Danielle Steel wannabes take a novel look at romance

BURLEY — Pat Tracy thought it was a pretty decadent thing to do, buying that first romance novel in a grocery store. But she was going on a trip and decided to "indulge myself, like eating a banana split."
Debbi Bedford was only hoping to take her mind off her misery when she

stopped by the drug store after work to pick up a prescription and a copy of Danielle Steel's "Once in a Lifetime."
Both women were surprised — pleasantly so — at the content of the books they bought and both set out to become published writers of romance novels.

Both succeeded. Tracy and Bedford say the Romance Writers of America organization has helped them publish more and gain self-confidence. The two women will share the benefit of their experiences Saturday at the Southern Idaho Chapter of the Romance Writers workshop at the Best Western-Burley Inn.
They insist that romance novels aren't what some people think — pulp books

long on violence and smut and short on plot.
"What I found in that first book was very tight writing, wonderful humor and depth and a very real story line," said Tracy, who lives in Idaho Falls. "These books aren't about silly little dating games and trite plots, what some people think of as 'women's work.'"

Shorter leash

After drug indictment dismissals, grand juries may face closer scrutiny

TWIN FALLS — A district judge's decision to toss out 28 felony drug indictments may result in judges watching grand juries more closely.
"It may require a judge to exercise more oversight," 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl said Thursday. "The judges in the district are looking into that."

Meehl signed an order in December convening the grand jury that handled the ill-fated indictments. His comments came one day after fellow 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt ruled that misconduct by Twin Falls County deputy prosecutor Frank Nichols made the indictments invalid.
"All the district's judges are obviously concerned with what happened," Meehl said.
Their influence is limited in grand jury proceedings, however. When a prosecutor is granted permission to call a grand jury, the 16-member panel hears testimony and sees evidence presented by the prosecutor behind closed doors without a judge present.
The grand jury is an alternate way of getting felony charges into District Court. Most cases are filed in Magistrate Court, and must pass muster before a magistrate judge before going District Court.
One problem that judges may be able to address is that of the incomplete record. The absence of a complete record of the grand jury proceedings resulted in the

cases of a Twin Falls couple accused of beating a 2-year-old child to death being sent back to Magistrate Court for a preliminary hearing.

A faulty tape recorder left several gaps and inaudible portions in the audio recordings of those grand jury proceedings.

Transcripts of the hearings that resulted in the drug indictments show similar problems, according to Hurlbutt's ruling. Idaho law does not require a record to be made of grand jury proceedings, but Hurlbutt ruled that an incomplete record, coupled with Nichols' misconduct before the grand jury, would require dismissal of the charges.

To assure a complete record in any future grand jury proceedings, judges may have a court reporter available as allowed by the law, Meehl said.
Nichols, who is running for the Republican nomination for Twin Falls County prosecutor, could not be reached at his office Thursday and did not return calls to his home.
He has said in the past that the drug cases would be refiled in Magistrate Court if Hurlbutt dismissed them.

Not everyone welcomes Bush

LOS ANGELES — The seamless machinery of the presidency — the studiously balanced photo ops, the urgent, cross-town cavalcades from meeting to meeting — did not play well in Los Angeles Thursday.

Among the barely cooled embers of the city's recent unrest and the barely cooled tempers of its residents, President Bush was making his presence known, rounding all the bases — South-Central Los Angeles, Koreatown, a police station.

But savvy Angelenos, who see on their streets both real car chases and the made-for-TV kind — and know the difference — were not altogether sold on what many shrugged off as feel-good policy-by-performance.

Beneath the green-tile roof of a South-Central Baptist church, Bush's voice quavered as he spoke feelingly of being "our brother's keeper."
Outside, Pedro Padilla, on his way to class at Jefferson High School,

dismissed the president's appearance as piggybacking on the city's misery. "It's a political move. He just wants more votes from over here. They

really know how to play the little people."

Vampire vanquishes voting in barrios

MANILA, Philippines — Filipinos will choose a new president and thousands of elected officials next week. But in the squalid barrios of the capital, the big news is there's a vampire on the loose.

For weeks, the slums of Manila's Tondo district have been abuzz with rumors that a "manananggal," a supernatural creature similar to a vampire, has been terrorizing the area.

According to Filipino folklore, a "manananggal" (pronounced Ma-na-NANG-gal) appears as a woman who can cut her body in two. The top half flies around at night searching for babies to devour.
"The top half must return before daybreak to rejoin the rest of the body and move around like regular folks.

No one knows how the latest rumor got started, but it was picked up by most of the tabloids, which filled readers with the demon's latest exploits.
"It's scary," one housewife told a vendor in the crowded Divisoria market as she paid for fresh fish. "That's why I don't sleep alone at night."

The largest circulation tabloid, People's Journal Tonight, even published what it said was an interview with Martina Santa Rosa, who purportedly battled the demon last week.
"She attacked me," Ms. Santa Rosa said. "I was just lucky I was able to get free. I saw half of her body. It was naked. She had long, scraggly hair, long arms, nails and sharp fangs."

The newspaper reported that the woman's account was "corroborated" by her neighbors.

Broccoli benefit: longer life span

LOS ANGELES — Men who consume a few hundred milligrams of vitamin C every day live about six years longer than men who don't, and the vitamin may extend women's lives by about one year, a study suggests.

The U.S. government's recommended daily allowance of vitamin C is 60 milligrams for most adults. But the study indicates that consuming 300 to 400 milligrams daily might help people live longer, said its author, James E. Enstrom, an epidemiologist at the University of California, Los Angeles.

Gladys Block, a nutritional epidemiologist at UC Berkeley who was not associated with the study, said it suggests moderate increases in vitamin C consumption might help reduce the risk of heart disease, premature death and cancer.

The study, published in Friday's issue of the Journal Epidemiology, won't settle debate over the use of multivitamins or vitamin C supplements.

Block, Enstrom and other scientists said they believe it is better to consume the higher amount of vitamin C by eating five daily servings of fresh fruits and vegetables than by taking vitamin pills.

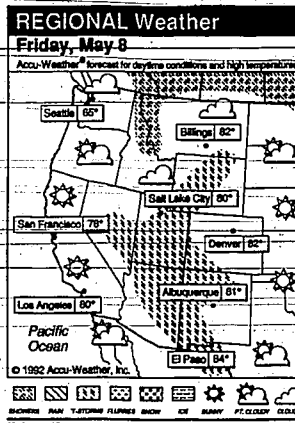
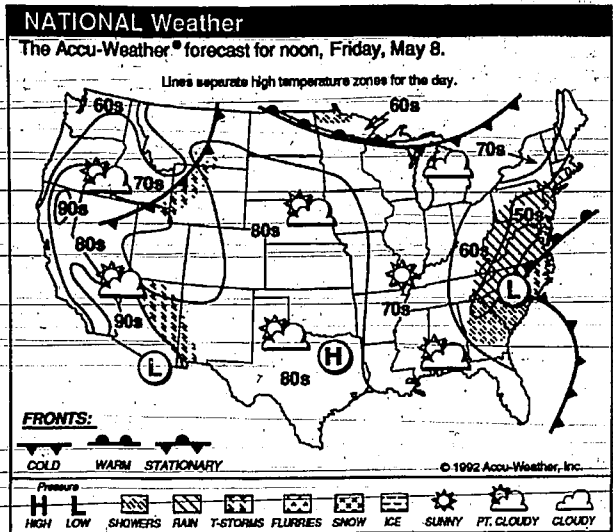
"Foods rich in vitamin C include oranges and other citrus fruits, strawberries, cantaloupes, watermelons, sweet potatoes, cabbage, green leafy vegetables, cauliflower, broccoli, green and red peppers and snow peas."

They said the pills cost more and there is some question about whether the body absorbs the vitamin as well when it comes in a pill.

But only 9 percent of Americans eat five daily servings of fruits and vegetables, so "it probably doesn't hurt" — and this study suggests it may help — to take a multivitamin tablet daily," Block said.

Enstrom's study is consistent with evidence suggesting moderate amounts of vitamin C counteract oxidants, chemicals that help cause heart disease, said Ronald Krauss, a senior scientist at Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory and a member of the American Heart Association's nutrition committee.

Southeast shivers in record cold, heavy snow on heights

Temperatures plummeted to record lows Thursday from Texas to Massachusetts, and more than 3 feet of snow covered the mountains of western North Carolina. Rain fell over much of the rest of the Southeast and in parts of the West.

Record lows, according to the National Weather Service, were 45 at Baton Rouge, La.; 31 at Calico Rock, Ark.; 43 at Columbia, Miss.; 39 at El Dorado, Ark.; 33 at Fayetteville, Ark.; 27 at Gilbert, Ark.; 44 at Hattiesburg, Miss.; 37 at Holly Springs, Miss.; 48 at Houston; 50 at Lake Charles, La.; 41 at McComb, Miss.; 43 at Mobile, Ala.; 42 at Natchez, Miss.; 42 at Newton, Miss.; 35 at Oxford, Miss.; 35 at Ozark, Ark.; 46 at Patuxent, Miss.; 41 at Poplarville, Miss.; 47 at Port Arthur, Texas; 44 at Shreveport, La.; 43 at Waco, Texas; and 42 at Yazoo City, Miss.

The readings at Baton Rouge and Mobile eclipsed records that had been on the books since 1898. In the Northeast, Boston tied its record of 37. On the other hand, by early afternoon Billings, Mont., had warmed to a record high of 86, the weather service said.

A storm developing off the coast of the Carolinas pumped moist air inland, where it combined with cold air to produce rain and snow that began falling Wednesday. By midafternoon Thursday, 39 inches of snow had fallen at the top of Mount Pisgah, 5,749 feet high and 20 miles southwest of Asheville, N.C., the weather service said. And a heavy snow warning remained in effect.

Elsewhere in western North Carolina, officials at Mount Mitchell, the tallest peak east of the Rockies at 6,684 feet, reported 15 inches of snow. Grandfather Mountain got a record for May.

About 6 inches of snow was on the ground at Georgia's highest point, 4,784-foot Brasstown Bald near Blairsville in the northern part of the state, tying a 94-year-old record for Georgia's latest snowfall of the season.

Rain fell at lower elevations. As early as afternoon, showers and thundershowers extended over the southern half of the Atlantic states into eastern Tennessee and eastern Alabama. Heavy rainfall included 1.10 inches at Sumter, S.C., and .82 at Myrtle Beach, S.C.

Pay amendment over hump

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — It was neck-and-neck at the finish line. But it took 203 yeas to complete this race, Michigan lawmakers on Thursday edged out New Jersey in the decisive vote for a constitutional amendment to restrain congressional salaries.

Now the question is whether there's any legal force to something that took that long to ratify, that was forgotten for decades at a time.

The amendment, to bar Congress from giving itself a midterm pay raise, was ratified by New Jersey lawmakers a few hours after Michigan's approval.

The idea was proposed by James Madison in 1789; Maryland was the first to ratify it, on Dec. 19 that year. When the Michigan House ratified it, that state became the key 38th state to approve. The state Senate had approved it in March.

James Madison can now rest a little easier, said state Sen. John Kelly, who led the Michigan ratification effort. "It shows there's a message from the heartland of America that the abuses of Congress have to stop. This one has been a long time in coming."

The amendment reads: "No law, varying the compensation for the services of Senators and Representatives, shall take effect until an election of Representatives have intervened." Members of Congress currently are paid \$129,500 a year.

What will happen next?

What happens next to the congressional pay amendment to the U.S. Constitution now that it has been ratified by the necessary 38 states?

The issue goes first to the chief of the National Archives, Don W. Wilson. He could delay promulgating the amendment while seeking guidance from Congress, issue a conditional certificate of ratification, or issue a final certificate proclaiming the amendment ratified.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley declined to speculate on what Congress might do if the issue lands in its lap.

If Congress chooses to ignore it, the question of the measure's validity would go to the Supreme Court.

And regardless of what Congress might do, anyone could raise challenges on either side.

Legislatures of three-quarters of the states must ratify a proposed amendment to the Constitution for it to take effect.

Both the Michigan and New Jersey legislatures had the proposal on their agendas Thursday in an effort to become the state that would put the total over that mark. The New Jersey Assembly passed the bill 69-0 late in the afternoon; the Senate had earlier passed it 37-0. On Tuesday, Alabama and Missouri ratified the measure.

New Jersey Assembly Speaker Chuck Hayden said he was "sorry New Jersey wasn't the 38th, but we'll be proud to be the 39th. It's good government."

Indeed, some raised doubts about whether the ratification would count, whether the amendment is so old that it's a legal dead issue. The question could wind up in the U.S. Supreme Court.

The first Congress placed no deadline for ratifying the pay-raise amendment. Nowadays, Congress sets such deadlines.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley declined to speculate Thursday on what Congress might do if the issue lands in its lap. He said he favors the idea behind the amendment but added that to allow an amendment to be ratified over a period of more than 200 years runs counter to current practice.

And thought, I can write this kind of book," said Bedford, who lives in Wilson, Wyo. "I had always done some writing, but I had a real conflict. I couldn't write the trashy stuff. I wanted to write something with a lot of emotion, something that would strengthen family values."

When Tracy first started writing, she whined away on her computer, sent manuscripts to publishers and got rejection slips in return.

"I wrote a fan letter to (novelist) Jane Krenz and sort of whined about how difficult editors can be and why didn't they appreciate my manuscripts," Tracy said. Krenz wrote back and suggested the budding author join the Romance Writers workshop.

Tracy seized that advice, attended the group's national conference that year and met the editor through whom she would one day make her first sale.

After two years with the writers' group, spent mostly learning, she had a manuscript. Her third book has just been published.

"People wonder if they have the writing talent," Tracy said. "I think everyone has some talent, but it is the perseverance and determination that makes the difference."

Bedford did things a little differently.

"I actually sold two books before I joined (the group)," she said. "I was

so green, I didn't know how much I didn't know."

Bedford, now 33, wrote her first book in only five months and shipped it off to Harlequin Enterprises Ltd., because that publisher would look at unsolicited manuscripts. Five weeks later, she got a phone call saying Harlequin was interested and wanted to talk.

Was she lucky? Bedford isn't sure because writing her second book was into effect.

"Everyone knows the second book is the hardest. You've got some fans; you've got an editor and you've got a deadline," she explained.

Another author who will be at the Burley conference on Saturday, Brenda Wilson of Boise, has been writing since she was 21 and started out selling stories to "confession" magazines.

Now 45, she's had a living writing books — mostly romance novels — for more than a decade with a total of 32 published under a variety of pen names, including Brenda Trent and B.L. Wilson.

Her first book has been translated into several languages and because of the extensive marketing, she still receives royalties from its sales after 13 years.

Wilson has recently become enamored of a relatively new category of books — psychological suspense. After doing so, though, she found herself needing to learn about criminology and enrolled in several classes at Boise State University. As a result of her training, she has become a registered private investigator.

Fela Dawson-Scott of Boise, who will be autographing her second book on Saturday, said success was a long time coming.

"Scott said her husband, David, is a great helpmate. His favorite comment, 'A writer's husband's work is never done.'"

Indeed, David and a couple of other writers' husbands have started a support group, of sorts. They visit while the writers are meeting.

"Sometimes it is hard for them to understand what drives us, and it helps them to know that we all act the same way," Scott said.

Tracy still remembers a high school literature instructor in the 1960s who told his class that all important writers were men.

"He let us know that women weren't capable of producing literature of quality," the author said, "and I believed that for quite a few years."

She recognizes there's a prejudice against her craft in some literary circles.

"We all know a book has to have a sad ending to have literary value," Tracy said. "Well, romances have a happy ending and sometimes that offends the snobs."

got to Bush was at the church. The heartfelt prayers and hymns inside impressed the overflow crowd, some of them local Republican activists. Emily Holfield, president of the Compton Community College Board of Trustees and a former official of the Compton branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was "impressed by his message. The message he sent out was that I am the president — I am concerned."

Outside, on fences and on sidewalks, people were indifferent, or curious, or even angry.

Lorenzo Kennedy, 34, who lives right across the street from the church, stood smoking a cigarette. "If I was to say anything to him, I would tell him he's full of jive. ... I would tell him, 'Comin' here ain't going to vote for me. If a woman were running, I'd vote for a woman.'"

Besides, celebrity-widow 10-year-old Chet Slep said, "It's not like seeing M.C. Hammer."

Most had to find a spot around six huge red and white "Feed the Children" big-rips from an

Oklahoma City Christian relief organization. They would soon drive off to a relief kitchen, but were banked around the church at the local pastor's request as a security shield and "visual barrier as well," said Allen Jones, son of the Oklahoma City pastor.

Yong-Soo Hyun, a minister and professor at a religious university, came out of the service believing "there is no problem" between most ethnic groups. "The only problem is politicians who make games, who are gonna blame someone." As for Bush, "if he practices what he says, then he will get a lot of credit. But if he just campaigns for the vote, it will be worse."

In the downtown state building, where Bush whooshed unseen from the basement to the 16th floor aboard the judge's elevator, Bradley Solomon, a deputy attorney general, was saying, "We all have political jobs and we look at Bush's visit from a political perspective. We all know he has to visit here for appearance's sake. ... And if he's here just to do the photo opportunity, it will be typical of what might be expected."

If some people were miffed at being swept up in the Bush itinerary, others were miffed at being left out. Ruben Murillo, an Assembly of God minister and a booster of Democratic Latino congressional candidate, according to his naming, did get invited, but only after the Hispanic Ministers Coalition "had to fight the White House" to get to argue with them all day yesterday.

While Bush was conferring with the likes of Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley, who walked to the state building from City Hall, and "Rebuild L.A." head Peter V. Ueberroth, the Democrats' shut-out officialdom held a ground-floor press conference in protest. Among the angry speakers was California state Sen. Diane Watson, whose district was hit hard by rioting and who had earlier more or less crashed the church service from which she said she had been pointedly excluded.

In the Pico-Union district west of downtown, Salvadoran community leader Carlos Ardon was incensed when he heard Bush's itinerary. "He is visiting South-Central Los Angeles, Koreatown, soldiers and police; why isn't he coming here, to one of the areas hardest hit by violence? It's a disgrace."

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Here are excerpts from decision throwing out drug indictments

TWIN FALLS - The following are excerpts from 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt's decision Wednesday to throw out 28 drug indictments:

"This court fully acknowledges the important role of grand juries in the criminal justice system. This case is not about whether the grand jurors faithfully and diligently performed their duties. They most certainly did."

"This court holds that a direct financial conflict, like a property conflict, disqualifies a prosecutor from conducting grand jury proceedings."

"(Deputy Prosecutor Frank) Nichols knew that the Task Force lacked funding for his position; that

the county was unwilling to extend credit; and refused to pay his salary further; and that the account from which he was paid could only be replenished by forfeitures obtained from the accused. Mr. Nichols cannot claim that he was disinterested and impartial."

"At times Mr. Nichols compromised the jury's right to hear evidence, which jurors sought and which could have been material to their deliberations, by diverting the line of questioning. He personally vouched for the credibility of the witnesses he presented."

"Mr. Nichols injected himself in the grand jury proceedings in other ways which go far beyond the role of prosecutor. His extraordinary

reliance on leading questions made him the witness giving testimony rather than the people sworn to testify."

"The nature and extent of Nichols' mistakes before the grand jury is surprising. They reflect either the actions one would expect of a prosecutor possessing a financial conflict of interest or of a prosecutor appearing before a grand jury without adequate preparation and training."

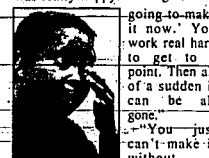
Riots leave thousands low on hope

LOS ANGELES (AP) - After years of welfare, inorganic Comming thought she had finally made it.

She had a job, dreams for the future and, best of all, a regular paycheck. Now she wonders when she'll get it all back.

Ms. Comming is a riot victim, one of thousands of people left without a job when fires and looting destroyed, damaged or closed thousands of businesses around the city, many of which will never reopen.

"Jobs are hard to find," the 41-year-old snack shop worker said. "I was really happy. I thought, 'I'm going to make it now.' You work real hard to get to a point. Then all of a sudden it can be all gone."



Ms. Comming, who helps support her mother but hopes to buy her own house, is confused, too. She now must walk 15 blocks to wash clothes or buy food.

Ms. Comming, who made about \$5 an hour, is among the luckier ones because her employer, Felco, a discount membership retailer, was looted and flooded but still stands. She'll have to live off unemployment temporarily, but the company is reopening the store and bringing workers back.

"Nichols began by reading I.C. 19-1105 entitled 'Evidence receivable by grand jury.' Unfortunately, the statute he read was repealed in 1989, and he failed to inform the panel of the current existing law. It is this type of conduct which pervaded these grand jury proceedings."

"The record of the proceedings and the evidence presented at hearing show that Mr. Nichols conducted the proceedings in a manner commensurate with the way someone with a conflict would. Therefore, this court must dismiss the indictments."

"It is important for the grand jury to understand that the proceedings must be kept secret. It is troubling, though, that the prosecutor paints those outside the courtroom as perpetrators of a sinister plot to disrupt the good which the jury will do in the courtroom under the

protection of the prosecutor. ... "In light of the instruction given, it must be asked if it was sufficient to tell the jury only that it must determine that a crime was committed and that the person named in the indictment is the one that committed it. The court holds that the instruction is insufficient."

"The grand jury was neither given an appropriate probable cause instruction nor given an instruction clearly spelling out the elements of the crime."

"In reviewing the transcripts, the court finds that it does not have a

complete record upon which to exercise review. The grand jury attempted to tape record its proceedings. However, there are many inaudible portions of the tapes and several unexplained gaps, where proceedings apparently continued off the record."

"Taken together, the best that can be said is that this prosecutorial effort was ill-prepared and proceeded without an adequate understanding of the grand jury process or the role of the prosecuting attorney when appearing before that body. This conduct may also be viewed as the natural course of action which occurs where there exists a financial conflict of interest."

Nichols' supervisor, County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter, said Thursday she had not read Hurlbutt's ruling and was not prepared to comment.

Nichols' rival candidates the GOP nomination for prosecutor said his inexperience contributed to the mass dismissal of the drug indictments.

"I think it emphasizes the problem you have with a lack of training," former Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson said.

Nichols graduated from the University of Idaho law school in 1990.

"Frank might be a competent lawyer ... but that doesn't mean he knows how to put on the grand jury," Twin Falls attorney Joe Stenzak said. "It's just inexperience."

Hurlbutt's ruling bears out those comments.

"Taken together, the best that can be said is that this prosecutorial effort was ill-prepared and proceeded without an adequate understanding of the grand jury process or the role of the prosecuting attorney when appearing before that body," the judge wrote.

On one occasion, Nichols read to the grand jurors a section of Idaho law entitled "Evidence receivable by grand jury."

"Unfortunately, the statute he read was repealed in 1989, and he failed to inform the panel of the current existing law," Hurlbutt wrote in his ruling.

dismissed in Twin Falls County.

The county's first-ever grand jury met in June 1987 and handed up 21 drug-related indictments. Five charges were dismissed after Meschl and Hurlbutt ruled the process used to select the grand jury panel was flawed.

Baxter asked for and was granted a second grand jury, which indicted the same batch of defendants. Most of those indictments survived intense pressure from local defense attorneys, although some were thrown out for improper procedures.

Whether the grand jury process will be used in the near future will be up to the next prosecutor and local judges. The rocky road grand juries have had to travel has left attorneys cautious, however.

None of the Republican contenders has ruled out using grand juries, but each says their use should be strictly limited to certain rare cases, such as investigating public corruption.

The past president of the 5th District Bar Association, Jim Meservy, said the grand jury system "looks like more work for prosecutors than it is worth."

Nixon papers: Perot pledged millions, White House pampered him

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Nixon aide Peter Flanigan remembers Ross Perot as much different from the man who now declares himself a political outsider.

White House logs show Perot met or talked more than 40 times in the Nixon years with Flanigan, who says the Texas businessman was "the ultimate insider."



Perot publicized efforts to free American prisoners of war in Vietnam.

Nixon administration documents reviewed by The Associated Press in the National Archives say the White House also provided VIP treatment to Perot and his family and intervened with government agencies in matters involving his computer company and taxes.

"The guy was an amazing operator," Charles Colson, Nixon's former special counsel and a Water-gate conspirator, said in a 1988 oral history interview included in the documents. "I don't know anybody in the whole four years I was at the White House who was able to muscle himself in quicker into the president's own confidence."

In an interview with the AP, Perot insisted his contacts with the Nixon White House were limited 99 percent of the time to his widely

But White House memos say that in private meetings with Nixon, Perot offered \$50 million for a public-relations effort in 1969 that included plans to buy a major newspaper and the ABC television network. He pledged another \$10 million in 1970 to create a pro-Nixon think-tank, the documents say.

Nixon accepted both offers, but Perot never delivered, according to the documents.

Colson, assigned to work with Perot on the think-tank, later concluded the offer was "one of the most effective con jobs I ever saw in the White House."

"He never put up a nickel. He parlayed that offer ... into access,

which ended up costing him nothing," Colson said.

Flanigan, a Nixon economic adviser, says the image of Perot as an outsider is "nonsense."

"He knows how to play every instrument in that band," Flanigan said. "He was the ultimate insider."

Perot steadfastly denies making the monetary offers, insisting Nixon aides would sometimes solicit him with "fantasyland numbers ... and beautiful and strange ideas. And I always made it very clear to them I wasn't interested."

When asked why the offers showed up in the documents, he said: "I can't control what people scribble on pads."

In 1971, the documents say Nixon encouraged Perot to invest in a failing Wall Street stock brokerage, duPont Glove Forgan, and Perot did so, for \$55 million. The

firm eventually went bankrupt and closed.

Perot, who founded computer giant Electronic Data Systems Corp., said he reluctantly made the purchase only after Nixon aides "got down on their hands and knees" and insisted that saving the firm was necessary to avoid a financial disaster on Wall Street.

Perot said his total investment was closer to \$60 million.

The AP reviewed dozens of Nixon-era documents in the National Archives that detail Perot's complaints, offers and requests, as well as White House efforts to appease one of its "financial angels."

The documents say that between 1969 and 1973 Perot requested and received at least three private meetings with Nixon, attended eight White House social events and sometimes had contact with the White House as frequently as once a week.

Such White House attention is legal and routine for major supporters, and there is no indication in the documents that Perot traded money for favors. Some memos go out of their way to describe administration decisions favorable to Perot as made solely "on the merits."

Perot told the AP he did not request any favors from the Nixon White House except for a few per-

sonal matters, such as getting clearance for his son to see the Apollo 11 launch and getting his mother into a presidential prayer breakfast.

A six-page memo prepared for Nixon chief of staff H.R. Haldeman by White House deputy Gordon Strachan in 1972 recounts a series of Perot complaints and requests and administration responses.

Publisher recalls 'pressure tactic' by billionaire

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A Texas newspaper publisher said Thursday that Ross Perot, upset over coverage of his son's business dealings, suggested in 1989 he had compromising photos of one of the paper's employees.

Richard Connor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram said Perot telephoned to complain about the newspaper's

coverage of an airport contract competition involving his son and hinted that he had photographs proving sexual impropriety involving a reporter and a city official.

"The incident was clearly a pressure tactic and could have been taken as an implied threat, but Perot made no direct correlation between the alleged photographs and the air-

port controversy," Connor wrote in a column published Thursday.

Perot, a likely independent presidential candidate, issued a statement denying he had raised personal issues in the conversation.

"Mr. Connor's account of our conversation is incorrect, except for the part stating that I did call and complain about the accuracy of a story in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram," Perot said. "I made no comments of a personal nature about anyone."

The conversation occurred in July 1989, when the city of Fort Worth was trying to decide who should manage Alliance Airport. The city-

owned airport was built by the federal government on land donated by the Perot Group, which continues to develop the area around it.

Ross Perot Jr., who runs the Perot Group, and Fort Worth businessman Reed Pigan were competing at the time to manage the new industrial airport. A Perot-Group unit won the contract a short time later.

Connor wrote that the senior Perot indicated to him that a newspaper employee "was guilty of impropriety with a city official ... and he suggested he had photographs to prove it."

Connor stated that he did not report the conversation in the paper.

Former hostage receives money for each day held

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — Former hostage Terry Anderson was honored Thursday for his "free spirit" and received an award of \$245,500 — \$100 for each of the 2,455 days he spent in captivity.

Anderson, in accepting the first Free Spirit Award from the Freedom Forum, said all the hostages showed the power of the human will: "We all kept our dignity. We all kept our spirit. You would have too. That is the greatness of the human spirit, it is common to all of us."

Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press, was captured in Beirut on March 16,

1985, and was longest held of all American hostages in Lebanon. He was also the first to be released. In December last year, Freedom Forum Chairman Allen H. Neuharth, in announcing the award last month, said, "Terry Anderson's uplifting spirit for 2,455 days provided a dramatic example of what free spirit means."

Anderson insisted he was not a hero and "I don't think I'm an especially brave or good man."

But he said all the hostages showed that "no matter what evil people do to you, no matter how they chain you, no matter what humiliations they inflict, they cannot crush the spirit."

Parkinson's test would use 'cow drug'

—WASHINGTON— Scientists want to start human trials of a possible treatment for Parkinson's disease using a drug derived from cow brains. The hope is that the drug can stimulate the human brain to repair itself. Tests on monkeys proved promising, according to Friday's edition of the Journal Science.

Parkinson's is a degenerative disease affecting 500,000 to 1.5 million people in the United States and causes difficulty in moving as well as muscle rigidity and tremors. The disease occurs when certain brain cells die and the supply of dopamine, the substance the cells use to communicate, is reduced.

Scientists seek atomic health data

—WASHINGTON— A panel of independent scientists accused the Energy Department Thursday of continuing to suppress health data needed to determine how seriously workers at atomic weapons factories may have been affected by radiation.

The physicians' task force said an examination of 124 available government reports on worker exposure to radiation are so flawed and incomplete that possible health effects cannot be determined. "What there is (available) is not comprehensible," said David Rush, a professor of epidemiology at Tufts University, and a member of the group of 12 scientists who studied the available government documents.

House OKs \$5.8 million budget trim

—WASHINGTON— The House overwhelmingly approved legislation on Thursday that would trim \$5.8 billion from this year's budget while preserving one of two planned Seawolf submarines that President Bush wants scrapped.

The measure, approved on a 412-2 tally, could lead the way to a compromise between Bush and Congress in their fight over the sophisticated attack submarines. The Senate passed a bill Wednesday that would allow both craft to be built, prompting a veto threat from Bush. The bill, borne of an election-year fight between Bush and lawmakers—over spending, focuses heavily on defense reductions—but chops elsewhere as well.

Gorbachev urges U.S. business leaders

—CHICAGO— Mikhail Gorbachev, the last Communist leader of the Soviet Union, shook hands and chatted with some kings of capitalism Thursday at the world's largest commodities exchanges.

Gorbachev urged officials at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange to think globally when thinking about economies. "We must think about the future and what that future should be," he told chairman John F. Sandner and the exchange's board of directors. "We have, all of us, to work together."

Through an interpreter, Gorbachev questioned Sandner about the U.S. recession and the long-term outlook for the world's market, then went to the trading floor, where he was greeted with shouts of "Gorby! Gorby!" One trader urged him to buy some pork bellies.

Judge orders AIDS test for worker

—PHILADELPHIA— A disabled mechanic suing for lost potential earnings must be tested for AIDS to help determine how long he might live, a federal judge has ordered.

Attorneys in the case called last week's order unprecedented and a lawyer who monitors AIDS-related issues said it could open the door for testing of other plaintiffs who fall into high-risk groups.

The plaintiff, a 35-year-old resident of suburban Upper Darby and father of two, was injured in 1989 when a truck wheel rim blew apart as he mounted a tire.

House bill could hurt 'Baby Bells'

—WASHINGTON (AP)— Efforts by the seven "Baby Bell" telephone companies to expand into manufacturing, long distance operations and new information services would be slowed down by legislation introduced Thursday in the House.

Judiciary Chairman Jack Brooks, D-Texas, said his bill is needed to prevent recurrence of the monopolistic practices that led to the breakup of American Telephone and Telegraph Co.

The regional phone companies reacted harshly against it. "The court agreement that broke up AT&T created the seven companies — Ameritech, Bell Atlantic, BellSouth, NYNEX, Pacific Telephone, Southwestern Bell and US West."

And since that agreement, the seven have been pushing to expand beyond their assigned role as controllers of local phone lines.

U.S. District Judge Harold Greene agreed last October to allow the companies into information services, sometimes called "electronic publishing." Customers in many areas now have access to the Yellow Pages through home computers that dial up a data base of local businesses provided by the telephone company.

The regional Bells also would like to get into manufacturing and have already received approval from the Senate for that.

Under Brooks' legislation, the regional Bells could immediately do research and development relating to manufacturing and activities for which there is a compelling need, like services for the handicapped.

But information services could not be pursued for three years after enactment of the bill, manufacturing and providing equipment, five years, and long distance and electronic publishing, seven years.

The phone companies would have to get an OK from the Justice Department before pursuing any of the new business ventures to assure against monopoly abuses.

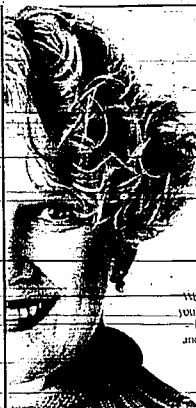
The companies would be prohibited from merging with each other or using revenues from customer billing to subsidize new ventures.

The newspaper industry has been pressing for the Brooks bill because the so-called "electronic Yellow Pages" compete with classified advertising.

Will Rogers birthplace replica destroyed by fire

—OOLOGAH, Okla. (AP)— A miniature replica of Will Rogers' birthplace was destroyed by a fire that apparently was arson, police said Thursday. "I can't imagine anyone who would do this," said police dispatcher Jan Miller.

The replica, built in 1931, was a two-story home about 10 feet high, encircled by a white picket fence. It stood on one corner of a highway intersection. Rogers, a humorist, journalist and actor, died in 1935 in a plane crash. His original birthplace is under water.



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Collector adds Gorbachev to photo list

—SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)— Richard C. Hooper is like a Canadian Mountie. He always gets his man. This time Hooper's man was former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev.

Gorbachev was visiting Westminster College in Fulton, Mo., on Wednesday, when the 44-year-old Syracuse man squeezed past security guards to snap a photograph of himself with Gorbachev.

Gorbachev looked startled but smiled. Security guards quickly pulled Hooper away. Hooper already has nearly 2,000 photographs of himself with famous people, some of which he displays in a private, white-carpeted gallery at his home in Syracuse. His most recent snap was an up-close and personal shot with the Dalai Lama, the Tibetan leader who visited Cornell University in March.

Hooper's 15-year-old daughter, Emily, told the Syracuse Post-Standard her father had been plotting the snapshot with Gorbachev for about two weeks. He left for Missouri on Tuesday.

Hooper reportedly was wearing press credentials when he approached Gorbachev.

N. Carolina hit by snowstorm

—MOUNT PISGAH, N.C. (AP)— A winter-in-May storm left more than 2 feet of snow Thursday on higher peaks of the southern Appalachians, stranding some tourists but attracting others.

Thirty inches of snow had fallen by midday atop Mount Pisgah, standing 5,749 feet high 20 miles southwest of Asheville, the National Weather Service reported. And more was on the way, the agency said.

The storm stranded people staying at The Pisgah Inn, on the Blue Ridge Parkway 700 feet from the top of the mountain.

Snow also fell atop other peaks in the area. Officials at Mount Mitchell, the tallest peak east of the Rockies, at 6,684 feet, reported 15 inches of snow. Grandfather Mountain got a record for May.

Whatever you've heard, bond issue isn't free ride

Don't kid yourself about the \$9.85 million Twin Falls school bond issue. It's not free.

School officials have structured the payment schedule so that taxes won't rise above their current level. It's an imaginative and probably effective way to win support for the bond issue. But anyone who suggests that this construction plan "won't raise your taxes" is telling less than the whole truth.

Our reason for making this point is not to torpedo the bond issue. In fact, we think it should pass. (More on that next week.) But no one who votes for it should do so under an illusion that it's a free lunch. It's not.

The School Board wants to spend \$9.85 million to build a South Park elementary school; to add onto Robert Stuart Junior High; and to build a gymnasium, an auditorium and additional classrooms at Twin Falls High School.

Taxpayers in the district are still paying off some bonds issued in 1985, and the board wanted to avoid asking them to take on a heavier load. So it devised this scheme:

By refinancing the old bonds at today's lower interest rates, and by extending the pay-back an extra six months, the board can reduce the payments on the old bonds significantly. You'll be making those reduced payments through 1998, instead of the original 1997 payoff date.

Then the board sets up a payment schedule for the new bonds that features tiny payments from now until 1998. The total — old-bond payments and new-bond payments — adds up to about the same as what you're paying now.

Starting in 1999, when the district is no longer paying on the old bonds, the annual payment on the new bonds balloons. So that the total paid each year stays about the same. These bigger payments continue until 2008.

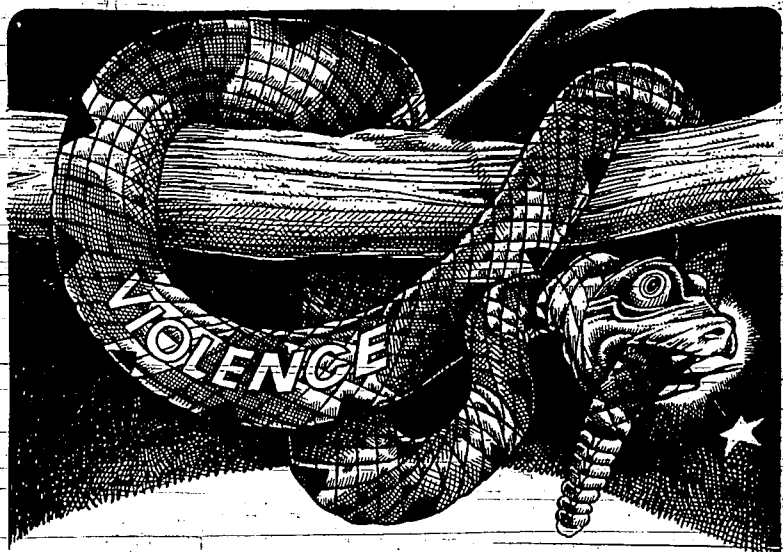
Do your taxes ever "rise"? No, not literally. But, when 1999 rolls around, and the payments on the 1985 bonds hit zero, the district will still be collecting taxes on the new bonds. In our book, that's a tax increase.

In fact, between principal and interest, the new bond issue will cost taxpayers \$16.3 million over the next 15 years. (If you own a \$60,000 house, you'll pay an estimated \$82 a year from 1999 to 2008.) Between the old bonds and the new ones, the total costs \$21.7 million.

None of this is a reason to vote against the bond issue. Taxpayers must decide for themselves whether the benefits of those new school buildings outweigh the costs.

Whether or not your taxes will literally "rise," you will pay for this bond issue for the next 15 years.

If you decide to vote yes, walk into the voting book with your eyes open.

Budget amendment appears closer

When you're a vocal opponent of overspending in Congress, the light at the end of the tunnel usually turns out to be a train coming the other way. This time, though, I think we're close to reaching a goal I've worked on for 10 years, and I'm excited about it.

That goal is a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget. If you've followed my efforts for the last few years, you know I've pushed it to the point of making a nuisance of myself.

I'd hoped it wouldn't take a crisis to force passage of the amendment. I hoped enough of my colleagues would see the light — or feel the heat from their constituents — to pass it early. I wanted Congress to put it before the states for ratification before we buried ourselves this deeply. But it did require a crisis, and we're in it.

Let's look at the results of not requiring the budget to be balanced:

We're the world's largest debtor nation. We run the risk that our foreign policy will be compromised by our dependence on overseas creditors to pay for the programs Congress says we must have. Our government now owes foreign investors more than \$1,700 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Even if it were good policy to spend our way out of a recession, we no longer can. Congress discovered that during the slump just ending. They need all the dough they

can beg or steal just to avoid shutting down the government. Forty-one cents of every individual income tax dollar this year will go to make the annual interest payment on the debt.

If that debt were apportioned out — and it will be, one way or another — each of us would owe about \$15,800. If you're a family of four or more, you might question whether you could afford that. Who benefits? Certainly not the taxpayers who foot the bill or their children. That's one reason Thomas Jefferson was hostile to a large debt — it resulted in a huge transfer of wealth from farmers, shopkeepers and laborers to wealthy merchants and bankers. The most ironic aspect of deficit spending is that it is usually justified in the name of helping the needy. As Jefferson knew, nothing hurts the little guy like the reckless borrowing of an unchecked government.

We must stop the hemorrhaging now — before we're fiscally bled to death. We must find a way to make the federal government quit overspending. Will it take a constitutional amendment? Absolutely. And polls show, by margins of 4-1 or more, that Americans agree. Congress has tried, by law, to make it illegal to overspend. But what Congress does, it can undo. That's not true of a

constitutional amendment. The Balanced Budget Amendment isn't perfect. But we've run out of time to find the perfect solution. Some detractors tell me the amendment would be limiting, that it would prevent a response to crises or economic stresses. On the other hand, they say that Congress can just find ways around it.

They can't have it both ways. Either it's effective or it's not. The leading versions have been fine-tuned for years. The resulting mandate will be effective and flexible.

Despite past close calls, this good idea won't go away. More than 60 percent of the House members are co-sponsors. The Senate Judiciary Committee approved it by 2-1.

Passage is a challenge: it requires two-thirds of each house. With public support, we can pass it this year. More importantly, we've proved that we won't give up. I pledge that I will pursue the goal of a Balanced Budget Amendment until it passes — or until I do.

Pedigreed dogs letter was meant to inform people

In answer to the letter titled "Pedigreed dogs need papers": First let me state for the benefit of my devoted friends who have called me expressing awe over the letter, I have never sold or given away a registered dog or puppy without supplying the receiver with the proper documentation unless a contract was read and signed by the receiver explaining the purpose for such action. My letter preceding "Pedigreed dogs need papers" was not meant to hurt, humiliate or ridicule the writer but rather to inform as I will attempt to do again.

Pedigree papers and registration papers are two different forms of documents. An "AKC" registration certificate is a document required by "The American Kennel Club" and obtained only by this club; which states that the dog has been registered by this club. It supplies the information of the date of birth of the dog; the mother and father, including registration numbers of both; the name of the dog; the breeder of the dog and the owner's name and address. It verifies that the dog is pure bred.

On the other hand, a "pedigree" is a document stating the lineage or ancestors of a dog (pure or otherwise) which may have three generations or more. A pedigree may be obtained in addition to registration by AKC or other organizations, (if it is registered) or by the breeder, in any case.

Recently, AKC has added a new form of registration. It is called a limited registration. This certificate has the same information as the original. However, any puppies produced by a dog with this type of registration will be refused registration by the club. The breeder of the dog in question is the only one who can obtain such a certificate. If the breeder decides, at a later date, that this dog is accepted as a breeder, he or she can re-register the dog, applying for the original type of registration.

I do not claim to be an authority on the matter, nor am I a representative employed by the club. I am merely a member of good standing and have been for quite some time. If anyone seeks advice on the why and why nots of the paperwork, they may write to The American Kennel Club, 5580 Centerview Drive, Suite 200, Raleigh, NC 27606-3390.

I was very upset about the handling of the ticket sales to concerts at the Boise State University Pavilion. — The Garth Brooks concert.

If you don't live in the Treasure Valley or plan to camp out in order to be there when the tickets go on

sale at 10 a.m., you will never get in to see a concert of this magnitude. You may think, "Well, that's the breaks!" But it's not, and something should and can be done about the problem.

In the outlying areas, there are people who crave culture as well, and just because their communities can't afford to bring the culture to their cities or don't have facilities in which to hold such events doesn't mean they can't be exposed to the beauty of their favorite form of entertainment — whether it be a sporting event, which I don't care for personally or a country or rock concert or the beauty involved in a performance of the classic "Madam Butterfly."

The system in which BSU has invested for their ticket sales stinks. Many other states have adopted a plan of distribution for tickets like ours — a lottery.

Each larger community is assigned a specific number of tickets for the larger events and the tickets are awarded in lots of four. You have to send in a request for the tickets, up to seven requests per envelope, which would be a package of 28 tickets, or for four requests, 16 tickets, etc. Just basic math.

Then when the requests are drawn by name and number, the person is

notified that their name has been drawn and they can charge them to a credit card or have three days to pick up the tickets or pay for them to be sent.

Think about it. The elimination of only one area's monopoly of the concert tickets, elimination of clogged telephone lines for an entire day, great numbers of people being totally disappointed ... and on and on.

If you agree, contact the ticket centers, Select-a-Seat if you will, and tell them you agree with the lotto method and want to give culture a fair shake.

Idaho's rural people are important, too, and deserve to be exposed to culture, whatever your entertainment preference is.

Make it happen, Idaho. Spread it around.

Cuba's rights activists live risky life

HAVANA, Cuba (AP) — On an otherwise quiet Wednesday a few weeks ago, hundreds of demonstrators stood for hours hurling rocks and epithets at an elegant home in which a portrait of Lenin, looking proud and defiant, adorned a hallway.

The seemingly incongruous event took place at the home of the son of one of President Fidel Castro's most trusted aides, the late Blas Roca Calderín.

The wrath of the mob was directed at Vladimir Roca, 49, who broke with the revolution last January after signing a declaration urging that Cuba's one-party state be replaced by a Western-style democracy.

Only rarely in the revolution's 33-year history have the offspring of the ruling elite engaged in such acts of rebellion. Roca was fired from his job and now is unemployed.

While working as a government economic adviser, Roca felt the country's economic system was condemning the Cuban people to permanent penury. He says billions of rubles in Soviet aid were squandered away and he believes Marx would be ashamed at what Cuba has done in his name.

Use of hostile mobs to intimidate activists has become routine at the homes of Cuba's small dissident population over the past two years.

Complaints by ordinary citizens go unpunished, but the government and its supporters have little patience with those who try to organize political pressure groups.

The dissidents insist the demonstrations against them are organized by state security agents. Government officials maintain they are largely spontaneous acts by outraged citizens.

As far as is known, the police have never dispersed any crowd engaged in a so-called "act of repudiation."

Although Roca remains free, other activists are not so fortunate. According to Americas Watch, a New York-based human rights group, authorities have arrested more than 200 rights monitors and political activists since 1989.

The government believes its critics — and their U.S. backers — must be kept at bay lest Cuba be overwhelmed by squabbling factions. To prevent Cuba from becoming yet another Communist corpse, the government is placing the highest priority on maintaining revolutionary unity.

Officials blame any excesses on concerns that the dissidents may be part of a U.S.-inspired plot to undermine the revolution. It was this same type of concern, officials say, that induced the United States to send 120,000 Japanese-Americans to detention camps after the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

Castro believes multiparty democracy and capitalism would convert Cuba into just another Latin American country where crippling poverty is the norm for the masses. Many Cubans disagree. Oswaldo Paya is an earnest 40-year old father of three who has organized the Christian Liberation Movement to demand the holding of national elections and the elimination of the government's "mechanisms of terror."

If the government provides certain guarantees, Paya says he may run for a seat in the National Assembly, which has always been filled by revolutionary loyalists.

Provocateurs have responded to Paya's preachings by painting a slew of insulting slogans on the walls of his house. The threats and intimidation were such that he was forced to move in with his in-laws. Some of his followers have been mistreated as well, he says.

The government claims Paya has no legitimacy because he has the support of Radio Martí, the U.S. government broadcast service to Cuba.

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Fighting leaves 11 dead in Peru prison siege

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Leftist guerrilla inmates armed with guns, explosives and acid battled troops on Thursday at a high-security prison on the Peruvian capital's outskirts.

Police said 11 people were killed in two days of fighting. It was the worst prison violence since June 1986, when police killed 250 rebel prisoners at three Lima prisons.

The violence at Canto Grande prison began early Wednesday when troops trying to clear 130 women inmates out of a cellblock they were barricaded inside. Police used explosives to blast a hole into the roof.

Some inmates then slipped into the block and began fighting troops alongside the women, who are members of the Maoist-inspired Shining Path guerrilla group.

Interior Ministry spokesman Hugo Lazo said the death toll could rise because security forces were still fighting for control of the cellblock. He said the siege would continue until the prisoners surrendered.

Police said they mined on the cellblock because inmates had turned it into a rebel training and indoctrination center.

German rail workers return

BONN, Germany (AP) — Union leaders on Thursday endorsed a new government wage proposal that outpaces inflation, though it does not meet the original demands of workers who have been staging Germany's largest postwar public sector strike.

Rail employees said they were immediately calling off strikes that have crippled commuter service.

It was not immediately clear whether others — garbage collectors, postal workers and others — would follow suit. The union rank and file must still vote on the government offer.

The strikes, involving 400,000 workers in western Germany, have wreaked havoc with public transit, postal deliveries, garbage collection, day care, airline service and even theater productions.

Malawi unrest turns deadly

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) — Protesters demanding democratic reforms and higher wages fought police in Malawi for the second day Thursday, leaving 38 people dead, diplomats and hospital officials said.

The riots in Malawi's two biggest cities, unprecedented in the nation's 28-year history, grew out of a labor dispute Tuesday in the southern city of Blantyre.

The strike exploded in violence Wednesday when protesters supporting strikers began looting businesses.

Western diplomatic sources in Blantyre, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said 38 people had died there. Hospital officials confirmed the figure.

Aquino OKs envoy

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corazon Aquino has accepted Richard Solomon, assistant secretary of state for Asian-Pacific affairs, as the new U.S. ambassador to Manila, foreign affairs department sources said Thursday.

The sources said the U.S. Embassy sent a note to the department last week requesting approval of Solomon's appointment to succeed Ambassador Frank Wisner.

TWIN FALLS — An 18-month-old Twin Falls boy escaped with only cuts and bruises Thursday morning when his grandfather backed over him with a car.

Lewis Austin Doane had tire tracks across his legs, Twin Falls police Sgt. Jim Munn said.

The boy was playing in the dirt when his grandfather, Lewis Gilbert Doane, backed his 1978 Ford LTD over him at 252 Second Ave. N., Munn said.

The child was treated at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center for cuts and bruises and released, he said.

Twin Falls woman reports sexual attack in her home

TWIN FALLS — Police are investigating a report by a 23-year-old Twin Falls woman that a man sexually attacked her in her home Wednesday evening.

The woman identified a 41-year-old Twin Falls man as the suspect, and police have spoken with him, but no charges were filed Thursday, Twin Falls police Lt. Jim Kistler said.

The man, who the woman knew, walked into her home and began "acting weird," according to a police report by Sgt. Jim Massey.

After she asked him to leave, she would say the man followed her into the bedroom and attacked her on the bed.

Kistler said police will take the results of their investigation to the Twin Falls County Prosecutor who will decide whether to file charges.

Rural Filer woman takes blind collie needing home

TWIN FALLS — A blind collie has been given to a rural Filer woman who had previously raised a blind poodle and said she could keep the dog in a fenced-in yard.

The woman was the first one to call the Twin Falls Humane Society and request the pet Thursday morning.

Twin Falls Humane Society workers say at least 50 persons responded to a Times-News story in Wednesday's edition that the collie needed a good home.

Pound supervisor Shari Rountree said there are plenty of other animals to adopt at the pound. The pound can be reached by calling, 736-2299.

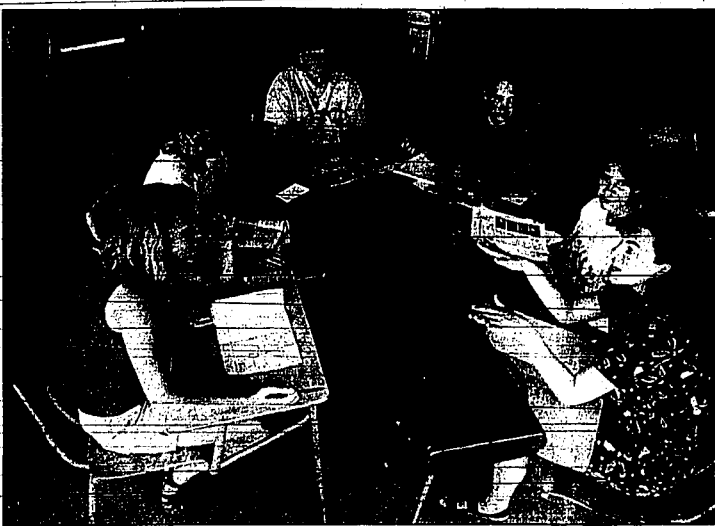

Valley High School debate champs take their topic to heart

HAZELTON — This year's Class B state debate title was out of the hands of judges.

With the top three debating teams all coming from tiny Valley High School, it was left to debate teacher Becky Rudolph to decide the championship by decree.

"For me they are all state champions," she said.

The unusual decision capped a debating season that moved Valley's young orators to care deeply about this year's debating topic, the homeless.

"I don't see them as crazy, scary, dirty people — anymore," senior Amanda Pennington said.

At one point during the year, dissatisfied with impersonal research, the

students took action — donating canned food and blankets to South Central Community Action Agency in Twin Falls.

At the debate season's climax last month, the Valley squad dominated the state tournament. Despite coming from a 160-student school and competing against about 40 schools with enrollments up to 900, Valley's three two-person teams swept the top three spots.

"But Rudolph wouldn't let her three teams compete against one another," she reasoned that the students shouldn't see their teammates as opponents, from whom they would guard ideas.

So when seniors Bennington and fellow senior Meryc McDonald encountered senior David Halwich and sophomore Annalise Carlquist in the

semifinal round, Rudolph forbade the match.

She advanced McDonald and Pennington, her consistent winners, to the finals.

Meanwhile, Valley seniors Karena Kohrt and Yavria Schwarz defeated their opponents in the other semifinal match.

It was left to Rudolph to crown the state champions. She chose McDonald and Pennington, who had been three-time district champions.

"We were like tri-champions because we all won," McDonald said.

But the students got more out of the debating season than championship titles.

Now, when Pennington looks at homeless people, she wonders what their lives have been like and what their

Kimberly nursing home deficiencies termed 'minor'

KIMBERLY — State inspectors have found minor deficiencies in the operation of Mountain View Care Center, a spokeswoman for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said Thursday.

"I can assure you there is no serious immediate threat to the patients," said Ann Kirkwood, Health and Welfare spokeswoman in Boise. "It deals with the appropriateness of care."

The deficiencies were discovered last July after an annual inspection by two surveyors from the department's Bureau of Facility Standards, Kirkwood said in a telephone interview on Thursday.

The department also received a complaint about patient care, Kirkwood said. Two surveyors returned to the care center and have been taking another look at the 65-bed skilled nursing home all this week as a routine follow-up visit, she said.

Kirkwood said she could not say what the complaint was about or give details about the current inspection until the survey team completes its report.

Mountain View Administrator Roger King said the report "should be clear," and declined to comment specifically on deficiencies. "We have a good care center here. I feel like we have a very good care team."

The deficiencies that state inspectors found in July included failure to notify relatives and physicians of injuries to residents within 24

hours, failure to respond in a timely manner to call lights, failure to keep residents clean and storing food in an unsanitary fashion.

The complaints about injuries not being reported soon enough included a diabetic patient's toenail that was lifted from the skin and a resident who received a 2-inch skin tear on the arm, the report says.

The care center wrote a correction plan that included closer supervision of notification requirements by the facility's nursing director.

A state surveyor noted that five residents did not receive assistance within 15 minutes after pushing call buttons, the report says. Two residents did not have call lights within reach, it says.

Five residents had unmet grooming needs,

including dirty and/or long fingernails, greasy hair with dandruff, long facial hair, and dried food on their clothes, according to the report.

Inspectors also reported they saw one dependent resident with her legs and thighs exposed throughout a meal and that no one came to her assistance.

To comply with the state's cleanliness and general care standards, Mountain View will provide employee training, the center's correction plan says.

The facility's refrigerator, which had fresh eggs and cheese stored in it, was 60 degrees inside — not cold enough, by state standards — when surveyors inspected, the report says.

The center replaced the refrigerator, the center's correction plan says.

Where they stand

When should grand juries be used to obtain criminal charges?

Former Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson, Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor Ernak Nichols and local attorneys Joe Stanzak and G. Richard Bevan are running for the Republican nomination for Twin Falls County Prosecutor.

In general, grand juries are over-utilized, especially when prosecutors get lazy, he said.

There are certain rare cases, such as those involving public corruption, where a grand jury is needed to protect the identity of witnesses, Nelson points to the recent case of Frank Crnkovich, the Shoshone County Sheriff facing federal racketeering and illegal gambling charges, as an example of a case where a grand jury was used properly.

Grand juries should not be used to handle "run-of-the-mill" cases, he said.

The drug indictments tossed out by a district judge on Wednesday are not appropriate cases to go before a grand jury, Nelson said.

When wielding the power of a grand jury, it can be difficult for a prosecutor to walk the fine line between seeking justice and winning at any cost, Nelson said.

The county's most recent grand jury was

used to protect witnesses, Nichols said. One witness testified against 13 defendants, and another testified against 12. Judges did not properly consider two motions aimed at keeping those names confidential, he said.

"It's no secret that witnesses in drug cases are really victims," he said.

The Times-News and the public defender's office have made a big deal of the grand jury process, but it is commonly used in other places, such as Ada County, which has a standing grand jury, Nichols said.

Based on the response the latest grand jury has drawn, it will probably be a long time before another one is convened in Twin Falls County, he said.

The judicial system here becomes bogged down when all the cases must go through a preliminary hearing, because the public defender drags out the proceedings, using them as a way to gather evidence for his defense case, and judges allow him to do it, Nichols said.

"If local judges and the defense bar don't like grand juries, then let them change the law," he said.

The grand jury is a powerful tool that should only be used when absolutely necessary, Stanzak said.

"You don't pull out a gun to stop someone from smoking in a public place," Stanzak said.

"And that seems to me to be what we've done."

When deciding when a grand jury is necessary, a prosecutor should consider whether the victim, the accused or witnesses need protection, or when the accused is likely to flee the area beyond the grip of law enforcement.

In some drug cases involving large crime rings, taking a case to a preliminary hearing will stop any ongoing investigation, he said.

The drug cases involved in the most recent Twin Falls County grand jury did not warrant grand jury treatment and should have been filed in the usual way, Stanzak said.

"I will use the grand jury only when, in my opinion, it is in the best interest of the

public," he said. "I will follow the guidelines set down by the law."

Bevan said he is generally opposed to grand juries, but the law provides for their use in some cases.

They can be used to protect a case involving a public figure or in situations where there is "a drastic need for witness safety," he said.

Judges in Idaho don't seem to like grand juries, Bevan said, pointing out that Idaho's grand jury statute was passed in the early 1900s and is outdated.

"The risk to me is too great unless I can see an overwhelming need for a grand jury," he said.

The preliminary hearing system also is subject to abuse, he said. Most preliminary hearings should take 15 to 20 minutes. If defense attorneys insist on using the preliminary hearing as a mini-trial, and judges allow them to do it, "we will certainly take issue with them," he said.

Will river determine growth?

TWIN FALLS — A lot of people refer to the Snake River as Idaho's working river.

"My belief is it's dead," said Gail Ater of Gooding on Thursday at the last in a series of public hearings on a proposed plan to clean up the river.

The Middle Snake River Study Group has developed a draft plan to deal with sediments and nutrients that have turned the river into what the group calls "weeched, choked shadow of former self."

Ater said he hopes the plan can resuscitate the river before it's too late.

Roger Furman of Idaho Power Co. said he was concerned with the plan's no-growth policy as part of the solution. Any solution to the river's problems needs to accommodate growth to meet future needs, he said.

"We ask that you do not lock the door on development," Furman said.

David Mead of Twin Falls borrowed a line from the comic strip "Pogo" to point out that everyone in the Magic Valley contributes to the river's problems.

"We have met the enemy, and he is us," Mead said. "All of us are the enemy of the Snake River in some way."

The low flows of past few years may be below the norm of the past 80 years, but perhaps it's the norm of the past 1,000 years, said Mead who is a member of the Idaho Health and Welfare Board.

Perhaps we ought to learn how to run the river at the low flow, after all southern Idaho is a desert, he said.

"Maybe, just maybe, we have come to the limit of growth of our resources," Mead said. "Maybe we've got to solve the Snake River problems before we allow more growth."

Harold Johnson, president of the Idaho Aquaculture Association, disagreed.

He accused most of those who oppose more development on the river of being employees at the public trough — people whose jobs don't depend on the local economy.

The state Division of Environmental Quality has targeted the aquaculture industry unfairly with a policy that allows new or expanded fish hatcheries only if they can prove they will add no more nutrients to the river, Johnson said.

Forest fire forces 40 houses to be evacuated in British Columbia

KELOWNA, British Columbia (AP) — A wind-whipped forest fire threatened a nearby residential area and about 40 houses were evacuated Thursday night, Royal Canadian Mounted Police said.

Firefighters from the British Columbia Forest Service and local agencies tried to quell the flames as police closed roads in the Mount Boucherrie area, about five miles from the town and about 170 miles east of Vancouver.

Smoke was visible from the town as flames rose more than 30 feet, leaping from treetop-to-treetop. Helicopters were used to drop water on the fire.

Elkhorn, Radisson tie knot

BOISE — Radisson Hotels International signed on with Elkhorn Resort in Sun Valley Thursday, lending its name and international marketing network to the financially troubled resort.

The 220-unit resort nestled in the hills adjacent to Sun Valley will now be known as Radisson Elkhorn Lodge & Resort Sun Valley.

Officials, with Elkhorn and Radisson, a Minneapolis-based company with 315 hotels and 25 resorts worldwide, said Thursday the affiliation marks a "perfect marriage" for both companies.

"It's a great pleasure to be involved in a resort like this that has the prestige of the Sun Valley area. It's a real coup for us," said Brian Stage, vice president-West of Radisson

International. Stage described Sun Valley as "the real granddaddy of all ski resorts."

Clyde Billman, managing director of Radisson Elkhorn, said the affiliation with Radisson "is going to make a big change in the profile of our property. It will give Elkhorn a presence in the international market and should increase our share of that market tremendously."

Billman said Elkhorn owner Milt Kuolt, a Seattle businessman and founder of Horizon Airlines, will retain ownership of the resort. The franchise arrangement required Kuolt to pay a "modest" fee to affiliate with Radisson International, and Radisson will receive a percentage of Elkhorn's revenue, Billman said.

Though Billman downplayed the resort's financial condition, it's no secret that Elkhorn has struggled since it was built in the early 1970s. Owned

originally by the Manville Corp., the property went into bankruptcy in 1982 and was closed for 10 months.

Kuolt purchased the property in 1984. Earlier this year, a Seattle bank reportedly was about to foreclose on Elkhorn before Kuolt made delinquent payments in the amount of \$60,000 on a \$2.7 million promissory note.

Following the death of snow that put the pinch on the 1990-91 ski season, Billman said Elkhorn enjoyed a better winter this year thanks to Sun Valley's new computerized snow-making system. "I'm not going to say the property is flush, because it isn't," he said. "But we're looking forward to a great summer."

Most people associate Sun Valley with skiing, but summer tourism continues to be the strongest season for the hospitality business, Billman said.

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Glenn, Crapo duel over state mandates at debate in Burley

BURLEY — A few sparks, but not as many as there might have been, flew Thursday night at a forum for Republican congressional and legislative candidates.

The only notable spat was between Ada County Commissioner Gary Glenn and state Sen. Mike Crapo, of Idaho Falls. Glenn and Crapo are running for the 2nd Congressional District seat.

In response to a question about federal mandates on state and local government, Glenn faulted Crapo for voting for two state mandates: a ban on jailing the mentally ill and enhancements to the Idaho's public safety laws.

Those mandates will cost Ada County hundreds of thousands of dollars, Glenn said.

Crapo shot back that he has worked in the Legislature to end unfunded federal mandates, but that because of court decisions or federal law, the Legislature doesn't always have the choice.

"It's easy to give a little sliver of the record and create an impression you want," he said of Glenn.

Besides the two House candidates, U.S. Senate candidates Dirk Kempthorne, Rod Beck and Milt Erhart attended the forum, as did Dem. 2nd State Senate candidates Glenn and Crapo.

The forum was sponsored by the Cassia and Minidoka County Republican organizations.

Perhaps the clearest distinction between the candidates came on the question of abortion.

Glenn, Crapo, Beck and Cameron all declared themselves to be solidly anti-abortion. Erhart and Peters said they were pro-choice, while Kempthorne said abortion is an acceptable option in cases of rape, incest, severe fetal deformity or when the life of the mother is threatened.

"I don't believe choice is a choice," Cameron said.

Peters, though, said that "I'm not for abortion, but if it's going to be, I want it to be safe, legal and rare."

The issue is too complex to be reduced to bumper-sticker slogans, Kempthorne said.

"The terms 'life' and 'choice' are not opposites, really," he said, adding that as a senator he would not support letting Medicaid cover abortions for poor women who otherwise were using federal money to pay for abortions.

Kempthorne considered the favorite for the GOP Senate nomination, touted Boise's economic Renaissance during his two terms in City Hall.

Since he took office in 1986, Kempthorne said, 27,000 new jobs have been created in Boise and \$2 billion in new construction has occurred. That, he said, is due to "government getting out of the way and letting private enterprise roll up its sleeves and get to work."

Minidoka County Commission candidate Larry Harper said county residents should feel fortunate to live here, especially when they hear what is going on in other areas.

"We need to plans for people who

will be moving in to our area and provide the industry and other resources we need to attract them," Harper said.

Harper's opponent in the Republican primary, Bill McClung, said he has been involved in city and county government for 21 years and he believes in local control.

"I have the experience to serve and to serve well," McClung said. "I am retiring this year and can devote full time to the commissioner's job."

He said he believes Minidoka County is going to grow and needs common sense leadership.

"I see a lot of government mandates. We don't want to knock heads with them. We need to get smarter than they are and throw the mandates back at them," McClung said.

Minidoka sheriff candidates Paul Fries and Ray Jarvis each reviewed their backgrounds, including extensive law enforcement training.

In response to a question, Fries, the Rupert police chief, said joint city-county law enforcement works well in some situations and has been a plus for Cassia County.

But he added that the decision to combine the departments is up to the voters and that if he were sheriff, he would want to see whether the county could save money by combining the departments or not.

Jarvis, the incumbent sheriff, said he is now contracting with the city of Paul to provide law enforcement services. He said a combined force is feasible, "if we can save money" and thinks the decision is up to city councils.

Gooding prosecutor steps down for race

IDAHO FALLS — Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jay Rosenthal will handle the case against an Ammon woman accused of killing her husband.

The trial is scheduled to begin June 2 in Idaho Falls.

Coroner rules man committed suicide

IDAHO FALLS — An Idaho Falls man found dead in the Snake River apparently committed suicide, Bonneville County Coroner Vernal Rydahl has ruled.

The body of Lynn K. Atwood, 39, was found Tuesday by workers clearing debris from a gate at the city hydroelectric plant on the river.

Rydahl said Atwood apparently drowned, and an autopsy indicated he had no injuries on his body that would indicate foul play.

Work set for troubled campus building

BOISE — The state's working on a \$100,000 project that officials hope will eliminate the problems which have limited use of the Hedlund Building on the North Idaho College campus.

The building has been limited use since students and others working in second floor offices and classrooms started complaining about headaches and other health problems. The first floor contains vocational facilities including a paint shop and automotive training.

The Permanent Building Fund Council on Thursday approved Thomas J. Gerard and Associates, Coeur d'Alene, to supervise renovations aimed at eliminating the problems in time for classroom work to resume in the fall.

Lawyers don't want sheriff trial moved

BOISE — Federal prosecutors are resisting Shoshone County Sheriff Frank Cmkovich's efforts to have his trial moved from Boise to the federal courthouse in Coeur d'Alene.

"It is beyond his financial ability to stage a defense in any other location," Cmkovich's attorney, Sam Eismann, wrote in pleadings to U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge.

Eismann said Cmkovich cannot afford to fly all his witnesses to Boise, feed them and put them up in hotel rooms if the trial takes the three weeks he expects.

Cmkovich, who is running for re-election, is scheduled to stand trial in federal court on federal racketeering and illegal-gambling charges starting Sept. 14 in Boise.

Widow's claim upsets relatives

COEUR D'ALENE — Relatives of an Athol firefighter killed last year while battling a Panhandle blaze are outraged that his widow has filed wrongful death claims seeking \$1 million.

Joseph Upchurch, 26, died Oct. 16 while fighting wildfires near Hauer. His widow, Kelly Upchurch, recently filed claims seeking \$500,000 each from Kootenai County and the Rathdrum Fire Department over his death.

But Upchurch's mother, Vicki Upchurch, contends her daughter-in-law's parents pushed their daughter into filing claims her son would not have supported.

Upchurch volunteered to fight fire wildfires that swept through northern Idaho last fall. But Sam Eismann, an attorney for his widow, said Upchurch was not provided proper training or supervision.

Panty thief will go to prison after all

COEUR D'ALENE — A judge has revoked probation for a Coeur d'Alene man convicted of stealing women's lingerie from lakeside cabins.

Steven Donald Burris, 27, was ordered to spend six months in a sexual offenders program at the state prison in Coitown after violating probation for his conviction in a string of northern Idaho cabin burglaries.

His attorney, Jonathan Hull, said Burris would plead guilty to five counts of second-degree burglary for stealing lingerie, swimsuits, a Playboy magazine, a Frederick's of Hollywood catalog and ads for women's underwear.

The items were discovered during a traffic stop in February.

Adult-store owner violates probation

BOISE — Garden City bookstore owner Lamar Larsen has violated his probation by once again selling obscene materials, says Ada County Magistrate Charles Hay.

Larsen was placed on probation after he pleaded guilty in April 1991 to selling obscenity at his Over 19 adult store. Police then arrested him three times in 10 days in late November and early December 1991. As a result, Larsen was charged with the probation violation and two additional counts of distributing obscenity. Larsen has pleaded innocent to the two obscenity charges and is set for jury trials later this summer.

Reburbed Capitol won't be easy task

BOISE (AP) — Restoring the Idaho Capitol to the condition it was in before a New Year's Day fire isn't coming easy.

The Permanent Building Fund Council on Thursday approved preliminary design for parts of the restoration work from what originally was estimated as a fire causing \$4.5 million damage.

But Public Works Director Anne Barker said the final cost may be lower. "The engineers and architects are working to come up with an economical, practical solution to the problems," she told the council.

A fire believed started by a discarded cigarette burned through the second floor attorney general's office, with flames and smoke damage spreading to Legislative Budget Office facilities on the floor above. There was minor damage to the first and fourth floors of that wing.

Architects and engineers told the council there are unique problems in restoring a building started in 1905 and completed in 1920. The 200,000 square foot Statehouse is on the National Register of Historic Places. Flames damaged the stone exterior

wall on the wing. In a project estimated at \$465,000, about 100 sandstone blocks will have to be replaced, retiled or given a new veneer.

John Hinman of CH2M Hill said the fractured surfaces of some of the stones will be replaced with a 4-inch veneer of new stone quarried from the same Boise source that supplied the original.

The restored exterior may not match the rest of the Capitol building. "The veneer won't match the 80-year-old stone, and may not match for 20 or 30 years," Hinman said.

In some places, damaged stone simply will be cleaned and then retiled by stone carvers. The officials discussed cleaning the entire exterior of the Statehouse to minimize the contrast, but reached no final decisions.

Much of the restoration work is expected to be completed by the end of the year. Repainting of the Capitol dome and other interior areas damaged by smoke should be done by August.

Remodeling of the Legislative Budget Office also should be done by August, and is being given priority

because that area will be used to prepare the next state budget.

Architect Kent Krohn said the goal of work in the attorney general's office is restoration, in some cases taking out decades of remodeling projects.

"We're just restoring what was already there," he said.

Estimated cost is about \$1 million, with an architect's fee of \$100,000. State planning and design chief Doyle Allen also said the state is paying \$30,000 to a historic preservation consultant.

Council Chairman Jerry Wray questioned the \$110,000 architect's fee for the exterior wall restoration. He said that was more than 23 percent of the estimated cost and \$1,100 per stone to be replaced.

"How can you justify that?" he asked Hinman.

Hinman said the restoration work is extremely detailed. Barker said the work is compounded by the fact that many of the stones that have to be replaced are load-bearing.

"We are dealing with a load-bearing wall system. We have to be very careful how the wall is rebuilt," she said.

The restoration projects also require a lot of engineering and consulting with specialists, she said, adding to the cost.

One of the changes will be evident to Statehouse visitors. Many of the office suites now have modern "store front" entrances of glass and aluminum. Last year, the governor's office got a new entrance, restoring the original carved mahogany.

Attorneys disagree; Baldwin trial still on

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — Even though a federal jury acquitted Idaho Sheriff Randy Baldwin of drug and robbery charges two weeks ago, he faces a Canyon County jury on related charges in June.

Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris said he met Wednesday with Baldwin's attorney, Keith Roark of Halley. "We discussed a possible or potential settlement of the case and ultimately we couldn't agree on it," Harris said.

Baldwin, 37, is charged in connection with the Dec. 20, 1991, break-in at a Nampa home and the attempted theft of drugs and money. The house was part of a federal sting operation.

He was acquitted by a U.S. District Court jury April 24 on four charges of attempted robbery, conspiracy to commit robbery, possession of drugs and use of a firearm in the commission of a crime.

His co-defendant in the federal case, Lamont Duane Jack, 45, formerly of Grangeville, was convicted on all but the drug

possession charge.

Jack and Baldwin's lieutenant, Patti VonBargen, 34, of Grangeville, are also scheduled for trial June 3 in Canyon County. Ms. VonBargen is charged with aiding and abetting the crimes.

Harris said Roark also filed a motion to dismiss the case, based on Baldwin's acquittal in federal court, and a motion for a change of venue, which asks for the case to be moved outside Canyon County.

"No hearing dates on those motions have yet been set," Harris said. The state case will be heard before 3rd District Judge Jim Doolittle of Caldwell.

Harris said he does not believe the publicity surrounding the two-week federal trial in Boise will cause a problem selecting a jury.

"We've had some pretty well-publicized cases in the past and it's never been any problem," Harris said.

He added the state case will probably not take as long to try as the federal one and he anticipates calling only eight to 10 witnesses.

Man with AIDS urges awareness

POCATELLO (AP) — A 34-year-old Pocatello man diagnosed with the AIDS virus more than six years ago told a Bannock Youth Foundation forum he starts each day watching the sun rise and rejoicing. "I was the fourth person in the state to be diagnosed. The rest are gone. I think it's awfully damn nice the good Lord gives me another day."

He discussed his life with HIV Wednesday night with the understanding that his identity would remain confidential. The man said he attended the forum at the request of some members of a panel that led the discussion on acquired immunodeficiency syndrome. But he sat in the audience until midway through the discussion, then stood up to introduce himself to dramatize how often people unknowingly come into contact with HIV-positive and AIDS.

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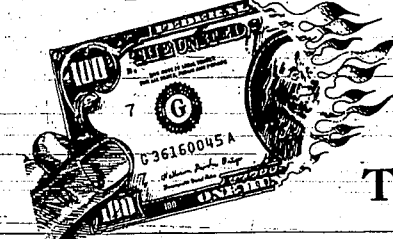

Gang experts head to valley for seminars

TWIN FALLS — The youth gang problem in the Magic Valley may not be a crisis, but it's serious enough that a local citizens' committee is looking for outside help.

Community Action to Reduce Gangs Organization (CARGO) announced Thursday that two gang experts from Sunnyside, Wash., will be in Twin Falls for five days this month to teach local police, parents and educators about identifying and thwarting gangs.

"We are not at the very serious stages yet," said Paul Du Fresno, Twin Falls police chief. "We hope we can actually stave off that kind of a problem."

Even in its early stages, the area's youth gang problem has generated plenty of serious crime, Du Fresno said.

Hard numbers are tough to come by, because police only recently began keeping records of gang-related crimes.

One 16-year-old boy was stabbed in a robbery attempt outside an Addison Avenue convenience store in January; another boy was threatened

Several community members formed CARGO in March. The group received a community block grant to pay for Donavan Villegier, a former Los Angeles County sheriff's deputy, and Sunnyside school Principal Dennis Birt to come to Twin Falls May 15-19.

with a pistol several weeks later, while skateboarding in a subdivision north of town.

Both of the boys responsible for those attacks currently are in the county's temporary juvenile detention center at the fairgrounds in Filer.

"Twin Falls police Lt. Ron Axman said the city has lost 12 felonies since November committed by juveniles either identifying themselves with gangs or emulating gang activities."

Added to that number is a whole host of misdemeanors, Axman said.

Several community members formed CARGO in March. The group received a community block grant to pay for Donavan Villegier, a former Los Angeles County sheriff's deputy, and Sunnyside school Principal Dennis Birt to come to Twin Falls May 15-19.

The group would like to see a youth center to provide a safe place for young people to go for good, clean fun, he said.

Simply being a member of a gang is not a crime, Du Fresno pointed out. It is the things that some gangs require new recruits to do by way of initiation that land kids in trouble.

Police are seeing lots of theft and shoplifting, some burglaries and even assaults by young people wanting to become gangsters. Girls are often pressured into sexual activity with other gang members to gain favor, he said.

"This is happening. There isn't any question about it," he said. CARGO's main goal is to "turn the light on and show parents and the community what already is going on," Du Fresno said.

Two workshops will be held at the CSI Shields building May 18. The morning session, beginning at 8 a.m., will cover gang mentality and culture, gangs and drugs, safe schools, and other topics.

The afternoon session begins at 1 p.m. It will address gang intervention and plans for communities, schools, and law enforcement.

The public is invited to the information sessions, which will be held at the College of Southern Idaho.

Local police and school officials already have taken steps to curb the gang problem, Du Fresno said.

A gang intervention program, where police officers confront suspected gang members and talk to their parents about keeping them out of trouble, has reached about five families so far, he said.

Schools are beginning to incorporate anti-gang messages into drug and alcohol awareness programs.

One CARGO subcommittee is looking into a youth center. It's a fact of modern life that many children are unsupervised after school and during the summer, often because their parents must work, Du Fresno said.

Dietrich water plan raises a bit of steam

DIETRICH — Some in Dietrich are displeased over the planned rise in water rates with the city's new water system.

Some complained to city officials at a recent meeting that they have raised the monthly cost far higher than originally planned.

The city received a \$120,000 Farmers Home Administration loan and grant to finance a water project. The community has no central water system.

The funds, along with a Community Block Grant for \$200,000, will provide a new well, water storage tank, distribution pipelines and meters.

Although the rates won't be set until the system has been in effect for at least a year, a base rate must be collected to begin the loan payments.

When the project was first promoted, the people of the town were told that the city water monthly

rates would not exceed \$15.75 per month. Also, there would be no meters, and residents could use all water they wanted.

The rates however have steadily climbed, first to \$17, then \$19, \$22, and now to \$24.

However, Carleen Herring, who wrote the grant for funds to put the project into place and who will oversee the project, said it is common for troubles to crop up causing costs to rise.

"When you're dealing with this type of project, you never know what kinds of problems you're going to run into," Herring said.

"We've provided budgeted extra money in case we hit rock, but again, it depends on how much rock we run into, and how much it's going to cost."

She said that having to bring three-phase power to the city was an unexpected expense.

The city needs to upgrade its power lines to pump water from its new, deeper well.

The State Health and Welfare department also requires the city to operate a backup well.

Councilman Tim Conant asked whether it was necessary to charge the \$24 per month and was told that it depended on what it cost for the system to run.

"We told the people no more than \$19.75," he said. "It bothers me that it's going to be more. There's a lot of older, retired folks in town, and it might be a financial burden for them."

Herring explained that financial aid is available for low-income families.

Conant said that the number of hookups for the town included several homes outside the city limits, and asked Mayor Leonna Knowles, "What if all of those people don't hook up to the system?"

"We'll annex them," Knowles answered.

Conant also said an ordinance that will be passed soon, requiring everyone to pay the monthly base

Bliss City Council hears double dose of good news

BLISS — The City Council got a double shot in the arm Wednesday.

The councilmen heard news that Bliss' municipal well-improvement project has obtained a federal stamp of approval and that a town eyesore will get some badly needed repair.

Mayor Sam Bishop read a letter at the monthly City Council meeting from Idaho Division of Environmental Quality's engineers.

It said the city had complied with all requirements for the \$15,000 well-improvement project, begun nearly two years ago using a grant from the

Idaho Water Resources Board.

The project involved raising the city's well to prevent contamination by flooding and installing backup safety measures to insure water quality.

"It's one of the largest and most expensive projects this city of 200 residents has ever undertaken," he said.

"They say we have everything in order," Bishop said. "It's been a long haul, but we got her done."

Bishop also announced that the Circle Bar, an abandoned restaurant and hotel west of town, had been purchased by local businessman Ray Faulkner.

Faulkner plans to turn the buildings, which have been empty and falling into disrepair for more than five years, into public storage

facilities and a private residence.

"It would sure be nice to have that wretch cleaned up and taken care of," Bishop said. "You hate to have people coming off the highway there and having that be the first thing they see."

In other business, the council considered having the Idaho Rural Water Association implement a wellhead protection plan for Bliss.

John Baker of the IRWA told the council that federal and state water regulations are becoming tougher every day, and that Bliss needs to protect it's water.

"The association would assist Bliss, free of charge, in setting up a

committee made up of council members and local water users to study the area surrounding the city well and make recommendations for protecting the well from contamination, either from gasoline or chemical spills, or from agricultural impact.

"We're definitely interested in this," Bishop said. "I'm sure between the state and the federal government, there's going to be more rules and regulations on us every year."

"With this we can kind of get the jump on them," Bishop continued.

"If we have a committee established, and they come in and ask us to look into something, well, we can say we've already surveyed and studied it."

Friedman master plan runs into turbulence

HAILEY — The proposed 20-year master plan for Friedman Memorial Airport survived a rough landing before the Blaine County Airport Commission this week.

Reviewing the "landside" portion of his firm's proposal, Larry Bauman of Carrier & Burgess engineering consultants recommended that the airport move existing facilities and tie-down spaces from the east side of the airport to the west, and that land be acquired for new tie-downs and hangars in the near future.

"It's been documented that we're going to have a shortage of aircraft storage capacity if we don't build more T-hangers," Bauman told the

commission Tuesday evening.

"You could probably document the need for more riverfront property too," responded Commissioner Stephen Kearns.

Homeowners in residential neighborhoods adjoining the west side of the airport have been critical of the proposed plan, which would situate most of the airport's ground operations closer to them and away from Idaho Highway 75. The airport commission, at its April meeting, approved the concept of the east-west shift on the condition that noise mitigation measures be discussed.

Many of the affected residents helped pack the county commissioners' meeting room at the Blaine County Courthouse Tuesday expecting a public hearing on the

matter, but County Commissioner Alan Reynolds said the "workshop session" on the plan would not include public comment.

"This is not the time or place for your own critical opinion of the proposed plan," Reynolds told the crowd, adding that opportunities for those comments would come later.

The commission solicited comment from Sun Valley Aviation on moving its fixed-base operations to the west side near the passenger terminal and representative Wayne Warner gave that idea a thumbs down.

"All the aircraft we would be serving would be down at the other end of the airport and would have to be towed to the FBO," Warner pointed out.

As an alternative, he suggested purchasing more land in the southwest corner of the airport and putting the FBO near the aircraft tie-downs in the same location. Acknowledging that his proposal could mean more noise for neighboring homeowners, Warner told the commission that mitigation of that impact was possible.

County Commissioner Tom Blanchard questioned the lack of snow storage in the proposed master plan.

"Snow?" quipped airport manager Todd Winthin. "We don't have snow here."

Winthin admitted that there was little snow storage included in the master plan. "If we do have a big snow year we're going to have to start tracking," he said.

Court rules inmate must have lawyer

BOISE (AP) — A prison inmate must have a court-appointed attorney for his petition for post-conviction relief, the Idaho Court of Appeals ruled.

The court on Thursday reversed a 3rd District Court decision against Noel Rodriguez' appeal to reduce his sentence. After pleading guilty to second-degree murder, he was sentenced to 10 years in life plus five years for aggravated assault in a

Canyon County case.

Rodriguez prepared two applications to reduce his sentence, and asked for an attorney to help him. District Judge Jim Donliffe dismissed the petitions, at the same time denying Rodriguez' request for transcripts of his trial proceedings.

Rodriguez was entitled to the help of an attorney, who might help him demonstrate the need for a transcript at public expense, the court said.

Glenn promises to work for prayer in school

If elected to Congress, Republican Gary Glenn says he will work to restore school prayer.

"I believe that our rights do not originate from government but from God," Glenn told an Onside County GOP gathering at Malad.

Glenn, Ada County commissioner, is battling state Senate President Mike Crapo for the party nomination in the 2nd Congressional District.

More than 60 people heard Glenn and Crapo debate their conservative credentials. Glenn's comments were

sprinkled with religious references and he said as a high school student, he was a member of a Christian athletic group.

Both candidates pitched their ties to southeastern Idaho. Crapo, an Idaho Falls lawyer, said Rep. Robert Geddes, R-Preston, heads this campaign in that area. Glenn said his wife's grandfather was raised near Malad.

"As they have in candidate forums throughout the district, the candidates sparred over Crapo's legislative voting record and each other's political styles.

Crapo, who the last four years has been the Senate's top officer, said he has support from both Democrats and Republican lawmakers and his low-profile style has been effective.

Retired farmer James Madison, 79, said both candidates espoused similar philosophies, but he would probably support Glenn because he helped pass anti-union laws.

"I'd like to see somebody stand up for right-to-work," Madison said.

Elsewhere in Idaho politics, a top-business lobbyist said at Idaho Falls that the shift in political power in the Idaho Legislature from rural to urban

areas will force business people to change how they advocate their interests.

Steve Ahrens, president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, a lobby group for Idaho businesses, spoke to a Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce committee Wednesday.

Only a day after Gov. Cecil Andrus signed into law the bill creating new legislative districts in

Idaho, lawmakers were changing long-standing voting patterns to reflect new political realities, Ahrens said.

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Energy Department might store nuclear waste at Yucca as test

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Energy Department officials are asking for permission to place nuclear waste at Yucca Mountain before the site is licensed so the agency can test the safety of the mountain as a nuclear dump.

John Bartlett, director of the Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, says the plan could place the radioactive waste at the site by the latter part of this decade.

Yucca Mountain, 100 miles north-

west of Las Vegas, is the only site in the country being studied to store radioactive waste from the nation's nuclear power plants.

Bartlett said the waste would be placed "in a disposal mode" to obtain data for the license to store the waste at Yucca Mountain. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission must give final approval to any temporary or permanent storage plan.

"I have no idea whether the NRC can buy this," Bartlett said.

Bartlett disclosed the plan during a speech to nuclear industry executives at a meeting in Washington, D.C. Wednesday. The conference was sponsored by the American Nuclear Energy Council, the lobbying arm of the nuclear power industry.

The plan would allow "earlier emplacement of spent fuel in order to test disposal safety for as long as possible," Bartlett said.

Bartlett said the plan would call for a different licensing procedure by the

NRC. Under current guidelines, the Energy Department would have to wait until the completion of its site characterization study near the end of the century before asking the NRC to license the facility, Bartlett said.

That procedure means the government would have to wait until 2010 before it could bury waste at Yucca Mountain, Bartlett said.

Bartlett said the Energy Department began considering the plan because "we need real, actual represen-

tative data as a basis for licensing reviews."

"The key thing is it would allow us to demonstrate safety aspects sooner," Bartlett said.

Sen. Richard Bryan, D-NeV., said he found the plan alarming and accused the Energy Department of being obsessed with the advancement of nuclear power.

"I kind of wish that guys like Nevada officials are vigorously opposed to the dump project."

Bartlett would come out of the closet and admit that they are nothing more than an advanced cadre for the nuclear power industry," Bryan said. "The Energy Department is supposed to be monitoring and regulating the nuclear power industry. In effect, the regulator is the cheerleader for nuclear power."

Group seeks Foley resignation

SPOKANE (AP) — A conservative political group is launching a petition campaign calling on Rep. Tom Foley to resign as U.S. House speaker.

The campaign by Citizens United of Fairfax, Va., announced here Wednesday, was labeled a mixture of "distortion and inaccuracies by Foley press aide Jeff Biggs."

Citizens United president Floyd Brown said his group hopes to collect 250,000 signatures on the petitions.

"As long as there is a cloud hanging over (Congress), the people's work isn't being done," Brown said in Spokane.

"Once again, a well-financed group of outsiders is trying to tell Eastern Washington residents what to do," Biggs said. "It sounds like a college prank ... but that may be pretty unfair to college students."

The effort is unlikely to sway the veteran Washington Democrat, he said in a telephone interview from Washington, D.C.

Brown's group was responsible for the controver-

sial "Willie Horton" advertisements attacking Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis during the 1988 presidential campaign. The ads were called racist by Democrats and disavowed by the Bush-Quayle campaign.

Foley's Republican challengers disavowed any connection with the Citizens United effort, though state Rep. Duane Sommers of Spokane said it could help his campaign.

Sommers said he wasn't aware of Brown's connection to the "Willie Horton" campaign, but said negative ads have a place in some campaigns.

"I think with Willie Horton, it fell on receptive ears," Sommers said. "It got the job done."

The petitions accuse Foley of trying to protect members of Congress who wrote overdrafts on their accounts at the defunct House Bank.

Cigarette starts fire; woman dies

WOODS CROSS, Utah (AP) — A 69-year-old woman died of smoke inhalation in a fire caused by a cigarette smoldering in a couch.

Norma O. Case was found in the bathroom of her apartment after the blaze was reported at 4:13 a.m. Thursday, said Chief Brent Argyle of the South Davis Fire District.

The apartment is in a four-plex that was evacuated for about an hour. There were no other injuries.

Case apparently became disoriented when she awoke. There were no smoke detectors in the apartment, Argyle said.

Firefighters extinguished the blaze in a few minutes. No formal estimate had been made, but Argyle said the damage could amount to between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

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Poverty, income levels rise in Nevada

LAS VEGAS (AP) — New figures by the U.S. Census Bureau show median household income has increased slightly in Nevada, but the poverty level has also risen.

The figures show the median household income in Nevada was \$31,011 in 1989. A decade earlier, in 1979, the median income was \$30,522.

After adjusting for inflation, Nevada households were making 14 percent more money, the census report said.

The figures, based on the 1990 census, were released Thursday.

The Census Bureau said the number of impoverished individuals rose from 68,657 in 1979 to 119,660 in 1989. In 1979, the impoverished represented 8.7 percent of the population. The figure increased to 10.2 percent in 1989.

The family poverty rate increased from 6.3 percent in 1979 to 7.3 percent in 1989. Based on 1989 incomes, 22,539 Nevada families lived in poverty.

Poverty statistics were based on federal guidelines that vary according to factors that include the number of family members under the age of 18. A family of four was considered to be

living in poverty if it made less than \$12,674 in 1989.

The report said 23.2 percent of Nevada families headed by women with no husband present lived in poverty in 1989.

Sixty-two percent of all women over the age of 16 were in the labor force in 1990, as were 77.4 percent of men.

The median gross rent in Nevada in 1990 was \$509 a month. In 1984, the median was \$493. Figures show 41.4 percent of renters had housing costs in excess of 30 percent of their incomes in 1990.

Couple battles for custody of grandnephew

CARSON CITY (AP) — Dean and Iris Crawford are picketing the Nevada Capitol this week in their bid to get custody of a 2-year-old grandnephew.

The retired Gardnerville couple waged a year-long battle with the state before deciding to picket in efforts to get Brett Michael Crawford, who is mildly disabled and living with adoptive parents in Las Vegas.

"We've been to judges, child protective services, the governor's office. We get nowhere," said Crawford, adding that he considers the state's refusal to consider him and his wife as adoptive parents is a miscarriage of justice.

John Sarb, administrator of the Division of Child Care Services, said he's sympathetic but bound by legal constraints and also by the mother's request that the child not be placed in the family.

Springsteen will take his music to television

Like Richard Nixon and The Beatles, Bruce Springsteen has had a standing offer to appear on NBC's "Saturday Night Live," for 17 years.

Saturday, The Boss makes good. Springsteen's three yet-to-be announced songs on Saturday's show will be his first live network gig.

Though Springsteen would seem immune to the kind of publicity appearances other performers must endure, at closer look, his visit to "SNL" is a masterful stroke.

With summer tour dates soon to be announced and two new albums slumping in stores, a mini-concert on "Saturday Night Live" should pique fan interest all over again.

And, after a long layoff, such reminders are crucial, particularly since the "anti-hype" campaign designed by Springsteen's handlers seems to be backfiring.

Until this week he has talked to no one, appeared nowhere, actively plugged nothing — all of which has helped his albums, "The Ghost" and "Lucky Town" free-fall to Nov. 12 and 23 after just four weeks on Billboard's chart.

That's why a casual studio jam on "SNL" is the perfect move. After 17 years of varying quality, the show still offers the most coveted musical slot on TV.

An irreverent, enduring reminder

of the '70s, "SNL" has played — a crucial role in showcasing all manner of musical talent for mainstream consumption.

"It really has a galvanizing effect," says Bob Merlis, a longtime Warner Bros. Records vice president. "It's the crown jewel — a great outlet. It's a rarified environment and rare juxtaposition of something that is undeniably hip. It's still the place to be, and still what people talk about on Monday morning."

Such industry adulation warns the heart of "SNL" associate producer Liz Welch, who books the show's talent.

"We have always been cutting-edge, while trying to find a good match between the host and the music," Welch said.

There is a cachet associated with musical-guesting on "SNL," which late-night talk shows and even MTV's dignified "Unplugged" series, do not have. Astute booking is just part of the reason.

"This year I'd have to say Nirvana was the one," Welch said, referring to the sudden explosion of the Seattle-based band. "I also think it's because we're live."

"Record companies would love it if we were like a restaurant. You could just call, make a reservation and be on the show."

"There have been numerous landmark musical performances on 'SNL' among them Elvis Costello's American breakthrough in 1977. Other breaking alternative acts who found a broad outlet on 'SNL' include 10,000 Maniacs, John Hiatt and Laurie Anderson.

NBC publicists say Paul Simon has logged the most musical performances with at least seven or eight," but that doesn't include all the times he has hosted.

"It's amazing that it has been on the air 17 years and it's still such a hip showcase," says Paul Grein, who monitors Billboard chart action. "For some rock acts there has always been a stigma in doing TV, but not 'Saturday Night Live.' It's not seen as a crass, commercial move."

Grein often sees a correlation between an "SNL" gig and album sales.

"When an act appears, there's usually an uptick," Grein said. "This should be especially helpful for

Springsteen, whose albums haven't gotten out of the gate as quickly as everyone expected.

But not everyone comes to "SNL" to sell albums. Some just do it for fun.

For example, Madonna has hosted (Nov. 9, 1985), and played a bizarre sketch cameo with Barbra Streisand this season, but neither has ever been a musical guest.

Only a few celebrities have been host — and musical guest simultaneously, among them Simon, Sting, Quincy Jones, Dolly Parton, Hammer, Art Garfunkel and the Rolling Stones.

Taylor, Simon, Tracy Chapman and the Stones are among the elite who have been accorded the honor of playing more than two songs, as Springsteen will.

"The Boss will play in two blocks: two songs at the beginning of the show, and one at the end, which Welch expects to fall within the show's traditional musical time slot."

"For 17 years he has always had an open invitation," said Welch. "He's made at least a half-dozen calls every season. Finally, the timing was right."

Cannes Film Festival remembers Marlene Dietrich

CANNES, France (AP) — One day after her death, film legend Marlene Dietrich was the dominating presence Thursday at the star-studded opening of the 45th Cannes Film Festival.

"Stars never die," Gerard Depardieu, film star and president of the festival jury, told reporters. "She will exist forever in her films."

Dietrich, the international symbol of glamor and cool sensuality for nearly 50 years, died Wednesday in Paris.

A huge portrait of Dietrich greeted festival-goers, who observed a moment of silence before opening ceremonies got under way.

The festival, which has drawn an estimated 40,000 fans and film-industry figures to this Riviera resort, was declared open by actress Catherine Deneuve.

Then, in Dietrich's honor, the audience heard a rendition in German of one of the Berlin-born star's hit

songs, "Don't Leave Me." Sharon Stone, the smoldering blonde in "Basic Instinct," the erotic thriller which opened the festival, remembered Dietrich as the ultimate "celebration of femaleness."

"Her photograph is the symbol of the festival this year ... she had incredible timing up to the last mo-

ment," Stone told reporters following a screening of Paul Verhoeven's controversial film.

Stone recalled Dietrich's definition of glamour. "Glamour is just being aware of yourself, accepting it and believing at each moment you are equal to any situation you are in," she said. "It's a great way to celebrate femaleness."

Dozens of international stars, directors and producers including Julie Andrews, Blake Edwards, Robert Altman, Anouk Aimee, Jamie Lee Curtis, Barbara Hendricks, Ridley Scott, Philippe Noiret, Franco Zeffirelli and David Puttnam converged

on the busy Croisette, the main coastal road in this sunny resort.

Hours of film buff-waited under the hot sun outside the modern festival palace for a glimpse of the stars as they ascended the red velvet-carpeted stairway.

Photographers combed the beaches for aspiring actresses striking topless poses.

The festival, which runs through May 18, features 21 movies from 13 countries, including six American films, competing for the prestigious Golden Palm award.

U.S. entries have won the prize the past three years.

Michael Douglas, who plays a homicide detective opposite Miss Stone in "Basic Instinct," praised the festival for choosing a big-budget American film as the opening attraction.

Verhoeven, the Dutch director who settled in Hollywood to make the science fiction hit "RoboCop" and "Total Recall," told reporters he had dreamed of directing Dietrich in Stone's role as a manipulative sex-pot.

"She never would have agreed to do the erotic scenes in the nude," he said.

From fillings to fiction: Wendell's Hagerman focuses on writing

WENDELL — Dr. Richard Hagerman spent 39 years putting smiles on people's faces as a dentist. Now he wants to put smiles on people's faces as a writer.

"A lot of writing creates the blinks," Hagerman said. "I'm trying to write stories that will make people feel good."

The jump from polishing teeth to polishing words was not a difficult one for the 67-year-old Hagerman. "I won a writing contest in school, and I have taken a few correspondence courses," said Hagerman, who recently placed third in a Cactus Pete's writing competition.

Since his retirement, he has been published in The Saturday Evening Post, Decision magazine, Artery magazine, Power for Living and American Square Dance magazine, among others.

The publications correlate with Hagerman's interests. Hagerman teaches courses in hunter safety responsibility for the Fish and Game Department. He and his wife, Dorothy, spent years on the square dance circuit. And he is an elder in the United Presbyterian Church of Wendell. He also crisscrosses the Magic Valley

filling in as a lay preacher in various pulpits.

When Hagerman traveled to Africa 10 years ago, he wrote and sold a story about his experiences building a library on a college campus near Freetown in Sierra Leone. A column he wrote about Niagara Springs for The Times-News was reprinted in an Idaho publication.

A series of his devotionals were incorporated into a book, entitled "Time Out," which sells for \$9.95 and is available at the Christian

Bookstore in Centennial Square Mall.

Hagerman frequently speaks to school groups about his love of writing. Not long ago, he spent a morning helping a fourth-grade class at Wendell Elementary learn about characterization and plot building. Before that, he traveled to Richfield with the Twin Falls Chapter of the Idaho Writers League to speak to a group of elementary students.

And no, Hagerman is not named after the town; in fact, he grew up in a small town in Michigan.

"I don't want to become an old dog, so I keep learning new tricks," Hagerman said, referring to writing, not dentistry.

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
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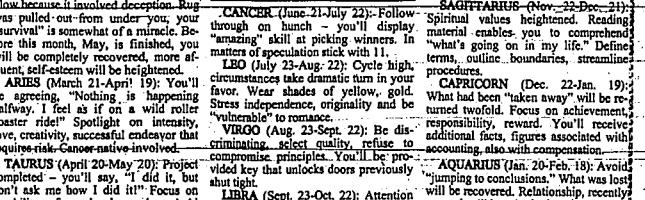
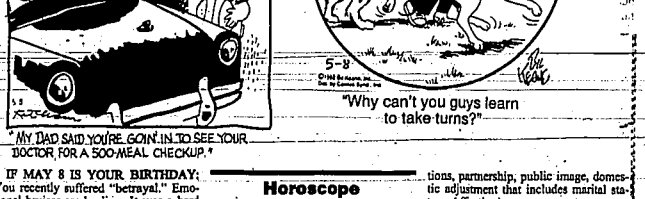
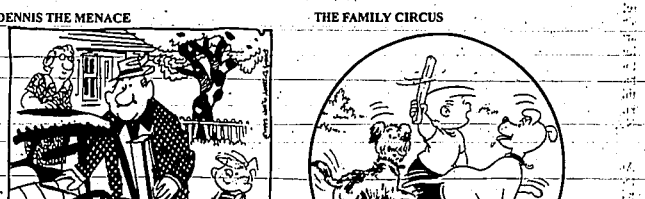
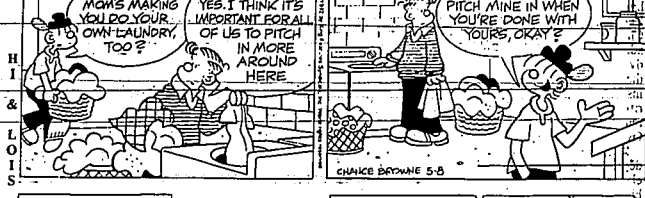
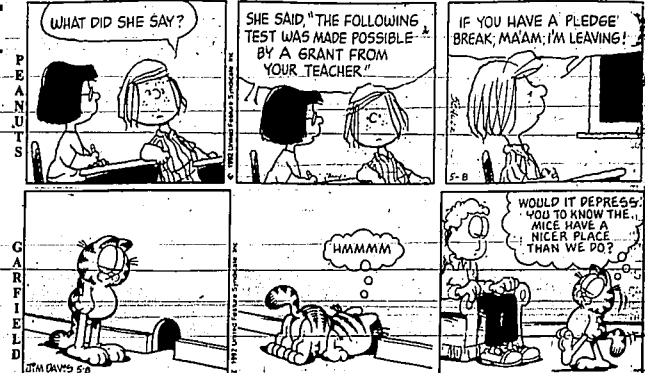
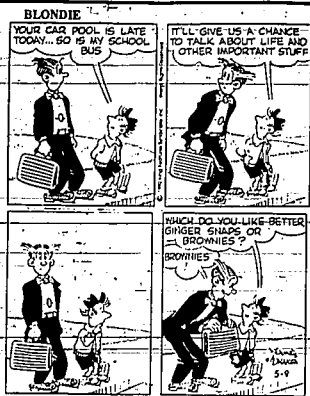

Canine star, uptight dad keep 'Beethoven' upbeat, lightweight

HOLLYWOOD — "Beethoven" is a medium-level comedy about a lovable Saint Bernard, a dog-loving family and a dog-phobic dad. It's a consciously naive movie — big, bright, cartoonish and kind of empty — but it isn't the doggy dud that "Bingo" was. It isn't another slap-happy, yuppie-puppie milk-bone of a movie, sentimental and nasty by turns.

There is some feeling in it, enough for the right kind of understanding audience, to make it a pleasant time-passer.

The movie is about the way pets humanize uptight suburbanites. And the suburbanite here, Charles Grodin as George Newton, is a good part of what makes "Beethoven" work. Grodin's mastery of uptight types is always apparent. As George, he has his usual sick-silly grin, his self-righteous tantrums, the whiny-but-often-astute, eternally second act.

His humanizer here is Beethoven himself: a big, sloppy, lovable Saint Bernard (played by canine actor Chris, 12 doubles and a score of adorable puppies) who leaves muddy footprints everywhere and tears the furniture to shreds — as well as inspiring ersatz Beethoven piano riffs on the sound track and frequent readings of Chuck Berry's "Roll Over, Beethoven."

Beethoven is trouble's pup, dogged by esthetic, ground-level-camera shots keep putting us in his dog's life: he escapes from the brutal minions of the evil veterinarian "Dr. Varnick, who kidnaps him from the pet store, his adoption by the Newmans — and the chaos when Varnick returns to kidnap him again.

The Newmans are a family so comically idealized family known to us from TV commercials: blustering dad, blonde wife Alice, and three winsome tykes. But Bonnie Hunt

expands her part; she gives Alice sturdiness. And Varnick, in a way, is George's nastier alter ego. He's played, in a sly casting stroke, by Dean Jones, the bright-as-a-button hero of 60s Disney Studio comedies like "That Darn Cat" and "The Love Bug." Twenty or 30 years ago, Jones would have been playing George.

"Beethoven" was directed by Brian Levant, and it's a big improvement over his first movie, "Problem Child II." There was a gross, raw edge in the "Problem Child" movies that typified many '80s sitcoms, but "Beethoven" isn't nasty. There's something a little goofy and sweet about it — and that probably comes

from the writers, Amy Jones (who wrote and directed "Love Letters") and the mysterious Edmond Dantes (who uses the same name as the Count of Monte Cristo).

Despite its crudities, overstatement and predictable plot, "Beethoven" (MPAA-rated PG) isn't obnoxious. It's not for cinematic gourmets, and probably only part of the mass audience will like it — the more tolerant, dog-loving part. It's a shopping mall movie. But the world should have a place for shopping mall movies — as much as it should for lovable, messy Saint Bernards and their fussy-budget masters.

Philadelphia Orchestra files suit seeking share of 'Fantasia' profits

The Philadelphia Orchestra Association lawsuit the Walt Disney Co. with a lapse Wednesday, claiming it deserves half the \$120-million videocassette profit from the animated classic "Fantasia."

The Philadelphia Orchestra's "musical performance, name and likeness were used throughout the movie," the suit said, and "no contract or agreement" gives Disney the right to use its performance without compensation.

The civil lawsuit, which also named Disney's Buena Vista Home Video subsidiary, was filed in U.S. District Court in Philadelphia. Besides half of Fantasia's estimated profit, the suit seeks unspecified punitive damages.

Steve Feldstein, a spokesman for Buena Vista Home Video in Burbank, Calif., said, "We don't comment on litigation, pending or otherwise."

In the past two years, Disney has been hit with similar suits. In March 1991, it lost a key legal battle with singer Peggy Lee. A jury awarded the singer \$3.8 million, agreeing with her claim that she wasn't compensated for Disney's video sales of the 1955 classic "Lady and the Tramp." Lee co-wrote six songs and provided the voices for four characters.

The Philadelphia Orchestra is making similar claims in its lawsuit, saying its role in the 1940 film was of central importance.

In "Fantasia," studio musicians are shown as a representation of the orchestra. The silhouette of Leopold Stokowski, then — the orchestra's

renowned conductor, appears. Stokowski conducted the orchestra as it performed a classical music score.

Critics regarded "Fantasia" as an instant classic, although it was something of a dud at the box-office in 1940.

Since its release last fall on laser disk and videocassette, however, "Fantasia" has been a fantastic money-maker for Disney. The California-based entertainment company credited the classic's video sales with being a key contributor to revenue and profit during its first business quarter, which ended on Dec. 31.

The orchestra estimated that Disney has sold more than 14 million cassettes or laserdiscs of "Fantasia," resulting in revenue of \$220 million and profit of at least \$120 million, the suit said.

When Disney sought to release phonograph recordings of "Fantasia"

in 1957, the suit said, Disney asked Stokowski to conduct the orchestra's performance and paid it royalties.

The orchestra then permitted Disney to use its sound recording of classical music "for a feature-length theatrical motion picture exhibited in theaters outside the home," according to the suit.

No formal permission was sought or granted before the videocassette and laserdisc versions were released, it said.

In "The Disney Films," author Leonard Maltin writes of the orchestra's role. He said the movie grew out of chance meeting, at a 1938 Hollywood party, between Walt Disney and Stokowski.

At first, Stokowski merely conducted the score for a single cartoon. But soon, Stokowski "prodded Disney about expanding his idea," Maltin writes. "And doing a whole series of visualizations of musical themes, Disney was intrigued."

Winless Susan Lucci gains 13th Emmy nomination

NEW YORK (AP) — Will No. 13 prove lucky for Susan Lucci?

The oft-nominated, never victorious soap opera star on Thursday received her 13th Emmy nomination for her role as the manipulative Erika Kane on "All My Children." It's deja vu all over again for Lucci, who's been honored — then defeated — 12 straight times.

CBS had the most nominees for the 19th annual awards with 68, followed by PBS with 41, ABC with 25 and NBC 24. Syndicated programs collected 33 nominations in the 43 categories.

"Guiding Light," on CBS, was the single most recognized show, with 16 nominations, followed by "The Young and the Restless," CBS, 15; "Another World," NBC, 10; and "As the World Turns," CBS, 9. Lucci's "All My Children" received 8 nominations;

and "The Restless," and last year's winner, the venerable "As the World Turns."

The top nominee for children's programming was longtime favorite "Sesame Street," which collected nine nominations. A kiddie show veteran making a comeback — Shari Lewis — received four nominations for "Lamb Chop's Play-Along," which debuted this season on PBS.

Among the talk show crowd was "The Joan Rivers Show," which garnered six nominations. Top choice among game shows was "The Price Is Right," which had six nominations. And the leader among animated programs was "Disney's Darkwing Duck," with five.

Lucci's competition for outstanding lead actress in a drama series are Elizabeth Hubbard as Lucinda

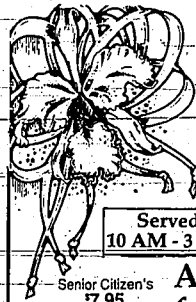

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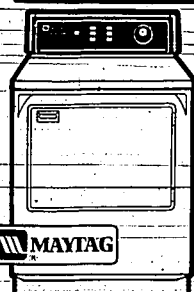
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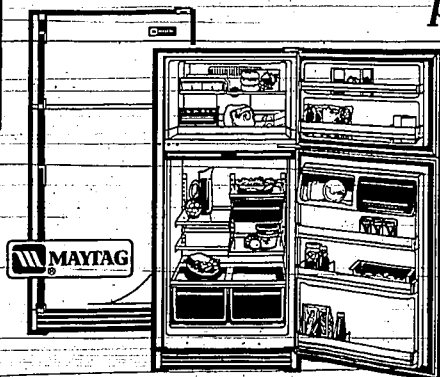

Reserve picks up slack as Bulls even series

The defending champion Chicago Bulls, threatened with a 2-0 deficit against the New York Knicks, got the boost they needed Thursday night from reserve guard B.J. Armstrong.

With Olympians Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen struggling offensively, Armstrong scored six consecutive points after the Knicks cut a 12-point deficit to 79-78 with 2:04 left. Armstrong finished with 18 points as Chicago evened the best-of-7 NBA playoff series 1-1 with an 86-78 victory.

Jordan scored 27 points, but only six came in the second half, while Pippen finished with six points on 2-for-12 shooting for the game. Jordan also missed three of four free throws in the closing minutes before Armstrong hit two clutch baskets and then a pair of clutching free throws with 19.2 seconds remaining.

"I felt good physically, but disappointed with the way I finished the game," Jordan said. "I was totally out of sync in the second half. I wasn't there when the team needed me."

"But I'm very happy other players like B.J. covered up my mistakes down the stretch."

The defending champion Bulls held a 12-

point lead early in the final period when the Knicks rallied behind Patrick Ewing, who scored 34 points in New York's series-opening 94-89 victory. He was held to four points for three quarters before finishing with 16 points and 16 rebounds.

With 2:04 left, Ewing closed the Knicks to 79-78, but they didn't score again. Armstrong scored the next six points before Jordan's free throw finished it.

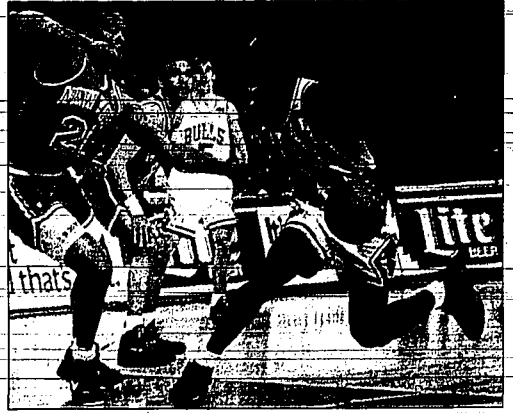
"It's something you always dream of," Armstrong said. "You don't know when the opportunity will come, but you have to answer the call. We worked hard for a 12-point advantage and you don't want to let it go on your home court. We have a lot of pride."

Xavier McDaniel finished with 15 points for the Knicks. Horace Grant scored 14 for the Bulls, who travel to New York for games Saturday afternoon and Sunday night.

Elsewhere Thursday, Portland took a 1-0 lead into its home games against Phoenix in the Western Conference semifinals.

On Friday night, the Boston Celtics meet the Cleveland Cavaliers at Boston Garden after taking the homecourt advantage in their best-of-7 playoff with a 104-98 road victory Monday, tying the series 1-1. It was Boston's 12th victory in the 13 games since

IBF middleweight champ avoids prison after assault

YPSILANTI, Mich. — James "Lights Out" Toney, the International Boxing Federation middleweight champion, was sentenced to six months' probation on an assault charge, a prosecutor said Thursday.

Toney, 30, pleaded no contest March 17 to the misdemeanor count, filed after he allegedly pointed a toy gun at a woman acquaintance in October 1990. The woman was not injured in the incident in Washtenaw County's Ypsilanti Township, said Mark Dermanulian, an assistant county prosecutor.

On Wednesday, District Judge John Collins sentenced Toney, 23, of Ann Arbor, to six months' probation and ordered him to perform 40 hours of community service and pay \$400 in fines and court costs, Dermanulian said.

Because of the plea agreement, Toney didn't testify in the case, the prosecutor said.

Brazilian driver becomes 2nd Indy practice victim

INDIANAPOLIS — The worst crash of the week sent three-time Formula One champion Nelson Piquet to the hospital Thursday and cast a somber mood over the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

The 39-year-old Brazilian, a rookie at Indy, had turned his fastest lap so far — 225.571 mph — only hours before he spun through Turn 4 on the 2.5-mile oval and crashed nearly head-on into the concrete barrier.

Piquet was just getting back up to speed after pitting for adjustments to his 1992 Lola-Buick. His lap prior to the one on which he crashed was 212.304.

It was the second time in less than 24 hours that a seasoned racer was the victim of a nasty crash during practice for the May 24 Indianapolis 500.

On Wednesday, four-time Indy winner and defending champion Rick Mears somehow escaped serious injury in a terrifying crash in Turn 2.

In both cases, it appeared that the accidents were caused by other-than-driver error. Mears slid through water from a broken hose in his own engine and something apparently broke or a tire deflated in the rear of Piquet's car.

Mears came away, with a mildly sprained wrist and a cracked bone in his left foot.

Nate Tebb's RBI single got the Eagles out to a 1-0 lead in game two, but Ricks, which improved to 21-20, responded with three runs on a trio of one-buggers punctuated by a hit batsman.

A Ricks homer following a walk sent Ricks up 5-0 after three and another solo blast in the fifth doomed CSI.

"I hate to end the regular season on a bad note," Walker said. "We're going to go hard at them tomorrow."

Lance Daniels is expected to face Viking right-hander Mike Bennett in today's 11 a.m. contest — a nine-inning affair.

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Bird practices but remains doubtful against Cavaliers

BOSTON (AP) — Larry Bird did everything the rest of his teammates did during Thursday's practice.

But Bird, who has missed 13 games with recurring back problems, was not expected to be in uniform Friday night when the Boston Celtics and Cleveland Cavaliers resume their Eastern Conference semifinal series which is tied 1-1.

"He was able to participate in the scrimmage for a full workout, and that was something I was pleased to see. But I still list him as doubtful," coach Chris Ford said. "It's a matter of conditioning and whether or not he's pain-free — how much pain he can tolerate. He'll let us know when he's ready."

Bird was definitely ready for the level of competition provided in Thursday's scrimmage, up to a point.

"I knew he was ready to play practice today because he didn't have his running shoes on, he had his basketball shoes on," said Rick Fox, who said Bird also seemed to indicate there were limits to his stamina.

Chief (Robert) Parish made a comment to Larry. "We'll go at you," and Larry said back to him: "You'd better, because I don't know how long it will last." Fox said.

Bird, who did not talk after prac-

ice, did an interview with former teammate Quinn Buckner, now with NBC Sports.

"Right now I think Larry is wanting to get back in the playoffs, get through the year and then decide on his future after that," Buckner said. "I think Larry is like anybody who has not played for a while. Right now he's just anxious to get back on the court."

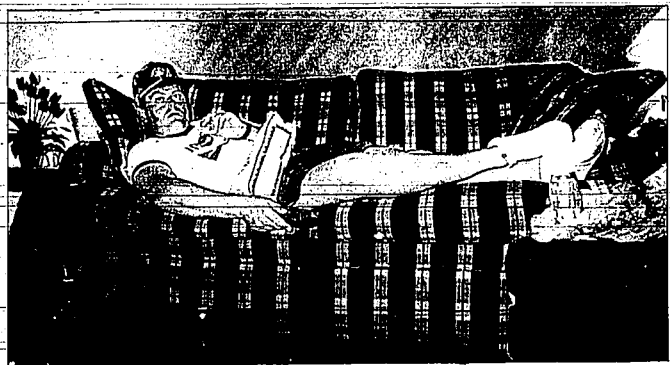
The Cavaliers might not be so eager to play on the uneven parquet floor at Boston Garden, where Cleveland has a franchise record of 9-50, including 0-5 in the playoffs.

Boston Garden is an old place — a very old place — where a lot of great fans are always screaming at you, Cleveland forward Larry Nance said. "Some places on the court are kind of dead and the ball doesn't bounce up so good, so I'm glad I'm not a point guard."

Nance, who has averaged 18.2 points and nearly 10 rebounds in six playoff games, might find some comfort in the announcement Thursday that financing for a new Boston Garden had been finalized. But the first game isn't scheduled there until 1995.

"We're a good team," Nance said. "If we go in there and play well, we should win. That's the way we're approaching it."

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Cordero retires after 7,076 winners

NEW YORK (AP) — To horse players, he often was the Angel in the Irons. Other times, he was a devil on horseback.

Nobody, but nobody, stirred bettors' emotions as did Angel Cordero Jr., who retired Thursday to become a trainer.

It was Cordero who held a sprinter named Bold Forbes together, fittingly, to win the 1 1/4-mile Kentucky Derby and the 1 1/2-mile Belmont Stakes.

It was Cordero who was accused of everything but treason when he forced the Kentucky Derby winning filly Genuine Risk wide entering the stretch and won the 1980 Preakness on Codex.

When bettors won, Cordero was the consummate horseman. When he lost, he often was accused of dirt deals by people who couldn't get on a horse with a fork.

"I loved the people even when they booed," he said. "Sometimes I lost my temper. When you get booed eight or nine times a day ...

Cheer him or curse him, however, Cordero was a standout in a dangerous profession.

The record book shows he rode 7,076 winners, third only to the retired Bill Shoemaker (8,833) and Laffit Pincay (7,759 through Wednesday). Cordero's purse earnings of \$164,571,847 were second only to Pincay's \$165,158,943; also through Wednesday.

"Laffit called me last night — he was very sorry," Cordero — not always able to choke back tears — told a news conference at a mid-Manhattan restaurant.

Injury finally put the 49-year-old Cordero on the ground for good. By his reckoning, the Puerto Rican native was in 24 serious spills.

On Jan. 12, Cordero was involved in a four-horse, chain-reaction spill at Aqueduct. He suffered a broken left arm, three broken ribs and severe internal injuries that resulted in the removal of his spleen.

Doctors advised him to quit riding, at least for the rest of his year. "I've always wanted to try training, and now is the time," said

Cordero, whose second wife, Marjorie, a former jockey, is a trainer.

"There was always hope I'd come back to ride. It's not easy to quit."

Of Cordero's latest accident, Dr. Gary Walder, said, "The first 48 hours, it's been steady, and it's true, we thought he wouldn't be with us. Any further injury to his abdomen, and we don't think we'd be as lucky the next time."

Kentucky Derby wins on 'Cannonade' (1974), 'Bold Forbes' (1976) and 'Spend A Buck' (1985) followed, plus a host of victories in major stakes, including the Preakness, Belmont and some Breeders' Cup races.

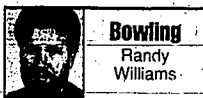
In 1988, he was inducted into the National Museum of Racing's Hall of Fame at Saratoga Springs, N.Y.

"Not only a great rider, but I never knew anyone else as good at getting off a horse and telling you not only about the race, but about the horse itself," said trainer D. Wayne Lukas, who will saddle Twilight Agenda in the Pimlico Special Saturday at Pimlico. "He had a marvelous knack for a horse and what it was capable of doing."

His biggest thrill, Cordero said, was winning the Kentucky Derby, but his best ride may have been in the 1976 Belmont aboard Bold Forbes.

His breeding suggested speed, and Bold Forbes showed a lot of that in winning the Kentucky Derby. But he was hard-pressed in the 1 1/2-mile Belmont, and many observers felt it was only the work of Cordero that brought the colt home ahead of the pack.

The New York Rangers took Mario Lemieux out of the playoffs. Now they're threatening to do the same to the Stanley Cup champion Pittsburgh Penguins.

Kris King, centering pass deflected off goaltender Tom Barrasso and into the net just 1:29 into overtime as the Rangers withstood 50 Pittsburgh shots and three blown two-goal leads to beat the Penguins 6-5 Thursday night in Game 3 of the Patrick Division finals.

A's hurler bristles at getting hook

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Dave Stewart's trademark "death stare," the look he gives Oakland manager Tony La Russa on his trips to the mound, often is just a playful ritual between these two fierce competitors.

This season, the fun and games appear to be over. The look Stewart gave La Russa Wednesday night, in the eighth inning of the Athletics 5-2 win over Detroit, was the real thing.

"My role has changed with this club, as far as I'm concerned," Stewart said. "Nobody's saying anything, but I sense certain things. It's just a

feeling. I think my instincts are good."

Stewart, trying to rebound from an 11-11 season and 5.18 ERA in 1991, left Wednesday night's game with a 5-2 lead in the eighth inning. He had just retired Tony Phillips on a fly ball to left after giving up a leadoff single to Mark Carmona. That's when La Russa called on the bullpen.

As Stewart stalked off the mound, he gave La Russa the look. This time he meant it.

"I didn't go out there to get Stewart's approval," La Russa said. "If he doesn't understand the move, that's

his problem, not ours. Not the team's. If he gave me a stare, that's not what I was paying attention to out there."

La Russa's move paid off. Vince Horsman retired one batter and Dennis Eckersley got the final four outs for his league-leading 10th save.

"If he doesn't have the same confidence he had in me two or three years ago, that's his thing," Stewart said. "It's his team. He can run it any way he wants. I'm not going to question my manager."

"He says he understands winning. Does he think he understands it more than I do?"

Giants Stadium still in running for World Cup

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The president of soccer's governing body inspected Giants Stadium on Thursday and saw no problems playing 1994 World Cup games on a field some critics consider too narrow.

The 76,000-seat stadium, approximately eight miles from Manhattan, has come under attack by soccer purists who complain the field cannot be 75 yards wide, the width called for in World Cup regulations. FIFA president Joao Havelange discounted the controversy, saying the width of the field would be between 70 and 80 yards, the dimensions required for international matches. He said the artificial turf in Giants Stadium will be replaced by grass at least three months before the start of World Cup play.

"This will not create any prejudices," he said Havelange, completing a tour of four World Cup stadiums. "We are happy to come into this stadium."

America3 crew 'learned tons' from losing

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A poster shows a big sailboat rising from a yellow wheatfield instead of blue water. It's a sign of the Heart of America campaign for the 1987 America's Cup.

A sea-of-red-ink or a bowl-of-brown-molasses might be more appropriate.

Stripped by a lack of money and speed, Heart of America fared poorly in the competition in Australia. It failed to qualify for the challenger-semester-to-pick-one-to-battle-the-Aussies-for-the-Cup.

The Heart of America crew that flopped in Fremantle now is the heart of the America3 crew that is succeeding in San Diego. The best-of-7 finals between America3 and Il-Moro-di-Venezia of Italy begin Saturday.

The experience and knowledge gained on Heart of America is paying off on America3 (America Cubed).

"We-learned-tons," Dave Dellenbaugh, participant on both boats, said. "The first time that you do a campaign is a new thing. You're willing to just do it any way you can because you have to make it."

"When you do the second one, you want to do it better or do it right. I think this is a nice chance to do that."

Buddy Melges, from Zenda, Wis., is reprising his role as helmsman. Eight other members of the Heart of America effort now are with America3's crew.

The differences this year are experience, money and a faster boat. Syndicate president Bill Koch's millions built a multi-boat campaign, compared to the single-boat Heart of America effort, and a much larger organization.

Melges can spend more time on sailing and less on fund-raising, one of his major responsibilities in Australia.

"That paid off in the defender elimination series, culminating with America3's 7-4 victory over Dennis Carter's Stars & Stripes in the best-of-13 defender finals."

"The last time was a small family. This is a very large family, 240 people," Melges said. "We had only 40 people in the last go-around. We had a lot of fun there. We did it on a very small budget so everybody was constrained."

"We needed about \$200,000 worth of sails to go into the final challenger round-robin series" with.

He didn't get it, and Heart of America ended up eighth of the 13 potential challengers to

Kookaburra III, Australia's representative. But many of its crew members viewed the effort positively.

"We didn't have a chance of winning," Dellenbaugh said. "But almost everybody in Fremantle we did the best job of increasing the speed of the boat as time went on. That's the silver lining in the clouds."

Wally Henry, a pitman for America3 who worked on Heart of America, said, "This is more of an opportunity to prove that we weren't just a bunch of stinkard in 1987. Our equipment was just inferior."

Peter Fenelly certainly needed the work in 1987.

There was a center for the University of Rhode Island football team and had no sailing experience when Melges recruited him. He sailed some of the races in the physically demanding role as grinder and is expected to fill that role in this year's finals.

"I didn't know a jib sheet from a halyard," he said. "It was a fantastic opportunity to sail with

Buddy and the whole Heart of America crew. But it became a dream after that to continue on, and this could come to a fruition of a dream."

"I've spent the last five years thinking, will I get another opportunity to go out and get back in the game?"

Henry said the 1987 attempt left crew members hungrier to win this time and began a natural progression from that underfunded-but-hard-working effort to the well-heeled, hard-working America3 campaign.

"I just look at this as the next step in the ladder," he said. "We got some good things started with Heart of America, and that's how I like to look at it, not as a failed attempt but a chance for a lot of us."

Buddy included, to get our feet wet and get some experience in the America's Cup.

"I wanted to win the America's Cup for 15 years now. It's been the main goal of my life and I'm only one step away from that right now and the Heart of America challenge got me a couple of steps closer."

1984 Olympic champ vies for 154-pound crown

LAS VEGAS (AP) — But for one round, Melnick Taylor might be the best undefeated fighter in boxing.

Because of that round, however, Taylor has some questions to answer Saturday-night when he challenges Terry Norris for his 154-pound title.

At the top of the list is whether Taylor is the same fighter who has won two world titles and looked sensational against Julio Cesar Chavez before Chavez stepped him in the closing seconds of the 12th and

final round of their March 1990 fight.

"I haven't lost anything," Taylor said. "It hasn't shaken anything out of me. Physically, I'm the same fighter. I went up a weight class and I feel much stronger."

Taylor was comfortably ahead of points against Chavez in their junior welterweight title fight and appeared ready to hand the unbeaten Mexican his first professional loss.

But instead of fighting Chavez from the outside in the final round, Taylor

mixed it up with him, and Chavez dropped him in the final seconds of the round. Taylor rose at the count of five and watched in disbelief as referee Richard Steele made a controversial call to end the fight with two seconds left.

"I had the fight won and I should have just stayed away that last round and boxed," Taylor said. "I could have given the last round away and still won the decision. But I actually didn't know if I was ahead or not."

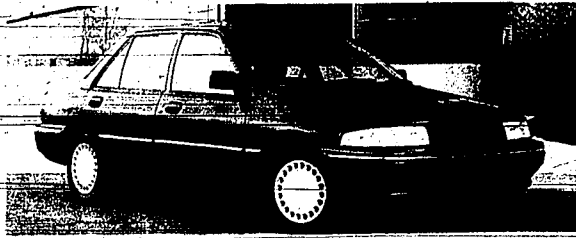
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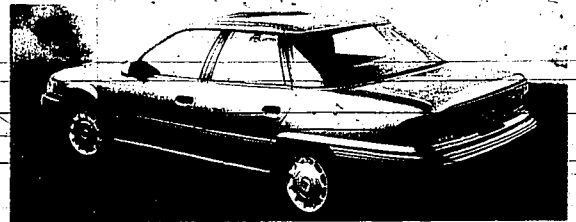
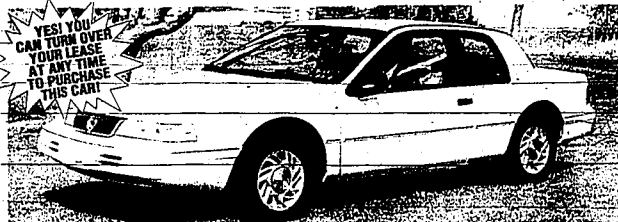
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THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

Dear Mr. Wolff:
We reached a small slam at Swiss-
team play, needing all five tricks in
a suit, which consisted of 10-5-3 in
dummy and A-K-9-8-6 in declarer's
hand. Luckily we made it finding Q-
J-x-x in a favorable position. What
were our odds for success?
Hil Jackson, Fort Meigs, N.Y.

ANSWER: The odds were not good.
You had to find both missing honors
inside and had to avoid a 5-0 break.
In all, it was less than a 24 percent
chance of success.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
Partner deals and passes, and I
open one club after RHO passes.
LHO overcalls one heart and partner
bids two hearts. What's my pri-
ority in answering his force?
No-Tremp of Spades, Seattle, Wash.

ANSWER—Lacking any specific
partnership agreement, I would in-
terpret partner's cue-bid as a "one
round force asking me for more de-
scription. I would choose my most
natural rebid. With four spades and
a heart stopper, I would rebid two
spades intending to bid no-trump at
my next turn.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
I open one no-trump, partner bids
two clubs, and next hand doubles to
ask for a club-lead—How much do-
need in clubs to redouble? What
does partner do over a redouble?
Cool Clubs, Rockford, Ill.

ANSWER: At least four, preferably
five, good clubs — something like
A-Q-10-8, K-J-10-9, etc. If you have

no four-card major, it is a plus for
the redouble. If you do, it may be
best to bid your major — partner
may well have a good fit.
If partner has two or three clubs
and a suitable hand for defense, he
passes. If he has only one club, he
can retreat to two no-trump, and
the partnership then scrambles to
its best spot.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
Partner opened one heart and I bid
one spade. He rebid two diamonds.
Holding ♠ Q-J-7-5, ♥ 7-5, ♦ Q-10-8-
2, ♣ A-Q-7, should I have raised dia-
monds or bid two no-trump?
Minor Rais, Houston, Texas

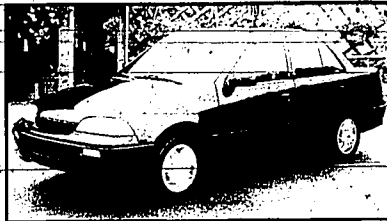
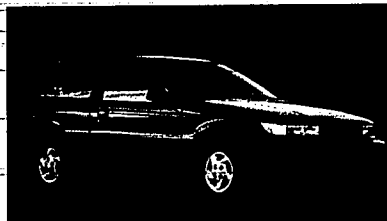
ANSWER: Both are invitational
bids, however, the two-no-trump
call is superior because it points the
partnership toward the more likely
no-trump game.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
Why is a trump lead against a small
slam considered a weak-lead?
Bud Chace, Raleigh, N.C.

ANSWER: When the opponents stop
at a small slam, they expect to lose
one trick. Since your objective is to
win two tricks, it pays to be aggres-
sive. You must try to establish a
second winner in time to cash it
when you get your expected trick. A
trump lead is usually defeatist since
it surrenders the advantage of time
to declarer.

Relive a piece of America when Dick Clark hosts Bandstand's anniversary

By Andrew BeDell

Let's trip and stumble down memory lane to a rainy Saturday afternoon in 1966, when we were forbidden our beloved physical pursuits and were forced indoors. We flipped on the TV — a Rory Calhoun Western, a golf tournament, a baseball game and "American Bandstand."

"We loved the outdoors, but we were also heavily into rock 'n' roll, even though we were only a young teen. Now, as if we were watching "A Hard Day's Night" in black and white, we vividly remember all the straight-looking white kids frugging and jerking and swimming to such diverse acts as Paul Revere and the Raiders, the Byrds, even the Who — all of whom lip-synched, more or less, to their current hits. We don't remember a particular moment on "American Bandstand" — just that image of Dick Clark and all those goofy kids dancing as if there were no tomorrow. Why 1966? Because that's as far back as our personal memories of "American Bandstand" go. But even then, it had already been on the air for 14 years.

What has led to all this reminiscing is the "American Bandstand 40th Anniversary Special," which airs Wednesday, May 13, on ABC.

To many adults, "American Bandstand" has achieved iconic sta-

tus as a piece of Americana, and so has the man who has become synonymous with the show — Dick Clark of the youthful good looks. He started with the show in 1956, when it was broadcast live from Philadelphia, and he has plenty of memories.

"Bandstand" had been on for four years when I became host," says Clark. "I don't remember the first show I hosted, but I do remember there was some animosity because the guy I replaced was fired." Everyone obviously got over that.

"I remember the first day we went on network, and everyone said we would fail; we were No. 1 in our time slot within 30 days," Clark says with satisfaction. He gives credit to ABC, which, he says, "was the Fox of its day," for taking a chance on the show.

Clark, an admitted promoter, says in all sincerity that the "American Bandstand 40th Anniversary Special" is going to be dynamite, mainly because of all the great old film clips, which include appearances by everyone from Fabian, Bobby Rydell, Chubby Checker and Frankie Avalon to Neil Diamond, Michael Jackson and Madonna.

And there will also be guests, many of whom you can bet partially owe the success of their careers to "American Bandstand." Alabama,

Boyz II Men, Neil Diamond, Gloria Estefan and the Miami Sound Machine, Little Anthony and the Imperials, Don McLean and Luther Vandross are scheduled to perform. Other stars, such as Pat Boone, Hammer, Barry Manilow, Reba McEntire, Johnny Mathis, John Mellencamp, Spinal Tap and Garry Shandling, will share their memories.

Utah station lays off 14 workers, trims programming hours

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — KOOG Channel 30, Ogden's only television station, has laid off 14 employees and cut back its broadcasting hours.

Business manager Becky Smith, who runs the station along with an engineer and assistant engineer, said KOOG will operate from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Tentatively, the Home Shopping Network will be featured from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

During prime time, the station will continue to feature either

one or two movies and a local religious program sponsored by the Miracle Rock Church.

KOOG will also carry baseball at night, but how much will depend on funding, Smith said.

"By June, we might stabilize financing and get settled in and do more. We will just try to keep things going until they improve again," she said.

The program changes may last only until the station obtains more financing, she said.

Channel chatter

SAWYER TO ANCHOR MAGAZINE: Forrest Sawyer, anchor of ABC's "World News Sunday" and a Gulf War correspondent, was named Tuesday to anchor of the network's new and as-yet unnamed magazine show. Sawyer, a frequent contributor to "Nightline," has anchored the Sunday news show since 1989, with frequent overseas assignments. He spent eight months in the Middle East, from the beginning of the Persian Gulf crisis, through the war and its aftermath. He also reported from the Soviet Union on the attempted coup against then-Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev. He will still host a weekly half-hour series called "Justice Files" on the Discovery Channel this fall. It features "real cases, real crimes, real cops, real victims," and uses ABC News footage. ABC is vending the series.

CHANGING ROLES OF SITCOM MOMS: "Sitcom Moms," CBS' hour pre-Mother's Day special on May 8, is a quick history of TV mothers from host Phylicia Rashad, "Cosby Show" mom Clair Huxtable. The show looks at expectant moms, moms with kids and teens, and adults and their moms. Guests are Florence Henderson of "The Brady Bunch," Barbara Billingsley and Jerry Mathers of "Leave It to Beaver," and Shirley Jones of "The Partridge Family."

MOVING ON: Calling it "kind of a mid-course correction," veteran correspondent-anchor Roger Mudd announced he will be leaving "The MacNeil-Lehrer NewsHour" this spring to accept the Ferris Professorship of Journalism for 1992 at Princeton University for the fall semester. He said he had "a verbal arrangement" with the producers to report for "NewsHour" when teaching permits — "If I've got any ideas, I'm sure they'll listen. We kind of left that open."

What's new?

CBS News announced that Bill Legattuta, who has looked good for NBC News on occasional appearances out of Burbank, has been named a correspondent working out of Los Angeles. He has been a reporter and weekend anchor for NBC-owned KNBC as well as a contributing correspondent for NBC News since 1985.

Lifestyle reporter Denise Richardson of New York TV show "Good Day, New York," will become national correspondent on ABC's "Good Morning America."

On tap

HBO is teaming with the BBC and Majestic Television to co-produce a movie based on the late press robber-baron Robert Maxwell's life that will be called "Maxwell: The Outsider." Mike Molloy, former editor in chief of Maxwell's Mirror Group Newspapers, will work on the script with Revel Barker, former general manager-managing editor of The People. The movie will be made from a screenplay by Robert Mundy based on a biography by Tom Bower. HBO would not say whether "Maxwell: The Outsider" would premiere in theaters or on TV. "Maxwell: The Outsider" is the second movie based on Maxwell now under way. A company called Blue Heaven Productions is behind "Fantastic Captain," by two Fleet Street journalists.

CBS Entertainment has begun production of "Double Jeopardy," a two-hour movie that will air first on cable's Showtime later this year, and then on CBS. The movie, starring Bruce Boxleitner, Rachel Ward and Sally Kirkland, is the first show CBS has produced for another network.

The last is billed as a "new live-action creation from Howie Mandel and the Chiodo Brothers, featuring a trio of funny, fishface characters. Mandel contributes to the mayhem as the madcap professor who brought them to life." Nuff said.

In "Disney's The Little Mermaid," Ariel, "the rambunctious daughter of King Triton, is a 'mer-teen' on a mission. With her pals, the lovable calypso crustacean Sebastian and the often flustered Flounder, she sets out on exciting adventures in the visually stunning underwater world."

"Fievel's American Tails," from Steven Spielberg, continues the escapades of Fievel Mousekewitz and the entire Mousekewitz family, as first seen in the film "An American Tail."

"Disney's Raw Toonage" is billed as a "half-hour of comic shorts, hosted each week by Disney's most popular characters."

The Disney Channel has expanded its commitment to promote national recognition of the teaching profession by increasing the number of teachers to be profiled in "The Disney Channel Salutes the American Teacher." The series of five-minute profiles will feature 60 outstanding educators from across the country, 24 more than last year's total of 36 profiles.

The salute, which is part of Walt Disney's year-long tribute to American teachers, will commence after "The Walt Disney Company Presents The American Teachers Awards," to be telecast live in December, 1992.

He's a prestige figure in the movie world, and he wouldn't dare go ahead with such a project without the consent of Chaplin's survivors. Robert Downey Jr. is portraying Charlie. He recently filmed scenes along with Anthony Hopkins (who plays a book publisher) at the late comedian's palatial estate in Vevey, Switzerland.

Q: What's this about Mary Tyler Moore turning down all acting offers because she wants to become a big-time Shakespearean stage actress? Is she suffering from delusions of grandeur? — S.W.

A: Mary has taken a few things easy lately, but is weighing offers. She is still beloved in show biz, and was recently honored by the Museum of TV and Radio. Her fling at the Bard turns out to be her participation in a Shakespeare acting workshop at a Santa Monica hotel. MTM tells me it's something of a lark. "My best friend (actress) Bernadette Peters talked me into it," she says.

SHAKY CELEB: One of America's favorite comedienne, who's been touring the country with a new act (along with her former partner) has been having a tough time remembering her lines. Insiders report she's been missing cues and, sadly, is far from the professional she's once was. My theater spy, who caught the act on the road, told me the much-beloved lady is so tired she all but collapses when she exits the stage — falling into the arms of a waiting "catcher" stationed in the wings and barely out of sight.

Q: We're interested in a report via the European press that Olivia de Havilland may soon be returning to films. Any inkling of when, and what the project will be? — C.Z.

A: Olivia, who'll soon be turning 76, is interested but in no hurry to return to work — despite the surpris-

ingly steady offers of stage and screen assignments still coming her way. De Havilland, who's now living in Paris, is rich enough to be very particular in her choice of roles, which she wants to be quite ladylike, and in keeping with her genteel image.

Married to restaurateur Stephen Crisman, Hemingway took the last four years off to raise her two children and tend to a growing list of restaurants the couple owns. "I felt as women, we're doing a disservice to ourselves by portraying only women as victims," she said. "There are women who are not victims and do important things and make a contribution."

In ABC's Sunday movie "Criminal Behavior," Fawcett plays a tough lawyer on the trail of a thief.

"She's a woman making her way in a man's world," the actress said. "She's not beaten up or beaten down."

A Martinez stars as a policeman assigned to look after Fawcett's character in her search for the thief, played by Morgan Stevens.

"I was looking at about five good scripts like 'The Burning Bed' and 'Small Sacrifices,'" Fawcett said, referring to two of her earlier projects.

"They were all true stories of women victims. It's so hard to turn down a good script, because I love

to work. But I said I had done shades of all of those characters. I didn't want to do that again."

Fawcett has played victims in such movies as "Murder in Texas" and "Poor Little Rich Girl." But it was 1984's critically acclaimed and highly rated "The Burning Bed" about an abused wife that began what has become a recurring theme of television movies.

She also has played strong characters: She portrayed Nazi-hunter Beate Klarsfeld and photographer Margaret Bourke-White in television biographies, and in "Extremities" — both on Broadway and as a theatrical film — she played a would-be rape victim who turns on her assailant with a vengeance.

Her last project was the short-lived 1991 CBS comedy series "Good Sports," which co-starred her longtime companion, Ryan O'Neal.

"Criminal Behavior" was adapted from the book "The Ferguson Affair" by Ross MacDonald.

"There was something about this woman that I liked — her attitude,

her relationship with men," Fawcett said.

"When I learned about the book, I got a copy and read it. I wanted to see if there was something else in it. Halfway through it I called (screenwriter) Wendell Mayes and said, 'Now I know why this woman is so interesting.' The character was a man in the book. So many scripts for women are not as interesting."

Her character, Jessie Lee Stubbs, comes from an unusual background. Her father is in prison for fraud, her brother is in jail for selling drugs and her mother is a psychic reader. Her father turned her into a cop-hater, but she ends up falling in love with a policeman.

Miss Fawcett said another plus for the story is having the atmosphere of Los Angeles portrayed as a character, which is typical of a MacDonald novel.

"I'm attracted to stories like that," she said. "I've filmed in L.A. when it was supposed to be someplace else. I've worked other places when it was supposed to be L.A."

CBS, Nabisco team up for fall favorites promo

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS and Nabisco announced plans Wednesday for "the biggest fall television consumer promotion ever," an advertising blitz that links the network's fall lineup with Nabisco's cookies and crackers.

The September "America's Favorites" promotion will include a viewer contest with a \$1 million grand prize. The total retail value of prizes would be about \$40 million and the total value of all the advertising media would be about \$50 million, said CBS spokesman Jim Byrne.

"We believe in premiere week," said George Schweitzer, CBS' senior vice president for marketing and communications. "The beach is empty, school is back in right after Labor Day and the next thing everybody wants is new television programs."

Nabisco expects about 60,000 to 70,000 retailers to participate, said Barbara S. Thomas, a senior vice president for marketing.

Nabisco Biscuit's more than \$3 billion in annual sales dominate its market, with the No. 1 cookie (Oreo), the No. 1 cracker (Ritz), the No. 1 chocolate chip cookie (Chips Ahoy!) and the No. 1 "snack cracker" (Wheat Thins). The company intends to use the promotion to launch several new brands this fall, said Ms. Thomas. She would not identify the new brands.

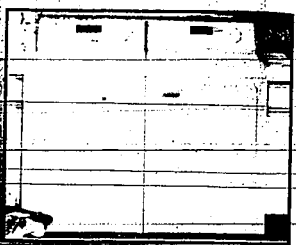
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
