take steps to prevent a similar tragedy.

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# Labor activists detained in Beijing

BEIJING (AP) — Seven Western European labor activists were detained Thursday after they unfurled banners in Beijing's Tiananmen Square calling for free labor unions worldwide.

There was still no information early Friday on the whereabouts of the activists from Germany, France, Britain and Switzerland. But it appeared police were holding them incommunicado prior to expelling them.

During the demonstration, Thursday, the activists unfurled a huge banner reading "Long Live Free Labor Unions" in Chinese. The action

occurred a day before May Day, which is celebrated in China and many socialist countries as a day of honor workers.

It was not immediately known if an eighth activist, from Hungary, was also in police custody.

The activists were members of an international organization formed in 1989 to protest the Communist regime's violent crackdown on China's pro-democracy movement. An independent labor union, the first in Communist China, was founded about a week before the movement was crushed.

A British Embassy spokesman,

Peter Davies, said the Embassy had received no information on the activists, but was told they had "carried out activities incompatible with their status."

Chinese authorities frequently use that language when expelling foreigners.

The activists were given 48-hour visas.

In London, China's ambassador to Britain, Ma Yuzhen, was summoned to the Foreign Office and asked for an explanation. In Beijing, Britain's ambassador to China demanded an urgent meeting with the Chinese Foreign Ministry.

**Legislature moves to expand diversity**

SALT LAKE CITY — After drawing criticism for a lack of diversity, legislative leaders have added Democrats and non-Mormons to a committee drafting a proposed constitutional amendment on prayer at public meetings.

The panel remains all white and male. House and Senate leaders moved to expand the committee one day after the group's first meeting Tuesday.

The four original members appointed by Senate President Arnold Christensen and House Speaker Craig Moody were Republican men active in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Added Wednesday were three Democrats — one of whom is Greek Orthodox, another Jewish and a third LDS — and one additional Republican, who also is Mormon.

**Skinhead draws indictment for assault**

PORTLAND — An 18-year-old skinhead gang member has been indicted on a single count of second-degree assault for the April 17 beating of a black man.

A Multnomah County grand jury issued the indictment Wednesday. The grand jury declined to charge Randal Lee Krager with other crimes, and police said the evidence did not support further charges involving racial bias.

Police detective Shirley Zahler said another arrest was likely in connection with the fight.

The charge stems from a fight between two black men and four white people with white supremacist beliefs. Police found Jacob Johnson, 34, who is black, unconscious on a northeast Portland street.

**Company to offer caller identification**

OLYMPIA — A small telephone company has won approval to offer Washington's first caller-identification service.

Callers will have the option, at no extra charge, of preventing the display of their name or number on the special telephone monitors of caller ID subscribers.

The state Utilities and Transportation Commission on Wednesday granted Pacific Telecom Inc., of Vancouver, permission to offer caller ID service on a one-year trial basis starting May 1.

**Fans arrive early for Brooks tickets**

SPOKANE — Darin Lane and his buddies arrived at the Spokane Coliseum Tuesday night, figuring they'd be first in line when tickets go on sale Saturday for a Garth Brooks performance in June.

But Corina Wolf and Maria Hill had already been waiting two hours.

"We just really wanted to be the first," said Hill, from Florida, who said she doesn't mind spending most of her vacation on a sleeping bag on the sidewalk. "This is my first concert and I just want good seats."

**Daughter denies theft of money**

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A woman pleaded innocent Thursday to charges she stole about \$9,000 that was supposed to pay for nursing home care for her father, an Alzheimer's patient found abandoned at a race track last month.

Sue Gifford was indicted on 20 criminal charges — 15 counts of first-degree theft, four counts of unlawfully-obtaining public assistance and one count of unsworn falsification.

Gifford's father, John Kingery, 82, was found last month at a dog-racing track near Post Falls, Idaho. The labels had been cut from his clothing and a note misidentifying him was attached to his wheelchair. A bag of diapers was next to his chair.

Prosecutor Steve Todd said the charges accuse Gifford of concealing her father's pension checks when she applied for public assistance. Medicaid is supposed to pay only for the parts of Kingery's nursing-home bills that his pension doesn't cover.

The charges allege what some people would call Medicaid fraud, Todd said.

Gifford was indicted Wednesday by a Multnomah County grand jury. She was freed today after agreeing not to leave the area or to transfer any assets except to pay her lawyer.

Gifford and her attorney, Joe Goretak, declined to talk to reporters at today's hearing.

Goretak earlier characterized his client as "a loving, caring offspring of an Alzheimer's patient." Gifford has refused to comment.

Kingery, a retired Ford Motor Co. employee who also suffers from Parkinson's disease, was a patient at the Laurelhurst Care Center in Portland for 18 months.



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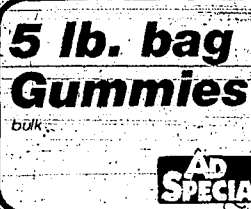

## Violence cancels Jazz, Dodgers games

### NBA playoffs — B2

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Civil unrest in Los Angeles, the most damaging in the city since the Watts Riots in 1965, put the sports world on hold Thursday.

The NBA playoff game scheduled for the Sports Arena between the Clippers and Utah Jazz was postponed as was the Dodgers-Philadelphia Phillies game at Dodger Stadium.

Both were to have been played Thursday night.

In addition, the thoroughbred racing program for Thursday afternoon at Hollywood Park in nearby Inglewood was canceled, as was Friday night's program at the race track.

Meanwhile, Los Angeles Lakers public relations director John Black said a

decision would be announced Friday on whether the NBA playoff game against the Portland Trail Blazers would be played at the Forum this night.

The Forum is adjacent to Hollywood Park.

The City of Inglewood declared a state of emergency at noon Thursday, requesting the California National Guard to help restore and maintain order.

Rioting mobs ignited fires, beat motorists and looted stores throughout the area late Wednesday after the acquittal earlier in the day of four white policemen in the beating of black motorist Rodney King.

The violence was centered in a 7-by-15-mile area including heavily black South

Central Los Angeles, within a few miles of both the Forum and the Sports Arena.

Dodger Stadium is several miles away, but there were disturbances within a few miles of the ballpark.

Also, the California National Guard and the Los Angeles Fire Department were using the Dodger Stadium parking lot as an emergency staging area.

The National Guard was on the streets of Los Angeles by Thursday afternoon, but looting and arson continued and was spreading to outlying areas.

As of Thursday afternoon, at least 10 deaths had been reported along with hundreds of injuries and arrests.

While the Lakers beat the Blazers 121-119 in overtime on Wednesday night, rioting went on within a few miles of the Forum. But the game was uninterrupted, as

was the game at Dodger Stadium, won by the Phillies 7-3.

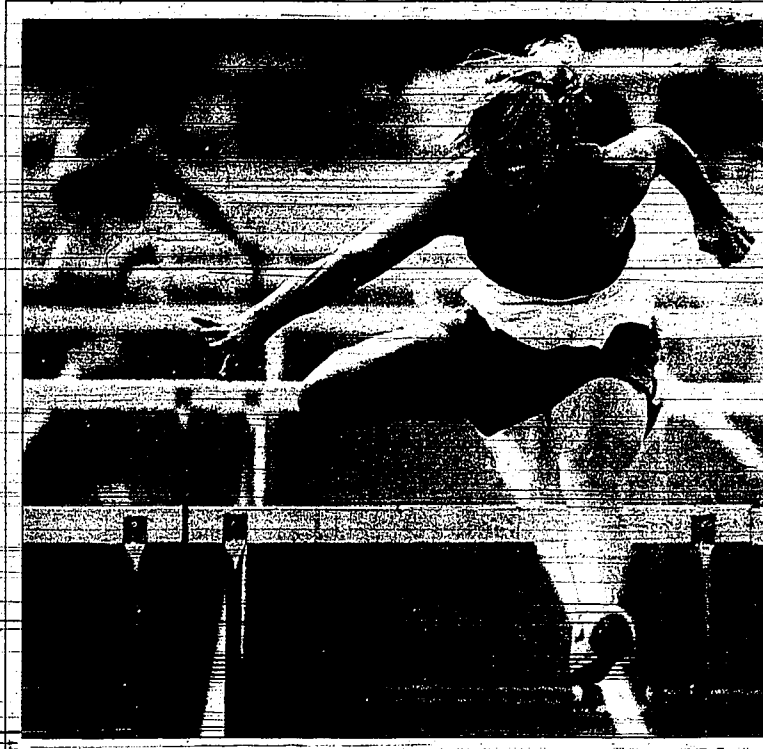

## Arazi has other horses 'just running for 2nd'

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Arazi is an outsider in the Kentucky Derby, but in post position only.

The smallest chestnut colt is the center of attention, watched by hundreds of people as he goes through the paces.

He also was the 6-5 early favorite Thursday to beat 18 other 3-year-olds from the No. 18 post Saturday at Churchill Downs — this despite surgery on both knees in November and only one Derby prep.

A.P. Indy was the 7-2 second choice, while Technology was next at 8-1.

Arazi would be the first favorite and first 2-year-old champion of the previous year to win since Spectacular Bid in 1979.

"Everybody else is just running for second place," said jockey Pat Valenzuela, who got on Arazi on Thursday for the first time riding him to victory in Breeders' Cup Juvenile on Nov. 2 at Churchill Downs.

The same thing happened that happened when Valenzuela worked Arazi before that race. The jockey was unseated.

"He never lost hold of the reins, landed on his feet and immediately remounted. This is not serious because he throws all his jockeys," trainer Francois Boutin said.

"We didn't want to change anything," Valenzuela joked.

Arazi was caught in 1:03 1/5 for five-eighths of mile. His last quarter was 24 1/5.

"Since Pat hasn't ridden the horse since last November, it was very reassuring to have him come back with a good report," Boutin said.

As for drawing the No. 18 post, Boutin said "I prefer 18 to the first two numbers. I can't do anything about it anyway."

"Pat isn't concerned about it," co-owner Allen Paulson said. "It's a long race, and there's plenty of time to get position."

The Derby is 1 1/4 miles. Arazi's winning prep was at about one mile on the grass April 7 in France.

Gato Del Sol, a longshot in 1982, is

only Derby winner to start from the No. 18 post.

"He (Arazi) is not going to be among the leaders anyway and he'll spend less time in the gate," LeRoy Jolley, trainer of 30-1 shot Conic Di Savoya, said of Arazi's post.

"I have never felt that post position was that important going that far," said Ron McAnally, trainer of 15-1 Dr. Devious, making his first start outside England.

Another colt making his U.S. debut in the Derby will be Thyme, a member of the seven-horse mutual field.

"He (Arazi) doesn't have to hurry, but then again, he does have to come around everyone," said Sonny Hine, trainer of Technology.

Arazi was eighth in the 13-horse field in the B.G. Juvenile after a half-mile, circled horses and won by five lengths.

"If he's enough horse to sit back there and settle the field again, he is truly a super horse," said Lynn Whiting, trainer of Lili E. Tec.

"To me he's had a uphill battle because of last year's complications, and if he does win, he's a wonder horse," said Bruce Headley, trainer of Disposal, a member of the mutual field.

Before returning to France after the

B.G. Juvenile, Arazi was taken to Paulsen's farm at Versailles, Ky., where he underwent arthroscopic surgery for the removal of bone chips from both knees.

"The surgery is the reason Arazi has raced only once this year."

"I guess everyone's banking that he won't be able to do it off one race," said Tom Bohannon, trainer of Pine Bluff.

Arazi had seven races in France, winning six of them, before running in the B.G. Juvenile, his first start on dirt and around two turns.

His main challengers should be A.P. Indy, Pine Bluff, Technology, Devil His Due and Dr. Devious.

A.P. Indy, ridden by Eddie Delahoussaye from the No. 16 post, has won five straight races, including the San Rafael and the 1 1/4-mile Santa Anita Derby this year.

Technology is coming off victories in the Florida Derby and the Tropical Park Derby at Calder, both at 1/4 miles. He will start from the No. 2 hole under Jerry Bailey.

Devil His Due, who did not race as a 2-year-old, has won four of six starts, including the 1 1/4 mile Wood Memorial on April 18. Mike Smith will ride him from the No. 6 post.

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# Female jockey competes in Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Early on, trainer D.H. Griffith didn't think female jockeys could ride as well as their male counterparts. And then ... along came Julie Krone.

Griffith admits to being one of those 30-year veterans of the backstretch who hatched the idea that a female jockey could compete. On Saturday, Krone will ride the Griffith-trained Ecstacy-Ride in the Kentucky Derby.

"I watched her ride several years and it took me a while before I figured out she looked like me—she got more run-out-of-horses than most people," he said. "After I figured that out, it became implanted in my mind even more so that this was a very talented rider."

He admitted that he was among the group that knocked Krone when she came on the scene more than 10 years ago. "I said, 'I'll never ride that little girl. She kept beating me every time I'd run a horse so I said, 'Hell, she must be genuine.'"

That was on the East Coast, where Krone has become one of the top riders. The winners of the male in history, with more than 2,000 winners; she was the first woman to win arid title at a major track — Moonmouth Park (130 wins) and the Meadowlands (924 wins), both in 1987.

She set a Meadowlands record with 132 victories in 1988 and finished one winner behind Mike Smith at the very competitive Saratoga meeting last summer.

"She's proven herself," said Griffith, sitting in his personalized golf cart a few feet from Ecstacy-Ride's home in barn 42 at Churchill Downs. "She went down to Miami and came back leading rider. She's a very competitive, hard-riding gal and the female aspect of it has gone out the window. I look at her as a top rider."

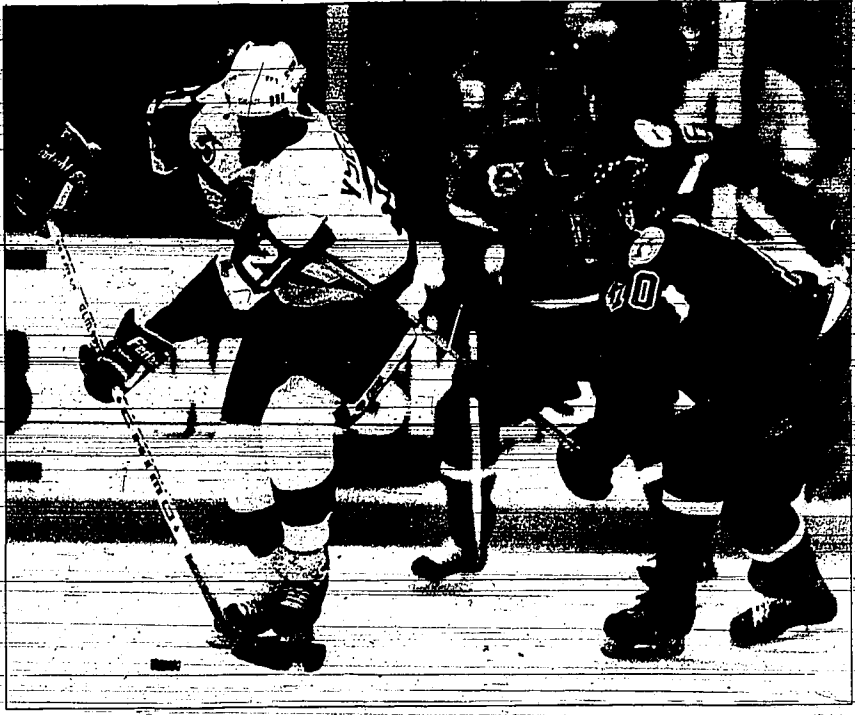
Griffith's cane is draped over the front of the cart. The leads the care to get around because of a problem in his legs. "I walk around like I'm drunk," he said.

Krone has never ridden Ecstacy-Ride in a race, but she worked him an easy mile last week.

Krone was aboard a badly beaten Colony Light when Ecstacy-Ride ran third in the Blue Grass on April 11.

"She called and said she'd like to ride him," Griffith said. "So I said, 'Fine, I appreciate it and look forward to it. She likes him and she'll get along with him fine.'"

Krone will be the fourth woman to ride in the Kentucky Derby. Those earlier rides by other jockeys never resulted in a finish better than 11th.

# Arazi likely to skip Triple Crown races

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Done deal. Rather, done deal.

Arazi will not win the Triple Crown no matter how he runs in Saturday's Kentucky Derby.

He won't even try to triple.

Arazi will fly back to France so fast after the Derby he might have his post-race meal at 8,000 feet.

Actually, we discovered, agents for co-owner Sheikh Mohammed al Maktoum already have booked a flight for Arazi back to Paris for Sunday morning. "Hey, who wouldn't prefer Paris to Baltimore?"

As the World War I song went, "I understand you come keep on down on the farm, after they've seen Paris?"

To racing, it isn't any jock. The decision to skip Arazi out of the United States and skip Baltimore's Preakness and New York's Belmont, regardless of his Saturday showing, has ended racing's biggest argument in years.

But billionaire Allen Paulson on the long end of it.

The Gulfstream Aerospace honcho sold half of Arazi to Mohammed for \$9 million. In his pro-Americanism, Paulson is dying to shoot for the triple. Paulson keeps saying the decision will be made "within an hour after the Derby."

It is understood it has been firmly made already, not to be unmade.

Unlike Paulson, Mohammed wants to run Arazi overseas, where his vast stable works. They must have foreseen such a dispute as this, for they agreed early on that in the event of a voting standoff, trainer Francois Boutin would cast the deciding ballot.

Boutin would vote to put his neck on a guillotine. Inarguably, though, he wants to become the first trainer to win both a Kentucky Derby and Epsom Derby.

Boutin's pursuit of historical singularity for the horse AND himself could go much further.

Winning first this 1 1/2-mile Derby, and then the Epsom, a mile and a half on June 3, Boutin would like to run Arazi back in the Arc de Triomphe the first Sunday in October. That's also a mile and a half on grass.

Then he would bring him back

to Gulfstream Park on Oct. 31 for either the Breeders' Cup Mile on grass or the Turf Classic at 1 1/2 miles.

That would be Arazi's last race before going to stud. But it would stake him to an impregnable Quadrilateral never even so much as considered in racing.

It would be this year's equivalent of Bobby Jones' 1930 Grand Slam — U.S. and British opens, U.S. and British amateurs — and send Arazi's breeding value soaring.

An Arazi victory at Churchill Downs this week or then at Gulfstream in October would be a dream for American racing.

What happens in between would be an extension of the industry's decade-long nightmare.

Foreigners bought 21 of the 28 highest-priced U.S. yearlings in 1990; the crop represented in this Derby. It means more and more breeding leadership leaving this country, especially Kentucky and Florida.

An Arazi victory Saturday would also mean a wholesale invasion of America by the products of that foreign breeding.

"If Arazi wins," said trainer Wayne Lukas, "they're going to have to have menus in French and Italian at the trainers' banquet before every Derby." Once those guys find out how much cash there is in racing over here, we'll all be in trouble!

Meanwhile, you will seldom see a less likely-looking superstar.

Arazi hangs his head in his stall in Barn 45 like a child being forced to be coaxed to his first day of school.

When Pat Valenzuela climbed up to work a mile, Arazi promptly bled.

"That's OK," Valenzuela said. "He did here last November before we blew away the Breeders' Cup Juvenile. We want to do everything just the same."

There was a mile in an average 1:01 1/5. Nonetheless, Valenzuela added, "He'll win without a doubt. He's the horse of my dreams."

But not America's. Not the way it's shaking down now.

# Red Wings eliminate North Stars in Norris

Detroit (AP) — The Detroit Red Wings, behind the dramatic goaltending of Tim Cheveldae, became only the ninth team in NHL history to overcome a 3-1 deficit when they eliminated the Minnesota North Stars with a 5-2 victory in the seventh game of the Norris Division semifinals Thursday night.

Detroit will open a best-of-7 series against the Chicago Blackhawks on Saturday night at Joe Louis Arena for the division title.

It was the second time the Red Wings had overcome a 3-1 deficit to win a playoff series. They rallied to oust Toronto in the 1987 division finals.

Sergei Fedorov, Alan Karr and Gerard Gallant each scored in the second period to take the Red Wings to a 3-0 lead. Bob Probert and Shawn Burr scored in the third period.

Brian Bellows stopped Cheveldae's string of scoreless-playoff minutes, which included shutouts in Games 5 and 6, at 1:48.36 with a third-period power-play goal. Minnesota's Mike Craig closed out the scoring with 51 seconds left in the game.

Minnesota goalie Jon Casey, whose hot hand took the surprising North Stars all the way to the Stanley Cup finale a year ago, also played well. But he was no match for the determined Red Wings, who finished first in the division, 28 points ahead of the fourth-place North Stars.

Casey handled 31 shots, Cheveldae 31.

It was the fifth time in their history the Red Wings were playing a seventh game in a playoff series. They were 8-5 in the previous 13 attempts, but 7-2 at home. It was the seventh time the North Stars were playing a seventh game in a playoff series. They were 3-3 in the previous six attempts, 1-2 on the road.

Fedorov's fifth goal, on a power play, came from directly in front of the net on a pass from Kevin Miller. The shot was high on Casey's glove side, just inside the post at 11:04 while Chris Dahlquist was off for

holding Paul Ysebaert.

On Karr's goal, his second, the puck rolled slowly toward the net after a rather weak shot from the right circle. But Casey couldn't get to it and the puck rolled into the goal at 14:07.

Gallant, who had been booed frequently by Detroit fans at Joe Louis Arena, scored his first goal at 17:57. He picked up the puck in the left corner, skated behind the Minnesota

goal, and scored the unassisted goal at 17:57 just inside the post on Casey's stick side. It was Gallant's first playoff goal since April 11, 1989, against Chicago.

The Red Wings felt they had an earlier goal at the 15:32 mark of the second period. But replays showed the puck, after a shot by Brad McCrimmon, stopped on the line, under the helmet of Casey, who was sprawled flat on his back.

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# Walker goes home, takes lead in Centel

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Former Florida State star Colleen Walker took a career-best, 8-under-par 64 Thursday to take the first-round lead in the \$1.2 million Centel Classic.

Walker, one of four former Seminole players back in their college hometown for the tournament, finished on the front nine with a 5-under-par 31.

"Right now I'm a little bit numb," Walker said. "I don't think it's sunk in that I've had this low round."

Walker needed only 27 putts during a bogey-free round.

"It was kind of strange," she said. "It was trying to get it close to the hole and they just fell in today. It just happened."

Walker, who has won one tournament this season and five in 10 years as a pro, said she enjoyed being on a familiar course.

"It's always good to come to Tallahassee," said Walker, who visits often in the autumn to watch her alma mater's football team.

Michelle Estill, who won two shots back at 66 and Alice Ritzman, win-

less in 14 seasons on the LPGA tour, was at 67.

Estill had one bogey, but needed only 26 putts and matched her career low.

"I'm not known as the greatest putter in the world," said Estill, a second-year pro from Phoenix. "The greens rolled well."

Brazton took four shots off par on the front side and claimed the early lead with a birdie at No. 17.

"At least I'm off to a good start," said Ritzman, who has earned all most \$900,000 in her career.

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# Black, Hulbert tied for Houston Open lead

THE WOODLANDS, Texas (AP) — Mike Hulbert and Ronnie Black, acting on advice and inspiration they got from fellow pro Davis Love III, shot 7-under-par 65s Thursday to share the first-round lead in the Shell Houston Open.

Hulbert, from the practice range Wednesday afternoon to the first tee on Thursday feeling comfortable with the adjustment in his swing suggested by Love.

His eight-birdie, one-bogey round over the Tournament Players Course matched Black's best round of the year, giving them a one-shot lead over Keith Clearwater.

Eight golfers were at 67, headed by defending champion Fulton Allen and Tom Kite.

Hulbert and Black had few witnesses to their tournament-leading rounds because most of the gallery lined up to follow either Love or hometown favorite Fred Couples, the world's top-ranked golfer.

Love, trying to become the first golfer since Gary Player in 1978 to win three straight tournaments, shot a 69 in the opening round that ended with a dramatic 30-yard chip-in for a birdie.

Couples finished with a 70. He bolted past the waiting media and went to the practice tee saying, "I'm going to stay until I get it right."

Hulbert, however, was ready to play after the lesson he got from Love and his brother Mark Love, Wednesday night.

"It was pretty simple. I just wasn't getting the club head squared up and the timing was a little off," Hulbert said. "I felt good leaving the range yesterday and I felt good starting out today."

Hulbert birdied the first two holes of the day but his round didn't really open until he took a one-stroke penalty on No. 5 when his ball moved as he addressed a putt.

"The ball just rolled about three-fourths of an inch, there was nothing to do but take the penalty," Hulbert said. "I couldn't get too perturbed about it. I was able to put it out of my head. You'd think it would be the other way around."

Hulbert, recovering from a shoulder ailment that's troubled him the

past two months, parred "the next hole and then ran in birdie putts of 6 and 15 feet and made the turn at three under.

He sank a 12-foot birdie putt on No. 11 and then birdied three of the last four holes for his 65, two shots off the course record set by Mike Sullivan in 1986.

Black said he was saved by his chipping game.

"I didn't strike the ball as well today as that sounds funny because it was my best round of the year," he said. "But I hit a couple of chip-ins and a couple of lucky shots after lousy shots. That tends to turn your round around."

It's like competing at anything, whether it's sailing or Space Invaders," Conner said Thursday morning before sailing Stars & Stripes against Bill Koch's America3 in the defender finals.

"This is a chance for me to compete against the world's best, most powerful guy," said Conner, skipper of Stars & Stripes. "Everyone I run into here against is a billionaire (Raul) Gardini, Koch, (Sir Michael) Fay, they all have unlimited resources. We're trying to do our very best. There's no excuse not to do your very best."

Gardini heads Italy's Il Moro II.

Venezia challenger syndicate and Fay, who's merely a multimillionaire, heads the New Zealand challenge.

Conner has some serious competing to do. America3 beat Stars & Stripes on Thursday to take a 6-4 lead in the best-of-13 finals. But he's in a better position than New Zealand, which was eliminated by Il Moro in the challenger finals.

This has not been an easy regatta for Conner. He has been outpenned more than 4-1 by Koch, who built four yachts in Conner's single year.

Stars & Stripes is a two-keel boat. A switch to a tandem keel between the first and second rounds led to three straight routs before Koch allowed Conner to retrofit Stars & Stripes. In the third round, Stars & Stripes' \$500,000 mast shattered.

But Conner has come back, although never into a controlling position in the finals. He won a race-off with Koch's Kauihale to reach the finals, then was pounded in three straight races before winning four of the next five to tie it. America3 went back ahead on Wednesday.

One big reason for Conner's comeback was light wind and low seas that Stars & Stripes favored.

Conner cites his crew as another reason.

"It probably starts with people," he said. "I'm very fortunate to attract the finest people, and I've had them for a long time."

Many of the Stars & Stripes' crew members have been with Conner for more than one America's Cup campaign.

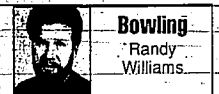

# Braves' streak depends on Avery

ATLANTA (AP) — It's up to Steve Avery to continue the Atlanta Braves' 33-inning shutout streak in Friday night's game against the New York Mets. Is he feeling the pressure? Not from his coaches.

"Steve's challenge will be to beat the Mets. It will have nothing to do with keeping a scoreless streak," said Braves pitching coach Leo Mazzone.

"We're just going to let Avery be Avery. He won't have to be a shutout, just a win."

But with a day off Thursday to think about it, Avery may be putting pressure on himself.

"No one wants to be the pitcher that ends the run we've got going," Avery told the Daily News of suburban DuPont.

John Smoltz pitched the Braves' third consecutive shutout, 8-0 Wednesday night, over the Chicago Cubs, the fifth victory in a row for Atlanta. Tom Glavine shut out the Cubs 5-0 Monday, and Charlie Leibrandt and two relievers combined for a 1-0 shutout Tuesday.

"They have a great pitching staff. This document," said Cubs manager Jim Leibrandt, "mentioned," said Cubs manager Jim Leibrandt, "In the three-game series, the Cubs managed only 12 hits.

The Braves' pitching staff has thrown 74 shutouts in the last five games and six this season compared with seven in all of last year. Avery (1-2) is coming off a shutout of the Astros last Saturday.

The 33 consecutive scoreless innings, which date back to the final six innings of Sunday's 3-2 win over

Houston, is a franchise record. The major league record for consecutive scoreless innings pitched is 56, set by the 1903 Pittsburgh Pirates.

"But it's a pretty good feeling sitting in the dugout watching."

Mazzone said the pitchers "are a close-knit group. They feed off one another, competitively and emotionally."

"You see me pitch you out and do it, you just want to try to duplicate it," he said after his victory Wednesday.

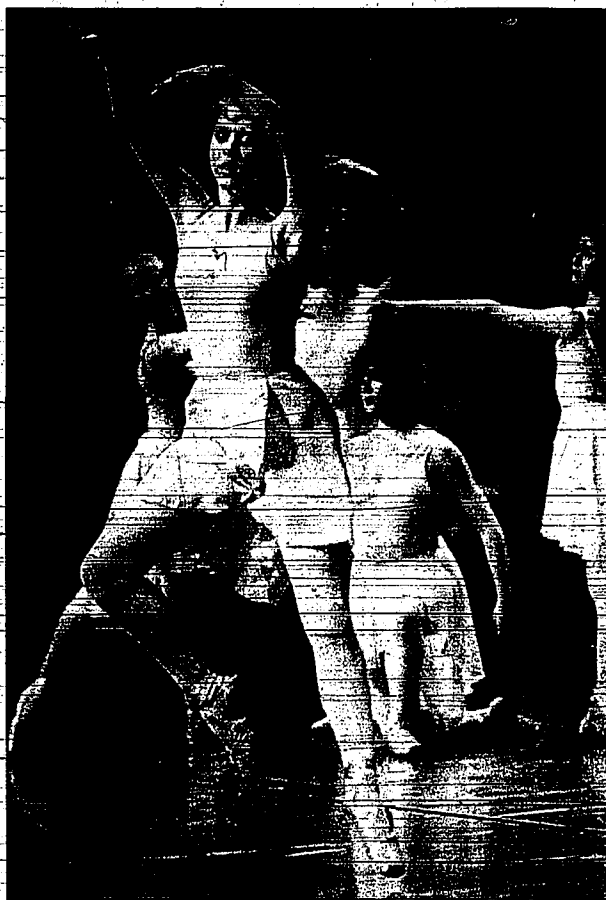

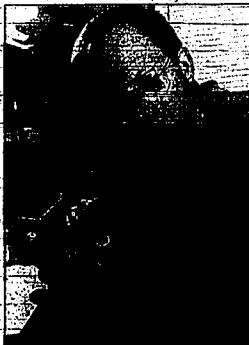

## Bliss man gets hooked on fly tying's lost art

Full-dress salmon fly holds tradition, ultimate expression of tying



After six years of tying flies, Jonathan Goss has turned his interests to the full-dress Atlantic salmon flies.

BLISS - Those who have tried the fine art of tying fishing flies know patience is a virtue.

The craft calls for an exacting hand, the ability to combine materials to look like a particular insect and a knowledge about which insect should be created in order to catch a fish's attention.

After tying flies for the past six years, 33-year-old Jonathan Goss has mastered the flies that trout and steelhead salivate over.

Now he has turned his interests toward what has nearly become a lost art—the art of tying full-dress Atlantic salmon flies.

The full-dress salmon fly is really the ultimate expression of the fly tying art, Goss says. "It's beautiful to look at and it has so much tradition behind it."

The creation of this group of classic flies came in the mid-1800s when the British navy expanded its fleet to explore the far reaches of its empire. Sailors came back with a myriad of colorful, exotic feathers not previously available on the European continent.

Some of the feathers found their way into the hands of fishermen in Ireland, Scotland and England. These fishermen designed a whole group of flies which were loud, gaudy and colorful, indicative of the style of the times.

Since salmon do not feed actively when they enter fresh water to spawn, the fly does not need to match a hatch or imitate food. The fish simply strike at anything that intrigues them.

Experimenting with the array of newly available feathers, fishermen developed a unique group of flies that were more fanciful, more colorful than anything they had tied before, Goss said.

Over the years as materials became scarce due to expense and conservation practices, hair-wing flies took their place.

Materials from animals such as the grey fox and squirrel were dyed to match the exotic feathers, making a fly that was easier to tie and less expensive, Goss noted.

In the past decade, however, a resurgence of interest in tying a full-dress salmon fly has emerged. Goss says flytiers have revived this old custom because the flies are beautiful, it's an art form which can secure up to

\$1,000 for a framed setting, and it represents a return to traditional values.

Goss ties salmon flies for more personal reasons.

"I really enjoy following the footsteps of legendary flytiers," Goss says. "You can tie these flies and escape into a world very few people know today, and I think that's what it's all about."

For Goss, learning to tie full-dress salmon flies was, and still is, in some cases, a challenge.

Most of his skills were learned by reading books from the 1800s and early 1900s.

To a fisherman, a display of Goss' full-dress salmon flies must bring the same sensual delights as a seamstress who enters a fabric store - vibrant colors, patterns and richness abound.

Orange Parson, Silver Doctor, Thunder and Lightning, Green Highlander, Durham Ranger, Flood Tide, Jock Scott and Blue Charm give clues to the effectiveness of color these flies exude.

Goss's wife calls his hobby an "obsession," one that takes him into seclusion each morning before the start of a

# Sailing: America3, Il Moro win

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Dennis Conner talks a lot about the luck of the Irish, but there's something else that has kept him scrapping back in the 1992 America's Cup regatta against tough odds, mostly financial.

"I like competing at anything, whether it's sailing or Space Invaders," Conner said Thursday morning before sailing Stars & Stripes against Bill Koch's America3 in the defender finals.

"This is a chance for me to compete against the world's best, most powerful guys," said Conner, skipper of Stars & Stripes. "Everyone I'm on there against is a billionaire (Ray) Gardini, Koch's (St. Michael) Fazio, they all have unlimited money. They're trying to do our very best. There's no excuse not to do your very best."

Gardini heads Italy's Il Moro di

Venezia challenger syndicate and Fazio, who's merely a multimillionaire, heads the New Zealand challenge.

Conner has some serious competition to do. America3 beat Stars & Stripes on Thursday to take a 6-1 lead in the best-of-13 finals. But he's in a better position than New Zealand, which was eliminated by Il Moro in the challenger finals.

This has not been an easy regatta for Conner. He has been outpumped more than 4-1 by Koch, who built four yachts to Conner's single, year-old Stars & Stripes.

A swivel to a tandem keel between the first and second rounds led to three straight routs before Koch allowed Conner to return Stars & Stripes. In the third round, Stars & Stripes' \$500,000 mast shattered.

But Conner has come back, although never into a controlling position in the finals. He won a race-off with Koch's Kanza to reach the finals, then was pounded in three straight races before winning four of the next five to tie it. America3 went back ahead on Wednesday.

One big reason for Conner's comeback was light wind and low seas that Stars & Stripes favors.

Conner cites his crew as another reason.

"It probably starts with people," he said. "I'm very fortunate to attract the finest people, and I've had them for a long time."

Many of the Stars & Stripes crew members have been with Conner for more than one America's Cup campaign.

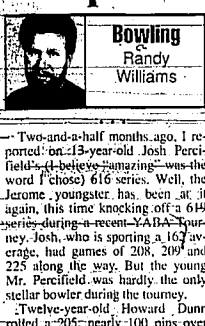

# Bliss man gets hooked on fly tying's lost art

## Full-dress salmon fly holds tradition, ultimate expression of tying

BLISS — Those who have tried the fine art of tying fishing flies know patience is a virtue. The craft calls for an exacting hand, the ability to combine materials to look like a particular insect and a knowledge about which insect should be created in order to catch a fish's attention.

After tying flies for the past six years, 33-year-old Jonathan Goss has mastered the flies that trout and steelhead salivate over.

Now he has turned his interests toward what has nearly become a lost art — the art of tying full-dress Atlantic salmon flies.

The full-dress salmon fly is really the ultimate expression of the fly tying art, Goss says. "It's beautiful to look at and it has so much tradition behind it."

Some of the feathers found their way into the hands of fishermen in Ireland, Scotland and England. These fishermen designed a whole group of flies which were loud, gaudy and colorful, indicative of the style of the times.

Since salmon do not feed actively when they enter fresh water to spawn, the fly does not need to match a hatch or imitate food. The fish simply strike at anything that intrigues them.

Experimenting with the array of newly available feathers, fishermen developed a unique group of flies that were more fanciful, more colorful than anything they had tied before, Goss said.

Over the years as materials became scarce due to expense and conservation practices, hair-wing flies took their place.

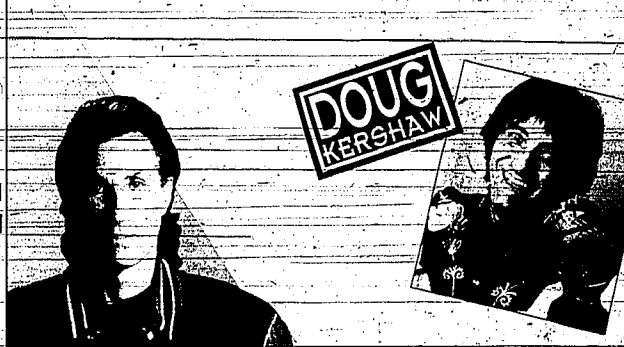

The band will release a statement in the next two weeks detailing the earnings from the all-star fund-raising event.

Meanwhile, radio programmers who are concerned with finding a follow-up single to "Bohemian Rhapsody" (still No. 4 this week) can rest easy. The band's "Stone Cold Crazy" from 1974 will be part of the soundtrack for "Fencing Man," a new film starring comic Pauley Shore. Others contributing to the "Encino" film include the Smotherses, the Infectious Grooves and Vince Neil, lead of Motley Crue.

# Brooks, Jackson win big at country awards

UNIVERSAL CITY, Calif. (AP) — Showman Garth Brooks and lanky Alan Jackson each took home two top prizes from the annual Academy of Country Music awards presentation. And Reba McEntire won her sixth best female vocalist award.

Brooks led with the entertainer of the year and male vocalist trophies Wednesday night at the 27th annual of the presentations.

Brooks had led the current renaissance in country music, selling more than 15 million albums and most-selling even Michael Jackson on the pop music charts.

Brooks went into the show leading with six nominations, with Alan Jackson close behind.

Jackson's "Don't Rock the Jukebox" won best album and song.

"Thank God and the Grand Ole Opry for country music," said Jackson, who debuted last year as the new male vocalist winner.

McEntire's best female vocalist award was joined by the top video prize for her "Is There Life Out There."

"You never cease to amaze me. This is dress-up, this is fun, this is exciting," she told the audience.

Another double winner was Billy Dean, who took the new male singer award and the best song trophy for "Somewhere in My Broken Heart."

"For a newcomer, you guys don't know what this means. This is going to mean a lot to my career. It gives me confidence," Dean said.

Top group honors went to Diamond Rio and the Nashville team Brooks & Dunn, who won the vocal duet and new group awards.

The new female vocalist award went to Trisha Yearwood. "This is a lot heavier than I thought," she said after being handed her first ACM "Hit" trophy.

The academy bestowed its non-competitive Pioneer Award on Willie Nelson for "outstanding and unprecedented achievement in the field of country music." Past recipients include Gene Autry, Johnny

Cash, Buck Owens, Kitty Wells and Roy Rogers.

# Madonna makes music industry take her seriously

Item: In the wake of recent megamillion-dollar deals for such acts as Motley Crue, Aerosmith and Michael Jackson, Madonna has signed one of the richest contracts of all. The deal — actually several separate deals, all with Time Warner — provides for her ventures into recording, song publishing, film and TV production, even the formation of her own record label. Total price tag: a rumored \$60 million.

We often don't take women all that seriously in this country. You can see it for yourself in everything from the average-beer-commercial to the flood of crocodile tears that greeted the falling of convicted rapist Mike Tyson. Poor Mike, they wailed. I didn't hurt anyone at all crying for his victim.

And why should they? Women's lives don't matter. Oh, we say they do, but we know they don't. Normally.

Pop music's record is particularly dismal in that regard. Yes, I know I reported some months back that the industry has improved with regard to sexism — and it has. There are more female executives now, and they have more power than they ever did. There's a cause for celebration.

But there is so much that still needs doing — particularly on the creative end. From Michael Bolton and Richard Marx to Nirvana and Naughty by Nature — newcomers and veterans alike — male acts are often given the creative reins in terms of songwriting and production.

But women get that freedom only rarely. Typically, a mainstream female group is purely the creation of male producers. And that term, creation, is not used lightly. Most audition and sessions, even tell their artists what to wear. The women's job? To sing — or lip-synch — as they are told. Oh yeah, and to be pretty.

Even women as seasoned as Gladys Knight and Aretha Franklin don't often get the sort of control their status should afford them.

So I'm glad Time Warner is paying Madonna six million bucks.

But you got serious reservations about the long-term wisdom of the recent trend toward this kind of megadeal.

But I'm glad she's getting it. Yes, I remember what I once wrote: "I will not like Madonna. I will not like Madonna."

Still don't like her as a person. She's crass and needlessly cruel.

But yeah, I'm glad. Glad because it says something about her long-needed saying. And it says it without the hint that accompanied Janet Jackson's recent megadeal. Because let's face it: For all the success she's had in recent years, Janet Jackson is still regarded — and rightly so — as a creation of her producers, the prodigiously talented Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis.

Madonna, on the other hand, is the creation of one person: Madonna.

I wish I could say I saw her coming back when she made her debut in '83, but that'd be a lie. As I recall, E.G. Daily and several other pretty young women whose names escape me now were all riding high on the charts back then with innocuous dance hits. Madonna, with early successes like "Holiday" and "Lucky Star," was simply one of the pack.

"Like a Virgin" was the hit that suggested a reevaluation might be in order. It combined the crisp, uncomplicated pummability of early Motown or Beatles with a coy, sweet charm that was strictly her own. There was a sophistication there, a sense of style that wasn't evident on the earlier hits.

Over the years, Madonna has only deepened and refined that feeling, mixing the sacred and the profane with provocative aplomb. In songs like "Express Yourself," "Papa Don't Preach" and "Like a Prayer," she has managed to give us that rarity: dance hits that have something to say, some relevance beyond the disco floor.

## But you want to know the most amazing thing about Madonna?

She has never been out of style. See, this industry is one of cycles. The average life span of a hit artist is five years. After that, the hits become misses, your star begins to fade. Oh, the faithful might still turn out for your concerts — you might even mount a comeback — but that fervent sense of urgency and discovery is gone, usually never to return.

It's happened to Madonna one day, but the miracle is that it hasn't happened yet. Not even after nine years — a couple of lifetimes in pop. We've never lost interest in her. And she has always been — or seemed, anyway — in control of it all.

Someone once said this of Madonna: Women have spent years being exploited by men. Now, with her, they've reached the point where a woman can exploit herself. Is this progress?

I'd have to answer yes. Because whatever she is, the point remains that Madonna made herself that. Although she's worked with often like composer Patrick Leonard and producer Nile Rodgers, she's had nobody pulling her strings, telling her what to do. And she has had monstrous success. Created a phenomenon.

Now the mucky-mucks at Time Warner have reached deep into the corporate coffers to come up with a sum that will properly acknowledge her achievements. And in the process make her probably the most powerful woman in pop — if she isn't already.

It's about time they did. And I'm happy for her. Because we DON'T take women seriously. We belittle their achievements and scuttle their dreams. Often without even meaning to.

I've done it. Most men have probably done it. Women themselves do it all the time.

So Madonna's big bucks represent the capture of an important beachhead in the march toward enlightenment. What's the old saying? Money talks. It means that in this country, cash is the ultimate arbiter of what is serious.

Time Warner is forking over \$60 million to Madonna. You don't get more serious than that.

Last month, I discovered that I am HIV-positive. I have not dated since the breakup, and I have no other risk factors.

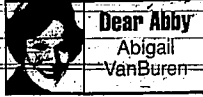

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# Goodman is good, but 'Babe' misses

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**THE BABE (PG)**—The N.Y. Yankee home run legend and Roaring '20s idol has always seemed too much of a subject — too big, humpious and prodigiously skilled, too much a proletarian sports genius in a platoon of cranks — for the movies to handle, and this Arthur Hiller-John Fusco movie misses it again. John Goodman is good as The Babe, but watching this movie — with its careful period decor, sincere direction and well-researched but sanitized script — is like watching a highly professional-but dull-baseball game where the players are being fanned from base to base.

**BASIC INSTINCT (R)**: This tale of a tough cop (Michael Douglas) who falls for a sultry murder suspect (Sharon Stone) has been the center of an innumerable series of controversies that turn out to be more interesting than the film itself. Despite liberal amounts of nudity, its sexual feelings and its plot is filled with implausibilities. Instead of lifting you up, director Paul Verhoeven only wears you out, and while that is something, it is not nearly enough.

**BEETHOVEN (PG)**—A pleasant doggie comedy — bright and slick as a shopping mall, with a big, lovable Saint Bernard conquering upright dogs and evil yet obedient — that benefits from Charles Grodin's effortless work as the papa, some attractive pups and canines and a general air of pleasant, unambitious sympathy.

**FERNGULLY — THE LAST RAINBOW (G)**—With its bright colors, upbeat rock sound track and strong ecological message, this modest-but-promising animated film should delight children and amuse their older

siblings and parents. In his feature debut, director Bill Kroyer manages to keep the action moving, although he's saddled with a very talky script that tells the story, through words, rather than visuals. The animation looks reasonably fluid, although the characters really don't do much acting.

**FRIED GREEN TOMATOES (PG-13)**. A fine group of appealing, audience-friendly performances in a not very involving motion picture. Not only does this film deal with Southern women in a fragmented, circular style, its very existence makes you wonder how its trapped actresses (Jessica Tandy, Mary Stuart Masterson, Kathy Bates and Mary-Louise Parker) managed to make the best of a dramatically disheartening situation.

**THE LAWMOWER MAN (R)**. Another high-tech movie with low-tech people based on a Stephen King story about a sweet, dopey gardener (Jeff Fahey) who has his IQ fantastically boosted, enters into a Philip Dick-alternate state called "virtual reality" and generally wreaks havoc across Sweet Suburbia, U.S.A. This Brett Leonard-Gimel Everest movie has lots of visual dash and fire — spectacular, but somewhat unconvincing. It's lost in its own FX: a horror fake of intelligence in which no one speaks intelligently.

**STEPHEN KING'S SLEEPWALKERS (R)**. This bottom-of-the-barrel-for-the-famed-horrormeister; morbid, silly ultra-violent trash involving monsters who can assume human form. With Brian Krauss, Mädchen Amick and Alice Krige.

**WHITE MEN CAN'T JUMP (R)**. No one knows the funny fringes of sport like "Bull Durham" writer-director Ron Shelton — and in this sassy and profane urban fairy tale he has the expert comic help of Wesley Snipes and Woody Harrison as pie-cup and baseball hitters on the loose in L.A. The film is unstoppable on the court but, except for a one-of-a-kind performance by Rosie Perez, as a Jeopardy-obsessed "giffindell, is less sure-footed off it.

# 'Newsies' survives clash of storylines

**HOLLYWOOD**—Certain movies engage your affections so strongly that, even if they start to fall apart, you tend to keep rooting for them. That's pretty much the case with "Newsies."

## Review

It's a big, bright, rousing period musical and its subject — the 1899 New York City newsboys' strike — makes it an anachronism. The various elements often seem to clash: Golden Age musical and the '30s- or '60s-style left-wing labor drama, the young cast exclaiming and leaning to songs like "Seize the Day" while the writers try to fill a broad canvas with social detail.

The happily sunny Hollywood, buoy ending, probably a commercial prerequisite, clashes with everything. The real strike didn't end this rapidly, and to suggest that these Newsies could bring Gollath Pulitzer and Hearst to their knees with heat and hope, some slingshots and an assist from Teddy Roosevelt, is as false to the material as it is history.

Yet, for all its failures, "Newsies" has something that many successes miss. It's done with such full-bore enthusiasm, verve and energy, that it does have moments that lift your heart or moisten your eyes. Kenny Ortega, the director and (with Peggy Holmes) the co-choreographer, doesn't act as though his material has flaws: perfunctory plot, cloying lyrics or characters. He's like his newsies: He's out to seize the day. When the material works, he does.

The story is archetypal. We meet three boys who will be active in the

strike: an intellectual (David Moscow), his cute kid brother (Luke Edwards) and a devil-may-care rogue (Christian Bale). We get a glimpse of their seething turn-of-the-century world, and the forces arrayed against them: local bullies, their weaselly distributor ("Barton Fink"), splendidly sleazy Michael Pulitzer, played as a cold, Joseph-patronic by Robert Duvall.

In the first, and best, part of "Newsies," Ortega keeps rushing us and the boys from place to place, in big, eye-catching, mobile Panavision shots that bustle and boil with back-ground detail. The production design and cinematography (Andrew Laszlo) are often smashing, and Bale, the boy protagonist of "Empire of the Sun," has lots of sweetwise charis-

ma. When we reach the end of the first "act" — Bale's wistfully romantic, nocturnal walk-in-the-streets-and-dream number "Santa Fe" — the movie has created its own little world, sucked us in with its movie-movie romanticism.

Then Pulitzer raises his paper costs, the strike begins, and the premise crumbles: "Newsies" which, up till then, has looked a bit like "Oliver" mixed with "Raiders" and "Angels With Dirty Faces," suddenly becomes, more obviously, a formula Disney movie. The tone goes off. There's little sense of how this strike might develop or sustain itself.

Writers Bob Tzudiker and Nona White drag in a reformatory, an evil warden (Kevin Tighe, the porcine

thing from John Syles' movies), an idealistic reporter (Bill Pullman), improbable turnarounds, benefits (with Ann-Margret) and melodrama galore. "Newsies" becomes a string of set-pieces, some of which work, some of which don't.

Yet, if you're caught by its opening — probably a matter of production — it keeps some of its charm. Composer Alan Menken, who lost his longtime partner, lyricist Howard Ashman, to AIDS, is like Rodgers without his Hart. He has a new lyricist here, Jack Feldman (who, unpromisingly, wrote Barry Manilow's "Copacabana"), but, though Feldman can't match Ashman, Manilow's music is still in the best Tin Pan Alley Broadway heart-throb tradition. It has lift-and-range, infectious inevitability.

# Disney to begin marketing animated artwork

**HOLLYWOOD** — The Walt Disney Co. is about to change the 'toon of the \$100-million-a-year trade in animation cels — the colorful paintings that, until Disney used a sophisticated computer program to make its block-buster "Beauty and the Beast," were the handmade individual building blocks of all cartoons from "Steamboat Willie" to "The Simpsons."

The company is preparing to market cels from "Beauty" that were never used to make the movie itself. The studio, which pioneered animated paintings, will score off "Sink and Paint" and "Facing Drawings and then hand-painting thousands of individual cels has now delegated those expensive jobs to its new computer system.

The result? A boundless new frontier for animation. Critics and animators agree that the revolutionary ability to manipulate cartoon images digitally will produce animation never before thought possible, and at a lower cost.

"The rub?" — Images that exist only as the binary zeros and ones of a computer's memory. Because they are electronically transferred-to-film, they bypass the traditional steps of creating and filming production cels.

The remedy? Disney is manufacturing so-called "pre-rendered" cels and hand-painting them, solely for the fast-growing, lucrative collecting market. It's a huge, collectibles business of original and limited-edition artworks with more than 350 galleries across the country and multimillion-dollar sales by the same auction houses that sell Rembrandts and Picassos.

Sotheby's auction house, in New York was expected to announce plans Thursday for a special sale of the specially created artwork from "Beauty" to be held later this year.

"I think it's a great thing that just at the moment that the animation industry is trying to phase out cels, the cels have never been more valuable and desirable," said film critic Leonard Maltin, a collector and author of "Of Mice and Magic," about the history of Disney animation. "It's pretty amusing actually."

Disney, which sells animation artwork through its studio art program and more than 100 Disney stores worldwide, has good reason to keep the animation art market alive. So for the Sotheby's auction, Disney will be combining its created cels with original backgrounds hand-painted for use in "Beauty" to re-create scenes as they appeared in the movie.

Serious collectors and gallery owners say created cels will drive up the value of vintage cels from animation past — more and more of the industry moves over to computers.

Computers may diminish the production of new animation art but in no way will diminish the collectibility or the value of existing animation art, said Michael Halpert, director of the Crickler Gallery in Atlanta. "Just the opposite. Hand-painted art will be much more sought after, and existing quality animation art will remain extremely desirable and become extremely more valuable."

Some collectors are concerned that

an unsuspecting public will be duped into believing that the cel reproductions Disney has planned were used in the making of movies.

Traditionally, animators pencil drawings, were traced or photocopied onto celluloid and then painstakingly colored by hand. Now, on feature films, Disney digitally scans the pencil drawings into a computer, which paints them in electronic strokes of vivid colors. "The time-saving and money-saving procedure has revolutionized the industry, as companies using a computer-assisted animation technique are being contracted for work throughout Hollywood."

Police Chief Paul Pries would not comment Thursday on the possibility of a second suspect in the April 13 attack. But he said an investigation is continuing.

Detective Terry Quinn said in an affidavit that a woman entering the pawn shop apparently was attacked while a lethal attack on pawnbroker Randy Walker, 54, was still going on. That testimony suggests two attackers, Quinn wrote.

## Taking flight

### Buhl teacher, kids nurse injured birds back to health

**BUHL** — An osprey perches in a large cage with a bandage around one talon. The bird is recuperating at Buhl High School after it damaged the talon in wire at a trout farm near Deep Creek Road.

Students Cassie Payne and her friend Eilbon Nield visit the osprey twice a day, don heavy welding gloves and gingerly feed the big bird and give it therapy, gently bending the joints in the sore talon.

"He's a little more calm now," says Payne. "We feed him fingerlings right now. At first, we had to force feed him. He was afraid."

The two seniors and about 10 other students are helping the birds recuperate from their injuries in a unique raptor rehabilitation program at the school.

In the case of the osprey, it could be weeks or months before the bird is released into the wild.

Payne explains the talon is healing, but for now the bird has lost its balance from the injury and is still a little wobbly. Meanwhile, the students are also waiting for some tom feathers on its right wing to grow back.

The rehabilitation program begun by science teacher Ed Richards last June so far has attracted 10 students into the program, while another 20 are waiting to join.

In nearly a year, the students have cared for 17 different injured birds, and Richards says they've had good success in saving many of them.

The birds have included barn and great horned owls, rough legged sparrows, hawks and golden eagles.

Most of the birds that come to the birds' problems are man-made. They fly into power lines and get tangled up in nets set up to protect fish at commercial hatcheries.

Some of the birds are poisoned, and one hawk had been shot.

"There are more raptors here than anywhere else in the continental United States," Richards said. Alaska is the only other state to have more.

Richards said the main objective is to rescue the injured bird and take it back to the high school to evaluate the severity of

is injuries and take it to a veterinary clinic in Twin Falls if necessary.

Sometimes, the bird is taken to the Raptor Rehabilitation Foundation in Glens Ferry.

Pat Smith, who runs the foundation, has worked with the students helping them learn the basics of treating infections, wrapping wings, feeding the birds and other care.

The osprey arrived in Buhl in the hands of Fish and Game department field supervisor Gary Hompland.

He said the Buhl program has been invaluable, allowing him to have more time to carry on his law enforcement duties.

Hompland also often lets the students handle the capture of the injured birds.

As for the osprey, Payne says students may have to teach the bird to fly after it is fully healed.

Payne adds she doesn't object, though. "It's really awesome to hold a osprey in your own hands," she said.

## 911 manager targets addresses as top priority; start-up date likely delayed

**TWIN FALLS** — The manager of the enhanced 911 project starts work today and says his top priority will be getting a street address guide in place.

Without the address guide, E-911 won't work, Alan Sandner said at a news conference Thursday. Sandner will earn \$30,000 a year as project manager of the four-county system.

The chairman of the four-county joint board for the project, Twin Falls County

Commissioner Marvin Hempleman, also said Thursday that the counties likely will not meet their original target date to have the system running.

Hempleman said he had hoped the system would be in place by February 1993. That date now might be delayed as long as six months, he said.

Sandner will help Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties decide what kind of equipment to buy and how to get the system running. He'll also find a building for the central dispatch center and then manage the system when it's running.

The address guide will match the addresses of residences in the four counties — Twin Falls, Jerome, Lincoln and Gooding — with the appropriate police, medical and fire agencies.

Residential addresses will be put into a grid system and entered in the address guide. When someone calls the E 911 system, the caller's address automatically will flash on a computer screen and the appropriate fire, police, or medical agency will be listed with the address.

## Employee embezzled, jury finds

**HAILEY** — The 12-member jury in the embezzlement trial of Michael Vierra returned a verdict of guilty on all 45 counts brought against him.

Vierra, 47, was found guilty Wednesday of seven counts of forgery and 38 counts of embezzling funds from the Topnotch fine furnishings store in Ketchum, where he was employed for 16 months between 1989 and 1991. He misappropriated more than \$100,000 of the company's funds during that period.

This man was transferring monies and spending monies faster than all of us could hope to do," said prosecutor Ned Williamson in his closing argument.

During an eight-day trial Williamson detailed a series of complicated transactions Vierra made on corporate checking and charge card accounts without authorization of the Topnotch owners, Bret and Lori Berier.

Vierra's defense team, led by attorney James Reid of Boise, maintained that the defendant was authorized to use the corporate accounts by Bret Berier without his wife's knowledge.

Bret Berier denied that assertion on the witness stand. He described how Vierra gained his trust and was given control of the company's books.

"I put my trust in him that he would do what was in the best interest of the business," Berier testified.

Vierra will be sentenced at a later date.

## Hearings set in Amanda death case

**TWIN FALLS** — Three felony indictments stemming from the death of a 2-year-old Twin Falls girl in January will be sent back to Magistrate Court for preliminary hearings.

"This effectively nullifies any decision making of the grand jury," Twin Falls County Public Defender Mike Wood said after a brief hearing in 5th District court Thursday.

Wood represented Daniel "Bub" Stradley, 28, who was indicted by a grand jury three months ago on a first-degree murder charge in connection with the death of Amanda Hostetter. Prosecutors allege that the child was beaten to death after a long history of abuse.

The girl's mother, 20-year-old Jodie Hostetter, was indicted on two counts of felony child abuse. Both remain free on bond.

Defense attorneys in both cases challenged the indictments in court, but reached a "diplomatic decision" with prosecutors to allow the indictments to stand while returning the cases for a preliminary hearing. Hostetter's attorney, Tom Ketschov, said.

5th District Magistrate John Varin will hear the cases May 13. Varin must decide whether the state has enough evidence to take them to District Court for trial.

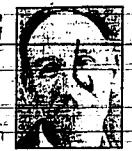

"They're taking the honest intentions of the people and using them to further Gary Glenn's career," said McMurrian, a longtime Democrat who ran for City Council as a Green last year. He now says he's on his own politically.

The letters, printed on Idaho State Property Owners Association letterhead, but paid for by the Glenn campaign, urged 1 Percent supporters to "make sure that your right now is for the largest amount you can afford" and to vote for Glenn.  
In the letter, association president Rankin refers to state Sen. Mike Crapo, Glenn's opponent in the Republican primary, as "Tax Hike Mike" for opposing the 1 Percent and supporting increases in sales, income and gas taxes.  
Rankin defended using the names of 1 Percent petition signers as a mailing list. Glenn, an Ada County commissioner, is one of only two county commissioners who have been a member of the 1 Percent Initiative. He has been a more active supporter, manning booths at fairs last fall and collecting some 600 signatures at Idaho State University a few weeks ago.  
McMurrian said he opposes Glenn because of the leading role he played in getting Idaho's "right-to-work" law enacted in the 1980s.  
"I think he's one of the two worst people (along with officials of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints) in the 2nd District," he said, adding that he doesn't like any of the 2nd District candidates.  
However, Dan Beard, one of the leaders in the Magic Valley 1 Percent movement, said he didn't see anything with narrowly sending the Glenn letters to petition signers.  
"Mailing lists are bought and sold and used and borrowed at just about every level of our society," he said. Beard said he hadn't decided who he would vote for in the May 26 primary, but "at this point, I'm inclined to vote for (Glenn)."

Those not registered to vote must do so before 8 p.m. June 12, at City Hall.

# Oregon Trail organizers to gather

**BURLEY** - Anyone who wants to help plan activities for next year's 150th anniversary of the Oregon Trail in "the county with the mostest trails" will come to a meeting Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the Cassia County School District.  
Chairman Bill Boggs was appointed by the Cassia County Commission to organize a group of volunteers to plan events.  
"We really have a story to tell," Boggs said. "So much history went through here. Cassia County has more historic trails than any other county in Idaho."  
He said there are still about 85 miles of trails visible and at the time the pioneers were moving west, Cassia County had 234 miles of routes. Boggs said he needs a committee to oversee the planning of activities for the year and also needs committees to make each program happen.  
There will be informational projects, social events, sporting events, trail rides; just to mention a few, Boggs said.  
He said he expects between 70,000 and 100,000 cars to turn off of Interstate 84 at Burley because of a growing interest in the Oregon Trail and other historic trails in Cassia County.  
Boggs, who works for the Bureau of Land Management, said he commonly sees out-of-state cars when he stops by the Oregon Trail Visitor Center near Milner Dam, while requests for information received by his agency continue to grow.

# Frustrated jurors, prosecutor trade shots over verdict in Baldwin case

**BOISE (AP)** - Prosecutors brought the wrong charges and police botched their surveillance of Idaho County Sheriff Randy Baldwin, said frustrated jurors who acquitted Baldwin of federal robbery and drug charges.  
But the prosecutor who tried the case said the jury missed the point that Baldwin was guilty of attempted robbery the moment he admitted breaking into the Nampa house when he was arrested.  
"The jury, I'm afraid, got caught up in the sympathy of a not-very-bright sheriff and they missed it," Assistant U.S. attorney Kim Lindquist said Wednesday.  
Baldwin's admission during trial last week that he broke into a repaired drug dealer's home to set him up for arrest was by definition an attempted robbery, Lindquist said.  
Jurors said they felt the charge should have been burglary, instead of robbery.  
Baldwin, 37, and Lamonte Duane Jack, 46, formerly of Grangeville, were arrested last Dec. 20 after entering the Nampa home.  
After a 10-day trial, Baldwin was acquitted last week on charges of attempted robbery, conspiracy to commit a robbery, possession of drugs with intent to deliver and using a firearm in a felony.  
Both Baldwin and Jack still face trial on state charges in June.  
Jurors said the fact that Baldwin never left the house with drugs or money raised doubts about whether he intended to rob the owner, or scatter evidence for police, as he claimed.  
"As far as we were concerned, the cops blew the case when they didn't wait another 60 seconds before confronting Baldwin and Jack," said Michael Stumpy, a juror from Boise.  
"They called a halt to the thing right at the point it would have been not obvious what was going to happen next," Monte Jack said.  
Baldwin and Jack were seen physically outside the house with the safe in his hands. If they would have left the thing play out another 60 seconds, there wouldn't have been any questions in anybody's mind," said Stumpy.  
"We were all frustrated," Stumpy said. Jack was convicted of all but the drug charge and faces up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine on the first two charges and five years on the handgun charge.  
Joe Day, a Drug Enforcement Administration agent, said surveillance team members felt they had to act quickly to avoid a possible shootout on the residential street.  
Jury foreman Dale Bingham of Payette said jurors felt the outcome would have been different had prosecutors brought a burglary charge, or police waited another five or 10 minutes before making arrests.  
Other jurors said the evidence didn't match the charges brought against Baldwin.  
"If it had been some other charges perhaps there could have been another verdict," said Jeanie Harris of Emmett. "I felt badly that they had not let the surveillance last long enough to be able to determine and get more evidence."  
"We didn't have enough strong evidence to prove robbery and possession of a gun during a robbery," she said. "He could have been doing what he said or what the prosecution said."

# BYU ponders draft on academic freedom

**PROVO, Utah (AP)** - Brigham Young University on Thursday asked its faculty to comment on a proposed statement of policy on academic freedom that includes "reasonable limitations" at the Mormon Church-owned school.  
The limitations govern any behavior in an expression that "seriously and adversely affects the university mission or the church."  
The university gave faculty members three months in which to respond to the 9%-page document drafted by a 10-member faculty committee headed by John S. Tanner, an English professor. The committee was formed in July 1991.  
BYU President Rex E. Lee met Thursday with academic deans and department heads to review the statement, endorsed by the administration and, "in principle," by the BYU Board of Trustees.  
The board is comprised of Thursday officials of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.  
As a church-sponsored university, BYU is "an endangered species" in today's academic ecosystem. To force religious institutions to comply with narrowly secular definitions of academic freedom is to further imperil the survival of these distinctive intellectual communities, the document says.

## Irrigators say Idaho Power rate hike plan not justified

BOISE (AP) — Irrigation interests attacked an Idaho Power Co. request for a drought surcharge on Thursday, arguing the company's financial condition does not justify customers paying another \$17.9 million.

Other customer groups also questioned the temporary rate hike plan with industrial customers expressing the hope that the case would convince state regulators to set up a system where customers not only help bear the costs of drought but also benefit from the excessive profits in good water years.

Idaho Power Chairman Joe Marshall indicated some support for a scheme to raise rates in tough times and provide refunds in good ones. But he maintained the \$5.3 million decline in the utility's retained earnings since the drought began six years ago was not the indicator of financial health that irrigators' attorney Randy Budge claimed.

"That alarms me, that concerns me," Marshall said during the opening session of the Public Utility Commission's hearings on a one-year surcharge plan that would add about \$32 to the average residential power bill over the next 12 months.

"It's certainly not an indicator that the company is doing very well," Marshall said.

"Over time, retained earnings should grow," Budge, however, claimed the earnings decline can partially be attributed to the utility's decision in 1989, in the midst of the continuing drought, to increase the cash dividend for stockholders.

Under questioning, Marshall admitted the company was financially strong enough to justify the increased cash payout to stockholders.

Budge also pointed out that since 1981, a period that included some of the wettest and driest years the utility has experienced, retained earnings are up \$90 million, an annualized increase through 1991 of more than 6 percent.

He also questioned the justification for the

surcharge when he contended Idaho Power is not adequately using its Nevada coal-fired generating plant and is contemplating purchase of a new corporate jet.

Idaho Power attorney Larry Ripley vigorously objected to both assertions, claiming neither was relevant to whether the surcharge was justified.

Budge, however, said both reflect the financial condition of the company and that condition is relevant "if they want to come after the ratepayer in times of drought."

But at the heart of the irrigators' objections was the fact that the utility never considered customer refunds during the early- and mid-1980s when abundant water significantly reduced its operating costs because its hydro-generating system could provide a greater share of the electricity demanded by other customers.

"We feel there's a lack of fairness and equity in that," Budge told the commission.

Utility figures showed that during the first half of the 1980s when water was abundant and the need for other more expensive sources of power limited, it found an average of \$135 million less on power costs than its customer rates provided for. But once the drought began, that financial advantage was more than offset in just three years and by the end of last year, the utility's cost of producing power over the previous decade was \$147 million more than its rates were expected to finance.

That shows, Idaho Power rate analyst Gregory Said testified, that the savings generated in the 1980s was eventually turned back to customers, and Said emphasized that the surcharge plan would do nothing to recover any of the \$147 million in excess power costs the company has suffered already.

Coupled with an equal share from stockholders, the surcharge is intended only to stop the excess power costs from rising even

more. Marshall said the situation had become so severe that Idaho Power could no longer avoid seeking temporarily higher rates. Without the rate hike, he said the utility's financial stability would be threatened.

And while he supported the concept of a power cost adjustment clause that would refund money when costs are below normal and assess higher rates when the costs are excessive, he cautioned that such a scheme could not be implemented until more normal water years return.

The commission staff has recommended a \$15 million increase that would spread only a third of the burden of the excessive power costs to ratepayers. Stockholders would bear the rest. The company plans sees each bearing half.

In 1988, when the commission approved a \$9.6 million drought surcharge, ratepayers took on only about a quarter of the excess power costs.

## INEL cutback will hit E. Idaho hard

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Business leaders and economic analysts say it is too early to assess the repercussions, but layoffs at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory could deliver a severe blow to eastern Idaho's economy.

"This is a major layoff and it will have significant impacts on the Idaho Falls economy," said Paul Zelus, director of Idaho State University's Center for Business Research and Service.

Zelus, who has conducted several economic studies of INEL, said it is difficult to comment on the consequences of the layoffs without analyzing the type of jobs to be eliminated. Still, he said, any time 1,000 people are put out of work, the impact will be significant.

The Idaho Chemical Processing Plant cutbacks are the largest in Bonneville County's history, said Ed Hunter, job analyst with the Department of Employment.

In comparison, 294 workers were terminated when the Utah-Idaho Sugar factory shut down in 1980.

The Department of Energy announced Wednesday it will lay off 500 construction workers and 550 research and development workers over the next 17 months. Some construction jobs could be lost quickly.

"It's possible a couple subcontractors could be terminated immediately," said INEL spokesman Brad Bigger.

Bigger said layoffs also could trigger employment reductions by other site contractors providing support services at the Chem. Plant. Security and transportation personnel are examples.

INEL spokesman Nick Nichols said every effort will be made to retrain and relocate laid-off workers, but the site probably won't be able to find jobs for everybody.

A study conducted by Zelus last year showed the INEL's 12,300 workers earned \$424 million. The study also said two-thirds of all INEL activity is concentrated in Idaho Falls and Bonneville County where two-thirds of all site employees live.

Many INEL workers also live in Bannock, Butte, Bingham, Jefferson and Madison counties.

One economic analyst played down significance of the layoffs.

Bill Weida, chairman of the economics department at Colorado College in Colorado Springs, said the job losses will be mitigated because some workers will retire and layoffs will be spread over a two-year period.

"I think the actual economic effect will be minimal," he said.

## Beating verdict shocks, dismays Idahoans

Pocatello police officers and a civil rights leader expressed shock and dismay over Wednesday's acquittal of four Los Angeles police officers accused of beating black motorist Rodney King.

At Boise, a Statehouse rally drew about 70 people who complained about the verdict.

"I was positive they were going to get convicted," said John Purce, past president of the Pocatello chapter of the NAACP. "This is something everyone in America who has a television set has seen. It's really sad to think that this is the sort of typical behavior for law enforcement officers."

The King case drew national attention when a videotape showing officers beating King was repeatedly aired on newscasts. It was a key piece of evidence during a jury trial in Simi Valley, Calif.

Purce predicted Wednesday night's street violence in the Los Angeles area. He said the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is concerned about police brutality involving blacks and Hispanics in southern California.

Those complaints are a top agenda item at regional NAACP meetings.

"It's the victim's word against the police officer in most cases. Police officers are under the veil. In this case, everybody saw it," Purce said.

Bannock County Sheriff Bill Lynn said he was shocked by the verdict.

"My overriding emotion was disappointment," Lynn said. "As law enforcement officers, we all saw the tape and we thought it was absolutely disgusting. There was no way it could be justified."

He said if the L.A. officers were indeed acting within guidelines, then those policies need to be revised.

While Lynn said he understood the frustration that has led to violence, he said that "rage and disappointment" can be counterproductive in the long run.

The sheriff said he doesn't expect the verdict to have repercussions in Idaho because of its rural nature. He

said small town police departments usually don't deal with racial clashes as common in many large cities.

Pocatello Police Chief Jim Benham, president of the Idaho Chiefs of Police, said he was surprised by the verdict, but said law enforcement must attempt to rebuild public trust.

He was concerned that the area where the rioting is occurring is in poor neighborhoods which can least afford the losses.

"From my perspective, I hope that we can work our way through this and start the healing process," Benham said.

"We have to regain the trust of those who might have been lost through this whole situation."

At Boise, about 70 people gathered outside the Statehouse after the verdict was announced. They shouted, "Let's build prisons for police," and "No brutality!"

"Hopefully enough angry people will make some sort of difference," said Melissa Gulpepper, a Boise State University art major. "We're right back to where Martin Luther King was where people were beaten in the streets. I don't want to see that for my kids."

## Boise police arrest rape suspect

BOISE (AP) — Citizen tips have led to the Boise arrest of a man wanted in connection with the kidnapping and assault of a 15-year-old Mountain Home girl.

Marshall Stauffer, 63, was in the Elmore County Jail late Wednesday after his arrest earlier in the day, sheriff's Detective Tom Berry said.

Stauffer awaited arraignment on charges of first-degree kidnapping, aggravated assault, lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor, an infamous crime against nature and use of a firearm in a felony.

"He is currently being held on a \$3 million bond," Berry said.

Boise police arrested Stauffer, also known as William R. Nickerson and Roger Kurth, as he tried to drive away from his residence.

### Search called off

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — A search has been called off for an 18-year-old Canadian youth missing since his family's motor home plunged into the Salmon River near Riggins.

Tracy Bonner of the Idaho County Sheriff's Office said the search was halted late Tuesday after divers from the local counties and state finished looking from the accident site about three miles north of Riggins downriver to Lucile.

### Kooskia boy killed

KOOSKIA (AP) — An 8-year-old Kooskia-area boy was killed when he was accidentally run over by a vehicle, Idaho County authorities say.

Chase LaBudie was reportedly killed Wednesday evening on the Tahoe Ridge above Kooskia, county dispatcher Kim Zumwalt said.

The boy was taken to Clearwater Valley Hospital in Orofino, where he was pronounced dead.

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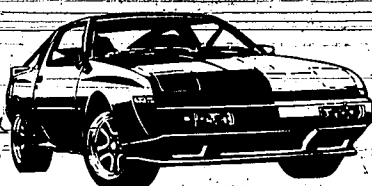
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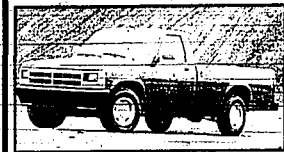

# New 'Dayo' dawns for Delta

Delta Burke has redesigned herself. After five turbulent seasons on "Designing Women," followed by some much-needed time off, Burke is back with a new hair color, a new TV movie and a new series on a new network. The hair is blond, the TV movie is called "Dayo," and the new ABC series will be called "Delta." And the Orlando, Fla. native is thrilled about all three.

In "Dayo," (airing Sunday, May 3 on NBC), Burke, still a brunette when she filmed it, plays an under-appreciated career woman whose imaginary childhood playmate makes a reappearance, turning her life upside-down. The TV movie's inner-child theme couldn't be more timely, what with such recent examples of the genre as "Herman's Head" and the big screen's "Drop Dead Fred."

"I thought we were being original, but I guess not," concedes the 35-year-old actress, who has been nominated twice for an Emmy. "But that was one of the things I liked about it when I first saw the script. We all have that inner child that usually has the good gut reaction to stuff, but we don't listen to it as we get older."

The whimsical fantasy, which also stars young Elijah Wood ("Radio

Flyer"), gives Burke an opportunity to wean her fans off her Suzanne Sugarbaker persona. It also allows her to croon the title song, originally made famous by Harry Belafonte. Well, maybe not croon.

"It's not like a singable song, really," Burke admits. "I had to belt it out there really loud. She wasn't supposed to be good. But it was frightening to go screaming out in this voice and hear it, nothing but your voice, no music, belting around that set. It just about undid me."

Burke will get another chance to stretch her vocal cords in her upcoming series. In "Delta," she'll play the part of a frustrated woman who decides to take control of her life and pursue her dream of becoming a country-and-western singer. Shooting of the pilot, which also features Earl Holliman, has just been completed, and, if all goes well, the series should make it onto ABC's fall schedule. And, adds Burke, there are obvious parallels between her new series character and her real-life situation.

"Towards the end of 'Designing Women,' I was at a place where I didn't really want to be in the business at all anymore," she says. "But then along came an idea I was really excited about. For me, I am starting over."

While her well-publicized

"Designing Women" trauma is now behind her, Burke still admits to being haunted by the experience.

"What I went through was very, very emotional and very complicated," she says. "Most people will not believe me when I say what happened, so there's no real point in getting into it. Basically, it was like putting in five tours of duty in Vietnam."

Alda starred in many top movies, though none as successful as the Gershwin story. He also starred as Sky Masterson, the gambler, in the original stage production of "Guys and Dolls." Robert Alda died in 1986.

In "Stormy Weathers," Shepherd searches for the missing relative of an Italian aristocrat in an investigation that ties in with an old case involving Samantha's father. Her father had left the police force under a cloud.

The movie also stars Robert Beltran, Charlie Schläfer, Kurt Fuller, Diane Salinger, Roy Thinnes, Mimi Kuyzk, Keene Holliday, Philip Baker Hall, Vonetta McGee and Tony LoBianco.

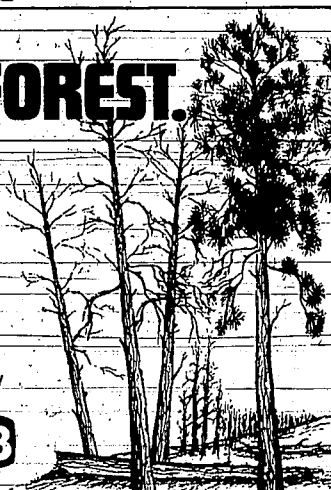
